Historical Statement

THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

(Southeastern Jurisdiction)

- I Composition: The North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church is composed of:
 - (1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
 - (2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
 - (3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.
 - (4) The Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction.
- II Organization: The organizing dates of the four former Conferences were as follows:
 - (1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church, 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina
 - (2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia
 - (3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.
 - (4) The Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference was organized at a special session on August 11, 1964, at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina.

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

I. RULES OF ORDER

- 1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
- No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
- 3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, or more than twice on the same question under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
- 4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and later) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
- 5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.

II. VOTING PROCEDURES

- 1. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.
- 2. Election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences: Only clerical members in full connection and elected and registered lay delegates may vote. (Alternate lay delegates may not vote except in the absence of the delegate and then only if they are duly registered in lieu of the delegate.) All votes must be cast in the bar of the conference as determined by the conference; votes must be cast upon the official ballots authorized by the conference; ballots shall be placed by individual delegates in ballot boxes; whereupon the bishop shall declare the balloting closed.

The official ballots furnished to the delegates shall be numbered consecutively and no vote shall be valid unless cast upon the ballot bearing the number designated by the presiding officer for such particular balloting. In the event a ballot is defaced, it may be exchanged at the secretary's desk for another ballot bearing the same number. Ballots furnished to lay delegates shall be different in color from those furnished to clerical delegates. Ballots shall be distributed to official delegates by the secretary at the time the presiding officer calls for the first ballot.

III. ORGANIZATION

- The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
- Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
- 3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
- Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.

- 5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
- 6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except those cases in which the Discipline directs otherwise. Near the end of each quadrennium, the Chairman or President of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall submit a list of qualified suggested nominees to the Bishop and his Cabinet for their consideration in the formation of new Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The nominees shall be consulted about their nominations. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference. At the beginning of each quadrennium all Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall elect their officers only after all their members have been properly notified of the organizational meeting.
- The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
- The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
- 9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
- Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. (This Committee replaced by Program Council.)
- 11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
- 12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
- 13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
- 14. Courtesies and Introductions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Introductions annually, at the first session of the Conference.
- 15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
- 16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

IV. REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS, MOTIONS, AMENDMENTS

- 1. All reports to be presented to the conference shall be sent to the conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Coordinating Council and published in the conference calendar.
- 2. All resolutions to be presented to the annual conference affecting the structure, policy and function of any board or agency of the annual conference, shall be sub-

mitted in writing to the conference secretary with copies for all the delegates twenty-four hours prior to consideration by the annual conference, and not later than the second night session of the conference.

3. All motions presented to the annual conference, and amendments to any paper, shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the conference secretary at the time of presentation, or immediately following.

V. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
- Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in triplicate, to the conference secretary.
- 3. When necessary, substitutions shall be by election of the Quarterly Conference called upon authorization by the district superintendent. No person will be seated unless duly elected by the charge Quarterly Conference as the regular or alternate delegate. Notice of change in delegates must be sent to the Conference Secretary at once.

VI. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

- Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
- 2. Charge and church treasurers shall make final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on or before the date scheduled by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, and each pastor shall complete and submit Table II to the conference statistician on or before the opening date of the annual conference.
- Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
- 4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
- Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastor's reports.

VII. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

- Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
- 2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The conference claimants, lay members of the conference boards, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other institutions and agencies of the General Church as he may deem advisable. Six copies including copy for lay delegate to annual conference shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$2.00 each, or single copies by mail at \$2.25 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VIII. DISTRICTS

- 1. The number of districts shall be eleven.
- A district conference shall be held annually, in each district, if authorized by the annual conference.
- Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the district conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officion members.

- 4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.
- 5. The district superintendent of each district shall be required to furnish the conference treasurer as early as possible following the fourth quarterly conference an official copy of the apportionments of the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support, and a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the quarterly conferences. The figures furnished by the district superintendent to the conference treasurer shall be used by the statistician to compile his report to the annual conference. Two of these copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

IX. AMENDMENTS

 These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference.

X. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

 These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL SESSION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

ST. PAUL UNITED METHODIST CHURCH GOLDSBORO, NORTH CAROLINA

JANUARY 8, 1969

Opening: The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, convened in Special Session at St. Paul United Methodist Church, Goldsboro, North Carolina, January 8, 1969, at 10:00 a.m. with Bishop William R. Cannon, resident bishop, presiding.

Hymn No. 1, "O, For A Thousand Tongues To Sing", was sung. The Invocation

was given by the Reverend S. T. Gillespie.

Purpose of Special Service: Bishop Cannon stated that the purpose of the Special Session was to consider the Quadrennial Emphasis for 1968-1972, as adopted by the General Conference of the United Methodist Church. The agenda for the Session was briefly reviewed by the Chair.

Introduction: The Chair introduced Dr. J. Lem Stokes, II, Executive Secretary of the Committee on Quadrennial Emphasis, Dayton, Ohio, who addressed the Conference.

Church-wide Bible Study - "The Sermon On The Mount": The Reverend Paul Carruth, chairman Committee on Interpretation, Conference Program Council, spoke briefly on the Bible study in the local churches of the Conference.

Fund for Reconcilation: The Reverend N. W. Grant, Director of the Conference Program Council, was recognized and presented a definitive statement about the Fund for Reconcilation, a proposal adopted by the General Conference whereby twenty million dollars would be raised by the end of the Ouadrennium.

Recruits for Youth Voluntary Service: N. W. Grant presented Thomas A. Collins, who explained this phase of the Quadrennial Program on Reconcilation.

Miss Sandra Ray of St. Paul Methodist Church, and member of the Methodist Youth Fellowship spoke to the Conference of her interest in Missions and mentioned her plans to be a missionary.

Presentation of Special Projects: The Reverend H. M. Wilkinson spoke on the Beach Ministry; The Reverend Robert L. Mangum discussed Community Centers; Mrs. Ira Moore discussed Day Care; The Reverend Gayle Alexander spoke on Half-Way House; Dr. J. S. Blair, on Housing.

Hymn No. 150 "A Charge To Keep I Have", was sung by the Conference.

Resolution — Fund for Reconcilation: The Chair recognized Dr. Arnold K. King to present the Resolution for the Fund for Reconcilation. Dr. King read the Resolution and moved its adoption. The Reverend A. F. Fisher and the Reverend Leon Russell seconded and spoke in favor of adoption. The Chair called for a discussion of the Resolution. Wallace Kirby requested an explanation of Item III. Mr. Grant explained this item. The Chair called for a vote on the Resolution and it was adopted. ("See Resolution which follows below").

Hymn No. 149 "I Love To Tell The Story", led by L. C. Vereen, was sung.

Acknowledgement: Bishop Cannon expressed appreciation for the interest and concern of the Conference as indicated by the attendance.

Introduction: Bishop Cannon spoke briefly of the influence of Bishop Fred Corson, Philadelphia, on his life and ministry and then introduced Bishop Corson who delivered the Sernon.

Pledge Service: Pledge cards for the Fund for Reconciliation were distributed to all present. Bishop Cannon led in prayer before the pledges were made. The District Superintendents collected the pledge cards and a dedicatory prayer by Bishop Cannon followed.

Announcements: Announcements were made by N. W. Grant and the Conference Secretary W. C. Wilson,

Luncheon: The Host Pastor, Reverend B. L. Davidson announced that lunch would be served to all present following adjournment of the Conference.

Greetings: A message of greetings was received from Mrs. Harold Mann, Conference President Women's Society Christian Service.

Absence noted: The absence of Walter Anderson, who was scheduled to speak on the Program but could not attend because of illness, was noted.

Benediction: The Reverend Leon Russell gave the Benediction and the Conference adjourned.

RESOLUTION FUND FOR RECONCILIATION

The North Carolina Conference, Raleigh Area, The United Methodist Church in Special session at St. Paul Church, Goldsboro, January 8, 1969, Bishop William R. Cannon, presiding:

Whereas, The General Conference of The United Methodist Church in session April 23-May 4, 1968 in Dallas, Texas voted to raise the sum of not less than \$20,000,000 during the 1968-1972 Quadrennium, said sum to be known as the Fund For Reconciliation.

Whereas, the purpose of the Fund For Reconciliation is to provide hope and alternatives for constructive action for all alienated peoples. "As Christians we have acknowledged that in Christ God was reconciling the world unto himself. Therefore, individually and corporately, we are charged with the responsibility of being agents of reconciliation in the world. We are called to acknowledge our oneness with the distillusioned, the angry ones, the poor, the hungry, the war-ridden, the rejected, the depersonalized, the searching ones of our world. God is calling us to listen, and to respond in acts of loving service so that man may come into his fullness as a person, recognized as equal with all others."

Whereas, The United Methodist Church has called upon all conferences and churches to participate in this work of reconciliation through a fund to be known as the Bishop's Fund For Reconciliation.

Whereas, we of the North Carolina Conference, Raleigh Area, feel a keen responsibility to be agents of reconciliation throughout the world as well as within the bounds of our conference,

Whereas, The United Methodist Church meeting in Dallas set the division of the Fund For Reconciliation so that 50% of all money raised within an episcopal area would be remitted to the Treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance to be used at the direction of the Council of Bishops and the special Quadrennial Emphasis Committee; and that 50% of the total money raised would be retained by each episcopal area to be used by the area for approved projects of reconciliation within the conference or conferences,

BE IT RESOLVED:

- That the North Carolina Conference participate fully in the Bishop's Fund For Reconciliation.
- (2) That we adopt a minimum goal of \$400,000 as the goal of the North Carolina Conference, with 50% of the total money raised be remitted to the Treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance; and 50% to be retained by the Treasurer of the North Carolina Conference to be used within the bounds of said conference.
- (3) That of the above 50% (which is to be retained within the annual conference) (a) 75% of the amount raised within a district be deposited by the Conference Treasurer to the credit of the district in which it is raised, to be used by that district on its approved projects. (b) That the remaining 25% (of the above stated 50% which is to be retained within the annual conference) be placed in a general reconciliation fund to be allocated by the Conference Committee on Reconciliation to those projects needing funds, regardless of the district in which they are located.

(4) That the funds, raised within those districts which do not have needs and do not develop projects, be held to their credit until January 1, 1971, after which unused funds will be placed in the hands of the Conference Committee for direction.

(5) That the Annual Conference Committee on Reconciliation determine which projects are to be funded with the money retained by the Conference Treasurer from each district. Said money to be allocated to those projects within the conference that are not adequately supported by the districts in which they are located.

(6) That every minister and lay person, young and old, be encouraged to join whole-heartedly in this great endeavor to minister in our Lord's name to the disadvantaged be they far away or close at home.

FIRST DAY, MORNING SESSION

Tuesday, June 3, 1969

The prelude, "Fantasy in C Major" by Cesar Auguste Franck, was rendered by the organist of University Methodist Church, Mrs. Richard Ray.

Conference Convened: Bishop William R. Cannon, resident bishop of the Raleigh Area, called to order The North Carolina Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church at ten o'clock in the morning of June 3, 1969. This is the one hundred and forty-fourth session (thirty-first since unification of American Methodism in 1939 and the second since unification of The Methodist Church and The Evangelical United Brethren Church on April 23, 1968) of the Conference. The 1969 session was convened in University United Methodist Church, Chapel Hill, North Carolina. The Call to Worship was given by the church choir. Hymn No. 336, "And Are We Yet Alive?" was sung, after which the Apostles' Creed was repeated in unison. The opening prayer was led by C. D. Barclift, host district superintendent.

Roll Call: Bishop Cannon called on W. C. Wilson to call the roll of the Conference. He moved that the registration cards as signed by the delegates be the official record of attendance at this session. The motion was approved.

Rules of Conference: Bishop Cannon called on H. L. Watson, host pastor, who moved that the rules as published in the 1968 Conference Journal be the rules for this session of the Conference. The motion was seconded and passed.

Bar of Conference: H. L. Watson moved that the main floor of the sanctuary and the balcony be the bar of the Conference. The motion was approved.

Program of the Conference: H. L. Watson moved that the printed program, except as changed by the presiding officer, be the official program of the Conference. It was seconded and passed.

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Tuesday, June 3, 1969

Opening: The Conference convened at 3:00 with Bishop William R. Cannon as the presiding officer. The organist used as a prelude "I Call To Thee" by Johan Sebastian Bach. The afternoon session was devoted to The Ministry.

Announcement: W. C. Wilson made an announcement concerning special message for Mr. Ralph Benton.

Hymn No. 73, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" was sung. The prayer was led by M. W. Lawrence.

Question 8 was called, relative to the character and official administration of both pastors and superintendents. These matters were properly considered and then approved.

Resolution No. II, concerning the North Carolina Annual Conference Committee on Continuing Education. Paul Boone moved that under Section B, No. 4, that "Two representatives of the Conference Board of Missions, one of whom shall be a representative of the Church and Community Committee." The motion was approved. The resolution was adopted.

Board of Managers of the Pastors' School: Paul Carruth presented the report of the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School.

Lay Pastors' School: O. K. Ingram presented the report on the School for Lay Pastors.

Duke Divinity School: Dean R. E. Cushman reported on the Duke Divinity School.

Announcements: W. C. Wilson made announcements concerning Board of Missions, Duke Banquet, and class to be ordained. Bishop Cannon announced death of Bishop Walter C. Gum and moved that the Conference Secretary send words of sympathy to Mrs. Gum.

H. L. Watson made announcement concerning the Ecumenical Breakfast Wednesday morning.

Benediction: W. C. Wilson gave the benediction.

FIRST DAY, EVENING SESSION

Tuesday, June 3, 1969

Opening: At 7:30 the organist presented a prelude "Sonata No. 2" by Felix Bartholdy Mendelssohn. The Choral Call to Worship, "The Lord Is In His Holy Temple" was sung by the choir. The evening prayer was led by W. J. Neese. Children's Choirs of University United Methodist Church sang the anthem "Lift Thine Eyes," by Mendelssohn.

Admission of Class Into Conference Membership: Bishop Cannon asked the Chairman of the Board of the Ministry and Conference Secretary to present the persons to be admitted into full conference membership. Bishop Cannon then asked the class the traditional questions of Methodism for persons being admitted. He preached to the Conference, using the theme "Being Faithful in Revolutionary Times." Hymn No. 150, "A Charge to Keep I Have" was sung.

Benediction: The benediction was given by H. G. Ruark.

SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION

Wednesday, June 4, 1969

Opening: The Conference convened at 8:30, with Bishop William R. Cannon in the chair. "Temporal Economy and the Laity," was the theme for the morning session.

For a prelude the organist of the host church played "Aria in F Major" by Handel. The Conference joined in singing Hymn No. 352, "Come, O Thou God of Grace." The morning prayer was led by O. L. Hathaway.

Presentations: Bishop Cannon called on C. W. Robbins to present two noted clergymen. They were Bishop Vincent Waters of the Roman Catholic Diocese of North Carolina, and Bishop Moseley Moore of the Episcopal Diocese in North Carolina.

Announcements: W. C. Wilson made announcements concerning resolutions and reports.

Commission on World Service and Finance: Bishop Cannon called on C. S. Hubbard, Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance. The chairman introduced Mr. Vernon Sidler of the General Board of World Service and Finance. The report No. 1 was presented by the chairman.

James Coile asked the question whether Long Range Planning would continue or if successor's name as may be adopted later will be used. The chairman answered that this would be cared for editorially.

O. K. Ingram moved an amendment that figure for Campus Ministry of \$29,000 be amended to read \$45,000, and then he spoke to the amendment. H. L. Watson also spoke to the amendment. A. P. Brantley made comments in opposition to the proposed amendment. G. S. Eubank asked question: "How many students are touched by the Wesley Foundation?" H. L. Watson answered by stating the figure as 300 at Wesley Foundation and 1000 at University Church. Henry S. Goodwin of Southport spoke to the amendment. Wade Dunbar of Laurinburg asked question as to whether there is an increase in budget. The chairman answered by saving it is an increase of 5% over last year. Mrs. Worth Seymour of Camden asked question: "Is the whole conference program, including budget, planned before we come to Conference?" Walter Johnson of Chapel Hill spoke, introducing Joe Mann who spoke on how Wesley Foundation operates. Joel E. King of Havelock spoke against the Ingram amendment. William Senn Teague spoke for the amendment. Nathan Byrd asked questions: (1) "Were poor people fed at Wesley Foundation on their recent March to Raleigh?" (2) "Has Wesley Foundation given office space to an ex-Episcopal minister?" Robert Johnson, Wesley Foundation Director, answered both questions as "No." G. S. Eubank spoke for the amendment. W. A. Seawell moved the previous question. It was carried. R. W. Ponder asked whether money for the increase requested by O. K. Ingram is available from the Reserve Fund. The answer was "No." The chairman spoke concerning items in the conference budget. The vote on the amendment was taken. It was carried.

C. S. Hubbard moved the adoption of Report No. 1. It was approved. Paul Carruth asked question as to whether a revised budget will be presented later in this Conference by the Commission. The chairman said that we have a year in which to make changes. He stated this budget being submitted is for Conference year 1970-71. Carruth moved that the Commission attempt to submit a revised budget during this session of the Conference. The motion carried.

Charles Hubbard, chairman, presented Report No. 2. He stated that this report contains temporary figures. He asked T. M. Vick to read supplement to Report No. 2 as follows: Repairs and replacements, episcopal residence, \$4,986.90; Conference Treasurer's office budget, 1969-70: \$2,000.00. The chairman moved its adoption. It was adopted.

The secretary of the Commission presented Report No. 3, a resolution concerning request to our General Board of Missions regarding use of church money. Rufus Starke spoke against it. C. S. Mercer moved that Section 3, Report No. 3 be deleted. A. D. Byrd, Jr. spoke against the Mercer motion. Paul Bunn raised question as to whether an Annual Conference can dictate to the General Board what is done with the money sent to it. The chairman stated that we can control by what we raise. R. W. Ponder spoke in favor of the Mercer amendment. A. P. Brantley spoke against the amendment. A. Kimsey King made comments for the amendment. E. L. Earnhardt spoke against the amendment. Paul Bunn moved that the Mercer motion be tabled. The Bishop ruled the motion out of order. Bunn then spoke concerning authority of Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. He asked

that we uphold the Mercer motion. J. Nelson Gibson made statement about monies sent to General Board. The vote on the Mercer motion was taken. The results were; for, 229; against, 171.

The report of the Commission was adopted.

Minimum Salary Commission: James Bailey, secretary, presented the report of the Commission. It was adopted.

Methodist Building Committee: O. L. Hathaway presented the report for the committee. H. L. Watson asked questions: "Who are the members of the committee, why are they not listed, and who nominates them?" O. L. Hathaway answered the questions. It was adopted.

Methodist Foundation: Sid Gullege presented the report of the Methodist Foundation. The report is for information.

Conference Board of Trustees: J. W. Jenkins, Jr. presented the report of the Conference Board of Trustees. It was approved.

Committee on Conference Entertainment: T. A. Collins presented J. V. Early. He presented Wyatt Brown who issued invitation to meet in 1970 at Jarvis Memorial, Greenville. W. R. Stevens spoke in support of the invitation. Dr. Leo Jenkins and John Howard also supported the proposal. The invitation was accepted.

The Board of the Laity: Bishop Cannon called on James Patrick, Conference Lay Leader, to preside. He presented the report of the Board of the Laity. He called on Roy L. Turnage to present the work of the Board during the year. Mr. Turnage nominated James Patrick as Conference Lay Leader for 1969-70. He was elected. Mr. Turnage nominated the District Lay Leaders as follows: Burlington, George H. Forehand; Durham, George D. Stephens; Elizabeth City, Dr. A. L. Whitehurst; Fayetteville, R. R. Allen; Goldsboro, Elbert A. Ward; Greenville, J. W. H. Roberts; New Bern, Grier L. Garick; Raleigh, Dr. J. Edward Legates; Rocky Mount, Willis E. Marshall; Sanford, T. Roy Phillips; Wilmington, Arvel E. Heafner. They were elected.

The Conference Lay Leader, Iames T. Patrick, read the schedule of meetings and conferences planned by the Board. He then called on Bishop Cannon to present the speaker of the hour. Bishop Cannon presented Mr. D. W. Brooks, trustee, Emory University, Atlanta. Ga. He addressed the

Conference on the theme, "The United Methodist Church."

Announcements: W. C. Wilson made announcements concerning Board of Missions, Retired Ministers' Luncheon, ordination of deacons, and schedule of meals at Granville Towers.

Benediction: W. C. Wilson gave the benediction.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, June 4, 1969

Opening: Beginning at 2:30 the organist of the host church, Mrs. Richard Ray, used for a prelude "How Fair and Pleasant Art Thou," by Jules Dupre. The afternoon emphasis was "The Church in Worshin and Work." Bishop Cannon called the Conference to order. Hymn No. 279, "I Want A Principle Within," was sung. The prayer was led by J. J. Rudin II.

The Board of the Ministry: W. J. Neese, Chairman, called Question 26: "Who are admitted as Associate Members?" Paul W. Boone, Registrar, an-

swered as follows: William Lee Barbee, James Hillary Bryant, Hobart William Burnside, Jr., Donnie Gray Davis, Sr., William Ernest Herbert, Jakie Locklear, John Gilbert Olive and Rufus Miles Smithson.

Joint Committee on Disability: H. B. Johnson presented report of Joint Committee on Disability. It was approved.

Ministers' Credit Union: C. M. Mitchell presented the report of the Ministers' Credit Union. This report received as information.

Duke Endowment and Ormond Fund: O. K. Ingram presented the report for the Duke Endowment and Ormond Fund. These reports received as information.

Conference Brotherhood: J. K. Bostick submitted the report of the Conference Brotherhood. The following officers were re-elected: President, Kermit R. Wheeler; Secretary, Norwood L. Jones, and Treasurer, J. K. Bostick.

Board of Pensions: C. W. Everette, chairman, presided at the request of Bishop Cannon. Norwood L. Jones, secretary, presented Report No. 1 of the Board. He moved its adoption. It was adopted. Report No. 2 was given. J. A. Tingle asked question about wording in Section 1. The Board secretary stated that wording would be clarified. W. B. Cotton raised question about Section 2 dealing with dividends. He moved that a member be eligible to receive the dividends resulting from his investment. The chairman of the Board accepted Cotton's amendment. Report No. 2 was adopted.

Candler School of Theology: Bishop Cannon asked Dean R. E. Cushman of Duke Divinity School to escort Dr. Mack B. Stokes, acting dean of Candler School of Theology, to the platform. He spoke briefly to the Conference.

Report of the Commission on Worship: R. E. Fowlkes presented the report of the Commission on Worship. It was approved.

Commission on Ecumenical Affairs: C. W. Robbins presented the report of the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs. It was approved.

N. C. Council of Churches: T. A. Collins, president of the North Carolina Council of Churches, spoke to the Conference concerning the work of the Council.

Commission on Ecumenical Affairs: C. W. Robbins asked H. L. Watson to make a statement about the Ecumenical Movement in Chapel Hill. He introduced Father John Houston, a Roman Catholic priest and head of Newman House of Chapel Hill. He spoke of the work of the Ecumenical Movement.

Announcement: W. C. Wilson made announcements about District Conference records and lay and clerical tellers. THIRD DAY, MORNING SESSION Thursday, June 5, 1969

Conference Convened: At 8:30 the organist used as a prelude, "Rosymedre," by Vaughn Williams. The morning emphasis was "The Mission of the Church." Hymn No. 470, "God of Grace and God of Glory," was sung by the congregation. The morning session convened with Bishop William R. Cannon presiding. The prayer was led by Ross Towns.

Greetings: Bishop Cannon spoke words of appreciation for the leadership of Bishop Paul N. Garber during his seventeen years of tenure as Episcopal head of this area. He suggested that the secretary send a cablegram to

Bishop and Mrs. Garber. It was so ordered by a standing vote.

Announcements: W. C. Wilson made announcements concerning recording tapes, Committee on Resolutions, Committee on Minutes, and Consecration Service for lay workers.

Board of Christian Social Concerns: Bishop Cannon called on H. A. Phillips, chairman, to present the report and recommendations of the Board of Christian Social Concerns. (A) The report of the Division of General Welfare was presented and adopted. (B) The report of the Division of Human Relations was presented by the president of the Board along with a resolution concerning the National Black Economic Development Conference. He then moved the adoption of Section B, which was approved by a standing vote. (C) The Division of World Peace was presented. Attention was called to the seminars on Draft Counseling in October, the purpose of which is to acquaint pastors with the nation's draft laws. E. L. Earnhardt asked the question: "Are the seminars designed to promote draft-dodging?" The president answered "No." Ralph Fleming moved that Paul Couch be granted privilege to speak to the Conference concerning seminars on draft laws. The permission was granted, and he spoke to the Conference.

Announcement: W. C. Wilson made announcement concerning death

message for J. P. Pegg.

Jack Crum presented amendment to Section C, Item 4, relating to participation of the Viet Nam War. He moved its adoption. The Board accepted the resolution. George Hux of Halifax spoke expressing disapproval of ideas in resolution. Paul Carruth moved that the Crum amendment be deleted. W. M. Jeffries spoke in favor of the amendment. Chaplain Albert Gore, Jr. spoke in opposition to the amendment. W. R. Stevens asked: "Is this amendment an option of love or related to the seminars on the draft laws?" The president answered by saving the seminars are merely to help ministers understand the draft laws. Willie Teague spoke for the amendment. J. Malloy Owens spoke. G. R. Garris moved the previous question. It was approved. The vote to delete the amendment was taken. The amendment was overwhelmingly defeated. W. M. Jeffries moved that "This conference support our young men in selective conscientious objection, and call upon the

Congress of the United States to change the law accordingly." The amendment was defeated. Section C was voted on, and it was adopted. Vote on the entire report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns was taken. The report was adopted.

Constitutional Amendments: Bishop Cannon called on N. W. Grant to present four constitutional amendments to be acted on by the Conference. Mr. Grant explained the substance of each amendment. The procedure for voting was stated by the Conference Secretary. Constitutional amendment No. 1 was voted on. The result was: Total votes cast, 244; for, 128; against, 116. Constitutional Amendment No. 2 was voted on. The results was: Total votes cast, 322; for, 322; against, 0. Constitutional Amendment No. 3 was voted on. The result was: Total votes cast, 273; for, 273; against, 0. Constitutional Amendment No. 4 was presented. Dean R. E. Cushman spoke in support of the amendment. The vote was taken, and the results were: Total votes cast, 320; for, 320; against, 0.

Announcement: H. L. Watson made announcement concerning child care during the Ministers' Wives' Luncheon.

Personal Privilege: W. C. Wilson presented L. D. Hayman, retired minister who is attending his 59th Annual Conference session. The Conference feted Mr. Hayman with enthusiastic applause.

Women's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. Harold Mann, president of the Women's Society of Christian Service, was presented to the Conference by Bishop Cannon. She spoke on the work of the women in the Conference.

Registration: J. A. Auman presented the registration figures. Present at this session: Ministers, 624; Laymen, 336.

Board of Missions: Bishop Cannon asked A. F. Fisher to preside during this emphasis. Mr. Fisher called on Rufus Stark to present the section on Education and Cultivation. Mr. Stark, Conference Missionary Secretary, asked that Paul Bunn escort Mrs. James Stanford, the widow of Rev. James Stanford, who died last January while serving as a missionary in Peru. She spoke words of appreciation. Rufus Starke also asked Clyde Tucker, a former missionary, to stand and be presented. He also lifted up mission specials before the Conference.

The work of the Committee on Church and Community was presented

by R. W. Ponder.

L. C. Vereen, Conference Executive Director of the Conference Board of Missions, presented the work of the Committee on Home Missions and Church Extension.

A. F. Fisher moved the report of the Board of Missions. It was adopted. He also requested that a statement about James Sanford's death be included in the Memorial Section of the *Journal*. Mr. Stanford was a member of the Conference in Peru. The Bishop said this would be done without objection.

Leo C. Thompson, chairman of the Sub-committee on Town and Country Work, presented Rural Church of the Year Awards to the following churches: Burlington District—St. Luke's United Methodist Church, the Reverend J. K. Young, pastor; Goldsboro District—Princeton United Methodist Church, the Reverend R. F. Bundy, pastor. Greenville District—Tabernacle United Methodist Church, the Reverend H. H. Cash, pastor. New Bern District—Harlow United Methodist Church, the Reverend E. F. Seymour, pastor. Raleigh District—Holland's United Methodist Church, the

Reverend W. N. Fulford, pastor. Rocky Mount District-Bethany United Methodist Church, the Reverend W. E. Herbert, pastor. Sanford District-Pleasant Hill United Methodist Church, the Reverend Lester C. Bissette, pastor.

Hymn Singing: L. C. Vereen led the congregation in the singing of several hymns.

Presentation: Bishop Cannon called on C. H. Mercer to present visitors who are of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church. They were Rev. and Mrs. Ulysses S. Johnson of St. John A.M.E. Zion Church, Wilson, N. C., and Rev. L. A. Miller, St. Mark A.M.E. Zion Church, Durham, N. C.

Introduction: Bishop Cannon introduced Bishop Herbert Bell Shaw, Second Episcopal District, African Methodist Episcopal Church, Wilmington, N. C. He preached to the Conference on the theme, "The Mission of the Church.'

Benediction: Bishop Cannon gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Thursday, June 5, 1969

Opening: Beginning at 2:30, the organist of the host church played as a prelude, "Adagio in A Minor," by J. S. Bach. Bishop Cannon convened the Conference with the singing of Hymn No. 299, "O, Zion Haste." The afternoon prayer was led by T. A. Collins. The theme for the afternoon session was "Education and Vocation.

Announcements: W. C. Wilson made announcements concerning picture-taking of the class of ordained deacons. Blue Cross representative at the Conference, the Committee on Resolutions and References, and the Conference Calendar. Bishop Cannon made announcement concerning report of World Service and Finance.

Report of the Board of Education: Bishop Cannon asked H. S. Winberry, Board president, to preside. He presented John Mears, F. B. Joyner, and Keith Glover, who serve with the Board of Education in Specialized Ministries. Section A of the report on the General Church School Ministry was presented and adopted.

Section B on Children's Ministry was presented and adopted.

Section C on Youth Ministry was presented and adopted. Fred Irons,

Conference Youth president, was presented and spoke briefly.

Section D on Adult and Family Life Ministry was presented and adopted.

Section E on Camps and Conferences was presented by the chairman, W. W. Bishop. He asked Mr. Kent Pate of Burlington to speak concerning the support and use of the camps. Mr. Bishop moved its adoption. C. H. Mercer moved that Item 2, part A, be deleted. The president accepted that motion. Section F was approved.

Section G. Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry, was presented. Dr. Cameron West of Raleigh spoke concerning the report and

moved its adoption.

Association of Methodist Colleges: J. A. Auman spoke with reference to the Association of Methodist Colleges, emphasizing Christian higher education.

Consecration of Lay People in Christian Vocations: Bishop Cannon asked W. C. Wilson to direct procedure. He called on C. P. Morris to present those to be consecrated. Miss Barbara Louise Johnson, First United Methodist Church, Washington, N. C., was consecrated as Director of Christian Education by Bishop Cannon, assisted by Mr. Wilson. Miss Ruthann M. Greenwald, Front Street United Methodist Church, Burlington, N. C., was consecrated a Director of Music by Bishop Cannon, assisted by Mr. Wilson. Bishop Cannon asked Leon Russell to take the chair.

Board of College Visitors: K. R. Wheeler was asked to present the report of the Board of College Visitors. E. L. Earnhardt offered an amendment to the report of the Board of College Visitors: "That the Board prepare, or cause to be prepared, a report to the next annual conference, statistically, as to the religious beliefs of those who teach in our colleges, particularly as regards belief in the deity of Jesus Christ." G. S. Eubank spoke. V. E. Queen stated that the Board of Visitors is not authorized to dictate to colleges. T. H. House spoke for the Earnhardt amendment. The chair ruled that the amendment was out of order. The report was adopted.

G. S. Eubank moved that the Earnhardt amendment be referred to the Board of Education. W. M. Jeffries offered an amendment to the Earnhardt amendment namely to add "and whether they are in accord with the teachings of Jesus as contained in the New Testament." The Jeffries amendment

was voted on and was defeated. The Eubank motion was adopted.

Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations: Jack L. Hunter made the report for the Commission on Enlistment for Christian Occupa-

tions. It was approved.

Rev. H. L. Watson moved that we amend Section G, the report of the Board of Education, by adding the following: "That the Annual Conference not be asked to vote on any trustees of our colleges in the future whose names have not previously been submitted to the Annual Conference either in printed or mimeographed form." The amendment was carried.

A. P. Brantley asked a question whether the Resident Bishop is a trustee of any of our colleges. C. P. Morris stated that the Board of Education is re-

sponsible for naming trustees. This part of Section G was adopted.

Mr. Winberry, president, moved the adoption of the report dealing with College Sustaining Fund. It was adopted.

The section on Capital Funds Crusade was presented and adopted.

Section G in its entirety was adopted.

Section H on Young Adult Ministry was presented and approved.

Section I on Nominations was presented and approved.

Section J dealing with additional recommendations was submitted and adopted.

Regional Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry: O. K. Ingram was asked to present this part of the Board report. He spoke to it, and then asked Bob Johnson, Wesley Foundation Director at Chapel Hill, a question: "Why are so many students alienated from their home church after coming to the university?" The director spoke in answer to the question. Joe Mann, a student, spoke of the involvement of the student in the religious life of the college campus. H. L. Watson spoke in the interest of the campus ministry.

Winberry moved the adoption of the entire report. W. M. Wells spoke

briefly to the Conference. The report as a whole was adopted.

General Conference Commission on Religion and Race: Bishop Cannon presented Dr. Woody White, Director of the General Conference Commission on Religion and Race, Washington, D. C., who addressed the Conference.

Conference Statistician: D. D. Traynham, Conference Statistician, gave

his report.

The Chair called the following Disciplinary questions: Questions 18, 19, 48, and 53, District Committee on the Ministry, District Boards of Church Location and Buildings and Nominations for changes in membership on Boards and Agencies.

Answers to the above Disciplinary questions will be found in the Con-

densed Minutes, Section III.

Announcements: Necessary announcements were made by the secretary.

Benediction: W. R. Stevens gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, EVENING SESSION

Thursday, June 5, 1969

Conference Convened: The Conference convened at 7:30, with Bishop William R. Cannon as the presiding officer. Hymn No. 223, "When We Walk With the Lord," was sung, followed by prayer led by L. C. Vereen.

Methodist Publishing House: Mr. Marvin Rodgers of the Methodist Publishing House presented to Bishop Cannon a check in the amount of \$12,261.92 for the Superannuate Fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Pensions.

Introduction: Bishop Cannon introduced Bishop Arthur J. Moore, Atlanta, Ga., retired.

