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PREFACE.

IN the former Volume of the Society's Transactions, the premiums offered for the Year enfuing, were intermixed with the papers published under the feveral Heads of Agriculture, Chemistry, Polite Arts, Manufactures, Mechanicks, and Colonies and Trade, but the necessity of waiting till the time of renewing the premiums was expired, which by the Rules of the Society is the fecond Wednefday in April, occafioned fuch delay, that the book could not be printed before the Society's adjournment during the Summer months took place; it has therefore been judged proper to change the mode of arrangement, and to print the feveral papers, intended to form the prefent volume, under their different Heads, adding the Lift of Premiums compleat at the end of the book; this will appear more methodical and commodious, and expedite the annual publication.

Another circumftance occurs in this volume which requires fome explanation.

In order to give the public the most clear information poffible, of the diffribution of the feveral rewards beftowed by the Society, a general flatement of them from the first institution to the Year 1782, was inferted in the first volume, but as many perfons may be defirous of knowing to what individuals the rewards have been adjudged, a lift of those who have received them, is now introduced into each Clafs, beginning with the year 1775, and ending with the year 1783. To fuch as are not fully acquainted with the proceedings of the Society, it will not very plainly appear, why the year 1775 is made choice of for beginning the lift in this volume.

It is neceffary therefore to obferve, that many of the papers communicated to the Society before that period, were given to the late Mr. Dossie, to be inferted in the work

work published by him, under the Title of Memoirs of Agriculture and other Oeconomical Arts, and as in the third volume of that work, a list of fuch perfons as had been rewarded by the Society previous to that time, is inferted, the list given in this volume will ferve as a continuation, and make a compleat Catalogue of the rewards hitherto bestowed to promote the views of the inftitution, with the names of those to whom they have been given, annexed.

The favourable reception which the first volume of the Transactions met with, has shewn the utility of such an annual publication, and it is believed the perusal of the following sheets, will afford equal matter of instruction and entertainment, and still further prove (if further proof is necessary) the great benefits which have accrued to the community from the rewards which the meritorious have received from the Society.

The future Volumes of this Work will a 4 furnifh

furnish means of conveying to the world the Sentiments of ingenious Men, on subjects the most interesting to every commercial Country, viz. Improvements in ARTS, MANUFACTURES, and COMMERCE. The Correspondence therefore of all such is invited, that those thoughts which tend to promote the public Good, may be preferved, and the Authors of them recorded in a manner honourable to themsfelves, and beneficial to Mankind.

It is here unneceffary to enumerate particularly the feveral articles which will be found in the following fheets, yet it may not be amifs to point out fome of them.

In AGRICULTURE, the reader will find great attention has been paid to the planting Trees for Timber, an object highly deferving every encouragement the Society can beftow upon it, and from the number and refpectability of the Candidates who have offered in claim of those rewards, there

there can be no doubt fuch premiums have ftimulated many of the first Characters in the Kingdom to turn their thoughts towards this species of improvement.

Some obfervations will be found under the fame head, refpecting the use of the Larch Tree, and a comparative examination of the Drill and Broad-Cast Husbandry, a subject of much Debate among those gentlemen who have attentively considered this branch of Agriculture.

A paper is also added containing fome further remarks on the culture and use of the Turnep-rooted Cabbage, which may ferve as a supplement to those Letters inferted in the former Volume, and still further shew the advantages that will attend a more enlarged cultivation of that excellent Plant. These are some of the principal matters under this Class, but many other useful ones will be found on the perusal of the Work.

Under the heads of CHEMISTRY, MA-NUFACTURES, and MECHANICKS, are inferted fome papers relative to each of those feveral Objects of the Society's Regard.

Among thefe the raifing Silk Worms to Advantage in this Kingdom, will appear from fome Letters now inferted, more practicable than has been generally imagined, efpecially as it is feen that there is a probability of obtaining food for those useful infects among our indigenous plants; a circumstance of great importance, when it is confidered how precarious their existence must be in this Climate, if the Mulberry tree is, as generally thought, their only support.

The Letters inferted in the clafs of Mechanicks, on the Gun Harpoon, it is believed, will afford much fatisfaction to every one who knows the great Confequence of the Greenland Fifhery, both as a Nurfery for hardy feamen, and for enabling us to fupply

fupply ourfelves in a great measure, with the immense quantity of Fish Oil, consumed in this Country.

In the class of POLITE ARTS, will be found a method of taking imprefiions in Colours, from Mezzotinto Plates, an art hitherto unpublished, but which, when well executed, produces a very beautiful effect.

Having thus, in a fummary manner, given an account of fome of the papers contained in the following pages, the whole is now fubmitted to the candid Reader, well affured that when the ufefulnefs of the Society becomes univerfally known, it cannot fail of receiving the fupport of a generous Publick.
