

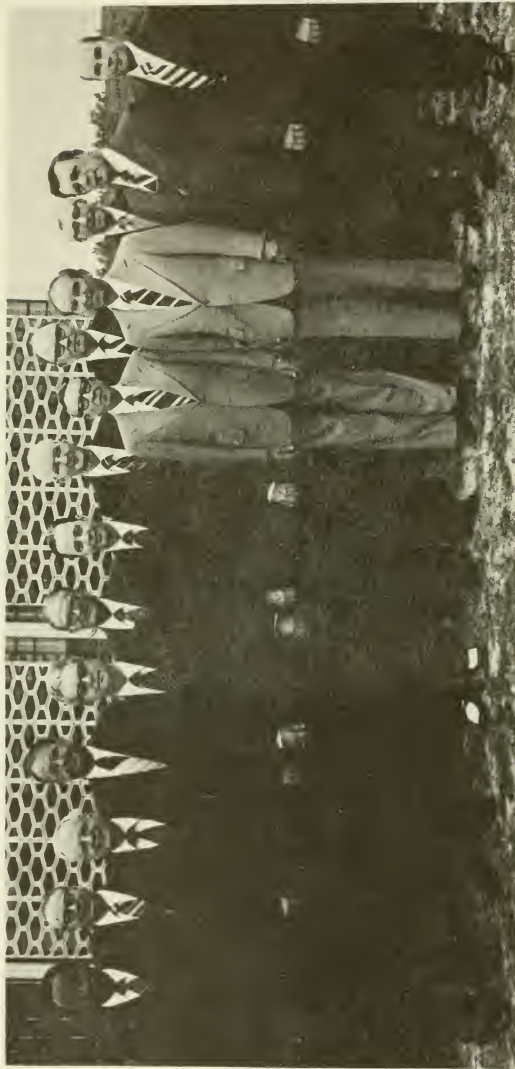

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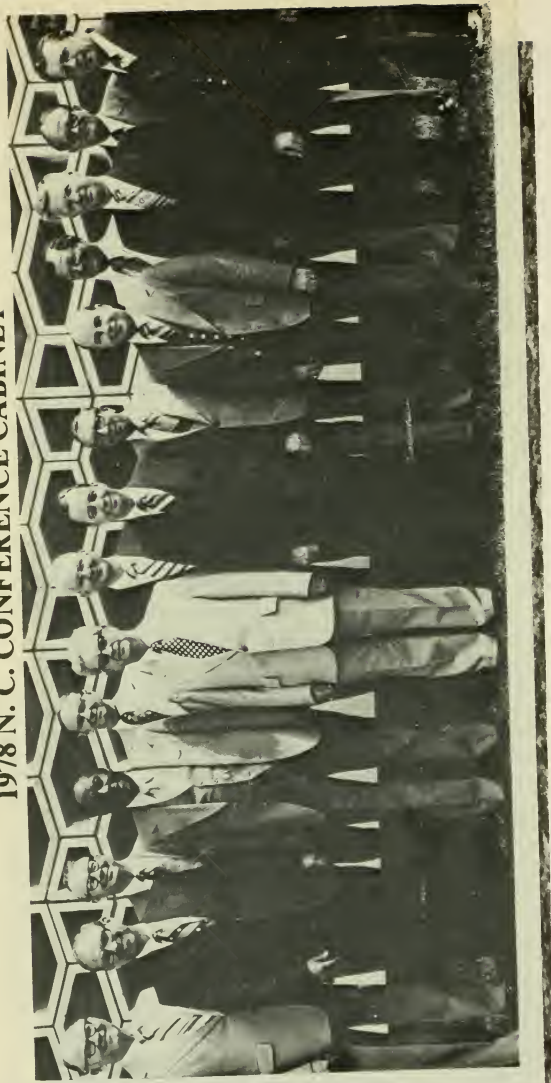

Historical Statement

I. COMPOSITION:

The North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church is composed of:

- (1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
- (2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

- (3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.
- (4) The Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction.

II. ORGANIZATION:

The organizing dates of the four former Conferences were as follows:

- (1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina
- (2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia.
- (3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.
- (4) The Eastern District North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference was organized at a special session on August 11, 1964, at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina.

Rules of Order and Procedure

Section I: Rules of Order

1. *Robert's Rules of Order* shall apply to any situation not covered by these rules.
2. A member may speak only once on any one motion until all who desire to speak have done so; and then he may speak only one additional time.
3. The chairperson of an agency (or someone designated by him) shall be allowed to speak last on his report even though the previous question has been ordered.
4. Speeches shall be limited to ten (10) minutes except by consent of the conference.
5. If any part of these rules conflict with *The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church*, the *Discipline* shall prevail.
6. The Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church shall apply to the Annual Conference as regularly scheduled and to all called sessions of the conference.

Section II: Voting

1. Voting shall be by "yes or no" or by a "show of hands" or by "standing" at the discretion of the chair.
2. A count vote may be ordered or called by any member of the conference supported by one-fifth (1/5) of the members present and voting. The results of a count vote shall be printed in the Journal. The chair may call for a count vote if he is in doubt as to the outcome of the vote.
3. All votes shall be cast in the bar of the conference. The bar of the conference shall be determined by the conference at the beginning of the first session.

Section III: Election of Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences

1. The election of clerical delegates shall be by the "Roman Ballot." (Each person eligible to vote shall write his selection of names to the number of names ordered by the chair on a secret ballot, without prior nomination, with balloting to continue until a majority is received by sufficient persons to fulfill the needed number of delegates.)
2. Any local church may, by action of its Administrative Board, nominate at most one person for lay delegate. It shall forward a biographical sketch and statement, both together not to exceed one typewritten page, to the Conference Secretary, who shall distribute copies thereof in or with the *Conference Program and Recommenda-*

- tions, or in a manner to be determined by the Council on Ministries.
3. The election of lay delegates shall be by the "Roman Ballot," as above. Electors may vote for any eligible person, whether nominated as above or not.
 4. All votes shall be cast upon the official ballots authorized by the conference.
 5. Ballots shall be numbered consecutively and only ballots with the number announced by the chair shall be valid. Defaced ballots will not be valid. (If a member defaces a ballot, he may exchange it for a new one at the secretary's desk.)
 6. Each member will place his own ballot in the ballot box held by a teller.
 7. Different colored ballots will be provided for lay and clerical members.

Section IV: Conference Structure

1. The Bishop and Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases where the *Discipline* or the Annual Conference directs otherwise.
2. Near the end of each quadrennium, the heads of all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees shall submit a list of qualified, suggested nominees to the Bishop and Cabinet for their consideration in the formation of new Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees.
3. Recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Annual Conference.
4. At the beginning of each quadrennium all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees shall elect their officers only after all their members have been notified of the organizational meeting. A member of the Cabinet or the Conference Staff (designated by the Cabinet) shall serve as the convening officer for the organizational meeting. Tenure for membership for all persons on boards, agencies, divisions, commissions, and committees shall be 8 years, with exception of the Board of Laity where tenure shall be six years for members and four years for The Conference Lay Leader. (The Conference Lay Leader may serve also the unexpired term of his predecessor.)
5. The Conference structure is that which was determined by the 1969 Annual Conference (Pages 212-217) and as amended by the Special Session of February 21, 1970 (Pages 110-117), the 1972 Annual Conference (Pages 308-311), and the 1976 Annual Conference.
6. The offices of Conference Secretary and Statistician shall be as determined by the 1973 Annual Conference (Pages 289-290).

The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.

Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.

Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.

Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.

Compensation: The Council on Finance and Administration shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also, the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.

7. Committees and Boards:

The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.

There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the Resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the host District Superintendent, and the pastor of the host Church, and the Conference Lay Leader. The Conference President of the U.M.W., the U.M.Y.F., and the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries. They shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the conference expense fund.

There shall be an Entertainment Committee composed of three ministers and three laypersons. The Committee shall be elected at the first session of the Annual Conference in the quadrennium. The Committee shall receive invitations and recommend to the Annual Conference the place and the method of entertaining the Annual Conference.

(1) The Annual Conference will be held at Methodist College and N.C. Wesleyan College on alternating years (held at Methodist College until Wesleyan has an auditorium) except at such times that a local church or other institution wishes to host Annual Conference as a part of a special celebration in the life of the Church.

(2) The cabinet will designate a district each year on a rotating basis as the host district which will be responsible for ushers, flowers, and other related items of hospitality.

- d. There shall be a Committee on Memoirs composed of the Conference Secretary, and the District Superintendents. They are charged with the responsibility of providing for all details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall serve as its Chairperson.
- e. There shall be a Committee on Daily Minutes elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
- f. There shall be a Committee on Appeals appointed quadrennially, composed of five members whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Buildings, or any other questions that may properly come before it.
- g. There shall be a Committee on Rules which shall provide to the Conference a document of Rules of Order and Procedure and the policies and standing rules and structure that the Conference from time to time shall adopt for its functioning. This document shall be presented to each Annual Conference.
- h. There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Introductions annually, at the first session of the Conference.

Section V: Financial Administration

1. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the *Journal*.
2. The Council on Finance and Administration shall present their report to the Annual Conference only after all other committees, commissions, divisions, boards, and agencies having claims on the budget have presented their report.
3. Each District Superintendent shall furnish the Conference Treasurer as early as possible following the completion of the Charge Conferences an official copy of the acceptances of the Single Figure Askings and a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Charge Conferences. The Conference Treasurer shall furnish this information to other agencies who have need of it. The Statistician shall use this report in compiling his report to the Annual Conference. (See also Section VII, Paragraph 2).

Section VI:

Reports, Resolutions, Motions, and Amendments to Reports

1. All reports, recommendations, and resolutions to be included in the Book of Recommendations shall be sent to the Conference Secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the council on Ministries and published in the conference calendar,

2. Resolutions presented to the Annual Conference affecting the structure, policy, and function of any board or agency of the Annual Conference shall be submitted in writing to the Conference Secretary with copies for all the lay and clerical members of the Conference. The resolution shall be presented to the Annual Conference on one day and considered the next day. No resolutions shall be distributed later than the second night of the Annual Conference. None can be considered later than the third night of the Conference.
3. Motions presented to the Annual Conference and amendments to motions shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the Conference Secretary prior to or when presented or immediately following.

Section VII:

Pastor's Report to The Annual Conference: Statistics

1. Table I and Table II shall be submitted to the Conference Statistician one week following the close of the financial books of the Annual Conference.
2. Final remittances for the current calendar year shall be made to the Conference Treasurer on or before the date scheduled by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the *Conference Journal* with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the Conference Statistician from the pastor's reports.

Section VIII: The Conference Journal

1. The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the *Conference Journal*, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the *Conference Journal* shall be sent to each of the following: the conference claimants, Lay members of the Conference Boards, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference, and Lay Delegates to Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other institutions and agencies of the General Church as he may deem advisable. Three copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$3.50 each. Monies accruing from the sale of the *Journal* shall be deposited with the Conference Treasurer and credited to the *Journal* Account.
3. The *Journal of the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church* shall be published in two volumes. Volume I of the *Journal*

shall include what is presently designated as:

Section VI - Treasurer's Financial Exhibits

Section VII - District Charge and Church Statistics

Schedule for this volume shall be set at March 1 each year, with the provision that while adjustments are made in coming to schedule, April 15 will be a temporary schedule. Distribution will allow:

1. Boards, Divisions and Commissioners of the Conference can have this information for their Spring meeting.
2. Current statistical data to be generally available to our entire membership in considering pastoral appointments.
3. Current statistical data to be used as a basis for action taken at the session of the Annual Conference.

Volume II of the *Journal* shall include Sections I-V and shall be published and distributed in September following each Conference session.

Section IX: Districts

1. The number of districts shall be twelve.
2. Any change in the number of Districts shall be approved at one Annual Conference to take effect at the next Annual Conference. A majority may change the number of District.
3. A district conference may be held annually in each district when authorized by the Annual Conference.
4. The District President, Sub-district presidents, and the local church presidents of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship shall be delegates to the District Conference, in addition to those named by the Discipline.
5. The district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the District Superintendent and the Conference Lay Leader.

Section X: Amendments

These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing, provided that the rule governing the manner in which the number of districts may be changed cannot be amended until the next Annual Conference.

Section XI: When the Rules Become Effective

These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Monday, June 5, 1978

The prelude, "Introduction-Allegro-Adagio" from Suite for Organ, by John Stanley was played by the Conference Organist for the afternoon, Mrs. Charles Davenport, Director of Music/Organist at First United Methodist Church, Wilson. The traditional Conference Hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive?" was sung.

Invocation: Bishop Blackburn called the Conference to order and prayed the deep spiritual blessings of God working through and within the Church as the body of Christ, asking that all participants in the Conference find the spiritual courage to carry the work of Christ's church into daily life through the spirit and love of Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Conference Convened: Bishop Blackburn convened the Conference with these words: "I now have the privilege of calling to order the Eleventh Session of The North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church and the One Hundred Fifty-Third Session of the oldest constituent member Conference of United Methodism in The North Carolina Conference. This is the 1978 Session. The North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church is the successor to:

The North Carolina Conference, Methodist Protest Church, 1828-1939.

The North Carolina Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, 1837-1844.

The North Carolina Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1845-1939.

Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879-1939.

Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction, The United Methodist Church."

Welcome: Bishop Blackburn presented the president of Methodist College, Dr. Richard W. Pearce, who brought greetings on behalf of the trustees, faculty and staff of the college. Pearce observed that this was the

sixth consecutive Annual Conference Session of The North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church to be held at Methodist College in Fayetteville. He emphasized the desire of the entire staff to provide for all participants' comfort and convenience during their stay. He noted the many new additions to the campus since last year, including new stage curtains and lights; the completion of the Graham S. Eubank Conference Room in the Student Union Building; and other student-inspired projects which have improved the usefulness of that building. Pearce requested the privilege of granting exceptional greetings and words of appreciation to the man who has come to be known as "Mr. Methodist of Methodist College," Vice President and Reverend Bill Lowdermilk. The Conference responded with applause signifying their warm appreciation for his attentiveness to detail. Pearce requested two things: help with holding down the energy utilization and thus the expense, and the hope that every delegate would feel free to ask for and accept every possible hospitality of the college.

Presentation: Dr. Pearce presented the Honorable Beth Finch, Mayor of the City of Fayetteville, now in her second term. Mayor Finch recognized the fact that Methodist College was now officially within the City Limits and again welcomed the ever increasing number of delegates to this Conference and to Fayetteville, expressing the continuity to which Pearce had already alluded. To old friends and new she invited all to participate in the variety of cultural attributes that Fayetteville offered and expressed her hope, on behalf of herself and the citizens whom she represented, that the Conference would meet here for many years to come.

Host District: Bishop Blackburn responded with appreciation for Mayor Finch's earnest words of welcome, led in applause on behalf of the Conference, and then introduced Host District Superintendent, Paul Edwards of the Goldsboro District. Edwards brought greetings on behalf of the more than 16,000 members and 63 ministers of the Goldsboro District and reiterated appreciation to Lowdermilk and his staff for their tireless work in keeping the leaders in the Goldsboro District "on course" as they made plans for this year's Annual Conference. Edwards offered the services of the ushers and ministers of the district to guide the delegates during the week. Edwards read a telegram from Bishop Lance Webb of the Iowa Conference sending greetings to The North Carolina Annual Conference, which is meeting concurrently. He requested that Bishop Blackburn send similar greetings to the Iowa Conference.

Communion Service: Bishop Blackburn gave instructions to the Conference as preparations were made to celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Communion. All were urged to consider this a house of solemn worship and to come and kneel at the altar and partake of the elements.

Bishop Blackburn announced that the offering from Heritage Sunday and other gifts would be received before the celebration of the Sacrament. He emphasized these gifts would be used as direct aid for the final restoration of Wesley's Chapel. This offering will be presented by a special delegation to be led by Rev. John Cline at the Chapel in London, England, later in this summer of 1978.

Sacrament of Holy Communion: After reception of the offering Bishop Blackburn called for singing of the hymn, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing." Assisted by the District Superintendents, the ritual was read, the altar uncovered, and Bishop Blackburn led in the celebration of the Sacrament with devout solemnity.

Conference Recessed: Bishop Blackburn called for a five-minute recess to prepare for the remainder of the afternoon business session.

Conference Reconvened: Bishop Blackburn called for the Conference to again be in session and for the singing of Hymn 150, "A Charge to Keep I Have." Following the singing of the hymn, Bishop Blackburn expressed appreciation to Mrs. Ed Tyndall of the Haymount United Methodist Church for the assistance in the preparation for the Sacrament of Holy Communion. for the past several years.

Rules of the Conference: Bishop Blackburn presented the Conference Secretary, James Coile, who moved the adoption of the Rules of the Conference as contained on pages 5-9 of the 1977 Journal. Two exceptions were given: permission to Dr. Fred Brooks to present an amendment to the rules to be considered on Thursday morning, and the consideration of the report of the Committee to study the procedures for Making Nominations for Episcopal Election on Thursday morning. The rules were approved.

Official Roll: Coile moved that the registration cards signed at the registration tables by both lay and clerical members of the Conference be designated and declared the official roll of the Conference. It was approved.

Bar of the Conference: Secretary Coile moved that the main floor and stage of Reeves Auditorium be the bar of the Conference. It was approved.

Official Program: Coile moved that the program contained in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978 and the brochure enclosed in the delegates' packets, as amended by the presiding Bishop, be designated and declared the official program of the Conference. It was adopted.

Property of the Conference: Coile moved that the material printed in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978 and published in the SADDLE BAG be declared presented to the Conference when distributed to the delegates to satisfy the requirement of Section VI, paragraph e, of the Conference Rules. It was approved.

Privilege of the Floor. Secretary Coile moved that all those persons appearing on the program of the Conference be granted the privilege of the floor. He explained that some of those on the program are not members of the Conference. This would enable them to speak without a specific motion for each individual. It was adopted.

Nominations: The Secretary of the Cabinet, the Rev. James H. Miller, Jr., stated that nominations were listed on pages 4 and 5 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. There are two changes: the names of Christian White and R.L. Wallace are to be added to the Committee on Investigation under Reserves. They were approved.

Special Presentation: Bishop Blackburn introduced Mr. John Procter, President and Publisher from The United Methodist Publishing House,

who brought greetings to the Conference. Mr. Procter stated that it was the first time that the president of the Publishing House had visited the North Carolina Conference during a session of the Annual Conference and he wished to correct that long overdue mistake. He brought special commendations for the segments of the Publishing House within the bounds of the Conference and recognized Mr. Bruce Hargrove of the Conference. Mr. Procter observed that the Publishing House was the oldest United Methodist agency and observed a mutuality of appreciation: the Publishing House for the constituent Conferences and the constituent Conferences for the work done by the Publishing House. He expressed a specific concern that the Publishing House continue to move toward growth and utilization of the literature and an improvement in the attendance at United Methodist Church Schools throughout this conference and the nation at large. He invited all those traveling through Nashville to visit the Publishing House headquarters.

Bishop Blackburn expressed appreciation to Mr. Procter for his remarks and they were received by the Conference with applause and appreciation.

Passing of the Character of the Ministers: Bishop Blackburn called the names of the District Superintendents to ask if there was anything against them and the ministers of the districts and then the Conference was asked if there was anything against the District Superintendents. As the names were called the characters were passed, both of the ministers and the District Superintendents. There was one instance of investigation lodged by the District Superintendent of the Wilmington District. Question 18 was considered by Bishop Blackburn to be satisfactorily answered.

Announcement of Appointments: Bishop Blackburn announced the appointment of Rev. James H. Miller, Jr., to the position of Director of the Council on Ministries; the Rev. Barney L. Davidson as Superintendent of the Burlington District; the Rev. Charles H. Mercer as Superintendent of the Durham District; the Rev. Paul Carruth as Superintendent of the Fayetteville District; and the Rev. Reginald Ponder as Superintendent of the New Bern District.

Report of the Division of Ministry: Bishop Blackburn recognized the dedicated work done by this Division and the arduous hours put in over the years, and called upon Herman S. Winberry for the report. Winberry recognized the Rev. Robert Drew to present the report of the Division of Ordained Ministry. Drew called Question 23, "Who are elected Associate Members?" (For names, see CONDENSED MINUTES.) He then called Question 24, "Who are elected as Probationary Members?" (See CONDENSED MINUTES for names.) Drew then called Question 25, "Who are continued as Probationary Members and what progress has been made in their ministerial studies?" (See CONDENSED MINUTES.) This concluded A, B and C. All of those under Question 23, 24 and 25 were moved for acceptance or continuation. The vote was taken and it was unanimously in favor.

Question 26 was called, "Who have been admitted from other Christian denominations?" and the men were approved. (For names see CONDENSED MINUTES.) Question 27, "Who are elected as ministerial members in Full Connection?" was called. (See CONDENSED MINUTES.)

Drew announced the completion of the report and Bishop Blackburn moved the approval of the entire report. It was seconded and the Conference approved it unanimously. Bishop Blackburn called for the members of the Division of the Ministry to stand and expressed appreciation for their hard work. They were accorded a round of applause.

Recognition of Ministerial Members Elected to Full Connection: Bishop Blackburn called these persons forward and asked them the historic questions. The candidates answered the questions as required with great sincerity of purpose. Bishop Blackburn offered prayer following the solemn ceremony and all candidates received parchments with the historic questions to remind them of the vows they had taken as they were received into Full Connection.

Continuing the Report of the Division of Ministry: Winberry called on Don Phillips to present the section on the Local Pastor. Question 21, "Who are approved and appointed as (a) Full-time Local Pastors; (b) Part-time Local Pastors; (c) Student Local Pastors?" was called and the candidates were approved. (For names see CONDENSED MINUTES.)

Question 33 was called, "Who have been elected and ordained Deacons?" Names were read and corrections were made. The candidates were approved. (See CONDENSED MINUTES.)

Continuing the Report of the Division of Ministry: Winberry called Question 37 "Who have been received by transfer?" (See CONDENSED MINUTES for names.)

Question 39, "Who have been granted honorable location?" The names were read and approved. (See CONDENSED MINUTES.)

Question 40 was read, "Who have had their conference membership terminated?" (See CONDENSED MINUTES.)

Question 42, "Who are the ministers on leave of absence and for what number of years consecutively has each held his relation?" was called. Names were read and approved. (See CONDENSED MINUTES.)

Question 43, "Who are granted Sabbatical Leave?" was called. The name was read and approved. (See CONDENSED MINUTES.)

Question 37 was called, "Who have been transferred out?" Names were read. (See CONDENSED MINUTES.)

Question 38, "Who are discontinued as Probationary Members?" was called. The names were read and approved. (See CONDENSED MINUTES.) The report was approved.

Winberry announced that this concluded the report of the Division of Ministry for the present. Other items will be brought before the Conference at a later time.

Report of the Division of Diaconal Ministry: Mrs. Martha Garrick brought the report which is outlined on page 48 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. She emphasized the very special nature of the Division of Diaconal Ministries and its responsibility to seek the certification of those who committed their lives to full time work within the framework of the Church. She read the various categories of Diaconal Ministers as listed in the report, recognized those transferring in, and made certain changes in the report. Certificates were presented as appropriate and the Conference gave a round of applause.

The report was placed before the Conference for adoption and was adopted unanimously. Those to be consecrated were approved separately by the Conference. (See CONDENSED MINUTES.) Bishop Blackburn expressed appreciation for the report and for the work of Mrs. Garrick in this area.

Composite Report of the District Superintendents: Bishop Blackburn recognized the Host District Superintendent, the Rev. J. Paul Edwards, to present the report. Mr. Edwards' report was received with appreciation. The complete text appears in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

Report of the Conference Lay Leader: Bishop Blackburn requested that Dr. Richard W. Pearce, Conference Lay Leader, come to the podium to present the report. A number of specific goals were set before the laity, and district and church lay leaders were urged to give support to these goals. The text of Dr. Pearce's remarks to the Conference appear in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL. Dr. Pearce read the list of district Lay Leaders and the floor was opened for nominations. There being no further nominations, the slate as presented was moved, seconded and adopted.

Report of the President of The United Methodist Youth: Bishop Blackburn presented Mark McMillian, president, to bring the report.

Report of United Methodist Women: Bishop Blackburn introduced Mrs. Ruth Cade, president, who brought the report. Mrs. Cade wanted everyone present to have a copy and had copies distributed to the entire Conference. (See text in SECTION V.)

Recognition: Bishop Blackburn introduced Mrs. Jean Dorsett, who is the representative from this Conference on the national board of The Women's Division.

Report of United Methodist Men: Mr. Grier Garrick was presented by Bishop Blackburn to give the report of the Conference president of United Methodist Men. (Text of the report will be found in SECTION V.)

Report of the Conference Statistician: The Conference Statistician, the Rev. D.D. Traynham, presented the statistical exhibits displayed on pages 76 and 77 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. Traynham reminded the Conference that his work consisted simply of a compilation of statistics which demonstrated some of the efforts of the churches throughout the Conference. He emphasized that, "They make my report for me." The year 1977 was compared and contrasted with 1976. Bishop Blackburn thanked Traynham for his work and the report was accepted by the Conference with appreciation.

Announcements: Conference Secretary Coile made announcements necessary before the evening session.

Personal Privilege: Bishop Blackburn introduced Bishop Kenneth Shamblin, who had just arrived, and announced that he would be the preacher for the evening.

Benediction: The afternoon session was adjourned by Bishop Blackburn with appropriate benediction requesting God's peace.

FIRST DAY, EVENING SESSION

Monday, June 5, 1978

The Most Sacred Service for the Ordination of Elders: Organist for the evening, Mr. William E. Hilderbrandt, Organist-Choirmaster, First United Methodist Church, Henderson, N. C., played as preludes, "Come, Holy Spirit, God and Lord" and "We Pray Now to the Holy Spirit," both by D. Buxtehude. After the singing of the processional hymn, A Mighty Fortress is Our God," and the Invocation by Bishop Robert M. Blackburn. Mr. Dale Caldwell, Organist-Choirmaster, Front Street United Methodist Church, Burlington, directed the North Carolina Conference Ministers' Chorus in singing the anthem, "Soldiers of Christ, Arise" by Richard Warner.

Bishop Blackburn presided over the services of ordination. He introduced the speaker of the evening, Bishop J. Kenneth Shamblin, Resident Bishop of the Louisiana Area. Bishop Shamblin preached on the topic, to the ordinands and the Conference on the need for those involved in ministry to feed the multitudes within the bounds of one's ability and commitment. He emphasized God's ability to take our abilities and do mighty works with it.

The Rev. Herman S. Winberry and the Rev. Robert Drew presented to the Bishop the names of the Elders to be ordained, calling Question 33. (See CONDENSED MINUTES.) The Elders were duly ordained.

The recessional hymn, Number 342, "Go, Make of All Disciples," by Henry Smart was sung by the congregation assembled, following which the evening worship service was adjourned with the pronouncement of the benediction by Bishop Blackburn.

For a postlude the organist of the evening played "Good Christian Men Rejoice and Sing," by Willan.

SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION

Tuesday, June 6, 1978

Holy Communion: The Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated in Hensdale Chapel at 8:00 a.m. under the direction of the Division of Worship.

Conference Convened: Following the 8:55 playing of the prelude, "Fanfare" by Ronald Arnatt, with organist of the morning, Mr. Dale Caldwell, Organist/Choirmaster, Front Street United Methodist Church, Burlington, Bishop Blackburn called the Conference to order and pronounced the session open for business at 9:00 a.m. The bishop called for the singing of Hymn 271, "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah." Bishop Blackburn called upon the Rev. Junius Neese to lead in the morning prayer.

Report of the Committee on Minutes: The Rev. Robert L. Bame, chairman, brought the report and announced that the Minutes for the Monday sessions had been read and were approved. The report was accepted by the Conference.

Announcements: Conference Secretary Coile made necessary announcements for the Order of the Day. Various resolutions were

distributed to the Conference to be considered after the next 24 hours as required by the Rules of the Conference. No comment was made on them at the time of distribution.

Recognition: Bishop Blackburn recognized the Dr. Howard Wilkinson, president of Greensboro College, who was in the morning congregation and was introduced to the Conference prior to his presentation of the report of the Commission on Higher Education tomorrow.

Cokesbury Report: Miss Sue Henry, Manager of the Cokesbury Bookstore in Raleigh, brought greetings to follow up those of Mr. Proctor yesterday. She commented on the new satellite bookstore at Duke and noted that the Duke satellite and the Raleigh store rated number three among the 31 Cokesbury Stores in the nation. Cokesbury experienced a 50% increase in sales over the preceding year. Miss Henry presented a check for \$8,865.77, representing the share of the profit proceeds from the United Methodist Publishing House to be contributed to the Pension Fund of the North Carolina Annual Conference. Bishop Blackburn expressed thanks and commended the Conference to a close examination of the Cokesbury display and the books that are available. He particularly made reference to the biography of Bishop Paul Neff Garber which is available at the Cokesbury Store this year.

Report from the General Council on Ministries: The Rev. Dr. N.W. Grant brought the report of the General Council. The text of the report is printed in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL. Grant gave special attention to the Convocation on Missional Priorities, September 29, 1978, at Highlands United Methodist Church, Raleigh, and then yielded to Bishop Blackburn who gave a special call to the Conference members to place the item on their calendars at this time.

Recognition: Bishop Blackburn introduced Mrs. Doris Gidney representative from the Board of Global Ministries.

Report of the Conference Council on Ministries: Bishop Blackburn presented the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries, Dr. Charles H. Mercer, Dr. Mercer has served in this position for 5 years. Bishop Blackburn expressed his appreciation for his work which will be assumed by the Rev. James H. Miller, Jr., in the coming year as Mercer becomes the Durham District Superintendent. Mercer asked the members of the Staff of the Conference Council on Ministries to come to the stage and be presented. Mercer recognized Mrs. Mary Louise Stansbury who was present at the Conference as a delegate and who, also, is one of the secretaries at the Methodist Building. He gave further tribute to all of the secretarial staff for the work that they have accomplished.

After expressing words concerning his appreciation for the type of work that he had been doing and was to do, Mercer presented the Supplemental Recommendations of the Conference Council on Ministries on pages 20-21 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. Mercer placed these before the Conference with the exception of Recommendation III, A, 2, under which the words "in June" were to be deleted.

Dr. Joseph B. Bethea moved to amend the wording of III, a, 2 to read "...that a Conference-wide Consultation on the Ethnic Minority Local

Church shall be held to consider the ministerial needs..." This was accepted.

The Supplemental Recommendations for 1978 were approved by the Conference.

Mercer then presented the 1979 Recommendations on pages 21-25 in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMENDATIONS 1978, and all were placed before the Conference. The recommendations were approved by the Conference unanimously.

Mercer moved to that section of the report dealing with recommendations to the District Council on Ministries. The section was presented and Items on page 25, II, A, 1-4 were placed before the Conference. They were passed unanimously. Section B, Item 1-20, were presented to the Conference. They were adopted unanimously.

Next, Mercer presented III. Recommendations to the Conference Council on Ministries, beginning on page 27, beginning with A, 1-9. This section was moved, seconded and adopted without dissent. Section B, on page 28, Recommendations Which Shall Be Considered, were next presented by Council Director Mercer, including Items 1-30, and continuing through page 31. Mercer emphasized the flexibility of this section as being items which, for the most part, have been done in the past, but which might be done, depending upon the actual request for the implementation of these items. The section was moved and approved by the entire Conference without dissent.

Mercer expressed his appreciation to the Conference for having done their homework and having been knowledgeable of the various recommendations and gave his appreciation for the dispatch with which these very important matters were assimilated and accepted as a part of the total Christian ministry as guided by the Conference Council on Ministries would be accepted and implemented throughout the local church.

Mercer alluded to the redefinition of the Job Description of a number of the staff members. Simeon Cummings will be leaving the staff at his own request. Information concerning this will be distributed in the next monthly Coordinated Mailing.

Bishop Blackburn called upon Mercer to again present the staff of the Conference Council on Ministries and asked for a round of applause for the good work done by all of them. The Conference responded with warmth and appreciation.

Report of the Division of Evangelism: Rev. Jack L. Hunter brought the report for the Division. For the complete text see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL. Hunter also expressed appreciation for the coming of the Mass Evangelism Rally to be held this fall and acknowledged the hard work of Walter Feltman, the vice chairman, and Simeon Cummings. They stood and were greeted with the applause by the Conference. The Division of Evangelism gave approval to the continuation of Tommy and Bobby Tyson as approved Evangelists of the Conference and asked that the name of John Hobbs be added to that list. The report was placed before the Conference for adoption and was approved by the Conference. Bishop Blackburn expressed concern for the more than 200 churches of the Conference which received no new members on Profession of Faith during the past year.

Report of the Division of Education: The report for the Division was brought by the Rev. F. Belton Joyner. (See SECTION V of THE JOURNAL for text of the report.) Joyner's report was well received and he was complimented by the Bishop. The report was moved for adoption along with the Policy Recommendations under Section D on page 32 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. The Conference adopted the report and the Policy Recommendations.

Call for Hymn: Bishop Blackburn called on the Conference to sing Hymn No. 224, "Blessed Assurance, Jesus is Mine." The Conference stood and joined in a joyous singing of this great hymn of purposeful evangelism.

Report of the Division of Worship: The Rev. Dr. Robert S. Pullman brought the report, the text of which will be found in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL. Pullman emphasized in a separate paper the importance of the principal weekly service of worship which gathered together more persons than any other single activity of the church. He stated that the great diversity of opportunity that came within the confines of this service was also the greatest opportunity for creativity and the promulgation of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Pullman viewed with alarm the slow decline in average attendance over the last several years at this principal service of worship, and he called on the Conference to offer suggestions as to how the attendance in each church each week could be improved. Pullman commended the use of the Lectionary in the preparation of sermons. The report was received as information and did not require a vote.

Report of the Division of Lay Life and Work. Donald C. Craft of Ahoskie brought the report, the text of which will be found in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL. Craft spoke of the importance of the change of emphasis within the Division and the need for all of the laity to serve in a fuller way the cause of Christ. He then presented Item G on page 34 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1987. He added a second article: "We recommend that Bishop Blackburn consider setting the time of the Annual Conference session so that it would begin on Thursday and close on Sunday" and made this a motion. Bishop Blackburn pointed to the fact that the dates for Annual Conference were set by the Bishop and the Cabinet and so this item could be accepted as a recommendation only and not as a requirement. The Bishop invited Craft to speak to the rationale behind the motion of the Division. His rationale emphasized that employment restrictions kept many lay persons from attending Annual Conference and that by placing the Annual Conference over a weekend period more lay persons could attend. Mr. Steve Hickle from the Vanceboro Circuit spoke in favor of the recommendation, indicating that it would have a further positive effect in regard to the moving day for pastors. Barbara Whiteside of Divine Street Church, Dunn, a Youth Delegate, spoke in favor of the recommendation, indicating that it would make it easier for youth to attend Conference because of the timing of school, examinations, graduation, etc.

Point of Clarification: Point of Clarification was raised by Rev. Stanley Smith, Jr. Smith questioned the fact that, if Conference went through Sunday, that all pulpits on Sunday would be vacant because of pastors' being

in attendance at Conference, and wondered how the pulpits would be filled and yet have the laity in attendance as requested. Bishop Blackburn ruled that an amendment to the recommendation would be in order. Smith moved "that the Conference will begin on Wednesday and conclude on Saturday afternoon at 5:00 p.m.." It was seconded and failed. Bishop Blackburn stated that we were back on the Craft recommendation and emphasized that the Conference was not setting the dates of Annual Conference, simply making a recommendation. The recommendation carried. Mr. Craft then presented Richard B. Bryant to the Conference and introduced him as the recipient of the Lay Person of the Year Award. The Conference accorded Mr. Bryant, one of the youngest members of the Conference ever to receive this award, a standing round of applause in response to the warm words of the citation spoken by Mr. Craft. Mr. Craft indicated that this concluded the Report of the Division of Lay Life and Work. The entire report was adopted by the Conference.

Point of Personal Privilege: The Bishop called on Rev. Paul Edwards to present a matter that he had requested. Edwards presented Bishop Blackburn's daughter, Frances Blackburn, who was at Conference serving as an official delegate from the Raleigh District. Dr. Richard Pearce escorted her to the platform. She spoke words of appreciation. Bishop Blackburn also expressed appreciation.

Special Introduction: Bishop Blackburn gave attention to the presence of Dr. Robert Cushman, long-time member of the Conference and a distinguished professor and former Dean of the Divinity School of Duke University and oft-time member of General Conferenc.

Committee on Communications: The report of the Committee on Communications was brought by the Rev. Dr. Reginald W. Ponder. For complete text see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL. Ponder stressed the importance of the work being done by the Rev. Al Simonton, Editor of the NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE, the North Carolina Conference edition, and the increase in subscriptions and readership. Ponder also challenged the churches of the Conference and the institutions of the Conference to become members and regular users of the Media Center. He noted that the average usage of the Media Center had increased to 84 items per week this year. Ponder introduced Mrs. Barbara Wilkinson, Coordinator of Communications for the Conference, who gave a brief report concerning her work and contacts with the media. Wilkinson's report was gratefully received.

Bishop Blackburn presented the Rev. Al Simonton, Editor of the NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE, who reported the growth in the subscriptions to THE ADVOCATE. He stated that the North Carolina Conference had out-distanced the Western North Carolina Conference in obtaining new subscriptions. He commented on the report on page 74. The report of the Committee on Communications was moved, seconded and adopted by the Conference.

World Communion Pilot Project: Rev. Vernon Tyson brought the report on the project and indicated the tremendous increase in the giving on World Wide Communion Sunday. Bishop Blackburn expressed ap-

preciation for the work that had been done in lifting up this offering and stated that its purpose could not be over-emphasized. He encouraged every congregation to keep this as a priority item and to do even better next year. The report was received as information.

Recognition of Chaplains: Colonel James P. Richards was presented by Bishop Blackburn to give the Report of the Chaplaincy and to present the chaplains of our Conference. Rickards called upon the Chaplains to come forward and be recognized. Rickards spoke with appreciation for the work of Bishop Blackburn on behalf of the episcopacy working within and through the Chaplain's Program. Col. Rickards' report was received with appreciation and Bishop Blackburn invited each chaplain within the bounds of the Conference to introduce himself and make appropriate remarks. He asked that the recognition begin with Rev. Wes Aitken, Chaplain and Director of Chaplaincy Service at Duke University Medical Center. The report and actual attendance of each of these active men from many areas was gratefully acknowledged by the Conference.

Call for Hymn: Bishop Blackburn called for the singing of Hymn No. 30, "Praise to the Living God." He encouraged the Conference to consider this as the beginning of the sacred worship hour at which time we would be privileged to hear Dr. Cecil Myers of Peachtree Road United Methodist Church, Atlanta, who would bring the Conference sermon.

Announcements: Conference Secretary James Coile brought special announcements.

Call for Hymn: Bishop Blackburn requested the Conference to remain seated and be in a prayerful mood as the hymn, "Dear Master, In Whose Life I See." be sung. Bishop Blackburn presented Dr. Myers to the Conference and introduced him with personal affection and appreciation. Mrs. Myers was also recognized as Dr. Myers prepared to present the first of three sermons as Conference preacher. Dr. Myers' first message was entitled, "Wanted: Revolution." He preached to the Conference fully assembled.

Benediction: Bishop Blackburn pronounced the benediction and the morning session of Annual Conference ended with the playing of the postlude, "Prelude in C Major," by Edward Bairstow.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Tuesday, June 6, 1978

Following the playing of the prelude, "Prelude and Air" by Samuel Wesley and "Festal Song" by Seth Bingham, by the organist for the afternoon, Roger F. Searles, Diaconal Minister, Director of Music/Organist, St. Paul's United Methodist Church, Goldsboro; Bishop Blackburn called the Afternoon Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference to order and prepared for the service of recognition of Ministers who are retiring. The congregation sang Hymn No. 138, "Spirit of God, Descend Upon My Heart."

The prayer for the afternoon was led by the Rev. Vassar Jones of the Camp United Methodist Church, Fayetteville.

Recognition of Rev. Mel Harbin: Rev. Mel Harbin brought the report of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council on Ministries and also that of the Lake Junaluska Assembly. Copies of the Jurisdiction newsletter were distributed to the Conference. Harbin expressed appreciation for the support given to the Lake Junaluska Assembly. He announced that this summer was the 65th season of the Assembly. Harbin and Bishop Blackburn had an interchange of mutual concern and appreciation for the work of Lake Junaluska and the recognition that it was necessary to stimulate attendance at Lake Junaluska and continued participation in the raising of funds necessary to complete the new Terrace Hotel. This concluded Dr. Harbin's report. It was approved by the Conference as information.

Recognition: Bishop Blackburn recognized the parents of Richard B. Bryant who received the Lay Person of the Year Award. They stood and were recognized and received a round of applause.

Bishop Blackburn also recognized Brother John Russell for his long and faithful attendance at Annual Conference, being here as a delegate in his 90th year of age.

Recognition of Ministers Who Are Retiring: Bishop Blackburn asked the ministers who are retiring and their wives to come to the platform for a very important service. While this was occurring, the Conference was led in the singing of Hymn No. 223, "When We Walk With The Lord." Bishop Blackburn asked the Rev. Kermit Wheeler, Secretary of the Board of Pensions, to call the names of the retiring ministers in answer to Question 45, "What members in Full Connection have been retired?" After each minister responded, the Bishop presented a certificate to the retired minister and gave each retiring minister a chance to make a statement. Then, Mrs. Paul Edwards, wife of the host District Superintendent, pinned an orchid on each of the wives of the retiring ministers. Each retiree responded in his own unique, effective and unusual manner to make the service a happy one, a time of sharing and yet a time of great meaning for the Conference as the ministers testified in their own way to their experiences, joys, successes and failures in serving the Lord Jesus Christ over the years as they now passed the torch on to those yet in active service. (For list of ministers retiring this year see CONDENSED MINUTES.)

At the conclusion of the order for the recognition of retiring ministers Bishop Blackburn called on the Conference assembled to join with the retiring ministers and their wives in singing, without benefit of accompaniment, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds." So they departed the stage and took their seats, joining once again with that great company assembled, all in the service of the same Lord, Jesus Christ.

Report from the Duke Divinity School: Bishop Blackburn presented Dr. John Bergland, representative of the Dean and faculty of the Duke Divinity School to bring the report of that institution of education for ministers. Bergland expressed gratitude for gifts through the Ministerial Education Fund and expressed appreciation on behalf of all of the seminaries. He expressed a concern for the future and the continuing rise in the cost of higher education. Yet, he saw the essential need for the support from the private sector so that the church could continue to have trained leadership for the churches of today and tomorrow. Dr. Bergland's remarks on

seminary education were received with great enthusiasm on behalf of the Conference.

Report of Conference Nominating Committee: The Rev. James H. Miller, Jr., brought the report. Mimeographed sheets with names of the nominees were distributed and studied by the Conference. The nominations were moved, seconded and adopted with no further nominations. For current list of nominations see SECTION II of THE JOURNAL.