Commission on World Service and Finance: C. S. Hubbard was called on to present a revision of Report No. II. He made a statement of explanation. Mimeographed copies of the proposed budget were distributed. G. S. Eubank asked what has happened to the budget we adopted yesterday. The Bishop answered by stating that the Commission was instructed to bring in a progress report today. Eubank then spoke briefly. C. S. Hubbard made additional statements. Paul Carruth spoke endorsing and supporting the explanation given by Hubbard. T. P. Sykes of Efland made a statement concerning the church entering business. G. S. Eubank made additional statement. The previous question was called for. It carried. The revised budget of

Paul Carruth moved that the Warren motion and vote be rescinded. The motion carried. Thus the previous question was before the Conference. C. L. Warren spoke against the Ponder amendment. C. H. Mercer moved the previous question. The motion lost. G. S. Eubank offered a substitute amendment: "that the Commission use the earnings from central funds to apply toward the budget adopted yesterday." The vote was taken on the Eubank

substitute. It was lost. The motion was made that the revised Report No. II be adopted. It was adopted.

Worship Hour: Hymn No. 505, "Now on Land and Sea Descending," was sung, followed by the evening prayer led by A. F. Fisher. The choir of the host church sang as an anthem, "Turn Back, O Man," by Gustav Holst.

The evening offering was received. An offertory tenor solo, "Come, Ye

Blessed," by John Prindle Scott, was sung by Mr. Gene Strassler.

Bishop Cannon presented Dr. Tracy K. Jones, General Secretary of the Board of Missions, The United Methodist Church, New York, N. Y. Dr. Jones then preached to the Conference.

Following Dr. Jones' sermon there was a period of questions and an-

swers with Dr. Jones giving able answers to questions raised.

Announcements: The Conference Secretary made necessary announcements.

Benediction: G. S. Eubank gave the benediction.

FOURTH DAY, MORNING SESSION

Friday, June 6, 1969

Beginning at 8:30, the organist of the host church played for a prelude, "Blessed Are Ye Faithful Souls" and "My Heart is Ever Yearning," by Johannes Brahms.

Love Feast: The Annual Love Feast was observed with S. J. Starnes presiding, assisted by A. L. Thompson, W. A. Seawell, M. W. Maness and M. W. Warren.

Conference Convenes: The morning session of the Conference was convened at 9:30, with Bishop William R. Cannon in the chair, Hymn No. 299. "O Zion, Haste," was sung.

Announcements: W. C. Wilson made an announcement concerning the meeting of the Committee on Investigation.

Board of the Ministry: J. H. Miller, Jr. gave the report of the Board. The following were granted sick leave: Charles E. Bell, H. B. Harrell and R. E. Walston.

The following were voted the superannuate relation: Conference members: Buel E. Bingham, Howard Harrell Cash, William Addison Crow, Theodore Roosevelt Jenkins, Allen Clarence Lee, Benjamin Franklin Musser, John Henry Parrish, Leon Warren Ross, James Doyne Young and John F. McEachin. Bishop Cannon and W. C. Wilson spoke words of appreciation for the services of these men now retiring.

Board of Evangelism: Bishop Cannon called on A. Kimsey King, president of the Conference Board of Evangelism, to preside during this emphasis. Mr. King presented the report of the Board. He moved its adoption. It was adopted. H. M. McLamb spoke briefly.

Questions 1-17: The Secretary stated that the answers have been adopted in various reports already approved and need not be repeated in the interest of saving time.

He moved a substitute motion to set up a special study group to make a study and report back to the next Conference. James Bailey spoke for the Crum substitute. The vote was taken and the substitute motion carried. The resolution was approved.

Moving Date: N. W. Grant, secretary to the Cabinet, made a motion that moving date be Thursday, June 12.

Resolution: A. F. Fisher presented a resolution concerning consultation between proper persons in this conference and those from the Western North Carolina Conference. He moved the adoption of the resolution. He then spoke in support of the resolution. It was adopted.

District Conference Records: L. C. Bissette presented the report of the Committee on District Conference Records. It was adopted.

FRANENSTINE BARDIN BRANDENBURG

1893-1968

Franenstine Bardin Brandenburg, son of John Martin and Martha Keller Brandenburg, was born June 12, 1893, in St. Matthews, South Carolina. He spent his early years in Orangeburg, South Carolina, in the employment of the Atlantic Coastline Railroad Com-

pany. In 1922 he came to Greenville, North Carolina, as an agent of the American Railway Express Company.

Alhough he was born into the Lutheran Church, he united with the Methodist Church in Orangeburg when a very young man. After moving to Greenville, he joined the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church of that city. So impressed were the laymen of that church with the leadership of this young man that they, on June 3, 1925, recommended that he be granted local preacher's license. He was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Annual Conference in 1927 at Edenton Street Methodist Church in Raleigh. He immediately applied himself to the studies required for full conference membership, and was oraqined Deacon in 1929, and ordained Elder in 1932. And for years he continued his ministerial training by taking studies at Emory University and at the Duke Divinity School.

At the age of 33, 12 years after his marriage, and after 14 years of service to the Methodist Church as a Christian

layman, he, his wife and three small daughters went out to serve the Church of Christ full time. The measure of his dedication and success as a minister is reflected in the Charges he served: Mattamuskeet, Straits-Harlowe, Trenton-Jones, Roberdell, Warren, Mount Gilead Circuit, and Caledonia. On these seven circuit charges he was a good shepherd to 36 congregations within the North Carolina Conference. His appointments averaged more than five churches per charge; four charges had six churches each, the other three had five, four, three. That his work as a minister was very acceptable, both to the Conference and to the people, is revealed in the fact that he never served any charge less than four years, while serving one charge six years, and another five years. He was truly another prophet of the "long road."

So great was his love for life and his family, for people and for the work of the ministry that he was reluctant to break connection with these for the rewards that await the faithful in the great beyond. Yet, in great faith and with pleasant anticipations of a better life ahead, he departed this life at the Moore County Hospital June 26, 1968. Funeral services were conducted by the Reverend V. E. Oueen in Green Lake Methodist Church in Richmond County. Interment was also in the cemetery of this church, by the side of his first wife, Jennie Mae Horger Brandenburg, who died February 13, 1955. To

this marriage were born three daughters, Mae, Annie Laurie, and June.

He is survived by his wife, Lucille Parsons Brandenburg, and three daughters: Mrs. Gerald Whitehurst, Beaufort, N. C.; Mrs. Wm. O'B. McIntosh, Rockingham, N. C.; and Mrs. J. E. Caldwell, Atlanta, Ga. Other survivors are five grandchildren and three greatgrandchildren. Also surviving are two brothers, David and Sidney Brandenburg of El-

loree, South Carolina.

F. B. Brandenburg had within his character, by nature as well as by grace, a mixture that made him a good minister. He was humble, he was compassionate. Into the pulpit he carried a conviction, a simplicity, and a dignity that demanded reverence and attention. Outside of the pulpit he was sociable, clean, humorous, and witty. I knew him well for 35 years. He and I were close friends, often helping each other in evangelistic services. Although at home in the town church as well as in the rural church, among the circuit riders of the North Carolina Conference he was a Sir Galahad of the Bishop's Round Table.

Ilis dedication to the call to preach is well illustrated in the lines of an old hymn the early Methodist preachers often sang at Annual Conference just before the appoint-

ments were read:

"No foot of land do I own in this wilderness below, To hold me back when I hear the call to go."

WILLIAM JAMES FREEMAN

1887-1968

"Take up your cross and follow me" is the call to which many have answered as they gave their lives in service to God. William James Freeman was one of these who answered this call unreservedly at the age of 36, as he laid aside other interests, and with



little more than his Bible and an unfailing trust in God, became a "traveling preacher" in the Methodist Church of

the North Carolina Conference.

Brother Freeman was born in rural Robeson County on April 23, 1887. The early years of his life were filled with tragedy, insecurity, and uncertainty. His mother died before he was three years old, and he then had to depend on his grandparents to give him a home with them. However, this home also proved to be only temporary, because his grandmother died just a few years later. These unfortunate circumstances led him to a home with foster parents, but this home failed to meet his needs as a growing boy. Therefore, at the age of 16 he ran way to find his own way in the world.

For a time he worked at various jobs as he moved from place to place, but he finally settled in Rockingham. North Carolina as a textile worker. This employment offered security and afforded him an opportuity to estab-

lish a real home for the first time in his life.

Miss Roberta Maness of Rockingham became his wife in 1905, and nine children were born to them in the years that followed. However, they were destined to continue establishing new homes in the years ahead as William had been in the past. In 1922 God

called him into the Methodist ministry.

In January of 1923 he and his family went to another new home, his first pastorate, the Town Creek Charge in Brunswick County, He later lived and served at Shallotte, Pink Hill, Hallsbore, Seven Springs, Council, White Oak, Scotts Hill, Atlantic, and Kitty Hawk. He won a place in the hearts of all he met because he loved people, Their love and respect for him was revealed in the fact that on two occasions he was reappointed to serve charges he had served earlier in his ministry. He returned in later years to serve again at Town Creek and at White Oak.

Brother Freeman's formal education was limited by the circumstances of his youth, but he constantly sought to better prepare himself for the work to which God had appointed him. By self-determination and a real sense of mission, he increased his education and became a very able minister. He was ordained Elder at Henderson, North Carolina

in 1946 by the late Bishop W. W. Peele.

In 1956, two years after his retirement, his beloved wife died at their home in Elizabethtown. She was buried at the Bethlehem Church Cemetery at White Oak, one

of the churches they had served twice during his ministry.

In June of 1957, W. J. married his second wife, Viola Mintz, a widow with five children who lived in Brunswick County. They made their home there within the bounds of the Town Creek Charge, the other charge he had served on two different occasions

during his active ministry.

Even though he formally retired in 1954 after 30 years of service, he continued to give of himself for several years. He worked with the Deems Chapel Church on the Bladen Charge while living in Elizabethtown, and he served at Kelly after moving back to Brunswick County. In the last years of his life he worked actively along with the pastors and members of the Shiloh Church on the Town Creek Charge where his wife was still a member.

With steadily failing health, it was discovered in early 1966 that he had leukemia. This illness limited his activity increasingly as the months passed; however, with the loving care of his faithful wife, he remained at home until just a few weeks prior to his death. He died on June 29, 1968, at the New Hanover Memorial Hospital in Wilming-

ton.

His body was returned to White Oak for funeral services at the Bethlehem Church, and he was buried by the side of his first wife in the old church cemetery. He was really "home" at last. "This be the verse you gave for me: Here he lies where he longed to be; Home is the sailor, home from the sea, And the hunter home from the hill."

WALTER LEE DAVIS

1882-1968

A native of Scotland County, North Carolina, Walter Lee Davis was born November 24, 1882, and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Watt Davis. He was converted at an early age and joined the Beaver Dam Methodist Episcopal Church. Later he met and was married to the late Callie Covington, and to this union nine children were born.

Brother Davis felt the call to preach and for several years served as a local preacher in his home church. He served as an approved supply preacher from 1951 until his

retirement in 1963.

He departed this life June 30, 1968, at Scotland Memorial Hospital. Funeral services were conducted at Beaver Dam United Methodist Church on July 3, 1968, the Reverend Samuel L. Townsend, the pastor in charge. Burial was in the church cemetery near Laurel Hill.

PAUL RICH MANESS

1905-1968

Reverend Paul Rich Maness was born into a Methodist parsonage family in Asheville, North Carolina, September 6, 1905. Death came to him October 11, 1968. Unselfish person that he was, Paul willed his body to the Duke University Medical Center. A

memorial service was conducted from the First Methodist Church in Roanoke Rapids on Sunday afternoon, October 13, 1968, by the Rev. T. R. Jenkins, pastor of the church, and Rev. C. Wade Goldston, chaplain of Louisburg College.

Paul was prepared for the ministry by his family ties. His grandfather, his father, and one uncle, Troy Maness,

were ministers before him.

When Paul was nine years old, he moved to West Virginia. There, after his education in the public school, he attended West Liberty and Buckhannon Colleges. Prior to his entrance into the ministry he taught two years in the public school, In 1933, he was ordained in the West Virginia Conference and served the following charges: Clarkshurg, Clenville (where he served as assistant pastor), Mt. Zion, Pennsboro, Corinth, and Albright. He was married to Miss Edith Hill of Harrisville, West Virginia. While in West Virginia, in addition to his pastoral duties, he served two terms in the state legis-



lature.

Paul transferred to the North Carolina Annual Conference in 1948 and served four years on the Oriental Charge, four years on the Mt. Olive Charge, and one year on the Garysburg Charge. It was at the end of this year at Garysburg that ill health forced

him to retire. He and his family then moved to Roanoke Rapids. Paul is survived by his widow, Mrs. Edith H. Maness; two daughters, Mrs. Willie McCotter of Petersburg, Virginia, and Miss Dorcas Beth Maness of the home; one brother, Asa W. Maness, Charleston, West Virginia; two sisters, Mrs. Dorothy King, Charleston, West Virginia, and Mrs. Losie Harold, New Samaria Beach, Florida; and three grandchildren.

Paul Maness inspired and enriched multitudes of lives beyond measure, including my own. He was a minister with a warm heart and profound spiritual experience. He was the friend of all, and his home was always open, especially to young people. He dreamed big dreams about the kingdom of God. Even during his retirement and ill health he conceived of large plans for the spreading of the Good News. Like Moses, "he endured as seeing him who is invisible," and, like Abraham, "he looked for a city which hath foundations whose builder and maker is God."

1905-1968

In the late afternoon of October 15, 1968, Earl Bowling Edwards left the scenes of earth and journeyed to the dwelling place that God has prepared for them that love Him. With simple ceremony and amid an assemblage of friends and loved ones, the funeral

service was conducted at the Page Memorial Methodist Church in Biscoe, North Carolina. His body was laid to rest in Maplewood Cemetery in Durham, North Carolina where sleep the bodies of friends and loved ones. All this is strikingly indicative of the man and his manner of life. At home amid familiar scenes, simple in faith, constant in love, upright in all of his ways, this son of God came quietly to the climax of his career, honored and loved by the people among whom he had lived and to whom he was both friend and minister. Earl Bowling Edwards, the son of William Ryland

Edwards and Arimathea Edwards, was born May 1, 1905, in Durham, North Carolina along with his twin sister, Pearl.

Earl was educated in the Durham city schools and Duke University. He received his A.B. degree from Duke in 1928 and his B.D. in 1930. Because of the early death of his father and mother, Earl had to finance his high school and college education. Being a determined person,

Earl kept struggling until he reached the goal of life which was the ministry.

After Earl graduated from Duke, he joined the Western North Carolina Conference and served seven appointments there. In 1942 he became a chaplain in the 80th Infantry Division. He received the Bronze Star for meritorious service and received high praise for his gallantry and service. In 1946 he joined the North Carolina Conference and served the following churches: Belhaven, 1946-48; Winfall, 1948-51; Edenton, 1951-54; Person Street, Fayetteville, 1954-55; LaGrange, 1955-57; Four Oaks, 1957-61; Gatesville, 1961-65; City Roads, Elizabeth City, 1965-68; Biscoe, 1968 until his death.

In 1937 Earl was married to Rachel Copeland of Windsor, North Carolina. She was his faithful and devoted helpmate for thirty-one years. She now survives him. He leaves one son, Robert Earl, who lives in Haddon Heights, New Jersey. Robert is now in law school in Temple University, Philadelphia. He also leaves one daughter, Sarah Frances.

She is a 1969 graduate of Greensboro College, There are two grandchildren.

Our Lord's words concerning Nathaniel are descriptive of Earl: "Behold, an Israelite in whom there is no hypocrisy." Pretense and vain display were foreign to his nature. He was genuine to the core, and sincerity is an indispensable requisite of Christian character. As a pastor he was a gentle and understanding man, often in the homes of his people. As a preacher, he held to the central verities of the Gospel, unenticed by the fads of the day. In worship, he led his people with quiet dignity, and thereby taught them and he did not compremise them to win popular approval. He might have said with the Hebrew, without pride and boasting, "I have walked in mine integrity." His life was to worship the Lord in the beauty of heliness. He ws a man of deeply-reoted convictions,

above reproach. When he laid his armor down there was no blot on his character. None can measure the continuing influence of such a man as this.

A feature of his work with St. Paul was his organization of the Sixty-Uppers Club, with an interesting program and fine fellowship. His visiting included the shut-ins and hospital patients.

To accent some of his church activities, Mr. Chaplin believed heartily in visitation evangelism, and gathered many into the kingdom by that method. Then his annual pre-Easter attendance campaigns were well planned, involving many with responsibilities and filling the sanctuary.

His sermons were undergirded by study, wide reading, and careful preparation. His

RAYMOND JOSEPH BOLLES

1902-1968

Raymond Joseph Bolles was born January 22, 1902, in New York City, one of thirteen children of Emily and Harry Bolles. He attended the public schools of New York City and graduated from high school. An avid reader, Raymond was always searching for the

truth, and became most interested in the relationship between the different faiths of his time.

In 1925, while working in New York, he met and married Ethel Ungerer, of New Jersey, and six children were born of this marriage. Raymond and his wife were very active members of their church with Raymond serving in many capacities. As a member of the Bergen Boulevard Reformed Church in Ridgefield, New Jersey, and in the United Church of Christ in Hasbrouck Heights, New Jersey, Raymond served as superintendent of the Sunday school, Adult Bible class teacher, choir director, deacon, elder, and a member of the Board of Trustees. In the community of churches of his area, Raymond's interest and service were recognized through his selection as a vice-president of the Bergen County Council of Churches. While a member of the Hasbrouck Heights congregation, Raymond received his license as a lay minister in the United Church of Christ.

Retiring from membership of the staff of the Johnson Library in Hackensack, New Jersey in 1967, Raymond came to visit his married daughter at Cherry Point, N. C., and entered into the life and activity of First Methodist Church in Havelock. In his new church life, he heard of the need for ministers in the North Carolina Annual Conference, and with the assistance and encouragement of Rev. William W. Sherman, Jr., his pastor, and New Bern District superintendent, Rev. R. Crady Dawson, Raymond enrolled in the Pastors' School at Duke University in 1967 to begin his studies for the ministry.

Though 65 years of age at that time, Raymond recognized the opportunity to give his life to a challenge that long had been speaking to his heart and life. His progress in the studies for the ministry at Pastors' School and the record of his work in local churches through the years were of such quality that both the New Bern District Committee and the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications approved his name at the 1968 Annual Conference as an approved supply pastor. Raymond was appointed

to Carroll Chapel United Methodist Church in Sneads Ferry.

From June until October, when he became ill. Raymond conducted his first funeral, officiated at his first wedding, baptized and confirmed two members in his church, and carried out his other duties with joy. In that short time, he and his wife had captured the hearts of their congregation, and there was a great outpouring of love between the people and the parsonage family.

Though his ministry here in our conference was short, in terms of weeks and months, among the second of the Sneads Ferry congregation remarked. "He left something with each and every one of us." For

his family and friends, he left a legacy of faith in an abiding and sustaining love of his

Rev. Raymond J. Bolles passed away on December 5, 1968, from the effects of several months' illness with cancer, at the Onslow Memorial Hospital in Jacksonville. He was buried in Clifton, New Jersey. VIRGINIA BOLLES HULTS

HENRY IVERSON GLASS

1882-1968

Dr. Henry Iverson Glass, born October 9, 1882, was a gifted Methodist minister in the North Carolina Annual Conference for fifty-four years. During all these years he rendered faithful service and the fruits of his labors were abundant.



He served in business for several years and gave up a promising career with the American Tobacco Company to answer the call to the ministry. The call was clear and his answer was firm, as he joined the long line of those who have said, "Here am I; send me." He never

doubted the call or regretted his answer.

A graduate of the public schools and Gillam Academy, he entered Vanderbilt University after his decision to be a minister, and graduated from its School of Religion. In 1942, High Point College awarded him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. Having disdain for mediocrity in all phases of life, he continued a lite-long discipline of serious daily study and ever sought new ways to enrich his ministry. A clear thinker, he believed that nothing conceived in mental fuzziness could be declared with clarity. His library was admired by many both for the quality and quantity of its volumes.

An excellent preacher, his sermons always showed good preparation. They were couched in the Bible, underwith literature, and always relevant to the needs of his

girded by prayer, interspersed with literature, and always relevant to the needs of his congregation. Many of his younger brethren regarded his sermons as being worthy of

emulation.

He had a true pastor's concern and reflected the heart of the Good Shepherd in his daily loving care of his people. On occasion when a minister would say that he could not find time to do house-to-house visiting, Dr. Class would observe that if a minister would make just two or three calls each day he would get into every home, even in the larger churches, at least once a year. For the most part, he did not think there was any

valid substitute for purposeful home visitation.

He was distinguished in appearance, dignified in demeanor, and gracious in manner.

A warmhearted friend, he was at home both with the cultured and the uncultured. He

could "walk with kings-nor lose the common touch."

He was a leader in Boy Scout work, both on the local and council level. Active in civic work, he served as president of Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs. He manifested interest in public affairs, serving as a member of the County Board of Public Welfare and on the State Committee of 100 on Interracial Affairs.

In his annual conference he was a member of the various boards and agencies and chairman of many of them. He had a special interest in youth and brought inspiration and motivation to them as he instructed in their assemblies. He also taught in Supply

Pastors' Schools.

He served the following appointments: Tarboro (where during his administration the present edifice was creeted); Edenton; Central, Raleigh; Elizabeth Citv District; Washington; First Church, Elizabeth City; Front Street, Burlington; Releigh District; Queen Street, Kinston; Trinity, Wilmington. He was called from the nastorate in Wilmington in 1952 to become the executive director in charge of the building of the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham. He served in this capacity for three years, 1952-55, during which time the first building was completed. At the 1954 Annual Conference ses-

sion. Dr. Glass took the mandatory retired relation by age limit. However, in retirement, he served the last of his three years at the Retirement Home, followed by two years as organizer and pastor of the Aldersgate Methodist Church, Durham. In 1957 he and Mrs. Glass moved to their home at Lake Junaluska.

He married the former Miss Mary Cowell of Washington, North Carolina, on December 28, 1922. Through the years, in high fidelity, they served together and met the demands and shared the joys of the Methodist itinerancy with unity of purpose and singleness of heart. They accepted challenges, enlarged opportunities, and opened new

doors of labor.

It was rather unique, though singularly appropriate, as life came full circle, that the memorial service for him was held at the United Methodist, Church in Washington, North Carolina, at whose altar he made many pledges and dedications. It was there he joined the North Carolina Annual Conference and was ordained deacon in 1914; it was there he was married in 1922; it was there he served as pastor from November 5, 1928, to November 28, 1932; and, after a life span of more than eighty-six years, which began on October 9, 1882 in Caswell County, North Carolina, and ended, after a brief illness, on December 23, 1968 in Kinston, North Carolina, his body rested before the same altar for a service of worship, praise, and thanksgiving. We have abiding gratitude that he lived among us and blessed us.

Robert Frost's hauntingly fascinating lines are most applicable:

The woods are lovely, dark and deep, But I have promises to keep, And miles to go before I sleep.

With promises kept and the last mile traveled, he entered into the fullness of the larger life.

The memorial service was held on December 26, 1968, conducted by Kelly J. Wilson, Harold F. Leatherman, F. Don Beaty, and this writer. Interment was in Oakdale Cemetery, Washington, North Carolina.

IOHN ANDREW THARPE

1886-1969

John Andrew Tharpe was born June 12, 1886, in Iredell County, North Carolina, son of J. F. Tharpe and Martha Beggerly Tharpe.

He attended the county schools, Harmony Academy, Yadkin Normal, and Grant Uni-



versity, Athens, Tennessee. He married Miss Anna Brown on November 24, 1909, at the bride's home in Iredell County. To this union the following children were born: Otto D. (deceased) and Mrs. Mamle T. Fox. Mrs. Tharpe died on August 21, 1965. On July 16, 1967, he married Mrs. Gertrude Smith Cagle.

Brother Tharpe was licensed to preach on July 24, 1909, in the Statesville District, Blue Ridge Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church. In November 1909, he was appointed to a church in South Carolina, but was almost immediately appointed to Misenheimer, North Carolina, where the pastor had suddenly died. In November 1910, he was transferred to the Atlantic Mission Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, and his appointments in that conference were St. Neal-Bladen; Ocracoke, and Pearl Street, Elizabeth City.

He was ordained deacon in November 1911 at Rowland, North Carolina, by Bishop William F. Anderson, and ordained elder in November 1913 at Walkertown, North Carolina, by Bishop Theodore S. Henderson. In November 1914, he was admitted to the North Carolina Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Washington, North Carolina, by credentials and vows. His appointments in this conference were as follows: Bladen, Stedman, Roxboro, Garysburg, Rosemary, Moyock, and South Alamance.

He retired in 1937 because of deafness and moved to White Oak, North Carolina. By request of the churches of the Bladen Circuit, where he had previously served four years as pastor, he was appointed there as a retired supply and served for three additional years, November 1945 to November 1948. After some other years, he and Mrs.

Tharpe moved to Spencer, North Carolina, to be near their daughter.

Brother Tharpe was genuinely loved in every place he served. He had sterling qualities of character and brought out the best in the lives of others. He was a clear thinker and a splendid preacher. He was fruitful in the work of evangelism. He led over seven hundred persons to make a profession of faith in Christ. He stayed close to those committed to his care by faithful visitation. He knew their joys and sorrows and ever gave to them the care and concern of a shepherd's heart. He successfully led many churches which he served in paying off accumulated and discouraging indebtedness. Though there are many intangibles involved in progress, it doubtless would not be far from the mark of full truth to say that he left every church he served stronger and better than he found it.

In a Raleigh, North Carolina hospital, Brother Tharpe died on January 9, 1969. He is survived by his wife, daughter, four sisters, and several grandchildren. Funeral services were held in the chapel of Lyerly Funeral Home, Salisbury, North Carolina, on Sunday, January 12, 1969, 1:30 p. m., and at Bess Chapel United Methodist Church, Flay, North Carolina, 4:30 p.m. the same day. Interment was in the church cemetery beside his first wife. The efficiating ministers were Mitchell C. Murrow, Ben Steele, and

JACKSON LAYFAYETTE SMITH

1876-1969

The Reverend Jackson Lafayette Smith was born near Concord in Cabarrus County, North Carolina, on August 8, 1876, the son of Francis Marion and Susan Hedick Smith. He died on January 10, 1969, at the age of 92, in the Methodist Retirement Home,



Durham. Services were conducted January 21 from the Hillsborough United Methodist Church by Revs. O. L. Hathaway, Harvey Johnson and J. D. Young. Burial was in the Hillsborough Cemetery with Masonic rites.

Brother Smith was educated in the private and public schools of Cabarrus County and was tutored by the late Dr. J. E. Davidson, widely known Presbyterian minister and teacher. He continued his studies at Weaver College in Buncombe County and did theological work through Emory University and Trinity College (now Duke University).

He began his career in Charlotte where he was in business for several years. During this period he served on the Charlotte Board of Commissioners, having been elected to this position without spending a penny during the political campaign. At Belmont Methodist Church he was superintendent of the Sunday school and charge lay leader. It was in this church that he met the former Miss Augusta Mae Robinson, whom he married on July 23,

1906. Mrs. Smith passed away on August 28, 1964.

He entered the ministry in 1910 and served in the Western North Carolina Conference for a period of eight years. His appointments included Marion, Old Fort, Weaverville and East Flat Rock. He was ordained deacon in 1914 and clder in 1918. In 1918 he transferred to the North Carolina Conference and served the following appointments:

South Mills, Columbia, Carvers Creek Circuit, Laurinburg, Hillsborough, Winfall, Ahos-

kie, Conway and the Oxford Circuit.

Brother Smith was a circuit rider in the tradition of Francis Asbury and other pioneer Methodist preachers. Mrs. George W. Glimore, a daughter, recalls that when she was a small girl her father rode a mountain circuit beyond Mars Hill. He would pack his saddle bag on Friday—one side with his Bible, the Methodist Discipline and a clean shirt—and the other with a change of clothing for his daughter Jackie who would ride with him on old Duke, the faithful steed. Up the mountains, down the valleys, Mr. Smith would practice his sermons on Duke and his small companion. The hills rang with songs of faith and praise and sermonic lectures. The circuit rider would preach two or three times on the weekend and he, Jackie, and old Duke would return, tired and exhausted, to their parsonage home. The journey was repeated week after week and month after month.

Brother Smith loved young people. He saw a great potential in youth. Many ministers in the North Carolina Conference testify to his encouragement and brotherly love during their early years in the ministry. His concern for youth is expressed in his establishment of a scholarship at Louisburg College in memory of his wife and son, Fred A. Smith, to aid young people preparing for full-time Christian service. Concerning this scholarship, he said, "I want to leave something to help young people throughout the years ahead. What we do to help youth prepare for life is the most important thing we

do.

Wherever he served, Brother Smith was greatly loved by his parishioners and wide circle of friends. He was a faithful pastor, a strong preacher of righteousness and a devoted follower of Jesus Christ. After 38 years of fruitful service, he retired in 1948.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. George W. Gilmore (Mae Jackson) of Hillsborough and Mrs. T. Walter Camlin (Helen Walton) of Greenville, S. C. A son, Fred Austin, died February 3, 1968.

OLLIE VICTOR ELKINS 1908-1969

The Reverend Ollie Victor Elkins was born in Normandy, Tennessee, December 20, 1908. He died in Moore County Hospital, Pinehurst, February 26, 1969. While he was a boy, his family moved to Chattanooga, Tennessee, where he lived until he entered the



Methodist ministry. At an early age he felt the call to preach which finally resulted in his joining the Holston Conference in 1934. He was from a family of Method:st ministers, consisting of a grandfather, an older brother and a nephew, the Reverend Carl L. Elkins, a member of the Tennessee Conference.

On December 16, 1938, he was married to Miss Venia E. Costello of Chattanooga, Tennessee, who survives him

along with their son, Mike.

His ministry was varied and effective. From 1934 to 1954 he was a member of the Holston Conference. Most of his early ministry was in the coal fields of southwest Virginia. In 1943 he entered the United States Army as a chaplain and served the young men in service unsel-fishly and effectively until he was discharged in 1954 from active duty. During the time of his active duty he served in World War II, in the Southwest Pacific and following the close of the war, in the Army of Occupation in Japan and in Germany.

In 1954 he was transferred to the North Carolina Conference and served the following charges: Daniel's Memorial, Goldsboro; Cedar Grove, Orange County; Branson,

Durham; Littleton, and his last charge, Hoke, Raeford, where he died.

O. V. was an humble servant of his Master and "went about doing good," heeding the admonition of his Savior, "Let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth." He was loved and appreciated by those who knew him as was evidenced by the many cards, letters and beautiful floral offerings to him and to the family giving expression to their feelings. His visits to the sick rooms were a blessing of cheer and assurance. He often departed saying: "The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord lift up His countenance upon you and give you peace; both now and evermore." He loved and sang the great hymns, adding much to the congregational singing with his resonant voice.

The life Ollie Elkins lived is well described in the following poem:

HE LIVED A LIFE

"What was his creed?"
I do not know his creed, I only know
That here below he walked the common road,
And lifted many a load, lightened the task,
Brightened the day for others toiling on a weary way:
This, his only need; I do not know his creed.

"What was his creed? I never heard him speak Of visions rapturous, of Alpine peak Of doctrine, dogma, new or old; But this I know, he was forever bold To stand alone, to face the challenge of each day, And live the truth, so far as he could see— The truth that evermore makes free.

"His creed? I care not what his creed; Enough that never yielded he to greed, But served a brother in his daily need; Plucked many a thorn and planted many a flower; Clorified the service of each hour; Had faith in God, himself, and fellowmen: Perchance he never thought in terms of creed; I only know he lived a life, in deed!"

FRANK EUGENE BERRY 1924-1969

Frank Eugene Berry, a native of Oxford, laid claim to his heavenly citizenship on March 1, 1969. Born June 13, 1924, to Louis Edward and Mini Icard Berry, he was educated in the Hickory city schools and was a veteran of World War II, serving in the



South Pacific with the United States Army. He felt the "tap on the shoulder" during those war years but he returned to Hickory, established a successful business and out of the market place God called Frank Berry into the ministry of his Church. From the moment he settled the matter of his life's work with his Master until that hour on Saturday morning, March 1, when God said, "It is enough—come now with me," he was sure about the call to the ministry. He began his earthly ministry in obedience; he departed it in triumph. Yet—

"His life was gentle
And the elements so mixed in him
That nature might stand up
And say to all the world:
This was a man"

Through the ripening of our friendship over the past three years, two of which were spent as Minister of Education in a shared ministry at Saint James, I know these lines apply to Frank Berry, The Annual Conference Jour-

nals—both in Western North Carolina and our own Conference—cannot tell the whole story of his ministry. His worth to God, the Church, and the world cannot be so coldly computed. As a matter of public record, he served in the Western North Carolina Conference the following charges: 1952-53, Creston Charge; 1953-55, Avery Charge; and 1955-59, the Mount Vernon Charge near High Point. He then transferred to the North

Carolina Conference and served the four churches on the Rougemont Charge in North Durham County from 1959-63. During these years he obtained his B.D. degree from the Duke Divinity School. He had graduated from High Point College during his Mount

Vernon pastorate. He served Saint John in Durham from 1963-66.

In June of 1966 he was appointed as Minister of Education to Saint James. It was in August, 1967, following his return from a conference at Lake Junaluska that he suffered his first near-fatal attack. He recuperated and returned to work on a limited basis. On March 15, 1968, he suffered another severe attack on the eve of the annual spring retreat of the Saint James MYF. His physician's verdict: a complete rest and no appointment for the coming conference year. Frank was granted emergency sick leave by Bishop Garber. He regained strength and his doctors felt he needed some occupational therapy and so he enrolled in the graduate counseling program at ECU and looked forward to receiving an appointment at the 1969 session of the Conference at Chapel Hill.

Frank Berry was faithful and effective—whether teaching little children, counseling, guiding and inspiring youth, giving courage to those who bore heavy loads, comforting the burdened and sorrowing, and was an able, tactful and patient administrator. Not in my sixteen-year ministry have I found a more sympathetic and understanding pastor who moved among us quietly and unobtrusively—whose life was stamped as genuine—without superficiality and pretense. I never knew him to enter the chancel of Saint James without the most exacting preparation. His prayers and sermons were spoken with authority, but ever with humility. He loved and supported Methodism and his ministry

was stamped by thought, spirituality and adherence to the Word.

There was no burial for Frank, for in his death he still sought to speak. His last will ordered his body to be given to the Duke Medical Center for scientific research. It seemed a final testimony to his continuing interest in God's people on earth. He is survived by his wife, the former Doris Dellinger; a son, Frank Eugene, Jr. of Durham, and a

daughter, Chervl Elaine, a first-year student at ECU.

Memorial services were held at Saint James on March 3 by the Rev. Willis R. Stevens, Greenville District superintendent, and myself. Those present attest to the theme of triumph in that hour. A second service, as requested by Frank, was held at the West View Methodist Church in Hickory by the pastor, Mr. White, Dr. M. Wilson Nesbitt and the writer.

