Together, we are Planning for LA.



Going forward, the Department will release a quarterly update to this report, as part of a broader effort to increase data transparency and analysis around policy outcomes.



Dear Councilmember Paul Koretz,

I am appalled that you are blaming the Ellis Act and Costa Hawkins Act for the homelessness crisis in our city in the attached newsletter dated July 27, 2018 pages 3 and 4. We had a homeless population in Los Angeles for decades. Skid Row in downtown Los Angeles has existed for over 75 years with a population of over 10,000. Where was the city council and mayor all those years before these laws were enacted?

Neither the Ellis Act nor the Costa Hawkins Act has reduced the housing stock in Los Angeles. Please provide me with evidence to support your statement on July 27 that the homelessness crisis is largely due to the Ellis Act and Costa Hawkins Act. The Ellis Act permits a developer to convert rental units to ownership units while the Costa Hawkins Act allows property owners to increase rents for vacant apartments to market rate. Without those options rental units in Los Angeles would decrease as there would be no incentive for developers to build more units.

Homeless people can't afford to rent at any price, even if the whole city was under rent control homelessness would not drop by one person. You are making apartment owners a scape goat instead of facing the reality that the City Council and Mayor are to blame for the problem. This is so because you control how the city spends the tax dollars paid by us taxpayers and instead of fixing sidewalks, improving roads, and building shelters for the homeless, you pissed millions of dollars away on lawsuit settlements, and unfunded pensions to the tune of Billions of dollars.

If you pursue the blame on apartment owners and you repeal the Ellis Act and repeal Costa Hawkins Act you will find that apartment owners will not be able to pay for plumbing repairs, fixing smoke alarms, air conditioning and heating, roofing, insurance, trash collection expenses because these costs rise much faster than the 3% rent increase allowed under current law.

For example you voted to give 8 trash collection companies a monopoly on each collection area of the city and the monthly cost increased on December 1, 2017 for my apartment building 53%. I am doing a seismic retrofit at a cost of nearly six figures of which I will (after first spending the money) recover from tenants 50% over 10 years (with no interest of these funds). The city will greatly benefit from the safety of buildings not collapsing so how much is the city contributing to the cost of this benefit? **NOTHING!** I can go on and on about each of the above mentioned cost that have increased way more than 3% a year. Don't forget we live in Los Angeles, not in a part of the country where housing costs and services are half our cost of living.

Blaming apartment owners for the city's failure is going to severely hurt the tenant population, the very people you say you want to help.

I hope you respond shortly, as I would like to see a positive result for tens of thousands of homeless population in our great city.



I hope you will join me in welcoming them to your neighborhood,



Homeless Count Broken Down in More Detail

The Los Angeles Homeless Services
Authority (LAHSA) has released more
detailed results from the annual Greater
Los Angeles Homeless County staged at
the end of January. As usual, the numbers
don't always line up precisely with what
CD5 residents experience in their
neighborhoods from day to day.



Some of the perceived discrepancies appear to derive from the way neighborhoods are defined by LAHSA, which compiles the Homeless County data by Census tract and assigns the numbers to neighborhoods commonly understood to contain those tracts. Another factor is the mobility of people as they seek services, food and safe places to bed down. As expected, the vast majority of homeless persons in CD5 reside south of Sunset Boulevard.

Some key statistics released earlier by LAHSA indicated that the number of people experiencing homelessness in Los Angeles had dropped by about 3% since January 2017. This was largely due to a significant effort on the part of agencies and organizations to move a record number of homeless persons into temporary or regular housing. It's especially noteworthy in the face of the affordable rental housing crisis which is so pervasive in Southern California. That crisis also contributed substantially to the large number of first-time homeless persons counted this year.

Councilmember Paul Koretz is working to address homelessness on all fronts. He is working with nonprofit developers to find suitable locations for Supportive Housing that can be funded by Measure HHH. He's working with Mayor Eric Garcetti to site "Bridge to Home" temporary housing to get people out of encampments and into shelters. He's working with LAHSA and private organizations to provide outreach services to unsheltered people and people living in vehicles, and to find Safe Parking opportunities for the latter. And he's working with LAPD and other agencies to addresses any criminal activities and nuisances caused by a minority of homeless individuals.

The crisis is largely due to the Ellis Act, which helps developers evict tenants in order to demolish properties and build new ones. Sadly, it leaves many tenants who had been paying low rents unable to find affordable replacement units who are then vulnerable to becoming homeless. In addition, the Costa-Hawkins Act, which allows rent controlled units to go to market rate, also is a major contributor to homelessness. For example, when a 25-year tenant moves out (or somehow is evicted) who was paying \$1,000 per month, the next tenant might pay as much as \$4,000 per month in the current market, meaning every vacated affordable unit eventually becomes unaffordable) These laws need to be modified if we ever hope to end homelessness in Los Angeles (and elsewhere in California).

you may have regarding the person's wellbeing.

LA-HOP (Homeless Outreach Program) is a service designed to assist people experiencing homelessness in Los Angeles County with outreach services. Calling LA-HOP will dispatch a homeless services outreach team to the area.




Homeless individuals or others may call the line when seeking help for themselves or others. This program is funded by Measure H, the County of Los Angeles special sales tax increase passed by the voters in 2017 that specifically funds services, shelter, and permanent rental subsidies for people experiencing homelessness.

211 LA is the central source for providing information and referrals for all health, human services and social services in LA County. The 2-1-1 phone line is open 24 hours, 7 days a week, with trained Community Resource Advisors prepared to offer help with any situation, any time. If you are calling from outside Los Angeles County or cannot directly dial 2-1-1, call (800) 339-6993.

Urban Forest Management Plan - Public Input Survey

The City of Los Angeles is in the initial stages of developing an Urban Forest Management Plan (UFMP) funded by a grant from CAL FIRE. Urban Tree Canopy cover in the City of Los Angeles is only 21%, lower than the national average of 26%, making the health and sustainability of the City's park trees critical. The goal of the UFMP is to help guide the planting. care, protection, and sustainability of the City's urban trees. The initiative represents a city-wide collaborative effort to better understand current urban forestry management needs. In order to ensure that the plan considers and incorporates resident priorities, the following survey is

Complete Your Driver License Application from Home

The California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is now offering customers a convenient way to complete a driver license or identification (ID) card application before visiting a field office. The easy-to-use online application guides applicants through the process of filling out the required

fields for a driver license or ID card. When customers arrive at a DMV field office, technicians can quickly access the completed form.