Continuation of the Report of the Conference Council on Ministries: The Division of Missions: The Rev. Paul G. Bunn reported for the Division of Missions. Bunn introduced Rev. Clyde Dunn, who presented slides indicating the Second Mile Giving through the Advance. The program enlightened the Conference as to the needs served through the Advance and Dunn expressed a genuine enthusiasm for promoting the Advance within the local church. Following Dunn's report, Bunn recognized the section of Church and Community whose report was brought by the Rev. Tom Faggart. The report was received with appreciation and Faggart introduced Tom White to discuss the area of Urban Ministries. White was followed by the Rev. Clay Smith who spoke on the missional needs of churches with small memberships. Next the Rev. Charles M. Smith spoke on the evangelistic outreach in the Ethnic Minority Church and the seeking out of places where new churches, including Ethnic Minority Churches, can be placed within the bounds of the Conference. He also spoke of the Phase II promotion of the Ten Dollar Club and commended the churches and individuals who had participated in this. He expressed particular appreciation to the Rev. Franklin Grill for his work in promoting the increase in membership of the Ten Dollar Club. Smith was followed by the presentation of the Rev. Albert F. Fisher who spoke on the ways the North Carolina annual Conference had sought to fulfill the mandate of the Quadrennial emphasis to strengthen the life and quality of the Ethnic Minority Church within the Conference. Help has been proficed eight minority churches to help them upgrade their parsonage facilities and other necessities which will attract continuing good leadership within the Ethnic Minority Church. Fisher spoke to the needs that had already been accomplished and how others would be provided. Fisher moved that the documents concerning this be made a permanent part of the Conference records. It was seconded and adopted without discussion.

Rev. Paul Bunn returned to the podium to conclude the presentation of the report. Fisher's action concerned Addendum I. Bunn now spoke to Addendum II and Addendum III concerning the Ethnic Minority Local Church including the priorities. All of these are additions to H, 1-5, on pages 34-35 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978.

Question: Mrs. Catharine Vick questioned whether the third addendum would affect the appropriation requested under the Program for Conference Advance Specials already listed under Section 3, F. Bunn answered "No."

Bishop Blackburn stated that the entire report was now before us and it was adopted without dissent.

Resolution of Personal Privilege: The Rev. Paul Bunn read a significant resolution honoring the Rev. Simeon Cummings for his tireless efforts over the last five years. This was adopted by the Conference unanimously. (For text see Resolutions under SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

This concluded the report of the Division of Missions.

Church of the Year Awards: The Bishop called upon the Rev. Tommy Faggart to present the Church of the Year Awards. Faggart spoke on the keenness of the competition. The first church honored was the Four Oaks United Methodist Church with the Rev. J. B. Helms pastor. He was recognized in the category of churches of under 300 members. Helms and the Lay Leader of the church came forward to receive the award. Ocracoke and Pinetops United Methodist Churches were in that same category and they also deserve recognition.

The second church receiving an award was the Nashville United Methodist Church in the category of churches with 300-1000 members. The Rev. J. Donald Phillips, pastor, and representatives of the laity from his church received the award and a standing ovation from the Conference as, indeed did all of those who had actively participated in the competition for this award.

The final award, for the church with 1,000 members or more, went to First United Methodist Church of Roanoke Rapids, Dr. Thomas A. Collins, pastor. Dr. Collins and members of the church came forward to receive the plaque honoring the church and signifying the award for their efforts.

The Division of Health and Welfare Ministries: Bishop Blackburn introduced the Rev. Ernest R. Porter, chairman of the Division, to present the report. Porter introduced the Rev. Carson Wiggins to bring the policy statements found on pages 32-33 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. Section E, Items 1-8, were placed before the Conference for adoption. Mrs. R. B. Guthrie of Lumberton offered the following amendment to Item 1: "...that we publicize and promote the church's ministry to children through the Methodist Home for children with special emphasis during the Thanksgiving season..." It was accepted and the Policy Recommendations for the Division of Health and Welfare were adopted. Porter took the podium and called attention to the Interim Report of the Child Care Study Commission, indicating that this was not simply a report regarding the Home for Children, but was a study involving child care throughout the Conference. Porter requested that the Conference allow another year until June, 1979 - to complete the special report of the Child Care Study Commission. It was accepted. Porter presented Dr. T. Marvin Vick, Jr., Administrator of the Home for Children, and Vick described the process the Home had been going through towards achieving certification under the Methodist Certification Council. Vick presented Mrs. Earl Peterson, chairman of the Board of Trustees, to make the report. Mrs. Peterson called attention to the Annual Report that had been handed to each member of the Conference, urged them to read it and reminded each Conference member that this is a home that is owned by the entire Conference. In addition expressed appreciation for the gifts of the Conference through the Single Figure Asking and also for the many in-

dividual gifts. She also expressed a concern for the ministry and work of Vick as Administrator of the Home. The report did not require adoption and it was accepted gratefully by the Conference as information.

Porter next introduced Mr. W. Don Penley, the new Executive Director of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. Mr. Penley made the report for The Retirement Homes. Mr. Penley made an earnest and devout and positive presentation on behalf of The Retirement Home, the text of which is published in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

Porter introduced the Rev. Vassar W. Jones to present the cause of SEMAR (Southeastern Methodist Agency for the Retarded.) Jones took the podium and noted that for seven years he had attempted to represent this area, representing people who cannot speak for themselves but must have someone speak for them. Jones gave a full report, the text of which will be found in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

The Rev. Bob Wallace concluded the report of the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries by presenting the cause of the Golden Cross Fund administered by that Division. The text of Wallace's report will be found in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

The entire report on Health and Welfare Ministries was accepted with appreciation and adopted as required.

Call for Hymn: Bishop Blackburn requested that the Conference stand and sing Hymn 170, "O Master, Let Me Walk With Thee."

Request for Suspension of the Rules: The Rev. Jack Crum made the following motion: "I move that, because of the N.C. General Assembly's current considerations today and tomorrow, we suspend the Rules so as to receive favorably the resolution from City Road's Administrative Board and make it a resolution of this Conference by changing a few words in the closing paragraph." The Rules were suspended.

Crum moved that the last paragraph of the resolution be changed to read as follows: "Therefore, we of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church call upon the N.C. Legislature to defeat any bill permitting the sale of liquor-by-the-drink in any community of North Carolina." This was accepted.

The Resolution from the Administrative Board of City Road United Methodist Church, Elizabeth City, Charles Koch, Chairman, and Jack Crum, Pastor, as amended by the Conference is as follows:

"Whereas, it appears that a bill may be seriously considered by the North Carolina General Assembly which would liberalize the sale of whiskey in North Carolina and add by-the-drink sales to brown-bagging and the ABC system of distribution and thereby greatly increase the number of outlets for whiskey in our state; and

Whereas, the voters in a state-wide referendum in 1973 defeated a proposal by a two and one-half to one margin which would have changed the method of distribution to allow private bartenders and waitresses to promote the use of whiskey; and

Whereas, any local option bill would inevitably make it profitable for local establishments to promote the sale of whiskey; and

Whereas, authorities on the use of drugs list alcohol as the greatest problem drug in American society; and

Whereas, The United Methodist Church has a long tradition of opposition to the use of this deadly drug;

Therefore, we of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church call upon the North Carolina Legislature to defeat any bill permitting the sale of liquor-by-the-drink in any community of North Carolina."

The Rev. George C. Smith offered the following recommendation: "...that the vote of the Annual Conference on the liquor-by-the-drink resolution be sent to the Governor and the General Assembly and also be released for publication as of this date." This was accepted by Crum as a part of the entire document. The resolution, as presented and as amended, opposing bills concerning liquor-by-the-drink before the State Legislature at the present time, was adopted by the entire Conference without dissent and with applause.

Committee on Career Planning and Counseling: Bishop Blackburn presented the Rev. Thomas S. Yow to present the report which he so brought to the Conference with the help of the Vice Chairman, the Rev. Judi Smith who presented the Task Group report. The report was received by the Conference with appreciation and as a matter of information.

Commission on Religion and Race: Bishop Blackburn presented Dr. O. Kelly Ingram to give the report. Ingram presented Mr. Harvey Mitchell, District Lay Leader of the Burlington District, to augment his already positive report of items in the Conference which were heading toward racial inclusiveness in a meaningful way.

Mr. Alphonso Henry continued the presentation of the Commission on Religion and Race by stating his feelings concerning the progress made toward racial inclusiveness. Henry praised the progress but emphasized that we needed to keep up the tempo.

Point of Order: Mack McMillian brought a Point of Order concerning the statistics submitted by the Commission on Religion and Race regarding the number of Ethnic Minorities on the Committee on Youth Ministry. McMillian indicated there were five blacks on the Committee on Youth Ministry and five women and he requested that these corrections be made. The Rev. James McCallum accepted the corrections and urged, if any other mistakes had been made, that they be called to the attention of his office so they could be incorporated in the final report and sent out in the monthly mailing. This concluded the report of the Commission on Religion and Race and the text for all sub reports will be included in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

The Division of Church and Society: Bishop Blackburn asked Mrs. J. L. Watson, the chairman, to present the report of the Divisions. Mrs. Watson explained the painstaking work that had gone into the preparation of the Position Papers which appear on pages 36-42 in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. They represent the work of the entire Division, but they do not attempt to speak for this Conference or for The United Methodist Church, and she stressed that they are being presented for information only and do not require - nor is a vote requested - on these Position Papers. They are simply presented so that members of the Conference may read them, consider them and make up

their own minds concerning these issues. For complete text of Mrs. Watson's remarks to the Conference regarding the budget expenditures of the Division see SECTION V in THE JOURNAL.

Question: Mr. R. Gage Smith rose to question why the Division on Church and Society had not reconsidered his motion of last year as they had agreed to do according to the action of the Conference. Mr. Smith did not feel that the Division of Church and Society had fulfilled its work. Mrs. Watson said that, not having the actual Minutes in hand when they made their studies, they felt that they could not adequately respond and were victims of time and lack of information. She requested further time to study and act at a later date.

Point of Order: Joseph E. Dyer of Camp Ground United Methodist Church, Fayetteville, questioned THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. He objected to the ambiguity of the preamble and suggested that there should be no vote taken on this matter. The ruling was made that the report required no vote.

Motion: Motion was made by Olin K. Beaty "that the Position Paper on the Wilmington Ten be rejected. (No. 1, page 36.)" The motion was seconded and Beaty spoke against the paper.

Point of Order: The Rev. Stan Smith raised a Point of Order as to whether we could reject a paper that was not before us for a vote.

Rev. Jack Crum spoke against the Beaty motion. Robert Morgan rose for a point of clarification to ask if they would become a part of the permanent record of the North Carolina Annual Conference. The Bishop answered that the report of the Board of Church and Society would be entered into the record, but that The Church would not be held accountable, although the Division would.

Mr. Clarence Skillman rose to make a motion and was informed by the Bishop that he could speak later but that there was a motion on the floor.

The Rev. Rufus Stark spoke against the Beaty motion to reject the Position Paper on the Wilmington Ten. Instead he wished to thank the Division for doing what the Conference asked them to do last year, namely, to write Position Papers that could be studied and thought about, and that were published well in advance of Conference, instead of bringing them forward as last-minute motions.

Mr. Dyer said he was not altogether against the issue but he felt that it was an issue that should not be upon the floor of the Conference.

The Rev. Richard T. Commander moved a substitute motion "that Position Papers No. 1 and No. 4 be deleted from the Position Papers - No. 1, The Wilmington Ten Case; No. 4, Issue of Tobacco." The substitute motion was seconded. Commander spoke to the substitute.

Mr. T. E. Medlin offered a substitute to the substitute motion, that we "accept the report of the Division of Church and Society as we would any other committee report and make clear that the view expressed does not reflect the views of the Conference as a whole."

The Question was called on all that was before the Conference, was seconded and passed.

Bishop Blackburn called upon Dr. Robert Cushman for a parliamentary opinion. Dr. Cushman felt that there was a constitutional question in-

volved here which could, upon deliberation, be submitted to the Judicial Council of The United Methodist Church. The Bishop then ruled that the Medlin substitute was properly before the Conference. The Medlin substitute to the substitute to the Beaty motion prevailed. The remainder of the report of the Division of Church and Society was held over until the next session.

Announcements: Conference Secretary Coile made announcements.

Benediction: The Conference was adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Blackburn. The postlude was "Tocata in D Minor" by Johan Eberlin.

SECOND DAY, EVENING SESSION

June 5, 1978

The prelude, "Prelude in B Minor" by Cesar Franck and "Choral" by Joseph Jongen, was played by the organist of the evening, Mr. William E. Hilderbrandt, Organist/Choirmaster, First United Methodist Church, Henderson. The Call to Worship, "Surely the Lord is in This Place" by Paul Langston, was sung by the Chancel Choir of Edenton Street United Methodist Church under the direction of William J. Weisser, with organist, David Witt, playing. The Processional Hymn, No. 153, "God of Love and God of Power" by Gerald Kennedy, was sung and Bishop Blackburn called the evening session to order with an invocation. The anthem, "Notes from Paul" by Eugene Butler, was sung by the Chancel Choir.

Dr. Cecil Myers, Conference Preacher, delivered the sermon.

Following the sermon, the anthem, "The Heavens Are Telling" by Haydn, was sung by the Edenton Street Church Chancel Choir.

The service of the Ordination of Deacons was conducted by Bishop Robert M. Blackburn following which was performed the Consecration of Diaconal Ministers by Bishop Blackburn.

The service concluded with the Recessional Hymn No. 478, "Lead On, O King Eternal" by Ernest W. Shurtleff and the benediction which was given by Bishop Blackburn. The response, "The Lord Bless You and Keep You" by P. Lutkin, was sung by the choir and the postlude, "Trumpet Voluntary" by John Stanley, was played adjourning the evening session of the second day of Annual Conference 1978.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, June 7, 1978

Communion Service: The Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated in Hensdale Chapel on the campus of Methodist College at 8:00 a.m. under the direction of the Division of Worship.

Conference Called to Order: Organist for the morning session, Mr. David Hines, Director of Music, Grace United Methodist Church, Wilmington, played the prelude, "Prelude in D Minor" Op. 109 by Camille Saint-Saens. Bishop Robert M. Blackburn called the session to order by calling for the singing of Hymn No. 91, "When Morning Gilds the

Skies." The morning prayer was given by the Rev. Mrs. Ruth Harper, pastor of St. Johns-Gibson Charge.

Report of the Committee on Minutes: The Rev. Robert L. Bame reported for Committee on Minutes, stating that all the minutes for the second day of Annual Conference had been read and approved. The report was adopted by the Conference.

Division of Interreligious and Ecumenical Concerns: The Bishop introduced the Rev. Ralph L. Fleming to present the report. (For text see THE JOURNAL, SECTION V.) After introductory remarks Fleming presented Dr. Samuel Wiley who was first greeted by Bishop Blackburn and then addressed the Conference on behalf of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

The Division of Higher Education: Bishop Blackburn expressed his appreciation for the work of the Division and presented Dr. Paul Carruth who presided over the presentation for the Division. Carruth asked the college presidents present to come to the stage. Text of the report may be found in THE JOURNAL, SECTION V. Carruth called on the Rev. Sam McMillan to present the 1978-79 Blackburn Scholar. The recipient is Miss Jeneal Whorton of the Garber United Methodist Church, New Bern. Miss Whorton will receive the \$1,000 Scholarship which will enable her to continue her education at Methodist College. McMillan presented Miss Whorton to the Conference and she was received with a standing round of applause as Bishop Blackburn rose to greet her and shake her hand. Miss Whorton expressed her appreciation in a brief and moving address to the Conference.

Carruth returned to the podium and presented Dr. Joseph Bethea to present the causes of the Regional Commission on Higher Education and Campus Ministry. (For text see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.)

Carruth requested that we turn to pages 57-59 in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. Corrections were made to the list. The adoption of the report was held until the Rev. Rufus Stark could present the cause of the Black College Fund, which he did. Stark spoke eloquently and with statistical accuracy concerning the cause and the participation of The Church within it as both mandated mission and a valid and compelling human concern. (For text see THE JOURNAL, SECTION V.)

Bishop Blackburn made a response to the Stark report and stated his feeling that it was necessary that these remarks be printed and put before the Conference in permanent form. He endorsed the report and assured the Conference that he felt this was of utmost significance and a matter for priority concern.

Carruth made further corrections to the report of the Division of Higher Education as published in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. Carruth recommended that the report of the College Monitoring Committee be postponed until the Annual Conference of 1980. Carruth also spoke on behalf of the Ministerial Education Fund and encouraged the reception of the Methodist Student Loan and Scholarship Fund offering which would be taken in the next few weeks.

The report of the Division of Higher Education as contained in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978 and as

amended was adopted by the full Conference without dissenting vote.

The conclusion of the report of the Division of Higher Education included the high moments of introducing the college presidents who were present, including Dr. Allen Norris of Louisburg; Dr. Richard Pearce of Methodist; and Dr. S. Bruce Petteway of North Carolina Wesleyan. All the presidents had positive reports and were received with applause and great enthusiasm by the Conference. Carruth announced that this completed the report of the Division.

Committee on Continuing Education: Bishop Blackburn presented the Rev. W. Allen Wentz to give the report. (For text see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.)

Division of the Ordained Ministry (continuation): The Rev. Herman S. Winberry expressed appreciation for the work of Allen Wentz and the Committee on Continuing Education and presented a resolution of appreciation for his work as he departed from office. Winberry made two nominations to the Board of Managers for the Pastors' School: Rev. Allen Wentz and Rev. Judi Smith. They were elected.

Recognition: The Bishop asked Mrs. Mildred Fry to stand and be recognized as the new president of Church Women United in North Carolina. Mrs. Fry was accorded a round of applause by the Conference.

Call for Hymn: Bishop requested that Hymn No. 222, "My Hope Is Built," be sung.

Report of the Board of Managers, Pastors School: Rev. James H. Bailey brought greetings from the Board of Managers and expressed gratitude to Dr. McMurry Richey and the hard working staff of the Continuing Education represented by that ongoing program. Bailey's report was received for information and the text may be found in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

Ministerial Education Fund: Rev. Wilbur I. Jackson gave extended remarks apart from those that had been made during the program of the Division of Higher Education. The report on the use of the Ministerial Education Fund was distributed to the Conference assembled. The text of the report may be found in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

Report from the Duke Endowment: The Rev. Albert F. Fisher gave the report for the Duke Endowment program and explained the tripartite nature of the grants given throughout the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. He outlined the statistical amounts so granted and described the nature of the work of the Duke Endowment office. (For text of the message, see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.) Fisher presented Dr. Maurice Ritchie, who is assuming the work of the Field Education Program which had been done by Rev. Cliff Shoaf. Fisher commended Shoaf for the fine job that he had done and spoke words of welcome for Dr. Ritchie as he assumed that same post. Bishop Blackburn brought special words of appreciation for the Duke Endowment which has meant and continues to mean so much to our Conference over the years.

Report of the Ormond Research Center: Dr. Robert Wilson brought the report of the Ormond Research Center, telling of the services that it provided, particularly to the rural churches. His report is published in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

Conclusion of the Report of the Division of Church and Society: Mrs. J.O. Watson brought the conclusion of the report which consisted of adopting the Policy Recommendation on page 32 in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978, Item B. The Item was presented to the Conference assembled, moved, seconded and adopted. This completes the report of the Division of Church and Society.

Continuation of the Report of the Conference Council on Ministries: Dr. Charles Mercer called attention to the need to adopt Item C on page 32 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978, the specific 1979 Policy Recommendation from the Conference Council on Ministries. The Item was moved, seconded and adopted by Conference.

Report of the Credit Union: Rev. Maness Mitchell brought the Annual Report of the Methodist Ministers Credit Union and distributed copies of the report throughout the Conference. The text appears in THE JOURNAL in SECTION V.

Point of Personal Privilege: Charles Mercer wanted to also recognize Mr. Bobby Lowry as a member of the General Board of Church and Society. Bishop Blackburn asked all those who were members of General Church agencies to stand. They did so and the Conference responded.

Bishop Blackburn also recognized the ministers' wives who were present awaiting the Annual Luncheon for the Association of Ministers' Wives. He then recognized all the past presidents of United Methodist Women as well as the current presidents and had them stand. They were greeted with a round of applause. Bishop Blackburn recognized the Rev. Carleton Wilson who was a long-time Secretary of the North Carolina Annual Conference. Wilson responded to the Bishop's gracious introduction.

The Committee on Pastoral Care: Mrs. Wallace Kirby presented the report of the Committee on Pastoral Care and encouraged the use of the services offered. Her report was received with great appreciation and may be read in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

Announcements: Conference Secretary Coile made announcements.

Reports of the Task Force on Hunger and of the Committee on Church Architecture were filed for inclusion in the Conference JOURNAL under SECTION V.

Call for Hymn: Bishop Blackburn called on the Conference to sing Hymn No. 235, "I Need Thee Every Hour." The Conference responded by singing with great spiritual dignity and obvious concern.

Call for Order of the Day: Bishop Blackburn commented on the quality of the singing of the Conference and asked that, as we got ready for our hour of worship, that we sing Hymn No. 221, "Standing On The Promises." The Bishop observed the obvious pleasure of the Conference in singing and called for the singing of Hymn No. 226, "Savior, More Than Life To Me."

The Conference Sermon: Bishop Blackburn again presented Dr. Cecil Myers for the third in the series of Conference Sermons. He expressed warm appreciation for his total ministry and for what he had done for the Conference meeting here in Fayetteville in June of 1978. Dr. Myers spoke on the topic, "Gentlemen, Start Your Engines!"

Following the sermon which was well received as were the others in this much appreciated series by Dr. Myers, the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Blackburn and the postlude, "Voluntary" by Thomas Roseingrave, was played by the organist of the morning.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, June 7, 1978

Conference Brotherhood: The Rev. Kelly J. Wilson, Jr., convened the meeting of the North Carolina Conference Brotherhood. Reports were given and discussed. (For complete text see SECTION V of the JOURNAL.) After nominations were made and approved by the Brotherhood, the Annual Meeting was adjourned.

Conference Convened: The organist for the afternoon, Mr. Greg P. Jones, Director of Music and Education, Epworth United Methodist Church, Durham, played the prelude, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" by Gordon Young.

Bishop Blackburn called the Conference to order and called for the singing of Hymn No. 223, "When We Walk With The Lord." The Bishop called on the Rev. Theodore Carter of Wilson Temple United Methodist Church, Raleigh, to lead us in the afternoon prayer.

Special Recognition: Bishop Blackburn recognized Dr. Isaac Miller, president of Bennett College in Greensboro, for remarks to the Conference.

Commission on the Status and Role of Women: Bishop Blackburn introduced the Rev. Nancy R. Best to present the report. (For complete text see THE JOURNAL, SECTION V.)

Division of Stewardship: Bishop Blackburn introduced the Rev. Bruce D. Taylor to present the report. (For text of the report, see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.) Taylor introduced Dr. Jerald Pierce, Director of Deferred Giving for the Conference, who gave a report as to the burgeoning activities of that office which were having a positive effect throughout the Conference. Dr. Pierce invited each charge, church and individual to make use of the Estate-Planning services which are available through the office of Deferred Giving.

Commission on Archives and History: The Rev. Lawrence E. Lugar brought the report for the Commission. The report was adopted and filed. (For text see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.)

Special Recognition: Bishop Blackburn recognized and gave a special salutation to Mrs. L.D. Gill of Wake Forest who has attended 53 consecutive sessions of Annual Conference. He also recognized Mr. Will Chadwick of New Bern who has attended 65 sessions of Annual Conference.

Conference Board of Trustees: Dr. S. Bruce Petteway presented the report. (For text see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.) He moved that the resolution regarding the Rocky River Methodist Church Property, printed on page 78 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978, be approved by the Conference. It was moved, seconded and approved. This concluded the report of the Board of Trustees and it was accepted with appreciation.

Announcements: The Rev. James H. Coile, Conference Secretary, made announcements regarding the Memorial Service which was soon to take place.

Recess: A five minute recess was called by Bishop Blackburn prior to the Memorial Service so that the families of those being honored in memory could be properly seated.

The Memorial Service: Bishop Robert M. Blackburn called the conference to order and presided over the Memorial Service for the 1978 annual Conference. The prelude was "Fantasy in A Minor" by J.S. Bach. The congregation assembled was called upon to sing Hymn No. 48, "How Firm a Foundation." Following the hymn Secretary Coile read the Roll Call of Our Honored Dead and answered Question 40, "What ministers have died during the past Conference year?" (The list is included in the CONDENSED MINUTES.) In answer the question, "What ministers' wives and husbands have died during the past year?" Coile read those names. (See SECTION IV.) The prayer was offered by the Rev. Norwood L. Jones. The anthem, "A Prayer by St. Francis of Assisi" by Olive Dungan, was sung as a solo by Mrs. Marilyn Johnson of New Bern. The Scripture, John 4:31-38, was read. The Memorial Address "A Greater Cause," was brought by Rev. Harold F. Leatherman. The service was concluded with the singing of Hymn No. 187, "Take My Life and Let It Be," and the offering of the benediction by Bishop Blackburn.

Announcement: Bishop Blackburn read an announcement of the Wire Service that the issue of Liquor-by-the-Drink before the North Carolina Legislature was voted down on the second reading this day. The information was greeted by applause from the Conference.

Council on Finance and Administration: Mr. Ray Euliss brought the report for the Council on Finance and Administration. (For text see SECTION V.) Mr. Euliss introduced Mr. Charles K. McAdams to introduce a new member of the Conference Treasurer's office staff. Mr. Herb Stout is the new Assistant Treasurer-Business Administrator. Mr. Euliss assumed the podium and requested the delegates to observe in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978 the information included on pages 63-67. Under Section I, Items 1-4 were placed before the Conference. They were moved and seconded. Mr. Charles A. LeGrand of Front Street Church, Burlington, questioned the last two sentences in Item 2, Section I, concerning the supplementary appropriations. He questioned whether some of these items could not be held over for approval by the Conference. Mr. Euliss responded that some items were absolutely undeterminable at the time the budget is proposed and they would indeed constitute emergency appropriations. Some of the supplemental appropriations have grown over the past few years, but he explained and accounted for the rationale of this. Mr. LeGrand again questioned the budgetary preparations. He rejoined that he was not going to make a motion but hoped the Council would be more cautious in making supplemental appropriations. The items under Section I, pages 63 and 64, were adopted.

Section V on page 66 was moved by Mr. Euliss. It was seconded and adopted by the Conference. Mr. Euliss recommended the adoption of Sec-

tion IV on page 66. It was moved, seconded and adopted. Mr. Euliss presented the material under Section III on page 65. Rev. Norwood Jones offered two amendments.

AMMENDMENTS FOR THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

AMENDMENT A.

I.

Paragraph III of the report of The Council on Finance and Administration page 65 in the 1978 Book of Recommendations shall be amended as follows:

On line 2, following the years 1971, 1974, 1975, 1977, the words, shall be continued, with the addition that be deleted. Inserted after the 1977 this statement: "shall be determined in the following manner."

Beginning with the conference budget for 1980, the Fair Share Apportionments for each charge in the North Carolina Conference will be based on the average of the total money raised for the years 1976, 1977, and 1978, less the exclusions stated elsewhere in this report; and that each year thereafter the Fair Share Apportionments or each charge will be based on the average of the total money raised by that charge for the three previous years less the approved exemptions.

II.

Then continue Report III by beginning a new sentence, following the above amended paragraph, that will read, "All monies contributed for Conference Advance Specials shall be excluded from total money raised in arriving at the Fair Share Apportionments."

With these two amendments the recommendation shall read:

The Fair Share Apportionment formula approved by the Annual Conference in 1967 as amended in 1971, 1974, 1975, 1977 shall be determined in the following manner. Beginning with the conference budget for 1980, the Fair Share Apportionment for each charge in the North Carolina Conference will be based on the exclusions stated elsewhere in this report; and that for each year thereafter the Fair Share Apportionment for each charge will be based on the average of the total money raised by that charge for the thre previous years, less the approved exemptions. All monies contributed for Conference Advance Specials shall be excluded from total money raised in arriving at the Fair Share Apportionment.....etc.

The remaining part of paragraph III would continue as shown in the report.

AMENDMENT B.

At the end of paragraph III, page 65, add this sentence:

The amount of the Fair Share Apportionment for each charge shall not exceed 31.5% of the average total money raised for the three years, less the exclusions, unless the per-cent of the increase is specifically approved by the vote of the Annual Conference at the time the Conference is adopted."

Norwood L. Jones

The Jones Amendment A was seconded and before the Conference. Jones spoke to his amendment, indicating that this would make for a fairer "Fair Share Apportionment" without imposing a particular penalty on a church or charge that would receive an unusual increase in any one given year. Mr. Euliss spoke for the Council and concurred. The Rev. Clarence Warren asked a question for clarification concerning the words "raised," "paid out" or "disbursed." All agreed upon the word "disbursed." The amendment was adopted. Jones then presented Amendment B concerning the maximum amount that a charge should be apportioned as a "Fair Share Apportionment." (See Section V.)

The Rev. G. Robert McKenzie questioned the reason for the 31.5% figure as opposed to the 28.3% figure that is now the average amount. Euliss responded by stating this was simply a matter of setting tentative maximum on apportionments or askings, not upon acceptances. Mr. LeGrand from Burlington questioned the purpose of the amendment. He did not see any purpose in it. Jones responded. Mr. LeGrand rejoined with opposition to the amendment as he felt it opened the door to a higher proportional share of a local church's budget going to the fair share apportionment. Rev. Clyde Tucker, First Church, Elizabeth City, spoke for the Jones amendment. A question of clarification by a delegate from Sanford was asked. He wanted to know if this amendment was going to lead to a greater amount of money on the part of churches that have paid their apportionments regularly. Euliss responded that this was not necessarily so. Rev. Paul Carruth spoke against the Jones Amendment. A point of clarification was asked by Rev. Langill Watson as to what Mr. Carruth was talking about. The point was made that the first of the Jones Amendments had already been passed and we were simply on the second amendment which was more of a request guideline than anything else. It came to the attention of the Bishop that many delegates did not have copies of the amendments. The ushers were instructed to distribute them to all present members of the Conference. Carruth asked if we failed to pass Amendment B, would Amendment A be of no effect. The Bishop responded that Amendment A was adopted in its entirety and Amendment B would have nothing to do with that. Euliss pointed out that Amendment B was not a restriction on the Council on Finance and Administration but a recommendation. Rev. David Dunlap asked for a point of clarification. Henry Grant of Union Grove Church moved that Amendment B be tabled. The vote was taken and the motion to table lost.

The Rev. Horace Quigley asked a question which was answered by Jones regarding the percentage item. Jones explained that this was simply a top recommendation rather than a suggestion that there should be an increase. Henry Goodwin of Trinity Church, Southport, raised a question. Euliss explained that this amendment does not set a limit, but is simply suggestive in nature and there is no limit at the present time. Amendment B was adopted.

Henry Grant requested reconsideration of Amendment A and it was seconded. The motion to reconsider was lost.

The Bishop stated that we were back on the entire Section III on pages 65 and 66 as amended. Rev. Milton E. Sluder-Jordon made the following motion: "I move that the following exclusions be added to the list found in Section III, page 65; World Wide Communion, Human Relations Day and Methodist Student Day." It was seconded and passed.

The question was raised as to the printing of the formula for Fair Share Apportionments and whether or not it could be printed in each JOURNAL first published at the beginning of a new quadrennium. Euliss accepted this and stated that he would offer it for publication in this year's JOURNAL.

Mrs. Irene Gattis made a motion that Item 7 under Section III be changed to read: "Reimbursement for travel to authorized meetings of all Conference agencies shall be at the rate of 12 cents per mile." It was seconded. Euliss stated that they would accept the 12 cents per mile. Rev. Malloy Owen requested that the Fair Share formula be given in the next mailing by the Conference Treasurer's office. It was so ordered by Mr. Euliss.

Point of Personal Privilege: A point of personal privilege was suggested by Secretary Coile and asked for by the Council on Finance and Administration that the Sluder-Jordan amendment which passed be deferred in its enactment for one year so as to avoid the recomputation of all apportionments for the current round of Charge Conferences. This was voted on and adopted.

Section III as amended was adopted.

Mr. Euliss stated that this concluded the work of the Council with the exception of the adoption of the Budget which would be delayed until tomorrow morning by previous Conference action. Bishop Blackburn called upon Ray Euliss to present the report with a Recommendation for the Committee to Study the Feasibility of a Capital Funds Campaign. Euliss offered three Committee-approved amendments to the report on page 47 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978.

1. Our Conference goal will be broken down into local church goals.
2. Bishop Robert M. Blackburn will be authorized to appoint a steering committee.
3. Monies raised during the Capital Funds Drive shall be excluded from the total monies raised in arriving at the Fair Share Apportionments.

Euliss stated that he believed that this was one of the most important items to come before this Conference in a number of years and moved its adoption. Speaking to the need of the Conference.

Dr. Fred Brooks proposed an amendment: "to delete from the sentence 'The following distribution is proposed,,,' all causes other than Pensions, leaving the total goal at \$3,000,000." It was seconded and Brooks spoke to it. A question was asked by Rev. E.L. Earnhardt concerning whether monies paid into the Pension Program, if these should be paid to the retirees, would this not almost double the retirement benefits. Mr. Dave Speir said this would be correct. Mr. Earnhardt wondered if a pay-as-you-go system wouldn't be better since this is something that Social Security is doing now.

Point of Order: Rev. Langill Watson, contested that Ed Earnhardt is debating a point that was adopted by Special Session of the Annual Conference some years ago and that this is not now debatable.

Rev. James Auman spoke against the Brooks Amendment. Rev. A. D. Byrd spoke for the Amendment.

Point of Personal Privilege: Mrs. Dilys Hale asked to speak on behalf of widows with children. Since she was not a member of the Conference, the Bishop asked for permission from the Conference for her to speak. It was granted and she spoke of the inadequacy of pension funds to provide for the needs of the widows and widowed children. She felt we needed to have more faith in the members of the United Methodist Churches and their ability to see the need and have the vision to fulfill the needs of the Pension Program. Ray Euliss again stressed his support of the Pension Program, but emphasized that the other institutions had needs as well. Langill Watson requested the privilege of the floor to move an amendment to the amendment: "that a campaign for \$3,000,000 be carried out including \$500,000 for Methodist College." It was seconded. Watson indicated that the needs of Methodist College were entirely different from those of any of the other institutions, particularly since Wesleyan College had already had a special funds campaign to help it out of an emergency situation. Now the indebtedness on Methodist College is just as great and it would be almost in a situation of crisis were it not for the year by year stewardship practiced by that institution. Watson felt this is a case of "fair is fair." Rev. Reginald Ponder rose to speak against the amendment to the amendment. He stated that he felt that this sort of fragmentation of the endeavor would create dissension and impede our efforts in the Campaign.

The Watson amendment to the amendment failed and the amendment by Brooks, stating that the entire \$3,000,000 go to Pensions carried by an overwhelming vote of the Conference.

This ended the presentation of the Capital Funds Committee.

Special Recognition: Bishop Blackburn recognized President Terry Sanford of Duke University to speak to the Conference. President Sanford spoke and told of Duke's particular feeling of appreciation for Methodism in North Carolina. He spoke of the fact that the Chapel was packed every Sunday morning while school was in session and he felt that this was a testimony to the continuing ties between Church and Campus. Bishop Blackburn expressed appreciation for the words of President Sanford and then recognized Dr. Don Nichols of the Candler School of Theology at Emory University, Georgia. Nichols brought greetings from Candler.

Announcements: Secretary Coile made announcements.

Benediction: The Conference was adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Blackburn. The postlude, "Finale Jubilante" by H. Willan, was played.

THIRD DAY, EVENING SESSION

Wednesday, June 7, 1978

The organist of the evening Mr. Washington Hargrove of Wilson Temple United Methodist Church, Raleigh and the pianist, Rev. James H. McCallum of Raleigh, played a medley of familiar preludes which introduced the Conference to an evening of sharing the Black Worship Experience.

Following the Call to Worship under the leadership of Dr. Joseph Bethea, who presided over the service, the congregation joined in singing Hymn No. 297, "The Church's One Foundation." Dr. Bethea gave the invocation and the congregation responded with the Act of Praise, No. 567, "Trust In The Lord."

A choir composed of members from choirs of traditionally Black Churches from throughout the Conference sang as the Anthem, "Go, Tell It On The Mountain." The Rev. Albert Shuler read the lesson from the Holy Scriptures, Psalms 137. The congregation joined in affirming our universal faith through a unison repetition of The Apostles Creed. Rev. Roosevelt Wilkerson led the evening prayer with the response by the combined choirs. The first offering was received as the choirs sang, "Close To Thee." The congregation sang the Doxology as the offering was presented and then joined in singing Hymn No. 294, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord."

The congregation listened with an expectation that was soon fulfilled as the Rev. Samuel Townsend, minister of Galilee United Methodist Church, Laurinburg, preached, taking as his subject "Mine Eyes Have Seen The Glory," raising to crescendo as the sermon concluded and the congregation stood and joined in singing the closing stanza.

A final offering was received to be used in the work of the Task Force on the Ethnic Minority Local Church. Dr. Bethea led in the Sending Forth which was followed by a silent prayer and the benediction. The choirs sang "The Three-fold Amen."

To conclude the service the congregation sang, "God Be With You Till We Meet Again." Dr. Bethea recognized each of the choirs and the congregation expressed appreciation with applause.

FOURTH DAY, MORNING SESSION

Thursday, June 8, 1978

The organist of the morning, Mr. William E. Hilderbrandt, Organist/Choirmaster, First United Methodist Church, Henderson, played the prelude, "Aria" by Flor Peeters.

Love Feast: The Conference was called to observe the Annual Love Feast at 8:30 a.m. with Bishop Blackburn presiding. He called for the singing of Hymn 131, "O, For A Thousand Tongues To Sing." Bishop Blackburn introduced Rev. S. J. Starnes to begin our testimony of the mor-

ning and to lead in prayer. Brother Starnes announced that this was his 58th Annual Conference. Hymn No. 234, "O, Love That Will Not Let Me Go," was sung. The elements of the Love Feast were distributed by the ushers serving from the Goldsboro District. During the passing of the elements the hymn, "Amazing Grace" was sung. After the repetition of Scriptures and the continuation of the passing of the bread and the water, further testimonies were given and spontaneous singing followed until the conclusion of the service.

Conference Convened: Bishop Blackburn called the Conference to order for the closing business session of the 1978 Annual Conference with the singing of Hymn 159, "I Am Thine, O Lord." The Bishop offered the morning prayer.

Report of the Committee on Minutes: The Rev. Robert L. Bame reported that the Minutes for the Wednesday morning, afternoon and evening sessions had been read and passed by the Committee. He moved their approval. They were approved. He moved, further, that the remainder of the Minutes of the Conference be approved on recommendation of the Committee on Minutes. It was so ordered by the Conference.

Point of Personal Privilege: Bishop Blackburn expressed his appreciation to James Coile, the Conference Secretary, and to the entire secretarial staff for their hard work and then called upon Paul Edwards to make remarks. Reverend Edwards expressed his appreciation to the ministers and lay persons of the Goldsboro District -- particularly, the ushers who have worked long, hard and diligently to help make the Conference a very satisfying experience for all.

Announcements: Bishop Blackburn announced that, since the passage of the Capital Funds Campaign for Pensions had been passed yesterday, the Department of Finance and Field Services of the Board of Global Ministries, in the person of Dr. Arnold Wilson, would be heading up the preparations for this campaign which would begin intensively next January. Bishop Blackburn presented Dr. Wilson to the Conference and Dr. Wilson addressed the Conference concerning some potential plans for the coming program. Bishop Blackburn expressed appreciation to Dr. Wilson and then announced a Steering Committee consisting of the District Superintendents, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of United Methodist Women, Chairperson of the Council on Finance and Administration, Director of the Conference Council on Ministries, Conference Stewardship Director, Conference Director of Youth and the Conference Public Relations Director. These were to meet today and other representatives would be elected from the clergy and laity as time went on.

The Commission on Equitable Salaries: Grier Garrick brought the report from the Commission. Garrick directed the attention of the Conference to the Report of the Commission on Equitable Salaries on pages 60-62 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. He made several corrections in the wording, including, under Section II, line 2 changing the word "pastoral" to "secular." Garrick explained the report and moved its adoption.

James C. Lee of Laurinburg moved the following amendment: "that the

total minimum salary for full-time conference and associate conference members, full-time local pastors and students, beginning with 1979, shall be increased by no less than the percentage increase in salary granted to the District Superintendents for the respective years." It was seconded. Rev. Owen Fitzgerald stated that the application of this motion would require additional supplemental appropriations. Rev. Kermit Braswell offered a substitute to the motion: "that the base salary of student pastors be increased from \$5,600 to \$5,800, and that the Commission on Equitable Salaries study the feasibility of making the travel an item to be included with salary and utilities rather than making it optional." It was seconded and Braswell spoke to his substitute motion. Rev. Bob O'Keefe, Glenwood Church, Rockingham, spoke against the Braswell amendment. Rev. David Dunlap rose to ask a question. Bob Price from Wesleyan College spoke for the Braswell amendment. A question was raised concerning the rationale for the adoption of a lesser salary scale for students. Mr. Garrick responded. The Rev. Cliff Shoaf spoke against the Braswell amendment. Rev. Sam McMillan spoke in favor of the Braswell substitute.

Point of Order: Rev. Al Fisher called for a Point of Order. Fisher pointed out that additional funds were available through the Duke Endowment and through MEF which were very real funds and actually increased the student salary above that which is shown under the recommendations of the Commission.

Point of Order: Rev. Ed Earnhardt raised a Point of Order as to the legality of the Braswell substitute's being a true substitute. The Bishop ruled that it was. Rev. Bill Wells made the same objection and the Bishop responded in the same manner.

Rev. Quentin Scholtz spoke for the substitute. James C. Lee offered a substitute to the substitute which would amount to a study of the feasibility of the increase in minimum salaries on a percentage basis with the increase of the District Superintendents' salaries with this amount to be effective in 1980. This would be harmonized with the Braswell substitute which would give an immediate raise to the students. The Bishop requested that the parties get together to try and straighten out their motion and substitute and substitute to the substitute. Secretary James Coile attempted to read a document that attempted to harmonize the three. The substitute motion, as agreed upon, was adopted after the question was called. An amendment to add the word "spouse" to the listing of dependents was made by F. P. Brooks of Orange United Methodist Church. It was adopted.

A question was asked by Mr. Dunlap concerning Section II, F. Answer was given by Dr. Charles Mercer. Mercer stated that this had never been applied. Dunlap rejoined that he felt it needed further study. The entire report of the Commission Equitable Salaries, as amended, was moved, seconded and adopted. (For complete report, as amended, see Section V.)

Committee on Pastors' Moving Expense: The Rev. F. Owen Fitzgerald gave the report which appears on pages 68-69 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. Fitzgerald observed that, since the text had been before the delegates for some time, he would not read the entire report, but simply move it for adoption. It was seconded. The Rev. Russell Stott wished to amend Item B under Section IV to read: "The Annual Conference shall pay the first \$200 and three fourths

of all claim above \$200 with submission and approval of itemized requisition forms accompanied by receipts for labor, materials and miscellaneous claims, provided no payment will exceed a total of \$600." It was seconded and Stott spoke to his amendment. Delegate Mrs. Becky Hackler of Morehead City spoke against the amendment. The Stott amendment was called and defeated.

The Rev. Wade Goldston questioned student's receiving their first appointment not receiving moving expense to their first appointment. He offered the following: "delete A under III, page 68; B becomes A."

Rev. F. Owen Fitzgerald moved that I. D should read: "Ministers moving into the North Carolina Annual Conference to assume appointment to serve in category 1 A in which case claim can be from point of entry into bounds of the North Carolina Conference." Further, "delete all of III." After discussion and consensus opinion, changes were made in the report and the report was adopted. (See Section V.)

