JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY

Wednesday, November 3, 1948

Opening: The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, convened in its tenth annual session in the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church, Greenville, North Carolina, November 3, 1948, at 7:30 p.m., with Bishop W. W. Peele, presiding.

Holy Communion: A worship service was conducted by Bishop Peele, B. B. Slaughter and R. W. Bradshaw, with Bishop Peele bringing the Communion Meditation. Bishop Peele administered the Holy Communion assisted by R. W. Bradshaw and the District Superintendents: A. J. Hobbs, B. B. Slaughter, E. L. Hillman, H. C. Smith, J. H. Miller, W. L. Clegg, and H. B. Porter.

Roll Call: T. McM. Grant moved that the registration in the office of the Committee on Entertainment be accepted as the official attendance record of the Conference, and the motion was carried.

Our Honored Dead: T. McM Grant read the names of those ministers who have died during the year. Those who have died during the year are: C. N. Phillips, J. H. Shore, J. R. Edwards, Luther B. Bridgers, J. C. Humble, N. C. Yearby, J. D. Bundy, and A. C. Thompson. Bishop Peele read selected passages of Scripture.

Secretary: T. McM. Grant was elected Secretary.

Organization: N. W. Grant, H. B. Lewis, F. W. Paschall and C. W. Robbins were elected Assistant Secretaries; W. C. Wilson, Statistician, and B. H. Houston, Assistant Statistician.

Committee on Minutes: R. W. Bradshaw, O. L. Hathaway and W. R. Stevens were named the Committee on Minutes.



Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not spoken desires the floor, no more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of a Committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, that chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by signed ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially by the Conference, at its first session after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The Secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a Conference Statistician and an Assistant statistician, both of whom shall be elected quadrennially by the Conference on nomination of the Conference Secretary.
4. The Conference Stenographer: The Conference Secretary shall employ the Conference Stenographer.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their service and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern

Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.

7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
8. Board Treasurers: All Board Treasurers shall be required to file financial statements, annually, with the reports of their respective Boards. These financial statements shall be published in the Conference Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers; and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
10. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 46—1948 Discipline.
11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The Committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than April 1, if possible.
12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

1. All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (typewritten if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary before the report or resolutions shall be read to the Conference for consideration.
2. Any amendment offered to any paper and all motions of more than a single sentence must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular or reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each District Superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Conference, from his District, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in duplicate, to the Conference Secretary.
3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made to the Conference Secretary, in written form, through the District Superintendent of each District.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete table I of his annual report to Conference and transmit the same to the Conference Statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening of the Conference.
2. Table II shall be completed and turned in at the time of registration, the first day of Conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal only by charges.
6. A third table of individual church reports shall be compiled by the Statistician from the pastors' reports. This table shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the South-eastern Jurisdictional Conference. The Editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent each of the following: The Conference Claimants, the educational institutions, the General Boards, The Publishing House, the lay members of the Conference Boards. Eight copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.00, or single copies by mail at \$1.10 each.

VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of Districts shall be seven.
2. A District Conference shall be held annually in each District.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.
4. The District and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the District Superintendents and the Conference Lay Leader.
5. The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish to the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician, as early in the year as possible, an official copy of the apportionments to the

charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these official copies are to be sent to the secretary of the commission on World Service and Finance.

6. Each District Superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the District Superintendent to the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
7. We call attention of the District Superintendents to Paragraph 432 (1) 1948 Discipline and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of Districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by vote of the majority of the Conference.

We recommend that the distribution of these district apportionments be made to the several charges by the District Superintendents.

5. We recommend that from the remaining funds on hand in closing the report for the current year our Treasurer retain the sum of \$5,000.00 and that 50% of the balance be remitted to the General Commission on World Service and Finance for World Service.

6. PAR FOR WORLD SERVICE AND CONFERENCE BENEVOLENCES ACCEPTANCES.

For use in the making of apportionments to charges by District Superintendents we print below the table of PAR. Many charges have moved up to PAR, many have taken a step in that direction. Now that we have entered a new quadrennium we urge all charges to lift their giving to these benevolences.

As the acceptances increase we can do more in the "ADVANCE FOR CHRIST AND HIS CHURCH," also, further advances by Conference causes must await increased acceptances. The acceptances are subject to review annually and are not fixed for the quadrennium.

Salary in excess of \$6,000.00 add 2 per cent for each \$100.00. Salary less than \$1,500.00 PAR is at the discretion of the charge.

For circuits composed of two or more churches on written application by the pastor and with the approval of the District Superintendent, if the circuit is paying above minimum salary without aid from the Sustentation Fund, PAR may be set on the basis of the salary less \$500 but not less than for minimum salary \$2,200.

PART II

1. THE EPISCOPAL FUND as set by General Conference shall be an amount equal to 1 3/4 per cent of the salary of pastor and ministerial assistants, for the current year.

2. SALARIES FOR DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS AND GROUP INSURANCE.

- a. We recommend: That the annual salary of each of the seven District Superintendents shall be set as \$5,400.00, including expenses attendant to his office.
- b. That a committee of not to exceed five persons be appointed (by the Bishop) who shall investigate the plans of other organizations having group insurance plans, and shall also study the relation of any group insurance plan to the entire program of ministerial support; that such committee be directed to work toward a careful correlation of the various parts of the program of ministerial support in this Conference and be requested to report their specific recommendations to the 1949 session of this Conference, with copies of such report delivered to each charge not later than September 15, 1949.
- c. That 5% (5 per cent) of a sum equal to the amount estimated for the then current Conference year for the salary of the pastor and assistant pastor, if any, of each and every charge in the Conference, be apportioned to each charge, said sum to be remitted to the Conference Treasurer for payment of District Superintendents' salaries.

3. THE BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS requests an apportionment of an amount equal to 14% of the salary of the pastor and all ministerial assistants.

The three items above equal 20 3/4 per cent of Pastor's Salary. All are to be remitted to the Conference Treasurer.

PART III

1. ORPHANAGE:

We recommend the apportionment to each charge of an amount equal to seven (7) per cent of the total money raised by the charge in the Conference year 1946-1947 as reported in our 1947 Journal, less the following five items:

Statistical Table 2-A—Amount paid on Indebtedness including Principal and Interest.

Statistical Table 2-A—Amount paid on Buildings and Improvements.

Statistical Table 2-B—Amount paid Schools and Colleges.

Statistical Table 2-B—Amount paid on Crusade for Christ.

All special gifts for endowment purposes made either to the local church or the orphanage.

All orphanage specials, except that raised by the Woman's Society of Christian Service, are to be credited on the 7 per cent asking.

We further recommend that in order to have the apportionments uniformly calculated that the Business Manager of the Orphanage have the calculations made for each charge, inform each charge of the amount and furnish each District Superintendent with a report for his District—Further, that the Business Manager be authorized to notify each charge at least one month prior to Conference of its credits and balance of apportionment for the year.

It is anticipated that exact payment of the apportionment will provide the Orphanage with \$124,000.00.

2. SUSTENTATION FUND:

We recommend the apportionment to each charge of 2 per cent of the total money raised as in paragraph 1, or an amount equal to 2/7 of the amount of the Orphanage apportionment.

The total apportionments in Part III equal 9% of the total money raised as herein defined.

3. METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES FUND:

- a. We recommend that each charge be asked to raise an amount equal to one fourth (1/4) of the amount of the Orphanage Apportionment on a strictly voluntary basis.
- b. We also approve the solicitation and acceptance of voluntary bequests, gifts, etc., for this cause.
- c. We recommend the solicitation of voluntary contributions from charges, churches, persons and corporations for the purpose of erecting District Homes for retired ministers, their wives or their widows.
- d. We recommend that Marvin M. Fowler, Durham, N. C., be elected Executive Secretary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, without salary. We also recommend that he be elected a member of the Board of Directors of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated.
- e. We recommend that the Board of Directors of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, grant Rev. Leon M. Hall and any other qualified persons permission to erect individual homes on the land which will be received from the good people of Durham.

PART IV

1. METHODIST COLLEGE ADVANCE FUND:

We authorize the Conference Treasurer to accept all Methodist College Advance Funds, which may be remitted to him until all pledges are paid.

2. THE METHODIST COLLEGE FOUNDATION OF NORTH CAROLINA, INCORPORATED:

We recommend that the plans for this new organization as presented in the report of the Board of Education have the hearty support of the Conference, and that the purposes and functions of the Foundation as outlined therein be approved.

3. THE INTER-CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON CHURCH BUILDING AT FAIRMONT CHURCH, RALEIGH, AND COLLEGE PLACE CHURCH, GREENSBORO:

We approve the plans of this commission to solicit funds in a special campaign for the purpose of additional buildings at the above points.

4. We recommend approval of the request of the WESLEY FOUNDATION for the privilege of soliciting the Alumni, parents of the Methodist students, and others who desire to make special gifts for the benefit of the student work in State supported institutions.

5. We recommend Conference approval of the request of the Board of Education for permission to raise money for the purpose of developing Camp Don Lee in Pamlico County. Any funds which may be raised under this authorization are to be remitted to T. J. Collier, Arapahoe, N. C.

6. ORPHANAGE:

We do not recommend that endowment funds of the Orphanage be used to build another cottage, but we do recommend that the loan by the endowment fund to the operating fund be repaid, and that the endowment fund be built up as rapidly as possible. A larger endowment fund would have the effect of decreasing the apportionments.

7. SUPPLEMENTARY BUDGET ITEMS:

- a. We recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay from funds on hand and on approved vouchers any excess in the cost of Conference entertainment above \$2,500.00.
- b. Also that the Treasurer be authorized to pay from funds on hand the neces-

sary sum for printing and delivery to the local charge of a leaflet promoting World Service if one be issued.

- c. We recommend that the Board of Missions and Church Extension be authorized to transfer the sum of \$5,000.00 from the Mission Fund to the Extension Fund.

PART V

GUIDE FOR PASTORS IN SETTING UP NEW BUDGET

1. Part I of report:

World Service and Conference Benevolences to be the ACCEPTANCE as agreed with the District Superintendent. We suggest consideration of PAR as a minimum, but not a ceiling.

