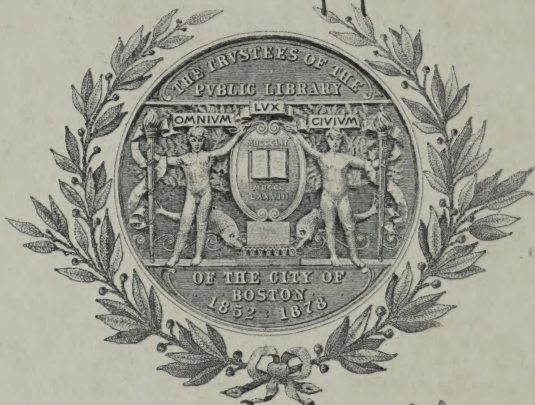
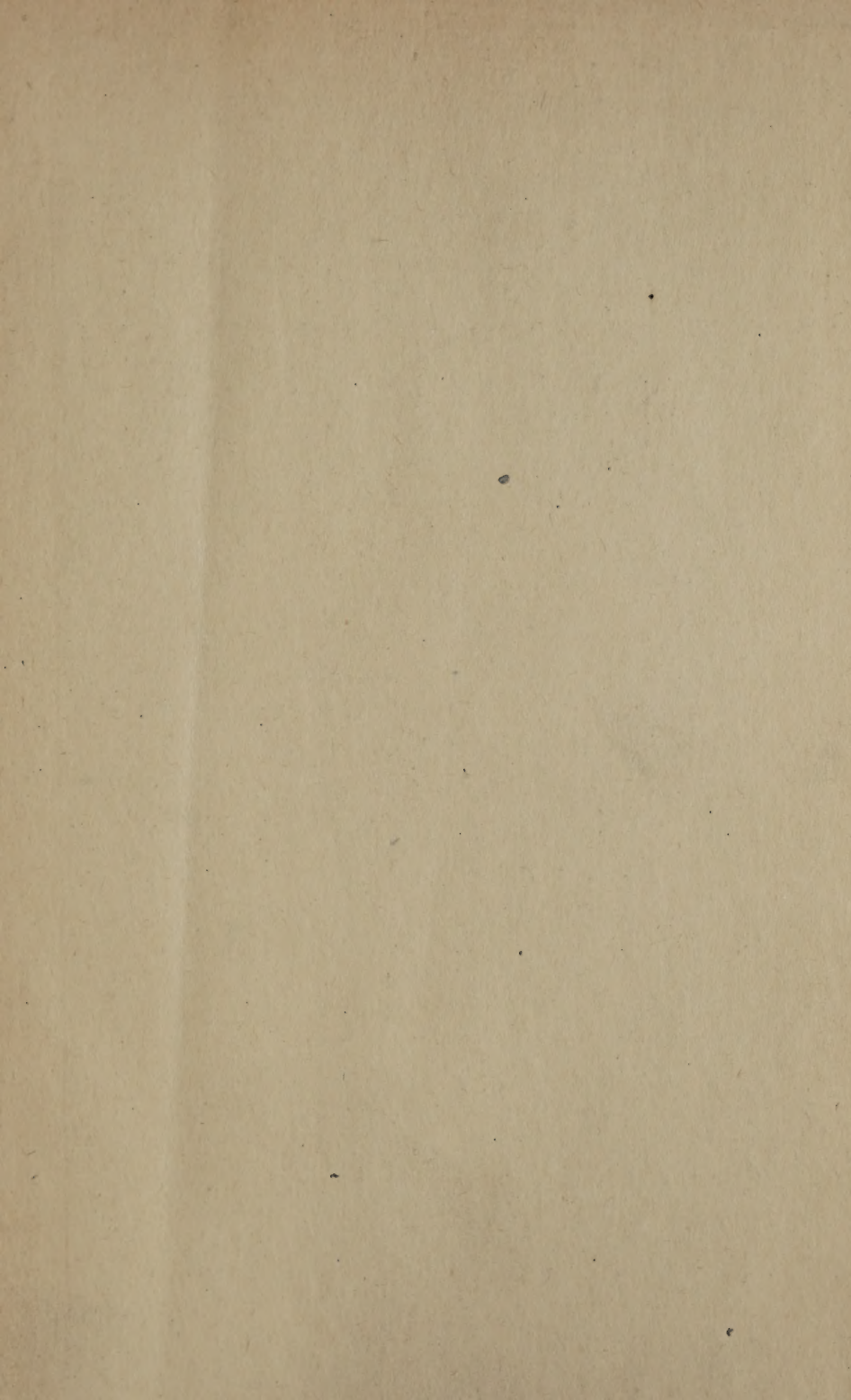

