Gunshots, Wreck Leads To Two Arrests

Two young Adair County men were arrested early Sunday morning on a host of charges for alleged reckless and aggressive behavior towards one another.

The incident apparently started when 21-year-old Justin Bledsoe showed up at a gathering on Snake Creek Boat Ramp and fired shots in the general direction of a crowd of people, then fled the scene. Dakota Biggerstaff, also from Columbia, followed after Bledsoe.

"It appears that [Bledsoe] told his girlfriend that he was going to go break up a party," Adair County Sheriff Harrison Moss says. "He fired a few rounds then left, and the Biggerstaff boy chased him."

According to the police report, Biggerstaff became upset that Bledsoe fired a weapon in his direction, and followed the man in a 1995 Jeep. On Knifley Road, Biggerstaff rammed Bledsoe's 2004 Nissan from behind and then fled the scene.

"He knocked Bledsoe's vehicle off into a field, then went home, or had someone take him home," Moss says.

Bledsoe was arrested at 2:30 a.m. on charges of wanton endangerment first degree, tampering with physical evidence, possession of drug paraphernalia, and leaving the scene of an accident. Biggerstaff was taken into custody almost three hours later on several charges, including two counts of wanton endangerment—first degree, failure to maintain required insurance, and leaving the scene of an accident.

Deputy Aaron Rainwater investigated the incident. Sheriff Moss and officers from the Columbia Police Dept. assisted him on scene.

County Clerk's Office Changes Schedule For Primary Election

Interim Adair County Clerk Joyce Rodgers is closing her office on primary day Tuesday, May 20 for all business that isn't explicitly electionrelated.

"We expect to have so much going on with the election that we probably won't be able to handle any other business," Rodgers says. "Due to the redistricting and so many changes I'm just thinking we'll have a lot of that to deal with on Election Day."

The Clerk's Office will open Tuesday at 6 a.m. for the election and remain open until 6 p.m.

"We will be closed though for all transactions except election business," Rodgers adds.

County Races Highlight Tuesday Primary

Voters Will Also Nominate State And U.S. Lawmakers

After months of campaigning, handshaking, and backslapping, candidates will find out Tuesday if all the work has paid off when voters head to the polls to cast their ballots in the 2014 primary election.

Up for grabs this year are nominations for county offices, magisterial seats on the Adair County Fiscal Court, and constable, as well as the state and U.S. Senate and U.S. House of Representatives. Seventy-two individuals have filed to run for the various offices, and all but 13 face competition in the primary. According to interim County Clerk Joyce Rodgers though, a strong turnout is not guaranteed.

"Usually county elections are big turnouts," Rodgers says. "However, we haven't had as many absentees yet as we usually do, so that might mean something."

Rodgers estimated that only about 70 absentee ballots have been cast, significantly less than the 170 absentee votes in 2010—the last year county elections were held. She noted

though that absentee ballots could still be cast on the voting machine in the Clerk's Office until Saturday.

On the national scene, longtime U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell faces four challengers for the GOP nomination. Matt Bevin has been McConnell's most frequent target in radio and television ads, but Brad Copas, Chris Payne, and Shawna Sterling are also looking to unseat the Senator.

On the Democrat side of the race, Burrel Charles Farnsley, Alison Lundergan Grimes, Gregory Brent Leighty, and Tom Recktenwald are each attempting to end the GOP's decadeslong stranglehold on the seat.

U.S. Rep. Ed Whitfield (R) doesn't have a challenger in the primary, but two Democrats—Wesley Seaton Bolin and Charles Kendall Hatchett-will compete to face Whitfield in the general election.

On the state level, District 16 Sen. Sara Beth Gregory will seek reelection, but faces competition from fellow Republican

Judge Paul Barry Jones Passes Away

Columbia lost a legal giant, public servant and, more importantly, a beloved member of the community on Monday as Judge Paul Barry Jones passed away at his home. He was 77.

Paul Barry Jones was born in Danville in 1936. He graduated from Adair County High School before obtaining an undergraduate degree from Georgetown College and ultimately his law degree from Vanderbilt University Law School. Judge Jones served as

Circuit Judge for 18 years and as District Judge for two, ruling with an always-fair mind and heart.

"He was a very respected judge, whether it was from attorneys or other people he worked with," said Jones'former bench clerk Annette Burton, with whom he worked for 13 years. "He was always fair to everyone, and a pleasure to work with and be

Hunter Durham, who worked alongside Jones as an attorney, and lived alongside him as a friend, echoed those sentiments.

