- 8. Continued interest in the welfare and work of the Methodist Orphanage.
- 9. Enlistment of every Methodist woman in effective service in the Woman's Society of Christian Service.
- 10. Larger circulation of the North Carolina Christian Advocate and the Christian Advocate.
- Every minister of the Conference a member of the Conference Brotherhood; increase in number of lay non-beneficiary members.
- Unrelenting opposition to the liquor traffic, both legal and illegal.
- 13. A sense of Christian fellowship one with another and with Jesus Christ that will give us strength sufficient for an effective ministry to every person who looks to us in the tragic day in which we live.

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE

for

THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of

THE METHODIST CHURCH

(The following rules aim only to meet situations and needs not provided for in the Methodist Discipline.)

I. RULES OF ORDER

- Roberts' Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these rules.
- No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that the time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
- 3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
- 4. When the report of a committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the Chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
- 5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the Chairman judges that he has exhausted his privilege.
- 6. Voting shall be a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea and nay" vote, if taken, shall be by a signed ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

- The Secretary: The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually by the Conference, at its first session; and on nominations arising from the floor.
- Assistant Secretaries: The Secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
- 3. Statisticians. There shall be a Conference Statistician and an Assistant Statistician both of whom shall be elected annually by the Conference on nomination of the Conference Secretary. The Conference Statistician shall use the form found on pages 95 and 96 of the 1942 Conference Journal in making his report to the Conference.

- The Conference Stenographer. The Conference Secretary shall employ the Conference Stenographer.
- 5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given the above officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said offices. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.
- 6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, The Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.
- The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
- 8. Board Treasurers: All Board Treasurers shall be required to file financial statements, annually, with the reports of their respective Boards. These financial statements shall be published in the Conference Journal.
- 9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host Church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers; and this shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
- 10. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This Committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the quadrennium. This Committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The Committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than April 1, if possible.
- 11. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Super-intendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of this Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the Memorial Service. The Conference Secretary shall be the Chairman of this Committee.
- 12. Committee on Daily Minutes: A Committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
- Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
- 14. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
- 15. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

- All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (type-written if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary before the report or resolution shall be read to the Conference for consideration.
- Any amendment offered to any paper and all motions of more than a single sentence must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary.
- 3. Any resolution involving the expenditure of Conference Funds shall be presented to (or the approval shall be secured of) the Commission on World Service and Finance. The same rule shall apply for resolutions seeking consent to solicit funds in the several congregations for Conference schools or institutions; provided that the pastor must be made aware of amounts solicited and secured.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be selected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
- The District Superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in duplicate, to the Conference Secretary.
- Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made to the Conference Secretary, in written form, through the District Superintendent of each District.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND STATISTICS

- Each pastor shall complete tables I and II of his annual report to Conference and transmit the same to the Conference Statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening of Conference.
- 2. Table III shall be completed and turned in at the time of registration, the first day of Conference.
- Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
- 4. Table III shall be made out in even dollars only.
- Tables I, II, and III shall be printed in the Conference Journal only by charges.
- A fourth table of individual church reports shall be compiled by the Statisticians from the pastors' reports. This table shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

- Editor: The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility
 of editing and making contracts for publication of the Conference Journal,
 in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the
 Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The Editor shall have full authority
 to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
- One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent each of the following: The Conference Claimants, the Educational Institutions,

the General Boards, the Publishing House, the Lay Members of the Conference, the Lay Members of the Conference Boards. Ten copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge.

VII. DISTRICTS

- 1. The number of Districts shall be seven.
- 2. A District Conference shall be held annually in each District.
- Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.
- 4. The District and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on Nomination of the District Superintendents and the Conference Lay Leader.
- 5. The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish to the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician, as early in the year as possible, an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished to the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these official copies are to be sent to the Secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 6. Each District Superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conference. The figures furnished by the District Superintendent to the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
- 7. We call attention of the District Superintendents to Paragraph 332 (1) 1940 Discipline and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

 These Rules of Order and Procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided, the rule fixing the number of Districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference Session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

 These Rules of Order and Procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

PART I

Acting in accordance with the Discipline of the Methodist Church, the edition of 1940, under authority of Par. 840, your Commission recommends:

- 1. That the annual salary of each of the seven District Superintendents shall be set at \$4,800.00, including expenses attendant to their offices.
- 2. That 7% of a sum equal to amount estimated for the then current Conference year for the pastor and assistant pastor, if any, of each and every charge in the Conference, be apportioned to each charge, said sum to be remitted to the Conference Treasurer, who shall administer it according to the financial plan as stated in Paragraph 840 of the Discipline of 1940. Provided, however, that the District Stewards of each and every District may, if they so elect, estimate a sum equal to seven per cent of the combined estimated salaries of all pastors and assistant pastors, if any, in the district for the then current Conference Year, and distribute said sum among all the charges of the district according to their ability to pay.
- 3. That we authorize the Conference Treasurer to borrow, from month to month, an amount up to fifty per cent of the combined monthly deficit of salaries of the District Superintendents.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

THE SUSTENTATION FUND

When the North Carolina Conference in its 1941 session adopted a resolution providing for a sustentation fund for ministerial support, the responsibility for the distribution of the money was laid upon the Board of Missions and Church Extension. The Board is, herewith, submitting the first annual report of its work in this new capacity.

report of its work in this new capacity.

Several problems had to be dealt with before allocations could be satisfactorily made. The old method of making appropriations could not be followed, therefore, a new plan had to be adopted. The sustentation resolution did not specify just who were eligible for the minimum salary. The Board interpreted the will of the Conference to mean that all who had been admitted on trial

should receive the minimum, but it was uncertain in regard to supplies. An investigation showed that some of the supplies were students, some teachers, some mail carriers, and some doing other types of work which meant that only part time service was given to the churches. Among the supplies who were supposed to give full service, some were receiving from the churches more than the minimum. What the Board finally did was to appropriate the necessary money to meet the minimum salary scale for all ministers in the Conference and all supplies who were giving full time service, and to make appropriations to others on the basis of requests from the District Superintendents, as was the custom under the old plan.

The Board is of the opinion that the Conference has acted very wisely in adopting the sustentation plan. After receiving the copy of a survey of fortyfour Conference sustentation plans throughout the Methodist Church in this country it is quite obvious that in several respects the North Carolina Conference plan is superior to the others. The success of the system is attested by the excellent spirit shown in the response of the churches and in the fact that

the first year's results are especially gratifying.

The Board received from the Conference \$14,738.78, distributed \$12,-

318.84, and has on hand a balance of \$2,419.94.

In addition to the amount distributed from the Conference sustentation fund, the Duke Endowment provided \$11,370.00 for the support of rural ministers in the Conference, making a total of \$23,688.84, used to supplement the salaries of ministers.

Based upon the experience during this first year, the Board makes the

following recommendations:

- 1. That appropriations to the ministers and supplies of the Conference, who give full-time service, be made automatically on the minimum salary scale as early as the necessary information is provided.
- 2. That such support as may be necessary for the ministers and supplies of the Conference who give only part time service shall be provided by the old method used in appropriating mission funds.
- 3. That the Board be authorized to make needed adjustments after the appropriations are made if during the year additional information calls for such adjustments.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

CITY MISSIONARY SOCIETIES

For several years this board has advocated the organization of City Societies to promote the interests of Methodism in cities of ten thousand or more populition. The Discipline provides for such organizations, and the General Conference has set up machinery to establish them and assist in their promotion, in Paragraphs 962-976. It is the purpose of the City Missionary Society to co-ordinate the work of the church in such cities and contiguous territories and to promote evangelization. It may organize Church Schools and Churches, aid the weak churches, and render certain other services, such as securing real estate for the erection of churches, the adaptation of down-town churches to their altered environment, the securing and holding of endowments for the City Society and dependent churches, conducting missions for needy groups, the development of open-air evangelism, the support of rescue missions, and the relief of the sick and destitute. It can be seen from these statements that there

is a large field of service open to City Missionary Societies.

Four such societies have been organized in Wilmington, Raleigh, Burlington, and Durham. These societies are functioning in such a manner as to give ample justification for their existence. Those who are privileged to observe the work of these societies at close range are thoroughly convinced that there is the possi

bility of real achievement through these agencies.

We recommend that District Superintendents, Pastors, and leading laymen seriously consider the organization of City Missionary Societies in all our cities of 10,000 or more population. The time seems especially ripe now for such action, due to the rapid growth in population in many sections, and also to the further fact that money for the development of such a program can be secured perhaps with greater ease now than it can be after the war. It is the responsibility and privilege of the church to minister to the spiritual needs of the multitudes, and in many instances we are not exerting our full strength. While we are not unmindful of our duty to carry the gospel to the ends of the earth, we need also to enter the open doors that lie immediately before us within the bounds of our Conference.

REPORT NO. 3—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The Board of Missions and Church Extension has reviewed the achievements of the past year and is gratified with the missionary interest manifested in many ways throughout the Conference.

The Commission on Town and Country Work has made a good start in this its first year of organization, as will be noted by referring to its report submitted to this Conference.

mitted to this Conference

The war has intensified the need within the bounds of our Conference as is indicated by a number of new projects undertaken, especially in defense areas. In some instances new churches are being organized with ministers and deaconesses assigned to them.

