### **MEMOIRS**

#### REV. JOHN JENKINS MANKER, D. D.

John Jenkins Manker was born in Fincastle, Ohio, Dec. 24, 1839, and died at Saratoga Springs, N. Y., May 16, 1916. His parents were Rev. John Manker and Sarah Wright Manker. His grandfather, William Manker, was a Revolutionary soldier, and was in the war with the Indians, having helped to build the first Block House where Cincinnati now stands.

In 1858 our subject entered the Ohio Wesleyan University where he remained until, answering his country's call in 1861, he enlisted in the 50th Ohio Volunteers, serving four years, first as private, then as Lieutenant, and later as Captain. In May, 1862, he was wounded in battle at Princeton, W. Va.

In 1863 Dr. Manker was married to Miss Julia Tarbell of Ripley, Ohio. She died at Greeneville, Tenn., in 1880. He was married to Miss Ida Kirk of Chattanooga in 1891. His second wife passed away sixteen years ago. He is survived by the following children: Myron W. Manker, Paul A. Manker, Mrs. Edith Manker Patten, and Miss Elizabeth Manker, all of Chattanooga.

He joined Holston Conference at Greeneville, Tenn., May 17, 1866, and served as follows: 1866-1867, East Knoxville; 1867-1868, Athens; 1869, Tutor in E. T. W. University; 1870-1871, Cleveland; 1872-1874, Presiding Elder Knoxville District; 1875-1876, First Church, Knoxville; 1877-1879, Greeneville; 1880-1883, Pastor First Church, Chattanooga; 1883-1885, Financial Agent by appointment, but actually Pastor First Church, Chattanooga; 1884-1885, Presiding Elder Chattanooga District; 1886-1889, Professor in Chattanooga University; 1889-1890, Presiding Elder Chattanooga District; 1890-1892, Highland Park; 1893-1895, First Church, Chattanooga; 1895-1900, Presiding Elder Chattanooga District; 1901-1902, Presiding Elder Knoxville District; 1903-1904, Professor Theology in University; 1904-1916, Editor Methodist Advocate Journal. From 1870 to 1879 he was Secretary of the Conference.

He was elected as a delegate to the General Conferences of 1876, 1884, 1908, and 1916.

From the time of his coming among us the climate, the work, and the people found such a place in his heart that he never even seriously thought of transferring to other fields. As history records, the position of our beloved Holston was peculiar. Division of sentiment, bristling with fiery antagonisms, fixed us in the gaze of the nation, so when the time came for us to occupy, in order to assert ourselves with helpfulness, great wisdom in policy and Christliness

in spirit were necessary. We planned under the guiding hand of the Clarks, the Simpsons, the Cobleys, the Fullers, and others. To say there were no mistakes is to say that we are not human. We have succeeded gloriously. In what we are and what we have done, our beloved Manker is a part. In our educational policy, which culminated in the Chattanooga University, Dr. Manker was designated by the proper authority to select the ground, and the Board of Trustees for the University.

Called to the highest places of trust and honor by his Conference, invariably he gave a good account of his stewardship. Possibly the Stone Church at Chattanooga, Tennessee, is his most noteworthy monument. Starting with the idea of a ten thousand dollar church, the enterprise found its consummation in the present artistic structure, costing sixty-five thousand dollars. In order to bring this enterprise to success he cut hickory canes from the battlefields of Mission Ridge, Lookout Mountain and Chickamauga and sold them in various states, thus raising thousands of dollars to replenish the revenues of this undertaking. This service alone puts our departed Brother in the class of the man of whom the Bible said, "His raiment was camel's hair and his meat locusts and wild honey."

Touching his death the ten editors of our Connectional papers adopted the following in regard to their associate and co-editor:

"The imperative order which came to Dr. Manker found him at his post doing battle for the interests committed to him, and which he defended with his latest heart beat. He had arisen in the meeting of the General Conference Committee on Book Concern, and standing beside the altar of the Methodist Church, began an intensely earnest appeal in behalf of the church press. He had uttered the words, "I have preached the Gospel of Christ for fifty years," "Excuse me," when the sentence came to an end and his soul passed on.

We, his brothers and comrades in the editorial ranks of the church, long since learned to respect him for his substantial talents, to emulate the virtues of simplicity, sincerity and loyalty which stamped the sterling metal of his manhood, and to love him for the gentleness, purity and sympathy of his spirit. He fell while pleading our common cause. It was true to his whole career that he was found on duty to the last, and of him as of the French hero it may be answered when the roll of the faithful is called: "Dead on the field of honor."

As his associates we wish to record this expression of our sense of personal loss, and of our heartfelt sympathy with his sorrowing children. Our common prayer is that they may be sustained both by the consciousness of his useful and noble life and by that strength that cames from the Heavenly Father on whom his trust was firmly stayed."

Bachman, Dr. W. S. Bovard, Dr. R. M. Millard. Following the service at the church, the interment was in Forest Hills cemetery.

### JOHN A. PATTEN

John Alanson Patten was born September 27, 1867, at Delaven, Illinois, a son of Major George W. and Charlotte Holmes Patten. With his parents Mr. Patten came to Chattanooga in December, 1883. He was united in marriage October 2, 1890, to Miss Edith Manker, daughter of the Rev. J. J. Manker, of the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He died in Chicago, Ill., April 26, 1916.

John Alanson Patten was a large man—large physically, intellectually, spiritually. He had unusual mental powers. His native mentality was illuminated and strengthened and requisitioned for service by his Christian experience. Mr. Patten was a self-educated man. Education for himself and for others was a passion with him. In his home he surrounded himself with standard books, books of abiding worth; and he was continually adding to his library the latest books. Upon the table was to be seen a long list of the best magazines and papers of the day. It is a matter for marvel how one whose hours were crowded with other duties could find time to garner into his mind so much of the real substance of so many books and current publications. He kept the dust from his mind

as well as from his heart. He was in the true sense an educated man. His vocabulary, the substance of his conversation, his comments upon men and institutions and passing events gave evidence of this. Not having had the advantage of a college education, he was nevertheless at home in his thinking and conversation with bishops and ministers and professors and the best minds of the community.

Mr. Patten's interest in education was not confined to his own denomination. Those of us who have seen even a small portion of the receipts and vouchers for his donations know that he gave with a lavish hand to the Young Men's Christian Association, to educational institutions, of various kinds in the South and the North.

But how shall we speak of his service to the cause of education within the Holston Conference. How generously he gave of prayer and time and effort and money to raise up an educated ministry among us. The educational advance of this Conference and particularly the conspicuous advance in the matter of the educational equipment of the ministry of the Holston Conference is deeply indebted to Mr. Patten. He was the constant friend, the wise counselor, the untiring helper, the princely benefactor of the University of Chattanooga. The successful campaign of this institution for a half million dollars for buildings and endowment would not have been achieved without him.

Mr. Patten's intellectual gifts and intellectual development, together with the other large endowments of his personality, made him an acknowledged leader. He was recognized as the first citizen of Chattanooga. He not only held high office in the church but he was a power in her affairs. For instance, after a memorable discussion in which Mr. Patten was opposed by some of the greatest leaders of our denomination a certain policy in the work of the Freedmen's Aid Society advocated by Mr. Patten, was adopted and is still in operation. He had unusual ability as a public speaker. Before great gatherings of business men, before Laymen's Associations, before Annual or General Conferences he was equal to the occasion.

That which distinguished Mr. Patten even more than his intellectual power was his spiritual life. He owed much to his parentage. He came from a good home. His splendid Christian father and mother gave him the inestimable blessing of a good name, the example of righteous living, the benediction of true parental love, and the many hallowed and powerful influences of a Christian home. He early gave his life to the Savior. He early became a member of Christ's Church and in the Church of Christ he developed that strong and tender Christian character that served so mightily in the kingdom of his Lord.

Mr. Patten had crowned Christ as King of his life. He told me that he and his family had tried to make the Church the center

even of their social life. He loved Christ. He loved Christ's church. He gave to the church generously-even with sacrifice. He gave with marvelous liberality of his time, his strength, his thought, his money. I have heard him declare that for twenty years out of his waking hours he had given twice as many hours to the church as he had given to his private business. Has such devotion in any other man ever came under the observation of any of us? Methodist Episcopal Church is unique. He record in the of the Book Committee of the Methodist Episcopal Church which is usually considered the highest office in our Church to which a layman is eligible. He gave himself in beautiful devotien to the upbuilding of the First Methodist Episcopal Church of Chattanooga. He was the ablest, the best known and the most influential layman this Church has ever had. I would not overstate the matter, but I think it can be fairly said that this one life has brought more ecclesiastical honor to this church than all other members of the church throughout its history. But John Patten was too great a man to care for a meaningless office or an empty honor. His life was a life of service. He was the organizer of the Men's Class of the First Church of Chattanooga and since his death this class has been formally named "The Patten Class." He was a member of the Board of Federation of the Methodist Churches. He was a member of the Board of Managers of the Freedmen's Aid Society. He was elected as delegate from the Holston Lay Electoral Conference to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church for every quadrennium since 1900.

