



Dr. Michael Brienza

It's almost painful for some of Dr. Michael Brienza's students to admit how much they enjoyed a physics course.

As a professor of physics at Fairfield University who, along with regular physics courses, teaches core courses, Dr. Brienza is accustomed to having students in class who are there for only one reason: to fulfill their science requirement and move on. But as one student put it in an essay nominating Dr. Brienza for Teacher of the Year, his courses aren't the customary treks through arcane formulas and stultifying lab experiments.

"This is no ordinary physics class," wrote sophomore Mary Vingelen, in her nomination form. "I have learned more about life and myself because of Dr. Mike. He urges us to be passionate about something, and don't do anything if you're not passionate about it.' He teaches us not to take anything for granted, and to do our best at everything we do. Dr. Mike is an extraordinary teacher, mentor and friend, and I am a better person because I have had the wonderful opportunity to get to know him."

Ph.D., an associate professor of biology at the University, redesigned the physics curriculum to base much of the learning and experiments on human physiology.

"Did you know that the brain uses a tremendous amount of its computing power just to keep you erect? It interprets messages from the ears about balance, and all in all keeps this tall, awkward body balancing on two relatively small feet. We have students measure parts of the body, and learn about stability, forces and torques. We use headphones to demonstrate how the ears locate sound and determine where it comes from. In the lab, we have students measure their own eyes and write a prescription for themselves." The point, he says, is not just to make the learning fun. "I want them to see that it's relevant," he says.



Indeed, Dr. Brienza streve the relevance of physics to a variety of careers in the everyday world. His own background helps. Dr. Brienza holds a BS and Ph.D. in physics from the University of Notre Dame. Dr. Brienza has worked in a variety of industries, from aerospace to the sewing machine business, and holds 29 patents in everything from lasers to sewing machines to radar.

"Michael Brienza is truly to be admired. His enthusiasm for physics and the care and dedication he has for his students are exceptional," said Orin Grossman, Ph.D., academic vice president of Fairfield University. "I am delighted that he is being recognized by Fairfield's students as Teacher of the Year."




Robert Daniel Keder

Keder spent three summers researching the effects of technology and literacy on children and families with Judy Primavera, Ph.D., professor of psychology. He credits Dr. Primavera and Robert Chessin, M.D., a Trumbull pediatrician who allowed Keder to "shadow" him at his practice, with fostering his desire to pursue medicine. This fall, he will begin his studies at the Loyola University Chicago Stritch School of Medicine.


of faculty mentors Dr. Martha LoMonaco, Lynne Porter and Susan Haggstrom.



Asian Student Assoc.



poised to follow through on one elusive goal for fall 2004: a National Tournament Berth.



Season Highlights - 2003 marked another successful season for the Stags, who despite early injuries and loss of key runners maintained their 6th place standing in the MAAC Conference. Led by captains Matt Borland '04 and Bryan Mahoney '05, Fairfield performed well in a number of meets throughout the season, including a 2nd place finish at the 27th annual Fairfield Invitational and the New England Championships in Boston, in which many Stags set personal marks. The 2003 season marked Head Coach Andrew Harrington's third season at the helm of his alma mater, as well as the first for assistant coach Erin Heslin.

The Women's Cross Country team started their season with a sixth place finish in the 2003 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) Championships on Friday, October 31. The Stags were led by Shannon Kenefick '06 who traversed the course in 23:59.3 for an overall 18th place finish. Captain Lauren Wilson '05 was second on the team with a 24:21.2, and Colleen Brasser '05 closed out the top three for the Stags with a 24:42.1. Julie Wargo '05 (24:56.3), Kara O'Connell '06 (25:13.5), Taylor Dunn '04 (25:26.7), Cara Muzik '06 (25:39.3), and Liz Casey '07 (26:52.6) closed the books on the Stags scoring.

The team closed out their 2003 season on Saturday, November 15 at the NCAA Northeast Regional at Franklin Park in Boston, Mass. Shannon Kenefick once again finished first for Fairfield with a 23:44 over the 6,000-meter course. Lauren Wilson was next with a 24:05, followed by Cara Muzik (24:34), Colleen Brasser (25:05), Julie Wargo (25:09), Taylor Dunn (25:30), and Kara O'Connell (26:09).

nationally for her service aces by using her fierce jump serve. Laurie is pursuing a career in public relations in professional sports.







tough to go to a championship less than a week after a conference championship and put in that kind of performance."

Diver Chrissie Mayr was the Stags top finisher, taking third-place on the one-meter board with a score of 219.60, registering 16 points for the women. Mayr also took sixth-overall on the three-meter board with a score of 366.05. Katie Niemczyk, also put in an outstanding performance on both the one- and three-meter boards, placing ninth in both events.

The women's relay team swam well throughout the championships, taking eighth in the 400 free relay and scoring in

the 200 free relay with a 12th place finish.


Individually, Hunter was the other big-scorer for the women, racking up points in the 200 IM with a 14th place finish and taking 16th in the 200 back.

With the conclusion of the ECAC Championships, the Stags finished one of the most successful swimming and diving season's in recent school history.












In Loving Memory of

The MANOR 2004, was published by the Herff Jones Yearbook Company located in Gettysburg, Pa. 17325. The total press run for this years edition consisted of 600 copies using a 9 x 12 page size format. The staffs original cover design was created using a custom embossed cover process featuring custom cut embossing and foil dies. The base material of vibra-tex matte crimson red #41013 was silkscreened with #26 black. Silver foil #F-01 was also applied to the front cover. The endsheets were printed on 65 pound custom fibertext filament FCF-2 navajo stock using a custom pantone mixed red and #950 black litho inks. The paper stock chosen for the entire book consisted of Meade Westvaco's triple coated 100 pound bordeaux stock. Special effects consisted of 4-Color Process photos and spot color backgrounds. Percentage screens of black, overprints, reverses, mortices, rule lines and shades texture screens were also utilized throughout. The opening color essay contained an application of UV ultra violet coating to all 4-Color photos. Our Professional Photographer was Varden Studios, located in Rochester, New York. Our Publishers Representative and friend is Dale Alger of Bedford, New York and Jim Mielty of Yonkers, New York. Our Customer Service Person in Gettysburg is Ms. Barb Hale. Additional credits go to the Herff Jones Art Department for their creative renderings of the cover, endsheet, interior, and division spreads. We'd like to give special thanks to Mr. James Fitzpatrick, our faculty adviser whose commitment and dedication make this yearbook special.
