200th ANNIVERSARY OF LOUISBURG COLLEGE

Louisburg College, located in Louisburg, North Carolina, is the oldest chartered twoyear, coeducational, church-related college in America.

The roots of the institution may be traced back to the post-Revolutionary War era, when on January 6, 1787, the legislature chartered Franklin Academy - the first ancestor of Louisburg College. One member of the first board of trustees was the Reverend John King, who had participated in the first Annual Conference of the Methodist Church in America (held near Louisburg).

The institution achieved college status in 1857, when Main Building opened its doors to students. Many of the persons who have served as College Presidents and Trustees have been ministers or active members of the Methodist Church. In the 1870's, Raleigh District Methodists sponsored the school, and in the 1890's Louisburg Methodists were the chief supporters.

In 1896, Washington Duke owned the College property, and Methodist leader Matthew S. Davis served as President. From 1907 to 1909, Benjamin Duke made possible a transfer of College ownership to the North Carolina Conference.

Over the past two hundred years, Louisburg College and its ancestor institutions have benefited greatly from Methodist leadership and support. The newest building on campus, the Clifton L. Benson Chapel and Religious Life Center, is a recent example of the continuing interest of Methodists in the progress of Louisburg College. The Raleigh District United Methodist Men were instrumental in the Chapel project.

Under the leadership of President J. Allen Norris, Jr., Louisburg College is entering its third century with renewed commitment to its mission of providing opportunities for the academic and spiritual growth of young people. The United Methodist connection is the College's greatest asset!

I. COMPOSITION:

The North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church is composed of:

- 1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Protestant Church.
- 2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church South.
- 3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.
- 4) The Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction.

II. ORGANIZATION:

- The organizing dates of the four former Conferences were as follows:
- The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina.
- The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia.
- 3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.
- 4) The Eastern District North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference was organized at a special session on August 11, 1964, at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina.

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE

Section I: Rules of Order

- 1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these rules.
- A member may speak out only once on any one motion until all who desire to speak have done so; and then he/she may speak only one additional time.
- The chairperson of an agency (or someone designated by him/her) shall be allowed to speak last on his/her report even though the previous questions have been ordered.
 Speeches shall be limited to ten (10) minutes except by consent of the conference.
- 5. If any part of these rules conflict with The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, the Discipline shall prevail.
- The Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church shall apply to the Annual Conference as regularly scheduled and to all called sessions of the conference.

Section II: Voting

- 1. Voting shall be by "yes or no" or by a "show of hands" or by "standing" at the discretion of the chair.
- A count vote may be ordered or called by any member of the conference supported by
 one-fifth (1/5) of the members present and voting. The results of a count vote shall be
 printed in the Journal. The chair may call for a count vote if he/she is in doubt as to the
 outcome of the vote.
- All votes shall be cast in the bar of the conference. The bar of the conference shall be determined by the conference at the beginning of the first session.

Section III: Election of Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences

- The election of clerical delegates shall be by secret ballot. (Each person eligible to vote shall indicate his/her choice of names for the places ordered by the chair on the secret ballot without prior nomination, with balloting to continue until a majority is received by sufficient persons to fulfill the needed number of delegates.)
- a. Any lay person who is a member of United Methodist Church of the North Carolina Annual Conference who wishes to be a nominee may submit a resume, not to exceed 200 words. Resumes may also be submitted on behalf of a prospective nominee.
 - Consent of the nominee should be obtained after the nominee has been informed
 of the duties of a delegate.
 - Any lay member of the Church may be voted for whether a resume is submitted or not.
 - d. Resumes should be mailed to the Conference lay leader by April 1 of the year prior to the upcoming General and Jurisdictional Conferences.
 - The list of nominees and their resumes will be prepared and distributed by the Conference Board of Lay Life and Work at the District Briefings or be mailed with the Book of Reports.
 - f. The election of lay delegates shall be by secret ballot as above. Electors may vote for any eligible person, whether nominated as above or not.
- 3. All votes shall be cast upon the official ballots authorized by the conference.
- 4. Ballots shall be numbered consecutively and only ballots with the number announced by the chair shall be valid. Defaced ballots will not be valid. (If a member defaces a ballot, he/she may exchange it for a new one at the secretary's desk.)
- 5. Each member will place his/her own ballot in the ballot box held by a teller.
- 6. Different colored ballots will be provided for lay and clerical members.
- The names of persons receiving less than ten votes shall not be reported to the Conference.
- 8. Five alternates to Jurisdictional Conference shall be elected.
- 9. A ballot will be considered invalid in the following cases:
 - a. Any electronic ballot which is not marked clearly and darkly with a number 2 lead pencil. (Any the scanner will not read.)
 - b. More or less than the maximum number of votes permitted on that particular ballot.
 - c. Voting for a person already elected.
 - d. Voting for someone not eligible.
 - e. Voting twice for the same person.

Section IV: Conference Structure

- The Bishop and Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases where the Discipline or the Annual Conference directs otherwise.
- Near the end of each quadrennium, the heads of all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees shall submit a list of qualified, suggested nominees to the Bishop and the Cabinet for their consideration in the formation of new Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees.
- Recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Annual Conference.
- 4. a. At the beginning of each quadrennium all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees shall elect their officers only after all their members have been notified of the organizational meeting. A member of the Cabinet or the Conference Staff (designated by the Cabinet) shall serve as the convening officer for the organizational meeting.
 - All elections in the Boards and Agencies of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall be by written, secret ballot of those present and eligible to vote. Nominations from the floor may be made.
 - The presiding Bishop shall be requested to announce the Cabinet assignments to the various Boards and Agencies at some point during the Annual Conference.
 - d. Tenure for membership for all persons on boards, agencies, divisions, commissions, and committees shall be eight years, with two exceptions: the Board of Laity where tenure shall be six years for members and four years for the Conference lay leader; the Board of Trustees where tenure shall be nine years. (The Conference lay leader may serve also the unexpired term of his predecessor.)
- 5. The Conference structure shall be as determined by the charter of the Conference Council on Ministries. In addition there shall be a coordinator of ministerial relations/administrative assistant to the bishop with such duties and responsibilities as determined by the Annual Conference or assigned by the residing bishop.
- The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
 - The position of Conference Secretary shall be continued on a part-time basis with adequate funding provided.
 - b. The responsibilities of the Conference Secretary shall be defined as follows:
 1) To fulfill the duties and functions of the Conference Secretary as adopted by
 - The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
 - 2) To edit the Conference Journal.
 - 3) And such other duties as are stipulated by the Annual Conference
 - a) Provides for the Local Entertainment Committee any necessary information pertinent to Conference entertainment, and to provide the names and addresses of all persons (guests, delegates, and reserves) to be invited and entertained, including early arrivals.
 - b) Provides delegate registration cards with complete information, by districts,
 c) Serves as a member of the Annual Conference Program Committee and
 - c) Serves as a member of the Annual Conference Program Committee and responsible for the printing and the distribution of the Conference Program as planned by the Bishop and the Program Committee, also the Book of Recommendations.
 - d) Serves as chairman of the Annual Conference Committee on Memoirs and is responsible for the compiling and the printing of the memoirs and the Memorial Service as prepared by the Bishop and the Memoirs Committee,
 - e) Arranges with the Local Entertainment Committee plans for all special luncheons or banquets,
 - f) Provides a packet for each delegate with necessary materials, including name tags,
 - Responsible for proper preparation of ordination credentials and other documents, and securing the class photos,

- h) Provides necessary office equipment and supplies during Annual Conference for the following offices: Bishop, Conference Secretary, Cabinet, Cabinet Secretary, Conference Statistician, Treasurer, and United Methodist information.
 -) Nominates secretarial staff, assigns and supervises their work,

j) Compiles list of lay delegates and reserves for Journal,

- Serves as editor of Conference Journal with responsibility for printing and distribution,
- Keeps accurate alphabetical and chronological rolls of ministers, including career records, widows and children of ministers,
- m) Provides required statistical information for General Church Agencies,
- Serves as Conference archivist and custodian of historical artifacts and information of antecedent conferences,

o) Receives and retains surrendered credentials.

- c. The position of Conference Secretary shall be limited by a tenure of eight years, effective at the beginning of the 1972-1973 Conference Year.
- d. Proper provision shall be made in The United Methodist Building in Raleigh for the protection and the preservation of all records, historical data, etc. of the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church and (and any antecedent conferences) dating prior to the Union of 1939 now being held by the Conference Secretary and the Conference Statistician.
- e. Assistant Secretaries: The Secretary shall nominate his/her assistants and the Conference shall elect
- f. Conference Stenographers: The Conference Secretary shall employ the Conference stenographers.

7. The Conference Statistician:

 The position of Conference Statistician shall be continued on a part-time basis with those duties stipulated by The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, with adequate funding provided.

b. The position of Conference Statistician shall be limited by a tenure of eight years,

effective at the beginning of the 1972-1973 Conference Year.

 Compensation: The Council on Finance and Administration shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also, the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The Conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.

9. The Conference Lay Leader: The Conference Lay Leader shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Annual Conference following General Conference, upon nomination by the Bishop and Cabinet and the Executive Committee of the Board of Laity. Should the vacancy occur at any other time it would be filled by the same procedure. The Conference Lay Leader shall serve as the chairperson of the Board of Laity.

10. Committees and Boards:

a. The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.

b. There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference secretary, the host district superintendent, and the pastor of the host church, and the Conference lay leader, the Conference president of the UMW, the UMYF, and the director of the Conference Council on Ministries. They shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.

c. There shall be an Entertainment Committee composed of three ministers and three laypersons. The Committee shall be elected at the first session of the Annual Conference in the quadrennium. The Committee shall receive invitations and recommend to the Annual Conference the place and method of entertaining the Annual Conference. A local church or other institution may host the Annual Conference upon acceptance of the invitation by the Annual Conference.

 When no invitation has come from a local church or other institution, the Annual Conference will be held at Methodist College and N.C. Wesleyan Col-

- lege on alternating years (held at Methodist College until Wesleyan has an auditorium).
- 2) The Cabinet will designate a district each year on a rotating basis as the host district (when the Conference is held at Methodist College and N.C. Wesleyan College) which will be responsible for ushers, flowers, and other related items of hospitality.
- d. There shall be a Committee on Memoirs composed of the Conference secretary, and the district superintendents. They are charged with the responsibility of providing for all details of the memorial service. The Conference secretary shall serve as its chairperson.
- There shall be a Committee on Daily Minutes elected each year to examine the daily
 minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
- f. There shall be a Committee on Appeals appointed quadrennially, composed of five members whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Buildings, or any other questions that may properly come before it.
- g. There shall be a Committee on Rules which shall provide to the Conference a document of Rules of Order and Procedure and the policies and standing rules and structure that the Conference from time to time shall adopt for its functioning. This document shall be presented to each Annual Conference.
- h. There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Introductions annually, at the first session of the Conference.
- 11. No person may serve on more than one board of trustees of an institution to which trustees are elected by the Conference. This rule to become effective at the 1986 Annual Conference.

Section V: Financial Administration

- The Conference treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the *Journal*.
- The Council on Finance and Administration shall present its report to the Annual Conference only after all other committees, commissions, divisions, boards, and agencies having claims on the budget have presented their report.
- 3. Each district superintendent shall furnish the Conference treasurer as early as possible following the completion of the Charge Conferences an official copy of the acceptances of the Single Figure Askings and a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Charge Conferences. The Conference treasurer shall furnish this information to other agencies who have need of it. The statistician shall use this report in compiling his report to the Annual Conference. (See also Section VII, ¶ 2).

Section VI: Reports, Resolutions, Motions, and Amendments to Report

- All reports, recommendations, and resolutions to be included in the Book of Recommendations shall be sent to the Conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Council on Ministries and published in the conference calendar.
- 2. Resolutions presented to the Annual Conference shall be submitted in writing to the Conference secretary with copies for all the lay and clergy members of the Conference. The resolution shall be presented to the Annual Conference on one day and considered no earlier than the next day. No resolutions shall be distributed later than the second night of the Annual Conference. None can be considered later than the third night of the Conference. All resolutions shall be referred to the Conference Committee on Resolutions and Reference.
- Motions presented to the Annual Conference and amendments to motions shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the Conference secretary prior to or when presented or immediately following.

Section VII: Pastor's Report to The Annual Conference—Statistics

- Final remittances for the current calendar year shall be made to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.
- 2. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches.
- 3. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.

 Tables I and II shall be printed the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the Conference statistician from the pastor's reports.

Section VIII: The Conference Journal

- The Conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and
 making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with
 regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other
 papers when necessary.
- 2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: the conference claimants, lay members of the Conference boards, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference, and lay members of the Annual Conference. The Conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other institutions and agencies of the General Church as he/she may deem advisable. Three copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$5.00 each. Monies accruing from the sale of the Journal shall be deposited with the Conference treasurer and credited to the Journal Account.
- 3. That the Conference return to the policy of publishing a one volume *Journal* of the North Carolina Annual Conference each year.

Section IX: Districts

- 1. The number of districts shall be twelve.
- Any change in the number of Districts shall be approved at one Annual Conference to take effect at the next Annual Conference. A majority may change the number of Districts.
- 3. A district conference may be held annually in each district.
- 4. The district president, sub-district presidents, and the local church presidents of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship shall be delegates to the District Conference, in addition to those named by the 1972 Discipline.
- The district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendent and the Conference lay leader.

Section X: Amendments

These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day a proposed amendment has been presented in writing, providing that the rule governing the manner in which the number of districts may be changed cannot be amended until the next Annual Conference.

Section XI: When the Rules Become Effective

These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS (Daily Minutes)

EXECUTIVE SESSION, Monday, June 8, 1987

Prelude: The organist for the Executive Session was David Hines, Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church, Wilmington. The prelude was Fugue in D Major by J. S. Bach.

Executive Session for All Ministers in Full Connection: Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., gaveled the Executive Session to order and brought greetings by the reading of the Scripture including passages from Paul's letter to Timothy. He called for the singing of Hymn 298, Christ Is Made the Sure Foundation. The ministers comprising the Executive Session responded by singing with vigor and enthusiasm. The Executive Session was called to order at 10:30 a.m. The Bishop described the parameters of the Executive Session as one particularly for the ministers in full connection and this was to take care of matters pertaining to the ordained ministry. This was the one hundred sixty-second session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction. Bishop Minnick offered special prayer for this particular session and brought greetings to the members assembled.

Bishop Minnick asked that the members of the Board of Ordained Ministry come and be seated on the stage so that they might be recognized for their diligent and hard work in serving in this very special capacity. Bishop Minnick called upon H. Langill Watson, chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry, to lead in the report, Watson alluded to the fact that this was his final year, as his tenure expired as member and chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry, and that the same was true for Vice-chairperson Albert Shuler. Watson spoke of his gratitude for those colleagues he had worked with and the understanding of the Conference in the difficulty of the work that had to be done. On behalf of the entire Conference, Bishop Minnick acknowledged Watson's poignant comments and called for a round of standing applause which was accorded. He also called for Vice-chairperson Albert Shuler to come forward and receive applause. It was done.

Watson called attention to the report of the board which had been distributed to each member and called attention to items on the first page. He noted the work of the Ministerial Education Fund as it was outlined in the report. Watson called Questions 19 through 54 and answered each question appropriately with corrections being made as necessary. At the completion of each question, the vote was taken. The entire report was amended as necessary and the final report may be reviewed in the Condensed Minutes.

Special attention was given to the probationary members being elected deacons and then the probationary members being received into full connection. All were recognized and the latter group, comprising Question 28, were asked the historic questions by Bishop Minnick, Each responded to each of the questions appropriately. Watson moved the

adoption of the report as a whole and it was done.

Watson called upon Robert Ray to bring a report concerning ministers' health matters. Ray spoke to the needs of stewardship of ministers looking after their health and taking the responsibility for this. He told of the provision for health screening in the Student Union Building of Methodist College for the next three days. Jesse Moore, Director of Pastoral Ministry of Methodist Health Systems, was invited to speak to the matter and was accorded the privilege of addressing the ministers assembled.

Miscellaneous Matters: The list of appointments beyond the local church was presented. These require a two-thirds vote of the Annual Conference, having received twothirds support of the Cabinet and the Board of Ordained Ministry. The required vote was

given. (See Condensed Minutes.)

The list of Conference members seeking less than full-time appointments was presented. These require a two-thirds vote of the Annual Conference, having received two-thirds support of the Cabinet and the Board of Ordained Ministry. These were adopted. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Watson returned to the main report to present an item on Part 1, page E, regarding nominations to the Joint Review Committee. These were presented to the ministers, particularly those who were to be elected by members in full connection. The names J. Edward Morrison and John W. Ruth, with an alternate, W. T. Cottingham III, were presented and were put before the Conference. These were elected. Watson then presented the

recommendations from *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports* 1987, page 127, on the election of members for the Board of Managers from the North Carolina Conference for the North Carolina Pastors' School. They were elected. Watson made miscellaneous comments regarding the reception for the new ordinands.

Bishop Minnick called the district superintendents to the stage and asked Question 17, "Are all the ministerial members of the Conference blameless in their life and official

administration?" All the district superintendents answered in the affirmative.

Point of Personal Privilege: J. B. Parvin and James H. Bailey presented Brother Adrian Brown to the Conference for recognition. Brown has been a member of the Conference for 65 years and is now 94 years of age. He was accorded a round of applause.

The Bishop called for the acceptance of the proposals of the superintendents to endorse the ministers. It was approved and the character of the district superintendents was

approved as well.

Special Recognition: Woodrow W. Wells, Jr., was called to the podium to make a presentation. He spoke on behalf of the Board of Ordained Ministry and presented plaques of appreciation to Langill Watson and Albert Shuler. Bishop Minnick called for the singing of one stanza of Hymn 195, Lord, Speak to Me. The Conference stood and sang.

Recess: The Bishop called for recess until 1:25 p.m. when the full Conference would be convened in Reeves Auditorium at Methodist College in Fayetteville, NC to open formally

the full Conference session.

Postlude: The postlude was Rigaudon by Andre Campra.

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION, Monday, June 8, 1987

The organist for the afternoon was Barbara D. McClure, Grace United Methodist Church, Wilmington, who played as a prelude Adoro te devote and Ave Verum by Everett Titcomb. After the singing of Hymn 336, And Are We Yet Alive, the Communion Service opening the Conference session was celebrated. Reeves Auditorium was completely filled with people taking the elements of Holy Communion. Mrs. McClure played as a postlude, Allegro Marziale by Titcomb.

Recess: Bishop Minnick called for a brief recess.

GENERAL SESSION FOR ALL LAY AND CLERGY MEMBERS: Robert Owens of John Wesley United Methodist Church, Fayetteville, played as a prelude, Prelude and Fugue in GMajor by Felix Mendelssohn. Bishop Minnick called the Conference officially to order at 2:45 p.m. The Bishop called upon M. Elton Hendricks, president of Methodist College, for words of welcome.

Greetings and Welcome: Hendricks brought words of greeting in welcoming the Conference back to Reeves Auditorium and to the Methodist College campus. He noted that this was the largest number of people ever to register for the North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church or its predecessor as far as he could determine at any period in history. He stated that it would be quite a challenge for the hosts and at the same time he hoped that the delegates would find their stay pleasant and meaningful in every possible way. He indicated the availability of staff members and helpers who would provide assistance when called upon. Hendricks made humorous remarks concerning welcoming all 425 ministerial members who were running for General Conference and particularly the 3 who were not! In a more serious vein, he stated that those who needed some time apart and became tired following sessions could take advantage of the new nature trails that were available for walking and exercise.

The Conference responded with applause and the Bishop expressed appreciation to Hendricks.

Greetings: The Bishop called upon the Honorable J. William Hurley, mayor of Fayetteville, to bring greetings to the Conference. Mayor Hurley expressed appreciation for the Conference's coming back after a year's absence to visit Durham, and responded to the Bishop's comments concerning the warm weather. Mayor Hurley asked for the privilege of presenting his father, J. Bascom Hurley, who is the senior minister in the Conference. He was presented and received a round of applause. Mayor Hurley concluded his comments and the Conference responded with its usual enthusiastic applause.

Recognition of Host District Superintendent: Bishop Minnick presented F. Owen Fitzgerald, Jr. to bring greetings to the Conference. Fitzgerald gave a brief history of the Burlington District. He brought words of appreciation for the clergy and laity of the

Burlington District and for their hard work in preparing for the role as hosts of the Annual Conference. Fitzgerald asked Bishop Minnick if it were in order that the lay and clergy members of the Burlington District stand to be recognized. It was so ordered. They stood and applause was given. Fitzgerald went on to acknowledge that most of the work was done by the people of Methodist College and in particular to praise the continual and ongoing role of Bill Lowdermilk in the success of the Conference.

Organization of the Conference: Bishop Minnick recognized Conference Secretary L. T. Wilson for rules concerning the organization of the Conference. Wilson presented the

following motions:

"I move that the registration kept by the registrars at the registration tables be designated and declared the official roll of the Conference;

that the bar of the Conference be the main floor and the stage of Reeves Auditorium; that the program as contained in *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987* (as amended from time to time by the Chair) be the official program of the Conference:

that the materials printed and published in *Saddlebag* be declared 'presented to the Conference' when distributed to the members, to satisfy Section VI, Paragraph 2, of the Rules of the Conference;

that persons appearing on the program of the Conference be granted the privilege of the

that the committees and persons printed on pages 7 and 8 of *The Conference Programs, Recommendatons and Reports 1987* be elected."

The motions were approved.

Report of Committee on Conference Rules: James Coile spoke to certain changes in the rules on pages 10-18 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. Looking toward the possibility of electronic tallying of the vote, he moved that the wording be changed from Roman ballot to secret ballot. Other contingent changes were made as indicated.

Bishop Minnick called for discussion. There was no discussion. The Bishop called for a vote and the vote was virtually unanimous. Coile then referred to page 14 and presented a change under Section VI, paragraph 2 of *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987*.

Quinton Covington asked for a guarantee that it would not be a violation of *The Discipline* or of free speech if this prevented dealing with crucial issues that came up at the last minute. Coile responded that it would keep crucial issues from being dealt with at the last moment and in haste - particularly those that would change the structure of, say, boards and agencies of the Conference, for example, that needed to be thought about overnight. The Coile amendment was approved. Coile then moved the adoption of the rules.

Amendment: Bishop Minnick recognized Joseph Bethea who moved "that the rules be amended in Section IX - Districts, Item 3, to say 'may' instead of 'shall'." Coile responded that this was already covered in *The Discipline*. The amendment passed unanimously.

The rules were then presented for adoption and they were passed.

Amendment: Samuel Dixon brought the following amendment: "On behalf of the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, I move that the Lay Equalization Plan (1974 Journal, page 261) determining Annual Conference membership, be amended to include the Conference Treasurer Business Administrator. This slot would follow immediately after the inclusion of 'All Lay Chairpersons of Conference Boards and Divisions."

Amendment to Amendment: Maness Mitchell proposed the following amendment to the Dixon Amendment: "All lay persons on Program Staff shall be seated as delegates in the Annual Conference."

The Bishop called upon the Conference to vote on each of the issues: the amendment to the amendment, the amendment, and the structure statement. They were all approved.

Report of the Task Force on Nominations Procedures: Coile read the changes in the nominations procedure which are included in *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987* on pages 65 and 66. The additions are indicated by italics, the deletions are indicated by parentheses.

Bishop Minnick put the report before the Conference.

Malloy Owen spoke to this, commenting that it would take from the boards and agencies the right to nominate their own chairpersons. Coile responded that this was not altogether correct in that they would retain the right of nomination from the floor, as well as receiving nominations from the Conference Committee on Nominations. Owen stated that we have moved away from democracy to an autocracy in giving a small committee enormous power. He felt that it was not democratic and he felt each central agency should be able to nominate its own chairperson.

Amendment: Malloy Owen moved "that the first two paragraphs of the report be deleted."

Robert McKenzie rose with a question, asking if the report were adopted, would it preclude the nomination of chairpersons from the floor of the Conference? The answer was, "no." Another clergyman spoke in opposition to the report of the task force, stating that this could be a move toward the centralization of authority, and that it was a move away from allowing people to begin to get leadership experience. He further stated that he felt that under no circumstances should the end justify the means.

Substitute: Vernon Tyson moved the following substitute to the Owen motion for deletion: "To insure racial and gender inclusiveness among chairpersons...! move that we delete the following sentences through 'Joint Committee on Disability' and include, 'We ask each Conference agency to devise a plan so that its leadership may have racial and gender inclusiveness and to report its plan to the 1988 Annual Conference." Tyson spoke in opposition to the Committee's report, stating that the Bishop and the district superintendents already have much power, and this is a further erosion of responsible power on behalf of the individual boards and agencies.

Carrie W. Parrish, a member of the committee, spoke, stating that she did not understand when they were meeting that they were taking any power away from anyone. Owen spoke again, saying that he did not feel that the committee was trying to do anything they realized as potentially dangerous and suggesting that Vernon Tyson's motion be adopted as a substitute, which would insure this would not happen.

Bishop Minnick summed it up by saying it was simply a matter of getting the boards and agencies individually to be responsible for making things more inclusive. Coile made a closing statement to the effect that the committee's report would best effect the change that the Conference had requested.

William E. Cummings spoke in favor of the Tyson amendment. He felt it should not be postponed a year but should be implemented now. Tyson spoke to a point of clarification.

The question was called. Albert Shuler questioned the Tyson amendment, asking if it did not also give the boards and agencies the right to remain status quo. Bishop Minnick responded that he thought so. John Meares called for the previous question on all that was before us. A reading of the Owen-Tyson amendment was called for. Secretary Ted Wilson read the amendment. The Owen-Tyson amendment prevailed. In light of the passage of the amendment, Coile made certain editorial changes and then moved the adoption of the full report.

Amendment: Reginald W. Ponder moved "that on page 65, Paragraph 4, line 7, we substitute twelve (12) for five (5)."

William M. Wells, Jr., spoke to the Ponder amendment, stating he felt that it swung things away from the laity. Ponder clarified his motion by pointing out that the word "ministry" was deleted from the report in the last sentence of Paragraph 4.

The Ponder amendment passed.

The report as a whole was adopted and Coile stated that the boards and agencies would now develop their own plan to insure inclusiveness instead of having a task force develop a plan.

Point of Personal Privilege: Mr. Jesse Speaks Phillips, an elderly and loyal lay person from the Glendon Church, was introduced to the Conference on a point of personal privilege. He was given a round of applause.

Report of the Conference Committee on Nominations: The report was called for by Bishop Minnick. F. Belton Joyner, Jr., presented the report with the list of changes including those of District Lay Leaders. He offered this to lay on the table until tomorrow for the Conference to examine.

First Ballot for Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences: Bishop Minnick called for the first lay and clerical ballots. He called upon Secretary Wilson to discuss the procedure. Wilson stated that he assumed that people were thoroughly familiar with the procedure and the proposed electronic processing. The first ballot would be by the same procedure that we have been using over the years and would be the nominating ballot. He continued to describe the process in accord with the literature that had been distributed in advance. William C. Simpson, Jr., asked, "Is this not an electing ballot?" The reply was, "Of course, if any one or more people received enough votes on this ballot, he/she would be elected."

Amendment: Robert S. Pullman moved the following substitute motion to the balloting procedure: "I move that the report for Election of Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences be amended as follows:

After I. on page 16, there be a new section number II to read: II. After the first ballot for Jurisdictional Conference delegates, another alphabetical print-out will be prepared, one for lay and one for clergy members with assigned numbers, and will be available to lay or clergy members respectively prior to taking the subsequent ballot. All other voting procedures and guidelines in this plan for electing General Conference delegates will be in effect for electing the remainder of the Jurisdictional Conference delegates.

Section II becomes Section III.

The following editorial changes will then be made on page 16.

I.A. Add to the first sentence the words 'for General Conference delegates.'

I.C. In line 3 strike 'both General and Jurisdictional Conferences' and substitute 'General Conference.'

I.D. Strike the last word 'process' and substitute 'voting for General Conference delegates and for the first ballot for Jurisdictional Conference delegates.'

Make the following procedural change. Under Ill.F. on page 17, delete the last sentence and insert: 'Tellers may be used to prepare names for the print-out for Jurisdictional Conference nominees."

The motion was adopted.

Clergy Ballot No. 1 for General Conference: Bishop Minnick ruled that the clergy ballot be taken first and only the clergy should vote. The ballot was opened. The clergy ballot was closed for the first ballot.

Lay Ballot No. 1 for General Conference: Bishop Minnick called on Chief Lay Teller James E. Vann to speak to the laity and declared the first lay ballot open. The lay persons were asked to remain standing and after they cast their ballot to be seated. After the ballots were taken, the first lay ballot for General Conference was closed.

Report of United Methodist Youth: Bishop Minnick called on Carl H. King, president of United Methodist Youth, to bring his report since he was in the middle of final examinations and needed to return home. He made the report of the Conference Youth including the

Youth Service Fund report. (For complete text, see Section V of the Journal.)

Composite Report of the District Superintendents: Bishop Minnick called upon Charles M. Smith to bring the composite report for the district superintendents. Smith brought the report. (For complete text, See Section V of the Journal.) At the conclusion of the report Smith asked that Bishop Minnick's wife, Mary Ann Minnick, be escorted to the stage and that the Conference receive her and greet her. She was presented a floral tribute

and accorded a round of applause.

Report of the Board of Laity: Bishop Minnick called upon J. Allen Norris, Jr., to lead in the report and also called for other lay agencies to take a position on the stage. He mentioned that since we had already heard from Carl King on United Methodist Youth, we would now hear from Norris, Conference Lay Leader; Emest J. Wendell, president of United Methodist Men; and Margaret R. Saunders, president of United Methodist Women. Each of these reports was presented in turn and received with appreciation by the Conference. (For full texts, see Section V of the Journal.)

Report of the Council on Finance and Administration: Samuel Dixon was called upon by Bishop Minnick to bring the report. He directed attention to pages 76 and 77 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987, part of which was presented for information only. The budget on pages 74 and 75 was presented for study and consideration for a later vote. Dixon emphasized how the Council on Finance and Administration had agonized over each line item, taking into consideration the needs of each agency, trying to fulfill what was absolutely necessary. Sections II and III on pages 76 and 77 were placed before the Conference for adoption.

Amendment: Jerry A. Jackson moved that "after 'UMW Funds' - add, 'UMYF and UMM Funds sent to Treasurer" under Section II, Item 1, page 76.

Steven A. Hickle spoke in favor of the motion on the grounds that it would show that the amounts contributed would be in the grand total of what was contributed throughout the Conference. He generally felt that it would "muddy the water" to put it in, however. The motion failed.

Samuel D. McMillan, Jr., rose to ask a question about item 9 on page 77. The question was, "How is it appropriated?" Dixon stated there was no particular policy, no formula, and that they looked at what the needs were and what was available and what could be done. Sections II and III were adopted.

Barton Baldwin, First Church of Mt. Olive from the Goldsboro District, tried to make a motion, but it was ruled out of order until a later time.

Amendment: Langill Watson brought a motion concerning a change necessary to the Board of Ordained Ministry on page 18 of the people serving on the board. He stated that Alvester Gales had to be replaced; he reported that the Bishop had consulted with him and the Bishop had named Lawrence Johnson in place of Gales. This made it impossible for Johnson to serve on Equitable Salaries, so Bess G. Hunnings was placed on Equitable Salaries in Johnson's place.

Hazel Bryant indicated that B. J. Pierce had been left off and needed to be included on the Board of Worship.

Benediction: Langill Watson was asked to give the benediction. He did so, concluding the afternoon session.

Postlude: The postlude was God of Grace (CWM Rhonda) by Paul Manz.

FIRST DAY, EVENING SESSION, Monday, June 8, 1987

At 7:30 p.m., a Service of Worship for Ordination was held in Reeves Auditorium. Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., presided and Bishop Felton E. May was the preacher. H. Langill Watson presented the deacons and elders for ordination. (For a a synopsis of the entire service see Service of Worship for Ordination, 1987.)

SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION, Tuesday, June 9, 1987

Holy Communion: The Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated in Hensdale Chapel at Methodist College in Fayetteville at 7:30 a.m., with Robert E. Bergland as celebrant.

Prelude: At 8:25 a.m., in Reeves Auditorium, Organist William J. Weisser of Edenton Street United Methodist Church, Raleigh, played Concerto No. 5 in F Major by G. F. Handel.

Bible Study: Bishop Minnick called for the singing of I Love to Tell the Story. He then led in prayer. He greeted the Conference and spoke of the large attendance and his pleasure with the events of the preceding day. In his Bible study, the Bishop stated that he would give attention to one major and one minor prophet. The minor prophet would be Habakkuk and the major prophet Ezekiel.

Time of Singing: Bishop Minnick announced a brief period of singing, having concluded this Bible study, and called upon Charles M. Smith to have us sing some of the hymns that were being presented by the Hymnal Revision Committee. The Conference assembled responded with enthusiasm.

Introduction: Bishop Minnick called upon James E. Vann to present Leslie Gamer, Jr., the new president of North Carolina Wesleyan College. He addressed the Conference briefly and was accorded a round of applause.

Report of the Clergy Ballot No. 1:359 ballots cast. 53 invalid. 306 valid. 154 necessary to elect. Joseph B. Bethea was elected with 186 votes. The Bishop then asked all clergy to stand and Secretary Wilson passed out the sheets giving an alphabetical list (with assigned numbers) of all who received at least ten votes.

Point of Order: Henry B. Grant, Jr., rose to a point of order, stating that since the rules were changed yesterday from a Roman ballot to a secret ballot, that the number of votes cast did not matter in order for a ballot to be valid.

The Bishop ruled the matter out of order as it was clearly stated yesterday that we had to vote for neither more nor less than the number required.

Clergy Ballot No. 2: Secretary Wilson emphasized that the ballots should now be cast with no more than nine blocks marked and the ballot No. 2 sticker affixed to the upper left

hand corner. The ballot should not be folded but should be placed flat in the box. The clergy ballot was closed by Bishop Minnick.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 1: Ballots cast 503. Invalid ballots 62. Those needed for election 221. J. Allen Norris, Jr., was elected with 293 votes. Sheets were then given to the lay members to assign numbers to the other persons who received at least ten votes for General Conference. After the lists were distributed, the Bishop called out the number of votes of each person who had received at least ten votes.

Lay Ballot No. 2: Ballot No. 2 was opened and the ballot was taken. Bishop Minnick

declared Lay Ballot No. 2 closed.

Announcements: Secretary Wilson made announcements.

Report of the Board of Diaconal Ministry: Phyllis G. Savage brought the report. She encouraged picking up the brochure on the procedure for becoming a Diaconal Minister which is available at the Cokesbury display. She encouraged those who are Diaconal Ministers to advance themselves with a sense of professionalism. She called attention to the report on pages 59-64 in The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. She made two changes in the report. The changes were approved. (The full text of the report as amended will be in Section V of the Journal.)

Motion: Barton Baldwin, First Church of Mt. Olive, moved the adoption of a proposed motion which had been distributed the previous day. He moved "that the budget of the North Carolina Annual Conference, which is to be raised in 1988, remain the same as budgeted to be raised in 1987 in the amount of \$7,181,859. In freezing the budget, supplemental appropriations could only be provided in emergency situations after being approved by the Bishop, Cabinet and CFA. All requests for future budgets could not exceed the previous year's increase in the national cost of living as set by the rise in the CPI (consumer price index). CFA would have to reallocate this budgeted amount to provide for any items previously funded by supplemental appropriations and any new items such as Methodist Building Renovation."

Metriodist Building Renovation.

Baldwin indicated that all requests for future budgets would be determined by the rise in the consumer price index. He indicated that obviously CFA would have to reallocate the budget amount to provide for any items previously funded by supplemental appropriations. Bishop Minnick indicated this would be on the table until the full CFA report on the third day of Conference.

Continuation of Report of the Council on Finance and Administration: Dixon resumed comments and distributed information which was provided through research by the Conference treasurer. Dixon introduced the video, Making Your Faith Visible, which

was then shown to the Conference.

Report of the Conference Statistician: Bishop Minnick called for the report of Conference Statistician D. D. Traynham who called attention to pages 128-130 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. His report was comparative in nature, pointing out both the areas of growth and loss from the preceding year. His report

was received and accepted with appreciation.

Report of the Methodist Board of Publication: C. Alison Simonton, Jr., brought a report from the North Carolina Christian Advocate and introduced the chairperson of the Board of Publication, George W. Johnson. He called attention to page 51 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987 and moved paragraph 8 under The Methodist Board of Publication. He also moved, on page 4, Items A39, A40 and A41. They were adopted by the Conference. This concluded the report of the Board of Publication and The North Carolina Christian Advocate.

Conference Council on Ministries: Belton Joyner took the podium to bring the program recommendations. He made corrections to the report included on pages 34-51 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. Joyner moved the

changes and they were adopted by the Conference.

A question was asked of Joyner about a stewardship training opportunity for pastors scheduled for April. He was asked if the date could be changed to May because of student pastor's schedules. Joyner called on Clyde H. Dunn who said that no one could be completely satisfied about the date set because we were dependent upon the time leadership could be supplied from Nashville. Dunn explained that the 20-hour seminar in question had now been set for September. 1988.

James B. Ward asked for an explanation of A29 of the report concerning a ministerial fitness program for ministers of the Conference.

Bishop's Point of Order: Further discussion was postponed in order to hear clergy ballot No. 2 for General Conference.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 2: Number of ballots cast 349. Valid 331. Needed to elect, 166, F. Belton Joyner, Jr., received 172 and was elected.

Clergy Ballot No. 3: The third clergy ballot was taken and Bishop Minnick declared the ballot closed.

Report of Board of Pensions and Recognition of Retiring Ministers: J. Donald Phillips lead this order of the day. He called for Robert L. Davis IV, representing the Methodist Publishing House, to come to the stage. Davis gave a brief summary of the report of the United Methodist Publishing House. He presented Bishop Minnick a check in the amount of \$14,406 which traditionally is added to the Pension Fund for the Conference. Phillips took the podium and indicated that the report was on page 87 and following of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987, but at this time he wished to give those ministers who were retiring at this session of the Annual Conference an opportunity to be recognized and honored. The names were called and the ministers came to the platform accompanied in many cases by their spouses. Bishop Minnick greeted each warmly and the women were presented with orchid corsages. After all were on the stage, Phillips called for the Conference to stand and greet the retirees, which was done with resounding applause. The retiring ministers one by one continued to make their statements until they had concluded by giving the Conference new wisdom and had been presented with appropriate recognition upon retirement.

Bishop Minnick announced that following a round of applause for all those retiring, the

report of the Board of Pensions would be continued in the afternoon session.

Benediction: The benediction was given and the Conference was adjourned for the noon hour.

Postlude: The postlude was Prelude to a Te Deum by Charpentier.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION, Tuesday, June 9, 1987

Prelude: The organist for the afternoon, Laura Davenport, First United Methodist Church, Wilson, played *Voluntary* by John Bennett.

Conference Called to Order. Bishop Minnick called the Conference to order at 1:30 p.m., calling upon the Conference to sing the hymn, Ask Ye What Great Thing I Know. The Conference fully assembled, and with Reeves Auditorium filled, sang with great vigor.

Prayer: James Coile led the prayer.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 2: Number of ballots cast 503. Number of valid ballots 408. Number needed for election 205. Margaret R. Saunders was elected with 211 votes. The Bishop then read the remainder of the ballot.

Lay Ballot No. 3: Instructions were given by Chief Lay Teller James Vann in order to avoid the invalidation of so many ballots. The ballot was to be marked and the ballot number affixed properly. Eight candidates were to be selected and only eight. The ballot was declared officially open. After all ballots had been collected, Bishop Minnick declared the third ballot closed.

Special Presentation: Bishop Minnick recognized Thomas A. Collins for a special presentation. Collins presented Richard Ward to speak on behalf of Candler School of Theology. He spoke on the great advantages of the Ministerial Education Fund and expressed his appreciation of the support that came from this Conference as well as many others. He brought special greetings from Candler and spoke to those of this Conference that had attended that institution.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 3: There was no election. The Bishop read the results. Clerical Ballot No. 4: After instructions from Chief Clerical Teller Carson Wiggins, the fourth clerical ballot was declared open by Bishop Minnick. After the ballots had been cast, Bishop Minnick declared clergy ballot No. 4 for General Conference closed.

Return to the Report of the Board of Pensions: Don Phillips resumed the report on page 87 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. Report A was moved and passed, including correction in I.B.4, Section II was passed; Sections III, IV and V were passed with corrections; Sections VI and VII were adopted; Section VIII passed with a correction and Section IX was passed.

Report B was adopted · Sections I through IX. Report C was adopted.

Phillips called upon William W. Sherman, Jr., to discuss the Task Force for Studying the Ministers' Retirement Fund Constitution. Sherman indicated that the constitution of the fund would remain essentially the same, but there were some concerns that the task force had, including the name of the fund, the planning for counseling of ministers who did not make their payments on time, the allowing of ministers to make payments throughout the year instead of making it due at one specific time, and finally, the promotion of the fund so that more ministers might be participating. The Bishop placed the task force recommendations before the Conference. Discussion was called for.

Edwin L. Earnhart asked a question as to how many of the ministers benefited from the fund. Sherman reponded that between 60 and 70 percent of the ministers were participants. Earnhart then asked how many of the churches participated in the fund. The answer

was 100 percent.

Amendment: Wilbur I. Jackson made the motion "that after a minister belongs to the MRF for 20 years that he/she be allowed to make a one time draw against his/her account, of one-half the amount for the purpose of making a down payment on a home."

Herb Stout responded by stating that this would have a drastic effect on the corpus of the fund and should be studied by an actuary before any reasonable answer could be given. He suggested that it be referred to the Board of Pensions.

Jackson accepted the suggestion to refer with a report to be made next year. The matter

was referred.

Having heard the report of the task force, funding was discussed and then the report was

approved.

The report of the Board of Pensions as a whole was before the Conference. It was

Return to the Program Recommendations of the Council on Ministries: Bishop Minnick asked Belton Joyner to return to the report which was started during the morning session. Joyner directed the attention of the Conference to page 43 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987, Item A29.

Amendment: James Ward moved that in Item A29 we "delete 'established for' and add

'offered to." The motion passed.

All items through A60 were passed. Beginning on page 47, all items from R1 through R14 were adopted. The 1988 Policy Recommendations on pages 49 through 51 were adopted.

Joyner then introduced members of the support staff from the United Methodist Building, Sarah Brock, Jai Dyer-Bryant, Linda Harris, Diana Hunter, B. J. Lewis, Sandy Provenzano, Linda Smith, Sandy Smith and Mellissa Blankenship. He described something of each one's specific job. They were all appropriately greeted by the Conference. Appreciation for the staff was shown by a round of applause.

Resolution: Belton Joyner called on Samuel Wynn to present the action on Native American urban ministries. The resolution was presented, having been previously distributed to the Conference, and with some emending language, it was now presented to the Conference for action. The section of the paper beginning with the first "therefore" was

approved with a change of date.

Action on Report of the Committee on Nominations: Bishop Minnick called for action on the report of the Committee on Nominations. Belton Joyner returned to the podium to present this report. The nominations as distributed on the first day of Conference were

approved unanimously as corrected.

Roger Thomas, a lay member from Trenton United Methodist Church, rose to speak about the book of lay nominees to General and Jurisdictional Conferences - its compilation and its inadequacy. He felt that it ought to reflect what people stand for as well as who they

Report from the General Council on Ministries: Allen Norris brought the report. (For full text of his report, see Section V of the Journal.) Norris called for all those in the Conference who were members of General Boards and Agencies to stand and be recognized. It was so done, and they were accorded a round of applause.

Point of Personal Privilege: Joseph Bethea requested a point of personal privilege for Mrs. Jeanne Hack. She presented Bethea, Jack M. Benfield and Bishop Minnick with T-shirts (that were a take-off on the Ghost Busters theme) entitled Sin Busters. They all

immediately put them on, much to the delight of the Annual Conference. This moment of

levity was greatly appreciated.

Special Emphasis: Report of Plans Council on Capital Funds: T. Harry Gatton rose to present the discussion concerning the resolution passed at the Annual Conference in 1986. He discussed the Plans Council recommendation that had been sent out in the information packet concerning Annual Conference. He spoke of the wonderful experience of working on this plan and expressed appreciation of the committee. He spoke of the overwhelming majority of the people who believed in the needs to improve our camping and church extension and development. Gatton said that it was when the question of the fund drive came up that the committee hit a hard place. A large number of suggestions were made, but there was a feeling of being unable to accomplish what we wanted to do because of the economic situation throughout the Conference - particularly in the rural and agricultural areas. Gatton said that in accord with the Bishop's instructions, the committee listened, and the people were heard. The message was that these were things that the people would like to see done but not at the expense of a funds campaign right now.

Motion: Gatton presented as a recommendation to the Annual Conference in the form of a motion: "Whereas the local churches of the North Carolina Annual Conference have acknowledged the major needs in camping and church extension, we recommend to the Annual Conference that the Plans Council be kept intact with the mission to continue its work to present to the Annual Conference in June 1988 a plan which, when approved, would successfully accomplish an eight million dollar campaign for camps and church extension." He asked Beth M. Norris to come and express her views on camping ministries. She described the change in camping from the rustic camp-fire times of the 1950's and before to the retreat and learning ministries that are now necessary. As a matter of fact, she indicated that across the country more adults need camping ministries today than young people.

Russell McLean, from the Resurrection Church in Durham, spoke on church extension. He spoke of the need to get back to the fundamentals of understanding and form a new bond of trust for our entire Conference, remembering that we in United Methodism are not local autonomous churches but we are a part of a single body, and that body in our case is the North Carolina Annual Conference. He asked the Bishop to lead the Conference in regaining that sense of trust through the dedication of the district superintendents and the lay leaders so that they might provide leadership to the clergy and lay leaders of individual

churches. He spoke of the great challenge to Christians and to United Methodist Christians citing that the harvest is great but the workers are few. He quoted from Matthew 7:7.

Gatton asked Sam McMillan, Jr., to give some of the other reasons why the committee

Gatton requested that the motion lay on the table until tomorrow.

John K. Bergland asked questions concerning the original mailout to the Conference.

Gatton replied that he would be glad to discuss it with him during the day and evening.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 4: Number of ballots cast 327. Number valid 299. Number needed for election 150. Dennis M. Campbell was elected with 166 and Wallace H. Kirby received 163 votes and was elected.

Clergy Ballot No. 5: Bishop Minnick declared the taking of the Fifth clergy ballot for delegates to General Conference and stated that the ballot would be for 6 persons. The ballot was taken. The Bishop declared clergy ballot No. 5 closed.

Bishop Minnick proposed that the Order of the Day had come, but a lay ballot was ready to be taken, and by more than a two-thirds vote the Order of the Day was postponed in order to take lay ballot No. 4.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 3: There was no election. The Bishop read the results of the ballot.

