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James (Jacobus) Krom (Dirck Johannes Dirck Gysbert )  
 baptized 28 July 1771, son of Dirck Krom and Maria Viele  
 (Marbletown Dutch Church) married 19 January 1797 in  
 the same, Helena Terwilliger, born in 1773, daughter of  
 Solomon Terwilliger of Marbletown and his wife Helena Bosch  
 or Bush. James Krom died 1 February 1827, aged 52 years;  
 his wife Helena died 24 September 1845, in her 73rd year.  
 Both are buried in the Marbletown Dutch Church ground. Issue:

- i. Lena Terwilliger , born 14 January 1800 (Marbletown Dutch Church); sponsors, Salomon Terwilger, Lena Terwilger (maternal grandparents). 2025034
- ii. George Baster , born 27 February 1804 (same church); sponsors, George Baster, Anathe Helm; married (first?) Jane Vandemark, and had Jane Ann , bapt. July 30, 1825 at the Clove (High Falls) Dutch Ref. Church. Beers' Commemorative and Biog. History of Ulster Co. gives his wife as ..... Vandemark. The baptismal notice says the mother was deceased. He possibly married (2) 15 June 1830, Maria Van Leuven (Marbletown Dutch Church).
- iii. Maria Viely , born 2 January 1807 (same)
- iv. Salomon , born 12 May 1810; sponsors, Helena Terwilliger, Salomon Terwilliger (same).
- v. William H. born 4 August 1812 in Marbletown (Beers, as cited; died 2 February 1885 in 73rd year; married Hannah, daughter of Hugh Burns.
- vi. Isaac , born 22 January 1815 (Marbletown church).
- vii. James Burke , born 25 July 1817 (same)
- viii. Sarah Ann , born 25 January 1819 (same).

James or Jacobus Krom resided for a while at Cottekill or Woolsey Corners, Ulster County; afterwards moved to a place between High Falls and Stone Ridge in that county. He was a chairmaker and farmer (Beers). He died 1 February 1827, "aged 52 years". "Lanah, wife of Jacobus Krum" was named in the will of her father, Solomon Terwilliger, as his daughter, 23 July 1804. (Ulster County Wills, Liber D; p. 60

in Surrogate's Office, Kingston.

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Cornelius D. Krom(Dirck Johannes Dirck Gysbert )

baptised 6 May 1781 (Marbletown Dutch Church), son of Dirck and Maria(Fiele or Viele) Krom; married Maria Van Aken, bapt. 14 September 1783 in the Kingston Dutch Church, daughter of Benjamin Van Aken, a Revolutionary soldier, and his wife Maria Ekker (O lde Ulster 5;184-"Van Aken and Allied Families".) Their marriage took place January 8, 1804 in the Kingston Dutch Church,"both residing under the jurisdiction of Kingston".

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John J. Krom(John J. Johannes Dirck Gysbert )

baptised 28 March 1777 (Marbletown Dutch Church), son of John Krom, Margaret Fiele(Viele), married 12 December 1798, Jenny Kain, and had 1. Rachel , baptised 9 November 1799(same); sponsors, John van Sichel, Rachel Krom.

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Abraham J. Krom(John J. Johannes Dirck Gysbert ),

baptised 15 February 1780, son of John J. and Margaret (Viele) Krom; married 3 March 1798 in the Marbletown Dutch Church, "Nella Doil", elsewhere called Eleanor Doyle. Children:

- i. Margreijtje , born 30 June 1799 (Marbletown Dutch Ch.) spongor, Peggy Doil.
- ii. John , born 25 February 1801, bapt. 26 July 1801; sponsors, John Krum, Margaret Krum (paternal grandparents) (Bloomington Dutch Church).

Abraham Krom died 12 May 1844, aged 64-1-27, and was buried in the Friends' ground, Tillson, town of Rosendale, Ulster County(Ulster Co. Gravestone Inscriptions, p.218).

