Please read this manual before operating your phone, and keep it for future reference.



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Getting Started

Closed View of Phone



- 1. **Camera Lens:** The camera lens allows you to take pictures and record videos whether the phone is open or closed.
- 2. **Volume Key:** Allows you to adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (with the flip open) or to adjust the voice volume during a call. You can also:
 - mute the ringer during an incoming call by pressing the volume kev up or down
 - press and hold the key to ignore an incoming call
 - scroll up or down through menu options
 - mute the alarm
- 3. External Display: Displays information needed to operate your phone.
- 4. **Headset Jack:** Allows you to plug in an optional headset for safe, convenient hands-free conversations.
- 5. Camera Key: This key is used to launch the integrated digital camera, both when the phone is open or closed.

Front View of Your Phone



- 1. **Speaker:** The speaker allows you to hear the other caller and the different ring tones and sounds offered by your phone. The speaker also allows you to hear your music when not using headphones.
- 2. **Display Screen:** This screen displays all the information needed to operate your phone.
- 3. Navigation Key: This key allows you to scroll through the phone menu options and provides a shortcut to phone functions from standby mode.
- 4. Left Soft Key: This key can be used in several different ways.
 - In idle mode, press to access your Favorites.
 - When using other features, such as the Web Browser, the left softkey **f** performs a context-sensitive action. This action is shown in the bottom left corner of the Display Screen.
- 5. TALK Kev: This key can be used in several different ways.
 - Allows you to place or receive a call.
 - In standby mode, press the key once to access the Recent calls log.
 - If you press and hold the key down, you will initiate the Voice Recognition feature.
- **6. BACK Kev:** Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode. When in a menu, press to return to the previous menu.
- 7. Voicemail Key: From standby mode, press and hold to access your Voicemail.


- Shift/Asterisk Key: Enters the asterisk [*] character for calling features. In text entry mode, press to change the character input type (ABC, Abc, abc).
- Microphone: The microphone allows the other caller to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
- 10. Power/Accessory Interface Connector: Allows you to plug in the battery charger or connect optional accessories, such as a USB data cable.
- 11. Space/Pound Key: Enters the pound [#] character for calling features. In text entry mode, press to enter a space.
- Numeric Keypad: Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and characters.
- 13. END Key: This key can be used in several different ways.
 - During a call, press to end the call.
 - When you receive an incoming call, press to mute the ringer.
 - When the phone is off or in standby mode, press and hold this key for a few seconds to turn your phone On or Off.
 - When in the main menu, press to return the phone to standby mode and cancel your input.
- 14. Right Soft Key: This key can be used in several different ways.
 - In idle mode, press to access your Contacts.
 - In text entry mode, press to change the character input type.
 - When using other features, such as the Web Browser, the right softkey performs a context-sensitive action.
 This action is shown in the bottom right corner of the Display Screen.


- 15.OK/Menu Key: This key can be used in several different ways.
 - In idle mode, press for the main Menu.
 - Press while navigating through a menu to accept the highlighted choice in the menu.

Viewing the Display Screen





Turning Your Phone On and Off

To turn your phone on:

Press and hold
 multiple to turn your phone on.

Once your phone is On, it displays "Looking for Service" which indicates that your phone is searching for a signal. When your phone finds a signal, it automatically enters standby mode – the phone's idle state. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching. a Power Save feature is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode.

In Power Save mode, your phone searches for a signal periodically without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned On).

Tip: The Power Save feature helps to conserve your battery power when you are in an area where there is no signal.

To turn your phone off:

 Press and hold for two seconds until you see the powering down animation on the display screen.

Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).

Using Your Phone's Battery and Charger

Battery Capacity

Your phone is equipped with a Lithium Ion (Lilon) battery. It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained. The battery provides up to 3 hours of continuous digital talk time or approximately 8 days of continuous digital standby time.

When the battery reaches 5% of its capacity, the battery icon blinks. When there are approximately two minutes of talk time left, the phone sounds an audible alert and then powers down.

Note: Long backlight settings, low signal strength, searching for service. vibrate mode, playing games, or browser use affect the battery's talk and standby times.

Tip: Be sure to watch your phone's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power.

Installing the Battery

To install the Lilon battery:

1. Insert the battery into the opening on the back of the phone at an angle, making sure the plastic tab on the bottom of the battery is inserted into the matching slot in the phone.



2. Press down until the battery snaps into place.



3. Replace the cover.



Removing the Battery

Note: Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.

To remove your battery:

1. Remove the protective cover by pressing the release latch and pulling up on the back of the cover.



Grip the battery at the bottom and pull up and out at a 45° angle.



Charging the Battery

Your phone's Lilon battery is rechargeable and should be charged as soon as possible so you can begin using your phone.

Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your phone automatically turns off and you will lose all the information you were just working on. For a quick check of your phone's battery level, glance at the battery charge indicator located in the upper-right corner of either of your phone's display screens. indicates that the battery is full. If the battery charge is getting too low, the battery icon blinks and the phone sounds a warning tone.

Always use a Samsung-approved desktop charger, travel adapter, or vehicle power adapter to charge your battery.

Note: You **must** unplug the adapter before removing the battery from the phone during charging to avoid damage.

It takes approximately 4 hours to fully recharge a completely drained standard battery. With the Samsung approved Lilon battery, you can recharge the battery before it drains completely.

An animated battery icon is displayed on both the external LCD screen and the main screen. The icon provides an indication of whether the battery is being charged or is fully charged.

Phone Basics

Note: To access the phone's main **Menu**, press **m** from standby mode. Menu items may be selected by highlighting them with the navigation key and pressing **m**, or you can press the key corresponding to the menu's position in the 3x4 grid.

Note: Your phone can display the various features and options in one of two different menu styles, **3x4** (black or white) and **List**. By default, your handset is set to the 3x4 menu style. Key commands for the first menu level in the List style differ from those in this guide. For more information on changing the menu style between 3x4 and List, see "Changing the Phone's Menu Style" on page 48.

Displaying Your Phone Number

Just in case you forget your phone number, your phone can remind you.

To display your phone number:

- Press , followed by for Settings.
- Press for Phone Info.
- 3. Press **I** for **Phone Number**.

Making and Answering Calls

Making Calls

Placing a call from your phone is as easy as making a call from any land-line phone. Just enter the number and press mand vou're on your way to clear calls.

To make a call using your keypad:

- 1. Make sure your phone is on.
- 2. Enter a phone number. (If you make a mistake while dialing, press to erase one digit at a time. Press and hold to erase the entire number.)
- 3. Press to call.
- **4.** Press or close the phone when you are finished.

Tip: To redial your last recent call, press **twice**.

Tip: Some networks support + dialing. + dialing automatically indicates to the network that you are dialing an international call and adds the international dialing prefix (typically '011') to the call automatically. To use + dialing, press and hold [(until the + appears) before entering the phone number.

You can also place calls from your phone by using Voice Command (page 37), Speed Dialing numbers from your Contacts (page 25), and using your Call History listings (page 65).

Answering Calls

To answer an incoming call:

- 1. Make sure your phone is on. (If your phone is off, incoming calls go to Voicemail.)
- 2. Press to answer an incoming call. (Depending on your phone's settings, you may also answer incoming calls by opening the phone or by pressing any number key. See "Call Answer Mode" on page 158 for more information.)

Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings or vibrates (unless set to Silence All).
- The screen displays an incoming call message.

If the incoming call is from a number stored in your Contacts, the Contacts entry's name is displayed. The caller's phone number may also be displayed, if available.

The following options are also available to handle an incoming call:

- Press sor the volume key to quiet the ringer.
- Press the right softkey for Ignore or press and hold the immediately.

Note: When your phone is off, incoming calls go to Voicemail.

Ending a Call

To disconnect a call when you are finished:

Close the phone or press

Missed Call Notification

When an incoming call is not answered, a Missed Call message is displayed on your screen.

To dial a missed call back press

Calling Emergency Numbers

You can place calls to 911 (dial 📨 🐚 🐚 and press 🐚), even if your phone is locked or your account is restricted.

Warning: After initiating a 911 call, you must end the call by pressing [] . This notifies the phone that the 911 call was terminated intentionally by the user. No other calls can be made prior to terminating the 911 call.

In-Call Options

During a call, use the left softkey to **Mute** or **Unmute** your phone's microphone. Additional actions are available by pressing the right softkey for **Options** during a call. (To select an option, press the corresponding keypad number or highlight the option and press).

- (1) Turn Speaker On/Off allows you to activate or deactivate your phone's speaker (routing calls through an attached headset).
- (2) Key Mute or Key Unmute allows you to mute or reactivate your phone's keypad sounds.

- (3) Contacts accesses the Contacts menu options.
- (4) Messaging allows you to check notifications and access the contents of voice or text messages.
- (5) 3-Way Call allows you to talk to two different people at the same time. (For more information, see "Making a Three-Way Call" on page 27.)
- (6) Call History checks your call log for Missed, Outgoing, and Incoming calls. You can also erase the logs from this menu.
- (7) Voice Memo allows you to record the current conversation. (For more information, see "Reviewing and Erasing Memos" on page 107.)
- (8) Tools accesses the Tools menu options.
- (9) Phone Info displays the phone number, icon glossary, the hardware/software version. Preferred Roaming List (PRL), the system and the technology being used.

End-of-Call Options

After receiving a call from or making a call to a phone number that is not in your Contacts, the phone number and the duration of the call are displayed. Press the left softkey and to Save the new number in vour Contacts. (See "Saving a Phone Number" below for more information.)

Note: The End-of-Call options are not displayed for calls identified as Unknown ID or Restricted Number.

Saving a Phone Number

Your phone can store up to 500 phone numbers in its Contacts list. Each Contacts entry can store up to a total of five phone numbers. and each entry's name can contain up to 20 characters. (For more information, see "Adding a New Contact" on page 134.)

To save a number from standby mode:

- 1. Enter a phone number.
- Press the right softkey for Options.
- 3. Press for Save.
- 4. Select **New Entry** and press **3**.

Note: Step 4 does not appear when your Contacts list is empty.

- **6.** Enter the name using the keypad and press **......**.
- 7. Press the left softkey for **Done**.

After you save the number, the new Contacts entry is displayed.

Finding a Phone Number

To find an entry from the Contacts menu:

1. From the Idle screen, press the right softkey for Contacts

Scroll down through your list of contacts to highlight the name and press to make the call.

Tip: To search through your list more quickly, enter the first few letters in the **Name** box. The display will move down the list to the first entry that matches the text in the Name box.

Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as Voicemail or credit card billing numbers.

There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- Hard Pause sends the next set of numbers when you press .
- 2-Second Pause automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds.

Note: You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine 2-second and hard pauses.

To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

- 1. Enter a phone number from standby mode.
- Press the right softkey for Options and select Hard pause or 2sec pause. Hard pauses are displayed as a "P" and 2-second pauses as a "T".
- 3. Enter additional numbers.

4. Press **b** to dial the number.

Press the right softkey for **Options** and select **Save** to save the number in your Contacts.

When dialing a number with a hard pause, press to send the next set of numbers.

Abbrey Dial

Abbreviated dialing allows you to program a five or six digit prefix for commonly used phone numbers. When abbreviated dialing is on, you can enter the last four or five digits of any phone number that matches the five or six digit prefix, and the number is dialed.

To set up abbreviated dialing:

- 1. Press . followed by for Settings.
- Press for Others.
- 3. Press **I** for **Call Setup**.
- 4. Press Im for Abbrev. Dial.
- 5. Select **On** or **Off** and press **....**.
- 6. Input the five or six digit prefix (for example, area code and prefix) and press 🚃 .

Making an Abbreviated Dial Call

1. Enter the last four or five digits of the prefix phone number. Abbrey. Dial is displayed in the lower left corner with the prefix digits displayed.

Note: If there is more than one Contact entry that matches the last four or five digits, a list is displayed which allows you to select the desired number to call.

2. Press to make the call.

Dialing From Contacts

To dial directly from a Contacts entry:

- Press the right softkey for Contacts.
- Scroll to highlight the desired entry and press to make the call.

Tip: If the entry contains more than one phone number, scroll left or right to display the number you wish to call and press to make the call.

Using Speed Dialing

You can store up to 98 numbers in your phone's speed dial memory to make contacting friends and family as easy as pressing a few buttons. With this feature, you can dial Speed Dial entries using one key press for locations 2-9, or two key presses for locations 10-99.

To use One-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 2-9:

 Press and hold the appropriate key for approximately two seconds.

To use Two-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 10-99:

- 1. Press the first digit.
- Press and hold the second digit for approximately two seconds.

Using Caller ID

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the incoming call. If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call, just follow these easy steps.

To block your phone number from being displayed for a specific outgoing call:

- 2. Enter the number you want to call.
- 3. Press ...

To permanently block your number, call the Customer Service department of your network service provider.

Note: If you have not subscribed to Caller ID, and the back light is set to turn off after a period of time, pressing make will switch the back light back on. Either press and hold or press twice to answer the second call when the LCD is turned off. To avoid this problem, set the back light to "flip open". For more information, see "Backlight" on page 145.

Responding to Call Waiting

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you of incoming calls by sounding two beeps. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available and you are in digital mode).

To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

 Press . (This puts the first caller on hold and answers the second call.)

To switch back to the first caller:

Press magain.

