Foreword

TO

Corsican and Irish Landscapes.

In this exhibition of landscapes from two islands, of which one has a hold on the very heart of the artist and the other has appealed irresistibly to her artistic perceptions, will be found not alone complete fidelity to the natural features of the land, but also the expression of the inner character of things which demands interpretation, and is, so to speak, personal to the interpreter. The first thing suggested by this collection is that Corsica is not a subject for every painter. After a short visit in the far-off days of boyhood, on revisiting it again this year that vague thought had become an absolute conviction.

No ! Corsican landscape is not everybody's subject. It is dangerous by the apparent facility of its Alpine type which, like certain types of very fine faces, lends itself to commonplace, as if it were a mask rather than the envelope of the soul. Nothing could be made more banal by the exercise of mere skill or even by a vision not frankly and delicately personal than snow-crag, tormented rock-faces, fantastic pinnacles bordered by a blue sea. The truth of Corsican landscape is a matter of deeper vision ; its features do not impose themselves by mere grandeur of desolation or exceptionality of form—things easy to capture on the canvas. Yet all those things are there ! But in this series of pictures something more has been captured, something extremely subtle, composed of amenity and

ruggedness which may be felt obscurely by any one, but which this artist, so faithful in her technique, has rendered with imaginative and touching insight. These pictures, so full of light and truth, contain all the wildness and all the transparent suavity, *suavita de aiere*, which give its unique charm to the Corsican landscape.

So much for Corsica. As to the other, her native island, there must be added to her individual and appreciative vision of beauty, as found in the world at large, the deeper sense of pathos born of love, something on which the emotions of a non-native are not perhaps capable of pronouncing a worthy appreciation. An artist who had perceived the inner truth of a foreign landscape by the power of imaginative sympathy could not fail to render still more finely the spirit of her native land shining upon its outward face ; to respond more intimately still to the tie of old association, an association going back into the soil, an association that, like all manifestations of inherited personality, is really unanalysable in its profounder appeal.
