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Gunshots, Wreck Leads To Two Arrests

Two young Adair County men were arrested early Sunday morning on a host of charges for alleged reckless and aggressive behavior towards one another.

The incident apparently started when 21-year-old Justin Bledsoe showed up at a gathering on Snake Creek Boat Ramp and fired shots in the general direction of a crowd of people, then fled the scene. Dakota Biggerstaff, also from Columbia, followed after Bledsoe.

"It appears that [Bledsoe] told his girlfriend that he was going to go break up a party," Adair County Sheriff Harrison Moss says. "He fired a few rounds then left, and the Biggerstaff boy chased him."

According to the police report, Biggerstaff became upset that Bledsoe fired a weapon in his direction, and followed the man in a 1995 Jeep. On Knifley Road, Biggerstaff rammed Bledsoe's 2004 Nissan from behind and then fled the scene.

"He knocked Bledsoe's vehicle off into a field, then went home, or had someone take him home," Moss says.

Bledsoe was arrested at 2:30 a.m. on charges of wanton endangerment—first degree, tampering with physical evidence, possession of drug paraphernalia, and leaving the scene of an accident. Biggerstaff was taken into custody almost three hours later on several charges, including two counts of wanton endangerment—first degree, failure to maintain required insurance, and leaving the scene of an accident.

Deputy Aaron Rainwater investigated the incident. Sheriff Moss and officers from the Columbia Police Dept. assisted him on scene.

County Clerk's Office Changes Schedule For Primary Election

Interim Adair County Clerk Joyce Rodgers is closing her office on primary day Tuesday, May 20 for all business that isn't explicitly election-related.

"We expect to have so much going on with the election that we probably won't be able to handle any other business," Rodgers says. "Due to the redistricting and so many changes I'm just thinking we'll have a lot of that to deal with on Election Day."

The Clerk's Office will open Tuesday at 6 a.m. for the election and remain open until 6 p.m.

"We will be closed though for all transactions except election business," Rodgers adds.

County Races Highlight Tuesday Primary Voters Will Also Nominate State And U.S. Lawmakers

After months of campaigning, handshaking, and backslapping, candidates will find out Tuesday if all the work has paid off when voters head to the polls to cast their ballots in the 2014 primary election.

Up for grabs this year are nominations for county offices, magisterial seats on the Adair County Fiscal Court, and constable, as well as the state and U.S. Senate and U.S. House of Representatives. Seventy-two individuals have filed to run for the various offices, and all but 13 face competition in the primary. According to interim County Clerk Joyce Rodgers though, a strong turnout is not guaranteed.

"Usually county elections are big turnouts," Rodgers says. "However, we haven't had as many absentees yet as we usually do, so that might mean something."

Rodgers estimated that only about 70 absentee ballots have been cast, significantly less than the 170 absentee votes in 2010—the last year county elections were held. She noted

though that absentee ballots could still be cast on the voting machine in the Clerk's Office until Saturday.

On the national scene, longtime U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell faces four challengers for the GOP nomination. Matt Bevin has been McConnell's most frequent target in radio and television ads, but Brad Copas, Chris Payne, and Shawna Sterling are also looking to unseat the Senator.

On the Democrat side of the race, Burrel Charles Farnsley, Alison Lundergan Grimes, Gregory Brent Leighty, and Tom Recktenwald are each attempting to end the GOP's decades-long stranglehold on the seat.

U.S. Rep. Ed Whitfield (R) doesn't have a challenger in the primary, but two Democrats—Wesley Seaton Bolin and Charles Kendall Hatchett—will compete to face Whitfield in the general election.

On the state level, District 16 Sen. Sara Beth Gregory will seek reelection, but faces competition from fellow Republican

Judge Paul Barry Jones Passes Away

Columbia lost a legal giant, public servant and, more importantly, a beloved member of the community on Monday as Judge Paul Barry Jones passed away at his home. He was 77.

Paul Barry Jones was born in Danville in 1936. He graduated from Adair County High School before obtaining an undergraduate degree from Georgetown College and ultimately his law degree from Vanderbilt University Law School. Judge Jones served as

Circuit Judge for 18 years and as District Judge for two, ruling with an always-fair mind and heart.

"He was a very respected judge, whether it was from attorneys or other people he worked with," said Jones' former bench clerk Annette Burton, with whom he worked for 13 years. "He was always fair to everyone, and a pleasure to work with and be around."