Lay Ballot No. 4: Lay ballot No. 4 for General Conference was called. Instructions were given to prevent invalid ballots. The ballot for 8 delegates was opened. After the ballots were collected, Bishop Minnick ordered lay ballot No. 4 closed.

Presentation of Scholarships: F. Odell Walker came to the podium to present the four scholarship recipients. The Blackburn Scholarship this year is awarded to Michelle Marshall from White Plains Church, Cary. She will be attending Methodist College. The Cannon Scholarship recipient is Terry French, pastor of Beulaville United Methodist Church. He will

be attending North Carolina Wesleyan College. Two Student Day scholarships were awarded to Amy Lane of McMannen Church, Durham, who will be going to Louisburg; and Susan Sullivan of Parker's Chapel United Methodist Church in Raeford, who also will be attending Louisburg. Each of the recipients was given a chance to respond to the scholarship presentation. All responded with obvious deep appreciation. The Bishop greeted and shook hands with all the recipients and expressed his gratitude at their pleasure in receiving the scholarships.

Presentation of the Lay Person of the Year Award: Allen Norris took the podium and explained the award and made the presentation. The names of the nominees were called and may be reviewed in the full text of the report in Section V of the Journal. The 1987 Conference Lay Person of the Year is Robert Frazier of West Nash United Methodist Church in Wilson. He was escorted to the platform with a standing ovation from the Conference and greetings and well wishes from many colleagues. He responded with appreciation.

Special Emphasis: 150th Anniversary of the North Carolina Conference: The presentation prepared by the Commission on Archives and History had overtones of drama with narratives, dramatic sketches, and music as we were allowed to revisit February 8, 1837. (For a synopsis of the presentation, see the "North Carolina Conference Sesquicentennial, 1837-1987" in Section V.)

Following the splendid and much appreciated anniversary celebration, the Conference

returned to the business at hand.

Report of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Council on Ministries: Bishop Minnick called on Reginald Ponder to present the report of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Council on Ministries. Ponder gave the report. For complete text, see Section V of the Journal.

Report of the Lake Junaluska Assembly: Reginald Ponder gave the report. He spoke of the renovation of the Junaluska Apartments as a key program during the past year. He also expressed his warmth and feelings for his home conference and for the many people who had written to him and told him that they were praying for him and giving him their love and concern as he undertook these jobs for the Southeastern Jurisdiction. The report was received with appreciation and was sustained by the Conference.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 5: Number of ballots cast 298. Number of valid ballots 288.

Needed for election 145. No election. Bishop Minnick read the results.

Clergy Ballot No. 6: Clergy ballot No. 6 for 6 delegates was ordered by Bishop Minnick. Chief Clergy Teller Carson Wiggins gave instructions and the ballot was opened. After the ballots were collected, the ballot was closed by the order of Bishop Minnick.

Report on Lay Ballot No. 4: Number of ballots cast 445. Number valid ballots 415.

Needed for election 208. No election. Bishop Minnick read the results.

Lay Ballot No. 5: The fifth lay ballot was opened for the election of 8 delegates. After the

voting, lay ballot No. 5 was closed.

Report on the Black College Fund: Bishop Minnick introduced Isaac H. Miller, Jr., president of Bennett College, to bring the report. Miller indicated that this would be his last report to this Conference, as he is retiring as president of Bennett College after 21 years of service. He was accorded applause for his long and faithful service. He proceeded with the report, both for the Fund and for Bennett College.

Benediction: Bishop Minnick gave the benediction.

Postlude: The postlude was Postlude by Ronald Besemer.

SECOND DAY, EVENING SESSION, Tuesday, June 9, 1987

At 8:00 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium the Evening Worship service was held with Bishop Felton E. May preaching. (For a synopsis of the entire service, see *Service of Worship*, Tuesday, June 9, 1987.)

THIRD DAY, MORNING SESSION, Wednesday, June 10, 1987

Holy Communion: The Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 a.m., in Hensdale Chapel on the campus of Methodist College, with J. Mark Kasper preaching.

Prelude: All Creatures of Our God and King arranged by Hal Hopson was played by organist Lin Bratcher of Centenary United Methodist Church, Smithfield.

Hymn: Bishop Minnick called for the singing of Hymn 109, Wonderful Words of Life. Bible Study: Bishop Minnick continued his excellent series of Bible studies to enrich the lives and minds of the Conference. With his characteristic candor he took the difficult book of Ezekiel and presented words of hope and challenge to the Conference at large. His was a message of deep intensity, presented with pastoral love.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 6: Number of ballots cast 240. Valid ballots 228. Needed to

elect 110. No election. Bishop Minnick read the results of the ballot.

J. Rodney Fulcher asked a question concerning the taking of another ballot. The Bishop ruled it out of order at this time and said we would return to it later.

Clergy Ballot No. 7: Bishop Minnick opened ballot No. 7 for the clergy for General Conference delegates. After the voting, the Bishop declared clergy ballot No. 7 closed.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 5: Bishop Minnick read the report. Number of ballots cast 324. Valid ballots 305. Needed to elect 153. Ernest J. Wendell was elected with 177 votes. Ryan Eidson with 160 votes was elected. Robert C. Frazier was elected with 156.

The Bishop prepared the Conference for the need for a night session this evening following the worship service.

Lay Ballot No. 6: Lay ballot No. 6 was opened with 5 delegates to be elected. After the voting, the Bishop declared the ballot closed.

Point of Personal Privilege: Hazel Bryant was allowed a point of personal privilege to ask that the Conference remember Bruce Hargrove in his continuing illness.

Announcements: Secretary Ted Wilson made announcements regarding the meeting of the group to examine the District Conference Records, transportation for the Clergy Partners Luncheon, and the meeting of the Hymnal Feedback session. He requested that the first two rows in the auditorium be reserved for the chaplains during their presentation and also for family members during the Memorial Service.

Point of Personal Privilege: Robert McKenzie brought a request that greetings be sent to Jean L. Hood who was unable to attend Annual Conference because of illness.

Report on Ministers' Moving Expense: Bishop Minnick called upon Kermit L. Braswell to present the report. Braswell explained the report as printed on page 64 of *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987* and moved its adoption. It was seconded.

Jerry J. Juren raised the question as to why there would be an additional amount for clergy couples. Braswell responded by stating that sometimes they had separate offices or even separate quarters as demanded by their diverse appointments.

A question was asked about the dollar per mile travel. Braswell answered that this was to allow a person to use a truck or even two automobiles in helping with the move and lowering the cost otherwise on a long distance move.

Amendment: Johnny H. Branch proposed the following: "that we place the figure of \$1200 in place of the figures of \$850 and \$1000 listed on page 64, Section II, A-1 and A-3." Herb Stout estimated that the cost of that amendment would be approximately \$60,000

per year. The amendment was defeated.

Amendment: Quinton Covington offered this amendment: "The Conference treasurer will make an advance payment up to \$600 to eligible ministers to cover the expense of deposit and fees for moving expenses prior to their move, upon approval by the District Superintendents. This advance payment may be adjusted to cover adequately the initial up front money that must be paid by the moving clergy who move themselves. Any money that is left over shall be refunded to the Conference treasurer. The checklist entitled, So You're Moving, must be properly signed and returned to the District Superintendents, along with the receipts for moving, before the balance of the moving expense can be mailed by the Conference treasurer." The motion was seconded. He indicated the need for an advance by many ministers when they found they were going to move. Many need some money up front in order to help make the move before they receive any final reimbursement.

Herb Stout had suggested the wording of "up to \$600" and "upon approval of the District Superintendents" with the approval of Covington. The amendment was approved.

Previous Question Called: The previous question was called on all that was before us. Debate was closed. The report as amended was adopted.

Presentation: Caswell E. Shaw, Jr., was recognized for a presentation. He asked Jesse V. Bone, Sr., to come to the podium. Shaw presented Bone with a plaque recognizing his dedicated service to the Board of Missions and the cause of missions over many, many years. He was accorded a round of applause. Shaw also presented Rene Bideaux, a

member of our Annual Conference, who is a Deputy General Secretary of the Board of Global Ministries.

Composite Report of the Chaplains: Bishop Minnick called for the order of the day and asked for A. J. Wilson III to be recognized and to present the composite report of the chaplains. The report was presented and an audio-visual presentation was given. A. J. Wilson III was recognized as a chaplain in special ministry. The report was accepted with appreciation by the Conference and the chaplains came to the stage and introduced themselves one at a time, in all of their diverse ministries. After the chaplains had finished, Bishop Minnick spoke gracious words of appreciation for their service in the name of Jesus Christ around the world.

Special Presentation: Caswell Shaw was called to make a special presentation. He presented Bill Simpson who spoke about the Jamaica Eye Care Project Mission and the collection of eyeglasses by Wesley Memorial Church in Wilmington to be used in Jamaica. Simpson presented Elbert Anderson, who spoke words of appreciation and asked that the

glasses keep coming.

Special Resolution by the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries: Joseph C. Parker introduced P. Wesley Aitken and read a resolution on his behalf upon the event of his retirement. Aitken was presented a plaque of recognition. Aitken then took the podium to express his appreciation.

Recognition of Clergy Partners, Inc.: Bishop Minnick called upon the clergy partners who were present to stand and be recognized. They were accorded a round of applause. Brief Recess: Bishop Minnick called for a brief recess in order to prepare for the

Memorial Service.

Postlude: The postlude was *Prelude in C Major* by J. S. Bach.

Memorial Service: The Memorial Service was held at 11:00 a.m., in Reeves Auditorium with Ted Wilson presiding and W. Junius Neese preaching. (See synopsis of entire service and memorials in Section IV of the Journal.)

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION, Wednesday, June 10, 1987

Prelude: Toccata in a minor by J. S. Bach was played by organist Bess Sawyer of Queen Street United Methodist Church, Kinston.

Hymn: Bishop Minnick called for the singing of Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee. The Conference responded.

Prayer: Bishop Minnick called upon Murry DeHart to offer prayer.

Meeting of the North Carolina Conference Brotherhood: The Bishop announced that this was the part of the Conference that dealt with the work of this special informal organization of the Conference. Don Phillips brought the report, referring to pages 79 and 80 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. Phillips called upon Joseph K. Bostick to give the report as treasurer of the Brotherhood. He directed attention to the treasurer's report on pages 79 and 80 and made a correction in the amount of call number 335 from \$1,500 to \$1,850. Bostick stated that the benefit amount would be \$3,800 effective at the end of Conference. Bostick's report was approved, and it was noted that nearly \$600,000 had been paid out in benefits since the beginning of the Brotherhood. (The actual total amount is \$590,300.)

Nominees for officers and trustees were announced and elected.

With the approval of the report the meeting of the North Carolina Conference Brotherhood concluded. (For complete report, officers and trustees, see Section V of the Journal.)

Composite Report of the Conference Council on Ministries: Belton Joyner came to the podium to make the report. Special recognition was given by Joyner to Michael W. Safley for his five years of outstanding work on the program staff. Safley received a standing ovation from the entire Conference. Belton Joyner introduced members of the Conference Council program staff. Joyner described how he had decided that the best persons to make the report of the Conference Council on Ministries would be representatives of the typical church. He had searched the Conference for a typical church, found the average size, and picked the Franklinton Church. He asked their pastor, Michael A. Davis, and lay member, Alice Bigham, to make the report. They were introduced and proceeded to make the report, (The report will be found in Section V of the Journal.) This concluded the report of the Conference Council on Ministries.

Point of Personal Privilege: Gwen Henderson asked for the privilege of addressing the Conference before the taking of the next ballot. She directed attention toward the lack of an elected ethnic delegate among the lay constituency. She asked that all the ethnic minority clergy and lay candidates for General and Jurisdictional Conferences to stand. While she stated she was not representing or supporting any particular one, she wanted to prick the conscience of the Conference before they took the next ballot.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 6: Number of ballots cast 419. Valid 385. Needed for election

193. There were no elections. The results were read by Bishop Minnick.

Lay Ballot No. 7: Chief Lay Teller Vann gave instructions and announced that sticker nunber 7 must be used in the appropriate place. This ballot is for 5 delegates and no more. The Bishop opened the ballot. After the ballots were collected, the Bishop declared lay ballot No. 7 closed.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 7: Number of ballots cast 271. Valid ballots 260. Number needed for election 131. Reginald W. Ponder was elected with 131 votes. The remainder of the ballot was read.

Clergy Ballot No. 8: The eighth clergy ballot for the election of 5 delegates to General Conference was opened. The ballot having been taken, the Bishop closed ballot No. 8.

Motion: Terry D. Preiss moved "to suspend the rules and instruct the Bishop not to read the names of any lay candidates with less than 20 votes." The motion was adopted.

Motion: James Coile moved "that we eliminate Orders of the Day for this p.m. in order to

allow the Chair to move at an expeditious rate." It passed.

Motion: Bill Sherman moved "that, beginning with the evening business session on Wednesday evening, June 10, and continuing through the remainder of this session of the Annual Conference, the members be seated by orders, full ministerial members to be seated at the left of the main aisle facing the stage and lay members seated on the right. This motion, by necessity, excludes the Cabinet." The motion was approved.

Point of Episcopal Privilege: Bishop Minnick requested that a group of clergy wives present musical numbers which they had sung at the Potpourri. They came forth and sang

three, much to the delight of the Conference.

Report of the Duke Endowment: Bishop Minnick called upon Albert F. Fisher to bring the report of the Duke Endowment. He described the funding origin and endowment of the

fund. (For a complete text of the report, see Section V of the Journal.)

Special Recognition: Bishop Minnick recognized Conference Treasurer and Business Administrator Herb Stout to present his staff. They were called to the stage. Stout emphasized that they do not work for him but rather for the Church and for the Lord, and they all work together as a team. He introduced Josefa Bethea, Loretta Bishop, Annette Harper, Dawn Hodge, Cynthia Perry and Alison Smith. He described these servants of the Lord as intense and hard working and intelligent as well as Christian.

Special Emphasis: 200th Anniversary of Louisburg College: Bishop Minnick called Allen Norris, president of Louisburg College, to introduce a special 200th Anniversary Celebration audio-visual presentation. The ushers were asked to distribute special descriptive material about Louisburg College and its ties over the years with the

Conference.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 8: Number of ballots cast 320. Number valid 303. Number needed for election 152. No election. The report was read.

Clergy Ballot No. 9: Ballot No. 9 for election of 5 delegates to General Conference was opened. After the ballots were collected, the Bishop declared the ballot closed.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 7: Number of ballots cast 467. Valid 409. Needed for election 220. Robby Lowry with 254 votes and Ruth L. Cade with 226 were elected.

Lay Ballot No. 8: Lay ballot No. 8 was taken. Chief Lay Teller Vann gave instructions asking that sticker number 8 be attached and that 3 delegates be voted for. Bishop Minnick ordered the ballot opened. After all ballots were collected, lay ballot No. 8 was declared closed.

Resolution Concerning Louisburg College: Bishop Minnick recognized Lawrence Lugar, representative of the Commission on Archives and History, to present a resolution on page 69 of *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987*, under Resolutions, I.

Amendment: Lugar presented replacement of some wording on behalf of the commission as follows: "Section beginning: 'Therefore, be it resolved,' delete 'Petition be

made for Louisburg College to be entered as a United Methodist historical site on the National Registry," and substitute "the General Commission on Archives and History be petitioned to make Louisburg College one of the United Methodist shrines and landmarks, and be so recognized as an historical location on the Historical Tour Guide of the United Methodist Church." The Conference so ordered.

Report of Church Extension and Presentation of New Church Charters: Bishop Minnick asked Thomas A. Collins to bring the report. Collins spoke with enthusiasm on what had been done in the field of church extension and the potential of what was yet to be done. He called upon Bishop Minnick to help recognize new churches which would be

recognized as chartered by the Conference.

Charters were presented to Topsail, Resurrection, Morningstar, Harry Hosier, West Cary, and North Chatham United Methodist churches, and the recommissioned Soapstone United Methodist Church. All of these received charters indicating both their growth and potential as well as either their organization or planned organization.

Bishop Minnick called upon Rene Bideaux of the National Division to speak of new church development. He spoke of how David E. Brownlee was coming from this Conference to take a position with the Board of Global Ministries in the field of church

extension. David Brownlee was recognized and given a round of applause.

Report of the Conference Board of Trustees: Bishop Minnick called upon Myron C. Banks to present the report of the Conference Board of Trustees. Banks took the theme of stewardship and read the parable of the talents and stated that they had tried to be good stewards and now look for the Conference to practice good stewardship as well. He stated that there were two efforts: one in the area of the improvement of the Methodist Building, which would be presented in a few moments; and the other in the area of parsonage development. Fifty thousand dollars were set aside for the repair of staff parsonages for clergy persons in the Methodist Building. One parsonage was determined as being not economical to repair and was sold for more than a new one cost. A second parsonage was sold because the position that has been occupied by a clergy person will now be occupied by a lay person. This report was approved.

Banks gave a history of the need for renovation of the Methodist Building, the request by former tenants for the termination of their lease, and the Study Commission formed at the last Annual Conference. Banks stated that with less rental property and more area being used for Conference purposes there would be less rental income to pay for the restoration of the building and noted to the Conference that the time may well come when there would

be appropriations necessary to make payments on the cost of this building.

Report on Clergy Ballot No. 9: Number of ballots cast 294. Number of valid ballots 281. Needed to elect 141. There was no election. Bishop Minnick read the results.

Clergy Ballot No. 10: Ballot No. 10 for 5 clergy delegates to General Conference was called. After the ballots were collected, the ballot was declared closed by the Bishop.

Announcement: Bishop Minnick announced that the meeting of the Board of Ordained Ministry, which had been called for 5:00 p.m., would now meet upon adjournment.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 8: Number of ballots cast 451. Valid ballots 429. Needed to elect 215. There was no election.

Lay Ballot No. 9: Lay ballot No. 9 for the election of 3 delegates was opened. After the

voting, the lay ballot was declared closed.

Return to Report of the Conference Board of Trustees: After a slide presentation concerning the Methodist Building project and the taking of two ballots, Myron Banks returned to the discussion of the Methodist Building renovation matter. He pointed to the items in the budget which would be continuing items for approximately 15 years that would cover the cost of this project. The first year's cost is already displayed in the Conference Budget. Banks called for those serving on the committee to stand and be recognized. Banks also expressed appreciation to Herb Stout and his staff. He noted that approval of the report did not include approval of the funds. That would be done when the budget was voted upon. An addendum was presented by Banks and the architects indicating that asbestos products used in the original building would have to be removed at a substantial additional cost of more than \$170,000, which had not been included.

Motion: Vernon C. Tyson moved "that we delay a decision about the Methodist Building until we have made a decision about a possible Capital Funds Campaign for camps and church extension." It was seconded and passed.

church extension." It was seconded and passed 159 Sam McMillan, Jr., was then given a special presentation of appreciation for his work with camping ministries.

Belton Joyner made certain changes in the Camping Nominations and called on Brian G. Gentle to make the College Trustee Nominations and Campus Ministry Nominations. These were elected.

Joyner called upon Joseph Parker to present Health and Welfare Nominees. Trustees for The Methodist Home for Children were adopted, with changes that will be printed in the *Journal*. The same is true for trustees for The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.

Langill Watson suggested that Alene Haverstock be reinstated as a trustee of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., in the Class of 1991 in the place of Gary Fisher. He stated that an injustice had been done as an accidental omission in leaving her off after she had served two years only. For that reason he moved the replacement of Fisher with Haverstock. Joseph Parker spoke against the Watson motion.

The name of Haverstock was substituted. The votes were confirmed by the Conference at large.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 10: Number of ballots cast 288. Valid 281. Necessary to elect 141. William W. Sherman, Jr., received 149 votes; Ruth E. Harper received 143 votes. Both were elected.

Clergy Ballot No. 11: Clergy ballot No. 11 for 3 delegates to General Conference was opened. After the ballots were collected, the Bishop declared Ballot No. 11 closed.

Return to the Report of the Plans Council: Harry Gatton spoke in support of the plan made earlier which would extend the time of the campaign decision until 1988.

Amendment: Ernest Porter moved the following amendment: "During the time prior to Annual Conference of 1988, I move that the NC Conference request that (1) the Executive Vice-president of The Methodist Foundation give at least 75% of his time to cultivating capital funds for camping ministries during this conference appointment year, July 1987-June 1988, making monthly reports to the Camping Committee and the Cabinet; (2) that the Assistant to the Cabinet for Church Extension spend a majority of his time cultivating capital funds for church extension primarily in those areas identified as target areas for new churches during this conference year, July 1987-June 1988, making monthly reports to the Cabinet; and (3) that the Board of Missions be directed to develop, beyond and in addition to the \$10 Club, a Century Club for Church Extension with four calls per year of \$25 each. A report of all of the above to be submitted to Annual Conference as a part of the Plans Council report in 1988."

Thomas E. Chandler spoke against the Porter amendment on the issue of using the Office of Planned Giving and its executive director. Porter responded that the office was paid for by the Conference and therefore the Conference could direct as it wished. Chandler replied that the Conference had requested that it work toward being a self-

sustaining operation and that was the direction it was taking.

Amendment to Amendment: John Bergland moved "to substitute the initial Plans Council recommendation as stated in the Book of Recommendations." Charles Smith spoke against this amendment to the amendment. Robert McKenzie stated his support of the Bergland substitute. Jack Hunter spoke against the Bergland substitute. David Fischler wished to support the Bergland motion. Debate was cut off and the Bergland amendment was placed before the Conference for a vote. It was defeated.

Amendment to Amendment: Sam McMillan, Jr., called the question on the Porter amendment with the understanding that the 75% of a person's time be changed to "a major portion of time by the Director of Planned Giving and Assistant to the Cabinet for Church Extension in promoting major gifts for camping and church extension." It was accepted.

Herb Stout spoke against the Porter amendment. Frank Brooks asked that the amendment be tabled. Jimmy Dean rose to support Robert McKenzie's statement. The previous question was called and sustained. The Porter motion was defeated.

The recommendation of the Plans Council was approved.

Hazel Bryant asked for the privilege of speaking and it was granted. She mentioned that the Ahoskie Church is 100% for moving ahead with the Capital Funds Campaign. She pointed out that the cost to the church members would be about that of three trips to Hardee's or McDonald's per year for three years.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 9: Number of ballots cast 406. Number of valid ballots 399. Number needed for election 197. Myron C. Banks was elected with 223. Jane Hook

Johnson was elected with 223.

Lay Ballot No. 10: Bishop Minnick declared that lay ballot No. 10 for the election of 1 delegate to General Conference would be taken. Bishop Minnick called lay ballot No. 10 closed after the ballots were collected.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 11: Number of ballots cast 264. Valid ballots 258. Needed

to be elected 130. No election.

Clergy Ballot No. 12: Clergy ballot No. 12 was opened for the election of 5 delegates. Bishop Minnick declared the ballot closed after the ballots were collected.

Announcements: Ted Wilson made announcements.

Motion: James Coile moved to "suspend the rules and limit speeches to 3 minutes instead of 10...except for those making reports for boards and agencies." It was seconded and supported.

Bishop Minnick called for the singing of *The Doxology* and the Conference was dismissed until 8:00 p.m. for the worship service. He reminded the Conference that there would be a business session of great importance following the worship service, including more discussion and ballots.

Postlude: The postlude was Voluntary in D by John Stanley.

THIRD DAY, EVENING SESSION, Wednesday, June 10, 1987

Worship Service: The Worship Service was held at 8:00 p.m. in Reeves Auditorium with the Reverend Gloria R. Davis preaching. The mass choir with over 180 persons rendered special music. (For a synopsis of the entire service see Service of Worship, Wednesday, June 10, 1987.)

Conference Reconvened: Bishop Minnick reconvened the Conference following the

evening worship service.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 12: Number of ballots cast 262. Number of valid ballots 251. Needed for election 126. Robert L. Mangum was elected with 139 votes.

Clergy Ballot No. 13: Clergy ballot No. 13 to elect 2 delegates was declared open by the

Bishop. After the ballots were collected, the Bishop declared the ballot closed.

Report from The Methodist Home for Children: Bishop Minnick called on Rufus Stark to bring the report. Stark reminded the Conference that the Home had been mandated by the 1986 Conference to consider residential care for mentally retarded and developmentally disabled persons. A task force was appointed to consider this and report to the trustees of the Home. After much discussion, study, and agonizing, it was decided by the Home that the position would be maintained that the residential care units would not offer services for the mentally retarded and developmentally disabled. The suggestion was made that churches find families that are willing to provide respite care - temporary care, in other words - for mentally retarded and developmentally disabled persons to allow some time for the primary giver of the care to gather strength. A plan for this was presented by Robert Kanoy of the committee. Stark stated that the Home's trustees referred the matter to the Committee on Persons with Handicapping Conditions, chaired by James Coile.

Point of Personal Privilege: Jim Pharr, reporter for the Fayetteville papers was recognized, this being the last Annual Conference he would cover before his retirement. It was noted that he had been covering the sessions of the North Carolina Annual Conference in

Favetteville since 1973.

Report of Parsonage Use Study Committee: The report of the committee was brought by Robert C. Frazier, Sr. He explained that Chairperson Dennis Nicholson was unable to be here either today or tomorrow. Frazier said the committee had arrived at seven recommendations which were on page 67 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. Under 1. on page 67, he gave the following corrections in paragraph 2, "The committee would include a maximum of 15 members that would include representatives from each of the following: all districts, the Cabinet, Pastoral Counselor, the Director of Ministerial Relations, Board of Ordained Ministry, CFA, Clergy family, Equitable Salaries. There will be at least 50% lay membership and the chair shall be a lay person." The remainder of the items will be as in the book.

Sam McMillan, Jr., asked a question about the number of people that might be involved. Frazier responded that people from different districts could fill more than one role.

Harold Leatherman questioned the need for meeting four times a year. He said that he had not heard of that many problems regarding parsonage living.

Amendment: Harold F. Leatherman moved the following change in the wording of Section 1, "Meet as necessary up to four times a year." It was seconded. The question was called and the amendment was adopted.

Amendment: Richard T. Commander moved "that a lay person and clergy person alternate as the chair each year." The motion passed following a failed request for a count vote

Amendment: Grier Garrick moved "to delete Item 4 (regarding storage of unused furnishings) from the report" on the grounds that it would put an undue burden on many churches.

Substitute: Peg Witt, lay member from New Hope-Purley in the Burlington District, moved "that the charge should provide for storage of unused parsonage furnishings and the pastor provide for storage of the pastor's furnishings."

Garrick said he could accept that in lieu of his amendment. The Witt motion prevailed. *Amendment*: Donnie G. Davis moved, under 6.d., that "the pet owner is responsible for professional fumigation of the parsonage when moving, if the pet is kept in the parsonage." It was adopted.

P. D. Midgett III moved "to strike Item 2" of the Parsonage Use Study report. His motion failed.

Langill Watson rose to say that his wife was a member of this committee and that they had agonized over this thing for hours and he couldn't understand why this body should "nit pick" the resolution apart when it was only a recommendation to begin with. He emphasized that this was not a mandated law but a recommended policy.

The previous question on all that was before us was called and supported. The remainder of the report was supported and would be held in abeyance until consideration

by CFA on the next day.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 13: Number of ballots cast 264. Number valid 259. Necessary to elect 130. No election. The Bishop read the results.

Clergy Ballot No. 14: Clergy ballot No. 14 was opened. After the ballots were collected, the ballot was closed by the Bishop.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 11: Number of votes cast 313. Valid votes 301. Needed to elect 151. No election.

Lay Ballot No. 12: Lay ballot No. 12 was opened. After the ballots were collected, the Bishop declared the ballot closed.

Report of The Methodist Foundation, Inc.: Tom Chandler brought the report. He indicated a net increase of more than \$2,000,000 over the previous year in net assets and indicated a generally healthy condition for the Foundation. The managers of the funds have been considered acceptable and the unqualified audits are available for inspection by any member of the Conference at the Treasurer's Office. He spoke warmly of the work of Douglas Byrd and his activities throughout the Conference.

Report of the Commission on Equitable Salaries: Charles Morrison brought the report contained in *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987* beginning on page 81 and continuing through page 85. Morrison spoke about the underlying philosophy of Equitable Salaries. He moved the adoption of Part 1, pages 81-84.

Amendment: William M. Jeffries, Sr., moved to change I.A.2 to read: "percentage figure of average raises (or District Superintendents' raises) whichever is greater for that year." This referred to adjustment of the full-time salary levels. The motion was defeated.

Amendment: George C. Smith moved "that the student salary be raised to \$12,000 plus \$1,800 travel." The amendment was defeated.

Part 1 of the report was voted and received.

Part 2 of the report dealt with the report of the task force on salary supplementation. Maness Mitchell asked what the minimum salary would be for a pastor of a new church. Morrison explained that there was a separation between minimum salaries and those who were serving new and emerging churches. While minimum salary might be the floor, it was explained that these would be negotiated salaries, depending upon the experience level and the specific needs of the location of the emerging congregation and its particular requirements. In some cases the emerging church might be able to pay a portion of the salary, but Equitable Salaries would still consider paying at least a floor of minimum salary. On the ledger side, the funds would be separated.

Amendment: James H. Bailey made a motion to amend. The Bishop ruled that the motion would require reconsideration. It was not voted to reconsider.

Part 2 was again before the Conference.

Amendment: J. Thomas Smith made the following motion: "It is recommended that each district superintendent be required to prepare a review in writing of each part-time appointment, if it is subject to equitable salary support...(The rest of the motion continues.)"

Kermit Braswell spoke against the Smith amendment.

Amendment: Reginald Ponder offered this amendment to the Smith motion: "V. line 2, delete 'appointment,' add 'pastoral charge."

Simeon Cummings spoke to the Ponder substitute. He brought out the point that it was hard to recruit Native American pastors because the small Native American churches could not even pay a student salary, and yet they were not eligible for equitable salaries.

The vote was taken. The Ponder substitute became the amendment and the motion carried.

Part 2, as amended, was before the Conference. Part 2 was supported.

Amendment: James H. Bailey moved to "amend Part 1, Section II, paragraph A to read, Exempt Topsail Beach Church from these guidelines." The motion passed.

Reconsideration: Bishop Minnick ruled a reconsideration of the Bailey motion. Charles Morrison made a motion to reconsider. It was seconded. It was agreed to reconsider. The report as a whole was adopted as amended.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 12: Number of ballots cast 304. Number valid 300. Needed to elect 151. Wade H. Pierce received 157 and was elected. This completed the election of 10 lay delegates to General Conference.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 14: Number ballots cast 263. Number valid 254. Necessary

to elect 128. Helen G. Crotwell received 134 and was elected.

Clergy Ballot No. 15: Clergy ballot No. 15 was called for the election of one person as delegate to General Conference. Bishop Minnick declared the clergy ballot closed when all the ballots had been collected.

Motion: Thomas A. Collins moved that we "suspend the rules so as to delay beyond the third day of the Conference, the report of CFA and other resolutions which were called for before the close of the third day of business." It was seconded. There was a two-thirds vote and it passed.

Closing Prayer. Bishop Minnick offered the closing prayer for the evening session.

FOURTH DAY, MORNING SESSION, Thursday, June 11, 1987

Prelude: The organist for the morning, Edward Norton, First United Methodist Church, Roanoke Rapids, played *Andante from Concerto No. 1* by G. F. Handel.

Hymn: Bishop Minnick called for the singing of Love Divine, All Loves Excelling in

preparation for the Love Feast.

The Love Feast: Christian White led in the Love Feast. He read from I Corinthians 13 and then offered prayer. Then, he gave of some of the history of the Love Feast. He told how John Wesley had adopted the Love Feast from the Moravians. He emphasized that this by no means was a sacrament, but was an expression of love and common bond and love for God.

The traditional bread and water were distributed as people in attendance began to give testimony in song and word of glory to the Lord and testimonies as to what the Lord had done in their lives in the past year. After testimonies were given, the Conference sang Amazing Grace and joined hands together in the final prayer closing the Love Feast.

Brief Recess: A brief recess was called that we might prepare for the work of the day

ahead.

Conference Reconvened: The Conference was called to order by Bishop Minnick.

Report of Clergy Ballot 15: Ballots cast 239. Valid ballots 234. Needed for election 118.

No election.

**Clergy Ballot No. 16: The Bishop opened clergy ballot No. 16. After the ballots were collected, the ballot was closed. This was a ballot for one delegate to General Conference.

Lay Ballot No. 13: Secretary Ted Wilson was called upon to explain how the delegates to Jurisdictional Conference were to be elected. He explained that after the first Jurisdictional ballot, a new list would be provided with newly assigned members. A person might or might not retain the same number.

Motion: George Smith of the Pamlico Parish moved "that the first Jurisdictional ballot be a hand-written ballot with new names to start a new list for Jurisdictional Conference." It was seconded. The motion was defeated.

Motion: Ernie Wendell moved "for the first 2 Jurisdictional ballots, that we read all names receiving 10 or more votes." The motion passed.

The lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference for 12 delegates was taken. Chief Lay Teller Vann made extensive comments and gave directions on how to write in votes and which names and numbers not to vote for because they had already been elected. He encouraged people to be very careful so that they would not have invalid ballots. Bishop Minnick closed the ballot after all had been collected.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 16: Number of ballots cast 268. Valid ballots 264. Needed for election 133. Richard T. Commander with 159 votes was elected. That completed the slate for General Conference.

Clergy Ballot No. 17: Chief Clergy Teller Wiggins gave instructions. Bishop Minnick opened clergy ballot No. 17 for the election of 12 delegates to Jurisdictional Conference. After the ballots were collected, the ballot was ordered closed by the Bishop.

Report of the Committee on Minutes: Chair Angus M. Cameron moved, for the Committee on Minutes, the adoption of all minutes through Wednesday afternoon. He further moved that the Committee on Minutes be given permission to approve the minutes for the remainder of the Conference. It was done.

of the remainder of the Conference, it was done

Report of the Insurance Committee: Myron Banks led in the presentation of the report of the Insurance program of the General Council on Finance and Administration. He introduced Ruth Ann Barnes to bring greetings from the General Secretary of The Council on Finance and Administration. She introduced Anthony St. Leger to discuss the insurance program of the General Council. This was a discussion of a total church casualty and loss insurance program for church property. It is authorized by The Discipline in paragraph 907.15. The report was accepted as a matter of information.

Continuation of Report of Board of Ordained Ministry: Bishop Minnick called for a return to the report of the Board of Ordained Ministry. Langill Watson brought the remaining items to complete the report. Watson alluded to two additions to the report made at the Executive Session. Under Question 19, the name of William Thomas Smith, should now appear. Under Question 29c, those continued as Probationary Members, the name of Charles L. Aaron, Jr., was accidentally omitted from the list and should be added. Watson lauded the Ministerial Education Fund and explained how fundamentally important it was to our church. He described the funds as a life-line for our seminaries and for the education of our ministers. He urged complete acceptance of the Fund by the churches for the sake of the Church to provide for the education of future ministers. During the past year, nearly fifty students were able to remain in school because of the Ministerial Education Fund in our Conference alone.

Report of the Evaluation and Morale Committee: Watson presented Charles K. Moseley of the Evaluation and Morale Committee. The substance of the report was that the Evaluation and Morale Committee still had been unable to come up with a suitable measurement device and asked permission for the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet to prepare the instrument.

Motion: Sam McMillan, Jr., moved that the committee "create a concise instrument and an effective process." This was accepted by the committee.

Substitute Motion: Tom Faggart brought as a substitute motion: "therefore, we move that the PPR Committee meet in the fall of the year with the minister or ministers to discuss the needs of the church and how the minister and leaders of the church may work together in meeting those needs. Minutes of the meeting will be sent to the district superintendent." The Faggart motion was defeated.

Amendment: Brian Gentle moved as an amendment to the McMillan motion "that training be provided in the January Workshops to implement the process." This motion passed.

Amendment: Rick Commander moved "that no evaluation be made of the pastor for at least 11 months." The committee objected on the grounds that *The Discipline* requires an evaluation each year. Brian Gentle called the Commander amendment into question.

Gentle felt that it was important for communications to start from the beginning and that the evaluation should be done in the early months of a minister's tenure.

Henry Grant called for the previous question on all that was before us. It was sustained. The Commander amendment was defeated. The committee paper, as amended, was supported.

Watson made final comments and expressed appreciation for the opportunity of serving as chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry. He stated that the Reverend Carol W. Goehring had been elected as chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, and that the Reverend Jimmy Creech had been elected vice-chair. The Conference applauded with enthusiasm.

Reference to Motion of Last Year. Frank I. Lloyd, Jr., called attention to the motion which he had made last year - on page 168 of the Journal. He wished to make the same

motion again.

Motion: Frank Lloyd made the following motion: "I recommend that the Board of Ordained Ministry request that United Methodist related seminaries (if they aren't already doing so) and other affected seminaries investigate the establishing of classes on Evangelism and/or Church Growth and/or Church Planting looking forward to a future date when such classes might be required for ordination." The Conference supported the motion.

Report of the Joint Committee on Disability: Jack Hunter brought the report found on pages 80-81 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. Hunter said that Evander Parnell (AM) should be placed under Item 9. Under Item 10 the names of James Earl McLendon and Clarence Lee Warren should be listed. With those changes, the

adoption of the report was moved. It was adopted.

Report of the Council on Finance and Administration: Bishop Minnick called upon Sam Dixon to return to the report of CFA. Dixon referred to the CFA budget on pages 74 and 75 of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. He showed that the Conference budget had grown at a slower pace than the pace of local church

expenditure. Dixon moved the adoption of the report.

Motion: The Barton Baldwin motion, which had been tabled earlier, was brought before the Conference: "that the budget of the North Carolina Annual Conference, which is to be raised in 1988, remain the same as budgeted to be raised in 1987 in the amount of \$7,181,859. In freezing the budget, supplemental appropriations could only be provided in emergency situations after being approved by the Bishop, Cabinet, and CFA. All requests for future budgets could not exceed the previous year's increase in the national cost of living as set by the rise in the CPI (Consumer Price Index). CFA would have to reallocate this budgeted amount to provide for any items previously funded by supplemental appropriations and any new items such as Methodist Building renovation." Baldwin spoke to his motion.

James R. Huskins questioned the motion. He asked, "Is there or is there not money within our Conference to accomplish what needs to be done?" Rufus Stark spoke against the issue and raised the question of where the confidence of the Conference is. John Raper spoke for the amendment. Bob Thompson spoke against the motion by preaching briefly on tithing; he was concerned about calling and about Scriptural emphasis on items such as tithing. Tom Faggart spoke in favor of the motion. Roger Elliott spoke against the motion.

The previous question on all that was before the Conference was moved. Sam Dixon had a final statement and urged the defeat of the Baldwin motion. The motion was defeated.

Amendment: Rufus Stark asked the line Item 16, Methodist Home for Children, be increased "from \$240,055 to \$300,000," as a request in 1987, to be raised in 1988 for 1989. The Stark amendment was not supported.

Amendment: James E. Creech moved to "add under Ministerial Support, #43. Clergy Living Committee \$800, requested in '87, raised in '88, spent in '89." This was accepted by CFA

Amendment: J. Malloy Owen moved to "eliminate line 63, Methodist Building Renovations, from the budget." Reginald Ponder felt that this should be supported until we decide how we want to fund our missional causes in the church - which we had already suggested delaying for a year.

Motion: Charles Holland, lay member from Fairmont Church in Raleigh, moved "that we postpone consideration of renovation of the Methodist Building until the camping and

church extension campaign funding is complete."

Myron Banks was asked to speak to the question being raised concerning the Methodist Building renovation and maintenance. The Bishop ruled that we are now dealing with the Holland substitute which states that we will not consider the renovation of the Methodist Building until after the funding campaign is completed. The Holland amendment was not supported.

Amendment: Ernest Porter moved "that Item 63 of the budget be deleted and that the Conference authorize the Board of Trustees to renovate the present Methodist Building and/or build new additions to the Methodist Building as they deem appropriate and needed, provided all or any debt incurred is self-liquidating by rental income in the manner in which capital funding was accomplished in the original process of constructing the Methodist Building." This amendment was defeated.

Motion: Bill Jeffries moved that the "need for Methodist Building renovation be referred to the Plans Council for possible inclusion in a Capital Funds Campaign." It was defeated. E. Powell Osteen, Jr., spoke in support of deletion. R. Bruce Pate asked what was the value

of the present land and buildings on a sale basis.

The Owen amendment prevailed and line 63 was deleted.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 13: Ballots cast 337. Valid ballots 295. Needed to elect 196. Mary B. Carroll 231, Ross E. Townes 171, Becky Auman 149, and Catharine Vick 149 were elected.

Lay Ballot No. 14: Lay ballot No. 14 to elect 8 delegates was opened. After the ballots were collected, the ballot was declared closed by the Bishop.

Report on Clergy Ballot No. 16: Number of ballots cast 306. Valid ballots 250. Needed to elect 126. No election.

Ballot No. 18: Ballot No. 18 for the election of 12 delegates was opened for the clergy. After the ballots were cast, the Bishop declared the ballot closed.

We were adjourned for lunch until 1:30 p.m.

FOURTH DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION, Thursday, June 11, 1987

Conference Reconvened: Bishop Minnick reopened the Conference.

Prayer. The Bishop offered prayer.

Motion: Jerry Juren moved "that the delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences be required to submit a record of their voting on matters of ordination and other critical matters affecting the life of The United Methodist Church, and that this record be distributed to pastors and churches through the first coordinated mailing following each of these conferences." Vernon Tyson spoke in opposition. John Meares spoke in support. Bill Bingham felt the matter was unworkable. The Juren motion prevailed.

Motion: James Coile moved the following: "I request that we ask the Judicial Council to rule on the legality of the action we have just taken. (paragraph 2610)" It was so directed by

the Conference.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 14: Number of ballots cast 308. Number valid 282. Number needed for election 142. Becky Ballentine was elected with 183; William L. Bingham was elected with 165; Jeanne Rouse was elected with 159. The rest of the ballot was read.

Lay Ballot No. 15: Lay ballot No. 15 was opened, voting for 5 delegates. After the ballots

were collected, the Bishop declared the ballot closed.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 18: Number of ballots cast 283. Number valid 258. Number needed for election 130. Albert Shuler with 137 votes and Kermit L. Braswell with 133 votes were elected. The Bishop completed the reading of the ballot.

Point of Personal Privilege: Langill Watson rose to a point of personal privilege to withdraw his name from consideration.

Clergy Ballot No. 19: Ballot No. 19 for 10 delegates to Jurisdictional Conference was taken. When all were collected, the Bishop declared the ballot closed.

Motion: Bob Thompson moved, "If needed votes to elect delegates are not received on Ballot 15, that Ballot 16 elect the remainder of delegates." The motion passed.

Return to Report of Council on Finance and Administration:

Amendment: Myron Banks moved to amend line 64 on page 75 to read \$275,000 .5100,000 for operating expense and \$175,000 for removal of asbestos. Stan Smith asked a question. Malloy Owen asked a question.

Amendment to Amendment: Barton Baldwin moved "that the line item to place the maintenance item be funded by supplemental appropriation." The amendment to amendment was defeated.

Ernest Porter spoke against the Banks amendment. The Banks amendment was not proved.

Amendment: William Presnell attempted to make an amendment concerning travel allowances: "Since pastors receive travel allowances from local churches and the IRS gives tax exemptions for additional mileage traveled for business purposes and since our lay people are benevolent in their service to the Annual Conference, I move that all travel allowances to Conference meetings be discontinued and the funds set aside for this purpose be used for the Annual Conference Committee on Hunger and Human Need...and church extension." The Bishop ruled the amendment out of order.

Motion: Alan Swartz moved to suspend the rules that we might consider the William

Presnell motion. It was not sustained.

Continuation of Report of Council on Finance and Administration: Sam Dixon put the CFA budget and the entire report before us. Robert Pullman asked about the 8% increase in district superintendents' salaries. Dixon replied that this is simply a pool of money out of which the actual increases would be paid. It did not represent the actual amount of the superintendents' raise.

Motion: Pat Lykins, lay member from Andrews Chapel Church in the Durham District, moved the following: "I would like a brief rationalization for the increases in all line items where the proposed increase is \$10,000 or more. In the future, I would also suggest that this information be provided to us with the budget recommendations." It was seconded. It was

not sustained.

Motion: Robert Bergland moved "that we establish a task force to study the possibility/feasibility of selling the Methodist Building and relocating and constructing a new Conference Headquarters on one of the campuses of our four-year colleges. Report back to the 1988 Annual Conference. To be funded by CFA."

Motion: Reginald Ponder moved "that we suspend the rules so that we may consider the

Bergland motion." It passed with 71 percent favoring.

Amendment: Charles Moseley moved "to consider construction of a new Conference Headquarters... at a more central location in our Annual Conference." The amendment failed.

Amendment: Ernie Wendell moved "to change the word to 'trustees' in place of 'task

force." The motion passed.

Amendment: Kermit Braswell moved an amendment to change the wording by inserting, after "four year college campus or other appropriate location(s)." The motion passed.

Previous Question Called: The previous question on all that was before us was moved by Sam Dixon. The Bergland motion as amended carried. The Conference Trustees will make the study.

The budget, as amended, was adopted.

Resolution Concerning Proposed Race Track: Michael K. Boggs presented the resolution and moved its adoption. The resolution was supported.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 19: Number of ballots cast 298. Number of valid ballots 268. Needed for election 135. Paul L. Leeland was elected.

Motion: J. Rodney Fulcher moved "that candidates receiving fewer than 40 votes on this and succeeding ballots not be read." The motion was not approved.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 15: Number of ballots cast 286. Number valid 259. Needed to

elect 130. No election. The ballot results were read.

Clergy Ballot No. 20: Clergy ballot No. 20 was taken. After all ballots were collected, the Bishop declared the ballot closed.

Lay Ballot No. 16: Lay ballot No. 16 was opened. The votes were cast. Bishop Minnick

declared the ballot closed.

Comprehensive Plan for Missional Priority: Bishop Minnick called upon Albert Shuler to present the Comprehensive Plan for the Missional Priority for the Ethnic Minority Local Church. A full copy of the text was distributed to each delegate. It was discussed at length. For full text see Section V of the Journal.

Amendment: Rufus Stark moved to add on page 33 a new number 5, "To enhance inclusiveness in the membership of all local churches in the Annual Conference. The

present number 5 would become number 6." The motion passed.

Amendment: Sam McMillan moved in V.B., these substitutions: "3. Each program board or agency will seek to develop specific programs for ethnic minority local churches; 4. Each program board or agency will seek to fund ministries specifically for the ethnic minority local church." The motion to amend was defeated.

The Comprehensive Plan as amended was approved.

Report of Laity Ballot No. 16: Number ballots cast 278. Ballots valid 252. Needed to elect 127. Ellen M. Bergland, 156; Jean Jerome, 138; Cashar W. Evans, 135; Tibbie Roberts, 127; and Roy Turnage, 120, were elected. (The Conference had approved that the top 5 would be elected.)