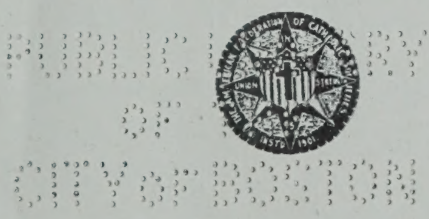

FOREWORD

Here we have a list or catalogue of books in the Grand Rapids Public Library, written by Catholic authors. It has been under consideration and in course of preparation for many months, and is now issued under the auspices of the Federation of Catholic Parishes of Grand Rapids.

The list may be open to criticism in some respects, but in the main, it will be found helpful in the selection of pure, wholesome, instructive reading.

Great credit is due to Mr. Samuel H. Ranck, librarian of the Grand Rapids Public Library, for his kind coöperation and valuable suggestions.

While the catalogue or list of books is not pretentious or formidable as regards the number of volumes, yet there is afforded in the different departments of literature abundant material from which the judicious and cultured may select. It is hoped that this catalogue will create and stimulate a demand for good books; that it will familiarize the Catholic reading public with the fine collection of standard Catholic books, now in the library; and that it will be the means of increasing this collection in number and variety, till we are able to challenge comparison with any city of similar conditions in the whole country.

The library officials have always shown themselves most cordial and ready to accommodate their Catholic patrons with such books as were requested. And we trust that such cordiality and willingness to serve will encourage our people to present their requests without hesitation for works of general interest not yet in the library.

It is believed that Catholics, especially parents and those charged with the care of the young, will duly appreciate the advantage of having such an authoritative catalogue of books as containing nothing against faith or morals. Purity of faith and morals is of vital importance to all; but more especially to the young. Books and papers like companions exercise a powerful influence for good or evil. Many youths of both sexes, says Cardinal Gibbons, have learned their first lesson in the dark mysteries of moral depravity from the pages of a sensational and salacious paper. And the danger grows apace; cheap and vicious writings abound. Many of the great universities are turning out thousands of accomplished materialists and thorough infidels.

According to Bolce, a large per cent of America's universities are teaching materialism, rationalism and rank infidelity. They are "Blasing the Rocks," and undermining the foundations of Christian civilization. Christianity has built up all that is best, highest and most enduring in our civilization. Christian teachings and Christian principles are the foundations on which our institutions and society itself, is based and founded. But these time-honored teachings and principles in very many of our great institutions of learning are disregarded, considered

obsolete, unworkable, mere expressions of a condition or phase of society long since outgrown,—in fact, mere expressions of superstition. And the result of this sort of education is that tens of thousands of young men and young women, thus poisoned and perverted, are turned loose upon society to disseminate and propagate by tongue and pen their pestilential convictions.