Often the supreme test of one's religion is its practice at home. Many a man bears a great name in a far country and is little thought of at home. John Patten's life shone with clearest light at home. None knew the genuineness of his character or the sweetness of his spirit so well as the folks who in church and office and street and home met him month after month and day after day. The people who knew him best loved him the most. His great personality shone resplendent in the high offices to which he was elected. I believe a greater test of genuine love was the test in his home church and here his life was truly a marvel. One man said of him, "There is one thing about John Patten I want to mention. You can never ask him to do anything for the church but that he not only does it but does it at the hour you ask him to do it." He might be closeted with a committee concerning large financial interests. The committee might have come from a distance; but when 4:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon drew near Mr. Patten would excuse himself and go to the meeting of the Advisory Committee of the local church. He very rarely missed teaching his Sunday School Class, even though it required a long railroad journey to be present in Chattanooga on Sunday morning. Always through the years and especially in the last year of his life, when

almost overborne with the extreme weariness from labor and from anxiety for his church and his loved ones, he was found regularly in his place in the sanctuary morning and evening. The evening might be very hot or very cold, a storm of rain or sleet or snow might be a foregone conclusion before leaving his home that very few people would venture out in such weather, but he would be in his place in the service. "Go home and tell to thy friends what great things the Lord hath done for thee," said the Master to one whom He had healed. Unostentatiously, earnestly, honestly, unselfishly, sacrificially, John A. Patten lived the gospel and told the gospel to the people among whom he lived.

A most beautiful thing about the giving of Mr. Patten was not the amount of his benefactions but the manner and motive of his giving. His giving was the giving of love. He made the recipient feel that he was doing the donor a kindness to receive the gift. The supreme characteristic of Mr. Patten's life was love. God is love and the lives of his children are characterized by love. "Faith, hope and love; these three, but the greatest of these is love." Mr. Patten went through life making himself the good Samaritan unto thousands. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto Me!" Then how beautifully did our great friend serve the Master! Mr. Patten's compassion was not the weak sentiment of a weak personality. He was nothing if not strong. His compassion was the genuine love of a strong virile manly personality; and his love did not evaporate in emotion but crystalized in deeds of mercy and help. He loved God. We can still hear the accents of his voice saying, as he said so often at the beginning of a public prayer, "Dear Father." His love for Christ and for Christ's humanity amounted to a passion. He had a passion to help. He believed in Christ's doctrine, "the extra." "If any man will compel thee to go with him a mile, go with him twain." "Give to him that asketh of thee and from him that would borrow of thee turn not thou away." He was "the Herald of a Passion." "Hereby perceive we the love of God because He laid down His life for us and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren."

One of the products of Christianity is the Christian home and a man's character is revealed in his home. Mr. Patten's home life was ideal. His wife was the daughter of one of the most distinguished and honored and faithful ministers of the Holston Conference. The fine spirit of sacrifice and service and humility and fidelity to God learned in a Methodist parsonage she has carried through all the years in her own home. The beautiful Christian character, obedience and filial love found in his children speak eloquently of the genuineness of the father's and the mother's life. His home was to Mr. Patten a refuge and an inexpressible comfort.

In the First Methodist Episcopal Church of Chattanooga no name stands with John A. Patten. No bishop, no pastor, no layman las filled so large a place in the life of the church as he In the Ho'ston Conference, layman though he was, his devotion to the Master's work, his marvelous liberality, his saintly character, his heart of love, places him not only in the ranks of the laymen but also in the ranks of Christ's true ministers. Human hands and not been placed upon him in ordination, but God's hands had touched him. Philanthropist, patriot, friend, brother, saint of God, we trust thee to God's unfailing care. In our pilgrimage here below we hail thee in the Land of the Eternal Morning.

### **CONFERENCE RULES**

- 1. No person shall absent himself from the sessions of the conference without leave, unless he be sick or otherwise unable to attend.
- 2. The secretary shall keep a journal of the conference proceedings, which he shall cause to be published in the Annual Journal of the conference, and it shall be the official journal. He shall edit the minutes and all matter for publication, and shall make contracts for the printing of the journal as in his judgment may seem best. He shall have charge of the journal and conference files, and forward them to the place of the meeting of the annual conference each year.
- 3. All committees whose reports are to be printed in the journal shall present their reports to the secretary in writing, otherwise the committee on publication is not required to insert such reports in the journal.
- 4. All candidates for admission on trial, for admission into full membership, for admission on credentials from other churches, for readmission and for recognition of orders, shall be required to appear before the Committee on Conference Relations and the Board of Examiners, and to furnish such information as may be required touching their general character and their qualifications for the ministry.
- 5. All cases involving a change in conference relations or with-drawal, shall be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.
- 6. Widows of deceased ministers who have never traveled with their husbands may be temporary claimants, and may be referred to the board of stewards, who shall decide each case from year to year.
- 7. The chairman of the board of stewards shall be ex-officio one of the assistant secretariies of the conference for secretarial work in connection with conference claimants, and shall be the last member of the Committee on Memoirs.
- 8. The memorial service for deceased members, and for the wives of deceased members, shall be the special order for conference Sunday afternoon following the ordination service.
- 9. Conference visitors shall be allowed 10 minutes in which to address the conference. District Superintendents' reports shall be limited to 15 minutes, and reports of committees, except the board of stewards, to five minutes.

- 10. All applications for special collections to be apportioned to the charges in the conference shall be referred to the Committee on Special Collections.
- 11. There shall be elected each year a Nominating Committee, consisting of three members, which committee shall nominate the standing Committees and the Committee on Nominations for the ensuing conference session. No member of the Nominating Committee shall be eligible for consecutive re-election to this committee.
- 12. When a resolution has been introduced by a member, before the person who introduced the resolution shall speak, the question of consideration may be raised by a member saying, 'Mr. President, on that I raise the question of consideration.' The question of consideration shall then be put without debate, and if there is a two-thirds vote against consideration, the resolution shall not be entertained; but if consideration be not denied, the member introducing it may speak to the resolution if it be seconded.
- 13. The standing committees confirmed each year by the conference shall be as follows: 1. American Bible Society; 2. Auditing; 3. Church Literature; 4. Conference Claimants; 5. Conference Relations; 6. Deaconess Work; 7. District Conference Records; 8. Education; 9. Epworth League; 10. Foreign Missions; 11. Freedman's Aid Society; 12. Home Missions and Church Extensions; 13. Memoirs; 14. Nominations; 15. Public Worship; 16. Resolutions; 17. Sabbath Observance; 18. Sunday Schools; 19. State of the Church; 20. Social Service; 21. Special Collections; 22. Temperance; 23. Book Concern Accounts.

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### RULES OF ORDER

- 1. The conference shall meet at 8:30 a. m., spending 30 minutes in devotional exercises, and adjourn at 11:45 a.m.
- 8. No new resolution or motion shall be made until the one unappeal to the conference, and in case of appeal from the decision of the chair, the question shall be put without debate.
- 3. The president shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for by the conference or the discipline, but any member may decline serving on more than one committee at a time.
- 4. All motions and resolutions introduced by any member shall be reduced to writing, if the president, secretary, or any member requests it.
- 5. No motion shall be considered unless it has been seconded.
- 6. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, and shall be decided without debate.
- 7. When a motion, resolution or report has been read by the secretary, or stated by the president, it shall be deemed in possession of the conference, but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before decision or amendment.
- 8. No new resolution or motion shall be made until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following should intervene, which motions shall have precedence in the following order: the previous question, indefinite postponement, laying on the table, reference to a committee, postponement to a given time, amendment or substitution.
- 9. When any motion or resolution shall have passed, it shall be in order for any member who voted in the affirmative, to move a reconsideration. The motion to reconsider shall be taken without debate.
- 10. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the conference when said question is put by the chairman, except by leave of the conference.
- 11. Every member who is within the bar of the conference at the time a question is put shall give in his vote thereon, unless the conference for a special reason shall excuse him.

