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
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
THE CONSTRUCTION PROCESS



Honor Fraternities

Phi Beta Kappa

The Eta of Virginia chapter of the Phi Beta Kappa Society annually elects a limited number of juniors and seniors to membership. In electing these members in course, the Chapter seeks to recognize academic attainment, moral character, responsible citizenship, and a broad intellectual curiosity. No more than 10% of a prospective graduating class can be elected. Consideration is given on an individual basis to those students who, having completed at least four semesters at Hampden-Sydney, and having failed no courses, meet the following criteria:

- I. A minimum cumulative GPA of 3.800 on work at Hampden-Sydney for those in their sixth semester; or, for those in their eighth semester, a minimum GPA of 3.300 on work at Hampden-Sydney.
- II. A college record which, as determined by the Chapter, demonstrates that the student has
- an interest in the literary heritage of the Englishspeaking peoples;
- a conceptual grasp of mathematical structures and derivations;
- an understanding of the religious and philosophical roots of Western culture;
- familiarity with the conceptual structure and heuristic methods of modern science;
- a perception of the historical development of the government and culture of the United States;
- a substantive grasp of the historical development of the institutions of Western culture;
- a commitment to the liberal ideal of education as revealed by a prudently balanced and selected program of courses.

The application of the standards of Section II may result in the election of some students whose cumulative GPA's are lower than those of candidates who are not elected. Fulfillment of minimum course requirements does not *per se* satisfy the criteria listed above.

Omicron Delta Kappa is a national leadership honor society for college men and women. It was founded in 1914 at Washington & Lee University to recognize and encourage superior scholarship and leadership by men and women of exemplary character. Membership in ODK is a mark of highest distinction and honor.

The Lambda Circle was founded at Hampden-Sydney on April 12, 1924, and is the eleventh oldest of the society's more than 200 circles. To be selected as a member of the Lambda Circle, a junior or senior must be in the top 35% of his class and must have actively participated in three and demonstrated constructive leadership in two of the five areas of college life considered by the society: scholarship; athletics; social service, religious activities, and campus government; journalism, speech, and the mass media; and creative and performing arts.

Men selected for membership are tapped in the fall and spring.

The members of Omicron Delta Kappa seek to use their personal influence as campus leaders to better campus life and to encourage high standards in all activities.

Alpha Psi Omega

Alpha Psi Omega is a national fraternity honoring outstanding work in the theatre arts. The Hampden-Sydney chapter was established in 1932, and was chartered as the Delta Delta Cast. The fraternity was reactivated in the Spring of 1995. Members meet their criteria by acting, directing, designing, or working in technical areas for a minimum of three Fine Arts Department-Jongleurs productions. Members must also exhibit dedication, a working knowledge of all areas of theatre production, and outstanding ability in their particular field of interest.

Football:

New Year, Same Expectation





Although the calendar showed this to be the 2004 season, the expectations and challenges facing the Tiger football team remained as if it were still 2003. Hampden-Sydney entered the 2004 campaign coming off a highly successful 2003 season in which the Tigers established team, conference, and national scoring records, while individual players had career seasons. However, as good as the 2003 season was, it can be defined in some ways by the lone pitfall of the entire season: in week four, the Tigers fell in a heartbreaking lastminute loss to Bridgewater. That one game kept the team from accomplishing its goals of winning an Old Dominion Athletic Conference champion-ship and advancing into the NCAA Tournament.

Those two goals are defined by the last three decades of Hampden-Sydney College football. Under the tutelage of legendary coach Stokeley Fulton, the 1970's were the glory years of Tiger football. In the early '70s, Fulton's squads won four straight Mason Dixon Conference Championships. The 1970 and 1971 teams advanced to the Knute Rockne Bowl, the equivalent of today's Stagg Bowl, except that it was then limited to east coast small college teams. The Tigers joined the ODAC in 1976 and a year later, Fulton's team captured the program's first-ever ODAC title.

With that title came a berth in the NCAA Tournament. Despite falling to Albany State in the tournament contest, the Tigers still could revel in the fact that the team had captured five conference crowns in eight years and experienced three post-season tournament berths. However, the Tiger football program has not tasted that post-season glory since 1977. Meanwhile, Hampden-Sydney, which won four Old Dominion Athletic Conference titles in the first 11 years of affiliation with the conference, has now been locked out of a conference championship since Joe Bush led the team to the crown in 1987. In that 16-year span, Emory and Henry College, which had won the conference title outright just one time before 1987, has captured nine ODAC crowns, while Bridgewater, a team Hampden-Sydney has beaten 50 times in 60 meetings, and archrival Randolph-Macon have each won three.

