3. The Joint Committee on Disability will study each application for disability Leave submitted by ministers of the Conference to determine the recommendation of the minister's physician and district superintendent, particularly as it reflects the anticipated length of the minister's disability. The medical reports will be sent to the medical consultant of the Joint Committee on Disability for an interpretation of the minister's disabling conditions, who in turn will submit a medical report on the required form to the Joint Committee on Disability for action. All materials will then be sent to the medical consultant of the General Board of Pensions, who will determine if the minister is eligible for benefits paid through the Comprehensive Protection Plan. From July to December, 1981, disability benefits were paid through coverage as adopted by the 1981 Session of the Annual Conference. Beginning on January 1, 1982, disability benefits from the General Board of Pensions were transferred to coverage under the new Comprehensive Protection Plan.

## HISTORICAL STATEMENT

### I. COMPOSITION:

The North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church is composed of:

- 1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
- 2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church South.
- 3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.
- 4) The Eastern District, North Carolina- Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction.

### II. ORGANIZATION:

The organizing dates of the four former Conferences were as follows:

- 1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina.
- 2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia.
- 3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.
- 4) The Eastern District North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference was organized at a special session on August 11, 1964, at Bennett College Greensboro, North Carolina.

**RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE**

## Section I: Rules of Order

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these rules.
2. A member may speak out only once on any one motion until all who desire to speak have done so; and then he/she may speak only one additional time.
3. The chairperson of an agency (or someone designated by him/her) shall be allowed to speak last on his/her report even though the previous questions have been ordered.
4. Speeches shall be limited to ten (10) minutes except by consent of the conference.
5. If any part of these rules conflict with THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH, the DISCIPLINE shall prevail.
6. The Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church shall apply to the Annual Conference as regularly scheduled and to all called sessions of the conference.

## Section II: Voting

1. Voting shall be by "yes or no" or by a "show of hands" or by "standing" at the discretion of the chair.
2. A count vote may be ordered or called by any member of the conference supported by one-fifth (1/5) of the members present and voting. The results of a count vote shall be printed in the JOURNAL. The chair may call for a count vote if he is in doubt as to the outcome of the vote.
3. All votes shall be cast in the bar of the conference. The bar of the conference shall be determined by the conference at the beginning of the first session.

## Section III: Election of Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences

1. The election of clerical delegates shall be by the "Roman Ballot." (Each person eligible to vote shall write his/her selection of names to the number of names ordered by the chair on a secret ballot, without prior nomination, with balloting to continue until a majority is received by sufficient persons to fulfill the needed number of delegates.)
2. a. Any lay person who is a member of United Methodist Church of the North Carolina Annual Conference who wishes to be a nominee may submit a resume, not to exceed 200 words. Resumes may also be submitted on behalf of a prospective nominee.  
b. Consent of the nominee should be obtained after the nominee has been informed of the duties of a delegate.

- c. Any lay member of the Church may be voted for whether a resume is submitted or not.
  - d. Resumes should be mailed to the Conference Lay Leader by April 1 of the year prior to the upcoming General and Jurisdictional Conferences.
  - e. The list of nominees and their resumes will be prepared and distributed by the Conference Board of the Laity at the District Briefings or be mailed with the BOOK OF REPORTS.
3. The election of lay delegates shall be by the "Roman Ballot," as above. Electors may vote for any eligible person, whether nominated as above or not.
  4. All votes shall be cast upon the official ballots authorized by the conference.
  5. Ballots shall be numbered consecutively and only ballots with the number announced by the chair shall be valid. Defaced ballots will not be valid. (If a member defaces a ballot, he/she may exchange it for a new one at the secretary's desk.)
  6. Each member will place his/her own ballot in the ballot box held by a teller.
  7. Different colored ballots will be provided for lay and clerical members.
  8. The names of persons receiving less than ten votes shall not be reported to the Conference.
  9. Five alternates to Jurisdictional Conference shall be elected.

#### Section IV: Conference Structure

1. The Bishop and Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases where the DISCIPLINE or the Annual Conference directs otherwise.
2. Near the end of each quadrennium, the heads of all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees shall submit a list of qualified, suggested nominees to the Bishop and the Cabinet for their consideration in the formation of new Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees.
3. Recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Annual Conference.
4. a. At the beginning of each quadrennium all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees shall elect their officers only after all their members have been notified of the organizational meeting. A member of the Cabinet or the Conference Staff (designated by the Cabinet) shall serve as the convening officer for the organizational meeting.
- b. All elections in the Boards and Agencies of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall be by written, secret ballot of those present and eligible to vote. Nominations from the floor may be made.
- c. The presiding Bishop shall be requested to announce the Cabinet assignments to the various Boards and Agencies at some point during Annual Conference.
- d. Tenure for membership for all persons on boards, agencies, divisions, commissions, and committees shall be eight years, with exception of the Board of Laity where tenure shall be six years for members and four years for the Conference Lay Leader. (The Conference Lay Leader may serve also the unexpired term of his predecessor.)
5. The Conference structure is that which was determined by the 1969 Annual Conference (Pages 212-217) and as amended by the Special Session of February 21, 1970 (Pages 110-117), the 1972 Annual Conference (Pages 308-311), and the 1976 Annual Conference.
6. The offices of Conference Secretary and Statistician shall be as determined by the 1973 Annual Conference (Pages 289-290).  
**THE SECRETARY:** The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.  
**ASSISTANT SECRETARIES:** The secretary shall nominate his/her assistants and the Conference shall elect.  
**STATISTICIANS:** There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.  
**CONFERENCE STENOGRAPHERS:** The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.  
**"PLUS" COMPENSATION:** The Council on Finance and Administration shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation



given officers for their services and also, the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER: The Conference Lay Leader shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Annual Conference following General Conference, upon nomination by the Bishop and Cabinet and the Executive Committee of the Board of the Laity. Should the vacancy occur at any other time it would be filled by the same procedure. The Conference Lay Leader shall serve as the chairperson of the Board of the Laity.

7. Committees and Boards:

- a. The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
  - b. There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the Resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the Host District Superintendent, and the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of the U.M.W., the U.M.Y.F., and the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries. They shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the conference expense fund.
  - c. There shall be an Entertainment Committee composed of three ministers and three laypersons. The Committee shall be elected at the first session of the Annual Conference in the quadrennium. The Committee shall receive invitations and recommend to the Annual Conference the place and method of entertaining the Annual Conference. A local church or other institution may host the Annual Conference upon acceptance of the invitation by the Annual Conference.
    - (1) When no invitation has come from a local church or other institution, the Annual Conference will be held at Methodist College and NC Wesleyan College on alternating years (held at Methodist College until Wesleyan has an auditorium).
    - (2) The cabinet will designate a district each year on a rotating basis as the host district (when the Conference is held at Methodist College and NC Wesleyan College) which will be responsible for ushers, flowers, and other related items of hospitality.
  - d. There shall be a Committee on Memoirs composed of the Conference Secretary, and the District Superintendents. They are charged with the responsibility of providing for all details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall serve as its Chairperson.
  - e. There shall be a Committee on Daily Minutes elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
  - f. There shall be a Committee on Appeals appointed quadrennially, composed of five members whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Buildings, or any other questions that may properly come before it.
  - g. There shall be a Committee on Rules which shall provide to the Conference a document of Rules of Order and Procedure and the policies and standing rules and structure that the Conference from time to time shall adopt for its functioning. This document shall be presented to each Annual Conference.
  - h. There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Introductions annually, at the first session of the Conference.
8. No person may serve on more than one board of trustees of an institution to which trustees are elected by the Conference. This rule will become effective at the 1986 Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Section V: Financial Administration

1. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the JOURNAL.
2. The Council on Finance and Administration shall present their report to the Annual Conference only after all other committees, commissions, divisions, boards, and agencies having claims on the budget have presented their report.
3. Each District Superintendent shall furnish the Conference Treasurer as early as possible following the completion of the Charge Conferences an official copy of the acceptances of the Single Figure Askings and a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Charge Conferences. The Conference Treasurer shall furnish this information to other agencies who have need of it. The Statistician shall use this report in



compiling his report to the Annual Conference. (See also Section VII, Paragraph 2).

#### Section VI: Reports, Resolutions, Motions, and Amendments to Report

1. All reports, recommendations, and resolutions to be included in the BOOK OF RECOMMENDATIONS shall be sent to the Conference Secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Council on Ministries and published in the conference calendar.
2. Resolutions presented to the Annual Conference affecting the structure, policy, and function of any board or agency of the Annual Conference shall be submitted in writing to the Conference Secretary with copies for all the lay and clerical members of the Conference. The resolution shall be presented to the Annual Conference on one day and considered the next day. No resolutions shall be distributed later than the second night of the Annual Conference. None can be considered later than the third night of the Conference.
3. Motions presented to the Annual Conference and amendments to motions shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the Conference Secretary prior to or when presented or immediately following.

#### Section VII: Pastor's Report to The Annual Conference: Statistics

1. Table I and Table II shall be submitted to the Conference Statistician one week following the close of the financial books of the Annual Conference.
2. Final remittances for the current calendar year shall be made to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference JOURNAL with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the Conference Statistician from the pastor's reports.

#### Section VIII: The Conference JOURNAL

1. The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference JOURNAL, in keeping with regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference JOURNAL shall be sent to each of the following: the conference claimants, lay members of the conference boards, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference, and lay members to Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other institutions and agencies of the General Church as he/she may deem advisable. Three copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$5.00 each. Monies accruing from the sale of the JOURNAL shall be deposited with the Conference Treasurer and credited to the Journal Account.
3. That the Conference return to the policy of publishing a one volume JOURNAL of the North Carolina Annual Conference each year.

#### Section IX: Districts

1. The number of districts shall be twelve.
2. Any change in the number of Districts shall be approved at one Annual Conference to take effect at the next Annual Conference. A majority may change the number of Districts.
3. A district conference shall be held annually in each district.
4. The district president, sub-district presidents, and the local church presidents of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship shall be delegates to the District Conference, in addition to those named by the 1972 DISCIPLINE.
5. The district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendent and the Conference lay leader.

#### Section X: Amendments

These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day a proposed amendment has been presented in writing, providing

that the rule governing the manner in which the number of districts may be changed cannot be amended until the next Annual Conference.

**Section XI: When the Rules Become Effective**

These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

Prelude: Organist for the morning session was Roger P. Searles, Diaconal Minister of Music, Saint Paul Church, Goldsboro, who played "Suite from Water Music," by Handel ("Allegro Vivace", arranged for air and hornpipe).

EXECUTIVE SESSION FOR ALL MINISTERS IN FULL CONNECTION: Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., called the Conference to order in the Executive Session of the Ministerial Members in Full Connection of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of the United Methodist Church at 10:30 a.m., meeting in the Reeves Auditorium at Methodist College. This was the first section of the one hundred sixtieth session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, United Methodist Church. Bishop Minnick explained the significance of the gavel with which he opened the Conference, stating that it had been made of wood taken from the White House in 1927 and had been presented to him when he left the Alexandria Church in the Virginia Conference.

HYMN: Bishop Minnick called for the singing of Hymn 93, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing."

Bishop's Remarks: After the singing of the hymn, the Bishop referred to the high moment and privilege of this Executive Session and made remarks regarding ministerial relationships of the Annual Conference. He expressed his own excitement about being a part of the ordained clergy of the North Carolina Annual Conference. He expressed gratitude for the love and support and the undergirding strength that he had already received from the ministers and their families. He expressed that the same went for his wife, Mary Ann. He emphasized the continuity of the ministry and his looking forward to the years that lay ahead. He read from the words of the Apostle Paul regarding total commitment. He then spoke to the historic questions used by John Wesley and reminded us that these were questions that had been asked that all might respond in their hearts.

Prayer: Bishop Minnick concluded his most appropriate remarks with prayer.

Bishop Minnick called for the presentation of the report of the Board of Ordained Ministry and took the opportunity to commend Dr. H. Langill Watson for his able work. He commended the entire Board as well. He charged the entire group of ministers assembled also to realize the awesome and difficult job that the Board had had - the many, many hours that they had spent in preparing the report. Bishop Minnick called Dr. Watson to the podium for any statement he wished to make and for the presentation of the report.

Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry: Langill Watson expressed appreciation for the Bishop's words, then gave his and a corporate welcome to the Bishop in this, his first Annual Conference serving among the Methodist people of the North Carolina Conference. Watson called for the distribution of the copies of the report of the Board of Ordained Ministry. He referred to the introductory remarks in the report. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) He expressed appreciation for use of the new trial ritual for ordination which would be used in the service of worship for ordination and consecration during the evening service.

Question 19 was called, "Who have received the certificate of candidacy for ordained ministry?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 20 was called, "Who have completed the studies for the license as a local pastor are approved, but are not now appointed?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 21 was called, "Who are approved and appointed as: a. full time local pastors?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 21, b, was called, "Who are approved and appointed as part-time local pastors?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 21, c, was called, "Who are approved and appointed as student local pastors?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 21, d, "Who are approved and appointed as students of other denominations?" was called. The answer was, "None".

Question 22, a, "Who have been discontinued as full time local pastors?" was called. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 22, b, "Who have been discontinued as part time local pastors?" was called. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 22, c, was called, "Who have been discontinued as student local pastors?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 23 was called, "Who have been reinstated as local pastors?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 24 was called, "What ministers from other Annual Conferences or Methodist denominations are approved for appointment in the Annual Conference while retaining their conference or denominational membership?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 25 was called, "What ministers in good standing in other Christian denominations have been approved to serve appointments or ecumenical ministries within the bounds of the Annual Conference while retaining their denominational affiliation?" The answer was, "None".

Question 26, a, was called, "Who are affiliate members with vote?" The answer was, "None".

Question 26, b, was called, "Who are affiliate members without vote?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 27, "Who are elected Associate Members?" was called. The answer was, "None".

Question 28, a, was called, "Who are elected as Probationary Members under the provisions of Par. 415?" The list was read and the candidates were asked to stand and come forward, facing the Conference assembled. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 35, "Who have been received by transfer from other Annual Conferences of The United Methodist Church?" was also called at this time so that those being received by transfer could also be recognized. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 28, b, "Who are elected as Probationary Members under the provisions of Par. 416.1?" and Question 28, c, "Who are elected as Probationary Members under the provisions of Par. 416.2?" were called. The answer to each of these questions was, "None".

Question 29, a, was called, "Who are continued as Probationary Members, what progress have they made in their ministerial studies, and in what year were they admitted to probationary membership as students in approved schools of theology?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 29, b, was called, "Who are continued as Probationary Members, what progress have they made in their ministerial studies, and in what year were they admitted to probationary membership in the advanced Ministerial Course of Study?" The answer was, "None".

Question 29, c, was called, "Who are continued as Probationary Members, what progress have they made in their ministerial studies, and in what year were they admitted to probationary membership following completion of their education requirements?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 30, a, "Who have been transferred from other Christian denominations as Associate Members?" was called. The answer was, "None".

Question 30, b, was called, "Who have been transferred from other Christian denominations as Probationary Members?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 31 was called, "Who are elected as Ministerial Members in Full Connection?" (See Condensed Minutes.) Bishop Minnick asked them to come forward as their names were called so that they might be recognized. The Bishop reviewed the questions that would be asked during the evening Ordination Service with the candidates for Full Connection. He commented on them and mentioned that he would read them for their answer at the ordination without further comment.

Question 32 was called, "What Probationary Members, previously discontinued, are readmitted?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 33, a, "Who are readmitted as Associate Members?" was called. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 33, b, was called, "Who are readmitted as Members in Full Connection?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 34, "Who are returned to the effective relationship after voluntary retirement (a) as Associate Members? (b) as Probationary Members? (c) as Members in Full Connection?" were called. The answer to each was, "None".

Question 35 was called, "Who have been received by transfer from other Annual Conferences of The United Methodist Church?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 36 was called, "Who are transferred in from other Methodist denominations?" The answer was, "None".

Question 37, a, was called, "Who have been elected and ordained deacons as Associate Members?" The answer was, "None".

Question 37, b, "Who have been elected and ordained deacons as Probationary Members?" was called. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 38, a, was called, "Who have been elected and ordained elders as theological graduates?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 38, b, was called, "Who have been elected and ordained elders as Probationary Members previously Associate Members?" The answer was, "None".

Question 39, a, was called, "What ministers, coming from other Christian denominations, have had their orders recognized as deacons?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 39, b, was called, "What ministers, coming from other Christian denominations, have had their orders recognized as elders?" The answer was, "None".

Question 40 was called, "Who have been elected or ordained as a courtesy to other conferences?" The answers to a, b, and c were, "None".

Question 41 was called, "Who have been transferred out to other Annual Conferences of The United Methodist Church?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 42 was called, "Who are discontinued as Probationary Members?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 43 was called, "Who have been granted honorable location: This year?" The answer was, "None". "Previously?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 44, a, was called, "Who have had their conference membership terminated by withdrawal to unite with another denomination?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 44, b, was called, "Who have had their conference membership terminated by surrender of the ministerial office?" The answer was, "None".

Question 44, c, was called, "Who have had their conference membership terminated by withdrawal under complaints or charges?" (See Condensed Minutes.)



Question 44, d, was called, "Who have had their conference membership terminated by withdrawal between conferences?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 44, e, was called, "Who have had their conference membership terminated by involuntary termination?" The answer was, "None".

Question 44, f, was called, "Who have had their conference membership terminated by administrative location?" The answer was, "None".

Question 44, g, "Who have had their conference membership terminated by trial?" was called. The answer was, "None".

Bishop Minnick called for the Conference to stand as Question 45 was called, "What Associate Members have died during the year?" The names were read and will be found in the Condensed Minutes.

Question 45, b, was called, "What Probationary Members have died during the year?" The answer was, "None".

Question 45, c, "What members in Full Connection have died during the year?" was called. The names were read. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 45, d, "What local pastors have died during the year?" was called. (See Condensed Minutes.)

A moment of silent prayer was requested by the Bishop.

Question 46 was called, "What ministers have received appointments in other Annual Conferences of The United Methodist Church while retaining their membership in this Annual Conference?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 47, a, was called, "Who are the ministers on leave of absence and for what number of years consecutively has each held this relation with consent?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 47, b, was called, "Who are the ministers on leave of absence and for what number of years consecutively has each held this relation without consent?" The answer was, "None".

Question 48 was called, "Who have been suspended under the provisions of Par. 2623.3e?" The answer was, "None".

Question 49 was called, "Who are granted sabbatical leave?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 50, a, was called, "What actions have been taken concerning disabled ordained ministers and full time local pastors?"

a. "What ordained ministers and full time local pastors were granted disability leave since the last Annual Conference session?" The answer was "None".

b. "What ordained ministers and full time local pastors have had their disability leave terminated since the last conference session?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

c. "What ordained ministers and full time pastors are granted disability leave at this session?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 51 was called, "What Members in Full Connection have been retired this year?" Bishop Minnick asked them to stand so that they might be recognized as their names were called. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 52 was called, "What Associate Members have been retired this year?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 53 was called, "What Probationary Members have been retired this year?" The answer was, "None".

Question 54 was called, "Who have been recognized as retired local pastors this year?" (See Condensed Minutes.)

All questions were voted upon by the eligible ministers assembled and  
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were duly adopted.

Miscellaneous Matters: Appointments beyond the local church (Par. 443.1d) - Names of those appointed beyond the local church were presented. The required two-thirds vote was given. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Conference Members seeking less than full time appointments (Par. 442.2, 436.2, and 1606.4b) requires two thirds vote of the Annual Conference, having received two thirds support of the Cabinet and the Board of Ordained Ministry. These were adopted and will appear in the Condensed Minutes.

This concluded the official report of the Board of Ordained Ministry and it was requested that it be approved in its entirety by the Executive Session of the Ministerial Members of the Annual Conference. It was done.

Passing of Character: Bishop Minnick asked Watson to respond to the question, "Are all District Superintendents blameless in their life and ministry?" He responded affirmatively. There was nothing against them. The Conference agreed. Bishop Minnick called the District Superintendents to the front and addressed them with the question, "Are all the ministerial members of the North Carolina Annual Conference blameless in their life and character?" The character and administration of ministers within each district was recommended by each superintendent with affirmation for all. It was so recommended by each and affirmed by the Bishop.

Bishop Minnick asked if there were other matters to come before the Executive Session. The following were remembered in prayer: Mark Kennedy, R. T. Commander, Ted Wilson, Lovell Aills, Vergil Queen, Kelly Wilson, Jr., and Mrs. Tom House.

A question about ministers receiving less than full time appointments was raised by Reginald Ponder and was answered by Watson and affirmed by the Bishop.

Announcements: Bishop Minnick called upon Joseph Bethea to make certain announcements.

Hymn: The Bishop then declared the business of the Executive Session concluded and called for the singing of Hymn 154, "Have Thine Own Way, Lord."

Benediction and Postlude: The Bishop gave the benediction and the organist played as a postlude, "Allegro Maestoso", by G. F. Handel.

## FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION, Monday, June 3, 1985

Prelude: The organist for the afternoon session was Bette Jo Pierce, Organist-Director of Music, Centenary Church, New Bern. She played "Prelude" by Theodore Dubois.

GENERAL BUSINESS SESSION: The first general business session for all lay and clergy members was called to order by Bishop Minnick and began with a service of Holy Communion for all members of the Annual Conference and visitors, conducted by the Bishop and the Cabinet.

Holy Communion: James Bailey served as liturgist and called for the singing of Hymn 336, "And Are We Yet Alive?" Following the hymn and the liturgy, the elements were first distributed to all those who were in turn to serve them to the Conference assembled.

Sermon: Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., preached during the course of the liturgy preceding the distribution of the elements. He used selected verses from Colossians I.

Call for Recess: At the conclusion of the service of Holy Communion, Bishop Minnick called for a short recess for the purpose of setting the stage for the opening of the business session of the Annual Conference, and to allow the lay and clerical members of the Conference to be seated. It was so ordered.

Conference Convened: Bishop Carlton P. Minnick, Jr., Resident Bishop of the Raleigh Area, called to order the North Carolina Conference of the



Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church, meeting in full session at Methodist College in Fayetteville, North Carolina, at 3:00 p.m. The Bishop called upon Dr. M. Elton Hendricks, President of Methodist College, to bring greetings.

Greetings: Dr. Hendricks brought gracious words of welcome to the meeting of the North Carolina Annual Conference which is always such a delight to entertain. Hendricks spoke on behalf of the staff and trustees of the college and those who had worked such long hours to do everything possible to make this Conference an effective and pleasurable experience. Dr. Hendricks called attention to the yellow name tags that would identify staff members of the college and the Conference who would assist in answering questions and solving problems. He encouraged members of the Conference to take advantage of their services. Hendricks introduced Bill Lowermilk, Vice President of the College, who received a round of applause in response to Dr. Hendricks' remarks regarding how much work Bill Lowermilk and his immediate staff had put into this Conference.

Introduction: Bishop Minnick presented the Honorable J. William Hurley, Mayor of the City of Fayetteville, who came to bring greetings.

Greetings: Mayor Hurley brought greetings on behalf of the city and welcomed the Conference members back to Fayetteville and to Methodist College. He expressed his appreciation for Dr. Hendricks and what he was meaning to the college and to the City of Fayetteville. Mayor Hurley spoke of some of the changes in Fayetteville including the face-lifting of the 500 block of Hay street, the building of a new medical complex, and a new library. Mayor Hurley announced that Fayetteville was chosen an All-American city, one of the eight in the United States this year, and in response received a round of applause from the Conference. Hurley concluded by urging Methodists to get behind the anti-pornography and obscenity laws that are proposed before the legislature and take an active role in writing their representatives and taking action, that Methodism might have a role in making more stringent the very open pornography laws in North Carolina.

Introduction: Bishop Minnick introduced James Bailey, Superintendent of the Wilmington District, to bring greetings from the host district for Conference this year.

Greetings: James Bailey brought greetings from all the churches and ministers of the Wilmington District and expressed appreciation for all who had taken part in making preparations.

Introduction: The Bishop called upon Joseph Bethea and James Coile for expressions and motions.

Motion: James Coile moved "that Joseph Bethea serve as secretary pro-tem for this Annual Conference". It was adopted. Expressions of sadness for the recent hospitalization of Secretary Ted Wilson for by-pass surgery were given.

Rules of Order and Procedure: James Coile read the necessary rules of the organization of the Conference.

Amendment: Coile moved that Paragraph 7, c, on page I-8 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND REPORTS 1985, be amended to read as follows:

"IV.7.c. There shall be an Entertainment Committee composed of three ministers and three laypersons. The Committee shall be elected at the first session of the Annual Conference in the quadrennium. The Committee shall receive invitations and recommend to the Annual Conference the place and method of entertaining the Annual Conference. A local church or other institution may host the Annual Conference upon acceptance of the invitation by the Annual Conference.

(1) When no invitation has come from a local church or other institution, the Annual Conference will be held at Methodist College and North Carolina Wesleyan College on alternating years (held at Methodist College until Wesleyan has an auditorium).

(2) The Cabinet will designate a district each year on a rotating basis as the host district (when the Conference is held at Methodist

College and NC Wesleyan College) which will be responsible for ushers, flowers, and other related items of hospitality."

In Section I, page 9, change the last two sentences of VI, 2, to read: "No resolutions shall be distributed later than the second night of the Annual Conference. None shall be considered later than the third night of the Conference." IX, 3, shall be amended to read as follows, "A district conference shall be held annually in each district."

James Coile moved adoption of the Rules of the Annual Conference with those changes. His motion passed.

Motion: Robert Pullman moved "that the Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference be amended as follows: Under IV - Conference Structure, a number 8 be added. It shall read:

IV., 8, "No person may serve on more than one Board of Trustees of an institution to which Trustees are elected by the Conference." This rule will become effective at the 1986 Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

The motion was seconded. Robert Pullman spoke for the motion. Ernest Porter rose for a point of information. He wondered if this would take the ex-officio members off boards of trustees that had people on them by virtue of other offices.

Charles Smith brought a point of question. Coile expressed the feeling that it was a restrictive rule, and, if adopted, would hinder the choices of boards of trustees in their selection of candidates. Coile suggested that the ballot be exercised rather than a restrictive rule.

A vote was taken and Bishop Minnick ruled the motion passed unless someone asked for a count vote. A count vote was requested. The Bishop requested the tellers to come forward and asked the chief teller to give instructions. Both clergy and laity would vote, but the clergy tellers would do the counting. A count vote supported the Pullman motion by a 337 to 297 vote.

Organization of the Conference: Joseph B. Bethea requested that the items of organization be voted upon as a body and read the following motions:

"I move that the registration kept by the registrars at the registration tables be designated and declared the official roll of the Conference.

I move that the bar of the Conference be the main floor and the stage of Reeves Auditorium.

I move that the program as contained in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND REPORTS 1985 (as amended from time to time by the chair) be the official program of the Conference.

I move that the materials printed and published in "Saddle Bag" be declared 'presented to the Conference' when distributed to the members, to satisfy Section VI, Paragraph 2, of the rules of the Conference.

I move that persons appearing on the program of the Conference be granted the privilege of the floor.

I move that the committees and persons printed on pages 2, 3, and 4 of Section I of the program book be elected."

Bethea's motions were before the house and the motions were adopted.

Special Recognition: Bishop Minnick asked Brother Adrian Brown, a member of the Conference, 93 years of age, to appear before the Conference. He was greeted with a round of appreciative applause.

Motion: Norwood Jones moved "that the Board of Pensions Report, scheduled for the next day, be set for 11:00 o'clock instead of 11:30 because of needed extra time." It was so ordered.

Committee on Nominations: Ernest Porter presented the Nominations of

Members for the Boards, Commissions, and Committees 1984-1988, Revisions for 1985-1986. They were laid on the table until the next day.

Presentation of Proposed Constitutional Amendments: Bishop Minnick asked Joseph Bethea to present the amendments appearing on Section II, page 38 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND REPORTS 1985. Bethea read the constitutional amendments proposed to the 1984 session of the General Conference which require a two-thirds vote of the Annual Conferences. These were: 1984-25, 1984-26, and 1984-27. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) The first two amendments deal strictly with legal matters that are important to the Council on Finance and Administration. The third amendment gives permission to the diaconal ministers to be voting members of the Annual Conference. Bishop Minnick requested that they be reflected upon by members of the Conference for voting upon at a later time.

Introduction: Bishop Minnick presented Cabinet President, J. Thomas Smith, to make a report in lieu of Vernon Tyson who had been kept out of town this afternoon by pressing business. Smith rose to a point of high personal privilege not only to welcome Bishop Minnick officially to the episcopal residence and to the Conference but also to express pleasure over having a woman in the episcopal residence. Wallace Kirby and his wife escorted Mrs. Minnick to the stage and pinned on a corsage. The Conference gave a round of applause. Mrs. Minnick took the podium and gave gracious thanks for the welcome and for the opportunity to be a part of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Composite Report of the District Superintendents: Smith continued in his office as president of the cabinet by bringing the composite report of the District Superintendents for the past year in review. First, he extolled the leadership the Conference has in Bishop Minnick and then in the strength of the laity. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Smith presented the summary of the report most eloquently and Bishop Minnick received it with appreciation.

Introduction: Bishop Minnick presented J. Allen Norris, Jr., Conference Lay Leader.

Report of the Laity: Norris expressed his appreciation for Ed Hammond and his work as Associate Conference Lay Leader and noted the invaluable help that he had received. Norris referred to the recent celebration of the Bicentennial of Methodism and the return to roots of the faith and the hope that this had brought a new day and a new revival in our charge and challenge to double our membership within a short time span which will require commitment, diligence and effort. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Dr. Norris's report was received with great appreciation.

Report of United Methodist Women: Mrs. Margaret Saunders brought the report for United Methodist Women of the North Carolina Annual Conference. She alluded not only to the 200 years of Methodism but also to the 100 years of women united for mission. She spoke of the leadership and vision that had been an enormous contribution to the church through its emphasis on all fields of mission, training, and a sense of spiritual wholeness and togetherness within the church. She referred to the coming Conference theme - a challenging one - "To Love is to Risk..." (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Report of United Methodist Men: Charles Sauls brought the report for United Methodist Men. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Sauls indicated that the Methodist Men's organization was not as old as that of the women, but he emphasized that it was one of the fastest growing segments of the supportive lay elements of the church. He spoke of some of the projects of United Methodist Men and of the fact that 42 percent of the churches in the North Carolina Conference have units of Methodist Men fellowships. He stated that our Conference ranked fifth in the nation of those with active charters for Methodist Men's groups.

Report of United Methodist Youth: Steve Hutchins brought the report and indicated that giving to the United Methodist Youth Fund by youth of the North Carolina Conference was fourth in the nation. Hutchins spoke of a number of other accomplishments and of goals that were being set. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Bishop Minnick expressed the feeling that the reports of the laity had been received with enthusiasm and asked for their approval. The Conference so approved.

Report of the Conference Statistician: D. D. Traynham brought the report of the Conference Statistician. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Traynham referred to pages 39-41 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND REPORTS 1985, emphasizing the study of changes between 1983 and 1984. Traynham indicated that nearly 51 percent was devoted to benevolences paid directly by the local church and only 12 percent was sent outside the Conference. He encouraged everyone to study the statistics.

Council on Finance and Administration: Bishop Minnick presented Randolph Few to bring the report. Section I on page III-2 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND REPORTS 1985, was presented for information. Under II, Few moved adoption of 1 through 10 with the addition of North Carolina Council of Churches under Item 4.

Motion: Ernest Porter moved "under Item 10 delete: 'will be reported in whole or in summary form in the Conference JOURNAL, unless exempted by CFA and'; and delete: 'CFA upon recommendation.'"

Porter spoke to his motion. He felt that a detailed audit would increase the size of the JOURNAL by three times and felt that it would be non-productive in that this audit was available in the treasurer's office to anyone who wanted to read it. The amendment was accepted by Few for the Council on Finance and Administration. Section II was adopted as amended.

Section III, Approval to Solicit Funds, Items 1 through 6 were presented and adopted.

Sections IV and V were presented for information. Few recognized Sam Dixon to present Section V which concerned a study of the District Superintendent's salary ordered last year. He indicated that this was not a matter of information but a report. Dixon explained the all-encompassing study and exactly how it was made. The feeling and concern was that the basis for determining the district superintendent's salary did not reflect a broad cross section of the Annual Conference. Therefore, the proposal in Section V was to make the district superintendent's salary for 1986 and subsequent years the same as the average percentage change in salary, including salary, travel, and utilities for that year, for all full-time pastors serving in local charges in the North Carolina Conference. Dixon placed it before the Conference for discussion. Bishop Minnick asked for response and it was approved and adopted.

Report of the Board of Diaconal Ministry: Phyllis Gantz brought the report for the Board and referred to Section II, pages 26 and 27 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND REPORTS 1985. She summarized the report and introduced the incoming Diaconal Ministers. Bishop Minnick recognized Kimberly Perdue and presented her with a certificate recognizing her move into our North Carolina Conference as a Director of Christian Education.

Return to the Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry: Bishop Minnick asked Langill Watson to present the ministers being received into Full Connection in the Annual Conference. Watson presented these to the full conference and Bishop Minnick read them the historic questions so they might answer them, and then the ordained ministers would be invited to approve them. After giving positive answers to the questions, they were unanimously received into full membership in the North Carolina Conference.

Report of the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc.: Bishop Minnick called on C. Alison Simonton to bring the report. He referred to Section IV, pages 29 and 30 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND REPORTS 1985. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Simonton urged greater efforts toward more subscriptions, brought greetings from the staff of the "Advocate" and called attention to the recommendations that would be presented later through Conference Council on Ministries reports.

Report from Hinton Rural Life Center: Clay Smith brought the report. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Smith particularly applauded the increased emphasis on helping churches of small



membership in growth and in ministry.

Announcements: Joseph Bethea, Secretary Pro-tem, made announcements. James Bailey urged people to attend the Duke banquet and gave them a second chance to make reservations, if they had not done so. The announcement was made that Bishop Colaw was not present yet, and that, while the aircraft he was supposed to be on had landed, they had not been able to ascertain whether he was aboard or was enroute for his presentation tonight. Telegrams were read from other conferences meeting at the same time and it was moved that we reciprocate.

Hymn: Bishop Minnick asked that the Conference sing stanzas 1 and 4 of Hymn 124, "Ask Ye What Great Thing I Know". The Conference joined in doing this.

Benediction: Joseph Bethea gave the benediction.

The Conference was adjourned at 5:15 p.m., to reassemble at 7:30 p.m. for the Service of Worship for Ordination and Consecration.

Postlude: The organist played as a postlude, "Rondeau" by Jean Joseph Mouret.

## FIRST DAY, EVENING SESSION, Monday, June 3, 1985

At 7:30 p.m., a Service of Worship for Ordination and Consecration was held. Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., led the service and Bishop Emerson S. Colaw was the preacher.

Phyllis Gantz presented one candidate for consecration as a diaconal minister. H. Langill Watson presented the deacons and elders for ordination.

Organist was Judy Aycock and special music was by the chancel choir of Haymount Church, Fayetteville, under the direction of Tony Argo. (For a synopsis of the entire service see "A Service of Worship for Ordination and Consecration 1985".)

## SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION, Tuesday, June 4, 1985

Holy Communion: The Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated at Haysdale Chapel at 7:30 a.m., under the direction of the Board of Worship.

Prelude: The organist for the morning was David M. Hines, Diaconal Minister of Music, Wesley Memorial Church, Wilmington. He played "In Thee is Joy" by J. S. Bach.

Bible Study: Bishop Minnick announced he was wired for sound so he could give a roving Bible Study in a unique style. He called for the singing of Hymn 149, "I Love to Tell the Story". It was done. After the hymn was sung, Bishop Minnick led in prayer and then expressed appreciation for the overwhelming crowd that completely filled Reeves Auditorium. Minnick spoke of the Bible as a dynamic personal living experience and said he wanted to share with the members of the Conference portions that made his faith grow. He explained that he wanted the Conference to understand his approach - which was to be considered as one of many - that would give some insight into his theological and deep appreciation of the Scriptures. He spoke of his belief in the Bible as the special Word of God.

The Bishop said, "I believe the Bible is the Word of God, but the Bible has been used to support many strange and contradictory beliefs... This does not mean that the words of the Biblical text are the Word of God...There is a Word behind these words...I feel called to live by the faith of the scripture but not always by the application which the Biblical people made of that faith..."

The Bishop continued: "The Bible is (1) ancient, (2) oriental (3) literature (4) through which God has confronted his people with the Word of God...Thus, every text has four contexts: (1) historical, (2) cultural, (3) literary, and (4) theological."

Bishop Minnick emphasized that divergent pieces of Scripture could be

used to prove various things. He gave several humorous illustrations and then exhorted the congregation to utilize the Bible as a total Word of God which must be studied and understood and practiced on a personal level with responsibility. Minnick stated that we should live by the faith of the Scriptures, not necessarily by the application that the Biblical community made in a given day. Still he emphasized that behind all the laws is God's affirmation of life and his presence as the Lord of life. Bishop Minnick emphasized the expansiveness of the Bible as it opened up issues rather than closed them. It allows the minds of God's children to go on in their understanding and grow. The Bible is ancient oriental literature, the Word of God in which God has attempted to confront his people. Bishop Minnick said this would be his thesis in further presentations during these morning Bible studies. He then spoke briefly to the first two of the four items of his thesis.

Minnick spoke to John 21 and the various meanings of love as an example of the same word meaning different things in the ancient language. He spoke to the cosmology of the Bible and the fact that it was not pure science, but a theology of science. While the Bible is filled with history, one must also view it as a theology of history. Bishop Minnick announced he would address the Bible as literature in a successive session and concluded his study. The study was received with applause and appreciation.

Brief Recess: There was a brief recess following the Bible Study.

Call to Order: Bishop Minnick called the Conference into business session and called upon Charles Mercer to present a matter that needed to be presented at this time. Mercer presented the proposal for the Methodist Building addition which would be on the agenda for the following day during the report of the Conference Board of Trustees.

Report of the General Council on Ministries: Bishop Minnick presented J. Allen Norris, Jr., to present the report. Norris pledged to join the other two North Carolinians on the General Council on Ministries to provide the best possible representation on this important general board. He stated that he would be reporting from time to time on the missional priorities that were presented. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Report of the Lake Junaluska Assembly: Bishop Minnick called upon Reginald Ponder to present the report. Ponder discussed the changes at Lake Junaluska and emphasized the increased good living space for retreat groups and conferences. He expressed thanks for the giving to Lake Junaluska Assembly and emphasized what the presence of this assembly grounds relatively nearby in our state meant to all of us. He encouraged us to attend events at Lake Junaluska that were important to all members of the Conference.

Report of the Conference Council on Ministries: Bishop Minnick called upon Ernest Porter to bring the report. Porter asked the members of the Council on Ministries staff to come to the stage and join him and the members of the support staff. Porter asked that certain corrections be made to the Nominations Booklet. Changes were made and these are to be corrected in the final copy in the JOURNAL.

Nomination: Catharine Vick rose to nominate Marjorie Overman for the 1990 class of the Board of Publication. She was elected as a member. The revised list of nominations for 1985-1986 was approved.

Introductions: Porter introduced each member of the staff and explained what they did and called for the Conference to express their appreciation, which they did by according them a round of applause.

Porter referred to THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND REPORTS 1985, page 2 of II, and moved the Program and Budget Timelines. They were adopted by the Conference. Porter moved the adoption of the 1985 Supplemental Program Recommendations. They were adopted.

Conference-wide Congregational Development and Church Growth Plan: Porter called on Charles Bryant to present the quadrennial conference-wide congregational development and church growth plan. Phases I and II were adopted and will be included in the JOURNAL, Section V. Porter presented some of the Conference support staff who were present.

Missional Priority Emphasis: Porter called upon Jimmy Cummings and Clyde Dunn to present the Missional Priority Emphasis, The Ethnic Minority Local Church: for Witness and Mission. Cummings expressed appreciation as did the Conference for all members of the Missional Priorities Committee and emphasized pleasure over the progress in the coming quadrennium. A visual presentation was then given. After the most meaningful presentation, Porter expressed appreciation to Jimmy Cummings as Chairperson of the Ethnic Minority Task Force and presented him for a round of applause by the Conference.

Nomination: Porter nominated Myra Markham as an addition to the at-large members of the Commission on Archives and History. She was elected; then the entire Book of Nominations, as revised, was approved.

The program recommendations from the Commission on Archives and History, page II-4, THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985, Item B, were adopted.

Bishop Minnick then recognized Ernest Porter for his fine work as Director of the Conference Council on Ministries.

Report of the Board of Pensions: Bishop Minnick recognized Norwood Jones to present the report. Jones asked that we look at page 13-III of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. Bishop Minnick interrupted, stating that he found it necessary to change the Order of the Day to allow the presentation of this report and it required two-thirds vote of the Conference. It was moved, seconded and adopted. Jones continued with the report.

The Board of Pensions report was corrected to a certain extent and all sections of the report that involved information were adopted. Jones addressed Report B, Recommendations for the Pension Program, and made certain changes which will appear in Section V of the JOURNAL. Jones moved adoption of Report C, Housing Exclusion Allowance. It was adopted by the Conference. Jones presented addendum to the Ministers' Retirement Fund Base Benefit Rule and its adoption was moved. It was adopted. Jones moved the adoption of the report of the Board of Pensions as a whole. After the report was adopted, Ed Earnhardt rose to seek information and, perhaps, offer a motion. The Conference agreed to receive Earnhardt's information regarding the report of the General Board of Pensions and their increasing losses. The Board of Pensions report was adopted as a whole.

Report of the United Methodist Publishing House: Sue Henry and Bruce Hargrove came forward to represent that service to the Church. Hargrove brought the Board of Publication report. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Sue Henry indicated that sales were down in Raleigh and the toll-free number has reduced Raleigh sales. Ms. Henry reported that the Cokesbury Store would be moving to a new shopping center which will be easier to reach and provide more room and better service. She presented Bishop Minnick with a check in the amount of \$13,747.00 as the Conference share of the profits from the United Methodist Publishing House which would be applied to the pension funds for the Conference.

Hymnal Revision Committee: Bishop Minnick recognized those from this Conference serving on the Hymnal Revision Committee: Helen Crotwell, Harold Jacobs, and Charles Michael Smith. Smith spoke on behalf of all of them, interpreting their delight at serving on the Hymnal Revision Committee. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Appreciation was expressed by the Conference. Smith requested that we sing one stanza of "Come Ye that Love the Lord".

Call for the Order of the Day: Bishop Minnick called for the Order of the Day and the recognition of ministers now retiring from active service. Norwood Jones was presented to give this, the remainder, of his report.

Recognition of Retiring Ministers: Jones read the list of those retiring (See Condensed Minutes). All were recognized and invited to come to the stage along with their spouses. Jones indicated that there were twenty-two persons retiring, the largest number that the Conference has had retire in a single year. Bishop Minnick called on each minister to make whatever remarks he felt moved to make. Each was presented with a certificate of appreciation and a corsage for his wife.



Both Norwood Jones and Bishop Minnick expressed their gratitude for the remarks made by all the members who are retiring. Bishop Minnick gave statistics concerning the total number of service years represented and individually shook the hand of each retiree as the certificates were presented.

Announcements: Secretary Pro-tem, Joseph Bethea, made the announcements. He stated that John Wood, who retired today, was in the hospital in Durham and could not be with us.

Benediction: Bishop Minnick called upon Emerson Thompson to give the benediction for the morning session.

Postlude: The organist of the morning played "Prelude and Fugue in B Minor" by Johann Fischer as a postlude.

## **SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION, Tuesday, June 4, 1985**

Prelude: Organist of the afternoon was William J. Weisser, Diaconal Minister of Music, Edenton Street Church, Raleigh. He played as a prelude "Berceuse" by Louis Vierne.

Conference Called to Order: Bishop Minnick called the Conference to order, requesting that we rise and sing Hymn 1, "O, For a Thousand Tongues to Sing." The Conference responded with vigor. Bishop Minnick then gave the invocation for the afternoon session.

Report of the Committee on Conference Minutes: Angus Cameron gave the report, asking that the minutes for the first day be approved in their entirety. It was so ordered.