Making a Three-Way Call

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

To make a Three-Way Call:

- 1. Enter a number you wish to call and press .
- Once you have established the connection, press the right softkey for Options, followed by for 3-Way Call.
- 3. Dial the second number and press
- When you're connected to the second party, press again to begin your three-way call.

If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all three callers are disconnected.

Tip: You can also begin a Three-Way Call by displaying a phone number stored in your Contacts, Call History, or Messaging. To call the third party, press .

Note: Call Waiting and Three-Way Calling are not available while roaming off the network.

TTY Use With Handset

A TTY (also known as a TDD or Text Telephone), is a telecommunications device that allows people who are deaf or hard of hearing, or who have speech or language disabilities, to communicate by telephone.

Your phone is compatible with selected TTY devices. Please check with the manufacturer of your TTY device to ensure that it supports digital wireless transmission. Your phone and TTY device will connect via a special cable that plugs into your phone's headset jack. If this cable was not provided with your TTY device, contact your TTY device manufacturer to purchase the connector cable.

Note: Not all service providers support TTY. Consult your service provider for more information.

To turn TTY Mode on or off:

- 1. Press 📰 📧 🐷 of followed by 📻 . (A brief explanation of TTY Mode will display.)
- 2. Press again to continue.
- 3. Press the navigation key up or down to select **TTY On** or **TTY Off** and press **and** to save and exit.

Note: In TTY Mode when your headset is plugged in, your phone will display the TTY access icon. If TTY mode is enabled, the headset cannot be used.

IMPORTANT 911 Emergency Calling: We recommend that TTY users make emergency calls by other means, including Telecommunications Relay Services (TRS), analog cellular, and land line communications. Wireless TTY calls to 911 may be corrupted when received by public safety answering points (PSAPs) rendering some communications unintelligible. The problem encountered appears related to TTY equipment or software used by PSAPs. The wireless industry and PSAP community are currently working to resolve this.

Roaming

Understanding Roaming

Recognizing Icons on the Display Screen

Your phone's display screen always lets you know when you're off the network. The following chart indicates what you'll see depending on where you're using your phone.

Note: You may pay a higher per-minute rate for roaming calls.

Roaming on Other Digital Networks

When you're roaming, your call quality and security will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on your home network. You may not be able to access certain features, such as web services.

Note: If you're on a call when you leave the network and enter an area where roaming is available, your call is dropped. If your call is dropped in an area where you think service is available, turn your phone Off and On again to reconnect to the network.

Setting Your Roaming Mode

Your phone allows you to control your ability to roam. By using the **Roaming** menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts. Choose from three different settings on your phone to control your roaming experience:

- 1. Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press **5** for **Roaming**.
- 3. Press Im for Set Mode.
- 4. To select an option, highlight it and press 📟.
 - Automatic: This setting seeks service. When service is unavailable, the phone searches for an alternate system.
 - 1X-Only Mode: This setting allows you to access 1X networks. No EV-DO service is available.
 - Home Only Mode: This setting allows you to access the home network only and prevents roaming on other networks.

Set NAM

This setting allows you to associate your Mobile Directory Number (MDN) to your phone's electronic serial number (ESN).

- 1. From the standby screen, press 🕶 🕶 🚾 🗺
- Enter the service code provided to you by your service provider.

Warning: Modification of the MDN may render your phone inoperative.

Entering Text

Selecting a Character Input Mode

Your phone provides convenient ways to enter words, letters, punctuation, symbols, and numbers whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when adding a Contacts entry or when sending text messages).

To change the character input mode:

- 1. When you display a screen where you can enter text. press the right softkey for **Options**. Soft key options are not displayed when viewing existing messages.
- 2. Select a character input mode:
 - **T9 (English)**: to enter characters using predictive T9 Text Input (see page 33).
 - Alpha: to enter characters by tapping the keypad (see page 34).
 - **Symbol**: to enter symbols (see page 35).
 - Number: to enter numbers (see page 35).
 - **Preset Msq**: to enter a pre-prepared message, chosen from a list of common phrases.
 - Recent Msq: to reuse the text from a recent message.
 - Emoticons: to enter emoticon symbols.
 - Text Options: to customize your character input mode (see page 146).

Note: Not all character input modes may be available for all phone features. For instance, Preset Msg and Recent Msg are only available when composing text and picture messages.

T9 Text Input

T9 Text Input lets you enter text in your phone by pressing keys just once per letter. (To select the **T9 (English)** mode when entering text, see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" above.)

T9 Text Input analyzes the letters you enter using an intuitive word database and creates a suitable word. (The word may change as you type.) Other possible words appear in a list below your text.

- To choose a word displayed in the list, scroll up and down using the up and down navigation keys.
- To accept a word, press
- To accept a word and insert a space, press
- Press to erase a single character. Press and hold to delete an entire entry.
- To enter a period, press . To enter other special characters, press and then repeatedly press to cycle through other special characters until the desired character is deposed. If the desired character does not display, press the right softkey for Options and select Symbol.
- To insert a number, press and hold the corresponding number key. For instance, to enter '3', press and hold

To enter text using T9:

 From the text entry screen (for example, a new event in scheduler), press the right softkey for **Options** and select **T9 (English)**. Use your keypad to enter the new event. (For example, to enter "Meeting", press once, twice, once, once, once, once, and once.)

Alpha mode

To enter characters by tapping the keypad, select the Alpha mode (see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 32). Press the corresponding key repeatedly until the desired character appears.

When the highest icon is shown, the first letter of the first word is capitalized and following letters are lowercase. The key can be used to switch between uppercase, lowercase, and mixed case.

To enter text using Alpha:

- From a text entry screen (for example, a Contacts entry), press the right softkey for **Options** and select **Alpha**.
- 2. Use your keypad to enter the contact's name. (For example, to enter "Bill", press twice, three times, three times, and then after a brief pause three times again.)

Characters scroll in the following order:

After a character is entered, the cursor automatically advances to the next space after two seconds or when you enter a character on a different key.

Numbers, Symbols, Emoticons and Preset Messages

To enter numbers:

 Select the Number mode and press the appropriate key. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 32.)

To enter symbols:

 Select the **Symbol** mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 32.) To enter a symbol, press the appropriate key indicated on the display. Use the navigation keys to scroll up or down to see additional symbols.

To enter "emoticons" (smileys):

 Select the **Emoticons** mode and press the appropriate key. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 32.)

To enter preset messages:

- Select the Preset Msg mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 32.)
- Scroll to the desired pre-programmed message and press .

Note: Preset messages make composing text messages quicker by allowing you to enter pre-typed messages, such as "Meet me at," "Let's get lunch," or a customized preset message of your own. (For more information on preset messages, please see "Preset Messages" on page 96.)

Voice Service

Activating Voice Service

Voice recognition allows you to say commands to perform common functions supported by your phone. There is no voice training required to use the voice recognition feature. You simply say the pre-designated command displayed on your screen in a normal tone of voice to perform the desired function.

To activate voice recognition:

- 1. Press and hold . (The phone prompts you to say a voice command.)
- 2. Wait for the beep and then say one of the following commands:
 - Call <Name or #>
- Lookup <Name>
- Send Text <Name>
- Go To <App>
- Send Fmail < Name>
- Check <Item>

When it recognizes one of these commands, the phone launches the associated application. If the phone does not hear a command within approximately eight seconds, it de-activates voice recognition without taking any action.

Note: If you want to use another button to activate voice recognition, in addition to , press for Menu, followed by for Launch Pad. Through this menu, you can change button assignments, including the button used to launch "Voice Services", which is the voice recognition application.

Call <Name or #>

Call <Name or #> allows you to dial any valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number by speaking the number naturally, without pausing between the digits. It also allows you to dial by pronouncing a name stored in your Contacts.

Tips for using Call <Name or #>:

- Voice Service works best in quieter environments.
- When saying a number, speak at a normal speed and say each digit clearly. There is no need to pause between digits.
- The phone recognizes the digits one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, zero, and oh. The phone does not recognize numbers such as "one eight hundred" for "1-800." Instead, say "one-eight-zero-zero."
- The phone recognizes only valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone numbers.
- If your phone does not usually recognize you correctly when you are using Voice Service, try adapting Voice Service to your voice, which can significantly improve accuracy for some speakers. (See "Sensitivity" on page 42 for details.)

To place a call using Call <Name or #>:

- Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding the phone prompts you for a command.)
- Say "Call" followed by either a name stored in your Contacts or a valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number naturally and clearly.

- If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by the correct number, say Yes. (You can also select the correct number from those displayed on the screen by pressing on the correct number. The phone will then dial the number.)
- If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect number, say No. (If there are other alternatives, the phone will prompt you with the next one. You can also press the navigation key up or down to select the correct number from the Choice List, and then press to dial.)
- 3. Alternatively, you can call a person in your Contacts by saying the full name of the person you want to call, exactly as it is entered in your Contacts. (The phone plays the name through the earpiece and displays it on the screen.)

If you said a name listed in your Contacts that has more than one number associated with it, the phone displays the different locations (Home, Work, Mobile, Pager, Others) and asks you which one to dial. Say one of the location names and the phone will dial the number for the location vou specified.

Note: In some cases, the phone might ask you to repeat a name or number. Make sure that the number is a valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number, and then say the number again. If the number isn't valid, or if the phone still doesn't understand the number on the second try, it will not place a call.

Send Text < Name>

Send Text <Name> lets you start composing text messages for any person in your Contacts or to a phone number.

To compose a text message using Voice Service:

- Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding the phone will prompt you for a command.)
- Say "Send Text" followed by either a name stored in your Contacts or a valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number naturally and clearly.
 - If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by the correct number, say Yes. (You can also select the correct number from those displayed on the screen by pressing on the correct number.)
 - If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect number, say No. (If there are other alternatives, the phone will prompt you with the next one. You can also press the navigation key up or down to select the correct number from the Choice List.)
- 3. Compose your text message. For more information, see "To send a text message:" on page 87, beginning at step 6.

Send Email <Name>

Send Email <Name> lets you start composing email for any person in your Contacts.

To compose email using Voice Service:

- Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding (The phone will prompt you for a command.)
- Say "Send Email" followed by a name stored in your Contacts

Note: You must have an email address stored for this Contact.

- If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by the correct name, say Yes. (You can also select the correct address from those displayed on the screen by pressing on the correct number.)
- If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect name, say No. (If there are other alternatives, the phone will prompt you with the next one. You can also press the navigation key up or down to select the correct address from the Choice List.)
- 3. Compose your email message using the keypad. For more information, see "To send a text message:" on page 87, beginning at step 6.

Lookup <Name>

Lookup <Name> lets you retrieve contact information for any person in your Contacts by saying the full name of the person.

To retrieve information using Lookup <Name>:

- 1. Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding ... (The phone will prompt you for a command.)
- 2. Say "Lookup" followed by the name of the person, exactly as it is entered in your Contacts. (The phone will play the name it recognized through the speaker, and then open the contact information for that name.)

If the phone says, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect name, say No. The phone then prompts you with the next name, if there is one. If there are no more names, the phone will say "Sorry. No Match Found."

Go To <App>

You can open an application or access a menu by saying "Go To" followed immediately by the "destination," either an application or menu.

To see a list of possible destinations:

- Press and hold to activate voice recognition. (The phone prompts you to say a voice command.)
- 2. Say "Go To" by itself. A list of valid destinations is displayed and prompts you with "Please Choose." If the list is too long to fit on one screen, the screen displays "Next Menu." You can say the name of a destination, or say "Next Menu" to view the next screen.

Check < Item>

The voice recognition Status option gives you an update on your phone's service, signal strength, and battery level.

To retrieve your phone's status information:

- Press and hold to activate voice recognition. (The phone prompts you to say a voice command.)
- Say "Check" followed immediately by one of the following items:
 - Status: plays back and displays ALL status information.
 - Battery: plays back and displays the current level of battery charge.
 - Signal: plays back and displays current signal strength.
 - Network: plays back and displays the type of network coverage.
 - My phone #: plays back and displays your phone number.

Customizing Voice Service

Choice Lists

You can customize whether the Voice Service feature displays the list of top voice recognition choices or automatically dials the first number, without displaying a choice list.

To enable or disable choice lists for Voice Service:

- Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press for Voice Service.
- 3. Press **I** for **Choice Lists**.
- **4.** Press the navigation key up or down to select **Automatic**. Always On or Always Off and press .

Sensitivity

You can adjust your phone's sensitivity to sounds when listening for voice commands or names, making it require a more exact or less exact sound match before responding to your command.

To adjust your phone's Voice Service sensitivity:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Settings**.
- Press for Voice Service.
- 3. Press **game** for **Sensitivity**.
- 4. Press the navigation key up or down to select **Reject More** or **Reject Less** and press **B**.

If you select **Reject More**, your phone will require a more exact sound match and if you select Reject Less. your phone will require a less exact sound match.

Digit Dialing

Voice Dialing is speaker independent, which means that no initial training or adaptation is required. Some users with heavy accents or unusual voice characteristics may encounter difficulty in achieving high accuracy with speaker independent Voice Dialing. The Adapt Digits feature allows users to dramatically improve the digit accuracy through adaptation. Users who get acceptable digit recognition accuracy will gain no additional benefit performing the Adapt Digit adaptation.

