



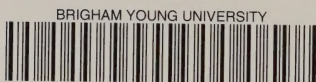

## PREFACE

THIS catalogue is an attempt at giving a list, with some bibliographical details, of a portion of the library of Mr. Edmund Gosse. As Mr. Gosse explains in his introductory essay, the collection of his library has taken over fifty years. It is in every sense a working library, for almost every book contained therein, with the exception of such as have been given to Mr. Gosse, has been acquired because it is a book to be read and used by an historian of letters and not for the sole reason that it is rare. Each book has been chosen for its place in literature; and the advanced market-value of many of the books, picked up by Mr. Gosse many years ago for a mere song, only helps to prove, what is occasionally forgotten, that the monetary value of a book depends largely upon its place in literature.

Mr. Gosse's library is so large that I have found it impossible to include all the items in one volume. Owing to considerations of space, no mention can be made of his remarkable collection of the first editions, many of them presentation copies, of French and Dutch authors: nor has there been room to include more than one work of many recent authors mentioned in this catalogue, while in almost every case, standard editions such as Professor Saintsbury's "Dryden" and Mr. Montague Summers's "Aphara Behn," have been omitted for the same reason.

The actual bibliography may appear meagre compared with that of such monumental catalogues as Mr. Wise's "Ashley Library," but this has been adopted with deliberate intent, partly to keep this list within the compass of a single volume, and partly from the fact that this is primarily a catalogue of books and not a bibliography. One of the main charms in Mr. Gosse's library is the example which it holds

out of what may be achieved during many years' careful collecting.

As far as possible the question of edition has been worked out; and, unless definitely stated to the contrary, all the items are first editions, but the debated question of issues has often been left in abeyance. Owing to the length of time in which books were kept in the press during the sixteenth, seventeenth, and eighteenth centuries, and the alterations which were continually taking place, variations in the issues were continuous. Most of the differences are so trifling and so many arguments can be brought to bear on each and every point of view that the question of the issue of a book seems to be of slight importance in a catalogue of this kind.

In collating I have used the sheet signatures invariably, as being the most direct method of finding out whether a book is complete or not. As well as being a more concise method of collation, we are liable to meet with fewer errors in the signatures than in the pagination. In using this simple method I have even gone so far as to leave out all mention of the epilogue, or other matter, if it is on the verso of a leaf. The leaf is mentioned as carrying material on its recto with the obvious corollary that what is on the verso is also present. If, on the other hand, the epilogue, or other matter, begins on the verso of a leaf and is carried on to the next leaf, this is always mentioned. No collations have been attempted of books published later than 1800.

The size of a book is always a difficult point in modern bibliography. Within the last few years some kind of a standard of measurement has been applied to the size of the sheets used, but prior to the nineteenth century every paper-maker manufactured his paper according to his own fancy. Except in the obvious cases where a quarto book has been printed in half sheets or a specially large sheet has been used so that a book of folio size has been printed in fours or sixes, I have merely called a book folio, 4to, 8vo, or 12mo, according to the signatures. This has not been done with the idea of giving even an approximate size, but only to help the reader in collation should this book be used for comparison.



I should like to express my debt of gratitude to Mr. Wise. He has always been ready to give the soundest advice, and his wonderful catalogue has been invaluable as a work of reference. But, above all, must I thank Mr. Gosse. He has always been at hand to help, and the immense storehouse of his knowledge has always been at my disposal. Those days which I have spent with him and among his books have been amongst the pleasantest I have ever passed.

## AN ESSAY IN APOLOGY

WE have recently been told that a catalogue of books must be purely bibliographical, and must not wander outside the limits of that science. That may be true in the case of other libraries, more serious and more significant than mine, but if I am not permitted to stray into the seductive meadows of reminiscence, it were better that Mr. Euan Cox, as the historian of my books, should never have been born. I have not been a cold-blooded collector; I have been a bibliophil, but never in the least a bibliomaniac. There is a class of book-buyers who multiply editions of the same book without regard to the text; who possess more separate Bibles than there are chapters in Holy Writ; who pounce upon every volume in which the name of Shakespeare is mentioned. I regard these collectors with wonder and respect, as I regard those who lay up for themselves treasures in the postage-stamps of all nations. Their aim is definite, and perfectly harmless, but I cannot include it in the province of bibliophily. It seems to me deliberate and cold-blooded; it is a game, and might be played with glass balls or counters as conveniently as with volumes. The man who indulges in it has no stability, and we may see him at a moment's notice break away to the collecting of orchids or of pen-wipers.

