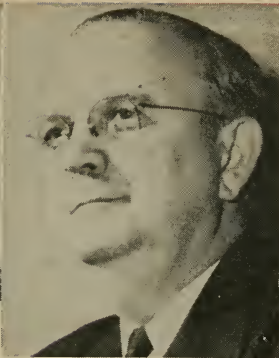

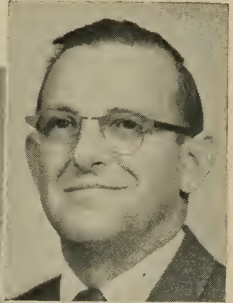

Historical Statement

THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH (Southeastern Jurisdiction)

I Composition: The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church is composed of:

- (1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
- (2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
- (3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.

II Organization: The Organizing dates of the three former Conferences were as follows:

- (1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church, 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina
- (2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia
- (3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA
ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.

5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
4. Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all boards, commissions, and committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the *Discipline* directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.
7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
8. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
10. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 47, page 198, 1960 *Discipline*.
11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be

charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.

13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS, MOTIONS, AMENDMENTS

1. All reports to be presented to the conference shall be sent to the conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Coordinating Council and published in the conference calendar.
2. All resolutions to be presented to the annual conference affecting the structure, policy and function of any board or agency of the annual conference, shall be submitted in writing to the conference secretary with copies for all the delegates twenty-four hours prior to consideration by the annual conference, and not later than the second night session of the conference.
3. All motions presented to the annual conference, and amendments to any paper, shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the conference secretary at the time of presentation.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at last forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in triplicate, to the conference secretary.
3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made in written form provided by the conference secretary, and must be approved and signed by the district superintendent. Such substitute delegates may function only in the absence of the regular delegates.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
2. Charge and church treasurers shall make final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on or before the opening date of the annual conference, and each pastor shall complete and submit Table II to the conference statistician on or before the opening date of the annual conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church

reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastor's reports.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The conference claimants, the general boards, the publishing house, lay members of the conference boards, lay delegates to the Annual Conference, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other educational institutions as he may deem advisable. Six copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.75 each, or single copies by mail at \$1.85 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be nine.
2. A district conference shall be held annually, in each district.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the district conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.
4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.
5. The district superintendent of each district shall be required to furnish to the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician, as early in the year as possible an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
6. Each district superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the district superintendent to the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
7. We call attention of the district superintendents to Paragraph 432 (1) 1960 Discipline, and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

Question 28: "Who are admitted in full connection?" was called. The answer was: Robert Mitchell Drew. He was received by Bishop Garber. (Question 28 called previously.)

Question 1: "Who are elected for the quadrennium?" was called. The answer was: Secretary: W. C. Wilson; Statistician: D. D. Traynham; Treasurer: M. J. Cowell.

Question 2: "Is the Annual Conference incorporated?" was called. The answer was: "No."

Question 3: (a) "What officers handling funds of the conference have been bonded, and in what amounts?" was called. The answer was: The Conference Treasurer, \$100,000; assistant to the treasurer, \$25,000; Director of Christian Higher Education, \$100,000; Superintendent of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$50,000; and others of various officers, \$10,000.

(b) "Have the books of said officers or persons been audited?" was called. The answer was: "Yes."

Question 4: "Have the conference boards, commissions and committees been appointed or elected?" was called. The answer was: "Yes."

Question 5: "Have the secretaries, treasurers and statisticians kept their respective records upon and according to the forms prescribed by the Methodist Church?" was called. The answer was: "Yes."

Paine College: Bishop Garber presented Rev. E. Clayton Calhoun, president of Paine College, who spoke to the conference.

Commission on World Service and Finance: Bishop Garber presented Bill Price of Burlington, chairman of the Commission. The chairman presided and spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

College Board of Visitors: Bishop Garber called on L. C. Vereen, chairman of the College Board of Visitors, who presented the report of the Board. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Long Range Planning Committee: C. D. Barclift, chairman of the Long Range Planning Committee, presented the report of the committee. He moved its adoption. R. M. Gradeless and R. W. Pritchard asked questions, which the chairman answered. O. L. Hathaway, J. Nelson Gibson, A. J. Hobbs and E. C. Crawford spoke on the subject of increasing the number of districts.

T. Fant Steele asked a question concerning the local church voluntarily assuming moving expenses of the minister. R. M. Gradeless asked a question. J. N. Gibson and C. D. Barclift answered the questions.

An Amendment was offered by J. E. Garlington that the local church pay one-half of moving expenses beginning this year, the moving expense to be based on a minimum of 25 cents per mile, within conference lines. It was seconded. Key Taylor asked for clarification of the amendment. A. S. Parker amended Garlington's amendment to read, "to request the local church." It was seconded. Garlington spoke against Parker's amendment. R. W. Pritchard spoke in favor of the Garlington amendment. H. F. Leatherman spoke for the Parker amendment. J. J. Cole of Fremont spoke for the Garlington amendment. R. G. Dawson spoke, stating that 25 cents per mile was not enough. J. S. Epperson asked a question and Garlington answered. He then asked that the word "one-half" be deleted. Mrs. Rufus Riddick of Hertford and M. L. Husted spoke.

The question was called for on the Parker amendment to the Garlington amendment. The vote was taken. The result was 265 for; 98 against. The Parker amendment was adopted.

The amended report of the Long Range Planning Committee was adopted.

Anniversary of the Board of Evangelism: The anniversary of the Board of Evangelism was observed with Paul Browning, chairman, presiding.

Hymn Number 267, "Rise Up, O Men of God," was sung. E. B. Fisher led in prayer. C. Allison Simonton, Jr. gave the report of the Board. He moved its adoption. Key W. Taylor asked a question and the secretary answered. The report was adopted.

S. T. Kimbrough, Jr. sang "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say."

C. F. Heath presented Dr. G. Ernest Thomas, Director of Spiritual Life, General Board of Evangelism, Nashville, Tenn., who addressed the conference.

Ministerial Training and Qualifications: Question 24: "Who have been admitted from other evangelical churches as traveling preachers?" (Question 24 called previously.)

(1) As members on trial: Deacon? Jesse Virgil Bone; Elders? No one.

(2) As members in full connection: Deacon? No one. Elders? No one.

Question 29: "Who have been elected deacons?" was called. The answer was: (a) Theological students: Jesse Virgil Bone. (Question 29 called previously.)

Bishop's Committee on Church Architecture: C. D. Barclift made the report of the Bishop's Committee on Church Architecture. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Committee on Sustentation Fund: W. R. Stevens made the report of the Committee on Sustentation Fund. It was approved.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented Bishop Walter C. Gum of the Louisville Area.

Committee on Reference to Corporations Auxiliary to and/or Controlled by the North Carolina Annual Conference: C. D. Barclift presented the report of the Committee and moved its adoption. David G. Bradley asked a question and Barclift and Bishop Garber answered the question. The report was adopted.

Emory University: Bishop Garber presented Ross Freeman, Director of Development at Emory University, who brought greetings from Emory University and Candler School of Theology.

Study Committee Authorized to Revise Historical Statement and Study Founding Date of the North Carolina Conference: W. M. Howard, Jr. made the report for the committee. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Local Church Emphasis: R. E. Walston reported for the Committee on Local Church Emphasis. He moved that the report be adopted. It was adopted.

Announcements: L. C. Vereen and Bishop Garber made announcements.

Memorial Service: Bishop Garber read appropriate scripture selections after which the organist played as a prelude: "Crossing the Bar" by Tennyson. Hymn Number 220, "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned," was sung, and W. R. Stevens led in prayer. S. T. Kimbrough, Jr., sang "Face to Face" by Johnson.

Question 39 a: "What ministers and ministers' wives have died during the year?" was called. 



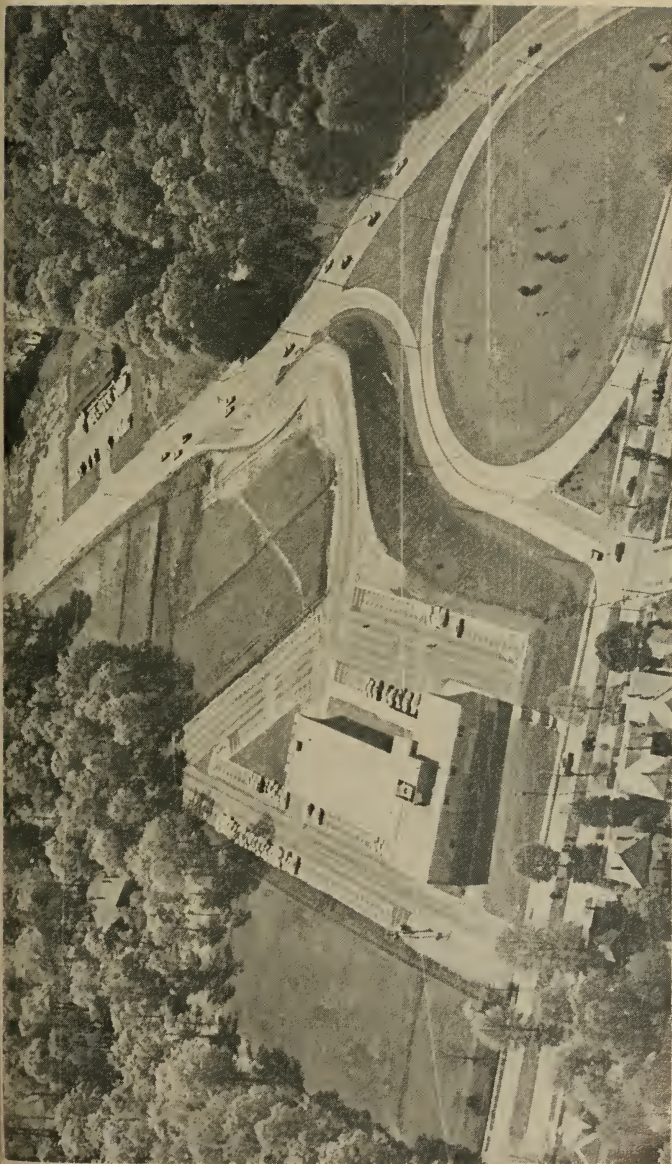

LEON VOIGHT COUCH

1906 — 1961

He is my friend who loves me true,
 Whate'er I do;
 Who love me, and yet more than me,
 What I might be;
 Whose trust in me's not even stirred
 By my own word;
 Who's loyal to me even when I
 Myself belie.
 I think, with such a friend, I'd be
 Even such as he.

These vibrant words from the pen of Frank Crane, illustrious uncle of Methodism's Henry Hitt Crane, express with sincerity, my feelings toward my friend, Leon Couch.

I am reminded that in thinking about Leon, "all life is growth, and all growth is struggle." This might well indicate the mark of this truly great man. Leon was such . . . great, and with an abundance of service to, and love for, his fellow man.



Leon Voight Couch was born November 25, 1906 at Toms Creek, Virginia, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Couch. He passed away when his great heart failed, June 30, 1961, at Wayne Memorial Hospital, Goldsboro, N. C., the funeral being held Sunday, July 2, at St. Paul Methodist Church with burial in Willow Dale Cemetery. Surviving are his wife, the former Ruth Worthington; one daughter, Lois; two sons, Paul and Leon II. Services were conducted by Bishop Paul N. Garber, Rev. Mark W. Lawrence assisting, a scant 72 hours after Leon's name had been read at Conference, returning him to St. Paul Methodist Church for his sixth year. What a tribute, for until Leon's inspirational ministry there, no one had ever served beyond this church's four-year rule.

By earning his way, he graduated at 19 from Emory and Henry College with an A.B. degree in 1926. The next year, he served as principal of the Methodist Orphanage, Greenville, Tennessee. The following year, having won a scholarship to Duke University, he studied in the Duke Divinity School. Now, with many debts to pay and a burning desire to serve mankind, he became first a teacher at Walstonburg, then in 1931, principal of the Eureka High School, and in 1937, principal of the Grantham High School. Always seeking more knowledge Leon attended many summer schools—Duke in 1934-35-37; Carolina in 1936-38; Harvard in 1939; Columbia in 1940. He received his M.A. degree from Duke in 1939.

In 1941, Leon accepted a position as supervising principal of the Roxboro, N. C., city schools. And it was while there that the Lord laid His program before Leon so masterfully and insistently that he, with Ruth's complete accord, understanding and helpfulness, accepted in 1943 a position as Executive Secretary of the Durham Methodist Society. This resulted in a labor of love which saw the erection of St. Paul Methodist Church and Maybrook Church in Durham. And for nine glorious but frugal years he served St. Paul Methodist Church well.

It was during these years that Leon Couch began to dignify the Methodist ministry, too. He was admitted on trial at Rocky Mount in the year 1943; was ordained a deacon at Goldsboro in 1945; and ordained as an elder in Elizabeth City in 1947.

In 1951 he became pastor of First Methodist Church, Morehead City, where he served for five years. It was during this highlight in his career at Morehead City that I came to know and to love, and to want to be more like Leon Couch. It was my

pleasure and privilege to be a member of his congregation for a short while, and he invited my participation in the work of the church, as he did everyone, for he knew no strangers. His days were 24 hours long, and the hour was never too late to "go and serve, teach and heal." There was a simple, yet dignified eloquence, about his services that belies description even today. Unhurried, yet in quiet faith, were they conducted. Never will I forget the awesome, spine-tingling sensation which came to me each time Leon turned and so poignantly and meaningfully approached that altar where Jesus stood, with our tithes and offerings!

Leon served our Conference well in, oh, so many areas. In his quiet, unassuming, yet intelligent manner, at various times he had served on many boards and agencies, while at the time of his passing he was a member of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Home for Children and occupied the chair as president of the Conference Board of Evangelism.

Each of four summers Leon traveled to Alabama, Mississippi, and Georgia to teach in their pastors' schools, and once in his own North Carolina Pastors' School at Duke University. Three times he taught in the Workers' School in Miami, the last time just prior to his passing. In the Workers' School in Jacksonville, Fla., he left lasting impressions, on three occasions. For fourteen summers he was found teaching in the Supply Pastors' School at Duke University.

Leon had an especial interest in people who were confronted with the problem of alcohol. He organized the AA group in Durham and his endeavors in this direction were constant and rewarding. During 1944 he attended the Yale School of Alcoholic Studies, and subsequently, he conducted workshops dealing with the alcoholic problem.

Leon was devoted to the program of the W.S.C.S., believing as he did that the hand that rocks the cradle rules the world. He began, by teaching in the Jurisdictional Conference at Lake Junaluska, writing a part of the 1948 W.S.C.S. handbook. From this beginning, each summer thereafter, he taught in two or three Schools of Missions in the various Conferences—Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, Arkansas, Georgia, Texas—the last summer, 1960, in his own North Carolina Conference held at Duke. Yes, he endeared himself to the women throughout Methodism as he did to the ministers who knew and understood him and to laymen such as I.

A simple tribute to this very humble and gentle man was expressed by a citizen in Goldsboro, over the radio, at the time of his passing, which sums it up so eloquently. "The greatest sermon Leon Couch ever preached was the life that he led. He was a shining example of a husband, father, friend, and servant of God and his fellow man. The memory of this example indelibly stamped itself on this community, and the people who knew him. He showed us how we ought to live. A man can make no greater contribution during his passing on this earth . . ."

WILLIAM LAWRENCE LOY

1889 — 1961

William Lawrence Loy was born August 5, 1889, in Chatham County, Snow Camp, North Carolina. He was the son of William H. Loy and Sallie Jane Loy.

He attended Whitsett Institute where he finished high school in 1912 and continued his education by entering Trinity College in the fall of that year where he graduated with an A.B. degree in 1916.

Brother Loy joined the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church in 1916 at Durham, N. C., and was ordained deacon in 1918 and elder in 1920. Not being satisfied with his education he later entered Vanderbilt University where he received further training and his M.A. and B.D. degrees in 1925.

Lawrence was twice married. First to Miss Margaret Long of Alamance County and second to Miss Anne Bullard of Rowland, North Carolina.

To his first marriage two children were born: Vance Loy of Florence, S. C., and Lynn Loy of Laurinburg, N. C.

Brother Loy served the following charges in the North Carolina Conference: Periquimans Circuit, Tar River, Zebulon, Brooksdale, West End, Creedmoor, Mount Olive-Calypso, Enfield-Whitakers, Bailey, Chad-

bourn, Rowland, Lillington, and Granville Circuit, from which he retired 1956. After his retirement he served Macedonia, as retired supply, for two years, after which he moved to his new home in Rowland, N. C.

My acquaintance with Lawrence Loy extends over a long period. We were together in Trinity College graduating in the same class. Then for over forty years we were associated together in the North Carolina Conference.

Lawrence Loy was a true friend and a good helper in the Lord's work. We were together in several revivals and I shall never forget some of the experiences we had in prayer. Lawrence firmly believed in prayer. He practiced it in public and in private. He testified to me that one morning while he was lying in bed praying that he felt as if an unseen hand was lifting him bodily from the bed towards heaven. The choir sang at his funeral "My Faith Looks Up to Thee," and no more appropriate hymn could have been sung, for all through his illness he kept faith with God that what ever was best for him would be done. The depth of his faith was expressed through the reality of his worship.

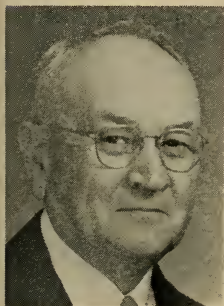
Brother Loy was a true minister of Jesus Christ. His sermons were full of love of God and for his fellow man. He preached Jesus as the only source to which a sinner can go for pardon from sin. He believed in the divinity of Christ as stated in the Creed. Many people were brought into the church by his ministry, for, like Andrew, he would seek them out and introduce them to Jesus.

Brother Loy was a good pastor. He visited in the homes of the people and won many to Christ by coming in contact with them in their homes.

He loved The Methodist Church and worked hard for her success, giving her forty-two years of his life. One outstanding thing comes with his closing ministry in that he was instrumental in purchasing a beautiful lot on which the new Macedonia Church is now being erected.

Lawrence and Anne moved to their home in Rowland in July 1958, where they lived happily until June 30, 1961, when the Lord reached down with a tender hand and lifted him to his new home.

His funeral was conducted in the Rowland Methodist Church, Sunday, July 2, 11 a.m. The following ministers were in charge: Rev. J. H. Parrish, assisted by Dr. A. J. Hobbs and Rev. W. G. Farrar.



Lawrence is survived by his widow, Mrs. Anne Loy; two sons, Vance Loy of Florence, S. C., and Lynn Loy of Laurinburg, N. C.; five grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

Brother Loy was buried in Alamance County where he will await the last trump. He now rests in peace for which he spent a lifetime in seeking.

I think the writer of this hymn has summed up the life of Lawrence Loy:

My times are in Thy hand:

HARRIS LINDSAY HENDRICKS

1885 — 1961

The Reverend Harris Lindsay Hendricks, son of Warren Aiken Hendricks and Rosa Harris Hendricks, was born at Cartersville, Georgia, on February 14, 1885. After attending the public schools in his home town, he was a student at Rhinehart College and Vanderbilt University.



Brother Hendricks joined the Georgia Conference of The Methodist Church and was ordained an Elder in 1917. He continued his ministry in the Georgia Conference until 1923, when he was transferred to the North Carolina Conference. From 1932 until his voluntary retirement in 1954 he served faithfully and with outstanding ability and devotion a number of churches in the North Carolina Conference. He was a person of strong convictions; nevertheless, he was kind, patient, sympathetic, understanding and tolerant. He possessed a logical and analytical mind. His sermons were always well prepared and delivered in choice language and with the earnestness and conviction of a true man of God. He was loved and highly respected by the members of his churches. He gave to them the teachings of Jesus Christ, our Saviour. He did not seek self-advancement. He was content to serve his people and his Master. He had a keen sense of humor and was a delightful companion.

When the members of his church were blue and despondent he gave them hope; when they were sad he gave them comfort; when they were fearful he gave them

courage; when they were indifferent he gave them interest and enthusiasm; when they were prone to be vindictive he taught them to be merciful and forgiving; when they were in doubt he gave them faith, and by precept and example he led them in the paths of righteousness. He was a good shepherd.

He married Eloise Coe Morrison, the daughter of Dr. Ambrose Morrison who was a member of the faculty of Vanderbilt University and the University of Nashville. This union was blessed with four children: a daughter, Shirley La Gay, deceased; a daughter, Eloise; two sons, Harris Lindsay, Jr., and Warren Aiken. He was devoted to his family, and he and his good wife made great sacrifices so that each of their children might have the opportunity of a college education.

The last church that he served was St. James Methodist Church, Tarboro, North Carolina. After his retirement he made his home in that city.

After a short illness he died in Tarboro on July 20, 1961. Funeral services were held in St. James Methodist Church in Tarboro on Friday afternoon, July 22, 1961. The Reverend R. S. Brodie, pastor, was in charge of the services. He was assisted by the Reverend Walter C. Ball, district superintendent, and Colonel Worth Wicker, a retired Army Chaplain. He was buried in Edgecombe Memorial Park Cemetery in Tarboro.

Surviving are his wife and three children: Eloise, who is now a teacher in the public schools of Rocky Mount; Harris Lindsay, Jr., a research chemical engineer, who resides in St. Louis, Missouri; Warren Aiken, a research physicist at the Rocket Center, West Virginia; four grandchildren; three brothers and two sisters of Atlanta and Cartersville, Georgia.

After laboring tirelessly for many years in the Lord's vineyard, Harris Lindsay Hendricks was ready for the summons:

"Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest."—Matthew 11: 28.

WILLIAM LEMUEL CLEGG

1902 — 1961

William Lemuel Clegg was born in Cleveland County, North Carolina, October 21, 1902, and he was called to his Heavenly Home November 18, 1961. He lived, walked and talked with us for fifty-nine years. I first met him on the campus of Duke University in the fall of 1924, and for thirty-seven years I had close association with him, first as a student and later as a colleague and brother in our Methodist ministry.



Brother Clegg had a noble heritage. His father, Mark Bynum Clegg, was a faithful Methodist preacher, and I have often heard Brother Clegg tell of the spiritual influences of his parents and grand-parents upon his life. Lemuel Clegg was a worthy representative of good and noble forebears and of their honored traditions. The Clegg family in the years to come can always point with pride to this worthy son who added additional distinction to a noble family and tradition.

W. L. Clegg experienced a divine call to the Methodist ministry. He came to Trinity College in 1920 planning to enter the Legal profession, but while on the campus the call to the ministry became so real to him that he changed his program. He was graduated from Trinity College in 1924, and in 1927 enrolled in the Divinity School of Duke University.

Brother Clegg became a member of our North Carolina Conference in 1924, and during the past thirty-seven years served the following appointments: Aulander, Garner, Maxton, Bethel, Asbury; Durham; district superintendent of the Elizabeth City and Fayetteville districts; Front Street; Burlington, district superintendent of the Durham

District, Hayes-Barton: Raleigh, and his final appointment before being called to his Heavenly Home was the district superintendency of our Burlington District.

I feel that the best way to describe the ministry of Brother Clegg in our North Carolina Conference is to say that he was a Conference man. He believed in historic connectional Methodism, which really means that we preachers are brethren *together* in a Conference program instead of being independent, isolated, individual preachers, ministering to independent, isolated, individual Methodist congregations. He understood that the genius of Methodism has been our family spirit, our ability to march as an army in the cause of righteousness.

This characteristic of Brother Clegg was shown in so many ways. As a young preacher he thought of the basic needs of the older preachers, and under his leadership our North Carolina Conference adopted the Ministers' Retirement Fund which has meant so much to our brethren at the time of retirement. Brother Clegg also knew that higher education had always been a cornerstone in Methodism. He therefore led in the crusade by which our North Carolina Conference founded two new Methodist colleges and strengthened Louisburg College. At the time of his death he was serving as a member of the Board of Trustees of Duke University and The Methodist College. When the Church Extension program was launched in 1951 in our North Carolina Conference, Brother Clegg was serving one of our large city churches, Front Street Church, Burlington, and this congregation was involved in a building program and faced financial problems. This pastor could very easily have said that because of these two reasons Front Street Church would be unable to assist in the Conference Church Extension program. Instead, however, he led that noble congregation in the connectional Church Extension program of our North Carolina Conference. Brother Clegg's belief in connectional Methodism caused him to oppose all tendencies toward a status quo North Carolina Conference. He led in the movement to create two new districts in our Conference, and was serving one of these new districts when he was summoned to his reward. I need not continue with other illustrations. The ministry of Brother Clegg was dominated by his belief in connectional Methodism, which really means for us preachers thinking about others instead of ourselves.

The talents of Brother Clegg were early recognized by his brethren, and he was elected to serve as a delegate to our General Conferences. The first was the General Conference of 1938 of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; the last was the General Conference of 1960 of The Methodist Church. He was five times a delegate to the Southern Jurisdictional Conference. I served with Brother Clegg from 1956-1960 on the General Conference Commission to Study the Jurisdictional System, and I followed with personal interest the leadership of Brother Clegg in making possible a final report that retained and strengthened our Jurisdictional system. I shall ever be happy that I was presiding at the General Conference of 1960 on the day when Brother Clegg was elected on the first ballot a member of the Judicial Council of The Methodist Church, which is the Supreme Court of the Methodism. This election by lay and clerical delegates representing all the annual conferences of Methodism in America and abroad shows the high respect in which W. L. Clegg was held in World Methodism.

This faithful servant of the Church was a good preacher. He had a firm and convincing grasp of the fundamentals of the Christian faith. In his sermons he took these familiar beliefs and made them winsome and appealing by a freshness of approach, and originality of presentation, and aptness of illustration. It was the human interest quality of his preaching that led adults and youth to hear him gladly.

His preaching did not stop at the pulpit, for some of his finest work was done in the pastoral relationship which he shared unstintingly with others. When men found life bleak and forbidding, Brother Clegg brought to them brightness and beauty, courage and faith, and led them to a happier way through Jesus Christ. When life's sorrows, often deep and piercing, overwhelmed men with appalling suffering, Brother Clegg knew how to enfold them to his heart and through confidence in the triumphant Christ to transmute sorrow into the sober joy of the convinced Christian. People who sought him out as counsellor always departed renewed and strengthened in spirit. Brother Clegg not only preached Christ, but in all his personal relationships presented Jesus to men by tactful words and living example.

On August 26, 1925, the Clegg home was established when Lemuel Clegg and Dorothy Konoy were married. Lem and Dorothy, as they have always been called by their friends, were wonderful Christian parents to their three children: William Lemuel, Jr., who was called to his Heavenly Home in 1939; Dorothy Louise, the wife of Brother Lyle E. Harper, a minister of the Baltimore Conference; and David, now with his mother in the home.

There are so many other things that I would like to write about Brother Clegg, but he would prefer that the memoir be brief. There is, however, one scripture passage which I must mention: "In my Father's House are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you." Since these are the words of our Saviour, we need not question today the doctrine of immortality. Brother Clegg as a young man placed his life in the hand of our Saviour, and our Saviour walked and talked with Brother Clegg during his earthly days, and we know that in the world beyond he continues to live in continual contact with our Saviour. People like ourselves, even in the hour of sorrow, when we lose our cherished loved ones, need not raise the question of immortality, for our Saviour said, "I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth in me, though he were dead yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die."

Nearly two hundred years ago Charles Wesley, the great poet of Methodism, wrote: "God buries the workman but carries on the work." I know that the message of Brother Clegg for us today is that we his loved ones, friends and colleagues dedicate ourselves anew to the unfinished task before us. My sincere prayer is that the fundamental principle which he held so sacred, a world brotherhood dominated by the life and message of our Saviour Jesus Christ, will be kept bright and clear in all our works of faith and labours of love.

EDGAR MILTON HALL

1872 — 1961

Edgar Milton Hall was born May 20, 1872, in Fairmont, West Virginia. He was the son of Ashbel G. and Mattie Williamson Hall. His mother died when he was quite young. His father remarried. His stepmother was a staunch Methodist and his father a devout Presbyterian.



As a young man he was very active in the Epworth League in Fairmont Methodist Church. During revival services he did counseling work with those who came forward to make decisions for Christ.

He attended high school in Fairmont and was a student at West Virginia State Normal School. He graduated from West Virginia Wesleyan College at Buchanan, West Virginia, in 1899. He attended Allegheny College at Meadville, Pennsylvania, where he met Ella Belinda Lovell, whom he married on June 21, 1905. His father's serious illness required him to withdraw from Allegheny College to assume the responsibility of his father's business.

Upon the death of his father, he enrolled in the International YMCA College at Springfield, Massachusetts. After graduation he was assigned as General Secretary of the YMCA in Newport News, Virginia. In 1911 he was transferred to Raleigh, North Carolina, as the first

General Secretary of the newly organized Raleigh YMCA.

While serving the YMCA post he was teacher of the Norman Bible Class of Edenton Street Methodist Church.

He joined the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church in November, 1918. Pastorates served included Benson, Zebulon, Raleigh (Epworth), Lillington, Southport, Kenly, Grifton, and Cary. He retired from the active work in 1944, and made his home at 415 Morrison Avenue, in Raleigh.

Brother Hall continued to serve the church even in retirement. When Dr. Howard P. Powell was seriously hurt in an automobile accident shortly after coming as pastor of Edenton Street Methodist Church, Brother Hall assumed many of the pastoral duties, visiting the sick, filling the pulpit, and conducting the Wednesday evening prayer services.

In 1947, Brother Hall was appointed Chaplain of the Senate of the General Assembly of North Carolina.

He was a Scottish Rite Mason, 32nd degree, and a member of Hiram Lodge Number 40, A.F. & A.M. In 1929 he was Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina.

In 1949 he suffered a stroke, from which he recovered quite well. He was somewhat a shut-in until he passed away on November 23, 1961. He bore his confinement with superb cheerfulness and good humor, always thanking God for the many blessings he enjoyed.

Brother Hall is survived by his wife, Ella L. Hall, and two sons, Dr. John L. Hall, a chemist at North Carolina State College, and Dr. Edgar M. Hall, Jr., a physician in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Funeral services were held on Saturday, November 25, 1961. The officiating ministers were Dr. Howard P. Powell, the Rev. Ernest C. Durham, and the Rev. Graham S. Eubank, district superintendent of the Raleigh District. Burial was in Montlawn, with Masonic Rites.

JOHN DUNCAN ASBURY AUTRY

1905 — 1961

John D. A. Autry was born May 28, 1905, in Cumberland County at Goodwin, North Carolina, the son of Roberson and Nancy Autry, who were staunch citizens of their community and leaders in the church. The name given their son reflects their love for Methodism, for he was named for three bishops of The Methodist Church.

After graduating from college John Autry taught in the public schools of North Carolina for some years and was admitted to membership in the North Carolina Conference in 1940. Two years later he was ordained deacon and received elders orders in 1944. He was married on May 30, 1933, to Miss Clara Williams of Fallston, N. C., who survives him.

For twenty-one years John D. A. Autry served faithfully and effectively the following charges in the North Carolina Conference: Avon, three years; LaGrange, eight years; Richlands, five years; Fairmont, two years, and was serving his fourth year at First Church in Hamlet at the time of his death.

The fine leadership of this devoted Methodist preacher was demonstrated wherever he served. After the church at LaGrange had been partially destroyed by fire he led the congregation in the building of a beautiful new structure there. On that same charge, educational facilities were built at Bethel, Hickory Grove, and Trinity churches, and at Haw Branch, Gum Branch on the Richlands Charge. In all these churches the sanctuaries were redecoreated and improved.



A new educational building was completed at Fairmont during his administration there. At the time of his death a beautiful new educational building at Hamlet was under construction.

After a fruitful Sunday, December 10, 1961, as he led the Hamlet congregation in preparation for Christmas, Brother Autry died in his parsonage home in Hamlet. Funeral services were held at First Methodist Church in Hamlet on December 12, 1961. The officiating ministers were the Reverend M. C. Dunn, superintendent of the Fayetteville District, Dr. T. B. Hough of Lumberton, and Dr. J. E. Garlington of Clinton. His body was laid to rest in Lafayette Memorial Park in Fayetteville.

The following quotation from an editorial in a Kinston newspaper is an illustration of the esteem in which this good minister was held wherever he lived and served: "The sudden death in Hamlet of the Reverend John D. A. Autry takes from North Carolina one of the ablest ministers ever to serve the Church in this section. The work of the churches reached a new peak under his leadership. Impetus gained by the various congregations is still being felt in a continuing program of spiritual service throughout the region."

One of his brother preachers spoke for all who knew him when he said, "His innate goodness was reflected in his countenance and it made people feel better just to be in his presence." Not only was one made to feel better by his presence, but one was always made better by the power of his contagious goodness. He was one of the closest friends this writer ever had. It was my good privilege to be with him and to assist him in evangelistic services in every charge he served. Only last October, we were together in his revival at Hamlet. In every sense of the word, he was the good shepherd of his people, including all ages. The little children loved him. At 7 o'clock in the morning during that revival week, his interest in his young people and his love for them drew 65 of them to a service each day before school hours.

Evangelism was the passion of his ministry. Three young men from LaGrange Charge will ever remember him as the minister of Christ who led them to a decision for the ministry. A Methodist deaconess was called to fulltime Christian service under his ministry. Scores were brought to Christ by him. Soldier of Christ, well done. We know that you were

One who never turned his back but marched breast forward,

Never doubted clouds would break,

Never dreamed, though right were worsted, wrong would triumph,

Held we fall to rise, are baffled to fight better,

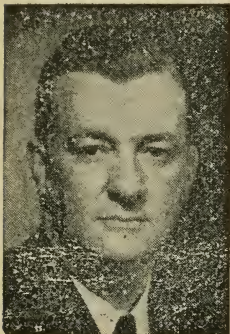

JAMES FURMAN HERBERT

1895 — 1962

On the morning of June 18th, as his brother preachers were leaving to gather at their annual conference, James Furman Herbert was called by "the Shepherd and Bishop of our souls" to an appointment in the conference eternal. It was fitting that his transfer should come on such a day, for he was bred and nurtured in the Methodist ministry. His great-grandfather, Thomas Herbert, himself a travelling preacher, gave three sons to this calling; and each of these sent a son into the full-time service of the church: James Furman in the North Carolina Conference, R. Bryce in South Carolina, and Chesley C., Jr., in the Western North Carolina Conference.



On his mother's side he came from forebears as dedicated and distinguished in another branch of the church. His great-grandfather, Dr. Richard Furman, was founder of Furman University; and his great-grandfather, Dr. James C. Furman, the first president of that Baptist institution. Thus two traditions of piety merged in him to produce an able and devoted servant of Christ and His Church when he was born in Florence, S. C., on July 2, 1895, to the Reverend Walter I. and Constance Furman Herbert.

He trained for his work at Wofford College, Emory University, the University of Chicago, and Garrett Biblical Institute, receiving the B.D. degree from the latter. In 1919, while a student, he was licensed as a local preacher in the Methodist Church. During his seminary years in Chicago he began his ministry, serving as pastor to two congregations which he brought together into the Austin Congregational Church. Also in these years he met Ruth Elizabeth Utiger, and they were married on June 27, 1926. To them God gave four children: Constance Kennison, David Furman, Walter Frederick, and Anne Elizabeth.

In 1928 he joined the North Carolina Conference at its meeting in Wilson and received his first appointment to Central Church, Raleigh. There followed pastorates at Roxboro, Rockingham, and Grace Church in Wilmington. In 1945, characteristically seeking to grow in knowledge and usefulness, he took sabbatical leave to attend New York University. While studying there he served student pastorates in Jersey City and Brooklyn; and, in line with his ecumenical interest, was also executive secretary of the Paterson Area of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. Returning to active service in the conference in 1948, he was pastor at First Church, Roanoke Rapids, then superintendent of the Rocky Mount District, whence he went as pastor to Morehead City in 1956. Declining health required him to retire from this work in 1959; and the family settled at Chapel Hill, in the atmosphere of learning that was congenial to him. There, in the nearby cemetery of Orange Church, he was buried on June 20, 1962.

It was said of a certain scholar that he "possessed the facts but not the phosphorescence of learning." So these facts give in brief outline an account of our brother's earthly career; but they do not transmit the glow that remains with those who have known and loved him. Staunch comrade of the way, ever-thoughtful friend, even in the days of his own weakness he continued to gladden their hearts with gracious acts of kindness and affection. Clear in his conviction that the gospel must be brought to bear upon the whole life, he gave inspiration and strength to his fellow-preachers and contributed much to the widening and deepening of the church's insight and concern. To the end his thought and loyalty were given to the church and his brethren. A few days before his transfer he said to his doctor: "A Methodist preacher has two great affiliations: one with his wife, the other with his conference. My conference convenes on the 18th. Is there any chance of my going?" So he did go: to make his report and receive his appointment at the Great Conference in that better country for which he had looked and lived.