After you adapt Voice Service, your phone will be customized to your voice. Other people may not be able to use Voice Service on your phone accurately unless they reset the phone to factory defaults.

Note: ONLY adapt Voice Service if the system is frequently misrecognizing your speech. You can always restore the system to its original factory setting.

Adaptation involves recording several digit sequences to teach the system your voice. The adaptation process takes about 3 minutes. Tips for adapting Voice Service:

- Perform the adaptation in a guiet place.
- Make sure you wait for the beep before starting to speak.
- Speak clearly, but say each digit sequence naturally.
- If you make a mistake while recording a sequence of digits, or
 if there is an unexpected noise that spoils the recording, you
 can say or select No when the prompt asks, "Did the recording
 sound OK?" You will then be prompted to re-record the
 sequence.

To adapt Voice Service to your voice:

- Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press **s** for **Voice Service**.
- 3. Press **f** for **Digit Dialing**.
- Press for Adapt Digits. (The phone displays the first digit sequence.)
- 5. When you are ready to start recording, press . (The phone prompts you to say the first sequence of digits.)
- 6. Wait for the beep, and then repeat the digits using a normal tone of voice. (The phone plays back your recording and asks you if the recording sounds "OK.")
 - If the recording sounds OK (no mistakes and no background noises), say Yes.
 - If you need to re-record the digits to fix any problems, say
 No. (The phone then prompts you to say the digits again.)
- 7. After confirming that the recording sounds OK, repeat the recording process with the next set of digits. In total, there are 10 sets of numbers. When you are finished with a full session, you will reach a screen that reads, "Adaptation Complete."

Note: It is recommended that you perform the complete adaptation of Voice Service at least once to achieve the maximum benefit of this feature. If a partial adaptation is performed, you can always return later and resume the process from the half way point.

Resetting Voice Service Adaptation

To erase any adaptation and reset Voice Service to its original state:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Settings**.
- Press for Voice Service.
- 3. Press **f** for **Digit Dialing**.
- 4. Press for Reset Digits.
- 5. Press the navigation key up or down to select **Yes** and press the left softkey for **OK**.

Sound

By default, your phone provides audio prompts such as "Please say a command". You can turn these prompts on or off.

To turn Voice Service prompts On or Off:

- Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press **s** for **Voice Service**.
- 3. Press for **Sound**.
- Press of for Prompts, for Digits, or for Names.

To modify your Voice Service prompts:

- Press , followed by for Settings.
- Press for Voice Service.
- 3. Press for **Sound**.

45 Voice Service

- 4. Press a for Name Settings.
- 5. Press image for Speed or for Volume.
- 6. Press the navigation key up or down to select the appropriate setting and press .

Voice Launch

Note: By default, the Voice Service feature is activated by pressing and holding . You can change your phone's settings to activate Voice Dialing whenever you open your phone.

To change your Voice Launch method:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Settings**.
- 2. Press for Voice Service.
- 3. Press for Voice Launch.
- 4. Press the navigation key up or down to select Talk Key or Talk Kev and Flip Open and press .

Main Menu

Menu Styles

Your phone can display the various features and options in one of two different menu styles, **3x4** (Black or White) and **List** (White only). By default, your handset is set to the 3x4 menu style (White).

Note: Key commands for the first menu level in the List style differ from those in this guide. For more information on changing the menu style between 3x4 and List, see "Changing the Phone's Menu Style" on page 48.

3x4 Style

3x4 style displays the first level menu choices with graphical icons arranged in a grid pattern. In other menu levels, choices are arranged in a vertical list.

- To navigate through a first level menu, simply press the navigation key in the direction towards your desired menu choice. The currently-highlighted menu choice is enlarged and has a text label beneath it. Once the desired menu option is highlighted, press
- You can also press the number corresponding to the menu choice. For example, if you want to send a text message:
 - 1. Press , followed by for Messaging.
 - 2. Press image for Send Message.

List Style

List style displays all the various menu choices in a vertical list. As you navigate through the menu, menu options are highlighted. You can use your navigation keys to scroll through menus quickly and easily. The scroll bar at the right of the menu keeps track of your position in the menu at all times.

- To navigate through a menu, simply press the navigation key up or down. If you are in a first-level menu, such as **Settings**, you may also navigate to the next menu by pressing the navigation key left or right.
- You can also press the number corresponding to the menu choice. For example, if you want to send a text message:
 - Press , followed by for Messaging.
 - Press Image for Send Message.

Changing the Phone's Menu Style

Your phone allows you to choose how the menu appears on your display screen.

To select the display's menu style:

- 1. Press ma for Menu.
- 2. Press the right softkey for **Options**.
- 3. Press **I** for **Menu Style**.
- Press the navigation key up or down to select 3x4 Black,
 3x4 White, or List White and press to save and exit.

Web

The Wireless Web

Your phone comes equipped with wireless Web access through your browser. You can view specially designed version of popular sites which includes sports, weather, news, stock quotes etc.. as well as downloadable ringtones, screen savers and games. When you launch the browser, the phone will connect to the Internet and the service indicator icon will display. Any time the service indicator icon is visible on the display, you are connected to the Internet and will be invoiced accordingly.

Note: Rates and pricing vary according to your service plan. Please contact your service provider for additional information.

Launching the Browser

Note: The first time you use the Browser, you will be prompted to go through a setup process that takes approximately three minutes.

To launch a web connection:

 Press , followed by for Web. You are connected to a home page provided by your carrier. If you had a previous web connection, the last page you visited will be displayed when you launch your browser. When this occurs, you may not see the "Connecting as..." message when you launch the session. Though the browser is open, you are not currently in an active data session - that is, no data is being sent or received. As soon as you navigate to another page, the active session will launch and you will see the "Connecting" message.

Web Connection Status and Indicators

Your phone's display lets you know the current status of your web connection through indicators which appear at the top of the screen. The following symbols are used:

- When the arrows are in a high-speed EV-DO coverage area. When the arrows are moving, data is being transferred over the EV-DO network. Incoming voice calls go directly to Voicemail; outgoing voice calls can be made, but the web connection will terminate.
- Your web connection is active using the 1X network (data is being transferred). The 1X network is not as quick as EV-DO. Incoming voice calls go directly to Voicemail; outgoing voice calls can be made, but the web connection will terminate.

Navigating the Wireless Web

Navigating through menus and Web sites during a web session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips for getting around:

Softkeys

When browsing the Web, the bottom line of your phone's display contains one or more softkeys. These keys are shortcut controls for navigating around the Web, and they correspond to the softkey buttons directly below the phone's display screen. Depending on which Web sites you visit, the labels on the softkeys may change to indicate their function.

To use softkeys, simply press the desired softkey button. If an additional pop-up menu appears when you press the softkey button, select the menu items using your keypad (if they're numbered) or by highlighting the option and pressing

Scrolling

As with other parts of your phone's menu, you'll have to scroll up and down to see everything on some Web sites.

 Press the navigation key up and down to scroll line by line or press the volume buttons on the side of the phone to scroll one page at a time.

Navigating Between Web Pages

Once you've learned how to use softkeys and scroll, you can start navigating Web sites.

 Select on-screen items by using the navigation key to highlight the desired item, then press the desired softkey button (or press).

You'll find that the left softkey • is used primarily for selecting items. This softkey is often labeled **OK** or **Go**.

 If the items on a page are numbered, you can use your keypad (number keys) to select an item. Links, which appear as <u>underlined text</u>, allow you to jump to different Web pages, select special functions, or even place phone calls.

 Select links by highlighting the link and then selecting the appropriate softkey.

Tip: The tenth item in a numbered list may be selected by pressing the key on your phone's keypad, even though the number 0 doesn't appear on the screen.

To go back one page, press on your phone. (Note that is also used like a BACKSPACE key to delete text.)

Using the Menu to Navigate

By pressing the Menu softkey, you can navigate between web pages. Press the **Menu** softkey and select one of the following options:

- 1. **Home** to return to the carrier's home page
- Forward one web page (if you have not returned back from a previous web page, this option is greved out)
- **3. Mark this page** to create a Bookmark
- 4. View Bookmarks to see your list of Bookmarks
- 5. **Search** takes you to a search engine
- Send page to embeds the current URL in a Pic/Video message that can be sent to others.
- 7. Go to URL to directly jump to a specific web page
- History to see a list of web pages you have browsed this session
- 9. Refresh this page reloads the current web page
- **10. More** displays the following options:

- Show URL to view the URL of your current webpage
- Restart Browser to reload your Browser and return to your home page
- Script Log shows any scripting errors that have occurred on the page
- About Browser to view information about your Mobile Browser
- Preferences to change your Mobile Browser preferences

Note: Scroll down the list to select Preferences.

Call History

Viewing History

You'll find the Call History feature very helpful. It is a list of the last 20 phone numbers (or Contacts entries) for calls you missed, made, or accepted. Call History makes redialing a number fast and easy. It is continually updated as new numbers are added to the beginning of the list and the oldest entries are removed from the bottom of the list

Each entry contains the phone number (if it is available) or the Contacts entry name (if the phone number is in your Contacts). Duplicate calls (same number and type of call) may only appear once on the list.

To view a Call History entry:

- Press . followed by for Call History.
 - Press for Outgoing Calls.
 - Press and for Incoming Calls.
 - Press for Missed Calls.
 - Press a for Recent Calls.
 - Press for Air Time.

Tip: You can also access your list of recent calls from the idle screen by pressing the makey.

Call History Options

After you access the Call History menu, press the right softkey for **Options** to select one of the following options for this entry:

Tip: You can also scroll between Call History entries by pressing the navigation key left or right.

Press the right softkey for **Options** to select one of the following options for this entry:

- Send Msg to send a text or picture message to this phone number.
- Save to create a new Contact for this phone number. (Appears only if this number is not already stored as a Contact.)
- Prepend to add a dialing prefix to the phone number prior to calling. (Appears only if this number is not already stored as a Contact.)
- Erase to erase this number from your Call History.
- Erase All to erase all entries.

Note: To view additional information about a call, highlight the call and press **3**. The hour and date of the call are displayed.

Making a Call From Call History

To place a call from Call History:

- Press , followed by for Call History.
- Select Outgoing Calls , Incoming Calls , Missed Calls , Recent Calls , or Air Time .
- Highlight the entry you want to call and press to dial the number.

Tip: When in the Idle screen, you can also press the **m** key to show your recent calls. Highlight the entry you want to call and press to dial the number.

Note: You cannot make calls from Call History to entries identified as Unknown or Restricted

Saving a Phone Number From Call History

Your phone can store up to 500 phone numbers. Each contact entry can store up to a total of five phone numbers (plus one email address), and each entry's name can contain up to 20 characters.

To save a phone number from Call History:

- 1. Press , followed by for Call History.
- 2. Select Outgoing Calls 🔤 Incoming Calls 💷 . Missed Calls , Recent Calls , or Air Time .
- 3. Highlight the entry you want to save and press the right softkey **o** for **Options**.
- 4. Press **save** the number. Follow the onscreen prompts to complete the entry. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 22.)

After you have saved the number, the new Contacts entry is displayed.

Note: You cannot save phone numbers already in your Contacts or from calls identified as Unknown ID or Restricted.

Erasing Call History

To erase a single call entry or to erase all entries within Call History:

- 1. Press , followed by for Call History.
- Select Outgoing Calls , Incoming Calls , Missed Calls , Recent Calls or Air Time .
- Highlight the entry you want to erase and press the right softkey for Options.
- Press to Erase the currently-highlighted entry or for Erase All.

Air Time

Air time allows you to check the time of the last call or the total air time since your phone was activated on the network. **These times are not meant for billing purposes.**

To view the air time:

- Press , followed by for Call History.
- 2. Press for Air Time.
- 3. Press image for Last Call or image for Total Calls.

Media Player

Media player gives you the ability to listen to audio clips and view video clips right from your phone's display. The content can either be streamed to your phone from your network provider's server, which allows you to stay up-to-date, or from your memory card to allow you to enjoy your collection of favorite media contents. The media content available for viewing or listening depends on your service provider. Content can be accessed in the following ways:

- Channel Listing displays all the audio or video channels available for you to listen to or view.
- Memory Card displays all the media content that is save on your memory card, if installed.
- My Play List displays content saved on your memory card.

Note: Files and playlists are not shared between the Media Player (Menu 3) and Music applications (Menu 6).

Channel Listing

To select and view a streamed channel:

- 1. Press , followed by for Media Player.
- 3. Navigate through the media content offered by your service provider using the navigation keys. Press or the left soft key **a** to make your selections.
- 4. Follow the on-screen instructions to purchase and play the desired media clip.

Memory Card

You can also watch programs that you have downloaded or otherwise transferred to your phone.

To watch a program saved on your memory card:

- 1. Press , followed by for Media Player.
- Highlight Memory Card and press . A list of programs appears.
- Select a program and press or press the left softkey for to begin playing.

Media Player Controls

The Media Player works with the phone both open and closed.

When the phone is open:

- Press to play or pause the current track.
- Press the right navigation key to skip to the next song in the current playlist.
- Press the left navigation key to skip to the previous song in the current playlist.
- Press the up navigation key to display all the tracks in the current playlist. Press up or down using the navigation keys to move through the list and press or to select a song.
- Press the down navigation key to change the play mode between shuffle (SFL), one time or repeat.
- lacktriangle Use the side volume keys lacktriangle to adjust song volume.

