HU GADARN.*

THE following wood-cut is the copy of a Bas Relief found under the Church of Notre Dame, in Paris, in the year 1711, and which was first published by Montfaucon, in his "L'Antiquité Expliquée," from whence it was copied, in the "Early History of the Cymry," by the Rev. Peter Roberts, who considers the Hesus of Gaul, and the Hu of the Cymry, to have been one person, and that the attitude, in which he is here represented, "denotes either clearing the ground or pruning, either of which is," according to the Triads, "suitable to the character of Hu Gadarn."
