APOLOGETICAL.

We scarcely need say that mistakes will be found in this Record, much as we have sought to guard against them. Hundreds of letters had to be written to gather what is here found. Many of the replies were so incomplete as to require further correspondence; and even thereby correct and satisfactory results were not always secured. So the issue of this Genealogy has been delayed.

There are yet many chasms in it, which could have been bridged with shrewd guesses; but as they would have been unsatisfactory, we leave each to get over as best he can. We send you this Record, asking each to pardon and correct its mistakes.

HISTORICAL.

From Hawick, Roxburghshire, Scotland, in the spring of 1795 the family of Adam and Margaret Kedzie came to the United States, sailing from Greenock on the Clyde. After a brief stay in the city of New York the family settled in Stamford, Delaware county, New York.

In this family were four sons and four daughters. Two of the sons, George and Adam, lived and died in the place of their first settlement. The others removed—William to Michigan in 1823, and James to Ohio in 1838. The daughters married Grant, Jones, Graham and Mabie, as recorded in the Genealogy.

The Kedzies subsequently ranged far and wide, so that the name is now borne by residents in New York, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Kansas, Colorado, and Canada. Their Relatives are still more widely scattered, as will be seen by the Record.

The catalogue of the Kedzies is not very large. When in 1826 William Kedzie brought his family to Michigan he left Delhi, N. Y., May 2d. and arrived at Monroe May 14th. a two weeks journey, by teams to Utica, canal boat to Buffalo, steamer to the mouth of the river Raisin and schooner to Monroe. Owing to exposures in a new country this branch of the Family was thought to be on its way to extinction, yet three-fourths of all now living and bearing the name belong to this branch.

The list of Kedzies would have been less, had it not been for this heroic transplantation of the stock into the wilds of Michigan by Wm. Kedzie, an event brought about largely through the influence of his life long friend, Dr. Robert Clark, then Register of the United States Land Office at Monroe. This removal was made by Mr. Kedzie both to secure for his five boys a more fertile soil than could be found on the stony hills of Delaware county; and also to aid in founding a christian settlement in a new country.

For this he bought, in 1824 and subsequently, larger tracts of land than he needed, making the

first purchase in the town and locating his residence five miles from other settlements; that he might select his immediate neighbors, selling them parts of his purchase.

He bought, for a farmer in those days, a large supply of books, chiefly religious. As soon as other families came, he established the public worship of God: soon a Sabbath school and still later a church were organized, both of which are still at work.

Of the men bearing the Kedzie name nine have been or are farmers; five, mechanics; two, merchants; eight, professional men, of whom three are authors. All the professional men, the wives of four of them and the daughter of another were graduates from college. All of these except two, belong by birth or marriage to the Michigan branch of the Family: of whom are others yet in college. Lineage under other names also furnishes college graduates.

Of those named in the following Record one is a member of the present (47th) congress, Hon. Jacob Ferris, of Delhi, N.Y. One has been a member of the legislature of Illinois, Hon. John H. Kedzie, of Evanston, Illinois, and one a member of the legis-

lature of Michigan, Hon. R.C. Kedzie, of Lansing, Michigan, who also by appointment of the Governor was a member of the State Board of Health, of which for four years he was President.

Among those found in the Record thirteen have in war defended their country against the slaveholder's rebellion, or have served the army as members of the Christian Commission; and one, James T. Kedzie Esq. of Bl'sfield Michigan, enlisted in the "Black Hawk War" of 1832. The politics of the Kedzies, having been Wh'g, are now strongly Republican.

No Kedzie is known to have been arrested as a violator of the laws of his country, to have repudiated his debts, to have been intemperate or dependent on charity. Nor has any reached middle life without having become a member of Congregational, Methodist or Presbyterian churches. Each has secured what little it takes of this world's goods to make such men rich.

The families with whom the Kedzies intermarried were chiefly of Scotch origin, as will be seen by the following.

The Grants came from the Highlands of Scotland and settled in Stamford, Delaware county, New York, where many of them still reside.