What his report was we know; for he made it when he preached the memorial sermon at the conference of 1958. Using as a text Goodspeed's translation of II Timothy 4:7, "I have had a part in the great contest," he spoke for himself as well as for his brethren who had gone before. The burden of his message was, not that he had had a great part, but that he had had a part in a great contest. With that he could be content to report to his Master. And the part he had summons and strengthens us who remain to take our part.

She was also associated with Memorial Hospital, Johnson City, Tennessee, in her later years and worked there until her retirement.

Mrs. Ethel Crouch Mercer met the Reverend Saul E. Mercer while both were vacationing at Lake Junaluska. Both of them being Methodists and very active, they had many mutual interests. After the Reverend Saul E. Mercer was appointed to serve the Washington District as Presiding Elder, as it was then called, they were married December 12, 1925, in Nashville, Tennessee, by Dr. J. L. Mrs. Holmes was reared in a devout Christian home, and early in life became an active member of Bethel Church which she loved and served as occasion permitted throughout her entire life. She held dear the missionary society and its objects, also other phases of the Christian service program. She was a church attendant as often as her health and other factors permitted until after she passed her ninetieth birthday.

Mrs. Holmes joined her husband as a faithful pastor's wife as together they served churches in Halifax, Vance, Granville, Alamance, Orange and Chatham counties. They were most fortunate in having a family that has been active in the educational and business life of our State. Mrs. Holmes gave unreservedly of herself to assist her husband in every possible way in his ministerial work and to her family as they grew into responsible citizens to take their places of leadership in the church, educational and business life of our State.

Since the death of her husband, Mrs. Holmes spent the closing years of her life at the old Holmes homestead near Graham, N. C., surrounded by loving children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and many thoughtful and helpful relatives and friends. To the very end she was blessed with an alertness of mind and body which very few are privileged to have for one of her age. She retained a bright outlook upon life and remained youthful in spirit to the very end. Her life was certainly a benediction to all who knew her as a mother in a home, a neighbor in the community and a helpful pastor's wife in the parsonage.

Mr. and Mrs. Baines moved to Whaleyville, Va., soon after their marriage and transferred their membership to the Wesley's Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church, South, where they remained until 1903 when Mr. Baines received his license to preach and was given his first episcopal appointment.

From 1903-1947 Mrs. Baines followed where duty called. Her kind and cheerful personality, her dedicated life, her devotion to her family, and concern for the Kingdom-work endeared her to those to whom they were called to minister.

After retirement in 1947 they moved to a farm in Pasquotank County near Elizabeth City, N. C., and transferred their membership to Newbegun Methodist Church January 21, 1947. Mrs. Baines was very active in church and community life until age and declining health prevented. Still her concern and her prayers were ever with the church she loved.

SECTION V

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

BURLINGTON DISTRICT

E. L. HILLMAN, *District Superintendent*

Following the sudden and untimely death of Dr. W. L. Clegg, Bishop Paul N. Garber appointed me to serve the Burlington District as Superintendent for the remaining months of the Conference year. Dr. Clegg had underway a most constructive and comprehensive program for the District and was giving effective and dedicated leadership. I deem it a privilege to have had a part in completing the task he had so ably begun.

Under the supervision of Mr. James F. Rogers, District Lay Leader, and his associates, the lay activities have been most helpful to the work of the churches. Brother Rogers completes his administration as District Lay Leader with the termination of this Conference year. He has rendered faithful and effective service and is held in high esteem by his co-laborers in the District.

Forty-three new members have been enrolled in the \$10 Club, and there are twenty-eight chartered Methodist Men's Clubs doing an excellent work. The most important event has been the experience of the United Christian Witness. Here the laymen, laywomen, and ministers participated in this glorious task of bringing many people into the Church of Christ for service in His kingdom. Four hundred seventy-six members have been received on profession of faith; 288 were received from other Methodist churches; 142 transferred from other denominations; 118 infants have been baptized. The total church membership numbers 20,254; and the church school enrollment totals 15,667. The cost of new church buildings completed amounts to \$130,000. Those under construction cost \$143,900.

Davis Street Church and the Educational Building in Burlington were dedicated, First Church, Graham, was dedicated, with appropriate services.

In Sanford Jonesboro Heights congregation is building a new sanctuary, and Steele Street Church is changing its location to build a new sanctuary and education building.

The work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service is progressing in a fine way under the leadership of Mrs. J. E. Davis, district president, and other district officers. It shows growth in all its area of activity. Excellent reports have been made by the presidents of the local Woman's Society of Christian Service in the Quarterly Conferences throughout the district. No better work is being done in our churches today than that which is rendered by the loyal and faithful women.

The District MYF is steadily moving onward with its program of varied interests and activities.

I consider it a privilege to have worked with the ministers and laymen of the Burlington District in this work of Christ and His Church.

DURHAM DISTRICT

C. D. BARCLIFT, *District Superintendent*

The good reports on the Durham District are made possible by the faithful work of the 58 dedicated pastors, their associates, and the 23,427 loyal laymen.

Membership and Evangelism. Reports to date (May 8) show that 517 members have been received on profession of faith and 781 by transfer, a net gain of 527. There have been 228 infants baptized.

New Church. On October 8, 1961, a new church with 53 members was organized

in the Parkwood section of the Research Triangle. The church will be known as Parkwood Church.

Circuits Divided. As of the 1962 Annual Conference the following circuits will be divided:

Orange Circuit: Each of the two churches, Chestnut Ridge and Hebron, will become a station charge and Hebron Church will be transferred to the Burlington District.

Union Grove Circuit: Each of the two churches, Cedar Grove (Chatham County) and Union Grove, will become a station charge.

Christian Education. The church school enrollment is 15,848, a small increase over the previous year. The average attendance is 8,936. Christian Workers' Schools have been held at Bahama, Durham, Oxford, and Roxboro. There was a large attendance at the district-wide Youth Rally held in University Church, Chapel Hill. Practically all of the 86 churches conducted vacation church schools.

Lay Activities. There are twenty-five Methodist Men's Clubs in the district, including a new organization at Oak Grove in Person County, and St. Paul Church, Durham. There were 954 present at the Laymen's Rally held in February. The need for lay speakers in the No Silent Pulpit program grows less each year in this district, but those who have the opportunity to participate render effective service.

Woman's Society of Christian Service. There are seventy-seven Woman's Societies of Christian Service. A new society has been organized at Parkwood Church with twenty-one members. The district society has sent \$2,000.00 to the Jesse Lee Home in Alaska to be designated as a scholarship fund for a Jesse Lee boy or girl at Alaska Methodist University. There has been a small increase in membership and, again, the women have increased their pledge to missions and their contributions to supply work.

New Buildings. The following is a progress report on building projects during the conference year: The first unit of the new churches at Glendale Heights and Wellon Village, the educational building at Epworth Church, the fellowship hall at Cedar Grove Church, Chatham County, and the parsonage at McMannen's Chapel Church have been completed. The first unit of the new church at Bethesda, the fellowship halls at Merritts and Union Grove Churches, and the educational wing at Mt. Tirzah Church are under construction. Construction will begin soon on the sanctuaries at Aldersgate, Durham, and Hebron Churches, and the educational buildings at Duke Memorial and Salem Churches. A new parsonage has been purchased for Parkwood Church and one for the Lea's Chapel-Warren's Grove Charge. An educational building is in the planning stage for Allensville, Mt. Pleasant, Carrboro, and Duke's Chapel Churches.

It has been both a privilege and pleasure to serve as district superintendent on the Durham District for the past six years. Not all the progress that has been made in the different areas of the work of the kingdom can be tabulated, statistically reported, nor detailed in writing. But much has been accomplished and out of this new growth other achievements will follow. My gratitude abounds for the cooperation, faithfulness, and friendship of the ministers and laymen, alike.

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

R. L. JEROME, *District Superintendent*

With profound gratitude to God for permitting me to work with the 16,000 members, 87 churches, and 42 pastors of the Elizabeth City District, which covers a large area of historic northeastern North Carolina, I take pleasure in recording some of the accomplishments of our faithful pastors and loyal laymen for the year. Fifteen of the pastors came to our district this year, and they and the others have worked harmoniously with our consecrated lay people in all phases of our program. Our parsonage families have rejoiced in the addition of six new babies born during the year, and a

baby was born to our lay missionaries in Korea, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Theis. Our District Conference in Manteo was a highlight of our year when weather, attendance, reports, and speakers were excellent. Two charges, Dare and Roper, plan to divide next year, and other charge changes are planned that will affect Brite Meadows, Pasquotank, and Union.

Membership and Evangelism: Thirty-two of our pastors attended the Conference on Evangelism at Louisburg and returned to promote the United Witness program and conduct 69 revivals. As a result of their labors and the cooperation of the laymen they have received (through May 1) 685 into the church, 299 of these on profession of faith, with a net gain of 225, and have baptized 129 babies. The pastors have reported over 24,000 pastoral visits.

Education: Our reports show that we have 10,867 enrolled in our church schools, 1416 enrolled in 55 Methodist Youth Fellowship groups, and 2913 enrolled in 61 Vacation schools. Holly Grove Church on the Columbia charge has started a new Sunday school with 22 charter members. Our survey shows that we have seven Outpost Church Schools planned. We have had three Christian Workers' Schools, a District Youth Rally, Workshops, Institutes, and other meetings planned by our Conference agencies. Our people have paid into the College Campaign over \$226,000, which is about 65% of the amount pledged. We have 412 subscribers to the *N. C. Christian Advocate*, 253 to *Together*, 131 to *World Outlook*, and 1,400 to the *District News*.

Lay Activities: The laymen of the district are loyal supporters of the church program. Led by John N. Turner, the lay leader, and his associates, the laymen have sent out 100 lay speakers to fill 165 No Silent Pulpit engagements and turned out 400 strong for our District Lay Rally at Hertford. We have 14 organized groups of Methodist Men with 450 members, and we hope to increase this number next year. This year we will have 48 churches putting on the Every Member Visitation in preparation for the new church year.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Although our District president, Mrs. J. R. Bryant, has been sick, other officers have carried on the work in an effective manner. We have 77 societies with 2,643 members plus four Wesleyan Service Guilds with 127 members. The subdistrict and district meetings have been well attended. Our District has received the Study Jewel in recognition of the number of study classes held. Elizabeth City is looking forward to entertaining the Annual Meeting of the WSCS next year.

Finances: Our achievements in church finance are modest when compared to other districts, but our people with limited means are making definite progress. A number of our churches will increase the amount paid to their pastors next year, these increases amounting to about \$7,000. Not all of our charges will make increases on World Service and Conference Benevolences, but so far 23 have committed themselves to increases amounting to \$4,212. Others are yet to be heard from. Our advance specials sent to the Theises in Korea amount to \$2,029.

Building Projects: We have various building projects either under construction or in the planning stage. Their estimated cost is \$341,805, cash raised this year on these projects amounting to \$97,385. A new sanctuary is under construction at Avon. Improvements have been made at Asbury, Bath, Stumpy Point, First Church, Elizabeth City, Columbia, Engelhard, Plymouth, South Mills, and Wanchese.

New educational buildings are planned for Bethany and Anderson on the Chowan charge, Mann's Harbor, Hertford. A new building has already been built at Avon, and one is under construction at Savage on the North Gates charge. The Oak Grove Church on the Perquimans charge has almost liquidated its debt on a building constructed last year. A new heating unit has been installed at McBride on the South Mills charge.

New parsonages are planned for Ahoskie, Asbury, Currituck, Perquimans, and possibly Ocracoke. The Washington Circuit is buying the equity of Asbury in the circuit parsonage. Extensive changes and improvements have been made on the parsonage at Stumpy Point, and minor improvements have been made to 10 others.

Our churches have paid on church debts this year the sum of \$36,782.

FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

MILLARD C. DUNN, *District Superintendent*

The good preachers, laymen and laywomen of the Fayetteville District have been busy about their Father's business. It is a great privilege to make this report on their behalf.

Membership and Evangelism: Additions on profession of faith, 635, by transfer and otherwise, 751, make a total of 1,386 additions. We have had removed by transfer, death and Quarterly Conference action 680. During the year 292 babies have been baptized.

Under the capable leadership of our District Secretary of Evangelism, the Reverend Chester J. Andrews, our district has cooperated with both the General and Conference Boards of Evangelism in the United Witness, and Outpost Church School Endeavors.

Christian Education: We have carried out, to the best of our knowledge, the program of Christian Education as directed by the Conference and General Boards of Education. Christian Workers' Schools have been held in each of our four subdistricts. Under the leadership of Mrs. J. W. Page, Vacation Church School Institutes were held in Page Memorial Methodist Church, Aberdeen, N. C., and in Hay Street Methodist Church in Fayetteville, N. C. Subdistrict groups are very active. Vacation Church Schools were held in practically all of our 101 churches.

Buildings and Improvements: Great strides have been made in the construction of new buildings, and in improving our present buildings. Without exception all of the 63 charges in the Fayetteville District are either in a building program, have just finished one, or are making plans to begin one. Among the outstanding are: Haymount Methodist Church, Fayetteville, who has just begun a \$300,000 auditorium; Trinity, Red Springs, moved into their beautiful and most worshipful auditorium; First Church, Hamlet; Trinity, Troy; Page Memorial, Biscoe; and Laurel Hill, all have built new educational plants. Hoffman, under the leadership of the pastor, J. W. Scott, completely renovated their auditorium which included new pews and furnishings.

New parsonages have been built at Southern Pines, Maxton, and Victory. The South River Charge, under the leadership of F. J. Duplissey, has begun a building program at each of the three churches.

Finances: Our churches reported having raised for all purposes: (budget, building fund, church school, Methodist Men, WSCS, MYF, Boy Scouts, etc.) the amount of \$1,309,257.

At this writing one-half of the charges in the Fayetteville District have increased the pastor's salary by \$12,900.00. More than 90 percent of the charges have accepted their Benevolent askings.

The dedicated laymen and ministers of the Fayetteville District are to be congratulated on their second mile giving. For the various specials we gave: Advance Specials \$11,669.44; Church School Rally Day \$2,402.83; Fellowship of Suffering and Service \$2,079.27; Methodist TV \$411.42; Race Relations \$536.23; One Great Hour of Sharing \$1,109.49; Methodist Retirement Homes \$2,193.95; Methodist Student Day \$461.66; Thanksgiving offering \$1,166.83. This second mile giving amounts to \$22,031.11.

Lay Activities: Mr. Raymond E. (Buddy) Luper, our district lay leader, and his associates have given to our district efficient and consecrated leadership. One hundred and fifty speakers under their direction carried out a very effective "No Silent Pulpit" program. Our Lay Rally at Hay Street was most successful with approximately 1,000 in attendance.

Our laymen responded to the "Knock on Every Door" campaign by visiting 9,949 homes. 1,625 of them participated in the prayer program. More than 1600 prospects were found.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: The Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild provide information, education and inspiration to not only the mission causes of our church but to many areas of social concern and the Spiritual Life of the church and its members. Again this year we are indebted to Mrs. H. R.

Odom and her fine staff for the wonderful record achieved among our women. We shall always be grateful to Mrs. Odom for her devoted Christian leadership and at the same time offer to the new president, Mrs. J. S. Hiatt, our support and prayers.

THE GOLDSBORO DISTRICT

M. W. LAWRENCE, *District Superintendent*

Fifty-nine pastors and more than 20,000 faithful laymen have given a good account of themselves this year and have made an unusually fine record.

Membership and Evangelism: The district was almost 100% in its participation in the United Witness for Christ. Added to our churches have been 701 by profession of faith in Christ and 632 by transfer, making a total of 1,329 for a net gain of 636 as compared with 344 the year before. 214 babies have been baptized.

Education: 17,474 are enrolled in our church school, making a net gain of 582 as compared with 381 the previous year. Outpost church schools are being organized in the Goldsboro area. More than 75 vacation church schools were held. 38 churches have pledged \$1,771 on the 1% Plan for the education of our preachers.

Lay Activities: Under the guidance of Robert C. Rose and his associates many groups of The Twelve have been organized, more and more churches are using the Every Member Visitation with good results, and the total lay program is moving forward.

Missions: The total missionary program is supported; 53 new members to the Ten Dollar Club; three bicycles given to the Methodist ministers in Poland. Under the leadership of Mrs. C. M. Pate, the Woman's Society of Christian Service has added many new members, increased its pledge, and supported the program of the Church.

Building and Improvements: The district has made remarkable strides in providing better facilities for worship and study and for its ministers. Buildings valued at \$831,000 have been completed or are under construction. Over \$300,000 have been paid on these buildings and on indebtedness.

The parsonages at St. Paul and Clinton have been renovated, and five new parsonages have been completed: Lucama (\$14,000), Smithfield (\$35,000), Browning-Smith (\$15,000), Hopewell-Mt. Moriah (\$18,000), and New Hope (\$14,000). The parsonages at Smithfield, Browning-Smith and the district parsonage are ready to be dedicated. The Stantonsburg parsonage, valued at \$29,500, was dedicated November 12, 1961.

Bishop Paul N. Garber was in the district on February 11 to dedicate the sanctuary at Providence and the John M. Mitchell educational building at Pine Forest, and to open formally the beautiful sanctuary at St. Luke.

Seven educational buildings have been completed: Wallace (\$100,000), Ebenezer (Newton Grove Charge) (\$17,000), Jefferson (\$15,000), Kenly (\$22,000), Bethel (Beston-Bethel Charge) (\$14,000), New Hope (\$65,000), and Hickory Grove (\$24,000). The building at Hickory Grove was dedicated June 10, 1962. Three rooms were added at Brogden and six at St. Luke. Selma is enlarging and modernizing her educational building at a cost of \$50,000.

Three sanctuaries have been completed: St. Luke (\$105,000), Fellowship (\$35,000), and Sanders' Chapel (\$40,000). A \$40,000 sanctuary is under construction at Faison, and First Church, Clinton, is enlarging its sanctuary at a cost of \$125,000.

New parsonages are planned for Brogden and LaGrange; new educational buildings at St. Paul, Mount Olive, Pikeville; a new sanctuary at West Smithfield, and Airboro will begin her first unit within a few weeks.

The acceptance on World Service and Benevolences is 100% for next year and the Charges have increased the pastors' salaries by more than \$13,000. It has been a good year, and it is a privilege and a joy to work with these fine ministers and laymen.

NEW BERN DISTRICT

A. JARVIS HOBBS, *District Superintendent*

Consecration, intelligent planning, and faithful service of our fifty-three pastors and 21,412 laymen have resulted in a most fruitful year in the New Bern District. Throughout the year we have witnessed a continuing increase of interest in the work of the several Commissions, and in all areas of the Church's program.

Membership and Evangelism: Following closely the plans outlined by our Conference Director of Evangelism, we succeeded in bringing into our churches 1,273 members, 590 on profession of faith, and 683 by transfer of letter. The net increase is 349. We baptized 273 infants.

Christian Education: Our church school leaders are becoming increasingly aware of the value of Christian Workers' Schools. At almost any place in the district our people will find one of these schools within reach. Church school membership has increased by 304. Offerings for all special days were taken. Also, we have participated in the program for church school outposts, and will continue on the alert to establish such outposts wherever possible.

Lay Activities: Our District Lay Leader, Roy L. Turnage, Jr., continues month after month to give intelligent and inspiring leadership for our 21,142 laymen. His sympathetic understanding of the needs and the opportunities of our laymen and our churches contributes mightily to our spiritual victories. With 200 certified lay speakers standing ready to witness for Christ, we have no silent pulpits during the period of Lent. The Every Member Visitation has become a regular part of the program of a large number of our local churches. We have fifty-one groups of Methodist Men.

Missions and Church Extension: The Woman's Society of Christian Service sets the pace; they always press forward with their work. Thus the women inspire the laymen to set high goals, and to reach them. Several churches support missionaries on the foreign field.

The \$10 Club membership has increased by 31. The Dover Charge will be divided, with each of the two churches—Dover and Lane's Chapel—becoming a station. Harkers Island leaves the Straits Charge, and will become a station.

Buildings and Improvements: Bayboro has completed a new sanctuary at a cost of \$32,000. Northwoods in Jacksonville has completed the first unit (\$50,000) in a great building program. Saint Peter's, formerly Camp Glenn, is well along on a \$79,000 unit being erected in Mitchell Village, Morehead City. This church will entertain the 1963 session of the District Conference.

Queen's Creek on the Hubert Charge has broken ground for a \$50,000 building. Trinity Church, New Bern, will soon begin the building of a \$65,000 sanctuary. Dover has a new parsonage valued at \$20,000; Lane's Chapel will complete a \$20,000 parsonage by June 28. Grifton has broken ground for a parsonage to cost \$21,500; Newport will erect a parsonage valued at \$28,000. Also, parsonages are planned for Bridgeton and Harkers Island.

We have paid on indebtedness \$198,014.

Seven Benevolences accepted: For the year 1962-63 the Benevolence acceptance is \$144,052, or \$2,110 in excess of the amount requested by the Conference.

Pastors' Salaries: Increase in pastors' salaries for the new year is \$13,072.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

GRAHAM S. EUBANK, *District Superintendent*

Methodism in the Raleigh District is truly an "endless line of splendor." The advance continues in almost every area of the life of the church. We believe that this advance is evidence of the deepening of the spiritual life of our people and the inspiring leadership of our pastors.

Membership and Evangelism: Pastors' reports to the Annual Conference this year will show the largest net increase in church membership of any year during my tenure as superintendent of the district. By May 1 we had received on profession of faith 750, by transfer from other Methodist churches 900, and from other denominations 335, making a gross increase of 2,035, for a net gain of 1,041 members. We expect our district total membership to be 29,000 when all reports have been made.

Some of the churches showing exceptional increases in membership are: Garner 145; First Church, Henderson 85; Edenton Street 223; Hayes Barton 136; St. James 76; Highland 138; Mamers 58; and White Plains, which was organized October 1, 80.

Christian Education: We have a total church school enrollment of 20,996 which is an increase of 732 over last year. Several subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools have been held, supplemented by schools in local churches. Vacation Church Schools were held in almost all of our churches. Most of the churches have had children, youth, and adults attending assemblies and camp programs. We have had two outstanding youth rallies during the year. One was held in Duke Chapel in the fall with over 600 young people in attendance.

Missions and Church Extension: We are happy to report that the Raleigh District is fourth among the districts in the Richmond Area in giving to general advance specials and that Edenton Street Church is fifth in The Methodist Church in giving to world missions. Schools of Missions have been held in most of the churches of the district. The Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild continue to increase their giving to missions. The membership of these organizations continue to grow and two new societies have been organized during the year. The Raleigh Board of Missions has made possible several new churches in the Raleigh area and continues to support the establishment of new churches to meet the needs of a growing population. A new project of the Board of Missions is the establishment of a Mission in East Raleigh. The Board has requested the Woman's Division to assign a deaconess to this work. Our pastors' reports show 108 new members of the \$10 Club. One new church, White Plains, has been organized in Cary. A site of six acres at the cost of \$9,000 has been purchased, and this new church has already raised more than \$3,000 to pay on the cost of the site.

Lay Activities: The laymen of the Raleigh District have been busy during the year. Due to the illness of Brother W. D. Payne, it was necessary to secure a new district lay leader. Mr. B. M. Fesmire was elected and has been very diligent and active in the program. Almost 900 men attended the district lay rally in February. The No Silent Pulpit program provided lay speakers for many of our churches making it possible for all of our churches to have morning services during Lent.

Building and Improvements: New buildings dedicated: Union Chapel educational building; Plank Chapel parsonage; Trinity (Franklin County) parsonage. The following churches in Raleigh have completed construction of their first units during the year: Wynnewood Park, cost \$46,000; St. James, cost \$61,000; Cokesbury, cost \$25,000. Trinity in Raleigh has completed a new educational building at a cost of \$63,000. Two new parsonages have been completed at St. James in Raleigh and Louisburg. New church at Macedonia, cost \$101,000.

Churches and educational buildings now under construction are Mt. Ariel on the Mamers Charge and Divine Street Church in Dunn. A new parsonage is under construction at Rehobeth in Vance County. One hundred fifty-seven thousand, six hundred twenty-three dollars has been raised for new church buildings and improvements. Forty-eight thousand dollars has been raised for new parsonages and parsonage improvements.

One hundred eighty thousand, nine hundred thirty dollars has been paid on indebtedness.

Stewardship: The churches of the Raleigh District are to be commended for the growth made in stewardship. It is in this area that we have probably made our greatest growth during my tenure on the district. Our district has accepted its apportionment on World Service and Conference Benevolences in full, totaling more than \$205,564. This represents an increase of forty per cent for these causes during this four-year period.

While the churches have been increasing their giving for these causes, they have not neglected the support of their pastors. Salaries have increased every year, and during this four-year period pastors' salaries have increased more than \$100,000 or fifty per cent. The 1958 Journal reports salaries and travel paid pastors during the year was \$207,625. Next year the pastors of the Raleigh District will receive from their charges over \$300,000.

Next year only one full-time non-student pastor will receive aid from the Minimum Salary Fund. All other full-time pastors will receive more than the conference minimum of \$4,000. The district superintendent expects to be able to report at our Annual Conference that all pastors of the district have reported all conference obligations paid in full.

All pledges made during the college capital funds campaign have not been paid, but on May 1, \$369,671 had been received in the campaign office.

These facts and highlights of a year's work are encouraging: yet, there are seeds to be sown and harvests to be reaped. We pray that during this conference session we may dedicate ourselves anew and reflect more perfectly the will of Christ for our lives in the coming year.

ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT

WALTER C. BALL, *District Superintendent*

I am honored to present this sixth consecutive report for the pastors and laymen and women of the Rocky Mount District.

Christian Education: Under the leadership of Reverend Grady Dawson as Director of general church school work and his dedicated and capable staff members, the program of Christian Education has moved forward most successfully. Leadership training, increased membership, outpost Sunday schools, work with the children and youth and adults have been stimulated and properly guided. Special help this year has come to us through two music workshops; the response of our people in attendance at these sessions has proven how important this work is. We are able to report that five outpost Sunday schools have been established in the district and that more than 2,000 new pupils have been added to our church school rolls.

Evangelism: Reverend W. J. Neese has led us this year as the District Director of Evangelism. Our people have cooperated fully in the Conference program "Knock on Every Door" with telling results. The information gained from the surveys and other valuable means were proved very efficient in continuing our work in this field. The churches have received into their membership by profession of faith and otherwise approximately 1,100 persons and approximately 200 babies have been baptized.

Missions and Church Extension: The special work of missions and church extension for our district has been guided by Reverend R. L. Crossno. We have been strengthened in all phases of missions and church extension. As a significant notation of what a local church can do to help new churches, I mention the membership of First Methodist Church in Wilson. These good people have assisted in money, time and leadership in

the Winstead Church. In the new West-Nash Church, now in its third year, First Church members will by the end of this Conference year have given approximately \$40,000.00 for the purchase of land and for the building of a new sanctuary which will be built this year.

Finance: We have been improving our per capita giving in the realm of Stewardship. Many of our people are finding by practice that the answer to the financial difficulties in their church is in Christian stewardship.

Christian Social Concerns: In the realm of Christian Social Concerns embracing Temperance, World Peace, and Social and Economic Relations, we have been led by Reverend Vance Lewis. This Commission is becoming well established in our churches, and reports at the Quarterly Conference are encouraging, as to the progress being made. Our people seem more interested than ever in striving to help all grow in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: All throughout the Rocky Mount District by the leadership of Miss Camille Staton and her devoted leaders, the Woman's Society of Christian Service is ever moving in the direction of good. We are most grateful to these good women who can always be depended upon to help in the full program of our Church.

Laymen: E. E. Adkins, with his six subdistrict leaders, have followed effectively the church program on lay activities. All phases of the work under them this year seems to have been strengthened. The rallies, the No Silent Pulpit program, special retreats and other ventures in Christian living have been successful.

Building and Repairs: It has been a very uplifting experience that during these six years in which I have served as superintendent of the Rocky Mount District that the faithful people have done a marvelous job in the building of new sanctuaries, new educational buildings, new parsonages, or the repairing and bringing up to a more usable state what they already have. More than 70 churches have been involved in this expansive program.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

CLYDE S. BOGGS, *District Superintendent*

The fine consecrated pastors, the wonderful laymen and lovely laywomen are due credit for the forward movement of the district. It has been an inspirational experience to serve as their superintendent. The district staff has been of inestimable value in leading us to accomplish the signal tasks of the year.

Education: The Reverend Frank Salmon has guided us toward a well-rounded program in this phase of the work. Many of our church schools will be sponsoring outpost schools during the year. Our youth are also rallying to help in their field. The Educational Committee has given the guidance we needed.

Evangelism: The Reverend Paul Browning has kept ever before us the goals of evangelism. Our rally at Whiteville was an exhilarating experience. Eight hundred eighty-two people have been added to the church rolls—389 on profession of faith; 493 by certificates and transfers. We have a gain of 798.

Stewardship and Finance: The laymen of the district have guided us in this phase of our work. We express to them our deep feeling of praise. Wade Pierce, our district leader, has been willing and ready to aid us. Wade and his staff led us in the lay rallies in Wilmington and Lumberton. Many people have expressed their appreciation of the No Silent Pulpit. Thank you, laymen, very much. Two new Methodist Men's Clubs have been organized.

Benevolences: Many of our churches increased their benevolent giving. Some have felt the necessity of decreasing their giving; others are holding steady.

Missions and Church Extension: A. P. Hill has given information and vision in this movement. The district has spent \$150,088.00 on new buildings and repairs. Prospect

has almost completed its educational building. Many of our churches are planning new educational units and others are repairing and renovating their sanctuaries. Hallsboro and Rocky Point have new educational units started. New churches are planned at Sharon and Shallotte Circuit and at Lake Waccamaw. Rowland is building a new parsonage. The estimated cost is \$25,000.00. It will be ready in the fall. Wrightsboro is planning to build a new unit. They are buying a parsonage. Pine Valley has organized and moved into their new church.

Christian Social Concerns: The Reverend Paul Boone is District Secretary. Our youth were well represented at the Tri-District Rally at Clinton.

Christian Vocations: The Reverend W. C. Teachey is District Secretary. Our Tri-District Rally at Clinton brought together over 700 young folk.

**REPORT OF APPROVED SUPPLY PASTORS' SCHOOL
DUKE UNIVERSITY**

The Duke Supply Pastors' School is one of several schools conducted by the Methodist Church for clergymen who are required to take the Methodist Course of Study. Under the joint sponsorship of the Department of In-service Training, General Board of Education, the Southeastern Jurisdiction, and the Duke Divinity School, this school is held each summer on the West Campus of Duke University for a period of approximately four weeks. Beginning in the summer of 1949 with an enrollment of 20 the school has grown in size to an average of more than 200. The total enrollment in 1961 was 241. In the early years practically all students came from the two annual conferences in North Carolina, but in the sessions since 1954 an increasing number of representatives from other conferences have been enrolled. In 1961 the following conferences were represented by the number of students indicated:

The Course of Study: The Introductory Studies and the Studies for the First, Second, Third and Fourth Years are offered each year. A student may complete in one session either the Introductory Studies or one year of the main course. The text materials are the books approved by the General Conference of 1960.

The Faculty: The instructors are chosen from the faculties of Duke University and other church-related institutions. Special lecturers and visiting preachers are selected from nearby Methodist Conferences.

Plans for the 1962 School

The fourteenth Supply Pastors' School is scheduled for the period, July 16-August 10, 1962. The faculty will be composed of Boyd Daniels, Frederick Herzog, O. Kelly Ingram, W. A. Kale, Creighton Lacy, F. Joseph Mitchell, Robert T. Osborne, James H. Phillips, John J. Rudin, Gunter F. Sommer and Harmon L. Smith.

Scholarship funds for men from the North Carolina Conference have been provided by the Commission on World Service and Finance, and these are made available to students endorsed by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training.

REPORT OF THE BISHOP'S COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

The Bishop's Committee on Church Architecture of the North Carolina Conference is composed of the bishop, the district superintendents, representative ministers and laymen, and representatives from the Duke Divinity School and the Rural Church Committee of The Duke Endowment. Four regular meetings were held during the year. In addition to programs of study relative to various phases of church architecture, the committee has provided counseling service for 110 rural churches.

Through the committee, materials have been made available to architects rendering service to rural churches within the bounds of the Annual Conference.

Assistance has been given in the preparation, publication, and distribution of the brochure, The Duke Endowment Rural Church Building Program. Plans have been made for the close coordination of the efforts of the National Division of the Board of Missions, the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension, and The Duke Endowment Rural Church Building Program. These groups are vitally interested in having the local church help itself and in making possible building facilities which it might not otherwise have. At the same time the committee seeks to guide the local church in the development of adequate plans and the execution of a building program at a minimum cost.

At the joint meeting with the Bishop's Committee from the Western North Carolina Conference, Norman G. Byar, architect, who serves as the Director of the Department of Architecture of the National Division of the Board of Missions, presented the program.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

I

K. R. Wheeler, president; C. S. Meekins, lay vice-president; L. L. Parrish, clerical vice-president; J. M. Cline, secretary-treasurer.

The Brotherhood is a group of Methodist ministers and lay people who want to express their sympathy to the bereaved widow of a Methodist minister in a way that will be of real assistance when it is most needed. Instead of sending telegrams or flowers, members of the Brotherhood send money; gifts of \$1 by superannuate ministers and lay people; \$3 by ministers in active service whose salary is under \$3,000; \$4 if the salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5 if above \$4,000. This money is sent by the treasurer as soon as the death is reported to him, and the widow has the needed money to pay funeral expenses even before she receives any money from insurance. This is not an insurance company. It is a fellowship, a brotherhood.

The membership is made up of 292 beneficiary (ministers) and 180 non-beneficiary (lay) members, a total membership of 472. We express our appreciation to the lay people who are members of the Brotherhood. Their support has meant much to the Brotherhood, and we hope many more will join.

The following calls were made this year: 173—Leon Couch; 174—W. L. Loy; 175—W. L. Clegg; 176—E. M. Hall; 177—A. R. Bell; 178—J. D. A. Autry. Each widow or family received a sum of \$1,400.00.

Article 10 of the Constitution of the Brotherhood states: "Any minister of the N. C. Conference on trial or in full connection, or any accepted supply pastor doing supply work in the Conference, may become a beneficiary member of the Brotherhood by payment of an initiation fee of \$1, and within 30 days from the date of entrance a mortuary assessment of \$3, if salary is under \$3,000; \$4, if salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5, if salary is \$4,000 or above; provided that, if he has served as a clerical

member one year or more, the initiation fee and mortuary assessment shall be as follows:

(The table may be projected at the same method of progression to determine initiation fee and mortuary assessment of a minister with any number of years beyond eight.)

Article 7 of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Brotherhood reads: "A member who shall fail to pay any assessment due, as aforesaid, within thirty (30) days from the date of notice shall forfeit his membership in the Brotherhood; provided that any member forfeiting his membership under this Article shall be readmitted to the Brotherhood upon payment of all arrears; provided, further, that if a member shall die before the next session of the Annual Conference, and his beneficiaries should at said session pay all arrears, the treasurer shall call an assessment on account of his death."

We hope each member of the Brotherhood will pay his assessments when the notice is sent out so that the beneficiaries may be paid promptly and when they need it. Your co-operation is necessary.

AMENDMENT TO BROTHERHOOD CONSTITUTION

We recommend that the requirements stated in Article 10 of the Constitution of the Brotherhood be suspended for the next conference year and that for this period of time the requirements for membership for a beneficiary member of the Brotherhood be an initiation fee of \$1.00 plus a mortuary assessment of \$5.00.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

I. THE GENERAL PURPOSE AND PROGRAM OF THE BOARD

A. The Purpose

At the beginning of his ministry Jesus announced his purpose "to preach good news to the poor," "to proclaim release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind," and "to set at liberty those who are oppressed." (Luke 4:16-21). In his ministry Jesus carried out his concern in regard to the "health problem" by healing the sick, in regard to the "human relations problem" by ministering to the hated Romans and the despised Samaritans, in regard to the "economic problem" by talking more about the use of wealth than about any other one subject, in regard to the "temperance problem" by befriending harlots and drunkards and gluttons, and in regard to the "peace problem" by refusing to use the sword.

The words of Jesus to his disciples were: "Love your neighbor as yourself" and "love your enemy." (Matthew 5:43 and 22:36-40). Near the end of his earthly ministry Jesus warned that many who considered themselves to be his followers would be condemned to the eternal fire by their lack of practical love for the people who were crushed under social problems. In his parable of the last judgement the king says to those on his left hand, "I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not clothe me, sick and in prison and you did not visit me." When those who stood before the judgment seat were surprised and astonished at the accusation the King explained, "As you did it not to one of the least of these, you did it not to me." (Matthew 25:31-46.) In the Sermon on the Mount Jesus calls explicitly for action. He says, "Everyone . . . who hears these words of mine and does them will be like a wise man who built his house upon the rock . . ." (Matthew 7:24). Jesus made it clear that his own purpose to change social conditions must also be the purpose of his followers.

