Historical Statement

THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH (Southeastern Jurisdiction)

I Composition: The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church is composed of:

- (1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
- (2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
- (3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.

II Organization: The Organizing dates of the three former Conferences were as follows:

- (1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church, 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina
- (2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia
- (3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
4. Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all boards, commissions, and committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the *Discipline* directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.
7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.

8. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
10. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 47, page 219, 1964 *Discipline*.
11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS, MOTIONS, AMENDMENTS

1. All reports to be presented to the conference shall be sent to the conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Coordinating Council and published in the conference calendar.
2. All resolutions to be presented to the annual conference affecting the structure policy and function of any board or agency of the annual conference, shall be submitted in writing to the conference secretary with copies for all the delegates twenty-four hours prior to consideration by the annual conference, and not later than the second night session of the conference.
3. All motions presented to the annual conference, and amendments to any paper, shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the conference secretary at the time of presentation.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at last forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference

session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in triplicate, to the conference secretary.

3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made in written form provided by the conference secretary, and must be approved and signed by the district superintendent. Such substitute delegates may function only in the absence of the regular delegates.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
2. Charge and church treasurers shall make final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on or before the opening date of the annual conference, and each pastor shall complete and submit Table II to the conference statistician on or before the opening date of the annual conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastor's reports.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The conference claimants, the general boards, the publishing house, lay members of the conference boards, lay delegates to the Annual Conference, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other educational institutions as he may deem advisable. Six copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.75 each, or single copies by mail at \$2.00 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be eleven.
2. A district conference shall be held annually, in each district.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the district conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as *ex officio* members.
4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.
5. The district superintendent of each district shall be required to furnish to the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician, as early in the year as possible an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

6. Each district superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the district superintendent to the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
7. We call attention of the district superintendents to Paragraph 432 (1) 1964 *Discipline*, and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Monday, June 14, 1965

Words of Welcome: Bishop Garber presented Mr. S. T. Gaddy, a member of the Official Board of Edenton Street Methodist Church. Mr. Gaddy spoke words of welcome to the Conference. Bishop Garber responded with warm words of appreciation.

Greetings from the Governor of North Carolina: Bishop Garber asked T. M. Vick, Jr. to escort Governor and Mrs. Dan K. Moore to the pulpit. They were presented to the Conference by Bishop Garber. Mrs. Moore spoke briefly; and Governor Moore brought greetings on behalf of the State of North Carolina.

Introductions: Bishop Garber presented the following to the Conference: Carl J. Sanders of the Virginia Conference; J. M. Sells, Secretary of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, Atlanta, Georgia; and Ralph Jolly, President of Greensboro College.

Anniversary of the Board of Missions: The anniversary of the Board of Missions was observed. Upon request of Bishop Garber, Bishop W. Kenneth Goodson took the chair. T. M. Vick, Jr., president of the Board of Missions, was called on to lead in the presentation of the Program. The prayer was led by A. F. Fisher. The church choir sang the anthem, "Go Ye Into All the World" by York. The scripture lesson, Ephesians 3:8-21, was read by T. M. Vick, Jr.

Lester E. Griffith, Jr., Missionary to Algeria, preached to the Conference on the theme "Dynamic of Total Mission."

J. E. Garlington, Conference Missionary Secretary, spoke to the Conference. He also presented the report of the board. The report was adopted.

The Chair: Bishop Garber resumed the chair.

Committee on Publishing Interest: J. H. Waldrop, Jr. was called on to present information about the New Hymnal. Sam Brown, committee secretary, presented the report of the committee. The report was adopted.

Mr. A. R. White, manager of the Richmond branch of the Methodist Publishing House, was presented. He spoke briefly, then presented Bishop Garber with a check for the Conference in the amount of \$9,717.02 which represents dividends from the Publishing House.

Charter Fund: Bishop Garber announced the receipt of a check for \$100.00 from the General Board of Pensions to be applied to the Conference claimant fund.

Commission on Promotion and Cultivation: Bishop Garber called on James H. Bailey, Chairman of the Commission on Promotion and Culti-

vation, to lead in this emphasis. He presented the report of the Commission. It was adopted.

Announcements: R. L. Jerome, W. C. Wilson, and Bishop Garber made announcements.

Benediction: The benediction was given by Bishop Goodson.

SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION

Tuesday, June 15, 1965

At 8:15 the organist of Edenton Street Methodist Church presented an organ prelude, "Benedictus," by Rowley.

Conference Convened: The Conference convened at 8:30 a.m. with Bishop Paul N. Garber as the presiding officer.

Commission on Worship: Bishop Garber recognized R. T. Commander, Chairman of the Commission on Worship. He led the Conference in worship, using portions of the new hymnal. F. B. Joyner presented the report of the Commission and then moved its adoption. It was adopted. Hymn No. 12 (Sampler—The Methodist Hymnal), "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus," was sung.

The chairman presented Bishop W. Kenneth Goodson, who addressed the Conference on the theme, "Methodist Worship." His text was "What have we to do with Thee?"

Commission on World Service and Finance: Bishop Garber called on Bill Price, Chairman of the Commission, to lead during this emphasis. He presented the reports of the Commission. J. W. Lineberger, Sr. spoke to the report as it relates to The Methodist Home for Children. After speaking for ten minutes, the Conference granted an extension of time. T. M. Vick, Jr. offered an amendment relative to each commission or committee sharing equally in reduction of appropriation. The amendment was seconded. J. W. Page spoke against the amendment and asked J. W. Lineberger what is the cost per day for each child and how this figure compares with the cost in other homes for children across the state. He stated that it is higher at present. G. S. Eubank spoke. Bill Price spoke, stating that the Commission was only trying to appropriate the money that belongs to the Conference. P. D. Midgett, III asked Vick a question as to what constitutes preferred status. Vick answered by saying that certain items are preferred claims. W. A. Crow asked a question, "Where are Children's Home funds invested. Lineberger answered that they are invested through Wachovia Bank and Trust Company. The Vick amendment was adopted. R. W. Ponder moved that time be extended in presentation of report of Commission on World Service and Finance. The motion carried.

E. C. Crawford spoke concerning moving expenses and travel expenses as they relate to the local church. G. S. Eubank moved that General World Service be added to the preferred status. The motion carried. Jack Crum made amendment to World Service and Finance report that Long Range Planning Committee make a study regarding Conference support of the National Council of Churches. He spoke to the motion. O. L. Hathaway spoke against the amendment. The vote was taken, and the amendment was lost, the vote being 91 for and 182 against. W. D. Sabiston III moved that on page 112

of the Book of Reports that the first paragraph at the top of the page regarding purchase of an off-set duplicating machine, accessories and operator be deleted. The vote was taken and the amendment carried.

M. W. Lawrence moved that changes be made in moving expense figures as shown in Item 6, Section II of the Report as follows:

For each \$1,000 increase in salary, travel and utilities the moving fund is increased \$5.00. O. L. Hathaway and G. S. Eubank spoke against the Lawrence amendment. The vote was taken and the amendment was lost.

Announcement: W. C. Wilson made announcement concerning seating of families during the Memorial Service.

Introduction: Bishop Garber introduced J. Aubrey Hughes of the Virginia Conference.

Memorial Service: Bishop Garber read appropriate scripture selections after which the organist of Edenton Street Methodist Church presented the organ prelude, "Fairest Lord Jesus," by Schroeder. Hymn No. 77, "Praise My Soul The King of Heaven" was sung. The prayer was led by Paul Carruth. A solo, "Let Not Your Heart Be Troubled" was sung by Mr. Fred Duncan, Director of Music, Long Memorial Methodist Church, Roxboro.

The Bishop asked the question 39 (a): "What ministers have died during the year?" The Conference Secretary read the list as follows: Kirby Formy Duval, Charles Robert Olson, Robert Samuel Bryan, Joseph Paul Bartak, Charles T. Thrift, Sr., Edgar Lafayette Hillman, William Albert Cade, Sr., Russell L. Dicks, Leslie Leamon Parrish, Franklin Swindell Love.

The Bishop then asked the question: "What ministers' wives have died during the year?" The Conference Secretary read the list as follows: Mrs. I. L. Smith, Mrs. B. B. Slaughter, Mrs. B. M. Williams, Mrs. D. M. Sharpe, Mrs. C. L. Read, Mrs. J. C. Wooten, Mrs. D. N. Caviness, Mrs. J. L. Cuninggim, Mrs. George B. Starling. The name of Mrs. W. W. Peele added later.

C. W. Robbins gave the Memorial address using the theme, "The Name They Left Behind." The Conference joined in singing Hymn No. 73, "Be Still My Soul." The benediction was given by Troy Barrett.

Anniversary of Board of Evangelism: Bishop Garber requested Paul C. Browning, President of the Board of Evangelism, to lead in the anniversary observance. Hymn No. 227, "Come Ye That Love The Lord" was sung, after which Kimsey King offered the prayer.

Announcement: J. V. Early made an announcement calling for a meeting of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

The report of the Board of Evangelism was presented by C. Alison Simonton, secretary of the Board. The secretary moved the adoption of the report. C. W. Goldston spoke to the Conference expressing appreciation for services of Tommy Tyson, Conference evangelist. Solos, "O Speak to Me" by Carmichael and "The Saviour Is Waiting" by Chopin, were sung by Robert Gibbons.

C. F. Heath introduced Dr. Kermit Long, General Secretary, Board of Evangelism, Nashville, Tennessee, to the Conference. Dr. Long then addressed the Conference on the topic, "I Have Seen The Lord."

North Carolina Council of Churches: Bishop Garber presented Dr. Samuel Wiley, Executive Director, North Carolina Council of Churches, to the Conference. He spoke to the Conference concerning the work of the Council.

Announcements: L. C. Vereen made announcements.

Benediction: R. G. Dawson gave the benediction.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Tuesday, June 15, 1965

At 2:00 the organist of the host church presented fifteen minutes of organ music: "Sheep May Safely Graze" by Bach and "Praise God, Ye Christians" by Buxtehude.

Conference Brotherhood: The annual meeting of the Conference Brotherhood convened at 2:15 with K. R. Wheeler, president, presiding. Hymn No. 69, "How Gentle God Commands!" was sung, after which the president led in prayer. Norwood L. Jones, secretary-treasurer, made the report of the Brotherhood, and then asked its adoption. O. L. Hathaway moved that the latter part of the second resolution, beginning with the word "For" be deleted. It was seconded, and approved. J. E. Smith asked for clarification, and moved that the last two sentences in the first resolution be amended to read: "For clarity, a member who, at the time of his death, has paid all calls due except for calls issued in the last forty days of his life, is considered paid up. Beneficiaries of members not thus paid up are not eligible to receive any benefit from this Brotherhood." It was seconded and carried. W. B. Cotton asked for explanation as to why \$7.00 assessment is maximum. The secretary stated that it was because of demand by many members. Cotton moved that the last sentence in the third paragraph—"The maximum payment per call shall be \$7.00," and that the last sentence in the fifth paragraph—"The maximum payment per call shall be \$7.00" be deleted. The motion was seconded. R. M. Gradeless spoke for the amendment. The amendment carried.

Conference Convened: The afternoon session convened at 2:50, with Bishop Garber in the chair.

Statement: Bishop Garber called on J. Nelson Gibson for a statement. He asked that greetings be sent to Mrs. W. W. Peele who is ill. It was approved by standing vote.

Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification:

Question 24: "Who have been admitted from other evangelical churches as traveling preachers?" was called. (Question 24 called previously.)

(a) As members on trial? Jesse Harold Parker

Anniversary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes: Bishop Garber asked Mr. Charles C. Boone to preside during the anniversary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. Hymn No. 250, "Rescue the Perishing," was sung. James E. Thompson led in prayer. J. W. Lineberger presented Mr. and Mrs. Al Goldfinch, and Mr. Roy Hayman who are new staff members at the Methodist Home for Children. A girl's chorus from the Home for Children sang a number. Bishop Ralph T. Alton of the Wisconsin Area addressed the Conference. J. F. Coble made announcement, inviting the Conference to attend the 10th anniversary of the Home on September 21. J. W. Lineberger made statement concerning trustees of the Methodist Home for Children.

J. L. Joyce, secretary of the Board, made the report for the Board. A. D. Byrd offered amendment to Report No. 3. He moved that Item 2 be deleted, and that in Item 3 "that each church whose pastor elects coverage to be apportioned an amount equal to one-half of the rate for the policy, and the various boards to contribute one-half of the amount of the policy for their ministerial employees." G. R. McKenzie spoke for the amendment. W. A. Seawell spoke against the amendment. Sam Brown spoke against the amendment. M. J. Cowell spoke words of clarification. Mr. Boone spoke on the question. Arnold Pope spoke for the amendment. R. G. Dawson asked some questions which Mr. Boone answered. H. B. Johnson, A. D. Byrd, R. W. Pritchard made statements. Roderick Randolph spoke against the deletion of Item 2. Malloy Owen spoke. H. B. Johnson moved that Items 1-4 of Report No. 3 be referred to the Board of Hospitals and Homes for further study and that the board report findings to the 1966 session of the Annual Conference. It was seconded.

The motion to refer was adopted. Action on the Byrd amendment was not considered necessary since the Johnson motion was carried.

W. K. Quick moved that Item 5 be deleted, and the following substituted. "We request the director of the chaplaincy program at Duke Medical Center and the Conference Committee on In-Service Training to initiate a series of seminars within the Conference on the role of the minister in the hospital situation as a refresher course for the parish minister." The motion was seconded and carried.

The report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes was adopted.

Board of Pensions: Bishop Garber presented Mr. C. W. Everett, President of the Board of Pensions. Dr. Edge Gamble of Evanston, Illinois spoke to the Conference concerning pension operations. Norwood L. Jones presented the report of the Board, and moved its adoption.

The Chair: Bishop Garber asked Bishop Alton to take the chair.

M. W. Lawrence asked question, and Norwood Jones, Board Secretary, answered.

C. P. Morris made statements concerning Group 4 and Group 5 in Section F. Jack Crum asked question. The report was adopted.

The Chair: Bishop Garber resumed the chair.

Methodist Building Committee: O. L. Hathaway presented report of the Methodist Building Committee, and moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Committee on Sustentation Fund: H. B. Johnson presented the report of the Committee on Sustentation Fund, and moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Committee on Methodist Information: W. K. Quick presented the report of the Committee on Methodist Information. He moved the adoption. It was adopted.

Committee on Conference Relations: H. B. Johnson presented report of the Committee on Conference Relations.

Question 42: "What ministerial members have been retired?" was asked.

(a) This year? Zeb V. Cowan, Dwight Lang Fouts, Cuyler Freeman Heath, Louie A. Lewis, Ralph H. Lewis, Atticus Morris Williams. (Question 42 was called again later.)

North Carolina Pastors School: L. C. Vereen presented report of the North Carolina Pastors School. It was adopted.

The Duke Endowment: Bishop Garber called attention to the report of The Duke Endowment.

J. M. Ormond Fund: Bishop Garber made statement relative to the J. M. Ormond Fund.

Bishop's Committee on Church Architecture: M. W. Lawrence presented the report of the Bishop's Committee on Church Architecture. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Committee on Annual Conference Corporations: Key W. Taylor presented the report of the Committee on Annual Conference Corporations. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Conference Calendar of Work: C. P. Morris made report of the Conference Calendar of Work.

Announcements: W. C. Wilson made announcements.

Benediction: The benediction was given by W. R. Stevens.

SECOND DAY, EVENING SESSION

Tuesday, June 15, 1965

At 7:15 the organist of Edenton Street Methodist Church presented the following prelude selections: "Praise to the Lord, the Father Almighty" by Walther; "Deck Thyself, My Soul, With Gladness" by Bach.

Opening: The evening session convened at 7:30 with Bishop Garber in the chair. The conference sang Hymn Number 162, "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing."

Higher Education: Bishop Garber presented James A. Auman, Executive Director of the Association of Methodist Colleges, who spoke to the conference concerning the progress of our colleges. A chart was shown to display churches which have paid their pledge to the college campaign in full.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented J. W. Sells, Executive Secretary of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, who spoke briefly to the conference.

Presentation: Bishop Garber recognized Bill Price for a presentation to the Conference. Mr. Price commended the Conference Secretary for having the missing condensed minutes of the North Carolina Conference from 1837-

1882 copied from the archives in the Methodist Publishing House in Nashville, Tennessee. These consist of three leather-bound volumes and are to be placed in the archives of the Secretary's office, Methodist Building, Raleigh, North Carolina. Bishop Garber accepted for the Conference the gift of these volumes by Mr. Price, and commended him for his generosity in paying the cost of copying and binding these volumes.

Methodist Foundation: John Dozier made the report of the Methodist Foundation. Dr. Olin Hunt spoke briefly to the conference concerning Gifts and Wills. Mr. Dozier moved the adoption. It was adopted.

In Service Training Committee: W. K. Quick presented the report of the In Service Training Committee, and then moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Methodist Ministers Credit Union: C. M. Mitchell presented the report of the Methodist Ministers' Credit Union. This report is for information and did not require adoption.

District Conference Records: T. R. Jenkins presented the report for the Committee on District Conference Records, and then moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Committee to Study the Work of Our Conference Boards, Commissions, Etc.: C. D. Barclift presented the report of the Committee to Study the Work of Our Conference Boards, Commissions, and other Agencies, and requested continuation of the study for another year. The report was adopted.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented M. Wilson Nesbitt, Director of Duke Foundation work in North Carolina.

Announcements: L. C. Vereen, Vernon Tyson, and W. C. Wilson made announcements.

Benediction: Key W. Taylor gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, MORNING SESSION

Wednesday, June 19, 1965

Beginning at 8:15, the organist of Edenton Street Methodist Church presented preludes: "Tocatta per 'Elevazione'" by Frescobaldi, and "Beloved Jesus" by Zechiel.

Opening: The Conference convened at 8:30 with Bishop Paul N. Garber in the chair. Hymn No. 12, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee," was sung. The morning prayer was led by J. Paul Edwards. Mrs. Jo Ann Moore sang a solo entitled, "The Lord Is My Shepherd," by Curran.

Bullock of the General Board of Education, Nashville, Tennessee, who addressed the Conference on the theme, "A New Day in Christian Teaching."

John Sutton presented a check for \$390.00 to Bishop Garber to be used in the camping program for Polish Methodist young people. This money was given by the Elementary campers at Camp Chestnut Ridge and Camp Don Lee during the summer of 1964.

H. S. Winberry, Secretary of the Board of Education, presented the report of the Board. He moved the adoption of Report No. 1. O. L. Hathaway asked question concerning offering on Christian Education Day. He moved that the word "recommendation" be substituted for the word "request." He also presented Section C, and moved its adoption. It was adopted. Section D was presented, and the secretary moved its adoption. It was adopted. The secretary presented Section E, and moved its adoption. It was adopted. Section F and Section G were presented and adopted.

The secretary of the Board presented Report No. II of the Board, and moved its adoption. It was adopted. The secretary presented an amendment to the charter of Methodist College, and asked its approval. It was approved. Report No. II, Section E was presented. It was adopted.

The entire report of the Board was adopted.

Announcement: W. C. Wilson made announcement concerning ordination service.

Anniversary of Commission on Town and Country Work: Bishop Garber called on R. W. Ponder, chairman of the Commission on Town and Country Work, to preside during the anniversary of this Commission. Hymn No. 20, "We Gather Together," was sung, after which W. N. McDonald read Psalm 8 and led in prayer. The chairman introduced Dr. Harold S. Huff, Director, Town and Country Work, National Division of Board of Missions, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, who addressed the Conference on the topic, "The Mission of the Church in Town and Country." The chairman announced that the following officers have been elected for the newly-organized Methodist Rural Fellowship: President, C. Wade Goldston; Vice-President, R. E. Walston; Secretary-Treasurer, Haywood Harrell. Charles E. Owens, Secretary of the Board, presented the report of the Board, and moved its adoption. It was adopted.

He then spoke to the Conference emphasizing the work of the campus ministry. Bishop Garber called attention to the report. J. W. Page asked question concerning ex officio members. J. M. Cline answered the question. The report was adopted.

Board of College Visitors: W. B. Petteway presented the report of College Visitors and moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification: J. V. Early presented the report of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. He moved its adoption. J. W. Lineberger, Jr. asked that accredited colleges be added to the colleges approved by the University Senate. The chairman accepted this recommendation. The report was adopted.

Announcement: W. C. Wilson made announcement concerning the ordination service.

Benediction: R. E. L. Moser gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, July 16, 1965

Prior to the opening of the afternoon session the organist of the local church used the following preludes: "Help, Lord, With Strength to Praise Thee" by Zechiel, and "The Faithful Shepherd" by Handel.

Opening: The Conference convened at 2:45 p.m. with Bishop Paul N. Garber in the chair.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented Mr. Dillard Teer, of Durham, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Retirement Home. He a building at the Home, and the tenth anniversary of the Home. J. F. Coble spoke briefly.

Anniversary of the Board of Christian Social Concerns: Ralph L. Fleming, president of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, guided the anniversary of the Board of Christian Social Concerns. Hymn No. 471, "We Bear the Strain," was sung, after which C. W. Robbins led in prayer. A solo, "Lord, Thou Hast Searched Me Out," by Andrews, was sung by Mr. John Scott.

Bishop Garber presented Dean Robert S. Cushman, of the Duke Divinity School. Dean Cushman introduced Dr. and Mrs. Daniel C. Arichea, Jr., from the Philippines. Both have recently graduated from Duke Divinity School. Mr. Arichea was awarded the Ph.D. degree. Mrs. Arichea the M.R.E. degree. Dean Cushman then addressed the Conference.

E. M. Thompson, Jr., secretary of the Board, presented the report of the Board. The first section of the report was adopted. The second section was presented by the secretary, and he moved its adoption. Carl Calloway moved that the first sentence in paragraph 7 be deleted, and that it read "Local Church Commissions on Christian Social Concerns need to be alert to the activities and the charges of left-wing or right-wing extremist groups." The president of the Board accepted the motion by Calloway. This section was adopted. The third section was presented and adopted. The fourth section was presented by the secretary, who moved its adoption. W. M. Jeffries spoke to this part of the report.

The third section was reconsidered, and D. W. Charlton made an amendment as follows: "We wish to commend the Christian Action League of North Carolina to express our gratitude to Rev. D. P. McFarland, director of the Christian Action League, and his associates, for their leadership and constructive educational approach to the alcohol problem. We desire to thank them particularly for their teaching program with the youth in our public schools and churches.

Furthermore, we urge the Commission on Social Concerns to continue to cooperate with the Christian Action League, and to study ways and means for a closer and more effective relationship with the above agency."

The third section as amended was adopted. Rev. D. P. McFarland, director of the Christian Action League, was introduced to the Conference.

The fourth section was resumed. G. W. Blount spoke. W. M. Jeffries offered an amendment to this fourth section as follows: "We are deeply concerned about our country's military involvement in Viet Nam, which amounts to unilateral intervention in what is essentially a civil war. We became involved there because of our readiness to support an oppressive dictatorship rather than sympathize with a revolution we feared might not be 'safe' against communism.

"As our support for the *status quo* was soon more and more to be losing ground, we have launched upon a course of escalating the war—a course which we fear is a one-way street to nuclear annihilation of the race.

"Our protestations of willingness to negotiate seem inadequate indeed

when we announce that we will not negotiate with the very guerrilla forces with which we are fighting.

"We call upon our government to seek a cease-fire and a negotiated arrangement for a neutral coalition government in Viet Nam, with independence, unity, and neutrality guaranteed by international peace-keeping presence and machinery.

"We commend the President for proposing economic aid to Southeast Asia. We urge him to undertake conciliatory steps which can be done toward a peaceful settlement on unilateral initiative—including cessation of air attacks in the North."

C. S. Hubbard spoke in opposition to the Jeffries amendment. Judge Hubert E. May spoke, and moved that this conference go on record as endorsing the policies of our government in respect to Viet Nam and express our confidence in the leadership of President Johnson.

C. L. Warren spoke against the motion. Amos Stone spoke for the substitute motion. E. L. Earnhardt spoke in opposition to the resolution and to the amendment. M. Carr Gibson spoke. D. T. Goodwin spoke.

The Jeffries resolution and the May amendment were withdrawn. The fourth section was approved.

The fifth section was presented by the secretary. It was seconded and adopted. The entire report was adopted.

Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations: Bishop Garber called on D. S. Coltrane, chairman, to present the report of the Commission, with the following amendment: "On page 68 of the report delete all of Recommendation Number 2 and substitute in lieu thereof the following: 'We recommend that we keep faith with the General Conference and the Southeastern Jurisdiction by supporting the plan of action for the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction, as adopted by the General Conference of 1964, and especially by voting at this conference to issue an invitation to the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, lying within the bounds of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, which represents step number one of the 'Plan of Action' adopted by the General Conference in 1964.'" He then moved the adoption of the report. The vote was taken and the results were 154 for and 19 against.

Committee on Conference Entertainment: W. M. Howard reported for the Committee on Conference Entertainment. The report was adopted.

Question 48: "Where will the next session of our conference be held?" was called. T. A. Collins, on behalf of North Carolina Wesleyan College and First Methodist Church of Rocky Mount, issued the invitation for the 1966 conference session to be held in Rocky Mount. H. G. Ruark spoke to the invitation. Henry Harris, lay delegate from First Methodist Church, Rocky Mount, spoke supporting the invitation. The conference accepted the invitation.

Minimum Salary Commission: R. S. Harrison presented the Minimum Salary Commission report. He moved its adoption. E. C. Crawford made an amendment as follows: "That the minimum salary for the Third and Fourth Year men be raised by \$100 for single, married, and married with children, beyond the amount set in the Conference Book of Reports."

M. W. Lawrence spoke against the Crawford amendment. O. L. Hathaway spoke against the amendment. E. C. Crawford spoke in support of his amendment. T. A. Collins spoke. The amendment was lost.

J. W. Linberger, Jr. moved "that the Annual Conference recommends that the Minimum Salary Commission include the removal of the distinction between student pastors and full-time pastors in the matter of minimum salary as a part of their study." It was approved.

Long-Range Planning Committee: W. J. Neese presented the report of the Long-Range Planning Committee, and moved its adoption.

Amendment: H. B. Lewis moved that: "Since the Methodist Church has been historically a leader in the ecumenical movement, and

"Since Methodists are now active in leadership positions in the National and World Councils of Churches, and

"Since appropriations for these Councils have been cut from the budgets of some of our Methodist churches in North Carolina because of attacks made upon these Councils;

"Be it therefore resolved:

"That during 1965-1966 the Long-Range Planning Committee be directed by this conference to make a study of these Councils and report to the 1966 session of this Conference, and,

"That this report be circulated for study in every church in the North Carolina Conference during the 1966-1967 conference year."

It was seconded and adopted.

Leo C. Thompson moved an amendment to the Long-Range Planning Committee: that Section 4 dealing with a full-time director of Methodist Information be deleted. It was seconded and passed.

W. M. Jeffries moved the deletion of Section 3, which proposed identification cards for ministers. The motion was adopted.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented Grady Carroll to the conference. He presented a copy of his recent book, *Francis Asbury in North Carolina*, to Bishop Garber.

Announcement: Bishop Garber made a statement concerning the evening service, beginning at 7:15.

Benediction: The benediction was given by W. C. Wilson.

THIRD DAY, EVENING SESSION

Wednesday, June 16, 1965

At 7:00 P.M. the organist of Edenton Street Methodist Church rendered the following preludes: "Ye Sons and Daughters of the Lord," by Willan; "But the Meek Shall Inherit the Earth," by Howells; and "Holy Spirit, Light Divine," Willan.

Conference Convened: The Conference convened at 7:15 with Bishop Paul N. Garber as the presiding officer.

Ordination Service: The ordination service was conducted by Bishop Paul N. Garber. Hymn No. 482, "Heralds of Christ," was used as a processional hymn. Roy L. Turnage led in the reading of the scripture and the prayer. The church choir sang the anthem, "The Omnipotence," by Schubert. The ordination sermon was preached by Bishop W. Kenneth Goodson of the Birmingham Area.

Opening: The Conference convened at 9:15, with Bishop Paul N. Garber in the chair.

Announcement: Bishop Garber announced the death of Mrs. W. W. Peele, who died on Wednesday, June 16, 1965. The funeral to be held at St. John's Church in Scotland County on June 18, at 4:00 p.m.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Bishop Garber presented Mrs. S. A. Dunn, Conference president, who brought greetings from the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Anniversary of the Historical Society: Bishop Garber presented Christian White, president of the Society, and requested him to lead the program.

The prayer was led by Kimsey King. The report of the Society was given by W. K. Quick. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Parsonage Standards Committee: Bishop Garber presented Mrs. J. H. Miller, Jr., who made the report of the Parsonage Standards Committee. It was approved.

Registration: J. A. Auman reported the registration for this session. Ministers, 578; Laymen, 323.

Nominations: M. W. Lawrence presented nominations.

Question 18: "What local churches have been (a) organized? (b) merged? (c) discontinued? (d) relocated and to what address? (e) transferred into this Conference from the Central Jurisdiction and with what membership?" was called. (See Question 18, condensed minutes, Section III.)

Question 44: "Who are left without appointment to attend school?" was called. (See Question 44, condensed minutes, Section III.)

Question 50: "What changes have been made in appointments since the last Annual Conference Session?" was called. (See Question 50, condensed minutes, Section III.)

Changes in Charge and District Boundaries: M. W. Lawrence presented changes in charge and district boundaries.

District Boards of Church Location and Building: M. W. Lawrence presented nominations on District Boards of Church Location and Building.

District Committees on Ministerial Qualifications: M. W. Lawrence presented nominations for District Committees on Ministerial Qualifications.

Moving Date: M. W. Lawrence announced that the moving date will be Thursday, June 24.

Offering for Janitors: An offering was taken for the janitors of Edenton Street Church.

Announcement: Bishop Garber announced that the 1966 session of the Annual Conference will be held in Rocky Mount, with North Carolina Wesleyan College and First Methodist Church as co-hosts. The date—June 13-16, 1966.

Resolutions and Courtesies: A. L. Fisher presented the report of the Committee on Resolutions and Courtesies. He moved that the resolution be spread upon the minutes of this Conference. It was approved.

Committee on Minutes: W. H. Kirby made the report for the Committee on Minutes. It was approved.

Announcement: L. C. Vereen made announcements.

Question 49: "Is there any other business?" was called. The answer was "none."

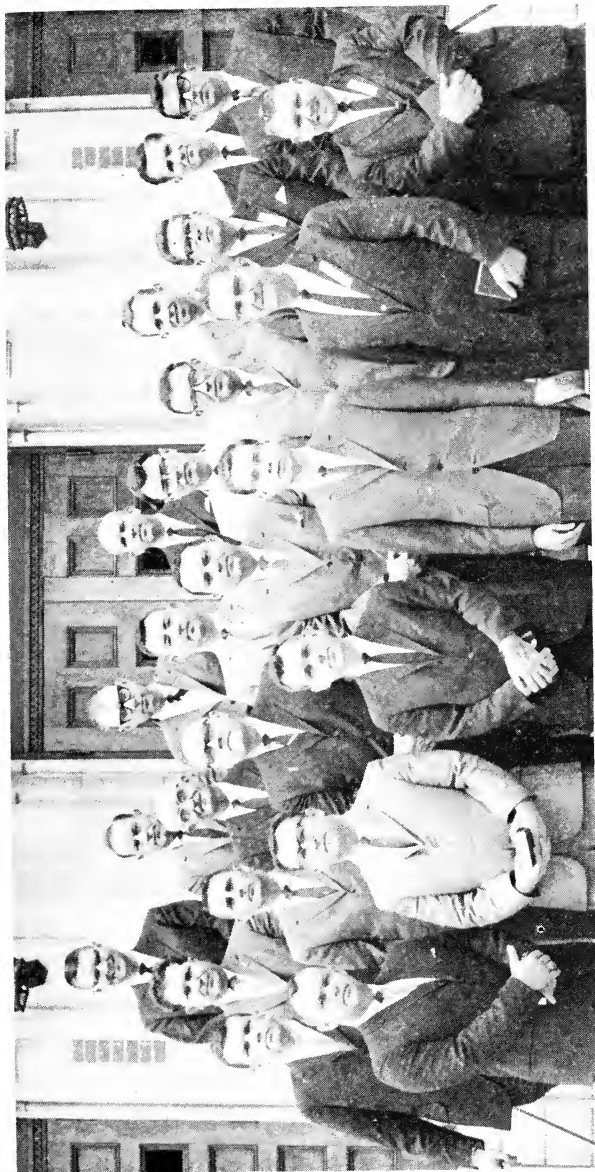

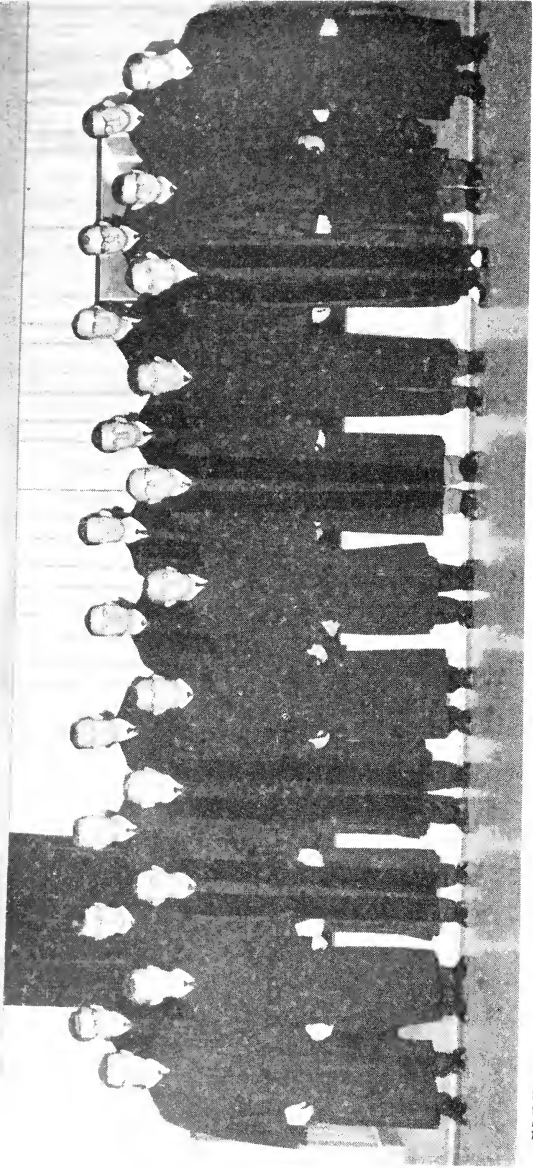

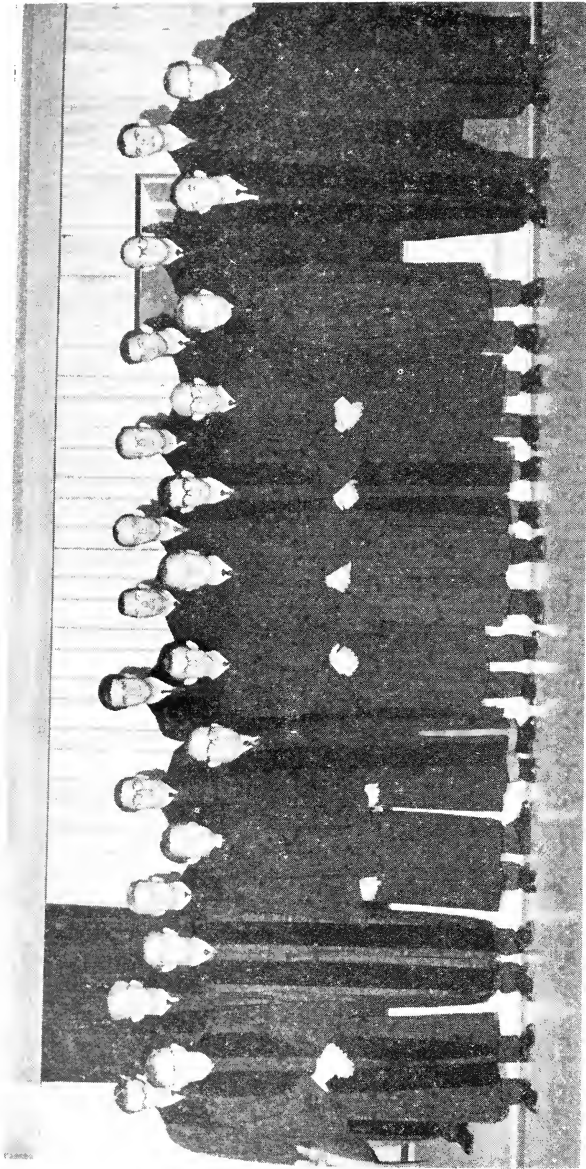

CHANGES IN CHARGE AND DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

Burlington District

Take the Bynum Church from the Bynum Charge (composed of Bynum, Mann's Chapel and Mt. Pleasant), and make Bynum Church a station.

Take Mann's Chapel and put it with Cedar Grove in Chatham County, and make Grove-Chapel Charge.

Take Mount Pleasant and make a station.

Durham District

Divide the Roxboro, Grace-Longhurst Charge and make two station charges: Roxboro: Grace, and Roxboro: Longhurst.

Elizabeth City District

Take Perkins from the South Camden Circuit and combine it with Brite Meadows to form the Perkins-Brite Meadows Charge. The South Camden Charge will be composed of two churches: Camden and Wesley.

Fayetteville District

Take Cotton from the Hope Mills-Cotton Charge, making each a station.

Take Branch Street and place it with the Sandy Plains Circuit.

Take Collins Chapel from the Collins-Philadelphus Charge and place it with Prospect, making it a church on the Prospect Charge.

Take Hickory Grove from the Sandy Plains Circuit and place it with Philadelphus, making it the Philadelphus-Hickory Grove Charge.

Goldsboro District

Take Unity from the Duplin Charge (Wilmington District) and place with the Turkey-Friendship Charge, forming the Turkey Charge which will be a three point circuit.

Take Kenansville from the Duplin Charge (Wilmington District) and place with Woodland, forming the Kenansville-Woodland Charge and dissolving the Duplin Charge.

Take Garris Chapel from the Garris-Walker Memorial Charge and place with Airboro, forming a two-point work known as Airboro-Garris Chapel Charge.

Take Walker Memorial from the Garris-Walker Memorial Charge and place with Ebenezer-Westwood, forming a three-point work to be known as Wayne Circuit, composed of Ebenezer, Walker Memorial, and Westwood. The Garris-Walker Memorial Charge is dissolved.

Transfer the Sarecta Charge from the Wilmington District to the Goldsboro District.

Transfer the Garland Charge from the Goldsboro District to the Wilmington District.

Greenville District

Unite St. Mark and St. John churches of Kinston and create a new two-point charge and call the charge St. Mark-St. John.

Transfer the Lane's Chapel-Bethany Charge from the New Bern District into the Greenville District.

New Bern District

Take Riverdale from the Bridgeton Charge and make it a station. The Bridgeton Charge then becomes a two-point work composed of the Bridgeton and Reelsboro churches.

Transfer Lane's Chapel-Bethany Charge from the New Bern District into the Greenville District.

Raleigh District

Divide the Hollands-Mt. Zion Charge making Holland Station and Mt. Zion Station. Change the name of Garner: Southside, to Garner: St. Andrews.

Rocky Mount District

Take Stanhope Church from the Sandy Cross Charge and place it with Middlesex, making Middlesex a two-point charge and Sandy Cross a two-point charge.

Sanford District

Take Central Church from the Caledonia Charge and Johns Church from the Caledonia Charge, and form a new charge to be called Central-Johns. This leaves Caledonia Charge a station.

Authorize the organization of a new charge in Laurinburg, to be called Collegiate.

Wilmington District

Take Magnolia from Duplin Circuit. Take Charity and Providence from Harrell's and form the Magnolia Circuit (three points): Magnolia, Charity and Providence.

Take Westview (a new church) and put with Harrell's, making Harrell's a two-point circuit.

Take Kenansville and Unity off Duplin Circuit, and the Sarecta Circuit, and transfer them into the Goldsboro District.

Transfer Garland Circuit from the Goldsboro District into the Wilmington District.

Take Weyman from the Bolton Circuit and put with Wesley at Riegelwood, and form the Riegelwood Circuit, making Bolton a two-point circuit.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

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KIRBY FORMY DUVAL

1884—1964

Kirby Formy Duval was born in Brunswick County, North Carolina, December 26, 1884. He was the son of William Formy Duval and Alice Gord Duval.

He was granted a local license to preach early in life and was ordained a local deacon in The Methodist Church in 1908, one year before he joined the North Carolina Conference in 1909, which met in Raleigh, North Carolina. He remained active for forty years, retiring in 1949. After his retirement he moved to Durham, N. C., where he lived until he died August 1, 1964.



Brother Duval served the following appointments in the North Carolina Conference: Branson, Durham; Columbia; LaGrange; Goldsboro Circuit; Trenton; Fuquay Springs; Kittrell; Fremont; Creedmoor; Plymouth; Ellerbe; Parkton; Roberdel; Bynum; Cedar Grove; and Siler City Circuit. In these sixteen charges Brother Duval has a record of serving as many rural churches as almost any man in the North Carolina Conference. He was truly a great "circuit-rider," and a beloved minister among the people. He loved his people and spent most of his time going into their homes. He bore the mark of a great man of God on his visits among the well and the sick.

He married Miss Annie Thomas of Durham, North Carolina, January 12, 1910, and to this union two girls were born, Dorothy, who married J. Glenn Reaves, and Julia, who married Elvin Aiken. The four grandchildren are Robert K. Reaves, Edna Earl Reaves, Lynn E. Aiken and Lisa Aiken.

Dorothy and Mr. Reaves live in Arlington, Va., and Julia and Mr. Aiken live in Creedmoor.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Annie Duval, and two daughters, Mrs. Reaves and Mrs. Aiken.

Funeral services were conducted at the Asbury Methodist Church in Durham, August 3, 1964, by the Rev. Sidney Boone, pastor of the church, and Rev. W. G. Farrar. Interment was in the New Maplewood Cemetery, where he awaits the final call to come again to mingle with those he loved and served for a while.

Words of scriptures take added meaning when we find them embodied in the life of one of God's chosen servants. My thoughts turn to the life of this devoted servant and friend. He was a good man and, like the words in one of Charles Wesley's hymns: "I want the witness Lord, that all I do is right, according to Thy will and work, well pleasing in Thy sight." I think many of his prayers were: "Teach me Thy way, O Lord, and lead me in a plain path."—Psalm 27:11.

Another hymn, found in the Methodist Hymnal, expressed to me the full nature and feeling of Kirby F. Duval, from the conversations he had with me about himself and his dreams. How happy he was when he dreamed that the Lord was still using him in great revivals, when men and women were accepting Christ as their Savior. Brother Duval believed in the changed life when people were born again and became sons and daughters of the Most High. The writer of this hymn has expressed Kirby Duval's wish:

"My times are in Thy hand, my God, I wish them there;
My life, my friends, my soul I leave entirely to Thy care."

CHARLES ROBERT OLSON

1893—1964

Charles Robert Olson was born January 7, 1893, in Chicago, Illinois. He was reared by Lutheran parents in a devout Christian family and worked for several years in his father's dairy there. His major occupation in life was a truck dispatcher for Brooks' Laundry, which he served in Chicago for 36 years. During

most of his life he served his Christ in the Lutheran Church in Maywood, Illinois, where he was a youth counselor for 16 years, Sunday school superintendent for 25 years, and a member of the Church Council, the equivalent of our Methodist Official Board, for many years.

Brother Olson was married in 1916 to Helen Ostlie, who passed away after a long illness in 1953. Of that marriage came three children. Dr. Robert Olson is a professor at Lamar Technical College, Beaumont, Texas. Arthur Olson is a professor in the high school at Benld, Illinois. Daughter Ethel passed away in 1956. In 1954 he married Hattie Diercks and she added her daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Beasley, to the Olson family.

