HISTORICAL STATEMENT

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.

The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church

I. RULES OF ORDER

- 1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
- No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
- 3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
- 4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
- 5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
- 6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

- 1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
- Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
- 3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
- Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.
- 5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
- 6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all boards, commissions, and committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in

which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.

- 7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
- 8. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
- 9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Super-intendent of the District in which the sessions of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
- Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 47, page 185, 1956 Discipline.
- 11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The Committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
- 12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
- 13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
- 14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
- 15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
- 16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

- 1. All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (typewritten if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the conference secretary before the report or resolution shall be read to the Conference for consideration.
- Any amendment offered to any paper, and all motions must be in writing and placed in the hands of the conference secretary immediately following its presentation.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- 1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conferences shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
- 2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in duplicate, to the conference secretary.
- 3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made in written form provided by the conference secretary, and must be approved and signed by the district superintendent. Such substitute delegates may function only in the absence of the regular delegates.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

- 1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
- 2. Charge and church treasurers shall mail their final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on the second Monday preceding the opening date of the Annual Conference, and each pastor shall complete and mail Table II to the conference statistician immediately thereafter.
- 3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
- 4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
- 5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastors' reports.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

- Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
- 2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The Conference Claimants, the General Boards, the Publishing House, lay members of the Conference Board, lay delegates to the Annual Conference, the Educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference sceretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other educational institutions as he may deem advisable. Six copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.25 each, or single copies by mail at \$1.35 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference teasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VII. DISTRICTS

- 1. The number of districts shall be nine.
- 2. A district conference shall be held annually, in each district.
- 3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the district conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.

- 4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.
- 5. The district superintendent of each district shall be required to furnish to the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician, as early in the year as possible, an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 6. Each district superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the district superintendent to the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
- 7. We call attention of the district superintendents to Paragraph 431 (1) 1956 Discipline, and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

 These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

REVEREND AND MRS. JOHN WESLEY FRANK

1871-1956

John Wesley Frank and Victoria Josephine Case Frank were born just three months apart and went home to their Heavenly Father exactly three weeks apart, after spending together 41 years as missionaries in Japan and 16 years in "active" retirement in Mount Airy, N.C.

John Wesley Frank, son of Jesse Martin and Margaret Surratt Frank, was born on a farm in Davidson County, N. C., on May 8, 1871. He was graduated from Oak Ridge Institute, Oak Ridge, N. C., in 1894, and from Western Maryland College, Westminster, Maryland, with the A.B. degree in 1897, and the M.A. degree in 1899. He served as pastor of the Methodist Protestant Church Winston-Salem N



Church, Winston-Salem, N. C., from 1897 to 1899.

Josephine Case, daughter of Charles and Elizabeth Prather Case, was born March 6, 1871, in Guilford County, N. C. Following her graduation from Oak Ridge Institute in 1889 she taught in the public schools of Virginia and North Carolina, until her marriage on October 17, 1899, to Mr. Frank. Soon afterward they set sail for Japan, having been appointed by the Methodist Protestant Mission Board to Yokohama for evangelistic and educational work. In 1904, because of ill health, Mrs. Frank returned to the United States with their two children, Charles and Margaret. Mr. Frank remained in Yokohama until after the death of little Charles in 1905. Because God was allowed to guide them, this sorrow strengthened and sweetened their lives, and made them better ministers of the grace of Jesus Christ.

From 1905 until 1912 Mr. and Mrs. Frank remained in North Carolina, serving pastorates at Liberty, Henderson, and Battleboro. In 1910, during the Annual Conference held at Elizabeth City, Mr. Frank transferred from the Methodist Protestant Church to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

In 1912 Mr. and Mrs. Frank were appointed to Japan. They served the following appointments: 1912-1919, Nakatsu, Evangelism; 1920-1931, Uwajima, Evangelism; 1931-1935, Palmore Institute, Kobe, Education; 1935-1940, Tokuyama, Newspaper Evangelism. Because of unsettled conditions in Japan, the Mission Board in 1940 recalled the missionaries from Japan.

After their return Mr. and Mrs. Frank made their home in Mount Airy. Although officially retired, Mr. Frank served rural churches as interim pastor from time to time; preached or lectured one or more times each week; taught Sunday School classes, study courses, and classes in institutes and assemblies; wrote for church papers and newspapers; served as secretary-treasurer for the Masonic Order for many years; and visited regularly the sick and shut-ins of Mount Airy. During these years Mrs. Frank was active in the work of the W.C.T.U. and with her husband worked faithfully in Central Methodist Church.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

On November 18, 1956 following a two-day illness from coronary thrombosis, after a life lived to the full in service to humanity, Mrs. Frank accepted the invitation of her Master to enter His heavenly mansion and become His eternal guest. The funeral service was conducted by her pastor, Rev. W. L. Lanier, at Central Methodist Church. She lived by her favorite verse of Scripture, "All things work together for good to them who love the Lord; to them who are called according to His purpose." She was loving and forgiving, yet unswerving in her convictions and unyielding in her fight for the right as she saw it. She was an excellent teacher, and loved nothing better than leading Japanese children, youth, and adults to Jesus Christ, their Saviour and Lord.

On December 9, 1956, exactly three weeks after his wife's death, Mr. Frank suffered an attack of coronary trombosis and slipped quietly and joyfully away to join Mrs. Frank in their home above. He had moved to Elizabeth City to make his home with his daughter, Mrs. C. Freeman Heath. The funeral service, by his own request exactly like that of his wife, was conducted by Rev. W. L. Lanier and Rev. Lee F. Tuttle, Superintendent of the Winston-Salem District, at Central Methodist Church. Three children survive: Margaret, wife of Rev. C. Freeman Heath, Superintendent, Elizabeth City District; John, President of the Mount Airy Granite Corporation, Mount Airy; and Grady, Military Intelligence, Far Eastern Division, The Pentagon, Washington, D. C., residence Alexandria, Virginia. Also surviving are ten grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

Mr. Frank truly lived for others. He was loyal to his Christ and to the Church, always putting aside personal comfort and ambition to further the good of the Kingdom. He believed money was a trust and, as his son John expressed it, "He was frugal in spending on himself but generous in giving to others." Mr. Frank was gentle and humble, a humility growing out of his faith in his Christ that "My grace is sufficient for you."

In the Bible which Mr. and Mrs. Frank had been using for their devotions, each morning and night, was found a typed copy of this poem from "Meditation", by Grace Noll Crowell:

> God loaned me life, and I must pay Him back a portion of each day. In loving service, I must give A part of every hour I live In thoughtful, kindly deeds to others Who are my sisters and my brothers.

> God loaned me coins I may not spend For any wasteful, selfish end. They are a trust that I must hold As sacred. All the world's bright gold Belongs to Him, and in my spending I must repay his gracious lending.

> God put his love within my heart, A love I ever must impart To a world in desperate need of care. All things God gives me I must share. This is the stewardship of living, A spontaneous and joyous giving.

REVEREND WILLIAM RICHARD ROYALL

1873-1957

The life that reaches back into the past for eighty-three years, has had experiences and faced issues far different from those pertaining to this New Age. In all the vast Atlantic seaboard, and ranging back through the Piedmont plains,

and up the slopes of the Blue Ridge the source of material life was the soil, save in some few centers where a river had been harnessed as a small mill was built.

This agrarian civilization was simple and uncomplicated but it furnished favorable background for ambitious boys and some few like W. R. Royall broke out of the limitations of rural life and climbed the hill to college. Such youth usually chose one of the "Professions"—law, medicine, teaching or the ministry. So after young handsome Royall finished Trinity College, he entered the ministry and served acceptably for a long day, retiring in 1936.

When the day of rest came he and his wife, who was Miss Ina Smitherman before marriage, were invited and urged to make their home in Rockingham where they had served for 5 years. This they did for

some time but later the lure of the highlands called them to Hendersonville, N. C. where near the top of a grand mountain they established Echo Inn and remained the owners for many years. There W. R. Royall who was born August 18, 1873, died January 18th, 1957.

One recalls the request of Caleb to Joshua, when the former was four score and five years old and looking to his final rest, "And now, behold, the Lord has kept us alive, forty and five years since the Lord spoke to Moses—Now therefore give us this mountain." Caleb got his highland inheritance and Royall lived happily on his peak of the Blue Ridge for 20 years after his retirement.

It was indeed a Royal house. Many guests sojourned there. The Pastor, the District Supt. and the Bishop all were welcome and often shared the superb view, fine fellowship and good fare of that Inn. It was a unique and elegant home with comfortable and inspiring surroundings. He reveled in his hill-top. His family was a strong support under the First Methodist church, both by attendance and substance.

Brother Royall was a man of strong independent mind. He was reared in a Baptist home but decided to cast his lot with the Methodists. He found the doctrine and practice more congenial to his spirit. He was never a strict conformist and sometimes chafed under the restrictions of Organization and Polity. He was a clear thinker, a wide reader remaining a student to the end of his days. He was especially interested in and watched the development of Duke University with avid concern, taking great pride in the expansion of his old college. He was a strong preacher and usually spent the full four years on his parish. He spoke his mind freely and his word was almost like the scriptural requirement which said "Let your conversation be yea, yea and nay, nay". Cant and pretense were not a part of his character but sincere manhood became him well and he admired that quality in others.



This writer recalls the many times when he was welcomed by the tall greyhaired patrician who would leave his shrubbery cutting, yard dressing or his chair on the broad veranda to make his friend at home. Our conversation was similar to that of Tennyson with Hallam,

> "Whereat we glanced from theme to theme Discussed the books to love or hate, Touched the changes of the state or Threaded some Socratic dream"

Brother Royall served the charges of Troy, Chapel Hill, Henderson, Washington, Fayetteville, Laurinburg, Wilmington, Rockingham and Sanford.

Survivors are his wife, one son W. R. Jr., three grandchildren, a brother, H. M. Royall. He was buried in Hendersonville near his beloved mountain by his pastor, the Rev. Phil Shore and the undersigned.

EDGAR WILSON DOWNUM

1885-1957

On February 26th, 1885, Edgar Wilson Downum was born to happy parents, George Franklin Downum and Susan Tomlinson Downum who lived near Harmony, North Carolina. He received his education at the Mount Bethel School and the



Harmony Academy. After his graduation from Harmony Academy in 1905 he taught school for some twelve years, teaching in the following counties: Wake, Iredell, Cumberland, and Davidson.

Edgar heard the call to preach at the age of eighteen. He felt he was not worthy of this call and resisted for some fourteen years. It was during a critical spell of sickness that he was sure of his call. He was teaching near Steadman, North Carolina in 1920 when he heard and responded to the call of Christ to "Come with Me", and like the faithful servant of Christ that he was, he left his teaching field to become a minister in the Methodist Church of the North Carolina Conference.

He received his local preacher's license in 1920 at Fayetteville, N. C. He was admitted into the North Carolina Conference in 1922 at Raleigh, N. C.; Ordain-

ed a Deacon in 1924 at Wilmington, N. C.; and Elder in 1926 at Durham, N. C. He took his required course of study by correspondence from Emory University and came into the North Carolina Conference in full connection in 1926.

During Edgar's thirty-one years of faithful service in the ministry he served the following charges: Buckhorn Circuit, Old Dock, Scott's Hill, Garysburg, Straits, Belhaven, Murfreesboro, South Mills, Bridgeton, Wesley Memorial, Winter Park, Aurora, Pikeville, Grifton, and Atlantic. Wherever he went he served his Master well, holding high the teachings of Christ by precept and example. He was greatly loved and respected by the rich and the poor, the learned and the unlearned, the Saints and the sinners. He looked after the sick, the shut-ins and those in distress. He felt it was his privilege to feed and lead his people into the green pastures and where the still, refreshing waters flow. It can be truly said that he was a good Shepherd always providing well for his flock. He had no cause to be ashamed of his work for he marched under God's command. He had a passion for the lost and always sought to lead them safe into the Good Shepherd's fold. He was a very humble man always willing to render his service to the Church he loved. He walked humbly before his fellowmen as a true servant of his God.

On June 5th, 1907, Edgar Wilson Downum was married to the very lovely and charming Miss Sadie Mozelle Fitzgerald at the Methodist parsonage in Nashville, N. C. by the Reverend W. H. Kirton. To this Christian home God sent four wonderful children: E. Wilfred of Beaufort, N. C., Dr. Allen F. of Edenton, N. C., Edwin R. of Orlando, Florida, and Mrs. M. W. De Berry of Murfreesboro, N. C. He was an attentive and devoted husband, an understanding and sympathetic father, a good neighbor, a splendid citizen and a wonderful friend to all who knew him. He loved and enjoyed his home life. His home was full of joy, and was a place of peace, and a most pleasant home to visit. He never ceased to be grateful for the inspiration and loving support of his gracious wife. He was proud, and justly so, of his family.

Brother Downum was superannuated at the Annual Session of the North Carolina Conference which met in 1953 at Duke Memorial Church, Durham, N. C. He made his home at 102 Circle Drive, Beaufort, N. C. after his retirement. His home was always open for his many friends. He made life beautiful and wonderful by his Christian life. His death on March 9th, 1957, came as a great shock to all of his many friends in Beaufort. He shall not only be greatly missed by his wife and children, but by all the Churches of Beaufort and Carteret County.

These words which come from the pen of Charles Wesley express so very well how Edgar's friends feel toward him.

> "Servant of God, Well done! Thy glorious warfare's past; The battles fought, the race is won And Thou are crowned at last."

Edgar Wilson Downum has gone to his heavenly reward, but his loving spirit will always live in the hearts and lives of those who are made better and for whom life is more meaningful. His wife, children, kin and friends know that the real significance of a Consecrated life cannot be expressed in the language of men. For words become so very cold and meaningless when man tries to express his heartfelt admiration for a true Christian friend. We do know that it is expressed in its influence on the living of others. Wife and children, fellow ministers, and parishioners will be filled with gratitude as we recall his devotion, his dependability, his humility and the clean Christian life that he lived.

Edgar went home to glory on March 9th, and his funeral was conducted from Ann Street Methodist Church March 11th by the pastor and the Rev. J. Furman Herbert of the First Methodist Church in Morehead City. His body was tenderly laid to rest in the Ocean View Cemetery at Beaufort, North Carolina.

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CECIL BYRON HARRIS

1909-1957

Cecil Byron Harris lived in deeds, not years. While his life span of only fortyseven years was brief, it was long enough for him to prove the value of his work and the quality of his soul.

Cecil was born on Cedar Island, North Carolina, on August 9, 1909. His parents were W. E. and Mamie Daniels Harris. He was educated in the public schools of Carteret County, graduating from Atlantic High School in 1928. He received his college training at Atlantic Christian College. At first his interests lay in the field of teaching. For more than ten years he was connected with the public schools of Carteret County—first as a teacher and later as a principal. In the midst of a successful career in the field of Education, he heard the call of God to preach the Gospel, and he answered by dedicating himself to the ministry.

Cecil was admitted into the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church in Wilmington in 1940. In 1942 he received his Deacon's orders, and in 1944 he was ordained an Elder. He successfully served



the following appointments: Straits-Harker's Island, Grimesland, Garland, Laurel Hill, St. Pauls, and Biscoe,

On March 11, 1933, Cecil was married to Erah Mason of Atlantic, and through the years she has been of tremendous help to him in maintaining a Christian home and in carrying on the work of the Christian ministry. It was an inspiration to visit in their home and see the evidence of a fine family relationship, where mutual love, devotion, and respect played a major role. In addition to his wife, he is survived by the following children Mona Lee, of Louisburg; Roger Byron, Esther Kay, Henry Paul, and William Gaines; all of the home. He is also survived by three sisters: Mrs. Doris Godwin, Mrs. Hugh Luttton, and Mrs. Eldon Smith; and two brothers: Clyde and Worth; all of Cedar Island.

Cecil lived several months of intense suffering. He was given the best of care by his family and friends, but even that was not enough to relieve his suffering or restore his health. He found release from his physical suffering when death came on May 31, 1957 at the parsonage in Biscoe. A funeral service was held at Biscoe Methodist Church on June 1, at eleven o'clock, with the following participating: Bishop W. W. Peele, O. L. Hathaway, and W. B. Petteway. A second funeral service was held at Atlantic Methodist Church on June 2, at three o'clock, with the following ministers participating: L. A. Lewis, J. A. Russell, and W. J. Neese. Interment was in the Community Cemetery in Atlantic, close by his beloved seacoast.

Cecil was a faithful pastor. He was deeply interested in his people and anxious to help them in every possible way. Long after he became physically unable to do so, he continued to give pastoral care to his people. He brought faith and courage to those whom he served. He impressed upon others his own hope in immortality.

He was also an eloquent preacher. He was forthright and convincing. His style was simple yet impressive. He was dedicated to the belief that men must know the truth, and then the truth will make them free. He had a special dislike for sham and hypocrisy and a special fondness for genuineness. His preaching reflected his hatred of falsehood and his dedication to the truth. Because he allowed God to use him, his preaching achieved many worthwhile and excellent results during his brief but fruitful ministry.

Surely Cecil Harris belongs in the category of good and faithful servants who have heard the voice of God saying, "Well done". He was a sincere Christian and a steadfast servant of God. While he zealously avoided having a reputation for sanctimoniousness, his real Christian Faith was made manifest in many ways. The better one knew him, the more one became aware of the depth of his spiritual life, and the more one appreciated the vitality of his Christian faith and conviction. These lines of Charles Wesley's seem appropriate:

> Servant of God, well done! Thy glorious warfare's past; The battle's fought, the race is won, And thou art crowned at last.

1884-1956

Mrs. Martha Hicks Culbreth was born September 24, 1884. She was the daughter of Dr. W. N. and Agnes Shaw Hicks of Durham, N. C. When only a girl she joined the Methodist Church. She worked in the church all her active life. For several

years before her marriage she played the organ for church services. On August 25, 1908 she became the wife of the Reverend Charles Franklin Culbreth. For almost thirty years she was his faithful companion and co-laborer in the active ministry of the Methodist Church in the North Carolina Conference. Her health failed and she and Brother Frank came back to his native community where they lived in retirement in their lovely home in Eastover Community, just a few miles north of Fayet:eville, N. C.

During the early years of the last World War this writer made frequent stops in their home while making pastoral visits in the community. When there were burdens and perplexities to deal with, here was a home where Christian fellowship and counsel lightened the load and gave sure direction.

Mrs. Culbreth died July 29, 1956. For ten years she had suffered severe ill health. Funeral services were conducted in Salem Methodist Church at Eastover by the Reverend O. L. Hathaway, the Reverend W. E. Howard, and the Reverend F. Owen Fitzgerald. Her body was laid away in the church cemetery beneath the many floral offerings of friends and loved ones. It was to people such as she that the Master said, "Where I am there ye shall be also."



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MRS. B. H. BLACK

1880-1956

Mrs. Sarah Watson Black, widow of Reverend Benson H. Black, died in Durham, N. C. on December 31, 1956 after five years of declining health. The funeral was conducted in Bethany Methodist Church on January 2, 1957 by Rev. John M. Cline,



Pastor, and Dr. C. D. Barclift, District Superintendent; interment was in the Maplewood Cemetery in Durham.

Mrs. Black, daughter of G. I. Watson and Sarah Carter Watson, was born in Lake Landing in Hyde County on June 3, 1880. She received her education in the Lake Landing schools and Greensboro College, where she finished in May, 1902. For several years she taught school in her native county.

In October 1908 she was married to Rev. Benson H. Black, To this union were born five sons who survive: W. W. of Asheboro, N. C., Harvey B. of Durham, N. C., J. C. of Columbia, S. C., Major Benson H., Jr., of the Air Force, and George F. of Hampton, Va. For 32 years she served faithfully and effectively with her husband, whose ministry included the following appointments in the North Carolina Conference: Campbellton and Rose Chapel, Ocracoke, Mattamuskeet,

Moyock, North and South Rocky Mount, Fremont Circuit, Conway Circuit, Rose Hill, Oxford Circuit, Granville Circuit, Stauntonsburg Circuit, Gates Circuit, Scotland Neck, Durham Circuit, Mount Tirzah Circuit, Garner Circuit, and South Rocky Mount Circuit.

With her husband, who retired from the active ministry in the Fall of 1940, Mrs. Black came to Durham to make her home, where Mr. Black died in 1946. During her years in Durham Mrs. Black led an active and useful life in Bethany Church and in local civic organizations. She was a member of the Julian S. Carr chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Mrs. Black leaves behind a treasure tucked away in the hearts of her sons, whose lives will ever be guided by memories of a Christian home and of the devotion of Mother and Dad to the work of Christ; she leaves behind a treasure in the hearts of the people of Bethany Church and of all the churches where she and her family labored in God's vineyard; but these treasures—precious as they are—are as nothing compared to the treasure she has stored up in that "land of pure delight where saints immortal reign."

We mourn her passing, but we rejoice in the certainty that for her life has just begun.

MRS. ELLA GASKILL HUMBLE

1874-1957

Mrs. Ella Gaskill Humble was born in Swanquarter, North Carolina, July 24, 1874, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Enoch Hyman Baskill. Mrs. Humble grew up in a Christian home, in the Methodist Church and early in life united with the church.



It was in the town of Swanquarter that she grew to womanhood and where she became a teacher in the public schools. It was here that she met a young Methodist preacher, the Reverend Hilary Augustus Humble, who had been appointed to the Swanquarter charge. It was during Mr. Humble's pastorate in Swanquarter that he and Miss Ella Gaskill were united in marriage on April 27, 1897. Her marriage to Mr. Humble opened to her a new door of adventure, the great adventure of the wife of a Methodist minister. She set out early in her marriage to make the adjustments to parsonage life and that of helpmate to her husband.

A long time friend of Mrs. Humble's, also a widow of one of our great soldiers of the Christian gospel, says of Mrs. Humble, "As a preacher's wife, she was a natural, sharing her husband's duties, responsibilities

and joys." She possessed those qualities of life which gave encouragement and spiritual strength to her minister husband. To her his work was the most important work on earth. Mr. Humble was a successful minister of Christ and his devotion and ability was recognized early in his ministry. Mrs. Humble enhanced the ministry of the one she loved so dearly and gave him encouragement in the work of the Christ whom she knew as a personal Saviour and friend.

In the home she gave him the love and kindness, consideration and devotion which helped him to meet successfully the opportunities of the ministry to which he had been called. To her, he was God's messenger, when he was in the home, visiting among his people, or leading them in great experiences of Christion worship.

A friend of long standing has said "The parsonage, whether in town or city, was her citadel, where she made a home for her husband and children and where many fellow ministers found happiness, fellowship and real hospitality,"

Mrs. Humble was a wonderful mother. She gave her three children excellent care, love and training. She saw that all three of her children were educated. One is a graduate of Greensboro College and two are graduates of Duke University. She gave to the world a son and two daughters whose lives are characterized by the Christian character and faith which marked her life. These have taken their places in the life and work of the church and community and are wonderful examples of their mother's Christian nurture and training. These "rise up to call her blessed."

Mrs. Humble responded willingly to the opportunities to help in the work of the churches where her husband served as pastor. She was a very faithful member of the church and her talents were readily recognizd. She was called upon often to teach in the Sunday School and to participate in the woman's work of the church. In 1924 this parsonage family moved to Wilmington where Mr. Humble had been appointed Presiding Elder of the Wilmington District. Soon after moving to Wilmington Mr. Humble became very ill and on September 11, 1926, God called him to a better place, where he could enter more fully in the joys of his Lord and become a full time citizen of his heavenly home.

Upon moving to Wilmington Mrs. Humble and her children joined Grace Methodist Church and in 1924 she became the teacher of the Hammill Memorial Sunday School Class. Following the death of Mr. Humble, Mrs. Humble continued to live in Wilmington and to be a faithful member of Grace Church. Here she continued as teacher of her Sunday School class for a number of years. In 1934 the class honored her for ten years of faithful service as its teacher. A booklet of testimonials was prepared by the members of the class and presented to Mrs. Humble. These testimonials expressed great appreciation to their teacher as one who was able to share with them her own Christian experience and the great truths of the Bible, which she loved so dearly. One of the members of her class expressed it thus: "As a teacher you are one with whom we can discuss the world as it is, or we would like it to be. As my friend you have accepted me for what I am, so I can be natural." Another member of her class expressed her love in these words, "By your own daily example you have inspired me to hold my head above the troubled waters of life." And another "It is a good thing to be rich, and a good thing to be strong, but it is a better thing to be loved by many friends."

Mrs. Humble had a great capacity for friendship and her friends were many in every place she lived. She never forgot a friend and they did not forget her. In the latter years of her life she recalled many of the kindnesses shown her family and her heart was once more touched by the deeds of friends which had meant so much to her and her family.

In 1944 Mrs. Humble moved to Fayetteville to live with her daughter, Mrs. W. L. Hunter and Miss Lelia Humble. She returned her membership to Hay Street Methodist Church where her husband had served as a beloved pastor and found herself associated with the many friends which she had made during her previous residence in the city.

This writer knew her only during the last three years of her life, but he discovered in her a friend, for she was truly a friend of Methodist ministers and their families. Every visit was an inspiration and a real blessing.

She suffered much during the last year of her life but it was a patient suffering, awaiting the day when her Lord would call her home. On January 22, 1957 the door which had been quietly opening, opened wide and God called her to join her beloved husband in the greater expanses of His love and the fullness of eternal life. "Well done thou good and faithful servant . . . Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

Her funeral was conducted in the Hay Street Church by her pastor and her body was tenderly committed to its resting place beside the body of her husband in Cross Creek Cemetery in Fayetteville.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. W. L. Hunter and Miss Lelia Humble of Fayetteville, and by a son, Hilary A. Humble, Jr., of Midland, Michigan.

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REPORTS OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

BURLINGTON DISTRICT

Allen P. Brantley, District Superintendent

The work on the Burlington District this year reflects the fine spirit of loyalty, and untiring work on the part of both Ministers and Laymen. Their work has been exceptionally commendable and shows increasing progress in the following areas:

Evangelism: This has been our special emphasis this year. We have received 582 on Profession of Faith; 588 by Church certificate, a total of 1170 new members, with a net increase of 470. The Rites of Holy Baptism have been administered for 239 babies. We have had 87 revivals and 53 Visitation Evangelistic campaigns.

Christian Education: Our Sunday School enrollment this year has been 17,327 an increase of 460 over last year. Vacation Bible Schools were held during the past year with an attendance of 4377. All charges are planning Vacation Bible Schools this summer. We have had six sub-district Christian Workers Schools with an enrollment of 869. We have 1347 subscribers to the North Carolina Christian Advocate and 207 subscribers to the national church paper "Together."

Missions: We have contributed \$9409 to Mission Specials and \$8115 to special offerings. \$2400 has been raised in the Burlington District for the purchase of an automobile Jeep for the Rev. James Goodwin who goes as a missionary to Brazil next month.

Lay Activities: We have 20 Methodist Men's Clubs with 690 members. 178 Certified Speakers who carried the "No Silent Pulpit" campaign thru three months. There are 79 Woman's Society of Christian Service organizations with 3745 members, and 5 Wesleyan Service Guilds with 252 members.

New Church Buildings: Graham completed their first unit and opened it for services last August. Mt. Hermon has completed a \$120,000 new church plant and occupied it for the first time just one month ago. Bellmontte has built a new church and Educational Building costing \$115,000 with the opening service 3 months ago. Center Church, on the Silk Hope charge has completed a new Church and Educational Building costing \$70,000 and occupied it for the first time the second Sunday in June. Moncure has opened their completely newly renovated church and Educational Building costing approximately \$30,000. Webb Ave. in Burlington is in the process of building an additional Educational Building costing \$50,000. Mebane has about one-third of the work completed on a new \$150,000 Educational Building. Robbins has completed a new educational building costing \$50,000. West Burlington has almost finished a renovation job on their present church plant costing approximately \$20,000. St. Paul, one of our new churches in Burlington, started their new church building two months ago. Grace, our other new church in Burlington, is ready to let the contract for the building of their new church

New Parsonages: Four new parsonages have been built—Front Street, Burlington, Silk Hope has built, and dedicated their parsonage this year. Bonlee has built a new parsonage, and Robbins Circuit will have their new parsonage ready for the preacher to move in after conference.

Finances: The Churches of the District have raised for building purposes this year \$519,246. The increase in salaries for the new conference year will be \$5600 while the increase for benevolences for this next year will be \$9625.

DURHAM DISTRICT

C. D. Barclift, District Superintendent

The progress made in the different areas of the work in the Durham district this year results from the continued blessings of our heavenly Father and the consecrated services and diligent labors of the earnest pastors and faithful lay people of the district. I give them credit for the achievements and record my gratitude for their contributions. Among the achievements are:

Membership and Evangelism. The various expressions of evangelism have resulted in the reception of 1,260 new members, 518 of whom were received on profession of faith. However, it seems that there is no end to the need of correcting church rolls which have been neglected for long years. The correction of the rolls on one circuit alone this year caused the removal of 120 names, 45 of whom had long since been in the cemetery and the remainder had taken membership elsewhere. All this, and not the first entry of information concerning same had been entered into the records. The net gain for the district is only 319.

Christian Education. There are 14,227 enrolled in the church schools. Many of the churches show an increase in enrollment and attendance. Some 1,800 youth constitute the membership of 62 Methodist Youth Fellowships which meet in the evening. Of 840 attending Christian Workers' School, 528 received credit. Practically every church in the district held a Vacation Church School.

There are 986 subscriptions to the North Carolina Christian Advocate, and 442 subscriptions to TOGETHER.

Missions and Special Offerings. Included in our giving this year to the cause of missions are the following items: Alaska College, \$1,257; Ed Smith Fund (missionary to Africa), \$3,182; Hungarian Relief, \$2,910; Fellowship of Suffering, \$1,340; Week of Dedication, \$1,112; Church School Rally Day, \$1,080; Race Relations, \$600; Mothers' Day Offering for Retirement Home, \$2,263; T.V. Ministry, \$252; and there are 444 Ten Dollar Club memberships in the Durham district.

Lay Activities. With a membership of 592, there are 13 Methodist Men Clubs. Three of these were organized this year—Chapel Hill: University Church; Durham: Asbury and Bethany churches.

The 146 certified lay speakers took part in the No Silent Pulpit program this year. Dr. Frank W. Hanft, the new district lay leader, and the associate district lay leaders have given splendid guidance to the lay activities program. We record with genuine sorrow the death in April of J. D. Ipock, Roxboro, one of the associate district lay leaders.

Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild. With a total membership of about 3,800, there are 73 Woman's Societies of Christian Service and 6 Wesleyan Service Guilds. Under the effective leadership of the president, Mrs. Frank W. Hanft, and the district officers, all lines of their work are being well promoted throughout the district. Their pledge for missions for the year 1957-1958 is \$12,500.