Report from the Board of Global Ministries: Rene Bideaux was introduced as a servant of that general board returning to his native North Carolina Conference. He expressed appreciation for the opportunity of bringing greetings on behalf of that board and also expressed appreciation for the service of Reginald Ponder and Tibbie Roberts on the board from this Conference.

### Continuation of the Conference Council on Ministries Report:

Report of Board of Education: Bishop Minnick recognized Ed Morrison to bring the report of the Board of Education. He referred to a chart, distributed to the members, of church school trends and indicated that Sunday School attendance at all levels was turning around and showing some growth for the first time in many years. The report is found in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985, on page II-5, E, and on page 10-IV. The report and recommendations were adopted by the Conference.

Commission on Outdoor and Camping Ministries: Sam D. McMillan, Jr., brought the report for the Commission. Recommendations are in Section II, pages 14 and 15, of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. The recommendations moved were adopted. The camping nominations for trustees as listed on page 21-II, were placed before the conference. The nominees were elected.

McMillan presented the report in Section IV on pages 27 and 29 and supplemented that with a visual report to the Conference showing some of the camping ministries in action. The report was presented to the conference and it was adopted. Bishop Minnick expressed appreciation for the presentation on Camping Ministries and directed the Nominations Committee and the Cabinet to meet tomorrow to make sure that there would be an Ethnic Minority representative on the Commission.

Ernest Porter moved, and it was seconded, that the Commission on Outdoor and Camping Ministries be increased in size from 25 to 30 and that the Conference Committee on Nominations bring to the Conference five ethnic minority nominees to be considered. It was noted that it would require a two-thirds vote because this would mean a change in the rules of the Conference. After this, the Bishop called for a vote and it was supported by more than the two-thirds margin.

Report of the Board of Evangelism: Bishop Minnick presented Eugene

Tyson to bring the report from the Board. Tyson presented the program contained in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985, Section IV, pages 12 and 13. In addition, he expanded on the written report with personal comments which were well received by the Conference. The report was adopted and will appear in Section V of the JOURNAL. Tyson brought program recommendations contained on pages 5, 8, and 12 of Section II. He requested that those recommendations be adopted. They were adopted. The Bishop called for a vote for the adoption of the report as a whole with the recommendations. It was done by the Conference.

Eugene Tyson mentioned that out of the 50 approved evangelists in The United Methodist Church, three of them were in the North Carolina Conference: Tommy Tyson, Bobby Tyson, and John Hobbs. He requested that John Hobbs speak to the Annual Conference and indicate some of the things that he was doing as a Conference Evangelist. Hobbs emphasized that the Conference Evangelist was working with the local church in a positive way and not trying to be a splinter faction. He stated that the purpose of the Conference Evangelist was to help bring about renewal and revival within any local church that requested his services.

Tommy Tyson, Bobby Tyson, and John Hobbs requested to be approved as Conference Evangelists. The Conference voted approval.

Tyson then announced the establishment of a North Carolina Conference Camp Meeting as a time of renewal and revival to be held on the North Carolina Wesleyan campus May 23-25, 1986. Edward Privette gave details of the Camp Meeting. Tyson displayed the logo for the Camp Meeting with the title, "A Time for Refreshing in Christ".

Tyson said the last item on the agenda of the program was the Southeastern Jurisdiction award to be given as special recognition for the churches having the highest number of persons received on profession of faith in the Conference and the highest ratio of persons received on profession of faith received in our Conference. The districts were called with the respective recipients. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Report of the Board of Church and Society: Bishop Minnick asked William Bingham to bring the report. He presented the report in IV-8-9 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. The recommendations are in Section II on pages 4-5. Other recommendations are on page 10 of Section II. He also referred to Item P, page 16, Section II, regarding COSROW and the support of the Board of Church and Society for this recommendation. Bingham also called attention to Section II, page 17, A, as a policy recommendation. The program and policy recommendations were moved and adopted by the Conference unanimously.

Bingham next presented resolutions on pages II-32-36. Rufus Stark questioned the wording of the resolution concerning victims of crime. The resolution was approved by the Conference without change.

On page 35 the Christian Stewardship and Nuclear Arms resolution was placed before the Conference. J. Quinton Covington proposed the following amendment: "Therefore, be it resolved that we United Methodists call for all nations of the world to disarm so as to reduce this real possibility of wholesale destruction." There were speeches for and against. The question was called and the amendment carried and will become a part of the resolution. A representative from Burlington spoke against the entire resolution on the grounds that we were representing the entire church and not just a few people. A speaker from Elizabeth City expressed opposition to the entire statement. Randy Hillman of Ocracoke made a speech in favor of the resolution. The Board presented its position. There was another speech against the issue. There was another expression of how the public would receive us in terms of this resolution. The previous question was moved and seconded. It was adopted. The resolution was adopted as amended by the Covington amendment.

The third concern was a resolution regarding Capital Punishment. Clarence Warren requested that the resolution be read aloud in its entirety. Bingham agreed and read it. There was a speech against the paper, a speech for, another speech against, and another speech for.

J. Lamont Norwood moved for deletion of the part of the resolution which reads: "Whereas the record of capital punishment in the United

States is marked by racial and class distinction..." A. K. King called the previous question on all that was before us. It was supported. The Norwood amendment was defeated and the resolution was supported and passed.

Bingham concluded his report by indicating two resolutions that had been circulated which would have to lay on the table before consideration. He also called attention to the Peace Event that would be held in Washington.

Introduction: Ernest Porter called upon Dennis Campbell, Dean of Duke Divinity School for a special presentation. Dean Campbell indicated that President Terry Sanford of Duke University, was present to make the report for the University and wished to acknowledge what he had represented over the last 15 years as President.

Terry Sanford's Remarks: Terry Sanford gave gracious expressions of his devotion to North Carolina Methodists and he told of the loss that all Methodists of this Conference would feel as he left his post, since his name was also synonymous with higher education, and particularly private higher education, in North Carolina. Sanford addressed the Conference and emphasized the bond that exists between the University and The United Methodist Church. Sanford's remarks were heard with appreciation by the Conference. He was accorded applause.

Report of Higher Education and Campus Ministries: Robert Redmond brought the report of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministries. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Redmond moved the adoption of the report in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985, Section IV, pages 19-23, and recommendations in Section II, pages 5, 6, and 13.

Motion: Sidney E. Stafford moved that "the Conference go on record as requesting that the Board of Trustees of each of our church-related colleges give serious consideration to having a clear, specific, and explicit statement concerning Jesus Christ in their statements of purpose." Bill Wells moved that the motion be tabled. It was tabled.

The report and recommendations were approved.

College Trustee Nominations: Trustee Nominations for the colleges, pages 21-23-II of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985, were presented for election. They were moved and approved.

Scholarship Awards: Kay Huggins was called upon to present the Cannon and Blackburn Scholarships and the Merit Scholarships. The Cannon Scholarship was presented to Ralph Ellis Wall of Louisburg College, a pre-ministerial student, as required by the terms of the Cannon Scholarship Committee. The Blackburn Scholarship, a four-year scholarship presented to an entering freshman, was awarded to JoAnn Elizabeth Sill of Fayetteville. Both recipients addressed the Conference and were received with appreciation.

Merit scholarships were awarded to Stephen Hedges of Fayetteville and Vanessa Levy of Pembroke.

Redmond recognized Ernest Porter and Elton Hendricks for a special presentation. The Bill Lowdermilk Scholarship at Methodist College was announced. This came through a mail solicitation as well as contributions from Methodist College and the Fayetteville Community. Lowdermilk appeared with President Hendricks and Bishop Minnick. To date \$12,560.00 has been contributed to the fund. Lowdermilk responded with gratitude and expressions of how meaningful his service with Methodist College had been over the years and continued to be.

Bishop Minnick recognized Tommy Smith who made a presentation on behalf of the Raleigh District to each of the college presidents in the form of a check for \$6,000.00 to establish a partial scholarship in each college for a deserving Methodist student.

Report of the Black College Fund: Isaac Miller was presented by Redmond to represent Bennett College and the Black College Fund.

Report of Greensboro College: William Likins, President, presented the report and news of the College to the Conference.

Report of Emory University: John Carr brought the greetings and gratitude of the University.

Call for the Order of the Day: Bishop Minnick called for the order of the day and asked James Coile to make announcements concerning the seating arrangements for those attending the Memorial Service. Bishop Minnick recognized the clergy spouses who were present. He asked them to stand. They received a round of applause.

Recess: A brief recess was called to prepare for the Memorial Service.

Memorial Service: The prelude, "Chorale and Andante Sostenuto from Sonata VI" by Felix Mendelssohn was played by the organist of the afternoon, William Weisser. Hymn 291, "On Jordan's Stormy Banks I Stand," was sung. Joseph Bethea read the roll call of our honored dead. Ernest Porter brought the memorial prayer. Catherine Wafford sang as a solo, "Eternal Life". The Scripture lesson was Hebrews 11:13-16. The address brought by Judi Smith was titled "Living With Permanent Instability". Following the address, the Hymn 288, "Servant of God Well Done", by Charles Wesley was sung. Joseph Bethea gave the benediction. The organist played as a postlude, "Now Thank We All Our God" by Selmar Mueller. Laura Davenport, Diaconal Minister of Music, First Church, Wilson, was organist for the Memorial Service.

The Conference was then adjourned until the evening session.

## **SECOND DAY, EVENING SESSION, Tuesday, June 4, 1985**

Organist for the evening worship service was Roger F. Searles, Diaconal Minister of Music, Saint Paul Church, Goldsboro, who played as a prelude "Spiritual" by Douglas E. Wagner and "A Canticle of Praise" by C. William Goff. Liturgists were Edith Gleaves and Jerry Lowry. Special Music was played by the Handbell Choir Directors from the North Carolina Conference Chapter of the Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians, Alan Porter, Director. The 1985 Conference Guest Preacher, Bishop Emerson S. Colaw, delivered the sermon.

An offering was taken with proceeds going to the Ethnic Minority Local Church Fund.

Following the evening worship service a reception was held in the foyer of Reeves Auditorium honoring Bishop and Mrs. Minnick.

## **THIRD DAY, MORNING SESSION, Wednesday, June 5, 1985**

Holy Communion: At 7:30 p.m. Holy Communion was celebrated in Hensdale Chapel by members of the Board of Worship.

Prelude: Organist of the morning was Becky Weese, Organist-Director of Music, University Church, Chapel Hill, who played "NR 3. Concerto del Sigr. Meck" by J. G. Walther.

Bible Study: Bishop Minnick called for the singing of Hymn 23, "Come, Let Us Tune Our Loftiest Song". He then introduced the second in his series of Bible Studies to a full audience. Minnick spoke, discussing the four points he had made on Tuesday, and said that while the Bible was ancient in many dimensions, it was totally relevant to the modern age. He emphasized that the cultural setting was Oriental; it was written in Eastern style rather than Western style. He then reflected on the Bible as literature. It confronts us with God's Word. It continues to confront us with God's Word in its diverse settings. He illustrated the various types of literature contained within the Bible and their setting. Bishop Minnick directed our attention to the Apocalyptic image, elucidated on the meaning of that image and its significance for today. He described Apocalypticism and its imagery as "the CB radio language of the Bible". He then discussed Biblical literature as fable. After all of the dimensions of the Bible as literature have been plumbed, they are meaningful only insofar as they help us to discern profoundly the meaning of the Word of God and hear God speak. Minnick then listed five other statements on his belief in the Bible. Minnick referred to reason, tradition, Scripture, and experience, with



Jesus as the fifth point of his pentagonal. Finally, everything is viewed in light of Jesus Christ as the Incarnate Word, and he said:

"(1) It is important to read the Bible directionally and not segmentally...

(2) It is important to read the Bible in the light of the readers' response...

(3) It is important to read the Bible experientially as well as propositionally...

(4) It is important to read the Bible wholistically...and

(5) It is important to read the Bible as gospel, not just as systematic theology."

Conference Called to Order: The morning business session was called to order by Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., following his Bible Study. He requested that we continue with the report of the Board of Higher Education and hear the college presidents who had not been heard from the preceding day.

Report of Louisburg College: J. Allen Norris, Jr., brought the report from Louisburg College. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Report of Methodist College: Elton Hendricks brought the report for Methodist College. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Report of North Carolina Wesleyan College: S. Bruce Petteway brought the report. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Report of Campus Ministries: W. Joseph Mann brought the report on Campus Ministries and alluded to the changes in the bylaws of the Campus Ministry program. The amendments were adopted by the Conference. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Report of Duke Divinity School: Dean Dennis Campbell, brought the report for the Duke Divinity school. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Campbell also reported on the Ministerial Education Fund and its importance in the training of United Methodist ministers. He described it as the finest support fund for ministerial education available.

Report of The Duke Endowment: Albert F. Fisher brought the report from the Duke Endowment. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Report of the Board of Managers, North Carolina Pastors' School: Charles Michael Smith made the report for the Board of Managers. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Motion withdrawn from Table: Robert Redmond asked that the Stafford motion of yesterday be removed from the table. Redmond stated that he now wished to accept the Sidney Stafford motion as a part of the report of the Board of Higher Education. Bishop Minnick called for it to be read. The inclusion of the motion in the report was approved by the Annual Conference.

Continuation of the Report of Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministries: Robert Redmond called upon Ernest Porter to take the podium to make certain remarks. Porter referred to the commissioning of a slide presentation that had been made last year to present the schools and indicated that the slides and script had been developed. The introduction to the slide program was presented to the Conference as a sample of what could be used in each local church.

Point of Personal Privilege: Robert McKenzie rose to present Judge Ballard Gay of Jackson, NC, who had been a lay member in attendance at Annual conference for 38 consecutive years. He did this by means of recognizing loyalty and long and continued faithful service to the church and the North Carolina Conference.

Motion: P. D. Midgett moved "that a special offering be taken, to become part of the Bill Lowdermilk Scholarship Fund." It was seconded and passed unanimously.

Continuation of the Council on Ministries Report:

Report of the Board of Missions: Caswell Shaw presented the report for the Board. Shaw referred to pages IV-25-27 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. For the policy recommendations he referred to pages II-17-19. The resolutions and the report were adopted by the Conference.

James E. Creech moved that on page II-19, we "add #18. Goldsboro District Ministry to Migrant Farm Workers." The program was explained and this was added to the report and accepted by the Conference.

Question: Charles Bryant requested that the words "beach ministries" be changed to "coastal area ministries". The change was accepted by Shaw.

George Johnson spoke to the needs that came out of UMCOR during the tornado disasters of the past year. He reported on the effectiveness of UMCOR in meeting needs in the sense of having been UMCOR disaster coordinator for the period of time involved.

Society of St. Andrew (Potato Project): Caswell Shaw asked that people remember the number 801-000-60 as the number for this Advance Special. Shaw presented Ken Horne to further explain the potato project. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Shaw gave an update on the disaster in Bangladesh and indicated UMCOR had sent \$10,000 of immediate funds to Bangladesh. Shaw felt this would be the first in a series of necessary commitments; he hoped that others would join in giving Advance Specials to this cause.

Report of the Conference Board of Trustees: Charles Mercer presented the report and asked Herb Stout and other members of the Board of Trustees to join him in making the report. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) The information sheet handed to the Conference on the preceding day gave the specific diagrammatic information concerning the projected extension to the Methodist Building and prior literature had done the same. Mercer explained the project and placed the resolution before the Conference.

Charles William Holland of Raleigh, who is in the business of rental real estate, expressed his opposition to the church going into the rental real estate business in order to finance an addition to the building on the grounds that it was in direct conflict with proprietary interests. He presented a substitute motion.

Substitute Motion: Charles William Holland moved "that the Conference instruct the Conference Board of Trustees to continue with their effort to secure enough space for the needs of the Conference in and/or at the Methodist Building but not to use rental property or rents to finance such efforts and to explore all possibilities of returning the now rented office space at the Methodist Building to the use of the Conference."

Sam McMillan asked Charles Mercer questions that were necessary: First, had the tenant made a long term commitment? Mercer said there was no definite contract for projected tenancy. McMillan asked what would be the cost to the Conference of maintaining the building. Herb Stout said it would be \$120,700 per year to maintain it. A portion of this money is coming from current rents.

Wallace Kirby asked what would happen if portions of the building being used by Methodists should be used by the current tenant. Stout stated it would have a negative effect on the cash flow, but he could not state exactly how much. To do away with rentals and use the entire space for Methodist purposes, on the other hand, would require an additional \$120,000 plus per year to operate the building. The Holland substitute was placed before the Conference for a vote. The substitute was lost and we were back to the main motion.

Robert Brainard of Saint Mark's in Raleigh asked about the financing and the period of the mortgage. Mercer indicated that the Methodist Home for Children offices could be combined, but only preliminary discussions had been entered into concerning that matter. Stout answered the question that a 30-year mortgage was a long time and that every attempt would be

made to pay it off at a faster rate. The motion to add to the Methodist Building was adopted.

Change in Order of the Day: Joseph Bethea requested that the order of the day be changed so that the Layperson of the Year Award might be made. The Conference adopted this with a two-thirds vote.

Lay Person of the Year: J. Allen Norris, Jr., was presented to name the person selected to be the Lay Person of the Year. Norris called attention to the sheet distributed naming the 1985 District Lay Persons of the Year, which demonstrated the superior qualities of so many of the fine lay persons that we have among us in our Conference. Conference Lay Person of the Year, Margaret Saunders of the Elizabeth City District, long-time leader of First United Methodist Church in Elizabeth City, was recognized with a standing ovation from the Conference assembled. Norris presented her to the Conference for remarks. A plaque of recognition was given to her.

Recognition of Chaplains: The order of the day was called in order that there would be time for recognition of the chaplains. It was noted that chaplains were all among us, not only military, but also in civilian life, and that these played a great part in the ongoing unified ministry of the church. This order of the day is an opportunity for us to see these chaplains who are so busy in their individual labors and recognize them. The chaplains were called to the stage and came forward one by one and introduced themselves and told where they served.

Continuation of the Conference Council on Ministries Report:

Report of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries: Bishop Minnick called upon Joseph C. Parker to present the overall report. Parker referred to pages II-23-26 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985 regarding the election of trustees. Changes were made by Parker. These will appear in the 1985 JOURNAL. A motion was made to substitute Lloyd Gurley for William Winslow in the Class of 1986. It was done. Ruth Mundy moved that Mrs. Carolyn High be replaced by Joyce Vereen. This was supplemented by the Board's nomination of Jean Sharpe. Mrs. Vereen was selected for nomination to the trustees of the Retirement Homes. Nominations were accepted as amended by the Conference.

Motion: James Bailey moved "that we adopt as the process for the selection and nomination of trustees for our Children's Homes and our Retirement Homes the process we currently use to nominate trustees for our three colleges." Robert McKenzie asked for a point of clarification on how trustees were selected. Bailey's motion would allow each Board of Trustees to elect its successors. The Bailey motion failed.

Announcements: Secretary Pro-tem Joseph Bethea made announcements.

Benediction: Bishop Minnick gave the benediction.

Postlude: The postlude, "Prelude in C Major", was played by the organist of the morning.

### THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION, Wednesday, June 5, 1985

Prelude: The organist of the afternoon, William Hilderbrandt, Organist-Director of Music, First Church, Henderson, played "Praise to the Lord, Almighty" by Diane Bish, and "Come, Thou Almighty King" by John Longhurst.

Annual Meeting of the North Carolina Conference Brotherhood: Don Phillips called the meeting to order. He called on Murray DeHart to read the roll call of those members of the Brotherhood who had died during the past year. Prayer was offered by W. R. Stinenger. DeHart referred to the charter of the Brotherhood and then called upon Joseph Bostick to chair the report.

Bostick gave the financial accounting for the Brotherhood. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) After an explanation of the Brotherhood, Vassar Jones was called upon to give a report of the Nominations Committee. Berry Barbour and Harold Chrismon were nominated as trustees of the Brotherhood along with the existing trustees and officers.



All were approved.

Arthur Phillips moved "that the name of the North Carolina Conference Brotherhood be changed to 'The North Carolina Fellowship' to show an act of Christian acknowledgement of the inclusiveness of our fellowship, since all ministers were no longer men." One person rose to ask the question, "Would 'fellowship' accomplish this, since the word 'fellow' was also a masculine term?" Reginald Ponder offered a substitute to the Phillips motion "to call the organization 'The North Carolina Conference Community of Clergy.'" Tom Holtsclaw offered a substitute to the substitute, asking the Brotherhood to study the matter and suggest a new name at Conference next year. The Holtsclaw substitute was adopted.

Robert McKenzie exhorted the clergy to become a part of the Brotherhood and mentioned how it had been one of the first organizations he joined when he became a Methodist preacher. He also encouraged lay people to become non-beneficiary members to show their support of the clergy. It was mentioned that as the number of people increased, the benefits were able to increase. With that statement the annual meeting of the Brotherhood was adjourned.

Business Session Reconvened: Bishop Minnick reconvened the afternoon session of the Conference and called for the singing of Hymn 217, "He Leadeth Me, O Blessed Thought." The auditorium rapidly filled as the congregation sang. Bishop Minnick called on Carol Goehring to lead in prayer for the afternoon session.

Report of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council on Ministries: Bishop Minnick called upon G. Ross Freeman to bring the report. Freeman gave the names of those serving with the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council from this Conference and then gave a certificate of merit to Bishop Minnick for the Conference's record of paying 100 percent of the askings for the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council.

Special Emphasis: Church School Evangelism and Extension: Robert O'Keef brought the presentation and asked the Conference to sing "Jesus Loves Me". After leading in prayer and the Conference's joining together in the Lord's Prayer, O'Keef stated that this was the reenactment of an opening of a Sunday School Assembly that he remembered many years ago. He lamented the passing of the truly warm and encouraging Sunday School fellowship that was truly a Sunday School and not just a series of individual classes without continuity. He expressed his gratitude that he had been requested to chair a committee to bring new life back to the Sunday School. He described the mailings that would be going out as well as the help that had already been provided through special courses at the Conference Summer School and emphasized the FETCH program. He then presented Herman Winberry. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Winberry's exhortation to the Conference was received with thunderous applause.

Motion: Langill Watson moved "that the message given by Herman Winberry on the Sunday School be printed in its entirety and distributed to the Conference through the Coordinated Mailing." The motion passed.

O'Keef made a final appeal to give the FETCH program a chance. He gave some examples of what had happened. That concluded the presentation.

Continuation of Conference Council on Ministries Report:

Return to the Report of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries:

Report of The Methodist Home for Children: J. C. Parker recognized the Director of Public Relations at the Children's Home, Douglas Byrd, to present information. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) He referred to the printed report by the Executive Director, Rufus Stark, on page IV-16 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985 and that, too, will appear in Section V. Byrd moved the adoption of the report on pages IV-16-18, and then made extended remarks explaining something of the work of the Home.

Rufus Stark then addressed the session, expanding on the current services being offered and emphasizing the need for increased funding.

Report of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.: Joseph Parker

introduced Hugh Jones, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, to begin the report. Jones introduced Joseph F. Coble, former Executive Director who had first put him on the Board. Ernest R. Porter was then introduced as the new Executive Director of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., who in turn would introduce the new management team for the Homes beginning at the end of Annual Conference. Porter expressed his emotions and soul searching at assuming this responsible office of ministry; which he did with a feeling of devout calling. Porter introduced Sandra West as Personnel Manager, Kelly Wilson, III, as Chaplain; Gerry Ingram as the new Administrator of the Methodist Retirement Home; Wayne Powers as Administrator of the Coble Health Care Center; Nathan Byrd as Director of Development and Public Relations; and Paul Bunn as Administrator of Wesley Pines. Porter asked Paul Bunn to come and make a special presentation.

Special Recognition: Kimsey King was called to receive a special award for his eleven years of service at the Methodist Retirement Home, which he accepted with gratitude. He received a round of applause from the Conference.

Nathan Byrd then presented the report for the Retirement Homes. Byrd referred to pages IV-18-19 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. Byrd extended his remarks from those printed in the report and these will be found in Section V of the JOURNAL.

Joseph Parker addressed the concerns of last year's mandate that we take steps to develop Conference relationships that would be appropriate. He indicated that both homes were now doing that. He also alluded to the blue sheet handed out by Health and Welfare Ministries concerning recommended reading materials regarding aging. Parker emphasized the need for additional funds for Golden Cross to match those being approved by the Western North Carolina Conference and he urged adoption of this in the overall Conference budget tomorrow.

Report of Golden Cross: Lloyd Edge brought the report. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Charles M. Smith moved "to remove the word 'laypersons' from the list of those eligible for Golden Cross assistance so that it will be available to all United Methodists, lay and clergy." The motion failed.

Motion: Charles M. Litzenberger moved the following: "I wish to ask the Conference to take a special offering for the minister in Goldsboro and his family who are in need of monies to pay their bills due to recent sickness." This motion was made since Golden Cross was not available in this case. It was ordered done.

Report from SEMAR: Kimsey King brought the report for SEMAR. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Motion: Jim Glass moved "that the question be asked by the District Superintendent at the Charge Conference, 'What is being done for the disabled in this church or charge?'" The motion passed.

Anne Collins made a motion regarding the use of land for office buildings by the Children's Home. The Bishop asked that that be held for later.

The Health and Welfare Report in its entirety was approved.

Recess: Bishop Minnick called for a seven minute recess which was taken.

Conference Reconvened: Bishop Minnick pointed out that there were twelve more reports and a vote to be taken before the adjournment of the day. He urged us to move with wise speed.

#### Continuation of Conference Council on Ministries:

Report of the Commission on the Status and Role of Women: Carrie Parrish brought the report for the Commission. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) Some of the children being cared for in the COSROW Child Care Program were introduced and one of the mothers, Rev. Shelley Fogleman whose husband is also a pastor, explained the joy of being able to bring their child with them and participate together as a family at Annual Conference. A delegate mother expressed what a privilege it was to

be able to participate in Annual Conference and at the same time be near her child and know that her child was well taken care of while she was in the sessions. It was made very obvious that the child care program provided for at Annual Conference was a tremendous success.

Return to the Collins Motion: Anne Collins moved the following:

WHEREAS we believe funds given over many years in support of child care through the Methodist Home for Children should be preserved for child care and spiritual nurture;

AND WHEREAS the Board of Trustees is proposing to use a portion of the endowed assets to construct an office complex for the Administrative Offices;

AND WHEREAS there will be space available in the Conference Office Building, authorized for construction and renovation by this Conference in earlier session;

I therefore move that space be made available in the Conference Office Building for the Administrative Offices of the Methodist Home for Children, and that the endowed assets be retained for the purposes for which they were given.

The motion was seconded. Irma Kirkpatrick made a motion to table. This motion was defeated.

Jack L. Hunter moved "that the motion be referred to the trustees of the Children's Home for study." Clarence Warren spoke in opposition to the motion to refer. Rufus Stark spoke in favor of the motion. The motion to defer was defeated. The Collins motion was defeated.

Report of The Commission on Archives and History: Lawrence Lugar brought the report. Lugar spoke of his recent trip to China, of the Chinese mission and Chinese Christianity as he had promised a Chinese Christian. He then presented his report on pages II-4, 9, and 10 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. Lugar brought a brief report from the Board itself and recognized members of the Commission. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Parliamentary Ruling by the Bishop: Bishop Minnick granted a student local pastor, Jim Glass, who had already made a motion which was passed, the privilege to make that motion by asking the Annual Conference to give permission. It was done.

Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns: Belton Joyner brought the report for the Commission. Joyner indicated that this was the 50th anniversary of the North Carolina Council of Churches and he felt that Sister Evelyn Mattern of that agency should have an opportunity to share with the Conference.

Joyner moved page II-10 as amended, and the report on pages IV-7-8. They were adopted.

Report of Commission on Religion and Race: Gwen Henderson presented the report for the Commission. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) The report is found on pages IV-30-31 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. It was moved and adopted.

Joint Committee on Disability: Bishop Minnick told the audience that Jack Hunter needed to make his report at this time due to another commitment. Jack Hunter brought the report. Hunter presented the report on pages III-10-12. Paragraph 3 was amended and approved. Paragraph 9 was amended by addition of the name of Kimsey King and approved. The report was adopted. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Continuation of Conference Council on Ministries Report:

Report of Methodist Foundation, Inc.: The report was given by Thomas E. Chandler. After giving his report, the extension of which may be found in Section V of the JOURNAL, he presented John K. Bergland from the Office

of Planned Giving. A report was made by Bruce Petteway, then a plaque was presented to Bergland in appreciation of his work. It was received graciously with appreciation. Bergland then gave a brief report. He noted those who had made substantive gifts and became members of the Founders Society. As Petteway read the names, Bergland presented a statuette of a circuit rider to each of the following:

The report was then moved and adopted.

Methodist Ministers Savings and Credit Union: John Cline brought the report. He indicated that he was sorry that Danny Blackman, the new Managing Director of the Methodist Ministers' Savings and Credit Union, was not present. Cline presented Curtis Ring and Roger Honeycutt of the North Carolina Credit Union League. Vivian and Maness Mitchell were called forward to accept a resolution of appreciation to Maness Mitchell for the years of service he had given to the Credit Union movement. Roger Honeycutt, President of the Board of Directors, North Carolina Credit Union League, made the presentation. Maness Mitchell responded with gracious words. He introduced Larry Johnson of the North Carolina Credit Union League. Danny Blackman came in and was presented by John Cline to the Conference. That concluded the report of the Savings and Credit Union.

Return to the Report of the Conference Council on Ministries:

The Missional Priority Coordinating Committee: Jimmy Cummings brought the report. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) The report is found on pages II-11-14 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. The report was moved and adopted.

Voting on the Proposed Constitutional Amendments: The tellers were called and the Bishop gave instructions that only lay members and clergy in full connection could vote on these amendments. The results of the vote on proposed Constitutional Amendment 1984-25: 400 in favor; none against; none abstaining. Amendment 1984-26: 400 in favor; none against; none abstaining. Amendment 1984-27: 344 in favor; 45 against; 4 abstaining.

Following the vote on the Constitutional Amendments, the Bishop declared the session adjourned until 8:00 p.m.

Postlude: The organist played as a postlude, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" by John Longhurst.

### **THIRD DAY, EVENING SESSION, Wednesday, June 5, 1985**

The Evening Worship Service began at 8:00 p.m. Organist for the service was Michael G. Regan. Liturgists were Margaret Ann Biddle and Albert Shuler. Music was by the Massed Choir composed of singers from various churches throughout the Conference, directed by Jo Anne Swartz.

The 1985 Conference Guest Preacher, Bishop Emerson S. Colaw, delivered the sermon.

The offering was designated for Bangladesh.

### **FOURTH DAY, MORNING SESSION, Thursday, June 6, 1985**

Prelude: The organist of the morning was Mark K. Gourley, Organist-Director of Music, St. Luke Church, Goldsboro. He played "Toccatina in D. (Dorian)" by J. S. Bach.

Hymn: Bishop Minnick called for the opening of the final day of Conference with the singing of Hymn 267, "Open My Eyes that I May See".

Bible Study: Bishop Minnick proceeded with the reading of Scripture and the Bible Study for the morning. He read Psalm 1:19, verses 91-105.

Minnick stated he wished to draw together some of the ideas that he had presented in the last several mornings. He did this by discussing the dialogue between the creationists and the evolutionists. He spoke of the ancient Oriental beginnings of the stories of creation. Minnick said that the question was not the methodology of creation but the fact that God was creator and the theology thereof. The narratives are the best scientific knowledge of the day and the revelation had to be made in terms of that knowledge.

The Bishop then spoke about his trip to Nicaragua, deviating from the Bible study, but reporting on what he had done at the request of many members of the Conference.

Bishop Minnick concluded the study and requested that we move into the Love Feast.

The Love Feast: Thomas Smith led in the beginning of the Love Feast by giving his own testimony. The newly ordained deacons and elders distributed the traditional elements of bread and water as a mark of Christian love and commitment. The elements were held until they had been distributed to everyone and then they were taken together. Testimony and sharing occurred and hymns were sung along with words of Scripture and poetry and all forms of Christian expression and experience.

Many of the Conference participants brought marvelous testimony to the power of God's love in the lives of others and in their own lives - how their lives had been touched by others and by their love and trust in God. Many gave thanks for the church and the blessings of the Lord Jesus Christ that had come to them in the recent years and what had happened in the earlier years of their lives. Some songs broke out spontaneously and were picked up and sung by the congregation. Tommy Smith asked all to join hands and closed with a prayer and the singing of "Lord Jesus, I Love Thee."

Brief Recess: The Bishop called for a brief recess.

Conference Reconvened: The Conference was called to order.

Committee on Minutes: Angus Cameron made the report. He moved "that all minutes for Tuesday and Wednesday be approved as they had been read." It was done. He moved further "that the Minutes for Thursday be approved with the understanding that the Committee on Minutes would review them." This was accepted.

Motion: Kermit Braswell moved that the Bishop's report on his trip to Nicaragua be distributed to the entire Conference in written form. It was referred to CFA.

Committee on Nominations: Ernest Porter brought the names selected by the Conference which would be added to the trustee list for the Commission on Outdoor and Camping Ministry and they were approved.

Report of Insurance Committee: Norwood Jones brought the report for the Insurance Committee found in III-23-24 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Motion: Willim Patterson moved "that the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, through its Insurance Committee, provide group health insurance to all non-ordained local church staff personnel who qualify by working a minimum of twenty-five (25) hours weekly;

that this health insurance coverage be representative of the introductory offer data, as documented in the mailing to all churches in the Conference from the Conference Insurance Committee, dated January 24, 1985;

that the waiting period for any pre-existing condition is to be exempt if the applicant enrolled when the opportunity to enroll for the health coverage was first offered;

and that this health insurance be set up apart from the ministerial group health insurance group and that this new coverage be implemented as soon as possible."



Jones accepted the motion as a part of his continuing report.

Substitute Motion: Herb Stout moved "that full time lay employees be eligible for the Conference insurance program if they work 30 hours per week; and that there be a one year waiting period for pre-existing conditions." Jones expressed that he preferred having a separate group. The Stout substitute lost.

The report of the Insurance Committee, as amended by the Patterson motion, was approved.

Commission on Equitable Salaries: Charles K. Morrison brought the report of the Commission as found on pages III-7-10 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985.

Motion: David Fischler moved "that the report of the Commission on Equitable Salaries be amended so that the minimum salary level (including utility allowance) would be \$10,350.00 for 1986." The amendment was placed before the Conference and discussed. There was a speech against. The amendment lost.

Motion: E. N. Tindell moved to delete Item 2 under Section III, A, on page III-8 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985. It was seconded. Kermit Braswell spoke against the Tindell motion. The motion was defeated.

The report was moved and adopted. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Committee on District Conference Records: Bruce Taylor brought the report. He moved "that the report of the Committee on District Conference Records be filed with the secretary for inclusion in the JOURNAL." It was adopted. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Resolution on Central America: The resolution had been on the table for the required period of time and was now presented for acceptance and inclusion as a resolution in the JOURNAL and for dissemination to the appropriate news media.

Amendment: Quinton Covington proposed the following amendment by addition to the resolution on Central America to be inserted as Item 7:

"7.a. We, as a body of United Methodists, express to the communist regimes infiltrating Central America, our strongest opposition to their presences and the active attempt to overthrow the governments of Central America, and we, therefore, call for an immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all arms and foreign soldiers from South America, thereby removing the threat of war and suffering due to war in our hemisphere.

b. We call upon the government leaders of Central America to submit to Christ's example of love and compassion, thereby illuminating the social injustices that have caused the revolution by the people of Central America.

c. We call upon the government leaders of Central America to immediately stop the slaughter of its citizens and the destruction of its resources.

d. We call upon the government leaders of Central America to stop immediately the persecution of Christians, pastors of churches, evangelists, and missionaries in their countries, and to restore the freedom of worship of God and expression of faith throughout the land without fear of reprisals.

e. We call upon the government leaders of Central America to grant amnesty to all political prisoners held in prisons of Central America, and to return these prisoners to their families safely."

There was a speech against the amendment. The amendment was adopted.

Eric Lindblade offered another addition to the resolution: "While we acknowledge human rights deficiencies in El Salvador, we applaud steps in El Salvador toward democracy, and we urge support from the United Methodist

Church and the US government." There was a speech against the amendment. The amendment was defeated.

Amendment: Winton Rankin proposed an amendment to the Resolution on Central America as follows:

"Delete the paragraph designated as '1)' and substitute:

1) Asks all Methodists to recognize that:

a. Those presently in control of government of Nicaragua embrace communist ideology.

b. Communist ideology is anti-Christ and demeans the dignity of the individual.

c. The government of Nicaragua thus is anti-Christ and anti-church.

Add at the start of the paragraph designated '2)':

Deplores the repressive actions taken by the government of Nicaragua against the citizens of that country and

Delete the paragraph designated '3)' and substitute:

3) Expresses regret that the economic and governmental situations existing in Nicaragua prompt flight by citizens of that country, and urges churches in North America to support actions designed to remedy the situation in Nicaragua.

Delete the paragraph designated '4)' and substitute:

4) Urge any churches that believe more immigration of Central Americans should be permitted to the United States government, to seek to achieve such increased immigration through revision of the laws of the US before resorting to civil disobedience through an underground railway of sanctuary churches.

Delete the paragraph designated '5)'.

Delete the sentence in parentheses from paragraph '6)' and renumber the amended paragraph as '5)'.

Delete the paragraph designated '7)'."

The Bishop asked that each item be considered separately. The various sections of the amendment were discussed. Each item failed. There was a call for the previous question on all that was before us. The total amendment was defeated.

The Resolution on Central America, as amended, was adopted. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Resolution on South Africa: The Resolution on South Africa was placed before the Conference. It was moved and seconded.

Amendment: Rufus Stark moved "that under #6 we delete the second sentence and insert: This committee shall implement, within the North Carolina Conference, the April 1985 resolution on South Africa enacted by the General Board of Global Ministries by distributing the requests of that resolution to each local church and agency of the North Carolina Conference, requesting that each church and agency having invested funds support the requests of the resolution.

Further delete from the paragraph the section beginning 'Emphasis shall be given...' through the end of the paragraph."

There was a speech against the Stark amendment and the resolution. Clyde Dunn spoke for the Stark amendment. The Stark amendment was adopted.

Amendment: Dennis P. Levin moved to add to Section 4 "so long as their participation was lawful and peaceful". There was a speech against the amendment, a speech for, and another speech against. The previous question on all that was before us was called. The amendment was defeated.

The Resolution on South Africa, as amended, was adopted. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)



Board of Ordained Ministry Matters: Bishop Minnick called upon Langill Watson to present certain matters from the Board of Ordained Ministry. Watson stated that there were no items concerning ministerial matters that were before us. Watson thanked all the churches that had supported the Ministerial Education Fund and reminded the Conference that 25 percent was retained in our own Conference. Watson referred to the brochure, "Guidelines for Continuing Education", and encouraged responsiveness to it. Watson recommended for the Class of 1989, Board of Managers of the Pastors' School, the reelection of Albert Fisher and William Sherman; Class of 1986, replace Judi Smith with Judith Lee. It was done.

Pastoral Care Committee: Jimmy Creech was called to discuss the work of the Pastoral Care Committee. Recommendations in II-19-20 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985 were amended with additions by the Committee, and presented for inclusion in the JOURNAL. The report was approved. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.)

Offering: Bishop Minnick called for the offering which had been requested the preceding day. He announced that the first offering taken during the Love Feast for Fred Dillon and his wife in the Goldsboro District was \$1,000.00 even, and he hoped for a good offering for the Lowdermilk Scholarship Fund which was now being taken.

Report of the Committee on Conference Entertainment: Allen Norris brought the report. With the affirmation of Methodist College, and with the expectation of returning here in 1987, it was reported that the Durham District had requested the Conference to meet at Duke University in 1986. Norris introduced Elton Hendricks, President of Methodist College, also a member of the Committee. Hendricks indicated that he did not want there to be any impediment against accepting the invitation from Duke. Methodist College is always glad to have the Conference meet here, but he indicated that they would continue to provide support to make a successful and meaningful Annual Conference wherever it was held.

Hugh Cameron inquired as to the differential in cost. Norris indicated that the cost would be no more than \$10,000.00 in excess of the normal cost. Various questions were asked concerning the arrangements. The invitation from Duke University to entertain the Annual Conference in 1986 was approved.

Council on Finance and Administration: Randolph Few expressed appreciation to those going off CFA this year for their loyal service and hard work. On pages III-2-3 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS 1985, the budget recommended by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration to be raised January 1, 1986 to December 31, 1986 was placed before the Conference. The budget was adopted.

Report of the Committee on Episcopacy: The report was brought by Vernon Tyson. The Bishop received a prolonged standing ovation before Tyson could even give his full report. Tyson spoke words of appreciation for what Bishop Minnick had already meant to us, explained what had been done in preparation for his coming, and told of some of the events of his first year here.

Supplemental Information: The unanswered disciplinary questions were included in this sheet and will be placed in the Condensed Minutes of the JOURNAL. They were placed before the Conference for adoption. Discussion was held regarding Question 16, regarding the careful examination of how charges are put together. The supplemental information was adopted.

Moving Day: Bill Sherman moved "that moving day be set for Thursday, June 13, 1985". The motion passed.

Report of the Committee on Resolutions: Tom Collins brought the report, expressing appreciation for the Annual Conference where the hospitality has been so enthusiastic and effective. (For complete text of the report, see JOURNAL, Section V.) The report was adopted by the conference with appreciation and applause.

Announcements: Joseph Bethea, Secretary Pro-tem, made announcements.

Reading of the Appointments: Bishop Minnick concluded the last

disciplinary questions by answering the question, "Where are the preachers stationed for the ensuing year?" Copies of the appointments were distributed to the Conference, during which Bishop Minnick called for the singing of Hymn 393, "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken".

Bishop Minnick read the Disciplinary Call to Ministry. He declared the appointments as distributed to be true and full and thereby fixed as true and accurate.

Diaconal Ministry Appointments: The Bishop read the appointments of the Diaconal Ministers as they were inadvertently omitted from the printed list.

The Bishop read the words of the Scripture which represented the sending forth to ministry. He then called for the singing of Hymn 164, "O Jesus, I Have Promised".

Hymn: After giving the members of the Conference a chance to make comments or changes concerning the appointments, the Bishop again fixed them with the changes as announced. He then called for the singing of Hymn 306, "God Be with You Til We Meet Again". The traditional hymn was sung by this historic Conference.

Benediction: The benediction was given by Carlton P. Minnick, Bishop, bringing to a close the 1985 session of the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church. This was the 160th session and the first year of the episcopacy of Bishop Carlton P. Minnick, Jr., as Bishop of the Raleigh Area, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The United Methodist Church.

Postlude: The organist of the morning played as a postlude, "Chorale Prelude on 'Today the Son of God Triumphs'" by J. S. Bach.

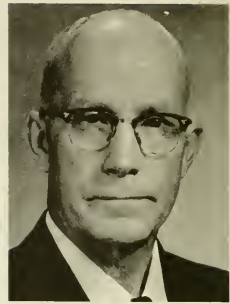

ROBERT MARRINER GRADELESS

1908 - 1984



When Brother Bob Gradeless died, I lost one of the dearest friends I have been privileged to know and love. The genuineness of his lifestyle was the thing that drew me to him when we first met.

Whenever I recall him and our friendship, I remember something about that expression, "The Greeks had a word for it".

Imagine with me. A customer takes a statue or an ornament made of marble, simple stone or the like, to be repaired by the sculptor. The work is done by the workman's use of wax rather than the material needed. In time, the deceit, as well as the flaw, becomes obvious.

Repairs done properly were said to be made "sine cera", that is, without wax. From this we get one of the most beautiful words in the English language, sincerity. To the best of my knowledge, Robert Gradeless lived a life completely "without wax" in relationship to all individuals. He was sincere and utterly free from disguise. His absolute contempt for dishonesty and fraud was well known by everyone who knew and loved him.

Robert Marriner Gradeless was born March 10, 1908, in Belhaven, NC to George J. and Jane Hodges Gradeless.

On September 15, 1934, he married Alice Cuthrell of Aurora and Bethel. They had a very special marriage and life together, and God blessed them with two children, James Hodges and Eleanor Jane.

Additional survivors, after 50 years of exemplary marriage, include five grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Brother Bob attended John Wilkerson High School in Belhaven, Louisburg College, Duke Divinity School and Candler School of Theology at Emory.