In August of 1956 Charlie, as he was known to his friends, retired from the laundry business and moved to Manteo, North Carolina, where he and his wife, Hattie,

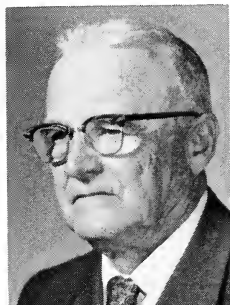
began to settle into the church and community. He was soon active in Mt. Olivet Methodist Church and joined that congregation in November, 1956.

Although retired from the business world, Charlie's Christian conscience would not let him rest and during the Lenten season of 1957, at age 64, he volunteered his services for the No Silent Pulpit program where he served with diligent success. After Easter he continued to fill vacant pulpits at the East Lake and Collington Churches. On December 5, 1957, he was examined by the Elizabeth City District Conference and granted license to preach. He then regularly assisted Brother A. L. G. Stephenson, pastor of the Dare Circuit, providing services every Sunday, continuing the No Silent Pulpit idea throughout the year.

In June of 1959 at the request of the North Carolina Conference he accepted the appointment as supply pastor of the Dare Charge. During the three years he served this charge the parsonage at Stumpy Point was renovated and the Stumpy Point Church brought out of debt. In June, 1962, he was appointed to the Mann's Harbor Charge and in the following two years a new education building was completed and paid for by the Mann's Harbor Church. In appreciation of his leadership an altar table and a baptismal font were given to the church in his honor. Since his passing the education building has been dedicated to his memory.

In the finest tradition of the Methodist lay preacher Charlie came into the autumn of his life with a vast knowledge of churchmanship and a personal companionship with the Lord Jesus Christ. He never could feel his discipleship was completed. Even in retirement from secular work he felt called to become one of God's spokesmen, and in response to that call he gave himself tirelessly to his ministry. He always held to the larger view of the church, believing there was much yet to be done with too few willing to do it. He was a Christian optimist, believing that a man ought to give that last full measure of devotion to his Lord with a smile and a cheerful word. His byword to his closest friends was, "Cheer up, nothing's going to work out right;" but those who knew him always understood that he had the faith to believe that all things done to the glory of God do work out right.

Brother Olson passed through the valley of the shadow into everlasting life on August 15, 1964, in Manteo, N. C. Final services were conducted August 17, 1964, by the Reverend Harold Leatherman, assisted by the Reverend Herman Wineberry and the Reverend J. J. Grimes, at Mt. Carmel Methodist Church, Mann's Harbor, N. C., and his body



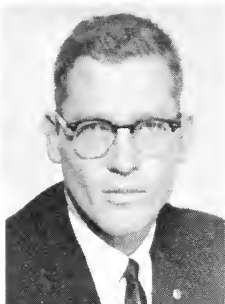
was put in its resting place in the yard of that church which he loved so well. No more fitting final word could be said than that regular last line Charlie used with most of his prayers when he would say, "And when thou art through with us here, take us unto Thyself in heaven."

ROBERT SAMUEL BRYAN

1929—1964

Robert Samuel Bryan was born to Mr. and Mrs. William H. Bryan on November 17, 1929, in Henderson, North Carolina. He received his education in the public schools of Ahoskie, North Carolina, and in the Ahoskie Methodist Church of which he became a member on the 6th of April, 1941. Bob was active in his church and school and was an Eagle Scout. He graduated from Ahoskie High School in 1947 before entering Randolph Macon Academy. He was graduated from Wake Forest College in 1953. Bob was married in 1952 to Dorothy Miller of Ahoskie. They have two children: Kenneth Sherrin, born September 22, 1953, and Gregory Samuel, born March 8, 1959.



Following his graduation from Wake Forest, Bob returned to Ahoskie where he worked between 1953 and 1961 with his father in training for the Gulf Oil distributorship. During this period of time he avidly pursued his avocation of flying. His interests also grew in the area of community service. He was president of the Ahoskie Junior Chamber of Commerce, state vice-president in 1960, and national director for North Carolina in 1961. During this period of wide association with people from many walks of life, Bob searched his own heart and he

began to hear a clear call to the ministry. Close counsel with his family, pastor and many friends helped him to make a decision. In October of 1962 he became the first person in recent years to be licensed to preach from the Ahoskie Methodist Church. He had already enrolled in the Divinity School of Duke University. He was admitted on trial to the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church and ordained a deacon at Greenville in 1963.

While in the divinity school, Bob served as associate pastor at St. Paul's Methodist Church in Durham and at West Burlington Methodist Church in Burlington. He was working in the summer program of the Duke Endowment at the Methodist Church in Maxton when the private plane that he was piloting suffered engine failure and crashed on August 19, 1964. He was mortally injured and died in North Carolina Memorial Hospital in Chapel Hill on August 28th. Memorial services were conducted in the Ahoskie Methodist Church on August 31st by the Reverend Kimsey King, pastor, the Reverend R. E. Walston, pastor of the Elm City Methodist Church, and the Reverend Stan Bell, Presbyterian minister of Laurinburg. Interment was in the Ahoskie Cemetery, Ahoskie, North Carolina.

To Bob Bryan the church was an incomparable joy in the fellowship of the people of God. He lived his short life as if each day were a privilege to be filled with unsearchable riches of his Savior. So he lived the much-prized, child-like faith with joy and enthusiasm. Because of his love of life and people, he packed an incredible number of things into his brief years. As a layman, he accepted people as they were and invited them to go with him as he painted the Christian life with a big brush. He lived the life with such grateful abandon that he was of constant joy and help to his church. Bob was never bitter nor cynical. He opened himself completely to the leading of Christ.

While a member of the Ahoskie Junior Chamber of Commerce he began to think deeply about the first line of that organization's creed, "*We believe that faith in God gives*

meaning and purpose to human life . . ." and so began the first inner whisperings of his call to the ministry of the church of Christ. His relationship to society became more expansive as he felt the moving call of God to witness in all walks of life. Nothing was too big to dare for God, nothing too small to be of service to his fellow man. The people with whom he worked thought of him as a living Christian and said that of all the people they had ever known, he was the most willing.

With the backing of his wife, children and parents, Bob gave up his work in Aoshkie and moved to Durham to return to school and so prepare himself for full-time Christian service. The foreign field was his first love and had long been his primary choice, but he felt it best to further prepare himself with the best education he could obtain. Although this was a period of his life fraught with problems and no little suffering, Bob did not give in to depression and self-pity but remained cheerful, open and optimistic. His days in school were not a time of retreat but of advance. He served in churches, organized missionary enterprises and gave wise and practical counsel to many of his fellow students. In a prayer offered at a memorial service in York Chapel of the Divinity School in September, 1964, Dr. O. K. Ingram, one of his professors and friends, used these words: "May we feel gratitude: for the inspiration of that in him which was good; for his capacity for friendship; for his gentleness and understanding of the weak and broken in spirit; for his unfailing acceptance of those who came to him in distress and those undone by their own foibles and foolishness; and for his untiring love of fellowship and his radiant good humor."

On a beautiful August afternoon near the end of a successful summer's work, Bob climbed into the cockpit of a two-seat private plane to share the joy of a quiet afternoon flight with a friend. This was as he had done hundreds of times before, for Bob was an accomplished pilot. It was to be his last flight. Just as the plane nosed into the clouds, one of the imponderables of life occurred. The engine failed.

One could wonder what "might have been" had Bob given up flying, yet such a thought would have been ridiculous to Bob. For to him flying was as elemental as breathing and sleeping. His close friends would not have thought of him as a mystic, but his impulse to fly derived from a desire to get closer to the purity, peace and serenity of creation itself.

Bob's last few days in the hospital at Chapel Hill involved pain and the knowledge of imminent death; yet he retained an optimistic outlook, a friendly manner and wise words until the moment came for which all else is preparation. He would have agreed with the young American flyer by the name of Magee who wrote these words shortly before his death:

Oh! I have slipped the surly bonds of earth
 And danced the skies on laughter-silvered wings;
 Sunward I've climbed, and joined the tumbling main
 Of sun-split clouds — and done a hundred things
 You have not dreamed of — wheeled and soared and swung
 High in the sunlit silence. Hov'ring there,
 I've chased the shouting wind along, and flung
 My eager craft through footless halls of air.

Up, up the long, delirious, burning blue
 I've topped the wind-swept heights with easy grace
 Where never lark, or even eagle flew—
 And, while with silent lifting mind I've trod
 The high untrespassed sanctity of space,
 Put out my hand and touched the face of God.

JOSEPH PAUL BARTAK

1887—1964

Christmas Day 1963 was the 75th birthday of one of the first leading workers of the Methodist Church in Czechoslovakia, superintendent in retirement, Brother J. P. Bartak.

In the course of his long service he held many different positions in the church, among them: pastor, district superintendent, director of the Central Offices in Prague, chairman of the Society for the Care of Orphans, head editor of the church monthly *Krestansky buditel* (*Christian Advocate*). He was also secretary of the Council of Evangelical Churches in Czechoslovakia, often a delegate to Central and General Conferences of the Methodist Church at home and abroad, and a member of many other church boards.



He was blessed by extraordinary ability for these varied tasks and displayed keen powers of observation and discernment. He was diligent as well as industrious. His straightforward character, sincerity of action, understanding of human nature, and his education earned for him respect and trust, not only within the church but from anyone with whom he came in contact. Dr. Bartak always tried to do his best with the talents God entrusted to his care.

Joseph Paul Bartak first saw the light of day in a simple room of a small mountain mill in Sedlonov, near Nove Mesto nad Metuji, in the northeastern part of Bohemia, which is the westernmost province of Czechoslovakia. He was born on December 25, 1887, to a poor miller named Antonin Bartak and his wife Helen, who read the Bible faithfully. The Bartak family lacked in earthly possessions, but were richly blessed with a deep sense of spiritual devotion. Theirs was a home where the gospel was the law, and the fear of God and an unshakeable faith in Jesus Christ were the highest treasures one could possess. This deep-seated personal faith and belief in God as a source of all life in the Bartak family came from the stepfather of Antonin Bartak, Jan Balcar, who was the spiritual leader of the Free Protestants in eastern Bohemia.

Then Joseph's father died. His widowed mother with six children left the mill to seek livelihood in the city. Her life's path eventually brought her all the way across the ocean to the United States where she joined a daughter and son-in-law, Rev. Vaclay Cejnar, who also made it possible for young Joseph Bartak to enroll at Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas. After five years of hard study including prep school, Joseph graduated as a Bachelor of Arts. Next he attended Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn., where after two years he obtained the degree of Bachelor of Divinity. During the war years 1914-1920 the Reverend Mr. Bartak served as pastor of the Bethlehem Church in Chicago, Ill., while studying at the same time for his Master of Arts degree. Later, Southwestern University of Texas granted him an honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity for his outstanding work on the mission field and for his literary activity.

After the First World War when the Methodist Church started missionary work in Czechoslovakia, Dr. Bartak returned to his native land to help build the Methodist Church there.

Upon his arrival in Prague, Czechoslovakia in 1921, Rev. Bartak was met at the station by several members of the mission staff, among them his future wife, Marian Polk Draper of Springfield, Tennessee, a secretary and youth worker.

In the 1930's he was made superintendent of the Methodist Mission in Czechoslovakia, and when Hitler's Nazi forces threatened the country, he elected to remain to continue the mission work there, although he sent his wife and three children to be with relatives in Texas for their safety. After the Uniting Conference in Kansas City he again returned to Prague in 1940 in spite of the personal danger involved under the Nazi regime there and continued to serve, until he was suddenly arrested in December 1941 by the Gestapo and was interned in an internment camp in Austria. In the summer of 1942 he was finally exchanged for German POW's and returned to the United States

where he spent the remainder of the war years traveling and speaking across the southern part of the country, drawing attention to the suffering of people under the Nazis and the need of renewed efforts of missions in those countries as soon as the war would be over.

In 1944 he was called to be pastor of the First Bohemian Methodist Church in Chicago, Ill., but a sudden illness and ensuing back operation in January 1945 disabled him briefly, so that he had to learn to walk again, this time with a cane. But in spite of this handicap he was again ready when the mission field in Czechoslovakia opened up later that year to return to his job there, to remain until 1950 when again the Communist regime began to pose restrictions for any Americans in church capacities. The Methodist Church began to be especially persecuted, like the Baptist Church there which had several of its pastors imprisoned as "agents of a foreign government," it began to be called a "foreign church," so that it was time for local citizens to take over or see the wonderful Christian work of many years be destroyed completely. Bishop Paul N. Garber then called Mr. Bartak to the mission work in Vienna, Austria, where there was one Czech congregation without a pastor and where he also served as treasurer. Since some of his early schooling had been in German under the old Austro-Hungarian Empire, Mr. Bartak found it quite easy to conduct services on Sunday in German, in Czech for the small minority, and also in English for members of the American-occupational forces.

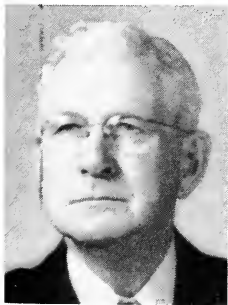
The year 1952 was spent on furlough in the United States and at the General Conference, and in part with his family in Durham, North Carolina, where he became a member of the North Carolina Conference, and again spoke widely. Mrs. Bartak accompanied him on his return trip to Austria in 1953 and died there in August of that year. Saddened, but still with the same perseverance Mr. Bartak continued his work in Austria until 1958, when age and rheumatism caused him to retire and come to live with his daughter in Savannah, Ga. Many letters and cards have come to him here each year from all over the world, from people whose lives he had somehow influenced for Christ. His humble spirit is shown by the epitaph which he chose for his wife's tombstone, "The Lord has done great things for us."

During the remaining months of his life, following an acute attack of pneumonia, he was confined to his bed. Upon the advice of the family doctor he was placed in the Methodist Nursing Center, Americus, Ga. His death occurred on September 30, 1964, and he was laid to rest by the side of his wife and mother in Shiner, Texas.

CHARLES TINSLEY THRIFT 1879—1964

The Reverend Charles Tinsley Thrift, son of Henry Lee Thrift and Laura Alice (Sutton) Thrift, was born at Oldhams, Westmoreland County, in the northern neck of Virginia on July 11, 1879, and passed away in Durham, North Carolina, on September 30, 1964, in his eighty-sixth year. Following an impressive funeral service in Branson Memorial Methodist Church, Durham (which Mr. Thrift had served from 1930 to 1934 as pastor), conducted by the pastor, the Reverend Matt R. Gardner, and the Reverend Leon M. Hall, associate pastor of Trinity Methodist Church, Durham, he was buried in Maplewood Cemetery, Durham, on October 1, 1964.



Surviving are his widow, the former Nell Webb of Kenbridge, Virginia, to whom he was married in 1910; two daughters, Susie Webb Thrift of Durham, and Laura Nell (Mrs. John W. Strutt of South Brent, Devon, England); a son, Charles Tinsley Thrift, Jr., a member of the Florida Conference and since 1957 president of Florida Southern College at Lakeland, Florida; a brother, H. H. Thrift of Wicomico Church, Virginia; three granddaughters; two nieces, and one nephew.

Mr. Thrift attended public schools and Farnham

Academy in his native Northern Neck. He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Randolph-Macon College in Ashland, Virginia, in 1902. While at Randolph-Macon he was especially distinguished for his scholarship, oratory, and achievements in debate. At the time of his graduation he was awarded the Bennett Historical Medal for achievements in the field of history, the orator's medal of the Washington Literary Society, recognition as the ablest debater in the college, and the runner-up position for the Walton Prize in Greek. The Bachelor of Divinity degree was awarded him in 1905 by Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee, where he was the runner-up for the Founder's Medal in Oratory.

In 1905 Mr. Thrift was received on trial into the Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and assigned to Clarksville. He was appointed to Kenbridge and Victoria in 1907, and there in Lunenburg County under his leadership, two church buildings were erected, one of these being called "Thrift's Chapel" by its members. Retaining the name to this day, the church has continued to serve as a part of Virginia Methodism for nearly sixty years, one of its members serving as a member of the last several General Conferences of The Methodist Church. In addition he served the following places in Virginia: Bowling Green, Richmond (West End Church), Louisa, and Danville (Calvary Church).

Transferring to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1919, Mr. Thrift served the following appointments: Graham-Haw River, Clayton, Farmville, Moyock, Rosemary, Durham (Branson Memorial Church), Parkton, Plymouth, Halifax, Warsaw, Ellerbe, and Elm City. Following retirement in 1948 after more than forty-three years of service, he and his wife made their home in Durham. The years in Moyock had been marked by leadership in the erection of the Memorial Methodist Church at Currituck, the scene of the first Methodist sermon preached in North Carolina on September 28, 1772, by the Reverend Joseph Pilmoor, one of John Wesley's missionaries to America.

Preaching (sometimes three or more times a day) and the parish ministry were Mr. Thrift's first loves. Until almost the end of his active years, he held his own evangelistic services and, in addition, frequently preached for his brethren in their services. "The Greatness of Christ" was the predominant theme of his preaching for the past two score years or more. The hymn "How Great Thou Art" expressed his feeling perfectly. Whenever he served, he was also noted for his program of visitation among the members of the congregation.

Extensive publications attest to Mr. Thrift's literary ability. In an early pastorate he served as editor of a weekly newspaper, the *Lunenburg Times*, and throughout his ministry he produced many parish papers. One of these papers, *The Sandhills Advocate*, was quite unusual, ultimately reaching forty pages in size and attaining a circulation of 2,500. Baptism was one of the subjects dealt with extensively. One publication, *Why John the Baptist Sprinkled the Multitudes at the River Jordan*, attained a circulation of more than one hundred thousand copies. Other publications included *The Model Church*, *A Modern Scholar*, *The Possibility of Falling from Grace*, *The Mode of New Testament Baptism*, *The Baptism of the Holy Spirit*, *The Conditions of Successful Praying*, *Robert Paine—Methodist Bishop*, *So You Don't Believe in Foreign Missions*, *Salvation*, *Poems and Hymns*, *Why Christ Was Baptized in Infancy*, and *Are Methodists Willing to Face the Facts?* Just as had been most of the active years, his years of retirement were productive literary ones also, with the writing and distribution of many volumes.

Mr. Thrift produced his largest and most significant literary work, *The Romance of the Gospel* (Piedmont Press, 1934, 307 pages), while serving as pastor of Branson Memorial Church, Durham. This volume was widely acclaimed by its reviewers and it attained an extensive circulation. Of the volume the author wrote in his Foreword that the primary objective was "to try to stimulate interest in the great aim of the gospel, namely, the complete evangelization of the world." He continued: "Missions constitute the supreme work of the Christian church. The gospel is nothing if not missionary . . . It seems incredible that any professional follower of Jesus Christ can know of the romance of the gospel and be indifferent to the cause of missions." The book was dedicated to the task of helping to make a better informed church, and of it Bishop Paul N.

Garber, then the registrar of the School of Religion of Duke University, wrote: "I hope that your book, *The Romance of the Gospel*, may have a wide circulation. It should be read by both clergymen and laymen. You deserve congratulations and thanks for furnishing the public with such a scholarly and interesting volume." Dean Wilbur F. Tillett of the School of Religion of Vanderbilt University, wrote: "It is indeed a unique and interesting book. I do not know of any other volume that seeks to bring together such a variety of Biblical, geographical and biographical facts as he has brought together in this book. It is very readable."

Many men entered the ministry, directly and indirectly, under the ministry of Mr. Thrift. He came to regard his pastorate at Farmville as being the most fruitful in this respect. A great believer in the printed as well as the spoken word, he always worked to place the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* in each home in his congregation and in 1944 led an effort to try to get the Methodists of North Carolina to raise an endowment for the *Advocate*. As early as 1925 he advocated a larger number of bishops, a lay delegate from each charge in the Annual Conference, a minimum salary plan, and a revision in the manner of the allotment to the charges of the benevolent askings. While none of these suggestions were popular enough to secure adoption when first made, most of them have now been incorporated into the framework of The Methodist Church.

"The Morning Star" is one of the most popular of Mr. Thrift's poems. It has been used as a hymn, and the opening and closing stanzas, which follow, were read as a benediction and farewell at his funeral.

The morning star! The break of day!
The kindling east enchants my sight;
The stars grow dim and then go out,
While darkness flees from morning light.

Hail, Morning Star! Hail, Jesu Christ!
Thou Morning Star art Heaven's Sun!
Night's turned to day; dead's come to life!
My Pilot hail! The harbor's won!

EDGAR LAFAYETTE HILLMAN

1890—1964

The life of Edgar Lafayette Hillman is a remarkable one of achievement and service. The story begins in Neshoba County, Mississippi, with the family of George J. and Percy Henry Hillman into whose home a baby boy was born on August 22, 1890. The story will have no end.



Ed Hillman grew to manhood and entered Millsaps College from which he graduated and which in 1937 awarded him the degree of Doctor of Divinity (which was never more worthily bestowed). His education continued at Candler School of Theology and at Edinburgh, Scotland. After graduation he selected the North Carolina Annual Conference as the locale of his labors and service. His pastorates were Scotland Neck; Red Springs; Central, Raleigh; Jarvis Memorial, Greenville; Trinity, Durham; First, Rocky Mount; and Siler City. This service was interspersed with appointment as presiding elder or district superintendent on the New Bern, Wilmington, and Durham Districts. He also served an interim term on the Burlington District after his retirement. Many men in our conference, especially young men, remember his fatherly counsel and admonition.

His pastorates at Greenville and Rocky Mount were

long ones. His stay at Trinity Church was characterized by a renewal of faith and courage in the congregation. The Diamond Jubilee of the church was celebrated and the closing message was preached by the beloved pastor on "Trinity Faces the Future." He pictured a bright outlook which brought encouragement to a congregation ridden by debt in the midst of the economic disaster. He had led Jarvis Memorial in paying off a debt of long standing and he paved the way for the hour of deliverance for Trinity.

It was outside the pulpit that Ed Hillman did some of his finest work. He taught often in Leadership Education Schools and in Youth Assemblies. He was president of the North Carolina Council of Churches. He worked for the National Conference of Christians and Jews. He was a frequent preacher in college services and was a trustee of Greensboro College and the Methodist Home for Children at Raleigh. He was a delegate to General and Jurisdictional Conferences. He was a world traveler. He said the climax of his life came in 1962 when he was invited to come to Maehyang Girls' School in Suwon, Korea, to participate in evangelistic services. He preached and assisted in the baptism of hundreds of girls.

No appraisal of Ed Hillman's life would be complete without the support of his wife, Estelle Warlick Hillman, and their two children, Ed and Anne (Mrs. Raymond Luper). Family relationships were deep and strong; the whole group, including six grandchildren, were closely knit.

In 1959 the Hillmans returned to Durham for the third time, this time for retirement, and Trinity Church again became their church home. On Sunday morning their pew looked like a study in international good will with a foreign student or a visitor from India or Korea. He was active in teaching and working in church and assisting in communion. Best of all, his quiet, dignified presence was an inspiration to the preacher and the congregation. His honorable retirement was cut short, too short, with his passing on November 28, 1964. Between the date of his birth and his death, just as the sun was rising over the eastern hills on that November morning, Edgar Lafayette Hillman created an indelible impression of great courage, faith, and Christian certainty.

Trinity Church, where he served as pastor, presiding elder, and faithful communicant, was the scene of the last rites of the church, followed by interment in Maplewood Cemetery in Durham.

A layman, who knew him and loved him over a long period of his ministry, wrote these words: "Dr. Hillman never posed as a man of physical might and muscle, but as he stood in the pulpit, erect as a pillar, he mirrored the strength of the Almighty whose power armed his words and radiated from his sense of purpose."

He was a forceful and faithful preacher of the gospel. He was an able and wise administrator. He was a loyal and loving husband and father. He was a man of cosmopolitan culture and international interest.

He came to the end of his days full of honor and crowned with praise. Crowded into these seventy-four years were countless acts of love and good will which endeared him to a circle of friends around the world. He stood tall with God and man. In his realm he was a giant but as humble and gentle as a child. Wherever he went, God and Methodism and brotherhood had a strong advocate.

John Oxenham wrote in one of his poems:

"Think not of me as dead,
But rather . . .
He has gone home to God,
His Father."

WILLIAM ALBERT CADE

1887—1964

"For the Lord knows *and* is fully acquainted with the way of the (consistently) righteous."—Psalm 1:6. (Amplified.)

Those who knew Brother William Albert Cade will agree that the psalmist was writing about his kind when he expressed so well the relationship of the righteous man with his God.

William Albert Cade was born in Kipling, Harnett County, North Carolina, on January 20, 1887. His parents, Joseph Martin Cade and Cornelia Arnold Cade, blessed him in infancy with the atmosphere of a Christian home. Therefore, it was a normal anticipation for him and for them that his life would be dedicated to God. He prepared for the Methodist ministry at Trinity Park Preparatory School, and Trinity College (Duke University), graduating in the class of 1913, earning the B.A. degree, majoring in Religion.



Brother Cade served the following appointments in the North Carolina Conference: Bridgeton; Centenary, New Bern; Edenton; First Church, Rocky Mount; First Church, Laurinburg; First Church, Morehead City; Grace, Wilmington; Fayetteville district superintendent; Front Street, Burlington; St. Paul's Goldsboro; Ayden, the Raleigh and Wilmington Districts. He directed the Methodist College Advance and was for several years chairman of the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College, continuing a member of this board for the rest of his life. He was active on the Raleigh Board of Missions and Church Extension on which he served with efficiency on many committees. Brother Cade was a loyal member of the Raleigh Rotary Club, the Executives Club, and a devoted member of the Raleigh Methodist Ministers' Breakfast Club.

Following his retirement Brother Cade was active in the Hayes-Barton Methodist Church in which he assisted the pastors and taught a Sunday school class of young adults.

On October 14, 1914, Brother Cade and Miss Iver Ellis of Durham were married. To them were born two children: William Albert Cade, Jr., and Alma Louise (Mrs. William J. Erwin). Mrs. Cade died August 2, 1919. On October 12, 1921, Brother Cade was married to Eva Howard Covington of Laurinburg, N. C., who died November 13, 1962. To this union was born one daughter, Betsy Shaw (Mrs. Charles W. Close).

Following a period of critical illness, Dr. Cade died on Saturday, December 19th. The funeral service was held at Hayes-Barton Methodist Church, Raleigh, on Monday, December 21, 1964. The following ministers officiated: the Reverend N. W. Grant, the Reverend R. H. Hodge, and the Reverend Howard P. Powell. Brother Cade is survived by three children, Major William Albert Cade, Jr., Raleigh, N. C.; Mrs. William J. Erwin, Columbus, Ga.; and Mrs. Charles W. Close, Wellesley Hills, Mass., and eight grandchildren.

Among the ministers of the North Carolina Conference Brother Cade was one of the most loved and highly respected. He loved the Methodist Church and did all he could for the church and her institutions without reservations or qualifications. He was never known to refuse whatever service he could render in the name of the church. Always, he did efficiently and thoroughly that which he agreed to do.

Following his retirement Brother Cade made a diligent effort to organize other retired ministers of his conference into a fellowship of prayer. This kept his own heart warm, his mind alert and his faith in God steady.

Brother Cade was a man of strong convictions. Therefore, he enjoyed the confidence and the respect of his brethren whenever major decisions were to be discussed and opin-

ions considered. He was able to preserve the friendship and good will of those with whom he could not always agree but with whom he continued to work. He was a good example of a Christian who could respect the opinions of others and at the same time preserve his own integrity and add to his spiritual stature.

When it became obvious that he could no longer grow physically it was even more obvious that he could grow and would grow spiritually and mentally. His love for, interest in, respect for and devotion to his Bible was impressive. This made of him a radiant example of Peters' program of "growth in grace." "Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust. And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; and to knowledge temperance! and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness; and to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness charity. For if these things be in you, and abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. But he that lacketh these things is blind, and cannot see afar off, and hath forgotten that he was purged from his old sins. Wherefore the rather, brethren, give diligence to make your calling and election sure: for if ye do these things, ye shall never fall: For so an entrance shall be ministered unto you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."—II Peter 1:4-11.

The bishop and his cabinet in planning the program for the Annual Conference honored Brother Cade for many years with the request that he conduct the annual Love Feast. This he did with unusual effectiveness and efficiency. Among his many notes the family found the following in which we find in his own words the deep emotions and affections of his heart to which he gave the title, *My Personal Witness*:

"Dear Brethren: More and more as the years come and go, and I attain to a ripe age and a half century in this Conference, I look forward to this Love Feast hour the closing day of each annual conference. I have participated in about every phase of our ministry in the church in the North Carolina Conference.

"More and more my fellowship with one generation after another of you, my brethren, is not only a sacred memory, but is becoming a blessed and holy heritage.

"It is not shallow sentimentalism when I say that I have, and do now *love* all of my brethren! But this blessed fellowship has not been, and is not now, limited to you, my fellow ministers. My high calling and main business in this half century has been to love and care for the brethren, the people whom God and the church have given me opportunity and responsibility to love, encourage and direct along the upward way to God, to the heavenly home which is not far away. So I begin to share the vision and expectation of John on Patmos where it was given him to see the heavenly country. 'A new heaven and a new earth, in which we shall dwell with God; and we shall be his people, and God himself will be with us and be our God.'

"It is our high calling to do our utmost to help make a new heaven and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness; especially the kingdom of God in this world and in our day.

"And God shall wipe away all tears from *our* eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, no crying, neither shall there be any more pain . . . He that overcometh shall inherit all things; and God will be *our* God and we his children.

"Yes, may we be faithful unto death and He will give us a crown of life."

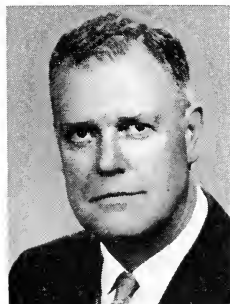

RUSSELL L. DICKS

1906—1965

“Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, for they rest from their labors and their works do follow them.”

Dr. Russell L. Dicks was born in Stillwater, Oklahoma, 1906, and was graduated from the University of Oklahoma, A.B. degree and the Union Theological Seminary, New York City, B.D. degree. He was married to the former Miss Dorothy Smith on September 4, 1938, and they had three children—James D. Dicks, William W. Dicks, and Miss Joanne Dicks. Dr. Dicks was admitted on trial into the North Texas Conference at Dallas, Texas, 1941. He was received into the North Carolina Conference by transfer from the Rock River Conference, November 6, 1948.



Dr. Russell L. Dicks served on the staff of four teaching hospitals. He was chaplain of the Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston, 1934-37; chaplain of the Presbyterian Hospital, Chicago, Ill., 1937-40; chaplain of the Wesley Memorial Hospital, Chicago, Ill., 1944-48; and chaplain of the Duke University Hospital, Durham, N. C., 1948-58. In addition to this, he has lectured at the John Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, Md.; the Methodist Hospital of the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn.; the Henry Ford Hospital, Detroit, Mich.; the Baylor Hospital, Dallas, Texas; the Methodist Hospital, Houston, Texas; and the Christ Hospital, Cincinnati, Ohio.

Dr. Dicks has taught at Harvard University, the University of Chicago, Southern Methodist Seminary and Duke University. He was the author of fifteen published books among which are *The Art of Ministering to the Sick*, *Who Is My Patient?* *Pastoral Work and Personal Counseling*, *My Faith Looks Up, And Peace at the Last*, *Meet Joe Ross*, *Toward Health and Wholeness*, *Principles and Practices of Pastoral Care*, *Premarital Guidance*, and others. He was the founder of the magazine entitled *Religion and Health* which he edited for five years. Recently Dr. Russell L. Dicks was the general editor of the *Successful Pastoral Counseling Series* published by Prentice-Hall, Inc.

In 1958 Dr. Dicks traveled abroad as a consultant for the military in Europe and the Far East, which included trips to Germany, Korea, Japan, and Okinawa.

In 1960 Dr. Dicks established the Central Florida Counseling Center in Orlando, Fla. During the five years of activity, as statistics indicate, he has counseled and interviewed more than 5,000 people.

Dr. Dicks was the first of the younger clergy of any Protestant denomination to become a full-time general hospital chaplain. He was the first person to keep detailed clinical records of his conversation with patients for reflective study. He was the first person to publish “conversational material” for study by pastors. He was the first person to work out a clinical study course for pastors in a general hospital. He was the first president of the Association of Protestant Chaplains of the American Protestant Hospital Association. In 1955 Dr. Dicks was one of four Americans cited by the National Council of the Churches of Christ for “outstanding work for the welfare of the people.” He was also the recipient of two honorary doctorates, D.D. and Litt.D.

Dr. Dicks was called to God’s eternal city on the 8th day of March, 1965. He was buried in Greenwood Cemetery, Orlando, Fla. Yet, in many ways, his life will continue even on earth. His light will keep on shining in our hearts. His courage will remain a source of encouragement to others. His search for truth will not be undone. His love will remain a power unto health, healing and wholeness.

LESLIE LEAMON PARRISH

1901—1965

Kind and comforting words, even though they may be tenderly and sympathetically spoken or written, fail to convey all that one may feel in his or her heart at the time of a great loss. It is difficult for us to understand that one so devoted to the ministry of Jesus Christ should experience so short a ministry of service. Jesus himself was an example of what one may do, not by the length of his ministry but rather by the quality of his service. The ministry of Leslie Leamon Parrish was shorter than that of many of his brethren. His call came at a later time than the average, and because of illness, his ministry was cut short. His years of service numbered thirty.



Leslie Parrish was born January 8, 1901, in Johnston County, near Kenly. He felt the call to the ministry at the age of twenty-six, at which time he said, "If I can't preach, I'd rather die." Not having previously finished high school, he felt that to be a good minister he must prepare himself to do the Master's work more effectively. So he and his wife enrolled at Washington Collegiate Institute, Washington, N. C. After completion of his high school work, he enrolled at Duke University as a freshman in the fall of 1931. During his college days at Duke

he served part-time as a barber and as an approved supply pastor in the North Carolina Conference. He was admitted on trial into the conference at the session held in Raleigh in 1937. Until his retirement in 1962, Brother Parrish served the following appointments: Carrboro, Burlington Circuit, West Burlington, Jonesboro, Jacksonville, Fifth Avenue, Wilmington, Rosemary, Roanoke Rapids, and Mebane. He returned to Wilmington to live in a lovely home overlooking beautiful Greenfield Lake. During his years of retirement he enjoyed the beauty of nature which surrounded him, particularly when the azaleas were in bloom.

L. L. Parrish died in Duke Hospital on April 14, 1965, after an extended illness. In all of his suffering he was never bitter; he never complained. His faith in God was strong, and his reliance upon God was definite. When his body was overtaken by disease and became tired, he could well say with the apostle Paul, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith." Funeral services were conducted from Fifth Avenue Methodist Church in Wilmington on April 17 by Rev. C. J. Andrews, pastor of the church, and Rev. C. S. Boggs, superintendent of the Wilmington District, with interment in Greenlawn Cemetery, Wilmington.

On March 27, 1917, he married Miss Stella Gladys McGuinn of Rocky Mount, N. C., who survives him. She was a most capable and devoted companion in the work of the ministry, always doing even more than was expected of her. She was most attentive to his every need during his long illness. In addition to his widow, he is survived by three daughters: Mrs. Arthur England of Cape Girardeau, Mo.; Mrs. Lee Morrow of Wilmington; and Mrs. Marvin Troutman of Morehead City, and two brothers: R. E. Parrish of Kenly, and W. H. Parrish of Winston-Salem.

Leslie Leamon Parrish was a dedicated minister of Jesus Christ. Without a definite call to the ministry and a complete dedication to his Lord, he could never have been able to perform such a great ministry for Christ and His Church. He never considered any part of his ministry a drudgery or a sacrifice, but rather a privilege that was his as he followed his divine calling. He gave emphasis to the total program of the church. There were two areas, however, where he seemed to excel, namely, preaching and evangelism. Many times this writer heard him say, "I love to preach, and I love to win people to Christ."

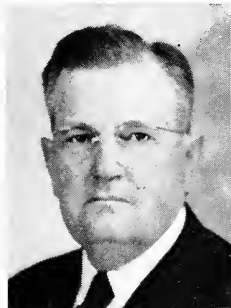
FRANKLIN SWINDELL LOVE

1883-1965

Teacher, preacher, educator, executive — Franklin Swindell Love filled many positions of importance and influence and filled them all with distinction. It has been said that life is not measured by our span of years but that it is the quality and not the

quantity of life that really counts. Dr. Love ranked among the great and notable regardless of whether his life was viewed from a quantitative or qualitative point of view. Long since he passed his "threescore and ten" and the greater part of the long life which he lived was spent in significant service to his fellowmen and his church.

The salient yet simple facts of his life are easily recounted. He was born October 17, 1883, and reared in Union County, the son of Thomas Lee Love and Mary Williams Love. He was educated in the Union County schools and attended Trinity College (now Duke University) where he made a wonderful record as a student leader, debater, and a religious influence. He was the only man in that institution to be elected president of the Y.M.C.A. in his junior year and to be re-elected as a senior. He graduated in 1908. He later received the Master of Arts degree from Columbia University.



His activities in the church were varied and manifold. He served as a missionary in Brazil for two years. He served the following pastorates in the North Carolina Conference: Aberdeen, Kinston, Wilson, Elizabeth City, Edenton Street, Raleigh, and the Grace Methodist Church in Wilmington. In all of these pastorates he was a pronounced success.

Dr. Love was also superintendent of the Raleigh, Elizabeth City and Durham Districts. His work in the cabinet was of the same high quality that marked his pastoral and pulpit work elsewhere.

As an educator, Dr. Love rendered distinctive service as president of Louisburg College, an office which he held for six years. He served as superintendent of the Lake Junaluska Assembly for six years.

Among the many places of honor which he held were included secretaryship to the mission to set up Autonomous Methodist Churches in Brazil, member of the General Conference for Unification of Methodist Churches and membership in several jurisdictional conferences. He was listed in Who's Who in America and other lists of notable people. After a prolonged illness Dr. Love died on April 30, 1965.

He was first married to Miss Cornelia Clegg who died many years ago. Surviving this marriage are two daughters, Mrs. John O. Evans of Raleigh, and Mrs. William Belvin of Savannah, Ga. He was next married to Miss Phala Hawkins of Missouri who survives with one son, Frank S. Love, Jr., of Nashville, Tenn. Also surviving are one brother, J. W. Love of Cedartown, Ga.; one sister, Mrs. James Campbell of Smithfield, and five grandchildren.

Funeral services were held in Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh. Officiating were the Reverend Joseph F. Coble, superintendent of the Methodist Retirement Home where Dr. Love spent his last years; the Reverend Cecil Robbins, president of Louisburg College of which Dr. Love was for years president; the Reverend Marvin Vick, pastor of the church; and Bishop Paul N. Garber. Pall bearers were six of his minister friends. Interment was in the Laurinburg City Cemetery where the Reverend D. J. Reid also took part in the burial ceremonies.

So runs the story of the life and death of a good and great man. But the story is not fully told. I knew Swindell Love for more than sixty years fairly intimately. We were in college together for four years. We joined the North Carolina Conference together in New Bern in 1907. We have worked together in scores and scores of institutes, conferences and other gatherings. As a college man he had the love and respect of faculty and

student body alike. During the more than sixty years that I have known him I never knew him to shirk a task however hard; or to refuse to do a piece of work however little and unremunerative of praise or pay. I never saw him show an ugly spirit in his work. I have never seen him do a piece of shoddy work. If he agreed to serve in any given capacity, he could be trusted to fulfill faithfully every promise. He spoke with enthusiasm and energy as if he believed every word he said and wanted the rest of the world to believe him also. He had a scorn of indifference and a devotion to his calling that amounted almost to an obsession. No finer spirit ever lived. No cleaner life was ever known among us. Surely no one could ever more deserve the plaudit: "Well done, good and faithful servant."

MRS. AUGUSTA ROBINSON SMITH

1888—1964

Born December 5, 1888, in Fort Mill, South Carolina, Augusta Robinson Smith was the daughter of the late Joseph Robinson and Linda Huntley. During her early childhood, the family moved to Charlotte, North Carolina, and it was here that she spent her childhood and grew to be a mature young lady very much interested in church work. She was an avid reader and participated in many cultural activities, most of which were centered around her church life.

In her church work, she met and later married Jackson L. Smith who was at that time superintendent of the Sunday school and charge lay leader at the Belmont Methodist Church. They were married July 23, 1906. There were three children born to this family — two daughters and one son. Soon after the arrival of the second child, Jack Smith entered the Methodist Conference, and these two people dedicated the remainder of their lives to the ministry.

Their ministries carried them across the mountains of western North Carolina, including work in Marion, Old Fort, Weaverville, and East Flat Rock. In 1918 they transferred to the eastern North Carolina Conference and served work at South Mills, Columbia, Laurinburg, Hills-

boro, Winfall, Aboskie, Conway, and Oxford.

The many appointments served by this minister's family were interesting and challenging experiences, but they always meant additional work for the minister's wife. Augusta Robinson Smith was a perfectionist and many, many old parsonages yielded to the firm and thorough hand of this master housekeeper and mother. She was never satisfied with mediocrity. If a nail had to be driven or a board sawed in order to alleviate obsolescence and deterioration in an old parsonage, she was capable. Her children were meticulously cared for, and she found great satisfaction in providing her children and husband with good meals, a clean house, and clean clothing.

Augusta Robinson Smith's concern for human welfare reached beyond her own home. She was constantly working with mothers in the community giving advice and demonstrations in child care and feeding. There were many sickly children across eastern North Carolina who grew to be strong men and women because of her help and advice.

On August 28, 1964, Augusta Robinson Smith went to her eternal reward. She passed quietly at Cabarrus Memorial Hospital in Concord at seven o'clock in the evening. Services were conducted at the Whitley's Chapel by the Reverend J. W. Braxton, pastor of Trinity Methodist Church in Kannapolis. Brother Braxton was assisted by Brother O. L. Hathaway at the graveside services in Hillsboro.

In addition to her husband, Reverend J. L. Smith of Kannapolis, she is survived by two daughters, Mrs. George Gilmore of Hillsboro and Mrs. Walter Camlin of Greenville, South Carolina, and one son, Fred A. Smith of Zebulon.

Mrs. Elma Grimes Slaughter was born in Murfreesboro, North Carolina, February 28, 1886, the only daughter of Lieut. and Mrs. George W. Grimes, and died in Durham on November 16, 1964. Funeral services were held in St. Paul Methodist Church in



Durham, where she held her membership, by Reverend John R. Poe, pastor. Burial was in Maplewood Cemetery, Durham, where the pastor was assisted by Reverend Key W. Taylor. She was educated at the Young Woman's Seminary in Murfreesboro. On March 14, 1916, she was happily married to Reverend B. B. Slaughter. To this union were born three children—Anne Walker who is now the wife of Reverend Harry E. Flowers, pastor of First United Presbyterian Church, Paris, Tennessee; B. B. Slaughter, Jr., who is married to Bettie London of Rockingham, and is now a pilot with the Piedmont Airlines in Winston-Salem; and Dr. Grimes C. Slaughter who is a nuclear physics researcher at the National Laboratories at Oak Ridge, Tennessee.

Mrs. Slaughter gave freely of her time and talent, interest and service to the total program of the churches served by her husband. As an accredited instructor of teachers and workers with children, she taught in Christian Training Schools throughout the conference. She also gave much of her time and service to the Woman's Society of Christian Service, serving on local, district and conference levels. She served as vice-president and spiritual life secretary of the conference. She was awarded a Life Membership.

Four special funds have been set up at our Children's Home in Raleigh in her memory which will help young people continue their education. These funds were donated by Reverend and Mrs. Freeman Heath, Mrs. W. B. Rouse, the ministers' wives of the Raleigh District, Mrs. W. A. Biggs, and Mrs. Lydia Love. A donation by Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Moore was given to the Missionary Friendship Fund of Jarvis Memorial Church in Greenville in her memory and her name was entered in the Book of Remembrance of that church. Miss Jean Umstead set up a fund at our Retirement Home in Durham in her memory.

Since Mrs. Slaughter made her greatest contributions, perhaps, to children's work, her family and many friends thought her work could best be perpetuated by establishing a scholarship fund at North Carolina Wesleyan College to be awarded to young people going into the field of religious education, who in turn will contribute to the work of children and youth in the churches they serve.