Historically the Methodist Church has been built upon this rock of doing as well as hearing the social commandments of Jesus. John Wesley wrote, "Christianity is essentially a social religion." Wesley himself dealt with the social problems of his day; our church must deal with the social problems of our day. Wesley began schools for the poor; our church schools must serve the poor as well as the rich. He spoke out against the accumulation of wealth; our church must speak out against economic injustices. He opposed Negro slavery as "the scandal of religion of England;" our church must oppose discrimination and segregation as the scandal of religion in America. He denounced war as a "horrid reproach to the Christian name;" our church must stand for safeguarded world-wide total disarmament. He took food to the hungry; our church must feed and care for the children and the aged who need our help. He preached to the miners in the fields when most of the churches would not welcome them; our church must welcome all men of every social, economic and racial group. He visited criminals in prisons;

our church must seek the rehabilitation rather than the punishment of prisoners. In short, John Wesley stood upon the rock; our church must be built upon this rock of doing God's will in society.

We know from history, however, that Christian churches have often had difficulty in doing the social commandments of Jesus. Opposition has come not only from outside but also from inside the religious communities. The Pharisees opposed Jesus in his healing, in his ministering to Gentiles, and in his befriending sinners. Leaders in the Church of England opposed Wesley. Jesus anticipated this when he said, "Everyone who hears these words of mine and does not do them will be like a foolish man who built his house upon the sand." (Matthew 7:26). We recognize that many churches in past history have been built on sand and have been washed away when the floods of God's spirit have come.

Many famous men have been repulsed by pious words when the churches have not done anything about social evils. Mohandas K. Gandhi, whose life became radiant with the teachings of Jesus, would never identify himself with the church. As a boy he developed a dislike for Christianity when he heard of a well-known Hindu who was compelled to eat beef and drink liquor after being converted. As a man, in a moment of intense feeling, Gandhi once said: "If I were appointed dictator for one hour for all India, the first thing I would do would be to close without compensation all liquor shops." Gandhi never joined the church because of its discrimination against colored peoples and also because of the intemperance of many church members he knew. To the degree that a church will not be concerned with temperance and general welfare she is built on sand.

Voltaire gave his reason for hating the church. "Go through the five or six thousand sermons of Massillon," he said, "and you will scarcely find one in which a word is uttered against the scourge and crime of war. The same is true of Bourdeloure. Miserable physicians! Of what concern to me are benevolence, humanity, modesty, temperance, gentleness, wisdom, and piety so long as half an ounce of lead shatters my body and I die at twenty in torments unspeakable . . . while my eyes, opening for the last time, see the town in which I was born delivered to fire and sword, and the last sounds that reach my ears are the shrieks of women and children expiring in the ruins." Voltaire distrusted the church of his day. To the degree that a church will not speak for peace and world order she is built on sand.

Abraham Lincoln read his Bible and earnestly tried to practice Christian principles, but he would never join a church. About slavery, the great social problem of his time, he said: "You say it is wrong, but don't you constantly . . . argue that this is not the right place to oppose it? . . . It must not be opposed in politics, because that will make a fuss; it must not be opposed in the pulpit, because it is not religion. Then where is the place to oppose it?" Lincoln answered his own question by opposing slavery wherever he could as the greatest evil. In appraising the silence of many of the churches he quietly said, "If any church will write on its altar as the sole condition for membership the words of Jesus, 'Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart . . . and thy neighbor as thyself,' that church will I join." Lincoln never joined. Apparently he thought the churches were not concerned enough with love to stand clearly against the injustices of slavery. To the degree that churches will not deal with human relations and economic affairs they are built on sand.

The Board of Christian Social Concerns calls our churches to build upon the rock by applying the gospel of love to current social problems. The Board calls our church to act as well as speak. Jesus condemned the Pharisees who spoke the Golden Rule by saying, "They preach, but do not practice." (Matthew 23:3). Wesley called some of his followers who were not practicing what they professed the "half-Methodists." The Board of Christian Social Concerns calls our church to be in the company of the first Methodist preachers in America who set out not only to "spread scriptural holiness throughout the land" but also to "reform the continent." We believe revival and social concern to be two sides of the same coin. We want our church to be a fit vessel for a new revival of God's spirit. Such is our purpose,

B. The Program for the First Two Years

During the first half of this quadrennium the emphases have been on organizing local church commissions and on Peace and World Order. The following things have been done:

1. The district superintendents have reported to our Board that 702 Commissions on Christian Social Concerns have been organized in local churches with chairmen elected.

2. The Division on Peace and World Order initiated the "Race for Peace" program in our conference.

3. The Board has invited representatives from the Boards of Christian Social Concerns of the Western North Carolina Conference (SEJ) and of the North Carolina Conference (CJ) to attend meetings. The Rev. Oscar Burwick of Raleigh has been designated as the permanent representative of our Board from the Central Jurisdiction. As a result of these contacts the executive committees of the three Boards met in Sanford on March 16 of this year and set up a steering committee to plan a statewide Convocation on Christian Social Concerns. This steering committee met on April 2 at Lexington and decided to invite representatives from the respective three Methodist Youth Fellowships, the Woman's Societies of Christian Service, the Boards of Lay Activities, and the Methodist Student Movement to help plan this convocation. This larger group met and began this planning on May 3 in Greensboro.

4. The Board had three Tri-District Rallies on January 4-6 of this year at Chapel Hill, Clinton and Greenville with Dr. Carl Soule speaking and with guidance for local church commission chairmen on organizing commissions.

5. Eleven representatives of our Board attended the National Convocation on Christian Social Concerns in Washington, D. C., on April 24-28, 1961.

6. The North Carolina Convocation on Christian Social Concerns was held on May 3, 1961, in Raleigh with Dr. Charles Ray Goff of the Chicago Temple preaching. This was a follow-up on the National Convocation.

7. The Board has sent two members of its executive committee and the conference director of youth work to the U. N. in order to plan U. N. Study Tours for youth and adult members of our conference.

8. The executive committee and the district directors have taken part in two Southeastern Regional Briefing Conferences on Christian Social Concerns at Lake Junaluska.

9. The Board has sponsored with many other groups two Blue Ridge World Affairs Institutes.

10. The Board's officers, district directors, and members have spoken at many youth and adult meetings on the Christian approach to various social concerns.

11. The Board has met six times, once for an overnight meeting. The Rev. Emerson Smith and the Rev. Jack Corbett from the General Board of Christian Concerns have met and talked to our Board. The three divisions of our Board have each met from two to four times. The district directors have met as a separate group once this year. The executive committee has met about eight times.

C. The Program for 1962-63

The emphasis for 1962-63 will be upon "Temperance and General Welfare." However, the earlier emphases upon the organization of local church commissions, upon "Peace and World Order," and upon local church participation in study and action projects in the "Race for Peace" will continue.

During this coming third year in the quadrennium the Board has planned the following program:

1. July 20-August 31: The Board is sponsoring two of its general officers, Vernon Tyson and Jack Crum, and one district director, Charles Bryant, on a "Study Tour of Europe and Russia" under the leadership of Dr. Carl Soule, the General Board of Christian Social Concerns' representative at the United Nations. The cost of this tour for each man will be an initial amount of \$1,800.00 plus a suggested minimum expense fund of \$200.00 plus travel expenses to New York of about \$100.00. Of this total cost of \$2,100.00 the Board is contributing \$500.00. Each man is personally responsible for

the remaining \$1,600.00. These men will be available upon their return to speak in local churches and subdistrict meetings. The Board is co-sponsoring with the Western North Carolina Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns the Rev. Glenn Brooks, president of the North Carolina Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns of the Central Jurisdiction, to go on this study tour by contributing \$250.00 toward his expenses.

2. July 27-28: The Board is cosponsoring with many other groups the ninth annual World Affairs Institute at Blue Ridge, N. C.

3. September 11:13: The Southeastern Regional Briefing Conference on Christian Social Concerns will be held at Lake Junaluska.

4. September 17-27: District conferences on Christian Social Concerns for pastors and local church commission members and other interested persons will be held to give guidance to local commissions and to follow up with the "Study Tour of Europe and Russia."

11. March 7-8: The Board of Christian Social Concerns will meet.

12. March 12, 13, 14: Tri-District Rallies and Pastors' Conferences on "The Church and the Alcoholic" will be held with Dr. Thomas Shipp of Lover's Lane Methodist Church, Dallas, Texas, speaking. Later a follow-up workshop will be held.

13. March 13: 11 a.m., Duke Divinity School Assembly, York Chapel, Dr. Thomas Shipp, speaker.

15. April 26-27: A Statewide Convocation on Christian Social Concerns will be held at the West Market Street Methodist Church sponsored by three Boards of Christian Social Concerns in North Carolina.

16. May 3: The Board of Christian Social Concerns will meet.

17. Spring of 1963: A U.N. Study Tour for adults will be sponsored.

18. For 1962-63 our Board plans to contribute for work in social concerns to several worthy agencies in our state. We plan to contribute \$500 to the Christian Action League, \$500 to the North Carolina Human Relations Council, and \$1250 to the North Carolina Council of Churches with \$250 of this directed to the Carteret County Mobile Medical Program for Migrants.

II. THE DIVISION OF TEMPERANCE AND GENERAL WELFARE

A. General Policy Statements

1. The General Conference has assigned the following areas to our Division (paragraph 1535): alcohol problems; addiction to injurious habits such as the use of tobacco and drugs: gambling; pornography; juvenile delinquency and crime; penal system and rehabilitation; mental health and medical care; problems associated with aging, population and planned parenthood; and traffic safety. Each division member has accepted one of these areas in which to study and to make recommendations.

2. The Division commends the following persons and institutions for work in areas of our concern:

a. The Good Shepherd Home of Lake Waccamaw for its Christian approach in working with alcoholics.

b. The North Carolina Prison Department for establishing Alcoholics Anonymous groups in many of its prison units.

c. The North Carolina Council of Churches for its aid in establishing a chaplain in Memorial Hospital of Chapel Hill, North Carolina.

d. That we commend the outstanding work of the Rev. D. P. McFarland of Raleigh, Executive Director of the Christian Action League, for his able and energetic leadership in the area of Alcohol Education. Mr. McFarland is making a new and excellent approach to alcohol problems in the high schools and churches throughout the state. We urge our pastors, principals of public schools, and other community leaders to make use of Mr. McFarland's dynamic leadership in the field of temperance. His address is:

e. Mr. Haywood Starling, a narcotic agent with the State Bureau of Investigation, whose understanding and performance has been outstanding.

f. The Youth Division of the Conference Board of Education for holding an Assembly on Moral Concerns.

B. Program for the Past Year

The Division makes the following report of its activities:

1. Commitment Day was observed on the first Sunday in December.

a. 157 pastoral charges reported they observed the day.

b. 27 pastoral charges reported they did not observe the day.

c. 309 pastoral charges did not report.

2. This year the Division has met twice in Carrboro and once in Rocky Mount.

3. The vice-chairman, Charles V. Bryant, represented us at a seminar in Washington, D. C., held for all conference chairmen of the Division on Temperance and General Welfare.

4. The Division has placed audio-visuals in TRAFCO which deal with its area of concern.

C. Program for 1962-63

1. Your Division is concerned about the prevalence of social drinking and the ever-increasing number of men and women who suffer from alcoholism. We are also aware of the feeling of frustration which comes with failure in working with alcoholics. We confess that such a ministry takes skills and time which we too often lack. In light of our need and because the emphasis for 1962-63 lies in the area of Temperance and General Welfare we are proposing the following program for our North Carolina Conference:

a. That we invite the Reverend Thomas Shipp of Dallas, Texas, to come to our conference for the week of March 12-14 to lead us in exploring "The Church and the Alcoholic." Mr. Shipp is pastor of the Lover's Lane Methodist Church. There are over 200 sober alcoholics within this congregation. He has gained nationwide recognition for his exceptional ministry. His schedule would be:

b. That we have one conference-wide workshop as a follow-up to these rallies.

2. In 1962-63 the following scholarships will be offered so that ministers may better equip themselves to work redemptively with persons who have an alcoholic problem:

a. Keeley Institute, Box 27, Greensboro, North Carolina, has a 10-day training program for ministers. The cost is \$60. Four scholarships are available.

b. At Rutgers (formerly Yale) School of Alcoholic Studies one partial scholarship of \$100.00 is available.

c. Anyone interested in participating in these programs may contact the Division Chairman, Vernon Tyson.

3. We suggest to pastors and churches that they use the services of the agencies which we commend above, particularly of the Christian League and the N. C. Council of Churches to which we contribute funds.

4. We recommend that all churches observe Commitment Sunday and report their observance.

III. THE DIVISION OF PEACE AND WORLD ORDER

A. General Policy Statements

I. The Race for Peace Emphasis:

We are deeply concerned that ours is the first generation in history to face the possibility of complete annihilation. These are perilous times.

This crisis in world history and the accelerating arms race have produced a variety of public attitudes. Many persons have jumped to the oversimplified conclusion that there are only two alternatives: suicide or surrender. Of these individuals, some favor a policy of aggressive action against the Communist world even if it means nuclear war. There is also a dangerous revival of isolationist thinking which would have the United States abdicate from all world responsibilities and leadership, leaving the future in the hands of the Communists.

Among Methodists in the United States an entirely different response is emerging. Pastors, lay people and students are asking for leadership, resource materials and an opportunity to join in a major constructive effort toward peace. Among the people called Methodists there is a growing realization that the United States must seize the initiative in planning and working for peace.

We are thankful that this call from the field is being answered by our Methodist leadership with vigor and enthusiasm. Our Council of Bishops has spoken forcefully: "The making of peace is our business, our sacred trust. In this heritage of remembrance, commitment and redemption, we call the Methodist Church, and indeed all Christians, to join in a crusade for peace, to move resolutely against the drift toward war. We believe the abolition of war is an absolute imperative, that under God it can be achieved in our time."

To provide guidance and resources for this united effort the National Division of Peace and World Order held a special meeting and declared: "We must implement the position of the Methodist Church that safeguarded world disarmament under a strengthened United Nations is an essential prerequisite to peace."

The Division statement continued: "The hour has come for Methodists:

To affirm that we believe that war is not inevitable,

To insist that there are moral and realistic political alternatives to both suicide and surrender,

To demonstrate that the Christian faith is a positive substitute for panic and panic programs,

To reaffirm our faith that man everywhere can live in peace with his fellow man,

To covenant ourselves and our resources to informed action for peace in the places where we live and work."

These declarations of the Division of Peace and World Order will mean little, unless there is a determined movement of lay people in the churches of Methodism to join in prayer, study and action for peace.

The Division has offered its full resources to assist "in the development of a committed core in each local church which will: (1) Study peacemaking alternatives, (2) communicate concern to neighbors and others, (3) register Christian conviction at the places in government where decisions are made, and (4) support the sending of peace missions to other nations."

Though the Race for Peace is of vital importance to all Methodists, it is properly a specific responsibility of the local Church Commission on Christian Social Concerns. The pastor and this commission will want to meet and plan carefully for this urgent task by participating in the study and action projects recommended for the Race for Peace emphasis.

The ENTIRE Board of Christian Social Concerns at National, Conference and local levels is supporting this united effort for peace. The Council of Bishops has called for a crusade. Leaders, pastors and people are responding with energy and purposeful action. There is general agreement with the words of the Division of Peace and World Order:

"Man stands under the judgement of God. We have never confronted so great a challenge as now faces us. We are not sufficient in ourselves. Neither can we stand apart from our responsibilities for the solution. As children of God we are under compulsion to be consumed in the tasks of peace, that man shall not be consumed in the fires of war."

2. Complete, Universal and Enforceable Disarmament:

The 1960 General Conference of the Methodist Church stated: "We call on the United States and all other governments to declare complete, universal and enforceable disarmament to be their goal and to move in this direction."

The General Conference further called "upon the United States and all other governments to exert forceful, imaginative, patient and dedicated leadership toward the achievement of such disarmament."

This goal becomes more urgently necessary each day as the arms race accelerates and because of the scientific, technological revolutions of our time, especially in nuclear, biological and chemical weapon developments. These revolutionary developments in modern weapons within a world divided by serious ideological differences have produced the most dangerous crisis in all of human history.

We agree with the President of the United States that "Mankind must put an end to war, or war will put an end to mankind," and "that every man, woman and child lives under a nuclear sword of Damocles, hanging by the slenderest of threads." We enthusiastically support his statement: "It is . . . our intention to challenge the Soviet Union, not to an arms race, but to a peace race . . . until general and complete disarmament has been achieved."

Our national security and world peace require the achievement of safeguarded disarmament. It is surely evident that the arms race cannot continue its acceleration without eventual explosion into war through accident, folly or madness.

The only adequate defense that either side can now have against war is participation in mutual disarmament that removes the arms from both sides while safeguarding the national security of each. Whereas arms have traditionally been essential to a nation's defense, only effective world disarmament can any longer provide a really meaningful defense for the existence and welfare of our nation. Whether the motive be high morality or the elemental matter of survival, all logic demands a massive effort for safeguarded world disarmament.

We are thankful for two encouraging developments in the disarmament field:

(1) For the first time, the United States government seems to have put forward a bold, new program for general and complete disarmament. We heartily commend the President for his September 25, 1961, speech to the United Nations' 10th General Assembly in which he introduced this practical, realistic, U. S. program for general and complete disarmament in a peaceful world. This new program provides for the progressive reduction of the war-making capabilities of all nations and the simultaneous strengthening of international institutions to settle disputes and maintain the peace. It sets forth a series of comprehensive measures which can and should be taken in order to bring about a world in which there will be freedom from war and security for all nations. The essentials of this new U. S. policy objective are outlined in a booklet, "Freedom From War" (Dept. of State Publication 7277, Disarmament Series 5. Order from Dept. of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. Price 15¢). This booklet should be read and studied by every Methodist.

(2) We commend our North Carolina Congressional and Senatorial delegations for their support of legislation which recently passed by large majorities in both the House and Senate establishing a U. S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency. The setting up of such an agency and the authorization of funds and machinery to make this agency effective was long overdue. Now, for the first time in our nation's history an official Government agency is engaged in intensive planning and research in the problems of peace and disarmament, is responsible for the development of U. S. disarmament policies and manages U. S. participation in disarmament conferences.

However, we are concerned that the financial appropriations supporting this agency have been inadequate. We would hardly count as adequate a disarmament effort that receives only as much as 1% of the financial support given to the research and development of arms. Yet the \$6½ million proposed for the 1963 work of the U. S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency falls far short of that sum, being only one-tenth of 1% of the \$7 billion budgeted for military research and development in the current year.

We call upon members of Congress and the administration acting in the interest of our national security and defense, which now require the achievement of world peace through effective, safeguarded world disarmament, to urge the U. S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency to expand its work and to provide funds adequate for that purpose. We have confidence that our Congressmen and Senators will not only resist all efforts to decrease the requested appropriation for the USACDA, but that in the light of the importance of disarmament to our national security, they will substantially increase that appropriation.

3. United Nations and The Opposition

No nation in this interdependent world community can now provide true welfare for its people without continuous cooperation with other nations. No nation can now provide security for its own people except as security is provided for all people. The interests of the nations coincide more and more with meeting the basic needs of mankind. Lest all perish, the Christian concept of one humanity under God must lead to practical expression in international, social, economic and political institutions.

The necessary institutions for our world are beginning to emerge. Chief among them is the United Nations, the best means we have for continuous cooperation by national governments on political, economic, social and cultural matters. The United Nations is now reaching a crucial point in its development. The newly independent nations, as symbols of new freedom and of the collapse of Colonial empires, add a new dimension to the call for a world political instrument for collective guidance and action. The need is immediate and urgent, lest the limited resources and leadership of some nations lead to anarchy and dangerous competition for national prestige and power.

The Christian faith and life, even survival itself, in the world community requires intelligent good will toward all nations and peoples. It also requires effective organizational and practical processes for dealing with hard facts of international relations.

The Charter of the United Nations is a code of conduct for the nations which can help to create a world community. Just and durable peace can be developed as nations

and peoples fulfill the obligations of the Charter and use its processes for the settlement of disputes and for cooperation in promoting the common welfare.

Christian churches in the United States have consistently advocated discriminating and steadfast support of the United Nations and the adherence to its principles. Methodists have, since its organization, been loyal supporters of the United Nations. A recent national survey indicated that over 80% of the Methodists who were questioned believed that the UN deserves support as "The best political hope for world peace."

We are encouraged that nearly 3000 Methodists each year take part in UN Seminars and Study Tours which are directed and arranged by our Methodist UN Office in New York City. More Methodists should visit the UN in an effort to become better informed of its purposes and programs. We enthusiastically endorse the recent decision of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns, with the support and cooperation of the Woman's Division of Christian Service, to build a Church Peace Center in front of the United Nations headquarters in New York City.

The 1960 Methodist General Conference declared: "We give thanks to God for the United Nations and its agencies and their continued efforts to create peace in the world. Particularly do we commend the United Nations for its direct approach, exploration and action on crucial problems that arise periodically throughout the world and pose a direct threat to the peace of the world."

"We believe there is continuing and urgent need to use more fully the various agencies of international understanding and cooperation which are presently available in the UN. We believe the United Nations and its agencies should be supported, strengthened and improved. Moreover, if these facilities are to become most effective, the United Nations with membership open to all nations must be given sufficient authority to enact, interpret and enforce world law against war and aggression."

We note with deep concern a growing tendency among many Americans to criticize the activities of the United Nations and to blame it for the chaos and confusion that has often been the result of world revolutions against oppression, hunger, ignorance and disease. These revolutions have been exploited in many areas by Communist, political, economic and military subversion. It is now clear that a militant opposition composed of the Communists on the one hand and the Right Wing Extremists in America on the other is intent on destroying the United Nations. Both groups would like to "get the US out of the UN and get the UN out of the US." The communists understand, as the American right wing does not, that American withdrawal would give the Russians a mechanism of world politics and a world forum for their propaganda which would enormously enhance their position as a world power. The destruction of the UN would give to Russia one of her greatest victories. A United States pull-out from the UN would, in reality, deliver this victory to world Communism.

Bishop John Wesley Lord of the Washington Area of the Methodist Church has warned us that if these misguided and fearful leaders of the crusades of suspicion succeed in killing the UN, their avowed intent, this is what they will do:

(1) They will destroy daily contacts between two sides in the world today. This necessary contact is a force for peace.

(2) The transition from colonialism to self-rule will be bloody rather than peaceful and sane.

(3) They will blow up a dam that has already prevented local wars from spreading in Korea, Indonesia, Kashmir and Palestine.

(4) They will convince millions now receiving medicine, milk and plows from the UN that there is no hope for the hungry and the homeless except in communism.

(5) They will tremendously increase the chance that man will one day wipe himself from the face of the earth.

Amid all the half-truths being perpetrated by faint-hearted and petty individuals concerning the cost of this institution to the United States, let us remember that the United Nations has an annual budget lower in cost than a single battleship and that its annual cost to our country is less than the cost of a single destroyer. It amounts to 3% as much as our country spends on tobacco. Our total UN budget is about \$192 million or about \$1.04 for each American.

We need to take care that our rightful concern to preserve our national security and our national values does not cause us to jeopardize them because we betray our international responsibilities by trying to go it alone and retreating to a non-existent isolationism.

We recognize that the UN is faced with a financial crisis due largely to extraordinary expenditures which it incurred in fulfilling the pledges of its Charter to secure peace, progress and human rights in the Congo and Middle East peace keeping operation. The success of the UN still depends in large measure on U. S. support and action which will decide whether the UN can continue to act as an effective world agency to keep the peace or whether it will deteriorate into an impotent debating society which the Russians seem to desire.

We regard it as vital to the interest of our country and to the maintenance of peace that the capacity of the UN to act for peace not be inhibited by a lack of financial resources. We further urge our N. C. Congressmen to join our President and the overwhelming majority of their colleagues in the Senate, including our N. C. Senators B. Everett Jordan and Sam J. Ervin, in their forthright support of the legislation to authorize the President of the United States to purchase UN bonds and to make available to the UN loans up to \$100 million.

It is our belief that the UN is the only force in the world today which can serve as mediator and peace-keeper in areas of tension endangering the peace of the world. With all its imperfections and occasional failures, the UN has served in the interests of peace and freedom, which are also the interests of the United States. To abandon it now, to refuse the purchase of the bonds, to fail to do whatever is necessary to solve the UN's financial problem would either paralyze the executive arm of the UN or load the US with even greater burdens.

When the U. S. spends around \$50 billion a year to defend itself and the free world, it would be gross folly to weaken the UN for the sake of \$100 million, and forego its moral and material support for policies we espouse. Only Communist imperialism could profit from that. We believe the purchase of the UN bonds would be an act of faith. It would be an affirmation of our belief in even an imperfect UN, as against world anarchy. It would state our hope for the future in the development of a peaceful world order where law, justice and freedom prevails.

4. Christians and Fallout Shelters.

The Council of Bishops of the Methodist Church has warned against "the folly of panic programs for bomb shelters." We are concerned that many Americans are thinking and talking about escaping from the disaster of nuclear war by burrowing under the earth and living like rats in a hole. It is a strange commentary on our times that we should be driven to that conclusion instead of diverting all our energies and strength into the prevention of such a catastrophe.

There is something tragic and incongruous about a Christian on all-fours, crawling into a fallout shelter, shutting the door and taking up arms to keep his neighbor out. It is difficult to understand how the Christian conscience can condone a policy which puts supreme emphasis on saving your own skin without regard for the plight of your neighbor. The Christians who outthought, outlived and outdied their pagan contemporaries in the first and second centuries were not those who took refuge in the catacombs of Rome but were those who faced wild beasts in the public arenas and challenged the authority of kings and emperors. Bishop John Wesley Lord has suggested the alternatives facing us as Christians in this matter: "We must choose between the catacombs and the arena."

We believe that the Federal Government has the right and duty to provide mass shelters for those citizens who desire such protection and who cannot afford to build private shelters. To consider survival only in terms of those who can afford it is unthinkable. We are deeply concerned for the hundreds of millions of the world's people who are unsheltered and we are disturbed about the false feeling of security generated in those who do have shelters.

All questions of morality aside, there remains the simple question of practicality. Even if there are enough shelters for our 180 million people and if they are able to get

to and into the shelters in time, will they survive the firestorm and fallout of a nuclear attack? Irwing Michelson, a member of the Scientists Committee on Radiation Information, also noted that: "Shelters, either individual or mass, are of very limited value because of the firestorm effect. Everything in a 25-mile radius of the blast would be cut off from oxygen. Anything under the firestorm is usually killed. Shelters are a very poor idea."

On the same issue of practicality, Marquis Childs had some observations in his October 6 *Washington Post* column. He assumes for a moment that a person had had "all the breaks," such as being at home near the shelter when the bomb fell, having adequate warning and being able to stay in long enough to miss the first massive dose of fallout. But then, he writes: "You would come out to all but uninhabitable desert. Even if some semblance of civil order had been preserved—most unlikely in view of the appalling chaos—the means of existence, heat, light, water, food, would be virtually nonexistent."

Secretary of Defense McNamara, under whose direction the Civil Defense effort has been placed, recently said: "We just don't know enough yet to project a long-range program." Therefore, we concur with our Council of Bishops in its "call for a careful study by qualified national authorities before any fallout shelter-building program is promoted." A "panic" shelter program, they said, "invites surrender to the assumption that nuclear conflict is inevitable; encourages irresponsible, even reckless, action by national leaders; makes for indifference to the suffering a nuclear war and its aftermath would inflict upon defenseless and innocent people unable to avail themselves of protection; and develops a climate of hysteria which makes for war."

We support our Council of Bishops in their belief that "the best shelter program is that directed toward eradicating the cause of strife." Instead of building fallout shelters, as Christians we feel under a compulsion to direct our energies into constructive, positive and creative channels for the building of a peaceful world order. We call upon all Christians to concentrate on providing the only practical shelter for our free way of life and for all men under a universal, enforceable system of safeguarded disarmament through a strengthened United Nations. To place our reliance for peace in weapons of mass destruction and in any kind of civil defense alone offers no final solution to the problems of survival but rather sows the seed of man's annihilation.

B. Program for the Past Year

In the pursuit of these policy objectives during 1961-62, the Division of Peace and World Order has:

1. Cooperated with the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns in the three Tri-District Rallies involving 550 laymen and ministers. The guest speaker, Dr. Carl Soule, our Methodist UN observer and head of the Methodist UN office, spoke on the current "Race for Peace" emphasis.

2. Held a conference "Race for Peace" leadership training workshop at St. Paul's Methodist Church in Goldsboro, for the purpose of training 40 ministers and laymen in methods of presenting and conducting district workshops to assist teams from the local churches in the study-action project based on the booklet on the Christian approach to the disarmament problem, "None Shall Make Them Afraid."

3. Enlisted district directors of Christian Social Concerns in setting up district workshops on the "Race for Peace" involving over 300 local church leadership teams in preparation for local study and action in the peace program.

4. Sponsored the Rev. Rodney Shaw, Disarmament Education Director of the National Methodist Board of Christian Social Concerns, as a speaker and resource person at the N. C. Methodist Student Movement United Nations Model Assembly at Raleigh.

5. Joined with other North Carolina religious and civic organizations in sponsoring the annual Blue Ridge World Affairs Institute.

6. In cooperation with the Conference Board of Education we sponsored the appearance of former Congressman Byron Johnson, a Methodist layman, presently with the Economic Cooperation Agency in Washington, D. C., who spoke on "A Christian Approach to Foreign Aid" before a group of 400 young people at the Annual Conference Session of the N. C. Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship.

7. Worked with the Conference M.Y.F. in sending the Conference Youth Director to a United Nations-Washington Seminar and helped the Conference M.Y.F. to plan for a UN-Washington Study Tour.

8. Sent a conference-wide mailing to all pastors which included materials in support of the United Nations, the "Race for Peace" program, and the book, *In Place of Folly*, by Norman Cousins.

9. Directed communications in behalf of our Conference to the North Carolina Congressional and Senatorial delegations as well as the White House supporting legislation to establish the U. S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency and legislation to strengthen and expand the United States' contribution to the United Nations' peace and security operations.

C. Program for 1962-63

For the conference year 1962-63, the Division of Peace and World Order plans to:

1. Continue to stress the importance of local church participation in the study and action projects of the "Race for Peace" emphasis.

2. Sponsor in the spring a United Nations Study Tour. This tour, planned in cooperation with the Methodist UN Office in New York City, will be open to 40 lay people and ministers of our conference. Applications will be sent to all pastors and to local church chairmen of Commissions on Christian Social Concerns. Anyone interested in participating in this program may contact the Division Chairman, Ralph Fleming.

3. Co-sponsor again with the N. C. Council of Churches, the American Freedom Association and the Western N. C. Methodist Conference Division of Peace and World Order the ninth annual World Affairs Institute at Blue Ridge, N. C., July 27-29. Scholarship assistance is offered to four persons in our conference: a layman, an M.Y.F. leader, a minister, and a college student. Anyone interested in this assistance may contact the Division Chairman.

4. Promote and urge active support of World Order Sunday, October 21, 1962, and the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) at halloween, October 31, 1962.

IV. THE DIVISION ON HUMAN RELATIONS AND ECONOMIC AFFAIRS

A. General Policy Statements

A church with a conscience, a church which takes seriously the words of Christ in the Sermon on the Mount, and a church which is true to itself (see the statement of the annual conference) must assert itself forthrightly in the area of human relations. We, therefore, bring to the attention of the North Carolina Conference our concern in the following area:

I. Extremist attacks upon the church.

From certain quarters intensified attacks are being made on the churches, with charges that they are infiltrated or influenced by communism. The best answer to such charges has been made by Mr. William Sullivan, assistant director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation: "It can be stated factually and without equivocation," he said, "that any allegation is false which holds that there has been and is, on a national scale, any substantial Communist infiltration of the American clergy . . . There can be no doubt as to the loyalty of the overwhelming majority of the clergy of our nation, for they have been among the most consistent and dedicated opponents of communism. In view of the great amount of time and money Communists have spent propagandizing the American clergy, it is a remarkable tribute to them that they have resisted so successfully." The greatest danger of these attacks is not that the Church shall be discredited. We have Christ's promise that "the powers of death shall not prevail against it." The real danger is that these attacks will be used to turn the Church aside from bringing the teachings of our Lord to bear upon the pressing problems of our society. The only answer to man's need today, as in all days, is the gospel entrusted to us. Let us, then, continue to answer these charges calmly and factually. Our bishops have led us in this; and we express our appreciation to them for their leadership. The Board of Christian Social Concerns has available reliable and effective materials to be used in making plain the

truth. We urge all ministers and local church organizations including Men's Clubs, Sunday school classes, and Commissions on Christian Social Concerns to sponsor studies on "Christianity and Communism," using such materials as: **A Christian's Handbook on Communism**, available for \$1.00 from the Service Department, 100 Maryland Ave., N.E., Washington 2, D. C.; **John C. Bennett's Christianity and Communism Today** (paper \$1.50); and other student materials currently being prepared by the staff of the National Board of Christian Social Concerns. A packet of excellent materials on **The Extremists and the Churches** will help laymen and ministers get the facts about the individuals and groups who are responsible for reckless and irresponsible charges being made against the churches and ministers. We recommend for mass distribution in our local churches the recent statement, **The Methodist Bishops Speak on Communism and the Churches**, available from the Service Department. But let us also give ourselves more vigorously to the proclamation of the gospel and its interpretation for the whole of life. We commend the North Carolina and National Councils of Churches for their clear stand on these issues, and urge our people to increase their support for these cooperative agencies both financially and otherwise.

2. Race Relations.

a. In the relations between the races in our state, one of the most pressing needs is for greater and more varied employment opportunity for minority groups. Probably North Carolina's greatest unused economic resource is in the productive potential of the Negro citizens who constitute approximately one-third of our population. We call upon public and private agencies, as we seek to raise the economic level of life for our people, to give particular attention to the needs and capabilities of this group. We commend Governor Sanford for his statement pointing out that if only the income of white people were considered, North Carolina's ranking among the states as to per capita income would be much higher. We appreciate his emphasizing the need for raising the income level of our Negro population. In this connection, we recommend that our churches re-examine policies and practices with regard to employment of lay people. Because of the nature of church activities these people, especially those who serve as janitors, often work long hours for which their pay is usually low in comparison with other such employment. In addition, many of them are not covered by social security or workman's compensation. The fact that churches are charitable institutions does not justify them in exploiting their employees, nor in failing to meet standards required by law of other employers. Indeed, our profession of Christian faith lays on us an especial obligation to lead the way in just and considerate business dealings.

b. We commend the Chapel Hill Local School District for its positive, non-inflammatory approach in regard to desegregation.

c. We support the North Carolina Council of Churches in its program of interracial conferences on "The Role of the Churches in Human Relations" in cooperation with ministerial associations and other groups within the state. And we urge our churches to participate fully in them.

d. We welcome the direction being taken by the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church with respect to our mutual jurisdictional problem, and we commend them for their plan to make their jurisdictional and conference boundaries more nearly contiguous with our own, to the end that the Central Jurisdiction may eventually be eliminated.

e. We would also express to the trustees of Duke University our appreciation and our support of their adopting the policy that admission to its professional and undergraduate schools is open to qualified persons without regard to race. We note with genuine appreciation the recent steps taken by the Board of Trustees of Wake Forest College and East Carolina College in opening their undergraduate departments to qualified persons of all races. In keeping with our Christian conscience, and in keeping with previous conference attempts, we can but urge that the trustees of our conference-related colleges take under study their admission policies as related to race.

3. Migrant workers.

In our industrial and mechanical economy untrained and unskilled workers are rapidly being displaced, many of them with no place to go except on the welfare rolls or into the ranks of the migratory laborers. In this connection, as more of our land goes into food production, problems related to migratory labor will

become increasingly acute. We, therefore, commend the North Carolina Council of Churches for its ministry to migrant agricultural workers and call on our churches to support this both financially and otherwise. We further commend the North Carolina State Department of Public Health for its interest in and action on the enforcement of livable sanitation standards of migrant camps, and we urge that the state legislature implement needed direction here and look into and effect any needed legislation to eliminate economic exploitation of migrant laborers.

4. We are encouraged by the progress being made in the outpost church school program of our conference, and urge our local churches to increased vision and effort in this. We call attention to the fact that the greatest need for such schools exists in disadvantaged neighborhoods and among minority groups. We recommend to our churches and to the educational leadership of our conference that particular attention be given to such areas in order that the word of our Lord, "the poor have the gospel preached to them," may be fulfilled.

B. Program

During the past year the Rev. W. N. McDonald accepted the post of Vice-Chairman of the Division. For 1962-63 the Division recommends that Race Relations Sunday be observed in all churches and that contacts be continued and increased between our conference and the North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction. A scholarship of \$100 is available to one minister during 1962-63 to study at a workshop on human relations at Fisk University. Anyone interested should contact the Division Chairman, Henry Ruark. The year of emphasis upon "Human Relations and Economic Affairs" in our conference will be 1963-64.