Motion: Bob Thompson moved "that ballot 17 will elect alternates." The motion passed. Lay Ballot No. 17: The final lay ballot for five alternates was taken. After the ballots were

collected, the ballot was closed by the Bishop.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 20. Number of ballots cast 289. Number valid 265. Needed to elect 133. Paul A. Mickey was elected with 137 votes. The Bishop read the rest of the ballot.

Clergy Ballot No. 21: Clergy ballot No. 21 was opened for the election of 8 delegates. After the ballots were collected, the ballot was closed.

Motion: Frank Lloyd moved "that the rules be suspended and on clergy ballot No. 22 the number of delegates needed to be elected to Jurisdictional Conference be those receiving

the highest number of votes." The motion passed.

Resolutions from the Board of Church and Society: William L. Bingham brought the report. He called attention to pages 69 and following of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. Tom Collins asked Bingham if the MFSA resolution concerning AIDS could be substituted for Section II on page 69 under Resolutions, as II.A. in The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987. It was concurred.

Amendment: David A. Banks moved to add: "and as encouraging sexual abstinence in

singleness and fidelity in marriage, and..." The motion carried.

Amendment: Rick A. Moser proposed the following amendment: "Be it further resolved that the NC Conference of The United Methodist Church recommends that Conference institutions and agencies plan to deal with the time when one or more of its employees be tested for AIDS." The motion failed.

We were back on the substitute.

Amendment: James Coile moved to "delete words 'such as House Bill 490." The motion failed.

The substitute was supported and became the main resolution and it was adopted.

Section B, Capital Punishment for Minors, was sustained.

Amendment: On the Farm Crisis Resolution, Section C, Robert McKenzie moved "that all United Methodists in the North Carolina Annual Conference, including all of our Conference institutions (colleges, retirement homes, and camps) have as a priority..." The amendment passed. Section C on page 70 was approved.

Previous Question Called: The previous question on all that was before us was called. It passed. Section D, Peace with Justice, was adopted. Section E, Prison Reform, was

adopted. Section F, Victim Restitution, was presented.

Amendment: William C. Spencer moved the following amendment: "Therefore, be it resolved, that we support fair, legitimate, and legal initiatives for 'victim restitution,' such as, People Assisting Victims, and community-based Penalty Programs." The motion passed.

Amendment: Bill Spencer also moved: "Be it further resolved, that we call upon the NC State Legislature to create vehicles for victims to gain financial redress from criminals, and emotional redress including community mental health and family counseling services." This motion also passed.

The report as a whole was approved.

Resolution Concerning Gambling: Bingham introduced Malloy Owen who had an additional resolution that the Board of Church and Society had also supported. Owen presented a resolution against lottery or any other form of gambling in North Carolina. It was adopted and made a part of the report.

Report of Task Force on Farm Crisis: Margaret Saunders presented the report of the task force which had been chaired by J. Ed Legates, who could not be present. The text is on pages 105 and 106 of *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports* 1987. It was moved, as a part of the resolution, that the task force be continued for another year. The report of the task force was adopted and the task force is continued for another year.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 17: Ballots cast 244. Valid ballots 233. Needed to elect 117. Five alternates were elected: Herb Stout, 117; Margaret Anne Biddle, 116; Lula Jane Locklear Smith, 116; Anne Collins, 92; and Ellis Henry Townsend, 89. (The top 5 were elected.)

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 21: Ballots cast 268. Valid ballots 247. Needed to elect 124. James H. Coile was elected with 128 votes. The remainder of the ballot was reported.

Clergy Ballot No. 22: Clergy ballot No. 22 to elect 7 delegates was opened. After the ballots were collected, the Bishop declared the ballot closed.

Motion: Frank Lloyd moved "that the rules be suspended so that on the next ballot those persons receiving the top five votes would be elected as alternates to Jurisdictional Conference." The motion passed.

Motion: Frank Lloyd moved "to suspend the rules and that the names of those receiving

less than 40 votes not be read." The motion passed.

Petitions to General Conference: Tom Collins, for the Committee on Resolutions and Reference, was called upon by Bishop Minnick to bring the report. Petition I, concerning changing wording in the 1984 Discipline on acceptance of apportionments, the committee proposed nonconcurrence and the Conference agreed. On Petition II, the sanctity of human life (abortion), the committee voted noncurrence on the grounds that the Disciplinary passage currently was better written. The committee was supported in nonconcurrence. Petition III to General Conference by Alan P. Swartz concerning names for the Deity in administration of Sacraments, ordination and consecration was considered too broad by the Committee on Resolutions and Reference and they recommended noncurrence.

Amendment: Swartz offered to amend with the following: "Be it therefore resolved that the traditional name for the triune God - Father, Son, and Holy Spirit - be used in the administration of the Sacraments and the ordination and consecration of persons for ministry." There was more discussion on the floor of the Conference.

Previous Question: The previous question was called. The committee was supported in

noncurrence on the Swartz petition.

On Petition IV regarding the limitations of spending for overhead in the Board of Global Ministries, the committee recommended nonconcurrence.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 22: Number of ballots cast 242. Number valid 228. Number needed to elect 115. It had been agreed that the top 7 would be taken. They were David L. Harvin, 117; Samuel W. Dixon, Jr., 112; Hope Morgan Ward, 107; William T. Cottingham III, 102; Caswell E. Shaw, Jr., 92; Samuel Wynn, 90; John K. Bergland, 81.

Clergy Ballot No. 23: Clergy ballot No. 23 for the election of 5 alternates to Jurisdictional Conference was opened. After collection of the ballots, Bishop Minnick closed the

ballot.

Continuation of Petitions to General Conference: Bishop Minnick called upon Tom Collins to continue the report. Concurrence was voted on Petition V concerning ministerial standards. Petition VI concerning not funding gay caucuses was also supported. Efforts were supported to insure that at least one half of the Crusade Scholarship Funds would be used for ministries beyond the United States of America as was originally intended. The committee was supported on the World Wide Communion offering use of Petition VIII. Petition VIII concerning the African Church Growth and Development program was voted to be forwarded to General Conference with concurrence. Petition IX concerning the Board of Pensions was presented.

Amendment: Kermit Braswell moved that Item 16 be changed to read, "These funds shall accrue income at the rate established by the Directors of the General Board of

Pensions." The motion passed.

Petition IX concerning the Board of Pensions, as amended, was supported to be forwarded.

Petition X, the statement on responsible parenthood was considered.

Amendment: Mary Helen Hayman, lay member from the University Church in Chapel Hill, moved "that the fifth paragraph under Responsible Parenthood on page 1, and paragraph number 5 on page 2 are to be deleted because they permit abortion only when the life of the mother is endangered." The motion was adopted. With the amendment, concurrence was voted.

Concurrence was voted on Petition XI concerning prison and criminal justice ministries and Petition XII relating to apportionments for World Service and Conference benevolen-

ces. All petitions voted concurrence by the committee were approved.

Report of the Board of Managers for the Pastors' School: Charles M. Smith brought the report contained on page 127 of *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987.* He noted that the main speaker would be the noted religious editor, Jim Walls. The report was adopted.

Report of the Insurance Committee: Norwood L. Jones gave the report. Jones reported on the help given by the clergy in controlling costs by using local medical care rather than seeking more expensive care. It was noted with appreciation that considerable money would be credited by changing plans (but not benefits) for one year only. The life insurance plans will involve a rate increase of approximately \$9.50 per year. Jones moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted.

Report of the Office of Planned Giving: Douglas L. Byrd brought the report and filed the text for inclusion in the Conference Journal, Section V. Recipients of the Circuit Rider Awards were E. Carroll Joyner of Raleigh, Helen McLawhorn Whitehurst of Ayden, and Frank and Mollie Welch of Burlington. These persons had made contributions to create permanent endowment funds through the Foundation.

Report of the Pastoral Care Committee: James Creech brought the report for the committee. For complete text, see Journal, Section V. The report appears on pages 67-69

of The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987.

Motion from Committee on Evangelism: M. Eugene Tyson brought from the Board of Evangelism certain items that needed to be approved, including the reappointment of Bobby Tyson and Tommy Tyson as approved Conference evangelists. They were approved.

Reports of the Committee on the Episcopacy and the Committee on Entertainment: Allen Norris was recognized to present these reports. They were summarized. They will be found in Section V of the Journal. The Committee on Entertainment proposed that Annual Conference be held at Methodist College in 1988 according to the standing invitation. It will be June 16-19.

Miscellaneous Business: Secretary Ted Wilson indicated that with the distribution of supplemental information on Questions 15, 16, 67 and 68, all the Disciplinary Questions have been satisfied.

Ministers' Moving Day: Moving Day has been established as Thursday, June 18, and ministers will preach at their new appointments on June 21.

Conference Attendance: Wilson announced registered attendance at this Annual Conference is 1,494 · 766 clergy and 728 laity. This does not include a large number of guests who are not required to register.

Motion: Wilbur Jackson moved "In order that we may further enhance a climate for church extension and that we might do something positive at this Annual Conference for newly formed congregations, I move that we endorse the concept of a Century Club and that we encourage the Board of Missions to implement this program in the coming year; additionally, if receipts can be significantly increased, that the Board of Missions consider upping the amounts granted to new churches for land purchase and/or construction." It was adopted.

Motion: Allen Norns moved "that the Council on Finance and Administration consider a supplemental appropriation to fund the travel and per diem expenses of the General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates (to include the first lay and clergy reserve delegates) not funded by the General or Jurisdictional Conferences, in accordance with policies which may be established by the Council." The motion passed.

Resolutions and Papers for Study: Additional papers from the Methodist Federation for Social Action were presented, but because of the lateness of the hour, only one concerning divestment in South Africa was discussed and passed. The resolution concern-

ing Pension Escrow Fund was defeated and the human rights resolution was commended

to be read and prayerfully considered for information.

Report of Clergy Ballot No. 23: Number of ballots cast 210. Number valid 200. Needed to elect 101. It had been voted to declare the top 5 as alternate delegates. George W. Johnson, Robert L. Baldridge, Carol W. Goehring, David E. Brownlee, and J. Malloy Owen III were elected as alternates.

Wallace Kirby moved that we express our gratitude to Carson Wiggins for his service as chief teller for many years and to the tellers who served with him. The Bishop gave a personal word of appreciation for the tellers, and for Chief Lay Teller James E. Ann, all of whom had served for so many long hours and for the members of the Conference who have come to a lengthy Conference. Wiggins asked that all the tellers come out so that they could be recognized at one time. They were awarded an appreciative round of applause.

Report of Committee on Courtesies: Tom Collins moved that the report be published

in the Journal rather than read. It was so ordered.

Closing Worship Service: The Conference was in order for the closing service. A hymn was sung. The Service of Worship, Passing of the Torch, was conducted by Bishop Minnick. (For a synopsis of this meaningful service, see the Service of Worship, Passing of

the Torch, Thursday, June 11, 1987.)

Appointments: The lists of appointments were distributed to the Conference and corrections were made as appropriate. The appointments were then fixed as true and accurate by Bishop Carlton P. Minnick, Jr. The final hymn was sung and the benediction given by the Bishop, bringing to a close the 1987 Session of the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church. This was the one hundred sixty-second session in the third year of the episcopacy of Carlton P. Minnick, Jr., as Bishop of the Raleigh Area of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church.



ERNEST HADLEY OVERMAN, SR. 1913 - 1986

Ernest Hadley Overman, affectionately known as Hack, was born in Smithfield, North Carolina on November 22, 1913 to Mr. and Mrs. Rueben Overman.

Hack was a wonderful minister and served his Lord and his parishioners faithfully. He served with distinction and love the following appointments: Sea Level, 1966-69; Belgrade-Tabernacle, 1969-74; Union-Newbegun, 1974-82; at which time he retired. After his retirement he served Perkins from 1982 until he became ill in 1985. Hack was greatly beloved by the members of the churches that he served. He served as a Free Will Baptist minister from 1953-62, serving in Norfolk, Virginia, and Paintsville, Kentucky.

Hack Overman had the unusual ability to relate to his congregation as a whole, and yet the ability to enable each member on an individual basis to feel that he or she was his only concern when he was serving in a pastoral relationship. It was because of this ability combined with his caring nature that endeared Hack to his members.

Hack was a great friend to his minister friends. He was always ready to lend a listening ear when it was needed. The young ministers turned to him for advice and counsel. In his own humble way he would give whatever guidance and encouragement that he could. Hack was respected by the ministers who knew him. It was the high privilege of the writer of this memoir to work with him as his district superintendent from 1980-84. He was a great friend and would frequently visit at the district parsonage for a friendly chat or to give words of encouragement. He was considered by the writer as a personal counselor and confidant. He was an inspiration and a faithful servant as he sought to carry out the work which he knew needed to be done.

From the onset of Hack's illness in 1985, his health declined until his death on September 1, 1986. Funeral services were conducted in Elizabeth City, North Carolina at Twiford Funeral Home on September 3rd by the Reverend A. P. Hill, Jr., Superintendent of the Elizabeth City District, and the Reverend William C. Townsend, Jr., Pastor of Union-Newbegun Charge. A second service was conducted at Ebenezer United Methodist Church in Raleigh, North Carolina on September 4th by the Reverend Paul B. Scott, pastor, and Kermit L. Braswell. Burial followed in the church cemetery at Ebenezer United Methodist Church.

Hack was married to Julia Mae Kelly who predeceased him. He is survived by his son, Ernest Hadley Overman, Jr., of Merced, California; his daughter, Sharon Kelly Mosley of Virginia Beach, Virginia; and four grandchildren, Michael Overman, Michaele Mosley, Phyllis

Mosley and Phillip Mosley.

The death of Ernest Hadley Overman, Sr., ended the mortal life of one of God's chosen ones. He was faithful beyond any expectation. Prior to discontinuing his pastorate at Perkins, he preached on occasion when it was necessary for him to use oxygen in order to function. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." (John 3:16) Hack Overman knew that God gave His Son for him as well as others, and that through him he would have life eternal. Hack gave his life to Christ completely as he served him to the end. "Now to him who is able to keep you from falling and to present you without blemish before the presence of his glory

with rejoicing, to the only God, our Savior through Jesus Christ our Lord, be glory, majesty, dominion, and authority, before all time and now and for ever. Amen." (Jude 1:14)

Richard loved and enjoyed his home life. His home was full of joy and it was a place of peace, a pleasant place to visit. He had a wholesome and divine sense of humor and was good company. He was a good musician with a special love for gospel and country music. It was my good fortune to have him as a friend for some twenty years. He possessed a very special compassion, love and patience for those who were trapped by alcohol. Many were the nights that he carried a drunken stranger home with him and bathed, fed, and put the stranger to bed. All the time he would be telling him how much Christ loved him. He felt it was his duty and privilege to feed and lead the flock. He sought to lead his flock in green pastures and where the still refreshing waters flow. He ministered to rich and poor, the learned and illiterate, the saint and the sinner with equal interest and understanding, sympathy and love. He looked well after the sick, the shut-ins and those in distress. He was an inspiration to all with whom he came in contact. It can be truly said of Richard that he was a "good minister of Jesus Christ," a workman who had no cause to be ashamed of his work, rightly dividing the Word of Truth. He had a passion for the lost and always sought to lead them safe into the Good Shepherd's fold. His grandfather came in at noon after viewing his cotton fields in the land of "Egypt" near Camden, SC. As was his custom, he sat in the old rocking chair on the front porch and read his daily Bible verses. When the sons came in from the fields, they found min still sittin there with the Bible in his hands and his head slumped over in death. His father could always be seen on his knees in prayer at his bedside every night just before retiring. With these memories ever present in his mind, Jim White grew up and lived a life of faithful

service to his Heavenly Father.

He was born to James G. and Sue Plummer White on October 20, 1928 in Charlotte, NC and was their only child. Before his mother's death in 1938, Jim was baptized and joined First Methodist Church of Charlotte where his parents were charter members. From as far back as he could remember, he attended Sunday school and church there on a regular basis. During the summers, he spent much of his boyhood years visiting aunts, uncles and cousins at the old homeplace in South Carolina. While there, he attended St. John's Methodist Church in Spring Hill. The annals of the church history include many of Jim's ancestors and several of the pews and stained glass windows bore the White name (this building was destroyed by fire in early 1986) and the cemetery is full of his ancestors and relatives.

After his mother's untimely death in 1938, his Grandmother Plummer came to live with him and his father until his dad's remarriage to Frances Hawfield when Jim was 13. During his teenage years, two brothers, Anthony and Lawrence, were born to this union. With the loving influence of his grandmother, stepmother and father, his life continued to revolve around the church.

Several others had a great influence on his young life; Doctors G. Ray Jordan and Clovis Chappell, senior ministers at First Methodist in Charlotte, and Dr. Howard Wilkinson, an associate minister of the church. When Jim reached his mid-teens, his father became the business manager and treasurer of the church, a position he held until his retirement some 25 years later. These people and his close association with the Methodist Church molded

Jim's life so that the church and service to it was always uppermost in mind.

After finishing Central High School in Charlotte in 1946, Jim joined the Army and served for over a year with the Army of Occupation in Japan. Upon discharge, he enrolled at Brevard College and finished there in 1950. On September 2nd of that same year, he and Frances Bass were married at the First UMC in Hendersonville. She had just finished nutsing school in Charlotte and they set up their first home in High Point where Jim attended High Point College, from which he graduated in 1952. While there, their first child, James G. White III, was born. In the fall of 1952, the Reverend John Poe at West Burlington UMC helped Jim to join the NC Conference and he was appointed to the five-point

Lumberton Circuit. He commuted to Duke Divinity School and oversaw the building of a new parsonage and had 52 new members added to the Singletary Church at Dublin during the SC-NC Conference exchange of ministers in the spring of 1953.

Moving to the Duplin Circuit in Kenansville in 1953 where he had four churches, he initiated some remodeling for two of the churches. Also, he and Frances had their second child, Vera Sue, while living there. The next move was to the Asbury-West Smithfield Charge in Smithfield. At this appointment, he oversaw the building of an educational and fellowship building for Asbury and helped to establish these two newly formed churches into a strong two-point charge.

After two years, he accepted the Kenly-Buckhorn Charge in Kenly while he continued with his studies at Duke. He was elected and ordained a deacon in 1957. Jeffrey, their third and last child, was born just before they left for Biscoe in 1959, where Jim served for 5 years. During his tenure, he finished his formal education and became an elder in the Conference. A two-story educational building was added to the Page Memorial Church under his leadership. In 1964 the Whites moved to Carrboro to serve the Carrboro UMC. While there he built a two-story educational and fellowship building and started a kindergarten and daycare center, which today has an enrollment of over 100, and added a steeple to the sanctuary. Mount Olive First UMC was his next appointment in 1969. While there he oversaw the remodeling of the sanctuary and was one of the principal supporters of the Mount Olive Centennial. He next served Cary First UMC for four years and oversaw some extensive remodeling in the educational building.

Going back to Carrboro UMC in 1979, he served there for 3 more years and decided that he wanted to stay in the Triangle area. At this time he was appointed to the Merritts-Ebenezer Charge in Chatham County and he opened the Christian Care and Counseling Ministries in Carrboro. He helped Merritts to start plans for remodeling the educational building and burned the mortgage on their fellowship hall. His Christian Care and Counseling Ministries reached out to assist many needy and troubled persons in the Chapel Hill

area.

In early 1985 he was diagnosed with lung cancer which later spread to the brain. Throughout the 18 month period prior to his death, he kept ministering to his two churches and also kept his counseling office open until shortly before his death on October 9, 1986.

During all of his ministry, Jim was very active in civic affairs. He was a member of the Lion's, Kiwanians and Rotarians, serving as an officer both locally and on the district levels. He was a Boy Scout leader and served on the district level several times. In Cary and Mount Olive he was a member of the rescue squad and the fire department. In Carrboro, he was elected to serve on the Board of Aldermen for four years and was also on the Board of Directors for the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Chamber of Commerce and the Salvation Army.

For those who knew him best, he was a loving and caring person. He had a good sense of humor and loved to tease. He was especially fond of young people and worked very closely with them through the years. He loved to preach and to counsel. Throughout his life he kept a strong trust and faith in God and even though at times he stumbled, he always got up

again and kept moving in the journey that would lead him Home.

On October 12, 1986, Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., the Reverends James C. P. Brown, Vernon Tyson and Clarence Garner officiated at his funeral at the Carrboro UMC. As his earthly body was being borne from the church, the Merritts-Ebenezer Choirs sang "Alleluia" joyfully, for he had finally reached the object of his faith, communion with his Maker.

He was buried in the Westwood Cemetery in Carrboro.

Surviving are his wife, Frances; three children, Jimmy of Carrboro, Vera Sue of Miami, FL, and Jeffrey of Carrboro. He had one gradson, Graham, of Carrboro; a stepmother, Frances White, of Pineville, NC; two brothers, Anthony of Charlotte and Lawrence of Hinesberg, VT; and several nieces and nephews.

EDGAR BEAUREGARDE FISHER 1903 - 1986

Edgar B. Fisher was a member of the North Carolina Conference for forty-eight years, plus ten years of part-time service in retirement. He was distinguished for his leadership roles in the church as well as for his exemplary character. He chose the Methodist itinerancy as a life's vocation after years of reflection and following a brief career as a teacher and high

school principal in Kinston, North Carolina.

He found joy in being a clergyman. For him pastoral visiting was no mere duty. He enjoyed his relationships with thousands of families and cherished his friendships with all sorts and conditions of people. He knew the thrill of proclaiming "good news" from a pulpit and experienced the blessedness of administering the holy sacraments. Throughout his career his was the joy of fellowship with colleagues in ministry, especially at Annual Conferences.

Edgar Beauregarde Fisher was born in Clayton, North Carolina, on November 4, 1903, the eighth child of the Reverend and Mrs. George Washington Fisher. His father was a native of Catawba County who began his own career as a Methodist preacher in 1885 and served congregations across the State of North Carolina from western foothills and mountains to the seacoast. His mother, born Ida Lee Love, grew up in a prominent family in Caswell County. She was equipped, mentally and in Christian conviction, for the demands of parsonage and parish. Edgar often remarked, "I was fortunate in my parents." Under their tutelage he joined the church in Cary when he was eight years of age.

He was a graduate of Trinity College, now Duke University, where his superior academic record resulted in his election to Phi Beta Kappa and his success in intercollegiate debating brought him membership in Tau Kappa Alpha. He received the degree of Bachelor of Arts

in June, 1924.

Advanced theological and professional training was completed at Yale Divinity School in June, 1928, when he was graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Divinity.

In November of that same year he was "admitted on trial" into the NC Conference. On his twenty-fifth birthday, the fourth of November, he was appointed to the St. John Gibson

Charge in the Rockingham District, where he served four years.

Early in the Gibson pastorate Edgar began to date Ruth Elizabeth Knight of Jefferson, South Carolina, who was teaching the second grade in the Gibson school. On November 5, 1929, the two were married in the home of Ruth's parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. W. Knight, in Jefferson. Her pastor, the Reverend S. D. Bailey and Dr. H. C. Smith, "Presiding Elder" of the Rockingham District, were the officiating ministers.

After serving the Gibson charge Edgar's next six appointments, covering a period of twenty-four years, brought him to the zenith of his effectiveness and influence in the Conference. Those appointments were: Mt. Gilead; First Church, Roanoke Rapids; Chestnut Street, Lumberton; Trinity, Wilmington; Raleigh District; and Duke Memorial, Durham, where he served five years. During half that period he also taught courses in Evangelism and Urban Ministries in the Duke Divinity School. In June, 1956, while he was still the pastor of Duke Memorial Church, High Point College conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

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Later appointments, starting in the summer of 1956, were: Front Street, Burlington; Jarvis Memorial, Greenville; Burlington District; and Lillington. He retired in 1976, having completed forty-eight years as an active member of the North Carolina Conference. In retirement he added another decade of work as the Pastor Emeritus and Minister of Visitation at Front Street.

During his years as pastor and district superintendent, Edgar accepted many cognate responsibilities, including a term as President of the Conference Board of Education and another term as Vice-president of the Board of Evangelism. For nineteen years he was a trustee of Louisburg College, and later a trustee of Methodist College. He was elected to two

Jurisdictional Conferences of The United Methodist Church.

Health problems limited Edgar's mobility in recent years and became life-threatening in 1986. In October he was admitted to Duke Medical Center and for eight weeks was in critical condition. He died at 6:00 p.m. on Monday, December 15. The funeral was conducted in Front Street Church at 11:00 a.m., Wednesday, December 17, with the pastor, Dr. Jack L. Hunter, in charge. Assisting were Dr. Charles Mercer, of Roanoke Rapids, and the writer of this memoir, whose mother was another Fisher of Catawba County. Pallbearers included four grandsons: Alexander Holloway Veazey III, Daniel Bert Veazey, Lee Fisher Veazey, and Edgar Beauregarde Fisher III. The two additional pallbearers were: William Howard Page, husband of granddaughter Beth Fisher, and the Reverend Richard P. Wilkerson, Associate Minister at Front Street. Burial was in Pine Hill Cemetery in Burlington.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Ruth Knight Fisher, of Burlington; a daughter, Mrs. Alex H. Veazey, Jr., of Hendersonville; a son, Edgar Beauregarde Fisher, Jr., of Greensboro; a sister,

Mrs. Alma Finch of Zebulon; seven grandchildren; and six great grandchildren.

Edgar Fisher was an unusual clergyman. In many senses he was a man of strength, but he had a weakness. He loved ice cream inordinately! Neither his conscience nor his wife's protests could save him from indulgencies! Beyond this foible, however, he was a person of mental and spiritual vigor. Intellectually he was superior but never snobbish. He was fun-loving but not lacking in dignity; he was devout but not prudish or sanctimonious. He added luster to the family's name and contributed substantially to the effectiveness of the NC Conference. To all who knew him, including many non-Methodists, he was the exemplar of Christian manhood and servanthood.

The funeral was held at the First United Methodist Church in Rockingham on December 26th at 11:00 a.m. The Reverend Harold F. Leatherman conducted the service. Interment was in the Sandy Ridge Cemetery out from Kernersville, NC. He is survived by one son, Jabez G. Pegg of Winston-Salem, NC; and two daughters, Paula A. Schwehm of Tacoma, WA, and Sarah P. Chance of Rockingham, NC. He is also survived by two sisters and one brother.

Following 56 years of marriage, his beloved wife, Ella Lillian Edwards, whom he had married on April 16, 1927, died just three years earlier on September 22, 1983.

During his ministry, J. Paul Peag served the following churches: Flat Rock, Glen Raven. State Street, Granville, St. John-Gibson, Seaboard, Nashville, Riverside, Fellowship, Kenansville, Bethel-Concord and Troy after he retired for three years.

Paul Pegg wrote several books, the most loved and read was The Hollu and the Oak.

which was written in memory of his son's death in 1948, at the age of 6.

He also served several years as a school teacher and principal. As a minister, he worked long hours writing and preparing for his church services. He truly served the people, and they loved him. Through his sermons, poetry, and other writings, he has left a rich heritage to his family and friends.

As a father, he encouraged his children in their studies and he impressed upon them the importance of an education, hard work, and most of all - living Christian lives. The less

serious side of him was evident in the jokes and stories he enjoyed telling.

After he retired, Paul Pegg enjoyed painting, writing and reading, especially history books. He was a very kind person. Even during his long illness, he never complained and loved everyone that took care of him and visited him - and above all - his children. grandchildren, and great grandchildren.

Paula Ann remembers, as a young girl, that she was proud to be "Mr. Pegg's" daughter. She believes that her father continues to live through his children, through the things he taught them and more significantly, the example he set. He used II Timothy 4:7 as a text for many sermons. Like St. Paul, he could say, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith."

WILFORD DENNY WISE 1916 - 1986

Wilford Denny Wise was born in Dare County on November 7, 1916 to Claude and Bertha Meekins Wise. He spent his formative years in Manteo where he graduated from high school in 1934. In his teens, he worked as a party boat captain for fishing excursions to the Gulf Stream.

On April 14, 1941, he married Hulda Lenora Ballance of Currituck who had just

graduated from Capitol City Nursing School of Washington, DC.

For several years he worked in the naval shippard in Norfolk, Virginia before being called to active duty in World War II where he fought under General Patton during the push across the Rhine River. The trauma of that experience, including the loss of his own brother, Gerald, and countless other "buddies," led him to make a personal covenant with God. He pledged that if he were spared, he would dedicate his life to Christian service.

Five years later, after having served in many lay capacities at Mt. Olivet United Methodist Church in Manteo, including lay leader, lay speaker, scout master, church school teacher,

and chairman of the board, he entered into full-time Christian service.

By his second appointment, he was serving five churches spread out over two counties while attending college at Louisburg. Further training also came the "hard way" with correspondence courses from Emory University and many summers at the Duke Pastor's School. Finally, he was ordained an elder in 1958 at age forty-two. 215

During his twenty-three years of service, he served appointments in the following areas: Bath, Middleburg, Whiteville Circuit, Rocky Mount: St. Paul, Goldsboro: Airboro-Garris, Broadway. Apex. and Newport.

The two men who most influenced his life and who gave him the courage to continue in spite of declining health were his late uncle, the Reverend Earl Meekins, and his colleague and friend, the Reverend Vergil E. Queen.

A long battle with illness, including four kidney operations and a stroke, eventually took

its toll forcing him to retire on disability in 1976.

Settling in the coastal commuity of Śwansboro, he spent most of his last days near the sea that he loved so well. Subsequent strokes, however, left him unable to speak and partially paralyzed for the last two and a half years of his life. Only his warm smile and the radiance of his countenance remained. Then on December 26, 1986 at Veterans Hospital in Fayetteville, he quietly crossed over Jordan.

Funeral services were held in Manteo at Mount Olivet Church in December 29 with the Reverend Julian Scott presiding. A powerful eulogy was preached by the Reverend Whit

Warren, Superintendent of the New Bern District.

Surviving are his wife, Hulda, of Swansboro; his son, the Reverend Denny Wise of Mount Olive; a daughter, Wanda Sanseri of Portland, Oregon; one brother, Willis of Manteo; a sister. Hilda Ballance of Manteo; and four grandchildren.

Several scholarships have been established in his honor, including one at Louisburg College and one by the Scottish Rite Masonic Order of Raleigh. Also many memorial funds

have been set up at local churches across the Conference.

People will long remember the strength of this man's character and the warmth of his spirit. As a loving husband, a kind father, and as a man of deep faith and compassion, he has left his mark.

As a result of his influence, at least four young people were called into the active ministry, including his own son.

Dr. Daryl Martin, formerly of Apex and presently professor at Emory University, expressed the sentiments of many upon hearing of Wilford Wise's death: "He was the epitome of a 'Christian' and quite an example...A little bit of him lives on in me."

BUELL ELDEN BINGHAM 1900 - 1987



Buell Elden Bingham was born on January 26, 1900 into the Quaker home of a farmer and school teacher near Asheboro, NC. The eldest son of ten children, he helped provide for the family until the children had finished school. At 21 he returned to school completing high school, college and Bible School and became a pastor in the Pilgrim Church. He was married to Lois Crouse on February 10, 1927 and with his wife and infant daughter, Rebecca, he went to the British West Indies in 1928 to serve as a missionary for seven years.

He built a church and mission home in Grand Cayman and a mission home in Jamaica in addition to his other ministry which included: Grand Cayman, Nevis, Jamaica, Antigua, Leeward Islands, Barbados, St. Kitts and Montserrat. His skills with an axe were legendary as

he cut down mahogony trees to build a church as well as clear the land for a road across the island. The islanders still recall how he could shave the hairs from his arm with his sharp axe. Though he had never been to sea before this mission assignment, he fearlessly sailed a boat across the ocean inlet to preach on the other side of the island - thus the need for the road!

Buell preached the gospel with dignity! He always carried with him a white suit which he would put on before preaching for he told the islanders, "We always give God our very best." He also took with him his cornet which he played to God's glory. How the church delighted to hear his rich bass voice as he sang the good news of Jesus' love! Two more children joined him there, Nita and Bill. In 1976 the island of Grand Cayman honored him with a week long celebration including the governor of the island representing the queen of England and other dignitaries. He was greatly loved by the islanders as fifty years later they still knew and called each of his family by name. One islander expressed this love when he embraced Buell as he stepped from the plane and said, "We're blood brothers!"

After seven years, he returned stateside where he ministered in Kentucky, Oklahoma, Illinois, California, and North Carolina before joining the Methodist Church in 1947. A graduate of Asbury College, he took post graduate studies from Emory University while serving his first charge at Roper. There his fourth child, Priscilla Sue, was born. His other charges included Alamance, Goldston, Kinnakeet and South Camden. He was pastor of Asbury UMC near Washington and Smith UMC in Halifax before retiring to Archdale in 1969. During retirement he continued to preach, marry and baptize. He made two more trips with building teams on mission endeavors to Chile, South America and Panama. He was active in Archdale UMC where he taught the Men's Bible Class and sang in the choir until shortly before his death.

An enthusiastic sportsman, he was often invited to return to former congregations for hunting and fishing trips as well as for speaking at homecoming services. During these occasions many times were recalled when he had helped his parishioners at slaughter time by hoisting the animal completely by himself. Much of his ministry was done at times such as these or at harvest when he assisted in whatever needed to be done. His physical strength and stamina were truly amazing and remained so until his last year.

Equally as outstanding was his love for his family. A man of high integrity, he was always devoted to his wife and children. He provided, protected and defended them well throughout his life. "The steps of a good man are ordered of the Lord and he delighteth in that way." "In all your ways acknowledge Him and He will direct your paths." These were his favorite passages from scripture and he endeavored to live by them.

On January 1, 1987 Buell died in Rex Hospital in Raleigh, NC after a week's illness. A Service of Celebration was held on January 4 at Archdale UMC with the Reverend Robert McKenzie and the Reverend Keith Bingham officiating. Six of his grandsons sang his favorite hymns, a niece and brother-in-law sang solos. His grandsons were pall bearers and his granddaughters attended the pall. Interment was in Guilford Memorial Park. Buell Bingham is survived by his wife, Lois; three daughters, Rebecca, Juanita and Priscilla Sue; a son, William; fifteen grandchildren; four great grandchildren; three sisters and a brother.

WILLIAM FRANCIS ELLIOTT 1900 - 1987

William Francis Elliott was born in Rockville, South Carolina on November 24, 1900 to William and Lena Elliott. He was married to Sarah Louise Johnson on December 25, 1932. Sarah had died March 18, 1986 and William died January 18, 1987 at the Wesley Pines Retirement Home in Lumberton, North Carolina. Surviving are two children, Bernice Elliott

Best and William F. Elliott, Jr., of St. Croix, Virgin Island.

William Elliott attended a Presbyterian Church school in Camden, South Carolina, Bordentown Training School in Bordentown, New Jersey, and Cheyney Teachers College in Pennsylvania. He transferred to Virginia Seminary College in Lynchburg, Virginia where he received an A.B. degree, Lincoln University in Pennsylvania for a B.A. and Masters degree in Sacred Theology. He did graduate work in counseling at Virginia Union University in Richmond, Virginia.

William held pastorates at Court Street Baptist Church, Lynchburg, Virginia; First Baptist Church, High Point, North Carolina; and Seventh Street Baptist Church in Charlotte, North

Carolina.

After serving in the Western North Carolina Conference, William transferred to the North Carolina Conference in 1960 and held pastorates at Red Springs, Pembroke, and the

Lumberton-Mt. Olive-Smith Charge.

William was a champion of justice for the disadvantaged, an advocate for equal rights and equal opportunity for all people, regardless of their race. He organized the Democratic Negro Party in Lynchburg, Virginia, was president of the Better Citizens League of Red Springs, president of Robeson and Scotland County political organization and chairman of the Committee on Human Relations in The United Methodist Church.

He was like the Prophet Amos, proclaimed by his activities that "Justice should roll down

like water," if society is to know real peace.

His funeral was conducted by the Reverend Jimmy E. Cummings. Expressions of memorial were given by the Reverend Sidney A. Locks, the Reverend James H. Woods, Dr. E. B. Turner and the Reverend William W. Sherman, Jr., at the Mt. Olive United Methodist Church in Lumberton. Interment was in Lumberton.

JOHN THOMAS MAIDES, JR. 1919 - 1987

John Thomas Maides, Jr., was born on November 29, 1919 in Maysville, North Carolina. John graduated from Louisburg College, 1942, A.A. degree; High Point College, 1944, A.B. degree; Duke Divinity School, Duke University, M.Div. degree; American Divinity School, Chicago, 1953, Th.D. degree.

He was granted a license to preach April 1942; ordained deacon and received on trial, November 1946; ordained elder and received into full connection November 1948.

In his thirty-nine years as an itinerant United Methodist minister in the North Carolina Conference, John faithfully served fourteen charges: Rosemary, 1946; Roanoke Circuit, 1947; Stantonsburg, 1951; Wilmington: Wesley Memorial, 1954; Raleigh: Longview, 1958; Durham: Asbury, 1961; Jacksonville: Trinity, 1964; Roxboro: Long Memorial, 1969; Kinston: Queen Street, 1973; Mount Olive: First, 1975; Windsor, 1977; Yanceyville, 1980; Morehead City: Franklin Memorial, 1982; Hawkins-Tabor, 1984; and retired 1985.

John was proud of his work in church extension. In 1949 the South Rosemary Methodist Church, where he served, was voted by the North Carolina Conference as "The Church of the Year." He also emphasized evangelism and stewardship as well as the total program of the church. He worked and shared with children, youth and adults alike. It was while John was the minister of South Rosemary Methodist Church, Roanoke Rapids, that one of the writers of this memoir, Kermit L. Braswell, was greatly influenced by him along with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. I. Kermit Braswell, to enter the ministry. John diligently worked in establishing the church and had a tremendous impact on the entire community.

John was a good preacher, an able administrator, a caring pastor, and a faithful minister

for God. He presented himself as "a living sacrifice."

He served his church at the Conference level as well as the local level. He was a member of the Board of Social and Economic Relations from 1952 through 1960 and served as chairperson and vice-chairperson of this board. He was a member of the Church Extension Research Planning and Survey Committee from 1956-1958. John served on the Division of Stewardship from 1972-1977 and was chairperson from 1972-1976. Further, he served as a trustee of the Methodist Retirement Home.

To the union of John Thomas Maides, Jr. and Mary Shirley Allen, who were married on December 16, 1950, were born four children, Shirley Allen, Mary Nell, John Thomas Ill, and Dabney Ragland. Three of the children are married, and there are three grandchildren.

They all are grateful to their father for his devotion and support.

John married Virginia Ruth Laughlin on June 13, 1982. He retired from the North Carolina Conference in June 1985. After his retirement, he served the Bedford Circuit in the

Virginia Conference.

Funeral services were conducted by Troy Barrett and Steve Fulton, pastor of Penn Forest Christian Church, Roanoke, Virginia at the Oakey Funeral Home, Roanoke, Virginia. Louise passed to her glory on September 13, 1986 while a patient in Kennestone Hospital of Marietta, Georgia. While in seemingly good health, she nonetheless experienced several flare-ups which required hospitalization six times during the spring and summer of 1986. The ultimate cause of death was a painful cerebral hemorrhage. The Lord seemed to be saying, "My daughter, you have suffered enough, come home."

Louise was a graduate of Orlando High School in Florida and attended Bowling Green Business College in Kentucky. On June 15, 1934, this gifted and gracious lady became the wife of the Reverend Cyrus B. Hutcherson who at the time was a member in the Louisville Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.

Her track record as the wife of a minister for over fifty years was one of unselfish devotion to him as well as to the members of the twelve churches they had the pleasure and joy of serving.

Six years before her death, being the loving mother she was, she encouraged their move from Madisonville, Kentucky to Marietta, Georgia where she and Cy could spend their latter days near their children. It was their good fortune to have all their children living in the Atlanta area.

Funeral services were held in the First United Methodist Church in Marietta. The Reverend Charles Sineath, pastor, officiated, and was assisted by the Reverend Gary R. Oates, Louise's nephew. Interment was in the Cheatham Hill Memorial Park of Marietta.

Surviving is her husband who for fifty-five years served as pastor, evangelist and World War II Army Chaplain. Surviving children are David Hutcherson of Tampa, Florida, C. B. Hutcherson, Jr. and Katherine Nysewander, both of Marietta. Louise was the proud grandmother of eight and great grandmother of one. Survivors also include three brothers, Ward J. Oates, of Frankfort, Kentucky, Harmon W. Oates of Ormond Beach, Florida and Charles K. Oates of Madisonville, Kentucky.

ELIZABETH HARRIS PLYLER 1919 - 1986

Elizabeth "Betty" Harris Plyler died September 24, 1986 in the Tracy Memorial Community Hospital in Tracy, California after a lengthy illness. Betty was born May 16, 1919 in Olean, New York, the daughter of Fred and Jessie D. Harris of St. Marys, Pennsylvania.

Betty spent the early part of her life in St. Marys, Pennsylvania where she graduated with honors from St. Marys Public High School. In St. Marys, she was a very active youth and

young adult in the local Methodist Episcopal Church.

She married Lorenzo Pierce "Joe" Plyler on August 27, 1938. They resided in St. Marys until June of 1950 when Joe entered Lycoming College at Williamsport, Pennsylvania to begin his career as a minister in the Methodist Church. One son, Lorenzo G. Plyler II, was born to their union on June 22, 1945 at St. Marys. While still in St. Marys, "Joe and Betty," as they became known, served part-time the Benezett-Penfield Charge in the Central Pennsylvania Annual Conference. During college they were appointed to the Fairview Parish, RD, Montoursville, Pennsylvania. Here, under the scrutiny of loving parishioners, Betty learned the "ins-and-outs" of parish life. She loved every minute of it though they were hard and trying days for both wife and husband.

Betty and Joe, with their son, moved to Boston, Massachusetts where Joe became a seminarian and Ph.D. candidate at Boston University. Betty went to work in the statistical department of the university and eventually became the supervisor of clerical work in

statistics research.

After graduation and the Ph.D., Joe became the interim minister at Wesley Methodist at Gloucester. Betty remained at the university until they moved to Sioux City, lowa where Joe became chaplain at Morningside College. After two years, Joe was transferred to Everly, lowa becoming involved in the unification of several churches into the Everly United Methodist Church.

In 1966 Betty moved with the family to Fayetteville, North Carolina where Joe became an instructor and professor at Methodist College. Deeply engrained with their life and work here, Joe joined the North Carolina Conference in 1969. Here, Betty was mother and

confidant for seventeen years to her son and countless students.

Following retirement in 1983, Betty and Joe joined their son to live in Birmingham, Alabama; and it was in the last years of her life, in Fayetteville and Birmingham, that Betty became aware of a deterioration in her health. Diabetes and heart disease began to take

their toll on her health and physical condition.

Betty and Joe moved to Tracy, California in 1984 to be with their son who was transferred there by his employer, Northern Telecom, Inc. Betty had a carotid operation which left her with a stroke and a heart attack. Another heart attack in 1985 left Betty very weak and needing constant care. The final attack, a massive coronary, took her life. A Celebration of Life Service was held for Betty in the Tracy United Methodist Church on September 26, 1986.

All her life Betty lived for the Lord, giving herself unstintingly for others and her church. She is greatly missed by Joe, her son "Rhett," and her grandson, Lorenzo E. Plyler. She is also missed by the many friends she learned to love during her years as the wife of a

Methodist minister. It is our deepest prayers that the Lord Jesus Christ, whom she loved so greatly, will have rewarded Betty with his promise of eternal life and that her life in heaven with him far surpasses her busy sixty-five years of physical life. Betty's ashes will be interred at Raleigh, North Carolina when the family takes up residence there.

BONNIE IRENE HARRELL ALLEN 1953 - 1987



Bonnie Irene Harrell was born September 1, 1953 to James and Hazel Harrell, the first of what was to be three children in the Harrell family. Weldon, North Carolina was home for the family and Smith's United Methodist Church had provided the church home for at least four generations. During her teen years, Bonnie was active in her local church through its youth group, Sunday school and finally serving as secretary to the Council on Ministries. On June 18, 1972 Bonnie Irene Harrell and the Reverend Danny Gregory Allen were united in marriage at Smith's United Methodist Church, Roanoke Rapids, North Carolina.

During the following years, the Allens served pastorates in the Rocky Mount, Greenville, Durham and Raleigh Districts. Bonnie's zest for life provided a special lift for all who met her. The ministry was hers as well as her husband's. She managed to touch the lives of

many people in personal ways that were never forgotten.

Motherhood was a special privilege for Bonnie. October 15, 1975, Christi Lynn became the first child to be born in the Allen home with Gregory Clayton to follow on June 21, 1979. Both children were showered with healthy amounts of love and discipline from "Mama." In just a few short years, she instilled enough strength and love in her children sufficient to

provide a secure foundation for all of life.

On December 2, 1985, Bonnie was diagnosed with a brain tumor of the most aggressive and least medically responsive type of cancer. During the next fourteen months, two major surgeries, radiation therapy and chemotherapy along with numerous hospital stays, became the battleground from which Bonnie fought the battle of life. She fought with the conviction, "I'm going to beat this thing!" On January 15, 1987, Bonnie claimed the victory as she peacefully stepped into heaven. Those of us left behind remember her joy, her celebration of life, her strength, her faith, her commitment as a child of God, a friend, a wife and a mother. We miss her.

The funeral service was conducted on Saturday, January 17, 1987 at 11:00 a.m. at Wendell United Methodist Church. Interment concluded the service that afternoon at Smith's United Methodist Church in Roanoke Rapids, North Carolina. Bonnie had come home. Participating ministers included the Reverend Joseph Bethea, superintendent of the Raleigh District, the Reverend Henry Lovelace, pastor of Zebulon United Methodist Church, and the Reverend Johnny Branch, pastor of Smith's United Methodist Church.

On her headstone are inscribed the words from II Timothy 4:7 as a testimony to the courageous life Bonnie lived: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have

kept the faith."

Memories touch the heart. Soft remembrances comfort the loss. Lives are richer having known Bonnie. I shall always miss her. I look with joyful anticipation to the family reunion in heaven where God has prepared a place for us - and Bonnie is putting the final touches on.

SALLY ANN BROOME KIRBY 1932 - 1987



Sally kept a diary of private prayer. On January 17, 1980 she wrote the following prayer, which is so exemplary of her life and how she met each day: "Father, each day is a gift and I'm so grateful for it. Some are wrapped in tinsel, some in yarn, some in string, some in masking tape, some in clear tape, some loose. Help me to accept each as a part of the whole, to the fullest. Forgive me when I wish tape days were yarn days, string days were tinsel days, and thus waste or misuse them."

That prayer sums up the way she lived, for she did treasure each day because of her love for living and all the excitement and joy that she found in life. Even in the last year when cancer invaded her body again and was untouchable by surgery, chemotherapy, and radiation, she prayed that she would not succumb to self-pity or resentment or bitterness. Her family and friends are aware that prayer was answered, for she never lost her gracious concern for them and others in the midst of her suffering.