- 12. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the conference, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address the chairman.
- 13. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, nor more than five minutes at any one time, without special leave of the conference, and no person shall speak more than once until every other member desiring to speak shall have done so.
- 14. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the chairman to call him to order, when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language, but any member may call the attention of the chairman to the subject when he considers the speaker out of order, or any other member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.
- 15. It shall be in order to move that the question be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the conference, except in case where character or conference relations are involved, and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall then be put.
- 16. No motion, resolution or report shall be laid on the table until the member introducing such motion, resolution or report has been allowed to speak on the subject.
- 17. It shall require a majority vote to sustain the call for the yeas and nays.
- 18. The motion to adjourn, to suspend the rules, to lay on the table, to take from the table, and the call for the previous question shall be put without debate.
- 19. It shall require a two-thirds vote of the members present to suspend these rules.

- 1. The work of the Board is divided into six groups. Admission on trial; first, second, third and fourth years, and Local Orders. Each group to be in the hands of a committee—one of the committeemen to be chairman of the committee.
- 2. Mid-year examinations are required; time and place to be arranged and announced.
- 3. The day preceding the opening of the Annual Conference is the time appointed for examination.
- 4. The candidates are urged to buy their books at the very opening of the year, and study carefully the mid-year subjects, and after the mid-year examinations make complete survey of the remaining subjects immediately. The examiners are required to correspond with the candidates in the early winter, preparatory to mid-year examinations.
  - 5. The requirements of the Discipline are to make the exami-

At 9:45 a. m. the conference came to order in the conference church, and after singing H. B. Ogle led in prayer.

**The Journal.**—The journal of the previous session was read, corrected and approved.

**Delinquents.**—The Treasurer and the Statistician read their lists of those pastors who had not yet turned in their reports.

Disciplinary Questions.—Question 1, "Is this Annual Conference incorporated according to the requirements of the Discipline?" was answered, "It is." Question 2, "Who have been received by transfer, and from what conference," was answered as follows: "J. H. Stevenson, Troy; W. F. Smith, North Indiana; W. S. Gray, St. Johns River; J. M. Melear, Kentucky." Question 15, "Who have been transferred and to what conferences?" was answered as follows: "R. F. Porter, St. Johns River; L. A. Swisher, North Indiana" Question 3, "Who have been readmitted?" answer, "none."

Boone Tree Gavel.—J. M. Emert made appropriate remarks and presented to the Bishop a gavel made from the famous "Boone Tree" in Washington County, Tenn.

Cases Referred.—The following were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations: Timothy Peters, O. L. Smith, J. T. Ware, M. N. Davenport, A. M. Rose.

Questions 9 and 10.—The name of Henry E. Little was was called, his character was passed and he was graduated from the course of study and elected to elders' orders. D. C. Slagle was graduated from the Conference Course of study and elected to elders' orders.

**Question 8.**—The class for full membership was called, and an eloquent address was delivered by the Bishop. The Bishop asked the disciplinary questions for admission into full membership.

**Extra Session.**—The conference voted to hold a session at 2 p. m. G. T. Francisco was appointed on the Committee on Conference Relations.

#### FOURTH DAY

October 14th.

**Opening Exercises.**—The devotions were conducted by O. R. Tarwater. At 9 a. m. the presiding bishop occupied the chair. J. M. Melear led in prayer. The journal was read and approved.

**Conference Evangelist.**—The bishop was requested to appoint W. S. Grant, A. B. McKenzie and J. C. Patty as Conference Evangelists.

Committee Reports.—J. M. Melear presented the report for the Trustees of the Advocate Journal Fund. The committees on the business interests and the circulation of the Advocate Journal reported respectively by J. J. Robinette and R. L. Stapleton. J. J. Robinette read a resolution regarding the Bristol Church property which was adopted.

**Disciplinary Questions.**—Questions 20 and 21 were answered. Question 4, "Who have been received on credentials, and from what churches?" was answered as follows: The credentials of Timothy V. Peters, of the Louisiana Conference Methodist Episcopal Church South, were recognized and he was received into the conference. Owen L. Rev. J. S. Hill, representing the Freedman's Aid Society, was introduced to the Conference. A motion was adopted to hold a session of the conference at 4 p. m. P. L. Clonce was excused. After a motion adopted to reconsider a previous action of the conference with reference to the annuity funds for the distribution to the claimants, and annuity rate of \$4.00 per year was adopted by the conference on motion of M. C. Bruner.

**Committee on Organic Union**—The following committee on organic union was appointed by the bishop: J. J. Robinette, G. T. Francisco, J. M. Melear, D. R. Haney, W. L. Oliver. The session adjourned.

### Afternoon Session

The session was opened with G. T. Francisco presiding.

Compliment to F. D. Watson.—S. G. Ketron called F. D. Watson forward and presented to him a check for \$50.00, which was a gift to him from an unknown friend.

Committee Reports.—The following conference committees reported: American Bible Society, Auditing, Church Literature, Deaconess Work, District Conference Records, Epworth League, Foreign Missions, Freedman's Aid, Sabbath Observance, Sunday School, State of the Church, Social Service. (Here the bishop resumed the chair.)

Temperance Committee reported and after considerable discussion J. J. Robinette moved to recommit. The motion was adopted.

Organization of Conference Board of Education.—A motion was adopted to instruct the Committee on Education to nominate a Conference Board of Education with one minister and one layman from each district.

**Reports.**—The committee on nominations reported the standing committees for the coming year. The special committee on Organic Union reported by J. J. Robinette. J. J. Robinette and A. C. Goddard offered resolutions which were adopted by the conference.

Minute Fund.—Subscriptions were taken by the Secretary for the minute fund.

**Board of Examiners.**—The bishop announced the board of examiners for the quadrenium.

Question 36.—Question 36, "Where shall the next conference be held?" was asked, and R. L. Stapleton put in nomination, Morristown, and the motion was unanimously adopted.

Question 12.—Question 12, "What others have been elected and ordained deacons," was asked, and Isaac N. Curvin was elected to deacons' orders as a local preacher.

**Question 13.**—Question 13, "What others have been elected and ordained elders?" was asked, and James Wiley Grace was elected to elders' orders as a local preacher.

Questions 31, 29, and 30 were asked by the bishop; \$4.00 in certain monies held by the conference treasurer was ordered paid into the Conference Claimants funds.

**Reports.**—The Treasurer and the Statistical Secretary reported.

Announcements and assignments of ministers for the

Sunday services were made by the pastor of the church.

**Adjournment.**—O. R. Tarwater moved that the Monday morning session meet at 8 a. m. and the motion was adopted. Adjournment was ordered and the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Bristol.

### FIFTH DAY

October 15th.

Bishop Bristol preached in the conference church Sunday morning, and ministers of the conference supplied the other pulpits in the city.

Ordination Exercises.—At 2:30 p. m. Bishop Bristol ordained the following Deacons: Elbert M. Boyd, Thomas E. Goodman, Otis Lawson, James F. Lynch, William C. Martin, William H. Ragan, Jacob F. The session then was adjourned with the benediction.

#### SIXTH DAY

October 16th.

**Opening Exercises.**—I. B. Leonard led the devotional exercises.

**Business Session.**—At 9 a. m. the bishop assumed the chair. The journal of the previous session was read and approved.

Conference Relations.—The bishop was requested to appoint J. H. Stevenson a professor in Vanderbilt University. J. W. Cardwell was made effective. J. D. Roberson was placed on the retired list. J. J. Genthner was made supernumerary. Solon McNeese was left without appointment to attend some one of our schools. A. B. Dennis was transferred to the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.

**Disciplinary Questions.**—Questions 26 and 27 were asked.

**Committees.**—F. M. Cones reported for the Committee on Education, on the appointment of members of the Conference Board of Education, and the report was adopted.

Conference Boards.—B. M. Martin read the list of Conference Boards as follows: Conference Claimants Commis-

sion, Conference Treasurer's Committee, Triers of Appeals, Home Missions and Church Extension, Foreign Missions, Sunday School, Church Location, Deaconess Work, Stewards, and the nominations were approved by the Conference.

**Episcopal Fund.**—The apportionments for the Episcopal fund were announced.

Missionary Appropriations.—The Missionary appropriations were read and the report was adopted by the conference.

Home Missionary and Church Extension Askings.—The askings from the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension were read and approved by the conference.

**Disciplinary Questions.**—Question 31, "What are the claims on the Conference fund?" was answered as \$8,232.00. Question 32, "What has been received on these claims?" was answered as \$5,812.00.