REPORT OF THE INTERCONFERENCE COMMISSION ON COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY RELIGIOUS WORK

Ours is the privilege of supervising our denomination's spiritual ministry to communities of higher learning throughout the state. Our organized effort is called the Methodist Student Movement, or by the initials, MSM. Its purpose is to nourish Christians and to attract non-Christians. Working as a missionary movement in society, the MSM provides opportunities for worship, study, service, and recreation.

Annually, such intercollegiate projects as Retreats, a United Nations Model Assembly, and a State Student Conference are conducted. Under MSM auspices, leaders in various fields of Christian service are brought to campuses in our state. These have included the following: Jameson Jones of Garrett Theological Seminary; Rodnev Shaw of the Methodist Board of Christian Social Concerns; Darrell Randall of the School of International Service of American University; Harve C. Brown of the Methodist Board of Education; Jim Gibson of the administrative staff of the Peace Corps; and Barbara Leonard, missionary to the Philippines.

Boards of Directors or Campus-Church Relations Committees composed of responsible people in local communities supervise our work on various campuses. The Woman's Society of Christian Service through its Secretaries of Student Work is most helpful. While monetary pay for our employed workers is quite low, remuneration is found in other ways—especially in the inspiration found in working with stimulating personalities.

Questions concerning the ministry to campus committees in our state are always welcomed. They should be addressed to the State Director, Methodist Student Movement of North Carolina, 310 S. Spring St., Greensboro, N. C.

Here follows a brief summary of our ministry to approximately one-half of the colleges in our state and an outline of the ministry carried on in one community.

A & T College, Greensboro (State), the Rev. William T. Brown, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 2,713; Methodist preference (all branches), 582. Programs were held on missions and social concerns, and study groups were offered on marriage, religion and science, theology, and literature; study will be greatly expanded next year. A limited budget prevents full accreditation. There is regular participation in intercollegiate MSM meetings.

Appalachian State Teachers College, Boone (State), the Rev. David Andrews (on leave of absence), Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 3,000; Methodist preference, 600. A program of worship, study, and fellowship has been conducted. Participation in intercollegiate activities has been high.

Atlantic Christian College, Wilson (Disciples of Christ), the Rev. Lawrence Lugar, counselor of the Methodist Student Movement. Enrollment, 1,400; Methodist preference, approximately 400. Chapel services are provided; religion courses are required. First Methodist Church has helped this new group.

Bennett College, Greensboro (Methodist), the Rev. James Busch, Director of Religious Activities. Enrollment, 574; Methodist preference (all branches), 207. All religious life is approached in a campus-wide manner, rather than in denominational groups. Regular chapel services are held; religion courses are required. Students participate in intercollegiate meetings.

Brevard Junior College, Brevard (Methodist), Mr. Louis Miles, Advisor of the Methodist Student Fellowship. Enrollment, 448; Methodist preference, 230. Denominational groups are allowed. Religion courses are required. Distance probably contributes to a low participation in intercollegiate meetings.

Campbell College, Buie's Creek (Baptist), the Rev. Franklin Grill, minister (Lillington Methodist Church). Enrollment, 1,465; Methodist preference, 175. Semi-monthly meetings and slight liberalizing of a staid denominational institution, coupled with the enthusiasm of the Lillington Methodist Church and its minister, have contributed to hopeful signs of an effective ministry to Methodist students. Religion courses and chapel services are required.

Catawba College, Salisbury (United Church), the Rev. Frank Kiker, adviser of the Methodist Student Movement. Enrollment, 871; Methodist preference, approximately 175. Chapel services are provided; religion courses are required. This new group has enthusiasm and promise of becoming an outstanding unit of the MSM. First Methodist Church is helpful.

Chowan Junior College, Murfreesboro (Baptist), the Rev. Harry Jordan, minister (Murfreesboro Methodist Church). Enrollment, approximately 500; Methodist preference, approximately 50. Chapel services are provided; religion courses are required. A special student Sunday school class, the concern of the Methodist Church and its minister, and approachable college staff contribute to possible growth here.

Davidson College, Davidson (Presbyterian, U. S.), the Rev. Russell Montfort, Director of the Methodist Student Fellowship. Enrollment, approximately 900; Methodist preference, approximately 150. Chapel services are provided; religion courses are required. Deep study is emphasized in the Davidson MSF. The Davidson Methodist Church and its minister have influenced the whole community. There is regular but small participation in intercollegiate MSM meetings.

Duke University, Durham (Methodist), the Rev. Jackson W. Carroll, chaplain to Methodist students. Enrollment, 5,331; Methodist preference, 1,393. Chapel services are provided; religion courses are required of A.B. students. Worship, study, and drama have been among the main emphases at the Methodist Student Center located on Oregon Street between Duke's two campuses. There is regular but small participation in intercollegiate MSM meetings.

East Carolina College, Greenville (State), Miss Mamie Chandler, a deaconess, director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 5,263; Methodist preference, 1,244. Wor-

ship and fellowship have been among the main emphases. Participation in intercollegiate MSM meetings is always high. Miss Mamie Chandler, a long-time faithful servant, is retiring. In the future the Foundation will be administered jointly by the Interconference Commission and the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Elon College, **Elon College (United Church)**, the Rev. Richard Commander, minister (Faith Methodist Church, Burlington). Enrollment, 909; Methodist preference, 175. A recent change in policy at the college now encourages denominational groups, so the MSM was organized in 1962.

Fayetteville State Teachers College, **Fayetteville (state)**, the Rev. W. A. Royster, counselor of the Methodist Student Movement. Enrollment, 900; Methodist preference (all branches), approximately 180. Occasional meetings are held, and there is some state-wide participation.

Greensboro College, **Greensboro (Methodist)**, Dr. Raymond Smith, Director of Religious Activities. Enrollment, 550; Methodist preference, 345. All religious life is approached in a campus-wide manner, rather than in denominational groups. Regular chapel services are required through the junior year; six hours of religion are required. Students participate in intercollegiate meetings.

High Point College, **High Point (Methodist)**, Miss Charmione Rose, advisor of the Methodist Student Fellowship. Enrollment, 1,154; Methodist preference, approximately 400. Chapel services are provided, and religion courses are required. Many religious organizations are active on the campus. The MSF meets regularly; there is active participation in state-wide meetings.

Lees-McRae Junior College, **Banner Elk (Presbyterian, U. S.)**, the Rev. Ben Steele, minister (Newland Methodist Church). Enrollment, 380; Methodist preference, 94. A recent change in policy at the college now encourages denominational groups, so the MSM was organized in 1962.

Lenoir-Rhyne College, **Hickory (United Lutheran)**, Mr. Steve Shuford, advisor of the Methodist Student Movement. Enrollment, 970; Methodist preference, 153. The MSM meets occasionally. There is small but regular participation in state-wide MSM events.

Louisburg Junior College, **Louisburg (Methodist)**, Dr. Gunter Sommer, Director of the Methodist Student Movement. Enrollment, 552; Methodist preference, 273. The MSM meets regularly and participates in state-wide functions.

Mars Hill College, **Mars Hill (Baptist)**, the Rev. James M. Thurman, Methodist Student Movement Director. Enrollment, 1,055; Methodist preference, 90. The MSM is an enthusiastic group which meets every Sunday night. There is slight participation in state-wide activities. The college is in the process of becoming a four-year one.

Methodist College, **Fayetteville (Methodist)**, Dr. Sam Womack, chaplain. Enrollment (full-time), 215; Methodist preference, 89. The college is in the process of becoming a four-year one. Regular chapel services and religion courses are available. There is participation in state-wide MSM activities.

N. C. College at Durham (State), the Rev. J. T. Jones, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 2,361; Methodist preference (all branches), 465. Meetings for study have been held; there has been participation in the state-wide MSM projects. In the future eight denominations will co-operate to provide a full-time ministry to the campus through the United Campus Christian Ministry.

N. C. Wesleyan College, **Rocky Mount (Methodist)**, Dr. James R. Hailey, Director of Student Life. Enrollment, 199; Methodist preference, 107. The college is in the process of becoming a four-year one. Regular chapel services and religion courses are available. There is participation in state-wide MSM activities.

Pembroke State College, **Pembroke (State)**, Miss Marjorie Kanable, Faculty Advisor of the Wesley Fellowship. Enrollment, 570; Methodist preference, 115. Regular WF meetings are held, and there is enthusiastic participation in state-wide functions.

Pfeiffer College, **Misenheimer (Methodist)**, Dr. Roger Kusche, Adviser of the Methodist Student Movement. Enrollment, 885; Methodist preference, 472. Chapel services

and religion courses are required. There is small, but regular participation in state-wide MSM meetings.

(Raleigh), the Rev. Neal V. McGlamery, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Total enrollment of five schools, 8,437; N. C. State College (state), 7,117; Meredith College (Baptist), 745; Peace Junior College (Presbyterian, U. S.), 335; Rex Hospital School of Nursing (city), 150; State Hospital School of Nursing (state), 90. Total Methodist preference of five schools, 1,990; N. C. State, 1,785; Meredith, 114; Peace, 48; Rex, 25; State Hospital, 18.

St. Andrews Presbyterian College, Laurinburg (Presbyterian, U. S.), Miss Betty Lou Williams, First Methodist Church Educational Assistant, and Dr. Harry Harvin, a Methodist professor, advisors of the Methodist Student Movement. Enrollment, 808; Methodist preference, 106. The school's 36-hour Christianity and Culture course is a required core curriculum which goes through all four years. Denominational groups meet in local churches off campus. There has been some participation in state-wide MSM meetings.

University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill (State), the Rev. Robert Johnson, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 9,500; Methodist preference, 1,800. Annual Wesley Lectures are delivered by such renowned theologians as Marcus Barth. Emphases include study and the relation between theology and culture. A three-man department in the University offers a major in religion. There is some participation in state-wide MSM meetings.

Western Carolina College, Cullowhee (State), the Rev. A. A. Ferguson, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 1,825; Methodist preference, 417. Emphases include fellowship and stewardship. There is strong participation in the annual MSM state conference, but distance makes other participation difficult.

(Winston-Salem), the Rev. Robert W. Younts, Director of the Wesley Foundation. The Foundation serves four schools: Baptist Hospital School of Nursing (Baptist), Salem College (Moravian), Wake Forest College (Baptist), and Winston-Salem Teachers College (state). Total enrollment of the four schools, approximately 4,300; Methodist preference (all branches), approximately 800. Emphases include study and worship. There is some participation in state-wide MSM meetings.

Woman's College of U. N. C., Greensboro (State), Miss Iris Summers, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 3,165; Methodist preference, 820. Emphases include increasing student participation and interest.

One of our outstanding Wesley Foundations is located in Raleigh and serves five of the schools in that community. The year begins with summer preparation. The Foundation always sends officers to be trained in local, state, and national conferences.

The close relationship which exists with local churches is seen as families of the community open their homes to new students. As a part of its ministry the Wesley Foundation holds spiritual life retreats.

There is a great deal of co-operation in and enthusiasm for intercollegiate meetings. Recently the Foundation played host to a United Nations Model Assembly. Later a delegation of twenty-four attended the MSM State Conference in High Point.

Fellowship receives a very strong emphasis in the Foundation. Camping trips and an annual beach trip contribute to the enjoyment. In addition to trips for fun, some retreats are held primarily for the purpose of planning the program of the Foundation.

Community service receives a strong emphasis. The holding of a Christmas party for underprivileged children and the adoption of a needy family are examples of the kind of things that this and other Foundations often do.

Graduating seniors are honored annually and efforts are made to keep track of alumni. This is not quite as difficult as it might seem, since the Director of the Wesley Foundation is often called upon to perform the wedding ceremony of seniors and alumni.

A strong emphasis is placed upon the mission of the Church. A visit was made by René Bideau, an alumnus of the Wesley Foundation at Raleigh, who is a missionary to Costa Rica. Walt Whitehurst, a former associate director who is now a pastor spoke

to the group; he was a short term missionary in Latin America. The Director, "Brother Neal," was honored by being selected as a guest of the Board of Missions at its annual meeting at Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania.

Study is coming in for a greater emphasis. This year the Foundation followed the example of U.N.C., Duke, and Winston-Salem by forming a Community of Lay Scholars. Some stiff theological study is in store for those who stick to the subjects.

Social issues come in for their share of attention. The race problem, the Berlin crisis, the United Nations, and the alcohol problem are typical subjects of study.

Worship is held with students leading programs. Students are encouraged to attend the services of Fairmont Methodist Church, since the two institutions share the same building.

Monthly, deputation teams visit the state mental hospital where religious programs are conducted. Programs are exchanged with Pembroke State College and the Woman's College of U. N. C.

During the year "Brother Neal" has been assisted by the Reverend Lewis Chesser, a student at the Duke Divinity School. However, Lewis, the students, and especially "Brother Neal" are quick to say that Neal's main help comes from his wife whom the students fondly call "Sister Neal."

Some areas are emphasized more strongly by other Wesley Foundations and not every Foundation includes all of these areas in its program; but perhaps this outline of what is taking place in one community will help to show the Church at large the opportunity which is ours in every campus community.

REPORT OF THE STUDY COMMITTEE IN REFERENCE TO CORPORATIONS AUXILIARY TO AND/OR CONTROLLED BY THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE,

Since not all the corporations auxiliary to and/or controlled by the North Carolina Annual Conference have reported compliance with the resolutions, concerning amending charters, adopted at the 1960 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference (pages 85, 161-163, 1960 *Journal*), and the 1961 session of said conference (pages 168-169, 1961 *Journal*),

We recommend,

That the time for amending these charters be extended to February 1, 1963.

JUDICIAL COUNCIL DECISION—RE: LEGALITY OF COMMINGLING FUNDS

Section 2 of the report of the above committee, concerning the commingling of conference funds, which was adopted by the 1960 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference (page 161, 1960 *Journal*) was referred to the Judicial Council for a declaratory decision as to its legality and constitutionality. The Judicial Council has rendered its decision. The decision is as follows:

DECISION NO. 190

IN RE: THE RIGHT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE TO DIRECT ITS TRUSTEES CONCERNING THE INVESTMENT OF TRUST FUNDS

Digest of Decision

An Annual Conference has broad powers to direct its Board of Trustees concerning the investment of its trust funds including the right to instruct its Board of Trustees not to commingle the funds in its hands with other funds.

Statement of Facts

On November 7, 1951, pursuant to paragraph 709 of the 1948 *Discipline* of The Methodist Church (now paragraph 711 of the 1960 *Discipline*) the North Carolina Annual Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) of The Methodist Church sought and obtained a Certificate of Incorporation for "The Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, Incorporated." The original Corporate Charter thereof has been amended as hereinafter noted.

In November of 1953 the North Carolina Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church created a Central Treasury, which Central Treasury was given authority to handle the receipt and disbursement of the funds coming into the hands of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

In 1955 the North Carolina Conference authorized the creation of a corporation known as the Methodist Fund, Inc., which corporation was authorized by the Conference to buy and sell securities for the Central Treasury of the North Carolina Annual Conference. Thereafter, the Methodist Fund, Inc. was issued a Corporate Charter in the State of North Carolina.

In 1958 the name of the Methodist Fund, Inc. was changed to "The Methodist Foundation, Inc., a North Carolina Corporation."

Under the prevailing customs in the North Carolina Annual Conference the Central Treasury handles the funds of the Boards, Commissions and Agencies of the Conference.

On June 25, 1959, the North Carolina Annual Conference adopted a resolution directing the presiding Bishop to appoint a Committee of five or more persons to study and consider "the Charters, Amendments to Charters and By-Laws of all corporations auxiliary by and/or controlled by the Annual Conference and to consider any and all other matters which the Committee may determine pertinent and to report to the next Annual Session of the Annual Conference with such recommendations as said Committee may determine necessary for appropriate action to be taken in reference thereto by the Annual Conference." (Page 14, Minutes of the North Carolina Annual Conference, 1960 Session.)

The Bishop duly appointed the Committee required by the foregoing resolution and this Committee made its report to the Annual Conference on June 28, 1960. Said Committee report included inter alia a recommendation that the Charter of the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Incorporated, be amended "to allow the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, the explicit right to turn over funds to the Methodist Fund or Methodist Foundation, Inc. for the purpose of investment by the Methodist Foundation, Inc., as agents for the Board of Trustees and to invest the permanent funds of said Church but that said funds shall not be commingled with other funds of the Methodist Foundation, Inc." This resolution was adopted by the North Carolina Annual Conference following which a resolution was adopted by the conference referring Section 2 of the report (from which the quotation set forth above is taken) to the Judicial Council for ruling as to its legality and constitutionality.

The 1961 session of the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, authorized an application to the Secretary of State of North Carolina for certain amendments to the Corporate Charter of The Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, Incorporated which would:

(a) Change the name of the Corporation to "The Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Incorporated."

(b) Specifically provide that said Corporation "shall be under the jurisdiction, control and direction of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church."

(c) Specifically provide that the Corporation should administer the assets delivered to it in accord with the discipline The Methodist Church.

(d) Provide that any alteration or amendment to the Corporate Charter would first have to be approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

The Corporate Charter of the Corporation was duly amended in accord with the action of the Annual Conference.

The corporate By-Laws of the Corporation were amended to provide:

(a) That any amendment to said By-Laws must first be approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference.

(b) That the Board of Directors of the Corporation be given the specific authority "to place with the Methodist Foundation, Inc., a creature of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, such funds as it may deem proper for the purpose of investment by the Foundation. The Methodist Foundation, Inc. serving as agent for the Trustees shall be required to keep an accurate accounting of all funds held and invested for the Board of Trustees. Further, a financial report shall be placed in the hands of the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees once each quarter, indicating the investment transactions during the period, the valuation of all funds of the Foundation and showing specifically the funds held for the Board of Trustees. A certified copy of an annual audit performed by a certified public accountant shall be placed in the hands of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees annually. The Methodist Foundation shall have as a fully qualified and voting member one representative elected by the Conference Board of Trustees. Finally, any funds of the North Carolina Annual Conference held in trust by the Board of Trustees and placed in the hands of the Methodist Foundation, Inc. for investment must be payable to the Board of Trustees on demand, as its equity appears."

Most of the agencies of the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, including the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, Incorporated, invest their funds with the Methodist Foundation, Inc. under an arrangement by which said agencies in effect purchase units or shares in the Methodist Foundation, Inc., the purchase price of which units or shares is in direct proportion to the book value of such shares or units as of the date of purchase.

Jurisdiction

The Judicial Council takes jurisdiction of this matter under Paragraph 914 (8) of the 1960 edition of the *Discipline* of The Methodist Church.

Analysis

This matter comes to us from the North Carolina Annual Conference requesting a decision as to the legality and constitutionality of a resolution of said Conference permitting its Board of Trustees "the explicit right to turn over funds to the Methodist Fund or Methodist Foundation, Inc. for the purpose of investment" . . . but directing that "said funds shall not be commingled with other funds of The Methodist Foundation, Inc."

On the record before us no constitutional question is made to appear. We therefore confine ourselves to the question of the legality of the action of the North Carolina Annual Conference in adopting the resolution from which an appeal was taken.

Briefly stated the questions before us are: (1) Can the North Carolina Annual Conference direct or permit its Conference Board of Trustees to invest trust funds in The Methodist Foundation, Inc. as set out in the foregoing statement of facts? (2) Can the North Carolina Annual Conference direct its Board of Trustees that in the investment of its trust funds they shall not be commingled with other funds?

Both of these questions are answered in the affirmative.

Paragraph 711 of the 1960 *Discipline* states:

"1. Each Annual Conference shall have an incorporated *Board of Trustees*." Then follow instructions as to the election of members of such board.

"2. The said corporation shall receive, collect, and hold in trust for the benefit of the Annual Conference any and all donations, bequests, and devises of any kind or character, real or personal, that may be given, devised, bequeathed, or conveyed to the said board or to the Annual Conference as such for any benevolent, charitable, or religious purpose, and shall administer the same and the income therefrom in accordance with the direction of the donor, trustor, or testator, and in the interest of the church, society, institution, or agency contemplated by such donor, trustor, or testator, under the direction of the Annual Conference. The Board shall have power to invest, reinvest, buy, sell, transfer, and convey any and all funds and properties which it may hold in trust, subject always to the terms of the legacy, devise, or donation . . . Funds committed to this board may be invested by it only in collateral that is amply secured and after such investments have been approved by the said board or its agency or committee charged with such investment, *unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference*." (Emphasis added).

Under the above quoted provisions of Paragraph 711 (2) of the 1960 *Discipline*, it is clear that neither the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference nor the Annual Conference itself may legally direct the investments of funds entrusted to it in violation or disregard of the specific terms governing the investment of funds which have been entrusted to it.

"The board shall have power to invest, reinvest, buy, sell, transfer and convey any and all funds and properties which it may hold in trust subject always to the terms of the legacy, devise, or donation."

It seems that this principle of administration is so clearly so forth in paragraph 711 (2) of the *Discipline*, that it is not open to question. If, therefore, the limiting conditions governing any particular fund or trust provide that such funds shall be forever maintained intact and not commingled with other funds held by the Board of Trustees, they are forbidden by this law of the church to disregard such limiting condition.

Funds not specifically designated and restricted by conditions under which a "donation, bequest, or devise" comes into possession of an Annual Conference, become a part of the "Permanent Fund" of the Annual Conference and are held in trust by the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference, Paragraph 711 (2) of the *Discipline* gives broad discretionary power to the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference in determining how the funds entrusted to it shall be invested but always subject to any direction the Annual Conference may give.

It is the opinion of the Council, and we so hold, that the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Incorporated, when authorized to do so by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, may invest funds held by it and which are not assets of a legacy, devise or donation under a trust agreement or arrangement prohibiting such investment in the purchase of shares or units in The Methodist Foundation, Inc. in the same way in which it can invest such funds in the shares, obligations, bonds or stocks of some other person, firm or corporation.

We direct attention to the fact that the investment procedure followed by the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, Incorporated as herein outlined does not constitute a commingling of the funds of such Board of Trustees with the funds of others. Nor does it constitute a turning over of its funds to some other person, firm or corporation for investment purposes. Rather, it is a purchase by said Board of Trustees of shares or units in an investment corporation: to wit, The Methodist Foundation, Incorporated. Such investment is represented by a certificate from the Foundation to the Board showing the number of shares or units owned by it, and such shares or units may be liquidated or cashed-in on demand by said Board of Trustees. The legal relationship of the Board and the Foundation is not one of creditor and debtor, but the Board is a shareholder or unit holder in the Foundation, and in case of a liquidation thereof the Board would

be entitled to share pro rata with the other unit or share holders in the net assets of the Foundation after its creditors have been paid. In other words, the relationship of the Board of Trustees to the Foundation is the same as its relationship would be to any other corporation in which it is a stockholder. Under the facts of this case the position of the Board is strengthened by the fact that the beneficiary of the trust funds which it administers, the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, has specifically authorized it to invest in the shares or units of the Foundation. Thus, the Annual Conference shares the responsibility for the making of such an investment and could not be heard to complain if for any reason such investment proved to be unwise or improvident.

With reference to the right of the North Carolina Annual Conference to direct its Board of Trustees not to commingle its trust funds with the funds of others we think there can be no doubt that the Annual Conference has the right to give such a direction to its Trustees in view of the provisions of Paragraph 711 (2) of the *Discipline*.

Decision

It is therefore the decision of the Judicial Council:

1. That it is legal for the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Incorporated to invest funds entrusted to it in shares or units of The Methodist Foundation, Inc., provided that in doing so it does not violate the terms of any specific trust.

2. That the North Carolina Annual Conference has the legal right to direct its trustees not to commingle its trust funds with the funds of others.

(For the information of the Conference, the Committee on Revision of Charters has included herewith in its report the decision of the Judicial Council in its entirety.)

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Nineteen sixty-one opened with the largest Annual Meeting in the Council's history, held January 30-February 1 in White Memorial Presbyterian Church, Raleigh. Outstanding speakers included Bernard Boyd, Theodore Wedel, Ralph Sockman, Benjamin Mays, Mrs. Murdoch McLeod, and Carlyle Marney. At the close of the meeting, Dr. Harold J. Dudley, Presbyterian Synod General Secretary, was installed as Council president, succeeding Dr. Cecil W. Robbins. Mrs. Dudley began her second year as General Chairman of the Department of United Church Women. Rev. Vernon Tyson, pastor of Jonesboro Heights Methodist Church, was elected to the Executive Board.

The Council program is carried out through five Commissions—Christian Education, Christian Social Action, Town and Country Work, Ecumenical Relations, and the Pastoral Ministry—and two Departments—United Church Women and United Christian Youth. Features of the program included:

Christian Education: A Camping Institute for leaders at Camp Chestnut Ridge in April, sponsored by the Camping Committee. The Student Christian Council of college age youth co-sponsored the Raleigh Intercollegiate Conference and supported an African student attending college here. The Youth Work Committee sponsored these U.C. Y.M. projects: a retreat at Camp New Hope; a work camp at Lumberton; a legislative assembly at Raleigh. Weekday Bible teaching continues to reach thousands of elementary and high school students in 50 communities.

Christian Social Action: The Alcoholism Committee met twice; held a one-day Institute at Morehead City in February, and launched an expanded program of lectures before both high school and college students. A regular series of preaching missions was set up at State Prison. The Human Relations Committee set up a workshop at Boiling Springs for ministers and laymen, November 30th; more are planned for 1962. It also communicated its views to public officials and private firms over the state. Through the efforts of the Institutional Ministry Committee a chaplain was installed for the first time at Memorial Hospital, Chapel Hill. He is Rev. Fred Reid, and he will maintain a working relationship to the Council through this committee. World Affairs

Committee again co-sponsored conferences at Chapel Hill and Blue Ridge Assembly. State and Local Legislative Affairs Committee appeared before the General Assembly in Raleigh to speak in behalf of migrant legislation and other bills of interest to church people.

Town and Country Commission: This Commission sponsors CROP, the Migrant Ministry, and Rural Church Work. CROP continues to feed the millions of hungry overseas at the lowest possible cost. Our State Council of Churches carries on the local administration of CROP on a volunteer basis so that no overhead is deducted from state receipts by our office. In co-operation with Church World Service (of which CROP is a division), the N. C. Council also collects clothing for use overseas. About 100,000 pounds was collected through our centers in eight of our cities. Under the Migrant Ministry clothing is also collected for use of migrants here in North Carolina. Fifteen staff workers served in two Day-Care centers for migrant children and in the camps of five counties (Camden, Carteret, Currituck, Pasquotank, and Henderson). A new Harvester station wagon was dedicated at the Annual Assembly and joined two others owned by the Council of Churches for this ministry. A Rural Church 3-day Seminar, set for May, had to be cancelled due to small registration, but has been re-set for 1962 (May 21-23 at State College in Raleigh).

Ecumenical Relations Commission: This Commission sponsored the Summer Camp Ministry in Doughton Park for the third year, with increased attendance reported. An enlarged program to include other areas is planned for 1962. The observance of Reformation Day and World Communion Sunday is also encouraged. Radio-TV was transferred from this Commission to the new Public Relations Committee.

Pastoral Ministry Commission: A splendid Pastors' Conference was sponsored in conjunction with the Annual Assembly in Raleigh. The 1962 Conference was held in First Presbyterian Church, Burlington, January 30th with good attendance and interest. Dr. Robert V. Moss, Dr. Richard C. Hoefler, Rev. A. Dudley Ward, and Dr. John A. Mackay brought messages. The Committee also sponsored a Pastor's Institute on migrant work at Elizabeth City in May.

All of the above Commissions, with their sub-committees, have officially appointed representatives from the North Carolina Conference serving in active capacities.

In other significant action during 1961, your Council observed its 25th Anniversary with a Silver Anniversary Convocation held in First Presbyterian Church, Greensboro, May 1-2. The distinguished group of speakers included Eugene Carson Blake, Frank P. Graham, Billy Graham, Liston Pope and Rufus Clements.

A new General Committee on Public Relations was organized during the year to study more effective employment of and co-operation with all media of communications, including the press, radio, TV, audio-visuals, and the printed word. Mr. Blaine M. Madison, a member of Edenton Street Methodist Church and State Commissioner of Correction and Training, is Chairman.

The Women's Department sponsored highly successful observances of World Day of Prayer, World Community Day, and May Fellowship Day. A new Council of UCW was organized in Thomasville; a two-day seminar for officers was held in Raleigh; and four District Institutes were held in March. The Department over-subscribed its goal for the new Harvester wagon used in the migrant ministry. It also was active in support of legislation for migrants.

The Youth Department sponsored two retreats, a work camp, and a Fall legislative Assembly in Raleigh.

Summary

All of these activities, and many other services which space does not permit to be listed, are carried on day by day as your State Council seeks to serve the interests of its 27 member bodies, of which the N. C. Conference is one. Because it is a truly representative agency, the Council remains always responsive to the will of its member bodies, and it is the only agency in our state which concerns itself with all areas of the Christian witness. It does its work on a budget far smaller than any of our larger individual churches (\$32,845.00 in 1961, not including the Women's Department). This

small sum, however, served to administer a program involving over a quarter of a million dollars in cash and commodity receipts.

Your Council is grateful for the support given it by the Conference and for the leadership which Methodists have supplied through the years, exemplified by its retiring president, Cecil Robbins, and by Bishop Garber. It asks for your constant prayers, interest, and continued support in seeking to serve our Lord Jesus Christ.

REPORT OF THE DEACONESS BOARD

At the present time, there is only one active deaconess serving in the North Carolina Conference—Miss Ethelynde Ballance, director of Christian Education in the Raeford Methodist Church. Because of health reasons, Miss Mamiej Chandler is on leave of absence from her work as director of the Methodist Student Center in Greenville.

Three retired deaconesses reside within our Conference: Miss Jennie Congleton of Greenville, Miss Elizabeth Davis of Wake Forest, and Miss Mary Nichols of Wilmington.

In the annual meeting of the Conference Deaconess Board held at our Methodist Retirement Home in Durham in March, we discussed the necessity for continuous interpretation of the work of the deaconess. Plans were made for distributing among our ministers a leaflet which explains the deaconess relationship.

Nineteen sixty-three marks the 75th anniversary of the Deaconess Movement. We look forward to participating in the observance of this anniversary. Plans are being made to tie in this observance with the Southeastern Jurisdiction Convocation to be held in Memphis, Tennessee, March 5-8, 1963.

Miss Ballance is ready to answer as many calls as possible to speak, to interpret the deaconess relationship, to present the call to full-time Christian service.

We feel the need for presenting deaconess work to our youth in district and conference vocational conferences. Commissions on Christian Vocations in local churches also need to be informed, and to pass on information to youth.

The Deaconess Board recommends:

That we seek to continue finding meaning in our theme for the quadrennium, "Our Mission Today," with emphasis on (1) the faith which compels us, (2) the factors which confront us, (3) the frontiers that call us, and (4) the program that unites us in witness and service.

That there be an ACTIVE Committee on Christian Vocations in each local church.

That the deaconess relationship be presented at "Vocations Conference" whenever held on either the district or conference level.

That the deaconess relationship be presented to all women employees of the church, and to business and professional women in the local church.

SUMMARY REPORT FOR 1961-1962

Church School Membership and Attendance

For the first time since Methodist union our conference showed a decrease in church school membership in 1960-1961 as compared with the previous year. The decrease of

2.3% was the same as the decrease experienced by The Methodist Church as a whole. While there is reason to believe some of this loss was due to errors in reporting, it is obvious that we did experience a loss along with the total church.

We are unable to account for this loss which should be of great concern to all of us. A number of factors could have contributed to this decline—indifference of the pastor in the church school, poorly motivated and trained teachers, poor church school program, inactive Membership Cultivation Superintendent, no definite plan for reaching and keeping members, lack of hospitality and failure to visit in homes, haphazard ways of keeping rolls and promiscuous ways of marking off members, no home-members plan, failure to start new classes, failure to start an outpost school or class, etc. The basic reason for this decline, however, is probably our zealous concern to preserve the church as an expression of our devotion to middle-class values and lack of genuinely Christian concern for persons. Most churches can increase their membership and attendance if they want to and are willing to work. We call upon all of our pastors and people to pray earnestly for a revival of devotion to Christ which will send us out to reach the lost in His name and with His gospel.

Evangelism Through the Church School

During the past year the Conference Boards of Education and Evangelism joined hands in a program known as the "United Evangelistic Mission." The first phase of this mission dealt with discovering unreached prospects and winning them to active membership in the church and church school. The second phase dealt with a ministry to "outsiders" through the establishment of Outpost Church Schools. District-wide meetings were held in the early fall to launch the first phase of this program. A second series of district meetings were held in January to launch the Outpost Church School program. We feel that this "United Evangelistic Mission" was most successful. Approximately 21,470 prospects for the church and 30,000 prospects for the church school were discovered. Thousands of these have been won. The pastors' reports to the Annual Conference will reveal the exact number. These reports will show a substantial increase in church and church school membership. Additional thousands remain to be won through the preaching, teaching and outreach ministry of the church.

Leadership Training

Dedicated and trained leadership is essential to the growth and vitality of the local church. To assist local churches in training their workers is one of the principal functions of the Conference Board of Education. It is for this purpose that "field workers" are employed and a major portion of its budget expended. During the past year 35 Subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools have been held with an enrollment of approximately 3,500 and 2,400 course cards of credit issued. In these schools there were seventeen laboratory observation courses with an enrollment of 229 and 191 course cards of credit issued. Six additional one-teacher schools enrolled 111 and issued 51 course cards of credit. We now have more than 500 persons certified to teach approximately 100 approved courses. Twenty-five persons attended the Leadership and Laboratory Schools at Lake Junaluska. Three persons attended the Seminar for Prospective Laboratory Instructors and one person attended the Audio-Visual Seminar at Lake Junaluska. Three persons attended the SeJ. Recreation Workshop at Leesburg, Florida. Nine District Junior High Curriculum Workshops were attended by 151 persons. Fourteen Vacation Church School Institutes were attended by 1225 persons. Five Church Library Seminars were attended by 56 persons. The two-day Orientation Workshop for New Pastors, sponsored by the various conference boards and agencies, was attended by approximately thirty pastors beginning their first years of service in the North Carolina Conference.

Numerous local church consultations, weekend labs, seminars, etc., have been conducted by the conference and district staffs and other resource leaders. Seventeen local church consultations on Church School Building and Equipment were conducted by the conference staff. Other consultations have been in the areas of Goals and Materials for Methodist Church Schools, Team Teaching, Planning a Unit of Study, Curriculum Selection, Leadership Training, Evangelism Through the Church School, Room Arrangement and Equipment, etc.

Outpost Church Schools

An Outpost Church School has been described as "an organized, sponsored, supervised continuous teaching ministry, beyond the usual and regular program of the church, to groups of persons who are not now being reached by the church." We are confident it is a valid ministry by which we can reach persons not now being reached with the teachings of the Master. Outpost schools and classes may be started in all kind of places where people are not now attending church or church school: private homes, school buildings, public halls, funeral chapels, country stores or service stations, self-service laundry, garage, fire station, new shopping center, vacant store, homes for aged, jails, hotels, vacation centers, etc. Outpost Church Schools are of five varieties: (1) in churches without church schools or in abandoned churches, (2) In new churches, (3) In locations which may grow into churches, (4) In nonchurched communities which may not grow into churches, (5) In churched communities to reach persons who do not come to the church because of occupational, social, economic or cultural barriers.

A series of district meetings on Outpost Church Schools were held in January to introduce this new ministry to our pastors and local church leaders. Rev. Randle Dew, staff member of our General Board of Education, Nashville, Tennessee, was our resource leader in these meetings which were well attended. Literature was distributed and local churches were requested to survey their areas for outpost possibilities and to report these to their district superintendent. At the time of this writing 55 outpost possibilities have been reported by seven districts. Local churches have agreed to sponsor 40 of these and 13 are already in operation. A District Committee on Outpost Church Schools has been set up in each district under the direction of the District Superintendent and District Director of General Church School Work. These committees will seek to stimulate interest in this ministry and give guidance and assistance to local churches sponsoring outposts. The Conference Board of Education staff will also assist in this program which we hope will gradually grow into a significant ministry.

EMPHASIS FOR 1962-1963

Increasing Church School Membership and Attendance

A. The following steps are suggested for improving Church School membership and attendance for 1962-1963:

1. The District Superintendents are requested to urge each local church to elect a Membership Cultivation Superintendent who will function. The Membership Cultivation Superintendent's Kit should be placed in this official's hands to help him do his job well.

2. Commissions on Education should follow suggestions in the leaflet, "How to Get More Members—In Nine (Easy) Hard Lessons."

3. Each local church Commission on Education and Workers' Conference should study the leaflet, "Standards for Church School Roll, 1960-64," at meetings early in the church school year. It is recommended that the District Directors of General Church School Work be informed concerning the above standards and that they be given responsibility for promoting knowledge and practice of the same in local churches of their districts among Church School Superintendents, Membership Cultivation Superintendents, and Pastors.