Hunter Durham, who worked alongside Jones as an attorney, and lived alongside him as a friend, echoed those sentiments.

"I practiced under him for his entire judicial time, all 20 years, and always found him to be a very gentle but concerned person about the law," Durham said. "He was a fair judge and treated everyone the same."

Beyond the courtroom, Paul Barry was a farmer, spent time as an instructor at Lindsey Wilson College, and practiced as an

The liberal arts college awarded a total of 246 undergraduate and graduate degrees at its 99th commencement ceremony, held

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Chamber of Commerce Holds Monthly Meeting • Arrests

The Columbia-Adair County Chamber of Commerce met on Tuesday afternoon at Lindsey Wilson College's Cramer Dining Center, and were joined by this month's corporate sponsor, Hosparus of Green River.

Ron Heath, former president of the Chamber and a volunteer with Hosparus, introduced the organization.

"One of the things that has always impressed me is the professionalism and the care and concern that you see from everyone throughout the organization," he said, before turning the floor over to Lisa Sanford, Hosparus' Director of Advancement and Community Relations.

Sanford began by outlining the statistics involving hospice care in Kentucky, explaining that only around 20-percent of Adair County's hospice care needs are met. Of the 20-percent that are, 36-percent of the care period is for seven days or less.

"We simply aren't getting the referrals, and those that are given are done too late," she said. "Patients aren't getting the full benefit."

Further stressing the need for increased awareness of the service, Sanford shared that while 70-percent of Americans answered that they would prefer to pass away at home, only 25-percent of expected deaths actually occur there. Despite that, Sanford explained that Hosparus is not about a place, but rather, a philosophy.

"It's a philosophy of care," she began. "We tailor everything to the patient's needs and wishes. If they want to be at home, they're at home, but we go out and make visits wherever they are, 24/7."

"We're all like books," she continued. "We all have a beginning and an end, and we never know when we're entering the final chapter of our book. With Hosparus, patients choose the way their final chapter is written."

Sanford then introduced Hosparus RN, Pam Druin, who shared countless stories and memories of her experiences with patients.

"I like to reflect on those experiences," she said. "Those are the moments that matter. Whether it's listening to a patient's jokes or looking at family photos, that is what's important to them in those moments."

Druin said that in her time with the service, she had worked with patients as young as seven days and as old as 103 years, and has seen every range of scenarios that she could imagine.

"Sometimes I go into a home visit and the patient is doing fine and is very accepting and the meeting takes ten minutes," she began. "And then I go into the other room and spend an hour with a family member of who is not adjusting as well. We do whatever is needed."

Druin shared that she has seen mothers wait until all their adult children are present to take their final breath, and comatose patients open their eyes and take one look around the room at their family before passing on.

"We don't just take care of the physical needs," she said, explaining that everyone from doctors to chaplains to bereavement counselors are available to families. "I've been blessed beyond measure to be a part of so many lives and included in so many stories."

Debbie Faircloth, the Volunteer Coordinator for the area explained the importance and the roles played by volunteers. Because the company does not refuse service due to inability to pay, and because such a service takes more than a staff of employees can provide, Faircloth says that Hosparus relies heavily on volunteers.

"They're some of the most wonderful people you'll ever know," she said.

Faircloth explained that volunteers might simply offer companionship, give a family member a short break, serve as a hairdresser, or anything in between.

"Volunteering for Hosparus is not a job everyone wants," she admitted. "But for those that do it, they find it is a life-changing experience."

A Few Tips For The Garden

As temperatures rise and sunny days arrive, home gardeners will become busy in the backyard tending to this year's crops. Gardening is quite rewarding, providing a sense of accomplishment as well as fresh produce for the family. Gardening also has its fair share of challenges, especially when it comes to weeds, diseases, and insects. The most important nutrient to all plants is water. Many home gardeners find it difficult to provide ample water to the garden during the summer due to a lack of time or the garden is placed too far away from a water source. weeds. Another advantage to mulching that many are not aware of is disease control. Several diseases (especially those that affect tomatoes) are present in the soil. Mulching can prevent soil particles from splashing on the leaves during rainfall and thus aiding in the prevention of disease. Various material found around the soil can serve as excellent mulching materials. Grass clippings, newspapers, shredded paper, cardboard, etc. all help conserve moisture, prevent weeds and disease, as well as assisting in building organic matter of the soil.