God does not measure life as we mortals do, by length of years, but by depth of devotion, by height of purpose and by breadth of compassion. Frank Berry will continue to minister in Saint James and all the churches he served. For his Christian influence will continue to move in the lives and witness of those whom he loved and served.

CARLOS O. GARDNER, SR. 1905-1969

Reverend Carlos O. Gardner, Sr., the son of Reverend A. M. Gardner and Mae Davis Gardner, was born in Tampa, Florida on October 8, 1905. His death came on March 19, 1969, after having faithfully served the Church of his Lord for some thirty years. His

Such was the faith of Reverend Carlos O. Gardner, Sr. In his death he is missed by all who loved him but in his life he pregared those who loved him to accept the day of sorrow. And we are able to accept the day of sorrow for during his life he rejoiced with us in the Christian hope and at his death we are able to rejoice with him in the reading of Paul's words:

For I am sure that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ

Jesus our Lord.'

ISAWO TANAKA

1890-1969

The Reverend Isawo Tanaka, native of Japan, graduate of Trinity College and member of the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church, died at his home in Durham, North Carolina, April 2, 1969, after an extended illness. Funeral services

were conducted in the Duke University Chapel, April 4, 1969, and interment was in Maplewood Cemetery in Dur-



Born in Hotaido, Japan, June 14, 1890, son of Tasuku and Yei Tanaka, Isawo attended the high school and theological departments of Kanseigahuin University and entered Trinity College in Durham in the fall of 1916, from which he received the A.B. degree in 1920. In 1921. he was awarded the A.M. degree in psychology by Clark University, and in 1924 the B.D. degree by Yale Divinity School. After an additional year of graduate study at George Peabody College for Teachers, he returned to Japan in 1925. Having been admitted into the Methodist ministry in 1924 in Kobe, Japan, Isawo was ordained Deacon in 1924 and Elder in 1926.

For three years, 1925-1928, he taught in Hiroshima Girls' College, and from 1928 to 1934 he preached in the Japanese Methodist Church in Seoul, Korea. For the next two years he served as Dean of Kyroitsu College in Yoko-

hama.

Returning to the United States in the late 1930's, he preached for a time in Methodist churches on the West Coast, including the Japanese Methodist Church at Wapato, Washington, and in Oakland, California from 1938 until near the outbreak of World War II.

After a period in the Japanese resettlement work in New York state, he joined the staff of the Duke University Library in 1948 and served there until his retirement in 1960.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Kimi Yanagihara Tanaka; a son, Dr. Shin Tanaka, and daughter-in-law, Taeko Tanaka, of Minneapolis, Minnesota; two grandchildren, and two sisters in Japan, Mrs. Iku Hirano and Mrs. Shizu Goto. Dr. Shin Tanaka, the son, a specialist in transplant surgery, holds the A.B. and M.D. degrees from Duke University.

The Reverend Dr. Howard C. Wilkinson, Duke University chaplain, was assisted in the funeral services by the Reverend J. II. Phillips of the Duke faculty, and the Rever-end Takemi Sasamori, of the Japanese United Church, New York City.

Throughout his long period of association with Duke University, including the years of retirement, he was held in high esteem by colleagues, students and all who observed his fidelity to his particular role in the academic world. His unassuming manner did not disguise his Christian commitment. His affection for people was obvious in conversation and chance association as well as in meticulous attention to his official duties.

*JAMES C. STANFORD

1933-1969

Jimmy Stanford, 35, Methodist missionary in Peru, lay on a hospital bed in Lima, dying. He was in the hospital for routine surgery when complications set in. At the peak of his powers to be of service life was slipping from him. His last request was that the fourth chapter of Ephesians be read.



Paul writes to the Ephesians in that chapter saying that God has given us the gift of His grace through Christ. "For the building up of the body of Christ until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the statue of the fullness of Christ." This was the goal of Jimmy's personal life. His belief that every person could attain this goal was the fire of his evangelism.

James C. Stanford went out with his wife, Jo Ann Spell, as missionary to Peru in 1962. His going marked a milestone in his pilgrimage which began when he was born in Burlington in 1933. He experienced conversion in the Fairview Methodist Church in Altamahaw and came out of that congregation to enter the Christian ministry. He finished Altamahaw-Ossippee High School and went on to Asbury College and Duke Divinity School to complete his education.

Jimmy served Harrells Charge near Coldsboro before coming to Davis Street Church in Burlington as associate pastor in 1958. It was while there that he felt the call to offer himself for mission service. He and Jo Ann entered training and on December 9, 1960, Bishop Paul Carber commissioned them as missionaries of the church at a service in Davis Street Church.

Jim requested that he be buried in Peru. Funeral services were held in Magdalent Magdalena Church in Lima. He went from there to Trujillo where he had a fruitful ministry. While there he started two churches and two social centers in Chimbote. A member of the Peruvian Annual Conference, Jim served as president of the Board of Evangelism. His last appointment was that of district superintendent of the Central District. In addition he was serving as pastor of churches in San Ramon, La Merced, Puerto Bermudez, and Puerto Mairo.

Church and he was laid to rest in Lima. A memorial service was held in his memory at Davis Street United Methodist Church on Sunday, March 30, 1969, and the community joined together to give thanks for his life.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Earl Stanford; his wife, Jo Ann, and their three children, Denise, Sharon, and Richard. Additional survivors include his two sisters.

Although young in years, Jimmy Stanford had already attained toward the mature manhood in Christ which he sought. Sudden death has stilled his voice, but the message he proclaimed that all people can "attain to mature manhood, to the measure of the statue of the fullness of Christ" shall go on forever.

Her very presence was a witness to the reality of our faith, and her testimony lives on in the lives of those who hold her in precious memory.

It would be impossible to evaluate the quality of her life, to estimate the influence for good, to measure the help she furnished others, to state fully the force of her impact

upon all who came in contact with her.

In days when people pessimistically criticize the church, Mrs. Thrift stood steadfast in her belief in the church. She loved God and she loved His church. She embodied the message of God within her life. In Acts 2:42, the writer says, "And they (the saved) continued steadfastly in the Apostle's doctrine and fellowship, and in the breaking of bread and in prayers." We miss her but thank God for the fact that Ella Belinda Lovell Hall passed our



This coveted jewel was won for the first time by the Rockingham District and was presented to Mrs. Thompson, its secretary. It was intended that this jewel represent excellence, "excellent in design and beautiful to the eye." It is of pure gold. These qualities are all symbolic of the one who wore it with such appreciation and gratitude. And now:



She not only taught, but was a member of the administrative staff. She was eminently qualified, having received a doctor of philosophy degree.

Mrs. Beale's life was characterized by a spirit of unselfish service wherever she happened to be—in the class-

room, the administrative position, or the parsonage which she and her husband occupied. She and her husband always emphasized those truths which are eternal. She was anxious to do everything within her power to bless mankind. The beneficent influence of her life will long be felt. She possessed a most gracious and cordial spirit, and it was always a joy to be a guest in her home, where every possible courtesy was extended.

Several weeks before her death, in talking with her husband, she made the following statements: "I am not afraid to die. I don't mind dying. I am ready to die. I have no hard feelings or grudge against anyone." At the funeral the soloist sang "At the Cross" and "In the Sweet By and By." At the request of her husband, the poems entitled "Should You Go First," "He Maketh No Mistakes," and "Now the Laborer's Task Ie O'er" were read. Truly Mrs. Beale was prepared to say as she approached life's earthly end, as did Paul of old, "I have fought the good fight; I have finished the course; I have kept the faith; henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness."

MRS. MARGARET HINTON BROWN

1877-1969

The writing of this memoir is an act of grateful love. For more than eighty years I have known, admired, respected, esteemed and loved "Cousin Maggie," as our family always called her. She was the daughter of Edgar Latimore and Mary Elizabeth Hinton,



one of the best known and most highly regarded families in the eastern section of North Carolina. They were staunch supporters of church, civic and educational life and of all other worthy causes. I recall the fervor of their religious enthusiasm in old Newlands Church, Margaret was one of the loveliest girls I have ever known. She was attractive in face and physique; beautiful in conduct and character; in bearing and behaviour. I never knew a young person more devoted to the ideal than was she.

Her girlhood was but a promise of her womanhood —a promise so well fulfilled. She was like the ideal woman of the Proverbs whose "price is far above rubies;" who is clothed with strength and honour, whose "mouth speaks wisdom and in her tongue is the law of kindness." Wordsworth must have had such a woman in mind when he wrote of one "A perfect woman nobly planned, to

warn ,to comfort, to command."

Mrs. Brown's life was so interwoven with that of her

husband, the Reverend W. H. Brown, that the same memoir might appropriately be used for both. They were married in 1903 and lived together "in peace and harmony" until his death in 1967. They were almost literally an example of an old love rhyme which ran:

> "Two minds with but a single thought, Two hearts that beat as one.'

To their marriage were born two children, William Hinton Brown of Rutherfordton, and Mrs. J. R. Warren of Lynchburg, Va., who with three grandchildren survive her.

This beloved couple served in the regular pastorate 34 years, including in their itinerary some of the best charges in the Conference. Upon retiring they moved to Jackson Springs, North Carolina, where they were useful servants of the church and community for twenty-five more years. They entered the Methodist Retirement Home at Durham in 1961 where they were living at the time of their deaths. She was buried from the West End United Methodist Church, as was he, and both lie side by side in the old church cemetery. Her funeral was conducted by the Reverend Pierce Layfield and Dr. Joseph F. Coble, administrator of the Retirement Home where she died. The date of her death was Sunday, April 13, 1969.

I shall miss her. One of the most disconcerting things about old age is that there is no one to whom you can talk about old times. She was the last connections between me and a happy past. I realize that when I have paid her this feeble tribute I have not told the full story. Her's was the life of an exemplary Christian. It would be difficult to evaluate properly either her character or conduct; her attitudes or actions. Her's was the strength of serenity; the power of purity; the greatness of goodness. In the long years I have known her, I do not recall any single action which might be considered unseemly,

or have I known her to act in any manner unbecoming a child of God.

Her's was the quiet life which achieved notable things but without show. She wrote no books or articles for publication, she ran for no office, held no public post of honor, but it would be difficult to find anyone who exerted more influence among her hundreds of friends.

Our beloved friend had the simple faith of our fathers. She literally walked with the Good Shepherd beside the still waters. She always felt the assurance that underneath her were the everlasting arms. She ever looked with unfaltering faith for the city whose "builder and maker is God."

We have no misgivings as to her future. That future may be like the one depicted in those old songs she loved so well: "The Christian's Home in Glory," "The Sweet By and By." It may be as the one described in the Revelation. Or all may fall short of the glory that awaits the Christian "over there." Whatever it may be like, I am convinced that such unfaltering faith, such unswerving devotion as her's cannot perish but will become a part

of that unfailing goodness and unfailing beauty called God.

There is no cause for mourning. There must come to those who loved her so greatly and cared for her so tenderly a sense of satisfaction that comes from the realization that her sufferings are over. They have no regrets save that of parting. Even that is made easier by the belief that we shall meet again.

Section V

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

No. 1

The United Methodist Church

The 1968 Uniting Conference of The United Methodist Church voted to recommend to the members of the Annual Conferences as a proposed amendment to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church, the following:

That Paragraph 12, Article I which reads as follows:

"The General Conference shall be composed of not less than 600 nor more than 1,000 delegates ,one-half of whom shall be ministers and one-half lay members, to be elected by the Annual Conference."

be amended to read:

"Paragraph 12. Art. I. 1. The General Conference shall be composed of not less than 600 nor more than 1,000 delegates, one-half of whom shall be ministers and one-half lay members. 2. Delegates shall be elected by the Annual Conferences except that delegates may be elected by other autonomous Methodist churches if and when the General Conference shall approve concordats with such other autonomous Methodist Churches for the mutual election and seating of delegates in each other's highest legislative conferences. 3. In the case of The Methodist Church in Great Britain, mother church of Methodism, upon mutual approval of the concordat now pending, provision shall be made for the reciprocal election and seating of four delegates, two clergy and two lay. (Votes cast 244: for, 128: against, 116).

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

No. 2

The 1968 Uniting Conference of The United Methodist Church voted to recommend to the members of the Annual Conferences as a proposed amendment to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church, the following:

That Paragraph 36, Article I which now reads:

"The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the conference president of Women's Society of Christian Service, the conference president of United Methodist Men, and the conference lay leader. Each charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. The lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The United Methodist Church."

be amended by adding after the conference lay leader the words,

"and the president of the Conference Youth Organization" and by adding at the beginning of the last sentence the words "except for the president of the Conference Youth Organization."

so that the amended Parapraph 36, Article I will read:

"The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the conference president of Women's Society of Christian Service, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, and the president of the Conference Youth Organization. Each charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. Except for the president of the Conference Youth Organization, the lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The United Methodist Ohurch." (Votes cast 322; for, 322; against, 0).

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

No. 3

The 1968 Uniting Conference of The United Methodist Church voted to recommend to the members of the Annual Conferences as a proposed amendment to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church, the following:

That Paragraph No. 8 (Article II) and Paragraph No. 9 (Article III) which now reads:

"Paragraph No. 8, Art. II. There shall be Jurisdictional Conferences for the church in the United States of America, with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth; provided that in The United Methodist Church there shall be no jurisdictional or central conference based on any ground other than geographical and regional division."

Paragraph No. 9, Art. III. There shall be Central Conferences for the church outside the United States of America and Canada, and if necessary Provisional Central Conferences, all with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth."

be amended by deleting the words "and Canada" and that the sixth section of Paragraph 42 (Article I) which now reads:

"Western.—Washington, Idaho, Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Alaska, Hawaii, Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia."

be amended by deleting the words "Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, and British Columbia" and inserting the word "and" before Hawaii, so that the amended paragraph will read:

"Paragraph 8, Art. II. There shall be Jurisdictional Conferences for the church in the United States of America, with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth; provided that in The United Methodist Church there shall be no jurisdictional or central conference based on any ground other than geographical and regional division."

"Paragraph 9, Art. III. There shall be Central Conferences for the church outside of the United States of America, and if necessary Provisional Central Conferences, all with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth."

"Western—Washington, Idaho, Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Alaska and Hawaii." (Votes cast 273; for, 273; against, 0).

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

No. 4

The 1968 Uniting Conference of The United Methodist Church voted to recommend to the members of the Annual Conferences as a proposed amendment to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church, the following:

That Paragraph 54 (Article V) which now reads:

Paragraph 54. Art. V. The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected or to which they are transferred. Bishops may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision under the following conditions: (1) The transfer of bishops may be on either of two bases: (a) a jurisdiction which receives a bishop by transfer from another jurisdiction may transfer to that jurisdiction or to a third jurisdiction one of its own bishops eligible for transfer, so that the number transferred in by each jurisdiction shall be balanced by the number transferred out, or (b) a jurisdiction may receive a bishop from another jurisdiction and or transfer out a member of its own College of Bishops. (2) No bishop shall be transferred unless he shall have given his specific consent. (3) No bishop shall be eligible for transfer unless he shall have served one quadrennium in the jurisdiction which elected him to the episcopacy. (4) All such transfers shall require the approval by a majority vote of the members, present and voting, of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved after consideration by the Committees on Episcopacy. After the above procedures have been followed, the transferring bishop shall become a member of the receiving College of Bishops and shall be subject to residential assignment by that Jurisdictional Conference.

"A bishop may be assigned by the Council of Bishops for presidential service or other temporary service in another jurisdiction than that which elected him, provided request is made by a majority of the bishops in the Jurisdiction of the proposed service.

"In the case of an emergency any jurisdiction or Central Conference through the death or disability of a bishop or other cause, the Council of Bishops may assign a bishop from another jurisdiction or Central Conference to the work of the said jurisdiction or Central Conference with the consent of a majority of the bishops of that jurisdiction or Central Conference."

be amended by adding the following sentence: "Nothing herein shall prevent the assignment by the Council of Bishops on a quadrennial basis of one bishop for full-time secretarial responsibility in the Council of Bishops," so that the amended paragraph shall read:

"Paragraph 54. Art. V. The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected or to which they are transferred. Bishops may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision under the following conditions: (1) The transfer of bishops may be on either of two bases: (a) a jurisdiction which receives a bishop by transfer from another jurisdiction may transfer to that jurisdiction or to a third jurisdiction one of its bishops eligible for transfer, so that the number transferred in by each jurisdiction shall be balanced by the number transferred out, or (b) a jurisdiction may receive a bishop from another jurisdiction and not transfer out a member of its own College of Bishops. (2) No bishop shall be transferred unless he shall have given his specific consent. (3) No bishop shall be eligible for transfer unless he shall have served one quadrennium in the jurisdiction which elected him to the episcopacy. (4) All such transfers shall require the approval by a majority vote of the members, present and voting, of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved after consideration of the Committees on Episcopacy. After the above procedures have been followed, the transferring bishop shall become a member of the receiving College of Bishops and shall be subject to residential assignment by that Jurisdictional Conference.

"A bishop may be assigned by the Council of Bishops for presidential service or other temporary service in another jurisdiction than that which elected him, provided request is made by a majority of the bishops in the Jurisdiction of the proposed service.

"In the case of an emergency in any jurisdiction or Central Conference through the death or disability of a bishop or other cause, the Council of Bishops may assign a bishop from another jurisdiction or Central Conference to the work of the said jurisdiction or Central Conference with the consent of a majority of the bishops of that jurisdiction or Central Conference. Nothing herein shall prevent the assignment by the Council of Bishops on a quadrenial basis of one bishop for full-time secretarial responsibility in the Council of Bishops." (Votes cast 320; for, 320; against, 0).

NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE PROGRAM COUNCIL

Introductory Statement: This proposal is designed as a working pattern of organization for the North Carolina Program Council. Amendments may be made to the plan at any Annual Conference Session.

(Note: The language of the General Church Plan of Union is used in the following proposal wherever possible. Words that do not appear in the General Plan of Union appear in CAPITAL letters.)

Paragraph 738:

IN THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH AN ANNUAL CONFERENCE PROGRAM COUNCIL SHALL BE ORGANIZED WHICH WILL BE REFERRED TO HEREAFTER AS THE COUNCIL.

1. Purpose.—The purpose of the Council shall be: (a) to receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district agencies, the Annual Conference agen-

cies, and the Jurisdictional and General Program Councils; (b) to develop these recommendations into a coordinated program to be recommended to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment, and adoption as the Annual Conference program, and (c) to provide implementation for and administration of the coordinated program as adopted by the conference.

2. Membership.—The membership of the Annual Conference Program Council shall consist of the presiding bishop, the district superintendents, representatives of conference agencies as determined by the conference, the conference secretary, two members (one to be the president) of the Conference Women's Society of Christian Service, the Conference Lay Leader, two representatives of the conference youth organization, one layman from each district, chairmen of age-level departments, and such additional members as the Annual Conference may determine.

(REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE BOARDS OF THE CONFERENCE SHALL BE THE CHAIRMAN OF EACH GROUP. THE LAY PERSON FROM EACH DISTRICT SHALL BE NOMINATED BY THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT. THERE MAY BE ADDITIONAL MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL SELECTED AT LARGE BY THE BISHOP AND HIS CABINET.)

The following shall be members of the council without vote: Salaried and volunteer Annual Conference str ff, the conference treasurer, and one or more members of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

3. Officers.—The officers of the Council shall be a chairman, a vice chairman, a secre-

tary, and a treasurer. They shall be selected by the council.

4. Executive Committee.—There may be an executive committee consisting of the officers, the Bishop, at least one district superintendent chosen by the Cabinet, the difference of the council, and other members as the Annual Conference may determine. Approximately one-half of the members of the executive committee shall be laymen.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE SHALL BE COMPOSED OF THE FOLLOW-ING: CHAIRMAN, VICE-CHAIRMAN, SECRETARY, TREASURER, AND DIRECTOR OF THE COUNCIL, CHAIRMEN OF THE THREE COMMITTEES: (1) INTERPRETATION, (2) TELEVISION, RADIO, AND FILM COMMUNICATION, (3) PUBLISHING INTERESTS, CONFERENCE LAY LEADER, PRESIDENT OF THE WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE, AND PRESIDENT OF CONFERENCE UNITED METHODIST YOUTH FELLOWSHIP. IN ADDITION THE CHAIRMAN OF ANY COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY THE COUNCIL WILL BECOME A MEMBER OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, DURING THE DURATION OF THAT APPOINTMENT, AND TWO AT LARGE MEMBERS TO BE APPOINTED BY THE BISHOP.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE SHALL BE AMENABLE TO THE COUNCIL AND SHALL EXERCISE ADMINISTRATIVE AND COUNSELING FUNCTIONS

FOR THE COUNCIL. THE CHAIRMAN OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MAY APPOINT ANY OF THE COMMITTEE MEMBERS TO SERVE IN A COUNSELING RELATIONSHIP WITH ANY BOARD OR AGENCY RESPONSIBLE TO THE COUNCIL.

- 5. Committees, Task Forces, and Consultations.—The council shall appoint a committee on Interpretation, a Committee on Television, Radio and Film Communication, and a Committee on Publishing Interest. It may appoint such other committees, task forces, and consultations as may be deemed essential to the effective discharging of its responsibilities.
- 6. Departments.—The council may establish departments as it deems necessary to the performance of its duties.
- 7. Director.—The council shall elect, upon nomination by the Bishop and district superintendents, an executive officer, to be known as the conference program director. He shall be in consultative relationship to the conference Cabinet on matters relating to correlation, implementation, and administration of the conference program. HE SHALL BE CONSIDERED AN EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT TO THE CABINET FOR THE CORRELATION, IMPLEMENTATION, AND ADMINISTRATION OF THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM.
- 8. Staff.—All Annual Conference program staff shall be employed by, directed by, and amenable to to the Council, and shall be known as the Conference Council Staff. Ordained ministers on the staff are subject to being appointed by the presiding Bishop THE COUNCIL SHALL BE AUTHORIZED TO EMPLOY ADEQUATE AND QUALIFIED PERSONNEL TO IMPLEMENT THE WORK OF THE PROGRAM COUNCIL.
- 9. Relationships.—The council shall have the following relationships including the amenabilities indicated:
- (a) All District and Annual Conference agencies shall submit the elements of program which are to be promoted in, supported by, or implemented by the local churches of the conference to the Council for consideration, correlation into a unified program and calendaring prior to submission to the local churches. The council may request district or Annual Conference agencies to implement a program for the entire conference.
- (b) The Council staff shall be responsible, in cooperation with the district superintendents, for the implementation of the conference program.
- (c) FOR THE PURPOSE OF HAVING MOST EFFECTIVE LEADERSHIP AT STRATEGIC ADMINISTRATIVE LEVELS EACH DISTRICT SHALL HAVE A DISTRICT COUNCIL COMPOSED OF THE FOLLOWING: THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, DISTRICT LAY LEADER, DISTRICT PRESIDENT OF WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE, DISTRICT PRESIDENT OF WINTED METHODIST YOUTH FELLOWSHIP, AND DEPARTMENTAL COORDINATORS (FOR FAMILY LIFE, ADULTS, YOUTH AND CHILDREN) WHO SHALL BE SELECTED BY THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT IN PROVIDING EFFECTIVE LEADERSHIP FOR THE ENTIRE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AS IT RELATES TO DISTRICT PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION.

DISTRICT COORDINATORS WILL RECEIVE CONTINUING TRAINING THROUGH THE EFFORTS OF THE CONFERENCE PROCRAM DIRECTOR AND THE CONFERENCE STAFF, AND FROM TIME TO TIME THESE COORDINATORS WILL RECEIVE ASSIGNMENTS TO REPRESENT THE CONFERENCE IN NATIONAL AND/OR REGIONAL MEETINGS IN WHICH FURTHER TRAINING, INSPIRATION, OR PLANNING MAY BE AMONG THE PURPOSES OF SUCH MEETINGS. THE PURPOSE OF SUCH ASSIGNMENTS BEING GIVEN TO DIFFERENT PERSONS IS TO MAKE POSSIBLE THE TRAINING OF A LARGER GROUP OF EFFECTIVE LEADERS FOR THE CONFERENCE.

ANY MEMBERS OF THE CONFERENCE OR DISTRICT STAFF MAY BE EXPECTED TO PROVIDE SPECIALIZED LEADERSHIP IN ANY AREA OF INTEREST REQUESTED BY THE COUNCIL.

EACH DISTRICT MAY BE EXPECTED TO USE THE LEADERSHIP OF PERSONS FROM THAT DISTRICT SERVING ON ANY BOARD OF THE CONFERENCE. THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT MAY SELECT SUCH PERSONS AS HE MAY DESIRE FOR THE DISTRICT COUNCIL. THE DEPARTMENTAL COORDINATORS OF EACH DISTRICT SHALL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR CARRYING

THE ENTIRE PROGRAM AS CHANNELED THROUGH THE DISTRICT COUNCIL.

- (d) THE STAFF MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL SHALL NOT BE DESIGNATED AS OFFICERS OF ANY PARTICULAR BOARD TO EXCLUSION OF ALL OTHER BOARDS. FROM TIME TO TIME THERE MAY BE REALIGNMENT OF RESPONSIBILITIES AS THE COUNCIL MAY DEEM NECESSARY FOR THE EFFECTIVENESS OF ITS WORK.
- (e) EACH STAFF MEMBER MAY EXPECT CONTINUING JOB ANALYSIS AND DEFINITION FROM THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ACTING AT THE DIRECTION OF THE COUNCIL.
- (f) ADEQUATE SECRETARIAL SERVICE FOR STAFF FUNCTIONS SHALL BE PROVIDED BY THE COUNCIL. HOWEVER, EVEN THOUGH A SECRETARY IS ASSIGNED TO A PARTICULAR OFFICE ALL SECRETARIES ARE CONSIDERED AS EMPLOYEES OF THE COUNCIL NOT A PARTICULAR BOARD.
 - 10. Functions.—The functions of the Annual Conference Program Council are:
- (a) To study the mission of the Annual Conference and the local churches of the conference and to determine program emphases which will assist the conference and the local churches to perform their mission.
 - (b) To describe, coordinate, and organize opportunities to serve within the mis-
- (c) To receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district and annual conference agencies, and the jurisdictional and General Program Councils, to evaluate these recommendations and to formulate a coordinated conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for adoption.

sion.

- (d) To provide for implementation and administration of the program adopted by the conference.
- (e) To provide program resources and assistance in program-planning and implementation for local churches.
- (f) To provide staff personnel for implementing and administering the conference program.
- (g) To provide channels of communication between Annual Conference agencies and local churches.
- (h) To give leadership in research and planning for the conference and cooperate with other research and planning agencies.
- (i) To cooperate in ecumenical projects and events which have been approved by the conference.
- (j) To study and coordinate the budget askings of the conference agencies as they relate to conference program and to make recommendations regarding the same to the Commission on World Service and Finance; it being understood that an Annual Conference may direct that the accounting service for the Conference Treasurer shall be provided by a centralized office under the direction of a Business Manager. (THE EXECU-TIVE COMMITTEE SHALL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR MAKING THIS STUDY AND SUBMITTING IT TO THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL).
- (k) To interpret the conference program to the local churches with a view to gaining the financial support needed in order to implement the program.

MEETINGS—THE COUNCIL SHALL MEET AT LEAST THREE TIMES DURING THE CHURCH YEAR WITH SUCH ADDITIONAL MEETINGS AS MAY BE CALLED BY THE RESIDING BISHOP.

MEETINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE SHALL BE HELD AS DEEM-ED NECESSARY BY THE COUNCIL CHAIRMAN.

MEETINGS OF THE STAFF SHALL BE HELD MONTHLY OR AS OFTEN AS DEEMED NECESSARY BY THE COUNCIL DIRECTOR.

EACH DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT IS REQUESTED TO REPORT REGU-LARLY TO THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL CONCERNING THE EFFECTIVE-NESS OF THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM WITHIN HIS DISTRICT. Paragraph 739: In THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE COUNCIL, chosen by it, and amenable to it, there shall be a Committee on Interpretation.

- 1. Functions.—It shall, in cooperation with the Conference, promote the program of world service and other general benevolence causes in the pastoral charges of the conference in cooperation with the Division of Interpretation of the General Program Council. It shall coordinate the promotion of all approved general and conference benevolence causes including general and conference Advance Specials, the One Great Hour of Sharing, the Television-Radio Ministry Fund, the Fellowship of Suffering and Service, the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, and other general benevolence causes except as otherwise directed by the General Conference, and shall assign the responsibility for the promotion of approved causes that do not clearly belong to an existing agency.
- 2. Finance.—The budget for the committee shall be provided by the Conference through its Commission on World Service and Finance. THIS BUDGET SHALL BE A PART OF THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL BUDGET.

 Paragraph 740:

In THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE COUNCIL, chosen by it, and amenable to it, there shall be a Committee on Television, Radio, and Film Communication, which in cooperation with the program boards and other agencies in the conference, shall have for its purpose serving the conference in the field of communication by:

- (a) Promotion of the principles of good communication.
- (b) Promotion of the use of mass communication methods and materials by the local churches.
- (c) Promotion of the Television-Radio Ministry Fund in cooperation with the Committee on Interpretation.
- (d) Where necessary, establishment of audio-visual libraries and assistance in training audio-visual librarians. THIS COMMITTEE SHALL SUPERVISE THE MAIN-TENANCE AND USE OF THE WALTON MEMORIAL LIBRARY OF AUDIO-VIS-UAL AIDS WITH STAFF RESPONSIBILITIES DETERMINED BY THE COUNCIL.
 - (e) Production and distribution of programs for conference-wide use.
- (f) Cooperate with the Conference Board of Education and other conference agencies to provide training opportunities for leaders in the use of audio-visual methods and materials.
- (g) Service to other agencies of the conference, and close cooperation with the conference or area public relations office. THE DIRECTOR OF UNITED METHODIST INFORMATION SHALL BE RELATED TO THE WORK OF THIS COMMITTEE.
- (h) Cooperation with other agencies to organize and train local church Intercommission Audio-Visual Committees.
- (i) Cooperate with the general Division of Television, Radio, and Film Communication in the promotion and placement of television and radio programs within the conference.
- (j) Finance.—The budget for the committee shall be provided by the Conference through its Commission on World Service and Finance. THIS BUDGET SHALL BE A PART OF THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL BUDGET.

Paragraph 979:

- (1) There shall be organized in each Annual Conference a committee on Publishing Interests. IN THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE COUNCIL, chosen by it, and amenable to it, there shall be a COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.
- (2) The designated responsibility of the committee is to cooperate with the Board of Publication in promoting the work of this board. This implies that the committee is to promote the publications of the Board of Publication.
- (3) Finance.—The budget for the committee shall be provided by the Conference through its Commission on World Service and Finance. THIS BUDGET SHALL BE A PART OF THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL BUDGET.

Although it is not a mandatory committee, it is recommended that a Committee on Research and Planning be appointed by each annual conference Program Council and that it shall be amenable to it. IN THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE COUNCIL, CHOSEN BY IT, AND AMENABLE TO IT, THERE SHALL BE A COMMIT-

TEE ON RESEARCH AND PLANNING. THIS COMMITTEE WILL REPLACE THE CONFERENCE LONG-RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE. THE PURPOSE OF THIS COMMITTEE IS TO GIVE LEADERSHIP IN RESEARCH AND PLANNING FOR THE CONFERENCE AND TO COORDINATE WITH OTHER RESEARCH AND PLANNING AGENCIES. (Paragraph 841.10h).

MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTERPRETATION, COMMITTEE ON TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMUNICATION, THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS, AND THE COMMITTEE ON RESEARCH AND PLANNING MAY BE SELECTED FROM ANY PERSONS IN THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE, EITHER CLERGY OR LAY PERSONS, WITH PREFERENCE GIVEN TO THOSE WHO HAVE PARTICULAR SKILLS AND COMPETENCY IN THESE AREAS OF WORK.

AMENDMENTS OF ANY PORTION OF THIS ANNUAL CONFERENCE COUNCIL PLAN MAY BE MADE AT ANY SESSION OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE, UPON AT LEAST TWENTY-FOUR HOURS ADVANCE PRESENTATION OF PROPOSED AMENDMENTS IN WRITING.

AMENDMENTS MAY APPLY ONLY TO THOSE PORTIONS WHICH ARE NOT SPECIFICALLY DEFINED OR DESCRIBED IN THE CURRENT DISCIPLINE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH AS REVISED FROM TIME TO TIME.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

1. The Annual Meeting of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Commission on Archives and History is set for July 8-10, 1969, at Louisburg College. This will mark the first time that the Jurisdiction has held its annual meeting within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference.

Among the speakers for the Jurisdictional sessions are Bishop Roy Short, president of the General Commission; Dr. John H. Ness, Jr., Executive Secretary of the Commission on Archives and History; and Dr. J. Manning Potts, immediate past president of the Jurisdictional Historical Society. Sessions will be held at Louisburg College, with visits to the Green Hill House, one of the twelve shrines of the Church, and Whitaker's Chapel. It is hoped that many ministers and laymen from North Carolina will be able to share in this Jurisdictional meeting.

2. Since the Jurisdictional session is to be held in July, and it is hoped that all members of our Conference Commission will be able to attend, we are requesting that our spring meeting of the Commission be held February 17, 1970, at the Methodist Building

in Raleigh.

We wish to commend with thanks the General Conference Commission on Archives and History which adopted a recommendation on April 23 that historic Whitaker's Chapel, near Enfield, be declared a national historic United Methodist shrine. This chapel, which was restored and reopened in 1966, was a historic site of the former Methodist Protestant Church. The Conference Commission will work with the General Commission in planning appropriate ceremonies following the 1970 Special Session of the General Conference.

Report for 1968-1969

A. Preface

The United Methodist Church has demonstrated a concern for social justice and has taken forthright positions on controversial issues involving Christian principles. John Wesley's opposition to the slave trade and to smuggling was an early expression

of work for social justice.

To express its concern, the Church has adopted The Methodist Social Creed, (The Methodist Episcopal Church 1908) (The Methodist Episcopal Church South 1914) (The Methodist Protestant Church 1916), and the Uniting Conference of 1939 adopted a social creed. Social statements of the Church have been reviewed and revised by successive General Conference to take into account new and changing social conditions. The churches have been responding to social changes and complexities by increasing involvement in research, education and modes of action. The social creeds of both former churches (Methodist and EUB) are printed in the 1968 Book of Discipline and will be combined at an early General Conference.

Our heritage in this area of social welfare springs from the gospel, and from the labors of John Wesley, who ministered to the physical, intellectual, and social needs

of the people to whom he preached the gospel of personal redemption.