4. It is recommended that each local church Commission on Education study the need for the organization of new classes in the church school.

5. It is recommended that emphasis be given Church School membership and attendance during the months of September and October, 1962, in each local church.

Evangelism Through the Church School

A. It is feared that some have interpreted evangelism to mean the recruitment of congenial individuals who share our social and economic commitments rather than a faithful proclamation of the "good news" to all men everywhere regardless of race, economic or social status. They may have assumed that simply getting "joiners" is enough. Perhaps our present decline in membership and attendance is God's judgment upon a church that has failed to faithfully proclaim and live out the implications of the

gospel. We can only speculate concerning these matters; for we cannot know the operations of the inscrutable Divine wisdom. But we can earnestly seek to know God's will for His church by studying what the Bible and Christian doctrine teach concerning the church. To this end, pastors are encouraged to read *Rebirth of Ministry* by James Smart and *Christian Nurture and the Church* by Randolph Crump Miller, and they are urged to lead their Official Boards and all officers and teachers of the church in a study of the New Testament conception of the church making use of materials adapted for lay understanding.

B. The Church School continues to be the most effective evangelizing agency we have. In 1960-61, out of 4,733 members joining the church on profession of faith, 3,855 (81%) came from the church school. This compares favorably with 6 out of 10 (60%) joining from the Church School on profession of faith in the total Methodist Church.

C. Steps for improving the Church School as an evangelizing agency:

1. It is recommended that Workers' Conference sessions in January-February be devoted to training teachers in their evangelistic functions.

2. Churches are urged to conduct classes in preparation for church membership, and it is suggested that a minimum of 12 sessions be given to this preparation. *Understanding the Methodist Church* by Nolan B. Harmon, is a particularly good text for adult groups studying in this area.

3. The Commission on Education should work closely with the Commission on Membership and Evangelism in formulating and implementing the evangelistic program of the church.

D. It is recommended that the Board of Education endorse the Southeastern Jurisdictional program of evangelism through the Church School, but due to previous commitments in the conference program for 1962-63, this program should be undertaken in 1963-64 in close co-operation with the Board of Evangelism. It is further recommended that leaders for this program be sent to Lake Junaluska August 10-12, 1962, for training.

Leadership Training

A. How to improve present programs

1. Subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools

a. Boards of Managers of Christian Workers' Schools are urged to make up from local records or from records on file in the Conference office a list of all courses taught in previous schools, showing the year in which the course was offered. Reference should be made to such a list as the curriculum for the new school is being set up to prevent too frequent duplication of the same courses or similar courses; it will also reveal areas which have been neglected in previous schools.

b. Make greater use of the District Director of General Church School Work or the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education. Keep both notified about plans.

c. On last night of each school ask each student to write his evaluation of the school as well as suggestions for the next school. This information can be of value to the Board of Managers in planning for future schools.

2. It is suggested that one-teacher schools may be of greater value in larger churches if they specialize in one field. Such a school in a local church might reach all teachers and prospective workers for a selected area each year.

3. The guidance material provided for deans of Christian Workers' Schools is recommended.

4. Coaching Conferences should be held to certify new instructors in fields where there is need.

B. New Training Programs

1. A Conference on Christian Education for local church school officers and teachers should be held on a weekend basis at one of our Methodist colleges or camps at a time suitable in the summer of 1963. This conference is to be planned by the Executive Secretary in consultation with his staff.

2. We are convinced that the Sunday Evening Fellowship provides an opportunity to open again our churches on Sunday evenings for a creative program for our families. The Board urges local churches to give careful study to the possibility of beginning such programs. Our Conference Board staff will assist local churches in organ-

izing and directing them. Churches desiring consultation services on the Sunday Evening Fellowship are requested to contact the Conference Executive Secretary.

3. We approve the idea of District Interboard Schools to train Commission Chairmen in the organization and program of their respective areas of work. Also, we recommend that our Executive Secretary contact the Executive Leadership of the Boards of the Conference to enlist their interest and support for such a program to be held in the early part of 1964.

4. We are cognizant of the helpfulness of the first series of District Pastors' Consultations on Christian Education held early in this quadrennium. We recommend that our Executive Secretary and his staff begin planning for another such series of consultations to be held early in the next quadrennium.

5. The staff of the Board of Education is preparing a local church program of leadership training known as "GUIDE." We commend the thorough study that has been given this matter and are convinced of the potential usefulness of "GUIDE." We recommend continued study and revision designed to perfect this instrument and look forward to its use in the churches of the Conference.

Local Church Consultation Service

Pastors and local church leaders have repeatedly asked for qualified persons to come to their church for consultation in some specific area of need. In an effort to meet this need we are launching a program to be called "Local Church Consultation Service" which will be available to local churches late next fall. Carefully selected persons will be trained as Local Church Consultants in District Pilot Lab Consultations to be conducted by Rev. Randle Dew and the Conference staff the first two weeks in September, 1962. Information brochures will be sent to local churches with application forms which may be used in requesting this service in any one of a number of areas of work. The consultants will serve without honorarium. The local church will pay travel and other expenses. The District Directors of General Church School Work will administer the program in their respective districts. This program will make it possible to help many local churches which the Conference staff cannot reach for lack of time. Local churches are urged to make use of this service.

Local churches are urged to call on the staff of the Board of Education for consultation in the area of building and improving Church School facilities.

The Conference Board of Education observes with pride the rich store of experience, the effective leadership and the ever-increasing usefulness of our Executive Secretary, Dr. C. P. Morris. His leadership has been recognized beyond the North Carolina Conference as evidenced by the fact that for the second time he has been chosen as the Dean of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Leadership School at Lake Junaluska. We enthusiastically recommend his reappointment for the year 1962-63.

COMMITTEE ON CHILDREN'S WORK

PROGRESS REPORT FOR 1961-1962

"Every generation faces a somewhat changed context for living from that which preceded. Therefore, although it may be safe to say that human nature does not change

and that the gospel is always good news, children will make differing responses within varied environments. This is why educational theories and practices inevitably vary. Past work met the needs of a particular generation and gave insights on which to build for the future, but it cannot give the entire framework.

"Children's work today revolves around certain understandings in child development, the insights of contemporary Biblical theology, and an awareness of the church as an enviroing fellowship. Thus the rewarding work of guiding the Christian nurture of children continues, ever-changing, and ever renewed." (Taylor, ed., *Religious Education* p. 119).

To help the Church School teacher in knowledge and understanding of the Christian faith and the child in his environment today, much of the work of the Conference Director and the Children's Committee has been that of leadership training.

During the year 10 laboratory courses were conducted. Of the 142 persons enrolled in these courses, 121 received Course Cards or Recognition. A weekend Primary Laboratory Course was held in one local church for its teachers and prospective teachers.

Three hundred and ninety persons enrolled in children's workers' courses in twenty-five Christian Workers' Schools. Of this number, 275 fulfilled the requirements of the course and received Course Cards of Recognition.

To aid teachers in the local church in teaching the missionary units in the January Additional Sessions, workshops were held. In some of the districts where separate workshops were not conducted, a special session was held as a part of the Woman's Society of Christian Service District Seminar.

Fourteen Vacation Church School Institutes were held in the spring to guide teachers preparing to teach Vacation Church School in local churches this summer. One thousand two hundred twenty-five persons participated in these Institutes. As in previous years all instructors were persons from the North Carolina Annual Conference. A special class in connection with the Vacation Church School Institutes was conducted by Miss Grace Wright of Richmond, Virginia, for local church librarians.

Camping for the Junior age group was carried out at Camp Don-Lee and Camp Chestnut Ridge. During the summer of 1961 there were 384 Juniors in attendance. The adult leadership totaled 124.

A second annual meeting of the teachers at Haves Barton Methodist Church, Raleigh, on October 28th. Twenty-two persons were in attendance. Miss Rebecca Yow of Danville, Virginia, was the resource leader. The study topic was, "Developing Religious Concepts in the Kindergarten."

An area of increasing demand has been that of requests to the Conference Director for consultation on educational facilities for children. Ten such consultations have been held. Several follow-through sessions with local church personnel have been held in connection with these consultations.

An increasing number of requests from local churches are coming for consultation in all areas of the program of Christian Education of children. The Conference Director and the District Directors are making every effort to fulfill these requests.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1962-1963

1. Nursery Home Visitor

a. That each District Director secure the names and addresses of all Nursery Home Visitors in the local churches of her respective district.

b. That emphasis be given to improving the Nursery Home Visitation program, using new materials now available.

2. Use of Methodist Materials

a. That stress be made in the local church of the importance of the use of Methodist materials in working with children.

b. That children's workers recognize the need to help children and parents to know what they believe as Methodists and as Christians, and to that end that there be increased emphasis on the use of parent guidance material as provided in the Church School Curriculum.

c. That leaders be aware that churches need help on the local level in the use of

Child Guidance and other curriculum materials.

3. Vacation Church Schools

a. That the Vacation Church School Institutes be held the weeks of March 4-8, March 11-15, and March 25-29.

b. That Mrs. Laura Williard, Mrs. Jewel Glenn, and Mrs. J. A. Auman comprise a committee to read and evaluate the texts available for the year 1963 and to select the texts to be used in this conference.

c. That a 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. schedule, eliminating lunch, be tried in 1963.

d. That classes in Day Camping be held as part of the Vacation Church School Institutes in 1963.

4. Laboratory Schools

a. That a committee representing the various areas of the Conference be convened to plan an experimental combination Commuters and Residence Laboratory School to be held in 1963 in a location and at a time selected by the committee.

b. That experience gained at this Laboratory School be used as a basis for planning additional Laboratory Schools in coming years.

c. That leaders of local Christian Workers' Schools be encouraged to make increased use of Laboratory Courses in their schools.

5. Missionary Education

a. That the Conference Board of Education join with the Conference Board of Missions and the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service in conducting Missionary Training Sessions in the various districts of the Conference.

6. Ministry to Exceptional Children

a. That Miss Charity Holland, Rev. A. C. Lee, Dr. Hardwicke Harshman, Felix Barker, E. C. Shoaf, and Wesley Brogan continue as a committee to work toward establishing and promoting a Sunday program for exceptional children.

7. Local Church Consultation Service

a. That the Local Church Consultation Laboratories to be held September 4-14 be strongly supported by all children's workers.

b. That our Conference Director of Children's Work be commended for the exceptional service given in local church consultations this year for teachers of children, and that this service be continued within the limits imposed by time and scheduling.

8. Weekday Nursery and Kindergarten

a. That in view of present progress in Weekday Nursery and Kindergarten work that this program be continued with the development of additional workshops and training enterprises.

b. That the Conference Director of Children's Work send the leaflet, "Kindergarten Graduations—No," to directors of Weekday Kindergartens.

9. That the Board of Education plan a program of special service in the children's field for the small churches of the Wilmington and Elizabeth City Districts using the services of the General Board of Nashville.

10. That each District Director form a Council of interested workers from her area to plan with her the program for that district in the field of children's work.

CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF CHILDREN'S WORK

There is increasing evidence that more effective and improved teaching practices are being undertaken by teachers of children in our local churches. Moreover, there is a general improvement of morale and dedication to sharing the gospel with our children by our teachers and workers. There are many new faces among those lay persons who ride the circuit teaching in workshops, institutes, workers' schools, and local church consultations. There is a feeling of confidence and gratitude for this firm grasp of the work maintained by our Director. These evidences, and more, suggest the excellent character of the work of our Director. Therefore, we wholeheartedly commend and endorse him and recommend his reappointment.

The Rev. Mr. Brogan has been asked by the General Board of Education to serve as Supervisor of the Laboratory School of the Southeastern Jurisdiction for 1962 at

Lake Junaluska. We commend him on this selection and wish to recognize his outstanding leadership in this field.

Section C

COMMITTEE ON YOUTH WORK

PROGRESS REPORT FOR 1961-1962

Enrollment in the Youth Division increased 700 to a total of 28,448, for an increase of 2.5% in the year 1960-61.

The Senior Workshop at Louisburg College was attended by 221 delegates and staff.

Four hundred and seventy-six delegates and staff attended the Tenth Annual Conference Session at Duke University in August. These persons were joined by 1,800 youth and their adult leaders for Rally Day.

Four hundred and sixty-nine Junior Highs participated in the summer camping program. The second Senior Camp was attended by 75 youth, an increase of twenty from the year before.

In the area of leadership education we can report thirty-two courses were offered in Christian Workers' Schools with 478 persons enrolled and 354 receiving credit cards. This report includes eight Junior High Labs and one Senior Lab—an increase of four laboratory courses over last year.

The new Junior High School Curriculum was introduced to the Conference through workshop in each district. One hundred and fifty-one persons attended.

Vacation School Institutes were conducted for workers with Junior Highs with 121 persons enrolled.

During the past year four persons have received certification as Junior High Laboratory instructors, and one person has received Senior High Laboratory certification.

A new venture for Senior Highs will be attempted this summer at Camp Don-Lee. The purpose of this weekend conference is "to help youth discover principles through which they may establish personal standards for moral conduct in the light of the Christian gospel." This conference will go by the title of "Moral Concerns Conference," and will concentrate on one particular area of moral concern, the "Role of Sex in Christian Living."

The second Appalachian Trail Hike for older youth and single young adults will be held the latter part of the summer. Last year's pioneer adventure was a success and indications are pointing toward the possibility of having to conduct two hikes this year to accommodate the persons.

An effort was made this year to stop the seemingly waning interest in the summer program for Seniors. The Senior Youth Council has tried to develop a program which will meet the needs of youth and one which will be interesting to them. Attempts were made to make the publicity more attractive. A set of slides was developed for use in local churches. These slides, which depict the many facets of the program, have been in constant demand throughout the Conference.

As of February 28, \$9,165.66 has been raised on the Conference goal of \$18,000.00 for the Methodist Youth Fund. This is an increase of about \$1,100.00 over the same period last year.

The special MYF Study Commission authorized by the Board of Education at its annual meeting last year has been appointed and has held its first meeting. The Reverend Mr. Lewis Durham of the General Board of Education met with the group. The purposes of the Study Commission have been formulated, and this group is ready to proceed with its most important and most needed task.

A word of thanks should go to the District Directors of Youth Work for their excellent leadership and service during the past year. They are a dedicated group who are continually searching for ways of making the gospel relevant in the lives of today's youth.

Recommendations for Youth Work

1. That the special MYF Study Commission be continued; and that this Study Commission continue its task of studying, evaluating, and recommending program for all levels of the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

2. That a Convocation of Adult Workers with Youth be held in late summer 1963 with special emphasis being placed on "Youth—Their World, Their Dreams, Their Faith, Their Gospel."

3. That a Senior High United Nations-Washington Study Tour be held March 16-22, 1963.

4. That the Youth Council continue to explore the possibility of a Senior Work Camp.

5. That an Older Youth-Young Adult Workshop" be held in each district to present to interested persons the problems, possibilities, and potentialities of an Older Youth-Young Adult program in their churches.

6. That a pilot seminar be held with working older youth-young adults in an attempt to discover what ministry we as a church can have with this group.

7. That the Youth Council explore the possibilities for a Recreation Workshop to be held as soon as possible.

8. That the Youth Council consider the possibility of having adult delegates to the 1963 Workshop and Annual Conference Session on the basis of a one to ten ratio.

9. That Boards of Managers of Christian Workers' Schools include a Senior High Laboratory Course in their curriculum for the purpose of training local church teachers to use the new undated unit "Sex and the Whole Person" by Frank Wier.

10. That courses for adult workers with youth be included in all Christian Workers' Schools.

11. That the fall District Youth Rallies be "Youth and Missions Rallies" with special emphasis of the Methodist Youth Fund.

12. That a youth mission study be held in each local church using the study materials, "The Christian Mission on the Rim of East Asia" or "The Church's Mission and Persons of Special Need."

13. That the teachers of these mission units be given help and guidance in their preparation by means of the Training Sessions for Missionary Education, October 28-November 2.

14. That the local church Secretary of Student Work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service be urged to send the "blue cards" to the college campus.

15. That a District Planning Retreat be held soon after ACS to evaluate and to plan the district and subdistrict program for the year.

16. That the youth of the Conference be informed of the possibility of their participation in the Annual European Caravan.

We commend the Rev. J. Conrad Glass, Jr., for his guidance in the broadening youth program which offers to the youth of our Conference greater opportunities for personal spiritual enrichment and deeper understanding of the outreaching ministry of the Church. We feel that his guidance comes from his own personal commitment and devotion to this task. We heartily recommend his reappointment as Conference Director of Youth Work.

Section D

COMMITTEE ON ADULT WORK

R. L. CANNON, JR., *Chairman*

PROGRESS REPORT, 1961-62

Enrollment in the Adult Division decreased by 1503 to a total of 61,114. This is a decrease of 2.3% from last year's total enrollment.

A total of eleven courses pertaining to the work of the Adult Division were offered in Christian Workers' Schools. There was an enrollment of 239 with 157 Course Cards of Recognition.

The Young Adult Assembly at Camp Don-Lee was attended by 48 delegates. The Assembly was mainly devoted to giving participants training and experience in various teaching methods and procedures.

The Second Annual Spiritual Life Retreat, Camp Chestnut Ridge, had 45 participants.

Much progress has been made during the year in the training of adult leaders in the proper procedures and methods in leading individual groups in selecting study materials.

Young Adult Week was observed in many local churches during the week of January 21-28. Activities for such an observance were suggested by the Conference Young Adult Council in a mailing to all local churches.

New resources, activities, and ideas were presented to local churches through mailings of the **Young Adult Letter**.

QUADRENNIAL GOALS — 1960-64

1. Create a consciousness of the unique importance of Christian adults in the life of the community and of their need for continuing spiritual, mental and social growth.

2. Increase awareness of the significance of the Adult Division in the church organization, and stimulate the formation of Adult Councils in local churches, to increase service to adults of all ages; and to inform members of work of our Methodist agencies and institutions.

3. Help to increase understanding and mutual appreciation between members of various economic, social, and racial groups both inside and outside the church.

4. Foster an increased knowledge of the Bible, and acceptance of the Christian's obligation and desire to relate it to daily living.

5. Help local adult classes to become Redemptive Fellowships, increase active participation of nominal church members, and help the church school become a more effective evangelistic arm of the church.

6. Improve teaching procedures so as to involve class members in learning situations and help each person to understand and assume leadership and membership functions.

7. Help adults understand themselves, to strengthen marital relationships, and improve family life through increased parental competence.

PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1962-63

A. Leadership Training

1. We urge the inclusion of a course on Adult Work in every Christian Workers' School. Special emphasis should be given to 410—"Understanding Adults," and 412.1—"Young Adult Work in the Church."

2. We urge that special emphasis be stressed on the inclusion of an Adult Laboratory Course in Christian Workers' Schools.

3. We recommend that an "Older Youth-Young Adult Workshop" be held in each district to present interested persons the problems, possibilities, and potentialities of an Older Youth-Young Adult program in their churches.

4. District Directors, the Conference Director, and selected resource persons will be available for local church consultation on materials and teaching procedures.

B. Conference Meetings

1. We recommend that one Young Adult representative to the Young Adult Assembly be elected from each church, confirmed at the Fourth Quarterly Conference and sent by the church, with the Assembly open to additional delegates.

2. We propose a Conference on Preparation for Aging be included in the Conference on Christian Education in 1963.

3. We propose a Conference on Family Life in the middle years be included in the Conference on Christian Education in 1964.

4. We propose an Adult Laboratory be included in the Conference on Christian Education in 1965.

5. We recommend co-operation with the youth in the sponsorship of a Recreation Workshop during the conference year 1962-63.

C. District and Subdistrict Work

1. Training of District and Subdistrict Directors

a. We recommend a guide be prepared for district and subdistrict directors which would outline their responsibilities and duties.

b. One-day District Adult Council Meetings—Fall 1962.

- c. Half-day District Adult Council Meetings—Spring 1963.
2. Programs—to be selected by each Subdistrict or District.
 - a. Subdistrict directors to visit all local young adult groups, after training in District Adult Council Meetings.
 - b. Adult Education Workshops to introduce new Manual.
 - c. Bible Conferences—in co-operation with Board of Education.
 - d. Mental Health Workshops—in co-operation with State Board of Health.
 - e. Social Action Seminars—in co-operation with Board of Social Concerns.
 - f. Older Adult Workshops—in co-operation with Retirement Home and delegates to White House Conference on Aging.
 - g. Christian Workers' School course.
3. Our goal is at least one program, in addition to the Christian Workers' School course, carried out in every subdistrict of the Conference in 1962-63.

D. Adult Education in the Local Church

1. We emphasize the importance of the Adult Council for planning and co-ordinating work to reach all adults with Christian teaching; and we propose that literature and consultation service be offered to help implement its work.

2. We continue to urge all adult classes to examine all available curriculum materials, to select courses based on interests of all class members, and to select teachers for units of study rather than for a year. A sample Unit Selector and instructions for its use will appear in "Resources for Adult Groups" for 1962-63.

3. We call upon every church to observe Young Adult Week, January 20-27, 1963. Suggestions will be supplied.

4. We recommend the use of teams of teachers, for improved continuity and increasing participation in adult classes, and the planning for seating arrangements which enable class members to see and talk to each other easily.

5. We urge every class to carry on activities in all the seven areas of Concern, based on the new manual, *Adult Education in The Methodist Church*. The areas are study, worship, evangelism, missions, social action, family education, and recreation. This program should include visits to agencies and institutions of our conference.

6. Local church groups are invited to call upon Conference, District, and Subdistrict Directors of Adult Work for help.

7. We urge local church groups to take advantage of the Local Church Consultation Service.

E. Summer Opportunities for Adults, 1962-63

1. June 8-10—Young Adult Assembly—Camp Don-Lee
2. June 19-23—Bible Conference and Conference for Teachers of Adults — Lake Junaluska

COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

H. L. HARRELL, *Chairman*

REPORT FOR 1961-62

Courses in family life have been varied and spread throughout our Conference. Adult family life courses have been taught in Christian Workers' Schools, local churches, PTA's and Young Adult Assembly.

Courses on boy-girl friendships and preparation for marriage have been taught mostly in local churches and public school classes and organizations.

Some family life institutes have been held, and other family life courses have been taught in churches of other denominations by leaders in our Conference.

Needs Listed

1. Thorough training of young teenagers in boy-girl friendships.
2. Effective training for older teenagers in preparation for marriage.
3. Unmarried or once-married adults—finding a mate or adjusting to singleness.
4. Unwed parents—a radically different approach is needed.
5. Better trained ministers in the family life field.
6. Meaningful family worship.

Recommendations

1. That the Commission on Education in each local church form a representative family life committee according to paragraph 234 in the 1960 Discipline.
2. We remind every minister of the "Pastor's Manual for Premarital Counseling," and the book for engaged couples, "In Holy Matrimony," and urge their use.
3. We recommend the inclusion of a period on marriage counseling in the Orientation Workshop for New Pastors.
4. We recommend an orientation class of feasible nature for beginning ministers and their wives relative to the difficult adjustments demanded by the ministry upon the parsonage family.
5. Cooperation is urged with all community organizations and institutions which promote wholesome family living.
6. Each church is urged to concentrate meetings on one night a week, so that family units might be together more.
7. Every church should observe National Family Week. The Round Robin Institute may be used effectively, among Methodist churches, or in co-operation with other denominations.
8. We recommend family camping of all kinds provided by our church.
9. We urge more clerical and lay people to become accredited in one or more courses in the family life field.
10. We urge our people to write their legislators concerning the following resolution adopted by our Conference Committee on Family Life:

"Resolved: That the Committee on Family Life of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church recommend that the legislature of the State of North Carolina enact a law requiring persons applying for license to be married to wait three days (72 hours) after the date of application before any minister, officer, or justice of the peace may perform the marriage ceremony."

1. Two of our ministers will attend the Training Laboratory in Group Dynamics at Massanetta Springs, Virginia, May 31-June 10, 1962, with the intent of leading our Conference in similar ventures in the future.

COMMITTEE ON MINISTERS AND DIRECTORS OF
CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND MUSIC

Christian Education Section

At the present time there are thirty-five employed Directors and Ministers of Christian Education and Educational Assistants serving local churches in the North Carolina Conference. Several churches are now looking for directors. These professional workers in Christian education are not only rendering effective service in their own churches but are also assisting in subdistrict, district and conference-wide programs which benefit many local churches. We are indebted to these trained and dedicated workers for their service to the churches of our conference. At the present time Miss Bernice Ballance of Dunn is serving as president of the North Carolina Conference Directors Association and Rev.

E. C. Shoaf is president of the Joint Directors Association of the N. C. and W. N. C. Conferences.

A state-wide meeting of Directors and Ministers of Christian Education and Educational Assistants will be held at Wesley Memorial Methodist Church, High Point, N. C., November 7-9, 1962. Information and training in the use of the new Methodist curriculum for the children's division will be given. Miss Rowena Ferguson of the Editorial Division of the General Board of Education, Nashville, Tennessee, will be the resource leader. This meeting will be open to candidates for degrees in Christian education as well as to persons now serving in local churches. We urge these churches to encourage their directors to attend and recommend that they provide financial assistance. We also recommend that the Conference Board of Education supplement the financial needs of this conference.

A southeastern Jurisdictional Workshop for Directors and Ministers of Christian Education and Educational Assistants will be held at Lake Junaluska, August 13-17, 1962. This workshop will provide inservice training for employed workers in Christian education. We urge local churches employing workers in Christian education to provide financial assistance and to encourage their director to attend.

We recommend that the North Carolina Conference Association of Directors have a conference-wide meeting of workers in Christian education and that the Conference Board of Education provide some financial aid for such a meeting.

We also recommend that the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations include other church-related vocations as well as the ministry in future vocations conferences.

Music Section

Three one-day Area Music Workshops, sponsored by the Board of Education, were held during 1962. They were held in the following places: Lumberton, January 29; Raleigh, January 30 and Greenville, January 31. The total attendance in the three workshops was 200. Mr. and Mrs. Caleb Cushing of Lynchburg, Virginia were the resource leaders for these workshops. The growth in interest and attendance has been most inspiring.

Ten District Music Workshops have been held in our conference under the direction of the District Music Representatives. Three workshops were held in the Wilmington District, and two in each of the following districts: Rocky Mount, Goldsboro, and Burlington.

The Committee formulated the following statement interpreting the relationship of the Local Church Committee on Music and the Local Church Commission on Worship: "Where there is a music committee in the local church, it is an agency of and is responsible to the Official Board of the church as provided in paragraph 278 of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church. It is to work closely with the other agencies and

commissions of the local church to insure the most effective use of music in the total church program."

COMMITTEE ON CAMPS AND CONFERENCES

BROOKS PATTEN, *Chairman*

Progress Report

Flexibility and enrichment mark the camping program opportunities for this year. Last summer the resident camp program included ten Junior Camps, twelve Junior High Camps, one Senior Camp, and one Family Camp. The total attendance for all resident camps was 1,006. Beyond this, our camping facilities are in constant demand by local church groups for retreat purposes. For instance, at Camp Chestnut Ridge, from April through August, 1,844 campers from sixty-one churches made use of the camp with more than half of them staying two days or more. In all, over 2,300 campers were numbered in retreat groups.

This trend has an important bearing on the projection of schedule and development as we look ahead. An attempt has been made to meet the needs of all age groups on as flexible a basis as possible and to provide periods of longer term camping. The program for this summer includes ten weeks of Junior Camping, eleven weeks of Junior High Camping, two ten-day camps at Camp Don-Lee, one two-week camp at Don-Lee, with one week of camping for Seniors. A Senior High Assembly will be held at Camp Don-Lee from July 20-22, with a Family Camp scheduled for five days from July 16-20. Camp Don-Lee will also be host to a Young Adult Assembly, while Camp Chestnut Ridge will entertain the Young Adult Spiritual Life Retreat in September. It is now possible for Junior and Junior High Campers to attend the camp of their choice at almost any given week.

KERR LAKE METHODIST CAMP—Last summer four small camps using hogans and covered wagons were reserved at this camp for local church use. A waterfront director and an assistant were provided. Ten churches conducted their own camping program with 210 campers. This is a start in local church camping.

We urge more local churches to make a three or four-day camp program part of summer youth activities week. Added attractions this summer—two small group camps being moved closer to counselor lodge, where electric cooking and refrigeration and dining facilities will be available. The lodge for use by families, retreat and camping groups, very nominal fees. Make reservations through Camp Superintendent, Mr. Robert Reed, Route One, Effland.

CAMP CHESTNUT RIDGE—In order to meet the great demand for winterized facilities and year-round camping, the first unit of permanent buildings is now under construction. Our sincere thanks to Mr. Bill Price for the gift of a unit lodge, which will serve as the central lodge for six individual cabins to be grouped about it. This lodge will contain a fine kitchen, toilets, two large porches, and eating facilities for forty-two campers. Each cabin will accommodate six campers and have its own bath and heating. Gifts of a cabin will be most welcomed. Where as much as 60% of the cost of a building is given by a donor, the donor will have the privilege of designating its name. Four of these cabins are the immediate goal in order to make this an efficiently functioning unit.

Lake—The MYF's of the Durham and Burlington Districts are now hard at work underwriting the costs of constructing the nine-acre lake at Chestnut Ridge. This project is now over half-way subscribed and it is hoped that the lake can be a reality next year.

Improvements This Year—Filter house at the swimming pool; enlarged bath house, a new walk-in refrigerator for the kitchen.

CAMP DON-LEE—An exciting feature of the Don-Lee program for this summer is the new two-week camp for Junior-Highs. This will be a program emphasizing sailing and real camping. A beautifully wooded site of twenty-three acres has been leased on a long-term basis ten miles from camp on the shore of South River, which will serve as an outpost camp. The sailing fleet now includes twelve prams, three larger sailboats, and a cabin cruiser, recently received as gifts from interested laymen. With the addition of three new staff members to the sailing program we look forward to a fine summer at Don-Lee.

We wish to express sincere appreciation to Mr. R. L. Foreman of Elizabeth City and the laymen of the New Bern District for their gifts which have made possible this program expansion.

Improvements—An additional small camp outpost constructed last summer, pier improvement, road work, and cabin repair and maintenance.

The committee wishes to express deep appreciation to Mr. T. J. Collier, who for many years has served as treasurer for Camp Don-Lee and as a local representative to oversee many phases of construction and maintenance. Treasurer functions will now be handled directly from the conference treasurer's office.

CAMP ROCKFISH—The committee shares and appreciates the concern of many people in the Fayetteville District that the development of this camp be started as soon as possible. The committee has met with a camp committee of the Fayetteville District to study initial steps to implement the master plan of development. We look forward to a program of providing a Central Lodge for summer retreat groups at the earliest by spring of 1963 and not later than 1964. Sheer limitation of funds have made it mandatory that this site's development be delayed until now. A program of reforestation is underway, and other initial work in opening up picnic sites is being carried on with the local committee.

GENERAL—Evaluation reports from the Camp Directors indicate that last summer's staff was the best that we have had. Day camping is on the rise, with one hundred and ninety-five days being given to this on our camp sites. The small group, allowing for a ratio of two counselors to ten and twelve campers, continued to prove to be most effective in achieving the purposes of our camping program. These purposes are to provide a laboratory experience in Christian living under the guidance or consecrated leaders; to help the campers live everyday experiences in the light of the Gospel of Christ; to guide the camper in a Christian interpretation of all of life and the universe in a setting unhampered by the distractions of our modern society.

The Appalachian Trail Hike will be offered again this summer for experienced Senior Campers. As we find it possible to enrich program, more longer-term camping periods will be offered to meet an insistent request. Dedicated counselors are the key to finest quality camping. We thank all who have given of their time and abilities so generously. We encourage ministers, parents, and teachers to give one or two weeks to this task. It will prove to be one of the most rewarding relationships possible with your young people. Some ministers are trip-camping as a special educational feature with young people.

A basic principle in camp programming and development is that administration and supervision keep pace with facilities. At our present budget level, we are limited to approximately \$10,000 as an annual investment in new capital facilities. This must be spread to all camps over and above minimum maintenance and supervision requirements. By necessity this places a large share of responsibility upon interested individuals, churches, and lay groups to help provide capital improvements to any appreciable degree. Our sincere thanks to many across the conference who are doing just this. This fine co-operation and generous spirit is making for a program of camping and conferences of the highest order.

Recommendations for 1962-63

1. That a Building Committee be named and empowered to act in the construction of buildings at Camp Chestnut Ridge.
2. That the committee be composed of Dr. C. P. Morris, Chairman, Mr. Paul Carr, and the Rev. Mr. W. W. Bishop.
3. That the above named Building Committee be authorized as follows:
 - a. To proceed in building four cabins and a small unit lodge.
 - b. To use funds from the 1962-63 budget as necessary; provided, that every effort be made to secure financial support from individuals, churches, and groups.
 - c. To secure short term loans for financing the construction of the small unit lodge.
4. That Mr. Robert Reed be continued in his position as Superintendent of Camps. Sincere appreciation is expressed to Mr. Reed for the excellent work he is doing and for his dedication and leadership.

PAINE COLLEGE

Paine College during the current academic year has an enrollment of 455, a budget of \$464,272 and an endowment of \$344,089. Support from the North Carolina Conference through Race Relations Day as reported to May 7, 1962, totaled \$3,572.99. Gifts from our Conference to the Gilbert-Lambuth Memorial Chapel as of May 7, 1962, totaled \$6,072.81 on a goal of \$16,101.00.

The long-awaited goal of achievement represented by admission to membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools has been realized. Thus, Paine College becomes a sign of encouragement in the Church's effort to bring all of her colleges serving Negroes to that goal. We recommend that Race Relations Day offering on February 10, 1963, be designated for Paine College.

An increase is needed in the participation by all churches in the Race Relations Sunday offering, and the special offering for the chapel to be built in memory of Bishop Walter Russell Lambuth and Dr. John Wesley Gilbert who served as missionaries to the Congo. We urge that no Methodist be denied the opportunity to contribute to these offerings.

Section C

COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND 1962-1963

At its 1961 session, the North Carolina Annual Conference requested a declaratory decision by the Judicial Council to clarify the responsibilities of the Board of Education for the allocation of monies to educational institutions receiving funds from the Conference. The Judicial Council reaffirmed the responsibility and authority of the Board of Education in this area. (See Decision 191).

We are pleased that the annual increase of \$40,000.00 in Sustaining Fund has been included in the recommendations of the Commission on World Service and Finance. While our increases have not kept pace with the needs of our institutions the goal of \$500,000.00 in annual support is coming into sight with the current total of \$370,000.00. See Section V—Amendments, Motions, Resolutions.

We recommend the following distribution of the College Sustaining Fund for 1962-63, with the Commission on Higher Education listed to be a preferred claim:

**RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY LOUISBURG COLLEGE BOARD OF
TRUSTEES, APRIL 27, 1962**

Federal Housing Loan to build Woman's Dormitory

Upon motion duly made by J. W. Jenkins, seconded by Nelson Thomas, the following resolution was adopted at the annual spring meeting of the Louisburg College Board of Trustees held at the college April 27, 1962, by an affirmative vote of 22 people with no persons voting in the negative.

Whereas, the Charter of Louisburg College contains the following provisions:

"But no conveyance of the real property of the corporation shall be made without the consent and permission of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South;" and

Whereas, it is desirable that and expedient for Louisburg College to finance a new dormitory to house approximately 96 women by the sale of bonds aggregating not more than \$300,000.00 under an agreement proposed to be entered into between Louisburg College and the United States, acting through the Housing and Home Finance Agency,

said bonds to be payable over a forty-year period and to be secured by a mortgage on the site of the said proposed dormitory and on an easement providing access thereto, the pledge of the revenues therefrom, and such other security as the Housing and Home Finance Agency shall require;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College does hereby petition and request the North Carolina Annual Conference, the Methodist Church, to grant its consent and permission to convey to a Trustee to be designated by the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College, a tract of land located on the campus of Louisburg College, and a new women's dormitory housing approximately 96 students to be situated thereon, and a right-of-way not over 50 feet in width for ingress thereto from the public street, all to be selected and described by said Board of Trustees of Louisburg College, as security for not to exceed \$300,000.00 principal amount of bonds to be issued under a proposed agreement with the United States acting through the Housing and Home Finance Agency, said bonds to be payable over a period of forty years; and

Resolved Further, the said Board of Trustees do request that said consent be evidenced by a deed quitclaiming any interest superior to the indenture securing said bonds, said deed to be executed by the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, describing the lands selected by the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College as a site for said dormitory, and the right-of-way thereto, and to be delivered to the Trustee designated in said Indenture; and

Resolved Further, that the following resolution in respect hereof be adopted by the said Annual Conference, to-wit:

Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, Incorporated, be and it is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute and deliver a deed to a trustee designated by the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College quitclaiming any right superior to and indenture securing \$300,000 in bonds to be issued under an agreement with the United States, acting through the Housing and Home Finance Agency, in a tract of land on the campus of Louisburg College designated by the Board of Trustees of said College, and a right-of-way thereto not exceeding fifty feet in width, to the end that said indenture securing said bonds of \$300,000.00 shall be a valid first lien on the land on which the proposed new women's dormitory is to be located.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Christian Higher Education has become an important part of our Church program for Christian leadership. It is a recognized fact that it has become an integral part of our Church development and extension program.