To the bibliomaniac, then, I offer no apology, but to the genuine bibliographer some explanation is due. The appeal of this book, which Mr. Cox has constructed so skilfully and so patiently, is not to the scientific student. The exact aspect has never been neglected; indeed, it seems to my modesty that it has sometimes been unduly emphasised—unduly, that is, in proportion to what I saw in my poor regiment, until Mr. Cox flashed his electric light across them. But what is especially to be noted here, if the indulgent reader in this crowded age can find time to note anything, is the biographical rather than

the bibliographical element. In this catalogue I find my own life revealed, or at least suggested. Each entry is a confession; between the covers of each of these specimens there lurks an anecdote half-concealed. It takes a lifetime to form a library, and mine remains pitifully unfinished after more than half a century of collecting; but is not life unfinished too?

Ainsi font font font  
 Les petites marionnettes,—

The marionettes in one box, and the books in the other; while a new set starts a new dance. Alas, alas! But a truce to these melancholy reflections.

Let me defend the autobiographical nature of this catalogue against those who demand the severity and rigour of bibliography. My little "closet" of books is none of those magnificent collections which thrill America from New York to Texas and on to California. It does not compete with the British Museum nor with the Ashley Library. But I dare to claim for it that it is extremely *personal*. It represents the tastes, the habits, the limitations, and the requirements of the owner. It is the accretion of more than half a century of effort originally directed not towards the creation of a library but towards the furniture of a mind. I have collected books not, in the main, because they were rare or curious, but because I wanted to read them at my leisure, and to have them at my side for reference. Other considerations have intervened. There has grown up a certain pride in seeing that these companions and helpers were in wholesome condition, and clothed in appropriate garments. I have come to take a pride in their "state" and a care for their pedigree. In short, the voracious reader has almost unconsciously developed into a collector, yet without ever ceasing to be essentially a reader. I have never added books to my shelves for purposes of mere ornament of binding or peculiarity of imprint, although I admit these objects to be legitimate. They do not happen to appeal to me. On the other hand, my books have never been so numerous as to make it difficult to refer to

them all upon occasion, and there is, I think, not one with which I am not on easy terms.

If I may be forgiven for the fatuity of speaking of my own childhood, I will begin at the beginning by telling my indulgent reader that my bibliophily was discerned in the age of bib and tucker, since it has been handed down that, refraining until rather late from such elements of speech as "Mama" and "gee-gee," the earliest word I was known to utter was "book," laying my hand upon a specimen to show what I meant. I had the odd fortune, at my start in life, to be appointed a transcriber or copying clerk in the Department of Printed Books in the British Museum. Fifty-seven years ago, this was not the admirably equipped and neatly disciplined institution which students know and value to-day. Great laxity prevailed among the assistants and librarians, whose standard of accuracy was low, and their zeal that of the Church of Laodicea. If attempts were made to stir these drones, the reply was obvious that they were so meanly paid and so villainously housed that neither activity nor assiduity could be expected from them. Into this dull hive I was thrust, a young bee as idle as the best of them; I have nothing to say here of the queer, even grotesque conditions of life in that mysterious fortress or cage of steel and leather in which my days were spent. But one advantage, unforeseen by those who appointed and those who neglected me, pursued my official indolence.

When the very small amount of work demanded from the slaves, by slave-drivers even lazier than themselves, had been performed, we transcribers in the Printed Book Department enjoyed an almost unlimited leisure. Cricket was not unpractised in remoter galleries; less audacious spirits cultivated the pencil or the jew's-harp. My own diversion was reading, ceaseless devouring of the printed page. I believe that the Library is nowadays—I am sure very properly—closed to youths of seventeen or eighteen, but there was no one then to check me or say me nay. Through the long silent afternoons, immersed in the curious odour of slowly decaying calf-skin, I would stand in the upper gallery of the King's Library or

among the Garrick Plays, absorbing with ceaseless appetite the obscurer parts of seventeenth-century literature. Treasures of the most unique description were open to the air in those easy days. Such recognised rarities as were already put under glass and locked up were scarcely less open to access, since, although we were strictly forbidden to touch the keys, I knew where they were kept and used them without scruple. What a world of wonder was unveiled to me in those long hours, when, if a bookworm had been there, I could have started at his cock-crow, and where not a footfall broke the velvet silence! There I read the poets and playwrights who were as yet entirely inedited; there, in the dim quartos—many of them a good deal cut down as I regretfully remember—I made such friends as Peele and Vaughan and Cartwright, and such life-long acquaintances as Cyril Tourneur.