Pay close attention when purchasing transplants. Sometimes diseases start in the greenhouse and become serious problems later in the garden. Do not purchase plants with leaf spots, lesions on the stems, or plants with other signs that suggest disease is present. As a rule of thumb,

locally raised transplants are the least likely to be infected with disease.

Keep a calendar. Most seed packets will provide you with the average days to maturity. Record the planting date on your calendar and then count forward the days of maturity and make a note on the calendar on that date. While the actual days to maturity will be relative to the weather, knowing the average will help you to plan your work in the garden and canning or freezing. Knowing the relative maturity also comes in handy when waiting for melons to ripen. Pesticide applications and harvest restrictions should also be recorded in the calendar to prevent exposure to chemicals. Additional records that are useful to keep include fertilizer applications, rainfall, and watering dates and amounts.

Have your problems identified. Whether it is an insect, a disease, or nutrient deficiency, have the problem identified. Having proper identification is the first step to finding the solution when problems arise in the garden. Some diseases are caused by insects; therefore fungicides are ineffective in those instances.

Nutrient deficiencies can sometimes be caused by a lack of moisture or by soil compaction, therefore fertilizers do not always correct nutrient deficiencies. The Adair County Cooperative Extension Service provides insect and disease identification service free of charge. For more information, contact the Adair County Extension Service at 270-384-2317.

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Fiscal Court Approves 911 Salaries

After months of discussion on the matter, the Adair Fiscal Court voted unanimously Tuesday night to institute uniform pay scales for all 911 employees.

The approved plan calls for starting part-time pay rates of \$8 an hour for noncertified personnel and \$9 an hour for certified. For full-time workers, certified dispatchers will start at \$9 an hour, and noncertified employees will start at \$8.50 per hour.

Part-time employees can earn 50-cent on the hour raises for becoming certified, and/or moving to full-time. If a dispatcher moves from full to part-time, however, his or her pay will be reduced accordingly.

"This is something we've talked about a lot, and it's pretty much what we've already been doing," Thomas said. "We now have it in writing though."

Initially, Thomas presented two proposals to the Fiscal Court. The two were similar except for slightly higher wages

for Proposal A—around 50 cents per hour more than proposal B.

The Court's budget committee, consisting of magistrates Joe Rogers and Sammy Baker, had already met with Thomas and reviewed both proposals, and offered their suggestion to their fellow magistrates.

"The budget committee recommends Proposal B," Rogers said. Magistrate Daryl Platt moved to go with the budget committee's recommendation, and Adair 911 now has a standard pay scale.

In other business at Tuesday's meeting:
•The Court hired Crystal Garmon as a part-time dispatcher, at the newly established set rate of \$8 per hour.

•The Court heard a Trail Town presentation from Ellen Zornes and Holly Grimsley. The two weren't asking for money, but said that they needed the Fiscal Court's support to be able to move forward with the initiative, which aims to promote local business, health

and wellness, and tourism in the area by connecting and marking trails for biking, walking, running, hiking, horseback and ATV riding, and canoeing.

"We want it because it would be good for the community, for our town, for the local economy and health and wellness," Zornes said. "We feel like we're well on our way."

"It's an exciting venture if we can make it a reality," Judge-Executive Ann Melton said to the magistrates. "We just want to let the Court know what's going on with it."

There was some confusion about whether the Court should take any action on the matter. Zornes and Grimsley said that they had to have the Fiscal Court's support to attain Trail Town certification, but no resolution had been written. Magistrates discussed taking a vote of support for the plan, but decided—after Zornes assured that it wouldn't impact the timeline for the project—to table the matter until next month, when a formal resolution can be passed.

Adair Man Arrested For Making Meth

George Maxwell "Max" Wise. No Democrat filed in the race.

Several heated local races have developed, and Tuesday's primary will bring voters one step closer to determining winners for the general election in November.

Democrats Joe Rogers and Mike Stephens face off in the County Judge-Executive race, and the winner will take on incumbent Republican Ann Melton, who faces no primary opposition.

Five Republicans are vying for the County Clerk nomination. Lisa Greer, Mark Harris, Brenda Mann, Dale McCloud, and Mike Sneed will all square off, and the winner will presumably face Veronica Mouser—the only Democrat to file for the office—in the general election.