Insurance Committee: The Rev. Ted Wilson brought the report, stating that it was absolutely necessary to have 20 more people to sign up for the supplemental insurance for that to become active and effective. He requested that people sign up.

Parish Travel Committee: Mr. Bill Cable stated he had no formal report. Cable suggested that the new IRS formula be adopted. This report will have to be picked up and published elsewhere.

Question: Rev. Robert Smith asked what happened to a student taking his first appointment in regard to Blue Cross-Blue Shield Insurance coverage -- when he was not covered until the first of July. Charles McAdams responded by stating that it could be worked out on a case-by-case basis.

Motion: Rev. William C. Simpson, Jr., made the following motion: "I move that insofar as finances will be used in determining the goal for each local church in the Capital Funds Campaign, the base used by the Steering Committee and CF and A shall be representative of an average of the net money for the years 1975, 1976 and 1977." It was moved, seconded and adopted by the Conference.

Report of the Board of Pensions: The Rev. Kermit Wheeler brought the report for the Board as contained on pages 71-72 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. Various changes to the printed report were made. The full text will appear in SECTION V of THE JOURNAL as corrected.

The Rev. Paul Carruth brought the following motion: "Paragraph beginning on line 28, page 73 in the Board of Pensions Report in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978, Paragraph shall be amended to read: (added words are underlined) 'Therefore, be it resolved, that the amount of \$3000 per year be set as a fair and reasonable rental allowance for each retired minister or spouse of a deceased minister of this Annual Conference.' Beginning on line 7, the sentence in this paragraph will read: 'The housing allowance is specifically designated as compensation to the minister or the spouse of a deceased minister for the cost of renting or providing housing for himself or herself and his or her family and the costs related thereto, pursuant to the Code as

stated in Document 5045 (10-67). It was seconded. Wilson spoke against the motion. The Carruth amendment carried.

Wheeler moved the adoption of the entire report as amended. It was adopted by the Conference.

Recess: Bishop Blackburn called for a five-minute recess.

Conference Called to Order: Bishop Blackburn reconvened the Conference from the brief recess with the singing of Hymn No. 254, "Dear Master, In Whose Life I See."

Continuation of the Report of the Council on Finance and Administration: Mr. Ray C. Euliss moved the adoption of the tentative Budget for 1980 to be raised January 1, 1979-December 31, 1979, as contained under II, pages 64-65 in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978. The Budget as presented was moved, seconded and adopted. Euliss then made a speech of appreciation for his eight years of service on the Council on Finance and Administration and the people with whom he worked, particularly Charles K. McAdams. He expressed his confidence in the people of the Conference and expressed appreciation for their love and what they have done over the years. He stated that he left his post in love, with confidence in the future. Fitzgerald took the podium with Euliss and told something more of the work of Euliss and moved the adoption of a resolution of appreciation which was passed with a standing round of applause.

Motion: Rev. F. Belton Joyner moved reconsideration of the Capital Funds Campaign for the Conference. His motion was seconded and he spoke to it. The Joyner motion lost. The Capital Funds Campaign was not to be reconsidered and would continue as ordered by the Conference on Wednesday.

Point of Information: Charles K. McAdams reminded the delegates that the Duke Endowment adds approximately \$17 per service year to the Pension amount for retired ministers. It was noted that the Western North Carolina Conference also received this benefit.

Joint Committee on Disability: Rev. William Sherman presented the report which is found in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1978 on pages 55-56. Sherman added the name of Luther D. Wesley under Section 7 of the report, and under Section 8, he added the name of George W. Ports, Jr., receiving support from the Emergency Relief Fund. The report of the committee was moved, seconded and adopted by the Conference, as amended.

Division of Ministry: The Rev. Herman Winberry concluded the report of the Division of Ministry with various items which will appear in the CONDENSED MINUTES of THE JOURNAL.

Report of the Bishop's Proper Procedures Committee on Episcopal Elections: The report was brought by Mr. Grier Garrick who presented the paper which had been distributed on the first day of Conference to all delegates. Garrick went over the paper and moved its adoption. Rev. Tommy Faggart moved the following amendment to paragraph B. 1 on page 2 of the report to read: "one name rather than 3 names to be written." It was seconded. Garrick responded to the Faggart amendment on the grounds that he felt that it was not in the spirit of the Discipline. Faggart stated he believed it would still be a straw vote and asked the Bishop to rule. Bishop Blackburn ruled that the motion was properly before the Conference. Rev.

Vernon Tyson spoke against the Faggart amendment. Dr. O. Kelly Ingram moved an amendment to the Faggart amendment: "that we vote for three episcopal candidates on the straw ballot and that we seek as many episcopal candidates as there are vacancies in the College of Bishops." It was seconded and Ingram discussed his rationale before the Conference. Tyson rose again and spoke against the Ingram amendment.

Question: Rev. Willie Teague rose to state that he felt that the Faggart amendment was out of order.

Substitute: Rev. Rufus Stark rose to make a substitute to the Faggart amendment: "that the straw vote of three persons be by preferential ballot (the first name be given 3 points, the second 2 points, the third, 1 point.)" This was seconded and Stark spoke to his substitute. Rev. Jack Crum spoke against the Stark substitute. The Question was called on the Stark substitute and it was lost.

The Faggart amendment was placed before the Conference and lost.

The Question was called on the original document as presented. It was adopted by the Conference.

Report of The Methodist Foundation, Inc.: Bishop Blackburn called for the report of The Methodist Foundation, Inc., and stated that in the absence of a formal presentation, it would be filed for publication. (See SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.)

Amendment to Conference Rules: A motion to amend the "Rules of Order and Procedure" Section III: Election of Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences, which had been distributed to the Conference on June, 1978, was presented by Dr. Fred Brooks, Lay Member, Orange United Methodist Church. It was seconded and explained by Dr. Brooks. Secretary Coile moved the following amendment under section 2, "that the following be added '...or in a manner to be determined by the Council on Ministries.'" This was accepted by Brooks and by the Conference.

Dr. Richard Pearce moved the following amendment to Item 2: "I move that Item 2 of the proposed amendment be amended as follows: Any District Committee of Lay Life and Work may nominate not more than ten lay persons for election as lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conference. The District Committee of Lay Life and Work may forward sufficient mimeographed copies of a biographical sketch of each nominee not to exceed one typewritten page in length, to be distributed to each lay delegate as the delegate registers for Annual Conference at which lay delegates are elected to General and Jurisdictional Conference." The Rev. G. Robert McKenzie spoke in opposition to Dr. Pearce's amendment. J. Nelson Gibson spoke in support of the Pearce amendment. Grier Garrick spoke in favor of and Rev. Clyde Dunn spoke against the amendment.

Mrs. J.O. Watson rose to bring a substitute to the amendment: "that lay delegates will be nominated by local churches and submitted to a district committee composed of 50% District Executive Committee of United Methodist Women who will make nominations to the Conference." The Watson amendment was defeated and the Pearce Amendment was defeated.

Dr. A. Kimsey King moved to table the Brook's Amendment to the rules. The motion was lost. The Brook's Amendment was adopted by the required 2/3 vote.

Motion: The following motion was made by Ben Gravelly of North Raleigh United Methodist Church: "I move that a summary of Roberts Rules of Order pertaining to motions, amendments, substitute motions and tabling of motions be printed in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS publication. Additional Rules of Order may be included at the discretion of the chairman of the Conference." It was moved, seconded and adopted.

Prayer Request: Dr. Joseph Bethea asked that those who were deceased or critically ill during this time should be remembered in prayer by the Bishop. It was immediately adopted unanimously and the Bishop called for silent prayer and then led in prayer.

Committee on District Conference Records: The Rev. Frank Lloyd brought the report (See SECTION V of THE JOURNAL for text)

Committee on Conference Entertainment: Rev. Vernon C. Tyson brought the report. He moved "that the spouses of disabled ministers who must attend Conference with their husbands/wives have the privilege of meal tickets and other expenses of a delegate." It was seconded.

Resolution of Appreciation: Rev. Maness Mitchell came to present to Dr. Thomas A. Collins a Resolution of Appreciation and citation for his leadership from July, 1961 - January, 1978 in the Methodist Ministers Credit Union.

Committee on Resolutions and References: Dr. Thomas A. Collins presented the report, expressing appreciation for the Conference. (For complete text see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.) The Resolutions were adopted.

Announcement: The Rev. James H. Miller announced that moving day would be Thursday, June 16, 1978 - one week from today. He requested all those moving to be out of the parsonage by 12:00 noon on moving day and those moving in not to arrive before 1:00 p.m. Secretary Coile made further announcements as appropriate.

Motion: Secretary Coile moved that with all Disciplinary Questions distributed, and with the reading of the Appointments, all Disciplinary Questions be declared properly answered by the 1978 Annual Conference. The motion was approved by the Conference.

State of the Church Address: Bishop Blackburn delivered an abbreviated "State of the Church" address. For the full text see SECTION V of THE JOURNAL.

Motion: Motion was made by Rev. Paul Phillips that the full text of the Bishop's "State of the Church" address appear in the NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE. It was seconded and adopted with a round of applause.

Reading of the Appointments: Bishop Blackburn introduced Mrs. Vivian Mitchell, his secretary, who received a round of applause, and then directed that the printed copies of the appointments be distributed to the delegates. The Bishop concluded the Conference by calling Question 63: "Where are the preachers stationed for the ensuing year?" Bishop Blackburn read just the changes in appointments, not the names of those ministers who were returning to the same appointment.

Closing Hymn: "God Be With You Til We Meet Again" was sung.

Benediction: The benediction was given by Bishop Robert M. Blackburn, bringing to a close the 1978 Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.



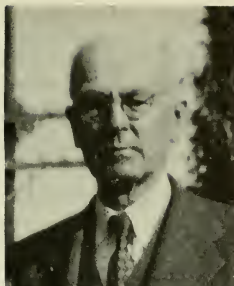

WILLIAM VOGEL McRAE
1878-1977

The Reverend William Vogel McRae, native of Anson County, retired Methodist minister and of late, resident of the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, NC, passed away in Durham County General Hospital on Thursday evening, June 16, 1977.

A descendant of MacRaes who came from Kintail, Scotland, and into the Carolinas in 1760, Mr. McRae had an intense love for his native Anson County, the home of his pioneer ancestor.

He was a son of Duncan McRae and Sara Johnson McRae.

His early education was in the schools of Anson County.

In 1906, he was graduated from Trinity College (now Duke University, Durham, NC).

His graduate work was at Vanderbilt University in Tennessee, and Boston University.

After graduate studies, he was enrolled as a member of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church.

His dedicated services in the several phases of church work include many influences: among them are the following: Pastor of many North Carolina Churches; District Superintendent; Chaplain in the service of his country in World War I; served on various boards and committees; served in advisory capacity in civic and church related interests of the Methodist Conference Center at Lake Junaluska, NC.

One of his outstanding accomplishments was the realization of the establishment of a Methodist Retirement Home in Durham.

It was through his promotion and his contributions that this home became a reality.

Reverend McRae was married to the former Miss Pearl Andrews of Wilmington while he was pastor of the First Methodist Church in that city.

Their children are: William V. McRae, Jr. of Anaheim, California, and Eleanor McRae Snyder of Martinez, California.

There are four grandchildren.

After retirement in 1947, the McRaes lived in their home in St. Petersburg, Florida in Winter, and at Lake Junaluska in summer.

During the past few years, they have resided in their apartment at the Methodist Home in Durham, NC.

Paramount in interests during past years has been the church in the

community of his youth, the Pleasant Hill Methodist Church in McFarlan, NC.

On Saturday afternoon, June 17, 1977, at 3 o'clock relatives and friends from many areas of the Carolinas met at this church for a Christian service of love and respect for the life of Reverend W.V. McRae.

Dr. Joseph L. Coble a minister from Durham and a personal friend of 40 years, and the Rev. Michael O. Buckner, pastor of the local charge, conducted the service.

Internment was in the McRae-Johnson family plot in the church cemetery.

Active and honorary pall-bearers were nephews and great-nephews of Rev. McRae.

If these words and tributes seem prolonged, the reader will understand, for in this age, it is unusual for one to live almost to the age of one hundred years, still mentally keen; still loving people of all ages; and still interested in all things worthy.

His immediate survivors are his wife, Mrs. Pearl Andrews McRae of their apartment home Methodist Retirement Home, Durham, NC; son William V. McRae and family of Anaheim, California, and daughter, Mrs. Eleanor McRae Snyder and family of Martinez, California.

Nearest relatives in Anson are nieces Mrs. Ben Robinson of Morven and Mrs. T.C. Johnson of McFarlan.

Among many other relatives, there are those who know him as their great or their great-great uncle.

In this relation there seems to be no less love or respect because of the existing space of time and generations.

In respect to his memory, family and friends are sending their memorial gifts to the building fund to be used for a sanctuary adjacent to the present Fellowship Room of Pleasant Hill United Methodist Church in McFarlan, North Carolina.



JAMES HILLARY BRYANT
1931-1977



James Hillary Bryant was "born to serve the Lord" on November 25, 1931. A native of the Taylor's Bridge section of Sampson County, he graduated from the Taylor's Bridge-Ingold High School, attended Louisburg College, and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Biblical

Education from Toccoa Falls Institute in Toccoa, Georgia.

Hillary served the following appointments in the North Carolina Conference during his dedicated and effective ministry: In the New Bern District: Midway-Bethlehem 1956-58; Stonewall 1958-60; Sea Level 1960-64; and in the Goldsboro District: Bethel-Rones 1964-68; Mt. Carmel-Saulston 1968-72; Falling Creek-Brogden 1972-76, and Turkey 1976-77, where he was serving at the time of his death. He was ordained as Deacon in 1958, and as Elder in 1960.

In addition to his regular pastoral duties, Hillary was widely sought after as a revivalist. He has held evangelistic services in many churches across the conference. He was held in high esteem and admiration by his colleagues in the ministry.

Early in 1977 Hillary's general health began to deteriorate. In June of that year he suffered a series of strokes that proved fatal on June 21st. His death was announced later that day at a meeting of the Goldsboro District pastors, and each pastor present knew that he had lost a dear friend in the Christian ministry. His funeral was held on June 23rd from his home church, Trinity United Methodist on the Clinton Circuit, by the Reverend J. Paul Edwards, his District Superintendent, and the Reverend Hobart Burnside, pastor of Trinity Church, of which Hillary's mother is presently a member. He is buried in the Trinity Church cemetery. Goldsboro District pastors were honorary pallbearers.

Brother Edwards noted in the funeral service that as a boy Hillary would "play preacher" by standing on a box and "preaching" to an imaginary congregation. The Victory Quartet sang a song at the service which so well described the life and career of our Lord's devoted servant:

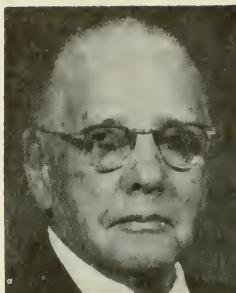
"My hands were made to help my neighbor,

"I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."

DOCTOR FULLER LOWRY
1881-1977

Doctor Fuller Lowry was born January 8, 1881 in Robeson County, North Carolina, the seventh son and the eleventh of twelve children born to the Reverend Calvin Lowry and his wife, Maria Sampson Lowry. He obtained his primary education at the Sarah Dial School and was then tutored for high school level work. He completed his advanced work at Pates, a four year school near his home, around 1906. At the completion of his education Brother Fuller became a teacher in a primary school, a vocation from which he was to retire some twenty years later. In 1906 he married Jessie Mae Hatcher, the daughter of the Reverend Peter W. Hatcher and his wife, Frances Taylor Hatcher. The young couple made their home in sight of what is now Pleasant Grove United Methodist Church. To this union was born eight children, four boys and four girls, between the years 1907 and 1931.

It was during this time, while his family was young and while he was yet teaching school, that Brother Fuller felt the call to preach and was licensed at Sandy Plains Methodist Church in the summer of 1913. This was to be the beginning of a long and illustrious career in the ministry. He became a "circuit rider" in the truest sense of the word, preaching from Bladen County to the east, throughout Robeson County, and into South Carolina to the south. He preached in established churches and established churches for the preaching of the word. Among those churches where he preached and served as minister were: Prospect, Sandy Plains, Bethel, Ashpole, Pleasant Grove in Robeson County, Hickory Grove in South Carolina, Fair Grove in South Carolina, Pleasant Grove in Bladen County, Branch Street, Collins Chapel, Philadelphus, and First Church, Pembroke.

Along with his ministry he was a rural letter carrier, an appointment he received in 1919 and held until his retirement in 1949. Brother Fuller led a full and active life as teacher, minister, and rural letter carrier for many years, serving until retirement in each position.

Brother Lowry experienced great joy in his work and ministry. He also knew the pain of separation from loved ones as he experienced the loss of his beloved wife, Jessie Mae, and three of his four daughters.

The loss of Jessie Mae by death was bridged by a marriage to Phelia Hunt in 1942. She was to be a faithful and loving companion until his death.

Fuller Lowry was also a champion of his people. He gave much of himself and his time and energy to gain recognition for his people. His efforts were rewarded when his people became officially recognized as the "Lumbee Indians." He was a treasured friend of his community and the honors the community has bestowed upon him has been indicative of the exalted place he held among his friends and in the community.

After retirement from the active ministry he continued to preach and to help churches wherever he was given opportunity. He was named Minister Emeritus at First Methodist Church of Pembroke. There he continually challenged the congregation to total commitment through proposals which called forth their best efforts. He was an inspiration to the changing ministry of the church, and in his quiet way, was a cohesive force that helped the church to grow and become more vital throughout the years.

On the Sunday prior to his death, Brother Fuller Lowry preached at the Morning Worship Service at First Church, Pembroke. He preached about heaven, describing heaven and the joys that awaited those who by faith would be welcomed there. It was during the week that followed that Brother Lowry became ill. He was hospitalized on Friday, and the following day, Saturday, August 13th, he entered into the life immortal. He was ninety-six years old. His had truly been a life of both quality and of quantity.

Funeral services were held from First United Methodist Church in Pembroke by Rev. LaFon C. Vereen, Reverend Harvey Lowry, and his pastor, Reverend Jerry Jay Juren, on August 16, 1977. His body was laid to rest in Lumbee Memorial Gardens near Pembroke.

Fuller Lowry was a man whose countenance ever exhibited his deep and abiding faith. His was a life of assurance and joy characterized by the smile with which he always greeted everyone. His was a life which made its mark on his community for nearly a century. It was a life that was committed to the improvement of a people and a community. It was a life that was committed to the cause of Jesus Christ, and above all, his was a life that made manifest the love of God. Doctor Fuller Lowry took his calling seriously. His dedication and his demeanor will always remain a challenge to those of us who were so blessed as to know him.

"For all the saints, who from their labors rest,
Who Thee by faith before the world confessed,
Thy Name, O Jesus, be forever blest.
Alleluia! Alleluia!"

JACK WARD PAGE
1911-1977



In writing a final "Well done, thou good and faithful servant" tribute to Jack Ward Page, it is difficult to find a starting point. It seems appropriate, however to eschew the traditional listing of appointments, positions of service, and honors. His work sheet is really not very different from those of his many comrades in the ministry. Furthermore, these activities have been well chronicled in the journals of the church. Instead, it seems more fitting to deal with the man himself, and his unique position in his "Father's World."

The third of seven sons, Jack was born in Dillon County, South Carolina, March 7, 1911, to Frank M. and Betty Burns Page. At the age of seven, he lost both parents during an influenza epidemic. His life then fell under the influence of two wonderful families of kinsmen: the Burns family, and later, the Ward family, of Robeson County, North Carolina.

Jack's late childhood and early adult years were a time of intense inner struggle. His life had little meaning. His family saw that he attended church, but the message of the church, for him, was empty. He sought to live by his own standard and ethics, or by no standards at all.

At the memorial service for Jack in Rowland, North Carolina, Rev. Charles Hubbard, his long-time friend, remarked that when he first met Jack, he was surprised to learn that he had led a rather normal life, with a certain amount of sin involved. Sin, there was; but, looking back, it seemed that this part of Jack's life was only the prelude to a well-orchestrated symphony, which was yet to be played.

The Lord had plans for the life of Jack Page which were unalterable and unavoidable. Slowly, he was captured by the person of Jesus Christ. He felt a strong pull on his heart which he could neither understand nor escape. Finally, unable to find peace, he made the Lord, and himself, a promise. He would return to school, to read, to listen, to learn. He vowed to learn all that could be known about this strange man, Jesus.

Jack entered Duke University, several years older than most incoming freshmen, earning his BA (1936) and BD (1939) degrees from that institution. He did not learn all that could be known, but he did learn enough to satisfy his own mind and heart, enough to end his spiritual confusion. Jesus Christ was, indeed, a personal Saviour. Jesus Christ did, indeed, have a plan for the betterment of mankind.

Thereafter, Jack's life was testimony to that message. When he was no longer able, physically, to preach the Gospel, much of the inner spark of

his life was extinguished, although his body lived on for several years. His relationship with the Lord developed through many hours of quiet prayer and disciplined study. He came to serve the Lord by learning, perhaps the hard way, that he could not successfully, fight against Him or run away from Him. He realized, further, that he was a much happier person living with the Lord than he had been living without Him.

If faith without works is truly dead, then Jack's faith must have been very lively indeed. His belief in the so-called work ethic was uncompromised, if unarticulated. His greatest personal shortcoming might have been his slavery to the schedule, even though his schedule was largely self-imposed. He probably would have listed yard work as his favorite form of relaxation.

He was not, however, an unsmiling, unfeeling automaton. His love for his family and his congregation was as strong as his love of the Lord. He was a man of great humor and was at his best at informal gatherings of family and friends. He was a master story teller, loving nothing better than sharing the latest "good one" that he had heard while making his rounds.

He was concerned that the church should develop positive social concerns, taking active steps to improve the lot of mankind. He was extremely interested in the mission field and in Christian higher education. A more personal example occurred while he was minister at Hay Street Church in Fayetteville. He was a member of a group of ministers, both black and white, which organized to insist on the prompt integration of lunch counters in that city. His family remembers that part of his reward for bearing witness to the brotherhood of man came in the form of hate mail and abusive telephone calls.

Jack's ministry was aided and strengthened for thirty-nine years by his good wife Frances, whom he met in Mocksville, North Carolina, while working with the Duke Foundation. Frances taught Sunday school, sang in the choir, folded bulletins, worked in the church kitchen, was active with women's groups, and worked diligently with the parsonage committee. Together, they founded a home based on Christian love and endeavored, by precept and example, to keep their two sons on the straight and narrow. She would accompany him on out of town trips while he was a district superintendent, helping to ease the loneliness of the long drive home. Frances continues to be active in the church in Rowland, their home since retirement.

Rev. Clyde McCarver, in his remarks at Jack's funeral, said, "Jack never wanted to blow the trumpet, but he did want to be in the fight." A good fight it was. The faith was well kept.

CARLOS POYNOR WOMACK
1905-1977

When Carlos Poynor Womack went home to be with God on Friday, December 16, 1977 the North Carolina Conference lost one of the most effective pastors it has ever had, and I lost a contemporary in the ministry who for more than fifty years had been one of my dearest and most intimate friends.

Carlos died at Southern Pines after an illness which had lasted for more than two years. He was married to Jane Barker, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph C. Barker, of Durham. She provided a beautiful Christian home for him for forty-seven years. Other survivors include their two sons, Carlos Poynor Womack, Jr., of Aberdeen, and John Barker Womack, of Southern Pines; three grandchildren, Deborah Jane Womack, Janet Lee Womack and Betty Jean Womack; and two brothers, John G. Womack, of Little Rock, Arkansas, and Joe C. Womack, of Van Buren, Arkansas.

The funeral services were held Monday, December 19, in the United Methodist Church of Southern Pines, by The Reverends John S. Paschal and W.A. Crow. Interment was in the Woodlawn Cemetery, Durham where the officiating ministers were The Reverend Mr. Paschal and Dr. T. Marvin Vick, Jr.

Carlos was born July 10, 1905, in Berryville, Arkansas, the son of The Reverend John A. Womack and Sallie Coley Womack. He was reared in a parsonage home while his father was a pastor and presiding Elder, in the North Arkansas Conference.

When he joined a Methodist Conference, he became, indeed, part of "an endless line of splendor." His father, and two of his father's brothers were outstanding Methodist ministers. Two other brothers were leading Methodist laymen—one a Methodist College President and the other Arkansas' Superintendent of Public Education.

Carlos finished High School in Fayetteville, Arkansas. He received his AB degree from the University of Arkansas in 1927 and was awarded the BD degree from the Divinity School, Duke University in 1930. He became a member of the North Carolina Conference in 1930, and was ordained a Deacon in 1932, and an Elder in 1934. His appointments in the North Carolina Conference were: Associate Pastor, Duke Memorial, Durham; Scotts Hill; Enfield; Parkton-Hope Mills; Carr Church, Durham; Maxton; Jonesboro; Long Memorial, Roxboro; Chaplain, McCain Hospital; Bethel; First Church, Siler City; Divine Street, Dunn; First Church,

Elizabeth City; Asbury Church, Durham, from which he retired in 1970.

He served willingly and with effectiveness as a member of a number of Boards and Agencies of the Conference. He was especially helpful on the Board of the Ministry and won the gratitude of a large number of young men who continued to thank him for his help in their ministry.

For Carlos Womack, Christianity was a radiant and victorious faith. He both preached and practiced it. It was always evident in his ministry. His was a personal faith, both for himself and for those who were committed to his care. He appealed to men in a special way and became an integral part of their lives. They confided in him and were blessed by his caring concern for them. Men and women all over eastern North Carolina now rise up to call him blessed.

Twice during his ministry Carlos was stricken with a distressing illness. Each time he spent more than a year in a hospital bed. Even there he was a ministering pastor to the patients, doctors, and nurses who sought to help him.

Each time he came back to the pastorate with renewed enthusiasm and a deeper devotion. His commitment to Christ and His Church was complete.

Carlos, by his example taught us all how to live, and most of all how to meet suffering heroically, and then to enter triumphantly into God's Eternal Home.

Surely, he would have us join him in singing the story of his life and ministry:

“My times are in Thy hand;
My God, I wish them there;
My life, my friends, my soul,
I leave entirely to Thy care.

My times are in Thy hand,
Whatever they may be;
Pleasing or painful, dark or bright,
As best may seem to Thee.

My times are in Thy hand;
Why should I doubt or fear?
My Father's hand will never cause
His child a needless tear.

My times are in Thy hand;
I'll always trust in Thee,
And, after death, at Thy right hand
I shall forever be.”

WILLIAM CARSON LEWIS
1916-1977



The spirit of The Reverend William Carson Lewis was transplanted out of this earthly pilgrimage to its eternal home on December 17, 1977. Carson was born in the Old Dock Community of Columbus County, North Carolina on November 4, 1916. At an early age he moved with his family to Rockingham, North Carolina. On June 2, 1945 Carson was married to Pauline Woodard Wheeler of Hamlet, North Carolina. Pauline had a son by a previous marriage and to her union with Carson was born three other children. Mrs. Lewis and three of the children survive him. Carson was a loving and devoted husband and father. Throughout the days of his illness he expressed a constant and practical concern for his family. Like so many men, perhaps he could have done more for his family but that which he did was performed with an unselfish devotion.

Carson accepted the call to preach rather late in life but once he accepted the calling he never lost sight of it. He could no more have lived apart from the ministry than a fish could live out of water. At the age of forty he went back to school to prepare himself for the ministry by attending Wilmington College, Pembroke State University and Duke University. To the ministry he brought a great literary mind as well as a love for current events. He loved argument and debate and this inquisitive and searching mind was reflected in his pulpit ability as well as in his daily conversation.

As a minister he was eminently successful both in and out of the pulpit. He patterned his life on the two great commandments of our Lord, that was to; "Love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. And the second is like unto it, Thou shall love thy neighbor as thyself." It was this love of God that was exemplified in his ministry throughout eastern North Carolina for twenty years. Carson was a very warm person who was filled with wit and laughter and yet there was a deep and compassionate concern for humanity. His ministry was one that was lived day by day in the field of his appointment though he did not limit himself to just Methodist. Most of his years were spent in the rural areas where there is an overlapping of ministry to all denominations and it was there that he gave himself without reservation, going where he was needed and doing whatever was necessary. Carson's victories lay not in where he ministered but in how he ministered and to whom he ministered. Those who knew him found him to be generous to the point of sacrifice. To the nine churches that he served as pastor he was a pillar

of strength and a tower of inspiration. He built relationships with the people that led them into a deeper relationship with Christ.

In my back yard there is a sand cactus which at first glance is just another shrub with a thick hide and harsh needle like spines but underneath that exterior coating there is the most beautiful flower that one can possibly imagine. Sometimes Carson wore the external robe of harshness for he fought untiringly against the injustices of the world. Sometimes he was so honest that he almost seemed cruel. Yet there was about him the air of great concern for all mankind. There was something beautiful about him that endeared people to him. Unto his death he remained an obedient servant of our Lord. He was steadfast in his faith and faithful in his duties as a minister. He loved the church and was ever mindful of the task that the church imposed upon him. Even in his retirement he wanted to know what was happening in the conference, in the district and in the local church. He had a strength which enabled him to meet the issues of life head-on, a strength of conviction which knew no compromise and a strength of devotion that would not let him rest. Carson knew and loved people and because of this love and knowledge he was able to minister to the total needs of his congregations. He had the ability to identify with humanity in its various needs and forms. when there was strife he sought to bring peace, when there was sorrow he sought to bring joy and comfort, and when there was discord he sought to bring reconciliation. His friendship was something to be nourished and his love something to be cherished.

Carson's favorite expression of faith was, "That he was in the process of being saved and one day he would be saved in the fullness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ." His favorite passage of scripture was Romans 12:1, "I beseech you therefore brethren, by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Today Carson is both wholly and Holy acceptable before God.

Because I could not stop for death,
He kindly stopped for me,
The carriage held but just ourselves
and immortality.

Carson's last few months of physical life was spent in McCains Hospital. Carson's funeral was preached on December the 19th from the Glenwood United Methodist Church in Rockingham by the Reverend Robert O'Keef, Joseph Bethea and Donnie Davis. In his physical death Carson left behind him only a meager amount of worldly goods but he left something in which we can all share and that is love, for love is all encompassing, LOVE IS ETERNAL.

I am grateful that I had an opportunity to know him here and call him friend for this world is a bit better place because he lived here for a short span of sixty-one years on his way to an eternal home.

DAVID WAYLAND CHARLTON, SR.
1897-1978

It is very difficult to write a memorial for The Reverend D.W. Charlton, Sr. He was my dad.

He died in Wayne Memorial Hospital, Goldsboro, North Carolina, January 9th. A Memorial Service was held on January 11th at St. Paul United Methodist Church with The Reverend W. Junius Neese, Pastor, officiating, assisted by The Reverend J. Paul Edwards, District Superintendent. It was a celebration as he would have wanted it and planned it. We sang his favorite hymns and heard his favorite scriptures and the Choir led this service of worship.

My dad was born in Dillwyn, Buckingham County, Virginia, and grew up on a farm being a member of a large family. The family reunions were something to behold!

He attended the University of Richmond, the University of Pennsylvania, and Crozer Theological Seminary. In 1924 he was ordained as a Baptist Minister. One of my first memories of him was watching him from the pew as he preached in the pulpit of The First Baptist Church, Altavista, Virginia.

After several Pastorates in the Baptist Denomination, one of his dreams came true. His ordination was accepted and he was approved by the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church in 1944.

His first appointment was Manteo on Roanoke Island. It was my first view of the ocean and this historical country and I could sense for my dad it was a new dimension of happiness. He loved the sea, the islanders, and the experience of seeing people come from everywhere as he hosted Sunday services at Fort Raleigh.

He then was introduced to Goldsboro, where he served on two different occasions and after retirement made his home. During his last years, he served as Minister of Visitation for St. Paul United Methodist Church. Through a span of over fifty years in the Christian Ministry, my dad was a traveling preacher and lived many places and, in a sense, didn't have a home.

In Goldsboro and St. Paul Church, he found a home. His last years were probably the most rewarding of his life. He loved the community and its people and had opportunities to serve which were so fulfilling. The editor of the Goldsboro News Argus said it better than I could:

He practiced what he preached, whether it was his message from the pulpit or his personal philosophy of staying involved. At 80, he was

dapper of dress, straight of frame and he had a quick smile and charming wit. He made the twilight of life appear indeed to be the golden years.

There are certain things that stand out about my dad as I remember him.

I remember his DEDICATION

He had a passion for reading, studying, and staying up with the latest trends in Christian thought. If I wanted to please him, I always knew to give him a challenging and stimulating book. Even when he was not preaching, he was writing sermons and articles, right up until he went into the ICU unit, he was writing a sermon. He was a regular contributor to the North Carolina *Christian Advocate*, *The Upper Room*, and the *Gold-
boro News Argus*. Dad had three books published: *By These Things Men Live*, *Survival Is Not Enough*, and *My View of The Church and The Living Word*.

I remember how he LOVED people.

All kinds of people. It was very appropriate at his Memorial Service that the church custodian of the black race led the prayer. This was my dad, he didn't put labels or race distinction on people. Someone wrote on a card that he always seemed to be where and when he was needed. He was never happier than when he was out visiting.

I remember him as a champion of SOCIAL JUSTICE.

He was no doubt ahead of his time. He was ready to preach and crusade wherever social injustices raised their ugly heads of whatever nature, in the local community, the country, or the world. His special interest in social concern was indicated by his service on conferences boards, especially the Board of Temperance of the North Carolina Conference, of which he served as president. I noticed in his scrapbook a recent letter to the editor where he was still taking a strong stand against capital punishment.

I remember how he LOVED "The Church."

He participated in the Christmas eve communion service at St. Paul Church, a few days before he went into the hospital for the last time.

The Church was his life. He truly believed "The church's one foundation is Jesus Christ her Lord." Through fifty years my dad hung in there with the church, through ups and downs, disappointments and discouragements, through all the unrest, ferment and change, his faith in his Lord as his church remained secure. My mother stood by my dad's side for those fifty some years and she, myself and my brother, Bill, salute him and pay him tribute. We believe he was a very rare person and we shall truly miss him.

The following is a poem I wrote for his Memorial Service:

My dad was a good man,
He loved his God
his church
and people, all kinds.
If I could turn the clock back,
I would spend more time with him
get to know him better,

sharing with each other on deeper levels,
yet in God's eternity, hopefully that yet
shall come to pass.

I would say now, dad, I share your faith.
"Hallelujah! The Lord God, omnipotent
reigneth! And he shall reign forever and
ever! Hallelujah!"

CARROLL HOWELL BEALE
1902-1978

Rev. Carroll Howell Beale has been called from his earthly ministries to God's service above. He passed away on January 10th in the Mediocenter where he had been since the sixth, having had surgery at the Norfolk General Hospital for a malignant brain tumor on December 16, 1977.

Born in Southampton County, Virginia near Franklin, he was the son of the late Walter N. Beale and Frances Matthew Beale. He was married to Lorena Miles Beale also of Southampton. After retiring from active ministry they have made their home in Boykins, Virginia.

Carroll received his B.A. degree from the University of Richmond, Richmond, Virginia and his M.A. from Peabody College, Nashville, Tennessee. He held pastorates in both North Carolina and Virginia, his last pastorate was held in the Sandhills Circuit, Jackson Springs, North Carolina.

HOWARD HARRELL CASH
1903-1978



Howard Harrell Cash was born March 2, 1903 on a farm near Huntersville, Logan County, Ohio. He was the only child of Charles Wesley and Emma Pedan Cash. Soon after his birth, his parents moved to a village near West Liberty, Ohio, where Harrell grew up and received his early education.

Graduated from West Liberty State Normal Teachers College in 1923, where he majored in history and archaeology, his aim was to become a teacher and archaeologist.

In his senior year, Nov. 29, 1923, he married Miss Thelma Levon Roberts, of Jeneria, Ohio, his high school sweetheart. Of this union across the years there were born six children. The three oldest preceeded their father in death. The three remaining children are Wallace, of Langley, S.C., Paul David, of Kinston, and Mrs. Helen Moore, of Smyrna, N.C. There are eight grand children and three great grand children. Mrs. Cash is living at the Methodist Retirement Home, Durham.

Harrell's dream of becoming a teacher in the conventional sense, spiced by the fascination of work in archaeology, was not destined to materialize. However it was replaced by a much greater dream, which did materialize, and that is a most glorious way.

In December of 1924 Harrell was converted in a revival meeting in the Methodist Church, Harper, Ohio. The preaching was done by the pastor, the Rev. W.A. Thompson. Other results of that meeting are not known, yet it has borne much fruit for the Kingdom of God across many years, for from that experience came Harrell's call to preach. And through his

ministry several hundred have been born into the Kingdom of God.

Across the more than fifty years of his pastoral ministry, brother Cash has been known as "a man of action." Decisions once made were followed through. And now that he knew how the Lord wanted him to invest his life, he lost no time in preparing for the task before him. Just how long and exceedingly difficult that task was to be, he had no way of knowing, but he did realize that it demanded his best.

Accordingly, though already frail in health, with an infant daughter, and no financial support, he immediately secured work at Taylor University, Upland, Ind., where he entered the theological department in the fall of 1925.

On March 3, 1926, he was "Licensed to Preach" by the Wabash District Conference of the North Ind. Conference, meeting at Gas City, Ind. Thus a most remarkable career was officially launched.

His first appointment was to the "McLenoreville Station," of the Central Tennessee conference, a town where we had a large church high school, and a new church building under construction.

In relating this incident a few years ago, Harrell said that he didn't recall being afraid—that either he was too busy, or else didn't have sense enough to be—probably some of both!

But by the end of the conference year the building was completed, and they celebrated by having a revival meeting, during which 27 persons were converted and joined the church.

Today we would expect a pastor to be left a while in a situation like that to develop it further, but fifty years ago when a pastoral appointment was made "for one Conference year," that was exactly what it meant!

So the following year found him on the Lexington Circuit, and the next year on the Monroe Circuit in the Cumberland Mountains.

Ordination being slow to come by in the M.E. Church, brother Cash acted on the advice of a friend and transferred to the Tennessee Conference of the M.E. Church, South. He was ordained Deacon.

Then in the late fall of 1933 after three years of evangelistic work in Tennessee he found himself in the Mountains of N.C. With a growing family, and cold weather setting in so no revivals could be held, when asked by a M.E. Pastor if he could "lend a hand" in the work of the Lansing Larger Parish, he thought he could find the time! The work lasted two years, and resulted in him transferring back into the M.E. Church, where he received his Elders orders in 1936.

There followed a period of time in which he was employed by the Board of Home Missions, working under Dr. Burnette out of Pittman Center in eastern Tennessee, then with former M.E., M.E. South, and M.P. Churches, until the reorganization of the newly formed "Methodist Church" placed him within the bounds of our N.C. Annual Conference in 1940.

In many respects, this second part of Brother Cash's Ministry was radically different from the first fifteen years. His "circuit riding" days were past and gone, as were the days physical privation and hunger for him and his family. His ministry was certainly far less dramatic—indeed, almost prosaic by comparison. But no less productive!

It would serve no real purpose to list in order the appointments he served from 1940-1975. They are available through the Conference Journals for those years. Suffice it to say that for over thirty five years he traveled up and down and across eastern N.C., doing the work of a good and faithful pastor and an effective evangelist.

Let me share with you a few of my personal observations of this Man of God:

1. Brother Cash was, I think, the last of his kind. He was a real "circuit rider"—and I mean the "on horseback" kind. He had several circuits which covered more than forty miles, and on numerous occasions arrived at his destination so nearly frozen that he could not dismount without help.

2. He promoted the total program of the Church, not neglecting the difficult.

3. He was a strong preacher, and in the over-all his messages were well balanced. He was intensely evangelistic, yet at the same time he was quick to point out that true Christian witnessing meant that one's faith had to be translated into social attitudes and actions.

4. He read much, yet he never let theory enslave his mind nor blind him to common sense and the practical.

5. Even in the years of declining health he remained young in spirit. —Consistently, he was genuinely interested in youth, organizing and working with them successfully.

—Becoming a Boy Scout at age 13, across the years he earned over 100 merit badges. He was a Life Scout, Star Scout, Eagle Scout, held the Bronze Palm, the Gold Palm, the Silver Palm, the Silver Beaver and the Scoutmaster's Key.

6. He never served a really "big" church, yet I never heard him complain about any appointment.

7. I never heard him say an unkind word about a fellow pastor.

To me these things reveal the ability, the noble purpose, the high ideals, and the purity of heart of one I counted it a privilege to be associated with.

Certainly of no one can the words of James Montgomery be more truly and aptly spoken than of our late brother and fellow minister, the Rev. Howard Harrell Cash:

"Servant of God, well done!
Rest from thy loved employ!
The battle fought, the victory won,
Enter thy Master's joy."

CHARLES WESLEY WOOTEN
1924-1978

As refreshing as the remembrance of a sunlit, budding, crisp, spring day, so do we engender the memory of Charles Wesley Wooten. His wisdom, loving concern, and keen wit brought much heavenly light into the hundreds of lives which experienced his touch.

God's great servant delivered his final message of celebration on Christmas Day, 1977. On December 30, 1977, he was taken to Moore Memorial Hospital in Pinehurst as he suffered a heart attack. In the weeks which were to follow, Charles experienced four other attacks; significantly, the final heart attack which occurred on Ashe Wednesday, February 8, 1978, resulted in his passage from this earthly existence into the heavenly realm. He died, as he had lived, with magnificent and unquestioning faith in God and in His Will. Near the end of his time here, he comforted and challenged his most loved family with a Biblical verse which had taken on new meaning for him, Phillipians 1:12, 'But I would ye should understand, brethren, that the things which happened unto me have fallen out rather unto the futherance of the gospel...' During his final hours, he prayed for others—the sick, the afflicted, the bereaved, never expressing concern for himself—sang old, beloved hymns as his beautiful tenor voice had so often done to glorify God, quoted great passages of scripture—verbatim, and recalled many joyful times in his life—times spent in a life of total commitment to God.

An Eleven O'Clock Divine Worship Service of Love was held on February 10, 1978 in the crowded Pleasant Hill Church in Robbins where Charles was pastor; the Reverend Wade Goldston led the service and the Reverend Clyde McCarver, District Superintendent of the Sanford District, assisted. Also on February 10, a Memorial Service was held in Charles' "home" Church, Mt. Carmel, in Pikeville, with the Reverend Wade Goldston conducting this worship experience; the sanctuary was filled to overflowing as dear ones expressed the love felt for him within our hearts. Both services concluded with Charles' favorite hymn:

A Charge to Keep I Have,
A God to glorify,
A never dying soul to save,
And fit it for the sky.

Interment was in the Pikeville Cemetery.

As is evidenced by his name, Charles Wesley Wooten, he was born into a devoutly Christian, Methodist home on November 20, 1924. He was one

of four children born to Wesley and Enness Wooten in Wayne County. It was learned early in Charles' life that he possessed great intellect and a remarkable capacity and zeal for obtaining knowledge. Through the influences of his family, he developed a great love and respect of nature; the clouds, the rain, the sunrises and sunsets — things which are considered merely daily occurrences to many of us — were all unique and magnificent paintings in God's gallery of handiwork. He spent all of his life in the state which he loved and appreciated, North Carolina.