Board of Stewards.—The Board of Stewards made a preliminary report, and the following were referred back for further consideration: J. B. Kiester, A. G. Cadle, C. W. Miller, Mrs. Creswell, Mrs. Forrester, Mrs. Henry, Mrs. Robertson, Mrs. Clendennin, J. K. Rumburg, and W. R. Byerly. B. M. Martin reported a delayed pastor's report. The Stewards retired to readjust their report. The Conference took recess for five minutes.

Committee on Temperance.—The conference reconvened and a call was made for the report of the committee on Temperance, which had been recommitted at a previous session. On statement of the chairman of the committee, T. H. Hodge, that there had been no change in certain statements in the report, the bishop refused to put the motion to adopt the report, on the ground that it was a reflection on the church. C. E. Clarke moved to strike out the objectional clause in the report, the motion was adopted, and the report was then adopted as amended. C. E. Clarke read additional amendments which were also adopted.

Report of the Board of Stewards.—A motion was adopted by the conference to have the report from the Board of Stewards not later than Friday morning in the conference sessions.

**Memorial Service.**—The date of Rule No. 8, regarding the memorial service, was changed by vote of the conference from Wednesday morning to Sunday afternoon.

Introduction.—Dr. Wilbur F. Sheridan, General Secretary of the Epworth League, was introduced and addressed the conference.

**Endowment Fund Campaign.**—It was moved by A. C. Goddard that one half of one per cent of each pastor's salary be assessed as an advertising campaign fund for the Endowment Campaign for Conference Claimants. After discussion

the motion was adopted.

Board of Incorporators.—B. M. Martin reported for the Board of Incorporators. G. T. Byrd moved that the conference make such assessment as may be necessary to complete the payment of the shortage on the Cairns-Martin Trial and Investigation Expense Fund. The motion was adopted. The Board of Incorporators was authorized to complete the collections and pay the remaining shortage on these accounts.

**Committee on Resolutions.**—The Committee on Resolutions reported by W. R. Byerly and the report was adopted.

**Board of Stewards.**—The report of the Board of Stewards was read by the Secretary, the report was adopted, and the annual distribution to the Claimants was made.

**Corrections in Statistical Records.**—It was moved by the Secretary and adopted, that the District Superintendents be allowed to report to the Statistical Secretary, certain corrections for the record that should have been included in the reports of the pastors.

**Official Record.**—On motion of the Secretary, the minutes of the conference were adopted as the official record of

the Conference.

Introductions.—Rev. J. M. Crowe, pastor of Munsey Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and Rev. Haga

of Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference, were introduced.

**Adjournment.**—It was moved by the Secretary, and adopted, that after the reading of the journal, devotional exercises, and the reading of the appointments, the conference stand adjourned. The Journal was read and approved. The Journal as a whole was adopted. Devotional exercises were conducted by the Bishop. The appointments were read and the Conference was adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Bristol.

### REPORTS

#### BRISTOL DISTRICT

### E. O. WOODYARD, Superintendent

The Virginia Conference of which the Bristol District is a part was organized in 1868. It might be of interest to note that the present Bristol District embraces the same territory as the Abingdon District at the time of the organization.

Ten years ago when the Virginia Conference dissolved, the Abingdon, now the Bristol District, was added to the Holston Conference, and since we have closed the first decade of Holston oversight, it is well that we look at the results to see if we have played prodigal to the area. Ten years ago there were in this area 4440 full members, now 8,226. There was paid for support of pastors \$5,137; for support of District Superintendent, \$598. This year, to pastors, \$10,621; to District Superintendents, \$1,228. There were 68 church buildings, valued at \$60,310, now there are 104, valued at \$160,101; 11 parsonages, valued at \$7,800, now 15, valued at \$15,400. There were 70 Sunday Schools with an enrollment of 4,343; now there are 121, with an enrollment of 10,643. Ten years ago there were 25 charges, manned by 5 conference men, 5 undergraduates, and 15 supplies; there are at present 26 charges, manned by 4 conference men, 6 undergraduates, and 16 supplies.

## Changes in Appointments and Preachers During the Present Year.

Save in three instances the appointments stand as they were made at the conference last fall. In December the Wise Mission was placed back with the Wise charge. In January John W. May was released from the Wise charge to become pastor at Blackwood, a union coal mining church for which we are asked to furnish a pastor. W. S. Robinette was secured to finish out the year's work at Wise. In January Levi Murray was released from the Russell charge and A. V. Dye was secured to fill out the year. In one or two instances the work has moved very slowly, but all the rest of the charges have had a very fruitful year.

### Dedications and Church Buildings.

Five new churches have been dedicated on the district this year. In May, the District Superintendent, assisted by Rev. A. H. Ingle, dedicated, free from debt, the Free Hill church on the Greendale charge, cost about \$1,000. On the 5th Sunday in July the District Superintendent dedicated on the Lafayette charge, the Ironto church, cost \$1100, all paid. On August 20th, H. G. Osborne, pastor of Rose Hill charge, dedicated Chances Chapel, cost about \$700, debt

all provided for. On the 4th Sunday in September Dr. Hurley, Presiding Elder of the M. E. Church South, dedicated Oak Grove, an Union church of our own and the Southern church. He was assisted by A. A. King, one of our local preachers. The cost of the church was about \$1,200, all paid for. On October 8th the District Superintendent dedicated Brumley Gap church, on the Glenford charge. This church takes the place of the one that was burned down last winter. The cost of the church was about \$1,000, all paid. There is being erected in the town of Pennington, Va., a new \$5,000 brick veneered church, the best church in Lee county, Virginia. We had hoped to dedicate this church before Conference, but unavoidable delays have made it impossible. It will be ready for dedication about the first of November. T. J. Crumley is the pastor and church builder. Four other churches on the district are in the process of erection, and will be completed during the coming year. We have also accepted during the year one-fourth interest in Union Chapel Rose Hill charge, and one-fourth interest in Texas Chapel, Riner charge.

### Ministerial Support.

One of the crucial problems of the Bristol District is the one of Ministerial Support. Many of the pastors have a very inadequate support, and much of what they do receive is in produce and only enough of that to eke out a poor living. Some of our pastors do not receive enough that they can afford to keep a conveyance, and they are compelled to walk from appointment to appointment, some of which are miles apart. We are glad to note an increase in pastoral support, and were it not for two or three charges falling several dollars behind last year we would have shown a good rate of increase.

#### Membership.

929 Members have been received this year, the most notable gains being on the Lafayette, Rose Hill, Bristol, St. Charles and Swords Creek charges. All the other charges save three have made good gains. Although we have received this large number of members, yet the net gain in full membership will not be so large as last year. The Oakvale charge with 166 members was given to the West Virginia Conference. Counting this loss and loss otherwise, we will still show a good gain.

### Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies.

There are on the district 122 Sunday Schools, a gain of one over last year. The total enrollment of these 122 schools is 10,643, a small increase over last year. The increase last year over the preceding years was so large that we feel we have done well to hold up the record of last year.

There have been two new Epworth Leagues organized on the

district this year. We have now on the district seven Epworth Leagues and three Junior Leagues, all these are doing good work. We are hoping for a better day in the young people's work on the district.

### Laymen's Work.

We have tried to emphasize the importance of Laymen's work on the district and in a measure we have made some progress, especially in the eastern section of the district, and in the Gate City section. We feel the work done by these laymen will have good and lasting results.

#### District Conference.

There was held in August at the New River Church, Christianburg charge a very helpful and profitable District Conference. It was well attended and the people in the eastern end of the district appreciated it because there had not been a District Conference nearer than 100 miles of them for several years.

It is well known that it is a mission field and the prospects of growth were never brighted than they are today. Our people in Virginia are waking up as they have never wakened before to their opportunities. There is no reason with our present rate of progress, but that in a few years this will be as strong numerically and financially as any other section of the Conference.

In our humble way we have tried to faithfully perform the work that was assigned to us last Conference. During the year we have held all the 102 Quarterly Conferences in person, preached 330 times, visited 487 different homes, baptised 23, received 17 into full connection in the church, dedicated three churches, traveled 8991 miles, 7904 by railroad, 540 on horseback, in buggies, wagons and autos, walked 522 miles. This just represents the amount of travel necessary to reach the Quarterly Conferences, and other points incident to a District Superintendent's work.

Thanking Divine Providence for His goodness towards me and for an opportunity to work in his vineyard, I submit my second report from the Bristol District.

### CHATTANOOOGA DISTRICT

### J. A. Mitchell, Superintendent

We have tried to keep in mind throughout the year the things that make for the building up of the Kingdom of God, and the increasing of the spiritual life of His people, and we can truthfully say that on the Chattanooga District the Kingdom of God is growing, and that our people are more spiritual than they were a year ago.

