Dear Garrison,

131 I have just returned from Eagleswood with Mary Anne, where we spent Sunday. I now fulfil a promise I made to Theodore and Angelina Weld to ~~write~~ convey to you their earnest invitation to visit them as you pass on to Philadelphia. They (and other Eagleswood friends, including Marcus & Rebecca Spring) want you to spend next Sunday with them. Indeed this seems the only way in which you can command time for a visit, unless you prefer to spend Sunday in New York, & go to Eagleswood

on Monday. In the way last men-
tioned you might have the time
from 8 a. m. Monday till 2 p.
m. Tuesday to ~~stay~~ spend there;
but if you do not leave Boston
before Monday, I see not how
you can make the visit at
all. They would prefer to have
you spend Sunday with them,
as that is the day not only for
hospitality, ^{but} for their religious
gathering, when they would be
glad to have you speak. Then,
if you desired so to do, you
could come back to New York
Monday morning, reaching the
city by 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ a. m., and stay till
next day at 4 or 6 p. m., which
would be in time to reach Phila.

Tuesday evening. Mattie Griffith
& sister are at Eagleswood now,
and many good people from
various places, who feel an
earnest desire to greet you.
You could come by boat or cars
Friday evening, & have ~~from~~ Satur-
day (till 2½ p. m.) to make ~~any~~
calls upon your friends here.
The boat for Eagleswood leaves
Saturday at 2½^{p. m.} and will
land you there (within a few
rods of Theodore Weld's door) at
3 p. m. Can you not do this?
I am sure you would find
the visit a very pleasant
one to yourself, and useful
for the cause. You would

meet a warm welcome from
the Welds and Springs, on whose
behalf I write.