This new electronic form is a significant step in streamlining the process and should greatly reduce time spent in field offices. Scheduling an appointment can also reduce wait time even further.



In order to fill out the electronic application.

customers will first need to create an account and then complete the DMV electronic driver license and ID card application. Customers will need an active phone number and email address to verify their identity through a secure two-factor authentication process.

The electronic application also allows customers to choose to be an organ donor and begin the process to register to vote. Voter registration will not be completed until an applicant visits a field office and submits the application with the DMV technician.

Customers can also use the Touchscreen Terminals at field offices to complete the electronic driver license and ID card application.

Homeless Count Broken Down in More Detail

The Los Angeles Homeless Services
Authority (LAHSA) has released more
detailed results from the annual Greater
Los Angeles Homeless County staged at
the end of January. As usual, the numbers
don't always line up precisely with what
CD5 residents experience in their
neighborhoods from day to day.



Some of the perceived discrepancies appear to derive from the way neighborhoods are defined by LAHSA, which compiles the Homeless County data by Census tract and assigns the numbers to neighborhoods commonly understood to contain those tracts. Another factor is the mobility of people as they seek services, food and safe places to bed down. As expected, the vast majority of homeless persons in CD5 reside south of Sunset Boulevard.

Some key statistics released earlier by LAHSA indicated that the number of people experiencing homelessness in Los Angeles had dropped by about 3% since January 2017. This was largely due to a significant effort on the part of agencies and organizations to move a record number of homeless persons into temporary or regular housing. It's especially noteworthy in the face of the affordable rental housing crisis which is so pervasive in Southern California. That crisis also contributed substantially to the large number of first-time homeless persons counted this year.

Councilmember Paul Koretz is working to address homelessness on all fronts. He is working with nonprofit developers to find suitable locations for Supportive Housing that can be funded by Measure HHH. He's working with Mayor Eric Garcetti to site "Bridge to Home" temporary housing to get people out of encampments and into shelters. He's working with LAHSA and private organizations to provide outreach services to unsheltered people and people living in vehicles, and to find Safe Parking opportunities for the latter. And he's working with LAPD and other agencies to addresses any criminal activities and nuisances caused by a minority of homeless individuals.

The crisis is largely due to the Ellis Act, which helps developers evict tenants in order to demolish properties and build new ones. Sadly, it leaves many tenants who had been paying low rents unable to find affordable replacement units who are then vulnerable to becoming homeless. In addition, the Costa-Hawkins Act, which allows rent controlled units to go to market rate, also is a major contributor to homelessness. For example, when a 25-year tenant moves out (or somehow is evicted) who was paying \$1,000 per month, the next tenant might pay as much as \$4,000 per month in the current market, meaning every vacated affordable unit eventually becomes unaffordable) These laws need to be modified if we ever hope to end homelessness in Los Angeles (and elsewhere in California).




Homeless individuals or others may call the line when seeking help for themselves or others. This program is funded by Measure H, the County of Los Angeles special sales tax increase passed by the voters in 2017 that specifically funds services, shelter, and permanent rental subsidies for people experiencing homelessness.

211 LA is the central source for providing information and referrals for all health, human services and social services in LA County. The 2-1-1 phone line is open 24 hours, 7 days a week, with trained Community Resource Advisors prepared to offer help with any situation, any time. If you are calling from outside Los Angeles County or cannot directly dial 2-1-1, call (800) 339-6993.

Urban Forest Management Plan - Public Input Survey

The City of Los Angeles is in the initial stages of developing an Urban Forest Management Plan (UFMP) funded by a grant from CAL FIRE. Urban Tree Canopy cover in the City of Los Angeles is only 21%, lower than the national average of 26%, making the health and sustainability of the City's park trees critical. The goal of the UFMP is to help guide the planting, care, protection, and sustainability of the City's urban trees. The initiative represents a city-wide collaborative effort to better understand current urban forestry management needs. In order to ensure that the plan considers and incorporates resident priorities, the following survey is

Complete Your Driver License Application from Home

The California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is now offering customers a convenient way to complete a driver license or identification (ID) card application before visiting a field office. The easy-to-use online application guides applicants through the process of filling out the required

fields for a driver license or ID card. When customers arrive at a DMV field office, technicians can quickly access the completed form.

This new electronic form is a significant step in streamlining the process and should greatly reduce time spent in field offices. Scheduling an appointment can also reduce wait time even further.



In order to fill out the electronic application.

customers will first need to create an account and then complete the DMV electronic driver license and ID card application. Customers will need an active phone number and email address to verify their identity through a secure two-factor authentication process.

The electronic application also allows customers to choose to be an organ donor and begin the process to register to vote. Voter registration will not be completed until an applicant visits a field office and submits the application with the DMV technician.

Customers can also use the Touchscreen Terminals at field offices to complete the electronic driver license and ID card application.



Dear Council Members and Mayor Garcetti

RE: Proposed Development on Centinela and Palms

Hilltop residents in Mar Vista and friends in our surrounding neighborhoods are set against any further density along Centinela Avenue at Palms Blvd. This includes the proposed four-story multi-use building on the northeast corner. We have been seriously abused by Playa Vista traffic that we were promised would not affect Centinela Avenue. We were further abused by the Great Streets fiasco that removed a traffic lane from Venice Blvd, causing huge traffic jams and multiple accidents at the Centinela-Palms intersection, which is now a main emergency route (one lane each directions) for ambulances and police vehicles who can no longer get down Venice Blvd. in a timely manner.

HEIGHT: There is an existing Ordinance allowing **2.5 story structures with NO variances.** It does <u>not</u> permit a four- story building on Centinela and Palms. In the past we Hilltop Neighbors successfully defeated a loft violation of the Ordinance on Centinela and later the opening of what would have been an illegal marijuana shop at this proposed location.

<u>PARKING</u>: The plan provides **only 58** parking spaces. For 32 Apartments there has to be at least 48 parking spaces to provide 1.5 spaces per unit. That leaves 10 spaces for guests, restaurant customers, employees and the businesses. Even if they include extra spaces for charging electric cars and bike racks it will not accommodate all the tenants, employees and customer's needs.