Charles was so happily married to his wife, Callie, for thirty-one beautiful years. Because of Callie's love for God and for Charles and his ministry, this couple became a Christian team working together to further God's kingdom on earth. They always did all church work together. When a church received Charles as a pastor, it also had the good fortune to be blessed with Callie as a continuous worker for Christ. Their loving home was blessed with three daughters, who along with their mother, survive Charles. Their daughters are: Sue Wooten Grissom of Goldsboro (wife of Reverend David R. Grissom), Christian and Charline Wooten of the home. Charles always spoke with great pride of his lovely wife and his daughters; truly he loved each in a special, endearing way. The Wooten home abounded with love, respect, and devotion as was set forth in the example of Christian love. Their parsonage always became the community center for sharing. And in the Wooten family, each member assumed responsibility to work in Charles' Churches; in effect, the entire family felt the call of the ministry. Perhaps two of the most enriching aspects in Charles' life were presented in the form of twin granddaughters, born July 30, 1977; during the six months that Charles was permitted to love Kellie and Susanna Grissom, his life took on added, deeper spiritual meaning — never as one loved the children of his child.

Charles entered the ministry from the Mt. Carmel Church, Pikeville. He was admitted on trial in the North Carolina Conference on October 30, 1954. He was ordained Deacon on October 31, 1954 and ordained Elder on June 27, 1957. He served the following appointments in the conference: Atlantic; Evansdale-Winstead, (and later) Evansdale-Black Creek, Wilson County; Rich Square; Goshen-Keener, Sampson County; Norlina; Fellowship, Hamlet; Vas; Stantonsburg; Wesley Heights, Fayetteville; and Pleasant Hill, Robbins, While serving these churches, Charles was influential in the initiation and completion of several building projects, many of which he architecturally designed himself. He was truly a man of many talents.

Charles was an excellent minister; his value was unsurpassed in the roles of preacher and in the responsibilities of pastor. He never faced his congregations with sermons until he was confident that he was both spiritually and mentally prepared. He always studied, constantly enriching his spiritual and educational horizons, as was obvious to those who heard him speak, or simply engaged in conversation with him. He frequently amazed members of his churches with his great knowledge and memorization of the Holy Scriptures. He felt privileged to be chosen to preach the Word of God to others. With each new conference appointment, his church members soon realized his loyal devotion to them; he delighted in their happinesses, and was compassionate in their sorrows—their joys

were his elation, and their burdens he bore. His spiritual, guiding theme concerning the lives of those to whom God had entrusted within his care was: "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God..." (Romans 8:28) And he also took the message of God's love beyond the doors of his churches into the lives of the uneducated, underprivileged, and to those behind prison bars. He was truly God's man.

Because of his symbolic dedication to God, Charles was influential in causing many men to become Methodist Ministers. Among those who chose the ministry, in great part due to the influence of Charles' life, was his beloved son-in-law, David Grissom. Charles watched with great love, pride, and enthusiasm the life of a young man become the life of God's man. He so often referred to David as his son—a son who came along much later in life than his dear daughters! The love and respect, which Charles and David shared was truly blessed by God.

I knew Charles Wesley Wooten as well as anyone who was honored by his life; he was my Father, my friend, my life-example. He had the most trusting, steadfast, unquestioning faith in God which I have ever witnessed; this he maintained until the very end of his earthly days. Every phase and aspect of his life reflected the realization that God's will was his will. We, his family and loved ones, have an obligation to convey his loving, Christian example to others as this will enable him to dwell forever here among God's people.

CICERO REDMON ETHERIDGE
1912-1978



Dear Lord,

I want to introduce to you my preacher, Cicero Redmon Etheridge. How many times have I heard those words said about myself and how it thrilled me to feel the fondness expressed in that introduction! Now with all the fondness and admiration that those words hold for Eastern Carolina Methodist, I use them to present to You, C.R. Etheridge.

He was a man of plain and simple faith and piety who counted it his greatest honor and privilege to be acquainted with Your Son, Jesus the Christ. Cicero didn't speak of Him with the glowing and flowing words of the poet. Nor did he procalim Him with the profundity of theological exactness. But when one was in Cicero's presence, he knew a third person was there. He walked with Him in the garden when the cool morning's dew was on the roses. He walked with Him in the heat of the day when the noonday sun was symbolic of the warmth of Your love. He sat with Him in the evening's shadows when the day was far spent. And when the evening shadows became the dark of night, he remained confident that the night was light about him because Your Son, Jesus Christ, was there.

C.R. Etheridge was born May 17, 1912, in Wilson County, North Carolina. He was reared in Evansdale community near Wilson and for many years worked for Export Tobacco Company and Food Processors, Inc., in Wilson. In the middle fifties, You called and he responded. First in the Original Free Will Baptist denomination, he served Gethesamane, Arapahoe, and Coratan Churches near New Bern. He also served Rosebud, Otter's Creek, and Macklesfield Free Will Baptist Churches and was primarily responsible for the organization of Calvary Free Will Baptist Church in Wilson. In 1973, he became a United Methodist again and served the Pollocksville Charge for two years. In 1975, he was appointed to Midway-Bethlehem and served there for two years. After he was appointed to Turkey-Friendship in 1977, his days were filled with a struggle against an illness that tore at his physical being, but never dented the calmness and assurance of his soul. He gave up the struggle on February 25, 1978.

A service in memorial to his life was conducted at Joyner Funeral Home in Wilson, NC, on February 26, 1978, by the Reverends Robert Rattz, James Coile, Richard Etheridge, and Dr. Joseph Bethea. His mortal remains are safely deposited in Memorial Park in Wilson.

He leaves behind a most lovely wife, Polly Taylor Etheridge; three sons,

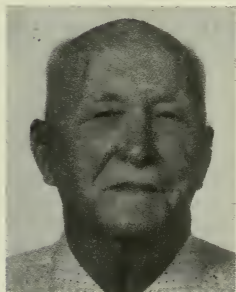
John Thomas of Wilson, Richard Allen, a minister in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Starksville, Mississippi, and William Hunter of Shelby; three daughters, Esther Ruth Edmondson of Tarboro, Judy Carol Dixon of Bethel, and Joyce Joan Reale of West Islip, New York; and thirteen grandchildren. He also leaves behind a vast multitude of sons and daughters in the faith because he was "the preacher" for a lot of us.

The most difficult day of his earthly life was Sunday, December 25, 1977. It was neither the pain of sickness nor anxiety for his own soul that made it difficult, but rather his absence from a pulpit on this anniversary of the Lord's birth. He wanted to share with others the joy of the presence of Jesus, his Lord.

Well, Lord, he's in your presence now; and at times I can almost hear "my preacher" singing:

Then in a nobler, sweeter song,
I'll sing thy power to save,
When this poor lisping, stammering tongue
Lies silent in the grave.

RENA BRIDGMAN LUPTON
1883-1977



Mrs. Rena Bridgman Lupton, widow of the Reverend Frederick Arthur Lupton, was born April 28, 1883 in Hyde County, North Carolina. She was the daughter of George Stevenson Bridgman and Elizabeth Watson Bridgman. She was educated in the public schools of Hyde County and in September 1901 entered State Normal and Industrial College, now the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. In the winter of 1904 the main building of the college burned down and Rena Bridgman found herself out in the snow with only her nightgown. She developed influenza and had to drop out of school. During her college days Dr. Charles McIver had a positive and profound influence on her regarding her respect for education.

For several years she taught school in Hyde and Pamlico Counties. On July 31, 1906 she married Frederick Arthur Lupton of Whortonsville, N.C. A few years later they moved to Durham, N.C. where her husband studied at Trinity College. He was admitted into the North Carolina Annual Conference in 1913.

Rena B. Lupton was a wonderful minister's wife. She endured the hardships with a smile and a sense of purpose. She taught Sunday School, directed many Easter and Christmas programs and on occasions she preached if her husband was sick. She helped with the quarterly and annual reports and always she was an inspiration to her husband and children.

Reverend and Mrs. Lupton served the following charges: Town Creek, N.C., Hatteras, Tarboro, Atlantic, Tabor City, Scranton, S.C., Columbia, Swepsonville, Cedar Grove, Kenly, Leasburg and Four Oaks. Upon their retirement from the ministry in 1947 they lived in Graham, North Carolina. Her husband died in 1954 and for a number of years she lived with her children. For the last ten years of her life she lived at the Methodist Retirement Home, Durham, N.C., where she found love, a christian atmosphere and excellent care.

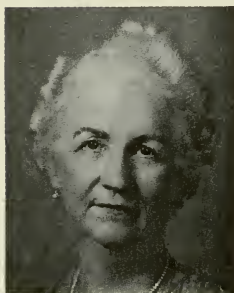

Mrs. Matilda McRae Culpepper Proctor, the daughter of the late Cicero and Margaret Lancaster Culpepper, was born in Wilson, North Carolina, on July 16, 1887. She was educated in Atlantic Christian College and Meredith College.

She was the widow of the Reverend Creasy Kinion Proctor, who was first a member of the Western Oklahoma Conference and later, 1916-1946, a member of the North Carolina Conference. Mr. Proctor served churches in Selma, Raleigh, Kinston, and Rocky Mount before moving to Oxford in 1928, where he was Superintendent of the Oxford Orphanage from 1928 until his death on June 26, 1946.

Mrs. Proctor was a devoted wife and mother, having two sons—the late Sidney Kinion Proctor and Dr. Richard C. Proctor, now Professor and Chairman of The Department of Psychiatry in The Bowman Gray School of Medicine.

Mrs. Proctor's life was characterized by outstanding Christian service. Following her husband's death in 1946, she moved to Raleigh. For a while she worked in Rex Hospital; later moved to High Point, where she served as a counselor in the Women's dormitory of High Point College. Following this period, she returned to Raleigh, where she worked for several sessions as a clerk in the State Senate. Later she moved to Winston-Salem for a few years and then went to live in the Presbyterian Home in High Point. She was a member of Edenton Street United Methodist Church in Raleigh, North Carolina.

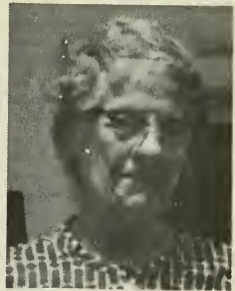
Mrs. Proctor died in High Point on July 31, 1977. Funeral and interment followed in Oxford, N.C., on August 2, 1977. The service was con-

She met John Robert Edwards, a young minister at a session of the North Carolina Annual Conference and they were married a year later on October 1, 1919. To this union three children were born, all of whom survive: Robert D. Edwards, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Evans, and J. Paul Edwards.

Gertrude shared fully, gladly, and faithfully in the ministry of the church with her husband in the communities to which they were appointed in the North Carolina Conference. She always had a love for people, and especially young people. Working with the youth in the church was to her a challenge and privilege. The influence she had on the lives of many young people could never be calculated. Not only was she an affectionate and helpful wife, but she was a dedicated mother. Her own children are a living example of her Christian influence.

Her husband died while minister of First Methodist Church, Roanoke Rapids. Following his death Mrs. Edwards taught in the public schools of

that city for a few years. She later had a private first grade in her home for a number of years.

She went to The Methodist Retirement Home in Durham in 1961 and remained there until her death on September 3, 1977. Though I had known her through the years, I really came to know her well during the years she was at The Retirement Home. Even before I joined the staff of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. I recall visiting The Home on many occasions and one of the first persons you would see would be Gertrude Edwards. From 20 December 1934 when she was born, to the day of her death, 17 December 1977, Joan Anderson DeHart packed the days of her life to the fullest. Born in Durham, North Carolina, she attended Durham's public schools and then High Point College and Duke University. She was related to the Methodist Church all her life, having grown up in Trinity Church, Durham.

Married 17 May 1958 to the Reverend Murry L. DeHart, Jr., she entered gladly with him into our Methodist itinerant tradition. In 1958, they went to Union Church, Elizabeth City. After three years there, they moved in 1961 to the North Gates Charge. From that appointment, they traveled to Camp Church, Shallotte in 1964, and in 1967, to Sunset Park in Wilmington. In 1970 they returned to the piedmont section of our state at Saxapahaw; and in 1974, they went to First Church, Pittsboro, their fam-

ily home at the time of her death.

During these years of parsonage life, three children were born to the DeHarts, Lee, David and Jon; these sons and their father survive Joan as does her mother, Mrs. Kenneth (Myrtle Smith) Anderson of Black Mountain. Joan is survived also by two sisters, Mrs. Mary A. Leggett of Durham, and Mrs. Bird A. Baldwin of Black Mountain, as well as three brothers: Kenneth Anderson of Jacksonville, Florida; John Anderson of Durham; and Roger Anderson of Raleigh.

A number of periods of illness made life difficult for her, but her spirit and yearning to be well again never flagged. Her death just before Christmas after nine days in the intensive care section of Duke Medical Center came as a shock to her family and her friends. Her body was laid to rest in Maplewood Cemetery, Durham, following a funeral service conducted by the Reverend Edward F. Smith, pastor of Duke Memorial Church.

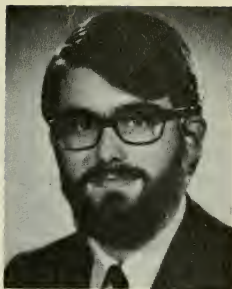
One of the prayers often used in funeral services has a sentence: "The young may die but the old must die." Death came to Joan while she was yet young. In such instances, often we wonder what life would have developed into had the person lived what we understand to be a normal life span. One of the personal memories of Joan cherished by her family and friends is the deep love she had for the expression of our faith in William Whiting's poem, "Eternal Father, Strong to Save." The poem envisions life's perils and problems in terms of the risk of the mariner whose life is bound to the stormy sea. The closing stanza sums up something of the writer's faith in God's providence and adequacy for our needs. This expression which Joan loved and which had great meaning to her is a fitting conclusion to this brief word of appreciation of her life.

So she lived and so she died. Her life remains a precious memory to all who knew and loved her.

WILLIAM WALTER LEVIS III
1947-1977

William Walter Levis III, M.D., was born March 1, 1947, in Detroit, Michigan. His short life reflected his love for people and was devoted to service to others. He died December 16, 1977, in Swansboro, North Carolina. The events that took him from childhood in Michigan to fulfillment in North Carolina are the threads of life that created the man.

William Walter Levis III, M.D., was always called Bill. In Cartaret County, North Carolina, where he practiced family medicine, he was known as Dr. Bill. Dr. Bill knew his patients—not just their names and their illnesses; he knew their dreams and hopes and problems and fears, their children and parents and cousins and aunts and uncles. He treated the person, not the symptoms, and was humble in his recognition of the limits of his skills. One of his patients, a young woman who was a college student and mother of three, wrote at the time of his death:

“The thing I loved about Dr. Bill was his complete honesty and the way he ministered to people. He always firmly reminded me to call if I was sick or if I needed reassurance. He was always reading new information and making checks with other doctors about my individual situation...He was truly a servant of God and will be remembered forever.”

Dr. Bill was in debt at the time of his death because he was a doctor, not a business man. He charged no fees for those who needed him and could not afford to pay, or he accepted payment in goods or services. Fresh-caught fish or painting his office were adequate exchanges for his skills. He once told the story of a patient whom he put on a diet. “But, Doctor Bill,” she said, “I can’t go on a diet. I’ve just baked a strawberry pie.” Dr. Bill took the strawberry pie as payment for his services, chuckling as he pointed out that everyone profited in that case.

Dr. Bill chose an area where medical services for people were scarce and hung out his shingle. Some thought his practice of making house calls would stop once he was established. However, during the four years he worked, he continued to call on the elderly and those he felt could not come to him.

One eighty year-old patient, who had been seriously ill, gave Dr. Bill a handmade quilt which he admired. Dr. Bill was so impressed with her workmanship that he got her to make quilts for sale to others. Even when her health and outlook improved, Dr. Bill still made his housecalls because “She was so interesting to talk to.”

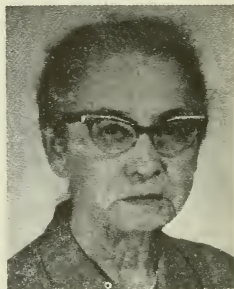
All of the events of Bill Levis' life were preludes to his becoming a doctor. He was an outstanding student, a Merit Scholar as he graduated from Roosevelt High School in Wyandotte, Michigan. Before his graduation, he had been an American Field Service exchange student to Tatui, Brazil. There he learned the joys of living in a small town and the warmth and love of a second family. His Brazilian family, Joachim and Therezinha da Silva-Camps and their sons, welcomed and loved Bill. He returned their love and felt that they were his "other" family. His sharing of his Brazilian experiences brought to his natural family and his community an understanding and affection for another country and other ways of life.

Bill attended college at Michigan State University, the University of Michigan, and the University of North Carolina. After he obtained his medical degree and moved to Swansboro, he met, courted, and married the Reverend Susan Padgett, a United Methodist minister. Dr. Bill and Reverend Susan worked together to help others. They complemented each other, and their own love was reflected and enlarged as they shared with those around them.

Bill Levis will be remembered by many as a truly good person. The problems he fought in life gave him insight into the problems of others and strength to help them. He is loved dearly by the family whom he has left behind: his wife, the Reverend Susan Levis; his father, William Walter Levis, Jr.; his mother, Dr. Rae M. Levis; his brother, Richard Arthur Levis; and his grandmother, Edith M. Stein.



SADIE FITZGERALD DOWNUM
1895-1978



It was always fun to visit Sadie Downum in her neat, modest, and comfortable home on Circle Drive in Beaufort. She was truly a "virtuous woman" (as spoken of in Proverbs) who built her home around her husband and children. Even in her advanced age, Sadie was keenly aware of the well-being of the members of her family wherever they were living and she always asked for prayer for those who were suffering.

Born in Davidson County near Linwood, North Carolina, on September 18, 1885 to John Burgess and Mary Fitzgerald, Sadie Mozelle Fitzgerald received her education at Spring Hope Academy. It was at that academy that she met her future husband—a school teacher named Edgar Wilson

Downum. They were married on June 5, 1907, at the Methodist parsonage in Nashville, North Carolina.

"Edgar," as Sadie always affectionately spoke of her husband, had felt a call to preach at the age of 18 but resisted this call for 14 years. They were living near Stedman, North Carolina, in 1920 when Mr. Downum felt such gratitude for healing from a serious illness that he could no longer resist. He joined the North Carolina Conference in 1922 at Raleigh when he was 37 years of age. Sadie and their four children, Will, Allen, Edwin and Lucille, lovingly served with Mr. Downum as they moved from charge to charge as assigned by the bishop. The charges they served were: Buckhorn Circuit, Old Dock, Scott's Hill, Garysburg, Straits, Belhaven, Murfreesboro, South Mills, Bridgeton, Wesley Memorial, Winter Park, Aurora, Pikeville, Grifton and Atlantic.

Having come from a little Methodist church near her home out of which has come nine ministers (most of whom were Sadie's brothers, nephews or grandnephews), Sadie was prepared to be the active church worker that she was. Often she played the piano for church services, and Mr. Downum expressed his gratitude for the inspiration and support of his loving wife.

Sadie continued to live in their retirement home after Mr. Downum's death in 1957 until January 1, 1978, when at age 92, she too, was called home to join her husband and other loved ones.

The Reverend Douglas L. Byrd, minister of Ann Street United Methodist Church in Beaufort, conducted her funeral service. As a boy Douglas was a member of Wesley Memorial Church in Wilmington where Mr. Downum served as minister. Douglas said he well remembers the special place the Downums won in the hearts of the people there. He stated of Mrs. Downum that "death is precious when it comes as a crowning touch of God upon a life of service in God's Kingdom here on earth."

Also participating in the funeral service was a former minister, the Reverend Robert L. Nicks, who quoted a remark made by Mrs. Downum's son. Will said, "Mother instructed us well and meant for us to do right."

Interment was in Ocean View Cemetery in Beaufort. Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Lucille DeBerry of Rocky Mount; sons, E. Wilfred Downum of Beaufort; Dr. Allen F. Downum of Edenton; and Edwin R. Downum of Richmond, Virginia; a sister, Mrs. R.D. Hope of Burlington; 10 grandchildren; 20 great-grandchildren.

DARLENE TEBEAU MERRIMAN
1941-1978

Darlene Tebeau Merriman, totally alive in both the physical and spiritual worlds, was at home and vitally involved in both of them. She was and is alive in very special ways known, or unknown now, to those who knew her here and loved her.

Darlene died February 3, 1978 in an automobile accident in Alamance County. She was the wife of David B. Merriman, pastor of Bethel United Methodist Church, Route 1, Graham, N.C. Funeral service was held at Bethel Church, February 5th, followed by burial at Woodlawn Memorial Park, Durham, N.C.

Darlene was born November 28, 1941 in Pittsburg, Pa. Following her marriage in 1962, four sons were born: Scott Blair (May 13, 1964 in Wellsville, N.Y.) who died at the age of eight in Durham, N.C.; Matthew William (October 3, 1966 in Morristown, N.J.); David Alexander (June 1, 1969 in Johnstown, Pa.); Marcus Raymond (November 9, 1970 in Bedford, Pa.)

She earned her B.S. in Education from the Indiana University of Pittsburg in 1967 and worked with the Cambia County Department of Social Service as a case worker in Johnstown for one year. After her husband's call to the ministry and the family's move to Durham, N.C., she served as N.C. Vice-President of the Parent's Advisory for the Head Start Program; worked as a Reading Assistant with the Durham County Schools; and did nurse's aid and other work in several hospitals.

Supportive of her husband's work in the local church and in response to her own personal commitment, she served as a member of the Church Choir and leader of children and youth in Sunday School and M.Y.F. activities. She was active in an Ecumenical and Prayer and Personal Growth Group in Burlington as well as Prayer Groups in her own church.

An exceptional writer of poetry, children's stories and fiction, Darlene was a member of the Burlington Writers' Club and the North Carolina Poetry Society. Her writing reflected her deep appreciation for her husband and each of her sons as well as awareness of herself as a part of the world community. In 1977 she began study at UNC-Greensboro in preparation for pursuing a Master's degree in the School of Fine Arts.

Surviving, in addition to her husband and their three sons, Matthew, David, and Marcus, are her mother, Mrs. Ralph Cornett; her father Allyn Tebeau, and her brother, Allyn Tebeau, Jr., all of Pittsburg, Pa.

It is difficult to comprehend the depth of maturity found in one whose life on the physical plane was cut short after thirty-six years. Persons of all ages—children, co-workers, fellow-writers, family, friends—whose life touched hers were recipients of her unspoken message saying to each person individually, “You are important to me, to God. Let’s share the overflow of life together.”

Children as well as adults responded to her evident honesty and loving awareness of them as persons. The sharing of herself was done with sincerity and willingness to risk, and always devoid of personal aggrandisement or judgemental antagonism.

Others experienced her maturity in many ways:

Over a cup of coffee, she met you on your own level whether you were an intellectual or spiritual giant or a person with one foot in the depth of despair and seemingly losing the will to climb out. She wanted for others what she wanted for herself—with God’s help, to reach individual maximum potential.

In working with others she could make judgment decisions with the clean precision of a surgeon’s knife and, still keeping an open mind, stand by those decisions until sincerely convinced otherwise.

With rare wit and humor she could laugh with others and with herself.

Intensely aware of the pain of the human condition and knowing and accepting herself, she could “be present” with another, give quality time in a one-to-one encounter.

A giving person, she could also graciously accept gifts from others—she was easy to give to.

Sensitive to the inner world of the Spirit, Darlene explored this path with an eager desire to grow into the fullness of God’s will for her life, within His purposed fulfillment for all of His creation. Totally believing in the lovingness of God who hears and answers prayer, she sought His will with wholesome zest, listened for guidance and willed to act upon it. The living Christ through His Holy Spirit was present with her.

Conscious also of the dark, she looked toward the Light, as expressed in her poem, “Grief.”

Why do you cry so?
I am here inside
Look in through the pain
Here I live in joy.

Darlene had a tremendous capacity for joy in her looking toward the Light. A recent poem included these lines:

I must go to get it done...
To catch the sun, to catch the sun,
I must go
to catch the sun.

Following Home Coming at the church, she told a friend, “Home Coming should be a gay happy time remembering those who have gone to heaven... Just to enjoy each other and the good food—and Boy, did we have good food! You know, all Sunday afternoon, I felt like joining hands with the kids to sing and dance and just be glad for this day and time.” Perhaps she expressed this and so much more in her poem, “Love’s-Go-Round.”

Bishop Robert M. Blackburn and the Reverend Clyde G. McCarver conducted a Service of Worship on March 8 in Trinity United Methodist Church, Troy, N.C. to celebrate Betty's joy in finding eternal rest. She was buried at Scotland Neck.

Early in their marriage, Mr. Johnson worked eagerly in service to God and his friends. He taught in the Sunday School at Mount Zion Methodist Church in the afternoon and served as Superintendent of the Sunday School at Plymouthn Christian Church in the morning. Mrs. Johnson supported and encouraged him in this intensive service to his Lord. When the call of God came to her husband to enter the ministry after the birth of their two children, Mrs. Johnson answered the call with him, sacrificing to help him through Trinity College.

In 1918 Mr. Johnson was admitted on trial by the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and given his first appointment. Together they accomplished numerous good works. The poor were a special concern of theirs. With these they shared their meager earthly goods.

Their chief goal was to lead the lost into a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. This they accomplished many times to the glory of God at Hatteras, Ellerbe, Fairmont, Biscoe, West End, Zebulon, Burgaw, Tabor City, and Roseboro, where she served with her husband.

In 1939 upon the retirement of her husband, she moved with him form Roseboro to their home in Raleigh. She continued to live in Raleigh after the death of her husband, March 9, 1944. From 1946 until 1967 Mrs. Johnson spent much of her time with her daughter and grandsons in Columbia, South Carolina. From 1967 until she entered the Methodist Retirement Home in Druham in 1975, she lived in Raleigh. Wherever she was, her life was given in service to her Lord and other people. She counted it a high privilege to serve in any capacity. She spent her latter days in joy and comfort in the Methodist Retirement Home where she received excellent care. During the second week of May 1978 she entered Duke Hospital and was called to her Heavenly Home in the joy of the Lord on May 13, 1978.

Since the pastor of her home church, the Reverend W.M. Jeffries, was away at that time attending the Duke Divinity School Seminar in Mexico, the Reverend John C. Andrews, pastor of Hollands United Methodist Church, conducted her funeral in the Mount Zion United Methodist Church. He was assisted by the Reverend Bewie Shaver, pastor of Flat Springs

Baptist Church. She was laid to rest beside her husband in the Mount Zion Church Cemetery.

For eighty six years and nineteen days, Willafred Howe Wellons lived the life that inspired her children to have placed on her tombstone, "She Lived Love." Her life began in Knoxville, Tennessee, on 6 December 1890 and in the earthly sense was completed in the Health Care Center of the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, N.C. on Christmas Day 1976. Her life spanned two continents and many situations, in all of which her commitment to Christ and her desire to serve God's children formed the primary points of her way of living.

She grew up in Bloomington, Indiana, and went to public schools there. She graduated from Indiana University, in Bloomington, and taught there for a period. She and Dr. Ralph D. Wellons were married in Bloomington on August 18, 1914. More than half of their working years together were spent in missionary service in Lucknow, India, where Lucknow Christian College was their area of service.

After more than twenty-six years of missionary service, Dr. and Mrs. Wellons returned to the United States for health reasons. In 1942 they went to Pembroke, N.C., and spent fourteen years in outstanding service there, where Dr. Wellons was president of what was then Pembroke State College, now Pembroke State University. A second "retirement" led them to Winter Park, Florida, where Dr. Wellons was associate pastor of First United Methodist Church and Mrs. Wellons taught a Sunday School class of young couples. Their third "retirement" in 1964 brought them to the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, N.C., where Dr. Wellons died in 1974.

Mrs. Wellons is survived by three children: Alfred E. Wellons, New Bern, N.C.; Mrs. Rebecca W. Rissmiller, Matawan, N.J.; Mrs. Janet W. Smith, Durham, N.C.; and nine grandchildren.

Always related to the Methodist church of the community where they lived, she was in Durham a member of Duke Memorial Methodist Church. The matter of "she lived love" took her into many sorts of church and community work, always with the thought of serving God and of aiding His children by her life and work.

Willafred Wellons is a beautiful example of a person whose will to serve overcame bodily weakness and illness. Physicians and surgeons in India and the United States, as far back as 1922 and 1923, assured her family that she would not survive for another year. It could almost be said of her that death had to wait until she had attended to all the things which she felt God had given her to do. In that spirit, quietly and peacefully on Christmas Day 1976, she breathed her last. So ended the wonderful days of a superlatively fine Christian witness, wife, mother, church member, citizen.

Her funeral service was held in Durham, N.C., on 28 December, 1976, by the pastor of Duke Memorial Church, Edward F. Smith, who was also her son-in-law. Her body was buried in Maplewood Cemetery, Durham, N.C., beside the body of her husband. One of her favorite poems, based on I Corinthians 13:12, was read at her service and is a fitting conclusion to this tribute:

My life is but a weaving, between my Lord and me;
I cannot choose the colors He worketh steadily.
Oft times He weaveth sorrow, and I in foolish pride,
Forget He sees the upper, and I, the underside.

Not till the loom is silent, and the shuttles cease to fly,
Shall God unroll the canvas and explain the reason why
The dark threads are as needful in the Weaver's skillful hand
As the threads of gold and silver in the pattern He has planned.

Group A—Agency Reports

The Committee on Church Architecture

The Annual Conference Committee on Church Architecture is established to be of service to local churches. Churches planning to begin a building project or needing to evaluate the need for a possible building project are encouraged to ask the committee for assistance.

The committee cooperates with the District Boards of Church Location and Building in developing procedures and requirements for building programs. Members of the committee are prepared to offer education about the essential steps involved in a building project: discovering needs, developing a program, creating a design, and execution of contract documents.

Membership of the committee includes the District Superintendents, representatives of the Conference Agencies, ministers, architects, and laypersons interested in the building process and church architecture. To encourage innovative design, the Randolph E. DuMont Design Awards program was established with awards made annually in our conference and the Western Congregation in the Rocky Mount District for the design of their sanctuary.

Each year a joint meeting is held with the Western N.C. Conference Committee to offer education and enrichment to the members of the committees and invited guests. At this year's annual meeting held at Duke University Divinity School the guest speaker was Mr. Frank Kacmarcik a noted Liturgical Designer for St. Paul, Minnesota who has worked with some of the best architects in the country developing innovative facilities for worship.

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Whenever local congregations become involved in planning new construction or renovation programs, they are encouraged to turn to the Conference Committee for assistance.

The Division of Church and Society

Bishop Blackburn, Members of the N.C. Conference, Lay Delegates, and Guests:

The Division of Church and Society respectfully reports a year of learning, studying, voting, writing, re-writing, and or voting as we endeavored to carry out the resolution passed by this conference last year instructing us to present our concerns in position papers rather than resolutions. Briefly, our purpose was this: at our fall meeting we met first in plenary session where everyone participated in identifying the pressing social issues in this conference and then we divided into our three committees of world peace, human relations and general welfare where these

issues were prioritized. Following that, the total division came together to review and hear reports from each committee and then voted their approval of the two top-priority issues presented by the individual committees. After agreeing on the concerns on which position papers would be developed, we worked through a process that would assure that the position taken was one on which the full membership had a voice and a definite consensus was voted. The committees themselves selected the writers, did the rough draft, and mailed out each paper to the total division for suggested revisions and comments. When the papers were returned to the committees, they were reworked and brought to the executive committee for further rewriting and finally reviewed by the full division in February and approved and released. I say all this to assure you that the position papers you have read in our Book of Resolutions are the work of the full division and that collectively we have shared our position on these sensitive issues as best we can. We have not attempted to speak for the conference or the church and we have been careful to carry out the instructions our Discipline gives to Church and Society "to identify issues of social concern and to suggest lines of Christian action" and "to promote the Social Principles of The United Methodist Church". We are not asking for you to vote on our positions; rather, we are presenting them for your information.

Following last year's session, the conference secretary sent our resolution concerning the imprisonment of persons convicted of misdemeanor offenses back to our division for further consideration. During our fall meeting this resolution was returned to the committee originating it and it was not voted as a top-priority concern and was therefore tabled.

Perhaps a good way to review our year's work for you would be to break down our budget and explain how we have used the funds allocated to the division. In 1977 our budget was almost \$8,500 and for the current year it is \$9,000. and in both years the first \$5,000 has gone for our support of the Yokefellow Prison Ministry in the state. Since we are the major agency of the church involved in prison ministries, we feel it is imperative that we give our energies, resources, and full support toward visiting those in prison and giving them visible evidence that United Methodists care; and to this end we have made the initiating of a new Yokefellow program or the participating in an existing one a major program recommendation to the districts this year. A member of our division attends monthly meetings of the board of Yokefellow and keeps us well informed.

Of the remaining less than half of our budget, one thousand dollars was allocated to funding the two full division meetings of the year where we worked on our position papers as well as our program recommendations. Another one thousand dollars was used for training sessions and seminars. Last August we had eight members of the division attending the Southeastern Jurisdiction Briefing Conference at Junaluska and in the Fall we had delegates at a workshop on ERA in Nashville and at a seminar on "The Church's Responsibility in the Changing Southern Economy" at Junaluska. And since we are affiliated with the State Council for Social Legislation in this state and participate fully in its activities, we also send

four voting delegates to its annual meeting and one representative to its study committee sessions. Another thousand dollars is earmarked for programming assistance - - - to help defray expenses of speakers or materials, etc., for districts who carry out our program recommendations of conducting legislative seminars or initiating Yokefellow ministries. Out of the remaining part of our budget we gave two scholarships to the Adult Study Tour, assisted the youth with expenses for their program called "LASER: Legislative Affairs-Study, Explore, Respond", paid dues to the State Council for Social Legislation and the coalition of North Carolinians United for ERA, and subscribed to IMPACT and The Raleigh Report - - two valuable pieces of information relative to national and state legislative concerns - - for each member of the division.

One of our most significant activities of the year is operated so as to cost the conference nothing but is invaluable in its educational and community-building qualities. It is our conference-approved program recommendation known as The Adult Study Tour to New York and Washington, D.C., where 38 people from our conference participated in the United Nations Seminars on National and International Affairs, a program opportunity of the United Methodist Church sponsored by The Women's Division and the Board of Church and Society. This year our theme was "Our Neighbors to the South" and we heard a variety of specialists from Latin American countries discuss the canal treaties, textiles, energy and problems we share. Because our days at the United Nations coincided with the big coal strike and the peace overtures in the Middle East, we were able to hear experts in these fields too. As one of our young scholarship recipients wrote in her moving thank-you letter, "No one could come home from such an experience without enlarged vision, more understanding of our role in our problems, and a greater appreciation of our heritage in our church". I think we brought home 38 people who shared her evaluation and I consider that a pretty good year's work. We invite you to join us on the tour next year.

Committee on Communications

One of my responsibilities as the Coordinator of Communication on the Conference Council on Ministries staff is to serve as a liaison between the news media in eastern North Carolina and the conference. There are approximately 230 news outlets-radio stations, television stations and newspapers-within the bounds of our conference. I am continuing to develop relationships and contacts with these news media personnel and I am pleased to report again this year that we generally get--in my opinion--good coverage of the conference and the activity of United Methodists.

I write and send out news stories on many of our conference events--of-

ten localizing the story for a particular individual or a community. The subjects of these stories range from curriculum workshops to ministerial appointments and from softball team champions to grants for parsonages for ethnic minority ministers.

In addition to reporting on conference activities, I often rewrite stories from our national United Methodist news service if they have relevance here. For example, this year I have covered the Joan Little case, the boycott of J.P. Stevens products, and most recently, the fate of our missionaries in Zaire.

In addition to writing for the secular press, I send numerous stories to our conference newspaper, *The North Carolina Christian Advocate*. I am] most appreciative of the cooperation of Al Simonton and his staff.

During the past year I have also assisted in news coverage and public relations for two ecumenical groups--the North Carolina council of Churches and the Good News North Carolina Bible Celebration.

One of the common concerns I hear as I visit newspaper offices is their lack of local church news. This is an area in which I cannot work, and so I would challenge you lay members and ministers to work at this.

The editor of the *Circuit Rider* magazine, Richard Peck, had an interesting editorial about this very subject recently. He said,

"If church paper editors have strange ideas about news, it's because we taught them. We grind out the releases about a superintendent's visits, but we never prepare releases about what he or she said. We assume announcements are more important than ideas or beliefs." He goes on to criticize us for our refusal to "report the substance of sermons, the application of the faith to social issues, or significant stories of a congregation's ministry to the community."

I hope this is a challenge to many of you.

I enjoy my work very much. To me it is a ministry--a supportive ministry to those United Methodist who read about themselves in the papers or hear about themselves or their church on radio or television; and a witness to other Christians, as well as the unchurched, that United Methodists are doing something--and are putting their faith into action.

METHODIST MINISTERS CREDIT UNION

The writer of Ecclesiastes confidently proclaims, "there is no new thing under the sun." And yet, the next word begins a question, "Is there a thing whereof it may be said, See, this is new?"

In this report we will tell you some of the new things in our Credit Union as well as update some of the old things.

New is a 6% Deposit Account available to churches only. This is 3/4% higher than other insured savings institutions are permitted to pay on "passbook type" savings accounts. When compounded quarterly, this amounts to about \$7.50 more per thousand per year. Deposits may be

withdrawn on the first of any calendar month after the account has been open for one quarter, without loss of interest or incurring any penalty. This rate is guaranteed. It cannot be decreased until ninety days after we have mailed to the church a written notice of proposed change in rate. We invite you to get your church to participate in this program. Any organization or agency of your church can participate, beginning with as little as one hundred dollars. Is it wise to lose this extra profit? The maximum aggregate amount permitted in this type account is limited to \$225,000.00.

New, too, is a Promissory Note program. This is available to churches and laypersons at a negotiated rate of interest for a specified time, with interest paid at maturity. These notes are not covered by share and deposit guaranty insurance, but such loans have the entire assets of the credit union pledged as security. The total amount borrowed under this program, along with the deposit program offered to churches only, cannot exceed \$225,000.00.

Another new thing is semi-annual dividends. Dividends will be declared on June 30 and December 31, at a rate to be announced.

Perhaps the most significant new thing to come to our credit union this year is the provision for continuing education of staff. Your treasurer was sent to the University of Florida for an intensive period of study in the field of Family Financial Counseling. In August John Mitchell will go to the University of Georgia for the Regional Credit Union School for two weeks. These learning experiences will strengthen the services of our credit union through the years.

Now for an update on the things that are not new. Delinquency in loan payments is not new to us, but it has improved. This is not a reason to be satisfied. We must press on until we wipe it out. It is not a problem reserved for those on low salary. It makes its home at times with those in the \$20,000.00 plus range. Like sin, it is no respecter of persons or income. We plead with those who have problems in meeting their payment schedule to contact us so a solution can be worked out without hurt to anyone.

Delinquency not only hurts the delinquent; it hurts every credit union member. It can be devastating to the credit union if not controlled. Under new regulations issued by the Credit Union Division of the State of North Carolina, delinquent loans may stop the payment of dividends on shares under certain conditions. Now you see why we must control and blot out this practice. The borrower bears the responsibility of notifying the credit union of any problems that arise before their account becomes delinquent. In this way they can avoid a damaged credit rating.

The Estate Loan plan is not new, but it has changed since the last report to you. Estate Loans now bear 9% APR interest. They are still one of the biggest bonanzas one can find in the savings field. The member borrows \$2,000.00 and buys shares with the loan. The shares earn dividends and life insurance. The last dividend paid was at 5 1/4% per annum. If the borrower is under 55 years of age, the life insurance in force is \$2,000.00, with a double indemnity rider that doubles the insurance paid when death is by accident. There is also a \$2,000.00 accidental loss of sight and dismemberment of hands and feet rider. These accidental riders cease at age 65, but the basic life coverage does not cease or decrease.

The credit union actually pays you a profit to take this package of protection. You would earn \$335.13 in dividends at 5 1/4% compounded semi-annually. You would pay \$289.24 in interest at 9- APR over a period of thirty-six months with monthly payments of \$63.59. This gives you a profit of \$45.89, plus the security you have provided your family through the Estate Loan.

The life insurance is available to those between 55 and 70, but it is on less than dollar for dollar ratio.

The number of new members is 116 this conference year, up from 96 reported last year.

Last year we reported a growth in assets of \$215,866.21. This was made possible by a \$143,000.00 increase in borrowed money, leaving a net growth of \$72,866.21. This year we report a growth of \$128,944.99, while decreasing our borrowed funds by \$21,000.00. This is an indication of good health for our credit union.

Significant areas of growth revealed in the comparative balance sheet below are indicated by the following percentages:

Assets, 11.66% - Loans, 11.44% - Shares, 14.46% - Deposits, 21.07%.

Reserves, 16.09% - and a decrease of 8.16% in borrowed money.

The Committee on District Conference Records report to 1978 Annual Conference. The Committee has examined the district conference records and all twelve Districts Records were accounted for.

We examined the records in accordance with the guidelines in the 1977 Journal of the N.C. Annual Conference on page 239. Generally speaking we found all the record books in compliance with the guidelines with the exception that half of them did not contain the District Superintendents report on the State of the District. The committee feels that this report is essential and should be a part of the reports at each District Conference and therefore a part of the District Conference Record.

We recomend these continuing guidelines:

1. Official binders be used.
2. The most current reports be placed in the front of the binder, that visible tabs be used to designate years, and that no more than 4-6 years be in the binder.
3. The following records be included:
 - a. Minutes of the District Conference
 - b. The District superintendents state of the District report
 - c. An attendance record reporting the number present from each charge as well as the totals of laity and clergy present.
 - d. A book of reports presented to the District Conference
4. District Conference records beyond 6 years be placed in the repository of the Conference Commission on Archives and history.

Composite Report of the District Superintendents

I have always felt frustrated when I had to make the pastor's report to the Charge Conference, for it is an impossible task to give a brief report on what the church has done during an entire year and at the same time cover all that needed to be reported. It is an even more impossible task to make a report for the entire conference, but this is what I have been asked to do. I am trying to report for all twelve districts of our conference, but since this can not be done in full, I hope that you will read the report of each district superintendent which will appear in our Conference Journal that you will receive sometime in the future.

So much pessimism is expressed to day about the church. Maybe we are guilty of the short term view. I began to think about the United Methodist Church and how far it has come in every area since I was a boy. I was born in the bedroom of a Methodist parsonage and have known and loved our church all my life. Many changes have taken place and there has been great growth in every area of our church's life. I remember sitting beside my daddy one year at conference when the bishop read the appointments. It was his fourth year and I knew that by the law of the church we would be moving, but I did not know where and neither did he. There was great suspense as the bishop began to read, and I could hear a groan here, a sigh there, and I could see some tears as well as a few broad smiles. Out of the corner of my eye I watched my daddy to see how he reacted when his name was read, and when that time came there was no change of expression but he patted me on the knee, and I was assured. There was no great raise in salary, but at least we would eat for another year.

I got out an old Journal of the year of my birth and I think that some of the changes that have taken place between that year and now will be of interest. Let me note a few.

(1) There were 258 ministerial members of the conference when I was born and there are 751 today.

(2) There were 226 pastoral charges then and 535 today with nine districts in that great year and today there are twelve.

(3) Church membership was 107,497 compared to 211,763.

(4) We had 90,220 in our Church School and today we have 107,480.

(5) Three ministers were received into full connection at Annual Conference then and though I am not certain of the exact number that will be received, I am told that it will be thirty eight.

(6) There were 772 local churches then and 849 today.

(7) The grand total of money raised was \$1,774,458 and last year we raised \$23,641,221.