Sally was born in Catawba County, Virginia on November 4, 1932. Her father, Dr. Lemuel R. Broome, Sr., was a pulmonary specialist at the tubercular sanatorium. Her mother, Dorothy H. Broome, a registered nurse, practiced there after the children were grown. Three other children in the family were Lemuel, Jr., Betty, and Barbara. Her mother, brother, and sisters survive her.

A graduate of Stratford Junior College (Danville, Virginia) and Randolph-Macon Woman's College (Lynchburg, Virginia), Sally enrolled in Duke Divinity School in January 1954 to pursue a degree in religious education, and was encouraged by the Duke faculty to continue her studies towards a doctorate. It was there that we met and thirteen days after our first date, I asked her to marry me. It took visits to our homes in Virginia and Roxboro before she consented and on October 9, 1954, we were married at the Whitmell Methodist Church near Danville.

Our first appointment was Fremont, a small town in northern Wayne County. We put down roots so deep that we bought a cemetery plot there. Two children, Mark and Ann, were born during the six years we lived in Fremont. In June 1960 we were sent to serve the Wallace church, and the children were excited about a church and a town named after their father. John was born during that four year pastorate. The third appointment (June 1964) was to Divine Street Church in Dunn and we had another son born, Lemuel (Lem). Four years later the Cabinet sent us to an exciting and challenging downtown church in Fayetteville, Hay Street Church. Six years there gave us a chance to develop some exciting ministries to the lonely and needy of that metropolitan area. In June 1974, we were sent to serve Edenton Street Church in Raleigh, another downtown church that had all the loving traits of a caring, supportive, and mission-minded congregation. All four children are now young adults and there are two grandchildren, Greyson and Stewart.

While in Raleigh, Sally had her first health difficulty in March 1983 when emergency surgery revealed cancer. The next four years were anxious ones, with all the medical treatments and all the surgery involved trying to conquer the disease. We were moved in June 1984 to the Durham District.

During those thirty-two years of ministry together, Sally not only lent support to my work but she worked diligently on her own in every level of the church's ministry. Her ability to teach and her comprehension of the Gospel were remarkable. Her life revolved around her love for her God and culminated in exemplifying that love to everyone she met. Her sincere concern for and interest in other people made her an inspiration to many. Her love for clergy families inspired the work she did as chair of the Conference's Pastoral Care Committee. She was, as the editor of the children's curriculum described her, an excellent writer. She had just finished a manuscript, which is due for publication next winter, and had three other articles outlined.

Sally died on Wednesday, May 13, 1987 at the home in Durham. Having done so well in teaching us how to live, she taught us how to die. Even though she pleaded in her diary of prayer to live, she faced the reality of death and planned every detail of her funeral. The service was held at Edenton Street Church in Raleigh on Friday morning, May 15, and it, like her life, was radiant and full of joy, especially the organist's rendition of "Jesus Loves Me." The soloist that day sang "Eternal Life," which summed up Sally's life, for she exemplified so adequately the words of that song, based on the prayer of St. Francis of Assisi:

"Lord, make us an instrument of thy peace! Where there is hatred, let me sow love;

Where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith;

Where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light;

And where there is sadness, joy. O Divine Master, grant that I may not

So much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand;

To be loved as to love; for it is in giving that we receive;

It is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to Eternal Life." The last entry which she was able to make in her prayer diary was on March 18, 1987. She wrote: "Maybe death is like the closing verses of Isaiah 55 - all joy and music and a going home."



- A39. That the *N.C. Christian Advocate* continue to offer special subscription rates for churches in which every resident family subscribes to the *Advocate* and for churches in which every family on the Administrative Board subscribes to the *Advocate*, the former to be known as All-Family Plan churches and the latter as All-Administrative Board Plan Churches. In small member churches in which the functions of the Council on Ministries have been combined with those of the Administrative Board to form an Administrative Council, the rates shall be the same as those for All-Administrative Board Plan Churches. In All-Administrative Board Plan Churches (including those with Administrative Councils), all other subscriptions may be entered at the special All-Administrative Board Plan rate.
- A40. That the Advocate continue to implement an endowment campaign.
- A41. That a subscription campaign for the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* be held in February, 1988 for the North Carolina Conference with February 21, 1988 suggested as *Advocate* Emphasis Sunday.

FROM THE MISSIONAL PRIORITY COORDINATING COMMITTEE

- A46. That an aggressive program of recruitment of ethnic persons to the call of God for ministry be developed by the Missional Priority Coordinating Committee in consultation with the Board of Ordained Ministry with a report to the Conference Council on Ministries by their Fall, 1988 meeting.

- A47. That a conference-wide Mission Interpretation be held on March 19, 1988 for the purpose of promotion of mission programs and to stimulate missions involvement and support. To be implemented and funded by the Board of Missions.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES, REPORTS OF

ARCHIVES AND HISTORY, COMMISSION ON

Our Committee on Historical Records continues to collect historical data on every minister who has served the North Carolina Conference. There are over 300 present day ministers who have not sent in the information we requested several months ago. This information is vital for our records. Ministers who have not sent in their information should send it immediately to Vivian Mitchell, secretary to the Bishop

We have formed a new committee this year. It is a Committee on Microfilming. This committee is looking into the possibility of microfilming historical records, data, etc., and

the cost involved.

Our Commission continues to work with the Ethnic Minority Local Church group in writing a history of the Native American United Methodist Church in the North Carolina Conference. We hope this project will be completed by June 1988.

We encourage local churches to consider making Advance Special Gifts to the Preserva-

tion and Restoration of Historical Churches in our Conference.

We reached 120 persons during the 1986 January Workshops. Our topic for teaching and discussion was *The Preservation of Records and Collecting Oral History*.

Several of our members attended the Southeastern Jurisdictional Historical Society

meeting at Epworth-by-the-Sea, St. Simons Island, Georgia in July, 1986.

Our North Carolina Conference Historical Society is alive and well. They meet twice a year at some historical church in our Conference. The Society publishes a newsletter several times a year. Membership fees are \$5.00 per year. Anyone can join the Society. The Reverend Junius Neese is chairperson.

The Reverend Lawrence Lugar, chairperson of this Commission, was elected editor of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Historical Society newsletter, at the SEJ/HS meeting at St.

Simons.

The Commission held meetings at Carver's Creek, Council, NC and Edenton United

Methodist Church, Edenton, NC in 1986.

The Commission will sponsor a tour to England in July or August of 1988 to commemorate the 250th anniversary of Wesley's heart warming experience. CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS, COMMISSION ON

Dr. John Deschner describes the period the church is now in as one of creative waiting. Creative because so much is going on in the ecumenical movement. In 1982 the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches produced a text, Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry, which was unanimously judged by the plenary Faith and Order Commission to be ripe for transmission to the churches which had called for it. So for the past few years, church groups throughout the world have been reading and studying the Lima documents in the hope of recognizing significant theological convergence. In a similar fashion, the Consultation on Church Union has published Consensus which states the consensus on Church unity that participating bodies now need to claim. Also available is Covenanting which proposes seven elements of visible unity. It is easy to see how creative the times are for Christian unity. It is also easy to see that we still wait. As Charles Wesley wrote, we ask God to finish then Thy new creation. Much progress has been made, and even more creative works are before us. Together we work and wait.

The North Carolina Conference Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns works to keep the Conference abreast of ecumenical events. Representatives of our Commission attend national workshops on Christian unity. We have encouraged pastors and local churches to use the booklet *Called To Be Witnesses* as the basis for a

study in local churches or in the district. We continue our support of World Day of Prayer, a program of Church Women United, and are happy to help provide materials for it. The Commission is pleased to note the number of United Methodist churches that involve themselves in CROP Walks each year, and we commend this service opportunity and a grand expression of Christian concern and unity.

The Commission supports the excellent work of the North Carolina Council of Churches. Through its officers and employees, the Council continues to be an effective agency for

churches across the state to work together on any number of mutual concerns.

Finally, the Commission notes with great sadness the death of H. Shelton Smith. Shelton Smith had a distinguished career as theologian, author, teacher, and church leader. He is recognized as the prime mover in the inception of the North Carolina Council of Churches and was a leader in the movement for Christian unity for decades. The Commission remembers with great appreciation Shelton Smith's courageous and energetic witness for Christian unity.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY, BOARD OF

He has set kings down from their thrones and lifted up the humble. He has satisfied the hungry with good things and sent the rich away with empty hands. (Luke 1:52-54) Thus proclaims Mary toward the end of her Magnificat, a section which we might easily gloss over after having read the first part with a glow during our Christmas celebrations.

This board seeks to be in tune with this proclamation as we 1) sense where some of those hungry and hurting in humiliation are in our society and world, 2) respond directly as we are able, and 3) recommend to this Conference some of the responses it could make by

means of some resolutions.

We have wrestled with issues of prison ministry and reform, pomography, drug and alcohol abuse, AIDS, migrant farmworker ministry and other justice concerns. We have co-sponsored minority youth leadership training, a convocation on peace-making leadership for minority church people and the great celebration for peace at last Annual Conference. We have also ecumenically co-sponsored prison ministry with Yokefellows and co-sponsored a farmer assistance program to help farmers deal with some of the practical questions brought on by the current farm crisis such as possible foreclosure.

We present a resolution that offers some specific suggestions of actions which can help alleviate the impact of the farm crisis on North Carolina farmers. Another resolution that we present opposes capital punishment for minors while another calls for the State to build more prisons to ease overcrowding and provide for more humane living conditions. The other side of crime, victim restitution, is frequently overlooked and is addressed in another resolution. In another resolution, we seek to alert the Church to the very real and impending social problem of AIDS. Finally, we ask this Annual Conference to endorse "Peace with Justice," as the priority for the general church for the next quadrennium.

CONFERENCE SUMMER SCHOOL

The 1986 session of Conference Summer School was held at Methodist College August 1-6 with a weekend and week session. The total attendence was 509 with 288 on the weekend and 221 for the week. The theme of the school was *Values and Technology in Tension*. Eleven courses were offered, three of which were for CEU credit. Open forum sessions were held on Peace and Justice issues and Farm issues in North Carolina. A drama on Daniel was presented by members from Ashpole Center Church and a video tape made by Haymount Church was viewed. The Learning Resource Center offered a

chance for everyone to participate in activities related to each of the courses and was used extensively. A highlight of the session was Dr. Ed Hammond's thought provoking presentation on Looking Ahead.

Dr. W. E. Hammond served as dean. The Reverend R. W. Ponder resigned as associate dean and the Reverend Leonard Doucette was appointed to serve in his place. The COM elected the following to the Board: at-large members - the Reverend Dufrene Cummings, Mrs. Elaine Lilliston and the Reverend Susan Allred. Ernest Wendell replaced Charles Sauls as the president of United Methodist Men. The capable leadership of the staff representative, the Reverend Cliff Shoaf, added much to the success of the school.

Plans have been made and leaders secured for the 1987 school to be held at Methodist College July 28 to August 2 with the week session preceeding the weekend session. The theme will be Catch the Spirit - The Spirit is Catching. Dr. David McKenna, President of Asbury Theological Seminary, will be the platform speaker for the week session and Dr. Rodney T. Smothers from the Board of Discipleship will be the speaker on the weekend. Sixteen courses will include the three mission studies, a United Methodist Women's emphasis, a Lay Speaker advanced course, four CEU courses, and helps in Bible studies, Ministries for Older Adults and Children, Youth Work, Music, Drug Prevention and Lay Volunteers

CONGREGATIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND CHURCH GROWTH, THE QUADRENNIAL TASK FORCE ON

In this third year of our existence, our Task Force would like to applaud a couple of actions taken by our Conference and affirm our support of demonstrated commitment to

congregational development and church growth.

The appointment of an Assistant to the Bishop and the Cabinet for Church Extension and Development was a vitally important next step in the effort to focus our energies upon new church planting. Our research has shown that church growth occurs most effectively, efficiently, and in the long-term, most economically by the planting of new congregations in settings without this necessary contemporary witness. That we charged an individual with the sole responsibility of facilitating this new effort at church extension is a right and timely decision.

Our Task Force is also supremely supportive of efforts at raising additional capital funds for church extension. We believe the wisdom of the Conference under the guidance of the Holy Spirit will result in some program which will provide additional money for land acquisition, first unit construction, and pastoral salary supplement. The need for large sums of money adequately to plant the average new church is indeed the greatest problem facing us as a people committed to congregational development and church growth.

In the last year, our District Teams have continued to work in the area of revitalization within each district. Many districts have carried out training workshops, "how to" seminars, and motivational conferences all aimed at rekindling and strengthening the flame that burns in our churches to fulfill our Lord's Great Commission mandate. Our Task Force has helped to provide funds for these events in almost every district of our Conference.

We have heard from the pastors and leaders of our most newly planted churches. With appreciation, encouragement, and direction, we have attempted to support their efforts. We have encouraged and provided funds for pastors who have desired to be trained by our general agencies in the development of skills needed to be a "church planter." Consequently, we are thrilled to know that, again this year, we will establish new churches, and appoint pastors to fertile, but, as of yet, undeveloped congregational fields.

Presently, the Task Force is involved in beginning preparations for a Conference-wide event to be held in February of 1988 entitled *How to Revitalize United Methodist Churches of the North Carolina Conference*. Through special funding provided by the Conference Council on Ministries and the Council on Finance and Administration, we hope

to provide the most outstanding United Methodist leadership available in the area of congregational development and church growth.

The work has just begun as we see the Church begin to come alive in our midst.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS, COMMITTEE ON

The past year has been one in which the disasters within our Conference have been such as to require minimal response on the part of the Disaster Response Committee. Fires in Onslow and Pender counties destroyed many acres of timber but losses to residents were not beyond the local communities' ability to restore. The high water and subsequent beach erosion, again, could be met by the areas concerned.

Therefore, the Disaster Response Committee was not called upon to provide the unique ministries related to severe disasters. However, we were involved in the following opportuni-

ties this past year:

We aided in the creation of a distribution site for the CWS Farmer to Farmer Aid in northern Orange County by providing a start-up grant.

We joined with the Goldsboro District and Jefferson UMC to provide for a new beginning for a United Methodist family who lost all household items after a tomado hit their home while skipping others.

We had a training event regarding the Farm Crisis and potential ways in which our committee might be involved in this and other disasters within our Conference

houndaries.

There is a District Response Representative is in each district to inform us of a need within each district and coordinate all disaster responses within that district. It is our understanding that the affected area will request additional help when needed. Please call upon us. We pledge ourselves to aid in such a crisis.

EDUCATION, BOARD OF

Programs of the Board of Education in 1986 were formulated primarily to strengthen the ministries of the Local Church. Throughout the year, emphasis was placed on the Local Church and meeting its educational needs. Care was taken to ensure that Ethnic Minority congregations were included in the planning processes and in the future we know the fruit of this year's inclusive work will be bountiful.

Highlights of the program year included another successful year in youth ministry with a dozen full capacity programs being held. We continue to see youth make conscious decisions about their relationship with Christ and their life's Christian witness being formed.

Again, the Board sponsored a very successful Boy Scout Camporee.

We have continued our TLC (Teaching, Learning, Caring) Teams. Going into local churches, these groups make teachers and leaders in the Sunday School aware of help available in Children's Ministry. The program has been expended and will continue to offer local churches help in evaluating and strengthening their children's ministry.

The Fellowship of Musicians continues to be strong. Meeting on a regular basis they have planned and executed several day-long workshops for the local musician. They plan, support, and provide leadership for the Handbell Festival, the Children's Choir Camp, and Youth Music Workshop. Members represent our Conference at the Southeastern Jurisdictional meeting at Lake Junaluska.

The Christian Educators' Fellowship continues to meet on a regular basis and has expanded into area support groups meeting on a monthly basis. Leadership training for its members who represent the professional educators and Diaconal Ministers of our Confer-

ence is one of its prime goals.

The FETCH program continued to be successful in 1987, as Sunday Schools which were using the program experienced continued growth in membership and enthusiasm. While the gain is small, we report that one new Sunday School was started during the year.

The Board in cooperation with The Divinity School sponsored a workshop dealing with areas of counseling relating to marriage. The event was well attended and offered participants great help in this expanding area of concern and work within the Local Church. Through the Young Adult Council several marriage enrichment events were held to strengthen this ministry of our Church

These continue to be exciting times in the field of Christian Education and particularly in the North Carolina Conference. We look forward to exciting and expanded, inclusive

educational ministries in 1987.

EVANGELISM, BOARD OF

The Board of Evangelism greets you today in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Many of you have already read the year-end reports which reflect those churches who have increased in membership, profession of faith, transfer of new members, as well as those who decreased in membership. Figures do not always tell the entire story of a church. Nevertheless, I submit to you the results of some of our churches in our Conference which

are reflecting growth in these areas.

1986 proved to be both a productive and effective year in terms of church growth in the North Carolina Annual Conference. We applaud the efforts of the local churches and districts who have committed themselves to setting growth goals and seeking to achieve them. Raleigh led the Conference in net gain in 1986 with 678; followed by Wilmington, 220; Greenville, 185; Rockingham, 121; Fayetteville, 94; New Bern, 88; Elizabeth City, 40; Rocky Mount, 27; and Goldsboro, 14. Raleigh also led in professions of faith with 551; followed by New Bern, 373; Rockingham, 322; Fayetteville, 331; Burlington, 260; Greenville, 252; Durham, 236; Rocky Mount, 234; Sanford, 226, Wilmington, 223; Goldsboro, 190; and Elizabeth City, 159.

Asbury United Methodist Church of the Raleigh District led our Conference in net gain with 120; followed by North Raleigh, 93; St. James (Greenville District), 91; Millbrook (Raleigh District), 86; and Faith (New Bern District), 82. The highest percentage of net growth for 1986 was recorded by Wesley's Chapel (Wilmington District), 43.9%; followed by Faith-New Bern, 39.6%; St. John-Wilmington, 29.4%; Asbury-Raleigh, 26.7%; and Pine

Valley-New Bern, 22.3%.

This year those joining by profession of faith were divided into adult profession of faith and youth profession of faith. The top 5 churches in adults' profession of faith for 1986 were Pine Valley in the New Bern District, 31; followed by Salem (Greenville District), 30;

Epworth-Durham, 23; Haymount-Fayetteville, 22; and Millbrook-Raleigh, 21.

Our Conference evangelists were busy preaching, leading Bible seminars, prayer groups and leading evangelistic rallies during the year. We are very proud and privileged to recommend to the North Carolina Annual Conference the approval of Tommy Tyson and Bobby Tyson as Conference approved evangelists for the conference year of 1987-1988.

1986 marked a special and unique event in the life of the North Carolina Conference. The Board of Evangelism sponsored our first Camp Meeting held on the beautiful campus of Wesleyan College in Rocky Mount. Over 1200 United Methodists from every district registered to attend this event. Bishop Emerson Colaw was our main speaker as well as Tommy Tyson, John Hobbs, Cornelius Henderson and Jack Gray. The three day event was highlighted by children, youth and adult events. We are recommending for 1988, our second Camp Meeting to be held at Methodist College in Fayetteville, NC.

It seems very popular today to say The United Methodist Church is in trouble and is losing and decreasing in membership each year. Statistics do prove certain facts and our church

leaders should be commended for alerting us and pointing us in directions that will assist our church in regaining her posture in the body of Christ. Many church growth ideas, plans and programs have been suggested and have been recommended to us from many different sources. They will all help us if we will apply them to our congregations.

However, it's been my observation there is an element of renewal in which, I believe, we are missing. Many United Methodists who attend our churches on a regular basis in our rural areas, in our hamlets, in our villages, in our small towns and in our cities have voiced the need for a spiritual awakening to take place within our churches. I know of many United Methodists who desire and believe the answer to our problem is a spiritual awakening throughout The United Methodist Church through the ministry of the Holy Spirit.

It is my opinion many lay persons and pastors throughout our Conference are praying for a genuine and authentic move of the Holy Spirit with New Testament dimensions in the congregations in which they serve and attend. The time has come for us to humble ourselves before the Lord and pray and seek his face and call upon God to send revival to our churches. It is my opinion the answers to diminishing growth in The United Methodist Church does not lie solely upon recommendations or programs passed by the General Conference, Annual Conference or Conference Council on Ministries. Our real hope lies in the sovereign move of God among His people, people who are open to renewal through the Holy Spirit. I am seeing more and more people today, lay and clergy, hungry for this kind of move of God upon their lives. I am one of those and there are hundreds of others. If we continue to be enchanted with figures and short-term solutions to long-term problems, it is my opinion we will become but a whisper in the world in which we work to minister. However, if we will seek God's face. I believe He will heal his land.

I wish to thank those persons who have served on the Board of Evangelism, not only for this past year, but for the past three years in this quadrennium. They have proved to be loving, caring and people with great concern for evangelism, not only on a Conference level, but particularly on the local church level.

May God bless you in your work in your churches and your evangelistic effort. Pray for revival!

FARM CRISIS, TASK FORCE ON

The Task Force was appointed by Bishop Minnick in accord with a motion passed by the 1986 Annual Conference. The initial meeting was held on September 3, 1986 with three additional well-attended meetings of the Task Force to evaluate its mission and to move projects forward. Early in the deliberations, it was agreed that the focus should be on farm families rather than family farms. The critical importance of family farms was recognized, but the magnitude of the economic emergency exceeded the Task Force's capabilities. However, it was agreed that we could make a difference in alleviating some of the stresses on farm families.

Projects carried out this year were:

- A fair booth was arranged at the North Carolina State Fair by Jim Huskins, assisted by David Harvin with the help of many clergy and laity who manned the booth. It was a success in reaching many persons to let them know our church cared and to point them to agencies that could provide further assistance. A booth at the 1987 State Fair is planned.
- Workshops to develop and improve listening skills among pastors and key laity were endorsed. Such events have been held in Person, Johnston, Robeson and Wayne counties. A continuing emphasis on this activity is recommended for 1987-88.
- 3. Prior to Thanksgiving, Bishop Minnick arranged for a Conference-wide offering to meet emergency needs of farm families. Our Conference is the only one known to sponsor such a project. The generous response to this request has provided funds totaling \$58,000.00 to date. These funds are being dispersed to farm families on the basis of an

application by the local pastor for needs up to \$500.00. Requests beyond this amount will require special consideration. A total of \$40,000.00 has been dispersed to date.

4. Development of County Ecumenical Farm Crisis Task Forces has been endorsed to bring together church leaders, agencies, organizations and Agricultural Extension Service representatives for pooling and focusing their efforts. Orange County has found this to be most effective to obtain and distribute hav and seed funds and information. The opportunity to serve on the Task Force has been rewarding and the Conference through the Task Force has made a significant contribution to meeting farm family needs. Continuance of the Task Force for another year is recommended.

HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES, BOARD OF

A vital part of the church's ministry is to provide healing ministries to God's people. especially to children, youth and the aged. This is being accomplished through the Methodist Home for Children, in the eight group homes and the four area family life specialists, and the Methodist Retirement Homes in Durham, Lumberton and Greenville. God is vitally concerned with the whole person and the church seeks to carry out that

mandate by providing these special services.

Support for other ministries is provided through the Duke Chaplaincy Program under the able and capable leadership of the Reverend Wes Aiken. Wes has been at Duke Hospital for 30 years and is retiring at this Annual Conference. We commend this United Methodist minister for the outstanding service he has provided through the years. The Day by Day Treatment Center of Selma, NC, receives financial support from our Conference. The center provides assistance to recovering alcoholic men and women. The Good Shepherd Home of Lake Waccamaw, NC, has closed its doors and therefore receives no further assistance from our Conference. Please note the report on the Golden Cross by the Reverend Lloyd Edge. Our Conference is providing a vital means of help through this

program of long standing.

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries has maintained membership in the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries of 601 West Riverview Ave., Dayton, Ohio 45406-5543. The association is a national arm of the Church which provides training. leadership and guidance to carriers which provide ministry through institutional organizations. Training is provided by the association for trustees of hospitals, child care agencies and providers of service for the aged, as well as Conference leaders. The Association sends out a quarterly newsletter, a job find service, as well as regular communications of vital interest to related institutions and organizations. They have now established and trained persons to fullfill goals of the EAGLE program. The EAGLE stands for Educational Assessment Guidelines Leading to Excellence. It is a voluntary self-assessment and peer review evaluation system developed by the Association. Its purpose is to promote excellence in Christian ministry in health and welfare organizations that are members of the Association.

The Task Force on Persons with Handicapping Conditions is meeting and developing plans to provide programs and guidance in this special ministry. An outstanding commit-

tee of highly skilled and compassionate individuals has been selected to serve.

Accessibility grants are available through the National Division of Health and Welfare again this year. Applications may be obtained from the Conference office or J. C. Parker, Chairperson of Health and Welfare.

There is to be a Convocation for Older Persons at Lake Junaluska in August of 1987. We encourage attendance at this convocation. Those persons having an interest should contact the Reverend Cliff Shoaf at the United Methodist Building in Raleigh.

Golden Cross

Golden Cross is a ministry of love, sharing and caring for the United Methodists within the bounds of our Conference who are confronted with financial hardship due to medical expenses. It is 217,000 United Methodists across our Conference reaching out to touch the lives of our own people who are hurting. This is a beautiful part of our connectional system.

In 1986, Golden Cross assistance was given to 61 individuals representing every district within the Conference. The total amount of money available for medical expenses was \$29,355.08, which includes \$2,346.00 carried over from 1985, a special appropriation of \$10,000.00 from the Council on Finance and Administration, and \$519.08 contributed during the year from local churches. We paid \$27,601.77 for medical expenses and closed the year with a balance on hand of \$1,753.31. Most of the balance was carried over to 1987. In addition, we contributed \$5,500.00 to the Chaplain's Program at Duke Medical Center, \$1,500.00 to the Good Shepherd Home at Lake Waccamaw, and \$1,500.00 to the Day-By-Day Home in Selma.

The Methodist Home for Children

1987 is a good time to put the recent history of the Methodist Home for Children in perspective. We have completed the transition mandated by the 1979 actions of the Board of Trustees and the Annual Conference to move from child centered institutional campusbased care to family centered community-based care. This mandate was arrived at through careful strategic planning by the Board and the Annual Conference. The steps in this strategic planning process were:

1. To clarify central values

- To survey the environment and to determine in light of our values how this ministry should be done
- 3. To develop priorities of ministry

4. To set forth possible strategies of implementation.

If this strategic planning had not been done, the Children's Home would still be institutional campus-based. We would be in the process of massive renovations of the 20 buildings of that campus. We would be seeking inclusion in the proposed capital funds drive already at 8 million dollars for an additional 5 million dollars.

Instead, quality strategic planning was done. The Board of Trustees translated the value of the campus property into assets that enabled a major transition to family-centered

community-based care:

 A network of eight community-based youth homes throughout the bounds of the Conference serving children and families in the vicinity of their homes

- Family life services located in the four geographic quadrants of our Conference.
 These services include: family counseling, family life education workshops, pastoral
 counseling training for pastors, family life interpretation, and in-home crisis
 intervention for families in jeopardy
- Versatile foster care placement
- · Higher education assistance for youth in care
- · Permanent central administration office building
- A center for training staff personnel in residential care and in-home family therapy
- The Children's Home has become a leading advocate for child and family issues.

1987 will be the first 12 month period when all phases of our continuum of care have been in service. Cumulative statistics for the first two months of the year are as follows:

These statistics represent the greatest annual positive impact on children and families in need in the 88 year history of the Methodist Home for Children.

This transition has been done at *no additional cost* to the Annual Conference. In fact, during 1984-1988, the Annual Conference will have used \$702,100.00 which, had the transition not occurred, would have gone to the Children's Home. This money is being used for other purposes.

For *five* years through 1983, the Annual Conference had funded the Children's Home at the level of \$300,000,000 per year. Funding beyond 1983 is as follows:

1984 - No contribution

1985 - \$150,000.00

1986 - \$205,000.00

1987 - \$211,232.00

1988 · \$227,750.00 Projected

1989 \$240,055.00 Amount proposed in CFA Budget

Reason and fairness indicate that the Annual Conference funding level should return to the pre-transition level of \$300,000.00 in 1989. While capital from the sale of the property enabled transition to occur without additional funding from the Annual Conference, these funds are *not sufficient* to fund fully the annual operational cost of the full program. The funding of the Annual Conference at least at the \$300,000.00 is indicated.

The 1989 request from the Methodist Home for Children, approved by the Conference Board of Health and Welfare was \$464,630.00. The recommended budget to be raised in 1988, has allocated \$240,055.00. The Board of Trustees will initiate action at Annual Conference session to amend the budget and to raise the 1989 Children's Home appropriation to \$300,000.00. We earnestly seek your support.

The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.

When you get to retirement, even if that's just a few years away, retirement living may be a lot more exciting than you expected it to be. Old age is entering a new age. As more and more Americans move into whatever age range you think of as belonging to the "elderly", they have received the attention of the people who build and market retirement living facilities. The result has been a flurry not only of construction but also of innovation, creativity and new ways of developing retirement communities. These facilities are for a new kind of retiree. They live longer, are healthier and wealthier than ever before.

Where does this leave the older established retirement facilities that have a commitment to those who have served the Church and community but do not have funds for these new, and many times, elaborate facilities?

At the Methodist Retirement Homes we are aware of the changes taking place and are working to provide for *all* who wish to live within a Christian environment where the beliefs and concerns of the Church play a prominent role. We take it to be our task to provide care for the less affluent while at the same time developing facilities that are unsurpassed for this new kind of retiree. We see no conflict in providing services for people in all economic situations. It is towards this end that we are striving to excel, not only in the present, but in the distant future.

With these convictions to guide us, we wish to report the progress made and our plans for the future.

With the opening of our newest facility, *Cypress Glen* in Greenville, we have a dream come true. Almost all United Methodists in the North Carolina Conference, except for the Outerbanks, are now within approximately sixty miles of a United Methodist retirement campus. A full service community is being developed in Greenville that will include the most independent living arrangements called the *Villas* to skilled care in a health care center. It is a quality facility of which we can all be proud.

Wesley Pines in Lumberton is planning expansion to provide for more health support facilities as well as additional space for resident activities, a Chapel and office spaces so we can expand our ministry in meeting the needs of all who desire our services. The Villas have

added a new dimension to an already beautiful campus.

The Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, being our oldest facility, is facing a real challenge. A study is being made as to how to proceed in meeting the demands of an ever changing market. The Durham Campus is now 32 years old. We perhaps have more to offer than any area in the country, being located adjacent to Duke University and the Duke Medical Center. Durham has a rich heritage of sports, medicine, arts, and education. We are indebted to those pioneers who had the vision to purchase these 39 beautiful acres.

The *Villa* project on the Durham Campus is well underway with eleven now built and others under construction. The *Villas* are our most independent living accommodations. They not only provide for those who have the additional funds required, but also they will

provide revenue for our growing needs.

The Joseph F. Coble Health Care Center is a 125 bed facility which provides both intermediate and skilled care in either private or semi-private rooms. This facility is primarily for our residents who need this extended medical service though we do take direct admissions. The Health Care Center is a quality facility that meets all requirements for Medicaid/Medicare and other types of medical insurance. The Center is staffed well above the requirements of the State so that quality personal care can be provided for our loved ones.

Our report would be incomplete without saying to this Conference that we are doing our best to make our services available to all United Methodists from the North Carolina Conference who need our services, no matter what their financial resources. But along with this, we feel that you do not want us to attempt to provide more benevolent care than we have the financial resources to underwrite. This year we anticipate reaching \$1 million in benevolent support. We cannot ignore the fact that this need is growing. In 1986 we received \$325,000 from the Conference for which we are grateful. This year we are to receive \$315,000. This support from the churches of the North Carolina Conference is used for United Methodists of our Conference only.

Persons with Handicapping Conditions, Conference Committee on

The Committee on Persons with Handicapping Conditions seeks to provide for ministry to all persons who have a handicapping condition. During the year the Committee has sent persons to workshops at Lake Junaluska to learn about ministry to persons with hearing impairments and to learn to help local churches in using literature for classes for persons with mentally handicapping conditions. The committee is producing a newsletter on handicapping conditions for mailing to all interested persons. During the early autumn, the Committee will sponsor a Pilot Workshop in one District in the Conference on ministries in which a local church can become involved to touch and help lives of persons with handicapping conditions.

The Committee realizes that the greatest task before it is one of education and sensitivity training. Most of us are unaware of the inconveniences that persons with handicapping conditions face. We are all caring individuals. We are all helping individuals. The Committee sees a part of its responsibility as enabling others to care for and help others to live life to its fullest even though there are handicapping conditions with which the persons have to deal.

HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY, BOARD OF

We are quickly approaching the completion of a very exciting year in the ministry of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and we are looking forward to another exciting year. Our mission comes from the normal business definitions. In the Christian context, institutions make mission possible. The Board has been careful to maintain institutional integrity, but at the same time, never to lose sight of institutional purpose. What is our mission? It is to articulate and support an institutional system of learning and nurture in Christian ministry to ensure that the church will have the best possible leadership - both lay and clerical. There appears to be a new wind blowing across the seven campuses of higher education in our Conference-supported schools. And the same can be reported by our campus ministers on the public college and university campuses. More students are being reached there and more are participating than in many years.

NC Methodism in higher education is marching onward and upward in this the 200th anniversary of the presence of our church in higher education. The Board pledges to you its continual vigilance in leading the church in the fulfillment of its mission in Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

Campus Ministry, State Commission on

The North Carolina State Commission on Campus Ministry oversees campus ministry in North Carolina. The Commission is made up of representataives from both the Annual Conferences in North Carolina and is related to both Conferences' Boards of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. The State Commission meets the first Monday in October for its annual meeting. At that time the budgets of the individual campus ministry units are reviewed, the State Commission reviews its work of the past year, the next year's budget is approved, and other business is carried out. In addition to the October meeting, the State Commission met in Chapel Hill in February to discuss the program of our campus ministry, adopt a handbook for local units, and discuss a Bishops' Consultation on Campus Ministry.

The United Methodist Church in North Carolina is on thirteen campuses and serves hundreds of our United Methodist students and faculty. In addition to primary ministry with students and faculty, our campus ministers also act as loan and scholarship agents for United Methodist Student Loans and Scholarships. Our campus ministers and a group of student representatives also planned a most successful Statewide Student Conference in February, attracting some 200 students. The State Commission feels that you can be proud of the effective leadership our campus ministers are giving to the church on our campuses.

The State Commission is also pleased that the Bishops in North Carolina have agreed to sponsor a Bishops' Consultation on Campus Ministry, planned for June 22, 1987 at Greensboro College. The Consultation will bring together church leaders to discuss the present and future of campus ministry. As glorious as our past has been and as strong as our present program is, we still face crucial issues in campus ministry. The Consultation should help us all identify problems and find ways to deal with those problems.

The State Commission salutes the able work of our campus ministers. We also express appreciation to you members of the Annual Conference for your faithful support of this vital ministry. Higher education is a crucial arena for the minds of our next generation. We thank God that The United Methodist Church is in ministry on the college campus. Likewise, we give thanks to God for our campus ministers. Listed below are their names. Please call upon them. They are an able resource for the church in higher education.

The Candler School of Theology

The academic year just completed at the Candler School of Theology has been one of the most successful in its history. Enrollment in the Fall semester was 629 students, about 480 in the Master of Divinity degree which leads to ordination and pastoral ministry. Candler is educating more ministers for The United Methodist Church than any other seminary in the denomination.

One interesting statistic gathered from this year's enrollment is that 60% of our students

are over the age of 30. With many more students pursuing ministry as a second career, we find the need for financial support and housing more critical than ever. I am pleased to report that we are making progress in providing both. The Sherman Scholarship Program is now offering 150 scholarships which provide 90% of a student's tuition cost.

Additional statistics show that 10% of our current enrollment are ethnic minority stu-

dents, up from the previous year, and 25% of our students are women.

In the past year, the Pitts Theological Library added its 400,000th volume and has become the second largest theological collection in North America.

Candler has appointed three new faculty this year: Ms. Susan Garrett in New Testament, Dr. Rebecca Chopp in Systematic Theology, and Dr. Jane McAuliffe in History of Religions. In addition, Candler has been given a new chair in preaching named for Jack and Aggie Bandy of Dalton, Georgia. The Bandy Chair is held by Dr. Fred B. Craddock, who is overseeing the development of a major program in preaching, beginning with basic work in speech and moving to advanced courses in preaching.

Candler has also begun to develop significant partnerships with several conferences in offering continuing education in preaching. Our other programs in directed study for

clergy are also having significant impact.

Finally, Candler faculty are making a real contribution to the work of ministry through their writings. Several of their recent books in theology, Christian education, religious

values in the American society, and preaching have received wide acclaim.

Candler's budget will approach \$6 million the coming year. We are dependent on the Ministerial Education Fund for \$1.2 million or 20% of that budget. The support you and your conference are offering for the MEF is having a remarkable impact on the work of Candler and particularly on the lives of our ministerial students.

I am grateful for this help and our partnership together in the work of Christian ministry.

The Divinity School of Duke University

Duke Divinity School's 60 year tradition of intellectual rigor in the service of the church and its ministry continues to grow, as evidenced by the strength and diversity of our student body. With the start of the Fall 1986 semester, the Divinity School enrolled 380 students in the professional degree programs (M.Div., M.R.E. and Th.M.) and an additional 90 students in the M.A./Ph.D. program. Our students are men and women from 192 undergraduate schools, 26 denominations, 33 states and 7 foreign countries. Women constitute just over 30% of the total enrollment, and black students constitute 10%. At a time when many schools are being forced to lower their entrance requirements, the Divinity School maintains its historical commitment to high standards. The quality of our student body has never been better.

While the accomplishments of its distinguished faculty and scholars, and an aggressive international exchange program earn it increasing prominence in American theological education and the ecumenical world, the Divinity School continues to enjoy strong regional, denominational and alumni support as well. Finally, Duke Divinity School is most fortunate to be able to depend on the generous support of United Methodists nationwide through the Ministerial Education Fund. These are some of the resources which account for Duke's margin of excellence and provide assurance that the Divinity School's ministry in the service of the church will endure. These resources, including the apportionment from the Ministerial Education Fund, have made possible several exciting developments in the life and work of Duke Divinity School this past year, and I want to share that good news with you.

Russell E. Richey began serving as the new Associate Dean for Academic Programs at the Divinity School with the start of the fall semester. Dr. Richey comes to Duke from the Theological School and Graduate School faculties of Drew University where he was Professor of Church History. Dr. Richey will also serve as Research Professor of Church History at Duke. He is a member of the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist

Church. His appointment will allow improved supervision of student academic programs, better academic advising and closer oversight of curricular planning and development.

Teresa Berger, a native of Hanau, West Germany, has been appointed Assistant Professor of Ecumenical Theology effective July 1, 1987. We are delighted that Dr. Berger has accepted our invitation to join the Duke faculty. Since we have had her in our midst for the last two years as Visiting Scholar and Visiting Assistant Professor, we know we are getting an enormously talented young theologian who brings a great deal of experience in ecumenical Christianity, a gifted teacher deeply committed to training men and women for Christian ministry, and a scholar whose interests span an impressive range, from the Wesley hymn corpus to Eastern Orthodox worship.

After attending the International Convocation on Theological Education and the World Methodist Council and Conference in Nairobi last summer, I came away more convinced than ever that we have much to learn from Christians outside the United States. Duke has a long record of concern for international issues through courses, visiting professorships and a wide variety of study opportunities for faculty, students, alumni and friends, including ongoing exchange programs with the University of Bonn and the University of Zimbabwe and additional programs in Mexico, China and the Mediterranean. We are especially proud that our student body includes Charles Boayue, the President of the World Methodist Youth and a member of the Presidium of the Executive Committee of the World Methodist Council and Conference, as well as Tumani Mutasa-Nyajeka, the first woman to serve a pastoral appointment in the Methodist conference in Zimbabwe. When John Wesley said, 'the world is my parish." he saw a mission field that included both the wide variety of classes and social groups in his own country and throughout the world. Today that mission field has become an international Christian community with much to share, and Duke remains committed to the challenge at home and abroad. We are particularly excited by the prospect of dramatically expanded offerings in Christian education and church music made possible by the anticipated affiliation of the Divinity School and the Scarritt Graduate School. We honor and respect Scarritt's historic mission, and its long record of accomplishment in the training of lay professionals for the service of the church throughout the world, and are convinced it can be carried out with increasing effectiveness in the context of Duke Divinity School.

These are exciting times at Duke Divinity School as we seek to give our best in the service of the church and its ministries. As a part of the Divinity School's extended family of friends and supporters, United Methodist churches are our chief partners in that enterprise and our greatest strength. Your loyal support through the Ministerial Education Fund and your continuing involvement in the life of the Divinity School are the envy of the other professional schools in the university and a source of great pride for us. Together we are committed to advancing the life and work of the church through a well-prepared ministry. The Hunger/ Human Need Task Force will continue to promote the use of the fish bank during Lent, or at other times throughout this quadrennium, to help alleviate World Hunger.

The goal is that each local church will give an Advance for World Hunger in 1987 and 1988.

We celebrate the commitment of this Annual Conference to ministering to the hungry and deprived. We have a ministry to our neighbors next door that may be unrivaled in Methodism, our Hunger/Human Need Fund.

Economic conditions are still generally depressed in eastern North Carolina. The farming situation is critical with its ripple effect on the total economy. The plight of textile

and garment unemployment is of great concern.

However, The Hunger/Human Need Task Force was able to fund 89 social ministry projects across our Conference in 1986 because of the generous grant of \$125,000.00 by CFA from "Central Funds" (a total of \$284,755.00 was requested by projects). Persons and families in dire need throughout eastern North Carolina know that God cares because we have helped make ministries possible that provide food, clothing, shelter, fuel, electricity, medicine, transportation, supplies, services and ministries that meet other needs.

The investment of this Conference in human need has multiplied into new projects, hundreds of volunteer hours, inter-agency cooperation and sharing of human and financial resources, and in generating thousands of dollars of expenditures by churches, communi-

ties and helping organizations.

Thank God for this demonstration of *love in action* by our North Carolina Conference.

MISSIONAL PRIORITY, COMMITTEE ON

During the past year the Missional Priority Committee of the North Carolina Conference has been working diligently in keeping before our brothers and sisters of this Conference the importance of continued support of the 1985 quadrennial priority, Strengthening and Developing the Ethnic Minority Local Church for Witness and Mission.

It is important that we remember that the Missional Priority calls for a massive and sustained response from all levels of The United Methodist Church to human needs and opportunities that exist today in ethnic minority local churches and communities. It calls for responses in recruiting and training of ethnic minority leadership, developing and revitalizing of congregations, reaching out to persons in need, empowering and liberating of persons and systems, strengthening necessary structures, developing resources for vital worship, Christian education and evangelization.

Throughout the year we have continued to provide scholarships for mission work teams, nationally and internationally. Scholarship assistance has also been given to persons

attending adult leadership development conferences and youth events.

We have made grants to ethnic minority local church for programming and building needs. We co-sponsored *The Bishop's Convocation on Empowering the Ethnic Minority Local Church for the Ministry of Peacemaking* in October, 1986. Our greatest accomplishment has been the development of the Comprehensive Plan. The purpose of this plan is stated in the objective:

Because we have not arrived at the point to which God has called us, we address ourselves to the continuing task of developing and strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church for witness and mission in the years to come, including beyond this

quadrennium.

The basic components of the Comprehensive Plan are:

1. Envisioning

2. Assessment of present situation

3. Assessment of needs and possibilities

4. Program goals

5. Annual Conference agencies and resourcing

6. Plans for implementation for comprehensive strategy

7. Procedures for evaluation and monitoring

This plan also includes a job description for an ethnic minority person who would become a part of the Conference Council on Ministries Staff. This portfolio will be primarily the Ethnic Minority Local Church. This plan has been approved by the Executive Committee of the CCOM, the CCOM and will be presented at the 1987 session of Annual Conference for approval.

The Missional Priority Committee has been a force toward broadening the vision. It has helped us better to grasp what Jesus meant when he said, "For whoever does the will of my

Father in heaven is my brother, and sister, and mother" (Matt. 12:50).

Most importantly, the Missional Priority has provided the people of The North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church an opportunity to reaffirm and renew their commitment to the mandate of Christ: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations..." (Matt.28:19).

As we look toward the final year of our quadrennial emphasis and beyond, the Ethnic Minority Local Church must continue to be a priority as we seek to be faithful to Christ, our Redeemer.

ITINERATION

In 1986 there were 526 mission studies reported being held in our local churches across the Conference.

CHURCH FXTENSION

The North Carolina Conference has been looking at areas where new churches are needed. Some of these areas will need newly organized congregations. Others can be served by existing churches that have made a commitment to serve a growing population. \$10 Club guidelines have been altered so that such churches can receive \$10 Club calls to assist in their building to serve population growth. Present requests for \$10 Club assistance come from existing congregations with special needs. It may be necessary in the near future to limit \$10 Club calls to new churches and existing churches serving in lieu of new congregations. Certainly, one of the major thrusts of the North Carolina Conference in the next five years must be church extension!

VOLUNTEERS-IN-MISSIONS

In 1986 this Committee was responsible for helping 12 overseas work teams and two in-country work teams. There was a total of 157 people who participated. Those sent were:

ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH

Developing and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church: for Witness and Mission is the missional priority for 1985-1988.

The first year of the missional priority our efforts went mainly toward building needs such as repairs and maintenance. In 1986 we began to see new programs developed in the ethnic minority local churches such as evangelistic outreach, a group called SCAN which stands for Serving the Concerns of the Needy, senior citizens programs, hunger programs, self-help programs and transportation programs, to mention only a few.

The Native American Larger Parish ministry had its beginning. This ministry is pulling five churches together to strengthen and enable them to become self-supporting.

Two Native American churches in the Rockingham District have been developing age level music programs. These two churches have drama groups and singing groups that have performed throughout the NC Conference this past year.

John Wesley United Methodist Church in Fayetteville has started an after-school pro-

gram of Latch Key Children.

The Board of Missions went to the Robeson County Church and Community Center in October as a work team and worked there for a day and was deeply touched by the ministry of the center.

In October The Bishop's Convocation on Empowering the Ethnic Minority Local Church for the Ministry of Peacemaking was held at Methodist College. The Convocation included addresses by Bishop W. T. Handy and Bishop C. P. Minnick, Jr., provided time for response and each district met to make action plans. This event was well attended.

We have come a long way and accomplished much but there is still much that we can do. We are beginning to move from the *Developing and Strengthening* stage of our missional priority and it is wonderful to see the ethnic minority local churches reaching out for *Witness and Mission*.

The years past show lots of happenings in the area of missions but our work is never done. We are grateful for the support of all of our churches, and we encourage all of them to give of our best to the Master. Our command is go. Let us rise to meet our task.