"I practiced under him for his entire judicial time, all 20 years, and always found him to be a very gentle but concerned person about the law," Durham said. "He was a fair judge and treated everyone the same."

Beyond the courtroom, Paul Barry was a farmer, spent time as an instructor at Lindsey Wilson College, and practiced as an

The trend of people steadily becoming more and more hurried, more to-the-point, more efficiency-driven, more focused on the endgame and more skeptical of rituals of the past really isn't a trend at all. It represents a cultural shift, sure, but only in the same sense that time does: It just keeps marching forward.

I hear people all the time talking about how things were slower and more peaceful 30 or 40 years ago. I'm sure that back then, other folks were saying the same thing, but fondly recalling the generation before. I'd imagine this good-old-days rhetoric is about as old as language itself, because it seems like anyone over 25 wishes for nothing more than to turn the clock back a couple of decades.

I try not to be like that, really. My grandfather used to have a saying about this line of thought that I've always tried to remember: "They call 'em the good old days, but they didn't live them. They weren't that good to me."

I've always tried to keep my Pa's view on this kind of thing. There's no point in romanticizing the past, because people tend to only remember the good parts and forget about all the day-to-day struggles and hassles that everyone deals with whether it's 2014 or 1994 or 1850.

Looking at the world like my Pa did helps me remember to keep pushing forward and not dwell on how much better things used to be, because in most cases our world today is safer, more convenient, more accepting, and more tolerant than it was just a few generations ago.

I'm saying all of this not to persuade anyone to think like I do, but to explain why I notice when things DON'T change. Of all the sacraments and rituals of the past that have been abandoned or altered to the changing times, graduation, of all things, serves as a relatively unchanged link between the good old days and the good new days.

The recent graduates of Lindsey Wilson College and the soon-to-be graduates of Adair County High School will celebrate—or in the case of the Lindsey grads, have celebrated—their commencement pretty much the same way people did 60 years ago.

The very first graduation I attended was my eighth grade commencement ceremony. I remember being completely flabbergasted by the archaic customs. We wore weird gowns—which is not an item of clothing teenagers typically don—even weirder hats, and draped strings over our shoulders that varied in color depending on how good our grades were. My diploma said 2001, but it felt more like we were in some kind of elaborate play set in the 1940s.

Four years later, it was the same song, next verse, as my class essentially repeated our exercise from eighth grade, only it seemed like a bigger deal because more people were there and we had a few guest speakers.

Fast forward a few more years, after staying in college about as long as they would let me, I graduated from Lindsey. Right back in the same gym my eighth grade graduation was held, I began to change my mind about the silly ceremony. I still thought it was kind of silly, and definitely archaic, but I began to understand its appeal. Graduation is the one aspect of education that doesn't evolve with the times because it doesn't have to.

College is different now than it was 10 years ago and will be 10 years from now. High school content changes every few years and evolves with every new scientific and historic development. Very little of my experience in school was the same as my parents, and even less so with my grandparents.

The experience that we can all relate to though, the one thing that basically hasn't changed, is putting on silly clothes, gathering with your classmates one final time, and then turning toward the future. No one knows what that future holds, but we can all rest easier knowing that no matter how much better or worse things get, one thing will remain the same.

Congratulations to all the 2014 graduates and good luck!

Decoration Day...

We never hear the term today, but for a very long time Memorial Day was known as Decoration Day. It was a day set aside to honor those who had served their country with service in the Armed Forces. With the passing of time, all dearly departed ones have gained the respect of grave adornment on this special day by those who remain behind. It is a sign of respect.

The Mt. Carmel community were quite active at the turn of the last century. There were those who worked tirelessly to organize annual Decoration Day activities, as evidenced by the following:

"Decoration Day at Mt. Carmel on the 30th day of May was largely attended. [Lt.] Gov. J.R. Hindman delivered the oration, and there were short talks by other gentlemen. There was dinner on the ground." [5 June 1901, Adair County News]