The Methodist Church has always been interested in higher education, which is Christian and it will continue with increasing interest in this field, for it becomes the heart and soul of our Church in the development of leadership in every area of our Church life.

It is with this in mind that our Church is confronted with the challenge of higher education which is Christian. We know the Church cannot function without adequately trained leaders. Our church schools must look for Christian trained men and women if they are to survive and function. Knowledge alone does not make people good. Education alone is not the salvation of all the world, nor the solution of all the world's problems.

Education that is Christian must be sharply distinguished from other types of education such as the lower stages of education and from technical, vocational, or professional education. Christian higher education embodies every area of man's activity plus the supreme thrust in, and through faith to the beginning and end in all things—GOD.

To this end, therefore, the Methodist Churches of the North Carolina Conference have launched a constructive and aggressive campaign for training leaders in our churches and in our communities. We are confronted with an almost impossible task, that of educating the youth of our communities because we have such limited facilities to offer the ever-increasing number of boys and girls who are, and will be wanting an education.

Four years ago, the North Carolina Conference started two new colleges. Today these colleges are open, and this year just closed, marked the end of two very successful years of college work. We had an enrollment of 668 students in the freshman and sophomore classes this year. In the next two years all indications are, the enrollment will be more than doubled.

Louisburg College has come to the front scholastically and numerically in an amazing way. The physical plant has been enhanced by the construction of new buildings and the purchase of two buildings and 12 acres of land, adjacent to the present campus. Six hundred students were enrolled this year and the anticipated enrollment for next year is even greater.

Our Conference is supporting these institutions in a commendable way with both capital and sustaining funds. Even so, the ever-increasing demands on these colleges make it imperative that we continue our increased support for both capital and sustaining funds.

After a careful study of the needs of the colleges the North Carolina Conference helps support, we have recommended to the Board of Education and to the Annual Conference the following distributions of the College Sustaining Fund, for the year 1962-1963:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

No. I

THE PAST YEAR

“The United Witness for Christ and His Church” as adopted by the 1961 Annual Conference was carried out according to plan, with all agencies of the Conference cooperating. This was done by each Board foregoing meetings and working with both the Boards of Evangelism and Education in promoting the two phases of the United Witness program.

The District Superintendents and the District Secretaries of Evangelism gave splendid leadership in the preparation, planning and carrying out of the program in their respective Districts.

The Pastors’ Conference on Evangelism, September 5-7, sponsored jointly by the Town and Country Commission and the Board of Evangelism, gave specific training in all aspects of the United Witness program. This Pastors’ Conference was the best attended of any held to date.

A Planning Session was held with the District Secretaries at First Methodist Church, Morehead City, from 3:00 p.m. Thursday, July 13, through noon, Friday, July 14. The United Witness program was carefully studied, and plans were made for promoting it in each District.

Between September 11 and 22, District Planning Sessions were conducted. Those in attendance were Pastors, District Secretary of Evangelism, District Missionary Secre-

tary, District Director of General Church School Work, District Lay Leader, and District Committee on Evangelism. This meeting was guided by the District Superintendent. Geographical territory was mapped out for each pastoral charge's responsibility in the "Knock on Every Door" Census. Each phase of the Witness program was discussed by ministers who had had experience in a particular phase, such as "The Preparation and Taking of the Census," "Training of Visitors," "The Importance of the Prayer Vigil," "Training and Assimilation of New Members," "Easter Preparation and Training Classes for Children, Young People, and Adults." This Planning Session closed with a Panel Discussion and Question Period.

All the materials for promoting the program in the local church were furnished free by the Board of Evangelism.

The reports of the "Knock on Every Door" (Census) phase of the United Witness (October 22, 1961) were as follows:

The Visitation Evangelism aspect of the "Knock on Every Door" was carried out November 25-28, at which time the 25,464 prospects were visited for the purpose of winning them to Christ and His Church. The results of this house to house visitation were given at the nine District Victory Rallies held simultaneously at 7:30 p.m. on December 5. By means of a telephone hook-up reports were given by Bishop Garber preceding his message to the rallies. The report given at the District Rallies was as follows:

Many churches which were unable to participate in the United Witness program at the time, have carried out the program at a later date. The final net gain for the year can be ascertained by subtracting last year's membership total from this year's total as will be recorded in the Conference Journal.

The continuing program of evangelism called for "January through Easter evangelistic emphasis; pastor's training classes for children, young people and adults; revivals; and lay evangelistic visitation."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

No. I

THE PAST YEAR

"The United Witness for Christ and His Church" as adopted by the 1961 Annual Conference was carried out according to plan, with all agencies of the Conference co-operating. This was done by each Board foregoing meetings and working with both the Boards of Evangelism and Education in promoting the two phases of the United Witness program.

The District Superintendents and the District Secretaries of Evangelism gave splendid leadership in the preparation, planning and carrying out of the program in their respective Districts.

The Pastors' Conference on Evangelism, September 5-7, sponsored jointly by the Town and Country Commission and the Board of Evangelism, gave specific training in all aspects of the United Witness program. This Pastors' Conference was the best attended of any held to date.

A Planning Session was held with the District Secretaries at First Methodist Church, Morehead City, from 3:00 p.m. Thursday, July 13, through noon, Friday, July 14. The United Witness program was carefully studied, and plans were made for promoting it in each District.

Between September 11 and 22, District Planning Sessions were conducted. Those in attendance were Pastors, District Secretary of Evangelism, District Missionary Secre-

tary, District Director of General Church School Work, District Lay Leader, and District Committee on Evangelism. This meeting was guided by the District Superintendent. Geographical territory was mapped out for each pastoral charge's responsibility in the "Knock on Every Door" Census. Each phase of the Witness program was discussed by ministers who had had experience in a particular phase, such as "The Preparation and Taking of the Census," "Training of Visitors," "The Importance of the Prayer Vigil," "Training and Assimilation of New Members," "Easter Preparation and Training Classes for Children, Young People, and Adults." This Planning Session closed with a Panel Discussion and Question Period.

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The Boards of Evangelism and Education have worked hand in hand in the field of evangelism, for each board realizes that evangelism must be educational and education must be evangelistic.

The Board of Evangelism believes that the new lay movement, "The Twelve," has been the means of the revival of dying churches and inactive laymen, and that groups of "The Twelve" in the churches of our Conference can bring spiritual renewal and

spiritual maturity. Because of this faith, the Board of Evangelism sent three laymen, along with others, to the Laymen's Conference on "The Twelve" at Purdue University. These men returned, after receiving a new heart-warming experience, on fire for Christ and His Church. They have been, on invitation, going into the churches of the conference, telling what fellowship in "The Twelve" has done for them, and helping start groups in the churches.

Representatives of the Board of Evangelism attended the National Council on Evangelism at Texoma, Oklahoma, and the Ministers Conference on Discipleship at Montreat.

The Bishop and his Cabinet were invited to meet with our Board in the fall meeting at Rocky Mount to hear a report on the Purdue meeting from the laymen who attended. The laymen spoke of the heart-warming experience of salvation which had come into their hearts at Purdue. It was their firm conviction that groups of "The Twelve" in the churches of our Conference would spiritually revitalize our people.

Dr. G. Ernest Thomas, Director of the Department of Spiritual Life of the General Board of Evangelism, was invited to speak at Fairmont Methodist Church, Raleigh, to a group of interested ministers and laymen from the nine Districts of our Conference on "The Twelve." Some 160 were in attendance. No pressure was exerted for attendance. Those present came because they were vitally interested.

No. II

THE NEW YEAR

I. The Purpose:

The purpose of the program of the Board of Evangelism for the year 1962-63 shall be two-fold in nature:

1. To deepen the spiritual life of our people.

2. To organize and put new life in the local Church Commission on Membership and Evangelism.

II. The Procedure:

1. Organize at least one unit of "The Twelve" in each local church.

- a. Ministers receive inspiration and training at the Conference on Evangelism at Louisburg College. Laymen may attend one day.

- b. Board of Evangelism work with the Conference and District Board of Lay Activities to set up training and organization method on how to get this job done. Let the laymen spearhead this part of the program.

2. Set a goal to go into each local church to organize and train the Commission on Membership and Evangelism. In order for the Board of Evangelism to be able to carry out an effective program for winning people to a commitment of their lives to Christ and His Church, the group responsible in each local church—the Commission on Membership and Evangelism—must be trained to do its work. This has been attempted in the past on a district basis in connection with workshops for all Commissions. The results were not satisfactory because in many cases persons in small churches were on more than one Commission, and the distance involved in traveling to the workshop kept the majority from attending. We propose grass roots training schools for local Membership and Evangelism Commissions conducted by the Conference Director of Evangelism and the District Secretary of Evangelism in his respective district. Each school should run for at least two or three fifty minute periods. The Commissions on Membership and Evangelism from at least four churches or charges should attend each school. The schools are to be arranged by the District Superintendent and the District Secretary of Evangelism in conference with the Conference Director of Evangelism in such manner as to avoid conflicts in schedules.

III. Program for the Conference Year 1962-1963:

The National Council on Evangelism of The Methodist Church, meeting at Texoma, Oklahoma, has challenged each Annual Conference to a year of spiritual enrichment.

The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, in response to the challenge of the National Council, presents as its program for the Conference year 1962-1963 the following, dedicated to the task of deepening the spiritual life of the local church.

1. *Annual Conference*, meeting at Kinston in Queen Street Methodist Church, June 18-21, launch the Aldersgate Year Observance. The 225th anniversary of Wesley's spiritual experience at Aldersgate is a splendid time for ministers and laymen of our Conference to renew and dedicate themselves.

2. *Principles:*

a. To deepen the spiritual concern of pastor and people through a period of preparation leading toward a new look within and a new witness without.

b. To undergird this concern with soul-searching study of the Book of Romans (Luther's Preface) which provided the spark to Wesley's Aldersgate experience.

c. We request the Annual Conference, through Bishop Garber and his Cabinet, to provide leadership in the program planning, which will furnish every local church, through its minister, with the motivation to call its members to "New Life" in the church.

d. We encourage each Board in our Conference to supplement its program by linking it to the Aldersgate theme and applying it to its own area of concern.

3. *Schedule for Conference Program:*

a. Annual Conference launch the Aldersgate Observance. The summer will be a time of Conference Board preparation.

(1) Meeting of committees to work out details.

b. Fall of 1962: The fall of 1962 shall be a period of "Preparation for ministers and laymen."

(1) Preparation of ministers—Conference on Evangelism, Louisburg College, August 28, 29 and 30 (Laymen are invited to attend August 29).

(2) Period of Bible Study, Prayer Retreats, and Group Meetings.

(3) At this time the local church Commission on Membership and Evangelism will be instructed and organized in each church for the Aldersgate Observance.

c. January 1963:

(1) December 31, 1962—Watch Night Service, using Wesley's Watch Night Service.

(2) January 1, 1963—Begin Prayer Vigils.

(3) January 6, 1963—Family Prayer Sunday.

d. January through Easter—Preparation of the Local Churches.

(1) Organize small spiritual life groups such as "The Twelve."

(2) Week of Lay Visitation Witness in February.

(3) Church Attendance Emphasis.

(4) Church Membership Classes.

e. Easter to Pentecost:

(1) Mission to Members: (a) Reaching Members on the Move; (b) Church Attendance Emphasis Continued; (c) Revivals or Preaching Missions in each local church.

f. Aldersgate Sunday—May 19 or 26—Have the Sunday that is best suited to the local church.

g. Pentecost Sunday—June 2, 1963.

(1) Every Methodist Church receiving new members.

(2) No barren churches by Pentecost Sunday.

h. Summer 1963:

(1) Youth Camps

(2) Unconventional Evangelism

i. Aldersgate and after:

(1) Continuation of "The Twelve"

(2) Continue to take Gospel message to everyone.

Note: Throughout the year parents should be encouraged to present their infants to Christ in Baptism at the altar of the Church.

Report of Superintendent

We have had many things this spring for which to lift our hearts in gratitude to God. On Palm Sunday, Dr. Howard P. Powell, the Reverend A. Kimsey King, Jr., and the Reverend Clifford Shoaf baptized and received into Edenton Street Church on vows twenty-nine of our boys and girls. On April 8 Mrs. House presented a very fine piano recital. We have five seniors finishing Broughton High School this year, four of whom are planning to go to college. Janice Roebuck has received a scholarship to North Carolina Wesleyan College. Sandra Hardison and Barbara Hollers are planning to attend Louisburg.

On May 26, 1962, Bishop Paul N. Garber led a dedication ceremony of our two new cottages: the M. B. Smith cottage and the L. S. Massey cottage.

Progress has been made on the plans for a chapel and we hope this will soon become a reality.

With the help of Mr. Walter Biggs and Mr. C. A. Dillon, our campus is getting a face-lifting. The Nello L. Teer Company was hired to do some grading and terracing. Many trees and shrubs have been set out, and we are now planning to curb and gutter our roads.

I shall watch with interest the continued progress that I am sure is in store for our Children's Home under his guidance, with the help of our fine Board of Trustees and the help of Almighty God.

TRUSTEES' REPORT

YOUR RETIREMENT HOME ENABLES RETIRED METHODISTS to be independent, with dignity; to escape loneliness, anxiety, fear; to have the assurance of care in sickness and in health; to enjoy a Christian environment, warm with love, comfort, and security.

Every social agency agrees that these are immediate needs. Every church has individuals and couples who need The Home now. Commercial interests see a retirement home as a money-making opportunity—for the Church, it is a field of service.

The Federal and State Governments recognize the needs and provide much assistance; but *only the Church* can offer the spiritual love and atmosphere most nearly like HOME.

Your Retirement Home represents one of the Conference's finest efforts to meet the needs of people in the name of Christ and His Church. The Home serves a two-fold purpose. It offers companionship, love, and security to many who are tired of living alone, and who are afraid of the future. At the same, The Home has available the finest facilities for retirement in eastern North Carolina. The main buildings serve those who want close neighbors, while the apartments offer additional room and more privacy.

The Home has continued to expand its facilities to serve more retired people. It opened in 1955, with the second unit and the first four apartments completed in 1959. Eight new apartments have recently been completed.

The present capacity is 121 members in the main building. There are now twelve apartments. Though there is a mortgage of \$490,000 The Home has an equity of \$870,000.

As a retirement home, only those who are reasonably able to look after themselves are accepted. Preference is given to Methodists, both clergymen and lay people from eastern North Carolina, although others are accepted. The Home is prepared to keep a person for life once he is accepted. Requirements are a minimum age of 65 (62 for apartments), and a life of service to the Church and community.

Each case is considered individually by the Admissions Committee, both as to physical condition and finances. The filing of an application places the applicant under no obligation.

Members of The Home are on either a monthly basis or on a Life Contract. Those who are financially able pay the cost of their keep, and in addition, are urged to make

gifts to The Home. Others pay according to their ability, and the Church, through its benevolent program, provides the difference.

The monthly rate of \$160 provides room, board, laundry, the services of The Home's physician, the medicine he prescribes, the nursing and geriatric care, and the religious and social life in The Home. The average monthly payment by members is \$150. Only forty per cent of the members pay as much as the cost of their care, while another forty per cent are Old Age Assistance recipients. The Home can continue to accept members like these only through a liberal Mother's Day Offering and through special gifts made for this purpose. The average monthly cost of operation is \$169.00 including depreciation but exclusive of interest on investment.

Members desiring apartment living make a Capital Gift of \$10,000 which gives a couple the privilege of occupying an apartment as long as they are members of The Home, however they may move into the main building on doctor's orders or on request. They make the same monthly payment as members living in the main building and receive the same services.

Support for The Home comes from many sources: 1. Payment by members. 2. The general giving by the churches of the Conference. (Used for debt retirement). 3. The Mother's Day Offering in the churches of the Conference. (Used for the benevolent work of The Home). 4. Gifts from individuals and groups. (The furnishing of a room and other memorials are available in recognition of appropriate gifts to The Home). 5. Wills. 6. Memorial contributions sent upon the death of a friend.

Future Plans

The Home requests the continued privilege of receiving a Special Offering in the churches of the Conference on Mother's Day.

The apartments will eventually be paid for by the Capital Gifts made by members living in these apartments. The Board has authorized the construction of eight additional apartments and will continue to construct apartments as long as there is a demand.

The Board of Trustees of The Home recognizes the need for Christian care for the chronically ill. A Committee of the Board has been appointed to study the needs, and the practicability of The Home providing facilities for the care of the chronically ill. The Committee is to consider the experience of other homes offering this service, along with approximate cost of construction and operation, and is to investigate potential financial support for such a project. This Committee is to report to the next meeting of the Board of Trustees. The Board recognizes the fact that the care of the chronically ill is expensive.

The Board of Trustees requests the Conference if and when it makes plans for a Capital Gifts Campaign, to include The Home for an amount necessary to retire the present indebtedness and to make possible expansion of facilities for the care of chronically ill retired people.

The Board of Trustees feels that the time has come when the Conference should consider additional facilities for the care of retired people and it will look with favor upon the offer of land/or money for the expansion of facilities for the care of retired people at appropriate locations within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference.

REPORT OF THE GOLDEN CROSS

The Golden Cross Committee feels that due to the extensive change in rules made at the last annual conference no changes should be made this year. The Committee feels that it needs at least one year's experience with the new rules before consideration is given to altering them. It can be stated at this time, however, that due to the limiting of benefits to Methodist related families, Golden Cross for the first time in many years will come close to meeting its obligations. The funds still are not sufficient to completely

take care of all needy Methodist related families but most of these have been taken care of during this year.

The Chaplains program is progressing very satisfactorily. The Rev. Wesley Aitken and his associates are rendering a much needed and much appreciated service to patients in Duke Hospital. The Committee felt that there was no need for alteration of this program at the present time.

It is the desire of the Golden Cross Committee that all active ministers in the North Carolina Conference carry an adequate program of Hospital Insurance. We believe this can best be done through the Conference's group plan. Even though the Committee feels that the present coverage is the best we can get for the price we pay, the Committee plans during the coming year to carefully investigate some policies offered by companies other than Blue Cross so that a comparison can be made. It is our desire that the ministers get the best coverage for their premium and the Committee shall work toward that end.

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Laymen's Retreat at Duke University, August 19-29, 1961, was an outstanding event of the Board of Lay Activities program for the year. Our guest speaker was Roy Black, Lay Leader of the North Mississippi Conference. With the theme, "Living Our Christianity," discussion groups led by men of our own Conference dealt with the opportunities of serving God in our daily lives. Attendance exceeded that of any previous year. This year Laymen's Retreat will be August 18-19, 1962, at Duke University.

The Laymen's Rallies in February were led by Bishop Garber, R. H. Bond, Lay Leader of the Memphis Conference, and Robert P. Lav, Lay Leader of the Louisiana Conference. They were the best attended Rallies since the series began with more than 5,500 men present. The Rallies for the 1962-63 Conference Year will come the weeks of February 4-8 and 18-22.

A training school for district leaders of Methodist Men was held September 16, 1961, in Raleigh where instruction was given by Odie Howell of Arlington, Virginia, in making Methodist men more dynamic. Follow-up training sessions were held in the districts for local club officers.

In order to assist Methodist men officers to give their clubs more effective leadership, schools will be held in each district in June and July, 1962. It is the policy of our Conference for clubs to elect their officers in May and to take office in July to coincide with the beginning of the conference year.

Our No Silent Pulpit program was again successfully used this year from March 11 through Easter with more than 1,200 lay speakers giving their witness. For the coming year schools for Certified Lay Speakers will be conducted using the official manual of the Church and upon completion of the 10-hour course, laymen may be certified as Lay Speakers.

It is gratifying to the Board to find that virtually all of our churches are now using the Every Member Visitation program and that it has become an integral part of the

local church program. The Board members stand ready to assist any church that wishes help in instituting the program.

Laymen's Day will be observed this year on October 20, 1962, when laymen will conduct the service during the worship hour.

Laymen are strongly urged to attend the Southeastern Jurisdiction Laymen's Conference at Lake Junaluska, July 26-29, 1962. This is one of the greatest inspirational meetings of laymen in the nation with men from all over the South meeting together in the beautiful assembly grounds for fellowship and spiritual enrichment. It is our hope that a large group of our laymen will attend this year.

Due to the financial burden it now places on some of our ministers, especially those in the lower income brackets, and the great benefits which Social Security provides, we request the Bishop to appoint a Study Committee to consider the means whereby the churches of the North Carolina Conference will be requested to pay one-half of the cost of their pastor's Social Security payments as permitted by the Social Security Board, and to report to the next session of the Conference.

The Board pledges its continued support of all the causes of the Church and particularly to the proposed college campaign.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LOCAL CHURCH EMPHASIS

The Production Story has now been produced for each of the nine districts and a copy of the Story for each district has been made available to the pastors and churches of the district. If each church's pastor and official board will study its individual record in the Story, they will be provided the basis for interesting and rewarding self-evaluation.

1. Many churches will find some things in which they can take pride.

2. All churches will find some phase of church program and administration in which effort needs to be increased and intensified.

Your Committee on Local Church Emphasis recommends that adequate publicity be given to those things of which the congregation can be proud. Proclaim it from the pulpit; announce it in the Sunday bulletin; send an article about it to the local paper. Include in your reports to the local press all things of interest: names of new members received, information about Mission Specials supported, stories of new construction or repair and renovation of old buildings, a summary of last year's work. Your people like to hear and read good things about themselves. This kind of public relations will provide the atmosphere and the mood in which new progress can be made.

Regarding the things in which churches find themselves lacking, your Committee recommends they be referred to the proper commission or agency of the local church for action. Effective guidance by energetic pastors and intelligent leadership on the part of sympathetic laymen can activate lethargic congregations; revived congregations can produce a local church story that is news.

It is hoped that in the church year about to begin each local church will live out such a story and tell that story to the community in which it is located. This will be genuine LOCAL CHURCH EMPHASIS.

REPORT OF LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

I.

The 1961 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference adopted the following recommendation from the Long Range Planning Committee in regards to re-districting:

"That the number of districts for the conference year 1961-1962 remain the same as this year, and that the committee be continued to give further study to the proposal." (Page 204, 1961 *Journal*).

The enlarged sub-committee on re-districting, composed of A. J. Hobbs, chairman, C. D. Barclift, G. S. Eubank, J. N. Gibson, Jr., V. E. Queen, W. J. Smith, and K. W.

Taylor, after much detailed study and consultation, recognizes the probable need for additional districts and recommends that the committee be authorized to continue to study the need for new districts and to make its recommendations to the Long Range Planning Committee in sufficient time for all concerned to make adequate provision for action by the 1963 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

II.

The 1961 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference also adopted the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, in our appointive system pastors move at regular intervals, this often imposes a financial burden on pastors which, under the Methodist system, should justly be borne by the local church,

"WHEREAS, the following proposal would help to alleviate the financial burden and to create a cordial relationship between the new pastor and his congregation;

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Long Range Planning Committee study means of eliminating the financial burden of moving expense on the minister. We further recommend that the Long Range Planning Committee bring in a specific program of action to the Annual Conference Session meeting in June 1962." (Page 268, 1961 Journal).

The Long Range Planning Committee reports:

1. That we sincerely *request* the local churches to pay one-half of the moving expense of the pastor at the rate of twenty-five cents per mile within the boundaries of the Conference, beginning this Conference year 1962-63.

2. That it feels it unwise for such expenses to be made a *required* obligation of the local church; and

3. That it recommends that the committee hold under continued study the question of the possible obligation the Annual Conference has in this matter.

We have been able to accommodate four groups meeting separately at the same time. The assembly room has capacity for 125 persons. Our Snack Bar has been able to meet the needs of these groups for meals.

We are very much pleased with the people who occupy the leased area. When all leasing is completed, we hope to attain our objective to make the building self-liquidating and self-sustaining. The Building Committee feels that the N. C. Conference is very fortunate in having amply parking space around the building for those who come to the meetings.

The Building Committee wishes to thank the many people who have helped to make it possible for us to have a beautiful, spacious and comfortable building to carry on the work of the N. C. Conference. We feel that the building is in keeping with the growth and spirit of the N. C. Conference.

METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

DEPARTMENT OF GIFTS AND WILLS

F. OLEN HUNT, *Director*

In the passing of another year, decided progress has been made in many areas of the work. The last issue of the Methodist Foundation News was given over to the promotion of Church Extension, particularly the \$10.00 Club, for churches for new congregations. The Reverend O. L. Hathaway reports that a new interest in giving in this area was aroused and many subscriptions received. It is the purpose of this publication to promote the urgent needs of the various causes of the Conference.

Several new pieces of literature have been and are being prepared for distribution to give information on will making and gift giving. So many prior commitments have been made for current giving that it will be some time before our giving will cover the wider field. Will making is progressing much faster, although it is far short of what might be desired. More than 500 persons have made or promised to make wills leaving something for the church and Conference causes. Of this number, 117 agreed to tithe their estates, leaving 10% to Conference causes. Many churches have already realized on wills.

This Department has sent a check in the amount of \$2,214.23 for scholarships to North Carolina Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount. This is a gift from the estate of the late Louise Sholar Cowell who stipulated in her will a portion of her estate for this cause.

Special attention is being given to the creation of a Wills and Legacy Committee in each church. The District Superintendents have been most co-operative and helpful in this field. Of the 836 churches of the Conference, 50% of them have appointed a Wills and Legacies Committee. It is hoped we may be the first Conference in Methodism in which each and every church has such a committee. If this goal is reached, we will have over 20% of all the churches in America having a Wills and Legacy committee.

Brother pastor, if your church or churches, do not have such a committee, will you see that one is appointed at once, and report the names to your District Superintendent, and send the names and addresses of the committee to the Director of the Department of Gifts and Wills, Methodist Foundation, Inc., P. O. Box 10644, Raleigh, North Carolina?

II

The membership of the Foundation has established policy as to these items:

1. Disbursement of Earnings: Total earnings shall be disbursed quarterly pro-rata to holders of Capital Units with further provision that the earnings may be: (1) reinvested in additional capital units (2) taken in cash, or (3) held in a segregated savings account at current interest rate. (4) put in effect as of July 1, 1962 and include reserve (on accrual basis).

2. Distribution of Realized Capital Gains: That realized Capital Gains shall be disbursed annually as of the fiscal year end June 30. Except that by special action of the directors this action may be taken at a time other than the fiscal year end.

We request Conference approval of this new policy.

Heretofore earnings have been distributed annually at the end of the fiscal year June 30.

We estimate net income for the year ending June 30, 1962 to closely approximate \$79,281.92 or earnings per Capital Unit at 4.85128¢.

At the date of reporting 5/2/62 we have realized capital gains for the year amounting to \$17,446.60 or 1.675¢ per capital unit.

We have accrued undistributed earnings of prior years amounting to \$16,594.20.

We request Conference approval for full distribution of:

1. Current year earnings
2. Realized Capital Gains
3. Accrued earnings of prior years.

All the above as of June 30, 1962.

For detailed financial report, please refer to the Conference Treasurer's report of Board Operations (Section VI).

We express appreciation for the support of the Annual Conference, the co-operation of the agencies and the local church membership in respect to the Department of Gifts and Wills and in the Investment Department.

METHODIST STUDENT CENTER—EAST CAROLINA COLLEGE

East Carolina College is experiencing a population explosion. There was a fall term enrollment of 5,263 students, with 1,244 Methodist preferences. The Wesley Foundation is housed in a beautiful Methodist Student Center, attractively furnished, and well kept. The programs are planned by the Wesley Foundation Council, working with the Director, and presented to the Program Advisory Committee for approval.

The past year has been an extremely difficult one for our Wesley Foundation. The council president did not return to college in the fall of 1961. The vice-president later resigned on doctor's orders. The Director, Miss Mamie Chandler was hospitalized through November and December. After the Christmas holidays, the Woman's Society of Christian Service sent the Conference Secretary of Student Work to assist the Director who returned to the Center in January. In April she fell and suffered a broken hip, and is still in the hospital, leaving the Secretary of Student Work as acting director.

The general pattern for a week at the Methodist Student Center is: Coffee and doughnuts Sunday morning followed by student-led worship and Sunday School class taught by the director. The two Methodist churches in Greenville provide transportation for students to attend morning worship. Students are in charge of Sunday evening vespers. Dinner is prepared and served by students on Monday evening, followed by Wesley Conversations which include a speaker. Holy Communion in the chapel each Wednesday evening at 9:30, is administered by the two Methodist ministers. The Wesley Foundation Council meets with the Director every Wednesday night, and the Program Advisory Committee meets once a month. Friday and Saturday are fun nights at the Center.

Groups of students have often used the kitchen for suppers—students enjoy the informality of the lounge and the privilege of a cup of coffee or cocoa in the kitchen. Many come over to find a quiet place to study. Television and ping-pong are very popular. Two large parties were given during the year; at Halloween, and Christmas. The Center is open every day from 9:00 a.m. until half an hour before the girl's dorms close at night.

The program has suffered somewhat with the many changes that have taken place this year. Our emphasis has been upon outreach. We see the need to reach a greater number of students on campus and bring them into the Christian community. Elections were held in the spring and the new Wesley Foundation Council is functioning.

During the first quarter, Freshman orientation was highlighted. Wesley Conversations centered around "The Relationship of God to Man," and "The Relationship of Man to God."

The emphasis in the second quarter was, "The Church—the New Covenant in Jesus Christ." Lectures and films were used. Bible study in Sunday School was on this theme.

Third quarter's emphasis was, "The Mission of the Church." Student Christian Movements are halfway through the emphasis, "The Life and Mission of the Church." They are studying their heritage, theology, and their place in the world, as they seek to understand God's plan in today's universe. Hideo Kusama, a Japanese student at the University of North Carolina, and Miss Barbara Leonard, a missionary to the Philippines were speakers. The Director and her assistant gave reports on addresses given at the Woman's Society Conference by missionaries from the Congo, Cuba, and from Chile.

A member of our Foundation, Ronald Watson, was selected state representative to attend the United Nations—Washington Christian Citizenship Seminar in February. Ten

students and the Director attended the National Methodist Student Movement Conference at the University of Illinois the last week in August, 1961. Three council members and the Director attended the State MSM Planning Retreat at Camp Chesnut Ridge in September. Twenty-two students, the Director, and her assistant attended the State MSM Conference at High Point in January, taking with them an excellent art exhibit and a Wesley Foundation exhibit. One of our members, Ronald Watson, was elected state Publicity Chairman. Three students and the in-coming Conference Secretary of Student Work, Mrs. Edgar B. Fisher, attended the spring State MSM Planning Retreat.

Miss Chandler is retiring after nineteen years as Director of the Foundation. The Methodist Student Center stands as a memorial to the years of splendid and untiring service she has given to the Wesley Foundation of East Carolina College.

REPORT OF THE MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

I

Ours is a great Conference, as measured by its remarkable progress in almost every phase of its activities. But one of its finer achievements is in its program of Minimum Salary. This progress has been effected through co-operation of the Commission on World Service and Finance, the District Superintendents, and every other member of our Conference. All of us can thus take pride in our accomplishments, while pressing forward in the achievement of further progress.

We are asking each charge of our Conference, under the leadership of our District Superintendents, to assume their full askings on Minimum Salary, which now represent a ten per cent increase over the Minimum Salary askings for 1960-1961. Full acceptance is essential if we are to continue our fine program of Minimum Salary support.

We recommend for the Conference year 1962-63 that the salary for those serving pastoral appointments be supported at the following minimum levels:

\$3,300.00 for a full-time single minister.

\$3,600.00 for a full-time married minister.

\$4,000.00 for a full-time married minister with one dependent child or more.

We also recommend an increase of \$100.00 in each of the above categories for those ministers who have served one or more years in the Methodist ministry, making the maximum figures \$3,400.00, \$3,700.00, and \$4,100.00.

For Divinity School student pastors serving pastoral appointments we recommend that the salary be supported at the following minimum levels:

\$1,800.00 for a single minister serving as a student pastor.

\$2,000.00 for a married minister serving as a student pastor.

\$2,300.00 for a married minister with one dependent child serving as a student pastor.

\$2,500.00 for a married minister with two or more dependent children serving as a student pastor.

In addition to this support for Divinity School student pastors, their salary shall be increased by an allowance relative to the distance of their charge from the school they attend. When the charge is within 25 miles of their school, it shall be by \$100.00; when the charge is between 25 and 50 miles from the school, it shall be increased by \$200.00; when the charge is beyond 50 miles and within 75 miles of the school, \$300.00; when the charge is beyond 75 miles and within 100 miles of the school, \$400.00; and when the charge is beyond 100 miles, \$500.00 as a maximum increment.

When a student pastor is graduated from Divinity School at mid-term in January and he has been on Minimum Salary for students, we recommend that he shall be re-compensated at the rate of a full-time pastor for the remainder of the Conference year.

II

PRINCIPLES GOVERNING THE USE OF MINIMUM SALARY FUNDS

The Commission urges each charge receiving Minimum Salary funds, its minister, and district superintendent, so to administer the affairs of the charge that it may move as rapidly as possible toward full financial support.

To enable the conference, the commission, and the superintendents to carry on their co-operative efforts in understanding, harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned the following principles and procedures are set forth:

Aid to Charges

1. All requests for financial assistance on pastors' salaries for the succeeding year shall be presented to the President or to the Secretary of the Commission by the District Superintendents before May 15 of each year, thus permitting the Commission the time for needed study and adjustments.

2. Minimum Salary Aid provided by the Conference shall not be used to raise the salary above the minimum set by the Conference.

3. The family or marital status of the pastor at the time of assignment to the charge shall govern the amount paid the minister for the entire Conference year.

4. Owing to the pressure upon Minimum Salary funds we emphasize the necessity of staying within Minimum Salary when requesting funds for ministerial support.

5. In considering the salary for a charge, we call attention to the fact that the Commission on Minimum Salary must count salary, travel, utilities, bonuses, and expense allowances as salary in making appropriations to the charge.

a. Retired ministers serving Conference appointment on a full-time basis must add to the items above their retirement annuity.

Dividing Charges

6. The Commission on Minimum Salary, in co-operation with the Cabinet, is now, and should continue to function under the following directives:

a. There should be a Conference-wide policy and strategy, adopted by the Bishop and his cabinet after careful study for the division of circuits and the formation of new charges.

b. A process of education—spiritual, psychological, and financial—should precede the division of circuits. This is important if a new charge is to understand and accept intelligently the adjustments and the larger responsibility involved in the new status. Frequently the charge is impressed only with the privileges of its proposed new status, but the responsibilities are equally as real.

c. The churches forming a new charge should be, when possible, a sociological and geographical unit. Such factors as marketing centers, school districts, and county lines should be taken into account and given due consideration.

d. Generally speaking, small town and open country churches, even though having as many as 200-300 members, should be encouraged to become two-point charges rather than one-point stations.

(1) This is fairer to the many churches which are still on four-point charges.

(2) It is a wiser use of our ministers, as few small town and open country churches will need, accept, or demand a preaching schedule and the other programs of activity which justify the full services of a full-time minister.

e. Divisions of circuits should be on the basis of mutual agreement by all the churches on the circuit rather than simply from the desire of the larger church to withdraw for its own benefit and advancement.

f. If a new charge is to be served by a student pastor, that fact should be given the charge before it agrees to its new status.

g. The Disciplinary provision for equity in the existing parsonage, the location of the new parsonage, and other forces should be fully discussed and agreed upon by the charge involved prior to the division.

h. The following fundamental and basic questions should be discussed and clearly understood by the churches contemplating the formation of a new charge:

(1) Is there a real need for this new charge, or is the desire for its creation prompted primarily from a spirit of keeping up, or surpassing another denomination?

(2) What are the prospects for numerical growth in the new charge? Is this estimate of growth based on a religious census or on a guess?

(3) Can the new charge become self-supporting within a reasonable length of time? Will it now assume, or assume within a reasonable period of time, a budget that will provide not only for the pastor's support but also for the support of Methodism's connessional causes, including World Service?

(4) Does the new charge have a suitable parsonage for the minister, or will it provide one before a minister is appointed to it?

7. When the division of a charge is considered necessary and minimum salary is to be requested for either of the new charges resulting from such division, such project shall be presented to the president or secretary of the Commission on Minimum Salary on or before May 15, so that a thorough study of the proposed division can be made. This study shall be made in co-operation with the District Superintendent, the Commission on Minimum Salary, and a representative from each of the proposed new charges. Without such study the Commission shall not be obligated to provide aid for either of the charges resulting from such division.

8. The Commission looks with disfavor upon the division of a charge except and unless each new charge resulting from the division shall provide 80% of the minimum salary for the pastor to be assigned to said charge.

a. Where circuits are divided, any churches involved in the division that must receive minimum salary may, upon the consent of the District Superintendent, pay their proportionate share of the former items based on pastoral support, plus an additional 20% of this amount. This shall be increased by at least 20% of the original base annually until they achieve the then current base of established charges, in a period not to exceed four years.

