Methodism did not take root in America until the late 1760s, although John Wesley organized an evangelical group within the Church of England at Savannah, Georgia, in 1736.

Eastern North Carolina was among the sections of the original Colonies where Methodism began to flourish before the Societies were organized into the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1784.

Within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference are two Official Shrines of United Methodism. Both were designated Shrines by the General Conference because of their historic significance to the denomination. Bishop Francis Asbury, the father of Methodism in America, preached at each place.

Green Hill House

In April, 1785, near Louisburg, the Green Hill House was the scene of the first annual conference of the newly organized Methodist Episcopal Church, which had its inception in the famous Christmas Conference of 1784, held at Lovely Lane Chapel in Baltimore, Maryland. In a spacious "Upper Room", twenty preachers from thirty-one circuits on the continent met with the newly consecrated superintendents Asbury and Coke and reported nearly 1,000 new members. A lay preacher and colonial political leader, Major Green Hill, served as host for this and three future conferences, two in 1792 and one in 1793.

Whitaker's Chapel

The North Carolina Annual Conference, the oldest conference in the Methodist Protestant Church, was organized in Whitaker's Chapel on Friday, December 19, 1828. Whitaker's Chapel, which was first erected in 1740, is located near Enfield. It was not until April, 1970, however, that the General Conference designated the Chapel as the Fifteenth Shrine of American Methodism. The designation climaxed a six-year effort on the part of the North Carolina Conference Historical Society and following the restoration of the Chapel by the late J. Waldo Whitaker, preserving faithfully its 19th century atmosphere.

THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH (Southeastern Jurisdiction)

I Composition: The North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church is composed of:

- (1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
- (2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
- (3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.
- (4) The Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction.

II Organization: The organizing dates of the four former Conferences were as follows:

- (1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church, 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina
- (2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia
- (3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.
- (4) The Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference was organized at a special session on August 11, 1964, at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina.

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, or more than twice on the same question under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and later) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.

II. VOTING PROCEDURES

1. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.
2. Election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences: Only clerical members in full connection and elected and registered lay delegates may vote. (Alternate lay delegates may not vote except in the absence of the delegate and then only if they are duly registered in lieu of the delegate.) All votes must be cast in the bar of the conference as determined by the conference; votes must be cast upon the official ballots authorized by the conference; ballots shall be placed by individual delegates in ballot boxes; whereupon the bishop shall declare the balloting closed.

The official ballots furnished to the delegates shall be numbered consecutively and no vote shall be valid unless cast upon the ballot bearing the number designated by the presiding officer for such particular balloting. In the event a ballot is defaced, it may be exchanged at the secretary's desk for another ballot bearing the same number. Ballots furnished to lay delegates shall be different in color from those furnished to clerical delegates. Ballots shall be distributed to official delegates by the secretary at the time the presiding officer calls for the first ballot.

III. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
4. Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.

5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except those cases in which the *Discipline* directs otherwise. Near the end of each quadrennium, the Chairman or President of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall submit a list of qualified suggested nominees to the Bishop and his Cabinet for their consideration in the formation of new Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The nominees shall be consulted about their nominations. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference. At the beginning of each quadrennium all Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall elect their officers only after all their members have been properly notified of the organizational meeting.
7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
8. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
10. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
1. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
2. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
3. Courtesies and Introductions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Introductions annually, at the first session of the Conference.
4. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
5. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

IV. REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS, MOTIONS, AMENDMENTS

1. All reports to be presented to the conference shall be sent to the conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Program Council and published in the conference calendar.
2. All resolutions to be presented to the annual conference affecting the structure, policy and function of any board or agency of the annual conference, shall be submitted in writing to the conference secretary with copies for all the delegates twenty-four hours prior to consideration by the annual conference, and not later than the second night session of the conference.

3. All motions presented to the annual conference, and amendments to any paper shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the conference secretary at the time of presentation, or immediately following.

V. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Charge Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in triplicate, to the conference secretary.
3. When necessary, substitutions shall be by election of the Charge Conference called upon authorization by the district superintendent. No person will be seated unless duly elected by the Charge Conference as the regular or alternate delegate. Notice of change in delegates must be sent to the Conference Secretary at once.

VI. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
2. Charge and church treasurers shall make final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on or before the date scheduled by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, and each pastor shall complete and submit Table I to the conference statistician on or before the opening date of the annual conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastor reports.

VII. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The conference claimants, lay members of the conference boards, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other institutions and agencies of the General Church as he may deem advisable. Six copies including copy for lay delegate to annual conference shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$2.00 each, or single copies by mail at \$2.25 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VIII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be eleven.
2. A district conference shall be held annually, in each district, if authorized by the annual conference.
3. The District President, the Sub-District Presidents, and the local church President of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship shall be delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the *Discipline* as ex-officio members.
4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.

5. The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish the Conference Treasurer as early as possible following the completion of the Charge Conferences an official copy of the acceptances of the Single Figure Asking and a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Charge Conferences. The figures furnished by the District Superintendent to the Conference Treasurer shall be used by the Statistician to compile his report to the Annual Conference.

IX. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference.

X. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

SPECIAL SESSION
of the
NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE
EDENTON STREET UNITED METHODIST CHURCH
Raleigh, North Carolina
February 21, 1970

Opening: The North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, convened in Special Session at Edenton Street United Methodist Church in Raleigh, North Carolina, February 21, 1970, at 10:00 a.m., with Bishop William R. Cannon, resident bishop, presiding.

Devotional: Hymn No. 293, "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken." The Invocation and devotional was given by the Reverend T. Marvin Vick.

Announcements: W. C. Wilson, Conference Secretary, gave instructions for registration and made motions concerning the Rules, the Bar of the Conference and the agenda for the Special Session.

The motions were adopted.

Purpose of the Special Session: Bishop Cannon stated the purpose of the Special Session was organization of the Program Council staff.

Presentation of Proposed Plan: Bishop Cannon introduced Dr. A. K. King, Vice-Chairman of the Program Council. Dr. King opened with a brief prayer and then requested that N. W. Grant, Director of the Council, explain the duties and membership of the Program Council.

Resolution Read: Dr. King read the resolution presented by M. W. Lawrence and adopted by the North Carolina Annual Conference in Chapel Hill June 1969, as follows:

"Be it resolved that the Program Council of the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church, in planning and implementing the program of the Conference, look with favor to the reorganization of the staff giving consideration to effectiveness and economy."

Explanation of Plan: Dr. King then gave a brief account of the several meetings held by the Executive Committee in drafting and perfecting a Plan of Staff and Agency Reorganization to submit to the Program Council for study and approval, and later presentation to the Special Session of the Annual Conference for adoption. The "Recommended Staff and Job Description" was reviewed and its chief provisions pointed out by the Vice-Chairman. After a thorough discussion of the new plan, previously printed and distributed by mail to the delegates, Dr. King moved its adoption. (This document as amended appears at the end of the Minutes).

Discussion Period: Bishop Cannon stated that before final action be taken the body would have an opportunity for questions about the document, to

make corrections, and offer amendments. The Chair requested the Director of the Program Council, N. W. Grant, to lead the discussion period.

Inquiry: Clarence Warren asked the Chairman how and to what extent the proposed plan would effect actual economy.

N. W. Grant, Director, answered: "It will reduce staff members from 9 to 7, therefore cutting the cost of travel, office expense, etc."

Paul Browning: "Mr. Chairman, we would like to know in terms of dollars and cents what the saving will be."

Dr. King: "If it becomes a primary motive of economy you are losing the point of the program."

N. W. Grant: "I suggest that the Conference Treasurer's report in the 1969 Journal be used in making the comparison."

Reginald Ponder: "The page reference in the 1969 Journal is page 322."

Charles McAdams, Conference Treasurer, rose to answer the inquiry, stating that he had anticipated the question and that really the answers are variable. However, based on the staff now existing, the recommended salary reduction will amount to \$28,046.00.

Question: Wilbur Jackson, "Who would determine salaries of the new directors?"

N. W. Grant: "The Commission on World Service and Finance?"

Question: Tice Mahla asked what have been the improvements in other conferences that have adopted this or similar plan.

N. W. Grant: "The committee has studied the Baltimore, Western North Carolina, and Virginia Conferences. We found that there has been no injury to the work. The team concept has brought about more thorough and coordinated work."

Question: Harvey Woodruff expressed concern about dissolving a job by good executive and wanted to know where the flow of fresh ideas would come from.

N. W. Grant: "As of now the decisions are made by those away from the local church. We are hoping that the new plan will make for greater involvement and participation by the local church."

Question: Sam McMillan inquired, "Why is the Youth Fellowship not related to any group?"

N. W. Grant replied that this was inadvertently omitted.

Question: Roderick Randolph inquired how paragraph 1109:1-5 related to the new program in its application.

N. W. Grant: "There is no conflict. All the functions stipulated can be implemented within the framework of the proposed plan."

Clarification: Amos Stone asked for a clarification of the tenure of these new jobs.

N. W. Grant: "The Coordinating Council has set up an eight-year limit. If a person was appointed to a job previously held, tenure would be retroactive and date from the first appointment."

Wilbur Jackson inquired if the laity would be considered for staff appointments.

N. W. Grant: "The laymen are eligible for staff appointments."

Motion: Herman Winberry moved to delete No. 12, under II B (paragraph 1109:1-5, *Discipline*) from the proposed plan.

This was accepted by the Director.

Inclusion: Sam McMillan suggested that under Section II-A 1, and Sec-

tion IV-A add a number 10 to both—United Methodist Youth Fellowship.

This was accepted.

Motion: An unidentified delegate moved that the words "mutually agreed" be deleted wherever they appear and substitute therefor "assigned by the Program Council."

The motion was lost.

Additions: Wes Brogan requested Child Day Care Service and Kindergarten to be added as No. 6 under IV-B. This was accepted.

He also requested the addition of 7 under IV-B, to promote ministries to persons under IV-B. This was accepted.

Motion of Tenure: Graham Eubank moved that the tenure of new staff members be six years instead of eight years which now applies for Board membership. He based his argument on the tenure adopted by General Conference for Superintendents.

The Chair put the question on the Eubank motion for six years tenure.

The result of the vote was, for: 294; against: 181.

The Chair indulged discussion of the action just taken on tenure.

Point of Order: Langill Watson raised the question of legality of tenure being discussed and voted on since it was not brought out in the paper distributed and was not included on the agenda.

Graham Eubank contended that the matter of tenure was germane to the paper and was supported by the Chair.

Paul Carruth stated that Dr. King had mentioned tenure in his opening remarks.

Reginald Ponder moved that the Bishop rule the vote out of order due to the adoption of the eight-year tenure by the 1966 Conference.

Clarence Warren stated that the discussion of tenure was in order.

Horace Quigley moved to defer action on the Eubank motion fixing tenure to six years until Annual Conference in June.

Bishop Cannon made the following statement: "The Chair rules that due to the question being answerable it is important for you to know the tenure. Therefore, he rules the Eubank motion is in order, and the vote sets tenure at six years and it applies."

Motion: Malloy Owen moved extension of the Bar of the Conference due to latecomers having to be seated in the balcony. The motion carried.

Motion: W. K. Quick moved that a recount be taken on the previous vote on tenure. The motion was lost.

Tenure of Laity: Wilbur Jackson discussed reasons for the laity not to be included in the six-year tenure, and so moved.

Willie S. Teague expressed the opinion that the same tenure should apply to both clergy and lay.

Randall Baker spoke in favor of longer tenure for the laity.

Paul Carruth spoke for equal tenure.

Wes Brogan stressed the importance of knowing when a person should be relieved of his duties if he was not bringing to the work the growth and understanding needed.

Vote on Lay Tenure: The vote was called on tenure of laity. The six-year tenure will not apply to laity who become members of the staff. The vote: for the Jackson motion, 302; against, 150.

Malloy Owen favored a system of rotation.

Ed Earnhardt spoke in favor of tenure based on the time when the assignment was made.

Al Fisher made a motion that the assignment become a new job as of 1970 without becoming retroactive.

The Fisher motion was defeated.

Denny Wise spoke but his remarks were inaudible.

Marvin Vick inquired: "how can a job have tenure when the office is non-existent?"

Previous Question: Harvey Johnson moved the previous question on all that was before the body.

Bishop Cannon called for the vote on the paper. The paper was overwhelmingly approved.

Absence noted: The absence of Henry Ruark, Elizabeth City District Superintendent, was called to the attention of the Conference. Mr. Ruark will be undergoing open heart surgery at Duke.

Closing Remarks and Benediction: Bishop Cannon commended the Conference on the spirit of the session and of the importance of all that was brought before the Conference. He then closed with the benediction.

FIRST DAY, MORNING SESSION

Tuesday, June 2, 1970

The prelude, "Come Rejoicing," by Everett Titcomb, was rendered by the organist of Jarvis Memorial United Methodist Church, Mrs. Paul Toll.

Conference Convened: Bishop William R. Cannon, Resident Bishop of the Raleigh Area, called to order the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church at 10:00 o'clock on the morning of June 2, 1970. This is the one hundred forty-fifth (thirty-second since unification of American Methodism in 1939, and the third since unification of The Methodist Church and The Evangelical United Brethren Church on April 23, 1968) of the Conference. The 1970 session was convened in Jarvis Memorial United Methodist Church, Greenville, North Carolina. The Call to Worship was given by Bishop Cannon. Hymn No. 336, "And Are We Yet Alive?" was sung, followed by the Apostles' Creed in unison. W. R. Stevens, host district superintendent, led in prayer.

Words of Welcome: J. V. Early, host pastor, presented Mr. Marvin K. Blount who spoke briefly warm words of welcome. Mr. Blount then presented the following who spoke words of welcome to the Conference: Dr. Lee Jenkins, president of East Carolina University; Mr. Frank Wooten, mayor of Greenville; Dr. I. Edwin Clement, chairman of local Administrative Board and Dr. J. V. Early, host pastor.

Bishop Cannon responded, expressing appreciation for all that has been done.

Program of the Conference: J. V. Early moved that the printed program except as changed by the presiding officer, be the official program for the Conference. It was seconded and passed.

Nominations: C. H. Mercer, Cabinet Secretary, submitted the list of nominations for committee appointments. He moved the nominations be accepted. The committees approved were: Committee on Investigation, Committee on District Conference Records, Committee on Courtesies and Introduction, Committee on Resolutions and References, Committee on Minutes, and Committee of Tellers.

Announcement: W. C. Wilson made announcement concerning the memorial service.

Intermission: Bishop Cannon announced that there would be a ten-minute intermission, during which time all participants in the Memorial Service could get ready for the service.

Memorial Service: W. C. Wilson, Chairman of the Committee on Me-oirs, presided during the Memorial Service. Hymn No. 66, "Praise, My soul, the King of Heaven," was sung, after which C. D. Barclift gave the invocation. A duet, "I Waited for the Lord," by Mendelssohn, was sung by Mrs. Ivan Nicholson and Mrs. J. Herbert Waldrop, Jr.

He explained that the matter was carefully considered by the Conference Board of Education during the Conference year 1969-70. F. T. Mahla spoke for the Earnhardt amendment. H. L. Watson presented Dr. James H. Crawford of Chapel Hill who spoke against the amendment. H. S. Garris moved the previous question. The Garris motion was approved. The Earnhardt amendment was lost.

C. W. Robbins asked if the statement of H. S. Winberry about Earnhardt amendment could be included in the Board of Education report. He was told that it could be.

H. L. Watson asked a question about the Student Center at Louisburg.

C. W. Robbins moved that the report of the Board of Education be reconsidered. The motion carried. The Winberry statement concerning the Earnhardt motion was approved to go into the report of the Board of Education.

Campus Ministry: O. K. Ingram, Chairman of the Regional Commission on Higher Education and Campus Ministry, was asked to present the work of the Campus Ministry. He asked all the directors of Campus Ministry to come forward to be presented to the Conference. He then spoke to the Conference about student desires and attitudes.

H. S. Winberry asked the college presidents to come forward and be presented.

Announcement: Bishop Cannon made announcement concerning meeting of Board of the Ministry.

Conference Entertainment: Bishop Cannon asked T. A. Collins to present report of the Committee on Conference Entertainment. L. S. Weaver was presented, who invited the 1971 Annual Conference be held at Methodist

College. G. S. Eubank spoke supporting the Weaver invitation. The invitation was accepted by the Conference.

Enlistment for Church Occupations: J. L. Hunter made the report for the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations. He moved its adoption and it was adopted.

Resolution: Arthur Phillips presented a resolution concerning the threat that was made on the lives of Charles I. Umstead, his wife and son. C. W. Goldston spoke for the resolution. The resolution was approved. Malloy Owen asked for a few moments of prayer for the would-be murderer of the Umstead family.

Presentation: J. V. Early presented Reverend Tim Henry, president of the Greenville Ministerial Association, who brought greetings from the Association.

Prayer: Malloy Owen led in prayer, which was followed by a fifteen-minute recess.

Conference Reconvenes: The Conference reconvened at 10:45, then joined in singing Hymn No. 224, "Blessed Assurance." W. C. Wilson led in prayer.

Consecration of Director of Music: C. P. Morris presented Henry Alexander Ross, Jr. to be consecrated a Director of Music. Bishop Cannon led in the consecration service for this musician.

Lay Workers: Troy J. Barrett presented the report of the Commission on Lay Workers. The report was adopted.

Consecration of Lay Workers: Troy J. Barrett presented the following for consecration as lay workers: Margaret Ann Biddle, Mrs. Charles Davenport, Miss Ruthann Greenawald, Miss Barbara Johnson, Mrs. Alma W. Offutt, Mrs. Clifton Smith. They were consecrated by Bishop Cannon, assisted by Troy J. Barrett and W. C. Wilson.

Hymn: W. C. Wilson led the Conference in the singing of Hymn No. 221, "Standing on the Promises."

Presentation: Bishop Cannon called on G. S. Eubank to present the speaker for the emphasis on Higher Education. He presented Dr. Terry Sanford, president of Duke University. Dr. Sanford addressed the Conference, emphasizing the growth and development of Methodist colleges and the place of the Methodist educational institutions in our day.

Presentation: Bishop Cannon presented Mrs. Earl Brian, a trustee of Duke University, to the Conference.

Question 38: "Who have been transferred into our Conference?" was called. Bishop Cannon asked W. C. Wilson to read the list of those received by transfer. He read the following: David L. Hilton, Eugene M. Hancock, Charles R. Humphries (P), Douglas Jesse (P), Neal V. McGlamery, Thomas W. Mulling, Clarence D. Padgett, and John L. Stokes III.

Announcement: W. C. Wilson and L. C. Vereen made announcements.

Benediction: G. S. Eubank gave the benediction.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, June 3, 1970

Opening: Beginning at 2:30 the organist of the host church used for a prelude "Choral No. 1," by Hendrik Andriessen. The afternoon emphasis was Temporal Economy and the Laity." Bishop Cannon called the Conference to order. The Conference sang Hymn No. 174, "Rise Up, O Men of God." The prayer was led by C. W. Goldston.

Announcements: W. C. Wilson made announcements.

Greetings: Motion was made that greetings be sent to the Annual Conferences in session this week. It was so ordered.

Commission on World Service and Finance: Bishop Cannon called on C. S. Hubbard, Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, to lead in this presentation. He spoke of the proposed budget for 1970-71. He then called on T. M. Vick, Secretary of the Commission, to present the proposed budget. T. M. Vick made the report, and moved its adoption. Reginald Ponder made motion concerning the Contingency Fund. He spoke to the motion. C. S. Hubbard spoke in opposition to the motion. W. W. Austin moved that study be made by the Commission and findings brought back at the 1971 session of the Conference. Ponder accepted the Austin motion. R. M. Gradeless spoke. Kimsey King moved the previous question and it was approved. The report as a whole was acted upon, and was adopted.

J. T. Patrick presented the report of the Board of the Laity, and moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Dr. J. E. Legates nominated J. T. Patrick as Conference Lay Leader. He was elected.

Conference Relations: J. H. Miller made the report for the Committee on Conference Relations.

Sabbatical Leave: W. W. Bishop.

Disability: R. E. Walston, C. E. Vale, Z. V. Cowan.

Withdrawal: Clark R. Cahow.

Voluntary Location: A. E. Thompson, Jr., D. J. Reid, James E. Thompson, James A. Starnes, Eugene T. Long.

Reinstatement from Voluntary Location Status: Charles M. Smith.

Special Appointment: H. L. Bond, Ray West, John L. Stokes, Eldon Woodcock, W. S. Hopkins.

Norwood Jones moved that if W. S. Hopkins be given sabbatical leave it be without annuity credit. The motion was approved.

Ministerial Education Fund: H. S. Garriss presented the report of the Ministerial Education Fund. He reported that \$31,139.92 had been raised this Conference year. He read resolutions concerning the Ministerial Education Fund.

Minimum Salary Commission: Preston D. Page made the report for the Minimum Salary Commission. J. W. Scott presented an amendment to the Page resolution, then spoke to the amendment. J. H. Bailey spoke for the report. Donnie Davis spoke for the Scott amendment. C. M. Mitchell spoke for the Scott amendment. J. W. Page asked a question about the amount of money required to finance the Scott amendment. He moved that the matter be referred to the Minimum Salary Commission. P. D. Page answered J. W. Page's question by stating that it would take about a half-million dollars to support the Scott amendment. F. T. Mahla spoke, offered a substitute motion that we adopt the report of the Minimum Salary Commission. Scott accepted the substitute motion. G. S. Eubank spoke on the progress made in the Conference. C. W. Goldston asked a question about the amount having been paid to different pastors. J. H. Bailey spoke. The Mahla amendment carried.

Methodist Foundation, Inc.: S. L. Gullledge, Jr. presented the report of the Methodist Foundation, Inc. It was approved.

Leo C. Thompson made a motion regarding the Methodist Foundation. It was adopted.

Gifts and Wills: O. L. Hathaway made report for Department of Gifts and Wills.

Methodist Building Committee: O. L. Hathaway presented report of the Methodist Building Committee. It was approved.

H. L. Watson spoke of having the Hathaway report in printed form.

Committee on the Ministry: O. L. Hathaway presented report of Committee on the Ministry.

Conference Board of Trustees: J. W. Jenkins, Sr. submitted the report of the Conference Board of Trustees. He moved its adoption. James H. Coile asked the question: which is more expensive, to buy a house, or to have an allowance? Kimsev King made a motion concerning documents of incorporation. He then withdrew his motion and referred it to the trustees.

Announcements: J. V. Early, W. C. Wilson, and L. C. Vereen made the announcements.

Benediction: J. V. Early gave the benediction.

SECOND DAY, EVENING SESSION

Wednesday, June 3, 1970

Opening: The prelude, "Sonata in D Minor," by Ritter, was played by Mrs. Frances Cain, organist of St. James United Methodist Church. The evening service began at 7:30 with the Call to Worship by St. James Choir. Hymn No. 83, "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned," was sung, and the prayer was led by O. K. Ingram. The Chancel Choir of St. James Church sang "O Come, Let Us Sing Unto the Lord," by Swann.

The emphasis for this session was "The Mission of the Church." The Conference joined in singing Hymn No. 299, "O Zion Haste." F. Smith led the morning prayer.

Conference Minutes: H. S. Garris made the report for the Committee on Conference Minutes. It was approved.

Joint Committee on Disability: H. B. Johnson submitted the report of the Joint Committee on Disability. It was adopted.

Ministers' Credit Union: C. M. Mitchell presented the report of the Methodist Ministers' Credit Union. It was accepted as information.

Duke Endowment and Ormond Fund: M. Wilson Nesbitt, of the Duke Endowment, presented information to the Conference for the Duke Endowment and Ormond Fund.

Conference Brotherhood: K. R. Wheeler, president, presented the Conference Brotherhood cause to the Conference. The following officers were nominated and elected: President, James W. Hamilton; Vice-President, Norwood L. Jones; Secretary-Treasurer, J. K. Bostick; Layman, J. S. Blair. The report of the Brotherhood was submitted and accepted.

Women's Society of Christian Service: Bishop Cannon asked Mrs. Harold A. Mann, Conference president, to represent the Women's Society of Christian Service. She spoke of the work and plans of the women of the Conference.

Board of Missions: E. F. Smith led in the Report of the Board of Missions. He called on Rufus Stark, Chairman of the Committee on Education and Cultivation, to present this section of the Board of Missions report. Seavy Carroll, former missionary to Rhodesia, was presented to the Conference. Smith called attention to the progress in church extension and moved adoption of the report of the Board. It was adopted.

Leo C. Thompson was called on to present the awards to the outstanding rural churches of our Conference. Wilbur Teachey moved the addition of statement "That the N. C. Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church do hereby oppose liquor-by-the-drink" in paragraph II-A-2 concerning liquor-by-the-drink. H. A. Phillips stated that the Board would accept the addition.

Dean R. E. Cushman made a motion that the Board present a petition to the 1972 General Conference concerning abortion laws and practices. It was approved. The report of the Board was adopted.

H. A. Phillips presented the matter of work of the Long-Range Planning Committee.

H. F. Leatherman presented a resolution concerning the conflict in South-east Asia. The resolution was adopted.

Privilege: L. C. Thompson was asked to present the laymen from the following churches: Evansdale-Black Creek Charge, Parkwood Church, Smyrna Church (Williston-Smyrna Charge).

Resolution: C. H. Mercer presented resolution concerning delegates to the District Conference (see Section V, Resolutions). It was approved.

Moving Day: C. H. Mercer moved that moving day be Friday, June 12. The motion was approved.

Statistician: Bishop Cannon called on D. D. Traynham, Conference Statistician, to give the statistical report of the Conference. It was adopted subject to revision.

Recess: Bishop Cannon announced a ten-minute recess.

Conference Reconvenes: The Conference reconvened at 11:10. Hymn No. 470, "God of Grace and God of Glory," was used as a congregational hymn, and was followed by prayer led by A. P. Brantley.

Commission on Ecumenical Affairs: C. W. Robbins submitted the report of the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

T. A. Collins, president of North Carolina Council of Churches, was presented, who in turn presented the Reverend Dr. Sam Wiley, Executive Secretary of the Council of Churches in North Carolina. He spoke briefly to the conference.

Solo: Charles N. Burgess sang a solo, "Be Thou My Vision."

R. E. Cushman presented Dr. Robert W. Huston, General Secretary, Commission on Ecumenical Affairs, New York City, who addressed the Conference on the theme "Where We Are on the Ecumenical Road."

Announcements: Announcements were made by Bishop Cannon and L. J. Vereen.

Benediction: The benediction was given by J. H. McCallum.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Thursday, June 4, 1970

Conference Convenes: Beginning at 2:30 the organist of the host church played as a prelude "Jesus Calls Me," by Johannes Brahms. Bishop Cannon convened the Conference with the singing of Hymn 192, "In Christ There is No East or West." The theme of the afternoon session was "The Church in Worship and Work." The prayer was led by Leon Russell. Mrs. J. H. Waltrip, Jr. and Mrs. Ivan Nicholson sang a duet, "Love Divine."

Privilege: Bishop Cannon recognized A. L. Thompson for a personal privilege. He asked for greetings to be sent to H. P. Powell. Clarence Warren moved that greetings be sent to Mrs. R. R. Knowles. Paul Carruth requested greetings to H. L. Davis. E. B. Fisher asked that a message be sent to Russell Johnson. W. R. Stevens asked that greetings be sent to L. A. Watts and I. S. Richmond. C. G. McCarver requested that a message be sent to Bruce Garner.

Board of Evangelism: Kimsey King submitted the report of the Board of Evangelism. He called on H. M. McLamb, Conference Director of Evangelism, to speak concerning the work of the Board during the past year, and plans for the new Conference year. King called attention to recommendations for next year. He moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted.

W. J. Neese presented the report of the Publishing Interests. It was adopted. He also presented Mr. Bill Wright of the Methodist Publishing House. He presented a check for \$12,252 which is the Conference's share of the profits of the Methodist Publishing House.

N. W. Grant called attention to a summer program at Methodist College, August 11-16, to be known as "Summer R&R." The following spoke in interests of certain phases of the program: Evangelism, Kimsey King; Laity, Dr. J. E. Legates; Women's Society of Christian Service, Mrs. Harold Mann; Board of Education, H. S. Winberry; Missions, E. F. Smith; Social Concerns, H. A. Phillips; Dean of Summer Conference, E. R. Porter.

N. W. Grant announced the selection of the program staff. Associate Director of Nurture and Training: C. P. Morris, Associate Director of Stewardship: O. L. Hathaway; Associate Director of Witness, L. C. Vereen; Coordinator of Children's Work, Keith Glover; Coordinator of Youth Work, F. B. Joyner; Coordinator of Adult Work, John M. Meares.

Board of Pensions: N. L. Jones presented the report of the Board of Pensions. He read a resolution to the late J. A. Staton, for many years a leader in the program of Pensions. He then called attention to Sections A, B, C, D, E, G, H, I of Report No. 1. Under Section E the name of M. W. Maness was added to the retired list. C. P. Womack, D. D. Traynham, and Melvin Ray Miller were voted the superannuate relation by three-fourths majority of the Conference. Report No. 1 was adopted. Report No. 2 was presented by Jones. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Commission on Worship: J. Malloy Owen III presented the report for the Commission on Worship. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Archives and History: W. K. Quick presented the report of the Commission on Archives and History. He moved its adoption, and it was so ordered.

Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information: W. K. Quick made the report for this agency. He called the names of two great laymen, J. A. Staton and Dallas Mallison, who have meant so much to our Conference.

Board of Health and Welfare Ministry: J. L. Joyce was called on by Bishop Cannon to preside in this emphasis. He called on James White to present the report of the Board. It was adopted. J. W. Lineberger spoke, representing the Methodist Home for Children. J. F. Coble spoke to the Conference concerning the Methodist Retirement Home. He asked that greetings be sent to the following ministers at the Retirement Home: F. R. Lowry, H. E. Spence, W. G. Lowe, J. C. Harmon, and B. T. Hurley.

Jurisdictional Council: N. W. Grant reported what Lake Junaluska means to the church.

Publishing Interests: C. P. Morris submitted the report of Publishing Interests. He moved its adoption, and it was adopted. He also presented the re-

ised charter of the Methodist Board of Publications, Inc. This was approved. James C. Stokes, editor of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, was presented. He spoke briefly.

THIRD DAY, EVENING SESSION

Thursday, June 4, 1970

Conference Convenes: The morning session of the Conference was convened at 9:30 with Bishop William R. Cannon in the chair. Hymn No. 420, "O Love Divine, What Hast Thou Done?" was sung, after which M. W. Lawrence led the Conference in prayer.

Committee on Minutes: H. S. Garriss made the report for the Committee on Minutes. It was adopted.

Commission on Religion and Race: Bishop Cannon called on W. K. Quick to speak to the Conference on the action of the 1970 General Conference in St. Louis, Missouri, on the subject of Religion and Race.

Board of the Ministry: J. H. Miller, Jr. moved that W. S. Hopkins, Jr. be granted sabbatical leave without annuity credit. N. L. Jones spoke concerning the action of the Board. W. J. Neese reported on a lengthy meeting with W. S. Hopkins, Jr., expressing the opinion that it took proper course. Paul Carruth asked two questions: (1), has the Board of Pensions and Board of the Ministry met together on this matter? and (2) is voluntary location feasible? W. J. World Peace: Bishop Cannon called on H. F. Leatherman to offer a prayer for world peace.





LOUIE ARRINGTON LEWIS

1912 - 1969

Louie Arrington Lewis, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. S. F. Lewis, was born May 26, 1912, at Marshallberg, North Carolina. Here he received his early education. He later attended Pfeiffer College at Misenheimer, N. C., and Wesleyan College at Athens, Tennessee.



At the early age of twenty, he began his ministerial career which included service in the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Western North Carolina and the North Carolina Conferences of the Methodist Church. He was admitted into the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference in 1932, ordained a Deacon, 1936, and ordained Elder in 1939.

He served the following charges during his ministry in the North Carolina Conference: Beaufort, Atlantic, Aurora, Dover, Marshallberg and Core Creek. On account of ill health he was granted Sabbatical Leave in 1961 for one year. He was able to resume his pastoral duties for three years thereafter, but in 1965 he retired from the traveling ministry and made his home in Marshallberg, N. C.

One year after his admission into the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference, he was married on July 3, 1933, to Viletta Nesbitt Lewis, of Marshallberg, N. C. Four children were born to this union.

When our country became involved in World War II, he volunteered his services. The illness from which he finally succumbed was related to one contracted during the war. Along with thousands of others it may be said he was one of the casualties who died a slow death.

Louie Lewis was a dedicated minister in the truest sense of the word. He had responded early in life to what he regarded as a definite call to the Christian ministry.

Those who knew him best recognized in him the unmistakable marks of a man fully committed to the service of God and his fellowmen. His ministry related to the smaller towns and communities, and he was thus identified with the smaller churches from the standpoint of membership numbers. He accepted these assignments humbly, cheerfully and gratefully, regarding them all as priceless God-given opportunities to witness for his Lord who had redeemed him and called him according to His purpose. If, as has been said, the test of true greatness is fitting into a small place without feeling cramped, Louie Lewis stood the test. He was in the service of Christ "to make the world a bit more beautiful and better wherever his life was cast." For this devoted preacher, to quote Phillip Brooks, dean of Episcopal preachers of another generation: "No impulse was too splendid for the simplest task, and no task was too simple for the most splendid impulse." His people, therefore, were richly blessed by the gifts and graces with which God had endowed him. He was a good steward of that good thing committed to his care. In retirement his interest in and concern for people never waned. To the extent that his health would allow, he, like his Master, went about doing good, and rendered whatever service he could.

Death came to this humble but valiant soldier of the Cross July 14, 1969, and now he rests from his labours, having achieved the end of his faith. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Viletta N. Lewis of Marshallberg, N. C.; one daughter, Mrs. Lonetta Lewis McCloy, of Hickory, N. C.; two sons, Robert, of North Highlands, Calif.; William, of Marshallberg, N. C. (A son, Walter, a first class petty officer in the U. S. Navy, died in the service of his country March 12, 1970.)

Funeral services were conducted by the Reverends Denny Wise, Harold Cash, and Vance Lewis. Burial was at Marshallberg, N. C. Our deceased brother was fond of the following poem by Edgar A. Guest, and at the request of his beloved wife, it is quoted.

WHEN LIFE IS DONE

"I'd like to think when life is done
That I had filled a needed post,
That here and there I'd paid my fare

With more than idle talk and boast;
That I had taken gifts divine,
The breath of life and manhood fine,
And tried to use them now and then
In service for my fellowmen."

RALPH EUGENE FOWLKES, JR.

1928 - 1969

Reverend Ralph Eugene Fowlkes, Jr. was born on April 28, 1928, in Bluefield, West Virginia, son of Ralph Eugene Fowlkes, Sr. and Cinda Lou Mann Fowlkes.

He was educated in the public schools of Huntington, West Virginia, and graduated from Marshall University in Huntington. He received his A.B. degree from Marshall University, and his B.D. degree from the Duke Divinity School, Duke University, Durham, North Carolina.

He was received on trial in the West Virginia Annual Conference in 1948. He was ordained a Deacon in 1952 and an Elder in 1953, and was received in full connection in 1953. He transferred to the North Carolina Annual Conference on October 29, 1953. He served the following charges in the North Carolina Annual Conference: Associate at First Methodist Church, Rocky Mount, 1953; Hope Mills Church, 1953-56; Christ Church, 1956-58; West End Church, 1958; Edenton Church, 1959-61; Trinity Church, Burlington, 1961; Broadway Church, 1963-66; Bethany Church, Durham, 1966-69; Community Methodist Church, Butner, 1969.

While Ralph was associate pastor at First Church, Rocky Mount, he met a very attractive young lady, Miss Edith Ann Mangum, and they were married on January

Ralph Fowlkes was a good pastor, preacher, and a constructive minister. He gave good leadership to his people and to the North Carolina Conference. Much love has been expressed for his wonderful ministry through gifts to establish the Ralph E. Fowlkes, Jr. Memorial Fund with the Department of Gifts and Wills of the Methodist Foundation, Inc.

Death came to Ralph while he and his family were on vacation visiting his sister, Mrs. Charles Hall, of Columbus, Ohio. His body was brought back for the funeral at the Community Methodist Church at Butner, North Carolina. The service was conducted by Dr. C. D. Barclift, Reverend Vergil E. Queen and Reverend O. L. Hathaway, on August 4, 1969. The funeral service was conducted from the church where he had been appointed to serve in June 1969, and burial was in Maplewood Cemetery, Durham, North Carolina.

