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Would you kindly oblige

Ladies Emancipation Society - bodies which
will
surely be able to appreciate Mr. Craft's services
to the common cause. I do not know his
present residence or I would send it to
him direct. Pray present my kindest
remembrances to him. I am sure that
wherever he goes he will carry with him
sunshine and prosperity.

You see that "The Morning Star"
has been suddenly extinguished. The
simple explanation is that, owing to the
great competition, more capital was needed;
and this, owing to the bad state of trade
in Lancashire, was not forthcoming. My

connection with this journal has dated
from the beginning - thirteen years and
a half ago; and two articles from my
pen appeared in the last number. You
may therefore imagine what regrets I
feel at the extinction of a liberal
organ with whose fortunes and opinions
I have been so closely identified.
