My dear Bro. Speer-

At a meeting of Waterloo Presbytery, just recently adjourned, I was directed as Stated Clerk to convey to you the fraternal love and deep sympathy of your brethren in this part of Iowa in the great sorrow which has come to you in the death of your son. You probably know few of us individu-

ally but we all knew you and have so often been cheered and inspired by you that we love you and wish very sincerely that we might in some way help and comfort you in your affliction.

When a student in Columbia and Union I used to go down to the Presbyterian Building to hear you and after a lapse of nearly 40 years I could outline some of those helpful addresses today.

Now your brethren everywhere are sorrowing with you and praying for you and few of us who have grown old with you but have known in our own experiences such bereavements as enable us in a very real way to put ourselves in your place. In my own ministry I have laid to rest two beloved wives, a daughter, my mother and a father who served as a Presbyterian minister for 44 years. The Council presented its report through its chairman, Rev. B. N. Covert. The report consisted of the revised standing rules of the Presbytery after considerable discussion they were ordered printed and sent down to the Church sessions for review. A report on these to be made at the Spring meeting of Presbytery when they will be formally adopted as corrected by the churches.

National Missions—The committee on National Missions presented its report which was adopted. Its recommendations are as follows:

1. That we use the "Forward Again In Evangelism", as suggested by our General Assembly, and that every church adapt it and use it.

2. That we approve the recommendation of the committee for aid to the following fields, for the year beginning Oct. 1:

3. That the following churches be dissolved, that the property be taken over by the Trustees of the Presbytery, and that letters be granted to members of these churches by the Stated Clerk to whatever church they may wish to go:

Grand Prairie, Mt. Moriah, Concord.

It is further recommended that the Presbyterial dues of these above churches be cancelled.

4. That the following churches be visited, and investigation be made as to their wishes as to the future:

Va-Ridge Bethel, M. Q. Stevenson; Mt. Olive, Mr. W. O. Daniel; Corinth, Fred L. Hudson.

5. That the arrangement for Rev. H. M. Gardner to supply Ethel and Callao, be approved.

6. That moderators for the sessions of the vacant churches be continued as for the last six months, except that Rev. B. N. Covert be appointed Program" of Synod, and that we welcome the return to our Presbytery of moderator of the McLaughlin Memorial, instead of Rev. Alva S. Covert.

We recommend an elders' conference some time during the year.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Committee on Foreign Missions presented its report through its chairman, Rev. C. E. Almon. The report was received and adopted. Its recommendations follow: 1. That in response to the call from the Board for a 10% increase in gifts we urge the churches to make every effort to increase their benevolent giving.

2. That study groups be formed to keep in touch with current information from the fields.

5. Especially would we thank the ladies of the church for their elegantly prepared provisions for our physical needs.

The Stated Clerk was ordered to pay Mr. Payne \$5.00 toward his travel in attending Presbytery.


The Stated clerk was ordered to write to Rev. T. M. Funk our appreciation of his faithful interest in the Presbytery and to thank him for his gifts.





Tuesday my attention was called to an article in the Minneapolis Journal, giving an account of the tragic death of your dear son. Further than what is stated in the paper we know nothing at all, and are hoping that it is all a mistake, and that there is no truth in the story.