New Buildings. CHURCHES: Bethel on the Gray Rock charge has built a lovely church at the cost of \$42,000.

EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS: The following units have been completed this year—Creedmoor, \$35,520; Asbury, \$175,000; Massey's Chapel, \$3,200; Eno, \$2,700; Oak Grove, \$4,000; and Soapstone, \$5,000. PARSONAGES: Bahama, \$20,500; Epworth (purchased) \$16,950; Hillsboro, \$20,000; and Oxford Circuit (purchased) \$16,500.

FELLOWSHIP HALLS: Walnut Grove, \$5,000.

Improvements. Churches, \$49,119; Educational Buildings, \$32,207; and Parsonages, \$12,800.

New Churches Planned. Pastors will be appointed at this conference to two new churches in the larger Durham area, namely: Bethesda and Wellon's Village.

Benevolence Acceptance. We are glad to report that the charges of the Durham district have accepted the approximately 12% increase requested for the 7 benevolences.

A Record In Reporting. Doubtless, something of a record in receiving reports from pastors was set in the Durham district during the Attendance Crusade. Every pastor reported every week from January 1 to May 1, without the district superintendent having to make the first long distance call!

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

C. Freeman Heath, District Superintendent

The Elizabeth City District approaches the close of this Conference year with gratitude to the faithful pastors and laymen for their diligent attention to the matters of the Kingdom, thus making possible a report to the Annual Conference of which we can be justly proud.

The charges have accepted an increase in Benevolences of \$8,033 over last year. Salaries for 1957-1958 have been increased by \$10,570 over last year.

Evangelism: Thirty-three of the thirty-six pastors visited in every home of their respective churches. Counting members, prospective members, and the sick, an average of more than 600 calls was made by each pastor. To date, May 22, 1957, revivals have been held in sixty-nine of the eighty-six churches, and visitation evangelism campaigns have been conducted in thirty churches. A total of 833 has been added to the membership of the churches, 446 on profession of faith and 387 by transfer.

Education: The church school enrollment shows a two and one-half per cent increase over last year. Indications point to a larger enrollment in vacation church schools than usual. 170 vacation church school workers attended the district institute at Hertford. Five Christian Workers' Schools have been held with an attendance of more than 600, with 300 or more course cards being issued. A District Family Life Institute was held at First Church, Elizabeth City, with an attendance of 150. Three Clinics for Adult Teachers were held in the district. 1231 subscriptions to the N. C. Christian Advocate have been secured. Twenty-one churches send the Advocate to every church home. There are 71 MYF organizations in the district with an enrollment of 1500.

Missions: There are 74 Woman's Societies of Christian Service in the district with a membership of 2,527. Approximately \$32,723 has been raised by this organization. The district is one hundred per cent organized. There are eight Wesleyan Service Guilds with a membership of 204. They raised a total of \$3,998. The district reports \$5,658 in Special Offerings and \$3,781 for Advance Specials. There are 296 \$10 Club members.

Lay Activities: 578 were present at the Annual Men's Rally at Hertford, at which time the Conference Program of Higher Education was high-lighted. Bishop Garber consecrated 76 lay speakers who later took part in the "No Silent Pulpit" program. Three Men's Clubs have been organized, bringing the total to fourteen clubs with 500 members.

Buildings and Improvements: The district has spent \$274,214 on parsonages, educational buildings, and sanctuaries. AHOSKIE has completed one unit of her educational building at a cost of \$83,000, and at the same time has spent \$9,100 on the old plant. BATH and PANTEGO have started educational buildings at a cost of \$23,500. BELHAVEN is remodeling educational building and is putting central heat in the parsonage, total cost \$1,808, WESLEY MEMORIAL, Columbia, has installed a heating unit in the annex. ZION Church on the CURRITUCK Charge is planning a new educational building. FIRST CHURCH, Elizabeth City, has replaced the organ console at a cost of \$3,750. ZION Church, GATESVILLE Charge, has started building an educational plant to cost \$20,000. HATTERAS has completed a \$40,000 sanctuary. HERTFORD has put central heat in the parsonage, re-decorated the parsonage, and built a brick car port, cost \$9,061. KENNAKEET has spent \$1,450 on improvements at the parsonage, including 1250 square feet of driveway, walk and steps. KITTY HAWK has spent \$452 on improving the parsonage, \$1,000 on DUCK Church, and plans a \$40,000 plant at KITTY HAWK. The PILMORE MEMORIAL Church has been remodeled at a cost of \$1,500. The GRACE Church educational unit has been completed at a cost of \$30,500 by the help of the \$10 Club, Board of Missions, Conference Advance, and a \$10,000 loan. NEWLAND expects to spend \$2,500 by the time this is read. Rest rooms have been added to the KITTRELLS Church on N. Gates Charge at a cost of \$3,000. PASOUOTANK: Balconies at HALL'S CREEK AND NEWBEGUN converted to class rooms, new tile floor in educational building at MT. HERMON and new roof on church at a total cost of \$5,092. The PERQUIMANS CHARGE is being divided. EPWORTH, CEDAR GROVE, and OAK GROVE purchased the old parsonage, and NEW HOPE and WOODLAND have built a new parsonage at a cost of \$16,000. PLYMOUTH has installed a ten-ton air conditioner, cost \$3,165. ROPER has installed chimes at a cost of \$6,000. CAMDEN is building new class rooms, and PERKINS has remodeled choir loft and put down new floor. The McBRIDE Church on the SOUTH MILLS Charge has been remodeled at a cost of \$5,000. A parsonage has been built by SWAN QUARTER at a cost of \$15,002. UNION Church, near Elizabeth City, has built a garage for the pastor. WANCHESE has erected an addition to her educational building, cost \$15,000. FIRST CHURCH, Washington, has installed a new bath room in the parsonage, renovated the nursery and other class rooms; installed new chancel, new Moller pipe organ, new chancel furniture, new carpet, etc., costing \$71,000, WASHINGTON CIRCUIT: \$1250 has been spent on landscaping of parsonage grounds, purchasing new furniture, and finishing and equipping the study; WARES CHAPEL AND WHARTONS are constructing new educational buildings; The ASBURY educational building has been completed; the ASBURY sanctuary has new pews and carpets and has been re-decorated; WARES has added new windows, hymnals and pew racks; the charge has purchased visual aid equipment valued at \$500.

FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

O. L. Hathaway, District Superintendent

We lift up our voices in praise of the good work that has been accomplished during the year through the consecrated leadership of our pastors and the generosity of our lay people.

1—Membership and Evangelism: Additions on Profession of Faith 596, by transfer 592, from other denominations 230, making a total of 1418. Lost by death 138, by transfer 429, to other denominations 106, making a total of 673. Net gain in membership of 745. Infants baptized 346.

The Secretary of Evangelism, Rev. W. E. Howard, led the churches in 40 Prayer Vigils.

2—Christian Education: Church School enrollment of 15,128. The increase in Church School enrollment has been 784. The four areas of our Christian Workers' Schools enrolled 855 persons.

A Christian Witness Mission was held in the Fayetteville District under the sponsorship of the Board of Education and Board of Evangelism. The Burlington and Durham Districts helped in this venture of faith and witness for and with young people.

3—Missions and Church Extension: 726 members of Ten Dollar Clubs. 350 persons attended District Institute of Missions at Hay Street Church. Church School units have been completed at Cotton, Sandy Grove on the Parkton Charge; Glenwood Church in Rockingham; and Mt. Olivet on Troy Circuit. The congregations of Fellowship, Hamlet; and Southern Pines have entered their first units of their church plants. Building programs are going on at Doubs Chapel, Pleasant Hill, on Sandhill Circuit; West End, and Concord on Ellerbe Charge. Dedications have been held for the Educational Building at First Church, Laurinburg; Gibson, complete units at Parson Grove on Mt. Gilead Circuit, and Roberdell. Dedication services are being planned for Ellerbe, Salem, Vass, Sardis. Renovations and redecorations have taken place at Sandy Grove, Johnson Memorial, Caledonia, Hay Street, Red Springs, Pee Dee, Hoffman, Halls.

Air-conditioning units have been installed in Sanctuary at Hamlet, First Church; Raeford Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall, Hay Street Educational plant, Christ Church and Spring Lake.

The following churches are in the planning stage for a building program; First Rockingham, Mt. Gilead, Central, Laurinburg, Green Lake, Wesley Heights, Salem, Culbreth, Hope Mills, Maxton, Lyon Memorial.

Parsonages have been completed at Stedman and Vass. Parsonages have been purchased for Johnson Memorial, Lyon Memorial, St. Matthew, Christ Church. Wset Rockingham parsonage has been enlarged and redecorated. Parsonages are being built or are in the planning stage for Norman, Pee Dee and Pinebluff.

Three new churches have been organized this year. They are as follows: St. Matthews and Faymont at Fayetteville and Grace at Rockingham.

4—Lay Activities: Mr. Terry Sanford, our District Lay Leader, has given excellent guidance in our Lay work. Among the achievements of our laymen are: 925 laymen at the Laymen's Meeting at Hay Street Church; 128 lay speakers in the "No Silent Pulpit Program." 150 pastors and laymen attending a planning program. 10 new Methodist Men's Clubs organized.

The Methodist men are promoting the purchase of approximately 400 acres of land for a camp site near Fayetteville. The district has been and will be represented at the Lay Retreat and Conferences.

GOLDSBORO DISTRICT

Howard M. McLamb, District Superintendent

1. We are grateful to our heavenly Father for the privilege of serving with the fine laymen and preachers of the Goldsboro District through another conference year. We feel that the Kingdom has made progress in the district.

2. Our statistics here reported are incomplete, as we did not have complete information from all pastors on certain items.

3. Membership and Evangelism: During the year 1,057 new members have

been received—522 by vows and 535 by transfers. Net increase is 199, after allowing for various corrected church rolls. Infant baptisms number 190.

4. Chrisian Education: Church schools, 104; church school enrollment, 15,315. All five sub-districts held Christian training schools. Most churches held vacation church schools. Attendance at the vacation school institute was 150.

N. C. Christian Advocates, 1835. Churches sending the Advocate to all familes, 14.

5. Woman's Society of Christian Service: This organization, of which Mrs. S. B. Boyd is president, is doing a splendid job. Several new societies were organized during the year. We were hosts to the annual meeting of the Conference W. S. C. S. in March.

6. Lay Activities: A. C. Edwards, district lay leader, and his associates, have vigorously promoted lay activities. Six new Methodist Men Clubs have been organized for a total of 29 clubs and a membership of 1,032. Attendance at the annual lay rally was 500. There are 160 certified lay speakers.

7. Missions and Church Extension: We stressed the importance of members of the \$10 Club remaining active by paying the calls. We also enlisted 100 new members in the club.

A new church has been organized at Salemburg and a valuable site has been acquired. Eight new churches have been organized in 30 months. We plan two new churches in the new conference year. We are trying to buy sites where we think churches will be needed in the future.

We have not made the progress we desired in increases in benevolences for next year. We especially commend St. Paul for accepting the requested increase of \$1,890.

8. Buildings and Improvements: Spent for churches and parsonages: \$227,697. The new church at Sarecta is constructing a \$31,000 building, aided by the \$10 Club and mission specials by the churches of Duplin County. Micro has occupied and dedicated a \$26,000 building. Warsaw has enlarged and renovated the sanctuary and Providence has had groundbreaking for a \$54,000 sanctuary and a renovation program. Garland, Rose Hill and Windsor sanctuaries have been renovated. The Garris sanctuary was completed in February. Faison is planning for a new sanctuary.

New educational building completed: Daniels, \$50,000; Grace, \$35,000; Carlton, \$10,000. Planned: McGee, Saulston, Corinth, Rainbow, Trinity (Institute), Raleigh Highway, Pine Forest, Pink Hill, Princeton and Salemburg.

Three charges have parsonages under construction: Goshen-Keener, Beston-Bethel and Four Oaks. Pine Level Charge purchased a parsonage.

9. Visitation: As a former pastor and one now working with the laymen, we know the value of regular pastoral visitation of the people and their appreciation of the same. We have 6,569 church families. The pastors report visiting 6,137 of the families one or more times.

10. Salaries: Increases for the new year total \$10,955. The board of missions will be relieved of \$4,465 because of mission charge salary increases.

NEW BERN DISTRICT

A. J. Hobbs, District Superintendent

As we come to the close of our conference year, we have many reasons to rejoice. Our 48 pastors and approximately 20,000 laymen have labored diligently to strengthen the church, and to make Christ more meaningful to men.

Our District Lay Leader and his associates have given wonderful leadership in all phases of our church program. Significant advances were made in the No-Silent Pulpit effort, and in the organization of Methodist Men. We now have 36 Clubs with a membership of 1,245.

The work of our women continues to challenge every one; we have 82 socities with a membership of 4,100.

In the area of Evangelism, we report additions of 1,539: 684 by confession of faith and 655 by transfer. Leading all the charges was Trinity Church, Jacksonville, with 260 new members. We have baptized 324 babies.

Our 89 Church Schools have an enrollment of 15,000. These have made satisfactory progress in attendance, in Christian Workers' Schools and Vacation Church Schools, and in the observance of special days.

Advance Specials amounted to \$21,769; Church School Rally Day, \$873; Race Relations Day, \$550; Retirement Home Special, \$2,289.

Salem Church on the Grimesland Charge, and Aurora Church on the Aurora Charge were dedicated. Education Buildings at Harker's Island and Smyra were dedicated. Building projects completed this year, or under way, approximate \$1,000,000. New Education buildings at Centenary, New Bern, and Ann Street, Beaufort, have been completed and occupied. Shady Grove on the Shady Grove Charge is erecting a sanctuary and education building. Jarvis Memorial, Greenville, is moving toward completion of a \$350,000 building program. Newport will soon begin a new building. Also, several other charges are in the midst of smaller building projects. Grifton and First Church, Morehead City, are in financial campaigns for funds for new buildings.

A new Queens-Oak Grove parsonage has been built and occupied. Our Westminster pastor and family have moved into a new \$22,500 parsonage. Trinity Church, New Bern, acquired a new parsonage only a few weeks ago; and the Sea Level Charge has secured a parsonage.

1,500 copies of the North Carolina Christian Advocate come to our homes every week.

Five sub-district seminars were held for the purpose of an intensive study of the quadrennial emphasis on the Local Church.

Each of the 48 charges of our District has accepted the proposed increase in the Seven Benevolences for the new year 1957-1958. Total increase is \$10,844.

For all our advanc, and for all our successes this year, we are grateful to our Heavenly Father, and to our loyal pastors and laymen.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

R. Grady Dawson, District Superintendent

If the story of the achievements of the 50 pastors and the 25,000 Methodists in the Raleigh District could be told in full, it would be a most thrilling one. There is room here, however, for only the major outline. Perhaps the most significant achievements cannot be recorded at all. In grateful acknowledgement of the faithful work of these pastors and laymen, I list some of their work.

MEMBERSHIP AND EVANGELISM: With special emphasis upon spiritual enrichment, personal witnessing, and church attendance both pastors and people have grown in spiritual stature. Attendance at church services has been good. Evangelism has been stressed, and the results have been gratifying: 1770 additions to the church, 623 on profession of faith and 1147 by certificate. The losses have been heavy but with a net gain of 619. Nine churches have not had an addition this year, but this number will be reduced by Annual Conference. Last year 16 churches were without additions. This year 323 babies have been baptized. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: Church school enrollment and attendance has increased 12%. Leadership training has been advanced through five Subdistrict Christian Worker's Schools, three Subdistrict Workshops on the Four Commissions, and several one-teacher training schools. Many of our young people at tend the summer assemblies and camps. The Advocate goes into about 1600 homes in the district. The district has contributed \$39,149 to our Methodist Colleges.

LOCAL CHURCH EMPHASIS PROGRAM: In presenting this program the District Superintendent held six subdistrict training sessions with the pastors, and spent from one to two hours with the officials and commission members in each charge. 1135 Kits and 1501 Study Guides were distributed. Progress reports coming to me indicate that the materials are being used and the studies are being made in the commissions with encouraging effect. Many "paper" commissions are becoming active, working commissions with challenging goals.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION: Local church commissions on missions are becoming better organized and more active. The women of the district continue to render an excellent service through the W.S.C.S. Giving to missions has increased this year: World service giving, \$47,773; Advance Specials, \$32,292. The district has contributed \$27,000 to church extension. Giving to benevolences has also increased this year by approximately \$14,000, and a similar increase will be accepted for next year. No new churches have been organized this year, but one abandoned church has been reopened and reorganized (Piney Grove) with 37 members, 9 on profession of faith, and 60 in the Church School. Another abandoned church, Mt. Carmel, is now in the process of being reopened. Credit for this fine work is due Brother Roy Turnage.

LAY ACTIVITIES: Five new Men's Clubs have been organized, bringing the number to 36 chartered clubs. One four-point circuit (Vance) has a chartered club in each church. Attendance at the District Laymen's Rally was the best yet. The "No Silent Pulpit" program was better than ever this year, with 145 lay speakers filling 375 appointments over a period of 12 weeks, instead of the usual 6 weeks.

BUILDING AND FINANCES: The amount of church and parsonage building in the Raleigh District is truly remarkable. Forty of the fifty charges in the district are either in a major building program, have just completed one, or are just before beginning one. The following churches are now in such a building program:

a. New Church Unit or Sanctuary: Edenton St. and Highland in Raleigh, and Elevation Church on the Benson Charge.

b. New Educational Building: Fairmont and Longview Gardens in Raleigh, First Church and White Memorial in Henderson; Cary, Fuquay Springs, Lillington and Louisburg; Sims, Mt. Pleasant Charge.

c. New Parsonage: Cary, Clayton, Franklinton and Wake Forest.

The following churches have plans for new construction in the immediate future:

a. New Church Unit or Sanctuary: Layden Memorial and St. Marks in Raleigh, Mamers, and Garner.

b. New Educational Building: Wesley Memorial and Trinity in Raleigh, Prospect, Warren.

c. New Parsonage: Bailey and Pleasant Grove.

The following churches have recently completed building projects:

a. New Sanctuary: Hayes Barton, Raleigh; City Road, Henderson; Wesley Memorial, Warrenton; Stewart, Dunn; Coats, and Mt. Pleasant.

b. New Educational Building: Apex; Elizabeth and Hollands, Garner Ct.; Drewry and Cokesburg, Middleburg, Ct.; Jerusalem and Zion, Norlina; Knightdale; Millbrook; Jenkins Memorial, Raleigh.

c. New Parsonage: Ebenezer, Macedonia, Macon, Wendell.

Thanks be to God who giveth us the victory! And deep appreciation to the pastors and people who have given so freely of their service and substance. With such consecrated ministers and loyal Methodists, the Raleigh District has an unlimited future.

ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT

Walter C. Ball, District Superintendent

In the work of our District this year there are so many minds, so many hands and so many deeds that it is not possible to give each person the merit due them. However, it is with deep and sincere gratitude that I acknowledge the gifts of all who have helped to make this report possible.

Into the membership of our churches we have received on profession of faith and by certificate approximately a thousand persons. More than two hundred and fifty babies have been baptized. Special recognition should go to Mr. Wade Mullikin now a Local Preacher in the Hart Methodist church in Tarboro for the fine job he has done on reopening the Speight Methodist Church on the Battleboro Charge. He has received forty-two members into this church this year and has organized a Sunday School with seventy members.

In Christian Education we have been encouraged through our Training Schools and other agencies to help our own teachers to do a better job wherever they are serving. We are glad that Eight hundred and fifty new members have been added to our rolls.

Our greatest achievement in Christian Education has been in the raising in cash and pledges two million and sixty-nine thousand dollars by people of all denominations in Rocky Mount and Edgecombe and Nash Counties. This money has been raised to build the new North Carolina Wesleyan College in the city of Rocky Mount.

As a Mission Project we have supported Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Garrison, our Missionaries to Brazil. Also we have carried Advance and Conference Mission Specials.

The work of our organized women and men have been great towers of strength in promoting the whole program of our church.

Now within a few weeks of the session of our Annual Conference we are hopeful that the finances of the district will show some improvement percentage wise over previous years. To date I have held forty Quarterly Conferences and thirty-five of these charges have taken the full askings on Benevolences for 1957-58 which includes the 12% increase. The other five may improve their position on these items later.

Many of our charges are engaged in building new Sanctuaries, Educational Buildings, New Parsonages or renovating or remodeling some of these. Large sums of money are being raised and spent on these local projects. The full amounts of each charge will be carried in the Journal of our Conference. The following charges are now engaged in some of the above mentioned projects. Aulander, Elm City, Gaston, Halifax, Hobgood, Jamesville, Nash, Northampton, Red Oak, Rich Square, Rosemary, Robersonville, Clark Street, Englewood, First Church Rocky Mount, Marvin, Sandy Cross, Scotland Neck, Spring Hope, Spring Church-Garysburg, Smith's, Stokes, Temperance Hall, Weldon, West Halifax, and First Church Wilson.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

J. E. Garlington, District Superintendent

The people of the Wilmington District have been very gracious to their District Superintendent, for which he is most grateful. Without the fine spirit of cooperation between the ministers and laymen this report would not be possible. With this in mind we pass the bouquets to our consecrated ministers and our very fine cooperating and hard working laymen.

EVANGELISM: A District-wide Religious Census was made to find the people who are not in church. Each church has a prospect list which, we hope, will enable us to reach many people for Christ during the coming year. Over a thousand people have united with the church this year. 495 came on Profession of Faith and 599 came by Transfer, giving us a net gain of 507. We rejoice that 495 people were won to Christ but at the same time we are ashamed that 16,000 laymen and 42 ministers did not win more people to Christ. 83 revivals and 87 visitation evangelism campaigns were conducted.

NEW PARSONAGES: Approximately \$80,000 has been spent for new parsonages and improvements. Tabor City, Camp Shallotte, Lake Waccamaw, and Epworth have lovely new parsonages, with the latter having been begun before Conference this year. Tabor City's parsonage is air-conditioned. Elizabethtown, Burgaw, and Wrightsville are planning new parsonages next year. Sneads Ferry is purchasing a building for their parsonage.

NEW SANCTUARIES: Wesley Memorial is spending \$145,000 on a new sanctuary and ten additional Sunday School rooms, all of which will be airconditioned. Shallotte Camp has, not only, built a new parsonage, but has under construction a \$55,000 sanctuary and education building, with the sanctuary being air-conditioned. Lumberton is building a lovely \$165,000 air-conditioned sanctuary, with windows and altar rich in symbolism. A new church and educational building, begun last year, will soon be completed for the people at Peace, costing \$25,000. This new church and the lovely Gothic church at Chadbourn will be ready for dedication this fall.

EDUCATION BUILDING: Grace is constructing a new educational building at a cost of \$150,000 and also air-conditioning the sanctuary at a cost of \$12,000. Fairmont is building a new \$108,000 educational plant. Pembroke, First Church, is completing a \$20,000 addition to her educational facilities and Concord has dedicated a new \$20,000 educational building.

NEW CHURCHES TO BE ORGANIZED: A new church is now under construction between Wilmington and Wrightsville Beach. When organized it will be known as the Oleander Methodist Church. Another new church is being organized at Yaupon Village, which is a new beach area five miles south of Southport.

BENEVOLENCE INCREASE: We have increased our benevolences over \$10,000 and at the same time there has been approximately a \$10,000 increase in salary for the ministers.

REPORT OF THE

COMMITTEE ON APPROVED SUPPLY PASTORS' SCHOOL

The Approved Supply Pastor's School at Duke University provides in-service training for non-seminary candidates for the ministry, and is designed to aid such persons in fulfilling the requirements of the Course of Study, prescribed in the 1956 **Discipline**, Paragraphs 2044-2048. This School is jointly sponsored by the

Department of Ministerial Education of the Board of Education, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and the Divinity School of Duke University. The School runs for four weeks and grants credit for an entire year's work in the Course of Study.

The 1956 School was held July 17-August 10, with an enrollment of 178 students, 49 being from the North Carolina Conference. The 1957 session is scheduled for July 16-August 9, and the present indications are that the enrollment will be slightly above the figures of the year before. The instructors for the School will be: Reverends Leon Couch and O. Kelly Ingram of the North Carolina Conference; Professor William R. Locke of High Point College; Professor Raymond A. Smith of Greensboro College; Professors Boyd Daniels, T. A. Langford, and Clyde Manschreck of the Department of Religion, Duke University, and Professors John Carlton, Creighton Lacy, McMurry S. Richey, and John J. Rudin of the Divinity School at Duke. The School is planned each year by a committee headed by Dean James Cannon of the Divinity School. Other members are: W. A. Kale, M. S. Richey, Creighton Lacy, and A. J. Walton. Supervision is given by Dr. J. Richard Spann of the Department of Ministerial Education.

The majority of the men attending the Supply School need financial help. Last year 101 students were given scholarships. About twenty men were unable to come because scholarship funds were not available for them. Since the contribution to the School by the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference is not sufficient to take care of all scholarship needs, it has become necessary for the participating Annual Conference to make supplementary contributions. The leaders of the School are sincerely grateful to the North Carolina Conference for past and present allocations. It is believed that a continuation of sizeable financial contributions by Annual Conferences will be necessary throughout this quadrennium, and perhaps for a longer period. The Supply School is a reputable institution. The morale of the student body is unusually high, and serious work is done. Members of the faculty not only are leaders in their fields and, therefore, provide stimulation for the students, but look upon the Supply School as a significant opportunity for service.

The Brotherhood is a group of Methodist ministers and lay people who want to express their sympathy to the bereaved widow of a Methodist minister in a way that will be of real assistance when it is most needed. Instead of sending telegrams or flowers, gifts of \$1 by superannuate ministers and lay people; \$3 by pastor members whose salary is under \$3,000; \$4, if the salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5 if above \$4,000. This money is sent by the Treasurer as soon as the death is reported to him, and the widow has the needed money to pay funeral expenses even before she receives any money from insurance. This is not an insurance company. It is a fellowship, a brotherhood.

The membership is made up of 313 beneficiary (ministers) and 230 nonbeneficiary (lay) members, a total membership of 543. This is an increase over last year. We would like to express our appreciation to the lay people who are members of the Brotherhood. Their support has meant much to the Brotherhood and we hope many more will join.

The following two calls were made this year; 156—Rev. J. W. Frank; and 157—Rev. E. W. Downum. The response to these calls was good so each widow or family received a sum of \$1,500. Should all the Methodist ministers (approximately 150 more) and at least 300 lay members join the Brotherhood, approximately \$2,400 would go to the widow and family of the deceased.

Article 4 of the Constitution of the Brotherhood states: "Any minister of the N. C. Conference on Trial or in Full Connection, or any Accepted Supply Pastor doing supply work in the Conference, may become a beneficiary Member of the Brotherhood by payment of an Initiation Fee of \$1, and within 30 days from the date of entrance a Mortuary Assessment of \$3, if salary is under \$3,000; \$4, if salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5, if salary is \$4,000 or above. The Mortuary Assessment on any beneficiary member who becomes superannuated shall be \$1 per call. Accepted Supply Pastors who have served at least ten years and who cease to travel because of physical disability, or because there is no more work for them, may continue as beneficiary members. Any person or organization may become a non-beneficiary member upon the payment of \$1 or more and the promise to pay the specified sum on the death of each beneficiary member thereafter."

A PROPOSED SUBSTITUTE FOR ARTICLES, 5, 6, AND 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD, THE METHODIST CHURCH

We, the undersigned members of the N. C. Conference Brotherhood, request a reconsideration and revision of Articles 5, 6, and 10 of the Constitution at the next meeting of the Brotherhood. The revision or amendment of Articles 5 and 6 will enable the Brotherhood to determine the mortuary benefit for any given 9 year; reserve funds will be set aside for the purpose of increasing the mortuary benefits year by year; and the Brotherhood will be placed on a business-like basis. Since Article 10 provides that "a member of the conference shall not be eligible to membership in the Brotherhood after he has been in full connection for ten years," it sets an arbitrary deadline which, in some cases, may be unbrotherly. Furthermore, the provision that "at the time a member joins he shall pay all assessments in arrears from the time he was admitted into full connection or began working as a supply pastor in the conference," fails to recognize that the latecomer was not enjoying the protection of the Brotherhood during the years when he was not a member and, therefore, should not be expected to pay full arrearage.

We propose the substitution of the following for Article 5: At the beginning of each conference year the Board of Trustees shall meet and set the mortuary benefit to be paid the beneficiary upon the death of a Conference Brotherhood beneficiary member. The amount of such payment shall be determined by the total amount resulting from the first call after the close of Annual Conference plus $\frac{1}{3}$ net earnings of the preceding year, less expense of collection. This amount shall be paid to the beneficiary in two payments, one as soon as the death is reported, the other as soon as sufficient funds are in hand. In case the deceased member did not direct how his mortuary benefit should be applied, it shall be paid to the surviving wife, or as otherwise specifically directed.

We propose the substitution of the following for Article 6: Any funds coming into the Brotherhood in any way, (mortuary assessments always excepted,) over and above the amount set for one mortuary benefit payment for the particular year, less office expense incurred by the Secretary-Treasurer, shall be invested by the treasurer and the interest therefrom used solely as a supplementary fund to increase the mortuary benefit the following year.

We propose the substitution of the following for Article 10: Any minister of the North Carolina Conference on trial or in full connection, or any approved supply pastor doing supply work in the conference, may become a beneficiary member of the Brotherhood by payment of \$1 and within 30 days from the date of entrance a mortuary assessment of \$3 if his salary is under \$3,000; \$4 if his salary is \$3,000 and under \$4,000; \$5 if his salary is \$4,000 or above; provided that, if he has served as a clerical member one year or more, the initiation fee and mortuary assessment shall be as follows:

(The table may be projected at the same method of progression to determine initiation fee and mortuary assessment of a minister with any number of years beyond fifteen. Thus, a minister with 50 years of service would pay an initiation fee of \$27 and a mortuary assessment of \$713.50.)

This graduated scale takes two factors into account, First, by adding fifty cents per year to membership dues for each year of service prior to membership, it takes into account the increased risk in accepting into membership pastors who have attained greater age. Second, by the ever-increasing membership fee to the mortuary assessment of each preceding year, it takes into account the calls the pastors missed. It should be pointed out that at any time a pastor may choose to join, he will pay less than the accumulated arrearage; but, on the other hand, he will not have enjoyed the protection of the Brotherhood.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE QUADRENNIAL COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

For more than two centuries the Methodist movement has been a stalwart parton of education. Its beginning may be traced to Oxford University. John Wesley ,our spiritual father, was a scholar as well as an evangelist. His spiritual zeal would hardly have changed the religious climate of England and America in the eighteenth century had there not been coupled with it a trained an discerning mind. As the Methodist movement pushed westward over the American continent, it left in its make schools as well as churches. The circuit riders were pioneers in building colleges and universities. Many of them remain, and they are the churches' indispensable asset. Such as our heritage.