ERNEST ROY CLEGG

1891 - 1970

The Rev. Ernest Roy Clegg was born on July 18, 1891, near Pittsboro in Chatham County. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Clegg, who were life-long faithful members of the Chatham Methodist Church. It was this same Christian atmosphere in which Ernest Clegg lived his early life.



As a young man, Brother Clegg entered Rutherford College in 1912, and spent two years as a student there. During these years he participated in college athletics as a member of the varsity baseball team. He maintained a warm interest in wholesome sports for the remainder of his life.

In 1917 he entered Trinity College in Durham and became a member of the junior class. He graduated from the college in 1919. Three significant events in Brother Clegg's life occurred during that year: his graduation from college, his marriage to Miss Omega Wellons from Johnson County, and his admission to the North Carolina Conference at Wilson.

His first charge as a minister of the Conference was the Leesburg Circuit. In succeeding years he faithfully served the following: Youngsville, the Piedmont Circuit in Moore County, Mount Olive, Warrenton, Raeford, Farmville, Siler City and Louisburg.

In 1957 he retired from the active ministry with a record of over thirty-seven years of fruitful service. Following his retirement, Brother Clegg returned to his native Chatham County and resided there until he entered the North Carolina Retirement Home as a resident in 1962. After his retirement he was called upon by the Conference to serve these churches as a retired supply: Silk Hope, St. John's in Durham, and Rougemont in Durham County. During his Rougemont pastorate he died in the Retirement Home on February 9, 1970. He was buried in the old family cemetery in Chatham County, beside his faithful wife who had died on May 30, 1967. Funeral services for Brother Clegg were conducted by Dr. R. Wright Spears and Dr. J. F. Coble.

Ernest Clegg possessed a multitude of excellent qualities. He was a thinker with a keen comprehension of the truth. His analytical mind, coupled with good judgment and spiritual insight, made him strong. The needs of his people were his greatest burden. He brought an ardent devotion to the constant study of the Scriptures and ever believed that God surely answers prayers. His calling and election were sure. His faith in God and his fellowman never wavered, even though there was much for him to endure. His friends saw in him an abiding strength and the look of eternity in his face. When the purple shadows began to close in and the way narrowed toward the end, he quietly fell on sleep, trusting God, who had brought him all the way.

ALBEA SWINDELL PARKER

1890 - 1970

Albea Swindell Parker, son of the Reverend and Mrs. Asa J. Parker, was born in Magnolia, North Carolina, September 23, 1890. He passed away February 12, 1970, at the Greensboro Nursing and Convalescent Center and was buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Raleigh, North Carolina.

On January 22, 1918, Albea S. Parker was married to Etta Thompson, daughter of the Reverend and Mrs. Jasper B. Thompson. Four years previous to this, Albea and Etta graduated in the same class at Trinity College.

Albea was admitted into the North Carolina Conference at Washington, North Carolina in 1914. He retired in 1961, after forty-seven years of fruitful service in this Conference. After moving to his home in Raleigh, he continued as a supply pastor for four years.

In 1948 Albea's sister-in-law, Jessie Overman, died at the birth of her third child in Winston-Salem. At this time Albea and Etta took the three children into their home and hearts. Through the years they provided tender loving care for Donald, Jane and Jessie.

For a period of half a century he gave his full measure of devotion to Christ and His Church. His was a ministry of many dimensions. While he conscientiously gave himself to the promotion of the full program of the church, he found time to use his dedicated ability in the building of new parsonages and houses of worship. He gave splendid leadership to the Conference as a district superintendent. As a pastor he always expressed his love and concern for all the people in a truly sacrificial spirit.

It was the writer's high privilege to be associated with Albea in evangelistic services and on many vacation trips. It was a wonderful experience to share the fellowship of such a sincere friend across the years. It was very obvious to those who knew him best that he found his deepest satisfaction in showing a spirit of kindness and seeking at all times the happiness of others.

HENRY GIBBONS RUARK

1908 - 1970

Henry Gibbons Ruark exemplified qualities that marked him as an all-around "good minister of Jesus Christ," and as a person "who stood above the crowd," to quote words used about him by *The Laurinburg Exchange*.



He was a strong preacher of the gospel, coming as close to any preacher I have known proclaiming, as St. Paul said, "the full counsel of God." He cultivated the unusual art of saying much in a few words and declaring profound gospel truth with rare clarity. All this grew out of his disciplined and meditative study of the Bible and other deep books on the Christian faith.

He was widely known as a prophet of the social gospel, but the people he served and his intimate friends knew that the noun in the term "social gospel" was primary with Henry. Social implications were the fruits; the gospel was the tree from which the fruits grew.

Henry was also an effective pastor with the shepherd's heart and a church statesman in his administrative skills. For him people did not exist for administration but administration for people. He kept the Spirit within the wheels of ecclesiastical organization.

Henry served the Lord and His Church in many outstanding ways, including that of a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference of the Methodist Church in 1956, 1964, 1968, and a delegate to the General Conference in 1968; chairman of the North Carolina Council on Human Relations; a member of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Council of Churches; columnist for *The Christian Century*; editorial sermon writer for *The Greensboro Daily News*; a former trustee of Louisburg College and a trustee of Duke University at the time of his death.

But the list of "outstanding ways" in which Henry served his Lord and His Church does poor justice to the quieter, deeper aspects of his character and ministry. Here I do not apologize for speaking personally. When Henry preached, there was depth and vision in his messages, but there was also a strange and mysterious Presence that accompanied his words and drew one to want to fall on his knees in new and reverent dedication to the Lord Jesus Christ.

Love was the motive of Henry's life and ministry. When he was being considered for superintendent of the Elizabeth City District, he confided to me that this had never been a desire of his, but that God seemed to be leading him in a way "that he knew not." One particular thing that appealed to him was the opportunity to be "a pastor to pastors," especially to the approved supply pastors (now called lay pastors) whom Henry felt were as genuinely called to preach as pastors with seminary degrees. It was this loving concern in all phases of his life that was his supreme asset, and that made him so dearly and deeply beloved by his family, his close friends, and those he served as pastor and district superintendent. Such love, as Paul says, "lasts forever."

Born in Wilmington, October 16, 1908, Henry was a graduate of Duke University and of Yale University Divinity School, and was licensed to preach in 1932 and became a member of the North Carolina Annual Conference in 1934. His pastorates included Princeton; St. James, Tarboro; Trinity, Red Springs; University Church, Chapel Hill; Weldon; First Methodist, Laurinburg; and First Methodist, Rocky Mount. He was serving his fifth year as Elizabeth City district superintendent when death came to him.

Henry died unexpectedly of a heart attack following surgery, February 25, at the Duke Medical Center. The funeral service was held February 27 at First United Methodist Church in Laurinburg. Bishop William R. Cannon, episcopal head of the Raleigh area, conducted the service, assisted by the Rev. Kermit Wheeler, pastor of the church.

Survivors include his wife, the former Sarah Elizabeth Jenkins, to whom he was married in 1939; three children, Henry Gibbons, Jr., a professor at the University of Delaware in Newark, Del.; Mrs. Fred Lindstrom, Macon, Ga.; Robert Samuel, Colorado Springs, Colo., and three grandchildren.

His mother, Mrs. Robert Ruark of Raleigh, survives, as does one brother, Dr. Robert J. Ruark, also of Raleigh.

“Multitudes of persons share sadly the feeling expressed by Bishop W. R. Cannon: ‘The United Methodist Church in North Carolina has sustained a great loss in the death of the Rev. Henry Ruark.’ But the final appropriate word to be said is that of our Lord: ‘Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.’”

CLARENCE P. MASON

1918 - 1970

Clarence Pershing Mason was born in rural Harnett County, North Carolina on November 5, 1918. After spending his childhood and youth on the farm he enlisted in the U.S. Army on March 16, 1939. Shortly after his enlistment he married Sarah Louise McCarver on November 2, 1940, and from this union came two children, Clarence Douglas Mason and Rebecca Mason Thomas. They later adopted another child, Brenda Kay Mason.



In February of 1941 at a Baptist Mission in Bonnie Doone, North Carolina, Clarence consecrated his life to the Lord. Throughout his tour of duty in World War II he strongly felt the urge to minister to others so that they might find the inner peace through Christ and the church that had given him so much happiness. He and several other men were instrumental in building a chapel and securing an Army chaplain for an artillery base on Guadalcanal.

After returning to the United States he tried several jobs but soon realized that only one thing could give him satisfaction and that was the ministry of the gospel. In order to improve his educational background he enrolled and completed junior college studies at Burton Institute in Charlotte, N. C. He then enrolled at Trevecca Nazarene College in Nashville, Tenn. and later attended Olivet Nazarene College, Louisburg College and Duke Pastors' School in order to better prepare and continually improve himself for God's ministry.

Clarence began his ministry in the Nazarene Church in 1951 where he served for fifteen years in churches at Cherryville, N. C., Mooresville, N. C., Wabash, Ind., and Charleston, Mo. He was ordained Elder in the Nazarene Church on September 19, 1957.

In 1964 he transferred to the Methodist Church as an approved supply pastor at the Core Creek Charge in eastern North Carolina. He later was ordained Deacon on June 16, 1965 by former Bishop Paul N. Garber at Raleigh, N. C. During his service with the Methodist Church he also served Turkey Charge and at the time of his death was stationed at the Falling Creek Charge serving Brogden and Falling Creek United Methodist Churches.

Everywhere Clarence ministered people saw reflected in his everyday life the things he preached on Sunday; people knew he truly was a man of God who practiced what he preached.

Clarence had no love greater than his love for God. This was a paramount force in his life and he let everyone around him know it. Next to his love of God came his love for his fellowman. Throughout his ministry his concern was always for the needs of others and not himself. He felt that if he could help others then God would help him and God did richly bless his life and the lives of those with whom he came in contact. As one of the members of his church said, "this world sure needs more C. P. Masons."

When death came to Clarence Pershing Mason on Saturday, March 14, 1970, at Wayne County Memorial Hospital in Goldsboro, N. C., he could truly say:

"I have fought the good fight,
I have finished my course,
I have kept the faith" (II Timothy 4:7).

CARL KENNETH WRIGHT

1906-1970

On the day after Christmas 1906, Carl Kenneth Wright was born in Boaz, Alabama, to George Henry and Lilla Sophronia Wright. He lived in that town throughout his youth, and after graduating from the high school in Albertville, Alabama, he attended Furman University and Birmingham Southern College.



On February 8, 1934, he was married to Iva Ella Harris who proved to be a loyal and loving wife. That same year he was received into the North Alabama Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. His first appointment was in Cordova, Alabama. After serving this small church for one year, he and his wife accepted an appointment in the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference in North Carolina and moved to Marshallberg, N. C. The following 35 years were given in service to churches in Troy, Hyde County (Mattamuskeet Charge), Camden County, Columbia, Goldston, Roberdell, Conway, Windsor, Roanoke Rapids (Smith Methodist Church), Maury, and Atlantic, North Carolina.

It was while serving the Atlantic Methodist Church that death occurred on May 11, 1970. Funeral services were conducted there by the Reverend Charles Mercer, Superintendent of the New Bern District. He was assisted by the Reverend Carson Lewis, the Reverend Vance

Lewis, and the Reverend John Spencer, pastor of the Atlantic Baptist Church. His body was interred at the Atlantic Community Cemetery.

Those who survive him are his wife, now living in Louisburg, North Carolina; two daughters, Mrs. Lilla Jo Hutchinson of Bethesda, Maryland; Mrs. Sidney E. Stafford of Louisburg, North Carolina; and two sons, George Thomas of Los Gatos, California, and John Shadrick of Minot, North Dakota.

Carl Wright's life was his greatest ministry. He is remembered by those who knew and loved him not because he preached great sermons or because he was a great leader of men, but because he lived a beautiful, good, and inspiring life, and because he influenced so many people in so many ways. He was not only minister to his congregation, he was minister to the entire community wherever he lived. He was accepting of and accepted by the finest citizens and also by those who were outcast. He was a friend to whoever needed him and he was at all times the kindest man we ever knew.

The following remarks made by the Reverend Carson Lewis at Carl's funeral are appropriate here:

"Carl Wright was my pastor for six years; my friend for many more years . . . He was always unassuming, never presumptuous, an humble and obedient man; obedient to the purpose that his God called him to, and he never lost sight of, nor wavered, in that obedience of love and service. The path he followed was the only way for him and he could no more have followed any other way than he could have denied life itself. But he was a strong man who gathered his strength from his relationship with his Lord and from his relationships with his fellowmen. In that strength he served Christ by serving mankind. And out of his love and strength there are so many of us that he took by our hearts and led us into a wider knowledge and a deeper and more meaningful association with his Christ.

"Unrelentingly he gave expression to his love and loyalty and it was not only strength that he exemplified, but also a beauty of life in its totality. To his family: the wife who always stood with him, and the children, he gave of himself in unselfish devotion. To his church he gave beyond the usual and expected. To those he pastored he gave valuable and kindly guidance. And to his Lord he gave unexcelled loyalty and complete control of his life.

"And so today we do not come to mourn in sadness of defeat, but rather to celebrate in the joy of victory. Nor do we come to put the stamp of finality upon his life because love is divine and the divine never dies or goes away. The love he had for all of us is still alive and real, as is our love for him. True, he has changed his place and form of life, but so much of him lives on here in the hearts of all he touched, and it will go on living in the generations to come. Yes, this world is a bit better because he made a journey through it. And now he's with his Lord and there he's busy helping to prepare a place for us while he awaits our coming. Amen."

Mrs. W. J. (Lennie Peacock) Watson was born November 14, 1884, at Roper, N. C. and died October 5, 1969, after a long illness. Dignified funeral services were held at Stantonsburg United Methodist Church October 7, 1969, by the Reverend L. R. Sparrow, Reverend F. R. Randolph, and the Reverend W. R. Stevens. Her body was laid to rest in the Stantonsburg Cemetery.



Mrs. Watson was educated at Roper Academy in Roper, N. C., and Littleton College. On November 20, 1901, she married Mr. Henry T. Jackson of Hertford, N. C. Mrs. Alton Eason (Mary Colan Jackson) was the only child born of this union. Mr. Jackson died March 9, 1930. Later Mrs. Lennie Peacock Jackson married the Reverend William Joseph Watson of Poquoson, Va. Together they served our Lord and His Church at Stumpy Point, Pasquotank Circuit, Moncure Circuit, and Princeton in addition to doing ministerial supply work sometime in Raleigh, N. C. The deep faith and love of Christ she had demonstrated since childhood now made her an able and eager helper in her husband's ministry.

Mrs. Watson had a Methodist heritage and a great love of the church. Having attended her first session of Annual Conference at eleven years of age, she missed only a few during the remaining 73 years of her life. Her interest in youth made her an effective and beloved counselor of the UMYF. Somewhere in her personal papers she had written, "It was a cherished privilege to lead the youth as they carried on their work for our Master." One of her favorite expressions may have been the theme of her life: "The more you give yourself in Christian service, the more joy and satisfaction you get out of life."

Mrs. Watson's favorite Bible verse was Philippians 4:13: "I can do all through Christ who strengthens me." Her magnificent obsession was obedience to the heavenly Father. There was a goodness about her life that only God can explain. Although small in body, she was possessed of a great spirit. Behind her frail frame appeared one like a daughter of God. A quiet, soft-spoken response here and words of wisdom there manifested an optimistic faith in God that permeated her life.

Mrs. W. J. Watson was an epistle from God written on the fleshly tables of the human heart. Her favorite poem was "Crossing the Bar."

"Sunset and evening star,
And one clear call for me!

MRS. ELSIE WESTCOTT HALE

1890 - 1969

"A worthy woman who can find? For her price is far above rubies. The heart of her husband trusteth in her . . . She doeth him good and not evil all the days of her life . . . She riseth also while it is yet night and giveth food to her household . . . She stretcheth out her hands to the poor; yea, she reacheth forth her hands to the needy . . . Strength and dignity are her clothing . . . She openeth her mouth with wisdom, and the law of kindness is on her tongue. She looketh well to the ways of her household, and eateth not the bread of idleness. Her children shall rise up, and call her blessed."



These words by the wise writer of Proverbs very aptly describe Mrs. Elsie Hale, as I can personally testify, because it was my privilege to know her well. I became her pastor when I was appointed to the Clark Street Methodist Church, Rocky Mount, N. C., in the fall of 1934.

Mrs. Hale was a woman of quiet but deep faith in Jesus Christ her Lord. A faithful wife, mother, citizen, and Christian, she faced many struggles and sorrows in her long life, but she knew "in whom she believed" and "through Him who strengthened her" she was "more than conqueror."

Born May 9, 1890, in Manteo, N. C., the daughter of Obidiah Jennings, a captain in the Coast Guard, and Alethia Ward Westcott, Mrs. Hale attended Baptist Female Seminary (now Meredith College) for approximately two years (1907-1909) and then taught school for several years. On February 20, 1916, she married William Robert Hale of Rocky Mount, N. C. When her local Methodist preacher husband retired from his regular occupation and at the age of 65 took his first pastoral appointment, she became his partner in this new ministry. She, as well as her husband who died in 1959, was greatly beloved by the people of the two charges they served: Ocracoke Island and Sea Level. No small part of her husband's unusually effective ministry was due to his wife's sacrificial devotion and Christlike unselfishness.

Mrs. Hale died October 31, 1969, of congestive heart failure in Raleigh and was buried in Pineview Cemetery, Rocky Mount. Survivors include three children: Robert Jennings Hale, Raleigh; Rena Grace Irwin, Cherry Hill, N. J.; Alethia Ann Becker, Seattle, Wash.; two sisters: Mrs. Lena Pearsall and Mrs. Mary Davis Johnson, Raleigh; one brother, Carlyle Westcott, Manteo; and eight grandchildren.

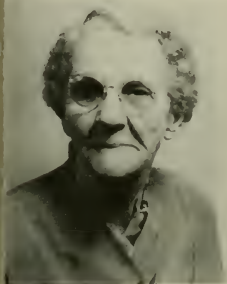

Group A: Agency Annual Reports For 1969 - 1970

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

The Committee on Church Architecture, formerly known as the Bishop's Committee on Church Architecture, met on November 5, 1969 at St. Paul's Church in Goldsboro, N. C. The change of name was initiated to avoid a conflict of terminology with the recently established Bishop's Advisory Committee under The Duke Endowment. Newly elected officers were: Chairman, James A. Ward; Vice-Chairman, Albert F. Fisher; Secretary, Edward F. Smith; members of the Executive Committee, Robert H. Stephens and Clyde G. McCarver.

The new constitution and bylaws which were adopted emphasized the establishment of a Review Committee to share with the District Boards of Church Location and Building and the Conference Boards of Missions in reviewing architectural designs and evaluating financial plans.

The purpose of the Committee on Church Architecture will be fulfilled through the following activities:

1. Cooperating with District Boards of Church Location and Building in the development of uniform procedures and requirements for local churches and a uniform functional operation for the District Boards.

2. Developing a program of education through which ministers, members of building committees, architects and builders may become informed about the essentials pertaining to discovering needs, developing a program, creating the design, and executing the plans of a building project in a United Methodist Church.

3. Assisting the local congregation to understand the importance of properly analyzing, planning, designing, and constructing even the smallest of building projects.

4. Educating the local congregation as to the extent of technical preparations and labor involved in the development of a design by an architect.

5. Guiding the congregation in adopting and executing plans that are acceptable to the District Board of Church Location and Building, the Annual Conference Review Committee, the Building Code Division of the Department of Insurance (for health and safety reasons), and to the Office of Rural Church Affairs of The Duke Endowment.

6. Helping the congregation to realize that the requirements of The Discipline of The United Methodist Church, the Building Codes of the State of North Carolina, the Boards of Missions, and The Duke Endowment are not necessarily restrictive rules to prevent local initiative, originality, or participation, but rather to share the experiences and provide the guidance that will lessen the possibility of mistakes.

7. Providing assistance in the review and evaluation of architectural plans and projects.

8. Planning the promotion and execution of the Randolph E. DuMont Design Program.

Activities for the Committee on Church Architecture during the forthcoming year will include:

1. A meeting of the Committee in the fall.
2. Some district workshops which will be designed to assist local churches and to train the District Boards of Church Location and Building.
3. The Annual Joint Meeting with the Committee from the Western North Carolina Conference held at the Duke Divinity School.

The Committee participated in the Annual Joint Meeting with the Western North Carolina Conference Committee held at the Duke Divinity School March 2, 1970, at which Dr. R. David Mustian, Professor of Sociology and Anthropology at North Carolina State University, spoke on "A Look at Changing Needs in Rural

North Carolina." Two churches within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference were selected for recognition under the Randolph E. DuMont Design Program. These were: (1) The Verona United Methodist Church, near Jacksonville, Mr. Robert H. Stephens of New Bern, architect, and the Reverend J. A. Tingle, pastor; (2) The Westview, located near Burgaw, Mr. Frank I. Ballard of Wilmington, architect, and the Reverend J. K. Horne, Jr., pastor.

Plans for the district and area meetings will be carried out in cooperation with the District Superintendents.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION

The North Carolina Conference Committee on Continuing Education is charged primarily with making effective opportunities for continuing education for ministers, developed through the North Carolina Commission on Continuing Education. The Commission is a joint enterprise of the North Carolina Conference, the Western North Carolina Conference, the Divinity School of Duke University, with the cooperation of the Duke Endowment. While the Commission will identify already developed programs, and devise cooperative ventures in the state, the Conference Committee will seek to involve our pastors in programs which reach pastors from areas across North Carolina and beyond, and to devise continuing education opportunities on the district and multidistrict level.

To this end, the Committee has developed the following projects for 1970-1971:

1. A Seminar on Preaching—meeting once each two weeks for 12 weeks, with leadership from the Duke Divinity School, or one of our colleges. This seminar will be focused on the needs of the full time lay pastor, but will be open to all. The place of the meeting will be Jacksonville.
2. A second seminar projected to meet the needs of Conference members will meet at Sanford. The exact area of concern will be chosen by a response to a questionnaire which will be mailed to a representative group of pastors. This study will also meet in the fall for a twelve-week period, with the group meeting once each two weeks.
3. The third project is an in residence reading program being developed in connection with the Duke Divinity School. The Committee has approved four \$100.00 scholarships to be awarded in connection with this project.
4. A task group has been given the responsibility of publicizing opportunities for individuals to participate in continuing education programs carried on by Institutions and agencies in and beyond the state. Some financial assistance will be made available to individuals who apply to the task group headed by Jack W. Moore, Dean of North Carolina Wesleyan College.
5. In addition to the above, the Committee warmly supports the opportunities provided by the Divinity School Clinics, the North Carolina Pastor's School, and the seminars of Interpreter's House, each of which afford means by which pastors may enlarge the skill and capacity for ministry. Particular attention will be given to announcements through the N. C. Advocate and selected mailings to pastors to keep opportunities for continuing education before our pastors.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION ON CONTINUING EDUCATION

In response to the mandate in the form of resolutions passed by the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences and the faculty of the Duke Divinity School, there was organized a statewide commission known as The North Carolina United Methodists Commission on Continuing Education for Ministers. Representatives from the participating bodies, including The Duke Endowment, met January 13-14, 1970, to organize, establish goals and procedures, and formulate a program. The statewide Commission grew out of cooperative planning under the direction of Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Jr., Bishop William R. Cannon, and Dean Robert E. Cushman.

The designated members of the Commission are: Bishop W. R. Cannon, J. Paul Edwards, Francis C. Bradshaw, Paul Carruth, Zane E. Eargle, W. Junius Neese, N. W. Grant, and Samuel J. Womack from the North Carolina Conference; Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Jr., Robert T. Young, Earl P. Crow, Jr., Peter E. Addo, Donald W. Haynes, Fred Jones, Robert A. Davis, and C. C. Herbert, Jr. from the Western North Carolina Conference; Dean Robert E. Cushman and Stuart C. Henry from the Duke Divinity School; and M. Wilson Nesbitt from The Duke Endowment.

The Concern of the Commission

The primary concern of the State Commission shall be to provide opportunities for continuing education for those persons serving full time in the ministry of The United Methodist Church of the two Conferences. This basic concern does not preclude continuing education programs in which laity may also be involved.

The Operation of the Commission

The Commission on Continuing Education for Ministers shall adopt a "style of life" or mode of operation that might be characterized as that of a broker of ideas

and opportunities. Rather than administering programs, it shall seek to coordinate existing programs and initiate new programs, utilizing existing structures. It shall seek to create a climate in which increasing numbers of ministers will have afforded to them opportunities to grow effectively within the ministry. It shall seek to evaluate programs of continuing education in order to promote those which most effectively meet the needs of ministers within the two Annual Conferences.

The State Commission is cooperating with the Committees on Continuing Education of the two Annual Conferences and the Duke Divinity School in the correlation of efforts to avoid duplication, to provide information, and to assist in the execution of selected programs. It is the intention of the Commission to correlate its efforts and energies with those of other communions, as well as secular agencies.

The officers elected are: Chairman, M. Wilson Nesbitt; Vice-Chairman, Paul Carruth; and Secretary, Stuart C. Henry. The respective representatives of the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences are Paul Carruth and Donald Haynes. The committee chairmen are as follows: Program, Robert A. Davis; Resources, Fred Jones; and Promotion, J. Paul Edwards.

The facilities and resources of the two Annual Conferences, the Duke Divinity School, the several colleges, and other institutions will be utilized to meet the continuing education needs of ministers.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES (For the program year ending April 30, 1970)

Christian concepts of the Incarnation of God in Jesus Christ and the unity of man's nature lead us away from a dichotomy between the spiritual and the physical. "The Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us." Man is a unity, so that a construct which depicts a soul dwelling in a body is an artificial model which masks the reality of his organic oneness.

For this reason, it can be said that ecumenism is the whole Church responding to the whole need of man. The program of the North Carolina Council of Churches therefore chooses its priorities from the broad range of individual and social dynamics. In this period of change, which is often so swift as to be revolutionary, it has been necessary to have an updating of the Council's work.

A year ago this "Renewal of the Council" was described as a process relating to three phases: (1) staff, (2) program, and (3) site. The Executive Director's report will concern itself with those phases.

I. STAFF

On September 2, 1969 the Rev. S. Collins Kilburn became Director of Christian Social Ministries, succeeding the Rev. J. H. Crum who had served until November 1968. Mr. Kilburn has his office in the IGO Building on the Airport Road near the Raleigh-Durham Airport. He has brought his considerable creative powers to bear upon the social concerns of the Council.

W. H. Shipes has been on the staff of the Migrant Project since its inception in 1965. In 1968 he became its Director. He continues to give dynamic leadership to this important phase of the Council's Migrant Ministry. The latter includes aid to local migrant councils at Elizabeth City, Morehead City, and Hendersonville. The Migrant Project has been funded by OEO for \$298,342 for the present fiscal year and operates in Johnston, Greene, Hyde, Tyrrell, Washington, and Carteret Counties, with prospects of expansion into others. A measure of its success is found in the fact that OEO has asked the North Carolina Council of Churches Migrant Project to administer an additional grant of \$150,000 for an Emergency Food and Medical Services Program for the states east of the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers. The offices of the Migrant Project are at 723 West Johnson Street in Raleigh. There are eight persons on the staff with many more in the field during the migrant season.

II. PROGRAM

Under the leadership of James D. Riddle the Council has effected a thorough-going revision of its organizational structure which became final at the Greensboro Assembly at the end of April. Instead of three program commissions and twenty-six program committees we now have three commissions which will operate through task groups and ad hoc committees. Great hope is held for the new plan whereby through "shared staff" the judicatory heads will be asked to take the lead in selecting program priorities for interdenominational work, with judicatory staffs forming the core of task groups and committees, to be supplemented by other churchmen.

Under the head of program, mention must first be made of the inspired activities of Church Women United in North Carolina. Their calendar for 1970 has its foci in three annual celebrations: World Day of Prayer, March 6, which had the theme, "Take Courage!"; May Fellowship Day, May 1, "Dissolve the Distance Between. . ."; and World Community Day, November 6, "Use a Key for Tomorrow: Education."

Church Women United is a national movement. In North Carolina its special project, now having reached its culmination, is the Samarkand Chapel Fund drive for over \$50,000 headed by Mrs. Ira C. Shelley with Mrs. Robert W. Scott as sponsor. Mrs. Sam Arrington Dunn of Enfield is State President of CWU. As such she is on the Council's Executive Board as head of its Department of Church Women United, and a member of its Administrative Committee. She is a splendid example of the right kind of "woman power," being herself a child of the North Carolina Governor's Mansion, daughter of former Governor Kitchen.

The Department of Youth has a Duke Divinity School middler, Harmon L. Wray, as Minister with Youth. He has planned "Task Force for Youth 1970," building on the experience of a model worked out for last summer. This will include "internships" in service agencies, business, industry, etc. for high-school juniors, seniors, and post-grads, with a period at the end of the summer for evaluation and contrasting experience.

The Commission on Christian Social Ministries under Mr. Kilburn's leadership has —launched a series of Engagement/Reflection Seminars at Central Prison at Raleigh to sensitize participants to the need for reform in the prison system.

—held Conflict Management Workshops for church and community leaders to develop skills in understanding and resolving conflict in the direction of reconciliation.

—begun a series of conferences on the ethical and theological issues relating to therapeutic abortion.

—engaged in conferences for church leaders on "The Church and the New City" in cooperation with Research Triangle COMPLEX, Inc., using urban simulation games.

The Commission on Christian Nurture has centered its program in family life education. Under the leadership of Dr. William F. Eastman of Chapel Hill a series of discussion opportunities focused on the family life of the clergyman has been planned. Also work continues in the areas of Scouting, evaluation by a group of high-school seniors of the new Through-the-Week Curriculum, and a series of conferences to introduce the new Trainable Series for the Mentally Retarded.

The Commission on Christian Unity will focus upon the encouragement of local ecumenicity. It will also continue the Council's efforts to make available information concerning movements toward organic union, following the Council's Conference on COCU held in High Point last October under the leadership of Dr. Paul A. Crow, Jr. These efforts are informational and not promotional.

The Durham office of the Council is still located at 208 East Duke Building on the East Campus of Duke University. Activities in that office include

—publication of the Church Council Bulletin six times a year. This goes to 5600 churchmen across the State.

—working with Billy E. Barnes, Chairman of the General Committee on Public Relations, and its sub-committee on Television, Radio, and Audio-visuals. Raymond A.

Horn has begun the new **Encounter** series on TV. Two special programs seen on prime time have been "The Now Generation in Chapel Hill High School" and "A Century at Central Prison." News of the Church continues on TV and **The Week in Religion** on radio, the latter announced by John W. Cobb of Raleigh. Dr. Horn's work is funded by the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina.

—assumption of primary responsibility now for the Church World Service Clothing Program in North Carolina.

—direction of the Migrant Ministry (mentioned in greater detail above).

—cooperation with the Resort Area Ministry.

—close liaison with the Commission Religion in Appalachia and the programs on Medicine and Religion of the AMA and the Medical Society of the State of North Carolina.

—planning and promotion of the annual Seminar on Church and Community, held at N. C. State University in Raleigh. The 1970 theme was "The Church as Initiator of Change."

—planning and promotion of the Council's Annual Meeting, which usually includes the Assembly of Church Women United, the Council's Assembly, and the Pastors' Conference. The 1970 Pastors' Conference in Greensboro on "Tradition and Innovation in the Church" was led by Harold R. Martin, Robert A. Raines, and Mrs. Robert N. Rodenmayer. Dates of the Annual Meeting in 1971 will likely be April 26 and 27.

—liaison with the North Carolina Chaplains Association.

—coordination of the Richard Shelton Communications Awards program and the Distinguished Service Award. Honored this year were the **High Point Enterprise**, the **Carolina Times** of Durham, WTVD Channel 11 Durham, WKIX Radio of Raleigh, and a personal citation to Clayton B. Weaver of WRDU Channel 28 Durham. The DSA went to Dr. George R. Whittecar, President of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America.

III. SITE

The 33rd Assembly of the Council ratified the action of the Executive Board in entering into a purchase agreement for 6.07 acres of land in the Nelson Community at the southeast corner of Research Triangle Park, with a view to ultimate construction there of an Ecumenical Center for North Carolina. The tract lies alongside the right-of-way of the new four-lane N. C. 54 connecting Raleigh and Chapel Hill with the Park. This is slated to be I-40. The Council's property is between two interchanges and thus has good accessibility and high visibility. RDU Airport is a little over three miles away. The purchase price is \$15,000 to be paid out by 1976. Dr. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., Conference Minister of the Southern Conference, United Church of Christ, was asked to head the fund drive. Dr. Lightbourne, at the Greensboro Assembly, was elected President of the Council for the coming year, succeeding Dr. Thomas A. Collins of Rocky Mount.

SECTION A

Committee on General Church School Ministry

Christian White, Chairman

I. Report for 1969-1970

- A. Thirty-one persons from our Conference participated in the Southeastern Jurisdiction Leadership and Laboratory Schools at Lake Junaluska, August 3-15. Ten persons were provided scholarships in the amount of \$50 each to participate in one of the Age-Level Seminars for Prospective Laboratory Leaders, the Workshop on Preparation for Confirmation, or one of the leadership courses designed to prepare them for leadership roles in the Annual Conference.

Ten persons from our Conference participated in the Weekend Conference on Developing Your Holistic Ministries and twelve persons attended the Family Life Conference at Junaluska.

- B. The Conference Board of Education participated in the twenty-two training sessions for local church Councils on Ministries sponsored by the Conference Program Council during September and October. The approximate attendance in the sections related to Education was as follows:

- C. The four Board of Education staff members, the President of the Board, and the Director of the Conference Program Council attended the United Methodist Conference in Chicago, Illinois, November 3-7. This biennial conference voted itself out of existence after many years of continuous service in the interest of holistic meetings involving all boards and agencies.

- D. Seven Christian Workers' Schools were held during this conference year. These schools offered 25 courses and enrolled 524 persons. Four Type D laboratory observation courses involved 24 leaders-in-training.

- E. Twenty-five Workshops of from one to three evenings were conducted in local churches and cluster groups of churches involving from one to three leaders. Three sessions reached 476 local church leaders. Additional local church consultations were held to assist local churches in planning new educational buildings or the renovation of existing facilities.

- F. A Coaching Conference for the certification of leadership school instructors in the adult and children's divisions was held at Camp Chestnut Ridge, January 5-8. Twenty-six persons participated in this four-day training session.

- G. The Conference Board of Education and Evangelism joined with the Western North Carolina Annual Conference in sponsoring a five-day Junior High Confirmation Education Laboratory at Salisbury, North Carolina, March 9-13. The purpose of this enterprise was to train selected persons from each conference in the use of the new confirmation materials to be published this spring. Nine persons from our conference participated in this training and will serve as re-

source leaders to conduct orientation and training sessions for all the pastors of our conference.

- H. The four Conference Board of Education staff members participated in a training session for Annual Conference Program Council staff persons at Lambuth Inn, Lake Junaluska, March 23-27.

SECTION B

Committee on Children's Ministry E. Clifford Shoaf, Chairman

1. Report for 1969-1970.

A. Vacation Church School Institutes.

The focus of the Vacation Church School Institutes this year was on creative teaching. These sessions were held in each district during the month of April for VCS teachers and others interested in developing skills in working more effectively with children in the church.

Another emphasis in some of the Institutes was on the use of learning centers as a way of helping youngsters become more actively involved in their own learning.

It is estimated that more than 600 persons will have invested an average of 4 hours each in these leadership training events for a total of 2,400 hours. There are about 55 leaders involved in the VCS Institutes. They alone will have invested a total of more than 1,000 hours of preparation and teaching.

With such a major effort being given to "tooling up for better teaching", it may come as no surprise if we discover, as some contend, that some of the most creative and effective teaching in the church is still being done in Vacation Church School.

B. Summer Time Ministries.

This year a new catalog was released by Cokesbury entitled "Resources for Summertime Ministries." It replaces the old Vacation Church School catalog and suggests that summer is a good time for the church to be involved in a wide variety of ministries both inside and outside the four walls of the church.

These ministries may range from Day Care Centers to Day Camp, or from a week-day coffee for mothers of small children to planning a vest-pocket park. Many ideas for creative activities for children and their teachers and parents are found in the booklet: "Let's Do More With Children," by Emma Jane White.

C. Coaching Conference.

Eighteen persons attended the Coaching Conference for workers with children held at Chestnut Ridge in January. The purpose of this three-day session was to help leaders of leaders develop skills in designing training events. Resource leader for the Coaching Conference was Reverend Richard Monroe, from the Department of Training Enterprises of the Division of the Local Church in Nashville.

