## PORTO RICO.

Report of transactions at San Juan and subports during January, 1901.

SAN JUAN, P. R., February 5, 1901.

SIR: I have the honor to make the following report of transactions of the Service at this port and the six subports of Porto Rico for the

month of January, 1901.

San Juan.—Number of vessels inspected, 20. The French steamship

Olinde Roderiguez, from Hayti, San Domingo, arrived on the 17th

instant. The baggage of 21 steerage passengers, consisting of 14 pieces, was disinfected. One bag of mail also disinfected, and 7 of the passengers vaccinated. The vessel was admitted to free pratique.

The Spanish steamship Cataluna, from Havana, Colon, and Venezuelan ports, arrived on the 18th instant, and was held in quarantine as usual.

She carried 26 passengers for San Juan, the immunity of whom as to yellow fever was considered satisfactory. The baggage of 1 passenger, 2 valises and 1 trunk, was disinfected and 3 passengers vaccinated.

On the 19th instant the provisional flag steamship *Julia* entered. She was from Havana via other Cuban ports, Santo Domingo, Macoris, Ponce, and Mayaguez. Disinfected at Santiago as usual. Passengers all immune and the vessel given free pratique.

On the 24th instant the French steamship *Fournel* arrived from Colon, St. Thomas, via Ponce. Vessel was held in quarantine to prevent steerage passengers from Colon and crew from landing, and transacted her

business under guard.

The provisional flag steamship *Maria Herrera* entered on the 29th from Havana via other Cuban ports and Puerto Plata. She had been disinfected at Santiago, Cuba, but 2 nonimmune passengers were held in quarantine at the island to complete their period of observation. Two valises disinfected. Vessels admitted to free pratique. Total number of persons vaccinated during the month, 15. Influenza has made its appearance in San Juan. Any data that I am able to obtain in this connection will be forwarded later.

The following is a report of the vessels inspected at the subports: Mayaguez, 14; Arecibo, 6; Humacao, 8; Aguadilla, 7; Fajardo, 0,

and Arroyo, 8.

The following constitute the mortality reports from the subports: Mayaguez, no report; Arecibo, 85; Humacao, 51; Aguadilla, 37; Fajardo, 27; Arroyo, 12.
