

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
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What are you planning to do in the summer?




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What are your favorite places to hang out in Lexington?


How long do you average on a computer everyday? What do you do on it?


In the wide world of sports, there is a difference between a memorable season

The Lexington girls' volleyball season, by the above definition, was a memorable one. A 10-8 record, state tourney berth, and three senior Middlesex League All-Stars – Meaghan Murphy, Emily Wiederhold, and Dominique Serio – all vouch for this conclusion.

Yet the 2009 season was so much more than that. The girls created a legacy – a lasting change in the athletic world independent from winning and losing. Although achievements on the court were in no short supply, they paled in comparison to one event. We all heard about it; its story touched the hearts of thousands statewide, and

filled the gym to capacity one powerful Friday night: The Volley for Molly. The charity event, inspired by Molly Eisenberg, a recent LHS graduate diagnosed with ovarian cancer, was later recognized by the M. Patricia Cronin Foundation with the Ovarian Cancer Awareness Award. Lexington also received the Division 1 Sportsmanship Award, which has since been renamed the Molly E. Eisenberg Sportsmanship Award. "Volleyball teaches you a lot about life," Molly once said. And she was right: focus, selflessness, and teamwork lay the sport's foundation. Most of all, however, volleyball is about never giving up, regardless of the odds. Molly is a testament to that.

Lowen, and Hannah Rosen all worked together to plan team dinners, spirit days, and the traditional end of the season banquet.









The cross country season could only be described as a runaway train. Slow to start at first, it gradually picked up speed - gaining momentum, gaining confidence - until nothing could stop it.

With a gaping pair of holes left by two departed 2008 all-stars and a slew of injuries that left half the varsity team sidelined one week before the regular season began, the Minutemen appeared vulnerable in the early weeks of September. And, to their misfortune, it was the Reading Rockets, 2008 league champions and Lexington's heated rival, which would step in the way of a staggering Minuteman squad.

Fighting tooth and nail, the Minutemen and the Rockets swapped finisher for finisher, blow-for-blow. The end result was devastating: Reading 27, Lexington 28. The gold and blue had lost by one measly point.

Facing little opposition, the Minutemen walked on and over the rest of the league en route to a respectable 8-1 record, on the backs of what would become an incredibly deep lineup.

Lexington's eight-meet winning streak was only the beginning of the league's woes. In the culminating League Meet, a fiercely determined Minuteman squad took vengeance on the Rockets, claiming the League Trophy - and not a small amount of redemption.

With the regular season over, thoughts turned to the postseason: with solid representation at the prestigious Brown Invitational in late October, the Minutemen had for the second year in a row assumed their spot in the state's Top Twenty, at number eleven.

By now, however, eleventh wasn't good enough. The Minutemen had become nothing less than unstoppable, and thus tore through the competition once more with a fifth-place finish at the Eastern Massachusetts Division 1 Meet in Boston. Lexington's top-5 performance allowed them to reach a goal greater than any win over Reading or league title: an appearance in the All-State Meet, the first time for the Minutemen in five years.





WITH A LARGELY underclassman lineup, the 2009-10 boys hockey season required a fair amount of learning on the job. As such, the Minutemen were something of a sleeper team through the first half of the regular season, claiming only two wins through their first eight games. However, as its players gained experience and as its confidence and team chemistry rose steadily together, Lexington miraculously put its slow start behind. The team proceeded to win six of its last nine games to finish fifth in the Middlesex League with a winning record and qualify for the state tournament.

Senior captains Craig Wood and Charlie Guthrie paced Lexington's offense, and were supported by assistant captains Gene Arciprete, Matt Wentzell, and Greg Cuoco. Coach John Coughlin stuck through the good times and

the bad with his Minutemen, and as a testament to his continued encouragement and his team's incessant desire to win, the home team claimed a thrilling 2-1 victory over league rival and state powerhouse Winchester late in the season – all on the heels of an 8-1 loss to the Sachems only a month earlier.