Accordingly, the General Conference of The Methodist Church, in its 1956 session, meeting in Minneapolis, Minnesota, saw the full implication of our historic hertage in higher Christian education, and adopted a far reaching program intended to mobilize the leadership and the resources of the great Methodist Church to meet the contemporary crisis in higher education.

"It is necessary that on the Annual Conference level there be a Quardennial Committee on Christian Higher Education, for the purpose of initiating and implementing any proposed campaign or policy. It is recommended that this Committee be constituted by the Annual Conference and that representation form the Conference Board of Education be included in its membership."

Following this General Conference directive, the North Carolina Annual Conference, in its 1956 session in Greenville, North Carolina directed that the Annual Conference Board of Education be designated as the Quadrennial Committee on Christian Higher Education.

The Committee was organized promptly and at a subsequent meeting, voted to enlarge its membership by electing as Ex Officio members, the resident Bishop, the District Superintendents, and the Chairman of the major Conference Boards and Agencies.

Progress in the field of higher Christian education within the bounds of the North Carolina Annual Conference has been amazing. The Annual Conference had approved, in a special session, the establishment of **two** new senior colleges within its bounds. In July, 1956, a site was chosen for N. C. Wesleyan College at Rocky Mount, N. C. This magnificant tract of some 200 acres north of the city of Rock Mount is valued at \$200,000.

On October 25, 1956, the Trustees of N. C. Wesleyan College filed its charter with the Secretary of State of the State of North Carolina.

The people of Rocky Mount and the surrounding areas have pledged \$2,069,504 toward the construction of their college.

Likewise, Methodist College, Fayetteville, N. C. filed its Charter with the Secretary of State on November 1, 1956. On February 21, 1957 titles were secured for the 600 acre site, and this property was officially received by Bishop Paul N. Garber in a formal public presentation. This property represents a value of 3300,000. In the first year, the records of Methodist College, show that contributions have totaled almosto 3300,000 toward pledges of 1,750,000 over a five year period.

The Committee commends with high appreciation the Trustees' election of Mr. L. Stacy Weaver, as President of Methodist College, Fayetteville, N. C.

Your Committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That our N. C. Annual Conference accept the challenge of raising the General Conference goal of \$1.30 per member for higher Christian education— \$1.00 per member for our Colleges and 30ϕ per member for the Wesley Foundations—and that we strive to reach that boal at the earliest possible date.

2. That The Rev. Paul Carruth be apponted the Executive Director of the Annual Conference Committee on Christian Higher Education.

3. That the Annual Conference authorize a Capital Funds Campaign to be launched when, in the discretion of the Committee, proper cultivation has been made, with the further provision that a detailed blueprint outlining and defining such a campaign be presented for approval at the forthcoming special session of the Annual Conference.

Your Committee is acutely awarte of our unique position—divinely called and set apart—our N. C. Annual Conference, has in the providence of God, been destined to become the Pace Setter for Methodism in the creative and pioneering privilege of planting new institutions of learning. We call on every pastor and layman to accept this new challenge with fervent dedication.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION RESEARCH PLANNING AND SURVEY COMMITTEE

The Conference Church Extension, Research, Planning and Survey Committee has led in careful study of areas of need in our Conference through the past three years. Careful census studies have been made in a number of communities, as a consequence of which study, new Church are now organized in our Conference.

Mr. Roy L. Turnage has worked half-time for our Committee, and the remainder of his time he has worked in the same area of concern with the Town and Country Commission. We commend the fine work he has done. The Duke Foundation has co-operated with this committee by making available to us six students at the Duke Divinity School who helped in surveys made this year.

The work of this committee is of such significance, that we recommend that

its area of interest be broadened. To better keep pace with the growth of our State, and to plan in advance for the needs of a continuing industrial progress. we believe more executive and administrative personnel will be required.

Inasmuch as we desire this committee to help chart the course of Church Extension in our conference, keep us abreast of advances and growth in our conference area, and work closely with the Board of Missions in its program of advance, we recommend that a principal person be employed as soon as practical.

This employee would conduct a constant, creative, and effective promotion of the work of Church Extension, and would assist to the end that greater funds be made available for this work. He would conduct a conference-wide program of information and selling both as to the needs and opportunities for growth and expansion.

For these and other reasons, we believe it is necessary that annual appropriations should be continued to this Committee in an amount equal to, at least, the amount of the annual appropriations during the past several years. We, therefore, recommend that this be given favorable considerable by our World Service and Finance Commission.

The religion and deeply Chrisian Spirit which is evident in all our schools was most heartening to the members of the Board. This is the thing which makes our church related colleges distinctive and should lead the Church to a new dedication with the part of our quadrennial emphasis on Christian higher education.

While the Board is concerned with our mammoth program of building new colleges, we believe, also, that the same enthusiasm going into this work should go also to the support and expansion of the colleges, which have served so long and so well. L. C. Vereen, Chairman

REPORT OF THE DEACONESS BOARD

The Deaconess Office signifies a relationship to the Church, rather than a type of work. "This office entitles a woman to serve The Methodist Church through any of its agencies in any capacity not requiring full clergy rights." (Par. 1252—Discipline 1956)

The primary function of the Conference Deaconess Board is to plan promo-

tional and interpretative programs and to accept responsibility for seeking to find young women who may become interested in deaconess work and guiding them through the necessary steps, referring them to the Joint Committee on Missionary Personnel.

Your Conference Deaconess Board has sought to give the Pastors and leaders in our churches a better understanding of the place and purpose of the Deaconess in the life of our Church, and a new appreciation for the devoted and varied service which she is prepared to render. Our deaconesses in the North Carolina Conference have been untiring in their effort to present the opportunities offered to the Deaconess and to give information concerning the Deaconess Order and preparation needed for such service to the Church. This has been done in organizations in the local Church, in sub-district and district meetings, vocational conferences, youth conferences and assemblies, and in personal conferences with individuals. The whole area of full-time Christian services has been presented and the challenge presented to both young men and young women on the basis of the need of our Church for workers. Special emphasis has been given to this through the program of the Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College, Greenville.

Three active deaconesses have served this year in the North Carolina Conference: Ethelynde Ballance, as rural worker on the Roberdell Charge; Mamiej Chandler, as Director of the Methodist Student Center, East Carolina College, Greenville; Alta Nye, in Indian Work, Pembroke. Deaconess Candidate, Charlotte Whitfield, has served as Director of Christian Education in our local Church at Siler City, Sara McCracken, deaconess on extended leave because of need in her home, Durham, has been untiring in her service with the Women's Society of Christian Service, in the local Church where she holds her membership and on the district and Conference level. There are two retired deaconesses living within the bounds of our Conference: Miss Jennie Congleton, Greenville, and Miss Elizabeth R. Davis, Rocky Mount.

Hazel Burke, of LaGrange, after completion of work for the Master's Degree, was given an appointment in January and has been serving as a group worker in a Social Settlement under the Woman's Division in Tampa, Florida, Willa Dean Lindsay, Clinton, will complete this summer two years of service as a US-2 in Georgia. Olene Civils, Kinston, received the Master's Degre from Scarritt College for Christian Workers, the first of June and is ready for an appointment.

In view of the urgent appeals from all boards of our Church for workers, and in recognition of the need within our own Conference, your Deaconess Board recommends:

That Pastors and adult workers with Youth give special emphasis through the local Church during the coming year to this call of our Church.

That a special and definite effort be made to find capable and attractive young women in our local churches and colleges and present to them the call to service as a Deaconess.

That the names of these young women be sent to the Chairman of the Deaconess Board, so that information may be sent direct to them concerning the opportunities offered for service and the aid provided for specialized study to young women accepted as Deaconess candidates.

We believe that our youth today will respond, as youth has always responded, to the call of the Church, if the challenge is presented to them by their Pastors and leaders.

GENERAL CHURCH SCHOOL WORK

The Committee on General Church School Work of the North Carolina Conference Board of Education finds no cause for complacent self-congratulation as it contrasts the achievements of the 1956-1957 conference year with the monumental task of challenging the spiritual illiteracy among our people. Yet we rejoice that God has not left Himself without able and consecrated witnesses.

Under the skilled leadership of our Executive Secretary, Dr. C. P. Morris, and his competent staff, diligent, vigorous, and effective work has been done. We are pleased to note the following attainments:

Attention has been given to the various aspects of the educational task, its goals, its dynamic, and the techniques of its accomplishment through the continuing program of training of local Church School leaders, and the relating of their work to the total life and mission of the Church. Institutes, workshops, laboratory schools, Christian Workers' Schools, the counseling of individual churches by conference staff members, the providing of appropriate literature, and a seminar for Directors of Christian education are among the means used to effect the desired advances in General Church School Work. For the sake of brevity it can only be noted in passing that considerable attention has been given to the areas of the increasing of Church School membership and attendance, evangelism, alcohol education, race relations, and to the observance of special days. Music, the design and equipment of educational facilities, statistical records, the organization of new Church Schools, and the promotion of the Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship have all been areas of concern.

We congratulate Dr. Morris and the Conference Staff for the marked degree of advance that has been made in the area of local church emphasis in the area of education during this period.

Concerning the Conference Film Library, Appreciation is expressed for the use of the North Carolina Film Library Service under the sponsorship of the Conference TV, Radio, and Film Commission. These filmstrips are appreciated by all age-group workers.

We call for the effective implementation of the following program during the coming conference year:

Adequate provision for guiding and training general church school workers in local church schools.

The leadership of the District Superintendent is solicited in guiding the work of the District Staff.

We recommend:

a. Suitable workshops for training pastors in the goals and techniques of Christian education to be arranged by the Conference Executive Secretary.

b. The naming of subdistrict directors of General Church School Work by the District Director.

c. Suitable autumn institutes for the training of General Church School officers on a district or sub-district basis under the direction of the district staff.

d. The conducting of a Christian Workers' School in each subdistrict on an annual basis.

e. That an amount for leadership training be included in each local church budget.

f. The continuance of the program of one-teacher Christian Workers' Schools for small churches.

g. The promotion of approved standards of education in each local church.

h. The election of officers of local church schools at the fourth quarterly conference to take office at the beginning of the conference year. The Church School year shall begin on the first Sunday in October with teachers taking office at that time.

The Committee approves the proposed program for strengthening of declining churches as amended.

Guidance in Organization and Program of the Local Church School

We recommend specific courses on organization and program in Christian Workers' Schools. We recommend that Conference Board of Education Staff leadership continue to be provided for Christian Workers' Schools.

We urge that more qualified instructors for leadership training schools be secured over wider geographical area of the conference.

We ask that the District Superintendents cooperate in locating particular areas which need leadership training, assisting the District Directors of General Church School Work to provide training opportunities.

We encourage local and subdistrict Workers' Conferences to acquaint all workers with the total purpose and program of Christian education, and to help each individual worker understand his place in the total ongoing program of the church.

We encourage local churches to organize their program so that it is selfsustaining, with diversity of responsibility throughout the local congregation.

A Successful and continuing emphasis on increasing church school membership and attendance

The attention of every church school leader in Methodism should be directed to these three facts:

1. "Man's ancient dependence upon the gospel of Jesus Christ for life and salvation, here and hereafter, has taken on a new urgency.

2. "The church school is, next to the Christian home, society's chief and best agency for teaching persons the gospel of Jesus Christ and His way for our lives. Yet only one American in every four is a member of a church school.

3. "Any church school anywhere can increase its membership if it really wants to and is willing to work."

Recommendations
1. That each church school secure the best qualified person to serve as

1. That each church school secure the best qualified person to serve as membership cultivation superintendent. Where this was not done at the Last Quarterly Conference we urge that it be done at the First Quarterly Conference of the new Conference year.

2. That the membership cultivation superintendent be given guidance and training in subdistrict institutes for church school workers in the fall.

3. That September through October be observed as a special period for increasing church school membership and attendance, with guidance materials being mailed from the office of the Conference Board of Education to the pastors, general church school superintendents, and superintendents for membership cultivation early in September. That each church use Church School Rally Day as a means of lifting up the program of Christian Education in the church and emphasizing the importance of regular attendance.

4. That each local church school observe Promotion Sunday on the Fourth Sunday in September in a meaningful and well planned manner.

5. That each church school be urged to consider organizing one or more new classes.

6. That each local church school set up a complete home members plan to include all ages.

7. That good use be made of Christian Education Week; that promotional and guidance materials be provided by the Conference Board of Education office on all these phases of the church school work.

Emphasis on an intelligent approach to recruiting and training teachers and other workers

Recommendations

1. That churches set up personnel committees of the Commission on Education, using church school rolls, to seek out prospective leadership.

2. That a Fellowship of General School Superintendents be organized on the district level. The suggestion is to have one district rally of General Church Superintendents, at which time the group will determine the need for subdistrict or district meetings of superintedents, and how often.

3. That pre-service and in-service training programs be organized in local churches.

4. That local churches place leadership training in the church budget.

5. That the Conference Board of Education continue the goal of having a Christian Workers' School in every subdistrict, recognizing the joint responsibility of the District Director of General Church School Work and the District Superintendent.

6. That the Executive Secretary inform the District Directors of Christian Workers' Schools, where and when held.

7. That the Conference arrange Training Day for Deans of Christian Workers' Schools.

Promoting the Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship Recommendations

Seek the cooperation of the District Superintendent and the Pastor involved in promoting the Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship in at least two churches in each district. a. Promote the study of **Sourcebook** and the **Manual** by a committee appointed by the pastor in each of the two churches.

b. Where possible, this committee should observe a Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship in operation.

c. Lend assistance where possible.

Evangelism in the church schools

Recommendations

That the period January to Easter be observed annually as a period of evangelistic emphasis.

a. That a school of evangelism for teachers be held by the pastors in January.

b. That pastors' church membership classes for all ages begin by Feb. 16, 1958.

Organizing new church schools

Recommendations

1. That the Board of Education offer services to the District Superintendents in organizing.

a. outpost Sunday Schools

b. Sunday Schools in new Churches

c. Sunday Schools in old churches where Sunday Schools are not already organized.

2. That the Conference Board of Education continue the policy of providing one-half the cost of Methodist literature to newly organized church schools, and to church schools changing from non-Methodist to Methodist literature, for the first quarter. We call attention to the fact that in such situations the Methodist Publishing House provides literature for two quarters at one-half price. This makes it possible for a church school to have literature free for the first quarter. **Music**

Recommendations

1. That, in accordance with the Methodist Discipline, (Par. 1397.3) the Board of Education appoint a committee on Directors of Christian Education and Ministers of Music, whose duties shall be

a. to review the credentials of candidates for the office of Director of Christian Education and Minister of Music, and make recommendations to the board for certification in harmony with the provision of the 1956 Discipline; and

b. to recommend to the board plans for institutes, conferences, and other occasions for fellowship and training for directors of Christian education and educational assistants, and for ministers of music and others responsible for music in the local church.

2. That this committee shall be composed of one director of Christian education, one minister of music, one pastor who need not be a member of the Board of Education, one member of the Committee on General Church School Work shall be the chairman of the committee, one ministerial member-at-large from the Board of Education, and one lay member-at-large from the Board of Education.

Design and equipment of church school buildings

Recommendations

1. That the Conference Board of Education offer information service to churches planning to build or remodel.

2. That local churches be encouraged to evaluate present use of space and equipment as to effectiveness, with a view of achieving greater efficiency according

to the standards of Christian education in The Methodist Church. That local churches be encouraged to develop a definite planning program for improving or replacing currently obsolete or inadequate equipment.

3. That before any church school building is planned, the local church committee contact the District Board of Church Location and Building.

4. That the following available materials be studied thoroughly:

-Conduct one-day District Clinics on the Declining Church in each of the nine districts.

Purpose: To discover, insofar as possible, the need or "sickness," cause and possible cure; to decide on definite steps to be taken; to determine how the conference boards and agencies may assist these declining churches.

Participants: Pastors and at least one layman and one lay woman from each declining church in the district.

Leaders: District Superintendent (presiding); a representative* from each sponsoring group; a resource leader with special training and experience in small church work. *For the WSCS representative the District Secretary of Promotion is suggested.

-Conduct a two-day Coaching Conference for Selected Leaders.

Purpose: To train carefully selected leaders to conduct "Preaching-Teaching Missions" in the declining churches.

Leaders: A representative from each sponsoring board and a resource leader on "The Work of the Local Church."

-Conduct a Community Census or Survey in each church to be assisted.

Purpose: To discover the people residing in the community, their church affiliation and preference; whether or not they would be interested in a Sunday School; and to invite them to the "Preaching-Teaching Mission" already scheduled.

Leadership: Subdistrict or local church young adult group, with the assistance of the district superintendent, the district director of adult work, the subdistrict director of adult work, and the subdistrict YAF president.

--Conduct a "Preaching-Teaching Mission" in each church requesting this help.

Purpose: To revive and revitalize the church; to motivate the people with a concern and desire for improvement and growth; to help the church set up a simple, workable organization; to help train the workers for their task; to help them make a long-range plan for improving and sustaining the program.

Leader: One selected leader trained in the Coaching Conference assigned to each church, working with the pastor, and entertained locally if possible. This leader to have a conference with the pastor ten days or two weeks prior to the Mission.

Schedule: Three successive evenings---two hours each evening:

Worship-a preaching service to motivate, challenge, revive.

Study and Planning—a period to study "The Work of the Local Church" and to make definite plans for improvement.

-Set up a simple, workable organization:

- 1. official board with small committees or commissions meeting regularly.
- 2. A Sunday School
- 3. MYF and WSCS if possible.

Fellowship—An opportunity for the people in the community to get to know each other. A period for refreshments and visting together would be good.

-Provide a Follow-up Program to help Sustain the Local Church

a. A re-visit by the leader for a one-night session one to three months afterward to hear reports on programs made and to make plans for the future.

b. Help through correspondence and counseling provided by the participating boards.

c. Lay services planned for the church as needed by D.S. and District Lay Leader.

d. Regular district meetings of the pastors and lay leaders of the declining churches (monthly or quarterly) conducted by the District Superintendent, for fellowship, reporting on progress made, and plans for the future, and for training.

Financing the Program

1. District Clinics on the Declining Church:

Expenses of Board representatives taken care of my respective board. Expenses of resource leader apportioned equally to the four sponsoring boards.

2. Coaching Conference

The young adults who make the surveys to give of their time.

Each board take care of the expenses of its representative.

Expenses of resource leader apportioned equally to the four sponsoring boards.

Expenses of selected leaders, including travel, room, meals, and materials, apportioned equally to the four sponsoring boards.

- Community Surveys Expenses of organizers and cost of materials apportioned equally to the four sponsoring boards.
- "Preaching-Teaching Mission" Expenses of leader of each mission and \$30.00 honorarium apportioned equally to the four sponsoring boards.
- 5. Follow-up Program Expenses of leader and \$10.00 honorarium for a re-visit apportioned equally to the four sponsoring boards.
- 6. Miscellaneous

The host church to provide room and meals for visiting leaders if possible. A free-will offering to be taken in each church served, to be used for some cause outside the local church, the cause to be decided by the local church.

Note: References above to the four sponsoring boards should read: "The first four named groups at the top of Page 1" of this article"

Section B

CHILDREN'S WORK

Report for 1956-57

Children's Work suffered a severe blow when Miss Elizabeth Johnson, who had directed a very effective program, resigned her position as Conference Director of Children's Work at the end of the last Conference year. It has not been possible to replace her, so we have had to get along this year without a Conference Director. The Executive Secretary, with the very fine assistance of the District Directors of Children's Work, has promoted a limited program in this area.

Much emphasis was placed on the Vacation Church School the past year, and our conference goal continues to be a school in every local church. According to the statistical report we had a significant gain in the enrollment of these schools in the Conference Year, 1955-1956. These schools were attended by 35,566 boys and girls, an increase of 5227 over the previous year. Very successful District Vacation Church Schools were held in each of the nine districts in March. Fifteen hundred persons were reached in these one-day sessions which were led by the district directors of children's work, assisted by a team of outstanding leaders in the field of children's work.

Nine District Junior Camps were held with more than six hundred boys and girls in attendance. These camps were directed by district camp directors and counsellors recruited in each district. Several churches reported successful day camps conducted during the summer.

A Conference Laboratory School, directed by Miss Johnson, was held at First Church, Wilson, July 16-20, with 58 in attendance.

One of the most effective methods of training workers with children is through the Subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools. During the past year 60 courses for workers with children were taught in 48 schools. These classes reached 1406 workers with 791 receiving course cards of recognition. The Durham Area School and the Alamance County School held Observation-Laboratory classes for workers with children.

We are glad to note that while the general church had a decrease in the Nursery Home Department in the year 1955-56, our conference had a substantial increase. We also had a gain of 844 in the children's department as a whole, for a total enrollment of 38,250. It is our hope that we will have a good increase in the Children's Department this year.

Nursery home workers have been urged to cooperate with the pastors in urging the parents of young children to have their babies baptized. We feel that this is most important and that all Methodist parents should be encouraged to follow this historic practice faithfully.

We have encouraged the Missionary Education of Children in every way possible. We have worked with the Woman's Society of Christian Service in encouraging local churches to use the special missions units in extended and additional sessions of their local church schools. We have also helped them to promote the children's Service Fund which is the offering for missions taken in these extra sessions.

We are looking forward to an active program in the area of children's work during the next conference year. We are making recommendations for the new year, realizing that some of them cannot be met unless we secure a Conference Director of Children's Work—and we do hope to have a Director in the field very soon to lead us in this program. We will continue to rely heavily on the district directors who have been so helpful in the past. Pastors are urged to make children their business and to include them in their personal affections and pastoral ministry. The church that neglects her children will soon have no church at all.

Recommendations for Children's Work

1. That there be a Vacation Church School held in every church in the Conference. That the dates of March 4-14, 1958 be reserved for District Vacation Church School Institutes.

2. That Junior Camps be supported on a district basis and that more exten-

sive promotion be made of the program of Day Camping. We recommend that there be a training session in early spring for those interested in Day Camping.

3. That fall subdistrict institutes be held in each district to introduce new materials and to introduce the year's program in children's work. We call special attention to the new closely graded kindergarten materials, which will be ready for use.

4. That a Conference Laboratory School be planned for the summer of 1958 and that we continue the practice of a conference-wide Laboratory School until that time when all districts can have these on district or subdistrict level.

5. That we strengthen the work of the Nursery Home Department by urging regular contact with parents of children too young to attend Nursery Class, regular distribution of THE CHRISTIAN HOME magazine, and that we develop a program of training for parents prior to their entering a child in nursery class.

6. We recommend a Membership Training Class for all persons joining the church.

7. That District Directors work closely with the Secretary of Children's Work in the Woman's Society of Christian Service in promoting work with children in additional sessions and in clarifying proper channeling of the Children's Service Fund.

8. That churches planning to build or remodel their educational facilities consult with the Conference Board of Education as to suitability of plans.

9. That the local church Commission on Education set-up standards for all teachers in the church school, using as their guide the recommendations of the General Board of Education.

10. That a survey be made of the number of church-sponsored Week-day Nursery Schools and Kindergartens and that we study the advisability of a training program for leaders of these week-day projects. Also recommend that churches sponsoring a week-day program of religious education encourage their leaders to take advantage of training opportunities and that they affiliate themselves with a recognized Association of Childhood Education.

11. Realizing the importance of encouraging church attendance among our school-age children, we would like to ask our ministers to include in their morning worship service some planned moments with the children.

12. That children's workers cooperate in every way possible with the total church program of Christian Education, especially leading out in observance of Children's Day, Church School Rally Day, Promotion Sunday, and National Family Week.

13. We would like to ask for a Conference for Children's Workers in the early fall of 1958, with resource people to give help in the field of local teaching situations and teacher problems, and also an inspirational speaker. It is also suggested that at this conference, a section be included for ministers and their relationship to children in the church.

We would like to express our appreciation to our Executive Secretary, Dr. C. P. Morris, for the very fine way in which he has helped to keep the Children's Section of the Board of Education active during this year. We have looked to him for leadership and he has never failed us.

Section C

YOUTH WORK

Under the marching order of its motto, "Christ Above All" the MYF has a wide range of responsibilities placed on it by the church. Some of the areas where we have been at work are:

1. Youth Summer Agencies

a. Eighty-two persons attended the older Youth Assembly at Camp Don-Lee, July, 1956.

b. The Senior Assemblies at Louisburg College were accounted successful in quality and numbers. Four hundred and forty persons attended the first two weeks. One hundred and twenty-five persons attended the third week which was a new venture for the North Carolina Conference MYF. This week was an "Assembly Workshop." Its purpose was to train officers and program area chairmen in the MYF. All evaluations concluded that this week was one of the outstanding summer opportunities for MYF leaders.

c. The MYF Annual Conference is unique in Methodism in its five-day program on the campus of Duke University. Four hundred seventy delegates and leaders attended and were joined on Rally Day by an additional 2000 youth and adult leaders.

d. Twenty youth and three adults attended the SEJ MYF Workshop at Lake Junaluska. This gave the N. C. Conference one of the largest delegations present.

2. Special Service Projects

a. One hundred twenty-five youth and adults joined in a Recreation Laboratory at Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church in Greenville, February 22-24 under the leadership of Rev. Larry Eisenberg.

 b. One hundred thirty youth and their leaders were present March 1-3 at Steele Street Church, Sanford, for a most inspiring church Vocations Conference.
 3. Evangelism

a. MYF membership moved from 23,747 in 1954-55 to 24,707 in 1955-56. This doubles the gain any year in the past ten.

b. The Board of Evangelism and the MYF cooperated in a tri-district Christian Witness Mission held in Fayetteville, N. C. Twenty youth from the Durham and Burlington Districts joined with 20 youth from the Fayetteville District in making 86 visits. Results were good: twenty-four young men and women were won on profession of faith and two by transfer.

4. MYFund

Last year \$11,040.04 was contributed to this fund. This is the largest amount ever contributed by the youth of the N. C. Conference and represents the largest net gain of any conference in the S.E. Jurisdiction.

5. Vacation Church School Institutes were conducted by the District Directors of Intermediate Work.

6. The first Conference-wide MYF Prayer Day was observed in many of the churches the first day of Lent, March 6, 1957.

7. The Conference Director taught in five Christian Workers Schools.

8. Investment in Youth Leadership

a. The Conference MYF sent one delegate to the Southeastern Recreation Workshop at Leesburg, Florida.

b. The Conference MYF sent two delegates to the UN-Washington Seminar.

c. The Conference MYF sent its President, Jim Long, to the National Conference of Methodist Youth.

d. Two youth delegates will be sent to the National Youth School of Alcohol Studies.

9. A Fellowship of Adult Workers was organized and held its first meeting in the Cumberland Subdistrict.

10. A TV program was presented over the Educational Station at Chapel Hill, N. C., on the Conference Summer Program offered Methodist Youth. 11. A National Caravan composed of three young women, one young man, and an adult counselor visited six churches. A Duke Divinity School Caravan composed of two ministerial students worked in ten churches.

12. One new trend in subdistrict work is that of offering training for local church officers and MYF Counselors. Many subdistricts throughout the conference carried out some type of Leadership Training.

Commendation

We commend our Conference Director of Youth Work, the Reverend Herman S. Winberry, for injecting into the life of our youth a keen sensitivity for commitment to the Christian life, for helping develop in our Conference an intelligent approach to the problems of youth, and for the devotion of his own life as it has been reflected in the Conference program.

Emphases for 1957-58

1. ADULT WORKERS WITH YOUTH

Training adult workers is increasingly recognized as one of the most fruitful uses of time and energy in raising the level of youth work in the annual conference. We believe time invested with adult workers will achieve more in strengthening the program of youth work than at any other point. To this purpose we recommend:

a. That the subdistrict MYF offer training for adults and youth as a part of its yearly program.

b. That Workers Conferences be encouraged to consider as a part of their opportunities the training of adult workers.

c. That training for adult workers be offered in some measure at Senior Youth Assemblies and MYF Annual Conference Session.

d. We commend as one of the very finest training programs the Christian Workers' School.

e. That the 1957 District Christian Education Institutes feature the training of adult workers.

f. That a fellowship of adult workers with youth be formed by bringing together workers from a number of churches in a given area.

g. That an effort be made to secure more certified instructors for courses in the Youth Department for leadership in Christian Workers' Schools.

h. That all training experiences for adult workers with youth concern themselves with problems of the local church in so far as possible.

i. That study and evaluation be given to the question, "What kind of significant training for adult workers with youth is possible in one evening?" This study could serve as a key for the work of conference, district, and subdistrict personnel. Also, it would provide a clue for local church workers' conferences.

j. We suggest that goals for any program with youth should include inspiring the faith of youth, considering a wide choice of vocation, and wise counsel in the matter of choosing a life partner. We suggest also that there be greater cooridination between the various adult workers, where these workers in the morning and evening sessions are not the same persons.

k. We propose that some help be given in the matter of developing Subdistrict Councils of adult workers, in addition to the help given in developing cirriculum materials. This former proposal has to do wth assisting the adult workers to understand the psychology of youth.

l. We feel that there is a need for caution in planning and scheduling extra meetings, and that this should be considered in the Fellowship of Adult Workers. This Fellowship of Adult Workers should, we feel, meet on a Subdistrict basis at least twice annually, to the end that this program is integrated into the local church's program, utilizing all teachers, counselors, program area advisors, club and scout workers, secretaries of youth work in the WSCS.

2. CHRISTIAN WITNESS MISSIONS

We recommend that TriDistrict Christian Witness Missions be held in as many as two districts. This recommendation is made on the basis of the Tri-District Mission held this year in the Fayetteville District. We further recommend that this be a joint venture of the Board of Education and the Board of Evangelism. The youth wish to express their appreciation for the fine cooperation of Brother H. K. King and the Board of Evangelism this past year.

3. PRAYER DAY

We recommend that the first day of Lent, Wednesday, February 19, 1958 be designated "MYF Prayer Day: for the youth of the North Carolina Conference." We urge the MYF's of the North Carolina Conference to magnify the place of prayer in the life of the individual, family, and church on this day.

4. METHODIST YOUTH FUND

This is a fund through which members of the MYF help in a program of missions, Christian education, and youth work around the world. The MYFund is a vital part of the world mission of the Church. We recommend:

a. That a Conference goal of \$1.00 per year per member of the MYF be an aim for this fund. This would more than double the present giving to this fund.

b. That a conference-wide pledge week be set and each MYFer be asked to make a personal pledge to the MYFund.

c. That conference publicity and promotion stress the vital elements in this program, namely;

(1) Stewardship of possession

(2) Help in world mission of church

(3) Act of dedication of this offering.