- Press the right softkey for Options to access one of the following:
 - Channel Listing to display streamable channels.
 - Media Listing to display all the clips stored on your memory card.
 - Visual Effect to change the on-screen visualizer.
 - Bluetooth to route the audio output to either the Phone or to a connected **Bluetooth Device**. If you are using a Bluetooth-enabled headset, it must be stereo. Other headset types will not work. For more information on pairing and connecting a Bluetooth device, see "Pairing Bluetooth Devices" on page 75.
 - Info to return to the main player menu
 - Exit to exit the Media Player.

Note: During a streaming session, the navigation keys are not used. Only the center key is used for play and pause.

When the phone is closed:

- When a media clip from the memory card is playing, press the camera key () to bring up the menu and use the volume
 - key to highlight one of the following functions and then press the camera key | to:
 - play or pause the current media clip
 - skip 10 seconds ahead
 - go back 10 seconds

- hide the menu
- When a media clip from the memory card is not playing, press and hold the camera key () to bring up the menu and use the volume key $\ \ \ \$ to highlight one of the following functions and then press the camera key | to select:
 - Camera: to start the camera.
 - **Music**: to open the Music Store application. For more information, see "Music" on page 79.

Note: The music client does not have external key support when a song is being played from the Music store application.

> open the Mv Favorites folder. For more information, see "My Play List" on page 71.

My Play List

You can create and use play lists to organize the media clips that you have stored on your memory card.

When you attempt to open a newly created play list for the first time, you will receive the following prompt,

"There is no content in My Play List, Copy from Media"

Select **Yes** if you have media clips in the Media folder on your memory card that you want to add to My Favorites (the default play list automatically created in My Play List). The contents of the memory card Media folder will then be listed so you can select and add the clips you want added to the default play list (My Favorites).

To add files to the play list again, at a later date, you must select the play list and press the left soft key for **Options**, and use the **Add** New feature.

To create a play list:

- 1. Press , followed by for Media Player.
- 2. Highlight My Play List and press
- 3. Press the right softkey for New Play List.
- 4. Enter a name for your play list and press the left softkey for **Done**.
- 5. Highlight a media clip that you wish to add and press to check/uncheck it. When you are finished, press the left softkey **a** for **Done**.
- 6. Select a media clip and press media to begin playing. For more information, see "Media Player Controls" on page 69.

To start a play list:

- Press _____. followed by _____ for Media Player.
- 2. Highlight My Play List and press 📟 . A list of play lists appears.
- 3. Select a play list and press **a** to begin playing. For more information, see "Media Player Controls" on page 69.

Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range communications technology that allows you to connect wirelessly to a number of Bluetooth devices, such as mono or stereo headsets, hands-free car kits, and Bluetooth-enabled handhelds, PCs, printers, and wireless phones. The Bluetooth communication range is usually up to approximately 10 meters (30 feet).

Note: There are many Bluetooth devices in the market whose compatibility with the SPH-m500 cannot be guaranteed.

Enable

By default, your device's Bluetooth functionality is turned off.

To turn Bluetooth on or off:

- 1. Press , followed by for Bluetooth.
- 2. Press **l** for **Enable**.
- 3. Select **On** or **Off** and press **....**.

Bluetooth Status Indicators

The following icons show your Bluetooth connection status at a glance:

- Bluetooth is active.
- Bluetooth is connected to a device.

Visibility

The Visibility setting allows you to manage your availability to other Bluetooth devices.

To configure your phone's visibility (discoverability) to other Bluetooth devices:

- 1. Press , followed by for Bluetooth.
- 2. Press **for Visibility**.
- 3. Select your desired Visibility setting and press :
 - Always Visible to allow other Bluetooth devices to detect and identify your phone.
 - Visible for 3 min to allow other devices three minutes before changing your status to hidden.
 - **Hidden** to prevent other Bluetooth devices from detecting and identifying your phone.

Device Name

Your phone's Bluetooth name will appear to other in-range Bluetooth devices, depending on your Visibility settings.

To change your Bluetooth name for your phone:

- Press , followed by for Bluetooth.
- Press for Device Name.
- 3. Press and hold **to clear the current name**
- 4. Use your keypad to enter a new name and press less to save and exit

Tip: Give your handset an easily-recognized name so other people can select your handset quickly in environments where multiple Bluetooth devices are visible.

Exchange FTP Folder

You can designate which folder files are transferred over using the Bluetooth connection.

To set your Bluetooth FTP folder:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Bluetooth**.
- 2. Press a for Exchange FTP Folder.
- Using the navigation keys, scroll through your phone's folder structure to the desired folder.
- 4. When you are finished, press the left softkey 🚭 for Set.

For information on how to transfer files to and from your phone, see "Mass Storage" on page 103.

Pairing Bluetooth Devices

Paired Devices

The Bluetooth pairing process allows you to establish trusted connections between your phone and another Bluetooth device. When devices are paired, a passkey is shared between devices, allowing for fast, secure connections while bypassing the discovery and authentication process.

To pair your phone with another Bluetooth device:

1. Press , followed by for Tools.

- Press for Bluetooth.
- 3. If no devices are currently listed, press the left softkey for **Add New**. Otherwise press the right softkey for **Options** and select **Add New**.
- Select Search and press ... Your phone displays a list of discovered in-range Bluetooth devices.
- Select the device you wish to pair with and press the left softkey for Add to List.
- 6. Enter the passkey and press 📰 .
- The name of the Bluetooth device is displayed. Press the left softkey for **Done**.
- Highlight the device and press the left softkey for Connect. Connection Successful will display if the device is connected properly.

Waiting for Pairing

If you are going to be using a Dial-Up Network (DUN) profile to pair with a PC or PDA, you will need to allow the other device to initiate pairing with your phone.

To allow your phone to be paired with another Bluetooth device:

- 1. Press , followed by for Tools.
- Press for Bluetooth.
- 3. If no devices are currently listed, press the left softkey for Add New. Otherwise press the right softkey for Options and select Add New.
- Select Always Visible or Visible for 3min and press .
 For information on these options, see "Visibility" on page 74.

- 6. Enter the passkey and press 📰 .
- Follow the on screen prompts to enter your passkey and press .
- Highlight the device you wish to connect to and press the left softkey for Connect. Connection Successful will display if the device is connected properly.

Note: The stereo Bluetooth headset only supports voice calls, and listening to music stored on the memory card. Streaming content and video is not supported. The mono Bluetooth headset will only support voice calls.

Missed Alerts

The Missed Alerts screen shows you a list of events that you have missed while busy working on other high priority work. The Missed Alerts screen serves as a centralized location so you don't have to go through different menus to check for missed calls, unheard voice mail or unread messages, etc.

The Missed Alerts screen appears whenever you flip open your phone and you have unviewed Missed Alerts. You can also view your alerts by going to the Missed Alerts menu.

To view your Missed Alerts:

 Press , followed by for Missed Alerts. A list of all your missed alerts is displayed.

Missed Alerts options

Using the navigation keys, highlight the desired alert and select one of the following:

- to view more details about the alert, press **\equiv**. Viewing the alert will delete it from the Missed Alerts list
- if the alert is a call, press the left softkey at to Call the person back.
- if the alert is a text or pic/video message, press the left softkey
 - to **View** the message.
- to delete an alert without viewing it, press the right softkey for **Dismiss**.

Music

Music is an application that provides a searchable catalog of music that can be previewed and purchased and downloaded to your phone. Once downloaded, you can use the phone's built-in player to listen to the music. As new features are being rolled out by your service provider, the Music application can be updated over the air.

Note: Files and playlists are not shared between the Media Player (Menu 3) and Music applications (Menu 6).

Music Store

You can use the Music Store to download songs to the memory card. When you start the Music application, the Music Store is automatically loaded.

To download songs from the Music Store:

- Press , followed by for Music. The Music Store is displayed.
- Follow the onscreen instructions to download songs or other audio tracks. A service charge may apply.

Music Player

The Music player can play songs that are stored in your phone.

To start the music player:

- Press , followed by for Music. The Music Store is displayed.
- 2. Press the right navigation key to select the Player tab.
- Select either All My Music or a desired playlist and press .

To exit the music player:

Press . When the phone prompts you to confirm, highlight

With your new, web-enabled phone, you have access to a variety of services such as downloadable Games. Ringers, and Screen Savers. While each type of download involves a different file type, the basic method for accessing and downloading files is the same.

Games

You can play a variety of entertaining and graphically rich games on your phone. Two demo games are pre-installed on your phone. New games are easy to download and play.

Downloading Games

- 1. Press , followed by for **Downloads**.
- Highlight Games and press _____.
- 3. Highlight **Get New Games** and press **.** The browser will launch and take you to the Games download menu.
- 4. Use your navigation key to highlight and select a game you wish to download. (For more information on navigating the Web, see "Navigating the Wireless Web" on page 60.)
- 5. Follow the web page instructions to complete your purchase.

Note: You may store a limited number of downloaded games on your phone, depending on the file sizes.

Playing Games

To play a pre-installed or downloaded game on your phone:

- 3. Highlight Get New Applications and press . The browser will launch and take you to the application download menu.
- 4. Use your navigation key to highlight and select an application you wish to download. (For more information on navigating the Web, see "Navigating the Wireless Web" on page 60.)
- 5. Follow the web page instructions to complete your purchase.

Note: You may store a limited number of downloaded applications on your phone, depending on the file sizes.

Messaging

Now you can exchange text and multimedia messages right from your phone and stay connected without saying a word. Within the Messaging menu you can also view the number of Voicemail messages you have waiting for you.

The following folders are available in the Messaging menu:

- Send Message allows you to send text or Pic/Video messages.
- Text Message allows you to check your Inbox and manage the text messages stored in the folders in your handset.
- Pic/Video Msg allows you to check your Inbox and manage the Pic/Video messages stored in the folders in your handset.
- Voicemail allows you to view or listen to any voice messages saved in the phone.
- Web Alert allows you to receive an alert that a new web message is available.
- Settings allows you to configure the messaging options.

Text Messaging

Using Text Messaging

With Text Messaging, you can send instant text messages from your phone to their messaging-ready phone or to their e-mail account and they can send messages to you. When you receive a new message, vou'll automatically be notified with a one-way text message.

In addition, messaging includes a variety of pre-set messages, such as "I'm running late, I'm on my way," that make composing messages fast and easy.

To send a text message:

- Press , followed by for Messaging.
- 2. Press image for Send Message.
- 3. Using the navigation keys, select **Text** and press **____**.
- Using the navigation keys, select either the Contacts, Mobile #, or Email box and press .
 - if you selected Contacts, scroll through your Contacts list and press to check/uncheck desired recipients. When you are finished, press the left softkey for Done.
 - if you selected Mobile # or Email, enter the recipient's phone number or email address and press

Tip: The recipients of the message appear in the lower half of the screen. If you wish to send your text message to multiple numbers or addresses, repeat step 4. You can send a text message to a maximum of 10 numbers.

- Press the left softkey
 for Next.
- 6. Enter your message using the keypad. If you wish to change your text message options, press the right softkey for Options and select one of the following:
 - **T9** changes the text entry mode to T9. For more information, see page 33.
 - Alpha changes the text entry mode to Alphabet. For more information, see page 34.

- Symbol changes the text entry mode to Symbol. For more information, see page 35.
- Number changes the text entry mode to Numbers.
- Preset Msg allows you to choose one of a list of Preset messages.
- Recent Msg allows you to choose a recent text message as a template.
- Emoticons allows you to add emoticons such as:) to your message.
- Text Options allows you to access the following options:
 - Auto Capital: when on, capitalizes the first word of a sentence.
 - Used word Dic.: when on, adds the words used to the phone's dictionary.
 - Display Cand.: when on and you are in T9 Mode, displays possible word choices on the screen.
 - Prediction Start: sets the number of letters required to activate the Display Candidate feature.
 - Dual Language: when on and you are in T9 Mode, displays choices from both the English and French dictionaries.
 - Insert Space: when on, adds a space after you select a word in T9 Mode.
- 7. Press the left softkey for **Next** when finished.
- 8. Press the left softkey to **Send**. If you wish to change your text message options, press the right softkey for **Options** and select one of the following:
 - Edit allows you to reenter the message recipients and the message.

- Priority allows you to set the priority level between Normal and Urgent.
- Call Back # allows you to enter or omit a call back number in your message.
- Save to Drafts stores a copy of the text message in your Drafts folder.

To read and Reply to a Text Message:

When you receive a text message, you will see "New Text Message" on your display screen.

To reply to the text message:

- While the message is open, select the left softkey for Reply.
- 2. Compose your reply, or use a pre-composed messages.
 - To type a message, use your keypad to enter text. Use the right softkey to select a character input mode.
 - To use pre-written messages, press the right softkey for **Options**, followed by for **Preset Msg**. Press the corresponding number on the keypad to enter the preset message response.
- 3. Press the left softkey for **Next** when finished.
- 4. Press the left softkey **a** to **Send**.

Note: The last preset message used automatically moves to the top of the list when you send a new message.

Erasing Text Messages

To erase messages:

- 1. Press , followed by for Messaging.
- Select for Text Message.
- 3. Press Importantes.
- **4.** Press the right softkey **....**, followed by:
 - for Erase. Using the navigation keys select Erase. This to delete the currently highlighted message, Erase **Read** to delete all read messages, or **Erase All** to delete
 - Image: for Erase Multiple. Scroll through your list of messages and press **and** to check or uncheck messages you want to erase. When you are finished, press the left softkey **f** for **Erase**.