The Minutemen wrapped up their regular season with dominating performances over non-league competitors St. Bernard's and Dracut before falling 3-1 to Billerica, one of the top teams in Massachusetts.






















How does being in an academic club help you get ahead in science/math class?



interests.











comfortable with yourself and the people around you, but that's not the only way to make a good improv scene."

REMEMBER THE CLASSIC MATH TEAM POSTER? Sociologists, biologists, chemists, and physicists lined up side by side with a mathematician on the farthest right. The mathematician implies that without his discipline, none of the others could exist. Math is hardcore.

Yet amidst bleak tests and proof after proof, glimmers of some of the best moments of the year can be discovered. This year, "some Honors Geometry kid threw another kid's backpack out of the window," said Kevin Lai, recollecting some of the more hectic moments. Whether the backpack was thrown during a meltdown or for sheer hilarity shall remain a secret. Even the lectures themselves contained the occasional fascinating topic. "I think imaginary numbers are fun to work with because they're easy and it's a cool concept. They are abstract without being complicated," said Kiran Mani.

Science is as difficult, especially when it relies on abstract thinking. "Understanding difficult concepts in one of the most conceptual classes is challenging, and then at the same time you also have to apply them in labs," said Kaustubh Garimella. 
runway," Devon Buczkowski said, recalling instances when spontaneous jokes spiced up lectures.








Can you describe a memorable teacher you had?



Testing was a source of anxiety for many. Fortunately, they were well-prepared as a result of their extra studying.




















EVERYTHING FROM anatomy to triangles was covered in the sophomore curriculum. From geometry and biology to world history and English, sophomores had it all.



The first day was also the



























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Happy 85th Birthday!
The Lexington High yearbook finally has a name:
The Revolution.

It not only reflects this year's theme but reinforces the independent spirit of our school. Editors-in-Chief Anne Mok Nikita Nadkarni Sonia Weiser

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Revolution is the 2009-2010 Lexington High School yearbook of Lexington, Massachusetts. It is the school's 85th volume and sixth full-color yearbook.

This book contains 275 pages of 100-lb Bordeaux paper submitted electronically via electronic proof through Herff Jones representative Mr. John Carrier. Publisher Herff Jones printed 750 copies of the book at their Gettysburg plant in Pennsylvania. The cover, end sheets, and the design elements were created using Adobe InDesign CS.

The cover was printed using a four-color process on permocote base with a matte lamination and a custom foil die. The original design was by Nikita Nadkarni. End sheets were printed using Vibracolor chamois. Every page of color was made using a lithographic four-color process. Staff members Anne Mok and Sonia Weiser attended the Columbia Scholastic Press Association Conference in New York City in June 2009 to learn design techniques. Briana Lee, Jessica Wan, Aileen Haque and Michaela Schtilman-Minkin participated in the Yearbook New England workshop. The 2009-2010 theme of "Revolution" was conceived at the editor in chief meeting during the summer of 2009. It was further developed by editors and staff at the beginning of the school year.

Staff members used Adobe InDesign CS and Adobe Photoshop CS on three Apple eMac computers, two Apple iMac computers, and one iMacG5. Yearbook staff members took the majority of the candid photographs. Senior, underclass and sports pictures as well as some activities pictures were taken by Burlington Studios of Burlington, Massachusetts.

Modoono Photographers took additional sports photographs. Yearbook staff members used the staffs' Sony DSC-W50 and Canon PowerShot SD1000 along with various student-owned digital cameras.

Headlines were in Minion Pro size 72pt. Subtitles were Myriad Pro size 36pt. All body copy was Adobe Garamond Pro size 12pt. Captions were Myriad Pro size 10pt. Caption headers Myriad Pro Semi Bold 10pt.

The LHS Yearbook is a member of the Columbia Scholastic Press Association (CSPA), the New England Scholastic Press Association (NESPA), the American Scholastic Press Association (ASPA), and the Quill and Scroll Society. The 2009 yearbook *color outside the lines* received a silver medal from the CSPA and earned a first place from the ASPA contest.