D. Local Church Ministries.

1. Workshops were conducted by the Conference Coordinator for workers with Children in seven different local churches or groups of churches. These sessions ranged from two to four hours and covered a wide variety of issues, including: use of curriculum, lesson planning, use of arts, crafts, and dramatics, understanding boys and girls, and communicating the Christian Faith. About 25 churches were involved in these workshops.
2. Four Christian Workers Schools were taught involving about 45 children's workers from 12 - 15 churches. These schools were 3 or 4 two-hour sessions in length and dealt with various facets of the Church's Ministry with Children.

3. Consultations with numerous local churches have been conducted by mail, telephone, and personal visitation. Some of the areas where help has been sought include:
 - a. Planning Laboratory Schools or Demonstration-Observation Schools. Four local churches are now in the process of planning accredited 16-hour Laboratory Schools.
 - b. Evaluating or planning for a Week-day Kindergarten or Nursery School. Numerous requests are received concerning state regulations as well as church standards for an accredited program.
 - c. Organizing and setting up Day Care Centers or other child care services for younger children. Many churches are discovering this as an important service to both parents and children.
 - d. Use of Space. A number of situations develop which require a comprehensive analysis of how space in the Church School can be used to best advantage: when a new building or additions are anticipated, when attendance shows a substantial increase or decrease, when major redecorating or remodeling is anticipated, or when grouping patterns or sizes change significantly.
 - e. Questions are being received increasingly concerning resources, procedures, and skills for working with persons with special needs. More and more churches are finding ways of ministering helpfully to the mentally retarded, deaf, blind, aged, physically handicapped and the economically and culturally disadvantaged.
4. Coordinators of Children's Ministries have taken on special significance in the new church structure. Four events this year have been focused toward helping this person with his task:
 - a. About 250 Coordinators of Children's Ministries, representing as many churches, attended the 22 Council on Ministries Workshops held across the Conference last fall. These two-hour sessions were designed to help interpret the responsibilities of the Coordinators, with special reference to their relationships to the Work Areas and the Council on Ministries.
 - b. A page in the Program Supplement to The N. C. Christian Advocate each month is devoted to current programs and resources of interest to persons working in Children's Ministries.
 - c. A survey conducted last fall by the Conference Children's Work Committee was designed to discover the major concerns and activities of persons involved in supervising Children's Ministry in the local Church. A great deal of activity was indicated in scout programs and children's choirs. The greatest desire for help was indicated in the areas of use of the arts: crafts, art, creative dramatics, puppetry, etc.
 - d. District Coordinators have made resources, counsel, and training available to local churches in various ways through district programs and local church settings.

SECTION C

Committee on Youth Ministry
Samuel D. McMillan, Jr., Chairman

I. Report on 1969-1970

Conference-wide youth ministries were offered in a variety of settings this past year. The following ministries were available (the number in attendance is listed beside each one): Canoe Trip (8), Senior High Camping (89), Junior High Camping (850), Junior High Workshop (108), Senior High Workshop (190), A. C. S. (329), United Nations-Washington Study Tour (46), Explore (34). A total of 1654 persons participated,

an increase of twelve per cent over the previous year. In addition, over 1000 youth attended a Conference Youth Rally at Methodist College.

Summer opportunities planned for this year include a Canoe Trip, Camping for Junior Highs, Camping for Senior Highs, Junior High Workshop, Senior High Workshop, A. C. S., Celebration of Life Week-end, and a Counselor-in-Training Program at the Camp for the Mentally Retarded.

The report in Leadership Education includes the following: (a) in five Christian Workers Schools, 103 persons took part in youth ministry courses; (b) two labs offered training for 8 adults and 23 youth, (c) 9 persons attended a Junior High Confirmation Lab held jointly with the Western North Carolina Conference, (d) 4 persons were involved in youth labs at the Southeastern Jurisdictional Leadership School at Lake Junaluska, (e) there were additional training in youth ministry for the Conference Staff at the United Methodist Conference on Christian Education and the Southeastern Jurisdiction Consultation for Program Council Staffs, (f) in fourteen settings of local churches and groups of churches, 169 persons were involved in workshops in youth ministry, (g) 200 local church coordinators of youth ministry participated in the series of Council on Ministries Workshops.

Enrollment in the Youth Division decreased by 390 to 25,221 in 1968-1969.

SECTION D

Committee on Young Adult Ministry F. Belton Joyner, Jr., Chairman

1. Report on 1969-1970

A. Local Church Ministries

1. A questionnaire was mailed to each pastor to determine what young adult ministries are effective in our Conference, what hopes there are for young adult ministries, and what resources are needed to develop young adult ministries. The General Board of Education distributed the questionnaire nationally to each Conference Coordinator of Young Adult Ministries.
2. Using the information gathered in the survey of Young Adult Ministry in our Conference, we prepared a leaflet for all the pastors on some effective young adult ministries now going on within the Conference. Several of the resource persons mentioned in this leaflet have reported receiving inquiries about their young adult ministry.

B. Other Ministries

1. The Committee on Young Adult Ministry had a consultation with Lander Beal and Lon A. Speer of the General Board of Education staff in young adult ministry. A follow-up meeting with Lander Beal was held in April to hear reports of some task groups and to finalize some plans for young adult ministry in this area.
2. The Committee on Young Adult Ministry has named a task force to design and possibly implement a Young Adult Life Information Center for the Raleigh area.
3. The Committee on Young Adult Ministry has tried to adopt a "listening stance" in relation to the young adult community. Guidelines for listening were prepared and several Committee members have made written reports of their perception of the young adult community.
4. Four churches in the Raleigh area offered an International Film Series, which provided an opportunity for "dialogue" with a number of non-church young adults.

SECTION E

Committee on Adult and Family Life Ministry

R. T. Commander, Chairman

I. Report for 1969-1970

A. Adult Curriculum

In the Conference year 1969-1970 there has been an increase in the use of the International Lesson material with a corresponding decrease in use of The Foundation Study Series. A new series, "Faith in Christian Living" was introduced in the fall of 1969. Many groups are developing curriculum at the local level and engaging in studies of current issues and concerns.

B. Leadership Education

Enrollment in Adult Education classes in Christian Workers Schools declined. Two Adult Laboratory courses and three week-end adult learning workshops were cancelled for lack of enrollment. Courses in adult leadership were conducted at community colleges and technical schools at Elizabeth City, Jacksonville and Whiteville. Several week-end and one-night workshops on adult education were conducted. Adult Leadership Courses were held in Tarboro, Morehead City, and Calvary Church in Durham. Twenty-two sub-district sessions on the role of the coordinator of Adult Ministry and Family Life were held in cooperation with the program council, and many in local churches.

C. Family Camp

Family Camp was held at Camp Don-Lee July 12-18 with 35 adults and 40 youth and children in attendance.

D. Leadership Training

Five persons attended Leadership and Adult Lab Classes at Lake Junaluska. Two persons attended an Adult Lab Refresher Seminar at St. Simon's Island, Georgia. Eight persons attended a Coaching Conference for the course "Adult Learning in A Changing World."

SECTION F

Committee on Christian Educators and Music Ministry

H. Langill Watson, Chairman

I. Christian Educators Section, Wyatt Brown, Chairman

A. Report for 1969-1970

1. The Ministers and Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants are providing leadership to many churches in our conference. They are concerned about the total life and ministry of the church. Through the educational workers, local congregations are able to develop an effective program of Christian nurture for all ages. Their services are used on the conference, district, and sub-district levels. Many times their talents are used as they cooperate on an interdenominational and community-wide effort to meet needs.
2. During 1969-1970, Ministers and Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants joined together to create the Christian Educators Fellowship of the North Carolina Annual Conference, a chapter of the church-wide Christian Educators Fellowship. It is working to help recruit educational workers for the North Carolina Conference by providing training, orientation, and resources that will benefit local churches employing Christian education workers. It recognizes that education is a vital ministry in the church and it is seeking to help to provide all available leadership possible to fulfill this ministry.

II. Music Ministry Section, Charles Moore, Chairman

A. Report on 1969-1970

1. Workshops

- a. A conference-wide Music Workshop was held at Saint Paul Church in Goldsboro on November 1, 1969. The emphasis was on music ministry with children and youth. Sixty persons took part in this Workshop.
- b. Two hundred persons participated in the three Workshops held in February and March 1970. One Workshop was held at Methodist College in Fayetteville; sponsored jointly by the Fayetteville Presbytery of The Presbyterian Church, this Workshop focused on "Music by the Volunteer Choir." Another Workshop was at the Methodist Center at Duke University in Durham; special attention was given to music ministry with youth and choral technique. The third Workshop was at North Carolina Wesleyan College in Rocky Mount; this experience was a general music clinic.

2. Local Church Ministries

- a. Twenty articles have appeared in the Program Supplement of the North Carolina Christian Advocate. These articles were designed to help the local church musician.
- b. Local churches were invited to participate in A Great Day of United Methodist Singing. A number of congregations requested materials for use in AGDOUMS.
- c. Some of the District Directors of Music Ministry report that they have worked with local churches in planning music ministry, in developing new choirs, and in providing music resources.
- d. Three mailings have gone to local church musicians. Each mailing was related to the Music Workshops.

SECTION G

Committee on Campus and Conferences W. Warren Bishop, Chairman

1. Report for 1969-1970.

A. Program.

1. Attendance. In the summer camping program of 1969 a total of 1,662 persons attended the three camps. In terms of camper weeks the total was 1,781. There was a total of 325 at Chestnut Ridge, 1,228 at Don-Lee, and 228 at Rockfish. This represents an overall increase of 218 over 1968.
2. Staff. Supervising the program in 1969 for these campers was a staff of 98 persons. This included 57 counselors, 13 waterfront personnel, 12 kitchen and food services persons, 3 crafts directors, 6 Program Directors (including Family Camp and Mentally Retarded Camp), 2 nurses and 5 counselors-in-training. The CIT program has been operative only three years; however, in the summer of 1970 there will be four regular counselors who have had experience and training in this program.
3. Camping for the Disadvantaged. In the camp for the Mentally Retarded at Don-Lee there were 56 campers. These came in approximately equal numbers from Murdoch, Caswell, O'Berry, and private homes. In the camp for disadvantaged boys at Rockfish there were 60 elementary and junior high boys from Fayetteville sponsored by the Kiwanis Club. In addition, there were 40 youngsters in camp who were awarded partial or full scholarships through the Campership Fund. The Campership program was so enthusiastic-

ally received that it is hoped that the number of youngsters accepted in 1969 on partial scholarship can be doubled this summer.

4. **Retreats and Day Use.** Our conference camp facilities are being used increasingly on a year-round basis by local church groups, district, conference, and campus groups, and others for a wide variety of purposes. Some examples of the kinds of use made of the camp sites during the past year are: youth retreats for planning, study, fellowship, and enrichment; Administrative Board retreats for planning and fellowship; W.S.C.S. planning and enrichment sessions; Wesley Foundation and other student group retreats; Day Camps for children; picnics, and family camping.

A total of 5,562 persons used our four camp sites in the calendar year 1969 for events other than the summer resident program. This represents an increase of 592 over 1968. The breakdown by camp is as follows:

B. Development

1. Chestnut Ridge

- a. The Staff House was completed and furnished at a cost of approximately \$25,000, of which Front Street Church, Burlington, donated \$14,000 in cash and equipment. It was used in the summer of 1969 for the housing of non-counseling staff and has been in constant use during the fall, winter, and spring by retreat groups. A special service of dedication for this new facility at Chestnut Ridge will be held in the spring of 1970 when an appropriate plaque will be placed in recognition of the gifts of Front Street Church.
- b. Improvements were made on the swimming pool at a cost of approximately \$3,500.00.
- c. One of the existing cabins was named the Teresa Sykes Cabin. It was given by Mr. G. P. Sykes, member of the Chestnut Ridge Church, and generous benefactor of the camp.
- d. A new panel truck, costing \$3,300, was donated to the camp by Mr. Robert E. Reed, Camp Superintendent.
- e. A new tractor with front-end loader was purchased and is being used in maintenance at Rockfish and Kerr Lake as well as Chestnut Ridge. The cost was \$3,038.50.
- f. A new winterized cabin is being given by First United Methodist Church, Mebane, at a cost of \$6,000.

2. Don-Lee.

- a. The long-delayed beach-erosion project was completed at a cost of approximately \$40,000. Two timber groins were constructed on either side of the property. The beach was rebuilt and restored by pumping sand, grading, and grassing.
- b. The pier was rebuilt.
- c. A pulpwood operation, involving about 70 cords of wood, was completed, thus helping to ventilate, beautify, and landscape the central area of the camp.
- d. A start was made on the rehabilitation of beds. Fifteen double-deck beds were rebuilt by the Family Camp work group. New mattresses are being provided as the beds are rebuilt.

- e. The Family Camp work group also helped clean the swimming pool, grounds, and buildings.
- f. The pavilions were rescreened.
- g. The caretaker's house was termite-proofed.
- h. A new pick-up truck was purchased.
- i. New boats bought this year for the sailing program include: six sunfish, a cargo boat, and a chase boat.
- j. A start was made on the re-roofing of the buildings. A new roof is expected on the Dining Hall before the summer, 1970, program begins.

3. Kerr Lake.

The development of the Day Use area was begun. It is expected to be complete by the end of this summer and will include:

- a. A central bath house given and built by the Englewood Church, Rocky Mount.
- b. An open-air pavillion, a project of the Fairmont Church, Raleigh.
- c. Rebuilding the road.
- d. Development of the parking lot.
- e. Construction of a boat launch.
- f. Additional picnic tables.

4. Rockfish.

- a. Payment was completed on the indebtedness and a dedication held for the first unit which includes the unit lodge (with kitchen, dining, and bath facilities), and six winterized, award-winning cabins.
- b. Two cabins were recognized as special gifts: one given by Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur R. Smith, and one by Mr. Norman Suttles and Mr. J. W. Wyatt in honor of Reverend W. J. Neese, pastor of Haymount United Methodist Church, Fayetteville.
- c. A fence and gate were built on the front side of the property.
- d. A new road to the Day Use area was developed.
- e. The road to the main camp was improved.
- f. A second fleet of (6) canoes was purchased.
- g. A canoeing outpost was established up Rockfish Creek.
- h. A new hiking outpost was developed.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Statement by Herman Winberry

Regarding

The Operation and Christian Standards
of our Church-Owned Colleges

The following motion was made and seconded at the Annual Conference, Wednesday, June 3.

That the Board prepare or cause to be prepared a report to the next Annual Conference, statistically, as to the religious beliefs of those who teach in our colleges, particularly as regards belief in the Deity of Jesus Christ.

Submitted by: E. L. Earnhardt

Reverend Herman Winberry, President of the Board of Education, presented the following in opposition to the resolution:

1. This resolution implies a lack of trust in our college presidents and administrators. It says in effect, we don't trust your judgment as to the hiring and firing of faculty members. I have faith in our college presidents and administrators, and I believe we need to leave in their hands judgment on the Christian life of faculty members.

2. There is also this same principle of trust with reference to our college trustees. The point of control that an Annual Conference has over its colleges is in the election of trustees. We have many splendid trustees who give time, talent and money to the operation of our colleges. These Christian laymen and pastors are charged with the responsibility for our colleges. These trustees pass on all faculty. I am satisfied that these are Christian men and women. As a Board of Education and as an Annual Conference, we can instruct these trustees, advise them, or fail to elect them. In the latter case, we must elect new ones; and as an Annual Conference, we have that duty and responsibility. Once they are elected by this Annual Conference, we must trust them to get the job done. The principle of trust and support must prevail for any set of trustees to operate.

3. I oppose this resolution out of personal experience. I was pastor of the Methodist Church in Louisburg. Many of the faculty held membership in the Methodist Church; several were outstanding Christians. I cannot believe we want to go to some of the most sterling Christians in our ranks and say to them, "We do not trust the commitment you once made to Christ; we do not trust your baptism and confirmation; we do not trust the witness you have made up to now. Therefore, you must do it all again and put your name on the dotted line." Every Methodist teacher has stood at an altar and pledged belief in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. I do not believe you want to go to these persons and ask them to sign any paper.

4. All of our local churches are obligated to support our church colleges, and thus these colleges are duty-bound to answer to the Annual Conference. Our Conference Board of Education as an arm of the Annual Conference has the responsibility of nominating and presenting trustees to the Annual Conference. We do so in good faith and Christian conscience. We invite you to review our recommendations, change them, and perfect them. But then, we request that judgment on faculty be left to our trustees and administrators. The trustees are the point of control for the Annual Conference with regard to our colleges.

REGIONAL COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

I. Report for 1969-1970

The work of the Regional Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry has traditionally been in campus ministry, but it is the feeling of some that ministries in higher education, whether on United Methodist campuses

or other campuses, should be viewed and supported as a single ministry, as far as possible. The Regional Commission has acknowledged that initiatives in regard to United Methodist colleges are with the several conferences. At the same time, there continues to be urged upon us the need to seek some statewide approaches to our colleges. Consequently, the bishops of North Carolina will be asked to hold a Bishop's Conference on Higher Education for all inter-conference and conference officials connected with higher education, and all college trustees and presidents. All colleges within this larger political unit will be asked to look at the task of the colleges in the future, the resources available to them, the problems they face, alternative courses of action, and possible strategies. Nationally recognized leadership will be employed.

During the year 1969-1970 the office of State Director was discontinued, and the Chairman of the Regional Commission exercised the functions of the Director. Direction of interconference student work was delegated to the Campus Ministers Organization. More responsibility and initiative was expected of the chairmen and Committees on Higher Education, Program, Personnel, Finance and Facilities. The state office was moved from Greensboro to Durham and in it Mrs. Holland Hale serves as secretary.

The program of campus ministry has been extended to the University of North Carolina at Charlotte where United Methodists and Presbyterians are launching an ecumenical venture. A Board of Directors has been formed. The partial funding provided by the two conferences has been supplemented by the offer of a \$6,500 grant from the Reeves Foundation, so that the aggregate should be sufficient support for the new work.

The program may be expanded on the campus of Pembroke State University. The Regional Commission has tentative plans to engage one third of the time of Reverend Henry Bizzell, pastor of First Methodist Church in Pembroke. Problems surrounding this proposal include the question of continuation of the salary supplement after Mr. Bizzell leaves and the Commission's right to participate in the selection of his successor.

It should be noted that Reverend Reginald Smith, campus minister and Wesley Foundation Director at Appalachian State University, has resigned. Reverend Fred Macon, permanent director of the Wesley Foundation at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, will return in June, and Reverend Manuel Wortman, temporary director there, will be leaving. It should be noted that Reverend W. M. Wells, who was for twelve years State Director of the Methodist Student Movement, resigned at the 1969 conference.

When we made our last report, we were depressed by the fact that the financial prospects for the Regional Commission did not look good. We appealed a second time to the World Service and Finance Commission and finally to the conference itself where the request was supported. For the first time in many years, the North Carolina Conference came near the 40% of total support that it is supposed to provide. In order to make possible the new work at Pembroke and Charlotte and to underwrite the necessary salary increases projected for campus ministers, the conferences will not need to increase appropriations, but they will need to allow us to transfer funds previously appropriated for the retirement of the indebtedness at Chapel Hill to the Program and Personnel Fund.

REPORT ON COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

The Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations invites everyone to consider the following . . .

That every Christian is called to a life of involvement in the world.

That the more clearly one comes to see the church as the people of God called to mission in the world, the more significant becomes the work of persons in fulltime Church Occupations in helping this to happen.

That to every person comes an unmistakable summons which must be answered by decision:

To build a shell of indifference to man's need—or to do something about it;
 To select a pattern of life work for what it offers one—or forget self in a great cause;
 To work with limited loyalties—or to witness through one's work to the highest qualities of life.

I. Program Report for 1969-1970

1. Our Commission was extremely pleased with the dialogue session led by Bishop William R. Cannon on two of our state supported university campuses. These sessions were held with the Wesley Foundation students at the University of North Carolina in Raleigh and the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. The reception at these two Wesley Foundations was extremely gratifying. We wish to express appreciation to Bishop Cannon for the giving of his time and for the manner in which he so clearly related the church's position on a number of important issues confronting our students today.
2. A feasibility study was made to determine the establishment of a United Methodist Testing and Guidance Center within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference. A recommendation for such a Center will be presented to the 1970 Annual Conference.
3. In an effort to promote Ministry Sunday a joint letter from the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations and the Board of the Ministry was mailed to every pastor in the North Carolina Conference.
4. A special luncheon will be held on Wednesday, June 3 for all men being received into full connection in the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church.
5. This Commission chairman attended a Regional Meeting in Atlanta in January on United Methodist Voluntary Service. Those attending were informed by the Reverend Randle Dew not to recruit any more volunteers for UMVS unless the local conference had some place to put them. The following facts and figures on UMVS were also presented:

51 persons have completed terms of service
 251 persons now serving as volunteers
 168 service opportunities planned
 470 total

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

We have sensed God's presence as we have made plans for Evangelism and sought to implement them. We believe God has used us as Christian pastors and laymen in bringing renewal to many churches and winning many people to Christ and the Church. We eagerly await what we expect to be a significant gain in professions of faith, average church attendance, and net membership.

The Executive Director has faithfully devoted his time, thought and energy to representing and doing the work of the board during the past five years. We express our appreciation to him and wish him continued success and happiness.

We have shared in becoming a part of the "wholistic" Program Council plan for coordination of all agencies. We provided leadership in the 22 district workshops in the fall of 1969. About 350 persons, mostly Evangelism Work Area Chairmen, attended the Evangelism sections.

I.

THE GOOD NEWS

The Good News was published bi-monthly, as it has been for almost five years. It was mailed to the pastors and Evangelism Work Area chairmen. The purpose of the publication was to report on Evangelism ideas, plans and achievements and inspire and encourage leaders in Evangelism toward greater efforts.

II.

EVANGELISM EMPHASIS

Our Board sponsored a Church Attendance Emphasis last fall, feeling the need to bring inactive members into the fellowship and worship experiences of the church.

An Evangelism Emphasis was conducted this spring, striving to enlist the lost and the non-affiliated people of the local church communities.

"A Holy Season of Love," a folder for a Lenten project, was distributed for the fourth year. The Churches ordered some 20,000 copies. Many churches have reported renewal as a result of members doing the suggested acts of kindness to other church members the various weeks of Lent.

III.

PASTORS' CONFERENCE ON EVANGELISM

The Pastors' Conference was held at Methodist College, August 26-27. Speakers were Bishop William R. Cannon, Dr. Lee C. Morehead, of Illinois, and Dr. George Fallon, of the General Board. About 250 ministers attended.

Bishop Cannon conducted an ordination service for new Deacons.

IV.

LAY CONFERENCE ON EVANGELISM

The Conference was held August 16-17 at Methodist College with the Reverend Larry Eisenburg, of the General Board, as resource leader. Focus was on the local church Work Area of Evangelism. About 80 persons attended.

V.

U. S. CONGRESS ON EVANGELISM

Robert L. Bame and H. M. McLamb were sent by our Board to the U. S. Congress on Evangelism in Minneapolis in January. They reported on the Congress at the spring Board meeting. Attendance was in excess of 5,000 from 93 denominations. Platform speakers and small group leaders represented the various theological persuasions. We were pleased with the tone of the Congress for social concerns as expressed by leaders of the more conservative groups.

VI.

LAY WITNESS MISSIONS

The Board of Evangelism has joined with the Board of the Laity in co-sponsoring Lay Witness Missions in the Conference. There was a thorough discussion of Lay Witness Missions in the spring Board meeting and a motion was adopted to reaffirm the Board's support of the Lay Witness Mission movement.

About 20 missions were held this year. Our Executive Director has worked this year primarily in an advisory capacity.

VII.

DISTRICT SECRETARIES OF EVANGELISM WORKSHOP

Two workshops were held. They were scheduled a day in advance of the two regular meetings of the Board in order to save time for the district secretaries and keep down expenses of the Board.

We realize the importance of the secretaries in the program of evangelism. We have tried to magnify this position and we have tried to train and inspire the men for their work in the districts, with an emphasis on functioning district committees on evangelism. Reports on the workshops were made at the two Board meetings, followed by questions and discussion.

VIII.

SPECIAL REVIVAL SERVICES

A special project of the Board this year has been free revival services conducted by the executive director in the smaller churches. Revivals were held in the following churches: Holly Springs, Wesley (Franklinton Charge), Fletcher's Gillburg, and Wilson Temple and Layden Memorial in Raleigh.

The revivals featured guest youth singing and witnessing groups, lay witnessing, gospel choruses, evangelistic preaching and calls to commitment.

IX.

SUMMER BEACH MINISTRIES

Nags Head—Sponsored by Baptists, Methodists and Presbyterians.

1. **Movies on the Beach:** "Antkeeper, Time and Eternity" and "Making of a Man." Attendance was 3,931.
2. **Circus Tent Ice Cream Parlor:** Daily music and witness programs were conducted by young people. Contemporary forms of worship were conducted on Saturday nights. Distributed 992 copies of "Good News for Modern Man" New Testaments. An estimated 40,000 people visited The Circus Tent. A total of 188 local people and tourists gave work and life to the Circus Tent Ministry. Letters and testimonies witnessed to changed lives.

Atlantic Beach

The Reverend Ellis Bedsworth reported to the fall Board meeting on last summer's Atlantic Beach Ministry. He said, "The Bogue Bank Resort Ministry exceeded our dreams and hopes during the 13 weeks of its operation. We never lost our aims. Our aims were to minister to youths in their way, to witness to youths that we care, to witness that we are willing to help them meet their needs, and above all, witness to the love of Jesus Christ."

The Reverend A. P. Hill, Jr., reported Sunday School attendance of around 200 and an estimated 5,000 per week in the film ministry and the "Koinonia Coffee House."

Bogue Banks Resort Ministry was incorporated February 17, 1969 as an ecumenical venture.

X.

PROJECTS WE HAVE ENCOURAGED

1. Leisure Time Ministry, Currituck, The Reverend R. M. Smithson, director.
2. Outdoor Church Theater, Lumberton, The Reverend James H. Bailey, director.
3. "Contact" a telephone ministry for people in emergency needs, especially the suicide prone. Hay Street Church led the churches of various denominations in Fayetteville to inaugurate "Contact" there, under direction of The Reverend W. H. Kirby.
4. "The Fish," a project of a church or a group of churches to give practical aid of an emergency nature as people call for help, such as transportation to a hospital, reading to the blind, referrals, etc.

XI.

BISHOP'S DIALOGUE

Our Board sponsored the second Bishop's Dialogue with young ministers on August 27, at Methodist College. Bishop Cannon conducted the session. The young ministers expressed their innermost feelings, concerns and problems.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE

TRUSTEES OF THE METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN, INC.

PART I—REVIEW OF THE YEAR

The Conference year 1969-1970 has been a period of progress at the Methodist Home for Children. Long Range Planning began in 1968. The first stage decisions have resulted in significant improvements in program, staff and campus.

It is recognized that what we can do for children depends primarily upon the staff who works with them. For this reason, considerable emphasis has been placed upon staff development including both supervision and training. The result is a staff which is continually developing their skills and efficiency in working with children. Large use is being made of workshops and training conferences attended by staff of many child care agencies as well as on the job supervision and training.

The assignment of children to cottage living groups is receiving strong attention. Most of the cottages now would be called family style cottages having both brothers and sisters living in the same cottage. The progress of each child is watched carefully so that adjustments can be made in our plans for caring for him as these adjustments may be indicated.

Efforts are being made to secure a large house in the community that can be used as a group home for more mature high school boys so that a special program for them can be carried on, calculated to better prepare them for graduation and moving back into responsible citizenship in the community. Until we can secure such a house we are presently using one of the cottages on the campus for this purpose. Two new residences have been built during the past year, one for our Chaplain and one for our Director of Group Care. One of these takes place of house that had been rented off the campus and the other takes the place of a very inadequate house that had been used in the past for the Chaplain and his family. One of the streets has been repaved to bring it up to the standards of the other streets on the campus. A small greenhouse has been built to be used to help children throughout the year learn something about growing plants. Using this and an outdoor nursery we expect to get the children involved in growing plants and shrubs for use in the cottages and other campus areas. This has been made possible by special gifts and the project has been sponsored by one of our trustees, Mr. Muncie Daniels from Manteo, whose term expired in 1969.

The fence along the Glenwood Avenue frontage has been removed and this area will be beautified with grass and shrubs. The trustees have approved steps leading to the construction of one additional cottage for children and the replacement of one existing cottage and also changes and additions in the water mains to provide adequate fire protection for the campus.

Under the supervision of the Raleigh Public Schools, using the ESEA funds, a special program has been carried on for our children. This includes tutoring services for some of the children throughout the year who need special help in school. An Educational Coordinator throughout the year maintains liaison between the Methodist Home and the public school as well as taking special responsibility to see that each child has the best educational opportunity that can be provided for him. This project also provides some extra staff for our summer activities for the children. The program makes it possible for our children to attend summer school and special camp and enrichment opportunities in the summer which might not otherwise be possible.

The Alumni Association held the annual reunion at Easter. Among other things a gift of \$400 was made for the Alumni Project, which is the provision of certain equipment for the new recreation area being developed in the center of the campus. The alumni will continue this project for the next year.

On September 19, the Home suffered a great loss in the death of Mr. Hugh G. Dupree, President of the Board of Trustees. The trustees adopted the following resolution:

IN MEMORIAM

HUGH C. DUPREE

Whereas The Heavenly Father, in his infinite wisdom, has called to his eternal resting place Hugh G. Dupree, the honored President of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Home for Children, Inc., and,

Whereas we, the Trustees of the Methodist Home for Children, in regular session assembled on September 23, 1969, desire to express our deep sense of personal bereavement and loss.

Therefore, be it resolved:

1. That we express our gratitude to Almighty God that our beloved friend was permitted to serve for four years as a trustee and for one year as President of the Board of Trustees.

2. That we record our admiration for "Hugh," as he was affectionately known, as one of the truly great examples of Christian citizenship. In his home life, his church life, his community life, and his business life he expressed a depth of Christian commitment, a genuineness of Christian love and a sincerity of Christian humility that made his presence among us an inspiration and a blessing.

3. That we record our appreciation for the strong but gentle leadership he gave to this Board of Trustees. As its President, he conducted its affairs with a quiet dignity. He had the rare quality of being able to reconcile different points of view and judgment and to get to the real heart of the issue. He could express himself without offense and lead people in a united effort.

4. That we acknowledge his dedications to the mission of the Methodist Home for Children. He loved children and manifested deep concern for the deprived and neglected ones who needed help. He took pride in being a part of the church's ministry of service to needy children.

5. That we express to his family our sincere sympathy in their bereavement. We share in the bereavement. With the family we also share the priceless heritage of his noble life. Our lives have been enriched because he lived.

PART II--PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

The staff and the Trustee Committees are working on long range plans and these are being coordinated by the Long Range Planning Committee. Plans for the immediate future have already been approved by the trustees. These include the following:

1. The construction of one additional cottage for children, making the total number of cottages on campus twelve, and the construction of one cottage to take the place of Borden Cottage which is inadequate for this purpose.

2. Improvements to the water mains which would provide adequate fire protection for the campus.

3. The purchase of an off campus group home to be used in a special program for preparing high school students to move back into the community when they graduate and to take their full responsibilities as Christian citizens.

4. To remodel the administration building and the building formerly used as a dining room-kitchen facility so that they can be better used for our present program.

The entire program of services offered with the Methodist Home is under study. An effort is being made to keep aware of the changing needs for service to children that are being brought to our attention.

Report No. 2

THE METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES, INC.

Part 1

Christ was so vitally concerned with meeting the needs of people he insisted that one entered the kingdom of heaven by having concern for his neighbor. His dying command from the cross to His disciples was to care for His mother. The early church caught this concern, for the first offerings taken by the church were to care for the widows of Jerusalem.

The founder of our Church, John Wesley, in 1748, "converted the old foundry in London into a home to care for nine widows, one blind woman, two children and two servants".

The North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church in its concern for the needs of all its members realized that there were ministers, ministers' widows, and lay people who after long years of service to the Church and the community were spending the latter years of their lives with no one to care for them.

The North Carolina Conference accepted the challenge and on September 1, 1955, the Home in Durham was opened. Its capacity has increased from 40 to 200. The Home has domiciliary facilities for 125, 42 apartments and 48 beds for skilled nursing care.

The Home is operated by a Board of Trustees elected by the Conference. Though much support has come through gifts from individuals and through bequests, the major financial support has come through an item in the budget of the Churches of the North Carolina Conferences. This is used for construction and benevolent work.

The Home is located on a beautiful 39-acre tract of tree-studded, gentle rolling hills, just inside the western limits of the city of Durham, and adjacent to the beautiful Duke University campus, making all of its facilities available to the members of The Home. It is between the North Carolina Cerebral Palsy Hospital and the Veterans Hospital on Erwin Road and only nine miles from the University of North Carolina.

The basic requirements for admission are a minimum age of 65 (62 for apartments), there is no maximum age limit, a life of service to the Church and the community and the need for the services The Home has to offer. Preference is given to Methodists who are members of the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church. Eighty-five per cent of the members in The Home are members of the North Carolina Conference. The other 15 per cent are in The Home because they have made a real con-

tribution to their church and community or their children are active in the North Carolina Conference.

Approximately 15 per cent are men. This is average for homes that do not cater to men.

Though the decision regarding admission is left to The Home's medical committee after an entrance physical examination, the rule of thumb has been for the member to be able to keep his room with weekly maid service, dress himself, and go to the dining room. Once The Home accepts a member, it keeps him for life. Twenty-five per cent of the members will be receiving nursing care at any one time.

The Home has an excellent relationship with Duke University Medical Center and unless the member requests otherwise, he will be sent to Duke Hospital when hospitalization is needed. He will be returned to The Home as soon as he is released from the hospital.

The Home has an excellent staff physician in the person of Dr. William Poe, who has regular office hours and is on call, and the best of nursing care is provided under an excellently trained and qualified staff.

A prospective member will file an application which will place him under no obligation. The Admissions Committee of The Home will consider the application and if the basic requirements are met, the member will be accepted tentative to there being a vacancy, the approval of The Home's physician, and the working out of financial arrangements.

The Home operates like the church, with members paying according to their ability. The Board of Trustees sets the rate at the current operating costs exclusive of depreciation or interest on investment. This is considerably less than the actual total cost of maintaining a member in The Home but is an amount that a reasonable number of people can pay. The actual charge for an individual is based on the member's ability to pay, the member's physical condition at the time of entry, that is, how soon The Home's physician feels the member might be moving more or less permanently to The Home's infirmary, and the member's life expectancy. Some members pay more than the rate per month, either because they have the ability and desire to do so, or because they are requiring an unusual amount of medical and nursing care. There are those who cannot pay as much as the monthly rate. They receive Old Age Assistance and their care is supplemented through the benevolent program of the Church and through special gifts and bequests. Less than thirty per cent of the members of The Home have sufficient assets to keep them at the current rate for their life expectancy.

Forty-five percent of the members in the main building are Old Age Assistance recipients. No one has been turned away because of lack of finances. The cost of caring for an older person is increasing, not just with the general cost of living, but also with hospital costs. Industry can become mechanized but there is no way to speed up or mechanize the giving of a bed bath, spoon-feeding a person, or dressing or walking a crippled or handicapped person. There is no way to mechanize tender loving care which means so much to older people. This means that when salaries double, the employee will not give twice as many baths, but each bath will cost twice as much.

While some members are on a life contract and approximately one-third of the members are old age assistance recipients, the majority of the members of The Home who have assets are on a life contract.

The current rate of \$250. per month charged members is approximately \$100. per month less than the actual total cost of care. Some members will reimburse the Home for this by monies left in their wills.

If The Home is to give security to its members, it must remain financially solvent. The Trustees of The Home feel a moral obligation to the Church to secure all funds available from legitimate means, such as payment for the members, public funds, and then use gifts from the Church to supplement this to make available the services to the members.

To occupy one of The Home's apartments, the member or members must be acceptable as paying members of The Home. In addition, they will make a capital gift of \$10,000, which will give them the right to occupy an apartment as long as they are members of The Home though they may move into the main building on their request or on doctor's orders.

The Trustees of The Home are justly proud of the excellent service being rendered in The Home. As a result of talking with people and a study of 25 comparable homes across the country, the Trustees believe that The Home is rendering above average service at below average cost and that the policies of The Home which have evolved over a period of 15 years are sound.