The Hume family immigrated to this country from East Gordon, Berwickshire, Scotland in 1795, coming in the same ship with the Kedzies. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hume brought their seven children three sons and four daughters, John, Robert, George, Isabel, Jane, Margaret and Betsey. They settled first in Saratoga county, but afterwards removed to Delaware county, New York. Robert Hume Sr. lived to the age of one hundred years. Like Moses, "his eye was not dim, nor his natural force abated."

The Thompsons were from Scotland, and when related to the Kedzies by marriage were residents in the city of New York and visitors at their uncle's, Rev. Robert Forest in Stamford, New York.

The parents of the American Archibalds with two sons and a daughter came to this country from the village of Midholm, Roxburgshire, Scotland in

1807. One son preceeded them and two sisters followed, finding homes in the state of New York.

The progenitor of the Mabie family in this country came from the Low Lands of Holland in the 16th century, as a privateersman during war between Holland and Spain. Different generations of the family have resided in Westchester, Putnam, and Delaware counties, New York.

The ancestors of the Telford family are of Scotch origin and when a member thereof was united by marriage with the Kedzies, the Telfords were residents of Cambridge, Washington Co., New York.

The Grahams are traced back to John Graham of Roxburghshire, Scotland, who was born March 7, 1754, the son of Thomas Graham of that ilk. The said John Graham and his wife, Jane Grey, about the year 1800 removed to the United States bringing their four sons, William, John, James and Thomas, and their four daughters Janet, Jane, Euphemia and Margaret, leaving in Scotland their daughter Isabel married to James Thompson. They settled in Stamford, Delaware county, N. Y., where and elsewhere in the same state the children married and lived. John Graham, the

patriarch, died at Erin, Chemung county, N. Y. October 7, 1841, aged 87 years.

The Jones family is traced to Scotland. William Jones who became connected with the Kedzies by marriage was from Raritan, New Jersey. His father removed to this country from Wales before the Revolutionary War: and to Wales his grandfather came from Scotland.

The Grant, Jones, Archibald, Hume, Telford, Graham, Mabie and Thompson Families, with whom the Kedzies of the second generation intermarried, were an industrious, intelligent and frugal people, having all the characteristics peculiar to the "cannie Scotch." In addition, they were not only strictly, but straitly, religious, devoutly offering their praises only in the use of David's Psalms.

The Families with whom the latter generations of Kedzies and their relatives intermarried are so thoroughly Americanized that they make little account of their remote ancestry. Yet generally

they are persons of culture and refinement, and stand on desirable levels both in society and the church.

In the main, upon these ranges can be found our "Lineage under other names," In church and state, as well as in general society, they reflect honor upon their relatives. And the history of not one of them is now recalled with any sense of shame. *Deo et ejus gratiæ laus.*



TRADITION.

From as early as the 14th century till the present our Family Name has taken a variety of forms, as Calzow, Cadyow, Kadge, Keddie, Kadzie, Kaidzie and Kedzie. Decendants of our ancestors, still living in Scotland, write the name Kedia, though acknowledging that it was formerly written Kedzie. An historical work the "Annals of Hawick" has the name spelled Kaidzie; while another, the "Memories of Hawick" has it Kedzie.

Sir Walter Scott in his romance, "The Fair Maid of Perth" spells it Keddie, and in one of his songs he writes it in the ancient form Cadyow.

In the central part of the Kirkyard in Carnwath, Lanarkshire, Scotland, devoted as early as in

reign of Queen Elizabeth to the burial of our ancestors, a monument, it is said, gives our name in most of the above forms.

This Carnwath is a village on the road from Edinburgh to Ayr, 25 miles southwest from Edinburgh. It has one main street, half a mile long, parallel with which a new street has recently been opened. The parish church was built in 1798 and rebuilt in 1833. Contiguous to it stands the ancient church, founded in 1424, and previous to the Reformation it was a provostry with six prebendaries. The aisle of the old church has been, successively, the burial place of the Somervilles, Dalziels and Lockharts. For how many generations the Kirkyard of Carnwath has been the burial place of our ancestors Tradition has not even guessed.