Elias J. Krom(lineage same as above), bapt. 24 November 1782 in Marbletown, son of John J. and Margaret (Viele) Krom, married 1 September 1803, Hendrica Terwilliger in the same church(she is called Hendrica Smith in the baptismal records of her two children); and had -

- i. Rebecca , born 20 July 1804; sponsors, Johanes Terwilger, Rebecca O'Connor(Marbletown Dutch Ch.)
- ii. Jacob Snyder , born 3 January 1807 (same).

Another Elias Krom was baptised 31 July 1791 (Marbletown), son of Elias and Marytie(Smith) Krom. I have no further record.





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Esther Krom(John Hendrick Dirck Gysbert ), born  
 25 March 1776, daughter of John Krom, Esther Le Roy, died  
 July 5, 1850. She made her will 1 February 1841; probated  
 13 August 1850. It throws much light on this family.  
 (She was buried in the Whitfield ground, town of Rochester).

"I, Hester Krom of the town of Rochester, County of  
 Ulster.....To brother Solomon I. Krom all my real estate  
 in the town of Rochester and the neighborhood called Newtown,  
 being the part or share belonging to me of all that certain  
 farm of which my father John Krom late of Rochester deceased,  
 died seized. Also a certain farm conveyed to me by Jacob  
 Barley and Hannah his wife. Solomon I. Krom to pay the  
 following legacies: To Jane, wife of Fredrick M. Markle,  
 \$50; John Burns, \$60; sister Elizabeth Burns,\$40; Hannah, wife  
 of William Henry Krom,\$40; Gertrude Burns,\$40; Esther, wife  
 of Jacobus Hoornbeck Enderly, \$40; sister, Gitty, wife of  
 Michael Rider, \$350; niece, Hester L. Krom,\$60; Maria M.,  
 wife of John Quick,\$60; Esther, wife of Hiram Terwilliger,  
 \$150; brother Lucas, note of hand executed by him for \$500;  
 sister Elizabeth and Gitty and the children of my sister  
 Hannah, deceased, residue of personal estate. Brother  
 Solomon I. Krom and Louis D. Bevier, executors. Witnessed  
 by Louis D. Bevier, Jacob C. Depuy. Prob. 13 August 1850  
 (Ulster County Wills, Liber M;299). Note. Solomon I. Krom  
 who married Maria Graham was the brother named in this will, as





they had a daughter, Hester La Roy, named in this will.

Solomon I. Krom who married Maria Bush was another person.

In regard to the Krom homestead of Whitfield, J. Hartley Tanner, a descendant of these Krons, wrote in the Ulster County Historical Society Proceedings, 1937-38, that "near the district school"(an old stone schoolhouse in Whitfield or Newton) "stands an old stone house built by John Krom, probably before 1800. It passed down the line of his descendants to Solomon Krom, to Lucas Krom, and to Emily Rider, daughter of Lucas. The walls have been covered with stucco, porches and additions have been attached, so that a former generation would not recognize it. It is now the property of Isidore Backinoff, who operates it as a farm and boardinghouse." The John Krom mentioned by Mr. Tanner evidently refers to John<sup>4</sup>, who left the house to Solomon I.<sup>5</sup>, who left it to Lucas<sup>6</sup>, born 1818, who left it to his daughter Emily?

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John J. Krom(John Hendrick Dirck Gysbert ),

baptised 18 September 1780, son of John and Esther (Le Roy) Krom, perhaps did not marry. He made his will 25 May 1813, describing himself as "weak of body", and named his two brothers, Solomon and Lucas, three sisters, Hester, Hannah and Gitty, to all of whom he left his estate, both real and personal, in five equal shares. Brother Solomon J. Krom and Hester Krom, executors. The will was probated 3 July 1813. Abm. T. E. DeWitt, Mary Rider, Alexander Lattimer were witnesses. (Ulster County Wills, Liber D:459).