Changes.—Rev. M. C. Bruner, who was appointed to the Copper Hill charge, soon after Conference adjourned, was changed to Englewood, leaving Copper Hill to be supplied; I found it difficult to get a man for the place, and Brother Byrd of Etowah was asked to look after the work at Copper Hill in connection with his work at Etowah, which he did with much success, having paid \$1200.00 on the church debt there this year.

Rev. R. F. Porter, pastor at Cleveland, was in April transferred by Bishop Henderson to the Saint Johns River Conference, and Rev. W. S. Gray of the Saint Johns River Conference was transferred to the Holston Conference and stationed at Cleveland, where he has had large success for the time he has been there.

Some of our pastors began their revival work early in the conference year, and this work has been persistently followed up on nearly every charge on the district, which has resulted in a large number of conversions, and a gain of more than ten per cent to our Church Membership.

This has been a year of debt paying. Many of our churches have made strenuous efforts this year to pay all their debts. The St. James church had a debt of \$12,500 at the beginning of the year, including the accumulation of interest, and through the persistent efforts of the pastor and the Official Board this debt has been provided for.

The Manker Memorial church has paid their debt of \$600 and the church and parsonage are now free from all debt.

Our First church at Athens has not only provided for their debt, but have installed a splendid pipe organ at a cost of \$3,000, which has added much in every way to the services of this church.

Our church at Highland Park has also installed this year a fine pipe organ which is said to be one of the best organs in the city, and have also provided for the debt on the church.

The sum of \$10,200 has been paid in improvements on churches and parsonages during the year. And a new church has been built at Coalmont on the Tracy City circuit at a cost of \$1500. At Englewood we have built this year a fine parsonage which will cost about \$1500.

The Sunday School work on the district is in a most excellent condition. Great care is exercised in the election and confirmation of Superintendents, our most competent and best workers are chosen for this office, and we have had a nice increase in our enrollment this year.

The Epworth Leagues and Junior Leagues are in most places doing good work, some of our Leagues are pursuing a systematic

course of study, and the Junior Leagues are studying the catechism.

The Chattanooga University and its affiliated school at Athens has had a very prosperous year, the total enrollment was the largest in its history, and the new year opens with large attendance.

The pastors' salaries have almost all been collected in full, some of them were small, too small, we are sorry to say, but we are hoping for an increase in the future.

As to my own work a brief word will do. Through a good Providence I have been permitted to personally attend all the Quarterly Conferences during the year, and have not been kept from any engagement because of ill health or bad weather. Many special meetings have been held; I have visited the weak points, and have tried to build up the waste places; I have assisted the pastors in revival meetings, and have tried to carefully look after all the details of the work.

To God who gives us grace for all good work, and who has blessed us with all spiritual blessings in Christ Jesus, we render hearty thanks.

#### HARRIMAN DISTRICT.

### B. M. Martin, Superintendent.

We bring you our Fifth Annual Report. It is not all that we desire; but more favorable conditions would have allowed better results. When our last session adjourned at Athens October 18, 1915, we had by appointment 28 regular charges and one Mission. For each charge a man had been appointed. But the lines were quickly broken. Robt. B. Stansell, appointed to Harriman, the best charge in the District, wired from Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 28, informing me of his election to the Field Secretaryship of Asbury Hospital, an institution of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and requested my consent together with that of Bishop Henderson, to his transfer to the Northern Minnesota Conference. Though disconcerting to the plans of the district, we gave our consent and urged Bishop Henderson to grant transfer.

Our task was to readjust men to care for the broken line. Bishop Henderson was 3,000 miles away on duty at the Bishop's Meeting and Boards of the Church in California. We could have made adjustment of men without consulting him. But we did not presume to do so. We wired our recommendations and he gave approval by telegram. D. R. Haney was moved from Jellico to Harriman; W. A. Martin from Crossville and Clarkrange to Jellico;

W. C. Martin from Byington and Scarboro to Crossville and Clarkrange. A. B. McKenzie, one of the two men appointed to LaFollette and Jacksboro, was placed at Byington and Scarboro, leaving H. M. Torrey in charge of full field at LaFollette and Jacksboro. J. S. Yeary announced as supply for the Morgan Springs charge early notified me that he could not enter upon duties of the work and we procured the services of G. F. Swafford, who later took charge of the circuit.

A. M. Rose, a regular conference appointee to the New Tazewell circuit, entered the field and worked until the last days of December and asked to be released because the outlook did not indicate adequate support. Bishop Henderson, on my recommendation, granted the release. His work was divided between W. J. Letsinger and F. T. Munsey on adjoining charges.

George H. Long, a supply appointed to Burrville circuit, made good until near the middle of April. But the latter part of said month offered his resignation. This was accepted and arrangements made to place Noel Cardwell, who was in May to finish the year's work in our Athens School.

Bro. Cardwell entered upon his duties first day in June and made a fine record. The financial depression upon us last year and which has still been felt more or less this year, has made it unfavorable to start new enterprises. The proposed unification of the two Methodisms has also delayed our contemplated church buildings at some points.

Our outlay on new buildings, repairs and old indebtedness was over \$5000.00. A much needed parsonage begun last year has been so nearly completed this year on the Big Valley circuit as to allow the pastor, J. F. Lynch, with his family, to occupy the same for nine months. The people of Rockwood, led by the heroic leadership of H. E. Little, put in an addition to the church costing \$900. This was done after paying off an indebtedness of \$1300.

The next largest liquidation of indebtedness was on the Harriman District Parsonage. On this has been applied \$757, leaving an indebtedness of only \$110. The amount invested now reaches nearly \$3500.

The revival work has been general this year. But the results have not equalled those of some former years.

Four of the pastors have failed to this hour to furnish me with data desired for report on this matter. The tabulated results show that we have had on the charges making special reports: 756 conversions and 592 accessions. This will probably show a net increase of membership of near 500 members on the district.

The various organizations on the district have about maintained their normal standing. We have one each of the Woman's Home and Foreign Societies, twenty Ladies' Aid Societies with a good membership, five Junior Epworth Leagues and thirteen Senior Epworth Leagues with tabulated membership respectively of 248 and 429.

The tabulation on Sunday Schools will show something like 102 schools with an enrollment about 8,000. Along with this we have four Home Departments and 13 Cradle Rolls.

The Annual Spring Rally of the Epworth Leagues of the Holston Conference was the most largely attended convention for a half dozen years and showing equal interest to all former years blessed and honored the headquarters of the District for three days and nights in the month of April.

The District Conference convening at Jacksboro the latter part of July was a gathering of much interest. We lacked our usual number of visiting leaders. But our own pastors and laymen put themselves into the conference in great shape. W. J. Lewis, the invincible worker in Gospel Team service, was with us. Dr. G. T. Francisco beat himself in his fine address on Sunday morning and Dean R. M. Millard of the Athens School preached to splendid advantage on Sunday and fairly won all hearts.

Without the last figures before us, giving results over Sunday, we cannot be accurate in reporting the results on salaries, Conference collections and benevolences. But note this: Our field has been all these years a difficult field to win collections. And subject to fluctuations because of the situations created by lumber camps, mining camps and the largeness of loss from strawberry and peach crops at times owing to these crop failures. We have not fully recovered from the financial depression so evident last year. Then the lower end of the district was seriously affected by crop failures mentioned above. We think, however, that the record will be about saved on the support of the pastors as a whole and possibly show some increase over last year. But fear the benevolences will show a falling aff due not only to above causes, but also to the neglect of pastors to begin early in the year to handle these matters.

Our greatest apprehension is for the collection for the Conference Claimants. We have done so well for this cause near to our hearts. And with the aid of some friendship money for the past two years, have led the whole conference in per capita giving on this cause. But we closed the year without this aid and had to leave the men after placing before them again and again the law of prorating, on their own conscience as well as on their limitations in carrying it out. If we show serious losses, we shall profoundly regret it. We have handled the work on the district in person, as has been our custom. Have only failed to meet two engagements during the entire year—then we substituted.

We have held 109 Quarterly Conferences and several adjourned

sessions and superintended the work of one Mission where no quarterly conferences have been required. Have preached upon an average of five times each week. Whether effective or not, we have been in labors abundant.

### JOHNSON CITY DISTRICT

### Rev. Samuel G. Ketron, Superintendent

In presenting the report of my fifth year's superintendency over the Johnson City District I wish to acknowledge in the beginning my profound gratitude to my ever-present God for His loving kindness and His guiding Spirit, which has presided over all my labors and blessed them very graciously. I am grateful also to the loyal preachers within my district who have continually co-operated with me in securing the results of this year of which we are mutually proud.