To Avoid Crippling Charges

9. In the division of circuits where one church seeks to become a station, the Commission on Minimum Salary looks with disfavor upon such division unless the station established can care for its salary and its proportionate share of the World Service and Benevolences, and that the remainder of the charge can be provided with ministerial leadership and adjusted and arranged so that it has opportunity to grow to self-support.

Reduction of Aid

10. The Commission on Minimum Salary further requires that each charge which has received, or shall hereafter receive Minimum Salary aid, shall make every reasonable effort to reduce this aid by 25% each year until the charge has accepted full self-support. The District Superintendents are to inform all charges receiving, or to receive aid in the future, of this regulation. This requirement must be kept in mind in preparing for any requests.

a. When a charge is established as a student appointment and desires to be served by a full-time minister, this change may take place at such time as the charge shall pay 80% of the amount needed to provide such full-time ministerial support and shall agree to reduce the aid by 25% each year.

A New Church As a Charge

11. When a new church is to be established and become a new charge, the District Superintendent shall present for study the complete details of the proposed project on or before May 15. These details shall be presented to the General Board of Missions, the Conference Board of Missions, and to the Commission on Minimum Salary. All shall carefully evaluate the project, and if it seems worthy and a timely project, the Board of Missions shall see that an adequate salary and living quarters are provided for the minister and the essential steps taken to provide a place to meet and worship. It shall be understood that each year the new charge shall accept more of the budget till it becomes self-supporting. We recommend that each new church shall become self-supporting in a period of five years or less.

Salaries for Special Students

12. An approved supply pastor who is serving an appointment, who has less than two years college work to his credit, and who wishes to continue his education, shall be a special case. Each case will be handled on its own merits. The District Superintendent shall present these special cases to the Commission on Minimum Salary. When these cases have been approved by the Commission, aid may be granted, less than, but not to exceed the regular minimum salary scale, rather than according to the Divinity Student pastor's scale. These special cases shall be presented to the Commission on Minimum Salary by the District Superintendent in ample time for action before the students' matriculation in school.

The major purpose of this recommendation is to make possible for pastors serving as approved supplies, and who usually have reached fair maturity in years, opportunity to support their families and at the same time improve their capacities and abilities through improved educational achievements.

This recommendation applies to such special students attending any properly accredited college until they receive their A.B. degrees, or their equivalent. It is suggested, however, that wherever feasible and practical these students shall attend Methodist colleges. And while in attendance at any one of such colleges, a reasonable course load must be carried so as not to stretch such support over too prolonged a period of time. Such students shall at all times, in their academic activities, be under the oversight of their District Superintendents.

A Final Admonition

These principles, as listed, are intended only to promote the health and welfare of our Conference in matters pertaining to Minimum Salary. They are not intended as rigid laws, but only as a satisfactory framework within which our Commission may function best for the good of all concerned.

We submit our report and commend our "Principles" to our District Superintendents, the Board of Missions, the Duke Endowment, and all our interested friends in the hope that they may serve us well in meeting the needs of our people.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

Report No. 1

GENERAL STATEMENT

The Board is endeavoring to administer the *Discipline* as it understands it, with fairness and impartiality to every candidate for the ministry, and with a deep sense of moral responsibility to the Conference and the Church as well as to the candidates in upholding the standards for the ministry.

The Board is studying its task diligently with the purpose of strengthening the ministry. Whatever progress has been made may be attributed in large measure to the dedication and co-operation within the membership of the Board and the assistance and co-operation of the bishop, the cabinet, and the district committees on Ministerial Qualifications.

On December 8, 1961, the Board met at the Retirement Home in Durham to evaluate its work for the past year and make plans for the future. A number of changes with reference to interviewing candidates were adopted. The candidates first see the registrars in a separate room, fill out a number of forms providing all information required, and take the Minnesota Multi-phasic Personality Inventory psychological test. The Board receives the candidate's folder in time to check all required information before he appears for the interview. The Board also worked out and adopted a proposed plan for administering THE ONE PER CENT PLAN (see Report No. 2).

It is the policy of the Board to have a personal interview with each candidate each year. This will be done two days at St. Paul Church, Goldsboro, March 26-27, 1963;

at the Retirement Home, Durham, March 28, 1963; and the morning of the day Conference convenes.

Approved Supply Pastors and Local Preachers

1. Each district committee on ministerial qualifications is requested to continue to require written work for license to preach and the grading of examinations on "Studies for License to Preach" through the Correspondence Department of Ministerial Education, Nashville, Tennessee.

2. For renewal of license the local preacher must make regular progress in required studies, either as a student in school (307.1) or through the four-year course of study (307.2, 1374, 327).

3. A full-time approved supply pastor, unless an elder, must complete each year a full year of the course of study to be recommended for appointment (317.2).

4. A part-time supply pastor must complete a minimum of two books a year in the course of study (317.3).

5. Attention is called to the resolutions adopted by the Conference which appear on pages 199 and 200 of the 1957 Conference *Journal* concerning "Approved Supply Pastors and Local Preachers" and "The on Trial Status of the Traveling Ministry," which state (1) that ordinarily no person be given Approved Supply status who is over forty years of age, (2) that no person without a high school diploma, or its equivalent, be recommended for Approved Supply status, (3) that district committees on Ministerial Qualifications not grant local license to any person who does not have a high school diploma, and (4) that the attitude has developed within the North Carolina Conference that after a preacher has been admitted on trial his final reception into full membership is automatically assured. Paragraph 321 of the 1956 *Discipline* (the same in 1960 *Discipline*) is quoted as being contrary to that attitude.

Recommendations are as follows:

1. That a concerted effort be made toward securing highly qualified young men and women for full-time Christian service, and that each minister give special attention to this most important matter.

2. That all candidates for the ministry endeavor to attend and pursue their studies in colleges and theological schools related to the Methodist Church, particularly schools approved by the University Senate.

3. That all candidates in the Course of Study be encouraged to attend the Approved Pastors' Schools held at Duke and Emory and that financial assistance be continued as funds are available. The full-time supply pastor, unless ordained elder, must complete in the preceding year a full year's work in the course of study, either in a school or by correspondence, to be eligible for appointment.

4. That all ministerial candidates seeking admission on trial and full connection, especially those under thirty-five years of age, be urged to obtain the B.D. Degree or its equivalent from schools of theology related to the Methodist Church and accredited or approved by the University Senate, and that they be encouraged and assisted in every practical way to complete the preparation recommended in Paragraphs 342, 344 of the 1960 *Discipline*. That those who drop out of seminary for unsatisfactory reasons be delayed in being recommended for Full Connection.

5. That Ministry Sunday be observed in every local church, the Sunday of or preceding May 24 (Aldersgate Sunday).

6. That the Orientation Workshop for Pastors new to the North Carolina Conference held at Camp Don-Lee in August be continued and that the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to make provision for financing it.

7. That each local church be urged to make an annual appropriation equal to one per cent of its operational budget for the One Per Cent Plan—the fund for ministerial education.

Report No. 2

THE ONE PERCENT PLAN OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE
OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

ARTICLE I

AUTHORIZATION FOR THE PLAN

The Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference in session at Lake Junaluska, N. C., on July 15, 1960, adopted a resolution implementing the Ministerial Education legislation of the General Conference. (See the 1960 *Discipline*, para. 670.2).

ARTICLE II

NAME

This plan for ministerial education shall be called the One Per Cent Plan, and otherwise known as the Jurisdictional Fund for Ministerial Education.

ARTICLE III

ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

Section 1. The Conference Ministerial Scholarship Fund Committee

The North Carolina Conference portion of the One Per Cent Plan shall be administered by a Conference Ministerial Scholarship Fund Committee (hereinafter called the Committee). This committee shall function as a committee of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. The Chairman of the Committee must be a minister, who shall be an ex-officio member of the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

Section 2. Membership of the Committee

The Committee shall consist of two ministers in full-connection in the North Carolina Conference, one of whom shall be chairman; and two laymen, nominated by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. In addition to these elective members, the Chairman and the registrar(s) of the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and the Chairman of the Scholarship Committee of the Duke Divinity School, shall be ex-officio members with voting privileges.

The Chairman shall serve as chairman for the quadrennium. The nominations of the chairman and the members of the Committee shall be subject to election at the Annual Conference. The Chairman and the registrars from the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall serve on the Committee as long as they hold their respective positions on the Board. The elective members are to be staggered in their terms of service so that half rotate off the Committee at the end of each quadrennium.

Section 3. Organization of the Committee

At the beginning of the quadrennium, the Chairman shall convene the Committee. The Committee shall then select a vice-chairman and a Registrar. Should the Chairman of the Committee vacate his office either by resignation, or by rotation, or by death, the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall select another chairman to serve until the following Annual Conference. The Vacation of office by the vice-chairman or registrar shall be filled by the Committee from among its members. After the system of rotation has been established, each member shall serve a maximum of eight years, and the system of rotation shall continue permanently.

Section 4. Duties of the officers

a. The Chairman shall preside over the Committee during its regular and called meetings. He shall perform all those duties that usually pertain to the office of chairman.

b. The Vice-Chairman shall preside during the absence of the chairman, *provided* that if he should be a layman, he shall not succeed to the office of Chairman nor shall he serve as the ex-officio member of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

c. The Registrar shall be the regular secretary and accountant for the Committee. The records, payments and collections that will be involved in this Scholarship program shall be handled through the office of the duly elected Registrar of the Committee. All moneys in this Scholarship program shall be handled by the Conference Treasurer, to be disbursed upon requisition by the Committee.

ARTICLE IV FINANCES

Section 1. Income

The Commission on World Service and Finance shall continue the policy of financial aid to the Scholarship Program of our Conference by promoting the voluntary support of the local churches in this program. The churches shall be urged to contribute each year an amount equal to one per cent of the total operational budget, exclusive of building funds, capital expenditures, and special offerings adopted by the Conference, and Advance Specials.

Section 2. Division of Income

One-half of this fund shall be divided by the Conference Treasurer between Candler School of Theology and Duke Divinity School as recommended by the Jurisdictional Conference. The other half of this fund shall remain in the hands of the Conference Treasurer, and be administered by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications through the Committee.

Section 3. Administrative Costs and Reserve

The annual administrative costs of the Student Scholarship Program shall be paid out of the funds received by the Conference Treasurer for the Student Scholarship Fund. A five per cent reserve fund shall be maintained at all times; and funds collected in the current year of operation shall not be drawn upon except in case of emergency.

ARTICLE V

GRANTING OF SCHOLARSHIPS

Section 1. Screening of Applicants

The Scholarship Committee shall meet in the spring of each year to process applications received by the Registrar of the Committee, and to hold a personal interview with each applicant. These applications shall be made by the use of a formal application form supplied by the Committee. Following the study of the applications and an interview with each applicant, the Committee shall make its selections.

The decisions of the Committee shall be final; provided that it may request the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications to give counsel concerning any applicant; and provided further, that the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall determine the eligibility of any applicant as regards his status in the Conference and in the traveling ministry.

Section 2. Eligibility

The North Carolina Conference Scholarship Fund shall be available to Methodist Students who have evidenced their desire to become Methodist Ministers under appointment of the N. C. Annual Conference, and have been approved by the District Committee to obtain their Local Preacher's Licenses, and are enrolled in one of the colleges affiliated with the Methodist Church. Students who are already enrolled in and are attending a school not affiliated with the Methodist Church, who during their college career decide to enter the Ministry, may be considered as a special case by the Committee.

The Applicant for such scholarship aid must be recommended by the pastor of his church, and his district superintendent, *provided* that if he is already in college or seminary at the time of his application, he must also have a recommendation from one of the representatives of the Department of Religion of the institution where he is enrolled; *provided, further*, that if the applicant is attending a state or private institution where there is no Department of Religion, he shall obtain a recommendation from *either* the Director of the Wesley Foundation at the School, *or* from the pastor of the church which he attends while he is at such a school.

Section 3. Restrictions

a. The applicant for this Scholarship aid shall be an undergraduate Ministerial Student, or seminary student with extreme financial need. The intensity of this need shall be indicated on the financial section of the Application form, and discussed in the interview with the Committee.

b. Any student or student-family whose total income is equal to the minimum salary or better is ineligible for this Scholarship assistance.

Section 4. Scholastic Requirements

It shall be required that a student have at least a "C" average at the time of his original application. Thereafter, he must maintain at least a "C" average in order to be eligible for the renewal of his scholarship loan for the succeeding year. The Committee shall proceed in close co-operation with the colleges and Theological Schools wherein the Ministerial Scholarship students are enrolled.

Section 5. Amount of the Individual Loan

The amount of each individual loan to any applicant shall be determined by the Committee on the basis of the merits of each case.

Section 6. Securing the Loan

Any loan granted under this Scholarship Fund shall be secured by a promissory note prepared by the Scholarship Committee, stating clearly the terms of the Scholarship loan, properly signed and dated by the applicant, and co-signed by the applicant's legal parents or guardians, if they are living, or by his wife if he is married.

Section 7. Repayment of the Loan

Those who receive their B.D. degree from an accredited Theological School may repay the loan in service under the appointment of the N. C. Annual Conference. For each year of full-time service in the N. C. Conference, \$150 and the interest thereon shall be considered repaid, with the further provision that a maximum of eight (8) years full-time uninterrupted service in the N. C. Conference shall repay all moneys, including interest, received by the individual from the Scholarship Fund. If a student for some reason does not continue in the Methodist Ministry, or if he shall take appointment in some Conference other than the N. C. Conference, or if he does not receive the B.D. degree from an accredited seminary, the note or notes shall be repaid in full, including interest, on a cash basis. Such a cash obligation shall met in annual payments of not less than \$150 a year, including interest, and shall be paid in full by the end of an eight year period beginning with the first year after he terminates his formal schooling. The rate of interest shall be three per cent (3%) per annum. If a scholarship recipient should serve in the N. C. Conference long enough to repay in service only a part of his total grant, that part not repaid in service shall be repaid in cash in keeping with the terms stated above, beginning with the year of termination of his service in this conference.

ARTICLE VI

GUIDANCE FOR SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

The Committee shall keep in close contact with all students receiving scholarship aid. Students may be requested to meet the Committee annually at a place and date designated by the Committee. Further, a student receiving scholarship aid shall report for counseling to his pastor and to his district superintendent at least once annually. The pastor and the district superintendent shall report in writing to the Committee the results of this period of counseling.

ARTICLE VII

PERSONNEL

The following persons have been nominated for the elective positions and the terms of service on the Committee:

Ministers: J. S. Epperson, term to expire in 1964; W. M. Howard, term to expire in 1968.

Laymen: Hugh Ragsdale, term to expire in 1964; Cliff Edwards, term to expire in 1968.

The chairman of the Committee has been nominated: J. S. Epperson.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PSYCHOLOGICAL TESTING

Again this year the Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory is being administered to every new candidate for the ministry coming before the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. This is done in accordance with paragraph 322.4 of the 1960 *Discipline*. It should again be emphasized that this inventory is interpreted by skilled professional people. It is not used to determine a candidate's qualification or lack of qualification for the ministry, but is a diagnostic instrument to help refer individuals in need of further counsel to appropriate agencies before they continue into the full time traveling ministry. It is not the desire of the Committee or the Board to use the inventory pre-emptorily to eliminate candidates from the ministry.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PROCEDURES

New procedures have been adopted by the Board in the interviewing of candidates for the ministry. It is the hope of the Board that as these procedures are put into full practice it will be possible for an individual to schedule his appearance before the Board with minimum inconvenience and loss of time. Forms that must be completed and directions concerning records which must be supplied the Board are mailed to each candidate in advance. When candidates appear before the Board they are asked to register, and records are checked to make sure all necessary data is supplied before they appear before the Board. This eliminates multiple appearances before the Board and clarifies all questions concerning procedure. Following his appearance before the Board written notification of his status is sent to the candidate by the registrar. It is our desire to improve and streamline our procedures to serve the interests of each candidate for the ministry.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS, INC.

I

GENERAL STATEMENT

The Board of Missions of the North Carolina Annual Conference is happy to report continued progress in the area committed to its care. The measure of success which we have enjoyed has been due to the support of the entire Board, the Bishop and his Cabinet, and each local church. We herein express our gratitude to each person having a part in the work of missions.

We recognize, and do express, our gratitude to the Reverend O. L. Hathaway, Executive Secretary of the Board, for his enthusiastic and efficient execution of the total program of Church Extension and Missions. We recommend his re-appointment as Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Board of Missions and Church Extension for the ensuing year.

We express our abiding gratitude to the District Superintendents for the support given in leading our local churches to a larger vision of the world-wide mission of the Church. Our District Secretaries have given time, energy, and leadership in the total program of the Conference Board, for which we are grateful.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service, through its efficient President Mrs. H. C. Turlington, has done much to keep the zeal for missions before our people. We commend her and the other leaders of her Society for the valuable assistance given us throughout the year.

Your Board earnestly requests the full support of every local congregation in the total program of missions and church extension.

The following is a report of the work done during the year and a small view of what needs to be done.

II

WORLD MISSIONS

World Service: If the church is to fulfill its purpose in the world, it must be very sensitive to the calls for help that come to it from all places in the world. How desperate and how pitiful are the calls that come to the church from all areas of our world today. God's people are sick, hungry, cold, and ignorant; they are oppressed, persecuted, frightened, and many live in terror. Their cries, their tears, and their prayers go up to God each day saying, "O Lord, How long?" The answer to these prayers can only come

from the church, and from you and me; as individuals or as churches we cannot possibly know of all the needs of our world, but your Methodist Church through its General Board of Missions—World Missions, National Missions, MCOB, and Church Extension—have a trained staff that is familiar with the great needs of the church in all areas of the world. Your *World Service* is the channel through which the saving power of God is channeled to all of the needy places in the world. Your *World Service* is the instrument by which the command of Christ "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" is carried out.

Your conference Board of Missions is keenly aware of the great need of our Methodist Church for additional support for all of its missionary projects, both at home and abroad, and it humbly, but without apology, recommends to each church in the conference a full acceptance of its *World Service* askings.

Audio-Visual Aids: Your Conference Board of Missions recommends the continued and more extensive use of the Audio-Visual materials that relate to the mission areas of the church. The Commission on Missions can greatly strengthen and inspire its leadership in the local church by the use of these materials. These materials can be obtained from TRAFICO at the Methodist Building in Raleigh or from the Cokesbury Store in Richmond.

Missionary Conference: One of the most inspiring and informative Missionary enterprises for this area is the Annual Conference at Lake Junaluska. The Missionary Conference at Lake Junaluska for the summer of 1962 will take place July 20 through 26. Along with the Missionary Conference there will be held a *Youth and Missions Conference*. These conferences at Lake Junaluska provide an excellent opportunity for both youth and adults to become informed and inspired concerning our Methodist Missionary program. Bishop Paul N. Garber is to be the speaker for the Sunday morning service July 22nd, and he will share with the conference his experiences while among the Methodists of Poland.

European Caravan: A Caravan of eight young people under the leadership of the Reverend and Mrs. J. W. Page visited Methodist Churches in Europe last summer (1961). This was the 12th consecutive year that a Methodist Caravan from the North Carolina Conference had visited Methodist Churches in England, Germany, Austria, and Switzerland. It is impossible to describe the impact of the Caravan on the peoples of the communities visited. It is one of the finest missionary projects that is being sponsored by our conference. The 1962 Caravan is under the leadership of the Reverend and Mrs. Robert L. Bame. The prayers and the sincere good wishes of our Board of Missions and the North Carolina Conference go with the Caravan this summer as they share their Christian witness with the Methodists of Europe. If the Methodists of the North Carolina Conference could see and know the inspiring response of the Methodists of Europe to the Caravan, and if you could hear the reports from our young people who go on the Caravans, you would know that the Caravan is worthy of continued and added support. Because of the great need for this continued service, we recommend the continuation of the European Caravan for the mutual good of the Methodists of Europe and the selected youth of the North Carolina Conference.

It is the goal of the North Carolina Conference to provide the financial support for each of our missionaries from church or from individuals within the conference.

Advance Specials: Each church in the conference is urged to accept a Mission Special in each of the four areas—Foreign, National, M.C.O.R., and Conference. We recommend that each church in the conference be given the opportunity of accepting at least one special in each of the above mentioned areas.

Our Advance Special Program includes the following causes: Lands of Decision (Argentina, the Chinese in Dispersion, Pakistan, Rhodesia); all new Methodist churches (organized since 1932), including parsonages of these churches, proposed sites for new churches; tuition scholarships for directors of Christian education; the Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College; Alaska Methodist College; Bethany Mission on Shiloh Charge, Rocky Mount District; Conference missionaries in other lands; Caravan Methodist Church in Linz, Austria; work of Methodism in European area; Soo Cho University of Hong Kong; Sunset Park Methodist Church, Wilmington; Foreign student to assist students to study in Methodist Colleges in North Carolina; Wesley Foundation, North Carolina College; Galilee—Laurinburg (C. J.); St. John—Wilmington (C. J.); John Wesley—Fayetteville (C. J.).

Mission Special: An Inspiring Story: Bishop Paul N. Garber visited with the Methodists of Poland in December of 1961, and his report of the love, loyalty, and sacrifice of our Polish Methodists was inspiring and humiliating: those who heard the story of Poland and its preachers and layman were inspired by their love of the Christ and His Church, and their willingness to sacrifice so greatly for their church under conditions of poverty and want, and we, in this land of plenty and wealth, were humiliated because we have so much and have done so little in the way of actual sacrifice for the church of Christ. We were made glad to know that so many churches and people responded to the appeal of Bishop Garber to secure bicycles for the preachers of Poland. We are grateful to Bishop Garber for his leadership, and for the inspiration of his message from our Methodist people in Poland.

III

HOME MISSIONS

Church Extension

In the conference year work has continued in the area of extension with new buildings and new sites being developed in every district. The Board is facing population explosion in our state in a realistic manner and attempting to keep pace with community development.

During the last year our conference has started three new churches as follows: Pine Valley Methodist Church, Wilmington, N. C.; Wilmington District was organized on September 10, 1961; White Plains Methodist Church, Cary, N. C., Raleigh District, was organized on October 1, 1961. Parkwood Methodist Church, Durham, N. C., Durham District, was organized on October 8, 1961.

\$10.00 Club

Due to the continued generosity of the members of the \$10 Club, during the conference year to May 1, 1962, the board has been able to make available \$60,000.00 for new church construction. The churches helped and the amount given to each is as follows:

Approved for July 1962, Bethesda Methodist Church, Durham, N. C., \$15,000.00. Approved for November 1962, Christ Methodist Church, Graham, N. C., Burlington District, \$15,000.00.

The continuation of this important program is contingent upon the combined efforts

of our pastors and laymen in encouraging an increased membership to support the cause. We urge both pastors and laymen to encourage participation in this program.

New Sites

New locations in growing communities are receiving our attention and we hope to be able to secure good sites for new churches.

Churches and Parsonages

We have helped thirteen churches in the amount of \$13,050.00. We have helped eighteen parsonages in the amount of \$13,750.00.

When You Build

In order to make a request for a donation from the Board of Missions, the pastor or some official of the church must secure an application blank from the executive secretary, Reverend O. L. Hathaway, 3341 Hampton Road, Raleigh, N. C. This application for aid must be completed and in the hands of the executive secretary not later than May 1, annually. The applications are then processed and donations granted at the time of annual conference. The funds granted on these applications will be available to churches, parsonages, or other building causes within the ensuing conference year.

We recommend that each church follow the rules of the *Discipline* of the Church (1960) and the laws of the state in all of its building programs. Any building to cost as much as \$10,000 must have the approval of the commissioner of insurance and plans for any building to cost as much as \$20,000 should be drawn by a competent licensed architect. We recommend that all plans be presented to the District Board of Church Location and Building, to the Conference Board of Missions (if aid is requested) and to the National Board of Missions, Board of Architecture, for review and improvement if needed.

Alaska Methodist College

This is one of our National Missions Specials and one of the most worthy of our projects. We urge every church to continue its support of this project.

Pastors' School

The Board of Missions submits the following as members of the Pastors' School Board of Managers: Rev. J. W. Lineberger and Mr. C. H. Chewning, terms to expire in 1963; Rev. L. C. Vereen and Mrs. George Ratterman, terms to expire in 1965; Rev. C. P. Womack and Rev. C. S. Boggs, terms to expire in 1967.

Division of National Missions

The Board of Missions wishes to thank the staff of the Division of National Missions for their help in Pastors' Salary Aid and gifts and loans from the section of Church Extension. We have had visits from Dr. Allen B. Rice, Executive Secretary, Section of Home Missions; Dr. H. L. Johns, Director of Church Extension of the Southeastern Jurisdiction; Norman G. Byar, Director of Department of Architecture, and Dr. Alton E. Lowe, Director of Finance and Field Service.

We appreciate the co-operation and helpful understanding of these servants of The Methodist Church.

IV

AID TO CHURCHES

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Inc., was chartered by the State of North Carolina to facilitate the expansion of Church Extension within the bounds of the Conference.

The Board has made four construction loans for the building of churches, located in three districts.

The Board has made permanent loans to seven churches, located in four districts.

The Board has helped fifteen churches to secure loans for the construction of churches, located in eight districts.

The Board has helped to secure one parsonage and two sites for new churches.

The entire work of Church Extension is helped through the Board of Missions, Inc. and we need your support and endorsement of our work.

The Board of Missions, Inc. requests this session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church to grant permission to borrow a sum up to \$250,000.00 at the most favorable terms to expand the loan funds for Church Extension.

We recommend the re-election of all officers of this board for the ensuing year.

We seek the support of the Conference, that this agency of Church Extension may grow in its services to our people.

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1961 Session of the North Carolina Pastors' School was held jointly with the Christian Convocation on the campus of Duke University on Oct. 30-31 and November 1. Some two hundred participants registered for the program. As many as seven hundred were present for some of the main features of the program.

Dr. Albert C. Outler of the Perkins School of Theology, Dallas, Texas, delivered the James A. Gray Lectures on the theme, "The Forging of Wesley's Theology."

Bishop John Wesley Lord was the Convocation preacher. Special lecturers were: Dr. Jesse H. Zeigler, Associate Director of the American Association of Theological Schools; and Dr. Frank Baker, Associate Professor of Church History, Duke University. Dr. Zeigler lectured on "Psychology and the Ministry." Dr. Baker chose as his subject "Early Methodist Worship: The Three Distinctive Services."

The second Alumni Lecturer was Dr. Leon Russell, minister, Front Street Methodist Church, Burlington, N. C., and Chairman of the Board of Managers, N. C. Pastors' School.

The dates for the 1962 program are Oct. 29-31, 1962. The James A. Gray Lecturer is Prof. Gibson Winter of The Divinity School of the University of Chicago; the Convocation Preacher is Dr. Carlyle Marney, Myers Park Baptist Church, Charlotte, N. C.; Special Lecturers are: Dr. Stewart Henry, Duke Divinity School, and Rev. George Williams Webber, Union Theological Seminary of New York. Dr. Charles P. Bowles of West Market Street Methodist Church of Greensboro, N. C., is the Alumni Lecturer.

Dr. McMurray Richey will serve again as the Director of the Pastors' School.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

For the support of the Conference Claimants during the year 1962-'63, we recommend an apportionment on the churches of an amount equal to 16% of the salaries of the preachers. We recommend an annuity rate of \$60.00 per service year for Retired Preachers, including Retired Approved Supply Preachers whose service years meet the disciplinary requirements for annuity credit. (Attention, 1960 *Discipline*, Section 1631, paragraph 1 and section 317.)

A list of the Conference Claimants, their record of service years and annuity will appear in the Conference *Journal*. Special or Relief appropriations are recommended as follows: Miss Nannie Pattishall, an amount equal to a dependent child's annuity rate

for 28 years of service; Mrs. J. W. Smith \$600.00 annually and James E. Mahoney one year of Approved Supply service in the amount of the annuity rate of \$60.00. We recommend the reinstatement of Mrs. Leland L. Smith as a Claimant for widow's annuity for 20 years of service.

The Conference Claimants who have died during the past conference year are: W. L. Loy, H. L. Hendricks, E. M. Hall, Mrs. R. F. Munns, Mrs. S. E. Mercer, Sr. and Mrs. G. W. Holmes. Our deep sympathy goes with the loved ones of those who have moved into an eternal reward. The Rev. J. D. A. Autry, a faithful member of our Board, passed away in December of 1961. We wish to express to his wife and other close loved ones our deep sympathy and sincere appreciation for his devoted service to the Conference through the Board of Pensions. Due to ill health, Mr. John Hackney has found it necessary to resign from membership on the Board. In gratitude for his service, we wish him a speedy and complete recovery.

The Board recommends an annual honorarium of \$360.00 for the secretary of the Board of Pensions in addition to the expenses of this office.

It is recommended that ministers receiving benefits, through the Sustentation Fund Committee, during temporary release from appointments, pay 1% of their income into the Ministers' Retirement Fund in order to benefit from the Ministers' Retirement Fund.

Benefits paid in behalf of our Conference Claimants through the Hospital and Medical Expense Program for the first seven months amounted to \$5,079.00. Individual payments ranged from \$37.50 to \$559.12. We also call attention to the fact that, as of June 1, 1962, the total life-time maximum which will be paid to each retired person covered will be \$5,000.00 instead of \$2,500.00. This means that should anyone covered, exhaust the \$2,500.00 between July 1, 1961, and June 1, 1962, he would then have an additional \$2,500.00 upon which he could draw. The benefits from the HMEP is not affected by any other policy, the cost of which is paid, in full, by the individual insured. Our contract with Travelers reads as follows: "There shall be no duplication of benefits: If any benefit shall be provided under any other policy of group insurance . . . toward the cost of which any employer shall have contributed."

The Board calls attention to the Disciplinary requirements for receiving annuity credit for Approved Supply Service. Full explanation may be found in the 1960 *Discipline*, section 1631, paragraph 1 with reference to section 317. Unless the minister becomes a member of conference before retirement, he must have "rendered not less than four consecutive years of full-time approved service in one annual conference as pastor of a charge." Any period less than one full-time year of service may not be counted. An Approved Supply Service year for annuity credit must be full-time service. Full-time Approved Supply Service is service rendered on an appointment by a minister "who devotes his entire service to the church in the charge to which he is appointed whose cash support per annum from all church sources shall be not less than the minimum salary established by the conference for full-time Approved Supply Pastors."

Therefore, the Board calls attention to the fact that a Student Approved Supply Appointment does not qualify for annuity credit unless it is full-time service with minimum salary. The District Superintendents are urged to point out this to the Approved Supply Preachers in their districts.

We call attention to the Disciplinary requirements for annuity credit for years of service under special appointment to an institution, organization, agency, or community church (1960 *Discipline*, Section 1623, paragraph 7a). In order that such a year of service receive annuity credit, the institution, organization, agency, or community church must appropriate to the Conference Pension Fund an amount equal to twelve times the annuity rate which has been adopted for the conference year.

The Board recommends that Special Appointments, of which the salary is not received from conference funds and of which the institution, organization, agency, or community church, to which the appointment is made, does not appropriate to the Conference Pension Fund an amount equal to twelve times the annuity rate, be listed: "Without annuity claim upon this conference."

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

The Commission on Promotion and Cultivation recognizes as its purpose the promoting of World Service and Conference Benevolences in the local church. This purpose can be achieved only through a program which will help the local church better understand the financial needs of The Methodist Church.

During the year we have purchased the back page of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* to promote such causes as "World-Wide Communion Sunday," The Methodist Home for Children, "Radio and T.V. Sunday," The Ten Dollar Club, and "One Great Hour of Sharing." We believe this makes possible a wider participation in these special offerings and it is our desire to continue this practice.

We have purchased a copy of the new filmstrip "Fantastic Journey" which deals with the Benevolent Program of The Methodist Church. We have also given assistance to TRAFCO in some of their promotional needs.

We wish to commend the work of our conference in moving forward to full acceptance of the General Conference World Service Apportionment. We must continue to emphasize that "payment in full of these apportionments by local churches and Annual Conferences is the first benevolent responsibility of the church." (1960 *Discipline*, par. 740).

It is the hope of this commission that the membership of every church in our conference will become fully aware of our benevolent responsibility to the church and that we will understand which causes our money supports and the purpose of each of the causes thus supported. To this end we recommend that each local church make use of the following films and filmstrips on loan from the Walton Memorial Audio-Visual Library, Room 215, The Methodist Building, Raleigh, North Carolina:

"Fantastic Journey"—World Service

"The Church and Human Need"—M.C.O.R.

"Man on a Door Step"—M.C.O.R. (16 mm. Film)

"The Future Is Now"—World Service (six filmstrips and one 16 mm. film)

We wish to emphasize the overwhelming need which the church has for our full participation in the special offerings authorized to be taken in the local churches. We urge each pastor to give full promotion to each of these offerings as they appear. It is only through our continued support of these offerings that the benevolent arm of the church can be strengthened.

We recommend the use of the free World Service leaflets by each local church. These may be ordered from the Central Promotion Office and will be delivered each quarter on a standing order basis. These bulletin leaflets describe the benevolent causes of The Methodist Church.

METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION

(North Carolina Christian Advocate and Piedmont Press)

The Methodist Board of Publication is glad to be able to report that progress continues in the operation of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and the Piedmont Press. The picture continues to improve as the auditor's report and that of the Editor will show. The Board meets in regular quarterly meetings. These are held in February, May, August, and November. The annual meeting is held in May of each year. These meetings are well attended by the Board members.

Since the last annual report considerable saving has been effected in the cost of the paper for the *Advocate*. We figure a saving of some \$2,000 per year on this item. Further savings have been made in the over-all operation, amounting to \$229 per month.

Finances based upon ten months report indicate: Income from subscriptions \$22,273, Job work \$95,307, Advertising \$3,175, Other \$819, Endowment \$2,726, totaling \$136,894, with additional income expenses \$27,200, totaling \$164,094. Disbursements include: Salaries \$61,700, Travel \$840, Postage \$960, Supplies \$30,700, Taxes \$4,075, Miscellaneous \$8,771, with additional disbursements totaling \$45,821 and an expected balance of \$11,227. The final year's report will be duly audited.

We now have a staff of 17 persons employed in producing the *Advocate* and operating the Piedmont Press. The Editor, the Reverend S. J. Starnes, is endeavoring to eliminate unnecessary expenses. Our one great need right now is for an increase of *Advocate* subscriptions, and an increase in the amount of commercial job printing given us by the agencies of the conferences. We do quite a bit of this, but could, with our staff, handle quite a bit more. We solicit printing from our churches and educational institutions, as well as from our ministers and laymen. The Board has adopted a goal of 20,000 subscriptions. We are convinced that number can be secured if each church will give proper emphasis to this matter. The *Advocate* is endeavoring to serve every agency of the church, and solicits the co-operation of everyone involved. Our subscription price is lower than that of many such periodicals, and the appearance of our publication is superior to that of many.

The Editor has been busily engaged, both in the office and in covering the two conferences and otherwise. For instance, he visited personally and presented the cause of the *Advocate* at fourteen of the twenty-two district conferences. (Conflicts prevented him from attending the other eight.) He has also attended a number of other district meetings, as well as attending the World Conference of Methodism in Oslo, Norway, last summer; attended the Annual meeting of the Board of Missions at Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania; and the Sixth Assembly of the Woman's Society of Christian Service in Atlantic City, May 15-18, and usually preaches somewhere every Sunday in one of the Conferences from the extreme eastern to the extreme western boundaries of the state.

We are grateful for the fine expressions of appreciation of the *Advocate's* brighter day, and we sincerely request every minister and every church to give full support to this fine publication by securing a larger list of new subscriptions, and making sure that subscriptions expiring are renewed.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

One of the main objectives of this committee has been and will continue to be to co-operate fully with the Methodist Publishing House in such matters as Presentation of the Publishing House check for Conference claimants. Our Cokesbury store in Richmond has been especially helpful. Once again we present to the whole conference that money which has traditionally been given to our retired brethren, from the profitable activities of the publishing interests of Methodism. Dr. John Gross, General Secretary of the Division of Higher Education, Board of Education, recently made this affirmative statement about our publishing arm of the church: "The Methodist Publishing House has become one of Christendom's greatest enterprises for the production of Christian literature." The primary purpose of the organization in our church is to provide the local churches with necessary books, Bibles, periodicals, church and church school supplies and other materials. For 172 years this has been the cause for which the Publishing House has functioned and in 1961 the publishing interests of the church reported the most productive twelve months in its history from the standpoint of service to the church and its people.

Another major interest of this committee is the promotion of the wider use of the excellent family magazine, *Together*. There is not another just like it in any other denomination and it has become one of the most popular magazines in the Methodist homes (almost 1,000,000) across the country. The usual subscription price is \$5.00 a year. But now there is a special rate of the following:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION FUND MINISTERS' EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND

1. The Emergency Relief Fund Committee shall be composed of one representative from each of the following Boards or Committees: Board of Pensions, Committee on Conference Relations, Board of Hospitals and Homes, and a representative from the Cabinet. This committee shall make all decisions as to approval of grants after a thorough investigation of a case in point upon written applications from the disabled minister's District Superintendent.