On the east side of Centinela in the extremely long block from Stanwood south to Palms Blvd there are estimated about 800 residents in about 8 homes, 20 condos and 190 apartments plus the North Venice Little League Fields and the Ocean View Community Gardens. Some of the older apartment buildings have only one parking space per unit so many tenants and all guests must park on Centinela.

The shared parking lot for Little League and the Gardeners has recently been designated as a school bus drop off and pick up site for L.A. Unified School District. Morning and evening approximately a hundred cars enter and exit on Centinela between Stanford and Palms.

Because of the heavy traffic on Centinela and Palms the businesses at the proposed location have not been successful due to lack of parking spaces and no left turn allowed into or out of their driveway. Because of the very steep hill on Palms there have been many accidents and at least two deaths in that area during our 58 years on the hill.

TRAFFIC and OUTDOOR DINING: With all the development on Jefferson and only 2 main thoroughfares (Lincoln and Centinela) the traffic has increased by many hundreds of cars daily.... NOT conducive to outdoor eating at that corner with bumper to bumper traffic from 7-9:30 am and 4-7:30 pm.

Mar Vista is a valued residential community. There is now so much "cut through" traffic because of the overdevelopment all around us that neighbors are all unhappy with plans to make it worse.



We will be ready to discuss EmpowerLA's election outreach plans at this committee and at the Health, Education and Neighborhoods Committee meeting on Tuesday. 



Many of us who live, work, and raise our families in Venice are worried about your plans for the Bridge project. As one of four major projects to serve the homeless to be located in Venice, we wonder if Venice is planned to be the center for serving the homeless in council district 11? We'd like to know the global plan for serving the homeless in district 11 before signing off on this project. Are there planned projects in Mar Vista, Palisades, Brentwood, Palms. W La, or Playa?

Beyond that, what guarantees is the city making that this facility will be properly policed and maintained? Or perhaps, like other facilities already in existence it will only serve to attract more blight to our neighborhood?

I own a home and raise my family in Venice, I own property and a business on the stretch of Lincoln Blvd. near the SJC, and the VRC. I see no attempt by the city in the form of police presence or social workers to mitigate the effects of these service centers on the neighborhood. Perhaps the City should focus on the well being of the existing neighbors to these service centers and prove that it can effectively run a program before embarking on building more facilities.

The homeless problem has reached crisis proportions and we ALL need to do our part, but I can't support this project. If we learned anything from failed urban policies of the 1960's, it's that you don't put the poorest members of society all into one place. 

Yesterday, a federal court underscored why it is imperative for Los Angeles to approve bridge housing and supportive housing for people who are homeless.

In a unanimous ruling, the U.S. Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals said that it is cruel and unusual punishment for any city to prohibit sleeping on public property unless adequate shelter is available and accessible. This ruling applies to all of California and eight other states.

What this means for Los
Angeles is that we are faced
with a stark and binary
choice --provide sufficient
housing and shelter where
those who are homeless can



access it, or allow people to sleep on public property, such as sidewalks. Providing housing and shelter has always been the right thing to do — but this ruling makes it a clear requirement.

After decades of neglect and inaction, Los Angeles is finally starting to do the right and necessary thing. This morning, Mayor Eric Garcetti and my colleague Councilman Jose Huizar opened the first bridge housing facility built through the Mayor's Bridge Home initiative (make sure to check out their inspiring video about the project here). This afternoon, the Homelessness & Poverty Committee is expected to approve bridge housing in Hollywood. The Department of Veterans Affairs is working with the city on bridge housing at its campus in Brentwood. And the mayor and I have proposed bridge housing in Venice. In every council district, the city will be approving hundreds of units of long-term supportive housing, and the city is finally investing in quick and nimble solutions, like shared housing and reunification.

Whether you want to end the human misery that is our homelessness crisis, or whether you want to eliminate encampments in our neighborhoods, the course of action is the same. We need to say yes to bridge housing, supportive housing, crisis housing, shared housing, safe parking, and more.

We need every community in Los Angeles to say yes to genuine solutions. If you are willing to support solutions where you live, please click here to let us

know. Working together, we can solve this problem.

Dear Councilman Mike Bonin,

With the volume of traffic increasing so dramatically along Lincoln Boulevard, many drivers are taking alternate routes through the side streets and alleys.

There are increasing numbers of drivers speeding at rates of around 40 Miles Per Hour in the alley north of Palms Boulevard, from Lincoln Boulevard to Penmar Avenue.

There are three alley connections between Lincoln and Penmar that are not only used by tenants cars, at Lincoln Place Apartments, but also by persons riding the Bird and other like devices, as well as children on bicycles, pedestrians, various pets, in addition to local wildlife, such as squirrels, opossums and raccoons.

As those listed above traverse the connector alleys they merge at the Palms alley. This is becoming more and more precarious with the drivers proceeding at such high rates of speed.

The most recent incident has cost the life of my neighbor's very expensive cat. Several months ago there was a hit and run in the alley area behind my apartment at 3 A.M.

I fear that in the not too distant future another incident could cost the life or severe injuries to any of the humans who ride recreational wheeled devices.

I would appreciate your office providing any feasible solutions to slowing the rate of speed in this alley.

Dear Councilmember Bonin,

In 2005, I sat on the first Neighborhood Council in Palms as a residential representative. I worked closely with your current deputy, Len Nguyen, and we were represented at the time by your predecessor, Bill Rosendahl. I subsequently served two more terms on the Palms NC, in multiple roles, and I've continued to sit on several committees since, today representing the Homelessness Committee and the Planning & Land-Use Committee. In fact, I've chaired both, and am on my 14th consecutive year of Planning Committee membership.

I say all this not to portend any clout or influence, but rather as a testimonial to my empathy for the position you find yourself in. I'm familiar with the naysayers, the NIMBYs, and the "coalitions" against progress and change. I have supported your efforts, and the fortitude behind them, to build new bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure in Playa Del Rey and Mar Vista, as well as to bring new housing and supportive services to our homeless neighbors in Venice. I've seen you stand up for what's right, in the face of opposition and vitriol, and I've come to your defense many times over the past several years, in private conversations with neighbors, at public meetings and town halls, and often on social media.

Today, I write to you from my tiny office at the top of the hill on the historic Chalon Campus of Mount Saint Mary's University. I look out the window, as the sprawl of Los Angeles settles into the flats of Brentwood, West LA and beyond, and my eyes are met first by the swimming pools, vistas and verandas of our immediate neighbors here in the hills. Several are in the midst of "home improvement" projects themselves - I pass the dump trucks every day. Yet, I've come to learn that some of these neighbors have ironically organized an all-too-familiar voice of opposition to a project that comes to your desk for consideration.