He entered the Methodist ministry in 1950 and his appointments were Chowan, Bridgeton, Red Oak-Yorks, St. John in Kinston, Hubert, Hawkins-Tabor, Evansdale-Black Creek, Chadbourn, Shady Grove, Ocracoke, Trenton, and Williston-Smyrna.

Brother Bob retired in 1974, having chosen his hometown for retirement, the place where he grew up and dearly loved. He died July 8, 1984, in Pungo District Hospital, Belhaven. His body was laid to rest, July 10, in the family cemetery at Belhaven. Funeral services were conducted by the Reverend Tom Hollis, pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church, Belhaven, the Reverend Dr. Julian Scott of Kinston, and this writer.

This memoir would not be fair to Robert Gradeless if it also did not include the fact that, to those familiar with the political scene, local and beyond, he was affectionately known as "Mr. Republican".

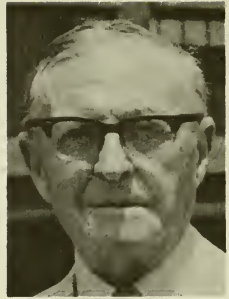
His church life and his political life were very much alike in that both were based on honesty of intentions and an obvious lack of false pretense.

Leon Warren Ross, a retired United Methodist Church minister, died at Nash General Hospital, Rocky Mount, NC on July 20, 1984. Funeral services were held at Johnson's Funeral Home in Rocky Mount by Reverend Wade Goldston and Reverend Jerry Cribb. Interment was at Elon Presbyterian Church Cemetery in Elon, VA. Reverend Wayne Meredith officiated.

Born September 3, 1903 in New Jersey, Ross was educated at Washington College in Maryland and Dickinson Seminary (now Lycoming College) in Williamsport, PA. After graduation, he served churches in Virginia, Delaware, Maryland and North Carolina. He was received on trial in the Peninsula Conference in 1932 and admitted into full connection in 1934. He transferred to the North Carolina Conference in 1956 and retired in 1969. He then served three years after retirement, totaling 40 years of service to the Church.

Ross was a member of Granite Lodge No. 177, A. F. & A. M. in St. Michaels, MD, and the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of Wilmington, DE.

He is survived by his wife, Anne Collier Ross of Monroe, VA; two daughters, Colleen Ross Baker of North Port, FL and Shirley R. Peterson of Ponchatoula, LA; one step-son, William L. Hildrebrandt of Elon, VA; six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

When I think of Brother Ross, a verse of Scripture from the Apostle Paul comes to my mind: "For we do not preach ourselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord; and ourselves your servants for Jesus' sake". (2 Corinthians 4:5) These words describe both the life and ministry of Ross. He was a self-effacing person, requesting before his death that little be said of him at his funeral service. He highly exalted his Lord. Like John Wesley, he could have said of his own preaching: "I offered the people Christ." He sought not the "high" places in the Church but the "low" places. Jesus' words fit him well: "Everyone who exalts himself shall be humbled, but he who humbles himself will be exalted". (Luke 14:11)

The last charge that Brother Ross served as a retired minister was the West Halifax Charge in the North Carolina Conference. Just prior to his giving up his work, on Sunday, June 3, 1973, Dr. Ralph Hardee Rives, member of the Eden Church on this Charge, had these praise worthy words to say of Ross: "Since last September, he and Mrs. Ross have greatly endeared themselves to us. They have become a 'part of us', and our church; our lives, and our community are richer today because they came our way".

Dr. Rives goes on to say of Mr. Ross: "You have shown real dedication to mankind...your deep faith has strengthened our faith. Your quiet, dedicated ministry, your sincere witnessing at all times of the Christian faith, your nobility of spirit, have set high standards for us to try to measure up to in our own lives.

When Mr. Ross came to complete this Conference year (1972-73), our church was in a state of confusion and frustration and despair...Mr. Ross's greatest contribution has been that of a 'mender'. He has helped us to keep our church alive and intact. He has kept us going and encouraged us to grow over our unpleasant memories and experiences...As a result of the past year, I like to think that we are all a little more understanding and a little more compassionate. And that, to me, is what Christianity is all about, anyway." And so the Eden Church proclaimed the third day of June, 1973, "Ross Appreciation Day".

I can think of no better way to end this memorial to Brother Rosss than to quote a poem which Dr. Rives quoted on "Ross Appreciation Day". The poem was written by Mahatma Gandhi while imprisoned in the year 1930.

This and this alone  
Is true religion...  
To serve thy brethren!

This is sin above all other sin,  
To harm thy brethren!

In such a faith is happiness,  
In lack of it is misery and pain:

Blessed is he who swerveth not aside  
From this straight path:  
Blessed is he whose life is lived  
Thus ceaselessly in serving God:

By bearing others' burdens,  
And so alone,  
Is life, true life, to be attained:

Nothing is hard to him, who, casting life aside,  
Thinks only this...  
How may I serve my fellow men?

LLOYD CRAWLEY BROTHERS, SR.

1893 - 1984



"Brother Brothers", as he was affectionately known to many of his peers and congregations, was a true "brother" to his fellow man. One of the original "Circuit Riders", his earliest charges were covered from horse back or horse and buggy. When an early Ford became available, it often had to be pulled by church members on horses out of deep mud to reach a service.

Lloyd was born November 13, 1893 to J. J. and Mary Ellen Garrett Brothers in the Elizabeth City area of North Carolina. He worked his way through Trinity College (now Duke University) graduating in 1917. During college, an appendectomy at nearby Watts Hospital (also now Duke) introduced him to the care of nurse, Corrie Lee Page. The relationship bloomed into marriage on November 8, 1918 while Lloyd was serving as a World War I Army chaplain. Overseas orders canceled by the Armistice and his subsequent discharge enabled the young minister and his bride to begin their almost 43 years of service with the North Carolina Conference. Pastorates included Columbia, Bath, Erwin, Stonewall, Bailey, Robersonville, Spring Hope, Kenly, Warrenton, Oxford, Conway, Middleburg, Halifax, Rocky Mount, and Wake Forest.

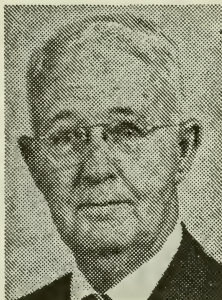
Lloyd and Corrie raised two sons, L. C. Brothers, Jr. (deceased 2-8-56) and William N. Brothers. To be near their remaining son, they moved to California after spending early retirement years in Raleigh, NC. Lloyd continued to do "guest-shots" in local pulpits whenever possible until finally an operation removed his left leg. No longer able to care

for the progressively bedridden Corrie but still able to minister to others through prayer and gospel singing, Lloyd was forced to give up his apartment. The couple moved into new quarters at the Royalwood Nursing Home in Torrance, California. In March of 1982, Corrie now blind, was called to rest, leaving Lloyd to continue a lonely ministry to his fellow patients. Alert, lucid, reading his Bible and "The Advocate" until the very end, Lloyd now in his ninetieth year was called to join his beloved Corrie in a heavenly charge.

Survivors include one son, William N. Brothers of the Los Angeles Area; a grandson, Dr. Michael Brothers of New Orleans; sisters, Mrs. Edith Thompson of Phoenix, AZ, Mrs. Alice Whitehurst of Elizabeth City, NC, Mrs. Bertie Gregory of Elizabeth City, NC, Mrs. Grace Spangler of Norfolk, VA, and Mrs. Mary Shipp of Chesapeake, VA; brothers, John A. Brothers of Black Mountain, NC and James A. Brothers of Sunbury, NC.

Interment was at Green Hills Memorial Park, San Pedro, California on September 12, 1984. Funeral services were conducted by Reverend Thomas L. Rothhaar.

WILLIAM NORMAN VAUGHAN

1895 - 1984

The Reverend William Norman Vaughan, at 88 years old, died at the Coble Health Center of the Methodist Retirement Home on October 1, 1984 where he had lived for about 12 years.

A graveside service was conducted at Forest Lawn Cemetery in Richmond, VA by the Reverend Kelly Wilson, III, Chaplain of the Coble Health Center.

Surviving are sons, Richard Stone Vaughan of Richmond and William Norman Vaughan, Jr., of Marietta, GA; a brother, LeRoy Vaughan of Jackson, NC; six grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

Born on October 22, 1895 at Scotland Neck in Halifax County, he attended Halifax Schools and Trinity College. Mr. Vaughan was admitted into the NC Conference in 1922, received his deacon's orders in 1926 and elder's orders in 1928.

Finishing his education and carrying out his commitment to preach, he served at Epworth in Raleigh, Henderson, Calvary in Wilson, and Swan Quarter. Following his marriage to a school teacher, Kathleen Ernestine Horman from Manteo on January 27, 1925, together they served churches at Bath, Vanceboro, Rocky Mount Circuit, Wanchese, Northgates, South Mills, Lillington, Faison, Spring-Garysburg and Evansdale at Wilson. During these busy years of faithful service to the church they were blessed with two sons and the communities in which they lived were blessed by their presence and ministry.

With more than 30 years of dedication to Christ's work, Mr. Vaughan retired in 1950. He and Mrs. Vaughan moved to Richmond to be with their children. Soon after the move to Richmond, Mrs. Vaughan became ill and never fully recovered her health but she continually worked in her home and in her beautiful flowers and shrubs. Her death came on April 21, 1961.

Some years later, with his own health declining, Mr. Vaughan moved to the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham. While there he met and married Elizabeth Hudson Malbone; then following her death on April 23, 1975, he later married Margaret Kelly, also of the Home. Margaret died on January 28, 1984.

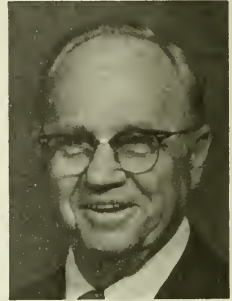

EARL RAY MEEKINS

1900 - 1984



Earl Meekins was born just after the new century on February 5, 1900. He and his twin sister Edith grew up in a large, close family in Stumpy Point, a coastal fishing village in Dare County. He remembered the village before roads were built and before fishing boats had engines. He remembered attending a one-room schoolhouse, and the large campmeetings with three circles of tents on Hatteras Island. In 1923, he married a girl from Stumpy Point, Blanche Hooper, whom he had first met when he was three and she was a newborn. They were together for 61 years.

At about ten years old, Earl decided he should preach and practiced from various tree stumps to an admiring audience of other children. But it was another 30 years before he actually became a full-time minister and began the process of training, summer schools at Duke Divinity School and Candler School of Theology which resulted in his becoming a member of the North Carolina Conference in June 1955.

In those intervening years Earl pursued many trades, accumulating life experiences which helped make his ministry compassionate and meaningful to so many. He had been there: he understood the economic realities of his parishioners. He served in the Coast Guard in World War I. He established a family grocery store in Elizabeth City only to see it swallowed up in the Great Crash of '29. He fished commercially with his beloved brother Lit, moving their families back and forth seasonally between fishing villages, eking out the Depression. He relocated, along with a mass of other coastal boatbuilders, to Norfolk when World War II necessitated huge crews in the shipbuilding yards of Tidewater. For the first time, Earl and Blanche had resources and security.

Finally by 1944, the point toward which Earl's life had always been leading came. The North Carolina Conference had so many ministers in the wartime chaplaincy that it could not fill its home pulpits and turned to holders of local preacher's licenses. Earl agreed to take a charge. He began his ministry on the Hatteras charge from 1944-45 and continued to take appointments for the next twenty years. He served the Chowan charge 1946-49, Columbia 1950-54, Perquimans 1955-56, Robbins Circuit 1957, Friendship 1958-60, Columbia Circuit 1961-62, and Columbia Church 1963-64.

He loved his churches. He visited with genuine interest in seeing how the folks lived their lives and what they needed from him and from their church. His sermons were never pretentious, never scolding, never self-righteous. He was an example of an honest, upright, hardworking man whose relationship with God was obvious but not ostentatious. He laughed a lot but never at anyone else's expense. He displayed a warm heart and a forthright manner, never pretending to be what he was not. His sermons and his life were integrated: he was who he was. His last church was a repeat

appointment - meaningful to him as a sign of the warm regard and respect of the people for him to request him back again. After his retirement he compiled the statistics of his twenty years of service: he had baptized 294 - 96 infants and 198 adults; he had received 565 members into the church - 265 on profession of faith and 300 by transfer. There are, however, no statistics on how many lives he touched with warmth and faith and strength. His favorite hymn was "A Charge to Keep I Have" and it seems particularly symbolic of his ministry.

After a serious heart attack in 1964, Earl retired, moving to Manteo where he and Blanche had previously established a family owned motel. Earl began a different kind of work. He gardened extensively, providing an endless stream of vegetables for the motel restaurant. He built a cottage on the land where he grew up on Stumpy Point. He maintained a steady physical pace, caring for the gardens, dealing in real estate, fishing, building a boat, helping manage the family motel business. Occasionally he preached when he was needed.

The life suited him. His heart lasted a long time, and even in spite of a bout with cancer he remained extraordinarily vital and productive to an advanced age. That may have been partly because he always looked ahead. Though he had exceptionally clear recall of events of 75 years or more ago, he did not dwell in the past but continuously planned his next projects. At 84, he planned to double the size of his lakefront garden, and bought a huge tiller to accomplish that. Within the last week of his life, he was astride a roof, putting shingles on a new building to house his tiller on the same land where his father before him had gardened.

What was he like? How will he be remembered? With a saltine cracker or a homemade biscuit in hand, whistling a vague tune as he walked and thought out his plans for a sermon or a business venture, listening to every baseball game he could find on television even after he was too deaf to really hear the announcer, carrying a little notepad and pen in his shirt pocket for scribbling and tic-tac-toe with his great-grandchildren, making corny jokes with all the children and drawing them to him by his grin and his unmistakable affection, arguing politics with his brothers or talking theology with anyone who displayed the slightest interest, digging septic tanks and drainfields for the motel property, bringing baskets of long green cucumbers from the fields and thankful to be productive at an age when many are not able to move from their chairs.

He was a man of keen intelligence and common sense, a shrewd businessman who yet never looked for the unfair advantage. He was a good minister who led but never got lost in the pride of leadership. He was a firm father who yet never needed to be stern. He was a good husband who instinctively thought of marriage as a partnership and lived out that code long before it was fashionable. He was an attentive and generous grandfather. Family was almost everything to him. His children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren recognized and loved him for that fiercely. Many of his family were there when he died quietly on October 20, 1984. His survivors are his wife, Blanche Meekins of Manteo, his daughters, Ina M. Evans of Manteo and Mary M. Beauchamp of Newport News, his 10 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by one daughter, Lois Meekins Jackson of Drake's Branch, VA.

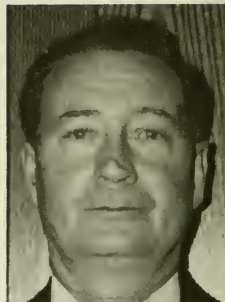

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CAREY HOUSTON BRIGMAN

1926 - 1984



Carey Houston Brigman, son of Boggan and Alice Reynolds Brigman, was born in Richmond County in North Carolina on August 28, 1926. He also grew up in Richmond County and graduated from Rockingham High School. He attended Pfeiffer College, Louisburg College and Duke University Pastor's School.

Carey died on December 6, 1984 at West Onslow Beach in Onslow County. Funeral services were held at the Carroll Chapel United Methodist Church in Sneads Ferry, NC. Officiating were New Bern District Superintendent M. Whitfield Warren, Jr., and the Reverend Clyde B. Cheezem. He was laid to rest in the Straits United Methodist Church Cemetery in Carteret County.

On November 24, 1944, Carey was married to Ella Mae Humphrey and they had a special life and a special ministry together for 40 years. Carey's survivors include his wife; one son, Rodney Houston Brigman of Harkers Island, NC; one daughter, Ellen Dale Johnson of Straits, NC; three grandchildren, Mia and Meg Brigman and Carey L'Neal Johnson; and one brother, Jack P. Brigman of Hamlet, NC.

Carey served his Lord as a United Methodist minister for 13 years. His first appointment was to Mount Gilead Circuit followed by Straits-North River and then Carroll Chapel. He was licensed to preach in 1960, ordained Deacon in 1967 and admitted into Associate Membership in 1970.

On November 1, 1965, Carey suffered a massive heart attack and another one in May of 1977. Cause of death was Eschemic Heart Disease. He was a quiet, gentle man but strong in his Christian convictions. Being "brought up" from childhood with a keen sense of "right and wrong", he lived his life that way.

After retiring from the ministry, Carey worked for Onslow County government until his death. He was known to all as a good man, sincere in his work and a fine gentleman in every sense of the word.

Carey's favorite hymn was "In The Garden":

I come to the garden alone,  
While the dew is still on the roses,  
And the voice I hear,  
Falling on my ear,  
The Son of God discloses.

And He walks with me,  
And He talks with me,  
And He tells me  
I am His own,  
And the joy we share  
As we tarry there,  
None other has ever known.

WILLIS ROSWELL STEVENS

1907 - 1984



"What doth the Lord thy God require of thee, but to fear the Lord thy God, to walk in all His ways, and to serve the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul?" (Deuteronomy 10:12)

Willis Roswell Stevens, truly a servant of God, was called to his eternal home on December 8, 1984 after suffering a series of heart attacks. The final one came on Thanksgiving evening as the family gathered for dinner. He was taken to Johnston County Memorial Hospital in Smithfield, NC, where a few days later, he peacefully slipped away with a prayer on his lips, "Thy will be done. Thy will be done." His last act of love, was the bequeathing of his earthly temple to medical science with the hope that it may be used for the betterment of mankind in the years to come.

Willis was born on September 25, 1907 in Wendell, NC, the only son of Milton Roswell and Donia Hales Stevens. These devoted Christian parents taught him to love God and his fellowmen and encouraged him to grow as "Jesus grew in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man".

As a small boy, Willis informed his parents that he wanted to be a preacher and a few years later, while living in Smithfield, NC, he accepted Christ as his Lord and Savior and became a member of Centenary Church. It was there that he received his call to the Christian ministry. In June of 1929, on the recommendation of his pastor, the Reverend D. H. Tuttle, he received his license to preach. One of his most cherished possessions was the Bible that was presented to him at that time.

Willis was graduated from Hugh Morson High School in 1928. In preparation for the Christian ministry, he studied at Duke University, NC State College, and Emory and Henry College, where he received his A. B. Degree. He continued his theological training at the Biblical Seminary of New York.

While at the Biblical Seminary, he met Elma Hensley of Tusculum College in Greeneville, TN. They were married in the College Chapel on October 26, 1935. To this union were born three sons, Willis Jr. of New Bern, NC, Robert (deceased), and Franklin Hales of Weddington, NC. A daughter, Elizabeth Anne Stevens Jordan, resides in Charlotte, NC. Now there are beloved in-laws and six grandchildren.

Willis was admitted on trial to the North Carolina Methodist Conference in November of 1935 at Wilmington. His ministry began soon after that as he served the six churches of the Bladen Circuit. His other appointments were as follows: Wesley Memorial in Wilmington; the Goldsboro Circuit in Wayne County; Rosemary in Roanoke Rapids, Trinity in Jacksonville; Chestnut St. in Lumberton; Rockingham: First; Trinity in Wilmington; Centenary in New Bern, District Superintendent of the Greenville District; Fairmont in Raleigh, Horne Memorial in Clayton; and Asbury in Smithfield as a retired supply. It was here in Smithfield, his boyhood home, that he and Elma spent more than twelve happy years after their retirement in 1972.

During his more than forty years of service in the Christian ministry, Willis constantly stressed that every phase of the Church program should have as its chief objective the directing of lives toward a personal commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour through the preaching, the teaching and the living of the Word. This he did as a gifted preacher, an able administrator, a builder, a devoted pastor, husband and father.

In addition to his duties in the local church, Willis accepted the

opportunity and challenge to serve on various conference boards and agencies. These included the Board of Missions, the Board of Education, the Board of Pensions, and a number of years as a trustee of the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham. He was Conference secretary of the Board of Pensions for sixteen years. During that time, he became known as a special friend and counselor to the retired ministers, their widows, and orphans, always seeking ways to promote and provide for their well being. He was so efficient and dedicated in this service that, at one time, he was asked to consider serving with the General Board of Pensions. He chose to remain in his beloved NC Conference.

Willis had great faith in and love for the youth of the church. He rallied to their needs in many areas of their lives as a pastor and friend, helping them to come to grips with their problems and difficulties in a victorious way. This he did as a camp director, leader of retreats and assemblies - along with personal witnessing in his everyday living.

This love of young people and his ability as an organizer and counselor took Willis beyond the bounds of the NC Conference. During ten weeks in the summer of 1959, he and his wife, Elma, were counselors of the NC Conference European Youth Caravan, sponsored by the Board of Missions. They, with eight college-age young people, lived and worked with members of Methodist Churches in England and Europe, helping them to rebuild and repair their churches which had been ravaged by war.

In 1964, he was appointed District Superintendent of the new Greenville District which he organized and promoted for six years. Under his leadership and that of dedicated ministers and lay people, the Greenville District became a center of activity for the building of the Kingdom of God in that area and across the world.

Along with his ministerial duties, Willis was active in the affairs of the local communities in which he served, lending support and often directing fund drives for humanitarian purposes. This was especially true during the polio epidemic in the early fifties. His efforts were acclaimed across the state.

Willis cherished the fellowship with his fellow ministers. His close friend and brother in Christ, Dr. O. L. Hathaway, paid this tribute to him following his death.

"W. R. Stevens gave the best of his years in service in the NC Conference. Wherever he was appointed and whatever work he was asked to do on boards and committees, he gave it his best. He loved the Church and his ambition was to win those under his leadership to a commitment to Christ and the Church. The people in the churches he served loved him and appreciated his leadership. It was a great joy for me to have him as a dear friend. Many people have been blessed by his life and good works. His home was a haven of peace and love, always open to his friends."

A memorial service of Celebration and Thanksgiving was held on Tuesday, December 11, in Centenary United Methodist Church in Smithfield, where so many years ago, Willis had dedicated his life to the Christian ministry.

The service was conducted by his pastor, the Reverend Hugh Cameron, the Reverend Paul Edwards of Goldsboro, and the Reverend Charles Michael Smith, District Superintendent of the Goldsboro District.

In the memorial sermon, Mr. Cameron shared these thoughts, "We gather today to do two things: to honor the memory of Willis R. Stevens and to thank God for his life. So many of us have been touched by his life and I find it somewhat ironical that I should be his pastor now. He was my pastor when I was a child. His oldest son, Willis Jr., and I joined the Church together. Willis started me on my Christian life walk and I'm here as he finishes his. I cannot add to his Christian witness by what I say. His life has so eloquently preached this sermon. Like Abraham, he went where he was called. Like Moses, he led people from doubts and fears to confidence to face difficulties. Like Jonathan, he met many a discouraged brother minister and cheered him by sharing God's strength. Like David, he sang the Church to victory. Like Daniel, he was true to his boyhood teachings learned here at Centenary. Like John the Baptist, he delighted to preach. Like Paul, he rejoiced that Jesus died for all, even you and me.

Willis was a consecrated Christian minister, husband, father, and grandfather. I do thank God for his life and the touch I received. Now we must carry on. We must proclaim the saving message of hope. We honor his memory and thank God for his life."

We, his loved ones, are most grateful for the host of friends, ministers and lay people alike who sent messages of consolation and shared in this memorial service. As someone said, "It was a beautiful and appropriate tribute to a man whose life touched so many and even in death continued his ministry by this uplifting service of Celebration and Thanksgiving.



A few years ago, the ministers of the NC Conference were requested to make a summary of their accomplishments during their years in the ministry. Willis finished his report with these words:

"For whatever accomplishments I may have achieved during my ministry, I give God the glory. I present my report unashamed. The people in my churches and in my Conference have been good to me. My Christ has been more than gracious in love, patience, understanding and a supply of spiritual resources."

We thank God that he touched our lives.

FREDERICK JOHN DUPLISSEY

1908 - 1985



Frederick John Duplissey died in his daughter's arms on January 4, 1985 after gathering firewood for their home in Kenly, NC. Due to ill health, Fred had retired in 1977 after 23 years of service in the North Carolina Conference.

He was born in Chesterfield, MA and orphaned at the age of four when his mother pinned his name to his coat, left him outside a grocery store and indicated that she would return shortly. However, she never returned and Fred was placed in an orphanage where he grew up and was later able to attend Andover-Newton College as well as Harvard Theological Seminary. Due to his experience as an orphan, Fred never left anyone alone. He gave his utmost attention and expressed concern to each and everyone; and he shared readily with all friends and strangers.

Called "Papa Dubinsky" by many who knew him so well, with a twinkle in his eye and a pointed finger he would say, "Son, you'd better believe it". This was one of Fred's favorite expressions when emphasizing a point. He got the nickname, "Papa Dubinsky", when he and his choir were guests in a brother minister's church. When introducing Fred, the brother minister could not remember the name, Duplissey, and he stated that he was glad to receive his good and long-standing friend, "Reverend Dubinsky". There was much laughter among the choir members but the name remained with Fred through the years as a sign of affection, admiration and love.

He was always a great spinner of good stories about his military career and of his experiences in the Navy chaplaincy. His daughter, Martha, said that he participated in five major beach landings where he led his "boys" and was one of the most decorated chaplains of World War II because of his heroism and fearlessness. Fred joined the North Carolina Conference following his retirement from the Navy chaplaincy with the rank of Commander. ALAN DE LEON GRAY

1908 - 1985



My brother, the Reverend Alan De Leon Gray was born in Brighton, Jefferson County, AL on August 1, 1908. He was the youngest of three children born to Alan Duffy Frank and Minnie Katherine Gray.

He received his early education in public and private schools of the Birmingham District. He graduated from Simpson High School in Birmingham in 1932; graduated from Birmingham - Southern College with a A. B. Degree in 1938; and Duke Divinity School in Durham, NC receiving his B. D. and M. Div. Degrees in 1941.

When Leon was 8 years old, he presented himself for membership in the Brighton Methodist Episcopal Church South. The Reverend William McDonald was afraid that he was too young to realize the seriousness of joining the church but he gave him some guidelines to study. In March of 1918, he seriously took the vows and became a member. In 1921, Leon felt the call to preach and the Reverend U. S. Pitts counseled with him for he was only 13 years old. Reverend Pitts recommended him for Exorters License to Preach and his first sermon was preached at Brighton Methodist Episcopal Church South in September, 1923. For many years he was active in the Epworth League, always attending the Annual Conference at Montavallo College.

While Leon attended Birmingham - Southern Collge as a ministerial student, he served Sixteenth Avenue Methodist Church, now Houston Memorial United Methodist Church in Bessemer, AL and Ernest Chapel Methodist, now Ernest United Methodist Church in Concord, AL.

While attending Duke Divinity School, Leon fell in love and married Miss Saralee Willis of Cartaret County, NC. She was the daughter of the late Walter Lee and Mary Ida Willis of Atlantic, NC.

Leon wrote his thesis on the Methodist Orphanage in Raleigh, NC, a subject very dear to him.

Leon joined the NC Conference in 1941. He was ordained Deacon on November 4, 1943 and ordained Elder on September 9, 1944. He served the Methodist Church of Jacksonville, NC from 1941-45. From November 1945 until December 1946, he served as pastor of the Snow Hill Methodist Church.

During his tenure at Jacksonville, NC he temporarily served as Superintendent of Onslow County Hospital, after the superintendent resigned and until a new one could be found. While there he was Chairman of Infantile Paralysis Foundation, Chairman of March of Dimes and Trustee of Crippled Children's Society of Onslow County, NC.

In November, 1946, the Board of Directors of the Oxford Orphanage elected Leon as Superintendent of that Institution. Having been left an orphan at the age of 6 when his father passed away, it was his life ambition to work with orphanage children.

Upon Leon's retirement from the Orphanage, I quote from his retirement address:

"Somewhere in living I discovered an axiom: A man is lucky who has a wife who loves him, a friend who trusts him, children who admire him, a God

who guides him, and a job so large that he must depend upon all three. Herein abides my career as Superintendent of Oxford Orphanage.

It has been a long life, but never a dull one. Years and days filled with growth and development in the heart of North Carolina. A mystical union of many facets of life, bound together by unique spiritual ties. Herein are involved children of many ages who live, or have lived "under the oaks", along with thousands of members of our large Masonic family where abideth beauty beyond compare.

There is a great trauma involved in laying down my working tools. I know that I have trod three giant steps that were allotted me. I may wish to remain because the job is not complete, but it cannot be complete, so long as there is a child in need and a heart pure enough to meet the need. So now I stand aside to be absorbed in reflections, memories of beauty shared tender as a budding flower, yet as glorious as the rising sun and as majestic as the setting of the same."

As Superintendent of Oxford Orphanage, Leon served as President of NC Child Care Association, SE Child Care Association and Masonic Home Executives Association of the United States of America.

After retirement from the Orphanage in August 1973, Leon and Saralee moved to Beaufort, NC, the childhood home of Saralee's, to enjoy the sunset years.

Again they answered a call from their Lord and Master to serve Cedar Island Methodist Church for three years. There they enjoyed the love and fellowship of those with whom they became acquainted. Then they were forced to retire again because of failing health.

Leon was a gentle, deeply religious man. He was devoted to the more than 15,000 children who it was his privilege to nurture and guide. He was devoted to his wife of 43 years. And his loyalty to his fellowman was surpassed only by his worship for the God he served.

He answered the last call from his Lord and Master on January 5, 1985. His funeral was from the St. Paul Episcopal Church with the Reverend George Muir, Rector; the Reverend Wilbur C. Teachey, pastor of Ann Street United Methodist Church; and the Reverend Robert L. Nicks officiating. His last resting place is in the adjoining cemetery.

Leon is survived by his beloved wife, Saralee Gray, two foster daughters, one sister, Mrs. Florence Gray Sims, one niece and one nephew. A host of friends will miss his cheerful greeting and friendly smile, his never forgetting to say "thank you!" for any courtesy shown him.

So he, too, would let his light shine as the stars.

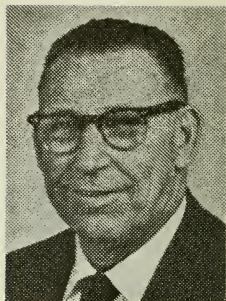

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JOHN DANIEL LONG

1910 - 1985



John Daniel Long was born in Orange County on February 15, 1910, the eldest of five children born to Thomas A. and Luna Dodson Long. He lost his father at the tender age of ten. As a young boy he learned to plow the fields and work at any task to help his mother provide for the family. As a young man he felt the call to the ministry, but failed to heed the call until years later. John was well known around Chapel Hill and Hillsborough for his work as a carpenter and was successful in various occupations, but never found true satisfaction. Always there was that feeling deep within - the call to preach.

God spoke to John in many ways, and finally the conviction to preach the gospel became so strong, he went to talk and pray with a Christian friend. "How can I, with little education and limited funds ever become a Methodist minister?" John asked his friend. The friend replied, "With God, all things are possible". So in the fall of 1952, at the age of 42, he laid aside his carpenter's tools and entered Louisburg College. It was difficult for him to attain the high grades and goals he set for himself. But with the help of many friends and the support of his family, he made it. Ever in his mind were the words of his friend, "With God, all things are possible". He attended Louisburg College two years and then transferred to Atlantic Christian College in Wilson. John's first appointment was in 1953 to West Halifax, then Wesley Memorial and Milwaukee. In 1963, he transferred to the Virginia Conference and served South Franklin charge and attended school in Virginia. John returned to the NC Conference in 1967 and served Woodington-Webb, Belhaven, Trinity and the Kinston Circuit.

Following retirement in 1980, he and his wife, Elizabeth, moved to the home he had built for them in Lenoir County. He continued his ministry at Richlands Circuit as a retired supply until he suffered a stroke in October of 1983.

Later, doctors diagnosed John as having Alzheimer's disease. Although the disease took its toll, he never complained or lost his desire to preach. He suffered multiple strokes in February, 1985 and was in Lenoir Memorial Hospital when he entered life immortal on March 14, 1985.

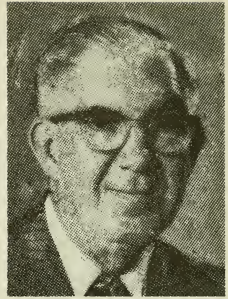

1912 - 1985

Francis George Bryans was born in Buffalo, NY on May 30, 1912. He was the son of Frederick and Anne Tisdall Bryans and was the oldest of four children. Fran was married to Anna Dorigi on May 29, 1937 in Buffalo. His wife preceded him in death as did his brother William. He was survived by his children, Anna Bryans Williams of Salt Lake City, UT and Donald George Bryans of Kinston, NC; a brother, Reverend Frederick Bryans of Hillsdale, MI; a sister, Mildred Campbell Parks of Ashland, OH; and four grandchildren, Kimberly and Dina Williams of Salt Lake City, and Donald and Chad Bryans of Kinston.

Fran was employed by the DuPont Company for over 35 years, first working at the plant in Buffalo, NY and later in Kinston, NC.

Fran had been raised in the Disciples of Christ tradition and until his transfer to North Carolina was a member of Forest Avenue Church of Christ in Buffalo. As a youth, he was involved in Christian Endeavor, the church choir and men's organizations of the church. He was also a member of Occidental Lodge F&AM of NY where he later was presented with a lifetime membership. Fran became 32nd degree Mason and was a member of the Consistory of Buffalo.

Long feeling the call to respond to God's love, Fran related to his family a very moving experience in his life when he was in his early forties. He had been diagnosed as having cancer and was recommended as a candidate for radical surgery. This surgery left him with a temporary paralysis of his face and tongue rendering speech as impossible. While a patient at Buffalo General Hospital, his roommate was a Presbyterian minister, confined to a wheelchair because of crippling arthritis. Seeing Fran become more depressed because of his condition this minister encouraged him to be his legs and he would be Fran's voice. The two became a team visiting patients in the hospital. Through the long lonely days of recovery this team supported each other as they reached out to many persons. This very special ministry helped Fran realize that he had much work to do in life and it later gave him the encouragement to pursue an active part in the Methodist Church in Eastern North Carolina.

He first served as a lay preacher and traveled with his wife to many rural churches filling in during the absence of a minister. He attended Pastor's School at Duke University and in June of 1976 was ordained deacon at the Annual conference. Fran served as pastor of Bethany United Methodist Church and Webbs Chapel United Methodist Church in the Kinston area.

After a long battle with cancer Fran died on May 4, 1985. A service of Thanksgiving and Memory was held on May 7, 1985 at Webbs Chapel United Methodist Church with the following friends conducting: Reverend Rick Commander, Reverend Don Lee and Reverend Jere Rouse. He was laid to rest at Westview Cemetery next to his wife, Anna.

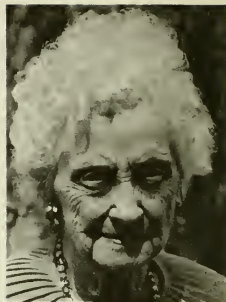

Owen Fitzgerald, Jr., on March 12, 1985 at First United Methodist Church of Graham. Burial in Graham Memorial Park followed the service. Bishop Minnick captured the essence of Mildred's life when he said: "Mildred did some beautiful things for God in this world and some beautiful things for God's children in so many places in this Annual Conference and far beyond." Because of her experience of God's love in her own life, Mildred had a great love for things of beauty - sunsets and flowers and butterflies and seashores - and for the things that make for beauty of the soul. That love of beauty flowed through her life into the lives of others, drawing forth the good and the beautiful in us. Thanks be to God for the gift of her life among us!

PHALA HAWKINS LOVE

1889 - 1985



Phala Hawkins Love was born December 29, 1889 in Independence, MO and died March 18, 1985 in the Coble Health Center of the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, NC. In that long span of ninety-five years she blessed many lives with her radiant Christian spirit, her excellent teaching abilities and her fine musical talents.

Daughter of a Methodist minister, she grew up in a number of cities in Missouri and lived for several years in Roanoke, VA and Baltimore, MD. Following graduation from public schools in St. Louis, MO, she attended the St. Louis Conservatory of Music from which she was awarded degrees in voice and piano.

While working for the Board of Education of the former Methodist Episcopal Church South in Nashville, TN, she met and married Dr. Franklin Swindell Love who at that time was president of Louisburg College. Following the Louisburg College appointment, they served pastorates at First Church in Wilson, First Church in Elizabeth City, Edenton Street Church in Raleigh, Grace Church in Wilmington, and Front Street Church in Burlington. Other appointments included district superintendent of the Raleigh, Elizabeth City and Durham Districts.

In 1944, Dr. Love became superintendent of the Lake Junaluska Assembly, serving in that capacity until 1950. During these years Mrs. Love worked in the Assembly office and opened her home to delegates and distinguished visitors to all major conferences and schools.

Whether it was on the college campus, the Lake Junaluska Methodist summer headquarters, the district parsonage or the local church, Phala Love was always the gracious hostess, the talented leader and the courageous Christian in upholding the high moral, ethical and spiritual standards of her church. She was a valuable helpmate, a strong leader in her own right; always seeking to make the church a vital and effective witness in the community and in the world. Her husband was one of the ablest and most dedicated leaders in North Carolina. His encouragement and support of young ministers - including this writer - provided courage and strength to many who were struggling to apply the Gospel to the glaring social ills of the day. Mrs. Love had a way of getting to the heart of issues with clarity and insight and was quick to discern sham and hypocrisy, whether it came from the pulpit or the pew.

For a number of years, Mrs. Love taught the prestigious and influential Betsy Peele Women's Class at Edenton Street Church in Raleigh. She was a leader in the Women's Missionary Society, later United Methodist Women. She conducted many mission study programs, organized units and served as a District and Conference officer. She used her musical talents generously in the service of the church.

When, in 1960, the couple moved to the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, she served as organist and pianist, organized and directed the choir, helped organize monthly birthday parties and other special events. She prepared and printed newsletters that went to members of the Home and for a number of years represented the members on the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Retirement Home.

Before coming to the Methodist Retirement Home, and after formal retirement, Dr. and Mrs. Love served the Macon charge in Warren County, a fitting climax to a long and fruitful ministry in Christ's church.

Mrs. Love is survived by a son, Frank S. Love, Jr., of Nashville, TN

and by two step-daughters, Mrs. John O. Evans and Mrs. William L. Belvin of Raleigh. She is also survived by five grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

A memorial service was held on March 22 in St. John's Chapel of the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham conducted by the Reverend Kermit Braswell, Dr. Kimsey King, Jr., and the Reverend Thompson Murray, intern chaplain at the Home. Burial was at Hillside Cemetery in Laurinburg, NC, beside her husband.

It is fitting that this dedicated servant of Christ, who was born and reared in a Methodist parsonage, who spent her active years in Methodist parsonages, should spend her last twenty-five years on earth in a caring Methodist Home surrounded and supported by caring and loving hands.

## CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES PROGRAM AND POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

### PROGRAM AND BUDGET TIMELINES

From the DISCIPLINE, 1984:

"All Annual Conference agencies shall submit the elements of program which are to be promoted in, supported by, or implemented by the local churches of the conference to the council for consideration, coordinating, and calendaring prior to presentation to the local churches. The council may request district or Annual Conference agencies to implement a program for the entire conference."

"The council staff shall be responsible, in cooperation with the district superintendents, for the implementation of the conference program." (Par. 726.9b and c)

August 1, 1985.....All dates to be included in the official Conference

Calendar in 1986 are to be in the Conference Council on Ministries Director's office.

- November 1, 1985.....Any supplementary Budget Requests are to be in the Conference Council on Ministries Director's office.
- November 11, 1985.....Conference Council on Ministries Budget Committee Meeting to consider any request for adjustments in 1985 or 1986 budgets.
- November 19, 1985.....Conference Council on Ministries meeting.
- January 6, 1986.....All Proposed Budgets for 1988 and Program Recommendations for 1987 are due.
- January 21, 1986.....Conference Council on Ministries Budget Committee meeting.
- January 23, 1986.....Conference Council on Ministries Program Coordinating Committee meeting.
- February 11, 1986.....Conference Council on Ministries meeting (Budget Requests for 1988 and Program Recommendations for 1987 will be considered.)
- March 14, 1986.....Deadline for all reports to be submitted for THE 1986 BOOK OF RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS

## 1985 SUPPLEMENTAL PROGRAM RECOMMENDATIONS

### A. FROM THE CCOM STAFF

1. That bi-district confirmation-discipling-membership training workshops for pastors be held in the fall on one of the following Mondays: September 23, October 7, 14, 21, 28, November 11, 18, or 25. To be implemented by the CCOM Staff.

### B. FROM THE BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

1. That a Spiritual Life Retreat be held for the Diaconal Ministers of the North Carolina Conference. To be implemented by the Board of Diaconal Ministry.

### C. FROM THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

1. That a study be done which will:
  - \*Gather data about the needs of persons in the North Carolina Conference with mental retardation;
  - \*Gather data on the plans for residential alternatives being developed by the State of North Carolina and/or private non-profit groups such as the Association for Retarded Citizens;
  - \*Develop a needs assessment instrument for use with United Methodist families with mentally retarded members;For the purpose of making a recommendation to the Annual Conference in regards to possible ministries to and with mentally retarded persons and their families.
2. That district meetings be held at which time families with mentally retarded members would share their needs. The schedule of the meetings is:
  - August 25.....Durham, Goldsboro, Rockingham, Rocky Mount
  - August 26.....Fayetteville, Greenville, Sanford, Wilmington
  - August 27.....Burlington, Elizabeth City, New Bern, Raleigh

### D. FROM THE BOARD OF THE LAITY

1. That each local church name a coordinator of the United Methodist Men if there is no elected president. It is recommended that the Committee on Nominations and Personnel name someone to this position other than the Lay Leader, with preference given to a Certified Lay Speaker. The coordinator of United Methodist Men is to serve on the Administrative Council or the Administrative Board and the Council on Ministries.

### E. FROM THE MISSIONAL PRIORITY COORDINATING COMMITTEE

1. That the North Carolina Conference make a survey of each ethnic church, including the percentage of the total budget spent for operational expenses, to determine needs in the congregation and community in the following areas: day care centers, thrift shops, educational programs, Scouts, community service programs, improvement of facilities and other areas that are pertinent to the on-going mission and ministry of the church. To be implemented by the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee in cooperation with the Cabinet, district Congregational Development teams and local church trustees.
2. That the need be determined and plans developed for establishing new

- ethnic churches in the Conference. To be implemented by the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee.
3. That scholarship funds be made available to assist at least two ethnic persons to participate in each of the Conference mission work teams in 1985, for a maximum of 12 scholarships. To be implemented by the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee.
  4. That 1986 be designated "The Year of the American Indian" in the Conference and that we begin planning for implementation in 1985. (The State of North Carolina will continue the 400th anniversary celebration and has designated 1986 "The Year of the American Indian.") That a program on this topic be considered for the 1986 session of Annual Conference.

## 1986 PROGRAM RECOMMENDATIONS FOR LOCAL CHURCH CONSIDERATION

- A. SPECIAL DAYS TO BE OBSERVED BY EACH LOCAL CHURCH BY DIRECTION OF GENERAL CONFERENCE
  1. The following are to be observed with special offering:

    - May 18.....World Order Sunday
    - October 5.....World Communion Sunday
    - December 28.....United Methodist Student Day
  2. The following are to be observed without special offering:
    - April 27.....Heritage Sunday
    - May 4.....Golden Cross Sunday
    - October 12.....Laity Sunday
- B. FROM THE COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY
  1. That each local church consider locating, identifying and cataloging all historical materials.
  2. That each local church consider supporting the restoration of Lovely Lane UMC with a special offering.
  3. That each local church consider establishing a local church archives.
  4. That each local church consider collecting oral history from its elderly members.
  5. That each local church historian consider keeping a journal and scrapbook of church events.
  6. That each local church consider arranging visits to our Conference historical shrines and landmarks. Assistance will be provided by the District Representative on the Commission on Archives and History.
- C. FROM THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS
  1. That each local church consider becoming involved in at least one ecumenical project.
  2. That each local church consider participating in ecumenical projects such as studies of the Common Lectionary, and CROP walks.
  3. That each local church consider joining in ministry with Pan-Methodist congregations, using lists of congregations provided by the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns.
- D. FROM THE BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY
  1. That each local church consider surveying and reporting to the Board of Church and Society and the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries its findings in regards to accessibility (to real property and facilities) to persons with handicapping conditions.
  2. That each local church consider providing a storage place for clothes and food, in cooperation with other churches and community agencies, to be used for emergencies and the care of migrants and other needy persons.
- E. FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION
  1. That each local church consider holding regularly scheduled intergenerational events involving all family members.
  2. That each local church consider providing classes on biblical studies at times convenient to older adults.
  3. That each local church consider holding a FETCH (Find, Encourage, Telephone, Cultivate, High Attendance Sunday), or comparable Sunday School enrollment and attendance campaign.
  4. That each local church consider having a choir exchange with other churches in the district, giving particular consideration to the



F. FROM THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

1. That each local church or charge consider holding a one-day "Spiritual Life Retreat" (an intensive time of personal and corporate reflection on "What it means to live for Jesus Christ in today's world"), preferably at the beginning of Lent for members of the church.
2. That each local church consider holding a series of services (revival, Lay Witness Mission, preaching mission, Festival of Faith, Discipleship Weekend), preferably during Lent, to heighten commitment and discipleship among the members.
3. That each local church consider observing "Evangelism Sunday" (or Sundays), including an "Each One Bring One" type program to fill the church pews.
4. That each local church consider promoting Bible Studies and other small group studies to strengthen the spiritual life of participants and to challenge each to a personal ministry of sharing his or her faith with others.