Less reliable tradition, prevailing both in Scotland and this country, cites Craig Nethan Castle as an ancient residence of our Family, being—so the story goes—dispossessed thereof in the reign of Charles II. for resisting his attempt to force prelacy upon Scotland. Such resistance our ancestors made, and for it they suffered persecu-

tion. The tradition of this is direct and reliable, but whether our ancestors were on that account dispossessed of Craig Nethan Castle, or whether they ever were possessed of it, tradition does not say with any assuring emphasis.

But as the ruins of that castle are one of the finest in Scotland, a description, gathered from visitors and from the *Gazeteer of Scotland*, may not be out of place. The castle stood upon a steep promontory, encircled by the Nethan on the east. The site is naturally very strong, and before the invention of artillery its bulwarks must have been almost impregnable. A high and solid wall of hewn stone, a great part of which is still standing, flanked with massive towers and perforated with loop-holes, pointing in all directions, surrounded the principal building, enclosing within its ample compass a courtyard, intersected with a deep moat, over which was thrown a drawbridge, defended by two parallel vaults, which are still accessible, though deeply buried in the rubbish with which the moat is filled. A large vaulted hall is still shown, called the Queen's room, where Mary Queen of

Scots lodged about the time of the disastrous battle of Langside. Over the entrance of the principal building is seen a much effaced escutcheon, in which it is still possible to trace the armorial supporters of different families that have had possession of the castle. One of its attractions is a well 300 feet deep, descended by a flight of polished stone steps built into the sides of the excavation. This well was to supply water in case of a siege; though Sir Walter Scott, in "Old Mortality," describing the castle under the name of "Tillietudlem Tower," says that this flight of descending steps led to subterranean dungeons for the confinement of prisoners. As above noted, the tradition connecting our name with that castle is wanting in the certitude of history.

Well founded tradition, however, gives us stronger ground for pride of ancestry, so far as it is justifiable, in the certified character of the Kedzies in Scotland for the past three centuries. During that time they have been known as people of high intelligence, honest farmers and staunch Presbyterians.

Such is the simple record of the beginning, union and ending of two remarkable lives, whose history fashioned the destiny of their descendants. In that non-migratory age for a father and mother to leave their native country—and such a country—to leave their kindred and the grave of their last born, to take their four sons and daughters and go forth, not like Abraham on a land

journey of a few hundred miles and in response to the certified will of God, but to sail away over three thousand miles of ocean, they must have been quickened by a faith as strong as Abraham's and even more heroic, since it had, for a foundation, to grope among the general probabilities of human wisdom and the general promises of God—finding justification only in the unknown issue. The history of a century, soon rounding to a close, brings ample justification of the far-seeing faith of that worthy pair. In the character shown and the results secured, every descendant can find occasion for admiration and thanksgiving; and all the profouder should these be, in view of the changed condition of life thereby secured.

In the changed state of the world's affairs, both in reach of knowledge and mode of travel, and in the different conditions of life now found, it is difficult for us rightly to conceive the perplexities and trials through which our ancestors passed in their migration to this country. Enough, that their firmness of faith and consequent strength of character were equal to the occasion.