(8) Finally, it is interesting to note that they met from Wednesday to Monday and began each day at 9:00 a.m., and finished the day's business at noon. With a closed cabinet it probably took more time on the outside trying to figure out the appointments.

Our conference has almost doubled in membership in my life time and I am optimistic about our future. Let us look now at some of the things we did this past year.

STEWARDSHIP: We had 432 charges that accepted and paid all of the Single Figure Askings. Total money raised for all causes was up \$2,282,466 over last year. Our churches pledged \$488,776 to North Carolina Wesleyan College to be paid over a three-year period and have paid \$450,218. Our benevolent giving is up significantly over last year and we had over a 10% increase in membership in the Ten Dollar Club.

LAITY: There was an increase in the attendance at the January Workshops with an attendance of 3,461. The Laity Rallies still draw large numbers, as over 6,000 attended the twelve held this year. The attendance at the annual meeting of United Methodist Women reached an all-time high with over 850 registering for the two-day meeting.

BUILDINGS AND IMPROVEMENTS: There were twenty-two church buildings under construction during the year and five parsonages were built. Fifteen church buildings were dedicated and five parsonages. Our church people spent \$3,128,465 for this fund last year which represents an increase of \$626,229 over the year before. The reports of the District Superintendents will list all of these buildings programs.

RETIREMENT HOME: Wesley Pines Methodist Retirement Home in Lumberton opened its doors on April 1, 1977. There are now twenty-five persons in residence with the number increasing each week. An infirmary with thirty-six beds was to open this spring.

COLLEGES: The enrollment in our colleges continues to grow. For the year 1977-1978 our Methodist colleges showed the following growth: Louisburg 2.5%. Methodist 9.2%, North Carolina Wesleyan 20.2%, Greensboro 9% and the report from High Point was not available.

SPECIAL MINISTRIES: The work of our churches shows much imagination and thought as we have many special ministries. The reports of the District Superintendents will list many, but let me lift up just a few. In the New Bern area the Bogue Banks Ministry ministers to seamen coming into the port during the year and to all during the summer; Walnut Terrace Day Care Center in Raleigh offers much needed service to children of working parents; Page Memorial United Methodist Church in Aberdeen is sponsoring an outpost church which will soon become an organized church; the churches of Fayetteville committed \$10,000 for 1978 to the Fayette-

teville Urban Ministry; the Raleigh Board of Missions is engaged in land acquisition for sites for future new churches; and the New Hope Church, Goldsboro, offers a ministry to carnival workers during fair week.

EVANGELISM: Our churches received 8,187 members during the year and lost 8,067 for a net gain of 120. Of our churches 376 showed a gain, 370 showed a loss in membership, and 200 were barren as they did not receive a new member into their membership during the entire year. If you will study the figures, you can see that it took 1,766 Methodist to gain just one new member during an entire year. I do not have the figures for 1977, as they are not available yet, but in the year 1976 our conference was one of only fourteen conferences of the seventy-three conferences in Methodism that showed a gain. We might try to find consolation here but there is not much comfort to be found. We see some churches in expanding neighborhoods growing rapidly, and we ministers, who are not so lucky, tend to excuse ourselves for barren churches or loss of membership by pointing out that there is no growth where we live. We plead that we are not in a growing community or are even in a declining area. I have probably used the same excuse during some bad years and it sounds valid.

I mentioned in the beginning of this report that I was born in a Methodist parsonage. I have, therefore, been to Sunday School and church all my life. What went on in the outside world between the hours of 9:30 in the morning and noon on Sunday was foreign to me. Since I have been a district superintendent I am riding most Sunday mornings during the Sunday School hour to some church in my district and I have had my eyes opened. In every church in my district I find people in shouting distance of the church mowing grass, washing cars, sitting on the porch, playing in the yard, etc.. I have come to know that there are communities that are not growing but there is no area that is even near to being fully church-ed.

Somehow all of us, ministers and laity alike, must find the consuming passion for souls that drove John Wesley and his early followers to seek out the unchurched and invite them to come with us to Christ. It is not enough to open doors and hope they will come but we must seek them wherever they are and bring them in.

I heard a minister - I do not recall his name - say at Lake Junaluska that after the assassination of President Kennedy he later learned that at one time Lee Harvey Oswald had live within two blocks of his church. He went back and searched all the records at the church and could not find that anyone in his church had ever visited this man and invited him to the church. What a difference there could have been in the history of our nation had someone led Oswald to Christ.

Who lives near your church that needs Christ? You will never know unless you go and seek them out.

Finally, we all know what Francis Asbury meant to our church. He is known as "The Prophet of the Long Road." He had a passion for souls and even though he had only four or five years of formal education, he brought people to Christ and into the Methodist Church through complete dedication and hard work. In the forty-five years of his itinerent ministry in the United States he rode over 275,000 on horseback from Maine to Georgia and back time and time again. Those early Methodist ministers caught his enthusiasm and our church grew by leaps and bounds.

Our own bishop, Robert M. Blackburn, crosses and recrosses our conference with the same dedication and enthusiasm. It would be interesting to know how many miles he has traveled in service of our church in the six years he has been with us. At cabinet meetings we always have as the last item of business a look at his schedule so that we will know at all times where he is if he is needed. I always leave the meetings thankful that I do not have his schedule as he has almost every day and hour of the week filled, including many Saturdays. On most Sundays he has two or three appointments from the Outer Banks to the other extremes of our conference. I feel that he has the same passion for souls that our early leaders had. My prayer is that each of the 221,000 United Methodist laypersons and the 751 pastors of our conference might here and now determine we will emulate him and our church forefathers in the year and years that lay ahead. Our church not only has a great past but can have a brilliant future. Are you willing to be a part of it?

Burlington District

As we come to the end of our fifth year as Superintendent of The Burlington District and the close of my active ministry in the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church I find much to give me satisfaction especially during the 1977-1978 Conference year.

The most outstanding event in which I have had a part has been "Operation Understanding" which was conducted by our district and participated in by forty-five of the forty-six Charges of the District. This program was conducted by our District in April of 1978 under the leadership of our Missionary Secretaries in cooperation with the General Agencies of The United Methodist Church. Nine outstanding leaders from the General Level of our Church spent nearly four days in the bounds of our District helping the membership of our local churches become familiar with the program of our church. Informal meetings were held giving our people the opportunity to ask questions and gain information. Discussions were held in Worship Service Hours, Church School, Coffee Hours, Dinners, and other planned occasions. Church Leaders received answers to many questions. The nine General Church Leaders expressed much satisfaction for the excellent planning which had been done and the execution of those plans. We express our appreciation to the lay people, Pastors under the superb leadership of Clay Smith and Jesse Bone.

MEMBERSHIP: The record for 1977 will indicate that the Burlington District remained in the list of Districts of the Conference with a net increase in membership for this year. However, we regret that the increase was rather small.

FINANCE: This year as has been the case for the last five, the Burlington District Churches accepted a larger percentage of the Single Figure Apportionment and all other apportionments, moving from 86% in 1973 to 97.8% in 1977. We were second in the Conference in percentage of acceptance.

BUILDING: During 1977 the following churches completed building programs. Front Street Church, Clover Garden Church on the Whitney Cross Charge, and Prospect on the Yanceyville Charge. The following churches are now in the planning or building stage of a church building program: Bethel on the Burlington Charge, Bethel on the Cobb Charge, Friendship, New Hope on the New Hope-Purley Charge, Saint Luke Church. Haw River Church is in the planning stage for an addition to the parsonage. Cedar Cliff has completed payment on its building and will dedicate its building in the near future.

Again we wish to express our appreciation to the large number of local church members who followed the superb leadership of the forty-eight ministers appointed to their churches during the past year.

A special word of gratitude should be given to the Retired Ministers of the District who have given outstanding service: C.J. Andrews, E.B. Fisher, W.M. Howard, Jr., J.F. Minnis, R.E.L. Moser, J.D. Stott, P.F. Newton, S.J. Starnes, T.J. Whitehead, A.P. Brantley and J.H. Lanning.

Last but by no means least, we wish to express our gratitude for Mrs. Harriet Wilson and the United Methodist Women and and the United Methodist Men under the leadership of Harvey Mitchell. These are they who make our church the force for good in our world.

Blessings upon you for what you are and what you have done.

Fayetteville District

The following is the report of the 49 pastors and 18,074 lay persons of the Fayetteville District for the year, 1977.

MEMBERSHIP: Net gain in membership for the year was 156. 393 members were received on profession of faith and 140 were removed by death. 297 members were received from other United Methodist Churches and 242 were removed to other United Methodist Churches. 186 were received from other denominations, and 187 were lost to other denominations. 141 were removed by Charge Conference action or withdrawn.

FINANCES: The Fayetteville District, with the exception of one church, paid its financial obligations accepted for 1977 in full. 99.79% of the acceptance for the year was paid. In the fall Charge Conferences, the percentage of acceptance on various askings for 1978 was: Single Figure--93.3%, Ministerial Education Fund--81.3%, In-

terdenominational Cooperation--59.7%, Black Colleges--52.2%, Missional Priorities--77.2%, and Lake Junaluska--66.1%. A number of churches had outstanding success with the "Pony Express" plan, and several of them oversubscribed their budgets.

BUILDINGS AND IMPROVEMENTS: Building and renovations this year include: Mt. Moriah (sanctuary renovation completed), McGee on the Clinton Circuit (sanctuary renovation in progress), Fayetteville: Trinity (first unit in progress). A new parsonage has been purchased for the Haymount associate pastor.

Dedications have been held for the new fellowship hall at Tabor, Hall's Church on South River Charge, Calvary Church in Fayetteville, the renovation of Beulah Church on the Salemburg Charge, and the parsonage at Grace Church in Clinton.

Groundbreaking was held for the first unit of Fayetteville: Trinity and the Haymount educational unit.

PROGRAMS: Mission Festivals and Lay Speaker Training programs were held in each of the three sub-districts. A successful "No Silent Pulpits" program was approved by lay speakers during Lent. At the fall Charge Conferences churches in the district committed \$9,980 to Fayetteville Urban Ministry and \$930 to a new Native American Ministry in the district for 1978. United Methodist Women pledged \$17,500 to missions plus \$1500 in second-mile giving to Harnett County Church and missionary salary support. In the N. C. Christian Advocate campaign, the Fayetteville District led the conference in new subscriptions.

A first for the district was the appointment of a Campus Minister, Paul Granger, to Methodist College in June.

I am grateful for the opportunity of serving with the Fayetteville District team in 1977 and for the dedication of laity and clergy which has made this report possible.

Goldsboro District

It is with real excitement that I make my fourth report for the fifty-eight dedicated ministers and the 14,880 loyal laypersons of the Goldsboro District for 1977. We did know heartache as three ministers in the district died: J. Hillary Bryant, David W. Charlton and Cicero R. Etheridge. They served our church well and will be greatly missed.

SPECIAL MINISTRIES - Our churches serve well the members of the local church, but their work and influence is felt in the community, the nation, and around the world. We are involved in leading worship services in rest homes and in a state hospital, in sponsoring scout and brownie troops, meals on wheels, mother's day out, yokefellow, tape ministries, etc., but we have some programs that are unusual. New Hope Church in Goldsboro offers a ministry to carnival workers during the week of the county fair. The Rose Hill Church has day camping for the mentally retarded and Whitley Memorial Church in Smithfield has a Vacation Church School for he retarded.

MEMBERSHIP - Our district has shown a net gain in membership for the first time in four years. For the last three years we have taken in many members, but always there has been a large number taken off the rolls by action of the Charge Conference, as the ministers have made an effort to get rolls correct. As a result we have shown a net loss. We received 230 on Confession of Faith and 370 by transfer. We still removed 64 by action of the Charge Conference but showed a net gain of 20. We are working hard in the area of evangelism and hope that next year we will have an even greater gain.

BUILDING PROGRAMS AND DEDICATION - Our district raised \$507,751 this year on buildings and improvements. Jefferson built a new parsonage at a cost of \$50,000. Bishop Blackburn dedicated the St. Luke Church in Goldsboro. Roness Chapel built an education building that cost \$96,000. On the same Sunday Bishop Blackburn dedicated the Pine Level Church, which cost \$75,000 and rededicated the Pine Forest Church which had been renovated. St. Paul Church in Goldsboro bought a parsonage for the associate minister at a cost of \$39,000 and Mt. Olive: First bought a parsonage at a cost of \$68,000. Antioch Church built an education building at a cost of \$40,000 and Faison, one that cost \$92,000. Bishop Blackburn dedicated the Trinity parsonage. LaGrange spent \$60,000 in the renovation of their sanctuary and Daniels Memorial in Goldsboro spent \$116,000 as they also renovated their sanctuary. Benson renovated their parsonage at a cost of \$13,000, and Institute spent \$5,000 on their parsonage.

FINANCES - For the eighth straight year the Goldsboro District has paid 100% of its acceptance on Single Figure but this year we paid 100% of the askings. This indicates the dedication of the ministers and laypersons in our district. In addition we accepted for Ministerial Education 83%, Interdenominational Cooperation 45%, Black Colleges 63%, Missional Priorities 90%, and for Lake Junaluska 80%. Each of these represents an increase over last year.

APPRECIATION - The work for Christ and His Church that is being continued in the Goldsboro District reflects the fine ministerial leadership that we have. The report in no way attempts to show all that they do, nor can it. I count it a great privilege to work with each of them. It is also obvious that the lay people are devout Christians and loyal to the United Methodist Church. They always seem to be willing to go the second mile. We offer a special work of thanks to our very able District Lay Leader, Mr. Jimmy Davis, to the president of the United Methodist Women, Mrs. Edith Holloman, and the the president of the United Methodist Youth, Mr. Harrell Overman, and to our District Council on Ministries. Finally we would thank Mr. C. Jack Houser who has served as district treasurer for ten years.

New Bern District

The report of the New Bern District is made with the realization that it is the record of each minister and layperson involved in Ministry in 67 local congregations. Further, it is made with a prayer of Thanksgiving to Almighty God for His countless blessings and the response of 16,292 United Methodist laypersons and all the ministers.

EVANGELISM: I am pleased to report that 1977 brought growth in church membership. The total number received in all categories was 670 and total number removed was 548. Thus, our net gain was 122. The highlight is the number received on Profession of Faith--265. We still need to seek out those who have made no commitment to Jesus Christ and bring them into the Fellowship of the Redeemed.

CHURCH SCHOOL: Total Church School Membership decreased as well as average attendance. This causes great concern and points up the need for us to do some serious soul searching and a renewed dedication to the cause of Christian Education. There must be an answer as to the cause for enrollment and attendance decrease, while church membership continues to grow.

STEWARDSHIP: Growth has been evident as indicated by the Acceptance and Payment of Single Figure Apportionment and other causes in the program of our church. However, there are too many charges that fail to Accept and pay the Fair Share. Each charge should make an effort to respond to all causes.

LAY LIFE AND WORK: The lay people of the district respond in a great way to the Lay Rally and the January Workshops. There is a very real desire on the part of our lay people to equip themselves for their particular responsibility.

BUILDING PROGRAMS: Harkers Island has completed a very extensive renovation program that involved both the sanctuary and educational building. Swansboro and Northwoods Jacksonville will soon start constructing new parsonages.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN: The women of the district continue to be very actively involved in the program on the Local, District and General church level. Their Mission Pledge continue to increase, as does the number participating in their many activities. Their Sub-District and District meetings are well planned and designed to be of help to the Local Unit.

UNITED METHODIST YOUTH: District Rallies, Sub-District meetings and meetings of local groups keep the youth very much involved in the life of the church.

This report reflects the work of the pastors and Lay persons in the Raleigh District.

MEMBERSHIP - During the 1977 calendar year, 1,500 members were received into our churches, with 409 of these coming by Profession of Faith. The total church membership for the District on December 31,

Faith. The total church membership for the District on December 31, 1977, was 28,416. This represents an increase of 340 members for the year.

The District Conference this year was highlighted by an Evangelism Seminar.

FINANCES - During this period the churches of the District paid 100% of their Single Figure Acceptance, for a total of \$537,261. The following amounts were raised for some of our other important causes: N.C. Wesleyan College, \$12,597; General and conference Advance Specials, \$38,112; and Ministerial Education \$23,623.

BUILDING PROJECTS AND IMPROVEMENTS - White Plains consecrated a beautiful new sanctuary; a new educational unit was completed at Macedonia; a new educational unit was begun at Providence Church. Wake Forest purchased land for future expansion and Wendell has a site for a new parsonage.

LAY LIFE AND WORK -The District Lay Rally was highly successful and inspirational. Approximately 600 were in attendance. Three scholarships for higher education were granted to the youth of the District from funds received at the Lay Rally. The Raleigh District Lay Retreat continues to be a highlight in the work of our Methodist Men. The United Methodist Women are an inspiration to all of us. I offer a special word of thanks to Mrs. E. G. Craig, President of our United Methodist Women; Bruce Hargrove, District Lay Leader; Hal Thompson, our Trustee Chairperson, and to all who have given so generously of their time and talents.

EVANGELISM: Church growth and development are at the very top of our lot of priorities in the District. In 1977, we had a net increase of 22.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN: Mrs. George Briley completed a very successful tenure as President of the Rockingham District United Methodist Women and has been elected to a Conference office. Three sub-districts are organized and functioning well. Under the able leadership of Mrs. J. A. Garner, we anticipate continued growth in the work of these lovely ladies of the Rockingham District.

UNITED METHODIST YOUTH: Our District Youth Council has been re-organized and has sponsored a District Rally and a District Retreat. Appreciation for this and more must be expressed to Miss Julia Henry, President, Robert Atchley, Coordinator, and a host of others who are also involved.

Several of our charges and their pastors can be cited for outstanding achievements. Among them are: Cordova, Jeff Davis; Fellowship, Brooks Patten; Laurel Hill, Bob Warren; Laurinburg: First, Troy Barrett; St. Luke, Jim Lee; Prospect, Harvey Lowry; Rockingham: West, Lee Phillips; Zion, David Harvin; St. John-Gibson, Ruth Harper; Snead's

Grove, Rob Atchley, and others too modest to report their outstanding work.

The District has been well organized with A. P. Hill, Jr., serving as Chairperson of the Council on Ministries, Herman Winberry, Chairperson of the Committee on Ordained Ministry, and Jim Lee, Supervising Pastor and Secretary of everything. To these and to all the ministers and laypersons of the Rockingham District, gratitude is expressed for good work and good fellowship in the church of Jesus Christ. AMEN.

Rocky Mount District

This report is the report of 18,430 Methodist of the Rocky Mount District and of their 53 pastors. They are to be commended for their dedication and for the fruits of their prayers and labors.

BUILDINGS - A new sanctuary was completed and occupied at Pinetops at a cost of \$241,535; the parsonage was remodeled at Roanoke Rapids: First Church at a cost of \$40,000 and the parsonage at Jackson on the Northampton Charge was remodeled at the cost of \$16,000.

EVANGELISM - The total membership of the District is 18,430. There were 227 additions to the churches on Profession of Faith, 212 from other United Methodist churches, and 138 from other denominations. There was a loss of membership of 722, making a net loss of 145.

THE LAITY - Our special commendation goes to John J. Ferebee, District Lay Leader for his excellent leadership in planning an outstanding February Lay Rally in Wilson with Dr. Robert Hayes as speaker. Under the sponsorship of the District Committee on Lay Life and Work our January Workshops continue to grow in number and in enthusiasm.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN - 1977 closed out the term of Mrs. Hunter Banks, Jr. as District President of United Methodist Women. Betty has given the District women excellent leadership and they have responded with enthusiastic cooperation. The new District President, Mrs. Roy Barrow, is well-qualified to continue excellent leadership and the future of this organization looks promising.

STEWARDSHIP: - The Rocky Mount District has at the end of 1977 paid \$49,739.07 to the North Carolina Wesleyan College Special on a goal of \$42,832. Of this amount \$3,645 was paid during the year 1977. On an apportionment of \$368,281 for Single Figure the district churches accepted \$357,406 and paid \$352,126.73. The figures represent payments of 95.6% of the apportionment and 98.52% of the acceptance.

Nashville and Rocky Mount: Englewood, under the leadership of Field Service, National Division, Board of Global Ministries, conducted very successful stewardship campaigns and are now blessed in the experience of increased giving and a growing sense of Christian stewardship. Many of the churches of the District in the Fall of 1977 conducted their stewardship campaigns using the Saddlebag procedure. These churches and their pastors have been high in their praise of the results of this stewardship emphasis.

EDUCATION - Successful Christian Workers Schools have been held at Roanoke Rapids: First Church, Rocky Mount: First Church, and Wilson: First Church. Most of the churches of the District have participated in these schools. Youth Sub-District organizations are active in Northampton County and in the Roanoke Rapids area.

An overnight retreat for ministers was held in September at Camp Willow Run, Littleton; in the midst of a lakeside setting God's presence was strongly felt in experiences of worship and recreation. The ministers were led by Christian White in a study of a Christian minister's use of money.

Sanford District

The following is the report of ministry and stewardship of the 45 pastors and 15,589 lay members of the Sanford District for the year, 1977.

MEMBERSHIP - 472 new members were received; 180 on Profession of Faith, 192 from Other Methodist Churches, and 100 from other Denominations. 62 were removed by Charge Conference or withdrawn, 124 transferred to other Methodist Churches, 80 transferred to other Denominations, and 177 were lost by death.

FINANCES - The churches of the District accepted 94.99% of the Single Figure Askings, 85.25% of Ministerial Education, 65.78% of Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, 65.51% of Black College Fund, 84.24% on Missional Priority Funds, making a total acceptance on Askings of 93.34%.

BUILDINGS AND IMPROVEMENTS - Aberdeen has sponsored an "Outpost Mission" and purchased a \$10,000 building lot for a tri-racial congregation. Center is in the process of finalizing plans for additional Educational space. Jones Chapel has renovated its Sanctuary, bricked its building, and erected a steeple. First: Mt Gilead has done renovation to its plant. Piney Grove has dedicated its new facility. Poplar Springs remodeled and dedicated the Educational Building. Robbins has done extensive remodeling of its facilities. McQueens has completed its new educational building. West End: Siler City remodeled its educational facility. Southern Pines has done extensive remodeling. Browns Chapel is in the process of building an educational and recreational facility, First: Troy dedicated its new Sanctuary. Bascoms Chapel has dedicated its new Sanctuary. Cameron is in the process of completing renovation.

PROGRAMS - The District Council had a two-day retreat and has had a good year under the direction of Dr. Reginald Ponder as Chairman. Clyde Strother, District Lay Leader, has given good guidance in this area. They, too, had a week-end retreat which was most helpful. Our Lay Rally was great. Over 600 persons were in attendance to hear reports, consecration of Lay Speakers, and a dynamic address by Dr. John Mason Stapelton. We

have a very active core of Lay Speakers who filled out pulpits during Lent and as the need arose during the year. Mrs. Max Matthews and her leaders have given fine stewardship in the United Methodist Women's work. Tommy Herndon has guided our Youth program for the year. We regret that some of the churches do not participate at the district level.

I am grateful for the blessing of serving with and among such fine people as those of the Sanford District. We hope for better things, always, for the district.

Wilmington District

I consider it a privilege to share with the Annual Conference some of the activities of the Wilmington District during the conference year 1977-1978.

EVANGELISM and COMMITMENT were the key words in the plans of the District Council on Ministries when it met in early September to make plans for the year. The District Superintendent worked with small cluster groups of ministers in sessions on "A Workable Plan of Evangelism." In the spring, we held two very successful workshops on "Evangelism and Commitment in the Church School," using materials from the Board of Discipleship.

We tried to make the Fall CHARGE CONFERENCES more creative by involving charge conference members in the meetings. Some churches had special music, others presented the year's activities with slides, others had their youth prepare special worship services, some used a panel-type discussion for reports, while others made a Question and Answer game of facts about United Methodism in the N.C. Conference. As a result of these efforts, the lay people and the district superintendent became better acquainted and enjoyed a more informal relationship.

VISITORS FOR SPECIAL EVENTS brought new interest. Bishop Blackburn was in the district on four occasions for dedication services, homecomings, etc. Frank Roughton, outstanding religious dramatist, was at Wesley Chapel and Wesley Memorial, Wilmington. Dr. and Mrs. Frank Anderson, missionaries to Zaire, Africa, visited in the district during the first week in December and were keynote speakers at the District Conference in Southport. Several other churches had missionaries for speaking engagements. Jerry Clower, nationally known entertainer, and author of "Ain't God Good!", will give his testimony and entertain at Wesley Chapel on June 1.

DISTRICT MINISTERS MET on March 14 at Wesley Pines Retirement Home, Lumberton and Robeson County Church and Community Center for the purpose of getting acquainted with these two ministries of the church. More will be done in the coming year, involving both lay people and ministers in a plan called "Operation Understanding."

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION was another major emphasis of the District Council on Ministries. Leadership Schools were set up in Wilmington,

Southport, and Elizabethtown. The Curriculum Workshop in Whiteville was enthusiastically received. Grace, Wilmington, held Inner-City Adventures during the summer months, a week-day ministry to children to the community. Oleander, Wilmington, had a very successful Intergenerational Sunday School program during the summer months. Vacation Church School Workshops were held in Whiteville and Wilmington. Southport and Ocean View joined in a Sunday School Consultation and training for teachers.

DISTRICT MEETINGS: The February Lay Rally was held at Acme-Delco School with D.D. Holt, guest speaker. The District Board of the Laity organized and conducted a workshop for Lay Speakers. Those who participated, 28 in all, received certificates at the Lay Rally. United Methodist Women had a fall District Meeting, and five sub-district meetings in the Spring. United Methodist Youth had two district rallies and had good representation at the Conference rally at Methodist College.

BUILDING PROGRAM: Bethel-Lebanon has completed a beautiful parsonage, it is paid for, and was dedicated on May 21. Riegelwood has made extensive improvements at the parsonage. Hampstead has paid off parsonage indebtedness. Wesley Chapel is enjoying a new educational building and gymnasium. Pleasant Grove on the Dublin charge has added fellowship hall, kitchen, and restrooms. Shiloh on the Bolton-Shiloh charge is in the process of building a fellowship hall and kitchen. Evergreen has a new educational building underway. Dixon Chapel and Old Dock are in new sanctuaries, and the educational building and renovation project at Smith Chapel has been completed. Mishop Springs has remodeled Sunday School rooms and added air conditioners. Wesley Memorial, Wilmington, has renovated a house adjacent to the church and made an attractive church office complex. Southport dedicated their educational building on February 5. Trinity, Wilmington, has completed payment on a \$100,000 lot for future relocation. Grace, Wilmington, is painting the second floor educational building and repaired the stained glass windows in the beautiful sanctuary, adding a protective lexan covering.

STATISTICS: "Roll Cleaning" hurt our membership record this year. 611 were received into membership, but 301 were removed by charge conferences so this brought down any hope of a net gain! However, attendance at principal weekly worship service was up over last year's report. We have 115 new subscribers to the N.C. Christian Advocate. Giving for all causes in 1977 showed an increase of more than \$150,000, and I am happy to report that on conference benevolences for 1978, the district acceptance is a little more than 95% of total askings, an improvement of 4% over the previous year.

FOR ALL THESE GOOD THINGS, WE GIVE THANKS. My special thanks to every minister in the district for the splendid team spirit which we have developed, and to the lay people for their friendship and encouragement and support of our ministry.

Duke, whose trust continues to enable the United Methodist Church to develop new and creative programs while stabilizing and maintaining those that already exist.

DIVISION OF EDUCATION

Once when I was a little boy, our family left on a summer vacation at the beach. We were about two blocks from our home when my father said, "We're on our way the the beach; I'll give five dollars to the first one of us to see the ocean." Visions of five unexpected dollars began to bounce around within my head and I began to plot how I should do my sister out

of that bonanza. My plan was to stick my head out of the car window about the time we reached Cherry Grove. That little bit of advantage ought to do it. We had driven about another block and were crossing over a small unnamed stream that wandered through my hometown. "Ah," said my dad as we drove over the bridge, "I guess I win the five dollars. That stream is part of the Atlantic Ocean!" He's right, you know. That stream moves eastward and joins other streams and rivers until they flow fully and finally into the ocean. We were looking at a creek, but we were really seeing the ocean.

We are in that situation again today, because we are looking today at the early signs that Christian Education is turning around in the North Carolina Conference. The hints are small but there is every hope that this creek is headed for the ocean. We are looking at a stream, but we are seeing the sea.

Case in point: Brother Traynham's report indicates that the average attendance at Sunday Church School was down last year about 4%. But did you see the rest of the report? Other settings and grouping for Christian Education in the local church were up about 4%. Some of our people have moved to different rooms in the building and different times of the week, but our local church ministry in Christian Education has halted a downward trend and has all but leveled off. The North Carolina Conference leads the entire Southeastern Jurisdiction in growth in on-going classes and settings and in short-term groups for Christian Education. In ten years the increase has been 600%. That is a pretty good-sized creek.

The people in the local church have not given up on Christian Education. Some professionals have abandoned ship; some prophets have mis-read the signs. But here is the response of our local churches to leadership development for Christian Education in this Conference: attendance at January workshop classes for persons in educational ministry was 1416; 2000 copies of the Decision Point: Church School evaluation instrument were distributed: 667 persons attended workshops in the districts to tell about United Methodist curriculum; from the districts came 54 leaders for an all-day exporation into new resources for youth ministry; YMET teams -- Youth Ministry Enrichment Teams -- reached hundreds of young people in ten different assignments; our courses in Christian Education at the Conference Leadership School reached 248 persons; a consultation on pre-school ministry brought together 34 leaders; workshops on Vacation Church School and other summer-time learning settings touched 548 people; and the Christian Workers School continued to return to the strength which has served us so well in the past -- 1081 persons took part in these events, an on-going recovery from a low point of nattended a regional workshop on Decision Point: Church School; annual conferences from across the Jurisdiction sent the same story of new excitement and positive spirit. A similar workshop two years ago was the occasion for hostility, despair, even outright anger; the contrast seemed to me to be quite significant. Those who have leadership responsibility for Christian Education have begun a new day of "Yes." And why not? The Church has always been at its strongest when it has taken study seriously. In the Book of Acts we are told that the early church devoted themselves to the apostles'

teaching; Martin Luther was in a study of the Psalms when the full insight of justification by faith began to form within him; John Wesley was at a Bible study at Aldersgate Street when he made claim upon the "strangely-warmed heart." And in this day, in our own Conference, 70% of those persons who joined the Church on profession of faith had roots in our Church School. To set aside Christian Education would be to ignore the lesson of Scripture and history.

Where to from here? What is ahead? Decision Point: Church School, Phase III will begin in September on Christian Education Sunday with the theme "A Community That Learns." The United Methodist Church continues to respond to the needs of our variety of churches and offer new curriculum resources. If you hear someone make an accusation against these resources, ask that person when he last looked at the full range of choices. Go take a look at the Cokesbury display at this Conference. And during this next year, with the approval of this Conference, our districts will be asked to set about planning for the 200th anniversary of the Sunday School in 1980.

Let me lift up one dimension of Christian Education that sometimes is taken for granted. Scouting. United Methodists sponsor 11,593 troops and units of Boy Scouts. A new way of recognizing excellence in that work has been made available through Scouting/USA and The United Methodist Church. A certificate of appreciation -- the Bishop's Award for Excellence -- will be presented to those units that meet criteria which take seriously the Christian Education dimensions of the Scouting program. Our Division is setting up procedures to bring this recognition to deserving groups within our Conference. I am pleased today to recognize Troop 130 of First United Methodist Church in Morehead City, a fine unit that is the first to make application for this acknowledgment of educational ministry through Scouting.

Finally, I should like to mention one other part of our local church Christian Education opportunity: the Conference Camps. These programs and facilities are extensions of local church ministry. I think of camping ministry as local church ministry in a fresh and creative setting. Your response to this ministry indicates that you find this a good way to experience Christian community and to grow in the faith. The summer camping program reached 1,832 persons last year, but that is only the tip of the iceberg. Other use of our camps for retreats and day-groups ministered to an additional 9,761 persons.

Excitement is breaking forth each day in our camping ministry. At Camp Don-Lee, only 38 vacancies are left for this summer's one-week ministries. The two-week and four-week camps are filled. The new Hobie Cat program has had two rich and rewarding outings. The week-end for Single Parents and Children was filled. The opportunity for youth in churches of small membership was so well-received that a second week-end had to be established to handle the registrations. We value the ministry of John Farmer as the Director-Manager at Camp Don-Lee. At Chestnut Ridge, the registrations for this summer are double what they were last year at this same time. There is continuing outreach with camps for Mentally Retarded, Autistic Children, and Persons with Muscular

Dystrophy going on simultaneously with our regular camping program. We are glad for creative program leadership at Chestnut Ridge. As Superintendent of Maintenance, Bob Reed continues to work with effectiveness and faithfulness. Camp Rockfish is our sleeping giant. The Committee on Camping Ministry has begun the process to secure the full-time professional leadership which is needed to use Rockfish to its fullest. We view this as an opportunity to give new focus to ministries with ethnic minority local churches, as the chance to make use of the unique ecological system of our site, and to broaden the base of local church ministry in the Rockfish area. Last year over 2000 persons were part of life at Camp Rockfish. It is very much alive. There is a rumor about Camp Kerr Lake to which I wish to speak. Some persons have thought that the Southern Baptists are taking over Camp Kerr Lake. This is not true. The rumor got started, I am sure, because with all of the rains it has appeared that someone was trying to immerse Camp Kerr Lake! No, full speed ahead! The lease with the Corps of Engineers has been renewed and our United Methodist presence at Camp Kerr Lake continues!

Our facilities need to be strengthened in order for us to be the kind of setting you desire. The Division of Education is giving continued concern to that issue.

Our camps are old enough now that we are getting second-generation campers. But that only serves to remind me of the saying that God has no grandchildren, and thus we must continue to provide for each generation the opportunity for growth and nurture within the Christian faith community, and to such ends we set our task.

Division of Evangelism

The United Methodist Churches of the Southeastern Jurisdiction have been challenged in the leading of every local church to be a functioning center for Evangelistic Ministry to the end that the Conferences of the southeastern Jurisdiction may expect a membership growth of 288,000 by 1984. We, in the North Carolina Conference, have accepted this challenge, and the Division of Evangelism used as its theme for 1978, "Growing in Discipleship."

We began our year with a Covenant Sunday which provided the Work Area Committee on Evangelism an opportunity to present the local church's program on Evangelism for the year. The work COVENANT has been a part of the life of Methodism since John Wesley urged Methodists to renew their covenant with God on December 25, 1747. It is the feeling of the Division of Evangelism that our Proclamation be Christ-centered, and that our ministries all be done in the name of Christ and His Church.

Every church was asked to make a survey within its community in order to develop outreach ministries to those persons who are unchurched, and

to enable the Church to be more inclusive.

Districts, through local church planning, have held New Life Missions, or are in the process of having such events within the next several months. We urge all churches who have not had a New Life Mission to seriously consider doing so. **WHAT IS THE NEW LIFE MISSION?** The New Life Mission is a contemporary strategy for Evangelism that is designed to awaken faith in persons and renew churches for mission. It combines teaching, preaching, reaching, and sharing approaches to communicating the gospel for response.

The objectives of the New Life Mission are best understood in terms of "four crises" that plague most local churches:

- **Contents:** Most people do not know what to believe and base their lives on. They are either bewildered by American Cultures, many religious options, or they are entrenched in a simplistic set of beliefs.
- **Commitment:** Although many people say they believe the gospel, they decide, relate, and live by non-Christian values.
- **Community:** Many Churches are mere collections of individuals, families, or cliques. They have no unity, no trusting-sharing fellowship.
- **Compassion:** Many churches are devoid of the one motive that generates service to persons and mission to the world. They need a revival of compassion, the ability to care so deeply that they act for others.

All of us must be alarmed and concerned over the continued decline in church membership. This decline began across the United Methodist Church in 1964, and we have not yet turned the tide around. It is somewhat comforting to note that our North Carolina Conference has had a slight gain this year. With 850 churches, we received 7,098 new members. This figure comes from 650 of our churches and indicates that 200 churches received no members at all; only 376 churches had a net gain; 370 had a net loss, with 104 churches remaining the same in their membership.

We have been asked, "Why so many losses in the United Methodist Church?" The Warren J. Hartman study of membership trends of the United Methodist Churches states clearly that the new losses in church membership are not due to a mass exodus or to increased number of removals from the membership rolls. A primary factor in the net loss is the sharp reduction in the number of persons who have been received on Profession of Faith. This Division will attempt to speak to this issue as it holds a Mass Evangelism Rally on Saturday, December 2, 1978, at the Raleigh Civic Center. Please note the printed announcement which has been distributed to the members of this Conference. Let us begin now preparing our people for this special event, and pray that we will share in an occasion which will literally set our church aflame.

Now, I wish to speak a personal word of appreciation to all of the members of this Evangelism Division, and to pay special tribute to our Vice Chairman, Mr. Walter Feltman, who has served the Division of

Evangelism so faithfully for many years. Because of his retirement, he will be resigning from this position.

We further express our thanks to our two Conference Evangelists, Tommy Tyson and Bobby Tyson, who are serving effectively in this ministry.

Our Division is pleased to present this Conference the name of John W. Hobbs who is being recommended by this Division and the Board of the Ministry as an approved Conference Evangelist.

It is the desire and commitment of the Division of Evangelism to do whatever possible to encourage our churches, pastors, and lay leadership to emphasize a stronger and deeper personal commitment to Christ and His Church.

The Methodist Foundation, Inc.

The past year, our 23rd, again reflects a very favorable performance for the Methodist Foundation, Incorporated. For the year ending December 31, 1977, net dividends paid to unit holders was \$387,815...again representing the largest amount paid since our beginning. Our net growth in assets for they year was \$360,369...representing \$469,621 from sale of new units; \$300,108 from reinvestment of dividends, \$15,338 from a bequest received...less a market depreciation of investments of \$334,250. Our fund at year-end had a market value of \$6,130,497...compared to \$5,770,128 at the beginning of 1977. during the year.

There was one investment policy change in that your trustees increased the percent invested in quality real estate mortgages from 25% of our portfolio to a maximum of 30%. At year end our mortgage investments stood at \$1,502,694...or 24.5%. Since the year-end ths section of the portfolio has been expanded to approximately 28%.

The directors of the Foundation have been advised by Hutchinson & Associates, actuaries for our pension fund, that the performance of the Foundation to date has exceeded the requirements for the satisfactory performance of the pension fund, thereby, enabling the Board of Pensions to increase the per service year pension rate by six dollars without requesting additional funds from the Conference.

We continue to pay close attention to the performance of individual companies and industries in the equity sector...gradually building up our holdings in proven companies rather than a further diversification of names. There was very little change in the fixed income sector of the portfolio. There is reason to believe that the coming year will reflect continued improvement in our overall performance and the amount of dividends paid.

General Council on Ministries

It would be impossible in the short time allotted to this report even to enumerate the many areas of concern into which the General Council on Ministries moves in its effort to coordinate and make effective the work of The United Methodist Church. I mention as examples such areas as the location of General Agencies, the overlapping of programs by different agencies, scholarships, special days, missional priorities, even the composition of boards, commissions and committees with reference to race, age and sex. Had I enough time I could give specific actions of the General Council which have served to make more economical and more effective the work of our great church. This is quite contrary to the prevailing idea in some quarters that no one in the church has any interest in economy or efficiency in our organization. Ned Dewire, General Secretary of the Council has said: "Ours is not the task of internal tinkering with machinery, but rather to assure that the machinery is in tune to do the task of responding to the needs of the local church. This often demands trimming our general program activities instead of adding on more functions, and more budget, each quadrennium". Never have I been a part of any group in our church which takes more seriously its commitment than that demonstrated by the membership of the General Council on Ministries. Let us keep in mind that this council is composed of approximately 100 persons from Conferences like our own who come from churches just as you do.

The meetings of The General Council on Finance and Administration and the General Council on Ministries are often held at the same location in order to see that program and finance are kept in line and that greatest effort is made to see that the needs of people around the world can be met by their brothers and sisters called United Methodists. This is our call. The seriousness of our people, young and old alike, can be detected in the following statement made by a youth member to the Council recently: "Youth are highly religious in certain key areas but seek a deeper involvement with the church than activities or recreation".

True to the directive of the 1976 General Conference to our church The General Council has focused its first attention on our Missional Priorities."

In some areas of the church exciting things are happening. Within the Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority, 20 new congregations have been started, and 64 persons have been recruited for the ministry. In Evangelism, the Decision Point Church School program has resulted in a variety of training experiences focusing on the role of the pastor as educator; attention has been given to the needs of the small membership church; and there has been an emphasis upon visitation, relational evangelism, the Holy Spirit, and church growth. In World Hunger, many conferences have conducted emphases with offerings for world hunger, and local community problems dealing with immediate hunger on the increase. Colleges are being utilized for hunger research and programs.

There is, however, the need to develop a commitment and will to change from a "consumer" society to one of simplicity of living, recognizing our peculiar responsibility as Christians to be better stewards of God's earth and to share with our sisters and brothers in their efforts toward the eradication of hunger and malnutrition.

Though we, at times, are thrilled with what has been accomplished with so little in such a short time, we have reason to be concerned with the truth found in a statement made by Joe Walker, Director of The Advance, when he said: "United Methodist people have not been impressed with the importance of our "Missional Priorities" in such a way that they have become priorities in their lives and in the program of their local churches."

Surely we will not allow this to remain true in the days ahead. How do we propose to bring before our people these needs and our responsibilities? In the fall months of 1978 each Annual Conference has been called to hold a Convocation on our Quadrenial Emphasis of Evangelism, the needs of the Ethnic Minority Local Church, and World Hunger.

Plans are already being made to hold this Convocation in Raleigh, North Carolina, on September 28-29.

No emphasis in the life of our church is more important to us just now than this. Every Church in our Conference should place this as a priority on its agenda. "Rise up O men and women of God. Have done with lesser things; Give heart and mind and soul and strength To serve the King of Kings."

The Division of Health and Welfare Ministries

Two of the seven vital concerns for this quadrenium, adopted by the 1976 General Conference, are a "concern for persons" and "the future of Church-related Institutions." This division has been vitally concerned about both of these this year.

First, through the work of The Child-Care Study Commission we have expressed a "concern for persons", especially children and youth, as the question has been asked, "who and where are the troubled and needy children and youth in our 56-county Conference and what can we do to respond to their needs?" In answering these questions, this commission listened to specialists in Child-Care on the national, state, and local level. This commission also has concerned itself with the future of our Children's Home in Raleigh. The final report of this group has been extended until June, 1979, and is expected to have significant implications for our future ministries to youth and children with special needs.

Second, The Division has maintained a close working relationship with our Methodist Home for Children as they have been moving toward "certification" by the General Division of Health and Welfare Ministries, which when accomplished will be the first certification of this institution in its 75-plus year history.

Third, This Division has had a vital relationship with The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. in (a) its expansion into Wesley Pines Home near Lumberton; (b) the opening of The Joseph Coble Health Care Center in Durham; and (c) in the transition of leadership with the retirement of Dr. Joseph Coble and the employment of Mr. Donald Penley as the new executive director. A search committee met many times for several months

and interviewed several applicants. Mr. Penley has the training and experience to give us good leadership. We are fortunate to secure his service.

Fourth, our Golden Cross program has assisted many persons with hospital and other medical care expenses.

In the name and spirit of Jesus Christ and on behalf of the 211,000-plus United Methodist in Eastern North Carolina, we have been at work "caring" for persons.

