

"Get it Together" Conclusions

Christian unity can be difficult at times. What are some things that have made it hard for you to be in unity with other Christians?

In the final chapter of 1 Corinthians, Paul addresses two more issues that tend to divide Christians: money (specifically, how the church collects and uses money) and personal offenses.

The Collection • 1 Corinthians 16:1-4

Read 1 Corinthians 16:1-4. Paul is taking a collection of money to send to the impoverished church in Jerusalem. On Sunday, we went through some of the reasons for the collection. What do you think of what Paul is doing?

How do you feel when your church asks for money? Does the reason for the request matter to you?

How does church financial management affect church unity? Does it affect you?

Personal Issues • 1 Corinthians 16:5-24

Here's a summary:

- Paul plans to make an extended visit to Corinth, but he can't come now.
- Paul is worried Timothy might not be welcome, but he's going now anyway.
- Apollos does not want to visit them now, even though he's been asked.
- Paul and the church in Corinth do not have a good relationship, but Stephanas and his servants have taken the risk to be a blessing to both.
- The churches in Asia, Aquila and Priscilla, Paul's companions, and Paul himself send personal greetings, including an affirmation of love for all of them.

Given the strained relationship between Paul and the church in Corinth, how do you feel about the way this letter end? Which item or items stand out to you?

Have you ever been tempted to break unity with a Christian because of something personal between you? How did you deal with that?