2. Part II of report.

The three items listed in this section equal 20¼ per cent of pastor's salary.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

During the quadrennium now closing the Methodist Church as been engaged in the Crusade for Christ movement, which has been one of the most forward looking movements to engage our efforts for many years. We rejoice at the success that has been attained in every phase of this movement. It struck a responsive chord in every Methodist heart and in every church. As we begin a new quadrennium we are expecting the new movement known as The Advance for Christ and His Church to elicit from our people the same fine response that was given to the Crusade movement. A great challenge again confronts us. The Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension is anxious to be of whatever service it may in the promotion of this great program. Every member of the Board will be at the command of the Conference for whatever service he or she may be able to render.

Through the Sustentation Fund this Board has been able to meet the minimum salary in every case and in special cases to go above the minimum. We administer four different funds. The Sustentation Fund netted around \$22,800 last year, and the Board appropriated \$21,500 for ministerial support. This fund is restricted to use for ministerial support. The Church Extension Fund amounted to \$12,687. From this fund the Board appropriated and paid \$16,375. This larger expenditure being made possible by cashing in a \$5,000 Bond. The Missions Fund receipts were \$2,000 and the Board appropriated \$2,900, again using some of the reserve. This Board receives from the Duke Endowment \$11,000 which it also

appropriates to supplement ministers' salaries. This money, however, is used entirely for rural charges.

During the past year a large number of churches and parsonages have been engaged in building programs, so much so that the Board appropriated all the donation funds it received plus several thousand dollars it had in reserve. The Loan Fund of the Conference Board which amounts to around \$28,000 is now all in use; therefore, no more loans can be placed until the repayments have been made on outstanding loans. It is the hope that with the upsurge in building activity more funds will be made available to this Board for such purposes, especially in establishing new churches throughout the Conference. In this connection we recommend that District Boards of Missions and Church Extension or City Boards be organized to promote the establishment of new churches, to hold titles to property and render whatever other service may be necessary.

We heartily endorse the report coming from the Conference committee on the Adequate Support of the Ministry which would increase the minimum salary level.

We endorse the plan for the raising of a mission special for new church organizations, this special to be an approved special of the Conference for the Advance Program, the particular organization receiving such fund to be determined by the cabinet.

We also endorse the plan of the Conference Missionary Secretary to hold a District Missionary Institute in each District during the month of January, and we urge all our people to give full support to this effort.

We recommend the election of Rev. Leon Russell to succeed himself as Conference Missionary Secretary. We also recommend that Dr. J. M. Ormond and Dr. H. C. Smith be elected to succeed themselves on the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

The list of appropriations, together with the treasurer's report, are attached hereto.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF EDUCATION

Resolutions Regarding Camp Don-Lee

(a) CHRISTMAS CAMP OFFERING: In view of the fact that the construction of Camp Don-Lee is well advanced, and must be further developed before the camping season of 1949, the Board of Education requests that it and its representatives be authorized to raise funds for Camp Don-Lee, by means of the usual Christmas Camp Offering, and through enlisting individuals, pastoral charges, and sub-districts in special donation or building projects. It is recommended that the Executive Committee of the Board of Education assume responsibility in developing and promoting the plans herein described.

(b) RESOLVED by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, that a non-profit corporation consisting of nine members be established under the style and name of "Camp Don-Lee Incorporated," to hold title to and manage the Camp Don-Lee property located in Pamlico County; each of the members of said proposed corporation to be named by the Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference on such terms that one-third of the members shall be replaceable each year and any vacancies in the membership of said corporation to be filled by said Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

(c) RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, be authorized, empowered and instructed to transfer and convey the title to the Camp Don-Lee property in Pamlico County to "Camp Don-Lee Incorporated," when such corporation has been finally organized.

(d) RESOLVED that the corporation, "Camp Don-Lee Incorporated," be authorized to borrow or issue bonds for an amount not to exceed \$50,000 to complete construction of buildings now in progress and to complete facilities for beginning use of the property for youth camping in the summer of 1949, with the understanding that this obligation be retired by donations from individuals and churches to the Camp Don-Lee Building Fund and with the further provision that the said corporation, "Camp Don-Lee Incorporated," from and after its organization, be authorized and empowered to pledge the Camp Don-Lee property as security for any funds borrowed or any bonds sold.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF EDUCATION

We appreciate the fine leadership of our Conference Staff during the year just closed, and express our thanks to Rev. J. G. Phillips, Executive Secretary; Rev. Troy J. Barrett, Director of Youth Work; John M. Meares, Director of

Adult Work, without salary; Miss Doris Sutton, Director of Children's work; and Miss Evelyn F. Cline, Office Manager and Director of Youth Fund.

We would like to lift out of the Staff Report to Annual Conference of 1948, the following items:

Crusade Program in Christian Education

A 23 per cent gain in total enrollment in Church Schools in first three years of the Crusade for Christ in our Conference.

A 32 per cent gain in average attendance in Sunday Schools in first three years of the Crusade for Christ in our Conference.

During the 17 years preceding the Crusade for Christ our Conference suffered a net loss of 14,359 in Church School enrollment.

During the first three years of the Crusade, beginning in the Fall of 1944 we gained back that loss and added an additional 4,698 to make a total gain of 19,057.

N. C. Conference Ranks 10th in Size in the Nation

But is fourth in total gain in Church School enrollment in Crusade.

Is third in gain in average attendance.

Is eighth in gain in enrollment of children in Church Schools.

Is third in gain in enrollment of young people in Church Schools.

Is fifth in gain in the enrollment of adults in Church Schools.

It is hoped that continued gains have been made in the last year of the Crusade for Christ in spite of the serious polio epidemic.

A New Day for Methodist Colleges

Methodism in the North Carolina Conference has expressed a new concern for Methodist institutions of higher learning in the College Advance movement, under the leadership of Rev. W. A. Cade. It probably would be accurate to say that our people as a whole have never before felt such a responsibility for, or given as much financial assistance to Duke University, Greensboro College, High Point College, and Louisburg College as they have through the College Advance. The College Advance has been a turning point toward the finest relations between our schools and our whole people.

Leadership Education

We rejoice in the growing interest in leadership education among the churches in our Conference. We especially commend the Fayetteville District for its plan whereby a standard First Series Christian Workers School was conducted in each of the six sub-districts.

The gain in church school enrollment and attendance during the Crusade for Christ and the expected larger gains during the Advance for Christ in the church schools in this quadrennium emphasize the need for constantly enlisting and training new workers for the teaching ministry of the Church. It is imperative that every church have a definite plan for enlisting and training all the workers it needs.

We Therefore Recommend:

1. That every pastor lead his workers in a study of the meaning of the ten Quadrennial Church School Goals and emphases for his church school program.

2. That each Church Board of Education set up a Committee on personnel and leadership training who will be responsible for developing an adequate program of enlisting and training all workers needed.

3. That each district staff study the leadership needs of the district and project a program of Christian Workers Schools that will serve all the Churches in the District.

4. That the Conference Staff in cooperation with the several districts plan coaching conferences to help selected instructors become certified for teaching in the Christian Workers Schools to be held.

5. That the development of leaders for Christian family life be a major emphasis in the programs of leadership education of local churches, districts and conferences.

In keeping with paragraph 1443 of the 1948 Discipline the Board of Education nominates the following additional members of the Board of Education: M. Earl Cunningham, Wayne G. Starnes, D. L. Fouts, Mrs. M. Leigh Sheep, Mrs. W. P. Moore, A. D. Gray.

REPORT NO. 3—BOARD OF EDUCATION

College Section

Our educational institutions almost without exception, report gains in enrollment, with proportionate difficulties regarding maintenance, due, principally to inflationary trends. Each institution regards with respect the financial assistance rendered through the Methodist College Advance, the annual appropriations from Conference benevolences and other sources of aid.

Greensboro College: For the scholastic year, 1947-48 the enrollment totalled 413; 75 per cent of the students were Methodists, 84.4 per cent were residents of North Carolina, and 71 counties were represented in the student body. Competition for faculty and staff personnel, due to salary increases at other institutions, has created a problem that needs immediate attention.

Louisburg College: Enrollment figures for the fall semester (1948-49) show that there are 251 students—178 men and 73 women—enrolled. This represents a decrease from the enrollment figures a year ago, due largely to the decrease in the enrollment of veterans. The value of the property of the college is \$401,772.68; the endowment stands at \$131,964.88 and there is no indebtedness. Improvements upon the physical plant of the college include the completion of a new cafeteria and the renovation of other parts of some buildings. Plans for a new gymnasium have been drawn and approved by the building committee of the Board of Trustees.

High Point College: For the year closing May 31, 1948, High Point College reports 871 students enrolled in regular session. 92 per cent of this number were from North Carolina. 57 per cent were Methodists. Property, Equipment and Special Reserve Funds worth \$964,080.94 are reported; this represents an increase over last year of \$122,308.93. An increase of \$93,260.57 on endowments is reported. Attention is directed to the fact that more students were on honor roll than any previous year in the history of High Point College.

Duke University: There were 5,233 students enrolled for the Academic year 1947-48. The endowment is \$49,952,461.53. The plant and equipment are valued at \$34,609,948.22 making a total of \$84,562,409.75. Loan funds total \$2,451,419.80 and scholarship funds total \$677,096.91. Expendable Special Funds total \$3,017,030.49.

Race Relations Day

The Board of Education urges the ministers to observe Race Relations Day the second Sunday in February and wherever possible to take voluntary offerings in accordance with the Discipline, and that the Conference Treasurer be instructed to direct any undesignated Race Relations Day offering to Paine College.

The Methodist College Advance

The Board acknowledges with gratitude the work done by its executive secretary the Rev. W. A. Cade. Through his fine leadership The Methodist College Advance has made progress in the face of extreme difficulty. The total cash paid by the Conference to date on the Methodist College Advance Fund, including

the 5 per cent Fund, is \$417,015.07. As the Methodist College Advance is absorbed by the Methodist College Foundation, Inc., it will profit by the vision, understanding and undergirding power contributed by preliminary work accomplished by Brother Cade and the Methodist College Advance Committee.

