Dear Davis

he has done his best, I'll venture to say (more wisely, I think, &
again that is good for our whole country. He has however, very precip
itate, I think, & may be very sorry for it in some time.

something for Jeffrey too.

I wd be very glad to obtain proof from Prof Henry the
isolated wire he was kind enough to offer me.

I haven't had time yet to see Mr. Wood. Remember me
respectfully to Mr. White & Miss Rebecca.

I wrote to Mr. Cuyler the other day upon the subject of Corres
pondence with the N.Y. papers. I haven't yet heard from him &
therefore can't tell you how I succeed or what my plans will
be. It is more than probable I shall not succeed & so
I proceed to stay till August.
