

T HE LYRIC POETS OF THE TWENTIETH CENTURY are few in number. But those whose names come immediately to mind-Auden and Spender-have had an impact far beyond the physical weight of the slim volumes they have produced.

For Spender, the mechanical monsters of our time make poetry as valid as that whose symbols are skylarks and curlews. Yet however much he embraces his age, he shares with most a yearning for the older, the nearly lost, values. If an airplane is beautiful, it is as beautiful as-what?-a great furred moth, after all. And finally,

What is precious is never to forget The delight of the blood drawn from ageless springs Breaking through rocks in worlds before our earth; Never to deny its pleasure in the simple morning light, Nor its grave evening demand for love; Never to allow gradually the traffic to smother With noise and fog the flowering of the spirit.
