Report from Honolulu-Examination of rats for plague infection.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Currie reports that during the week ended April 4, 173 rats were examined bacteriologically at the plague laboratory of the Service at Honolulu. No plague infection found.

Reports from Ceiba, fruit port—Railroad communication with the interior—Stegomyia present.

Dearth of good drinking water continues. Mosquitoes, Anopheles, Cutex, and Stegomyia calopus abundant.

April 11 a railroad was completed with Ceiba as its terminus. railroad extends 25 miles into the cultivated districts of the neighboring territory and, with various auxiliary lines into the adjacent farms, traverses in its route several towns, villages, and settlements. will bring the inhabitants of these places into close communication with this port, and therefore the health conditions of all towns along the railroad will, in a measure, contribute to similar conditions existing in Ceiba. No passenger service has been instituted on this road. Such a service will shortly be installed.

Report from Tela, fruit port.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Roe reports as follows: Week ended April 11. Present officially estimated population, about 1,250. General sanitary condition of this port and the surrounding country dur ing the week, good.