Wrong, perverted, Pagan views of life, its purposes, duties and responsibilities are as common as the daily paper, e. g., trial marriages are advocated; divorce and free love, as institutions are defended; the limitation of births in a family is a right and a duty; suicide is legitimate—and often the only honorable way of bowing one's self off the stage of life; the ethics of the barn yard and stock farm are to reconstruct society; eugenics with all its animal features is the hope of the future; morality is a spontaneous growth, not the result of religious teaching or the grace of God; private property should be confiscated for the public good; evolution—gross, materialistic, infidel,—adequately explains the riddle of the universe: these and similar questions are discussed every day in books, papers, and periodicals. Further, a personal God, a divine revelation, authority and certainty in religion, man, in a special manner the creature of God with an immortal soul, a supernatural destiny:—all these questions, so vital to the individual and society at large, are treated and debated as matters to be determined by a vote of the intellectuals. These same fundamental questions are raised and settled, too, by our infidel philosophers according to their own notions in the papers, magazines and books that issue from the press every day by the ton. The wells and springs of knowledge are being poisoned. No department of literature is free from this contamination. Books on religion, history, fiction, sociology, economics, the natural sciences, philosophy, pedagogy, and what not, are filled with the perversions of elementary truth.

How careful, then, should people be, lest they be perverted and corrupted by bad literature. "Tell me your company and I will tell you what you are." Your ideas and character will be molded and formed by what you read. Faith is destroyed by reading hostile to the faith. Many a one has become a heretic, an apostate, by reading irreligious books; others, moral bankrupts,—sex perverts,—degenerates of the lowest type, through the reading of immoral literature, in which crime and vice, sins of immorality are not only portrayed but are arrayed in the most fascinating garb, depicted in the most charming colors. And thus they arouse and inflame the depraved passions that lie dormant in the human heart.

This catalogue of books is intended to safeguard the highest interests of the Catholic reader, his faith and morality. It is in accord with the practice of the Church.

Leo XIII in his apostolic constitution concerning the prohibition and censorship of books has the following to say: "Of all the official duties which we are bound most carefully and diligently to fulfil in this supreme position of the apostolate, the chief and principal duty is to watch assiduously and earnestly to strive that the integrity of Christian faith and morals may suffer no diminution. And this, more than at any other time, is especially necessary in these days when men's minds and characters are so unrestrained, that almost every doctrine which Jesus Christ, the Saviour of mankind, has committed to the custody of His Church, for the welfare of the human race, is daily called into question and doubt. In this warfare, many and varied are the stratagems and hurtful devices of the enemy; but most perilous of all is the uncurbed freedom of writing and publishing noxious literature. Nothing can be conceived more per-

icious, more apt to defile souls, through its contempt of religion and its manifold allurements to sin. Wherefore the Church, who is the custodian and vindicator of the integrity of faith and morals, fearful of so great an evil, has from an early date, realized that remedies must be applied against this plague; and for this reason she has ever striven, as far as lay in her power, to restrain men from the reading of bad, as from a deadly poison. The early days of the church were witnesses to the earnest zeal of St. Paul, in this respect; and every subsequent age has witnessed the vigilance of the Fathers, the commands of the bishops and the decrees of councils in a similar direction."

For the majority of readers, the newspapers and magazines have supplanted the book as a medium of information and culture; and Catholics are no exception. It is of the greatest importance that in every Catholic household there should be one or two good Catholic papers, and if means will allow, one or two Catholic magazines to counteract and correct the evil effects of a secular press. This duty is imperative. Catholic reading will promote virile Catholicity—Catholic thought, and Catholic life. It is a positive disgrace for a Catholic to be ignorant or misinformed in regard to the teachings of his religion and the attitude of his church towards the burning questions of the day. The Catholic press is teeming with good papers and magazines, as for instance, the Michigan Catholic, a diocesan paper, and many others of similar character; the national weekly, America, edited by the Jesuits. Then there is the Catholic World, among the magazines, and Benzigers', Extension, Rosary, Messenger, Truth, and not the least, Light of Truth. Besides, there is the Catholic Mind and the publications of the International Catholic Truth Society.

There is no lack of wholesome Catholic literature, but the pity is that so many homes have several daily papers, all secular of course, but not one religious or Catholic to build up Catholic home life. In many of the eastern states they are beginning to have Press Sunday to promote the interest of Catholic reading.

At the end of this catalogue is a section in which Non-Catholic authors are represented to some extent. Not all the works of the respective authors are recommended. Selections from among their writings have been made and these are offered to the Catholic reading public with the assurance or hope that they can be read with pleasure and profit.