We were pleased with the fine response given the special appeal made last December for funds to be used in Camp Areas. The offering amounted to

\$7,038.29, and has been of great service to several such communities.

Based upon the needs indicated by the appeals coming to us from the District Superintendents and pastors, and being encouraged by the response to this cause, after careful consideration this board by unanimous vote adopted the following resolution:

"That the Conference again ask for an offering of at least \$15,000 to be used in defense areas; that a committee consisting of all District Superintendents, together with one other person from each district named by the Superintendent constitute a committee to promote the offering, and the executive committee of the Board of Missions and Church Extension be the distributing agency for the funds."

We call attention to the Missionary Institutes to be held and the book, "The Church After the War," written by Bishop Francis J. McConnell, to be used. We trust our institutions this year will be among the best ever held. The dates for these institutes follow:

Appropriations to ministers' salaries will be made as soon as the necessary facts can be obtained, and this information will be published in the Journal.

The splendid response by the Church to the week of Dedication this year is very gratifying. We recommend full cooperation in the 1944 Week of Dedication Observance. Special emphasis should be given to the spiritual aspects of the plan.

We urge all our people to cooperate as fully as possible with the Bishops' Crusade for a just and durable peace. Wherever feasible District seminars on the Christian basis for world order should be held following the Church-wide

meetings.

We recommend the re-appointment of Rev. F. S. Love as Conference

Missionary Secretary.

We recommend the appointment of J. M. Ormond and H. C. Smith as members of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

We nominate J. M. Ormond and M. B. Smith for membership on the

General Board of Missions and Church Extension.

Youth assemblies continue to draw larger attendance despite wartime conditions. Church Schools and Vacation Schools were taken directly to children in crowded defense areas and in rural communities. We led all Conferences in the Southeastern Jurisdiction in delegates at the Leadership School at Lake Junaluska, with 35 registered. We had our largest delegation ever at the Young People's Leadership Conference at Lake Junaluska, with 36 present. Substantial advance has been made in the observance of special days, namely, Methodist Student Day, Church School Rally Day, and Race Relations Day, with increased offerings in each instance.

For the coming year we wish to emphasize, throughout the Conference, the United Christian Education Advance, the Crusade for the New World Order, Bible Conference work, and children's work in war areas.

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

The enrollmment of students for the current academic year in our four educational institutions is 1,068 in the three colleges, and 3,602 in Duke University. High Point College is instructing a unit of the College Training Detachment of the Army Air Force. Duke University's large facilities are being used for the training of many hundreds of men for both the Army and Navy, including the Army Finance School, the V-12 Naval Reserve Unit, a unit of the Naval R.O.T.C., Marine Corps and Coast Guard Units, the Fiscal School, and the School of Military Government. In all these units there are over 2,200 young men in military organizations on the campus. It is noteworthy that over one hundred graduates of the Duke Divinity School are now serving as Chaplains in armed forces, together with many more graduates of Trinity College serving in the same capacity.

High Point and Louisburg College have high hopes of the early liquidation of all indebtedness. Louisburg College has made another increase in teachers' salaries, hoping soon to reach the level indicated by the Southern Association requirements. During the year the indebtedness was reduced by \$10,000.

Since our last Conference the debt at High Point College has been reduced by an amount of \$45,000. During the coming year the 20th anniversary of the founding of the college will be signficantly observed. 86% of all students at High Point are North Carolina young people. There are 24 ministerial students, 18 being Methodists.

Greensboro College has a capacity enrollment, 10% above last year. A building program is urgently needed to care for students who are anxious to be admitted. About one-sixth of the senior class majored in religion.

The Pastors' School and Scarritt College deserve our usual approval and recommendation.

Chadwick, Nathan Johnson, M. G. Mann, and Mrs. Belle Davis Cooper.

We recommend the confirmation and appointment of R. W. Bradshaw to succeed himself as Conference Secretary of Education and Director of Young People's Work at a salary of \$3,750.00, with an allowance of \$750.00, for maintenance of his home.

We announce the continuing services of Miss Lorene Weaver as Conference Director of Children's Work, and Mrs. La Fon Vereen as Office Secretary and Assistant Director of Youth Work.

The Financial Statement of our Treasurer, C. K. Proctor, and the certificate of audit by M. E. Parham, are appended hereto.

REPORT NO. 1-BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Board of Lay Activities accepts its responsibilities in connection with the total program of the Church and makes that program its objective for the new year.

The Board will place special emphasis on the matters of stewardship, of a training program for Methodist Laymen, and of finances in the local church.

In connection with the proposed training program, the following plan has been carefully worked out by a committee from our Board and is herewith made a part of this report:

"We recommend to the North Carolina Conference that every Methodist in the Conference be given the opportunity and be urged to study the Methodist Church and its program.

The aims of such a program are to develop in Methodist people the following things:

1-Intelligent understanding of the Church and its program.

2—Attitudes of loyalty and devotion toward the Church and its program.

3-Skills in service to the Church and its program.

We suggest that a course of study be worked out in detail and be made available to those who will use it. In broad outline, we feel that twelve paired lessons should be included under the following six major headings:

1-History and Development

2-Organization

3-Ministry

4-Lay Organizations and Activities

5-Financial Program

6-Church Related Organizations and Institutions

Some of the organized groups that might use this course of study are listed here:

1-Woman's Society of Christian Service

2-Youth Fellowship Meetings

3-Church School

4-Stewardship Institute

5-Official Board Meetings

6-Certain worship services.

To prepare a syllabus for this course of study, we have sought and obtained the assistance and assistance and cooperation of the Board of Education, The Woman's Society of Christian Service, and Bishop Purcell, in that each has named one person to serve with one member of our Board as a Special Course of Study Committee. It will be the duty of this committee to prepare and distribute the syllabus on "THE METHODIST CHURCH AND ITS PROGRAM." It is urged that this work be completed by January 1, 1944. The members of this committee are as follows:

B. G. Childs-Board of Lay Activities

H. E. Spence-Named by Board of Education

Mrs. B. F. Boone-Named by Woman's Society of Christian Service

Leon Russell-Named by Bishop Purcell (Temporary Chairman)

This project is fostered and supported by the Board of Lay Activities and the expense incident thereto will be borne by our Board.

At a retreat held during late August much was accomplished. Our Board has decided to hold another such meeting on August 15th and 16th next year.

Inasmuch as Laymen's Day comes in February each year, we believe that increased lay activities within the districts should be in evidence during that month. We plan, therefore, to hold a one day meeting of the various district Boards of Lay Activities in each District during February and prior to Laymen's Day which comes on February 20th. In this effort we earnestly seek the help and cooperation of the District Superintendents and pastors.

During the conference year just closing, Dr. M. L. Matthews, District Lay Leader of the Fayetteville District, has died. In his death the Board of Lay Activities and Methodism generally have lost a fine Christian leader. We mourn Dr. Matthews' passing and desire to extend our sympathy and love to his family. Appropriate resolutions were made at the retreat of the Board of

Lay Activities in Oriental in August.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

With the heavy demands of war upon the adult life of the nation there is danger of allowing our children and youth to become the forgotten people for the duration. But Christian people know this would result in the blackout of our vision of a new world wherein dwells righteousness, brother-hood and peace. The very destiny of the nation is wrapped up in our young.

The North Carolina Conference, in its Orphanage in Raleigh, has three hundred of these children and young people upon whom so much will depend in the years ahead, and, in the words of Superintendent A. S. Barnes, "the Conference is doing its best to show the world that we put a high estimate on childhood and youth,

The work, and worth, of the Methodist Orphanage is well known and its story need not be retold in this report. Your Board, however, would call attention to the new and heavier demands that will be made upon our home as this tragic war continues. Many fathers have already given their all in defense of their country and many more will never return to their children and their homes. The Church must prepare for the emergency that this situation is bound to create.

Your Board feels that we shall be made ready to meet these larger demands in proportion to the way in which our churches are given the facts about the

Orphanage and its work. The splendid fifth Sunday Church School programs being sent out from the Orphanage and used by hundreds of our Church Schools are paving the way for an ever-increasing support of our Home. The purpose of these programs is educational, not financial, but when our people understand the type of work being done, they respond with their money. Your board recommends the continued use of these fifth Sunday programs.

In the ever-widening program of character building and education the

In the ever-widening program of character building and education the Orphanage has recently organized a Boy Scout Troop, and just now the organization of a Girl Scout Troop has been completed. These are meeting a long felt need in the home, and the board wishes to express appreciation to the friends outside the orphanage who helped to make the organization of these

troops possible.

Under the plan adopted by the Conference in its meeting in Wilson last November, the Orphanage is now operating on a balanced budget. This plan is evidently very satisfactory to the Superintendent and his staff, to the Board

of Trustees and to the churches of the Conference.

We appreciate the fine work of many of the churches in making use of the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons in raising their orphanage apportionment, and we respectfully request that this be continued and that as much of the

apportionment as possible be raised during November and December.