"The following is the program for Decoration Day at Carmel Church, May 30: 9 a.m., devotional exercises, Rev. W.S. Dudgeon; 11 a.m., sermon, Rev. C.R. Payne; song; Afternoon: 1 o'clock, speaking by Judge H.C. Baker, Gov. J.R. Hindman, Hon. M. Rey Yarberry, and Mr. W.D. Jones; Miss Nannie Mat Dudgeon will be organist and Rev. W.S. Dudgeon will lead the singing. Everybody invited to come and bring dinner. --A.R. Pike, G.W. Pile, P.S. Monroe, com[mittee]." [18 May 1904, Adair County News]


"The following program will be observed at Carmel on the 30th of May. Devotional Exercises at 9 o'clock a.m., Rev. W.S. Dudgeon; Decoration of Graves at 10 o'clock; Sermon at 11 o'clock, Rev. C.R. Payne. Noon: Speaking at 1 o'clock p.m. by Judge H.C. Baker, Judge T.A. Murrell, Dr. [John Henry] Grady, W.D. Jones, and others. All Confederate soldiers are especially invited to be present and take part in the exercises; as also are the Mexican and Spanish-American soldiers. Everybody invited to come and bring dinner. Miss Nannie Mat Dudgeon and Mrs. Betty Henson, organists. (signed) --J.E. Pike, J.J. Hubbard, J.P. Harden, Committee." [17 & 24 May 1905, Adair County News]

"Decoration Day was observed at Mt. Carmel. Governor J.R. Hindman was one of the speakers. Quite a number were present and dinner was served on the grounds. It is fitting that these exercises be held once a year. The resting places of men who battled for what they conceived to be right, should be kept green." [31 May 1905, Adair County News]

"Quite a large crowd from this place observed Decoration Day at Mt. Carmel. A nice time and a large crowd were reported." [Cane Valley letter, 7 June 1905, Adair County News] "De

"Decoration Day was observed at Mt. Carmel. A large crowd was present, but the threatening condition of the weather prevented many from attending. The program was well carried out, an elegant dinner being served on the ground. A few soldiers of the Spanish-American war were present. The surviving soldiers meet occasionally to do honor to their dead comrades. Speeches were made by Gov. Hindman, Judge Baker, Dr. Grady and others." [Watson letter, 7 June 1905, Adair County News]

"Decoration Day--At Carmel, May 30th, 1906. Devotional exercises by Rev. W.S. Dudgeon, 9 o'clock a.m., Decoration of graves at 10 o'clock a.m. Sermon by Rev. C.R. Payne at 11 o'clock. Dinner on the ground. Speech by Hon. T.A. Murrell, at 1 o'clock p.m. Address by Rev. W.C. Clemens at 2 o'clock p.m. Address by Rev. B.H. Henderson, 2:30 o'clock. The Spanish-American soldiers are invited to come and take part. The Ex-Confederate soldiers are especially invited to come and take part. Everybody invited to come and bring baskets well-filled. Prof. J.S. Stapp will conduct the singing. Mrs. Bettie Henson and Blaine Russell will be organists. (singed) --P.S. Monroe, J.B. Beard, G.W. Pike, Committee." [9 May



"Decoration Day services at Carmel, May 30. Devotional exercises by F.M. Hubbard at 8 o'clock a.m. Decorating graves at 10 o'clock. Sermon at 11 o'clock by Rev. Henderson. Dinner. Speaking beginning at 1 p.m. by Hon. James Garnett, Judge H.C. Baker, Gov. J.R. Hindman and J.H. Grady and others. Everybody invited, especially ex-Confederate soldiers. All bring well filled baskets. Singing at 9 a.m. Wolford and G.W. Pike, and music by the Columbia Band. (signed) n--A.R. Pike, R.A. Hubbard, J.F. Pike, Committee." [13, 20 May 1908, Adair County News]

"At Carmel--A great many old soldiers and a large number of civilians and many ladies attended decoration day at Carmel last Saturday. There were several patriotic speeches made and flowers were strewn, by loving hands over the graves of departed heroes. In the forenoon a Presbyterian preacher delivered an appropriate sermon. In the afternoon Mr. Jas. Garnett and Gov. J.R. Hindman paid tributes to the dead. The Columbia Brass Band rendered a number of national airs during the day, and there was an abundance of dinner on the ground for everybody. Decoration Day was also observed in a very appropriate manner at Stone's Grave Yard, South of Columbia." [3 June 1908, Adair County News]

"Decoration Day at Carmel was well attended from this vicinity, and all report an interesting day with plenty of dinner on the ground." [Mt. Pleasant letter, 10 June 1908, Adair County News]