Pic/Video Msg

Your phone lets you take pictures, view them using the phone's display, and instantly send them to your friends and family. In addition to sending your pictures to friends and family, you can send them to a Picture Messages Web site for storage.

Sending Picture/Video Messages from your Phone

- Press , followed by for Messaging.
- Press Image for Send Message.
- 3. Using the navigation keys, select **Pic/Video Msg** and press 📰 .

Note: If you have not registered and configured this feature, you will be prompted to do so. Follow the instructions on screen, then continue with this procedure.

- Using the navigation keys, select either the Contacts, Mobile #, or Email box and press .
 - if you selected **Contacts**, scroll through your Contacts list and press to check/uncheck desired recipients. When you are finished, press the left softkey for **Done**.
 - if you selected Mobile # or Email, enter the recipient's phone number or email address and press

Tip: The recipients of the message appear in the lower half of the screen. If you wish to send your text message to multiple numbers or addresses, repeat step 4. You can send a text message to a maximum of 10 numbers.

- 5. Press the left softkey for Next.
- **6.** Using the navigation keys select:
 - In Phone or Memory Card to send a picture already that is already saved. Use the navigation keys to highlight a picture and press ______. A checkmark appears beside the picture. You can select more than one picture. Once you have finished selecting all the pictures you wish to send press the left softkey ______ for Next.
 - Select Take New Picture to take a new picture prior to sending your message. For more information on taking a picture, see "Taking Pictures" on page 119.
 - Select Take New Video to take a new video prior to sending your message.

- Select **Text Only** to make your message text only. Although this message is text only, it is not sent as a simple text message (SMS), and the receiver will receive the message differently depending on his or her phone's capability.
- 7. When you have finished entering all the desired destinations, press the left softkey **and** for **Next**.
 - If you wish to add a subject to your picture message. highlight Subi: and press the right softkey for Add. Enter your text and press the left softkey **and** for **Next**.
 - If you wish to add text to your picture message, highlight **Text:** and press the right softkey **n** for **Add**. Enter your text and press the left softkey **and** for **Next**.
 - If you wish to add an audio clip, highlight Audio: and press the right softkey **m** for **Record**. From the Add Voice Memo screen, press the left softkey for **Record** to record your message. When finished, press the left softkey **and** for **Done**.
- 8. Press the left softkey for **Send**.

Voicemail

Setting Up Your Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to your Voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. Therefore, you will want to set up your Voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.

To set up vour Voicemail:

1. Press and hold Im.

2. Follow the system prompts to create your passcode, record your greeting, and record your name announcement.

Note: You must request this feature from your service provider for it to work correctly.

Note: The Voicemail setup process may vary in certain Affiliate areas.

Voicemail Notification

There are several ways your phone alerts you of a new message:

- By displaying a message on the screen.
- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By displaying \(\square\) at the top of your screen.

New Voicemail Message Alerts

When you receive a new voice message, your phone alerts you and prompts you to call your Voicemail.

To call your Voicemail:

Press and hold

To display your Missed Calls:

Press
 (s), followed by
 (s).

Important: When you are roaming off the network, you may not receive notification of new Voicemail messages. It is recommended that you periodically check your Voicemail by dialing 1 + area code + your Phone Number. When your Voicemail answers, press 📰 and enter your passcode. You will be charged roaming rates when accessing Voicemail while roaming off the network.

Note: Your phone accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, you are only notified of new messages when your phone is turned on and you are in a Service Area.

Retrieving Your Voicemail Messages

You can review your messages directly from your phone or from any other touch-tone phone. To dial from your phone, you can either speed dial your Voicemail or use the menu keys.

Using One-Touch Message Access

Press and hold
 Follow the system prompts.

Using the Menu Keys on Your Phone to Access Your Messages

- 1. Press , followed by for Messaging.
- 2. Press for Voicemail.
- 3. Press to call the Voicemail server.

Note: You may be charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your Voicemail from your phone.

Clearing the Message Icon

Your phone may temporarily continue to display the message icon after you have checked your voice and text messages.

To clear the icon from the display screen:

- 1. Press , followed by for Messaging.
- 2. Press I for Voicemail.
- 3. Press for Clear Envelope.
- 4. Press the navigation key up to select **Yes** and press **.** .

Web Alert

Your phone is capable of receiving web alerts from online providers. Consult with your Service Provider for more details.

To access your web alerts:

- Press , followed by for Messaging.
- Press for Web Alert.
- 3. Follow the on-screen instructions.

Settings

There are several options associated with voice mail, text and pic/video messaging. The Settings menu allows you to customize the options to fit your preferences.

To access the Settings menu:

- 1. Press , followed by for Messaging.
- Press for Settings.

General

General settings affect voice mail, text and pic/video messages.

- Notification: Allows you to configure whether new messages will appear with a pop-up message or with an icon.
- Preset Messages: Allows you to edit or change the default prewritten messages.
- Message Alert: Allows you to configure the Volume, Type, and Reminder settings for Message Alerts.
- Auto-Erase: If this option is On, old messages are automatically deleted from the mail boxes when they become full. This allows the new messages to be added to a full mail box without having to manually delete old messages to free up space first.

Notification

To change the display pop-up option:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press **lim** for **General**.
- 2. Press Important for Notification.
- 3. Select Message & Icon or Icon only using the navigation key and press **a** to select.

Preset Messages

Preset messages are used to enter common responses to questions often received in text messages. A preset message can be selected and automatically entered into the message. Preset messages can also be changed to whatever you want by editing the pre-set entries already stored in your phone.

To edit a preset message:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press im for **General**.
- 2. Press for Preset Messages.
- Press the navigation key up or down to highlight the desired message or available entry and press to edit.
- 4. Press and hold to erase the message. Enter your new message or edit the existing one and press to save.

Note: When you send a message using Preset Messages, the last message selected automatically displays as the first choice when sending a new message.

Message Alert

The Message Alert menu allows you to configure the volume and message reminder default settings for your messages.

To set the volume:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press **lea** for **General**.
- Press for Message Alert.
- 3. Press **I** for **Volume**.
- 4. Press:
 - Image for Voicemail
 - **Image** for **Text Message**
 - for Pic/Video Msg
- Use the navigation keys to select the desired volume level and press sale to save.
- **6.** When you are finished, press the left softkey **a** for **Done**.

To set the ringer type:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press Implies for **General**.
- 2. Press for Message Alert.
- 3. Press **f** for **Type**.
- 4. Press:
 - Image for **Voicemail**
 - for Text Message
 - for Pic/Video Msg
- 5. Press the navigation key left or right to select between Single Tones, Ring Tones, Melodies, or Downloads and press 📻.
- **6.** Press the navigation key down to preview the first ringer. Press left or right to preview the other ringers associated with the ringer group selected. When finished, press press to save the desired ringer.

To set the message reminder option:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press **l** for **General**.
- 2. Press **f** for **Message Alert**.
- 3. Press **s** for **Reminder**.
- 4. Press the navigation key up or down to select the desired duration and press **a** to select.

Auto-Erase

This option allows you to automatically delete old messages when the memory becomes full. This prevents new messages from being rejected due to the Inbox being full.

To turn this option On or Off:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press ig for **General**.
- Press for Auto-Erase.
- Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No and press to select.

Text Message

Text Message settings only affect text messages.

- Save In Outbox: If this option is On, a copy of the message is automatically saved in the Outbox after being sent.
- Priority: Allows you to configure the default Priority level for your text message.
- Call Back #: Allows you to change the default call-back number for your text message.
- Edit Signature: If the option is On, your signature will be appended to each message you send.

Save in Outbox

This allows you to save a copy of the outgoing text message in the outbox.

To turn this option On or Off:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press **for Text Message**.
- 2. Press Image for Save in Outbox.
- Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No and press to select.

Priority

There are two priority levels associated with text messaging. They are:

- Normal: this option sends the message as normal with regular delivery.
- Urgent: this option sends the message at the highest level and alerts the recipient that it is urgent.

This setting allows you to select the default priority level when creating new messages.

To select the priority level:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press for **Text Message**.
- 2. Press **for Priority**.
- Select Normal or Urgent using the navigation key and press to select.

Call Back Number

This option allows you to enter a call back number that is automatically attached to your outgoing messages.

To access the call back number option:

1. In the Settings menu, press **for Text Message**.

- 2. Press for Call Back #.
- Use the navigation key to highlight None, your mobile directory number or Other for a different phone number and press .
- 4. For the Other call back #, enter the number using the keypad and press sale to save.

Edit Signature

The Edit Signature menu allows you to create a signature of up to 15 characters that is automatically appended to all your text messages.

To edit your signature, or to turn signatures on or off:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press for **Text Message**.
- Press for Edit Signature.
- Press the navigation key up or down to highlight On or Off and press .
- 4. If signatures are on, your current signature is now displayed. Press and hold to erase the signature. Enter your new signature or edit the existing one using the keypad and press the left softkey or to save.

Alerts setup

This menu allows you to set your phone to automatically connect to the Internet to receive WebAlerts.

- 1. In the Settings menu, press 🕶 for Alerts Setup.
- Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No and press to select.

Voice Mail

This menu allows you to change your voice mail number.

To change your voice mail number:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press a for Voice Mail #.
- Enter the new voice mail # and press the left softkey for Save.

To change your voice mail back to the default voice mail:

- 1. In the Settings menu, press a for Voice Mail #.
- Use the navigation key to highlight the default number and press _____.

Tools

Mass Storage

You can connect your phone to your personal computer using a USB data cable, using your phone as a portable disk drive.

Connect to PC

You must insert a memory card into the phone in order to connect the phone to a computer.

To transfer files between your phone and your computer:

- 1. Connect your phone to the data cable.
- 2. Connect the data cable to your computer.
- 3. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 4. Press **I** for **Mass Storage**.
- Press for Connect to PC. The phone now appears as a removable disk on your computer.

Warning: Call is disabled when the device is connected as a mass storage device.

Using your computer's navigation systems, transfer your files between the computer and the phone.

Warning: Do not disconnect the phone from the data cable while transferring files! Please follow proper shutdown procedure for removable storage device to avoid file corruption.

- When you are finished transferring files, press the left softkey for Done. Highlight Yes and press to confirm
- 8. It is now safe to remove the phone from the data cable.

File Manager

You can view and manage the files stored on your phone. Your phone can include any of the following folders that are used by different applications:

- **DCIM**: stores your photos and videos.
- BLUETOOTH: default storage location for FTP transfer. If you
 wish to transfer photos or music files from your computer to
 your phone via Bluetooth, then you should change the
 Exchange FTP Folder (see page 75 for more details).
- MEDIA: used by the MediaPlayer application. If you transfer music or video files from your computer to your phone to be played by the MediaPlayer application, you should place them here.
- Music: used by the Music application. If you transfer music files from your computer to your phone to be played by the Music application, you should place them here.

Note: there is no moving of files from one folder to another folder via the phone UI. If you need to move files, connect the phone to your computer via the data cable and use the **Connect to PC** application.

- Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press Image for Mass Storage.
- 3. Press **for File Manager**.

- 4. Using the navigation keys, highlight **Phone** or **Memory Card** and press **.**
- 5. Navigate through your phone's menu tree to the desired file.
 - To erase a file, highlight the file to be deleted, and press the right softkey for **Options**, followed by for **Erase**.
 - If the file is viewable or playable on your phone, press lo view/play. Not all files can be viewed or played.

Note: The file manager is capable of viewing Microsoft Office, pdf and text files, but is limited based on file size and complexity of content. Specific file types such as music, video and photos have to be in the correct folder (as described above) for the application to play correctly.

Format

Use this menu to format a memory card that has been inserted into the card slot. Your handset is capable of supporting memory cards with a maximum memory of 1 GB.

To format an inserted memory card:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 2. Press **I** for **Mass Storage**.
- 3. Press for Format.
- 4. Enter your lock code.

Tip: If you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of either your Social Insurance Number or Mobile Directory Number or try 0000. If none of these work, call Customer Service at 1-800-Samsung.

Highlight Yes and press . Your memory card will now be formatted

Note: Do not remove your memory card while it is being formatted.

Memory Info.

To view the amount of storage space used on your phone:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 2. Press Image for Mass Storage.
- 3. Press a for Memory Info...
- 4. Using the navigation keys, highlight ALL, Phone or Card and press . The amount of storage space used and available is displayed on-screen.
- 5. When you are finished, press the left soft key a for **Done.**

Voice Memo

You can use your phone to record brief memos to remind you of important events, phone numbers, or other items.

Recording Voice Memos

To record a voice memo:

- 1. Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press **s** for **Voice Memo**.

- 3. Press for **Record**. (The phone prompts you to start recording after the beep.)
- 4. Wait for the beep and then start speaking. (As it is recording, the phone displays a countdown timer that shows how many seconds are left for recording.)
 - Press the left softkey to **Pause** the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the left softkey again to **Resume** recording.)
- 5. To finish recording, press or the right softkey for Finish.

To record a conversation during a phone call:

- 1. During a call, press the right softkey a for **Options**.
- Press for Voice Memo. (As it is recording, the phone displays a countdown timer that shows how many seconds are left for recording.)
 - Press the left softkey to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the left softkey again to Resume recording.)
- 3. Press the right softkey for **Done** to end the recording prior to the countdown completion.