We are glad to report an ever-increasing interest in, and support of the Golden Cross in our Conference. Here again we see the value of giving our people the facts, and in proportion as they are made to see that this is a society with a Christ-like program ministering to the poor and the suffering, they respond with their gifts of money. As Conference director of Golden Cross, Professor F. S. Aldridge has been constant in his efforts to give the people the facts about this work. We recommend his re-appointment and also the appointment of Golden Cross Directors in each of the Districts of the Conference.

We also recommend that the month of May be designated in our Conference as Golden Cross Enrollment month, and that 95 per cent of all funds raised for this cause be administered by the director of Golden Cross within the bounds of the Conference, and that the remaining five per cent be put into the

General Golden Cross Fund.

The following persons have been re-nominated for membership on the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Orphanage for a term of six years: Mrs. G. G. Allen, Graham Woodard, J. P. Gibbons, Wesley Foreman, J. C. Biggs, T. H. Calvert, E. L. Hillman, and A. H. Vann. We recommend their election.

We also recommend the appointment of Rev. A. S. Barnes as Superin-

tendent of the Methodist Orphanage at a salary of \$3,600 per year.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Methodism from its earliest days has made war on the use, manufacture, and sale of intoxicants. It has recognized liquor as the worst enemy of the home and the church, and has urged upon its membership to taste not and handle not that which steals away the brains and undermines the character of those who

tarry long at the cup that inebriates.

Today as never before, the duty rests upon Christian people of protecting the youth upon whose clear heads and strong arms rests the hopes of free people. On the day war was declared, the saloon and the still should have been outlawed at least for the duration of the global stuggle. The brave men who battle in the skies, on land and on the sea need to be free from intoxicants. Freedom from temptation to drink would strengthen the men in all our armed forces. The failure in the republic and in the state to afford this protection is to be deplored. It is not too late for Congress to give us wartime prohibition and our State to close the ABC joints and free our country from the bane of intoxication. We petition our Senators and Representatives in Congress and our Governor to lead in these desirable ends.

This Conference rejoices in the organization of the Allied Church League for the Abolition of Beverage Alcohol, Inc., of which Methodists were among the pioneers. We pledge to that righteous organization full-hearted and militant support in the plans to make this a sober commonwealth in accordance with the twice expressed will of the people. In 1908, the people of North Carolina by a majority of 44,196 votes ended the legal manufacture and sale of intoxicants in every part of the State. In 1933 when a majority of the states voted to repeal the Eighteenth Amendment, North Carolina citizens voted against such repeal by a vote of 300,054 to 115,482. In defiance of this expressed will of the people of the State, we have witnessed the sabotaging of the prohibition law by devious methods until now twenty-five counties have liquor shops, miscalled Alcoholic Board of Control. The officials and employees of ABC stores ought to be forbidden by law to take any part in politics. The provisions of the Hatch Act should be applied to them.

This State has advanced education by a State system, supported by State funds. It abolished the old dirt highways by local control and placed the road program under State direction with State funds and North Carolina was thereby enabled to build the best highway system in the country. Committed to uniform State-wide control in schools and roads, we call upon citizens and officials to make it easy to return to the State system of Prohibition, now undermined by the misleading name of control by certain counties. Every ABC store in North Carolina and every joint where intoxicants are sold exist contrary to the expressed will of the whole people of North Carolina. They are conducted in defiance of the accepted State System which worked well before certain counties had themselves exempted from the State control which had been approved by the voters of the whole state. The policy of the liquor forces has been "to divide and conquer," a course similar to that which Hitler adopted when, denying he had dreams of world domination, he conquered one country after another.

The time has come—and the Christian churches have organized in solid phalanx—for the good people of North Carolina to demand that there be no longer a sabotaging of the will of the people, and to insist upon a return to a State system to put a stop to the evils of the liquor traffic, a traffic which has twice been outlawed by a large majority of the voters of the State.

REPORT NO. 2-BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

We urge:

- (1) That the State-wide Allied Church League be perfected in its organization and made to enlist the school forces, the women's clubs, the women's organizations of the churches, the W. C. T. U., and other agencies interested in human betterment in a united effort for the overthrow of beverage alcohol.
- (2) That the schools of the state be urged to teach the physical, mental, social and moral effects of alcohol on the human system and on corporate human life. To this end we request the next General Assembly to provide for more effective teaching of temperance in the public schools by putting an all-time person at the head of our temperance education in the public schools.
- (3) That there be organized county leagues supplementary to the state league to deal more effectively with local situations.
- (4) That \$2,500.00 be asked for the budget of the Allied Church League, this amount has been included in the budget of the North Carolina Conference.

We hereby pledge the hearty allegiance and earnest support of the North Carolina Conference to the Allied Church League. For sane, yet militant, efforts we are committed in this crusade against beverage alcohol in all the state of North Carolina.

REPORT NO. 1—COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

T

It is apparent that, as has been said, this war is now entering its final phase. This being so, the duty of the Church to exert its influence for the making of a righteous peace becomes even more pressing. It is in recognition of this fact that we are now beginning, under the leadership of the Council of Bishops, a "Crusade for a New World Order," the purpose of which is to "mobilize and register Christian sentiment and influence to help insure" a just and lasting peace. We recommend that this Crusade be made a major emphasis in our total work during the coming year. In particular, we recommend cooperation in the Crusade in these ways:

- 1. By promoting attendance on the mass meetings to be held in this area.
- 2. By giving to the Crusade a primary place on the programs of all our District and Conference meetings.
- 3. By the organization and active use of a committee on World Peace in every local church, as provided in Paragraph 1297 of the Discipline. We request that the District Superintendents on their first round ask in each Quarterly Conference the question, "Has the Committee on World Peace been organized?" and emphasize the importance of this committee's work at the present time. Among the activities of this committee would be—
- (a) To provide courses in the local church on the issues involved in the making of the peace. As a basis for these studies we recommend the Report of the Delaware Conference, the Six Pillars of Peace proposed by the Federal Council of Churches, and "Making This Our Last War," by Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam.
- (b) To distribute among the local congregation materials furnished by the Crusade Committee and the General Commission on World Peace. These materials may be obtained through the Conference committee either free or at cost.
- 4. By the publication at regular intervals in the North Carolina Christian Advocate of a column designed to inform our people on policies and actions of our government affecting the coming peace, particularly legislation proposed in Congress.

As we plan for peace there emerge three primary issues which must be

faced at the beginning:

First, will our nation either alone or in alliance with other powers undertake at the close of this war to dominate the world and impose its policies upon other peoples? Or will we enter on the basis of equality with all peoples everywhere into a genuinely cooperative effort to achieve international organization? It may now be impossible for us to foresee the details of postwar organization. But this basic question can and must be answered in the immediate future. Indeed, the answer is already being shaped as the war proceeds. At the heart of this problem lies the doctrine of absolute national sovereignty. The revision and limitation of that doctrine is an obvious practical necessity if we are to achieve world order. Just as a group of individuals, each acknowledging no authority above himself, would not be a community but an anarchy; so nations which hold as their supreme reason for being their own preservation and claim each to be judge in its own cause cannot form a world community. But more profoundly, such a claim on the part of the state constitutes idolatry, for it is exalting the nation into the place of God. Against that sin the Church must speak, and call upon the nation to become one in a community of nations under God.

Second, will the world's physical resources be used for the benefit of certain peoples, either privileged nations or privileged groups within nations, at the expense of others? Or will post-war economic arrangements be motivated by a purpose to improve the lot of all men everywhere? We hold, with the Delaware Conference, that "the whole earth is given by God to all men for their common dwelling place, and the resources of the earth should be used as

His gift to the whole human family."

Third, the problem of relations between the races is of crucial significance for the future peace. We commend the recent action of Congress to repeal the Chinese Exclusion Act and to admit members of that race to our country and its citizenship under the quota system. We ask our government to take, as rapidly as possible, further steps to clarify its aims toward recognition of racial equality and the protection of minority groups. We are deeply concerned over the growing racial tension in our own country, as evidenced in recent race riots and other expressions of violent feeling. We Americans cannot help to build a united world except as a united people. We request the leaders of the different races to enter more frequently and fully into consultation for the purpose of promoting understanding and cooperation. We urge upon our pastors the responsibility which their position places upon them to become influences for reconciliation in their local communities. And we exhort Christians of all races to exercise especially now the Christian virtues of patience and forbearance one with another.

While the Church counsels the State and the people, however, she must be mindful of her own shortcomings in this regard. At this point we have in our own life as a Church followed, not the mind of our Master, but the customs of the world. When we consult the New Testament, we are persuaded that there are no races in Christ. But we have for so long accepted another standard that we do not now see how we can practice the complete fellowship which He demands. In deep humility, therefore, we pray for His guidance as to how we may overcome "our unhappy divisions" and for the coming of the day when

we shall be, in fact as in ideal, all one in Christ.

While we seek and declare God's way of peace, the Church must give ever larger practical expression to a Christ-like spirit of mercy for a stricken world. As the devastation of war spreads, the need of men increases. As new areas become accessible to us, we must move in to give food to the starving, healing to the sick, shelter to the homeless, help and comfort to the distressed. By such a ministry of compassion the Church will best vindicate her authority as the spiritual guide for man's future.