Solomon J. Krom(lineage same as John J., above) was baptised 26 June 1785, son of John Krom, Esther Le Roy



(Rochester Dutch Church); married Maria Graham, born 1785; died 10 July 1861, and was buried in the Whitfield ground, town of Rochester. His birthplace is given on the stone as 26 June 1785; she died 17 April 1856, aged 70-11-19, and was buried there also. (Ulster County Gravestone Insc, p.200)

Solomon J. Krom is also written as Solomon I. - I and J being interchangeable in documents of this period. Mr. Tanner (previously quoted) wrote: "Beyond the cemetery at Whitfield is the old stone house of Solomon Krom, a brother of John, and I surmise that this was their ancestral home, as the old Krom burying ground is near. Strange stories have been told of this place and the cemetery - strange sounds and weird lights. The belief in witchcraft is common. If butter would not form, a hot horseshoe was thrown into the churn. If a pig was sick, it was whipped, which was supposed to leave stripes on the witch's back..... At Newton (old name for Whitfield) a certain worthy gentleman accused a lady to being a "Tover Hax", when she promptly brought suit for slander. He





failed to prove his assertion, and not being able to pay his fine, he was imprisoned in the Kingston jail."

Lucas Krom(John<sup>5</sup> ,Hendrick<sup>4</sup> ,Dirck<sup>3</sup> ,Gysbert<sup>2</sup> ) born<sup>1</sup>

12 June 1796, baptised Rochester Dutch Church, son of John and Esther (Le Roy) Krom, died 24 August 1871, aged 76-2-12, and was buried in Fairview cemetery in Marbletown.

(Ulster County Gravestone Inscriptions, p.94). He married (1) Helena Maria Miller; (2) Esther ..... who died March 4, 1875, aged 81-9-3. "She was a relative of Henry B. Caverly who married his daughter Helena Miller", according to Miss Miriam Krom of High Falls. Her age was given as 56 in the 1850 census. Issue(by first wife).

- i. Esther(Hester) , died 8 October 1843, aged 26-9-27, buried in Fairview cemetery (ibid).
- ii. Jemima , baptised 17 March 1819 (Rochester Dutch Ch.) name written "Jeremias", aged 31, in 1850 census.
- iii. John L. born 16 October 1820, according to Beers' Commemorative & Biog. History of Ulster Co.
- iv. Asa , twin of John L. (ibid)
- v. Solomon L. baptised 26 January 1823 (Rochester); aged 26 in 1850 census.
- vi. Lydia Maria , bapt. 29 December 1824 (Rochester), not named in census.
- vii. Cornelia , bapt. 22 December 1826 (Rochester); not in 1850 census.
- viii. Sarah Catherine , born 13 June 1829, bapt. 6 Dec. 1829 (Rochester), aged 21 in 1850 census.
- ix. Gertrude , baptism not found, aged 19, 1850 census.
- x. Hellena M. aged 17, 1850 census; married Henry B. Caverly; she died at Passaic, N.J. They had





Sophia E. Caverly, living at 265 Totowa Ave. Patterson, N. J. in 1942; and John Ludington Caverly, who died 4 December 1923, unmarried (information from Miss Miriam Krom, of High Falls.)

(Jerome Hutler Krom, aged 1, is listed in this house in 1850 census. Perhaps a grandchild?)

Stephen Krom(Jacob Hendrick Dirck Gysbert ), son of Jacob and Catharine (Crispell) Krom, baptised 5 February 1788 in Kingston Dutch Church. I have no further record of him.

5 4 3 2 1

Martin Krom(Jacob Hendrick Dirck Gysbert ), son of Jacob and Catharine (Crispell) Krom, was born before 1790, but his baptism is not recorded. He was the oldest living son of Jacob, 17 September 1847, according to surrogate records. He married Susan ....., and resided in Olive, where he bought the homestead farm from Reuben Krom and Mary his wife, William Long and Elizabeth his wife, Samuel Crispell and Hannah his wife, Isaiah Crispell and Sarah his wife, Henry Coons and Catharine his wife, 14 June 1838. This was evidently a family agreement (Ulster County Deeds in County Clerk's Office, Kingston). I have no other records o f Martin.