My desire is to make separate mention of each pastor's work in this report; hence these references to the various items in their totals to the statistical records of the conference secretary as they are transcribed from the pastors' individual reports.

A strong effort has been put forth in behalf of our financial interests throughout the district and in spite of adverse conditions in many places, the reports will equal last year's and possibly show increase.

Emphasis has been placed upon the evangelistic work this year in this district, with results for which we are glad. You are invited to note that every circuit and station in this district without a single exception, has had a revival this year; 1,931 conversions are recorded and these are not the ostentatious effervescence of sensational campaigns but rather the natural response to evangelistic awakening and hard work. It is interesting to note in this connection that 921 additions have been made to the church in this district also.

The Sunday Schools have maintained their numerical strength while they have increased in efficiency.

The young people's work has sustained an advance. The Senior Epworth League has 14 chapters in this district with an enrollment of 588 and the Junior Leagues number 6 splendid chapters with 395 members. Pastors are taking renewed interest in their young people with a response that is gladdening and telling in the general church efficiency.

Prayer and class meetings are observed in most of the churches.

The Methodist Advocate-Journal has a better report than last year, for while a loss was reported to our last conference, we now report that our paper has held its own and we feel the situation is ripe for some fine gains if a vigorous stimulus will be given to the subscriptions by the publishing office.

The Committee on Education will make good reports for our two schools, one at Baileyton and the other at Chuckey.

A noticeable feature of our district conference at Roan Mountain last July was the report of our ladies' work. The Woman's Missionary Society and the Woman's Foreign Society and the Ladies' Aid Society have each acquired new chapters and are doing a fine work. Their substantial aid is greatly appreciated at their respective charges.

A brief survey of the separate stations and circuits will be of interest to all.

Rev. T. E. Goodman has done a fine work at Baileyton. His wife has sustained a long illness which for a time hindered his work, but his report is withal a creditable one.

The Bloomingdale charge has had a splendid year. Brother D. L. Howell, the pastor, has worked to get good results and his report will show advancement on all lines. He has recorded 82 conversions and 72 additions.

A new church has been built at Arcadia, worth \$1,500; dedicated by Rev. R. M. Millard and Rev. A. C. Ketrun, assisted by the pastor, on fourth Sunday in September.

Rev. A. C. Ketron, the efficient pastor at Chuckey, has experienced a fine year in spite of three months' illness. Rev. E. W. Ackard, a local preacher, assisted effectively on this work; 138 conversions are reported on this charge and all claims paid in full.

Elizabethton members have come to love the pastor, Brother J. F. Rowe, who is one among the best in the district. His efforts have brought things to pass; all claims paid in full.

Rev. F. D. Watson is proving to be the right man in the right place in his work on the Fall Branch circuit. His people love him and stand by him.

Greeneville has passed through one of its finest years of history; 103 conversions, 47 additions to the church, and all claims paid in full are items in its fine report. The pastor, Rev. W. L. Oliver, has raised \$1,340.00 on church indebtedness and for improvements.

Greeneville circuit has been glad to greet Rev. I. B. Leonard with large congregations and to yield to his energetic work, 110 conversions; 54 persons have united with the church on this work. The Sunday Schools have attained 882 scholars as evidence of their growth.

Johnson City station was never in better condition. Under the leadership of Rev. J. M. Emert, the faithful pastor, this church has

had a great year. It has raised \$1,595.00 outside of the salaries and benevolences and these claims are all paid in full. The pastor reports 40 conversions and 30 net gain in membership.

Kingsport circuit has been heroically served by Brother W. R. Byerly. This good pastor has experienced great sadness during this year's pastorate, death having invaded the home and taken away for a while one of his daughters. Another daughter met with a serious accident and for days her life, too, hung in the balance, but she is now happily recovered. This circuit, however, presents a good report.

Limestone charge, under Brother W. C. Winslow, has a good report, showing 82 conversions and 26 additions to the church besides all claims paid in full.

Rev. R. L. Stapleton is the wide awake and beloved pastor at Morristown. This station is making a steady growth in attendance, membership, and influence. The pastor reports 57 conversions, 33 new members and all departments of his church in a healthy condition; \$825.00 of the \$1,400.00 indebtedness on the parsonage has been subscribed already by the membership and the balance is in sight. All other claims are met in full.

Rev. W. S. Bandy has been abundant in his labors on the Morristown circuit. He has raised \$186, which has been applied to church improvements on his work. More than \$1,500 has been raised with which to build a new church at Mt. Airy. Materials are being prepared and work begins at once on this new structure.

Brother A. A. Newman has been hard at work on one of the best circuits in the district and reports 53 conversions and 48 new members. The folks of this Mosheim circuit love Brother Newman and support him faithfully in his labors.

Rev. G. W. Matney, the alert pastor at Mountain City and Butler, has been doing a fine work in this splendid field. His churches have been strengthened by his direction.

Rev. M. H. Rambo, pastor on the Mountain City circuit, has done a fine work. He has raised \$700 and liquidated the debt on the parsonage and made some improvements on one of the churches and has a good subscription toward a new church at Trade.

Newport station looks like a new church since the improvements made by the pastor, Rev. J. C. Harmon, for which \$700 were raised. All claims are paid in full.

Rev. D. F. Smith has labored abundantly on the Newport circuit and has secured 66 conversions and 30 new members. A new church has been started on Webb's Creek and when finished will be worth \$1,000.

Parrottsville charge under the leadership of Rev. N. K. Rowe, has sustained a wonderful year; 88 conversions, 53 additions to the church; 901 enrolled full members and 717 Sunday School scholars, are a few items which he calls to our attention. One new church

has been built at Beach Bottom, worth \$1,500, was dedicated last June by the District Superintendent, assisted by Revs. W. T. Senter, M. M. Murrell, N. R. Rowe and A. A. Newman.

Roan Mountain circuit has experienced a phenomenal year. The untiring labors of Rev. J. E. Milburn have resulted in 177 conversions and 92 new members, \$23.00 increase on benevolences over last year and all claims met in full. He has also purchased a new school building from the county and this will be converted into a church.

Rev. J. F. Reed has had a good year on the Rogersville and White Horn work. His vigorous efforts to bring about good results have by no means failed. Two revivals resulted in much good besides 36 conversions and 11 new members. This charge pays more on benevolences according to its ability than any other in the district.

Rutledge circuit presents a splendid report of the work of its good pastor, Rev. W. D. Humphries. He has had 121 conversions and 99 accessions to the church, the major portion of the latter resulting from his revivals. The benevolences are in advance of last year and all salaries paid in full.

Sneedville and Thorn Hill have a good report. Rev. Solon Mcneese, a local preacher, was sent to this work by the last annual conference, but declined to go. Rev. W. A. Thompson was thereupon assigned to this work but he also did not go. Then Levi Murray, a third local preacher, was appointed and immediately took charge of the circuit and has done a fine work. He has had 39 conversions and 15 new members added to the membership. He has completed a new church also, called Liberty, valued at about \$1,000, which was dedicated last April by Rev. A. C. Ketron, assisted by the pastor.

Sulphur Springs has had a great year under its pastor, Rev. R. E. Walker. The Johnson City District Camp Meeting, lasting ten days, convened in the bounds of this charge. Rev. J. M. Melear, Editor of our Methodist Advocate-Journal, preached on the first Sunday and Monday. This camp meeting resulted in nearly a score of conversions and greatly stimulated the church. The pastor reports 82 conversions and 33 additions to the charge. This work never fails to bring up all claims.

Rev. C. L. Poulston has wrought splendidly in the Surgoinsville territory. He reports 57 conversions and 15 additions and the benevolences, though not large, double last year's.

Rev. T. O. Brumley, pastor on the Telford circuit, has had a prosperous year. His report shows 140 conversions and 82 new members received. The Sunday Schools on this circuit have been growing healthily for the past few years. It was thought that the high water mark was reached last year at 942 scholars but the tide rose this year to 988.

Unicoi circuit has had unparalelled success under the vigorous work of its pastor, Rev. W. E. O. Robeson. He reports 236 conversions and a net gain of 76 in membership. His benevolences almost double last year's. All ministerial claims are met in full. There is a fine brick community church at Piney Flats valued at \$6,000, in which our church possesses one-fourth interest. This church was dedicated last summer by Dr. John M. Crowe, pastor of the Munsey Memorial M. E. Church, South, of Johnson City.