The effect and influence of her life will go on for generations yet to be.

ELLA LYDIA HENDRICKS SHARPE

1881—1965

Ella Lydia Hendricks Sharpe, daughter of George Garland Hendricks and Priscilla Spoon Hendricks, was born on March 30, 1881, in Randolph County, North Carolina, near the site of old Trinity College.



A strong parentage always bestows its gifts on its children. Mrs. Sharpe's father, George Garland Hendricks, was typical of the solid citizenship which his family represented. Always a leader in the community, he served as sheriff and later as clerk of the Superior Court in Randolph County. The Hendricks family was known for its devotion to all good causes and especially for the interest in the devout life. Following the family tradition, Ella Lydia Hendricks joined Mt. Vernon Methodist Protestant Church in Randolph County at the age of thirteen. From that time until her death her loyalty to The Methodist Church never wavered.

She was educated in the public schools of the state and attended Guilford College and Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

In her early life, Mrs. Sharpe taught in the Greensboro city schools and also in the Asheboro city schools. While teaching in the Asheboro city schools she became

active in Central Methodist Church, serving on the Official Board and singing in the choir. It was during this time that she met Daniel Monroe Sharpe, whom she married on February 7, 1908.

The Sharpes made their home in Asheboro until 1916 when they moved to Liberty, North Carolina. In September of 1919, the Sharpe family moved to Durham, North Carolina, where Mr. Sharpe entered Trinity College to prepare for the Methodist ministry.

One of the true tests of character is the heroism with which individuals accept the challenges of life and the spirit with which they meet the responsibilities thrust upon them. Throughout the period of her husband's years in school training for the ministry, Mrs. Sharpe revealed her tremendous capacity for sacrifice, understanding, and true faithfulness as she fulfilled the role of mother, companion, homemaker, and trusted friend of all who knew her. Her gentle and undiscouragable patience and perseverance characterized her long career as the First Lady of many Methodist parsonages across the North Carolina Annual Conference. She lived and served in the following communities where her husband was the pastor: Gregson Methodist Church, Durham; Edgerton Memorial Methodist Church, Selma; Rosemary Methodist Charge, Roanoke Rapids; First Methodist Church, Morehead City; First Methodist Church, Hertford; Mt. Gilead Methodist Church, Mt. Gilead; Trinity Methodist Church, Raleigh; Nashville Methodist Charge, Nashville; Roseboro Methodist Charge, Roseboro; Creedmoor Methodist Charge, Creedmoor; Haw River Methodist Church, Haw River; Epworth Methodist Church, Durham; and St. John Methodist Church, Durham.

In all these places and through all these years, Mrs. Sharpe distinguished herself as one always devoted to the church and all its causes. Her special interest was with the children and youth; at the same time she loved the world-wide church. She loved and was ever loyal to the Woman's Society of Christian Service and its aims. Her churchmanship was one of selfless service and total commitment. She endeared herself to the total life of the whole church. Her personality drew people closer to the church and made them love it more dearly because of what she meant to them. To the end of her days she was constantly asking, "What more can we do for the church?"

Any adequate tribute of love and appreciation of Ella Hendricks Sharpe would say that she represented the finest flower of Christian womanhood. Her personality radiated a rare charm and a sweet winsomeness. She was known for her patience, kindness, sympathy, and genuine love of others. She was always positive in her appreciation and praise of others. She never criticized or depreciated others; nor did others feel inclined to criticize when in her presence. She believed the highest and best of everyone; she expected and inspired the highest and best in all whom she met.

Mrs. Sharpe's gratitude for all of life was reflected in her abiding love of nature. She and her husband loved the great out-of-doors and spent much time together enjoying the wonders of the natural world. She lived beauty in all its forms as she loved beauty in things and in persons.

Perhaps Mrs. Sharpe's finest self was seen in her ability to be the ideal hostess. Always a great lady, she presided over her home with great gentleness and great dignity. Her home was a place of warm hospitality, a refuge for her family and their friends. An impeccable housekeeper and always a gracious hostess, to dine at her table was a beautiful experience and a real benediction. Her love for her home and family was a powerful inspiration to them as well as to all who shared in its goodness. This was most outspoken in the remarkable character and training she gave to her children.

Mrs. Sharpe's later years were rich and full, but somewhat limited physically. She suffered a fall and consequent injury in 1956 that handicapped her subsequent activities. But she continued to assume her responsibilities until her final illness overtook her in November of 1964. She suffered a stroke on the 13th of the month and entered Watts Hospital, Durham, where she remained a patient until her death on January 9, 1965. Her going was a mighty spiritual triumph. Nearing the end, she repeated the 23rd Psalm to the words, "Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death . . . Thou art with me." And then she said, "I love the Lord and I know He loves me."

In a moving tribute of love and respect, Bishop Paul N. Garber compared Mrs. Sharpe's character and life with that of Susannah Wesley and concluded that both these

noble women will remain immortal in the memories of our beloved Methodism. These remarks were made at her services which were conducted from the St. John Methodist Church, Durham, North Carolina, where she was a member. He was assisted by the pastor, the Rev. F. E. Berry, and the Durham district superintendent, the Rev. O. L. Hathaway. Burial was in the Raleigh Memorial Park, Raleigh, North Carolina.

Mrs. Sharpe is survived by her husband, the Rev. Daniel Monroe Sharpe; one daughter, Mrs. Vergil E. Queen of Sanford; one son, Daniel Monroe Sharpe, Jr., of Raleigh; and two grandchildren, Peggy Manson Sharpe and Daniel Monroe Sharpe III, of Raleigh, North Carolina.

MRS. NAN GOODSON READ

1885—1965

"None knew thee but to love thee,
Nor named thee but to praise."

This beautiful and oft-quoted tribute from one poet to another was never more applicable than it would be to Mrs. Nan Goodson Read. In my more than sixty years of close acquaintance with her, I have never heard anyone speak unkindly of her or criticize her unduly. She was a living example of what Wordsworth described as

"A perfect woman, nobly planned
To warn, to comfort and command."

Mrs. Nan Goodson Read was born September 13, 1885, in Durham, North Carolina, the daughter of John William Goodson and Anna Walker Goodson. She graduated from Durham High School and Trinity College. She also received musical training at the Southern Conservatory of Music in Durham and Cornell University.

She was first married to the Reverend Leslie Powell Howard of Mobile, Alabama, who served the church at Morehead City, Rocky Mount, and Duke Memorial, Durham. He died in 1914 while serving this last named charge. Surviving that union are two daughters, Miss

Mary Ann Howard of Winston-Salem, and Mrs. Warren Whitehurst of Wilson.

On June 15, 1922, she was next married to the Reverend Charles Lewis Read who died on November 8, 1946. To this union was born one daughter, Mrs. W. V. Gupton of Rocky Mount, who survives. Mrs. Read is also survived by one brother, W. A. Goodson of Winston-Salem, and four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at Duke Memorial Church. The pastor, the Reverend R. W. Bradshaw, conducted the services, assisted by the Reverend Joseph F. Coble, superintendent of the Methodist Retirement Home, where Mrs. Read was living at the time of her death. Interment was in Maplewood Cemetery in Durham.

So runs the abbreviated story of the life of one of the most useful women ever to belong to the Methodist Church. Her ministry as mistress of the parsonage also included Queen Street, Kinston; St. Paul's, Goldsboro; Dunn; St. James, Tarboro; Franklinton; Zebulon, and four years in the district parsonage of the Rockingham District.

In all of these positions she was immeasurably useful. She was organist, pianist, choir director, soloist, teacher, divisional superintendent in Sunday school work, official in the W.S.C.S., and held other positions also. In all these relationships she was unsurpassed in both the quality and quantity of service rendered.

In addition to her church work she taught in the public schools, served as civic and social leader, and held places of importance among the alumnae of her alma mater, Duke University. She served as both vice-president and president of the Alumnae Association.



Mrs. Read was well read and widely travelled which made her an unusually charming and interesting conversationalist. She was so properly adjusted socially that she was equally at home with the parents of the underprivileged children whom she taught and the elite of prominent scholarly persons whom she helped entertain as hostess of the University House at Duke. She reminds one of the statement concerning the hero of Kipling's "If:" "Walked with kings nor lost the common touch."

Of Mrs. Read, a close friend wrote: "She radiated joy and gladness and her spirit was ever shedding kindness—just as a flower is constantly bestowing fragrance on the air. Nan had depth of faith, breadth of experience, and height of accomplishment—yet the simplicity of her trust in God and her absolute faith in prayer was almost mystic. Prayer was a natural part of her daily living."

But the story is not yet told nor can it be adequately done. It is impossible to recapture her captivating smile, her encouraging tones, her optimistic outlook upon life, her persistent faith.

It would be impossible to evaluate the quality of her life, to estimate her influence for good, to measure the help she furnished others, to state fully the force of her impact upon all who came in contact with her.

Her's is the story of a devoted loved one, a happy homemaker, an exemplary mother, a faithful friend, a consecrated Christian, an example of goodness and godliness. We shall miss her but with James Whitcomb Riley:

"I cannot say and I will not say
That she is dead—she is just away."

LYDIA YATES WOOTEN

1876—1965

Mrs. Lydia Yates Wooten, daughter of Charles Wesley and Alice Carolina (Walker) Yates, was born in Wilmington, N. C. on February 26, 1876. Twelve years later she joined the Grace Methodist Church. In preparation for her contribution as a teacher, she attended the Tileston Normal School in Wilmington and later the State Normal College, now the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. For fifteen years she taught in the Wilmington schools, and during this time continued her education by attending sessions at Columbia, Harvard and Cornell Universities. Her leadership qualities were recognized when in 1906-07 she served as state director of the National Education Association.

On October 16, 1912, she married the Reverend John Council Wooten, then pastor of the Grace Methodist Church in Wilmington. To this union were born two lovely daughters, Alice Yates Wooten, of the home, and Julia Speight, now Mrs. J. R. Jones of Mexico City, Mexico, who survive. She was a loving, sympathetic, and inspiring wife, and graced the parsonage for 24 years in the North Carolina Conference where her husband served pastorates in Elizabeth City, Raleigh and Farmville; also as presiding elder of the Raleigh, Durham, and Fayette-

ville Districts. I have often heard her referred to as "the ideal preacher's wife." She moved to Greenville, N. C. from Farmville following the death of her husband on October 9, 1936.

She contributed generously to many worthy causes and especially to the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh where she served on the board of trustees from 1935 until her health would no longer permit her to do so. She was a lifetime member of the George B. Singletary Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. She was an honorary Life Patron and honorary Life Member of the Woman's Society of Christian Service,



served as conference secretary of Children's Work 1927-39, and was a member of the Conference Board of Education 1930-32.

Endowed with a background of splendid culture and possessing a gifted intellect, she gave her best in dedicated service to her home, her church, and her community. She gave inspiration and strength to and contributed much to the widening and deepening of the church's insight and concern. This was most evident in the preparation she made for a Sunday school lesson or a mission study class. In two of our churches—Grace in Wilmington and Jarvis Memorial in Greenville—there is a Sunday school class that bears her name.

She loved our great Methodist Church, and even after she became unable to fill her place of leadership, she followed all its activities and knew just what the church was doing. She was a genuinely good woman, and good women are great women. Like Jesus whom she followed daily, she "went about doing good," and the world is a brighter, more beautiful place because she lived in and was a part of it. It was a joy and privilege to be in her presence for she radiated the spirit of Christ to all.

She was affectionately referred to as our own "Aunt Lydia" by all of us nieces and nephews who were deeply inspired and influenced by her devout Christian life. To know her was to love and respect her, and I will ever be grateful for the blessing and inspiration which her life meant to me. I am sure that her influence will continue to bless others in the years ahead, for they too will reflect upon her many gracious acts of kindness and affection.

On Wednesday night, February 3, she quietly and peacefully went to her heavenly reward. Solemn dignity, prayer, and meditation characterized the funeral service held in Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church in Greenville on Saturday morning, February 6, at 11:00 o'clock, conducted by her pastor, the Reverend E. B. Fisher. Interment took place in the family plot in Greenwood Cemetery.

1868—1965

Mrs. Laura Nora Cummings Caviness was born in Guilford County, December 4, 1868, the daughter of Enos Frazier Cummings and Catherine Lamon Cummings.

Mrs. Caviness was educated in the schools of Guilford County and Guilford College in the class of 1888. At the time of her death she was possibly the oldest alumna of Guilford College.

Mrs. Caviness was married to the Reverend Doctor Newby Caviness in 1894, in Greensboro, North Carolina. To this union five children were born, four boys and one girl, as follows: Dr. Verne Strudwick Caviness of Raleigh, N. C.; Rupert Newby Caviness of Ocala, Fla.; Miss Grace Caviness and William Branson Caviness, of Raleigh, N. C., and Warren Candler Caviness, who preceded his mother to their eternal home.

Mrs. Caviness accompanied her husband to the following charges and proved a great source of help in his work. They served eleven charges in the North Carolina Conference, which are as follows: Hillsboro; Carr; Durham; Roxboro; Burlington; Aberdeen; Warrenton; Morehead City, Central, Raleigh; Cary; Epworth, Raleigh; and Franklinton. Mrs. Caviness worked side by side with her husband until he retired in 1928 at the

Conference which met in Wilson, N. C.

Following his retirement the coupled moved to Ocala, Fla., where they lived until



death separated them September 28, 1937. Mrs. Caviness lived as a widow for 28 years, spending the latter part of her life in the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, N. C. Mrs. Caviness departed this life on March 28, 1965, to join her husband and others she loved and lost for a while.

Funeral services were conducted at the Hayes Barton Methodist Church March 29, 1965, by the Rev. Paul Carruth, pastor of the church. A large crowd of friends as well as several ministers of the North Carolina Conference were present for the funeral. She was laid to rest beside her husband in Montlawn Memorial Park, Raleigh, N. C.

I can speak a personal word for Mother Caviness, for it was while she and her husband were at Central Church that I was licensed to preach, and much encouragement came to me from them in finally surrendering to the Master's call. I was a guest in their home for a night when my own father was in Rex Hospital for an operation, and in the morning as we gathered at the breakfast table, devotions were held in which Mrs. Caviness showed great interest, in spite of the fact that two of her sons were rushing to a store they operated. When I heard of her passing, these things came again to my mind, and I could thank God for Brother D. N. and Sister Nora Caviness.

I think a few lines from a poem expresses it better than I can:

"If you aspire for something great
And give to this your time,
And trust the Lord for leadership
Your life will be sublime.

Whose life is yielded unto God
Without complaint or sigh,

MRS. MAUD MERRIMON CUNINGGIM

1874 — 1965

Maud Merrimon Cuninggim was born in Raleigh, North Carolina, March 7, 1874, the daughter of Augustus S. Merrimon and Margaret Jane Baird. At the time of her birth her father was a distinguished member of the United States Senate from North Carolina. In early childhood she lived in the Capital City of Washington part of the time. Her real home, however, that she knew and loved so well, continued to be her native city of Raleigh, North Carolina.

All of her elementary and secondary education, and first two years of college were taken at Peace Institute, which later became Peace College. She was talented in writing, music, elocution, and possessed a particular fondness for the theatre arts. She was the recipient of several literary awards for essays. Her aptitude and excellence in recitations and public speaking were responsible for the ease and charm with which she delighted various and numerous groups in later years. As a young lady she was a frequent visitor to Washington, and sang in the White House during the administration of President Grover Cleveland.

Following his tenure of office in the United States Senate, her father became Chief Justice of the Supreme



Court of North Carolina. Maud's admiration for her father almost persuaded her to choose a career in law. However, she decided upon the teaching profession, and returned to Peace Institute, her Alma Mater. Later she taught at the Lucy Cobb School in Athens, Georgia. While at Lucy Cobb, she chaperoned a group of young ladies on a tour of Europe. After eight years of teaching, she returned to Raleigh to be with her mother who was in declining health.

In the year 1910, Maude Merrimon was married to the Reverend Jesse Lee Cuninggim, and began a life of homemaker and preacher's wife. Dr. Cuninggim was connected with Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee. Here their two children were born, a daughter and son. Later the family moved to North Carolina, where Dr. Cuninggim served as a pastor and presiding elder. Later he moved to Texas and was associated with Southern Methodist University as Professor of Religious Education. He then went to Kansas City, Missouri, to become president of Scarritt Bible and Training School. This institution was moved to Nashville, Tennessee, in 1924 and became Scarritt College, with Dr. Cuninggim continuing as president of the school.

As the wife of a college president, Mrs. Cuninggim found many opportunities to render helpful and gracious service to the college and community. In addition to her campus and civic interests and activities, she enrolled as a student in Scarritt College and completed the requirements for both the Bachelor's and Master's degrees. Thus she became an alumna of the institution to which she and her husband devoted their great talents and exemplary lives. During all these years Maud Cuninggim was a devoted companion to her husband and children. Indeed, "her children rise up to call her blessed" and bear witness to her signal success as a mother who always "looked well to the ways of her household." Her son, Dr. Merrimon Cuninggim, an outstanding educator, is currently the Executive Director of the Danforth Foundation, of St. Louis, Missouri. Her daughter, Dr. Margaret Cuninggim, is presently Dean of Women at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

Maud Merrimon Cuninggim was a tireless worker in the Methodist Church. Her private devotional life became and continued to be an inspiration to her family, and to a great host of friends and associates among whom she moved with quiet and queenly Christian grace. In recognition and appreciation of her abundant labors and selflessness in the service of her church, the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Scarritt Aide honored her with a Life Membership. For twenty-five years Mrs. Cuninggim was the devoted and faithful teacher of the Mary Helm Bible Class, West End Methodist Church in Nashville, Tennessee. In excessive heat and winter's snow, she was usually among the first to arrive with a happy smile and a lesson well prepared during the preceding week. As a keen student of the Bible she had the rare gift of getting to the heart of the lesson, and the happy added facility of transmitting it forcefully and beautifully to the members of her class. Born to teach, she was wonderfully endowed with superior gifts and graces. Her resourcefulness and versatility marked her at once as a workman skilled in "rightly dividing the word of truth." Toward the end of her long, varied and useful life as teacher, her waning physical strength did not abate her zeal for the work, nor her love for the class. The time came, however, when it was necessary for her to give up, this her first love, teaching. The Mary Helm Bible Class honored her by furnishing a parlor in one of the residence halls at Scarritt College.

Mrs. Cuninggim soon moved to Knoxville, Tennessee, to live in retirement in the home of her daughter, Dr. Margaret Cuninggim. At the great age of 91 years her mortal life ended, Sunday, May 2, 1965. She is survived by the above named daughter, Dr. Margaret Cuninggim; a son, Dr. Merrimon Cuninggim of St. Louis; three granddaughters, Mrs. John Neff, Baltimore, Maryland, Miss Penny Cuninggim and Miss Terry Cuninggim of St. Louis; two great grandchildren, Michael Merrimon Neff and Heidi Holton Neff of Baltimore, Maryland.

Funeral service was held at West End Methodist Church, Nashville, Tennessee, the Reverend Ben St. Clair, officiating. Interment took place in the Mount Olivet Cemetery, Nashville, Tennessee.

Mrs. Starling was born March 20, 1875. She was the daughter of Spence Davis Watson and Josiah Watson of Fremont, N. C., and was educated in the Fremont Private School. On February 1, 1899 she married the Rev. George B. Starling, who had joined the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church in 1898, and was serving his first appointment on the Kenly Methodist Charge.

Thus began a partnership of love and faith that extended through forty-eight years of active service in fourteen charges throughout the North Carolina Conference. The last six active years were spent where they began—in Kenly. There her husband retired at the maximum age of 72; and there they lived in the midst of their friends until Mr. Starling died in 1959.

SECTION V

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

BURLINGTON DISTRICT

T. B. HOUGH, *District Superintendent*

The forty-seven ministers and approximately 19,000 laymen of the Burlington District have compiled a record this year that reveals their devotion to the Methodist Church. Of course, this report only covers the conference year to May 1, 1965.

Membership and Evangelism: To date, May 1, 1965, the pastors' reports of the following facts are evidence of their labor: Profession of Faith and from other denominations, 313; by certificate, 227, totaling 540. Lost by certificate, death, and action of the Quarterly Conference, 312, leaving a net gain of 228.

The district director of Evangelism, in cooperation with the conference director of Evangelism, has promoted the program of evangelism in the district, subdistricts, and in each local church.

Christian Education: I would say the district staff, in cooperation with the Conference Board of Education, has used every method known to it in seeking to promote the program of Christian education in each local church. Christian workers' schools, seminars and retreats have been used to extend the vision, intensify the efforts, and increase the dedication of the workers on the local level. These efforts and planning have enabled us to report a slight increase in net gain in the church schools of the district this year.

Lay Activities: Our dedicated, effective, and far-sighted lay leader, Mr. Joe Holmes, with the associate lay leaders, has promoted a training program that has sent out more qualified lay speakers this year than ever before. A training school for lay speakers was conducted over a week-end at Chestnut Ridge, and certificates of achievement were issued to those finishing the course. Our lay speakers now are going out qualified and eager to bear witness of their experience with the Lord. Further evidence of the laymen's interest is shown in the wonderful lay rally held in February. Even with a net loss of 4,000 to the new Sanford District, we had an increase in attendance of 79 over the 1964 rally, making a total of 704 present this year for the rally. We had a fine delegation at the lay retreat at Louisburg College; and they came back with vision, determination, a sense of commitment, and enthusiasm and began a program to enlist and inspire the laymen in the churches of the district.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. P. F. Newton, our enthusiastic and versatile district president, has shown unrestrained zeal in leading the courageous and spiritually-committed ladies of the Burlington District to a new plateau of achievement in the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service this year. This refreshing, wholesome band of women are not only surveying new areas for service, but they are planting new ideals in the hearts and lives of an ever-expanding multitude of men, women, young people and children who are searching for a way of hopeful living. The women of this district rejoice that they have the leadership of a president with the dynamic and motivation that Mrs. Newton has.

Building and Improvements: This year only one parsonage has been built in the Burlington District, and that was at New Hope-Purley, at a cost of \$15,000. The parsonage at Christ Church-Cedar Cliff has been dedicated this year. At least three churches are now planning immediate expansion programs. One parsonage is being planned. We have raised \$115,000 this year on debt, improvement, and new building programs.

Finances: The level of stewardship on the Burlington District continues to rise. Last year we paid 98% of our World Service and Conference Benevolences. This year we have no thought to do less than 100%. We anticipate achieving our goal for the increase

asked in World Service and Conference Benevolences. The pastors of the district achieve a higher standard of living only as their churches increase their pay. In recognition of this fact, 23 charges have increased the pastor's salary or expense for the coming conference year. The special offerings have been received by most of the churches of the district. Several of the churches have General and Conference specials and, thank the Lord, a few churches have undirected specials that have been lifesavers in a couple of critical situations. Our college payments have improved over last year, and we move on toward completing our acceptances.

Sunday, November 8, 1964, the members of the local church commissions of the Burlington District met at Mebane Methodist Church and organized the Burlington Board of Missions, with Dr. A. P. Brantley as President and Robert A. Wilkinson, Jr., as Secretary.

This superintendent shall be eternally grateful for the magnificent cooperation of the ministers of this district in making the record we have.

DURHAM DISTRICT

O. L. HATHAWAY, *District Superintendent*

The pastors and lay people of the Durham District have been carrying on the work of Christ in The Methodist Church, and we would like to share our report with the members of the Conference.

Membership and Evangelism: The report for April 26, 1965, reveals the fact that we have added 1,013 and lost 682, giving us a net gain of 332. We have baptized 136 infants.

Christian Education: Christian workers' schools were held in Durham, Bahama and Roxboro. Subdistrict institutes were held in the fall. Youth rally for the young people was held at the University Methodist Church.

Christian Higher Education: We had a district meeting at Louisburg College in the interest of our Methodist colleges. Our people are paying on their pledges toward the support of our Methodist colleges.

Lay Activities: The program of Lay Activities under the direction of James T. Patrick continues to move forward. We had laymen to attend the Southeastern Jurisdiction Rally at Lake Junaluska and the summer lay retreat. We had a new record in attendance of 1,350 persons at our Lay Rally held in February. The lay speaking program has improved this year—the Methodist Men are becoming more active.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. J. C. Wingate, the president, has given outstanding leadership to the 67 societies of approximately 3,234 members. The giving of our women has increased during the year.

Buildings and Improvements: Duke Memorial has completed the education building and held a consecration service during the summer. Fletcher's Chapel is building an education plant. Planning for new buildings continues at Allensville; Carrboro; Chapel Hill: Aldersgate; Durham: Aldersgate, Glendale Heights, McMannens; New Bethel; Orange; Oxford; Rougemont; and Warren's Grove. Dedication service was held for the Asbury educational plant by Bishop Paul N. Garber. Parkwood Methodist Church has held a groundbreaking service; Brooksdale Methodist Church is ready for the dedication of the educational building.

We have spent on church buildings, indebtedness on church buildings, parsonages, and indebtedness on parsonages this year a total of \$335,126.

Land: Asbury Methodist Church has purchased an additional lot for parking space. Parkwood Methodist Church has paid for its church site. Carrboro Methodist Church has purchased two lots for parking space.

Parsonages: Epworth has purchased a new parsonage.

The Durham District continues in the growth of new industries, institutions and people. We are planning and working that we may meet the needs of the people we have and the people who are coming into our area. I am very fortunate in having an opportunity to share in the growth of the fellowship of the Durham District.

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

ROBERT L. JEROME, *District Superintendent*

As I come to the close of six years on the Elizabeth City District I feel heavily in debt to many people. First of all, I am indebted to Bishop Garber for giving me the privilege of serving this district and for his unflinching help and encouragement. He preached at our recent district conference and has visited our district on numerous occasions. I am indebted to 86 pastors with whom I have been privileged to work and for their fellowship, kindness, and cooperation. I am indebted to numerous laymen and laywomen who have shared our dreams and labors and have shared their hospitality with my wife and myself as we have visited churches in twelve counties. Above all, I am indebted to God who has given us strength and encouragement for our labors.

As I consider the combined reports of our 37 pastors serving this district at the present time I am deeply grateful to them for their efforts and accomplishments. I take pleasure in recording some of their victories.

So far (May 4) we have added 471 to our church rolls, 240 of them on profession of faith. We have lost 367 by death and otherwise, leaving us a net gain of 104. Our pastors have baptized 91 infants and have made over 20,000 pastoral visits.

Our church schools have an enrollment of 8,755 with an average attendance of 5,473. In the summer of 1964 we had 50 vacation schools with 2,234 enrolled. Our records show a subscription list of 467 for the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, 122 for *World Outlook*, and 227 for *Together*.

We have been busy studying missions this year with 64 church-wide schools of missions. Twenty-six charges have advance specials amounting to \$5,384. The film, *And On The Eighth Day*, owned by the district, has been shown in 23 charges. Thirty-one charges indicate that they will pay their benevolences in full. This is a gain over last year.

We have 65 organized Woman's Societies of Christian Service with 2,026 members. They have held 116 study classes. The work in this area goes along well with Mrs. Pauline Miller as the district president. The Study Jewel was given to our district this year.

The laymen's work is making progress under the leadership of Mr. John Turner, the veteran district lay leader. There are nine groups of Methodist Men with 229 members. One new group organized this year. Our officials attend training classes, and our lay speakers have a training school each year. The lay speakers fill our "silent" pulpits effectively.

A new education building (\$25,500) has been built at Newland and will be dedicated May 23. Two new parsonages have been built and occupied this year—one at Moyock (\$21,500), and one for the Pasquotank Charge (\$15,664). The education building at Mann's Harbor was dedicated on February 14.

Twelve charges have been involved in additions or renovations to their buildings. The amount spent on sanctuaries was \$18,222; on education buildings, \$4,285; and on parsonages, \$3,707, leaving a debt on these combined building projects of \$7,382.

Twenty-one charges have paid \$39,860 on debts on sanctuaries, \$35,469 on debts on education buildings, and \$15,900 on parsonage debts.

The South Camden Charge will be reduced to a two-point charge, leaving Perkins Church to go with Brite Meadows to form the Perkins-Brite Meadows Charge.

During the year we have lost two ministers by death: C. R. Olson, retired; and R. S. Bryan, a student at the Duke Divinity School.

Our pastors and lay members have been busy studying Ephesians and Bishop Short's book, *One Witness In One World*, as a part of the quadrennial program. As we go deeper we feel that we will be girded for the task of going farther along the road to Christian conquest.

FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

BARNEY L. DAVIDSON, *District Superintendent*

The following report is a tribute to the 53 devoted ministers and over 18,000 laymen of the Fayetteville District who have done an outstanding task this year.

Evangelism: As of May 2, 1965, we have added 906 and lost 565, for a net gain of 341. Of this number, 408 have been added by profession of faith. The pastors have baptized 203 babies. The "One Witness In One World" program was carried out on a sub-district basis among the pastors with meetings, implemented by sermons by all the pastors on Ephesians and study courses in almost every church. The study book, *One Witness In One World*, was used in various ways by the pastors. This self-study was of tremendous help to our churches.

Christian Education: The churches in the district have carried out a well-rounded program in this area with a church school enrollment of 12,960. Our church schools are using the new literature in the children's division and it has been received with great enthusiasm.

Missions and Church Extension: We have secured 50 new members to the Ten Dollar Club, and a special offering for Branch Street Church of \$471.85. One of the highlights in this area has been the giving of a mobile chapel, valued at \$15,000, to the Fayetteville District by Mr. Larry Carr, a layman. At the present time this mobile chapel, which consists of a sanctuary, three classrooms, a kitchen and a rest room, is being used by Asbury Church in Fayetteville. Next March the mobile chapel will be moved and used either for the starting of a new congregation or a relocated congregation, and it will continue to be used in church extension.

College Crusade: The people of the Fayetteville District are being kept ever aware of the need for regular and systematic support of our colleges. Several of our churches have paid already their quota in full. This is the aim and goal of every charge. With Methodist College located in the center of our district, we have a special interest in this work. We realize that with the tremendous growth of our fine colleges our responsibility to support them will be a continuous effort in the years to come.

Stewardship: Financially, the Fayetteville District has a marvelous report to make. At the present writing, it looks as though every charge will pay out 100%. Also, the churches have responded well to the appeal to increase their benevolent giving. It is anticipated that an increase of approximately \$7,000 over last year will be accepted by the churches. Pastors' salary and travel expense has been increased by \$11,115.

Buildings and Improvements: The lovely new district parsonage and office was completed last July and occupied on July 28. In addition to this, new parsonages were built for Chestnut Street Church, Lumberton (\$35,000), Marvin (\$17,000), Salem (\$29,000), Angier (\$14,500), Mamers Circuit (\$15,000), Culbreth Memorial (\$18,000), and Asbury Church in Fayetteville is buying a new parsonage (\$14,000).

Asbury Church in Fayetteville has relocated and is using temporarily the mobile chapel until they build this fall (\$40,000). Salem Church has installed a \$19,000 air-conditioning unit. Camp Ground Church occupied its new \$95,000 sanctuary last summer. Pembroke First is remodeling its church (\$15,000). Person Street Church is remodeling their church (\$21,000). Erwin has relocated and is to build a new sanctuary and remodel an education building with the total value of this project to approximate \$150,000. Gardner's Chapel has bought new property and is to relocate closer to Methodist College and build in the near future. Regans, on the Lumberton Circuit, is to add to its education building (\$10,000). Branch Street, Lumberton, hopes to build very shortly (\$35,000). Pineview at Lumberton plans to build a sanctuary soon (\$30,000). St. Andrews at Fayetteville will build a sanctuary and education building (\$80,000). Lillington Church renovated its sanctuary and education building (\$55,655). Olivet renovated its church. At Rowland a new \$10,000 organ has been installed.

Lay Activities: We have in Bob Allen one of the finest district lay leaders any district could have. He along with other laymen in the district are developing Camp Rock-

fish, as stated below. Mr. Frank Eason, associate lay leader for lay speaking, has handled the No-Silent Pulpit program in a superior manner. He set up a school for lay speakers and has carried out this entire program for our district.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: We have 2,746 members in our 62 societies. Mrs. W. F. Scarborough of Lumberton is our new president and great plans have been made to carry forward this important work. When the new districts were made at the last Annual Conference we lost our president, so for most of this year Miss Ethelynde Ballance, the vice-president, has led our women in an excellent way.

Camp Rockfish: Under the leadership of our district lay leader Bob Allen, Camp Rockfish is becoming a reality. Four hundred acres of land were purchased by the old Fayetteville District in 1958. The first unit of six cabins and a unit lodge are about completed and will be ready for use in July. Mr. Allen is expending over \$15,000 himself. Eight cabins to cost \$4,000 each have been given by individuals and by church groups in our district. The total pledged by the Fayetteville District is approximately \$60,000. It is anticipated that perhaps as much as \$100,000 will be raised in our district in the near future for this camp for our conference.

GOLDSBORO DISTRICT

M. W. LAWRENCE, *District Superintendent*

The report given represents the work of 50 ministers and the faithful laymen of the Goldsboro District. It is with pleasure I speak for them, lifting up some of the achievements of the year.

Evangelism: As of May 1 the pastors reported 884 new members received into their churches. Of these 434 were on profession of faith. Included in their evangelistic efforts were 81 revivals, 68 membership classes, and 116 programs of visitation. Five subdistrict workshops were held on evangelism by able laymen and ministers under the leadership of Tracey Maness, district director of Evangelism.

Education: In our church schools the average attendance remains about the same although our enrollment is down 284, due the correction of many rolls. Subdistrict schools for Christian workers have been held in the district. Most of the churches had vacation church schools, and the new literature has been well received. Over \$27,000 has been paid on the College Crusade Fund.

One Witness In One World: This quadrennial emphasis was stressed in our district preachers' meetings, in the district conference, in subdistrict meetings, and in personal conferences with ministers. Forty-two of our preachers led their congregations in the self-study. In a few instances the results were very good. Seven hundred seven copies of *One Witness In One World* and more than 1,200 copies of *Ephesians* were ordered. One hundred sixty-eight laymen helped in over 400 sessions of study.

Missions: There were 37 schools of missions held in the district with more than 2,400 people attending. The Ten Dollar Club has 13 new members, and over \$6,000 has been given for mission specials. The Woman's Society of Christian Service under the leadership of Mrs. L. H. Lane, has given good support to the missionary program of the district.

Lay Work: Our lay program is ably led by Robert G. Rose. There are 164 lay speakers who rendered splendid services during the "No Silent Pulpit" program. Approximately 400 attended the Lay Rally in February, and an offering of \$250 was received as a scholarship fund for a ministerial student.

Finances: Every charge will pay in full our obligations for World Service and Conference Benevolences. Acceptances for next year represent an increase of more than \$5,000 on World Service and over \$7,000 on salaries. Our Christmas offering which meant so much to our new churches was more than \$1,100.00.

Buildings and Improvements: A "Silver Chapel" has been erected at Coharie and services are now being held. The church will be organized soon after Conference with Rev. R. G. Ridaught as pastor. Two new parsonages at Four Oaks and Saulston have been dedicated by Bishop Garber; also the education building and social hall at Grace

and the education building and sanctuary at Bethany were dedicated by Bishop Garber October 7, 1964. Faison has bought a new parsonage for \$11,500. Mount Olive has completed an education building costing \$150,000, and St. Paul has completed an education building and has renovated the old building at a cost of \$400,000. The sanctuary will be renovated this summer. Other renovations have been made at Four Oaks, Faison, Calypso, Benson, Garris Chapel, Eureka, Yelverton, and Mount Moriah.

Plans for new buildings include education buildings at Saulston (\$20,000), Mount Carmel (\$8,000), Hethabara (\$22,000), Walker Memorial, Westwood, and eight more classrooms at New Hope. New sanctuaries are to be built at Whitley Memorial (\$42,000), Pine Forest (\$60,000), Daniel's Memorial (\$65,000). Our people have spent \$205,000 for renovations and have raised \$171,803 for new buildings and \$127,000 on debts.

The work has gone very smoothly during the year, and it has been a real pleasure and privilege to work with these good people and to serve Christ and His church in this area.

GREENVILLE DISTRICT

WILLIS R. STEVENS, *District Superintendent*

This, the first year of the new Greenville District, has been one of encouragement and inspiration. The organization of a new district involves many "firsts," since a great number of the major phases of the activities occur one time each year. The thirty-eight pastors of the sixty-nine churches have been a great source of strength and challenge to their new, inexperienced district superintendent. Their wonderful cooperation and understanding have aided tremendously to hasten the unifying of these churches coming out of four other districts. Assistance and guidance from them and other friends have made it possible for me to watch the unfolding of this district to its many possibilities for a glorious future. Bishop Paul N. Garber truly has no little place among my sources of encouragement. His wise counsel and direction through close and constant fellowship have been invaluable at the spots where the road became rough. I come to this place with a glad and grateful heart.

Evangelism: At the time of this report, 655 have been added to the membership of the churches, making a total of 15,134 Methodists in the Greenville District. Sixty-two revivals, thirty-three visitation programs and forty-four membership classes have been conducted. Over half of the churches report an increase in church attendance and one hundred three infants have received the sacrament of baptism.

Christian Education: There are 86 church schools with a total enrollment of 10,830. The average attendance in these church schools is 5,680 with the majority of these reporting an increase. One hundred sixty-three workers attended Christian workers' schools with 125 participating in the district vacation church school institute. The new Methodist material for children has been received and is being used with enthusiasm. Plans are now being made for a Christian workers' school in each of the five subdistricts.

Christian Higher Education: A great number of our members attended the district Higher Education Rally at North Carolina Wesleyan College. This and the assistance of our executive director of the Association of Colleges have revived interest and support of the colleges. To date, \$30,303 has been raised this year on the College Crusade.

Missions and Church Extension: Thus far 38 church-wide schools of missions have been conducted with several of the charges involving all the churches of the charge. Thirty-one new members have been added to the Ten Dollar Club. Several areas of the district have been checked as possibilities for new churches. Three of these areas are being considered for new churches as soon as possible. Sixty-seven Advance Special projects are being sponsored in the amount of \$10,423 with \$450 for other mission projects.

Christian Social Concerns: Several churches report active commissions on Christian Social Concerns. The activities and projects involve work with alcoholics, study groups in human relations, messages to the legislature in opposition to the proposal of liquor by the drink and distillery operation in the state, the distribution of literature and studies

on the United Nations. Several of our ministers attended the U. N. Seminar in New York and Washington.

Stewardship and Finance: Only three of the charges have expressed doubts of paying conference claims in full. Those have pledged every effort to do so. A majority of the churches have reported an increase in stewardship of giving and tithing members. To date 20 charges have reported \$3,785 increase in benevolences and 16 an increase of \$5,140 on salary for next year. Asbury Church has instigated a tithing program beginning with the Official Board. At this date, 75% of the members of this group are participating.

Lay Activities: The laymen, under the district lay leader, David Spier, have shown a wonderful spirit of cooperation and given invaluable support to the promotion of the program of Christ and his church. The district Lay Rally had 450 in attendance and 31 attending the Lay Retreat. The district has 137 lay speakers speaking in 37 churches which participated in the "No Silent Pulpit" program. There are 26 Methodist Men's Clubs with 657 members.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Our district president of the W.S.C.S., Mrs. Betty Edmon, has done an excellent job, with the cooperation of a wonderful staff, in perfecting 65 societies with 2,493 members. There are also six Wesleyan Service Guilds with 141 members.

Buildings and Improvements: Thirty-nine projects of building and improvement have been begun with 31 of these being completed. An amount of \$50,340 has been raised on buildings. The value of district property is as follows: churches, \$4,212,550; parsonages, \$979,600; other property, \$234,800; a total of \$5,422,950.

One Witness In One World: The pastors and churches have been most responsive to the "One Witness In One World" program. Many are reporting new life in the churches as a result of self-appraisal, personal renewal of faith and commitment to Christ and His church. Ephesians and the text have been presented in study groups, church school classes, the parish plan, sermons and special literature.

Projects: Farmville has purchased additional property and begun plans for a new education building. Edward's Chapel has installed stained glass windows. Aurora has purchased a new parsonage. St. James broke ground for a \$310,000 sanctuary and education building which will be completed in early summer. Williams Chapel is remodeling. Ware's Chapel has completed a new church and education building. Tabernacle has added a kitchen and other facilities at a cost of \$3,000. St. Mark has completed additional education building, fellowship hall and kitchen. Williamston has paid off its debts on old parsonage, \$3,616. Institute Charge has installed central heating at Trinity and brick veneered, re-roofed and landscaped Hickory Grove. First Church, Washington, has completed payment on a twelve-year debt in eight years. Jarvis Memorial has purchased additional lots and is making plans for additional parking space. Pink Hill has relocated, renovated and dedicated its parsonage and is now in the process of making plans for a new sanctuary and an addition to the education building.

New District Parsonage: The district has a very efficient board of trustees composed of nine men with E. Hoover Taft, Jr. elected chairman. With the guidance of this board, the district purchased a newly-constructed nine-room house with central heat and air-conditioning, on a corner lot, 150 x 150 feet, in the Lynndale Subdivision of Greenville. The purchase cost was \$38,500 plus \$2,600 for converting the double garage into offices. The district superintendent and family occupied this home September 24, 1964. The committee is in the process of completing the purchase of furniture. The district parsonage family is very grateful for the privilege of living in this new and very comfortable home.

NEW BERN DISTRICT

R. GRADY DAWSON, *District Superintendent*

For the pastors, laymen and good women of the New Bern District, I am happy to make this brief annual report. It has been the faithful work of all of these good people that makes this report possible. To all of them I want to express my deep appreciation.

I also want to pay tribute to the district staff for its fine work. Of necessity this report must be incomplete for it covers only ten months of the conference year.

In the realignment of the districts at the last Annual Conference, the New Bern District suffered a loss of 30% in membership, and even more in financial strength. In spite of this heavy loss, the remaining 43 pastors and 15,000 church members have closed ranks and moved forward in a fine way in every area of the work of the church. Unfortunately, many of the sacrifices and achievements of these good people cannot be put down on paper in words and figures. In the brief time and space allotted me, I shall list a few of the achievements in the various areas of the work this year.

Membership and Evangelism: In the area of membership and evangelism, the pastors and laymen have labored faithfully, and their labors have been rewarded. During the past 10 months, 915 persons have been received into church membership—360 on profession of faith and 555 otherwise, with a net gain of 321 which, percentage-wise, is better than last year. During this same period 167 babies and 137 youth and adults have been baptized, 62 revivals held, 51 membership classes taught, 56 periods of visitation evangelism conducted, and several units of "The Twelve" organized.

Christian Education: The church schools in the district are active and doing good work but have not shown as much growth in enrollment and attendance as in the area of church membership. This is a matter of deep concern on my part and in all the quarterly conferences I have given emphasis to the work of the church school. A fine program of leadership training has been put on this year through Christian workers' schools and subdistrict workshops. For much of this good work, we are indebted to the district staff. The church papers continue to go into the homes of our people and make a vital contribution to the ongoing of the kingdom. Our people continue to support our Methodist colleges as they pay on their pledges to the College Crusade. Several of the churches have paid their pledges in full.

Christian Missions: Our people continue to demonstrate their concern for Christian missions both at home and abroad by their increased giving to World Service and Conference Benevolences. At this time it appears that the churches of the district will accept the \$105,000 asking for next year. In addition to their World Service giving, our people are contributing about \$10,000 a year in mission specials. I also want to pay tribute to the good women of the district for their faithful and effective work in the Woman's Society of Christian Service. In the district we have 69 societies and 2,717 members.

Christian Social Concerns: In many of our churches this commission is becoming more active and meaningful. Our people are becoming increasingly aware of the importance of the work of this commission in the kind of world in which we live. More of our people are becoming aware of the fact that the time has come for the church to speak out and move forward helpfully and constructively in the important areas of temperance, human relations, world peace, and human welfare. All of us have a responsibility to help our people grow in their concern for and understanding of these vital areas of life.

Lay Activities: Lay participation in the program of the church in the New Bern District is increasing. Under the dedicated leadership of our district lay leader, Brother Ernest Smith, and his faithful associates, lay activities in the district are playing an important role in the total program of the district. We have many consecrated laymen who are giving generously of their time, talents and money to advance the kingdom. We have a fine group of lay speakers—137—who give freely of their time to fill vacant pulpits any time they are needed. We have 33 active men's clubs.