There are twenty million people in the United States over 65 years of age. This number will double within the next few years. Approximately 25,000 members of the North Carolina Conference are over 65 years of age and at least 6,000 are daily requiring someone to care for them.

With it becoming increasing less possible to find someone to go into a private home to care for an aging or sick person, people must turn to a boarding, nursing, retirement home or hospital to find care for their loved ones. With steadily increasing cost more will depend upon the government or a benevolent organization to provide these services. In the foreseeable future thousands of members of our Conference will seek these services in a home provided by the church, for the church home offers a "plus" which Christian people need and deserve.

Many people have been misled in thinking that medicare will provide for all nursing care when needed. This is far from the truth and as people discover this, they are turning to the Church. If our Church is to meet the needs of its old and lonely members, it must make additional facilities available to care for more retired people and to care for the chronically ill. The Board of Trustees continues to be interested in making available another home strategically located within the Conference.

The Trustees are aware of the fact that many people with good intentions of entering a retirement home through a stroke, a fall or some other sudden tragic experience, find themselves chronically ill or nursing cases. In an effort to meet this need, The Board of Trustees has appointed a committee to study the need for and a method of financing a health care center on The Home grounds in Durham. The committee is to report to The Board in September. The Trustees will welcome help from individuals or a group in making these facilities a reality.

Bishop William R. Cannon reminds us "that in eastern countries old people are venerated and their wisdom is sought and their advice is heeded. They are the adornment of every home. Children are brought up in the presence of grandparents.

"This was true in our country for many generations but increasingly old people live in retirement homes and are separated from their children and grandchildren except on a festive occasion when they go home for a visit. Most of them are happy in it.

"When a retirement home is Christian it provides all the love and care one would normally find with the family."

In our retirement home your Church offers this kind of environment and care.

BOARD OF THE LAITY

REPORT NO. 1

The 1969 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference was held at the University United Methodist Church in Chapel Hill from Tuesday, June 3 to Friday, June 6. The Anniversary Program of the Board of the Laity was held on Wednesday morning, June 4 with Mrs. James T. Patrick, Conference Lay Leader presiding. Dr. D. W. Brooks of Atlanta, was the anniversary speaker. His address centered on **The United Methodist Church In Mission**. Dr. Brooks also addressed the Anniversary Luncheon Meeting of the Board of the Laity held at the Royal Ram Restaurant at 12:30 p.m. on June 4.

The Chairman and Executive Secretary of the board visited in every district from June 16 to 27, meeting with the District Board of the Laity Staff and going over the program of activities for the year 1969-70. The theme selected for emphasis in the year's program was, "**The Laity In Mission.**"

Several members of the board were represented at the Summer Institute for Laymen held at Emory University, Atlanta, from July 3-6. The theme of the institute, "Equipped to Serve," was given attention.

Twelve men attended the National Conference of United Methodist Men meeting held at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana. In cooperation with members of the Western North Carolina Conference, a charter plane was made possible to make the trip to Lafayette. Over 4,000 men were in attendance at the Purdue Conference. The theme developed was, "**United In Christ — Obedient In Service.**"

The first regional Lay Renewal Conference held in the Raleigh Area was scheduled at N. C. Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount, the week-end of July 19-20. Approximately 150 men and women were in attendance. The conference was sponsored by the Institute for Church Renewal of Atlanta, in cooperation with the Conference Board of the Laity.

Fifty-Six persons from the N. C. Conference were in attendance to the SeJ Laymen's Conference meeting at Lake Junaluska from July 31-August 3. Eighteen were present from First Church, Roanoke Rapids, making a new record from any single church in our Conference. "**Appointment with God In A Tangled World**" was the theme given emphasis.

Sponsored jointly by the Board of Evangelism and the Board of the Laity, the annual Lay Conference on Evangelism was held at Methodist College, Fayetteville the week-end of August 16-17. The Reverend Larry Eisenbrg of the General Board of Evangelism and Bishop William R. Cannon were the principal speakers for the conference.

The 27th Annual Laymen's Retreat was held at Methodist College the week-end of August 23-24 with 350 men in attendance. Opportunities were given in developing the theme of the year, "**The Laity In Mission.**" Discussion groups were offered in the following interest areas:

Lay Speaking

Lay Witness Missions

Sharing Groups—Retreats

Stewardship and Finance

Tithing: Time, Talents, Treasures

The general sessions of the retreat offered Bishop William R. Cannon as the keynote speaker for the Saturday afternoon program. A panel on the Council of

Churches consisting of Dr. T. A. Collins, Dr. C. W. Robbins, and Mr. J. Nelson Gibson was presented Saturday evening. The panel was presented by Mr. Grier Garrick. At the conclusion a special musical program was given by Mr. Robert Montague and Miss Linda Harrell. Mr. Charles K. McAdams, Conference Treasurer, gave the closing address at the worship services Sunday morning.

During the Fall and Winter months excellent opportunities were offered the laity in cooperation with the resource staff of the Conference Program Council. Through a series of district workshops, sponsored by the Program Council, members of the local Administrative Board and Council on Ministries received opportunity for training.

Laymen's Day was observed throughout the church on October 12, (or some more convenient date due to local conflict). The theme of the 1969 program was, "Proved By Action," using as the scriptural basis, James 2:14-22. It has been said that with the exception of Easter, Laymen's Day is the most widely observed Sunday on the church calendar.

The Annual District Lay Rallies continues to attract large numbers of our people every February. The 1970 Rally Program included three Bishops of the church; one former Governor and University President; one North Carolina Supreme Court Justice; member of the General Board of the Laity; a world renowned agriculture economist; a leading advertising executive and Conference Lay Leader; and a noted missionary of the Church.

REPORT NO. 3

Commission On Lay Life And Work

As laymen with a ministry we cannot sit quietly back and expect professional men, such as the clergy, social workers, missionaries, teachers, etc. to be the total witness for Christ in the world. We can no longer relax by the side of the road and just "be a friend to man." Laymen must move out where the main stream of the traffic flows in varying speeds and in various directions. The laity of the Church are also called to serve, and, if need be, to suffer for Christ's sake.

To be effective witnesses we need to be concerned about preparation, as well as dedication. The Commission on Lay Life and Work recommends this to be accomplished in three areas of emphases—

1—United Methodist Men

2—Lay Ministries

3—Spiritual Life

Each District Board of the Laity is now organized to move forward in each of these action areas. The organization will work only if we work the organization. The key to this will be: a) Effective leadership at every level of responsibility, and b) Clear communication in every direction.

We should work toward development of effective leadership on all levels of the church organization. Good leaders with good planning can motivate our people to become effective witnesses in the total life of the Church—gathered as well as scattered.

United Methodist Men

There are approximately 300 organized United Methodist Men Fellowships in our Conference. Mr. Harvey C. Mitchell, Conference Director of United Methodist Men, has prepared a brochure outlining a recognition program for United Methodist Men. A "Certificate of Merit" is to be awarded those UMM who accept certain minimum goals for the year. An additional award identified as the "Bishop's Award for Excellence" will be given the most outstanding UMM Fellowship in each district for the year. Copies of the brochure have been mailed to every UMM Fellowship on the conference listing.

District Directors and other qualified persons are available as resource persons to assist and promote the organization of additional UMM in churches that do not have an active men's fellowship.

Lay Ministries

This area of activity calls for a two-pronged project: **Lay Speaking** and **Lay Leadership Training**.

Realizing the importance of being properly equipped to serve we propose to enlist qualified men who will be willing to serve in providing training opportunities for laymen to become more effective in their local church responsibilities.

Lay Speaking: We recommend the continuance of the No-Silent Pulpit Program during the annual Lenten Season and suggest that these men be called upon at other

times throughout the year when they can be of service. In addition to pulpit assignments, lay speakers can be used in many ways, such as: Bible study and prayer groups; devotions; youth groups; Lay Liturgist, etc.

Lay Leadership Training: We recommend that each district provide the necessary basic training program to enable the Certification of Lay Speakers. November 1971 has been set as the goal to have this opportunity completed. It is hoped by then all of our lay speakers will have had the opportunity to become certified. Advance training, such as offered in Lay Schools of Theology, Lay Academies, and through similar courses offered in Community Colleges, are also encouraged when possible.

We propose that training sessions be established in each district to assist the following local church officers: Church Lay Leader, Lay Delegate to Annual Conference, United Methodist Men, Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, and others as needed and requested from time to time.

We further recommend that every District Lay Leader meet with his district staff for the purpose of planning to implement these goals.

Spiritual Life

Realizing that we must walk close to the Master of Men if we are to be the church scattered, the Commission on Lay Life and Work on behalf of the Board of the Laity desires to make available definite programs that prepare laymen to launch out with conviction and dedication. Such we believe are the following—

Lay Witness Missions: We recommend that this movement be encouraged to continue as an unorganized—not disorganized—effort in our conference to offer men, women, and youth the opportunity to witness to others the experience of Christ in their lives.

Conference Retreats: We pledge to cooperate with others concerned in helping to make the annual Summer Renewal and Re-Creation program meaningful and effective. Other forms of retreats and in-depth study groups are provided by the United Methodist Church and groups that are ecumenical in nature.

Lay-Clergy Dialogue: We suggest that each District Lay Leader and District Superintendent consider the possibility of bringing together a panel, or discussion group, that will deal with this subject on the district or sub-district level.

National Council of Churches: We recommend that each district treat this subject in the light of their own situation and consider a district meeting to analyse the purpose, membership, and work of the National Council of Churches.

REPORT NO. 4

Commission On Stewardship And Finance

RESOLUTION CONCERNING A PENSION PLAN FOR LAY WORKERS IN THE N. C. CONFERENCE

The North Carolina Conference, Raleigh Area, The United Methodist Church in session at Jarvis Memorial United Methodist Church, Greenville, N. C., June 2-5, 1970, Bishop William R. Cannon, presiding:

Whereas the 1968 Discipline of the United Methodist Church in establishing the position of Lay Worker specifically spells out in Paragraph 507.1 the responsibility of a local church or other employing agent to provide a retirement plan for lay employees in this imperative statement: "The employing agency shall include the lay worker in

the retirement plan of the Lay Employee Pension Fund (Par. 1377.12) or other such appropriate plan as provided by the Board of Pensions."

Whereas the 1968 Discipline of the United Methodist Church in Paragraph 667.3.f places with the Committee on the Lay Worker the responsibility of advising the Annual Conference of "ways in which the Annual Conference may be supportive of the work of persons who serve as lay workers."

Whereas the Committee on the Lay Worker of the North Carolina Conference meeting in Raleigh, N. C. on May 11, 1970 voted unanimously to present a rudimentary pension plan for consideration to the 1970 Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference,

BE IT RESOLVED

1. That the North Carolina Conference call upon all local churches within her bounds to provide a pension program for all lay employees.
2. That the North Carolina Conference urge local churches employing those persons consecrated as lay workers to take steps as quickly as possible to implement the recommendations of this resolution, using the North Carolina Conference Committee on the Lay Worker as the advisory and supervisory agent.
3. That for the sake of uniformity the Pension Plan for Lay Workers in the North Carolina Conference be based upon an annual contribution of 9% of the employee's salary: 7% to be paid by the employing agent and 2% by the employee.

Department of Gifts and Wills

We feel that we have had a very good and rewarding year, and that we have made significant progress in this department. We have had more people to consult with us concerning their wills, and all of these wills have included something for local churches, boards, agencies and institutions. We have had more inquiries that have promised a larger fulfillment of our purposes and goals.

We were able to bring to a successful completion early in the year, negotiations for one of our churches in the Conference to receive a gift of land and buildings valued at \$188,000.00, with a very good possibility of receiving more from this same source later.

We have been able to help the Women's Society of Christian Service in the sale of some stock that was left to them, and with the proceeds from the sale, they have made an investment through the Department of Gifts and Wills in the Methodist Foundation, Inc. We hope it may grow through the years to help them render the service they desire.

Mr. and Mrs. John O. Gunn of Yanceyville have placed a perpetual trust fund through the Department of Gifts and Wills in the Methodist Foundation, Inc., the income to be used for the Children's Home.

A memorial fund in memory of Reverend Ralph E. Fowlkes, Jr., who was a minister in our Conference, has been started to help further the education of ministerial students. Funds from over the Conference and out of State have continued to come in all during the Conference year.

The Cobb-Evans Ministerial Scholarship Fund was established by Mrs. Mary C. Evans in memory of her husband and in honor of herself. She has contributed \$3,500.00 to this fund and plans to continue to add to it.

The Stock Brokerage firm of Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith contributed \$500.00 (as they have for several years) through our department to two of our college funds, and we have had other contributors to give funds in smaller amounts for ministerial scholarships.

We have authorized payment of \$950.00 from the Pittman-Frizzelle Scholarship Fund for two young ladies at two of our colleges in the Conference.

I have been preaching and attending meetings throughout the year, having been invited into twenty of our churches on Sundays, and in consultation with people about their wills and desires of their gifts. I participated in 20 of the 22 Program Council sub-district workshops in September 1969; spoke at the Orientation workshop for new ministers of the Conference; attended board of trustees meetings of the Methodist Retirement Home, Methodist Foundation meetings, and held a meeting of our Gifts and Wills Committee; attended the special session of the Annual Conference; have spoken to Methodist Men's groups and other groups about our program. The last three months I have spent a great deal of time in the Elizabeth City district, as Bishop Cannon asked me to act as chairman of a committee of three to help finish the work in that district after the death of Brother Henry Ruark.

The eleven districts in our Conference were covered during our dinner meetings the months of October and November 1969, and we feel that the total attendance of 1,433 persons was an indication that our people want to learn more about their opportunities of strengthening the United Methodist Church. We wish to extend our heartfelt gratitude to all the wonderful people who gave of their time and talents for the work of the Department of Gifts and Wills during these dinner meetings, and especially to I. Lee Parker, Jr., Chairman of our Department. We feel so fortunate in having such a gifted and knowledgeable person who is willing to give so much of his time for the advancement of the United Methodist Church.

BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND

Purpose:

The purpose of the Ministerial Education Fund is to assist in providing an adequately trained ministry for our Methodist Churches by:

- a. Relieving some of the pressure of limited means, where such pressure may well prevent a ministerial candidate from obtaining the necessary education, and by:
- b. Reducing the necessity for too much employment while in school, thus allowing more time for adequate study.

Authority for the Plan:

In 1968 the General Conference of the United Methodist Church, realizing that the education of its ministers was vital to the life of the Church, and that the total membership of the Church should be engaged in a national effort to meet the increased demands for the education of ministers, passed the following resolution:

"Be it resolved that the General Conference establish a national Ministerial Education Fund to be supported by all the local churches, this fund to begin with the 1970 fiscal year. This fund is to be apportioned to the annual conferences by the Council on World Service and Finance on the basis of 2 per cent of the total paid for all purposes by the churches in each conference in the third year of the previous

quadrennium, excluding payments to World Service, conference benevolences, Advance specials, new buildings, and the servicing of debts."

Operation of the Plan:

a. Each Annual Conference, on recommendation of its Commission on World Service and Finance and its Board of the Ministry, is requested to adopt the two per cent plan for ministerial education.

b. Each local church is urged to make an annual appropriation equal to two per cent of its operational budget for this plan. The term "operational budget" includes only those items classified as current expenses. Advance specials, special offerings, building funds, funds of church organizations, such as Women's Society of Christian Service, M. Y. F., and others, and capital investment funds are not to be classified as operational budget items.

c. Methodist students, who are under the supervision of the District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications or the Conference Board of the Ministry and who need financial assistance for education for the ministry, may obtain an application blank from the Chairman of the Committee for Ministerial Education, or the District Superintendent.

d. All applicants for ministerial aid must appear before the Committee before their applications can be considered.

e. All amounts passed upon by the Committee are to be considered loans — not salary supplements — and are to be secured by a note signed by the applicant and witnessed by the financial officer of the college or university which the student attends.

f. The loan may be repaid in years of service in the North Carolina Conference. Loans will be reduced at the rate of \$200.00 for each year of service after Conference membership has been established. In no event will the required years of service exceed six. Failure to meet these conditions will necessitate repayment of the loan or any remaining balance thereof at 3% per annum.

SUB-COMMITTEE ON MISSION STUDIES

CHURCH AND COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

General

The Church and Community Committee is a resource and service committee for the Annual Conference (See: 1968 Discipline, paragraph 1048, sections 1, 2, 3 and 4). We believe that our function is to be trained in the several areas of responsibility that are given to us so that we can advise the leadership of the Annual Conference in the planning of strategy and program for the mission of The United Methodist Church in Eastern North Carolina.

Sub-Committee on Town and Country Work

Leo C. Thompson, Chairman

- (a) We have implemented the "Rural Church of the Year Recognition Program," which included the publication of the "Local Church Analysis Guide" and the selection of one church from each District to receive Certificate of Recognition and \$50.00 award at the Annual Conference Session in Greenville.
- (b) We have assisted in the establishment of effective policies of charge realignment through cooperation action of the Board of the Ministry, the Board of Missions, the Board of the Laity, and the Minimum Salary Commission.
- (c) We shared in the leadership of the United Methodist Parish Fellowship Retreat, March 30-31, 1970, at Camp Chestnut Ridge.

Sub-Committee on Parish Development and Community Service

Charles E. Owens, Chairman

We face a shortage of ministers and use a large number of lay pastors whose training is not complete. We have many persons of limited biblical, theological and sociological knowledge, and some who lack administrative skills who supply churches. Continuing education is a need of most ministers. Some must learn in on-the-job training. In view of this situation, professionally trained ministerial leaders should be used to the best advantage.

We must learn the meaning of Parish, and re-discover our horizontal connectionalism with other churches in a united ministry to an area. This discovery can mean the difference between the struggling-for-survival church, and the church in mission to the community. It can also mean a better deployment of our professionally trained pastoral leadership, and can provide a fertile sphere for developing and training leadership in all areas of the church's ministry. This can be done through the administrative or organizational form termed "parish" or "cooperative patterns" of church work. Such patterns may call for the designation of a trained minister as the "minister in charge" of a given geographical area. He would be responsible for the spiritual and administrative welfare of churches and people through a staff ministry involving other ministers who would be associates. The conference status of "associate ministers" assigned to work on a staff could range from "full connection" to lay pastors. In addition, other paid staff and volunteer staff could be used as members of this new administrative arrangement.

This committee has examined areas of special projects in Moore County, Pamlico County, Carteret County, and the Salemburg area. Various types of organization and cooperation exist in these areas. Preliminary studies are underway which should lead to the establishment of a cooperative work in Northern Wayne County.

Guidelines For Parish Development Grants have been established by the Church and Community Committee. These guidelines are of value for any group studying the possibility of cooperative patterns of ministry, even if no outside funds are solicited.

Our work for the future is the continuing promotion of the parish concept, helping all people to catch a vision of the Church in mission, realizing that none goes his way alone.

COMMITTEE ON RESEARCH AND SURVEY

Walter N. McDonald, Chairman

Committee Activities:

Project I: Conference Map

Under the direction of Reverend Harvey B. Johnson, the basic format and procedures have been established in order that the map may be completed during the 1970-1971 Conference Year.

Project II: Church Outreach

An instrument has been designed to measure the outreach in mission of the churches of the conference. The instrument will be distributed during the latter part of April and a report available at Conference in June.

Project III: Survey of Newly Established Churches

Survey instruments are being designed in order that an in-depth study may be made of churches organized within the North Carolina Conference between 1950 and 1960. The purpose of the survey will be to discover the factors which seem to be most conducive to the success of new churches.

COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION

W. B. Chalk, Chairman

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church, Inc., was chartered by the State of North Carolina to facilitate the expansion of Church Extension within the bounds of the Conference.

The Board of Missions, Incorporated, has \$1,091,030.05 in a revolving fund for the purpose of helping those churches which cannot secure local loans and to help churches to secure construction loans until their money from the General Board becomes available. We are finding it more difficult for churches to borrow money since the interest rate has been raised. Last year, fifteen churches received construction loans. This revolving fund has been of crucial importance for many of our small churches to re-finance their loans.

Ten Dollar Club

Since March, 1954, we have helped to build 74 new churches through the Ten Dollar Club. We have paid through the Ten Dollar Club the total amount of \$1,065,305.22. These 74 churches today are valued in excess of \$8,500,000.00. We desperately need new members for the Ten Dollar Club, if we are to keep pace with the population growth in our Conference. Since our last report, we have helped the following churches to build their first units:

July, 1969: Call No. 47 – Collins Chapel United Methodist Church, Lumber Bridge, North Carolina.

November, 1969: Call No. 48 – Trinity United Methodist Church, Fayetteville, North Carolina.

March, 1970: Call No. 49 – Pine Level United Methodist Church, Pine Level, North Carolina.

On September 15 of each year, the Ten Dollar Club Committee meets to approve churches to be helped by the Ten Dollar Club aid for the ensuing year. Church Extension Sunday will be held on the third Sunday in February. Our goal is at least one new member per church throughout the Conference.

Aid to Churches

The Board has endeavored to help churches through construction loans, through grants, and has assisted them in securing aid from the Rural Fund of the Duke Endowment. When a church loan becomes \$20,000.00, or more, we help to secure the loan from the National Division of the Board of Missions. We have helped churches secure loans in building parsonages and through our grant and aid program have made outright gifts to many of these churches.

Parsonage aid in the form of rental allowance cannot be given for longer than five years, and this must be reduced on a graduated scale. In cooperation with the Commission on Town and Country Work (Committee on Church and Community) and the Women's Society of Christian Service a brochure entitled "A Guide for Building, Furnishing, and Maintaining Parsonages" has been compiled for the convenience of those interested in building parsonages. REPORT OF COMMISSION ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION

Activity in the area of public relations has been particularly fruitful during the year past.

I

The matter of publicity vs. public relations has to be more clearly interpreted to and understood by the Church. While publicity involves primarily the dissemination of denominational news via television, radio and the press, the matter of public relations involves the relationship which both the Director and the Conference have with the communications media. If there must be a relationship involving integrity, reliability, and the style of representation demanded by the various media. The 1969-1970 Conference year saw not only increased publicity for our Conference and its program but also, your Director believes, a close bond with the entire news media.

II

The basis for this belief is seen essentially in the scope of coverage given the 1970 General Conference in St. Louis as well as the special session of the Annual Conference at Edenton Street and the Annual Conference coverage.

In addition to Associated Press and United Press International wire coverage by the Conference Director, both the Raleigh News and Observer and the Durham Morning Herald gave special coverage to the St. Louis proceedings. Three television stations—Channel 11, Durham, Channel 5, Raleigh, and Channel 9, Greenville—gave special television coverage through TRAFCO cooperation. The sixty-five stations in North Carolina, southern Virginia and upper South Carolina of the Tobacco Radio Network provided daily coverage as did WPTF-Raleigh, WDNC-Durham, and WNCT-Greenville provide regular in depth reporting. The significance of the communications media cooperation is seen in the fact that the Raleigh Area had the most extensive news coverage of any area of the Church during the very crucial General Conference.

III

The Director has also cooperated with Conference Boards and Agencies requesting special help with publicity of the program efforts of our Conference. Among these have been the re-structuring in the Program Council, the Bishop's meeting with young Methodists, the open house for the Church and Community Center in Robeson County, and the dedication of Camp Chestnut Ridge. Immediately upon learning of the death of Henry G. Ruark, Superintendent of the Elizabeth City District, a wire service obituary was prepared for the entire media. In addition, we have sought to cooperate with the Boards and agencies as we have had time, and an adequate time was given to meet deadlines.

IV

We have requested that a District Director of Communications to handle each District's own needs in this area be approved by the Conference and approved by the Bishop and the Cabinet. The Conference Director of Public Relations and Methodist Information would work in liaison with these District Directors (who may be either clergy or laymen). It is hoped that a training and sharing session for these persons can be held as soon as feasible.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

The Methodist Publishing House reports that the TOGETHER/69 Emphasis campaign was a success. Approximately 60,000 new subscriptions were entered. The subscription lists of "Together" and "Church And Home", the EUB family publication, were consolidated and the peak circulation for the new "Together" rose to 646,000 with the February 1969 issue. However, during the following twelve months there was a drop in the circulation of over 150,000 copies. As of February 1970 the circulation was 482,000. In this conference there has been a decrease from the 1,355 paid subscriptions to "Together" reported a year ago. There were 1,297 paid subscriptions coming to this conference as of the April issue.

Abingdon Press published 107 new book titles during 1969. Nine national religious book clubs selected Abingdon titles for distribution to their members. For the first time a church-owned publishing house received the John Barnes "Publisher of the year" award when this honor was presented to Abingdon this year. For the first time in many years, Abingdon published a novel. It is entitled, "Hushed Were The Hills". During the first three months after publication, more than 18,000 copies were sold.

There was an 11% increase during the year of church school curriculum audio-visuals, including film strips, filmstrips, and records.

The General Board of Publication authorized an appropriation of \$1 million from the Publishing House proceeds for distribution through the annual conferences to the Conference Claimants during this conference year. This is the second consecutive year that this amount has been appropriated.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

The Board of Christian Social Concerns submits the following report for the conference year 1969-1970. We submit it with gratitude for Christian witnesses throughout the conference who have by their integrity made known the application of the gospel of Christ's reconciling love. We submit it with a deep sense of penitence because we know of our many failures to be more effective in sensitizing ourselves and those committed to our care to the concrete application of Christian teaching in the area in which we have been sent to serve.

The President of the Board participated in the orientation workshop for new pastors, June 25, 1969, presenting the work area of Christian social concerns and the program of the conference board.

Eight members of our board participated in the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference on Christian Social Concerns held at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, July 7-10, 1969.

During September and October, district directors of Christian Social Concerns participated in the Conference Program Council Workshops on the council of ministries.

The Board served as a co-sponsor of a World Understanding Workshop held at Fairmont United Methodist Church, Raleigh, North Carolina, September 27, 1969. This workshop was chaired by Mrs. Charles Dorsett, Conference Women's Society of Christian Service Chairman of Christian Social Relations, and brought together District Directors of Ecumenical Affairs, District Directors of Christian Social Concerns, District Lay Leaders, District Officers of WSCS, members of the Cabinet, outstanding economists, agricultural and food science leaders, and community action personnel to discuss problems of world development.

For its fall board meeting, the board conducted a weekend convocation at Fayetteville, North Carolina, October 10 and 11, 1969. The board divided itself into areas of interest to observe activities in and around the Fayetteville-Fort Bragg area. Members observed the off-duty activities of servicemen and youth in the area, visited the Cumberland County jail, rode with members of the Sheriff's department and members of the Fayetteville Police Department, observed and participated in a discussion of community problems held at John Wesley United Methodist Church. A presentation of drug problems was made by Mr. Marroquin, U. S. Army Criminal Investigation Division and Mr. Pat Reese of The Fayetteville Observer.

The world development workshop and this fall convocation served to sensitize us to the real nature of the world into which we are called to serve, and these activities served to stimulate the thinking of our board in planning recommendations to the annual conference—such recommendations as cooperation with the board of Education promoting drug education seminars, taking advantage of the services of sensitivity training offered by the General Commission on Religion and Race, and recommending unsuccessfully, however,) that Lay Rallies in the District concern themselves with the real issues of national priorities.

The Board served as a co-sponsor for the Peace Education booth at the North Carolina State Fair in Raleigh during October.

Also during October, the board, in addition to its promotion of the observance of World Order Sunday and Tricking or Treating for UNICEF, sponsored three workshops on Draft Counseling, led by Clark Moses, special resource person from the General Board of Christian Social Concerns. Along with providing much needed conference-requested training, these seminars helped sensitize members of our conference to the extent of draft problems among our youth, and they helped shift the thinking of many from regarding draft counseling with the derogatory connotation of draft-dodging and put it on a more positive basis of an intelligent appraisal of what our Selective Service System is doing to our country.

The Board promoted the observance of Race Relations Day, but we report sadly that our offerings are still inadequate, and this has become acute in light of General conference Action to encourage and promote a far greater liberality of the United Methodist People to the cause of black education.

Members of our board have been active in meetings of the State Council for Social Legislation, and one member of our board, the Reverend Ralph Fleming, has been elected to the Board of Directors.

Our Board has heartily endorsed the council concept of conference program planning and implementation, and we look forward to greater coordination of conference program in the future.

The Board is appreciative for the assistance of the conference program council staff, and we express particular appreciation to John Meares who has served as executive director. We look forward to continued association with him and other members of the conference staff as we seek to work within the structure of United Methodism for a more efficient and effective coordination of the program of promoting the reconciling love of Christ.

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF SPECIAL STUDY COMMITTEE

TEN DOLLAR CLUB CHURCHES 1954-1969

In 1954 the North Carolina Conference of the then Methodist Church, realizing that post-war industrialization and suburbanization had caused significant shifts in population, embarked upon an ambitious program of church extension. A survey of the Conference indicated a need for eighty-three new congregations (see *Journal* 1953, p. 149). In order to finance this undertaking, a "Ten Dollar Club" was organized—members agreed to give ten dollars toward constructing new churches with a maximum of three calls being made per year. In 1954 four thousand seven hundred people were assisting in the construction of new churches through the Ten Dollar Club. By 1969, fifteen years after the first call had been made, seventy-four churches had been assisted in the program.

In 1969 the Conference requested the Board of Missions to make an in-depth study of the Ten Dollar Club churches. The report which follows is in response to that request. It must be noted that it has not been possible to carry out every detail of that request because of the time limitations set by the late publication of the *Conference Journal*. Although absolute figures are not compiled in this report for every item requested, enough are included to enable some important conclusions to be drawn. Statistical data concerning each church are appended.

From the collected information the following conclusion may be drawn: the program inaugurated in 1954 has been an almost unqualified success. The following data support this conclusion:

1. The combined membership of these churches represented in 1969 8.95% of the total conference membership; yet they paid:
 - a. 9.96% of the total money raised by the conference.
 - b. 9.59% of the total raised for Pastor's salaries.
 - c. 13.07% of the total raised for benevolences.
 - d. 16.3% of the total spent for building and improvements.
2. The per member giving for the Conference in 1969 was \$58.71, while the per member giving for the Ten Dollar Club churches was \$65.41.
3. Statistical analysis (see appendix A) indicates that when compared with churches of comparable size, there is no difference between Ten Dollar Club churches with respect to Pastor's salaries and building and improvements. However, when giving for benevolences is compared, Ten Dollar Club churches are significantly better.
4. Of the seventy-four churches so assisted, only two have been discontinued.
5. The average amount of supplement (including the Ten Dollar Club call gift) is \$28,222.62. In 1969, the average amount given for benevolences by these churches was \$3,628, indicating that by conservative estimate within ten years the Conference will have more than recovered its investment.

This is being presented as a preliminary study. To be included in subsequent studies are the following:

1. The total amount given by each church since its organization.
2. The relationship of type of community (industrial, suburban, or military) to needed assistance.
3. The growth rate of new churches.
4. Leadership capabilities.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The annual meeting of the Conference Board of Trustees was held at 2:00 p. m. on Wednesday, June 4, 1969, at University United Methodist Church, Chapel Hill N. C.

The financial statement by the Board of Trustees presented by the conference treasurer to the 1969 conference, showed that funds totaling \$371,377.62 were held by

the Board. This statement showed earnings for the year ending 1969 to be \$19,061.65. Total distribution was \$7,240.90, all paid to the Board of Pensions.

The following officers were elected: J. W. Jenkins, Jr., Chairman; J. W. Page, Vice-Chairman; J. L. Joyce, Secretary; James H. Ward, Representative on the Methodist Foundation.

The Board accepted the resignation of C. A. Dillon and by resolution expressed to him their sincere appreciation for his many years of service to the Methodist Church as a Conference Trustee.

On motion duly seconded and approved, the Board of Trustees adopted the guide for building, furnishing, and maintaining parsonages as approved by the 1961 Conference for its own use in acquiring parsonages for staff offices and recommended this guide to all local churches for their use in acquiring or remodeling local church parsonages.

During the Conference Year 1969-70, the property of Bethel Church, Littleton Charge, was disposed of at a net proceed of \$982.02, which money was transferred to Littleton Methodist Church.

A bequest of 60 shares of Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company stock was received from the estate of Mrs. Lizzie C. Fleming, Raleigh, North Carolina. According to her wishes, the proceeds from sale of this stock was set up in a segregated fund for retired preachers. The gift was made in memory of her father and mother, Charles Skinner Allen and Anna Murray Allen.

The Executive Committee of the Trustees met with the Program Council Director and the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance and helped draw up a reorganization plan for ownership and maintenance of the parsonages held by the Methodist Church for use by ministers who are conference staff members. This report will be submitted to the annual meeting of the Conference Board of Trustees and to the Annual Conference for their adoption.

The audit report of the conference trustees which will appear in the Conference Journal will include a report of the current status of the Board of Trustees.

REPORT OF WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

After one year as a new organization of the United Methodist Church, the Women's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild remitted \$210,935.98 to the Division Treasurer to help fulfill her purpose "to make Christ known throughout the world."

This organization of the women of the North Carolina Conference has also worked diligently to develop a personal responsibility for the whole task of the church, challenging her members to respond to God's redemptive purpose, by providing opportunities for service.

Miss Elaine Casser, Assistant General Secretary, Section on Program and Education for Christian Mission of the Women's Division, led a spiritual growth retreat in June at Louisburg College. Miss Gene Maxwell, Women's Division staff member led the Executive Committee in a two-day Enrichment Conference in January for the benefit of the executive committee.

A workshop on Hunger, Trade and World Development was held in September. Four United Nations workshops were held in North Carolina in September and October. The North Carolina president of the W.S.C.S. has attended meetings of the Board of Missions, the Southeastern Jurisdiction Council, pertinent North Carolina Conference meetings, and meetings of other denominations when invited.

Eight young people preparing for full-time Christian service received \$3600 in scholarships to Methodist Colleges.

A joint School of Christian Mission with the Conference Board of Missions proved successful, and plans for the 1970 Summer R and R, which will be even broader service to the whole church, is anticipated.

This is the year for the Quadrennium Assembly of Methodist women held in Houston, Texas, May 7-10. The North Carolina Conference had at least thirty delegates attending.

The annual meeting was held at Grace Church, Wilmington, in March with 553 women in attendance. The following outstanding speakers challenged the women to "build the world anew" which was the theme of the conference: (1) Dr. J. Edward Carothers, Associate General Secretary, National Division, Board of Missions, New York; (2) Mrs. Thomas P. Green, Vice-President Southeastern Jurisdiction Society-Guild, Louisville, Kentucky; (3) Mrs. Wayne Harrington, President, Women's Division, Omaha, Nebraska.

The Wesleyan Service Guild had an excellent annual meeting prior to the Women's Society meeting at Grace Church, Wilmington. Mrs. Harrington and Mrs. Green were also speakers for the Guild.

It has been a year of choice, change and challenge. Christian growth has taken place, but even more can happen. With dedicated women as can be found in eastern North Carolina, the Women's Society of Christian Service goals can be met with the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

An overwhelming majority of the pastors and approximately twelve hundred boys and girls preparing for confirmation attended area meetings led by the Conference Commission on Worship during the Year 1969-70.

Two major Conference-wide activities led annually by the Commission are: (1) District workshops during which pastors meet to study together some aspect of the worship of God, and (2) the Bishop's meeting with confirmation classes, held in three locations across the fifty-six-county area.

Planning & Preparation

In order properly to plan and prepare for these two events the Commission met three times. At an August 28th meeting in the Methodist Building in Raleigh the new Chairman was elected to replace the late Ralph E. Fowlkes. The broad outline of the coming workshops to be held in November in all eleven districts at this meeting began to take on more definite shape. October 14, at St. Luke Church in Goldsboro, more detailed plans were made for both the workshops and the Bishop's Meeting with Young Methodists to be held in March. February 16, at St. Mark's Church in Raleigh, final plans for the Bishop's Meeting were made and a theme for the 1970-71 workshops was developed. May 12, at the Holiday Inn in Selma, the full Commission met in a very productive session of evaluation of 1969-70 and planning for 1970-71.

