



◆Scene 6: Glorious Reunion

Choon-hyung in her thorny imprisonment keeps praying for Yi Doryong's success. In the meantime, Yi Doryong concentrates on his study, passing the official examination, and becomes one of the royal secret inspectors. And he rushes to Pyun Hak-do's province, and rescues Choon-hyang at the moment of her execution by the notorious governer Pyun, as well as the naive people under the tyranny of Pyun's. And villagers hail and bless the reunion of the beloved couple, Yi Doryong and Choon-hyang.

Scene 1: Kwang-Hal-Lu Pavilion in Spring

Village girls are group-dancing on a Dan-o Day, being over-joyed at the lovely spring days of Kwang-hal-lu Pavilion in Namwon, the native place of Choon-hyang.



♣Scene 2: Professed Love

Yearning after Choon-hyang whom Yi Mong-nyong (or Yi Doryong) happened to notice as she was swinging one day at the Kwang-hal-lu Pavilion, Mong-nyong, accompanied by his servant, Bang-ja, hurries to Choon-hyang's, sneaking in over the fence.

⇒ Scene 3: Enforced Farewell

Yi Doryong, secretly married to Choon-hyang, spends happy days at her home. The happy days, however, are to be interrupted due to his father's promotion to a higher position at Seoul, when the couple exchange tokens of their love, a mirror and a finger-ring. And he swears his return in glory in near future.





Synopsis of Choon Hyang Jun

In the 17th Century, during the Yi Dynasty, there lived a Miss Sung Choon-hyang and a Mr. Yi Mong-nyong in a place named Namwon, in the Southern Province of Cholla-Namdo. Sung Choon-hyang was the illegitimate daughter of Secretary Sung of the nobility and of Wol-mae, a Kisaeng girl. Though Choon-hyang was of lowly birth, she was beautiful, good-natured and very intelligent. Mr. Yi Mong-nyong, a son of Mr. Yi (a governor of the province) married her unofficially, without his parents approval, and they lived happily together for a year. Yi Mong-nyong, however, had to go to Seoul, for his father had been promoted to a post in the central government. The two young people, who were not married formally, had to separate: Choon-hyang was to stay at her house until Yi Mong-nyong passed the higher officials' examination.

Governor Pyun Hak-do, who took Governor Yi's place, was covetous and lustful. Charmed with her beauty, he tried to make Choon-hyang his concubine, but she resisted him. Furious with Choon-hyang, Pyun put her into prison. Still Choon-hyang kept her strong love for Yi Mongnyong in spite of torture and distress. Pyun, outraged, determined to send Choon-hyang to the scaffold. In the meanwhile, Yi Mong-nyong passed the examination, as he had determined to, and he became an Am-haeng-u-sa – a royal envoy travelling incognito to inspect local governments and officials on a special administrative and judicial order given by the king. On his travels, he came to the town, where Choon-hyang lived. He heard that Choon-hyang was to be beheaded and immediately rushed to the place. He saved Choon-hyang before she was to die. Sung Choon-hyang and Yi Mong-nyong rejoined each other and lived happily afterwards.

Scene I

Spring came and flowers were brightly blooming at Namwon, the town where Choon-hyang lived. Pretty girls were merrily riding on swings on a Dan-o day (May 5 by the lunar calendar).

Choon-hyang was attended by her maid, Hyang-dan. It was a beautiful place – many green trees and a bright blue sky. Then Yi Mong-nyong, who had been studying his lesson, came out to the Kwang-hal-lu Pavilion to see the beautiful spring scenery, escorted by his servant, Bang-ja. While enjoying scenery, Yi Mong-nyong saw Choon-hyang getting on a swing and was instantly attracted by her beauty. He called to her. However, she said she couldn't approach a strange man. Then she left for her house, leaving a note: "It is natural that a butterfly should come to flowers and a gull to the sea".

Scene II (Part 1)

Understanding the meaning of her words, Yi Mong-nyong went to Choon-hyang's place that evening, accompanied by Bang-ja.

Wol-mae, Choon-hyang's mother, regarded him as a fine candidate for her son-in-law. She, at first, refused his request for a definite answer. But, at last she approved of their union because of their strong profession of love.

Choon-hyang and Yi Mong-nyong expressed their own faith in love; then, in the night the two young people confirmed their faith.

Scene II (Part 2)

After one year, Yi Mong-nyong had to move to Seoul with his father, who was promoted to a higher position there. Yi Mong-nyong couldn't take his wife along, since he had not gotten approval for the marriage from his parents. Yi Mong-nyong promised to come for her after he passed the higher officials' examination. He left for Seoul, and Choon-hyang pledged to remain faithful.

Scene III

Provincial Governor Pyun Hok-do, taking the place of Mong-nyong's father, was a very covetous man.

Lustful Pyun Hok-do, charmed with Choon-hyang's beauty, tried to take her as his concubine. But Choon-hyang strongly resisted his attention. She wouldn't betray her love in spite of being coaxed and threatened. Indignant, Pyun Hok-do had her beaten and locked up in prison.

Scene V

After passing the examination, Yi Mong-nyong became an Am-haeng-u-sa, a royal envoy travelling incognito on inspection around the country. Yi Mong-nyong had heard of the impending execution of Choon-hyang and with all haste returned to Namwon.

Scene VI

Pyun Hak-do was holding a wonderful celebration for the commemoration of his birthday. He was angry at Choon-hyang and intended to behead her at the end of the party.

When the celebrartion was at its peak and they were about to behead Choon-hyang, the Am-haeng-u-sa Yi Mong-nyong suddenly turned up.

Pyun Hak-do, shocked and at a loss as to what to do, was captured as he tried to escape; Choon-hyang was saved by Yi Mong-nyong. They were a happy couple, overjoyed to see each other again. All the people in the province danced a delightful dance in celebration of the joyous event. Bang-ja and Hyang-dan, their two faithful servants, were also married a short while later.



◆Scene 4: Imprisonment

The new governor, Pyun Hak-do, taking the place of Mong-nyong's father, is utterly fascinated with Choon-hyang's beauty, trying to take her as his concubine in vain. Finally she is imprisoned, awaiting at prayer Yi Doryong's return.