During these early years I lacked not merely the money but even the inclination to collect a library. With the ancient world open to me in the Department of Printed Books, and with a subscription to the modern world at Mr. Mudie's, I might have gone through life without a volume in my possession. But when, in 1875, I ceased to belong to the British Museum, and opened for the first time a modest home of my own, all this was changed, and a new appetite was created. I forget what French bibliophil it is who says, "Studying at public libraries is like staying at an inn." This is true, and books are not entirely valued or intimately loved unless they are ranged about us as we sit at home.

With my extremely small resources, the buying of expensive volumes was out of the question, but there was a field open to me fifty years ago which is closed to the poor student to-day. I was particularly led to make an examination of what are called Restoration Plays—that is to say, of the English dramatic literature produced between 1660 and 1700. That span of forty years was remarkably rich in a drama that in Victorian times had scarcely been explored, and that lay under the ban of those who exalted the Elizabethan and Jacobean ages inordinately. The Restoration was supposed to be uniformly lacking in decency and merit. The dramatists were for the

most part inedited, and to refer to their text it was needful to procure original or contemporary editions, which were almost without exception in the form of quarto pamphlets. The earliest play I bought, and the beginning of my collection, was a clean tall copy of Southerne's "The Loyal Brother," of 1682. The prologue and epilogue, though there is nothing to show it, were written by Dryden for this, Southerne's earliest publication. I remember that I had to pay the bookseller half a crown, which I thought extortionate.

Some time elapsed before I began to make a persistent search for plays in the shops of the second-hand booksellers. I think I was really started on my enterprise by going casually into a shop in Soho, where I remarked, with the hunter's excitement, that the counter was heaped with quarto plays of the seventeenth century. I felt like the African traveller who suddenly comes upon a water-hole surrounded by all the beasts of the wilderness drinking together in unity. The explanation of the phenomenon was that the bookseller—I forget his name—had just bought *en bloc* the library of a Mr. John Kershaw, who had, apparently, indulged a particular fancy for plays. These had been suddenly delivered to the purchaser, who must have bought them like a pig in a poke, for he seemed to know nothing of their relative value, and was only anxious to get rid of them for a percentage of profit. There were treasures lying in that ignominious heap, and if I had only had in my pocket what a single one of some of those plays would fetch to-day, I might have gone off laden with spoil. There were things lying there which, in all the fifty years since, I have never cast eyes upon again. I emptied my poor purse, however, to its uttermost penny, and I carried away a goodly parcel, containing, amongst other jewels, the earliest 1664 issue of Sir George Etheredge's "The Comical Revenge; or Love in a Tub," of which (I believe) no other copy had at that time been met with. The importance of this play in the history of English drama gave interest to the discovery of its date, which had hitherto been placed in 1668.

With gratitude I recall the kindness of the various book-

sellers whose premises I haunted; most of them endured with indulgent patience the rummaging of their top-shelves by an unprofitable lad. I recall in particular Mr. Wilson of Great Russell Street, where my very earliest investigations were made. His was a stern, grim figure, calculated to alarm more than to seduce the would-be purchaser, yet he was very affable to me. I remember that Mr. Wilson gave me a piece of advice, at which the book-buyers of the present day will smile. Entering into my passion for plays, he said, "Those Restoration dramas of yours will never have the slightest value, but you keep your eye on Massinger and Ford. You may think it extravagant, but I recommend you not to grudge ten shilling apiece for a really fine copy of a first edition of them, or of Shirley or any other of those chaps. They may not be worth it now, but they will be one of these days." This was to me indeed a counsel of perfection, since half a crown was long my limit to outlay; still I did now and then make a plunge not quite so daring as Mr. Wilson's, and brought up a Shirley or a Chapman. My own particular Restoration plays were everywhere abundant enough. Indeed, the volumes of them, bound together in contemporary calf, had been in mid-Victorian times a drug in the book-market. I think it was Mr. Salkeld who told me that he had made a bonfire of Restoration plays, because they took up so much room, and because not a soul ever bought one. It was the gifts of the Tarquins over again; they began to be desired when they began to be difficult to find.

The name of Salkeld has escaped my pen. It should have come a little later, for I did not find that remarkable bower of dust and beauty, his shop in Red Lion Square, until about 1876. I was taken there by my earliest master in the science of bibliography, the poet John Leicester Warren, long afterwards the third Lord Tabley. He was a book-man without guile, and it was first from him that I learned what book-collecting involved. Warren would think nothing of hanging about Red Lion Square at six in the morning, waiting for Salkeld to take down his shutters. In Warren I first observed the passion of the genuine bibliophil, and I imbibed from him



the true spirit of the game. I have seen him physically faint with joy at securing an "Alastor" of 1816, and tears spring to his eyes at the unexpected arrival of a Milton's "Poems" of 1645. In one of his own poems he celebrates the charms of Red Lion Square and of

SALKELD, solace once of book-men,  
Now beyond all cabs and ken,  
Far removed in realms transpontine,  
Who shall find his haunts again?