Building and Finance: In the areas of church and parsonage building, the New Bern District continues to move forward as is evidenced by the following list of building activities in the various charges:

ATLANTIC: A new sanctuary and education building erected and opened for use at a cost of \$110,000.

BEECH GROVE: Dedicated its parsonage.

BELGRADE: Extensive renovation of the sanctuary.

TABERNACLE: Erection of a new fellowship hall.

HARLOWE: Plans to renovate and enlarge the sanctuary and to build more church school rooms completed, and construction ready to begin.

FIRST, HAVELOCK: Purchased additional land for future expansion.

NORTHWOODS, JACKSONVILLE: Completed new fellowship hall which will serve as sanctuary, and erected additional church school rooms.

MAYSVILLE: Plans on drawing board for new sanctuary and education building.

MIDWAY: Acquired additional land for future expansion. Plans under way for new sanctuary and education building.

CENTENARY, NEW BERN: Plans for extensive renovation approved, work to begin right away.

TRINITY, NEW BERN: Official opening of beautiful new sanctuary.

POLLOCKSVILLE: Purchased an eight-room house for a parsonage.

BEULAVILLE: Official opening of beautiful new sanctuary and education building.

SALTER PATH: New education building under construction.

STRAITS: Extensive renovation and improvement of parsonage.

SWANSBORO: Construction of new sanctuary and education building to begin right away. Estimated cost \$150,000.

NEW BERN DISTRICT: To bring to a grand climax this impressive array of church and parsonage building, I am happy to report that the district superintendent and his wife have moved in to a beautiful, spacious and well equipped new district parsonage located at 1503 Kimberly Road, New Bern.

For all the building projects and debts the churches of the district have raised more than one-quarter million dollars. There will also be an increase in pastors' salaries of more than \$10,000.

Group Ministry: The ten Methodist churches in East Carteret County have been organized into a group ministry project which is proving very helpful to all the churches and communities involved.

These are only a few of the more evident accomplishments of the faithful ministers and laymen of the district which give eloquent evidence that the New Bern District is on the march. To these ministers and laymen I express my sincere thanks, and pray God's continued blessings upon them.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

NICHOLAS W. GRANT, *District Superintendent*

The 24,000 members of the 72 churches of the Raleigh District under the leadership of the 57 pastors have experienced a most successful year in the work of the church. At the beginning of the conference year certain goals were set up toward which we attempted to work. We are happy that under the leadership of our heavenly Father, we have been able to accomplish many of these goals.

Evangelism: During the first ten months of this conference year 467 have been received on profession of faith and 1,122 by transfer of letter. After all losses have been deducted, the churches of the district have had a net gain of 807. The most important emphasis in the field of evangelism has been the deepening of the spiritual life of the church. As a means of accomplishing this, the pastors of the district have taken the program, "One Witness in One World." All but two charges have held classes for the study of Ephesians in which 4,382 persons have attended. The 160 classes were taught by 199 laymen and pastors. At the time of the composition of this report, 1,165 members of the churches had participated in the study of "One Witness in One World." The remaining charges have plans to complete the study by the time of Annual Conference.

Missions and Church Extension: At the beginning of the year, we set as our goal, one new membership in the Ten Dollar Club for each charge. On May 1, we had secured 97 new memberships. One of the most outstanding accomplishments in the field of missions is being directed by the Raleigh Board of Missions under the leadership of Dr.

L. W. Aurand. During the year this group has secured the services of Miss Louise Kesler to direct its inner-city program. In order to gain adequate support for the work of the Board, the churches of Raleigh have been requested to contribute \$1.25 for each member on their rolls. St. Andrews Church, located south of Raleigh, was organized on January 4, 1965, and has a membership of 100.

Education: Over six hundred individuals participated in various worker improvement sessions during the conference year. We are happy to report an increase of 422 in our church school enrollment. The following churches have paid in full their College Fund quotas: Bethlehem of the Bethlehem-Shady Grove Charge, Hebron of the Macon Charge, Tabernacle Church of the Tabernacle Charge, Wesley Chapel of the Franklinton Charge.

Stewardship: Another goal for the district was 50% payment of all conference apportionments. On that date the district had paid 53%. At the time of the writing of this report we have only gratitude for the fine spirit of the churches as they have faced their responsibility in their acceptances for World Service and Conference Benevolences for next year. Many salary increases for pastors have been indicated in the last round of quarterly conferences.

Buildings and Improvements: Approximately \$100,000 has been raised by fourteen churches in the retirement of old debts. Five church buildings have been completed as follows: White Plains (\$75,000), Trinity, Franklin County (\$28,000), St. James (\$14,200), Franklinton (\$45,000), Cokesbury on the Middleburg Charge (\$15,000).

Edenton Street has purchased adjacent property for \$170,000 and Longview has purchased adjacent property for \$16,000.

The following churches have building plans which are to be executed in the days ahead: Westover, Plank Chapel, Cokesbury in Raleigh, Benson Memorial, Highland and St. Marks.

The following churches have constructed or purchased new parsonages: St. Marks, Benson Memorial, Mt. Zion, Hollands, Cary First for associate minister, and St. Andrews.

A special word of appreciation to Walter F. Anderson, district lay leader, and Mrs. John Crawford, district president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, for their superb leadership during this year. Both areas of our church life have enjoyed outstanding successes. To the 24,000 members who have been most cooperative as they have labored with the 57 excellent ministers, I wish to say, "thank you for a job well done."

ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT

J. W. PACE, *District Superintendent*

The work of the ministers and the churches of the Rocky Mount District for the conference year 1964-65 presents the usual done in an unusual way. The ministers and laymen have been usual in that some instances nothing was expected and nothing happened, but with the majority of ministers and laymen something was expected, and they went to work to make it happen. It is a trite statement, but it is true none the less, **THE MINISTER IS THE KEY MAN**. If the minister is enthusiastic and gives dynamic leadership, the church makes progress, but where pastoral leadership is static or negative, nothing happens.

Many fine things have happened this year in the Rocky Mount District in all the program areas of the church. A few of these are lifted up in the following report.

Membership and Evangelism: This area is listed first because of its importance. Early in the year the ministers met with Brother C. Freeman Heath and Brother Leon Crossno, the conference and district directors of Evangelism, respectively, and with the district superintendent to make plans for the program of Evangelism for the year. This program met with an enthusiastic response. All ministers were urged to give primary emphasis to the program of evangelism for this year. One goal was to receive at least one person by profession of faith into each church in the district. A revival meeting was to be held in each church, and each minister was urged to conduct two classes in training for church membership in each church—at Christmas and Easter. The membership statistics will show some progress has been made in membership and evangelism.

Christian Education: The Conference Board of Education under the leadership of Dr. C. P. Morris and his staff continues to give wise and effective leadership. The district staff, under the leadership of Reverend James Bailey, has done an excellent job of promoting the whole educational program of the church in the Rocky Mount District. Reverend W. L. Davenport is the director of adult work; Reverend E. M. Thompson, Jr. is the director of youth work, and Mrs. L. P. Jackson is the director of children's work. Each of them have given a great deal of time to promoting the work in their particular area. Standard training schools were conducted in all areas of the district, and a good attendance was reported. Church school institutes were conducted in the district, and plans and guidance were given for daily vacation church schools. The new literature for the Children's Division continues to meet with enthusiastic acceptance.

Christian Higher Education: Under the optimistic and inspired leadership of Reverend James Auman a new wave of enthusiasm has been set off among the ministers and laymen of the Rocky Mount District in behalf of supporting our Methodist colleges. More and more our people are coming to see that if our young people are to continue to find a place in college, our church must continue to undergird the colleges. This is a never-ending task, and the Methodists of the Rocky Mount District are indicating increasing support for our colleges. In the near future we hope to meet our commitment to the colleges in full.

Missions and Church Extension: Reverend W. Junius Neese is the district missionary secretary, and he has promoted this cause in the district in a superb manner. All the causes of missions—World, National, MCOR, and Conference, as well as Church Extension—have been presented. The report of the Ten Dollar Club will show how many new members have been added. The needs are great in each of these areas, and our preachers are leading their people by information and inspiration to do the job in a more effective way. Rev. and Mrs. W. Junius Neese were the leaders for the European Youth Caravan last summer, and their report was an inspiration to all who heard it.

Quadrennial Emphasis: "One Witness in One World." This is the motto and the emphasis of the Methodist Church for the quadrennium, and it is with a burning faith and zeal to make this hope become a reality that we set ourselves to the task of personal and collective re-examination. Christ is set at the very center of this program, and He must come to His rightful place in the hearts of both ministers and laymen if the church is to meet the needs of the present age. Chief credit for the dynamic and inspiration for this new program in our conference must go to Bishop Paul N. Garber. Early in December Bishop Garber made it possible for the Cabinet to go to Atlanta for a Jurisdictional workshop on the quadrennial program, and out of this meeting came an inspiration that has molded the thinking and action of each district superintendent. As a follow-up to Atlanta, I met with a few ministers of the district for a sharing and planning session. Out of this planning session, the program for the district was perfected. All of the ministers were then called to a meeting and the program was presented. Two two-hour subdistrict meetings were conducted in each of the five subdistricts. On the first evening the program dealt with the Introduction to Ephesians and the contents of Ephesians. On the second evening the book, *One Witness in One World*, was presented. The ministers and selected laymen attended these meetings, and these were to provide the core of leadership for the study of Ephesians during Lent, and *One Witness in One World* from Easter to Pentecost. Each church in the district participated in this program. The ministers of the district provided the leadership for the subdistrict workshops, and each minister was responsible for this program in his church.

Stewardship and Finance: Promotion and Cultivation has done an exceptional job in the film, "And On The Eighth Day," and this film has been used by each charge in the district prior to the time of setting the budget for the coming year. This film presents in a very dramatic way the total program of the Methodist church and its areas of service. Most of the churches of the district have accepted an increase in World Service and Conference Benevolences and in pastor's salary. All of the churches have accepted the asking for Ministers' Moving Fund. Most of the churches have accepted their askings on Interdenominational Cooperation and Ministerial Education. The ministers and laymen of the district are to be commended for their loyalty in this area.

Christian Social Concerns: Rev. E. M. Thompson, Jr. is the district director of Christian Social Concerns, and he attended a meeting of this Board in Washington, D. C., early in the year. At a conference-wide meeting held at the Edenton Street Methodist Church, the program was concerned with the subject, "Christianity and Communism." It was one of the most informative and inspiring programs that has ever been presented in our conference.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service: Under the leadership of the district president, Mrs. L. G. Hooks, the WSCS has made marked progress this year. There is no more loyal and hard working group in the church, and I commend Mrs. Hooks and her faithful women for the sacrificial service they have rendered to the church during the past year.

Lay Activities: Mr. L. Taylor Oakes of First Church, Roanoke Rapids, is the new district lay leader for the Rocky Mount District, and he is to be commended for his fine work this year. Brother Oakes has been most cooperative, and he has given excellent leadership to the laymen of the district. He has a fine group of associate lay leaders in several parts of the district. The No Silent Pulpit program was very effective this year, and the lay speakers of the district deserve high praise for their efforts.

Building and Repairs: Englewood Methodist Church completed and began use of its new sanctuary in January. The following churches have new education building units or additions: Bailey, Corinth on the Calvary Charge, Tabor on the Hawkins-Tabor Charge, Middlesex, Bethany and Zion on the Milwaukee Charge, South Rosemary on the Roanoke Circuit, and Clark Street. Conway, Elm City and Spring Hope have redecorated their sanctuaries. Mt. Pleasant has added an addition and installed a new heating system to the parsonage, and West Nash has purchased a new parsonage. A great many other charges have made improvements on both churches and parsonages.

SANFORD DISTRICT

VERGIL E. QUEEN, *District Superintendent*

The Sanford District, created by the 1964 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, is composed of five counties—Lee, Moore, Montgomery, Richmond, and Scotland. In this area there are 19,238 Methodists in 86 local churches grouped in 46 pastoral charges. These Methodists and their pastors submit the following facts as their Sanford District report for 1964-65:

Membership and Evangelism: During the year 81 revivals have been held; 40 visitation evangelism campaigns conducted, and 61 membership training classes enrolling 386 persons were taught. During the year there were 326 baptisms—147 infants and 179 others. Total additions were: 347 on profession of faith; 98 from other denominations, and 253 from other Methodist churches—a total of 698. Net gain for the year was 214.

Christian Education: There are 80 church schools enrolling 13,640 pupils. There are 1,502 members of the Methodist Youth Fellowship. Vacation church schools have been planned for 83 of the local churches. Special offerings were: Christian Education Sunday, \$887; Methodist Student Day, \$322; and \$24,076 was raised on the College Crusade quotas.

Missions: Acceptances for the year on World Service and Conference Benevolences were \$149,884. Total acceptances for the seven Benevolences were \$213,423. Advance Specials amounted to \$7,149 as follows: World Missions, \$2,688; National Missions, \$469; and Conference Projects, \$3,992.

There are 70 Woman's Societies of Christian Service with slightly more than 3,000 members who have pledged \$15,000 toward their work. There are 10 Wesleyan Service Guilds with 226 members who have pledged \$1,200 toward their work.

Special offerings received for Missions were: World-wide Communion, \$687; Race Relations, \$497; and One Great Hour of Sharing, \$759. Increased acceptances on World Service for the ensuing year are \$5,000 at this writing.

Building Projects: Two new churches were completed and opened during the year. First Church, Troy Circuit, and Highfalls Church, Glendon Charge, were opened for worship. First Church cost in excess of \$50,000 and Highfalls near \$60,000.

Central Church, Caledonia Charge, and Laurel Hill completed and opened their new education annexes. Smyrna Church completed its education building begun the previous year and Pleasant Hill will soon enter its splendid new education addition. Trinity Church, Troy, is radically remodelling its original education facilities.

First Church, Rockingham, is completing a new parsonage costing more than \$35,000. During the year \$94,098 has been paid on old debts; \$107,348 for new church improvements; and \$28,662 for parsonage improvements.

Lay Activities: Lay activities have been promoted by Mr. Joe Stowe, the district lay leader, ably assisted by a most competent group of associates. The district Lay Rally was a splendid success and the Lenten lay speaking schedule was expertly directed by Mr. W. B. Davis.

Summation: There are many challenges that confront us. These facts suggest more than they say about the good Methodists of the Sanford District. We do not see all our goals realized, but we push on hoping to persevere in faith and doctrine, in stewardship and mission, and in commitment and loyalty to our Lord and Christ.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Clyde S. Boggs, *District Superintendent*

The report of the wonderful Wilmington District has been possible through the valiant efforts of the members of the district staff. Without their coordination, cooperation and loyalty this report would have been less successful. Thank you, staff members, for your loyalty.

Christian Education: R. L. Nicks, Mrs. R. L. Nicks, Mrs. A. R. Crow, Belton Joyner, and Charles Lancaster have kept before the district and subdistricts the goals of the conference. Through district and subdistrict meetings with the help of our conference board members, we have lifted our church to a higher level of thinking and living. The Columbus subdistrict is more active than any of our other subdistricts. Our MYF rallies have been most encouraging and helpful.

College Development Crusade: Many of our churches through the rallies have taken on new life and have made special payments on their college pledges. Our district director, Fred Davis, is leading us, with his church at the top of the list of contributors.

Church Extension: One church has been organized, West View in Pender County. Sharon has been completed and paid for and will be dedicated soon. Hallsboro has completed and paid for a new education building. Bethesda has started a new church and will complete it this ensuing year. Magnolia has completed a new parsonage. Whiteville and Chadbourn will have new parsonages next year. Burgaw has started a new education building. Wrightsville Beach has completed plans and will start building in the ensuing year. Kenansville paid its indebtedness. Improvements have been made in most of our churches and parsonages. Keep up the good work.

Missions: Under the supervision of J. C. P. Brown, we have had a most inspiring year in missions. Seavy Carroll, Jack Martin and Ed Smith were brought into our district and subdistrict rallies. Grace had a week of missions which informed, inspired and encouraged all who participated. Many of our churches observe the fourth Sunday as mission Sunday. Eight thousand dollars has been given to mission specials. Elizabethtown gave \$750 to Seavy Carroll for Southern Rhodesia to help build a church in his mission field.

Evangelism: Under the spiritual leadership of C. B. Hutcherson, we almost reached our goal of no barren churches. Our Columbus County revival was an enlightenment to the whole district. Harry Denman in his peculiar way kept us alert to new opportunities. We have received over 300 on profession of faith. Sunset Park received the largest number, followed closely by Wrightsville Beach and Wesley Memorial. Wrightsville Beach received the largest net gain. One hundred twenty-four babies were baptized. We have had a net gain of more than 300 members.

Lay Activities: Wade Pierce and his dedicated lay leaders are optimistic about the future of the Wilmington District. The lay rally was most successful. The period of no

silent pulpit was outstandingly successful. Many very favorable comments were made in regard to these services. Our fine laymen have answered many calls to fill vacant pulpits for preachers on leave and who have been too sick to preach. Thank you, good laymen.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. A. E. Goldfinch in her persuasive personal manner has led the women in a year of varied achievements. These lovely workers in our church, who are always ahead of what is expected most of the time, pleasingly surprised themselves. Thank you, Mrs. Goldfinch. Mrs. J. A. Murdock has been elected to carry on the good work. She comes to us well qualified and willing to keep our work moving forward. We welcome her and pledge our cooperation.

May God continue to bless us and may we always be kind to all.

REPORT OF APPROVED SUPPLY PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1964 session of the Approved Pastors' School was held on the Duke campus July 13-August 7, with a total enrollment of 130. By conferences, the enrollment was: North Carolina, 39; Western North Carolina, 31; Virginia, 27; West Virginia, 15; South Carolina, 11; Holston, 6; and Florida, 1.

The enrollment by courses was: License to Preach, 9; Introductory, 26; First Year, 28; Second Year, 18; Third Year, 25; Fourth Year, 24; and Special, 1.

The full Methodist Course of Study was offered, including the Studies for License to Preach. Members of the faculty were David Bradley, Robert W. Bradshaw, James C. Cox, Thor Hall, Louis W. Hodges, O. Kelly Ingram, Thomas A. Langford, Robert T. Osborn, McMurry S. Richey, John J. Rudin, Bernard C. Russell, Harmon L. Smith, and Howard C. Wilkinson.

Awards for the Randolph E. DuMont Design Program were presented to J. Hyatt Hammond & Associates for the Pisgah Methodist Church, and to Frank I. Ballard for the Pine Valley Methodist Church.

Members who attended the Architectural Conference at Lake Junaluska last summer found it most meaningful and look forward eagerly to another such conference in July 1965.

Church agencies, architects, and ministers work with the Director of the Duke Endowment Rural Church Program to assist churches in planning the best possible facilities, both from a structural and a financial standpoint.

We feel it is important to call to the attention of the beneficiary members that the Department of Internal Revenue ruled in January that payments made by beneficiary members was not deductible as a contribution; also any benefits received is not taxable. Payments made by non-beneficiary members are considered a deductible contribution.

At the 1964 Annual Conference, the scale of making mortuary payments was revised so that for each call payment would be made at the rate of one-tenth of one percent of total salary, including travel and utility fees. The maximum payment was to be \$10.00 per call. During the past year, many have suggested that the maximum payment is too high, therefore, we are recommending the following amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution:

As of July 1, 1965, each mortuary assessment shall be one-tenth of one percent of the total salary paid, including the apportionment for travel and utilities. This shall be \$1.00 per \$1,000.00 to be rounded off in the following manner: from \$1,000-\$1,500, \$1.00; from \$1,501-\$2,500, \$2.00; \$2,501-\$3,500, \$3.00; from \$3,501-\$4,500, \$4.00; \$4,501-\$5,500, \$5.00, etc.

All connectional men shall make payment on this same scale. Any funds they receive that are designated for housing or secretarial help shall not be included in the total salary.

All retired ministers shall pay a mortuary fee of \$2.00 per call. Any retired minister serving as an approved supply, or in a connectional office, shall make payment at the rate of one-tenth of one percent of the salary paid, in lieu of the \$2.00 indicated for the retired men.

With the adoption of this scale of payment, we recommend the mortuary benefit paid to be \$1,650.00.

We call your attention to two new resolutions being offered:

1. All assessments must be paid in full each year by the time the Annual Conference adjourns. For clarity, a member who, at the time of his death, has paid all calls due except for calls issued during the last forty days of his life, is considered paid up. Beneficiaries of members not thus paid up are not eligible to receive any benefits from this Brotherhood.

2. The Brotherhood is to be open, permitting new members to join any time prior to their fiftieth birthday. After age 50, membership is closed. Each new member joining will pay an initiation fee of \$2.00 and make one mortuary payment, according to salary, before he is enrolled.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Its purpose and achievements in the North Carolina Conference, SEJ

The general purpose of this Board is set forth in the Methodist *Discipline*: "Through all of its history Methodism has sought to relate the gospel which it has preached to the life of its members and to the communities in which they lived. It has sought to follow Christ in bringing the whole of life, with its activities, possessions, and relationships, into conformity with the will of God. To lift up before the members of the church and also the secular world the Christian concern for personal, social, and civic righteousness, to analyze the issues which confront the nation and the world as well as the local community and the person, and to propose Christian lines of action, there shall be a BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS."

In fulfillment of this responsibility, the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns has made significant progress this 1964-65 conference year through the following projects and activities:

1. The Board has promoted the observance of four special days: Labor Sunday, World Order Sunday, Race Relations Sunday, and Commitment Sunday through mailing of materials including the Social Creed and the Social Pronouncements of the 1964 General Conference.

2. A most successful conference convocation, "Christianity Confronts Communism," was held at Edenton Street Methodist Church March 1, 1965. Nearly 1,000 laymen and ministers attended this event which was jointly sponsored with the conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and the conference Board of Lay Activities. Speakers included Bishop Paul Garber, Dr. Franklin Littell of Chicago, Dr. Creighton Lacy of the Duke Divinity School, Mr. Arbor Gray of the FBI, and Mr. Frank R. Barnett of the National Strategy Information Center of New York City. This convocation examined communism from a Christian perspective and sought to show with responsibility Christians can effectively challenge the threat of communism and the conditions that breed it.

3. Eleven members of the conference board attended and participated in the second Quadrennial Methodist Convocation on Christian Social Concerns in Washington, D. C., October 1964, and our Division of Peace and World Order vice-president attended the Methodist United Nations study tour in New York City.

4. Our board president is an active ex officio member of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Committee on Christian Social Concerns and served as a member of the Lake Junaluska Regional Conference Planning Committee. One of the vice-presidents, Dr. Cecil Robbins, is an active member of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns.

5. The board has mobilized and urged local church action and support on behalf of North Carolina General Assembly legislation to abolish capital punishment and also bills pending before the General Assembly providing for the building and staffing of three alcoholic rehabilitation centers in our state. Active support has been given to the North Carolina Good Neighbor Council and Methodist laymen and ministers have been urged to encourage the General Assembly and the Joint Appropriations Committee to appropriate funds in the amount recommended in the A Budget sufficient to continue the constructive, creative work of the Good Neighbor Council for the 1965-67 biennium. The board has actively opposed General Assembly legislation to legalize for the first time in

our state, the building and operation of liquor distilleries. The Board of Christian Social Concerns' president and vice-presidents have testified before both House and Senate committees regarding the above proposed legislation and have assisted in scheduling other Methodist laymen and ministers to speak at hearings before General Assembly committees. The board has also communicated directly with every member of the General Assembly registering Methodist Christian convictions regarding several pieces of pending legislation.

6. This board joined with the Western North Carolina Methodist Conference in sponsoring a full page ad in the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* promoting a local church observance of Commitment Day.

7. The Board of Christian Social Concerns is now a member organization of the State Legislative Council which studies, initiates and supports legislation of interest to its member organizations. Other member organizations include the North Carolina Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Western North Carolina Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns, the North Carolina Council of Churches, the North Carolina Mental Health Association, North Carolina Public Health Association, etc.

8. Three copies of the new sound filmstrip, "The Church and Christian Social Concerns," for use by local church commissions and official boards as a basic introduction to the work of the Christian Social Concerns have been placed in the conference TRAFCO library in the Methodist Building, 1307 Glenwood Avenue, Raleigh, North Carolina. Copies of the sound filmstrips, "The Church and Gambling" and "Under the Flag," have also been purchased and put in the TRAFCO library.

9. Two hundred packets including resource materials giving background information on extremist groups and answering the malicious charges these groups are making against the churches have been mailed to 200 key conference laymen and ministers.

10. Officers of this board led a seminar on "Alcoholic Beverages in a Mass Society" at the annual North Carolina Methodist Student Movement Conference held at West Market Street Church in Greensboro.

11. Six members of our conference were given scholarship assistance to attend the recent North Carolina Council of Churches-sponsored United Nations study tour in New York.

12. The 16th annual World Affairs Institute at Black Mountain, North Carolina, attended by 200 persons, was co-sponsored by your Board's Division of Peace and World Order. Reverend Rodney Shaw of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns, Division of Peace and World Order staff, spoke to this group under our auspices.

13. In cooperation with the conference Board of Education, Youth Department, a workshop group on the subject, "A Christian Critique of Communism," was presented under this board's leadership at the North Carolina Annual Conference session of the MYF at Duke.

14. This board joined with other conference boards and agencies in sponsoring and in providing leadership for the Conference Orientation Workshop for 50 new ministers at North Carolina Wesleyan College.

THE RECOMMENDED 1965-66 CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS PROGRAM

1. All local church commissions on Christian Social Concerns are urged to hold program-planning sessions during July-September using the May 1965 *Methodist Story* as a guide in setting up plans for studies, projects, and activities. Conference board officers and district directors of Christian Social Concerns are available as resource persons. The filmstrip, "The Church and Christian Social Concerns" (order from TRAFCO in Raleigh) and the new manual for this commission should be used and studied early in the year.

2. Local church Christian Social Concerns' leaders, pastors, and district directors are urged to attend the Southeastern Regional Conference on Christian Social Concerns at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, on July 5-8, 1965. Leadership for this conference includes Bishop Paul Hardin, Terry Sanford, Dr. Arthur Larson of Duke; Judge W. H. Maness of Jacksonville, Florida; Bishop Ellis Finger, Dr. Edwin Espy, general secretary of the National Council of Churches; and Dr. Dudley A. Ward, general secretary, Gen-

eral Board of Christian Social Concerns. Get applications from the Conference board president or Dr. Trigg James, Box 237, Lake Junaluska, N. C.

3. District Social Concerns workshops have been planned to train local church commission leaders and pastors in the organization and work of this commission. These have been scheduled as follows:

4. The four major special days should be observed in each local church: Labor Day Sunday—September 5; World Order Sunday—October 24; Commitment Sunday—November 14; and Race Relations Sunday—February 13. Social Concerns commissions should plan these using conference and general board of Christian Social Concerns suggestions, and distributing the Methodist General Conference pronouncements in local churches. It is recommended that copies of the excellent leaflet, "Does Your Community Need Liquor?" by William N. Plymat, president, Preferred Risk Mutual Insurance Company, Des Moines, Iowa, be distributed to Methodist congregations on Commitment Day. The facts and fallacies of "liquor by the drink" arguments are here exposed in a cogent and convincing style. All churches should distribute to their families copies of "The Methodist Church and Race" and "Charter of Racial Policies" (100 for \$4 from Service Department, 100 Maryland Avenue, N.E., Washington, D. C. 20002). "Mandates for Action" (\$.10, Service Department) and "The Bible and Race" (\$.05, Service Department) are useful for social concerns study.

5. A conference consultation on "The Methodist Church and Race" is planned for March 1, 1966, at Edenton Street Methodist Church in Raleigh. This project will be planned with the cooperation of the conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the conference Commission on Inter-jurisdictional Relations and the North Carolina-Virginia Conference of the Central Jurisdiction. The focus of this consultation is to be on the development of Christian attitudes and approaches to the race problem and on the need for racial inclusiveness in both churches and communities. This consultation should also provide help and guidance for local programs of study and action. It will also study the planning and preparation necessary for the ultimate elimination of segregation in the organizational structures of The Methodist Church. Conference, regional, and national Methodist leaders and resource persons will be invited to speak and share in discussions.

6. The Conference Board and the local church Commissions on Christian Social Concerns should join with the Commission on Missions and the Woman's Society of Christian Service in promoting the 1965-66 church-wide mission study, "Mission: the Christian's Calling." Fundamental to this study are four study books, study guides and other materials. The books are as follows:

Realms of Our Calling, by Howard Grimes
Babylon by Choice, by Martin Marty
The Word With Power, by Suzanne de Dietrich
Mission as Decision, by Bernard C. Ikeler and Stanley J. Rowland

These can be ordered for \$.75 from the Service Center, Board of Missions, 7820 Reading Road, Cincinnati, Ohio 45237. Consult the new manual for the Commission on Christian Social Concerns (page 22) for help in developing ways of implementing this important joint study.

7. Local church Commissions of Christian Social Concerns need to be alert to the activities and the charges of left-wing or right-wing extremist groups. Methodists need to

study and to understand the nature, the tactics and objectives of these groups. Men's Club programs, Sunday evening seminars, community civic club meetings and study groups should be set up for this purpose. Our conference board officers, the National Council of Churches (475 Riverside Dr., New York, N. Y., 10027), and the General Board of Christian Social Concerns (100 Maryland, N.E., Washington, D. C. 20002) will furnish materials, speakers, resource persons. A valuable study book is *The Strange Tactics of Extremism* by Harry and Bonaro Overstreet (available in paperback from Service Department). Also helpful is the document, "Sowing Dissension in the Churches"—a report on some of the individuals and groups engaged in attacks on the leadership of the churches (from the Episcopal Church Center, Department of Christian Social Relations, 815 Second Avenue, New York, N. Y. 10017). Dr. Henry Bullock, editor of Church School publications, The Methodist Publishing House, Nashville, Tenn., has published a valuable paper, "RE: None Dare Call It Treason," which answers in specific details the unfounded attacks and smears against The Methodist Church and the National Council of Churches. Methodists should know the truth behind the individuals and organizations who are aiding and abetting the communist conspiracy by spreading suspicion and doubt in this free land and undermining the faith of loyal United States citizens in their religious and political institutions.

DIVISION OF ALCOHOL PROBLEMS AND GENERAL WELFARE

The Division of Alcohol Problems in its report wishes to state again that its stand is unequivocal and clear with respect to the use of alcohol-containing drinks. In the historic words of Wesley to the Methodist Societies, it is reaffirmed that the Methodists "avoid drunkenness, buying or selling spirituous liquors; or drinking them . . ." We are encouraged by the forthright position of the 1964 General Conference which called Methodist Christians to total abstinence as a "challenge to a more disciplined life in Christ, a witness based on Christian love and concern." The General Conference further stated: "It is a matter of conscience and Christian responsibility. The Methodist stand is clear. We stand for total abstinence."

The increasing amount of scientific information concerning the noxious effect of even small amounts of alcohol on the human body, as well as the already impressive mass of information concerning the havoc that the disease of alcoholism, wrecks in the family structure, economy and spiritual life, lays a heavy moral and spiritual responsibility upon every individual Methodist to live an alcohol-free life.

During the past year, the division vice president was privileged to attend the Second National convocation on Christian Social Concerns in Washington, D. C., in October 1964 and participated in the seminars and workshops of that division. Commitment Sunday observance was actively urged this year, and it was carried out in a majority of the churches. Active support by contributions from local churches to the Good Shepherd Home, Lake Waccamaw, was encouraged. A number of sermons were delivered by the undersigned throughout the conference on the case for the alcohol-free life. Active lobbying has been carried out during the current legislative session (1965) in support of bills to establish three state-supported alcoholic rehabilitation centers, as well as mailings and active opposition being voiced to the proposed legislation to establish liquor distilleries and "liquor by the drink" in the state of North Carolina. It is felt that this is a year of fateful decisions in North Carolina where powerful financial and vested interests are striving mightily to further enslave this great state with specious economic reasoning.

We commend our Governor, the honorable Dan K. Moore, for his courageous and continuing opposition to the establishing of legal liquor distilleries and the sale of "liquor by the drink" in our state.

We express our appreciation to Mrs. R. B. Guthrie of Sanford, who is a leader in her local church Commission on Christian Social Concerns at Steele Street Methodist Church, for her initiative in requesting a public hearing on proposed legislation to legalize liquor distilleries in our state. Mrs. Guthrie's action and her intelligent, forthright testimony before the Joint Committee on Propositions and Grievances, expressing her opposition to this legislation is one excellent example of how we can effectively register our Christian conviction, and of the value of active, organized local church Commissions on Christian Social Concerns.

We also commend an outstanding Methodist layman, Eldridge Fergus, a well-known Wilmington restaurant owner, for his forthright Christian conviction and opposition to the efforts of the North Carolina Restaurant Association to lobby for changing North Carolina statutes to permit "liquor by the drink." Rather than conform to the North Carolina Restaurant Association's stand and thereby compromise his personal Christian position, Mr. Fergus resigned from his position as president of the Association.

It is to recommend that during the forthcoming year that the Division of Alcohol Problems and General Welfare continue to fight against the liquor traffic and all other forms of traffic in immorality such as pornographic literature or films or television programs which parade themselves off as modern art. The moral and spiritual climate of our state and our country and of every individual soul is only debased by such trash.

The Methodist Social Creed states:

"We believe that all persons have supreme value in the sight of God, and ought to be so regarded by us. We test all institutions and practices by their effect upon persons. Since Jesus died for the redemption of all men, we believe we should live to help save man from sin and from every influence which would harm or destroy him."

"We call upon the Federal Trade Commission to require warnings of health hazards on the labels of all alcoholic beverages, similar to those now being considered concerning cigarettes."

The goals of this Division are: education by every conceivable means as prevention against all debasing influences to which human personality is exposed; active support of all legitimate treatment programs which attempt to rehabilitate the alcoholic; and continued research and training in the areas of responsibility in our division. The increasing magnitude of the problems of alcohol and alcoholism, and other social vices perpetrated for economic advantage no longer allow for mealy-mouthed opposition but necessitates the adoption of militant approach, worthy of our forebears who spoke out against all forms of evil and vice.

We wish to commend the Christian Action League of North Carolina and to express our gratitude to Rev. D. P. McFarland, Director of the Christian Action League, and his associates, for their leadership and constructive educational approach to the alcohol problem. We desire to thank them particularly for their teaching program with the youth in our public schools and churches.

Furthermore, we urge the Commission on Social Concerns to continue to cooperate with the Christian Action League, and to study ways and means for a closer and more effective relationship with the above agency.

DIVISION OF PEACE AND WORLD ORDER

The General Conference in 1964 of The Methodist Church adopted the theme and program for the current quadrennium as *One Witness In One World*. We Methodists realize that we are living in a world whose size is rapidly shrinking as a result of ultra-modern methods of communication and travel; whose population is mushrooming as a result of advanced medicine and other healing techniques and whose future is more precarious because of mounting misunderstanding, selfishness, and lovelessness of so many people in all nations. We, therefore, believe the time has come to put the current quadrennial theme seriously at work in the areas of responsibilities assigned to this division: Foreign policy, United Nations and related international organizations, disarmament and nuclear weapons control, space control, economic aid and technical assistance, tariffs and trade, immigration and naturalization, military policy and conscription legislation, conscientious objectors and the draft, and Christian overseasmanship.

There is no witness without action. There can be no peace without peacemakers. Unless the threat of nuclear disaster is reduced by an active challenge of Christian conviction and skill, there shall be no world. If this possibility of world peril is averted, the church must use its unique and God-given opportunities with courage and consistency. This division, therefore, makes the following suggestions as projects and goals for the conference and local churches:

1. Become familiar with The Methodist Church's position and official statement on "Peace and World Order." Distribute this leaflet on World Order Sunday—October 24, 1965 (order from 100 Maryland Ave., NE., Washington, D. C. 20002).

2. Send your pastor or a key layman on a United Nations-Washington study tour on national and world affairs. The cost is approximately \$75.00 per person. (Write to the Methodist Office for the United Nations at 777 U. N. Plaza, New York, N. Y. 10017). All ministers are invited to attend the U. N. study tour sponsored by the N. C. Council of Churches.

3. See that the commission leads the local congregation toward a better understanding of the U. N. and its work for world peace. Consult *The Methodist Story* May 1965 issue for details and study materials on this year's emphasis on "Strengthening the U. N. and International Organization." Perhaps at no time has the United Nations and international organization been at a more serious crossroads. It is appropriate that this theme should be stressed on this international cooperation year.

THE DIVISION OF HUMAN RELATIONS AND ECONOMIC AFFAIRS

The Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs is concerned about race relations, civil liberties, public policy on education, church and state relations, civic responsibility, labor-management relations, agriculture, conservation, government and private economic policy and practice, technological change, unemployment, housing, and other matters that involve human well-being.

Race relations, particularly as they involve Negroes and whites, continue to be our most pressing problem in the South. The church is called upon as never before to provide a ministry of reconciliation in this tangled situation. The Methodist Church generally has set a good example in this area. Our problem and critical need now is to provide bolder and wiser leadership at the "grass roots," the local church and the community level. We call upon our pastors and laymen to take the initiative in setting up consultations wherever possible between churchmen of both races to mediate differences and to bring about justice and real Christian brotherhood. Unless Christians find the solution to our problems, there will be no solution.

The division commends the Good Neighbor Council in our state in its effort to solve racial tensions and its accomplishments in building confidence and cooperation between the races. We commend particularly a devoted Methodist layman, David S. Coltrane of Raleigh, who has provided wise, sane and distinctly Christian leadership in the Council.

The division also commends the work of the conference Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations and urges our Methodist people to support the transfer of Central Jurisdiction Conferences into the Southeastern Jurisdiction. We recommend that those churches in the North Carolina Conference (Central Jurisdiction) that lie within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) be transferred into the North Carolina Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) as soon as possible.

We urge strongly that our people support the Civil Rights Law of 1964 passed by the Congress of the United States and that they take a place of leadership in implementing the law in the institutions of the church and in the public institutions in the community. Wise and patient and calm leadership are urgently needed. Unless Christian forces work diligently, anti-Christian elements, namely, communists, Ku Klux Klan elements and other extremist groups, will lead our nation to further internal strife and ultimately to hopeless chaos.

We call upon all of our people to seek through prayer, through public worship, through good neighbor deeds and humanitarian service the mind and the spirit of Christ. The N. C. Methodist Conference views with deep concern the resurgence of the Ku Klux Klan in our state. Inasmuch as the Ku Klux Klan

- (1) foments hatred between Negroes and whites,
- (2) breeds disrespect for the Civil Rights Act of 1964,

- (3) nourishes ill will among Jews, Catholics, and Protestants, and
 (4) defames the Cross of Christ,

we strongly urge all Methodists not only to refrain from associating themselves in any way with the Klan; and also to use every opportunity to prevent this un-American and un-Christian organization from extending its evil influence in North Carolina.

We recommend that pastors and laymen participate in the Consultation on Race being planned by the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns during the 1965-66 conference year. We commend our Governor, the Honorable Dan K. Moore, who has pledged to continue the work of the Good Neighbor Council without reducing its budget or its program; and we pledge him our support as he continues to work for progress in good human relations in North Carolina and for the achievement of equal opportunities for all our citizens.

We recommend that each local church Commission on Christian Social Concerns take the initiative in all areas affecting human relations.

We recommend that each local church observe Race Relations Sunday in an appropriate way, including a generous offering for our Negro colleges.

REPORT OF THE INTERCONFERENCE COMMISSION ON COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY RELIGIOUS LIFE

It is our privilege to sponsor the Methodist Student Movement (MSM). This year the MSM has been in the middle of the mission of the church. At a fall retreat attended by more than 90 students and their leaders from 20 or so colleges, challenging messages were brought by the Reverend David Swain, minister to students in Tokyo, Japan. He had shown that his call to preach was a call to prepare, and he had never stopped that preparation. He saw that the mission is basically the same, whether in Chapel Hill or Tokyo, and that the need to make a Christian witness is enormous in either place. In that spirit, this missionary on furlough stimulated our students.

The mission was not forgotten. Students kept searching for the proper time and place to apply their talents to serve Christ. Tutoring projects were explored; letters were written on social concerns, including capital punishment and the Speaker Ban Law.

Students in some twenty schools began to project themselves into the day-by-day and week-by-week tasks of teaching those who for so long have been the victims of oppression. To the amazement of many students, a child who received tutoring in mathematics improved his grades in reading and spelling and other subjects also almost immediately. The knowledge that somebody cares is what counts. Few of these projects are directly under the auspices of the MSM, and not nearly all of the teachers are consecrated Christians. Some of them are students who have very little to do with the church because they have observed how the church in so many cases has refrained from making its witness in times and places of unpopularity and danger.

A North Carolina minister says that if it had not been for the interracial witness of the MSM when most of the rest of the church was silent several years ago, he probably would not be a minister now. But we have not reached enough such young men. Many in disillusionment have turned to other causes or given up in despair. More campus ministers are needed in order to make our witness more effective. The witness must be made wherever the way of freedom, dignity, and love is threatened.

During the year, as students conceived and initiated projects which involved Christian witness, they continued to search for what the mission of the church really is. The MSM State Conference had as its theme "Our Unquenchable Quest: Love That Lives." The speaking talents of William Mallard of Emory University, the dramatic talents of Walter Hudgins of Greensboro College, the dedicated leadership of some seminar leaders, and the organizing genius of several students combined to create the feeling expressed in F. W. Faber's hymn:

"For the love of God is broader
 Than the measure of man's mind,
 And the heart of the Eternal
 Is most wonderfully kind."

An ecumenical witness was made by the participants, including student representatives from several denominations, a minister from the Evangelical United Brethren Church, Dean Robert Cushman of Duke University Divinity School who spoke on the Vatican Council, and a grass-roots group of Roman Catholic laymen who presented the American Mass Program composed in the style of the Negro spiritual.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Edgar B. Fisher, N. C. Conference Secretary of Campus Ministry of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and many other dedicated laymen and ministers, thousands of dollars were raised to help send approximately one hundred students to the National Quadrennial Methodist Student Conference held in Lincoln, Nebraska, during the Christmas holidays. There, through fellowship with many others like them, our students were given a new vision of what it means to be in the middle of the mission of the church in the twentieth century. They received a new glimpse of the power they have in government and politics and of the necessity that conscience control our actions.

At the spring Leadership Retreat for the MSM of North Carolina new officers gathered and received instructions for their tasks. Leaders were from the North Carolina Council of Churches, the campus ministry, the local pastorate, conference boards of education and missions, and the overseas mission field.

Representatives from the General Board of Education of The Methodist Church have agreed to help the Interconference Commission in a study of our campus ministry in North Carolina. The initial part of the study, already under way in Chapel Hill, will be limited to a few Wesley Foundations.

At Chapel Hill the long-awaited modern building to house the Wesley Foundation will be opened in the autumn of 1965. This beautiful and spacious structure will include a chapel (with an organ donated by the Kresge Foundation), lounges, seminar rooms, a coffee shop, an art gallery, a library, a kitchen, guest rooms, and office space. Its design won the award for Methodist Student Centers at the National Methodist Student Conference in 1961.

Every school in the state has been invited to submit an estimate in the fall of 1965 concerning their needs five years hence and ten years hence, in order to enable the Interconference Commission to give a more realistic report to the commissions on World Service and Finance of the three Annual Conferences who supply our funds. Several Wesley Foundations and other groups already are engaged in this study. It is anticipated that the study will cover capital needs as well as program needs.

Developments taking place in the campus ministry in North Carolina include an added emphasis on securing and keeping qualified personnel to minister to students. A committee has been set up to explore training personnel, sabbatical leaves, and retirement.

We look with pleasure upon the fact that subscriptions to *motive* magazine in North Carolina have more than doubled during the past year. We commend our General Board of Education for producing this magazine of such high quality and for the pioneering way in which *motive* explores new ways of communicating the gospel.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The membership of the North Carolina Council of Churches is drawn from sixteen different denominations: General Baptist; Church of the Brethren; Christian Methodist Episcopal Church; Congregational Christian and Evangelical and Reformed, now merging into the United Church of Christ; Disciples of Christ; Episcopal; Friends; Lutheran Church in America; AME Zion; Methodist (North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences); Moravian; Presbyterian, U.S.; Salvation Army; United Presbyterian, U.S.A.; and eight individual congregations of the Southern Baptist Convention, namely, Binkley Memorial and University churchse, Chapel Hill; Lakewood and Watts Street, Durham; Pullen Memorial, Raleigh; Wake Forest, Winston-Salem; Zebulon at Zebulon; and Myers Park, Charlotte.