We urge, therefore, continued and increased giving through the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief. In particular, we recommend that each of our churches receive at each communion service an offering for the needy, and that at least half of these offerings be directed to the Methodist Fellowship of

Suffering and Service.

We also recommend that our pastors present to their young people the opportunities for full- or part-time service through the agencies of our Church, as listed in the directory recently published by the Methodist Service Committee.

We request that copies of this report be sent by the Secretary of the

Conference to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.

REPORT NO. 2—COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

By action of the General Conference of 1940, "those of our members, who, as conscientious objectors, seek exemption from military training in schools and colleges or from military service anywhere or at any time have the authority and support of their Church." During the year this committee has undertaken in three principal ways to carry out this declaration of purpose:

1. By counselling with individual members of our churches on questions

arising concerning their classification under the Selective Service Act.

2. By arranging church contacts and religious counsel for members of the Civilian Public Service Unit which has been established at Duke University Hospital under the direction of the Methodist Commission on World Peace.

3. By raising funds for the support of our members assigned to Civilian Public Service. We are glad to report that, after taking credit for the amounts contributed directly by the men themselves or their families, the committee has been able to pay, up to the time of the latest available statement—September 1, 1943—the full cost of maintenance of the men from our Conference in Civilian Public Service. Ours is one of two annual conferences in the Methodist Church which has achieved this record. The following is a statement of all monies handled by the committee during the year:

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

Your Committee on Evangelism begs leave to submit the following report: A limited vision of our world today brings us face to face with the fact that these are indeed terrible times in which to live, yet, the opportunity to live gloriously was never greater. Conditions throughout the world are appalling. The old world is passing, a new world is waiting to be born. These conditions have been made possible due to un-Christian attitudes and practices on the part of people of all lands. The need for Christ is quite evident. In Him alone, and the practice of His way of life, is to be found the only solution to the problems which confront us.

Herein lies the work of Evangelism: to publish abroad the good news through which Christ shall be known, loved, and obeyed by each and every person in every land. Thus, human relations will be Christianized, misunderstandings will disappear and the brotherhood of man will pass out of the theoretical into the practical realm of life.

The problems of our world are man-made. Their cause may be summed up in one word Sin. Man has sinned and today the human race suffers because

of the sins committed. The solution of the problem is found in Christ and in Him alone do we have any hope for the future. As individuals and as a church, we must preach Christ and proclaim the Salvation through faith in

Him, for which the hungry world yearns.

The Christian religion has from its beginning been based on a very personal relationship between God and man. As God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself, even so, He is today revealing Himself and His way of life to men, through men. If His Kingdom is to come in the hearts of all men, those who profess to know Him today must bear testimony of His saving power to others. This calls for a personal knowledge of Christ based upon experience.

We acknowledge with shame, that the feeling of responsibility to share Christ with others, rests so lightly upon the hearts of the people called Methodists. This is evident by the fact that last year 41 persons including the ministers of the North Carolina Conference were required to work a whole year, to win one person to Christ on profession of faith. The Kingdom of God comes all too slowly, due to the indifference and unconcern on the part of those who have acknowledged Christ as their Saviour.

We would, therefore, make the following recommendations:

1. That as a church we strive earnestly to create a feeling of compassionate concern for those who know not Christ,

2. That we use all available organizations and means provided by our Church to enlist individuals of the Church in the evangelistic efforts to reach the last and the least of every community.

3. That we encourage our people in making greater use of the Bible as a source book for inspirational reading and urge them to give themselves to

intercessory prayer and diligent effort to win others to Christ.

4. That this Conference go on record as favoring the sponsorship of a Home Visitation Evangelistic Crusade under the leadership of our Bishop, District Superintendents, and a District Secretary of Evangelism appointed by the Bishop from each District, directed by Dr. Guy H. Black, Associate Secretary of the General Commission on Evangelism of The Methodist Church, to the end that every church and community of the North Carolina Conference shall be thoroughly awakened to a sense of responsibility to make Christ known, loved, and obeyed by all.

5. That special emphasis be placed upon Evangelism in the Pastors' School and at Lake Junaluska during the summer. That men of outstanding ability and experience be brought to these centers of training to teach and lead our

ministers and laymen in the fine art of winning others to Christ.

6. That in humility we confess our sin of complacency and unconcern. As individuals and as a church, we do rededicate ourselves anew to follow cur Lord in leading others into a personal commitment to Christ.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC., TO THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

This corporation is jointly owned by the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences. Its main business, as you know is the publication of the North Carolina Christian Advocate. This paper has about 10,000 subscribers within the bounds of the two Conferences. The assets of the Corporation as reflected by the audit is \$111,141.85, after deducting \$85,747.55 for depreciation, and this seems to us excessive depreciation. The Advocate Building, built at a cost exceeding \$74,000.00 is in good physical condition and it and the other property are adequately insured.

Last year, the business was conducted at a loss of \$2,788.05. We are happy to say that by rigid economy and an increase of paid subscriptions we are able to show a net profit of 915.99. The figures for last year and this year do

not take into consideration depreciation.

In our report to last Conference, we said "The Board desires to observe the spirit of the Retirement Law of the Methodist Church, and the present editors expect to retire October, 1943. The Board has already appointed a committee to find a suitable editor." The Board has due diligence to perform this promise; but owing to the increased demand upon the ministry for furnishing Chaplains and workers in the armed forces of the United States, it was deemed

best to continue the present arrangement for the coming year.

Many years ago, Brother Frank S. Lambeth, now deceased, gave to the Advocate the sum of \$500.00 as a nucleus for an Endowment Fund. At that time the Advocate was enjoying a considerable income from advertising and was paying its own way without trouble and the matter was not pressed. Times, however, have changed and a religious newspaper can now get very little advertising, and the Advocate finds its financial position increasingly difficult. During this year the editors of the Advocate inaugurated a campaign for procuring an Endowment for the Advocate. The matter was presented to us at our regular meeting on the 14th of October. We believe it is a wise suggestion, and hereby request the two Conferences in North Carolina to authorize and sponsor a campaign to procure an \$100,000.00 Endowment Fund for the Advocate during the coming year. The Advocate already has bonds, stocks and notes in excess of \$25,000.00 which, by resolution at our regular meeting was made a part of the Endowment Fund. With this start, and the hearty cooperation of the ministry and laity of the two Conferences, we should easily make the goal of \$100,000.00 this year.

The term of N. E. Edgerton expired with the present meeting, and the corporation has nominated him to succeed himself and respectfully requests that

your Conference elect him to that position.

The Corporation elected the following officers for the ensuing year: President, Rev. A. J. Hobbs; Vice-President, N. L. Eure; Secretary, Thos. C. Hoyle.

Editors of the North Carolina Christian Advocate and Business Managers of

the corporation: Rev. A. W. Plyler and Rev. M. T. Plyler.

We respectfully solicit from the preachers and laymen of North Carolina Methodism a fair share of their job printing, but since the main business of the corporation is to publish a religious paper for the Methodists of North Carolina we would stress the increase of circulation of the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION

In view of the successful Wesley Foundation work which has been enterprised at Fairmont Church, Raleigh, for serving the Methodist students at State College, at Meredith, and at the North Carolina School for the Blind, we recommend to the Annual Conferences in North Carolina:

That the Wesley Foundation work at Fairmont Church be included in the work for students supervised by this Commission, and that it share in the financial resources of the Commission together with the Wesley Foundation at Chapel Hill and College Place, Greensboro.

Due to war-time conditions it has been impossible to secure and keep men us Directors at Chapel Hill, and Fairmont, Raleigh. Effective leadership has been given at these places by Mrs. R. W. Browning and Miss Juanita Stott.

FAIRMONT CHURCH, RALEIGH

The number of civilian students has been very much reduced, as the campus has been filled with service men. Of the 271 Methodist civilian students, 203 are affiliate members at Fairmont, and 8 have joined the church by profession or by letter. These students have contributed to Methodist student interest an amount of \$95.00 for the Methodist Youth Fund, and similar objects. Fifty students from the School for the Blind attend services each Sunday. At the beginning of the class period for students the day's devotional topic in the Upper Room is read by blind young people. The Braille edition is presented to two cottages of the blind students by the Methodist students. There are hundreds of Methodist young men at State College in the United States army. About 100 of these attend services each Sunday. Twenty-eight are affiliate members and three have joined as regular members. A fellowship hour for army students is held on Wednesday nights.

CHAPEL HILL

Every effort, in keeping with military regulations, is being made to serve the spiritual needs of the Methodist students. The membership of the Foundation's Student Council has changed rapidly on account of war conditions, but it has continued monthly meetings, and promoted a well-planned program for each term. Sunday evening fellowship suppers have been held regularly, Student workers maintain office hours at the church each day for any needed service.

COLLEGE PLACE, GREENSBORO

There are now 710 Methodist students at Woman's College. Of the 307 new students 116 are affiliate members of Greensboro churches. Students have contributed \$175.00 to the budget of the Wesley Foundation. The young women continue their social service activities, including the girls' club work at Coopertown. A large interest now centers in war-time activity, such as service rendered at the local Red Cross office. In cooperation with the Board of Stewards at College Place, an open house for soldiers and young people is being held every Sunday afternoon. A club of 10 subscriptions to Motive, our national Methodist student magazine, is being provided for the service men at the camp, BTC No. 10 in Greensboro. Two young women who graduated last June have entered the service of the church, one as a pastor's assistant, and the other with the Board of Education in Nashville.