Note: A total of 10 minutes in 10 separate memos can be recorded and saved. Individual memos can record up to 60 seconds of audio.

Reviewing and Erasing Memos

To play the voice memos you have recorded:

1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.

- 2. Press **g** for **Voice Memo**.
- Press for Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)

Press the number corresponding to the memo you want to review. (The phone replays the memo.)

Press the left softkey • to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the left softkey • again to Resume playing.)

To erase an individual memo:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- Press for Voice Memo.
- Press for Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
- 4. Select the memo to erase.
- Press the right softkey for Options followed by for Erase.
- 6. Press the navigation key up to select **Yes** and press **...**.

To erase all voice memos:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 2. Press **g** for **Voice Memo**.
- 3. Press **g** for **Erase** All.

Planner

Your Planner helps organize your time and reminds you of important events. You can schedule events for either the current day, or a specific calendar date.

There are four options available in the Planner:

- Today: shows events that are scheduled for today. You can create new events for later in the day.
- Scheduler: shows a monthly calendar, highlighting days with scheduled events. You can create new events for future dates.
- Task List: a to-do list, with optional priority settings and due dates.
- Countdown: Countdown allows you to enter a future date and time into the phone and then see the amount of days, hours, and minutes until that time is reached.

Today

To add an event to today's schedule:

- Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press for Planner.
- 3. Press **I** for **Today**.
- 4. Press the left softkey af for Add New.
- 5. Enter the event description using the keypad and press the left softkey for **Next**.

- Set the event details using the navigation keys. Press up and down to move between options and press left and right to change the currently-highlighted options.
 - Event Type: Choose between Personal, Business, Appointment, Birthday, or Vacation.
 - Reminder: Choose between No Alarm, On Time, 10 min before, 30 min before or 1 Hr before.
 - Recurrence: Choose between Once, Daily, Weekly, Monthly or Yearly.
 - Alarm Type: Choose a ringer type for the alarm.
 - Start: Enter the starting time and date using the keypad.
 Use the right softkey to toggle between AM and PM.
 - End: Enter the end time and date using the keypad. Use the right softkey to toggle between AM and PM.
 - go to Contact: Press lo display a list of your Contacts. Scroll down to the desired Contact entry and press lo when the scheduled event occurs, this entry will be displayed onscreen, making the person convenient to contact.
- When you are finished with the event details, press the left softkey for Done.

Scheduler

To add an event for a specific calendar date:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 2. Press for Planner.
- 3. Press **see** for **Scheduler**.
- 4. Using the navigation keys, scroll to the desired date.

- 5. Press the left softkey a for View.
- Press the left softkey for Add New.
- Enter the event description using the keypad and press the left softkey for Next.
- Set the event details using the navigation keys. Press up and down to move between options and press left and right to change the currently-highlighted options.
 - Event Type: Choose between Personal, Business, Appointment, Birthday, or Vacation.
 - Reminder: Choose between No Alarm, On Time, 10 min before, 30 min before or 1 Hr before.
 - Recurrence: Choose between Once, Daily, Weekly, Monthly or Yearly.
 - Alarm Type: Choose a ringer type for the alarm.
 - Start: Enter the starting time and date using the keypad.
 Use the right softkey ____ to toggle between AM and PM.
 - End: Enter the end time and date using the keypad. Use the right softkey to toggle between AM and PM.
 - go to Contact: Press lo display a list of your Contacts. Scroll down to the desired Contact entry and press lower will be displayed onscreen, making the person convenient to contact.
- When you are finished with the event details, press the left softkey for Done.

Task List

You can create and view a list of tasks.

To add a task:

- Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press for Planner.
- 3. Press **s** for **Task List**.
 - If you have no events currently scheduled for today, then the New Task menu is automatically displayed.
 - If you have one or more events scheduled for today, they are displayed. Press the left softkey for Add New.
- 4. Enter the task description using the keypad and press the left softkey for Next.
- Press the navigation keys left or right to select a Low or High priority.
- Enter the Due Time and Date using the keypad. (Press the right softkey to toggle between AM and PM.)
- 7. Press the left softkey **a** for **Done**.

To view a task:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 2. Press for Planner.
- 3. Press see for Task List.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to scroll to the desired task and press a to view the task details.

To delete one or more tasks:

- 1. Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press for Planner.
- Press for Task List. If you wish to delete a specific task, highlight it using the navigation keys.
- 4. Press the right softkey **n** for **Options**.
- Press to Erase the highlighted task or for Erase All.
- Highlight Yes with the navigation key and press to confirm.

Countdown

To set up a new countdown:

- 1. Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press for Planner.
- 3. Press for Countdown.
 - If there are no existing countdowns, the New Countdown screen is automatically displayed.
 - If you have one or more composed memos, they are displayed. Press the left softkey for Add New.
- **4.** Enter a name using the keypad and press **...**
- 5. Enter the time and date values and press the left softkey for **Done**.

To view a countdown:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 2. Press for Planner.

- 3. Press a for Countdown.
- Press the navigation key up or down to highlight the desired countdown and press to view.

Tip: When viewing an existing countdown, press the navigation key left or right to cycle between the other countdown entries.

Viewing Events

To view your scheduled events:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 2. Press 5 for Planner.
- 3. Press image for Today or image for Scheduler.
- 4. If you selected , use the navigation keys to scroll to the desired date and press the left softkey for View.

Erasing a Day's Events

To delete an individual event:

- 1. View the day from which you wish to erase the event.
- 2. Press the right softkey **n** for **Options**.
- Press for to Erase the current event or to Erase All events.
- 4. Highlight **Yes** using the navigation key and press **to** confirm.

Erasing All Events in your Scheduler

To delete all scheduled events:

- 1. Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press sam for Planner.
- 3. Press **g** for **Scheduler**.
- **4.** Press the right softkey **n** for **Options**.
- 5. Press for Erase All.
- Highlight Yes with the navigation key and press less to confirm.

Memo Pad

Your phone comes with a memo pad you can use to compose and store reminders and notes to help keep you organized.

To compose a memo:

- Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press for Memo Pad.
 - If you have no memos composed, then the New Memo menu is automatically displayed.
 - If you have one or more composed memos, they are displayed. Press the left softkey for Add New.
- Enter up to 160 characters in the memo using the keypad and press the left softkey for OK.

To view a memo:

- 1. Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press **f** for **Memo Pad**.

Use the navigation keys to scroll to the desired memo and press to view the memo details.

To delete saved memos:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 2. Press for Memo Pad.
- Highlight the memo you wish to delete using the navigation keys.
- 4. Press the right softkey **n** for **Options**.
- Press to Erase the highlighted memo or to Erase All memos.
- Highlight Yes with the navigation key and press at confirm.

World Time

World Time displays what time it is in different time zones around the world together with one or more major cities, states, regions, or countries in a time zone.

To access world time:

- Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press for World Time.
- Press the navigation key left, right, up, or down to display the different time zones.
- Press the left softkey for DST Setting to turn Daylight Savings Time (DST) On or Off.

Note: Your handset does not automatically turn DST on or off based upon the calendar date. Not all countries within a time zone may use DST.

Using the Alarm Clock

Your phone comes with a built-in alarm clock with multiple alarm times.

To use the alarm clock:

- Press , followed by for Tools.
- 2. Press for Alarm Clock.
- 3. Press 💹 , 📨 , or 📰 to select an Alarm.
- 4. Press the navigation key left or right and select **On** or **Off**.
- Press the navigation key down once and enter the alarm time.
- Press the navigation key down once to select the desired ringer. (Cycle through the ringers by pressing the navigation key left or right.)
- Press the navigation key down once to select the alarm frequency.
- 8. Press the navigation key left or right and select one of the following options:
 - DailyMon to Fri
 - OnceSat & Sun

- Press the navigation key down once to select Snooze Interval. Press the navigation key left or right and select the desired interval.
- 10. Press the left softkey for **Done**.

Calculator

Your phone comes with a built-in calculator.

To use the calculator:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Tools**.
- 2. Press for Calculator
- Enter a number with the keypad. (Use to insert a decimal point and/or to make the number negative or positive.)
- **4.** Use your navigation key to select a mathematical function:
 - Left to Subtract
 - Right to Add
 - Up to Multiply
 - Down to Divide
- Enter the next number using the keypad. Repeat steps 4 and 5 as necessary.
- 6. Press me to view the results.

Pics/Videos

Camera

Taking Pictures

Taking pictures with your phone's built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens, and pressing a button. You can activate camera mode and take pictures whether the phone is open or closed.

To take a picture with the phone open:

- 1. Press , followed by for Pics/Videos.
- 2. Press 📠 for Camera.

Shortcut: To activate camera mode, you can also press and hold the side camera button (see illustration on page 3).

Using the phone's main LCD as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject. To zoom in or out, press the up and down navigation keys.

Note: Depending on your picture resolution, zoom levels may not be available.

4. Press either the left softkey for **Capture**, or the side camera button () until the shutter sounds. (Make sure the camera is steady.)

The picture taken appears on-screen and is saved in your default file location. For more information, see "Status Bar" on page 132.

- 5. Press the right softkey for **Options** and select one of the following options:
 - Send Msg to send your picture to someone using Pic/ Video Msg. For more information, see "Pic/Video Msg" on page 90.
 - Camera Mode to take another picture.
 - **Upload** to upload the picture to your online folder, see "Creating an Online Album" on page 129.
 - Assign to assign the picture to Picture ID, Screen Saver or Incoming Call, see "Display" on page 141.
 - **Erase** to erase this picture.
 - Send to Other to send the picture to an online service provider.
 - Review Pictures to review the images stored in your camera.
 - To exit camera mode, press

To take a picture with the phone closed:

- 1. Press and hold the camera button 7 located on the side of the handset to access the Camera/Music menu. Press the camera button again to launch the camera.
- Point the camera lens at your subject. (You can check the picture framing through the external display screen.)

Note: When taking a picture with the phone closed, the subject image appears in reverse on the external display. The captured image will not be saved in reverse.

3. Press side camera button to take the picture. The picture taken appears on the external LCD.

- Open the flip lid to review your image,
- Press the Side Camera button again to return to the camera mode.

Camera Options

There are several settings associated with the full-color digital camera. These settings allow you to customize how the camera operates when taking pictures.

To set a camera option:

- 1. Start the camera. For more information, see "Taking Pictures" on page 119.
- Press the right softkey for Options.
- 3. Press the number key corresponding to the desired option.
 - Self-Timer: Allows you to configure a timer for Off, 5 Seconds or 10 Seconds.
 - Fun Tools: Allows you to select either Fun Frames or Color Tones
 - Fun Frames: Allows you to select a frame around the image before the picture is taken. Press the navigation key left or right to select the desired frame. Press so to select and return to the camera mode.
 - Color Tones: Allows you to select between several different color tones by pressing the navigation key left or right. When you find the desired tone, press ■
 - Controls: Allows you to set the Brightness and White Balance for your pictures.
 - Brightness: Allows you to set the brightness level.
 Press the navigation key left or right to increase or decrease the desired brightness.

- White Balance: Allows you to set up the white balance of the camera automatically or manually using the different preset modes. The modes available are:
 - Auto: Automatically adjusts the lighting.
 - Sunny: Decreases the light sensitivity for taking pictures in full or mostly sunny conditions.
 - Cloudy: Increases light sensitivity for taking pictures under cloudy conditions.
 - Tungsten: Adjusts the white balance to match inside lighting conditions displayed using common household light bulbs.
 - Fluorescent: Adjusts the white balance to match inside lighting conditions displayed using common fluorescent lighting.
 - Manual: Allows you to adjust the white balance settings manually.
- Settings: Allows you to change the following camera settings:
 - Resolution: Your full-color digital camera can take
 pictures in different modes. Each of the modes allow
 you to increase the zoom multiple levels, depending
 on the picture quality setting. This allows you to get a
 closer view of the subject or scenery being
 photographed. The available sizes are:
 - 1.3 MP (1280x960): This is the highest resolution setting available for this camera, thus allowing you the most image detail. Images taken at the high setting require more memory to save than the other three modes.
 - High (640x480): Allows you to take high quality images but uses less memory.
 - **Med (320x240)**: Allows you to take good quality images without using too much memory.

• Low (176x220): Allows you to take average quality images. You can save the most images in memory using this setting.

Tip: While in Capture mode, the zoom feature is available using the navigation keys.

- Quality: Allows you to select between Fine, Normal, and Economy. These settings reflect the image quality settings for the pictures.
- Shutter Sound: Allows you to select between different shutter sounds. The shutter sound is heard when you take a picture.
- View Mode: Allows you to switch between Portrait
 View and Landscape View. When in wide-screen mode, bars will cover the top and bottom of the screen.
- Status Bar: Allows you to switch the Status Bar On or Off.
- Save Picture To: Allows you to switch the saved file location between Phone or Memory Card.
- Review Pictures: Allows you to review pictures currently stored in your camera's memory.
- Camcorder: Switches the phone to Camcorder Mode. For more information, see "Camcorder" on page 124.

Setting the Self-timer

To activate the Self-timer and get yourself in the picture:

- With the phone open and in Camera mode, press the right softkey for Options.
- 2. Press **n** for **Self-Timer**.