Reuben Krom (lineage same as Martin, above), whose baptism is not recorded, son of Jacob and Catharine (Crispell) Krom, married Mary Du Bois, whose parentage is unknown to me. They lived in Olive township, a part of the old Marbletown, on land now under the Ashokan Reser voir. Reuben Krom, the son of Jacob, petitioned 21 August 1837 for administration of his father's estate, saying that Jacob Krom died 10 July 1837, and naming himself, Martin Krom, Elizabeth the wife of William Delong, Hannah the wife of Samuel Crispell,





## Isaias

Sally the wife of Isaias Crispell, and Catharine, the wife of Henry Koons, as heirs. (Filing Box 23, Surrogate's Office, Kingston). Reuben died before 17 September 1847, when a petition for the administration of Jacob Krom's estate by Jacob Krom, a grandson, refers to him as deceased, in naming his (Reuben's) 14 children, as heirs of the grandfather Jacob. The children were:

1. Angeline , named in the petition; married Solomon Hollister, born 15 August 1802 in Olive, son of Josiah and Mary (Winchell) Hollister; died 17 June 1850; 4 children (see Winchell Genealogy).
- ii. George - probably the George R. who married, 10 October 1828, Margaret Van Leuven in Marbletown Dutch Church.
- iii. Catharine , married Joseph Hoyt, 2 September 1845, by Shokan Dutch Church minister. He was of New York City. They lived later in Connecticut, according to Mrs. William J. Green of Ashokan, a Krom descendant.
- iv. Jacob , born 11 April 1819, baptised October 1833 "at the house of Mr. Krom" by Shokan Dutch Reformed minister.
- v. Lucinda , born July 24, 1820, baptised October 1833 (see above); married Hans Rees of New York City, a wealthy tanner; died about 1900 (information from Louis H. Porter, N.Y. City). Several descendants living.
- vi. Henry , born 8 February 1822, bapt. October 1833; died before 27 June 1859; married Harriet (Reese?).
- vii. Jane , born March 9, 1824, bapt. October 1833; married (1) John Reade; married (2) in Oakland, California, 28 November 1882, Pedar Sather. She died 12 December 1911 in Oakland. Being without heirs and having "inherited her small fortune from Pedar Sather's estate which had originated in the State of California, she decided to leave those funds to the University of California." The Jane K. Sather Chair in Cultural Literature and History, a fund for the purchase of Greek, Latin, Law and History books, and the Campanile with its bells, known as the Sathar Tower, were her gifts or bequests. She is said to have taught school in New Jersey before marrying John Reade.

Reuben Krom was an Elder of the Shokan Dutch Reformed Church from 1841-1843 and a man of importance in the community. He lived in a stone house in the village of Shokan, which is now covered by the waters of the Ashokan Reservoir. His descendants are many, and some of them live along the Reservoir at West Shokan, and also in Kingston. The late Charles Eugene Krom was a descendant, through the son Jacob. Charles Eugene Krom married Harriet S. Weidner, who died in January 1944 at the Huntington, Pearl Street, Kingston. Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. William J. Green of Ashokan and Mrs. Mary Louise Gaffken of Kingston; a grandson, Lieut. William E. Gaffken of Kingston.