Stone Grave Yard-- "A large crowd attended the Decoration services at the Stone Grave yard the 30th, and had good singing and plenty of dinner." [Gadberry letter, 10 June 1908, Adair County News]

Bearwallow--"Decoration Day, May 30th, will be observed at Bearwallow. A sermon will be preached at 9 o'clock in the forenoon. In the afternoon Capt. W.W. Bradshaw is invited to make a memorial speech. The singing will be conducted by Foster & Foster, W.B. Morris and B.H. Burton. All old soldiers are especially invited. Dinner on the ground. Everybody bring well filled baskets. Committee on arrangements, W.B. Morris, J.K.P. Dixon, J.D. Burton and H.P. Redman." [6 May 1908, Adair County News]

Tabernacle--"Decoration Day will be properly observed at Tabernacle, at Neatsville. The people of that section are requested to bring full baskets and spend the day in appropriate exercises. There will be plenty of music and several speeches. Hon. M. Rey Yarberry and others will address the ppoeple on suitable topics appropriate to the occasion." [19 May 1909, Adair County News]

"A more hospitable people than those who reside in the neighborhood of Tabernacle Church do not live in Adair County. Saturday was Decoration Day and about four hundred persons gathered. There were the aged, many handsome young girls and beautiful children and gallant young men present. Orations were made by Hon. Frank Neat, Waller Sinclair, and Hon. M. Rey Yarberry. The dinner could not have been surpassed and as many more people could have been bountifully fed. --J.S.B. [2 June 1909, Adair County News]

"Decoration services at Mt. Carmel, Sunday the 30th. The date at Bearwallow is fixed for the 29th." [19 May 1909, Adair County News]

"Decoration Day will be observed at Mt. Carmel next Sunday. Everybody invited. Rev. R.L. Tally will preach at 10 a.m., and also at 3 p.m. Dinner on the ground." [26 May 1909, Adair County News]

"Decoration Program--The following is the program for the decoration service, Columbia, Ky., Sunday, May 30, 1909. 4 p.m. Decoration of the graves; 4:30, song; prayer, Eld. Z.T. Williams; address, H.C. Baker; song; benediction, J.R. Crawford; committee on music, Misses Martha Hancock, Julia Eubank." [26 May 1909, Adair County News]

"The Rev. James D. Burton, of Purdy, informs us that decoration services at Bear Wallow Saturday was largely attended. In the forenoon an able sermon was delivered by Rev. Joe Turner. The Rev. C. Dixon also delivered an address appropriate to the occasion. An abundance of dinner was on the ground. In the afternoon two fine speeches were made, one by Plato Wade that demonstrated the fact that he is an orator with no mean ability. The other by Paul Smythe, of Columbia, who handled his subject in a manner that pleased his hearers. Good order prevailed throughout the day, not a single disturbance being reported." [2 June 1909, Adair County Mayers]

Antioch--"Several from this place attended Decoration Day at Antioch last Sunday." [Gadberry letter, 16 June 1909, *Adair County News*]

Chamber of Commerce Holds Monthly Meeting

The Columbia-Adair County Chamber of Commerce met on Tuesday afternoon at Lindsey Wilson College's Cranmer Dining Center, and were joined by this month's corporate sponsor, Hosparus of Green River.

Ron Heath, former president of the Chamber and a volunteer with Hosparus, introduced the organization.

"One of the things that has always impressed me is the professionalism and the care and concern that you see from everyone throughout the organization," he said, before turning the floor over to Lisa Sanford, Hosparus' Director of Advancement and Community Relations.

Sanford began by outlining the statistics involving hospice care in Kentucky, explaining that only around 20-percent of Adair County's hospice care needs are met. Of the 20-percent that are, 36percent of the care period is for seven days or less.

are done too late," she said. "Patients aren't getting the full benefit."

Further stressing the need for increased awareness of the service, Sanford shared that while 70-percent of Americans answered that they would prefer to pass away at home, only 25-percent of expected deaths actually occur there. Despite that, Sanford explained that Hosparus is not about a place, but rather, a

"It's a philosophy of care," she began. "We tailor everything to the patient's needs and wishes. If they want to be at home, they're at home, but we go out and make visits wherever they are, 24/7."

"We're all like books," she continued. "We all have a beginning chapter of our book. With Hosparus, patients choose the way their final chapter is written."