G. FROM THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

1. That each local church consider emphasizing the Methodist Home for Children on Thanksgiving Sunday, November 23.
2. That each local church consider emphasizing the Methodist Retirement Homes on Mother's Day, May 11, and at other times invite speakers from the Methodist Retirement Homes.

H. FROM THE BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

1. That each local church, in cooperation with campus ministers, consider entertaining students who cannot be home at Christmas.
2. That each local church consider informing the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry about scholarships available through that church.
3. That each local church consider supporting the recruitment of students for Louisburg, Methodist and North Carolina Wesleyan Colleges by inviting representatives from the three colleges to speak to UMYF groups and at services of corporate worship by inviting choirs from the colleges for concerts; by encouraging high school students to consider attending one of the three colleges; and/or by establishing scholarships at each of the colleges.
4. That each local church consider supporting the Blackburn and Cannon Scholarships.

I. FROM THE BOARD OF THE LAITY

1. That each local church consider selecting a Lay Person of the Year and recognizing the recipient on Laity Sunday, October 12, and submitting this person's name to the District Committee of the Laity.
2. That each local church consider encouraging its members to participate in the certified Lay Speaker program.

J. FROM THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION

1. That each local church consider accepting as a minimum goal of "Advocate" subscriptions 10% of its membership. For example, a church with 500 members would have a goal of a minimum of 50 families and/or individuals subscribing to the "Advocate".
2. That each local church consider nominating to the Charge Conference a person to be the "Advocate" representative, and that this person be a member of the Administrative Board or Administrative Council of the church.

K. FROM THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

1. That each local church consider scheduling the three church-wide studies, and including children and youth in the study "Caring For God's Earth".
2. That each local church consider scheduling a mission minute during the worship service at least once per month, using materials provided by the Board of Missions.
3. That each local church consider highlighting current mission concerns, projects, or themes through the use of a mission bulletin board placed in a strategic place in the church.
4. That each local church consider scheduling a mission speaker for a worship service or some other church-wide event.
5. That each local church consider supporting an Advance Special

project in the area of the current church-wide studies and/or in the area represented by mission interpreters who speak in the church during the year.

L. FROM THE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

1. That each local church consider observing "Women in the Pulpit Sunday", that churches with memberships of 300 or less consider having a woman, lay or clergy, in the pulpit on April 27, or another appropriate date, and churches with over 300 members consider having a clergy woman in the pulpit one Sunday during the year.
2. That each local church consider having a study based on the General Conference document "Words that Hurt, Words that Heal", using the document and leader's guide.

M. FROM THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

1. That each local church organized using the Administrative Council Plan consider electing a Stewardship chairperson and a full committee in order to plan for and work at deepening the Christian commitment of the church membership.
2. That each local church consider using the program "Children Count for Christ" to help children appreciate and understand why the church needs their support.
3. That each local church consider holding a church-wide study on "Discovering A Christian Lifestyle" by D. George Vanderlip as a way of stressing the importance of personal values and their impact on lifestyles.
4. That each local church consider emphasizing the biblical and spiritual nature of stewardship during April, May and June.
5. That each local church consider having a "Day of Stewardship" event using resources provided by the Board of Stewardship.
6. That each local church consider having an estate planning program that will educate and encourage members in the stewardship of possessions.

## 1986 PROGRAM RECOMMENDATIONS DIRECTED TO THE DISTRICT

A. FROM THE COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

1. That each District Council on Ministries consider locating, identifying and cataloging all historical materials and artifacts.
2. That the host district for Annual Conference use local church banners for display purposes.

B. FROM THE BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

1. That each District Council on Ministries in districts with migrant workers consider developing recreational programs for migrants and Spanish language lessons for the farmers who employ migrants (i.e., Granville County model).

C. FROM THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

1. That each District Council on Ministries consider scheduling a workshop in late February on "Living in a World of Religious Pluralism", for local church chairpersons of Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. To be implemented by the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns at the request of the District Council on Ministries.

D. FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

1. That each District Council on Ministries consider holding a district or tri-district symposium on ministry to and with older adults.
2. That each District Council on Ministries consider utilizing Cokesbury Educational Services, Nashville, TN, to conduct a district Sunday School Growth and Renewal Workshop.
3. That each District Council on Ministries consider holding a workshop for workers with children, youth and adult choirs and/or a music festival for children, youth, and adult choirs in late winter or early spring.
4. That each District Council on Ministries consider compiling and distributing to churches a list of substitute organists and pianists.

E. FROM THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

1. That each District Council on Ministries consider holding a two to three hour Visitation Evangelism Workshop.

2. That each District Council on Ministries consider conducting an "Institute on Evangelism" which will focus on the need for evangelistic outreach within the district.
3. That each District Council on Ministries consider holding a "Pastor's Day Apart" to focus on the personal commitment of each minister to Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

#### F. FROM THE BOARD OF LAITY

1. That each District Committee of the Laity, composed of the District Lay Leader as Chairperson, the presidents of United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, United Methodist Youth Fellowship, and at-large members representing young adults and minorities, consider planning the District Lay Rally, orientation for the Lay Members of Annual Conference, Lay Speaker training, spiritual life retreats, and other lay events.
2. That each District Council on Ministries consider having a Lay Rally, preferably in February.
3. That each District Committee of the Laity consider selecting a Lay Person of the Year and recognizing the recipient at the District Lay Rally.

#### G. FROM THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

1. That each District Council on Ministries consider scheduling a training event on the church-wide mission studies (Native Peoples of North America, Daniel, Caring For God's Earth), including classes for leaders of children and youth, and that study materials be available for purchase and that mission interpreters related to the studies be present if possible.
2. That each District Council on Ministries consider scheduling mission studies on district, sub-district, or cluster-group levels for churches not holding their own studies.
3. That each District Council on Ministries consider having a mission interpreter to itinerate in the district annually.
4. That each District Council on Ministries consider scheduling a Board of Global Ministries staff-pastor dialogue, mission saturation event, or some other district-wide mission interpretation event.

#### H. FROM THE COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

1. That each District Council on Ministries consider making a demographic survey of the counties within the district for the purpose of discovering unchurched ethnic minority persons.
2. That each District Council on Ministries strongly consider naming an ethnic minority person to serve on the DCOM with voting rights; and that in the case of there being no such person available, an ethnic minority person from another district may be so named.

#### I. FROM THE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

1. That each District Council on Ministries consider providing child care at district lay rallies, conferences, January Workshops and other district events as selected by the District Council on Ministries.

#### J. FROM THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

1. That each District Council on Ministries consider having an Interpretation Rally in late summer with an emphasis on local church funding, resourcing, training, and expenditure of funds.
2. That each District Council on Ministries consider having a "Day of Discipleship" training event for pastors and local church Stewardship and Evangelism leaders in estate planning and planned giving and local church discipleship using materials provided by the Conference Board of Stewardship and the Office of Planned Giving.

8. That a research project on the Sunday School movement in the Conference after 1870 be carried out. To be implemented by the Commission on Archives and History.
9. That research be done on the Native American churches in the Conference. To be implemented by the Commission on Archives and History.
10. That a video cassette be produced on all Conference historic churches, sites and landmarks along with taped descriptions. To be implemented by the Commission on Archives and History and the Committee on Communications.
11. That consideration be given to microfilming historical records and documents and to the purchase of microfilm readers for the Methodist Building, the Archives Center, and our colleges where needed. To be implemented by the Commission on Archives and History and the Conference Trustees.

E. FROM THE BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

1. That a Spiritual Life Retreat and Interpretational Event be held for the Diaconal Ministers of the North Carolina Conference. To be implemented by the Board of Diaconal Ministry.

F. FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

1. That a "Children's Ministries Notebook" be compiled and made available in the fall to churches through TLC (Teaching, Learning, Caring) team members and the district coordinators of Children's Ministries. To be implemented by the Conference Council on Children's Ministries.
2. That persons from across the Conference be recruited for a March TLC (Teaching, Learning, Caring) training event to be held at a Conference camp. To be implemented by the Conference Council on Children's Ministries.
3. That a Conference-wide event for pastors in counseling young adults who are recently married, or contemplating marriage or remarriage, be held in April at one of the Conference colleges and granting CEU credit. To be implemented by the Board of Education after consultation with the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Committee on Pastoral Care.
4. That a laboratory on Young Adult Ministries be held in March. To be

implemented by the Conference Council on Young Adult Ministries in cooperation with the Board of Education.

- 4) United Methodist Camps - The North Carolina Conference has excellent camping programs at (a) Camp Don-Lee, near Arapahoe, (b) Camp Rockfish, near Fayetteville, (c) Camp

Chestnut Ridge, near Efland and (d) Camp Kerr Lake. These funds help with scholarships and with meeting other needs of the camping program.

- 5) District Mission Societies - These may be organized within a District to meet needs in the areas of church extension and missionary needs within the District.

  - 7) District Christmas Offering - This fund is supervised by the District Superintendent.
  - 8) Isa Grant Scholarship Fund - To provide volunteer work team scholarships for persons who could not otherwise participate in a work team experience.
  - 9) NC Food Bank - An ecumenical hunger project. Receives and distributes food that is surplus or cannot be sold. Raleigh.
  - 10) The General Scholarship Fund at Louisburg College, Methodist College and NC Wesleyan College.
  - 11) Learning Together, Inc. - Based in Raleigh, this program provides services for handicapped children, provides workshops and consultations, works with foster children, provides workshops and consultations, works with foster parents and in the rehabilitation of parents who have abused their children or who are at risk in this area.
  - 12) Preservation of Historical Sites - To preserve old historical churches which have been closed.

3. Professional counselors and therapists having one or more of these

- a. Pastoral counselors who are members, fellows, or diplomats of the American Association of Pastoral Counselors, Inc.
- b. Clinical members of the American Association of Marriage and Family Therapists
- c. Certified marriage and family therapists
- d. Psychiatrists with AMA Board certification and state licensure
- e. Clinical psychologists with North Carolina licensure

This professional assistance is available through referral or on volunteer basis with a portion of the cost to be assumed by the Committee on Pastoral Care. The committee will assume a total of \$300.00 per family, per calendar year, which will include up to \$40.00 for the first visit and up to \$25.00 for testing. The remainder of the amount from the \$300.00 limit is to be used to pay one-half of the cost of each additional visit until the appropriate limit is reached. The names of those receiving this help will be anonymous with the submitted bills stating that "a minister" (and/or his/her family) have been to the agency or the individual counselor.

Clergy and their families receiving help from professional counselors or therapists not specified in numbers 1 & 2 should request them to apply to the Committee on Pastoral Care for approval to bill the committee for services rendered. Approval will be given when the proper certification is established. Billing forms then will be provided. Bills are submitted to the Committee on Pastoral Care, Post Office Box 10955, Raleigh, North Carolina 27605.

E. FROM THE COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

1. That we continue the practice of sending visitation teams to our conference agencies and institutions to examine practices related to our Affirmative Action Plan, the inclusion of ethnic minority persons. To be implemented by the Commission on Religion and Race.

F. FROM THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION

1. That the "Advocate" continue to offer special subscription rates to churches in which every resident family subscribes to the "Advocate" and to churches in which every family on the Administrative Board subscribes to the "Advocate", the former to be known as All-Family Plan churches and the latter as All-Administrative Board Plan churches. In small-membership churches in which the functions of the Council on Ministries have been combined with those of the Administrative Board to form an Administrative Council, the rates shall be the same as those for All-Administrative Board Plan churches. In All-Administrative Board Plan churches (including those with Administrative Councils), all other subscriptions may be entered at the special All-Administrative Board Plan rate.

## CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES REPORTS

### COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

#### ORGANIZATION OF COMMISSION

The Commission on Archives and History met in Goldsboro on June 21, 1984 to organize for the quadrennium. The following officers were elected: Chairperson, The Reverend Lawrence E. Lugar; Vice-Chairperson, The Reverend Cliff Shoat; and Secretary, the Reverend Jan Fogleman.

#### PLANNING SESSION

The commission met at Methodist College, Fayetteville, North Carolina, August 17-18, 1984 to make some long-range plans. It was a very productive meeting. Three major committees were organized for the quadrennium.

1. The Committee on Historical Records: It will be the responsibility of this committee to put on computer, biographical information of every minister who has served in the North Carolina Conference. In the future it will be possible to trace the ministry and appointments of each individual minister. Mrs. Vivian Mitchell has been, and will continue to be, a great asset to this committee, since she has secured much of the data. The Reverend Jack Benfield is chairing this committee.

2. The Committee on Cataloging: It will be the responsibility of this committee to catalog and set up a filing system for all the material we have in our archives room in the Methodist Building. The Reverend Cliff Shoat is chairing this committee.

3. The Heritage Center Committee: It will be the responsibility of this committee to find and establish a permanent home for our archives. The Reverend Charles Mewborn chairs this committee.

#### DEATH CLAIMS TWO FAITHFUL MEMBERS

Mr. Leroy Mintz, representative from the Wilmington District, and the Reverend James McCallum, Cabinet representative and author. We shall miss greatly these two outstanding men. They served faithfully and well. May their names be recorded in the history of this conference.

#### JURISDICTIONAL MEETING

Eight of our members attended the SEJ Historical Society meeting at Lake Junaluska, July 13-16.

#### ERNEST R. PORTER ON SEJ COMMISSION

The Reverend Dr. Ernest R. Porter, program director for the NC Conference and staff representative on our commission, has been elected vice-chairperson of the SEJ Commission on Archives and History. He will be a great asset to the commission.

#### MEETINGS HELD

The commission held meetings at Queen's Creek, Hubert Charge and St. James in Tarboro in 1984.

#### STEVEN A. HICKLE

### COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

In 1984, the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns completed eight years under the effective leadership of Ralph L. Fleming. Beginning the work of a new quadrennium, the Commission expresses gratitude for that solid foundation and caring spirit.

#### NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The North Carolina Conference continues to be one of the chief supporting judicatories for the North Carolina Council of Churches. In 1984, we contributed \$11,000 for the work of the Council. Our Conference

representatives to the North Carolina Council of Churches House of Delegates have been part of the Commission, also.

Legislative concerns of the Council have focused in five areas: Ecology in North Carolina, Migrant Farmworkers, Housing in North Carolina, Alternatives to Prison, and an Expanded Public Defender System. The Council continues to explore possibilities for joint television programming.

#### COMMISSION ORGANIZATION

When the Commission had its planning meeting at Methodist College in August, 1984, it set up its work in four sub-committees. The Sub-committee on Interreligious Concerns will deal with our relationships with non-Christian faith communities, an increasingly important dimension in a religiously pluralistic society. The Sub-committee on Coalitional Unity will handle issues related to how United Methodists can be a part of ecumenical service projects, CROP Walks being a familiar example. The Sub-committee on Pan-Methodism will seek to continue the interests generated during the bicentennial year, how life can be shared with others in the Wesleyan family. The Sub-committee on Traditional Issues will help in interpreting and participating in the National Council of Churches, the World Council of Churches, the Consultation on Church Union, some of the broader relationships of ecumenism.

#### PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITY

The Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns has made available resources to help local churches in their observance of the World Day of Prayer, the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, and the Consultation on Church Union Sunday. "The North Carolina Christian Advocate" and the coordinated mailing have been used to interpret the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund. In 1984, congregations in our Conference paid \$13,712 for the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund.

#### NATIONAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

In an effort to have informed and equipped persons in each district, the Commission sent each district representative on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns a copy of the 1984 Report of Counciliar Review Committee of the Council of Bishops. This report, first shared with the 1984 General Conference, offered support for the National Council of Churches. The General Conference re-affirmed United Methodism's commitment to the National Council of Churches. The Council of Bishops has established procedures for more intentional involvement in the decisionmaking of the Council of Churches.

#### BAPTISM, EUCHARIST, AND MINISTRY

Three churches in our Conference were asked to conduct studies of "Baptism, Eucharist, and Ministry", the document prepared by the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches. The resource states places of possible theological and pastoral agreement in sacramental understanding and practice and in ministerial orders. Harker's Island United Methodist Church in Harker's Island, Jonesboro Heights United Methodist Church in Sanford, and Trinity United Methodist Church in Durham began responses which will become part of our United Methodist reaction to the document.

The Commission heard first-hand reports from Collins Kilburn on the world Council of Churches meeting in Vancouver, British Columbia...The Media Center videotaped the public television series on Judaism... Preparations are underway to observe the 50th anniversary of the North Carolina Council of Churches in 1985.

## BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

"Without change and without risk, I doubt that we can witness with any real power." These words come from the State of the Church at the 1979 North Carolina Annual Conference. They seem as cogent today as then.

Our church has set a goal for enormous membership growth in the years immediately ahead. This "witness with real power" will require more than some special programs, seminars, and training designed by those designated to lead us in evangelism. It requires of us a commitment to demonstrate in every facet of our individual and corporate lives that we are a people who care. We are a people who care about each individual; about each social group; about our neighborhoods, our cities, our counties, our states, our nation, and yes, about every nation, if we truly believe the words of the old hymn, "This is My Father's World". Whenever the Methodist Church has experienced large growth, those were also the times that our social witness was clear.

Our task, then, is to expect and assist change, and then, to risk as required. So let us remember that our Christian heritage began with One who risked ALL. The only questions then are: What changes are being called for? What risk is necessary? This board seeks to assist local churches, and the conference in raising these questions appropriately.

The Peace with Justice national program was reaffirmed by the 1984 General Conference and calls for the church to work for a faithful, disarmed, just and secure world. The three goals are these:

To be obedient to Christ's call to peace and justice.

To work for a peace that promises freedom from racial discrimination and the right to human dignity.

To involve members at the United Methodist Church to growing movements for disarmament, peace in Central America, economic justice and civil rights.

This then calls the whole church and every member to prayer, study and action for peace with justice.

To that end, our board has begun a process this year to locate where special efforts for justice are being called for by our times and the guidance of God. We would be looking for opportunities to assist a local church, a cluster of local churches, or a district in making a response to an ongoing need for justice ministry in a clearly defined area in society. We would be looking for opportunities to assist those in specific local situations in developing and executing a plan of ministry that would be an appropriate ministry and which would serve as a model for other local churches.

At the same time, we are planning opportunities to expand our own awareness of society's needs by planning experiences such as the UN Study Tours. In addition, we present for your consideration, resolutions in two arenas that our study and prayerful consideration has led us to understand are timely and significant. We also present a position paper and ask your endorsement of these three papers.

The 15 courses to be offered are: Daniel, Caring for God's Earth, Native Peoples of North America, Evangelism in the Church School...Teaching Adults, Evangelism in the Church School...Teaching Youth, Evangelism in the Church School...Teaching Children, Words that Hurt...Words that Heal, Ministry of God's People, Living with World Neighbors of Other Faiths, Make a Joyful Noise unto the Lord, The Church and Technology, Spiritual Power in Your Church, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women...Getting and Keeping Members, and Nurturing for Peace and Justice. Three of these will be offered during the week session as 10 hour courses giving 1 CEU credit. Childcare will be available.

Registration fees will stay the same as last year, \$30.00 for the weekend, \$45.00 for the week. There will a \$10.00 charge for those taking courses giving CEU credit, and the clergy will be eligible for Continuing Education grants. Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., will preach once during the weekend session, and preach once and hold an informal rap session during the week session.

## BOARD OF EDUCATION

### NEW EMPHASIS GIVEN TO THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

"The Sunday School is a group of people who meet together weekly, organized as they need to be organized, with officers and teachers who work with those who are available." The Sunday School, vitally important to the life of the church, has four traditional functions:

1. Outreach - According to the Great Commission, Matthew 28:16-20, making disciples is the charge given us. We are to do this by baptizing and teaching. The Assemblies of God, one of the fastest growing religious bodies in our nation, reports that 90% of that growth comes through the Sunday School. The Southern Baptist Church receives 80% of its new members through the Sunday School. For us, 60% of all new members come through the Sunday School. If we are to grow we must work at the evangelistic task of reaching out and enrolling more children, youth and adults in our classes. We strongly recommend the conference FETCH campaign and its dual emphases on enrollment and attendance.

2. Nurture - Sunday School is the place where we keep up with people. In the midst of a high tech society that is growing increasingly impersonal, Sunday School is called to be a place of high touch.

3. Teaching - Sunday School is a school. In The United Methodist Church 4 1/2 million students are present each week. That's a lot of children, youth and adults learning to be disciples.

4. Developing Leaders - For many of us Sunday school was where we first stood up and became a leader. Yes, Sunday School is very important!

### LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

In the North Carolina Conference more and more people are recognizing the importance of our educational ministry. Last year attendance in Christian Workers Schools totaled 825, a 20% increase over 1983. In addition, 555 persons attended Sunday School Growth and Renewal Conferences held in the Goldsboro, Rockingham and Sanford districts. The primary leader for these was Dr. Warren Hartman, director of research for The Board of Discipleship. At Conference Summer School 106 persons attended the class "Revitalizing Your Church School" led by Dr. Roy Ryan, and 133 persons attended the class "Reaching Out Through The Sunday School," co-led by Kirk McNeill and James Cowell, all of the Board of Discipleship staff, Nashville, Tennessee. Most recently, at the January Workshops, 414 persons attended the class on education. This was the second largest attendance in any of the 16 classes. Conference youth events involved a total of 1,200, again an increase over the previous year. The TLC (Teaching, Learning, caring) program has continued and skilled and enthusiastic leaders are available to help your church strengthen its ministry with children.

We are excited about what is hapening in our churches, districts and conference when it comes to Christian education.

In addition, a statistical report follows this report showing trends in membership and attendance of the Church School. You will notice that for the first time in 15 years, we had a increase of 344 in the number of children enrolled in Church School. This has been brought about by the increased attendance, or the coming back to the church, of young adults. As they return to start their children in the Church School, we are excited at the new avenues of witness that are opening up. You will note that the number of adults enrolled in the Church School lacks only 13 persons of being a break-even figure - the best membership figure also in 15 years. We are only 149 persons short of breaking even with our total number enrolled in the Sunday School - a fantastic figure after losing persons by the thousands for so many years. We are currently in better shape with enrollment and attendance than we have been in a long time - and with the possibilities that FETCH, TLC, the symposium on ministry with and to older adults, and the young adult and youth programs that are scheduled for 1985, we look forward to plus figures in all columns next year. Just imagine what would happen if each of our 840 churches had a membership gain of only one child, one youth, and one adult in 1985!!

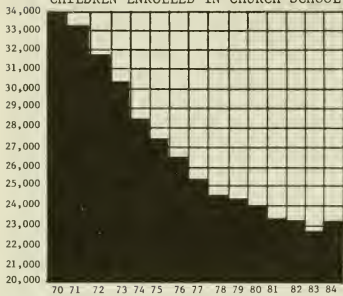

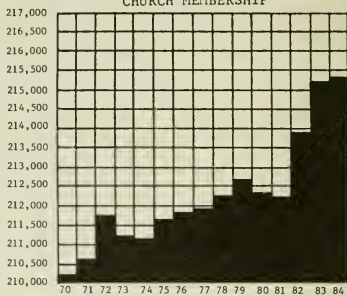


# CHURCH SCHOOL TRENDS

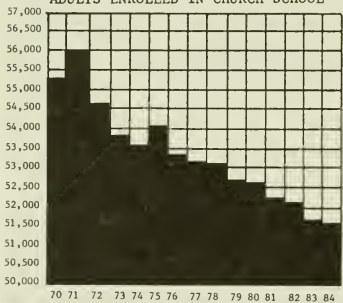
CHILDREN ENROLLED IN CHURCH SCHOOL



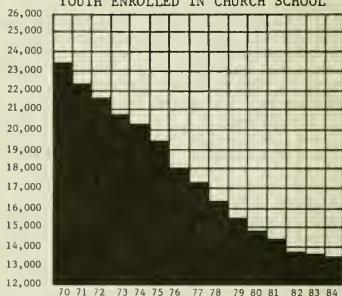
CHURCH MEMBERSHIP



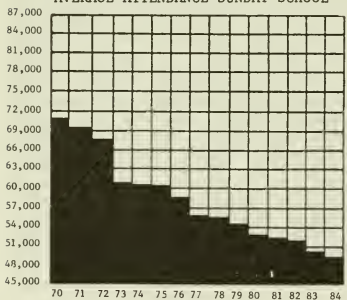
ADULTS ENROLLED IN CHURCH SCHOOL



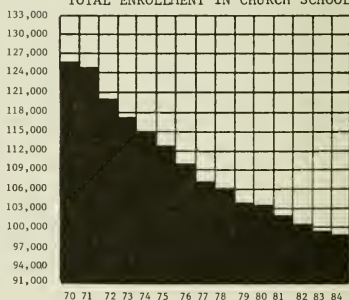
YOUTH ENROLLED IN CHURCH SCHOOL

## ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH (EMLC)

During the last four years the EMLC Committee of the NC Conference Council on Ministries (presently the Missional Priority Committee) has been active resulting in many accomplishments.

A publication listing names and addresses of the committee members, pastors of Ethnic Minority churches, church profiles, church and community workers, goals, and objectives of Native American and Black churches, requests for funding/resources, information about EMCL funds, evaluation and application and applications received and grants approved. Also, a conference-wide consultation on the Missional Priority was held for pastors and lay persons and more than 700 persons attended.

Workshops were held in the Black and Native American communities providing knowledge about resources available and skills in proposal writing.

Every EMLC congregation in the Conference has been directly and/or indirectly affected favorably. Annual Conference grants, along with grants from General Boards and Agencies, have made possible innovative and creative ministries in almost every charge. The ethnic minority churches are proud of their special music ministries, church van ministries, senior citizens service program and Christian education resources and equipment. Across the Conference churches have been involved in building and structural improvements and expansions. EMLC pastors and lay persons have gained access, through financial assistance, to conference, jurisdictional and national meetings. Forty-six clergy and lay persons were able to attend a special tour of the General Board of Global Ministries, the office of the General Commission on Religion and Race and the General Board of Church and Society empowering ethnic minority local churches to facilitate mission interaction in domestic and global dimensions.

The Bishop and Cabinet, the Executive Director and Council Staff have given effective leadership in the work of the EMLC Committee, and the members of the Committee have worked efficiently and effectively in concerted efforts to strengthen the Ethnic Minority Local Church.

## BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Significant membership growth characterizes our report for 1984. In 1983 we led the Southeastern Jurisdiction and were third in the United Methodist Church in membership growth. This would have been the same for 1984, except for some extensive purging of numbers for which we had no names on the roll. The majority of our districts reported a net gain of members. An increase in youth making their profession of faith and joining the church indicates spiritual vitality among churches and families. Youth and adults joining by profession of faith totaled 3,187.

Rededications to Christ and His church are on the upswing. Our pastors report these quarterly, and this has been observed as a significant trend. This does not change the statistics but it certainly changes the spirituality.

District events and training for ministries to inactives were held with high caliber leadership from our own Conference pastors. This is an attempt to learn methods and means of decreasing our loss of members "through the backdoor". Since 1957, active participation in all worship services has decreased from 60% to 38%. This is why we are in a drive to activate our inactives.

Evangelism has joined education and missions in a task force to promote the ministry of FETCH. This is a combined attempt to "find" them, be enrolled in church for the purpose of discipling them, "encourage" them to become involved, "telephone" or visit them, "cultivate" them as prospects for discipleship, and to bring all together on a "high" attendance Sunday in the fall.

Special evangelistic ministries abound with an increase in lay witness missions, gifts for ministry workshops, Church School growth training sessions, youth evangelism convocation for Black churches, and visitation workshops. Confirmation classes for youth and adults, as well as training pastors to conduct these, continue to increase.

Preparations have been in operation to respond to the General Conference action to double our membership by 1992. A training session was held by a General Board of Discipleship representative for the Conference board in relationship to these preparations.

We celebrate the good news of 301 churches being organized for regular visitation ministries, 374 churches that set membership goals which were

specific, and 498 churches that reported having confirmation classes for their youth.

### BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

A most important ministry of the church is to meet the needs of the people of God. In this report and the reports of the agencies of the conference under the Board of Health and Welfare can be found the goals and purposes of the Board. You will note that the Children's Home report expresses the concern for the total family and especially the families in crisis.

The report of the Methodist Retirement Homes will reveal the concern for the people of God in the twilight years of life. The home in Durham and the Joseph Coble Health Care Facility, the home in Lumberton and the new home, Cypress Glen, to be constructed in Greenville, NC, are examples of tremendous effort and the expending of great resources. The homes are attractive and inviting both from the inside and from the outside.

However beautiful and attractive the buildings and grounds are there must be found in them love, commitment and compassion. These factors are vital and of major concern in the operation of the homes. In the absence of love, commitment or compassion, these homes may as well be prisons, for only the body is housed there.

Our conference, the local churches and our conference leaders have gone to great limits to establish, maintain and uphold these great institutions. We are justly proud of our tradition, our heritage and the institutions that are now in operation. We are challenged to continue and to enlarge upon these ministries, to support the administrators and staff persons serving in our institutions. We must expect and require of all concerned the highest degree of professionalism possible.

The report of the Task Force on Ministry to Adult Mentally Retarded reveals our concerns for persons in these handicapping conditions. It is the goal of the task force to make specific recommendations to the 1986 NC

## Annual Conference.

The Golden Cross report lifts up the church's desire to minister to the whole person. We are pleased to report that any United Methodist that is unable to receive medical treatment may apply for funds from the Golden Cross. There is a limit of \$600 for each applicant.

The church has a wide and varied ministry, one that calls for strong support and cooperation from United Methodists throughout the Conference.

Other developments to be reported on are:

1. The report of the Task Force on Ministry to Adult Mentally Retarded persons.

2. The Board of Health and Welfare sponsors, through Conference financial support, the Day By Day Treatment Center of Selma in Selma, NC. The organization is a highly specialized treatment program for recovering alcoholics, both men and women. The Good Shepherd Home of Lake Waccamaw is also a recipient of Conference funds.

3. Prison ministries are carried on at the Johnston County Correctional Center by Reverend R. G. Gurley. It is recommended by the board that these funds be shared with the Chaplaincy Service, NC Dept. of Corrections, New Hanover County Unit, beginning in 1987. A program of prison ministries has been undertaken by the Wilmington Presbytery in New Hanover County and they have submitted an application to the Board of Health and Welfare for funding.

If you know of someone that needs help with their medical expense, ask your pastor to fill out an application and send it to the district health and welfare chairperson.

You can be proud of the part you have in this vital ministry of the church.

## The Methodist Home for Children

### PRO-FAMILY MINISTRY

The ministry of the Methodist Home for Children is pro-family. This ministry to children, youth, and adults seeks to avoid disruption of the family. It was this focus on the family that brought about the present day transition. The Board of Trustees, the Child Care Study Commission, and the NC Annual Conference all agreed in the actions of 1978-79 that the emphasis of this ministry needed to shift from focus on the child, somewhat in isolation from his/her family, to focus on the family.

This approach to child care represents a profound break with the philosophy that prevailed in the first half of this century. In those days it was assumed that the child could be best served by removing him/her from the "weak" family environment and raising him/her in the "superior" institution. Today we know that our ministry to the child is best done by ministry to the entire family.

### NEW STRATEGIES

This shift in philosophy led to a shift in strategies. No longer would we minister to children on a campus, permanently removing them from their natural families. Children who needed care outside their natural family would be cared for in homes located throughout the Conference, so that as children receive care, their families would also be involved.

Another major strategy is the Family Life component of our ministry. Family Life specialists seek to work at prevention of family disruption. The counselor is available to work with families in their own homes seeking to avoid disruption of the family. These specialists are capable of doing family life education in local churches and assisting local church pastors in improving their family counseling skills.

In order to bring these new strategies into being, significant new funding was required. The 1979 Special Session of Annual Conference

authorized the conversion of the value of the Raleigh campus into assets which would be available for the new property acquisitions necessary to implement the new strategies. It has been almost six years since that action was taken. Your Board of Trustees and staff, together with the Cabinet and the Board of Health and Welfare have worked diligently to accomplish the sale of the campus property.

#### SALE OF PROPERTY

The sale of the remaining 9.42 acres of the campus property was finalized in this way. Following the recommendation of the 1984 Annual Conference, the special Property Committee drew up a set of specifications stating that the seller would "give extra consideration to any offer that includes a proposal that all or part of the property will be used for the purpose of developing and building a housing project for the elderly". The committee decided to advertise for bids on the property and copies of the specifications were sent to all parties who had expressed interest in the 9.42 acres. The bid opening was held on October 22, 1984 and the transaction was finalized on January 9, 1985.

That transaction brought the net proceeds of the total sale of the campus to \$6,928,684. This income has been designated the Property Fund. A portion of these funds together with other designated funds, have already made possible the purchase of four youth homes: Lord Ashley Dr., Raleigh; Fremont; Edenton; and North Hills Drive, Raleigh. Six youth homes remain to be purchased. We are presently in construction of a youth home in Erwin in the Fayetteville District. Plans to purchase homes in North Durham, Laurinburg, and Wilmington are now in progress. Acquisition of two additional homes is projected for 1986, bringing our total number of community based homes to 10.

Plans are now being perfected for a new administrative building to be located on land retained, adjacent to the Methodist Building. The old administrative building was vacated in April and the staff is now temporarily housed in the Makepeace Building. The Board of Trustees has made available a portion of this remaining property to the Annual Conference without cost for future use as determined by the Annual Conference.

#### CONTINUING SUPPORT NEEDED

Capital outlays for 10 youth homes and the new administrative building will reduce significantly the size of the Property Fund. Earnings from the Property Fund and the \$5,927,750 General Endowment Fund are available for use in partially funding the operations of our total program. As we fulfill our transitional goals, the operating budget will increase accordingly. The earnings of the Property Fund and General Endowment, while significant, represent only a portion of the necessary funds to underwrite the year-to-year operating expense of the total program. The continuing budgeted support of the Annual Conference and individual contributions are essential.

We live in a time of unprecedented stress on the family. All of us are aware of the high level of child abuse that has recently come to light. Unstable homes produce unstable children, who if not helped go on to establish instability in the next generation. The teaching-family model of child care that we use in our community-based homes and our family life program offers the reach of Christ's love to our aching world.

This year has been a significant and demanding year for the Home. Much has been done and much yet remains to be done as we accomplish this far reaching transition to family-centered care. Your continuing confidence and support will go far toward enabling us to accomplish the stewardship God is giving to us.

### The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.

What an exciting and challenging time to be a provider of retirement and health care for United Methodists. Exciting because how the elderly are cared for is a measure by which our society is judged. Challenging because the best we can do will not measure up to the needs.

In the year 2000 these 65 and older will reach one million in North Carolina - a 55% increase over 1980. By the year 2020 one out of every 4.5 Americans will be retired.

Because the church looks upon the future as a time to be joyful and thankful over the longevity of life, we must use all our talents and resources to make the future, for those who have given us so much, rewarding and fulfilling.

By the time this Conference is in session, we will have already broken ground for the new Cypress Glen Retirement Community in Greenville. Although the Board of Trustees felt it best to build what was known as the



first phase in two segments, we are confident that sufficient funds will be received to allow us to complete both wings housing some 125 members. We are also anticipating building villas even while we are in construction of the main building.

What is happening on our present campuses adds to our excitement. In Durham we will soon start construction on our new villas which will be located behind and adjacent to Spence Lake. These will be beautiful homes what will provide the flexibility so many are seeking in early retirement. There are four different monthly plans whereby residents can choose only the services they desire. This project is self-financing and will require no funds from the Home.

The Coble Health Care Center, which provides both intermediate and skilled nursing care, now has a new administrator. He is Mr. Wayne Powers who moved as associate administrator of the Retirement Home to Coble Health Care Center to take up his duties on March 21. He is a licensed nursing home administrator with a master of science degree in long term care administration.

Wesley Pines has come into its own and has been filled for over a year. The Reverend Paul Bunn, Administrator, says there is now a waiting list of those who are anxious to become residents. Recently, a new apartment building was completed and is occupied. A new villa will be under construction by Annual Conference.

Many have heard about our auxiliary. This organization is active and is providing much needed support for our Homes. Louise Peterson, president, had provided the leadership that has brought the auxiliary to a place of prominence in our Conference.

This report would be incomplete without a word of thanks to the laity of this Conference for their financial support. This year we are receiving \$300,000 from the budget of our Outreach Ministries. We are indeed grateful. This support, along with other funds, will provide benevolent help for some 34% of our Methodist residents and patients who do not have adequate funds to pay the full cost of care.

We are working hard to enlarge our endowment fund so as to be able to do more in the future. In 1984, we spent \$477,759 in benevolent support.

From our Board of Trustees, employees, residents, and patients we share our excitement over our future and say to you...we are proud to be able to share in this caring ministry of the United Methodist Church.

## **SEMAR, Inc.**

SEMAR, Inc. was created by the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference in 1968 to develop and coordinate programs of ministry and service with mentally retarded persons and their families. In 1980 the Jurisdictional Conference asked SEMAR to expand its horizon of ministry to include all persons with handicapping conditions.

While the not-for-profit corporation continues to function under the name of SEMAR, the ministries now include persons who are blind or visually impaired, persons who are deaf or hearing impaired, persons who are physically disabled or mobility impaired as well as persons who are mentally retarded or intellectually impaired.

SEMAR has developed a wide variety of services and ministries over the years through the United Methodist Church in the Southeastern Jurisdiction including:

- Religious Education Classes
- Camping for retarded persons of all ages
- Day Training for pre-school children, young people, and adults
- Work orientation, training and work programs for retarded adults
- Scouting programs for retarded boys and girls
- Residential facilities for retarded children, youth and adults

SEMAR has been involved in assisting a special Task Force on Mental Retardation in our Annual Conference over the last six months. As a result of that study, it has been determined that there are approximately 180,000 retarded persons in North Carolina of whom 106,034 live within the bounds of the North Carolina Annual Conference - and more important, more than 8,000 (8,65) are related to families who are members of the United Methodist Church in our Conference.

The Task Force on Mental Retardation will report on its progress and recommendations as a part of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries Report. One of the greatest needs that the task force has uncovered is that of residential alternatives for retarded adults.

SEMAR is currently developing a program to encourage families to give or to will a home to the church to enable the church to provide family size



homes for retarded persons all across the church without having to build or buy them. We believe that there are families in EVERY district of the United Methodist Church in the Southeastern Jurisdiction who could give - or leave in a will - a home to the church if they knew of the need.

SEMAR is urging churches with elderly and/or visually impaired persons to have their Sunday Worship Service Bulletins enlarged for use by these persons. A copy machine with enlarging capabilities can provide this type of copy that visually impaired persons can read and thus participate in the church in worship.

SEMAR has requested of the Hymnal Revision Committee that an edition of the proposed new hymnal be published with large type for use by visually impaired persons. There are over a million and a half such persons in the SEJ alone.

Bob Pitzer, Director of SEMAR, has asked me to inform this Annual Conference that new curriculum resources for retarded persons is in the development stage and will be published and ready for distribution in early 1986. Workshops are being planned as soon as the publication date is firm for training workers and teachers how to use the new material with retarded persons.

If your church is not totally accessible, we urge you to secure a copy of the book **ASSESSIBILITY AUDIT** published by the Board of Global Ministries and available through their Service Center in Cincinnati, Ohio and do an audit in your church to identify and find ways of eliminating the barriers in your church that keep people with handicapping conditions from getting in and being a part of the church in fellowship or worship or study.

SEMAR has recommended to the SEJ Council on Ministries and had the recommendation approved urging that NO meetings be held in the United Methodist Church in the Southeast beyond the local church in buildings or facilities that are not accessible.

With more than 8 million persons with handicapping conditions within the bounds of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, approximately 700,000 of whom are members of United Methodist families, we are grateful to have an agency like SEMAR to work with and on behalf of persons with handicapping conditions and their families - and to be, in a sense, the voice of and advocates for persons who look to the United Methodist Church for help - that they may be a part of the church's fellowship - or find through the church ministries that will enable them to live a more normal, productive life because the United Methodist Church cares.

## **BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY**

Bishop Minnick, delegates of the North Carolina Annual Conference, friends and guests, it is exciting to be a part of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry as we have launched into the new quadrennium. Louisburg, North Carolina Wesleyan and Methodist College are making forward strides that will make them stronger for the future; they are recruiting students and working to stay at the level of excellence that you expect from them.

A concern we all share is that of the number of students at your colleges from North Carolina Methodism. You can help by taking an active role as a recruiter for the colleges by promoting Louisburg, Methodist and North Carolina Wesleyan. Encourage your minister and youth counselors to encourage your youth to visit one of your colleges, write for information or visit and talk with college recruiters at College Day at their high school. You and your youth will be enlightened to see the difference that a United Methodist College can make!

This year has been one in which the Minister-in-Residence program again has been beneficial to the colleges and to the ministers who have participated in the program. The alcohol policy on your college campuses has not changed this year. The Student Day Offering has been increased to the point of our Scholarship Committee being able to later in this report to present two Merit Awards of \$500.00 each. I would challenge you to help us give three awards next year. This would mean that as a Conference we would have an offering of \$15,000 on December 29 or another Sunday in the year designated by the local church as United Methodist Student Day.

The Black College Fund for 1985 is down in the amount sent in by this time last year. I hope you will "catch up" on this fund before the end of the year.

Beginning with the 1985 Charge Conference, your church will be asked to report as information to the Board of Higher Education the scholarships that your church has to help your students in their college education. We also encourage every church to consider helping the General Scholarship

Funds of your colleges by making a gift to the Conference Advance Specials for Scholarship Fund.

The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry is proud to announce that grants from the General Board of Higher Education have been awarded to Louisburg College and Duke University for the year 1985-1986 to help celebrate the new quadrennium and the theme "Into the Third Century".

The Board of Higher Education will be involved in a S. E. J. Training Event on September 7 from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at Louisburg College. The Reverend Dr. Robert Conn, Assistant General Secretary of the Division of Higher Education of Nashville, TN will come and lead in this training event which will equip our Board with new information for the new quadrennium.

Our hope and goal is that more of you and your churches will support your colleges and students by prayer, gifts, and recruiting of future students. Private church-related colleges are in a unique time frame. Some consider it a crisis - it is also a challenge. It is in our Methodist heritage to be involved in educating the mind, body, and soul. The challenge is that you and I continue to entrust our young men and women with the environment of the church-related campus to feed their hunger with the food of the mind and the soul.

## Campus Ministries

I bring you greetings from United Methodist students, faculty and administrators on college campuses from across North Carolina. As chair of the North Carolina State Commission on Campus ministry, I am pleased to report the work of thirteen Wesley Foundations and campus ministers serving on campuses with a total student population of nearly 130,000.

And the story of campus ministry that you support is exciting:

1. Students gathering in a Wesley Foundation for a fellowship meal and the worship of God.

2. Campus ministers taking students from East Carolina University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill on a mission to Mexico. There they worked with Mexican Methodists, painting and refurbishing two churches.

3. A frightened college student, admitted to a hospital in a strange city, visited by one of our United Methodist Church chaplains. Suddenly a lonely hospital room is made more bearable by the visit of someone who is connected to a local Methodist Church.

