## Attach the strap and the lens cap

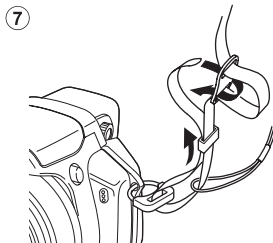
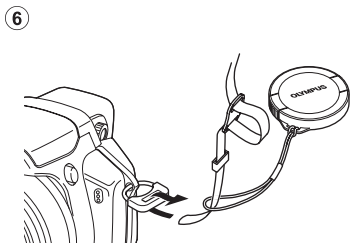
Be sure to use the strap and strap rings provided.

- Attach the strap and strap rings together. The strap rings may fall off if they are attached without the strap.



- Tilt the strap rings in such a way so that the strap rings can go through the strap eyelet.

- Insert it all the way in.

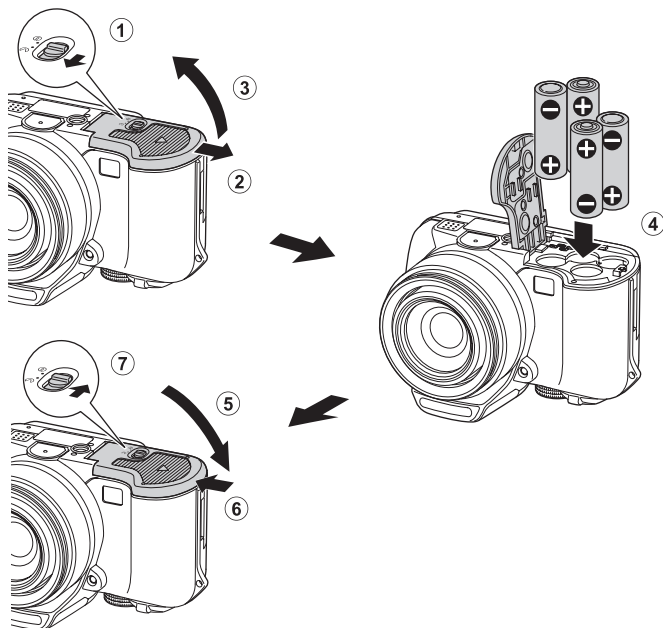


- Attach the strap to the other eyelet in the same manner.

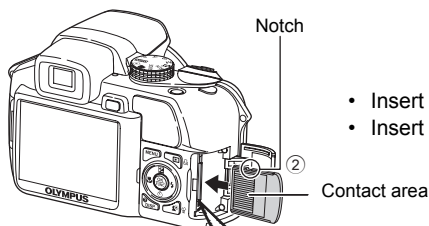
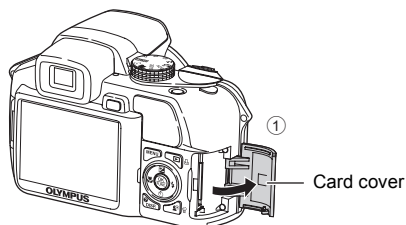
- Pull the strap tight so that it does not come loose.

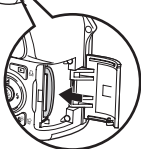

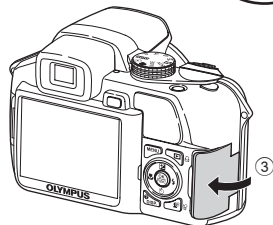
## b. Insert the xD-Picture Card (optional) into the camera



- Insert the card straight in.
- Insert the card until it clicks into place.



- To remove the card, push it all the way in, release it slowly and remove.

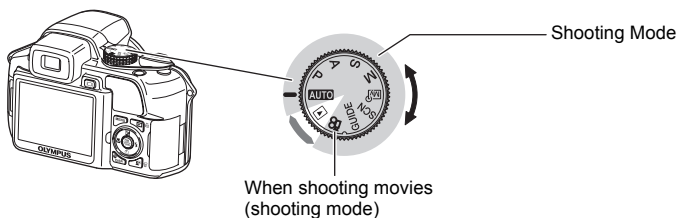

## Turn the camera on

This explains how to turn on the camera in shooting mode.