Who, indeed! and where are the roses of yesteryear?

The premises of Mr. Salkeld were extensive, upstairs and downstairs, and they were lumbered beyond the dreams of the most untidy of bookworms. With great difficulty the visitor penetrated between tables heaped with miscellaneous literature and shelves which bulged with volumes two or three deep. An inner parlour was the haunt of the bibliopole himself, who had cleared one chair and the corner of one table for his practical requirements. Elsewhere chaos reigned, but Mr. Salkeld's memory was wonderful. He would point to a tottering tower of books and say, "Somewhere at the back of that there's a Giles Fletcher if you want to see it. Got no half-title, though!" Upstairs even the memory of Mr. Salkeld was at fault. Here there was no order, no tables, only piles of books on broken kitchen chairs; and hanging from the ceiling a large open cage of doves. Mr. Salkeld soon gave me his confidence, and I was allowed to rout at my own free will in the upper rooms. But the doves were a trial. Bored with their long seclusion, they used to leave their cage to greet the visitor. In those days the humblest of us wore a silk hat on all occasions. Just as one was stooping to detach a folio from its heap, a dove would make a sudden swoop, and skate wildly on one's hat, which would presently skip off into a corner carrying the hysterical bird upon its rim. Despite the doves and the dirt, many a precious item have I excavated in the garrets at Red Lion Square. There are no such treasure-heaps left unsearched to-day in the sophisticated shops of Soho.

It was Leicester Warren who initiated me into the mystery

of *ex libris*, in which I must confess I have never really been an adept. In the days of which I speak, no handbook to book-plates existed in the English language. Like the vicar's wife who obtained the reputation of a traveller because she *talked* of visiting Italy, a Mr. Daniel Parsons was considered the main authority on book-plates because, in 1851, he "announced his intention" of writing a book about them. This "intention" he abandoned. There had been book-plates in use in England since before the reign of Queen Anne, and of late enthusiasts had begun to collect them, but there was no guide to them in existence. Leicester Warren, who had long dallied with the theme, was its pioneer in his volume published, at last, in 1880. Since his day the multiplication of studies of *ex-libris* has been excessive, but his "Guide to the Study of Book Plates" remains the classic.

Leicester Warren was accustomed to urge upon me the importance of having a book-plate of my own. I was not eager for it, but in 1883 our ingenious friend, Edwin Abbey, undertook to make designs for Austin Dobson's books and for mine. Each of his drawings was charming; mine represented a cavalier of the period of Charles I., in lovely garments, walking in the open air and holding a manuscript in front of him. The sun, an enormous luminary, is blazing at his back, and the motto is "Gravis cantantibus umbra"; why I chose this, and where I found it, are details which have escaped me, but I imagine it meant that poets carry no sunshades.

This spirited and picturesque design was very successfully engraved, and I began to paste it in the more precious of my books. This labour, however, I found distasteful, and the dampness produced a tendency to cockling of the fly-leaves. What, however, really made me desist was the senseless rage of collectors of *ex-libris*. That I possessed a book-plate designed by so celebrated an artist as Edwin Abbey induced complete strangers to ask me to give them specimens of it. Many would actually enclose their own "in exchange." This filled me with what I still consider a just anger. I had no sort of use for the book-plates of these volunteers, which found their way to the wastepaper basket; and as to giving my own

to a stranger, that would have been to stultify the whole proceeding. One's book-plate is, or should remain, a jealously guarded personal possession. Once separate the book-plate from the book of its owner and its whole significance is gone. The only reason for using a book-plate is to issue a final claim to property in the book. I am afraid that some collectors of *ex-libris*, especially in America, thought me coarse when I replied that I would no more send away my book-plates than I would my flannel waistcoats; both were individual possessions with which no stranger should meddle. What finally prejudiced me, however, against the hoarders of other people's book-plates was the discovery that there are fiends in human shape who take a book and remove its plate with steam, in order to place it in their ridiculous "collection." My amusing friend, Lady Dorothy Nevill, preserved her library by pasting in each volume the plain legend: "This book has been stolen from Lady Dorothy Nevill." This was drastic, but practical.