REPORT OF METHODIST STUDENT CENTER

The Methodist Student Center in Greenville is truly a "Home away from home" for the 291 Methodist students, in an enrollment of 939, on the campus of East Carolina Teachers College. The Center, a six-room bungalow, is located at 409 Holly St., just across from the campus, near a corner where the students pass on their way to the business section of the city. The Counselor, Deaconess Mamiej Chandler, lives in the Center, and is there at all times to welcome the students and make them feel at home. The cozy living-room, with a piano and comfortable chairs, is a place for real fellowship. Students drop in to talk over matters of mutual interest, read books and magazines, listen to the radio, sing, or just sit quiet and relax before the open fire. "Coffectime," from 3:30 to 5:00 p. m. is a favorite time with the students, cooking-parties, "bag suppers," and waffle-breakfasts are enjoyed in the kitchen and dining-room. Council and Commission meetings are held in the Center.

The program for this college year is following the general program of the Wesley Foundation, and is set up under a Student Council and eight Commissions-Worship, Personnel, World Friendship, Community Service, Church Relations, Recreation, Music, and Publicity. The aim is to bring every Methodist student into active participaton in the program through one of these Commissions. The Wesley Foundation is the Church at work on the campus of the state college or university, therefore the program of the Wesley Foundation at East Carolina Teachers College is a vital part of Jarvis Memorial Church. An effort is made to bring every student into an affiliate membership in the local Church during his residence in college. The Wesley Foundation Choir leads the singing at the evening worship in the church on Sunday. A local committee from Jarvis Memorial, with the pastor, acts in an advisory capacity to the Counselor and supervises the financial program. The Student Class meets every Sunday morning as a part of the Youth Division of the Church School. The Counselor is leading this group in a study of "Jesus as a Person." Our students take part in programs of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and a committe from the W.S.C.S. assists the student Commission on Recreation in planning and giving various social events during the college year.

The objectives of our Wesley Foundation program is to give our students an interpretation of God through Jesus Christ which will be adequate for the living of these days and for the building of a world order that is Christian, to lead them into a personal commitment of themselves to Christ, and to find a

place of service through the Church.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Your Commission on Town and Country Work has found itself under certain physical limitations in attempting the work you have committed to us. Not only the work of the commission but the program has suffered because of limitations on travel. It has not been a fruitless year and there is promise of great things to come in the area of country work. There is a growing appreciation of this work and intelligent research is enriching the service of the church in this field. The only meeting of the commission during the year was immediately preceding this Conference. We present to the Conference the following suggestions as to program. Some of these are continued from a meeting held in Raleigh, January 8, 1942.

1. That a circulating library be set up in each District, the District Superintendent to designate some minister through which it may function.

That Rural Fellowships for the study of rural problems and means for a more effective ministry of the church in meeting these be established wherever practical. This might well be done in connection with Bible Conferences.

3. That the effort to have our rural churches indicated by markers be continued till all may know a Methodist church wherever it is,

4. The Commission in its January meeting named a committee composed of J. M. Ormond, Mrs. W. C. Chadwick and Robert W. Bradshaw to study and make suggestions relative to a Group Ministry. The committee in its report made the following suggestions which were approved by the commission:

"(a) We believe that there is definite value in the idea of ministers in certain adjoining rural charges working together as a unit to bring a combined impact on the areas they serve. "(b) We believe the success of such a venture depends upon ministers being placed in these areas who are committed to the idea and who can and will

work vigorously in promoting it.

"(c) We believe that such a project should be undertaken on a conservative scale, under conditions that would be possible in like areas in the Conference, and that the work should be expanded and extended only after a good foundation has been laid.

"(d) We believe that it would be a good start in the development of this idea if there would be set apart in each District a definite group ministry project composed of several charges, manned by men who are capable of making a contribution to the project and who would be interested in testing its possibilities, under the leadership of the District Superintendent, which could serve as an experiment for that District in this area of work.

"(e) Three areas in the Conference have been brought to the attention of your Commission as areas which might prove good places for such experimentation. These are: Green County in the New Bern District; Alamance and

Caswell Counties in the Durham District."

5. We are happy to report not only organization of Conference Methodist Rural Fellowship, but that vital progress has been made toward intelligent appreciation of the rural problem. Evidence of this is in the remarkable and scientific study made by the Rev. Key Taylor. It is a proposal of such vision and daring that every rural pastor might well study it. The Conference is grateful for a growing number of young leaders with vision, daring and faith adequate for this service. We bespeak for these and for the Commission the help and guidance of the District Superintendents.

6. From the first your Commission has been greatly concerned about an adequate support for our ministry. We rejoice in the great achievement of a minimum salary scale, but even more in the response of the Conference to this project. This has abundantly justified the men who projected this

movement. Its happiest results have been experienced in the rural community.

We recognize the limitations in these suggestions for an immediate program, but we are confident that achievement here opens the door for a larger service.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

For the past twenty four years the North Carolina Pastors' School has held consecutive annual sessions at Trinity College and Duke University. During the past nine years the Rural Church Institute has been held concurrently with the annual sessions.

Because of the government's large use of the facilities at Duke University in training service men the 1943 session could not be held there. At the invitation of Dr. L. L. Gobbel, President of Greensboro College, the twenty-fifth session of the Pastors' School and the tenth session of Rural Church Institute were held at Greensboro College, May 31 to June 5, 1943. On account of limited cormitory and dining room facilities the attendance was considerably below that of other years. Nine credit courses were offered. The number of credit students was 105. The number auditing classes and not receiving credit was 220.

There were four assembly periods and two class periods each day. The attendance upon the assembly periods was very gratifying and the speakers

were of high order.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The members of the North Carolina Council of Churches from the North Carolina Conference are pleased to present the following report on the work of the Council for the year just closed:

The North Carolina Council of Churches is entering its seventh year of service and is seeking in every way possible to fulfill its three-fold purpose,

which is:

1. To promote fellowship and mutual understanding among the followers of Christ constituting the several Communions of North Carolina.

2. To serve as a medium of interchurch advice and counsel on matters

affecting the progress of Christianity in the State.

3. To associate the Communions in such joint service as may achieve more

effectively the objectives of the Christian religion.

While it would be impossible to list here or describe even in part the full program, the following are a few of the activities in which the Council is continually engaged:

WEEKDAY RELIGIOUS EDUCATION: The movement for the teaching of Bible in the public schools of the state has had a phenomenal growth during recent years. In 1936, the year of the Council's birth, only about six communities made some provision for Biblical instruction in the public schools. As a result of the cooperative efforts on the part of the Council members and representative leaders across the state, such Bible courses are now being offered in more than 160 public schools in approximately 85 North Carolina communities. The number of students being reached has grown from 816 to over 20,000.

RADIO MINISTRY: Aside from sponsoring such programs as "The Churches Make News," heard weekly over WPTF, Raleigh, and now beginning its fourth year, the Council has continually sought to raise the standard of religious radio broadcasting. This has come about through work with personnel of both radio stations and groups of interested individuals in the local communities.

NEWS SERVICE: Papers throughout the state continue to express their appreciation for the service the Council is rendering in the field of religious journalism. For two years now weekly releases of the news of the churches have gone to the daily and semi-weekly papers.

SPECIAL OBSERVANCES: The Council has assumed responsibility for the promotion of such observances as those recognized by the Methodist church and other Communions. Such observances as the following have been promoted by the medium of the press, radio, denominational paper and through local groups, including ministerial associations and councils of churches:

World-wide Communion Sunday Universal Bible Sunday Race Relations Sunday World Day of Prayer Rural Life Sunday And many others STATE-WIDE STUDENT CONFERENCE: The Fourth Annual Student Conference, under the Council sponsorship, is scheduled to be held in Salisbury, November 19-21. These conferences are intended only for selected leaders among the college students and are designed to do for the students what the convocations do for ministers and other religious leaders; namely, develop a spirit of unity and fellowship across denominational lines.

BUREAU OF INFORMATION: The Council has been termed a "Bureau of Information" in that it is a clearing house for information which cannot be secured from other sources in the state.

CONCLUSION: The Council and the idea back of it is something more than an organization with headquarters in Durham, N. C. It is the churches of North Carolina in action. And whenever Christian men and women, regardless of denomination, class or color join together in doing those things that they cannot do separately, they become a part of the ecumenical movement.

We recommend that this report be incorporated in the Journal; the representatives again be named; and the Conference continue its financial contribution to this worthy organization.

JURISDICTIONAL BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

1. There shall be a Jurisdictional Board of Missions and Church Extension in the Southeastern Jurisdiction, auxiliary to the General Board of Missions and Church Extension, composed of the effective Bishops of the Jurisdiction, one preacher and one layman (man), elected by each Conference in the Jurisdiction on nomination of the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension, and one woman elected by each annual Conference in the Jurisdiction on nomination of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service. The Board shall meet annually and shall elect such officers and committees as it deems necessary to its work.