CAMP CHESTNUT RIDGE is located on a beautiful tree-studded ridge among the hills of Orange County just off I-85 near Hillsborough, Here small group camping takes place with 12 campers working with two counselors. Emphasis is placed on living with others while growing together in Christian life and faith. Mrs. Jan Thomas, our manager/director came to us in 1984. She has continued the fine ministries here and added horsemanship and outpost programs. In writing about her resident camping program, she has said that she felt there was an underlying intentionality about being Christian in all that was done, and she tried to establish a general atomosphere and feeling that it was okay and good to talk about God and faith issues. She also tries to apply our faith understandings to everyday situations of living together at camp with both the joys and the problems. CAMP DON LEE, our oldest camp, is located at the mouth of the Neuse River where it opens into the Pamlico Sound. Eight boys and eight girls are in the typical small group living community and they participate daily in sailing Sunfish and Flying Scot sailboats as they work with two counselors in developing skills, community, and an awareness of God's universe. The Rev. John Farmer our manager/director is our senior manager-director, having come to this post in 1977, and he has led us in the establishment of exciting ministries at Don-Lee. John says that staff training set the spiritual mood for Don-Lee in 1986 as each counselor was given a series of beads symbolizing compassion, kindness, lowliness, meekness, patience, and forgiveness—the spiritual gifts that each must use to build a Christian community. CAMP KERR LAKE is located on Kerr Lake near Henderson. It is open on weekends in April, May, September, and October; and week long June-August, There is a picnic shelter. a boat ramp, a day camping area, A frames, and 24 camp sites for tents or trailers. These facilities were enjoyed by over 2,514 individuals in 1986. Mr. David Bennett is our maintenance manager, and a college

student is hired each summer as summer manager.

CAMP ROCKFISH, which is located on Tom Upchurch Lake 15 miles Southwest of Fayetteville provides Christian community in small group camping with 8-14 campers and two counselors. There is time to find one's special niche in God's world, to learn, to pray, and to plan together. Canoeing on the creek, a canoe trip down the Cape Fear River, and a night in the treehouse are special opportunities at Rockfish. Mr. Bob Pryor came as our manager/director in 1979 and has turned our program around here. He says of his 1986 program, "Small group camping once again provided the vehicle for Christian growth. Our staff understood more than ever their role as Christian educators and realized that they were the model that campers looked to. We (counselors and campers) used the theme Gifts of God as a springboard for inviting Christ into our lives in all that we do not just at camp but as we go home and reach out to those in need around us." You can take groups to these three camps the year round for weekend retreats. Day camping and picnicking are available at all four of our camps. Local churches are encouraged to see camping in the out of doors as an ideal setting for the development of Christian community and character, for worship, for growth, for personal developing an awareness of our responsibility as stewards of God's creation.

YOU AND YOUR CHURCH CAN HELP

Your church, your UMYF, your UMW, your UMM, or a Sunday School class from your church can adopt a cabin at one of our camps or come and help with a work day at a camp in the spring. You can make a contribution to the Campership Fund to help a needy child go to camp. You can make a contribution to the Rockfish Swimming Pool Project. A STUDY OF OUR NEEDS AND OPPORTUNITIES

Special Task Forces reported on our outdoor and camping needs in 1982 and 1985, both indicating the need for a capital fund campaign for outdoor and camping ministries in a state which will experience the loss of 700,000 acres of farm and woodland by the year 2000. We worked for a year with a consultant, Mr. Art Harrison of Ames, lowa. We received his final report on May 1, 1986; we developed our own Master Plan of needs by the fall of 1986; and we submitted to the Plans Council a priority of the way we would spend four million dollars if the Conference approves a capital fund campaign. We need to upgrade our present facilities; we need to continue our present ministries; and we need to be prepared for a ministry to an increasing number of adults in a nation where 65% of the campers are already adults, and in a Conference where there is an increasing demand for adult retreat facilities. Based on three years of sustained study we have shared our needs with the Bishop, the Conference Capital Fund Committee, and the Plans Council. At the 1987 Session of the NC Annual Conference we hope the delegates will approve a capital fund campaign which will enable us to build facilities which will enable us to carry creative and Christ centered ministries well into the 21st century.

THE NEED FOR A CAPITAL FUNDS DRIVE

For outdoor and camping ministries the need is immediate. Our camp facilities were built largely between 1950 and 1970, so many of our buildings are 16 to 36 years old, and in need of major upgrading. The increase in camper fees and the generous provision of over

\$200,000.00 a year for Camp Maintenance by the Conference is not adequate for needed annual upkeep, much less improvements. So capital funds are needed to upgrade our present facilities and to provide much needed new facilities. We hope that the Annual Conference will approve a major capital fund campaign to be conducted 1987-1988, and that half of the money raised in the campaign will be made available to upgrade and expand the programing facilities for outdoor and camping ministries in the North Carolina Annual Conference.

PUBLICATION, METHODIST BOARD OF

Through the ministry of the North Carolina Christian Advocate every United Methodist minister in our state has at his or her disposal an associate minister making weekly calls in the homes of their member families who are subscribers. Therefore, every minister is encouraged to use to the fullest the services offered by this associate minister, the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

The *Advocate* is an indispensible information-inspiration tool for the work of ministry in the local church. Pastors are asked to provide the enthusiasm and support for an exciting and successful *Advocate* subscription campaign in their local churches. Research indicates one of the best ways to get subscribers and keep them is through a local church telephone network. In a small membership church this could be a single person. In larger churches this would be a committee of several persons who divide up the church families and call them once a year every year, year after year, asking for a subscription or a renewal. The calls should be bright, brief and enthusiastic. The secret of success is in perseverance. The first year calls are made the results may not measure up to expectations, but as the calls are consistently made year after year, results are excellent.

Due to the fact that many subscribers share their *Advocate* each week with others and the fact that the *Advocate* circulates out to our seminaries and even some public libraries, it is a ministry that by conservative estimate touches some 60,000 persons every week. Because it requires some degree of special interest in The United Methodist Church for a person or family to subscribe to the *Advocate* as their church's official newspaper, the *Advocate* is reaching the heart of Methodism even if some church officials are not subscribers.

The Advocate is truly a joint enterprise by the leaders and contributors in both of our annual conferences. Bishops, district superintendents, pastors, members of the Board of Publication, Inc., local church leaders, Advocate representatives, subscribers, advertisers, staff persons, guest writers, columnists and others all cooperate to keep this ministry vital and effective. Perhaps if any special accolades should be passed out they should go to our faithful contributors whose columns appear regularly in the Advocate. This is a labor of love whose only reward is in a job well done and the appreciation this generates among our readers. And, a special word of commendation for our staff, Mrs. Ruth Laughlin, our news editor, and I put out the newspaper. Mrs. Marie Fulton keeps our circulation current, and Mrs. Margaret Hinshaw is our part-time bookkeeper. This is a dedicated staff with years of loyal, above-and-beyond-the-call-of-duty service to merit the deepest appreciation of us all.

We are extremely pleased with the work of our Joint Advocate Endowment Committee under the able leadership of Dr. Wilson O. Weldon. The lengthy list of contributors for 1986 appeared in our issues of December 16 and 30 and January 13. The *Advocate* is assured a securer financial future as a result of these contributions to its endowment fund. The committee is committed to continue its work until an endowment goal of at least one million dollars is achieved.

Finally, I just want to say how privileged I am to be at the helm of this ministry of the printed word. My excitement for this ministry continues unabated, actually increasing with each passing year. I see a bright future of service ahead for the *Advocate* and I am excited about being part of it.

RELIGION AND RACE, COMMISSION ON

In attempting to carry out the mandates of the Conference and the General Church, the Commission on Religion and Race has had an active and fruitful year. We have been involved from several perspectives with the continuing program of the church in efforts to enhance its inclusiveness.

Because of the working, praying and believing of the Commission members and a large number of other persons throughout the Annual Conference, the Bishop and the Cabinet have begun the process of looking more positively toward our becoming an inclusive church (racially and with regard to gender). This positive attitude is manifesting itself in Conference appointments, nominations and selections.

The Commission on Religion and Race has been involved with the Personnel Committee, the Task Force on Nominations and The Missional Priority Committee in an effort to become fully cognizant of the direction these groups are taking in assisting the Church to become an inclusive entity. This involvement is in keeping with the Commission's role as monitor, advocator and sensitizer.

The recommendations from the General Commission on Religion and Race to our Annual Conference have given credence to the work of the Commission. The impetus of the work of both groups is synonymous with the efforts of the Church...to strive to promote harmony and a wholesome attitude toward all children of God.

In an effort to continue these measures, the Conference Commission on Religion and Race planned the Convocation on Racial Inclusiveness for May 2, 1987 in order to continue to promote the fact that we have a mutual bond in Jesus Christ.

By this time it is hoped that all our charges have returned the Local Church Survey (prepared by the Cabinet), so that we can take a closer look at our role as the Church.

The Commission on Religion and Race has provided support through scholarships and grants for several minority projects. Among those are:

Camping Ministries - Four Camperships to Ethnic Minorities
UN Study Tour - Five Scholarships to Ethnic Minority Youth

Native American International Caucus

Black Methodists for Church Renewal

Adolescent Education Project - Orange County

Global Gathering - Louisville, KY

The racial composition of the various boards and agencies we monitor saw both increases and decreases in 1986. The Conference camps all saw very positive increases in the number of minorities that participated in their programs. The Conference Council on Ministries saw a very slight decrease. Two of our Conference colleges (Louisburg and Methodist) saw slight decreases in minority enrollment. NC Wesleyan saw a positive increase in 1986. Wesley Pines Retirement saw a slight increase in minority clients.

On a whole, we feel that 1986 was a good year for the North Carolina Conference boards and agencies that the Conference Commission on Religion and Race monitors.

We have reviewed and monitored the programs supported by the General Commission's Minority Self-Determination Fund in our Annual Conferences, namely:

Durham District - North Carolinians Against Racist and Religious Violence Fayetteville District - John Wesley Church Testing and Learning Center Rockingham District - Fair Employment Program (Robeson County)

The Commission also spearheaded the celebration of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday with the sponsorship of district wide observances. The districts having a part in this celebration were Durham, Raleigh, Rockingham, Fayetteville and Wilmington.

Plans are in the making for Conference-wide celebration to be held January, 1988.

As we move toward 1988, the prayers of the Commission on Religion and Race shall continue to be that God will touch the hearts and minds of each of us and help us to realize that as sons and daughters, we are all destined in love.

STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN, COMMISSION ON

The North Carolina Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women gives thanks for the General Conference action of 1968, creating a commission to study the participation of women in the policy-making activities of the newly-created United Methodist Church. The General Conference of 1972 responded to that study by establishing a standing Commission on the Status and Role of Women for the general church, and the North Carolina Conference Commission was created in 1974. The General Conference action of 1984 completed the chain by authorizing a Status and Role of Women work area in each local church.

We give thanks, also, for the mandate of the Discipline, ¶ 2202, which defines the commission's role as advocte, catalyst, and monitor. Our advocacy responsibilities mean that we are charged with seeking for women their right to participate in the planning. programming and policy-making of the church. The Commission must see that women's concerns are reflected in the policies and pronouncements of the church, in its publica-

tions, as well as in the establishing of its priorities.

We are catalusts when we call attention to situations where the gifts and graces, as well as the needs, of women are overlooked or excluded. The Commission functions to educate and to provide specific program recommendations aimed at heightening awareness and acceptance of women. COSROW monitors when it oversees the performance of the Church in issues related to women. The North Carolina Conference COSROW seeks to be faithful to our task as we call our Conference, districts and local churches, by their own inclusiveness, into faithfulness to the liberating power of the Gospel.

In faithfulness to the objective of the missional priority, the Commission has worked for over a year with that committee to design a leadership development seminar for ethnic minority women. The purpose of the event is the strengthening of leadership skills of these women for use in the local church. Objectives include increasing awareness of what leadership opportunities exist in the local church and what one's own capabilities are. Additionally, the process will aim at affirming individual self-confidence and assertiveness

as well as to help women develop skills for training other persons.

COSROW is increasingly aware of the importance of its monitoring function. Consequently, the Commission is developing procedures for examining its own ministries since its creation in 1974. We also want to determine the extent to which local churches are responding to the program recommendation regarding the study of "Words that Hurt; Words that Heal," and how many churches observe "Women in the Pulpit" Sunday annually. We were pleased to accept the invitation to monitor the interviews by the Conference personnel committee of candidates for the position of associate director of youth and young adult ministries in our Conference.

The Commission is acutely aware that many persons do not know that COSROW exists and many others do not understand the purpose and importance of such a body. Therefore, efforts were made in January Workshops of 1987 to introduce the Commission through a look at the history of the General Commission, the creation of the NC Conference Commission, and the opportunities for faithfulness to COSROW's reasons for

existence, through the local church work area on the status and role of women.

As chairperson of the Commission, I express deep gratitude to the members for their commitment to an inclusive church. Catharine Vick as vice-chairperson brings a wealth of resource to our effort, and Peggy Hickle, our secretary, does a thorough job. Finally, the services of Bill Norton, our liason with the CCOM, are immeasurable, and the support of Bishop Minnick and Belton Joyner, CCOM Executive Director, blesses us.

STEWARDSHIP, BOARD OF

The forty-one persons who are members of the Board of Stewardship provide leadership for the Conference, district and local church in cultivating a stewardship attitude toward the conservation and use of our resources. Stewardship is a grateful recognition of God's creation and sovereignty whereby His people express themselves by a dedicated and creative use of all these gifts toward the fulfillment of Christ's mission in the world. TRAINING LOCAL CHURCH LEADERS

Three members of the Board have specific responsibility to their district to train pastors and local church leaders. The Board provides resources, meeting ideas, program suggestions, samples of EMV materials, job descriptions and calendaring tasks for local persons

to consider in developing their specific program.

The District Director of Stewardship is usually clergy and is a member of the District Council on Ministries. As a resource person, that director is ready to help develop district programs with financial assistance from the Board ultimately to enable the local church to define better the meaning and purpose of stewardship for that local church. District directors and selected local lay persons receive training for their work through the resources of the Board.

In addition, the Board offers training events for pastors to understand the biblical foundation for stewardship and how to adapt this understanding to the practical and workable local church program. For instance, almost each year a workshop on time/stress management is available.

LOCAL CHURCH CONSULTATIONS

The Board organizes teams within its membership to meet with local church committees or pastors to deal specifically with any local church's needs and will come to the church on invitation to share resources, ideas or suggestions on how to develop a stewardship program. It is hoped that every church will elect a chairperson or committee on stewardship to serve as contact person.

On the Conference level the Reverend Clyde Dunn, Associate Director of CCOM, is available to meet with a district or local group for any need. His address is P. O. Box 10955.

Any officer, especially the chairperson, the Reverend C. Franklin Grill, will also consult with a district COM or local church over expressed needs to develop a program or provide needed resources.

PER CAPITA GIVING

Our Conference system has a built-in way to promote increased giving which is one of the dimensions of a devoted stewardship response. As a result of the concerted effort of all persons the per capita giving of United Methodists in our Conference increased from \$194.17 in 1984 to \$204.42 in 1985.

WORSHIP, BOARD OF

The Board of Worship continues to seek for ways of enriching the worship experience of the members of the North Carolina Conference. We were pleased to have the opportunity to assist in the planning and presentation of the worship services for the 1986 Annual Conference held at Duke University in Durham. We were grateful for the excellence achieved in these services and here again express our deep appreciation to the many, many people who assisted in the planning and presentation of these services. We are currently involved in the planning of the worship services for the 1987 Annual Conference in Favetteville.

The Board of Worship is very pleased to have this year completed a project that has been under way for a number of years. The Worship Center in the Assembly Room of the United Methodist Building is now complete. We sought to find Methodist artisans to create the final appointments for the altar but were unable to find such artisans. However, we are very pleased with the appointments that have been selected to complete the worship center. The chalice and paten were used for the first time at the Maundy Thursday Communion service held for the staff of the Methodist Building in the Assembly Room. We anticipate this worship center being a meaningful and useful addition to this room for years to come.

To assist pastors in their planning of the Sunday worship service, we again published *The Lectionary*. Also printed and distributed in the coordinated mailing was a pamphlet on the

Training of Acolytes.

The Board of Worship in cooperation with the Board of Education this spring sponsored a meeting at Edenton Street UMC in Raleigh giving the members of the confirmation classes from across the Conference an opportunity to meet with Bishop Minnick. This was once an annual event and is being sponsored again because of popular demand.

The Board of Worship and the Fellowship of United Methodists in Worship, Music and the Other Arts have worked together on two projects this year. One, we have created a team that will conduct workshops to assist the directors of children's choirs. A number of districts have asked this team to present workshops in their districts. We hope other districts will use this team in the year ahead.

The second cooperative venture was the preparation of a *Policy Statement on Weddings and Funerals*. This statement was compiled by looking at many from across the Conference and by discussions with musicians from various size congregations. This statement is being distributed through the coordinated mailing and is designed to be a tool to assist churches in revising their statements currently in use or in compiling their first such statement. It is not considered to be a final word on any isue but was prepared only to assist local churches in thinking about the use of their own facilities and staff.

Several years ago the Board of Worship completed a Worship Survey in our Conference. In the years since that survey we have worked to meet some of the needs that surfaced from this study. One need was the desire for the opportunity for personal spiritual renewal of both ministers and church members. In answer to this need, Steven Bryant of the Upper Room met with members of the Board of Worship and is assisting us in the establishment of an Emmaus Community in the North Carolina Conference. The first meeting of the Cape Fear Emmaus Community will be this fall at Fort Caswell near Wilmington. Information concerning this opportunity was included in the December 1986 and February 1987 coordinated mailings.

Another need that became evident through the worship survey was the desire of pastors to have help in the effective use of laypersons in worship. This help has been offered at the January Workshops and will be addressed at the coming Conference Summer School.

The Western NC Conference also conducted a worship survey in their conference and from their results they planned a *Bishop's Convocation* on the *Sacraments* in High Point in January. The members of the Board of Worship were invited to attend and a number of

our members attended. They were inspired and enriched by this experience.

There is a representative from the Board of Worship in every district and these members are eager to help the pastor, local churches and districts in any way possible to make the worship experience richer and more meaningful. If you have questions relating to any of the projects of the Board of Worship or you need help in any phase of worship, please call me and I will do my best to put you in touch with the help you are seeking.

The Board of Worship continues in its efforts to serve the North Carolina Conference that through effective worship Christ may be made more real in the lives of our members.

By January 31, 1988, Conference staff will have met with leadership of at least fifty percent of the ethnic minority local churches in order to initiate and develop a leadership plan for the local church. By January 31, 1989, staff will have completed this work in all ethnic minority local churches.

4. At the spring meeting of the Conference Council on Ministries of 1988 and 1989, the staff will report on progress toward the goals stated in item three.

- 5. Pastors, district superintendents, and leaders of Conference boards and agencies will be asked to provide by January 31, 1988, names, addresses, and telephone numbers of ethnic minority persons who can be selected and/or equipped to assume positions of responsibility on district and Conference agencies. These data are to be submitted to the Conference Committee on Nominations.
- 6. Staff persons related to leadership development and to ethnic minority local churches will develop a plan for equipping persons for leadership roles. This will be offered after Annual Conference and before September 1; for example, at Conference Summer School.

VI. E. Ethnic Minority Local Church Staff Person

The Rationale for an Ethnic Minoritu Local Church Staff Person in the North Carolina Annual Conference

The Missional Priority is presently a massive and sustained response to a critical need in God's world which calls for the reordering of program and budget at every level of the church for Developing and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church: for Witness and Mission. (¶ 803.8, 1984 Discipline)

In light of this statement, we are asking for the reordering of our current Conference Council on Ministries staff responsibilities to include an ethnic minority person whose primary portfolio would be the Ethnic Minority Local Church. Why should this be done?

1. The General Church has in fact stated that the Ethnic Minority Local Church is an area that needs special consideration.

In view of the fact that the ethnic minority population is increasing at a tremendous rate, the need for continued ethnic minority emphasis is in order.

The Ethnic Minority Local Church will not always be a missional priority in our church. For its survival, it must become a part of the Conference Council on Ministries structure (a permanent place).

This Comprehensive Plan is being developed to continue strengthening and developing ethnic minority local churches after 1988. Without a staff person to implement this plan, it will only be another written report or plan.

There is a need for ethnic minority leadership on the Conference level now; in the future there will need to be role models for other ethnic minorities. This will show that our Conference is inclusive, regardless of one's race or ethnic origin.

- 6. At present, there are a limited number of seminary trained ethnic minority leaders. This ethnic minority staff position could give prime visability as far as recruiting, training, and deploying ethnic minority persons into all areas and levels of ministry within our church.
- There are new ethnic minority settings for ministry that need to be established throughout our Conference, especially where there is an ethnic minority presence with no established United Methodist ministry.

8. Without such a position, the Ethnic Minority Local Church could become an

invisible institution in the future.

The Ethnic Minority Local Church generally does not function at the level of other United Methodist churches because of a lack of educational opportunities afforded its ethnic minority leadership. Such an ethnic minority staff person should be available to interpret United Methodist publications of all types from Church School curriculum and resources to writing proposals for programming as well as an aid in designing programs and workshops better to serve ethnic minority leadership as well as its membership.

Job Description for Ethnic Minority Local Church Staff Person

- No later than June 1988, this person would be a part of the Conference Council on Ministries staff and would be accountable to the Executive Director of the Conference Council on Ministries.
- This person must be knowledgeable of the United Methodist structure, as well as the North Carolina Annual Conference structure.
- 3. This person must be knowledgeable of the various ethnic minority groups and their diversified needs, including, but not limited to Blacks, Native Americans, Hispanics, and Asian-Americans.
- 4. This person would be a facilitator, supporter, and an enhancement to the Ethnic Minority Local Church throughout the Conference in every way possible, which would include but not be limited to the following:

A. To help identify needs of ethnic minority local churches and assist each Ethnic Minority Local Church.

B. To develop in the ethnic minority local churches an awareness of its responsibilities to its own community and to the world and to assist the Ethnic Minority Local Church in addressing community and global needs.

- C. To establish annual events for the Annual Conference and each district to keep before their memberships an awareness of ethnic minority local church concerns; to establish a celebration time to tell of the progress and successes of ethnic minority local churches and to incorporate some type of learning event for ethnic minorities at least twice a year.
- D. To develop a priority list of the program and building needs of each ethnic minority local church and to prioritize further according to the need at the district and Conference level so as to reach the most pressing needs first.
- E. To work with appropriate agencies in seeking, recruiting, training, and deploying ethnic minority persons for ministry, or Christian education, as well as assisting with their educational training opportunities.

F. To promote, support, and bring about acceptance and understanding of ethnic minorities at all levels of the church.

G. To develop awareness of the needs of ethnic minority local church ministries within the districts and the Annual Conference.

H. To cooperate with the appropriate agencies to increase the number of ethnic minority candidates for ordained, diaconal, and other related ministries.

 To enlist the cooperation of general church boards and agencies, Annual Conference, districts and local churches in providing program resources for ethnic minority ministries.

- J. To identify potential leaders among ethnic minority youth and young adult leaders and to involve them in every way possible in our United Methodist Church programs and leadership workshops.
- K. To develop a list of youth, young adults, and adults who will serve faithfully on the district, Annual Conference boards and agencies, and the jurisdictional level, and at the general church level.
- L. To serve as an advocate to the Annual Conference of ethnic minority local church issues and needs.
- M. To encourage all ethnic minority local churches to move toward selfsufficiency and self-determination within our United Methodist connectional system.
- N. To coordinate activities intended to promote spiritual formation and more social action among ethnic minority local churches and their leadership.
 O. To develop new and emerging ethnic minority ministries.
- P. To develop strategies for churches in transitional neighborhoods.
- To enhance inclusiveness in the membership of all local churches in the Annual Conference.

This person will assume other responsibilities as assigned by the Executive Director of the Conference Council on Ministries after consultation with related agencies.

VI. F. Interpretation

- 1. Annual Conference
 - Utilize coordinated mailing and other available resources, including North Carolina Christian Advocate and district newsletters, to publicize the Comprehensive Plan.
 - Use major Conference gatherings (such as Conference Summer School, annual meetings of United Methodist Men, Women, and Youth, Campmeeting, etc.) to highlight ingredients of the Comprehensive Plan as they pertain to these individual groups or settings.
 - c. By January 31, 1988, each board or agency will have reviewed the Comprehensive Plan and ascertained its responsibilities for carrying out the Plan.
 - d. The Council on Ministries will prepare a written report to each session of the Annual Conference to describe how the Plan is being implemented.

District

- a. Use major district gatherings (such as Lay Rallies, January Workshops, district conferences, and pastor meetings) to highlight the ingredients of the Comprehensive Plan
 - District Councils on Ministries will review the Plan by January 31, 1988, and develop district strategies for implementing the Plan.

Local Church

- Staff person related to Ethnic Minority Local Church will be available to interpret the Comprehensive Plan to all local congregations within the Annual Conference.
- b. The Conference Council on Ministries will provide each local church with a synopsis of the Comprehensive Plan which should be reviewed by each Administrative Council or Council on Ministries to discern if there are programs to be implemented on the local level.

We wish to refer this interest or concern to the Bishop and the Cabinet and to the Annual Conference Program Planning Committee.

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER, REPORT OF

It continues to be both an honor and a privilege for me to serve as Lay Leader of the North Carolina Conference and to be a team member of its strong lay leadership. Indeed this Conference is a sustaining influence in my life as I interact with laity and clergy in the vital ministry that we share collectively. We have strong programs in place and can be proud of accomplishments made in the past year. Our conference lay life and work is healthy, as evidenced by quality of planning, effectiveness of ministry, and participation of laity in the events scheduled. We continue also to show real strength in United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and United Methodist Youth; and we will continue an advocacy role in promoting activities for all age levels. Our goal is to do even better.

This morning we began what we hope will become an annual occurrence in having a laity session to precede the convening of Annual Conference. It can be a time for presenting

relevant information and for discussion as the need arises. It is obvious that we have a space problem in locating a place large enough to hold this meeting, but between now and next year's Conference session, we will attempt to work these problems out. The idea itself seems to be a good one.

As most of us are aware, our Conference has been engaged in dialogue - in recent months about potential directions for us to move in special ministries. Clergy and laity alike have voiced hopes for the future in recognizing needs to be met as well as concerns about funding or timing of projects to be undertaken. In general, we have debated what we should or should not, may or may not, can or cannot do in strengthening program ministries or in initiating capital improvements. Now we are here at Annual Conference to make some decisions and/or to agree to continue in dialogue, talking with and listening to one another about certain matters on which we apparently basically agree in terms of need.

As I have listened to expressed concerns of the laity, I have heard the call for a reaffirmation of the strength and importance of the local church within our denomination and that conference and general church programs should better emphasize and enhance what is happening within the local church. There are obvious financial constraints being experienced by many individuals and therefore by some local churches. There is an apparent low morale factor perceived by the laity, particularly among some of the clergy. And there is general consensus that more emphasis needs to be placed on lay inclusion in

decision-making at the Conference level.

The process of discussion in which we have engaged has been good and should lead eventually to a lessoning of these concerns and a better understanding of what we are all about in ministry within our Conference. As we continue to talk and to listen, and as we make decisions, let us remember that while decisions alone are always important, equally important is the *attitude* with which we make these decisions. The North Carolina Conference is known as one in which the Church *CAN*- and my hope and prayer is that we may assume an attitude to enable us to become more a Conference in which the Church *WILL*-

- Will adopt a positive attitude of unity emerging from any diversities we may have.

- Will commit time and resources to strengthening ministries wherein obvious needs exist.

- Will move forward in Christian discipleship.

To employ an old cliche, our lay leader's message is that we should think on these things, ponder them in our hearts, and step forward as a Conference with assurance for our Lord and our Church.

If ever a Conference appeared to be dominated by a single issue, this year was the "Year of The Ballot". Not only did we eagerly anticipate the liberation of the new electronic balloting which would count votes more rapidly, but we lost more time than we saved for a while as we learned the intricacies of this new instrument.

Then betwen concern for those to be placed on the ballots, and the time we spent in hearing and preparing our ballots, most other concerns were shuffled to accommodate the demands of this election year. Finally the ballots were counted more rapidly, but with contests so intense, we did not complete the balloting until much later than usual, the last

hours of the final day.

Though much of our attention was directed to the balloting, special moments were reserved, undisturbed, for worship and Bible study. Rapidly becoming one of the most popular features of our Conference sessions, laity and clergy alike eagerly anticipated the moming Bible study sessions led ably by Bishop C. P. Minnick. We express the appreciation of the Conference to you, Bishop Minnick, for the quality of these presentations and for returning the Bible to a dominant role on our Conference agenda.

Our Conference preachers brought us inspiration and spiritual insights with the sincere and forceful messages at worship sessions. We were captivated by the enthusiasm and fervor of Bishop Felton May, of the Harrisburg Area of Pennsylvania. We were charmed by the manner in which the Reverend Gloria Robbins Davis lifted "the Ordinary into the Extraordinary" as she spoke. Ms. Davis is District Superintendent of the Hartsville District of the South Carolina Annual Conference, the first woman District Superintendent in the

Southeastern Jurisdiction. The Reverend Junius Neese moved us all at the Memorial Service as he spoke with love and affection for the ministers and spouses whom we honored with this service of memory. We appreciate so much the contribution of each of these, our associates in His ministry.

A special blessing was the quality of excellence we perceived in the music offered to us, not only at worship services, but throughout the Conference sessions. For this we are indebted to the excellent musicians provided by the Conference Fellowship of United

Methodists in Worship, Music and Other Arts.

We were blessed with memories of our rich heritage in Methodism as we celebrated three great anniversary occasions. We rejoiced at the 200th Anniversary of Louisburg College, the oldest Methodist Junior College in America in continuous service to higher education. We celebrated the work of Deaconess ministry for 75 years - in service to the poor, caring for the sick, comforting the sorrowing, seeking the wandering, and spreading God's Word at home and abroad. Finally the Conference was intrigued and informed by the Celebration of the 150th Anniversary of the North Carolina Annual Conference, a dramatic presentation provided by the Conference Commission on Archives and History.

Our Conference continues to grow as we received by ordination an alert, well prepared, consecrated class of candidates for ordination. We shared in the ordination of 15 deacons and 17 elders. As we celebrate the past, we can prophesy a bright future with such a well qualified, deeply committed young group to offer leadership joining the "endless lines of

splendor" which have led United Methodism through more than two centuries.

Speaking of growth, we welcomed the five congregations chartered during 1986-87, and commissioned three additional congregations in a special recognition of the claims of growth which demand our response in Church Extension and Church Development. A proposal for Capital Campaigns in support of Church Extension and Camping Ministries in the amount of \$8,000,000 was deferred until 1988 but with strong evidence of support for each cause.

As we welcomed these signs of growth, we expressed a grateful farewell to sixteen retiring ministers who were recognized on a special order of the day. Junius Neese reminded us of our human frailty even as he expressed our affection for the contribution of the nine ministers and five clergy partners who have died during this Conference year.

Honored during this Conference in addition to our new congregations were: Dr. Robert Frazier, recognized as Layperson of the Year for the Conference; Dr. P. Wesley Aitken, retiring after 31 years as head of Chaplain services at Duke Hospital; four bright and attractive young scholarship winners for our Conference colleges, and several committee and board chairpersons who were completing tenures of effective service. The Reverend David Brownlee was recognized as the new Executive Director for Church Extension of the Board of Global Ministries, sharing in church extension all across the nation.

Issues of finance, including the proposed remodeling of our Methodist Headquarters Building, issues of social justice, petitions to General Conference, and other resolutions of concern were frequently paramount in our concerns expressed for our great Church.

Interest was taken and debate often fervent.

We want to offer the appreciation of the Conference to Bishop Minnick, to our able speakers, to the many persons who worked so hard behind the scenes to keep the business of the Conference flowing smoothly, and to those who worked in preparation for our gathering.

We would be remiss were we not to express special words of appreciation to President Elton Hendricks of Methodist College for the massive work which has been done by him and his associates to assure our gracious welcome to Methodist College after a year away.

We thank Dr. F. Owen Fitzgerald, District Superintendent, and his associates in the Burlington District who have done so much as our host district to assure that each detail was ably and attractively prepared. We always appreciate the quiet efficiency of Dr. F. Belton Joyner and his Council staff associates who prepared most of the materials for our consideration, and helped present them.

Too seldom do we take the time to say the "thank you's" we take for granted to our cordial Conference Secretary, the Reverend Ted Wilson, and to his associate secretaries who work round the clock that we may proceed on time and maintain permanent records of all actions taken. Thanks and be assured you are noticed and appreciated.

We appreciate the work of the media, including our own staff representative, Bill Norton,

our Advocate editor, Alison Simonton, and particularly we commend Mr. Jim Pharr, reporter for the Fauetteville Observer, who has faithfully covered each Annual Conference session held in Favetteville since 1973. Mr. Pharr will be retiring before our next Conference session.

There is no way we can express our appreciation to all who genuinely deserve such expressions in a brief summary report. We must offer words of thanks to those persons who have served as our tellers, lay and clergy, during this intensely busy Conference session. To all others who made this a successful part of the life and ministry of this Annual Conference, we say a heart-felt "thank you"! We are confident that our Lord knows each name and each action taken by each one.

Many tasks have been charted, many goals set during this session. Let us pray God will give us the determination, the energy, and the commitment to carry more than our share of these burdens as we "climb Jacob's ladder" together toward a more visable and a more

triumphant Church in the name of Jesus Christ, our Redeemer and our Lord.

DIACONAL MINISTRY, BOARD OF

On March 24-25 of this year, our Board sponsored a retreat for Diaconals and those in candidacy for Diaconal Ministry. The leadership event was led by the chairperson, Phyllis Savage and her husband, Jim. At the retreat they focused on their leadership styles and

how to achieve excellence in Diaconal Ministry in the local church.

DISABILITY, JOINT COMMITTEE ON

The Joint Committee on Disability acts as the advocate of those pastors in the North Carolina Conference who are forced by physical or emotional disability to seek temporary or permanent relief from their appointment. The committee is given the responsibility to study the problems of disability within the Conference, to provide a continuing personal ministry to those who are disabled, and to make recommendations to the appropriate agencies of the Conference for each pastor seeking Disability Leave, including the source of their disability income.

The following recommendations are presented to the 1987 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference:

- The Joint Committee on Disability will make available upon request the necessary forms for any pastor to make application for Disability Leave. In all cases the applications must be completed by the pastor, the physician, and the district superintendent before the request for Disability Leave can be acted upon. It is the recommendation of the Joint Committee on Disability that such requests be presented before May 15 for inclusion in the committee's report to the Annual Conference.
- The Joint Committee on Disability may require psychological examinations of those seeking disability when deemed necessary by the committee. These will be done by a physician approved by the committee, and in such a case the committee may share the expense of the examination in an amount not to exceed \$100.00.
- 3. The Joint Committee on Disability will study each new application for Disability Leave submitted by pastors of the Conference to determine the recommendation of the pastor's physician and district superintendent, particularly as it reflects the anticipated length of the pastor's disability. The medical reports will be sent to the medical consultant of the Joint Committee on Disability for an interpretation of the pastor's disabling conditions, who in turn will submit a medical report on the required form to the Joint Committee on Disability for action. All materials will then be sent to the medical consultant of the General Board of Pensions, who will determine if the pastor is eligible for benefits paid through the Comprehensive Protection Plan. From July. 1981 to December, 1981, disability benefits were paid through coverage as adopted by the 1981 Session of the Annual Conference. Beginning on January 1, 1982, disability benefits from the General Board of Pensions were transferred to coverage under the new Comprehensive Protection Plan.
- We recommend that pastors who may not be eligible for benefits paid by the Comprehensive Protection Plan may be placed on Disability Leave with benefits paid through the Emergency Relief Fund. The Ministerial Pensions Plan, Comprehensive Protection Plan, Hospital Insurance and Life Insurance may be paid also by the Emergency Relief Fund.
- Disability requests are to be submitted ninety (90) days prior to Annual Conference 5. except in life-threatening situations after that date, or when the disabling condition occurs after that date.
- We recommend that a monthly grant of \$300.00 will be made for the first six months a 6. pastor is granted Disability Leave. At the end of six months this grant will terminate.
- The Joint Committee on Disability will review the progress of each pastor on Disability 7. Leave at least annually. This review will include both recommendations from the pastor's physician and district superintendent as well as opportunities for continuing fellowship with the pastor to develop further possibilities of assistance in his/her disabled circumstances. Those receiving aid from the Emergency Relief Fund will be reviewed at the end of their first six months of Disability Leave.
- We recommend that the expenses of travel, telephone, postage, and other materials 8. for the committee be paid from the Emergency Relief Fund.
- We recommend the following pastors to be continued on Disability Leave: 9.

11. We recommend that pastors and congregations in the communities in which our disabled pastors reside seek to establish a supportive relationship with those on Disability Leave to maintain good fellowship and provide for pastoral opportunities. It is further recommended that housing needs and other special problems of our disabled pastors be considered by these congregations and communities in the light of the contribution made to our United Methodist Church by those on disability during their years of service. We can all become better stewards of the gift of life and skill as we share in this ministry of caring and concern.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS, COMPOSITE REPORT OF

Bishop Minnick, Lay and Clergy Members of the Annual Conference and Friends:

It has been my privilege to address the Annual Conference on several previous occasions on behalf of various Conference boards and agencies, and most recently for the Hymnal Revision Committee of the General Conference. This afternoon, it is my joy to speak on behalf of the twelve district superintendents. No higher honor has come to me and no greater pleasure as a member of this Annual Conference than serving in this pivotal role within United Methodism. *The Discipline* requires that we give you such a report annually "reflecting the state of the Conference, with recommendations for greater effectiveness" (¶524.4).

One of the best things I can report to you about the state of our Conference is that Carlton P. Minnick, Jr., presides over it with a rare combination of warmth, effectiveness and grace. Each district superintendent is an extension of the bishop and we are all grateful to God that we are honored to serve in this historic office with Bishop Minnick as our episcopal leader. We are proud of his work not only with us, but also within the Council of Bishops where he has made a major contribution toward helping that important body move all of us toward a more just and peaceful world. His wife, Mary Ann, is a loving and supportive partner and one we are proud to recognize as the "First Lady" of our Conference. I will ask my wife, Barbara, to escort Mary Ann to the stage so that we may all stand and greet her.

As Jack Hunter told me five years ago when I joined the Cabinet, it is a unique fellowship and one in which deep and lasting friendships are formed. We have had many joys this year, especially in welcoming our first woman and in welcoming back our first ethnic minority member; we have also had the great sadness of losing the beloved wife of one of our members. Serving in this office not only draws us closer to each other, but gives us a wider perspective on the Conference and the whole church, and deepens our love for our

tradition of connectionalism.

Another good thing I can report to you about our Conference is that it is growing! Not too many can make that claim each year as we have been privileged to do for most of this decade. We had a net gain of 966 persons during 1986. As you study the Statistician's Report, you learn that over 3,300 persons joined our churches on profession of faith, more than double the number removed by charge conference action or withdrawn; you learn that our net gain of people joining our churches from other denominations versus those leaving us for other traditions was nearly 800; you learn that a growing number of young children over 21,000 are preparatory members of our churches. If you have followed the reports of other annual conferences in recent weeks through *Newscope*, you know that 8 have reported decreases in membership and 8 have reported growth. Thus far, our total of 966 net gain exceeds such growing areas as Florida, North Texas, and Arizona. The only two ahead of us at this stage are Oklahoma, up 1,186, and Africa's Sierra Leone, up 2,182!

One way we grow is through starting new churches. Morningstar in northeast Raleigh and Resurrection in southwest Durham are off to solid starts, and Soapstone in northwest Raleigh, formerly a small, rural church, has been treated as a new congregation and is finding success in reaching out to the burgeoning population surrounding it. Fayetteville has both a new Korean and a new Black church. Later this week, Bishop Minnick will appoint pastors to serve new churches in the Cary and Chapel Hill areas and at Topsail Beach. Efforts will also be made to convert a dying White church in Kinston into a thriving Black one. The decision of last year's Annual Conference Session to create the position of Assistant to the Cabinet for Church Extension is bearing fruit as these new churches are planted; close cooperation between our Commission on Equitable Salaries, our Council on Finance and Administration, our District Councils on Ministries, and our Cabinet are helping create a climate that will encourage the initiation of new churches in a variety of districts and socio-economic settings.

Another way we grow is through re-opening churches that earlier circumstances dictated that we close. This near miracle occurred on February 1 when the Flint Ridge Church on the Rock Creek Charge re-opened with an afternoon worship service with 96 people present. It now has a membership of 8 and an average attendance, astoundingly, of 35! Last month a work team of 14 Burlington District pastors spent the day scraping and painting the church; more such teams of lay and clergy are planned to continue helping this re-opened church serve its community.

Where we have grown is also cause for rejoicing. Of course, we are showing our biggest gains where the population is growing most rapidly: in the Research Triangle area and along the beaches. But we are also growing at Prospect Church, the largest Native American congregation in the whole connection, where 37 persons were received on profession of faith, and not too far away still in the Rockingham District, Sandy Plains, another Native American church, began the year with only 132 members but received 20 young persons and adults of profession of faith and 6 more by transfer thus surpassing 150 members by year's end.

In some parts of the world, annual conferences require pastors of churches that have not received a new member during the previous year to explain why not before the entire body. Surprisingly, even our Discipline has a provision stating that "the Annual Conference shall have the power to make inquiry into the membership status of the local churches, and where no members have been received on profession of faith during the year, it may require the pastor and the lay member to appear before the appropriate agency and make explanation" (¶703.9). Bishop Wilkie, in his best-seller, And Are We Yet Alive?, scares us with the facts of our numerical decline as a denomination. He also makes the startling claim that "if each church in our denomination received a person by profession of faith for every one hundred members, the whole downward trend would be reversed in a single year" (p.53). Prospect, Sandy Plains, and many others in our Conference are doing this and more, and their example is an inspiration to all of us. Whatever we accomplish is by the grace of God and the power of the Holy Spirit, but as successors of John Wesley we also believe in the benefit of good preparation and hard work. To that end, several of our districts have had workshops and continuing education events either on their own or in cooperation with one of our colleges or Duke University Divinity School in particular. A frequent subject was evangelism and church growth; several held spiritual growth retreats; others focused on studying and implementing in their churches the Bishops' Pastoral Letter, In Defense of Creation; Bishop Wilkie's book and/or its sequel by Duke's Will Willimon and Bob Wilson,

Rekindling the Flame, were the subject of seminars in four districts; at least 3 districts studied worship and the sacraments and their central role in church renewal.

Study is meant to lead to action, and the Wilmington District is leading us in creating a strong base for the Emmaus Community, an Upper Room-sponsored spiritual formation movement that will offer its first Emmaus Walks in our Conference this fall. The New Bern District has 12 churches that have contracted with the Institute for American Church Growth at a cost of \$3,000 each to study and participate in their three-year program for church growth. The Goldsboro District has applied for a full-time Church and Community Worker through the Board of Global Ministries to work with the Migrant Farmworker Ministry now in its fifth year. The Sanford District gave \$10,000 to establish a District Scholarship at this college. A satellite of the Robeson County Church and Community Center opened in Maxton, and new Youth Homes were opened near Laurinburg and in Durham.

Another sign of vitality is the building boom that is taking place across our Conference. New fellowship halls and education buildings and new parsonages sprang up in nearly every district; sanctuaries were renovated in several districts, construction begun on new ones in many places, and Durham's Aldersgate Church sold its facilities and constructed new ones north of the city. Four of our districts have benefitted from the energy conservation program sponsored by The Duke Endowment and the North Carolina Alternative Energy Corporation; this program enables rural churches at very little cost and using volunteer labor to weatherize their facilities and save significantly on energy costs.

This leads into another area of our corporate life: stewardship. We are justly proud of our record of financial support by our churches of world service and conference benevolences and advance specials. Throughout this decade, we have averaged paying 96.9 per cent of our Outreach Ministries Fair-Share Apportionment, a figure we matched exactly in 1986. This compares very favorably with other conferences and with other denominations.

In their new book, Willimon and Wilson point out that giving by churches to mission and benevolent causes received a smaller share of the total income of local churches in recent years. More money was given by fewer people across our church, but more of it stayed at home. Also, more of what was sent to the Conference Treasurer stayed in the Conference. "In 1970, the national church agencies received 39 per cent of the benevolent income; by 1983 this proportion had dropped to 33 per cent" (p. 20). Needs closest to home are being met first

Some members of our churches get the impression that the Conference's share of the financial pie is getting too big. However, the fact is that during this decade, total giving to items beyond the local church have increased on average only 4 per cent per year! This is decidedly below the national inflation rate for this decade. Furthermore, for this past year, our total giving was up 9.3%, but giving to causes beyond the local church was up only 4.8%. Interestingly, local church expenses increased over 13% during this same period. Verification for these figures can be found in the Conference Statistician's Reports.

A wider issue is the matter of trust between the local churches and the Conference leadership. We learned from our administrative councils and boards this year that our members are overwhelmingly in favor of improving our camps and starting many new churches. We also learned that they are not equally sure of their ability or willingness to pay for these desired improvements. What we as a Cabinet find very encouraging is that the Plans Council listened to the local churches and is committed to finding the best possible funding plan during the coming year. We are in agreement on the local level and the leadership level of our Conference about the needs; now we are searching for the best way to meet these needs.

Trust regarding appointment-making is a continuing concern between the Cabinet and the clergy and lay members of our Annual Conference. Although consultation is a fact of our procedure, basically we still have to trust the Bishop and the Cabinet to follow the leading of the Holy Spirit and their knowledge of the needs of the churches and the abilities of the clergy in making the best possible set of appointments each year. This was a classic "tight year" in making appointments due to a small number of retirements and other openings at higher salary levels. Still, three-fourths of those moving received a raise while less than a handful suffered large decreases.

Willimon and Wilson are blunt in their attack on how our appointive system is being used. They charge us with employing a seniority system which is neither in *The Discipline* nor

The Journal; according to them it is destroying rather than building up morale among clergy and churches. These Duke professors challenge the clergy to become convinced that the church's mission is more important than their needs (pp. 51 and 56).

Bishop Wilkie is just as straight-forward when he says: "Ineffective ministers will have to be weeded out...Churches do not exist to serve ministers...No longer should a pastor be quaranteed a job for life...A seminary degree is not a work permit" (p. 60).

Both of these best-sellers issue a strong call for leadership in the local church and on the annual conference level as well as at the general church level. "Persons who cannot make tough decisions (regarding appointments) should not be appointed as district superintendents or elected as bishops," Will and Bob write (p. 56). "A revitalized United Methodism must place persons in official positions who are leaders and not simply managers, persons who have a vision of what the church can be and who inspire other people to risk making that vision a reality" (p. 67).