Sanford then introduced Hosparus RN, Pam Druin, who shared countless stories and memories of her experiences with patients.

"I like to reflect on those experiences," she said. "Those are the moments that matter. Whether it's listening to a patient's jokes or a burglary of a home in the Esto area of Russell County. looking at family photos, that is what's important to them in those moments.'

Druin said that in her time with the service, she had worked with patients as young as seven days and as old as 103 years, and has seen every range of scenarios that she could imagine.

"Sometimes I go into a home visit and the patient is doing fine and is very accepting and the meeting takes ten minutes," she began. "And then I go into the other room and spend an hour with a family member of who is not adjusting as well. We do whatever is needed."

Druin shared that she has seen mothers wait until all their adult children are present to take their final breath, and comatose patients open their eyes and take one look around the room at their family before passing on.

"We don't just take care of the physical needs," she said, "We simply aren't getting the referrals, and those that are given explaining that everyone from doctors to chaplains to bereavement counselors are available to families. "I've been blessed beyond measure to be a part of so many lives and included in so many stories."

> Debbie Faircloth, the Volunteer Coordinator for the area explained the importance and the roles played by volunteers. Because the company does not refuse service due to inability to pay, and because such a service takes more than a staff of employees can provide, Faircloth says that Hosparus relies heavily on volunteers.

> "They're some of the most wonderful people you'll ever know," she said.

Faircloth explained that volunteers might simply offer and an end, and we never know when we're entering the final companionship, give a family member a short break, serve as a hairdresser, or anything in between.

"Volunteering for Hosparus is not a job everyone wants," she admitted. "But for those that do it, they find it is a life-changing

The approved plan calls for starting part-time pay rates of \$8 an hour for noncertified personnel and \$9 an hour for certified. For full-time workers, certified dispatchers will start at \$9 an hour, and noncertified budget employees will start at \$8.50 per

Part-time employees can earn 50-cent on the hour raises for becoming certified, and/or moving to full-time. If a dispatcher moves from full to part-time, however, his or her pay will be reduced accordingly.

The jailer's race figures to be just as crowded, as five Republicans and Democrat have filed for the seat that will be vacated by the retiring Rick Wilson. Eric Antle, Lawrence Alan Burton, Buddy Powell, Mark Selby, and Joey White are each vying for the GOP nomination, and the winner will move on to face Darrel Baker, the lone Democrat to file for the position.

Incumbent Sheriff Harrison Moss, a Democrat, won't have any competition Tuesday, but three Republicans will seek the opposing nomination—Josh Brockman, Justin Claywell, and Chris Janes.

Magisterial races look to be especially competitive this year, as only one incumbent— District 3 magistrate Sammy Baker—faces no opposition in the primary and general election.

District 1 magistrate Harold Burton will face two Republican challengers— Danny Wayne Goodin and Jamey Neat, and the winner will assume the seat barring an independent candidate filing, as no Democrats are

We will keep on trying and someday we will be successful with everyone working together. It might take counties working together instead of individual counties trying to get factories to their towns. We recently had the opportunity to secure a business, but a few didn't seem to want them in Adair County or didn't think they were good enough for Adair County, you can drive over to Clinton County—the beginning of this factory just 40 miles away.

The hospital is the biggest issue facing our county today, not just court, but each and every citizen of our county. This was something I knew nothing about when I was elected, but I know more than I want to know now. In May 1981, Prunariu became the only Romanian-born cosmonaut and the 103rd human to fly into outer space. He and Russian cosmonaut Leonid Popov completed an eight-day space mission aboard Soyuz 40 member of one of the world's most elite organizations: the Association of Space Explorers. The association includes persons who have completed at least one orbit of the Earth in space -currently more than 325 individuals from 35 countries.

"As an individual, the most significant experience during a spaceflight is the human experience. Ö Seen from cosmic heights, our planet looks fabulous," Prunariu said. "By traveling 16 orbits around the Earth every 24 hours, one can admire all the areas on Earth."

But Prunariu said that orbiting the Earth can also be cautionary experience.

"One can also unfortunately, the wounds caused to our planet by the reckless activity of man in his struggle for resources at any price, the disposal of waste in various places on our planet, the deforestation of our oxygen stocks, the Equatorial forests, and many other things," he said. "When you fly in the outer space and you see the planet as a whole, you understand the global consequences of local activities of human communities and the need -- for our health's sake and for the future generations' sake -- to keep our planet clean, as we keep clean our homes."