In January 1965 the Council's Assembly elected as president for a two-year term Bishop M. George Henry of the Episcopal Diocese of Western North Carolina.

Samuel S. Wiley, a minister of the Presbyterian Church, U.S., became executive director on June 1, 1964.

The Council continues to rely heavily upon the Methodist church for leadership. J. H. Crum, director of Christian Social Action, is a Methodist, as are the following:

Once again the Department of United Church Women has been very active, with a program focusing in three special occasions, World Community Day in November, World Day of Prayer in March, and May Fellowship Day. The women have been particularly interested in the support of the Council's migrant ministry, having given last year a fifth "Harvester" vehicle for use in this work and being now engaged in collecting enough trading stamps to secure yet another. The women also gave \$3,500.00 to the migrant ministry in 1964.

Other phases of the Council's program are carried out through committees, the General Committee on Public Relations, the General Committee on Business and Finance, and twenty-three program committees grouped under five commissions, as follows:

- Commission on Christian Education, Committees on Audio-Visuals, Camping, College Work, Family Life Education, Recreation, Scouting, Weekday Religious Education, and Youth Work
- Commission on Christian Social Action, Committees on Alcohol and Narcotics, Human Relations, Legislation and Public Morals, and National and World Affairs
- Commission on Christian Social Ministry, Committees on Ministry in Institutions, Ministry to Migrants, Ministry in State and National Parks, and Ministry for Overseas Relief (Church World Service and CROP)
- Commission on Inter-church Cooperation, Committees on Evangelism, Research and Strategy, Urban Church, and Town and Country Church
- Commission on Council Organization and Extension, Committees on Annual Meeting, Evaluation and Long-range Planning, and Ministerial Associations and Council of Churches

In a brief report such as this there is not space for even a sentence or two about each of these committees and the work which they have done. Reference will therefore be made to only one new development which is of special interest. Following a decision of the annual Assembly in January, the Committee on Ministry to Migrants submitted proposals to the Office of Economic Opportunity and was awarded a grant of \$270,444.00 for an expanded migrant program involving housing, day-care and homemaking services, sanitation, and education. Charles L. Herron, Methodist minister from Princeton, Fla., has been called to direct this project, which will have headquarters in Raleigh. The Council was the only agency prepared to undertake this program and will serve temporarily until other agencies can take it up. The Committee on Ministry to Migrants, now headed by Charles L. Kirby of Morehead City, has continued to work through local committees in the three areas centering in Morehead City, Elizabeth City, and Hendersonville in a very effective ministry. It is estimated that as many as 23,000 migrants come to North Carolina each year and that perhaps 150,000 pass through the state. The expanded program will seek to meet the needs of these people in the following counties: Chowan, Perquimans, Pasquotank, Camden, Currituck, Gates, Washington, Tyrrell, Beaufort, Pamlico, Craven, Carteret, Jones, New Hanover, Pender, Duplin, Wayne, Sampson, Surry, Stokes, Yadkin, Forsyth, Transylvania, Henderson, Polk, and Rutherford. The federal grant for migrant work will not mean a lessening of the Council's needs for this work, but rather an added financial load due to more committee meetings and the challenge of five new areas where chaplaincy services should be provided.

The Council's monetary needs are also increased by the growing work of Christian Social Action and the opportunity of instituting a weekly religious TV newscast. The budget for 1965 of \$55,581.00 represents an increase of \$11,081.00 over the previous year. To finance this increase the Executive Board has adopted the Proportionate Percentage Plan of support by the member bodies. By this plan the total giving of all member bodies to current expenses and benevolences (but not including capital building funds) is divided into that portion of the Council budget expected from the denominations to secure a percentage, and this figure is applied to the total giving to current expenses and benevolences of each member body to determine its proportionate share of Council support. The Finance Committee is making an effort to secure special contributions to meet the Council's needs until the new plan can become effective. The tentative budget for 1966 is \$60,000.00.

The North Carolina Council of Churches has proved itself a useful instrument for the united witness of its member churches to the Lordship of Jesus Christ over all of human life. It is commended to the prayers and loyal support of those who seek that kingdom.

Our Deaconess Board, in connection with the 25th anniversary of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, is much concerned about the goal of recruiting at least one new deaconess within our conference by 1966. We stand ready to cooperate in any way with our Conference Commission on Christian Vocations in recruiting church-related workers.

We accept the challenge to continue to present deaconess work to youth in local churches, in district and conference rallies and vocational conferences. We must continue to stress the importance of the Committee on Christian Vocations in the local church. We always feel the need to interpret the deaconess relationship. We must use every opportunity to present "call" to the deaconess relationship to all women employees of the church, and to business and professional women in the church.

We are thankful for the progress and the blessings of the past year, and for the challenge which is before us!

Section A

COMMITTEE ON GENERAL CHURCH SCHOOL WORK

W. H. KIRBY, *Chairman*

I. Report For 1964-65

A. Twenty-seven Christian Workers' Schools have been held this year with twelve laboratory observation courses being offered. It is hoped that pastors will give full support to these schools, for they provide excellent training if planned properly and promoted intelligently.

B. A Coaching Conference for prospective instructors in the Children's Division was held in September at Camp Chestnut Ridge.

C. Church School Institutes for all officers and teachers were conducted on a sub-district level throughout the conference, and over 2,200 persons trained in such.

D. We had delegates at the leadership and laboratory schools at Lake Junaluska last summer. Approximately thirty persons from the conference were enrolled in the leadership section and four persons were certified as laboratory instructors.

E. A conference-wide laboratory school with five courses was held during the summer at North Carolina Wesleyan College, with sixty-six persons enrolled.

F. Consultations by the district staffs and the conference staff were held during the year. The conference staff conducted twelve consultations on planning church school buildings.

G. A two-day pilot conference for ministers on the Nature and Mission of the Church

was attended by forty-six ministers. Thirty-six laymen attended a week-end conference on the "Ministry and the Laity," which was sponsored by the Board of Education and the Board of Lay Activities. Dr. Howard Grimes of Perkins School of Theology of Southern Methodist University was resource leader for these two conferences.

H. We have cooperated with the other conference boards in the New Pastors' Orientation Conference.

II. A New Day in Christian Education

THE CALL: "The General Conference in 1964 summoned every church in Methodism to a self-appraisal of its mission and ministry to its community and to the world. Each church is called to look with courage and penetration at itself in the light of what Christ expects of those who confess him as Savior and Lord.

"The General Board of Education of The Methodist Church now calls upon all of our churches to prepare for 'a new day' in Christian education . . . We call upon churches to prepare to give more adequate time for teaching children, youth and adults, moving toward the day when there will be at least one hundred hours of class study for all of these persons each year.

"We call upon the churches to study the new kinds of approaches in learning, new ways of guiding groups, new techniques in leadership, and coordinated administration to the end that they may create a better climate for learning the Christian way of life.

"We call upon local churches to prepare now for the introduction of new curriculum resources for youth and adults which will correlate with that already introduced for children. This curriculum based upon the new *Design for Methodist Curriculum* (427-E) will appear in the fall of 1967." (Maturity, Winter 1965).

The Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference enthusiastically endorses this "Call" of the General Board of Education and recommends each local church to prepare for significant changes in its educational ministry. To assist local churches in making these changes we offer the following calendar of proposals:

A. Summer, 1965:

1. Seminar at Duke University, August 2-6, for resource leaders to serve as interpreters of this "New Day."
2. Training session for leaders of Annual Conference Coaching Conferences on new leadership course, *Helping Adults Learn*, Lake Junaluska, August 2-7.
3. Workshop on new curriculum for adults for selected local church teams, Lake Junaluska, August 9-14.
4. A Regional MYF Seminar, Lake Junaluska, August 25-31, will explore new trends in youth ministry and related program-curriculum.

B. September, 1965:

1. Promotion of the "Call to a New Day in Christian Teaching" in literature and other mailings.
2. Coaching Conference for instructors of new course, *Helping Adults Learn*.
3. Christian Education Sunday, September 26, with emphasis on offering for supporting training of leaders and conducting seminars on "New Day."
4. One-day consultation on curriculum resources for adults for selected local church people.
5. Listening posts on curriculum resources for youth for selected local church workers with youth.

C. October, 1965:

1. Christian Workers' Schools should offer new course, *Helping Adults Learn*.

D. November, 1965:

1. Methodist Conference on Christian Education, Netherlands-Hilton Hotel, Cincinnati, Ohio, November 8-13, for selected conference leaders, dealing with the *Design for Methodist Curriculum*.
2. District Seminars for Pastors, November 29-December 3, to interpret the "New Day" and the Design of Methodist Curriculum.

E. February, 1966:

1. Get-ready Seminar, February 21-25, to prepare Annual Conference teams for involving local churches in the "New Day in Christian Teaching."

F. *Spring, 1966:*

1. Church school administrators week-end seminar to prepare the local church for changes for the "New Day in Christian Education."

G. *Fall, 1966:*

1. Christian Workers' Schools continue to offer the new course, *Helping Adults Learn*.

2. District Workshops for pastors, church school administrative workers, members of the Commission on Education, and others to consider changes in scheduling, grouping, administering the program and preparing the local church for change.

H. *Winter and Spring, 1967:*

1. Train district consultants who will visit local churches to assist in implementing new plans and developing new approaches to the educational ministry.

I. *Summer, 1967:*

1. Laboratory Schools using new curriculum materials for youth and adults.

2. District and Subdistrict meeting of teachers of youth and teachers of adult groups to prepare for the first unit in the new curriculum.

3. Visits of district consultants to local churches to help leaders make final plans for beginning the use of the new curriculum materials.

J. *September, 1967:*

1. The beginning of the "New Day in Christian Education."

2. All adults and youth will begin using the new literature.

III. Recommendations For 1965-66

A. *Christian Workers' Schools*

Believing that Christian Workers' Schools provide one of the most effective ways of training leaders for the church and church school, and that these schools can be most helpful in preparing our people for the "New Day in Christian Education," we call upon the pastors, church school superintendents and Commission on Education chairmen to support these schools by participating in the planning sessions, eliminating conflicts in their local church calendars, pre-enrolling their people and encouraging them to attend all sessions. Our goal continues to be an annual school in each subdistrict area.

B. *One-Teacher Schools*

We strongly recommend that smaller churches take advantage of One-Teacher Schools for leadership training.

C. *Local Church Leadership Training*

We feel that the primary responsibility for leadership training lies within the local church. Therefore, we recommend that the pastor conduct classes for training leaders in certain basic courses, such as: "Life and Mission of the Church," "Christian Beliefs," "The Bible."

D. *Missionary Education*

Since the Woman's Society of Christian Service has now been reorganized and no longer has secretaries of youth and children's work, the responsibility for this missionary education of these comes under the work of the Commission on Education. In keeping with the recommendation of the Interboard Commission on Missionary Education of the Methodist Church, we recommend that the Commissions on Missions and Education in each local church have a church-wide School of Missions with classes for the children, youth and adults. We also recommend that district training sessions for instructing persons to teach these courses be held under the leadership of the District Missionary Secretary, the District Directors of Adult, Youth and Children's Work, and that such sessions be held in the fall and the schools be held in early January or February, 1966.

E. *Commission on Education Planning Retreats*

We recommend that a planning retreat for each local church Commission on Education be held for the planning for the year's work. The conference and district staffs will be available for help, if requested.

F. *Schools for Evangelistic Teaching*

We recommend and pledge cooperation with the Conference Board of Evangelism in its planned annual program, especially the schools for evangelistic teaching.

G. *Neighborhood 1 Program*

We recommend and pledge support to the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation in its promotion of Neighborhood 1 Program as adopted by the 1964 General Conference, and we offer assistance in every way possible, especially in the training of workers.

H. *Raleigh Inner-city Project*

We commend the Raleigh Board of Missions for its Inner-city Project, and suggest that other areas might consider similar programs. The following statement of this ministry is presented by Miss Louise Kelsler, director: "The Inner-city Mission is an attempt of the seventeen Methodist churches composing the Raleigh Board of Missions and Church Extension, Inc., to extend the ministry of the church into the community wherever persons have been prevented their potential as children of God. The task of this ministry thus falls into two areas: (1) To help the churches see their mission as agents of reconciliation in the world because of what God has done for us through Christ. (2) To express concern for the total need of all men and to provide the opportunity for them to achieve their full humanity as children of God. The current projects of the Inner-city Mission are as follows:

(1) A liaison person working in and with public and private agencies involved with, or concerned about, social action in the community.

(2) Working in city-wide program of basic adult education in cooperation with the local Industrial Education Center.

(3) Working with Jenkins Memorial Methodist Church to help extend its ministry in the community by working with older adults, expanding their Junior High program and training leadership.

(4) Working in the Manly Street area to develop a summer church-related program for all age groups and in the fall to establish an all-day care center. This will be a basis for other services.

(5) Exploring possibilities of a single older youth-young adult ministry.

(6) Developing a volunteer leadership for carrying out these projects."

I. *Church School Administrators' Conference*

We recommend that a week-end seminar for church school administrators be held in the spring of 1966 for training such leaders in specific areas of responsibility.

J. *Special Days*

1. Promotion Day in the Church School (August 29, 1965)

2. Christian Education Day (September 26, 1965) with a special emphasis on offering to support seminars 1966 for the new curriculum.

3. Student Recognition Day (December 26, 1965)

4. Race Relations Sunday (February 13, 1966) with a special offering for Paine College.

5. National Family Week (May 1-8, 1966)

6. Methodist Student Day (June 12, 1966) with special offering for Student Loan and Scholarship Funds.

7. World Service Sunday in the Church School (each fourth Sunday)

IV. *Relationship With the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference*

Believing that the time has come for a closer working relationship with our brethren of the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference, and that such a cooperative relationship will be mutually beneficial to both conferences, we welcome communication and cooperation between the leaders of these conferences. We rejoice in the close working relationship that has already been established between the Boards of Education staffs of these two conferences and recommend that they continue to plan joint leadership education enterprises and activities in such areas as:

Subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools; Coaching Conferences for prospective leadership instructors; Vacation Church School Institutes; Training Institutes for Teachers of Mission Study Courses; District Seminars for Pastors on "A New Day in Christian Teaching;" Subdistrict Training Sessions for church school officers, adult and youth teachers on the new curriculum; Summer Training enterprises for adults and youth; Convocation of adult workers with youth, etc.

We further recommend that the youth committees of the two conferences hold joint meetings for the planning of mutual youth ministries;

That the subdistrict and district youth councils be urged to include the youth of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference in their activities;

That the district Christian education staffs of our Conference Board of Education consult with the district workers of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference to discover ways in which they can be mutually helpful;

That district directors in the area of Christian education make their services available to the churches of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference in their respective districts working under the direction of the executive secretary of the Board of Education of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference.

V. Christian Education Sunday

Whereas Christian Education Sunday Offering, formerly called Church School Rally Day, is vital to the Conference Board of Education in its efforts to improve the teaching ministry of the local church, and

Whereas increased funds are needed to finance the expanding leadership training enterprises, including Christian Workers' Schools, Laboratory Courses, One-Teacher Schools for small churches, Local Church Consultations on Buildings, Equipment, Teaching Methods, Use of Curriculum Materials, Program Planning, Vacation Church School Institutes, Music Workshops, District and Subdistrict Institutes, Ministries to Persons of Special Needs and District Directors Services, and

Whereas the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church is calling upon all our churches to prepare for a "New Day" in Christian education; to prepare to give more time for the teaching of children, youth and adults; to study new kinds of approaches in learning, news ways of guiding groups, new techniques in leadership; to discover a new depth in biblical and theological foundations, a new recognition of the findings of psychology and the social sciences, a new relevance to world culture, and a new dedication to Christ and His gospel; to prepare now for the introduction of new curriculum resources for youth and adults which will correlate with that already introduced for children, and

Whereas increased funds are needed for an intensive program of orientation and training pastors, church school officers, and teachers of youth and adult groups to prepare for the "New Day" and the introduction of the new curriculum resources,

Therefore, we call upon all of our people, pastors and laymen, to give serious attention to the importance of increasing the Christian Education Sunday Offering.

We hereby request the Annual Conference to set as a minimum offering goal in each local church an amount equal to one per cent of the salary of the pastor and associate pastor, including travel and supplements received from Conference sources.

We call upon each local church to observe Christian Education Sunday and to receive a special offering using envelopes provided for this purpose, following an explanation of the purpose and importance of the offering.

We call upon churches using the unified budget plan, whereby all special offerings are put in the church budget, to include in their budgets the minimum amount requested above for this cause.

VI. Policy of Conference Board of Education Concerning Financial Support of Christian Workers' Schools

1. Financial support will be provided for all schools set up on a subdistrict or area basis involving at least four participating charges.
2. The Conference Board of Education will provide honorariums for one-half of all certified instructors of courses reaching the attendance requirement in accredited schools.
3. Only those courses having twelve or more pupils officially enrolled shall be counted in determining the number of instructors' honoraria to be provided by the Conference Board of Education.
4. As a special service for small churches, the Conference Board of Education will provide the full instructor honorarium (\$30.00) for One-Teacher Schools meeting

all the requirements set forth in the brochure entitled, "One-Teacher Christian Workers' Schools." The Executive Secretary shall determine whether or not a church is eligible for this assistance.

5. Certified instructors in accredited Christian Workers' Schools shall receive honoraria as follows:

- Three evenings with two one-hour class periods, \$30.00
- Four evenings with two one-hour class periods, \$40.00
- Five evenings with two one-hour class periods, \$50.00
- Laboratory Observation with a minimum of 16 hours teaching time, \$60.00.

VII. Executive Secretary

In recognition of his leadership in the field of Christian education, not only within our conference but on a national level, we recommend the reappointment of Dr. C. P. Morris as executive secretary of the Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference.

Section B

COMMITTEE ON CHILDREN'S WORK

MRS. JAMES A. AUMAN, *Chairman*

Progress Report For 1964-65

The committee on Children's Work has given emphasis to the following areas of need during the conference year 1964-65:

1. The program for introducing "Christian Studies for Methodist Children" reached its climax with the appearance of the new curriculum materials in September, 1964. These materials have been enthusiastically received and are bringing about a new and more effective ministry to the children of the North Carolina Conference.

(a) Forty-four subdistrict workshops were held in July for local church teachers.

(b) A Conference Laboratory School, using the new curriculum materials for children, was held at Rocky Mount, North Carolina, July 26-30, 1964.

(c) As a "check" to assist teachers with questions and problems relating to the new curriculum materials, a series of forty-six subdistrict meetings were held in November near the close of the first quarter.

(d) Through the Conference Director and the District Directors of Children's Work, consultation concerning the use of Christian Studies for Methodist Children is continuing.

2. The ministry to exceptional persons has continued.

(a) Resident Camp for Mentally Retarded Children and Youth was held at Camp Don-Lee, August 16-22, with 52 campers in attendance.

(b) A detailed report of the camp has been written by the Conference Director of Children's Work. This report has been published by the General Board of Education and is being used interdenominationally as guidance material in establishing and conducting similar camps.

(c) An article to encourage the establishment of additional church resident camps for retarded persons has been prepared by the Conference Director of Children's Work for distribution by the National Council of Churches for use in various denominational publications.

(d) The Conference Director of Children's Work has participated in a curriculum conference to explore the needs for materials in this ministry. He has written one curriculum unit to be used experimentally with retarded persons.

(e) One local church has been assisted in the establishment of a week-day program for pre-school mental retardates.

3. Eleven camps for junior boys and girls were held during the summer of 1964, with three hundred ninety-four in attendance.

4. September 1, 2, 3, 1964, a coaching conference was held for Children's workers. This was a refresher course for those already certified and also assisted additional persons to secure their certification.

5. During the year, nine "Type D" laboratory courses were held for Children's workers. Of the seventy-five persons enrolled, seventy received course cards of recognition. (Cumberland County School still to report.)

6. Two "Type C" laboratory enterprises were held.

(a) The conference laboratory school had sixty-six persons enrolled. Sixty-five received course cards of recognition.

(b) An enterprise sponsored jointly by the General Board of Education, the Duke Divinity School, the Western North Carolina and North Carolina Conference Boards of Education was held at Duke Memorial Methodist Church. Twenty-eight persons from the Divinity School and the local church were enrolled. Twenty-six course cards of recognition were given.

7. Support was given the High Point College Department of Christian Education through a kindergarten laboratory course conducted for students by the North Carolina Conference Board of Education. Nine persons were enrolled and nine received course cards of recognition.

8. Three hundred seventy-seven persons enrolled in the Children's workers' courses, in sixteen Christian workers' schools. Of this number two hundred sixty-two fulfilled the requirements of the course and received course cards of recognition.

9. Twelve vacation church school institutes were conducted to give guidance to teachers from local churches. A total of 1,315 persons attended the institutes.

10. Supervision of additional regular areas of work has continued, including leadership-development and teacher-training in workers' schools, weekend clinics, church building consultations, camping, weekday nursery and kindergarten programs, and others.

Recommendations for 1965-66

A review of our work with children leads us to recommend the following emphases for the coming year, 1965-66:

1. The committee on Children's Work commends the Youth and Adult Division for the projected plan for introducing the new youth and adult curriculum materials. We look forward to the correlation of studies in all age group divisions and urge each local church to move toward greater coordination in its planning, its studies, and its program.

2. That a conference laboratory school be projected for July 10-14, 1966.

3. That vacation church school institutes be held in a minimum of 12 areas, during the period: March 1-4; March 8-11; March 22-25. We recommend:

(a) The use of Christian Studies for Methodist Children Vacation Church School Units.

(b) Classes be held for Kindergarten, Elementary I-II, III IV, and V-VI. There will be no class for directors of vacation church school.

(c) Institutes to be conducted from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

(d) All vacation church school institutes be open to all Methodists from Central and Southeastern Jurisdiction.

(e) Additional vacation church school institutes be held on Saturday or at night will be planned in cooperation with the North Carolina-Virginia Conference.

4. In cooperation with other concerned groups, we urge that in each district there be conducted, in the fall, a missionary education institute. The purpose of these institutes to be that of helping local church teachers prepare to teach the recommended mission study. The 1965-66 theme is "Missions—The Christian's Calling."

5. That a committee on Methodist Weekday Nursery and Kindergarten be organized. Mrs. James Auman, Mrs. Manly Oldham, and Mrs. W. R. Stevens are to be invited to serve as this committee. The committee shall have responsibility in the following areas:

(a) Prepare a list of standards for Methodist Weekday Kindergartens in the North Carolina Conference.

(b) Present to the 1966 meeting of the Conference Board of Education a procedure by which these schools may be approved.

(c) Plan a one-day meeting of fellowship and training for the weekday nursery and kindergarten teachers.

6. That the ministry to exceptional children be continued and expanded:

(a) That a ministry to mentally retarded persons be continued through the resident camping program, church school classes, and weekday kindergartens. That special consideration be given to the needs of the adult retardate.

(b) That a ministry to blind children be instituted. A committee composed of Rev. Earl Richardson, Dr. Frank B. Thomas, Mr. Leslie Page shall give leadership in this area.

1. This committee to give consideration to a means of providing church school curriculum materials and resource materials.

2. That guidance be given church school teachers who have blind students in their classes.

3. That some study and experimentation be done to discover most effective teaching methods.

(c) That a ministry be provided for deaf children. With the opening at Wilson of the Eastern North Carolina School for the Deaf, there is a need to provide a ministry to the 120 students enrolling in September, 1965. The student age range presently is five to ten years. Ultimately, the age will move to include eighth grade students.

Mrs. J. C. Reynolds, Rocky Mount, Rev. Charles Hubbard, and Mr. Paul C. Darden will be asked to constitute a committee to study the needs of these children and possible ways of meeting these needs.

1. The committee shall be responsible for an interim ministry.

2. This committee shall submit to the 1966 meeting of the Conference Committee on Children's Work a plan for a continuing ministry to these children.

7. That district directors will make their services available to the churches of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference that are within the bounds of their respective districts of the North Carolina Conference. They will work in cooperation with the executive secretary of the Board of Education of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference.

8. That the Conference Laboratory School, planned for July 11-15, 1965, *not* be held since it is impossible to secure local leadership. Due to the decline in available leadership education funds, it is impossible to meet the expense involved in bringing laboratory leaders from outside the conference.

9. That as a part of a continuing program of leadership training, selected persons be invited to attend a weekend training conference.

It is with a keen sense of appreciation that we review the progress in the area of children's work, for we realize that much of the accomplishment is due to the dynamic leadership of our Conference Director of Children's Work, the Reverend Wesley G. Brogan. His contributions in this field have received attention from many other denominational groups and civic organizations. We are indeed fortunate to have him as our leader. We, therefore, respectfully request that he be appointed our Conference Director of Children's Work for another year.

Section C

COMMITTEE ON YOUTH WORK

Progress Report For 1964-65

Enrollment in the Youth Division increased 73 to a total of 28,675.

In order to provide a varied program for the differing needs and concerns of Senior Highs, the following ministries were offered this past year: (the record of attendance is listed beside each event) Workshop at N. C. Wesleyan College (194), Work Camp at Morehead City (17), Study Seminar at Duke University (21), Moral Concerns Conference at Camp Don-Lee (33), Annual Conference Session at Duke University (519), National Convocation at Purdue University (101), Senior Camp at Camp Don-Lee (78), Youth and Their Commitment Conference at Camp Chestnut Ridge (50), and the United Nations-Washington Study Tour on Peace and World Order (41). A total of 1,054 persons participated in these ministries as compared with 1,030 in 1963-64, 943 in 1962-63, and 722 in 1961-62.

Some attention should be called to two events which were included, for the first

time, in last year's program. The first of these is the Study Seminar. This experience was designed for a small number of youth who want to seriously study Christian theology. The Seminar, which has been likened to the advanced science courses offered to Senior Highs in the summer, was conducted by Dr. Thomas Langford of the Duke University faculty.

The second ministry which we would like to lift up is the Youth and Their Commitment Conference. This Conference, which was held on a weekend in December at Camp Chestnut Ridge, dealt with a study of the nature and mission of the church. The Reverend Mr. William Landiss, Director of Wesley Foundation at Georgia Tech, was the principal resource person. Those youth who attended were led to reconsider their concepts of the church. This weekend assembly was so well received by the youth of the N. C. Conference that several had to be turned away because registrations were filled.

We cannot leave last year's ministries without once again calling attention to the Migrant Work Camp, the second of its kind. Seeking a small number of youth applicants, this Work Camp provided an opportunity for real service to some of God's children who are in need—the migrant workers in Carteret County. The effect upon the Work Campers themselves is hard to express in the proper terms, but we can say that, once again, those who participated were "changed persons" as they came to see that all persons are of individual worth and concern. We trust that the migrant workers and their children were made aware of the fact that God cares as they encountered His "ambassadors," the Work Campers.

Varying experiences will again be a part of the program for Senior Highs this summer. This program will consist of a Study Seminar, Work Camp, Moral Concerns Conference, Senior Camp, Annual Conference Session, Workshop, and Vocations Conference. The latter is offered for the first time in a summer assembly. It will be held at Methodist College in Fayetteville. The Moral Concerns Conference, though not new itself, will deal with a new topic. This conference will concern itself with helping you consider how they as Christians can help bring about social change in today's society.

We can report that 536 Junior Highs attended camp sessions last summer.

In the area of leadership education, we can report that 19 courses were offered in Christian Workers' Schools, with 219 enrolled and 148 receiving credit. This report includes one Junior High Laboratory course and two Senior High Lab courses. The Senior Labs provided training for adult workers in using the elective unit, "Sex and the Whole Person."

Last summer one person completed certification as a Junior High Laboratory Instructor.

In September a new approach was made in the training of adult workers with youth by means of the Convocation of Adult Workers held at N. C. Wesleyan College. Fifty-one persons received training and guidance in understanding youth and in communicating the gospel to youth. Dr. Leo Rippey, Jr., of Scarritt College, Nashville, Tennessee, led the work through the theme "Youth—Their World, Their Dreams, Their Faith, Their Gospel." Dr. Rippey will return this September to lead us in our second Convocation which will deal with the importance of relationships in a youth ministry. The theme for this weekend training will be "Encountering God Through Persons."

At long last the N. C. Youth Research Project was brought to a conclusion. The report session was held in April. Significant and disturbing information was discovered through this project. Though the report may have been given, the work is far from over. The youth committee will be trying to discover the real meaning of their findings for years to come. Much experimentation will be needed as we attempt to incorporate these findings into relevant ministries with youth.

Thanks needs to be expressed to Dr. Leo Rippey, Jr., for his excellent work. Dr. Rippey put in many, many hours on this project. His personal dedication to his work deserves a special word of commendation. Appreciation needs to be expressed to the General Board of Education and to Scarritt College for their cooperation in this

project. The Ormond Fund also contributed financial support. Though they are too numerous to mention, we are grateful to the youth and adults in the churches of North Carolina who assisted in this Research. We trust that we will be wise enough to realize the full significance of this Research.

The contributions of the District Directors of Youth Work are invaluable to the Youth ministry in our North Carolina Conference. We offer special thanks for their service.

Recommendations For Youth Work 1965-66

1. That each local church be urged to sponsor their youth teachers and counselors to the second Convocation of Adult Workers with Youth, September 10-12, 1965, at North Carolina Wesleyan College.

2. That the Senior High United Nations-Washington Study Tour be held March 19-25, 1966.

3. That a youth mission study be held in each local church using the study materials, "Missions: The Christian's Calling" or "Races and Reconciliation."

4. That Missionary Education Institutes be held in each district for the purpose of providing training for teachers in the local congregation-wide missionary studies.

5. That, recognizing the need of youth to understand a real concept of missions and realizing the poverty of mission study units in the local church, the work groups at ACS and Workshop incorporate a promotion of the 1965-1966 mission themes into their presentations.

6. That a committee be appointed to develop a home-study course for adult workers with youth.

7. That we recognize that the subdistrict youth program, as it now exists, is a source of fellowship and help to many youth and their MYF's, while to many others it is seen as an ineffective organization. We realize our past negligence in providing guidance for the leaders of the subdistrict. We are not yet ready to determine exactly what course of action should be taken in our beyond-the-local-church ministries. In order to be better able to determine a course of action, we recommend that we experiment with several new patterns in beyond-the-local-church ministries this coming year.

8. That special attention also be given to the training of subdistrict officers and counselors.

9. That a weekend Senior Bible Study Conference be held for the purpose of studying the book of I John.

10. In the light of the results of N. C. Youth Research, we recognize the need for serious experimentation in youth ministries. We propose the following pilot projects:

a. In consideration of what seems to be a need for youth to be a part of a large enough group to function effectively, we recommend experimentations with groupings of youth from different churches in the formation of "charge" or "area" MYF's.

b. Recognizing the need for variety in the local church's ministry with youth, we recommend experimentation in elective courses and different groupings in the Sunday morning church school sessions.

c. We propose that experimentation take place in local churches with regard to different times, sequences, and settings for Christian education.

11. That the youth committee explore the potential of a radio ministry with youth.

12. That the youth council consider the possibility of conducting a study tour of contemporary church ministries for Senior Highs.

13. That a committee explore the possibility of sponsoring a Churchman's European study tour for Senior Highs in the summer of 1967.

14. That the youth council consider the possibility of forming a special committee for the purposes of confronting our young people with the Methodist Youth Fund as an expression of their commitment to Christ.

15. That, in an effort to bring about a closer working relationship with those youth in the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference, and/or other Methodist-related congregations, we encourage:

a. Subdistrict and district MYF's to include the youth of these churches in their activities; and

b. The youth of local MYF's to plan interracial Christian experiences with the youth of these churches; and

c. The district youth staff of the Board of Education to contact the educational workers in these churches concerning the ways in which they can be mutually helpful.

The youth committee commends the Reverend J. Conrad Glass, Jr. for his dedicated and effective service to the youth of our conference. His imaginative leadership has reached beyond the bounds of our conference through his leadership in the N. C. Youth Research Project and through his consultation and service on several national and regional committees.

We urge that he be reappointed as Conference Director of Youth Work.

Section D

COMMITTEE ON ADULT WORK

Progress Report For 1964-65

Adult Division enrollment increased by 1,176 (from July, 1963-June, 1964).

Three adult division courses were taught in Christian Workers' Schools. Thirty adults were enrolled and 22 course cards of recognition were granted.

A total of 49 adults attended Young Adult Assembly at Camp Don-Lee and the Spiritual Life Retreat at Camp Chestnut Ridge.

Subdistrict Institutes on Adult Curriculum and the use of the revised Adult Bible Course were conducted, reaching a total of 540 local adult leaders and teachers.

Young Adult Week, January 17-24, was observed by many local churches.

Goals and Proposals

We welcome communication and cooperation between the leaders of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction, and the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, in planning adult leadership education enterprises and activities.

We recommend that the Quadrennial Goals listed in the 1964 Journal of the North Carolina Conference continue as a point of reference in planning the program for the conference year 1965-66.

Recommendations For 1965-66

1. That continued emphasis be made upon use of the revised Adult Bible Course in the local church.

2. That the Committee on Adult Work cooperate with the Committee on General Church School Work and other boards and agencies in continuing conferences for laymen and clergy on the nature and mission of the church and the ministry of the laity.

3. That all adults in the local church be encouraged to participate in the following activities:

a. Family Camp, Camp Don-Lee, July 13-15 and July 15-18, 1965

b. Family Camp, Camp Chestnut Ridge, August 14-16, 1965

c. Spiritual Life Retreat, Camp Chestnut Ridge, September 24-25, 1965

d. Adult Assembly, Camp Don-Lee, early in June of 1966

4. That each local church show a specific concern for unmarried adults, parent education, and the aging in its ministry of adult education.

5. That the Committee on Adult Work, along with the Committee on Youth Work, give support to the committee set up to establish a special pilot project in the Raleigh-Durham area as an experiment in new patterns of ministry to single young adults not being reached by the existing activities of our churches.

6. That each local church develop an interest indicator, patterned on the one found in *Plan for Adults*, and use this as a guide for selecting adult study materials as described in *Planbook*.

Initiate Planning For Methodist Adult Curriculum

We call upon the pastors and the leaders of the Adult Division in every local church to prepare for the introduction of better and more effective curriculum resources and methods of teaching for adults in September 1967. These will be correlated with those already in use in the Children's Division and proposed for the Youth Division. To begin this preparation the following steps are to be undertaken:

1. Selection and training of an outstanding resource person who can explain the whole program and help create interest in it.

2. Selection and training of persons who will be trainers of teachers so that all teachers of adult classes will be reached with the new resources and the skills in teaching before the fall of 1967.

3. Set up a Coaching Conference at Camp Chestnut Ridge in November 1965, to recertify present instructors and train new ones to teach the revised Course 411: *Helping Adults Learn*. All Boards of Managers of Christian Workers' Schools are urged to include this course, No. 411: *Helping Adults Learn*, in their school either this year or next year, so as to prepare local adult church school teachers to properly interpret and use the new curriculum for adults beginning in September 1967.

4. Conduct a "One-day Consultation on Curriculum Resources for Adults" in September 1965. Teachers, students, and administrators from representative churches all across the conference will be brought together by invitation to discuss such questions as: What kinds of materials will help you do the best job of teaching adults? If there were a basic foundation course in the Christian faith and life, what should it include? What are the basic issues facing Christians with which the curriculum must deal in our time? What kinds of leadership materials do teachers and leaders need most? The answers to these questions are to be summarized and sent directly to Dr. Horace Weaver, Department of Adult Publications, Editorial Division, Methodist Board of Education, 201 Eighth Avenue, South, Nashville, Tennessee 37203.

COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

Progress Report For 1964-65

God is concerned about our families. Building the Kingdom of God means building personal relationships. The family is the primary group of society. As we allow Christ to enter into family life, we allow Him to enter into total life. "God is love." As God enters into the home, love enters. We envision the task of our committee to be the revelation of God through Christ to North Carolina families in such a way that they become Christ-centered and love-centered. The plans, activities, and recommendations which we present are prayerfully directed to this end.

During the past year we continued the two family camps at Camp Don-Lee. With the basic work accomplished during the last quadrennium under the splendid leadership of the Reverend H. L. Harrell, our first Ministers' and Wives' Retreat was held at Methodist College. It was such an outstanding success that we believe we will be unable to accept all of the applications for the new year.

A bibliography of helpful pamphlets, books, and other materials was sent to family life committees through a local church mailing. Family life courses were held in Christian Workers' Schools and committee members were encouraged to become certified to teach these courses. One District Family Life Workshop was held.

Quadrennial Recommendations

That we sponsor the following Family Life Conferences and Seminars in the order listed:

1965-66 A series of One-Day District Conferences on Family Life (for local committees)

1966-67 A series of One-Day District Seminars on Premarital Counseling (for pastors)

1967-68 A Three-Day Marriage Counseling Seminar (for pastors)

Recommendations For 1965-66

1. That we institute two new family camp programs:
 - (A) Family Camp at Camp Chestnut Ridge, August 14-16
 - (B) Trailer Camps at Camp Kerr Lake
2. That we sponsor a series of one-day District Conferences on Family Life (for local committees) during National Family Week, 1966.
3. That a detailed and extensive annotated bibliography of Family Life resources be compiled and sent to each local pastor.
4. That a list of all Family Life and allied services in eastern North Carolina be compiled and sent to each pastor and Family Life committee chairman.
5. That study be continued toward the establishment of a Pastoral Care and Counseling Center within the bounds of our conference.

Sutton, Jr. We urge that he be reappointed as Conference Director of Adult Work and Camping. He has given us dedicated and conscientious leadership, and we are deeply grateful for his outstanding direction.

Section F

COMMITTEE ON MINISTERS AND DIRECTORS OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND MUSIC

Christian Education Section

The church school is the foremost instrument in the realization of Christian nurture in the common life of the church. In the development of this fundamental calling in the Christian community, we are pleased that thirty-two churches in the North Carolina Conference benefit from the services of Directors of Christian Education and educational assistants. Of these, six are certified Directors of Christian Education and twenty-six are educational assistants. These persons, working in a professional capacity in the local church, have also been most helpful in the development of subdistrict, district and conference-wide programs contributing to the over-all task of Christian nurture. We commend them for their breadth of interest and their willingness in service.

The Conference Board of Education has conscientiously endeavored to keep these persons informed of the development in programs, materials, and training opportunities. In cooperation with the N. C. Conference Director's Association, the Board sponsored a one-day meeting at the Methodist Building in Raleigh on March 4, 1965, to acquaint directors and educational assistants with the services and materials provided by the Board staff. Some thirty persons attended this meeting. The Board also is being host to the directors of Christian education and music and educational assistants during the Annual Conference in June, 1965.

On November 2-4, 1964, our Conference was host for the biannual meeting of the North Carolina Association of Methodist Ministers and Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C. The theme of the meeting was "The Life and Mission of the Church," with Dr. Howard Grimes, professor of Christian Education at Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas, as resource leader. Some forty persons were in attendance.

The committee makes the following recommendations for the coming year:

1. That the Board recommend to each church employing persons in Christian

education to provide at least one week with financial assistance to enable their director to attend one of the following training opportunities at Lake Junaluska this summer:

- a. SeJ Leadership and Laboratory Schools, August 1-13, 1965.
- b. SeJ Church School Administrators' Conference, August 13-15, 1965.
- c. SeJ Workshop for Directors of Christian Education, August 15-20, 1965.

2. That the Board, in cooperation with the North Carolina Conference Directors' Association, sponsor a one-day meeting of directors and educational assistants sometime in the early spring of 1966, for the purpose of briefing them concerning the services and materials available through the Board staff and for the discussion of mutual problems.

3. That, in the light of the shortage of qualified directors of Christian education, the Board:

a. Call on pastors and local church committees on Christian Vocations to encourage prospective leaders in this area through an emphasis on the needs that exist.

b. Request the Conference MYF to give emphasis to this need in the conference youth program.

c. Call upon those with responsibility for Christian education in our colleges to encourage undergraduate students in Christian education to continue in graduate study so that they may meet the requirements for certification as a Director of Christian Education.

d. That the Board offer counsel and encouragement to prospective graduate students as to possible scholarship aid that is available for such study.

e. That the North Carolina Conference be called upon to acquaint itself with the problems involved in the vocation of education director because of the lack of retirement and pension security.

f. That the Board endeavor to acquaint local churches with some of the problems which result in a rapid turnover of educational workers and loss of persons to this area of work. For this purpose, the Board is requested to call a one-day meeting with pastors of churches having directors and pastors of churches desiring to have directors.

4. That the office of executive secretary of the Board of Education serve as the agent for the procurement and placement of education directors. Churches planning to employ a person in Christian education and those seeking a change in employment are encouraged to use this service.

Music Section

The Seventh Annual North Carolina Conference Music Workshop, sponsored by the Board of Education was held at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C.

The workshop was in two sessions. The first session, March 2, 1965, was planned for persons having little or no training in choral conducting. The session on March 9, 1965, was directed to persons with a background in choral conducting. Mr. Marvin Burke, Director of Music, Edenton Street Methodist Church, led the sessions.

Two courses in the area of church music were taught in Christian Workers' Schools. Eleven persons were enrolled, with six receiving course cards of recognition.

District music representatives have conducted local church, and subdistrict music workshops. In Goldsboro, an anthem festival was held with five church choirs participating. The Methodist churches of Goldsboro are providing music training for three indigent kindergartens through volunteer services of choir members.

Recommendations For 1965-66

1. That plans be made for the introduction of the new Methodist Hymnal in cooperation with the Conference Committee on Publishing Interests, and the Conference Commission on Worship.

a. The initial introduction is to be the presentation of the "Sampler" at the 1965 session of the Annual Conference.

b. That district workshops be held for the introduction of the new hymnal.

c. That the format, schedule and personnel of the district workshops be planned by the chairman of the committee on Publishing Interests, Conference Commission on Worship, and the committee on Music.

d. That a coaching conference be held in Raleigh, on March 28th, to train the persons who will lead the district workshops.

e. That a plan be made with Cokesbury to make Hymnals available for these workshops.

Convocation of NAFOMM to be held August 4-11, at Salem College, Winston-Salem, N. C.

4. That each district music representative enlist the aid of sub-chairman in various areas of their districts to help promote workshop attendance by telephone and personal contacts.

5. That district music representatives, by arrangement with the district superintendent, obtain from ministers at a ministers' meeting, the names and addresses of all music personnel.

6. That *Music Ministry* magazine be promoted at all conference and district music workshops.

7. That every eligible Methodist musician seek certification as a Methodist director of music. Information and application forms may be secured from the North Carolina Conference Board of Education, P. O. Box 10957, Raleigh, N. C.

8. That the Conference chapter of NAFOMM prepare three worship services for use at the Christmas season and three for use at Easter, one of these to be based on the Cokesbury Hymnal, one on the Methodist Hymnal and one on Anthems.

9. That each local church observe "A Great Day of Methodist Singing," November 7, 1965.

10. That local churches make use of the "Hymn of the Month" program as recommended by the General Board of Education.

Section G

COMMITTEE ON CAMPS AND CONFERENCES

W. WARREN BISHOP, *Chairman*

General Statement

Church camping, as an integral part of the program of Christian education, continues to grow in significance and participants in the North Carolina Annual Conference. Using the out-of-doors setting and seeking to fulfill the basic objective of Christian education, camping is assuming its rightful place as a tool for learning. Under the auspices and leadership of the church, persons are being helped to "become aware of God's seeking love, as shown especially in Jesus Christ to respond in faith and love to the end that they may develop self-understanding, self-acceptance, and self-fulfillment under God; increasingly identify themselves as sons of God and members of the Christian community; live as Christian disciples in all relations in human society; and abide in the Christian hope."

(*Foundations of Christian Teaching in Methodist Churches*, page 31.) With this goal in mind, the Committee on Camps and Conferences of the Board of Education is striving to provide mature Christian leadership and the best possible physical facilities.

