Treasury exhausted - end of January

Nearly 4 mos. remain to complete the
Official Year of the Standard - & of our Societies.

Not only the ordinary expenses of those
4 mos. (wh. cannot be paid lower than \$ 3000.)
are needed, but the additional cost of the paper,
at present prices, could not safely be estimated
much less than \$ 400. -

Some of our friends think the Antislavery work done,
and that nothing remains for us but to disband. -
Were it not for the high character & intelligence of those (very few)
persons who so believe, we should say, it was contradicted by
every fact, by every day's experience, ~~we do say that~~ & by the very anxiety
with wh. all look now to see whether the 1st of January will
really bring, or not, an effective enforcement of the President's
Proclamation of Sept. 22nd '62 contradicted such an idea. -

I will not presume to forecast any opinion as
decision of this Comt^s, but being placed by the Abolitionists
of Mass^{ts} in a position ~~which requires me~~ to know something of
the exigencies & perils of our cause, I must say that, ~~for~~
for myself, it would have all the characteristics of a Soldier's
desertion of his Post. When the great decisive Contest of the Thirty Years
War is about to be fought, for us to disband now, to close our
depositories, to stop the Society & organ the "Standard", I
desire to say, as a reward to the Society & the cause, that I
never saw the hour, when it was more imperative on us all,
upon every Abolitionist, upon every friend of the Slave,
upon every friend of his Country, to stand absolutely

firm - unyielding - abandoning no great
instrumentality. We must preserve our
Organization unbroken & perfect, our free
& well-known Standard conspicuous at its high
elevation, until we can not only imagine, or
by straining the sight into the ~~future~~ dimly
catch a glimpse of, a possible freedom - but
until Freedom - Emancipation - the Downfall
of Slavery - are Facts - recognized facts thru'
the world. Accomplished Facts, and the
Era of Absolute, Universal, Constitutional Liberty
has begun.

The necessity is laid upon us,

woe be to us, if we yield this post, or lay our
arms down, while the enemy is in the field. -

I hold, Ladies, that we cannot, must not
do this; and I am sure no one here will cease to
oppose Slavery, so long as Slavery is.

As to the best method of raising the means
which the Society now most urgently needs, and for
which it has been so largely indebted to your labors in
past, we all look to your counsel & action at this time with
the deepest interest.