2. The duties of the Board shall be both promotional and administrative. It shall (1), promote the missionary interests of the Church, in cooperation with the Joint Division of Education and Cultivation of the General Board of Missions and Church Extension, and (2), provide for the missionary interests and institutions within the Jurisdiction, in cooperation with Boards of Missions and Church Extension of the various Annual Conferences.

1. In promoting the missionary interests of the Church the Jurisdictional

Board, through its Executive Secretary, shall;

(1) Provide for the distribution of missionary literature and circulation of the general missionary periodical.

(2) Organize and promote an annual missionary institute in each district, in cooperation with the District Superintendent, Conference and District Missionary Secretaries, and the proper conference and district officers of the Woman's

Society of Christian Service.

(3) Promote annually a school of missions for the whole congregation in each local church, using the book prepared or recommended for such schools by the general section of the Joint Division of Education and Cultivation, in cooperation with the pastor and the proper organizations and officers in the church.

(4) Promote the organization of a Church Board of Missions and Church

Extension in each church.

(5) Hold annually or bienially a Jurisdictional Missionary Council.

(6) Cooperate in carrying out within the Jurisdiction of all the plans

and programs of the Joint Division of Education and Cultivation.

2. In providing for the missionary interests and institutions within the Jurisdiction the Board shall survey the missionary needs of the Jurisdiction and prepare a program and policy of missionary administration based thereon. It shall endeavor to support all the missionary work in the Jurisdiction which cannot be supported by the Annual Conference, giving preference to those causes and projects which have inter-conference relationships, and it may ask the General Board of Missions and Church Extension to support any work which cannot be supported by the Jurisdictional Board. It shall cooperate with and endeavor to give financial support to the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church. It shall cooperate with the Annual Conference Boards of Missions with reference to missionary work within the Conference, the relation of the Conference Boards to Jurisdictional missions, and plans for bringing the Conference Missions to self-support.

3. The work of the Jurisdictional Board shall be financed by apportionnents to the Conference, Districts and Charges of the Jurisdiction, through the process prescribed for the collection of such funds. The Board shall prepare a budget and submit the same for the approval of the World Service Committee

of the Jurisdiction and the Jurisdictional Conference.

4. There shall be an Executive Secretary of the Board elected quadrennially by the Jurisdictional Conference on nomination of the Jurisdictional Board or the Committee on Missions and Church Extension of the Jurisdictioal Conference. He shall be the executive officer of the Board and shall conduct its correspondence and administer its work. His duties shall be to maintain an office at the headquarters of the Board, carry on missionary cultivation and promotional work in the Jurisdiction in cooperation with the Joint Division of Education and Cultivation and in accordance with its plans and program, travel throughout the Jurisdiction in the interest of missions, visit the Annual Conference sessions and cooperate with the Conference Boards of Missions and Church Extension, supervise and administer the missionary work of the Jurisdiction, organize, conduct and promote missionary councils, institutes, and summer schools and conferences, and do any and all things to promote missions within the Jurisdiction and discharge the duties of the Board. The various conference missionary secretaries, shall constitute an advisory cabinet for the Executive Secretary and they shall confer and cooperate in all matters pertaining to missionary work.

5. The headquarters of the Jurisdictional Board shall be at Atlanta, Ga.

Memoirs

TIMOTHY ALEXANDER SIKES

Rev Timothy Alexander Sikes, lived and served his course in time, and entered into the eternal world, February 4, 1943, from Wrightsville Beach, N. C., while on a visit to his son, John H. Sikes.

He was born January 5, 1860 on a farm in Union County, the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Sikes.

He was married May 18, 1891, to Miss Ada Flow, who survives him. There were born to this union the following children: Dr. Earl R. Sikes, Professor of Economics at Dartmouth College, New Hampshire; John H. Sikes, Claude A. Sikes and three children who died in infancy.

The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, February 7th from the First Methodist Church in Charlotte, N. C., with the following ministers officiating: Revs. J. H. Armbrust, pastor of Central Methodist Church, Monroe; Dr. G. Ray Jordan, Howard P. Powell, and W. B. Davis.

He united with the Methodist Church in early boyhood, and was educated at the Weddington Academy in Union County and at Concordia College (Lutheran), Concordia, N. C.

He was engaged in newspaper work for some years, most of the time with the Charlotte Observer.

He joined the Western North Carolina Conference at the session held at Concord in 1898.

In 1920 he became the business manager of the North Carolina Christian Advocate, coming to the Advocate under the editorship of Dr. Gilbert T. Rowe, and served in this capacity for seven years and rendered faithful and devoted service.

He was ordained a Deacon in 1901 and ordained an Elder in 1903. He served, with great devotion the following charges in his ministry: Belmont, Spencer, Dilworth, Siler City, Hamlet, Hertford, Burlington, Beaufort, Kenly, Clayton, Franklinton, Roxboro,

Louisburg, Edenton, Scotland Neck, and Ayden.

He was a member of the General Conference, which met in Memphis in 1926.

He was retired from active work in 1938, and was making his home in Monroe, N. C., at the time of his passing. Brother Plyler has written of his work with the Advocate at the time they were associated together in the office, "He was a capable business manager and popular with the office force."

He read good books and stored up his mind with the best literature, which made him an interesting and entertaining conversationalist. Brother Sikes had a fine approach to people and on every charge that he served, he made strong and lasting friends.

He was a good, sound gospel preacher and never turned aside from his high commission to merely entertain his hearers but confined himself in preaching the eternal verities of truth as revealed in the Word of God.

He spoke with the voice of authority, and when the people heard him, they knew that they were listening to a man of God, who had an experimental knowledge of the mind of Jesus Christ.

He loved the Methodist Church intensely, but was never narrow, but brotherly and fraternal with Christians of all denominations.

I wish to pay a personal tribute to the memory of this man of God as I knew him in the closest intimacy:

We were the strongest of friends for many years, and always shared the complete confidence of each other, and while at times did not see eye to eye on secondary policies, this did not affect for a moment the love and respect that we had for each other.

Time, distance or absence never affected our friendship, and lasted from the first time that we met until he passed away. We had made special arrangements for a number of years to room together at the Annual Conference, and at the last session of the Conference, held at Wilson, he was present for one day and night, and we held sweet communion together and talked far into the night about the church that we both had loved and served for many years.

He was then in a precarious state of health, and spoke a number of times of his translation of which he seemed to have a presentment that the time was drawing near.

I knew him in the days of his vigor of physical strength, and now the frost of autumn was about to fall upon him, I could observe very clearly that there was a beautiful ripening for the sunset that he could almost see with the illumination of the setting.

Among the last things that he said to me before we parted for the last time, "I love God and I love everybody."

There was not a doubt or a fear as he approached "the valley of Jordan" and he was ready to cross and go up to receive the crown of eternal life.

He spent a few years in the retired relation to the Conference, during which time, as Bishop John C. Kilgo said of a close friend, "he just walked up and down the banks of the Jordan, looking for a place to cross." He loved to talk about the great preachers that he had known in the two Conferences, and he has now joined them and they are "resting under the shade of the trees."

GEORGE H. BIGGS By H. C. Smith

Brother George H. Biggs, an honored member of the North Carolina Conference, was born in Cumberland County near Hope Mills, N. C., July 12, 1856, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. B. Trogdon, Star, N. C., February 13, 1943. The funeral service was conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. W. Page, assisted by Rev. H. C. Smith, and we laid him to rest in the cemetery in Wadesboro. During his life of eighty-five years this country passed through the horrors of the Civil War, the south lived through the hardships of the reconstruction days, we passed through a world war and a world wide depression, and had entered another world war. It is no little thing to say of one who lived through such a period of the history of the world that, "He kept the faith." Brother Biggs not only kept the faith but it had become so vital in his life that it kept for him "in the evening it was light."

Even when I had only a conference acquaintance with him I felt sure that his always neat appearance and his noble face were the outward expressions of an inner strength and purity. In 1928 I was sent to the Rockingham District and he was pastor at Laurel Hill. It was in that relationship that I came really to know and appreciate him. I saw him meet the great testing trial of losing his good wife. He met that trial with the strength that only comes through long association with the Great Comforter. I found that he knew God other than by hearsay. He believed that his Master would keep that which he had committed to Him, and he had committed all to Him. When he retired in 1931 his name was of course before the cabinet. Bishop Mouzon said to us, "Brethren let us not do anything to hurt Brother Biggs, he is a perfect gentleman." That was high praise but I knew that it was not too high.

Brother Biggs worked with the railroad in Wadesboro until he was about forty years old before he entered the ministry. He first joined the Methodist Protestant Conference and served as pastor in Enfield, Seagrove, Why Not, and Halifax Circuits. He joined the North Carolina Conference in 1909 and served Montgomery Circuit, Elizabeth Circuit, Roberdell Circuit twice, Lumberton, Ellerbe, Newton Grove, Bladen, Goldston, Laurel Hill, and Mamers Circuits. His story, as he told it to me, of how he walked and served the Montgomery Circuit when it covered the whole county, is a story of sacrifice and devotion that few of his younger brethren know.