Progress Report For 1964-65

During the period from September 1, 1963, until December 31, 1964, 6,946 persons were involved in the use of the camping facilities and program. Of this number 2,060 persons were in camps organized and sponsored by the Board of Education at Camp Don-Lee and Camp Chestnut Ridge. Approximately 4,900 persons were involved in retreat groups, picnics, planning sessions, day camping, and trailer camping activities from local churches at Camp Don-Lee, Camp Chestnut Ridge, and Camp Kerr Lake.

Resident camping, under sponsorship of the Board of Education, fills most all weeks at Don-Lee and Chestnut Ridge during the summer months. Most week-ends are filled during the remainder of the year, using available winterized facilities. (Application for use of these camping facilities is made through the Reverend John H. Sutton, Jr., Director of Camping, Box 10957, Raleigh, N. C., 27605.)

Current Program Features

Camp Don-Lee: The camping program at Camp Don-Lee will be under the very capable direction of Mr. David Riffe, director of the Wesley Foundation at Wake Forest College, an enthusiastic and experienced camper. Scheduled for Camp Don-Lee are sessions for Elementary IV-VI boys and girls, Junior High and Senior High youth, and Family Camps.

The outpost facilities and a renovated pool are to be in use this season. Also under way will be the beach erosion project, carried out to the specifications set forth by a soil erosion engineer. This will involve a rather large capital expenditure.

We are deeply indebted to the ministers and laymen of the New Bern District for their Christmas offering to be used on the beach erosion project at Camp Don-Lee.

Camp Chestnut Ridge: Our director of camping, Reverend John H. Sutton, Jr., will be directing our program at Camp Chestnut Ridge. The schedule includes camps for Elementary IV-VI boys and girls and Junior High youth and the Moral Concerns Conference.

We wish to give our thanks to the people of the Burlington District for their Christmas offering, and to Mr. Gera Wykes for his gift of \$2,200.00, to be used at Camp Chestnut Ridge. With these gifts we hope to construct a Staff House to add to our facilities.

During the spring of 1966, a Southeastern Region Interdenominational Workshop on Operation and Maintenance of Camps and Conferences will be held at Camp Chestnut Ridge. The workshop is being sponsored by the General Board of Education of The Methodist Church, the Southern Baptist Convention, and North Carolina State University at Raleigh.

Camp Kerr Lake: Camp Kerr Lake continues to be used on a local church basis for retreats, picnics, church family camps, trailer camping, and other groups. A master plan is being developed by Mr. Charles Stott, of North Carolina State University at Raleigh, and when this plan is complete and approved, further development will be undertaken. The camp will continue to be available for local church usage through reservation at the Board of Education office.

We appreciate the work being done by the Raleigh District Methodist Youth Fellowship in their raising funds for the construction of a bath house at Camp Kerr Lake.

Camp Rockfish: One of the dreams of the Committee on Camps and Conferences, and of the people in the Fayetteville district, has been the development of Camp Rockfish. The camp has been master planned and our dreams will be a reality this summer. Under the leadership and direction of the district superintendents of the Fayetteville District and the Sanford District, Reverend B. L. Davidson and Reverend V. E. Queen, and their district lay leaders, Mr. R. R. Allen and Mr. J. C. Stowe, a fund-raising campaign was held. The response of the ministers and laymen to this call was most generous. The result is that during July and August four weeks of resident camping in permanent facilities

will be held at Camp Rockfish. Six cabins, a unit lodge, and other necessary buildings accommodating approximately forty persons each week, have been provided by these efforts. After the resident camping program is completed, these same facilities will be available for other uses, as retreats, meetings, picnics, day camping, and other activities. Without the leadership of these persons and the enthusiastic support of both ministers and laymen, this dream would not be progressing as it is today. The Committee on Camps and Conferences wishes to take this opportunity to express appreciation and gratitude for the efforts and generosity of these persons who have responded to this need.

Mr. Gene Clayton, of the Methodist College faculty, and an experienced counselor and worker with youth, will direct the program at Camp Rockfish this summer.

Future Needs

The continued success of camping as an instrument in Christian education depends mainly upon two factors: First, we must continue to supply the mature, Christian leadership necessary for camping to be effective. We have been fortunate in having many persons to serve with us in past years who have met these qualifications. We will continue to need persons who will be willing to serve in these positions.

We also need the financial backing of many persons if we are to continue to develop campsites which will be beneficial and convenient to the persons of the North Carolina Conference. Our conference appropriation does not allow us to expand rapidly, as we must maintain our facilities year by year. Our dreams of completing development of Camp Chestnut Ridge, Camp Rockfish, and Camp Kerr Lake depend upon the support of the lay people of the conference and their interest in this vital part of Christian education.

Appreciation

We have been fortunate during the past few years to have Mr. Robert Reed as our superintendent of camps. It is his responsibility to supervise the construction and maintenance of our camping facilities and to assist in the operation of the facilities. We are indeed grateful for his services and for those many things he has done to complement the camping program for our conference.

It has been with the continued support and cooperation of the Duke Divinity School and the Duke Endowment in making students available to serve as summer camp counselors that our camping program has had the dedicated leadership that is so essential in small group camping. To Dr. Wilson Nesbitt, Dr. Arthur Kale, and Dean Robert E. Cushman go our sincerest thanks and appreciation for their cooperation.

Section D

PROPOSAL FOR LONG RANGE STUDY OF CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION IN THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

Preamble: Christian Higher Education has become big business in the North Carolina Conference. Our people are becoming increasingly aware of the fact that Christian

Higher Education is equally as important as Evangelism, Missions, Church Extension, etc. It is no longer a marginal or optional concern of our conference.

As a result of this awakened concern, we have established two new senior colleges—North Carolina Wesleyan at Rocky Mount and Methodist College at Fayetteville—each of which had its first graduating class last spring. At the same time, we have witnessed the transformation of Louisburg Junior College into a thriving institution. We have continued supporting Greensboro College, High Point College, and the Duke University Divinity School. We have now 1,686 more students enrolled in our colleges located within the bounds of our conference than we had in 1956, and there has been a phenomenal increase in enrollment in all of our institutions.

Our Annual College Sustaining Fund, which has been called the lifeblood of our institutions, has increased 628% since 1950, from \$59,867 to \$436,000. The support of our Wesley Foundations has increased similarly. During the past six years \$3,201,552 have been raised in cash for capital improvements, with \$1,771,281 remaining in unpaid pledges. This does not include money raised locally by the colleges and their foundations.

In view of these and other factors, we believe the time has come for us to undertake a comprehensive, long-range study of Christian Higher Education in North Carolina Conference. We need to take a good look at our institutions of higher education and make careful plans for expanding and stabilizing them consistent with sound fiscal policies and superior academic standards.

The Proposal: We therefore recommend that the Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church authorize its standing committee on Christian Higher Education to conduct a comprehensive, long-range study of Christian Higher Education in the North Carolina Conference and those institutions of higher education supported by the conference.

We further recommend that the Division of Higher Education of the Board of Education of The Methodist Church be invited to direct this study.

We further recommend that the chairman of the committee on Christian Higher Education be authorized to appoint a steering committee, composed of himself and six other persons from the committee on Christian Higher Education to work with the General Board of Education in making this study.

Section E

We further recommend that these funds be paid to the colleges quarterly from current receipts.

Because of the urgent need for qualified ministers to fill the pulpits of The Methodist Church and because provision for recruiting and educating ministers is an undeniable responsibility of the church, we strongly urge support of the One Percent Plan for Ministerial Education. This plan helps provide scholarships and grants-in-aid to ministerial students and to increase the support of our seminaries.

We urge our bishop, the conference cabinet, and pastors to give wide publicity to this plan which will help greatly our support of the Duke Divinity School.

Section F

COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT CRUSADE

We are grateful to the Reverend James A. Auman, executive director of the Association of Methodist Colleges of the North Carolina Conference, for his ministry throughout

the conference this past year in the interest of Christian Higher Education. Under his leadership \$225,000 has been paid on pledges since the last annual conference. We are also grateful to the three colleges within the bounds of the conference for supporting his work.

A subcommittee of the committee on Christian Higher Education is working with Mr. Auman and representatives of Louisburg College, Methodist College and North Carolina Wesleyan College in the development of plans for the completion of the payment by churches in the conference of outstanding commitments to the College Development Crusade.

We urge the observance in each church of College Day on Sunday, November 7, 1965, for the purpose of lifting up our colleges and Christian Higher Education.

Section G

AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER OF METHODIST COLLEGE, INC.

Amend Article 6 by repealing the entire article and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

ARTICLE VI

Subject to the control and direction of the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, as hereinafter more fully set forth, the business and affairs of this corporation shall be vested in, administered and managed by the Trustees of Methodist College, Incorporated.

The Board of Trustees shall consist of not less than 24 and not more than 36 members. At least 6 of these shall be ministerial members of the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church; at least 6 shall be residents of Cumberland County; and at least three-fourths of the membership at any given time shall be members of the Methodist Church. Trustees may succeed themselves. All Trustees shall serve until their successors are elected.

The Trustees shall be divided into four classes of not less than six nor more than nine members each. The term of office of one class shall expire on July 1 of each year.

Amend Article XI by eliminating the first two words "Twelve (12) Trustees" and substituting therefor the words "one-half of the membership of the Board shall constitute a quorum. . . ."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

The committee on Conference Entertainment has not had a meeting as there did not seem to be sufficient business to demand a meeting of the full committee.

We appreciate the hospitality of Edenton Street Church in extending an invitation for this session of the Conference. An invitation has been received by the committee for the 1966 session which will be duly extended when Question 48 is called. The committee is in conversation with churches for future sessions of the conference.

No change in the plan of entertainment is contemplated for the present.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

No. 1

THE PAST YEAR

Believing that an effective program of evangelism can only be carried out through a Holy Spirit-filled and Holy Spirit-directed leadership, District Retreats were held for pastors. These pastors' retreats were to be followed by local church retreats for the lay leadership.

The Board jointly with the Conference Town and Country Commission planned and conducted the Pastors' Conference on Evangelism at Wesleyan College August 25, 26, 27, 1964. This was one of the best attended pastors' conferences held thus far, and was one of the most beneficial. The faculty consisted of Bishop Paul N. Garber,

Dr. and Mrs. Lawrence Lacour, and Dr. William Ragsdale Cannon.

Immediately following the Pastors' Conference the Orientation Workshop for pastors new to the North Carolina Conference was held. This workshop is sponsored jointly by five of the Conference Boards.

The Conference Board continued the publication of "The Good News," a mimeographed newsletter containing evangelistic plans of local churches. This newsletter has attracted the attention of the General Board of Evangelism.

Feeling that evangelism must be accomplished in the local church, the Conference Board of Evangelism through its Director has preached in 40 churches on the evangelistic theme, has talked to the combined Sunday School classes in 27 local churches on the theme, "Spiritual Renewal; personal, in the home, and in the church," has spent 130 hours in evangelistic workshops, taken part in 11 retreats, and has represented the Board in 10 conference meetings of various boards.

The "E-Day Program" (Sunday for Evangelism) which was originated by our conference Director has been complimented by our General Board of Evangelism and has been written up in "The Methodist Story." We recommend the continuance of this program.

The District Secretaries of Evangelism have been active in serving their districts.

No. 2

DISTRICT EVANGELISM 1965-1966

Bishop Garber in an address recorded in a pamphlet entitled "The Evangelistic message of the Christmas Conference" delivered some years ago at Little Rock, Arkansas, had this to say, "We might adopt a great comprehensive program of evangelism here today, but I doubt whether it is possible to have a great revival of religion until there exists in our lives as Methodists a sincere feeling that our main work is to save souls."

John Wesley wrote in his Journal on August 6, 1786, "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America. But I am afraid lest they exist only as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power, and this undoubtedly will be the case unless they hold fast both the doctrine, spirit and discipline with which they first set out."

We Methodists, of all people, should be evangelistic, for it was this warm-hearted care for lost men which brought our church into existence; to nurture those who had been won to Christ.

Like our religious forebears, we too, must have "a sincere feeling that our main work is to save souls." To have this sincere concern for lost people we must live constantly under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. To live under that guidance we must daily place ourselves at God's disposal, willing to be led by His Spirit wherever necessary for the doing of His will. We will then believe in the power of God to perform the miracle of salvation—the transformation of human beings who put their trust in Christ, and making "New Creatures in Christ Jesus." Because we have this happy experience ourselves, we will want to share it with every person in our community who is unsaved.

With the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives we will not only have the "form of religion," but our lives, our enthusiastic devotion to Christ and His church, our eager and loving concern for lost people will make of us a church where people find Christ and His saving power.

We, your Conference Board, therefore, call each pastor, each official, each leader and each member to a self-examination of his or her spiritual life. We call upon pastors to preach for a verdict—commitment on the part of sinners and rededication on the part of unconcerned church members. We call upon church school teachers to teach for a verdict. We call the entire church to daily prayer that we may be "vessels fit for the Master's use." We call upon each church member to be a true witness for Christ both by precept and example.

In the interest of spiritual renewal on the part of church leaders and members,

and Christ-like witnessing to the unsaved, we present the following program of District Evangelism in keeping with the quadrennial theme, "One Witness In One World."

GENERAL PLANS

1. Establish parish responsibility lines for discovering all pockets or communities of unchurched or unreached people, and assign these areas to specific pastoral charges.

2. Have those churches in the district make a census where necessity warrants it. Rolls of all church school classes and organizations should be examined for locating prospective members.

3. Pastors carefully select Visitors to be trained for doing "Two-by-Two" Evangelistic Visitation.

4. Selection of persons to do "Friendly Visitation of Members" who are inactive.

5. The "Cultivation" of prospective members.

6. District or subdistrict training of pastors, chairmen of Commissions on Membership and Evangelism, and other local church leaders. The district secretary of Evangelism will be assisted in these training workshops by the district lay leaders and district secretary of the Town and Country Commission.

7. Goals: 5% net increase in membership for both district and local church unless otherwise stated.

Goldsboro: No set district goal; church goal: no barren churches, with each church showing net gain.

New Bern: 10% gross increase both in district and local churches.

Sanford: District goal—600 net gain; church, 5% net gain.

8. District-wide Church Attendance Crusade using chart, "Let Us Go into the House of the Lord" for training Visitors, and the chart, "Mission to Members," used by teams of Visitors in the homes of indifferent members.

12. Invitation to the local Commission on Education to work with the Commission on Membership and Evangelism in training teachers as evangelists.

13. Invitation to local Commission on Missions to work with the Commission on Membership and Evangelism in making survey, doing evangelistic preaching, taking part in Visitation Evangelism, N-1 program—in forming new congregations.

14. Invitation to Conference Board of Lay Activities and Conference Town and Country Commission to work with the Board of Evangelism in their Conference Evangelistic Program.

15. Carefully planned overnight District Retreats should be held for pastors and lay leaders.

16. Pre-Christmas Training Classes for children and Pre-Easter Membership "Training Classes" for all age groups:

a. Children—use Manual by Cokesbury, supplemented by other materials.

b. Youth—use Manual by Cokesbury, supplemented by other materials.

c. Adults—The chart "Spiritual Life of a Methodist Christian." It is our feeling that all new adult members being received into the church by any method should have the four lessons on this chart.

Dear Paul:

For the past five years it has been my happy privilege to work with the Bishop and the Conference Board of Evangelism as your Executive Director. It has been my conviction from the beginning and still is that if the work of evangelism is to be done, it must be done in the local church.

It is my further conviction that if people are to be won to Christ and the church, and helped become mature Christians, there must be pastors with passions for the souls of men and a laity with a loving concern for lost people.

This conviction has led me to put the emphasis upon Christian experience as the undergirding spirit of all method and program. It has led me to travel many thousands of miles, meet with hundreds of local churches, subdistrict and district groups, meet with pastors and local church commissions.

I had hoped to remain in the work for another year. Several things have happened during this year to cause me to weigh the facts and pray much for guidance in my plans for next year. I had pneumonia at Annual Conference, and after weeks of treatment, I was able to get rid of the cough. In the meantime, the Private Diagnostic Clinic at Duke Hospital revealed that I have moderate emphysema. This means that I will have to spend fifty minutes a day in deep breathing exercises. An automobile accident of several years back left me with phlebitis in the leg. And a month ago I underwent surgery for inguinal hernia. At my age there is only one chance out of six that it will not return.

The long automobile trips and the hours of public speaking which are necessary to effectively do the work as Director could possibly cause a return of the hernia. And, too, my conscience would not allow me to draw a salary and not be able to do the work I feel ought to be done.

Therefore, I am tendering my resignation to become effective at Annual Conference this June. I am planning to ask for the retired relation.

May God lead the Board in the selection of my successor, and I assure you that my prayers and service will always be to help our Conference be a Conference where men and women, boys and girls are told the good news that Jesus Saves—a Conference where the miracle of salvation is happening week after week and year after year.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

CHRISTIAN WHITE, *President*; WILLIAM K. QUICK, *Secretary*

Minutes—1964 Session

The seventy-first session of the Historical Society of the North Carolina Annual Conference was held at Front Street Methodist Church in Burlington, North Carolina, on Wednesday, June 24, 1964, with the president, the Reverend A. F. Fisher, presiding.

The report of the Society as printed in the Book of Reports was presented by the president of the Society. Recommendations regarding officers for the 1964-65 conference year were adopted by the delegates.

The Historical Address was given by Bishop T. Otto Nall, resident episcopal head of the Minnesota Area, Minneapolis.

Program—1965 Session

The speaker for the Anniversary of the Historical Society at the 1965 session of the Annual Conference will be Dr. Ralph Hardee Rives, associate professor of English at East Carolina College. Dr. Rives, an active Methodist layman and historian, will speak on the subject, "The Contributions of Methodist Protestantism to The Methodist Church."

Activities

During the conference year 1964-65, the officers of the Society met twice and report the successful re-opening of the Whitaker's Chapel near Enfield. The first Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church met at Whitaker's Chapel on December 19-20, 1828. Subsequent sessions of the Methodist Protestant Conference in North Carolina were held there in 1830, 1833, 1842, 1845 and 1849.

On December 20, 1964 (the 136th anniversary of the first conference), some 200 persons assembled at Whitaker's Chapel for the Anniversary Service. Bishop Paul Neff

Garber, the Rev. J. W. Page, Dr. Thomas A. Collins and officers of the Society led the service. Bishop Garber announced that Whitaker's Chapel will be one of the historical shrines of Methodism to be reproduced in miniature at Lake Junaluska.

The Historical Society officers have filled the pulpit for regular third Sunday services since the Anniversary program.

Through the generosity of Mr. J. Waldo Whitaker, a direct descendant of the original family, we are happy to report the complete renovation of Whitaker's Chapel.

The erection of a Historical Marker at Whitaker's Chapel during the month of May climaxes the work of the Society this year in re-claiming and re-opening one of Methodism's most outstanding and historical churches. The North Carolina Department of Archives has provided a marker which denotes the role of Whitaker's Chapel in early Anglican and later Methodist circles. We commend Dr. Ralph Hardee Rives for his interest in and support of the Chapel and the securing of the marker.

Recommendations

I. We request the 1965 Annual Conference to adopt the proposed constitution of the Historical Society of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church. (viz. copy)

II. The officers of the Historical Society request the delegates to the 1965 session to commend with a rising vote of appreciation Mr. J. Waldo Whitaker, staunch Methodist layman and benefactor and the leader in restoring Whitaker's Chapel during the spring of 1965. The Society further requests that its secretary be empowered to compose and present an appropriate "Citation of Appreciation" to Mr. Whitaker.

The Society requests permission to obtain ministerial leadership from among its officers and other interested persons to provide for Third Sunday worship services at Whitaker's Chapel during the 1965-66 Conference year.

III. Bi-Centennial Plans for the North Carolina Conference

1966 will be a year-long observance of Methodism celebrating its Bicentennial in America. We hope during the year that we may discover some essentials that will encourage us to look ahead to new experiences of God's presence. The Historical Society is eager to help make this a time of rediscovery and renewal, not because of yesterday but because of tomorrow. The 1960 and 1964 General Conference have set some guidelines and we propose today some practical plans for appropriate Bicentennial celebrations in the Conference and local churches.

1. The observance of Sunday, January 2, 1966, as Methodist Heritage Day, with special reference to the 200th Anniversary of Methodism.

2. We propose a special observance during the year at the Green Hill House near Louisburg, site of the first Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and one of the shrines of American Methodism.

3. A special observance during the Annual Conference session of the Bicentennial Year is requested with details for the program to be worked out with the Society officers, Bishop Garber, and the Commission on World Service and Finance. At this observance the oldest Methodist church in the Conference would be cited.

4. On a district level we request the promotion of the following:

a. Appointment of a committee on each district for the promotion of the District Bicentennial program.

b. The district conference of 1966 give some sort of special emphasis to the Bicentennial and its theme: "Forever Beginning."

c. The oldest Methodist church within each district should be cited at the district conference with a special Methodist Historical Celebration at the oldest church in each district sometime during the year.

5. On a local church level:

a. A historical committee should be appointed in each church to plan for the local church celebration during the year.

b. The pastor and historical committee should plan to write (or bring up to date) the history of the local church. A copy of this should be mailed to the Historical Society secretary for placement in the Archives.

c. Promotion of January 2, 1966, (or some other appropriate Sunday) as Methodist Heritage Day.

6. We further request permission to prepare and publish a guidebook to historical Methodist churches or shrines in North Carolina. This guidebook should include the oldest church in each of the eleven districts of our conference and other historical churches which date prior to 1815. Cost of such publication would be paid for from sale of the guidebooks.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE ADOPTION OF A CONSTITUTION

WHEREAS, it is the consensus of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, that a historical society should be set up by the Conference to collect and preserve the Conference's records, to provide and maintain Archives and display of North Carolina Methodist memorabilia, and to encourage the preservation and restoration of historic sites and buildings within the bounds of the Conference, and to do such matters and things necessary to preserve the glorious heritage of the Conference and to cooperate with the Association of the Methodist Historical Societies.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, that the following Constitution of the Historical Society of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church be, and is, hereby approved:

1.

The name of this organization is the Historical Society of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

2.

The Society shall be under the jurisdiction, control and direction of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

3.

The purpose and duties of the Society shall be as follows:

(a) To preserve the records of the Conference.

(b) To gather all data referring to the Conference organization's past history and former members.

(c) To collect and preserve items of historic interest to the North Carolina Annual Conference.

(d) To provide and maintain an Archives and display of North Carolina Methodist memorabilia.

(e) To encourage the preservation and restoration of historic sites and buildings within the bounds of the Conference.

(f) To remind the Conference of our glorious heritage through programs and historic commemorations.

(g) To cooperate with the Association of Methodist Historical Societies.

4.

That the Society shall be governed by a Board of Trustees consisting of one minister and one layman from each district in the North Carolina Annual Conference chosen for their interest in the history of North Carolina Methodism. The minister shall be in effective relation in the Annual Conference. The layman shall be a member of The Methodist Church and be at least twenty-one years of age. In addition there shall be one representative from the cabinet of the North Carolina Conference appointed by the Bishop. The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be an ex officio member of the Historical Society. The said Trustees of the Society shall be nominated by the cabinet and elected by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, at the beginning of each quadrennium for such term of years and in such manner as the Conference may determine.

5.

All members of the North Carolina Annual Conference who are members of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Historical Society and the Association of the Methodist Historical Societies shall be ex officio members of the Conference Society. Provision

shall be made for interested ministers and laymen to qualify as affiliate members of the Society by the payment of one dollar per year membership dues. Affiliate members shall be without vote.

6.

The officers, to-wit: President, Vice President and Secretary of this Society, shall be elected by the Trustees at the first meeting of the Trustees which shall be on the day of, 1965, at of the Society, and all officers and Executive Committee shall serve without compensation.

7.

All properties of this Society shall be the property of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church and shall be held in trust for the benefit of the said Annual Conference.

8.

That the said Trustees of this Society shall have the authority to set up By-Laws not inconsistent with this Constitution.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES, INC.

No. 1

TRUSTEES OF THE METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN

Section A—Report of Operations

Our last fiscal year ended September 30, 1964. During the year the Home served 175 children and their families, providing 49,000 days of care. Our capacity is 150 children in residence. The year began with 121 and ended with 149 with an average of 128 per day. Eleven children were assisted with scholarships in post-high school education and one was served through "Mother's Aid." During the year 66 applications were processed and 42 children admitted. Of the 149 children in residence at the end of the year 10 were full orphans, 45 were half orphans, and 94 had two living parents, neither of whom could make a home for the child.

During the year two full-time caseworkers joined our staff. This has enabled us to render better casework services to our children and their families. We have enjoyed full cooperation from the County Welfare Departments, the Children's Home Society of North Carolina, the Raleigh Mental Health Center, the Wake County Health Department, Dorothea Dix Hospital, and the Psychiatric Clinics at Duke Hospital in Durham and Memorial Hospital in Chapel Hill; all of whom have made their resources available to us for serving the special needs of our children.

Our Chaplain, Rev. Frank Daniels, joined our staff two years ago. His service as pastor, preacher, MYF leader and counselor, has added much to our ability to serve children. The Monk Memorial Chapel, dedicated November 29, 1964, is the center of our religious program.

Since we serve troubled children we expect to face serious problems frequently. There has been a marked improvement in the general attitude of our children. This is the natural result of the improvement in our services.

We are grateful to the Woman's Societies of Christian Service and other church groups who have sponsored our children for clothing, school lunches and spending money. The money has been a great help. The interest in the children has been even more valuable to us. The financial support that has come from many people through

small cash gifts, coupons, and merchandise, is a significant part of our operating income. In past years devoted friends have put the Methodist Home in their wills and during the year several of these bequests have added \$21,000 to our Endowment and \$63,000 to our special Designated Funds. The income from these invested funds will be available for use annually. By careful management we were able to operate and end the year with only a small deficit of \$1,487.

Section B—Challenges Which Confront Us

A careful consideration of our work and of the calls that come to us for help reveals certain needs that challenge the whole church and the Methodist Home which is the church's agency to serve children in need.

One of the challenges is to improve the quality of our present services. Specifically, this means improvement in (1) educational and vocational guidance; (2) in casework services to children and their families; (3) in the in-service training of all staff members.

A second challenge is to expand our service. This expansion is urgently needed in three areas of service: (1) a carefully supervised foster home program in addition to our residential group care; (2) service to mildly retarded children with IQ's from 70 to 80 for whom there is now no good resource; (3) psychiatric help for many children with serious emotional problems arising out of the family background.

A third challenge is to recruit and train qualified persons to work with children. We must have Christian people with a deep sense of dedication to their work. We must find a way to train our workers. This will involve scholarship assistance for professional education. We must pay salaries at least competitive with salaries these persons could earn elsewhere. It is not fair or realistic for the church to expect dedicated people to take a large cut in their salaries for the privilege of working in a church agency. Our salary scale is so low that it is becoming almost impossible to secure competent staff. We are faced with a desperate alternative: We must increase salaries or go out of business as a child care agency. More than one-third of our annual income goes to pay salaries. We are required to increase salaries of a large segment of our staff by the new wage-hour law in North Carolina setting a minimum wage of \$1.00 per hour. This means more money coming from some source.

THE METHODIST RETIREMENT HOME, INC.

I

On the first of September the Retirement Home will complete its FIRST DECADE of Service. During this time you, through your Retirement Home, have served 225 worthy retired members in the Master's name.

The Home is filled to its capacity with 145 members, ranging in age from 65 to 96 with an average age of 80. There is a long waiting list of people who need the care the Home offers. Applications continue to come at the rate of more than one per week. Many of the most needy applications come from the chronically ill whom the Home is not equipped to serve.

The Home opened September 1, 1955, with twelve members and a capacity of forty. The Home has continued to expand its facilities to serve more members. In 1959 the first addition to the Main Building increased the capacity to 120. At the same time the first unit of four apartments was occupied. Since that time two units of eight apartments each have been added. There is now under construction, to be completed in September, a new unit of eight apartments. Construction has begun on an addition of thirty-five rooms to the main building. These will enable the Home to serve 185 members. The land, buildings and equipment are valued at \$1,500,000. There is an indebtedness of \$450,000. The Home's equity is now \$1,277,000.

On September 21 the Home will celebrate its tenth anniversary. At that time the 1959 addition to the Main Building will be dedicated in honor of Mr. M. M. Fowler who was instrumental in securing the land on which the Home now stands. Bishop Paul N. Garber will conduct this service.

The real meaning of life at any age is found in man's relationship with God, and this relationship gives meaning to all human values. The goal is not to keep the aging busy but to help them find in every moment an opportunity for greatness. In the Retirement Home, members are helped in meeting this goal.

A well-rounded, happy life is found in a religious environment with Christian companionship and an opportunity to be needed and wanted. The members find this in the Home along with security and adequate provision to meet their physical, social and spiritual needs.

The Home serves a twofold purpose. Besides giving needed care through its Benevolent Program it offers the finest facilities available for retirement in eastern North Carolina.

The apartments offer "retirement at its best," for the apartment members have all the privacy found in their own homes plus all the services offered by the Retirement Home. The members may move into the main building or into the infirmary on their request or on doctor's orders. You should investigate the apartments if you are considering retirement.

The basic requirements for admission to the Home are a minimum age of 65 (62 for apartments), a life of service to the church and community and a need for the services offered by the Home. Members are received on a monthly boarding basis or on a life contract. Each case is considered on its own merits. No one is turned away because of lack of finances, while those who are financially able are expected to make contributions to the Home.

The average monthly rate of \$158.87 paid by the members provides room, board, laundry, the services of the Home's physician, the medicine prescribed, and when needed the nursing and geriatric care available in the Home's modernly equipped and well staffed infirmary along with the religious and social program in the Home.

Fewer than one-half the members pay as much as the cost of their care; thirty-five per cent are Old Age Assistance recipients. The Home can continue to accept members like these only through a liberal Mother's Day Offering and through special gifts made for the Benevolent Work of the Home. The average monthly cost of operation is \$167.92 exclusive of depreciation and interest on investment. When these are added the total cost is \$233.41.

Support for the Home comes from many sources: (1) Payment by members; (2) the general giving by the churches of the Conference (used for debt retirement); (3) the Mother's Day Offering in the churches of the Conference (used for the Benevolent Work of the Home); (4) gifts from individuals and groups (the furnishing of a room and other memorials are available in recognition of appropriate gifts to the Home); (5) wills; and (6) memorial contributions sent upon the death of a friend.

Long Range Plans

The Home requests the continued privilege of receiving a special offering in the churches of the Conference on Mother's Day.

The apartments will eventually be paid for by gifts from the members living in these apartments. New apartments will continue to be constructed as long as there is a demand.

Recognizing the increasing need for providing adequate facilities and service for our retired and chronically ill people, the Board of Trustees of the Home is requesting the Methodists of the North Carolina Conference to accept this challenge. Funds are urgently needed to retire the indebtedness on the present buildings and for the construction of facilities for the care of the chronically ill.

Realizing that many individuals, families, and churches are vitally interested in the care of our retired people, the Trustees of the Home will welcome a gift of money and land for the expansion of retirement facilities in an appropriate location within the bounds of the Conference. Some individual or family can create a Living Memorial by making money available for this much needed home.

The first DECADE of service has been made possible by your prayers and financial support.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON IN-SERVICE
 TRAINING FOR PASTORS

The committee on In-Service Training for Pastors reports a successful pilot project during the 1964-65 conference year. Appointed in August 1962 by Bishop Paul N. Garber, the committee's program has been financed entirely through grants from the Duke Endowment.

During the months of October and November 1964 a total of thirty-five ministers from the Greenville, Goldsboro and New Bern districts participated in a Clinic in Preaching at Queen Street Church in Kinston. The lecturer for the five-week pilot project was Dr. Thor Hall, associate professor of preaching in the Duke Divinity School. Group leaders for the six preaching sections of the clinic who were appointed by the district superintendents included A. F. Fisher, T. O. Fulcher, G. R. McKenzie, Jr., J. T. Maides, Earl Richardson and William K. Quick.

Each participating minister wrote one new sermon on an assigned topic or text and

preached in one of the sections during the clinic for evaluation. Attendance was on a voluntary basis.

The clinic was planned primarily for the non-seminary graduate although it was open to the seminary graduates in the three cooperating districts. An evaluation of the pilot project by the participants, the group leaders and Dr. Hall emphasized the value of such clinics to the parish minister.

Based on the evaluation and the needs requested by the pastors, the In-Service Training Committee therefore recommends for the 1965-66 conference year:

(1) A Seminar in Biblical Theology for the ministers of the Greenville-Goldsboro-New Bern districts, meeting once each week for six weeks. This seminar is requested by the ministers who participated in the pilot project in preaching. The committee appoints William K. Quick as dean of the tri-district seminar.

(2) A Clinic in Preaching is recommended for the Rocky Mount District under the leadership of Dr. Thor Hall, of six weeks duration with one session weekly. The committee appoints C. Wade Goldston as dean of the Clinic.

(3) The committee also requests that preliminary plans for a Clinic in Preaching for the Fayetteville-Sanford districts be considered by the superintendents of these two districts.

The committee also wishes to express appreciation to the Duke Endowment for a grant of \$3,500.00 to underwrite the cost of the proposed seminar and clinics.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON INTERJURISDICTIONAL RELATIONS

Appointed by Bishop Paul N. Garber as a result of the action of the General Conference of 1964, the Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations has met repeatedly during the past conference year.

The commission accepted, as a basis for study and action, the plan of action for elimination of the Central Jurisdiction as amended and adopted by the 1964 General Conference of The Methodist Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, May 1964. This plan of action contained six recommendations pertinent to the Annual Conferences of Methodism. They are as follows:

(1) That each Annual Conference designate a committee or commission to meet with the designated group from the other conferences involved to discuss and work out together the problems and adjustments involved in the transfer of Central Jurisdictional Conferences into the regional Jurisdictions.

(2) That each of the committees of the newly aligned Annual Conferences and each of the committees of the Annual Conferences with which they overlap meet and discuss ways and means of merging Annual Conferences, or of transferring churches or groups of churches and arrange to care for all the necessary details involved.

(3) That each Annual Conference of the regional Jurisdictions, other than the Western, vote by record to receive into its Jurisdiction the Annual Conference or Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction which lie within the boundaries of the Jurisdiction, as provided in Amendment IX.

(4) That each Annual Conference of the Central Jurisdiction vote to merge with the Jurisdiction in which it is geographically located, by transfer as provided in Amendment IX.

(5) That each Annual Conference of the Central Jurisdictional and Annual Conferences of the regional Jurisdictions, where transfers are in the process of negotiation, meet as soon as possible after the Central Jurisdictional Conferences has realigned the boundaries of its Annual Conferences to take such actions as will facilitate transfers and mergers.

(6) That each of the Central Jurisdictional Annual Conferences vote consent to the transfer of any Central Jurisdictional Annual Conference which, by the necessary two-thirds vote, indicates a desire to merge with a regional Jurisdiction.

In order to pursue the study requested by the Annual Conference, the commission

also has met on two occasions with a similar commission from the North Carolina-Virginia Conference to evaluate progress and discuss possible action in carrying out the mandate of the General Conference. These sessions proved to be both interesting and helpful as we frankly and honestly considered the problems involved in carrying out the mandate of the General Conference, recognizing that there are definite problems to be solved in fulfilling the recommendation, such as:

(1) Support of the ministry.

(2) The pension plan.

(3) The possibility of merging certain small churches in the Central Jurisdiction before considering the possibility of the transfer into the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

(4) Certain property problems involved in the scattered situation of the Central Jurisdiction that would have to receive attention before further consideration of the merger.

The full Commission on May 1 recommended to the Annual Conference the following:

(1) We are in harmony with the church's stand on open membership.

(2) We recommend that we keep faith with the General Conference and the Southeastern Jurisdiction by supporting the plan of action for the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction, as adopted by the General Conference of 1964, and especially by voting at this Conference to issue an invitation to the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, lying within the bounds of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, which represents step number one of the "PLAN OF ACTION" adopted by the General Conference in 1964.

(3) We recommend that the executive committee of the Commission on Inter-jurisdictional Relations be authorized to work with a similar committee from the North Carolina-Virginia Conference in study and planning for the fulfillment of the General Conference Mandate and complete assimilation.

(4) We recommend that the Boards of Education staffs of the North Carolina Conference and the North Carolina-Virginia Conference continue to plan joint leadership education enterprises and activities in such areas as: Subdistrict Christian workers' schools; coaching conferences for prospective leadership education instructors; Vacation Church School Institutes; Training Institutes for teachers of mission study courses; District Seminars for pastors on "A New Day in Christian Teaching;" Subdistrict training sessions for church school officers; adult and youth teachers on the New Curriculum; summer training enterprises for adults and youth; Convocation of adult workers with youth, etc.

(5) We further recommend that the youth committee of the two conferences hold joint meetings for the planning of mutual youth ministries.

(6) That the subdistrict and district youth councils be urged to include the youth of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference in their activities.

(7) That the district Christian Education staffs of our Conference Board of Education consult with the district workers of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference to discover ways in which they can be mutually helpful.

The Conference Commission wishes to express its appreciation to Bishop Paul N. Garber for his cooperation and assistance.

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The North Carolina Conference is fortunate to have many dedicated laymen who are giving of their time, service, and material resources in helping to advance the Kingdom of God. Including those men on the district and conference level, over 1,000 laymen are actively engaged through the work of the Board of Lay Activities in training and motivating their fellow laymen "so that their spiritual life is deepened and they become a stronger and more effective force in the mission of the church-at-large, as well as the local congregation." To this end the Board of Lay Activities is charged. On behalf of all who have been involved, the following chronological report is given relating the program events over the past church year.

The theme emphasized during the year was: "Spiritual Renewal Through Christian Commitment." By working in cooperation with the Conference Board of Evangelism we are confident a more effective contribution was made in this area than would have otherwise been possible.

The theme of the year was highlighted at the Conference Laymen's Retreat held at Louisburg College on the weekend of August 22-23. Over 300 laymen heard Mr. Robert Rose, Goldsboro District lay leader, deliver the keynote address on "Evangelism—Our Witness," at the opening session on Saturday afternoon. Mr. Rose is also serving as Conference Director of Lay Evangelism.

Laymen attending the retreat were offered the following discussion groups: (1) Unit of the Twelve, (2) Visitation Evangelism, (3) Prayer, (4) Local Church Retreats, (5) Lay Revivals, and (6) Methodist Men.

Mr. Walter Anderson, Raleigh District lay leader, was the evangelist for the retreat and brought dynamic messages to the men gathered at the front of the auditorium in an act of re-dedication to Christ and His church.

Earlier in the church year, approximately forty of our laymen attended the Se. J. Laymen's Conference held at Lake Junaluska, July 30 to August 2. The theme of this conference, "The Church Tomorrow—What We Do Today," was used and supported by a variety of discussion group on: (1) Local Church Officers, (2) Personal Evangelism, and (3) The Bible and Prayer.

For the second consecutive year, District Training Sessions for Local Lay Officers were held throughout the conference. The purpose of these meetings was to offer our local officers the opportunity to learn more about their duties in the local church. It is estimated nearly 1,000 of our local lay officers were reached in the eleven district training sessions held this year on September 20 or 27. Courses were offered for the benefit of the following: (1) Church Lay Leaders, (2) Official Board Chairmen, (3) Methodist Men Officers, and (4) Commission on Membership and Evangelism. The latter group being led by ministers of our conference serving as district secretaries of evangelism.

Laymen's Day continues to be observed on a large scale in our conference. The second Sunday in October is the official date, though many of our churches observe the day on other Sundays as matter of convenience. The quadrennial theme of "One Witness In One World," was given emphasis in the promotional material received from the General Board of Lay Activities.

The Annual District Lay Rallies continue to be recognized in the church as one of the finest series of lay meetings held throughout the denomination. Now in their twelfth year the total attendance over the years has exceeded 60,000. For the first time the attendance reached 6,000 in the series this year. Several of the district meetings had over 700 in attendance and the Durham district reached 1,350 women and men. This record is thought to be the largest gathering of Methodists ever held on a district level in the North Carolina Conference.

It is estimated that 112 district lay rallies have been held in the Conference since their beginning in 1954. Of these, Bishop Paul N. Garber has attended and actively participated in 96. He challenged us this year to "build on the foundations of our great heritage as Methodists and followers of the faith." He again consecrated hundreds of our lay speakers taking part in the Annual "No-Silent Pulpit Program" scheduled during Lent.

The Board of Lay Activities, on behalf of all those attending the 1965 Lay Rallies, express appreciation to the eleven ministers of our conference who so ably brought the inspirational sermons on "The Call To Christian Commitment."

An offering was received in each district on behalf of a scholarship for a student entering the full-time Christian service from the district. The total amount received was nearly \$4,000. Twelve young people in our conference received scholarship aid as a result of the monies raised in the 1964 rally offerings.

One of the finest experiences the members of the Board of Lay Activities have shared together came on the weekend of April 24-25 at a retreat held at Camp Chestnut Ridge. The board's theme of the 1965-66 conference year, "The Ministry of

the Laity," was studied under the resource leadership of Dr. Howard S. Grimes, professor of Christian Theology of the Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas.

The Board of Lay Activities is appreciative of the cooperation received from the Conference Board of Education for making it possible to secure Dr. Grimes, and also giving assistance to local matters relating to the retreat. Already plans are being made for a similar meeting of the board at Camp Rockfish in April of 1966.

Methodist Men

The board is indebted to the services of Mr. Charles L. McCullers who is doing an outstanding work in the promotion of Methodist Men on the conference level. Under his leadership, and the several active district directors, notable contributions have been made to the life of many of our Methodist Men clubs. These men also head the responsibility of promoting the attendance to the Fourth National Methodist Conference to be held at Purdue University, LaFayette, Indiana, July 9-11, 1965.

It is difficult to ascertain at this writing how many new clubs have been organized in the conference this year, but we know of several new units that have received their charter from the General Board of Lay Activities and are presently serving a real need for fellowship and service in their local church.

In many of our established men's groups we are perhaps in need of clarifying the objectives of Methodist Men and urge our local clubs to give more emphasis to this in the coming year. Along this line, the filmstrips, *What Changed Charlie?* and *Chain Reaction* have been used to advantage to interpret the purpose of the organization by many of our local groups, and is available from Mr. McCullers or one of the district directors of Methodist Men.

Lay Evangelism

Mr. Robert Rose, Conference Director of Lay Evangelism, has given sacrificially of his resources over the past two years in the promotion of this area of the board's work. Scores of lay revivals have been held throughout the North Carolina Conference in a real effort to involve laymen in this aspect of Christian witnessing. Many churches have held two or more meetings of this nature over the past year or so, and we are most encouraged from the good reports brought to our attention of their results.

A suggestive list of certified lay speakers has been made available to local churches desiring information on laymen capable of leading in lay revivals and may be obtained from Mr. Rose in Goldsboro, or from the office of the conference lay leader in Ayden.

Through the direction of Mr. Rose's office, **Local Lay Retreats and Units of the Twelve** have also been given emphasis.

Lay Speaking

In addition to several training schools for lay speakers, offered in previous years, four District Schools for Lay Speakers were held in the conference this year. Over 100 lay speakers were certified. This number added to those of other years gives us several hundred laymen who have now received this official Lay Speakers Training Course as recommended by the *Discipline* of the church, and offered through the General Board of Lay Activities.

The subject of "Lay Schools of Theology" was discussed in the meeting of the Conference Board held April 24-25, and is to be given further consideration in the near future. In this matter we are in conversation with Dr. McMurry Richey, professor of Theology and Christian Nurture of the Duke Divinity School.

Stewardship

After a long search for many months for someone to give leadership to this important phase of the board's work we are pleased to announce the selection of Mr. James F. Rogers as Conference Director of Stewardship for the Board of Lay Activities. Mr. Rogers has previously served as Burlington District lay leader and more recently, as conference director of lay speaking. He has served the church well and faithfully in these tasks and we are fortunate to be able to secure his services in this new field of vital concern.