I serve on our Conference Board of Ordained Ministry as a Cabinet Representative, A large part of our job is evaluating candidates for membership in the ranks of the clergy of our Annual Conference. Overall, the group that appears before us year in and year out is a highly committed and talented group of Christians who have been nurtured in local churches and called by God to this high office. They are a group to gladden the hearts of churches, boards of ordained ministry, and cabinets. They have received the endorsement of their charge conference and their district committee on ordained ministry as having not only the call to preach, but the requisite gifts and graces as well. They are persons with rare exception that we as a Cabinet can send to you confident that they will represent Christ faithfully and effectively as pastors. They are disciples who sense that they are part of an endless line of splendor set within a covenant community through which God has called them to this vocation. They go to the task with idealism, commitment to long hours, and willingness to work primarily for other than monetary rewards. As I have often told Pastor-Parish Relations committees in my district, if we had a candidate to appear before us who said he or she was going into the ministry for the money, we would reject such a candidate right away, not so much because of his greed, but for his stupidity! The excesses recently brought to light of some of our televangelists only serve to point up the relatively simple lifestyle of the vast majority of our pastors.

My brothers and sisters in the faith, there are problems in our Conference and on the general church level, just as there are in the local church. But there are also unlimited possibilities for renewal and revitalization, for we are the community of grace, children and heirs of a tradition that transformed English society and came to this land to spread scriptural holiness. It is still our commission to offer them Christ through our words and our witness. May the same Spirit that called the church into being on the Day of Pentecost, that raised up John and Charles Wesley, that inspired the early circuit riders, be present and

powerful among the people called Methodists in our time and place.

THE DUKE ENDOWMENT

On December 1, 1924, James Buchanan Duke established a charitable trust known as The Duke Endowment. The expressed purpose of The Endowment was "to make provision in some measure for the needs of mankind along physical, mental and spiritual lines..." The Indenture was a legal document that established a \$40 million endowment, named trustees to manage it, and defined the organizations or individuals which were to be the beneficiaries of trust income. Within a year James B. Duke died, but he left an additional \$67 million to The Duke Endowment. On December 31, 1986, the assets of The Duke Endowment were \$797.5 million. The idea of helping people in North and South Carolina began much earlier in the life of the Duke family than when James B. Duke signed the Indenture.

Washington Duke and his two sons, James Buchanan and Benjamin Newton, started a family tobacco business soon after the Civil War. In 1884, the small firm gambled on an innovation - automation - and the cottage industry rapidly grew into a giant tobacco company. In 1902, the family bagan investing in hydroelectric power development, a move which eventually led to the founding of Duke Power Company.

Throughout the years of growth and prosperity, the Duke family contributed generously and privately to selected hospitals, orphanages, the Methodist Church, and Trinity College.

So even though the indenture was not signed until 1924, the general trends of the family's philantropic interests had been well established: The Duke Endowment simply systematized and strengthened what already existed. Now the largest foundation in the southeast. The Duke Endowment ranks among the nation's largest foundations in size of assets.

In establishing The Duke Endowment, Mr. Duke specified who the recipients or beneficiaries would be. Income from the trust was to assist four institutions of higher education not operating for private gain - Duke University, Davidson College, Johnson C. Smith University and Furman University, hospitals in North and South Carolina not operating for gain, not for profit child care institutions in North and South Carolina, and rural United Methodist churches in North Carolina.

The Rural Church Division of The Duke Endowment, responsible for making recommendations to the Trustees of The Duke Endowment about grant requests, works in three areas. The largest amount of income goes toward building rural churches. By building rural churches, the Trustees of The Duke Endowment understand this means either building

new churches or renovating existing buildings.

An exciting new development under the Building Rural Churches Program is the Weatherization Program, Sponsored by individual districts, the Alternative Energy Corporation and The Duke Endowment, local churches are assisted in weatherizing their buildings in order to gain the highest possible energy savings. This past year 64 churches participated in the project - 17 in the Burlington District and 17 in the Sanford District of the North Carolina Conference and 30 in the Northeast District of the Western North Carolina Conference.

The Alternative Energy Corporation provides energy audits, training of volunteers to do the work in the local church, ordering and coordinating materials, and inspections. The Duke Endowment grants pay for weatherization materials used. Reports indicate that churches are experiencing greater comfort levels and substantial energy savings.

Over the next few years The Endowment's intent is to help sponsor the project with every district that chooses to participate. Projects for 1987 will be in the Statesville and North Wilkesboro Districts of the Western North Carolina Conference and the Rocky Mount

District of the North Carolina Conference.

The second area of responsibility in the Rural Church Division has to do with maintaining and operating rural churches through which a variety of programs are supported. The major recipient under this program is the Duke University Divinity School. Grants applied to tuition are made to student pastors as well as students in field experiences, both in the summer and the winter. Funds are also allocated through the Divinity School to assist pastors attending continuing education events.

The Duke Endowment makes Parish Development Grants to rural churches, charges or larger parishes to assist in the development of new and innovative ministries. Start-up assistance has been provided for day care ministries; ministries with the elderly; food,

clothing and fuel assistance ministries; and ministries with migrant workers.

The third phase of the work of the Rural Church Division is in superannuate grants whereby retired pastors who serve as many as five years in either of the Conferences in North Carolina will receive a check in December. Presently each pastor receives \$25 per service vear

The Committee on Episcopacy has met with Bishop Minnick for a beneficial and enlightening dialogue in the 1986-1987 year. We can report again that to the best of our knowledge the North Carolina Conference appreciates the leadership of its bishop and that our bishop is pleased with our Conference and his ministry here!

Bishop Minnick, clergy and laity alike are grateful for your presence among us in shepherding, preaching, and teaching; and for your availability and willingness to listen to cares and concerns of our people in their local churches. Your leadership roles also at the jurisdictional and general church levels continue to show the esteem in which you are held by your colleagues on both the College of Bishops and the Council of Bishops. We are

proud of your ministry, Sir, and pledge our continuing support,

To the Conference, the Committee can report that Bishop Minnick's calendar for speaking is essentially filled well into 1988, with acceptances almost solely within the Conference. He will have continuing opportunity to meet with clergy and laity, and we welcome this reciprocal means of conveying ideas for progress. Since last year's Annual Conference, the Bishop has made visits to every district twice and has met with district and conference lav leadership. He has heard concerns and senses the real need for us to address our sense of The Connection within our denomination. Later this summer he will be one of seven Bishops selected to attend the Oxford Institute on Wesleyan Studies in England. In the fall he will visit churches in Scandinavia and Estonia as a part of the overseas study leave each bishop has scheduled.

We affirm Bishop Minnick's ministry in the North Carolina Conference and express the desire to see him remain here for subsequent appointment. Further, we express our love as a Conference also for Mrs. Minnick - Mary Ann - who has become so much a part of us. As she is among us we see a real Christian witness that permeates all that she does. Thank you. Mary Ann, for the asset you are to the Bishop and to us!

We look forward to a continuing ministry of mutual love and respect as Bishop Minnick is assigned to the Raleigh Area.

EQUITABLE SALARIES, COMMISSION ON

Part 1

By disciplinary provision and moral obligation, the Commission on Equitable Salaries is instructed to "support ministry in the charges of the Annual Conference by (1) recommending Conference standards for ministerial compensation; (2) administering funds to be used in salary supplemation; and (3) providing counsel and advisory material on ministerial compensation to district superintendents and pastor-parish relations committees." (Discipline, ¶ 722.2)

That provision often places the commission in a contradictory spot. "Assumption of the obligations of the itinerant ministry required upon admission to the traveling connection places upon the church a counterobligation to provide adequate support for the entire ministry of the church." (*Discipline*, ¶ 717) "The commission shall carefully study the *needs* for... ministerial support within the Conference and the sources of income, and shall recommend annually to the Conference a schedule for minimum salaries for all... pastors." (*Discipline*, ¶ 722.3) In other words, ministers are required to spend considerable expense, time and energy in preparing for and executing ministry. Common sense recognizes the increased pressure upon a local church to provide an ever increasing salary for its minister. Churches with dwindling resources find themselves spending more and more on pastoral compensation and less and less on property, program and expansion. Clergy and laity are caught in the proverbial place between a rock and a hard spot.

The commission has spent considerable time in examining the situation. Solutions are not included in this report. However, we do have recommendations whose implementation will help us move towards "fair and equitable salaries" for all those who "assume the obligations of the itinerancy," and simultaneous "fair and equitable management" of the resources of the local church in ministry and mission.

Recommended Schedule of Minimum Salaries for 1988

A. Salary Schedule

 With respect to the ever increasing cost of living for all, we recommend that the minimum full-time salary level be raised by a percentage equal to the percentage of raise enjoyed by all ministers for the Conference year 1987.

- We recommend that the full-time minimum salary levels be adjusted annually by the percentage figure of average raises in the Conference for the current Conference year.
- Guidelines affecting student pastors as adopted by previous Annual Conference sessions will continue to govern the use of equitable salary funds for student pastors.

(For reference, the *Discipline*, ¶ 442, 717, and 722, and the *Journal* of 1983, provides the bases for our work.)

B. Travel Allowance

Although travel is reimbursed by the charge as an item of ministerial expense, it is expected that the charge would provide at least \$1,800.00 for travel expense. A charge receiving equitable salary support may provide this \$1,800.00 travel allowance, but any travel allowance in excess of \$1,800.00 will result in a reduction of equitable salary support.

C. Pension Program

Charges receiving Equitable Salary Fund support are responsible for paying the

total amount required for the Ministerial Pension Plan and the Comprehensive Protection Plan based on their pastor's total income for salary and utilities (including funds from the Equitable Salary Fund, Duke Endowment, and any other sources).

Principles Governing the Use of Equitable Salary Funds:

The Pastor's salary is the responsibility of the charge; therefore, the charges of the North Carolina Conference should be so arranged as to be able to assume full salary support. The commission urges each charge receiving Equitable Salary funds, its pastor, and the District Superintendent responsible for that charge to administer the affairs of that charge to the end that it may move as rapidly as possible toward total self-support. To enable the Conference, the commission, and the District Superintendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, in harmony, and for the

tendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, in harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned, the following principles and procedures are set forth:

A. In considering the salary for the charge, all income, including salary, bonuses, and other benefits not specifically excluded, are included as salary in determining appropriations from the Equitable Salary fund. Salary support for retired supply, interim supply or associate pastors in other than larger parish arrangement of

B. Charges must be so arranged that no more than one-third of the total salary will come from the Equitable Salary Fund on the first application from the charge. Newly established congregations will be given special consideration during the

- first five years of their existence. Other charges seeking more than one-third supplement must provide specific information with their application, indicating the reasons for their inability to meet these guidelines. Information shall be made available to the Commission on Equitable Salaries and the District Superintendents regarding the term of Equitable Salary support, giving the date of its inception and the present amount of support being received by the respective charges.

 C. When the division of a charge is desired, Equitable Salary Funds will be used only

 D. In the division of a charge in which one church seeks to become a station church, it is recommended that such a church shall assume all salary obligations and its proportionate share of all apportionments.

- The remainder of the charge in such a division assumes full pastoral support and its proportionate share of all apportionments. In no case will the Commission on Equitable Salaries provide more than one-third of the salary required for such a division.
 When there is a division of a charge forming one or more student appoint-
- ments, each newly created charge must pay initially two-thirds of the pastoral support established by the division.

 E. The Commission on Equitable Salaries further recommends that each charge which is receiving, or shall hereafter receive, Equitable Salary Fund assistance, shall reduce this aid by at least ten (10) percent each year until the charge has achieved full self-support in ten years. The Commission wants to be clear at this
- which is receiving, or shall hereafter receive, Equitable Salary Fund assistance, shall reduce this aid by at least ten (10) percent each year until the charge has achieved full self-support in ten years. The Commission wants to be clear at this point that its intent in this recommendation is that the charge will accept in full whatever increases are made in the minimum salary for their pastor each year and receive ten (10) percent less each year in aid from Equitable Salary funds than granted the previous year. Newly established churches are expected to move toward full self-support during the first five years following their organization. The District Superintendents are to inform all charges receiving aid or making applica-
- tions for assistance in the future of these requirements.

 F. Any Equitable Salary Fund supplement will be terminated immediately upon information that the pastor has taken full-time secular employment. Such a charge may be reinstated at such time as its pastor returns to full-time or student status. Exceptions to this provision may be permitted only by the approval of the executive committee of the Commission on Equitable Salaries upon the recommendation

- of the District Superintendent of the pastor seeking for emergency reasons to be employed outside of his/her ministerial responsibilities.
- G. Equitable Salary Funds are sent to charges who have applied for their use to provide their pastor with the minimum salary established by the Annual Conference. The monthly salary supplement checks sent by the Conference Treasurer are to be deposited by the charge treasurer in the salary. The checks are not to be endorsed and cashed by the pastor.
- H. Churches receiving Equitable Salary Funds will conduct an annual financial campaign to accurately gauge the level of financial support the local church can reasonably expect from its members.
- I. We remind the Conference of provisions in the *Discipline*, ¶ 717, which state: "Primary responsibility for the payment of pastoral salaries remains with individual pastoral charages." (2)"This schedule of minimum salaries shall be observed by the bishops and district superintendents in arranging charges and making appointments."
- J. Churches or charges applying for Equitable Salary Funds shall submit a request on the appropriate form supplied by the District Superintendent. The request shall be carefully analyzed by the pastor, recording secretary of the Charge Conference, and the District Superintendent. The form must have the signatures of the pastor, recording secretary of the Charge Conference, and the District Superintendent affixed to it, and the request must have been approved by the Charge Conference.

The Commission plans further consultation and study with other Conference agencies and resources to seek ways to more adequately provide for the temporal needs of our pastors and churches.

Part 2 - Report of The Task Force on Salary Supplementation

These recommendations of the Bishop's Task Force on Salary Supplementation are endorsed by the Commission on Equitable Salaries and the Cabinet of the North Carolina Annual Conference

- It is recommended that the North Carolina Annual Conference approve a division of funds within Equitable Salary to include two categories for making grants: (a) The first line item in the Equitable Salary Budget will be for established pastoral appointments for which present guidelines (or those modified in future years) would apply. These would be assigned specific funds predicated upon present experience and future projections; and (b) a category of new and emerging pastoral appointments, also within an amount assigned for a set number of appointments and a fixed amount of money. These funds would be assigned under similar guidelines, with careful reduction in annual assignments so that funds would be available for successive new assignments. The Conference and its "management agencies" would exercise judicious restraint upon too rapid escalation of these funds.
- It is recommended that beginning in 1988 the amount allocated for line item one, "Established Churches," be \$285,000 and that the line item for "Emerging Churches" be \$165,000. The Commission on Equitable Salaries would continue to administer the \$285,000 but the \$165,000 would be administered by the Conference Board of Missions.
- III. If the proposed Capital Funds campaign including Church Extension and Development is passed by the Annual Conference it is recommended that a pool of funds in the amount of \$500,000 be set aside for salary support for new and emerging congregations when the Bishop and Cabinet assign a pastor to those rapidly growing communities. These funds would be set aside and deposited with the appropriate agency so that only income from those funds would be used to support the pastors in the emerging congregations.
- IV. It is recommended that a conference-wide review team be established to determine in 1988 whether continued Equitable Salaries support should be available to churches

who have been receiving Equitable Salary Support for five years or more and have not made appropriate reductions in requests for Equitable Salary support as stipulated in the Conference guidelines. This committee should have the authority to recommend to the district superintendent that salary support be discontinued, that the particular charge be realigned so that Equitable Salary support would not be necessary or what other appropriate action might be taken.

- V. It is recommended that each district superintendent be required to prepare a review in writing of each part-time pastoral charge if it is subject to equitable salary support and present a case as to why that pastoral charge should continue as part-time and not be realigned with other churches in the Annual Conference so as to form a full-time appointment. The report of the district superintendent should be sent to the Commission on Equitable Salaries which in turn, will evaluate the report of the district superintendent to determine in its judgment if it is a valid part-time appointment. If the Commission on Equitable Salaries is of the opinion that a better alignment could be made, it will report that to the Bishop.
- VI. It is recommended that the Commission on Equitable Salaries work to the end that no part-time appointments receive salary support from the Commission on Equitable Salaries by the end of the 1988 calendar year. To implement this goal the district superintendents would negotitate with the charge and the pastor tentatively appointed on a salary that would be paid by the local church in compliance with the Discipline, ¶ 436.2a and ¶ 442.2.
- VII. It is recommended that the Bishop and Cabinet meet with the Commission on Equitable Salaries in February or early March of each year to determine Equitable Salary needs for the coming year.

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION, COUNCIL ON

- I. Financial Policies
 - 1. The Outreach Ministries Fair Share Apportionments for 1988 shall be based on the formula adopted in 1979 which computes the apportionments from the average of the total monies disbursed by each church in the three years immediately previous to the apportionment year less the appropriate exclusions each year. The current exclusions are: Payments on Outreach Ministries; principal and interest on indebtedness; buildings and improvements; local benevolences paid directly by the local church; General and Conference Advance Specials; Ten Dollar Club; up to \$2400 travel paid by a charge for each pastor; One Great Hour of Sharing; World Wide Communion; Human Relations Day; World Order Sunday; Methodist Student Day; Pension Funding Crusade; UMW Funds sent to district or conference treasurer; housing allowance paid in lieu of furnished parsonage to a minister serving under Episcopal appointment in a charge of the Conference.
 - 2. Apportionments to the churches shall be made by the Council on Finance and Administration (CFA) based on the current formula for the Outreach Ministries apportionments. Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptance up to the amount fixed by the Annual Conference upon the recommendations of the Council. In the event collections shall fall short, all items shall be paid pro-rata or proportionate excepting prior claim items: (Fixed obligations on conference owned property; salaries paid directly from the Conference treasurer's office; Pensions; Equitable Salary Fund; Emerging Church Salary Support; General World Service; General Administration Fund). In the light of possible unforeseen and emergency need within the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration is authorized to make supplementary appropriations between sessions of the Annual Conference. Such supplementary appropriations shall be made only from available undesignated funds and shall be reported in the Conference. Journal for purposes of information.
 - 3. The Lake Junaluska Development Fund shall continue based on a minimum

goal of 50 cents per member per year (\$2.00) over the four-year period 1985-1988 inclusive. This is based upon the membership at the close of the calendar vear 1983 as reported in the 1984 Journal.

4. The following special offerings shall be taken in each local church and remitted to the Conference treasurer as separate items. They are not to be included in the Fair Share Apportionments: World Communion Sunday, United Methodist Student Day, One Great Hour of Sharing, Human Relations Day, World Order Sunday.

5. Outreach Ministries Apportionments will be delivered from the treasurer's office to the District Superintendents by July 15. The District Superintendents will then. as soon as possible, distribute the apportionments, without adjustments, to the churches. The District Superintendent may adjust the apportionments of the churches under a charge provided that the total apportionment for the charge is not changed.

6. No Conference agency's budget shall incorporate funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the Council on Ministries for program budget items or the Council on Finance and Administration for all non-program budget items. All funds granted to a non-Conference agency must be spent consistent with the Social Principles of The United Methodist Church.

7. No transfer of funds shall be made from one line item in the Conference Budget to another without approval of the Council on Finance and Administration,

- 8. The Episcopal Fund, General Administration Fund, Jurisdictional Conference. Temporary General Aid, World Service, College Sustaining Fund, and College Debt Retirement will be raised and paid out in the same year. All other funds will be raised and paid out in the subsequent year on a schedule determined by the Council on Finance and Administration.
- 9. The Council shall consider an appropriation to the Conference Fund for Human Need at the close of the fiscal year. The supplemental appropriation in 1986 to the Fund for Human Need was \$95,000.
- 10. Investment Policy: (a) The investment of the funds of the conference shall be such that funds available for mission are maximized in a manner consistant with the preservation of capital and with the Social Principles of the Church. (b) South African Policy: The Council will not do business with or invest in banks making loans to the government of South Africa or its agencies, or who have operations within South Africa. The Council has no investments in South Africa and has adopted a policy of making no investments in South Africa.

11. Monies paid by the churches shall be reported to the statistician by the pastors at the end of the year on the Table II, Financial Report. The Table I and Table II reports for 1987 shall be due to the statistician no later than January 31, 1988.

Approval to Solicit Funds

Approval is given to the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the District or Conference.

1. Christmas Offering for District Superindents' programs and/or projects.

2. The Board of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar

3. The Commission on Outdoor and Camping Ministries to solicit from church groups and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the four camps of the North Carolina Conference.

4. The State Commission on Campus Ministry for the privilege of private solicitation for special gifts for the benefit of special works in the state-supported institutions

of higher education.

5. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated; Methodist Home for Children; Louisburg College; Methodist College; and North Carolina Wesleyan College for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such funds as may be directed thereto with the understanding that such solicitation or private campaign may not be taken into the local churches of the Conference through solicitation in classes or other groups or by the use of membership lists of entire churches

- which might be provided, and that solicitation not be made through the North Carolina Christian Advocate.
- 6. The United Methodist Foundation, Incorporated, as provided in its charter.

III. Organization and Procedure (presented for information only)

- The Council on Finance and Administration uses McGladrey Hendrickson & Pullen, Raleigh, NC, as auditors.
- The president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer of the Council on Finance and Administration shall serve as the executive committee of the Council.
- 3. The Conference treasurer will include in his monthly financial reports, for any given month, all monies received in his office by 8:30 a.m. on the 5th day of the following month, except when the 5th day falls on a weekend or holiday the report will include the funds received by 8:30 a.m. on the following workday.
- Requests for supplemental appropriations for the operating budget for 1988 shall be delivered to the treasurer's office no later than January 25, 1988.
 Requests for the budget to be raised in 1989 shall be delivered to the treasurer's
- office no later than February 18, 1988.
- Requests for special supplemental appropriations shall be delivered to the treasurer's office at least 10 working days prior to a scheduled CFA meeting.
- 7. The treasurer, at his discretion, may approve minor overexpenditures of a budget line item up to \$1,000 or 5% of the line item, whichever is less. A request for such overexpenditure shall be submitted in writing in advance and shall state the reason for the request. The overexpenditure will be reported to CFA and will be listed in the Conference Journal.
- 8. Requests for the purchase/lease of specific data processing equipment or services must be approved by CFA. The request must address the problem of compatability of the project with the current Annual Conference data processing service. The approval of funds to begin a project does not constitute approval for the purchase/lease of specific equipment or services.
- All remittances for General Church items must be received in the treasurer's office by 8:30 a.m. on December 31, 1987, in order to receive credit for 1987.
- All remittances for Annual Conference items must be received in the treasurer's office by 8:30 a.m. on January 14, 1988, in order to receive credit for 1987.
- 11. Any request from the churches for adjustments to apportionments must be made to the Council on Finance and Administration on or before Wednesday prior to Thanksgiving (November 25, 1987). Requests for adjustment must be submitted in writing to the District Superintendent who will attach a recommendation and forward the request to the Conference Treasurer's office.
- 12. Any Conference or non-conference agency which receives Conference funds in excess of §1,000 shall submit, with any budget request, an annual detailed, audited budget report of all receipts, disbursements, and assets. A statement in effect that "All funds granted have been spent consistent with the social principles of The United Methodist Church" will be furnished to CFA upon submission of the audit. Such reports received may be reported in whole or in summary form in the Conference Journal and shall remain on file in the treasurer's office. An agency may be exempted (for just cause) from this reporting requirement by CFA for non-program agencies, or in the case of program agencies, by CFA upon recommendation of the Council on Ministries.
- 13. A carry-over to the next fiscal year of budgeted funds remaining (not including any supplemental appropriations) of up to 10% of the amount raised for the subsequent year will be allowed for non-salary Conference budget line items.
- 14. Full time lay employees (25 hrs./week minimum) on the Conference staff will be eligible for the Cummulative Pension and Benefit Fund after 1 full year of continuous employment. The employee will be required to contribute 3% of compensation and the Conference will contribute the same percentage as that contributed for clergy in the Ministerial Pension Plan.
- 15. Funds appropriated to a board or agency must be spent in the calendar year of the appropriation unless otherwise allowed by CFA.

16. Meeting Schedule: The Council will meet on the first Wednesday of February. March, and the second Wednesday in December. There may be a meeting at Annual Conference or on the first Wednesday in September at the discretion of the President. There will also be a joint CFA/COM budget hearing in November on a mutually agreed date. The executive committee meets at the call of the President. The principle business at the meetings is as follows:

February: to consider the operating budget for the current year. All payments on apportionments are due to the Treasurer by mid January. A report of receipts. amounts allocated to the budgeted boards and agencies, and supplemental

appropriations are decided at the meeting.

March: to consider the budget to be recommended to Annual Conference which will be raised in the subsequent year and spent in the year following that. Additionally, the CFA policy recommendations to the Annual Conference are adopted.

June: to elect officers if required. There may be a called meeting in conjunction with Annual Conference if necessary to elect officers or conduct other

September: an optional meeting to be held if necessary at the call of the President.

November: a joint CFA/COM budget hearing. The purpose of this hearing is to receive a report from boards and agencies on funds spent and requested funds for future programs and activities. (November 10, 1987)

December: to consider the apportionment appeals from churches. The requests for appeals are due in the Treasurer's Office on or before the Wednesday prior to Thanksqiving. The supplemental appropriations for salaries are also considered at this meeting.

IV. District Superintendents' Salary

The percentage change in District Superintendents' salary for 1986 and subsequent years shall be the same as the average percentage change in salary (salary, travel, utilities) for that year for all full-time pastors serving local charges in the North Carolina Annual Conference, (adopted in 1985)

GENERAL COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Those of us who represent the North Carolina Conference on General Church boards and agencies continue to do so with a real sense of the Connection of our Church. We are pleased to have the opportunity to relate our Conference to the General Church and, in turn, to have a linkage role in relating General Church programming to the Conference and to our local churches.

The General Council on Ministries is our church program coordinating agency, and it is an exciting experience to be an active part of its work. With myself as basic member and Robby Lowry as an additional member, we are actively involved in the General Council and its direction.

The General Council's responsibilities center on evaluation of current church programs and identification with the other boards and agencies of new or evolving programs. In a recent meeting it was decided that based on extensive research, GCOM would not be recommending to the 1988 General Conference a new missional priority for the coming quadrennium, but that a general theme related to Evangelism be approved. Other general boards and agencies will be carrying to General Conference special emphases for possible adoption, and these emphases currently are being coordinated with GCOM and the General Council on Finance and Administration. With your help, we will continue to have input to these discussions.

INSURANCE, COMMITTEE ON

Blue Cross/Blue Shield Insurance

The Administrative Services Only (ASO) plan for our Blue Cross/Blue Shield group health insurance continues to work very well for all of our subscribers and their families.

Pre-Admission certification is a requirement that will be continued. Emergency and maternity care are excluded from this requirement. Minor revisions are being made to the Major Medical Program effective April 1, 1987. You were provided a copy of these revisions which should be attached to your benefit booklet.

As long as a pastor is active he/she and the dependents remain on our active ASO group program. When either reaches age 65 he/she should sign up for the Medicare program but as long as the pastor is active there is no change in the benefits. In this case, Medicare becomes the secondary carrier until the subscriber retires. There may be penalties if you do not sign up for Medicare when eligible.

We recommend a continuation of the dental insurance as part of our regular ASO program with 80% coinsurance with a \$25.00 deductible for maintenance and surgical; 50% coinsurance with a \$25.00 deductible for replacement, periodontic or orthodontic work. Each participant or covered dependent can receive up to \$1,000 in dental benefits each year, except for orthodontics which has a lifetime maximum of \$1,000.

We recommend that any premiums not used in payment of claims or for administrative costs be retained by the Insurance Committee to provide reserves. These reserves are being used to maintain premium cost at the lowest possible level or to increase benefits. We have been able to maintain the same rates since cost paid out are exceeding the premiums collected. This deficit is being covered by these reserves. If the cost trends continue through the remainder of 1987 and the first quarter of 1988 it will be necessary to increase the premiums at next year's Conference.

In 1986 provision was made to enroll eligible lay employees of the local church in our program. Currently, 96 have enrolled in the lay health insurance program and 45 in the lay group term life insurance program. Guidelines for eligibility for lay employees are found on page 330 of the 1986 *Journal*.

The Insurance Committee provides an appeal process for any participant who feels claims have not been adequately satisfied. A written report of all pertinent information should be made to the Insurance Committee chairperson.

The Insurance Committee acknowledges that participants are assisting in good cost control factors by making use of facilities in their area and using the teaching/training facilities primarily for specialized health needs.

We remind you that the coverage is \$15,000 for active participants, \$7,500 for retired pastors up to age 72; \$1,000 for pastors over age 72. Benefits for any pastor retiring prior to 1978 remain at \$5,000. For several years we have been able to maintain premiums at the same level, however, our experience in claims paid over the last two years makes it necessary for an increase of approximately 12%. The new monthly rates effective January 1, 1988 will be: individual, \$9.00; family \$9.50. This represents an increase of \$1.01 for individual and \$.93 for family coverage per month.

Premiums for health and life insurance may be paid in advance on a quarterly,

semi-annual or annual basis.

When there is a change of address, or a change in family status it is the insured's responsibility to notify the treasurer's office within 30 days. The toll free number to the United Methodist Building in Raleigh is 1-800-621-5467 where a staff person continues to provide personal attention to insurance matters.

We recommend the current billing procedure be continued. We commend the churches and participants who continue to send remittances promptly. There are some who are consistently delinquent with their payments. Since there is no grace period payment in the Blue Cross program the insurance may be cancelled if payment is as much as 30 days overdue. Rather than leaving a participant without health insurance benefits, the premium is paid and efforts are made with the participant and/or church/charge treasurers to collect the premiums. These efforts consume an inordinate amount of staff time, telephone charges, etc. Consequently to cover the cost of paying the premiums, the Insurance Committee finds it necessary to make a charge of 1.5% per month beginning July 1, 1987 for any premiums as much as 30 days in arrears.

Payment for the churches' portion of the insurance programs must be made by the church/charge treasurer. Personal checks by the pastor cannot be accepted as payment

for the churches' portion.

The Insurance Committee considers it a privilege to be involved in the care and well-being of our families. We wish you good health and a long life.

ADDENDUM

The insurance industry is experiencing rapid and significant changes. Since the report of the Insurance Committee was prepared, we have the opportunity to benefit from one of the

changes.

Recently it was revealed that Blue Cross Blue Shield had accumulated several million dollars more than had been paid out in claims and expenses. Consequently, North Carolina Blue Cross Blue Shield has been directed to credit the groups it insures their proportionate part of the refund. We have the opportunity to change from the Administrative Services Only Plan (ASO) to the Modified Minimum Premium Plan (MMP), for one year only, from June 1, 1987 to June 1, 1988. This change will not affect in any way the insurance coverage we have and the Appeals Committee will continue to function. Next June we will go back to the Administrative Services Only Plan. The reason for this procedure change to this Modified Minimum Premium Plan is our group will be credited with between \$65,000 and \$80,000 towards claims paid out. We would not qualify for the credit if we continued with the Administrative Services Only Plan. This change will become affective June 1, 1987.

Our Group Health and Life insurance plans now offer coverage to eligible lay employees. It is appropriate that these persons have representation on the Insurance Committee. Thus it is recommended that the chairman of the Board of Laity appoint a District Lay Leader to

the Insurance Committee.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE: 200th ANNIVERSARY - HISTORICAL TIES BETWEEN THE CHURCH AND THE COLLEGE

During 1987, Louisburg College is celebrating its Bicentennial as the oldest two-year, coeducational, church-related college in America. From its beginnings as Franklin Male Academy, through its evolution as Louisburg Female Academy and later Louisburg Female College, the institution now known as Louisburg College has had an important

relationship with the Methodist Church. Methodist laymen and ministers played a crucial role in the establishment, development, and preservation of the college's 200-year-old tradition of academic service. The link between church and college has grown in strength

during the twentieth century and is now forged firmer than ever.

The original charter, issued in January 1787 to Franklin Male Academy, named John King to the board of trustees. Noted for his role as a Methodist preacher in Maryland and North Carolina, King was one of the participants in the First Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States, which was held in 1785 at the home of the Reverend Green Hill near Louisburg. A number of Methodist laymen served on the early boards of trustees for the Louisburg Male and Female Academies, including Green Hill, Jr., and Joel King.

In the 1850s, the Louisburg Female Academy was headed by Asher and Jane Ray, both members of the Louisburg Methodist Church. The success of the academy under their direction led to enlargement of its facilities, increased enrollment, and classification as a

college in 1857.

Louisburg Female College flourished under the guidance of President Turner M. Jones (1866-1868), a native of Franklin County who became noted as a Methodist leader and as

president of Greensboro Female College.

From 1876 to 1881, Louisburg Female College was endorsed as the district conference school by the Raleigh District Conference. During that time Frank L. Reid (1876-1878) and William C. Doub (1878-1881) served as presidents. Reid later became owner of the

Raleigh Christian Advocate.

In 1889, the Reverend S. D. Bagley began a five-year term as president of the college. In 1891, industrialist and philanthropist Washington Duke became interested in Louisburg Fernale College. He purchased the college property, and reportedly considered changing the name to Mary Duke College. By 1894, annual reports were being sent by the college to the North Carolina Conference.

Matthew S. Davis assumed the position of college president in 1896. He was an active Methodist layman and a highly respected educator. With Washington Duke providing the facilities rent-free, Davis was able to increase college enrollment to two hundred students. At his death in 1906, his daughter Mary Davis Allen became president. She had taught at the college since 1889 and had achieved a reputation as an exceptionally talented teacher.

During the administration of Mary Davis Allen (1906-1917), the link between Louisburg College and the Methodist Church became more formal and official. A two-year legal process (1907-1909) brought about the transfer of ownership of the college property from the Duke family to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. By 1915, the school was accorded the status of a junior college; it did not become coeducational until 1931.

The support of Methodists in Louisburg and the rest of North Carolina has played a decisive part in the survival and growth of Louisburg College. Many Methodist ministers and lay leaders have filled the position of college president during the last seven decades, and each has contributed his talents to meeting the challenges that have faced the institution. The campus and facilities have expanded greatly, and the student enrollment has reached capacity (700-800). Dr. Cecil W. Robbins (1955-1974) is immediate past president, and Dr. J. Allen Norris, Jr., has served as president of Louisburg College since 1975.

Located in a county that values historical preservation, Louisburg College constitutes a significant historic landmark. The college is located in the Louisburg Historic District, about two miles from the Methodist Historic Shrine of Green Hill Place. The college property includes the nineteenth-century Male Academy Building, Old Main (which is on the National Register of Historic Places), Person Place (former home of the Rays and now a restoration project), and the President's Home (former residence of World War I Governor Thomas W. Bickett).

During the Louisburg College Bicentennial, hundreds of school children and college alumni have toured the historic campus. Visitors have viewed the original four-story brick Main Building constructed for the college in 1857; they have also been impressed with the new Clifton L. Benson Chapel and Religious Life Center - the most recent sign of support by Raleigh District Methodists.

As it enters its third century of service, Louisburg College continues to fulfill its role as an

institution that provides a thorough two-year college course, creates opportunities for spiritual growth, and focuses attention on the well-rounded development of each individual student.

MINISTERS' MOVING EXPENSE, COMMITTEE ON

EFFECTIVE DATE - JANUARY 1, 1989

The Ministers' Moving Expense Committee met several times and studied a number of possibilities for providing moving expense. A company that will contract to move all ministers gave an estimate. This seemed to be too rigid and offered the possibility of error. Secondly, consultation was done with a moving company and it seemed the cost could be exorbitant unless a poundage limit was imposed.

After much careful consideration, the Committee makes the following recommendation. If full advantage is taken of this process the cost for 1989 will be \$168,860.00 which

represents more than 100% increase over 1988.

I. Eliaibility

- A. Pastors of local churches continuing under appointment to local churches within the Conference, district superintendents, and Conference ministerial staff whose salaries are paid from the Conference treasurer's office.
- B. Pastors in section I.A. who retire from serving appointment or who assume approved disability leave or return into active service from approved disability leave. C. Widows or widowers of ministers in section I.A. upon moving from place of

appointment to new residence.

D. Pastors moving into the North Carolina Conference to assume full-time or student appointments under section I.A.

E. Interim Supply pastors

F. Persons moving that are not defined above will not be eligible to make claim.

Payment of Claims 11.

- A. Payment will be granted to all who are eligible to make claims as follows:
 - 1. Active ministers in section I.A. (except retiring ministers, widows, widowers, and clergy couples) will receive a base payment of \$100.00 as well as reimbursement of costs up to \$850.00 with submission of paid receipts for actual movina expenses.

2. Retiring ministers, widows, or widowers will receive a base payment of \$100.00 as well as reimbursement of costs up to \$1,500.00 with submission of paid

receipts for actual moving expenses.

3. Clergy couples will receive a base payment of \$200.00 as well as reimbursement of costs up to \$1,000.00 with submission of paid receipts for actual moving expenses. If only one minister of the clergy couple is re-appointed,

section II.a.1. will apply.

- B. Travel Allowance: An allowance of \$1.00 per mile will be granted to all who are eligible to make claim. The mileage will be computed from appointment to appointment, or from the appointment to the Conference boundary, or the appointment to the residence/Conference boundary (in case of retirement) whichever is less. Clergy couples will receive \$1.00 per mile as defined above.
- C. The Conference treasurer will make payment to eligible ministers as soon as the district superintendents have received the completed document, "So You're Moving" checklist properly signed. This will fulfill the 1984 Discipline, ¶ 267.2.f)(4), which states "The chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the chairperson of the Board of Trustees, and pastor shall make an annual review of the church owned parsonage(s) to assure proper maintenance."
- D. The Conference treasurer will make an advance payment up to \$600 to eligible ministers to cover the expense of deposit and fees for moving expenses prior to their move, upon approval by the district superintendents. This advance payment may be adjusted to cover adequately the initial up front money that must be paid by the moving clergy who move themselves. Any money that is left over shall be refunded to the Conference treasurer. The checklist entitled, So You're Moving,

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must be properly signed and returned to the district superintendents, along with the receipts for moving, before the balance of the moving expense can be mailed by the Conference treasurer.

E. No additional claim can be made against a local church, district, or the Conference

for payment of moving expenses.

F. The base payment of \$100.00 is intended to cover incidental moving expenses. Therefore, the cost of boarding and moving domestic animals, the moving of recreational vehicles, boats, mobile homes, etc., and the cleaning of the parsonage are not eligible for reimbursement.

III. Review Committee

A. There will be a Review Committee consisting of two persons appointed by the chairperson of the Council on Finance and Administration, one district superintendent appointed by the Bishop, the Conference treasurer, and the director of Ministerial Relations.

B. The Review Committee will consider and have final authority over any questionable or disallowed claim or special claim beyond allowances set in the approved plan.

MINISTERS' RETIREMENT FUND CONSTITUTION, TASK FORCE TO STUDY

The Ministers' Retirement Fund is a unique creation of the North Carolina Conference that celebrates its fiftieth anniversary at this session of the Annual Conference. Its original intent was to provide a means for retiring pastors drawing pension benefits to have financial assets to make the transition from living in a home provided and furnished by the church to living in their own personal home. At the time of the creation of this fund there was no early retirement or disability benefits; retirement came at the end of forty years of service or at age sixty-five. Subsequent actions of the General Conference have provided additional retirement and disability choices.

The Ministers' Retirement Fund has never been linked to the regular pension program of the Annual Conference or the general church except to provide that a minister can only participate in the fund during those years when pension credit is being earned through an appointment to a local church or an Annual Conference staff position. This program was an attempt to provide a minister with some real amount of financial equity in a system that

always provided a furnished home.

The amendments proposed at the 1986 session of the North Carolina Conference to the Ministers' Retirement Fund would alter considerably the nature of the fund as it has historically been administered. The present plan requires that a minister's participation be regular and systematic with dividend benefits being accumulated during 75% of the period of participation. Under one proposed amendment a minister can make payments with no regularity and remain a member of the fund. Under another amendment benefit dividends would be paid during 90% of the period that a minister did make regular payments. There would be no apparent problem with a minister who made haphazard payments as the years moved on. The need to be consistent and regular in making annual payments is presently addressed in the constitution but would be deleted by another amendment.

The task force recommends no change in the present constitution of the Ministers' Retirement Fund, but it does make several suggestions to address some of the concerns

that prompt the proposed amendments:

 That ministers who participate in the Ministers' Retirement Fund be advised that payments can be made to the Conference Treasurer's office all during the year to avoid the inconvenience or difficulty of making a large payment to pay the whole year's

apportionment in January.

2. That notices of the Ministers' Retirement Fund be made a part of the June/July Coordinated Mailing to remind ministers who may wish to become participants so they will have ample time to plan for this expenditure. This would be in addition to a notice sent in December to all ministers by first class mail. The notice would include an explanation of the fund as well as an application blank for those desiring to join.

That a letter be sent to the District Superintendent of any minister who is a member of the Ministers' Retirement Fund but has not made a payment for the current year. A time of counsel would be given to insure that payment could be arranged before the third year default caused termination of the minister's membership. A list of those who have missed two (2) consecutive payments should also be provided to the Conference Board of Pensions and the Ministerial Relations Office for additional review.

 That promotion of the Ministers' Retirement Fund at the Orientation Session for Pastors new to the North Carolina Conference and at District set-up meetings be continued and strengthened where possible by personal testimony.

5. That a new name for this fund be considered that would incorporate the idea of its transitional nature, removing the somewhat implicit relationship of the fund to the pension program; for example, "The Retired Ministers' Transitional Equity Fund."

NOMINATIONS PROCEDURES, TASK FORCE ON

The Annual Conference Committee on Nominations shall determine the size of and nominate to the Annual Conference session the members of all boards, commissions, and committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases where the *Discipline* or the Annual Conference directs otherwise.

To insure racial and gender inclusiveness among chairpersons, we ask each Conference agency to devise a plan so that its leadership may have racial and gender inclusiveness and to report its plans to the 1988 Annual Conference.

This Nominating Committee shall be composed of the Resident Bishop as chairperson, the district superintendents, the director of the Conference Council on Ministries, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of United Methodist Men, the Conference President of United Methodist Women, the Conference President of United Methodist Youth, the President of the Young Adult Council, a representative selected by the Commission on Religion and Race, a representative selected by the Commission on the Status and Role of Women, and twelve persons selected by the Resident Bishop to insure that the Nominating Committee is representative of the Annual Conference in terms of the size of congregation, gender, and race.

As sub-committee of this Conference Nominating Committee, there shall be in each district a District Nominating Committee composed of the following: the district superintendent as chairperson, the district lay leader, the district President of United Methodist Men, the district President of United Methodist Women, the district President of United Metodist Youth, chairperson of the District Council on Ministries, one young adult, and two

ministers selected by the district Council on Ministries.

The Conference Committee on Nominations shall let each district committee on nominations know what nominations need to be made for any positions to be filled by the Annual Conference, along with an outline of the duties and responsibilities of each position. The district committee may make nominations for these positions to the Conference committee, along with the list of qualifications of each nominee. The district committee on nominations shall nominate district representatives to Conference committees, boards and agencies as required.

The Conference Committee on Nominations shall review these district nominations, as well as nominations for members and chairpersons submitted by the various boards, agencies, and individuals. It shall then make nominations, contact persons being nominated, and obtain a consent to serve, and then submit the list of nominees to the Annual Conference session for election.

Unless otherwise provided for in the *Discipline*, the Bishop and Cabinet shall act to fill any vacancies which shall arise in the interim between the quadrennial elections.

INCLUSIVENESS STATEMENT

Insofar as possible, the membership on councils, boards and agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry. Special attention shall be given to the inclusion of clergywomen, youth, young adults, older adults, persons with a handicapping condition, and racial and ethnic minority persons in keeping with policies for general church agencies. ¶ 704.4, 1984 Discipline

The Reverend Doctor Beverly Waugh Presiding Bishop of the Virginia Conference 1837

150th ANNIVERSARY OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

A new territory in which Methodist preaching had continued for over fifty years was authorized to be created from the Virginia Conference at the General Conference meeting at Cincinnati in May, 1836. On February 8, 1837, Bishop Beverly Waugh, presiding over the Virginia Conference at Petersburg, Virginia, assigned five presiding elders to the new Raleigh, Newbern, Roanoke, Danville and Salisbury Districts, and appointed fifty ministers to circuits within that area.

Five preachers who had taken the retired relationship in the Virginia Conference were placed in the North Carolina Conference · William Holmes, Thales McDonald, James Patterson, John H. Watson, and Rufus Wiley. We celebrate the one hundred fiftieth anniversary since that beginning of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church. The first session of the North Carolina Conference was held in Greensboro in January, 1838 and reported 15,312 white and 3,896 colored members, 76 preachers and 175 local preachers.

ORDAINED MINISTRY, BOARD OF

Introduction: It is a pleasure to present to the North Carolina Annual Conference the 1987 Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry. Following are recommendations of fifteen (15) persons to be elected probationary members, fourteen (14) of them to be ordained deacons; of seventeen (17) persons to be elected into full connection and ordained elders; and of one (1) person to be elected associate member. Included also are recommendations for many other persons covering the whole wide range of ministerial relationships. In preparing these recommendations the Board of Ordained Ministry has spent eleven days in meetings as a board, and as many or more days in meetings of various committees of the board. All those being recommended for membership and ordination have been examined by the Board, 1) on their call to ministry and the diciplines of their lives, 2) in preaching and worship, and 3) in theology and doctrine. In so doing, we have endeavored to be earnest and exacting in expectation, to be fair and charitable in judgment, to be gracious in examination, to express joyful appreciation and commendation for work well done.

Ordination: Ordination represents a moment of profoundest meaning and significance in the life of those persons called to ministry in the church. In qualifying persons for ordination we are awed by the knowledge that we stand in a tradition spanning two thousand years of Christian history, a continuity that takes us back to the shores of Galilee and the calling of Peter and Andrew, James and John to become "fishers of men." With reverence of feeling and a most solemn sense of responsibility, we commend our report to the North Carolina Annual Conference.

The Ordinal which will be used at the Ordination Service, June 8, is an alternate service developed on the initiative of the Council of Bishops and adopted for use by the 1980 General Conference. Written in contemporary English, it incorporates inclusive language, and yet retains a high quality of liturgical character, embodying our theological understanding of the pastoral office.

Miscellaneous Requirements: The Board of Ordained Ministry would remind the Annual Conference and the ministerial candidates preparing for membership relationships to the North Carolina Conference that several actions of past Annual Conference sessions have established requirements that go beyond the basic step found in The Book of Discipline.

For Full Time Local Pastors, the Board recommended that ministers having completed the basic Five Year Course of Study continue to attend the Course of Study School in the summer, enrolling in at least four years of advanced studies during any six year period. These courses, offered on a seminary level would increase the competency of our Full Time Local Pastors (1980).

For Associate Membership, the Board recommended that the academic requirement be raised to four-year baccalaureate degree (1974).