2. The Emergency Fund Appropriation shall be used for emergency grants to effective ministers, and approved supply pastors serving an appointment, who become disabled during their active ministry and are unable to continue work during the period of disability, and whose income during this period is not adequate to meet emergency needs. Maximum aid shall not exceed \$4,000 per Conference year for any one disabled minister.

3. Aid shall be granted for the period of disability within the Conference year in which the grant is made. At the end of the Conference year, or period of disability, if further aid is needed, reconsideration shall be given to the case.

4. Application for aid shall be made in writing by the District Superintendent of the minister involved. Full and complete details should be given. Authorization for payment of grants shall be made in writing by the secretary of the Committee and submitted to the Conference Treasurer.

5. We recommend that the Ministers' Emergency Relief Fund be continued as an appropriation equal to 1 per cent of the pastor's salary in connection with the Ministers' Retirement Fund.

6. The following ministers received aid from the fund this year: the Reverend L. A. Lewis, the Reverend George W. Ports, Jr., the Reverend Key W. Taylor, the Reverend H. B. Harrell, the Reverend Paul Callahan.

REPORT OF THE TELEVISION RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

1. TRAFCO, with the other agencies, moved into the Conference Headquarters Building in Raleigh, from which point we will be able to render a greater service to the church. Our new address is: TRAFCO, Room 215, The Methodist Bldg., 1307 Glenwood Avenue, Raleigh, N. C. This may be shortened to TRAFCO, Methodist Building, Raleigh, N. C.

2. There has been a marked increase in the use of our facilities since moving and we encourage more of our people to visit our office to pre-view and check out the needed visual aids from The Walton Memorial Audio-Visual Library.

3. In all fairness to the Librarian, materials ought to be ordered at least one week to ten days in advance of the intended date of use. If less notice is given, we cannot assure delivery on a desired date because of the mailing situation.

4. Three workshops were held at strategic points during the last Conference Year. We urge more of our audio-visual users to become acquainted with the proper use of audio-visual aids.

5. It is our dual objective in the coming Conference Year to:

(a) publish a new catalog or work out an arrangement with those concerned for a listing in the Audio-Visual Resource Guide.

(b) to place with at least one of the TV Stations in the Conference Area, the new children's TV series called "*Breakthru*." All pastors are urged to promote this series through the church school if "*Breakthru*" is to be seen in their section of the Conference.

6. In view of this new series and other circumstances involved in the operation of TRAFCO, we are asking permission to use up to 50% of the funds received by the special offering on TV Ministry-TRAFCO Sunday which is the first Sunday in January.

7. It should be emphasized again and again that liberal giving to the TV Ministry

Fund could very well mean the production of more and more children's series for Television. The church can be in the rightful position of changing the nation's TV viewing habits. This is an opportunity we ought not to miss.

FIELD WORK EXPANDED

 - Visitation Evangelism
 - Out-Post Church Schools
3. Representing the interest of the Commission on various Conference boards and agencies.
4. Numerous counseling sessions dealing with a variety of local rural church situations.
5. Commission Report to the District Conferences.
6. Assist in the promotion of Conference Pastor's School of Evangelism.
7. Prepare three district wall maps.
8. Activate District Directors of Town and Country Work.
9. Promote Jurisdictional Conference on Town and Country Work.

Rural Church Fund

Perhaps, the most significant of our endeavors this year has been the launching of the Rural Church Fund of Methodist Foundation, Inc. After months of preparation by the Reverend Key W. Taylor, Chairman of the Commission on Town and Country Work, the Rural Church Fund brochure was made available for distribution. Much of the future work of the Commission is expected to be made possible through the resources of the Rural Church Fund. We earnestly seek the support and whole-hearted co-operation of all our people in this crucial undertaking.

Ofttimes we are humbled by the magnitude of the challenge that presents itself in the work with our rural churches. Through faith in an unfailing God to bless us with the power of His Grace we are given the strength to face the opportunities of the day.

A statistical study, *Local Church Production Story*, was completed in March, 1961. This is a progress report from 1950 to 1959 for each church in the Conference, and contains detailed information on church and church school membership, pastoral change, and finances. It was published in nine volumes, one for each district. A report of the study was made at an Interagency Meeting on the Local Church at Edenton Street Church, Raleigh, on November 28, 1961. At this meeting an exhibit was presented by 22 placard charts summarizing the study.

A one-volume supplement to the above work was prepared this year to show the growth of each church for the two years since the study was made. This carries as a frontispiece a Conference-wide summary chart of the original 10-year study.

In 1955, a study was published under the title, *Look at the People*, in which the total and white population of each county in the Conference Area is given for 1940 and 1950 by age and for urban, rural-farm, and rural-nonfarm residence. This information was available for planning the location of new churches and colleges, and in other ways. A similar volume will be published this year for the census years 1950 and 1960, with some additional information. The study is being financed by the Ormond Fund of Duke Divinity School, as was most of *Local Church Production Story*.

Statistical tables have been prepared for a book on the rural church now in preparation by the chairman of the Commission on Town and Country Work.

Report No. 3

DEPARTMENT OF TOWN AND COUNTRY CHURCH WORK
OF LOUISBURG COLLEGE

The Department of Town and Country Work of the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church, for some years has promoted a program by which Methodist colleges are encouraged to establish departments of town and country church work. A number of Methodist colleges have established such departments or professorships. On September 1, 1954, the Department of Town and Country Church Work was instituted at Louisburg College, and C. Wade Goldston was appointed by the bishop and elected by the college Board of Trustees as professor of town and country church work.

The Department of Town and Country Church Work of Louisburg College as to nature of work is evolving, seeking to adapt and serve in a growing Annual Conference.

From the beginning, one of the major functions of the Department has been to encourage and assist approved supply pastors to get college education. The college pioneered in providing for approved supply pastors a three-consecutive-day weekly schedule. This schedule is necessary for student pastors living too far from the college to commute daily, and affords the student pastors four consecutive whole days each week on their charges.

In addition to the college training for approved supply pastors, a helpful counseling service for these ministers is offered, in school and on the field.

Other functions of the Department are: teaching college Bible and sociology courses, helping with campus religious activities, counseling of college students planning for or considering full-time church vocations, co-operating with Annual Conference agencies in in-service training of pastors and in training lay preachers, helping to strengthen local churches, evangelistic work, and assisting with the Annual Conference town and country church work.

Since the beginning, 61 approved supply pastors (ten in other Annual Conferences) and 13 others have been enrolled in Louisburg College, Department of Town and Country Church Work. Of the 493 pastors serving in the North Carolina Annual Conference, ten per cent have been enrolled in the Department.

The Virginia Annual Conference, having studied the work of the Department of Town and Country Church Work of Louisburg College, plans to institute such a department in Ferrum Junior College.

Report No. 4

THE RURAL CHURCH FUND OF METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

The North Carolina Annual Conference area is "frontier again" as to economic expansion, population growth, and sociological development. Therefore, the work of rural church expansion is large and complex. The rural church of the North Carolina Annual Conference has long suffered from much neglect. The task of rural church rehabilitation is large and complex. Rural church expansion and rehabilitation are inter-related.

The white population of the North Carolina Annual Conference area is nearly two-thirds rural (1960 census). A competent population projection study indicates that the white population of the area will remain about two-thirds rural throughout this century. A reliable population forecast indicates that the white population of the State of North Carolina will about double in the course of this half century.

The rural church enterprise of the North Carolina Annual Conference should be a program of development having adequacy of conception.

The Commission on World Service and Finance has constantly given helpful financial support to the expanding rural church enterprise of the Annual Conference. Doubtless it will continue to do so.

However, the time has come for the Commission on Town and Country Work to seek supplementary funds, mainly for special projects designed to make significant contributions to the rural church work of the Annual Conference. In this interest, The Rural Church Fund, through the Commission on Town and Country Work, has been established as a participating part of Methodist Foundation, Inc.

It is likely that many persons and some foundations, endowments, and commercial corporations will be found willing to contribute to The Rural Church Fund. Through the years, the Fund should grow to be large and very helpful.

Three types of persons, mainly, would be motivated to contribute to The Rural Church Fund, namely, (1) a person who grew up in a rural community and who belongs or belonged to a rural church, and would like to give expression to a feeling of indebtedness by assisting the rural churches; (2) a person who grew up in an urban community and who belongs to an urban church, and would like to assist the rural churches because of their constant contribution to urban churches; (3) a person who realizes that the rural churches are important religious and social institutions.

A foundation, endowment, or commercial corporation realizing that the rural churches are important religious and social institutions, would be motivated to contribute to The Rural Church Fund.

The Rural Church Fund contains 14 funds (at present, small in amount), to provide needed rural church projects and for general rural church work. The Rural Church Fund has two sections, namely, (1) endowment section, and (2) expendable section. Donor, making gift or writing will or both, may designate fund(s) according to interest, and may designate endowment section or expendable section or both. (If donor does not designate fund(s), the Commission on Town and Country Work has the authority to select fund(s). If donor does not designate section(s), the Commission on Town and Country Work has the authority to determine section(s).)

Methodist Foundation, Inc. has the authority and responsibility to solicit, invest, and disburse moneys, to counsel in the writing of wills, and to administer gifts and wills as directed by donors. The Commission on Town and Country Work elects one member of the corporation.

Note: The above was approved by Methodist Fund Incorporated (now Methodist Foundation, Inc.), on October 22, 1958. On June 24, 1959, the Annual Conference provided that "members of the Corporation" (Methodist Foundation, Inc.) shall include one person elected by the Commission on Town and Country Work. On June 28, 1961, the Annual Conference gave permission to the Commission on Town and Country Work to solicit throughout the Conference for The Rural Church Fund.

Report No. 5

A Philosophy of Work for the Commission on Town and Country Work*

Relative to the 1960 *Discipline*, paragraph 1231, the Annual Conference is requested to approve the following interpretation and implementation:

(1) The Commission on Town and Country Work is the one specifically grass roots board of the Annual Conference, by name and by definition of the *Discipline*. The existence of the Commission is recognition that the rural church is a problem and opportunity field of the Annual Conference.

One of the works of the Commission is to analyze the rural church problem, find solutions, and to get the solutions adopted and made effective. In this procedure, creativity and excellent craftsmanship are required.

The North Carolina Annual Conference area is "frontier again" as to economic expansion, population growth, and sociological development. The work of the Commission has to do with rural church expansion, and with Annual Conference expansion. In this procedure, creativity and excellent craftsmanship are required.

(2) One of the functions of the Commission is to help remedy the illnesses of the rural church. A function of greater importance is to help cure the causes of the illnesses. Politically, The Methodist Church is a connectional system, not a congregational confederation. Most of the causes of the rural church problem are systemic. Therefore, the Commission should work mainly where policies and programs are devised, not merely at the margin of Annual Conference activity.

(3) The church is both body and soul. Good health of each is necessary for the church to be a redemptive and transforming force. The Commission is properly interested in helping to solve institutional problems of the Annual Conference, and in helping to recover the Wesleyan evangelistic spirit.

(4) The Methodist Church of America was established with the episcopal type of church administration. Gradually the boards and other agencies have grown up alongside the episcopal system, and have grown in number and strength. So now there is a dual system of church administration,¹ and the *Discipline* does not clearly define the spheres of authority of the two systems. The Commission, aware of this duality, should be alert to possible operational problems.

(5) The Commission is a research and resource board. Its administrative authority is limited to work within the Commission.

(6) The rural churches, members, and pastors of the Annual Conference are a marginal group, and are a marginal majority. The Commission is the agent, the voice, and the servant of the rural churches, members, and pastors.

(7) In Christian history, the plain people and poor people have been the human source from which the great spiritual movements have come. This was a significant factor in the Wesleyan revival. The plain people and poor people reside in large and increasing numbers in eastern North Carolina. These people are not being adequately reached by Methodism. The Methodist Church is becoming a middle and upper class church. The Commission has as one of its major concerns the inclusion of the masses of plain people and poor people in Methodism's mission.

(8) The white population of the North Carolina Annual Conference area is predominantly rural, and will be so for a long time to come. Life rises from the roots. So, the state of health of the rural (root) churches determines considerably the degree of spiritual vitality and institutional strength of the Annual Conference. The Commission has responsibility for the rural (root) churches. Therefore, competent husbandry by the Commission is of great importance to the life and work of the Conference.

(9) The rural church is affected detrimentally by two opposite currents, operating viselike.

(a) The sociological process operates in the manner of an upbound escalator, carrying population, leaders, economic wealth, religious values, and other resources from rural to urban communities and churches.

(b) The downward pressure of paternal Methodist procedure is a cause of local church initiative being impaired to the point of paralysis in some respects.

Thus, the rural church is affected detrimentally (devitalization) by these two opposite currents. This is a basic cause of the Methodist rural church problem. The Commission is responsible to provide statesmanlike leadership in Annual Conference work, which will creatively cope with this cause of the rural church problem.

Resources comparable in value to those received should be returned to the rural churches by the urban churches, and the Annual Conference should learn to work from the local church upward. (In the vegetable kingdom, the life process flows upward.) For this needed dual enterprise, county group ministry would be a necessary procedure.

Return to the rural churches by the urban churches of resources comparable in value to those received, is a moral obligation. Also, it is a practical necessity, as it is a matter of "feeding the cow being milked." Return of resources to the rural churches should not be done paternally, but with a well-studied and well-managed process of "plowing back" of resources needed. Examples of such work are the Federal and State enterprises serving farmers and rural communities.

Report No. 6

RESOLUTION

The work of the Secretary of the Annual Conference has become too heavy to be done by a pastor.

The Annual Conference of 1959 approved a proposal that the Annual Conference have an archive, and that the Secretary of the Annual Conference be the archivist. (See *Journal*, 1959, p. 221).

There are Annual Conference agencies, without executive secretaries, which have increasing load of work too heavy to be done well by available workers. So, part-time workers are needed.

The Annual Conference needs a Commission on Methodist Information with a director, which is provided for in the *Discipline*. (See *Discipline*, 1960, pars. 1586-1590).

The Long-Range Planning Committee and the Commission on World Service and Finance are hereby requested to study the possibility of combining with the work of the Secretary of the Annual Conference some of the other above mentioned functions, making one full-time job. It is requested that the study be reported to the next regular session of the Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Conference Board of Trustees has had three meetings since it last submitted a written report to the Annual Conference. In addition a decision has been received from the Judicial Council which, in effect, upholds the position of the Board of Trustees in placing funds for investment with Methodist Foundation, Inc. The Board of Trustees continues to believe that it has met its primary responsibilities of safe guarding and protecting the interests and rights of the annual Conference in all matters relating to property and rights of property.

At the request of the Board of Pensions of the Conference, \$3,500.00 from the current earnings of the funds held in trust was transferred to them for their use. The remaining earnings were left with the Foundation for reinvestment.

The Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees required in their By-laws was held in

Durham during the Annual Conference Session in June, 1961. Subsequent called meetings were held on January 19 and March 16, 1962.

The Conference received the sum of \$2,214.23 under the Will of the late Louise Sholar Cowell and these funds were paid to the Board of Trustees. At its January meeting, the Trustees voted to transfer this money to North Carolina Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount, North Carolina to be used as an addition to the scholarship fund of the college, which was in accord with the wishes of the late Mrs. Cowell.

At its meeting of March 15, the Conference Board of Trustees passed a resolution authorizing the lease of two acres of land in the tract at the site of the Methodist Building which will provide for the Conference annual revenue of \$10,000.00 which will be applied against the remaining indebtedness of the Headquarters Building. A copy of this resolution is attached to and made a part of this report.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees visited the Office of the Secretary of State and obtained the necessary information relating to the rechartering of the Board of Trustees by providing certain amendments to the Charter previously adopted in 1951. The amendments which have been incorporated in the Charter were approved at the 1961 Session of the Annual Conference.

RESOLUTION

In consideration of the request of The Methodist Building Committee to the Conference Board of Trustees, that official action be taken relating to formalizing of a commitment to lease approximately two acres of the Headquarters Building site to financially responsible person, persons or a corporation for a period of 50 years more or less and at an annual rental figure of \$10,000.00 more or less as may be acceptable to The Methodist Building Committee:

IT IS HEREBY MOVED: That this Board direct its Chairman or Vice-Chairman to execute such a lease to be attested by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees when presented by the Building Committee.

In support of the motion, it is understood and agreed that such lease would contain a provision for subordination of the interest of the annual conference to the first claim of a lending agency. However, it would also contain provision for the Board of Trustees to have prior rights in event of default by the lessee in payment of:

a. rental on the land, or

b. installments or interest or further requirements on the mortgage or deed-of-trust so that the Trustees might protect the interest of the conference by stepping in and taking over the entire property in due process as may be formulated by attorneys in preparing papers.

Under such an arrangement as set forth, the conference would recapture in a period of four years, a total value of the two acres of land at \$40,000.00 which represents the same value established by the sale of 8 acres on Wade Avenue. It is, therefore, considered that there is little if any risk at all involved in this transaction and that it is to the best interest of the annual conference to execute same.

The Building Committee has set forth the need for the income from this lease in balancing the operating budget and that it has been contemplated from the first day of presentation of the plan for the building to the annual conference that the project be self-sustaining and self-liquidating. The only means to do this is to utilize these resources until such purpose has been accomplished.

It is also understood that the proposed lease in no wise puts the conference in the position of constructing, or operating the proposed building. It is purely a land rental operation.

We do so move.

REPORT OF BOARD OF COLLEGE VISITORS

Considerable progress was noted at the three colleges visited in April 1962 by the Board of College Visitors. At Methodist College in Fayetteville, Wesleyan at Rocky Mount and Louisburg College there were many gratifying features about each which gave the Board, in its second tour as presently constituted, a feeling of accomplishment and pride.

One member of the Board expressed the feeling of all who made the trip when he said "We have something to be proud of in our new colleges. What is taking place on the campuses is nothing short of a miracle, and we have a right to ask our people to pray for and support them without reservation."

At each college the group met with administrative officials, the faculties and the students. An extremely high morale was noted at each institution, a feeling of pride on the part of both students and faculties in their accomplishments, and a definite forward look in each instance.

Perhaps this is directly traceable to the increased facilities and the satisfying progress in the long-range plan for physical improvement. However, there is discernible a spirit of accomplishment and an air of expectancy which speaks well for the future.

The Board viewed for the first time the auditorium at Louisburg, the dining facilities at Wesleyan and the new dormitories at Methodist College. It was pleased to note the progress in the libraries at each school. Particularly impressive was the program undertaken at Louisburg for training of Supply Pastors. Of 493 pastors presently serving the N. C. Conference, 52 have received some training under the program. A similar one is anticipated for Methodist College.

Without exception students interviewed expressed the opinion that they have received benefit from attending these smaller schools where they have been able to secure individual and excellent instruction.

The Board believes its greatest impression on this trip is the fact that this year the N. C. Conference has something tangible to which it can point with pride. Last year, particularly at the two new college, things were in the formative stage, but this year there is more a feeling of permanence. The Conference can justly feel that the three colleges are filling a very real need, and filling it commendably.

The Board would recommend that Methodist young people be encouraged to take advantage of these church-related institutions. There is no substitute for seeing for one's self, so the Board recommends that Methodists visit these campuses themselves and see the marvelous progress which has been made. They will be welcome at any time.

THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

We glance back to see what has been done so far, during this quadrennium, that we may take a more fruitful look forward. Last year, 1961, we held a week-end conference on Church-related vocations with over 150 youth and adults in attendance, Dr. Mack Stokes of Emory, speaker.

This year, 1962: (1) we held tri-district rallies in Durham, Williamston, Clinton with over 1,000 youth and 400 adults in attendance, some 800 of these at Clinton. We thank Bishop Roy Short, Rev. Jack Wilson, Rev. Bob Barefield, Chapel Hill, Queen Street at Kinston, Centenary at Smithfield MYFs for presenting the drama on Christian vocations, "One Man's Moon," as well as Bishop Paul N. Garber, each of the District Superintendents, each of the District Directors on Christian Vocations, each of the host churches and all others for helping in this tremendous impact for good. We are especially grateful to Dr. A. J. Hobbs, our representative on the cabinet. (2) We had four in attendance at our Regional Conference on Christian Vocations in Atlanta in March: Rev. Norwood Jones, Rev. J. C. Alexander, Rev. Robert Baldrige, Rev. Bill Wells. (3) We sent each minister a copy of *Church Related Vocations, Service Projects, 1962* and *Steps in Counseling*, and also encouraged them to observe Ministry Sunday,

May 20th. (4) We wish to present at our Annual Conference half-hour on Monday, June 18th, about 4:00 p.m., our report and Dr. D. D. Holt, President, Scarritt College, speaking on the direct as well as the indirect influence and image of the minister on the youth in their choice of a vocation, particularly a church-related vocation. (5) We plan to have a supper for the Commission on Christian Vocations, at 5:30 on Monday, June 18th, at King's Barbeque, Kinston, with Dr. Rodger Decker, Director, Vocational Guidance Center, St. Andrew's Presbyterian College, Laurinburg, N. C., as speaker. We feel that our Conference and Church should get into this area of Vocational Guidance and are in the process of laying the ground work.

This coming year, 1962-63, we hope to do the following: (1) Have a special training session at Louisburg College, beginning at 10 o'clock on Monday, August 27th, under the direction of those who attended the Regional in Atlanta. Each District Director of Christian Vocations will work with his District Superintendent in presenting this cause to the ministers of our conference in a fall district meeting, to encourage every local church, not only to organize the Committee on Christian Vocations, but to carry out specific suggestions that will help all. (2) Encourage each minister to help see that Church-related vocations are presented on Career Day in each high school. (3) Work with the Conference Board of Lay Activities in their round of Lay Rallies in February, 1963, on the theme of Christian vocations, to help those in attendance see the need and importance of making and keeping their vocation Christian. (4) Work with the Duke Divinity School, if additional funds are available, in a week-end meeting for prospective ministers, to be held at the Divinity School. (5) Work with the Board of Ministerial Training in encouraging every minister to observe Ministry Sunday, May 19, 1963.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND THE WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

As we come to the close of another year and take stock of the year's work we see and feel some gains, but also find that in some areas there is much room for improvement. During the entire year one fact has stood out—the dedication, the selflessness and the co-operative spirit of the women who serve with us on the Executive Committee.

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Society held in the First Methodist Church of Wilson March 20-22 and of the Wesleyan Service Guild in Rocky Mount April 7-8 followed the theme "The Factors that Confront us." The attendance was excellent and the speakers a source of inspiration to the women. Just now we are looking forward with great anticipation to the Assembly in Atlantic City May 15-18. Its theme will be "The Church in the World." The North Carolina Conference Society will have an official delegation of 14—3 conference officers, 1 delegate from each district, 1 student, and 1 representative from the M.Y.F. A chartered bus carrying visitors will also go.

Statistics do not tell the whole story but are necessary in making reports. Last year we reported 26 unorganized societies and again we report 26 churches without a Woman's Society or Guild, and yet we have 7 new societies and several new guilds making a total of 765 societies and 75 guilds with a combined membership of approximately 35,000 members. These 26 unorganized churches are the same churches which were unorganized last year. The new societies are in the new churches. The Fayetteville, Elizabeth City, New Bern, Raleigh, and Rocky Mount Districts are 100% organized.

An accurate financial report cannot be made at this time, for our district treasurers' reports are not due until May 15th. It is estimated that at least \$220,000.00 will be the amount sent to the Woman's Division for the year 1961-1962 for all purposes and an equal amount will have been spent on Local Church Activities. An increase in the pledge for 1962-1963 has been made.

It is with pleasure that we report that Miss Rebecca Modellmog and Mrs. Carl Maynor have been reassigned to the Pembroke Area for another year. Mrs. Maynor, the

former Barbara Jean Smith, will complete her term as a U. S. 2 and is going into regular work with the Woman's Division. The Woman's Society supports Miss Sudie Hunt Doughton of Durham in Santiago, Chile, and a new worker, Miss Anne Page Brooks of Roxboro, in Toyko, Japan. It is with deep regret that we see one of our workers leave us. Miss Mamie Chandler who has made an outstanding contribution to the work at the Methodist Student Center in Greenville for the past nineteen years is retiring. This Center bears the imprint of her personality and consecration. The Woman's Society became involved in the establishment of this Student Center because of certain situations, but now instead of a project of the Woman's Division it is becoming a joint project of the Interconference Committee and the Woman's Society and these two agencies of the church are working together harmoniously.

A Rural Advisory Committee has been set up in the Wilmington District and one is now in process of formation in the Fayetteville District. The Conference Scholarship Committee has just awarded three scholarships of \$500.00 each given by the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the North Carolina Conference to girls going to Methodist College, Louisburg College, and/or Wesleyan College. Smaller scholarships are still given to three girls going to Pfeiffer College.

There has been evidence in some areas of a better understanding of the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and we are most appreciative of the co-operation of our Bishop and the District Superintendents. The Society has sought to and is seeking to meet the rapid social changes in our world in such a way as to be a more effective witness for Christ. May we meet "The Factors that Confront Us" in our own lives, in our societies, in our local churches, and in our world as He would have us meet them!

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

On the first day of the week, let every man . . . as God has prospered him . . . lay aside a tithe . . . Thus we learn in this "economic world" the difference between living and existing, between owning our possessions and being owned by them.

This Commission seeks simply to hold up for every Methodist in this Conference the need to give weekly, not monthly, not quarterly, not annually, your offering to your local church.

Our stated goal: That every church will be responsible for conducting each year an Every Member Visitation urging regular "methodical" weekly contributions by its membership, and then to be responsible for submitting to our Conference treasury monthly one-twelfth of its benevolence quota and connectional expense, and all collected specials.

We truly believe such procedure will tend to resolve the financial problems and crises many local churches have faced in the past. We believe such a program will enable churches to lift their pastors off of minimum salary basis. We believe such dedicated efforts by laymen, stimulated by their ministers, and undergirded by this universally recognized Commandment of Jesus Christ Himself, will enable our Conference to meet its responsible obligations to World Service, to our colleges, to every benevolent cause of the church. "Prove me, saith the Lord, if I will not open the windows of heaven . . ."

Why do we doubt, why do we drag our feet in this Conference? It has been brought to our attention that across this Conference criticism is directed toward our financial policy; that monies sent in are held in our treasury to be invested, until spent a year later, to meet budget, and that the local church might just as well do the same.

Your Commission could not argue against this ideology if it were true, but it is not! We hold, that if every Methodist knew and understood the true procedure under which this Conference operates, members would be the first to see the wisdom of regular monthly remittances, simply because it is essentially fair. We Methodists are essentially fair people!

The facts are simply this: 44.07% (increasing each year) of the combined total budget of \$1,905,042 is remitted at our direction during the year in which it is raised—and as

the churches remit to us. These Commission receipts are now going out monthly. That is, \$839,560 is not held, to be invested or distributed the following year, but is held only as the churches withhold it themselves. Why do they do this? Simply because they do not understand, or have been given erroneous information as regards the needs of our colleges, our Children's Home, World Service, and other church programs. Let us prove our hearts are in the right place by placing our treasures in God's hands!

Allocations to the charges shall be made by the district superintendents. Benevolences shall be distributed thus: Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptances up to the amount fixed in the budget. Any surplus shall be held by the conference treasurer to be expended by the Annual Conference upon recommendation of the Commission. Provided, however, in the event collections under Item No. 7 Benevolences shall fall short to an extent which cannot be bridged by the Contingency Fund, the Commission requests authority within its discretion to pay in full certain items in the budget (World Service, General Administration). The remaining sum available will be paid proportionately to the remaining budget items.

LIMITING AND SUPPLEMENTING PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE BUDGET

1. Apportionments against pastor's salary are defined to include the salary of the pastor and associate pastor under Episcopal appointment.

2. (a) The annual salary of each of the nine district superintendents shall be set at \$9,600.00 including travel and utilities (water \$60, heating \$300, electricity \$180, residential telephone \$60, up to a total of \$600).

(b) We approve the use of an amount up to \$3,000 to be provided by each district for the district superintendent for secretarial help and promotion of the district program.

(c) To provide for Cabinet Meeting expenses.

3. The Commission recommends that each person who has authority to draw checks against an account of a conference agency be required to present annually to the full membership of his agency a complete list of all checks drawn, justifying all checks with the budget approved by his agency.

4. The Commission recommends that each agency whose accounts are not audited in the treasurer's office be required to have an annual audit made and furnish this commission with a copy of it.

5. (a) Under the Church Extension Fund the first \$50,000.00 is earmarked to be paid to Board of Missions, Inc. for the revolving fund in order to provide security for money to be borrowed by the Board of Missions, Inc. in the total amount of \$250,000.00 (To be used for loans to build churches).

(b) We recommend that the amount under Section A be considered a fixed obligation annually through conference year 1966-67 or until the borrowed money is fully repaid.

(c) We approve the request of the Board of Missions, Inc. for the renewal of their loan in the amount of \$250,000.00.

III

The Commission recommends approval of the following Specials to be arranged by Special Offerings or included in the local church budget. If budgeted, the amount should be liberal. Remit to conference treasurer.

6. The Methodist Home for Children for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.
7. The Methodist Foundation, Inc. as provided in its charter.
8. The Town and Country Commission, Rural Church Fund, for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

V

We recommend to charge or church treasurers that they set up a schedule for remitting at a fixed time each month and to close the year as early as possible. Final remittance should be mailed on Monday two weeks preceding the opening of Conference.

The pastors bear responsibility to check with treasurers for full remittance of all budgeted items and all funds collected as specials and to harmonize their reports to Annual Conference with conference treasurer's acknowledgments both received and pending.

We report the issuance of a Fidelity Bond in Employers Mutual Casualty Company of Des Moines, Iowa, to cover the Conference Treasurer in the amount of \$100,000.00 and to cover the Assistant to the Treasurer in the amount of \$25,000.00; others to a minimum amount of \$10,000.00 in said office. Also to cover others handling funds: Director of Christian Higher Education \$100,000.00; Superintendent of Methodist Homes, Inc., \$50,000.00; Business Manager, Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$50,000.00; and others to the amount of \$10,000.00 in various offices.

We recommend the continuation of A. M. Pullen & Company as auditors.

A WORD FROM THE CONFERENCE TREASURER

The financial aspect of the Conference year 1961-62 may be termed successful. The local churches paid their apportionments more than 97% complete. We were able to meet the Benevolences Budget; that is World Service, Conference Program and Benevolences in full.

One gratifying feature is the improvement in remittance of Conference items on schedule. By doing this the local church is better able to meet its budget in full and avoid last-minute financial emergency appeals. Also of great interest is Conference occupancy of the new Methodist Building in Raleigh. Visitors are expressing surprise and pleasure at the beauty of the building and the functional planning of the Conference area. The leasing of the space built to lease is moving ahead and when completed will assure the conference sufficient income above operating expense to liquidate the entire cost over a period of 20 years.

You are invited to visit the building.

Methodist Foundation, Incorporated, in its investments has weathered the recent financial storm quite well. The total income has been improved and the market value of securities as of August 3, 1962, is in excess of the value of the securities on our books.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

Questioned concerning the United Societies, John Wesley described them as "A company of men having the form, and seeking the power, of godliness . . . that they may help each other to work out their salvation." From this recognition that Almighty God honors and uses godly and corporate "means of grace" and the people's participation in the Christian life has come the command of General Conference to recover theology and liturgy, that we may indeed recognize Jesus Christ as Lord in our common life and faithfully serve Him and lead the people.

In the discharge of our responsibility this year we can report with satisfaction: the establishment of a Commission on Worship in every church of one district; the holding of several subdistrict workshops for members of the Commission on Worship in the Local Church; the establishment of a Commission on Worship in several larger churches of the

Conference; several music workshops and schools for ushers; the teaching of the course on Christian Worship in several laymen's leadership schools; the supplying of copies of the Revised Communion Service to ministers on request, its study in several church school classes, its regular use in the Divinity School, and study and use in the Supply School, with uniformly favorable and grateful responses.

We report that revision of the general services continues by the National Commission on Worship, and that the revision of the hymnal proceeds with the aid of a large number of consultants.

We regret to report that we were unable to conduct district workshops, deferring to the Outpost Church School campaign; and that it has not been possible this year to restore the Communion service to the Annual Conference. And we respectfully question of all concerned whether a Methodist Annual Conference so organized and so busy as to exclude Holy Communion is effectively organized and wisely busy?

We report with pleasure these plans and services for the future: a workshop for officers of Conference Commissions on Worship during Ministers' Week at Lake Junaluska, July 15-20, 1962, open to all interested persons; the establishment of a leadership course on the work of the Local Church Commission on Worship, to be offered in the Alamance County Leadership School in October; that the chairman of your Commission with the assistance of Rev. Fred Still planned and presented two programs on worship and church architecture to the Conference Bishop's Commission on Architecture; that mimeographed copies of the Revised Communion Service to be inserted in the Sunday Morning Service leaflets are available from the Commission at nominal cost and that each minister may secure copies from any member of the Commission, or by mail from the Chairman.

We call on our district superintendents and pastors to honor Christ and build the Church by vigorous co-operation in the March 1963 Pastor's Church Membership Classes, and we hereby offer to arrange and lead a series of workshops to this end. We call all concerned to establish a local Commission on Worship in each church, and will furnish copies of the brochure on the nature and duties of the Commission upon request. We call each district superintendent and minister to study the occasional services: baptism, confirmation and church membership, marriage, burial of the dead, and Holy Communion, and to employ them reverently, faithfully, and unhurriedly, with special attention to the new opportunities for congregational participation. And we announce that the members of this Commission stand ready to aid in group study of any or all of these services upon invitation.

We call upon all those responsible for worship, for Christian nurture, and evangelism to new and prayerful co-operation, to the end that Methodists may be led back to Godly forms and the disciplined life through which the Holy Spirit may again manifest the power of God in our lives and corporate witness.

THE REPORT OF A SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY BISHOP GARBER TO STUDY THE IN-SERVICE TRAINING NEEDS OF MINISTERS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

At an Inter-Agency meeting on the Local Church called by Bishop Garber in the Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C., on November 28, 1961, the following motion was adopted: "That our bishop appoint a committee to make a study of In-Service Training needs of our ministers and make a report to the forthcoming Annual Conference."

In accordance with this motion, Bishop Garber, on January 8, 1962, named the following to serve on this committee: Dwight L. Fouts, C. Wade Goldston, M. W. Lawrence, C. P. Morris, William K. Quick, Cecil W. Robbins, and Key W. Taylor. Mr. Taylor was asked to serve as convener.

The committee held its first meeting in Raleigh, March 30, 1962, at which time C. Wade Goldston was elected chairman; Key W. Taylor, vice-chairman; and W. K. Quick, secretary.

In an effort to discover the In-Service Training needs of the ministers of our Conference, the committee has held two exploratory meetings; and, in addition, through a subcommittee, has sought the counsel of Bishop Garber and his cabinet. Enough evidence has already been discovered to show that the need for in-service training for our ministers is great, and that perhaps the first beginning in meeting these needs should be made on the district level. However, the committee feels that its investigation is incomplete and that the subject is so important that further study should be made. Therefore, the committee presents to this Annual Conference the following resolution:

Be it resolved that our bishop appoint a permanent committee to continue the study of the in-service training needs of the ministers of our Conference, and that this permanent committee be empowered to take appropriate action, as soon as feasible, to set up a practical program of meeting these needs.

Be it also resolved that the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to make an emergency appropriation not to exceed \$1,500 for the work of this committee during the conference year 1962-63. Five hundred dollars of this amount is to be designated for the expenses of the committee, and the remaining \$1,000 for use in carrying out a practical program designed to meet some of the more urgent in-service training needs of the ministers of our conference.

us. The method of presentation in the Conference Treasurer's report differs from this report in the following schedules:

- Schedules H-1 and M-1 The results of these statements are not presented in this report.
- Schedule T The Conference Treasurer's statement states the securities at market value while this report states the securities at cost value.
- Schedule U The interfund investments are not eliminated as shown in Schedule 1 of this report.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, some features of which are referred to in the outline that follows on specific items.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Recorded cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges, as shown by the Treasurer's records, was confirmed directly with the pastors, and minor differences reported to us as of the date of this report were adjusted or satisfactorily explained.

Distribution of income from charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commissions on World Service and Finance for the 1961 and 1962 session of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorization from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and the various boards and funds were either inspected or, if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1961-62 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits in the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorization for the distribution of 1961-62 collections.

OPINION

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and related statement of income, expense or distribution and fund balance present fairly the financial position of M. J. Cowell, Treasurer, North Carolina Conference, SE. J., of the Methodist Church, at June 30, 1962, and the results of its operations for the 1961-62 Conference year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles of the Conference applied on a basis consistent with that of the previous year.