Campus ministry means Bible study; "a home away from home", a Christian witness with a State-supported University; a challenge to students to own their faith - to grow and mature spiritually as well as intellectually. The governor of Ohio; former North Carolina Supreme Court Justice, the Honorable Phil Carlton; numerous teachers, extension agents, preachers - all have one thing in common: they are products of Wesley Foundations.

The North Carolina and Western North Carolina Annual Conferences provide the largest share of support for campus ministry - \$413,059.00 in 1985. Through State Commission meetings and annual campus ministry conferences with district superintendents, the work of campus ministry is reported and evaluated. I am glad to say that we have found a creativity, an energy, a spirit of evangelism and service that is indeed impressive.

The North Carolina representatives to the State Commission are: Dr. Wallace H. Kirby, The Reverend Robert C. Redmond, The Reverend Susan Allred, Mrs. Estelle Hillman, The Reverend George Johnson, The Reverend William Presnell, The Reverend Murry DeHart, Jr., Dr. Brian Gentle, and Dr. Ernest Porter. One of our Conference's ministers, The Reverend Bill Sharpe, is Wesley Foundation Director at North Carolina State University. Another, The Reverend James Olive, serves as campus minister at Pembroke State University. The Reverend Mike Weber serves half-time as United Methodist Campus Minister at Duke University.

I would like to thank members of the State Commission for their hard work. I also thank our campus ministers for their dedicated and able work done on behalf of Christ and the Church within higher education. Lastly, I thank you for your generous support of campus ministry.

## The Divinity School of Duke University

Among the many resources which support Duke's commitment to excellence in theological education, none is more important than the strong reputation which the Divinity School continues to enjoy as a school of the church. In the 57 years since its founding, more than 3,000 graduates have gone forth to serve in thousands of congregations around the globe. We regard that reputation as a sacred trust. We believe fulfilling that trust requires continuing boldness and imagination if we are to prepare students for ministries equal to the challenges of these perplexing times.

Duke's reputation for intellectual rigor in the service of the church and its ministry continues to grow, as evidenced by the strength and diversity of our student body. With the start of the fall 1984 semester, the Divinity School enrolled 392 students in its professional degree programs (M.Div., M.R.E. and Th.M.) and an additional 60 students in the M.A./Ph.D. program. Our students are men and women from 192 undergraduate schools, 22 denominations and 33 states. Women constitute 30% of the total enrollment and black students constitute 10%. And at a time when many schools are being forced to lower their entrance requirements, the Divinity School continues to maintain its historical commitment to high standards. The quality of our student body has never been better.

While the accomplishments of its distinguished faculty and scholars, and an aggressive international exchange program earn it increasing prominence in American theological education and the ecumenical world, the Divinity School continues to enjoy strong regional, denominational and alumni support as well.

In addition, the Divinity School's unique field education program makes it possible for students to combine remunerative employment and vocational preparation. Funding from the Duke Endowment insures that what our students do by way of self-help while at Duke contributes as much to their competency in ministry as it does to their financial support.

Finally, Duke Divinity School is most fortunate to be able to depend on the generous support of United Methodists nationwide through the Ministerial Education Fund. These are some of the resources which account for Duke's margin of excellence and provide assurance that the Divinity School's ministry in the service of the church will endure. These resources, including the apportionment from the Ministerial Education Fund, have made possible several exciting developments in the life and work of Duke Divinity School this past year, and I want to share that good news with you.

#### OUR FACULTY GROWS FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

We are pleased to celebrate the addition to our faculty of three scholars of the first rank. Stanley Hauerwas, a theologian and ethicist, Dan O. Via, Jr., a New Testament scholar, and William H. Willimon, Minister to the University, are exciting additions to our community. A member of the theological faculty of the University of Notre Dame since 1974, Dr. Hauerwas has been named professor of Theological Ethics at Duke. Dr. Via, who has been teaching at the University of Virginia, has joined us as professor of New Testament. And Dr. Willimon returns to our faculty as professor of the Practice of Christian Ministry after four years as a pastor in South Carolina.

Dr. Willimon's earlier service on the Divinity School faculty marked him as one who has much to contribute to our students and the life of the church. We are thankful for his return. I am also happy to announce the appointment of Dr. Paula E. Gilbert to the faculty effective July 1, 1985. Dr. Gilbert is currently director of Admissions and Student Affairs. She is an ordained elder in the United Methodist Church and will teach in American Christianity while continuing to serve in her administrative capacity. These additions bring to nine the number of faculty members appointed during the past two years.

#### DUKE HOSTS FIRST SOUTHEAST CLERGYWOMEN'S CONSULTATION

United Methodist clergywomen from all over the south gathered at the Divinity School for the first Clergywomen's Consultation on March 4-7, 1985. This was the first time United Methodist women in ministry from all parts of the United Methodist Church's Southeastern Jurisdiction had met together as a group, and we were quite pleased to see close to 200 attend. The Reverend Susan Vogel, dean of students at St. Paul's School of Theology, delivered the keynote address on "Fibers of Ministry - Love, Power and Justice". Other plenary sessions explored the history of women in the South, women's spirituality, and the appointment system in the United Methodist Church. The Consultation also offered clergywomen an opportunity to attend several workshops, as well as daily worship services featuring women preachers.

#### DIVINITY STUDENTS SPONSOR SYMPOSIUM ON EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

World and national leaders in the field of Christian missions converged on the Duke University campus on January 15 for a three-day symposium on evangelism and missions. The symposium was an occasion for serious examination of the theology and methodology of mission. Major speakers during the three-day event included:

- Bishop Ole E. Borgen (B.D., '62), United Methodist Bishop of Northern Europe and president-elect of the United Methodist Council of Bishops
- Dr. Everett L. Hunt, President of Overseas Missions Society International
- Dr. Rene O. Bideaux (B.D., '58), Deputy General Secretary of the United Methodist General Board of Global Ministries
- The Reverend H. T. Maclin, Executive Director of the Mission Society for United Methodists

#### CONTINUING EDUCATION FROM DISTRICT SEMINARS TO INTERNATIONAL STUDY

Under the leadership of Joe Mann we are carrying on a remarkable program of continuing education for ministry and invite your interest and participation. We are particularly committed to relationship with and understanding of the world church. Accordingly, we offer extensive opportunities for students, alumni and others to learn about international issues, including seminars in Mexico with McMurry Richey, China with Creighton Lacy and the cities of the early church (Paul's travels) with Moody Smith.

The Divinity School's long-standing commitment to international studies has earned it the signal honor of hosting the first two scholars from the People's Republic of China permitted to study religion in the United States. Ms. Deng Wen Wen and Mr. Yen Chang You, members of the faculty of the National Academy of the Social Sciences, arrived on the Divinity School



campus last fall. They are pursuing studies of the role of religion in American life and culture.

These are exciting times at Duke Divinity School as we seek to give our best in the service of the church and its ministries. As a part of the Divinity School's extended family of friends and supporters, the North Carolina Annual Conference is one of our chief partners in that enterprise and our greatest strength. Your loyal support through the Ministerial Education Fund and your continuing involvement in the life of the Divinity School is the envy of the other professional schools in the university and a source of great pride for us. Together we are committed to advancing the life and work of the church through a well-prepared ministry. ### Louisburg College

Your college at Louisburg continues to be a first class United Methodist two-year institution, and we are proud of our achievements. Recently, when the United Methodist Women were on our campus for the Christian Personhood Retreat, one of them said to me, "How does Louisburg College do what it does?" I replied that quality comes from a caring faculty and staff emphasizing the small details as well as the larger components of academic life. If we are to meet the needs of our total campus community, then we have to look beyond the usual expectations of colleges, to provide the extra ingredients. And we do.

The academic year just completed was a good one, with continued full enrollment and a balanced budget. Endowment monies, especially for scholarships, continue to grow; and we are in better position to meet student financial need. This capability is essential for us as we anticipate reduced federal support in the years ahead. For the 1985-86 year, however, there will be financial aid available for all students who qualify on a need basis. Let me lift forward especially the extension of the Franklinton United Methodist Church to Louisburg College in establishing the Richard Cheatham Scholarship to provide annual monies for a student or students attending the college. It is a prime example of what local churches can do. Our 1985 Commencement speaker was Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., who challenged our graduates "for such a time as this", using the Book of Esther as his text.

As we look toward the 1985-86 year, we again anticipate full enrollment. Freshmen applications are 12% ahead of the same time a year ago, with freshman deposits paid almost 30% ahead. The academic program continues to be strengthened, especially in the Science area with the addition of two new Ph. D. faculty. Construction is now underway on the long-awaited Clifton L. Benson Chapel and Religious Life Center, made possible by the dedicated work of the Raleigh District United Methodist Men. Funding has reached the 75% level, and we have initiated the building phase as a venture in faith that United Methodists in our Conference will help us secure the remaining monies necessary.

In 1987 Louisburg College will celebrate the 200th anniversary of its date of founding, and we look forward to having all the people of the North Carolina Conference mark the occasion with us. Although we cannot claim to be all things to all people or to be a campus immune to the social problems and concerns of society, we are in a sense an oasis, in that we try with understanding and compassion to meet the needs of students who come our way in the manner the Church would expect us to follow. Church-relatedness is the basic plank in our missional foundation, and we thrive because the Church is our guide.

We conclude this report with an affirmation of support for one of our able staff members. Dr. Thomas S. Yow, who has been my administrative assistant since 1977, will be leaving immediately following Annual Conference to assume the presidency of Martin College in Tennessee, a United Methodist two-year college similar to Louisburg. Although we and

all in our Conference will miss him, we take this occasion to express appreciation to him for all that he has done and to wish him well in his new administrative role. He is imminently qualified to assume it.

## Methodist College

Bishop Minnick, members of the Annual Conference, ladies and gentlemen. Many pleasant experiences have occurred in the twenty months that I have had the privilege of serving at Methodist College. Among the most pleasant of these experiences has been the opportunity to get to know more closely the Methodists of North Carolina - lay and clergy. I have especially appreciated the invitations to preach in your churches, to speak to meetings of Methodist Men, Methodist Women and Youth groups. Those opportunities to be in your churches have been a joy indeed.

The challenge that I face in this report is to convey the sense of growth and confidence that exists in the Methodist College community without overstating the case. Good things have occurred in enrollment, finances, staff and curriculum. But, we are not yet out of the woods. An accurate report requires that I be positive, but realistic.

Concerning enrollment, this past fall saw the largest freshman class in many years. Our overall enrollment was up twenty percent in the day program and our evening enrollment almost doubled. In the spring semester our total enrollment was 1,035, surpassing 1,000 for the first time in more than a decade.

Our most challenging recruitment problem continues to be in the residential area. This past year we increased our residential enrollment by 13% over the preceeding year. At the present time our applications for new residential students are 54% above last year and we project that our residential enrollment will be up by about 15% over last year. Even with a fifteen percent increase we still will have many empty beds.

One of the recruitment problems that we face, and one with which you can help us, is concern on the part of many prospective students about the cost of attending Methodist College. Quite simply, many students think they cannot afford our college and never bother to consider us. And those students are misled. It is our goal at Methodist College that no student be denied the opportunity to attend Methodist College because of lack of financial resources. Our goal, which we are very close to achieving, is that we will provide a financial aid package that will meet the NEED of any North Carolina student who desires to attend Methodist College. There are Federal grants, some of which reach \$2,000, State grants which will provide \$950, and the various college scholarship programs which assist students who lack resources. In addition, we guarantee at Methodist College a campus job to any residential student who desires to work. In such a job a student can earn up to \$850 per year. In short, we can find a way to make it possible for almost any North Carolina student to afford to attend our college. But not everyone is aware of this opportunity and you can help us in our communications problem.

The second area that I would like to mention concerns the financial health of the college. The generous support of the Annual Conference has helped to put the college in its best financial shape in many years, perhaps in our history. Our alumni giving is up, both in dollars and in percentages, and this year we received a \$600,000 gift to support the economics and business program at Methodist College, a program which is now being expanded. For the first time in our history giving to Methodist College in a single year exceeded 1.3 million dollars.

The scholarship program which you created last year in appreciation for the work of Bill Lowdermilk has generated over \$12,000 for an endowed scholarship. The college and the Annual Conference continues to benefit greatly from Bill's dedicated efforts. Bill is a symbol of the numerous dedicated people whose hard work at Methodist College is a major reason for our existence and success.

We received this year the first Federal grant in our history. This grant supports a special program for first generation college students.

In the financial management area we have made some steps in attacking our maintenance problems. We have been able to do more painting and more tree and shrub planting than in all of the past decade. But as you can see by looking closely we have left many roofs unrepaired and potholes unfilled. We are blessed again this year by the volunteer assistance of about 40 ministers who painted for two days in our residence halls. This program, organized by Tom Holtsclaw of Camp Ground Church was a major advance. I don't know which I enjoyed more, seeing the newly painted rooms or hearing the singing that accompanied the painting.



Two of the Methodist College faculty will attend very competitive National seminars this summer. The fact that we have two people at these much sought after positions testifies to the quality of our faculty. Dr. Sue Kimball will be at Columbia University studying Chaucer and Dr. Robert Christian will be at Stanford University studying romantic literature. Both of these teachers are very involved members of Hay Street United Methodist Church.

The appointment of the first full-time Vice-president for Development at Methodist College in about ten years was announced recently. Gene Clayton, a member of Haymount United Methodist Church, and the Athletic Director here for many years will assume primary responsibility for our efforts to secure a broader base of support.

I want to close my report with a short statement of my understanding of the mission of Methodist College. It involves two parts. First, we want to be a strong academic institution. We want to teach well those skills and wisdom that help to make an educated person. But we want to do more than train the mind - we want to inspire the spirit. We want to produce BETTER HUMAN BEINGS. In this we fulfill our mission as your college - for like you, the church, we want to call men and women to more noble lives marked by caring, concern and commitment. We believe that this mission is important, and we appreciate your support in this venture.

### North Carolina Wesleyan College

Bishop Minnick, delegates and guests.....this has been another good year for North Carolina Wesleyan College. More than 1100 students have been enrolled in one or more courses.

Our off-campus programs in Raleigh at Athens Drive High school, in Goldsboro at Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, and in Jacksonville and New Bern have provided degree completion opportunities for non-traditional students. These off-campus sites were visited by our regional accrediting agency, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and received a stamp of approval.

The most popular programs of study at Wesleyan continue to be Business Administration, Accounting, Computer Science, and Hotel and Food Service Management. New faculty have been employed in each of these areas to meet student demand.

We are currently in the midst of preparing a long-range plan to see us into the 1990s. An aggressive marketing effort will be included to help us recruit more North Carolina Conference Methodist youth at Wesleyan. (Our College is best known by those who travel I-95 and 301 from New York to Florida. Few persons traveling within the state have the occasion to pass our campus.)

This year we have been involved in expensive maintenance of putting new roofs on buildings, resurfacing all the paving and replacing worn air conditioners.

We hope that you will make plans to attend an old-fashioned camp meeting on our campus next spring (May 23-25). The Board of Evangelism is making plans for the event now and we invite all of you to make reservations and join us next May.

One of the greatest opportunities and the greatest needs we have is for scholarship funds. We appreciate the gift from the Raleigh District. Our General Board of Higher Education will name 2,000 Bicentennial Scholars from among graduating high school seniors this year and next.

Your local church can name a Bicentennial Scholar by pledging \$1,000 toward that student's education. When the student applies and is accepted at North Carolina Wesleyan College, we pledge another \$1,000 toward his expenses. If he or she is chosen as a Bicentennial Scholar, the General Board also puts up \$1,000. That makes \$3,000 the first year.

Let me urge you to put \$1,000 in your local church budget and encourage your youth to apply for designation as Bicentennial Scholars. If accepted, they can receive an additional scholarship of \$2,000 from other sources.

This program can help our Conference colleges and make church-related higher education affordable to young people in your church.

Even if the Bicentennial Scholarship is not possible, other forms of financial aid are available. Please encourage your youth to visit Wesleyan and the other Conference colleges before making a final decision.

## BOARD OF LAITY

In THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE, Par. 104, we read: "The heart of Christian ministry is Christ's ministry of outreaching love. Christian ministry is the expression of the mind and mission of Christ by a community of Christians that demonstrates a common life of gratitude and devotion, witness and service, celebration and discipleship. All Christians are called to this ministry of servanthood in the world to the glory of God and for human fulfillment." The task of the Board of the Laity is to assist lay persons to be effective ministers. To this end several important programs were implemented this past year.

District Lay Rallies were held in each of the 12 districts with a total attendance of 8,281. This is the second largest attendance recorded since the rallies began in 1955. Speakers included Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., Dr. W. E. Hammond, Dr. Will Willimon, Dr. Wallace Chappell, Dr. Thomas Langford, and Judge J. Taylor Phillips. The rallies featured spirited singing, the recognition of the outstanding high school seniors, and the presentation of the district Lay Person of the Year. The district Committee of the Laity, which is representative of all lay persons, men, women and youth, planned and participated in the rallies.

January Workshops continued to increase in quality and quantity. Every year we announce a new attendance record and this year is no exception. Participating this year were 4,103 persons. The New Bern District took the prize with a total attendance of 438 and an amazing 80 persons in one class! The 1986 January Workshops will include classes for the administrative officers of the church, including the Committee on Finance, trustees, children, youth, young adult, and adult coordinators, and United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women and United Methodist Youth Fellowship.

The Lay Speaker program was changed considerably by the 1984 General Conference. There are now two levels of certification. The first is that of Local Church Lay Speaker. Persons who achieve this distinction have had Administrative Board or Council or Charge Conference approval and then completed a 10-hour basic training course. Basic courses have been held in most of our districts this year with the new materials being used in most cases. Emphasis is given to three aspects of speaking, leading and caring. The second level is that of Certified Lay Speaker; a local church lay leader achieves this level by participating in an advanced 10-hour training course after effective service in his/her local church. Advanced courses have been held at Conference Summer School and in several of the districts. Advanced courses will also be offered at Conference Summer School this August.

Each year the Board of the Laity recognizes a Lay Person of the Year. We are proud to call the names of these special district representatives, who collectively represent more than 500 years in service to the United Methodist Church: Burlington - Lester Ridenhour of Front Street UMC in Burlington, Durham - Ross Townes of Asbury Temple UMC in Durham, Elizabeth City - Mrs. Margaret Saunders of First UMC in Elizabeth City, Fayetteville - Mrs. Alma McRae of John Wesley in Fayetteville, Goldsboro - Miss Daisy Young of Centenary UMC in Smithfield, Greenville - Mrs. Carolyn Harris of Providence UMC, Swan Quarter Charge, New Bern - Grier and Martha Garrick of Trinity UMC in Jacksonville, Raleigh - Col. Roy L. Holley of St. Mark's UMC in Raleigh, Rockingham - Mrs. Alice T. Nelson of St. Peters UMC in Hamlet, Rocky Mount - Mrs. Ophelia Taylor of West Nash UMC in Wilson, Sanford - Larry and Lynda Newsome of Southern Pines UMC in Southern Pines, and Wilmington - Wade Pierce of Pine Valley UMC in Wilmington.

Last year Robert and Leiotte Long of Roxboro shared this honor. The Board has reviewed the list of those honored as district lay persons of the year. They are all capable and enthusiastic representatives of the laity of our churches. The 1985 Lay Person of the Year is Mrs. Margaret Saunders

of the Elizabeth City District and President of our NC Conference United Methodist Women. Margaret has been a leader at First UMC for more than 35 years. She is Chairperson of the Work Area on Missions, and has led her local church in mission studies and the underwriting of financial support for a missionary family. She teaches "Monday School" at Guardian Care and at Winslow Nursing Home. She is an active member of her church school class, the Council on Ministries and Administrative Board. On the district level she has served as Youth Coordinator, Chairperson of Education, and as Vice-President and then President of United Methodist Women. She is on the District Council on Ministries. On the Conference level she is a member of the Council on Ministries, Board of the Laity, Board of Missions, Conference Summer School Board of Directors, and The Methodist Foundation. She is a trustee of the Methodist Retirement Homes, and a member of the Edenton Children's Home advisory board. ## Report of the Conference Lay Leader

When we look at the 1984-85 year, we can see encouraging signs that spiritual enrichment, commitment, and diligence in effort have been our motivation to Church advancement. We have been blessed by the challenges in spiritual growth extended by Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., as he has been with us in all twelve districts and in many of our local churches. We have reached new attendance levels in district lay rallies and in the January Workshops. We have seen our Conference Summer School continue to be an excellent experience for training leadership and deepening our faith. The Lay Speaker Program has received renewed emphasis, as we continue to seek to provide new leadership, not only for worship but for church school teaching and sharing with one another. United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and United Methodist Youth activities have received emphasis and recognition; and we have increasing participation in all three. Yes, we can see good signs that our Conference is advancing on all fronts, and these signs should give us fortitude for what lies ahead.

Our challenges and needs are many, as we seek to strengthen our ministry to young adults and to our growing older adults. Increased membership will require our concerted effort to provide more and better programs to meet these growing populations within our midst, and our failure to recognize and follow through accordingly will lend credence to those who say that the role of the Church is a lessening one in our Society. We must also address effectively the social, economic, and political issues prevalent in our time and see that the Church as we know it and want it to become is a positive factor in reasonable change. And our steps toward inclusiveness must become broadened ones if we are to secure the faith that has brought us to this point.

So let us observe our significant rite of passage in continued celebration, but in wise assessment of who we are and what we are all about. As Conference Lay Leader I compliment our progress, but call on us as a Church to renew our commitments and dedicate ourselves to extension beyond where we have been to reach toward meeting the needs and challenges that are clearly our task.

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## United Methodist Men

United Methodist Men continue to be the fastest growing segment of our church. It is support from leaders like Dr. Allen Norris, Conference Lay Leader, and Mrs. Margaret Saunders, President of United Methodist Women, and so many other members of the laity and clergy that we continue to grow both in numerical and spiritual strength.

As we look back at what United Methodist Men have accomplished we can be proud of our organization. Our men have helped to raise the money for a chapel at Louisburg College, a parsonage within the Sanford District and are working to raise money for a swimming pool for Camp Rockfish. These stand out as district projects but are dwarfed by the individual projects that United Methodist Men have accomplished in their own churches.

We can be proud that very district now has either an appointed or elected president and 42% of our church have an active United Methodist Mens Fellowship.

Our Conference ranks third in the nation in percentage of churches with a charter and fifth in the nation in the number of chartered groups.

April 12-14 we held our first ever, men's retreat at Methodist College. Our program got off to a great start on Friday night with a training session for Prayer Covenant groups and information about the Upper Room Prayer Ministry which is one of our national projects. James K. Wagner, Executive Director of the Upper Room Prayer and Healing Ministries was our speaker.

Saturday morning started with a morning watch lead by Rudy Hillman, Conference Vice-President. After singing, lead by Roger Searles, Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., lead us in worship. After lunch we heard from Jim Snead, Assistant General Secretary of the General Board of Discipleship and Tom Mallonee, United Methodist Mens President of the Western North Carolina Conference and the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

Then we had two sets of interest groups and after supper a video presentation by Dr. Ross Freeman on a new program, "A Spiritual Journey for Men" which will be introduced at Purdue in July.

Our meeting ended on Sunday with a most meaningful Love Feast lead by Dr. Norris and an inspiring message by R. H. "Red" Bond, President of the Memphis Conference United Methodist Men.

The men attending the meeting voted overwhelmingly to hold the retreat again next year the weekend after Easter at Methodist College.

We have adopted the theme of M A N which stands for Meeting Another's Needs and the theme has been picked up for the Southeastern Jurisdiction Convo '87 - they are using the theme M A N in the Third Century. This event will take place in April of 1987 at Lake Junaluska.

On July 12-14 of this year we will hold our National Congress of United Methodist Men at Purdue with many from our Conference planning to attend.

The Conference Summer School, August 2-4 will have a course for United Methodist Men led by Mr. Pay Smith, Director of Volunteers in Discipleship for United Methodist Men.

As United Methodist Men we must take advantage of the opportunities and meet the challenge of our third century - How well we do this may very well shape the destiny of our Church.

## United Methodist Women

United Methodist women, too, have marked a rite of passage, not only recalling 200 years of Methodism, but also 100 years of women organized for mission.

As we look to the future, United Methodist Women of the North Carolina conference have adopted "Visions of Shalom" as the Quadrennial theme. The dictionary defines vision as "the ability to perceive something not actually visible". As we envision Shalom - peace, wholeness, unity - we realize it is the embodiment of Christ's concern for all humanity.

The year 1984-85 has brought many opportunities for learning, for spiritual growth, for nurturing the seeds of peace and wholeness. Attendance at Regional School, Conference Summer School, New Officer Training in New York and Chicago as well as our own "Do It Day" have provided both knowledge and inspiration for carrying on the work.

Our Annual Meeting in October was planned around the theme "To Love Is to Risk". Bernice Johnson who was completing her service on the Women's Division as Vice-President for Mission and Membership Development, was the speaker. She challenged us to do more than talk about love: to risk



reaching out to those who need to experience the love of Christ through us.

In February the Women's Division conducted a Christian Social Relations Interpretation Workshop for our Conference and District Officers. In March 169 young women attended the 39 and Under Event. This age group is alive with enthusiasm and an eagerness to learn.

The historical records and artifacts of the Women's Missionary organizations of our conference have been placed in the archives in the Davis Memorial Library at Methodist College.

Interest and enthusiasm was everywhere evident in the recent Personhood Retreat at Louisburg College where Elise Eslinger led us down the "Roads to Shalom" and renewed commitment.

The Treasurer's Report for 1984 showed a total of \$313,863 sent to the Women's Division. In addition \$12,000 went to support the work of our three Conference projects, Robeson County Church and Community Center, the Harnett County Project, and the Walnut Terrace Child Development Center. Recently \$1,000 was sent to the Raleigh Board of Missions that we might share in the ministry of Motlalepula Chabaku in the larger Walnut Terrace Community. \$500 was given to the Bill Lowdermilk Scholarship Fund in appreciation for his ministry of love and service. Twelve scholarships were awarded to women attending our Methodist colleges as an investment in the future leadership of our Church.

We have set as goals the organization of at least 36 new units in churches that do not now have an organized unit of United Methodist Women, and a 10% increase in membership throughout the Conference. We continue to strive toward inclusiveness. We remember with thanksgiving Mollye Hughes Briley who worked throughout her lifetime to accomplish this. As a Church and as United Methodist Women we must continue to work for peace and justice, for concerns of the elderly, child and spouse abuse, migrant ministry, alcohol and drug abuse, prison ministries. We must continue an emphasis on Food, Land and Justice, realizing that world hunger is more than the hunger for food.

As we look to the future under the able and inspiring leadership of our Bishop Carlton P. Minnick, may we become a network of Christians - United Methodist women, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Youth - working together to heal the brokenness of our world out of an active and compassionate concern for all people.

## United Methodist Youth

A very successful year is coming to an end and as president of the North Carolina Conference Youth, I am pleased to say that all of our goals have been met if not surpassed.

The Youth Service Fund (YSF) is money raised by the youth, spent by the youth to benefit the youth. The YSF goal for 1984 was \$13,500. The total amount raised was \$17,900, which makes us the fourth largest fund-raiser in the nation among conference youth. Being near the bottom seven years ago, the North Carolina Conference Youth has made its way up in the national YSF standings. A definite success! I would like to thank the conference youth treasurer, Jim Benedict, for a job well done. However, all the youth of the Conference deserve to be thanked. Thank you.

Last January, the YSF Task Force met to set next year's fund-raising goal and to decide how to use the money raised this year. Our new goal is \$18,500, an ambitious 37% increase over our 1984 goal based on our success this year. We support many IN and OUT of Conference programs such as: a drug addict recuperation center in Brazil, and a chapel at Louisburg College. The Brazilian project is just starting. We are helping with the initial construction costs. The chapel at Louisburg College has been given monies to provide the altar railing. There are many more projects ranging from day care type programs to missionary programs. I stress the importance of the YSF and the need for help in fund-raising. Please encourage the youth of your local church to become involved and increase their support of this much needed youth fund.

The Youth Council of the North Carolina Conference has the responsibility to plan youth events for all the youth of the Conference. We have had great success in planning events in the past and this has sparked many new ideas for future activities. A youth work team went to Jamaica last year to do missionary work. As a member of that team, I can assure you that the experience was both educational and inspirational. The experience gave each team member the opportunity to practice, in a very meaningful way, Christ's teachings. To continue the new tradition, similar teams will be going to Costa Rica and to the west side of New York City this year. I am certainly looking forward to the Costa Rica project in

August.

Other new programs include a youth tour of the Holy Land and, with the cooperation of the Camping Ministries, a youth white water rafting retreat.

Another area I would like to address is involvement in youth events. We are pleased with the number of minority youth who have participated. I would like to see their participation increase, as well as the participation of all the youth of the Conference. The best way to see the numbers grow is for you, as ministers and lay persons, to support your local and Conference youth programs. I especially urge you to encourage the youth of your local church to become more involved in Conference level activities. Let the youth know of the great opportunities they have to contribute to the life of the church. Together we can build an even more worthwhile youth ministries program.

## BOARD OF MISSIONS

When we hear the name Board of Missions, we must not think only of missionaries or lands in other countries. Missions is the outreach of the church, here and abroad, from work teams of local churches in their own neighborhood, to new church development, to studying in small groups about other cultures and peoples, to giving to appeals for hunger and relief of human need.

### THE AFRICA CHURCH GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT FUND

In 1984, \$36,179.89 was given to this fund. Our Conference chose to give \$1,000.00 for every 150 years or \$150,000.00 to Africa Church Growth and Development as part of the celebration of the anniversary of Melville B. Cox going to Africa. The total that has been given now is \$112,581.04.

### CHURCH AND COMMUNITY

Grants have been given to rural and urban churches, and the Church and Community Center and the Walnut Terrace Project totaling over \$90,000.00.

### HINTON RURAL LIFE CENTER

One of our own ministers in our Conference is now executive director of the Hinton Rural Life Center. Our Board of Missions has recommended that \$4,000.00 be given annually to the center to support the program as our part as the North Carolina Annual Conference.

### THE ADVANCE SPECIAL

1. We are trying to limit to a maximum of four, the Advance Specials in any category other than Conference Advance Specials.

2. We are trying to hold before the church the need for missionary salary support.

3. We want to lift up at the Fall Charge Conferences that particular country related to the churchwide study that has been scheduled for that year.

This was a record year of giving in the Conference. Giving was down in National and World Advance; however, the response of churches to the Tornado and Hurricane Crisis in our Conference and the Ethiopian and African Hunger Crisis giving to the advance almost tripled over 1983. In 1983, giving to the Advance was \$326,070.23. The response in 1984 was \$916,396.29. This is an increase of \$590,326.06.

In 1984 there were 587 mission studies reported using the guidelines. There were other studies held which were not conducted by the particular guidelines.

The Commission on Outdoor and Camping Ministries was authorized by the 1983 NC Annual Conference, and came into being in June of 1984 with 25 members. Local committees were organized for the first time in 1984 for all four camps, and work camps have been held at each camp. A fine resident camping program has been planned for 1985 and 1986.

Proposals for a master plan and a capital fund drive will be presented to the 1986 NC Annual Conference. Moving from a very detailed study that was done of our camping ministries in 1982, we are presently working on a master plan for camping that will carry us into the 21st Century. Details of this plan will be presented to the NC Annual Conference in 1986 for the conference's approval, and approval will be sought for a Capital Fund Drive to be conducted across the conference in 1987.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

In keeping with our role as the monitoring and advocating agent of the church, the Commission on Religion and Race is continually viewing and reviewing the many levels of the NC Conference where racial awareness and inclusiveness is still lacking.

Our commitment to the Missional Priority is one way of assessing our commitment to racial pluralism and inclusiveness and we must keep before us the fact that, "The work of Religion and Race is the task of the whole church".

We applaud our bishop and offer our support to assist in determining the depth of the commitment of our Conference in the area of open-itineracy.

Several strides have been made toward inclusiveness; however, it is felt that the Conference has not yet benefited by the experiences ethnic minorities bring to it. Our perception of our progress differs significantly between ethnic minorities and Caucasian persons.

The NC Conference is not utilizing its ethnic minority leadership, in fact, some ethnic minority persons are over-utilized thus depriving others of opportunities to serve.

The commission has sent teams of its members to visit and monitor the number of ethnic minorities represented in our institutions and agencies. The following is submitted by way of statistics: Blacks - two administration, three staff persons, 36 maintenance and one trustee. Native Americans - one staff person, 13 maintenance. Asians - two administration/faculty. The greatest percentage of ethnic minorities are students at our institutions of higher education.

The commission for the first time this year felt the need to monitor the practices of employment in our Annual Conference offices (Council on Ministries and Treasurer's office) and we are recommending to the NC Annual Conference that steps be taken to actualize racial and ethnic minority inclusiveness in these areas. Our Conference camps have been added responsibilities of the commission and a report of the findings in this area will be given at a later date.

An Affirmative Action program is in force at all of our institutions and agencies with the exception of one and the visitation team recommended to that agency the adoption of one as soon as possible.

Your commission has been in the position to provide scholarship assistance to your ethnic minority brothers and sisters for the Adult Study Tour and for the National and Jurisdictional Meetings of Black Methodist for Church Renewal (BMCR).

Many of our boards and agencies have not elected a coordinator of Religion and Race as is the policy of this Conference; however, the commission shall continue to work toward making this a reality.

A recent recommendation from this commission has been an attempt to make us more racially inclusive at the district level - that is to have ethnic minority representation on every district council on ministries where there are none. It is hoped that the funding for this shall come first from our districts and then from the Conference Commission on Religion and Race.

The significance of the visit to our Conference by the General Commission on Religion and Race has not yet been felt; however, we are sure that much will be derived from this visit that will give impetus to our continued work for this quadrennium.

The United Methodist Church (NC Conference) has come a long way in its efforts to become an inclusive church. Some notable victories have been achieved. We have some celebrating to do, but racism is still too apparent at every level in the life of the church and in this Conference and as such, it still remains our unfinished agenda. It will require "Our Lord, who is able to cleanse and forgive; change and review; heal and reconcile".

## COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

The NC Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women (COSROW) moves into the new quadrennium with renewed commitment to its functions as described in the DISCIPLINE, Par. 2202. In our roles as advocate, catalyst and monitor, we work on behalf of women and their empowerment for full participation in the total life and mission of the church. We believe, furthermore, that such inclusion of women is one of the ways whereby man and woman alike are enabled, as the Body of Christ, to be partners in ministry. To this end, we are engaged in a number of programs across our Conference. A few of the major emphases are described below.

### DISTRICT COSROW REPRESENTATIVES

We are pleased to begin our work for the 1985-1988 quadrennium with a new structure for COSROW. We now have on the commission a representative from each of the 12 districts in our NC Conference. These members sit on the District Councils on Ministry (DCOM) as COSROW chairpersons and have the following responsibilities: 1) to relate the commission's concerns and programs to the DCOM; 2) to help implement programs directed to the districts; 3) to resource and assist local church COSROW chairpersons; and 4) to communicate district and local church concerns to the Conference commission.

#### LOCAL CHURCH REPRESENTATIVES AND JANUARY WORKSHOP TRAINING

The General Conference of 1984 made it possible for each local church to elect a Status and Role of Women chairperson as a member of the Administrative Board and the Council on Ministries or the Administrative Council. We are pleased with this action but are disappointed that across the NC Conference few churches have chosen to elect this officer. Some churches see themselves as already including women fully in leadership/worship/educational opportunities and responsibilities. We believe that every church, including these described, can benefit from the kind of self-evaluation that a Status and Role of Women work area can direct. We urge that every church in the NC Conference select this chairperson and put her to work. The Conference commission is eager to provide resources and instruction for any local church Status and Role of Women leader.

#### CHILD CARE

COSROW seeks to be faithful to our commitment and to the recommendation by the 1984 session of Annual Conference that child care be provided at district meetings and at the 1985 sessions of Annual Conference and Conference Summer School. Our district chairpersons continue to work through their DCOM's to offer this ministry at meetings on the district level. Child care is being offered at the Annual Conference for the first time during the 1985 session. Such an effort is an enormous one, and there are numerous difficulties yet to be resolved. It is apparent, however, that child care is a vital means for the inclusion of parents, especially mothers, in the total life of the church.

#### INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE

We are pleased that the course "Words that Hurt...Words that Heal" will be offered at the 1985 Conference Summer School. While the issue of inclusive language is an emotional and difficult one, it is essential that individuals and groups struggle with it and understand why it is important. In so doing, we will discover that it is possible, when we speak to and about each other as well as to and about God, to use words which are not strictly male-gender terms.

#### ETHNIC MINORITY WOMEN

Our commitment to the Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority focuses upon hopes for a leadership skill development seminar for ethnic minority women in 1986. We will work with the missional priority coordinating committee and with ethnic minority women to plan such an event.

#### WOMEN IN THE PULPIT

COSROW encourages every local church to utilize the leadership skills of women in worship by having a "Women in the Pulpit" Sunday. As a part of our concern for open itineracy, we particularly encourage churches of 300 or more members to have an ordained clergywoman preach during some major worship service during the year.

### BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

"And this they did - but first gave their own selves to the Lord, and unto us by the will of God." II Corinthians 8:5

Paul reported that the Macedonian Christians received the grace of God and out of their poverty responded liberally to others' needs. They ministered to the needs of other Christians through a financial gift. But, first, in order to prepare for this act of generosity, they gave themselves.

It is easier to give pennies than personality. We often give money without involving ourselves. The biblical basis for service is to first give ourselves to a need and then assist financially. This process is also affirmed as good stewardship.

Your Board of Stewardship exists in order to educate our people in the correct style of life and attitude of giving. It is to this end that we have given ourselves to serve the members of the local churches.

#### ORGANIZING THE BOARD

The first step was to organize ourselves (40 persons) so as to operate efficiently to carry out our mandate to serve the stewardship leaders of our local churches. An executive committee composed of 10 persons was created with the following concerns within stewardship assigned to specific persons.

Stewardship Education  
Proportionate Giving and Tithing  
Time and Abilities  
Christians/Financial Planning

Planned Giving  
Funding the Local Church  
Christian Life Style  
Economics and Management

A task force from within the board was organized to prepare a local



church manual to explain the process and to motivate pastors and leaders in developing discipleship within the members of all of our local churches. This material will be presented in 1986.

#### TRAINING IN STEWARDSHIP

Several training experiences are provided for each level of programming in order to raise the level of expertise in these areas. These include:

- A January Workshop class for training local church leaders in stewardship and finance.

- An SEJ Workshop for training the district director of stewardship.

- A Time/Stress Management Workshop was held for pastors in the Greenville District.

- An Interpretation Workshop in each district was resourced by the Board of Stewardship.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES WITHIN THE CONFERENCE

How to get programs implemented in the local church is the major concern of the Board. To expedite this process some lines of support were established to bring aid and resources to the local level at their request.

- Task Forces are named to respond to local church requests for implementation of programs.

- District Directors are trained to seek out needs and to respond to local church requests. Their initiative is applied toward developing district emphasis.

- COM staffperson in the Methodist Building will coordinate assistance for the local church (Call the Reverend Clyde Dunn at 832-9560).

- Board Committees concentrate on specific areas within stewardship: Stewardship Education - The Reverend Suzanna Helms, Chairperson; Funding the Local Church - The Reverend Johnny Branch, Chairperson; Giftedness - Ms. Lynn Thigpen, Chairperson; Christian Life Style - The Reverend Dr. Tommy Yow, Chairperson.

#### STEWARDSHIP FOCUS FOR 1985

Some special efforts, events and emphasis are being highlighted this year for special consideration by the Conference and the local church. These include:

- An effort to effectively use Conference funds and educate members on how they are used.

- A local church study on the biblical and theological basis for stewardship in a one night setting.

- An Ethnic Minority Stewardship Workshop.

- Encouragement and promotion of the Conference program on Planned Giving.

- Financial/Interpretation Workshops in each district.

- Stewardship education especially designed for children (a manual is available for this purpose).

- Tithing cells organized in local churches.

## Church School Evangelism and Extension

The Task Force on Church School Evangelism and Extension is proud to report that progress is being made across the Conference in the strengthening of existing Church Schools and in the starting of new ones.

Legislation was passed at the 1984 session of the NC Annual Conference asking each local church to participate in a program designed to improve Church School enrollment and attendance beginning this August. The program is called FETCH, which stands for Find, Encourage, Telephone, Cultivate, High Attendance. FETCH asks us all to celebrate a High Attendance Day on Sunday, October 13. The goal is for each church to increase its Church School enrollment 10% and attendance by 15% over 1984 by October 13. This can be done by each church in the Conference...but it won't happen without hard work. By now your church should be organized to make FETCH successful.

Each district has been asked to begin at least one new Church School as a mission project during 1985. Many districts have already begun the process and some have seen the need to begin more than one.

Each local church has been asked to consider starting new classes for those persons not now being reached by the church, such as young adults, single adults, the divorced, latch-key children, and persons with handicapping conditions. Each local church should start at least one new Church School class in 1985.

With this renewed emphasis in the NC Conference the 20-year decline in Church School enrollment and attendance will be reversed!

## FETCH

What is FETCH? It is an intentional method used to increase the enrollment and attendance in the local church program of Christian education, especially in the Sunday School. FETCH has been used successfully by churches of various sizes in the North Carolina Conference. It is not a contest; it is a movement. Its purpose is to increase the number on the roll rather than reduce it. Studies show that growing churches focus their attention on enrollment, the adding of new members to Sunday school classes.

Why have such a program? The Great Commission demands that we reach out and extend our teaching ministry to everyone. "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you." Matt. 28:19-20a. The Bible constantly underscores the need for growth in Christian maturity. See Eph. 4:15, Col. 1:10, I Pet. 2:2, 2 Pet. 3:18.

What is needed to make it work? For FETCH to work in your church it will take: 1) A congregation willing to make the Sunday School a major priority; 2) A pastor who participates in planning and promotion; 3) Attendance goals and promotion; 6) An ongoing program of visitation. If your members will commit themselves to these essentials FETCH will work for you.

How is it administered? A representative of each adult and youth class, the Pastor, the Church School Superintendent, the Education Chairperson, teachers, counselors, and others interested in the program of Christian education should take the lead. Even if you have an Education Work Area, you should name a FETCH Task Force with the above persons as members. This task force will want to make sure that adequate training is provided all workers.

What about the dates given for FETCH? There is a reason for the specific steps given in the program. There is also great merit in all



churches in the district and Conference following the same schedule. This program may be tailored according to the specific needs of your local church. You will want to plan a suitable kick-off for FETCH, including a service of dedication for workers and teachers.

What is you need help? Members of your district Task Force on Church School Evangelism and Extension and your Conference Council on Ministries staff will be available if you need help.

**FIND...August 18-31.** Compare the church roll book with class rolls and make a list of persons not now enrolled. Ask class members and church members to give the names of friends and family members not in a class at the present time. Enrollment is "the key" to growth. Have an area canvass.

**ENCOURAGE...September 1-14.** Write letters of welcome to all of the prospective class members identified during the "Find" campaign. Tell of the value of being part of an organized Christian fellowship which is committed to the study of our faith. Tell others about what is happening throughout the life of the local church.

**TELEPHONE...September 15-28.** Make one or more phone calls to every person who has been identified as a prospective class member. Make this a most personal call urging them to be a part of a class in the church.

**CULTIVATE...September 29-October 12.** Visit all persons identified as prospective class members. Visit all those who have shown an interest through steps F, E and T. Take copies of curriculum resources with you. Be enthusiastic as you share what is happening in the various classes in the church. "Enroll" persons at this time in a class.

**HIGH ATTENDANCE SUNDAY...October 13.** This is a day to celebrate! Each local church will be given a specific numerical goal by the District Task Force. On October 13, you will want to recognize all new class members. This is also Laity Sunday and a great time to recognize the place of persons serving as teachers, counselors and administrators. You will want to have a service of recognition and dedication for them.

## **FETCH Address to Annual Conference**

FETCH is a straight-forward effort to increase the enrollment and the attendance of the Sunday Schools in the North Carolina Conference. It is the purpose of the Task Force on Church School Evangelism and Extension to inspire pastors and laity to a new commitment to the teaching-learning ministry, and to bring about a greater enthusiasm for Sunday School growth, numerical and spiritual formation growth.