Appointments Recommended

We recommend the confirmation and appointment of Rev. J. G. Phillips to succeed himself as Executive Secretary of the Board of Education; Rev. Troy J. Barrett, to be Conference Director of Youth Work and State Director of the Methodist Student Movement; Miss Doris Sutton, Director of Children Work, Miss Evelyn F. Cline, to be confirmed as Office Manager and Director of Methodist Youth Fund; and Mr. John M. Meares, to be voluntary Conference Director of Adult Work, to serve without salary.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Your Board of Lay Activities, during the Conference year now closing, has continued its support of the Church's "CRUSADE FOR CHRIST" and in particular has sought to undergird every effort made in connection with this year's special emphasis on church school work. It would not be proper, were this Board not to report that laymen everywhere through the Conference have found new sources of spiritual enrichment and achieved great religious experiences through the Crusade, during the past quadrennium.

A joint meeting of this Board and the Virginia Conference Board of Lay Activities was held in Richmond last year, shortly after the close of the Annual Conference meeting. This joint meeting was found to be especially helpful, not

only in combining our separate experiences for greater inspiration but more definitely in working out together more effective plans for the year's work. The results were deemed so satisfactory that a similar meeting will be held by the two Boards in Raleigh on November 13 and 14.

The Annual observance of Laymen's Day, held each year in accord with Disciplinary authority, was more generally practiced this year than ever before. The Board heartily endorses this program and recommends that every minister of the Conference seek more diligently this year to make it possible for this program to be held in his charge.

The practice, instituted some years ago, of holding a week-end Laymen's Retreat at Louisburg College was followed this year. The Retreat was held on June 12 and 13 with a large and enthusiastic number of laymen in attendance. Your Board feels that this Retreat is a most important event and does much to promote Lay work in the churches of this Conference. The committee on ways and means of reducing the number of churches on circuit charges was authorized to continue its work and every effort is being made to render assistance in the serious problems faced by ministers, and particularly young ministers, serving five, six, and seven point charges.

Contrary to the hopes of this Board, it is regretfully noted that anonymous and scurrilous communications concerning members of this Conference have continued during the past twelve months. Such a practice, in addition to running counter to accepted principles of Christian conduct, unfairly casts the onus of suspicion on every member of the Conference of sharing in the authorship of the objectionable material and is therefore to be condemned. Your Board, in deep sorrow that such a step should be necessary, suggests the desirability of having a Committee on Investigation take cognizance of the matter, and pursue it vigorously to the end that appropriate disciplinary action be taken.

Pursuant to the responsibility imposed, your Board nominates for membership on The Methodist College Foundation of North Carolina, Incorporated, persons as named in the attached list, and nominates as the representative of this Board on The Commission on Town and County Church, Mr. Sam B. Underwood, Jr.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

As a channel through which matters pertaining to hospitals and homes may be brought to the attention of the Annual Conference, your Board of Hospitals and Homes presents the following report which is composed of reports from the Methodist Orphanage, The Golden Cross Society and the Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated.

Report I—The Methodist Orphanage

After a highly successful tenure of nearly thirty-four years the Reverend A. S. Barnes is retiring as Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage. We recognize his outstanding contribution to this important agency of our Conference and bid him Godspeed in his new office of Director of Public Relations for the Methodist Orphanage.

We wish also to recognize with gratitude two generous gifts to the Orphanage:

1. The sum of \$30,000.00 for the erection of a memorial chapel, by the late A. C. Monk of Farmville.
2. The sum of \$60,000.00 for the erection of a cottage on the Orphanage campus as a memorial to her husband by Mrs. L. B. Garris of Greenville.

We recommend:

1. That the Conference confirm the election of Reverend Leon C. Larkin as Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage at a salary of \$5,000 per year.
2. That, the following persons having been nominated as Trustees of the Orphanage, the Conference elect them for the terms expiring as indicated.
C. R. Philpot, 1951; Rev. L. S. Massey, 1953; P. D. Snipes, 1953; Norwood Boyd, 1953; Mrs. Homer Lyon, 1953; W. A. McGirt, 1953; C. A. Dillon, 1953; Mrs. E. Y. Speed, 1953; Mrs. W. W. Kitchen, 1953.
3. That the fifth Sundays continue to be used in giving special emphasis to the work of the Orphanage and that an offering be made to apply on Orphanage apportionment.
4. That the Orphanage apportionment for each local church be a sum equal to 7% of the total budget of the year 1946-1947 as reported in our 1947 Journal, less the following four items:
 - (a) Amount paid on indebtedness, including principal and interest.
 - (b) Amount paid on buildings and improvements.
 - (c) Amount paid schools and colleges.
 - (d) All special gifts for endowment purposes made either to the local church or to the Orphanage. All Orphanage specials, except those raised by the Woman's Society of Christian Service, are to be credited on the 7% asking.

Report II—The Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated

This Corporation, for the Conference, accepts the gracious offer of Miss Mary Shore and Mrs. Lucille Shore Coburn of the cabin of their father, the late Reverend J. H. Shore, subject to the conditions set forth in their offer.

1. We recommend that to implement action of the Annual Conference of 1947 as stated on page 69 of the 1947 Journal, this Conference approve the raising of a sum not to exceed \$100,000.00 for a Home for the Aged.

2. We approve the solicitation and acceptance of voluntary bequests and gifts, to provide funds necessary to support this cause.

3. We recommend the solicitation of voluntary contributions from charges, churches, persons and corporations for the purpose of erecting District Homes for retired ministers, their wives or their widows.

4. We recommend that Marvin M. Fowler, Durham, N. C., be elected Executive Secretary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, without salary. We also recommend that he be elected a member of the Board of Directors of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated.

5. We recommend that the Board of Directors of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, grant Rev. Leon M. Hall and any other qualified persons permission to erect individual homes on the land which will be received from the good people of Durham.

Report No. 3—Golden Cross

The Board of Hospitals and Homes, administering Golden Cross Funds, recommends:

1. That a committee of three approve admissions and bills at Duke Hospital: Said committee to be composed of one layman, one lay woman and one minister. All from the City of Durham.
2. That no person employed by a hospital shall be named to a district committee or to the Duke Hospital Committee.
3. That these committees be appointed by their respective District Superintendents at the beginning of the Conference year.
4. We restate that approval be made for room and board only—said items not to exceed \$6.00 per day. The number of days may be left to the discretion of the approving Committee.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The early Discipline of The Methodist Church included in the instructions for ministers the following: "You have nothing to do but to save souls, therefore, spend and be spent in this work. And go always not only to those who want you, but to those who want you most. Observe! It is not your business only to preach so many times, and to take care of this or that; but to save as many as you can; to bring as many sinners as you can to repentance, and with all your power to build them up in that holiness without which they cannot see the Lord."

Your Board of Evangelism makes the following recommendations in the hope that they will not only be included in the Journal, but that they will come to full realization and fruition during the next conference year:

1. A Preaching Mission in every Church.

Note: "Our Faith" is the emphasis for 1949 in the program "Advance for Christ and His Church." We, therefore, recommend that a Preaching Mission be conducted in every Church and that the Mission Preacher use only doctrinal themes. The great revivals of other years have come as a result of doctrinal preaching. A minister said recently, "We have a shortage of preachers because we quit having revivals."

2. The Methodist Primer by Bishop C. C. Selecman be placed in every home in the Church membership.

3. Each church seeking diligently to win one person on confession of faith for every 17 active members.

4. A spiritual retreat for pastors and laymen.

5. A conference of Methodist youth in co-operation with the Conference Board of Education to train young people in the methods of youth evangelism, and to secure commitments and re-commitments to the Christian life and to Christian vocations.

6. The District Committee on Evangelism shall confer with the District Superintendent, and under his guidance, give assistance in organizing at least one new Church or Sunday School in each district.

7. The Membership and Evangelism Committee in each local Church, working with the pastor, shall devise a plan for reaching the inactive members of that Church.

8. That H. P. Powell be appointed Conference Director of Evangelism.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

WHEREAS, the use of intoxicating liquors is admitted universally to be hurtful, both to the persons who use the same and to society generally;

WHEREAS, the legalization of beer throughout North Carolina and the establishment of liquor stores in many counties in our State have increased drinking, drunkenness and all of the other evils that accompany the liquor traffic, and,

WHEREAS, the Methodist Church always has been and still is opposed to the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors and opposed to the legalization of the nefarious business;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: By the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, assembled in Greenville, North Carolina, on this 6th day of November, 1948, as follows:

1. That we deplore the great increase in the sale of beer, wine and whiskey and the tragic increase in drinking, drunkenness, and the evils that are caused by liquor.

2. That we reaffirm our endorsement of the Allied Church League that has been organized by the Churches of North Carolina for the purpose of combating the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors; that we recommend to the 1948 Session of our Annual Conference that \$3,500.00 be appropriated to aid in

supporting the work of the Allied Church League; and that all Pastors and other church leaders and church members throughout our Conference give full cooperation and support to the program and work of the Allied Church League.

3. That, since the purpose of advertising the sale of any merchandise is to increase the sale of the same, we appeal to the owners and publishers of newspapers and other publications, published in North Carolina, to refrain from publishing advertisements of beer, wine, and whiskey; and we urge the General Assembly of North Carolina to enact a statute to prohibit the advertisement of beer, wine, and whiskey in all newspapers and other publications published in North Carolina and to prohibit such advertisements on bill boards on the highways in our State.

4 That we urge the General Assembly of 1949 to enact statutes to prohibit in North Carolina the manufacture, transportation and sale of beer, wine, whiskey and all other intoxicating liquors; and, if the General Assembly is unwilling to outlaw the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, we urge the General Assembly to at least give the people of our State the privilege of voting in a State-wide Referendum for or against the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors.

5. That in order to aid in the development of sentiment against the liquor traffic, we urge that the instruction in our public schools and in our Church Schools relative to the harmful effects of alcohol be made as effective as possible; that our Pastors preach often in behalf of total abstinence; that each Pastor arrange to have presented in his church or churches some such Temperance Drama as "The Prisoner at the Bar"; that each year the subject of Temperance be allotted a prominent place in the program of our Annual Conference; and that each year the subject of Temperance be allotted an adequate place in the program of the annual meeting of each District Conference.

