





LIGHTS! Places! Curtain! Action! These are but few of the words which come from Lincoln's worthy dramatic instructor, Vesper Price. The appreciation of great dramatic work and love of the stage are but few of the aims of all the students who study drama in Lincoln high school. One of the foremost purposes of the dramatic department is to give a stage production successfully and to give to those who attend the performances a greater conception and a broader appreciation of worthwhile drama.

A great addition towards upholding the standards of the department is the wonderfully equipped stage and the beautiful auditorium. The public address system which is being bought for the purpose of enabling the public to hear the presentation more clearly, is also a great asset.

This semester has seen two outstanding plays produced under the careful direction of Miss Price. "Anne of Green Gables" being the first, and "The Patsy," the last play of the year.

Miss Price also has charge of the speech department. In this department the fundamentals for which the students strive



are, at the end of the year, to have clear enunciation and to be able to speak more distinctly. Another aim is to eradicate handicaps which might prevent students from speaking in public effectively. A great advantage of the public address system is its usefulness in the speech class. Each student is given an opportunity to speak over the "mike," and also to give talks from the stage. This is a great help in developing one's ability in speech.

With the splendid assistance and work of Miss Price, both the dramatic and speech departments of Lincoln high are making rapid progress. This persistent and constant striving is very essential in making the department perfect in all ways.

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PATIENCE and untiring effort built the foundation for the successful and talented services rendered to Lincoln high



during the last year, by the art department. With the aid and capable supervision of Miss Lewis, senior art instructor, the department has been a great factor in promoting school drives and stage productions, as well as gaining national recognition through contests held for student competition.

Working in co-operation with the dramatics department and costume committee, the art students have helped create effective stage settings and costumes, not to mention colorful publicity and neat program cover designs.

As a new art project a committee composed of Barbara Cox, Ralph Figg, Elizabeth Fillingham, and Mary Woodman, last fall undertook the planning and construction of the Abraham Lincoln Mural.

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MUSIC DEPARTMENT RATES HIGH

Way back in 1930 when the music department had less than one-fourth its present enrollment, Frederick E. Engel started the long and difficult task of building up an outstanding set of music organizations. Since that time many "crack" outfits have been turned out. This year the band has had sixtynine members, the chorus seventy-five, and the orchestra fifty-five.

Important along its rise, the department has organized the Music Parents' Club, which has engineered the purchase of many instruments, of new band uniforms, and just last year, choir robes.

With perfection as the standard, many graduates have spent pleasant years of work—but really worked—in the music department. The band, both in organization and in discipline, is semi-military. The officers, elected by the band members, are required to execute certain duties. These officers are also given authority and must accept responsibility and those who have had this excellent training feel it invaluable.

The band has entered contests in the past and placed third division in both concert and marching band classes at the National Contest in 1934. However, Des Moines high school music organizations have not been allowed in contests since 1934. This includes, besides bands, choruses and orchestras. Though neither of the latter organizations have participated in contests, they have turned in many creditable performances.

Lincoln high is unique in that it has been the only high school in the city to establish an annual opera as a "tradition." Since the beginning of this custom, starting with the opera "Martha" in the fall of 1935, the department has excellently rendered "The Chimes of Normandy" in 1937 and "The Mikado" in

The annual concert in which the band, orchestra, and choruses take part, presented guest conductors such as: Karl L. King and Prof. Stanford Hulshizer in the year 1937, and Tolbert MacRae, head of department of music at Iowa State college, and Clate Chenette, director of Ames Municipal Band, in 1938.

Besides having several fine groups in the department, there are many excellent soloists. These soloists received high rankings in contests this year; sixteen superior ratings having been won in the subdistrict contest, and three in the district competition.