At least three of Reuben's daughters, Catharine, Lucinda and Rebecca, married men in the tanning business who became wealthy. Harvey S. Ladew and his wife, Rebecca(Krom) contributed substantially to St. Luke's Hospital, New York City, where a memorial tablet is placed, with their names.

born 16 January 1791, baptised Rochester Dutch Church,  
 son of Reuben and Cornelia (Dailey or Doyle) Krom, married  
 Margaret Rider, born 8 March 1790, baptised Rochester Church,  
 daughter of Benjamin and Molly (Enderly) Rider. The date  
 of his death I do not know. She died 16 January 1862, aged  
 71-10-8, and was buried at Whitfield, Rochester township.  
 J. Hartley Tanner, previously quoted, thought that they lived  
 on the old Montagne(De la Montage) place. Issue:

 bapt. 13 November 1795 in Kingston Dutch Church, son of Reuben  
 and Cornelia (Dailey) Krom, married Mary . . . . ., born 1799,  
 aged 51 in 1850, according to the census. They were living



in Rochester township in 1850, with children as follows:

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Abraham Krom (Jacob Abraham Dirck Gysbert), bapt.

14 April 1780 in the Kingston Dutch Church, son of Jacob and Catharine (Blanshan) Krom (their only child, so far as known); died May 12, 1844, aged 64-1-27, and was buried in the Friends' ground, Tillson, town of Rosendale (Ulster County Gravestone Inscriptions). He married, 31 December 1800, Polly Coutant (Marbletown Dutch Church records). The Coutants were Quakers. On April 1, 1835, Abraham Krom and his wife Mary, Anna Coutant, Abraham Coutant and Elizabeth his wife of Marbletown, and Hezekiah Coutant and Jane his wife of the town of Hurley, deeded to Aretus Berry of Marbletown, a lot in Marbletown. (Ulster County Deeds 46;286 in County Clerk's Office, Kingston).

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Charles Krom (Cornelius, Abraham Dirck Gysbert)

born 28 September 1806, baptised 19 October 1806 (Rochester Dutch Church), son of Cornelius and Maria (Deyo) Krom, married Maria Relyea, who was born in 1806. He resided in the town of Hurley, where he petitioned 30 May 1806 for the settlement of the estate of "Cornelius Krom, Jr." of Hurley, of which he was executor. Children:

"Henry Krom of the town of Marbletown" made his will 20 September 1864. He bequeathed to his son Benjamin a woodlot along the Lucas Turnpike near his home, of 15 acres, and \$200, and named three daughters: Sarah Ann, the wife of Jacob Roosa, deceased; Catharine, wife of Charles Markle; Louisa, wife of Abraham Keator. Wife Catharine and daughter Sarah Ann, all personal property. Richard Teneyck, "a colored man now living with me, if he remains during my life, a good horse." Two sons in law, Charles Markle and Abraham Keator, executors. The will was probated 16 April 1866. (Ulster County Wills, Liber P.229, in Surrogate's Office, Kingston). Henry resided in the town of Marbletown, where "Catharine Moris, wife of Henry Krom" was received in the Marbletown Dutch Church 31 March, 1832.

THE HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES

CHAPTER I

THE EARLY HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES

The first European settlers in North America were the Spanish, who discovered the continent in 1492. They were followed by the French, the Dutch, and the English. The English colonies were founded in 1607 at Jamestown, Virginia. The Pilgrims founded Plymouth in 1620. The Massachusetts Bay Colony was founded in 1630. The New England colonies were characterized by their Puritanism and their emphasis on education and industry. The Southern colonies were characterized by their dependence on agriculture and their more relaxed social structure. The Middle colonies were a mix of the two.

William S. Krom (Simon W. Willem Hendrick Gysbert )