6. That, while we welcome all movements and organizations that are working against the manufacture, sale, and use of intoxicating liquors, we are alarmed by the fact that some of these movements are approving and promoting the idea of so-called "moderation" in drinking. Such an attitude or idea is misleading and dangerous. All addicts of alcohol began as moderate drinkers; and, since alcoholic beverages are habit forming, it is dangerous for any person to delude himself with the idea of drinking in moderation. We urge that our Churches, our Church Schools, our public schools and all other institutions teach that the individual should abstain completely from drinking beer, wine, and whiskey, and that our Government should prohibit the manufacture and sale of these intoxicating liquors. Our position and program with respect to beer, wine, and whiskey should be Total Abstinence by the individual and Absolute Prohibition by our Government.

7. That we beseech all Pastors and other Church Officers that they do not recommend or approve for membership on the Board of Stewards, for service as an officer or teacher in the Sunday School, or for official position in any phase of Church life, any person, who manufactures, sells, advertises, buys, drinks, or votes for beer wine or whiskey.

REPORT OF PEACE COMMITTEE

The very name of the group that submits this report—The Committee on World Peace—makes inescapable the necessity of dealing with World Conditions as they affect World Peace.

The hot spots, or crisis areas, in the world today disturb the balance of international equilibrium as was never true before in all the history of mankind. India, Japan, Korea, China, Palestine, Greece, Berlin—Symbols of the chaos that reigns in Europe—are too much with us to present an academic or temporizing attitude on our part.

What measures already in force to solve these problems should we as Christians support? What other proposals ought we to originate, or sponsor?

To state these questions is to demonstrate the difficulty of suggesting answers that would be acceptable. It will be well therefore, if we seek rather to mention a few deep-lying principles upon which treatment of the total world conditions may be undertaken.

First, the liberation and integration of the individual as a free unit in society and government.

Second, the spiritual enlightenment and normal development of the grass-roots people of every Country and Nation.

Third, the economic rehabilitation of the wasted peoples of the earth.

Fourth, the extension of fundamental human rights to all people on the condition of the acceptance and discharge of the basic responsibilities of good citizenship.

The implementation of these principles may be left to the government of the nation, under the shaping and guiding influence of religion and education. Hence the magnitude of the task which confronts the Church of Christ today as it moves in to take its place as the major creative force in the redemption of a lost world!

Believing that experience has indicated that a war—comparable to fire—is easy to start and difficult to terminate and that modern science has probably provided civilization with the tools for its annihilation in atomic and biological warfare, we would recommend that this conference commend our President whose expressions upon notification of his re-election on Tuesday was a dedication of self "to the cause of peace in the world and prosperity and happiness at home" and that we seek as a church to give him every aid in our power to that end, calling attention to the fact that—with nations as with individuals—deceit, selfishness, misrepresentations and a failure to apply the Golden Rule have brought woes to both nations and individuals; and that this Conference should go on record as asking a resurvey of our acts and relations abroad, that they may be devoid of all propaganda, deceit, selfishness and misrepresentations if such exist.

We believe that we must seek freedom of communication with all the nations of the earth on an equitable basis without gift or subsidy, that our American way of life may be known to the world and that we may in turn learn of theirs. We regard this as a challenge to our church and a significant contribution to World Peace, and believe that on such a basis despots and dictators cannot flourish; for a people correctly informed will not for long wear a yoke of oppression.

We believe that the Church's most effective contribution to the achieving of peace consists in creating in many places fellowships in which dwells a living peace. This means that each of our local congregations should seek to become such centers of peace. To do this we believe that in their actual corporate life they should strive to grow in the following directions:

1. Toward an ecumenical fellowship in which all believers in Christ, of whatever denomination, class, race or color, may find themselves at home among brothers in Christ. That is to say, that the worship and fellowship of our local churches should be open to all believers, without distinction or discrimination.

2. Toward a more direct and effective ministry to the real needs and hungers of men by:—

Increased efforts to relieve the sufferings of our fellows in the world's shattered areas.

Becoming identified with and the champion of the disadvantaged and dispossessed in our own land and all lands.

An increased and more thoughtful ministry to the frustrated, defeated, spiritually confused and lost individuals who throng our communities; this ministry not to be conceived as a professional function of the clergy but the natural concern of the whole fellowship and each of its members.

3. Toward the discovery of the community of spirit; not only through cultivation of forms of worship, but by the actual sharing of life and prayer.

If such fellowships can, by God's grace, be created among us, there may yet come out of them the health that will save our sick world.

Specifically, the Peace Committee urges the Conference to adopt the following program for the ensuing year:

1. Help meet the needs of people overseas through contributions of food to CROP, through gifts of clothing and other necessities through Church World Service, and through contributions to Methodist Overseas Relief and the Fellowship of Suffering.

2. Make wider use of peace literature available through the General Peace Commission of the Methodist Church.

3. Authorize the Peace Committee to hold week-end peace institutes in local communities.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION

The Methodist Board of Publication, Incorporated, is a board of trustees elected by the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences of the Methodist Church, whose chief responsibility is the publication of the North Carolina Christian Advocate, the weekly news-magazine which is the official organ of these two Conferences.

The Board owns a printing plant at 429 West Gaston Street, Greensboro, N. C., which according to the audit of Lindsay, Squires, and Everett dated Aug. 31, 1948, is valued at \$59,594.41. The audit shows current and other assets of \$25,755 and liabilities of \$2,536.18, making a surplus of assets over liabilities of \$22,813.82. The original outlay for land, plant, machinery and furniture was \$153,476.53.

The Board also owns and controls through the fiscal agency of the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company of Winston-Salem, N. C., an endowment fund which amounted on March 26, 1948 to the principal sum of \$50,695.51. Contributions to the endowment fund received during the year were as follows:

The circulation of the North Carolina Christian Advocate shows a net decrease of about 2,250 subscriptions since August 1947. Except for an unusually profitable year in the job department and a contribution of \$2,486.16 from the earnings of the Endowment Fund, the Advocate would be facing financial embarrassment. The Board must call attention to the fact that costs of production have risen greatly, and unless the circulation of the Advocate is increased, additional income must be found in order to produce the type of periodical which the needs of our Conferences require.

The Board recommends, therefore, (1) that an active Advocate representative be named in every local church; (2) that each pastoral charge accept a goal of at least seven new subscriptions for every hundred members; and (3) that continued support be given the effort to raise the Advocate Endowment Fund,

with an amount equal to 5% of the pastor's salary as the suggested contribution from each pastoral charge which has not yet given to this cause.

The following officers were re-elected at the annual meeting of the board September 23, 1948: A. J. Hobbs, president; N. L. Eure, vice-president; Thomas C. Hoyle, secretary; and H. C. Sprinkle, Jr., editor and business manager.

The members of the Board from the North Carolina Conference are A. J. Hobbs, H. C. Smith, C. E. Jordan, N. E. Edgerton and John Hackney, and from the Western North Carolina Conference, Thomas C. Hoyle, S. B. Turrentine, N. L. Eure, John W. Moore, and W. B. Hall.

The terms of H. C. Smith and N. L. Eure having expired the Board requests that these men be re-elected by their respective Conferences for a term of five years.

REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION (1948)

The ministration of the Methodist conferences in North Carolina to their students in colleges and universities throughout the state is becoming increasingly larger and more effective. Their sphere of influence has been extended to thirty-two of the thirty-eight institutions where there are Methodist students with no employed director. These contacts, made through campus visits by the State Director for the Methodist Student Movement, the Rev. Troy J. Barrett, help to emphasize the Methodist Student Movement program, improve campus-church relationships, and create an enriching fellowship through exchanged ideas.

From the three campuses where we contribute to the support of full-time directors of Wesley Foundation, we receive encouraging reports. For the inspiration and instruction of their members, retreats were held in the fall or spring, and in some cases both. A valuable means of integration with Methodist work outside their immediate bounds has been the exchange of deputation teams with nearby fellowships. Innovations in the field of student religious activities have been established in the form of fellowship groups, bible study groups, and daily vesper services. All Foundations report interested delegations to varied youth assemblies and conferences. Newspapers provide campuses with both local and state-wide student news. Religious drama has been utilized by the organization of groups of Wesley Players.

For those concerned with the work of State College in Raleigh there has been a constant effort toward establishing a vital conception of what relation there can be between religion and the highly technical education their students receive. The Wesley Foundation director on this campus is the Rev. Charles S. McCoy. It is impressive to observe the degree of cooperation this group enjoys with other denominational organizations on the campus.

From the report of Miss Hazel Cousins, director of the Wesley Foundation at College Place, Woman's College, Greensboro, we find an important improvement in their purchase and partial furnishing of "Wesley House," as a student center. It is, of course, by no means complete, but it will greatly increase the success of their endeavors.

At the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, the new director, the Rev. Brooks Patten, and his workers are facing a vastly enlarged field of service with some 1900 Methodist students on the campus. They have ventured into a new field by organizing a fellowship group of graduate and married students. This group is also using fellowship suppers very effectively.

Delegations from the Wesley Foundations and other student organizations will be strengthened and encouraged in the fellowship to be shared at the annual Methodist Student Movement state-wide conference to be held in February.

The Wesley Foundation Commission appreciates the conferences' support of their aims in student work and petition the continuation of their interest toward providing for the spiritual, moral, and social guidance of all students. Although much progress has been made, there is still urgent need for equipment and operating funds for a dynamic program of Christian service.

The annual financial statement of the Treasurer, J. G. Phillips, and the statement of the auditor are attached to this report and submitted to the Annual Conference for printing in the Journal.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Your Commission on Town and Country Work has sought to promote the interests of the country church as outlined in the report of the Committee on Rural Church Policy and Strategy submitted to and adopted by last year's Annual Conference.

We wish to express special appreciation for the splendid work done by the following committees: (1) The Committee on Experimental Rural Parish Projects, composed of C. T. Hicks, Mrs. H. B. Bryan, Key W. Taylor, W. A. Crow, C. W. Goldston. (2) The Committee on Rural Pastors' Salaries, composed of W. A. Graham, W. J. Smith, S. B. Underwood, Jr. (3) The Committee on Rural Church Parsonages, composed of H. G. Ruark, J. L. Joyce, E. G. Purcell, Jr. (4) The Committee on Rural Research, composed of J. M. Ormond, Key W. Taylor, T. McM. Grant, W. L. Clegg, W. A. Graham, E. D. C. Brewer, Mrs. J. H. Cutchin. The reports of these committees have been submitted to the Rural Church Planning Committee authorized by the last Annual Conference.