For some perspective, Mount Saint Mary's has graduated young women from this campus since 1929 - long before these hills filled in with the homes we know today. In fact, no construction has taken place here at all in decades. Yet, in that time, "The Mount" has provided a quality, liberal-arts education to tens of thousands of students - primarily women of color from all over Los Angeles County - most of whom were the first in their families to obtain a college degree. This campus is considered by many to be the gem of the Archdiocese, even of Los Angeles itself, and indeed your district.

The Chalon Campus is overdue for an upgrade to its aging infrastructure. The Mount now has an opportunity to create a state-of-the-art Wellness Pavilion and advance efforts in its Health & Wellness Initiative. This is a project that will benefit many, for years to come - not just the students here, but the entire university community.

The opposition has expressed the same tired complaints of increased traffic, overwhelming haul routes, construction noise and dust. This is exactly what our students, faculty and staff have faced on their drives to campus every day as our neighbors add value to their multi-million-dollar homes.

I hope you'll stand with the university community, and with me, in support of this needed and overdue improvement to the Chalon Campus of Mount Saint Mary's University. Rest assured, I'll continue to support you as you fight the good fight.

Hello Krista and Len,

I wanted to provide the update we received from Office of Historic Resources on the status of our HCM nomination of the Pat Minnick House. Based on the availability of upcoming agendas of the Cultural Heritage Commission, the earliest agenda OHR could place the nomination on would be January 10, with the action of deeming the nomination complete/notifying the property owner/officially placing the agenda item taking place on December 12--which would mark the date that a hold would be placed on permit activity for the property. OHR can't provide a guarantee to that timeline, but said that's the earliest timeframe if everything worked out.

That knowledge brings a new sense of urgency for the house, because the applicant of the demolition permit could conceivably receive it on December 10. Our biggest worry is the scenario in which LADBS issues the demo permit before our nomination is pending, as we understand that there's very little that anyone can do to reverse a valid demolition permit once issued. We also understand that LADBS cannot technically withhold issuance of a demo permit (even if they've been notified to flag a property) if the proper clearances have been satisfied—and we have additional concerns that the applicant of the demo permit appears to be savvy with the ongoing preparations at the site. They would likely plan to follow up with LADBS on the earliest day the permit could be issued.

We also reached out to the Los Angeles Conservancy, which has been very helpful at providing technical assistance overall on the HCM designation process. In learning how the HCM nomination and the demolition permit applications are currently tracking, the Conservancy is very concerned that the possibility for the demo permit to be issued before the HCM nomination has received pending status is very real. The Conservancy alerted us to an unfortunate demolition earlier this month of a historic house awaiting the start of the HCM designation process in nearby CD5 that they've profiled on their website:

https://www.laconservancy.org/locations/palms-farmhouse

With this realization and new sense of urgency, we are formally requesting that CD11 exercise leadership on this particular case and introduce a motion to initiate HCM in the setting of the full City Council so it could be voted on the same day. This appears to be the only way to guarantee that the house can remain standing and the HCM process play out fairly. We understand that this is an exceptional ask, but we do not make this ask frivolously. Additionally, OHR would be using the nomination prepared by our preservation consultant. Our timeline has extended back to early September, when our nomination was submitted to OHR; a backlog of nominations is responsible for the delay. Earlier than that, we had submitted a disclosure letter to the estate responsible for selling the house so that all potential buyers would be apprised of the property's historical significance and the efforts of Friends of the Pat Minnick House to secure HCM designation. We also know that the current individual interested in purchasing the property is a speculative builder who has constructed many past projects throughout Pacific Palisades. We understand that the sale of the property to them is contingent upon the approval of the demo and replacement project.

We would like to set up a conference call with you at your earliest convenience to discuss our request of Council District 11.

Re: Your Lime scooters are clogging up my neighborhood

Dear Sir:

Your employees have been parking/storing Lime electric scooters on parkways, sidewalks, and residential driveways on Linden Avenue in Venice, CA for the past several months. Here is an example from today. The attached photos taken on 1/5/19 show your products left overnight under an LA City street sign. Three of your products are in a red zone fire hydrant area, clearly blocking the adjacent sidewalk at the intersection of 900 Marco Court & Linden Avenue. The Lime scooters in these photos were placed at this location by your employees and/or by your irresponsible customers. The same parking pattern is being repeated on other sections of Linden Avenue. Your company is responsible for this nuisance.

Linden Avenue is a narrow, one-way street in the Venice walk-street district. It was never designed for the commercial storage of your products, per LAMC § 56.11, which states that: "No person shall leave or permit to remain any merchandise, baggage or any article of personal property upon any parkway or sidewalk." I request that you immediately place a Geo-Fence scooter parking restriction on the walk-street portion of Linden Avenue in Venice; specifically the area bounded by Palms Avenue on the north and Venezia Avenue on the south. I also request that you immediately instruct your employees to cease placing your products in this restricted area.

A copy of this letter has been sent to Los Angeles Councilmember Mike Bonin's office, District 11.

Dear Senior Lead Officer Acosta and Senior Lead Officer Delatori,

My name is Staci Liu. I am a member of the Broadway Elementary Safety Committee and a parent of two children that attend the school.

I, along with many other parents, school staff members, LASPD officers, and officials from LAUSD have contacted you numerous times over the last month to request your assistance with the relocation of the homeless encampment across the street from Broadway Elementary School, on the northeast corner of California Avenue and Lincoln Boulevard. We have also contacted 211, St. Joseph's Center, 311, and Mike Bonin's office to no avail.

Last Tuesday, during a community safety meeting at Animo High School, Lead Officer Delatori told parents, students, and community members to contact you when we witness a situation that poses a safety concern for our children and students. The homeless encampment across the street from Broadway Elementary is one of those situations, and our reasons are as follows:

- 1. It is on the sidewalk directly across the street from the entrance to the school. This sidewalk is used by hundreds of parents and students of Broadway and Animo High School every day. On most days there is less than the required 3 feet of walking space available on the sidewalk; their trash, human waste, and belongings are everywhere.
- 2. Within the encampment we have collectively witnessed alcohol consumption, sniffing of inhalants, and drug use. Empty liquor bottles get discarded on site, and Broadway Elementary School staff members have witnessed cocaine use.
- 3. These individuals are urinating and defecating in and around the encampment. My husband, children, and I have all walked by human waste on a weekly basis.
- 4. Last week, a Ralph's staff member informed the Broadway Safety Committee that one of the members of the encampment died overnight and was left on the pavement for hours before authorities came to collect the deceased. Ralph's is adjacent to his encampment.