Brother Biggs was married to Miss Margaret Anne Northcott, June 26, 1884. There were ten children, six of whom are still living: Mrs. Eliza Lyon, Mrs. Raymond Davis, Mrs. A. B. Trogdon, Miss Mary Biggs, B. F. Biggs, and W. C. Biggs.

It was one of the blessings of my life to have known and to have been associated with this man of God. He perhaps never knew how much his life meant to me.

DAVID ISHAM GARNER

The Rev. David Isham Garner, son of Oliver and Maggie Way Garner, was born in Randolph County near Liberty, N. C., February 19, 1892, and died March 23, 1943, Route 1, Mebane, N. C. The funeral services were conducted at the First Church, Mebane by Rev. T. B. Hough, Dr. S. W. Taylor, and Dr. F. W. Paschall and interment was in Pine Hill Cemetery, Burlington, N. C.

Brother Garner attended High School at Haw River and received training at Elon College and Westminster Theological Seminary. He was admitted into the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, November 1922, at Henderson, N. C., and was ordained November, 1926, at Greensboro, N. C. He served as minister 18 years the following charges: Rockingham and Why Not Circuits, English Street, High Point; Randolph Circuit, Saint Paul, Greensboro; Concord and Mebane, and after the merging of the three Methodist Churches he ministered to the Milton and Belhaven Circuits of the North Carolina Conference.

Mr. Garner was married twice. The first marriage was to Miss Sarah Elizabeth Hughes, April 12, 1914, and to this union were born two children, Ruth Elizabeth who died at two years of age, and John Albert who survives his father. The second marriage was to Miss Carrie Lee Mabry, November 29, 1931, who survives her husband.

In an appraisal of the life of Brother Garner it might be said that he was a good man. He was very devout and entered into the duties of the pastorate with earnestness. The charges he served were greatly benefited by his consecrated leadership. He was quiet in nature and did not seem to seek advancement for himself, but he gave himself willingly to the cause of Christ. He will be remembered as having very strong convictions pertaining to the Christian way of life. Truly as he was faithful to the duties assigned him here he will be rewarded in the life hereafter.

J. P. BROSS

Rev. J. P. Bross was born February, 1876, in Thompson, Georgia, and died April 6, 1943, in Norfolk, Virginia. His parents were Mr. Wesley C. Bross and Mrs. Albea Bross. Rev. J. P. Bross was

twice married. One daughter to the first marriage survives him, Mrs. D. K. Deans of Norfolk, Va.

His second marriage on May 31, 1929, was to Miss Inis Reid of Nashville, Tenn.

Brother Bross was admitted into the South Georgia Conference at Sandersville in 1903. Was ordained Deacon in 1906, was ordained Elder in 1910, and served the Church as an active itinerate Methodist preacher for thirty-four years. He served in Georgia, Texas and in North Carolina. I could not secure a list of all the appointments he served. I know some of them: Wanchese, Halifax, Currituck, and Troy.

He rendered great service to Louisburg College. He was a most effective campaign worker for students. Scores of girls and boys were influenced to attend college at Louisburg and also at Salemburg College by his fine and faithful service. He raised money for Maxton College when it was a Methodist institution. Brother Bross was a tireless worker in any charge to which he was sent.

So far this is a rough sketch of a very useful life. His was not an easy road; he struggled for every mile he covered. He was never a pessimist or defeatist. Being very resourceful and diligent he found a way out to meet the delicate and difficult tasks of life. I rarely ever heard him complain about the hardships of the Methodist itineracy. He was a real optimist if I ever saw one. The best is yet to be. It was even that way after he retired. But he did not retire to sit down in an easy rocking chair. He worked on to supplement his small pension. As a minister he belonged to old school of theological thinking. His knowledge of Law enabled him to do some fine concise logical thinking. He never left his audience without something very definite and worth-while to think about. He fed the sheep and shepherded the lambs. In his earlier days the churches prospered greatly under his leadership.

He hated sin, sham, hypocrisy, he loved the sinner and pointed him to the lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world. Brother Bross stood for something greater than himself. He loved persons as well as causes for which he labored.

He had a special sermon I liked so much and he loved to preach it. "I know Him in whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him against that day."

J. P. Bross did not take his religion lightly. What he believed, he believed with all his heart and sought to translate his creed into conduct. Hence his Christian courage to stand for truth and righteousness. He drew upon great resources for the deep convictions by which he lived and labored. He had deep convictions concerning God, man, sin, righteousness, and redemption. Hence

his devotion and the consecration of his long and useful life. So religion was more than a philosopky with him, it was right-living and Christian service.

A beautiful story is told of three sons sent out by their father to make an exploring trip up the mountain side, and to bring back specimens of their journey. The first son came back with beautiful flowers from the mountain side. The second son returned with rare stones from farther up the mountain. The third son came back with no flowers, with no gems, but he said: "Father, I climbed on and on till I reached the top of the mountain. There I caught sight of the sea." So the subject of this sketch cared little for the tangible, for this world's goods. He dealt in the intangible; he endured as seeing Him who is invisible. He caught sight of the sea of life and into that larger life, with expanding horizons he has entered into that land that is fairer than day, where the stars forever shine, where flowers never fade, where fellowships are unbroken.

"Well done, good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of the Lord,"

"Now the laborers task is o'er Now the battle day is past Now upon the farther shore Lands the voyager at last Father, in thy gracious keeping." Leave we now thy servant sleeping."

WALTER HERBERT PAVY By Chancie D. Barclift

Walter Herbert Pavy was born June 13, 1882 at Stowford Hill, near Trowbridge, Wilts, England, a son of Robert Pavy and his wife, Amelia Haddrell Pavy.

He attended the following elementary and preparatory schools in England: Derry Hill, Circnester, Shepscombe and Chepstow.

He was converted and received into the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Walcot Wesleyan Chapel, Bath, in February, 1899. Serving the Bath Circuit as a local preacher from 1899 to 1905, he preached his first sermon in the Bath Easton Wesleyan Chapel, September 7, 1899, at the age of seventeen. Also, during this period he was special subject master at Kingswood School, Bath. In 1905-1906 he was assistant at St. Peter's, Leeds. In this city mission work he gained much experience in street preaching and in visiting and serving in the slum areas.

He came to Canada on September 7, 1906 with a party of young men who had volunteered for the Canadian ministry under the guidance of Dr. J. S. Woodsworth. Accepted as a candidate for the Methodist ministry in the Saskatchewan Conference in June, 1907, he served the following appointments: Greenville, Moosomin District, September 1906 to June 1907; Kennedy, Moosomin District, July 1907 to June 1908; Craven. Regina District, July 1908 to September 1908; first minister in charge of the newly organized All Peoples' Institute, Winnipeg, from June 1909 to December 1911; student pastor of Epworth Methodist Church, Port Arthur, Ontario, part of the year 1912. (In October 1908, he entered Wesley College, Winnipeg, Canada, and was graduated from it in Theology in May, 1913.)

He was ordained a Methodist minister on June 8, 1913 at the Saskatchewan Conference at Saskatoon. He then served the following charges: Imperial, 1913-1915; Kinistino, 1915-1916. In October, 1916 he enlisted in the Canadian Army and, being rendered physically unfit for active service from an injury received during training, served as a Y. M. C. A. worker at St. Charles Camp, Winnipeg, in 1917 and at Port Arthur Armories part of 1918. He was given the rank of honorary Captain and Chaplain the latter part of 1918, and served on many troop ships until demobilization.

In October, 1919, he was appointed to the Manitoba Conference to organize the religious and social work in the coal docks' section of Port Arthur. Here he carried on a general social sevice program among the Ukrainians, Poles and Italians. His ministry to every phase of human need to these non-Anglo-Saxon peoples was quite fruitful for a number of years.

When the United Church of Canada was formed, thus leaving many men without charges, he transferred to the Maine Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, U. S. A., on April 29, 1927. His appointments in that Conference were: Conway Center, N. H.; Saco Valley United Parish, Me.; Mt. Forist Church, Berlin, N. H.; and Danforth, Me. In December, 1938, he became pastor of the Free Grace Methodist Episcopal Church at Harker's Island, North Carolina, and was formally transferred from the Maine Conference to the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the Methodist Eposcopal Church, on February 1, 1939. Moreover, pending union, he was appointed in December, 1938 pastor, also, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, on Harker's Island. He served these two churches jointly for one year. With union, he became a member of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, and served these appointments: Epworth, Wilmington, November, 1939 to November, 1940; Town Creek Charge, November, 1940, until he was transferred to a heavenly appointment two and one-half years later.

On August 20, 1923 in Toronto, Canada, he married Miss Irene Maude, the daughter of the Reverend and Mrs. William H. Maude of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of England. She died on June 5, 1935, and was buried in Berlin, N. H., where they were serving then. With high fidelity, she joyously walked with her husband in paths of consecrated labors that often led to places that were difficult but which, for them, because they interpreted life with love, became a sunny road, flecked only with the satisfaction of hard tasks well done.