Entering the new millennium, Hampden-Sydney was coming off a tough decade (1990s) in which the team won just 40 of 60 contests, including just four games total from 1997 through 1999. Having reached rock-bottom, the Tiger program

turned to Marty Favret who had engineered a high-scoring and successful offense at ODACfoe Catholic University, to resurrect the storied program. Favret's Tigers won four games, as many as were captured in the late '90s combined, during the 2000 season, then followed that up with a 5-5 performance a year later. The Favret-led Tigers seemed to have arrived in 2002 as the team finished 8-2 overall and 5-1 in the ODAC. Poised to finally take the seat at the head of the table in the ODAC last season, the expectations were spoiled with a last minute controversial victory by the Bridgewater Eagles in week four. The Tigers trudged ahead in victorious fashion over the final six weeks of the season, rolling up scoring records and setting individual standards that many would consider to be unbreakable. Overall, in 2003 the team led the nation (all divisions) in scoring, averaging 47.2 points-per-game, while the 520 yards of offense per game was the nation's second-best feat. Meanwhile, JD Ricca became the first Tiger quarterback to pass for 29 touchdowns and 3,000 yards in one season, while CW Clemmons' 24 touchdowns established a new Tiger and ODAC record. Nationally, Conrad Singh led the NCAA with 98 receptions for over 1,400 yards and 11 TDs. He garnered national acclaim as a finalist for Division III's Heisman Trophy, the Gagliardi Award. Meanwhile, his 287 career catches placed him third all-time in NCAA Division III history. However, despite the acclaim, the Tigers were still shut out of post season play for the 27th consecutive year.

Now a year later, not much has changed, including the goals that are certainly within reach. Hampden-Sydney's football program has seemingly come full circle, but only an ODAC Championship and NCAA Tournament berth will make the resurrection complete. Hampden-Sydney cannot play the spoiler this season as the squad achieved top-25 rankings in six preseason polls, including a No. 6 ranking in a poll conducted by *Sports Illustrated*. The team has moved to 13th in the two weekly and most prominent polls, conducted by *D3football.com* and the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA).

Of the changes on offense in 2004, five offensive linemen made their first collegiate start against Sewanee in the opening game of the season. The Tigers continue to be led by Ricca and Clemmons on offense; Singh has been replaced by a group of veteran and talented receivers, each looking to make his mark on the program. Despite going relatively unheralded a year ago, the Tiger defense could be the game changers in 2004, as six seniors highlight a group of nine starters who return from the ODAC's second-rated defense in 2003.

The team is off to a high-flying start with victories over Sewanee (35-17), Gettysburg (59-16) and Guilford (62-21). Bridgewater again proved our nemesis, in a close-fought 37-28 contest. Undaunted, the Tigers came out to whip up a come-from-behind 52-21 victory over Old Dominion Athletic Conference foe Emory and Henry in H-SC's 2004 Homecoming game and a 31-28 victory over Washington and Lee.

Leading the way for the Tigers in their battle against Bridgewater and the remainder of the Old Dominion Athletic Conference is a slew of outstanding offensive powers, along with several steady seniors on the defensive side of the ball. Junior quarterback JD Ricca has nabbed two ODAC Offensive Player of the Week nods in three weeks of action and was a consensus preseason All-American. In his first six games this year, the Gaithersburg, MD, product completed 107 of 174 passes—61.5%—for 1,755 yards and 18 touchdowns, compared to just four interceptions. Ricca ranks fourth in NCAA Division III with a 175.9 efficiency rating, while his 290 yards of total offense-per-game ranks him 13th nationally. In 2003, he became Hampden-Sydney's first-ever 3,000-yard passer as he completed 206-of-336 (61.3%) passes for 3,032 yards and 29 touchdowns. The bad news is that he injured his throwing thumb in the second half of Hampden-Sydney's victory over Washington and Lee and will probably miss the remainder of the 2004 season.

In Ricca's absence, the Tigers will turn to sophomore Brett Delk, who has played in four games this season and has completed 6-of-10 passes for 56 yards. Freshman Travis Hicks, who has not played in a game in 2004, will move into the backup role.

Meanwhile, senior running back C.W. Clemmons has scored ten touchdowns on the year and has become the Tigers' all-time leading scorer with 260 career points in 36 games. Through his first six games of 2004, Clemmons once again is leading the ODAC with 739 yards on the ground. He is now only 234 yards shy of passing Jimmy Ferguson's record of 3,601 rushing yards for a career.