In cooperation with the College Advance Movement and the Duke University Divinity School, the Commission on Town and Country Work has undertaken in the closing months of the conference year to raise a fund of \$50,000 to be known as the J. M. Ormond Fund. It was agreed that the income from this \$50,000 would be used for the purpose of providing an enlarged program of recruiting and specialized training of men for the rural ministry of the North Carolina Conference. The administration of the Ormond Fund is to be under the direction of the Department of Rural Research of the Duke Divinity School in cooperation with the Town and Country Commission. Key W. Taylor has served as chairman of the Ormond Fund Committee and during the months of September

and October devoted his full time, without charge, to the raising of the Ormond Fund. We record our debt of gratitude to Mr. Taylor for his excellent leadership.

By ruling of the recent General Conference pastors who have not been admitted into full connection and duly ordained are not entitled to administer the Lord's Supper. Inasmuch as sixty or more of the charges in our Conference are now being served by students and accepted supplies, this unfortunate ruling leaves approximately 22,000 of our Methodist people without regular access to the Lord's Table. In view of this fact—a fact which we hope will be altered at the next General Conference—we urge our District Superintendents to work out a plan whereby the churches served by our students and accepted supplies may receive the Lord's Supper at least quarterly. This might be done by an exchange of pulpits between the ministers entitled to administer the Communion and those who are now denied that privilege.

The Displaced Persons Act of 1948, which was passed by Congress in June, authorizes the admission to the United States of 205,000 displaced persons over a period of 2 years. It is expected that about one-fourth of these folk will be Protestant or Eastern Orthodox whose resettlement will become the responsibility of our American Protestant Churches. Our Methodist Church will be asked to resettle 5,000 persons or approximately 2,000 family units. Among these are about 400 Methodists including some 15 ministers.

The Division of Home Missions and Church Extension is asking the Commission on Town and Country Work in each Annual Conference to find places for five or six families. In cooperation with this request from the Division of Home Missions and Church Extension the Commission on Town and Country Work of the North Carolina Conference is recommending that each of the seven districts of the Conference absorb one of these families. It is recommended that the responsibility for seeing that this project is carried out be placed on the District Superintendent and on the clerical member of the Commission on Town and Country Work of each district.

We recommend that all our country churches diligently promote both the study and the sale of the mission study book by Bishop W. C. Martin, entitled "The Country Church."

In accordance with the requirement of the 1948 Discipline, we request that the Conference elect and the Bishop appoint Rev. J. D. A. Autry as secretary of town and country work, to serve without salary but with such expense allowances as the Commission on Town and Country Work may determine, but not to exceed \$1,000.

Your Commission has consulted with the Rural Church Planning Committee and records its approval of this Committee's recommendations.

REPORT OF RURAL CHURCH PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Rural Church Planning Committee appointed by the Bishop at the last Annual Conference has received reports from the Committee on Rural Research, the Committee on Rural Parsonages, the Committee on Rural Pastors' Salaries, and the Committee on Rural Experimental Projects. Out of the study of these reports the Rural Church Planning Committee submits the following report, for the consideration of the Conference.

Report No. 1

1. Minimum Salary Schedule

In view of rising living costs, the salaries of men in the lower brackets should be increased again this year. We recommend the following scale as a goal:

- (1) Single men\$2,000
- (2) Married men with no children\$2,200
- (3) Married men with children\$2,400

However, in view of the fact that the present sustentation fund is inadequate to raise the minimum salaries to these levels for this coming year, we approve the salary scale as recommended by Commission of World Service and Finance Report.

2. A Committee to Give Continued Study to Problems of Ministerial Support.

We recommend that a sub-committee of five members of the Board of Missions and Church Extension be formed to give continued study to the varied problems of ministerial support and to suggest means of meeting these needs. It is suggested that this committee be made up on one layman from a rural charge, one preacher from a rural charge, and three others to be determined by the Board. In order that the committee might work most effectively, it is recommended that its members be persons not already overtaxed by duties on the Board.

3. Recruiting of Ministers

We recommend that the Bishop lead a definite conference wide program acquainting our people with the church's need for more ministers and lifting up before our youth the opportunities for service which the ministry offers. This program is to have as a definite purpose the recruiting of ministers for immediate service as well as discovering candidates who will undertake to train themselves for the ministry.

4. Experimental Rural Parishes

We recommend that the following charges be placed on "The Approved list of Experimental Rural Parish Projects," as provided for in paragraph 5, page 124 of the 1947 Journal: Walstonburg, Evansdale, and Battleboro. We further recommend that there be a continuing Annual Conference Committee on Experimental

Rural Church Projects, said committee to be appointed by the Chairman of the Town and Country Commission:

5. We recommend the continuation of the Committee on Rural Research to be appointed by the Bishop.

6. We recommend the continuation of the Committee on Rural Church Planning to be appointed by the Bishop.

7. Travel Expense

Effective this conference year now beginning, each pastor shall receive from his charge, mileage payment for his car at the rate of 3 cents per mile for exclusively church travel, both local and general. This operational cost shall be paid over and above stated salary and shall be paid monthly on the basis of an estimate approved by the 1st quarterly conference and a specific figure approved by the 4th quarterly conference. On charges having more than one church the mileage payment shall be divided among the churches on the basis of mutual agreement.

In instances where pastors do not reside in the bounds of their charges, as in the cases of certain student pastors and certain supply pastors, mileage payment shall not apply for distance traveled from place of residence to place of ministry.

It is suggested that pastors receiving salaries of \$3,300, or more, remit their mileage payments to the treasurer of the Town and Country Commission who would annually pro-rate the total money to pastors receiving only minimum salary. The basis of pro-rating would be decided by the Executive Committee on the Town and Country Commission.

8. We recommend reduction of larger circuits as rapidly as recruits to the ministry make this possible. In the formation of new circuits the following items should be considered:

(a) Circuits should be made up of three churches, preferably, and never more than four.

(b) Circuits should follow natural community lines with no unaccounted for territory between circuit boundaries.

(c) Closed churches, churches about to close, and churches in need of relocation should be investigated and proper steps taken.

(d) In creating new charges the over-all needs of the conference should be considered as well as the ability of a church or group of churches to assume necessary financial obligations.

(e) Undeveloped charges which have promise of growth should have salaries supplemented, thus assuring them of pastoral leadership which will enable them to become self-supporting.

(f) Unchurched communities with potential Methodist congregations should be discovered and provided for.

9. Stewardship

Reports which have come to this committee from two of the Experimental Rural Parish Projects indicate that adapted forms of The Lord's Acre and Harvest Day plans have been useful in developing a sense of Stewardship among rural folk and have given spiritual significance to farm life. We recommend these methods of developing Christian Stewardship to all rural pastors.

10. Transportation

We recommend the use of buses to provide transportation from outlying communities to Church and Sunday School.

11. Buildings, Equipment, Grounds

We recommend that rural pastors lead their congregations in remodeling and equipping buildings and beautifying grounds so that rural churches may provide

an adequate ministry of worship, education, and social activities of the communities in which they are located.

Report No. II

During the year a committee on Rural Church Parsonages has sent out a questionnaire which was answered by 230 pastors and 174 Woman's Societies. There were only 16 charges in the conference from which replies were not received. The recommendations in this report are based on the information thus secured.

The committee wishes to express its appreciation to Mrs. Gurney P. Hood and Mrs. L. C. Larkin, who served as its advisors.

I. General recommendations:

We recommend that:—

1. There be constituted in each charge a parsonage committee which shall be representative of both the laymen and the women of the churches. And that this committee inspect the parsonage at least once each year to determine needed repairs and improvements.

a. We request that the district superintendents at the first quarterly conference on each charge call for the appointment of this committee, and furnish its chairman with a copy of these recommendations.

2. That in the budget of each charge there be an item for the maintenance and improvement of the parsonages.

a. It is suggested that this amount be at least 1% of the original cost of maintenance, plus additional provision for improvement.

3. That, where possible, a study for the pastor be provided in the church.

4. That our churches consider the fact that there is at present a greater than normal need for replacement of parsonages.

a. In the light of the average number of persons in parsonage families, we suggest that where new parsonages are being built or acquired, houses of 7 or 8 rooms would be adequate.

5. That there be a continuing Annual Conference committee on parsonages, to be appointed by the Chairman of the Town and Country Commission. Among the functions that this committee might perform are: to recommend revised minimum standards, and to investigate the possibility of providing standard plans and specifications for parsonages.

II. Minimum standards

We recommend that every parsonage in the conference be expected to meet the following minimum standards:—

1. Be equipped with running water and sewage disposal.
2. Be completely screened, with screens in good condition.
3. Be underpinned.
4. Exterior be painted at least once every five years.

III Division of responsibility

We recommend that:—

1. Charges be expected to furnish parsonages with heavy furniture (including heating, cooking and refrigerating facilities), rugs, shades or blinds, curtains and drapes.

a. In particular we recommend that as quickly as possible each parsonage be furnished with modern, automatic cook stove and refrigerator.

2. Pastors be expected to furnish bed and table linens, dishes, table silver and kitchen ware.

3. That pastors consider themselves responsible for repair or replacement in case of damage beyond normal wear and tear done to the house or furnishings by the parsonage family.

In compliance with the action of the conference at its session last night the Rural Church Planning Committee offers the following resolution as a measure to give our ministers in the minimal salary scales a more adequate salary:

Be it resolved that the percentage for Sustentation Fund for this conference year be set at an amount equal to 2% of all monies raised in the conference year 1946-1947 as shown in the 1947 journal allowing the same deductions that are made in setting the orphanage apportionment, and that all other actions thus far in the conference pertaining to the Sustentation Fund percentage figure be repealed.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON ADEQUATE SUPPORT OF THE MINISTRY

Recognizing the necessity of sufficient financial support of the minister so that he might work effectively, and with a view of present day needs and resources in the North Carolina Conference, your Committee on Adequate Support of the Ministry recommends:

First, that the minimum salary levels for 1948-49 be:

\$1,900.00 for unmarried ministers.

2,050.00 for married ministers without children.

2,200.00 for married ministers with a child.

Second, that an apportionment for the Sustentation Fund to each charge be made in the amount of one and three-quarters percent ($1\frac{3}{4}\%$) of total money raised in said charge less amounts paid on indebtedness, principal and improvements; schools and colleges; Crusade for Christ; and special endowment gifts. The 1947 Journal to be the basis for determining the total money raised.

