

Jan 9. 1837.

Monday evening.

I did up the enclosed letter, my dear & on Sat morning last, but was disappointed about Mr Bent's calling as I saw nothing of him. In the evening, so I meber in the afternoon Miss Paul came here & took a drawing lesson. The day of the Fair lawline agreed to give it to her. She appeared very well & I liked her. Sunday I did not go out all day. Lucia & Lucretia went to the Free Church where Mr Fitch preached. Sat evening whether was at Maria's. He seemed to think that the cause was going along famously. This morning she came in town in the stage. She brought us lots of goodies, & will stay I hope two or three wks. I had a letter from Aunt Mary, which spoke of them all as pretty well. She is going to Duxbury on Thursday next. Elizabeth goes to Weymouth Tues. As the day was quite pleasant I ventured out this morning. Mary Ann & I went to the Kidding school & I rode an hour, Mary Ann also. Maria told me to go a few times & she would pray for it, but I do not wish to rely on her, but hope, through my own wits somehow or other to get money enough to pay for my going a few times. I really felt better after it. Mrs Farwell was there. She was at first cold, but afterwards very civil.

We heard to day of Henry Benson's death. He died on Sat, I believe. His last moments were free from suffering & though he would have been very glad to have lived, he still shewed himself reconciled to dying. Mrs Garrison is in great trouble as any one would suppose. Garrison I believe bears it pretty well. It was trying to me, but when I come to think how soon we are all to go it troubles me less. - This morning long since received a letter from Mr Bang thanking her for a copy of Right & Wrong & stating that he very much admired it. To night Maria had a very civil letter from Daniel Webster acknowledging the receipt of her petitions. Mary Parker has got so weak as to be out of her room. Mr Bent called this afternoon & was very pleasant. I felt glad to see the little man but disappoointed that I could not go to N.B. for he asked me to, or was going to, if my deliverance of ill health had not prevented.

With regard to the N.B. petition ask Charlotte Taber to write a few lines to Webster & send on to me with the petition. I want her to write on account of the thees & thous, also I think it will be smart. Do not let her seal it for tell her I want to see it. Ask her too to write to me. Send it the very first chance.

New Years day the Chapmans made a present
of \$100 to Garrison & have received a beau-
tiful letter from him.