### KNOXVILLE DISTRICT

### W. K. Harris, Superintendent

In presenting this, my second report as the superintendent of the Knoxville district, I may say that the year has been one of unusual difficulty. The year began with a feeling of unrest among the people of several charges. A number of changes among the pastors became necessary early in the conference year which seriously affected the charges concerned. An unusual amount of sickness among our pastors and their families has made other changes necessary and has hindered others from the best work. In each of the following charges a change of pastors was made during the year, viz: Oakwood, Knoxville circuit, Asbury and South Knoxville, Jefferson City and Friendsville. Some of these changes were made under disturbed conditions which vitally affected the work of the year.

The Methodist Forward Movement, inaugurated last year under the leadership of Bishop Henderson, reached its climax in a district-wide revival campaign in the month of April. Much personal work had been done, especially in the city churches, for some weeks preceding the meetings in the churches. Practically all the city and suburban churches united in the campaign and a number of the circuits were represented. The meetings closed with the passion week and resurrection Sunday. A fine spirit of co-operation was seen and felt among the ministers and laymen. Many conversions were reported and a goodly number added to the church. During the entire campaign from May, 1915, to May, 1916, more than a thousand persons were added to the church, more than five hundred took the Time Legion pledge and nearly two score pledged themselves to definite Christian service whenever, however, and wherever the Lord may call.

Many successful revivals have been held by the pastors on their own charges while some have heard the Macedonian call and have gone to the assistance of pastors in charges other than their own.

A very successful union revival was held at Sevierville by J. C

Patty and O. W. Stapleton. More than two hundred conversions were reported and fifty-three added to our church. In two other meetings on this charge, conducted by J. O. Cox and the pastor, as many more were added to the church.

Church building enterprises have been noticably hindered by the prospect of Methodist Unification. In every place the people are delighted in the hope of a united Methodism and in some places are impatient to await the necessary legislation by the General Conferences. Nowhere have we been able to interest the people in a building project if there is a probability that it cannot be used to an advantage by the united church. One small chapel has been erected on the Pigeon Forge charge at Huskey's Grove. At Park City we need a ten thousand dollar building but the trustees think it unwise at this time to begin such a building and have decided to erect instead a fine bungalow on the rear of the splendid new lot on Virginia avenue. This will face Chestnut street and will be finished inside without partitions and used as a place of worship until the new church is erected when it will be completed and used as a minister's residence. A new parsonage is under way on the Fair Garden charge. The lot has been provided and a large part of the material is on the ground with sufficient cash and good subscriptions to complete the building. The Jones' Chapel parsonage has been newly furnished with more than two hundred dollars' worth of heavy furniture. A debt on the property amounting to about five hundred dollars has been paid. Maryville has added more than a hundred dollars' worth of furniture to the parsonage. Lonsdale and Second Church have each spent more than a thousand dollars in repairing and beautifying their respective church buildings. The pastor at Sevierville has shown commendable energy in raising the indebtedness on that church, which amounted to about fourteen hundred dollars.

Perhaps the most noted building project, however, is the new college building at Murphy College in Sevierville. Dr. E. A. Bishop, our worthy president of that institution, has worked heroically for this building for a number of years and has succeeded beyond our fondest hopes. The building when completed will cost \$12,000, and will make possible a fine increase in our student body of that most helpful institution. An imperative need for this school is a home for girls such as is provided by the Woman's Home Missionary Society at Athens and many other schools of our church.

Some salaries will be deficient. No district or conference sustentation fund was provided and we have felt the need of it. In many cases a discouraged class may be persuaded to provide the larger part of a deficiency if we are able to provide a small part of it. These deficiencies occur almost entirely on charges where the work has been disturbed by change of pastors or in some other manner. The salaries are entirely inadequate for the needs of the

pastors and their families. We have on this district eight men who must provide each for a wife and seven or more children from a salary of six or eight hundred and fifty dollars, and house. The cost of living has increased at a much more rapid rate than the increase in salaries making the financial problems of the district increasingly difficult. The floods on some of the rivers damaged many of our best people and in some cases they have been unable to pay the usual amounts for the work of the church. The reports indicate that the benevolent collections are about the same as last year. The raising of the disciplinary benevolences has become more difficult since we have doubled the claim for conference claimants. The people do not seem to understand that these items are to be made a part of the budget as salaries and in most cases they are raised as a benevolence by a special collection.

We have now twenty Epworth Leagues in the district and almost every one of them has had a prosperous year.

The Laymen's Association under the leadership of Dr. M. S. Roberts and his associates, F. W. Biddle and C. O. Fowler, has done very effective work. A number of teams of laymen have visited many of the charges and their work has been highly appreciated. Especial mention should be made of the work of W. I. Marshall, who gave his vacation from the hardware store to visiting the charges and speaking in the interest of better Sunday Schools and a closer fellowship with God.

Many charges, pastors and laymen deserve personal mention. Their names should be on the honor roll. But we must refrain except for the few charges who have added more than fifty members, as follows, viz: Chestnut Hill, 66; East Main Avenue, 60; First Church, 107; Second Church, 62; Trinity, 68; Sevierville, 105. While Maryville was in many respects the most difficult field in the district the pastor has won the hearts of the people of his church and they have so nobly responded to his efforts that, though no revival was held during the year, 22 conversions are reported; 43 members are added to the church, all salaries paid in full, benevolences equal with last year, the indebtedness of \$140 from last year all paid in full with fifty dollars in the treasury; while friends outside the church donated to the pastor with special request that it be not reported on salary sixty dollars as an appreciation of his services in the town.

Many blunders have been made by the district superintendent for which he takes the whole responsibility. For the victories we give glory to God and the pastors, than whom as a whole there was never a more loyal and devoted band of men, and to the fine body of laymen of which this district is composed.

#### COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

We as a conference can but repeat that which has been hitherto expressed in that the generous co-operation of our Board of Education with our schools, in standardizing curricula, faculties and plants, has been in the highest degree helpful.

Its thorough and painstaking inspection of educational conditions that now obtain throughout the country, promises much for the church and is expressive of a commendable forward movement.

We heartily commend and approve as we did last year, the apportionment by the General Conference Commission on Finance, of the one Public Educational collection authorized by the Discipline, being eighty per cent. at the order of the Conference and twenty per cent. for the Board of Education.

The publication of The Christian Student, the Board's official organ, is decidedly helpful.

It contains most useful information relative to Educational interests and should be widely read.

Dr. Thomas Nicholson, now Bishop, for eight consecutive years served the church in the capacity of Corresponding Secretary of our Board of Education. His administration was eminently successful; and especially do we desire to record our appreciation of his interest in our schools of the South.

His promotion to the episcopacy we predict will bring a worthy climax to his eventful life.

Abram. W. Harris, L. L. D., the worthy successor of Bishop Nicholson, brings to this office a wide and varied experience in the educational work of our church. We welcome him among us and anticipate for him a most successful administration.

### UNIVERSITY OF CHATTANOOGA

Brethren:

The University of Chattanooga is an institution of higher learning owned by the Methodist Episcopal Church as represented in the General Conference. The assets of the Institution at this time, including grounds, buildings and endowment, amounts to more than \$1,000,000. The combined campus comprises 33 acres. There are sixteen buildings in all. The endowment fund at the close of the present endowment campaign will be slightly more than \$500,000.

The Board of Trustees of the Institution are thirty in number and by the Charter of the Institution, two-thirds of this number must be members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. On the Board of Trustees at present there are twenty members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, seven of whom are ministers and three of whom

are Bishops. The President of the Board of Trustees is a Bishop of the Church, the Secretary of the Board is also a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The Executive Committee is composed of seven members, four of whom are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

The University has been constituted the central institution of higher learning of our denomination in the South. The Board of Education of our Church, accordingly, is seeking in every possible way to affiliate with the University, our several academies and seminaries in the adjoining states. The success of this effort is seen in the fact that we have in the University this year students from the following academies and secondary schools: Murphy College, Oakland Seminary, McLemoresville Collegiate Institute, Baxter Seminary, Mt. Zion Seminary, Epworth Seminary, John H. Snead Seminary and Wesleyan Academy. Recent graduates of the University are principals of the following academies: Mt. Zion Seminary, Epworth Seminary and Washington Collegiate Institute.

The Board of Education of our Church in addition to making a subscription of \$48,000 toward the endowment of the University, makes each year loans to worthy and promising students of the University amounting to approximately \$2,000.

Another fact bearing upon the relation of our University to the Church may be seen in the fact that there are this year in the student body of the College and the Athens School more than thirty young men who are preparing for the ministry besides some other students who will enter special forms of Christian work. Our graduates receive Teachers' Certificates in this State without examination. Six or eight of our charges in the Holston Conference are supplied by students of the Institution.