Tiger senior running back C.W. Clemmons was named the Division II/III Virginia Player of the Year by the *Richmond Times-Dispatch* as part of the 2004 "Bullet" Bill Dudley Awards. Clemmons is the first-ever Tiger football player to earn the award. As the Old Dominion Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Yeat, Clemmons ran for 1,098 yards on 193 carries (5.7 ypr) and caught 31 passes for 366 yards while racking up 13 touchdowns. He finished his collegiate career as the all-time leading rusher in Tiger football history with 3,771 career yards, while his 282 career points places him atop the all-time Hampden-Sydney and ODAC career scoring list.

Alums recruit four for football

"Cave Spring [and its daughter school Hidden Valley] have been terrific pipeline schools for us," says Tiger head football coach Marty Favret. The tradition holds true this year, as four seniors will be joining forces again in Death Valley. The rectuits are Judd Carte, captain, Hidden Valley High School football and basketball teams, first team all-district, and second team all-region; Brian Thompson, captain, Cave Spring High School football and basketball teams, and second-team all-district; Andrew Sellers, captain, Cave Spring High School football team, first-team all-district, second-team all-region, and District Defensive

Player of the Year; and Matt Davis, first-team all-district and honorable mention all-region.

All four went to school together until the high schools split. "[Being separated by the split] was pretty sad at fitst," says Carte, "but I realize these three are going to Sydney with me and I get even more excited."

No doubt they got plenty of encouragement from their assistant coaches, Deke Summers '67 and Neal Herndon '02, as well as former Cave Spring men who played here—current co-captains Wes Hall and Ben Dull, and Chris Gould '05, now in medical school.

Senior receiver Nick Ferrante and junior receiver Brian Rolander are pacing the receiving corps, as Ferrante leads the team with 34 catches on the year, along with 358 yards and two touchdowns, while Rolander has caught 18 passes for a team-best 422 yards.

Perhaps the biggest surprise of the season has been freshman receiver Drew Smith. Smith's career started on the right foot as his first career reception went for a touchdown in the Tigers' 35-17 victory over Sewanee. Smith then tied the H-SC record with four TD receptions in the first half of H-SC's 62-21 victory over Guilford. He later tied the Tiger record for longest touchdown reception with a 98-yard catch and run in Hampden-Sydney's 52-21 victory over Emory and Henry. For the season, Smith has caught 16 passes for 394 yards and eight touchdowns.

The defense squad, perhaps the best in the Favret era, is led by several seniors who rank first through fourth on the team in total tackles. Linebackers Ty LaFlame and Daniel Park lead the team with 48 and 39 tackles respectively. Meanwhile, linemen Michael Clark and lames Riley have combined to post 60 tackles and seven sacks. Thanks to veteran talent on the field, the Tiger defense ranks second overall in the ODAC, led by a tough run-stopping defense that limits opponents to 83.2 yards-perg. Hampden-Sydney College's soccer team faced a very difficult early season schedule including highly respected teams such as Emory University. Emory was ranked sixth in the nation and number one in the region at the time. Hampden-Sydney held them scoreless for 70 minutes proving they can compete with the best.

Sitting on a 2-6-1 record, with a few breaks, the Tigers could easily be 6-2. They lost to Chowan in the last 40 seconds of the game, Catholic in overtime, Eastern Mennonite and Lynchburg on tough goals. The hardest part to swallow is that Hampden-Sydney is outplaying its opponents, but not taking advantage of the other teams mistakes.

"There are times when we play as well as any team in the conference but are unable to put a complete game together," said first-year head coach Josh Laux. With the exception of the Emory and Eastern Mennonite game, we have controlled the pace of every game. We've scored a lot of quality goals as well as created more than enough chances for ourselves, but have been unable to capitalize on the easy ones. We can be as tough as any team in the ODAC."

Freshmen Jaime Johnson and Brian Peters have been leading the offensive attack for the Tigers. Peters has netted three goals and added one assist to lead the team in total points at seven. Johnson is right behind him with six total points consisting of two goals and two assists. All-ODAC forward/defender Bobby Hillmann has been hindered by an ankle injury limiting his minutes thus far in the season. Hillmann is almost back to 100% and gives the team a much far in the season. Hillmann is almost back to 100% and gives the team a much more dangerous front line when he is in the game.