born 29 August 1797, son of Simon W. and Marjore (Davis) Krom, married Dorothea , whose surname is not known. He is listed in the 1850 census in the town of Rosendale, aged 58, and had in his house Simon W. Krom, aged 80 (evidently his father); his wife "Dortha", aged 59; children, Jacob Krom, 24; Peter Krom, 18; John Krom, 17; George Krom, 12. Also Mary Milton, born in Ireland. In 1855 he had two other servants and Mathusalem Krom, aged 22, a laborer, born in Ulster County, whom I have not placed. His sons, Peter, John and George were still with him in 1855,<sup>6</sup> and his wife, Dortha. His son Jacob Krom, born about 1826; died 20 August 1890, aged 63-7-0; married Maria Lefever, born 18 July 1821, daughter of Simon and Catharine (Hendricksen) Lefever of Bloomington, Ulster County. She died 14 August 1884, aged 60-0-26, and both are buried in Rosendale cemetery (Ulster Co. Gravestone Insc.) They had: a. Israel .<sup>7</sup> b. Julia C.<sup>7</sup> who married Edward E. John S. Krom, brother of the above William S., was evidently born about 1799, for he gave his age as 51 in the 1851 census in Marbletown. His baptism was not recorded. He was named as a son in Simon Krom's will (see volume 1; page 33-35 of this genealogy.) He married (1) Hannah Van Leuven, as shown by Marbletown Dutch Church records, and a family record of a descendant, Dorothy Mae Krom; married (2) Gertrude . . . . ., who was aged 50 in 1850 census. Krom and to my two sister Rachel, wife of David Osterhout and Eliza Jane, wife of Simon Wood, the residue of my property, each an equal third part. Thomas Everett of Marbletown, sole executor." Henry S. Krom of the town of Rochester made his will 2 November 1846. It was probated 17 September 1849 (Ulster County Wills, Liber M;100), giving to his wife Elizabeth sole control of his real and personal estate during her life or widowhood; eldest son Solomon, all real estate on the northwest side of the public highway from Bakertown to the Mill brook, with one half "my woodland in the town of Rochester". "To my younger son, Peter B., all real estate on the southeast side of the said public highway with other half of woodland. My daughters" (not named) "\$50 each." Son Solomon and Dr. Meeker Gorham, executors.

Krom and my two nephews, John R. Depuy and John L. Tanner. To the American Tract Society \$40. for 2 life members, "my two grandchildren, John James Schoonmaker and Arthur Krom. To son Westbrook B., \$300; to son John J., \$400. To daughter Mary E. Schoonmaker, \$800. To son Augustus, \$1. To daughter Cornelia D. McGaffin, \$25; to grandson Arthur Krom, \$1200; to grandson John James Schoonmaker, \$500; to son Solomon Krom, residue of personal and real estate. Probated 29 April 1872. (Ulster County Wills Q;699). 2025034

George Krom, whose parentage I have not ascertained,<sup>6</sup> married Hester LeRoy Krom (Solomon I. John Hendrick Dirck<sup>5</sup> Gysbert<sup>4</sup> )<sup>1</sup>. She was baptised 23 January 1812, daughter of Solomon I. or J. and Maria (Graham) Krom<sup>3</sup> she died 1858 and was buried in the Whitfield ground, town of Rochester. She was named in the will of her aunt, Esther Krom, on February 1, 1841 as Hester L. Krom. She made her will 3 April 1858 "being of the town of Rochester", "age og 45 years"; it was probated 14 June 1858, and named "beloved husband, George Krom" to whom she bequeathed \$1000. "To children of Reuben A. Tanner and my sister, Joanna Tanner, \$60. each when they attain the age<sup>2</sup>





of 18 years; sister Hannah J. Sahler, wife of Abraham L. Sahler, my mahogany table standing in the parlor, and sofa bottomed boston rocking chair; to my sister Sarah the wife of Benjamin H. Depuy, my Sofa; to husband George Krom, use and possession of real and personal property for two years after my decease: executors to buy from George Krom the real estate he purchased of my father; residue to 2 brothers and 2 sisters, John, Lucas, Hannah and Sarah. Executors, husband George Krom and brother Lucas Krom, Jr. (Ulster County Wills, Liber N;57).