For Probationary Membership, the Board recommended that each candidate must complete the following seminary level courses to be eligible (1988):

1. A course in preaching that includes a practicum, laboratory, or field experience in the preparation, delivery and evaluation of sermons.

2. A course in public worship that includes the theory and practice of planning and leading public worship.

For Full Connection, the Board recommended that only those persons who had completed the M. Div. degree (or its equivalent) in seminary be elected to full membership (1975). Attention is called to the course requirements contained in *The Book of Discipline*, ¶423.3c. Candidates must complete these 3 separate and distinct courses:

- 1. United Methodist Polity
- 2. United Methodist Theology and Doctrine
- 3. A History of Methodism

AD HOC COMMITTEE ON ETHNIC MINORITY PASTORAL RECRUITMENT

Goal: To set a goal that by the end of 1988 that each Ethnic Minority Local Church or Ministry or Mission of the North Carolina Annual Conference and/or each Ethnic Minority pastor in the North Carolina Conference shall identify and enlist at least one person for

ordained ministry in the North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.

To Facilitate This, we recommend that:

There be a consultation on recruitment for Ethnic Minorities involving the Bishop, the District Superintendents, the Board of Ordained Ministry, the District Committees on Ordained Ministry, Pastors and Pastor-Parish Relations Committees from every local church, and respresentatives from the Ethnic Minority Ministries of the North Carolina Conference; at which time the Bishop will relate the needs, challenges, responsibilities, opportunities and expectations for recruitment of Ethnic Minority pastors for service in The United Methodist Church. This one-time consultation would be considered Phase 1 of the recruitment process.

Phase 2 would be a series of convocations involving Pastor-Parish Relations Committees of Ethnic Minority local churches and other church people; District Superintendents, District Committees on Ordained Ministry, and those persons identified as potential ordained ministers. The difference in format would be the involvement of some recent Ethnic Minority persons in ministry who would be asked to share their pilgrimage and "success story." The purpose is again to challenge Ethnic Minority pastors and local churches to actively recruit persons for ordained ministry. The intended audience would be persons ranging from Junior High School age through college.

Phase 3 of the recruitment process would be a series of semi-annual "retreats" to: 1) involve all Ethnic Groups together; and 2) involve individual Ethnic Groups as a homogenous unit. The purpose of these retreats would be to promote solidarity and unity of purpose. The retreats would continue semi-annually until all persons identified in the above process

as potential ordained ministers have reached seminary level in their education.

Cost Estimate: The Ad Hoc Committee estimates the following amounts on the basis of the current number of Ethnic Minority local churches in the North Carolina Conference (36), and funding will be requested from the following agencies: the General Church Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority funds available; the Annual Conference Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority funds available; and the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry.

Bishop's Consultation: \$3,000 (includes cost of a meal for all participants; honoraria and

travel for principles.)

Convocations: \$4,000 (based on an estimate of four events at \$1,000 each).

Retreats: \$16,000 (We estimate the term of this funding to be from eight to ten years, and involving 36 to 45 persons, plus 4 to 5 leaders, at one of our Conference camps for a period of 3 days per year).

Total Cost Estimate: \$23,000.

CONTINUING EDUCATION, COMMITTEE ON

The Continuing Education Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry has the responsibility of developing continuing education programs that will enable ministers to fulfill the Disciplinary requirements. According to The Book of Discipline, 1984, ¶446.1, Ministers shall be expected to continue their education throughout their careers, including carefully-developed personal programs of study augmented periodically by involvement in organized educational activities. The Discipline, ¶447, further states that, in most cases a minister's continuing education program should allow for leaves of absence for study at least one week each year and at least one month during one year of each quadrennium. Such leaves shall not be considered as part of the minister's vacation and shall be planned in consultation with the charges or other agencies to which they are appointed, as well as the bishop, district superintendent, and Annual Conference Continuing Education Committee.

In providing the resources to enable pastors to meet the minimum requirement of *The Discipline*, the Committee on Continuing Education has edited a new brochure that applies to all ministers of the North Carolina Annual Conference. The brochure contains information defining continuing education, the role of the local church and how the pastor's continuing education can be financed. The brochure is printed as part of this

report.

Continuing Education for Ministry in the North Carolina Annual Conference

Rationale: A prime expectation of every minister of the North Carolina Annual Conference is professional growth. In recent years one of the major avenues through which such growth occurred has been continuing education. The General Conference of The United Methodist Church has recognized this by requiring annual participation in a continuing education program by each ordained minister seeking appointment. (The Discipline, ¶422.1c)

Definition: Continuing education is defined as an organized structured program of formal study under competent leadership with clearly defined goals and objectives. Here the key words are organized, competent leadership, and clearly-defined goals and objectives. By this definition certain activities, though worthwhile, are not considered continuing education, e. g. recreational programs, promotional meetings, worship services, entertainments, undirected reading and study travel (except for limited lecture, seminar or workshop time), and the like.

The Conference Program: The Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, through the Committee on Continuing Education, performs three functions: 1) It sets minimum continuing education standards for ministry; 2) it establishes guidelines for continuing

education; and 3) it seeks to insure their availability.

1. Minimum Standards. The North Carolina Conference has established as a minimum standard one Continuing Education Unit (CEU) to be earned by each minister from an approved continuing education program each year. One CEU is defined as ten contact

hours of participation in an approved continuing education program.

2. Guidelines for Continuing Education Programs. CEU's will be approved for those programs sponsored by organizations which are accredited by (a) a regional educational agency (such as the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools), or (b) a professional accrediting agency (such as the American Medical Association) or (c) the Council on the Continuing Education Unit. It should also be noted that only those programs which relate directly to ministerial growth and development will be approved.

3. Insuring their Availability. Efforts by the Board of Ordained Ministry to insure the availability of continuing education programs include encouraging Conference-related and other colleges within the Conference bounds to offer courses for ministers, providing supplementary financial aid for ministers, publicizing approved programs, and identifying

specific subject areas for needed programs.

Role of the Local Church: In addition to the minister, the local church has a significant stake in the success of continuing education programs. The local church, therefore, has an important role to play in continuing education. The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee of the local church:

1. Confers with the pastor and the district superintendent in the development of a continuing education program which will enhance the total ministry of the Church.

2. Provides leaves of absence for study at least one week each year and at least one month during one year of each quadrennium. Such leaves of absence are not to be considered vacation time. (The Discipline, 1984, ¶447)

3. Recommends to the church's Finance Committee budgetary funds to be applied

toward the minister's continuing education program.

In providing funds for continuing education programs the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee should insure that only those programs which meet both the definitions and specific guidelines above are funded.

Financial Aid to Ministers: Funding for continuing education is the combined responsibility of the participant, the congregation, the sponsoring institution and the Annual Conference. Conference funds for continuing education are derived as a portion of Conference acceptances of the Ministerial Education Fund. Thus, it is not possible (nor is it desirable) for the Conference to assume a major responsibility.

All persons under episcopal appointment to charges, Conference staff positions, district superintendencies, and Conference-related agencies and institutions are eligible for grants

from Conference funds provided:

- 1. The program does not lead to advancement from one level of Conference relationship to another.
 - 2. The program meets the definitions and Conference guidelines described above. 3. The applicant has documented his or her efforts to secure funding from other sources,

including local church, Duke Endowment, and personal.

4. The application for a grant is filed on the appropriate form which furnishes complete information about the event and bears the signatures of the applicant, the Pastor-Parish chairperson, and the district superintendent.

In providing grants, the Conference will place limits as follows:

- 1. The maximum grant to an individual applicant over one Conference year is \$300.00.
- 2. For a one-week event \$150.00 will be the maximum grant; for a two-week event, \$300.00
- 3. The event must involve some definite measure of intensive study by the participant and offer at least one continuing education unit.
- 4. The Conference may fund no more than 75 percent of the cost of any continuing education event.

Monitoring Continuing Education Units:

- 1. The district superintendent, in annual consultation, may suggest to the minister the area of continuing education he or she should take to facilitate his or her professional growth. The pastor's annual continuing education report will be given to the district superintendent at the annual consultation.
- 2. Ministers shall have the responsibility for securing from the institution granting continuing education credit a record of earned credit and providing a copy of this record to his or her district superintendent.
- 3. The district superintendent will send the pastor's continuing education report to the director of Ministerial Relations on the annual basis so that this report can be placed in the pastor's permanent file (and possibly on computer). This information will include course title and continuing education credits.
- 4. It is the responsibility of each minister to determine, in consultation with the Committee on Continuing Education, if a proposed program meets the criteria prior to participation and funding.

EVALUATION AND MORALE, COMMITTEE ON

The Executive Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry expressed concern regarding the current instrument from the evaluation of all clerical members of the Annual Conference. This form was designed in response to an action of the 1984 North Carolina Annual Conference Session which was submitted by Mr. D. E. Vaughan, a lay member of the Annual Conference from First Church, Morehead City, The substance of the Vaughan resolution was to limit the instrument of evaluation to no more than three questions. (For the full text of the Vaughan resolution, see the Journal of the North Carolina Annual Conference, 1984, p. 350; and for the record of debate over this resolution, see p. 182.)

Mr. Vaughan's resolution was noble in its intent, and well-received by the Annual Conference. He stated that the laity and the clergy were not comfortable with the instruments we had used up to that time; that the process of evaluation itself is intimidating to all involved; and that it can create more problems than it was intended to solve, its use for instance, as a tool of manipulation. He suggested that the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet design a drastically simplified criteria of evaluation in order to avoid these problems.

Unfortunately, time and use has shown that the current revised, simplified instrument is not accomplishing the ends desired in the resolution. Indeed, if anything, the "simplified" form allows more room for intimidation, discomfort, and manipulation. Morale among the

clergy is low, especially with regard to the evaluation process.

Please note further: the objective purpose of the evaluation process is to be of assistance in the planning of the pastor's program for Continuing Education for the ensuing year. Chapter 3, Section IV of the Book of Discipline, 1984, ¶¶445-446, links Evaluation and Continuing Education together. Whatever instrument we use should then reflect this objective more clearly than what we have used in the recent past.

The main problem with achieving these ends is that we are bound by the Vaughan resolution to an instrument whose design limitations will not allow the freedom to overcome its inherent problems. Unless the Vaughan resolution is rescinded, the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet will continue to be frustrated because they are bound by its terms to abide by its requirement of no more than three items in the review instrument.

Therefore, we move that the North Carolina Annual Conference return the structure and design of the evaluative instrument to the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet without limitation on the items to be included, but with a strong concern to create a concise instrument and precise process which will better suit the needs of clergy and the local church Committees on Pastor-Parish Relations; and that training be provided in the January Workshops to implement the process.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND, COMMITTEE ON

The Ministerial Education Fund remains the major source of support for theological education in The United Methodist Church. When the local church remits the Ministerial Education Fund to the Conference treasurer, it is divided two ways. The larger portion (75%) is sent to the Division of Higher Education and Ministry in Nashville to be divided among the United Methodist seminaries for their operating expenses and for scholarship help to minority and special students. The remaining 25% portion is retained by the Board of Ordained Ministry in the North Carolina Conference.

The Board of Ordained Ministry may use its funds to provide scholarship assistance for ministerial education, for continuing education and for recruitment. However, the amounts of funds available during the past few years and the number of students seeking to prepare for ordained ministry has made necessary the use of almost all of the funds for scholarships for ministerial candidates.

Grants to students eligible for full scholarship were based on 35% of the actual educational cost (tuition, fees and an annual \$300.00 book allowance). For students at Duke Divinity School this was \$1,813.00 for full-time students (four courses) and \$1,386.00 for student pastors (three courses) annually.

The need to continue our support of the Ministerial Education Fund at the present level, and to increase where possible, is borne out by these statistics of our present group of students preparing for ministry and the need to move further into continuing education opportunities for the ministers already in the field.

PASTORAL CARE, COMMITTEE ON

The Committee on Pastoral Care administers a financial assistance program for Conference clergy and their families for confidential counseling and therapy. The annual allowance is \$300.00 per family unit. Additional financial assistance is available through the Conference Blue Cross/Blue Shield insurance policy, which includes partial coverage for outpatient psychiatric care. Clients should check with the therapist and the *Health Care Benefits* for details.

Family includes dependents of the minister living in the minister's home, such as spouse, children, parents and grandparents. Dependent children away from home for college are also eligible.

The only qualifications for this financial assistance are:

- membership in the North Carolina Conference or serving as a minister in a local church of the North Carolina Conference, or be a dependent of such a person;
- the counseling or therapy must be provided by someone who has one or more of the credentials listed below in this report, or be someone on the staff of one of the pastoral care centers, also listed below.

The financial assistance will be provided to cover one-half of the cost of each counseling session for which application is made until the full \$300.00 annual allowance has been granted. Application for financial assistance must be made within one year from the date therapy was received.

Application Procedure

At the client's request, the counselor or therapist is to make application to the chairperson of the Committee on Pastoral Care for financial assistance to the client in the following manner:

- the therapist requests application forms, Conference Directory and instructions from the chairperson of Pastoral Care.
- the application is submitted by the therapist to the chairperson of Pastoral Care as directed on the application form. Clients will be identified by a case number only! The minister and/or dependents are assigned the same case number.
- the therapist will receive financial assistance on behalf of the client to apply to the client's account or to refund the client as appropriate. Clients should request from the therapist a record or statement showing financial assistance received on their behalf. Should this procedure not be acceptable with the therapist because of her/his payment

contract, the client should request the therapist to contact the chairperson of Pastoral Care to negotiate an acceptable procedure.

PSYCHOLOGICAL TESTING AND EVALUATION, COMMITTEE ON

Psychological Testing and Evaluation is a psychological assessment program of the Board of Ordained Ministry. All persons seeking membership in the North Carolina Conference are required to undergo psychological testing and evaluation. It serves two basic purposes: nurture and selection. The nurture aspect is for the benefit of the candidate seeking Conference membership. The selection aspect is for the benefit of the Conference. Nurture is accomplished when the psychological assessment provides the candidate information pertinent to the achievement and maintenance of maximum psychological adjustment in professional ministry by identifying specific areas of potential problems and offering concrete suggestions to remedy them. Selection is accomplished when the assessment program provides early detection of unacceptable behavior patterns which could jeopardize effective ministry.

For persons who transfer into our Conference from other denominations and for all probationers, the required tests are: Strong/Campbell (Interests), Theological School Inventory (Religious Interest), Personal Research Form (Values), Myers/Briggs Type Indicator (Personality), Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory (Pathology), and Clinical

Analysis Questionnaire (Back-up to M.M.P.I.).

The tests required by those coming by transfer from other United Methodist Conferences are: Personal Research Form (Values), Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory (Pathology), and Clinical Analysis Questionnaire.

The testing program uses personality, interests, religious interest, and values inventories to measure fitness and competency for ministry. In this Conference eighteen (18) probationary candidates have been tested this year under this program.

PARSONAGE USE STUDY COMMITTEE, TASK FORCE ON

At the 1986 Annual Conference, the Committee on Pastoral Care recommended the establishment of a committee to... "address issues and concerns regarding the use of parsonages and recommend to the 1987 North Carolina Annual Conference for its approval constructive measures to resolve these issues and concerns for both parsonage families and the local churches."

The committee was formed in late August and met almost monthly either as a committee-of-the-whole or as sub-committees with specific tasks. Immediate attention was placed upon the body of work completed by previous committees, the latest report being submitted in 1982.

Much time was spent in our deliberations on a variety of issues connected with parsonage family life. Soul searching and frank, open discussion of the clergy and laity roles in the system were positive reinforcement of the need for continual dialogue on parsonage issues. It became evident that education was the key to developing positive solutions rather than escalating intense emotional issues. Flexibility on the part of both the clergy and laity was also deemed of greatest importance to resolution of concerns.

It was felt that a questionnaire was needed to evaluate some of the information found in the earlier study. As the committee did not have funding, a limited survey was accomplished at the January workshops, through the help of the District Superintendents, Conference Staff and the Reverend Rob Rollins. Although limited by method of collection of the data, the survey overwhelmingly highlighted two major considerations: 1) the majority of clergy and laity favor the present parsonage system for our Conference, and 2) the majority of the respondents felt the need to have a standing Conference Clergy Living Committee for policy making and appeal.

The committee's specific recommendations are as follows:

- 1. That the Annual Conference establish and fund a Conference Cleray Living Committee. The committee would include a maximum of 15 members that would include representatives from each of the following: all districts, the Cabinet, Pastoral Counselor, the Director of Ministerial Relations, Board of Ordained Ministry, CFA, Clergy family, and Equitable Salaries. There will be at least 50% lay membership, and a lay person and clergy person alternate as the chair each year. The committee would meet as necessary, up to 4 times a year, to hear unreconciled problems regarding parsonage usage and to recommend solutions and alternatives. Other responsibilities of the committee will be to compile data on existing parsonages, to annually review and update the Parsonage Minimum Standards booklet, and to publish an annual newsletter.
- 2.That a special parsonage maintenance fund be established by each charge. A minimum of 1% per year of the replacement value of the parsonage be placed in this fund and that this continue until the fund reaches a minimum of 5% of the replacement value of the parsonage and then maintained at that level.
- 3. That the Charge shall establish a definite policy for implementing emergency replacements and/or repairs.
- 4. That the Charge should provide for storage of unused parsonage furnishings and the pastor provide for storage of the pastor's furnishings.
- 5. That the parsonage family should provide for unique family furnishings (e.g., nursery, handicap, extended family needs).
 - 6. That a pet policy be established that is the standard policy for rental property: a. The pet owner is responsible for any property damage caused by pet(s).
 - b. The pet owner must conform to all state and local ordinances.

 - c. The pet owner is responsible for liability for any injury caused by the pet(s). d. The pet owner is responsible for professional fumigation of the parsonage when
 - moving if the pet is kept in the parsonage. 7. That the parsonage family will be responsible for any damage they cause beyond
 - normal wear and tear.

Report B — Recommendations For the Pension Program

. Past Service Liability

A. Past service will continue to be paid on the defined benefit concept (per service year rate) for all service rendered to the North Carolina Conference through December 31, 1981. This plan will continue until all pastors with past service benefits and their

- surviving spouses are deceased.
- B. Goal of defined benefits (per service year rate) has been defined in the Book of Discipline for many years as 1% of the Conference Average Salary. The 1987 CAS for the North Carolina Conference is \$21.675.00.
- C. The current rate is \$225.00 per service year. Participation in the new Ministerial Pension Plan requires that an Annual Conference increase its past service rate as the Conference Average Salary increases, to at least 0.9% of the CAS to continue to participate fully in the new pension program. We propose that the past service rate beginning January 1, 1988 be increased to \$240.00 per service year, and that further increases will be presented to the Annual Conferences of the future as the Conference Average Salary increases.
- D. To increase any past service rate will always involve accepting an unfunded liability that must be satisfied by either a single cash payment, a series of planned payments, or a combination of both.

Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) 11.

Guidelines for the Ministerial Pension Plan and the Comprehensive Protection Plan are contained in the 1983 and 1984 Journal of the North Carolina Conference. Thus we call to your attention only those guidelines that are relevant to these programs.

- A. Service on and after January 1, 1982 will be funded on a new concept, called a defined contribution plan. This plan is basically deferred salary, and creates no unfunded liability because it builds an account of funds for a specific minister as his/her salary is paid.
- B. Funding is based on a percentage of Plan Compensation, Plan Compensation is calculated as follows:

Take Cash Income (salary plus utilities) i.e. less 10% for utilities	\$20,000.00 2,000.00

Add Housing Allowance (20% of cash income)

Plan Compensation will be

- No travel funding is ever used in Plan Compensation calculations as this is considered by the General Board of Pensions to be an item of local expense.
- The utility allowance of the pastor is not considered by the General Board of Pensions to be more than 10% of the total Cash Income, regardless of the amount set at the Charge Conference.
- Clergy couples housing Effective January 1, 1988:
 - When only one of the spouses is furnished a parsonage, the one furnished the parsonage includes the housing allowance.
 - b. When one spouse is furnished a parsonage and the other a cash allowance, the one furnished the parsonage will use the housing allowance, and the other will report the actual cash housing paid.
 - c. When two parsonages are furnished and both are used, each spouse claims a housing allowance.
 - d. When neither is furnished a parsonage, the actual cash housing allowance may be counted by the person/or persons receiving the allowance.
- 4. The housing allowance for those furnished housing is 20% until January 1, 1990, when it increases to 25% in accordance with the Plan Document.
- 5. Where a cash housing allowance is provided as a part of the compensation for an appointment or where the pastor chooses to live in housing other than the parsonage provided by the charge, the housing allowance in the Plan Compensation calculation shall be considered 20% of the Cash Income, regardless of the amount of the cash housing allowance. (Beginning in January 1, 1988, those furnished a cash housing allowance will report the actual amount in accordance with the Plan Document.)
- C. The Ministerial Pension Plan contribution from the local church is to be paid monthly by the Church or Charge Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer for

- transmission to the General Board of Pensions.
- These contributions are placed in the individual minister's Church Account to be available for benefits when the minister becomes eligible for payment in the retired relationship.
- E. Each minister who is eligible for benefits will be required to designate beneficiaries for the benefits he/she is qualified to receive.
- F. We recommend that the following schedule of participation in the Ministerial Pension Plan be adopted and implemented to bring the North Carolina Conference participants into the intended structure of the Ministerial Pension Plan:

- III. Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP)
 - A. This part of the program contains provisions for a death benefit, disability income, and funding for the peerage portion of the Ministerial Pension Plan. In addition to the provisions of a death benefit for the pastor, there is a death benefit on the life of the spouse. The Comprehensive Plan also includes educational benefits for the children of a deceased minister. This part of the new plan is only available to those ministers covered under the CPP.
 - 1. Death benefits provide 150% of the Denominational Average Compensation as the benefit paid on the death of an active minister through age 46, dropping on a graduated basis to 20% upon retirement at any age.
 - Disability payments are based on 40% of the Denominational Average Compensation in effect at the time the minister is placed on disability.
 - 3. The peerage program provides for a contribution from the Comprehensive Protection Plan to the minister's Church Account of a sufficient amount to provide the minister with a total contribution for the year based on the Denominational Average Compensation at 11% of Plan Compensation based on the Denominational Average Compensation for those eligible.
 - 4. The Comprehensive Protection Plan contribution from the local church is to be paid *monthly by the Church or Charge Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer* for transmission to the General Board of Pensions.
 - B. The cost of the Comprehensive Protection Plan is a 4.1% contribution of actual Plan Compensation. The pastor will be required to pay 1.0% of the 4.1% as provided in the Comprehensive Protection Plan, and the church or charge will pay the additional 3.1%. Beginning in January 1, 1990, the CPP will be changed to 4.4% up to the Denominational Average Compensation to comply with the Plan Document. Churches will pay 3.4% and pastors 1%.)
- IV. Implementation of the Program

The benefit program adopted by your Conference Board of Pensions seeks to provide a wider range of support for the minister's family through death benefits for every member of the family, disability income for the minister in time of great stress, educational benefits for children of deceased ministers, minimum annuity benefits for surviving spouses, and the build-up of contributions to the Church Account of these ministers whose compensation is below the Denominational Average Salary.

A. Costs of the Ministerial Pension Plan/Comprehensive Protection Plan will be borne by the local charge as an item of ministerial support according to the Plan Compensation of the minister and the category of the charge.

Full Time (Conference Member/Local Pastor) - 14.4% of Plan Compensation Student (Conference Member/Local Pastor) - 11.0% of Plan Compensation Less Than Full Time (Conference Member/Local Pastor) - 11.0% of salary Interim or Retired Supply - no pension responsibility

- B. The pastor will make regular monthly payments to the Conference Treasurer for his/her portion (1%) of the Comprehensive Protection Plan.
- C. The pastor will make regular monthly payments to the General Board of Pensions for his/her Personal (3%).

V. MPP and CPP Payments Policy: The churches and participants who send the MPP and CPP remittances promptly are

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to be commended. This is necessary for the program to function efficiently. There are some who are consistently deliquent in their payments. This deliquency could jeopardize the Ministerial Pension Plan and Comprehensive Protection Plan Programs, Rather than depriving any minister of these benefits, inexhaustible efforts are made with the minister and or the Church or Charge Treasurer to collect the MPP and CPP Funds. These efforts consume an inordinate amount of staff time required by correspondence and telephone conversations. To help defray the cost of these additional efforts to collect these funds it is necessary to charge one and one-half per cent per month for any MPP or CPP funds that are as much as 30 days in arrears effective July 1, 1987.

VI. Policies Related to Life and Hospital Insurance

- A. Surviving spouses who are not covered under the minister's hospital insurance must request coverage within thirty (30) days after the death of the pastor to avoid the one year waiting period for pre-existing conditions.
 - 1. When surviving spouses are employed and provided hospital insurance, the policy of the Board of Pensions will be the secondary carrier.
 - 2. If the surviving spouse remarries, the hospital insurance will terminate until the said surviving spouse attains age 65 or the dissolution of the marriage.
 - B. Pastors Insurance (to become effective at the conclusion of the 1988 Session of Annual Conference.) 1. Pastors who retire from the North Carolina Annual Conference with twenty or
 - more years of earned pension credit in the North Carolina Annual Conference will have their hospital and life insurance paid by the Conference Board of Pensions when the minister attains age 62, OR retires with thirty-seven (37) years of service, provided at least twenty of the thirty-seven (37) years of pension credit is in the North Carolina Annual Conference.
 - 2. Pastors who retire from the North Carolina Annual Conference with less than twenty years of earned pension credit in the North Carolina Annual Conference will pay, when he/she attains age 62, or earned 37 years of pension credit, a portion of the premium by the following formula:

VII. Dental Insurance

The Board of Pensions recommends that retired ministers covered under our Blue Cross supplement plan have dental insurance added. It is to be paid by the North Carolina Board of Pensions and to become effective July 1, 1987.

VIII. Special Provisions

The North Carolina Annual Conference Board of Pensions is hereby authorized, at its discretion, to arrange with the General Board of Pensions for active participation in the MPP and/or CPP by persons who are eligible under special rules but not automatically included as active participants. (MPP Section 3.2 and CPP Section 3.2)

IX. Conclusion

Our constant aim is to provide our retired families with their needs for an adequate income to purchase essentials for living as well as to insure adequate care in case of illness. To these ends our recommendations are directed, and their satisfaction is found in the acceptance of the North Carolina Conference and its membership.

Report C - Housing Exclusion Allowance

RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED MINSTERS OF THIS CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as the United Methodist Church has and functions through ministers of the gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of the United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of the United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the North Carolina Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference; and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received by a retired minister (including amounts received in this respect from the Duke Endowment), or 100% of the disability benefit payments received by a disabled minister, during the year of 1987-1988 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of the United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the North Carolina Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability;
- 2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of the United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of the United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of the United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the

Code as 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities." Beginning in 1984, there is no longer a sick pay or disability income exclusion available with respect to disability benefit payments. Therefore, the full amount of disability benefit payments will be taxable income to the recipient beginning in 1984.

Report D-Ministers' Retirement Fund Constitution

The Principle of the Fund

The Ministers' Retirement Fund is established to assist the minister to more easily make the transition from the active relationship in which a furnished parsonage has been provided, to the retired relationship in which the minister provides his/her housing, by paying two lump sum benefits at the time of retirement. The fund is established by apportionments to each local church in the Outreach ministries—Fair Share Apportionments and by assessments to each minister who has membership in the Fund. Since all churches contribute to this Fund, it is the desire of the Annual Conferece that all ministers participate in the Fund. We do not interpret the churches' support of the Ministers' Retirement Fund as an additional benefit for their minister, but a benefit for all ministers of the Conference. Therefore, the only funds to which a minister can make personal claim are those which he/she contributed to the Fund. We vigorously emphasize that this Fund is for the minister's retirement, and not any kind of emergency fund to be made availabe for any other purpose.

The treasurer of the North Carolina Conference shall serve as treasurer of this Fund. He shall promote this work, receive reports from the district superintendents, receive funds from pastors and charges, and keep permanent records of collections and benefits paid. The treasurer shall obtain the names of all ministers retiring at each Annual Conference, who are eligible to receive the lump sum payment, and pay them promptly any benefits to which they are entitled. Retirement benefits are to be paid to each participating minister at the time of his/her retirement (either at the regular time or at the earlier optional time) or when that minister is placed on disability leave. Retirement or disability will terminate any

further participation in the Fund by any minister.

Eliaibilitu for Membership

Each ministerial member of the North Carolina Conference (associate, full, probationary or full time local pastor) who is serving full time in a charge or other work by episcopal appointment, and such work is contributing to the minister's United Methodist pension credit shall be eligible to join. In order to remain an active, participating member, the ministerial member or lay pastor must continue to serve full time in a charge or other work under episcopal appointment that contributes to the minister's United Methodist pension credit. Membership in this Fund is certainly in the minister's best interest, but it is not mandatory. The period of enrollment for all ministers is January 1-31 of each year, when full payment for previous year's service is made.

Ministerial members who transfer into the Conference or new ministers receiving appointments for the first time are eligible to join the Fund in January of the year following the Annual Conference session in which their credentials were recognized. Ministers in these categories applying for membership will be assessed on the basis of their total remuneration for the seven months between June I and December 31 computed to a

twelve months amount.

A full time local pastor may continue as a member of the M inisters' Retirement Fund only during the time he/she is serving under episcopal appointment and earning pension credit.

Each new member of the Fund shall file an application form. Upon filing of application for membership and paying the recommended assessment for one year, his/her membership becomes effective.

Assessments

Funds shall be placed in the Conference budget annually equal to an amount of one percent (I%) of the total salaries and utilities paid to all pastors and associates of the Conference based upon the Conference Journal figures for the year preceding the year in which the budget request is made to the Annual Conference. This amount will be apportioned to charges on the same basis as all other Conference budget items.

Each minister in a pastoral appointment shall pay into the Fund one percent (1%) of all money excluding travel he/she receives each year from the charge or charges he/she is serving and/or Conference sources (this includes salary, utility allowances, Equitable Salary Fund payments. Duke Endowment Funds, and missionary sources).

The Council on Finance and Administration shall make provision for payment equal to one percent (1%) of salary usually paid by the charge for district superintendents and ministers employed by the Council on Ministries. District superintendents and Council on Ministries ministerial employees shall pay one percent (1%) of their income designated as salary and utilities.

All other ministers who participate in the Fund shall pay a sum equivalent to two percent (2%) of their annual salary and utility allowances.

Deadline for Receipt of Payments

The fiscal year of the Ministers' Retirement Fund shall be the same as that of the Annual Conference fiscal year, January 1 through December 31. Each member of the Fund shall submit the required payment no later than January 31 of each year. No later than December 1 of each year, the Conference treasurer shall notify all members that this payment is due. Payments made after January 31 will be credited to the minister's account for the following year. If he/she has been a member less than ten (10) years this delayed payment extends the period prior to dividend payments for one year. If the minister has been a member over ten (10) years, he/she will collect no dividends for the year of delayed payment.

Base Benefits

Base benefits shall be paid to retired members of the Retirement Fund as follows:
If retired at the end of one year of membership \$200.00
If retired at the end of two years of membership
If retired at the end of three years of membership
If retired at the end of four years of membership
If retired at the end of five years of membership 600.00
If retired at the end of six years of membership
If retired at the end of seven years of membership 800.00
If retired at the end of eight years of membership
If retired at the end of nine years of membership
If retired at the end of ten years of membership
If retired at the end of eleven years of membership
If retired at the end of twelve years of membership
If retired at the end of thirteen years of membership
If retired at the end of fourteen years of membership
If retired at the end of fifteen years of membership
If retired at the end of sixteen years of membership
If retired at the end of seventeen years of membership
If retired at the end of eighteen years of membership
If retired at the end of nineteen years of membership 2,000.00
If retired at the end of twenty years of membership
If retired at the end of twenty-one years of membership
If retired at the end of twenty-two years of membership
If retired at the end of twenty-three years of membership
If retired at the end of twenty-four years of membership
If retired at the end of twenty-five years of membership

After ten years of membership, a member is eligible to receive dividends credited to his/her account and payable in addition to the base benefit upon retirement. In no case would the member receive less at retirement than the member's contributions plus passbook interest.

Dividends

Any funds remaining after retirement benefits have been paid to eligible members retiring at the Annual Conference shall be divided into equal parts and credited to the accounts of those who have been participating members for ten years or longer and are not in arrears for the previous year(s).

Death Benefits

When a participating member of the Fund dies, the treasurer shall pay to his/her named beneficiary or beneficiaries designated, otherwise pay to his/her estate, the full amount of the basic benefit payments plus the dividends added to his/her account.

Each member shall provide the Conference treasurer and the Board of Pensions a statement, naming the beneficiary or beneficiaries to whom these funds are to be paid in the event of death before retirement.

Payment of Retirement Benefits

At retirement, members who have accrued the same years credit in the Fund (during the same years) will receive exactly the same benefit regardless of their total individual contributions.

A minister who retires with less than ten (10) years credit in the Fund will be paid immediately following the session of the Annual Conference at which time he/she retires, the total amount as prescribed by the formula for retired members. A minister with ten (10) or more years credit in the Fund shall be paid in two payments, an amount equal to the total dividend accrued plus the base payment for the years of membership. The first payment shall be the amount for which the member has paid taxes and the second payment shall be for the balance in the member's account. The remainder of the amount accrued to the minister's credit shall be paid to him/her in a lump sum between January 1 and January 10 of the year following the year in which the minister retires. This amount will draw simple interest from June 1 to December 31 computed at the current bank passbook interest rate paid by a bank located in the city of Raleigh (the "passbook rate") in effect on December 15 prior to the January payment. The total January payment should be reported as ordinary income for income tax purposes.

Disability Leave

A minister who is approved for and placed on disability leave may elect to receive payment of benefits under one of the following options:

I. The same as a retiring minister.

II. The same as a transferring member.

III. Remain as an active member and pay two percent (2%) of the disability pay received from all sources.

IV. Receive all benefits within ten (10) days following the determination of disability status by the Conference Joint Committee on Disability.

The minister shall notify the Conference Treasurer in writing of his/her choice of option within ten (10) days following the adjournment of Annual Coference or declaration of disability leave.

Membership Transferring

Any ministerial member who leaves the North Carolina Conference by transfer to another annual conference of the United Methodist Church will not make any further payment to the Fund. He/she may leave his/her holdings (including dividends, if any) in the Fund until retirement. If this is done, the retirement benefit will be computed as of the date of transfer from the North Carolina Conference with passbook interest added from that date to the date of retirement. If the funds are held, and the minister returns to the North Carolina Conference, he/she may reinstate his/her payments and dividend earnings, effective at the time of transfer back into this Conference.

Penalties

If any member of the Fund fails to contribute his/her required contribution for three consecutive years, he/she shall be required to withdraw from membership in the Fund. Withdrawing from the Fund

If a member desires to withdraw from the Fund prior to retirement, upon a written request to the Conference treasurer and the Board of Pensions, he/she shall receive an amount equal to the amount he/she has paid into the Fund, plus the simple interest computed at the "passbook rate" which was in effect each year he/she was participating in the Fund, and terminate his/her membership in the Fund.

Each member whose membership is terminated in the Fund in any way will provide the Conference treasurer with a statement indicating that he/she has received funds for which he/she is eligible, and that he/she is no longer a member of the Fund. Any minister leaving

the North Carolina Conference to join another denomination will be required to withdraw from the Fund and payment will be made to the minister according to the above formula.

Reinstatement

A member who has withdrawn from the Fund may not be reinstated, but is required to begin anew as though he/she were a new member. A minister shall not be permitted to join the Ministers' Retirement Fund more than two (2) times during his/her ministerial career.

New Rules and Constitutional Provisions

At the time these rules and guidelines are adopted, all previous legislation regulating this Fund shall be null and void.

PETITIONS TO GENERAL CONFERENCE

MINISTERIAL STANDARDS

The North Carolina Annual Conference petitions the General Conference of The United Methodist Church, meeting in 1988, to retain the present wording of *The Book of Discipline*, ¶402.2. (The wording is as follows: While such persons set apart by the Church for the ministry of Word, Sacrament, and Order are subject to all the frailities of the human condition and pressures of society, they are required to maintain the highest standards represented by the practice of fidelity in marriage and celibacy in singleness. Since the practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching, self-avowed practicing homosexuals are not to be accepted as candidates, ordained as ministers, or appointed to serve in The United Methodist Church.)

FUNDING OF GAY CAUCUSES OR GROUPS

The North Carolina Annual Conference petitions the 1988 General Conference of The United Methodist Church to retain the wording of *The Book of Discipline*, ¶906.12. (The council shall be responsible for ensuring that no board, agency, committee, commission, or council shall give United Methodist funds to any "gay" caucus or group, or otherwise use such funds to promote the acceptance of homosexuality. The council shall have the right to stop such expenditures.)

WORLD COMMUNION OFFERING

Whereas the World Communion Offering is authorized by the General Conference and is to be observed on or near the first Sunday in October: and

Whereas The Book of Discipline 1984, ¶¶272.3 and 916.4, authorizes that the receipts, after payment of promotional costs shall be divided as follows: 50 percent to the Crusade Scholarship Committee, 35 percent to the Ethnic Minority Scholarship Program and 15 percent to the Ethnic Minority In-Service Training Program; and

Whereas 50 percent of this money is specified for ethnic minorities, who, according to promotional material, may be persons in the United States, and a portion of the remaining 50% may go for Crusade Scholarships for persons in the United States as well as for international students: and

Whereas the nature of World Communion Sunday is to emphasize the Holy Commun-

ion as being celebrated worldwide that day; and

Whereas the formula for dividing the offering leaves the possibility that at least half, and probably more than half, of this offering goes for ministries to those within the United States;

Therefore, be it resolved that the North Carolina Annual Conference petitions the General Conference of 1988 to set clearly the distribution of the World Communion Offering, so that over one-half must go to ministries beyond the United States of America.

AFRICA CHURCH GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

Whereas the General Conference of 1980 and 1984 approved and provided funding channels for a program known as Africa Church Growth and Development with components of: evangelism and community development, leadership development, and church construction, and

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Whereas the Africa Church Growth and Development Program has proved to be a justified "new model" for serving both existing and new opportunities and challenges of church growth and development, offering opportunities for self-determination and mutual sharing and cooperation of United Methodist churches in Africa, Europe, and United States of America, and

Whereas continuation of this program is vital to the churches of Africa, Europe and the

United States of America,

Therefore be it resolved that the North Carolina Conference Board of Missions does hereby recommend that the General Conference of 1988 authorize the continuation of the Africa Church Growth and Development Program as a global program, covering Africa, Europe, and the United States of America with undergirding through the Advance For Christ and His Church and with programmatic relationship through the General Board of Global Ministries (GBGM), and

Be it further resolved that this program report to the 1992 General Conference through

the GBGM reporting system.

INVESTMENT IN UNITED METHODIST DEVELOPMENT FUND

Add to The Book of Discipline 1984, ¶1604.16:

16. The General Board of Pensions shall as soon as feasible and by January 1, 1992, invest at least ten percent (10%) of its undesignated pension and benefit funds in the United Methodist Development Fund or other responsible United Methodist agencies for the purpose of lending those funds for establishing new congregations. Each loan is to be underwritten by the Annual Conference in which the new congregation is located. These funds shall accrue income at the rate established by the Directors of the General Board of Pensions.

Rationale: The United Methodist Church needs a substantial amount of funds for establishing and developing new congregations. Establishing new congregations is an essential growth strategy for the denomination if it is to make significant strides towards reaching its goal of doubling its membership. Those denominations that have begun more congregations than they have closed in the last fifteen years have grown in membership. Those denominations that have closed more congregations than they have begun have lost in total membership. The United Methodist Church is in the latter category. The answer is obvious. The United Methodist Church must make a concerted effort to establish thousands of new congregations during the last three quadrennia of the twentieth century. Such an endeavor is extremely expensive. Where can our denomination find such money? The answer is in the coffers of the General Board of Pensions. There are now more than two billion dollars in the funds of the General Board of Pensions. These funds are held for the lay and clergy persons serving the denomination and who have served in the past.

Investing in a United Methodist congregation is probably the safest investment that could be made, especially when loans are quaranteed by the Annual Conference in which the church is located. The amount earned by investors in The United Methodist Development Fund is equivalent to earnings on the very best bonds. In addition, such an investment in the growth of the denomination will insure support for the Board of Pensions in future

decades.

RESPONSIBLE PARENTHOOD

To the members of the 1988 General Conference, The United Methodist Church: The North Carolina Annual Conference petitions that the following resolution be adopted as a replacement for the resolution of the same name adopted by the 1976 General Conference

and printed on pages 91-94 of the Book of Resolutions 1984.

We affirm the principle of responsible parenthood. The family in its varying forms is the fundamental unit of society and constitutes the primary focus of love, acceptance and nurture, bringing fulfillment to parents and children. Healthful and whole personhood develops as one is loved, responds to love and in that relationship comes to wholeness as a child of God.

Each married couple has the right and the duty prayerfully and responsibly to control conception according to their circumstances. They are in our view free to use those means of conception control considered medically safe including abstinence and voluntary sterilization. The decision whether or not to conceive children must include acceptance of

the responsibility to provide for their spiritual, moral, mental and physical growth.

To support the sacred dimensions of personhood, all reasonable efforts should be made by parents and the community to ensure that every conceived child enters the world with a healthy body and is born into an environment conducive to spiritual, moral, mental and physical growth so that the child may reach his or her full potential and become a positively contributing member of society.

In accordance with the Scriptures all sexual intercourse outside of marriage is forbidden Therefore all unmarried persons should abstain from sexual intercourse, thereby avoiding conception and contributing to the development of that community environment conducive to healthy spiritual, moral, mental and physical growth.

We call upon our churches to:

Provide spiritual and moral leadership and guidance for all families, providing fellowship and relational support during times of pregnancy, wanted or unwanted.

Provide spiritual and moral education on human sexuality and family life, including means of marriage enrichment, rights of children born and unborn, responsible and joyful expression of sexuality in marriage, abstinence from sexual intercourse outside of marriage and responsible attitudes toward male and female roles in family relationships.

Provide spiritual and moral counseling opportunities for married couples and those

approaching marriage on the principles of responsible parenthood.

4. Make information and materials available to married couples so that they can exercise responsible choice in the area of conception control. We support the free and morally responsible flow of information on reputable, effective and safe nonprescription contraceptive techniques through educational programs and through periodicals and other advertising media directed toward married couples.

Encourage and assist the states to make provisions in law and practice for the care 5. and treatment of minors who have, or think they have, venereal diseases, or female minors who are, or think they are, pregnant, after notifying and soliciting the support of their parents or guardians. Support of parents is crucially important and most desirable on such occasions and therefore they should be notified, but needed care and treatment should not be contingent on their support.

Understand the family as encompassing a wider range of options than that of the two-generational unit of parents and children (the nuclear family); promote the development of all spiritually, morally, and socially responsible and life enhancing expressions of the extended family, including families with adopted children, single parents, those with no children and those who choose to be single, remembering that

unmarried persons must abstain from sexual activity.

View parenthood in the widest possible framework, recognizing that many children of the world today desperately need functioning parents and also understanding that adults can realize the choice and fulfillment of parenthood through adoption or foster care.

Encourage men and women to demonstrate actively their responsibility by creating a family context of spiritual, moral, mental and physical nurture and growth in which the children will have the opportunity to share in the mutual love and concern of

their parents.

Be aware of the fears of many in poor and minority groups and in developing nations about imposed conception planning and birth control, oppose any coercive use of such policies and services, and strive to see that conception planning programs respect the dignity of each individual person as well as the cultural diversities of groups.

PRISON MINISTRY

We support the recommendation of the Prison Ministry Task Force and ask that General Conference adopt this plan calling for an active program of prison ministry and criminal justice ministry in each annual conference.

IMPLEMENTATION PLAN AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- Recognizing that criminal justice ministry is one aspect of securing Peace with Justice, we recommend that the Council of Bishops:
 - a. Build an awareness through a church-wide study of the criminal justice system

- and the need for this ministry.
- b. Give encouragement for those members already involved in such ministries; and c. Give leadership by advocating for the development of effective ministries.
- c. Give leadership by advocating for the development of effective ministries.

 We recommend that each Conference Council on Ministries establish a Committee
- on Prison Ministries, with linkage to conference boards which will:
 - a. Raise awareness and generate local church involvement
 - b. Identify existing programs
 - c. Promote criminal justice ministries
 - d. Serve as resource and connectional link with local churches, general program agencies, and ecumenical groups
 - e. Use the Model Components for Effective Ministry identified in this report.
- Each bishop, district superintendent and conference council director will be asked to visit at least one prison or jail in their area each year and report on the significance of prison and jail ministries and prison reform and to report to clergy and laity in their areas.
- We recommend that, in the observance of Human Relations Sunday, congregations focus on police/community relations and criminal justice ministry along with the need to be aware of the worth, dignity and potential of all persons.
 We recommend that each local church and council on ministries or administrative
- We recommend that each local church and council on ministries or administrative council engage in biblical and theological study related to the criminal justice system in the United States, starting with the Biblical/Theological Perspectives and the Model Components for Effective Ministry in this report.
 General boards and agencies shall serve to support the annual conference and local
- church in implementing criminal justice ministries
 - a. General Council on Ministries will develop an ongoing consultative structure:
 - 1) To receive updates annually from each program board
 - To convene an interagency group at least annually to coordinate the basis of these reports, to consult with and to challenge each other to increasing ministry
 - 3) To assure that general agencies provide leadership development opportunities for those involved in criminal justice ministries for the exchange of ideas and examination of experiences
 - To coordinate the development and distribution of an informational brochure of available resources and programs
 - b. General Board of Discipleship
 - 1) General Board of Publication and General Board of Discipleship will work with General Board of Higher Education and Ministry to set up a plan to send surplus devotional and/or spiritual development resources free of charge to United Methodist-endorsed prison chaplains, based on the requests of such chaplains. Congregations are encouraged to sponsor gift subscriptions of such resources for prisons and jails, after consultations with appropriate chaplains
 - Develop a packet of resource materials (including bibliography) based on the model component for use in annual conferences and local churches
 - c. General Board of Higher Education and Ministry will:
 - Work with annual conferences to recruit and affirm chaplains for jails and prisons in their boundaries
 - Emphasize the importance for United Methodist theological schools to provide clinical pastoral education training in penal institutions as well as other sources on criminal justice ministries
 - 3) Provide a bi-annual retreat for prison/jail chaplains
 - d. General Board of Church and Society will:
 - Give primary emphasis to and guidance for addressing criminal justice reform and advocacy
 - 2) Monitor and support the continuing development of federal and state policies and legislation related to criminal justice
 - e. General Board of Global Ministries will:
 - Continue to support The Women in Crisis program and other criminal justice related programs, including assignment of church and community workers

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and national division staff to Criminal Justice Ministries. GCOM will receive progress reports from agencies and report to the 1992 General Conference

WORLD SERVICE, CONFERENCE BENEVOLENCES AND APPORTIONMENTS

To the members of the 1988 General Conference, The United Methodist Church, we petition that *The Book of Discipline 1984*, ¶247.14 which now reads:

As soon as practicable after the session of Annual Conference, each district superintendent or designated agent shall notify each local church in the district what amounts have been apportioned to it for World Service and Conference Benevolences. Following the Annual Conference, it shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the lay member(s) of the Annual Conference and/or the church lay leader(s) to present to a meeting of each Charge Conference a statement of the apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences, explaining the causes supported by each of these funds and their place in the total program of the Church. The district superintendent or designated agent shall also notify each Charge Conference of all other amounts properly apportioned to it.