5. LOCAL CHURCH EMPHASIS: YOUTH DECISION

We commend to any MYF that wishes to seriously examine its purpose, organization, and program the special leaflet prepared for this quadrennium, "A Self Study Guide For Our MYF." This is an honest attempt to help your MYF take a look at itself. These can be ordered for the Conference Board of Education. (One copy free).

6. CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

1. We recommend that ministers, by Districts, gather for one-day workshops, for the purpose of re-orientation and re-evaluation of our fundamental understanding of the "call to preach" as it is interpreted in our contemporary theological standpoint. We suggest that this enterprise be a joint effort with the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification and Committee on Christian Vocations and that it be held preferably during the first two weeks of February, 1958.

2. We encourage the continuation of an annual conference-wide Christian Vocations Conference.

3. We urge that materials be made available in and through local churches concerning the "call to preach," vocations, and Methodist service projects; and that these be placed in high school libraries.

4. We recommend the reactivation of the Christian Vocations Committee of the Quarterly Conference.

7. DISTRICT WORK

We would emphasize here the proper perspective for District and Subdistrict MYF organizations. Let it be known that they have as their reason for existence the strengthening of the local MYF's. In planning programs these organizations should ask, How does this help the local young people and their MYF?

We recommend:

a. That each MYF Subdistrict in the conference plan one meeting designed to train local MYF officers and adult leaders.

b. We recommend at least one district rally in every district to be held preferably in the spring.

c. We suggest that, where feasible, the usual Fall Rally be substituted with a District Planning Retreat, composed of subdistrict and district councils, for the purpose of coordinating the conference youth program with that of the subdistricts.

d. We recommend the following themes for district rallies:

(1) "Making Your Calling Sure" (Christian vocations)

(2) "My MYF: A Redemptive Fellowship" (local church emphasis)

We desire to express appreciation for the leadership that is being given to the youth program by the District Directors of Youth and Intermediate Work. District work in several of the districts has been very effective. For those who give extra time and labor to the cause of Christian youth, we express here our joy and thanks.

8. CHURCH SCHOOL INSTITUTES

1. We recommend the continuation of the Church School Institute in the Fall.

2. We urge that these Institutes be utilized to train local church workers with youth.

9. MATERIALS FOR THE SMALL MYF.

We heartily recommend these two tools:

a. "A Manual on the Methodist Youth Fellowship in the Small Church."b. A new filmstrip, "Not Bigger But Better," dealing with the MYF in the small church.

10. SUMMER YOUTH CARAVANS

We call attention to the fact that a National Youth Caravan, consisting of four young people and one adult counselor, and a Divinity School Caravan, consisting of two young men, will be working in our conference during the summer to improve and strengthen the youth program in the churches visited.

We recommend that similar caravans be secured to work in our conference during the summer of 1958.

11. YOUTH SUMMER AGENCIES

We recommend to youth and adult workers with youth these summer activities.

a. Christian Adventure Camps at Camp Don-Lee

b. Senior Assemblies at Louisburg College

c. Annual Conference Session of the MYF at Duke University.

d. Older Youth Assembly at Camp Don-Lee

e. Local Church

(1) Christian Adventure Camping

(2) Christian Adventure Week

(3) Youth Activities Week

(4) Daily Vacation Church School

f. Jurisdictional Training

(1) Recreation Workshop, Leasburg, Fla.

(2) SEJ Youth Leadership Workshop at Lake Junaluska

(3) SEJ Leadership Workshop (for adult workers on all levels) at Lake Junaluska.

We encourage the continuation of our existing summer agencies and enterprises, feeling that through the program area emphases that our youth will indeed be led to the abundant life.

We feel that, from the standpoint of the youth themselves, the Annual Conference Session is helpful inasmuch as, ideally, each local Methodist Youth Fellowship has a voice in the Conference program of youth and the idea of a Conference of this nature for the youth seems good.

The purpose of ACS should be to carry out in the Methodist Youth Fellowship a program similar to that of the Annual Conference, except that it effects youth and their adult workers as it relates to delineating the five program areas as a recipe for living.

We feel that ACS offers the youth an opportunity to become familiar with the entire program of Methodist youth and can be a broadening experience for the young people who attend. This program which we refer to is not only that of the Youth Department, but as well the program of the entire church; to the end that these youth grow mentally, spiritually, and enjoy fellowship one with another. The experiment in group living enhances their appreciation and respect for the Christian community.

We note several difficulties. For example, there is insufficient representation from local MYF's. Of approximately 800 churches in the conference, a maximum of 400 youth are usually in attendance at the ACS.

We feel, further, that the program of ACS lacks basic Christian content in the program areas. Much of the time the work of the program areas is superficial and lacks the depth of understanding on the part of adults and youth alike which will strike imagination, interest, and devotion on the local church level.

We submit these recommendations: that there be a representative from the Bishop's Cabinet in attendance at all sessions of the ACS; that when area reports are submitted to the Conference for adoption that the Conference Director of Youth Work be present for clarification of goals and programs and as advisor to their acceptability; that we constantly re-examine our program in the light of changing times and needs and re-evaluate the effectiveness of the ACS in terms of local church benefit.

Generally speaking, the programs at Louisburg and Don-Lee are acceptable. But we encourage the same sort of continued re-evaluation and re-examination of these programs that is recommended for the ACS.

Section D

ADULT WORK

Report for 1956-1957

Adult education is crucial in the program of the church because adults are the parents and teachers of children and youth; adults wield power and influence in the church and community; and adults control the extent of the church's ministry through their practice, or lack of, stewardship of time, money, and ability.

Evaluation of 1956-1957 Program

1. Clinics for Teachers of Adult Classes were held in 25 subdistricts, with some 375 teachers in attendance. The Clinics, led by District or Subdistrict Directors of Adult Work, stressed the use of group procedures in teaching. There were several requests for repetition of this project, from teachers attending.

2. New Subdistrict Young Adult Fellowships have been formed in Durham, Raleigh, Roanoke Rapids, Rockingham, Rocky Mount, and Wilmington. Previously active Subdistrict Fellowships are Burlington, Goldsboro, and Greenville. New organizations will be completed where possible.

3. Adult methods courses were offered in twenty-one Christian Workers' Schools, enrolling 578 persons of whom 316 received Course Cards of Recognition. We urge the inclusion of a course in Adult Work, or Family Life, in every Christian Workers' School.

4. Bible Conferences were held in Goldsboro, Clinton, and Snow Hill Subdistricts, with total attendance of over 300. Dr. Clyde Manschreck of Duke was the lecturer in each conference. Bible Conferences have been planned for Elizabeth City, Siler City, Rockingham, and Jacksonville, November 24-December 6, 1957. Dr. W. A. Smart of Emory is to be the lecturer. We recommend a Subdistrict Bible Conference to be held at a six-month interval from the Christian Workers' School, wherever desired.

5. Family Life Institutes were held in Rocky Mount, Greenville, and Elizabeth City, with a total attendance of 282. Programs included addresses, movies, discussion groups, fellowship meals, and worship, were acknowledged to be excellent, but poorly attended.

6. One Social Action Seminar for pastors and teachers of adult classes was held, in the Burlington District, on the theme of Labor-Management Relations. Total attendance was 44. We urge the recognition by the conference, of our need to witness and educate our adults for full-time, full-life Christian living in society. We intend to cooperate to the fullest possible extent in this field with the Conference Boards of Social and Economic Relations, World Peace and Temperance. We recommend that where possible, meetings for creative contact be held on the interdenominational, inter-racial basis.

7. Adult Rallies were held at Middlesex, Warrenton, Fairmont, and Elizabethtown, with total attendance of 210. We recommend the inclusion of this project in the District or Subdistrict Christian Education Training Institutes.

8. Conference Family Camp was attended by only eight families. As an experiment, it proved the value of family camping, but also the desirability of sponsoring Family Camps on a District or smaller area basis. The goal is for District Family Camps in 1958, and eventually, family camping in many local churches. We recommend the continuance of the Conference Family Camp as a training agency.

9. The Durham District Older Adult Workshop was held at the Retirement Home with an attendance of 45. We do not recommend the repetition of this type of project until a deeper concern for the needs of older adults has been created.

10. One Recreation Laboratory School was held at Jarvis Memorial Church in Greenville, jointly sponsored by the youth and adult departments of the Board of Education, the North Carolina Recreation Commission and the North Carolina Recreation Society, Church Section. This was accounted very successful, and we recommend that the next Conference Recreation Laboratory be held in 1958-1959.

11. The Conference Older Adult Assembly had to be cancelled because of lack of registration. This also caused cancellation of a Training Conference in Older Adult Work, for District Directors.

12. The Conference Young Adult Workshop attendance was about average. Leadership was top-flight, and a fine experience was had by the delegates.

Additional Plans for 1957-1958

1. We call especial attention to the Third Adult Convocation at Lake Junaluska, August 2-5. Every adult class should send its teacher, president, pastor, or director of Christian education. Dr. Harold Bosley, Dr. Elton Trueblood, Dr. Leon Adkins, Bishop John Branscomb, and the Bishop's Players provide inspiration. Discussion groups on "My Church—A Redemptive Fellowship," skill groups, recreation groups, Bible study groups provide know-how in improving our local church adult program.

2. Mental Health Workshop—an optional program for a District or Subdistrict. Purpose—to create concern and spread information about Mental Health.

3. Young Adult Week—January 26-February 2, 1957. Requested and sponsored by the North Carolina Conference Young Adult Fellowship. A time for young adults to experience new leadership responsibilities, educate themselves, and serve in new ways. A time for the needs and potentialities of young adults to be lifted up before the churches of the Conference.

4. Follow-up of Christian Workers' School courses in Adult Work, by class reunion attended by instructor—for reporting on progress, experience in using new methods, etc.

5. Adult Convocation for North Carolina Conference, summer 1958, to include older adults and eliminate Older Adult Assembly.

6. Use of "A Guide to a Study of Adult Work in the Local Church" as a part of the Local Church Emphasis.

Quadrennial Goals

1. Create a consciousness of the unique importance of adults in the life of The Methodist Church, and of their need for continuing spiritual, mental and social growth.

2. Create an awareness of the Adult Division as a part of the local church organization, and stimulate the formation of Adult Councils in local churches.

3. Help to increase understanding and mutual appreciation between members of various economic, social, and racial groups both inside and outside the church.

4. Foster an increased knowledge of the Bible, and the desire to relate it to contemporary life.

5. Help local adult classes to become Redemptive Fellowships, to increase active participation by nominal church members, in the life of the church.

6. Improve teaching procedures so as to involve class members in learning situations and help each person to assume leadership.

7. Strengthen marital relationships and enrich family life.

Section E

CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

Report for 1956-57

The Quardrennium Committee on Christian Family Life has been duly set-up and organized with Jesse H. Lanning, Chairman; Mr. John Meares, Vice Chairman; Rev. Harold Minor, Secretary.

The committee is led to believe that some real progress has been made during this year. Some of the reasons for this belief are listed below.

1. We have been very fortunate in having Rev. Harold Minor as Adult Conference Director to lead in the Family Life program and in having the real interest and support of Dr. C. P. Morris, our Executive Secretary.

2. The over-all growing understanding, interest and participation show that some real progress is being made in Family Life Education. 3. Successful Family Life Institutes have been held in Rocky Mount, Greenville, and Elizabeth City.

4. A number of local churches have held special classes for young people on Preparation for Marriage and Family Living.

5. Several of our Ministers attended and shared in a Workshop on "Enriching Christian Marriage and Family Living" sponsored by the North Carolina Council of Churches held in Charlotte, April 23-24.

6. Family centered courses have been included in Christian Workers' Schools throughout the Conference.

7. A Family Camp was held at Camp Don-Lee, August 22-25. The response of those who shared in it pointed the way for another one to be held this coming, August 21-24.

It is Recommended for the Coming Year and Quadrennium that we:

1. Develop Parent Education and Church-Home Cooperation for more abundant living.

2. Make special effort to prepare our Youth for Marriage and Christian living.

3. Include course on Christian Family Living in the Christian Workers' Schools wherever possible.

4. Encourage use of National Family Week for special emphasis on Family Living.

5. Have a joint meeting this coming September of all of the Instructors in Family Life or related courses in all age areas of the Church work along with resource persons and potential instructors to discuss scope, content, materials and methods to help unify and enrich the work that is being done in our Conference.

6. Help provide in-service training in Pastoral Counseling, both premarital and postmarital. Specifically to conduct a Pastor's Seminar in 1957-58.

7. De-centralize Family Camping, with District Family Camps beginning in 1958.

8. Discover and develop resource leaders for Family Life education at all levels, local church, subdistrict, district and conference. Specifically, instructors for courses in Christian Workers' Schools, leaders for Family Camps, Family Life Institutes, etc.

9. Conduct Subdistrict Training Institutes for all division workers in the fall of 1958, possibly September, using the theme "Enriching Family Life" and publicizing the National Family Life Conference proposed for October 1958.

10. Publicize and secure as many of our ministers and laymen as possible to attend the Southeastern Jurisdictional Family Life Workshop at Lake Junaluska, July 11-14, 1957.

The statistics of the Divinity School for 1956-57 show a total of 278 students enrolled in the following categories: 235 candidates for the B. D. and M. R. E. degrees, 30 students enrolled in the Department of Religion of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences as candidates for the M.A. and Ph. D. degrees in Religion and 13 students enrolled for 1956 summer session only. Thirteen denominations are represented coming from 25 states and two foreign countries. Previous training was received by these students at 87 institutions. Sixty persons are candidates for the B.D. degree at the 1957 commencement and four are candidates for the M.R.E. degree. Seven are candidates for the Ph.D. degree in Religion and one for the M.A. degree in Religion.

In keeping with the general University policy of selective admissions, not all of those who apply for admission to the Divinity School can be accepted, but a comparison of our admission statistics with those of the other nine Methodist Theological Schools for the current year shows very little difference in the percenage of applicants not admitted to the Divinity School as compared with the other schools. We find that the caliber of the Divinity School students is constantly improving and their service in the Church vindicates our confidence.

By wise and generous provisions of the Duke Endowment, the Divinity School is able to make more generous provision for the assistance of its students than is found in any other American theological school. The current report on theological education made by the Survey Committee of the American Association of Theological School makes this statement: "The plan at Duke University which allows students a certain subsidy during the school year in exchange for summer service on the field is most unusual."

No theological school is stronger than the University in which it operates. Duke University is one of the 37 members of the Association of American Universties, is one of five universities in the South holding membership in this Association, is one of the two privately supported universities in this category, and is the only southern university holding close relationship with a church such as Duke holds to the Methodist Church.

Within the framework of Duke University the strength of the Divinity School Faculty is notable. Since 1950, nine members of the Divinity School Faculty have declined attractive offers to go to other institutions as against only two who have left Duke.

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The newest addition to the Divinity School Faculty is Dr. Hugh Anderson, of Glasgow, Scotland, who will join the Faculty in September, 1957, as Associate Professor of Biblical Theology. Dr. Anderson holds several degrees from Glasgow University and along with his pastorate of a strong congregation has been engaged in various forms of teaching at Glasgow for the past seven years.

A new venture in the Divinity School this summer will be a Clinic in Preaching conducted under the direction of Dr. James T. Cleland, Professor of Preaching and Dean of the Chapel. Dr. Cleland will be assisted by a strong group of lecturers. The Clinic will run from July 1 to 13 and promises to be increasingly significant in our work.

The Christian Convocation held June 4 to 7 offered one of the strongest programs in its history, featuring Bishop Gerald Kennedy as the James A. Gray Lecturer who spoke on the subject, "The Methodist Way of Life."

Some 200 approved pastors are expected at the school for such men to be held July 16 to August 9. A carefully selected and highly competent faculty of 12 instructors will feature this school with Dr. W. Arthur Kale as Director. The school is under the direction and support of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference and the Department of In-Service Training of the Methodist Board of Education. The Divinity School serves as host to the School and furnishes direction to the work. Increasing support has come this year from the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences in the form of grants-in-aid to the pastors enrolled.

The allocation of support to the Divinity School from the World Service Funds through the Board of Education of the Methodist Church has been increased by about 25% since the action of the 1956 General Conference. Also the support from the two North Carolina Conferences through the College Sustaining fund showed measurable increases during the 1956-57 conference year, and the schedule now in effect shows additional increases during the remainder of the present quadrennium.

3. Greensboro College

We are continuingly grateful for the support which the Methodists of North Carolina give to their institutions of higher learning. We look forward to the Quadrennial Emphasis upon Higher Education, during which the church and its colleges will have an unprecedented opportunity to work hand in hand toward common goals.

During the academic year 1956-57 the college has shown a marked increase in enrollment. Four hundred ninety-five students have registered for full and parttime courses. The addition of the Greensboro Building has permitted our resident population to increase by 96 persons and has given our dining service long-needed facilities.

Still ahead in terms of capital needs are the following: (1) a gymnasium, (2) a residence hall to accommodate 120 persons, (3) an additional \$2,000,000 for endowment, and (4) \$150,000 needed to bring existing structures to higher standards. The college is working toward additional operating funds from sources outside the church. In addition, however, we shall need at least \$125,000 per year in sustaining funds from the conferences to place our instruction on the highest quality basis.

The following statistics for the year 1956-57 are subject to correction when the outside audit is completed at the end of the fiscal year: officers and instructors, 55; students, 495; value of property, \$2,721,000; endowment \$1,000,000; endowment scholarship aid, \$2,100; work awards to students, \$17,500; other scholarships and grants, \$6,000; tuition reductions to ministers' children and to ministerial candidates, \$6,225.

The Board of Trustees requests the reappointment of Clark R. Cahow as Director of Public Relations.

Greensboro College is happy to have had, through the years, a close relationship with the Methodist Church. Over 80% of our students have been Methodist and many of them have gone directly into active professional and lay work in our church. We are frankly and avowedly a church-related college, endeavoring to fuse the best in education with the highest Christian ideals.

Our thanks for the support which the North Carolina Conference gives to Greensboro College!

4. High Point College

High Point College wishes to express its appreciation and gratitude for the interest in and appropriations toward the financial support of the College. Especial thanks are given for the College Sustaining Fund and the capital funds without which the College could not operate.

Student religious activities play an important part in the life of the College. Faculty leadership for these activities heads up in the Department of Religion and Philosophy. In the regular life of the College the Student Christian Association is responsible for morning devotionals, Wednesday evening prayer services, Sunday evening Vespers, Religious Emphasis Week, the support of two orphan children in Korea, and other campus-wide activities. The Methodist Student Fellowship, The Baptist Student Union, and the Presbyterian Westminster Fellowship are active as denominational groups. Kappa Chi Fraternity is composed of men who are preparing for the ministry, and Alpha Delta Theta Sorority is made up of young women who have an interest in religious work. The Fellowship Teams offer to all students who are interested an opportunity to participate in church activities, especially youth work. The teams work with local church groups in putting on the local groups' programs. After a period of careful training these teams go out into surrounding churches to lead in services, youth meetings, and planning sessions. Last summer nineteen students took part in special temporary summer activities. such as caravans, migrant work, rural work, and religious education positions in local churches.

The enrollment for the year ending May 26, 1957, was as follows: Regular Session 1009 different students; Summer School 586 different students, making a total of 1595. Between 80 and 90 pre-ministerial students and a similar number of young women preparing as Directors of Christian Education and other religious vocations have been enrolled this year. There were 72 faculty and staff members. We had 922 students enrolled during the Fall semester. For next year we will continue to hold the enrollment to approximately the same number of well-selected students of high quality. In view of the number of applications for admission High Point College could now have enrolled 1500 or 1600 qualified students if ample funds and facilities were available. The majority of entering freshmen in September, 1957, will come from the upper halves of their graduating classes.

In an operational budget of well over \$700,000 the College closed the year without a deficit. The value of equipment, buildings, and grounds increased more than \$168,000. The Endowment Fund increased more than \$28,000 during the year. There is no indebtedness.

High Point College is in desperate need of additional funds from the College Sustaining Fund of both conferences. Last year we received nearly \$52 per fulltime student from the N. C. Conference Sustaining Fund and \$63 (assuming that the usual check of approximately \$12,000 is received by the end of May) per full-time student from the Western N. C. Conference, or a total of \$155 from both conferences. Without knowing the exact corresponding figures for Louisburg, Greensboro, and Brevard Colleges, but knowing that they need all the funds they are receiving, I am sure the amount appropriated by the two conferences to each student at High Point College is not more than one-half or perhaps less, of the amount appropriated by the two conferences to each student at these other colleges.

Since High Point College has a larger number of commuting students, it has been claimed by some that High Point College does not need as large an appropriation per student as a college with few day students. This is entirely erroneous. It costs as much to teach a commuting student as it does a dormitory student. The accrediting agencies require the same amount to be spent on teaching a commuting student as a dormitory student.

At \$300 per student presently enrolled, which is the figure used in discussing the new colleges in the North Carolina Conference, High Point College should receive appropriations from the two conferences and from other sources of more than \$270,000 per year as compared with approximately \$143,000 of supplementary funds it is expecting to receive during the year. Obviously, its sustaining funds from the two conferences, the income from endowment, and supplementary funds from other sources should be doubled. Of this \$143,00 coming from the two conferences, from endowment income, and from other supplemental sources, approximately \$55,000 is expected from the Western N. C. Conference. A little more than \$44,000 has been received from the N. C. Conference during the College's fiscal year.

Just a word about our most immediate needs for the present enrollment, in addition to double the amount of operating funds from the College Sustaining Fund: (1) \$1,000,000 added to the endowment; (2) a new and adequate gymnasium, dining hall, kitchen, and additional class rooms, \$400,000; a separate building for an infirmary, \$60,000; (3) an adequate pipe organ for Memorial Auditorium and Chapel, \$40,000.

5. Louisburg College

Statistics. Total enrollment, 366; faculty and staff, 32; property evaluation, \$1,500,000; endowment, \$188,000; indebtedness, \$80,000.

Building projects. During the summer the Davis Building will be renovated at a cost of \$60,000, and construction on a student union-cafeteria building, to cost \$200,000, will be started. A loan of \$180,000 has been tentatively approved by the Housing and Home Finance Agency. With the \$50,000 on hand for the Davis Building and the government loan, an additional \$45,000 will be required to complete and furnish the two buildings.

Other building needs. Other buildings needed include a library building and a class-room auditorium building, both of which will cost around \$400,000. Improved infirmary and laundry facilities are also greatly needed.

Endowment needs. The college needs at least \$500,000 in additional endowment to increase faculty salaries and to provide scholarship aid to worthy students.

6. Methodist College

The complicated business of setting up a new college requires months of fact-finding, interviews, study, and planning. And these, mainly, have been the activities pursued by the Board of Trustees of Methodist College during an eleven months period of orientation to the important tasks ahead.

From these labors and deliberations, the blueprint-if not the picture-is beginning to emerge.

It is already clear that the following two objectives are basic in the board's thinking at the present time: (1) A liberal arts college to be established on the highest beginning standards of accreditation; and (2) The development of a building program that will follow a carefully devised "phased" growth pattern.

Many of the details associated with these prime objectives have been resolved thus permitting more rapid progress as time goes on.

During this first year, two significant dates will bear recording. The first, November 1, 1956, was when the board was granted the official charter proclaiming the birth of the institution. The second, February 21, 1957, was the occasion for dedication services at the 600-acre site acquired by the college. Bishop Paul N. Garber made the dedicatory address.

In addition, other important developments are expected momentarily—certainly before Annual Conference. These, the results of long and careful study and interviewing, will include the selection of a college president and the appointment of an architect to draft the building plans.

Within the next few weeks, too, the board will be presented with a master land use plan compiled by a graduate student in city and regional planning at the University of North Carolina. This study, projected over a 25-year period of phased-growth, promises to be highly informative and enlightening.

Looking hopefully toward September 1960 as the target date for admitting the first class of students at Methodist College, the board feels this goal can be met with the kind of financial support indicated from both churches in the Conference and citizens of the Fayetteville community.

In the first year our records show that contributors in Fayetteville have paid in cash, and the equivalent of cash, a total of almost \$300,000 in first year installments toward aggregate pledges in excess of \$1,750,000 over a five-year period. Local opinion is that pace of giving will pick up as events materialize.

The trustees have undertaken their assignments and responsibilities in a faithful, diligent, capable, and enthusiastic manner, and it is their cherished hope that these labors will ultimately bring forth the kind of institution which will be a source of great pride and satisfaction to their constituency upon whose help and prayers they will constantly rely for success in the venture.

7. North Carolina Wesleyan College

The Cooperative spirit among all the people of the Rocky Mount vicinity in connection with the establishment of North Carolina Wesleyan College provokes amazement. All individuals and groups stand ready at all time to assist with any matter that comes up.

The local pledges have been most carefully analyzed and validated with the result that \$2,069,594 has been determined as the verified amount, upon which daily collections are being realized.

The Rocky Mount Area Wesleyan College Foundation has been established by the citizens of Edgecombe and Nash Counties for the dual purpose of collecting these pledges and raising the continued annual support as agreed.

This fine cooperative effort also extends to each member of the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Wesleyan College. Considerable effort has produced much progress in the matter of preliminary study, looking towards the needs of the college. Several of the trustees have spent much time in visits to various schools and universities located in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky, and Virginia. Many architectural firms have been interviewed, and the Building Committee is prepared to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees in connection with this phase of our plans.

The people of this vicinity embrace North Carolina Wesleyan College with great devotion and intend to support it to the limit.

Amendments to Charter, N. C. Wesleyan College

Be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of Rocky Mount College, Inc., that said Charter of said Corporation as issued by the Secretary of State of North Carolina on the 25th day of October 1956, be amended to read as follows:

1. Be it resolved that Article I be stricken out and in lieu thereof the following inserted:

Name of this Corporation is North Carolina Wesleyan College.

2. Be it resolved that Article VI be amended as follows:

That the language appearing in Article VI as follows: "There shall be twentyfour (24) trustees," be stricken out and inserted in lieu thereof the following:

The trustees of said college shall not exceed more than twenty-four (24) in numbers.

Article VII to be amended to read as follows:

Upon the expiration of the term of office of each class, the Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, after consultation with the Board of Trustees, shall nominate their successors to serve for a period of four years or until their successors are elected, and submit the names of persons nominated to the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of said church for election or rejection.

The North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, shall have power, at any time, by a majority vote of its members to remove from office any trustee.

Should there exist a vacancy by death, resignation, or otherwise, of any trustee, the same shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner dscribed above for the election of trustees, provided persons so nominated by the Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, shall exercise all powers conferred under these articles of incorporation until they have been either elected or rejected by the said Conference of The Methodist Church.

All members of this Board of Trustees shall be at least twenty-one years of age. 8 Pfeiffer College

ANNUAL REPORT OF

INTER-CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON STUDENT RELIGIOUS WORK

The work of the Inter-Conference Commission is concerned with providing a program of student religious work for the 13,000 Methodists enrolled in our 58 colleges and 34 Schools of Nursing in North Carolina. At the present time, we have MSF groups or Wesley Foundations organized at 29 colleges and we cooperate in the inter-denominational programs being carried on at three of our Methodist colleges and the remaining 26 colleges. The increased interest that is being evidenced toward our State program of student religious work because of the Quadrennial Emphasis on Christian Higher Education encourages all of us. Our college officials look with favor on what the Methodist Church is attempting to do to give pastoral and educational services to our students. They only ask that we provide more of the same types of services so that we might reach many more of our Methodists enrolled in the several colleges in the state.

Financial assistance for student religious work is provided at the following colleges: University of North Carolina, Rev. Murry Unruh, Director; Duke University, Rev. Arthur Brandenburg, Director; Woman's College, U.N.C., Miss Mauriel Shipp, Director; Western Carolina, Rev. and Mrs. Milford Thumm, Codirectors; Appalachian State Teachers College, Rev. Bob Barefield, Director; Raleigh, Rev. Neal McGlammery, Director; East Carolina, Miss Mamiej Chandler, Director; Pembroke, Miss Alta Nye, Director; Catawba, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Hardesty, Directors; Wake Forest, Rev. Bob Younts, Director; and Davidson, Rev. Jerry Murray, Director. Only a small amount of financial assistance is provided at Davidson, Catawba, and Pembroke to assist in program planning. The State Director, Rev. J. Robert Regan, Jr., is employed on a half-time basis, al-though a full-time State Director will be employed next year.

The inter-collegiate program of the MSM attempts to provide a "beyond the local campus" expression for student leadership training and personal enrichment. During the year, we held a retreat for 40 local MSM presidents and advisors, a series of three District Conferences which involved 200 students and in March. the State Conference brought together 240 students at College Place Church and the Wesley Foundation in Greensboro. Also, in May a state recreation workshop was held to train 75 recreation leaders. Our work in the 34 Schools of Nursing is carried on jointly with the Baptist Student Union. We sponsor a Nurses' Retreat each June which attracts approximately 50 student leaders. North Carolina Methodists were also well represented at the other State, regional, and National Conferences such as the USCC Student Regional, the Junaluska Regional in June, the Inter-Collegiate School of Alcohol Studies, and the UN-Washington Seminar, to mention a few. Also, the MSM has been one of the main supporters of the State Ecumenical Movement which sponsored a conference in April involving all of the major denominational student movements. The State Director served as advisor for this group. Garland Young has served as president of the State MSM this year and Jim Thompson is incoming president.

The 13,000 Methodist Students enrolled in the colleges were divided as follows: 5,952 in State Institutions of higher learning; 3,275 in Methodist Colleges; and 2,767 in private or other denominational colleges with the remainder in the 34 schools of Nursing.

Notable projects of the MSM this year have been the publishing of a bimonthly page of MSM news in the North Carolina Christian Advocate, the raising of \$2500 for the Methodist Student Fellowship Fund, and the establishment of active Wesley Foundations at Wake Forest, A. & T. College in Greensboro and N. C. College in Durham.

During the remainder of the quadrennium, we look forward to a new vigor that is arising in our student religious program. We only hope that all of the needs that are envisioned may be met as we find more and more people becoming interested in Christian Higher Education. Our present accredited Wesley Foundations need more adequate financial help. Staffs need to be enlarged to take care of the doubling of our student population. New centers must be built at UNC, Appalachian, and Western Carolina, and the centers at Duke, N. C. State, ECC, and Wake Forest must be completely finished and equipped. Also, there is a need for part-time staff leadership at Guilford, Atlantic Christian, Elon, Catawba, and Lenoir Rhyne, and some financial help needs to be provided for several of the smaller colleges. The Inter-Conference Commission is approving the plan of the General Conference to seek to secure an average of 30 cents per member for student religious work. If this were accomplished, we would have \$120,000 for this work in North Carolina instead of the present \$35,000. In addition, the Commission is asking the two Conference Commissions on Higher Education to provide \$500,000 to build and equip new Wesley Foundations. We believe that both of these goals will be realized.