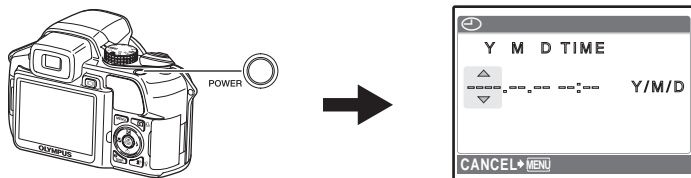
### a. Set the mode dial to **AUTO**.



#### Still picture shooting modes

<b>AUTO</b>	This camera determines the optimum settings for the shooting conditions automatically.
<b>P</b>	The camera automatically sets the optimum aperture value and shutter speed.
<b>A</b>	This function allows you to change the aperture manually.
<b>S</b>	This function changes the shutter speed for shooting pictures.
<b>M</b>	This function allows you to change the aperture and shutter speed manually.
<b>My?</b>	This function allows you to set each shooting function manually and use as your original shooting mode.
<b>SCN</b>	This function allows you to shoot pictures by selecting a scene according to the shooting condition.
<b>GUIDE</b>	This function allows you to set the target items by following the shooting guide displayed on the screen.

### b. Remove the lens cap and press the **POWER** button.



- When the date and time have not yet been set, this screen will appear.

- To turn off the camera, press the **POWER** button once again.

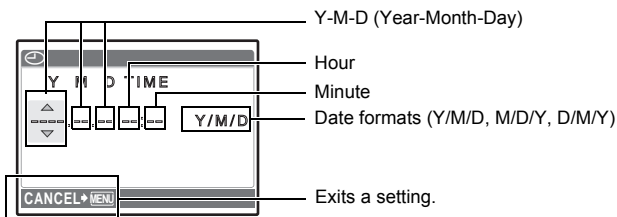

- The time is displayed in the 24-hour format.



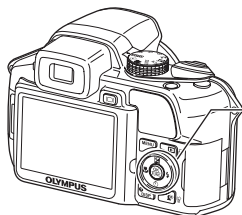

- For precise time setting, press the button as the time signal strikes 00 seconds.

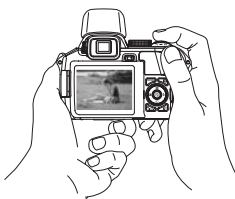
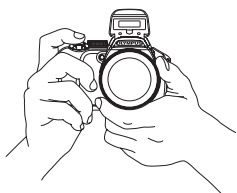




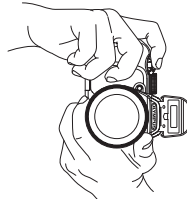

## 1 POWER button

Turning the camera on and off

Power on:

- Lens extends

- Before turning the camera on in shooting mode, remove the lens cap.

Playback mode

- Monitor turns on

## 2 Mode dial

Switching between shooting and playback modes

Set the mode dial to the desired shooting or playback mode.

- Some functions cannot be set depending on the position of the mode dial.

### AUTO Shooting pictures with full automatic settings

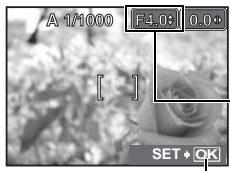
The camera determines the optimum settings for the shooting conditions automatically. Settings in the [CAMERA MENU] such as WB and ISO Sensitivity cannot be changed.

### P Set the optimum aperture value and shutter speed

The camera automatically sets the optimum aperture value and shutter speed for the brightness of the subject.

Settings in the [CAMERA MENU] such as WB and ISO Sensitivity can be changed.

## A Changing the aperture value for shooting pictures



Adjustment range  
W : F2.8 to F8.0  
T : F4.5 to F8.0

Press  $\triangle$ / $\nabla$  after pressing  $\triangle$ / $\square$ . The camera automatically sets the shutter speed.

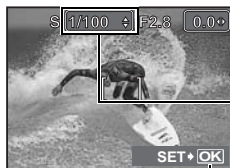
### Aperture value

- $\triangle$  : Increases the aperture value.
- $\nabla$  : Decreases the aperture value.