Be amended by adding: (Insert after the first sentence the following)

This notification shall include a complete breakdown of the World Service, Conference Benevolences and any other apportionments, specifying the amounts apportioned for each board and agency of the Church and for each fund and each benevolence being apportioned.

¶247.14 as amended would then read as follows:

As soon as practicable after the session of Annual Conference, each district superintendent or designated agent shall notify each local church in the district what amounts have been apportioned to it for World Service and Conference Benevolences. This notification shall include a complete breakdown of the World Service, Conference Benevolences and any other apportionments, specifying the amounts apportioned for each board and agency of the Church and for each fund and each benevolence being apportioned. Following the Annual Conference, it shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the lay member(s) of the Annual Conference and/or the church lay leader(s) to present to a meeting of each Charge Conference a statement of the apportioments for World Service and Conference Benevolences, explaining the causes supported by each of these funds and their place in the total program of the Church. The district superintendent or designated agent shall also notify each Charge Conference of all other amounts properly apportioned to it. **RATIONALE**

This information is essential in order for the pastor, lay member(s) or lay leader(s) to properly explain the scope and significance of the various apportionments to the Charge Conference.

PEACE WITH JUSTICE

WHEREAS, the 1988 General Conference will be considering a new Missional Priority for the next quadrennium.

We, the North Carolina Conference request that Peace with Justice be adopted as this priority, and

We petition the 1988 General Conference to this effect.

RESOLUTIONS

ACQUIRED IMMUNE DEFICIENCY SYNDROME (AIDS)

WHEREAS, one of our society's greatest emerging health and social threats is the increasing AIDS epidemic, and

WHEREAS, by now almost everyone knows or has known of someone stricken by the disease, and

WHEREAS, the National Center for Disease Control forecasts that, unless better treatments are found, by the end of 1991 the total number of AIDS cases in this country will reach 270,000 with 179,000 deaths (over three times the American death toll in the Vietnam War), and

WHEREAS, our society is still content to limit its perception of AIDS to being only a disease affecting certain minorities, and

WHEREAS, the AIDS epidemic has been met with increasing fear and

misunderstanding.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church go on record as supporting efforts to prevent and control AIDS through medical research and education, including the use of the media and sex education in schools and churches, and as encouraging sexual abstinence in singleness, and fidelity in marriage, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the North Carolina local churches conduct a program of AIDS awareness during the coming conference year and establish ministries of out-

reach, pastoral care and concern to and for AIDS victims and their families, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Conference ask our Bishop to appoint an AIDS Task Force to work in cooperation with the Executive Director of the Council on Ministries to develop a resource curriculum on AIDS for local churches, as well as to identify qualified persons available to conduct AIDS awareness seminars in the local churches.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Conference publicly express support for AIDS prevention/education legislation, such as NC House Bill 490, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution be sent to members of the North Carolina State Legislature.

APPRECIATION OF P. WESLEY AITKEN

WHEREAS, P. Wesley Aitken has served as a member of the North Carolina Conference

since transferring from the West Virginia Conference in 1954; and

WHEREAS, P. Wesley Aitken was recruited to be the first full-time chaplain at Duke University Hospital in 1956, and has served as Director of Duke University Medical Center's Chaplains Service since that time; and

WHEREAS, P. Wesley Aitken has been pastor, friend, and colleague to countless patients and their families as well as staff members of the Medical Center and has served as a pastoral colleague to pastors of the North Carolina Conference (as well as other pastors) in ministering to members of their congregations; and

WHEREAS, under the leadership and direction of P. Wesley Aitken, the Chaplains Service at Duke University Medical Center has grown from one chaplain to a staff of four

senior staff chaplains and 15 to 20 chaplain interns and residents; and

WHEREAS, under the guidance and ministry of P. Wesley Aitken, numerous pastors, chaplains, and CPE supervisors and pastoral counselors have been enabled to become better ministers, chaplains, and pastors because of the teaching role he has exercised as Director of the Chaplains Service; and

WHEREAS, P. Wesley Aitken has been a leader in the "Clinical Training" movement, helping to found the North Carolina Chaplains' Association and serving in various regional

and national offices of the Association for Clinical Pastoral Education; and

WHEREAS, P. Wesley Aitken will retire this year from the position of Director of the

Chaplains Service at Duke University Medical Center;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church meeting at Methodist College in Fayetteville, North Carolina, June 8 through 11, 1987, does establish the P. Wesley Aitken Award, to be presented to persons who have rendered long and faithful service to a Health and Welfare Agency or Institution related to the North Carolina Conference on recommendation of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries of the North Carolina Conference; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the P. Wesley Aitken Award is presented this year to the one in whose honor it is established in grateful appreciation for the outstanding leadership and ministry he has performed to countless persons, patients, pastors, and professional colleagues as he has served as Chaplain and Director of Chaplains Service at the Duke Medical Center and as he has served the Lord Jesus Christ as an ordained United Methodist

Minister in membership in the North Carolina Conference.

CAPITAL PUNISHMENT FOR MINORS

WHEREAS, United Methodists have taken a stance against capital punishment (See Book of Resolutions, 1984, for resolutions from 1980, pp. 109-111, and from 1984, p. 401), and our Book of Discipline states in part, "In the love of Christ who came to save those who are lost and vulnerable, we urge the creation of genuinely new systems of rehabilitation that will restore, preserve, and nurture the humanity of the imprisoned. For the same reason, we oppose capital punishment and urge its elimination from all criminal codes." (Crime and Rehabilitation. ¶ 74F, 1984);

WHEREAS, North Carolina Law allows for the execution of persons as young as 14 years

old when they are convicted of capital crimes;

WHEREAS, it seems unlikely that current public opinion will allow for the abolition of all capital punishment in the near future;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Conference of the United

Methodist Church stands opposed to capital punishment for minors;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to members of the North Carolina press and State Legislature.

COMMITTEE ON NATIVE AMERICAN MINISTRIES

WHEREAS, the National Division of the General Board of Global Ministries has established a Native American Urban Ministries Initiative;

WHEREAS, Raleigh and Fayetteville are among the cities selected by the National

Division for focused ministries:

WHEREAS, this project will lead The United Methodist Church in the development of innovative and creative ministries to meet the spiritual, physical, and social needs of Native Americans in targeted urban areas;

WHEREAS, the National Division has allocated \$145,000 for 1987 and \$255,000 for 1988, with a total of \$1,141,000 projected nationally over a five year period (1987-1991) for this program initiative, including funds for leadership development, human resourcing and technical assistance, coordination of efforts, and documentation for sharing with others;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Council on Ministries endorse North Carolina Conference participation in the program, refer this resolution to the Board of Missions for the purpose of establishing by January 1, 1988, in consultation with the Cabinet Task Force on Native American Ministries, a Native American Urban Ministries sub-committee, which committee will become, upon approval by the 1987 Annual Conference, a committee of the Annual Conference, in association with the Board of Missions.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Committee on Native American Urban Ministries make its first task a preliminary probe process in Raleigh and in Fayetteville to gather data,

resources, and information on possibilities for Native American ministries.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Committee on Native American Urban Ministries seek to find ways for the North Carolina Annual Conference to participate in the Native American Urban Ministries Initiative of the National Division of the General Board of Global Ministries.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Committee on Native American Urban Ministries establish an itemized budget with shared responsibilities among the National Division, the North Carolina Annual Conference, and other boards and agencies.

FARM CRISIS IN NORTH CAROLINA

The Farm Crisis, which has received so much attention in the media in the past year, is not some distant problem for large scale farmers in the mid-west. It is right here, right now, especially striking the family farmer, who has been the backbone for so many rural church communities.

Some sobering statistics:

- in 1986 North Carolina was #1 in the nation in terms of farms lost, over 3,000.
- 10,000 North Carolina Farmers were projected by North Carolina State University to leave the farm in 1986.
- Farm land values are down by as much as 50% in some eastern counties, and down 20% in value state-wide.

of more than 7,400 Farmers Home Administration loans approved in the state, 1,360 are behind on loan payments (18.4%).

Clearly this crisis deserves special attention of the North Carolina Conference. We salute our Bishop for calling a special meeting on the farm crisis in January to hear the plight of our farmers. However, direct action by our Annual Conference is now needed to show our support for those who literally out the food on our tables.

THEREFORE WE RECOMMEND:

- That all United Methodists in the North Carolina Annual Conference, including all of our Conference institutions (colleges, retirement homes, and camps), have as a priority buying and serving North Carolina grown food. Currently 70% of all vegetables and fruits purchased in North Carolina come from out-of-state.
- That we support the efforts of the United Farm Organization, a grass-roots movement that has set up hot-line information and counselling services for farmers in our area.
- That we encourage local churches to host members of the United Farm Organization, and other groups such as the Rural Advancement Fund, to speak in our churches to educate persons on the depth of the North Carolina Farm Crisis.
- That we support the efforts of those in the N. C. Legislature to pass a moratorium on farm loan foreclosures in the next two years, in order to enable farmers to re-schedule their debt.

(Passed by North Carolina Chapter, Methodist Federation for Social Action.)

GAMBLING

WHEREAS, the Social Principles of The United Methodist Church state that gambling is a menace to society, deadly to the best interests of moral, social, economic and spiritual life, and destructive of good government;

WHEREAS, while some forms of gambling may appear harmless, gambling feeds covetousness, promotes the idea that a person can get "something for nothing," allows some to profit from the losses of the many, is destructive of persons, families, and human character, and is contrary to scripture;

WHEREAS, legalized gambling is a regressive tax in that the poor provide a dispropor-

tionate portion of the monies collected;

WHEREAS, the good "ends" of providing needed governmental services do not justify utilizing a means of collecting revenue that has so many destructive effects on the quality of human life and character;

WHEREAS, legalized gambling as a means of raising governmental revenue is increasing, and support for a lottery or some other unacceptable means of raising revenue in North Carolina is increasing;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED. THAT

- a. at the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church go on record as strongly and unequivocally opposed to any effort to bring about legalized gambling in North Carolina and is respectfully requesting all members of the North Carolina General Assembly to oppose it; and
- the clergy of the Conference call attention to the biblical basis for the Church's condemnation of gambling and to the destructive effects of gambling and that local churches work to end all forms of gambling, including selling chances to raise money in the local church; and
- c. all United Methodist churches and church members be encouraged to make known to the members of the General Assembly the opposition of The United Methodist Church and their own opposition to legalized gambling; and
- d. the Conference Secretary forward copies of this resolution to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, and all members of the General Assembly of North Carolina.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE AS UNITED METHODIST HISTORICAL SITE

WHEREAS, Louisburg College had its original charter granted January 6, 1787, making it the oldest chartered denominational junior college in the nation, and

WHEREAS, Louisburg College has been long associated with the North Carolina

Conference of the United Methodist Church as owner and supporter of their mutual mission in Christian higher education, and

WHEREAS, Louisburg College this year of 1987 is conducting a public celebration of its

200th anniversary,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church that the General Commission on Archives and History be petitioned to make Lousiburg College one of the United Methodist shrines and landmarks and be so recognized as an historical location on the Historical Tour Guide of the United Methodist Church.

PRISON REFORM

WHEREAS, United Methodists have a longstanding concern for the incarcerated, after the manner of Jesus (Matthew 25:36), and John Wesley, who did not hesitate to minister

among the imprisoned;

WHEREAS, the Book of Discipline, 1984, states, "In the love of Christ who came to save those who are lost and vulnerable, we urge the creation of genuinely new systems of rehabilitation that will restore, preserve, and nurture the humanity of the imprisoned." (Crime and Rehabilitation, ¶74F);

WHEREAS, prisons in North Carolina are badly overcrowded, with a system designed for approximately 13,000 now holding 18,000 persons (see *Raleigh Times*, 2/12/87, p. 3-D

for other details of overcrowding);

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church supports the easing of such overcrowding, and the building of more humane conditions to meet and conform with federal minimum standards;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that United Methodists in the North Carolina Conference

seek ways to minister to and among the imprisoned in their local settings;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to members of the North Carolina press and State Legislature.

PROPOSED RACE TRACK

WHEREAS, Mount Zion Church, organized in 1804, and at its current location since 1924, making it one of the oldest churches in Eastern North Carolina finds itself confronted with the initial stages of construction of a dirt race track for automobile races within approximately 300 vards of the Church.

WHEREAS, there are also three other United Methodist Churches in Nash and Wilson Counties in close proximity to this proposed track as well as approximately 20 other

churches.

WHEREAS, there is a great deal of Church-wide and community concern for the effects that this track will have upon our quality of life, property values, maintenance of our churches and our homes because of dust, the increased traffic that would frequent this establishment could present danger for our families on these rural roads, and also the noise level that such a facility would produce would be deafening and prevent many church and family activities.

WHEREAS, there has been the establishment of Nash/Wilson C.A.R.T. (Citizens Against Race Track), Inc. to increase public awareness, sensitivity, and an organization to combat this threat to our peace. CART has made the definite commitment to proceed through our

court systems to enjoin this construction.

WHEREAS, The National Division of the Board of Global Ministries in New York has seen fit to make a financial grant for emergency assistance for legal expenses and a representative from the Church and Community Ministries Program will be coming to Eastern North Carolina within the next two weeks from Nashville to further assist our efforts and strategies.

WHEREAS, We are a connectional family of United Methodists across North Carolina; and when one part of the family celebrates we all celebrate and when another part is in need

and hurts we all hurt. And families do stick together!

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church offers its moral support to the sisters and brothers in the Mount Zion community by supporting their actions strongly opposing this track as they attempt to continue a growing ministry and tradition. They are not asking for dollars, they are,

however, asking for a vote of confidence from this Annual Conference. The North Carolina Conference taking this action most certainly affirms our connectional system.

SUPPORT OF FULL DIVESTMENT

WHEREAS, the 1984 General Conference of the United Methodist Church, by resolution, stated: "The apartheid system as practiced in Namibia and South Africa is legalized racism in its cruelest form" (*The Book of Resolutions, 1984, page 409*); and

WHEREAS, the General Conference, by resolutions, 1904, page 409; and United Methodists and United Methodist institutions to "close accounts with and withdraw funds from banks and divest from corporations doing business in South Africa" (The Book of Resolutions, 1984,

page 411); and

WHEREAS, most United Methodist general agencies have complied with the 1984 General Conference resolution, including the General Council on Finance and Administration, the General Board of Church and Society, the United Methodist Publishing House has also complied with full divestment; and

WHEREAS, the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church continues to

invest in corporations doing business in South Africa;

BE IT RESOLVED, The North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church supports full divestment by the General Board of Pensions of funds invested in businesses and corporations doing business in South Africa.

VICTIM RESTITUTION

WHEREAS, as caring and Christian People, we are called to be in ministry to all of God's children, including the ones "by the road" (Luke 10:29-37, The Good Samaritan);

WHEREAS, victims of crime are often forgotten in the legal process:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we support fair, legitimate, and legal initiatives for "victim restitution," such as People Assisting Victims and community-based penalty programs;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we call upon the North Carolina State Legislature to create vehicles for victims to gain financial redress from criminals and emotional redress including community mental health and family counseling services:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to members of the

North Carolina press and State Legislature.

SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTIONAL COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Bishop Minnick and lay and clergy members of the North Carolina Annual Conference, it is a distinct pleasure to have the opportunity to report to you on behalf of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference Council on Ministries.

1. Last summer 9,869 persons attended program events sponsored by the SEJ COM

and the several associations/fellowships related to the Council.

2. For the summer of 1987, we anticipate 13,000 persons attending SEJ events at Lake Junaluska. This is an increase of over 3,000 persons. We want you to be a part of this experience as we focus on the theme "Witness for God." Some of the outstanding programs planned for the summer of 1987 are: June 21·26 · Music Week, June 26·28 · United Methodist Men's Convocation, July 1·5 · Mission Week (Glenn Olds), July 5·10 · Ministers Week and Leader Development (Mouzon Biggs and Bill Mallard), July 10·12 · EMLC Convocation and UM College Trustee Workshop, July 19·23 · Prayer and Bible Conference (Maurice Boyd), July 23·26 · Laity Conference (Bishop Richard Wilke), July 26·August 1 · Camp Meeting, August 3·7 · Small Membership Church Convocation (Harold Bales and Karl Jones) and Workshop for Church Leaders, and August 10·14 · Older Adult Convocation. These and other programs are described in the issue of the SEJ United Methodist which has been distributed at this Conference.

 The most significant change in the operation of the SEJ COM during the past year has been the addition of the program responsibilities formerly related to the Lake Junaluska Assembly. These include Children's Ministries, Youth Ministry, Health and Fitness Ministry, Staff Ministry, under the direction of the Reverend Millsaps Dye; and the Ministry of the Intentional Growth Center, whose director is Dr. Mark Rouch. Along with these program responsibilities, the SEJ COM received the program funds from the Jurisdictional Administration Fund which were being administered by the Lake Junaluska Assembly. The summer of 1987 will be the first summer in which this will be operative. We trust that this change will serve to enhance these ministries as we seek to serve you, the United Methodist people in the Southeast.

As we look to the future, and we must, two things seem to stand out in bold relief against a "bright" horizon. The first is the need to take many of our ministries to the annual conferences, the districts, and - in rare cases - local churches. This does not mean that we lan to reduce our leadership development enterprises on the jurisdictional level. Instead, it is viewed as an expansion of it. The purpose is not to compete with the leader development

programs of the annual conferences but to supplement them.

The second concern is the need for each annual conference to pay 100 percent of its apportionment to the Jurisdictional Administration Fund. It is a very small item in your budget, but it is the only primary source of funding that we have to provide program administration and support for the Southeastern Jurisdiction. I can assure you that we are doing everything possible to keep the budget balanced. Though the amount apportioned to the annual conferences has increased significantly during the present quadrennium, the amount paid by the annual conferences has not. This is causing a real shortfall in our budget. I encourage all United Methodists to pay all apportioned items in full. If there are problems that need to be addressed, let us address them forthrightly, not in a tangential

manner by withholding funds.

As I complete my first year of ministry as Executive Secretary of the SEJ COM, exciting things continue to happen in the areas of mission and Ethnic Minority concerns under the guidance of Dr. Israel Rucker, Renfro Trust Fund Grants totaling \$21,500 have been distributed; the SEJ Association for Native American Ministries is beginning to make significant strides in its programs; the SEJ UMVIM program continues to grow; and an exciting EMLC Convocation is planned for July. Dr. Robert Pitzer continues to lead SEMAR, the Southeastern Methodist Agency for the Retarded in aggressive plans and programs of ministry for and with persons of handicapping conditions. We in the Southeast are doing more in this special area of ministry than the rest of our entire denomination. Dr. David Abernathy has guided us in the area of Communication and Public Relations to redesign the format of the SEJ United Methodist, gives award-winning supervision to the Protestant Hour Radio ministry, and is working to produce the first Protestant Hour television programs. Mrs. Frances Hart, our newest Director and staff member, serves the Commission on Archives and History. Frances is already proving to be a valuable colleague and is working with the leaders of the Commission to develop an impressive archival program and Heritage center.

Thank you for your prayers, your guidance, and your support. We, the staff of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference Council on Ministries are your servants. Call upon us whenever we can serve you, and come to Lake Junaluska this summer to participate in

one or more of our exciting programs. God bless each of you.

TRUSTEES, CONFERENCE BOARD OF

The Conference Board of Trustees has unanimously voted to recommend to the Annual Conference that the United Methodist Building be renovated for the first time since it was built. The current tenant for the rental area in the United Methodist Building will move out by October 1. 1987: therefore, there will be a change in circumstances in the building.

The Board appointed a building committee to help study and make recommendations. The members of the committee were: Myron Banks, Chairman, Kermit Braswell, Robert Bundy, Sam Dixon, Henry Jones, Belton Joyner, Bishop Minnick, Rufus Stark, Herb Stout, and Pat Wiles. This committee and the Board considered the following options:

- 1. No renovations attempt to lease the rental space without major modification (costs cannot be determined until a tenant is secured).
- 2. A renovation project (cost is a maximum of \$1,900,000).
- 3. Build additional space and finance the construction from rental receipts (cost over \$2,000,000).
- Sell the building and relocate (cost would depend on the specific site and building chosen).

The Board and the Building Committee are recommending the second option. The needs of the Annual Conference were the first considerations in deciding to make this recommendation. The rental matters were considered to be of lesser importance than the program needs of the Conference.

The Board is preparing a presentation on this recommendation to be presented at the Conference orientation sessions and at Annual Conference. There will be a member of the Board or the Building Committee present at each of these sessions to answer questions

about the proposed project.

The presentation made by the Board during its report will be for the purpose of informing the Annual Conference of the details of the proposed project and answering questions. The vote on the project will be taken when the budget is decided during the CFA report on the

Wednesday afternoon session of Annual Conference.

The Board requests your careful consideration of this project. We have studied this matter carefully and believe that this project is appropriate for the Conference offices for a Christian denomination which is looking forward to being a growing, dynamic force in the lives of North Carolina people in the next twenty years.

During the past year, the Conference Board of Trustees has pursued two major efforts. The Trustees are proposing a renovation to the Methodist Building and a formal presentation on that proposal will follow in a few minutes.

The second major effort of the Trustees this year has been in the area of parsonage improvements. The Board has a parsonage committee which administers the funds

appropriated for repair and maintenance in the seven parsonages.

After careful review of the budget for the parsonages, it was determined that insufficient resources had been allocated to accomplish the needed repair and maintenance. The Board requested a supplemental appropriation of \$50,000 from the Council on Finance and Administration to make the needed repairs. The Council granted that appropriation. In the process of determining the specific repairs to be accomplished, the Board determined that one of the parsonages required repair beyond that which was economically feasible. Consequently, the parsonage was sold and a new one has been purchased. The old parsonage was sold for \$182,900 and a new one purchased for \$153,500. The new parsonage has just been built and in the opinion of the Parsonage Committee and the Board, represents a much better residence than the one which was sold. The process of moving the resident from one parsonage to another is under way at this time.

Also, there has been a change in the Council on Ministries staff wherein a lay person has been employed in a position formerly occupied by a clergy person. In response to this change in circumstances, the Board is in the process of selling one of the parsonages. The proceeds from that sale will be put into a reserve fund to provide an additional parsonage in

the future should it be required.

Bishop Minnick, I move the adoption of the report to this point.

And now, for our recommendation concerning the Methodist Building renovations. By way of a brief review of the circumstances which led to this recommendation, the Board received a request in 1985 from the current Methodist Building tenant to lease the

entire building. The Trustees considered that request and received permission from the Conference in 1985 to build an addition to the building. After Annual Conference in 1985, the Trustees were informed by the current tenant that they had changed their mind and would be terminating their lease when it expired in 1987. At Annual Conference last year, this circumstance was reported and the following report was made by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees:

"(We have) asked a committee to study the feasibilty of renovating the present building utilizing some of the space now being rented to meet the expanding Conference needs. The Conference Council on Ministries, which has the major amount of the space used by Conference agencies, was asked to project needs. It is the belief of the Trustees that the additional space needed can be provided in the existing Methodist Building. The Board will make every effort to provide for these changes within existing resources. We do feel it important to report to you that as more space is used for Conference and less for rental purposes, the possibility increases that an annual appropriation will be needed."

The time for consideration of this situation is now here.

The slides which I am about to present have been shown at each of the twelve orientation sessions in preparation for Annual Conference. For those who have seen these slides before, I apologize for the redundancy, but we felt that there would be a significant number of persons present today who would not have seen the presentation. You should have received a copy of the script from the ushers. There was some concern expressed about the appropriateness of the slide of the Baptist State Headquarters in Cary. That concern was only expressed in one district and since the script was printed before the orientation sessions, it is still included in this presentation. I will make an additional comment when it is shown, however. (Slide Presentation)

The vote on the appropriation to support this recommendation will be taken when the budget is debated this afternoon. You will note that there are two line items in the budget concerning this recommendation. Line #63 contains the amount needed to supplement the operating expenses in the building due to the reduction in rental area. Currently, all of

the operating expenses are being paid from rental receipts.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to the members of the Building Committee, Parsonage Committee, and Board of Trustees for their many hours of service. There have been many meetings and difficult decisions to make this year and their dedication to service to our Annual Conference has been most apparent. Special thanks likewise are expressed to Herb Stout and his excellent staff for their support during the year.

Bishop Minnick, I move the adoption of this report as specified on page 98 of *The Conference Programs, Recommendations and Reports 1987*, keeping in mind that approval of this report does not constitute approval of the funds needed to support this recommendation. That issue will be decided when the Annual Conference budget is adopted this afternoon.

UNITED METHODIST FOUNDATION, INCORPORATED

The United Methodist Foundation, Inc. was established primarily as an investment pool available for organizations, churches, and agencies related to the North Carolina Conference, SEJ, of The United Methodist Church. The foundation, also, from time to time receives gifts and bequests on behalf of individuals or organizations and acts as trustee according to the wishes of the donor. As of December 31, 1986, the Methodist Foundation, Inc. completed its 32nd year of service to the North Carolina Conference.

I am pleased to report this past year's operations again reflect a favorable performance. Net dividends paid to unit holders was \$1,288,121, an increase of \$78,781 or 6.5%. These results were quite acceptable as interest rates continue to decline during the year. The total net assets at year's end had a market value of \$17,148,552, an increase of \$2,291,194. This increase was from two sources: \$560,787 in Securities Transactions and new outside funds

from unit holders of \$1,730,407.

The Board of Pensions and the Ministers' Retirement Fund continues to hold 83% of the units with a year end market value of \$14,346,915. First Union National Bank continues to manage the investment portfolio of stocks and bonds and Stockton White manages the

mortgage loan portfolio. We are pleased with the performance of both of these firms. They have exceeded the guidelines as set by the Investment Committee of the United Methodist Foundation and the actual expectations as set out by the General Board of Pensions.

The unqualified audit by McGladrey, Hendrickson & Pullen for the year ending December 31, 1986 is on file in the Conference Treasurer's office for review by any

member of this Conference.

I am pleased to report that the Office of Planned Giving, under the direction of the Reverend Douglas Byrd is making great progress. This stewardship emphasis has now completed five (5) years of operation as a part of the Methodist Foundation. Mr. Byrd has traveled extensively throughout the North Carolina Conference discussing deferred giving with local congregations and individuals. He has implemented many programs to serve the needs of individual donors. This cooperative effort by the local churches and the office of Planned Giving will provide many benefits in the years to come. It is my feeling that this important work will continue to grow. You will hear from Mr. Byrd and his report shortly.

The Methodist Foundation, Inc. has grown to a strong position as an investment pool and Trustee for agencies of this Conference. It is my belief that the Methodist Foundation will continue to serve the Conference well because of the strong foundation and the dedication to sound business investment decisions that are being made by the Investment

Committee and the members of the Methodist Foundation.

PLANNED GIVING, OFFICE OF

Bishop Minnick, members of the Conference and guests...The stewardship of accumulated possessions and the concepts of planned giving are becoming more and more a part of the thoughts and practices relating to our total stewardship. There is increasing evidence that we are becoming more conscious of our stewardship opportunities and responsibilities as they relate to all we hold in trust from God.

The late Gurney P. Hood, a prominent layperson in this Conference and the first president of The Methodist Fund (today known as the United Methodist Foundation, Inc.) set a good example for us in the stewardship of accumulated possessions many years ago when he established a trust fund with the Foundation to help care for a disabled grandchild

whom he knew would need institutional care throughout his lifetime.

Just a little over two months ago his grandson died, and as designated in the original trust agreement, the remainder of the funds reverted to the United Methodist Foundation to help carry forth this stewardship ministry in our Conference. The needs of family were met, but a generous charitable gift to benefit the Church was also possible through careful and thoughtful gift planning.

More and more people are seeing planned gifts as ways of fulfilling stewardship oppor-

tunities and responsibilities.

For the last two years this portion of the report of the United Methodist Foundation to the Annual Conference has included the presentation of "The Circuit Rider Award" to persons who have made major gifts through the Foundation. These donors are recognized as

members of The United Methodist Founders Society.

I am pleased to report to you that three donors are so recognized this year: 1) J. Carroll Joyner of Raleigh, through a generous gift of appreciated securities, funded a permanent endowment to benefit his home church, the Brownings UMC of the Goldsboro District. At Mr. Joyner's request "The Circuit Rider Award" was presented at the Annual Homecoming Celebration at Brownings Church to his mother and father whom he honored by naming this endowment the Albert Allen Joyner and Sula Savannah Joyner Endowment Fund. 2) Mrs. Helen McLawhorn Whitehurst, formerly of Ayden and presently of Raleigh, through a generous gift created the J. Clarence and Helen McLawhorn Whitehurst Scholarship Fund to benefit youth from the Ayden United Methodist Church and community. Due to ill health Mrs. Whitehurst could not attend this Conference, and so "The Circuit Rider Award" was presented to her in a family gathering at Christmastime in the home of her daughter in Raleigh. 3) D. Frank and Mollie Lee Welch of Burlington created the Fairview Christian Education Scholarship Fund several years ago to benefit persons from the Fairview UMC and surrounding community preparing for Christian education vocations and to benefit Christian education enterprises in the Fairview Church community of Alamance County.

They have continued to contribute generously, and during the past year gave a 96 acre farm to benefit the scholarship endowment. We wanted to recognize Frank and Mollie Welch here today, but due to Frank's recent surgery they were unable to be present. "The Circuit Rider Award" will therefore be presented to them in their local church, the Fairview UMC in the Burlington District.

These are examples of Christian stewardship at its best...persons who have made second mile gifts from their accumulated possessions to benefit the Church, its mission.

and ministry.

Since we reported to you last year nine permanent endowment funds to benefit the Church and its causes have been created, and existing endowments have been strengthened by additional contributions. Numerous persons have sought assistance in planning gifts through their will to benefit the Church and its many causes. Nine more local churches have turned to the Foundation for management and investment of their capital funds. Assistance has been given donors in making gifts to directly benefit their local church.

Through stewardship sermons, special presentations, gifts and wills workshops, and other events planned giving opportunities have been lifted up in over eighty churches of our

Conference this year.

I have sought to be faithful to the stated purpose and goals for this planned giving

ministry by representing all causes of the Church without prejudice or partiality.

One of the basic tenets of "planned giving" affirms the interests and needs of the donor. Oftentimes a donor is challenged and inspired by something he or she has read, heard, or experienced and thus requests my assistance as a planned giving officer in planning a gift to benefit a cause of the Church he or she has already chosen. Thus, I go not to persuade the donor to give to one cause over another, but to assist the donor in giving to benefit that special mission or ministry he or she has already chosen...a local church, one of our church colleges, one of our health and welfare institutions, camping and outdoor ministries. church extension, or one of many other causes of the Church...not my choice, but the choice of the donor.

I aladly offer the planned giving services of the Foundation to every United Methodist cause in our Conference. I will be pleased to make personal contacts with prospective donors when requests are made by local churches, institutions, and causes within our Conference.

May I now ask your help in two specific ways? First, make a note to look carefully at your church calendar when you get back home and see if there is not a place for an emphasis on "the stewardship of accumulated possessions." See if there is not room for a special program to raise the awareness of your church family to these stewardship opportunities, and then call the Foundation office and let us help you. Second, may I ask your help in gathering some information that will be helpful in our wills education program? Just this past week two families included in their wills provision whereby a portion of their estate at the time of the death of the survivor will fund permanent endowments which will benefit the Church and its causes. Monday of this week I was privileged to talk with a donor who is creating an endowment to benefit camping and outdoor ministries in our Conference and whose will includes plans of support for that endowment. Wills education is an important part of this stewardship ministry.

The ushers have passed out within the last few minutes a lavender sheet with "United Methodist Foundation, Inc." on the bottom of it. Will you please complete this anonymous and confidential survey and then pass it to the aisle where the ushers will collect them. Extra survey sheets are available at the Foundation display in the lobby where you may also leave

your completed questionnaire.

Prior to this Conference year this planned giving ministry was funded 100% by the Annual Conference. This year, I am pleased to report that our request for funding was only

90% of our budget.

In 1988 our funding request is for 82% of our budget, and in 1989 we are reducing our request to 72% of our budget. We are pleased that because of positive response and strong support we have been able to reduce our funding request from the Conference, and it is our plan to continue this reduction each year.

On behalf of the United Methodist Foundation, I thank you for your support of this vital

stewardship ministry.

UNITED METHODIST MEN

I am confident our Lord, Jesus Christ, is pleased with the many dedicated United Methodist Men in his service in this great Conference. United Methodist Men remain on a certain and continuing course of onward and upward - bigger and better.

A word or two of appreciation and affection to Cliff Shoaf our staff support - who is such a tremendous asset to the work of North Carolina's United Methodist Men. Conference officers - Rudy Hillman (Raleigh District), James Toney (Rockingham District) and Russell Taylor (Fayetteville District) - serve this Conference with dedication and devotion. Twelve hard working Christian men are in place as district presidents. We have the full and enthusiastic support of our Bishop, C. P. Minnick, and our Conference Lay Leader, Allen Norris. Margaret Saunders, President of United Methodist Women, ardently encourages our every effort.

When compared to the 74 annual conferences in United Methodism, North Carolina ranks fourth in the percentage of churches served by a men's fellowship - 67% of our churches participate in this ministry. We rank fifth in the nation in total fellowships chartered. I will be the first to admit that we sound pretty good - however, the very same statistics tell us that one-third of our churches do not provide this opportunity for men's service; that 33% of our local churches are missing this opportunity for extended lay ministry. If you do not have a men's fellowship - start one. We will help you. If yours is a very small church please consider forming a cluster group with another church. Put your men into new and stimulating ministry.

The men of the United Methodist Church are actively engaged in exciting Christian service. Our new national foundation (enabled by men's gifts) contributed over \$100,000 in 1986 to the scouting ministry of our church. United Methodist Men are also in financial partnership with the Upper Room Prayer Ministry; The Upper Room Prayer Hotline ministers, through the wonderful power of prayer and intercessory prayer, to as many as 7,000

persons every month.

More program materials are available. In addition to the "Spiritual Journey for Men" we now have the new six lesson series entitled, "The Mighty Acts of God." The new quarterly program material "Men and Faith" has received rave notices across the denomination.

I was privileged, during the past year, to visit with local fellowships across our Conference; six districts invited me to speak and participate at their annual meetings. On behalf of the United Methodist Men of this Conference, I have attended two jurisdictional gatherings and one national meeting (where I was elected to chair the United Methodist Men's national program and prayer ministries). I have observed the men of our church at work in mission outreach. At a district banquet in Goldsboro I listened in wonder to a report on ministry from each local fellowship present. It was a celebration of the wide range of service provided by the men of that district. I sat in at a meeting at White Plains UMC where a \$9,000 men's budget was allocated to outreach ministry. I fellowshiped and worshiped with the men of Nashville, NC who had just purchased a magnificant bus for their church and then constructed a new building to house the bus. I was present in the Durham District - and swelled with pride as Trinity and Henderson First joined the ranks of men's fellowships. I celebrated with the men of Haw River as they observed their 30th charter anniversary. I have witnessed the enthusiastic commitment of our men over and over again.

At the SEJ CONVO · beginning June 26th at Lake Junaluska · Methodist men will share facilities and program with the First Asbury Scouting Fellowship. In 1986 United Methodist churches opened their facilities to an additional 25,000 Boy Scouts and many Girl Scouts and Explorers. This phenomenal growth in church scouting is largely due to the whole

hearted support of United Methodist Men.

United Methodist Men remain the fastest growing organization in Methodism. Since 1977, our first year under the leadership provided by the Men's Section of the GBOD, our numbers have grown by 344%. Our Conference has about 8,000 men actively engaged in Christian service under the banner of United Methodist Men. During the next several years our Conference goal will be to lead the nation in new growth. It will take a dedicated effort by lots of good folks to secure new charters and renew and reactivate others. Those of you who have never chartered your fellowships need to rethink any past objection and climb on-board. We need you!

When you hear Methodist Men knocking at your church door - let us in. We want your

men to have this opportunity to serve Christ, to "Rise up on wings of eagles" and to place Jesus at the center of their lives so that he will abide in them and come out from them. May his name always be praised by the men, women and youth of the North Carolina Conference.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

The United Methodist Women of the North Carolina Conference have sought this year to understand more fully the meaning of Shalom with the theme "Shalom is Peace With Justice."

Shalom in the Old Testament means living in a harmonious, caring community with God at its center. It suggests harmony even in the natural order when the lion and the lamb shall lie down together. If justice means moral rightness and fairness, the Shalom blessing is intended for all. When the blessing is denied, God's will is thwarted and justice too is denied.

Through the mission studies, the reading program and the various projects undertaken there has come the challenge to work for justice and inclusiveness that there may be peace

and reconciliation here at home and throughout the world.

In keeping with the stated Purpose of United Methodist Women we have participated in workshops on South Africa, Southern Asia, Pomography, the Farm Crisis, Working for Peace, Growing in the Christian Faith, Ministry to Released Prisoners, Hazardous Waste, Coping With Stress, Migrant Ministry and many others. In April the women of our Conference joined with the United Methodist Women of the Western North Carolina Conference in a most informative Workshop on Women and the Law.

During the year 815 mission studies were held including Southern Asia, Technology and Christian Values and Hallelujah Anyhow!, a study of Suffering and the Christian Community of Faith. The Study Jewel was awarded to the Elizabeth City District which reported 132 studies held. We look forward to Conference Summer School when the new studies will be introduced on The Peoples and Churches of the USSR, Toward Health and Wholeness, and the Book of Acts

1,157 women participated in the Reading Program. The Goldsboro District was recognized for having 284 participants. 173 Units reported at least a 10% increase in membership. Ten new units were organized and four District Members added. The Fayetteville District won the Membership Banner for having 39 Units with a 10% increase. Fourteen scholarships were awarded to young women attending our Methodist Colleges and Universities.

The Pledge to Missions for 1986 was \$278,250. The total sent to the Women's Division was \$295,927. We exceeded the Pledge by \$17,677! The World Thank Offering, the nickles, dimes and quarters given in gratitude for God's daily blessings, totaled \$34,094.

Annual Meeting brought 646 in attendance. The program took place here at Methodist College amid the color of the District Windsocks and the logo which hung on the stage, reminding us of the winds of change in our world. We experience God's direction in our lives just as the wind fills and directs the windsocks. Barbara Weaver, executive secretary for Development Education for the Women's Division, was the speaker. The Love Offering which totaled \$10,291 was divided between the Summer Day Camping Program at the Robeson County Church and Community Center and the Native American Children's Fund in the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference. The Candle representing the work of the Women's Division around the world at a cost of \$34.20 a minute, burned 8 hours, 1 minute, 44 1/2 seconds amounting to a total of \$16,476. The New Bern District served as host to the meeting.

The 39 and Under Event brought young women from across the Conference to consider Shalom as Peace With Justice. They were inspired by an address given by Bishop Peter of India. A panel discussion introduced the new emphasis "Women Facing Our Future."

The Personhood Retreat at Louisburg College with Dr. John Bergland as leader brought us both inspiration and challenge as we confronted once again the year's theme.

Plans are under way for our 1987 Annual Meeting. We shall be honored to have Carolyn Marshall, president of the Women's Division, as our speaker.

1988 will bring the opportunity to travel to Biloxi, Mississippi for the Southeastern

Jurisdiction Meeting of United Methodist Women. Our own Bernice Johnson chairs the program committee for that meeting.

This has been a year filled with opportunities for spiritual growth and learning as we

sought to respond to God's call.

Finally, I would like to share this challenge in the words of Bishop Tutu as he addressed the World Methodist Conference in Nairobi, Kenya: "God enlists you and me and all of us to work together with him to change the evil of this world, to change its hurt, its antagonism, its anxieties, its poverty, its disease, its famines...to change all of this into the kingdom of Shalom, of justice, and goodness and joy and laughter and compassion and caring and sharing."

UNITED METHODIST YOUTH

Youth Ministry in the North Carolina Conference is to be prized. Nurtured by a caring and motivated group of young people, our youth ministry today is stronger than it has ever been. Like the airline commercial used to boast: we are "up and coming." And this year is proof of that fact.

The event LASER was revived last February. The letters which spell the event's name stand for Legislative Affairs: Study, Explore, Respond. In the past, not enough people had applied for the four-day study of state government in Raleigh. This year's attendance was

between 30 and 40. It is back and it is a success.

Strong, productive youth events have always been the goal of youth ministry. That goal was again brought to light last July at our Annual Conference Session (ACS). In just two years, this event has had its attendance jump 43%. Last year 242 youth were present. For 170 of them it was their first event.

From the interest these statistics represent, even more joys have occurred this year in youth ministry. Junior and Senior highs alike raised a total of \$24,000 for their Youth Service Fund (YSF). This fund is monies raised by North Carolina youth to support various programs both inside and outside of our Conference. For the second year in a row, United Methodist Youth in the North Carolina Conference have contributed the fourth largest sum of all conferences to the National Youth Service Fund. Perhaps you yourself have made a contribution to YSF. Do you remember putting a dollar in the bucket at the car wash your CIMYF sponsored for YSF? If you do, than I am sure you'd like to know where that money went. You may have helped support chapels for the mentally retarded or Wake County's Adult Reading Center. Or maybe your money went out of the country. This year the Youth Service Fund supported a recuperation center for drug addicts in Brazil and a mission in Liberia.

\$24,000. It's helped a lot of people. Through the Youth Service Fund we touch the lives of people around the world with the money we contribute. Through youth ministry we touch

the lives of people around the world with the life of Jesus Christ.

Five years ago, Michael Safley became Associate Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries. When he arrived he fine-tuned a machine that was already running smoothly. This summer he has moved on to continue his work in youth ministry as Vice president of Student Affairs here at Methodist College. Into the vacated position has stepped Pam Lineberger...and the machine has not skipped a beat.

Youth ministry is not one person. Youth ministry is a love. The love of Jesus Christ. For some kids, youth ministry is a home. A home away from a *troubled* home. Youth ministry is

a caring. A caring that allows one to show true feelings, to receive first hugs.

Youth ministry. Let's look at one example, ACS, the Annual Conference Session for Youth. ACS is a place where youth discover their potential. It is a place where they aren't just the church of tomorrow...they are the church of today. It's a place from which bright kids return with information and ideas that can strengthen their local church.

At ACS a young person isn't just another face in the crowd. There are growth groups that meet each day throughout the week where an individual becomes part of a family. Interest groups are provided on topics from suicide and nuclear disarmament to human sexuality and music. Teenagers are given the chance to ask pointed and frank questions about subjects that concern or confuse therm...and they get straight answers.

At Annual Conference Session, United Methodist Youth see the fruits of their labors.

Each day legislative affairs sessions are held in which we discuss the problems facing our country and our world. The resolutions that are passed are sent to political figures...and we get responses. The youth of this Conference learn that *they* can make a difference. "Claim the Victory...Jesus Won!" is both the theme and the challenge for this year.

The story is the same at each of our events. Each is a time of spiritual growth and personal development where lives are changed, yet the victory is not won without hurdles to be overcome. The hurdle still to be cleared is that the word is still not out. The good news hasn't reached the number of people it can reach. Each year an elected president stands before Annual Conference requesting and reporting the same things. "Look what we have to offer!" they say. "Please spread the word! We can offer so much more!" But because we hear the same requests, we tend to disregard them. We have begun to look at youth ministry in the Conference as having reached its peak. It is successful and therefore it can sustain itself. We are beginning to forget that each year this ministry needs a push. Each Conference year begins with a new group of young people looking for the opportunities that this ministry can offer. And each year ends with most of those kids still searching for those same opportunities because they haven't been shown where to look.

Think about it The minister doesn't just sit back in his or her chair and expect the members to pour in. The minister builds a program within the church that is supportive to the individual and caring of all, in hopes that the message of what is to be offered will go out, and that individual needs will be met. I speak for the 18 year old. I speak for the 12 year old. Ours is such a program. It is supportive of the individual. It is caring of all. Please pass the

word.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of business:

The Conference was established to handle transactions for the operations and programs sponsored by 843 churches in Eastern North Carolina. The Conference also administers the Annual Conference and collects funds from the general and jurisdictional conferences and forwards these funds to the designated recipients. Fund transactions included within this report represent all funds administered by the treasurer, except for the Methodist Foundation, Inc.

A summary of the Conference's significant accounting policies follows:

Fund accounting:

To ensure observance of limitations placed on the use of resources available to the Conference, the accounts of the Conference are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Conference are reported in two Board-designated self-balancing fund groups:

- Annual Budget Funds, which are represented by various annual funds are determined by the Annual Conference, and all funds are raised by member churches.
- . Special Funds, are funds created by the Conference for special purposes.

Other accounting policies:

Real estate, major additions to real estate, and major purchases of furniture and equipment are stated at cost.

Note 2. Investments

Investments are represented in the financial statements in the aggregate at the lower of cost or fair market value and consist of:

Note 4. Supplemental Appropriations and Other Revenue

Supplemental Appropriations and Other Revenue includes appropriations received by each fund, revenue received by each fund and gain on sale of investments.

Note 5. Pension Fund

In 1981 the Conference began participating in the pension program of the General Board of Pensions which basically provides that benefits accruing for service years after 1981 will be funded currently through contributions from the minister and his/her church or charge. Further, the Conference agreed to fund the past service liability for service years prior to 1981. On January 1, 1987 the actuarially computed unfunded liability based on a per service rate of \$225.00 was approximately \$19,590,822.

During 1986 the Board of Pension Fund and the Pension Funding Crusade were combined.

Note 6. Fund Balance

Certain funds represent amounts raised and expended during the current year. As a result, these funds have no assets, liabilities or fund balance.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

lote 1. Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies

United Methodist Foundation, Inc. was established primarily as an investment pool available for organizations, churches and agencies related to the North Carolina Conference, S.E.J., of the United Methodist Church. The Foundation also receives gifts and bequests on behalf of the member organizations. Its financial statements are prepared primarily in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for investment companies.

A summary of the Foundation's significant accounting policies follows:

Valuation of securities:

Investments are stated at market value, based on closing prices reported on National Securities Exchanges on December 31, or at the last bid price, for over-the-counter securities.

General:

The Foundation follows the accounting practice of "equalization" whereby undistributed investment income per unit is unaffected by sales or redemptions of units

Security transactions are accounted for on the trade date. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date.


Realized gains and losses from security transactions are reported on the first-in, first-out basis.

The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954.





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
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