B. Principles of the United Methodist Church and Race

The principles of the church of which we are a part become the principles of this Conference. Our Lord Jesus Christ teaches that all men are brothers. His gospel makes no room for arbitrary distinctions and expressions of racial or group prejudice. His followers early came to see that "...God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him" (Acts 10:34). We rejoice that the church has erased many of the legal boundaries which previously divided the people by race.

The minimum requirements for justice in the social order include the recognition of equal rights and opportunities for all races in voting, law enforcement, education,

employment, housing, public accommodations, and cultural advantages.

C. Principles of The United Methodist Church and Peace

The Christian church must stand for the principle of unconditional love as manifested in the life and service of its Lord. Christians and the church must seek to express God's love through the incorporation of universal values in the policies of nations and the programs of international organizations. We call attention to the unique opportunities of the church as an instrument of peace, and to the special responsibilities which these opportunities imply.

The church can be a means of reconciliation and unity, since it holds forth a

supreme loyalty greater than the lesser causes for which men fight.

The church has, in the witness of Christ, the key to achieving needed change without violence. We must be aware of the dynamic factors unrelated to foreign policy that keep an arms race going on. A sense of stewardship should lead the nations to seek every reasonable opportunity to reduce the vast amounts of resources and manpower now devoted to the production of armaments. The substantial savings which can be achieved from significant reductions in arms spending could and should be used to create social and economic conditions which contribute to the maintenance of peace and justice.

D. Principles of The United Methodist Church Concerning Drugs and Alcohol

We seek to overcome those social and psychological forces which lead so large a part of our society to unhealthful dependence upon alcohol and drugs. The illicit traffic in drugs cannot be tolerated. Society must provide through public and private facilities for the treatment, rehabilitation, and after-care of narcotic addicts and other victims of drug abuse. It is our purpose to foster understanding and acceptance of the dimensions of Christian responsibility in one's decisions about alcohol and drugs and in the church's concern for the personal and social problems related to alcohol and drugs, especially the addictive and dependency disorders, and to encourage abstinence from the use of alcoholic beverages as one form of personal and social witness to God's liberating love for mankind.

E. Activities for the Past Year

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns was represented at the SeJ Conference on Christian Social Concerns, Lake Junaluska, June 30-July 3, 1968, and at the National Conference on Christian Social Concerns (CONVO '69), Washington, D. C., March 3-7, 1969.

District, Sub-district and local church meetings have been held dealing with the

issues of social concerns. Two outstanding local enterprises were:

- A section of the Alamance County Christian Workers School was devoted to issues of social concerns. Community leaders, police, court, health and welfare, and housing officials were used as resource persons. This activity was directed by Reverend W. W. Newman, District Director of the Burlington District.
- 2. A very excellent program over a period of four Sunday evenings was conducted by the Commission on Christian Social Concerns of Highland United Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C. Local and state agency personnel, as well as our Executive Director, were used as resource persons. This program was under the direction of Dr. Murray Downs, Commission Chairman.

Several mailings were made to pastors and local church chairmen, presenting issues, promoting special days, and suggestions for action at the local level.

Each supplement of the North Carolina Christian Advocate contains suggestions

for local churches as well as editorials and articles in the regular section.

The magazine "ENCAGE", a publication of the General Board of Christian Social

Concerns has been promoted.

The Executive Director participated in the UN-Washington Seminar sponsored

by the Youth Ministry of the Conference.

The Board was represented at the meeting of the State Legislative Council, of

which it is a member, in mid-November.

The Board has cooperated with the North Carolina Council of Churches in their Section on Christian Social Action. Mr. John M. Meares was chairman of the Council's legislation seminar on law and order and consumer protection, held in Raleigh February 17-18, 1969.

Your Board of Christian Social Concerns has coooperated with the Western North Carolina Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns and the North Carolina State Baptist Convention to form a coalition to deal with our common Christian social concerns.

The Board has been active in its opposition to legislation concerning liquor by the drink, capital punishment and for the legislation commonly known as the "implied consent" law.

A sermon was prepared, "A Modern Form of Human Sacrifice" by Dr. N. A. Desrosiers (dealing with alcohol problems) and mailed to all pastors, along with a statement by Bishop Cannon, Bishop Hunt, and by Dr. W. Perry Crouch, North Carolina State Baptist Convention, calling for the defeat of legislation which would permit the sale of "liquor by the drink."

The Board was active in State legislative action regarding the mandatory licensing of Day Care Centers, and in the motion to rescind action of prior legislation calling for

a Constitutional Convention to amend the United States Constitution.

During the conference year your Board and the Ceneral Board of Christian Social Concerns participated in the trial of the son of one of our ministers who, because of his conscience, asked for conscientious objector status. His request was refused and he refused to step forward to be sworn in. He was tried, and sentenced to serve 5 years in Federal prison which sentence was appealed and is still pending. The General Board contributed a substantial amount to the trial cost (your Conference Board has no funds for this purpose).

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

II. Resolutions, Recommendations, Projects for 1969-70

The United Methodist Church has demonstrated a concern for social justice and has taken forthright positions on controversial issues involving Christian principles. The purpose of this Board shall be to relate the gospel of Jesus Christ to the members of the Church and to the persons and structures of the communities and world in which they live—to effect reconciliation which God effected through Christ involving personal, social and civic righteousness. To achieve this purpose we make the following recommendations:

A. Division of General Welfare

- That district directors of Christian Social Concerns, in cooperation with the Division of General Welfare of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, hold district and/ or local seminars to explore in depth the social problems of alcoholism, addiction to other drugs, and mental health.
- 2. That the Division of General Welfare of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, in cooperation with the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, make a study of the Good Shepherd Home, Lake Waccamaw, North Carolina, to determine its effectiveness, and if the Conference should give more substantial financial support to this institution.
- That all churches observe Drug and Alcohol Sunday, November 8, 1970, with appropriate study, sermons and action.
- 4. That all churchmen continue to exert their Christian witness and influence on the legislative bodies of our country, seeking safer control and/or abolition of drug and alcohol traffic in our state and nation.

B. Division of Human Relations

Communication between the black and white segments of each local community is a potent force. It must be remembered that irresponsible tactics of extremists, black or white, are to be abhorred as the greatest barrier to good human relations. We must endorse communication rather than confontation in order to hasten the day when ecclesiastical rhetoric will coincide with historical reality. We therefore make the following recommendations:

- 1. That Race Relations Day be observed in all churches February 8, 1970, with emphasis on involvement—i.e., clergy and laity working together to seek the Christian approach to race problems.
 - a. Exchange choirs with a church of another race in your community.
 - b. Exchange pulpits with a minister of another race in your community.
- c. Have a special service for two congregations, black and white, planned together, and participated in together.
- d. Local Church Social Concerns Work Area Chairmen and other interested persons meet with similar groups representing other churches, black and white, to seek reconciliation.
- 2. That local churches hold seminars, using resource persons within the community (state and local government agency representatives, etc.) to discover problem areas and work toward solutions, and create task forces to implement action in these areas.

3. That the Annual Conference authorize the Board of Pensions to carefully consider the possibility of including certified lay workers (as defined by Chapter Three, Paragraph 501, The Book of *Discipline* of The United Methodist Church, 1968) in the Conference Pension Plan and that the Board of Pensions report its recommendations to the next Annual Conference.

4. We recommend and encourage our Methodist-related institutions to be sensitive to the increasing intensity of collegiate activism, and that they take a creative stance in re-

solving these areas of unrest.

5. That our ministers and churches make use of the Social Creed of The United Methodist Church, in order that this document become a guideline for our Christian action in the church and society.

6. That the magazines Engage, Interpreter and Christian Opinion be used as guides

in the church's program of Christian Social Concerns.

7. The continued support for the North Carolina Good Neighbor Council in its program, and continued involvement with the North Carolina Council of Churches and the Legislative Council of North Carolina.

We offer the following resolution:

DAVID S. COLTRANE - 1893-1968

The Board of Christian Social Concerns pays tribute to the memory of its beloved member, David S. Coltrane, whose death, October 31, 1968, was a loss not only to our Board, but to our state and nation. This Board honored him at the 1964 session of Annual Conference for his creative work in race relations and his service to our state. We remember him for his wise counsel, his even temper, his compassion for all the people of our state, and his elder statesmanship inspiration to younger Christians, and his determined spirit which was motivated by his Christain concern to stand firm in the acceptance of public responsibility as an expression of Christian stewardship.

Our Conference remembers with gratitude his service as chairman of the Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations which successfully brought into being the merger of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Church with the churches of the

former Central Jurisdiction lying within the bounds of the Conference.

However, we temper our tributes by remembering words written by the Right Reverend Thomas A. Fraser, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina: "Our real respect, however, will not come in our words or in memorials but in how we continue to forge ahead relentlessly and courageously to achieve better relations among all people in the spirit in which David Coltrane lived."

Therefore, we resolve to honor his memory as we ask our heavenly Father to give us the determination to make our ecclesiastical rhetoric conform to our purposeful action in bringing about the conversion of the world. As David Coltrane was eulogized in the press of the state as "the Good Neighbor," we remember that the Great Commandments

enjoin us all to be good neighbors.

C. DIVISION OF WORLD PEACE

The Christian Church must stand for the principle of unconditional love as manifested in the life and service of its Lord. The power of such love to transform persons, groups, and relationships is a testimony to the practical realism of the Christian Gospel. We call attention to the unique opportunities of the church as an instrument of peace, and to the special responsibilities which these opportunities imply. Anti-ballistic missile systems threaten to accelerate arms spending and heighten tensions dangerously without adding to the security of the nations. We emphasize that there is no real substitute for worldwide safeguarded disarmament under agreements that provide for adequate verification and enforcement.

We therefore make the following recommendations:

1. That one or more meetings be held in each Congressional district with our members of Congress to discuss national priorities (e.g., guns vs. food).

That all churches observe Peace and World Order Sunday, October 19, 1969, with

appropriate study and sermons.

3. The study of The Book of Resolutions of The United Methodist Church (1968) concerning The United Methodist Church and Peace (page 21, paragraph 7, The Individual and Military Training and Service).

4. Seminars on draft counseling be held as follows: October 20, 1969, in Chapel Hill. for the Burlington, Durham, and Raleigh Districts: October 21, 1969, in Favetteville for the Sanford, Wilmington, Fayetteville, and Goldsboro Districts; October 22, 1969, in Greenville, for the Greenville, Rocky Mount, New Bern and Elizabeth City Districts.

5. Support of and participation in the following events:

a. Sixteenth Annual World Affairs Institute, University of North Carolina, Greens-

boro, Elliott Hall, July 18, 19, 20, 1969.

b. World Order Conference, Chapel Hill, N. C., March 12, 1970.

6. The program of UNICEF to every local church and urge them to participate in the collectoin of funds for the needy children of the world.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON CONTINUING EDUCATION

RECOMMENDATIONS

The necessity and possibilities of Continuing Education has recently found dramatic recognition in a broad range of vocational disciplines. As a result, programs of continuing education have been burgeoning among a wide variety of institutions and groups. Educational institutions, professional associations, industries, and communications media have developed their individual programs aimed at continually enlarging the informa-

tion, understandings and skills of persons in particular fields of endeavor.

Your own Commission on Continuing Education has sponsored two multiple district clinics on Rethinking the Ministry which featured Carlyle Marney of Interpreter's House.

These clinics attracted a wide attendance from pastors of the conference.

During the year, an awareness of the number of continued education programs in North Carolina and the need for relating the ministers of our state to the interests and resources of the Duke Divinity School and the Duke Endowment, as well as to those of the two United Methodist Conferences, has prompted the convening of a Consultation on Continuing Education in Durham on May 6 and 7. The purpose of the Consultation is to effectively coordinate the continuing education efforts of the two annual conferences, the Duke Endowment and the Divinity School in order to achieve the maximum effectiveness in our total continuing education program. Further, the purpose of the consultation is to initiate a cooperative program for the identification of significant continuing education programs sponsored by other groups in which our ministers may participate.

To the end that the ministry of our Conference members may be enriched through opportunities in continuing education, we recommend that the conference approve and

endorse the following:

1. The development of a cooperative program of continuing education in cooperation with the Western North Carolina Conference, the Duke Endowment, the Duke Divinity School, Methodist colleges in North Carolina, and other agencies.

2. The continued identification of programs of continuing education by other agencies, particularly those in our general area, and assistance to our pastors in becoming enrolled

in such endeavors.

3. The implementation of the provisions of Par. 355 of the 1968 Discipline which outlines a plan of leaves of absence for the pastor from his charge for the purpose of con-

tinuing education.

4. The cultivation in our local churches of a warm support for programs by which the needs of the parish are provided for during periods when the pastor shall be engaged in continuing education. Also, we recommend budgetary provision by the local church to assist in the cost to the pastor of continuing education.

5. The development by the Commission on Continuing Education under the direction

of the Program Council of programs of continuing education on the district level.

RESOLUTION

We recommend that:

I. The North Carolina Annual Conference co-operate with the Western North Carolina Annual Conference and the Duke Divinity School to form "The North Carolina" United Methodists' Commission on Continuing Education for Ministers.'

II. The commission be composed of:

- A. Ten representing the two Annual Conferences, five from each as follows:
- 1) Two from the Board of Ministry.
- 2) Three at large, selected, in co-operation with the Bishops, by the Annual Conference Committee on Continuing Education, at least one of whom shall be a lavman.
- B. Three representing Christian Higher Education
- 1) One from colleges in the N. C. Conference. 2) One from colleges in the W. N. C. Conference.
- 3) One from the Duke Divinity School. C. One representative from The Duke Endowment
- D. Five ex-officio members.
- The presiding Bishops
 Program Council Directors
- 3) The Dean of the Duke Divinity School
- Total 19
- III. This Commission be charged with the responsibility of:
- A. Determining the needs of ministers through study and research, and developing and executing such programs of continuing education as will meet the stated needs.
- B. Correlating the programs and proposals of the N. C. and the W. N. C. Conferences and the Duke Divinity School.
- C. Utilizing the resources available within the two Annual Conferences, the Methodists colleges, and the Duke Divinity School.
 - D. Securing financial resources.
 - E. Developing a plan to provide employed personnel to carry out the program.
 - IV. The Commission begin to function immediately after the Annual Conferences. Adopted Paul Carruth

RESOLUTION

In keeping with the recommended procedure of the Discipline we recommend:

- A. That the responsibility for continuing education for ministers be assigned specifically to a subcommittee of the Board of the Ministry to be known as "The Committee on Continuing Education for Ministers."
- B. That the Committee be composed of the following:
 - I. Five representatives of the Conference Board of Ministry.
 - 2. One representative of the Conference Board of Education.
 - 3. One representative of the Conference Board of Evangelism.
 - 4. Two representatives of the Conference Board of Missions, one of whom shall be a representative of the Church and Community Committee.
 - 5. One representative of the Conference Commission on Christian Social Concerns.
 - 6. One representative of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastor's School.

 - One representative of the Duke Divinity School.
 One representative from each Methodist College within the Annual Conference.
 - 9. Director of Continuing Education, Duke Divinity School.
 - 10. Program Council Director.
 - 11. Three at large members appointed by the Bishop.
- C. That the Committee be responsible for developing the Annual Conference programs of Continuing Education in the context of the general program developed by the

North Carolina United Methodist Commission on Continuing Education.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

I

The Commission on Ecumenical Affairs was authorized at the Annual Conference

session in 1967 and formally organized December 7 that year.

During the Conference year just ending, there have been two meetings of the full Commission and two additional meetings of the Executive Committee. Special committees have also met.

The Commission has appointed 27 representatives to the North Carolina Council of Churches, a number of whom attended the Annual session of that body held re-

cently at Rocky Mount.

The Commission sponsored a workshop as a training session for members of the Commission on August 28-29, 1968, at North Carolina Wesleyan College, with 30 present. Speakers were Dr. Robert W. Huston, General Secretary of the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs of the United Methodist Church; Dr. Thomas A. Collins, vice president of the commission; Dr. Samuel Wiley, executive director of the North Carolina Council of Churches. Mrs. E. L. Hillman, vice president in charge of study, was in charge of the program.

Four members of the Commission attended a three-day symposium on "Methodism's Destiny in an Ecumenical Age" held last September at Delaware, Ohio, including the Reverend Ed Armstrong, Mrs. E. L. Hillman, Mrs. R. L. Jerome and the Reverend Vernon Tyson. An additional member, the Reverend Jack Crum, and Mrs. Crum also

attended.

During the year three special committees have been working. They are as follows:

- 1. A committee to study the National and World Council of Churches and to suggest ways of providing accurate information about these two ecumenical bodies. This committee was headed by the Reverend Paul Carruth, and its recommendations are found in the Report of the commission on pages 13 and 14 in the 1969 Book of Recommendations.
- 2. A committee to work with the program committees of the Conference Women's Society of Christian Service and the Board of the Laity in providing an ecumenical theme for their programs in 1970. This committee was headed by Henry Goodwin, and its recommendations are also found in our report in the 1969 Book of Recommendations.
- 3. A committee to provide the Commission's program at Annual Conference, headed by Dr. Thomas A. Collins.

One of the features sponsored by the Commission is the Ecumenical Breakfast. This was held last year and is planned again this year with Bishop Vincent S. Waters,

Catholic Bishop of Raleigh, as speaker.

The Commission seeks to strengthen the ties of our Conference with the North Carolina Council of Churches, with the National and World Council of Churches, with the Consultation on Church Union, of which the United Methodist Church is a member, as well as with the ecumenical movement generally. Unfortunately, our financial resources are very limited and many areas of ecumenical concern are neglected. We have to rely upon pastors and laymen to put into action the spirit of ecumenism in their communities. The Commission is grateful for the leadership Bishop Cannon is giving in the field of ecumenical relations.

Members of the Commission are interested and have given of their time generously to promote the work of the Commission. Many members have paid their own way to meetings and one member has provided a substantial gift toward the expenses of

the delegates to the Delaware, Ohio, symposium.

The Commission on Ecumenical Affairs recommends the following for the year 1969-70:

- 1. That members of the Commission should be prepared to serve as resource persons in each district and be able to provide information in the area of ecumenical affairs.
- That pastors and laymen secure factual materials that will enable them to combat some of the false and derogatory criticisms of the National and World Councils of Churches.
- 3. That pastors and laymen use materials provided for them in the Methodist Building in Raleigh. Audio visual materials will be placed in the Walton Memorial Audiovisual Library and reading materials in the Board of Education Library.
- 4. That the Board of the Laity, at its annual lay rallies, and the Women's Societies of Christian Service, at their annual meetings, adopt an ecumenical theme in 1970.
- 5. That a display from the Commission should include materials on the National and World Councils of Churches at Annual Conference.
- 6. That an ecumenical breakfast be held with efforts made to draw in representatives from churches of COCU and the Roman Catholic Church at Annual Conference.

- That a national figure who has been close to the conciliar movement be invited to speak at the Annual Conference in 1970.
- 8. That the following observances be held in all churches in 1970: the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, January 17-24; COCU Sunday, April 19.
- 9. That representatives from boards and agencies that have a particular interest in the commencial movement be represented on the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs in order to promote jointly and strengthen the work of the ecumenical movement.

There are three from the North Carolina Conference who are affiliated with the National Council of Churches: Dr. Cecil Robbins and Bill Price are members of the General

Board and Nelson Gibson is a delegate to the General Assembly.

SECTION A

Committee on General Church School Ministry

CHRISTIAN WHITE, Chairman

I. Report for 1968-1969

- A. Methodist Curriculum Resources. With the introduction of the new Youth Curriculum Resources in the fall of 1968, we now have a complete life-span curriculum based on Biblical, theological, psychological and education foundations evolving from years of research. While not all of our local churches are using our United Methodist Curriculum Resources, we are pleased with the way these resources have been received and are being used by most of our churches. A recent check revealed the fact that during the fall quarter of 1968 63 of our 825 churches failed to order our United Methodist Curriculum Resources, 198 churches ordered only part of these resources, 43 ordered no adult resources, 154 ordered no youth resources and 48 ordered no children's resources. The new adult Christian Faith and Life Series will be introduced this fall. These materials provide a variety of study opportunities and should be used by all of our churches.
- B. Structure of The United Methodist Church. With the formation of The United Methodist Church, we have been trying to understand the opportunities and limits which are part of the new structure. We are also learning how this structure applies at the local church level and are making an effort to provide the leadership training needed to help local churches make the transition.
- A team of five persons from our Conference participated in a special course on "The Educational Ministries of The Local Church in the United Methodist Church" during the first week of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Leadership School at Lake Junaluska in August, 1968.
- 2. In September, 1968, seventy-nine persons from local churches participated in a weekend Workshop on "Developing Your Educational Ministry" at Methodist College. Two staff members of our General Board of Education, Rev. J. Irvin McDonough and Miss LaDonna Bogardus, assisted our Conference Board of Education staff in this meaningful training experience.
- 3. A Workshop on the "Local Church Council on Ministries" and an "Orientation and Planning Session" for the age level and general church school committees of our Board were held at Camp Chestnut Ridge October 10-11, 1968 and March 11-12, 1969 respectively.
- 4. A team of six persons represented our Conference Board of Education in a six day Regional Meeting on "Training Consultant Teams for Designing Age Level and Family Ministries" at Lambuth Inn, Lake Junaluska, in February, 1969.
- C. Christian Workers' Schools. Eleven Christian Workers' Schools were held this past year in the following places: Alamance County (Burlington), Greenville, Fayetteville,

Raleigh (2 sessions), New Bern, Snow Hill, Chowan-Perquimans (Hertford), Belhaven, Louisburg, East Carteret Group Ministry (Straits), and Laurinburg. These schools enrolled 616 persons and included three laboratory courses. The School of Christian Missions held at Methodist College involved 185 persons.

D. Laboratory Training Enterprises

- A Regional Junior High Confirmation Laboratory and Seminar to prepare leaders for conducting training sessions for pastors for Junior High Youth was held at Hayes Barton Church, Raleigh, January 5-9, 1969, with nine persons from our Conference participating.
- 2. Three additional Laboratory Courses in three separate locations enrolled twenty-four "leaders-in-training" in the Youth and Children's Divisions.

E. Additional Leadership Training Enterprises

- 1. Eleven persons participated in a Coaching Conference for the certification of instructors for new youth ministry courses led by Rev. George Yetter of Knoxvlle, Tennessee, at Camp Chestnut Ridge, in December, 1968.
- Many persons from our Conference participated in the Southeastern Jurisdiction Leadership and Laboratory Schools, Church School Administrators Workshop and Institute of Church Music at Lake Junaluska in August, 1969.
- F. Local Church Consultations: The Conference and District Christian Education Staff and other resource leaders conducted numerous consultations in local churches to help them develop a more meaningful education ministry.

II. Recommendations for 1969-1970

A. LEADERSHIP TRAINING

- 1. Christian Workers' School.
- a. There has been a noticeable decrease in enrollment in Christian Workers' Schools in some areas while it remains good in others. We urge local pastors and Boards of Managers to give support and good promotion to these training enterprises.
- b. We recommend that Boards of Managers of Christian Workers' Schools seek new ways of training and scheduling and take advantage of all helping agencies such as community colleges and technical institutes. These schools will set up training in almost any area of work where 15 or more persons can be enlisted. We see real advantages in courses in leadership development, interpersonal sensitivity training, etc., being carried on in these schools on an ecumenical basis.
- c. We recommend that the Board of Managers in each school include courses on the Ministry and Mission of the Church.
- d. We recommend that the Board of Education not provide an instructor unless at least six persons be pre-enrolled in a course at least ten days before the opening of the school or course.
- 2. We recommend that the Board of Education cooperate with the Conference Program Council in setting a three-day training enterprise for District Program Councils in early September, 1969, to help them understand the role of the District Program Council, to assist them in developing consultative skills for aiding local church Councils on Ministries in planning their own Ministry and Mission, and to enable them in designing a series of worshops within the districts to train local church Councils on Ministries for their work.

An alternative plan would be to select and train conference teams for these same purposes.

- 3. We recommend that a Coaching Conference for the certification of instructors of leadership courses for workers in the Children's and Adult Divisions be held January 12-15. 1970.
- 4. The General Board of Education in re-evaluating its ministry feels that it should train coaching conference leaders in the Annual Conference who will in turn train the instructors, etc., in that Conference. In the light of this thinking, we recommend a training session for Coaching Conference leaders for the North Carolina Conference in cooperation with the Western North Carolina and the Virginia Annual Conferences in the fall of 1970.

5. We recommend that the Conference Program Council take steps to initiate a joint enterprise with the Western North Carolina and Virginia Conferences for a Laboratory on "Interpersonal Sensitivity Training" for Program Council staffs and other selected conference leaders in January 1970.

6. We recommend that the efforts of the Boards of Education and Evangelism in their efforts to train pastors in use of the new Junior High Confirmation materials be continued. We recommend that Labs for pastors be set up in selected areas of the Conference and extended over several years in order that all pastors might have the opportunity

to participate in one.

7. We call attention to the fact that resource persons are available to assist local churches in leadership and development, and that one-teacher schools can be provided for a church or group of churches.

B. SPECIAL DAYS

We urge each local church to observe the following special days and that they take the special offerings called for after explaining the purpose and importance of each.

- 1. Promotion Day in the Church School, August 31, 1969 (no special offering).
- Christian Education Sunday, September 28, 1969 (included in "Single Figure Asking.")

3. Student Recognition Day, December 28, 1969 (no special offering).

4. Race Relations Sunday, February 8, 1970. Special offering for Paine College, Augusta, Ga. (not included in "Single Figure Asking").

5. National Family Week, May 10-17, 1970.

- 6. Methodist Student Day, June 14, 1970. Special offering for Methodist Student Loan and Scholarship Fund (not included in "Single Figure Asking").
 - 7. World Service Sunday in the church school each fourth Sunday.

C. NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

We encourage the local church to inform its members about the information and resources for ministry to be found in the *Advocate* and to promote subscriptions for it. We see a special need being fulfilled by the monthly program supplement.

D. GROUP MINISTRIES

We recommend that the Conference Program Council look into the possibilities of developing group ministries in order to use our trained men more advantageously and cooperate to strengthen their common ministry in a geographical area. This could help with the shortage of ministers and the training of new ones.

SECTION B

Committee on Children's Ministry

E. CLIFFORD SHOAF, Chairman

I. Report on 1968-1969 Program

- 1. Vacation Church School Institutes were held in April, 1969, in all the Districts. The committee developed plans, provided resources and training for the District Directors who conducted the Intitutes in their area. Total attendance was about 800, under the guidance of nearly 100 planners.
- 2. Through our District Directors we participated in the Fall Mission Study Conferences to train for Mission Study Programs in the local church.
- 3. A new search for well trained workers with children was begun in the Districts and local churches. These persons will be trained to teach in Workers Schools, Laboratory Schools, and as local church consultants,
- 4. Two coaching sessions with District Directors were held in connection with committee meetings. These sessions provided them with resources and processes to do the children's work in their districts.
- 5. Consultations and training sessions have been held by the District Directors with local church teachers of children. These were held upon request of the pastor and local teachers.

- 6. Shared with the Camp Committee in making plans for the Camp for Mentally Retarded.
- 7. Consulted with persons and agencies from Lumberton and Raeford on the problems and programs for handicapped children.

II. Recommendations

- 1. That local churches be stimulated to expand the ingredients of their ministry with children beyond the mere Sunday school sessions. Our knowledge of child growth indicates a need to focus the whole church on the task of developing the whole child as a person being molded by his whole cultural environment. To initiate this concern, we recommend a series of District Christian Education Conferences for local workers with children be conducted in the winter of 1970.
- 2. To secure increased use of summer and vacation time programs with children, we recommend that:

a. The Conference and area local churches develop a program specifically de-

signed to minister to children and families at vacation and resort areas.

- b. Local churches be encouraged to provide a wide variety of enrichment programs for children during the summer months, such as day camps, arts and crafts groups, drama and music, story hour for pre-schoolers, and other offerings related to local interacts
- 3. That leadership development and training children's workers be given greater effort by the Conference Board of Education. We especially commend the following enterprises as initial undertakings in this direction:

a. Use the Coaching Conference planned for January 12-14, 1970, to prepare

training personel for children's workers.

- b. That district directors undertake a campaign to identify and recruit five persons in their district who possess the potential skills and attitudes to become strong and able trainers of children's workers, and that these candidates be invited to attend the Coaching Conference and otherwise encouraged to prepare themselves for training and consultative service.
- 4. That a series of conference-wide workshops be held in August and September, 1970, to help local church teachers of children review their progress and problems in the use of the children's curriculum.
- 5. That our Conference Board of Education seriously resolve to study ways of initiating and supporting week-day religious education programs in our local communities as a means of enlarging the amount and quality of religious instructional time made available to children. That steps be taken this year to introduce and interpret the new week-day curriculum resources that are becoming available in the summer of 1969.
- 6. In the area of our work with children of special need, handicapped and retarded, we recommend that we continue our exploration of work with blind children, continue our camp for mentally retarded, distribute information about the new curriculum for use in local communities with mentally retardates, encourage the development of religious classes for children of special need in local communities, recruit more professional people in our religious work with these children, and cooperate more closely with other agencies involved with these children.
- 7. We recommned the continuation of Vacation Church School Institutes as our best means of training workers for summer vacation church schools, and request that the Conference Program Council reserve the month of April, 1970. for scheduling these workshops in the various districts.
- 8. We recommend that the staff arrangement which provides us the services of Keith Clover be continued. The Children's Committee needs the kind of counsel, advice and re-

sources he has given it this year.

SECTION C

Committee on Youth Ministry

SAMUEL D. McMILLAN, JR., Chairman

I. Report on 1968-1969

A variety of opportunities in youth ministry were offered the youth of the Conference during the past year. The following ministries were available (the number in

attendance is listed beside each one): Appalachian Trail Hike (13), Senior Camp (36), Senior High Workshop at North Carolina Wesleyan College (241), Annual Conference Session at Methodist College (463), Sub-district Workshop at Methodist College (38), United Nations-Washington Study Tour (38), Explore (34), and Junior High Camping (615). A total of 1478 persons participated, an increase of eight per cent over the previous year.

This year's summer opportunities include Camping for Junior Highs and Senior Highs, a Canoe Trip, a Senior High Workcamp with Mentally Retarded Youth, Subdistrict Workshop, Junior High Workshop, Senior High Workshop, and A.C.S.

The report on leadership education includes fourteen courses in Christian Workers' Schools, 208 were enrolled in these courses with 140 being eligible for full credit. In addition, three labs provided training for 33 leaders in training (adults) and 51 youth. One of these experiences was a lab/seminar held on "Confirmation" in conjunction with the Western North Carolina Conference and the Virginia Conference.

In other training opportunities, two persons from our Conference attended a regional training conference at Montgomery Bell State Park, Tennessee, on The Informal Group, and eleven persons received certification after a Coaching Conference on the courses "Person to Person" and "Using Resources in the Church's Educational Ministry with Youth."

Enrollment in the Youth Division decreased four per cent to 27,140 in 1967-1968.

The Committee on Youth Ministry wants to record its deep sense of appreciation for the outstanding service rendered the youth of our conference by the Rev. J. Conrad Glass, Jr., who served faithfully and creatively as the Conference Director of Youth Ministry for the eight year period 1960-1968.

II. Recommendations for 1969-1970

A. Conference-wide Ministries

1. That the Council on Youth Ministry consider the possibility of sponsoring the weeklong canoe trip again.

2. That the Council on Youth Ministry consider the possibility of a work camp providing a service opportunity, such as a migrant work camp or a work camp with mentally retarded youth.

3. That the Council on Youth Ministry consider the possibility of having another subdistrict workshop.

4. That the Council on Youth Ministry consider offering senior high workshop in the early summer and including Bible study groups as part of the program.

5. That the Council on Youth Ministry consider offering the junior high workshop again.

6. That junior high and senior high camping opportunities be offered during the summer.

7. That the Council on Youth Ministry consider whether or not larger churches are adequately represented at the Annual Conference session of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship (A.C.S.) with just one delegate.

 That the United Nations-Washington Study Tour be offered March 14-20, 1970, with an effort made to increase the number of participants, perhaps by offering two such study tours.

9. That the Council on Youth Ministry consider the possibility of sponsoring a weekend Recreation Lab.

10. That the Council on Youth Ministry offer the Explore weekend in cooperation with the Commission on Enlishment for Church Occupations.

11. That there be (in cooperation with the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations) a program of enlistment of youth for church-related vocations, especially the pastoral ministry.

12. That a scholarship/campership fund be established to provide opportunities for economically deprived youth to attend summer opportunities in youth ministry.

13. That informal group training centers be formed to equip youth and adults for the informal group ministry in local churches.

14. That the Council on Youth Ministry consider possibilities of sensitivity training for themselves.

15. That the Council on Youth Ministry consider the possibilities of a senior high Arts Weekend in New York City in the fall of 1970.

16. That training in the use of audio-visuals be offered for workers with children, vouth, and adults.

17. That a clarification be made of the relationships of the Council on Youth Ministry. the Committee on Youth Ministry, the Board of Education, and the Program Council.

B. LOCAL CHURCH MINISTRIES

1. That a youth or youth/adult mission study be conducted in each local church on "China" or "Reconciliation in a Broken World,"

2. That there be a continuation of the specialized ministries with youth in resort areas and that exploration be made of possible additional areas for these ministries.

3. That local churches include an item in their budgets for leadership education for both youth leaders and adult workers with youth.

C. ECUMENICAL MINISTRIES

1. That persons involved in youth ministry be open to possibilities for approaches to ministry which can be interdenominatinoal in nature.

2. That explorations be made into the possibilities for an ecumenical experience or experiences designed to break down racial and denominational barriers among youth.

D. PERSONNEL

That F. Belton Joyner, Jr. be reappointed Conference Coordinator of Youth Ministry. He has brought devotion, skill, flexibility, and a sense of humor to the youth ministry of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

SECTION D

Committee on Adult and Family Life Ministry

R. T. COMMANDER, Chairman

I. Report for 1968-1969

A. Adult and Family Life Curriculum

Reports indicate that approximately fifty percent of our churches have one or more adult groups using the Foundation Studies. Some new groups and a few ongoing groups are picking up this series. Any group may pick up this study at any time, and it is hoped that all Methodists at some time in the near future will have had this study

opportunity.

We are hopeful that many groups will enter into the new series "Christian Faith In Life", which is now available for study, and is scheduled for general study beginning in September. This series will emphasize the personal dimensions of the crisis experiences of life; those situations in which the person "grows up or folds up", which almost every person can identify in his own life.

A great deal of interest is being shown in Family Life education, using The Christian Home and curriculum that is developed by the local Council on Ministries.

The Adult Bible Studies continues to be most popular study in adult groups

B. Evaluations and Reflections

Reports from the Publishing House indicate that 63 churches in our Conference are not ordering standard Methodist curriculum materials, and 43 are not ordering adult materials but are ordering some other material. We need to evaluate our educational objectives to determine if we are making the best effort possible in this area.