Third, that the District Superintendents be requested to secure larger ministerial support, whenever possible, from the charges on the Sustentation Fund.

Fourth, that the Board of Missions and Church Extension be requested to appropriate more than the minimum salary if and when special needs require and Mission funds will justify.

REPORT OF INTER-BOARD COUNCIL COMMITTEE

The feeling has been growing among many members of our conference that the time has come for a more united, purposeful and cooperative program designed to meet the needs of our conference as a whole.

To promote the work of the Church, the General Conference has ordered certain Annual Conference Boards and Commissions with duties defined in the Discipline. We recognize the wisdom of this legislation and believe in the essential and continuing task of these Boards and Commissions. However, we are presented with the problem of correlating the work of the various organizations. Therefore, we recommend the formation of the Inter-Board Council, whose duties shall be to correlate and coordinate the work of the several Boards, Commissions and Committees of the Annual Conference.

We recommend that all Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees hold a mid-year meeting to study the opportunities and needs in their respective fields, plan their programs and submit them to the Inter-Board Council for coordination and correlation. We also recommend that the full membership of the Boards, Commissions and Committees meet jointly with the Inter-Board Council to hear the reports and plans from all the Boards, Commissions and Committees and consider the reports to be presented to the ensuing Annual Conference; this joint meeting to be held not later than 30 days preceding the meeting of the Annual Conference.

The Inter-Board Council

The Inter-Board Council shall be composed quadrennially as follows: The resident Bishop; the Conference Secretary; the secretary of the Cabinet; three members each from the Board of Education and the Board of Missions and Church Extension; two members each from the Board of Evangelism, the Board of Lay Activities, the Board of Conference Claimants, the Board of Hospitals and Homes; one member each from the Board of Ministerial Training, the Board of Temperance, the Commission on Town and Country Work, the Committee on World Peace, the Conference Youth Fellowship and the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service. The District Superintendents shall also be members of the Council. Each organization shall elect its own representatives to the Council. There shall also be six members at large—three ministerial and three Lay, nominated by the Council and elected by the Annual Conference. All Conference and District Secretaries shall be invited to the meetings of the Council.

The Council shall elect a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The Council shall have not less than two regular meetings annually, one of which shall be not later than thirty days prior to the meeting of the Annual Conference, for the purpose of correlating and coordinating the program for the ensuing year. The member attending the Council meeting shall constitute a quorum. The Council shall form an executive Committee composed of the officers and four person elected by the Council. The executive committee shall meet at such times as the Chairman shall deem it necessary. The secretary shall mail promptly to each member of the Council a copy of the minutes of each meeting.

The Bishop shall call together the District Superintendents, the Executive Committee and other related workers soon after Conference to study the program for the year and launch it in the Districts.

The Council shall make full report of its activities and expenses to each Annual Conference and all participating organizations.

It is requested that the Conference Secretary convene the Inter-Board Council for organization as soon as convenient following this session of the Annual Conference.

Believing that there is enough interest in this matter, we think it is worthy of our consideration. Therefore, to bring this matter before our conference, we would like to suggest the following plans for your consideration.

Plan No. 1

First: That the North Carolina Annual Conference now in session at Greenville, N. C. consider the adoption of a spring Conference, to be held as near the first of June each year as may seem feasible to the bishop in charge.

Second: That if this Conference should consider the plan of a spring Conference the first Conference year shall be six months instead of twelve in order that the time of the first Conference may be held in the spring following the adoption of the plan.

Third: That the committee on arrangements or entertainments of the Conference contact one of the Educational Institutions within the bounds of the Annual Conference regarding the possibility of holding the Annual Conference on the campus of the University each year, immediately after the closing of the spring term and before the beginning of the Summer School.

Plan No. 2 (The Alternative Plan)

That, if a Spring Conference seems inadvisable, then we recommend that an early Fall Conference be held preferably the first weeks in September or thereabout. To fix the First of September as the date for Annual Conference, would pre-suppose a ten months conference, following the adoption of such a plan.

We, therefore, recommend that the Bishop appoint a Committee to study these plans and to bring in a report at the next Annual Conference, with recommendation for Conference action.

RESOLUTION ON GAMBLING

WHEREAS, there appears to be a growing tendency in North Carolina to legalize gambling, particularly in the operation of racing tracks; and that there is now a greyhound racing track in Carteret County near Morehead City, N. C., where gambling on the outcome of races is apparently legalized;

AND WHEREAS, it appears that there may be efforts before the next General Assembly of North Carolina to further amend and modify the general laws against gambling at race tracks;

AND WHEREAS, it has been the public policy of this State to suppress gambling in all forms;

AND WHEREAS, throughout the ages it has been recognized that gambling is a social and moral evil; and that gambling affects not only those who actually engage in gambling, but the children and dependents of those who gamble.

AND WHEREAS, it is the sense and desire of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church that gambling should not only be prevented from spreading, but that all forms of present gambling, whether apparently legal or otherwise, be discouraged and prohibited;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, assembled in Greenville, N. C. on this 6th day of November, 1948, go on record as opposing all forms of gambling, whether ap-

parently legal or not, and that the members of this Conference exert their influence in all proper ways to that end, by requesting those in official authority to oppose attempts to legalize gambling.

Memoirs

ARNOLD CHESTER THOMPSON

Arnold Chester Thompson was born in Durham, N. C., March 9, 1896, the son of the late James D. Thompson and Nancy Smith Thompson. He died December 3, 1947 at the Veterans Hospital, Kecoughtan, Va.

One can readily see from the above paragraph that his life was not long. But there was struggle and determination that cannot be recorded upon the written page. He was educated in the Durham City Schools and enlisted for service September 6, 1917. He was discharged with the rank of Chaplain on April 19, 1919.

"Tommie," as he was known to his many friends, was determined to prepare himself for the Christian ministry. He spent two years at Toccoa Falls Institute and in 1923 was graduated from Taylor University, Upland, Indiana. From 1923 until 1931 he traveled for the John A. Hertel Co., selling Bibles and Biblical literature. In 1931 he entered the Duke University Divinity School, and was admitted on trial to the North Carolina Conference at the annual session in Greenville. In 1934 he received the B. D. degree from the Duke Divinity School. He was ordained Deacon in 1935 and Elder in 1937. After serving West Burlington, Stem, Andrews-Massey, Moncure, Battleboro, Columbia and West End, he was retired because of illness, by the Annual Conference meeting in Durham in 1941. Tommie was married on August 19, 1934 to Miss Margaret Mullen of Durham, who survives along with son, David Arnold, his mother, six brothers and a sister.

Funeral services were conducted on December 5, 1947 in the Calvary Methodist Church in Durham by the pastor, Rev. Leon M. Hall assisted by Rev. Jesse H. Lanning of Clinton. He was laid to rest in the Maplewood Cemetery in Durham with semi-military rites being conducted at the grave by the American Legion.

It can be said of him that he was a plain man. He loved people, and there was much compassion in his heart and soul for plain, down-to-earth folk. He served his Master happily, wherever he was assigned to serve. He had a great faith, and there was a radiance upon his countenance even in those final hours before he fell asleep.

Though his ministry may seem short in terms of years, I feel sure he would have us think in terms best expressed by William Penn.

"They that love beyond the world cannot be separated by it.

Death cannot kill what never dies.

Death is but crossing the world as loved ones do the seas;

They live in one another still—

This is the comfort of everyone; that tho' they may be said to die,

Yet their love and devotion are, in the best sense, ever present because immortal."

CHARLES NELSON PHILLIPS

The Reverend Charles Nelson Phillips was called to his eternal home on December 12, 1947, from the parsonage of Epworth Methodist

Church, Wilmington, North Carolina. He was beginning the eighth year of his second pastorate, having previously served the church for five years (1925-30), being recalled by popular demand in 1940.

His passing brought real sorrow to his congregation, to numerous others in the city, and to hundreds of people in the Wilmington District, where he had served for the past thirty-three years.

Brother Phillips was born at Princeton, North Carolina on March 26, 1875. In early manhood he was married to Miss Margaret Aldridge of Southport, North Carolina, whose inspiration and help strengthened his ministry as they happily labored together for fifty-four years. He is survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Nellie Watts and two grandchildren, all of Wilmington.

He joined the North Carolina Conference held in Wilmington in 1915, at which time he was assigned to Scott's Hill Charge. His other appointments were Hallsboro, Tabor City, Pamlico and Shallotte.

With the exception of two years, his entire ministry was spent in the Wilmington District. For twenty-two years he was elected secretary of the Wilmington District Conference, and in 1946, at the conference held in Whiteville, he was presented a beautiful chair in appreciation of his long term of efficient service as secretary of the conference. The gift was presented by Bishop W. Walter Peele, who paid a glowing tribute to the fine spirit of this faithful and beloved servant of Christ.

Brother Phillips was in his thirty-third year as an active minister when the final summons came, having been a faithful and effective minister of Christ, loved and respected by all who knew him, wherever he has served. He loved his people and spent his life teaching little children, giving courage to men and women who carried heavy loads, and bringing comfort to the burdened and sorrowing. He was frequently called to assist in funerals on the charges he had previously served as pastor, and his loving and sympathetic manner was always a comfort and blessing to those in sorrow. His life and ministry were a benediction to every community in which he lived. He was never too busy to counsel with, comfort and help anyone who sought his aid. He was truly a friend to everyone.

The heritage left by Brother Phillips to his family, his friends and all those who came within the circle of his influence is a treasure of inestimable value. His great faith in God, and the translation of that faith into a life of gentleness, strength, purity and love are worthy of emulation by all who knew and loved him. Through his life and service he made a definite contribution to the building of The Kingdom of God.

His last year as pastor of Epworth Church was one of physical suffering. Ill and suffering, yet he visited his people and met his appointments regularly, almost to the very end of his earthly journey; ever anxious that the people of Epworth Church and the community should have the privilege of worship and Sunday School. He was faithful to his God-given calling—even unto the end. His funeral was conducted from Epworth Church, Wilmington, by his District Superintendent, Dr. E. L. Hillman, assisted by Reverend Mr. Pate of the neighboring Calvary Baptist Church, and Rev. A. S. Parker, of Fayetteville, N. C. His body was laid to rest in Oakdale Cemetery, in Wilmington, N. C.