The jailer's race figures to be just as crowded, as five Republicans and one Democrat have filed for the seat that will be vacated by the retiring Rick Wilson. Eric Antle, Lawrence Alan Burton, Buddy Powell, Mark Selby, and Joey White are each vying for the GOP nomination, and the winner will move on to face Darrel Baker, the lone Democrat to file for the position.

Incumbent Sheriff Harrison Moss, a Democrat, won't have any competition Tuesday, but three Republicans will seek the opposing nomination—Josh Brockman, Justin Claywell, and Chris Janes.

Magisterial races look to be especially competitive this year, as only one incumbent—District 3 magistrate Sammy Baker—faces no opposition in the primary and general election.

District 1 magistrate Harold Burton will face two Republican challengers—Danny Wayne Goodin and Jamey Neat, and the winner will assume the seat barring an independent candidate filing, as no Democrats are seeking the position.

Kelly Hamlett will take on District 2 magistrate Daryl Flatt in the primary, and the winner will go up against the lone Democrat to file—Wid Harris—in November.

Only two candidates, both Republicans, have filed for the District 4 magistrate position. Incumbent Perry Reeder will look to keep his seat if he can hold off his challenger, William Pilkington.

Billy Dean Coffey's situation mirrors Reeder's in the District 5 magistrate race. Coffey will face fellow Republican Mike Mitchum in what appears to be another winner-take-all primary, since no Democrat filed to run.

The District 6 magistrate race appears to be the most wide open. Incumbent Joe Rogers does not seek reelection as he has his sights set on the Judge-Executive position, and five individuals—three Democrats and two Republicans—are all looking to assume the seat. Greg Caldwell and Daril Salyers will square off for the GOP nomination, while Bryan Allen Feese, Rodney Karnes, and Steve Willis compete for the Democratic nod.

In District 7, magistrate Billy Rowe seeks reelection, but will first have to beat out Republicans Terry Hadley and Chad Moore for the nomination. The winner will face Democrat Terry Farris in the November election.

Constable races are also especially competitive this year, with 15 total candidates, all Republicans, running for the seven positions. In District 1, Jeremy Stearns and William "Bill" Troutwine square off. District 2 features Michael Blair, Shannon Rowe, and Brandon Willis. Robert Loy was the only constable candidate to file for District 3. Robert Dee

Albertson, Jane Potts, and Ed Wigal are seeking the District 4 nomination. Jim Bottoms and Stephen Johnson face each other in District 5; Anthony D. Burke and Jason Rector are the nominees for District 6; and Joe Collins and Steve Foster are running for the position in District 7.

Only a few lucky candidates will face no opposition in both the primary and general elections. Jennifer Hutchison-Corbin (R) figures to keep her seat, as she is the only candidate for County Attorney. Todd Akin (R) is the lone option for County Coroner, interim Property Valuation Administrator Jeff Feese (D) will assume the PVA position without competition, and Mike McKinney (R) will once again be County Surveyor.

Marian Clayton Vance Honored Posthumously At UK's Teachers Who Made A Difference Ceremony

The 16th annual Teachers Who Made a Difference ceremony, part of the UK College of Education, gives all individuals the means to thank an educator who has impacted their lives. Over 2,000 teachers have been honored since the program's inception. Marian Clayton Vance, a former educator in the Adair County School system, was honored posthumously at the ceremony.

"The UK College of Education prides itself on preparing great teachers," said Mary Ann Vimont, the college's director of public relations and student, alumni and community affairs. "As part of our mission, we also think it is important to honor those teachers who are making a difference in the lives of their students, here in Kentucky and across the country."

Each year, all submissions are accepted up to a predetermined limit with each being honored that year. Also each year, the program is assisted by a spokesperson who helps get the word out. In the past, John Calipari, Dermontti Dawson, Tubby Smith, Lee T. Todd Jr., Kyle Macy, and Dan and Cheri Issel have led the charge. In 2012, 2013 and again this year, UK Women's Basketball Coach Matthew Mitchell has served as the spokesperson.

"Teaching is my job, teaching is my passion. And it is something that I love and hope to do the rest of my life," said Mitchell. "It is a tremendous thing to be a teacher."

Submissions for the 2015 program will be accepted beginning in December 2014 at education.uky.edu/Community/TWMAD.

Ms. Vance's son, P.T., wrote the following about his mother in his nomination:

Marian Clayton Vance (February 21, 1912 -- April 23, 2013) began teaching in Adair County, Kentucky, her lifelong home, at the age of 32. She was divorced and the sole supporter of two young sons. With fierce devotion, she reared her boys to adulthood.