Reports to the Conference Secretary continue to show a decline in enrollment in adult groups. We report this, not for our concern for numbers, but our concern that

a better job in adult education must be made if we are to reach more people.

The responsibility rests in the local church for the development and execution of its local program. Your Conference Board seeks to be of service whenever and wherever it is called onto assist in the development of program or leadership.

C. Activities during 1968-1969

In preparation to improve leadership development, the coordinator of Adult and Family Life Ministry attended leadership School, a week end conference on Develop-

ing Your Educational Ministry, and a conference on consultation at Lake Junaluska this

We helped plan and participated in a Conference Workshop on Developing Your Educational Ministry, held at Methodist College, Fayetteville. Eighty-five persons participated in this Workshop.

Family Camp at Camp Don-Lee was attended by eighty-three adults and children. A survey was conducted to discover adult teacher/leaders who might help in improving the adult learning process in local churches. The resources of the Community Colleges and Technical Institutes have been enlisted as an agency to help develop leadership for local churches.

Many local churches have been visited where programs on leadership development

and the Council on Ministries were presented.

Several mailings of guidance materials have been made during the year.

II. Resolutions, Recommendations, Projections for 1969-1970

Seasoned travelers, as well as beginners, know that the journey toward any desired destination begins with knowing where they are starting from and where they want to go. Likewise, persons charged with the responsibility for adult and family life ministry must take account of the existing needs, feelings, understandings, opinions, attitudes, and resources of the adults and families of their congregation in order to define their goals, plan

their strategy, and move toward their destination.

Important as their native endowments are, leaders have to learn how to do their work wisely and well if they are to be as effective as they can be. An adequate development of leadership should include orientation, understanding and motivation for the life and work of the church and its component processes, organizations and functions. Next, the leaders should be enabled to understand their own roles and responsibilities and trained to function with effectiveness in the positions of leadership to which the church has assiged them. Finally, the competencies of the leaders as communicators and educators should be developed through training in the processes of communication and in the use of learning resources. To this end we make the following recommendations.

A. ADULT MINISTRIES

1. We recommend that the Board of Managers of Christian Workers Schools make a concerted effort to include the basic adult leadership education courses such as Understanding Adults; Adult Learning in a Changing World; Training Adult Groups in the Church, and Adult Lab classes in areas where at least two of the above courses have been taught recently.

2. We recommend a series of weekend training opportunities, Friday evening through Saturday afternoon, be held at Conference camp sites, to train teachers and leaders of adults communication skills. The following dates are proposed: Camp Chestnut Ridge, October 17-18, 1969; November 14-15, 1969; Camp Don-Lee, October 24-25, 1969. Other groups will be scheduled if there is a demand for this type of training.

3. We recommend local and cluster groups of local churches plan weekend (Friday through Sunday afternoon) leadership training enterprises for adult leaders. The Con-

ference Board of Education will assist in these enterprises on request.

4. We commend the Department of Community Colleges, North Carolina State Board of Education, for opening up opportunities for leadership training by community colleges and technical institutes. Church leaders are urged to contact the institutions nearest them or consult with the Conference Board of Education about establishing leadership courses at this level.

5. We recommend local churches establish continuous training opportunities in the local church for training in leadership and communicative skills, to develop leaders at

the local level.

B. ADULT CURRICULUM RESOURCES

In The United Methodist Church, curriculum materials are the result of thinking, planning, and writing by many persons. The result is an array of curriculum resources that are thoroughly United Methodist, constantly Biblical, directly related to concerns of persons, and immediately practical. One hundred six churches in the North Carolina Conference were reported in a recent survey as not ordering Methodist literature for adults. This is a matter of great concern. Therefore, we recommend that all ministers in churches using non-Methodist materials evaluate the materials being used in the light of

the objective of Christian education of The United Methodist Church, with a view to strengthening the educational program of the church by the use of materials produced by our denomination.

C. FAMILY LIFE MINISTRIES

- 1. We recommend that a series of district meetings be held for ministers dealing with pre-marital counseling, these meetings to be in cooperation with the Conference Committee on the Continuing Education of Ministers.
- 2. We recommend that study groups be set up in each local church to discover the needs of constituent families and plan programs at the local level to enhance the Christian life in the community at the family level.

3. We recommend:

a. That a committee composed of members of the Committee on Television, Radio and Film Communication and the Committee on Adult and Family Life Ministry be established to investigate and provide a TV Guide for guidance in television viewing as a service to the homes of our church, this "Guide" information to become a regular feature of the North Carolina Chirstian Advocate.

b. That this committee investigate the possibilities of scheduling series of films to be shown on the TV stations covering our Conference, which would be entertaining and

instructive in family ministry.

- 4. We recommend the facilities of the community colleges as a source for training in Family Life.
- 5. We recommend that the Family Camp at Camp Don-Lee and the Family Tent-Trailer Camp at Camp Kerr Lake be continued.
- 6. We commend the services of Mr. John M. Meares as our Conference Director of Adult and Family Ministries and recommend that his most capable leadership be continned.

SECTION E

Committee on Christian Educators and Music Ministry

A. Report for 1968-1969

Persons employed by the local churches of our conference as full-time workers in Christian education perform a vital function in the total ministry of the church. Directors and Ministers of Education and Educational Assistants are responsible for guiding local congregations in the design and fulfillment of an effective program of Christian nurture for all ages. They are also actively involved in conference, district and sub-district responsibilities. Their services are shared with others as directors contribute time and talent to inter-denominational and community needs.

D. Recommendations

In order to further strengthen the work of the minister, director and educational assistant, the committee makes the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that the North Carolina Annual Conference extend its present group hospitalization program now being provided for ministers of the Conference, on the same basis to full-time ministers and directors of Christian Education and educational assistants serving churches in the North Carolina Annual Conference, and that this coverage be made effective at the June, 1970 Annual Conference session.

2. We recommend that local churches employing lay workers, including directors of Christian Education and educational assistants, include them in the retirement plan of the Lay Employee Pension Fund (paragraph 1377.12, 1968 Book of Discipline of The

United Methodist Church.)

3. We recommend that the Annual Conference Board of Pensions carefully consider the possibility of including "certified lay workers," as redefined in Chapter three, Paragraph 501 of the 1968 Book of *Discipline* of The United Methodist Church, in the Conference Pension Plan, and to report its recommendations to the 1970 Annual Conference.

4. We recommend that the Sub-committee on Christian Educators be authorized to prepare suggested guidelines for consideration by local churches in employing directors

of Christian education and educational assistants.

5. We recommend that the North Carolina Fellowship of Directors of Christian education determine the extent and interest in further training by educational assistants and that the Conference Board of Education, on the basis of these findings, request the Duke Divinity School to provide summer courses of study leading toward certification as associates in Christian education in The United Methodist Church.

6. We recommend that local churches employing educational assistants consider the possibility of providing time and financial assistance for their participation in the fourvear summer course of study (two weeks each summer) leading to certification as associate in Christian education, now being offered at several of our seminaries.

7. We recommend that local churches employing full-time workers in Christian education provide time and financial assistance to enable them to attend short-term leadership training enterprises designed to further train them for their ministry, and that the Conference Director of Education inform these churches concerning these opportunities.

II. Music Ministry Section, Charles W. Moore, Chairman

A. Report for 1968-1969

Conference-wide Ministries

a. A conference-wide Church Music Workshop was held at East Carolina University in Greenville on November 2, 1968. Emphasis was given to Music in the Christian Wedding, Music and the Service of Worship, and an Anthem Reading Session.

Thirty-eight persons attended this Workshop.

b. On February 22, 1969, a second conference-wide Church Music Workshop was held at Methodist College in Fayetteville. Seventy-five persons took part, Emphasis was given to the Music in Services of Worship and an Anthem Reading Session. There were special study groups on the trained Choir, the Untrained Choir, and the Organist/ Pianist.

2. Local Church Ministries

a. Local churches were asked to participate in the Great Day of Methodist Singing on October 20, 1968, or some convenient date. A mailing was sent to each pastor with suggestions for this special day.

b. There have been articles on Music Ministry in the supplement in the North Carolina Christian Advocate. These have been aimed at the local church musician. A number of inquiries in response to these articles suggests that they have been helpful.

c. Our mailing list of local church musicians is more nearly complete after a

letter was sent to the pastors of churches for whom we had no "contact.

d. Several of the District Directors of Music Ministry report that they have worked with local churches in planning music ministry, in developing new choirs, and in providing musical resources.

SECTION F

Committee on Camps and Conferences

W. WARREN BISHOP, Chairman

I. Report for 1968-1969

A. Conference Camps Crusade

The Camps Crusade continues to meet with success! Our initial goal of \$300,000 for improving and enlarging our four camps will be reached when current pledges have been paid. As of May 31, 1969, \$130,467.29 has been paid on pledges totaling \$329,571.82

The appreciation of the Committee on Camps and Conferences of the Board of Education is extended to all those who have supported this much needed program. It is the intent of the Camp Committee to be faithful to its responsibility to build, renovate, and maintain these facilities in a way complimentary to our Conference.

B. Summer Camping Program

During the past year our resident camping program showed a slight increase over the previous year. Programs and experiences in the out-of-doors involved 1550 children, youth, and adults. Not all camp weeks were filled to capacity, but a number of applicants were unable to attend because specific weeks at specific camps were filled. Camper weeks by camps were as follows during the summer of 1968: Camp Chestnut Ridge 375, Camp Don-Lee 967, and Camp Rockfish 221.

Special emphases in our resident summer program were the Camp for Mentally Retarded, the Sunfish Sailing Camp, Family Camp and our co-operation with the Kiwanis Club of Fayetteville in a camp for underprivileged children. These have become a part of our summer program and have shown the interest of our committee

in ministering to various groups and also those with special needs.

Two aspects of the resident program that are providing invaluable meaning to young people are those college and university students being involved in the camping ministry, and the high school students serving as counselors-in-training. The 60 counselors serving in the 1969 program come from 19 different colleges in North Carolina and 3 others from other states. Their interest, their dedication, and their service, is to be highly commended as they seek to minister to children and youth, and to come to deeper understanding in their own lives. Our camping ministry could not continue without them.

The Counselor-in-training program involves high school students and graduates working with trained and experienced counselors in an on-the-job training experience. This provides rich learning experiences, and helps in future counselor recruitment. Both

of these experiences are proving their merit in our camping ministry.

C. Retreats, Day and Picnic Groups.

A year round program and use of facilities is also provided at our camps. In 1968 a total of 4970 children, youth, and adults spent time in one of the camps, either in picnic or day groups, or in retreats for planning, spiritual enrichment, or fellowship. By camps these figures are: Camp Chestnut Ridge 2634; Camp Don-Lee 1257; Camp Rockfish 752; Camp Kerr Lake 327. Application for use of these facilities is made to the Board of Education office in Raleigh.

D. Improvements in Facilities.

During the past year progress has been made in the improvement and development of our facilities. Camp Kerr Lake has been re-master planned and the plan submitted to the Kerr Lake Reservoir Commission. Its approval has been given to these plans. Detailed plans have also been drawn for the bathhouse at Camp Kerr Lake and construction is expected on this facility this summer by the Englewood United Methodist Church of Rocky Mount. We are most grateful for this generous contribution of time and resources by this church for this most needed facility at Camp Kerr Lake.

The Staff House at Camp Chestnut Ridge is being completed for use this summer, largely through the contribution of Front Street United Methodist Church, Burlington. Through their generous contribution additional facilities for retreat groups and for summer staff personnel will be available, and will enhance the program greatly. We

appreciate their support in this project.

Other work in repairs and renovations have been completed at all four camps. Several groups have donated their time and energy in work camps. Our maintenance personnel have also worked toward getting camps ready for the 1969 season.

Projections for 1969-1970

A. SPECIAL EMPHASES IN CAMPING MINISTRY

Special emphases in the camping ministry for 1969-70 include:

1. A senior high work camp with mentally retarded teen-agers at Camp Chestnut Ridge July 13-19. A number of senior high youth will be camping and involving themselves in a ministry with disadvantaged teen-agers. This is a new and unique ministry with youth that should prove exciting and meaningful.

2. An adventure, exploration, and discovery trip by canoe is planned on Kerr Lake, Gaston Lake, and the Roanoke River June 22-27. This experience is replacing the trail hike of former years and was planned by the youth in search for a new form of activity and search for meaning.

B. EXPANDED PROGRAMS

Our resident program has been expanded in several areas, notably in extending some camp sessions into two-week periods. An additional sunfish sailing camp is planned, this being a four-week camping experience for junior highs. The 1969 schedule will also include the camp for mentally retarded children at Camp Don-Lee, the Kiwanis Club camp for underprivileged at Camp Rockfish, family camp and our one-week camps for elementary boys and girls, junior highs, and senior highs.

Extended canoe trips are planned at Rockfish. The addition of six canoes at Camp Rockfish will make possible more extensive canoe trips on the Cape Fear and Lumber

Rivers. A new outpost area is also being established at Rockfish.

C. COUNSELORS

We are grateful for the interest and enthusiasm of our college students who are employed in our summer program. It is our hope to be able to explore other areas of service for the large number of college students, mostly women, who apply for work in our summer ministry. We still need more men applying for counseling positions. With other agencies of the church, we hope to find and enlist these persons in meaningful experiences for them and for those with whom they could work.

We also plan to expand our Counselor-in-training program, realizing this provides a

future counselor with understanding, training, and experience.

D. PRIORITIES FOR DEVELOPING FACILITIES

Priorities for the renovation and development of our camp facilities have been established and will be undertaken as rapidly as funds become available. Following is a list of some of the most pressing needs.

Camp Chestnut Ridge:

a. Completion of winterized staff lodge and retreat center.

b. Construct two additional winterized cabins.

c. Construct winterized dining hall-assembly building. (Additional development as funds are available).

2. Camp Don-Lee:

a. Complete first phase of beach rehabilitation project.

Renovate existing buildings.

- c. Construct addition to staff house.
- d. Construct four winterized cabins. (Additional development as funds are available).

3. Camp Rockfish:

- a. Retire debt on present facilities.
- b. Construct staff lodge.
- c. Construct two additional cabins.
- d. Develop day use area.
- e. Construct swimming pool. (Additional development as funds are available).

4. Camp Kerr Lake:

- a. Construct roads and parking lots.
- b. Construct electric power line.
- Install underground water lines.
- d. Construct bath house and multi-purpose shelter in day use area.
- e. Develop camp sites in family camping area.
- f. Construct four winterized cabins.
- g. Construct dining hall-assembly building. (Additional development as funds are available).

E. Maintenance of Facilities

Further work in establishing and coordinating the over-all maintenance and development program will continue during 1969-70. We are grateful to the Commission on World Service and Finance for its understanding of our needs and problems, and for its increased budget item set for next year. We also hope they will be able to continue increasing this amount until it reaches \$50,000.00 annually, an amount needed for the regular maintenance of the camp facilities, both current and projected.

III. RESOLUTIONS

A. CONFERENCE CAMPS CRUSADE

Whereas, the North Carolina Annual Conference has undertaken a financial crusade to secure a minimum goal of \$300,000 for our Conference camps, and that this amount has been pledged;

Be it therefore resolved, that this camp crusade be continued during 1969-70, and

that these further suggestions be taken into consideration:

1. That each local church that has not reached its fair share goal in gifts and threeyear pledges, be requested to continue its efforts until its goal has been reached.

2. That individuals, organizations, and churches that have made pledges make pay-

ments as early as possible to allow work to be done.

3. That all churches continue to lift up the needs of our Conference camps and secure financial support for them.

B. DISTRICT DIRECTORS OF CAMPING MINISTRY

Whereas, District Directors of Camping Ministry have provided a valuable communication link between the Committee on Camps and Conferences and the local churches, and

Whereas, the Committee on Camps and Conferences feels they are vital to the continued development of camping ministries, recruiting counselors, and creating interest in

camping,

Be it therefore resolved that the District Directors of Camping Ministhy be elected in the same manner as District Coordinators of Children, Youth, and Adult Ministries, and further that they be included in the District Program Council, and as members of the Conference Committee on Camps and Conferences.

C. CAMPERSHIP FUND FOR THE DISADVANTAGED

Whereas, requests for financial aid to help disadvantaged persons attend camp are continually being received by the Board of Education, and

Whereas, camper fees are set as low as economically feasible to allow all persons desiring camp experiences to attend, and no funds are available for this specific cause; Be it further resolved that a campership fund be established in the North Carolina

Annual Conference to help youngsters who would like to attend camp, and further, That these funds be held by the Conference treasurer and administered by the Board of Education as necessary to supplement other available resources, or supply the total cost of camp fees, and, further

That requests for campership aid be referred to the Board of Education by local

churches and ministers, and
That local churches be encouraged, wherever possible, to provide camperships for persons in their own constituency and to contribute to the Conference Campership Fund to help youngsters from other needy areas.

D. We commend Reverend R. Keith Glover for his valuable service as Conference Director of Camping Ministry and recommend his reappointment.

State Support For Students

Whereas: Many qualified students are unable to attend institutions of higher education because of increasing cost factors; and

Whereas the State of North Carolina cannot provide facilities for all its qualified students without greatly increasing capital support; and

Whereas the private colleges and universities render a great service to the

State of North Carolina by providing facilities for many students, and

Whereas the private institutions cannot compete financially with the state institu-

Whereas the private institutions cannot compete financially with the state institutions in student-borne expenses;

Be it therefore resolved: that the Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church endorse a study of the needs of private colleges and universities proposed by the State Board of Higher Education to the Legislature of the State of North Carolina;

And that we endorse in principle the support of students attending both public and private colleges and universities through state scholarships or tuition grants related to

institutional costs and student needs;

And that we encourage the college officials related to the United Methodist Church to give every possible assistance in the preparation of carefully documented cases for such financial programs.

SECTION H

Committee on Young Adult Ministry F. Belton Joyner, Chairman

I. Report for 1968-1969

A. Developing Plans for a Young Adult Committee

Aware of a need for a more significant ministry with young adults, the 1968 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference called upon the Board of Education to make some new and special efforts in this area. On August 19, 1968, a Committee called together by Dr. C. P. Morris drew up this statement of purpose for a Young Adult

Ministry Committee:

'The purpose of the Committee on Young Adult Ministry is to determine some directions for a ministry to and a ministry of young adults in eastern North Carolina. The Committee is to (1) develop awareness of young adult population concentrations in eastern North Carolina (military, student, partment, etc.); (2) to seek better com-munication between the Church and the young adult population, both "church" and "non-church," with special care to assume a listening task; (3) examine existing forms of ministry; (4) establish pilot projects for new ministry; (5) consider the role of the local congregation in young adult ministry; (6) train young adult churchmen for mission.

This Committee was formulated with an effort to obtain members who were rep-

resentative of various stances within the young adult population.

B. Favetteville Area Leadership School

From September 29 to October 3, 1968, the Fayetteville Area Leadership School offered a course, "Young Adult Ministry." Fourteen persons were enrolled and eleven received "credit" for the course. Leadership was provided by the Rev. Stanley Wiley of Bridgeport, Connecticut. Mr. Wiley is recognized for his ministry with young adults. He came to be with us partially with the financial support of the General Board of Education.

C. Consultation with the Rev. Stanley Wiley

A small group of interested persons met with the Rev. Stanley Wiley on October 3. Mr. Wiley helped design a session for the Committee on Young Adult Ministry. He was able to relate this specialized ministry to the total ministry of the church.

D. Meeting of the Committee on Young Adult Ministry

Seventeen members of the Committee on Young Adult Ministry met at Camp Chestnut Ridge, October 4-5, 1968. There was considerable discussion about the appropriate stance of this committee—initiating, responsive, calculating, open, aggressive—or what combination of these. Members of the committee did advance reading in preparation for the meeting. Three primary questions arose: (1) Who is the eastern North Carolina young adult? (2) What stance do we have in approaching the task? (3) What are some guidelines for the Church's involvement in ministry?

E. Additional Work by Committee Members

1. In an effort to help the committee become more sensitive to the radical student as a young adult, Don Farthing has prepared a bibliography on "What the Radical Student

is Reading."
2. Jim Tingle surveyed around 100 young adults to learn whether (1) young adults felt the Church should be providing information on topics of young adult concerns and (2) whether they felt such information was actually being provided. Only one person surveyed had given his church relationship much thought and he had become disenchanted with the church because of the church's commitment to old forms without any

real meaning. Few were involved in the church in any way, but none indicated that this was because of the church's lack of concern about "worldly" topics. Actually, The United Methodist Church was recorded as having done a better job of informing young adults

about topics of their concern.

3. In investigating the relation of the young adult to the local congregation, Mary Ruth Williams concluded that the church seems to have no program for meaningful involvement. The church is apparently afraid to get involved in the world, yet many young adults want this involvement. This alienates them from most local expressions of the church's life.

4. Another inquiry into the church's attitude toward young adults convinced Arthur Phillips that there is a tendency in the church to lump all young adults into a stereotype—largely seen as irresponsible and wild. Although there is a verbalized concern for getting young adults "to church" there appears to be a basic resistance by both lay and clerical churchmen to the young adult population.

5. Other reports are being prepared on the military young adult, the relation of young adults to government, the single young adult, and the college campus as a concentration

of young adult population.

II. Recommendations for 1969-1970

1. That there be a week-end gathering of young adults to confront some of the issues of "where we are" in eastern North Carolina.

2. That the Committee on Young Adult Ministry initiate or re-enforce at least one

pilot project related to a local congregation or cluster of congregations.

3. That the Committee on Young Adult Ministry initiate or re-enforce at least one pilot project involving non-church-related young adults.

B. Equipment for Ministry

1. That potential instructors in a course on "Young Adult Ministry" be invited to a Coaching Conference, January 12-15, 1970, for training in leadership of this course.

 That planning committees for Christian Workers' Schools and other leadership education enterprises consider the possibility of including the course "Young Adult Ministry."

3. That a survey be made to determine where in our Annual Conference there are

already effective ministries with young adults.

4. That the Committee on Young Adult Ministry be continued as a study, research, planning, and ministering group through the 1969-1970 Conference Year at the end of which time a recommendation be made regarding the continuation of the Committee.

B. Revision of Charter and By-Laws of Methodist Board of Education, Inc.

In order to bring the Constitution and By-Laws of Methodist Board of Education, Inc. into conformity with the new organizational structure of The United Methodist Church, as set forth in the 1968 Book of The Discipline, we recommend that the President of the Conference Board of Education appoint a Committee on Charter and By-Laws charged with the responsibility of revising these documents for consideration of the Board at its spring meeting and for approval by the 1970 Annual Conference.

C. Constitutional Amendment to Make the President of The Conference Youth Organization A Member of The Annual Conference

Each Annual Conference is asked to vote at its 1969 session on a Constitutional amendment which would make the President of the Conference Youth Organization a member of the Annual Conference. If a 2/3 majority of the aggregate vote of annual conference memberships approve the amendment, it can become a part of the Constitution at the next General Conference (1970), following a 2/3 majority vote of the General Conference members present and voting.

We recommend that the North Carolina Annual Conference approve this amendment

to the Constitution of the United Methodist Church.

REGIONAL COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

I. Report for 1968-1969

The Regional Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry is successor to the Interconference Commission on College University and Religious Life, according to provisions of the 1968 Discipline and enabling legislation adopted by the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In addition to the former Interconference Commission's responsibility for campus ministry, the Regional Commission is expected to promote the cause of United Methodist institutions of higher education. The extent of the Commission's responsibility for higher education is still under study and will be shared, in any event, with the North Carolina Conference Commission and the Western North Carolina Conference Commistee on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

Through its Committee on Church-Related Colleges and Institutions, the Regional Commission is seeking to develop sound bases for effective interconference cooperation in higher education. That committee is gathering further information on state aid for church-related and other types of non-public colleges and universities. Recently, learn-

ing sessions were held with persons from Nashville and elsewhere,

At the present time the Regional Commission is responsible for the operation of eight full-time and seven part-time campus ministries at fifteen locations and employing ten full-time ministers, including the State Director. It maintains property at eight different locations, the total value of which is \$755,000.00. Exclusive of the two ministries, involving three ministers at Duke and ,Winston-Salem, the Weslye Foundations on campuses of state-supported institutions minister to campuses where 53,398 students are enrolled. On these campuses alone there are 11,704 Methodist students, many more than are enrolled in our Methodist colleges.

The United Methodists of North Carolina are urged to respond to the challenge to minister to campuses by giving greater financial priority to the mission of the church.

That the crucial character of campus ministry warrants such priority is borne out by the following considerations:

1. In a time of growing scientism, atheism, and agnosticism there is a need for extra

effort to conserve and enhance the faith of students;

The determinative role of education in contemporary life demands that Christian value commitments be represented aggressively and winsomely within the structures of education; and

3. Since increasing numbers of our ministers are entering seminary from state-supported institutions, it is especially important to provide in our Wesley Foundations ministers who can attract our most promising youth into church vocations.

 Electing one Methodist student to serve on each board or agency of the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Annual Conferences, except where such membership is prohibited by the Book of the *Discipline* of The United Methodist Church 1968.

2. Considering the desirability of creating a state student organization.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

The Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations is charged with the responsibility to promote among youth and adults a philosophy of Christian vocation that recognizes the potential sacredness of all useful work and all opportunities for Christian service; to organize a program for presenting to youth and adults the opportunities and claims of the pastoral ministry of interested youth and adults and to inform them of the necessary preparation for specific church occupations; to keep accurate and useful records of each youth who has indicated an interest in church occupations from the time of his first commitment until he is appointed to full work in the church or until such time as responsibility for him is accepted by the proper conference board or commission.

I. Program Report for 1968-69

- 1. Highlighting our Conference year was the meeting in September at the Methodist Building with Bishop Richard Raines and Dr. Richard Bauer, Executive Secretary of the Interboard Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations. Important information was gleaned from these able church leaders which should aid our Commission in the vital area of church recruitment.
- 2. Information was sent to each pastor concerning the ever-increasing needs in church enlistment.
- Each minister in the Conference was sent a 1969 Church Occupations and Voluntary Service booklet.
- 4. We have encouraged programs in the local church, schools and colleges on church occupations.
- 5. Presentations concerning church recruitment were made this year at Methodist College and Wesleyan College,
- 6. A regional meeting on church enlistment held in Charlotte was attended by three Commission members. At this meeting guidelines on Voluntary Service for each Conference were presented by Miss Betty Letzig, Assistant Secretary of the United Voluntary Service.
- 7. During this new quadrennial our Conference will have representation on the Interboard Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations. Our Conference Chairman, Jack L. Hunter, was chosen to serve on this National Executive Committee.

Since 1964 \$23,000.00 has been made possible for Church Occupational Scholarships, in undergraduate studies, through the offerings received.

II. Plans and Recommendations for 1969-70

1. We endorse the plan of the United Methodist Church to provide a Volunteer Service Program under the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation and recommend that this pro-

gram be implemented as quickly as possible. The Conference Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations stands ready to fulfill its responsibilities in the program as determined by the Conference Committee on Voluntary Service.

- 2. We feel that we should work with the Wesley Foundation and the Methodist Student Movement in sponsoring a dialogue session with Bishop William R. Cannon on our university campuses and other campuses as time allows. This could include a dinner meeting.
- 3. We recommend that the Board of the Ministry consider the possibility of a visitation and dinner for selected faculty members and students at Duke Divinity School and we offer our support.
- 4. We encourage our Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations and the Board of the Ministry to continue the promotion of Ministry Sunday in September.
- 5. We shall study the feasibility of a United Methodist Testing and Guidance Center, preferably within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference.
- The Commission plans to conduct an overnight Training Experience for District Enlistment Secretaries at Camp Chestnut Ridge sometime during the Conference year.
 - 7. We encourage continued support for the Lay Rally Scholarships.
- 8. We plan to secure two copies of the filmstrip, "It Takes a Man" to be used in recruitment for the Pastoral Ministry in our Conference.
- We shall study the possibility of producing a filmstrip showing the needs for church occupations within the North Carolina Conference.
- 10. We join in a cooperative effort with the Committee on Youth Ministry to share in the implementation and expense of *Explore*.

We confess our shortcomings and our failure to be what we might have been with your constant presence. For this and all sins of omission and commission we ask your forgiveness and pray for strength to make your will more our will in the days ahead. Amen.

THE OFFICE OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

A new quadrennium has brought a new Board of Evangelism to our Conference and we have found it to be a happy and creative year under its guidance. The Executive Director serves under the general supervision of the Conference Board of Evangelism. We have endeavored to carry out their ideas with the immediate help of the Executive Committee. The Director has attempted to implement all ideas and plans adopted in the program that was prepared for the year. A few changes have been made to fit in with the quadrennial emphasis of The United Methodist Church. However, our basic work has remained to be that as a Conference-wide resource-evangelist. We have counseled with pastors and local church lay leaders in the field of evangelism, in the churches, by correspondence, in our office, and by telephone. These services have been provided for all who request them as a function of the office. There is never any additional charge to the local church. We are particularly grateful for the enthusiastic support we have received from the District Superintendents and the District Secretaries of Evangelism. We have challenged the District Secretaries to an even greater and more personal leadership within the bounds of their own district.

This has enabled our Board to help free the services of the Executive Director to conduct five-night revivals within some of our smaller churches which have felt that they could not obtain the services of a revival speaker. Again, there has been no cost to the local church except the understanding that they will follow specific guidelines to prepare for the revival. The Board has been and continues to be particularly interested in helping the smaller churches in searching for new ways of spiritual renewal in depth. The Executive Director held two such revivals during the latter part of the Conference vear.

The Executive Director traveled more than 17,000 miles in the performance of his duties. He attended the Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism at Lake Junaluska and the National Council of Evangelism at Kansas City for ideas and inspiration, as did other representative members of the Board. This has been a year in which new vistas have opened and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit with confidence and optimism we face

the challenge of Christian evangelism which is our primary task.

PASTORS' CONFERENCE ON EVANGELISM

Last year, attendance at the Pastors' Conference on Evangelism was 341, with Bishop William R. Cannon and Dr. C. Ross Freeman as featured speakers. The Conference was held on the campus of N. C. Wesleyan College.

The Conference for 1969 will be held at Methodist College, August 26-27. Speakers will be Bishop Cannon, Dr. Lee C. Moorehead of Carbondale, Ill., and Dr. George A.

Fallon of the General Board of Evangelism.

LAY CONFERENCE ON EVANGELISM

The Conference of 1968 was held at North Carolina Wesleyan College with nearly one hundred persons attending. Dr. Claude Thompson of the Candler School of Theology discussed the theology of evangelism and the Reverend Ross B. Whetstone discussed new methods in evangelism, including Contact, the new and already successful telephone counseling service. Attendance trophies were awarded to Jarvis Memorial and Chadbourn Churches.

The Reverend Larry Eisenberg of the General Board will be our featured speaker at the 1969 Lay Conference on Evangelism at Methodist College, August 16-17. He will discuss the evangelistic emphasis in the quadrennial program and offer possibilities for

lay renewal through Koinonia groups.

The Lay Conference is primarily for chairmen and members of local church evangelism commissions.

BISHOP'S DIALOGUE

Bishop Cannon led our first Bishop's Dialogue in Evangelism for Young Pastors (up to five years in the ministry) at Goldsboro on February 4, 1969, with 40 persons attending. The young ministers revealed their inner thoughts and problems and asked questions of deep personal concern. They asked for future meetings with the Bishop; thus a second dialogue has been scheduled for Wednesday, August 27, at 2:00, at Methodist College, following adjournment of the Pastors' Conference on Evangelism.

LAY RENEWAL IN NORTH CAROLINA UNITED METHODISM

Nineteen Lay Witness Missions were held, bringing the total in our Conference to about 60. Two Lay Witness Mission rallies were held, at Durham and Goldsboro, under the leadership of Milford Chewning, More than 100 persons attended. These are primarily projects of the Board of the Laity with the cooperation of the Board of Evangelism.

A Lay Renewal Conference will be held at North Carolina Wesleyan College, July 19-20, conducted by Dr. Ben C. Johnson and Milford Chewning of the Institute of Lay Renewal, Atlanta.

Ohristian Growth Conferences are recommended as follow-up in-depth studies of Lay Witness Missions and their effectiveness. Studies include prayer, commitment, the Bible, and the Holy Spirit. A pilot conference was held at Benson May 16-18, 1969.

VII.

IOINT PROJECTS

Our board joins with other boards in sponsoring various projects: the Pastors' Conference on Evangelism, with Committee on Church and Community of the Board of Missions; the Lay Conference on Evangelism and Lay Witness Missions, with the Board of the Laity; the Orientation Workshop, for ministers new to the conference, with the Board of the Ministry, the Board of Missions, the Committee on Church and Community, and the Board of Education.

VIII.

DISTRICT SECRETARIES' WORKSHOPS

Three workshops were held during the last Conference year. In preparation for the subdistrict workshops to be held across the Conference in September, the Secretaries will hold a training session at Methodist College, August 25. The position of district secretary is being underwritten and emphasized this year as never before.

TX.

SUMMER COASTAL MINISTRIES

For several summers the Reverend Hank Wilkinson has led in an effective ministry at Kill Devil Hills, on a site owned by the North Carolina Conference Board of Missions, and aided locally by several denominations. In 1968 an estimated 42,000 customers attended the "Circus Tent Ice Cream Parlor." Daily programs were held at regular intervals with folk singing, music, searching, and personal testimonies followed by meaningful conversations.

The Reverend Irving Cook, the Reverend A. P. Hill and others are leading in beginning a similar ministry this summer to be housed in the Embers Club at Atlantic Beach, sponsored by our Board and other interested denominations.

A CALL TO THE CONSTANT CHRIST IN A CONTEMPORARY CULTURE IN CRISIS

The Good News: We have chosen to call our Board of Evangelism Newsletter by this title, we recognize that this is the Gospel of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, the best news for all time for all the world: The Logos. We view his as another year of our Lord. We view it with the vibrant excitement of a thriving Church serving Him. We view a frontier that is so great as to stagger the imagination. Let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith . . .", Hebrews 12:1-2. This call is as close to contemporary evangelism as evangelism was to the Apostle Paul. Therefore, our District Secretaries of Evangelism have voted to recommend that we creatively continue in this line of splendor during the 1969-70 Conference year. We do this because (1) all of us as Christians share a common cause and commitment; (2) more people than live in the state of North Carolina are being added to the population of the world every day; (3) the Macedonian Call continues to deafen our ears as we see before us a limitless frontier.

We take the positive approach of the Quadrennial Emphasis as we seek to cooperate with our Program Council and all boards and agencies, beginning with the evangelistic impact of the Church and the Word; continuing with the Church and Its Work; until we find ourselves The Church in the World under the banner which our Lord gave us when He proclaimed, "Behold, I make all things new!"