The Child-Care Study Commission

Are there children and young people in Eastern North Carolina troubled or needy? If so, what is The United Methodist Church doing to help them and is the help offered adequate to meet the needs?

These are the challenging questions given the Child-Care Study Commission by the North Carolina Annual Conference of 1977. The Study Commission was constituted under the direction of the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries. Members of The Study Commission are:

During ten sessions through the year the Commission has sought answers through reading; interviews with specialists in Child Care on the National level, State level and County level; on-site visitations to other Child Care Agencies in North and South Carolina, Virginia and Tennessee; and through a thorough study of what the North Carolina Annual Conference is currently doing.

Some facts that surfaced during the year have resulted in a feeling by the Commission that a final report at this time would be incomplete and so this report is presented as a preliminary study with the request that the Commission be continued for another year to enable it to complete its work.

There are certain conclusive findings that can be reported at this time with the hope that implementation can be considered by the appropriate agency even before the final report is submitted.

There are children and youth in Eastern North Carolina in need of care as a part of the Church's ministry.

Eastern North Carolina has a tremendous need for a DAY CARE MINISTRY FOR CHILDREN. Miss Sue Glasby of the State Department of Human Resources reported that as you move East the need increases. This is Day Care at a minimum or no cost to the user, since those who need it the most cannot afford the cost. This Day Care must be designed to provide character building opportunities and be a full day service to allow

both the mother and father to participate in the labor market. Church educational facilities that remain idle from Sunday to Sunday are perfectly suited for this service. We urge every church in the Conference to investigate this possibility as soon as possible. If assistance is needed in planning, help can be obtained from most County Departments of Social Service.

AFTER SCHOOL CARE is also critically needed throughout the Conference for children who return home to an empty house until the end of the work day. Again the churches' facilities are adequate for this type program. We urge every church in the Conference to investigate this possibility as soon as possible. Assistance can be obtained through the school systems and social service departments.

EMERGENCY CARE is mentioned by every professional in the Child Care Field as a critical need in our State. Emergency Care is defined as "short term residential care" available on a short notice to accommodate children and young people who must be immediately removed from their surroundings. Emergency Care needs to be close to the source of need and therefore could be a project for a local church or District. Our findings suggest that there is no community in our Conference that does not need Emergency Care. Assistance in planning such a program can be obtained through the Methodist Home for Children and The Department of Social Services.

GROUP HOME CARE is highly endorsed by the Child Care people. A Group Home is a licensed residence for no more than nine children or youth, which provides some professional direction. The recommendation is that Group Homes be close to the source of need, and therefore should be community oriented. The Administration Staff of the Methodist Home of Children is available to give planning guidance to a church or District that might be interested in pursuing this ministry.

LICENSED FOSTER HOMES are in great need. Information on how to develop and establish a Foster Home is available from every County Department of Social Service.

Serious attention needs to be given to the needs of the RETARDED and/or MILDLY DISTURBED CHILD. There are 7,300 Mildly Retarded Children and Youth in North Carolina, with an estimate that approximately 2,200 are United Methodist Children. A residential type setting could best serve these children and youth due to their multiprofessional needs. This is an expensive program, but one that is currently not being met. The Commission recommends that the Trustees of the Methodist Home of Children carefully look at this need and study its facilities to see if an expanded program could initiate at least a start in this program.

The Commission's investigations concludes that there is no need for expansion of Residential Care as now provided by Methodist Home for Children. Custodial care is not a serious need at this time unless it includes therapeutic techniques to help the child or young person with emotional problems. It is recommended that the Trustees of the Methodist Home for Children seek every means possible to enlarge its therapeutic program. Other recommendations now are: (1) that an emergency admissions cot-

tage equipped to accept children and youth twenty-four hours a day for their safety and for evaluation be developed on campus in an existing cottage; (2) that various types of vocational training be made available to residents of the campus through an on-campus training center; (3) and that a Family Life Training Center be developed on the Raleigh campus for families, ministers and other related professionals.

The Commission requested that the Trustees of Methodist Home for Children conduct a "Land Use Study" to determine if the property now occupied is being best used in the service of children. The Trustees accepted this request and are currently in the process of having a "Highest and Best Land Use Study" made. They expect a final report by midsummer, at which time they will evaluate the findings and share them with the Commission. This report will be vital in making the final recommendation concerning the Methodist Home for Children from the Commission.

A PROGRAM OF PREVENTATIVE MAINTENANCE FOR MARRIAGE AND FAMILY LIFE to help strengthen marriage, undergird families and thus help prevent the cultural and social situations that create trouble for children and youth is strongly recommended by this Commission. This could begin with the Conference Coordinator for Family Life and the Administrator of the Methodist Home for Children.

The final report of this Commission will be made by June 4, 1979.

The Methodist Home for Children, Inc.

The Methodist Home for Children continues to provide the best possible Child Care through residential services. We see our responsibility clearly in the care of abandoned, abused, neglected and emotionally disturbed children and are trying to staff and program to meet these needs.

Fewer and fewer children and young people are coming to us for what is called Long Term Care, (i.e. 3 to 10 years). Today the average stay is from 2 to 3 years. The typical child is coming into Care at about age 10 as a result of conflict in the home and community. Current social philosophy, with which we agree, is that the best place for a child is in the home. So, while we care for the needs of the child or young person at the Methodist Home, we are working with community social workers to create the right conditions for the child or young person to return to the home. This accounts for the shortened residence.

This service involves new problems which Methodist Home for Children must understand and be prepared to cope with them. Being older at admission, the young person brings experiences into the Care Program that are negative, yet by the tenth year have become acceptable behavior patterns. An understanding Staff, adequately trained must be available to redirect the youngster. Many young people are coming with a very poor attitude toward school and education. A real task awaits the Staff in creating an incentive program toward school and work.

Fear and distrust are so much a part of the preadmission pattern of life that Staff continually has the task of winning the respect and confidence of the youngster.

In many cases Methodist Home for Children is the last opportunity. The home has failed; the foster home has failed; and Methodist Home for Children is called upon to try.

POPULATION

As with most institutional agencies, our population census is down at this time. We think it is a seasonal thing and will move back up to around 100. At this moment we have 85 children and young people in Residential Care. The national governmental attitude right now is that institutions are the worst form of Child Care and foster homes or group homes are better. We can argue for or against these conclusions but contend that, at least for the foreseeable future, institutional settings are necessary and a significant part of the missional program of the Church.

STAFFING

We have a full Staff. Mr Ralph Robinson joined our Staff December 1, 1977 as Assistant Administrator for Residential Care. He was at the Elon Home for Children for 12 years before coming to Methodist Home for Children and has a Master's Degree in Social Work as well as 15 years experience in Child Care. Reorganization of the staffing patterns is in progress to tighten up our lines of responsibility and provide closer accountability in supervision. Staff training is conducted regularly under the direction of Mr. Robinson.

PHYSICAL PROPERTY

No significant changes have been made in our plant since the last report. Seven of our cottages are of the old Orphanage vintage and are over 50 years old. Maintenance expense is high for this reason. Our Maintenance Department is to be commended on keeping our aging plant in service.

ALUMNI

Easter weekend we had between two and three hundred Alumni return to the Campus for a two day Reunion. They had an excellent Reunion! In their Business Meeting they expressed a desire to establish an Alumni Room in the Vann Building where memorabilia of earlier days at the Orphanage could be collected, preserved and enjoyed. Your administration is now considering this request and may, after meeting again with the Officers of the Alumni Association, recommend to the Board of Trustees that we work together to prepare such a room adjacent to the present Memorial Conference Room.

LAND USE STUDY

A Land Use Study, authorized by the Board of Trustees, is currently in progress. Appropriations by the Commission on Administration and Finance of the North Carolina Annual Conference provide payment for this study. Gaddy and Bradshaw, realtors of Raleigh, have been commissioned to do the Study. Work is now in progress. At least a preliminary report, if not the full report, is promised by June 4. The initial presentation of this report will be made to the Board of Trustees, Methodist Home for Children as soon as it is available.

CERTIFICATION BY UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

For two years we have been working to obtain certification as an Agency of the United Methodist Church. The standards of the United Methodist Church are rightly very high. Last year in a peer review we were found to have too many deficiencies to warrant Certification. In March 1978 we asked for and obtained a second review. This time things were in order and the recommendation for Certification has been made to the National Division of Health and Welfare Ministries that Methodist Home for Children be Certified. We are anxious to meet the Standards of Certification set by the United Methodist Church.

We are also licensed by the State of North Carolina, meaning we meet the Minimum Standards set by the Department of Human Resources for Child Caring Agencies in North Carolina.

Methodist Home for Children is a faithful representative of the United Methodist Church as a caring arm in service of God's children.

The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.

The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. now includes facilities in Durham and Lumberton currently serving over 325 of our church-related aging population. The residents that we serve come from every walk of life - the retired minister and spouse, school teachers, college professors, housewives, farmers, and many others. Many people we serve are not able fully to pay their entire cost of care at The Home. It is the funds we receive from the single figure apportionment in the Conference budget and other individual gifts and bequests that enable the Homes to serve those caught in the trap of the inflationary spiral.

The Home's Health Care Center has been open for over a year--fully staffed with dedicated nursing and medical support personnel. The Health Care Center is meeting a two-fold need--serving the residents of the

Retirement Home in Durham and from time to time serving patients from the community or Conference who are not members of the Retirement Home.

Wesley Pines, the newest Retirement Home within the Conference system, is slowly making its impact on the Conference. The Home in Lumberton will not only be able to serve the healthy retired person who seeks a secure Home, but will also be able to serve the aging and less well. Thirty-six beds have been approved for skilled nursing care, and a compassionate and committed staff is in the process of being organized. All facilities are fully licensed and Medicare-Medicaid approved. Through all of these we give you "the opportunity to continue."

The North Carolina Conference can be proud of its Retirement Homes. The Homes have grown from a small unit serving approximately forty residents twenty-three years ago to facilities that will be able to serve over four hundred of our retired citizens when all renovations have been completed. There are some major renovations that need to be done at the Durham Home. We need to give serious thought to enlarging our kitchen and dining room facilities. At the present time they are inadequate, and we will find it difficult to serve additional people until this project is completed.

Your Retirement Homes are not in the financial situation that the Pacific Homes find themselves in. A copy of our annual audit is in the office of the Conference Treasurer, should anyone like to review it.

I am grateful for the opportunity to serve as the Executive Director of the Retirement Homes in the North Carolina Conference. The Homes are very fortunate to have a dedicated Board of Trustees who devote much time and energy to oversee and help insure successful operation.

If you have not visited the facility in Durham or Lumberton, we invite you to do so at a mutually convenient time. If you have any questions or if we can be of any service to you, please do not hesitate to get in touch with either the Administrators of the Durham (Dr. Kimsey King) and Lumberton (The Reverend LaFon C. Vereen) Homes or with the Executive Director.

Again, thank you for your continued interest in and support of your Methodist Retirement Homes.

Seventh Year SEMAR

The Southeastern Methodist Agency for the Retarded (SEMAR) is now an integral part of the Southeastern jurisdictional council. It is one of the basic components of ministry of that council. Its Executive director, Rev. Robert Pitzer, has his office in the SEJ Council on Ministries office in Atlanta, Georgia. Bishop Frank Robertson is the chairperson of SEMAR and presides over its annual trustees meeting at Lake Junaluska in October

when it meets at the same time of the SEJ Council. Two other Bishops serve on the Board.

SEMAR serves as a coordinating body for innovating and developing health and welfare ministries for the mentally retarded persons in the SEJ.

The Objects of SEMAR are:

1. (a) To render needed services to handicapped, mentally retarded persons, to encourage and promote the physical, mental, religious, educational, and charitable development and habilitation of such persons to the end that they may have the opportunity of achieving their full potential and of becoming active useful members of society, and to cooperate with/and work with the parents and other members of the families upon whom such persons are dependent; to develop residential services for retarded persons who need care; to develop non-residential ministries for the persons who will best be served by helping them to remain in their homes with their families.
2. (b) To develop residential services for severely and profoundly retarded infants and young children when they await admission to public facilities. To develop residential day-care and habilitation services for trainable and educable retarded children and youth. To stimulate and guide a ministry to all retarded persons and their families by local United Methodist Congregations, in cooperation with other community agencies and churches whenever possible, in harmony with special church school plans, homemaker services to relieve and support the families of retarded persons, and sheltered workshops for youth and adults. To work closely with the general Board of Health and Welfare Ministries or its successors of the UNITED METHODIST CHURCH and with Conference Boards and Agencies in order to assure that services and programs will measure up to the highest standards of care in this very specialized field.
3. (c) To sponsor and encourage research in the field of prevention and treatment of mental retardation.
4. (d) To administer and carry out charitable trusts and trusts for benevolent and philanthropic purposes in line with any of the above-stated objects.

A position paper on "The Role of the Church to Persons Who Are Mentally Retarded" is being prepared to go to the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries with an appropriate petition to General Conference.

Also an audio-visua- presentation for local churches is being developed for use in informing and educating people on mental retardation. And in order to encourage churches to meet some of the special needs of handicapped persons, a petition is being prepared for General Conference of 1980 to provide that guidelines for making loans and grants to churches require architectural plans that include the provision of those needs.

The SEMAR "Church of the Year" (that is the church in the SEJ which is chosen as the one offering the most outstanding work with mentally retarded;) and the "SEMAR Sermon of the Year", (the one selected as the best on the subject of mental retardation) are both to be presented with an

award at the annual meeting of the SEJ Council at Lake Junaluska in October each year.

About 3% of our N.C. Conference Church membership or about 6,300 persons, are mentally retarded. This is a significant number of people who need special attention. And when you add to that number the parents and close relatives of these people you can see that the number of people affected runs around 30,000. This ought to occupy considerable attention of ministers and churches. We are talking here about people who are experiencing great loneliness, hurt, frustration, sadness and guilt. These are the situations Jesus spent a great deal of his time with so His church must not neglect such a crying need for ministry. I urge you ministers to prepare yourselves to be able to minister effectively to the parents of mentally retarded children, as well as to the mentally retarded persons on their own level of mentality.

Churches, I urge you to accept the fact that you have mentally retarded people in your congregation and communities. Accept them as people - do not ignore them and make no provision for them. Make provision for their needs and their needs are the basic needs of everyone else. They are slower to catch on than some others, but they can learn too. Give them every chance to develop to their full potential. Get them into Sunday School classes, children, youth and adult activities. Give them something they can do in the church. Get Sunday School teachers to train themselves to work with the mentally retarded people. Help families who have mentally retarded children by offering to baby sit. Assure them that their children will be well cared for during Sunday School and Worship.

Churches, you can offer your unused classrooms during the week for day-care groups. Many communities could have special activities for the mentally retarded people if only they had the space to have it. Be sure to observe Mental Retardation Sabbath-Sunday one Sunday during November which is "Mental Retardation Month."

I was at the National Health and Welfare Convention in Dallas back in March and showed a series of slides and explained how our own Louisburg Church was able to get such a significant program going for 15 mentally retarded children simply by offering their Sunday School classrooms to be used during the week.

The church Administrative Board was debating whether or not to get involved in a program for the mentally retarded people of their community. One of the uneducated men of the Board finally rose and asked one question: "Its the right thing to do, ain't it?" and they did it.

When we decide that offering a ministry to the mentally retarded people of our congregations and our communities is the right thing to do, then we will do it.

Jesus said, "As you have done it unto the least of these, my brothers, you have done it unto me."

I call your attention to two items available to you: (1) A little booklet "The Clergyman Must Be the Leader" and (2) a movie "Celebrate Yourself". A 16 mm 30 minute worship celebration led by the Chaplains' Department and parishioners at Murdock Center. It was produced for WTVD by Cathy Carlson's Curious Kaleidoscope. You have been given a sheet on this movie. Get it and show it to your church groups.

Division of Higher Education

I. COLLEGES: All of our higher education institutions report satisfactory progress in meeting financial responsibilities and in increased enrollment. That this is the case reflects no lessening of the pressures of finance or student enrollment, but rather is a tribute to the leadership of these colleges. Continued vigorous support will be necessary to hold and build upon these gains.

II. SPECIAL MONITORING COMMITTEE: The Division recommends that the committee be continued for two years, with the report to be made to the 1980 session of the Conference.

III. THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE has selected Miss Jeneal Wharton of New Bern as the 1978-1979 Blackburn Scholarship recipient. An effort has been made to secure additional support for this scholarship to make possible the maintenance of the award for more than one year. Miss Susan Inabnit, the 1977-78 scholar, has been awarded a partial grant for 1978-79. We request that the Council on Finance and Administration and the Cabinet continue to support the raising of \$1200 in each district in 1979 and 1980 for the purpose of assuring four annual Blackburn scholarships.

IV. THE REGIONAL COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY work is to be presented by Dr. Joseph B. Bethea, the chairman.

V. Increased STATE AID TO STUDENTS attending private colleges is in prospect again this year. The Division applauds the work of the North Carolina Association of Independent Colleges and Universities in keeping the North Carolina General Assembly alert to the contributions of church-related colleges to the educational task of the state. We also commend the individual legislators who have led in the movement by which the state shares in the cost of higher education for students attending private colleges.

VI. Through its committees, the Division has continued to give attention to the following areas of concern: Academic Life, Student Life and Religion; Finance; Plants and Operation; the Minister-in-Residence Program; College Caravan; and the College Day program.

VII. The Division submits the nominations for Trustees to the several institutions. Attention is called to death of Arthur L. Tyler, Trustee and supporter of North Carolina Wesleyan from its beginning. The names are listed on Pages 57-59 of the Book of Recommendations. In addition, we nominate the following as trustees of North Carolina Wesleyan: J. Dewey Weaver, Jr. of Rocky Mount, for a term to expire July 1, 1982, succeeding Arthur L. Tyler; Millard Randall Baker of Goldsboro, for a term to expire July 1, 1982, succeeding James A. Auman; William F. Troxler, Raleigh, for a term to expire July 1, 1982, succeeding Earle A. Connelly.

VIII. The Division has distributed the \$570,000.00 College Sustaining Fund in the amounts listed on Page 57 of the Book of Recommendations. We call attention to the support of Bennett College through the Black College Fund, and urge the churches to increase their acceptance of this apportionment. The Reverend Rufus Stark will address the Conference on the Black College Fund as a part of our report.

IX. The Division calls attention to the Methodist Student Day Offering, received on the second Sunday in June, as a means of supporting the Methodist Student Loan Fund and National Methodist Scholarships. While funds are not sufficient to meet all demands, we encourage our North Carolina Conference students to avail themselves of this resource. Also, we urge all churches to be generous in their response to this offering.

The Joint Advisory Committee had expected to present a report on Methodist Campus Ministry in North Carolina to the 1978 session of both conferences. However, as a result of the illness of the director of the study, Dr. J. H. Oswalt, the report will be delayed until the 1979 sessions.

Report of the Regional Commission for Campus Ministry in North Carolina

The Regional Commission for Campus Ministry in North Carolina under the leadership of Chairperson Joseph Bethea has completed a strong year. Programs of evaluation of each campus ministry unit either have been completed or are under way. A systematic means of evaluation for each campus minister has been completed and will soon be implemented. Sub-committees of the Commission have met regularly, working long and hard hours in the work of the Commission. Financial support from each of the Annual Conferences has increased, and there is a great sense of increased moral and financial support for campus ministry in North Carolina.

During the year The Reverend Sadye Joyner has been appointed as campus minister at N. C. A & T State University. The Commission also has approved a grant of \$40,000 to N.C. A & T State University for the construction of a facility on property that was donated to the Wesley Foundation for that purpose. The Regional Commission has helped fund and support a state-wide United Methodist Student Conference for April 7 through April 9 at Camp Chestnut Ridge. The Commission accepted with regrets the resignation of Brenda Meadows Cooper from the Commission, and elected The Reverend Robert Stamey to replace her as Chairperson of

the Facilities Committee.

Campus ministry is being supported on 13 campuses in the state. We celebrate the fact that more and more persons are taking advantage of opportunities in higher education. The Regional Commission feels that the university is an extremely important institution in our society, and we are glad to bear witness to Christ in these centers of higher education.

Division of Lay Life and Work

Again it is my privilege to bring to this great United Methodist Conference a report of the activities of the Division of Lay Life and Work. This Division is representative of every segment of our Laity and our Clergy and the work done by its members reaches all our churches and their membership. Each year someone will suggest that Lay Rallies be discontinued. Each year Lay Rallies are held and overall response is better than the year before. The format is changing to keep in tune with the needs of our day. This is good. To come together as a group in the name of our Lord and His Church is inspiring and makes us stronger Christians and more dedicated Church people. This year some districts had conventional Rallies with guest speakers; some district put tremendous effort into musical programs and dramatics. Your district can be a Leader in Lay Rally programming if you will see to it. Through the years Lay Speakers have been identified with the No-Silent-Pulpit Program. Though there is still some need here, most Churches and pastors can fill the pulpit each Sunday during the Lenten Season; for this we are grateful. The need for Lay Speakers has not disappeared but certainly the point of emphasis has changed. This Division in the coming year will work to acquaint our Lay Speakers with their responsibilities as outlined in the Discipline. We will offer the necessary training and study materials to allow a Lay Speaker to attain certification and thus be recognized as a Loyal, Capable Methodist Lay person that can be called on when needed to fill a pulpit or serve in some other capacity as directed by the Discipline. The first classes for Lay Speakers will be offered this summer at Conference Leadership School here at Methodist College.

We lay people are concerned that our church maintain a balance between the clergy and the laity. Let us all show this concern by supporting and participating in a meaningful Laity Day program. We have this responsibility and this opportunity to be a part of our Church and to share with others our concerns and our faith. Lay person training in all areas of our church life is a vital concern of the Division of Lay Life and Work. Each year a comprehensive program is offered to all Lay People. This program is offered in our January Workshops. These are conducted in every district of the Conference. Acceptance of this program is shown by the steady increase in attendance. This year the January Workshops reached 3461 Lay People. The success of this program and the rest of the work of this Division is due to the fine support and guidance given by the staff people in Raleigh.

Conference Lay Leader Report

Bishop Blackburn, Delegates and Guests. During the past year I have met all meetings as Conference Lay Leader that I was expected to attend with two exceptions which occurred as the result of a conflict and an appointment out of state.

It has been my privilege to represent the laity in those meetings. I have done so with strong support from Mr. Grier Garrick, president of United Methodist Men; Mrs. Ruth Cade, President of the United Methodist Women, and Mr. Don Craft, Chairman, Conference Division of Lay Life and Work.

It has been my privilege to attend eight of the twelve District Lay Rallies held during the months of January, February and March. Conflicts on dates prevented me from attending others, but I did attend them from New Bern to Rockingham and Burlington to Wilmington.

There are several goals to which we, as the laity, should address ourselves regarding the organization and operation of the United Methodist Church.

1. There is a great need among the laity to understand conference program, that is, to know our agencies - our camps, retirement homes, colleges, children's home, missions, programs, and other projects and works of the North Carolina Conference. We need to understand our financing and comprehend the great strengths that we possess as a united body. To this end, I urge that our district lay leaders and church lay leaders give strength and support to conferences in the charges and the districts to better acquaint the laity with the program of the North Carolina Annual Conference.
2. There is a great need for our laity to become more involved in conference programs. I am sure all laity understand that the main lay expression lies in our representation and active participation on the various boards, commissions, agencies and divisions of the church. We probably do our best work on these various boards and agencies rather than on the Conference floor. The clergy must make sure that the time of the meetings of the various commissions, boards and agencies are times when lay members can be present.
3. I can only offer all the support I have to re-inforce the strength of the United Methodist Women. It was a tremendous feeling to stand in Jarvis Memorial in Greenville at the annual meeting of the United Methodist Women and see a church full of interested, concerned, involved United Methodist Women.
4. We must emphasize the United Methodist Men. They need to affirm their identity. The United Methodist Men need the cooperation of the district and charge lay leaders working cooperation with the Conference President of the United Methodist Men and the assistance of the Division of Lay Life and Work.
5. Our United Methodist youth have had good leadership this year. I look forward to ACS this summer, knowing it is in good hands and knowing that the youth have the strength of the United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and the Conference staff to assist them.

6. We need to emphasize lay involvement, primarily in the January workshops and Conference Leadership School. The Workshop and Leadership Schools present opportunities to our lay people to learn the conference program and to serve better the commissions and agencies they represent. You must urge your church members to support, attend, and actively participate in these programs.
7. I feel our Lay Rallies were quite successful this past year. Among those I attended one had as few as 240 persons in attendance and one over 1000. I heard excellent preaching at all the Lay Rallies. There has to be something good about a program that brings 8000 of our United Methodist lay people in Eastern North Carolina together. We have only started to use the Lay Rallies in the way in which they can be used. This year, two experiments took place in the operation of Lay Rallies. I consider both of them successful. First, rather than inspirational preaching, the Goldsboro District Lay Rally saw a play depicting the Bible in 45 minutes. It was unique and interesting and brought back to everyone's mind Bible story after Bible story as they were portrayed in a theatre-in-the-round setting. Our Districts must be able to try dramatic ministries, musical ministries, as well as preaching ministries when we plan Lay Rallies. At Burlington, the Lay Rally started in three groups prior to the general meeting. I attended the United Methodist Men's meeting and was pleased to hear a discussion of how the many church mens' clubs functioned and what their projects were. I found it to be stimulating and mutually reinforcing. Every member there learned better projects and procedures for operation of United Methodist Men Clubs in their charge. I am confident that the same experience was shared in the group of United Methodist Women and United Methodist Youth. This, again, is another example of how the Lay Rallies can reinforce the lay mission in the United Methodist Church.

However, a word of caution, when planning district Lay Rallies, we need to plan for enthusiastic, dynamic leadership handling the Lay Rally to keep a spirit of involvement, anticipation, and enjoyment throughout that Rally. One of our District Lay Leaders deliberately refused to take the role of Master of Ceremonies and assigned that job to someone he knew could give the enthusiastic, exciting leadership needed to start that Rally. I commend him for that--it resulted in a good Rally.

The District Lay Leaders need to meet together more often to plan Lay Rallies and conferences to better acquaint our Laity with the programs of our conference.

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This Spring I was privileged to attend a conference composed of all the United Methodist Church's Annual Conference Lay Leaders. In Nashville I learned that visitation is not the job of the preacher alone. To my surprise 80% of visitors to your church will join if visited that Sunday afternoon. Forty percent join if visited by Monday night. The results are negligible if visited later.

I was very proud to be able to suggest things done in our conferences for successful lay involvement. I found the relationship with the other Annual Conference Lay Leaders stimulating. I requested many of them to send me information regarding their programs. I will be sharing this with District Lay Leaders during the coming Year.

To close, I want to quote Part IV, Chapter I in the Discipline... "The General Ministry fo All Believers." This is Paragraph 106 and I quote:

"The people of God are the church made visible in the world. It is they who must convince the world of the reality of the gospel or leave it unconvinced. There can be no evasion or delegation of this responsibility; the church is either faithful as a witnessing, serving community or it loses its vitality and its impact on a believing world."

We are the church in action. We are the arms, hands, and the legs of the church. It is not the voice from the pulpit that convinces the world of the reality of the gospel. It is the faithful witnessing and serving of the church lay person who, during daily tasks, makes that witness and convinces the world. We are as much a part of the visitation ministry as our ordained ministers.

Committee on Continuing Education

"Continuing education in ministry is a multifaceted opportunity for growth, personal development, learning at different levels, up grading of skills, and on going enrichment." --- "There are as many definitions as there are persons involved in continuing education but basically such education is a lifelong process that begins when formal education requirements are met. At its best it is a personally designed program to meet individual goals for competency in the practice of ministry. It is not a scholarly smorgasbord but an intentional means of ongoing, planned, supervised learning. It is a process, not degrees or events." The continuing education of ministers is not something that just happens, it is planned intentionally by the individual minister. It is the purpose of the Committee on Continuing Education to provide direction, guidance, counsel, experiences, events, programs, materials, communication and cooperation with our education institutions, and funds that ministers know nurture in continuing education experiences. The fountain of learning is continually flowing free, bubbling through life, but so many of us never take a drink. Experiences for growing, expanding and finding fulfillment in Christian ministry are many and varied. We cannot make you drink, but we're going to keep enticing you to find the joy and refreshment of learning again and again.

We call upon the individual churches and charges to provide monies in their budgets for the continuing education of the pastor. (1976 Discipline P. 424.3)

We remind ministers in rural pastorates that the Duke Endowment has and will provide financial aid for continuing education. In addition the continuing education center at Duke Divinity provides some limited scholarship aid and finally as we noted above your Conference Committee is budgeted funds by the Division on Ordained Ministry to provide grants to individual ministers for continuing education. We will provide guidelines and applications for such grants at your request. We are providing some here at this 1978 Annual Conference in the lobby.

The work of the committee this past year has included: A total of 52 grants have been made to our ministers for their continuing education since last Conference for a total of \$5,296.00. These continuing education events include Spring and Fall Institute at Duke Divinity School, Death and Dying Seminar at N.C. Wesleyan, Midlife Crisis Symposium at Methodist College, Ministry Management at Junaluska, Leadership Lab at Princeton Univ., Evangelism Congress at Miami, Faith and Form Study Tour in Italy (Duke), Study tour in Mexico (Duke), Educational Opportunity in Edenburgh, a study tour in the Holy Land, an Educational Convention in Frankfurt, Germany and finally a Teaching Workshop at the Presbyterian Church, Graham, N.C.

The Committee sponsored or co-sponsored the following educational events: Death and Dying Seminar, Feb. 6-7, 1978 at N. C. Wesleyan with Dr. William Oglesby of Union Theological Seminary at Richmond Va.; Mid-Life Crisis Symposium on Apr. 20-21 at Methodist College with a variety of leaders; Bishop's Seminar on Preaching on Apr. 10-12 in

Raleigh with Dr. Rowland Murphy of Duke Divinity School, Dr. Edward Bauman of Foundry UMC, Washington, D.C. and Dr. Joseph Bethea of Rockingham District as leaders. There were a total of 453 ministers attending these events. On Sept. 11-13, 1978, at Duke, our committee is co-sponsoring a Pre-Retirement Seminar in cooperation with a number of other denominations.

Further our committee is now considering changes in guidelines for grants, plans for a Music and Pastor Seminar along with Music Committee and Div. on Worship and plans for the Bishop's Seminar on Preaching in 1979 are underway.

In closing the committee expresses its appreciation to our Bishop Robert M. Blackburn in his support of continuing education for ministers, to Dr. McMurry Richey and Dr. Thomas Lankford for making the faculty and resources of Duke Divinity School available for training and career development of our pastors, to Louisburg, Methodist and N.C. Wesleyan Colleges for counsel and support of educational ventures, to Mrs. Doris M. Jones of Nashville for guidance in our programs and organization, to the Ministerial Education Fund for monies and finally to our pastors who have taken seriously the call to be ministers continually preparing themselves in study and personal leadership and career development, that they may be complete servants of the Lord in His church.

The Division of Ordained Ministry allocated \$2,000 of MEF Funds to be used for Continuing Education in 1978 (5-10-77); and voted \$1,000 for

contact with seminaries in 1977 in a move to balance the Division's operating budget. As a usual thing, the Ministerial Education Fund assists with scholarships to the Course of Study Schools, but this assistance was not needed in 1977 by the Division.

Also, \$2,500 was collected during the year from individuals and other annual conferences for principal and interest indebtedness incurred in this Conference.

We regret to point out that our local churches remitted less for the Ministerial Education Fund in 1977 than in 1976. For work within the N.C. Conference (25% of the total amount remitted by the local churches), the reduction was from \$49,006.56 to \$45,478.66, a loss of \$3,527.90 for the important work of our Committee. We urge the local churches to accept the full apportionment for the Ministerial Education Fund in future years.

Division of Missions

The Division of Missions has experienced its best year of all during 1977. Following are the reports of the committees, including mention of expanded mission awareness and Advance support. A new program for providing grants of 40% up to \$20,000 for EMLC parsonages was created. With growing mission awareness in North Carolina, we expect continued increases in mission involvement.

Committee on Education and Cultivation

This committee does its work through four sub-committees - The Advance, Mission Studies, Volunteers-in-Mission, and Interpretation. Through the efforts in these areas of mission emphasis our Conference continues to move ahead as a Conference in mission.

The sub-committee on The Advance, chaired by the Rev. Rod Randolph, has led to increased giving to Advance Specials for Missions. Giving in 1977 was \$236,505, compared to \$220,608 in 1976. There has been continued increase in membership in the Ten Dollar Club. Missionary Salary Support has improved and there are now around 80 churches over our Conference who have underwritten salary support for our missionaries. Advance Specials in the area of World Hunger have had a good response while those to the Ethnic Minority Local Church have not. More emphasis will be made in the area of EMLC.

The sub-committee on Mission Studies is under the leadership of Jesse V. Bone. Efforts have been made to promote mission studies in the local church. One way promotion took place was the emphasis at Conference Leadership School. Mission Study Displays were provided at the 1977 school by Mrs. Kathryn S. Bundy. Names and addresses of Conference

Leadership School participants who were willing to teach mission studies were received by the committee and sent to all District Chairpersons of Missions. District Mission Study Workshops were encouraged and were held in the following Districts: Burlington, Durham, Raleigh, Rocky Mount, and Sanford.

Participation in mission has been carried out by the sub-committee of Volunteer-in-Mission, chaired by Linwood Blackburn. A work team, consisting of 16 members, went to Bolivia in the summer of 1977. The practical part of the project was the construction of a parsonage for the minister, or District Superintendent in San Pedro, Bolivia -- the other part, and a vital part was witnessing for Christ as the team worked, lived and shared with the Bolivian community. Another work team of 11 members, Young Adults, under the direction of Mike and Hope Morgan Ward, went to Johns Island, S. C. a third work team experience took place with a group of Sr. High youth. This was a One Day work team at Coharrie Mission, under the leadership of John Southerland. These experiences are of great help as these young people go into the local churches and share what happened through the work teams. One young person wrote recently that they had shared in local churches 30 times in in the last nine months. The member wrote, "It is a great story, a great experience and I continue to be thankful for the opportunity."

The work of the sub-committee on Interpretation, under the leadership of C. Reginald Johnson, has been directed toward exposing the local churches to mission interpreters. The primary purpose is to help our churches become "turned on" to mission. This is done by helping persons in our local churches discover what is happening in various areas of mission involvement. Mission Saturation events were held in the following districts: Durham, Raleigh, Burlington. Many of the District Lay Rallies had mission interpreters speak. In addition, churches throughout the Conference invited mission interpreters for special services.

We are grateful for the good work being done by these various sub-committees. We are mindful of the fact that these plans are implemented, in large part, by our District Chairpersons of Mission. We are grateful for the dedicated leadership of these persons who have worked so diligently in promoting the work of missions throughout our Conference: A. Clay Smith, Charles M. Smith, W.M. Presnell, L.E. Lugar, John H. White, M. Dewey Tyson, Jesse C. Staton, Jerry T. Smith, T. M. Faggart, Ralph I. Epps, A. W. Winstead, and C. Reginald Johnson.

Church and Community Report

The Committee on Church and Community work of the Division of Missions has five major areas of responsibility: (1) Urban Ministries, (2) Town and Country Work, (3) Ethnic Minority Local Church, (4) Church and Community projects and workers; plus the Church of the Year Awards. This year Urban Ministries funded Fayetteville Urban Ministries,

Raleigh Day Care Center, and Cokesbury, Raleigh. Town and Country Grants were given to: Caswell Parish, Inc.; Person United Methodist Parish, and Pamlico Parish. Church and Community Workers funded are Robeson County Church and Community Center---The Reverend Robert Mangum, and Ms. Betty Purkey, plus Ms. Bernice Ballance at Harnett County. Applications and funding are pending for workers at Colington, Elizabeth City District; A Black Church and Community worker for Rockingham District, and a Native American Worker for Robeson County Cooperative Parish Ministry. A new Tri-racial Congregation in Aberdeen has been given program aid. Another cooperative Parish is in the process of being organized in Robeson County---possibly Tri-racial. Three Church of the Year awards were given. The recipients were: First United Methodist Church, Roanoke Rapids, Nashville United Methodist Church, Nashville, and Four Oaks United Methodist Church, Four Oaks, North Carolina.

Major strides have been made during the year in Ethnic Minority Local Church Programs. The Division of Missions has made available grants up to \$20,000 but not exceeding 40% of construction cost for 10 Minority Parsonages. Three grants will have been made by Decembr 30, 1978. Leadership development has been made available through Conference Staff Offices with gratifying response.

Committee on Church Extension

The Committee on Church Extension experienced a busier year as momentum began building for the anticipated new wave of church extension in the North Carolina Annual Conference. Property was purchased at Kill Devil Hills as a possible site for a new congregation, and several districts are giving serious consideration to where new churches should be planted. Included among these are two ethnic minority congregations in two different districts. Our Bishop and Cabinet are challenging us as a Committee and a Conference to give renewed emphasis to organizing new churches as we approach the beginning of a new decade.

Our main activity as a committee this year has been promoting membership in the Ten Dollar Club, a builders club begun a generation earlier in which members contribute \$10.00 three times per year to assist a new church, an older church with special financial needs, and an overseas mission church. The following churches received grants from the 1977 calls:

Spring-Harker's Island, New Bern District
Summer-Holy Trinity, Greenville District
Fall-Manila, Phillipines

A vigorous promotional effort initiated by out staff persons, Simeon Cummings and Frank Grill, and communicated through the NORTH

CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE and the Coordinated Mailing resulted in a dramatic increase in the number of Ten Dollar Club Members. 344 new members were added, bringing our total membership to 2,294--this means we nearly doubled our goal of a 10% increase in membership! The Fayetteville and Raleigh Districts deserve special recognition for leading the way with increases of 72 and 64, respectively. We hope to equal or exceed this achievement in 1979 through promotion of the Ten Dollar Club in every local church on Church Extension Sunday, January 21 and at District Lay Rallies and Conferences.

PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The 1978 Pastors' conference sponsored by the North Carolina Council of Churches at St. Joseph's AME Church in Durham on April 18 afforded ordained ministers from across the State the opportunity to hear and engage in dialogue with Dr. Lloyd R. Bailey and Dr. Roland E. Murphy of the Divinity School of Duke University on "Biblical Study and the Preaching Task." The planning committee for this stimulating event was headed by the Rev. Robert T. Young, Minister to the University. Two cassette tapes recording the lectures are available for \$2.50 each from Council headquarters, Box 6637, College Station, Durham, N.C. 27708. Future plans for this annual conference will be considered by the Council's Commission on Christian Nurture in the light of its desire to provide continuing education for ministers.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES

The new plan for a House of Delegates to succeed the former Assembly went into effect in April 1977, and a second meeting of the House was held last October. A design team headed by Vernol R. Jansen, Jr., General Secretary of the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina, planned the third meeting held at Duke Divinity School on May 2, 1978. Pursuing a priority emerging from earlier meetings, the House dealt with the issue of "Racial Tensions in the Public Schools: Underlying Causes and Some Strategies for Solution," under the leadership of Dudley E. Flood, Assistant State Superintendent for Human Relations and Student Affairs, N.C. Department of Public Instructions. At this meeting the program of the Commission on Religion in Appalachia (CORA) was presented by its Chairman, the Rev. Paul J. Albers of Chattanooga. At the Honors Luncheon that day the North Carolina Council of Churches received an Ecumenical Service Recognition Award from the National Council of Churches' Commission on Regional and Local Ecumenism, of which the Rev. Nathan H. VanderWerf is Executive Director. For the second time, Dr. H. Shelton Smith of Durham, one of the founders of the North Carolina Council of

Churches, received the State Council's Distinguished Service Award for his continuing leadership in ecumenism. He first had the DSA conferred upon him in 1953 for foundational work going back as far as 1934. The Council's Communications Awards were presented to the Lexington Dispatch, to Creative Ministry Associates of Durham, and to Radio Stations WKIX (AM) and WYYD (FM) of Raleigh.

New vitality and strength had come to the N.C. Council of Churches in 1977 through the membership of the Roman Catholic Diocese Church of Chapel Hill. Out of the first meeting of the House of Delegates emerged SEVEN PRIORITIES which have been given to the Executive Board and the three program commissions for implementation. These are:

- I. To encourage reforms in the court system of N.C. which will result in speedier trials and more equal punishment for the same crimes.
- II. To promote church efforts to heal racial tensions in public education
- III. To develop programs in child advocacy and in the prevention of child abuse.
- IV. To Promote alternatives to capital punishment.
- V. To improve the conditions of our N.C. Institutions of Correction.
- VI. To promote equal rights for all citizens regardless of race, religion, status, sex, creed, or country of origin.
- VII. To build a climate of openness and cooperation between council and denominational staffs.

Most of these directions were being pursued by the Council's program units and are given new impetus by the backing of the House. Commissions are also carrying out particular programs arising out of their own research of needs.

Commission on Christian Social Ministries

A new Criminal Justice Committee is working with representatives of the National Council of Churches to plan a hearing on criminal justice issues in North Carolina scheduled for July 18-19. The Office of Social Ministries, directed by the Rev. Collins Kilburn, is located at 110 Cox Avenue, Raleigh 27706. Particular attention is given to criminal justice issues such as sentencing, prison reform, and the death penalty. Work continues with the N.C. Advisory Committee on Religious Ministry in Prisons and gratification is felt at the recent additions of nine new prison chaplains on a staff headed by Chaplain R.A.L. Walker. A conference on juvenile justice is being planned with Yokefellow Prison Ministry.

The Wilmington Ten has been a special concern of this Commission. Joseph Walker, Jr. of Greensboro heads a special task group which has made approaches to U.S. Attorney General Griffin Bell urging submission of an amicus curiae brief to the Federal court which is to review the case. Ten thousand copies of a paper entitled, "The Wilmington Ten: A Summary and a Call," were distributed and a new printing was required. The task group continues to advocate release of the Ten.

A Committee on Labor/Management Issues has been organized under the chairmanship of the Rev. Karey Gee of Wilson. A paper on the J. P. Stevens/union controversy published in early 1977 after an earlier committee's study, while not an official position paper of the Council, has served as a catalyst to stimulate study in several denominations of the issues in this area of concern.

The Equal Rights Amendment came near to approval in the N. C. Legislature in 1977. The ERA Committee working for approval in Raleigh.

Rev. Caly Rogers Witte of The Migrant Ministry Committee, chaired by Sister Evelyn Mattern of Raleigh, has become quite active in a program of study, education, and advocacy. Legal aid for migrants has emerged as a primary need which churches might assist in meeting. Legal Service of North Carolina is establishing a migrant project which is being aided by the committee. Sister Mattern has prepared a three-page summary of findings and recommendations available from the Council's Raleigh office.

Legislative seminars have been planned for youth in the N.C. Conference of the United Methodist Church and for the Board of Church and Society of the W.N.C. United Methodist Conference. In addition to being in frequent contact with legislators and state officials about matters which are among the Council of Churches' legislative concerns, Mr. Kilburn continues to serve as Director and legislative agent for the State Council for Social Legislation.

Last March his office worked with the N.C. Humanities Committee and the Center for the Study of Human Values in organizing a three-day conference on "Freedom and Equality in the American Economy."

With the Agricultural Extension Service of NCSU, the Cooperative Campus Ministry of NCSU, and the Baptist State Convention, this commission provided sponsorship for a seminar in Henderson on "The Church in the Changing Community."

The Office of Social Ministries in February aided in organizing an Advisory Committee of Drug and Alcohol Abuse to work with the N.C. Department of Human Resources in helping to equip clergy to deal with related problems and issues.