The work of the Inter-Conference Commission has a special interest in the Wesley Foundations and therefore we include the following reports from the Wesley Foundations and major MSF groups.

Appalachian

Out of a total enrolment of 1741, there were 445 Methodists enrolled at Appalachian. Of this number, approximately 225 have been vitally or casually reached by the Wesley Foundation in the various programs of worship, study, and fellowship. There is an intense need for facilities at Appalachian. A building lot is now being bought for the sum of \$7,500 and \$100,000 will be needed to build the building.

Woman's College

Six hundred and thirteen of 2500 students at WC are Methodists. Two hundred and fifty are members of the Wesley Foundation. Many others attend the services of the churches in Greensboro. The Woman's College Wesley Foundation has adquate facilities now in the educational building of College Place Church, but a much larger appropriation of funds is needed for maintenance of facilities.

Duke

There are 1100 under-graduate Methodists at Duke out of a total enrolment of 5000. The new Methodist Student Center is completed and will be ready for use in the Fall. Four hundred and eighty of the Mehodists are being reached by th Methodist Student Fellowship now. Others attend the Chapel services or downtown churches but do not become involved in the Methodist Student Fellowship. Rev. Arthur Brandenburg could use another part-time staff member and increased appropriations are needed for program and maintenance.

East Carolina

The College enrolment is 3693. Out of this number, 734 are Methodist. Two hundred and sixty-nine of these were involved at the Methodist Student Center with various activities. Others were worshippers in the churches in Greenville. Because of the consecrated work of the women of the North Carolina Conference and the help of the North Carolina Conference, a new \$100,000 student center will be completed during the coming year.

Western Carolina

Out of an enrolment of 1065, 266 are Methodist. One hundred and thirty-five became members of the Wesley Foundation. Plans for a new student center have been drawn for Western Carolina and can be built as soon as we raise \$50,000 for it.

Wake Forest

The new Wesley Foundation at Wake Forest College has gotten off to a good start. Two hundred and seventy-one of the 2000 students enrolled at Wake Forest were Methodist and 60 of these became members of the Wesley Foundation this year. With a full-time director there and new facilities, this Wesley Foundation tion will continue to make an impact on the campus.

University of North Carolina

With 1700 Methodists at U.N.C. out of an enrolment of approximately 6000 students, the Wesley Foundation has an unusual opportunity of reaching a vast amount of Methodist leadership. Crowded and inadequate facilities prevent us from doing the job that is needed. Four hundred and fifty Methodists are reached by Wesley and many more attend the church services at University Methodist Church but until we have more facilities and staff, the job is not going to be adequately done. We rejoice over the accomplishments of the Wesley Foundation at UNC working under the handicaps that are there. Special projects at UNC this year, in addition to Sunday morning and Sunday night programs and five-night a week Vesper services, have been Wesley Weekend, Drama, Choral and Folk-Dancing groups, deputations to other colleges and the direction of Christian Adventure Week for 80 intermediates at University Methodist Church. At least \$300,000 is needed for a new Center at UNC and an Associate Director is needed to assist in taking care of the expanding program and college enrolment.

N. C. State, Meredith, Peace, and Rex Hospital

Fifteen hundred and sixty-five Methodists out of 6378 enrolled at the four institutions served by the Raleigh Wesley Foundation come from dozens of Methodist churches from throughout the State. At present, 325 are active in the Wesley Foundation and many others attend the various churches in Raleigh. A new Center is under construction and will soon be ready for use. During the next few years, this figure of 1565 will be nearly doubled; therefore, to prepare for the influx, a much larger appropriation of funds is needed to employ an associate Director and provide funds for building maintenance and program.

Section A

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON CAMPS

This is the first year there has been a standing committee on camps but this committee has found that it will have a tremendous job to do for several years to come. With the development of a rapidly expanding camping program in our conference and the subsequent realization that we are in need of more camping facilities, the camping committee has attempted this first year to survey the situation for the future. Three years ago, we were able to carry out all our camping activities at Camp Don-Lee. However, last year, we had expanded until we were renting a total of nine weeks of camping at three different camp-sites in addition to using Camp Don-Lee to capacity. And still we are only beginning to meet the need of camping that is being demanded by the members of our conference.

To facilitate carrying out its functions, the camping committee set up three sub-committees which are as follows: the executive committee, a camp-site committee, and a program committee. The executive committee was given the task of recommending camping facilities needed, recommending ways and means of financing the development of these facilities, recommending a plan for receiving, holding, and distributng conference camp funds, recommending a plan for operating and maintaining conference camps, recommending policies relative to the use of camp facilities, and transacting all business committed to it by the committee on camps ad interim. The camp-site committee was given the task of recommending camp sites to be acquired. It is to develop a master plan for camp site development after analyzing program needs, studying camp standards, consulting a landscape architect and presenting tentative plans to the committee for approval. It is then to supervise camp construction. The functions of the program committee are to schedule camps and coordinate the conference camping program, determine philosophy and standards, plan and supervise a comprehensive camping program, develop a conference-wide training strategy for camp personnel, and arrange for financing the camping program.

Of considerable importance to the camping movement in our Conference was the completion of Camp Don-Lee, which was dedicated May 18, 1957. Especial words of praise must be bestowed upon T. J. Collier, C. P. Morris, L. R. Foreman, the Camp Director, all members of the Camp Don-Lee Trustees and others throughout the Conference who had a part in getting the camp completed.

The program committee set up the following summer program of camping to be carried out by the Conference Camping Director, the Conference Director of Youth Work, The Conference Director of Adult Work and nine District Junior Camp Directors: seven 1-week and two 10-day intermediate camps, an Older Youth Assembly, a Young Adult Assembly, a Family Camp and 9 District Junior Camps. All but the Junior Camps would be held at Camp Don-Lee. The Junior Camps were scheduled at Camp Caroline, Camp New Life and Camp Monroe. Words of praise need to be heaped upon all the volunteer leaders who gave freely of their time last year and who will give of their time this summer to make our camping program possible.

Members of the camp-site committee have spent considerable time looking over prospective campsites. It is contemplated that our Conference will need at least four and possibly five camps to take care of the camping program that is needed. The Rev. O. L. Hathaway, District Superintendent of the Fayetteville District, had led the laymen of the District in securing a 400 acre tract of land located 13 miles south of Fayetteville. The deed to this property has been secured and is being turned over to the Camp Committee for development. Mr. Hathaway and the Fayetteville District laymen are to be commended for this fine effort. The Director of Camping and Robert Reed are preparing a plan of development which can be used in beginning the development of the camp in the fall of 1957.

Also, the District Superintendents and lay leaders of the Durham and Burlington Districts are to be commended for their efforts to secure a large tract of land located near Hillsboro. It is expected that a site in this area may be secured and turned over to the camping committee for development during the new Conference year. Another site for camping is being secured on the Kerr Lake near Henderson by the Raleigh area churches. It is a very choice tract of land and holds promise for considerable use by church groups.

In making its request to the Conference Commission on World Service, a request was made for a full-time Director of Camping to replace the Rev. Robert Regan, Jr., who has served on a half-time basis. The World Service Commission did not approve this plan but did approve the idea of having a part-time care-taker at Camp Don-Lee and is designating part of the Conference Camp Building Funds for maintenance of Camp Don-Lee next year.

The Camping Committee hopes to appoint a camp-site development committee for the camp located near Fayetteville and begin work developing it just as soon as possible. Also, it is hoped that a site near Hillsboro can be secured and development begun on it during the coming Conference year. In the meantime, search will be begun in the Rocky Mount-Roanoke Rapids area for a possible campsite and in possibly one other area of the Conference.

It is believed by the members of the Camp Committee that camping offers the Church the greatest opportunity for leading children, young people, and adults in Christian growth it has had since Church School was added to the Church program. The Church and its leaders have the ideal background for getting the most out of camping situations, and camp is the ideal place for the Church to teach what it considers most important.

REPORT OF CAMP DON-LEE, INC.

This has been a historic year in the development of Camp Don-Lee. The year witnessed the completion of the building program and the formal dedication of the Camp by Bishop Paul N. Garber in exercises at the Camp on Saturday, May 18, 1957. This dedication symbolized the end of one era of camping and the beginning of a new with even greater opportunities for the boys and girls of the North Carolina Conference.

The building program completed during the year consisted of the following: a Staff Lodge with four large bedrooms, a fully equipped kitchen, lobby, screenedin porch, and two bathrooms. This building has been winterized, and together with the winterized Health Center, is capable of accommodating retreat groups of as many as thirty people the year around.

A Fellowship Lodge which will be the Camp Center is located next to the Phillips Memorial Swimming Pool. It contains a large assembly-recreation room with fireplace and altar which can be closed off, the camp director's office, a work room, the camp store, toilet facilities, and a wide screened-in porch on two sides with a second fireplace.

A very substantial pier has been erected near the center of the camp ground on the beautiful Neuse River. This pier is eight feet wide and extends four hundred feet into the river. It has a twenty-five foot square T at the end and a lower deck boat landing. This pier was built of creosote piling which was driven into the river bed, and cyprus lumber. Creosote cross beams, six by three inches, were bolted to the piling to support the runners and decking. It is believed that this pier will survive the severest hurricane.

The Phillips Memorial Swimming Pool pier has been completely rebuilt with treated lumber estimated to last at least twenty years. The original pier of painted pine lumber had rotted so that it was unsafe for use.

Repairs have been made on most of the camp buildings. The Grant Memorial Dining Hall has been painted inside and outside and Celotex ceiling placed overhead, making this a most attractive building. Repairs have been made on all the cabins. The buildings have been painted tan with a rustic brown trim. The road into the Camp and four parking lots have been graveled. A new gate consisting of large cypress logs placed in the ground in a vertical position and joined by chains has been erected at the camp entrance. The grove of pine, cedar, and locust trees has been thinned and cleared of all undergrowth.

Mr. T. J. Collier of Bayboro has been the overseer of all buildings at Camp Don-Lee. His personal supervision over the years without compensation has saved the Conference several thousand dollars, and has given the work a quality that can be measured only in spiritual terms.

A number of items of new equipment have been purchased, but none of these are prized more highly than the ice-maker which produces four-hundred pounds of cubed ice each day. Other new equipment includes furnishings for the new Staff Lodge and Fellowship Lodge, a rotary mower attached to the tractor, utensils for the kitchen, games equipment, etc. Some of these items were donated by individuals and local church and Sunday School groups.

The Dedication of the Camp on Saturday, May 18, 1957, featured an address by Bishop Paul N. Garber and music by the Greenville High School Band and a choral group from Greensboro College. Rev. Virgil E. Queen, pastor of Duke Memorial Methodist Church, Durham, N. C., and President of the Conference Board of Education, presided over the formal worship service of dedication. Words of greetings were given by Dr. A. J. Hobbs, District Superintendent of the New Bern District, and Rev. Robert Regan, Jr., Camp Director. Mr. Bill Price, Chairman of the Standing Committee on Camps of the Conference Board of Education, reported on progress made toward securing additional camp sites, including the 400-acre site near Raeford being donated by the laymen of the Fayetteville District. Rev. C. P. Morris, Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education and Business Manager of Camp Don-Lee, Inc., introduced special guests and presented a brief historical sketch of the camp. He also read a list of donors and announced certain memorials.

A Citation of Appreciation was presented to Mrs. Marie Grant of Rocky Mount in appreciation for the services rendered by her husband, Reverend Thomas McMillan Grant, D.D., Chairman of the Board of Camp Trustees from 1948 until his death in 1952, and in whose memory the Camp Dining Hall as been named The Grant Building.

A Citation of Appreciation was presented to Mrs. Mary Phillips of Durham in appreciation for the services of Reverend James G. Phillips, Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education from 1943 until his death in 1950, and in whose memory the Camp Swimming Pool has been named The Phillips Pool.

A Citation of Appreciation was presented to Mr. and Mrs. Don Elbert Lee of Arapahoe, N. C., for their gift of the beautiful fifty-acre camp site, and in whose honor the Camp has been named.

Mr. L. R. Foreman, President of the Board of Trustees of Camp Don-Lee, Inc., was the spokesman for the trustees in presenting the Camp to the North Carolina Conference and Bishop Paul N. Garber for dedication.

The program of the afternoon, following the barbecue lunch, included the inspection of the camp buildings and facilities, boating, fishing, swimming, horse shoes, volley ball, etc. All left the camp feeling that it was a good day and very proud of the fact that we have such a beautiful and well equipped camp.

The camping program for the past year was once again under the direction of Rev. Robert Regan, Jr. Under his leadership we have witnessed a phenomenal growth in our camping program. During the past year nine Christian Adventure Camps were held at Camp Don-Lee with more than 700 boys and girls in attendance. The camp will doubtless be filled to capacity again this summer. We commend Mr. Regan for his capable and energetic leadership.

It is our hope that we will be able to start camping at another conference camp site within the next year or so, and eventually we must have at least three conference camps.

Here is a brief historical sketch of Camp Don-Lee, presented at the Service of Dedication, May 18, 1957.

Historical Statement

By C. P. Morris

Camp Don-Lee began as a dream in the hearts and minds of the young people and their adult leaders of the North Carolina Conference. Rev. R. W. Bradshaw, Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, was one of the first persons to recognize the need for a Conference Youth Center. In 1944 Rev. J. G. Phillips became Executive Secretary and Rev. La Fon C. Vereen became Conference Director of Youth Work with special responsibility for intermediate camping. They helped inspire the Conference Board of Education to request permission at the 1945 Annual Conference to appeal to the churches of the Conference for a special Christmas offering to be used for securing and developing a camp site. That same year, Rev. A. J. Hobbs, President of the Conference Board of Education, appointed the following Committee on Camping: Rev. Allen P. Brantley, Rev. D. L. Fouts, Rev. T. J. Whitehead, and Mrs. L. R. Foreman. As advisers to this committee he appointed Rev. C. Freeman Heath, Rev. C. S. Hubbard, Mr. C. A. Dillon, Mr. B. M. Potter, and Mr. George Wallace.

Under the leadership of Mr. Phillips and Mr. Vereen a thorough search was made for a suitable camp site. On July 26, 1949, they submitted a report to the Committee on Camping in which they described four possible sites. The next day the Conference Board of Education adopted a resolution accepting with appreciation the gift of a beautiful fifty-acre tract of land in Pamlico County on the north shore of the Neuse River by Mr. Don Elbert Lee of Arapahoe, N. C., to the North Carolina Conference for use as a youth camp and summer assembly ground. This action was approved enthusiastically by the Annual Conference that fall.

Immediately following the Annual Conference Session in 1946, Rev. L. C. Vereen moved to Arapahoe, N. C., to direct the development of this camp site which was named Camp Don-Lee in honor of the donor.

The development of Camp Don-Lee continued to be financed by a Christmas

offering and special donations for several years. In 1948 each charge was given a quota and in 1952 it was changed to an apportionment.

Camp Don-Lee was incorporated in 1948 and the following persons were named by the Board of Education to serve as trustees of the corporation: Rev. T. McM. Grant, who was elected president; Mr. L. Roscoe Foreman, vice-president; Rev. J. G. Phillips, secretary; Mr. T. J. Collier, treasurer; Judge J. Paul Frizzelle; Rev. J. E. Garlingtin; Mr. J. H. Rose; Rev. F. D. Hedden; and Mr. F. L. Blount.

Rev. C. P. Morris became Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education following the death of Rev. J. G. Phillips in 1950 and succeeded him as secretary of the Board of Trustees of Camp Don-Lee, Inc. Rev. T. J. Whitehead succeeded Rev. T. McM. Grant on the Board of Trustees following the death of Mr. Grant in 1952. Mr. L. R. Foreman was then elected president and Mr. F. L. Blount, vice-president of the Board.

Each of these trustees has served on the Board in a most effective and faithful manner, but a special word of praise is due Mr. L. R. Foreman who has been a benefactor and servant of the camp in so many ways and Mr. T. J. Collier who has worked so unselfishly as treasurer and in recent years as builder.

In 1953 the Annual Conference, at the request of the Board of Education and the Board of Trustees of Camp Don-Lee, Inc., authorized the camp dining hall to be named "The Grant Building" in memory of the Reverend Thomas McMillan Grant, D.D., and the camp swimming pool to be named "The Phillips Pool" in memory of the Reverend James G. Phillips.

Rev. A. J. Hobbs, who gave such wise leadership to the Conference Board of Education in those pioneer years of our camping program, was succeeded as president of the board in 1948 by Rev. Allen P. Brantley, who played a leading role in getting the camp in operation for the 1952 summer camping program. His successors, Rev. Edgar B. Fisher and Rev. Vergil E. Queen, have likewise given wise leadership to our expanding camping program.

Rev. J. E. Garlington was made business manager of the camp following the death of Mr. Phillips, and personally supervised the construction of the dining hall. Rev. C. P. Morris succeeded Mr. Garlington as business manager in 1952 and has had the responsibility of supervising the development of the camp since that time.

The Conference Board of Education has continued to have the responsibility for conducting the camping program. This program was begun by Rev. L. C. Vereen in 1945. For a number of years intermediate camping was conducted on a district level. State-owned camps were leased for this purpose. Rev. J. E. Garlington, Rev. C. Freeman Heath, and Rev. C. P. Morris served as the first District Camp Directors. Rev. Peter Burks, a Duke University Divinity Student, served as Camp Director in 1952. Rev. J. Robert Regan, Jr., became Camp Director in 1953 and has directed the camping program since that time.

Under the leadership of Mr. Regan the camping program has grown by leaps and bounds. During the past year nine Christian Adventure Camps were held at Camp Don-Lee with more than 700 boys and girls in attendance and nine district Junior Camps were held in rented camps with more than 600 boys and girls in attendance. Approximately 200 volunteer adult counselors served in these camps.

We are now looking forward to the development of a second and third, and eventually a fourth Conference Camp to serve the boys and girls of the North Carolina Conference. Mr. Bill Price is chairman of the Committee on Camps which is giving guidance to this expanding program.

The development of Camp Don-Lee was a slow and laborious struggle, and

no one gave more in that struggle than the late Reverend James G. Phillips. All those mentioned in this historical sketch have also played significant roles. Still others known and unknown have had a part. Camp Don-Lee represents a labor of love on the part of many people. Some have labored with their hands to make this place a hallowed place. Others have given of their money. Still others have shared their talents with the boys and girls who come here summer after summer for adventure in Chrisian living and growth.

Camp Don-Lee, now completed, represents an investment of approximately \$150,000 and is valued even higher. But more important still, it represents an investment in boys and girls. It was Daniel Webster who said: "If we work upon marble it will perish. If we work upon brass, time will efface it. If we rear temples, they will crumble to dust. But if we work upon immortal souls, if we imbue them with principles, with the just fear of God and love of fellow men, we engrave on those tablets something that will brighten all eternity."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Your Board has worked for the first time this year with the services of a fulltime Conference Director. It has been a year of study, planning, and activity that we believe has brought worthwhile fruits and offers great hopes for steady growth. At its first meeting of the year the Board accepted the nine point program proposed by the Conference Director, as embracing both immediate action and longrange provision for the years ahead. We hold that Evangelism must permeate all our Church life if we are to play our part in winning the world to Christ. We feel that these nine points are fundamental to our spiritual life and imperative to our vitality as a Church:

1. PRAYER—An understanding of our dependence upon God and of the clear necessity of the place of prayer in the world of action. A development of our personal prayer life, of prayer groups, and of the devotional life of the Church.

2. A FUNCTIONING COMMISSION on Membership and Evangelism—in each Local Church—Organized by the Pastor, with help offered by the Board through District, Sub-District, and Local Church Workshops.

3. VISITATION EVANGELISM—Remembering our Lord's central emphasis on this plan as He sent The Seventy out two by two. A Fisherman's Club, or a similar group by any other name, promoted through Workshops as noted above, and by the Methodist Men's Clus.

4. YOUTH WITNESS MISSIONS in each Local Church—Promoted through Workshops as noted above, in cooperation with the Youth Division of our Conference Board of Education.

5. LAY PREACHING—To encourage and help train the great body of our laymen who, as Certified Lay Speakers of the Church, stand ready for this high service.

6. UNITED EVANGELISTIC MISSION—As early as possible, with definite plans for permanent carrying on of the phases of this great movement that should become a regular part of the Church's evangelistic life and service.

 ANNUAL PRAYER VIGIL for Evangelism and all the work of the Church—Varying in nature and time, as we feel led by the Holy Spirit, according to the situations and needs of each year. 8. THE 70-E PROGRAM OF EVANGELISM -- Especially for rural churches and in the summer time.

9. PASTORS RETREATS—To lift our own spiritual lives and make us more effective as Ministers of God, shepherds of His people, and workers with Christ for building His Kingdom among men.

We hope that we have made a genuine beginning this year toward the implementation of this program. We note especially the following activites:

Prayer Life: Accepting the call of our General Board of Evangelism to help make 1957 a great Year of Prayer throughout our Church, all nine of our districts united in a nine-week Prayer Vigil beginning on New Years Day and continuing through the first Sunday in March. We believe this has undergirded many of our churches, strengthened the ministry of many of our pastors, and blessed the lives of hundreds of our people.

Workshops have been held in every district for the members of the Local Church Commission on Membership and Evangelism. Some six hundred men and women have attended these training sessions for learning of their opportunities and responsibilities for Evangelism. Also, a Workshop on Evangelism was conducted at the Young Adult Assembly held at Camp Don-Lee the week-end of June 7-9.

Youth Mission: A Tri-District Christian Witness Mission for young people was conducted jointly by the Board of Education and the Board of Evangelism the week-end of March 29-31, with the Reverend Howard Ellis, National Youth Director of our General Board of Evangelism, leading. Nineteen teams of picked youth from the Burlington, Durham, and Fayetteville districts went out in the Cumberland Sub-District and won twenty-four young people to Christ. Our young people are the Church of tomorrow, and we want to make this program a part of the normal work of each local church.

Pastors Retreat: Our Pastors Retreat was held in Rocky Mount in March. with Dr. Thomas Carruth of our General Board leading, and with over a hundred of our ministers attending. This has been pronounced by those participating as an event of great worth, that should grow steadily with the years

Lay Preaching: The Board of Evangelism heartily commends the "No Silent Pulpit" program, especially for its evangelistic appeal, and wishes to offer its wholehearted cooperation to the Conference Board of Lay Activities in its Training Program for Lay Preachers.

Your Board has planned, in cooperation with the Commission on Town and Country Work, for a Conference-wide School of Evangelism and Week of Preaching, to be held at Louisburg College the first week in September, with Dr. Harry Denman of our General Board and other national leaders guiding us.

Revivals: We wish to commend the work of our pastors in giving of their time and energies in conducting evangelistic services in their own churches and in communities outside their own parishes. We also wish to express our appreciation to the churches that have allowed and encouraged their minister to hold revivals for other congregations.

Our District Secretaries have been unfailing in their cooperation and generous with their time and services in their respective districts. Bishop Garber and the District Superintendents have given us their full support and have been most helpful at all times. We are confident that our pastors and people are ready for a great and genuine advance in Evangelism.

Recommendations

1. That the essential objectives of the program as outlined above be earnestly

and continuously sought.

2. That our Conference cooperate with the General Board of Evangelism in carrying out its larger programs for the national Church.

3. That we participate in particular in the General Board's plans for a great Evangelistic Crusade in March, 1958, following the dates set forth for the whole Church. And that in our Conference this crusade be in the form of a Conferencewide United Evangelistic Mission, through the two weeks of March 2-16, under the guidance of the presiding Bishop and his Cabinet.

4. That the Conference approve an inter-board plan of help to the weaker churches as recently presented to Bishop Garber and the Cabinet and approved by them.

5. That we adopt a minimum goal of 5% net increase in Church membership during the next Conference year.

6. That an Evangelistic News Sheet or Bulletin be developed for the mspiration and guidance of the pastors and the chairmen of the Local Commissions on Membership and Evangelism.

7. That the Conference invite the Western North Carolina Conference to present with us a joint request to the Duke Divinity School as follows: That the Divinity School consider the need of the training, both theoretical and practical, of our ministerial students in Evangelism, having in mind the ultimate goal of establishing a Chair of Evangelism in the Divinity School.

8. That the Pastors Retreat for the new Conference Year be held at Louisburg College beginning Thursday, November 28, at 4:00 p.m., and closing on Saturday, November 30, at 1:00 p.m.

9. That the Conference recommend the renewal of the Reverend Tommy Tyson's appointment as a Conference Evangelist.

10. That we labor and pray for the strengthening of every part of the ministry of the Church, remembering that when one part of the body suffers the whole body suffers, and when one part is strengthened the whole body is strengthened.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

I

We recommend:

1. That 330,000 be appropriated by the Conference for the Golden Cross Fund, and that 60,000 be appropriated for the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.

2. That Mother's Day 1958 be used as a day for promoting our Retirement Home program with a special offering being taken on that day to go to the Retirement Home to be used for the benevolent work of the Home. This offering is in addition to the budget item. We further recommend and urge that the Retirement Home be given whole-hearted support in its expansion program.

3. Continued support of the work of a Chaplain at Duke Hospital. The Reverend Paul Wesley Aitken, a member of the North Carolina Conference, is now serving as Chaplain at Duke Hospital and The Keely Institute. The responsibility of his salary of \$5,000 is shared equally by the Golden Cross and The Keely Institute.

4. That all traveling preachers and approved supply pastors without hospital insurance give serious consideration to taking out group hospital insurance for themselves and their families through our Conference plan worked out with the Hospital Care Association, Inc., of Durham, N. C.

5. That Dr. Russell Dicks be re-elected as the Golden Cross Director of the North Carolina Conference, and that the district superintendents appoint a district director for each district.

The Board of Hospitals and Homes wishes to express its appreciation to The Reverend J. F. Coble, Superintendent of our Methodist Retirement Homes. Inc., and The Reverend R. L. Nicks, Superintendent of our Methodist Home for Children, for their fine work and for their whole-hearted cooperation with the Board.

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PROCEDURES AND RULES COVERING THE USE OF GOLDEN CROSS FUNDS

Authority for approval for Golden Cross service shall be vested in the hands of the District Golden Cross Committees, except as provided in item 1.

1. Approvals by District Golden Cross Committees shall be based upon evidence of extreme financial need and will be limited to ward cases only.

When circumstances warrant an exception to rules, the case may be presented by the District Committee to a special Board Committee composed of Dr. Howard P. Powell, 1543 Iredell Drive, Raleigh, N. C. and Dr. Russell L. Dicks, P. O. Box 4802, Duke Station, Durham, N. C.

2. Appropriate forms to aid the local pastor and the District Committee have been designed by the Board and should be used when processing Golden Cross cases. The local pastor should complete the form entitled "Application for Golden Cross Assistance" and send it to his District Director. If the District Committee approves the request it should complete the "Hospital Authorization" form and send it to the appropriate hospital. The secretaries of the District Committees will keep a supply of these forms on hand.

3. Initial approvals for Golden Cross service shall be limited to 14 days.

4. An additional 14 days may be granted by the District Committees but only in unusual cases. In not event may more than 28 days be approved for the same person within a 6-months period.

5. It is not contemplated that Golden Cross funds will be used for any purpose other than hospitalization.

6. Approvals shall not exceed \$14.00 per day for each authorized day actually spent in the hospital unless complete ward care, exclusive of special drugs and service above ordinary care, is provided for \$16 per day.

7. The Conference Treasurer has been instructed to make all payments directly to the hospital and not to an individual. In so far as possible, arrangements to secure Golden Cross aid should be accomplished before admission to a hospital. If this is not possible, authorizations for payments should be secured before the patient is discharged.

8. Golden Cross funds should not be called on for amounts less than \$14.00.
 9. Golden Cross aid is considered a donation, but if at any time the recipient wants to repay Golden Cross, he should be encouraged to do so.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

I

The first major project of the Board of Lay Activities this past Conference year was the Annual Layman's Retreat held at Duke University, August 25-26. The theme of the Retreat was "The Church and Higher Education." Bishop Garber, President J. Earl Moreland of Randolph Macon College, and President A. Hollis Edens of Duke University brought us highly informative and inspirational messages on the role of our Church to higher education. Attendance was the greatest that we have ever had with 500 of our laymen present. A new feature which met with much favor was meetings of the men by Districts for a discussion period with their respective District Superintendents and District Lay Leaders.

There was continued improvement towards our goal of 100% participation in Laymen's Day observed on October 21. More of our churches are observing it on the day set rather than at some other time during the year. This date is set by the National Council of Churches and is observed by all member denominations throughout the nation. October 20 has been set for Laymen's Day for this year.

In response to requests from Bishop Garber, the District Superintendents, and the Conference Board of Evangelism, we continued the No Silent Pulpit Program this year with 1.200 certified Lay Speakers filling pulpits so that no church in the Conference was without a worship service for the six weeks prior to Easter. Two Districts extended the time of the program to 12 weeks. The Raleigh District began their program 12 weeks before Easter and the Burlington District continued their program for 6 additional weeks following Easter.

As many of our Lay Speakers feel the need for instruction in lay speaking, there was held December 29-30 a Week-End Conference on Lay Speaking at Louisburg College with instruction on Methodist Beliefs, Planning and Conducting a Worship Service, and Fundamentals in Effective Lay Speaking. Dr. C. D. Barclift, Rev. J. W. Page, and Dr. C. W. Robbins led these courses and did magnificent jobs. Rev. Wade Goldston was the Director of the Conference. Because it was a new venture, the school was limited to the lay speakers from the Raleigh, Durham, and Rocky Mount Districts. There were 75 men in attendance. The New Bern District Board of Lay Activities also held an afternoon school for their Lay Speakers prior to their Lay Rally in February. It is the opinion of your Board that this program should be expanded and made available to all of our Lay Speakers throughout the Conference.

The Annual Laymen's Rallies were held again in February with a total attendance of about 5,000 laymen present. Of particular note was the fact that of 412 charges in the Conference, 405 were represented. Our theme of "Christian Higher Education" was most ably presented by President R. Wright Spears of Columbia College, S. C. and President B. Joseph Martin of Wesleyan College, Ga. Bishop Garber also was present at each rally and brought a message. As our Conference is leading Methodism in our establishment of two colleges, the General Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education sent its two Associate Directors, Dr. D. Holt and Dr. W. E. Clark, as representatives to the Rallies. The Rallies, begun several years ago by former Conference Lay Leader Jasper Smith, are unique in Methodism and much interest in them has been shown from all over the country. Our Board deeply appreciates the work of our Bishop, our District Superintendents, and our pastors in making these Rallies so successful. It is the purpose of the Rallies to help in the cultivation of the major emphasis of the Conference for the year.