In addition to being good stewards of the Earth, Prunariu told the graduates to set and strived toward goals.

"It is of utmost importance, when we become aware enough of our potential place in society, to set goals and to start fulfilling these goals diligently," he said. "This is where the real journey of our becoming starts."

Prunariu, who received an honorary doctorate from the college, cautioned the graduates that they should not become so consumed in reaching their goals that they forget about the 'human community.'

With the NFL Draft behind us, sports freaks turn their attention toward the NBA's version of the event. As a hoops junkie, I think the NBA Draft is far superior, both for brevity and for familiarity with the talent being selected. While I also love the NFL Draft as well (just not the mocks, as I told you last week), these drafts carry one inherent flaw: the people who run them.



Here's what I mean. At its heart, any type of sports draft is supposed to be a way for the bad teams to get the first choice at the best incoming players in order to promote balance, competitiveness and parity across the respective leagues. The problem, however, is that the excitement of such a notion makes everyone involved lose their minds. The process is simply too long and convoluted.

Don't misunderstand me. I get it. These teams are about to invest millions of dollars into the young men they select, and such an investment requires as much research as possible. When you look at the accuracy and results of many of these top choices, you'll start to see the point I'm making.

There is far too much poking and prodding. There is too much measuring and weighing and timing. We find out everything, ranging from their grandparents' medical and legal histories to their hand width and body fat percentage. It's too intrusive, it's irrelevant, and it's sickening.

Sure, you could make a correlation between the information they find and some type of positive or negative career success, but there is no way to extract real meaning from it. Absolutely none of it has proven to be a reliable indicator. In the NFL, 40-yard dash times don't really matter, the amount of times a guy can bench press a given weight doesn't matter, and who and what is in a guy's background doesn't matter—at least not every time.

Jerry Rice is the greatest wide receiver, and arguably the best football player, of all-time, and reportedly ran in the 4.6-4.7 second range in the 40-yard dash. Kevin Durant couldn't bench press 185 pounds even once. Countless guys have escaped poverty, crime and violence to be long-time greats and even ambassadors to their given sport.

It's all just noise. While it makes sense that you'd want the biggest, strongest, fastest athletes, we've seen too many examples of these workout warriors turning into complete busts for measurable feats to be used as anything more than notebook scribbles and internet chatter among excited fans who stand in awe at such athletic accomplishments.

Thankfully, the players and their agents have started to catch on. The upcoming NBA Draft combine will see another year of top prospects skipping out on as many drills and measurements as they're allowed. Wiggins, Parker, Embiid, Randle, Gordon and company will all spend as little time being studied like a lab rat as rules will accept.

That's because they have nowhere to go but down. If you read this column often, you're aware that I'm far from a Louisville fan—in any sport. That said, Teddy Bridgewater falling from what was once potential number one overall pick status to the end of the first round, based on his hand size (I'm not kidding), the need to wear gloves, and his body frame (again, I'm not kidding), was a joke.

Hearing the endless discussion of how top pick Jadeveon Clowney had this flaw or that flaw was idiotic, especially considering how every year since he was a senior in high school, he had been lauded by the same scouts and analysts as a sure-fire, can't miss, generational prospect. They spent four years picking, and digging, and analyzing, and then labeled him everything from lazy to a reckless troublemaker. And while any, all or none of the things said about him may prove to be true, nothing in their study of him will be what discovered it.

Too many guys have come out of nowhere. Too many guys have fallen through the proverbial cracks. Too many guys have been megabusts, for these scouts to have any credibility left. I know, I know, they do this for a living and have a billion years of experience, and the job is an inexact science.

That's my point. It's all just data gathering and then holding your breath and hoping, so why do we run these young men through the mud? Why don't we let their play, their body of work, their performance on the one stage that actually matters, speak for itself? No coach needs Kevin Durant to lift 185 pounds, and touchdowns don't count any less if your QB wears a glove to throw them.

So here's to all the prospects that refuse to play the sadistic game. There's zero reason for any human to be lined up in their underwear in front of a group of "scouts and owners." You're drafting players to play a game, not purchasing a horse. But that won't stop the sports conversation from being overrun with this measurement or that tidbit as we head toward the NBA Draft. The only question is which prospect is going to be badmouthed this time, and which "professional" will escape all accountability when that player goes on to be a star.


