**THEODORE W. DWIGHT.**

**Died June 28, 1892.**

THEODORE W. DWIGHT was professor emeritus of the law of contracts and maritime and admiralty law in the Columbia Law School, first established in 1858, and directed by him with distinguished success for thirty-three years. In this long period of time more than 10,000 students came under his instruction, and many prominent members of the bar in New York, as well as in other States of the Union, cherish the memory of their indefatigable teacher.

For devoted as he was to the duties of his chair, Prof. Dwight found time to act as counsel and referee in many important cases and to enrich legal literature with works of permanent value, while the breadth of his literary culture was recognized in his election to the presidency of the Dante Club. He was for a number of

years Vice-President of the Board of State Charities, and President of the New York Prison Association.

Prof. Dwight became a Fellow of the American Geographical Society in 1868.

He sat as a member of the Council for the years 1870-1876, and again from 1883 to 1892.