- Using the navigation key, highlight the length of delay you want the timer to use (5 or 10 seconds) and press
- 4. Press the left softkey for **Capture**. (A timer is displayed in the lower left portion of the main LCD during the Self Timer countdown and the phone starts beeping.)
- Prepare for the picture. At 3 seconds, the timer icon turns red.

To cancel the Self Timer after it has started:

Camcorder

In addition to taking pictures, you can also record, view, and send videos to your friends and family with your phone's built-in video camera.

To record a video:

- Press for Camcorder.
- 3. Select either:
 - Video Mail: to take a shorter video suitable for transfer via Pic/Video messaging.
 - Long Video: to take a longer video. Videos over 512 KB cannot be sent via messaging.
- 4. Using the phone's main LCD as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject. To zoom in or out, press the right and left navigation keys.

Note: Depending on your picture resolution, zoom levels may not be available.

- Press the left softkey for **Record**. Make sure the camera is steady.
- When you are finished recording, press the left softkey again for **Done**
- Press the right softkey for Next and select one of the following options:
 - Send Msg to send your video to someone using Pic/Video Msg. For more information, see "Pic/Video Msg" on page 90.
 - Play to view your video.
 - **Upload** to upload the video to your online folder, see "Creating an Online Album" on page 129.
 - Assign to assign the video as your Screen Saver. See "Display" on page 141.
 - Erase to erase this video.
 - Send to Other to send your video to someone else via your Online album.
 - Camcorder to take another video.
 - Review Videos to select and view a video.
 - To exit camcorder mode, press

Pic/Video Msg

Once you've taken a picture or video, it is automatically saved in the phone. You can share the picture or video instantly with family and friends. With Pic/Video messaging, a picture or video can be sent to up to ten people at a time using their email addresses or phone numbers (if their phones are equipped to receive picture messages). For more details, see "Pic/Video Msg" on page 90.

My Pics/Videos

My Pics/Videos allows you to view pictures and videos that you have taken. Your media can be stored in the phone or in an Online Album. Online albums are remote storage space provided by your service provider that can be accessed using your phone. The locations can be used to save pictures or videos from your phone.

To view media stored in an Album

- Press ____. followed by ____ for Pics/Videos.
- Press for My Pics/Videos.
- Select either In Phone, Memory Card or Online Album and press _____.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to scroll though your media. The media type is indicated by either a camera or a camcorder icon in the top right corner.
 - To select/unselect the currently-highlighted picture or video, press to check/uncheck the box beside the item.
 - To view the currently-highlighted picture or video, press the left softkey
 for Expand.
 - To access the video or picture options, press the right softkey for Options.

My Pics/Videos Options

Some of the options described below are available only for videos or still pictures:

- Play (video only) the current video.
- Send the picture or video to another user using Pic/Video Msg.

- Upload the picture or video to an online album.
- Send to Other to send the picture to an online service provider.
- Assign to assign the current picture as a Picture ID, Screen Saver, or Incoming Call or the current video as your Screen Saver.
- Erase to erase the selected pictures and videos.
- Copy/Move to copy or move the files to the memory card.
- Detail/Edit to attach a text message or view the media information associated with the picture or video.
- Album list to display the list of albums saved in your phone.
- Media Filter to filter just pictures, just videos or to display all media types.
- Camera Mode (picture only) switches back to the camera.
- Camcorder (video only) switches back to the camcorder.

Creating an Online Album

The first time you use any of the Picture Messaging management options involving the Picture Messaging Web site you will need to establish a Picture Messaging password. This password will also allow you to log in to the Picture Messaging Web site. Please contact your service provider for the web site details to access and manage your uploaded pictures and albums.

To create your Picture Messaging password:

- 1. Press , followed by for Pics/Videos.
- Press for My Pics/Videos.

- 3. Select Online Album and press
- 4. Follow the onscreen instructions.

Once you have received confirmation that your account has been successfully registered, you may upload and share pictures and access the Picture Messaging Web site.

To access the Picture Messaging Web site:

- From your computer's web browser, go to the Picture messaging web site provided by your service provider.
- Enter your Phone Number and Picture Messaging password to log in.

PictBridge Print

PictBridge is an industry standard established by the Camera & Imaging Products Association (CIPA) that enables a range of digital photo solutions including direct photo printing from a digital camera to a printer without the need for a PC.

Note: There are many PictBridge devices in the market whose compatibility with the SPH-m500 cannot be guaranteed.

Printing From Your Phone

The SPH-m500 comes equipped with a built-in camera that allows you to print images directly to a printer using the PictBridge technology. A USB data cable must be connected between the two devices before any printing can occur.

To use PictBridge to print pictures from your phone:

- Insert one end of the data cable into the USB slot on the printer. (Printer must support PictBridge technology.)
- Press , followed by for Pics/Videos.
- 3. Press for PictBridge Print.
- 4. Insert the data cable into your phone.
- Read the onscreen "Connect Printer" message and press the left softkey for Next.
- 6. Highlight the desired image and press the left softkey for Next. (To select multiple images, press to place a check mark next to each image selected.)
- 7. Highlight **Copies** and press the navigation key left or right to select the desired number of copies to print.
- 8. Press the navigation key down to select Size. Press the navigation key left or right to select one of the following sizes:
 - 4x6
 - Default

Note: These sizes may vary and are dependent on the printer's capabilities.

- Press the navigation key up to select Type. Press the navigation key left or right to select one of the following:
 - Standard: Prints the standard image.
 - Index: Prints the index information.

Note: These options may vary and are dependent on the printer's capabilities.

- 10. Press the navigation key down to select Border. Press the navigation key left or right to select on or off.
- 11. Press the navigation key up to select Date Print. Press the navigation key left or right to select **on** or **off**.
- 12. Press the right softkey to Preview the image or press the left softkey to Print the image.
- 13. Select **Yes** to confirm printing and press **3**.

Settings & Info

Auto Save To

You can change the default saved file location for your pictures and videos. Select **Phone** or **Memory Card** and press **.**.

Note: Even when this setting is set to **Memory Card**, photos and videos will be saved to the phone if the memory card is not in the phone. The File Manager can be used to move the media files to the memory card later.

Status Bar

You can set whether the status bar icons are displayed onscreen while taking pictures or recording videos. Select **On** or **Off** and press ...

Account Info

The Account Info screen allows you to check the details of your online album(s), such as your account number, the number of pictures you have loaded, and comments. Contact your service provider for more details.

View Mode

You can set the default view mode to either **Portrait View** or **Landscape View**:

- In Portrait View, images are oriented so that they are taller than they are wide.
- In Landscape View, images are oriented so that they are wider than they are tall.

To change View Mode:

- Press , followed by for Pics/Videos.
- Press for Settings & Info.
- 3. Press for View Mode.
- 4. Select either **Portrait View** or **Landscape View** and press ...

Contacts

Adding a New Contact

Your phone can store up to 500 phone numbers. Each contact entry can store up to a total of five phone numbers (plus one email address), and each entry's name can contain up to 20 characters.

To add a new entry:

- Enter a new phone number and press the right softkey for **Options**.
- 2. Press for Save. Press to New Entry.
- 3. Select the Label using the navigation key and press
 - MobileHomeWorkPagerOthers
- 4. Enter the name using the keypad and press .
- 5. Press the left softkey **a** for **Done**.

After you have saved the number, the new Contacts entry is displayed.

Finding Contacts

To find an entry from the Contacts menu:

- 1. Press , followed by for Contacts.
- 2. Press in for Find.

3. Scroll down through your list of contacts to highlight the name and press to make the call.

Tip: To search through your list more quickly, enter the first few letters in the **Name** box. The display will move down the list to the first entry that matches the text in the Name box.

Adding a Phone Number to an Existing Contact Entry

To add a phone number to an Existing Contact entry:

- 1. Press , followed by for Contacts.
- Press In for Find.
- 4. Press the right softkey **to Edit** the entry.
- Scroll down to the Add Number box. Enter the phone number using the keypad and press .
- Select a label (Mobile, Home, etc.) for this number and press .

Editing a Contacts Entry's Phone Number

To edit an entry's phone number:

- Press and hold so to erase the entire number or press once to erase just the last digit.

- 9. Press the left softkey **a** for **Done**.

Selecting a Ringer Type for an Entry

You can assign a ringer type to a Contacts entry so you can identify the caller by the ringer type. (See "Ringer Types" on page 148.)

To select a ringer type for an entry:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Contacts**.
- Press for Find.
- 3. Select the desired entry and press **3.**
- **4.** Press the right softkey **to Edit** the entry.
- Press the navigation key down until Ring is selected and press .
- Press the navigation key up or down and highlight the desired Ringer Category and press

- Press the navigation key up or down to highlight and listen to the desired Ringer and press to save.
- 8. Press the left softkey a for Done.

Speed Dial #s

You can assign a speed dial number (1 or 2 digits) to up to 98 phone numbers from your Contacts that you use most frequently to the number keys, and then dial them easily whenever you want, simply by pressing and holding the associated number key (for a 1-digit speed dial #) or the last associated number key (for a 2-digit speed dial #).

Note: '1' is reserved for your voicemail and is not assignable as a speed dial number.

To assign a speed dial #:

- Press , followed by for Contacts.
- 2. Press **f** for **Speed Dial #s**.
- Using the navigation keys, highlight the number that you wish to assign and press the left softkey for Assign.
- **4.** Highlight the Contact that you wish to assign to the speed dial # and press .
 - To call a Contact using a 1 digit speed dial, from the Idle screen, press and hold the # key assigned to the Contact.
 - To call a Contact using a 2 digit speed dial, from the Idle screen, enter the first digit, and then press and hold the # key for the second digit of the speed dial # assigned to the Contact.

Group

You can associate a preset group name to your entries to help you sort them easier in the Contacts. Four preset group names are already programmed into your phone.

To change the name of a group:

- 3. Highlight the group that you want to change the name for.
- Press the right softkey for Options and select Rename group.

To associate an existing number located in your Contacts:

Memory

You can display how many phone numbers are stored on your phone and how many spaces are available.

To view how much memory has been used:

My Name Card

This function is similar to an entry in the Phone Book, except that it contains your contact information, like a business card. You can send the name card to others via Bluetooth.

To send your Name Card via Bluetooth:

- 1. Press , followed by for Contacts.
- 2. Press **f** for **My Name Card**.
- 3. Press the left softkey for **Send Contact**.

Note: If Bluetooth is not activated, you will be prompted to enable it. Select **Yes** and press **(Select Yes)** and **(Select Yes)** are the prompted to enable it.

 Highlight the device you wish to send the name card to and press .

Note: If the device is not visible, you will be prompted to search for the device. Select **Yes** and press **.** For more information, see 'Bluetooth' on page 73.

To edit your Name Card:

- Press , followed by for Contacts.
- 2. Press **f** for **My Name Card**.
- 3. Press the right softkey **a** for **Edit**.
- 4. Edit your card details.
- 5. When you are finished, press the left softkey **a** for **Done**.

Services

This Services menu holds a directory of useful customer service and directory assistance numbers.

- 1. Press , followed by for Contacts.
- Press for Services.
- 3. Press im for Customer Service or im for Dir Assist.
- 4. The number is displayed on-screen. To call the number, press .

Display

Screen Saver

Your phone offers options for what you see on the display screen when in standby mode.

To change the display images:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Settings**.
- 2. Press Image for Display.
- 3. Press Im for Screen Saver.
- 4. Press ignormain LCD or ignormal for Sub LCD.

If you selected **Main LCD**, press the navigation keys up or down to select the type of Screen Saver: **Preset Images**, **Downloads** or **My Albums** and press

- Press the navigation key up and down to select the desired image.
- 6. Press em to save and exit.

Set Foreground

Your phone offers options for what foreground image appears over your screen saver image when in standby mode.

To change the foreground image:

- Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press Image for Display.
- 3. Press for **Set Foreground**.
- Press the navigation keys up or down to select one of Digital Clock, Analog Clock, Calendar or Others and press

If you selected **Others**, press the navigation keys up or down to select one of **Speed Dial #s**, **Today**, **Scheduler**, **Task List**, **Countdown** or **None** and press

Color Set Type

You can change the display on your phone between white text on a black screen and black text on a white screen.

To change the color set type:

- Press , followed by for Settings.
- Press Image for Display.
- 3. Press **f** for **Color Set Type**.
- Using the navigation keys, select White (for a white background) or Black (for a black background) and press .

Note: If the menu style is set to white list, changing the color to black will force the menu style to change to black grid since there is no black list menu style available.

Dialing Font

You can adjust style, color and size of your dialing font.

To change the dialing font color:

- 3. Press for Dialing Font.
- 4. Select one of the following styles:

- Rainbow displays each digit in a different color.
- Monochrome displays entered digits as a single color of your choice.
- Hyphenate displays each block of digits separated by hyphens in a different color.

A sample of the new Dialing Font color appears onscreen.

- If you selected any other option, press to save your changes.

Size: Press the navigation keys up or down to select Large, Normal or Small and press 📾 to save your changes.

Incoming Call

Your phone allows you to change the image shown on your display screen when receiving a call.

To select the Incoming Call style:

- Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press image for Display.
- 3. Press for Incoming Call.
- 4. Press in for With Caller ID or for No Caller ID.
- Press the navigation keys up or down to select one of Preset Animation, Downloads or My Albums and press
- Use the navigation keys to select the desired image and press .