In the backfield, senior captain Michael Kraemer, junior captain Chris Cadogan, and sophomore Kerry Burke make up one of the toughest defenses in the conference. Kraemer has also made his presence known on the offensive end scoring two goals for the Tigers this season. Along with the defense, goalkeeper Nathaniel Dallas, has put on some impressive performances in front of the net including a season high 10 saves vs. Eastern Mennonite and a total of 34 saves on the season.

A Division I transfer from the University of Richmond, junior midfielder/defender Grant Dickens, was forced to sit out last year due to back problems, but has recently started practicing with the team and played his first game in a H-SC jersey vs. Eastern Mennonite. Dickens is a highly skilled player and will give the Tigers a big lift as he gets back into game shape.

Looking forward to the rest of the season, the Tigers, without a doubt, could finish at the top of the ODAC. With a new coach, new system, and new players, there are going to be some kinks that need to be worked out. Hampden-Sydney's shots have been hitting the crossbar and taking just about every bad bounce possible. "Our players are buying into what we want to do as a program. We have the talent to beat the best teams; it's just a matter of keeping our focus and finishing our chances that we create," says Coach Laux.

It will only be so long before those shots are hitting the net and Hampden-Sydney is winning games.

Basketball haunted by ghosts of past champs

Hampden-Sydney's basketball team made major strides toward success in 2004-05 as Bubba Smith's young squad overcame early season struggles en route to a 17-10 finish. Despite having several winning traditions broken, including a 32-game home winning streak, a string of eight straight 20-win seasons and eight straight ODAC tournament championship game appearances, the Tigers evolved into a well-oiled machine that won 11 of its last 14 contests after losing seven of its first 13.

The season began ominously as the Tigers lost for the first time ever in the championship games of both its early-season tournaments, falling to Methodist in the title game of the C.P. Dean Tip-Off Classic and losing to nationally-ranked Baldwin-Wallace in the final of the Weenie Miller Memorial Holiday Hoops Tournament. Struggling at 6-6 overall, the Tigers traveled to arch-rival Randolph-Macon on January 15 and dropped a difficult 67-48 decision that registered as the team's worst loss in nearly five years. That game was the turning point of the season, however; with their backs firmly planted against the wall at 6-7 on the year, the team reeled off eight straight wins and moved from last place in the ODAC to tie for second late in the season.

The Tigers avenged early-season losses to Virginia Wesleyan, Bridgewater, and Eastern Mennonite during the eight-game stretch, while completing the season sweep of Emory and Henry. The Tiger winning streak snapped with a loss to Roanoke, but the team again responded to adversity with a thrilling 81-78 overtime victory at Guilford College that kept the team alive in a tie for second-place in the ODAC. The Tigers again met archrival Randolph-Macon, this time within the confines of Fleet Gymnasium. After giving Randolph-Macon a 16-point advantage, the Tigers battled back to cut the lead to two points late in the contest, only to have the hotshooting Yellow Jackets push their lead back to an insurmountable eight points in a 68-60 victory. Down, but not out, the Tigers came

back with a 67-55 victory over Lynchburg in the season finale to secure the fourth-seed in the ODAC Tournament.


Hampden-Sydney took on fifth-seeded Roanoke in the opening round of the ODAC Tournament and downed the Maroons, 64-56, to move into the conference semifinals for the tenth straight season. Matched up for the third time with Randolph-Macon, the Tigers built a 16-point lead on the Yellow Jackets before R-MC made a valiant second-half charge to overcome Hampden-Sydney in a 67-63 victory.

Despite failing to make the NCAA tournament for the first time since 1996, the future bodes well for the Tigers as the team returns 14 players and all five starters in 2005-06, including freshman guard Drew Prehmus, who led the team in scoring averaging 12.4 points-per-game and earned honorable mention All-ODAC accolades.







Hampden-Sydney's cross country team kicked off the 2004 season with a fourth-place finish at the Marlin Invitational. In his first collegiate race, freshman Matt Moore ran an impressive 30:15, earning a respectable eighth place finish overall.

Moore led the way for the Tigers followed by fellow freshman Nick Davis who finished with a time of 31:58. Senior Ken Bradley helped push the Tigers into fourth place with a time of 32:25 while freshman Pete Crow finished strong at 33:20.

Lynchburg claimed first place with 20 total team points followed by Bridgewater with 67. Eastern Mennonite slid in front of H-SC with 123 points for third place and the Tigers finished a strong fourth with 134 team points.