I. The Church and the Word

We urge every pastor to look for leadership from the Secretary of Evangelism within the District in which he holds an appointment. The District Secretaries have been conducting pilot Church Attendance Emphases to help you make plans for Attendance Emphases in local churches across our Conference next fall. We recommend the use of the "We Care" materials provided by Tidings. More crucial than the Emphasis is what takes place as a concerted effort is made to increase church attendance. The

period that we have selected is Sunday, October 5, through Sunday, December 28, 1969. The District Secretary will provide guidelines regarding procedure, publicity and promotion and other available materials. He will select these and help you on the basis of the needs of your particular District and the congregation(s) you serve. Your part is to remember the great opportunity you have to preach the Word. Each pastor will want to prepare diligently the best evangelistic (Kerygmatic) sermons possible through the leading of the Holy Spirit.

We recommend that with the cooperation of the General Program Council every local church implement in its work most creatively a thorough study of the Sermon on

the Mount.

From The Interpreter, January 1969, page 21: "The Discipline, 1968 says about evangelism: 'Evangelism is the winning of persons to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. It is an attitude, a spirit, and a living faith that finds expression in a continuous cooperative effort on the part of the Holy Spirit and man to bring the individual into vital relationship with God and his fellow men through faith in Jesus Christ, God's Son."

Thus, another part of this phase concerning the Church and the Word is to take the lead in your local ministerial association in sponsoring a community-wide religious census. This is particularly important if such a census has not been made in the past three years. In most cases, you will discover people who prefer the church you serve: then you will have an opportunity to reach them with the Word, The Good News!

II. The Church and Its Work

Yes, we are talking about evangelism. Evangelism as Didache: We refer you to paragraphs 1125 and 1126 of The Discipline, 1968. To this end we want to serve the Church in leading persons toward commitment to the Lordship of Christ. In spite of our tremendous population explosion we have the opportunity for great new frontiers of growth in Eastern North Carolina. We recommend that our fall attendance emphasis be followed up by a multi-phased spring evangelism emphasis. Each District Secretary is requested to encourage pastors within the bounds of his District to work at evangelism in the areas particularly needed in that District. This does not emphasize membership statistics. It does not call for reports or reporting. Membership statistics will be reported only to Charge Conferences, District Conferences and the usual Annual Conference Report.

By not reporting membership, the emphasis will not be on net "gains" within a given local church. Thus, pastors are encouraged to request their non-resident members to transfer to where they live. Use the Membership Conservation Double Postcards available from Tidings. All churches are asked to do their best to reach the non-resident members living in their areas. Non-resident membership has proven to be one of the greatest problems in loss of active churchmen as we view a rootless, highly mobile population.

For those who wish a goal we feel that a Conference net increase in membership of 5,000 is not unrealistic. This would require leading 7,000 to our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ on profession of faith and receiving another 8,000 by transfer of church letter. Actually, this would represent an average of only twenty-eight new members for each of our 535 pastoral charges.

We recommend the following procedures for an Evangelism Emphasis:

- A. Census. Continue to study and utilize the results of the Community Religious Census taken last fall.
- B. Compile a prospect list. Start now. Revise your current list of prospects to add newcomers or remove those who join the church or move out of the area. A careful study of attendance lists or cards taken during the Fall Attendance Emphasis will be one source of prospects. The Church School should be another source of prospects. The prospect list should be a prayer list for the pastor and everyone involved in the work area of Evangelism. Make it your job to know every person who is a constituent member of the church you serve but not on the roll. People can be led to a saving knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ only as they are known personally.
- C. A Week of Serving Through Concentrated Evangelistic Effort, March 2-4—three nights of training for visitation. March 15-18—four nights of evangelistic preaching followed by visitation. (An alternative to this would be a week of concentrated visitation.)

D. Ten-Week Confirmation Class, January 18 to Palm Sunday, March 22, 1970. 1. The results of all prior work will now come to fruit as we form Confirmation

Classes for children, usually beginning with grade 6, but earlier if a child so indicates interest in the class. Classes should never coerce.

2. Older youth, adult classes. We have found that older youth and adults work

together, whereas children and older youth will not work as well together.

3. Seek out unbaptized infants and young children and work with their parents to explain the meaning of the Sacrament of Baptism and institute a special day on which the Sacrament can be administered to a number of the unbaptized.

4. Suggested days for reception of Confirmation Classes: Palm Sunday, March 22, 1970; Easter Sunday, March 29, 1970. Do not take this casually; make the day of Confirmation a day long to be remembered, both by the new members and the church.

E. Continuing Growth in Spiritual Life.

1. Use and widely distribute The Upper Room: The Upper Room Disciplines: and The Sanctuary.

2. Emphasize family prayer through out the year. 3. Form Membership "Refresher" courses.

III. The Church and the World

We commend again to all the evangelistic command of our Lord to go into all the world. For most, "all the world" will mean places not very far away from home. We commend the careful appraisal of the Lay Witness Mission Movement and the recruiting of Lay Witnesses and Lay Witness Mission co-ordinators. We commend the recognition of the Day of Pentecost as a time we realize that the spirit of the living Christ is present with us and helping us as we seek to work for Him in the world. This is where the Church becomes an expression of Agape through true community. In this contemporary era we will constantly be identifying, creating, evaluating and demonstrating the situations, settings, opportunities and structures in which persons may respond to God's call for commitment, growing in grace and personal discipline, and participating in His mission. Thus, we will want to recall that the congregational care of new members is as important as gaining them.

We recommend continuous training classes, the Fellowship Friend Program, involvement in the various organizations of the church, visitations to welcome the new members, receptions honoring the new members, and the distribution of new member packets. Give new members something to do within the work areas of the church as soon as possible. Particularly help the youth to have a realistic and active role. Help all constantly renew the constant Christ in their life by working for Him in the world. Thus comes a spirit of community. They can join groups of The Twelve or The Ambas-

sadors.

TV

We commend this program as a cooperative endeavor in our Quadrennial Emphasis: "A New Church for a New World."

We define the duties of the Conference Director of Evangelism to be those of general guidance, office consultation, and revival preaching. He will issue helpful communications through The Good News, but other literature should be purchased from Cokesbury, Fifth and Crace Streets, Richmond, Virginia, 23216, or Tidings and The Upper Room, 1908 Grand Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee, 37203. The creative and preaching load of the Conference Director is growing to the extent that neither he nor the Board can sell books, tracts, or literature available from other United Methodist agencies. He will be glad to make recommendations and counsel with you as to your needs when you need help beyond the scope of the District Secretary.

The District Secretary of Evangelism is being provided with a sufficient budget to

work with all of those in the confines of his District, helping them with their specific problems, helping them in obtaining appropriate materials, and advising them as to the timing of the programs in their particular districts according to their particular needs. We are emphasizing the position and function of the District Secretary more than

ever before.

Our program predicates a firm belief that the parish minister is primarily an evangelist. We do not believe that he would otherwise be in the parish ministry. Therefore, we consider this program a statement of normal vigorous activity and humbly commend it to God and our parish ministers to the ennobling presence of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Department of Gifts and Wills

This has been a year of study and understanding of the Department of Gifts and Wills. I have found that we are indebted to Dr. F. Olen Hunt, our first director of Gifts and Wills, for the establishment of the Department of Gifts and Wills. Much that we have accomplished this year has been due to his wise leadership of the past. We have received a good heritage and we hope to be faithful to the Lord's work in this department. He gave himself for his work, and we have reaped some of the benefits this year, and more of his labor of love will be realized in future years.

One phase of my work this year has been in getting acquainted with the people in the North Carolina Conference. I am grateful to our pastors, district superintendents, and our Bishop for the opportunities that have been provided for me in the local churches

and the districts of our Conference.

I have had the privilege of presenting our program in preaching services, Methodist Men's groups, and other organizations of the church. I have been pleased with the response from individuals and small group meetings of interested persons in our Gifts and Wills program. We can point to the gifts that have been made for our Louisburg College, Methodist College, and North Carolina Wesleyan College, boards and agencies, and local churches, as real accomplishments by the Department of Gifts and Wills.

We have been pleased with the people who have come to receive help in the preparation of their wills. The local church and the institutions will be rewarded in the days to

come because of the love and concern of these good people.

One of the great joys of this year has been the trust and confidence of persons who have been willing to let us help in their gifts and wills. We have some scholarships set up in our department, but we did not have a single ministerial scholarship fund for the education of ministers. Realizing the great need to help young people who are called of God to be His ministers, and knowing the demand of our churches for educated ministers, our Methodist Foundation established under the Department of Gifts and Wills, The Ministerial Scholarship Fund. This fund was established in November 1968, and four persons have made a contribution to it. We will be promoting this fund and hope we can secure enough money that we will soon be helping in ministerial education. We have had good support from the president of the Methodist Foundation, Inc., S. L. Gulledge, Jr., I. Lee Parker, chairman of the Department of Gifts and Wills, the membership of the Foundation, members of the Gifts and Wills Committee, and the district directors of Gifts and Wills.

There continues to be a great interest in the Methodist Foundation. We have sent materials and information to four other Conferences, and the Presbyterian Synod of North

Carolina.

We are planning in this Conference year to hold district dinner meetings in order that we may tell our story and offer our services to our people. We seek your help and understanding for our people. Our services are offered on a confidential basis, and we hope that we may help you to extend your life and the ministry of Christ through the coming years.

THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

Recommendations

Section 1-Golden Cross Committee

Due to the increased costs of hospital care, it is recommended that the allowances for hospital payments be increased from \$20.00 per day to \$25.00 per day, maximum,

for all cases of special need effective as of July 1, 1969.

It is recommended that in order to further upgrade our Health Insurance program for ministers that we change our present policy to the new Blue Cross full cost for semi-private and private rooms program. The premium schedule would be \$21.90 per quarter for a single person, \$43.80 for parent and child, and \$61.08 for family coverage. This would be an increase of \$3.12 per quarter more for family coverage than our policy going into effect July 1, 1969 (see 1968 Conference Journal, page 253). The difference in coverage is simply in the amount paid for hospital rooms. Since most hospitals are going to private and semi-private rooms, we feel this to be advantageous in our Insurance Program. It is further recommended that this change in policy go into effect July 1, 1970

in order to give the churches an opportunity to make allowance for the increased cost in

their budget planning for the new year 1970-71.

It is recommended that the policy of billing the premiums be continued as in the past—two quarterly billings at the rate of \$61.08 per family per quarter to be paid by the church or charge; two quarterly payments in the same amount to be paid by the minister. For a single minister the rate would be \$21.90 per quarter.

It is recommended that the present group Hospital program now being provided for ministers of the North Carolina Annual Conference be extended to full-time ministers and directors of Christian education and educational assistants serving churches in the North Carolina Annual Conference. The arrangements for the payments of premiums will be determined by the individual and the church in which the person is serving. It is recommended that this be made effective at the 1970 session of the Conference.

The committee recognizes the work of Chaplain Wesley Aitken and his staff in the chaplaincy program at Duke Medical Center. The chaplaincy program presents the witness of the church in one of the finest ways. The program makes the service of chaplains available to persons from across the state and the eastern portion of the nation. We recommend that our support of the chaplaincy program be continued at \$4,700 for the Conference year 1969-1970.

The committee recognizes the work with alcoholics of the Rev. J. C. Dunn in the Good Shepherd Home at Lake Waccamaw, N. C. We recommend that the Conference continue its support of the Home in the amount of \$2,500 for the Conference year 1969-1970.

Section 2-Retirement Home Committee

The committee requests the Bishop to appoint Reverend Joseph F. Coble to be Administrator and Reverend Harvey B. Johnson to be Administrative Assistant for the vear 1969-1970.

The committee recommends that the Home be given the privilege of solicitation of funds for the purpose of carrying on the work of the Home and financing another home within the bounds of The Conference.

Section 3-Home for Children Committee

The committee recommends the appointment of Reverend J. W. Lineberger, Sr. to be Superintendent and Reverend James M. Waggoner to be Chaplain for the year 1969-1970.

The committee recommends that the Home be given the privilege of soliciting funds for the purpose of carrying on the work of the Home.

Section 4-Long Range Planning Committee

Due to the increased concerns and responsibilities of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, the committee recommends that Health and Welfare Orientation Workshops for ministers be held in each District of the Conference during the 1969-1970 Conference Year. The committee hopes that these workshops can be held during a two hour morning session that would be concluded with a lunch to be provided through the Board and its Agencies, but if this is not possible that such a workshop be held in conjunction with another Distrcit meeting. The committee feels that the workshops would be of invaluable help to the ministers in understanding the help and services available in this area of concern and responsibility.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN

Report No. 1

Part I-Review of the Year

The past year has been an eventful one at the Methodist Home for Children. The

long period of planning and study began to bear fruit in specific actions.

As the Conference year 1967-1968 was drawing to a close the professional study of the Home made by the Group Child Care Project, associated with the School of Social Work at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, became available to the Board of Trustees. A long period of self-study by the trustees and the administration of the Home had prepared the way for this professional study. Based on this study, and other information, the Board has begun to put together a long-range plan. The first steps are recorded in Part II of this report.

In June seven children graduated from high school. Arrangements were made for several other children to live with members of their families. This made it possible to vacate one of the cottages which needed extensive renovation. Two other cottages were in urgent need of renovation. It was decided not to admit children to fill this cottage until the renovation could be completed, one cottage at a time. This means that our campus

population has remained unusually low for the entire year.

Important additions have been made to our staff during the year. Mr. S. Afton Quinn joined our staff to be the director of Social Work, taking the place of our director who had resigned. Mr. Bill D. Britton came to fill a new position as the director of Group Care. Both of these men have the master's degree in Social Work and are well qualified, both by training and experience, for their responsibilities. These men have been used this year to give professional training to all members of our staff. This will enable us to im-

prove the quality of our services to children.

The Methodist Home has been faced during the year with the same financial problems that confront everyone else—the rapid increase of expenses. This has been especially true in terms of solaries. The radical increases in minimum salaries paid in our area have made it necessary for us to radically increase our salary schedules in order to employ competent personnel. It has been necessary for us to meet the salary competition from other organizations which would employ the same people whom we employ. As a matter of fact, almost every member of our staff could get a job somewhere else in the community tomorrow at a higher salary than we are paying. The church has no right to expect people to make a personal sacrifice for the privilege of working for a church agency.

In addition to the increase in salaries, an increase has been noted in the cost of food, clothing and supplies of all kinds. In spite of all this, we were able to come to the end of the fiscal year, September 30, 1968, with a very small surplus—due mainly to staff vacancies. It was necessary to budget the current year anticipating a considerable deficit

to give us time to find additional sources of income.

A number of years ago the Operating Fund borrowed from the General Endowment Fund a large sum to be used to make renovations and repairs to buildings. On October 1, 1967, the Operating Fund still owed \$81.204 on this obligation. Realizing that the Operating Fund would never be able to repay this loan, the trustees made the transfer permanent. This reduced the General Endowment principal by \$81,204, and cancelled out this inter-fund obligation.

Part II-Long-Range Planning

The process of long-range planning began more than two years ago. At its meeting in May, 1968, the Board of Trustees agreed that the aim of the Methodist Home for Children should be to provide the best service possible to the children of the Home: to do this as economically as possible, but with the emphasis not upon economy, but upon quality of service. At that meeting these important decisions were made, also:

1. That the Methodist Home for Children continue to develop the present site for

maximum effectiveness.

That the Methodist Home for Children maintain high quality in its service to children and their families, using standards recognized by the United Methodist Church and the North Carolina State Board of Public Welfare.

3. That the trustees formulate a master plan for future program and plant development based on the study made by Dr. Allan Keith-Lucas, director of the Group Child Care Project.

4. That the Methodist Home for Children operate under personnel policies including salaries, working conditions, retirement plan and other benefits which will attract and hold qualified and competent staff.

When the trustees met in September, 1968, other decisions were made. Some of the

most important of these were:

1. The maximum limit of each cottage should be twelve children and the maximum limit of the campus should be 144 children. This will require the construction of one additional cottage. It is recommended that the additional cottage be so constructed that it will be suitable for both boys and girls together and children of any age together.

2. An off-campus group home (half-way house) for the use of juniors and seniors

should be provided as soon as possible.

3. As a goal for employment of Social Work staff the ratio of one case worker for thirty to thirty-five children should be established.

The trustees have authorized the construction of two new residences for professional members of our staff. Much preliminary work has been done in preparation for this project, but it has not yet been completed. The central area of the campus has been graded, so that it can be developed as the recreation and activity center for the cam-

Other decisions must be made, but it is evident that the general direction of our long-

range planning has been set. The future has much promise.

THE METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES, INC.

Part I-The Home is Meeting a Need

As Christians, we are vitally concerned about the needs of minority groups. There is no minority group that is growing more rapidly in numbers or needs to be the concern of the church more than our retired people. Already there are in excess of eighteen million people over sixty-five years of age in the United States and this group will soon

make up 20 per cent of the total population.

The retired members of our church are faced with loneliness because children and grandchildren move further and further from the place called "home." They need someone to love and care for them but thye also need financial security and care in time of sickness, for inflation has taken away much of the buying power of the modest income they have. Approximately one-half of the members in the Home in Durham have no one closer than a niece or nephew living in North Carolina.

Our church, because of its concern, realizes that security and someone who cares are extremely important to the older person. It knows what loneliness and fear can do to a person. One of its finest efforts to meet the needs of people in the name of Christ and His Church is the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., in Durham, which is owned and operated by the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church.

Bishop Cannon says:

"The Methodist Retirement Home in Durham is considered by people everywhere as one of the finest institutions of its type in The United Methodist Church. All of us in North Carolina should be proud to claim it as our own.

"This institution is not separate from or independent of our church. Rather, it is The Church itself in this field of service. Therefore, we should give those who live there all the love, concern, and help that it is possible to give any of our people. The financial support of this institution merits consideration by all of us.

"Therefore, I am pleased to commend it to you as an object of your charity, your

care, and your continuing concern."

The Home in Durham has never had a capital funds campaign but was built with borrowed money.

The Home now has forty-two apartments, an infirmary equipped to handle forty members and domiciliary care facilities to care for 118 members, making a total capacity of 200. The domiciliary care facilities are filled and there is a long waiting list. At the present time there are a few of the recently-completed apartments to be filled.

Since the Home is a part of the Church it operates financially like the Church. Members pay according to their ability and all receive equal services. Those who do not have sufficient assets are maintained in the Home through its benevolent program financed by that part of the Conference Benevolences which comes to the Heme. Other contributions come as gifts from individuals or groups such as the furnishing of a room and other memorials or by the sending of contributions in memory of a loved one. Such gifts are recognized in appropriate ways. One of the major sources of income for the continuing work of the Home is through wills.

As a retirement home only those who are reasonably able to care for their daily needs are accepted. Nursing cases are not normally admitted. While the rule of thumb is that a member be able to keep his room with weekly maid service, dress himself, and go to the dining room without assistance, the final decision is made by the medical staff after an entrance physical examination. Preference is given to Methodists, both clergy and lay people from eastern North Carolina, though others are accepted. The Home is pre-

pared to keep a member for life once he is accepted.

Requirements are a minimum age of 65 (62 for apartments), a life of service to the church and community and a need for the services offered by the Home. Each case is considered individually by the Admissions Committee both as to the physical condition and finances. The filing of an application places an applicant under no obligation.

Financial Policies

Members enter The Home on either a monthly boarding basis or on a life contract. Those who are financially able to pay for the cost of their keep are expected to do so, and in addition, are urged to make gifts to The Home. Others pay according to their ability, and the Church, through its benevolent program, provides the difference.

The monthly rate, which at the present date is \$225 per month, covers room, board, laundry, maid service, the service of The Home's physician, routine medicine, nursing and geriatric care available in The Home's infirmary, along with the religious and social

program of The Home.

The comment is made sometimes that "all The Home is interested in is the Member's money." The fact is that 45 per cent of the Members in the domiciliary care facilities and infirmary are Old Age Assistance recipients or are not paying as much as the cost of their care. While there are a few Members who will leave The Home assets through their wills there are many more who have their monthly keep supplemented through the benevolent program of The Home.

Not more than one-third of the Members of The Home have sufficient assets to keep them for their life expectancy. Less than 20 per cent of the Members will leave The Home money if they live for their life expectancy. In the meantime The Home will have done many times the amount left by Members in Benevolent Work. The monthly rate charged the Member is based on actual day-by-day costs and does not take into account the cost of buildings, interest or depreciation, which means that the Members are not

paying room rent.

The question is often asked: "Why does The Home require people to apply for Old Age Assistance?" There are two reasons: First, this is a legitimate means of income for older people who do not have sufficient income to care for needs. Second, though the Church has been very liberal with The Home, it has not given The Home benevolent money necessary to care for these people without this additional source of income.

Approximately one-half of the Members in The Home are on life contract. These find security. The Home guarantees complete care for the Member as long as he remains in The Home. In exchange for this protection and security the Member is asked to leave to The Home a part of his estate. Contracts are never signed without the Member's family, his minister or lawyer's approval, unless the Member insists that he fully understands

and can make his own decisions.

The contract may be broken by the Member up to a year with no penalty and after a year with penalty. No assets come to The Home except the monthly rate until the Member is deceased. The Member is asked to set up all or part of his assets in a care account which is invested by the Trust Deprtment of Wachovia Bank and Trust Company. This amount is based on the Member's ability to pay, the Member's life expectancy, and how soon The Home's Physician feels the Member might be moving permanently to The Home's infirmary. The fund accumulates its earnings. The Home draws monthly upon this account its rate of care for the Member, the money agreed upon at the time of the signing of the contract for the Member's personal spending money and money for the payment of unusual medical expenses which includes premium on hospital policies, dental work, glasses, etc. In the exchange for the guarantee for care for life, the Member, after funeral expenses, etc., are paid, will leave one-half of the balance in the care account to The Home and dispose of the other half according to the terms of the Member's will.

The Home has never required a Member to turn over to The Home at any time their personal belongings, jewelry or furniture. The Home does require the Member to indi-

cate how these are to be disposed of, however.

To occupy an apartment, the Member makes a capital gift to The Home in the amount of \$10,000 which gives him the privilege of occupying an apartment as long as he is a member of The Home though he may move into the main building or infirmary upon doctor's orders or by request. In addition, the Member living in an apartment makes the same monthly payment as a paying Member in the main building and receives every service available there.

If you are interested in retirement at its best with privacy plus protection and security with the best medical and nursing care available when needed, you should con-

sider retirement in The Methodist Retirement Home.

Terrific increases in salaries along with a general increase in the cost of living has raised the cost of care for older people far beyond the ability of many of them to pay for this care. This means that their church must provide more benevolent money for this purpose. There has been an increase of approximately 20 per cent in the cost of care of older people in The Home within the past two years.

Though we do not know all of the implications of Medicare and Medicaid most of the Members of The Home have been signed up for both parts of th Medicare program. This is helping the Members with hospitalization and surgical bills but will not benefit The Home in reclaiming any medical costs incurred by The Home. Efforts are being made to seek help from Medicare to aid in the medical costs of the infirmary.

The program of The Home is carried out by an excellent staff of loyal and dedicated

people who go the second mile in serving The Home's Members.

The trustees have had much to do with the success of The Home, for they have given freely of their time, talent and money. The leadership of Bishop Cannon, the members of his Cabinet, as well as the leadership and financial support of the ministers and laymen of the Conference mean more than can ever be expressed in words.

Needs to be Met

Within the foreseeable future there will be approximately a half million people in North Carolina over sixty-five. Many of these are Methodists who are within the area of responsibility of the North Carolina Conference. The Home in Durham is filled and the

waiting list continues to grow with new applications coming every week.

The trustees of The Home feel that it is now time for the construction of another home strategically located within the bounds of the Conference. Such a home should be near a strongly-concerned Methodist constituency. There must be available utilities, public transportation to the area, an adequate supply of labor, both skilled and unskilled, and medical services. Within a reasonable distance must be a hospital, church, and shop-

ping facilities.

This home will bring to the community a fine Christian institution. It will give those who have a part in making it possible a sense of sharing in the name of Christ with many retired people who need someone to care for them. This home will serve the retired people of the area, for 50 percent of the Members in the Durham Home come from a radius of less than fifty miles. Though The Home in Durham has excellent facilities and its Members receive the finest services available they would still like to keep closer geographical ties with the place they call home.

While the Conference, through the trustees of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, is prepared to invest some money in this new home, a large part of the initial investment will have to come through a Capital Funds Campaign by the Conference or from interested individuals or groups in the area where the home will be located. The Church will add to the facilities as there is a need and the Church will help with

the large amount of benevolent work the home will do.

This home offers an excellent opportunity for a living memorial for some individual or family, for the home will grow and serve for generations.

This is an opportunity and a challenge for you!

REPORT OF THE CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM, DUKE MEDICAL CENTER

The most exciting event this year has been the opening of our hospital chapel. It will seat comfortably twenty-five people and yet is intimate and private enough to enable one person to feel at home in it. At least two prayer and meditation services are scheduled every day of the week. The Family Room next to the chapel will soon be completed and a formal dedication service is being planned for sometime this fall.

The Hospital Auxiliary presented an Allen organ to the chapel as a memorial gift and arrangements are being made for several organists to volunteer time for regularly-

scheduled periods of organ music throughout the week.

Within this next year we intend to begin a courtesy and consultation service for clergy who come to the Medical Center to visit or who wish to call us for certain types of advice or information. Details about this new service will be announced later.

Poeteral care and poeteral training how continued this wear without significant changes.

Pastoral care and pastoral training have continued this year without significant changes other than the addition of the chapel and the expansion of our ministry as a result of this.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY MINISTERS' EMERGENCY FUND

- 1. The Sustenation Fund is to be used for emergency relief in the form of grants to effective ministers and lay pastors serving appointments whose salary is paid by the local church or conference treasurer, and who become disabled to the extent that they are unable to continue their work, and whose income is not adequate to meet emergency needs.
- 2. Emergency appropriations shall be used to bring the disabled minister's income up to a maximum of \$4200 per conference year. If the applicant receives other personal income in excess of \$4200 such additional income shall be deducted from the emergency grant. In no event shall the emergency funds be used to supplement an applicant's income of \$4200 or above.
- 3. Payment of this \$4200 will be made on the basis of \$350 per month. Payments will be made only during those months the applicant qualifies for Emergency Funds. No funds will be appropriated without three-fourths approval of The Joint Committee on Disability.
- 4. The Joint Committee on Disability secretary must place all necessary forms in the hands of the Cabinet members at the beginning of each conference year.

5. In all cases the application forms-District Superintendent, the doctor, and the applicant-shall be completed and forwarded to the chairman of the committee before approval of funds will be made. Any minister expecting to receive Emergency Funds at the beginning of the conference year should make application not later than two weeks before the annual conference convenes.

6. Funds will be made payable within thirty days following committee approval.

7. In cases where application for Emergency Funds occurs during the session of the annual conference, the applicant's District Superintendent, and the applicant when possible, shall present an oral application to a joint meeting of the Cabinet and at least three members of the Joint Committee on Disability. At this time appropriate action will be taken in keeping with the best interest of the applicant and in the spirit of the Emergency Fund. The written forms must be completed and placed with the committee within thirty days of this meeting.

8. All cases shall be reviewed at the middle of the conference year to determine progress made in each case. It shall be the responsibility of each applicant's District Superintendent to see that the progress reports-statements from the doctor and the District Superintendent-are completed and placed with the committee. Should this review of the applicant's disability reveal that he is capable of resuming work, it shall be the responsibility of the Joint Committee on Disability to bring this information to the attention of the Cabinet.

9. Should the disability continue beyond one year or through one annual conference, we call attention to the fact that the General Board of Pensions makes Medical Disability payments, based on a man's service years. We also call attention that it is possible that in some cases retirement may offer specific advantages over Emergency Fund aid.

10. Should the disability continue beyond one year or through one annual conference, The Joint Committee on Disability will conform to Disciplinary Requirements

as found in Paragraph 357 which demand annual conference approval.

11. We recommend that expenses of travel, telephone, postage, etc. for the committee be paid from the Emergency Fund.

BOARD OF THE LAITY

Report No. 1

The 1968 North Carolina Annual Conference met for the first time on the campus of Methodist College, Fayotteville, June 4-7. The Anniversary Hour of the Board of the Laity was held Wednesday evening, June 5, in the new Reeves Auditorium. The main address of the program was given by Mr. Roy L. Turnage, retiring chairman of the board. Mr. Turnage served as conference lay leader from 1963 to 1968 and becomes the first executive secretary of the board as of June 1968.

Mr. James T. Patrick of Durham was elected by the Conference to succeed Mr. Turnage as Conference lay leader, Mr. Patrick was former lay leader of the Durham District

and vice-chairman of the board.

Dr. L. Stacy Weaver, president of Methodist College, was recognized as "Layman of the Year." The presentation was made on behalf of the board by Mr. Charles K. Mc-Adams, newly-elected North Carolina Conference treasurer.

Dr. Paul Hardin III, associate Conference lay leader in charge of Leadership Development, gave a brief report on the legislation enacted at the Uniting General Conference

held at Dallas, Texas, April 21-May 4, 1968.

June 17-28-The annual set-up meetings of the District Boards of the Laity were scheduled from June 12 to 28 for the express purpose of orienting the eleven district boards on the program activities of the board for the Conference year 1968-69. Emphasis was given the quad ennial theme. "A New Church for a New World."

August 1-4-The annual Southeastern Jurisdiction Laymen's Conference was held at the Lake Junaluska Assembly Grounds with over fifty persons attending from the North Carolina Conference. The total attendance exceeded any previous year and reached over 2,000 persons from throughout the jurisdiction. The program gave emphasis to "The Laity United in the Living Word." Present for the first time were members of the former Central Jurisdiction and Evangelical United Brethren Church.

August 24-25-The 26th Annual Laymen's Retreat was held at North Carolina Weslevan College, Rocky Mount, the weekend of August 24-25. The keynote address was delivered by Mr. James T. Patrick, new Conference lay leader and chairman of the board.

Dr. Charles O. Coffman, director of Lay Renewal, from the General Board of the Laity in Evanston, Ill., served as resource leader for the retreat. The manual, In and for

the World, by Stanley J. Menking, was used as the study book.

Bishop William R. Cannon gave the closing address to the 300 laymen assembled for

the worship services Sunday morning, August 25.

October 13-Laymen's Day was observed in the local churches of the conference on this date. The theme, "The Urgent Fellowship," 1st John, first chapter, was recommended to be theme for the services.

October 24-26-The 10th Annual Southeastern Jurisdiction's Seminar on Christian Stewardship, was held at Scarritt College, Nashville, Tenn. Resource persons included Dr. George M. Curry of the Methodist Publishing House; Dr. John Humphrey of the General Board of Education; Dr. Joseph H. Yeakel of the General Board of Evangelism; and Dr. Hilbert Berger, of the General Board of the Laity. Mr. W. Jasper Smith of Bethel, Conference Director of Financial Resources, and Roy L. Turnage represented the board at the stewardship seminar.

January 23-February 19—Over 6,500 persons attended the 1969 District Lay Rallies in the North Carolina Conference, Approximately \$4,500 in Christian Vocational Scholarships was provided in the offerings received. Bishop William R. Cannon spoke on the 1968-1972 Quadrennial theme of the United Methodist Church, "A New Church for a New World." Mr. Walter F. Anderson addressed the rallies on the importance of tithing and emphasized the Fund for Reconciliation.

February 7-9-A National Consultation for Conference Lay Leaders was held in Chicago with the following persons representing the North Carolina Conference: Mr. James T. Patrick, Conference lay leader; Mr. Walter F. Anderson, chairman of the Commission on Stewardship and Finance; and Mr. William S. Marley, chairman of the Commission on Lay Life and Work.

April 12-13—Twenty-six members of the Board of the Laity attended the Regional Seminar on Lay Life and Work held in Greensboro. Delegates from four annual conferences were represented. Dr. William B. McPherson, Dr. Charles P. Kellogg, and Dr. Charlie O. Coffman were the resource persons present from the General Board of the Laity.

Mention should be made of the impact of the Lay Witness Missions on the Lay Renewal Movement within the general church. Scores of "missions" have been held throughout the North Carolina Conference under the joint sponsorship of the Board of Evangelism and the Board of the Laity. It is our conviction the Holy Spirit is working through this movement to bring spiritual renewal to many of our churches.

Much time has been spend during the year in seeking to interpret the program responsibilities of the various offices in the organization of the United Methodist Church relating to the activities of the Board of the Laity. The work is "cut out" for us. May Cod grant us the wisdom and strength to be "thou good and faithful servant" in the fulfillment of the opportunities before us.

Report No. 2

COMMISSION ON STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE

There is general agreement that among the many problems which currently face the United Methodist Church of the North Carolina Conference, one of the most challenging

is the development of a Spiritual Stewardship program.

Under directives of the Discipline the basic objective of the church as accepted by the General Board of the Laity is that all persons be ware of and grow in their understanding of God, especially of His redeeming love as revealed in Jesus Christ, and that they respond in faith and love to the end that they may know who they are and what their human situation means, increasingly identify themselves as sons of God and members of the Christian community, live in the Spirit of God in every relationship, fulfill their common discipleship in the world, and abide in the Christian hope. (Par. 1186).

There are many ways in which we might begin a program of challenge to our people in the North Carolina Conference. Perhaps many of them would work in some places. but not in all the churches that make up our great Conference.

After much prayer, a careful study and research of each of our eleven districts, it seems that a stewardship program that would be effective in each local church would best meet our needs and help our people to grow spiritually as they week after week

see the results of their own labors for Jesus Christ through the church.

In each of the eleven districts each local church could pay off all of its indebtedness, raise the budget for their own personal needs, pay off all the Conference programs and apportionments assigned to it, and have some funds to take on other programs which they desire for their own local church by getting their membership to tithe their income for just six months in each year.

The Burlington District, composed of 80 churches, 20,274 members, has property and assets of \$7,694,374.00 with an indebtedness of only \$692,091,00. This district paid last year for all causes \$1,143,754.00. The per capita income of the six counties comprising the district is \$2,119.00. This then would mean that the take-home pay for the members of all the churches in this district amounted to \$42,960,606,00. The tithe of this amount would be \$4,296,060,00. The tithe for just six months would amount to \$2,148. 030.00, or for two years, \$4,296,030.00. Now you see that all the indebtedness of \$692,-091.00, the remainder of the College Crusade of \$76,977.00, \$50,000.00 for Camp Crusade, and the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation, \$40.548.00, could be paid off in two years and still have to raise ministers' salaries serving and retired in the sum of \$1.768.-792.00 and to use for other needed purposes.

The Durham District, composed of 72 churches, 22,772 members, has property and assets of \$10,742,106.00 with an indebtedness of only \$1,158,839.00. This district paid last year for all causes \$1,373,453.00. The per capita income for the seven counties comprising the district is \$2,044,00 which means that the take-home pay for the members of the church amounted to \$46,545,968.00. The tithe would have amounted to \$4,654,-596.00. The tithe for just six months would amount to \$2,327,298.00. All the indebtedness of \$1,158,839.00, the College Crusade remainder of \$140,900.00, \$50,000.00 to Camp Crusade and \$45,544.00 to Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation could be paid and at the end of two years there would be \$1,769,331.00 to raise the salaries of ministers serving and on retirement and for such other causes as would be helpful.