Our fine progress in the organization of Methodist Men's Clubs continued this year with the chartering of 29 new clubs which makes now a total of 223 clubs in the Conference. This exceeds our goal set by the General Board of Lay Activities of 217 clubs by 1960. With proper organization and leadership, our clubs are proving of great benefit to the local churches and to the spiritual life of our laymen. Plans are being made for training conferences for the officers and leaders of clubs so that their work may be even more effective. It is our hope that every charge should have a club.

Aside from these particular things, your Board of Lay Activities has cooperated and assisted in the whole program of our Methodist Church as is our assigned task. Although the promotion of Stewardship is a major part of our task, we are charged with working under the leadership of the Bishop, the District Superintendents, and the pastors to carry out the total program of the Church. We pledge ourselves anew to the building and strengthening of God's Kingdom and offer our energies and talents to that end.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON LOCAL CHURCH EMPHASIS

The General Conference of the Methodist Church, 1956, approved the quadrennial program of Local Church Emphasis. This emphasis includes a study and analysis of each local church, the establishing of goals by each church and recommended an annual emphasis: 1—Christ and Ourselves; 2—Christ and our Resources; 3—Christ and our Mission; 4—Christ and our Freedom. In approaching this emphasis the General Conference has recognized the source of the strength of our church. Each local church is a link in the great chain of our connectional system. The strengthening of the links in this great chain will bring a new spiritual power and a greater contribution to the causes of our Christ and His work in our time.

The General Conference has made the resident bishop and his cabinet responsible for the implementation of the local church emphasis. Our committee met with the bishop and his cabinet, at which time all of our district superintendents reported on the progress of the first phase of the program, "Study and Analysis." Each district superintendent had distributed the commission kits to all pastors, also the self study guide toward a more effective church. These kits include five booklets designed to assist the local church commissions in their study and analysis. We urge all of our churches to continue these studies and that each local church establish goals in evangelism, Christian education, missions, stewardship and finance, and social concerns.

Under the leadership of Bishop Garber practically all of our churches distributed the booklet "Christ and Ourselves" to the members of their congregation as a personal Lenten reading project. The purpose of this emphasis is to deepen the quality of our Christian life. The wide distribution of this booklet has strengthened the spiritual life of all of our churches.

The emphasis for our next conference year is on "Christ and our Resources." Persistent attention is to be given to the following:

- (1) The systematic presentation of the life-work opportunity and challenge in church vocations at home and abroad, with prayerful cultivation of choice youth and young adults for such service.
- (2) The marshaling and training of volunteer manpower and womanpower for more adequate and effective lay leadership and lay participation in and through the local church.
- (3) The promotion in every local church of stewardship education and commitment, holding up the tithe as our minimum standard of giving.
- (4) The improving of the functioning of the Official Board, the commissions, the church school, and other basic organizations of the local church.
- (5) The encouraging of local churches to provide more adequate buildings and other facilities for Christian education, worship, and other essential ministries.
- (6) We recommend that charges where pastors receive a part of their support from the minimum salary fund work toward increasing their support of the pastor, in order that some of the funds now being used for minimum salary support may become available for other needs of our church.
- (7) We recommend that the district superintendent spend at least one day in each pastoral charge with the pastor and the leaders of his church in assisting in study and analysis and the setting of goals for the local church. We further recommend that in those churches where additional assistance is needed that the district staff be utilized in assisting the pastor in organization and training.

We endorse all goals set forth by our bishop for the quadrennium.

It is our concern that the winning of people to Christ and His church be the primary responsibility of each local church; that our goal be that each local church in our conference become a fruitful and thriving Christian fellowship.

We recommend that our Board of Evangelism assist pastors and commissions on membership and evangelism in our local churches that this may be realized.

We heartily commend the goal of having each local church offer one candidate for the ministry or some other field of Christian service.

We call attention to the goal of an average of \$1 per member for our educational institutions as set by the General Conference, with an additional 30ϕ per member for Wesley Foundations. We encourage the rapid achievement of this goal by our conference.

We also urge that each local church relate itself to a specific missionary activity through the adoption of one or more advance specials.

Special offerings as called for by our conference play a vital part in the development of an understanding of the broad task of the church and we encourag every church to receive every special offering.

This commission expresses its appreciation to Bishop Garber for the high caliber of his leadership in the area of local church emphasis and we offer him our enthusiastic support and service in achieving the goals which have been set for the quadrennium.

REPORT OF THE

CONFERENCE LONG-RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

Some individual and civic agencies in Durham, Raleigh, and Rocky Mount have indicated a desire for the headquarters and co-operation in attaining it.

Also, Long Range has been requested to give careful consideration to recommendations made in the report of the Town and Country Commission.

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We recommend:

1. The establishment of a Conference Headquarters to house the various Boards and Agencies of our Conference;

2. That the Long Range Planning Committee give study to the matter of purchasing or building such a Conference Headquarters Building and the location of the same;

3. That the Long Range Planning Committee make its recommendations to the forthcoming special session of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST FUND, INCORPORATED

Methodist Fund, Incorporated is operated as a mutual trust fund for investment of permanent funds and for the bentfit of the Agencies which participate. Expenses are held at a minimum and management is by a group of our own people with assistance of expert investment counsel.

After having been through some troubled waters in the financial seas, we are happy to report that the market for our securities has recovered so that as of May 8, 1957, when this is written, our Schedule of Investments shows a value of \$801,253.00 against a cost of \$800,031.50. We point out that these investments are earning at the rate of 4.75%. We anticipate that the earnings for the current fiscal year of the fund will be at the rate of 4.5% or better. The members of the Fund in a meeting on April 24, 1957 voted to pay a dividend of 4¢ per unit on invested funds and we ask Conference approval of this action. This is equivalent to 4% with the remainder of the earnings which will be shown in our audit report, to be re-invested. A detailed audit report for the year will be printed in the Journal.

A MOTION RELATING TO METHODIST FUND, INCORPORATED

Acting under and by virtue of authority conferred by the Certificate of Incorporation of Methodist Fund, Incorporated (#76304) under Article IX of said Certificate, the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church does hereby direct that the members of the Corporation shall be until and unless the North Carolina Annual Conference, (Southeastern Jurisdiction) of the Methodist Church otherwise directs:

(a) That person holding the office of Treasurer of the North Carolina Annual Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) of The Methodist Church;

(b) That person holding the office of President of the Commission on World Service and Finance of the North Carolina Annual Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) of The Methodist Church;

(c) Three members elected by the Commission on World Service and Finance of said North Carolina Annual Conference;

(d) One member elected by the Conference Board of Pensions of said North Carolina Conference;

(e) One member elected by the Board of Missions of said North Carolina Annual Conference;

(f) One member elected by the Board of Trustees of said North Carolina Annual Conference;

(g) One member elected by the Board of Education (said person to represent the interest of the several colleges) of the North Carolina Annual Conference;

(h) One member elected by the Board of Hospitals and Homes (said person to represent the interest of the several Homes) of the North Carolina Annual Conference;

The members elected by the various boards and commissions may or may not be members of such boards or commissions.

Other provisions of Article IX are quoted for information:

"Vacancies occurring in the membership shall be filled by the membership by majority vote.

"Membership shall expire as soon after the quadrennial meeting of said North Carolina Annual Conference as a successor has been elected, except members elected by the membership on the happening of a vacancy shall expire upon the election of a successor, which may be done at the next regular meeting of the Board of Commission charged with the election of such member.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN, INC.

I am grateful for the opportunity of serving you and the Home as your Superintendent. To me, the Home is one of the scenic spots in the State. For over fifty years, this Home for children has done an excellent job because of its leadership in administrators and dedicated men and women who have ably served on its Board of Trustees. Just recently a fine young lady from Durham came to visit us. She grew up and was reared here in the Home. She is proud of the Home, and is a credit to the work being done here.

The Conference year 1956-57 has been a busy year, with a large family of boys and girls. We now have 192 children in the Home.

We have been understaffed in three areas: in administration, in case work, and in religious and campus activities.

We have made some changes in staff personnel in the interest of the Home. There are other changes that we feel are needed, and that will be beneficial to the Home. We do have some fine persons on our staff, who are loyal and giving of themselves in behalf of our boys and girls.

As I meet from time to time some fine alumni who have made their places in society, I can see what an opportunity we have in opening some of the doors through which boys and girls can go in becoming Christian young men and women.

We are recommending an increase in house mothers' pay, based on quality of service rendered—the idea being that a good house mother is worth just as much as a good public school teacher.

The Executive Committee went on record, April 23, 1957, as requesting the Raleigh City School Board to accept the Seventh Grade at Hugh Morson Junior High School next year. Also to provide extra help at the noon hour in the dining hall, so that the girls will not have to work the two hours in connection with the noon meal.

We have had a very good year in our athletic program. Beginning with the fall term, our boys and girls will be able to participate in the athletic and extracurricular activities of the Junior and Senior High Schools af Raleigh, N. C.

This year our major repairs and remodeling were on the Atwater Dormitory for girls and the Dining Hall and Storage Room. This next year our main projects in repair and renovation work will be the Infirmary and the Heating Systems of several dormitories. There is a real need for a building for arts and crafts and recreation.

We are working on personnel policies, job analyses, code or rules of conduct for children, punishments for infraction of these rules, and an improved over-all program for our boys and girls. A real need exists in the direction of arts and crafts.

Our fiscal year for reporting to the North Carolina Methodist Conference

ends May 31, 1957, and our fiscal year coinciding with the Duke Endowment report ends September 30, 1957. We do not have a financial report as of this date for the Work Book of this Conference year, but the Financial Report will appear in the 1957 Journal of the North Carolina Conference.

I would like to thank the Trustees for their time and interest, and especially to Bishop Garber, Dr. Howard P. Powell, Chairman of the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes, the Study Committee, Miss Lena J. Martin, of the National Board of Hospitals and Homes, and the Executive Committee for the many hours of service given to the helpful care of our Home. With your patience and help, and Divine guidance, we are working toward a better type of care for our boys and girls.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES, INC.

I

The first unit of our Methodist Retirement Home in Durham was completed in late August, 1955, and it opened to receive members of the Home on September 1. These past 22 months have been eventful months and, but for the fact that everyone of the seven committees appointed to administer the affairs of the Home have done an outstanding job, all that has been accomplished would not have happened.

The two committees that have had to carry the biggest part of the burden are Admissions and Medical and Health. Under the leadership of Mr. J. W. Jenkins, Jr., chairman of the Admissions Committee, and Mrs. D. S. Coltrane, vice-chairman, this committee has done an outstanding piece of work for our conference. We have received hundreds of applications and we knew at all times that we could take care of only 40, and to select 40 meeting the conditions prescribed by the Board of Trustees was no easy task. The fact that we have been able to fill the Home completely with such a fine group as we now have in the Home has been nothing short of a miracle.

The Medical and Health Committee has likewise carried a great deal of responsibility because the health standpoint enters into the admission of anyone into the Home in a very vital way.

Of course, great credit goes to the Rev. J. F. Coble, Superintendent of the Home. He has been the nearest thing to perpetual motion during the past two years that I have seen or know anything about. Many months Brother Coble lived in the Home in order that he could be on day and night dutyin case of emergency. I do not know of anyone who has put in more hours of real hard work than has Brother Coble and the Conference owes him a debt of gratitude for the service which he has rendered.

In this annual report I do not want to dwell on what we have done, but rather on what we must do in the near future if our church is to meet its responsibility in providing a Christian home for those aging men and women of our Conference who find themselves in the sunset hours of their lives in need of such a home.

When we started work on the first unit we knew that a great deal of the cost would have to go in providing kitchen, dining room, recreation, and other necessary space to take care of a much larger group and that we would be able to care for only 40 people in the first unit. However, we were in hopes that we could within a short time make plans for an addition that would increase our capacity to 125 members of the Home, because only in this way can we operate efficiently and economically.

The time has arrived when something must be done because we already have a waiting list and there is never a week that passes that several applications are not received for admission to the Home.

On faith, the Board of Trustees authorized the employment of an architect and plans are now being drawn for the second unit, which will provide 87 additional beds.

The only way that this new addition can be built is for the individual members of our Conference to make special gifts to the Home in the form of memorials or outright gifts because the amount which we are receiving from the Conference is not sufficient to enable us to proceed immediately or anytime in the near future with the construction of the second unit. In the spirit of faith about ten years ago, the Conference accepted a beautiful site situated near Duke Hospital from a group of interested Durham citizens under the leadership of Mr. M. M. Fowler, who is now first vice-president of the Home.

In 1953, the Board of Trustees on faith recommended to the Conference that an executive secretary be employed to promote the best interest of the Home and supervise the construction of the first unit.

On faith, the contract was let on May 10, 1954, and the first section of the Home was completed in August, 1955. You can see that all the way through, from the beginning ten years ago to this very hour, that those connected in any way with the Home have been operating on faith and we are still doing that, believing with all of our hearts that the members of the North Carolina Conference will not let us down and that we can continue without any great delay in providing the necessary room to take care of those now needing such a Home as we are providing.

We are ever conscious of the fact that had it not been for the wonderful cooperative attitude of Bishop Garber and the members of his Cabinet, we never would have been able to accomplish all that we have, and we are ever conscious that we must continue to have this support if we are to make the Home a success.

I want to thank, personally, the members of the Board of Trustees and the chairmen of the various committees for the very fine way they have worked to help make the Home the institution that it is today, and on their behalf we want to thank the members of the North Carolina Conference who have contributed in any way to the support of the Home.

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The Methodist Retirement Home is now filled and has been for many months. In spite of this, applications continue to come in every week. Because of this need the Board of Trustees of the Home is venturing in faith with plans to begin an additional unit as soon as it can be financed, which will raise the capacity from 40 to 125 members. This can become a reality in the near future through the loyal support of the Methodists of our Conference.

The need is so universal that all nine districts of our Conference are now represented in the Home's membership, with a minimum of two. In our membership are 2 ministers, one with his wife, the widows of 7 of our ministers, and 2 ladies who are former housemothers at the Children's Home in Raleigh.

The members pay toward their keep whatever they are able to pay, so that while some are able to pay our sustaining rate of \$160 a month, others pay less. The fact that the average income per member is \$132 a month indicates the large amount of benevolent work that the Home is doing. Some are on a life contract with a guarantee of care for life, others are on a monthly boarding basis.

Need for the services offered by the Home and a life of service to the Church and community are the first requirements for admission into the Home. Every Home member has been outstanding in these respects. Though no one has been turned away solely for financial reasons, many have been denied entrance because of lack of room. Choices have been made on the basis of need for the Home and a record of service by the member.

With contentment, proper diet, and excellent medical attention, all of the Home members are in better health than when they entered the Home. The building and the daily schedule are so planned that there has not been a single accidental injury. We must recognize, however, that with members ranging from 65 to 90, with an average age of 79, illnesses will come.

Our members are offered something that cannot be purchased commercially. Along with room, board, and medical attention, go love and compassion that can only be given by the Christian church. Our day begins with a worship program before breakfast. The remainder of the day is so scheduled that there is a wholesomeness to life. Not only are years added to living, but living is added to years.

Our income is derived from the Home members, the apportionment in the budget of the churches, the Mother's Day offering, the furnishing of rooms as memorials, gifts, and through wills. First must come the expenses of the actual day by day keep of the members. Next must come the payments of interest and principal on our debt. Our goal is to be able to pay the interest and principal out of moneys coming through the church budgets and to apply all of the Mother's Day offering to supporting those who cannot pay their own way.

At the present time we owe \$180,000 on our building and grounds which are worth approximately \$500,000. Using the money coming through the church budget along with special gifts, we will be able to reduce our debt at the rate of \$50,000 a year, when the Mother's Day offering becomes large enough to carry the benevolent work of the Home.

The Durham unit of our Auxiliary has meant a great deal to the Home under the leadership of Mrs. H. C. Satterfield, Jr. As it begins its second year, with Mrs. Carl Bunting as President, plans are being made to expand the organization and work until it reaches the entire Conference. Through the Auxiliary those who are interested in the Home are given an opportunity to serve.

The Superintendent has presented the cause of the Home at every opportunity. He is available wherever the cause of the Home can be presented. He has known the thrill of seeing those who were alone and afraid find security and contentment. He has been greatly concerned that many equally in need have been turned away because there is no room.

The progress of any worthwhile cause advances in proportion to the loyalty and support given to it. No group has ever been more faithful than the Trustees of the Home under the excellent leadership of Mr. M. G. Mann, Chairman of the Board. That which they have accomplished has been made possible because of the leadership of Bishop Garber and his cabinet along with the support of the ministers and lay people of the Conference.

The sacrifices the churches and individuals have made to support the Home have touched the hearts of all of us as we have seen Christ's love and compassion put into practice.

A sense of urgency for the starting of our new building comes when one realizes that each year that construction is delayed, 85 people who desperately need a home will go without one, and that many of these will be our retired ministers and the widows of ministers. With the continued loyal support of the Methodists of our Conference this building will become a reality.

The finest opportunity that some Methodist family in North Carolina will ever have for memorializing their mother and father is available through a generous contribution for this new building and thereby obtaining the privilege of naming this new addition in honor of them.

Through the budget of our churches, a liberal Mother's Day offering, and gifts from interested persons, we can share with God and accept the challenge of Christ on the Cross, to look after His mother, by making available a Christian home for those who have given their lives in service to the church.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE METHODIST STUDENT CENTER Greenville, N. C.

The program of the Methodist Student Center has had as its primary purpose to give our Methodist students direction in the Christian Way, that they might know Jesus Christ as their Saviour and Lord, witness to their faith on the college campus, and dedicate themselves to the mission of the Church in the world. We have endeavored to reach all Methodist students at East Carolina College and bring them into active participation in the program of the Church.

The opportunity presented at East Carolina College and our privilege as members of The Methodist Church was given careful consideration at the Retreats for the Wesley Foundation Council, held in the spring and in the fall, and plans were made whereby the student leaders with the Counselor might assume their responsibility as Christian leaders on the campus and in the community.

At the suggestion of the students a Retreat for Students was led by the Rev. Henry Ruark second week of Fall Quarter. A series of programs on "Spiritual Growth Through Summer Service" was presented at Sunday Vespers by five students who gave service in Youth Caravans and Work Camp. Two Meditation groups have met weekly at 7:00 a.m. to undergird our program with prayer.

Both Methodist Churches in Greenville, Jarvis Memorial and St. James, cooperate in the program of the Methodist Student Center. The Secretaries of Student Work in the two Women's Societies of Christian Service, served a buffet supper and held Open House at the Student Center on the first Sunday evening in Fall Quarter, to which all Methodists on campus were invited. Invitations from both Churches were extended to the students and a cordial welcome given to them. The programs of both Churches were kept before the students throughout the year through posters, WESLEYJ-student bulletin-, a special folder given to each student, and announcements in the Student Classes in Sunday School, Vespers. and on the Central Bulletin Board. Students were encouraged to find a "Church home" in one of the Methodist Churches in Greenville and to attend regularly and participate in the program of the Church. Both Pastors manifest an interest in the students, visit the Center and give leadership in various services and programs. During LENT the Pastors spoke and led discussions on THE METHODIST CHURCH-History, Doctrines, Sacraments. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is administered by one of the Pastors at the Student Center Little Chapel every second Sunday in the month, at the Vesper Hour.

Vespers were held weekly at the Center by the students. Subject during LENT was "The Meaning of the Church for Students." The book by Bishop Harmon— "Understanding The Methodist Church" and other resource materials in the Center library were used by the students in preparation for these services. Alpha Zeta Chapter of Wesley Players has held meetings twice a month. Dramatic programs of Worship were presented at both Methodist Churches, for the Woman's Society at Jarvis Memorial by request, at Vespers at the Center. A Christmas program was given for the annual banquet of N. C. Highway Department in Greenville, for both Churches, and at College Chapel on campus. The major production was a three-act play, "THE BROTHER," which was presented six times: two performances at Jarvis Memorial Fellowship Hall; Queen Street Methodist Church, Kinston; York A.M.E. Church, Greenville; State MSM Conference, Greensboro; Wesley Foundation of State and Meredith Colleges, Raleigh. Programs have been given by students in Circles of the Woman's Society, Adult Classes, for Churches in the vicinity of Greenville, and at meetings of the Woman's Society in the Church in Goldsboro.

The Wesley Foundation cooperated with the Religious Program on the campus through representation on the Inter-Religious Council, participating in Religious Emphasis Week, and working with the Coordinator of Campus Religious Activities. Alpha Zeta Chapter of Wesley Players presented several programs through the Department of Radio and Television of the College: a series of Bible Readings during National Bible Week, readings from the Life of Christ in the Scriptures during LENT (The "Voice of Lent" program); two meditations in the daily evening radio programs in spring quarter which were under the sponsorship of the Inter-Religious Council.

The outreach of our program goes beyond the local Church and campus: Students and Counselor participated in the Methodist Student Movement on District, Conference, Regional and National level. Contributions were made through the MSFF; WSCF; MCOR; Fellow-College (Ewha Unv.); Cuba Work Camp; also to two Negro Colleges—A&T; and N. C. State at Durham. Contributions were made toward the expenses of a Negro student in Clark College, Atlanta—a girl whose family lives in Greenville, N. C.; through the College Classes in Jarvis Memorial and St. James Sunday Schools.

Ten students attended MSM Conference of District No. I at Chapel Hill, Dec. 2 and presented a Service of Worship; one student and the Counselor attended the Student Ecumenical Study Conference, Southeastern Region, Davidson College during Christmas Holidays; fourteen students and the Counselor attended the State MSM Conference in Greensboro in March and presented "THE BROTHER"; one student attended the Recreation Week-End at Camp Betty Hastings in the spring; one student and Counselor attended the MSM Regional Leadership Conference at Lake Junaluska in June—the Counselor was leader of a Bible Study Group and Representative of the Woman's Division.

Last summere eight of our students were in Summer Service: Two on Youth Caravans; one in Drama Caravan; one in Mexican Work Camp in Rio Grande Valley; one as Counselor in a Camp for underprivileged children—inter-racial and inter-faith, sponsored by Goodwill Industries; three as counselors at Camp Don Lee. The President of the WF worked in the Department of Public Relations at Scarritt College, Nashville, Tennessee. Two Junior girls attended the Scarritt House Party, sponsored by the Woman's Division of Christian Service, in October.

The enrollment at East Carolina College this past year was 3,693. Of this number approximately 800 were Methodist. The names and addresses of 734 were in our files. All these students were reached in some way through letters, invitations and announcements of Church services and opportunities offered through the Methodist Student Center. Approximately one-third responded in some way; and about one-fourth were active in the program. Attendance was excellent at Morning Worship in both Churches; and good at the Sunday School

Classes. Many students have visited the Student Center and found there a "Home away from home." 866 personal conferences have been held by the Counselor with students. Four students have obtained loans through the Methodist Student Loan Fund.

In January the program was moved into a rented house which has been adapted to our needs and will be used until the new building is completed. We are deeply thankful for the way in which God has led us through the past years and for His guidance in the plans for an enlarged program and a new building through which we may better serve our Methodists at East Carolina College. We pray that we may meet the opportunity and challenge through His grace.

REPORT OF THE MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

I

The program of Minimum Salary assistance in the North Carolina Conference has been widely recognized as one of the finest in Methodism. The newly established commission anticipates carrying on the work formerly managed by the Board of Missions in the same skillful manner. We extend our appreciation to the Board of Missions for the excellent progress made to date.

The principles governing the use of Minimum Salary have been brought up to date and a copy will be included as Report No. 2 of this commission. These rules will henceforth be applicable in each instance, and the work of this commission will be regulated by them.

We are happy to report that we are still moving forward in this program of ministerial supplement. For next year we recommend that the salary be supported at the following minimum levels:

\$3,000 for a single minister serving full time.

\$3,300 for a married minister serving full time.

\$3,700 for a married minister with dependent children serving full time.

For student pastors we recommend that the salary be supported at the following minimum levels:

\$1,800 for a single minister serving as a student pastor.

\$2,000 for a married minister serving as a student pastor.

- \$2,200 for a married minister, with one dependent child, serving as a student pastor.
- \$2,400 for a married minister, with two or more dependent children, serving as a student pastor.

In addition to this support for student pastors, their salary shall be increased by an allowance relative to the distance of their charge from the school they attend. When the charge is within 25 miles of the school, it shall be increased by \$100.00. When the charge is between 25 and 50 miles from the school, it shall be increased by \$200; when charge is beyond 50 miles and within 75 miles of the school, \$300; when charge is beyond 75 miles and within 100 miles of the school, \$400; and when the charge is beyond 100 miles, \$500 as a maximum increment.

Beyond this current plan, the preparatory work has been done to raise this figure for those ministers serving full time by approximately \$100 in each of the three basic categories during each of the three years until we reach a minimum salary support approximating \$4,000 for a married man with dependent children

serving full time during the year 1960. This at least shall be our goal for ministerial support in this conference.

In order to achieve this goal, we encourage the whole-hearted support of each pastoral charge now receiving minimum salary support to raise the level of ministerial support by the church, or churches, now served. As this support increases, more funds will be freed to raise the general level of salaries. Unless this general promotion is followed, the goal cannot be as readily reached as now planned.

We wish to commend the work of our District Superintendents who have assisted in making possible this advance. We encourage them to continue this progress which has meant so much to our entire conference. We earnestly expect that the principles shall be studied and followed carefully by each charge. Particular attention should be given to those portions which regulate the division of charges.

PRINCIPLES GOVERNING THE USE OF MINIMUM SALARY FUNDS

The commission recognizes the principle, that, with the aid of the pastor and the District Superintendent, it should so administer its affairs that each charge shall move as rapidly as possible to full self support.

To enable the Conference, the commission, and the superintendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned the following principles and procedures are set forth:

Aid to Charges

1. All requests for mission aid to charges on pastor's salary shall be presented to the Commission Secretary (Rev. Thomas A. Collins, 920 Lake Boone Trail, Raleigh, North Carolina) by the District Superintendent before June 1, of each Conference year. Requests submitted later will not give the Commission time to make the needed study and adjustments. Therefore, requests submitted later than June 1 will not be considered.

2. Mission Aid and Minimum Salary aid provided by the Conference shall not be used to raise the salary above the minimum set by the Conference, except in the establishment of new church extension projects.

3. The family or marital status of the pastor at the time of assignment to the charge shall govern the amount paid the minister for the entire conference year.

4. Mission funds, or Minimum Salary funds, shall not be used to increase a retired minister's total income beyond \$3,800.00. By total income is meant retirement annuity, the salary paid by the charge, and mission or minimum salary allowances.

5. Owing to the pressure upon Minimum Salary funds we emphasize the necessity of staying within minimum salary when requesting funds for ministerial support.

6. In considering the salary for a charge, we call attention to the fact that the Commission on Minimum Salary must count both salary, travel, and expenses as salary in making appropriations to the charge.

Dividing Charges

7. The Commission on Minimum Salary and the Cabinet, in considering aid

when a charge is to be divided are bound by the action of the Annual Conference in session at Burlington, North Carolina, October 1952, as recorded in the Conference Journal, pages 148 and 149.

a. There should be a conference-wide policy and strategy, adopted by the Bishop and his cabinet after careful study for the division of circuits and the formation of new charges.

b. A process of education, spiritual, psychological and financial, should precede the division of circuits. This is important if a new charge is to understand and accept intelligently the adjustments and the larger responsibility involved in the new status. Frequently the charge is impressed only with the privileges of its proposed new status, but the responsibilities are equally as real.

c. The churches forming a new charge should be, when possible, a sociological and geographical unit. Such factors as marketing centers, school districts, and county lines should be taken into account and given due consideration.

d. Generally speaking, small town and open country churches, even though having as many as 200-300 members, should be encouraged to become two point charges rather than one point stations.

l' This is fairer to the many churches which are still on four-fivesix point charges.

2' It is a wiser use of our ministers, as few small town and open country churches will need, accept, or demand a preaching schedule and the other programs of activity which justify the full services of a full time minister.

e. Divisions of circuits should be on the basis of mutual agreement by all the churches on the circuit rather than simply from the desire of the larger church to withdraw for its own benefit and advancement.

f. If a new charge is to be served by a student pastor, that fact should be given the charge before it agrees to its new status.

g. The Disciplinary provision for equity in the existing parsonage, the location of the new parsonage, and other forces should be fully discussed and agreed upon by the charge involved prior to the division.

h. The following fundamental and basic questions should be discussed and clearly understood by the churches contemplating the formation of a new charge:

1' Is there a real need for this new charge, or is the desire for its creation prompted primarily from a spirit of keeping up, or surpassing another denomination?

2' What are the prospects for numerical growth in the new charge? Is this estimate of growth based on a religious census or on a guess?

3' Can the new charge become self-supporting within a reasonable length of time? Will it now assume, or assume within a reasonable period of time, a budget that will provide not only for the pastor's support, but also for the support of Methodism's connectional causes, including World Service?

4' Does the new charge have a suitable parsonage for the minister, or will it provide one before a minister is appointed to it?

8. When the division of a charge is considered necessary and minimum salary, or mission aid, is to be requested for either of the new charges resulting from such division, such project shall be presented to the secretary of the Commission on Minimum Salary on or before June 1st, so that a thorough

study of the proposed division can be made. This study shall be made in cooperation with the District Superintendent, the Commission on Minimum Salary, and a representative from each of the proposed new charges. Without such study the Commission shall not be obligated to provide aid for either of the charges resulting from such division.

9. The Commission will not approve the division of a charge except and unless each new charge resulting from the division shall provide 80% of the minimum salary for the pastor to be assigned to said charge.

a. Beginning with the conference year 1955-56, where circuits are divided, any churches involved in the division that must receive minimum salary may, upon the consent of the district superintendent, pay their proportionate share of the former items based on pastoral support, plus an additional 20% of this amount. This shall be increased by at least 20% of the original base annually until they achieve the then current base of established charges, in a period not to exceed four years.

To Avoid Crippling Charges

10. In the division of circuits where one church seeks to become a station, the Commission on Minimum Salary looks with disfavor upon such division unless the station established can care for its salary and its proportionate share of the World Service and Benevolences, and that the remainder of the charge can be provided with ministerial leadership and adjusted and arranged so that it has opportunity to grow to self-support.

Reduction of Aid

11. The Commission on Minimum Salary further requires that each charge which has received, or shall hereafter receive, sustentation or Minimum Salary aid shall have this aid reduced by 25% each year until the charge has accepted full self support. The district superintendents are to inform all charges receiving or to receive aid in the future, of this regulation. This requirement must be kept in mind in preparing for any requests following 1954.

a. When a charge is established as a student appointment and desires to be served by a full time minister, this change may take place at such time as the charge shall pay 80% of the amount needed to provide such full-time ministerial support.