William H. Krom (James Dirck Johannes Dirck Gysbert )  
 born 4 August 1812 in Marbletown, son of James and Helena (Terwilliger) Krom (see page 1 of this volume); married Hannah, daughter of Hugh Burns of Marbletown. Beers' Commemorative and Biographical History of Ulster County says that Hugh Burns was a soldier in the war of 1812, and uncle of "John Burns of Gettysburg, famous in the Civil War." William H. Krom was listed in the 1855 Census in the town of Marbletown, aged 43; his wife Hannah gave her age as 46. He had been living in Marbletown for 43 years. His wife Hannah was baptised as an adult in the Marbletown Dutch Church, April 1, 1830. Childrne, as listed in the 1855 census; Amanda, aged 18. John B., aged 15. James, aged 13, and "Lucus", aged 6. There had been another daughter, Lydia J., who died young (Beers). The only baptism I have found is that of Amanda, "born 5 August 1836", baptised Marbletown Dutch Church.

William H. Krom was a bridge builder and carpenter. From 1854 to 1867 he was the superintendent and contractor for the cement works at High Falls owned by Delafield and Baxter. He spent his last years on his farm one mile west of High Falls. He died 22 February 1885 "in his 73rd year". (Beers' History, previously cited).

Luke W. Krom, son of William H. and Hannah (Burns)

Krom (see above) was apparently born in 1849, as he was aged 6 at the time of the 1855 census. He married Mary E..... who died at her home in High Falls in May, 1944. She had been a member of the High Falls Reformed Church for 64 years.

"Surviving are five daughters, the Misses Miriam, Kathryn and Alice Krom (of High Falls); Mrs. Bessie Eastman of Livingston Manor, and Mrs. Helen R. Lintz, of Hempstead, L. I.; a son Albert, of Livingston Manor; four sisters, Mrs. Elma Schoonmaker, Mrs. Martha Hasbrouck, Mrs. Joetta Snyder and Mrs. Kate M. Snyder, and several grandchildren." (Obituary in Ulster County News.)

Benjamin<sup>1</sup> Krom (possibly Henry B. Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Hendrick<sup>3</sup> Gysbert<sup>2</sup>) married "Haner Youmans" and had: Uriah Hill<sup>6?</sup> Krom, born Sepr. 16, 1804, bapt. November 6, 1804, Shokan Dutch Ref. Church. This may have been Benjamin<sup>5</sup>, son of Henry B. and Rachel (Louw) Krom, baptised 20 June 1784. I have no further record of him.

John B. Krom (William H. James Dirck Johannes Dirck<sup>7</sup>, Gysb.<sup>6</sup>) brother of Luke W. Krom above, served in the Civil War; retired with the rank of Major. He married and had:

John B. Krom was born about 1840 and was aged 15 in 1855.

<sup>8</sup> Dr. James Krom, son of John B. Krom (above) was born

in High Falls about 1868, and graduated from the College of Physicians and Surgeons in New York City, class of 1892. His practice began in Kingston. He later practised in New Paltz, Phoenicia and from 1908 to 1938 in Saugerties. He died at the Kingston Hospital in September 1940, and was survived by his wife, Anne (Hotaling) Krom and one son, Dr. John B. Krom<sup>9</sup> of Kingston; three brothers, George S. Krom of New York City, Charles S. Krom of Spring Lake, New Jersey, and William L. Krom<sup>10</sup> of High Falls, and one granddaughter, Barbara Krom of Kingston.

Richard Krum of Atwood, in the town of Marbletown, was reputed to be aged 93 in September 1937, according to an article in the Ulster County Press. He was a veteran barber. The article stated that "Mr. Krum lives and practices his trade in an old stone dwelling house in Atwood which was originally a schoolhouse, built in 1773 by his greatgrandfather, James Krum." Richard Krum also mended clocks and watches, and was a cobbler, farmer, blacksmith and carpenter, Alexander Krum, who "died in a Southern prison camp" was an uncle, as were John Krum, Lamuel "Midderrhr", (Middagh?) and Henry Wells. Richard Krum died recently in Kingston (fall of 1943 or early winter of 1944.)

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