The Elizabeth City District, composed of 74 churches, 12,688 members, has property and assets of \$4.688.308.00 with only an indebtedness of \$124.664.00. This district paid for all causes last year \$641,395.00. The per capita income for the twelve counties comprising the district was \$1 452.00 which means that the take-home pay for the members of the churches was \$18,422,976.00. The tithe of this amount would be \$1,842,297.00. The tithe for six months would be \$921,148.00, All the indebtedness of \$124,664.00, the remainder of the College Crusade of \$113,900.00, the Camp Crusade of \$50,000.00 and the sum of \$25,376.00 to the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation could be paid in full in two years and there would be \$511,667.00 to raise the salaries of ministers serving and on retirement and for such other causes as would be helpful.

The Fayetteville District, composed of 71 churches, 19,292 members, has property and assets of \$8,088,264.00 with an indebtedness of only \$1,208,997.00. This district paid for all causes last year the sum of \$1,204,564.00. The per capita income for the four counties comprising this district was \$1,615.00. The take-home pay for members of the churches was \$31,156,580.00. The tithe of this amounted to \$3,115,658.00. The tithe for just six months would be \$1,557.829.00. To pay off all the indebtedness of \$1,208,997.00, remainder of the College Crusade of \$51,569.00, Camp Crusade of \$50,000.00 and \$38,-584.00 for the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation, continue the local church budgets, it will take three years for this district, but then there will be the sum of \$1,372,439.00 to increase the salaries of the ministers serving and on retirement. You will take notice this is the first district in which the total indebtedness can not be paid off in two years.

The Goldsboro District, composed of 85 churches, 18,022 members, has property and assets of \$7.607.431.00 with an indebtedness of only \$761,768.00. This district paid for all causes last year the sum of \$956,055.00. The per capita income for the six counties comprising this district was \$1,853.00. This means that the take-home pay for the members of the churches in this district was \$33,394,666.00. The tithe of this amounts to \$3,339,466.00. The tithe for just six months would be \$1,669,733.00. The total indebtedness of \$761.768.00, the remainder of the College Crusade of \$61,574.00, \$50,000.00 to the Camp Crusade and \$36,044.00 for the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation can be paid

in two years with \$1,104,586.00 to be used to raise the salaries of ministers serving and on retirement and for other good causes.

The Greenville District, composed of 71 churches, 16,319 members, has property and assets of \$7,054,361.00 with an indebtedness of only \$571,964.00. The per capita income for the ten counties comprising this district was \$1,683.00 which means that the members of the churches had a take-home pay of \$27,464,877.00. The tithe of this amounts to \$2,746,487.00. The tithe for just six months would be \$1,373,243.00. This district paid for all causes last year the sum of \$931,216.00. The total amount of indebtedness of \$571,964.00, the remainder of the College Crusade of \$87,000.00, \$50,000.00 for Camp Crusade and \$32,638.00 for the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation can be paid in two years and have \$573,141.00 to raise the salaries of ministers serving and on retirement and for other worthy causes.

The New Bern District, composed of 73 churches, 15,979 members, has property and assets of \$6,270,720.00 with an indebtedness of only \$942,941.00. This district paid for all causes last year the sum of \$985,999.00. The per capita income of the six counties comprising this district was \$1,790.00 which means that the take-home pay of the members of the churches amounted to \$28,602,410.00. The tithe for just six months would be \$1,430,120.00. In just two years if all the members would tithe for six months out of each year the total indebtedness of \$942,941.00, the remainder of the College Crusade of \$82,800.00, \$50,000.00 for Camp Crusade and \$31,958.00 for the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation could be paid in full with \$435,546.00 to give salaries increases to the ministers serving and on retirement and for other worthy causes.

The Raleigh District, composed of 71 churches, 27,338 members with property and assets of \$11,335,325,00 and an indebtedness of only \$2,038,951.00. This district paid for all causes last year the sum of \$1,673,839.00. The per capita income of the three counties comprising the district was \$2,020.00. This means that the take home pay for the members of the churches in this district amounted to \$55,222,760.00 and the tithe of this amounts to \$5,522,276.00. The tithe for just six months would be \$2,761,138.00. Should all the members tithe their income for six months out of the next two years the total indebtedness of \$2,038,951.00, the remainder of the College Crusade of \$58,873.00, \$50,000.00 for Camp Crusade and \$54,676.00 for the Bishop's Fund for Reconcillation could be paid and then there would be \$388,132.00 to give ministers an increase in salaries serving and those on retirement.

The Rocky Mount District, composed of 84 churches, 20,629 members with property and assets of \$7,774,514.00 and with an indebtedness of only \$475,891.00. This district paid for all causes last year the sum of \$985,584.00. The per capita income of the six counties comprising this district was \$1,581.00 which means that the take home pay for the members of the churches amounted to \$32,614,449.00 and the tithe of this amounts to \$3,261,444.00. The tithe for just six months would be \$1,630,722.00. For all the members to tithe their income for six months for the next two years, the indebtedness of \$475,891.00, the remainder of the College Crusade of \$60,100.00, \$50,000.00 to the Camp Crusade and \$41,258.00 to the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation could be paid in full with \$1,002,671.00 to be used to give the ministers serving and those on retirement an increase in salary and for other worthy causes.

The Sanford District, composed of 80 churches, 19,478 members with property and assets of \$8,061,035.00 and an indebtedness of only \$573,308.00. This district paid last year for all causes the sum of \$1,072,251.00. The per capita income of the seven counties comprising the district was \$1,973.00 which means that the take-home pay was \$38,430,094.00 and the tithe of this amounts to \$3,843,009.00. The tithe for six months would be \$1,921,504.00. If the people in this district would tithe their income for six months each year for two years they could pay all their indebtedness of \$573,308.00, the remainder of their College Crusade of \$114,470.00, give to the Camp Crusade the sum of \$50,000.00, pay \$38,956.00 to the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation and have the sum of \$1,438,691.00 to give their ministers serving and those on retirement an increase in salaries and give to other worthy causes of the church.

The Wilmington District, composed of 76 churches, 15,186 members with property and assets of \$6,471,469.00 and only an indebtedness of \$674.685.00. This district paid for all causes last year the sum of \$829.843.00. The per capita income of the seven counties comprising the district was \$1,667.00 which means that the members had a take home pay of \$25,865,062.00. The tithe of this amounts to \$2,586,506.00. The tithe for six months would be \$1,293,253.00. The members of this district could tithe their income

for six months each year for two years and pay off all the indebtedness of \$674,469.00, the remainder of the College Crusade of \$95,330.00, give to the Camp Crusade \$50,000 and the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation the sum of \$30,372.00 with the sum of \$601,-835.00 to give to their ministers serving and those on retirement an increase in salaries.

In making this report you will see that an exception is made in only one of the eleven districts. Ten of the districts could pay all their indebtedness, the remainder of their College Crusade responsibility, their share of the Camp Crusade, and the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation and still have a balance in which to give to their ministers serving and on retirement an increase in salaries, in just two years if only their members would tithe their income for six months each year for two years.

The exception is the Fayetteville District which would be short the sum of \$185,390

because of the heavier burden placed upon this district.

Therefore, we recommend to the Board of the Laity that all our districts, all local churches encourage their members to tithe their income for six months each year for the next three years and that this become the Stewardship program for the North Caro-

lina Conference for the remainder of this quadrennium.

God has made a covenant with all of us and now it is time for us to keep His covenant. In Malachi 3:10-12 we read, "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it. And I will rebuke the devourer for your sakes, and he shall not destroy the fruits of your ground; neither shall your vine cast her fruit before the time in the field, saith the Lord of hosts. And all nations shall call you blessed: for ye shall be a delightsome land, saith the Lord of hosts."

Jesus said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto

you."-St. Matthew 6:21 and 33.

We truly believe that tithing is Biblical both in the Old Testament and in the New

Testament and in so doing we are putting God first in all of life.

While the material benefits of a spiritual tithing program would benefit greatly all the people called United Methodist in the North Carolina Conference, we also want to urge all our people to give unto God the tithe of their time and talents, in His service through the church.

LONG-RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Conference Committee on Survey and Long-Range Planning came into being by action of the 1952 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference. From the very beginning of the formation of this committee it has been involved in virtually every major forward thrust of this Annual Conference. Its value to the forward progress of our conference is inestimable. In the resolution creating the committee is the statement: "This could well be a real work of ecclesiological architecture which would bear fruit for time and eternity." This truth has been borne out year after year as the recommendations of the committee have become realities in the form of colleges, retirement homes, missions and church extension, and in almost ever area of the church's life. It is with this same prophetic thrust that this committee expects to continue its work of giving leadership and challenge to the North Carolina Conference.

The Work of the Committee Automobile Leasing

This Long-Range Planning Committee has conducted a rather thorough study of the many factors involved in an automobile-leasing plan for conference agencies. With the facts at hand, it appears that if the conference continues to pay the 7-8 cents per mile to individuals driving their own vehicles, the present plan represents a saving to the conference. If, however, the conference should move to the more generally accepted practice of paying ten cents per mile for the first 15,000 miles driven and seven cents per mile beyond the first 15,000 miles, then it would appear that a car-leasing arrangement would be more feasible.

Conference Office of Information

The Long-Range Planning Committee has made a rather detailed study of the need for an Office of Information within the conference. The value of good public relations is unquestionable. Many conferences within the Southeastern Jurisdiction have set up central Offices of Information with budgets that range from as little as \$2,000.00 for a part-

time office, to as much as \$30,000.00 for a full-time office. In most conferences the budget is set at about \$16,000.00 to \$18,000.00.

It appears to the committee that a fully staffed office with facilities to do a credible job of public relations an annual budget ranging from \$14,000 to \$19,000 would be re-

quired. Initial equipment would cost approximately \$13,000.00.

Your Long-Range Planning Committee brings this to the Program Council with the hope the Council may direct a fully detailed report to be presented at the next meeting of the Council with appropriate recommendations.

Maternity Home

The Long-Range Planning Committee is concerned with Christian Social Concerns. For some time there has been a recognizable need for a maternity home to care for unwed expectant mothers to be established within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church. Along with the Methodist Home for Children and the Methodist Retirement Home, this facility would extend the arm of Christian concern into a field of Christian service too long neglected.

The Long-Range Planning Committee has only begun its research in this field but the meager statistics already gathered seem to indicate justification for a continued study of this new form of ministry for this conference. It is hoped that the Program Council will give its approval of this study. We would expect to bring in specific information

and appropriate recommendation during the 1969-70 year.

Minimum Salary

The Long-Range Planning Committee is interested in the salary levels for ministers of this conference. We recognize that across the church ministers' salary is becoming a cardinal issue. We are aware of the growing necessity for higher salary ranges for ministers if we are to reasonably hope to recruit more young men for the pastoral ministry. We offer our support to all agencies of the conference working in this area of need.

The Long-Range Planning Committee is particularly interested in the Minimum Salary level of our conference. With this in mind the following resolution was passed and sent to Mr. Preston D. Page, chairman of the Minimum Salary Commission: That it be suggested to the Minimum Salary Commission that there be three levels of beginning minimum salary, one for each of the following classifications of ministers:

1. Conference member with B.D. degree.

2. Associate Conference member.

3. Lay Pastor.

Redrawing District Lines

The Long-Range Planning Committee is aware of the imbalance in/of the eleven districts within this conference: the lowest number of pastoral charges in a single district being 37 and the largest number of pastoral charges in a single district being 64.

This committee recommends to the Program Council that this committee, or a committee appointed by the Program Council, be instructed to study the lines of the districts within the conference to determine the necessity of redrawing the district boundaries and/or establishing another district.

MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

The Minimum Salary Commission recommends for the conference year 1969-70 that the minimum salaries for all ministers who are serving pastoral appointments be as follows:

1. Full-Connection, Probationary, and Associates: One or More Dependent Children, \$6,000.00; Married, \$5,800.00; Single, \$5,600.00.

2. Lay Pastor: One or More Dependent Children, \$5,200.00; Married, \$5,000.00; Single, \$4,800.00.

3. Students: One or More Dependent Children, \$4,000.00 plus travel*; Married, \$3,800.00 plus travel*; Single, \$3,600.00 plus travel*.

When a student pastor graduates either from college or Divinity School and begins to serve as a full-time minister, his minimum salary shall be equal to the requirements of his new status and will be paid him from the first day of the first full month served full time.

The Commission recommends that retired ministers, serving as Retired Supplies, and receiving Minimum Salary assistance, may receive up to \$3,000.00, including travel

and utilities, regardless of the amount of their pensions.

II. Principles Governing the Use of Minimum Salary Funds

The Commission urges each charge receiving Minimum Salary funds, its minister, and district superintendent so to minister the affairs of the charge that it may move as rapidly as possible toward full financial support.

To enable the conference, the commission, and the superintendents to carry on their

cooperative efforts in understanding, harmony, and for the greatest good for all con-

cerred the following principles and procedures are set forth:

ravel allowance is based on the distance of student's parsonage from the school he attends. When the parsonage is 25 miles or less, it shall be \$100.00; when the parsonage is more han 25 miles but less than 50 miles, it shall be \$200.00; when the parsonage is more than 50 miles but less than 75 miles, it shall be \$300.00; when the parsonage is more than 75 miles but less than 100 miles, it shall be \$400.00; and when the parsonage is 100 miles or more from school, \$500.00 shall be a maximum travel allowance.

Aid to Charges

 All requests for financial assistance on pastors' salaries for the succeeding year shall be presented by the district superintendent to the Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions not later than five days after the May Cabinet meeting.

2. The family or marital status of the pastor at the time of assignment to the charge

shall govern the amount paid the minister for the entire conference year.

3. In considering the salary for a charge, we call attention to the fact that the Commission on Minimum Salary must count salary, travel, utilities, bonuses, and expense allowances as salary in making appropriations to the charge.

a. We stress the importance of reporting all such contributions, so that all ministers

involved may be treated alike.

Dividing Charges

- 4. The Commission on Minimum Salary suggests that, as a general practice, no appointments be made with a membership of less than 300, if the charge is to expect Minimum Salary support. Divisions of circuits should be on the basis of mutual agreement by all churches on the circuit rather than simply from the desire of the larger church to withdraw for its own benefit and advancement.
- 5. When the division of a charge is considered necessary and minimum salary is to be requested for either of the new charges resulting from such divisions, such project shall be presented to the Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions not later than five days after the May Cabinet meeting, so that a satisfactory evaluation can be made by the Commission. Without its approval the Commission shall not be obligated to provide minimum salary support for either of the churches resulting from such division.
- In the division of circuits where one church seeks to become a station, it is recommended that such church assume all salary obligations and its proportionate share of single figure asking.

a. It is recommended that the remainder of the division pay 80% of pastoral support,

and its share of single figure asking.

b. The Commission on Minimum Salary further recommends that each charge which has received, or shall hereafter receive Minimum Salary aid, shall reduce this aid by 20% each year until the charge has accepted full self-support. The district superintendents are to inform all charges receiving, or to receive aid in the future, of this regulation which district superintendents should support. This requirement must be kept in mind in preparing for any requests.

mind in preparing for any requests.

c. When a charge has been established as a student appointment and desires to be served by a full-time minister, this change may take place at such tims as the charge shall pay 80% of the amount needed to provide such full-time ministerial support and

shall agree to reduce the aid by 20% each year.

d. When there is a division of a charge forming one or more student appointments, the student appointment must pay 80% of said salary.

A New Church as a Charge

7. When a new church is to be established and becomes a new charge, the district superintendent shall present for study the complete details of the proposed project not later than five days after the May Cabinet meeting. These details shall be presented to both the Conference Board of Missions and the Commission on Minimum Salary. If such new church is approved by the Board and Commission, the Commission shall provide Minimum Salary assistance and the Board shall supplement the salary to make it adequate, and shall assist the new charge in providing living quarters for the minister and a place to meet and worship. It shall be understood that each year the new charge shall accept more of the budget until it becomes self-supporting. We require that each new church shall become self-supporting in a period of ten years or less, or assume circuit status.

a. Exception will be made if charge has made a reasonable effort to become selfsupporting and is willing and able to increase salary at least \$300.00 annually, increase its one figure askings proportionately, and reach full support within five more years.

III. Resolution on Increasing Salaries of Ministers in the North Carolina Conference

In regard to the "Resolution on Increasing Salaries of Ministers in the North Caroline Conference" which was passed by the 1968 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference and included in the 1968 report of the Minimum Salary Commission, let

it be recorded that this Commission has been faithful to this duty and has complied with all of its requests and implemented the same.

BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

Report No. 1

The Board of the Ministry makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That Ministry Sunday be observed in every local church in the Conference on Sunday, September 21, 1969 (or as near as possible); that every minister give special attention to enlisting highly qualified men and women for church occupations; and that the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations and The Board of the Ministry provide the necessary promotion for this observance.
- 2. That each candidate for a license to preach be required to complete the "Studies for the License to Preach", either by correspondence from the Department of the Ministry, or in the Lay Pastors' School at Duke; and that no one be appointed to a church or charge who does not hold a valid license to preach issued by The United Methodist Church.
- That all candidates in the Course of Study take the prescribed courses in Approved Course of Study Schools and that financial assistance be offered to each as funds are available.
- 4. That the Conference give support to the program to be promoted by the Conference Commission on Continuing Education for Ministers and other cooperating agencies; that each minister be encouraged to continue his education throughout his career; and that the local churches be encouraged to cooperate by allowing for leaves of absence for their ministers, as provided in the 1968 Discipline, Paragraph 355.
- 5. That Counseling Elders be assigned to provide counsel for the Lay Pastors of the Conference in accordance with Paragraph 353 of the 1968 Discipline.
- 6. That the pastors who are new to the North Carolina Conference be required to attend the Orientation Workshop to be held during the summer.
- 7. That the Conference approve the plan for the Ministerial Education Fund in the Southeastern Jurisdiction and the plan for the Ministerial Education Fund of the United Methodist Church. In effect, this will be a Two Percent Fund until December 31, 1969 and a Three and One Half Percent Fund beginning on January 1, 1970. The apportionment to the Annual Conference will be based on the total paid for all purposes, excluding payment to World Service, Conference Benevolences, Advance Specials, new buildings, and the servicing of debts.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

First of all may I say that for this academic year, as well as for all others, the committee was hampered in what it could do because of insufficient funds. We were forced to place a ceiling of \$600 per academic year for any one scholarship-loan, regardless of the student's need.

Even so, we were able to help twenty-three (23) students with some financial assistance. Nine (9) of these students received the maximum of \$600 per academic year; seven (7) received amounts of \$500 or more; four (4) received amounts of \$400 or more; three (3) received amounts of \$300 or less. The twenty-three scholarships totaled \$11,-470.

A quick look to the academic year 1969-70 shows that we have at the present time twenty-one applications totaling some \$12,625.

According to the Conference Treasurer's report of May 28, we only have \$7,415 with which to work. Our giving in this area has not kept pace with the need. I am sure this situation will improve. This year for the first time on a Conference-wide basis each charge has been asked to include a specific amount in the budget for ministerial education. The report from the district superintendents to me is overwhelmingly gratifying in that over 80% of the churches have accepted their askings.

Just a word concerning the 2% and the 3½% plans for Ministerial Education. On January 30, 1969, each minister of the North Carolina Conference was mailed three each of two brochures. One explained the action of the General Conference regarding the Ministerial Education Fund of the United Methodist Church. The other explained the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference plans for implementing the action of the General Conference. It think we are all aware that by the end of this quadrennium we are to be giving, for the purpose of ministerial education, an amount equal to 3½% of the local budget, less the following items: payments to World Service, Conference Benevolences, Advance Specials, new buildings, and the servicing of debts.

This concludes the report of the Committee for Ministerial Education, and I thank you, Bishop Cannon, for the opportunity to make this report.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS

The North Carolina Conference Board of Missions has undergone a major reorganization with the beginning of the new quadrennium. The work of the Board of Missions is now carried out by the various standing committees along with some temporary committees. This report reflects the new organization with the committees submitting reports of their activities of the year. The year 1968-69 has been an exceptionally good year for the Board of Missions. While we have not realized all of our ambitions, good progress has been made.

Beginning with the year 1968-69, the former Commission on Town and Country Work became part of the Board of Missions. In coming to the Board of Missions, it assumed a new title, The Church and Community Committee. The Board of Missions has been

greatly strengthened by the addition of this area of work.

APPRECIATION

Our summary report would be amiss if it did not include a word of appreciation to our executive secretary, the Rev. LaFon Vereen. Mr. Vereen has been an able administrator and ambassador for the Board of Missions. We are indeed fortunate to have a person of his ability to be our executive officer.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND CULTIVATION

RUFUS S. STARK II. Chairman

The task of the Committee on Education and Cultivation is to engage the Methodist people in both study and action.

Study: To involve persons in becoming aware of the needs of this world, the implications of the Christian gospel in face of these needs, and how best the church can be God's people in mission to meet these needs. Action: To initiate and marshal support for mission opportunities, To enlist the peo-

their lives in personal involvement.

The committee is convinced that we are far from reaching the potential of our Conference. Although much has been accomplished in the past, the record of involvement of our Conference in Advance giving and in missionary personnel is far below that of most other Conferences in the Southeastern Jurisdiction. The committee has confidence, however, that when our people are made aware of the needs, they will respond.

Committee in Training

District secretaries have spent time in preparation and planning in two ways this year.

1. Participation in the Conference School of Christian Mission in Fayetteville in Aug-

ust. This was a basic training session and involvement in study.

2. Briefing session at the General Board offices in New York. This was done in conjunction with the district chairmen of Missionary Education of the WSCS of each district along with district secretaries. This briefing was invaluable in preparing our committee for its work.

Sub-Committee on Mission Studies E. R. PORTER, Chairman

Our Annual Conference is among those conferences leading the nation in involving local churches in Mission Study. This has been accomplished through an excellent Conference School of Christian Mission held each summer in two sessions: a weekend of study and a week of study. Not including resource persons, 265 persons attended the weekend and 281 attended the week of study for a total of 546. Follow-up has provided teacher-training opportunities in each district through Fall Mission Study Conferences.

Fall Mission Study Conferences

Fall Mission Study Conferences were held in each district with approximately 2,088 persons in attendance. Studies for this year included "New Forms of Mission," "Southeast Asia," and the Gospel of John.

The Sub-Committee is pursuing the possibility of an Inter-board School, sponsored by the Program Council. The school will be a weekend experience involving all Boards.

Plans are projected for this in 1970.

Plans are now under way for the 1969 school.

Sub-Committee on The Advance PAUL G. BUNN, Chairman

Our effort is to help our Conference reach its potential in becoming involved in meeting the specific needs of the church in mission through our giving. We need to be aware that our Conference is third from the bottom of the sixteen conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction. Our total Advance giving June 1967-May 1968 amounted to \$51,411. Our neighboring conferences gave as follows: Western North Carolina, \$380,314; South Carolina, \$187,899; Virginia, \$363,950. While we are not competing with other conferences and while circumstances vary in each, we are certain that our people will respond in much greater degree if they become aware of the full scope of our needs.

A brochure describing Advance opportunities for this year has been prepared and distributed to pastors, chairmen of the mission work in each local church, and local church chairmen of Missionary Education of the Women's Society. The General Board

has contributed \$200.00 to this brochure.

The full Board has adopted annual goals for non-recurring Advance projects at the following levels: World Division, \$20,000; National Division, \$15,000; UMCOR, \$8,000. This means that the committee can plan for projects and make appeals within these goals. An emergency appeal was made this year known as the Mutambara Water Project. The request was for a total of \$9,870.00 to be used in Mutambara, Rhodesia, for the purpose of constructing an irrigation on the farm center there. Specials were also requested for missionary support, Hinton Center, Beach Ministry and Biafran Relief (UMCOR).

Itineration

Mission interpreters (missionaries on furlough) were itinerated in every district of our Conference this year. Planning was done jointly between district secretaries and district chairmen of Missionary Education of the Women's Society. Over 2,643 persons attended sessions where these persons spoke, not to mention others reached through radio and TV. The schedule of itineration was as follows:

CHURCH AND COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

General

The year 1968-69 has been one of considerable flexibility as the Church and Community Committee has sought to relate itself to the particular role and mission of the church for which it is responsible. The committee understands itself not as a program agency but as a resource and service committee for the Annual Conference (see 1968 Discipline, paragraph 1368, sections 1, 2, 3, and 4). We believe that our function is to be trained in the several areas of responsibility that are given to us so that we can advise the leadership of our Annual Conference in the planning of strategy and program for the mission of The United Methodist Church in eastern North Carolina.

Sub-Committee on Town and Country Work

LEO C. THOMPSON, Chairman

- (a) Implemented the "Rural Church of the Year" recognition program which included the publication of the "Local Church Analysis Guide" and the selection of one church from each district to receive Certificate of Recognition and \$50.00 award at the Annual Conference session in Chapel Hill.
- (b) Worked with several charges toward the goal of effective realignment of charge boundaries, particularly in Pamlico and Wayne Counties.
- (c) Assisted in the establishment of effective policies of charge realignment through coperative action of the Board of the Ministry, the Board of Missions, the Board of the Laity, and the Minimum Salary Commission.
- (d) Shared in the leadership of the United Methodist Rural Fellowship Retreats, February 3-8, 1969, in Williamston, Fayetteville, and Warsaw.

Sub-Committee on Urban Work F. O. FITZGERALD, Chairman

(a) Has studied the need for city (metropolitan) and/or district Urban Ministry Committees to be organized where needed to establish and enlarge urban work and inner city programs.

(b) Has studied the need for specially-trained ministers for appointment to innercity taking into consideration the specialized tasks, training, and dedication required for

such work.

(c) Has studied the need for developing cooperative parish programs for ministry to inner-city to enable the church to serve all of the people in a given area.

(d) Has studied the need for the church to cooperate with other agencies ministering to people within the parish in an effort to provide a total ministry for the whole person.

Sub-Committee on Parish and Community Development George W. Johnson, Chairman

The Sub-Committee in its two meetings this year has spent its time in an attempt to define the nature of its work and its application to the needs of the North Carolina Annual Conference. We see the need to apply ourselves at the point of education in the meaning of parish (1968 Discipline, paragraph 106.3). We are convinced that parish is a term defined better by an area of need and service than by geography. Parish is as much attitude as it is program. There can be little parish program until there is a parish attitude. The parish concept is relevant to the problem of ministerial shortage and support as well as a possible new and challenging way of community ministry. We feel that concern in this area of ministry is needed in all levels of the life of The United Methodist Church—the Bishop, the Cabinet, the clergy, and the laity.

The United Methodist Rural Fellowship

PAUL G. BUNN, President

I. UMRF Retreats

The United Methodist Rural Fellowship held three retreats in three geographically strategic areas of the North Carolina Conference during February 1969. These retreats were held in Williamston, Salem (near Fayetteville), and Warsaw. None of the 63 persons who attended them had to drive over 100 miles to get to the retreat, other than certain resource persons. The program included these emphases:

(a) New Forms of Ministry

(b) The Lord's Acre and The Lord's Hour

(c) Research and Survey

(d) Renewal in the Rural Church

(e) The Board of Mission and the Rural Church

Two of the main concerns growing out of these retreats are the need for the realignment of parishes and the need for more experimentation in new forms of ministry.

One other concern was the matter of the inclusiveness of the UMRF. A name change was suggested: The United Methodist Parish Fellowship.

II. The United Methodist Rural Fellowship exists for these purposes in the North Carolina Conference:

(a) To strengthen the rural and urban churches

 (b) To develop and experiment with new forms of ministry and worship
 (c) To encourage parish realignment through multiple parish and multiple staff ministries, through mergers, larger parishes, etc.

(d) To provide a forum for discussion among lay and clerical persons

(e) To create a climate for mission

- III. The UMRF Breakfast during the Annual Conference, Chapel Hill The speaker will be Dr. Tracey Jones.
- IV. Executive Committee: Paul G. Bunn, president; James A. Tingle, vice-president; Milton T. Mann, secretary; and A. J. Riggan, treasurer.

COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION

W. B. CHALK, Chairman

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church, Inc., was chartered by the State of North Carolina to

facilitate the expansion of Church Extension within the bounds of the Conference.

The Board of Missions, Incorporated, has \$865,258.59 in a revolving fund for the purpose of helping those churches which cannot secure local loans and to help churches to secure construction loans until their money from the General Board becomes available. We are finding it more difficult for churches to borrow money since the interest rate has been raised. Last year twelve churches received construction loans. This revolving fund has been of crucial importance for many of our small churches. We have also helped four churches to refinance their loans.

During the past year your Board of Missions has secured two sites for a church. One is in the Blue Creek area of Jacksonville, N. C. and the other site is located in the Weyer-

haeuser Development in New Bern, N. C.

Ten Dollar Club

Since March, 1954, we have helped to build 74 new churches through the Ten Dollar Club. We have paid through the Ten Dollar Club the total amount of \$1,106,539.51. These 74 churches today are valued in excess of \$8,000,000.00. We desperately need new members for the Ten Dollar Club, if we are to keep pace with the population growth in our Conference. Since our last report, we have helped the following churches to build their first units:

July, 1968: Call No. 44-Arran Lake United Methodist Church, Fayetteville, N. C.

November, 1968: Call No. 45—Holy Trinity United Methodist Church, Greenville, N. C.; Coats United Methodist Church, Coats, N. C.

March, 1969: Call No. 46-St. Paul United Methodist Church, Jacksonville, N. C.

On September 15 of each year, the Ten Dollar Club Committee meets to approve churches to be helped by the Ten Dollar Club aid for the ensuing year. Church Extension Sunday will be held February 15, 1970. Our goal is at least one new member per church throughout the Conference.

Aid to Churches

The Board has endeavored to help churches through construction loans, through grants, and has assisted them in securing aid from the Rural Fund of the Duke Endowment. When a church loan becomes \$30,000.00 or more, we help to secure the loan from the National Division of the Board of Missions. We have helped churches secure loans in building parsonages and through our grant and aid program have made outright gifts to many of these churches.

Parsonage aid in the form of rental allowance cannot be given for longer than five years, and this must be reduced on a graduated scale. In ecoperation with the Commission on Town and Country Work (Committee on Church and Community) and the Women's Society of Christian Service a brochure entitled "A Guide for Building, Furnishing, and Maintaining Parsonages" has been compiled for the convenience of those interested in building parsonages. Free copies of this may be secured from 1307 Glen-

wood Avenue, Raleigh, N. C. 27605.

The North Carolina Conference Board of Missions at its Spring Meeting, April 10, 1969 adopted program plans and goals for the Conference year 1969-70. These proposals are herewith submitted to The North Carolina Conference Program Council and The North Carolina Annual Conference. If the recommendations are approved, The Board of Missions will immediately begin implementation. The report contains two general recommendations followed by the plans for the four standing committees of The Board of Missions.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATION I

We, the members of The Board of Missions of The North Carolina Annual Conference do hereby express our enthusiastic support of the goal of \$400,000 for the Bishops' Fund for Reconciliation and pledge to our Bishop, Cabinet, Program Council, and Bishop's Committee on the Fund for Reconciliation our fullest cooperation in the achievement of this goal and the implementation of approved projects.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATION II

We propose that each district plan and implement a series of sub-district workshops for laymen to discuss fully the following:

- 1. The task of the minister in light of responsibilities placed on him by the local church and the Annual Conference.
- 2. The cost to serve as a minister in fulfilling the responsibilities placed on him by the local church and the Annual Conference,
- 3. The necessity for strong pastoral charges through re-alignment and increased giving to provide:
 - a. an adequate work load for the minister.
 - b. adequate financial support and lay leadership for a total parish ministry.
 - adequate salary for the minister.

We further recommend that a Task Force of selected lay and clerical leaders be set up by each district. The training program for these Task Forces will be provided by a joint committee of representatives from The Board of the Ministry, The Board of Missions. The Minimum Salary Commission, and The Board of the Laity.

We recommend that this program be the major emphasis of the Conference year 1969-70. We believe that these workshops should be held immediately, and that these be given priority of scheduling on the calendar.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND CULTIVATION

We recommend a call to renewed commitment to the total mission of the Church. We believe that wherever human beings come to know the fullness of life which God intends, there God is at work in the world. Our mission then is two fold:

- 1. To proclaim to the world that any such action is God at work in the world, no matter who are the agents of action.
- 2. To be willing to be instruments of God's action as He seeks to bring persons to know this "abundant life", this full humanity.

The life and ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ enables us to know the intention of God as to fullness of life. We would seek to live and proclaim this full "manhood and womanhood" we find in his style of life.

Out of this understanding of mission we further recommend:

The Advance

The advance is our method for giving designated funds for the mission of the Church. It is "second mile" giving over and above World Service and Conference Benevolence Funds.

- 1. The first priority of the Advance shall be missionary support, seeking first of all to underwrite the total support of missionaries from our Conference; further, we set as a goal at least three additional churches or charges in each district taking missionary support. (Missionary support may be taken in amounts of \$750 to \$6,000 annually per missionary, or \$12,000 per missionary couple) Provided: That we allow two or more churches to make up the minimum support figure (\$750) if necessary.
 - Non-recurring Advance Goals for 1969-70
- a. Emergency Priority, World Division. James Stanford Memorial—La Merced Elementary School, La Merced, Peru, \$25,000
- b. National Division: 1. Association of Christian Training and Service (ACTS) \$1,000; 2. Hinton Rural Life Center, \$2,500; 3. Alaska Methodist University, \$2,500; 4. Lumbee Indian Work, \$5,000; 5. Paine College Land Development, \$3,000.
 - c. UMCOR-\$5,000.
- d. Conference: 1. Seashore Ministry, \$2,500; 2. Church Extension Sunday shall be February 15, at which time the cause of the Ten Dollar Club shall be presented.
- 3. Undesignated Advance gifts at the end of the Conference year are to be designated to the World Division Advance projects according to the priority listing adopted by The Board.

Mission Study

 Dates of The Conference School of Christian Mission are: The Week-end of Study: August 9-10; The Week of Study: August 11-14. The place shall be Methodist College.

2. Subject for study: a. "Reconciliation in a Broken World"; b. "Toward Understanding China and the Chinese People"; c. "The Inner Life and the Christian".

3. Efforts are to continue to offer the School as a core curriculum around which the Program Council can build an Interboard School.

4. District Mission Study Conferences are to be held in each District prior to November 1.

Itineration

Itineration of Mission Interpretors (missionaries on furlough and others of first hand experience) is to be arranged in each District at the convenience of the District Missionary Secretary and the best advantage for the District.

Newsletter

The CRISIS CARD, issued for the first time last February, will be continued with issues in August and January. It will be mailed to pastors, Chairmen of Mission Work Area, Women's Society Chairman of Missionary Education and Church Lay Leaders. The CARD will be edited by The Conference Missionary Secretary and The Conference Chairman of Missionary Education of The Women's Society.