We have gone through two decades in which it has been popular to low rate the Sunday School as an arm of Christian education in the local church. I trust this period of debunking and selling short the Sunday School is over. There are signs that indicate this. It is a marvel that the Sunday School has survived as well as it has. Consider sociologists and religious analysis have almost delighted in saying that the Sunday School is the most wasted hour of the week. I am not here to cast stones, but in our colleges and seminaries there is not often heard an encouraging word about the school we call Sunday School.

It has come to pass that the teaching-learning ministry as found in our Sunday Schools is not considered a prime area of responsibility by the pastor. Pastor-Parish Relations Committees say, not with a bitter note, but with a yearning note, I wish our pastor would do more to encourage and inspire the work of the Sunday School.

Even the general church, I fear, has lowered its vision of the Sunday School movement. This can be seen in organization and reorganization of local church structure. On the Annual Conference level consider this: Until the late 1960's, two-thirds of the entire Conference staff were engaged in Christian Education ministries. In those days if we did not cut it in the church School, we were not considered effective. Then came the concept on the Annual Conference level and the local church concept of a Council on Ministries. Many good and great things have resulted from this structure but one net effect has been a lessening of time and effort of the teaching-learning ministry, especially in the Sunday Schools.

This is not an effort to blame anyone. As chairman of the NC Conference Board of Education at the time of the new structure, I helped dismantle all the old plans. Look at this on the local church level. Prior to 1968, one group in the local church that usually met regularly other than the Administrative Board, was the Commission on Education. This group usually met monthly to look after the concerns of the Sunday School and, of course, Christian Education in the local church. That was its prime concern. Now, when the Council on Ministries in the local church meets, all the concerns of the local church are considered. One item on a long

of the concerns of the Church School. Regular meetings of Sunday School officers and teachers have decreased. Workers' conferences of all those who teach or work in the Church School are unknown to some schools. In spite of all the forces that have converged to kill off the Sunday school, it has survived and I submit it is one of the healthiest groups in the local church, and in many places is the strategic base of discipleship and witness.

I submit that great things happen in the Sunday School. We need a new climate of concern for the teaching-learning ministries and for the Sunday School, a new spirit of encouragement for its mission, a commitment to its values. I trust you will not think I am tampering with the New Testament when I claim that Jesus began his public ministry by going to Sabbath School. He announces his mission as Messiah by reading from the book of Isaiah. The test was printed in the quarterly. Yes, I suggest that the results we desire in our Sunday Schools are similar to what took place in the Nazareth school that day. Dr. Luke describes the scene by telling us that after Jesus read from the book, he handed it over to one of the teachers and sat down. "All there fastened their eyes on Jesus." I take it that is our aim. Let me repeat the golden text again, "All there fastened their eyes on Jesus".

In 1970, we had 34,477 enrolled in our children's division; today, 23,192. In 1970, we had 23,481 enrolled in our youth division; today, 13,454. In 1970, we had 55,352 enrolled in our adult classes; today, 51,665. In 1970, our total enrollment was 126,352; today, we have 100,167. Average attendance in 1970 was 71,092 per Sunday. In 1984, the average was 50,328. To put this another way, 20,767 persons less hear about Christ and His Church on a given Sunday than in 1970.

In the Fayetteville District I wish I could report that the report is different. But I cannot. In 1984, we had 35 less on any given Sunday than in 1983. The challenging part of this is that if each Sunday School in the Fayetteville District had averaged just one more per Sunday, we could have reversed a 20-year downtrend.

For the Conference as a whole, we average 392 less on any given Sunday in 1984 than in 1983. And here again, if every Sunday School in the Conference had averaged only one more per Sunday, a 20-year downtrend would be reversed. But in the 1984 Conference report, there is the sign, and I consider it a "Johannine" sign. In 1984, we have more children enrolled in the Sunday School than we had in 1983 - 344 more, in fact, true for the first time in 19 years. I submit to you that often when God gets ready to do something great in His Church, He starts with children or even a child. May this "Johannine" sign be a beginning of a new movement in the Sunday School.

One of the centralities that we lay hold of is the certainty of the evangelistic mission of the Sunday School. Yes, the Sunday School is a school. It is a teaching-learning ministry. It is an agent of fellowship. It is for discipleship and spiritual formation. But also it is to reach out and bring others into the orbit of the love of God. I fear we have seen only the nurture purpose and not the outreach mission of the Sunday School. The Sunday School that is focused on its members only will in the very nature of the Christian life become less and less. A growing Sunday School is almost always focused out. Walter Towner said, "The Church School that is not evangelistic is not Christian." Please don't resist this. What if every Sunday School class had two roll books - one of its present members, another of prospective members. Every class from nursery to adult an evangelistic arm as well as a nurturing arm. If a class does not have a list of folks it is endeavoring to pray into that class, what does that say about the nature and mission of that class?

Arn and McGravin in their book *A NEW VISION OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL* say, "Outward-focused Sunday Schools in contrast to inward-focused Sunday schools, see evangelism and education as two sides of the same coin; two tasks to achieve one goal. Carrying out Christ's great commission, to reach and make disciples to lost people is the motivation for Christian education in most growing Sunday Schools."

Bishop Richard Wilke, in his first year as episcopal leader of the Arkansas Area, was asked early on about the loss of membership in the Arkansas area, 5% decline in the past four years. In his reply he told of what he did as pastor of First United Methodist Church in Wichita. I quote, "We tried 18 ways to grow in downtown Wichita and failed. Then we tried Sunday School and succeeded. We had nine adult classes 10 years ago. Now we have 19 adult classes with 700 adults." If we are going to be strong where we need to be strong, we will be clear that our purpose is nurture and outreach, education and evangelism, fellowship and witness. Not one or the other but both.

Take a look with me at four all important values of the Sunday School:

1) It is the No 1 evangelistic arm of the Untied Methodist Church. I am going over ground that you have been over before. I do so intentionally. This path is well-worn because it leads somewhere. Hear this: from 62% to 67% of those who have been received into the Church on profession of faith and first decisions for Christ have come through the Sunday School. This is true year after year. You say, "Oh, you're talking about children." Yes, but also about youth and adults. United Methodists have been surveying membership rolls to determine where we are losing members. Findings are revealing that we have no more losses than other years due to deaths. We are not losing members to other denominations. The fact is we are receiving more persons from other denominations than we are losing. Our losses are in the area of profession of faith and first decisions for Christ. This points to how strategic the Sunday School is as an evangelistic arm of the Church.

In 1967, we received into our Church in this Conference 4,309 persons on profession of faith. Three thousand one hundred and seventy-four of those came through our Sunday Schools. In 1983, the figures are: Persons by profession of faith 3,381; from the Sunday School, 2,200. There is some truth to the old proverb "As goes the Sunday School, so goes the Church." The Sunday School is the No. 1 evangelistic arm of the Church.

Last year, I asked one pastor of a small membership church, "What happened this year that brought you your greatest joy? He replied, "A 57 year old man in our adult Sunday School class professed faith in Jesus Christ. We baptized him and two members of his family. It was a great day for us."

2) The Fellowship of the Small Group. This can hardly be overemphasized. The place in the local church where there is the offer of fellowship and caring values of the small group for all ages every week is the Sunday School. Nothing in the way of small groups has the overall impact of Sunday School as this offers nurture and fellowship. Caring and support are experienced in the face to face give and take of small groups. Such can be provided in our Sunday Schools for all ages every week.

Our Church has just put out the first issue of a new publication under the title "People to People, Reaching out through the Sunday School." That such a sheet is being published is another sign of a new commitment to the values of the Sunday School. I quote from the first issue about a growing Sunday School, "Sunday School helps us communicate. We're like a family. We love each other. Sunday School binds us together." Fellowship deepens and intensifies in the class. Christian growth thrives in a climate of courageous caring such as can be found in a Sunday School class.

In a survey the largest single reason given by those who have returned to Sunday School is the need for Christian fellowship. Thirty-five percent of those who identified their reason for coming to a class listed Christian fellowship. I do not mean to say we can create Christian fellowship, rather I affirm it is our Lord's gift to us when we gather in His marvelous Name. One more thought on fellowship in the Sunday School class. A person who comes into membership in the church is less likely to become inactive if he or she finds and becomes a part of a Sunday School class. The Sunday School can help close the back door.

3) The Sunday School is the number one school in the church's teaching-learning ministry, save only the Christian home. Critics argue that often it is not much of a school. But a great deal does occur in the Sunday School. One of the purposes of the church School is to help persons understand the Christian faith and heritage that comes to us through the Bible and the church. And this biblical church heritage is passed on in a teaching-learning ministry. How does a person who does not know about Jesus respond to him? I am aware that we can know about Jesus and not know Jesus. But persons of all age groups will hear about Jesus in the Sunday School. Over fifty thousand persons next Sunday will hear about our Lord all the way from the nursery to adult classes. There is a knowledge dimension, a content dimension to the gospel of Jesus Christ. Christian disciples are called to know and to feel. The Sunday School at its best is a teaching-learning community.

Father John Wesley urged the people called Methodists to unite the two so long divided: learning and vital piety.

I arrived at a small frame church for Sunday School. The men's Bible class consisted of perhaps 12-14 persons present. Class business was presented, offering taken. Then a retired school principal got up and cracked open the lesson. It was on Romans, but he had a grasp on it. Then he involved the class in discussion - not sharing of ignorance, but a discussion on the points in the lesson. He summed it up. We all read the key verse and prayed together. A meaningful, stimulating session. I said to myself, "Any person in this entire community would be a better person and a stronger disciple by taking part in this class. The Sunday School is

the number one arm of the teaching-learning ministry. Let's get on with it!

4) The Sunday School is where leaders are developed. Leaders are not made, they are grown. We have in the Sunday Schools nearly 12,000 persons who are in action every week - EVERY WEEK!!! Where does the laity study and lead and act every week? Basic training in church leadership so often begins in the Church School. Few other organized groups for all age groups meet every week. But in the Sunday School teachers study, leaders prepare, class officers function, plans are made.

I remember a poised and radiant woman leading and speaking to a large group. In the course of her speech she told that she got her start by leading a devotional period in a Sunday School class. One young adult man told me that a highlight of the week for him was the person who spoke at the opening assembly of the adult division. If we are going to be strong where we need to be strong in the development of lay leadership, I submit that the laity is in action every week in the Sunday School. Where else are we giving 12,000 persons leadership positions which offer opportunities for the laity every week to lead and grow and reach out?

FETCH is a straight-forward, very simple plan to increase enrollment and attendance in our Sunday Schools. We have some high goals. The foundation blocks are fellowship and caring. Please do with me a bit of possibility thinking. Let's do this in order to help us see that goals can be achieved.

If every Sunday School averaged one more person present each Sunday than last year, we would reverse a 20 year trend and show an increase. Or if in each district we organized 10 new Sunday School classes, 10 new classes, we would have 120 over the Conference. If each new class averaged 10 persons present per Sunday, and we just held our own in all other classes, we would not only reverse a 20 year trend, we would have the most persons enrolled and in attendance hearing about Jesus than we have had in three years.

Try this one. If each Sunday School in our Conference increased its enrollment by five, yes, just five, we would have the highest enrollment we have had in six years. If we organized one new Sunday School in each district and that new school averaged 40 persons present, we would turn our decreases into increases.

We have set enrollment month for September and a high attendance day for October 13. Each Sunday School will be given a goal. Consider: If each Sunday School would take its high attendance in 1984 and increase that by three on October 13, we would have more persons in Bible study on that day than we have had on any one Sunday in eight years. Let these possibilities thrill your souls! When persons hear about Him, some always fall in love with Him. And others fall more in love with Him.

Would you say to me - Herman, much thinking about the Sunday School has made you mad. Then I say to you, I would that you were as I am about the Sunday School save for these losses and chains of debate. I do not appeal to Caesar, I do not wish to go to Rome. It is enough for me to make a case before our Bible-believing Bishop, to my colleagues in the Cabinet, to my brothers and sisters in the covenant ministry, to my lay brothers and sisters in Christ. I say, let there be in the year 1985 a mighty movement in the Sunday School. Let this not be an emphasis but a movement. Knights of the cross, there is no need to gather around the washbowl of Pilate and wring our hands over the Sunday School. Great things happen in the Sunday School. In the Sunday School we read and study about the mighty acts of God, but more, we are a celebrating community in which the mighty acts of God are performed.

Let not this FETCH program be just a program and one more set of reports. Let it be the year of the Sunday School, a new movement in the teaching-learning ministry.

In the matchless name of Jesus Christ, let our Church School be a place where the weak grow strong and the strong grow great.

Hallelujah! Amen!

## Council on Children's Ministries

### COMPOSITION

The Conference Council on Children's Ministries is composed of 27 persons including 12 district coordinators, 13 representatives from conference divisions and committees, and two at-large members. The council meets twice each conference year, and committees meet at other times as needed.

### PURPOSE



The purpose of the council is to strengthen the children's ministry in local churches and districts of the NC Annual Conference.

#### PROGRAMS

Teaching, Learning and Caring Teams (TLC) for leaders of children continue to be an important part of our work. Fourteen churches or groups of churches have used TLC Team persons in a variety of ways including curriculum consultation, teacher training workshops, creative activities courses, etc.

The TLC Team annual training event was held overnight at Camp Chestnut Ridge in March, 1985. Twenty-eight persons have contracted to fill at least two assignments this year. These committed leaders may be required by a local church or a group of churches to lead in an event by contacting Children's Ministries, P O Box 10955, Raleigh, NC 27605 (919) 832-9560 or 1-800-621-5467.

A Children's Ministries resource book is being prepared by the CCOM. Designed to provide practical help in 12 areas of children's ministry, the booklet will be ready in Fall 1985. Churches may request a copy along with a consultation by one of the TLC Team members.

TLC Team members will offer leadership for the course "Evangelism in the Church School - Teaching Children" at Conference Summer School, August 1985.

Focus '85 - a national conference on ministry with children with the theme "Children, The Word and The World" will have four CCOM representatives attend its July meeting in Nashville, TN.

Children's Service Fund: We are very proud of our accomplishments in this area of Christian Missions. In 1984, \$2,424.00 was given by churches to the Children's Service Fund.

### Council on Youth Ministries

#### COMPOSITION

The Conference Council on Youth Ministries (CCYM) is composed of both youth and adults. Membership includes the 12 adult district coordinators, the five elected Conference youth officers, the seven at-large members chosen by the five elected Conference youth officers, one youth from each district elected by district caucuses at A. C. S., and four junior high youth chosen by participants at Junior High events.

#### PURPOSE

The purpose of the council shall be to strengthen the youth ministry in local churches and districts of the NC Annual Conference.

#### PROGRAMS AND EVENTS

Under the present chairperson, the Reverend Marshall R. Old, the following programs and events were held: LASER (Legislative Affairs: Study, Explore, Respond); United Nations/Washington Study Tour; Junior High Weekend; Rally Day; Appalachian Trail Hike; Youth Music Workshop and Concert Tour; Junior High Workshop; Senior High Workshop; Annual Conference Session (A. C. S.); Senior High Weekend; Human Sexuality Weekend.

#### TRAINING

The council is also responsible for conducting numerous training workshops in the area of youth ministry in local churches across the conference. Resource persons for retreat programming are also available.

#### YOUTH SERVICE FUND

We are proud of the accomplishments of NC Conference youth in the area of Christian missions. Giving to the Youth Service Fund totaled \$17,964.48 in 1984. Six missional projects in our Conference and an additional five out-of-conference projects were funded.

### Council on Young Adult Ministries

#### COMPOSITION

The Conference Council on Young Adult Ministries is composed of the District Coordinators of Young Adult Ministries, and either one lay or clergy person from each district so that there is one lay person and one clergy person from each district. Our new quadrennial organization includes an executive committee to help guide the work of the council.

#### PURPOSE

The purpose of the council is to provide programs and events for young adults and to promote young adult ministries on the local and district levels.

#### PROGRAMS

During the previous year the Conference Council on Young Adult Ministries has offered to Conference young adults a spiritual enrichment weekend at the Ramada Inn, Atlantic Beach, centered around the theme, "Invitation to Practice". Wallace Chappell, formerly of the Board of Discipleship, was our key resource person. Additionally, the Conference Council on Young Adult Ministries co-sponsored a Single/Single Again Retreat also at Atlantic Beach. These events were February 8-10 and May 3-5 respectively. The council is also considering ways to strengthen young adult work on the local level. Currently, a training lab for young adult workers is being planned for the spring of 1986. Another goal is the placing of resource material into the hands of young adult leaders through the coordinated mailings. The feeling of the council is that a great area of ministry stands before us in which we hope, by God's grace, to effectively serve for the strengthening of the church and the people.

### Council on Adult and Family Life Ministries

The Adult and Family Council is excited about the ministries planned for 1985. Due to conflicts in scheduling leadership, the Council is planning to offer a leadership training event later in 1985 for a new program designed by the Board of Discipleship entitled "Celebrate Marriage". This is an entry-level marriage enrichment program intended to introduce couples in the local church to marriage enrichment. The Board of Discipleship will be certifying leaders and are encouraging pastors and interested lay persons to seek certification. Details will be forthcoming.

By the time this report is distributed our Single/Single Again Retreat will have been completed. This event was entitled, FAITH: Friendships Affirming Intimacy, Trust and Hope. The Reverend Willie Teague, who has been involved with the Jurisdictional leadership team since its beginning, was the featured leader. He was assisted by Dr. Michael L. Hale. This is a growing ministry within our Conference.

In November the Council is planning a Family Enrichment retreat built on the program, "Understanding Us" designed by Dr. Patrick Carnes. This event will help families discover those special qualities which make them a family. Families will have an opportunity to celebrate their uniqueness.

The Council is assisting the Board of Education in planning an Older Adult Symposium in November. The theme for the one-day event will be "An Affirmation of Aging". We are planning an exciting event and look forward to this ministry.

The Adult and Family Council is appreciative of the support of the Council on Ministries and especially the Board of Education.

#### TASK FORCE ON CRISIS AND FAMILY LIFE

At the 1980 Session of the Annual Conference, a resolution was passed that "the Bishop and Cabinet shall appoint a special task force to investigate and make recommendations as to how, as an Annual Conference we can design and implement creative and effective ministries and resources in response to the crisis in Family Life in our nation".

The report of the task force to the 1981 Annual Conference outlined six areas of concern which included: 1) Investigating Needs; 2) Providing resources; 3) Leadership Development; 4) Focus on the Ethnic Minority Local Church and Family Life; 5) Focus on the Family Life Component of Strengthening the local Church for Evangelistic Mission in the World; 6) Focus on the National Youth Ministry Organization concern for family life and youth.

Investigation of needs has been a difficult task. Informally, many persons have indicated that there are great needs in the area of family life but a formal survey proved to be unsuccessful. A one-page survey of needs was devised and sent to pastors and family coordinators in two districts, but only a few persons took the time to complete and return them. Some means to assess needs should be devised in the future.

There are now many resources available to churches in the area of marriage and family life. A list of materials is to be available from the Conference office in the area. The Methodist Children's Home has expanded its ministry in this area, at the direction of the Annual Conference in 1979, with the establishment of the Family Life department in 1984.

Continuing leadership development, the Conference Council on Ministries, through the work of the Board of Education and the assistance of the Adult and Family Council, has provided for training and certification opportunities in the area of marriage and family enrichment for the past three years.

Although the numerical response to family life in the Ethnic Minority Local Church was minimal, the results proved to be interesting. A meeting



for members and ministers of Black churches was held in Fayetteville at John Wesley United Methodist Church, October 9, 1982. We learned that family life has been going through a transition in the Black church but not as dramatically as that of predominantly White churches. Most of the participants were concerned that many Black families were adopting the values of white middle-class families.

Native American churches were invited to a similar meeting on November 7, 1982 at Prospect United Methodist Church. The results of this gathering proved to be an affirmation of the Native American family rather than a focus on problems. Native American families and churches in our Conference experience a positive view of the family.

Programatically, the task force was not as successful as it could have been, but we do think that the very existence of the task force brought some important attention to the issues of family life. The Conference Council on Ministries, and particularly the Board of Education and the Adult and Family Council have been increasingly supportive of family issues. The issue of Singles and Single Again persons, and the single parent family is one of the most critical, if not the most critical issues in family life today. The Southeastern Jurisdiction has had a strong program in this area in recent years.

The original motion of the 1980 Annual Conference charged the Task Force on Crisis in Family Life with "making recommendations as to how an Annual Conference can design and implement creative and effective ministries and resources..." Through the normal structure of our church and conference we have the means to fulfill this charge. We need to insure that the structure is open and sensitive to the concerns of our Conference in the area of family life.

## Hunger/Human Need

World hunger has been on the minds and hearts of our United Methodists in eastern North Carolina, especially during 1984 and 1985. We gave \$191,170.56 for Africa hunger relief and \$51,832.47 for general hunger ministries world-wide through the UMCOR Hunger Advance.

Plans are being made to promote a conference-wide World Hunger Advance, using the fish bank of UMCOR during Lent of 1986.

This Conference cares about world hunger, but is being challenged to do much more than before.

Further, this Conference demonstrates concern for hunger and poverty in eastern North Carolina where unemployment is still high and many are still economically deprived. In 1984, \$82,500.00 was appropriated from central funds to be granted by the Task Force on Hunger/Human Need. Fifty-seven hunger/human need ministries from each of our 12 districts asked for a total of \$181,194.00 to help to feed, to clothe, to provide shelter, to provide medical care, to provide transportation, to provide fuel and utilities, to secure employment, to provide other services and substances for emergency and continuing circumstances of basic survival and human dignity; \$82,500.00 was granted to those 57 ministries.

One hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000.00) was requested by the task force for 1985 and granted.

The Task Force on Hunger/Human Need is grateful to be a part of helping this Conference to reach out beyond and next door to persons hungry, poor and deprived... "In as much as ye have done it unto one of the least of these..."

## A Quadrennial Congregational Development and Church Growth Report

The Annual Conference of 1984 approved a Quadrennial Conference-Wide Congregational Development and Church Growth Plan for establishing new churches and revitalizing existing congregations to win new disciples, reclaim inactive members and nurture all members.

This has been in operation since the fall of 1984 with the following events and accomplishments:

1. Conference-wide training and information meeting in November.
2. Wide-Area Long-Term Trends Analysis and Profile Study of every local church, giving population trends, membership changes, and financial strength over a period of 13 years, from 1970 to 1983.
3. District Teams have been established in all 12 districts and at least three meetings have been held by each. At least 16 persons serve on each team.

4. The Conference committee met in February in Goldsboro to hear reports from all districts. At that meeting the following projects, information, and plans were reported:

A. Three dominant trends emerged:

1) churches are planning an extensive public relations attempt to raise the image, vision, and optimism relative to the good things going on in the churches. The gist is "to get the story out".

2) Six districts propose to consider realignment of some charges in order to strengthen the base for ministry and fellowship.

3) Thirteen areas were identified by five districts as considered sites for new congregations.

B. A variety of projects already begun: One district is conducting an extensive study of three counties and their needs. All churches on another district are doing a self-study with such to conclude with a mission statement. One district adopted goals dealing with the establishment of three Sunday School extensions. Another district has undertaken a concerted effort to develop lay ministries and lay involvement in all levels of ministry. One district has divided itself into four sub-districts as study teams. A metropolitan district conducted a thorough study of population changes and the influence these changes have on the churches. The other districts are involved in realignments, self-studies, and new church planting.

5. This year of 1985 shall be spent in further explorations by the district. In the fall another Conference committee meeting will be held to consider Conference-wide projects to be presented to the programming process for 1987 by the CCOM.

b. For your information. The Wide-Area Trends Analysis and Local Church Profile of Membership, Attendance, and Finances, conducted by ACTS, Association for Christian Training and Service, turned up the following:

- All but 3 of our 56 counties of the NC Conference experienced a population increase, totaling (for the 53) 15.7% or 385,816.

- The churches in those counties had a gain of 1.3% - From 1970 to 1983 our Conference received 41,258 new members on confession of faith, a number that exceeds the total membership of any one of 10 other United Methodist Conferences in the USA.

- Of the churches studies (804), 364 gained 23,131 and 441 churches lost 18,044 members.

- This study documented the following: 30 churches gained 6,690 members; 90 gained 10,518; 99 churches gained 4,369; and 145 gained 1,554 members; 93 lost 7,216; 84 lost 4,095; 137 churches lost 5,074; and 127 churches lost 1,664.

- Overall losses cannot be attributed to loss of population.

- The highest gain in population occurred in Dare County (91.2%) with the resident churches gaining only 4.5% Orange County had a gain of 33.9% in population but a 2.3% gain in church members.

- Overall, the ethnic minority population constitutes one-third (33.1%) of the population of the Conference. Warren County has the highest concentration of ethnic minorities, 63.7%. Dare County is lowest with 6.8% of the total.

- According to projected population increase in our 56 counties, if we maintained the current ratio of members to population, by the year 2000, our overall membership increase should be 43,000. The same theoretical increase applied to the past 12 years would have given us 32,022 more members. We gained only 2,688. This means that our strategy for growth needs to be carefully analyzed.

## THE BOARD OF WORSHIP

The Board of Worship met at Methodist College August 17 and 18, 1984 to begin the planning process of its quadrennial work. The board agreed to continue its yearly publication of our lectionary aid booklet. An Arts Festival was planned for September of 1985, and a workshop on supplemental worship resources was planned in conjunction with Duke Divinity School Office of Continuing Education and the Western NC Conference Board of Worship. February 1, 1985, a consultation on "Baptism, Eucharist, and Ministry" was held at Duke Divinity School in conjunction with the North Carolina and western NC Commissions on Christian Unity, Boards of Ordained Ministry and Boards of Worship. The board has analyzed the results of the Worship survey which are a part of this report. The work of the board for the remainder of the quadrennium will reflect our interpretation of the survey. The board was asked to design the worship services for the Bishop's Seminar on the Ministry and was pleased to have the opportunity to

design inclusive worship services. The question of the relationship between spiritual formation and worship has been identified as a major issue to be addressed during this quadrennium.

#### 1984 WORSHIP SURVEY

In January of 1984, the Conference Board of Worship, in conjunction with the Western NC Conference, distributed a survey designed to summarize worship practices throughout the Conference and to discover ways that the Board of Worship could better serve the pastors.

Three hundred and eighty nine completed surveys were returned giving a broad sampling of worship practices in the conferences. The following is a brief summary of the survey results.

Worship ministry (preaching and worship leadership) was ranked most important to the respondents, with pastoral ministry, outreach ministry, education ministry, and administrative ministry trailing in that order. Consistent with these priorities, the majority of the respondents have taken conference and/or district level continuing education courses in worship.

The great majority (86.9%) of the ministers plan every act of worship or every act of worship except the anthem. Only 8% of the pianists, 19% of the organists and 32% of the choir directors help in planning worship.

About 20% of the churches use a "Word and Table" type format with the sermon preceding the offering.

Just as one pattern of worship seems to predominate, so does a set of common "acts of worship". Sixty percent or more of our respondents usually use a Call to Worship, Invocation, three hymns, Silent Prayer, Prayer Requests, Pastoral Prayer, Responsive Reading, Apostles' Creed, Announcements, Gloria Patri, Offering, Anthem, Doxology, one or more scripture lessons, Sermon, Children's Sermon/Time, Invitation to Christian Discipleship, Benediction, and Choral or Congregational Response. There is some variety in the types of prayers and in the number of scripture lessons used.

There is widespread emphasis on the Church Year, especially Lent/Easter and Advent/Christmas. Surprisingly, Pentecost Day is widely celebrated (77.4%). Laity Sunday (79.7%) and Revivals (85.6%) are celebrated almost as widely as the seasons of Lent and Advent. Mother's Day, Father's Day, Homecoming, and Thanksgiving are "secular" holidays with general observance in our churches.

Scripture remains central to our worship. One scripture passage is usually used by 49.6% of the pastors; 35.5% report reading two, and 20.8% report three (some checked more than one answer). Fifty-seven and nine-tenths percent always or generally select scripture readings from the lectionary and larger percentages always or generally relate scripture to either the church year or to the sermon topic for the Sunday. Use of the lectionary is more common among younger pastors and pastors serving churches with average attendance of more than 100.

Formal sermon evaluation is largely neglected. Ninety-one percent rely on informal comments from laity while, 43.3% listen to the recorded sermon, and only 15.2% use organized methods of obtaining feedback. The most used resources for sermon preparation are as follows (in descending order of popularity): commentaries, translations, THE INTERPRETER'S BIBLE, concordance, previous sermons, sermon periodicals, INTERPRETER'S DICTIONARY OF THE BIBLE, sermons by other ministers, Greek word study, study with other ministers, and Hebrew word study (35 out of 389!).

The traditional baptismal service (#828 in the BOOK OF HYMNS) is used by 89.9% of the pastors. Only 12.6% use the baptismal ritual in the SUPPLEMENTAL WORSHIP RESOURCES series. 93.3% have baptized by sprinkling in the last two years, while only 16.5% have used immersion and 10.8% pouring. 90% have preached on baptism at least once in the last two years. There is one area of significant division. 39.1% have performed rebaptisms and 45.0% report they would rebaptize if requested to do so. Of the ministers under 40, 23.4% have rebaptized and 28.2% would rebaptize if requested. Of the ministers 40 or over, 49.8% have rebaptized and 53.6% would rebaptize if requested. 29% of the elders have rebaptized and 31.6% would rebaptize if requested. Of the elders who would rebaptize, 24% are under 40 and 78% are 40 or over.

A plurality of churches (48.6%) celebrate Holy Communion 1-5 times per year; 33.4% celebrate it 6-11 times and 16.7% celebrate it 12 or more times (including a third of the Black or Native American pastors). The traditional short form is most used, though the communion text in the SUPPLEMENTAL WORSHIP RESOURCES series has wider use (28.3%) than does the baptismal ritual in that same series (see above). Of the pastors under 40, 37% use the supplemental communion text; of the pastors 40 or over, 22.7% use the supplemental text. It is common to preach on the meaning of the sacrament, 95.6% having done so at least once in the previous two years.

In the great majority of churches (93.6%) children take part in worship by serving as acolytes. Children's sermons (84.1%) and children's choirs (76.9%) are also common during worship. In 16.7% of the churches, the children attend a separate "children's church". In all of these churches, however, children also participate in the main worship service during a "children's time" or as acolytes or choir members.

Youth appear to be less involved in worship-leading experiences than children. In 72% of the churches youth serve as ushers. Fewer churches have youth serving as acolytes (62.5%) but 43.7% do use youth as readers.

The statistics indicate that worship is primarily seen as an adult activity. Out of the total church family, adults attend worship in the largest percentages, followed by children and finally youth. Only 25% of the churches had a youth worship attendance rate of 51% or better, whereas 41.4% of the churches had an adult attendance rate of 51% or better. Adults were involved most commonly as choir members and readers (both 97.2%), ushers (96.9%), musicians (83.3%), and lay speakers (81.5%).

Lay adults are educated about worship by the senior pastor in 96.9% of the churches, with the Worship work area doing the same in 47% of the churches. The senior pastor is somewhat less involved in educating youth and children in worship, although the pastor remains more responsible for educating youth (90%) and children (88.7%) than does the youth coordinator (64.3%) and children's coordinator (62%).

The means of education most used by churches to instruct their children (79.7%) and youth (76.9%) in worship is the confirmation class, followed by Sunday School and acolyte training in that order. Education for adults comes primarily through the Sunday School in 64.5% of the churches. In the majority of churches the choir program (62.7%) and instruction during worship itself (6.4%) provided additional adult education. For the adults, Sunday School and choir became the replacement for confirmation and acolyte training as the place to receive worship education.

THE BOOK OF HYMNS (the United Methodist Hymnal) is used in nearly all (97.7%) of the churches, with the COKEBURY HYMNAL running a distant second at 4.8%. Only 1.8% are using the new SUPPLEMENT TO THE BOOK OF HYMNS and 5.4% (including all of the Black respondents) are using the new SONGS OF ZION hymnal. A few use the UPPER ROOM HYMNAL and others.

The most popular procedures for teaching new hymns to the congregation are: using a new hymn as a choir anthem (used by 60.2% of the churches), Hymn of the Month (27.5%), and Song Sundays (19.0%). 17.5% of the respondents do not use any method for teaching new hymns.

Adult choirs are found in most (94.1%) of the churches, children's choirs are the next most common (62.0%) followed by youth choirs (42.7%). Handbell choirs are found in 11.6% of the churches.

Pianos are the most often used musical instrument in worship (97.2%); electronic organs are used by 73.8% of the churches and pipe organs by only 16.7%. 12.1% use handbells. Guitars are the most popular non-keyboard instrument, used by 64.0%, followed by brass instruments at 35.2%.

By far, the training most asked for by the respondents was in Involving Lay People in worship (45.8%). 25% to 30% of the respondents asked for training in Children in Worship, Creative Use of the Hymnal, Resources for Preparation, and youth in Worship. Other areas checked by over 20% of the respondents included Introduction to the Theology and Practice of Worship, Planning of Worship Services, Observance of the Church Year, Sermon Preparation, Theology and Practice of Baptism, use of New Worship Resources, and Media in Worship.

Involving Lay People in Worship was also the training pastors most often requested for their lay people (60.4%) with Observance of the Church Year included (in descending order): Introduction to the Theology and Practice of Worship, Theology and Practice of the Lord's Supper, Theology and Practice of Baptism, Introduction to the New Music and Hymns, Use of the Hymnal, Evaluation of Sermons, Children and Worship, Development of Worship Aids, and Youth in Worship. The pastor, choir director, choir members, organist or pianist, ushers, worship committee members and church school teachers were listed by at least 50% of the pastors as people who would benefit from additional training.

The final question in the survey pertains to matters that enable people with handicapping conditions to participate in worship. The slight majority of churches now provide wheelchair access to the sanctuary (55.3%). Tape ministry for shut-ins is provided by 45.5% and large print Bibles/devotional books by 39.6%.

## COMMITTEE ON COURTESIES AND RESOLUTIONS REPORT

We began our 160th Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference in historic manner by singing "And Are We Yet Alive". This was intended as a paean of praise and thanksgiving that God has blessed us and enabled us to meet again in His name with joy.

Often we sing it so perfunctorily that it seems more like a dirge. This year we gathered with hope and enthusiasm under the brotherly and supportive leadership of Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr.

We welcome with enthusiasm Bishop Minnick and his charming associate in ministry, Mary Ann Minnick. We anticipate with pleasure many years in spiritual partnership.

Bishop Minnick has set the tone for a joyous, but genuinely Wesleyan Conference by the Bible Study with which we began each morning, and the excellent preaching of Bishop Emerson Colaw with which we climaxed each evening. We thank God for Bishop Colaw's challenge to the candidates for ordination, and his challenge to each of us to hope in God and believe in the possibility of a better world through the power of Christ available to each of us, and to all of us.

We would pray that all of us might share the enthusiasm and the vision of Christ and His Church evidenced by the 15 persons ordained as deacons, the 8 persons ordained as elders, and the one consecrated for Diaconal Ministry.

In a message to the Council of Bishops, Bishop Richard B. Wilke is reported to have lamented that negative factors in United Methodists threaten continued decline, and possible death of the church unless positive changes are effected. He stated publicly his doubt that the Methodist Churches could double their membership as proposed by the General Conference in 1984, and perceived a growing decline.

We are pleased to report new vitality discernable in our Conference as evidenced by strong reports on the renewal of the Church School and positive expectations of growth; plans for accelerating emphasis on Church Growth and membership cultivation; and the greater emphasis on the importance of the ministry of the laity.

Twelve churches were recognized for the largest number of persons received on profession of faith. These have set an example in church growth and discipleship.

The persons recognized as District Lay Persons of the year in each district, along with Mrs. Charles Saunders of the Elizabeth City District, give evidence of growing involvement in the total ministry of life and talents.

We thank God for the faithful service of the 22 pastors who retired at this session, representing more than 600 years of ministerial service to the United Methodist Church. This is the largest number to have retired at any North Carolina Conference Annual Conference.

In loving acknowledgement of years of service, we recognized the eleven ministers and seven minister's wives who have died since last we met. The Reverend Judi Smith challenged us to walk forward resting on Jesus' promise, "I will be with you always".

We learned of exciting things our churches are doing in ministry, from tornado relief, to potatoe projects, to new chapel construction at Louisburg. New ventures in ministry by Conference agencies and local churches piqued out interest, and demonstrated ways we each could serve more effectively.

We would be remiss should we fail to express our appreciation to Dr. Elton Hendricks and his associates at Methodist College for the careful preparation and the willing hospitality extended to each of us. We thank Dr. James H. Bailey and the pastors and laity of the Wilmington District for serving as our host district, and doing it well. We thank Bill Norton and members of the press for the communication services which support the Conference, almost without our perception of their presence.

In a successful Annual Conference, which this has been, a host of people work around the clock that we might meet without interruption. To each of these persons we wish to express our appreciation, understanding that their service may be unnoticed by us, but is certainly known to God, in whose name we gather.

Few know, or understand the hours of faithful work that are represented by the labors of Mrs. Troy (Robbie) Barrett and Mrs. Maness (Vivian) Mitchell in the preparation of voluminous reports and the transcription of the Conference Minutes. To these and their helpers we express appreciation.

As we part, let us take a moment to state our thanks to one or more of those who serve us before we rush back to our varied assignments. Let us give careful attention to the reading of the appointments aware that this

first appointive action of Bishop Minnick represents for him and for us a new beginning. Let us depart with the same enthusiasm which has been proclaimed regularly from this pulpit, that we may confidently expect what we often profess, that when reports are made at the 161st Annual Conference Session, we may honestly report, "These are the best reports we have ever made".

## BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

We are excited about the new directions in Diaconal Ministry. We now have a CANDIDACY JOURNAL for all new diaconals going through the candidacy process. In order to facilitate this process four persons were trained this spring as spiritual mentors for those in the diaconal program. These persons are Martha Garrick, William Weisser, Carol Dell and Phyllis Gantz.

This is a counterpart of the supervising pastor of those in the ordained ministry.

We elected new officers for this quadrennium. Chairperson - Phyllis Gantz, Vice-Chairperson - Dennis Goodwin, and Secretary - Brigitte Freeman. The officers along with our Cabinet Representative, James C. P. Brown, and our Director of Ministerial Relations/Diaconal Ministry Registrar, Joseph B. Bethea, met in Atlanta last fall in an interpretation event concerning the new HANDBOOK FOR THE BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY.

On March 28, a representative from the General Board was with all the diaconals, those considering Diaconal Ministry, and the Board of Diaconal Ministry, to interpret the 1984 General Conference changes in the DISCIPLINE and to look at future directions for Diaconal Ministry.

We have begun consultation with the Board of Ordained Ministry regarding the Ministerial Education Fund. We look forward to future cooperation between the two boards.

Our board recommends support from the Annual Conference for the amendment concerning vote for Diaconal Ministers in the Annual Conference. Voting status would be provided for Diaconal Ministers as is the vote for presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Youth Fellowship, etc. (DISCIPLINE, Par. 35, Article 1)

We continue to work directly with 13 church educators and 12 church musicians who are certified as Directors of Christian Education or Music. We work closely with 18 Diaconal Ministers. Their consecration to the office of Diaconal Ministry is the church's recognition of God's call, the individual's response to that call, and the authorization of such persons for designated service and ministry.

We recommend the consecration to Diaconal Ministry of Brigitte Freeman and we welcome the following persons into our Annual Conference as Diaconal Ministers: Carol Dell at the Epworth UMC in Durham from the Minnesota Conference, Carol Denise Conner at University UMC in Chapel Hill from the South Georgia Conference; Directors of Christian Education: Kimberly Perdue at Long Memorial UMC in Roxboro who is newly certified; and Director of Music: Susan Parker at St. Luke's UMC in Sanford who transferred from the Western North Carolina Conference.

## JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY

The Joint Committee on Disability acts as the advocate of those ministers in the North Carolina Conference who are forced by physical or emotional disability to seek temporary or permanent relief from their appointment. The committee is given the responsibility to study the problems of disability within the Conference, to provide a continuing personal ministry to those who are disabled, and to make recommendations to the appropriate agencies of the Conference for each minister seeking Disability Leave, including the source of their disability income.

The following recommendations are presented to the 1985 session of the North Carolina Conference:

1. The Joint Committee on Disability will make available upon request the necessary forms for any minister to make application for Disability Leave. In all cases the applications must be completed by the minister, the physician, and the district superintendent before the request for Disability Leave can be acted upon. It is the recommendation of the Joint Committee on Disability that such requests be presented before May 15 for inclusion in the committee's report to the Annual Conference.
2. The Joint Committee on Disability may require psychological examinations when deemed necessary by the committee. These will be done by a physician approved by the committee, and in such a case the committee may share the expense of the examination in an amount not to exceed \$100.00.
3. The Joint Committee on Disability will study each application for Disability Leave submitted by ministers of the Conference to determine the recommendation of the minister's physician and district superintendent, particularly as it reflects the anticipated length of the minister's disability. The medical reports will be sent to the medical consultant of the Joint Committee on Disability for an interpretation of the minister's disabling conditions. The General Board's medical consultant will determine if the minister is eligible for benefits paid through the Comprehensive Protection Plan. From July, 1981 to December, 1981, disability benefits were paid through new coverage under the Disability and Survivor Benefit Fund of the General Board of Pensions as adopted by the 1981 Session

of the Annual Conference. Beginning on January 1, 1982, disability benefits from the General Board of Pensions were transferred to coverage under the new Comprehensive Protection Plan.

4. We recommend that ministers who may not be eligible for benefits paid by the Comprehensive Protection may be placed on Disability Leave with benefits paid through the Emergency Relief Fund. The Joint Committee on Disability, in reviewing the minister's application, may recommend a short-term leave with benefits equal to (or less than) those provided by the Comprehensive Protection Plan. This could include a monthly benefit based on 40% of the Denominational Average Salary and the cost of the minister's coverage under the Conference insurance program of hospitalization and life insurance.
5. We recommend that an interim monthly grant of \$250.00 will be made for the first five months a minister is granted Disability Leave with benefits paid through the Comprehensive Protection Plan. This grant would be terminated during the five months period if the minister began to receive Social Security benefits.
6. The Joint Committee on Disability will review the progress of each minister on Disability Leave at least annually. This review will include both recommendations from the minister's physician and district superintendent as well as opportunities for continuing fellowship with the minister to develop further possibilities of assistance in his/her disabled circumstances. Those receiving aid from the Emergency Relief Fund will be reviewed at the end of their first six months of Disability Leave.
7. We recommend that the expenses of travel, telephone, postage, and other materials for the committee be paid from the Emergency Relief Fund.
8. We recommend the following ministers to be placed on Disability Leave for the first time:
  - A. Herbert Franklin Horne
  - B. A. Kimsey King, Jr.
9. We recommend the following ministers to be continued on Disability Leave:
  - A. Clingman Carter Capps
  - B. Frederick F. Dillon (AM)
  - C. Paul Wesley Evans (AM)
  - D. William H. Farmer (AM)
  - E. Robert Norman Knight
  - F. Robert Fulton McKee
  - G. Evander Parnell (AM)
10. We recommend that ministers and congregations in the communities in which our disabled ministers reside seek to establish a supportive relationship with those on Disability Leave to maintain good fellowship and provide for pastoral opportunities. It is further recommended that housing needs and other special problems of our disabled ministers be considered by these congregations and communities in the light of the contribution made to our United Methodist Church by those on disability during their years of service. We can all become better standards of the gift of life and skill as we share in this ministry of caring and concern.

## COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

I would, first of all, take this opportunity to express appreciation and joy for the leadership of our own Bishop, Carleton P. Minnick, Jr. Bishop Minnick has come into the North Carolina Annual Conference and brought with him a ray of sunshine. His open, loving and genuine style of ministry is welcomed by the North Carolina Conference. Sir, we are grateful for your ministry in this place. Your cabinet expresses appreciation to you for the many positive aspects of your ministry to date.

It would be a simple matter for me to stand here today and read statistics to you from a prepared text. However, it seems to me that every statistic, every number, every individual or act of ministry is an act of the laity and clergy of the North Carolina Conference as a whole. I will not, therefore, stand here and recite to you a long list of accomplishments church by church, or district by district. Rather I will indicate some areas in which we are strong, some areas in which we are not quite so strong, and some dreams for the future.

