

Brighton 23 Morning P.  
Thursday 5 P.M  
Oct 9<sup>th</sup> 1851

My dear Lou

I had a piping journey:  
on the platform stood Mr. Charlton.  
he cordially greeted me, & after a  
word or two about the weather, he  
spared, looked import ant, & told  
me, he had written something for  
the "Mercury" to explain himself  
as he was misunderstood: I ex-  
plained his proceeding, & then  
got into a double carriage, & seated  
myself in one compartment when  
no one was. Mr C. seeing me then,  
joined me. Our discourse was  
much to my concering: we talked

<sup>on all</sup> points, & I told him where he  
had blundered. But tho' amusing,  
the conversation was not interesting  
in my friend's view and a comprehen-  
sive mind, and is utterly ignorant  
about A.S. matters. But our  
union was not only friendly, (but  
is too cold a term,) it was down-  
right affectionate. He told me  
Mr. Eaton persuaded him to write  
his letter. When written & dubbing  
whether he ought to put in the  
book any thing so buried as H.C.  
without prof. he saw Eliza's sentiment  
so he put it at as an antidote!  
He is a weaker man than I thought  
he was. I regret having made myself  
nearer in talking to him. Still I

soon pitched upon, & showed me

the Americans were worse than