"The Pew-Eye View"

The workshop in each of the eleven districts this year focused on the role of the laity in worship. "The Pew-Eye View of the Worship Service" was presented in some districts by Conference Lay Leader James Patrick and in other districts by Laity Board Secretary Roy Turnage. The Board of the Laity cooperated in the sponsorship of this series. A ministerial member of the Worship Commission led as persons present listed problems they experienced in worship. Another ministerial member in each district then presented a statement on customary procedures through which lay persons participate in worship, and unusual or "beyond the customary" ways. It was discovered in open discussion that many of our churches are experimenting with helpful, fresh de-

partures from the routine in an attempt to make worship more meaningful for the average person. Some pastors for instance are inviting talk-back response to the sermon either at the close of the service or in special Sunday evening sessions. In some churches a lay person is invited to give a brief word of witness from the lectern or pulpit Sunday morning in special Advent or Lenten experiences of Christian witness. Several churches reported occasional services in which young people with guitars express the Gospel of Christ in contemporary music. Other congregations have secured pew Bibles and encourage the people to bring their own Bibles to Church so the worshipper can read the Word of God as it is being read from the lectern.

Boys & Girls Meet the Bishop

The Bishop's Meeting with Young Methodists this year was held in three locations. March 7, at 10:00 A.M. in Raleigh at Edenton Street Church and at 3:00 P.M. in Fayetteville at Haymount Church, and March 21, at 10:00 A.M. in Greenville at St. James Church, Bishop William R. Cannon spoke to, shook hands with and answered the questions of at least twelve hundred confirmation class members! Each child was given a picture of the Bishop and a message from him over his signature in the form of a printed program folder. In addition, these young United Methodists had explained to them the Christian symbolism of the three beautiful sanctuaries in which these meetings were held. In Raleigh and Fayetteville they heard representatives of Campus Crusade for Christ from the campus of Duke University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. In Greenville a Roman Catholic sister led the song 'n sharing session. In each place young people met not only the Bishop but one another and saw that hundreds of their peers were answering in the affirmative that crucial question, "Do you confess Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior?"

The Worship Commission is grateful to the Bishop, the Superintendents, pastors and laymen for their cooperation in this year's activities. We ask the reader to join us in prayer that God establish the work of our hands and use it in the cause of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Group B: Agency Recommendations, Effective 1970 - 1971

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE COMMISSION
ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The Commission on Archives and History has met twice during this Conference year and makes the following recommendations to the Program Council and to the Annual Conference:

I

We recommend to the General Commission on Archives and History, regarding the proposed relocation of our national headquarters, that primary consideration be given to Lake Junaluska as the major headquarters site. We go on record supporting Lake Junaluska because of the present facility and the opportunity for expansion at Headquarters Building.

II

A recommendation will be made to the forthcoming session of the General Conference in Saint Louis that Whitaker's Chapel become a National Historic Shrine of the United Methodist Church. This follows a recommendation from our Conference Commission several years ago, and has already been approved by the General Commission on Archives and History at the meeting in the fall of 1961 at Little Rock, Arkansas. Thus, Whitaker's Chapel will become the fifteenth shrine of United Methodism. We recommended that a Conference-wide commemoration of this designation be held on the second Sunday in October with worship and preaching services at 11:00 a.m., a picnic lunch on the grounds, and a special commemorative service at 2:00 p.m.

III

We urge the Commission on Archives and History of the state of North Carolina to consider erecting a state roadside marker, an historical marker, to honor the late Bishop William Walter Peele who died in July, 1959.

IV

The year 1971 will mark the 200th anniversary of Francis Asbury's arrival in the New World. We encourage all who are interested in Methodist history to make plans to share in a nationwide celebration to be held at Lake Junaluska, September 3-6, 1971.

V

In September, 1772, the Reverend Joseph Pilmoor preached the first Methodist sermon given in North Carolina. The Conference Commission looks forward to the 200th anniversary of this occasion and shall plan a commemorative service for Annual Conference in June, 1972. Pilmoor's *Journal* has been printed this year and copies given by the Commission, on behalf of the Conference, to the Louisburg, Wesleyan, and Methodist College libraries.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF COLLEGE VISITORS

I.

The Board of College Visitors of the North Carolina Annual Conference made its annual visits to North Carolina Wesleyan College, Methodist College, and Louisburg College during the month of March. We were impressed by the innovations in the educational programs at North Carolina Wesleyan and at Louisburg. Sixteen convocations during the year at Rocky Mount focus attention on the major issues of our day, and ap-

roximately half of the student body is involved in community life service. The systems approach at Louisburg promises to reduce the teacher's work load and to give the student exhibitory he has not had before.

The Hensdale Chapel and the Earth Science Laboratory have been completed at Methodist College. Our campus at Fayetteville continues to receive more students from North Carolina than the other two schools, and presently 54 students are preparing for full-time Christian service.

Recruitment of students, particularly at North Carolina Wesleyan and Methodist colleges, appears to be one of the great needs this year. Methodist College has an enrollment of 959 but could accommodate 1200 students.

In our conversations with students, faculty, and administrators we continued to find mutual respect and consideration in a truly Christian atmosphere. We are grateful to our colleges for their achievements in the past and their vital task in the present and future.

II.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend continual and increased financial support for our colleges. The power cost of state-supported schools, the increasing cost of education, and the increased competition for the benevolent dollar, all demand that we Methodists give more to support our schools.

2. We recommend that the Board of Education reallocate some funds for the Methodist Student Movement at Louisburg College. The lack of Student Union facilities and limited dormitory facilities for men, together with the lack of a central socializing area demand our immediate attention and help.

3. We recommend more participation of our students in faculty committees in each one of our colleges.

COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAM 1970-1971

The North Carolina Conference has entered into a cooperative relationship in the field of continuing education for ministers with the Western North Carolina Conference, the Duke Endowment and the Divinity School of Duke University. This cooperative commitment is expressed in the North Carolina Commission on Continuing Education. This Commission is made up of representatives of the above named groups, including persons from the Methodist colleges of the state.

In general, the main thrust of the Commission will be to identify programs of continuing education developed by institutions and agencies, both church and secular, both in and out of North Carolina. By assisting persons to become involved in already functioning programs of continuing education it is believed that the commission can be more effective than by attempting to initiate new programs. Selective programs will be initiated, however, to insure that the rich resources of talent in North Carolina will be used in district level programs to stimulate pastors to continue their education.

The North Carolina Conference Committee on Continuing Education is committed primarily to bringing the opportunities for continuing education to the attention of the pastors, and to assisting in the development of programs on the district or multi-district level.

During the 1970-71 Conference year, the committee proposes to assist in the following:

1. Seminar on Preaching meeting once every two weeks for 10-15 weeks in the fall, the times to be developed with a leader either from the Divinity School, or one of our colleges. This seminar will be especially focused on the needs of the full-time lay pastor, but will be open to all.
2. A second seminar to be projected to meet the needs of Conference members. The exact area of concern will be chosen by response to a questionnaire which will be mailed to a representative group of pastors. Suggested areas of study are "The Cooperative Parish," "Biblical Study," (in-depth study of particular Books of the Bible is a possibility), "The Biblical Basis of the Church's Social Involvement," etc. This study is also planned for a 10-15-week period with the group meeting once every two weeks in the fall.

3. The third projection for the year is an in-residence reading program to be developed in connection with the Duke Divinity School.
4. The Committee on Continuing Education in cooperation with the North Carolina Commission proposes to encourage individuals to participate in continuing education programs which are carried on by institutions and agencies in and beyond the state.

A listing of such opportunities will be made available either through the *Norht Carolina Christian Advocate* or by mailing to pastors. It is anticipated that the committee will be able to participate in the development of financial assistance to pastors in order to make their involvement possible.

In addition to the above, the committee warmly supports the following continuing education opportunities for ministers:

2. Duke Pastors' School, October 26-28, 1970.
3. Interpreter's House—Seminars at stated periods throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY MINISTERS' EMERGENCY FUND

1. The Sustentation Fund is to be used for emergency relief in the form of grants to effective ministers and lay pastors serving appointments whose salary is paid by the local church or conference treasurer, and who become disabled to the extent that they are unable to continue their work, and whose income is not adequate to meet emergency needs.

2. Emergency appropriations shall be used to bring the disabled minister's income up to a maximum of \$4,320 per conference year. If the applicant receives other personal income in excess of \$4,320 such additional income shall be deducted from the emergency grant. In no event shall the emergency funds be used to supplement an applicant's income of \$4,320 or above.

3. Payment of this \$4,320 will be made on the basis of \$360 per month. Payment will be made only during those months the applicant qualifies for Emergency Funds. No funds will be appropriated without three-fourths approval of the Joint Committee on Disability.

4. The Joint Committee on Disability secretary must place all necessary forms in the hands of the Cabinet members at the beginning of each conference year.

5. In all cases the applications—the district superintendent, the doctor, and the applicant—shall be completed and forwarded to the chairman of the committee before approval of funds will be made.* Any minister expecting to receive Emergency Funds at the beginning of the conference year should make application not later than two weeks before the annual conference convenes.

6. The Joint Committee on Disability may require physiological and psychological examination when deemed necessary by the committee. These will be done by a doctor approved by the committee and results of tests will be sent to the committee. In such case the committee may share the expense of the examination in an amount not to exceed \$100.

7. Funds will be made payable within thirty days following committee approval.

8. In cases where application for Emergency Funds occurs during the session of the annual conference, the applicant's district superintendent and the applicant, when possible, shall present an oral application to a joint committee of the Cabinet and at least three members of the Joint Committee on Disability. At this time appropriate action will be taken in keeping with the best interest of the applicant and in the spirit of the Emergency Fund. The written forms must be completed and placed with the committee within thirty days of this meeting.

*Except in those special cases as defined in paragraph 8.

9. All cases shall be reviewed at the middle of the conference year to determine progress made in each case. It shall be the responsibility of each applicant's district superintendent to see that the progress reports—statements from the doctor and the district superintendent—are completed and placed with the committee. Should this review of the applicant's disability reveal that he is capable of resuming work, it shall be the responsibility of the Joint Committee on Disability to bring this information to the attention of the Cabinet.

10. Should the disability continue beyond one year or through one annual conference we call attention to the fact that the General Board of Pensions makes medical disability payments, based on a man's service years. We also call attention to it is possible that in some cases retirement may offer specific advantages over Emergency Fund aid.

11. Should the disability continue beyond one year or through one annual conference, the Joint Committee will conform to Disciplinary Requirements as found in paragraph 57 which demand annual conference approval.

12. We recommend that expenses of travel, telephone, postage, etc., for the committee be paid from the Emergency Fund.

That members of the Commission be prepared to serve as resource persons in each district and be able to provide information in the area of ecumenical affairs.

That the Commission sponsor the following study seminars focused on COCU: (a) one in the fall for members of the Commission to which district directors will be urged to come; (b) one in each district or group of districts led by Bishop Cannon; and (c) one in each local church which will be led by the local director.

That pastors and laymen use materials provided for them in the Methodist Building in Raleigh. Audio-visual materials will be placed in the Walton Memorial Audio-Visual Library and reading materials in the Board of Education Library.

Ecumenical materials may also be secured from the following addresses: United Methodist Church, General Commission on Ecumenical Affairs, Office of General Secretary, 777 United Nations Plaza, New York, N. Y. 10017; World Council of Churches, 475 Riverside Drive, New York, N. Y. 10027; National Department of Publication Service, National Council of Churches, 475 Riverside Drive, New York, N. Y. 10027.

That an ecumenical breakfast be held at the session of Annual Conference with special efforts being made to draw representatives from churches of COCU and the Roman Catholic Church.

That the following observances be held in 1971: The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, January 16-23; and COCU Sunday, April 18.

That local United Methodist churches cooperate with other local denominations in the following areas of work: Ghetto, youth, music, pulpit exchange, recreation, dialogue, telephone ministry, and service projects.

Recommendations

Recommendations for 1970-1971

A. LEADERSHIP PRESUPPOSITIONS

The new structure of the United Methodist Church now calls for a wholistic approach to leadership development. This focuses attention on the team approach to ministry both in the church and in the life of the world. Leadership development, now more than ever,

must become an integral part of the ministry of each local congregation and long-range plans for developing the needed leaders should be a prime concern of each Council on Ministries. In making these plans, the councils should not overlook the skilled help which is already available in the community and in the larger church.

The local church can expect help from the district, conference, and general church agencies in the form of resource persons, consultants, interpreters, trainers, and enablers. The district and conference staffs should provide only those training events which cannot be effectively done by the local church.

The District Program Council becomes a very important link between the local church and the conference to establish communications and assess the needs of the local church and be the implementor in meeting those needs.

The Annual Conference should focus mainly on advanced leadership competence for designated district and conference leaders and resource persons who will, in turn, mobilize and equip congregations for ministry. In addition, there is need to train certain leaders within structural agencies, on the conference level, in the skills and knowledge needed for their specific tasks.

The Conference Program Council should consider the possibility of setting up a schedule of leadership needs for the various Conference Boards and Agencies and making plans to meet those needs through the appropriate channels.

B. LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

1. We recommend that a Consultation on Leadership Development Strategy be held at Camp Chestnut Ridge October 6 and 7, 1970 (noon until noon). We recommend that this consultation involve persons having leadership development responsibilities in the Conference Program Council staff, Program Boards and Agencies, and certain selected persons.

2. We renew the recommendation of last year that the conference conduct a three-day coaching conference for teams of four or more persons from each district to train them to help local churches, especially Councils on Ministries, to relate to and effectively use and understand the new United Methodist Church structures.

3. We recommend that the conference consider ways to train District Program Councils in the concepts of wholistic ministry, goal-setting, the team approach to planning and the responsibilities of the District Program Council in the new structure.

4. In the light of their new responsibilities, we urge District Program Councils to consider the possibility of having a planning retreat to plan their work and develop skill for their task.

5. We recommend that the conference use time allotted in the Summer R and I program at Methodist College to train pastors in confirmation materials. We further recommend that several Confirmation Education Laboratories be established in the conference over the next few years to help pastors sharpen their understandings and skills in confirmation preparation using the new confirmation materials.

6. We recommend that the conference consider the possibility of conducting pilot training projects to train teams of persons from each district for working with local church leaders. The purpose would be to find better ways to solve problems and develop more creative approaches to learning.

7. We recommend that the District Program Council be encouraged to seek a wide base of support for all kinds of leadership development and training enterprises. There is need for a variety of experiences for local church leaders. These should follow flexible schedules and be geared to the needs of the local church. We should make use of a helpful avenues of instruction such as Christian Workers' Schools, short-term institute workshops, etc. We would especially emphasize the laboratory approach to learning as one of the most valid ways to learn. We also encourage the short term laboratory experience which provides a minimum of ten hours of instruction.

8. We recommend that the following policy for honoraria for instructors be followed by the conference:

- a. Certified instructors in certified schools—\$6.00 per instructor hour, one-half to be provided from conference and one-half, plus travel, lodging, and meals, to be provided by the churches involved.

- b. That \$4.00 per instructor hour be provided by the conference for short-term leadership enterprises and that travel, lodging, and meals be provided by the church or churches involved.

SPECIAL DAYS

We urge that each local church observe the following special days and that they make the special offerings called for after explaining the purpose and importance of each:

1. Methodist Day, June 4, 1970. Special offering for Methodist Student Loan and Scholarship Fund (not included in "Single Figure Asking").
2. Promotion Day in the Church School, August 30, 1970 (no special offering).
3. Christian Education Sunday, September 27, 1970 (included in "Single Figure Asking").
4. Student Recognition Day, December 27, 1970 (no special offering).
5. Race Relations Sunday, February 14, 1971. Special offering (not included in "Single Figure Asking").
6. National Family Week, May 2-9, 1971.
7. World Service Sunday in the church school each fourth Sunday.

SECTION B

Committee on Children's Ministry

E. CLIFFORD SHOAF, *Chairman*

Recommendations for 1970-1971

STRUCTURE

In order to coordinate the interests of the various Boards and Agencies in Children's Ministry, *we recommend*:

1. That consideration be given to the establishment of a Council on Children's Ministries as a part of the Program Council.
2. That the membership of this Council be comprised of the eleven district coordinators of Children's Ministries and up to six members-at-large.
3. That the members-at-large be nominated by the various Boards and Agencies including the Boards of Ecumenical Affairs, Education, Evangelism, Social Concerns, stewardship, and Worship) and elected by the Council on Children's Ministries.
4. That additional persons with special interests and skills may be elected as needed for designated periods of time.
5. That the chairman be elected by the Council on Children's Ministries and that he be a member of the Program Council.

3. TEACHER IMPROVEMENT WORKSHOPS

For many years the Vacation Church School Institutes have been held across the Conference in the month of April. Recently an effort has been made to broaden the base of these institutes, to use these leadership training events as an occasion for looking at the church's ministry with children whole. In an effort to offer help for persons in any facet of Children's Ministry, *we therefore recommend*: that a series of Teacher Improvement Workshops be held during the month of April, 1971; that these workshops be held in the evening for a minimum of two hours; that the schedule, design, and leadership for these be developed by the Committee on Children's Ministry in consultation with the district superintendents and District Program Councils.

C. THROUGH-THE-WEEK RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The second series of a new Cooperative Curriculum for Through-the-Week Religious Education becomes available in the summer of 1970. There has also developed a growing interest on the part of many local churches to expand the Christian Education program beyond the limitations of a Sunday morning schedule. *We therefore recommend* that the Conference Board of Education engage itself in a study of the nature, purpose, and need for Through-the-Week Religious Education and consider the possibilities of a pilot project for the purpose of interpreting this new curriculum and training local church leaders to use it.

D. WEEK-DAY KINDERGARTEN

During the current school year the North Carolina State Board of Education has conducted eight experimental kindergarten programs. *We recommend* that the Conference Board of Education secure evaluations of these programs as they become available, and report to the local churches any implications they might have for churches that now sponsor, or that might be interested in sponsoring, a Week-day Kindergarten.

E. DAY CARE SERVICES

A number of factors have contributed recently to the need for Day Care services for small children. There are more and more situations where both parents work. The advent of the Community College has also made it easier for one parent to attend school while the other parent works. There is, too, the continuing need for week-day supervision and care for pre-school children from disadvantaged homes and communities. *We therefore recommend* that local churches carefully consider the need for a church-sponsored Day Care Center in their community as a service to both parents and children.

F. PERSONS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

We recommend:

1. That the Conference Boards of Education, Social Concerns, and Health and Welfare Ministries develop resources and identify other sources of help for persons working with special needs (mentally retarded, deaf, sightless, aged, physically handicapped; the economically and culturally disadvantaged, and persons with behavioral problems) and make this information available to teachers and other leaders in the local church.

2. That the local church Work Area of Education develop a plan of helping teachers gain skills in working with persons with special needs.

G. CAMPING

1. *We recommend* that the Camp Committee continue to explore possible uses of resources and personnel in Marine Biology at the Duke, U. N. C., North Carolina State Marine Labs and the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries and the Carteret County Marine Sciences Project as a way of broadening and enriching the camping program.

2. *We recommend* the continuation of the Campership Fund to help needy youngsters to attend camp, and *we further recommend* that local churches direct special offerings from Vacation Church Schools in the summer of 1970 to the Campership Fund.

SECTION C

Committee on Youth Ministry

SAMUEL D. McMILLAN, JR., *Chairman*

Recommendations for 1970-1971

A. CONFERENCE-WIDE MINISTRIES

1. We recommend that the Program Council consider establishing a Conference Council on Youth Ministry in this manner: eleven youth chosen in a manner determined by the Annual Conference Session of the North Carolina Conference United Methodist Youth Fellowship, a youth representative chosen by the youth in each district, the district coordinators of youth ministry, and the conference coordinator of youth ministry. This Council will evaluate youth ministry program for the Program Council. Each board and agency that wishes to do so can have a liaison person to meet with this Council. One youth and one adult from the Council will be named by the chairman to represent the Council on Youth Ministry on each appropriate board and agency. The chairman of the Council on Youth Ministry is to be an adult elected by the Council on the nomination of the conference coordinator of Youth Ministry.

There is also to be a Youth Committee of the Program Council consisting of eleven youth chosen by the A.C.S. of the U.M.Y.F., plus two adults elected annually by the district coordinators of youth ministry, and the conference coordinator of youth ministry. In addition, this group shall add to its membership other adults who will serve as resource persons for planning the conference-wide youth ministries. The Youth Committee will implement the program adopted by the Annual Conference on recommendation of the Program Council. The Youth Committee is to be presided over by the president elected at A.C.S. of U.M.Y.F.

2. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry consider the possibilities of having a canoe trip and/or an Appalachian Trail hike.

3. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry consider the possibilities of recruiting for service opportunities, such as the Robeson County Church and Community Service Center, camp for the mentally retarded, beach ministries, Cherokee Mission, and migrant ministries.

4. We recommend that District Councils on Youth Ministry consider the formation of teams of youth who are available as resource persons in youth ministry within the district.
5. We recommend that District Councils on Youth Ministry seek to find ways of expanding the participation of black youth in District Conference youth opportunities.
6. We recommend that the program of Junior High and Senior High Camping be continued, with one week in Junior High camping and one week in Senior High camping being devoted to aquatics.
7. We recommend that the Annual Conference Session of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship be continued.
8. We recommend that the United Nations-Washington Study Tour be offered March 3-19, 1971, for forty youth.
9. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry evaluate the Celebration of Life weekend and consider offering such an experience again.
10. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry cooperate with the Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations in offering Explore weekend again.
11. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry offer a one-day meeting for junior High and Senior High youth to explain the task of and to recruit youth for the pastoral ministry. The youth would meet with the bishop and pastors who have had success in and enthusiasm for the pastoral ministry.
12. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry consider having training in group dynamics.
13. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry consider offering an Arts Festival weekend in New York or some other multi-media experience in our Conference.
14. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry investigate the possibilities for an expanded ministry with persons in leisure.
15. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry offer an interracial encounter experiment in reconciliation among Senior Highs in a weekend retreat setting.
16. We recommend that the Conference Youth Rally be scheduled in the fall, with the site rotated annually between North Carolina Wesleyan College, Methodist College, Louisburg College, and Duke University.
17. We recommend that the Planning Committee for the Conference Summer School consider offering a course for adult workers with youth.
18. We recommend that the Council on Youth Ministry consider the possibility of offering a European Caravan for Senior Highs.
19. We recommend that delegates to the 1970 A.C.S. be asked to approve a plan for supporting the Youth Service Fund in the local churches in the amount of a minimum of \$1.00 per month in the U.M.Y.F.
20. We recommend that the district coordinator of youth ministry, the district secretary for Christian Social Concerns, and the district coordinator of adult ministry work together in each district to establish a program of drug education to be implemented by the Board of Christian Social Concerns.

B. LOCAL, SUBDISTRICT AND DISTRICT MINISTRIES

1. We recommend that the conference coordinator of youth ministry make resources available to local church, subdistrict, or district groups who might be able to sponsor their own United Nations and/or Washington Study Tour.
2. We recommend that each district coordinator of youth ministry establish a program of seeking funds for a scholarship fund to provide opportunities in conference-wide youth ministries for youth who are economically deprived.
3. We recommend that local churches be aware of possibilities for training and nurture offered in the experiences sponsored by Impact: Raleigh.
4. We recommend that District Councils on Youth Ministry seek to find ways of expanding the participation of black youth in district and conference youth opportunities.
6. We recommend that local churches consider offering the 1970-1971 church-wide studies, "How the Word Gets Around" and "The Americas: How Many Worlds?"
7. We recommend that the district coordinator of Youth Ministry be named by the district superintendent from recommendations made by the conference coordinator of Youth Ministry.

C. PERSONNEL

Because of his extensive training, his exceptional skill, and his deep dedication to youth ministry; and in recognition of the innovative youth ministry which has been developed in our conference under his leadership, we unanimously request that the Rever-

end F. Belton Joyner, Jr. be selected and appointed to the office of youth coordinator on the Program Council staff for the 1970-1971 Conference year.

Recommendations for 1970-1971

A. PROJECTED MINISTRIES

1. We recommend that the Committee on Young Adult Ministry pursue the possibility of establishing in Raleigh a pilot Young Adult Life Information Clearinghouse.

2. We recommend that the Committee on Young Adult Ministry serve as a liaison agency with the General Board of Education in the experimental use of a Young Adult Resource Packet in our Conference.

3. We recommend that the Committee on Young Adult Ministry consider the possibility of sponsoring a young adult weekend.

4. We recommend that the Committee on Young Adult Ministry cooperate in the Drug Education series of programs projected by the Committee on Youth Ministry, the Committee on Adult Ministry, and the Board of Christian Social Concerns.

5. We recommend that a list be prepared of resources for use in Young Adult Ministry in the local churches of our Conference.

B. COMMITTEE LIFE

1. We recommend that the Committee on Young Adult Ministry be continued as a study, research, planning, and ministering group through the 1970-1971 Conference year at the end of which time a recommendation be made regarding the continuation of the committee.

2. We recommend that the Committee on Young Adult Ministry give particular attention to its task as a "listening group," trying to be aware of the "world of young adults:" literature, films, entertainment, involvement, church relationships, education etc.

3. We recommend that the Committee on Young Adult Ministry be open to persons from other denominations.

SECTION E

Committee on Adult and Family Life Ministry

Recommendations for 1970-1971

THE CHANGING EDUCATIONAL MINISTRY

In the planning and conduct of an educational ministry for these days in a changing world, we must be constantly engaged in changing our approach to curriculum and study. Even as John Wesley proposed changes in the Church of England (which led to the establishment of The Methodist Church), we seek a more perfect church as God is continually renewing and redirecting his people in his changing world. We believe that changes are imperative if we are to be obedient.

INTEGRITY OF LIFE AND EDUCATION

In spite of its apparent fragmentation, life is whole and education for life must be whole. An educational ministry is thus not merely varied, but it has an integrity of design in which the whole of life is recognized. That is, it will be education for the learner's relationships to a vast "field" of realities impinging on his life. Thus it will deal with his relation to family, relatives and friends; to groups and institutions; to community and nation and world; to the incarnate, working God; to the community of God's people the church. To this end we make the following recommendations:

A. ADULT MINISTRIES

1. We recommend local churches establish continuous training opportunities in the local church for training in leadership and communicative skills, to develop leaders at the local level.

2. We recommend local and area groups of local churches plan short term leadership training enterprises for their church leaders.

3. We recommend that a District Program Council be activated in each district to consider the needs of the churches for their district and plan for implementation of program to meet their needs. Age level coordinators should be a part of each District Program Council. We further recommend that training be provided for District Councils across the Conference, and Councils on Ministries.

4. We recommend that local ministerial associations explore the possibilities for training churchmen through community colleges and technical institutes.

5. We recommend that a travel seminar to New York to study first-hand the activities of the United Nations, the National Council of Churches, and the United Methodist Board of Missions be conducted, in cooperation with the North Carolina Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns.

B. FAMILY LIFE MINISTRIES

1. We recommend that pre-marital counseling be included in the program for continuing education for ministers.

2. We recommend that support be given to the drug education projects of the Youth Ministry Committee and the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns.

3. We recommend that the Committee on Television, Radio and Film Communications investigate and provide a TV Guide for guidance in television viewing as a service to the homes of our church. We further recommend that this committee investigate the possibilities of scheduling series of films to be shown on TV stations covering our conference, which would be entertaining and instructive in family ministry.

4. We recommend that local churches discover the needs of constituent families and plan programs at the local level to enhance the Christian life in the community at the family level.

5. We recommend that local churches sponsor delegates to the National Conference on Family Life, October 8-11, 1970, at the Conrad Hilton Hotel, Chicago, Illinois.

6. We recommend that a greater effort be made in our work with older adults.

7. We recommend the facilities of the community colleges and technical institutes as a source for training in family life.

C. ADULT COMMITTEE

1. We recommend that the Adult Committee be continued under the new structure, and that it be composed of the district coordinators of Adult and Family Life Ministries, and representatives from the Conference Boards of Evangelism, Missions, Ecumenical Affairs, Education, Laity, Christian Social Concerns, and the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

D. PERSONNEL

1. We commend the services of Mr. John M. Meares as our Conference coordinator of Adult and Family Ministries and recommend that his most capable leadership be continued under the new Program Council structure.

D. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1970-1971

1. The committee recommends that Fred Falls, Jr. be appointed to replace Leslie Page on the Board of Education and that he be assigned to the Committee on Christian Educators and Music Ministry.

2. We call attention to the fact that full-time Ministers and Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants serving churches in the North Carolina Annual Conference are eligible, as of July 1, 1970, to be included in the group hospitalization plan offered by North Carolina Blue Cross and Blue Shield. We recommend that churches employing full-time workers in Christian education help to provide this coverage by paying two quarterly premiums as they do for pastors.

3. We call attention to the fact that certified directors of Christian Education and

certified directors of Music are now eligible to be considered by the Conference Committee on the Lay Worker for consecration as lay workers in the United Methodist Church. We recommend that these persons make application to the Conference Committee on the Lay Worker and that provision be made in the Annual Conference session for the consecration of those who qualify. We call attention to the provision of the *Discipline* (Paragraph 507) that "the employing agency shall include the lay worker in the retirement plan of the Lay Employee Pension Fund" and urge churches to initiate the necessary procedures to implement this provision. We recommend also that churches whose employees do not qualify for consecration as lay workers and inclusion in the retirement plan of the Lay Employee Pension Fund take steps to provide a pension plan for them.

4. In compliance with the recommendation approved by the last Annual Conference "that the Subcommittee on Christian Education be authorized to prepare suggested guidelines for consideration by local churches in employing directors of Christian education and educational assistants," a study has been made which included a survey of employment practices in this and other Annual Conferences, a review of studies and recommendations on multi-staff ministry reported in various books and articles, and a review of the salary scale for public school teachers. A set of guidelines, including recommendations on such items as salary, expense allowances, vacation, sick leave, and other working conditions was prepared and was approved by the committee. We recommend that the Board of Education adopt these guidelines and that churches employing or planning to employ a worker in Christian education secure a copy of these guidelines from the office of the Conference Board of Education, along with a copy of the "Standards of Certification for Christian Educators in The United Methodist Church."

5. We again call attention to the four-year program of study (two weeks each summer) offered through several of our seminaries to enable educational assistants to become certified as associates in Christian Education. We recommend that local churches encourage educational assistants to participate in this course of study and that they consider providing time and financial assistance to support this participation.

6. We recommend that churches enjoying full-time workers in Christian education provide time and financial assistance to enable them to attend professional meetings and short term leadership training enterprises. We call special attention to the National Conference of the Christian Educators' Fellowship scheduled for November 4-7, 1970, in San Francisco, Calif., and recommend that churches, by providing time off and financial assistance, encourage the attendance of the educational worker at this important meeting.

7. We recommend that the Board of Education lend its support to the Christian Educators' Fellowship in providing an orientation session for full-time workers in Christian education.

We recommend that the Board of Education support this enterprise financially for the year 1970 by providing luncheon and one night's lodging at the YMCA or YWCA for all workers attending, if possible, and that, in subsequent years, this financial support be provided only for those workers new to the North Carolina Annual Conference.

8. We recommend that the North Carolina Conference Board of Education continue its policy of providing a luncheon at the Annual Conference session for the Christian Educators' Fellowship.

C. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1970-1971

1. Program Recommendations:

a. We recommend that a Youth Choir Camp (for rising ninth-graders through graduating twelfth-graders) be held at one of our conference-related colleges, June 14-19, 1971, if possible.

b. We recommend that a Children's Choir Day Camp (for rising fifth-graders through rising eighth-graders) be held at Camp Don-Lee August 16-21, 1971, if possible.

c. We recommend that the Conference cooperate with the Advanced Choral Music Workshop at East Carolina University, Greenville (fall 1970) and the Small Choir Church Music Workshop at Atlantic Christian College, Wilson (winter, 1970-1971).

d. We recommend that a Handbell Festival be held at Edenton Street United Methodist Church, Raleigh, April 23, 24, 1971.

e. We recommend that local church musicians participate in the Southeastern Jurisdiction Institute of Music, Lake Junaluska, August 27, 1970.

f. We recommend that local churches observe A Great Day of United Methodist Singing on or around November 1, 1970.

2. OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

a. We recommend that the North Carolina Annual Conference extend its present group hospitalization program (now being provided for ministers of the Conference and full-time Directors and Ministers of Christian Education and full-time educational assistants) on the same basis to certified Directors and Ministers of Music and other full-time workers in music ministry in the local church, and that this coverage be effective at the June 1970 Annual Conference. When this coverage is available, we recommend that churches employing full-time workers in music ministry help to provide this coverage by paying two quarterly premiums as they do for the pastor.

b. We call attention to the fact that certified Directors of Christian Education and certified Directors of Music are now eligible to be considered by the Conference Committee on the Lay Worker for consecration as lay worker in the United Methodist Church. We recommend that these persons make application to the Conference Committee on Lay Worker, and that provision be made in the annual conference session for the consecration of those who qualify. We call attention to the provision in the *Discipline* (paragraph 507) that "the employing agency shall include the lay worker in the retirement plan of the Lay Employee Pension Fund" and urge churches to initiate the necessary procedures to implement this provision. We recommend also that churches whose employees do not qualify for consecration as lay worker and inclusion in the retirement plan of the Lay Employee Pension Fund, take steps to provide a pension plan for them.

c. We recommend that contact be made with each local church employing full-time workers in music ministry to advise the church of the provisions for hospitalization and the Lay Employee Pension Fund.

d. We recommend that a resource leaflet reporting meaningful music ministry in our conference be prepared for local church musicians in our Conference.

e. We recommend that members of the subcommittee on Music Ministry and members of the Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians (in our Conference) be available to offer their services in the music ministry at annual conference session and the summer conference study session.

f. We recommend continuing articles on music ministry in the Program Supplement of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*.

g. We recommend that the Conference Board of Education sponsor a luncheon during annual conference for certified and other full-time Directors and Ministers of Music.

SECTION C

Committee on Camps and Conferences

Recommendations for 1970-1971

A. PROGRAM

1. We recommend the continuation of the summer camp program at Don-Lee, Chestnut Ridge, and Rockfish as an important extension of the local church program of Christian nurture.

2. *Long-term Camps.* In view of the fact that there has been an increasing demand for the two-week and four-week camp programs, *we recommend* that consideration be given to the possibility of providing the facilities and staff necessary to expand both of these in the summer of 1971.

3. *Camps for the Mentally Retarded.* During the seven years that the Camp for the Mentally Retarded has been operative at Don-Lee, the number of campers has been limited to not more than 56. An increasing percentage of these campers has come from private homes. At the same time Caswell Center at Kinston and O'Berry at Goldsboro have added their support to that of Murdock at Butner as participating institutions. Although limited in size, this has been one of the most enthusiastically received facets of the summer camp program. *We therefore recommend* a) that a second camp for the mentally retarded be initiated in the summer of 1970 at Chestnut Ridge to serve the western end of the Conference, and b) that continuing effort be made to interpret the nature and purpose of this program to interested families by working through the State Council on Mental Retardation and related agencies, as well as its regular promotion through the local church.

4. *Family Camping.* In response to the rapid acceleration in family travel and trip camping, and the crowding of the highways and public camp grounds with a wide variety of tent-trailer camping equipment, *we recommend* that steps be taken, as quickly as budget and adequate planning permit, to provide at Kerr Lake a place where families from the North Carolina Conference can go with their own rigs and gear for an experience of tent-trailer camping.

Some of the next steps in providing an adequate facility for this program include: improve access road, bath house with hot showers, pavilion for picnic groups, boat launch, swimming area, and parking lot.

We further recommend that the resident, organized camp for families be continued at Camp Don-Lee the week between the two regular camp sessions, with guidance for the program from the Conference Family Life Committee.

5. *Counselors-in-Training.* As an avenue of service for graduating high school juniors and seniors, and as a means of recruiting and training future camp staff, *we recommend* the continuation of the Counselors-in-Training (CIT) program at Chestnut Ridge, Don-Lee and Rockfish.

6. *Camperships.* In order to make it possible for needy and worthy boys and girls to attend summer camp, *we recommend:* a) that ways be sought to continue and expand the Conference Campership Fund, and b) that local church groups be encouraged to provide partial or full camperships to help disadvantaged youngsters attend camp.

7. *Retreats and Weekend Camp.* In keeping with the new emphasis on using a variety of settings for the Church's ministry, *we recommend* that local church groups look for new and creative ways of making use of the Conference camps and retreat facilities on a year-round basis. Some possibilities include: Methodist Men or WSCS Planning Retreats, Administrative Board Planning-Enrichment Session, Church School Class Fellowship-Inspirational Outing. A Service-Enrichment type of experience was provided by one youth group who invited a group of mentally retarded youth to be their guests at a weekend retreat.

8. *Day Camp and Church School Out-of-Doors.* *We recommend* a) that church school teachers seek additional times and places to conduct Day Camps for older elementary boys and girls, and b) that regular experiences of using out-of-doors settings and resources for learning and enrichment be provided for all ages. Help with resources for these kinds of experiences may be secured from the Director of Camping.