Mr. Frank H. Eason, comptroller of Methodist College, and associate district lay leader in charge of lay speaking for the Fayetteville District, is to succeed Mr. Rogers as conference director of lay speaking. Mr. Eason recently directed a successful district training school for lay speakers in the Fayetteville area and is highly qualified for this new relationship on the board.

A word of genuine praise and appreciation is extended to the good ministers of our conference who have been most considerate of our efforts in attempting to fulfill the purpose and objective of the Board of Lay Activities. Where we have faltered, they have given us words of encouragement. Where we have stumbled, the helping hand has been extended. Without their support our efforts would have been in vain.

To Bishop Garber and every member of his cabinet we offer our sincere thanks and appreciation for their support in helping to make this report possible.

REPORT OF LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

I

At the beginning of the new quadrennium the Long Range Planning Committee felt that it should make a careful study of the various areas of work in our Conference in order that it might find the areas of need in which it could be helpful in making recommendations which would provide for growth and progress. As a result subcommittees were set up to make studies in the following areas of interest:

1. **Evangelism: Population Trends—New Methods**
2. **Church School: How to increase attendance and prevent loss**
3. **World Service: Stewardship, Finance, Getting information to the people**
4. **Ministerial Recruitment**
5. **Publishing Interests: Advocate and Journal**
6. **Combined Population and Financial Trends**
7. **College Students and Church**
8. **Church Extension**
9. **Urban Church**
10. **Meeting Place of Annual Conference: Place and Time**
11. **Financial Benefits for Church Workers: Ministers and Lay Employees**

Many of the studies have not been completed and the analysis in those areas will be continued. The findings and recommendations of the following studies have been handed to the board or agency which would be concerned with giving the report its consideration, and, furthermore, implementing the suggestions contained in the report if approved: Evangelism (An exhaustive study of Population and Financial Trends of the North Carolina Conference Area has been made and copies are available through the office of the Commission on Town and Country Work); Church School; Financial Benefits for Church Workers; World Service; and Church Extension.

II

Report of the Subcommittee on Ministerial Recruitment

A very comprehensive study was made in this area and it is the feeling of the Long Range Planning Committee that this should be given special emphasis. During the last ten years our Conference has shown tremendous growth to the current number of 522 pastoral appointments. However, less than half of the new ministers we have received into the conference during this time have been native to the North Carolina Conference area. We respectfully submit that the crisis in ministerial recruit-

ment demands immediate attention and creative programming. We therefore make the following recommendations and request that they be implemented through the appropriate boards and agencies:

1. The commissioning of a professionally designed brochure describing the Methodist ministry in North Carolina. We envision a brochure suitable to be given to vocational counselors in high schools and colleges, to be given to vocational representatives in civic clubs and service organizations, and to be used as a piece to be given out on Vocations Day in our schools and churches. A copy of the brochure would be mailed to each Methodist high school sophomore in the fall of the year with a cover letter from his pastor.

2. That all candidates be placed on a mailing list to receive a quarterly newsletter published by the Committee on Methodist Information containing capsule news about the work of the church in "their" conference and testimonies of young people their age who are making decisions for the ministry as well as experiences of men who have just entered the ministry.

3. That there be an annual weekend convocation on the ministry. Any person who has expressed an interest in the ministry would be invited to attend a workshop in which they would hear the testimony of and a challenge from truly great men of our church, with selected ministers from our conference serving as counselors and sharing with them in informal and personal experiences.

4. That during the summer prospective candidates for the ministry over sixteen years of age who continue to show promise and interest be invited to a one-week workshop at one of our conference camps where they would be given training and then assigned (away from their immediate home area) as a three-week apprentice to selected ministers of our conference.

5. That letters and regular mailings continue to be sent to ministerial candidates while away at college.

6. That an annual retreat for ministerial candidates of the college age be held during the winter months for the purpose of deepening commitment and encouraging the formation of lasting friendships and enthusiasm.

7. That a fellowship of those seeking the approved supply relation would be formed.

We wish to give each candidate a chance to discover for himself the presence or absence of the necessary gifts and graces for the ministry of Jesus Christ, and we believe that the program we have outlined will fulfill that purpose.

AMENDMENT

Since the Methodist Church has been historically a leader in the ecumenical movement, and

Since Methodists are now active in leadership positions in the National and World Councils of Churches, and

Since appropriations for these Councils have been cut from the budgets of some of our Methodist Churches in North Carolina because of attacks made upon these Councils;

Be it therefore resolved

That during 1965-1966 the Long Range Planning Committee be directed by this Conference to make a study of these Councils and report to the 1966 session of this Conference, and,

That this report be circulated for study in every church in the North Carolina Conference during the 1966-1967 Conference year.

The Methodist Building leasing area is fully leased and the Conference wing is fully occupied.

Operations commenced on April 16th for the grading of the site which is leased for a 50-year period to permit the construction of an apartment group consisting of four buildings and 51 apartment units. The conference is not involved in this construction project.

Effective July 11, 1965, we shall have income from the lease in the amount of \$9,300.00 per year (escalating to \$10,500).

During the current year, our facilities were used for 70 meetings for church purposes and 21 meetings for the accommodation of our tenants.

Traffic in the Building has been greatly increased since the coming of the Raleigh Area and our own Bishop Garber. We continue to hear expressions of admiration for the building from our conference members and from visitors from other areas.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

Maturing is a good and essential process in the growth of any vital thing or organization. The Methodist Foundation has moved from a period of growing up and getting established to a period of maturing. The action of the Conference in 1964 to broaden the base of Foundation membership, the stability and steady increase of earnings on investments, the deeper understanding of the importance of Christian stewardship of material assets, and the noticeable increase in interest in providing capital funds for our Conference causes through gifts and wills are all signs that the Foundation is coming of age as a full contributing member of the family of Conference agencies.

Annual earnings of approximately \$95,000 have been realized this year by the Foundation for Conference causes. In addition, significant capital gains from investment transaction have been realized. Careful attention has been given by the Foundation to the portfolio of investments held, and a high quality, stable group of holdings has resulted. The advisory services of Moody's, Incorporated have been continued and every new investment made is reviewed by their representative.

In prior years, the Foundation has paid as a dividend to each participating agency their share of any realized capital gains. Your Foundation membership after careful study, adopted this year a more conservative policy. Capital gains realized are now placed in a reserve account for each agency and may not be withdrawn. Such a reserve is usual in operating an investment pool or trust. The past history of the Foundation indicated that capital gains dividends had been almost universally reinvested. In addition, the level of annual earnings has now grown sufficiently to make the use of unpredictable capital gains unnecessary.

Your Foundation continues to be aware of the fact that the successful results of its efforts to manage Conference funds is valuable only as a means to attaining program goals. We are all workers together in His kingdom.

Although a more detailed summary of the Gifts and Wills Department appears in this report, it should be noted that the work of Dr. Olen Hunt has been especially fruitful during this year. New promotional material of the highest quality has been written and printed. Closer working relationships with local church committees have evolved. A number of probated wills have produced gifts for our colleges and other agencies, and the number of wills known to contain codicils naming a Conference agency as beneficiary has been increased.

A detailed financial report appears as a part of the Conference Treasurer's Report on Board Operations. All interested preachers and laymen are urged to read this report carefully.

The report given below gives figures for the end of the third quarter of our fiscal year. The Conference *Journal* will carry the reports for the complete fiscal year. The total portfolio contains only 38.7% of "equity" securities or common stocks and this the Directors and Moody's Investors Service consider to be a good defensive position.

Our holdings of equities alone showed \$248,000 of market appreciation as of March 31 or 31% above our book values. The rate of return from dividends and interest alone was 4.59% on book value.

DEPARTMENT OF GIFTS AND WILLS

F. Oien Hunt, Director

As progress continues in the program of Gifts and Wills, interest increases. We began our new conference year with the eleven district superintendents appointing a district director for each district to give guidance to this work within the district. These district directors were given a list of the churches in their districts that did not have a committee on Gifts and Wills, so that they could help the local pastor appoint one. Several have sent in a completed list for their districts, and those districts now have a Wills committee in each church.

As a Conference we are pioneers in a Foundation, and Gifts and Wills Department. The Board of Lay Activities called a meeting of all conference representatives to meet in Chicago in September for the purpose of formulating plans for their future operations in the Wills department. Dr. John C. Brauer and I attended, representing this Conference. When our conference Gifts and Wills Department was organized six years ago, we were the first in the field; now there are 25 conferences with Wills departments. Of

this group, we furnished full materials directly to 21 of them. Most of the conferences in this country were represented by an appointed delegate to this convention, and from responses there, no doubt many more will be organized in the near future. There is a ground swell for will-making.

Following this meeting in Chicago, a meeting of our district directors was called by me to discuss plans for our program for the year 1964-65, and these meetings will be held from time to time for further study and advance programming.

Our large brochure is now out and being distributed discriminately, as is the new file folder for attorneys and banks. Those that have been distributed have been received in a most favorable and satisfactory manner, with expressions of gratitude for this material.

Our Wills Dinners during the last conference year produced excellent results in each district, as I know of many wills already made and promises by others to make one. There has been a marked increase in interest in this program among the lay people as well as the pastors. People are becoming more WILL conscious, and we believe that with our continued efforts, the people of this conference will become better informed, and come to a full realization of the importance of making wills, and more important, leaving something for the causes of the church.

THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION

The committee on Methodist Information completes its first year of official service to the North Carolina Annual Conference having been appointed by Bishop Paul Neff Garber in August 1964 following the approval of the 1964 Annual Conference in Burlington.

One minister or layman in each of the eleven districts has been appointed to assist the director in writing and disseminating news of Methodist activities to the press, radio and television.

Two meetings of the committee were held during the year and we report that coverage through newspapers and the cooperation of the press has been superb. Through a clipping service subscribed to by the committee, we note that hundreds of articles have appeared in more than 100 newspapers which serve the area of the North Carolina Annual Conference. These clippings are kept chronologically for permanent filing and will be an asset to future historians of the church regarding the activities of Methodism in the state.

Recommendations

I. We recommend that the official name of the committee correspond to the national Methodist commission. Therefore the name of the committee, as constituted, should be The Committee on Public Relations and Methodist Information rather than the Committee on Methodist Information.

II. We further recommend that membership on the commission be broadened to include one minister and one layman from each district. The layman should preferably be a Methodist newsman and active churchman associated with either a weekly or daily newspaper or in the field of communications, i.e., radio or television. The minister or layman on the commission would become the district director of Methodist Information.

III. We request each pastor to appoint a Public Relations committee within the local church to assist him in publicizing news items to the secular press and to the *N. C. Christian Advocate*.

IV. We commend the news media within the conference for their cooperation with the conference director and the district directors.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST STUDENT CENTER

East Carolina College, Greenville, North Carolina—1964-65

We are fortunate to have in Greenville a well-furnished facility on the edge of the campus of East Carolina College through which the Wesley Foundation program is ad-

ministered. Our proximity to the campus and location on the main route downtown allows for quick and easy access by students while providing us with a convenient location for meetings and other activities. The building is divided into three sections with adequate worship, drama and recreational facilities on the bottom two floors and an apartment with guest rooms on the top floor. We are now in the process of furnishing a library which we hope will provide us with a backlog of general works by prominent church historians and/or theologians for personal reference and group study.

A rough estimate indicates that over 500 students, faculty and staff make use of these facilities during the school year while approximately 150 persons are more than casually involved in the Wesley Foundation program. Over the past three years approximately \$9,600.00 in loans has been granted to students through the Wesley Foundation, a service rendered by the Methodist Board of Education. This fund is supported each year by the offering which is taken in the local churches on Student Recognition Sunday.

The Wesley program is jointly supported by the Board of Education through the Interconference Commission and the Board of Missions (through the Woman's Division of Christian Service and the Woman's Society of Christian Service of North Carolina Conference). Because of rapid expansion of East Carolina in recent years there is an increasing need for additional trained personnel to assist the director with over-all administration of the Wesley Foundation program. While the present enrollment (6,000 students) in itself presents opportunities for the campus ministry which are vast and demanding in time and concern, the projected enrollment for 1970 is 10,000 students which leaves little to be said regarding the need in the near future for a multiple staff to meet these opportunities and growing responsibilities.

Since the significance of the Wesley Foundation program cannot be determined apart from our grassroots concerns and individual response to these concerns, I would like to elaborate briefly upon the elements of the program which have involved students and faculty in a more than casual relationship.

Realizing that vital piety and knowledge are inseparable for the maturing faith, we have established communities for study and worship, and more recently, we have decided that coming to be the church in community through worship and study must necessarily involve some valid expression of concern for the world and for our brother; hence, worship, study and mission.

The students have been quite responsive to studies in the areas of vocation, the meaning of life and death, the will of God and social concerns. Resources have included *Life, Death and Destiny* by Roger Shinn and *Instead of Death* by William Stringfellow. "The Christian and Politics" was the theme of our Fall Retreat in which twenty-four persons participated and the Spring Retreat being planned jointly with the Wesley Foundation from Wake Forest received a favorable response from a number of students. The Student Council was also well represented at the National MSM Conference this year in Lincoln, Nebraska, and at the MSM State Conference in Greensboro, N. C. There is a weekly joint supper meeting at the Wesley Foundation which provides a time for fellowship and informal talk concerning the mission of the church and our ministry on the campus. Faculty, local ministers and other guests are invited from time to time to share in this concern with us. The Student Council is now in the process of determining ways in which we as a community of faith can apply through service our concern for all sorts and conditions of men. Proposed projects include jail visitation, voter registration, leading weekly worship for individuals who are sick or shut in, gifts of money and service in local poverty-stricken areas and raising money for other benevolent causes.

Interdenominationally, the other two full-time campus ministers and I are experimenting in several areas this year through which we hope to complement our own respective ministries and consequently, to serve more effectively the campus community at large.

Thus far this year we have set up four classes with approximately ten students in each class tracing the "Idea of the Kingdom of God" from Adam till now using for reference *The Kingdom of God* by John Bright. The response to these seminars has been so favorable that we are planning to continue with this same study again next year. We have just begun another informal group examining the meaning of vocation, sex and

marriage, the will of God and the problem of communication, with the campus ministers sharing the teaching responsibilities. And for the first time at East Carolina College, the group ministry is sponsoring a series of Lenten worship services primarily for the faculty, students and staff of the college. Sharing the preaching responsibilities, the five campus ministers (two of whom are also pastors of local churches) are leading these services with an honest attempt to convey our unity in Christ across denominational lines. Each service is concluded with Holy Communion.

Apart from this report on the general program as it has been presented thus far, there are always those opportunities which arise within the context of the program for pastoral counseling. Serious questions are being raised by students concerning the church and the validity of a personal faith for the age in which we live. Faculty, likewise, are expressing by their response a growing interest in the work of the church through the Wesley Foundation and are contributing much for the church's understanding of herself through the wealth of knowledge represented in their respective disciplines.

Altogether, this has been a year of change and experiment, but indications are that we are growing closer toward the realization of our purpose and mission now than at any previous time, which means a great deal for the future of the Wesley Foundation at East Carolina College.

Our Commission recommends for the conference year 1965-1966 that the minimum salaries of our ministers who are serving full time be as follows:

It is recommended that the conference move toward a minimum salary goal for men with five years or more service in the North Carolina Conference on the following schedule: a salary of \$3,800.00 for a full-time single man; \$4,100.00 for a full-time married man; and \$4,500.00 for a full-time married man with one or more dependent children, to be effective by or before the last year of the present quadrennium.

The Commission also recommends for divinity school student pastors serving pastoral appointments in our conference that their minimum salaries shall be as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

Report No. 1 General Statement

The Board met on December 7, 1964, to complete its organization and to make a study of its duties. The group was divided into two sections—Approved Supply and On

Trial—with a registrar and a chairman for each section. The following committees were elected: Psychological Tests, the Christian Faith and The Methodist Church, Recruitment, the One Percent Plan and Procedures.

The chairman and the two registrars attended a two-day workshop in Atlanta, Ga., in November where they were briefed on new legislation pertaining to the ministry. These sessions were helpful in establishing guidelines for the work of our Board.

The Board has prepared a "Check Sheet" on steps to the Methodist Ministry which is a summary of the *Discipline* as related to the ministry. These are available for all district and conference members of the Board.

New Legislation by the General Conference

1. Local Elders orders were discontinued. Only those who have been received into full connection in an annual conference may be ordained elders. No local elders. (Par. 403.)

2. A candidate for License to Preach must be a graduate of an accredited high school, unless he be 25 years of age or older.

3. Courses of Study shall be taken in an Approved Courses of Study School, except in emergency, or unusual circumstances, and then only when authorized by the Conference Board. The entire course of study shall be completed in a maximum of twelve years from the time of first enrollment to the Introductory Studies and the four-year course. (Par. 317.)

4. Part-time approved supply pastors are required to complete one-half of a full year's work in the course of study. (Par. 318.)

5. A member on trial must complete two years under the supervision of a district superintendent. His appointment as a student does not count nor does field work in a seminary.

6. Seminary candidates for full connection must take the course in history, polity, and doctrine while in seminary or must take it by correspondence. (Par. 344.)

7. Local preachers who have not served under appointment as approved supply pastors do not meet the qualifications for ordination as deacons. (Par. 393.)

Spring Meetings

Spring meetings for interviewing candidates will be held two days at St. Paul Church, Goldsboro, March 21 and 22, 1966, 9:00 a.m.; and Duke Memorial Church, Durham, March 23, 1966, 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m.

Recommendations

1. That, effective with the 1968 session, a minimum requirement of an A.B. degree or its equivalent from accredited colleges approved by the University Senate of the Methodist Church, be required of all who seek admission on trial into the N. C. Annual Conference.

2. That pastors and laymen who have helpful information about the unusual qualifications of candidates seeking admission on trial under Par. 325-3, communicate with members of the Board.

3. That "Studies for License to Preach" be taken through the correspondence department of Ministerial Education, Nashville, Tennessee, or in summer school.

4. That all candidates in the Course of Study attend the Approved Courses of Study School at Duke or Emory, and that financial assistance be continued as funds are available.

5. That all ministerial candidates seeking admission on trial or full connection, especially those under 35 years of age, be urged to obtain the B.D. degree or its equivalent from schools of theology related to the Methodist Church and accredited or approved by the University Senate. That those who drop out of seminary for unsatisfactory reasons be delayed in being recommended for full connection.

6. That Ministry Sunday be observed in every local church the Sunday of or preced-

ing May 24 (Aldersgate Sunday). That every minister give special attention toward securing highly qualified men and women for full-time Christian service.

7. That the Orientation Workshop for pastors new to the N. C. Conference be continued and held in July and that the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to make provision for financing it through the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, as it is the responsibility of this Board.

8. That each church be requested to make an annual appropriation equal to one percent of its operational budget (for the previous year) for the One Percent Plan—the fund for ministerial education.

Report No. 2

Proposed changes in the One Percent Plan. (Original Plan appears in the 1962 *Journal* of the North Carolina Conference, pp. 257-259).

Article III, Section 4c changed to read as follows:

The registrar shall be the regular secretary for the committee. The records, payments, and collections that will be involved in this scholarship program shall be handled through the office of the chairman of the committee. All monies in this scholarship program shall be handled by the conference treasurer, to be disbursed upon requisition by the committee chairman.

Article IV, Section 3: Delete the last sentence which reads:

A five percent reserve fund shall be maintained at all times; all funds collected in the current year of operation shall not be drawn upon except in case of emergency.

Article V, Section 1. The first sentence changed to read as follows:

The Scholarship Committee shall meet twice a year—prior to or during Annual Conference and again in the fall, preferably the same time as the cabinet meets—to process applications received by the chairman and/or the registrar of the committee.

Section 2. Add a third paragraph, reading as follows:

Approved Supply pastors, serving appointments paying the minimum salary, who wish to pursue studies leading to the A.B. or B.D. degrees, or both, may apply for a service loan subject to the same rules, regulations, and restrictions as shown in section three (3).

Section 3. Delete *a* and *b* paragraphs and substitute new wording to read as follows:

a. Applicants for service loans shall be students with financial need who are enrolled in colleges or universities, or seminaries approved by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and pursuing such studies as will lead eventually to Conference membership. The intensity of this need shall be indicated on the financial section of the application form, and discussed in an interview with the committee.

b. Service loans are not to be considered as salary supplements. They are loans to be secured by a duly executed note and subject to repayment, as per sections six (6) and seven (7).

Section 7. The first sentence changed to read as follows:

Those who receive their B.D. degree, or equivalent, from an accredited theological school, or Approved Pastors' School, may repay the loan in service under appointment in the North Carolina Conference.

Section 7. In the third sentence insert the words *or equivalent* after the words B.D. degree.

Article VII. Under Ministers change the following:

Ministers: W. M. Howard, term to expire 1968
H. S. Garris, term to expire 1972

Laymen: Cliff Edwards, term to expire 1968
Roy Turnage, term to expire 1972

The chairman of the committee for this quadrennium has been nominated: H. S. Garris.

REPORT OF METHODIST MINISTERS CREDIT UNION

"Within reach of the people of the South lie opportunities that stir the imagination! These things are possible. These states have the natural resources and the human resources to attain them. While much progress has been made and is being made, it must be accelerated sharply. We look to the future, not to the past. We seek positive, constructive thought and action."

These statements come from the Commission on Goals for Higher Education in the South. The Methodist Ministers' Credit Union might well repeat these sentiments. We have seen progress which we would not have believed possible in the Credit Union during these past few years, but if we believe in the opportunity and the necessity of service to our fellow ministers, we have only begun to attain the financial strength and vitality we know to be possible.

In four short years, since 1961, we have moved up significantly in rank among credit unions affiliated with the North Carolina Credit Union League. We have moved from 57th place in number of members to 32nd place; we have moved up from 95th place in loans outstanding to 30th place; we have moved up from 97th place in total assets to 35th place; and we have moved up from 106th place in interest income to 29th place.

These are meaningful statistics, but we have taken a forward step this year which presages even greater advances. We elected for the first time a full-time treasurer to direct the administration of our Union. No man has taken a greater interest in the progress of the Credit Union than has C. Maness Mitchell. We are fortunate that he sees the mission of the Union and is willing to give himself to advancing it with the fervor only he has shown. With his able leadership, the Methodist Ministers' Credit Union will continue its growth and service. We recommend his reappointment as executive director of the Methodist Ministers' Credit Union of the North Carolina Conference.

Your Board of Directors approved a dividend of 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ % for 1964, the third successive year at this high rate. Dividends for 1964 were in excess of \$6,007.00, whereas the total assets of the Credit Union were only \$1,219.02 in 1959.

Our membership has grown by the addition of 109 new members since April 30, 1964. On April 27, 1965, Mrs. Anne R. Davis joined, making the 700th member since organization November 18, 1938.

An important gain has been registered for every shareholder. The legal reserve was increased by \$1,403.81 in 1964 to bring the total to \$3,337.97. This is the sum required by law to safeguard your shares against default in payment by the members who borrow. We are proud of the fact that in our twenty-seven years of operation not one cent has been charged against these funds due to default in payment. Some accounts have been slow, but we believe in the integrity of our minister brothers. Circumstances are so altered at times that we must be patient. This we shall continue to be in the face of those who may not understand, but we must also stand ready to counsel, trust, and work to help those in difficulty. In this spirit, we believe we shall continue this excellent record of loan and repayment. We urge each minister to continue to repay his loan promptly so that this amazing record may more easily be maintained.

Loans are limited by law. No member may borrow more than 10% of the total shares of the Credit Union. Signature loans are limited to a maximum of \$750.00. Estate loans may be made in any amount up to \$2,000.00. All loans are set up to be repaid in 36 months or less. All insurable loans are covered by Loan Protection Insurance against death, total and permanent disability as a service to the members who borrow. The Credit Union pays the premium for this insurance.

Life Savings Insurance is provided as a service to the insurable members who buy shares. Again the Credit Union pays the premium as an extra bonus for saving, over and above the regular dividend (4 $\frac{1}{4}$ % last year). This insurance in most cases doubles the savings up to \$2,000.00 for the survivor.

We wish to express our appreciation to the loyal and interested members of the Board of Directors and committees. They have served without pay and have traveled many

miles, made many contacts and decisions which they believe to be in the best interest of the Credit Union. Each of us is indebted to them for this service.

With sadness we report the loss by death of one member this year, Dr. Joseph Paul Bartak. For a very good reason we cannot report that his shares were returned to his heirs doubled by insurance funds. The reason was well understood by Dr. Bartak himself. When he returned to the Conference, at the age of 77, he saw a vision of service to be performed through the Credit Union to his brothers in the ministry. He did not ask, "What can I get for my money?" but rather he chose to ask us, "How can I share with my brothers who need?" It is this spirit which will cause the Credit Union to grow and which will cause many to bless his memory.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, INC.

 GENERAL STATEMENT

Our report is a record of deeds accomplished and dreams to be fulfilled. The clerical and lay members of the Board of Missions meet regularly through the year to consider the many possibilities that come to our attention, and to deal as wisely as possible with the requests that are made for money and service. We exist for one purpose, and that is to serve God and to extend a witness in North Carolina and the world.

WORLD MISSIONS

World Service: "The supreme aim of missions is to make the Lord Jesus Christ known to all peoples in all lands as their divine Savior, to persuade them to become His disciples, and to gather these disciples into Christian churches; to enlist them in the building of the kingdom of God; to cooperate with these churches; to promote world Christian fellowship; and to bring to bear on all human life the spirit and principle of Christ:" (Paragraph 1176—1964 *Discipline*).

Your Conference Board of Missions has a responsibility in making the aim of missions a reality in every area, where the cause of Christ is represented by the Methodist Church. Through our World Service giving we have had a part.

Missionary Conference: The Missionary Conference at Lake Junaluska, July 22-28, 1965, is one of the great opportunities for inspiration, information, and motivation. We urge each church to send the chairman of the local Commission on Missions to this conference. Each district is sending two youth delegates to the Youth and Missions Conference, July 22-28. Many of our youth enter the field of missions as a result of these conferences.

Advance Specials: Advance Specials are the very lifeblood of the missionary enterprise. Each church of the conference is urged to accept at least one special in each of the four areas—Foreign, National, MCOR, and Conference.

Our Advance Special program includes the following causes: Lands of Decision; all new Methodist churches (organized since 1932), including parsonages, proposed sites for new churches; tuition scholarships for directors of Christian education; the Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College; Alaska Methodist College; Bethany Mission on Shiloh Charge, Rocky Mount District; conference missionaries in other lands; Caravan Methodist Church in Linz, Austria; work in European area; foreign students to assist

them to study in Methodist colleges in North Carolina; the Wesley Foundation, North Carolina College; Galilee, Laurinburg (CJ); St. John, Wilmington (CJ); John Wesley, Fayetteville (CJ).

III

HOME MISSIONS

Church Extension

In the past year the following new churches were organized: St. Andrews, Raleigh District; Coharie Church, Goldsboro District. In addition, we have helped in securing four new church sites.

Ten Dollar Club

We have aided fifty-seven new churches through the Ten Dollar Club since its beginning. There are today approximately twenty-six churches waiting to get on a Ten Dollar Club call. We need new members to the Ten Dollar Club if we are to keep pace with the growth in our conference. Our goal for next year is at least one new member per church in our conference. Since our last report, we have helped the following churches:

Let us keep up the good work we are doing through our Ten Dollar Club.

On September 15, the Ten Dollar Club committee meets to approve churches to be helped by Ten Dollar Club aid for the ensuing year.

When You Build Remember

In order to make a request for a donation from the Board of Missions, the pastor or some official of the church must secure an official application from the executive secretary, LaFon C. Vereen, The Methodist Building, 1307 Glenwood Avenue, Raleigh, North Carolina. This application must be completed and in the hands of the executive secretary not later than March 15th, annually. The applications are then processed and donations granted at the time of the Annual Conference. The funds granted on these applications will be available to churches, parsonages and other buildings within the ensuing conference year.

We recommend that each church follow the rules of the *Discipline* (1964) of the church and the laws of the state in all of its building programs. Any building to cost as much as \$10,000.00 must have the approval of the Commissioner of Insurance, and plans for any building to cost as much as \$20,000.00 should be drawn by a competent licensed architect. We recommend that all plans be presented to the District Board of Church Location and Building, to the Conference Board of Missions (if aid is requested), and to the National Board of Missions, Board of Architecture, for review and improvement if needed.

IV

AID TO CHURCHES

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Inc., was chartered by the State of North Carolina to facilitate the expansion of Church Extension within the bounds of the conference.

The Board has made nine construction loans for the building of churches this year, and has assisted in securing four sites for new churches. The Board has helped nineteen churches to secure loans from the Division of National Missions and has helped nine churches in the refinancing of their loans. Fourteen churches have been aided with grants, totaling \$12,440.00 and fourteen parsonages have been aided with grants, totaling \$7,600.00.

Parsonage aid cannot be given to a church for longer than five years and this must be on a graduated scale.

The grant committee meets March 15 of each year, and all requests for churches and parsonages should be in the hands of the executive secretary prior to this meeting.

V

MISSION RALLIES

We were fortunate this year in securing the following missionaries who were home on furlough: Reverend Bill Bigham, Brazil; Reverend Bill Garrison, Brazil; Reverend Seavy Carroll, Southern Rhodesia; and Reverend Lester Griffith, Algeria.

These missionaries gave glowing reports of their work on the mission field at various rallies and district conferences. We express our appreciation to the district superintendents and district missionary secretaries who were responsible for making these meetings possible. The response from our churches in supporting these and other missions has been very gratifying.

VI

MISSIONARY INSTITUTES

Missionary institutes were held in six of the eleven districts for the purpose of training teachers and workers in putting on their local mission study programs. We are happy to announce that these institutes will be continued this year throughout our conference. We urge all local Commissions on Missions to organize and promote the following:

1. Interpret to our people through visual aids and other materials the total program of World Service and Conference Benevolences.
2. Be involved in the quadrennial program and study, "One Witness In One World."
3. Conduct a church-wide school of missions in every local church.
4. Encourage young people to consider full-time Christian service as a vocation.
5. Fourth Sunday offerings to be designated for World Service and Conference Benevolences.

THE NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The annual Christian Convocation and North Carolina Pastors' School, together with the James A. Gray Lectures, was held at Duke University, October 26-28, 1964.

The main speakers were Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Jr., at the Bishop's Hour; Father Godfrey L. Diekmann and Dean Robert E. Cushman, the Gray Lecturers on "The Second Vatican Council;" Dr. Samuel DeWitt Proctor, Convocation Preacher; Dr. Eugene L. Smith, Pastors' School Special Lecturer; and Dr. R. Wright Spears, Alumni Lecturer. The Reverend Leon Russell was chairman of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

The 1965 Convocation and Pastors' School is scheduled for November 1-3, at Duke University. Speakers include Bishop Paul N. Garber; Dean Samuel E. Miller of Harvard Divinity School, Convocation Preacher; Dr. H. Shelton Smith of Duke University, the James A. Gray Lecturer; the Honorable Brooks Hays; and Dr. George A. Foster ('33), of Tampa, Florida, the Alumni Lecturer.

The new officers of the Board of Managers for the quadrennium are the Reverend Julian A. Lindsey, chairman; the Reverend Paul Carruth, vice-chairman; Dr. J. Lem Stokes II, secretary; and the Reverend LaFon C. Vereen, treasurer.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

The Board of Pensions of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church makes the following report to the annual conference, June 1965:

1. We recommend that the apportionment on the churches of this conference be an amount equal to 16% of the salaries of the ministers appointed to the charge;
2. We recommend an annuity rate of \$60.00 per service year for retired ministers,

and for retired approved supply pastors who have served not less than four consecutive years of full-time approved service in the annual conference. We feel this rate is necessary because of the almost 30% increase in the HMEP insurance, as indicated in last year's report. Also the 1964 session of the General Conference revised the claim of a widow so that any widow having a claim of fifteen or more years service to her annuity claim shall be granted annuity payment on the basis of her husband's total years of approved service. (See ¶ 1620.1). This action necessitated our conference Board of Pensions making payment for this special responsibility in the amount of \$7,597.50. No increase in apportionments has been asked to take care of these increases in our expenditures. We also had fifty-two charges which were delinquent in their payments on conference claimants in the amount of \$10,865.13.

3. The Conference Journal for the years 1962, 1963, and 1964 has carried a paragraph in the Board of Pensions report regarding those ministers who serve in special appointments. For the purpose of clarifying these paragraphs, and in accord with the 1964 *Discipline* this Board has adopted the following resolutions:

(A) The annuity credit for which this conference is to be responsible is confined to those members of the annual conference who are actively engaged in full-time work of the conference as pastors, associate pastors, district superintendents, executive secretaries, and many other salaried ministerial employees of the Conference;

(B) Those who are conference members, but engage in service outside these appointments aforementioned, may arrange their own pensions through the General Board of Pensions;

(C) If there are years of service in which the conference member has served in full-time work as pastor, associate pastor, district superintendent, executive secretary, or other salaried ministerial employee of the annual conference, he shall receive annuity credit for these years of service. For all other years of service, the conference disclaims any responsibility for allowing annuity credit;

(D) All special appointments shall be subject to the foregoing regulations, and each such appointment shall specify, "with annuity credit" or "without annuity credit," and shall be so listed in the Conference Journal;

(E) In the chronological roll of the Conference Journal, a new column shall be added, listing the number of years of annuity credit each minister has accrued. Those serving under special appointment, or who have served in special appointments will have their record of service years adjusted according to the foregoing parts of this resolution. This column shall indicate only those service years for which this conference is responsible. Any annuity credit earned in other conferences will be recorded in the General Board of Pensions;

(F) Beginning with the Conference Journal for 1965, all the ministerial appointments shall read, "with annuity claim" on the annual conference or "without annuity claim" on the annual conference according to paragraph 1618 (4) of the 1964 *Discipline*;

4. We recommend special appropriations as follows: Miss Nannie Pattishall, an amount equal to a dependent child's annuity for 28 years service; Mrs. J. W. Smith, \$600.00 and James E. Mahoney, one year's service \$60.00.

5. We recommend the list of conference claimants, their records of service and annuity be published in the 1965 Conference Journal under the heading, “Statement of Prospective Distribution, Conference Year 1965-1966.”

6. We recommend an annual honorarium of \$400.00 plus expenses for the secretary of the Conference Board of Pensions.

7. We recommend the continuation of the HMEP insurance program for retired ministers and their wives, retired ministers, widows, and widows with dependent children. We *urge* each person covered by this insurance to notify the secretary of the Board of Pensions of any change of marital status or change of the status of dependent children.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

The Commission on Promotion and Cultivation was granted the responsibility at General Conference to promote the quadrennium emphasis, "One Witness in One World." We are relating this emphasis to our specific purpose which is the promotion of World Service and Conference Benevolences in the local church. We are earnestly endeavoring to inform the local church of the financial needs of The Methodist Church and to engender and stimulate Christian motivation for giving.

We report the following as some of our activities in implementing "One Witness in One World:"

1. The commission conferred with Dr. Frank L. Countryman from the general board; Dr. O. L. Hathaway, member of the general board and our conference commission; and with Bishop Paul N. Garber, concerning the procedures for the quadrennium.

2. Our conference commission chairman, James H. Bailey, attended the District Superintendents' Conference held in Chicago in November 1964.

3. Members of our commission met with Bishop Paul N. Garber and the conference cabinet to assist in planning the conference program for 1964-65, namely, the self-appraisal phase. Especially do we wish to commend the district superintendents and our bishop for their leadership and initiative in the beginning of this quadrennium emphasis.

4. Each pastor was sent a copy of the study book by Bishop Roy Short, *One Witness in One World*. The study of the Book of Ephesians was promoted in each local church during the season of Lent. Many churches developed their own programs by using special groups, such as the Official Board, Methodist Men, Woman's Society of Christian Service, and Prayer Cells, for this intensive study. The study book, *One Witness in One World* was recommended for use during the post-Easter season.

5. Each pastor received a brochure containing a tentative program and schedule for carrying out this year's "One Witness in One World" in the local church. This brochure provided suggested resource materials and an order blank for the film, "And On the Eighth Day."

6. We have purchased or secured seven copies of the film, "And On the Eighth Day." Arrangements were made for the showing of the film in every local church. We believe this has helped in the promotion of World Service askings.

7. The commission financed the Board of Missions and Church Extension brochure mailed to the pastors of our conference.

8. The commission made available materials for use in district conferences.

9. The May 1965 issue of *The Methodist Story* featured the work that our conference commission has done in the quadrennium emphasis.

Next Year — Plan of Action

The year of 1965-66 involves the Plan of Action phase in the quadrennium emphasis. It is from the study of "Ephesians" and "One Witness in One World" we base the plan of action.

The most significant project in the Action phase is the N-1 program. The N-1 program is the sending out of a lay missionary from a neighborhood church to witness, serve, and assist any church needing specific leadership or any new church being organized. These persons would be members of that congregation for a period of one year in which time they would share their tithe, time, and service. Any church needing assistance or leadership should contact their district superintendent or district lay leader.

The Plan of Action will give special emphasis to the evangelistic program for 1965-66 which will be introduced by the Board of Evangelism. By making one witness, Jesus Christ, to the unchurched people we are taking a giant step toward making this world one in Christ.

The commission will continue to give interpretation to the causes of the church in order that we should help our people understand our mission and benevolent giving as a means of witnessing Christian love into one world.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC

The Methodist Board of Publication, Inc., created by the two conferences of The Methodist Church in North Carolina, is responsible for producing the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and operating the Piedmont Press. The Board is prepared to report to the conferences the following:

1. January and February were observed as "Advocate months" during which time several thousand subscriptions, new and renewals, were received. This represented the fruit of the labor of our editor, S. J. Starnes, and the loyal support of our bishops, district superintendents, and district directors of the *Advocate*, as well as our pastors, local church *Advocate* directors and members.

2. The Board is pleased with the format and general effectiveness of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* in the life of our conferences, but it is not complacent. A committee made up of persons not on the Board has been appointed to make a study of editorial practices and make suggestions for strengthening what we consider to be a good publication.

3. While other conferences find it necessary to provide subsidies for their conference papers, the Methodist Board of Publication operates at no cost to the two conferences.

4. The Piedmont Press, operated as a subsidiary of the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc., has shown a profit not sufficient to offset the loss involved in producing the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*. This year's preliminary report indicates a net loss of \$1,261.64, which is due in part to—

- (1) necessary increases in salaries and improvements.
- (2) no subsidies from Annual Conferences.
- (3) income due, but not yet received.

The auditor's report was not completed at time of this statement. It will be available in its entirety for inspection by anyone.

The Board makes the following requests of the conferences:

1. That the conferences, in addition to the usual campaigns promoting subscriptions, adopt as their goals the placing of the *Advocate* in the hands of all members of the Official Board during the coming year. To that end we solicit the cooperation and earnest endeavor of district directors of the *Advocate*, pastors and local church directors of the *Christian Advocate*.

2. Recognizing the fact that the profit from the operation of the Piedmont Press is used to subsidize the publication of the *Advocate*, we call upon all our conference boards and agencies and local churches to patronize the Piedmont Press.

The Board expresses gratitude for the continued loyalty of the pastors and laymen of North Carolina to the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*. We are indebted to Bishop Paul N. Garber and Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Jr. and other leaders in our conferences and local churches for their labors in the promotion of subscriptions and in the making of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* an effective publication.

We continue to be grateful for the services and leadership of the Reverend S. J. Starnes, editor-manager.

N. E. Edgerton of Raleigh, from the North Carolina Conference, and T. C. Hoyle, Jr. of Greensboro, from the Western North Carolina Conference, are renominated for terms to expire in 1970.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

In his statement to the Board of Publication concerning Methodist publishing activities in 1964, President and Publisher Lovick Pierce described the year as "significant for the Publishing House in that it marks its 175th anniversary and a long period of service. Equally important," he said, "it is a year of organizational fulfillment and unusual achievement."

Copies of the filmstrip entitled "The Methodist Publishing House—What Is It? Where Is It?" have been given to members of your publishing interests committee and are available for use in local church training classes, men's clubs, Woman's Society meetings, as well as the various conference and district meetings. Your committee recommends the filmstrip as one of the most interesting and comprehensive media available to carry the story of the Publishing House to the people it serves and urges the members of this Annual Conference to make every effort to show it in their local churches. The filmstrip is also available from our Cokesbury Regional Service Center on a free, ten-day loan basis.

Mr. Pierce reported that the past year witnessed a slowdown in volume of old materials due to culmination of plans for the new children's curriculum materials and the prospect of the General Conference's authorization of a new *Hymnal* and *Book of Worship*. Your committee views the future as increasingly bright in view of the unusual reception accorded these projects as they have been and are being introduced into churches and church schools in this conference and across the nation.

Initial print order for the new *Hymnal*, scheduled for delivery in the spring of 1966, calls for one million copies. In line with its duties as specified in the *Discipline*, your publishing interests committee is responsible for coordination of plans and arrangements which seem appropriate for introducing the new *Hymnal* to this Annual Conference.

The new *Book of Worship* and revised Methodist *Discipline* have been produced and are now available in our Cokesbury Regional Service Center and Cokesbury Stores. Church officials will find the *Discipline* to be a valuable source of information concerning the rules of the church and the administration of its affairs. The new *Book of Worship* is designed for congregations and individual church members in the development of a deeper devotional life. Your committee urges the members of this conference to

patronize Cokesbury for these items and encourage their purchase by individuals and families as well as church leadership.

The new Church Plan subscription rate for *Together* magazine virtually puts this colorful and timely periodical within the reach of every Methodist family. The plan makes the publication available at \$2.52 per year when subscribed to through the local church. We are encouraged to believe that there will be increased interest and support in this conference and throughout the church for *Together*.

The *Christian Advocate* (Central Christian Advocate in Annual Conference of the Central Jurisdiction) and *Religion In Life* are also important parts of our church's periodical program and are deserving of our fullest support.

The Methodist Publishing House, of which this committee is an extension, is making every effort to provide The Methodist Church with the services which it rightfully deserves from an agency given responsibility to promote Christian education by publishing, manufacturing, and distributing books, tracts, periodicals, materials, and supplies for churches and church schools. This is evidenced by the Publishing House's continually expanding publishing program which House administrators consider essential if the Publishing House is to keep in step with the church. The following achievements of the past year are illustrative of the services rendered by our Publishing House:

—Abingdon Press church music operations experienced growth beyond expectations. Forty-eight new church music titles were produced.

—In the field of religious books the *International Lesson Annual* continues to enjoy a high annual sale—51,706 copies sold during the year.

—The number of Abingdon bulletins used by Methodist churches increased by 53,997 per Sunday during the year and now stands at 1,618,979 per Sunday.

—Registered church libraries now number over 10,500—an increase of over 1,000 during the year.

—Orders for a completely new *Young Readers Bible*, to be ready August 1, 1965, are being received daily. Cokesbury Bibles sold to date approximate 225,000.

The Publishing House again set aside \$700,000 in 1964 to be applied toward the support of the conference claimants, bringing total appropriations since Unification to \$11,165,000. We must be ever mindful of the fact that the Publishing House is dependent upon the use of its services by the church and individuals in order to make this appropriation from year to year and to continue to offer the services which we have come to expect.

Plans For the Year Ahead

1. In light of the increasing difficulty of publishing a weekly church paper jointly with the western North Carolina Methodists we suggest some consideration and discussion in district meetings and wherever feasible of the possibility of placing a "North Carolina Conference Supplement" in *Together* magazine and of promoting this excellent paper in our local churches.

2. We recommend the filmstrip "The Methodist Publishing House: What Is It? Where Is It?" to all our laymen and preachers.

3. This year the Conference Music Committee, the Commission on Worship and this committee will sponsor jointly a series of district workshops on the new *Hymnal*. Tentative plans call for the following:

(a) a coaching conference in Raleigh on March 28, 1966, for leaders of the district meetings.

(b) during the month of April each district will be asked to sponsor a workshop on the new *Hymnal*.

(c) ready the publication of the *Hymnal* in late May.

4. Provide music courses emphasizing the new Methodist *Hymnal* in Christian Workers' Schools.

5. We urge the promotion of *Together* magazine in all our churches and commend to them the new *Hymnal* to be published next spring as well as the new *Book of Worship* which already has been published.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION FUND

Ministers' Emergency Relief Fund

1. The Sustentation Fund is to be used for emergency relief in the form of grants to effective ministers, and approved supply pastors serving appointment whose salary is paid by the local church or conference treasurer, and who become disabled to the extent that they are unable to continue their work, and whose income is not adequate to meet emergency needs.