1. One of the strengths of the North Carolina Conference is the strength of the laity. Lay folks in our Conference are yearning for more responsibility. No longer are they willing to sit on the sidelines and watch ministry take place. They are asking to be given leadership roles in every area of the church's ministry. Lay men and lay women as well as young people across this Conference are awakening to the fact that they are sons and daughters of God and that He has called them too, to a special ministry in His name. No longer are they willing to just sit and listen, but now they are wanting to reach out and act and do in His name.

We can see the results of this new accelerating eagerness among the laity. If a church builds a new sanctuary on the coast or a new fellowship hall on the other side of the Conference in another small church; or if one embarks on a million dollar building program in one of the larger churches, it is simply saying that lay people are at work. They are responding to the leadership within their own ranks as well as to the clergy leadership at that place. And so we give thanks as a church builds a new parsonage or struggles to construct new classrooms that are sorely needed in some place that is even struggling to survive. We can give thanks to God that it is the small and the large church that makes up the North Carolina Conference. After all, it was St. Paul who reminded us that we are all one body and that we have many members. And if one member suffers, then it effects the whole body. And if one member is glorified, then the whole body rejoices. We cannot separate the members from the body without doing traumatic things to the body itself.

Of course, this means that we must lean on each other. That regardless of the size of the congregation, one church is just as important to the body as any other. So, together we go about doing the ministry of Christ. But the scripture tells us if one member fails, then the whole body is affected by it. When the ministry takes place on the coast, or in the central piedmont, or across the coastal plains, it is all the same body doing the work of Christ.

Today we give thanks for lay men and lay women, old, young, white, Black, and Native American, who in their place, day by day, work to do the things of God as they understand them in the North Carolina Conference. This is one of the things that makes our Conference great!

2. We also have a concern for evangelism. This year along in the North



Carolina Conference - from July 1 through March 31 - there were 1070 children baptized and brought into the church by profession of faith. During this same period of time 989 adults were brought into the church by profession of faith. We have all learned that it is not the minister alone who wins people to Christ. It is also interested lay persons who care about neighbors, friends and family. It is lay persons who are thinking more about the love of God and who give this loving care and concern for people. This is one of the main reasons persons are baptized and brought into the church.

Oh, we cannot minimize the role of the clergy in all of this but if we are honest we must never overlook the fact that concerned, dedicated lay people are those who often bring them to us that we may touch them.

And too, we must never forget that evangelism is our priority whether it be done through missions, the church school, or whatever means. God speaks through many concerns and issues.

3. The work and ministry of the youth of our Conference cannot be overlooked. The Conference youth rally held at White Plains UMC in Cary, NC which brought over 800 young people together to witness, worship and plan for a more involved ministry to young people in Eastern North Carolina surely has not been paralleled in any conference. They bring not only a lovely and gifted spirit to our Conference, but a caring, loving attitude that is welcome. We take note of their special emphasis to the Youth Service Fund project.

The work of the United Methodist Women and the United Methodist Men in our Conference is beautiful to see. The women have long held out the beauty of serving the Lord through study and work. Their endeavors in outreach and mission are applaudable. Our men are showing signs of new life and vitality through their growth and work within the various churches of our Conference. How grateful we are for the dedication and work of these two groups of the body.

4. We would be remiss if we did not say a word of appreciation to all the churches and all of the clergy in your leadership and response to the call for help during the tornado, hurricane and food crises appeals. What a grand response there was. The total given for the global food crisis alone was almost \$200,000.00. World hunger offerings topped \$51,000.00, while hurricane relief amounted to over \$36,000.00. How grateful we are for this outpouring of love and concern.

5. The clergy of our Conference are among the best to be found anywhere. For the most part they are the ones who seek diligently to do the work of Christ in the places where they live. They go where they are sent (most of the time), without too much complaining. Many of them are eagerly searching for those who need the saving touch of Christ in their lives.

These clergy persons are interested in every phase of the life and ministry of the church. They seek diligently to raise the budgetary items each year because they see the need. They promote the program of their church and the Conference because they realize the program is not a mandate handed down, but a ministry that we seek to share cooperately with the local church and the Conference staff. It is not unusual for these clergy persons to work late into the night in order that the work get done. The Bishop and Cabinet are not unmindful of the hard work and dedication of the clergy of our Conference and we give heartfelt thanks to you for your support and care in all the areas of the church's life and ministry.

However, after saying all that has been said, allow me to speak concernig some dreams the Cabinet is dreaming these days:

1. We are dreaming that charge conferences can become more exciting because our lay people and clergy persons are more excited about the ministries that have been entrusted to us.

2. We are dreaming that our churches will become more open to the ministries which can be performed by women and ethnic clergy within our Conference. The dream is that hearts and pulpits will be opening to a greater extent to these persons who have also been called of God to do ministry in this place.

3. We also have a dream that the clergy in our Conference will find once again a new love for one another. We dream that where there are feelings of envy, greed or jealousy that these may pass and we may become a fellowship of love and trust. It is our dream that cliques and self-interest groups may be a thing of the past and that we will become a community of people, called of God and giving our allegiance to him first and foremost. Those of us in this Cabinet commit ourselves to the fact that we shall strive to treat all clergy in an equitable and fair manner, giving each person due consideration and that no person or group of persons will have undue influence on our fairness and our consideration in making the appointments of this Conference.

4. We dream that lay people will be understanding and tolerant as we seek to re-align charges which will help us to better utilize the clergy talent present in the Conference, and thereby to more effective ministry. Hopefully, the laity will join us in seeing churches, whether large or small, as being equal in importance to the needs of and in importance to the North Carolina Annual Conference.

So there is a dream emerging from the Cabinet. A dream that we might all become brothers and sisters in the faith. That we can see each other's good potential and that we can work to the glory of God for each other's benefit. That fairness and honesty and above-board dealings will be the rule of the day within the Cabinet and among all of us throughout this Conference.

For, you see my friends, the world cannot stand anything less than our very best in these times. The world calls us to attempt great things for God! And there is not time to waste!

I was watching T. V. the other day. A woman was sitting on the ground. She was tattered and dirty and her body was thin - so thin, in fact, that it looked like skin draped over bones. Her eyes were hollow holes in her head and stared bleakly into space. In one hand she held a bowl of porridge, in the other a starving child. I watched as she scraped the last bit of porridge from the bowl and gave it to the child. Then she looked up. I cannot lose sight of those haunting, searching eyes. They continue to follow me. There is not enough time left to do anything but follow the Master and do his will. We don't have time to hurt each other, to cut each other nor do each other in. Jesus Christ brought us to this place, to this ministry. And He said, "Go into all the world and preach, and teach, and heal, and love. Be my body, my hands, my voice in this place".

May God help us if we settle for less!

## COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

By disciplinary provision and moral obligation, the Commission on Equitable Salaries is instructed to "support ministry in the charges of the Annual Conference by: 1) recommending Conference standards for ministerial compensation; 2) administering funds to be used in salary supplementation; and 3) providing counsel and advisory material on ministerial compensation to district superintendents and pastor-parish relations committees". (DISCIPLINE, Par. 722.2)

That provision often placed the commission in a contradictory spot. "Assumption of the obligations of the itinerant ministry required upon admission to the traveling connection places upon the church a counterobligation to provide adequate support for the entire ministry of the church." (DISCIPLINE, Par. 717) "The commission shall carefully study the NEEDS for...ministerial support within the Conference and the SOURCES of income, and shall recommend annually to the Conference a schedule for minimum salaries for all...pastors." (DISCIPLINE, Par. 722.3) In other words, ministers are required to spend considerable expense, time and energy in preparing for and executing ministry. Common sense recognizes the increased pressure upon a local church to provide an ever increasing salary for its minister. Churches with dwindling resources find themselves spending more and more on pastoral compensation and less and less on property, program and expansion. Clergy and laity are caught in the proverbial place between a rock and a hard spot.

The commission has spent considerable time in examining the situation. Solutions are not included in this report. However, we do have recommendations whose implementation will help us move towards "fair and equitable salaries" for all those who "assume the obligations of the itinerancy", and simultaneous "fair and equitable management" of the resources of the local church in ministry and mission.

I. We recommend that, in 1985-86, the Bishop's Task Force on Charge Realignment make a study of all part-time appointments to determine, by provisions of the DISCIPLINE, Par. 201-204: 1) if they are AUTHENTIC churches and 2) if they can be enabled to become more AUTHENTIC churches through charge realignment.

II. We recommend that there be a determination in 1985-1986 of the number of full-time ministers who can be supported by the resources of this Annual Conference. We further recommend that such information be utilized to determine by February 15 of each year the number of full-time members the Conference can receive in any given year. We recommend that this information be determined by a committee of the Bishop, his Cabinet, the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Equitable Salary Commission.

III. Recommended Schedule of Minimum Salaries for 1986:

A. Salary Schedule

1. With respect to the ever increasing cost of living for all, we recommend that the minimum full-time salary level be raised by a percentage equal to the percentage of raise enjoyed by all ministers for the Conference year 1985:

2. We recommend that the full-time minimum salary levels be adjusted annually by the percentage figure of average raises in the Conference for the current conference year.
3. Guidelines affecting student pastors as adopted by previous Annual Conference sessions will continue to govern the use of equitable salary funds for student pastors. For reference, the DISCIPLINE, Par. 442, 717, and 722, provides the basis for our work.

B. Travel Allowance:

Although travel is reimbursed by the charge as an item of ministerial expense, it is expected that the charge would provide at least \$1,800.00 for travel expense. A charge receiving equitable salary support may provide this \$1,800.00 travel allowance, but any travel allowance in excess of \$1,800.00 will result in a reduction of equitable salary support.

C. Pension Program:

Charges receiving Equitable Salary Fund support are responsible for paying the total amount required for the Ministerial Pension Plan and the Comprehensive Protection Plan based on their pastor's total income for salary and utilities (including funds from the Equitable Salary Fund, Duke Endowment, and any other sources).

IV. Principles Governing the Use of Equitable Salary Funds:

The Pastor's salary is the responsibility of the charge; therefore, the charges of the North Carolina Conference should be so arranged as to be able to assume full salary support. The commission urges each charge receiving Equitable Salary funds, its pastor, and the District Superintendent responsible for that charge to administer the affairs of that charge to the end that it may move as rapidly as possible toward total self-supprrt. To enable the Conference, the commission, and the District Superintendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, in harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned, the following principles and procedures are set forth:

- A. In considering the salary for the charge, all income, including salary, bonuses, and other benefits not specifically excluded, are included as salary in determining appropriations from the Equitable Salary Fund.
- B. Charges must be so arranged that no more than one-third of the total salary will come from the Equitable Salary Fund on the first application from the charge. Newly established congregations will be given special consideration during the first five years of their existence. Other charges seeking more than one-third supplement must provide specific information with their application, indicating the reasons for their inability to meet these guidelines. Information shall be made available to the Commission on Equitable Salaries and the District Superintendents regarding the term of Equitable Salary support, giving the date of its inception and the present amount of support being received by the respective charges.
- C. When the division of a charge is desired, Equitable Salary funds will be used only upon the recommendation of the Bishop, of the "Bishop's Task Force on the Division of Circuits", and the approval of the Cabinet.
- D. In the division of a charge in which one church seeks to become a station church, it is recommended that such a church shall assume all salary obligations and its proportionate share of all apportionments.
  1. It is recommended that the remainder of the charge in such a division assume full pastoral support and its proportionate share of all apportionments. In no case will the Commission on Equitable Salaries provide more than one-third of the salary required for such a division.

2. When there is a division of a charge forming one or more student appointments, each newly created charge must pay two-thirds of the pastoral support established by the division.
- E. The Commission on Equitable Salaries further recommends that each charge which is receiving, or shall hereafter receive, Equitable Salary Fund assistance, shall reduce this aid by at least ten (10) percent each year until the charge has achieved full self-support in ten years. The Commission wants to be clear at this point that its intent in this recommendation is that the charge will accept in full whatever increases are made in the minimum salary for their pastor each year and receive ten (10) percent less each year in aid from Equitable Salary funds than granted the previous year. Newly established churches are expected to move toward full self-support during the first five years following their organization. The District Superintendents are to inform all charges receiving aid or making applications for assistance in the future of these requirements.
- F. Any Equitable Salary Fund supplement will be terminated immediately upon information that the pastor has taken full time secular employment. Such a charge may be reinstated at such time as its pastor returns to a full time or student status. Exceptions to this provision may be permitted only by the approval of the executive committee of the Commission on Equitable Salaries upon the recommendation of the District Superintendent of the pastor seeking for emergency reasons to be employed outside of his/her ministerial responsibilities.
- G. No Equitable Salary Funds will be used for associate pastors in other than a larger parish arrangement of churches.
- H. Equitable Salary Funds are sent to charges who have applied for their use to provide their pastor with the minimum salary established by the Annual Conference. The monthly salary supplement checks sent by the Conference Treasurer are to be deposited by the charge treasurer in the charge account and used to pay the pastor his/her appropriate monthly salary. The checks are not to be endorsed and cashed by the pastor.
- I. Churches receiving Equitable Salary Funds will conduct an annual financial campaign to accurately gauge the level of financial support the local church can reasonably expect from its members.
- J. We remind the Conference of provisions in the DISCIPLINE, Par. 717, which states: "Primary responsibility for the payment of pastoral salaries remains with individual pastoral charges." 2) "This schedule of minimum salaries shall be observed by the bishops and districts superintendents in arranging charges and making appointments."

The commission plans further consultation and study with other Conference agencies and resources to seek ways to more adequately provide for the temporal needs of our pastors and churches.

## II. Financial Policies:

1. The Outreach Ministries Fair Share Apportionments for 1986 shall be based on the formula adopted in 1979, which computes the apportionments from the average of the total monies disbursed by each church in the three years immediately previous to the apportionment year less the appropriate exclusions each year. The current exclusions : Payments on Outreach Ministries; principal and interest on indebtedness; buildings and improvements; local benevolences paid directly by the local church; General and Conference Advance Specials; Ten Dollar Club; up to \$2400 travel paid by a charge for each pastor; One Great Hour of Sharing; World Wide Communion; Human Relations; Methodist Student Day; Pension Funding Crusade; UMW funds sent to District or Conference treasurer; housing allowance paid in lieu of furnished parsonage to a minister serving under Episcopal appointment in a charge of the Conference.
2. Apportionments to the churches shall be made by the Council on Finance and Administration (CFA) based on the current formula for the Outreach Ministries apportionments. Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptance up to the amount fixed by the Annual Conference upon the recommendations of the council. In the event collections shall fall short, all items shall be paid pro-rata or proportionate excepting prior claim items: (Fixed obligations on Conference owned property; salaries paid directly from the Conference treasurer's office; Pensions; General World Service; General Administration Fund). In the light of possible unforeseen and emergency need within the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration is authorized to make supplementary appropriations between sessions of the Annual Conference. Such supplementary appropriations shall be made only from available undesignated funds and shall be reported in the Conference JOURNAL for purposes of information.
3. The Lake Junaluska Development Fund shall continue based on a minimum goal of 50 cents per member per year (\$2.00) over the four-year period 1985-1988 inclusive. This is based upon the membership at the close of the calendar year 1983 as reported in the 1984 JOURNAL.
4. The following special offerings shall be taken in each local church and remitted to the Conference treasurer as separate items. They are not to be included in the Fair Share Apportionments: World Communion Sunday, United Methodist Student Day, One Great Hour of Sharing, Human Relations Day, World Order Sunday, North Carolina Council of Churches.
5. Outreach Ministries Apportionments will be delivered from the treasurer's office to the District Superintendents by July 15. The District Superintendents will then, as soon as possible, distribute the apportionments, without adjustments, to the churches.
6. No Conference agency's budget shall incorporate funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the Council on Ministries for program budget items or the Council on Finance and Administration for all non-program budget items.
7. No transfer of funds shall be made from one line item in the Conference Budget to another without approval of the Council on Finance and Administration.
8. The Episcopal Fund, General Administration Fund, Jurisdictional Conference, Temporary General Aid, World Service, College Sustaining Fund, and College Debt Retirement will be raised and paid out in the same year. All other funds will be raised and paid out in the subsequent year on a schedule determined by the Council on Finance and Administration.
9. The Council shall consider an appropriation to the Conference Fund for Human Need at the close of the fiscal year. The supplemental appropriation in 1984 to the Fund for Human Need was \$125,000.
10. Any Conference or non-conference agency which receives Conference funds in excess of \$1,000 shall submit, with any budget request, an annual detailed, audited budget report of all receipts, disbursements, and assets. Such reports received shall remain on file in the treasurer's office. An agency may be exempted (for just cause) from this reporting requirement by CFA for non-program agencies, or in the case of program agencies, by the Council on Ministries.

## III. Approval to Solicit Funds:

Approval is given to the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the District or Conference.

1. Christmas Offering for District Superintendents' program and/or

projects.

2. The Board of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.
3. The Commission on Outdoor and Camping Ministries to solicit from church groups and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the four camps of the North Carolina Conference.
4. The State Commission on Campus Ministry for the privilege of private solicitation for special gifts for the benefits of special works in the state-supported institutions of higher education.
5. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated; Methodist Home for Children; Louisburg College; Methodist College, and North Carolina Wesleyan College for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such funds as may be directed thereto with the understanding that such solicitation or private campaign may not be taken into the local churches of the Conference through solicitation in classes or other groups or by the use of membership lists of entire churches which might be provided, and that solicitation not be made through the "North Carolina Christian Advocate".
6. The Methodist Foundation, Incorporated, as provided in its charter.

IV. Organization and Procedure (Presented for Information Only)

1. The Council on Finance and Administration will continue to use McGladrey Hendrickson & Pullen as auditors unless otherwise advised.
2. The president, vice-president and secretary of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Conference treasurer shall serve as the executive committee of the Council on Finance and Administration.
3. The Conference treasurer will include in his monthly financial reports, for any given month, all monies received in his office by 8:30 a.m. on the 5th day of the following month, except when the 5th falls on a weekend or holiday the report will include the funds received by 8:30 a.m. the following workday.
4. Requests for supplemental appropriations for the operating budget for 1986 shall be delivered to the treasurer's office no later than January 10, 1986.
5. Requests for the budget to be raised by 1987 shall be delivered to the treasurer's office no later than March 3, 1986.
6. Requests for special supplemental appropriations shall be delivered to the treasurer's office at least 10 working days prior to a scheduled CFA meeting.
7. The treasurer, at his discretion, may approve minor overexpenditures of a budget line item up to \$1,000 or 5% of the line item, whichever is less. A request for such overexpenditure shall be submitted in writing in advance and shall state the reason for the request. The overexpenditure will be reported to CFA and will be listed in the Conference JOURNAL.
8. Requests for the purchase/lease of specific data processing equipment or services must be approved by CFA. The request must address the problem of compatibility of the project with the current Annual Conference data processing service. The approval of funds to begin a project does not constitute approval for the purchase/lease of specific equipment or services.
9. Monies paid by the churches shall be reported to the statistician by the pastors at the end of the year on the Table II, Financial Report. The Table I and Table II reports for 1985 shall be due to the statistician no later than January 24, 1986.
10. All remittances for General Church items must be received in the treasurer's office by 8:30 a.m. on December 31, 1985 in order to receive credit for 1985.
11. All remittances for Annual Conference items must be received in the treasurer's office by 8:30 a.m. on January 14, 1986, in order to receive credit for 1985.
12. Any request from the churches for adjustments to apportionments must be made to the Council on Finance and Administration on or before Wednesday prior to Thanksgiving (November 27, 1985).

V. District Superintendent's Salary:

The percentage change in District Superintendent's salary for 1986 and subsequent years shall be the same as the average percentage change in salary (salary, travel, utilities) for that year for all full-time pastors serving local charges in the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Since 1968 we have had a good working relationship with Fidelity & Guaranty Life Insurance Company. This year the Group Term program was put out for bids. After the bids were analyzed, the Insurance Committee decided to award the contract to State Farm Life Insurance Company. All of the benefits and operating procedures will be identical with our current plan with the exception of the value of the policy. The policy has been upgraded, effective January 1, 1985 to \$15,000.00 for active ministers, \$7,500.00 for retired ministers up to age 72, then \$1,000.00 with premiums continuing at \$103.00 per year. Benefits for any minister retiring prior to 1978 will remain at \$5,000.00.

## BLUE CROSS/BLUE SHIELD

The year's experience with Blue Cross/Blue Shield on the Administrative Service Only plan has proven very effective. This plan has enabled us to oversee costs more effectively than our previous program. The cost control effected with this plan enables us to maintain premium costs for 1986 at the same rate as 1985 and 1984; that is, no premium increase! The Insurance Committee recommends that the Conference continue with the present ASO plan with the Pre-Admission Certification feature. The committee would like to express appreciation to the members of this Conference for their acceptance of these changes in administrative procedures.

We also would like to emphasize that with a toll free telephone number, and a staff person in the Treasurer's office we are now able to give better personal attention to claims inquiries.

We are all aware of Medicare/Medicaid changes for our retired people. The reduction in Medicare benefits has made it necessary for the Blue Cross/Blue Shield premiums to be increased for this group. Because of this substantial increase, the health insurance for our retired group was put out for bids, and an analysis of the bids indicated that it did not seem expedient to make any change in carriers at this time. Therefore, our retired people will continue to be covered under the Blue Cross/Blue Shield program with the Board of Pensions paying the premiums.

We were instructed to consider the feasibility of adding lay employees at the local church to our Blue Cross/Blue Shield plan. Letters were sent to every charge in the Conference. Since less than 50 responses were received to this questionnaire, it is the opinion of the committee that there was insufficient interest to pursue the matter further. It is the recommendation of the Insurance Committee that any future consideration of benefits to lay employees be conducted by the Board of Laity.

The Insurance Committee considers it a privilege to be involved in the care and well-being of our families. We wish you good health and long life.

## METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

"The North Carolina Christian Advocate" is a ministry. Its purpose is to strengthen every other ministry in which the United Methodist Church is involved. The "Advocate" is a support ministry, promoting, enhancing, lifting up every other ministry of the church. This ministry is as varied as the work of the church it serves. The "Advocate" is also an associate minister making calls in the homes of member families every week. The "Advocate" carries the story of God's love to these families, telling them how this love is lived out in the life of our churches and inspiring them

to be better disciples of our Lord Jesus Christ.

I am happy to report another good year in the ministry which the "Advocate" represents. Our circulation continues in the range of 20,000. This means some 60,000 or more United Methodists are reading its pages. As grateful as we are for this excellent list of subscribers, research has shown us that this circulation figure can be doubled almost over night. Some of our churches have discovered how to send us excellent circulation lists year after year. They do it by personal contact and telephone calls. If all of the churches were to do this, our research reveals that our circulation would almost immediately double. We are anxious to extend our circulation in order that this ministry may touch more hearts and be of even greater service to the church. On the basis of this research we have established a goal which we hope every church will adopt: that every United Methodist family in North Carolina receive one friendly telephone call about the "Advocate" every year, year after year. The caller will either ask the member family to renew or subscribe. No arm twisting, just an enthusiastic call about the church newspaper. Every member family should subscribe to their church's official newspaper.

I continue to find this ministry as exciting as the day I first assumed the editorship. And, I continue to be exceedingly grateful for a fine staff without whose dedication this ministry could not succeed. This work requires a great deal of overtime and often weekend work, all of which is cheerfully done by our two full-time staff members and our part-time bookkeeper without overtime pay. Mrs. Ruth Laughlin continues as our news editor and Mrs. Marie Fulton as our circulation manager. Mrs. Margaret Hinshaw is our part-time bookkeeper.

The "Advocate" is also deeply indebted to the members of the Board of Publication, Inc. and its officers as well as the cabinets of our two conferences and our bishops for their time and efforts on its behalf.

It should be noted that everyone who writes for the "Advocate" does so as a labor of love. Thus, an extra share of appreciation goes to our regular columnists who discharge their duties with such expertise and diligence.

This year I have been traveling among our 26 districts in the state speaking to the ministers about this ministry of the printed word. Prior to this I had been traveling each year to the districts speaking primarily to our local church "Advocate" representatives. This next conference year I propose to use this time to travel among the districts seeking news and stories to enhance the quality of the "Advocate". This next year, therefore, our promotional work, as such, will be handled largely through the mail to the ministers and their "Advocate" representatives.

We encourage our local church to send us their news stories and pictures. We do not make any charge for publishing pictures as we believe these add greatly to the coverage of any event. We prefer black and white glossy prints where possible, although some color prints reproduce very satisfactorily.

## **BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY**

**ORDINATION:** Ordination represents a moment of profoundest meaning and significance in the life of those persons called to ministry in the church. For the gathered community of Christians at the Ordination Service is that sobering moment when we are aware of standing in a continuing tradition going all the way back to the beginnings of the Christian Church. In hushed awe we are witness to an historic continuity with the original resurrection faith which has been an inestimable blessing to the human race for two thousand years. With such reverence of feeling, we are privileged to present the report of the Board of Ordained Ministry to the Executive Session of the 1985 North Carolina Annual Conference.

Following are the recommendations of candidates to be ordained Deacons and Elders, for those to be received into the various categories of membership in the Annual Conference.

Following are the recommendations of 15 candidates to be ordained Deacon, eight to be ordained Elder; for 16 persons to be elected to Probationary Membership, eight to be elected to full membership in the Annual Conference; and the recommendations for various changes or continuance of status in Annual Conference relationship.

These recommendations come from ten full days of meetings held by the Board of Ordained Ministry since January 2 of this year, plus many other meetings by various committees of the Board. All those recommended for ordination and election to membership have been examined by the Board of Ordained Ministry on their call to Ordained Ministry, on Theology and Doctrine, and on Preaching and Worship.

**ORDINAL:** The Ordination Service, scheduled for Monday evening, June 3, is new this year, being the alternate service developed on the initiative of the Council of Bishops and adopted for use by the 1980 General Conference. The alternative ordinal expresses sensitivity to current concern for inclusive, non-sexist language. Although written in contemporary class English, it is liturgical in character. In language and in action, it embodies the theology of the pastoral office. We commend it to you with enthusiasm as a model of what the Ordinal will be for many years to come.

### **MISCELLANEOUS REQUIREMENTS**

The Board of Ordained Ministry would remind the Annual Conference and the ministerial candidates preparing for membership relationships to the North Carolina Conference that several actions of past Annual Conference sessions have established requirements that go beyond the basic step found in the BOOK OF DISCIPLINE.

For Full Time Local Pastors, the Board recommended that ministers having completed the basic Five Year Course of Study continue to attend the Course of Study School in the Summer, enrolling in at least four years of Advanced Studies during any six year period. These courses, offered on a seminary level would increase the competency of our Full Time Local Pastors (1980).

For Associate Membership, the Board recommended that the academic requirement be raised to the four-year baccalaureate degree (1974).

For Full Connection, the Board recommended that only those persons who had completed the M. Div. degree (or its equivalent) in seminary be elected to Full Membership (1975). Within the M. Div degree, the Board has recommended that certain specific courses be included to provide the ministerial candidate with competence in preaching and worship as well as a knowledge of our United Methodist history, doctrine, and polity. The following specific guidelines were recommended:

Each student must complete the following seminary level courses to be eligible for Full Connection and Elder's Orders (1979):

1. A course in preaching that includes a practicum, laboratory, or field experience in the preparation, delivery, and evaluation of sermons.
2. A course in public worship that includes the theory and practice of planning and leading public worship.
3. The course requirements contained in Par. 423.3c of the 1984 BOOK OF DISCIPLINE be fulfilled by completing these three separate and distinct courses:
  - a. United Methodist Polity
  - b. United Methodist Theology and Doctrine
  - c. A History of Methodism

## COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION

The Continuing Education Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry has the responsibility of developing continuing education programs that will enable ministers to fulfill the Disciplinary requirements. According to the 1984 DISCIPLINE, Par. 446.1, "Ministers shall be expected to continue their education throughout their careers, including carefully-developed personal programs of study augmented periodically by involvement in organized educational activities." The DISCIPLINE (Par.447) further states that, "in most cases a minister's continuing education program should allow for leaves of absence for study at least one week each year and at least one month during one year of each quadrennium. Such leaves shall not be considered as part of the minister's vacation and shall be planned in consultation with the charges or other agencies to which they are appointed, as well as the bishop, district superintendent, and Annual Conference Continuing Education Committee."

In providing the resources to enable pastors to meet the minimum requirement of the DISCIPLINE, the Committee on Continuing Education has edited a new brochure that applies to all ministers of the North Carolina Annual Conference. The brochure contains information defining education, the role of the local church and how the pastor's continuing education can be financed. The brochure is printed as part of this report and follows:

### CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY IN THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

**Rationale:** A prime expectation of every minister of the North Carolina Annual Conference is professional growth. In recent years one of the major avenues through which such growth occurred has been continuing education. The General Conference of the United Methodist Church has recognized this by requiring annual participation in a continuing education program by each ordained minister seeking appointment. (1984 Discipline, Par.422.1c)

**Definition:** Continuing education is defined as an organized structured program of formal study under competent leadership with clearly defined goals and objectives. Here the key words are "organized," "competent leadership," and "clearly-defined goals and objectives." By this definition certain activities, though worthwhile, are not considered "continuing education," e.g. recreational programs, promotional meetings, worship services, entertainments, undirected reading and study travel (except for limited lecture, seminar or workshop time), and the like.

**The Conference Program:** The Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, through the Committee on Continuing Education, performs three functions: (1): It sets minimum continuing education standards for ministry; (2) it establishes guidelines for continuing education; and (3) it seeks to insure their availability.

(1) **Minimum Standards.** The North Carolina Conference has established as a minimum standard one Continuing Education Unit (CEU) to be earned by each minister from an approved continuing education program each year. One CEU is defined as ten contact hours of participation in an approved



continuing education program.

(2) Guidelines for Continuing Education Programs. CEU's will be approved for those programs sponsored by organizations which are accredited by (a) a regional educational agency (such as the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools), (b) a professional accrediting agency (such as the American Medical Association) or (c) the Council on the Continuing Education Unit. It should also be noted that only those programs which relate directly to ministerial growth and development will be approved.

(3) Insuring their Availability. Efforts by the Board of Ordained Ministry to insure the availability of continuing education programs include encouraging conference-related and other colleges within the conference bounds to offer courses for ministers, providing supplementary financial aid for ministers, publicizing approved programs, and identifying specific subject areas for need programs.

Role of the Local Church: In addition to the minister, the local church has a significant stake in the success of continuing education programs. The local church, therefore, has an important role to play in continuing education. The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee of the local church:

(1) Confers with the pastor and the District Superintendent in the development of a continuing education program which will enhance the total ministry of the church.

(2) Provides "leaves of absence for study at least one week each year and at least one month during one year of each quadrennium." Such leaves of absence are not to be considered vacation time. (1984 Discipline, Par. 447)

(3) Recommends to the church's Finance Committee budgetary funds to be applied toward the minister's continuing education program.

In providing funds for continuing education programs the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee should insure that only those programs which meet both the definitions and specific guidelines above are funded.

Financial Aid to Ministers: Funding for continuing education is the combined responsibility of the participant, the congregation, the sponsoring institution, and the Annual Conference funds for continuing education are derived as a portion of Conference acceptances of the Ministerial Education Fund. Thus, it is not possible (nor is it desirable) for the Conference to assume a major responsibility.

All persons under episcopal appointment to charges, Conference staff positions, district superintendencies, and Conference-related agencies and institutions are eligible for grants from conference funds provided:

(1) The program does not lead to advancement from one level of Conference relationship to another nor does it lead to the acquisition of an advanced degree.

(2) The program meets the definitions and Conference guidelines described above.

(3) The applicant has documented his or her efforts to secure funding from other sources, including local church, Duke Endowment, and personal.

(4) The application for a grant is filed on the appropriate form which furnishes complete information about the event and bears the signatures of the applicant, the Pastor-Parish Relations chairperson, and the District Superintendent.

In providing grants, the Conference will place limits as follows:

(1) The maximum grant to an individual applicant over one Conference year is \$300.00.

(2) For a one-week event \$150.00 will be the maximum grant; for a two-week event, \$300.00.

(3) The event must involve some definite measure of intensive study by the participant and offer at least one Continuing Education Unit.

(4) The Conference may fund no more than 75 percent of the cost of any continuing education event.

Monitoring Continuing Education Units:

(1) The District Superintendent, in annual consultation, may suggest to the minister the area of continuing education he or she should take to facilitate his or her professional growth. The pastor's annual Continuing Education Report will be given to the District Superintendent at the annual consultation.

(2) Ministers shall have the responsibility for securing from the institution granting continuing education credit a record of earned credit and providing a copy of this record to his or her District Superintendent.

(3) The District Superintendent will send the pastor's continuing education report to the Director of Ministerial Relations on an annual basis so that this report can be placed in the pastor's permanent file (and possibly on computer). This information will include course title and continuing education credits.

(4) It is the responsibility of each minister to determine, in

consultation with the Committee on Continuing Education, if a proposed program meets the criteria prior to participation and funding.

## MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND COMMITTEE

**MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND ASSISTANCE:** The Ministerial Education Fund remains the major source of support for theological education in The United Methodist Church for the 1981-1984 quadrennium. When the local church remits the Ministerial Education Fund to the Conference treasurer, it is divided two ways. The larger portion (75%) is sent to the Division of Higher Education and Ministry in Nashville to be divided among the United Methodist seminaries for their operating expenses and for scholarship help to minority and special students. The remaining 25% portion is retained by the Board of Ordained Ministry in the North Carolina Conference.

The Board of Ordained Ministry may use its funds to provide scholarship assistance for ministerial education, for continuing education, and for recruitment. However, the amount of funds available during the past few years and the number of students seeking to prepare for ordained ministry has made necessary the use of almost all of the funds for scholarships for ministerial candidates.

Grants to students eligible for full scholarship were based on 35% of the actual educational cost (tuition, and fees and an annual \$300.00 book allowance). For students at Duke Divinity School this was \$1,547.00 for full-time students (four courses) and \$1,187.00 for student pastors (three courses) annually.

The need to continue our support of the Ministerial Education Fund at the present level, and to increase where possible, is borne out by these statistics of our present group of students preparing for ministry and the need to move further into continuing education opportunities for the ministers already in the field.

## PASTORAL CARE COMMITTEE

The Pastoral Care Committee serves the North Carolina Conference both as a sensitive listener to the needs of clergy and their families and as an agent for response to these needs. At the present time, the primary function of the committee is in providing financial assistance clergy and/or their families for counseling and therapy and for participation in programs of personal growth and marriage and family enrichment.

As this quadrennium begins, a broadened purpose and function is under study. Critical areas of concern that the committee hopes to make meaningful responses to include:

- attrition of clergy from ordained ministry;
- conflict between role expectations and personal

- identity for clergy and clergy spouses;
- issues regarding parsonage life;
- the whole health of clergy, physical and emotional, and programs of preventive and recreational care; and,
- the itinerancy and working clergy spouses.

## PSYCHOLOGICAL TESTING/EVALUATION COMMITTEE

Psychological Testing and Evaluation is a psychological assessment program of the Board of Ordained Ministry. It serves two basic purposes: Nurture, and selection. The nurture aspect is for the benefit of the candidate seeking Conference membership. The selection aspect is for the benefit of the Conference. Nurture is accomplished when the psychological assessment provides the candidate information pertinent to the achievement to the achievement and maintenance of maximum psychological adjustment in professional ministry by identifying specific areas of potential problems and offering concrete suggestions to remedy them. Selection is accomplished when the assessment program provides early detection of unacceptable behavior patterns which could jeopardize effective ministry.

The testing program uses personality, interest, and religious interest inventories to measure fitness and competency for ministry. This Conference year a new approach was taken in the testing arrangements. All candidates (23 individuals) for Conference membership were tested in a group setting by the staff of The Career and Personal Counseling Center. In due time each candidate went to the center, located on the campus of St. Andrews Presbyterian College, for the private evaluation of the testing results. This new approach proved to be a vital convenience for the candidates especially those who were students in seminary.

There is a recommendation by the General Board of Ordained Ministry that each Conference consider beginning the psychological testing and evaluation at the first stage (Candidacy stage) in the steps into the Ordained Ministry. This stage is typified when men and women declare their interest and desire to explore possibilities for ministry. The Committee on Psychological Testing and Evaluation will investigate and discuss this recommendation and render a report to the Board of Ordained Ministry during the 1985-1986 Conference year.

### REPORT A - GENERAL INFORMATION

- I. We recommend that the expense account of the Board of Pensions and such independent consultation expense necessary during 1986 be paid from

funds designated as Administrative Expense in the Board of Pensions Budget.

Earnings credited to the Board of Pensions from funds invested in Methodist Foundation, Inc. in 1984 = \$758,866.09. The percentage earnings as of December 31, 1984, was 9.63% on Market Value.

REPORT B - RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE PENSION PROGRAM

I. Past Service Liability

- A. Past service will continue to be paid on the defined benefit concept (per service year rate) for all service rendered to the North Carolina Conference through December 31, 1981. This plan is expected to continue until all persons with past service benefits and their surviving spouses have died.
- B. Goal of defined benefits (per service year rate) has been defined in the BOOK OF DISCIPLINE for many years as 1% of the Conference Average Salary. The 1985 CAS for the North Carolina Conference is \$19,100.00.
- C. The current rate is \$180.00 per service year. Participation in the new Ministerial Pension Plan required that an Annual Conference continue to increase its past service rate as the Conference Average Salary increases, to at least 0.9% of the CAS to continue to participate fully in the new pension program. We propose that the past service rate beginning July 1, 1985 be increased to \$195.00 per service year and that per service rate for 1986 be established at \$210.00 per service year, and that further increases will be



presented to the Annual Conferences of the future as the Conference Average Salary increases.

- D. To fund the past service rate with the General Board of Pensions will require an annual payment of \$1,238,267.00 in 1985 and \$1,410,000.00 in 1986.

E. 1985 Operating Budget (Revised):

This increase cost of past service is off-set by earnings from the Calvin Little Estate and Methodist Pension Fund Crusade and does not increase the askings in Outreach Ministries.

- G. To increase any past service rate will always involve accepting an unfunded liability that must be satisfied by either a single cash payment, a series of planned payments, or a combination of both.

II. Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP)

Guidelines for the Ministerial Pension Plan and the Comprehensive Protection Plan are contained in the 1983 and 1984 JOURNAL OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE. Thus we call to your attention only those guidelines that are relevant to these programs.

- A. Service on and after January 1, 1982 will be funded on a new concept, called a defined contribution plan. This plan is basically deferred salary, and creates no unfunded liability because it builds an account of funds for a specific minister as his/her salary is paid.

- B. Funding is based on a percentage of Plan Compensation. Plan Compensation is calculated as follows:

Take Cash Income (salary plus utilities) i.e.	\$15,000.00 and
Add Housing Allowance (20% of cash income)	+ 3,000.00 and
Plan Compensation will be	<u>\$18,000.00</u>

- No travel funding is ever used in Plan Compensation calculations as this is considered by the General Board of Pensions to be an item of local expense.
- The utility allowance of the pastor is not considered by the General Board of Pensions to be more than 10% of the total Cash Income, regardless of the amount set at the Charge Conference.
- The funding formula will not include an amount for utilities. This means that only 90% of the Cash Income will be the base for Plan Compensation.

4. Where a cash Housing Allowance is provided as a part of the compensation for an appointment or where the pastor chooses to live in housing other than the parsonage provided by the charge, the housing Allowance in the Plan Compensation calculation shall be considered 20% of the Cash Income, regardless of the amount of the cash Housing Allowance.
- C. The Ministerial Pension Plan contribution from the local church is to be paid monthly to the Conference Treasurer for transmission to the General Board of Pensions.
- D. These contributions are placed in the individual minister's Church Account to be available for benefits when the minister becomes eligible for payment in the retired relationship. The following options are available at that time:
1. A life annuity with 100% to the surviving contingent annuitant.
  2. A life annuity with 75% to the surviving contingent annuitant.
  3. A life annuity with 50% to the surviving contingent annuitant.
  4. A single-life annuity with ten years certain.
  5. A single-life annuity with five years certain.
  6. A single-life, (no refund) annuity.
- E. Each minister who is eligible for benefits will be required to designate beneficiaries for the benefits he/she is qualified to receive.
- F. We recommend that the following schedule of participation in the Ministerial Pension Plan be adopted and implemented to bring the North Carolina Conference participants into the intended structure of the Ministerial Pension Plan:

### III. Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP)

- A. This part of the program contains provisions for a death benefit, disability income, and funding for the peerage portion of the ministerial Pension Plan. In addition to the provisions of a death benefit for either the spouse or the surviving spouse of a minister, the Comprehensive Plan also includes educational benefits for the children of a deceased minister. This part of the new plan is only available to those ministers serving full time.
1. Death benefits provide 150% of the denominational average salary as the benefit paid on the death of an active minister through age 46, dropping on a graduated basis to 105% at age 55, 70% at age 62, and 20% upon retirement at any age.
  2. Disability payments are based on 40% of the Denominational Average Salary in effect at the time the minister is placed on disability.
  3. The peerage program provides for a contribution from the Comprehensive Protection Plan to the minister's Church Account of a sufficient amount to provide the minister with a total contribution for the year based on the Denominational Average Compensation. This would provide every minister in the North Carolina Conference under appointment to a full time charge (Conference Member and Local Pastor) with an annual Church Account accumulation of 9% of Plan Compensation based on the Denominational Average Compensation.

B. The cost of the Comprehensive Protection Plan is a 4.1% contribution

of actual Plan Compensation. This minister will be required to pay 1.0% of the 4.1% as provided in the Comprehensive Protection Plan, and the church or charge will pay the additional 3.1%.

#### IV. Minister's Personal Account

- A. The pension program provides that a minister who participates in the Ministerial Pension Plan shall contribute 3% of actual Plan Compensation annually to his/her Personal Account.
- B. These funds would be available in a lump sum or in a variety of other options when the minister reaches age 60, or may be left to accumulate as an additional amount for monthly pension benefits.
- C. The minister's personal account contributions can be made in one of three ways:
1. A tax-deferred annuity contribution. This option requires that the amount of the monthly contribution to the minister's personal account be withheld from his/her salary by the charge treasurer according to a signed agreement between the minister and the charge, and sent to the General Board of Pensions by the charge treasurer. The amount withheld should not be declared as income by the minister at the end of the year for either income tax or self-employment (Social Security) tax. The General Board of Pensions should be notified by the minister that he/she desires the contributions to be tax-deferred, and the monthly billing card should reflect that type of contribution.
  2. A personal tax-deductible contribution. This option allows the minister to send the monthly contribution from funds received from the charge treasurer. The General Board of Pensions presumes this type of contribution to be the minister's preference unless they are notified otherwise. This type of contribution can be deducted from the minister's income for income tax purposes on the line for Individual Retirement Account (IRA) contributions.
  3. A personal tax-paid contribution. This option also allows the minister to send the monthly contribution from funds received from the charge treasurer, but he/she must inform the General Board of Pensions that the contributions are so intended. The advantage of this type of contribution is that you may remove all such contributions at a later time without having to pay further taxes. Interest earned by such contributions is, however, taxable.

#### V. Implementation of the Program

The benefit program adopted by your Conference Board of Pensions seeks to provide a wider range of support for the minister's family through death benefits for every member of the family, disability income for the minister in time of great stress, educational benefits for children of deceased ministers, minimum annuity benefits for surviving spouses, and the build-up of contributions to the Church Account of these ministers whose compensation is below the Denominational Average Salary.

B. Costs of the Ministerial Pension Plan/Comprehensive Protection Plan will be borne by the local charge as an item of ministerial support according to the Plan Compensation of the minister and the category of the charge.

Full Time (Conference Member/Local Pastor) - 13.4% of Plan Compensation  
Student (Conference Member/Local Pastor) - 10.0% of Plan Compensation  
Less Than Full Time (Conference Member/Local pastor) - 10.0% of salary  
Interim or Retired Supply - no pension responsibility

C. We propose that the past service rate beginning July 1, 1985, be increased to \$195.00 per service year, that beginning January 1, 1986, per service rate be increased to \$210.00 per service year, and beginning January 1, 1987, the per service rate be increased to \$225.00.

D. The minister will make regular payments to the Conference Treasurer for his/her portion (1%) of the Comprehensive Protection plan.