9. *Environmental Stewardship.* Because of the acute problems being created by man's pollution of air, water, and land resources, *we recommend* that United Methodists of eastern North Carolina take active steps a) to interpret the meaning of Christian stewardship of all of one's environment and b) to help remove some of the causes of pollution.

We further recommend that the Camp Committee continue to explore with the Duke and North Carolina State Marine Labs at Beaufort and Morehead City ways in which their resources can be more effectively utilized in the Don-Lee summer camp program.

B. CONFERENCE CAMPS CRUSADE

We call attention to the urgent matter of the necessity for the completion of the Camp Crusade. This is mandatory if the immediate emergency needs are to be met and if we are to continue to provide and maintain the facilities required in order to maintain a quality program.

We therefore recommend:

1. That each local church be urged to complete payment on its goal during the 1970-71 Conference year.
2. That those churches not completing their goal during the 1970-71 Conference year be urged to put the balance in their budget for the following year.
3. That those churches that have not accepted a goal be encouraged to do so in order that the minimum emergency needs for development might be met at each of the camps.
4. That each district superintendent, in consultation with the district lay leader, appoint a small committee in each district to work with the Camps and Conference Committee to develop a strategy for the implementation of the above recommendations, and that dates be set for these committees to meet early in the 1970-71 Conference year.

C. DEVELOPMENT

We recommend that the Camp Committee be authorized to proceed with the construction and development of priorities at each camp, based on priorities carefully considered and set by the Camp Committee, as funds become available without incurring indebtedness.

We further recommend that Reverend Keith Glover be continued as Director of Camping for the North Carolina Annual Conference and that the Board of Education extend to him sincere appreciation for his unfailing thoroughness and imaginative leadership in guiding the expansion and development of our camping program.

We further recommend that these funds be paid to the institutions quarterly from current receipts.

III. CAPITAL FUNDS CRUSADE

A Special Laymen's Committee, under the leadership of Glenn E. Anderson, Sr. and Arnold S. King, Sr., has been active throughout the year on behalf of our Conference Capital Funds Crusade. Meetings are being held with local church officials in each district for the purpose of informing them of the status of the crusade and the serious problems created by our failure to raise all of the \$5,000,000 goal. These officials are being requested to bring this matter before their Administrative Boards for determining what additional funds may be expected from their churches over the next three years.

The results thus far have been modest but gratifying. Those churches that have taken action have agreed to pay in excess of fifty per cent of their quotas the next three years. Based on this response, it appears that these efforts could succeed in securing as much as \$200,000.

When this effort has been completed, the Conference Capital Funds Crusade will be considered terminated.

IV. OUR BLACK METHODIST COLLEGES

We call attention to the serious financial plight of our ten historic black Methodist colleges. We participate in the support of these colleges through the annual Race Relations Sunday offering. A goal of \$3,000,000 has been set for this offering in 1971, an increase of one-third over the goal for 1970. The quota for the North Carolina Conference based on this goal is approximately \$18,000.

We recommend that this matter be referred to the Committee on Interpretation and the Program Council for emphasis and action, and that the offering be given greater emphasis than it has received in previous years.

V. COLLEGE DAY

We recommend that Sunday, November 1, 1970, be observed as College Day in all of our local churches at which time our people be informed concerning the services our Conference-related colleges are rendering and the need they have for our continued support.

VI. STUDY OF CONFERENCE-RELATED COLLEGES

We recommend that the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry be authorized to make a study of the relationship of the North Carolina Annual Conference and its colleges for the following purposes:

1. To bring the Decker Report of 1966 up to date.
2. To ascertain what our Conference-related colleges may expect from the Conference by way of financial support in the years ahead.
3. To report these facts and any recommendations for action to the Conference Board of Education and the 1971 Annual Conference.

VII. STATE SUPPORT OF PRIVATE COLLEGES

We reaffirm the resolution passed by our 1969 Annual Conference endorsing in principle state aid for North Carolina students attending private or church-related colleges in North Carolina, through tuition grants related to institutional costs and student needs.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

Recommendations for 1970-1971

1. We recommend the continuation of Wesley Foundation and Methodist Student Movement Dialogue Session with Bishop William R. Cannon. The two schools to be visited this year will be East Carolina University and Duke University.

2. We recommend the implementation of a United Methodist Guidance and Testing Center at Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount, North Carolina.

3. We recommend a Second or Changing Careers Retreat at Chestnut Ridge April 16-18, 1971.

4. We recommend the establishment of a central filing systems on persons interested in the pastoral ministry or church employment. This system would also seek to list persons interested in short term enlistment such as medical and technical people willing to serve in disaster areas on quick notice.

5. We recommend that a study be made concerning the possibility of organizing a short term (three to four weeks) work team of trained persons and college students who would be willing to work in needed mission settings.

6. We recommend the continued support for the Lay Rally Scholarship offerings and request that each district, when feasible, have a recipient of the scholarship make a statement in behalf of this special offering.

7. We recommend the mailing to every pastoral charge in the North Carolina Conference a 1971 edition of the annual directory on *"Church Occupations and Voluntary Service."*

8. We recommend the promotion of Ministry Sunday in September. This will be done jointly with the Board of the Ministry.

9. We recommend that this Commission join in a cooperative effort with the Committee on Youth Ministry to offer a one-day meeting for junior high and senior high youth

who are interested in the pastoral ministry. The youth would meet with the bishop and their pastors would have a separate session at the same time.

10. We recommend that this Commission cooperate with the Council on Youth Ministry in offering explorer weekend again.

11. We recommend that a 16mm. sound film of professional quality should be made in color for use in the North Carolina Conference. This film will interpret the pastoral ministry within the context of all the church's ministry in an attempt to motivate persons to consider the pastoral ministry as a vocational opportunity. We further recommend the establishment of a coordinating committee by the Program Council from agencies including the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations, Board of the Ministry, Council on Youth Ministry, TRAFICO, and other appropriate persons.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

A Program Proposal for the Conference Year 1970-1971

INTRODUCTION

A Program of Evangelistic Endeavor in the Third Year of the Quadrennium

In a year when "the silent majority" has become an acceptable phrase in the American language, we find some secondary meanings within and without the church. All statistics in all areas of church life indicate either a decline or leveling off of enthusiasm for the Church. One *could* view this with alarm. Still, there have been extremists, both lay and clerical, on the theological left and right in all generations of the history of the Church. None of these, even collectively, form a majority of the membership of the Church. This is not an apologetic for Christ, the Church will prevail to the end of time and needs no defense, particularly by humans who speak of schism and ecumenism in the same church, at the same time. We are interested in the seeking "silent majority."

We submit a program designed to try to help reverse the trend. We realize that it is generally accepted that we are in a period of reformation, but we are too close to it to give it any historical evaluation or authentication. We do know there have been similar periods in the history of the church.

Our program is concerned with both the majority and the minority, but *our* "silent majority" may well be caused by a lack of communication between clergy and laity. It may be that we have our own "communications gap" with many church members being exposed to so many diverse theological points of view that they are confused. Thus, a "silent majority"—but one we believe seeking Christ and Christian service. All denominations have many church "drop-outs" and their number is growing. There are many devout Christians now living outside the church and a large number of former church members who have serious doubts about whether or not they are Christian and about the advantages of living within the ideal Christian community which is Christ's Church.

We call upon each pastor and each work area chairman in the field of evangelism to address himself to these problems optimistically and with a willingness to work hard and enthusiastically.

JUNE THROUGH AUGUST 1970

Period of Discovery of Local Church Evangelistic Needs, Development of Local Leadership, and Final Planning with the Local Church Council on Ministries

God is calling each congregation to a particular program of evangelism. It will vary from church to church because the needs of congregations vary. First, the pastor must examine himself and look at the evangelistic needs of the church he serves and the community about him. Second, the lay leadership in the work area of evangelism must meet with the pastor and plan a program for the local church which will involve the discovery of the evangelistic needs of that particular church and community. In doing this you are urged to call upon your District Director of Evangelism and/or the officers of your conference Board of Evangelism.

We strongly recommend that the district secretaries attend the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism at Lake Junaluska, July 27-30, 1970, and we urge local church leaders in evangelism to attend.

This is also a time for local church leaders to gather for study and prayer to prepare for the coming nine months. We commend the use of local church retreats. Utilize this

period of time to find the uncommitted *within* the local church and witness to them about Jesus Christ and promote attendance at corporate worship and in the educational enterprises of the local church. Use the new handbook for the local church work area in evangelism and other appealing new evangelistic materials which speak to people today. These can be ordered from Tidings, 1908 Grand Ave., Nashville, Tenn. 37203. Note that all printed helps, including The Lay Witness Materials, Koinonia Group Materials, Neighborhood Action Plan Materials, Church Attendance Materials and other renewal materials, as well as *The Upper Room*, may be ordered from the same address.

Finally, don't forget to have all leaders and interested church members attend our summer conference workshop and retreat, which will be a part of the Summer R and R (Renewal and Re-creation) sponsored by the Conference Program Council, August 11-16 at Methodist College.

Time these to be taught during the church school hour for all Senior High, Young Adult, and Adult church school members, particularly those inactive members who have been invited to this series as a means of retraining and explaining the mission of the church and a new doctrinal understanding of a personal experience of and committed to Christ in the individual life. It is hoped that these would be taught to the entire group together by the pastor and, if necessary, could extend into the month of November. Listen to the needs of your "silent majority." Help them become vocal.

2. Be sure that all church rolls are up to date and audited. Work with your Council on Ministries on a Thanksgiving project.

3. Evaluate the distribution of *The Upper Room* and make certain that it is being received by everybody that will use it.

4. Confirm the presence of *up to date* religious tracts, periodicals and books for free or paid distribution in each local church.

NOVEMBER

1. During the month of November complete plans for and conduct your chosen renewal and Thanksgiving projects.

2. Work with your local Council on Ministries to plan Christmas activities and the New Year's through Easter Attendance Crusade.

3. Continue to challenge persons to faith in Jesus Christ and involve them in His mission.

4. During the week before Thanksgiving have a Prayer Vigil based on what has been learned during the period of retraining.

DECEMBER

1. During the first week of December climax the period of retraining and basic membership training which has been occurring by the congregation gathering for corporate rededication and the baptism and/or confirmation of new members who have been at-

tending. At this same service receive some of the inactive members who have come from churches in other communities and who will now want to become active members of the church where they are. This is an important highlight of our year's program! Personal witnessing *within* the church.

2. Work with the Council on Ministries to promote Family Worship and encourage Christian Stewardship.

3. Work with the Council on Ministries to plan special Advent and Christmas worship gatherings of the congregation.

III.

JANUARY THROUGH MAY

A Time of Evangelistic Outreach

JANUARY 1971

1. Train interested, newly-rededicated Christian church members to seek out the uncommitted *outside* the church.

2. Make a prospect list and plan a Visitation Evangelism Crusade. Don't forget the church attendance emphasis with the use of attendance registration materials each Sunday January 1 through April 11, 1971.

3. Conduct a second confirmation class January 5 through April 11.

4. This is a good time to minister to non-resident members through writing a personal letter and encouraging them to become active and transfer their membership to where they are now living or become an affiliate member of a United Methodist Church in the community in which they are living.

FEBRUARY AND MARCH

1. Develop neighborhood discussion and prayer groups and continue to invite the uncommitted to come and discuss freely what they believe and what they want to believe, entering into dialogue with the renewed and rejoicing Christians in your local church.

2. Work with your local Council on Ministries to plan for special services during Lent and on Easter.

APRIL

1. Emphasize the baptism of infants and the confirmation of new members on Palm Sunday and Easter, April 4 and 11.

2. Assign active, committed Christians to be fellowship friends to all new and re-committed church members.

MAY

1. Compile final prospect list and prepare for great day of Pentecostal witnessing. The time of the second highlight of our Program of Evangelism is close at hand: A Biblically-inspired Visitation Evangelism Crusade.

2. Conduct training in helping persons relate to their fellowman so they can fulfill the mandate to witness.

3. Involve shut-in members in prayer and telephoning for the great day of Pentecostal witnessing to those *outside* the church. This is another seeking "silent majority."

4. Plan a prayer vigil for the Sunday before Pentecost, May 23, 1971.

5. Involve all of those who have been trained and have agreed to participate to go out and visit and witness to the uncommitted *outside* the church on the day of Pentecost, Sunday, May 30, 1971.

6. This is a witness to those who have never made a Profession of Faith in Jesus Christ. Expect an outpouring of the Holy Spirit such as occurred during the First Day of Pentecost. It will happen! The "silent majority" is now vocal for Christ.

7. Work with the Council on Ministries in the involvement of *all* new church members.

8. Work with the Youth Age Level coordinator and the Council on Ministries in planning a program of Youth Evangelism for the summer.

IV.

PLANNING AHEAD

We respectfully request permission to entertain discussion with the Baptist State Convention to join with us in a joint evangelistic rally in a major population center of our state to be held sometime during the fall of 1971. We feel this would be a great ecumeni-

cal experience and give added opportunity to each denomination to concentrate on their own programs of Christian witnessing during the conference year 1971-72.

V.

SERVICE MINISTRIES

1. *Summer Ministries.* A continuation of the summer ministries at Nags Head and at Atlantic Beach and, hopefully, other places will continue to reach thousands of people as they did last summer. An opportunity to worship and give a witness to people while on vacation and during their leisure time has proven to be a tremendous new form of evangelism.

2. *The Fish.* In larger population centers churches may join in manning a telephone number which will open the door to those who have emergency needs, such as providing rides for shut-ins, emergency housework for the sick, reading to the blind, talking to the lonely, referring those in critical need to other agencies. The telephone number would be publicized by all the churches of the community through all communication media.

3. *Contact.* This is another telephone ministry which involves trained, committed Christian shut-ins who can give counsel and help to desperate persons: those who are suicide prone or those who have sudden marital or moral problems. With proper training, a kind of sympathetic listener can save a person from a desperate act and give proper referral.

4. *Interboard Ministries.* Through our Conference Program Council we hope to continue portions of both our pastors' and lay conferences on evangelism as well as the orientation workshop for ministers new to our conference.

VI.

THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

We recommend that the semi-annual meetings of the Board of Evangelism be held November 12, 1970 and on March 6, 1971. We recommend that the district secretaries of Evangelism have seminars on the night following the fall meeting and the afternoon of the spring meeting. We further recommend that the district secretaries request the Conference associate director of Witness, Outreach and Involvement to plan a two-day workshop during the conference year.

VII.

Recommendations

1. We respectfully recommend to the Personnel Committee of the Program Council of the North Carolina Conference the appointment of the Reverend Howard M. McLamb as Conference Associate Director of Witness, Outreach and Involvement.

2. We recommend that the Board of Evangelism and the Commission on Worship jointly sponsor district seminars on Worship in Evangelism and Evangelism in Worship during the conference year 1970-71.

3. We recommend that the Board of Evangelism and the Commission on Worship jointly sponsor the Bishop's Meeting with Young Methodists during the Lenten season during the conference year 1970-71.

4. We recommend that the reports of the sub-committee on Honorarium of Evangelists and Youth Evangelism be appended to this report.

5. We recommend the reappointment of H. B. Jones, Sidney Huggins, Robert J. Rudd and Tommy Tyson as approved Conference evangelists.

SUGGESTED REMUNERATION FOR EVANGELISTS

1. TYPES OF SERVICES EXPECTED

- a. Full-time evangelistic work.
- b. Music director and evangelist as a team.
- c. Preacher on appointment who commutes.
- d. Preacher on appointment who visits for the week.
- e. Local pastor.

2. FULL-TIME EVANGELIST

- a. To be paid up to twice the salary of the appointed pastor. Per diem basis.
2. Accommodations to be paid. Transportation including one round trip from home to be paid at conference rate.

c. Love offerings to be discouraged. However, if it is necessary, it is suggested that two offerings be received on previously stated nights.

3. MUSIC DIRECTOR AND EVANGELIST AS A TEAM

- a. To be paid up to twice the salary of the appointed pastor. Per diem basis.
- b. Accommodations to be paid. Transportation including one round trip from home to be paid at Conference rate.
- c. Love offerings to be discouraged. However, if necessary, it is suggested that two offerings be received on previously stated nights.
- d. When evangelist and music director are a man and wife team the pay may be up to two and one-fourth times the salary of the appointed pastor.

4. PREACHER ON APPOINTMENT WHO COMMUTES

- a. To be paid up to three-fourths the salary of the appointed pastor. Per diem basis.
- b. Accommodations to be paid. Transportation to be paid at one-half the conference rate.
- c. Love offerings to be discouraged. However, if necessary, it is suggested that two offerings be received on previously stated nights.

5. PREACHER ON APPOINTMENT WHO VISITS FOR THE WEEK

- a. To be paid up to three-fourths the salary of the appointed pastor. Per diem basis.
- b. Accommodations to be paid. Transportation including one round trip from home to be paid at conference rate.

6. LOCAL PASTOR

- a. To be paid up to one-fourth the salary of the appointed pastor, for courtesies.
- b. It is suggested that local pastor preach first year's revival free.

7. RECOMMENDATIONS

- a. Conference evangelists should be used whenever possible.
- b. Remuneration for evangelists should be included in church budget.
- c. Revivals should be held primarily for the purpose of helping local churches and local church members.
- d. Commuting pastors for revivals should be discouraged in order to permit the evangelist to talk to local youth groups, civic clubs, schools, etc.

SUGGESTIONS FOR YOUTH EVANGELISM IN THE N. C. CONFERENCE

(Requested by the Board of Evangelism, October 21, 1969)

A. CONFERENCE LEVEL

- 1. Planning, approval and preparation (as follows):
- 2. Coordination of all conference and district leadership affecting this venture: District Superintendents, Conference Board of Evangelism and District Secretaries, Conference Board of Education and District Education staffs, Conference Board of Missions and District Secretaries, etc.
- 3. Scheduling and assigning respective parts in the total witness task.
- 4. Securing all resources.
- 5. Orientation and training sessions for all leadership (limited to district level).
- 6. Follow-up stages of preparation.
- 7. Rally of all local youth representatives and adult workers.

B. DISTRICT LEVEL

- 1. Participation of all leadership called in above planning and preparation.
- 2. Resource center for clearing and providing personnel and materials for the venture.
- *3. Special features too difficult to produce on local level.

4. Follow-up local preparation with reporting of leadership and visitation of district leaders.
5. Significant promotion months in advance aimed at persuading leadership to undertake this venture.
6. Rally of all concerned local youth and their adult workers (inspiration and training).

C. LOCAL LEVEL

1. Participation of all youth and local leadership as invited above.
2. Following conference and district sessions, complete local preparations.
- *3. Selection of types of witness to be utilized locally each year.
4. Clearing calendars if desiring to participate in this venture locally.
5. Innovate and do a creative job of publicity (a tremendous key to winning others).
6. Local workshops prepare all leadership, details and kick-off "the venture in faith."
7. Assimilation of those responding through counseling, introduction, etc.
8. Follow-up reporting to local, district and conference leadership for further action.
9. Evaluation and advance planning for extending the witness.

*TYPES (OR FORMS) OF WITNESS (each with a suggestive brochure of How to Begin and Where to Find Help)

1. Deeper life study for concerned youth to discover mission and emerging capability.
2. Youth corps developed to win youth and welcome them to all meetings.
3. Dynamic monthly program in local church utilized as a winning witness to all: Sunday School, Sunday evening, Family Night, Weekend away, etc.
4. Mobile and meaningful class in church membership (travelogue training course).
5. Youth choral groups for use in monthly services and special settings.
6. Youth Week utilizing high school youths to lead all classes and worship services.
7. Youth Witness Teams (similar to Lay Witness movement) to visit and assist others.
8. Retreat settings for introducing new leadership and later new converts to movement.
9. Public settings like theatres and barns for winning others by religious films.
10. Guitar sing-ins that lead to witness by select members of the group.
11. Youth Christian Witness Mission designed to discover and win youth for Christ.
12. Use of church buses by high school drivers to bring additional children to church.
13. Recreational area witness teams (similar to collegiate type).
14. Establishment of youth recreational centers: style that attracts youths and allows opportunity for trained youths to witness such as coffeehouse techniques.
15. College witnesses: Methodist Student and Student Recognition Day.

EMPHASIS—Suggestions and guidance through contact with persons witnessing to ways for each local church to find its own way to witness . . . rather than interpret permissiveness as "find your own way" and know-how (which usually means nothing but deterioration).

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF GIFTS AND WILLS OF THE METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

1970-71

First: We would like to secure permission to continue the promotion and cultivation of Gifts and Wills in the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Second: We would like to continue the Scholarship and Trust Funds, and add to these, and to secure additional help for local churches, boards and agencies, and institutions in the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Third: We would like to have a cultivation of selected individuals and interested groups at selected places and times that would fit into the area of cultivation.

Fourth: We would like to plan for some specific materials for distribution.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

Golden Cross Committee

The increase in daily allowances for Golden Cross Assistance—from \$20.00 to \$25.00 per day—approved by the Annual Conference last year seems to be adequate. It is recommended that the allowances remain the same for the 1970-71 Conference year.

It is recommended that the Blue Cross-Blue Shield hospital insurance policy adopted by the Conference last year and becoming effective as of July 1, 1970, be continued as adopted.

It is recommended that coverage under the Blue Cross-Blue Shield hospital insurance policy be extended on the same basis to certified directors and Ministers of Music and other full-time workers in music ministry in the local church on the same basis as it is to ministers and directors of Christian education and educational assistants. It is recommended that this coverage become effective as of July 1, 1970. It is further recommended that the churches employing full-time workers in Music Ministry help to provide this coverage by paying two quarterly premiums as they do for the minister.

The committee recognizes and commends the work of Chaplain Wesley Aitken and his staff in the chaplaincy program at Duke Medical Center. We recommend that our support be increased from \$4700 to \$5500 for the Conference year 1970-71 to provide for additional scholarships for the Summer Clinic conducted by the Center.

The committee recognizes the work with alcoholics of the Reverend J. C. Dunn in the Good Shepherd Home at Lake Waccamaw, N. C. and the Reverend Robert Drew at the Damascus Home in Snow Camp, N. C. We recommend that we continue our support of the Good Shepherd Home in the amount of \$2500 and that we begin support of the Damascus Home in the amount of \$2500.

Retirement Home Committee

The committee recommends that The Home be given the privilege of solicitation of funds for the purpose of carrying on the work of The Home and the financing of another home within the bounds of the Conference.

The committee requests the bishop to appoint the Reverend Joseph F. Coble to be administrator and the Reverend Harvey B. Johnson to be administrative assistant for the year 1970-71.

Home for Children Committee

The committee recommends that the Methodist Home for Children be approved for privately soliciting and receiving gifts to be directed to that agency by individuals, local churches, foundations, and other organizations.

The committee requests the reappointment of the Reverend J. W. Lineberger, Sr. to be superintendent and Reverend James M. Waggoner be chaplain for the year 1970-71.

The following nominations are made for special terms to the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Home for Children, Inc.:

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON LAY LIFE AND WORK

As laymen with a ministry we cannot sit quietly back and expect professional men, such as the clergy, social workers, missionaries, teachers, etc. to be the total witness for Christ in the world. We can no longer relax by the side of the road and just "be a friend to man." Laymen must move out where the mainstream of the traffic flows in varying speeds and in various directions. The laity of the church are also called to serve and, if need be, to suffer for Christ's sake.

To be effective witnesses we need to be concerned about preparation as well as dedication. The Commission on Lay Life and Work recommends this to be accomplished in three areas of emphases: 1, United Methodist Men; 2, Lay Ministries; 3, Spiritual Life. Each District Board of the Laity is now organized to move forward in each of these action areas. The organization will work only if we work the organization. The key to this will be: a) effective leadership at every level of responsibility, and b) clear communication in every direction.

We should work toward development of effective leadership on all levels of the church organization. Good leaders with good planning can motivate our people to become effective witnesses in the total life of the church—gathered as well as scattered.

United Methodist Men

There are approximately 300 organized United Methodist Men Fellowships in our Conference. Mr. Harvey C. Mitchell, Conference Director of United Methodist Men, has prepared a brochure outlining a recognition program for United Methodist Men. A "Certificate of Merit" is to be awarded those United Methodist Men who accept certain minimum goals for the year. An additional award identified as the "Bishop's Award for Excellence" will be given the most outstanding UMM Fellowship in each district for the year. Copies of the brochure have been mailed to every UMM Fellowship on the Conference listing.

District Directors and other qualified persons are available as resource persons to assist and promote the organization of additional UMM in churches that do not have an active men's fellowship.

Lay Ministries

This area of activity calls for a two-pronged project: *Lay Speaking and Lay Leadership Training*.

Realizing the importance of being properly equipped to serve, we propose to enlist qualified men who will be willing to serve in providing training opportunities for laymen to become more effective in their local church responsibilities.

Lay Speaking: We recommend the continuance of the No-Silent Pulpit program during the annual Lenten season and suggest that these men be called upon at other times throughout the year when they can be of service. In addition to pulpit assignments, lay speakers can be used in many ways, such as Bible study and prayer groups, devotions, youth groups, lay liturgists, etc.

Lay Leadership Training: We recommend that each district provide the necessary basic training program to enable the Certification of Lay Speakers. November 1971 has been set as the goal to have this opportunity completed. It is hoped by then all of our lay speakers will have had the opportunity to become certified. Advance training, such as offered by lay schools of theology, lay academies, and through similar courses offered in community colleges are also encouraged when possible.

We propose that training sessions be established in each district to include the following local church officers: Church lay leader, lay delegate to Annual Conference, United Methodist Men, Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, and others as needed and requested from time to time.

We further call upon each district lay leader to meet with his district staff for the purpose of planning to implement these goals.

Spiritual Life

Realizing that we must walk close to the Master of men if we are to be the church scattered, the Commission on Lay Life and Work on behalf of the Board of the Laity

desires to make available definite programs that prepare laymen to launch out with conviction and dedication. Such we believe are the following:

Lay Witness Missions: We recommend that this movement be encouraged to continue as an unorganized—not disorganized—effort in our conference to offer men, women, and youth the opportunity to witness to others the experience of Christ in their lives.

Conference Retreats: We recommend the cooperation of the Board of the Laity with others concerned in helping to make the annual Summer Renewal and Recreation program meaningful and effective. Other forms of retreats and in-depth study groups are provided by the United Methodist Church and groups that are ecumenical in nature.

Lay-Clergy Dialogue: We recommend that each district lay leader and district superintendent consider the possibility of bringing together a panel, or discussion group, that will deal with this subject on the district or subdistrict level.

National Council of Churches: We recommend that each district treat this subject in the light of their own situation and consider a district meeting to analyze the purpose, membership, and work of the National Council of Churches.

Recommendations

Stewardship

The Conference Board of the Laity, through the Commission on Stewardship and Finance, submits the following recommendations for the Conference year 1970-71:

1. Recommend the use of resource materials, such as the Stewardship Brochure prepared by the Conference treasurer, Charles K. McAdams, in planning a program of *Stewardship Emphasis in the Local Church* for the year.

2. Recommend that the month of October be designated as *Stewardship Emphasis Month* in the North Carolina Annual Conference, involving children, youth and adults.

3. Recommend a series of district workshops on *Stewardship Training in EMC* involving stewardship leaders in the local church.

4. Recommend that October 25 be recognized as *Stewardship Commitment Sunday* in the local church.

REPORT OF MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

The Minimum Salary Commission recommends for the Conference year 1970-71 that the minimum salaries for all ministers who are serving pastoral appointments be as follows:

1. *Conference Member:* One or more dependent children, \$6,200; married, \$6,000; single, \$5,800.

2. *Associate:* One or more dependent children, \$5,600; married, \$5,400; single, \$5,200. In the event that a pastor on Minimum Salary changes status he will not receive any less than he did the previous year.

3. *Lay Pastor:* One or more dependent children, \$5,400; married, \$5,200; single, \$5,000.

4. *Student:* One or more dependent children, \$4,400 plus travel; married, \$4,200 plus travel; single, \$4,000 plus travel.

Travel allowance is based on the distance of student's parsonage from the school he attends. When the parsonage is 25 miles or less, it shall be \$100; when the parsonage is more than 25 miles but less than 50 miles, it shall be \$200; when the parsonage is more than 50 miles but less than 75 miles, it shall be \$300; when the parsonage is more than 75 miles but less than 100 miles, it shall be \$400; and when the parsonage is 100 miles or more from school, \$500 shall be the maximum travel allowance.

5. *Retired Supply Pastors:* \$3,000 (including travel and utilities).

6. *Part-time Supplies:* Ministers of any status who are serving part-time will receive income from minimum salary funds, if any, on a basis negotiated with the church, the pastor, the district superintendent, and the Minimum Salary Commission.

We also recommend that the minimum salary supplement be stopped at any time when a full-time pastor takes over employment or is not employed full-time and that such a pastor may be reinstated at any time during the year that he returns to full-time ministerial status.

In 1971-72, every category will be increased by \$200 with the exception of the student which will be increased by \$400.

II. PRINCIPLES GOVERNING THE USE OF MINIMUM SALARY FUNDS

The Commission urges each charge receiving Minimum Salary funds, its minister, and district superintendent so to minister the affairs of the charge that it may move as rapidly as possible toward full financial support.

To enable the conference, the commission, and the superintendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned, the following principles and procedures are set forth:

1. All requests for financial assistance on pastors' salaries for the succeeding year shall be presented by the district superintendent to the Program Council not later than June 15.

2. The family or marital status of the pastor at the time of assignment to the charge shall govern the amount paid the minister for the entire conference year.

3. In considering the salary for a charge, we call attention to the fact that the Commission on Minimum Salary must count salary, travel, utilities, bonuses, and expense allowances as salary in making appropriations to the charge. We stress the importance of reporting all contributions, so that all ministers involved may be treated alike.

4. No charge may receive from minimum salary more than one-third of the total salary received with the exception of newly-established congregations. Charges must be arranged so that no more than one-third of the total salary be supplemented from minimum salary funds. Charges asking for more than one-third supplement must make an additional application, indicating the reasons for being given special consideration.

Dividing Charges

5. The Commission on Minimum Salary suggests that, as a general practice, no appointments be made with a membership of less than 400, if the charge is to expect Minimum Salary support. Creation of circuits and/or charges should be on the basis of mutual agreement by all churches on the circuit rather than simply from the desire of the larger church to withdraw for its own benefit and advancement.

6. When the division of a charge is considered necessary and minimum salary is to be requested for either of the new charges resulting from such divisions, such project shall be presented to the Program Council not later than May 1, so that a satisfactory evaluation can be made by the Commission. Without its approval the Commission shall not be obligated to provide minimum salary support for either of the churches resulting from such division.

7. In the division of circuits where one church seeks to become a station, it is recommended that such church assume all salary obligations and its proportionate share of single-figure asking.

a. It is recommended that the remainder of the division pay two-thirds of pastoral support, and its share of single-figure asking.

b. The Commission on Minimum Salary further recommends that each charge which has received, or shall hereafter receive Minimum Salary aid, shall reduce this aid by 10% each year until the charge has accepted full self-support. The district superintendents are to inform all charges receiving, or to receive aid in the future, of this regulation which district superintendents should report. This requirement must be kept in mind in preparing for any requests.

c. When a charge has been established as a student appointment and desires to be served by a full-time minister, this change may take place at such time as the charge shall pay two-thirds of the amount needed to provide such full-time ministerial support and shall agree to reduce the aid by 10% each year.

d. When there is a division of a charge forming one or more student appointments, the charge must pay two-thirds of said salary.

A New Church as a Charge

8. When a new church is to be established and becomes a new charge, the district superintendent shall present for study the complete details of the proposed project not later than May 1. These details shall be presented by them to the Conference Board of Missions and the Commission on Minimum Salary. If such new church is approved by the Board and Commission, the Commission shall provide Minimum Salary assistance and the Board shall supplement the salary to make it adequate, and shall assist the new charge in providing living quarters for the minister and a place to meet and worship. It shall be understood that each year the new charge shall accept more of the budget until it becomes self-supporting. We recommend that each new church shall become self-supporting in a period of ten years or less.

a. Exception will be made if charge has made a reasonable effort to become self-supporting and is willing and able to increase salary at least \$300 annually, increase its one-figure askings proportionately, and reach full support within five more years.

THE BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

The Board of the Ministry makes the following recommendations:

1. That every minister of this conference who holds a special appointment be required to make a report to the conference at least once each year; that the report include a job analysis; that any change in address or nature of service be reported to the conference secretary immediately; and that the area of service of each special appointment, and its relevance to the church, be reviewed each year.

2. That this conference give wholehearted support to the Ministerial Education Fund and that we accept our full apportionment at the earliest possible date.

3. That the assignment and functioning of Counseling Elders be in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 353 of the *Discipline*.

4. That Ministry Sunday be observed in every local church in the conference on Sunday, September 20, 1970 (or the nearest convenient date); that each minister seek to enlist highly qualified persons for church occupations, and that the necessary promotion for Ministry Sunday be provided by the Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations and the Board of the Ministry.

5. That the local churches of the conference give support to the program being planned in the area of continuing education for ministers, and that leaves of absence for ministers for this purpose be allowed in accordance with paragraph 355 of the *Discipline*.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions of the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church recognizes that its work lies in a geographical area of rapid change. As eastern North Carolina industrializes and urban concentrations of population represent an ever-growing percentage of our people, we face new opportunities and new tasks. The need for developing effective techniques for an inner-city ministry is before us.

The recommendations which the Board of Missions presents to the Program Council represent in some measure our plans for response to a changing world. We are the church; we art in mission. Therefore, as our environment changes, so must our emphases and strategies. These recommendations embody this type of response.

CHURCH AND COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

REGINALD W. PONDER, *Chairman*

A. General Recommendations:

1. That the goal for the minimum charge size in the North Carolina Annual Conference be set at 400 members (new congregations less than 12 years old excepted) and that positive steps be taken through charge realignment and other inventive forms of ministry to achieve this goal by the end of this quadrennium.

2. That the concept of the *parish* (see *Discipline*, paragraph 106.3) be emphasized in communications between local churches and the Annual Conference in an effort to broaden the understanding of the church and its ministry through the United Methodist Church in eastern North Carolina.

3. That the Church and Community Committee be authorized to work closely in the actual planning and implementation of the United Methodist Parish Fellowship Retreats. This closer relationship would allow greater versatility in program and a wider scope of interest and resources.

4. *Principles for Parish Development Grants* (General Statement)

Parishes shall be under competent leadership and fully organized with a Parish Council, which shall formulate a well-planned program based on a full study and designed to develop strong parishes with adequately proportioned budgets. Grants will be made in full cooperation with other agencies granting funds.

B. Specific Recommendations

1. That the Sub-Committee on Urban Work be authorized to initiate planning for an Urban Life Conference for the ministers and laymen of the North Carolina Annual Conference in the fall of 1971. This conference will deal with staff relationships within the parish, rural as well as urban.

2. That the Sub-Committee on Town and Country Work be authorized to continue the Rural Church of the Year Recognition Program.

3. That the Church and Community Committee be authorized to plan for the participation of representatives from the North Carolina Annual Conference in various training programs and seminars such as the annual Church and Community Seminar in Raleigh, the Hinton Rural Life Center, the Fellowship of Town and Country Leaders in the Southeast and others.

4. Recognizing the rapid transition and special needs of the rapidly-growing urban areas of eastern North Carolina, the Sub-Committee on Urban Work requests that district superintendents take the initiative in establishing city and/or district Urban Ministry Committees for the purpose of providing study, direction and financial assistance to areas of special urban ministry.

5. That particular care be exercised in the appointment of ministers to the inner-city church, taking into consideration the specialized tasks, training and dedication required for such work.

6. That inner-city churches be encouraged to cooperate with each other, with churches of other denominations, and with other community organizations and agencies to provide a total ministry within the parish.

7. That an annual "Inner-City Church of the Year" award be presented to the inner-city church that most imaginatively, creatively and positively accepts the challenge of problems and opportunities for special innovative ministry within the parish. Guidelines for this award are to be developed by the Urban Work Sub-Committee and distributed to all eligible churches.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND CULTIVATION

Continued efforts to build our base of missionary salary support toward the goal of three new churches per district accepting some salary support each year.

b. National Division

1. We recommend that efforts to establish a full Program Council training experience have our full and enthusiastic support. August 11-14; 15, 16.

2. It is recommended that each district provide study and training opportunities for each local church during the month of September as follow-up to the Conference training experience.