When the correct exposure cannot be obtained, the aperture value is displayed in red.

- $\text{Ⓢ}$  : Sets the settings.

## S Changing the shutter speed for shooting pictures



Shutter speed range:  
1/2 to 1/1000  
(When [NOISE REDUCT.]  
is set to [ON]: up to 4 sec.)

Press  $\triangle$ / $\nabla$  after pressing  $\triangle$ / $\square$ . The camera automatically sets the aperture value.

### Shutter speed

- $\triangle$  : Sets the shutter speed faster.
- $\nabla$  : Sets the shutter speed slower.

When the correct exposure cannot be obtained, the shutter speed is displayed in red.

- $\text{Ⓢ}$  : Sets the settings.

## M Changing the aperture value and shutter speed for shooting pictures

Press  $\triangle$ / $\nabla$ / $\triangleleft$ / $\triangleright$  after pressing  $\triangle$ / $\square$ .



Setting range:  
Aperture value F2.8 to F8.0  
(The aperture value varies  
depending on the zoom position.)  
Shutter speed: 15" to 1/2000  
(The shutter speed varies  
depending on the aperture value.)

### Exposure differential

When this range has been exceeded  $\pm 3.0\text{EV}$ , the exposure differential is displayed in red.

### Aperture value

- $\triangleleft$  : Increases the aperture value.
- $\triangleright$  : Decreases the aperture value.

### Shutter speed

- $\triangle$  : Sets the shutter speed faster.
- $\nabla$  : Sets the shutter speed slower.


- $\text{Ⓢ}$  : Sets the settings.

### To take long exposure (bulb) shots


Press  $\nabla$  to set shutter speed to BULB. The shutter remains open as long as the shutter button is pressed. (The maximum time that it can remain open is 8 minutes, however, this is possible only when [ISO] is set to [50], [100] or [200].)

## Setting your own original mode for shooting pictures

This mode allows you to set functions and save up to 4 shooting modes manually, and use them as your original shooting mode.

## **SCN** Shoot pictures by selecting a scene according to the situation

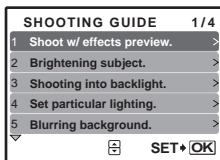
You can shoot pictures by selecting a scene mode according to the situation.

### Select a scene mode/change the scene mode to another one

- Press **MENU** and select [SCN] from the top menu. Use the  $\triangle/\nabla$  to select a scene and press  $\odot$ .
- By switching to the other scene mode, most settings will be changed to the default settings of each scene mode.

## **GUIDE** Follow the shooting guide for setting

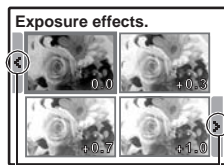


This function allows you to set the target items by following the shooting guide displayed on the screen.

- Press **MENU** to display the shooting guide again.
- To change the setting without using the shooting guide, set the shooting mode to another one.
- Functions set using the Shooting Guide will revert to the default settings when **MENU** is pressed or when the shooting mode is changed.

## Shooting pictures while comparing previews of different effects

When [Exposure effects.] is selected



Use  $\triangle/\nabla$  to change the display.


When an item is selected from [1 Shoot w/ effects preview.] using the shooting guide menu, the screen splits into 4 frames and pictures of subjects taken according to the individual settings will be displayed. You can then compare the shooting effects on the screen.

- Use the arrow pad to select the frame with the settings you want, and press  $\odot$ . The camera automatically switches to shooting mode and allows you to shoot with the selected effect.


## Recording movies

When  $\odot$  (movies) is set to [ON], audio is recorded with the movie.

- When  $\odot$  (movies) is set to [ON], optical zoom cannot be used during the shooting.

 " $\odot$  (movies) Recording sound with movies" (P.33)

- To zoom in when  $\odot$  (movies) is set to [ON], set [DIGITAL ZOOM] to [ON].

 "DIGITAL ZOOM Zooming in on your subject" (P.28)



This icon lights red during movie recording.

The remaining recording time is displayed.  
When the remaining recording time reaches 0, recording stops.