E. The minister will make regular payments to the General Board of Pensions for his/her Personal Account (3%).

#### F. Summary

It is obvious that there has been a great improvement on the benefits currently being received by our retired families. The per service year rate has increased from \$82.00 per service year in 1978 to \$195.00 beginning July 1, 1985. A minister retiring this year with forty years of pension credit will receive a monthly benefit of \$650.00, compared with \$273.33 in 1978. This is a 138% increase in a seven year period!

#### VI. Resolution from the 1984 Conference

I move, following both our own past practice of providing equal pensions for all ministerial members and following the current practice under the new pension program of the large majority of another annual conferences in our church, that the North Carolina Conference change our procedure so that all ministerial members will have equal pensions based on service years when they retire.

The 1984 General Conference made changes in the rules and regulations so that all deferred salary benefits must be based on the minister's plan compensation and paid out on the basis of the minister's actuarial life expectation. No provision is now made to equalize benefits under the Ministerial Pension Plan.

#### VII. Conclusion

Our constant aim is to provide our retired families with their needs for an adequate income to purchase essentials for living as well as to insure adequate care in case of illness. To these ends our recommendations are directed, and their satisfaction is found in the acceptance of the North Carolina Conference and its membership.

#### REPORT C - HOUSING EXCLUSION ALLOWANCE

Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of this Conference:

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as the United Methodist Church has and functions through ministers of the gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of the United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of the United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the North Carolina Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference; and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an

Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received by a retired minister (including amounts received in this respect from the Duke Endowment), or 100% of the disability benefit payments received by a disabled minister, during the year of 1985-1986 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of the United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the North Carolina Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability;

2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of the United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of the United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of the United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities." Beginning in 1984, there is no longer a sick pay or disability income exclusion available with respect to disability benefit payments. Therefore, the full amount of disability benefit payments will be taxable income to the recipient beginning in 1984.

#### REPORT D - CALVIN M. LITTLE ESTATE

The Board of Pensions calls attention to the substantial per service year rate increase which has been made with the last couple of years. The rates have changed from \$164.00 per service year for 1983 to a recommended per service year rate of \$225.00 for 1987. This increase has come about from funds other than through the Annual Conference apportionments in Outreach Ministry asking.

Among these funds are the monies received in 1983 and 1984 through the Calvin M. Little Estate. The Calvin Little Estate gave a total of \$140,890.79 to the Board of Pensions. Every minister who has years of pension service in which the per service year rate is a fact is the beneficiary.

We of the Board of Pensions are grateful to those who were responsible for the Calvin M. Little grant for pension funds. We strongly recommend ministers and lay persons use their influence wherever possible to lead others in making bequests or grants that the pension benefits may continue to increase.

## CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Conference Board of Trustees has met four times since the last Conference session. Other meetings have been held by the Executive Committee and the Staff Parsonage Committee. Much effort has been devoted to developing a plan to maintain properly the seven parsonages owned by the Conference for staff members of the Conference Council on Ministries. We have made available an interest free loan to the Committee on the Episcopal Residence for a much needed renovation of the Episcopal residence.

The significant part of our report and that which requires Conference action is our request for permission from the Annual Conference to build an addition to the Methodist Building. A representative of our board has explained the reason for this request at each district training session of clergy and lay members in the Conference. I would like to give a brief history of the Methodist Building.

A committee headed by O. L. Hathaway called the Methodist Headquarters Committee was established in 1959. At the Conference session held in Rocky Mount in 1960, the Methodist Headquarter Committee, which had previously been established and had chosen Charlie W. Davis, Jr. as the architect, gave a report which generated a mild explosion. The resolution was a decision to have a special session of the Conference to consider the issue.

Bishop Garber called the session at Jarvis Memorial in Greenville for September 9, 1960. The Conference authorized the committee to proceed with the building.

The building was completed and the open house was held Sunday, April 29, 1962. Bishop Garber gave an address and led the "Act of Consecration" which about six hundred people attended. With the completion of landscaping, the total cost was \$662,000. The plan was to pay for the building and maintain it with rent from other tenants plus \$16,000 per year to be paid by the Conference in lieu of rent for the space used by Conference agencies. This year the last payment has been made and the Methodist Building is now debt free. The Conference has invested \$316,398 or slightly less than \$16,000 per year for twenty years. The building is valued at about one and one-fourth million dollars. Though there was considerable controversy over building the headquarters, I know of no one today who questions the wisdom of the decision.

The Board of Trustees feels the time has come when we need to take another step forward. In January, we became aware of three facts. First, our tenant, College Foundation, needed more space; secondly, the Council on Ministries needed additional space; for example, a larger conference room, a working center, and a Media Center. The third fact was the generous decision of the trustees of the Home for Children to make property available to the conference "without cost" that is adjacent to our property and facing Glenwood Avenue. We express deep appreciation for this magnanimous act. We immediately requested F. Carter Williams and Associates, an architectural firm in Raleigh, to do a Feasibility Study. An advisory committee was named to work with the architects. This Committee was made up of trustees and non-trustees. Conference Staff and Council people consulted with the architects about the use of the space.

The architects have advised that we construct a building on the property that is being given by the Home for Children. In approaching this, the plan would be that the Council on Ministries would use the new facilities and therefore, it would be designed for this use and, of course, other conference agencies - the bishop's office and other areas that are now in the part of the building where the Conference agencies are meeting. College Foundation would like all of the space in the present building so the tentative study has indicated that the minimum amount of space needed would be about 25,000 feet.

The architectural firm has indicated that in order to do this and to renovate the present building, because the air conditioning and heating systems must be replaced regardless of what we do, would cost approximately 1.7 million dollars.

The Trustees now have available about 250,000 dollars so we would need to make a loan that we would propose to be done over a 30 year period. We have the approval of CFA who endorses the project and have agreed to help make money available so that it could be financed if you approve of this request.

We move then, Bishop Minnick, that you grant us permission to proceed with the addition. And I would like at least to present Mr. Wells with the architectural firm, a good Methodist in Raleigh, just to stand. If there are technical questions, he can answer them.

#### METHODIST BUILDING ADDITION:

The Conference Board of Trustees is requesting permission from the Annual Conference to build an addition to the Methodist Building in Raleigh. This project will be financed totally with the income from rents/lease, therefore NO FUNDS ARE BEING REQUESTED FROM THE CHURCHES.

In January of 1985, the Conference Board of Trustees was made aware of the need for additional meeting space in the Methodist Building, the intent of the Methodist Home for Children Board to donate property to the Conference, and the need of the current Methodist Building tenant for additional space. The Trustees immediately employed F. Carter Williams, Architects, and appointed an advisory committee to conduct a feasibility study of a possible addition to the building. The architects were given the following instructions:

1. Provide the Conference new offices with the same space.
2. Provide a larger meeting room which could accommodate a COM meeting and serve as a worship center.
3. Add space for a media studio for video production.
4. Add lease office space for the current tenant.
5. Finance the project with no increase in Outreach Ministries Apportionment.

The results of the study were presented to the Board of Trustees on May 9, 1985. The following alternatives were presented:

1. Take no action.
2. Add a minimum structure to the south of the present building.
3. a. Add a 20,000 sq. ft. structure to the south of the present structure.  
b. Add a 15,000 sq. ft. structure to the west of the present structure.
4. Sell the present structure and relocate the offices.

The advisory committee, the architect, and the Board of Trustees have agreed that option 3.a which is to make an addition to the south is the most feasible. Several of the reasons for this conclusion are:

- Additional and more appropriate space can be provided at no cost to the Annual Conference.

- A larger meeting room is needed in the Methodist Building.

- A media video production facility is needed.

The Methodist Building is 20 years old. The Conference invested \$316,398 over the 20 years, provided office space for the Conference staff, and now has a building worth \$1,281,000.

This project will be financed with a loan from the Conference Council on Finance and Administration. The loan will be repaid from rent receipts.

The Board of Trustees acknowledges with appreciation the donation of land which has been offered by the Methodist Home for Children Trustees.

### UNITED METHODIST FOUNDATION, INCORPORATED

In 1955, principally under the direction and guidance of Gurney P. Hood, the United Methodist Foundation, Inc. was chartered to serve as an investment pool and trustee for any agency of the Conference when requested. As of December 31, 1984, the Foundation completed its 30th year of service to this Conference.

This past year's operation again reflects a most favorable performance. Net dividends paid to unit holders was \$1,192,736 - an increase of \$200,256 over the previous year. Total net assets at the year's end had a market value of \$13,293,226 - an increase of \$849,036. This increase was from two sources, new outside funds of \$554,061, and net trading gains of \$294,975.

There were no major changes in the operating policies and guidelines of the Foundation. And, as in the past, the Board of Pensions and the Minister's Retirement Fund continues to hold 81% of the units with a year end market value of \$10,879,160. First Union National Bank continues to manage the investment portfolio (exclusive of mortgage loans) and has exceeded the guidelines as set by the Investment Committee and the actual expectations as set out by the General Board of Pensions.

The unqualified audit by McGladrey, Hendrickson & Pullen, CPA's for the year ending December 31, 1984, is on file in the Conference Treasurer's office for review by any member of this Conference.

I am pleased to report that the Office of Planned Giving, under the direction of Dr. John Bergland, Executive Vice President, has completed three years of operations as part of the Foundation. This stewardship

emphasis, long neglected in the Conference, now appears to be on a sound footing, well received throughout the Conference, and producing many tangible results.

In accordance with guidelines as set out by this Conference, new officers and trustees have been nominated and elected for the current quadrennium. They are: President, Thomas Chandler; Vice-President, Nelson Gibson; Secretary-Treasurer, Herb Stout.

The United Methodist Foundation, Inc., during the past thirty years, has grown to a strong position as an investment pool and trustee for agencies of this Conference, when requested. There is every reason to expect that the Foundation will continue to serve this purpose so well conceived back in 1955 - by Gurney P. Hood.

Change all references in the charter from "Methodist Foundation" to "United Methodist Foundation".

## OFFICE OF PLANNED GIVING

The Office of Planned Giving of the United Methodist Foundation has been blessed by having Dr. John K. Bergland as its Executive Vice President. John came to this office two years ago from the Divinity School at Duke where he gained experience in planned giving.

Many of you may not be familiar with the work of this office, for most of the trust agreements, wills and individual arrangements must be held in confidence. The fruits of John Bergland's work may not be fully known for several decades yet. There are, however, some things which can be told which provide evidence of his ministry in this position.

In two short years he has organized and conducted 82 wills clinics and planned giving seminars. He has preached 72 times in local churches using as his theme, "How One Can Leave His Mark in This World Through Planned Giving". He has held seven district Methodist Foundation banquets to uplift the cause of personal philanthropy.

We can report on more than 15 endowments which have been completed and which will earn funds in perpetuity to benefit local churches and Conference agencies. Many others are in progress or are contained in wills and other confidential documents and will not be made public for years to come.

Some of you may be familiar with the newsletter LEGACIES, which John has developed and distributed widely across the Conference. The emphasis on planned giving has been made through countless brochures and pamphlets which he has developed and distributed to inform and educate us on this complex subject.

You will hear in a few moments about the United Methodist Founders Society, organized to honor those who make possible significant endowments. The bronze circuit rider sculpture is symbolic of Dr. Bergland's work across this Conference.

He is leaving this work to move back into the Parish ministry. We will miss him but his work for the Foundation will never be forgotten. A search committee has been formed. The Conference Treasurer is the contact person.

Dr. Bergland, this token of our gratitude is presented in appreciation for your leadership in the Office of Planned Giving.

## OFFICE OF PLANNED GIVING REPORT

This is the third report I have made to the North Carolina Annual Conference in the interest of the Office of Planned Giving and the Methodist Foundation.

As you know, the Methodist Foundation, incorporated in 1955, has been given two responsibilities in its charter. The first is to provide a trustworthy depository for the permanent funds of United Methodists in North Carolina. An Investment Committee named by the Board of Directors faithfully discharges that responsibility. Their record of wise and faithful money management is outstanding. The second function of the foundation is to encourage gifts and wills and to promote the stewardship of accumulated assets. Estate planning is important not only for the financial support it provides, usually through endowments for our institutions and programs, but is also of strategic importance to individuals and families who are member of our local churches.

Financial planning precedes planned giving. Only about fifty percent of our people have taken the initial step in estate planning - making their own will.

Wills Emphasis Week, the second Sunday following Easter, provided the occasion to distribute information regarding the importance of a will through a bulletin insert. More than 80,000 of these were sent out to our local churches.

I have travelled through the church and am grateful for the ways in which I have been welcomed and received. Most Sunday mornings have found me meeting with Adult Sunday School Classes and with local church leadership responsible for the stewardship program. Pastors have been generous in their invitation to preach and I have welcomed the opportunity to bear witness to my faith in Christ.

The 1984 DISCIPLINE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH included for the first time references to planned giving in the sections related to the Work Area of Stewardship. New resources are being developed by the National Division of Stewardship. There is a growing number of persons who can provide excellent leadership in this area. Almost every local church has attorneys, trust officers, insurance brokers and financial planning professionals who will gladly provide the ways and means of planned giving.

A planned gift is one that requires a professional to put it in place. Planned giving still remains a largely untapped resource and opportunity in the life of the church. I commend the North Carolina Conference for its wisdom in being the first Annual Conference to create a Foundation and encourage you to give it lasting support.

## OTHER REPORTS

### THE CANDLER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Greetings from Candler. Our 1984-1985 academic year has been one of major accomplishment. This year our enrollment has reached a record 699. Of that number 475 are in the Master of Divinity program, preparing for local church ministry.

Candler has begun to develop a plan to strengthen its offerings in preaching. We are particularly concerned about basic speaking skills of students and are launching a program to assist each incoming student in need of improvement in public speaking.

Candler has also laid plans to increase its supervision of student pastors who serve churches while attending seminary. Atlanta businessman O. Wayne Rollins, chairman and chief executive officer of Rollins, Inc., has contributed \$1 million for a program in pastoral supervision and church ministries at Candler. The gift will establish a professorship in practical theology and church ministries, provide scholarships for student pastors and endow continued funding of these programs. Dr. John Freeman has been appointed to direct field supervision in the North Georgia Teaching Parish and to serve as an assistant professor of practical theology.

Scholars Press, a nationally recognized publishing consortium which specializes in printing and distributing scholarly works in religion and related fields, will affiliate with Emory and Candler this year. They are expected to move to our campus this fall.

Candler has made significant headway in its efforts to support students, particularly as a result of the Sherman Scholarship Fund. The



donors to this fund, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sherman, wish to assist those who are committed to an evangelical, biblically based ministry in our denomination. By 1985, 150 Sherman Scholars will be receiving major assistance as they prepare at Candler for Christian ministry.

The Pitts Theology Library continues to build its collection of African Christian Church materials and is fast becoming the leading repository of this material in the world. Total volumes in this library now exceed 388,000.

The Institute for World Evangelism, which we co-sponsor with the World Methodist Council, has plans for a major seminar on evangelism in the summer of 1985 in Australia. The work of this Institute continues to bless those who wish to improve the outreach of the Church in a world in need of Christ.

I am pleased to report to you on our progress and to thank you for the sustaining help which comes to us from the Ministerial Education Fund. Without that assistance Candler could not hope to continue to accomplish all it has for the life of the Church.

## THE DUKE ENDOWMENT

The Duke Endowment, now sixty-one years old, has proven to be one of the outstanding philanthropies of all times. When James B. Duke signed the Indenture creating The Duke Endowment on December 11, 1924, he established a charitable trust, with the expressed purpose "...to make provision in some measure for the needs of mankind along physical, mental and spiritual lines..."

Mr. Duke specified the beneficiaries of the charitable trust as not-for-profit hospitals and child care institutions in the two Carolinas, rural United Methodist churches in the two Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in North Carolina, together with retired ministers and widows and children of deceased ministers of those conferences, and four educational institutions - Duke University, Davidson College, Furman University and Johnson C. Smith University. In talking about the Indenture, Mr. Duke concluded that he might have extended aid to other causes and to other sections of the country but asserted his belief that "so doing probably would be productive of less good by reason of attempting too much." History has sustained Mr. Duke's wisdom in defining very specifically the beneficiaries of the trust.

Mr. Duke's concern for rural United Methodist congregations, ministers and their families, was an outgrowth of his early personal experience in the Methodist Church in rural Durham County. He knew the importance of the circuit-riding Methodist preachers to the spiritual life of his family and neighbors. The Duke Endowment support of rural United Methodist churches continues to be fulfilled in the manner specified by Mr. Duke, namely, grants for rural church building programs, grants to maintain and operate rural churches and to assist annually retired ministers and dependents of deceased ministers.

Under the Building Rural Churches Program, the Trustees of The Duke Endowment continue to support churches through grants for building programs as well as through consultation on the part of the staff of the Rural Church Division and a strong commitment for excellence in church buildings in the two North Carolina Annual Conferences. The Rural Church Program of The Duke Endowment is unique, giving rural United Methodist churches in North Carolina an opportunity for quality in building not known elsewhere.

In a never-ending attempt to meet the needs of rural United Methodist churches in the two North Carolina Annual Conferences, the Committee on Rural Churches of The Duke Endowment has approved and will recommend at the July meeting of the Trustees that \$100,000 be appropriated for weatherization programs in one district in the North Carolina Conference and one district in the Western North Carolina Conference. Recognizing the continued increase in energy costs, this program provides a way to reduce measurably the amount of money churches will have to invest in energy. If the pilot projects prove successful, we would anticipate offering this service to the other districts in the two Annual Conferences. The weatherization program will be a joint project of the North Carolina Energy Conservation Fund, the Rural Church Division of The Duke Endowment and the local congregations. The purpose of this venture is to make the rural churches in the two districts as energy efficient as possible. The Duke Endowment will provide all the materials for the weatherization program; the North Carolina Energy Conservation Fund will be responsible for purchasing the materials, doing the energy audit in each church and training people to install the conservation measures; and the local

congregations will provide the volunteer labor to do the installation work.

The significance of the weatherization program is the opportunity it offers The Duke Endowment to help many small rural churches that have not had a building program in the last sixty-one years and do not anticipate building in the near future. By helping in the weatherization program, The Duke Endowment can assist those who would not otherwise be beneficiaries of Mr. Duke's generosity.

This past Conference year was the first year of a new quadrennium in the United Methodist Church. Both the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conference received new Bishops; and since there has been a number of district superintendent changes in the last few years, the two Bishops and their Cabinets were invited to come to Duke and meet with the staff people from The Duke Endowment and the Duke Divinity School. One of the goals of the Rural Church Division is to publicize as much as possible the assistance available to rural United Methodist churches in the State of North Carolina. It is the conviction of this office that that can be done best by the district superintendents of the United Methodist Church. Ours is a connecational system and the superintendents, better than anyone else, are aware of the needs of churches within their districts. The meetings with the two Cabinets were very fruitful and the Bishops and Cabinets were very responsive.

The provisions of the Indenture represented what Mr. Duke felt was a personal Christian duty. He was confident that rural Methodist churches were where "we were to look, in a large measure, for the bone and sinew of our country". The Duke Endowment today continues to try to fulfill Mr. Duke's concern and dream.

Thus, we have the opportunity to assume greater influence in the programming of the General Church.

As the quadrennium progresses, we will be reporting to the Conference Council on Ministries as well as to the Annual Conference. We will be following how the current missional priority is being emphasized and at the same time joining in discussion of other priorities to be considered by the 1988 General Conference. It is my honor to chair one of the basic committees of GCOM, the Research Committee, and to serve on the Council's Executive Committee. I trust that my service, along with that of Robby

Lowry, Carl King, and our Conference representatives to other General Church Boards and Agencies will reflect well on the North Carolina Conference.

### HINTON RURAL LIFE CENTER

Hinton Rural Life Center began in 1957 with a vision, a building, and four and one-half acres of land in Hayesville, North Carolina. The Center came into being as the result of a gift of property from Mr. and Mrs. J. Walter Moore of Hayesville; a gift of money by Mrs. Harold H. Hinton in memory of her late husband, Harold H. Hinton, of Athens, Georgia; and contributions of money, materials, and labor made by people and churches interested in the development of a rural life center under the auspices of the Methodist Church. Twenty-five years ago Hinton's ministry was a dream - an idea in the minds of United Methodists concerned about the church's role in town and country areas. Today the Hinton Rural Life Center, a mission agency of the United Methodist Church, occupies about thirteen acres of land on Lake Chatuge, and a small staff carries out an innovative ministry with churches of small membership in town and rural areas. In addition to the original Lodge, a cottage in memory of James Sells, one of the original Hinton visionaries, provides facilities for small retreat and workshop groups.

In 1985 alone, workshop events included: The Holy Earth Movement: Alternative Agriculture, Images of New Life in the Small Membership Church, Solar Energy "Hands On" Workshop, Evaluation of Co-operative Ministries, Evangelism and Church Growth, Serving a First Appointment in Town and Rural Settings, Leadership in Cooperative Ministries, Team Building, Affirming the Small Membership Church, Spiritual Formation and Peacemaking Seminar.

This agency is a project of the National Division of the Board of Global Ministries and part of its history, purpose, and bylaws reads, "The purpose of the Hinton Rural Life Center is to create a conscience and conviction concerning our responsibility to man and to God for the conservation, development, and right use of the total resources of life". It is people ministering to people in workshops, consultation, resources, research, youth ministries, internships, and retreat facilities.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

The 1984 Session of the General Conference held in Baltimore, Maryland, May 1-11, proposed by more than the required two-thirds vote the following constitutional amendments and ordered their presentation to the Annual Conference for vote:

1984-25

DISCIPLINE, Par. 1 - delete "ecclesiastical and legal" - The paragraph would then read: "Paragraph 1. Article 1. Declaration of Union. - The Evangelical United Brethren Church and The Methodist Church shall be united in one Church. The united church, as thus constituted, is, and shall be the successor of the two uniting churches."

1984-26

DISCIPLINE, Par. 6 - delete "automatically vest in The United Methodist Church." - Add "...be held and administered in accordance with the BOOK OF DISCIPLINE."

The paragraph would then read: "Paragraph 6. Article VI. Title to Properties - Titles to properties in The Evangelical United Brethren Church and The Methodist Church shall, upon consummation of the union, be held and administered in accordance with the BOOK OF DISCIPLINE..."

1984-27

DISCIPLINE, Par. 35 - add following "together with a lay member elected by each charge," "the diaconal ministers"

The paragraph would then read: "Paragraph 35. Article 1. - The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the diaconal ministers, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, district lay leaders, the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult organization, the president of the conference youth organization, and two young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age from each district to be selected in such manner as may be determined by the Annual Conference..."

### A Resolution on Capital Punishment

In spite of heartening statistics on serious crimes, the fear of crime compels continuing support for capital punishment in the United States. Since 1973, more than a dozen executions have been implemented. In 1984 alone there were 10 executions, including two in North Carolina: James H. Hutchins and Velma Barfield.

WHEREAS the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church oppose capital punishment and urge its elimination from all criminal codes and

WHEREAS capital punishment eliminates all possibilities of earthly redemption, and

WHEREAS the teachings of Christ do not support capital punishment, and WHEREAS there is no empirical evidence that capital punishment is a deterrent to crime, and

WHEREAS the execution of the criminal does little to comfort the family of the criminal's victim and the exhaustive system of appeals can create undue hardships on the families of victims, and

WHEREAS the record of capital punishment in the United States is marked by racial and class distinction, and

WHEREAS the legal system that implements capital punishment to promote mercy has injected arbitrariness,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church opposes capital punishment and urges that more attention be focused on the poverty and strife that would promote one to kill another human being, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to Senators John East and Jesse Helms, to Governor James G. Martin, Lt. Governor Robert Jordan, and distributed to the news media by the Office of Communications of the North Carolina Conference.

### A Resolution on Central America

To fulfill Christ's mandate to give concrete expressions of love to the suffering and to respond to the 1984 General Conference resolutions on "Assistance and Sanctuary for Central American Refugees" and "Concern for Human Rights in Central America", this North Carolina Annual Conference:

- 1) Joins the team of United Methodist bishops, led by our own Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., who visited Nicaragua in January 1985, in acting to:
  - protest United States support for "contra" activity
  - urge negotiated non-violent settlements
  - be constant in prayer for peace
- 2) Designates Central America Week for March 1986, to be observed throughout our Conference through education, worship, and actions and asks the Board of Church and Society to provide local churches with resources, speakers and programs for this observance.
- 3) Expresses support to United Methodist congregations who have chosen to be or will choose to be sanctuary churches for Central American refugees and extends our appreciation for General Board of Global Ministries' and General Board of Church and Society's support of United Methodist Sanctuary Churches and United Methodists indicted for their sanctuary work, including Phil Conger and Peggy Hutchinson.
- 4) Urges churches in this Conference, in accordance with the General Conference resolution on "Sanctuary", to consider the opportunity to join the underground railway of sanctuary churches and pledges the support of the Conference and its agencies in such witness.
- 5) Deplores government infiltrating and wiretapping of churches and indictment of sanctuary workers whom we believe to be acting in accordance with the Refugee Act of 1980 and the 1967 United Nations Protocol Relating to the Status of Refugees.
- 6) Urges our members and churches to join Christians in North and Central America in observing the 24th of each month as a special day of prayer for justice and peace in Central America. (In El Salvador the Mothers and Wives of the Disappeared gather for a vigil on this day each month.)
- 7) A. We, as a body of United Methodists, express to the communist regimes infiltrating Central America, our strongest opposition to their presence and the active attempt to overthrow the governments of Central America, and we, therefore, call for an

immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all arms and foreign soldiers from South America, thereby removing the threat of war and suffering due to war in our hemisphere.

- B. We call upon the government leaders of Central America to submit to Christ's example of love and compassion, thereby illuminating the social injustices that have caused the revolution by the people of Central America.
  - C. We call upon the government leaders of Central America to immediately stop the slaughter of its citizens and the destruction of its resources.
  - D. We call upon the government leaders of Central America to stop immediately the persecution of Christians, pastors of churches, evangelists, and missionaries in their countries, and to restore the freedom of worship of God and expression of faith throughout the land without fear of reprisals.
  - E. We call upon the government leaders of Central America to grant amnesty to all political prisoners held in prisons in Central America, and to return these prisoners to their families safely.
- 8) Asks members to endorse the recent Council of Bishops' recommendations concerning Central America; they are as follows:
- express to the United States President its strong opposition to the recently ordered trade embargo between the United States and Nicaragua
  - call for unrestricted travel rights to Nicaragua
  - support the organizing of peace/study tours to Nicaragua
  - urge United States church groups to covenant relationships with local congregations in Nicaragua, try to persuade the President and Congress to support the Contadora peace initiatives and proposals and to engage in bilateral negotiations with Nicaragua for a non-violent settlement of disagreements
  - express appreciation to members of Congress who opposed further financial assistance to rebels fighting the Nicaraguan government.

#### **A Resolution on Charitable Deductions for Federal Income Tax**

WHEREAS recent tax proposals within the Treasury Department may seek to severely limit or abolish the charitable deduction for federal income tax purposes; and

WHEREAS it has been public policy for the government to encourage philanthropic giving and charitable work through the maintenance of a charitable deduction from federal income tax since the inception of the federal income tax law; and

WHEREAS it is reported that among proposals under consideration are the elimination of the charitable deduction for non-itemizing taxpayers originally enacted in 1981, the elimination of deductions for charitable gifts under 2% of the taxpayers adjusted gross income, and the limitation of charitable deductions for gifts of appreciated property to actual costs plus an inflation factor, or actual market value, whichever is less; and

WHEREAS studies indicate that the impact of such proposals would be to decrease the total of charitable gifts, as well as to significantly reduce the leadership gifts to charitable causes, on the order of an \$800 million (27%) decrease in giving to institutions of higher education, and an eight billion dollar (18%) decrease in giving for religious purposes, and an overall decrease in charitable giving of 17%-20%, or \$10-\$12 billion; and

WHEREAS in light of proposals to curtail or cut back government programs in support of education and for the provision of social services, it is expected that churches and other non-profit organizations will move to take on a greater role in these areas; and

WHEREAS in order to assume such a role, such organizations will need to make greater demands upon their constituencies for financial support; and

WHEREAS the tax proposals as reported would instead negatively impact upon the levels of such support, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church hereby records its strong support for maintenance of the existing rules regarding income tax deductibility for all charitable contributions, continuation of the charitable deduction for non-itemizing taxpayers, and continuation of the current rules concerning gifts for appreciated property at market value.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church instruct the secretary and the treasurer of the Conference to send a copy of this resolution to President Reagan, Secretary of the Treasury Baker and all members of the North Carolina congressional delegation.



God is sovereign. The scriptures and Christian living witness to this faith. Consequently, God will have the final word; human destructiveness will not finally frustrate God's will. The intention God has for human life will be achieved. Our confidence is in God. Nevertheless, as Christians, we are called to be stewards of this, God's world.

Genesis 1:27-2:1

- So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.
- God blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air and over every living creature that moves on the ground.
- Then God said, "I give you every seed bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it. They will be yours for food. And to all the beast of the earth and all the birds of the air and all the creatures that move on the ground - everything that has the breath of life in it - I give every green plant for food". And it was so.
- God saw all that he had made, and it was very good. And there was evening, and there was morning - the sixth day.
- Thus the heavens and the earth were completed in all their vast array.

Our responsibility as God's stewards and in covenant relationship with God (a relationship of love and redemption) demands that we prayerfully with reason and strength oppose the escalating arms race. This weapons race misdirects resources, funds and energy from the alleviation of human suffering. This race also threatens a devastating nuclear holocaust - a human inspired destruction of all the good which God has and is creating. The multitude of nuclear bombs are human creations and we cannot stand idle as their number increases.

Therefore, be it resolved that we United Methodists call for all nations of the world to disarm so as to reduce this real possibility of wholesale destruction.

Be it resolved that copies of this resolution be sent to the United Methodist Office of Communications for release to the news media, our president, senators, congressmen, and governor, as well as to the Soviet leadership, and leaders of all countries with nuclear capability.

### **A Resolution from The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries**

WHEREAS the following legislation was enacted during the 1984 General Conference, found in the 1984 BOOK OF DISCIPLINE, Pr. 730.4 (23):

"The Annual Conference and each health and welfare institution shall have a clearly stated document which describes their legal and financial relationships; provided that no such document shall impose as a party to it The United Methodist Church and/or the General Board of Global Ministries."

BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Annual Conference approve the necessary steps to carry out this legislation of the General Conference and that a committee be appointed to develop a mutual agreement between the Annual Conference and each institution concerning their relationships. The document to be developed shall include the legal and financial relationships of the North Carolina Annual Conference and the Health and Welfare Institutions. The committee is to be comprised of representatives from the Board of Health and Welfare and the Institutions providing the services, (The Methodist Retirement Homes and The Methodist Home for Children), and appropriate legal counsel.

### **A Resolution on South Africa**

To express our firm belief that racism is a rejection of the teachings of Jesus Christ and that racism denies the redemption and reconciliation of Jesus Christ, and to respond to the 1984 General Conference resolution on Southern Africa which calls the system of apartheid "racism in its cruelest form", this North Carolina Annual Conference:

- 1) Declares that in Jesus Christ, who is victorious over sin and death, the power of apartheid is broken and in the fullness of time is doomed to fall.
- 2) Renounces any hold that apartheid may have upon our Annual Conference, our churches or our church investments and programs.



- 3) Urges our churches to make this same declaration in their own name and to proclaim their support for a "Free South Africa".
- 4) Expresses support for our bishops, pastors, church members, and national church staff who have participated in the Free South Africa and TransAfrica witness at the South African embassy and consulates.
- 5) Urges involvement of United Methodists in efforts to stop the sale of the Krugerrand in our communities (Krugerrand Information Service, 1-800-356-4653, gives information regarding dealers in all areas.)
- 6) Requests Bishop Minnick to appoint a Committee on South African Investments to implement the 1985 General Conference resolution to "encourage United Methodist and United Methodist agencies and institutions to join with others in their communities to close accounts with and withdraw funds from banks and divest from corporations doing business in South Africa." This committee shall implement, within the North Carolina Annual Conference, the April, 1985, resolution on South Africa enacted by the General Board of Global Ministries by distributing the requests of that resolution to each local church and agency of the North Carolina Annual Conference, requesting that each church and agency having invested funds support the requests of the resolution. It is recommended that this committee include representation from the Board of Church and Society, EMLC, the Board of Missions, COSROW, Finance and Administration, Religion and Race, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Pensions, and the Cabinet. Participant's expenses on the committee shall be paid through the organization they represent.
- 7) Observe September 25 and the Sunday preceding it (September 22) as world-wide South Africa Day.

## A Resolution on Victims of Crime

### THEOLOGICAL STATEMENT

The bible clearly states a concern for the victims of crime and recognizes that all victims have rights. In the Scriptures, the criminal was accountable to the victim or the head of the victim's household. Provisions for compensation or physical punishment applied for crimes against citizens, slaves, and even the unborn (Exod.21:20, 23-25).

Crime was an offense against both the victim and God, the giver of the law. Society was responsible for enforcing the law and executing justice. God held the community responsible for the crimes it failed to punish (cf. Lev. 18:26-28; 26:3-45; Deut.28). In the New Testament, Christ's statement to Pilate (John 19:11a) meant that civil government was held accountable for justice. Christians were encouraged to support government in enforcing the law, even if the government was not based on biblical authority (Romans 13:1-5). Laws of common decency were the result of God's grace, regardless the government that enacted them. Society was responsible for the protection of its citizens and the enforcement of the law.

Biblical law required the criminal to compensate the victim (Lev. 5:1-5; 24:18, 21a; Exod. 21:18-19, 33-36; 22:1-16). Penalties were set for their deterrent value (Deut. 19:20; 17:13; 21:21), and to cover the victim's losses. Fines were paid directly to the victim or to the victim's family. Christ carried this concept a step further in the story of the "Good Samaritan" (Luke 10:29-37). Jesus criticized his own people for their lack of compassion for the victim. Being a good neighbor meant getting involved, even if the law didn't require it. The victim's suffering was reason enough for people to cover the costs of crime.

Vengeance was never a right of the victim. The penalty of "an eye for an eye", etc. (Exod. 21:22-24; Lev. 24:19-20; Deut. 19-21) attempted to make the penalty fit the crime, as opposed to the excesses of pure revenge. The avenger was strictly limited to the extent of punishment and acted on behalf of society. Vengeance was a divine prerogative (Deut. 32:35, 41, 43). Jesus confirmed this in his statement on the treatment of the offender (Matt. 5:43-44). Paul's advice to the church at Rome was to leave vengeance to God (Rom. 12:14-21).

### VICTIM'S RIGHTS IN TODAY'S SOCIETY

Our legal system has the difficult task of protecting society from the criminal. Persons keep criminals away from the public and serve as punishment for crime. Fines are set for their deterrent value, not as payment for the damage of the crime. Victims are compensated after society collected its dues and punishment is completed. Victims are forced to work with a system far more concerned with the crime and the criminal than with the needs and emotions of the victim. When the victim is the last priority of society, justice is easily forgotten.

The young lawyer's Division of the North Carolina Bar Association compares the rights of the criminal to the rights of the victim thus:

"For the Criminal:

- Pre-arrest/Arrest: - Must be informed of rights
- Receives free medical attention
- Provided with free attorney
- Pre-trial: - May be released
- May get help finding work & psychological counseling
- Has right to speedy trial
- May succeed in delaying trial
- Trial: - Has right to confront victims and witnesses
- Has right to remain silent
- Has right to appeal
- Sentence: - Has right to have emotional & financial problems considered
- Has right to make a statement to the judge
- Post-sentence - Has access to medical & psychological treatment
- Has access to educational & job development
- Has good time credit available
- May be eligible for early parole
- May get work release, free education & other rehabilitation services

FOR THE VICTIM

"The victim has no choice in becoming a victim. The victim's rights, if any, are entirely dependent on the understanding and sympathy of law enforcement officials, district attorneys and judges. Their rights are never guaranteed and most often ignored.." ("Final Committee Report 1983-1984, Crime Victim Services", Young Lawyers Division, North Carolina Bar Association, Raleigh, North Carolina)

While the laws hold the criminal accountable to society, the victim often is left with a loss unrequited. Lengthy legal procedures require the victim to open wounds of grief and loss without consideration of effect. Even when the criminal is punished, victims may not feel that the punishment fits the crime and are rarely consulted during plea bargaining or sentencing. Victims rarely feel safer after the police and courts have finished with the case.

Victims may suffer grievous personal loss or injury as a result of crime. Apart from the physical or material damage, victims suffer emotional scars that may never heal. Very few agencies or resources exist to help the victim through the crisis. Churches often do not know how to help a victim with the emotional or physical needs resulting from a crime. Victims even find themselves blamed for carelessness that may have left them vulnerable.

CHRISTIAN RESPONSIBILITIES

We call upon all Christians and Christian institutions to condemn crime in our society. Criminal acts are not only contrary to the laws of the land, but to God's intent that all people live in harmony with one another. Failure to condemn crime is the same as complicity in crime.

As Christians, we affirm the right of all people to live free from fear. Life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness are more than constitutional rights; they are part of the freedom which God intends for humanity. Victims of crime are people whose rights have been violated and who need to regain a sense of their own worth and freedom. Civil authorities are rightly entrusted with the protection of the innocent from the predators in society. Support of those responsible for protecting society is an inherent part of our affirmation.

Churches and Christian institutions should develop methods to assist victims in dealing with feelings of anger and helplessness. These feelings need to be expressed without developing into hatred or vengeance. Victims need support through the lengthy process of resolving the legal, material, physical, psychological, and spiritual effects of their ordeal.

PUBLIC POLICIES

Laws are needed to improve the efficiency of the courts. A speedy trial is a right of both the defendant AND the victim.

We call upon the legislatures, to enact and fund policies which meet the needs of victims. Programs such as victim compensation, help with medical expenses, and counseling services are needed to help the victim recover from the effects of crime. Funding should first be obtained from the criminal's personal assets, or from work performed by the criminal during incarceration or parole.

Services should automatically be provided to victims to inform them of their rights in the trial and the procedures necessary for a conviction. The victim should be told about parking, child care, explanation to

employers, and other services which may help them to appear in court.

The victim should be considered when scheduling trials; court appearances are necessary, but continue the hardship already experienced. Victims should be heard during sentencing, and plea bargaining. Victims should be notified of and be heard at parole hearings. Victims should be notified when the offender is released from custody. In cases where the victim consents, criminals should be allowed to meet with victims or listen indirectly to the victim to hear the effects of the crime.

We ask law enforcement agencies to be sensitive to the emotional needs of victims. Victims must be allowed the dignity of their humanity while providing the necessary evidence for the police.

#### DISTRIBUTION

The Secretary of the Annual Conference will distribute this position paper to the following state public officials and media:

The Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Attorney General, Secretary of Crime Control and Public Safety, and the news media.

## SOCIETY OF ST. ANDREW

### POTATO PROJECT PARTNERS

What are Potato Project Partners? They are churches that covenant with the Society of St. Andrew to help feed the hungry of America.

#### THE POTATO PROJECT:

The Potato Project is a produce salvage program that provides direct food relief to our nation's poor while addressing one of the major causes of hunger - food waste. This two pronged attack on hunger is responsible for distributing millions of pounds of potatoes and yams to hungry Americans in a nationwide direct relief effort. At a total cost of less than four cents per pound, nutritious produce (that is normally dumped to rot) is salvaged and distributed to food banks, Native American Reservations, and other agencies working to feed the poor and hungry. Expansion of this project is currently limited only by available finances.

#### ADVANTAGES OF BEING A POTATO PROJECT PARTNER:

The Partner Program is action oriented. Being a Partner provides a way for a congregation to directly aid the poor and hungry of our nation.

It's good stewardship. Contributions to the Potato Project feed potatoes to hungry Americans for less than four cents per pound.

It's effective. Studies consistently show that one of the major causes of hunger is food waste. Being a Partner allows congregations to attack hunger at one of its root causes - waste.

#### WHAT DOES THE POTATO PROJECT OFFER ITS PARTNERS?

A bi-monthly newsletter for pastors and other local church leaders responsible for program planning. The newsletter will keep you up to date on the progress of the Project in your area and around the nation.

Potato Project bulletin inserts will be available on request to help keep the hunger issue before congregations.

A specially designed poster identifying the church as a Potato Project Partner. This can be used to acquaint church members with the project and to hold the church's participation before its members.

Potato Project descriptive brochures are available in quantity on request. These are useful in acquainting church members with the basis message of the project.

Additional services are also available. Video tape programs and slide presentations on the Project, advice on creating local hunger ministries and other hunger related ministries, are a few examples.

#### WHAT DOES A POTATO PROJECT PARTNER AGREE TO DO?

Place the hunger issue prominently on the church agenda, with emphasis on involving the congregation in feeding the hungry both locally and nationally.

Designate a person who will serve as the contact between the local church and the Potato Project staff. This person may be the pastor or a member of the congregation. This person will receive the bi-monthly newsletter and all other regular mailings.

Support the ongoing work of the Potato Project with financial contributions. This should be done while maintaining or increasing local and denominational hunger commitments. To become a full partner, we ask a church to make a commitment to cover the cost of shipping of a tractor trailer load of potatoes (45,000 lbs.) at an average cost of 3.5 cents per pound. This is a financial commitment of \$1,500. Congregations that can commit to more than one truckload add much needed support to the Potato Project's ministry to our nation's hungry.

#### WHY THE POTATO PROJECT PARTNERS PROGRAM?

Since its inception in June of 1983, the Potato Project has grown at a

dizzying pace. The potential for further growth, both in potatoes and other produce, is nearly limitless. The simplicity of the concept and the effectiveness of the program have caught the imagination of congregations across the nation. We are continually asked, "How can our church become involved?" The Potato Project Partners Program is a response to these appeals. The Partners Program provides a way for local churches to share in this exciting ministry. ## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### Note 1. Significant Accounting Policies

Real estate, major additions to real estate, and major purchases of furniture and equipment are stated at cost. Minor purchases of furniture and equipment and minor repairs are expensed as incurred. The Conference does not provide for depreciation.

Fund balances within this report include unexpended funds raised during the Conference year ended December 31, 1984, which are to be expended during the year ending December 31, 1985.

### Note 2. Funds

Fund transactions included within this report represent all funds administered by the treasurer, except for The Methodist Foundation, Inc. This report does not necessarily present all funds of the North Carolina Conference, S.E.J., of The United Methodist Church.

### Note 3. Subsequent Receipts and Disbursements

Cash receipts and cash disbursements in the amount of \$921,483 and \$685,053, respectively, were actually received or disbursed subsequently to December 31, 1984. These transactions are applicable to the conference year ended December 31, 1984, and are, therefore, included in the accompanying financial statements.

### Note 4. Pension Fund

In 1981 the Conference began participating in the pension program of the General Board of Pensions which basically provides that benefits accruing for service years after 1981 will be funded currently through contributions from the minister and his/her church or charge. Further, the Conference agreed to fund the past service liability for service years prior to 1981. On January 1, 1985 the actuarially computed unfunded liability based on a per service rate of \$180 was approximately \$16,900,000.

### Note 5. Investments

Investments are stated at cost. Market value of investments at December 31, 1984 was \$18,700,839.

### Note 6. Accounts Receivable

The accounts receivable of the Conference Board of Trustees includes \$20,586 representing net rentals not yet remitted by the former rental agent. Although the collectibility of this amount is uncertain, the Administration feels that this entire amount will be collected.

### Note 7. Fund Balance

Certain funds represent amounts raised and expended during the current year. As a result, these funds have no assets, liabilities or fund balance.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1. Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies

United Methodist Foundation, Inc. was established primarily as an investment pool available for organizations, churches and agencies related to the North Carolina Conference, S.E.J., of the United Methodist Church. The Foundation also receives gifts and bequests on behalf of the member organizations. Its financial statements are prepared primarily in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for investment companies.

Significant accounting policies of the Foundation are:

Valuation of securities:

Investments are stated at market value, based on closing prices reported on National Securities Exchanges on December 31, or at the last bid price, for over the counter securities.

General:

The Foundation follows the accounting practice of "equalization" whereby undistributed investment income per unit is unaffected by sales or redemptions of units

Security transactions are accounted for on the trade date. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date.

Realized gains and losses from security transactions are reported on the first in, first out basis.

The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954.