Greeting

The text greeting can be up to 14 characters and is displayed on your phone's screen in standby mode. You may choose to display a custom greeting on the phone's screen.

To display or change your custom greeting:

- 2. Press **I** for **Display**.
- 3. Press **f** for **Greeting**.
- **4.** Select **Custom** using the navigation key and press **...**
- 5. Press and hold **to clear the existing greeting.**

- Use the keypad to enter a new custom greeting. (See "Entering Text" on page 32.)
- 7. Press me to save and exit.

Backlight

The backlight setting lets you select how long the display screen and keypad are backlit after any key press is made.

To change the backlight setting:

- Press for Main Display, for Keypad, or for Pwr Save Mode.
- **5.** Use the navigation key to select:
 - Flip Open, 30 seconds, 15 seconds, or 8 seconds for the Main Display.
 - Flip Open, 30 seconds, 15 seconds, 8 seconds or Off for Keypad.
 - On or Off for Pwr Save Mode. Turning on the power save mode will slow down the user interface response in order to conserve power.
- 6. Press em to save and exit.

You can change the brightness of the LCD screens, making them brighter or dimmer.

To change the LCD Contrast:

Press , followed by for Settings.

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- 2. Press implies for **Display**.
- 3. Press for Backlight.
- 4. Press a for Brightness.

Sounds

Ringer Type

Ringer types help you identify incoming calls and messages. You can assign ringer types to individual Contacts entries, types of calls, Scheduler entries, and types of messages.

- Single Tones are non-polyphonic traditional style ring tones.
- Ring Tones include a variety of standard ringer types.
- Melodies include a variety of musical melodies.
- Downloads include all the ringtones you have previously downloaded.
- My Videos includes videos you have recorded and can be used for playback.

Selecting Ringer Types for Voice Calls, Messaging and Scheduler

Your phone provides a variety of ringer options that allow you to customize your ring and volume settings. These options allow you to identify incoming calls, messages and scheduled alerts by the ring.

To select a ringer type:

- 1. Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press a for **Sounds**.
- 3. Press **a** for **Ringer Type**.
- Press for Voice Calls, for Messaging, or for Scheduler.
 - If you selected Voice Calls, press for With Caller ID or for No Caller ID.

- If you selected Messaging, press for Voicemail,
 for Text Message or for Pic/Video Msg.
- Press the navigation button left or right to select Single Tones, Ring Tones, Melodies, or Downloads ringers.
- Press the navigation button down and then left or right to select the desired Ringer.
- 7. Press me to save and exit.

Selecting Ringer Type for Roam Ringer

To select a ringer type for incoming roam calls:

- 1. Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press **sounds**.
- 3. Press **I** for **Ringer Type**.

Volume

To adjust the ringer or key tone volume:

- deselect Always Vibrate. Press the left softkey **a** for **Done** to save and exit.
- For Text Message, Pic/Video Msg, Voice Mail or Alarms, use the navigation keys to select Use Ringer volume or Separate Volume. Press to select/deselect Always Vibrate. Press the left softkey for Done to save and exit.
- For App. Volume, press to select Sound. Use the navigation keys to select Use Ringer volume or Separate Volume. Press the left softkey for Done to save and exit. To enable game vibration, press for Game Vibrate, select On and press

Tip: You can adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (or the earpiece volume during a call) by using the volume key on the side of your phone or Samsung Bluetooth headset when equiped.

Silence All

There may be times when you need to silence your phone entirely. The phone's Silence All option allows you to mute all sounds without turning your phone off.

Alerts

Key Tone

Your phone offers a number of options for selecting the audible tones accompanying a key press.

There are three different tones available:

- Xylophone: Polyphonic 'xylophone' tones are heard when a key is pressed.
- Voice: The number or symbol of the key is heard when you press a key.

To select a key tone:

Your phone offers a number of options for changing the tone duration of a key press. Voicemail or other automated systems may require long or short time lengths to activate different features.

To select a tone length:

- 1. Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press a for Sounds.
- 3. Press for **Key Tone**.
- 4. Press **f** for **Tone Length**.
- 5. Select **Short** or **Long** and press **m** to save and exit.

Launch Pad

Call Setup

Call Setup options allow you to set up the following options:

Abbrev. Dial

Abbreviated dialing allows you to program a five or six digit prefix for commonly used phone numbers. When abbreviated dialing is on, you can enter the last four or five digits and the handset will prepend the six or five digit prefix to the sequence you have entered to complete the dialing number.

To set up abbreviated dialing:

Airplane Mode

Airplane Mode allows you to use many of your phone's features, such as Games, Notepad, Voice Memos, etc., when you are in an airplane or in areas where making or receiving voice or data calls is prohibited. When your phone is in Airplane Mode, it cannot send or receive any calls or access online information. All incoming calls will be sent directly to your Voicemail box. The Bluetooth interface will be disabled when Airplen Mode is on.

To set your phone to Airplane Mode:

- 1. Press , followed by for **Settings**.
- 2. Press a for Others.
- Press for Airplane Mode. (A brief explanation of Airplane Mode will display.)
- 4. Press en to continue.
- Press the navigation key up or down to select On, Off or On Power Up and press at to save and exit.

While in Airplane Mode, your phone's standby screen will display "Radio off."

Location

Your phone is equipped with a Location feature for use in connection with location-based services that may be available in the future.

The Location feature allows the network to detect your position. Turning Location off will hide your location from everyone except 911.

Note: Even if the Location feature is enabled, no service may use your location information without your expressed permission.

To enable your phone's Location feature:

- Press for Location. (A brief explanation will display. Use your navigation key to scroll through to read the entire text.)

When the Location feature is on, your phone's standby screen will display the picon. When Location is turned off, the picon will display.

Key Guard

The Key Guard feature helps to prevent accidental key presses when the cover is closed. When Key Guard is on, the buttons are disabled until the handset is flipped open.

 Flip-closed activates Key Guard as soon the handset is flipped closed. This will prevent you from taking pictures with the handset closed.

- After 5 Seconds activates Key Guard five seconds after the handset is closed.
- Off deactivates the Key Guard feature.

To activate Key Guard:

- Press , followed by for Settings.
- Press for Others.
- 3. Press for Key Guard.
- Select the desired Key Guard level and press to save and exit.

Tip: To disable keyguard with the cover closed such as when you want to take a self portrait, press the Camera and the Volume key simultaneously.

Audio Routing

Audio Routing directs audio either the headset exclusively or to both the headset and the phone's speaker. There are two options:

- Normal: The ringer is routed through both the headset and the phone's speaker. Other audio is routed through the headset.
- Headset Only: All audio is routed through the headset only.
 The phone's ringer will not ring.

Note: This feature works with the wire headset and does not work with the Samsung Bluetooth headset.

To change Audio Routing:

- 2. Press for **Others**.
- 3. Press **f** for **Audio Routing**.
- 4. Select either Normal or Headset Only and press \blacksquare .

Phone Info

The Phone Info screen displays information about your handset's current hardware and software. The Icon Glossary option can help you identify a display icon whose function you have forgotten.

- 1. Press , followed by for Settings.
- 2. Press for Phone Info.
- 3. Press for Phone Number, for Icon Glossary, for Version, or for Advanced.

Phone Security

Accessing the Security Menu

All of your phone's security settings are available through the Security menu. You must enter your lock code to view the Security menu.

To access the Security menu:

- 1. Press , followed by for Settings.
- Press for Security.
- 3. Enter your lock code. (The security menu is displayed.)

Tip: If you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of either your Social Insurance Number or Mobile Directory Number or try 0000. If none of these work, call Customer Service at 1-800-Samsung.

Using Your Phone's Lock Feature

Locking Your Phone

When your phone is locked, you can only receive incoming calls or make calls to 911. Customer Service, or special numbers.

Special #s

You can save up to three special numbers in addition to your Contacts entries (the same number may be in both directories). You can make and receive calls from special numbers even when your phone is locked.

To add or replace a special number:

- Select entry one, two, or three and press
- 3. Enter the number using the keypad.
- 4. Press me to Save.

Note: There are no Speed Dial options associated with special numbers.

Erase

To erase your Contacts, Downloads, Pics/Video, Voice Memos or Message:

Default Settings

- 2. Using the navigation key, select **Yes** and press **____**.
- 3. Using the navigation key, select **Yes** again to confirm and press . Your phone will reset.

Reset Pic/Video Account

Resetting the Pic/Video account erases the handset's registration information with the picture server so the next time you access your online pictures, you will need to re-register with the server. Your pictures and videos, however, are not erased.

Reset Phone

Resetting the phone restores all the factory defaults, including the ringer types and display settings.

Safety

Getting the Most Out of Your Reception

Keeping Tabs on Signal Strength

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal. If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key. Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

Knowing Radio Frequency Safety

The design of your phone complies with updated NCRP standards described below. In 1991-92, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) joined in updating ANSI's 1982 standard for safety levels with respect to human exposure to RF signals. More than 120

scientists, engineers and physicians from universities, government health agencies and industries developed this updated standard after reviewing the available body of research. In 1993, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted this updated standard in a regulation. In August 1996, the FCC adopted hybrid standard consisting of the existing ANSI/IEEE standard and the guidelines published by the National Council of Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP).

Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

There are several simple guidelines for operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- Speak directly into the mouthpiece.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it's inoperable, return it to a dealer store or call Customer Support for service.

Note: For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

Maintaining Safe Use of and Access to Your Phone

Failure to follow the instructions outlined may lead to serious personal injury and possible property damage.

Using Your Phone While Driving

Talking on your phone while driving (or operating the phone without a hands-free device) is prohibited in some jurisdictions. Laws vary as to specific restrictions. Remember that safety always comes first.

When using your phone in the car:

- Get to know your phone and its features, such as speed dial and re-dial.
- When available, use a hands-free device.
- Position your phone within easy reach.
- Let the person you are speaking to know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving.
- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when stationary or before pulling into traffic.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may divert your attention from the road.
- Dial 911 to report serious emergencies. It's free from your wireless phone.
- Use your phone to help others in emergencies.
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless number when necessary.

Following Safety Guidelines

To operate your phone safely and efficiently, always follow any special regulations in a given area. Turn your phone off in areas where use is forbidden or when it may cause interference or danger.

Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, RF signals from wireless phones may affect inadequately shielded electronic equipment.

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic operating systems and/or entertainment systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or their representative to determine if these systems are adequately shielded from external RF signals. Also check with the manufacturer regarding any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF signals.

Note: Always turn off the phone in health care facilities and request permission before using the phone near medical equipment.

Turning Off Your Phone Before Flying

Turn off your phone before boarding any aircraft. To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground. To prevent any risk of interference, FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while the plane is in the air.

Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn off your phone when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating that two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives.

Turn off your phone when you are in an area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it is rare, your phone or its accessories could generate sparks. Sparks could cause an explosion or a fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked. These areas include:

- Fueling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

Note: Never transport or store flammable gas, liquid or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or accessories.

Restricting Children's Access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone, dial 911 by mistake or make calls that increase your phone bill.

Caring for the Battery

Protecting Your Battery

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

- Use only Samsung approved batteries and desktop chargers.
 These chargers are designed to maximize battery life. Using other batteries or chargers voids your warranty and may cause damage.
- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from 32° F to 113° F (0° C to 45° C).
- Don't use the battery charger in direct sunlight or in high humidity areas, such as the bathroom.
- Never dispose of the battery by incineration.
- Keep the metal contacts on top of the battery clean.
- Don't attempt to disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- The battery may need recharging if it has not been used for a long period of time.
- It's best to replace the battery when it no longer provides acceptable performance. When used correctly, the battery can be recharged hundreds of times before it needs replacing.
- Don't store the battery in high temperature areas for long periods of time. It's best to follow these storage rules:
 - Less than one month:
 -4° F to 140° F (-20° C to 60° C)
 - More than one month:
 -4° F to 113° F (-20° C to 45° C)

Disposal of Lithium Ion (Lilon) Batteries

For safe disposal options of your Lilon batteries, contact your nearest service center.

Special Note: Be sure to dispose of your battery properly. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited.

Note: For safety, do not handle a damaged or leaking Lilon battery.

- Connect the equipment into an outlet on a circuit different from that to which the receiver is connected.

Consult the dealer or an experienced radio/TV technician for help.

Specific Absorption Rates (SAR) for Wireless Phones

The SAR is a value that corresponds to the relative amount of RF energy absorbed in the head of a user of a wireless handset.

The SAR value of a phone is the result of an extensive testing, measuring and calculation process. It does not represent how much RF the phone emits. All phone models are tested at their highest value in strict laboratory settings. But when in operation, the SAR of a phone can be substantially less than the level reported to the FCC. This is because of a variety of factors including its proximity to a base station antenna, phone design and other factors. What is important to remember is that each phone meets strict federal guidelines. Variations in SARs do not represent a variation in safety.

All phones must meet the federal standard, which incorporates a substantial margin of safety. As stated above, variations in SAR values between different model phones do not mean variations in safety. SAR values at or below the federal standard of 1.6 W/kg are considered safe for use by the public.

What is Covered and For How Long? SAMSUNG Electronics Canada Inc. What is Not Covered? This Limited Warranty is conditioned upon proper use of Product by Purchaser. 