Commission on Christian Unity

In recent years the major contribution of this commission to ecumenical expression in North Carolina has been the gathering of Cooperative Area Planning Conferences to draw together church officials with responsibility for mission in various areas of the State. Something like this was done in the Four-County Conference on Church and Society at Pembroke, then in the first Cooperative Area Planning Conference in the State's eastern counties. The experience proved to be productive and the idea was transplanted to the Western Piedmont and to the Blue Ridge areas. In May of 1977 and again in September Seminars on Land-use were held in Watauga County, the latter coming in time to be highly significant in relation to the flood which struck sixteen mountain counties on November 6. The Council of Churches has cooperated with Church World Service in response to this

disaster and with the Western North Carolina Flood Committee which has set up an office in Asheville (809 Flat Iron Building) to help in long-range recovery efforts. The Rev. Richard G. Shelor of Black Mountain and the Executive Director represent the Council of Churches in this work.

This Commission has plans to institute another Cooperative Area Planning Conference in the Research Triangle. Also it has been asked to prepare a paper on biblical and theological light on the problem of child abuse in support of the Commission on Christian Nurture. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity will again be promoted next January.

Commission on Christian Nurture

In the past year a major thrust of this commission has been in Child Advocacy and Prevention of Child Abuse. Last September at Burlington an expanded meeting was held with experts and people interested in the field. Out of this grew the present Task Force on Child Abuse appointed by our judicatory executives and headed by Sister Maria Rhoads of Raleigh. It will tie in with the State Task Force on Protective Services for Children and the Statewide Child Abuse and Neglect Public Awareness Campaign (SCANPAC). Sister Mary Beard of Raleigh is the Council's representative on the latter.

In the winter another Camp Directors' Training Retreat was held, this one being at Camp Laurel Ridge, the Moravian Camp and Conference Center near Laurel Springs in the Blue Ridge. Another such event will be held in 1979.

This commission is effective in sharing opportunities across denominational lines, such as the Consultation on Camping of the Presbyterian Synod, the Symposium on Mid-Life Crises at Methodist College, Fayetteville, and the Moravian Training Conference for Professionals and Paraprofessionals Working with the Whole Family. The commission continues to look ahead toward an ecumenical ministry in the community colleges. It maintains liaison with the planning group for Mental Retardation Sabbath/Sunday, an annual emphasis in November, and it has linkage in the N.C. Family Life Council.

In the fall of 1976 the American Bible Society approached the Commission on Christian Nurture about making the Good News Bible known in this State. With the approval of the Council's Executive Board a coalition was formed which made it possible for juricatories not belonging to the Council of Churches to participate in the program which culminated last November, known as "Good News North Carolina: A Celebration of the Bible." The Rev. Terry W. Agner and the Rev. Darrell A. Monroe, Jr. played leading roles in this campaign to stimulate Bible reading and study. A significant exhibit of rare manuscripts and Bibles was made by the Rev. John L. Sharpe III, at Perkins Library at Duke University.

The General Committees on Public Relations and Business and Finance

With the loss of Mr. Monroe to Georgia the General Committee on Public Relations will be reorganized under new leadership. It has primary responsibility for the Richard Shelton Communications Awards to newspapers, radio stations, and TV stations deserving recognition. Next year denominational papers will be included in the program. A special need to be met in PR is an informational leaflet concerning the Council's work. The General Committee on Business and Finance reports support pledged from member bodies of \$65,848.00 toward the 1978 budget of \$68,872.00, with the balance to come from other sources. Judicatory allocations are up \$10,014.00 over 1977, a fact which gives great encouragement.

Church Women United in North Carolina

Although CWU is a movement comprised of individual Christian women, it continues in this State to be the women's department of the North Carolina Council of Churches, and in addition to its unique programs revolving around World Day of Prayer, May Fellowship Day, and World Community Day it renders tremendous support for two programs in which the Council of Churches is vitally interested, the Migrant Ministry and the Church World Service Clothing Appeal. The President of Church Women United in North Carolina becomes a Vice President of the Council of Churches, Mrs. D. K. Fry of Raleigh having succeeded Mrs. John W. Cobb in these important offices.

Church World Service-Crop

The establishment of the Carolina CROP Office in Durham has made possible a closer working relationship in the CWS Clothing Appeal and its Community Hunger Appeal, since the Council's office is nearby on the Duke East Campus. The Council's Executive Director, the Rev. Samuel S. Wiley, is a member of the State CROP committee and also of the Church World Service Department Committee in New York. CWS-CROP make effective response to world hunger and disaster, and through their agency the North Carolina Council of Churches will be able to participate in domestic disaster preparedness.

Membership

Presently the North Carolina Council of Churches consists of twenty-seven judicatories of seventeen denominations, plus ten congregations holding individual membership. There are approximately 7,000 congregations in the member bodies, with 1,400,000 communicants.

Epilogue

Joel Gajardo has said, "As long as institutions administer charity we have not institutionalized justice." The North Carolina Council of Churches is dedicated not only to honoring Jesus Christ as Head of the Church which is His body and accepting Him as Savior of believers' souls but also to offering Him as healer of the ills of society, eagerly working and praying for the day when the systems of this world shall be redeemed by His love and justice.

It is composed of representatives from the Division of Ministry, the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, the Ministers' Wives' Association, and the Pastoral Care Department of Duke Divinity School.

2. Encouraging, securing, and financing leadership for and evaluating up to three enrichment week-ends per year.
3. Attempting by every available means to advise Conference members of these services.

The goals of this Committee for 1977-78 were to make counseling available in more areas; to have three enrichment weekends; to continue to investigate the need for a Conference pastoral counselor; and to help our Conference members be more supportive of each other, especially in times of crisis, such as moving and illness. The accomplishments have been to fund and evaluate (with excellent response!) two weekends; to engage in a session with Dr. Iverson Graham, Director of the Pastoral Care and Counseling program of the South Carolina Conference; and to urge supportive love at moving time through the North Carolina Christian Advocate and through an appeal on June 7, 1978, to the clergy and lay persons at Annual Conference. We continue to seek counseling agencies in other parts of the Conference and expect to succeed with this by the end of 1978.

Gray Lectures were given by the Reverend Richard John Neuhaus, Senior Editor of *Worldview*, on "Freedom for Ministry." The Franklin S. Hickman Lectures, on "The Power of the Numinous and the Ministerial Priesthood," were presented by the Very Reverend Urban T. Holmes, III, Dean, School of Theology, University of the South. Bishops L. Scott Allen and Robert M. Blackburn conducted the Bishops' Forum. Five Workshops on Leadership in Worship Today were led by the Reverend Heather Murray Elkins of the Duke University Parish Ministry, on "Worship and Drama: Bodying the Word"; the Reverend Dr. H. Grady Hardin, LeVan Professor of Worship and Preaching, Perkins School of Theology, on "Worship and Preaching"; the Reverend Hoyt L. Hickman, Director of Worship Resourcing, Board of Discipleship, The United Methodist Church, on "Baptism, Confirmation, and Renewal";

the Reverend Dr. Paul Waitman Hoon, Henry Sloane Coffin Professor Emeritus, Union Theological Seminary, New York, on "The Christian Funeral"; and the Reverend Dr. James Floyd White, Professor of Christian Worship, Perkins School of Theology, on "Word and Table". Dr. White also gave a special lecture on "Liturgy, Theology of the Laity." Convocation Sermons were preached by Dr. Hardin, on "Sanctuary," and the Reverend Mr. Hickman, on "Remember Your Baptism." Choral music for the Convocation Services of Worship was led by the Divinity School Choir. The program also featured reunion class dinners and the general Alumni Association Luncheon.

The 1978 sessions will be held at Duke University October 23-25.

Methodist Board of Publication, Inc.

We are grateful to be able to give the annual conference an excellent progress report on the North Carolina Christian Advocate. Since June 1976, when C. A. Simonton, Jr., became editor of the Advocate, circulation has increased 51%. Circulation for the June 8, 1978, issue was 20,405. Of this number 9,649 were subscriptions in the North Carolina

Conference and 10,756 in the Western North Carolina Conference. We are hopeful that, with the continued support of the local churches, this circulation figure will be at least 25,000 by Dec. 31, 1978.

The circulation department has been completely revamped during the year. We have changed over from the older Addressograph, metal plate process to a modern Xerox process which has increased our efficiency and reduced the amount of time spent in processing new subscriptions. We now produce the labels which appear on the subscribers' newspapers right in our office. This gives us complete control of the circulation process so that we can trace all questions quickly that relate to the delivery of the Advocate to the subscriber.

We are most appreciative of the subscription campaigns that have been conducted in both conferences this year. We are hopeful that sustained promotion of the Advocate will continue to be one of the top priorities of the two annual conferences, at least until our circulation reaches 45,000 at which point the Advocate should be completely self-supporting.

The success of the Advocate is the result of a team effort. Local churches have been more alert in sending in their news than has been the case, according to old-timers, in quite a few years. The Advocate wants local news, and, where possible, accompanying black and white pictures.

Along with the bishops, district superintendents, pastors, and active lay persons, without whose support we could not sustain this ministry, we especially want to thank our regular contributors whose columns and features add so much to the vitality of our newspapers.

In anticipation of the weekly publication schedule, which is currently set for Jan. 1, 1979, we have hired a part-time person to assist in the bookkeeping and circulation departments.

The building at 429 W. Friendly Avenue has been sold and the offices of the Advocate are now located in the Main Administration Building, second floor, at Greensboro College.

Payments on the printing machinery, which was sold to Media, Inc., Greensboro, are being made on a regular schedule and are up-to-date. The Advocate has no outstanding indebtedness.

We believe the weekly publication schedule will greatly enhance the Advocate as an instrument of communication for our two conferences, and continue to solicit the prayers of all for this vital ministry of service to the Church.

Religion and Race

1. Provide an assessment consultation in each ethnic minority local church to determine needs, set goals, and determine the extent of conference support needed;
2. Review ethnic minority representation on all the conference boards, agencies, commissions, committees, and governing boards of related institutions, and make appropriate recommendations for total inclusiveness to the Annual Conference;
3. Seek ways of cooperating with Annual Conference boards and agencies as they seek to develop programs and policies of racial inclusiveness;

4. Advise with and assist the Coordinator of Special Ministries and Economic Development as he works with racial and ethnic minority groups seeking to develop programs of employment and ministry to communities;
5. Plan annual consultation with the Board of the Ministry and the Cabinet in making adequate provisions for pastoral leadership in the light of particular ethnic minority churches;
6. Be available to counsel with local churches which are seeking to establish multi-racial fellowship and encouraging and supporting local churches in maintaining a Christian ministry in racially changing neighborhoods;
7. Provide three opportunities for multi-racial and inter-ethnic dialogue;
8. Provide for one program of cooperation with Black and other ethnic denomination especially those of the Methodist family;
9. Evaluate the priorities of the Annual Conference in the light of the needs in the area of race relations;
10. Study the effects of merger and make recommendations to the Annual Conference;
11. Review the Annual Conference-related institutions concerning their practices of racial and ethnic inclusiveness in clientele and employment and reporting to the Annual Conference session.

Report of the Commission on the Status and Role of Women

"The primary purpose of the commission shall be to challenge The United Methodist Church, including its general boards and agencies, its institutions, and its connexional structures to a continuing commitment to the full and equal responsibility and participation of women in the total life and mission of the Church, sharing fully in the power and in the policy making at all levels of the Church's life." (The Book of Discipline 1976, paragraph 2101)..

The North Carolina Conference Commission takes very seriously the responsibility as set forth in the Discipline. Let me share with you some of the ways in which we are assuming this responsibility.

Last summer at Conference Leadership School, we had a course on the full participation of women in the life of the church. That course was oriented toward ways of getting lay women to assume positions of responsibility in the life of the church, and toward the support of clergy women as pastors of local churches. We will have this course again this summer with a slightly different theme. In this year's course we will look at getting women, both lay and clergy, to accept positions of responsibility beyond the local church. We will also look at some of the traps women fall into and/or are forced into when they become the "token woman" on a committee. We issue a special invitation to all women who are on conference boards and agencies to come and be a part of this course.

Another project which our commission has undertaken for this quadrennium deals with gathering statistics concerning the number of lay women in certain strategic offices in the local church. In connection with

this project, we have appointed Mrs. Jean Jerome as a liaison person with the cabinet to try to discover a better and easier way to compile these statistics.

In connection with the program recommendation concerning a Women's Day in the local church, a booklet of worship resources for use in such a worship service will be provided by our commission. A committee is presently at work on this project and would be happy to receive your suggestions. Members of this committee are Mrs. Jane Hook, Mrs. Jean Jerome, Rev. Bob Baldrige and myself. In addition, we will also provide a list of lay and clergy women who would be willing to fill a pulpit for such a service. This information will be distributed to you in one of the fall co-ordinated mailings.

You saw yesterday a sheet handed out by the Commission on Religion Race tallying the number of Women, blacks and native Americans on the various conference boards and agencies. Of the total 954 persons on conference boards and agencies only 150 or 15.7% are women. That's not a very adequate representation considering the fact that over 50% of the lay membership of our church are women. This is an area of real concern to our commission.

As a matter of information, may I report to you that we now have eight women ordained elder in our annual conference and seven others ordained deacon. We rejoice in this increasing number of clergy women. Those of us who are serving parish appointments also rejoice in the warm acceptance we have been given by the lay people of our churches.

We are moving in the right direction, but we are not there yet. There is much work left to be done. Will you join with all of us to see that the way of the Christ is followed in these matters in our church]

The final section of this report is a word of commendation for one who has been part of our commission since its beginning. The Rev. Harold Leatherman, better known to all of us as Harold Leatherperson, has not just been a cabinet representative. He has been a real member of our commission, struggling with us, guiding us in our decisions, inspiring us to do our best, challenging us to really step out, and always supporting us as we seek to fulfill the task which has been set before us. Since Harold will be leaving the cabinet this year, we wish to take this moment to say a very special thank you to a very special person.

Division of Stewardship

Our Discipline states that the purpose of the Division of Stewardship is "to interpret the biblical and theological basis for stewardship consistent with the doctrines of the United Methodist Church and inform the church of the same through educational channels and study materials.

Keeping this purpose in mind, we are presently involved in the development and publication of materials. These materials are designed to encourage a greater participation by the children of our Annual Conference.

It is the intent of our division to involve our children in systematic giving of their blessings received from God. This fall in cooperation with the Children's Council we will distribute the prepared materials with special training for workers with children.

The highlight for our division this past year was the class on "Simple Life Styles" taught during the Conference Leadership School by the Reverened John Schram. This class, with an enrollment of over 200, lifted up the need for our stewardship to touch every area of our life in light of our commitment to Christ. This year at Conference Leadership School the concept of "Voluntary Simplicity" will be carried one step further as we teach ways of practical application for every-day living.

It is the desire of our division that each local church develop a total program of stewardship in order that their membership might express the joy of giving. Each charge will be requested to submit their plans at Charge Conference in order that we might provide educational channels and study materials for their assisance.

I would remind the Conference that a variety of program options are presently available from our division through our staff coordinator, Reverend Frank Grill. We have materials on such areas as Simple Life Styles, Gifts and Wills, Family Financial Planning, Financial Fund Raising, Estate Planning, and Visual Aids. The film, "How Good Life Can Be", viewed at Conference last year, was received overwhelmingly throughout the conference. At present, with two copies available, it is booked for almost three months in advance.

STEWARDSHIP FACTS:

In 1977 the per-capita giving among the over 211 thousand Methodists of the North Carolina Conference increased over 56% from what it was five years ago (from \$70 to \$111). With an annual inflation rate of 6%, the dollar has deflated 34%. This means that we Methodists are giving more dollars than inflation has eroded.

This is due to several things:

1. More churches are employing programs of systematic giving.
2. Better interpretation of how money is being used in mission.
3. Enlarged channels through which to give, such as, Advance Specials, and Missional Priorities.
4. A deeper commitment to stewardship of financial resources by our local Methodists.

We have every reason to believe that the financial giving of our people will continue to grow in the coming year.

The division is presently establishing procedures to assist the Ethnic Minority Local Churches in their stewardship needs. With the addition of the Reverend Lafon Kincaid to our National Staff, we have recomended listening and training sessions to develop mateials that will enhance the work of these churches.

Among the active areas of our division is the Department of Gifts and Wills. We have been blessed with the service of our director of Deferred

Giving, Mr. Gerald Pierce, and at this time we would ask him to come and conclude our report.

Office of Deferred Giving

The efforts to attract deferred gifts for local churches and for agencies of the Conference during the last twelve months have been greeted with wide acceptance. One purpose of this report is to express deep gratitude to the pastors and lay persons who have contributed to that acceptance.

The program of deferred giving, having been given birth by and through the interest, generosity and kindly support of five of our agencies, has bloomed into a full Conference service. Although still supported financially by the agencies, the Deferred Giving Office has, during this past year, provided counsel in estate planning for the local churches through Methodist Men's groups, Sunday School programs, special seminars in the churches and personal ministries to individuals.

Though activity is vigorous there are many churches yet to avail themselves of these services. Another purpose of this report, then, is to invite each charge, church and individual to make use of our estate planning services. A request directed to the Conference Coordinator of Resources, C. Franklin Grill, or to me will insure either personal or group services in charitable estate planning. I urge you as delegates and pastors to accept this invitation to implement the ministry of your local committees on Gifts and Wills.

At Annual Conference last year it was recommended that each church adopt a goal of sponsoring at least one deferred giving emphasis during this year. To help facilitate that we responded to our own call by offering special direction in this area at the January Workshops. At that time each Chairperson for Gifts and Wills was given an opportunity to attend a training session in his District. Many responded and we shared a profitable time.

As a result of the efforts during this year our office has noted Wills written in favor of agencies, churches, scholarships and global missions totaling approximately \$356,000. Trusts for scholarships, either completed or in the process total approximately one quarter million dollars. In addition, a number of insurance policies have been purchased naming Conference agencies as beneficiary. These total several thousands of dollars.

As a point of information the estate planning services of the Office of Deferred Giving include: gift annuities, insurance, wills, trusts, pooled income opportunities as well as memorial funds. We will assist with the establishment of every kind of planned gift to any of the churches or agencies within the Conference.

It is my desire to assist every person within the Conference with their special estate plans. Please call on me to do this.

In the South lobby of Reeves Auditorium is the Deferred Giving display.

There you will find special brochures developed by our office to guide you in all areas of your planning. We hope that you will avail yourselves of those materials and that you will also use this Annual Conference opportunity to make a special request for counsel by completing one of the confidential questionnaires and depositing it in the sealed box at the display table.

I look forward to another year of vigorous activity as we strengthen our ties with the Division of Stewardship, the Methodist Foundation and with each individual and parish. I rejoice that we are recognizing this dimension of our personal stewardship and Christian life.

Task Force on Hunger

Durng 1977 the Task Force on Hunger attempted to apply the actions of WHEAT) World Hunger Education Action Together) in our Conference. The five different types of action presented by WHEAT are: 1) Intensive study of the problems of hunger; 2) Becoming directly involved in dealing with hunger issues in the local community; 3) Support related issues; 4) Provide financial support dealing with food needs, and 5) Change your own life-style toward reduced and less wasteful food and energy consumption.

Fourteen persons attended a "WHEAT ENABLING EVENT" at Sacred Heart College, Belmont, N.C. January 9-11, 1977. The purpose of this event was to train persons to be "Wheat Enablers." Upon returning the names of the "enablers" were distributed throughout the churches of the Conference. They were invited into local churches to interpret the problems of hunger and how to alleviate them. In addition to these "enablers" we are most fortunate in having Dr. Leonard Aurand as a Certified Hunger Interpreter of the Board of Global Ministries. He is well trained and equipped to deal with the issues of hunger and is available to our churches.

On Hunger Sunday, WHEAT COVENANT CARDS were distributed throughout the Conference. Members of local churches were given an opportunity to become involved in any or all of the five areas of action under WHEAT. These cards were sent back to the Task Force and responses were made to those who made commitments.

The Task Force also dealt with an issue raised at last Annual Conference. One of the issues raised was the problem of world hunger and the use of land for food production. A great deal of discussion centered around the conversion of land from tobacco to food and fiber. Mr. H.Frank Brooks made an amendment to the report as follows:

Be it resolved that the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church appeal to Methodists everywhere and to the entire

population of the United States to seek actively and to support personally increased prices paid to farmers for food and fiber production to that level which will provide a 6% per annum return on investment and a wage equal to that of the average industrial worker in the United States.

Though the amendment was defeated a motion was made to carry out the concern of Mr. Brooks. The motion by Jean Dorsett was:

That the concerns of the farmers with the North Carolina Conference as expressed by the Brooks amendment, be referred to the N.C. Conference Task Force on Hunger, that input be solicited from the farmers; and that the selection of representatives be made by the farmers themselves.

Our Task Force sought to carry out the concern and intent of this motion to the best of its ability. We were faced with the dilemma of getting farmers to select representatives. However, a group was called together to deal with this matter. The committee was: Clyde H. Dunn, Catherine Watson, Leonard Aurand, Frand Grill - all members of the Task Force on Hunger, and H. Frank Brooks. Also serving was Ralph S. Hughes, an agricultural economist. Much discussion took place as to how the conversion of land from tobacco to food and fiber products might be best accomplished. It became apparent specific ways would be difficult for our committee to suggest. We agreed on the principle of supporting the farmers in this conversion so that they would not suffer economic hardship. It was learned that Church and Society would be presenting a Position Paper on this matter at the 1978 Annual Conference. It was decided the concerns of the Dorsett Motion could best be handled through that group at the time.

Conference Board of Trustees

The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees was held at 12:30 p.m. June 7, 1978 at Methodist College during the Annual Conference Session.

The financial statements for the calendar year 1977 were presented by the Conference Treasurer. The Trustees Fund, Methodist Building Account, Staff Parsonages and Episcopal Residence Accounts are printed in Volume I, Schedules M, M-1 and M-2 of the 1978 Journal.

At the meeting of the Board on April 24, 1978, the insurance coverage for the Methodist Building and staff parsonages was reviewed and updated. The Methodist Building continues to be fully leased with leases containing utility escalator clauses. The Trustees, through the Treasurer Business Administrator, have endeavored to properly maintain the Methodist Building and all other Conference property entrusted in our care. Six of the staff parsonages are debt free and only \$6,610.46 remains to be paid on the seventh. The Episcopal Residence has an outstanding indebtedness of \$20,900.00.

The old Webb's Chapel Church property in Person County has been sold to C. Franklin Grill and wife Helge on behalf of the proposed "Webb's Chapel Restoration Association. Proceeds will be turned over to the Allensville United Methodist Church.

The Trustees authorized the sale of the Pleasant Grove Church property in the Elizabeth City District. Proceeds of the sale to be disbursed to the Trustees of the Elizabeth City District to be used in the organization of a new church in the District.

The United Methodist Men

Methodist Men's work in the North Carolina Conference is making steady progress toward its goal to increase the number of Fellowship groups, to improve the quality and type of programs, and to develop outreach ministries. In the annual reports submitted by local presidents, most of the groups are having church-centered programs at all meetings. The Executive Committees are meeting more often in planning sessions and as a result more projects are being undertaken. The projects seem to be showing more variety and imagination than previously. No longer are the United Methodist Men simply looked upon as the "church maintenance crew", although Plant Improvement Projects are in the program of nearly every group. The majority of the Fellowships are also trying to do additional projects beyond the local church. The money making projects are not just to raise money, but to finance a particular benevolent cause, such as, scholarships, home improvements for the elderly or indigent, financial aid for the needy, youth activities, church buses, and aid to the mentally retarded.

As to the increase in numbers, we are about 10% ahead of last year in the number of groups chartered with our national office. Of the 72 Annual Conferences we rank third in number of Chartered United Methodist Men Fellowships.

At the last meeting of Conference Presidents of United Methodist Men held in Nashville, it was decided that Men's Groups would combine in a national project to aid the Upper Room in its Prayer Ministry. Toward this end we are being asked to raise \$20,000, to supply an incoming WATS line into the Upper Room facilities for incoming prayer requests. Our share of this amount will come to less than \$25.00 per local group and should be easily raised. The Upper Room is asking United Methodist Men Fellowships to:

- 1) Join the Upper Room in an intentional nationwide partnership emphasis on prayer and the devotional life;
- 2) Become partners with The Upper Room in promoting Upper Room Covenant Prayer Groups in local churches through annual conference leadership;

- 3) Take initiative consistently to publicize the telephone number of the Living Prayer Center throughout their church and community.
- 4) Through our connection in the Annual Conference with local churches, seed to raise funds to initiate an incoming WATS line for prayer requests.

We pledge our support and ask that the Annual Conference lend its support to this opportunity.

United Methodist Women

Bishop Blackburn, Delegates, and visitors, I bring you greetings on behalf of the over 29,000 United Methodist women of the North Carolina Conference. A printed report has been given to each of you. Please read, carry them home with you and share with others in your church. We are proud of the work of United Methodist Women during 1977-78 and we feel that the capsule glimpses will share part of that story with you.

The chart on the back of the cover will help us understand the two hats which we wear. I wear first the hat of LCM (Local Church Member). The Local Church is the beginning of every gift. We give through Single Figure in our budgets. The church treasurer sends this to the Conference Treasurer who in turn sends a portion to World Service through the Council on Finance and Administration. We see that World Service supports 32% of the Budget of the Board of Global Ministries. Also, we give through our local church to Advance Specials and we note that these gifts support an additional 12% of the Budget of the Board of Global Ministries. Now, my other hat is the one we CHOOSE to wear when join our local Unit of United Methodist Women. The pledge I make to the local Unit helps with the Unit's total budget. The Unit gives a Pledge to Missions which is sent to the District Treasurer. She sends it to the Conference Treasurer and during 1977, \$245,747.97 was sent from the United Methodist Women in the North Carolina Conference to the Women's Division for Pledge Credit. We see that over 70% of the 1978 Budget of the Women's Division is sent to the Board of Global Ministries and the chart shows this amount makes up 40% of the Total Budget of the Board. Both hats which we wear as Women in the Church are important to the total support of MISSIONS. We continue to fulfill the purpose for which women in the church organized over 100 years ago - the support of Missions.

Being a part of the connectional system is sometimes very confusing to us on the local level. We are Local Methodist Women, but sometimes we hear of some action which the Women's Division takes and we become very excited. We feel that they did what we wanted them to do! But sometimes we become very upset when we do not agree with a decision the Woman's Division makes and we wonder just what this means to us in the local Units. May I share now an excerpt from a paper which I received on May 19, 1978 and this will be distributed this summer at Conference Leadership School in the class for United Methodist Women. *The Paper is entitled "Interpretation of Women's Division Policy and Program".

The Women's Division, the official policy-making body for UNITED METHODIST WOMEN is a corporation of 75 members. These persons are the elected representatives from the organization, having been nominated and elected through a multi-step process within the organization. The Division members are representatives from in the sense that:

1) they are part of a form of government in which the many (1.5 million members) are represented by 75 persons chosen from among them, by an elective process;

2) they are acting through delegated authority as authorized by General Conference.

3) they come from 54 of the 73 annual conferences.

This form of church government for the Women's Division and all other boards and agencies was patterned on the structures of the U. S. government. Each elected group speaks for itself (whatever its membership); and speaks to those in the church with whom it is authorized to work. The Women's Division speaks for itself, and to members of UNITED METHODIST WOMEN through its authority to "recommend programs and policies to UNITED METHODIST WOMEN." Only the General Conference, meeting once every four years speaks FOR the church."

Would you here today, join me and accept the theme of '78 of United Methodist Women of the North Carolina Conference - "GO AND TELL"....Go and Tell the story of United Methodist Women who are involved in and supporting Mission in Today's World as we strive to serve our Lord through this organization in our Church!

United Methodist Youth

The youth of the NC Conference began its 1977-78 year with a new Coordinator of Youth Ministries, J. Edward Morrison.

AT ACS, the governing body of the NC Conference UMYF in July 1977, officers were elected and resolutions acted upon. Resolutions were passed which dealt with such controversial issues as liquor-by-the-drink, abortions, and the Wilmington 10 -- issues which the Annual Conference failed to act on.

Mack McMillan was elected Conference President at ACS. Mack was from First Church in Henderson. Robin Sabiston from Durham was elected vice-president. Powell Osteen, also from Durham was chosen con-

ference treasurer by the delegates. Adelle Joyner from Goldsboro was selected as secretary, and Paul Stark from Raleigh was elected as LAP, legislative affairs person.

Mack McMillan, Paul Stark, and Ed Morrison were the NCC-UMYF representatives to the first National Youth Ministries Convocation (NYMO). While in Oklahoma at the NYMO meeting the representatives learned of many new ideas to help enrich the conference program, and they discovered where the NCC youth program stood in relation to other conference programs across the nation. The three NYMO delegates learned that the NCC has an unsurpassed summer youth opportunities program and that the NCC needed improvement in Youth Service Fund (YSF) giving and publicity by conference youth members.

Also, while in Oklahoma, Paul Stark was elected as a member-at-large of the NYMO steering committee.

Conference youth events this year have reflected the review they received in Oklahoma. Good attendance, superior spirit, and effective programs have been seen in all events during the 1977-78 year.

Senior High Weekend, a new opportunity created for this year and those in the future, gave senior high aged youth the opportunity to explore nature, body, and soul in a retreat setting, Camp Don-Lee.

Traing for Youth Ministry Enrichment Teams (YMET) was conducted for the second consecutive year in January at Camp Chestnut Ridge. YMET teams are six people groups that go into local church UMYF's to help improve local youth programs. YMET teams are now available through contact with the conference youth office in Raleigh.

LASER, Legislative Affairs-Search, Explore, Respond, was held in Raleigh in February for those senior high youth who were interested in how state government works. Attendance was the best ever for a LASER when the legislature was not in session, and the participants were enriched not only by the knowledge of more governmental facts, but also in a spirited way.

A Youth Study Tour to New York, Philadelphia, and Washington was conducted in March for Senior High Youth who find national and international politics and heritage interesting. The youth who attended the tour learned more about the nation, world, group living, spiritual enrichment, and meaningful relationships.

The Conference Youth Rally on April 1 at Methodist College drew the biggest crowd since the rallies were moved from Duke University. Nearly 800 people attended the rally. Singing, dancing, lunch on the grounds, and inspirational leadership in group building and worship by Rev. Milton Hadley highlighted the day's activities.

That Junior High Thing, an event for junior high aged NCC United Methodists, was held at Camp Chestnut Ridge in early May. The participants enjoyed recreation, dancing, group building and worship experiences in the retreat setting as they grew in their faith and belief in Jesus Christ.

A Conference Newsletter, a totally new development and concept in communication for the NCC Conference was begun in early 1978. The quarterly publication gives information needed by interested conference

youth on activities and YSF news. The newsletter is being funded through Youth Service Fund, the major way the youth of our church can be heard. Through an increase in YSF giving, by conference youth the newsletter became a reality.

A full slate of summer events awaits the conference's youth this summer.

In conclusion, the "state of youth ministry" in the NCC is excellent and getting better. The newsletter introduces conference events and programs and relates district news. Knowledge of and giving to Youth Service Fund has drastically increased over the last year. And, most importantly, youth events offered by the conference provide personal, spiritual and religious growth, insight and appreciation. Through conference level youth ministries many future leaders in the NCC United Methodist Church realize the importance of action--now. Youth Ministry in the NCC -- alive and growing.

Division of Worship

I. Accomplishments of 1977

In 1977 the Division of Worship focused its work on planning the Bishop's Meeting with Confirmation Classes, evening and early morning Holy Communion at Annual Conference, and worship at the Conference Leadership School.

The Committee to Plan the Bishop's Meetings with the Confirmation Classes was comprised of Andrew Hehry, chairperson; Roger Searles; Hugh Cameron; Anna Workman; and Jacqui Birt. The format remained basically unchanged from the previous year's, namely, fellowship singing, dividing of the group so that one half heard a presentation by the bishop while the other half saw and discussed a film, the two halves then switching, and a closing worship at which the bishop preached. Projects growing out of confirmation training were displayed and shared in the period when the film was shown. Meeting places and leaders were Aberdeen on March 5, Robert Pullman; Saint Paul, Goldsboro, on March 12, Andrew Henry; Tarboro on March 19, J. Sam MacMillan; and Edenton Street, Raleigh, on March 26, Fred Falls, Jr.

At Annual Conference the services planned by John Harwood, J. Thomas Smith, and Roger Searles received the highest ratings possible in an evaluation of the conference. The evening services are described on pages 153 and 163 of the 1977 Journal. Early morning Holy Communion was conducted in Hensdale Chapel on both Tuesday and Wednesday mornings.

The division was responsible for the six worship services at Conference Leadership School. The three quadrennial emphases were used as themes.

In the week-end session the two services were based on Hunger and the Ethnic Minority Local Church. Worship leaders were Claude Dial and Thomas A. Collins. The week session of worship services included all three emphases plus a summary theme of love. Worship leaders for the week session were James McCallum, Ruth Cade, Seaborn Blair, Bishop Blackburn, Robert Pullman, and Gayla Estes. Both sessions closed with Holy Communion. Cornelius Henderson of Atlanta, Georgia was preacher. Classes on worship taught at the Conference Leadership School were "Children and Worship" taught by Ara Tirzai and "Chancel Drama" by Jack and Ted Miles.

Robert Pullman attended the Consultation on the Black Church in Laurinburg July 29-30, Gregory Bell, Roger Searles, and Robert Pullman went to Horizons '77 a national convocation on church music and worship, in Santa Clara, California, July 17-22.

The conference office made available to District Coordinators of Children's Ministries further copies of "Making Worship Meaningful to Children." We responded positively to the request by the Commission on the Status and Role of women to include a fairer representation of women in conference worship services for which our divisions was responsible.

II. Immediate Major Concerns

A. In 1977 the average weekly attendance at the principal worship service(s) was 73,228 persons. At no other one gathering in our conference do we have that many persons to participate. This average is almost 17,000 above the nearest average attendance, which is that of the Sunday Church School. This principal weekly worship service (usually 11 o'clock on Sunday in most churches) brings into focus in our worship of God, at one time or another, ecumenical affairs, education, missions, religion and race, and social concerns and is the main thrust of evangelism and stewardship for most churches. Please note that from 1976 to 1977 we dropped by 2504 persons in our principal weekly worship attendance and in five years have fallen by 3476 persons in this attendance. Such a decline should alarm us all! I would suggest that we also look at this attendance decline as one cause for our slow growth in new members in this conference. Hence, what happens in the principal weekly worship is of vital importance to each local church, and great care should be given in making this a truly significant event each week. Our division stands ready to aid our conference in any way to enhance this experience, and we welcome any written suggestions how we may help pastors and others who plan and carry out this service.

B. To that end we shall sponsor demonstration workshops on Holy Communion March 12-15, 1979, in four areas of our conference under the leadership of the Reverend Hoyt Hickman, who is one of the most knowledgeable persons on Holy Communion in Section on Worship of the Board of Discipleship. Our primary aim in each workshop is to look at the alternate rituals of Holy communion prepared by our general church and to use one of them in closing. Because the Lord's Supper is so vital in worship we encourage all ministers and any interested laypersons to attend.

C. Further, the trend in public worship in the United Methodist Church is

the use of the lectionary prepared by the Consultation on Church Union (COCU) as the basis for Scripture selections and preaching.

The values of lectionary preaching are as follows:

1. Preaching is forced to be Biblical.
2. This preaching covers a variety of concerns in Scripture and avoids overworking the preacher's favorite themes.
3. The Christian year is followed in preaching.
4. The music and other acts of worship can be focused on these Scripture passages.
5. The unity of the church is present in that there is a common use of Scripture each week.
6. Bible study groups using the lectionary can enrich a preacher's sermon preparation.

This approach is not intended to be inflexible. Let any one who doubts the value of lectionary preaching try it for a season of the Christian year and see what it does for his or her preaching. He or she will be amazed how these orderly readings from the Word of God speak to the concerns of his or her congregation.

Group B—Conference Legislation

1978 SUPPLEMENTAL PROGRAM

I. RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE LOCAL CHURCH COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

That each local church Council on Ministries in each Ethnic Minority Local Church shall consider appointing a task force for the purpose of actively recruiting persons for full-time church vocations. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE DISTRICT COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

That each District Council on Ministries, in districts where there are Ethnic Minority Local Churches, shall consider having a consultation to consider the needs and opportunities of the Ethnic Minority Local Church by December 31. To be implemented by the district Council on Ministries.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

A. Recommendations Which Shall be Done

1. That a Conference-wide Evangelistic Rally bearing witness to our church heritage and faith in Christ and featuring United Methodist singing, preaching, and witnessing shall be held on December 2 at the new Raleigh Civic Center, beginning at 10:00 a.m. and lasting until 3:00 p.m. To be implemented by the Division of Evangelism.
2. That a Conference-wide Consultation on the Ethnic Minority Local Church shall be held to consider the ministerial needs and opportunities of the Ethnic Minority Local Church, and to be attended by the Cabinet, members of the Division of Ordained Ministry, and the Pastors, Chairpersons of the Committees on Pastor-Paris Relations and other key laypersons from the Ethnic Minority Local Churches. To be implemented by the Bishop in cooperation with the Committee on Career Planning and Counseling.

B. Recommendations Which Shall be Considered

1. That a pilot project of sub-district listening sessions shall be considered for one district of the Conference for the purpose of hearing the concerns and interests of local church members. To be implemented by the Committee on Research and Planning of the Conference Council on Ministries.
2. That a Younger Elementary Camp for children finishing first and second grades shall be considered for Camp Don-Lee, August 13-16. To be implemented by the Division of Education.

3. That a Labor Day Family Weekend shall be considered for Camp Don-Lee, September 1-4. To be implemented by the Division of Education.
4. That Senior Adult Fishing Days shall be considered for Camp Don-Lee, October 2-5. To be implemented by the Division of Education.
5. That a Children's Music Camp shall be considered for Camp Don-Lee in mid-August. To be implemented by the Division of Education in cooperation with the Conference Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians.

That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider organizing study groups (children, youth, adults) on the subject of conversion, with Christian Nurture materials to be used based upon commitment and "Born to Grow" study materials. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.

- b. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider utilizing "The Comprehensive Plan for Evangelism" in planning evangelism programs to reach its membership growth goals. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.
- c. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider promoting the use of small group experiences to strengthen the spiritual growth of persons, using such models as "Edge of Adventure" by Miller and Larson, and the "Upper Room Prayer Covenant Group." To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries with assistance from the Division of Worship.

2. World Hunger

- a. That the local church Council on Ministries shall consider participating to the extent of its resources in meeting the needs of persons in poverty and hunger in the community. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.
- b. That the local church shall consider conducting a Hunger Education/Action Study in order for the congregation to become informed about and be able to respond to hunger related issues. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.
- c. That the local church Council on Ministries shall consider having a workshop on the Simple Life Style consisting of three two-hour sessions, using material provided by the Division of Stewardship. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.

3. Ethnic Minority Local Church

- a. That each local church shall consider having a special program on "The Ethnic Minority Local Church in the North Carolina Conference," using audio-visual and other resources provided by the Conference Council on Ministries. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.
- b. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider participating in a program which would make possible a two-week exchange of pastors with a church of another race located in the North Carolina Conference. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries in cooperation with the District Superintendent and the Task Force on the Ethnic Minority Local Church.

That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider making a survey of local distributors/outlets of pornographic materials (books, magazines, movies and other related materials) within the local community, and applying pressure to remove these items from view and sale. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries with assistance from the Division of Church and Society.
3. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider starting a Yokefellow Prison Ministry Unit or actively supporting one that is now in existence. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.
4. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider sending representatives to the workshop on state legislative affairs to be held during January. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries in cooperation with the Division of Church and Society.
5. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider observing February as Social Concerns Month. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries with materials and helps provide by the conference Division of Church and Society.
6. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider providing study sessions on "Current Social Issues Facing North Carolina" and using resources developed by the Division of Church and Society in cooperation with the Division of Education and the Conference Council on Ministries. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.
7. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider forming a Young Adult Council under the direction of the Young Adult Coordinator for the purpose of determining young adult needs and designing programs to meet those needs. To be implemented by the local church Council on Ministries.
8. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider formulating and developing at least one new church or community caring ministry to persons with special needs, e.g. Meals on Wheels, friendly visitors, day care center, recreation center, help for the bereaved, Contact Teleministry, telephone reassurance, Big Brothers, half-way house, senior citizens group, tape ministry to shut-ins. That each local church Council on Ministries shall consider sponsoring work teams overseas, nationally, within the Conference, district, or local community as a means of broadening the local church's participation and education in the program of mission outreach. THE BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

NUMBER ONE THE WILMINGTON TEN CASE

POSITION PAPER
Of the Division of Church and Society
Of the North Carolina Conference
February 21, 1978

Within the boundaries of our Conference, we still have an apparent violation of human rights that cannot be ignored. To briefly review the situation, the "Wilmington Ten" case grew out of a time of racial unrest in 1970-71 when the New Hanover schools were first desegregated. As tensions grew, so did violent disturbances. The Reverend Eugene Templeton, pastor of Gregory Congregational Church, was encouraged by the Reverend Aaron Johnson, a member of the NC Good Neighbor Council, to ask for help for the black students. They invited the Reverend Ben Chavis who was working for the Commission on Racial Justice in the United Church of Christ.

Using Gregory Church as their meeting place, and with a member of the local Human Relations Council, Ann Shephard Turner, they planned for more effective, peaceful ways or protesting. As these meetings went on during the first week in February, armed white persons came into the

black community and fired upon the church and parsonage. When unable to get police protection, some blacks armed themselves and shot back.

Out of the turmoil, ten persons were charged the following year for the burning of Mike's Grocery, a white owned shop in the midst of the black community. They also were charged with conspiring to assault emergency personnel. They were tried and convicted for these crimes and sentenced for up to 34 years.

There have been many causes for concern since that trial and sentencing, and we believe that injustice has not been adequately alleviated by the Governor's partial reduction of sentences on January 23. Some of the grievances are as follows:

1. The only known evidence linking the Ten with the crime charged was given by three persons who were, at the time of the trial, serving time for other crimes. Allen Hall had himself been tried and convicted for burning the grocery and sentenced to 12 years. Since the trial of the "Ten," all three have recanted their testimony and then their recantations.

2. Apparently, the three witnesses against the "Ten" were induced to give false testimony. Allen Hall was promised by the prosecutor that he would be out of jail in six months even though he had a 12 year sentence. The sentence being served by Jerome Mitchell was changed, allowing him to be paroled. Eric Junious was given a mini-bike and a job.

3. The names of the accused were derived one year after the burning of the grocery store. They were obtained from allegations by Allen Hall, who had been convicted and sentenced and was in prison for that crime. The jury did not hear all of the evidence. The jury was unaware of promises to the witnesses, alibis for some of the accused, and the contents of the missing file of the North Carolina Good Neighbor Council.

4. Many serious crimes were committed during this period but the "Ten" were the only major arrests. Governor Hunt thought the sentences were too long for youthful offenders. We believe the sentences were extremely harsh, and that the "Ten" were penalized for their civil rights activities as a result of built-up feelings of anger and frustration.

The news coverage following Governor Hunt's statement has indicated that the whole world is watching North Carolina's struggle to be just in a matter of human rights. With the many irregularities that have been disclosed, how can we continue to say that justice is being served by their continued imprisonment? The position of the Division of Church and Society of the North Carolina Conference is that justice has not been done and that the "Ten" should be released from prison. We ask that the following actions be taken:

1. That individuals write President Carter and the Justice Department, asking that this case be investigated as a civil rights case.