I have attached pictures of the encampment from last week as well as this morning. As you can see, it is not decreasing in size. It has been over a month now since we started contacting anyone we could:

In light of the violence that continues to plague our schools nationwide, we, the parents and caretakers of the students of Broadway Elementary School, ask for proactive and preventative measures to uphold the safety of our students. Given the close proximity of the camp to the school–directly across the street–we ask this be treated with the utmost priority by the LAPD Pacific Division.

We recognize the plight of these homeless individuals and seek to have a peaceful resolution to this situation. But their erratic behavior and substance abuse cannot continue in front of our children. Please, act now before it is too late.

Mayor Garcetti,

I had the pleasure of meeting you at a dinner party on August 11th at my friend Eric Paquette's house. We enjoyed a cigar and discussed a great many topics, including my support for your initiatives that deal with the homeless crisis in our city and specifically in Venice Beach, where I live.

I need some guidance as the homeless crisis has created a specific problem for me, my family and my neighbors as it pertains to our residence. There is a small dirt patch that sits between Main Street and South Main Street right at Dudley Court in Venice (as a point of reference, it is directly across from the large 40-foot tall binoculars in front of the Google Building on Main Street). For the last 6 weeks, a homeless couple have been living in a tent that they set up there on the patch of dirt. They have verbally assaulted my wife, they repeatedly urinate/defecate on the street, they make use of our garbage cans and are often on our property. They are incredibly noisy at all hours and abusive and, quite frankly, there is a sense of threat. I am worried for my wife's safety, as well as the safety of myself and my neighbors.

We have called the police close to a dozen times. The police have been responsive and dutiful but have told us on each occasion that there is nothing they can do because there is no ordinance in place specifically mandating that there is no camping or loitering in that specific patch of dirt. The police have indicated to us that their hands are tied.

Taking that into account, I began an email/Twitter/phone call effort to reach my City Councilman, Mike Bonin, in hopes of having this ordinance passed. I have been trying to reach his office for weeks - I even started an online petition - and I finally got a response today which is below. It seems they are trying to get the Sanitation Department involved but our experience is that the Sanitation Department will be in a similar bind as the police. Plus, there is no mention of the ordinance we have asked for which would alleviate the problem short and long term.

I am at my wits end. As is my wife. We have lived in Venice for 20 years and understand our community and try our best to co-exist with all that Venice is. But this situation is out of control and I am feel as if I am being ignored, bounced around the city's different departments and feel strongly that nobody has a direct handle on this problem or seems willing to take responsibility or action.

I desperately need guidance from you, sir, on how to speedily and effectively swim in these waters so that we can achieve the result that we need, which first and foremost is feeling safe at home.

I am following up with you on the matter below. First off, I'd like to thank you, the LAPD, and LA SAN. Soon after I sent the email below, a crew came to South Main Street and Dudley Court and removed the encampment. The homeless man responsible ran off and for the last few days I, along with my wife and the many residents of this block, felt much safer and secure and that the city had our back.

Regrettably, this man returned last night and the situation has gotten worse quickly. We had to call the police multiple times last night as this man was threatening our safety and threatening to destroy our property. He was screaming over and over again that he was going to "fuck all of you up", "fuck the police" and that he was going to "break all of your car windows". My wife was, and is, frightened. She fears that this man will attack her when she leaves or returns home.

When the police showed up last night, he ran off again. Now, he is back and rebuilding his encampment bigger than before. I truly cannot believe what I am seeing. This is right on Main Street - in front of our homes, right across from Google's offices, in the eye line of iconic Venice businesses like The Rose Cafe and the Firehouse Restaurant. Hi Senior Lead Officer Muther,

Thank you so much for returning my email. Pardon my language below but I want to be clear as to what we are enduring.

This man has been at this location, returning every time he is removed, since October. In that seven-eight week span, I have witnessed him push this woman down to the ground, throw multiple items at her, repeatedly call her a "bitch" and worse, he has repeatedly screamed at her to "go fuck" herself, and he has done this at all hours of the night. He has also run her off chasing her down the alley where we park our cars screaming obscenities at her. She returns and it happens again.

My wife has told me that he has cursed at her on multiple occasions when I am not home, told her to go "fuck herself" and made her feel threatened on multiple occasions, including while taking out the trash to our trash bins on our property, which he uses all the time.

Me neighbor told me last week that they got into an argument about trash he placed behind his car and this homeless man raised a cooler he was holding in a manner that indicated he was going to swing it at my neighbor. We are trying to handle this peacefully but my neighbor - also a longtime resident - had to step to this guy and intimidate him until he backed off. He told me after that he didn't move here to fight homeless people in the streets and he might have to move if this isn't handled.

We have seen this man urinate on our property and all over the area. He scatters trash around our cars when he is angry, which is often.

On the night of Thursday, December 6th he returned to this spot after his encampment had been removed a few days prior (it rained in the interim and he was not there) and he went absolutely ballistic at 3:30am. He woke us up screaming incessantly and pointing to our windows yelling "fuck you", "I'm gonna fuck you all up", "I'm gonna break all the windows of your fucking cars". This went on non stop for about an hour. My wife and I felt completely threatened and called the police. When the police arrived he jumped on a bicycle and rode off and that was that... we understand there wasn't much more the police could do given the law but once again there was no actual solution. He has returned night after night.

So, now we are once again living with this man right outside our windows and steps away from where we park and walk into our home. My wife feels totally threatened and her job dictates that she leave early in the morning, often before the sun comes up, and returns this time of year after the sun has gone down. If I am home, I have to go out and

walk her inside and if I am not she carries pepper spray. This is simply to park her car at home and walk inside where we have lived for the past 19 years.

It is a completely unacceptable situation. We do our jobs, we pay our bills, we pay our taxes, we support neighborhood businesses, we voted for the homeless shelter a few blocks from our home because our hearts break for the homeless population and we want to support efforts to help them. We've lived in Venice for 19 years. How could we not have compassion for the homeless population. But now we are losing our minds daily, we are extremely angry and we are scared... all because of this one man.