3. We recommend that district secretaries assist in providing leadership for district follow-up on study materials.

C. Committee Training and Plans

It will be necessary for district secretaries to attend:

1. The Missionary Conference of the SEJ at Lake Junaluska, July 20-26.
2. The Conference Program Council Training Session, August 11-14.

D. Major Emphases for 1970-71

1. The committee respectfully requests that the Board of the Laity consider a mission emphasis for the 1971 Lay Rallies.

2. We plan itineration of Missionaries from the Americas during February and March in those districts desiring such itineration.

COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

W. B. CHALK, *Chairman*

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church, Inc. was chartered by the State of North Carolina to facilitate the expansion of church extension within the bounds of the Conference.

We submit the following recommendations to the Program Council for its approval:

1. We strongly recognize the need for district Boards of Mission and Church Extension and urge each district superintendent to proceed immediately in the organization of a district Board of Missions and Church Extension. The purpose of this board is to carry on the programs of church development, special ministries, and church extension within the district.

2. We recommend the third Sunday in February be set aside as Church Extension Sunday, and that necessary promotional materials be prepared and sent out.

3. The committee requests the Program Planning Council not to approve or hold a district or conference-level special financial emphasis in the churches of our conference three Sundays before Church Extension Sunday.

4. We recommend the Ten Dollar Club regulations be amended so that when all outstanding calls have been met in helping new churches, the remaining calls for that year will be used to help churches having special needs. Standards for determining churches of special need will be provided by the Committee on Church Extension of the Conference Board of Missions.

NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE PROGRAM COUNCIL PROPOSED CHANGES IN STRUCTURE

1. Change Paragraph 4 on page 3 which states:

The Executive Committee shall be composed of the following: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, and Director of the Council, chairmen of three committees (1) Interpretation, (2) Television, Radio, and Film Communication, (3) Publishing Interests, Conference Lay Leader, President of the Women's Society of Christian Service, and President of Conference United Methodist Youth Fellowship. In addition the chairman of any committee appointed by the Council will become a member of the Executive Committee, during the duration of that appointment, and two at-large members to be appointed by the Bishop.

To read:

The Executive Committee shall be composed of the following: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, and Director of the Council, Chairmen of Boards of Evangelism, Education, Missions, Social Concerns, Conference Lay Leader, President of Women's Society of Christian Service, President of Conference United Methodist Youth Fellowship, one District Superintendent, and two at-large members to be appointed by the Bishop.

2. Change Paragraph 5 at bottom of page 3 which reads:

The Executive Committee shall be amenable to the Council and shall exercise administrative and counseling functions for the Council. The Chairman of the Executive Committee may appoint any of the committee.

To read:

The Executive Committee shall be amenable to the Council and shall exercise administrative and counseling functions for the Council. The Chairman of the Executive Committee may appoint any of the Council staff.

3. Change Paragraph 7 entitled Director on page 4 which reads:

7. *Director.* The Council shall elect, upon nomination by the Bishop and district superintendents, an executive officer, to be known as the conference program director. He shall be in consultative relationship to the Conference Cabinet on matters relating to correlation, implementation, and administration of the conference program. He shall be considered an executive assistant to the Cabinet for the correlation, implementation, and administration of the conference program.

To read:

7. *Director.* The Council shall elect, upon nomination by the Bishop and district superintendents, an executive officer, to be known as the conference program director. He shall be in consultative relationship to the Conference Cabinet on matters relating to correlation, implementation, and administration of the conference program.

4. Delete entire Paragraph 4 on page 5 which reads:

District coordinators will receive continuing training through the efforts of the Conference Program Director and the Conference staff and from time to time coordinators will receive assignments to represent the conference in national and/or regional meetings in which further training, inspiration, or planning may be among the purposes of such meetings. The purpose of such assignments being given to different persons is to make possible the training of a larger group of effective leaders for the conference.

5. Change Paragraph 1 on page 6 which reads:

Each district may be expected to use the leadership of persons from that district serving on any Board of the conference. The district superintendent may select such persons as he may desire for the District Council. The departmental coordinators of each district shall be responsible for carrying the entire program as channeled through the District Council.

To read:

Each district may be expected to use the leadership of persons from that district serving on any Board of the conference. The district superintendent may add such persons as he may desire for the District Council. The age level coordinators of each district in cooperation with the Conference Program Council shall be responsible for implementing the entire program as channeled through the District Council.

6. Delete Paragraphs (d) and (e) on page 6 which read:

(d) The staff members of the Council shall not be designated as officers of any particular Board to exclusion of all other Boards. From time to time there may be realignment of responsibilities as the Council may deem necessary for the effectiveness of its work.

(e) Each staff member may expect continuing job analysis and definition from the Executive Committee acting at the direction of the Council.

7. Change Paragraph 3 on page 8 which reads:

Meetings of the staff shall be held monthly or as often as deemed necessary by the Council Director.

To read:

Meetings of the staff shall be held as often as deemed necessary by the Council Director.

8. Delete last paragraph which begins on page 10 and concludes on page 11 which reads:

Members of the Committee on Interpretation, Committee on Television, Radio and Film Communication, the Committee on Publishing Interests, and the Committee on Research and Planning may be selected from any persons in the North Carolina Conference, either clergy or lay persons, with preference given to those who have particular skills and competency in these areas of work.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

Report No. I.

Section A. Recommendations Relating to 1969 Conference Directives:

1. The 1969 session of the Annual Conference authorized in the Board of Christian Social Concerns report, p. 221 of *Journal*, and in the report of the Board of Education, Section E, p. 234 of the *Journal* that the Board of Pensions "consider the possibility of including certified lay workers, as defined by Chapter 3, paragraph 501 of the 1968 *Discipline* in the Conference Pension Plan and report its recommendations to the next annual Conference."

The Board of Pensions presents the following recommendations:

(a) Certified lay workers do not qualify for pension credit under our Board as defined in the Pension Code of the *Discipline*.

(b) Paragraph 507.1 of the 1968 *Discipline* makes it possible for certified lay workers to be provided pension under the Lay Pension Fund. Those eligible to participate in this fund are: "lay employees of local churches, boards, commissions, agencies, institutions, and organizations, in the United States of America listed in the book of *Discipline* or in the directory printed in the *Journal* of any annual conference of The Methodist Church situated in the United States of America."

(c) We recommend that those churches, agencies, boards, and institutions employing certified lay workers, or any other lay persons who qualify, arrange their pension program through the Lay Employees Pension Plan of the General Board of Pensions, where there is mutual agreement between the employee and the employer;

(d) That the Lay Worker Committee of the North Carolina Conference pursue the details as to the number of workers affected, the number of church groups needed to initiate participation in the fund, and the willingness of employers and employees to be affiliated with this pension program.

2. We interpret the above recommendations to include a plan whereby the Board of Pensions is authorized to "provide group term life insurance to all certified lay workers and other qualified lay personnel," as defined above.

Inasmuch as the present group term life insurance is solely for the ministers of the conference, we recommend:

(a) A study to determine the feasibility of forming such a group. If the findings justify the formation of this group,

(b) We recommend the formation of a new group which will be composed of lay persons employed full time by a local church, or an annual conference agency, board, or organization;

(c) The final details of this group plan are to be worked out by the Lay Worker Committee of the North Carolina Conference and reported to the 1971 annual conference.

Section B. Insurance:

1. We recommend that the Board of Pensions continue its current hospital insurance program with the Blue Cross/Blue Shield Inc.

2. We recommend that the Board of Pensions continue with the present group term life insurance program with Fidelity and Casualty Life Insurance Co., with the local churches paying the premiums through the Single Figure Askings, and that the proposed increased rates to go into effect July 1, 1970 be paid for out of the Cash Premium Refunds receipts, so each church will pay for the enrolled minister a premium payment of \$21.42 per quarter for a family and \$19.80 per quarter for a single minister.

3. We recommend that the Bishop authorize and appoint a special committee, to be made up of two members of the Golden Cross Committee of the Health and Welfare Board, two members of the Disability Committee, two members of the Board of Pensions, two members of the Board of the Ministry, a representative of the Lay Worker Committee, and a cabinet representative to "unite their efforts in making a detailed study of the total insurance programs of our conference, which includes group term life insurance, hospital, medical and accident insurance, and disability aid, in order to determine the best insurance program and the best rate cost to our conference. We further request that this committee be directed to use the services of an insurance consultant firm which

will submit pertinent information to all interested insurance companies, and assist the committee in determining the best total insurance program available. Further, we recommend that these agencies jointly make a proposal to the 1971 annual conference as to findings and recommendations, to become effective as quickly as arrangements can be made following the conference action on the report."

Section C. Accelerated Retirement:

A special committee, made up of representatives appointed by the chairman of the Board of the Ministry and the chairman of the Board of Pensions, met and adopted recommendations to the respective boards. The recommendations, stated below, have been unanimously adopted by the Board of the Ministry and the Board of Pensions.

"It is our feeling that the provisions for accelerated retirement as defined in paragraph 362.2 and 363.1 of the 1968 *Discipline* will confront our conference with difficult and serious problems, such as:

1. The increased financial liability would require a sizable increased apportionment from the World Service and Finance Commission, or
2. A reduction in the per year service rate currently being paid claimants to compensate for the additional liability, and
3. The per year service rate would be kept lower, or from advancing as rapidly as otherwise.

An example of the cost involved, for just one minister, would be: A minister, age 43, with 20 years pension credit, would receive a pension of \$1420 per year, at the current annuity rate, until he reaches age 65. This would come to a total cost of \$31,240.00 to benefits would be provided. During this period of twenty-two years, there is the expense be paid him during these twenty-two years. From age 65 until death, the usual pension of the Blue Cross/Blue Shield Hospital Insurance premiums and the premiums for the Group Term Life Insurance, both currently being paid for our claimants. These two items represent a cost of no less than \$265 per year, or \$5,830.00 for the twenty-two years. This makes a total cost of almost \$38,000.00 per person. Of course costs would vary somewhat in other situations, depending on the person's age, total years involved before reaching 65, and the total number of approved pension service years. During this period, however, payments would be made and no funds would be paid into the pension fund to compensate for this additional expense. Keep in mind also that each year more money would be paid out than this person's charge paid into the fund during each active year he served an appointment.

4. Another factor we considered, and that is early retirement with pension payments, would encourage an exodus of ministers from the ministry."

Therefore, it is the decision of the Board of the Ministry and the Board of Pensions that these Boards will not recommend to the annual conference the payment of an annuity claim to those ministers desiring accelerated retirement, as defined in paragraph 362.2 of the 1968 *Discipline*.

Further, these two boards request that the ministers of our conference be notified in writing of this action, and that the Board of Pensions be responsible for the notifying of the ministers and the notification be signed by the chairman of each board.

Section D. General Recommendations:

1. We recommend for the 1970-71 conference year a per service year annuity rate of \$73.00 for retired ministers and lay ministers, and seventy per cent of the approved annuity rate for widows.

2. We recommend special appropriations to the following persons in the indicated amounts:

- (a) Miss Nannie Pattishall, an amount equal to a dependent child's service for 28 years of service;
- (b) Mrs. J. W. Smith, \$600;
- (c) Garland Bailey, \$900;
- (d) James E. Mahoney, an amount equal to one year's credit;
- (e) O. E. Hall, an amount equal to one year's credit;
- (f) Mrs. James C. Stanford and each dependent child, an amount equal to ten years of service, and the Board of Pensions to make the payments for Blue Cross/Blue Shield Hospital Insurance while the pension is in effect.

3. We recommend that the expense accounts of the members of the Board of Pensions and the Special Study Committee, and the secretary's honorarium of \$1200 and expense fund be paid from current operating funds.

4. We recommend adjustments in the service record of Allen C. Edens, Jr., to give credit for the year 1943-1944, based on paragraph 1379.4e of the 1968 *Discipline*.

5. In keeping with paragraph 1381.5 of the *Discipline*: "The Board of Pensions shall select a Sunday in each year to be observed in the church as Retired Ministers' Day in honor of the retired ministers, their wives, and the widows of ministers, and in recognition of the church's responsibility for their support. The bishop shall request each conference in his area to insert a Retired Ministers' Day in its calendar, and he shall diligently promote the observance of it."

We recommend Sunday, September 13, 1970, for Retired Ministers' Day this year, and the second Sunday in September be so designated hereafter.

Section I. Special Committee, Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund:

The Board of Pensions requests the privilege of holding one or more workshops in each district during the conference year 1970-71 to which the following persons from each charge or church would be requested to attend: the minister, the chairman of the Administrative Board, the chairman of the Finance Committee, the chairman of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, and the delegate to the annual conference. Others who are interested may attend. The time and place of each workshop will be cleared by the Program Council, the district superintendents, and the pastor involved. The purpose of these workshops is to explain the Ministers' Reserve Pension Plan, to answer questions, and to provide more information about the ministers' pension. No resolutions or recommendations will be voted upon during these workshops. The information and reactions

obtained at these workshops will serve to guide the Board of Pensions in future action. We request these workshops be held in each district before January 1, 1971.

Report No. II. MINISTERS' RETIREMENT FUND

Revised Constitution

The Principle of the Fund:

The Ministers' Retirement Fund is established to assist the minister to more easily make the transition from the active relationship to the retired relationship by paying a lump sum benefit at the time of retirement. The fund is established by apportionments to each local church in the Single Figure Askings and by assessment to each minister who has membership in the fund. Since all churches contribute to this fund, it is the desire of the annual conference that all ministers participate in the fund. We do not interpret the churches' support of the Ministers' Retirement Fund as an additional benefit for their minister, but a benefit for all ministers of the conference. Therefore, the only funds to which a minister can make personal claim are those which he himself contributed to the fund. We vigorously emphasize that this is for the minister's *retirement*, and *not* any kind of emergency fund to be made available indiscreetly.

The treasurer of the North Carolina Conference shall serve as treasurer of this fund. He shall promote this work, receive reports from the district superintendents, receive funds from pastors and charges, and keep permanent records of collections and benefits paid. The treasurer shall obtain the names of all ministers retiring at each annual conference, who are eligible to receive the lump sum payment, and pay them promptly any benefits to which they are entitled. Retirement benefits are to be paid only to those ministers who are retiring either because they have reached 65; because they have accrued 40 years of approved service; or in special situations retired on Medical Disability.

Eligibility for Membership:

Each minister in the probationary relationship, in full connection, or associate member, and lay supply minister who is serving full time in a charge or other work by episcopal appointment, and such work contributing to the minister's pension credit shall be eligible to join. Membership into this fund is certainly in the minister's best interest, but it is not mandatory. Members may not be received retroactively. Ministers *transferring* into the conference, in the above mentioned categories, are eligible to join the fund in the year following the annual conference session in which their credentials were recognized. Eligible ministers, already members of this annual conference, may join the fund at any time, although no member shall be eligible for the dividends until he has been a member in good standing for 10 years.

A lay supply pastor may continue as a member of the Ministers' Retirement Fund only during the time he is serving under episcopal appointment.

Each new member to the fund shall file an application form. Upon the filing of application for membership and paying the recommended assessment for one year, his membership becomes effective.

Assessments:

Each charge in the conference shall be required to pay into the Ministers' Retirement Fund annually an amount equal to 1.12% of the charge Single Figure Asking *for each minister under episcopal appointment to that charge*.

Each member shall pay into the fund one per cent (1%) of all money he receives each year from the charge he is serving, or conference sources (this includes salary, travel and utility allowances, minimum salary fund payments, Duke Endowment funds, and missionary sources.)

All other ministers who participate in this fund shall pay a sum equivalent to 2% of their annual gross income and if such minister has no such annual income shall pay 2% of average salary. These persons shall make an annual payment into the fund, an amount equal to 2% of the *average salary* of the conference, as determined by the report of the General Board of Pensions, for the year or years affected. However, in the case of ministers appointed to the forenamed categories, whose salaries or income is below the average salary of the annual conference, these persons shall pay 2% of the new salary level of the charge they are leaving. The amounts for these salary levels are to be supplied to the Board of Pensions by their respective district superintendents. In the event the district superintendent does not furnish the salary information, these persons shall make

their annual payment on the basis of the conference average salary, as determined above. World Service and Finance shall make provision for payment equal to 1% of salary usually paid by the charge for district superintendents and ministers employed by Program Council. District superintendents and Program Council ministerial employees shall pay 1% of salary, travel, and utility allowances.

Deadline for Receipt of Payments:

Each charge and each member of the fund shall submit the required payment no later than the last day of the month following the month in which the North Carolina Conference meets. The Treasurer shall notify all members that this payment is due. This notice shall be made not later than 30 days before the Annual Conference session convenes. Payments made after this date will be credited to the charge and the account of the minister making the payment. However, this delayed payment extends the benefit payments for one year, if he has been a member less than 10 years. If the minister has been a member over 10 years, he will collect no dividends for the year or years of the delayed payment(s).

Benefits shall be paid to superannuated members of the Retirement Fund as follows:

If superannuated at the end of one year of membership	\$ 200.00
If superannuated at the end of two years of membership	300.00
If superannuated at the end of three years of membership	400.00
If superannuated at end of four years of membership	500.00
If superannuated at the end of five years of membership	600.00
If superannuated at the end of six years of membership	700.00
If superannuated at the end of seven years of membership	800.00
If superannuated at the end of eight years of membership	900.00
If superannuated at the end of nine years of membership	1,000.00
If superannuated at the end of ten years of membership	1,100.00

After ten years of membership the earned annual dividends, plus the base \$1,100.00.

Dividends:

Any funds remaining after retirement benefits have been paid to eligible members retiring at the annual conference shall be divided into equal parts and credited to the accounts of those who have been participating members for ten years or longer and are not in arrears for the previous year(s). The total dividends of each member shall be paid to him at the time of this retirement, or to his beneficiary in the event of his death prior to retirement.

Death Benefits:

If a participating member of the fund dies while in the active service, the treasurer shall pay to his named beneficiary or beneficiaries designated, otherwise pay to his estate, the full amount of the basic benefit payments plus the dividends added to his credit.

Each member shall provide the Conference treasurer and the Board of Pensions a statement, naming the beneficiary or beneficiaries to whom these funds are to be paid in the event of death before retirement.

These changes in death benefits shall become effective September 1, 1970.

Penalties:

Upon superannuation or the death of any member who has failed any year or years to contribute one per cent (1%) while serving a charge, or two per cent (2%) for years in which he did not serve a charge, there shall be deducted from any benefits, an amount equal to twice the amount he should have paid during the year or years he did not contribute. If any member of the fund fails to contribute the required per cent of his salary for three consecutive years or more, he shall have no claim on this fund other than the actual amount he has paid into the fund.

Membership Transferring:

Members transferring out of the North Carolina Conference or who may be appointed to employment which does not entitle them to annuity credit service, and who wish to retain membership in the fund must pay into the fund two per cent (2%) of their salaries and all other income which would be listed for income tax purposes. Payment may be made by the employing agency for the credit of the member, but the individual member is held responsible to see that such payment is made.

Withdrawing from the Fund:

If a member desires to withdraw from the fund prior to retirement, upon a written request to the conference treasurer and the Board of Pensions, he shall receive an amount equal to the amount he has paid into the fund, plus the simple interest computed at the annual bank pass book savings rate which was in effect each year he was participating in the fund, and terminate his membership in the fund.

If a minister is approved for *disability leave* he may submit an application to the Board of Pensions requesting permission to withdraw funds held in the Minister's Retirement Fund. If the application is approved, he will be paid the lump sum payment equal to the amount he would be paid if he were retiring at the *current session* of the annual conference. If a person on disability leave makes application to withdraw from the fund between sessions of the annual conference, and if the application is approved, he will be paid a lump sum payment on the basis of what he would have received if he were retiring at the *previous session* of the annual conference.

Each member whose membership is terminated in the fund in any way will provide the conference treasurer with a statement indicating that he has received the funds for which he is eligible, and that he is no longer a member of the fund.

New Rules and Constitution:

At the time these rules and guidelines are adopted, all previous legislation regulating this fund shall be null and void.

Constitution Printed:

It is recommended that with the adoption of this constitution by the annual conference, that the constitution be printed in a booklet and copies given to each member of the annual conference.

In Memoriam

JOHN A. STATON

January 15, 1885-February 10, 1970

John A. Staton was appointed to the Board of Claimants in 1926 and became chairman of that Board in 1931. From his first day on this Board until he retired from its chairmanship on June 26, 1956, he championed the cause for the well-being of the retired ministers, widows, and dependent children. In his first report to the annual conference, he pleaded for a superannuate endowment so "our worthy superannuated preachers and their families would be kept from want." The total payments for pensions and special needs that year were \$17,225.80. At the time he relinquished the chairmanship of the Board of Pensions, a per service year rate of \$48.00 had been approved, and \$196,439.00 was paid in benefits to claimants. This fantastic achievement is a tribute to Brother John, to his tireless crusading spirit, to his vigorous defense against those who preferred to retreat, to his driving leadership in challenging those who were reluctant to move ahead.

On February 10, 1970, Mr. John A. Staton passed from this mortal life. Truly our church, our conference, our board, and our retired ministers lost a noble friend. We of the Board of Pensions take this occasion to pay tribute to this gallant warrior. We resolve to honor his memory by forging ahead with unrelenting determination, so that our retired ministers, and those who retire in the future may enjoy security and dignity during the closing years of life.

"My name, and my place, and my tomb all forgotten,
The brief race of time well and patiently run,
So let me pass away, peacefully, silently,
Only remembered by what I have done.

"I need not be missed, if my life has been bearing
(As its summer and autumn move silently on)
The bloom, and the fruit, and the seed of its season;
I shall still be remembered by what I have done.

"Not myself, but the truth that in life I have spoken,
Not myself, but the seed that in life I have sown,
Shall pass on to ages — all about me forgotten,
Save the truth I have spoken, the things I have done.

"So let my living be, so be my dying;
So let my name, life, unblazoned, unknown;
Unpraised and unmissed, I shall still be remembered;
Yes, but remembered for what I have done."

A. *North Carolina Christian Advocate*

Whereas, local church leaders and United Methodist people in North Carolina, to be informed and effective leaders, need to be readers of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, and

Whereas, the Annual Conference Program Council, boards, commissions, institutions, and agencies need an effective organ for the promotion of the vital ministries and causes of The United Methodist Church in North Carolina, and

Whereas, each local church has the responsibility for providing adequate resources for its Administrative Board and Council on Ministries, to assist them in the performance of their duties, and

Whereas, the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* with its monthly Program Supplement is a vital resource for members of local church Administrative Boards and Councils on Ministries, therefore, we recommend

1. That each local church make provision for sending the *Advocate* into the home of each member of its Administrative Board and Council on Ministries by including the cost of subscriptions in its annual church budget;

2. That those churches now sending the *Advocate* to each family in the church be encouraged to continue this plan and that other churches consider the possibility of instituting the Every Family Plan.

3. That each local church consider the possibility of electing an *Advocate* agent to assist the pastor in securing subscriptions and in keeping the congregation informed about the helpfulness of this weekly periodical.

4. That each local church observe *North Carolina Christian Advocate Sunday*, January 24, 1971, at which time the congregation is given information concerning the *Advocate* and individuals are given the opportunity to subscribe.

B. *Piedmont Press*

Piedmont Press, the job printing department of Methodist Board of Publication, Inc., through the acquisition of new equipment, is now in a position to do printing of the highest quality making use of color, reproduction of pictures, use of line drawings, and modern graphic arts techniques. Proceeds from this operation subsidize and make possible the publication of the *Advocate* at a substantially reduced cost. We recommend that local churches, conference boards, agencies and institutions patronize Piedmont Press in their printing needs.

AMENDMENT OF CHARTER OF METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

The undersigned corporation hereby executes these Articles of Amendment for the purpose of amending its charter:

1. The name of the corporation is Methodist Board of Publication, Inc.

2. This amendment to the charter of the corporation was adopted by the board of directors of this corporation in regular meeting assembled on the 14th day of April, 1970, a quorum being present. The directors of this corporation are referred to in the existing charter of this corporation as "Members of the Methodist Board of Publication." The amendment was likewise approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church and by the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. The charter of this corporation is hereby amended by striking all of the existing charter, as amended, except the name of the corporation and by inserting in lieu thereof the following:

(a) The period of duration of the corporation shall be perpetual.

(b) The purposes for which this corporation was originally organized and the purpose for which this amendment is filed is to enable this corporation to more effectively carry out the business of this corporation, to wit:

(1) To publish a religious journal, newspaper, magazine, or other printed matter designed to promote the interest and mission of the United Methodist Church and in particular to publish the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* under this or any other name which may hereafter be chosen as the official organ of the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church.

(2) To carry on the business of job printing and the printing and circulation of books, pamphlets and all other printed matter and material whatsoever.

(3) To have and possess all of the corporate powers enumerated in Chapter 5 A of the General Statutes of North Carolina, as amended, and as the same may be hereinafter amended from time to time.

(c) This corporation shall issue no shares, shall have no capital stock, and shall have no members as defined by Chapter 55 A of the General Statutes of North Carolina but all of the property rights and all of the assets of this corporation shall be owned one-half by the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church and one-half by the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church. In event this corporation is liquidated all assets shall be divided according to the ownership of the property rights as set forth in this paragraph and pursuant to the *Discipline* of the United Methodist Church, subject, however, to those certain trust agreements under the terms of which certain shares of capital stock, bonds or other securities have been donated to this corporation.

(d) The corporation shall have eighteen directors, nine of whom shall be elected by the North Carolina Annual Conference and nine of whom shall be elected by the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church. The names, addresses, the conference from which said directors were elected and the term of office of each is as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

The Committee on Publishing Interests makes the following recommendations:

1. That each local church in this conference continue to use United Methodist curriculum materials exclusively. Attention is called to the fact that the Graded Press and the Division of Curriculum Resources of the Board of Education are studying ways of improving the presentation of the "New Day" in education. Local churches are called upon to make themselves aware of the wide variety of materials offered by the Graded Press. Those with complaints against any materials should take their criticism directly to the above named agencies of the church. Local churches should call upon trained members of the Program Council staff to interpret curriculum materials for them where a need for this service exists.

2. That members of all local churches be made aware of the provision in paragraph 945 of the *Discipline*, which requires that the net income of the Methodist Publishing House, after providing for adequate reserves and allowing for reasonable growth, shall be distributed by the Board of Pensions to conference claimants.

3. That local churches investigate the library services provided by the Methodist Publishing House and seek the help provided in enlarging their libraries, or where no library now exists, seek help in establishing one.

4. That emphasis be given by pastors and local churches to the values of *Together* magazine, and that an effort be made to increase the number of subscribers.

5. That the churches of the conference cooperate with the editor of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* in the cultivation of a greater interest of this important publication and in securing an increase in the number of subscriptions in accordance with the plan submitted.

RECOMMENDATION OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

REV. H. ARTHUR PHILLIPS, JR., *President*

Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs, Dr. Ross E. Townes, Chairman.

A. We recommend that in accordance with paragraph 844, 1968 *Discipline* that District Program Councils be established and made effective in each district.

B. We recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Use of church property for segregated private schools or other activities designed to circumvent integration of public schools is directly in violation of the clearly-expressed policy of The United Methodist Church on the subject of race. The Constitution of the church states:

"The United Methodist Church is a part of the Church Universal which is one Body in Christ. Therefore, all persons, without regard to race, color, national origin, or economic condition, shall be eligible to attend its worship services, to participate in its programs, and when they take the appropriate vows, to be admitted into its membership in any local church in the connection. In The United Methodist Church no conference or other organizational unit of the church shall be structured so as to exclude any member or any constituent body of the church because of race, color, national origin, or economic condition." (Article IV).

We therefore urge the bishop and district superintendents to communicate with the pastor, Board of Trustees and Administrative Board of any local churches in which private, segregated school activities are conducted that such is in contradiction and violation of The United Methodist Church policy and law, and the policies of the North Carolina Annual Conference. We urge the bishop to make it clear that he will fully and unequivocally support pastors in their efforts to persuade their congregations to follow such policy and those pastors and district superintendents who, where necessary, exercise their authority under paragraph 1536 of the *Discipline* of The United Methodist Church to prevent use of church property for such school activities.

We commend the many Methodists—clergy and laity—who have expressed the spirit of Jesus Christ and the United Methodist policy in the private segregated school situation. We also commend the other Protestant, Roman Catholic, and the other religious leaders, public officials, and citizens who have opposed or prevented use of church facilities for segregated schools and who are standing for support of quality integrated public education.

And we recommend further that United Methodists be discouraged and that they refrain from assisting in the establishment and support of private schools that would circumvent the establishment of a unitary school system, since said activity is in violation of both the letter and spirit of the Constitution of the United Methodist Church.

C. We recommend the following: Racism, as manifested by the laity and clergy of the North Carolina Conference, has created and continues to create and foster anti-Christian attitudes and behavior within the United Methodist Church. Numerous churchmen, black and white, find many of the platitudes and statements made by church leaders insulting, dehumanizing, and ludicrous. There are many white citizens in our state who call themselves Christians and patriots and we cannot doubt their sincerity. The damage they do comes not from Christian ideals, but from the mutilation of Christian ideals. Therefore, realizing that the United Methodist Church of the North Carolina Conference faces a serious problem in race relations, we urge that the following specific steps be taken:

1. That immediate and full advantage be taken of the services now being offered by the Commission on Religion and Race, that an invitation be extended to this Commission to hold a consultation on racism for the following:

- a. The Conference Program Council, and/or
- b. District Program Councils
- c. Members of selected boards and agencies
- d. The Cabinet and selected ministers and laymen from each district.

The purpose of such consultation would be to identify the problems facing the North Carolina Conference as it seeks to witness to the Christian faith and effectively structure a merged church by raising the level of awareness of church leadership.

2. That as many board and agency meetings as possible be scheduled on Saturdays or other days which will be compatible with work patterns of our black United Methodists who are members of these boards and agencies. Even though our boards and agencies are merged, many black Methodists are rendered ineffective and cannot fully participate in these policy-making meetings because of the dates and times they are scheduled.

3. That as vacancies occur on local, district, and conference levels, every effort be made to fill a proportionate share of these vacancies with qualified black Methodists, understanding that to fill such vacancies with persons not qualified is the worst sort of tokenism and a disservice to both black and white membership.

4. That the ministers, Cabinet, and bishop all "close ranks" and make it abundantly clear that ministers who seek reconciliation between races, who speak out for the brotherhood of man and against the injustices suffered by our black brothers will have the support of each other, thereby making economic sanctions against the Methodist clergy of the North Carolina Conference ineffective.

II. *Division of General Welfare*—Reverend Charles Hutchinson, Chairman

A. We recommend that each local church Council on Ministries and Work Area chairman and/or Commission on Christian Social Concerns become familiar with that section of the Methodist Social Creed on the Church and General Welfare (Par. 96, III, C.) and the section of Health, Welfare and Human Development in the 1968 Book of Resolutions. We also ask that they make a study of the needs of their communities in these areas of concern, and with the help of *Interpreter* and *Engage*, and community resources develop a program that expresses Christian love and concern for the welfare of persons. The emphasis should be on healing and compassion for those who suffer. We are concerned that the following receive special attention:

1. That there be a drug and alcohol concerns emphasis in each local church by the following:

a. The observance of the second Sunday in November (or other appropriate Sunday) as Drug and Alcohol Concerns Sunday. Helps will be found in *Interpreter* and *Engage*.

b. A seminar on alcohol and drug education in each local church using community people as resources, such persons being found among law enforcement agencies, Mental Health Clinics, Alcohol Information Centers, local Mental Health Associations, educators and the medical profession.

c. We ask that churchmen continue to exert their influence on the legislative bodies of our country to seek safer control and/or abolition of drug and alcohol traffics in our state and nation.

2. We recommend that the conference Program Council hold a one-day consultation on the vital moral and political issue of liquor by the drink, involving the Program Council, other key conference leadership, lay and clerical, the Program Council and key leadership of the Western North Carolina Conference, invited resource leadership from the General Board of Christian Social Concerns, and members of the legal and medical professions for the purpose of clarifying the official stand of the North Carolina United Methodist Church in the matter of liquor by the drink to the end of devising the legislative strategy of United Methodism in implementing our stand as we seek the best interests of the people of this state.

a. We go on record as opposing liquor-by-the-drink in North Carolina.

3. We urge that the United Methodists of the North Carolina Conference urge stricter enforcement of the traffic laws of our state, particularly those involving violations by persons under the influence of alcohol, narcotics, and dangerous drugs, including barbiturates.

4. We recommend that the Conference Program Council set a one-day seminar with the cooperation of the Reverend S. Collins Kilburn, Director of Social Action Ministries of the North Carolina Council of Churches, to meet with district chairmen of Christian Social Concerns and members of the division of General Welfare of the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns so as to sensitize these persons to conditions of the North Carolina Prison System.

5. We recommend that local churches, through the Council on Ministries, with the work area chairmen of Christian Social Concerns and Family Life coordinators, work with public school officials and local PTA groups in developing a healthy sex education program in our public schools.

B. District Drug Education Emphasis: Along with the Committee on Youth Ministry of the Conference Board of Education we recommend that district coordinators of Youth Ministry, Adult Ministry, and district chairmen of Christian Social Concerns work together to establish in each district a program of drug education to be implemented by the Board of Christian Social Concerns. Suggestions for implementation include:

1. The district coordinators of Youth and Adult Ministry and the district chairmen of Christian Social Concerns should study their district and determine what has been done already in the area of drug education to youth and adults by drawing upon resource persons available.

2. Many communities have technical institutes or community colleges in which an adult course in drug education can be offered. Development of such a course can be arranged by contacting the director of adult education in these institutions.

3. Cooperation with PTA groups.

4. Cooperation with the Social Action Ministries of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

5. Subdistrict United Methodist Youth Fellowships could plan studies on drugs.

6. Use of community resource persons, including law enforcement agencies, the medical profession, Mental Health Centers, Alcohol Information Centers, Mental Health Associations and educators.

7. The coordinators of Youth and Adult Ministry and the chairmen of Christian Social Concerns should work up a list of resource persons to be available for seminars on drug and alcohol education in each local church and community. Such listings should be made available for all pastors and Christian Social Concerns Work Area chairmen in the district.

C. With the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries we commend the work of the Good Shepherd Home, Inc. of Lake Waccamaw, N. C., and the Damascus Home of Snow Camp, N. C., for their work in the rehabilitation of alcoholics, and we recommend continued financial support from our conference as recommended by the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

III. *Division of Peace and World Order*—Reverend Charles M. Smith, Chairman

A. PREFACE:

"I think I know what is bothering the students. I think that what we are up against is a generation that is by no means sure that it has a future." This statement was made by Dr. George Wald, Nobel Prize-winning Harvard biologist. Agreeing with him, that our students, as well as the rest of us, have numerous reasons for being concerned about God's creation, and believing that our Lord wills that we have life and have it abundantly, we offer the following programs for implementation by the North Carolina Conference and certain statements which we call upon our Conference to make as suggestions of responsible Christian action to the members of our churches.

B. PROGRAMS

1. We propose an additional series of seminars on the draft and military life. However, we recommend that such seminars be conducted in cooperation with the Conference Board of Education, and that they involve not only pastors but youth and other leaders in discussion, not only of the draft, but also discussions of military life so as to equip churchmen to help young people deal in a creative Christian way with this facet of life.

2. The observance of World Order Sunday, October 18, 1970, by each local church with appropriate sermons, bulletin inserts and other materials. See *Interpreter* and *Engage* for suggestions for observance.

3. We recommend that youth groups in each local church "Trick or Treat" for UNICEF. In accordance with United Methodism's commitment to the United Nations, we see this as perhaps the best available means of involving our children and their parents in a meaningful program of education and action in support of the work of the United Nations.

4. Continued sponsorship of the Peace Education booth at the North Carolina State Fair by the Board of Christian Social Concerns. Traditionally, this board has served as

one of the sponsors of this educational display which effectively witnesses to thousands of fair-goers our concerns in world peace and what we can do to help achieve it.

5. We recommend that the Board of Christian Social Concerns sponsor an ecumenical, inter-racial, and inter-generational study tour of the Church Center for the United Nations, the United Nations Headquarters, and the Inter-Church Center at 475 Riverside Drive. This tour will be offered to laity and clergy, and will be scheduled to begin April 24, 1971.