- When [IMAGE STABILIZER] is set to [ON], continuous movie recording for a long period will cause the camera's internal temperature to rise and the camera may stop operation automatically. Remove the battery and allow the camera to cool down for some time before you begin shooting again. Or you can set [IMAGE STABILIZER] to [OFF]. In addition, the temperature of the camera's exterior also rises during usage. This is not a malfunction.

### ▶ Selecting playback mode

The last picture taken is displayed.

- Press the arrow pad to view other pictures.
  - Use the zoom lever to switch among close-up playback, index display and calendar display.

### Displaying pictures that have been shot continuously in index view (Sequential Playback) / Auto playing back of pictures that have been shot continuously (Sequential Pictures Auto Playback)

Only the first frame will be displayed for pictures that have been shot continuously using the next option.

- Select the pictures that have the [ ] displayed and press [ ] to playback in index view (Sequential Playback). Press the [ ] again to return to the first frame.
- Select the pictures that have the [ ] displayed and press [ ], to playback automatically (Sequential Pictures Auto Playback).
- This function is only available for pictures taken with this model.
- When the first frame is displayed, perform the next operation to configure the settings to all the sequential pictures.

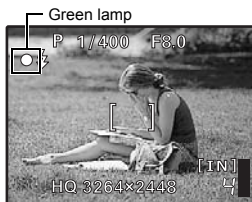
To configure settings to individual pictures, press [ ] to display the pictures in index view first before configuring.

## 3 Shutter button

Shooting pictures

### Shooting still pictures

Set the mode dial to **AUTO**, **P**, **A**, **S**, **M**, [MF], **GUIDE** or **SCN**, and lightly press the shutter button (halfway). The green lamp lights when the focus and exposure are locked (focus lock). Now press the shutter button all the way (completely) to shoot a picture.




Green lamp

### Locking the focus and then composing the shot (focus lock)

Compose your picture with the focus locked, and then fully press the shutter button to shoot a picture.

- When the green lamp blinks, the focus is not adjusted properly. Try locking the focus again.

## Recording movies

Set the mode dial to , and press the shutter button halfway to lock the focus, and then press the shutter button completely to start recording. Press the shutter button again to stop recording.

### 4 Zoom Lever

Zooming while shooting/close-up playback

#### Shooting mode: Zooming in on your subject

Optical zoom: 18x

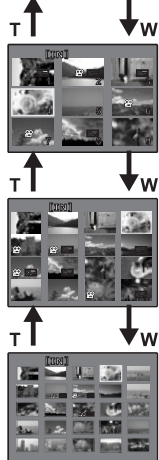
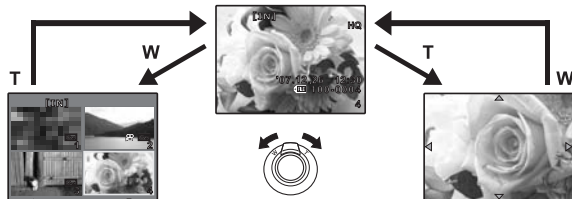



##### Single-frame playback


- Use the arrow pad to browse pictures.




##### Index display

- Use the arrow pad to select a picture for playback, and press  to play back the single-frame of the picture selected.

##### Close-up playback

- Pull the lever toward T to incrementally enlarge the picture up to 10 times the original size. Push the lever toward W to reduce the size.
- Use the arrow pad during close-up playback to scroll around the picture.
- Press  to return to the single-frame playback.



##### Calendar display

- Use the arrow pad to select the date, and press  or pull the lever toward T on the zoom lever to display the pictures on the date selected.



Press  in shooting mode to select [] ON].



### ● Locking the focus position (AF Lock)

- Assign the AF lock function to  so that the focus is locked by pressing , and  (AF lock mark) is displayed on the monitor. AF Lock will be kept after shooting. To cancel the AF Lock, either press  again, or change the exposure/shooting settings or the shooting mode. Each time you press the button, focus is locked and canceled alternately.
- If the zoom is operated after engaging the AF lock, the picture may be out of focus. Engage the AF lock after operating the zoom.