A New Church As A Charge

12. When a new church is to be established and become a new charge, the district superintendent shall present for study the complete details of the proposed project on or before June 1st. These details shall be presented to the General Board of Missions, the Conference Board of Missions, and to the Commission on Minimum Salary. All shall carefully evaluate the project, and if it seems worthy and a timely project, the Boards shall see that an adequate salary and living quarters are provided for the minister and the essential steps taken to provide a place to meet and worship. It shall be understood that each year the new charge shall accept more of the budget till it becomes self-supporting. We recommend that each new church shall become self-supporting in a period of five years or less.

Student Pastor Aid

13. The following was set up as a basis for aiding students when they are assigned charges where mission aid, or salary supplement is required. Mission aid, or minimum salary aid, can be used to provide a salary of \$1,800 for a single minister, and for a married student pastor, \$2,000. A \$200 allowance will be granted for one dependent child in the family and \$400 will be granted for more than one dependent child. In addition, there is to be a travel allowance as follows:

when the charge is within 25 miles of the school attended, \$100; when the charge is beyond 25 miles and within 50 miles of the school, \$200; when the charge is beyond 50 miles and within 75 miles of the school, \$300; when the charge is beyond 75 miles and within 100 miles of the school, \$400; and when the charge is beyond 100 miles, \$500.

"Louisburg Student" amendment to this paragraph

An approved supply pastor who is serving an appointment, who has less than two years college work to his credit, and who wishes to continue his education, shall be considered a special case. Each case will be handled on its own merits. The District Superintendent shall present these special cases to the Commission on Minimum Salary. When these cases have been approved by the Commission, sustentation aid may be granted, not to exceed the regular minimum salary scale, rather than according to the student pastor's scale. These special cases shall be presented to the Commission on Minimum Salary by the District Superintendent in ample time for action before the students' matriculation in school.

Beginning with the Conference year 1957-58, the only students who shall qualify under this rule must attend Louisburg College. However when any hardships occur due to unusual distance to travel, special consideration may be given to attend another school after the Superintendent has conferred with the Commission on Minimum Salary. Those now attending another college and previously approved under this provision, may complete their two years of work at the school in which they are presently enrolled. If a change is to take place in their college, they must complete their work at Louisburg College.

It is further decreed that such a student may be approved for a maximum of three conference years to complete the two years of academic work at Louisburg College. This should be enough to encourage completion of their work.

All Applications for Aid

14. In making application for aid, each charge shall report accurately all amounts paid by the charge or by individuals of the charge as salary, travel expenses or bonuses. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient cause to reject the application or discontinue payments if such failure is discovered after approval of applications.

15. These amounts fixed as the minimum salary allowances in all categories listed shall apply to all ministers serving charges provided each one is a conference member or an approved supply. If one shall not be an approved supply, he shall be considered as a special case, and the minimum salary rules do not of necessity apply. After consultation before such an appointment, such a minister may be approved for the appropriate minimum salary sum if in the judgment of the Commission on Minimum Salary it is a meritorious and necessary appointment.

16. The current minimum salary scale for full time ministers will be \$3,000.00 for single ministers, \$3,300.00 for married ministers without dependent children; and \$3,700.00 for married ministers with dependent children serving full time.

a. This shall be the minimum salary scale provided the charge follows the principles governing the use of Minimum Salary Funds.

These provisions are herein set forth to aid the district superintendents, the Conference Board of Missions, and the Minimum Salary Commission in making adequate distribution of funds, to stimulate and encourage churches to give needed help to ministers assigned to opportunity charges, and to enlist churches and pastors in sharing in the obligation to care for our rapidly growing population.

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RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTION NO. 1: Concerning Approved Supply Pastors and Local Preachers Whereas numerous complaints have reached the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification concerning the training of some men who have been recommended by the North Carolina Annual Conference and sent to minister to Methodist congregations:

Whereas (in spite of our knowledge that some unlettered men have wrought wonders for the Kingdom of God); yet, in a day of advancing education and training we are acutely aware of the intellectual and emotional needs of the Methodist minister.

We, therefore, present this resolution setting forth what we consider to be some minimum requirements:

First, we recommend that ordinarily no person be given an Approved Supply status who is over forty years of age;

Second, we recommend that no man without a High School diploma, or its equivalent, be recommended for Approved Supply status;

Third, we suggest to District Committees on Ministerial Qualification that no person wthout a High School diploma be given local preacher's license.

RESOLUTION NO. 2: Concerning The On Trial Status Of The Traveling Ministry

A person on trial may be discontinued without any reflection on his character." (Bold face not in the Discipline).

Therefore, we resolve that it be recognized that the provision of the above paragraph has been and will continue to be in effect within the North Carolina Conference.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

I

The two primary emphases of the Board of Missions this year have been those which we believe to be basic to the growth and development of our Church in its Christian outreach, namely, World Missions, and Church Extension.

We are aware how easy it is to see so urgently our needs at home that we lose sight of our total task. We dare not forget the imperative of the Christian message, that we "Go into all the world!" For this reason we have sought to promote the cause of World Missions as we have increased substantially our World Service giving, and have added to our Mission Special services.

We encourage each church to use the brochure prepared for our Conference this year in the promotion of Mission Specials. We shall seek to secure in each local Church a mission special for our Conference program of Advance, for the World Mission causes, and for the new Alaska College.

To further the Missionary emphases of the Conference, we propose and plan to conduct Missionary Seminars in each district the first two weeks of January, 1958. We encourage support for these district institutes, and we commend the study book to be used next year, as promoted by the Church. We wish to commend our Conference Missionary Secretary, Rev. M. W. Lawrence, for the fine work he is doing in this promotion, plus the fine work of the District Missionary Secretaries; Rev. Robert Wallace, Rev. Kenneth Sexton, Rev. Fred Duplissey, Rev. C. G. McCarver, Rev. L. C. Vereen, Rev. R. L. Crossno, Rev. J. W. Lineberger, Rev. R. L. Jerome, and Rev. J. T. Maides. We are much encouraged by the way many of our people are getting up and putting into operation the Commission on Missions in the local church. This commission is of such vital importance in informing the people, planning the annual school of missions, promoting World Service and the benevolent program of the church, securing missionary specials, circulating the WORLD OUTLOOK, and recruiting full-time Christian workers, that each such commission must function. We encourage the pastor to secure from the District Missionary Secretary the new prepared filmstrip showing the work of this commission, and show it before his local church commission, or his entire church membership.

The attendance at the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference was excellent last year. All of our District Missionary Secretaries and most of our executive officers were in attendance for planning the year's work. Our district youth delegates also attended and were benefited by this sharing. Delegates will again be sent and we trust the pastors will assist as we secure the best youth available to share in this fine Conference.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is doing an excellent work in this field and we commend them to each pastor and charge. We urge this cooperation to the end that a Woman's Society be established in each local church in the Conference.

For eight years our conference has sponsored a Caravan to Europe to further co-operation and understanding among our Methodist friends. This work has made possible a growing and virile church in Austria. This year, Rev. and Mrs. Thomas A. Collins are leading the European Caravan. At this time they are in Europe working with our Methodist Churches and youth groups in Switzerland, Austria, Italy, Germany, and England. We commend this fine program and recommend that it be continued.

The emphasis on Church Extension during the past quadrennium has aroused the conference to the necessity of making this a continuous part of our mission in doing the work of our Lord. The continued and expanding growth of our state has called for careful planning to achieve a sustaining program of Church Extension to keep pace with our growing responsibility. To this end we are seeking to establish approximately one new Methodist Church per month as we continue into a new quadrennium. Though this is not the primary emphasis of our conference this quadrennium, we know it must continue to have major support.

To this end we wish to thank the many faithful ministers and laymen who have made our Ten Dollar Club the finest in Methodism. This has provided the incentive to establish the forty-one new Methodist Churches last quadrennium, and the eight new Churches organized this year. These include: St. Matthew— Fayetteville; Faymont—Fayetteville, Grace—Rockingham, Salemburg, Nags Head Mission, St. Mark—Raleigh, Oleander—Wilmington, and Yaupon Village Methodist Churches. In addition there are eight more which will begin with an appointment at or about Annual Conference time.

Church Extension is also promoted as large circuits are divided to provide better ministerial leadership for each resultant charge. This necessitates new parsonages to make these charges as strong as possible. During this year, the Board of Missions has assisted in the construction of 24 new parsonages. Eight of these parsonages were for new churches and the remainder for established charges or newly divided charges. More than \$23,000 has been contributed to make these new homes possible.

Twenty-three churches have been assisted by the Board of Missions in building programs this conference year, in addition to gifts from the Ten Dollar Club. Some have added Church School facilities, enlarged present plants, or begun new buildings. More than \$35,000 has been donated to make possible this expansion that our established churches may better serve their community and their membership.

We urge our pastors to support and expand the Ten Dollar Club in their local churches. The membership may be expanded through the agency of a Ten Dollar Club committee on the Commission on Missions. Classes, Circles, Men's Groups, as well as individual members of the churches can be won to the support of this thrilling venture if we but share the 'good news' and offer them the opportunity to share in this program.

During this year a filmed "Story of Church Extension" has been prepared by our Executive Secretary, Rev. Thomas A. Collins, and is available to any church or church group wishing to use it. This is a series of color slides with a prepared script for easy presentation. Those who have seen it find it an amazing and thrilling narration. This film is available through our District Missionary Secretaries, our Executive Secretary, or our Conference film library. We believe it should be shown one or more times in each church in our conference during the new year.

To further the promotion of the Ten Dollar Club, we have named Sunday, January 19, 1958 as Church Extension Sunday. We would solicit the earnest support of each pastor in the conference to promote membership in, and knowledge of, the Ten Dollar Club on this date.

Our Conference has attained an enviable position among the conferences of American Methodism in the amount of mission specials. We must maintain and increase the number and amount of these specials. The Board of Missions approves as Mission specials the following: All new Methodist Churches organized since 1952, including the parsonages of these churches, the purchase of a site for a proposed church, the Ten Dollar Club, tuition scholarships for Directors of Christian Education, The Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College, The Alaska Methodist College, The Bethany Mission of the Shiloh Charge, Rocky Mount District, the work of our Missionaries in other lands, the Caravan Methodist Church, Linz, Austria, the work of Methodism in the European Area, the Lands of Decision (Belgian Congo, Bolivia, Korea, and Sarawak in Borneo), Soo Chow University in Hong Kong, Sunset Park Methodist Church, the foreign student aid fund to assist these students to study in Methodist Colleges in North (Carolina, Wesley Foundation, N. C. College, John Wesley Methodist Church (C.J.), Fayetteville, and Galhlee Methodist Church (C.J.)

Last year we attained our quadrennial goal for Minimum Salary to our Pastors, as custodians of the Minimum Salary Fund. We brought the salary to a maximum of \$3,600. We transferred to the newly organized Commission on Minimum Salary a healthy balance and a well-defined program for administering these funds. We commend the new Commission on the fine beginning they have made this year, and we encourage the support the conference should give to this program. Our Minimum Salary program is the best in Methodism, and we know this position will continue to improve.

The conference elected the following as members of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastor's School at Duke University, from the Board of Missions: Rev. S. J. Starnes and Rev. A. S. Parker, terms to expire in 1961, Mrs. J. H. Cutchin and Rev. L. C. Vereen, terms to expire in 1959, and Rev. T. M. Vick and Rev. J. W. Lineberger, terms to expire in 1957. For the term to expire 1963, we nominate G. P. Hood and J. W. Lineberger.

We wish to express the gratitude of the Board of Missions, and the North Carolina Annual Conference to the Duke Endowment for its long and valuable aid given to the Board of Missions, to the work of church extension in our conference, and to the assistance given through minimum salary supplement. Its directors have cooperated in every way possible in the efficient administration of the important work of our conference, through the work of Dr. A. J. Walton and others.

WHEREAS it is desirable to further integrate the work of Church Extension by the transfer of the North Carolina Conference Board loan funds to the Division of National Missions of The Board of Missions of The Methodist Church; and said Corporation and the Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, are agreeable thereto;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the North Carolina Annual Conference that the Board of Church Extension of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, is hereby authorized to transfer the North Carolina Conference Board Ioan funds amounting to \$28,883.12 in the Regular Loan Fund and \$5,300.00 in the Revolving Loan Fund, as of April 17, 1957 to the Division of National Missions of the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church, a Corporation of the State of New York, and to assign to said Division the mortgages representing outstanding Ioans.

Said Division of National Missions will continue to administer the conference loan fund as heretofore in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline.

As this grows, our ability to grow as a conference is increased. We solicit the cooperation of the conference to the end that this agency of service be supported.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

(Board of Managers)

The 1957 session of the Pastors' School and Christian Convocation was held on the West Campus of Duke University, Durham, during the period June 4 7, 1957.

An outstanding program was arranged by the Board of Managers, featuring Bishop Gerald Kennedy, Bishop Nolan B. Harmon, Dr. David A. MacLennan, Dr. Eugene L. Smith, and Dr. W. McFerrin Stowe. Other leaders were Dr. Russell Dicks, Mrs. W. R. Reed, and Miss Clarice Bowman.

Bishop Kennedy delivered the James A. Gray Lectures on the subject "The Methodist Way of Life." Bishop Harmon gave the morning meditations and was in charge of the Convocation Communion Service on the opening night. Dr. David A. MacLennan, who is pastor of the Brick Presbyterian Church, Rochester,

New York, spoke each evening in Duke Chapel on the theme "Respectable Sins." Dr. MacLennan also directed the seminar on preaching.

Dr. Smith's lectures were on the subject "The Christian Mission and the Making of History." Dr. Stowe's theme was "Parish Administration." All lectures were delivered in Page Auditorium.

The afternoons were spent in seminars in the following areas: (1) Pastoral Counseling (Advanced), led by Dr. Russell Dicks of the Duke Divinity School faculty; (2) The Vacation Church School, led by Mrs. W. R. Reed of the Staff of the Board of Education of the Western North Carolina Conference; (3) Youth Work, led by Miss Clarice Bowman of the faculty of High Point College; (4) Preaching, led by Dr. David A. MacLennan.

Advance preparations were handled by the Board of Managers, Wilson O. Weldon, Chairman, and the Convocation Committee of the Duke Divinity School, Dean James Cannon, Chairman. Helpful assistance was provided by J. Richard Spann, Director of the Department of In-Service Training of the General Board of Education.

During the School the annual luncheon of the Duke Divinity School Alumni Association was held, with Dr. W. McFerrin Stowe as the speaker. Reverend Warren Peteway, President of the Association, was the toastmaster.

During the School Dean James Cannon announced that the James A. Gray Lectures for 1958 will be delivered by Dr. John Marsh, Principal, Mansfield College, Oxford, England.

THE COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

1. The Gospel of Christ. The Gospel of Christ specifically teaches that men are brothers and that they should live together in peace. Any idea contradictory to this teaching is an affront to the Gospel and to the Prince of Peace. We, therefore, again affirm our faith in Christ and His Gospel and believe profoundly that only through His way can peace be achieved.

We are grateful to our ministers and laymen for their efforts to understand the critical racial and ideological differences that exist in the world today. We urge all of our people to continue to strive to achieve peace in the nation and everywhere on Christian principles. The Church must always take the initiative and seek to lay the foundation in all human relations.

2. International Relations. We do not believe that war is inevitable, nor do we believe that war ever settles the differences that separate nations. We condemn aggression and the use of armed forces as a means of settling the disputes that arise among the nations of the world. We call upon the Christian people of the world to use Christian imagination, Christian faith, and Christian courage to find an alternative to military conflict.

We believe that the crisis in the Middle East should be thoroughly debated in the General Assembly and the Security Council of the United Nations and that the recommendations of this body should be publicized in every nation of the world.

We believe that continued efforts should be made by the Government of the United States through the United Nations and apart from the United Nations to strengthen friendly relationships between this nation, on the one hand, and Russia and China on the other hand. We urge that proper diplomatic relations be established and maintained as a means toward lessening tensions created by the "cold war." Somehow, we must learn to live with people whose ideological views and system of government do not conform to our own.

3. The Cultural Advance. We believe that the best of art, music, and literature produced by any nation should be shared with other nations. We believe that technological skills and scientific discoveries that lift mankind should become the common knowledge of the human family. We urgently recommend that teachers, artists, and musicians, and Christian leaders be exchanged with similar people from other nations. We particularly urge that there be a steady flow of students from other nations into our colleges and universities and that thousands of our choice young people be sent to the colleges and universities of other nations for study and sharing. We want especially to commend the European Youth Caravan sponsored by the North Carolina Conference Board of Missions and Board of building understanding and good will between our nation and the countries of Europe.

We recommend that our nation through its State Department make increased efforts to open the avenues of travel that responsible citizens from this nation may visit other nations and that responsible citizens of other nations be permitted to visit our country. We strongly urge that as many opportunities as possible be given for people of our country to become acquainted with the people of other lands.

4. The A-bomb and the H-bomb. We call upon the United States through the United Nations to redouble its efforts to find an agreement with other nations to the end that the A-bomb and the H-bomb and other supersonic weapons be banned from use. We call attention to the terrible fact that man now possesses the technological know-how to destroy all organized human existence on earth. We call upon all Christians at home and abroad to pray and to work to the end that peace may yet come out of our tangled human relations and that the forces of destruction may be turned to creative purposes to lift the human family to higher economical, educational, moral, and spiritual levels. The Gospel of Christ, passionately believed in and sacrificially shared with all mankind, is mankind's final hope. The issue before us is clear—it is Christ or chaos; it is life or death; it is the beloved community or a snarling, tormentous hell.

The board recommends that the honorarium of the secretary remain at \$300.00 plus expense account.

We continue to urge that the conference think toward a plan whereby the ministers may participate in the conference annuity plan.

We wish to thank those ministers who have called attention to and assisted in correcting and establishing their proper years of service. We are very anxious that every minister be credited with all service years to which he is entitled.

We recommend that the years of service of the following men be corrected and that the correction be shown in the chronological roll of preachers in the journal: Add one year each to W. B. Cotton, H. B. Lewis, and E. R. Clegg. Credit Byron S. Shankle and R. L. Hethcox with one additional approved supply year each. Correct the record of approved supply years of D. E. Earnhardt to read one year instead of three. Except for R. L. Hethcox, this was approved last year but was not recorded in the journal.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

The 1956 General Conference took the following action concerning the Annual Conference Commission on Promotion and Cultivation: "In each Annual Conference there shall be constituted a Conference Commission on Promotion and Cultivation to promote the program of World Service and other benevolent causes in the pastoral charges of the Conference, in co-operation with the Central Promotional Office of the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation." (Discipline, 1956, Par. 755.1)

The General Conference further provided for the membership in (Par. 755.2), which has been set up and organized by Bishop Paul N. Garber. The legislation for the budget is as follows: "The budget for the Commission shall be provided by the Conference through its Commission on World Service and Finance." (Par. 755.3) The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance has made a recommendation for the budget for this year and the year following to help in extending the influence of Christ and His Church.

The Commission works, "in co-operation with the Central Promotion Office of the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation." Likewise the Commission co-operates with other Conference Agencies. The Bishop and his cabinet are members of the Conference Commission. No program for reaching pastoral charges for the promotion of World Services and other benevolent causes could succeed without their active co-operation.

The Conference Commission on Promotion and Cultivation has responsibility for the Conference-wide promotion of the greatest benevolence program ever undertaken by the Methodist Church. This program includes the financial cultivation of World Service, Advance Specials, Week of Dedication, Fellowship of Suffering and Service, the Television Ministry, Special Days, the Quadrennial Program for Educational Institutions, and the Interdenominational fund. Last year The Methodist Church gave more than 28 million dollars for these causes. The General Conference has set the goal of 38½ million dollars annually during this quadrenium. This represents a sum equal to \$4.11 per member per year. While this may not look large, it will require a great deal of co-operation, work, and prayer to reach our goal.

The Central Office of Promotion has made possible literature, such as, "General Benevolence Program of The Methodist Church," "Here are the Answers," and "World Service Agencies of The Methodist Church." These have been sent to every pastor in the Church. In addition to the printed work, films, and sound filmstrips are available for your use in the program of promotion and cultivation in the local church.

We wish to help every agency of The Methodist Church in cultivating the people called Methodist for the fulfilment of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus. We desire to keep the aims and achievements of the Methodist Church before the people through all the available channels of communications. We believe that we have a Christ to serve, a great and growing Church to promote, and a larger number of people every year to cultivate for the building of the Kingdom of God. To these great purposes we give ourselves to the task at hand and look to God for direction and strength to do His Work.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

In spite of rising costs of labor and materials, we are happy to report that the ADVOCATE has had a good year. Subscriptions have increased and the circulation is at an all-time high of more than 32,000.

Because of the fact that the Every-family Plan has proved so popular, subscription revenue has not kept pace with the increase in costs, and it has been necessary to raise the price of these subscriptions from \$1.50 to \$2.00, which is still slightly below cost. We believe, however, that the saving of fifty cents on a subscription will still be attractive enough to insure the success of the Everyfamily Plan and warrant its continuance.

We would emphasize the fact that this magazine is the only Conference Organ in the Church which is not subsidized in any way by the sponsoring organization. The Advocate asks nothing of North Carolina Methodism except co-operation in securing subscriptions and printing business. The loss in subscription revenue must be taken care of by the profits of the printing plant. The Piedmont Press, which, for many years, has served the churches and institutions of the state.

During the past year, it has become increasingly difficult to meet the rising cost of material and labor, and we must have more printing business, if we are to continue to support the Conference Organ. Therefore, we ask that all church institutions give their printing orders to the Piedmont Press.

During the past year, the Advocate has given free space to the various agencies, which, if charged at regular advertising rates, would have cost at least \$50,000.

We recommend that each district assume a subscription quota equal to ten per cent of the membership and that November be set as **Advocate** month in the North Carolina Conference.

REPORT OF THE

BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

The Board of Social and Economic Relations is the youngest of the Conference Boards. It has been necessary for the members of our Board to give careful study to the problems with which every Christian should be concerned in his social relations. We have found that the areas of economics, race relations, social welfare, and community and political life require much more consideration than most church members have given to them.

In order that there shall be a deepening of the sense of social responsibility on the part of our people in the North Carolina Annual Conference, we recommend the following three point program:

- That our pastors be urged to give more study to the social teachings of the Christian Gospel and seek to interpret these to their congregations through study groups and sermons.
- 2. That The Board of Social and Economic Relations and The Board of Education be granted the privilege of cooperating in planning for educational seminars and leadership education courses on social action on a subdistrict and district basis.
- 3. That the Board of Temperance, The Board of World Peace, and the Board of Social and Economic Relations be permitted to plan for a cooperative program of social action for the entire North Carolina Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE

TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

The Methodist Church took a tremendous forward step in the use of mass communications when the 1956 General Conference adopted legislation requiring a Conference Television, Radio and Film Commission in every Annual Conference. However, it is to be noted with interest that during the quadrennium just past the North Carolina Conference was one of approximately fifty conferences which had an organization TRAFCO under permissive legislation. The new legislation wisely makes the Conference TRAFCO a co-ordinating and service agency for the television, radio and audio-visual interests of the various Conference program agencies, and auxiliary to the general TRAFCO.

Certain general goals are ours for this quadrennium:

- To help broaden the Church's use of every means of communication, including television, radio, and audio-visual media, in extending the ministry of the Church.
- 2. To develop responsible leadership in these fields, and thereby help meet the opportunities created by modern methods of communication.
- To develop a closer tie between the Church and the television and radio industry by more effective programming including special events, and news.
- 4. To extend the use of audio-visual materials within the ongoing program of the many churches of this Conference, and to provide more training through workshops and in other ways for a more effective utilization of the many audio-visual aids.

During the past year the Filmstrip Library has been expanded to the point where it is now able to meet the demand for filmstrip rentals more adequately. The Library now contains more than 180 different titles. More than 800 requests for rentals were honored during the past year. All agencies of the Conference are encouraged to place with this service any promotional, educational, or inspirational filmstrips and motion picture film that should be made freely available to the Conference. Churches are encouraged to make maximum use of this service.

The Filmstrip Library was organized on a low budget, low rental basis as a service to all Conference agencies. The Commission wishes to take this opportunity to commend the Reverend W. Carl Walton, Jr. for his intelligent leadership, and for the sacrifice of the time and energy required to shepherd the Filmstrip Library from its infancy to its present state of maturity. He has been most capably assisted in this pioneer service by Mrs. Helen Lewis, the distributional secretary for the Library. They have given much study and time to this project and its success may be largely credited to them.

The Commission is grateful to the Conference for its response to the request that a special offering be received in behalf of the work of this Commission, including the Televison Ministry. Such response has enabled the Commission to keep faith with the work of the General Commission.

As the television industry expands, so also does the responsibility of the Methodist Church for religious programming on television. In order to meet our expanding responsibility in all areas of mass communication it will be necessary to promote more diligently the interests of the Television, Radio and Film Commission. The Commission encourages every pastor to write into the local church budget an item for the Methodist TV Ministry equal to 10ϕ per member, or to take a special offering with 10ϕ per member as the goal. We recommend that Sunday, January 12, 1958 be designated as Methodist TV Ministry Sunday, and that on that Sunday a special offering be received for the work of the Commission. We also recommend that the week of January 6-12 be designated as Radio and Television Appreciation Week.

The Commission encourages pastors and all interested persons to promote and use the Methodist TV series THE WAY. The pastors have received from the General Commission notices of the schedule on which stations are presenting THE WAY. We suggest that the series has not been supported by the Methodists of our Conference as much as the excellence of the series indicates that it should be supported. Churches may now rent most of the series from the Publishing House for use in the local church programming.

The Commission recommends that A TRAFCO representative be named in each local church as the coordinator for the Commission. We recognize that this person may profitably be a member of the Commission on Education. When elected or appointed please send the name and address to the Reverend W. Carl Walton, Jr., Chairman, in order that promotional materials may be distributed at the appropriate times.

It is proposed that sometime during the next Conference year workshops on the use of audio-visuals will be offered. The workshops will be so located and scheduled as that there may be a maximum attendance of clergymen, TRAFCO Coordinators, and other interested laymen at them. Details will be released at a later date.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

An unlettered man said that he wasn't afraid of what the ghosts would do to him, but what he was afraid of was what the ghosts made him do to himself. We are deeply concerned with what the alarming use of alcohol is making people do to themselves in this modern world.

With some 65 million drinkers, alcohol is a devastating problem in the nation. It's killer #1 on the highway; a serious health menace; a major factor in the breakdown of the home; a basic cause of crime; a heavy drain on our economic life. Whether drink is a disease or a symptom, the consequence is the same in individual and social life.

Four areas are included in the study and solution of the problem of alcoholism. (1) Education. Since the advocates and drink dealers are alert day and night, and are spending more than 200 million dollars annually in unsleeping efforts to sell their product by all modern media, it's high time that we learn the truth about alcohol.

Colorfully portrayed in leading magazines are "the Men of Distinction" who drink certain brands of liquor, but "not a word" is said about the alcoholics or men of extinction, who are bumbing around on the bottom of a pitiful existence. Nor are there any implications of the ravages of alcohol on persons, property, and people in human society.

But "the devil in drink is what alcohol does to a man's behavior." Drinking often produces grotesque and gruesome effects, turning a man into a stumbling, stupid distortion of himself.

What are the facts? Studies and schools on alcohol, streams of new books are pouring from the press, new films are being shown, which should shed much light on what alcohol does to the human body and behavior. The public schools, together with church groups, should make use of the wide-spread and dependable knowledge that is available.

(2) Legislation. We feel that legislation has its place in shutting off some of the over-flow spigots, and lessening the volume of alcohol consumption. Attempts at legislation, however, must be supported by an aroused people, who will rise up in the magnitude of their might and demand that something effective be done in lawmaking and enforcement to curtail the flow of alcoholic beverages. The law must have the undergirding of education, moral suasion, and honest effort at enforcement.

What can legislation do? Cut down the traffic in drink by local option; improve and put teeth in laws regulating the sale of alcoholic beverages; reduce the liquor outlets; take out the profit motive in the operation of the multi-billion dollar industry; and abolish high-pressure advertisement.

Our Board is cooperating with the Allied Church League, under the able leadership of R. M. Haus and W. T. Biggerstaff, in the above areas.

(3) Commitment. The battle of the bottle has to begin with the individual. The controlling of self is a greater triumph than the taking of a city, said Paul. The Christian way is that of disciplined living and since many are allergic to alcohol, the only safe course is that of total abstinence.

The misleading liquor and ABC store propaganda and educational programs is the word MODERATION. As one legislative committeemen said: "Fermentation has always been with us, and men have always indulged their thirst for drink." True, but he continued: "So the only sensible thing to do is to restrain and control their craving for the bottle." Certainly we want to keep its use down to a minimum, but is that what the liquor salesmen want to do?

The simple answer to the moderationists is that a little drinking is a dangerous thing. All alcoholics began as occasional or moderate drinkers. Moreover, moderate indulgence has its ill effects on the human body and behavior, and most highway accidents are caused by drinking drivers rather than drunken drivers.

Commitment Day should be effectively observed. Its results will be determined largely by preparation, a strong program, and follow up. The decision for a life of total abstinence has exerted far-reaching consequences in shaping the destiny of many people.

(4) Rehabilitation. Since we have millions of problem drinkers in our country, who are in trouble themselves and are causing trouble to others, the church has a responsibility to this army of alcoholics. These people need understanding, compassion, and help. Not only are they sick, but they are the products of a sick society. Why and how did they get that way?

We urge our pastors and temperance leaders to cooperate with Alcoholics

Anonymous, which is doing an outstanding work throughout our Conference. We wish to commend the work of Haslin Simon, who has projected a stimulating A. A. program in the Raleigh area, and the Good Shepherd movement by Edward Dunn near Wilmington.

A study of their "twelve steps" will be rewarding in discovering their approach and methods. The resources of religion are available to help the problem drinker. The A. A. members agree to "turn our will and our lives over to the care of God..." We can also do counselling to help the heavy, weary drinker.

We recommend: (1) That Workshops on Alcohol Education be held in each district in our Conference. Dr. Caradine R. Hooten, of our General Board, and Dr. R. L. Dicks of Duke University, have committed themselves to lead our institutes March 3-7, 1958.

(2) We also urge that Workshops be conducted on a sub-district and charge level.

(3) We support legislation affecting the advertisement of alcoholic beverages.