The student attendance for the year which has just opened shows a very substantial increase over last year both in the College and in the Athens School. Last year there were enrolled in the academic departments for the nine months, 450 students. In the Summer Session there were enrolled 402, making the total enrollment for the year in all departments 852. If the same rate of increase continues for the second semester the total attendance in the academic departments for the year show an increase of twenty per cent over last year.

There is an increasing tendency for graduates of our Athens School to go on to the College for the completion of their education. Five members of last year's class entered the College last month.

The academic earnestness of the student body is very satisfactory. This is noticeable particularly in the classes matriculating for the first time. Students matriculated promptly this autumn and the work of the class rooms was begun without delay. Literary Society

activities have opened with good interest. The Glee Clubs and other musical organizations which ordinarily begin activities in midyear are at work now.

The moral tone of the campus is very satisfactory. The Christian Associations, both among the young men and the young women, have energetic management. Delegates were sent last summer to the student Conference at Black Mountain. This has given an impetus to the Association work for the year. Only a small minority of the student body are without Church membership or affiliation. A majority of the students are Methodists, both in the College and in the Athens School. The Baptists and Presbyterians come next in point of numbers.

Currency has been given in some quarters to a report that the faculty of the University permit and encourage dancing among the students. This is not true; they do neither. They have specific instructions to do neither and propose in this as in other particulars to be loyal to the Church and to be careful to safeguard the best interests of the student body in every particular.

The one problem of great concern to the Institution at the present moment is the successful closing of the endowment campaign which was opened in 1912. The last day of the campaign is December 1st. In order to make settlement in full with the General Education Board and to receive the proportion of subscription promised by them it is necessary to collect the full amount subscribed locally and to provide for all of the accumulated indebtedness of the University. Within the four years that the subscription has been running, there has been an inevitable shrinkage due to death and other causes amounting to some \$50,000. It will, therefore, be necessary to secure new subscriptions covering this large amount. To close this campaign successfully within the next few days will mean securing for the University in lump sum \$51,000.00, which was conditionally pledged by two sources in New York. But very much more important than this even, it will place the institution upon the preferred list of 103 American Colleges which will receive in perpetuity the benefaction of the General Education Board. This fact alone would almost guarantee the future of the University financially. To fail in this supreme effort, on the other hand, would mean calamitous and irreparable loss, and would give the Institution a set-back from which it would not recover for many years. It is necessary to have the full and immediate co-operation of all the friends of the Institution at this moment.

The University craves the hearty and continuous support of all our people. The co-operation of our ministers and official laymen will be of very great value. With increased facilities and at the present rate of increase of our student body it is evident that in two or three years more, we are to have a very much larger group

of students than ever before and the ministry of the Institution will widen beyond the expectation of its friends.

#### MURPHY COLLEGE

Murphy College has entered upon its 25th year, with an increase of 25 per cent in its higher departments. The total registration for 1916 was 437, this number for the year being probably the best in the history of the school. Miss Esker McNelly of the Intermediate Department, Mr. Victor H. Klein of the Science and Higher English, and Miss C. Evelyn Bishop of the Music Department, declined re-election. Their places have been filled by the election of Mr. F. A. Roller, University of Tennessee, a teacher of several years' experience; Miss Mae Flanagin, class of 1914, and Miss Ella Miller, an accomplished musician of several years' experience. Dr. E. A. Bishop and his nine assistants are doing a great work for the educational uplift of this Mountain section.

The Trustees have let the contract for the addition to the administration building; it is to be two stories with full basement, 53 by 63 feet. The addition will cost between \$11,000 and \$12,000 and will provide accommodation for 200 students. This building is greatly needed to take care of the large number who wish to attend the Institution.

There is great need of additional dormitory facilities, especially for the girls. It is earnestly hoped that some one can be found soon who will provide a home for our young women.

The religious interest last year was deep and strong. The two Christian Associations are very active and the revival services brought substantial gains for the church. Rev. Richard Millard spent a week in the school with a fruitage of 21 decisions and 63 signers of Life Covenant cards. Later a union revival service conducted by Brother Patty and Brother Stapleton swept the community and the school, gathering into the fold of Christ almost every young man and woman of the Institution.

### OAKLAND SEMINARY

Oakland Seminary began its work for the present scholastic year, September 4, with a very large enrollment. Several changes have been made in the Faculty from last year. The teaching force for this year is as follows:

L. E. Easterly, Ph. B., Principal; Mrs. J. N. Pierce, Ph. B.; Mrs.

J. F. King; Miss Elsa Fields; Miss Flora Overholser, and Miss Sara Porter Lyle.

This school has an ideal location, splendid buildings, and is in a community that is far above the average, which co-operates with the school at all times.

The course at present consists of a full four year high school course. Almost one-half the students are doing high school work.

The main building, which was enlarged three years ago, is entirely too small for its present enrollment, and other additions are demanded. A well equipped laboratory is badly needed. The school has a very complete Domestic Science Department, and the work is being carried on very successfully.

Thus far we have an enrollment of 210, with bright prospects of several others coming in later. Another pressing need is a dormitory for the accommodation of those students living outside the community. While the people of Baileyton very hospitably open their homes to the students these accommodations are wholly inadequate, and numbers of worthy students have to be turned away.

Some concrete walks are to be built, and several other minor improvements are being contemplated for this year. With these improvements, and the continued support and co-operation of the people of Baileyton and surrounding community, this promises to be one of the most successful years the school has ever experienced.

### WESLEYAN ACADEMY

The Wesleyan Academy at Chuckey, Tennessee, began its work of the present scholastic year on September 5th, 1916.

The enrollment at the opening surpassed in numbers that of any previous year in the history of the school.

Dr. W. A. Wright, an experienced and popular educator, is continued as Principal

The following teachers constitute the Board of Instruction: Prof. W. A. Wright, Principal; Miss E. Maude Cox; Miss Jessie R. Gray; Miss Stanna Hawkins; Miss Lillian Gillespie and Miss Mamie Bitner.

All of this corps of teachers have had Academic and college training and are fully competent for the work of their several departments. They are all worthy and take special interest in the moral welfare of those under their tuition.

Of the last year's graduating class, fourteen in number, eleven are now in college.

The department of music under the direction of Miss Bitner, offers the best facilities on reasonable terms.

Some material improvements on the school buildings have re-

cently been made, and supplies much needed have been secured.

The increasing demand for greater capacity in buildings is daily manifest.

The people of Chuckey and vicinity are very generous in opening their homes for the accommodation of non resident students.

Board and rooms in the dormitory and in private homes can be secured at reasonable rates, while some students choose to board themselves.

The school year consists of eight months, divided into two terms of four months each.

The generous spirit shown in material aid from special friends is gratefully acknowledged.

Dr. F. M. Cones, Feld Secretary, devotes all his time to the general interests of this school.

With this efficient faculty daily at their posts, and a due co-operation on the part of patrons and friends, Wesleyan Academy may expect brighter days.

### ENDOWMENT FUND CAMPAIGN

- 1. Whereas, a general intensive campaign for the increase of enodwment funds for conference claimants has been inaugurated in a large number of conferences throughout our connection, and reports indicate that this movement is meeting with marvelous success;
- 2. Whereas, the Board of Conference Claimants has decided to use all its influence and a large part of its income in assisting the annual conferences throughout the church in planning, inaugurating and pushing such a campaign to a successful consummation, by furnishing the necessary literature, and expert workers from the General Office.
- 3. And whereas, our own conference has already too long neglected this important matter, be it

Resolved, (1) That we are convinced that the time for an intensive campaign for the raising of a \$50,000 endowment fund for our

conference claimants has come; that therefore we recommend, (2) to appoint a permanent Conference Fund Commission, consisting of the five District Superintendents, one layman and one minister from each district, with the Resident Bishop of this area as chairman. For the purpose of taking this matter under advisement and determining upon the most feasible plan for projecting and launching an intensive campaign in this conference for an endowment fund of \$50,000. This Commission shall meet at Knoxville at the call of the Bishop within three months after the adjournment of this conference session and shall then determine upon the time and program of the campaign. And as we are convinced that a campaign of education and publicity should precede the soliciting of pledges and contributions, we recommend that at least six months be given to this preliminary work, beginning with the general observance of a day set apart by the Commission as Veterans' Day and followed by a general distribution of literature bearing upon this subject.

We further recommend appointment by the Bishop of a Campaign Manager to take charge of the intensive work in soliciting funds for the permanent endowment fund as soon as may be advisable.


