

Tillipallie - District of Taffna. Ceylon Aug 1817

My dear Parent, Brothers & Sisters.

By the Brig Dryade in which I came to this country I sent you letter & an extract of my journal which I keep while on the passage. By the same conveyance I sent letters to several friends. & among the number was my worthy friend Mrs Miller of Kandy all of which I hope have been received. I have written over since to Mr. Abbott

I should have written often, but for these reasons. I have been in a moving & consequently in an unsettled state until within a short time, & there is no direct communication between this Island & America as no American ships touch here for trade, so that we are obliged to send all our letters by mail to the care of some friend at Calcutta or some other port on the continent that they may be put on board some American vessels. I have received a few letters from my American friends but none from my particular relations. It is now fifteen months since I left the shores of my beloved country, & I frequently notice the arrival of ships from different parts in Ceylon, at some of the ports in India, where I have been perusing the papers of this country. I am now looking with no little anxiety for the mail to bring me letters from some of my family.

I hope I shall not have long to wait. As cold water to a thirsty soul" so would news be to me from my friends.

My letters gave you some account of our very pleasant voyage & the favourable reception we received <sup>from</sup> our landing at Colombo 20th March. God was pleased to give us favour in the sight of strangers in this strange land. The people here especially the principal men in authority here, have showed us no little ~~friend~~ kindness.

They have expressed to us a strong desire that we would remain on the Island & teach to these ignorant & degraded natives the holy religion of our Divine & compassionate Saviour. O! that I could describe to you my feelings when comparing the wretched condition of these idolatrous people, with the highly favoured people of my native land. This is emphatically a land of darkness where no light is. While contrasting the state of the two countries I cannot forbear to exclaim - ban sinners, deserving of nothing but "indignation & wrath tribulation & anguish forever & ever," but yet enjoying a gospel which freely offers pardon & eternal life to them on the most consistent & advantageous terms - can such ~~reel~~ sinners lightly esteem such a gospel?

Can they refuse not to esteem it, as it is, indeed, good news - the astonishing exhibition of the wonderful love of God to his ingrateful & rebellious creatures - But then I recollect that multitudes there who do enjoy this gospel do neglect & despise it. But very few indeed, who are taught it in its greatest purity know experimentally its value, & drink in its heavenly spirit. How much more tolerable will it be for this hardened people with all their crimes in the day of judgment than for gospel hardened sinners however moral may have been their external conduct. I tremble for the careless sinners of my highly favoured Country when I see them negligent of gospel which offers to them pardon & eternal life, but they continue to

neglect till it be said of them - "The harvest is past the summer is ended & thin souls not saved. Against such these very heathens will rise up in the day of judgment & condemn them." -

"May this never be the awful condition of any one of our family - of our relations or our friends." - I have now arrived on missionary grounds, & commenced the work, to which I have for several years been looking forward. I bless God that he has seen fit to putt me into the Ministry, & to send me with the gospel of reconciliation to this land of pagan darkness. It is a work in which I am, altogether unworthy to be engaged. But since the great head of the Church has pleased to entrust his word in earthen vessels that the excellency of the power may be of God & not of us. I earnestly pray that it may be found faithful - ever remembering from whence all my sufficiency & success must come - And I ask you my Parent, brother & sister to remember me in your prayers. You know how much I need your prayers in this arduous & difficult work.

In view of the solemn responsibility of the station in which I am placed, & the utter insufficiency of all human means of themselves to turn a single idolater from the worship of his idols to the service & love of the only living & true God. I am led to exclaim. Who is sufficient for these things? But then I am animated with the thought that the cause is the Lord's. He is engaged to carry it on - It is his will to give to his Son the heathen for his inheritance, & when he sees it to be best, he will make his word like the fire & the hammer to break in pieces the flinty rock & cause even then superstitious heathen to bow in sweet subjection to the obedience of Christ. When my heart is rightly affected with this subject I find it pleasant to sow the seeds of the word & leave it with the great Lord of the harvest to send the early & latter rains till it spring up & bring forth fruit even in this barren desert.

It is now about three months since I came with Mr & Mrs Poor to reside at this place. Ever since we came we have been preaching to those people who would come to hear us, in our own house, & those around us who will not come to hear we go to their houses & tell them about the religion of our compassionate Saviour & urge them to believe in him & that their sins may be pardoned. We preach & talk to his people as yet wholly by an interpreter & when we have no interpreter with us we are almost as拙拙 men before them - The country around us is very thickly inhabited - If we call at any house & spend half an hour it is very common to have forty forty to sixty & sometimes more collect to see us. The people are very willing to us & listen attentively to what we say, but we find them very ignorant & much attached to their heathenish religion, & I suspect that our conversation & preaching as yet has produced very few if any lasting impressions upon their minds of most of them - But the residue of the Spirit is with him who will in his own time bring even this degraded people to a saving knowledge of his truth as it is in Jesus.