My feeling about bindings is very different. The theory that a jewel deserves a jewel-case is one which I share, I suppose, with every genuine lover of books. No one would enjoy more than I should to contemplate on my shelves a Montaigne printed by Abel Langelier and bound with the arms of the Count d'Hoym, but really to revel in this kind of bibliophily it is needful to be wealthy and a Frenchman. Bindings have been a consolation to many a public man who found that the world was out of joint. It is said that whenever Jules Janin had made a more than usually egregious blunder in his weekly article, and had been ridiculed in consequence—when, for instance, he had described the lobster as the Cardinal of the Seas, or Smyrna as one of the Greek islands—he would rush upstairs and fondle his first editions bound in crushed levant by Capé or Bauzonnet. They never failed to soothe him. But an affecting and chronic want of pounds has always precluded me from purchasing such white elephants. I have been obliged to confine myself to encasing particular favourites in the sobriety of plain morocco, by Bedford sometimes, by Riviere or De Coverly as a rule; while,

since the war, the enormous rise in prices has deprived me of even this chaste indulgence. I comfort myself by thinking that in most cases nothing is so completely satisfactory as the well-preserved original covers in which the volume first saw the light. What can be more delightful than Keats or Landor in the implicit simplicity of plain covers with paper labels? To preserve these intact, Mr. Bain has made me cloth boxes, sometimes lined with thin flannel, and lettered outside to look like volumes. Thus ensconced, the book defies not merely dust and exposure, but the wear and tear of circulation.

The importance of my collection is not to be insisted upon. Mine is essentially the workshop and playground of a man of letters. These books have been my tools and are still my companions. He who turns Mr. Cox's pages will be able to judge for himself how I collected them and why. There are no Shakespeare quartos here nor vellum Hours printed at the Unicorn. Curiosities, I hope, a few, but no real rarities in the heroic sense, will be discovered among the ensuing entries. Nor could La Bruyère—as he so rudely does of some collectors in his essay *De la Mode*—complain of me that my room stinks like a tannery with the richness of my stamped leathers. There are good books here, and uncommon books, but it may be that you must love them, as I have done, e'er to you they seem books worthy to be loved.

The exiguity of my purse was long my misery, but I have come to look upon it as my consolation also. Boethius, surely, did not live in vain. There is a pleasure incident to the collector even in his poverty. Many years ago there was to be sold a little eighteenth-century treasure which I had long desired, and it seemed going at a quiet auction. But, alas! the Exxl of Rxxxxxy had heard of it, and I fell before him, like a reed, at my first bid. I try to support the blows of life with fortitude, but I confess that on this occasion I dropped a tear on the shoulder of the most judicious of bibliopoles, now long departed. "He gets everything," I moaned; "he was born to get everything." "No," replied Mr. B., "not everything. He has not, and never will have, the exquisite pleasure of buying what he knows he cannot afford."

Of my seventeenth-century and eighteenth-century possessions enough is said in the ensuing pages. But a section of my library of even more special interest is the record of what is nowadays called "association." In selecting books of the present and immediate past, Mr. Cox has been guided not so much by the rarity of the issue as by the fact of its enshrining some personal and individual memory. In the latter case danger from fire, which hangs forever like a menace over the imagination of the collector, is greatly intensified. If a first edition of Walton or Pascal is destroyed, the loss is very serious, but it is not irreparable. Money might restore what is gone. But if a great dead poet has written your name and his in a volume, if he has made a relic for you by some expression of feeling or by some improvised jest, and if that is destroyed, no Bonanza King, with millions in his bank, can restore the treasure.

My recent books are largely records of friendships which are the most sacred memories of my life, and which the passage of years can but continue to sanctify with accessions of vain regret. When ambition sinks to a close, and we are left with so many presumptuous hopes unrealised, so little done of all we gaily started out to do, I am not sure that much will be more consoling than to have at hand the proof that those who passed us in the race regarded us, while the race was being run, with esteem, and sometimes with affection. If I have taken the egotistic step of allowing this catalogue to be published, it is most of all that it may preserve, against the possibility of extinction, these precious memorials of friendship. At least my children shall discover that I have possessed the confidence of men and women whose praise is better than rubies—yes, and better than all the manuscripts in the Vatican.

I have found a copy of the verses sent to Hone in the Half Hours with the Worst Authors, with a note by FitzGerald in*

*which he says they were sent by Lamb to the Athenaeum. He must have forgotten all about them."*

Watson telegraphed that either Beardsley must withdraw, or he should. The cancelled list of Contents, and his own poem, were given me by Watson. E. G., Jan 1896."*

Mr. Harland has added below :

*"This is, so far as I know, the only copy of this suppressed Yellow Book in existence. H. Harland. Jan. 1896."*