2. Emergency appropriation shall be used to bring the disabled minister's income up to a maximum of \$4,000 per conference year. If the applicant receives any other income in excess of \$4,000, such excess shall be deducted from the emergency grant. In no event shall emergency funds be used to supplement an applicant's income of \$4,000 or above.

3. Aid shall be granted only for the period of disability within the conference year in which the grant is made. All grants terminate at the end of the conference year. Applications for renewal shall be subject to full mandatory review by the committee.

4. Application for aid shall be made in writing by the district superintendent of the disabled minister involved, and shall be sent to the chairman of the committee. Full and complete details shall be given as to the nature of the disability, present income and the amount of aid needed.

5. A certificate as to disability of applicant from a qualified M.D. shall accompany each application for aid.

6. All cases shall be subject to review by the committee every six months.

7. We recommend that the Ministers' Emergency Relief Fund be continued as an appropriation equal to one percent of the pastor's salary in connection with the Ministers' Retirement Fund.

8. We urge each district superintendent to follow carefully the progress of each recipient of aid and that the committee be kept informed.

REPORT OF THE TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

The Bell Pavilion at the New York World's Fair has the theme, "To Live is to Communicate." TRAFCO's ministry is to help you communicate the gospel of Christ to the people that they might live.

General TRAFCO has produced three new programs this year, designed to utilize the radio for reaching people with the message of Jesus Christ.

(1) The *Word and Music* program is a 30-minute scripted radio program designed

for use by local pastors in presenting the Word over his local radio stations. The Conference TRAFCO held a workshop during February and trained about thirty ministers to present this program. The *Word and Music* program has already been placed on several radio stations within the bounds of our Conference.

(2) The "Man with a Mike" is a five-minute daily radio program to be released in the fall of 1965 and will present interviews and human interest stories from all parts of the world, to point up the relevance of the Christian mission. This program is being financed through contributions to the TV-Radio Ministry Funds.

(3) "Night Call," a late-night audience-participation radio program, premiered on April 28. "Night Call" is broadcast simultaneously over three clear channel radio stations, designed to cover the entire United States. A special hook-up of phone and broadcast lines enables listeners from all over the country to call in and talk with the guests of the evening.

Your Conference TRAFCO needs unlimited funds. The only means of unlimited funds is local church support of the TRAFCO TV Ministry Fund. Unlimited funds mean unlimited effort to meet the needs of the masses and the Methodists through the TV and radio media.

Plans are under way to have a workshop designed to aid our ministers in using the radio and television media to better communicate the gospel. Leaders in both of these fields will be brought in to lead discussions and direct actual productions to demonstrate methods and techniques.

TRAFCO's Walton Memorial Audio-Visual Library, located in The Methodist Building in Raleigh, continues to render increasing services to the churches in our conference. We are sending out an average of about 250 filmstrips and movies per month. In addition, we are now handling tapes of the Annual Conference addresses, the Pastors' Conference on Evangelism, and other meetings of interest within our conference. These tapes rent for \$.50 and sell for \$3.00 each. A supplement to the 1963 Audio-Visual Catalog has been printed and is available from the library.

Report No. I

The Commission on Town and Country Work has begun a new quadrennium of service to the North Carolina Annual Conference with new leaders and a new sense of vision. It has been our purpose this year to strengthen the mission of The Methodist Church in the town and country areas of our conference through cooperation with the other boards and agencies of the conference. We believe it to be imperative to develop a comprehensive program for *all* of the churches we serve.

In addition to the above disciplinary responsibility of our commission, we have sought and will continue to seek to lift the morale and level of enthusiasm among both the ministers and the churches in our town and country areas. We are committed to the belief that there is *no second-rate ministry* in the total life of the church nor is there any *second-rate congregation* within the "body of Christ." All "members" are equally important and one cannot say to the other, "*I have no need of you.*" We sincerely hope that the organization of a Methodist Rural Fellowship will undergird and strengthen this effort toward a better esprit de corps among town and country ministers and laymen.

Further, we propose to study and make recommendations to the bishop and his cabinet concerning ministerial leadership in town and country areas (especially rural areas) in an effort to make this ministry more effective. We hold that we must be aware of and participate in various programs of cooperative ministry in several geographical areas of our conference. These efforts will require cooperation among both ministers and laymen.

Also, we commit ourselves to fulfilling the need for spiritual *revival* and *renewal* in the church and especially in town and country Methodism. We pledge to the ministers and churches of the North Carolina Annual Conference our assistance in preparation for and participation in the imminent (if not present) revival of Methodism.

We commit ourselves still further to develop an effective program of local church

stewardship for town and country churches realizing that a real sense of Christian stewardship is one of our most pressing needs and most promising opportunities.

Finally, and perhaps most important of all, we commit ourselves to lead the North Carolina Annual Conference in achieving a spirit of true unity and brotherhood as we seek to make "One Witness in One World" a reality for Methodism in eastern North Carolina.

Report No. II

REPORT OF THE PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

During the first year of the 1964-1968 quadrennium the Commission on Town and Country Work has made several significant changes in policy concerning the organizational work of the commission. Perhaps the most noted of these is the formation of ten Special Study Committees within the framework of the commission, these committees being assigned specific duties relating to certain areas in which the commission is vitally concerned.

The Reverend Walter N. McDonald, vice-chairman of the commission, has led in the responsibility of forming these committees and is to be commended for his leadership in this area. Report No. III of the commission gives more in detail an account of the effort in the development of the Special Study Committees.

Rural Church Clinic

Twenty of our North Carolina Conference pastors attended the Rural Church Clinic sponsored by the Duke Divinity School in cooperation with the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work. The school was held for two weeks on the Duke campus from July 20-31, 1964, under the resource leadership of Dr. Harold S. Huff, director of Town and Country Work of the National Division of the Board of Missions. Dr. M. Wilson Nesbitt, director of the Work of the Rural Church under the Duke Endowment, served as registrar and dean of the Summer Clinic. A special meeting of the commission was called for July 28, 1964, to enable the members to meet with Dr. Huff.

Jurisdictional Workers Conference

Six members of the commission, including three representatives from the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, attended a three-day session for Town and Country Workers in the Se.J. The workshop was held at the Hinton Rural Life Center, Hayesville, N. C., November 9-12, 1964. This meeting proved to be mainly a sharing of ideas with the various Town and Country leaders in the Southeast regarding the work of their respective conference commissions. Plans were also made for the Jurisdictional Town and Country Conference scheduled for August 9-13, 1965, at Lake Junaluska.

Town and Country Seminar

In cooperation with the Town and Country Church Committee of the North Carolina Council of Churches and North Carolina State University, a seminar on the Town and Country Church was held in Raleigh, N. C., May 10-11. The theme of the meeting was "The Church and the State of Society." The commission was represented with several members present.

District Secretaries of Town and Country Work

Following a planning session held at the Methodist Building in Raleigh on November 16, 1964, the district secretaries of Town and Country Work were charged with specific areas of responsibility concerning the work of the commission in their respective districts.

The 1965 *Discipline* recognizes the office and function of the district secretary as follows:

- (1) Work in close cooperation with the promotional secretary of the commission in all phases of the town and country program.
- (2) Expedite all program aspects in his district.
- (3) Assist the district superintendent in implementing the program.
- (4) Serve as liaison between the district conference programs.
- (5) Be a member of the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work.

In addition to these it is suggested the district secretary seek to become familiar with the strengths, the problems, needs, and the mission of the church in town and country. He is to utilize the conference program as means of strengthening the local churches. He seeks to enlist the help of the conference boards and agencies as resource persons through workshops and training sessions on the best level of reaching each local church.

The position of the district secretary lends itself to the training of the minister in the total organizational structure and work of the church with its aims, goals, and hopes, and makes him more keenly aware of the great potential as well as the pressing problems and needs in the local churches. (Statement from the *Manual* for the Commission on Town and Country Work as prepared by the National Division).

Local Church Production Story

Supplement II

This volume of tables was distributed by the district secretaries to the various charges in their district and represents the third in a series of productions by the Research Office of the Commission on Town and Country Work regarding the statistical records of the local churches of the North Carolina Conference. The book is a supplement to the two preceding production stories and much of the information is a continuation of the tabular records of the previous works.

This study was financed by the Ormond Fund of Duke Divinity School; was produced by the Research Office of the Commission on Town and Country Work, and is published by the Commission on Town and Country Work. The Reverend Reginald W. Ponder, chairman of the Commission, was the researcher and is to be commended on this excellent research study. The volume, properly used, will be helpful in the development of the local churches and their church schools.

The work of the commission continues to present a real challenge to those who can "catch the vision" of the goals before us. The commission has been fortunate over the years in attracting dedicated men of outstanding ability to guide its course along progressive lines of leadership.

Report No. III

SECTION A: In order that the purposes and functions of the Commission on Town and Country Work may most effectively be carried out, the work of the commission has been divided among nine working committees. The commission feels that this will involve the total membership of the commission in the many-faceted concerns of the 89% of the conference located in town and country and thus will enable the work of the commission to be more effectual. Following are the committees and their purposes:

1. *The Ministry*: To study the meaning of the ministry, the support of the ministry, the effectiveness of the ministry, and the programs of ministerial training for town and country.

2. *The Parish*: To study the "parish" concept and to make a continuous evaluation of the North Carolina Conference policies toward ministerial-parish load; to evalu-

ate the effectiveness of cooperative parish programs and to make recommendations to the annual conference concerning them.

3. *Evangelism*: To cooperate with the conference Commission on Evangelism in the development of town and country evangelistic programs, to evaluate the effectiveness of programs for evangelistic efforts in town and country.

4. *Methodist Rural Fellowship*: To develop a fellowship or fellowships of Christians committed to the ministry of the church in rural areas; to encourage membership in the Methodist Rural Fellowship.

5. *Stewardship Education and Development*: To encourage the total expression of the Christian's awareness of the stewardship of all of life; to encourage the observance of Rural Life Sunday; to assist churches in town and country in the development of sound fiscal policies and programs.

6. *Research and Survey*: To initiate programs of research and survey relative to town and country areas; to advise with other committees of the commission with regard to their research and survey programs by assisting them and by correlating and coordinating their efforts.

7. *Cooperation with Extra-church Agencies*: "To develop cooperative procedures between the church and social and governmental agencies;" to keep informed of extra-church studies concerning town and country work and to make these available to the commission.

8. *Cooperation with Other Church Agencies*: "To develop cooperative procedures" between the N. C. Conference and "town and country departments of the State Council of Churches and with churches of other denominations" in our communities and areas; to become informed of special programs of other conferences which might prove beneficial; to keep contact with the Duke Endowment and the Rural Church Department of the Duke University Divinity School.

9. *Recruitment*: To cooperate with the conference Commission on Christian Vocations and the conference WSCS in the recruitment of persons to minister to rural churches as pastors, lay workers, and community workers; and to develop a program for the same.

SECTION B: *Recommendations*: Although a large part of the conference year 1964-65 has been concerned with becoming organized, the following recommendations are presented for conference action:

1. Concerning the support of the ministry: We urgently recommend that the conference take whatever steps are necessary to increase its minimum salary scale. This we feel is one of our more pressing obligations.

2. Concerning programs of ministerial training: (i) We commend the conference committee on In-Service Training for its work. We recommend that additional programs be developed to provide opportunities for in-service training in the following areas:

- a. Inter-parish Cooperative Programming.
- b. The Minister's Personal and Devotional Life.
- c. Counseling with Abnormal People.

(ii) In view of the continued increase in college and seminary costs we recommend that the conference extend its participation in the 1% program and develop other resources in order that conditional scholarships and loans may be granted to pre-ministerial and seminary students. We further recommend that such standards and administrative procedures necessary to implement such a program be developed by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

3. Concerning the Parish: (i) We recommend that each district be studied in order to discover situations in which effective cooperative ministries may be developed.

(ii) We recommend that each Christian Workers' School and Leadership Training School provide for a course on Larger Parish and Group Ministry.

(iii) We recommend that all ministers being appointed to places involved in cooperative parish programs be informed of their type and programs.

Report No. IV

ROOTS, RELIGION, AND REVIVAL

Key Taylor's forthcoming book entitled *Roots, Religion, and Revival* and bearing the subtitle *In the Interest of an Enterprise of Spiritual Development of the Rural Churches, and of Rural Church Extension, and of Rural Evangelism* is eagerly awaited by all.

While most books on the rural church are national in scope and general in nature, this one is very specific, dealing with the rural churches of the North Carolina Annual Conference and written by one who has given years of leadership in the pastorate to the churches of which he so ably writes. One has but to peruse the Journals of our Conference during the sixteen years in which Mr. Taylor was chairman of the Commission on Town and Country Work to see his varied interests and concerns and foresight, and the contribution which he has made to this conference and to the rural church.

The book is being produced in compliance with the 1964 *Discipline*, Par. 1302.2, which calls for research and the outlining of a program of Town and Country Work. A lot of spade work has been done here, before the book could ever start to be written, and we will be richer for incorporating, studying and heeding the statistical analyses and admonitions enclosed herein.

The book would be of value if for no other reason than the insight it gives into the mind, spirit and experience of its creator, who has always been willing to experiment and to launch out into areas uncharted, neither slavishly following the past, nor uncritically accepting the novel and transient fads of a sensation-seeking generation.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Conference Board of Trustees scheduled its 1964 Annual Conference sessions for the evening of June 23 at the Front Street Methodist Church in Burlington. Regrettably no quorum was in attendance and no business transacted. Subsequently, a meeting was called for August 22, 1964, at Louisburg College. This meeting was convened as the annual meeting and as the organization meeting of the board for the new quadrennium.

The financial statement of the Board of Trustees submitted by the conference treasurer showed that funds totalling \$314,202.33 were held by the board of the conference at June 30, 1964. The statement also showed total earnings for the year of \$18,751.22 on funds invested with Methodist Foundation, Inc.

The sum of \$7,000 was transferred from current funds of the Board to the Board of Pensions at their request. This appropriation marked the first increase in the amount paid for superannuate ministers in over a decade.

A proposal to lease 2.42 acres of the Methodist Building site for the construction of a 51-unit apartment project and the provision of an Episcopal residence for Bishop and Mrs. Garber were matters discussed extensively at the Louisburg meeting. Both were deferred with the request that additional information be provided by the conference building committee at a later date. A subsequent call meeting was held on September 2, 1964, and the following actions taken:

(1) Following a formal presentation by the conference building committee, the Board of Trustees unanimously approved a lease to Call and Associates (trading as Raleigh Toune, Inc.) of 2.42 acres of land for fifty years at an annual rental to begin at \$9,300 and increasing \$100 per year to a maximum of \$10,500. Plans for the construction of 51 apartment units were to be submitted to the conference building committee for its approval as to appearance and quality of construction.

(2) Following a presentation by the committee appointed to obtain a residence for Bishop and Mrs. Garber, the Board of Trustees unanimously approved the appropriation of \$42,500 for the purchase of a residence at 2301 Beechridge Road, Raleigh, North Carolina, and the appropriation of an additional amount not to exceed \$7,500 for repairs, decorating and furnishing. It was pointed out that this appropriation was entirely from accumulated earnings on conference funds held by the trustees for the conference.

(3) The duty of the trustees to provide a parsonage for the bishop of the newly-

created Raleigh Area was accepted by the trustees and its chairman was authorized by resolution to conduct a quiet campaign among interested Methodists. A total sum of \$19,184.50 was raised and it was drawn from 319 contributors of whom there were seven at \$500.00 and above; 50 at \$100-\$499; 115 at \$50-\$99; and 147 under \$50.

The balance of the cost was advanced by the trustees and a process of liquidation of the debt has been arranged under the allocations and discipline of the church.

J. L. Horne, chairman; J. W. Page, vice-chairman; and J. M. Dozier, secretary, were re-elected as the board officers.

The attention of the Conference is called to the report of the conference treasurer which contains a statement of the funds held for the Board of Trustees.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF COLLEGE VISITORS — 1965

Members of the Board of College Visitors of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church made their annual visit to our Methodist schools: North Carolina Wesleyan, Methodist College, and Louisburg College, on May 3, 5, and 6, 1965.

The board was cordially received at each school and met with the administration officials, faculty and students of each institution to inform itself regarding the policies, personnel, program and life of each institution, with particular regard to their distinctive Christian character.

The board was impressed with the fact that each of our colleges was different in its approach, its appeal and its program, and that each in its own way is fulfilling a distinctive need in the North Carolina Conference area for higher education. We were impressed with the good relationships between faculty and students, and feel that in the small school atmosphere the faculty is able to contribute not only their subject matter, but also to give of themselves, in character and influence in the maturing process of the student. This is appreciated by both student and faculty.

Our Methodist schools desperately need our support financially that they may improve the effectiveness of their task, already well begun, and command a place of leadership in faculty and student enrollment, so that they may more effectively contribute to the educational process and the spiritual enrichment of the college community. Facilities for meaningful worship experiences and a full-time chaplaincy program are needed on each campus.

The administrative staffs of each school are attempting to meet their obligations to the conference and the student bodies in an effective manner. While each approach is handled differently on each campus a spirit of able leadership is most evident and we can be proud that our schools and our children are in such dedicated and capable hands.

The board was impressed by the high caliber of the faculties on our campuses, indicating an emphasis on scholastic excellence in balance with physical surroundings and spiritual development.

The student bodies are appreciative of the efforts made in their behalf and have a healthy love and loyalty for their individual institutions and feel the real impact of their college experiences upon their lives.

Your board feels that our conference should be justifiably proud of our Methodist colleges and should uphold them with our financial support and by sending them our students. We need have no fears, nor reservations as to the capabilities of our colleges to educate and to inspire the youth of our land, equally as well, if not better, than other institutions in our area.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

In the quadrennial emphases for 1964-68, we will continue to give attention to the interpretation of Christian vocations in general, church vocations in particular, and the

ministry specifically. "The program, rooted in the local church, will center around three basic considerations: deepening the spiritual disciplines of young people and adults to accept the Lordship of Jesus Christ; development of pastoral and parental encouragements in helping individuals to understand the meaning of vocation and to respond to the needs of service; and conservation of decisions already made for church-related vocations through more effective programs of counseling and guidance."

I. To help attain these goals, during the past conference year:

1. We have sent each local church chairman a copy of "The Local Church Committee on Christian Vocation" and encouraged them to activate their respective committees.

2. We have ordered copies of the booklet "Methodist Church-Related Vocations and Service Projects, 1965" which will be distributed to each young person attending conference MYF summer assemblies. A number were also distributed at the Methodist Student Movement Conference which was held in February. We commend the use of this booklet which was sent by the Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations to each minister.

3. We had seven of our district directors in attendance at Lake Junaluska last August for the seminar, "Recruitment and Counseling for Christian Vocations."

4. We cooperated with the conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications in sending a joint letter urging the observance of "Ministry Sunday" on May 23, 1965.

5. We prepared and, through the cooperation of the cabinet, made available a fourth quarterly conference report blank to be used by each local church committee to report its progress over the past year.

6. We cooperated with the conference Board of Lay Activities in the preparation of application blanks to be used by pre-ministerial students seeking the pre-ministerial scholarships made available by means of the generous offerings taken for this purpose in each district lay rally. These application blanks are available from the district lay leader, the district superintendents, or the district director of Christian vocations.

7. We cooperated with the North Carolina Conference MYF in a recent weekend conference on Christian vocations held at Methodist College. The chairman of this commission served as dean of this conference.

II. During the coming conference year, 1965-66:

1. There will be four "Bishop's Survey on Christian Vocations" meetings. The local pastor, one leading youth, and the chairman of the local church committee on Christian Vocations from each church will attend. Bishop Paul N. Garber will be present in these meetings which will be surveys of what each of these three groups can do in this area of Christian vocations. These meetings will be held:

(a) At Durham, Monday, March 21, at 7:30 p.m. for Raleigh, Durham and Burlington Districts

(b) At Goldsboro, Tuesday, March 22, 7:30 p.m., for Greenville, Goldsboro, and New Bern Districts.

(c) At Fayetteville, Wednesday, March 23, 7:30 p.m. for Sanford, Fayetteville, and Wilmington Districts.

(d) At Rocky Mount, Thursday, March 24, 7:30 p.m. for Rocky Mount and Elizabeth City Districts.

2. Each district committee on Christian Vocations, under the direction of the district director, will have a follow-up consultation on the "Bishop's Survey" and make appropriate plans for the district's work.

3. We urge each district director to guide district training of local church committees on Christian Vocations.

4. Each local church chairman shall receive the pamphlets, "Resource Materials in Christian Vocations" and "The Local Church Committee on Christian Vocations."

5. We encourage each local MYF and subdistrict and district MYF to have at least two programs each year on Christian vocations.

6. We urge the use of the various filmstrips in the area of Christian vocations which can be rented from TRAFICO.

7. We urge the observance of Ministry Sunday, May 22, 1966.

8. We recommend that local pastors and district directors cooperate with local school officials in promotion of Christian vocations by consultation with guidance counselors, through Career Days, and by making Christian vocation packets, booklets, etc., available to these high school counselors.

9. We urge each minister to examine the image he projects and its effect upon his role in the area of leading individuals into Christian vocations.

III. We wish to express our appreciation to:

1. The Methodist Church for making "The Methodist Story" available to each local church chairman of Christian vocations and we trust this shall be continued.

2. The district superintendents for their support and cooperation at all times and especially in making the committee on Christian Vocations Quarterly Conference Report a required yearly report.

3. The conference Board of Lay Activities for its support and for the generous offerings for pre-ministerial scholarships made available through the district lay rallies. We hope these may continue.

4. Our three colleges—N. C. Wesleyan, Methodist College and Louisburg College—for their guidance and direction of our students and to Duke Divinity School for the training of those students who choose church-related vocations.

5. The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, the Board of Education, and all other conference boards and agencies which assist us with emphasis upon Christian vocations.

6. The Woman's Society of Christian Service for the scholarships which they make available to those individuals entering church-related vocations.

7. Our district directors of Christian Vocations: H. W. Pearce, J. C. Alexander, R. H. Jordon, R. D. Hicks, H. S. Garris, C. L. Cherry, J. S. Epperson, J. L. Hunter, G. P. Phillips, J. W. Scott, Travis Owen, as well as the rest of our commission.

8. Bishop Paul N. Garber, R. Grady Dawson, our representative, and the ministers and laymen for their support in the cause of leading youth and adults into Christian and church-related vocations.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND THE WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

The Woman's Society with the Wesleyan Service Guild has had an encouraging year. Last summer we had the largest attendance to date at both the Spiritual Life Retreat held at Louisburg College, and the School of Missions held at Methodist College. Due to the creation of the two new districts the need for a conference-wide training day was felt; this was held in Kinston in August and was well attended by the district officers. In September workshops on "Purpose and Program" were held in each district.

This has been a year of increased cooperation with the agencies of the Annual Conference. The Woman's Society has cooperated with the Board of Missions in the Raleigh Inner-City Mission, largely supporting the worker, and in the Pembroke Area, where we support two workers. A love offering given by the local Woman's societies and by individual members, in the amount of \$5,000.00 has been given to help in the building of a sanctuary for the Branch Street Church in Lumberton. We worked with the Board of Christian Social Concerns in the planning and promotion of the convocation, "Christianity Confronts Communism." We continue to support the program carried on by the Wesley Foundation at East Carolina College.

The eleven districts and the Wesleyan Service Guild have made possible our largest pledge to the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church, \$173,660.00 for the year 1965-1966, an increase of over \$20,000.00. We expect our total giving to the Board of Missions to reach \$200,000.00 for the current year.

We feel that the efficient and rewarding work done by the Woman's Society of Christian Service is due first, to the distinct and satisfying channels of service offered, and second, to the comprehensive program of missionary education acquired through our programs, studies, and magazines (*World Outlook* and *The Methodist Woman*). Now that primary responsibility for missionary education of all our people, children, youth, and adults, lies in the commissions of the local church, we shall work with these groups, as members of each, in striving to give all Methodists this type of education which challenges and inspires us to meet the needs studied. Such an education will give a greater sense of responsibility in carrying out the World Service program of our church.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 1

As eastern Carolina Methodists, ours is a great heritage!

Now this conference enters a new spiritual phase, under the dynamic, devoted, leadership of Bishop Garber, as the Raleigh Area. Our progress is being closely watched by all Methodism and with this privilege goes commensurate Christian responsibility and responsiveness to this earth's greatest cause and crusade, the Church of Jesus Christ. There is much to encourage us. We are an Area of The Methodist Church! We are now over two hundred thousand strong—a milestone passed this year! We are now eleven districts! We are now blessed with two senior colleges—having graduated their first classes, and a brilliant, 'second-to-none' junior college! We cherish within our boundary a great international university and divinity school! We have a beautifully maintained Children's Home. We undergird an outstanding Methodist Retirement Home, with apartment annex.

Allocations to the charges shall be made by the district superintendent for both Column A and Column B. Fund No. 7 Benevolences shall be distributed thus: Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptances up to the amount fixed in the budget. Any surplus shall be held by the conference treasurer to be expended by the Annual Conference upon recommendation of the Commission. In the event collections under Item No. 7 Benevolences shall fall short, the Commission recommends that the Items for Connectional Funds (section III A) shall be paid in full and that the items under Sections III B and C, World Service, Conference Benevolences, and Other Conference Benevolences shall be pro-rated on the basis of remaining receipts. We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance, subsequent to the distribution of these funds, shall be authorized to hear requests and to act upon same within the budget amounts in accordance with the judgment of the Commission by appropriation from other funds on hand, unallocated.

Remittances for these funds shall go to Marvin J. Cowell, Treasurer, P. O. Box 10955, Raleigh, N. C. Remittance forms should be requested if needed.

At the close of the year the total amount realized from Fund No. 4 is to be divided by the conference treasurer as follows: one-half to Ministers' Retirement Fund and one-half for Sustentation Fund (Discipline, 1964, Paragraph 828) for emergency aid to ministers of the conference who may be in special need.

The Commission report of approved requests for supplemental appropriations will be submitted in Report No. 2.

VI

LIMITING AND SUPPLEMENTING PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE BUDGET

1. (a) The salary of each of the district superintendents shall be set at \$10,200.00, including travel. Such part of said salary that is paid out by such district superintendent to cover the actual costs of all those utilities applicable to the operation and maintenance of his district parsonage is hereby assigned as housing expense not to exceed the sum of \$600.00 for heat, water, electrical services and residential telephone.

(b) We approve the use of an amount up to \$3,000 to be provided by each district for the district superintendent for secretarial help and promotion of the district program.

(c) To provide for Cabinet Meeting expenses.

2. The Commission recommends that each person who has authority to draw checks against an account of a conference agency be required to present annually to the full membership of his agency a complete list of all checks drawn, justifying all checks with the budget approved by his agency.

3. The Commission recommends that each agency whose accounts are not audited in the treasurers' office be required to have an annual audit made and furnish this commission with a copy of it.

4. Under the Church Extension Fund the first \$40,000.00 is earmarked to be paid to Board of Missions, Inc., for the revolving fund to be used for loans to build churches and/or acquire choice sites for new congregations or to repay money borrowed by Board of Missions, Inc.

5. The Commission recommends that no conference agency's budget incorporate within it funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

VII

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the conference.

1. Wesley Foundation Commission for special gifts for the benefit of special works in the state supported institutions.
2. The Board of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.
3. That the Board of Education be authorized to solicit from churches, groups and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the camps of the North Carolina Conference.
4. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, for the privilege of promoting Mother's Day offering for the Home and the receipts of a special Mother's Day offering in the churches for the benevolent work of the Home.
5. The Methodist Home for Children for the privilege of receiving a special offering at the Thanksgiving season and of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.
6. The Methodist Foundation, Inc., as provided in its charter.
7. The Town and Country Commission, Rural Church Fund, for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

VIII

We recommend to charge or church treasurers that they set up a schedule for remitting at a stated time each month and to close their year as early as possible. Final remittance should be mailed by Monday one week preceding the opening of Conference. By use of our data processing equipment in just one week we can finalize our conference financial program, and present this to our people at our Annual Conference session.

We recommend that local churches remit in 11 installments commencing on the first Monday in August and terminating the Monday preceding conference. They can be exactly or approximately equal. It simplifies the work of the local church treasurer for these periodic remittances to include one or several items in whole or in part rather than to remit one eleventh of each and every item.

The pastors bear responsibility to check with their local treasurers for full remittance of all budgeted items and all funds collected as specials and to harmonize their reports to Annual Conference with Conference Treasurer's acknowledgments both received and pending. Pastors should compare and keep on file all acknowledgments and the Data Processing reports from the Conference Treasurer. Errors if detected should be reported.

We report the issuance of a Fidelity Bond in Employers Mutual Casualty Company of Des Moines, Iowa, to cover the conference treasurer in the amount of \$100,000.00 and to cover the assistant to the treasurer in the amount of \$25,000.00; others to a minimum of \$10,000.00 in said office. Also to cover others handling funds: Superintendent of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$50,000.00; Business Manager of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$50,000.00; and others to the amount of \$10,000.00 in various offices. Executive Secretary Board of Missions, Inc., \$50,000.00.

We recommend the continuation of A. M. Pullen & Company as auditors.

Report II

The Future Belongs to Those Who Prepare for it!

Looking ahead, way ahead, and bringing our Area Program into focus with the whole of Methodism, the Commission on World Service and Finance sincerely recommends adoption of the financial closing date of the General Church being May 31 of each year.

Realizing full well, the underlying factors involved within our Area, to achieve this, and desirous of having the changeover accomplished with a minimum of financial headaches, and believing that it can be done if hearts and minds work concurrently and in harmony, we ask the adoption of the following closing dates for our North Carolina Conference Fiscal Year:

Closing time for receipt of funds at the Conference Treasurer's Office will be 8:30 a.m. mail.

Every agency can and should avail themselves to the fullest, of this philosophy of the printed word being invaluable to the furtherance of "The Methodist Story in Eastern North Carolina."

In the light of an expanded Conference Program, now full-fledged as this becomes the Raleigh Area of Methodism, we find an expanded program and enthusiastic endeavors being formulated by nearly every major agency and commission for the next years of this quadrennium. With this emphasis, the need for exact, accurate, and somewhat expanded services by our conference accounting office to furnish desired information becomes imperative. The Treasurer's office exists only to serve the daily financial program of all Eastern North Carolina Methodists responsibly and efficiently. Our Data Processing adventure has proven to all Methodism that accurate information placed into the hands of the Bishop and his Cabinet, and his ministers, means fiscal responsibility at the local church level, and has justified the expenditure many times.

Many hands and hearts have given untold time and unselfish loyalty to the culmination of such a program and this Commission recommends that additional recognition be given to Mrs. Eda M. Rogers, a key figure in the Conference Treasurer's Office, by being named as Assistant Treasurer.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

Building upon the effective work of the previous two quadrennia, which had been under the leadership of Dr. Vergil Queen and Dr. John J. Rudin II, we have endeavored to carry out a growing approach to worship concerns. Most of our emphasis has been on helping the pastors.

We began the year with a Planning Retreat at Camp Chestnut Ridge, in order to focus upon our goals and tasks for the year.

Seminars were held in each district on the revised Communion ritual, with Dr. William F. Dunkle, Jr. (Secretary of the General Commission on Worship) giving us guidance on the topic. His presentation was followed by Dr. J. J. Rudin's discussion of the practical use of the service. Each seminar ended with the celebration of Holy Communion, with the host district superintendent and the ministerial representative serving as celebrants.

In order to prepare for the seminars, our district superintendents were kind enough to meet with the Commission. There were two such meetings—one in Goldsboro, one in Raleigh, for their convenience.

Plans have been made for a Commission "booth" at the 1965 Annual Conference. Commission members will be available to discuss the new *Book of Worship* and other interests in this area.

In addition to four regularly scheduled meetings, six members of the Commission attended the Jurisdictional meeting of Commissions on Worship, at Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia.

Recommendations for the new Conference year are:

(1) Planning Retreat, October 15-16, at Camp Chestnut Ridge, with study of a pertinent theme, and planning of year's activities.

(2) Between January 23-29, 1966, there will be seminars in our districts on "the morning service of worship"; these seminars will be planned for pastors and members of local church Commissions on Worship.

(3) In co-operation with the Committee on Publishing Interests and the Board of Education, we will have presentation of the new *Methodist Hymnal* in the spring of 1966.

(4) On April 2, 1966, there will be a Bishop's Membership Training Session for children and youth.

(5) Members of the Commission will be encouraged to attend the National Convocation on Worship, April 18-21, 1966.

(6) A general effort will be made to work with local church commissions and to furnish them with resources for their study and planning.

It is our sincere desire to serve the church, to help our congregation worship God in significant and meaningful ways.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE WORK OF CONFERENCE BOARDS, COMMISSIONS, ETC.

The 1964 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference adopted the following resolution, submitted by Wade Goldston, J. D. Young, and Herman Winberry:

"That Bishop Garber appoint a committee of ten to study the work of our conference Boards, Commissions and other Agencies employing salaried personnel to ascertain the number of employed personnel which would promote the causes of our conference with greatest efficiency and economy.

"The Committee of ten shall be composed of an equal number of pastors and lay men or lay women and shall come from rural and city churches.

"The committee shall report to the 1965 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference and necessary expenses shall be provided by the conference Commission on World Service and Finance."

The persons appointed by Bishop Garber to constitute this committee are, Clerical: C. D. Barclift, chairman, R. W. Bradshaw, J. T. Maides, R. W. Ponder, H. S. Winberry. Lay: Walter F. Anderson, Marvin K. Blount, Mrs. Sam A. Dunn, Alonzo C. Edwards, J. Nelson Gibson, Jr.

Since a similar resolution has been adopted by our conference several times in recent years, it is the judgment of this committee that the conference wants a rather

comprehensive study made, which the present committee is trying to do. The committee has had three meetings but its study is not completed; therefore, it requests its continuance for another year.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Amendment No. 13 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning the Time and Place of Meeting of Jurisdictional Conferences.

At its seventh quadrennial session, held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, April 26-May 8, 1964, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3) on Monday morning, May 4, 1964, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Division II, Section IV, Art. IV, Paragraph 14 of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church which reads as follows:

"Para. 14, Art. IV.—Each Jurisdictional Conference shall meet within the twelve months succeeding the meeting of the General Conference at such time and place as shall have been determined by the preceding Jurisdictional Conference, or by its properly constituted committee. The first meeting of each Jurisdictional Conference after the General Conference shall be called by the Council of Bishops at a date fixed by them and at a place selected by a committee on entertainment appointed by them." by deletion and substitute for it the following:

"Para. 14, Art. IV.—Each Jurisdictional Conference shall meet at the time determined by the Council of Bishops or its delegated committee, each Jurisdictional Conference convening on the same date as the others and at a place selected by the Jurisdictional Committee on Entertainment, appointed by its College of Bishops unless such a committee has been appointed by the preceding Jurisdictional Conference."

Amendment No. 14 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning Residential and Presidential Supervision of Bishops.

At the seventh quadrennial session, held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, April 26-May 8, 1964, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3) on Monday morning, May 4, 1964, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Division III, Art. V, Paragraph 38, the first subparagraph, of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church which reads as follows:

"Para. 38, Art. V.—The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected. A bishop may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for residential and residential supervision by the Council of Bishops when such transfer is requested by the Jurisdictional Conference to which such proposed transfer is to be made."

by deletion and substitute for it the following:

"Para. 38, Art. V.—The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected or to which they are transferred. Bishops may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for residential and residential supervision under the following conditions: (1) The transfer of bishops may be on either of two bases: (a) a jurisdiction which receives a bishop by transfer from another jurisdiction may transfer to that jurisdiction or to a third jurisdiction one of its own bishops eligible for transfer, so that the number transferred in by each jurisdiction shall be balanced by the number transferred out, or (b) a jurisdiction may receive a bishop from another jurisdiction and not transfer out a member of its own College of Bishops. (2) No bishop shall be transferred unless he shall have given his specific consent. (3) No bishop shall be eligible for transfer

until he has served one quadrennium in, or under assignment by, the jurisdiction which elected him to the episcopacy. (4) All such transfers shall require the approval by a majority vote of the members, present and voting, of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved after consideration by the Committees on Episcopacy. After the above procedures have been followed, the transferring bishop shall become a member of the receiving College of Bishops and shall be subject to residential assignment by that Jurisdictional Conference. Conditions (2), (3), and (4) above shall not apply in the case of the transfer of a bishop from the Central Jurisdiction in connection with the transfer of one or more Annual Conferences of the jurisdiction under Amendment IX."

Amendment No. 15 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning Membership in the Annual Conference of the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Conference Lay Lear.

At its seventh quadrennial session, held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, April 26-May 8, 1964, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3) on Wednesday evening, May 6, 1964, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Amendment X (Div. II, Sec. VII, Article 1 (Para. 21), first sentence of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church which reads as follows:

"Amendment X. Article 1.—The Annual Conference shall be composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it, together with a lay member elected by each pastoral charge."

by deletion and substitute for it the following:

"Amendment X. Article 1.—The Annual Conference shall be composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it, together with a lay member elected by each pastoral charge, the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Conference Lay Leader."

Amendment No. 16 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning Additional Lay Members in the Annual Conference.

At its seventh quadrennial session, held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, April 26-May 8, 1964, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3) on Wednesday evening, May 7, 1964, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Amendment X (Para. 47, amending Div. II, Sec. VII, Article 1 (Para. 21), last two sentences of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church which reads as follows:

"Amendment X. Article 1.—Each pastoral charge served by more than one minister in full connection shall be entitled to two lay members. The lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The Methodist Church."

by deletion and substitute for it the following:

"Amendment X. Article 1.—. . . Each pastoral charge served by more than one minister in full connection shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are effective full-time ministers in full connection. The lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of The Methodist Church."

Amendment No. 17 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning the Abolition of the Central Jurisdiction.

At its seventh quadrennial session, held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, April 26-May 8, 1964, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3) on Thursday morning, May 7, 1964, voted to

send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Amendment IX, the entire sub-paragraph 5 of Art. V and the final sentence of the last paragraph (the addition to paragraph 26) of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church which reads as follows:

"Amendment IX. Art. V.—5. Whenever twenty-five per cent of the local church membership of the Central Jurisdiction have been transferred by this process to another jurisdiction or jurisdictions, the bishop of the area from which the largest number have been transferred shall be transferred to the jurisdiction which has received the largest number by such transfer, and the representation of the Central Jurisdiction on the boards and agencies of the church shall thereafter be proportionately reduced.

Abolition of the Central Jurisdiction.—The Central Jurisdiction shall be abolished when all the Annual Conferences now comprising it have been transferred to other jurisdictions in accordance with the voluntary procedure of Article V of this section. Each remaining bishop of the Central Jurisdiction shall thereupon be transferred to the jurisdiction to which the majority of the membership of his area have been transferred, and the Central Jurisdiction shall then be dissolved."

by deletion and substitute for them the following:

"Amendment IX. Art. V.—5. Abolition of Central Jurisdiction. The Central Jurisdiction shall be abolished when all of the Annual Conferences now comprising it have been transferred to other jurisdictions in accordance with the voluntary procedure of Article V of this section."

CUBA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTIONAL CONFERENCE

The 1964 General Conference of The Methodist Church meeting in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, April 27-May 8, 1964 voted to approve autonomy for the Cuba Annual Conference (See *Daily Christian Advocate*, page 721, column 2). The Judicial Council holds that "legislative action by the General Conference for the purpose of removing the Cuba Annual Conference can legally take effect only after a majority of the Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction have voted approval (See *Daily Christian Advocate*, page 627, column 1).

The 1964 Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference meeting at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, July 8-12, 1964 adopted a resolution requesting "every Annual Conference in this Jurisdiction to take a vote on freeing the Cuba Annual Conference from the Southeastern Jurisdiction at the earliest practical date in accordance with the Constitution of The Methodist Church (See *Journal of the Seventh Session of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference of The Methodist Church*, page 234.)

The office of Conference Treasurer as a full-time position was established by Conference action in October 1953. The office was opened in Raleigh, November 2, 1953 by the present Treasurer. His service to the Conference began in 1922 by his appointment to the Sunday School Board; in 1938 he was appointed to the Budget Committee and continued after unification on the Commission on World Service and Finance. In 1940 he was elected as Secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance which position he held until 1953 when elected as Conference Treasurer. During the years 1948-1953 he also served as Treasurer to receive and forward Advance Specials and certain special offerings. As Treasurer, he was a key figure in launching Methodist Foundation, Inc. in 1956 and in the planning and construction of our Methodist Building which was occupied in February 1962.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

The scope of our examination is contained in our opening letter. Certain features of the examination are set forth below.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges, as shown by the Treasurer's records, was confirmed directly with the pastors, and minor differences reported to us as of the date of this report were adjusted or satisfactorily explained.

Distribution of income from charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1964 and 1965 session of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorizations from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and of the various boards and funds were either inspected or, if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1964-65 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits in the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorization for the distribution of 1964-65 collections.

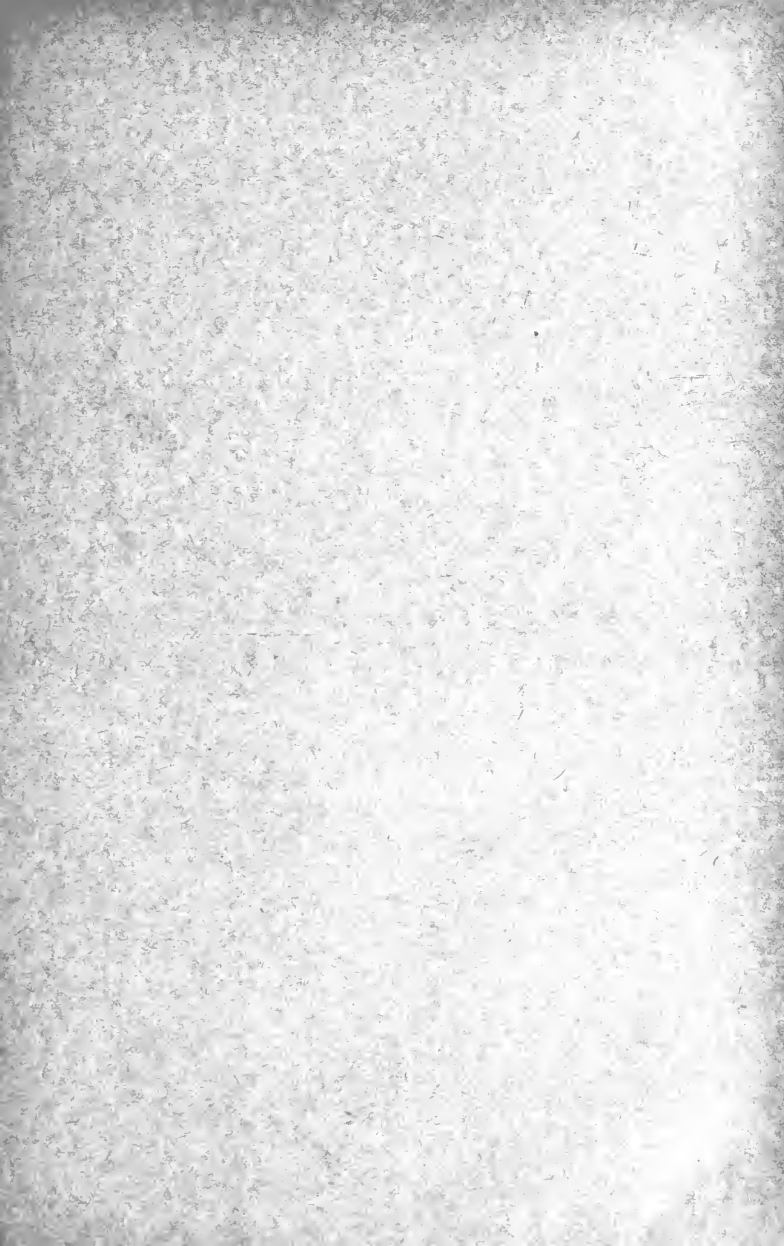