In the second event of the season, Hampden-Sydney's cross country team had five runners finish in the top 25 as the Tigers took third place in the Danville Collegiate Challenge. The Tigers finished with a total of 81 team points behind Barton (37 points) and North Carolina Central (26 points); both are top-notch Division II teams.

Moore paced the way for the Tigers with another impressive race, finishing in ninth place with a time of 31:11. Moore has finished every race this season in the top 10.



The golf team opened the 2005 spring season with a pair of solid top-20 finishes, including a ninth-place showing at the 32-team Camp LeJune Intercollegiate and an 18th-place finish at one of the most competitive spring events of the year, the Jekyll Island Invitational in Jekyll Island, GA. Hampden-Sydney finished 18th among several of the top teams in the nation, including national powers Emory, Oglethorpe, Guilford, and Greensboro. Tiger freshman Bob Boykin fired a second-round 69 to post the low round of the day in the tournament and paced the Tigets with a 22nd-place individual performance. At Camp LeJune, Boykin and junior teammate Mike Kelly each finished at threeover par to tie for 19th place out of 127 competitors in leading the Tigers to a ninth-place overall finish. The two-day score of 592 was the best of the 2004-05 season for the team. Still on tap, the Tigers will battle with crosscounty rival and Division I affiliate, Longwood University, in the Longwood Invitational, while the squad will also travel to Lexington, VA, for the Buck Leslie Memorial Tournament, before competing in the 2005 ODAC Championship Tournament in Laurel Fork, Virginia.

Golfers Victorious in 2004 Opener Hampden-Sydney's golf team opened the 2004 season in style by winning the Tom Kinder Memorial Classic at Lakeview Country Club with a team score of 304. The team score tied American University, a Division I affiliate, but the Tigers won the tiebreaker to take home the team trophy.

Freshman Bob Boykin and junior newcomer Michael Kelly led the Tigers as each shot a 75 in his first-ever collegiate event to finish in a tie for third overall. Meanwhile, sophomore Andrew Mitakides and freshman Rob Shrader each finished at 77.

Junior Nathan Huff finished at 79 and earned the tie-break win for the Tigers as his team fifthbest score was two strokes better than American's fifth-best score of 81. Freshman Nick Combs rounded out the scoring for the Tigers with an 80.

Hampden-Sydney and American each finished at 304, followed by Bridgewater's "A" team at 312, Virginia Wesleyan at 317, Bridgewater's "B" team at 326 and Shenandoah at 332.

Baseball Wins ODAC, Goes to NCAA Division III Championship Series

Hampden-Sydney's baseball team reached new heights in its second season under leff Kinne, Old Dominion Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, as the team captured the 2005 ODAC Championship and won the NCAA South Regional Championship. In the process, the Tigers became the first ODAC school ever to advance to the Division III Championship Series. Meanwhile the team set a program record with 27 victories, earning its first conference championship in 16 years and first national tournament berth in 14 years. The Tigers coupled early season success—winning 16 of its first 23 games with post-season brilliance, sweeping through the ODAC Tournament in four games. Junior starter John Schoenholtz, the 2005

nating, complete-game victories in the ODAC Tournament, with a single-season record-tying nine victories and 69 strikeouts in 71 innings.

He allowed no earned runs and struck out eight batters in a tournament victory over top-seeded Bridgewater. The ODAC Tournament MVP then pitched the Tigets past Lynchburg in the championship contest, giving up just two earned runs while striking out seven batters.

Hampden-Sydney also got strong pitching performances from junior Jayson Hanky and sophomore Larry Greene; the duo stopped Guilford (9-2) and Washington & Lee (7-2). The Tiger pitching staff recorded a tournament earned-run-average of just 1.51.

Hampden-Sydney's offense was led by first-team All-ODAC sophomote center-fielder Chris Padgett, who batted .407 with a team-leading 50 hits in 123 at bats. Padgett, with junior leadoff hitter Jay Lilley, an honorable mention all-conference selection, and sophomore right fielder John Appetson, gave

the Tigers a formidable lineup in the top three positions, tanking first through third in the ODAC in walks. Cleanup hitter and senior second baseman Mike Clark drove in a team-high and career-best 40 runs for All-ODAC second-team accolades, while Padgett, Apperson, and Lilley paced the team with 37, 36, and 35 runs respectively. Freshman catcher Jason Bour was tabbed ODAC Rookie of the Year and first-team all-conference after batting .375 with a team-leading two homers, three triples, and 12 doubles. Bour finished second on the team with 30 RBI; his .589 slugging percentage led the team and ranked seventh best in the conference. As

a team the Tigers batted .326 and had a team fielding percentage of .954— just three points shy of tying the 2000 squad's fielding record.