C. STATEMENTS OF CONCERN

1. The Population Crisis: The population explosion is a documented fact. Unless meaningful measures are taken immediately, the prospect of mass starvation in the poorer nations is inevitable, and even rich nations such as the United States are destined to feel the effects of the demands placed on the earth's limited resources by her booming population. A full-scale effort must be made to stem the flood. Therefore, we urge the following action:

a. By the Church

1. That the church recognize rapid population growth to be a matter of great religious and moral concern, producing a pressure of numbers that makes the problems of human society almost unmanageable, and threatening to alter the environment that sustains all life.

2. That the church devise educational and action programs that will alert its constituency and the general public to the fact and nature of the population problem and the dangers it holds for man if left unmet.

3. That the church lay a moral responsibility upon the leaders of government to undertake a maximum and sustained effort to meet the population crisis.

4. That the church underscore the moral necessity of adopting the small family norm as an essential principle for stabilizing the size of the population, and thus protecting the quality of life.

5. That the church offer classes in sex education when such instruction is not available in the local public schools.

b. Action by the government: We urge that the North Carolina Conference recommend the following actions to the body politic:

1. Creation of a Federal Population Commission.

2. Maximum feasible assistance be given to all other nations in meeting their population growth problems.

3. That the remaining legal and voluntary restrictions on voluntary sterilization be removed and that the individual after counseling be given the right to decide concerning his own sterilization.

4. That the Federal Income Tax laws be changed to discourage rather than encourage large families.

5. That the North Carolina Board of Social Concerns establish a sub-committee, by cooperation of representatives of the North Carolina Conference lay and clerical for thorough study of the issue of abortion in relation to ecological and population problems and that participants be characterized by legal medical and theological competence and of both sexes to study and report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Social Concerns.

6. That the North Carolina Conference Board of Social Concerns memorialize the General Conference of 1972 to establish a quadrennial commission to make theological, medical, and legally informed inquiry into the area of medical practices in relation to law and practice relating to abortion as it bears upon the norms of Christian life and practice.

2. The Pollution Crisis: We commend those agencies and individuals, including President Nixon, who have expressed their earnest concern over the threat posed to the quality of our lives by the pollution of our planet. Insofar as the church is committed to man's becoming more fully human, she cannot justifiably remain indifferent to his ravaging of nature, for when man degrades his natural environment, he ultimately degrades himself as well. With a sense of urgency, we recommend the following:

a. That the church join with other responsible agencies in alerting an apathetic public to the seriousness of the present ecological crisis. Christian educators are called upon to foster a new ecological awareness and sense of environmental responsibility among the church's constituency. We should challenge the widespread belief that technological progress in and of itself represents genuine progress. We should insist that human right take precedence over the property rights of individuals, and that no one should be permitted to degrade the environment simply for the sake of personal profit.

b. That the church urge the government to evaluate its programs, especially those related to defense, with regard to their effects on the ecological balance, that stringent legislation penalizing those industries and individuals who blatantly add to the pollution of our natural resources be enacted, that necessary measures be taken to upgrade the quality of our railway system thereby reducing the use of two major pollutants, automobiles and jet planes.

c. We urge that individual Christians assume personal responsibility for reducing the level of pollution in our environment and voice their concern over this issue to their governmental representatives on all levels that they think of themselves as stewards of God's gifts as well as consumers of society's products. Such an attitude would emphasize the goodness of God's creation, man's delight in the riches and wonders of earth, and his obligation to assure the right of future generations to similarly have the full enjoyment of them. We have followed God's commandment to Adam and Eve to be fruitful and multiply. It is time to implement the third part of that commandment: to replenish the earth.

3. The Crisis in World Peace: We are concerned to re-emphasize the statements in the Social Creed and in the 1968 Book of *Discipline* on world peace, and we call attention to certain concerns:

a. The futility of continued expansion of the anti-ballistic missile system.

b. That in light of the events in Southeast Asia and their threat to world peace, that in accordance with United Methodist principles, efforts be made to place United Nations controls into operation in Southeast Asia as soon as possible, and that the Geneva Convention be reassembled.

c. We urge that Strategic Arms Limitation Talks be encouraged, and publicly supported by our conference as an avenue toward nuclear disarmament.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Following the action of the North Carolina Annual Conference in Special Session on February 21, 1970, which adopted a Program Staff organization under which no executive of the staff is responsible to a specific board or agency, the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference recommends the following in keeping with legislation adopted by the North Carolina Annual Conference in 1966 (page 319, paragraph V, *Journal* North Carolina Annual Conference dated 1966) which states that "The Annual Conference shall purchase and furnish parsonages for all ministers serving in the Annual Conference in conference executive positions:"

1. That all parsonages for Program Staff now held in the name of the Board of Education, Inc., Board of Evangelism, Inc., and Board of Missions, Inc., be transferred to the Board of Trustees, Inc., North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church and that any subsequent purchase of parsonages for conference Program Staff be made by and held in the name of said trustees.

2. That the Conference Board of Trustees assume the responsibility for supervision and maintenance of said parsonages and assume the responsibility, along with the Commission on World Service and Finance, for financing, furnishing and maintenance of present parsonages and any additional parsonages which may be needed in the future. That a parsonage committee composed of three persons, one of whom must be a woman, be appointed by the Board of Trustees to serve with the conference treasurer-business administrator and the chairman of the Board of Trustees in the matter of parsonage maintenance and furnishings.

3. That any ministerial staff member currently being provided a housing allowance and applying said allowance toward the purchase of a house in which he is living be

continued until such time when there is a personnel change. Furthermore, that articles of subservient corporations be assigned to the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church and those not otherwise necessary be dissolved at their discretion.

4. That with the exception of 3 above, whenever parsonages are provided, ministers assigned the conference in executive positions be required to use said parsonages. Parsonages shall be assigned to the staff by the bishop with the advice of the program director.

6. That the above recommendations supercede Nos. 1 through 8 of Report No. 1 Inter-Board Coordinating Council, pages 255-256 *Journal*, North Carolina Annual Conference 1968.

III

1. We recommend that the Single Figure Asking formula approved by the Annual Conference in 1967 be continued as described on page 316 of the 1968 *Journal* with the exception that Mission Specials also be deleted to arrive at the net total money raised.

2. We recommend that the following special offerings be taken in each local church and remitted to the conference treasurer as separate items. They are not to be included in the Single Figure Asking: Fellowship of Suffering and Service, Methodist Student Day, One Great Hour of Sharing, Race Relations Day.

3. We recommend Askings as presented to Districts for Interdenominational Cooperation Fund and Ministerial Education.

IV

LIMITING AND SUPPLEMENTING PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE BUDGET

1. *District Superintendents Fund:*

(a) We recommend that the salary of each of the district superintendents shall be set at \$12,500.00 plus \$1,000.00 travel expense. Such part of said salary that is paid out by such district superintendent to cover the actual costs of all those utilities applicable to the operation and maintenance of his district parsonage is hereby assigned as housing expense not to exceed the sum of \$800.00 for heat, water, electrical services and residential telephone. We recommend that all districts assume this expense. We recommend that an amount equal to 1% of the salary and travel be allocated for Ministers' Retirement Fund and an amount of \$25.00 for moving expenses also to be assumed by the districts along with the cost of heat, water, electrical and residential telephone.

(b) We recommend provision for Cabinet meeting expenses from this fund.

(c) We recommend the continuation of an annual appropriation equal to twelve times the current annuity rate be made to the Conference Board of Pensions for each district superintendent for 1970-71.

2. We approve the use of an amount up to \$4,000 to be provided by each district for the district superintendent for secretarial help and promotion of the district program.

3. Under the Church Extension Fund the first \$45,000 is earmarked to be paid to the Board of Missions, Inc. for the revolving fund to be used for loans to build churches and/or acquire choice sites for new congregations or to repay money borrowed by the Board of Missions, Inc.

4. The Commission recommends that no conference agency's budget incorporate funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

5. We recommend that monies paid by charges toward the Single Figure Asking be reported to the statistician by the conference treasurer and that all other funds paid by the local church be reported in the Pastor's report, Table # II.

6. We further recommend that no transfer of funds be made by any agency from one line item in the budget to another.

7. Since under our new organization no program staff member is directly responsible to a specific board or agency, we recommend that any financial accounts now being administered by a staff member be handled through the central treasury beginning with the 1970-71 conference year.

8. We also recommend that in the interest of economy the treasurer-business administrator institute a system of central purchasing for equipment and supplies for all conference offices whose operating expenses are included in the conference budget.

9. To encourage pooling of travel, and in the interest of economy, we recommend that reimbursement to the driver of a car for travel to authorized meetings of Boards, Commissions, and Committees within the conference be made at the rate of 6 cents per mile for one person in a car; 8 cents per mile for two persons; 9 cents per mile for three persons and 10 cents per mile for four or more persons.

V

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the conference.

1. Christmas Offering 1970 for district superintendents' program and/or projects. These should be clearly defined in plenty of time to have successful promotion.

2. The Board of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.

3. That the Board of Education be authorized to solicit from church groups and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the four camps of the North Carolina Conference.

4. Interconference Commission on Campus Ministry for the privilege of private solicitation for special gifts for the benefit of special works in the state-supported institutions.

5. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

6. The Methodist Home for Children for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

7. The Methodist Foundation, Inc., as provided in its charter.

8. The Rural Church Fund, for the private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

9. Louisburg College, Methodist College, and North Carolina Wesleyan College for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto with the understanding that such solicitation or private campaign may not be taken into the local churches of the conference.

VI

We recommend the continuation of A. M. Pullen & Company as auditors.

We recommend that the president, vice-president and secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance and the conference treasurer shall serve as the executive committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

We recommend that the Conference fiscal year close May 31, 1971. We further recommend that we meet our financial obligations to the General Conference by December 31 which coincides with the General Conference fiscal year.

We call attention to the fact that the pastor's salary as set by the Charge Conference is for a conference year; that is, from one session of the Annual Conference to the next session of the Annual Conference. In keeping with our recommendation that the conference fiscal year close May 31, we recommend that each charge pay the salary promised the pastor for the conference year by that date.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

BURLINGTON DISTRICT

EDGAR B. FISHER, *Superintendent*

This has been a wonderful year in many respects for the ministers and lay people who work in the Burlington District. Ministers and laymen together have worked effectively in carrying on the program of the church. The district superintendent finds it a great joy to be associated with these dedicated Christian men and women. A warm and sincere friendship is found throughout the district. Diligence in the pursuit of duty has been characteristic of the membership as well as the ministers.

Membership and Evangelism: An evangelistic spirit has been observed throughout the year. At the time of this report it has been indicated that more than five hundred people have united with the church, nearly three hundred having been received on profession of faith. A number of successful lay witness missions have been held. Many series of special evangelistic services were conducted.

Christian Higher Education: The Burlington District continues to manifest great interest in the cause of higher education. Many churches have paid their college pledges in full, a number having done this recently.

Christian Education: The district has a number of training schools each year. Many take advantage of this opportunity to improve their ability to serve effectively.

Camp Crusade: The district has accomplished much in this program. The church at Mebane has pledged enough to erect a cabin at Camp Chestnut Ridge. Front Street United Methodist Church, Burlington, made such a large contribution that the new staff building was made possible, and appropriate recognition was given to this contribution. Some of the churches continue to make contributions for this work.

Women's Work: There are 74 organizations of the Women's Society of Christian Service and five Wesleyan Service Guild organizations, with close to three thousand members. Outstanding work is being done by these groups.

Lay Activities: In many respects the work of the laymen is noteworthy. Much is being accomplished. Splendid attendance was had at the Conference laymen's meeting at Methodist College last summer. The No-Silent Pulpit program has been very successful. Approximately five hundred attended the district lay rally this year.

Building and Improvements: This year a new educational unit has been erected at Orange Chapel on the Whitney Cross Charge. The new parsonage at Moncure is just about completed. The new educational building at Mebane was dedicated. The chapel in this church was also dedicated.

Finances: The district has made a commendable financial record. Nearly all of the churches have paid out in full. In accepting the Single Figure item for the conference year 1970-71 no charge decreased the amount of its acceptance over the year just closing, and many made an increase. The total increase was approximately \$2,800 for the new year. Many of the churches increased the salaries of the ministers for the coming year. Apparently the total increase for the entire district will be between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

The district superintendent is deeply grateful to all who have contributed toward making the year successful. The future for the district is truly bright.

DURHAM DISTRICT

CHANCIE D. BARCLIFT, *Superintendent*

The reports of the fifty-six charges, composed of seventy-five churches, of the Durham District for the 1969-70 conference year show an increase in many areas of work over the previous year. The credit for this progress rightfully belongs to the dedicated pastors, the members of their staff, and the 23,327 loyal laymen.

Membership: There were 1,158 members received, including 464 on profession of faith, for a net gain of 329, which is a substantial increase over last year.

Finances: On the Single Figure Asking (formerly known as World Service and Conference Benevolences) the district accepted \$283,269.00 for the 1970-71 conference year, which is an increase of \$3,751.00 over the previous year. The district paid on this item for the year just closed \$273,276.00, or 97.7% of its acceptance. Also, salaries increased for the new year by the amount of \$28,077.00.

Building Projects: Completed, under construction, or in the planning stage—Banks-Grove Hill: Grove Hill erected and dedicated a combined fellowship hall and classroom unit.

Butner: A new educational building was completed and consecrated in December, 1968.

Chapel Hill: Amity completed and consecrated a new sanctuary in September, 1968. Orange dedicated its educational building, and construction of a front porch and steeple on the sanctuary will begin soon.

Durham: Asbury Temple purchased an attractive and comfortable parsonage. Calvary installed a new organ, and constructed a large parking lot.

Duke's Chapel completed and consecrated its educational building in March, 1969.

Duke Memorial completed general renovation to the old educational building, and the same is planned for the sanctuary, including a new organ.

Epworth has plans for a new sanctuary, anticipating construction to begin within a year.

Lakewood dedicated the church building and consecrated the new parsonage in December, 1968.

Maybrook-Massey—general renovation of Massey's sanctuary to begin soon.

Trinity—general renovation to all church properties are in the planning stage.

Ellis Chapel: Constructed a fellowship hall.

Lea's Chapel-Warren's Grove: Lea's Chapel paid debt on educational building; to be dedicated soon.

Mt. Tirzah-Helena: Helena purchased adjoining land and house for future expansion.

Parkwood: Negotiations are under way for a larger parsonage.

Rougemont: New Bethel paid the debt on educational building; to be dedicated soon.

Rougemont constructed an outdoor memorial bulletin board and walkways in front of the church.

Union Grove (Orange County): Renovation of sanctuary to begin soon.

District Parsonage: General repairs now being done.

Board of the Laity: The dramatic spot of the work of the Board of the Laity continues to be the annual Lay Rally. The attendance again this year was the largest in the conference, 1,167 being present.

Women's Society of Christian Service: The work of this organization continues to be vigorous and effective. Both the quantity and quality of its work have been outstanding from its beginning.

The spirit and fellowship of ministers and laymen throughout the entire district have been inspiring and encouraging. Their attitude toward and their work in the kingdom of our Lord have borne much fruit of the nature that can be listed statistically, but far beyond the contents of mere reports, there has been growth in things of the spirit as redeeming grace and reconciling love have touched and transformed many lives.

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

O. L. HATHAWAY, *Chairman*

The death of Reverend Henry G. Ruark was a sad experience for the ministers and laity of the Elizabeth City District. The loss of his leadership was felt in the Cabinet and throughout the North Carolina Conference. Bishop Cannon issued the following statement to the Cabinet and Elizabeth City District: "In order to look after the affairs of the Elizabeth City District until the meeting of the Annual Conference, I have appointed a committee of three traveling elders: O. L. Hathaway, H. M. McLamb, and L. C. Veeren."

We met with the ministers of the Elizabeth City District and through their help and ours, we were able to complete the charge conferences and assist in the making of appointments for the Elizabeth City District. We wish to thank the ministers and the laymen for the wonderful way in which they helped to complete the year's work. Many of them went beyond the work of their own charges to assist us and the other ministers in closing the year's work.

The spirit of Brother Ruark has manifested itself in this undertaking. There were many expressions of love and appreciation for Sarah Elizabeth Ruark. The members of the committee would like to express their appreciation to Sarah Elizabeth for the co-operation and helpfulness to us.

Again may we say thank you to our Bishop, William R. Cannon, the ministers and the laymen of the Elizabeth City District and the members of the Cabinet for their help to all of us.

FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

GRAHAM S. EUBANK, *Superintendent*

In this report for the Fayetteville District for the year 1969-1970, we can only point out a few of the highlights for the year. This report was made possible only because the pastors and lay people have been faithful to the ministry of Christ in the respective churches, and to the district programs.

PROGRAM:

Two workshops were held in the district. One in Fayetteville and one in Lumberton for members of the council on ministries. These were well attended and were conducted by the Program Council Staff. One workshop was held in the district conducted by the Program Council Staff for laymen and ministers on the finances and for members of the Pastor-parish Relations Committees. Ministers and laymen also participated in the Conference School of Mission held at the Methodist College. Other conference programs in which our ministers and lay people participated were: the Laymen's Retreat, Lay School of Evangelism, the School of Evangelism for Ministers, the Youth Annual Conference, camping program and vacation church schools. All areas of the program have been promoted in churches. Special days have been set by the General Conference and the offerings on these special days have exceeded most previous years. The district lay rally was held at the Hay Street Church on February 19. The Honorable Terry Sanford, the new president of Duke University, was the speaker. Dr. Sanford was speaking in his own church and made a superior address to more than a thousand laymen.

In the area of ministry the most exciting new program was established in Robeson county when the Church and Community Center was opened on December 1. The offices are in a house just outside of Lumberton with a full time staff of four people. The Rev. R. L. Mangum is the director. Included on the staff is a church and community worker, a case worker, and a secretary. A number of voluntary workers including students from Pembroke State University also participated in the program. Church and community center was set up in Lillington under the leadership of the Rev. Charles Bryant and laymen from the Lillington Church. Hay Street Church is sponsoring "Contact" which is a telephone ministry for the Fayetteville area. Workers have been in training for several weeks. The coordinator is employed by the Hay Street Church. The actual ministry will begin in early July. The program and ministry of the church has been upgraded throughout the district to more adequately minister in these crucial and changing times. Our people are beginning to learn that the ministry of the church goes beyond the local program. We are not turning away from the "Now" generation but seeking to relate Christ and his Gospel to all people. We are involved now in this district with people often characterized as opposed to the "Establishment" who prefer to do their own thing. All meetings on the sub-district and district levels are integrated meetings, including all groups, Negro, Indian, and Caucasian. We have seventeen Negro churches and eleven Indian churches in the district.

BUILDING PROGRAMS:

Sandy Plains Church has completed a new educational building and renovated the sanctuary. A contract has been approved for the building of a new parsonage. Pleasant Grove Church has completed its new building. This building provides for worship, study and fellowship. A new educational building has been completed at Collins Chapel. The Coats Church has completed its new church building and had the opening services in July. Camp Ground Church dedicated its sanctuary in October and immediately began the construction of a new educational building, fellowship hall, and administrative unit. Wesley Heights Church and educational building have been completely renovated. Chestnut Street Church purchased and dedicated a new pipe organ built in Europe, and purchased additional land for expansion. Pleasant Grove Church in Fairmont has purchased a new site, and it is expected that a new chapel will be placed on this site soon. St. James Church, Pembroke has erected a small new church building to replace the one that was condemned. Haymount Church has purchased additional land for necessary expansion. Prospect Church has built a new fellowship hall and renovated the sanctuary.

FINANCES:

The churches of the district are to be commended for their support of the Fund for Reconciliation, Camps, Advance Specials, Race Relations, Student Day, Fellowship of Suffering and Service, and the One Great Hour of Sharing. Only four churches failed to pay Single Figure acceptance in full. 98.8% was paid on Single Figure apportionment. A total of \$307,548.15 was sent to the conference treasurer during the year. This does not include funds raised by the Women's Society of Christian Service sent to their conference treasurer. I express my sincere appreciation to the pastors and laymen of the district for what they have accomplished during the year.

All signals in the Fayetteville District are go with Christ!

GOLDSBORO DISTRICT

ALBERT F. FISHER, *Superintendent*

The district superintendent's report is, and has always been, a summary report of the pastors and congregations of the given district. This report is no exception. The Lord has blessed the labors of the pastors and laymen of the Goldsboro District during the year. It is with enthusiasm and deep appreciation that I make this report on behalf of the people of the Goldsboro District.

The year has been fruitful in those added to the rolls of the churches. Our pastors

reported 324 people added by profession of faith, with a total of 760 people received from all sources. The total membership for the district at this time is 17,548.

A new innovation was incorporated into the district this year in the form of a District Program Council. This has become a decision-making body for the district for matters of program. Those who have been on the Program Council have made invaluable contributions to the total church program of the district.

Recognizing our connectional responsibility, the district has had a good year both in response to and acceptance of the Single-Figure calls of the church. The district will pay better than 97% of the acceptance figure of \$215,635 for the year. The churches have accepted \$219,028 for the Conference year 1970-71, which is an increase of \$3,393.

Any summary would be inadequate if it did not call attention to the new salary increases given by the churches in the district. Salary increases for the new year totalling \$20,906 have been granted, which is an average increase of 7%. It was marvelous to see the concern and support registered by the churches, on behalf of the clergy.

Certain building programs must be mentioned. Two church building projects are under construction. The Pine Level United Methodist Church is building a new plant. Since its organization, the congregation has used an old Baptist Church plant which they purchased some years ago. The new facility, consisting of classrooms and a sanctuary, will be valued at \$55,000. The second church building program is an educational wing under construction at the New Hope United Methodist Church. The cost of the project will be \$36,000.

The Warsaw United Methodist Church has a new parsonage under construction. The four-bedroom parsonage will be valued at \$30,000.

It is obvious that the Goldsboro District has had a good year. The work has not been completed. Progress has been made and we give thanks to God for having blessed the labors of the consecrated ministers and laymen of the Goldsboro District.

GREENVILLE DISTRICT

WILLIS R. STEVENS, *Superintendent*

The Greenville District closes its sixth year with a membership of 16,126. The seventy churches have received into membership this year a total of 548: by profession of faith, 206; from other United Methodist Churches, 258; from other denominations, 84. Revivals and confirmation classes have been conducted in most of the churches.

At the time of this report, June 2, 1970, the stewardship of giving to all causes amounted to \$1,185,920. The acceptance on Single Figure for next Conference year shows an increase. There is considerable increase for salaries of pastors.

This report concludes the sixth year since the establishment of the Greenville District. It is also the final report of the present and only district superintendent, Willis R. Stevens, who organized the district bound by six eastern North Carolina counties and composed of seventy churches from four surrounding districts.

The net gain in membership for the six years is about 1,000. During this time there have been received a total of 4,608 members as follows: by profession of faith, 1,860; by certificate, 1,975, and from other denominations, 773. During these six years the churches have raised for all causes a total of \$5,925,500.

The property across the district shows wonderful improvements in both new structures and renovation of existing buildings. This program began in 1964 with the purchase of a lovely new district parsonage, offices and furnishings in the Lynndale subdivision of Greenville. Five other new parsonages have been purchased or constructed and four parsonages have had an extensive renovation program. Three new sanctuaries have been constructed and two completely renovated. Improvements in educational buildings include three newly constructed and four completely renovated. Plans are now complete for two new sanctuaries and three new educational buildings. All this means a great opportunity for worship and Christian training.

Many other records of progress could be listed if time and space permitted. The first six years of the Greenville District, especially during the early months, involved the perfecting of its organizations and bringing the seventy churches from four separate districts into one district unit.

This report represents the wonderful cooperation, support and devoted participation of a fine and loyal group of lay people and ministers during six years. Thus, this district superintendent proudly presents the Greenville District to his successor, the Rev. H. M. McLamb, with full confidence that it is in excellent hands.

NEW BERN DISTRICT

C. H. MERCER, *Superintendent*

I report for the New Bern District, which is the oldest District in the Conference. In the early 1800's most of the territory included in our Conference today, other than the Elizabeth City area, was in the New Bern District. At one time the small outlying communities of Wilmington and Raleigh were in this District.

The eloquent preacher, George Whitfield, came to New Bern in 1739. Joseph Willmoor visited in 1772. Bishop Asbury made his second visit to our section of the State in 1802 and preached in New Bern to large congregations. The first building was in progress at the time and the good Bishop called upon the large congregation for contributions to complete "the House of God." A collection was taken and \$60. received.

We have done a little better financially speaking this year than did Bishop Asbury, but our record will indicate that it is still difficult for Methodists to raise money in the New Bern District.

Though we have not reached our goal of almost \$200,000. for "the Single Figure" we have come near and will be even nearer when all records are completed.

Several churches are to be commended for progress in their building programs. The Oak Grove Church on the Hubert Charge has completed a lovely new sanctuary and renovated the educational building at a cost of \$40,000. The indebtedness is only \$13,000.

The Trinity Church in New Bern has built and occupied a beautiful parsonage at a cost of \$25,000.

The Educational Building at Salter Path was dedicated in May by Bishop Cannon. We are told that this is the first time a Bishop ever participated in a worship service here.

The Midway Church is now in the process of constructing an entirely new facility.

Trinity Church in Jacksonville has done extensive renovation.

The indebtedness at the Cherry Point Church has been paid and the building is now ready for dedication. The tenth anniversary will be observed in November and we hope our Bishop can come for the dedication at that time.

Last Sunday Garber Church in New Bern broke ground for a new Sanctuary which will cost in excess of \$100,000.

We now have 16,344 members, a net increase for the year of 361. We have baptized 149 babies. We have received 301 on profession of faith. Other statistics could be given to indicate the progress made in the various phases of the traditional life of the Church.

At the same time we have explored and found ways to carry on new ministries. The most dramatic has been the Bogue Banks Resort Ministry. Though sponsored by many Protestant and Roman Catholic Churches in Carteret County, the genius of the program has been the Reverend A. P. Hill, Jr., pastor of First United Methodist Church in Morehead City. The interfaith movement provides worship and Sunday School opportunities at various campgrounds, and trailer parks; a film ministry on the beach; and a fellowship center known as the Koinonia House at Atlantic Beach. Last summer about 65,000 persons were involved in this ministry during a 13 week period. It is our belief that the program will be even more effective this summer. The District supports the program financially through the Fund for Reconciliation and the Christmas offering.

I cannot say that our more than 16,000 Methodists in the New Bern District are all active. All of our Pastors are. The brief report indicates that many of our laymen, also, have fulfilled their Christian stewardship in a commendable way. I must acknowledge that a few, a very few, have expressed greater confidence and trust in Carl McIntyre, Tom Anderson, and others with a similar philosophy than they have in the wise and dedicated leaders of Methodism. However, the vast majority of us love the

Methodist Church, we thank God for it, and we are committed to serving Christ through it.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

LEON RUSSELL, *Superintendent*

Any report of the work of the Raleigh District for the past year must be an acknowledgement of the splendid spirit of cooperation we have had from both preachers and laymen as we have tried to promote the full program of our church. In every area of activity there has been progress.

In evangelism we have experienced growth, so that the reported net increase in church membership for the year has been 588. Two churches in the city of Raleigh have each received more than 200 members during the year. The total new members received was 1,654. Most of the churches have established a continuous program of evangelism.

In the program of education we have not had the numerical growth we would like, but our people have been alert to new methods and new approaches so that the quality of our church school work continues to improve. The youth work in many of the churches has abandoned traditional patterns, and has thereby become a challenging and exciting part of the church's life.

The churches of the district have not been engaged in many special financial campaigns during the year but there are indications of growing stewardship in many places. The people responded well to the appeal of Hurricane Camille and contributed more than \$30,000. Almost every charge increased the pastor's salary for the next conference year. The increases total \$33,281. The Single Figure Asking was accepted in most of the churches; it was increased in 23 of the Charge Conferences.

One indication of activity and commitment on the part of our people can be seen in the building enterprises undertaken during the year. The Longview Church completed the payment of its indebtedness and the church was dedicated. The Warren Charge built a new parsonage and dedicated it this year. A new parsonage was purchased by the Raleigh: Cokesbury Church. Three beautiful new sanctuaries were completed and consecrated. They are St. Andrews, in Garner; Highland and St. James, in Raleigh. Extensive renovation programs were completed at the Louisburg and Fuquay Springs Churches.

Early in May the Gillburg Church building was completely destroyed by fire, but the congregation of this church is remaining loyal and is developing plans for a new building to be erected during the next conference year.

It has been a joy to be associated with the loyal people of the Raleigh District, and I thank God for the victories He has made possible for us this year.

ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT

PAUL CARRUTH, *Superintendent*

A report of the significant events in any district during any conference year should properly begin with a heralding of the faithful performance of their tasks by the valiant pastors and laymen of the local churches. The quality of work and the passion for service displayed in the district should not be taken for granted because these positive efforts are maintained at a high level year in and year out. Nor should particular failures to reach goals which have been set cloud the achievements which have been realized. In the Conference year 1969-70, much good work in Christ's name has been done.

Though tempted to make our buildings monuments to our own pride rather than signs of our devotion to God, we do find strength in the reminders of the divine Father's presence which our church buildings give us. Therefore, with gratitude, we chronicle the building projects in the district which have made progress. The educational building at Black Creek has been completed and consecrated. Shiloh Church, Gaston Charge, has made significant progress in plans for a new church structure and expects to receive bids on construction in the near future. Scotland Neck has completed plans for its new church building and has a major portion of the money on hand. Construction of a new parsonage at Mt. Zion and one at Spring Hope are under way.

Of major significance is the project related to the care of members carried out across the district. With the objective of mobilizing the manpower of the church to participate in the ministry of our Lord, pastors and members have sought to establish the identity and location of every person carried in the official membership register of each church. The care of, and more especially for persons has resulted in the removal of inaccuracies in membership records. While correct totals of membership listings in a number of cases

re smaller than previously reported, this work has been welcomed in the churches as a sign of new concern among members for one another.

With respect to long-range implication, the bringing together of ten congregations to form three charges may be the most significant action in the Conference last year. These charges are engaged in a search for strength of interdependence between congregations. Eventually, they may participate in new patterns of charge organizations which will unleash tremendous new energies for ministry across the whole church. The three pastors, R. L. Bame, M. O. Stephenson, and Leo Thompson, with their assistants, A. E. Goldfinch, Jr., Larry Bond, Wade Goldston, and Russell Stott, merit our praise. More particularly, we salute the congregations of Battleboro, Speight's, McTyeire's, Whitakers, McKendree, Temperance Hall, Marvin, St. James, Hart, and Conetoe for their willingness to explore areas of cooperation which may well bless the entire church in days to come.

Our failures may appear larger than our successes, but the Rocky Mount District is grateful for the privilege of the struggle in which it has been engaged.

SANFORD DISTRICT

VERGIL E. QUEEN, *Superintendent*

The purpose of this annual report from the Sanford District is to briefly indicate the nature of the year's efforts by 92 local churches, 51 pastors, and nearly 19,000 laymen. The aim has been to simultaneously emphasize all phases of our Methodist work while applying the claims of the church in each situation according to the needs and resources of each church. All of our churches and their pastors have been involved.

The chief method of procedure has been educational. Considerable time and effort have been given to training our people in the principles of churchmanship according to the new structures required by the 1968 *Discipline*. This has involved the laity, and under the sponsorship of the District Board of the Laity, we have had meaningful experiences in lay speaking and in the lay rally.

During the year, interested laymen held four subdistrict consultations to consider the obligation to complete the College Crusade quotas.

Stewardship has been preached and taught throughout the year. The response has been reflected positively. More and better Every-Member Visitations have resulted and local church budgets have increased generally. Notable examples are seen in salary increases of the pastors. Better than \$16,000 in increases have been approved. Also, the 3% Theological Education Plan has been widely accepted.

Missionary cultivation has been emphasized. The district director of Missions organized and conducted four subdistrict training institutes in which more than 200 persons received instruction in directing mission studies in their own local churches. Approximately \$200,000 was accepted by the charges on the Single Figure apportionments for 1970-71.

The evangelistic story is one of hope only. Revivals were attempted in most of the churches with varying results. Much serious attention has been given to membership cultivation, and all pastors have been urged to intensify the quality of membership training through organized confirmation classes.

Building improvements and debt retirement efforts have been prosecuted vigorously this year. The Roberdel Charge has built and furnished a new parsonage with little remaining debt. Notable renovations and improvements have been made in several churches, especially Cool Springs on the Glendon Charge, and Mt. Gilead. The Highfalls Church reduced its debt considerably and was aided by a substantial grant from the Duke Endowment. The Biscoe Church has paid its parsonage debt in full and has burned the mortgage.

The district parsonage debt has been reduced by \$10,128 this year. The exterior has been repainted and the property is in excellent condition.

In conclusion, we give the thanks and praise to God our Father for His guiding hand and boundless grace, enabling us to keep the faith. We earnestly seek the prayers of those we love.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

CLYDE G. McCARVER, *Superintendent*

We of the Wilmington District feel a sense of gratitude and pride over the work accomplished this year. The credit is due to those wonderful preachers and laymen of the various charges of the district who have worked hard and faithfully this year. We wish that we could have done more, but we render this report of our stewardship.

We have had 572 additions, 460 losses (190 by death), and a net gain in membership of the church. Our church school has had a reasonable gain over the last year. The youth work has enjoyed a very fine year under the capable leadership of the Reverend G. Paul Phillips, district director. Lay activities have been very gratifying. We had a very fine lay rally and the entire program has capably been led by Mr. Arvell Heafner, Jr. Mrs. C. B. Hicks, president of the Women's Society of Christian Service, along with the district officers, has led our women to an all-time high in program and participation. Grace United Methodist Church was host for the Annual Conference of this fine group. We sincerely feel that all of the divisions of our work stand at the point of great advancement during the coming year.

Five hundred seventy-four thousand dollars worth of new buildings have been realized during the past year: district parsonage valued at \$61,000; sanctuary at Clarkton valued at \$71,000, is almost complete; Carver's Creek renovation and new educational plant valued at \$85,000; parsonage at Wallace valued at \$22,000; parsonage at Pine Valley valued at \$30,000; educational building at Wesley Memorial valued at \$250,000; sanctuary at Bolton valued at \$30,000 (Shiloh Church); Herrings Chapel, a new sanctuary valued at \$25,000. Forty-three thousand five hundred forty-eight dollars has been spent on improvements. We have accepted \$2,424 increase in Single Figure for next year, making a total of \$196,313. We had salary increases amounting to \$18,434 and a total of \$268,313. Almost all of the ministerial education apportionment was accepted by the churches.

At the time of the Annual Conference we were 97.8% paid out on the Single Figure Askings. More payment will be coming to the conference treasurer in the near future.

We feel grateful for the privilege of serving this segment of the kingdom and expect greater things to come.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS

MOTION CONCERNING ABORTION

Amendment to the Report of the Board of Social Concerns Re: C.i.b. 3 having been deleted:

I move that: 1. The North Carolina Board of Social Concerns establish a subcommittee, by cooperation of representatives of the North Carolina Conference lay and clerical for thorough study of the issue of abortion in relation to ecological and population problems and that participants be characterized by legal medical and theological competence and of both sexes to study and report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Social Concerns.

2. That the North Carolina Board of Social Concerns memorialize the General Conference of 1972 to establish a quadrennial commission to make theological, medically, and legally informed inquiry into the area of medical practices in relation to law and practice relating to abortion as it bears upon the norms of Christian life and practice.

ROBERT CUSHMAN

MOTION CONCERNING METHODIST FOUNDATION

I move that the Annual Conference be furnished by the Methodist Foundation the year by year breakdown by each participating agency of total amounts invested and the earnings therefrom at the next session of the Annual Conference in 1971.

LEO THOMPSON

MOTION CONCERNING CONTINGENCY FUND

I move that the Contingency Fund (line 14, Sec. 2, p. 51) of Tentative Budget be raised to an amount equal to 2% of Total Proposed Budget (\$54,000) and that no supplementary appropriations be granted to any agency beyond this budgeted amount. Second, that an estimate of Central Fund earnings based upon an average of earnings for the three prior years be included in Part I of the Report of the Commission on World Service and Finance each year as a part of anticipated income.

Be it finally resolved that the Conference expresses its desires that the person(s) responsible for the shooting into the Horne's United Methodist Church parsonage be brought to justice by law enforcement authorities and that a reward of \$1,000 be offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of such person(s).

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

The scope of our examination is contained in our opening letter. Certain features of the examination are set forth below.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges, as shown by the Treasurer's records, was confirmed directly with the pastors, and minor differences reported to us as of the date of this report were adjusted or satisfactorily explained.

Distribution of income from charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1969 and 1970 sessions of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorizations from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and of the various boards and funds were either inspected or, if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1969-70 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits in the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorization for the distribution of 1969-70 collections.