Brother Pavy's life was characterized by simplicity, sincerity and hard work. Possessing intellectual vigor, his preaching was of high order. He was gifted in the ministry of music. Always a faithful shepherd to his people, he sought to know and to interpret unto them the mind of Christ and the will of God. With the heart of a brother, he looked around him and out upon the world through the eyes of his Master and embraced in his love and service the members of all races. He was a great advocate of the social gospel, a staunch enemy of the liquor traffic and an unfailing friend to the needy. An excellent Boy Scout leader, he gave fine emphasis to the interests of youth. He spent much time with the children and young people of his charges, and they heard him gladly and followed him readily to the enrichment of their lives in Christ.

While riding his bicycle in the frosty chill on Friday morning, April 16, 1943, to keep a chapel appointment at the Bolivia school in Brunswick County, he died suddenly of a heart attack. Thus another prophet of a long road—a road that reached from Bath in England to Brunswick in North Carolina—heard the welcome, "Well done." As he thus rode into immortality, three thousand miles from the land of his birth, the many thousands that his life of selfless service had touched along the way mourned his passing and shall for a long time rise up to bless his memory.

Funeral services were held from the Zion Methodist Church, Town Creek, Saturday afternoon, April 17, by the Reverend A. S. Parker, District Superintendent of the Wilmington District, assisted by the Reverends R. S. Harrison, J. F. Herbert, and C. D. Barclift. On the following Tuesday afternoon from the Mt. Forist Methodist Church, Berlin, N. H., other funeral services were held by several ministers there, including some of his close friends of the other years. They tenderly laid his body to rest beside that of his wife in the cemetery of that city, but their good deeds live on after them and their spirits, released from the tenements of clay, are alive forevermore. He is survived by a sister, Miss Constance Pavy, and a brother, Harold Pavy, both of Reading, England.

It was good to be known as his friend and to have him visit one's home. His sunny smile, cheerful disposition and optimistic outlook brightened the day, lightened the load and made fellowship a real sacrament.

"At end of love, at end of life, At end of hope, at end of strife, At end of all we cling to so, The sun is setting—must we go?

At dawn of love, at dawn of life, At dawn of peace that follows strife, At dawn of all we long for so, The sun is rising—let us go!"

FRANCIS BOYD PEELE

Rev. Francis Boyd Peele, came to his translation in time, and entered into the glorified service of his Lord and Master, from Watt's Hospital in Durham, N. C., June 24, 1943.

He took just one short step across the boundary line to "be forever with his Lord."

He was born in Scotland County, N. C., May 16, 1889, the son of the late Andrew H. Peele and Mrs. Nora Jane Gibson Peele, and passed away at the age of fifty-four years.

He was one of the following brothers and sisters, Rev. Clarence C. Peele, a member of the Upper South Carolina Conference; Dr. David D. Peele, editor of the Southern Christian Advocate and the Dean of Columbia College, Bishop W. Walter Peele, in charge of the Richmond Area of the Methodist Church, Raymond Peele, Gibson, N. C., Mack Peele, Columbia, S. C., Mrs. D. C. Lytch, Gibson, N. C.

There was one brother, Jonathan Peele, a lawyer and member of the State Legislature, who died in 1916.

One sister, Mrs. Mary Peele Ritter, wife of Rev. H. C. Ritter, was a missionary, with her husband for some years, died a few years ago.

His first wife was Miss Lila Grey Branch of Fayetteville, N. C., by whom he left one daughter, Miss Francis Grey Peele of Durham, N. C.

His second wife was Miss Margaret Sikes of Fayetteville, N. C., who with two children survive, Carlyle Boyd Peele and Miss Louise Peele, with one grand child, Gerald Loman Peele.

Brother Peele was converted and joined the Methodist Church in 1922, was licensed to preach, admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference the same year, at the session held in Raleigh.

He was ordained Deacon at Wilmington in 1924, and an Elder in Durham in 1926.

He served the following charges in the North Carolina Conference:

Brother Peele was no ordinary man, having a fine heredity and being endowed with a strong mind, which from the time of his entrance in the Kingdom of God, he cultivated by a prayer life, reading the best literature, and thinking on the verities of eternal truth.

He possessed a truly marvelous insight into human nature which was a great asset to him in the work of the pastorate and the ministry, in his approach to the individual person. From the time that he gave his heart to God, and his life to the service of his Lord and Master, he never wavered in his devotion to the work to which God had called him.

He never for a moment failed to give the strictest attention to every activity of the church and was always faithful to his ordination vows.

There came to him in his conversion a profound experience of the deep things of God, and the power of Jesus Christ to save sinners.

He "never conferred with flesh and blood," but asked at once "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do."

The two outstanding elements in his whole ministry, were the Divine authority of a Christian experience, and a consuming passion to serve humanity.

He loved people, and was never so happy, as praying with the sick, comforting the sorrowing and the bereaved, and the cry of human need never reached his ear and heart, that he did not go at once to relieve.

He possessed a wonderful capacity for making friends and fastened them to him with hooks of steel.

He was always absolutely sincere and was as free from guile as Nathaniel.

There was nothing of the perfunctory in his ministry, but he kept himself nerved to the utmost of this strength in the performance of every obligation that came to him in his call from God.

During the last twelve months, he met his appointment and preached with increasing spiritual power, when almost unable physically, to stand in the pulpit, but he kept on smiling at his friends, while suffering the greatest pain.

This explains why his friends expressed such great surprise

when the end same, after what they thought was such a "short sickness."

Understanding human nature as he did, he excelled in the solution of the many problems and difficult situations that often arise in the work of the pastorate.

The people in every charge that he served, rise up and call his memory blessed, as a man with "the mind of Jesus Christ" in always going about doing good.

Measured by the calendar, his was not a long life, but measured by "the life more abundant," he lives in the lives of the multitudes, whom he touched and who knew and loved him.

He was serving Person Charge when the summons came and all classes of people, in the church and out of the church, mourn his passing and are heard to say "how much we shall miss him." Many of us will never be the same in our Christian lives, since we came under the influence of his sanctified smile, and the kind deeds that he never failed to render to some of us.

The celebration of his victory was held in Durham and his body laid to rest in the family cemetery at Gibson. The services were conducted by his District Superintendent, Dr. F. S. Love, Rev. W. V. McRae and this writer, with the commital service read at the grave by his friend Dr. H. C. Smith, District Superintendent of the Fayetteville District. His friends brought or sent many beautiful flowers to place on his casket. These will soon fade and die, but the flowers of affection given to his memory will never fade or die. We did not tell him good bye, as he had just entered another sphere of service, we were content to wait the time when we shall say good morning at the dawn of the eternal day.

She passed to her reward at 6:10 o'clock, Saturday evening, January 2, 1943, from her home, 106 East Markham Avenue, Durham, North Carolina.

Stella Ford Hinson came from the finest ancestral stock of the Old South. Her father, Benjamin C. Ford, came of the Colonial culture, Old Virginia, while her mother, Stella Pope Ford, was transplanted from the cultural atmosphere of Alabama. They established their home in Nashville, Tenn., where Mrs. Hinson was born. Added to her fine family inheritance, she grew up in the cultural city of Nashville, Tenn., was educated in the City Schools

and then continued her training at Ward Belmont College. Later she attended a finishing school in Boston, where she specialized in Culinary Art and Kindergarten, becoming a specialist in these fields. She early gave promise of a literary career and became a frequent contributor to various leading magazines.

When she married the Reverend O. I. Hinson, January 30, 1907. she was teaching in Nashville, Tenn. From this time until her death, she gave herself unselfishly to the Methodist itineracy. Her greatest contribution, however, to the cause of Christ was not manifest in a public manner. Due to declining health, her major work of necessity had to be done in and through her home influence. To her home and family, she gave herself with an enthusiastic abandon. Her cultural training and specialized skill enabled her to be at home in the best social circles and her chief delight was in contributing to the happiness and pleasure of others. The doors of her parsonage home, be it large or small, were open to her friends and those in need of a friendly touch. Her mind was a veritable storehouse of information, which she was glad to share with others. Her deep insight into life and ready wit made her a most welcome person in any group. Those who knew her best loved her most, for to know her was to appreciate and love her.

Stella Ford Hinson leaves behind her a husband, the Reverend O. I. Hinson, now serving the Bahama Charge, and a daughter, Miss Ellie Ford Hinson who teaches in the Durham City Schools. Her friends are scattered afar for her life has been an inspiration to many of all ages.

Surely life is richer and the privilege to serve a greater blessing because Stella Ford Hinson has lived and continues to live in the memory of those who knew and loved her.

Mrs Jenkins was born just at the close of the Civil War. In her childhood she knew the poverty of those reconstruction days in the South. She was married in 1888 and their first years in the ministry was during those depression days of the early 1890's. Her husband died in 1911 and left her to be mother and father to the boys, and so her life was never one of ease. But through it all she fought a good fight, she kept the faith, and now has entered her reward.

When we'think of what she did with what she had to do with, we may not only say that she did what she could, but she did what she "couldn't." We pray that a double portion of her beautiful spirit may rest upon her boys and their families, and upon us who had the good fortune to know her.



Sessions of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

NOTE: The Distributing Committee at the 1940 session of the Western North Carolina Conference added three retired ministers of the former Methodist Protestant Church to the roll of the North Carolina Conference. The names of these preachers should have been included in 1939 in the list of preachers coming into the North Carolina Conference from the former Methodist Protestant Church.