Marian's first teaching job was as sole teacher at Bloomington, a remotely rural school, in grades 1-8. One boy -- a young man, really -- came to school each morning and propped his shotgun against the wall inside the schoolhouse door. Marian taught at the

school two years. Sixty years later her students organized a reunion. All students lined up, without giving a name. As each filed by her, Marian greeted each and all by his or her name, though she had not seen some in their mid-sixties since they were six or seven years old.

Marian taught at Holmes and Calhoun elementary schools before teaching grades five through eight at Melson Ridge Elementary at the southern tip of Adair County. The school was nineteen miles from her residence just north of the county seat of Columbia, most of it over gravel road. The next year the superintendent offered her a school one-half mile from her home. Though she had grave need of money, she chose the long drive to teach her students of the previous year. Those students were counting on her to return, she told the superintendent.

Some years later Marian taught math at Columbia Middle School before finally settling into a first grade classroom for the final seventeen years of her career. This proved to be her favorite professional setting.

In the later years of her life Marian would be taken out to eat and to various stores in Columbia. Invariably she would meet several of her former students. They all would come and hug her in obvious delight. Most would volunteer that she was the best teacher the person ever had. Marian told them all that she loved them, and they knew that she meant it.

Except for some who moved into the county in the later decades of her life, Marian knew everyone in the county and the family tree of each. When she was ninety, she was invited to a reunion of a large family. Sixty attended, none of whom was a relative of Marian. Inviting her was a wise decision. She explained to each how he or she was related to the other members of the extended family, whether or not they were present at the reunion.

Marian's mother passed on at the age of 101. Her last words, to Marian at her side, were "I have hoed my row." When Marian reached her mother's age of 101, she also passed on, in a cloud of great peace.

Presently, I serve as Vice President of the American Dairy Association of Kentucky, Vice President of the Lake Cumberland DHIA, past board member of the Adair County Chamber of Commerce, member of Adair County Cattlemen's Association, member of Kentucky Magistrates Association and a charter member of Adair County Agriculture Alliance, a member of the FFA Alumni Association, and a lifetime member of the Adair County Jaycees.

Like most counties in Kentucky, we have had a tight budget, but we are in much better shape than many counties in our state. We have purchased several new pieces of equipment during the short time I have been magistrate and at least two pieces of property, blacktopped several miles of roads in my district alone and the county has built many new bridges.

As a magistrate I serve on the special committee and the nuisance committee, of which I am especially proud. The past court tried for four years and couldn't come up with an ordinance that they could pass. Daryl Flatt and myself worked on this for about a year and a half and came up with what we consider to be a good ordinance that was passed by the court unanimously. This ordinance made a few people mad, but we have helped clean up neighborhoods that have needed help for years and been thanked by many, many people.

We all know we need jobs in our county, but they are almost impossible to get without money to entice prospects and we certainly don't have the money to do that. We will keep on trying and someday we will be successful with everyone working together. It might take counties working together instead of individual counties trying to get factories to their towns. We recently had the opportunity to secure a business, but a few didn't seem to want them in Adair County or didn't think they were good enough for Adair County, you can drive over to Clinton County—the beginning of this factory just 40 miles away.

The hospital is the biggest issue facing our county today, not just court, but each and every citizen of our county. This was something I knew nothing about when I was elected, but I know more than I want to know now. I have heard everything from it needs to be blown up to we have to have a hospital, which I happen to agree with. Just recently a good friend of many of us was saved at Westlake Regional Hospital. She couldn't have gotten to Cane Valley, let alone Russell or Taylor County. This is not the only life that has been saved since I made the motion to loan the hospital the \$1.7 million on March 20, 2012, and it passed unanimously. I would do it again today if I thought it would save a life, no one can put a value on a human life. A total of eleven lives have been saved up until today. The hospital is showing a small profit, and this gives us hope of a sale in the future; hopefully, sooner than later.

Please consider voting Billy R. Rowe, #1 on the ballot for District 7 Magistrate.

in Biggers Sports Center before a crowd of more than 3,000 people. Combined with 418 degrees awarded in December at winter commencement, LWC's Class of 2014 is record 664 graduates, the most in the 111 years of the college. That is 57 more students than LWC's previous largest class, which was set last academic year.