South Regional Tournament in Salisbury, Maryland. Strong pitching prevailed as the team recorded a 2.33 ERA, led by Schoenholtz's two wins over 12th-ranked Salisbury and 20th-ranked Ferrum. Tiger batters came alive to the tune of a .407 team average, with 48 hits in three games; sophomore right fielder John Apperson led all batters with a .667 average with 10 hits in 14 at bats.

Before his start in the NCAA Championship Series, Schoenholtz became the first Tiger baseball player to earn All-America honors; he was named a second-team honoree by the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA). His 11 wins set a new Hampden-Sydney single-season record, while his 16 career victories rates second all-time.

The Tigers' phenomenal season came to an end in the NCAA Championship Series, as the team fell to Rowan University (10-0) and eventual series runner-up SUNY-Cortland (9-6). However, the success of the program in 2005 has left a lasting impression on the minds of the players, coaches, alumni, and fans, as one of several Hampden-Sydney's athletics programs that has officially arrived as a "team to beat."

Nationally Ranked Lacrosse Battles Tough Conference

Hampden-Sydney finished the regular season 8-4 overall and 4-2 in the ODAC. Starting off ranked 14th in the nation, Hampden-Sydney opened with two dominating wins over Mary Washington (14-3) and St. Mary's (14-6) to move up to 9th in the country. The Tigers then lost two heartbreaking games, both by one point, to Haverford (8-9) and sixth-ranked Washington (9-10).

Sophomore Thomas Jennings got H-SC back on track with a four-goal performance in an 11-7 victory over Gettysburg; he led all scorers in 2005 with 24 goals. After a tough 11-9 loss to Roanoke, the Tigers won four consecutive games, over Virginia Wesleyan (11-7), Guilford (21-4), Greensboro (13-8), and long time rival Randolph-Macon (10-5).

Hampden-Sydney's hot streak came to a halt with a 10-8 loss to 11th-ranked Lynchburg. H-SC closed out the season with a win over No. 10 Washington & Lee (10-5), improving its record to 8-4 overall and 4-2 in the ODAC, ranked 15th. The 2005 lacrosse season ended with a case of déjà vu: the Tigers' 8-5 record was identical to 2004. They traveled to Roanoke for the ODAC Semi-Finals, as in 2004, and lost to the thirdranked Maroons 13-5—also the 2004 score.

Nine Hampden-Sydney lacrosse players were named to all-conference teams for 2005—more players on the All-ODAC teams than any other team in the conference. Sean McChesney, Colin Dunn, and John Pritzlaff took home First-Team All-ODAC honors. Tri-captain McChesney, one of the quickest and most elusive players in the conference, led the Hampden-Sydney offense with 21 goals and 19 assists, for a season total of 40 points; he scored a career-high five goals in the victory over Virginia Wesleyan. Freshman standout Colin Dunn started every game and tallied the second most ground balls with 46, scoring three goals with one assist. Junior defenseman John Pritzlaff, a monster


in the backfield, was in charge of stopping some of the most dangerous offensive weapons in the country. Pritzlaff had three assists, scored one goal, and tallied 45 ground balls.

Earning second-team honors were Ryan Fassnacht, Will Albright, Vince Smith, and Michael Via. Senior captain Ryan Fassnacht has become one of the most adaptable players in Division III lacrosse as well as one of the top face-off specialists in the country, leading the Tigers with 79 ground balls and the ODAC in ground balls per game with 6.06. He has won 119 out of 190 face-offs, for a percentage of 63%. Fassnacht has also contributed one goal and two assists. Will Albright has developed into an athletic and intelligent defensive player as well as a team leader. Named a captain in 2005, Albright has been a key part of the Tiger defense, picking up 24 ground balls and one assist. Junior midfielder Vince Smith scored 18 goals with 14 assists and was the second leading scorer with 32 points. Sophomore attackman Michael Via scored 15 goals with 12 assists for a total of 27 points, also picking up 32 ground balls. Making the Honorable Mention list for Hampden-Sydney was senior goalkeeper Jeremy Bull and sophomore midfielder Thomas Jennings. Bull has continued to prove that he is one of the best goalies in Division III, with 117 saves, including his career-high 19 saves vs. Roanoke. Jennings also had a standout season with a team-high 24 goals and five assists, for 29 total points.