Please help us.

Hello all,

I am writing all of you once again about the situation occurring on South Main Street at the corner of Dudley Court in Venice. Despite having written you all: Mike Bonin, Kristan Delatori and Jennifer Muther multiple times and despite having had to call the police to come to my residence numerous times in the past month, the situation has yet to be remedied. In fact it is only getting worse. The homeless couple who have been removed previously by authorities returned yesterday afternoon, December 13th and quickly set up camp again in the small patch on the corner of Dudley Court and South Main Street.

They returned to their normal routine. Screaming and hollering at each other using profane language. I am not an expert but their behavior seems to be that of crack heads. They walk all around my property, up and down Dudley Court and up and down South Main Street tweaking, yelling, and acting bizarre. The young woman obviously is trading sexual favors for drugs as I have seen her get into multiple cars with different men (Some of whom park in my driveway to pick her up). She leaves for a short time then returns. Then I assume she and her "boyfriend" then do the drugs she has procured because they start screaming all over again. They are disturbing the peace at all hours. This cycle is insane and completely unacceptable. I am a writer and work from home. It has been nearly impossible for me to work, much less sleep at night as I have been dealing with them disturbing the peace since early OCTOBER.

The gentleman has directly threatened me, he trespasses on our property to use our garbage cans, he uses the bathroom on my property and right int he middle of the street exposing himself. I have also witnessed him threatening my neighbors and screaming "Fuck the police" at all hours of the day. He has threatened to "break the car windows" of the people who live in these buildings. He points to the windows at my building at screams at us all the time.

But the bigger and sadder issue at hand is that this couple is only a fraction of this area's problem. Over 50% of the parking spaces on South Main Street between Rose Ave. and Sunset Ave. are currently occupied by people living in their cars. With this brings a ton of litter and trash on the street, constant noise as the homeless "hang out" and talk loudly at all hours of the day and night by their cars. They also run their cars at night --I assume to have heat—so the noise of the cars is unbearable for everyone living in my building. I have been told by multiple police officers that this stretch of South Main Street between Rose and Sunset has a zoning law that makes it illegal for a car to park in the same spot for over 72 hours. Yet these cars have been parked here for two months. They move for street cleaning and then immediately snap up all the spots again. No one in this community has access to parking because this stretch of street has essentially become a homeless shelter. Why is this not being patrolled? Why are these zoning rules not being enforced? Why are the police and the elected officials not protecting the peace of the tax paying citizens living in this community? The parking signs need to be changed...the only way to solve this problem is to make this stretch of street permit parking only after 6pm. And the city must put a "No Loitering" sign on this tiny patch of grass outside my building that is currently home to the crazy crack heads.

In addition, Main Street between Rose and Sunset has become an RV park. With that comes additional constant noise, loitering and litter. I have lived at my address for 18 years. I did not move to an RV park. I did not move to a homeless shelter. I did not move to a crack den. I moved to a nice little beach community. WHY ARE THE CITIZENS OF THIS COMMUNITY BEING FORCED TO LIVE IN THESE CONDITIONS? A petition which currently has over 61 signatures from folks on this block, has been started about this issue. We will continue to obtain more signatures. Everyone is furious.

I am extremely busy trying to work and pay my bills. This situation has CONSUMED my life for the past two months. I have suffered emotional distress and constant lack of sleep due to the noise issues. I have tried my best to solve this issue through the proper channels but I am receiving no help and have yet to witness any significant results. My next step is to contact the media. I will contact the LA Times as well as all local television news stations. I have no problem going on camera and holding Mike Bonin, Mayor Garcetti and the LAPD accountable for this travesty. And several of my neighbors would be willing to do the same.

In addition, I have a successful YouTube channel with over 22 million views and a social media following of over half a million fans. If necessary, I will make a video about this issue and put it out for public consumption. I will show the world just how dysfunctional the city of Los Angeles actually is. How the peace and safety of taxpaying, voters is disregarded in favor of homeless rights. Mayor Garcetti wants to run for president? He can't even run this city. I have tried to be nice. I have tried to be patient. But that has yet to get me any results. Be warned that my neighbors and I will not stop until you people do something to effect long lasting change for the citizens living in this area.

### Dear Kristan.

I have lived at 112 Dudley Avenue, Venice, CA 90291 for 19 years. I have coexsited with the homeless population in my community and I am an avid supporter of several charities in Los Angeles that provide services and food to the homeless. HOWEVER, the situation on my block is currently OUT OF CONTROL. In the past 6 weeks, I have been forced to make over 10 calls to the Pacific Division of the Police Department and have even had to call 911. I DO NOT FEEL SAFE!

We have a tremendous amount of people living in cars, RVs and on the street right by our apartment building. Our cars have been broken into, our patio furniture has been stolen, and I am dealing with constant trespassing issues as these folks use the bathroom in my garage, use our garbage cans and make a total mess of them, as well as sleep in our patio courtyard and garage. Not to mention major noise at all hours.

There is a young couple (Causcasion, late 20s early 30s) who have set up a big tent at the corner of 112 Dudley Court and Main Street on a tiny patch of grass right outside my home and they have been here for 6 weeks. They are constantly yelling, disturbing the peace, screaming at me and my neighbors and threatening me as well as my neighbors with bodily harm. These two individuals trespass on my property on a DAILY basis and disturb the peace in this neighborhood with their drug fueled screaming matches at all hours of the night. Their tent is up ALL day EVERY day which is illegal and they only take it down for five minutes when the police show up. Then they build it again when the police leave and threaten both me and my neighbors for reporting them.

The police officers who have responded to my multiple call totally agree with me and my neighbors that this is a major issue. And that his tent is ILLEGAL! That is how I got your email address...one of the officers strongly encouraged me to write and explain the situation to you. In addition, I have written Mike Bonin's office repeatedly but have yet to be contacted in return. We need the STREET SIGNS changed on this block in order to legally remedy the situation. We need a "No Loitering" sign on the tiny patch of grass outside of my building. And the parking signs on Main Street (BEHIND THE PAID LOT) between Rose Avenue and Sunset Ave. must be changed. As it stands over 50% of the cars parked on this small stretch of road contain people living in their cars. That means that there is VERY little parking available for the actual taxpaying citizens and residents in this neighborhood. Many of whom do not have parking at their apartment buildings and rely on street parking. This stretch of road should be PERMIT PARKING ONLY after 6pm. I have had several police officers tell me that this is the only solution to the problem and that only you and your office can solve it.