In May 1981, Prunariu became the only Romanian-born cosmonaut and the 103rd human to fly into outer space. He and Russian cosmonaut Leonid Popov completed an eight-day space mission aboard Soyuz 40 and the Salyut 6 space laboratory. That made Prunariu a member of one of the world's most elite organizations: the Association of Space Explorers. The association includes persons who have completed at least one orbit of the Earth in space -- currently more than 325 individuals from 35 countries.

"As an individual, the most significant experience during a spaceflight is the human experience. Seen from cosmic heights, our planet looks fabulous," Prunariu said. "By traveling 16 orbits around the Earth every 24 hours, one can admire all the areas on Earth."

But Prunariu said that orbiting the Earth can also be a cautionary experience.

"One can also see, unfortunately, the wounds caused to our planet by the reckless activity of man in his struggle for resources at any price, the disposal of waste in various places on our planet, the deforestation of our oxygen stocks, the Equatorial forests, and many other things," he said. "When you fly in the outer space and you see the planet as a whole, you understand the global consequences of local activities of human communities and the need -- for our health's sake and for the future generations' sake -- to keep our planet clean, as we keep clean our homes."

In addition to being good stewards of the Earth, Prunariu told the graduates to set and strive toward goals.

"It is of utmost importance, when we become aware enough of our potential place in society, to set goals and to start fulfilling these goals diligently," he said. "This is where the real journey of our becoming starts."

Prunariu, who received an honorary doctorate from the college, cautioned the graduates that they should not become so consumed in reaching their goals that they forget about the "human community."

"Our main individual goal is to have a better life, to ensure a

future for our families and for our jobs, and a future without deprivation and material shortages," he said. "Let us not forget that money is just a means to achieve something, not a goal in itself. Let us not forget, in this context, about human beings who have less chances than us and they may need our help."

Before the commencement

ceremony, 11 members of the Class of 1964 were inducted into the Golden Alumni Society. Alumni are installed into the organization on the occasion of their 50-year reunion at the college.

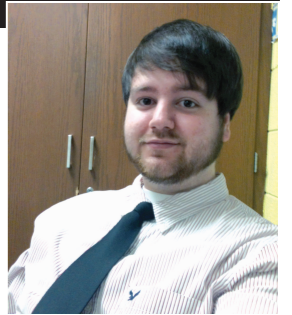

Behind a five RBI performance from senior Trenton Watson, who has missed much of his final season due to injury, the Tribe sent Hart home in five innings with an 11-1 win.

"The guys did a really good job tonight," Mantooth said. "They executed the offense and played very well defensively. This was definitely a game for us to build off."

Hutchison grabbed the win, going five innings with eight strikeouts and allowing just one run on two hits. Watson's 2-2 day yielded five RBI, while Bennett went 3-3 with three RBI of his own. Shelley went 2-3 with three runs scored, and Steinhilber drew two walks and scored two runs.

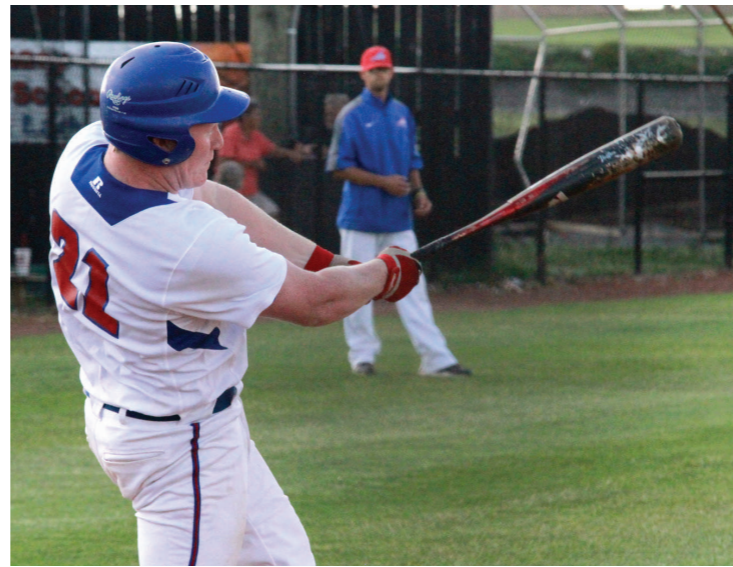
performance, beginning with a strikeout of the first batter he faced and a quick one-two-three start.
