Acting Assistant Surgeon Wailes reports as follows: Week ended March 31, 1908. Present officially estimated population, 300. General sanitary condition of this port and the surrounding country during the week, good.

Bills of health were issued to the following-named vessel, Corinto.

### HONDURAS.

Report from Tela, fruit port—Sanitary conditions good—Smallpox reported in interior.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Roe reports, March 28:

The general health of this locality is very good. It is reported that smallpox is prevalent in the interior.

#### INDIA.

Report from Calcutta—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Plague in India and Bengal.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, March 12:

During the week ended February 22 there were 112 deaths from cholera, 29 from plague, and 9 from smallpox in Calcutta. In Bengal there were 1,158 cases of plague, with 910 deaths, and in India there were 6,842 cases of plague, with 5,502 deaths.

#### JAPAN.

Report from Yokohama—Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports:

Number of emigrants per steamship *Mongolia* recommended March 18 for rejection or detention: For Honolulu, advised to wait, 27; for San Francisco, advised to wait, 6. Per steamship *Aki Maru*, March 18: For Seattle, rejected, 1; advised to wait, 17. All rejections and detentions were for trachoma.

Report from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants— Smallpox—Plague and smallpox at Osaka—Vaccinations performed by the Service.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, March 10:

Supplemental bills of health were issued during the week ended March 7 to 2 steamships, and there were inspected 2 vessels, 152 members of crews, 3 cabin and 3 steerage passengers. Seventy-five steerage passengers were bathed and had their effects disinfected by steam. Manifests were viséed for 17,607 pieces of freight, aggregating 1,821 tons. Vaccination certificates were issued to 75 persons. Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship Shawmut for Seattle, passed 20, recommended for rejection 19; steamship Asia for Honolulu, passed 48, recommended for rejection 80. Bills of health were prepared for the Shawmut, Asia, and Inverclyde, but were not issued, the sailing of these vessels being postponed on account of the severe storm prevailing.

The official report of the health department shows smallpox 79 cases and 47 deaths.