Several police officers have also told me that this patch of road is under a zone which makes it illegal to park in the same spot for over 72 hours however this is not being patrolled. People are parking cars for months on end and living in them. They only move the cars for street cleaning and then immediately grab the spaces again. The street is filled with noise, huge amounts of trash and human defecation. It is disgusting and an embarrassment to those of us who work hard to PAY to live in this community.

I am a personal trainer and a female. I often go to work extremely early in the morning as well as come home after dark. I do NOT feel safe anymore in the home I have lived in for over 19 years. I have been threatened numerous times and must deal with trespassers and extreme yelling at all hours of the day. Last night, the homeless couple living in the tent had "friends visiting" who were hanging out in my garage smoking. They would not leave and were extremely aggressive towards me. I was scared to death to get out of my car. I called the police and no one showed up. So I had to brave running into my home. This is unacceptable.

Today, (12/1) I had to call both 911 as well as the Pacific Division and NOT ONE POLICE OFFICER showed up. Not one! No one even responded to the 911 call. I was being screamed at and threatened by the homeless man living in the tent outside my building and he was also screaming at and threatening my next door neighbors. Not to mention he made a HUGE mess of our garbage cans...again...trespassing. But NOT ONE officer showed up. If I get injured by this man I have every intent of suing the city and the police department for negligence.

It's a SHAME and DISGRACE that the LAPD care more about the rights of homeless in Venice than about the quality of life for the taxpayers in this community. The taxpayers that pay your salary. I would appreciate it if someone in your office could contact me ASAP. We must find a solution. I should not have to live in fear and filth while paying \$3500 a month in rent! If this situation is not remedied in a timely fashion I will assure you that someone is going to get hurt or assaulted and that blood is going to be on the LAPD which has yet to remedy the situation and secure the resident's of Dudley Court's safety.



As part of an effort to enhance public safety, one year ago this week, I launched a major initiative to convince LAPD to refocus on neighborhood policing. That work has paid off: just this week, LAPD assigned 12 more officers to the 11th District -- and more will be added over the next few months.

I am very grateful to Chief Charlie Beck for making these assignments, which will help make our neighborhoods safer, curtail crime, and improve response times. The new resources are already making a difference. LAPD tells me that the extra cops helped its Pacific Area bust a prolific car burglary ring this week.


For too long, fewer and fewer cops were assigned to patrol our neighborhoods, and far too many people were telling me that they rarely saw a patrol car in their neck of the woods. It was the result of a decadeslong trend of deemphasizing basic neighborhood policing in



favor of specialized details and elite crime suppression units. Now, as my colleague Joe Buscaino and I proposed in our <u>"Back to Basic Car" plan</u>, the LAPD is moving officers from specialized details and into our neighborhoods, and hiring more civilians so well-trained and able-bodied officers can move from desk duty to neighborhood patrols and community policing.

This is an excellent example of the good that can come from neighbors working together to move Los Angeles forward, do good and get things done for our neighborhoods. Thank you to the hundreds of people who signed petitions in support of our "Back to Basic Car" program, and who joined us to call on LAPD to increase the presence of officers in our neighborhoods.

Rick Swinger got his E.coli testing kit in order and did his testing of the Rose Ave water drain water at the beach. It is a pond near the kiddies playground.

Swinger had made one previous attempt but forgot the ice.

Yes. The test showed 17.5 times what it should be.

"Drinking this contaminated water would certainly be a way of contacting E.coli,

according to the laboratory technician," said Rick Swinger. Less than 1 is normal. This is 17.5 times what it should be. Wading in the pond with an open sore would be another way." Mayo Clinic says Seniors and children are most susceptible.

"Santa Monica has 12 signs warning people about the dangers of their water drains at the beach," said Swinger. "We have none. I have called the county health department several times and they don't seem to care, but now I am going to send them the report."

Mr. Sidel,

I'd like to introduce myself. I am the Officer in Charge of the Venice Beach Task Force and have been in this position since January 2017. I've been monitoring this email thread and I'd like to address a few things for the benefit of the conversation. We have been receiving the same information regarding needles in the sand that you have and will be working with the LA County Dept of Beaches and Harbors to address this.

Regarding your first photo below of the volleyball courts, there is nothing in this photo which constitutes an encampment or illegal tents on the beach. Is it unsightly, distasteful, etc? I think we all are in agreement. But this is considered, in the eyes of the law, to be personal property which can not simply be removed because we don't like the way it looks. Is this the answer you were hoping for? Absolutely not, and I understand your frustration.

Regarding your second photo, there are tents in the background which are absolutely illegal. The dilemma is the response to their presence. In the past, the Venice Beach Task Force was able to drive our 4x4 trucks onto the sand,

make arrests as necessary and, as part of the arrest, remove the tent and belongings. This was a fantastic deterrence and enforcement tool which kept our beach safe and clean. Currently, the Department is reviewing our use of full sized vehicles on the sand and, in the interim, we are using small off road side-by-side type vehicles. As with any tool, there are pros and cons. The con, in this instance, is that we are unable to transport an arrestee off of the sand and remove the associated belongings without an unreasonable expenditure of resources and time that we simply don't have.

Regarding your third and fourth photos, they appear to depict the same concerns you rightly raise in the first two photos.

Just for a bit of historical background and to hopefully bring you some good news, since the beginning of 2017, the Venice Beach area from Pacific Ave to the water has seen crime (homicide, rape, robbery, assault with deadly weapons, burglary, auto theft, petty theft, and burglary/theft from vehicles) drop to levels not seen since 2013. Your Beach officers take great pride in our area and have worked very hard for you. To this point in 2018, these same crimes have been reduced by another 4%. Your officer continue to work hard for you. Does that mean things are perfect? Absolutely not. Does that mean we still have work to do? Absolutely. Our primary focus has been to reduce the fear and incidence of violent and property crime in Venice and this will remain our focus.

As part of this focus, I firmly believe in addressing the tents on the sand, encampments and unruly behavior or our residents. We are developing a strategic response which takes into account our current limitations on personnel, equipment, and time with the desire to implement it soon. What I ask from you, our partners in this effort, is your understanding that we recognize the same issues you do and we are working to resolve them.