CHURCH AND COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

A. General Recommendations:

- 1. That the goal for the minimum charge size in the North Carolina Annual Conference be set at 400 members (new congregations less than 12 years old excepted) and that positive steps be taken through charge realignment and other inventive forms of ministry to achieve this goal by the end of this quadrennium.
- 2. That the concept of the parish (see: Discipline paragraph 1.06.3) be emphasized in communications between local churches and the Annual Conference in an effort to broaden the understanding of the church and its ministry through the United Methodist Church in Eastern North Carolina.
- 3. That the Church and Community Committee be authorized to work more closely in the actual planning and implementation of the United Methodist Rural Fellowship Retreats in 1969-70. This closer relationship would allow greater versatility in program and a wider scope of interest and resources.

B. Specific Recommendations:

- That the Sub-Committee on Urban Work be authorized to plan for the participation of representatives of The North Carolina Annual Conference in the National Quadrennial Conference on Urban Work in the Spring of 1970.
- That the Sub-Committee on Urban Work be authorized to initiate planning for an Urban Life Conference for the ministers and laymen of The North Carolina Annual Conference in the Fall of 1970.
- 3. That the Sub-Committee on Town and Country Work be authorized to continue the Rural Church of the Year Recognition Program.
- 4. That the Sub-Committee on Town and Country Work be authorized to plan for the participation of representatives from The North Carolina Annual Conference in the Jurisdictional Quadrennial Conference on Town and Country Work at Lake Junaluska August 11-15, 1969.

COMMITTEE ON RESEARCH AND SURVEY

The following projects will be undertaken:

- Develop a Conference map locating each church and parsonage and seek to have printed copies available. Such a map could serve a variety of purposes, including:
 - a. the providing of general information.
 - b. becoming a tool for arranging district, sub-district, and parish boundaries.

- c. facilitating the finding of churches by those who are unfamiliar with a particular area.
- 2. Study the current survey and investigation practices used in the organization of new congregations. If the need is indicated, new instruments will be developed for such studies.
- 3. The committee will be available for such other research and survey projects as requested by the Conference.

COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church, Inc., was chartered by the State of North Carolina to facilitate the expansion of Church Extension within the bounds of the Conference.

We respectfully submit the following recommendations to the Program Council

for its approval:

- 1. We strongly recognize the need for District Boards of Missions and Church Extension and respectfully urge each district superintendent to procede immediately in the organization of a District Board of Missions and Church Extension. The purpose of this Board is to carry on the programs of Church Development, Special Ministries, and Church Extension within the District.
- 2. We recommend the third Sunday in February, February 15, 1970, be set aside as Church Extension Sunday, and that necessary promotional materials be prepared and sent out.
- 3. The Committee respectfully requests the Program Planning Council not to approve or hold a district or conference level Special Financial Emphasis in the churches of our conference three (3) Sundays before Church Extension Sunday.

BOARD OF MANAGERS, NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The annual North Carolina Pastors' School and Divinity School was held at Duke University, October 28-30, 1968.

Bishop William R. Cannon of the Raleigh Area gave the opening address at the Bishop's Hour. The James A. Gray Lecturer was Dr. Samuel Sandmel, Distinguished Service Professor of Bible and Hellenistic Literature, Hebrew Union College, Dr. Dow Kirkpatrick of First United Methodist Church, Evanston, was Convocation Preacher. Bishop Roy C. Nichols of the Pittsburgh Area was the First Frank S. Hickman Lecturer on the Ministry. The Alumni Lecturer was Dr. Joel A. Cooper of Central United Methodists Church, Favetteville, Ark.

Introductory Seminars were led by Professor Emeritus Kenneth W. Clark, Professor Herzog, and by a panel with Bishop Nichols, the Reverend Julius H. Corpening of Temple Baptist Church, Durham, and the Reverend Philip R. Cousin of St. Joseph's A.M.E. Church, Durham. The Divinity School Choir participated in the Chapel services of worship. Other features included a Ministers' Wives' Luncheon, general Alumni Association Luncheon, and an Alumni Reunion Dinner for Classes of 1933, 1938, 1943, 1948, 1953,

and 1963.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

Report No. I

Section A. Insurance:

- Blue Cross/Shield Hospital Insurance: We recommend that those claimants who
 currently are in Group 120—under 65, be transferred in their hospital coverage from
 the current policy, 25BL0L03, to a new coverage provided in policy 25CIR4P4D3.
- 2. Group Term Life Insurance: We recommend that beginning July 1, 1969, all ministers who are serving appointments in the North Carolina Conference be permitted to enroll in the Group Term Life Insurance Program except those ministers who are Part Time Lay Pastors. This recommendation carries the provision that when a minister leaves this conference, or is appointed without annuity claim upon the conference, he will be permitted transfer to a private policy, or discontinue his membership in this program.

We further recommend that beginning with the conference year 1971-1972 the premiums for the Group Term Life Insurance, \$21.42 for a family per quarter and \$19.80 per quarter for single minister, be paid from the apportionments in the Single Figure Asking Apportionment. These premium requests will be included in the budget

requests of The Board of Pensions in the 1969-1970 askings.

Section B. General Recommendations:

- We recommend for the 1969-1970 conference year a per service year annuity rate of \$71.00 for ministers and lay ministers retired; seventy percent of the approved annuity rate for widows.
- 2. We recommend special appropriations to the following persons in the indicated amounts:
- a. Miss Nannie Pattishall, an amount equal to a dependent child's service for 28 years of service;
 - b. Mrs. J. W. Smith, \$600;
 - c. James E. Mahoney, an amount equal to one year's credit;
 - d. O. E. Hall, an amount equal to one year's credit.
 - e. Garland Bailey, \$900.00.
- f. Mrs. James Carlton Stanford, and each dependent child, an amount equal to 10 years of service, and that the Board of Pensions make payment for Blue Cross-Blue Shield Hospital Insurance while the pension is in effect.
- 3. We recommend that the expenses of the members of The Board of Pensions and the expenses of The Special Study Committee, and the secretary's honorarium of \$1200 and expense fund be paid from current operating fund.
- 4. We recommend adjustments in the service records of the following persons for the time and type of service indicated:
 - a. William A. Seawall, 2 years, Approved Supply credit, 1954-1956.
 - b. William A. Crow, ½ year, Approved Supply credit, 1936.
 - c. Robert Walston, 1 year, Approved Supply credit, 1933-1934.

Section C. New Pension Legislation: We call attention to new legislation, Paragraph 1379.4 (a) (b) which states that a member of the conference who is under episcopal appointment and is employed in other employment is not eligible for pension credit for the time he is employed outside the church appointment. The Board of Pensions emphasizes this is General Conference legislation, therefore we will be abiding by this legislation.

Section E. Minister's Reserve Pension Fund:

The Board of Pensions is sensitive that it has two distinct areas of responsibility. First is very much aware that it is entrusted with the well being of those who have pension claims upon this Conference. This it is doing through a pension rate that exceeds the projected rate and through adequate hospital insurance. Secondly, we feel a keen responsibility for devising programs and policies which will give assurance of adequate pension for those now active ministers who will be looking to this Board for support at a future date. It is with both of these concerns that we present the following recommendation:

"The Board of Pensions requests the privilege of holding one or more workshops in each district during the conference year, 1969-1970, to which the following persons from each charge or church would be requested to attend: the Minister, The Chairman of the Administrative Board, The Chairman of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, and the Delegate to the Annual Conference. Others who are interested may attend. The time and place for each workshop will be cleared by the District Superintendent, the pastor of the church involved, and the Program Council. The purpose of these workshops is to explain the Ministers' Reserve Pension Plan, to answer questions and engage discussions. No resolutions or recommendations will be voted upon during these workshops. If, in the judgment of The Executive Committee of The Board of Pensions, and in the opinion of the Special Study Committee appointed to study The Minister's Reserve Pension Plan, there is sufficient interest to support a resolution to recommend transferring our pension responsibility to the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund, such information will be presented to the Board of Pensions and The Special Study Committee in order that they make whatever recommendation(s) that seem appropriate at the 1970 session of the Annual Conference."

Report No. II

THE MINISTERS' RETIREMENT FUND

The Constitution of The Ministers' Retirement Fund makes no provision whereby a minister may discontinue his membership in the fund without being penalized. We do not believe this to be the spirit or intent of those who organized this program, or of this Annual Conference. It is to correct this limitation that The Board of Pensons makes the following recommendation:

- 1. If a member in Full Connection has served five years or more since becoming a participating member and finds it necessary to withdraw from the fund, he shall be paid the amount he has paid into the fund plus the total amount the charges he has served paid into the fund during his years as pastor, with no dividend credit added, and terminate his membership.
- 2. If a minister in Full Connection has less than five years of credit in the fund, and finds it necessary to withdraw from the fund, he shall be paid the amount he has paid into the fund, with no dividend credit added, and withdraw from the fund.
- 3. The 1968 General Conference abolished the provision whereby a minister may be retired by Medical Disability. In its place a provision is made whereby a minister after recommendation by the Commission on Disability, may be appointed to Disability Leave. A pension would be paid on the basis of Approved Service multiplied by the current annuity rate. Therefore we recommend that if a minister is within 5 years of retiring either by 40 years of service or reaching age 65 he be permitted to submit

an application to the Board of Pensions granting permission to withdraw funds held in his name in the Minister's Retirement Fund. If the application is approved he will be paid the lump sum payment equal to the amount to be paid those members who retire at the present Session of the Annual Conference. This would terminate membership in the fund and no further claims would be paid.

RECOMMENDATIONS ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION

1. The 1968 Discipline, in Paragraph 161.4, provides the Administrative Board with authority to appoint a committee on Public Relations. We encourage each church within the Annual Conference to consider such a committee within its overall organization. In some of our smaller churches this may mean the appointing of one person to serve in this capacity within the local church. The Conference Commission will make available a guide, upon request, for the committee or person designated within each local church. This guide, How to Improve Your Church Public Relations, is an invaluable asset in planning.

2. Upon the recommendation of the Director, we find it necessary to have some type of training workshop for the District Directors and other interested pastors and laymen concerned with Methodist Information and Public Relations. It is, therefore, recommended that a workshop for the purpose of training be set in September, with the date to be approved by the Conference Program Council.

3. Since the Special Session of the General Conference is set for April 1970, we anticipate coverage for the news media within our Conference to be given by the Director.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION

During the past year the Methodist Board of Publication has carried out some sweeping changes relative to the publication of the North Carolina Christian Advocate and the operation of the Piedmont Press. Involved was the expenditure of close to \$100,000 on new equipment. The main item purchased was a new press to replace the one which had been in operation for forty years. Other purchases included a large folding machine, a paper cutter and a stitching machine.

A complete camera and plateniaking department were installed at a cost of about

\$12,000. Air-conditioning was installed in all areas except the offices.

Through the acquisition of this new equipment, the major part of our printing, including the North Carolina Christian Advocate, is now done through the offset process. The change was made in order to make fuller use of modern graphic arts techniques at a savings in cost. Through the change, we have very much broadened our capability in the use of color, reproduction of pictures, and in the use of line drawings. Also, we have made sizeable gains in production capacity.

We began the change-over in July, and it was not completed until December. Involved was the removal of old equipment and the installation of new. Also involved was the training of our personnel in the operation of new machines and their orientation to new printing processes. The services of the Rev. Ray Phillips in the carrying out of the change-over was an indispensable asset. His technical knowledge and practical experi-

ence in the printing field were used largely during the months of the transition.

Needless to say, these months were fraught with frustrations, with the facing of almost daily problems as we sought to maintain a relatively normal level of production. All of our employees are to be commended for their patience and faithfulness under difficult circumstances. We did not miss a single week of our publication of the Advocate,

although there were times when the issue was in doubt!

In January 1969 we came out with an entirely new format for the Advocate. We reduced the size from 9 inches by 12 inches to 6 inches by 9 inches, and increased the number of pages from 16 to 32. Also, we began the use of color. The response to the change has been overwhelmingly favorable. A small increase in the subscription price was also instituted at this time. Our present rate of \$3.49 for an individual subscription

is still below most of our sister publications.

We also began in January the printing once a month of an 8-page supplement for each conference, summarizing the conference program for the week ahead. This has been a cooperative venture with the Program Council and other conference executives of our two annual conferences. It has enabled our conference program builders to prepare and present to our pastors and laymen in one piece of literature once a month a condensed summary of what is to come. It is proving to be a useful tool for communication and interpretation.

In conjunction with the appearance of our new format, we launched a campaign for new subscribers. We laid emphasis upon getting Administrative Boards to subscribe as a body. The campaign netted us an increase in circulation from about 11,000 to 16,000, which represents the highest the North Carolina Christian Advocate has reached for some years. Much of the addition has come through churches adopting the All Adminis-

trative Board Plan and instituting the Every-Family Plan.

We feel that adoption of these plans is vital to the kind of support which the North Carolina Christian Advocate deserves and should get. We especially urge that as churches organize their new Administrative Boards in June, they place a subscription to the Advocate for every board member, and where possible for every family in the church. Both of these plans offer a substantial saving per subscription as compared to the individual subscription rate.

We are appreciative of the increased interest and support for the North Carolina Christian Advocate, which has been evidenced in many ways. Some pastors and laymen have given us the strongest possible support. We sincerely trust that many others will

follow suit in the months ahead.

We are not timid about urging this, for we know that unless our Methodist people themselves informed about church matters and religious concerns, they cannot maintain and develop the kind of leadership and loyalty to Christ and the Church which these times call for Regular access to the North Carolina Christian Advocate could make

the difference for the Methodist people of our state.

At the same time, we would point out that continued United Methodist patronage of the Piedmont Press is also vital to our production of a first-rate weekly religious news-magazine. Our revenue from advertising is almost negligible as compared to newspapers and secular magazines. If it were not for the Piedmont Press we would have to double the subscription price for the Advocate. It is, therefore, very much to our common interest to give our church printing business to our own Piedmont Press.

Taking the whole 12 months since May a year ago, we have not had a good year financially, as the attached financial summary will indicate. This has been due in large measure to losses sustained during the period of our transition and before installation of our new equipment. Since the completion of our changeover, however, we have brought

the operation into financial balance. The situation for the last several months augers well for the future, and would seem to vindicate our vote to upgrade our operation and make radical changes in the format of the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, Inc.

- 1. We recommend that the charter of the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc. be amended to provide for a membership on the board of up to 18 members, half of whom shall be from each of the two sponsoring conferences. This is proposed in order to give a broader base of representation. The present membership is ten, with five coming from each conference.
 - 2. In connection with the promotion of the Advocate, we recommend the following:
- a. That the goal of a subscription for every United Methodist family in the North Carolina Conference be reaffirmed as the over-all objective of our conference.
- b. That in churches where the Every-Family Plan has not been adopted, the members of the Administrative Board be enrolled as subscribers. In view of the leadership position filled by these officials, we recommend that the church take care of the cost of subscriptions through its regular budget or in some other suitable plan.
- c. That as an absolute minimum no congregation within the conference fall below one subscription for each 20 members. Pastors and lay leaders whose churches are below
- this token support are hereby urged to take steps to correct this serious deficiency.
 d. That Sunday, January 25, 1970, be observed as Advocate Promotion Sunday, and that an Advocate subscription campaign be carried out during January and Februarv. 1970.
- 3. That as far as can practicably be done, our various boards, agencies, and institutions patronize the Piedmont Press in their printing needs.
- 4. We recommend the following appointments for membership on the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc.:
 - a. Carl C. Wooten to succeed himself for a five-year period; term to expire in 1974.
 - b. J. Nelson Gibson, Jr. for a term to expire in 1972, succeeding Charles E. Jordan. c. Nicholas W. Grant, for a term to expire in 1973, succeeding O. Kelly Ingram.

Dr. Jordan has resigned due to ill health and the Rev. Mr. Ingram requested that he be replaced because of the pressure of increased responsibilities. The resignation of both was accepted by the board with deep gratitude for their years of distinguished service.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

RECOMMENDATION:

The Program Council of The United Methodist Church has designated the period from September 28 through November 2, 1969 as TOGETHER Emphasis Month. A churchwide campaign is scheduled to be conducted during that period in order to stimulate the circulation and readership of TOGETHER. A quota of 10,000 new subscribers has been suggested for the North Carolina Conference by the publishers. The Program Council of the North Carolina Conference is requested to endorse this campaign and to include it in the Conference Calendar. The Program Council is also requested to encourage the enlistment of a sufficient number of new subscribers to enable our conference to reach its quota.

An Explanation:

This recommendation does not come from the Committee on Publishing Interests, but it is conveyed by the Chairman of the committee to the Conference Program Council at the request of The Program Council of The United Methodist Church and the Publishers of TOGETHER. There is not time to call the Committee together for action in time for presentation of this matter to the Conference Program Council.

As a result of the union of The Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church into The United Methodist Church, there has been a unification of the operations and personnel of the publishing interests of the two former churches. This has brought the Methodist Publishing House to a new day in which there is enlarged service

to the eleven million members of The United Methodist Church.

The Publishing House received directives from the General Conference with regard to personnel. It reports that these directives have been met and that the transition to a revised organizational structure is going well and making satisfactory progress. This makes it possible for the Methodist Publishing House to provide better service to individuals, churches, and agencies.

At its annual meeting in October 1968, the General Board of Publication appropriated \$1,000,000.00 from the proceeds of the Publishing House operations to be distributed through the annual conferences to the conference claimants during this conference year.

There was an increase in the production and distribution of books and church supplies by Abingdon Press during the year. More than 4,000,000 copies of *The Methodist* Humnal have been distributed to date since 1966, One hundred ten titles were published

during the year by Abingdon, and nine of these were major book club selections.

In spite of the general decrease in church school enrollment and attendance, the circulation of church school curriculum materials showed an increase. Graded Press is the trade name of the Methodist Publishing House for all curriculum materials. Since 1964, more than 103 audio-visual projects have been produced. This has resulted in the distribution of 800,000 records and 1,100,000 feet of film—mostly filmstrips. In the fall of 1968, a new curriculum for youth was introduced in the church schools of The United Methodist Church. A second series of curriculum materials for adults is being prepared and is scheduled for use in the fall of 1969.

We regret to report that the general periodicals, Together and Christian Advocate, have experienced a further decline in circulation this year. The circulation report for Together for the May 1969 issue shows that there are only 1,355 paid subscriptions in the North Carolina Conference. In addition, there are 541 free subscriptions in our Conference. The ratio of circulation to member is 1 to 98.0 in this conference; 1 to 47.9 in this jurisdiction; and 1 to 17.2 in the United States. We urge all United Methodists of the North Carolina Conference to give their support to efforts to increase the number of subscribers to Together and to our own conference periodical, the North Carolina Christian

Advocate.

REPORT OF TRAFCO

As Chairman of the Television, Radio and Film Commission of the Program Council, the following proposals are suggested.

- 1. Cooperating with the Conference Committee on Adult and Family Life Ministry, we should like to initiate the possibility of a series of films on family life being offered to the various television channels within the boundaries of the North Carolina Conference. This would be a public service offering of the television station and we believe that a good series would be meaningful to the viewing audience in Eastern North Carolina.
- 2. General Trafco has projected a new radio program called "The Place" involving local youth, the local "rock" radio station, usually referred to as the "top 40" radio station, and a discussion format. This is a weekly program with local production, local youth and local hosts. The format calls for the playing on each 30 minute segment of five or six of the current favorite "Top 40" records with a brief discussion. The leader, either a minister or layman trained by TRAFCO, seeks a response from the youth in terms of what significance, if any, and meaning of life comes through to them through this rock music. It is not a program for sermonizing or moralizing, but combines the entertainment of youth with conversation which hopefully is relevant to life. A Conference Workshop for selected persons is proposed for October 7, 1969 at the Methodist Building in Raleigh, with leadership from our New York Office (alternate date October 9).
- 3. Despite the plethora of materials on television and television showings, many of our people are missing some of the best television viewing. We propose a cooperative effort with our Conference Committee on Adult and Family Life Ministry seeking through our North Carolina Christian Advocate to include a television viewing guide as part of their service to the Methodists of North Carolina.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The annual meeting of the Conference Board of Trustees was held at 2:00 p.m. Wednesday, June 5, 1968, in the assembly room behind the auditorium stage at Method-

ist College in Fayetteville, N. C.

The financial statement by the Board of Trustees presented by the conference treasurer to the 1968 conference, showed that funds totaling \$359,556.87 were held by the Board. This statement showed earnings for the year to be \$18,237.17; disbursements were \$7,238.80, all paid to the Board of Pensions.

The following officers were elected: J. W. Jenkins, Jr., Chairman; J. W. Page, Vice-Chairman; C. A. Dillon, Secretary; James H. Ward, Representative on the Methodist

Foundation.

The Board of Trustees held one mid-year meeting at the Methodist Building in Raleigh October 24, 1968. At this meeting, the trustees approved the sale by the Burgaw Church of a lot in Atkinson owned by the church and on which there were no plans to build.

Approval of the Board of Trustees was also made to discontinue Bethel Methodist Church of the Littleton Charge and to dispose of the property and absorb the church into

the membership of the Littleton United Methodist Church.

The chairman of the Board of Trustees has served during the 1968-69 year on committees of the conference that were instructed to purchase parsonages for staff ministers holding full-time assignment with conference headquarters. Three parsonages in the Raleigh area have been purchased. Two are held by the Board of Education for staff members and one is held by the Board of Trustees for residency by the Program Council director. Financing on these three parsonages was arranged through loans from the Board of Missions, and appropriations from the World Service and Finance Commission.

The financial report of the Board of Trustees, which will appear in the Conference Journal for 1969, will include a report of the funds held by the Board of Trustees for

the 1968-69 year.

1. The Commission Report of approved requests for supplemental appropriations will be submitted in Report No. 2.

2. We recommend that the Single Figure Asking formula approved by the Annual Conference in 1967 be continued as described on page 316 of the 1968 JOURNAL with the exception that Mission Specials also be deleted to arrive at the Net Total Money Raised.

3. We recommend that the following special offerings be taken in each local church and remitted to the Conference Treasurer as separate items. They are not to be included in the Single Figure Asking: Fellowship of Suffering & Service, Methodist Student Day, One Great Hour of Sharing, Race Relations Day, Interdenominational Cooperation Fund and Ministerial Education.

IV

LIMITING AND SUPPLEMENTING PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE BUDGET

1. District Superintendents' Fund:

(a) The salary of each of the district superintendents shall be set at \$11,500.00 plus \$1,000.00 travel expense. Such part of said salary that is paid out by such district superintendent to cover the actual costs of all those utilities applicable to the operation and maintenance of his district parsonage is hereby assigned as housing expense not to exceed the sum of \$800.00 for heat, water, electrical services and residential telephone. We recommend that all districts assume this expense. We recommend that an amount equal to 1% of the salary and travel be allocated for Ministers Retirement Fund and an amount of \$25.00 for moving expenses also to be assumed by the districts along with the cost of heat, water, electrical and residential telephone.

(b) To provide for Cabinet meeting expenses.

(c) We recommend the continuation of an annual appropriation equal to twelve times the current annuity rate be made to the Conference Board of Pensions for each district superintendent for 1969-70.

2. We approve the use of an amount up to \$4,000 to be provided by each district for the district superintendent for secretarial help and promotion of the district program.

3. The Commission recommends that each person who has authority to draw checks against an account of a conference agency be required to present annually to the full

membership of his agency a complete list of all checks drawn, justifying all checks with the budget approved by his agency.

- 4. The Commission recommends that each agency whose accounts are not audited in the treasurer's office be required to have an annual audit made and furnish this commission with a copy of it.
- 5. Under the Church Extension Fund the first \$45,000 is earmarked to be paid to the Board of Missions, Inc. for the revolving fund to be used for loans to build churches and/or acquire choice sites for new congregations or to repay money borrowed by Board of Missions. Inc.
- The Commission recommends that no conference agency's budget incorporate funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the North Carolina Annual Conference.
- 7. We recommend that monies paid by charges toward the Single Figure Asking be reported to the statistician by the Conference Treasurer and that all other funds paid by the local church be reported in the Pastor's report, Table # II.

8. We further recommend that no transfer of funds be made by any agency from one line item in the budget to another.

9. We recommend that the amount for office expense for the Executive Director of the Commission on Social Concerns now being budgeted by the Commission be included in the budget of the Board of Education since this staff person operates from the Board of Education offices.

V.

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the conference.

- 1. Christmas Offering 1969 for District Superintendents' program and/or projects which should be clearly defined in plenty of time to have successful promotion.
- 2. The Board of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar
- That the Board of Education be authorized to solicit from church groups and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the four camps of the North Carolina Conference.
- 4. Interconference Commission on Campus Ministry for the privilege of private solicitation for special gifts for the benefit of special works in the state-supported institutions.
- 5. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.
- The Methodist Home for Children for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.
 - 7. The Methodist Foundation, Inc., as provided in its charter.
- 8. The Rural Church Fund, for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.
- 9. Louisburg College, Methodist College and North Carolina Wesleyan College for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto with the understanding that such solicitation or private campaign may not be taken into the local churches of the conference.

VI

We recommend the continuation of A. M. Pullen & Company as auditors.

We recommend that the president, the vice-president and secretary of the Commission on World Service & Finance and the Conference Treasurer shall serve as the executive committee of the Commission on World Service & Finance.

We recommend that the Conference fiscal year close May 31, 1970. We further recommend that we meet our financial obligations to the General Conference by December 31 each year which coincides with the General Conference fiscal year.

We call attention to the fact that the pastor's salary as set by a charge's Quarterly Conference is for a conference year; that is, from one session of the Annual Conference to the next session of the Annual Conference. In keeping with our recommendation that the conference fiscal year close May 31, we recommend that each Charge pay the salary promised the pastor for the Conference year by that date.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

Recognizing that God is leading us to joyfully celebrate the Gospel together as The people of God, we choose as our theme, "THE LAITY IN THE CELEBRATION OF THE GOSPEL. March 14, 1970-10:00 A.M., Burlington and Durham; 1:00 P.M., Fayetteville, Sanford, Wilmington and Goldsboro.

2. That the Conference request each local Church to make plans to secure and use

the new 'Methodist Hymnal' not later than 1972.

- 3. That every local Church in the Conference observe 'The Christian Year' as outlined in The Methodist Hymnal (numbers 674-714) and explained in United Methodist Curriculum Materials, and that the N. C. Conference Calendar continue to list the recommended Scripture Lessons for each Sunday.
- 4. That there be District (and/or bi- and tri-district) Seminars on the theme, "Rethinking the role of the Laity in the Worship of God," sponsored jointly by the Board of the Laity and the Commission on Worship. We request that the dates of January 19, 21, 23, 26, 28, 30 (1970) be reserved for these seminars.

5. That each local Church be encouraged to appropriately observe the "Great Day of United Methodist Singing" in November each year.

6. That United Methodist families be encouraged to worship God in their homes as well as in the assembled congregation.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING MINISTERIAL SALARIES

STATEMENT:

It is the concern of St. James United Methodist Church, Tarboro, N. C .- and all Methodists—that ministers are leaving the church in ever-increasing numbers.

While there may be many reasons for this development, it may well be that the single most important reason is the inability of a well-educated man to provide reasonably for his family as a Methodist minister in today's prosperous society.

There are faults with our system of determining salaries:

- 1. Salaries are too low. We cannot ask our ministers to live in an economic society sustained largely by their spiritual dedication.
- 2. The system of setting minimum salary levels is unrealistic. It presents a rigid system in which ministers are moved when they are "ready" for a higher paying church. Actually, the system requires that a man must be fitted to the salary rather than his talents fitted to the needs of the church.
- 3. While longevity is important in any energetic advancement consideration, the system presents a discouraging picture to the energetic minister ready to apply himself to the challenges of our larger churches.

4. Travel allowances are still influenced by the apportionment burdens once placed upon the minister's salary. The district work fund still remains and should be removed as a percentage apportionment of the pastor's salary.

Travel allowances are still considered by many churches to be "salary," and this is totally unrealistic in view of the minister's need to travel for his congregation.

In view of the foregoing statement, I move that a special task force be appointed composed largely of responsible business men with broad administrative experience. This task force is to be instructed by this Conference to study the following:

- 1. Establishing a minimum and maximum salary for each charge. This would permit a church paying more than the minimum to reduce its salary in order to receive a younger minister at a lower salary than his predecessor. This would provide a younger minister the opportunity to move to a larger church with an appropriate increase. Today he would be denied the opportunity because of our rigid salary minimum.
- 2. Setting a policy under which the minister is paid his actual travel expense in a realistic and businesslike manner.
- 3. Applying continuous effort to increase our ministers' salaries and bring salary levels in line with other churches in the communities.
- 4. Stabilizing expenditures in other areas of church concern until ministers' salaries can be adjusted.
- 5. The study is to be completed in twelve months and reported to the next Annual Conference with recommendations for specific action. A six-month interim report is to be made no later than December 1, 1969, to each charge in the Conference.
- 6. That our bishop may appoint a special task force composed of a group of leading laymen and others to study the matter of salaries in the North Carolina Conference as outlined in the statement of St. James United Methodist Church as submitted by S. R. Satterthwaite, this study to be reported to our next Annual Conference.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE "BLACK MANIFESTO" OF THE NATIONAL BLACK ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church and those bodies which merged to form it, have not only recognized their duty and obligation to all citizens of God's kingdom, but have also taken constructive action toward helping all persons in need; and

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church in America has most recently taken constructive action to help persons in need by establishing the "Fund for Reconciliation," a fund to contain 20 million dollars to be administered by the Council of Bishops of The United Methodist Church with advice and recommendations from a separate group of advisors; and

WHEREAS, there has been presented by a certain group of individuals calling themselves the National Black Economic Development Conference, a "Black Manifesto," demanding "reparations" from the churches of America for alleged injustices to, or exploitation of, black people in America; and

WHEREAS, that group of individuals has, by its "Black Manifesto," threatened to use force or revolution to gain its announced aims; and

WHEREAS, the demands and threats contained in the "Black Manifesto" are considered to be contrary to the teachings of Christianity, and they are particularly repugnant to the doctrines and philosophy of The United Methodist Church; and

WHEREAS, while The United Methodist Church welcomes new ideas, advice, recommendations and cooperation from all citizens of God's kingdom, it deplores and will resist any attempt to, or suggestion that, it distriminate in its programs of carrying on God's work;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH:

- I. That all persons be encouraged to support by their gifts, their prayers, and their services the Fund for Reconciliation, and other similar programs of The United Methodist Church.
- 2. That our bishop is called upon and all other duly-constituted officials of this Conference are instructed to take such appropriate action as necessary to insure that no money or other assets of The United Methodist Church be given to the National Black Economic Development Conference or any other group making or supporting the "Black Manifesto" or any similar demand for reparation.
- 3. That the North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church commend the Executive Committee of the General Board of Missions for its refusal to appropriate funds to the promulgators of the "Black Manifesto."
- 4. That a copy of this resolution be sent to the presiding bishop and conference secretaries of all other annual conferences of The United Methodist Church in America and to the General Board of Missions, including the National Division, Women's Division and World Division, and to the general secretary of the National Council of Churches to the end that they may adopt a similar resolution.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING CONSULTATION BETWEEN THE NORTH CAROLINA AND WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCES

Therefore, Be it Resolved:

That the Bishop and Cabinet Representatives of the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference plan and conduct a Consultation on Coperation between the Western North Carolina Conference and the North Carolina Conference.

That the Representatives in the Consultation be composed of the two Bishops, five Cabinet Representatives (selected by the Bishops), five Representatives from the Conference Program Councils (selected by the Bishops and the Program Directors), the Program Director from each Conference, the Lay Leader from each Conference, the President of the Women's Society of Christian Service from each Conference and the President of the Conference United Methodist Youth Fellowship.

That these Representatives shall meet together to explore and determine areas and ways for cooperative action and joint endeavor by the two Conferences.

And be it further resolved that this Consultation be held the first six months of the new Conference Year to assist both Conferences while in the formative stages of new Conference Programs, to consider what might well be done together in both immediate and long-range projects.

Herewith is presented our report on the operations of the various boards and committees, the funds of which are handled in the Central Treasurer's office, for the 1968-1969 Conference Year ended May 31 1969, consisting of the schedules as set forth in the index.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

The scope of our examination is contained in our opening letter. Certain features of the examination are set forth below.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges, as shown by the Treasurer's records, was confirmed directly with the pastors, and minor differences reported to us as of the date of this report were adusted or satisfactorily explained.

Distribution of income from charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1968 and 1969 sessions of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorizations from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and of the various boards and funds were either inspected or, if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1968-69 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits in the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorization for the distribution of 1968-69 collections.

REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

The Women's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild closed its first year as a new organization of the United Methodist Church singing "Hope of the World, we would be faithful to Thy gospel glorious."

In June 296 women graciously heard Miss Ethelene Sampley and the Reverend Bob Gibbons as they led a spiritual growth retreat at Louisburg College. The Wesleyan

Service Guild held a spiritual growth retreat in May at Camp Rockfish.

A total of 546 persons attended the School of Christian Mission held in August at Methodist College, Fayetteville. The Women's Society has considered it a privilege to help with this conference-wide project to instruct and inspire the leaders in the local church that they may perform at their best.

Mrs. Margaret Minor, one of the two new members-at-large of the executive committee who were formerly members of the Eastern District, represented the Women's Society at the Leadership Training Workshop in Chapel Hill last July.

Several members of the executive committee attended the Mission Renewal Conference in September in Charlotte sponsored by the Women's Division. Also three persons on the executive committee and one representative from each district attended the Board of Missions Seminar in New York City in October.

Two delegates attended the Regional Human Rights Seminar in February in Frogmore, South Carolina, which was sponsored by the North American Unit of the World Federation of Methodist Women. It was a follow-up of the 20th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights as drawn by the United Nations General Assembly.

The annual meeting was held in Rocky Mount in March with 870 women in attendance. A very interesting and challenging program was presented featuring the following outstanding speakers: (1) Bishop William R. Cannon; (2) Miss Gene Maxwell, regional secretary for the Women's Division; (3) Dr. J. B. Holt, associate dean of Perkins School of Theology, SMU, Dallas, Texas; (4) Miss Theressa Hoover, associate general secretary of Women's Division. The Women's Society pledged \$126,690.00 to missions for a seven months year.

The Wesleyan Service Guild held its annual meeting in Fayetteville in March also and featured Dr. Robert Lundy of the Board of Missions, and Mrs. Ruth Collins of Atlanta, Georgia, who is regional staff member of the Women's Division of the Board of

Missions. There were 296 women who attended this week-end meeting.

We are excited about our new beginning and believe that the merger of The Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church, along with consolidation with the former Central Jurisdiction, will prove fruitful and glorious for the Women's Society of Christian Service.