JOHN HENRY SHORE

Words are but feeble instruments with which to portray adequately the life and character of a genuine Christian minister such as Rev. John Henry Shore was known to be. Were it possible to write in plain, bold outline an accurate likeness of this godly man, a noble service would be rendered. It is certain that a full, complete delineation of Brother Shore cannot be given in this brief tribute, yet it is hoped that some of his noble virtues and character achievements can be set forth to serve as worthy goals for all who may read.

Born in a country home in Forsyth County, North Carolina, with Christian parents, John Henry Shore and Martha Ann Dull Shore, on July 31, 1865, he was destined to experience the hardships and benefits of a period of tragic destruction and subsequent reconstruction. That he made a good start toward a life of usefulness is attested by his conversion and joining the Methodist Church at Doub Chapel in the same county at the age of thirteen. An excellent basis of training was supplied in his family where love, work, and religion were magnified. He attended the county schools and later on went to Rutherford College.

Having lost his father in the war, it remained for his Christian mother to have the responsibility of the family and always through life Brother Shore wanted to pay high tribute to her. Under her influence it was easy for him to consider the ministry for his life's work. He experienced a call from early youth and was licensed to preach at Bethel Church in Forsyth County. He was admitted into the North Carolina Conference on trial at its session held at New Bern in 1888. He was appointed by Bishop John C. Granberry to the Leasburg Circuit as Junior Preacher. Rev. D. L. Earnhardt was the preacher in charge. His subsequent appointments are as follows: Milton 1890-1893; Yanceyville 1894-1897; Burlington 1898-1901; Franklinton 1902-1905; Smithfield 1906-1908; Greenville 1909-1911; Dunn 1912-1915; Fifth Avenue, Wilmington 1916; Wilmington District 1917-1920; Rockingham District 1921-1924; Hay Street, Fayetteville, 1925-1927; Weldon 1928-1931; Hamlet 1932-1934; Assistant Missionary Secretary 1935-1936; Retired Relation 1936; Fayetteville District 1937. He thus served in the active ministry forty-eight years.

Comparable to his good fortune in having noble, Christian parents is that of his choice of a life companion. He and Miss Mary Caroline Winstead of Person County were married at the home of the bride on December 10, 1893. Miss Winstead's parents were Henry Samuel Winstead and Ella Minerva Wagstaff. She thus brought into the life of the twenty-eight year old minister the heritage of two cultured families. From this wedlock three children were born, Mary Walton Shore, Lucille Cuninggim Shore Coburn, and John Henry Shore. Miss Shore and Mrs. Coburn now live in Person County. John died at the age of seven years.

Toward the evening time of their active ministry, Brother and Mrs. Shore built a home near Roxboro, Person County, where they expected to live after retirement. They actually had ten years of quiet, happy life together at the "Schorr Cabin" before Mrs. Shore died. Brother Shore continued to live there until his death on February 3, 1948. He was buried in the cemetery at Concord Methodist Church in Person County. The funeral services were conducted by Revs. H. C. Smith and C. P. Womack.

For 59 consecutive years—1888 to 1947—Brother Shore was present at the Annual Conferences. Although extremely weak and hardly able to make the journey to the Conference at Elizabeth City last November, this faithful man of God expressed his wish and intention to answer the roll call as long as he lived. It must be a source of inward satisfaction to his two daughters to know that his desire to attend every Conference to the end was fulfilled.

Brother Shore was indeed one called of God to the ministry of Christ. He took the call seriously and would allow nothing trivial or unimportant to stand in the way of his faithful performance of duty. He had deep convictions which furnished a kind of urgent, religious drive recognized by those who knew him best. He had a courage to support those convictions, yet he was never unkind to those who might have differing opinions. His manner was firm, yet tender. He spoke with authority, yet with humility. He was a life-long student of the Bible and of the Christian religion. His love for people was comparable to his love for God, hence he was an effective evangelist. Nothing gave him greater satisfaction than the conversion of human souls to the Christian faith. He was a convincing debater for those things he knew to be right and his friendship to those of us who knew him best was highly prized.

In the declining years of his life during his retirement at home in the Concord community, Brother Shore continued to serve. He supplied in churches of various denominations and gave himself freely in a helpful ministry in and around Roxboro. At Concord Church as teacher of the Bible Class, Brother Shore rendered a valuable service and members of his class were eager to attend and felt that his messages were sermons.

The influence of this great, good man will live on through time to bless, to inspire, and to comfort those who are responsive to noble, Christian living.

JOHN ROBERT EDWARDS

John Robert Edwards was born April 3, 1889 at Mount Vernon Springs in Chatham County. He was the son of James Robert Edwards and Rebecca Jane Phillips Edwards, two of the best people that

Chatham County ever produced. These people were the backbone of Providence Church which is now a part of Goldston Circuit. It was this church that John Robert joined when he was eighteen years of age.

John got the last part of his High School training at Campbell College. He took his college training at the University of North Carolina and Duke University. At the latter institution he received the first of his training for the Methodist ministry. His further training came from the Methodist itinerancy in the North Carolina Conference where he served the following charges: Caswell Street, in Kinston; Graham; Bynum; Southport; Whiteville; Bethel; Gatesville; Mount Gilead; Clinton; Fifth Avenue, in Wilmington; and Roanoke Rapids.

In his marriage to Miss Gertrude Selby, of Aurora, he was quite fortunate. The perfection of this union is vindicated by the thousands of devoted Christians influenced by this happy couple. It is further vindicated by the quality of children born of this union. Robert Dixon is a steward in West Market Street, Greensboro. Rev. J. Paul is pastor of the South Robeson Circuit in the North Carolina Conference; and Mary Elizabeth is teaching in the Roanoke Rapids High School where she is also a leader in the last church served by her father.

John Edwards had the rare ability to grieve with the sorrowing and to laugh with those who were happy. For this reason his friends in the ministry traveled great distances to spend time with him. He was their sunshine. They told him their sorrows and they told him their joys and he heard both with a warm heart and a ready response.

In his ministerial life he was a pastor-evangelist. In his own natural way he skillfully guided men and women, boys and girls into the kingdom of God's dear Son. He always came up to Conference with a good report on number received by profession of faith.

John Robert died on Monday, May 17, 1948, following an unusually hard Sunday's work. His only complaint was that he was very tired. It was his heart that was tired and those who knew him best did not wonder at that because they knew well that that was where he carried his whole congregation. There was no surprise that ministers and former parishioners gathered in great numbers when the news of his death first saddened their hearts. At his funeral at the First Methodist Church in Roanoke Rapids, those who loved him crowded the church to capacity. Dr. A. J. Hobbs, the District Superintendent conducted the services. He was assisted by Reverends L. M. Hall, Willis Stevens, and D. E. Earnhardt. Interment was in the cemetery at Siler City, N. C.

In a way, we will go along without him but in many respects he is closer now than he has ever been before. He is not dead because men like that can never die. He had so much of the God qualities in him that he must of necessity rise above the accidents known as time and space.

LUTHER BURGESS BRIDGERS

Rev. Luther B. Bridgers was born February 14, 1884 at Margarettsville, North Carolina. He began preaching in 1901 and in the same year married Miss Sarah Veatch of Wilmore, Kentucky. In 1910 he lost his wife and three children in a fire. In 1914 Brother Bridgers married Miss Aline Winburn of Gainesville, Georgia. He was a general evangelist 1914-1932, and was pastor 1932-1948. He served the following churches

in Atlanta, Georgia: Trinity, Inman Park, and Haygood Memorial. He transferred to the North Carolina Conference in 1944, serving in Morehead City. He died May 27, 1948, and was buried in Gainesville, Georgia. He is survived by his wife, one son, Luther Bridgers, Jr., two grandchildren, Luther, III and Bobby, a sister Mrs. R. D. Stephenson of Craddock, Virginia, and three nephews: W. W. Lewis, High Point, North Carolina, Robert Lewis, Craddock, Virginia, and Joe Gasque.

Luther Bridgers was a master of assemblies. I have seen him sway large audiences with the power of his spiritual appeal. In his ministry of evangelism a large number of people were brought into the Kingdom of God. He did not spare himself. He gave himself with entire abandon to evangelistic work. His wife, Mrs. Aline Winburn Bridgers, who is an accomplished musician, added much to his success both as an evangelist and pastor. As a pastor he retained the evangelistic note, and his pastorates were marked by the progress of the church. His going away at a comparatively early age seemed from our human viewpoint to have been untimely. But God does not measure life by length of years, but by depth of devotion, and height of purpose and breadth of compassion. We cannot think of Brother Luther Bridgers as being without a mission in the heavenly mansion. We think of him as Tennyson thought of his friend Hallam.

JOHN COMPTON HUMBLE

Rev. John Compton Humble, a son of the late Daniel and Annie Humble of Randolph County, was born January 28, 1872. He departed from this life Saturday, August 14, 1948, while visiting his daughter, Mrs. Stacy Lewis, at Cambridge, Maryland. He lived here with us and his loved ones seventy-six years, six months, and seventeen days.

Surviving to mourn his going are the following: his wife, the former Elizabeth H. Walters; two daughters, Mrs. Brona McTyeire Humble Etheridge of Virginia Beach, Va., and Mrs. Florine Sellars Humble Lewis of Cambridge, Maryland; two grandchildren, and multiplied relatives and friends.

Brother Humble retired from the ministry in 1939 after serving as minister in the North Carolina Methodist Conference, of which he was a member for 44 years. The world is poorer without his bodily presence, but his spirit goes on challenging us to devotion such as his, to every cause dear to the Master whom he so faithfully loved and served.

As a minister, he was a great gospel preacher. One could not sit at his feet without feeling the heartbeat of his evangelistic passion. Brother Humble was once my pastor. After I entered the ministry, I worked with him in his pulpit, and he worked with me in mine. I have seen him close up from every angle and know his passion for souls. From the beginning, his ministry was full of the glow and warmth of evangelism. He preached with such zeal and earnestness that sinners could feel the pull of Christ in his messages. Few of our ministers

ever put their hands on more heads in help baptism than did this consecrated minister. He was well versed, not only in the scriptures, but also in history and literature. His sermons were crowned with the best in the material, and were running over with the highest and the richest in the spiritual.