Mr. Sidel,

First and foremost, thank you for your support. Our officers do a dangerous, difficult, and often thankless job so they will be excited to hear of your support. Kind words, rather than brow beating, are always invigorating and help to motivate our officers.

With regard to the use of vehicles on the sand, I am fully committed to the Department's vision, in whatever form that may take, and I will work with the tools and resources at my disposal to maximize our effectiveness. On a general note and off topic, I would say that, as a resident, you should always feel comfortable making your feelings known to your elected officials. Since Councilman Bonin and his Field Deputy Taylor Bazley are on this email thread, I'd say that you've done just that so no need to inundate his office. But I firmly believe that the best decision can only be reached if that's an informed decision.

With regard to the curfew on the beach, that is currently in litigation and there are groups that want 24 hour access to the beach so stay tuned. As it currently stands, the boardwalk and pier are open until 2AM and the park/sand are open until midnight. The restrooms at Horizon Av are available 24/7.

With regard to crime, always call 911 for a violent crime in progress as the preservation of life is our primary objective. Call 911 for property crimes in progress such as burglary, bicycle theft, vandalism and such. For non-emergency crimes in progress, please call 1-877-ASK-LAPD but also understand that both the emergency and non-emergency lines are inundated with calls for service so don't be surprised if there is a lengthy wait. Not what you want to hear but it's the truth. I would stay away from calling for "ticketable" offenses as they must be committed in the officers' presence for us to take enforcement action. Additionally, we have to prioritize our enforcement actions and our top priorities are protection of life and property. Ticketable offenses are addressed by officers on an "as available" basis. If we addressed every ticketable offense we saw, we wouldn't get a block away from the station! Yes, I'm joking, but only slightly.

Regarding the group at Sunset, we've been able to gain the cooperation of the owners of the parking lot with regard to authorizing arrests for trespassing and we've actively begun enforcing this after hours. This will hopefully address some of the issues.

We have reason to believe that the tents on the beach are part of a narcotics distribution ring. We've seen a dozen arrests in front of our building this week alone. There are used drug needles sitting right next to the tents and thrown on the volleyball courts where our children would play barefoot.

Mike Bonin's office told me the police aren't doing their job. The police have told me that the beach cannot be kept safe without 4x4 cruisers.

I think the beach should be closed due to a health risk to the public since it's not safe. We are actively seeking precedent to close Venice Beach until this political dispute is resolved.



We do appreciate and take your concerns seriously and I can simply say that none of us desire to see the deplorable conditions identified in some of your photos. Recreation and Parks has been a valuable part of the team engaged in the every Friday cleanup of Ocean Front Walk (OFW) and onto the adjoining side streets including Park Ave. since the beginning of the prograi years ago. Recreation and Parks is joined by LA Sanitation and LAPD on the team. That said, I want to let you know that after discussion with several City agencies, the barriers (initially the bicycle racks and later the concrete barricades) at the intersection of Park Ave. & Ocean Front Walk were installed as a safety measure resulting from a tragic incident in August 2013 when a motorist on OFW near Sunset Ave. The incident almost immediately resulted in serious litigation against the City of Los Angeles which in some form is currently ongoing. We realize the b conducive to the best aesthetic conditions but they do serve the purpose of not allowing a vehicle to enter OFW at that specific location.

While Recreation and Parks has no jurisdiction over the intersection of Park Ave. and Speedway Ave., I have reached out to Taylor Baziey, Field Deputy for CD11 to discuss a course of act can meet and confer with the correct City Departments which may be able to employ alternative strategies and protective barriers at Speedway and Park Ave. as you suggest. I am copying Division LAPD to assist with any law enforcement issues they deem necessary. Also, looping in Colleen Saro of the Venice Neighborhood Council's Ocean Front Walk committee.

Working together I'm sure we can return the location to a better condition and I look forward to doing so.

I would be happy to meet with you on site to discuss the matter and any other ideas you may have to accomplish this.
















Any blockage of open flow between Park Avenue and Ocean Front Walk supports the degradation of the whole area.

Dear City Officials and Police Officers:

I have written about this situation already on three occasions in the past two months. My neighbors have also repeatedly expressed their concerns and offered solutions to the current public health and safety emergency on Park Avenue in Venice. Again, I urge you to remove the Krails that serve to promote criminal activity and foster unsanitary and unsafe conditions.

My neighbor, Ira Koslow, recently sent an urgent appeal to immediately remove the K-rails and replace it with simple poles. Along with it, he sent photos of the appalling conditions on and around Park Avenue near Ocean Front Walk. If you haven't read it, please do so. The photos speak for themselves.

I have owned 21 Park Avenue for over 20 years. We have experienced problems with encampments, drug dealing, violence, litter, human defecation and anti-social behaviors in the past. However, the severity of the current problem cannot be attributed to lack of housing or homeless people anymore. It cannot be attributed to laws allowing persons to sleep in the public where there is inadequate shelter. The public health and safety emergency is due to the City's negligence and unwillingness to respond in a rational, expedient and efficient manner.

I am well aware that addressing homelessness in Los Angeles is complicated and challenging. I spent my career working for Los Angeles based non-profit organizations combatting homelessness and building affordable housing. I managed homeless services and coordinated the City of Santa Monica's efforts to create and implement sound policies designed to reduce homelessness and balance the needs of housed residents. As such, it is with some experience that I feel confident arguing that the City of Los Angeles is failing to protect the public health and safety of both housed and unhoused individuals on and around Park Avenue.

Recently, Mayor Garretti and a team of officials visited Park Avenue in an effort to drum up support for Bridge Housing. I support this effort, knowing that some residents in the area are strongly against it and fearful that the short-term housing option will further devolve our neighborhood into a permanent skid row at the beach. I, and many of my neighbors, are willing to advocate for support of the City's Bridge Housing in Venice. While I do not suggest a quid pro quo, I ask you, what is the City willing to do to help Park Avenue residents?

I urge you to act immediately to remove the K-rails. We have offered simple solutions that could be implemented in a day. This will not result in the elimination of encampments or crime, but removing the K-rails will provide some immediate improvement in the public safety and health along Park Avenue. Removing the K-rails will make it more difficult for individuals to conduct criminal activity and anti-social behavior and will provide some relief to residents suffering dearly from the current crisis.