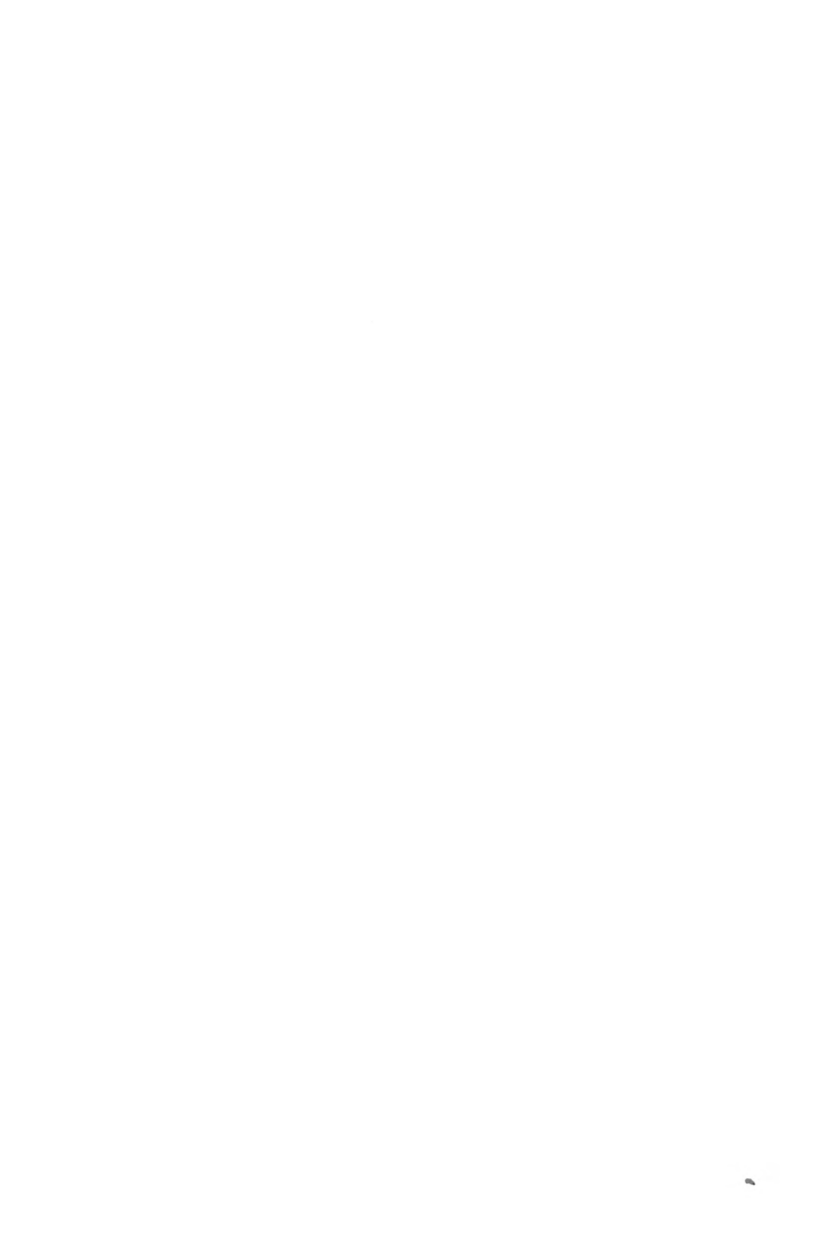

CONCLUSION.

The foregoing pages tell of the migration of the Kedzie Family from Scotland to this country, and give a list of their Relatives and Descendants.

Of those bearing the Kedzie name, and living in this country, the First Generation averaged 68 years of life. The Second Generation 67 years, four of whom, however, averaged 88, and two 93 years. Robert Hume, Sr., an ancestor of one branch of the family, lived a full century. Those bearing the Kedzie name, living in this Third Generation, and not having come to the end of their pilgrimage, have lives averaging 68 years,

indicating an increase of longevity over former generations.

The list contained in the foregoing pages gives the names, dates and places of birth, marriages, occupations and deaths, so far as could be ascertained. With most, these items might have been expanded into a biography. Though such biographies be not here written, the lives, nevertheless, were lived. They made their record and left their impress. Aspirations, plans, fears, hopes, love, marriage, labors, success generally, failures rarely—whatever these do in lives were done in the lives of the fore-named, and in those lives were found corresponding contents and consequences.

Varied as were the conditions in which these families found themselves, the essential things common to human experience, were found in each. These, in the way they were taken and used, led to crystallization of positive and well defined characters. So, shape was given to future destiny. One generation goes, another comes. So the waves sweep on.