2. That the local churches avail themselves of information for group study and understanding.

3. That the people of our Conference support our Bishop in his visit to the Governor on behalf of human rights.

NUMBER TWO THE PANAMA CANAL TREATIES

POSITION PAPER
Of the Division of Church and Society
Of the North Carolina Conference
February 21, 1978

Our 1976 General Conference passed a resolution on the Panama Canal which stated, in part:

...The ethical imperatives of the Christian gospel for equity, restitution, reconciliation, and self determination of peoples impels us to seek rectification of this unjust relationship...Early in this century, the United States initiated diplomatic and military activities which led to the separation of Panama from Columbia (and to the existing) treaty openly admitted by the Secretary of State, John hay, to be unequal and disadvantageous to Panama...The continuance of the terms and arrangements of the present Canal Zone treaty is a grave source of irritation and hostility not only between Panama and the United States but also between Latin America Republics and the United States.

Under the terms of the proposed new treaty, after the U.S. presence in Panama terminates at the close of this century, a provision will come into effect in which the U.S. and Panama assume mutual responsibility for the neutrality of the Canal.

United States ratification will enhance our relations with our Panamanian neighbors, other Latin American neighbors, and the Third World generally, and our prospects for living in peace with them; whereas our failure to ratify would do irreparable damage to our relations with them. In addition, we believe that our access to the Canal is better insured by its operation by a friendly neighbor than by our own operation of it in a hostile environment.

THE POSITION OF THE DIVISION OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY OF THE NC CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH IS THAT THE UNITED STATES SHOULD RATIFY THE NEW PANAMA CANAL TREATIES.

SUGGESTED ACTIONS BASED ON THIS POSITION;

1. By individuals: Write letters, make visits and telephone calls to Senators Jesse Helms and Robert Morgan (U.S. Senate, Washington, DC 20510). Raise the issue with others through letters to the editor of

local newspapers and participation in radio call-in programs.

2. By local churches: Have studies, programs, and sermon references on the issues; discussions in adult and youth Sunday School classes, United Methodist Women, and United Methodist Men. Include Panama as an issue in your Church-Wide Study on the Caribbean Crescent.

3. By Districts and Annual Conference: The District Council on Ministries promote the Church-Wide Study on the Caribbean Crescent; recruit attendance for the Adult Study Tour in March, 1978, with the theme, "Our Neighbors to the South." A resolution endorsing ratification should be considered by the Annual Conference if the treaty has not been ratified by that time.

NUMBER THREE THE ARMS RACE AND DISARMAMENT

POSITION PAPER

Of the Division of Church and Society

Of the North Carolina Conference

February 21, 1978

The 1976 General Conference passed a resolution stating that "the momentum of the arms race never slackens and the danger of a holocaust is

imminent. meanwhile, millions starve, development stagnates, and international cooperation is threatened. Increasingly sophisticated weapons systems accelerate arms spending and heighten anxieties without adding to the security of nations. Again and again, regional tensions grow, conflict erupts, and great powers intervene to advance or protect their interests without regards to human rights...If humanity is to move out of this period of futility and constant peril, the search for new weapons systems must be halted through comprehensive international agreements."

Micah and Isaiah said, "And He shall judge among the nations, and shall rebuke many people and they shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks: nations shall not lift up their sword against nation, neither shall they learn of war any more." (*Micah 4:3, Isaiah 2:4*)

There is no question that there is an arms race among all of the military nations of the world. Total world military expenditures in 1977 alone were estimated at more than \$370 billion dollars (Film Feedback: Disarmament, General Board of Church and Society). Since World War II the cumulative world military expenditure amounts to approximately \$4,500 billion according to 1970 constant prices. Military expenditures have increased 4.5% annually since 1948. The total world military expenditure has been 1) equivalent to the combined gross national product of 65 countries in Latin America and Africa, 2) equivalent to the total world-wide expenditures on education, or 3) about twice as large as the value of all official assistance provided to underdeveloped countries by all nations.

The arms race is not only costly, but dangerous. At the end of World War II only five countries, the United States, the Soviet Union, England, Canada, and Sweden, had any significant capacity to develop major weapons. In 1973 thirty countries were engaged in this activity. In March of 1960 Senator John F. Kennedy stated that the world's nuclear stockpiles amounted to the equivalent of about 10 tons of T.N.T. for every person on this globe. In the late 1940's following World War II the United States was invulnerable to an attack by any other nation. Since that time, the arms race has brought us to the point where we are incapable of preventing rockets from destroying our country at this very moment. We live in a time of "crisis stability," hoping that calm heads will prevail.

The position of the North Carolina Conference Division of Church and Society is that the United States should: 1) take the lead in the control of arms and in disarmament; 2) curtail its own military production to that which is absolutely necessary for defense; 3) pare down its own military spending, and 4) divert remaining yearly military funds towards human needs.

With this position, we encourage the following actions:

1. By individuals: Contact your congressmen through visits, letters, or phone calls and to voice your opinions on the arms race and disarmament. Support amendments transferring some of the funds proposed for military expenditures to programs dealing with human needs. Help organize educational events for your community with disarmament and the arms race as the topic.

NUMBER FOUR
THE ISSUE OF TOBACCO

POSITION PAPER

Of the Division of Church and Society
Of the North Carolina Conference
February 21, 1978

Without question, the tobacco industry has made a positive economic impact on the state of North Carolina. Tobacco has provided the major income of many small, family-owned farms; also, it has helped found such humanitarian enterprises as the Duke Endowment Fund. However, against this story of economic benefit, we hear the words of Jesus saying, "Man shall not live by bread alone..." (*St. Matthew 4:4a RSV*)

For 14 years, the Surgeon General has declared cigarette smoking to be injurious to personal health. Other leading medical authorities have concurred. Recently, the Secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare stated that some 78,000 persons died last year of lung cancer directly related to their personal use of tobacco. (*News and Observer*, January 12, 1978) Spurred by evidences of the harmful effects of cigarette smoking, the 1976 General Conference adopted a resolution stating: "The United Methodist Church discourages persons from taking up this generally habituating practice." In concert with this statement is that found in *The Book of Discipline, 1976*, which says: "As the use...of tobacco is a major factor in both disease and death, we support educational programs encouraging abstinence from such use." (Paragraph 72, I-Alcohol and Other Drugs, page 93)

Tobacco is generally considered to be an intensive crop; that is, to be grown successfully, tobacco demands a large investment of money, a great amount of land, a superabundant supply of water, and an extraordinary expenditure of time and labor. Just a few years ago that kind of investment would not have been challenged; but today, we live in a time emphasizing conservation of all natural and human resources. As we simultaneously face shortages and increased human need of many essential commodities, we must ask ourselves in which ways we can most properly and most faithfully utilize our time, money, land, water, and other resources. These considerations raise definite ethical questions—questions which must be faced as we struggle with the tobacco issue. Because of these many ethical questions concerning tobacco, the 1976 General Conference adopted the following statement: "We urge the Department of Agriculture and other government agencies to plan for and assist in the orderly economic transition of the tobacco industry—tobacco growers, processors, and distributors—into other, more benign lines of production."

With this background of reasoning, realizing the tremendous health hazard that tobacco represents, feeling compelled by the Gospel of Jesus Christ to seek the health and well-being of all persons, with deep convictions concerning our role as stewards of the earth's God-given resources and with a concern for the economic well-being of our many family farms in North Carolina, the North Carolina Conference Division of Church and Society states its position on the issue of tobacco as follows: (1) WE

ENCOURAGE ALL PERSONS TO ABSTAIN FROM SMOKING. (2) WE ENCOURAGE FARMERS TO CONVERT THEIR FARM LAND FROM TOBACCO TO MORE BENIGN AND BENEFICIAL PRODUCTION. (3) WE ENCOURAGE STATE AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO RESEARCH AND DEVELOP PROGRAMS OF AID TO FARMERS INVOLVED IN TOBACCO CONVERSION SO AS TO MAKE THIS CONVERSION ECONOMICALLY FEASIBLE AND PROFITABLE.

With this position, we suggest for United Methodist people the following actions: (1) Make a personal commitment to abstain from smoking as a faithful witness to the liberating and redeeming power of God. Encourage family and friends, out of love and concern for their well-being, to abstain from smoking. (2) If you are a tobacco farmer, seriously consider the ethical implications of planting a crop that may issue in the death of others. As a step of faith, convert your own tobacco acreage to other more beneficial production. (3) Encourage local Church School classes and other study groups to study this issue seriously. (4) On Local Church, District, and Conference levels, develop task groups of concerned persons to conduct feasibility studies of possible alternatives to tobacco production. (5) Actively publicize any pilot project of tobacco conversion. (6) Contact local, state, and national representatives encouraging them to work for aid (economic, legislative, social, etc.) for those farmers and workers willing to make the transition from tobacco to alternative crop production. Urge the assistance of the Department of Agriculture in providing information on how farmers can convert from tobacco to other crops.

EMPLOYMENT CONDITIONS IN NORTH CAROLINA
AS ILLUSTRATED IN THE CONFLICT BETWEEN

We believe it is time to have collective bargaining in the textile industry of North Carolina. For a long time there was little organization of workers in any industry in our state, but unionization has slowly increased. The textile industry has continued to resist this organized attempt to bring collective bargaining to North Carolina.

The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist church (paragraph 73) states: "We support the right of public and private...employees and employers to organize for collective bargaining into unions and other groups of their own choosing. Further, we support the right of both parties to protection in so doing, and their responsibility to bargain in good faith within

the framework of the public interest. In order that the rights of all members of the society may be maintained and promoted, we support innovative bargaining procedures that include representatives of the public interest in negotiation and settlement of labor management contracts including some that may lead to forms of judicial resolution of issues." In the present dispute between the J.P. Stevens Company and the Textile Workers' Union in Roanoke Rapids, each side has accused the other of not bargaining in good faith; therefore, no contract has materialized. It appears that some sort of judicial arbitration may be necessary to even obtain an initial contract.

The United Methodist Church speaks on this as well as many other controversial social issues because the Bible calls for justice and fair play with a special concern for the poorest people in society. The Church's first Social Creed in 1908 called "for the principle of conciliation and arbitration in industrial disputes" because the Church believed in "the recognition of the Golden Rule and the mind of Christ as the supreme law of society and the sure remedy for all social ills." We continue to believe that there is no secular or political dispute to which Christ's teaching does not apply. We believe that those who insist that the church remain silent on current controversial issues are actually asking the church to adopt a new religion that is unbiblical and unchristian. We speak because the Bible calls upon the church to speak.

The history of employment conditions in North Carolina shows that justice is often wanting in our state. With the textile industry's relative low wage scale, with safe and healthful working conditions in dispute, with job security at issue, and with finances for retirement inadequate, North Carolina needs a dignified and workable democratic procedure whereby differences of opinion can be worked out in the textile industry.

Our position is that there should be good faith collective bargaining. To have collective bargaining, the workers must be organized. To have good faith bargaining that resolves disputes, there must eventually be a third party—perhaps even a judicial party—to arbitrate and settle controversial issues on which the company and the organized workers are unable to agree. This has been the American way.

B

(1) That groups within our churches study the Bible, our *Discipline* (paragraph 73), and this Position Paper in relation to employment practices in our state and particularly in relation to the J.P. Stevens-Union struggle.

(2) That church members and groups join us in calling upon both companies and workers to engage in responsible collective bargaining concerning employment practices so that disputes can be resolved in a democratic way which will bring more justice to the business community, including both companies and workers, in North Carolina.

C

NUMBER SIX
ADVOCACY FOR VULNERABLE ADULTS

POSITION PAPER

Of the Division of Church and Society
Of the North Carolina Conference
February 21, 1978

The Division of Church and Society of the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church advocates the protection of vulnerable adults, in this contest, are defined as the elderly, mentally or physically disabled persons, including patients in nursing homes, and women subject to recurring physical abuse, referred to as battered women. Advocacy involves speaking up for the rights of such persons, negotiating access to services, and assisting people to speak up for themselves. These adults, because of their own circumstances and lack of power are often unable to extricate themselves from dangerous or exploitative situations.

Many familiar Bible passages, most notably the righteous indignation of Amos and Micah and the teachings of Jesus, exhort the faithful to "Hate what is evil, love what is right, and see that justice prevails in the courts."¹ The United Methodist Social Creed in paragraph 73 of the *Discipline* states, "We commit ourselves to the rights of men, women... the aging, and handicapped of all ages..."

The need for study and action in the area of adult advocacy is supported by current statistics. The North Carolina Department of Human Resources in 1977 estimated that 874,000 North Carolina adults had special needs because of advanced age or some type of disability.² This would be one of every six people or 16 per cent of the population of the state. The income of approximately one of every two older adults in North Carolina does not support daily basic needs as measured by national guidelines for poverty.³ North Carolina has greater numbers of elderly than any other southern state except Florida. Seventy-four counties in North Carolina have 15,451 beds in licensed nursing homes, 4 and these are 90 to 95 per cent occupied. Yet, only two counties have advocacy service to give assistance in case of violation of a patient's rights. The number of battered women in the United States is estimated by some to be as high as half of all married women. More accurately, a Piedmont county rural health clinic found that 40 per cent of the women who came to the clinic reported physical abuse.⁵ Throughout the picture runs the thread of poverty, particularly severe for the elderly and the disabled, who have little hope of bettering their condition.

Local communities have many resources which can be brought to bear on the problems of vulnerable adults. At least one staff member in each Department of Social Services has been designated an Adult Protective Services worker. Legal aid is sometimes available, and the NC Bar Association states that the county bar association provides legal aid for indigent clients when needed. Many counties have Councils on Aging; each planning region has a coordinator for aging. Each county is served by a mental health clinic or center. Larger communities may have rape crisis centers which also provide emergency help for battered women. Police can organize neighborhood watch programs to help protect the elderly, who are the most frequent victims of crime. Other community agencies which should be enlisted are Committees on Human Relations, consumer health agencies, and local hospitals.

The area of advocacy is ideal for local church and ecumenical action. Since a majority of the elderly are women, advocacy is an excellent project for women's groups such as United Methodist Women, Church Women United, General Federation of Women's Clubs, American Association of University Women, and home economics extension clubs.

Suggested Action:

1. By Individuals: Learn about the support given by your community agencies to adults "at risk;" ask questions about advocacy when you talk with social workers, doctors, counselors, and ministers; volunteer to participate in the Food Stamp Outreach Program.

2. By Churches: Educate church members to the community and statewide needs of vulnerable adults; encourage publicity on existing advocacy programs and support of them; invite the Adult Protective Services Worker from the Department of Social Services to speak to your church group; promote communitywide efforts to respond to the problems of vulnerable adults in areas where no help exists; exert pressure on county commissioners to provide more staff and funds for needed advocacy programs.

RECOMMENDATION FROM THE COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF A CAPITAL FUNDS CAMPAIGN

The nineteen hundred and seventy-seven (1977) session of the North Carolina Annual Conference passed a resolution authorizing Bishop Robert M. Blackburn to appoint a committee to study the feasibility of a Capital Funds Campaign. The resolution recognized that the pension per-service-year rate is woefully inadequate; that we have a long term debt of more than eleven million dollars, and that there has been thirteen years since we have had a major capital funds campaign. Further, the resolution stated that the committee was "to set in motion the mechanics of such a proposal" and present the same as the regular meeting of the Annual Conference in June of nineteen hundred and seventy-eight (1978).

The Committee met several times, carefully examining the needs for Pensions, Colleges, The Retirement Homes, The Methodist Home for Children and Camps. Dr. Frank Countryman, with the Department of Finance and Field Service was called in for consultation. After much consideration, the Committee recommends that we conduct a Capital funds Drive to raise three million dollars over a period of three years with the payment beginning in January of nineteen hundred and seventy-nine (1979). It is also recommended that we secure the services of the Department of Finance and Field Service to conduct the campaign. The following distribution is proposed:

Pensions	\$3,000,000
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This proposal will be presented in each district during the training session for the delegates to the North Carolina Annual Conference, and to the regular session of the North Carolina Annual Conference meeting in June of nineteen hundred and seventy-eight (1978) for its action.

Additional recommendations are:

1. Our conference goal will be broken down into local church goals.
2. Bishop Blackburn will be authorized to appoint a Steering Committee.
3. Monies raised in the Capital Funds Campaign shall be excluded from the total minies raised in arriving at the Fair Share Apportionment.
4. Insofar as finances will be used in determining the goal for each local church in the Capital Fund Campaign, the base used by the Steering Committee and CFA shall be representative of an average of the net money for the years 1975, 1976, and 1977.

DIVISION OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

The Division of Diaconal Ministry is a new happening in this quadrennium. The members of this Division, coming from all twelve districts, reflect as accurately as possible the professions involved, those working with them and those of us who utilize their services. We have spent some time studying our Handbook/Guidelines and discussing our questions and problems with Edith Goodwin and R. Hipps from the Division of Diaconal Ministry, General Board of Higher Education and Ministry in Nashville. In these efforts we have attempted to learn what our responsibilities are both to the Annual Conference and to the persons whose interests we represent.

It is our responsibility, working with the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, to certify at various levels, the Lay People who are employed by the church either full or part-time in the fields of Christian Education, Music and Evangelism.

We accept certification by the Board of Global Ministries for those persons certified as Church and Community Workers, as Deaconesses, and as Home Missionaries.

We accept certification by the General Division of Finance and Administration, Division of Field Service working with the United Methodist Association of Church Business Administrators.

Finally, we accept certification of Health and Welfare Workers by the Health and Welfare Council of the United Methodist church in co-operation with the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries, Board of Global Ministries.

These eight categories of certifications at various levels—Minister, Director, or Associate—represent academic and professional certifications which are established. Further personal and spiritual standards are required by the Interview Committee of the Division of Diaconal Ministry, working with the Local Charge Conference where the individual holds church membership.

This is to keep you, the Annual Conference, reminded that Diaconal Ministry is involved with Lay Persons whose calling is to render service to the church on a full-time basis, committing their lives to this endeavor.

We would also remind the local churches who employ such persons that every effort should be made to pay salaries which are commensurate with the education and training of the individual involved. We tend, in most instances, I think, to pay the least amount we think a person will accept to do a job for us. But I call to your attention that a Director of Christian Education, for instance, is not just someone hired on a part-time basis to work with the youth. A Director of Christian Education has gone to graduate school and holds a Master's Degree in Christian Education and is skilled and knowledgeable in *all* areas of Christian Education. If you are accustomed to calling anyone who works in Christian Education a "Director of Christian Education," you should be aware that there is a difference. There are Ministers of Christian Education, Directors of Christian Education, Associates in Christian Education, and Educational Assistants. A Minister of Christian Education is an Ordained Minister who is also trained in Christian Education. An Associate of Christian Education is one who

has an undergraduate degree with courses in Bible, theology and Christian Education. An Educational Assistant is one who is not currently certified but is employed as an educator by a local church.

We have in our conference several churches who employ highly qualified lay persons as Program Directors. No certification guidelines have been established for this category. But I have requested the General Division of Diaconal Ministry to establish such standards for the next quadrennium. If such persons enter Diaconal Ministry at the present time, it will have to be in one of the eight categories mentioned earlier for which certification standards have been established—usually Christian Education.

If you are employing a Diaconal Minister, you should consider that this is a life-time commitment and establish health insurance and retirement benefit programs. The retirement plan we now have is with the General Church in Evanston, Illinois. A minimum of 9% (maximum 12%) of the salary is contributed toward retirement. This is usually 6% contributed by the employer and 3% by the individual, or the employer may, as some have done, contribute the entire 9%.

Continuing Education funds should be established for these persons to attend workshops at Lake Junaluska or National and State convocations, where further advancement of learning and enrichment occurs.

Great progress has been made in many churches—a fact for which we are truly grateful. Further progress needs to be made in a good many more as they consider their role of employer toward an employee who is giving a life-time commitment to work in the church.

The following persons have been certified in their field of work and have been recommended by their Local Charge Conference. We recommend them for consecration as Diaconal Ministers:

Daniel F. Holland, certified Director of Music, is transferring from the Western North Carolina Conference. He is a member of Jarvis Memorial United Methodist Church in Greenville.

Dana Bunn, Diaconal Minister, Director of Christian Education, Ederton Street United Methodist Church.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY

The Joint Committee on Disability acts as the advocate of those ministers in the North Carolina Conference who are forced by physical or emotional disability to seek temporary or permanent relief from their appointment. The committee is given the responsibility to study the problems of disability within the Conference, to provide a continuing personal ministry to those who are disabled, and to make recommendations to the appropriate agencies of the Conference for each minister seeking Disability Leave, including the source of their disability income.

The following recommendations are presented to the 1978 Session of the North Carolina Conference:

1. The Joint Committee on Disability will make available upon request the necessary forms for any minister to make application for Disability Leave. In all cases the applications must be completed by the minister, the physician, and the district superintendent before the request for Disability Leave can be acted upon. It is the recommendation of the Joint committee on Disability that such requests be presented before May 15 for inclusion in the committee's report to the Annual Conference Session.

2. The Joint Committee on Disability may require physiological and psychological examinations when deemed necessary by the committee. These will be done by a physician approved by the committee, and in such a case the committee may share the expense of the examination in an amount not to exceed \$100.00

3. The Joint Committee on Disability will study each application for Disability Leave submitted by ministers of the Conference to determine the recommendation of the minister's physician and district superintendent, particularly as it reflects the anticipated length of the minister's disability. We recommend the payment of support funds for those ministers deemed temporarily disabled (or able to return to their appointment within the Conference year) from the Emergency Relief Fund and those who are deemed permanently disabled from the disability provisions of the Board of Pensions. Any minister receiving funds from the Emergency Relief Fund and recommended to be continued on Disability Leave for a second year will then receive support payments from the disability provisions of the Board of Pensions.

4. We recommend that appropriations from the Emergency Relief Fund, continuing with the 1978-1979 Conference year, be the same as those from the Board of Pensions, that is, based on one-third of the average salary of the North Carolina Conference. In addition to the basic support funds, the cost of the minister's coverage under the Conference insurance program, hospitalization and life insurance, will be paid in full, and an interim monthly grant of \$250.00 will be made for the first five months a minister is granted Disability Leave, or until Social Security benefits become effective, whichever is first. Support payments from the

Emergency Relief Fund will become effective on the date that the minister is granted Disability Leave by the Bishop and are payable at the end of each month.

5. The Joint Committee on Disability will review the progress of each minister on Disability Leave at least annually. This review will include both recommendations from the minister's physician and district superintendent as well as opportunities for continuing fellowship with the minister to develop further possibilities of assistance in his/her disabled circumstances. Those receiving aid from the Emergency Relief Fund will be reviewed at the end of their first six months of Disability Leave.

6. We recommend that expenses of travel, telephone, postage, and other materials for the committee be paid from the Emergency Relief Fund.

THE COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

Recommendations for 1979

I. The schedule of Minimum Salaries through the Commission on Equitable Salaries for 1979 is as follows:

A. Regular recommendations:

Full-Time Conference and Associate Conference Members

Base Salary (per pastor)	\$8,000
Utility Allowance (per charge)	1,500
Spouse, or one or more dependents* (per family)	400

Full-Time Local Pastors

Base Salary (per pastor)	\$7,400
Utility Allowance (per charge)	1,500
Spouse, or one or more dependents* (per family)	400

Students

Base Salary (per pastor)	5,800
Utility Allowance (per charge)	1,500
Spouse, or one or more dependents* (per family)	400

*The IRS definition of "dependents" will be used.

B. Special Recommendations:

1. A charge served by a full-time pastor(s) may provide up to \$1,000 for pastoral travel without its affecting equitable salary provisions. A charge served by a student pastor(s) may provide up to \$800 for pastoral travel without its affecting equitable salary provisions.
2. Retired Supply Pastors: \$4,750 (including utilities).
3. Part-time Supplies: Ministers of any status who are serving part-time will receive income from Equitable Salary funds, if any, on a basis negotiated with the church, the pastor, the District Superintendent, and the Equitable Salary Commission.

II. Principles Governing the Use of Equitable Salary Funds

The Pastor's salary is the responsibility of the charge; therefore, the charges should so group themselves as to assume full pastoral support. The Commission urges each charge receiving Equitable Salary funds, its Minister, and District Superintendents to administer the affairs of the charge to the end that it may move as rapidly as possible toward full financial support. To enable the Conference, the Commission, and the District Superintendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned, the following principles and procedures are set forth:

- A. The pastor's dependents at the time of assignment to the charge and as of January 1 shall govern the amount paid the pastor.
- B. In considering the salary for the charge, all income, including salary, bonuses, and other benefits not specifically excluded, are included as salary in determining appropriations from Equitable Salaries Commission.

- C. Charges must be arranged so that no more than one-third of the total salary will be supplemented from Equitable Salary funds. Charges asking for more than one-third supplement must make an additional application, indicting the reasons for being given special consideration. Newly established congregations will be given special consideration.
- D. When division of charges is desired, Equitable Salary funds will be used only upon recommendation of the Bishop, or the "Bishop's Task Force on the Division of Circuits" and Cabinet approval.
- E. In the Division of Circuits in which one church seeks to become a station, it is recommended that such church assume all salary obligations and its proportionate share of single-figure asking.
 - 1. It is recommended that the remainder of the division pay two-thirds of pastoral support, and its share of single-figure asking.
 - 2. The Commission on Equitable Salaries further recommends that each charge which has received, or shall hereafter receive, Equitable Salary aid, shall reduce this aid by 10 percent each year until the charge has accepted full self-support. The District Superintendents are to inform all charges receiving aid or expecting to receive aid in the future of this regulation. This requirement must be kept in mind in preparing for any requests.
 - 3. When there is a division of a charge forming one or more student appointments, the charge must pay two-thirds of said salary.
- F. Any Equitable Salary supplement will be terminated immediately upon a full-time secular employment. Such a pastor may be reinstated at any time upon returning to full-time ministerial status. Exceptions to this rule may be permitted by approval of the Executive Committee of the Commission on Equitable Salaries on recommendation of the District Superintendent of the pastor who is seeking for emergency reasons employment outside that of his church ministry.

III. In order to improve the effective utilization of Conference ministerial manpower,

And in recognition of the fact that the size of the membership of a charge together with its quality of leadership are significant factors both in charge salaries and the quality of a church's total witness:

The Commission on Equitable Salaries encourages and aids those churches which seek to improve their total programs through: (1) establishing cooperative programs which are designed to result in an increase in the number of churches and members in a charge; (2) increasing the level of intercongregational cooperation; or (3) merging congregations.

In order to implement this policy, the Equitable Salary Commission may utilize a maximum of seven percent of its total allocations to supplement salaries beyond the established minimum salary. In fund-

ing programs for this purpose the following procedures will be followed:

- A. The District Superintendent of the charge will submit a proposal to the Commission, which proposal (for initial requests) shall include:
 1. The names, locations, and memberships of each church involved.
 2. Evidence of the total charge's involvement, approval, and participation in the program.
 3. Specific year-by-year goals and objectives to be reached in the charges' witness as a result of the program.
 4. Specific job descriptions for each position if the proposal includes differentiated staffing.
 5. Salary budgets.
 6. Annual goals shall include provisions for the charges' assuming the total salary obligations within a specifically stated number of years, not to exceed five.
- B. At the end of each year there shall be a review of each program by the Commission on Equitable Salaries. Each review shall include data from the following:
 1. The District Superintendent, who shall provide a progress report, a statement indicating the level of funding required for the ensuing years as determined after consultation with the charge, and the salaries budgeted for the charge.
 2. The charge, which shall indicate:
 - a. the degree to which the charge goals and objectives as stated in its initial and subsequent proposals have been reached.
 - b. any changes of job descriptions as approved by the District Superintendent,
 - c. changes in membership of each church since the initial funding,
 - d. restatements of previous and/or additional goals and objectives.

The Lake Junaluska Development Fund shall continue based on a minimum goal of 50 cents per member per year (\$2.00) over the four-year period 1977-1980 inclusive. This is based upon the membership at the close of the calendar year 1975 as reported in this 1976 *Journal*. Each charge is reminded that this fund is to be paid in full by December 31, 1980.

2. Allocations to the charges have been made by the Council on Finance and Administration based on the current formula provided for the Fair Share Apportionments. Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptances up to the amount fixed by the Annual Conference upon the recommendation of the Council. In the event collections shall fall short, all items shall be paid pro-rata or proportionate excepting prior claim items: (Fixed obligations on conference owned property; salaries paid directly from the Conference Treasurer's Office; Pensions; General World Service; General Administration Fund). In the light of possible unforeseen and emergency needs within the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration is authorized to make supplementary appropriations between sessions of the Annual Conference. Such supplementary appropriations shall be made only from available undesignated funds and shall be reported to the Annual Conference for purposes of information.
3. The following special offerings shall be taken in each local church and remitted to the Conference Treasurer as separate items. They are not to be included in the Fair Share Apportionments: World Communion Sunday, Methodist Student Day, One Great Hour of Sharing, Human Relations Day.

4. Single Figure Apportionments will be delivered from the Treasurer's Office to the District Superintendents by July 15 each year. The District Superintendents will then, at their descretion, distribute the apportionments to the charges. *Any request from the charges for adjustments must be made to the Council on Finance and Administration on or before August 31* of each year. No request for adjustment will be considered after this date.

1. "The Fair Share Apportionment formula approved by the Annual Conference in 1967 as amended in 1971, 1974, 1975, 1976, 1977 shall be determined in the following manner. Beginning with the conference budget for 1980, the Fair Share Apportionment for each charge in the North Carolina Conference shall be based on the average of the total money disbursed for the years 1976, 1977, and 1978, less the exclusions stated elsewhere in this report; and that for each year thereafter the Fair Share Apportionment for each charge will be based on the average of the total money disbursed by that charge for the three previous years, less the approved exemptions. All monies contributed for Conference Advance Specials shall be excluded from total money disbursed in

arriving at the Fair Share Apportionment. The above recommended change, the excludable items are: Principal and interest paid on indebtedness; Paid on building and improvements; Local benevolences paid directly by local church; General Advance Specials; Ten Dollar Club; N.C. Wesleyan College special; Up to \$1800 travel paid by local church for each pastor; One Great Hour of Sharing; Conference Advance Specials, and to be excluded beginning with computations figured in 1979: World Wide Communion, Human Relations, and Methodist Student Day.

1. a. Request that when Finance and Administration determines the Fair Share Apportionments for 1980, and each year thereafter, they give serious consideration that the amount of the Fair Share Apportionment for each charge not exceed 31.5% of the average total money disbursed for the three years, less the exclusions, unless the per-cent of the increase is specifically approved by the vote of the Annual Conference at the time the conference budget is adopted.
2. The Apportionments as computed by the Treasurer's Office according to the formula shall be transmitted to the charges by the District Superintendents without adjustments.
3. Each Conference board, agency, division, committee, commission, etc., receiving allocation from the conference budget shall submit each year a detailed operating budget to the Council on Finance and Administration by January 10 covering the operating budget for the ensuing year. These budgets will be reviewed by C.F.A. in light of the funds available. Budgets which are related to the Council on Ministries will be submitted through the Director of the Council on ministries.
4. No Conference agency's budget shall incorporate funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the Council on Ministries for program budget items or the Council on Finance and Administration for all non-program budget items.
5. Monies paid by the charges on apportionments and all other monies paid out by the local churches shall be reported to the Statistician by the pastors at the end of the year on Table II, Financial Report.
6. No transfer of funds shall be made from one line item in the Conference Budget to another without approval of the Council on Finance and Administration.
7. Reimbursement for travel to authorized meetings of all Conference agencies shall be at the rate of 12 cents per mile.

IV

Approval is given to the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the District or Conference:

1. Christmas Offering 1978 for District Superintendents' program and/or projects. These should be clearly defined in plenty of time to have successful promotion.
2. The Division of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.
3. The Division of Education to solicit from church groups and indiv-

iduals, materials and money for specific projects for the four camps of the North Carolina Conference.

4. The Regional Commission on Higher Education and Campus Ministry for the privilege of private solicitation for special gifts for the benefit of special works in the state-supported institutions of higher education.
5. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated; Methodist Home for Children; Louisburg College; Methodist College; and North Carolina Wesleyan College for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such funds as may be directed thereto with the understanding that such solicitation or private campaign may not be taken into the local churches of the conference.
6. The Methodist Foundation, Incorporated, as provided in its charter.

V

Unless otherwise directed, the Council on Finance and Administration will continue to use A.M. Pullen & Company as auditors.

The president, vice-president and secretary of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Conference Treasurer shall serve as the executive committee of the Council on Finance and Administration.

The Conference Treasurer will include in his monthly financial reports, for any given month, all monies received in his office by 8:30 A.M. on the 5th day of the following month, except when the 5th day falls on Saturday or Sunday the report will include the funds received by 8:30 A.M. the following Monday.

MINISTERS' MOVING EXPENSE

(EFFECTIVE JUNE, 1980)

I. ELIGIBILITY

- A. Pastors, District Superintendents, and staff employed by the Conference.
- B. Ministers moving into the North Carolina Annual Conference to assume appointment to serve in category 1A in which case claim can be from point of entry into bounds of the North Carolina Conference.
- C. Widows or widowers of ministers
- D. Ministers moving into the North Carolina Annual Conference to assume full time appointment to serve in category 1A.

II. REQUISITION FORMS

- A. The Conference treasurer's office shall provide the District Superintendents with requisition forms for moving expense. The District Superintendents, in turn, will distribute the forms to all eligible persons assigned appointments within their District as soon as possible after adjournment of each session of the Annual Conference.
- B. The applicant will complete the form which will be returned (with proof of claim) to the District Superintendent for verification of the move. The District Superintendents will then review and forward approved requisitions and receipts to the Conference treasurer for payment.
- C. When changes in appointment occur between sessions of the Annual Conference, the same procedure shall be followed.
- D. Persons retiring, and widows or widowers of deceased ministers, will be furnished requisition forms by the Conference treasurer and will return their moving expense requisitions directly to the Conference treasurer for payment.

III. PAYMENT

- A. A base payment of \$100.00 will be made to all eligible ministers.
- B. The Annual Conference shall pay the first \$200.00 and two-thirds of all claim above \$200.00 with submission and approval of itemized requisition forms accompanied by receipts for labor, materials and miscellaneous claims, provided no payment will exceed a total of \$400.00
- C. Eligible retiring ministers and widows or widowers of ministers will receive 100% reimbursement for itemized claim up to but not exceeding a total of \$500.00. Should no itemized requisition form be submitted, they will receive the Base payment of \$100.00.
- D. No additional claim can be made against a local church for payment of moving expenses.

IV. EXCLUSIONS

- A. There shall be a Review Committee consisting of two members of the Council on Finance and Administration, one District Superintendent appointed by the Bishop, and the Conference treasurer.
- B. The Review Committee shall consider and have final authority over any disallowed claim or special claim for reimbursement beyond allowances set by the Payment formula.

PASTORAL CARE, COMMITTEE ON

1. That professional help for ministers and for minister's families of the North Carolina United Methodist Conference (who are undergoing personal, marital, or family problems) shall be made available through the Pastoral Care and Counseling Institute of Durham, Chapel Hill; the Fayetteville Family Life Center; and the Carolina Counseling Center, Inc., Raleigh; and the Life Enrichment Center, Raleigh; and other agencies certified by the American Association of Pastoral Counselors on a volunteer or referral basis, with a portion of the cost assumed by the Committee on Pastoral Care. The Committee on Pastoral Care will assume up to \$100.00 for visits and testing. Those receiving this help shall be kept anonymous with the submitted bills stating only that a minister (or family member) has been to the agency.
2. The Pastoral Care Committee will support three district marriage enrichment retreats for pastors and spouses by supplying the names of potential leaders and in the giving of some financial support of the leaders.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

HOUSING EXCLUSION ALLOWANCE

REPORT II

INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE DOCUMENT NO. 5045 (10-67)

DECLARES:

"Rental Value of Home furnished a Clergyman, and cost of utilities paid for him, as part of his compensation for carrying out his duties as

clergyman, are not income to him, if he is duly ordained, licensed, or commissioned."

A Rental Allowance to Clergyman, paid as part of his compensation, is not income to the extent he used it, in the year received, to provide a home, or pay utilities for a home furnished him. However, the church, or organization which employs him must have officially designated the payment as a rental allowance before the payment was made."

"The above rules are also applicable to retired clergymen where a rent-free home or rental allowance is furnished him in recognition of past services in carrying out his duties as a clergyman."

A REVISED RULING, 63, 156, 163-2 CB 79 STATES:

"...the rental value of the home furnished to a retired minister as part of his compensation for services is excludable from his gross income under Section 107 (1) of the Code. Also, the rental allowance paid to him as part of his compensation for past services is excludable under Section 107 (2) of the Code, to the extent used by him for expenses directly related to providing a home." (See Code Sec. 107, Reg. 1.107.1 - 1103.01)

Therefore the following resolution is presented to the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, meeting in Fayetteville, North Carolina:

Whereas, The United Methodist Church has a tradition of providing housing (a parsonage) for its ministers, or in instances where no parsonage is owned by the charge giving the minister a housing allowance;

Whereas, Retired Ministers of the North Carolina Conference are entitled to the same privileges as those in the Effective Relationship; and

Whereas, the most practical method of providing housing for the Retired Ministers is by means of rental allowance;

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the amount of \$3,000.00 per year be set as a fair and reasonable rental allowance for each Retired Minister or spouse of a deceased minister of this annual conference; that the first \$3,000 paid to a Retired Minister each year by The Board of Pensions of The North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist church and \$2,100.00 of this is designated as the payment of this Housing Allowance and \$900.00 for Utility Allowance. The Housing Allowance is specifically designated as compensation to the minister or the spouse of a deceased minister for the cost of renting or providing housing for himself or herself and his or her family and those costs related thereto, pursuant to the Code as stated in Document 5045 (10-67).

The Board of Pensions emphasizes that the Retired Minister who uses this Housing Allowance must be able to furnish proof that he made expenditures in the amounts claimed. If the full \$3,000.00 cannot be substantiated as expenditures, then claim should be made only for those amounts which can be verified.

We also remind the minister who uses this allowance, that the amount he claims as a Housing Allowance exclusion must be included as Income in reporting his Social Security. It is possible that reduced Social Security benefits would offset any claims for the Housing Allowance exclusion. Please consult your Social Security Advisor about this matter.

Further, the Board of Pensions absolves itself of any responsibility in the event the Internal Revenue Service disallows any housing allowance claimed.

METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

We recommend that

1. A *North Carolina Christian Advocate* subscription campaign be held annually in each local church. The dates of the campaign to be from January 15 through February 15 for the Western North Carolina Annual Conference and from February 15 through March 15 for the North Carolina Annual Conference. The purpose of the *Advocate* campaign will be to give each local church an opportunity to concentrate on *Advocate* subscriptions both new and renewal.

2. In order to promote maximum participation in securing new subscriptions to the *Advocate*, and, maintaining the highest possible level of renewals, each local church will be given a quota of subscriptions which will be one subscription for every six members based on each church's total membership as of Dec. 31, 1977, reported in the 1977 Journals of the respective conferences. Where the membership is not divisible by six the next highest number will become the quota (Example: a church with 43 members divided by six equals a quota of 7 $\frac{1}{3}$; thus, the quota in this case would be 8).

3. The quota for each district will be the sum of the quotas of its local churches and that this district quota be carried in all regular reports or mailings by the districts and/or conferences to the local churches along with a report from each district on the progress made to reach its quota.

4. Each local church be prepared to report to the 1978 fall Charge Conference progress made to date in reaching its quota.

5. That there be a category called Gold Star churches with the number of subscriptions for this category being one subscription for every 3.5 members based on each church's total full membership as of Dec. 31, 1977, reported in the 1977 Journals of the respective conferences. As in the case of the quota, where the membership is not divisible by 3.5 the next highest number will become the Gold Star figure.

6. That there be an All-Administrative Board subscription plan available to the local churches.

7. That subscription prices be as follows: (1) The price of individual subscriptions will be \$4.50 a year. (2) The price of subscriptions for the members of the Administrative Boards of the local churches - where every member of the Administrative Board is a subscriber (unless two or more members of the same family, living at the same address, are members of the Administrative Board in which case one subscription for the family will meet the requirements) - will be \$4.25 a year. (3) The price of subscriptions in Quota churches will be \$4.05 a year. (4) The price of subscriptions in Gold Star Churches will be \$3.25 a year. Both Quota Churches and Gold Star Churches are urged to send in their subscriptions at the individual rate of \$4.50. When either the Quota, or the Gold Star, status is reached, the *Advocate* will send the proper refund to the church. Such refunds will be limited to subscriptions received and current within the calendar year January 1 through December 31. All additional subscriptions in Quota and Gold Star Churches which exceed the status in question will be at either the Quota or Gold Star rate whichever applies.

8. Each district superintendent be asked to designate a District Director

for the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* to promote circulation.

9. Each local church nominate to the 1978 fall Charge Conference the name of a person to be its *Advocate* Campaign chairperson and that this person be a member of the Administrative Board of that church.

10. As soon as it is economically feasible, the *Advocate* be published weekly.

Liquor-By-The-Drink

Whereas: it appears that a bill may be seriously considered by the North Carolina General Assembly which would liberalize the sale of whiskey in North Carolina and add by-the-drink sales to brown-bagging and the ABC system of distribution and thereby greatly increase the number of outlets for whiskey in our state; and

Whereas: the voters in a state-wide referendum in 1973 defeated a proposal by a two and one-half to one margin which would have changed the method of distribution to allow bartenders and waitresses to promote the use of whiskey; and

Whereas: any local option bill would inevitably make it profitable for local establishments to promote the sale of whiskey; and

Whereas: authorities on the use of drugs list alcohol as the greatest problem drug in American society; and

Whereas: the United Methodist Church has a long tradition of opposition to the use of this deadly drug;

Therefore; We of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church call upon the North Carolina Legislature to defeat any bill permitting the sale of liquor-by-the-drink in any community of North Carolina.

RESOLUTIONS ROCKY RIVER METHODIST CHURCH PROPERTY

WHEREAS, the Rocky River Methodist Church in Chatham County was deeded on July 22, 1789 and said deed is recorded in Book F, Page 263 of the Chatham County Registry, and

WHEREAS, the church organization has long been disbanded and on November 1, 1950 the Francis Asbury - Rocky River Association was authorized to promote and direct the affairs of the historic site and since then the association has become disbanded, and

WHEREAS, the property was assigned to the North Carolina Conference with the right to change, reorganize or otherwise deal with the aforesaid association, and

WHEREAS, according to a resolution approved by the Annual Conference on November 1, 1950 title to the property "remain with the Siler City Circuit Quarterly Conference," which has also been dissolved, and

WHEREAS, Hickory Grove United Methodist Church is the nearest active congregation and during the most recent years has cared for the cemetery and church property and now wishes to restore the present church building erected in 1926, being the third structure on the historic site, and

WHEREAS, a Charge Conference of the Hickory Grove United Methodist Church met on October 9, 1977 and spread a resolution upon the records of that church to supervise the property and retain it as an historic site, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that Hickory Grove United Methodist Church hereby requests the North Carolina Annual Conference meeting at Methodist College, Fayetteville, North Carolina on June 8, 1978, to place the Rocky River Methodist Church property in supervision of that church to maintain it as an historic site and authorize the North Carolina Conference Trustees to give title of the property to that church.