WHEREAS: Millions of parents in this country do not consider the consumption of alcoholic beverages to be a part of the Christian or American way of life, and desire the opportunity to raise their children free from the influence of the "legalized" liquor traffic; and

WHEREAS: Alcohol is recognized as a depressant, narcotic drug, the sale of which is forbidden to minors by law; and

WHEREAS: Those who promote and sell alcoholic beverages are using every advertising device available through newspapers, magazines, radio, television and other media to indoctrinate the nation's children in the use of a product which they cannot legally purchase; and

WHEREAS: Appeals to advertisers and media representatives have failed to result in the establishment of a system of reasonable controls regulating such advertising: Now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the N. C. Annual Conference of The Methodist Church assembled at New Bern, That the Congress of the United States is hereby respectfully requested that legislation now before it, specifically, Langer S. 582, Siler H.R. 4835, which would ban the interstate transportation of alcoholic beverage advertising material; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this memorial be transmitted to the President and to the Vice President of the United States, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives of said Congress, and to each Senator and Representative from our area in the Congress of the United States.

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RESOLVED: That we commend the Rev. Gerald C. Primm, and the News and Observer for exposing the close tie-up and scandal of the liquor legislature group, and condemn efforts to influence our representatives by the distribution of free liquor.

RESOLVED: That we urge our voters to remember that disgraceful affair in choosing our candidates for the next election, and that only men of high integrity, who seek to do the will and to promote the highest welfare of the people be sent to our General Assembly.

(1) We recommend that District Directors be made ex-officio members of the Board of Temperance and that District Superintendents be asked to appoint as District Directors persons who are not always on the Conference Board of Temperance.

REPORT OF THE

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

I

Church Extension

Research reveals that the North Carolina Conference is the rural opportunity Conference in the Southeastern Jurisdiction in terms of population resources.

A study of population trends in the Southeast shows that in the North Carolina Conference area the population pattern of the future will be characterized by decentralization to an extent not equaled by another Annual Conference area in the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

The rural population in the North Carolina Conference area is shifting and growing. In the census decade of 1940-50, the white rural-nonfarm population in the Conference area increased 56.1%, and remarkable growth continues.

There are 816 churches in the Conference (**Journal**, 1956). Of these 565 are in population centers of 500 and less, of which 207 are in numerical decline in various degrees. Many of the declining churches are in the danger zone as to closing.

There are 103 one-room churches in the Conference, and many more which are near one-room.

Therefore it is important that a comprehensive rural church extension program be devised and developed. To this end the Board of Missions, the Commission on World Service and Finance, and other concerned Annual Conference agencies and agents are requested to give proper and prompt attention to the following rural church extension needs:

1. Organize at least 50 new churches in the rural areas by the end of the present quadrennium, and as many more in the next quadrennium. Many of these new churches, where close enough together, could be started as two-point charges, and many could be grouped with churches involved in circuit divisions.

Attention is hereby called to the provisions of **Discipline**, 1956, pars. 1303, 793, and 362(15c).

2. Conduct a Conference-wide survey to discover the interrelation of rural new church extension and logical circuit divisions, and provide the Bishop and Cabinet with this information.

3. Conduct a Conference-wide survey to discover all rural churches which should be moved to the highways and paved county roads, and in this interest properly institute cultivation procedures with the churches concerned.

4. Discover all closed churches, and institute appropriate action in each case.

5. Adopt a policy and program for adequate physical improvement of the numerous one-room churches.

6. Adopt a program for proper physical improvement of churches of more than one room, but having an insufficient number of class rooms.

7. Adopt a program for expansion of rural church facilities to include fellowship hall annexes, that each rural church may be the spiritual and social center of the neighborhood.

8. Adopt a program of rural parsonage improvement, that each charge may have a modern type new parsonage, or a properly remodeled parsonage.

9. Adopt policy and initiate necessary cooperative procedures, which will enable the Conference to have 1000 or more active churches within 15 years.

10. Provide an advisory and consultation service on planning and construction, for erection of class room annexes.

11. Provide an advisory and consultation service on planning and construction, for erection of fellowship hall annexes.

12. Provide an advisory and consultation service on planning and construction, for erection of new parsonages.

13. Provide an advisory and consultation service on planning and construction, for remodeling of old parsonages.

14. Provide an advisory and consultation service on planning and construction, for remodeling of old churches.

15. Require or provide proper architectural planning and construction supervision for all new church extension buildings, and replacement church buildings, to which financial aid is given by the Board of Missions.

16. Increase staff personnel as to adequately implement the comprehensive rural church extension program.

17. Increase staff personnel as to include at least one person whose entire work would be that of fund raising for church extension.

18. Enlarge the "church extension" fund used (1) to aid established small churches in making building improvements, and (2) to aid small churches in the erection of modern parsonages.

19. Add to the local church budget an apportionment of 1% of the "total money" base, to be used exclusively for rural new church extension. The amount of this apportionment should be increased annually until sufficient income is obtained to meet the needs.

20. Enlarge the Ten Dollar Club.

21. Institute a program of cultivation of established churches in the interest of securing their participation in the new church extension program as mother churches.

22. Consider the possibility of borrowing credit from Methodist churches and institutions, as is being done in some Annual Conferences. American Methodism in all its history has never had such vast property holdings as today. Debt free church property could and should be mortgaged to aid in the program of new church extension needed in this period of great population shift and growth.

23. Explore other possible ways and means of financing new church extension.

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Research

Research work is a recognized need, and is provided for in **Discipline**, 1956, pars. 1231(2), 1233, and 1304. The Annual Conference provides for research in the field of church extension. (**Journal**, 1956, p. 173) Also, the Ormond Fund of

Duke Divinity School is engaged in rural church research. (Journal, 1951, pp 133-4)

An important phase of research work is the study of trends as reflected in the **Journal** records of individual churches. The progressive realignment of charges, and other changes, makes it difficult to trace the individual churches from year to year with complete accuracy.

. Therefore, it is requested that the Conference Secretary, in cooperation with the Conference Statistician, and the Conference Treasurer, give a permanent number to each church in the Conference as listed in the 1957 **Journal** and those following. Also, it is requested that charge numbers be "permanent," and never repeated. It is suggested that the church number series begin with a figure which is larger than the anticipated total of charges, in order that a church number and a charge number would never be the same.

Also, it is requested that there be recorded in the 1957 **Journal** and those following, in the section, "Changes in Boundaries," a record of changes and additions as follows:

1. Churches newly organized, with numbers given.

2. Unlisted reopened churches, with numbers given.

3. Listed reopened churches, with numbers given.

4. Churches discontinued by action of Annual Conference, with numbers given.

5. Churches having names changed, with numbers given.

6. Charges and churches changed as to district alignment, with numbers of charges and churches given.

7. Churches changed as to charge alignment, with numbers of churches and charges given.

8. New charge names, with numbers of charges and churches given.

9. Charge names discontinued, with numbers of charges and churches given.

10. Changes as to charge names, with numbers of charges and churches given.

11. Other changes.

The Conference Secretary is requested to alter the above provisions in any manner deemed necessary, and at any time, in order to make it possible to trace the individual churches from year to year with accuracy.

Therefore the Annual Conference is requested to adopt the following stated policy: It shall be the purpose of the Annual Conference and the several concerned agencies and agents, to recruit, train, employ, finance, equip, and supervise Directors of Christian Education for country-wide work, that there may be one or more such workers for each county or practicable combination of counties.

5. The Annual Conference is hereby requested to create the office of district secretary of town and country work. The procedure to be followed in this regard, and the functions of the office, would be identical to those described in **Discipline**, 1956, par. 1302(2), but with respect to the Commission on Town and Country Work, and the Conference Secretary of Town and Country Work.

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1. There are 816 churches in the Annual Conference (Journal, 1956), of which 565 are in population centers of 500 and less. Most of these and other rural churches have church-schools which are very inefficient institutions of Christian education. It is therefore respectfully requested that the Board of Education add one person to the staff, whose entire work would be that of assisting in the development of the rural church-schools. The Indiana Annual Conference is cited as one Conference which has set a precedent in this regard.

2. Appreciation is hereby expressed for the capable and creative services during the Conference year now closing, of Mr. Roy L. Turnage, Jr., Director of Field Work, Commission on Town and Country Work.

3. Appreciation is hereby expressed to the Board of Lay Activities for the "No Silent Pulpit" program. It is respectfully requested that an adequate training program be established for the lay speakers used, and that no speaker be employed who has not properly participated in the training program.

4. The Bishop (**Discipline**, 1956, par. 433), and the Cabinet, are respectfully requested, in the divisions of circuits, to arrange the charges so that each charge is within a given high school district. Where this is not possible it is requested that each charge be within a given county.

5. The attention of the Bishop and the Cabinet is called to the "Methodist no-man's-land" pockets in the Annual Conference area. It is estimated that about one-fourth of the land of the Conference area is not included in the pastoral charges. The request is hereby made that proper steps be taken to annex this territory. The Oklahoma Annual Conference is cited as one Conference which has set a precedent in this regard.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The results of the work of the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations this year have been most encouraging and gratifying. A major emphasis has been on the work of the Local Church Committee on Christian Vocations, stressing recruitment and guidance.

A Church Vocations Conference was held in Steele Street Methodist Church, Sanford, on March 1, 2, 3 under the direction of the Rev. Herman Winberry, conference chairman, and Mrs. Stanley Potter, Secretary of Student Work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. This conference was attended by 124 delegates and their adult leaders. All were high in their praise and evaluation of this conference. Some of the district directors are planning to follow up this Church Vocations conference with one on the district level in the year 1958.

Using the slogan "A Minister from Every Local Church," our commission will think of its work for this quadrennium under these main headings:

The Christian philosophy of vocations

The local church

Recruitment

Guidance and follow-up

Helping pastors and other adults

Relationship to the public schools

With these in mind our commission makes the following recommendations for the next conference year:

(1) That each pastor organize a committee on Christian vocations in each local church, or one for each charge, using as a guide the suggestions as presented in paragraph 145(9) of the 1956 DISCIPLINE.

(2) That the committee chairman contact the local high school principal in his community and offer assistance during "Career Day" programs. Suggest that the general fields of Church vocations be included.

(3) That each pastor and local church committee send to the chairman of the conference commission on Christian vocations the names of any in the church who make a decision during the year to enter a church vocation. We urge each pastor who has not sent in the names of those from his church to do so. We promise as a commission to maintain a relationship with these persons on behalf of our Annual Conference.

(4) That each district director maintain a file of those in college committed to or interested in Church vocations, and keep in touch with them. Also look into the possibility of having a Christmas banquet each year for those in his district who are recruits for Church vocations.

(5) That each district superintendent meet with the district committee on Christian vocations in his district and make plans for the work of this committee during the year.

We recommend that "Bishop's Rallies on the Ministry" be held in our conference in the fall of 1958 for cultivation and inspiration.

We further recommend that district institutes for pastors, and possibly the chairman of the Local Committee on Christian Vocations, be held the first two weeks in February of 1958—February 3-14.

The commission plans to cooperate with the Methodist Student Movement in a Student Vocations Conference next year, 1957-58.

The next conference Church Vocations Conference will be planned for 1959 or 1960.

We plan to tie in the work of our commission during this quadrennium with that of the Local Church Emphasis Commission. Also to work with the Conference Director of Youth Work and the Director of the State Methodist Student Movement in all areas where our work relates to preparing for church vocations.

We wish to thank Bishop Paul N. Garber for his real interest in our recruitment program, Dr. A. P. Brantley, the District Superintendent who represents us in the cabinet, the Sanford Church, and Rev. and Mrs. Stanley Potter for being host to our Church Vocations Conference. We wish also to thank the Radio and Film Commission of our conference for purchasing filmstrips dealing with Christian vocations. We commend these to be more widely used by the churches of our conference.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

(June 1, 1956 - May 31, 1957)

As we come to the close of this, the first year of the new quadrennium, we see signs of progress all along the way. This is to be expected; it has been the pattern for many years. The trend seems always to be onward and upward, and how grateful we should be for this steady climb!

There has been an enrollment of 1,614 new members, but it is impossible to give an accurate statement of the total membership as the final statistical reports are not in. The number is approximately 36,000. Eight new societies have been organized, and continued effort will be made toward complete organization. The Wesleyan Service Guild is organized in sixty-seven churches, and is filling a definite need among the employed women.

The Conference Treasurer has received for Missions during the year 1956-1957, \$209,350.50. This is an increase over the previous year of \$10,956.57. The societies reported an expenditure of \$130,560.67 for local work, thus bringing the total figure to \$339,910.17. The pledge for 1957-1958 is \$135,200.00, an increase of \$7,200.00 over the pledge for 1956-1957.

Special emphasis is being placed upon the erection of a new building for the Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College in Greenville. Funds totaling \$41,278.76 have been sent to the Division and will be channelled back to our conference for this purpose. Of the above stated amount \$15,544.76 came as special contributions from the societies. The conference, with a gift from the Division, and apportionments from World Service, will be able to finance the project, and it is expected that the building will be completed within the coming year.

Work was established in the Pembroke area last fall, with Miss Alta Nye serving as deaconess. Miss Ethelynde Ballance is continuing her work on the Roberdell charge, Miss Mamiej Chandler at the Methodist Student Center, and Miss Charlotte Stevenson at Havelock.

Miss Barbara Ann Smith from Elizabeth City is serving her first year as a special-term missionary in Havana, Cuba, and is supported by our conference. Others who are being supported by the conference are Miss Chasteen E. Shine, Seoul, Korea, and Miss Charlotte Alston, Hiroshima, Japan. Miss Elsie Parker serving in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, is supported by the Wesleyan Service Guild.

The conference is privileged to have a part in this work both in the home and foreign fields.

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Society was held at Saint Paul Church in Goldsboro, and the Guild met at Hay Street Church in Fayetteville. The theme for the quadrennium, "The Spirit of Christ—For All of Life," seemed to be felt in a very special way throughout both of these gatherings.

Each year increasing interest is shown in the School of Missions at Duke University and the Spiritual Life Retreat which precedes the school. We believe the results of the school and retreat to be far-reaching in their influence. The facilities at Duke are unsurpassed and the officials are most gracious and cooperative.

Sincere appreciation is expressed to Bishop Garber, to the district superintendants, and to the pastors for their constant and able support of our work.

To each officer in the conference, district, subdistrict, and in the local society, who has borne her share of the responsibilities, and to each individual member who has upheld the work by her prayers, her gifts, and her service, we owe a profound debt of gratitude.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

I

Your Commission met January 30-31, 1957 for a budget hearing for the Conference year 1957-58.

We believe that the years ahead will come to be known as the "new college era" for the North Carolina Annual Conference. The Commission recognizes that the Annual Conference has accepted the challenge to build two new Methodist Colleges—one at Fayetteville now known as Methodist College, Incorporated and one at Rocky Mount now known as North Carolina Wesleyan College—all of this to be in addition to strengthening Louisburg College.

In undertaking support for these colleges we are aware that we are still in a period of transition in our finances to the new financial plan "As Much for Others As For Ourselves" which involves an Acceptance by the charges of the Conference Asking under the new fund for combined benevolences including World Service.

When Annual Conference convenes, we will be in a position to judge what has been the total payment on the current year Acceptances and we hope to have information as to what has been the total Acceptances on the item of Benevolences for the ensuing year. At that time any necessary adjustments may be made in the total budget.

The Commission believes that sound financial policy requires that each charge determine at its Fourth Quarterly Conference what is to be its Acceptance on Benevolences for the ensuing Conference year and recommends adoption of this policy by the Conference.

The Annual Conference has set for itself an annual increase of \$40,000 in the College Sustaining Fund which will lift this fund from \$208,250 in the current year to \$500,000 in 1964-65. It is felt that if this result is to be accomplished, along with growth in other items in the annual budget, the Conference must put emphasis on stewardship and tithing. Stewardship must come out of an experience we have had, therefore, we suggest that the conference consider promoting at once a vigorous program of stewardship cultivation so that our people may be prepared to support the annual increasing benevolence program of the Conference.

We present again to the charges of the Conference the emphasis in our new financial program "As Much for Others as For Ourselves" with the expressed hope that every charge will make a definite forward step each year until the goal is attained. We list below the total Asking for each of the 9 districts under Fund #7, Benevolences:

We request authority for the Board of Education and/or the Commission on Christian Higher Education to initiate their Conference Colleges Capital Funds Campaign at such time as they may deem suitable and desirable.

Limiting and Supplementing Provisions Relating to the Budget

1. Apportionments against pastor's salary are defined to include the salary of the pastor and associate pastor under Episcopal appointment.

2. (a) The annual salary of each of the 9 District Superintendents shall be set at \$8,000.00 including travel.

(b) We recommend each district provide a fund for office and program expense as needed up to \$1,000.00.

3. The Commission recommends that each person who has authority to draw checks against an account of a Conference Agency be required to present annually to the full membership of his Agency a complete list of all checks drawn, justifying all checks with the budget approved by his Agency.

4. The Commission recommends that each agency whose accounts are not audited in the Treasurer's Office be required to have an annual audit made and furnish this Commission with a copy of it.

5. The Commission would like to call the attention of the Conference to the increased amount of travel expense and request that the various agencies be diligent in holding it to the minimum necessary to properly perform their service.

6. Under the Church Extension Fund the first \$25,000.00 is earmarked to be paid to Board of Missions, Inc. for the revolving loan fund.

7. The distribution of the College Sustaining Fund shall be in accordance with the direction of the Board of Education.

8. Fund for Conference Youth Camps. We recommend that the Board of Education allocate \$4300 for Camp Don Lee for caretakers salary and maintenance of facilities and \$22,000.00 for development of new camps.

9. The District Superintendents will establish suitable apportionments for new churches, and adjust apportionments where other charge changes occur; provided that beginning with the Conference year 1955-56 where circuits are divided any churches involved in the division that must receive minimum salary, may upon the consent of the District Superintendent, pay their proportionate share of the former items based on pastoral support and total money raised, plus an additional 20% of this amount. This shall be increased by at least 20% of the original base annually until they achieve the then current base of established charges, in a period not to exceed four years.

The Commission recommends approval of the following SPECIALS to be arranged by Special Offerings or included in the budget. Remit to Conf. Treas.

> Advance Special General Advance Special Conference Church School Rally Day for Leadership Training The Television Ministry of the Methodist Church Fellowship of Suffering & Service (World Wide Communion) Race Relations Sunday (Paine College) Week of Dedication Methodist Retirement Homes Special (Mothers' Day) Methodist Student Day

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the Conference.

1. The Capital Funds campaign for our colleges.

2. Wesley Foundation Commission for special gifts for the benefit of special works in State supported institutions.

3. The Board of Missions for the promotion of Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.

4. That the Board of Education be permitted to accept funds donated by children's groups, young adult groups, individuals, etc., to begin an additional Camp for our Conference.

We recommend that the Conference fiscal year be designated to begin July 1st and to close June 30th.

We recommend to charge or church treasurers that they set up a schedule for remitting at a fixed time each month and to close the year as early as possible. Final remittance should be mailed on Monday two weeks preceding the opening of Conference.

We report the issuance of a Fidelity Bond in Employers Mutual Casualty Company of Des Moines, Iowa to cover the Conference Treasurer in the amount of \$100,000.00 and to cover the Stenographer-Clerk in the amount of \$25,000.00; also to cover others handling funds in Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., Board of Education, Methodist Youth Fund, Camp Director, Methodist Youth Assemblies, Treasurer Camp Don Lee, Treasurer Methodist Youth Center, Greenville.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Annual Conference Commission on Worship was created by action of the 1956 Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference in Greenville, North Carolina.

Although not a required Commission of the Annual Conference, the leaders of the organization felt it expedient to create a Commission of duly authorized persons who would serve as a Resource Group ready to provide guidance, information, training, and encouragement to all persons, groups, or churches anywhere in the Conference who might be concerned with the task of recovering our historic traditions in Methodist Worship. The Commission is especially concerned with the restoration of corporate worship to its proper place in the framework of our evangelical Protestantism.

It is the contention of the Commission on Worship that, our contemporary Methodism has lost the fine art of corporate worship; moreover, the Commission feels that the Church has deserted the historic norms and usages characteristic of historic Methodism. It should be observed that Methodism uniquely combines both form and freedom in worship within the framework of a theological emphasis on evangelism, personal religious experience, and the sacramental life. The aim of the Commission is not to dogmatize, propagandize, or agitate; rather, it wishes to provide a leaven of intelligent leadership and a source of information for those who wish help in improving our common worship.

This year the Commission held one regular meeting for organization and planning. In February a Coaching Conference was held at Duke University, conducted by The Reverend R. P. Marshall and Dr. John J. Rudin, II in which each member of the Commission began work leading to full accreditation for teaching Courses in Worship and Church Music. It is the Commission's plan to provide a supply of trained instructors in the field of worship for our Christian Workers' Schools under the direction of the Conference Board of Education.

The Commission on Worship hereby calls attention to the following basic principles of worship which ought to be sought and understood by ministers and laymen alike:

- 1. The consciousness of the living God should determine the relevancy or irrelevancy of everything that is done in a public service of worship.
- 2. Public worship is directed toward the living God as an objective reality outside of and beyond ourselves; it is "unto Him." Its primary reference is not to man but to God.
- 3. The congregation should participate actively in worship.
- 4. Worship is activity within which preaching is to be regarded as a distinct function.
- 5. The arts, especially architecture and music, have a distinct function in aiding worship.
- 6. The final test of effective worship is the Christian effect upon the everyday life of the worshipper.

To this end, the Commission on Worship suggests the following practical steps toward the recovery of effective Christian Worship.

- 1. A Commission on Worship in every local church.
- 2. The General Board of Education should be encouraged to create adequate Courses on Christian Worship in its Leadership Training Curriculum.
- 3. The Vacation Church Schools and Confirmation Classes should give wide emphasis on training for worship.
- 4. Every local church should plan a Christian Workers' School with a Course on Christian Worship.
- 5. The Methodist Hymnal should be regularly used in every local church with a strong emphasis on the Wesleyan Hymns.
- 6. Each Pastor should preach annually a series of Sermons dealing with the fundamentals of corporate worship.
- Every pastor and every local church should re-emphasize Methodism's high view of the Sacraments—Baptism, Confirmation, the Holy Communion, and Matrimony. (The Commission deplores the notion of the baptism of children as a mere christening, dedication, or as a training for parenthood).
- 8. All pastors should encourage frequent celebrations of the Holy Com-

munion by shifting from the essentially Reformed idea of periodic Communion to the traditional schedule of Methodist ones.

- 9. All new church buildings should be designed by Architects who know and appreciate the requirements for Christian Worship.
- 10. The Commission strongly urges every pastor and every local church to emphasize the high significance of the morning service of worship. This can be accomplished by remembering that the Church School is the church at study; morning service is the church at worship.

The Commission offers its service to the Conference in the humble hope that it may be of some help in guiding persons and congregations in the pursuit of scriptural holiness and its witness in the sacramental life of the Christian community.

SECTION V

AMENDMENTS — RESOLUTIONS

Proposed Amendment No. 9 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning the Transfer of Churches or/and Annual Conferences from one Jurisdiction to another.

At its fifth quadrennial session held in Minneapolis, Minnesota, April 25-May 7, 1956, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) vote, on Wednesday morning, May 2, 1956, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

First

Article I of Division Two, Section VIII of the Constitution of The Methodist Church shall be amended by adding at the end thereof the following paragraph with the heading:—

"Abolition of the Central Jurisdiction"

The Central Jurisdiction shall be abolished when all of the Annual Conferences now comprising it have been transferred to other jurisdictions in accordance with the voluntary procedure of Article V of this section. Each remaining bishop of the Central Jurisdiction shall thereupon be transferred to the jurisdiction to which the majority of the membership of his area have been transferred, and the Central Jurisdiction shall then be dissolved.

Second

The Constitution of The Methodist Church shall be amended by adding a new Article to be known as Article V of Division Two, Section VIII and to read as follows:

- A local church may be transferred from one Annual Conference to another in which it is geographically located upon approval by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting in each of the following:
 - a) The Quarterly Conference of the local church.
 - b) A Church Conference of the local church.
 - c) Each of the two Annual Conferences involved.

The vote shall be certified by the secretaries of the specified conferences to the bishops having supervision of the Annual Conferences involved, and upon their announcement of the required majorities the transfer shall immediately be effective.

- 2. An Annual Conference may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another upon approval by:
 - a) The Annual Conference desiring transfer, by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting. The secretary of the conference shall certify the vote to the College of Bishops of the jurisdiction of which the conference has been a part.
 - b) The remainder of the jurisdiction from which transfer is to be made, by a two-thirds majority of the total Annual Conference members present and voting. The vote shall be taken in the other Annual Conferences of the jurisdiction and certified by their secretaries of the College of Bishops, which shall determine whether two thirds of the total vote in the jurisdiction is favorable.

c) The jurisdiction to which transfer is to be made, by a two-thirds majority of the total Annual Conference members present and voting. The vote shall be taken in the various Annual Conferences of the jurisdiction and certified by their secretaries to the College of Bishops, which shall determine whether two thirds of the total vote in the jurisdiction is favorable.

Upon announcement by the two Colleges of Bishops of the required majorities the transfer shall immediately be effective.

- 3. The vote on approval of transfer under either subparagraph 1 or 2 shall be taken by each Annual Conference at its first session after the matter is submitted to it.
- Transfers under the provisions of this article shall not be governed or restricted by other provisions of this Constitution relating to changes of boundaries of conferences.

Third

Whenever twenty-five per cent of the local-church membership of the Central Jurisdiction have been transferred by this process to another jurisdiction or jurisdictions, the bishop of the area from which the largest number have been transferred shall be transferred to the jurisdiction which has received the largest number by such transfer, and the representation of the Central Jurisdiction on the boards and agencies of the church shall thereafter be proportionately reduced.

Proposed Amendment No. 10 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning Additional Lay Members in the Annual Conference

At its fifth quadrennial session, held in Minneapolis, Minnesota, April 25-May 7, 1956, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (3/3) vote on Monday morning, May 7, 1956, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Section VII, Paragraph 21, Article 1 of the 1952 Discipline of The Methodist Church, which reads as follows:

21. Article 1.—The Annual Conference shall be composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it, together with a lay member elected by each pastoral charge. The lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The Methodist Church.

by inserting after the first sentence, the following sentence: "EACH PASTORAL CHARGE SERVED BY MORE THAN ONE MINISTER IN FULL CONNEC-TION SHALL BE ENTITLED TO TWO LAY MEMBERS." The Paragraph when amended will read as follows:

21. Article 1.—The Annual Conference shall be composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it, together with a lay member elected by each pastoral charge. EACH PASTORAL CHARGE SERVED BY MORE THAN ONE MINISTER IN FULL CONNECTION SHALL BE ENTITLED TO TWO LAY MEMBERS. The lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The Methodist Church.

Proposed Amendment No. 11 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning the number of Members in the General Conference

At its fifth quadrennial session, held in Minneapolis, Minnesota, April 25-May 7, 1956, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) vote on Monday morning, May 7, 1956, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Paragraph 5, Article 1 of the 1952 Discipline of The Methodist Church, which reads as follows:

"5. Article 1.—The General Conference shall be composed of not less than 600 nor more than 800 delegates, one half of whom shall be ministers and one half lay members, to be elected by the Annual Conferences."

by substituting the figure 900 in line two for the figure 800, so that the Paragraph when amended will read as follows:

"5. Article 1.—The General Conference shall be composed of not less than 600 nor more than 900 delegates, one half of whom shall be ministers and one half lay members, to be elected by the Annual Conferences."

RESOLUTION CONCERNING ADMISSION OF STUDENTS IN DUKE DIVINITY SCHOOL

Whereas, the General Conference of our church has requested that its institutions "carefully restudy their policies and practices as they relate to race, making certain that these policies and practices are Christian";

And whereas, the Dvinity School of Duke University is one of the accredited schools of theology of the Methodist Church;

And whereas, the administration, faculty, and students of the Divinity School have requested the trustees of the University to permit the admission to the Divinity School of qualified students without regard to race;

Therefore be it resolved; that this Conference express its support for the petitions of the administration, students, and faculty, and request the trustees to permit the admission to the Divisity School of qualified students without distinction as to race.

We recognize that such a change of policy involves real problems; and confess that because of these we have not forthrightly faced this issue in our conference and congregations. But we believe that, because the Divinity School is in a special sense a community committed to the Christian quest, because such a policy would bring together only graduate students pursuing a specifically Christian purpose, and because of the expressed willingness on the part of the administration, faculty, and students to undertake such a venture, the Divinity School is peculiarly fitted to lead the church in this regard. We therefore respectfully hope that the trustees of the University will give it freedom to do so.

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be furnished by the secretary of the conference to the chairman of the Board of Trustees of Duke University.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING USE OF LAYMEN IN CONNECTIONAL VOCATIONS AND INSTITUTIONS

Be it here resolved that the Bishop and the cabinet appoint a committee to

investigate and study the possibility of securing more qualified laymen to fill some of the connectional vocations and the supervising of institutions, jobs now held almost exclusively by ordained ministers. Be it further resolved that this committee investigate and study the possibilities of setting up courses in our Methodist institutions of higher learning to help train laymen in administration and personnel designed for the above mentioned jobs.

It is our conviction that more and more men are being taken out of the pastorate into administrative and other vocations in the church, some of which could be adequately served by dedicated, trained, Christian layment of our church. If something is done to help in this situation it will help relieve some of the shortage of fully trained ministers in this conference. 26% or 126 pastoral appointments are served by Approved Supply Pastors.

Ministers are doing a good job in these position, but more instances of capable laymen, such as Stacy Weaver, filling jobs hitherto filled largely by ministers will help relieve the shortage of ordained clergymen across the church.

That, since setting aside a special page for our Home for Children and Board of Education may cause readers to treat news on these pages with the contempt of familiarity, it may well be that elimination of designated space and treating them as news-making agencies. Like other church agencies, will bring them more forcefully to the attention of the Methodists of North Carolina;

We call upon the Methodist Board of Publication to reconsider its journalistic policies with a view to the elimination of these two departmental pages.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, some features of which are referred to in the outline that follows on specific items.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Recorded cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were cerified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges as shown by the Treasurer's records was compared with reports of the pastors to the Annual Conference. The Treasurer requested the pastors from all charges in which there was a material difference between pastors' reports and treasurer's records to recheck the charge records and advise as to any corrections to be made. We examined all replies and determined that necessary adjustments were made. Distribution of

income from the charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1956 and 1957 sessions of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorization from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and the various boards and funds were either inspected, or if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts to transit represent 1956-57 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits into the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorizations for the distribution of 1956-57 collections.

CERTIFICATE

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and related statement of income, expense or distribution and fund balance present fairly the financial position of the North Carolina Conference, S.E.J., of the Methodist Church, Mr. M. J. Cowell, Treasurer, at June 30, 1957, and the results of operations for the 1956-57 Conference year then ended ,in conformity with accounting principles of the Conference applied on a basis consistent with that of the previous year.