John Humble was reared in the country. His parents were farmers. Their homes was filled with the spirit of Christ-likeness. They went to Bible School and worshipped in the old Rehoboth church in Randolph County. While the Rev. Phillip Greening was holding a revival in this church, all three of the boys, William Bynum, John Compton, and Hilary Augustas, gave their lives to Christ and his kingdom. All three of the boys joined the church at the same time. Within a few years, all three were in the ministry of the Methodist church. And may I say that they were evangelistic and extremely effective ministers of the gospel.

As a pastor, Brother Humble was sympathetic and loving. By the bedside of the sick and in the homes of the bereaved he could pray most gracious prayers. He ministered to the rich and the poor, the learned and the illiterate, with equal interest and devotion. He was a faithful shepherd and cared for the sheep, always seeking to lead them into greener pastures.

He spent much time in trying to inspire young men to give their lives wholly to God and the ministry. He was instrumental in leading many in this field of endeavor.

John loved his home. As well as he appeared in all other circles, he was his best in the home circle. He was always the husband who showed tender appreciation for his companion. As a father, he loved his children. He made every provision possible for their stay and happiness in this world. What they are is a good testimony to the success of their parents.

Brother Humble began preaching in 1898, and he served the following fields: Spring Hope, Ocracoke Island; Newton Grove, Goldston, Jonesboro, Northampton Circuit, Leasburg, Laurinburg, Rocky Mount Mission, Manteo, Durham Circuit, Battleboro, Whitakers, Parkton, Fayetteville Circuit, Hookerton Oriental and La Grange N. C. On leaving La Grange, he retired in November, 1939.

John Compton Humble's funeral was conducted in the First Methodist Church in Siler City, N. C. by the Reverend A. S. Parker, W. L. Clegg, and J. J. Boone. His body was left sleeping in Loves Creek Baptist Cemetery. Many ministers and laymen stood near by and walked away with bowed, uncovered heads.

When the curtains are lifted and the scroll unfolds, we shall expect to see his name on the roll of honor and written in letters of gold.

Norman C. Yearby was born March 26, 1872. He married Annie L. Lundsford November 7, 1900. Their children are N. L. Yearby, Durham, N. C.; James T. Yearby, Dunn, N. C.; Laura Y. Turner, Smithfield, N. C.

There are five grandchildren: Ann Yearby, Buddy Yearby, Sandy Yearby, LeMay Turner, and Elizabeth Ann Turner.

Brother Yearby joined the N. C. Conference at New Bern in 1900. He served the following charges: Tarboro, Mebane, Hillsboro, Leasburg, Roxboro, Mt. Gilead, Hertford, Raeford, Four Oaks, Goldsboro Circuit and Elm City. He served also on the Conference Board of Missions and on Conference Committees. He superannuated at Wilmington, N. C., in 1939, and made his home from that time at Smithfield until his death October 4.

Brother Yearby was like a father to so many of the young preachers, and it was my great loss to lose my own father soon after coming into the Conference over twenty years ago. Brother Yearby from the beginning of my grief adopted me, and through the years took the place of my preacher father. As I think of both today, they were saints on earth. In the quiet resting place at Riverside Cemetery, Smithfield, N. C., with friends and loved ones there, his body was tenderly placed, but his soul had gone like a bird freed from a cage back to God who gave it. He was near and dear to everyone. Man of God, well done! We will be better Christians because you lived and came our way.

JESSE DAVID BUNDY

Men in most professions are so much alike that one of them can drop out without it hardly being noticed. But every now and then there is one in the group that does not fit into what we call the average. We refer to such a one sometimes as "one of a kind." Rev. Jesse D. Bundy was more than an average preacher. He was a "voice in the wilderness" not just an echo. The service he rendered as a member of the North Carolina Conference was outstanding, it was unique.

He was born in Marlboro County, South Carolina, December 12, 1859, and died in Fayetteville, N. C. October 18, 1948. He spent much of his early life in Laurinburg and joined the Methodist Church there while yet a boy. He attended old Trinity College in Randolph County. He graduated in the class of 1878. After finishing college he taught school in Guilford and Davidson Counties. Then he taught several years in Laurinburg, also served as Superintendent of Public Education in Richmond County. In 1883 he was associated with the late T. T. Covington in founding and operating a newspaper known as The Laurinburg Exchange. He was editor and business manager of the paper for eight years.

It was about the year 1890 that he felt the call to preach, and in November 1891 he was licensed to preach. Dr. J. T. Gibbs was his presiding elder, and Rev. W. B. Doub was his pastor. That same month he was admitted on trial into the North Carolina conference which met in Greenville. It is very fitting that after 57 years of distinguished service this memorial service should be held in the city where he joined the conference.

Brother Bundy served the following charges. In this list are some of the so-called poor circuits, the large city station and four terms as presiding elder. Cumberland Circuit 1891-1894; Lumberton Circuit 1895-1898; Weldon 1899-1901; Henderson 1902-1903; Washington District 1904-1905; Kinston 1906-1908; Elizabeth City 1909-1912; Grace 1913-1915; Warrenton District 1916; Hay Street 1917-1918; Fayetteville District 1919-1922; Rockingham 1923-1924; Fayetteville District 1925-1928; Smithfield 1929-1931; Mebane 1932-1935; In 1935 he retired and lived in Fayetteville until his death.

He was first married to Miss Annie Petteway, daughter of Captain and Mrs. J. T. Petteway of Laurinburg, September 30, 1886. There were six children, only one of whom survives him, E. E. Bundy of Greenville. S. C. Mrs. Bundy died in August 1905. Brother Bundy was remarried April 24, 1908 to Miss Katie Bizzell of Kinston, who survives him. There were three children born to this union all of whom are living; Mrs. J. E. McLain, Dr. Lumsden Bundy of North Wilkesboro, and Dr. James Bundy of La Grange, N. C. There are five grand children and two great grandchildren. Also a sister, Mrs. Maggie Kehoe of New Bern, still lives.

The funeral, the details of which brother Bundy had arranged, was held in Fayetteville, Hay Street church. The ministers in the service were, Revs. W. L. Clegg, A. S. Parker, H. R. Ashmore, V. E. Queen, and H. C. Smith. We laid his body to rest in the cemetery in Laurinburg.

The changes in the way people lived on earth during the 89 years of our friend's life were greater than had been made in five hundred years before. He was born before the telephone, or the automobile, or the electric light. The airplane and atomic power had hardly been dreamed

of. The radio was only an idea for dreamers to toy with. He kept up with all these changes, but also held to the faith that the gospel was the same yesterday, today, and forever. He believed that no matter what changes were made in the physical life of man, purity, honor, honesty, and truth remain unchangable.

Brother Bundy was a thoughtful preacher, he was positive and preached with power. He was fearless and condemned sin in high and low places with the zeal of an old prophet. But he could also deal with the broken hearted, discouraged soul with the tenderness of a mother. He hated shame like he hated sin. He was sincere and there was never a question as to where he stood on an issue. He often disagreed with his brethren, but he would tell them so face to face. We need men like J. D. Bundy in the pulpit and on the conference floor.

There was something about this man of God that drew me to him. Before he knew my name he was having great influence upon me. I was his presiding elder when he was on his last charge at Mebane. No man ever worked with a more sympathetic and understanding pastor.

I cannot close this memoir without saying that no man ever had a more helpful, faithful wife than he did. During his long lingering illness she remained loyal and true. May the comfort of the Lord he preached, and the memory of him when he was in good health be her help now. He served his day and generation and is now at rest, may his memory be a benediction to us all.

MRS. L. S. MASSEY

Mary Anderson Massey was born in Franklin County, Virginia, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James C. Anderson. Early in her life the family moved to Statesville, N. C. At the age of eighteen she graduated from Mitchell College. From childhood she was always faithful in attendance and work at church. She was organist and Sunday School teacher in Broad Street Methodist Church until December 23, 1891, when she married Rev. Lucius S. Massey.

Always shrinking from public notice, Mrs. Massey taught the children and was active and helpful wherever she was needed in the parish. Twice she was honored with Life Memberships in the Woman's work and she kept up her interest in all of the work of the church as long as she lived.

Mrs. Massey had a courage that was born of adversity.

"Because the way was steep and long
And through a strange and lonely land,
God placed upon her lips a song
And put a lantern in her hand."

Her courage was contagious. I would turn my car out Chapel Hill Road to the big brick house beyond the city limits and feast upon that courage from the mind and heart of one long confined to her invalid's couch. Often she would come through with some clever remark that made the place sparkle with wit and wisdom. Mrs. Massey's optimism was not born from some shallow line like:

"The year's at the spring
 The day's at the morn;
 God's in His heaven
 All's well with the world."

Her courage was not an idyl of the dawn, it was more like the rainbow after the flood, found in the 23rd Psalm: "Yea, though I walk in sorrow and suffering, God is my comfort." Her life was no tender spring flower but more like a chrysanthemum blooming in the snow.

Mrs. Massey was a member of that grand group who through great suffering came into the blessedness the Master spoke about. Suffering gained for them the Kingdom of Heaven. She possessed that rare insight into God's goodness and His power to deliver from all distress. Frank to admit that many are the afflictions of the righteous, she was quick to add that the dear Lord delivereth out of them all.

After a lingering illness, she passed away November 23, 1947. Her home was blessed with her great spirit that seemed always to say;

"Bless, O Lord, and make safe the home
 For every troubled heart
 That all may enter happy
 And happy depart."

MRS. T. A. SIKES

Ada Caroline Flow was born in Monroe, N. C., September 23, 1872, the daughter of George Washington and Caroline Flow.

For the far greater part of her life she lived in the atmosphere of the Methodist Church as the wife of the late Rev. Timothy Alexander Sikes, who served both the Western North Carolina and North Carolina Conferences during his 39 years of ministry.

For 53 years, prior to his death in 1943, Rev and Mrs. Sikes served together in the Methodist church in North Carolina, seven of these years being spent in Greensboro where Mr. Sikes was Associate Editor and Business Manager of the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

Sessions of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

NOTE: The Distributing Committee at the 1940 session of the Western North Carolina Conference added three retired ministers of the former Methodist Protestant Church to the roll of the North Carolina Conference. The names of these preachers should have been included in 1939 in the list of preachers coming into the North Carolina Conference from the former Methodist Protestant Church.