**AEL** is displayed while in AE lock.

### ● Locking the exposure (AE lock)

- Assign the AE lock function to  so that the meter reading is saved by pressing  and the exposure is locked. **AEL** (AE lock mark) is displayed on the monitor. AE Lock will be kept after shooting. To cancel the AE Lock, either press  again, or change the exposure/shooting settings or the shooting mode. Each time you press the button, focus is locked and canceled alternately.

### ● Locking the focus positions and exposure (AF LOCK + AE LOCK)

- Register the AF lock + AE lock functions to  so that the meter reading is saved by pressing  and the focus and exposure is locked.  (AF lock mark) and **AEL** (AE lock mark) are displayed on the monitor. Press  again to cancel the AF lock + AE lock. Each time you press the button, focus and exposure are locked and canceled alternately.



## Playback mode: Playing back continuously shot pictures in index display

Only the first frame will be displayed for pictures that have been shot continuously.

Press in the playback mode to display pictures in index view.

- "Displaying pictures that have been shot continuously in index view (Sequential Playback) / Auto playing back of pictures that have been shot continuously (Sequential Pictures Auto Playback)" (P.14)

## 6 button

Flash pop-up

Opens the flash.

Press this button to take a picture with flash.

## 7 button

Monitor/Viewfinder

Toggles between the monitor and viewfinder.

## 8 MENU button (MENU)

Displays the top menu.

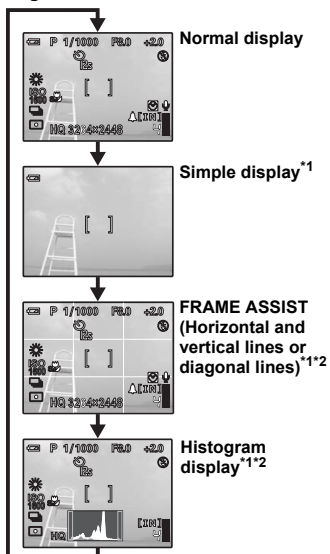

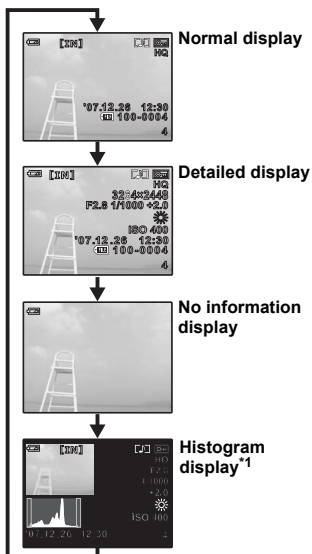

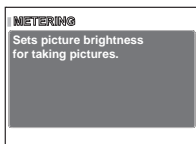

## Displaying the menu guide



With menu items selected, hold down **DISP./** to display the menu guide. Release **DISP./** to close the menu guide.

## Checking the time

While the camera is off, press **DISP./** to display the set alarm time (when [ALARM CLOCK] is set) and the current time for 3 seconds.

### 10 button

#### Brightening the subject against backlight / Erasing pictures

##### Shooting mode: Brightening the subject against backlight

Press in shooting mode to turn on or off Shadow Adjustment Technology. Press to set. A frame is displayed at the detected position (except for ). This function makes the face of the subject appear brighter even against backlight.

SHADOW ADJ. OFF Shadow Adjustment Technology is deactivated.

SHADOW ADJ. ON Shadow Adjustment Technology is activated.

- The face may not be detected for some subjects.
- It may take some time for the frame to appear.
- When [SHADOW ADJ. ON] is selected, the following setting restrictions apply.
  - [METERING] is fixed at [ESP].
  - [AF MODE] is fixed at [FACE DETECT].
  - This function is applicable only for the first frame when [DRIVE] is not set to [□].
  - This function is applicable only for the first picture in [PANORAMA].

##### Playback mode: Erasing pictures

Display a picture to erase in playback mode, and press the .

- Once erased, pictures cannot be restored. Check each picture before erasing to avoid accidentally erasing pictures you want to keep.

### 11 button

Use the arrow pad to select scenes, playback picture, and the items on the menus.

### 12 button

#### Viewing pictures/Printing pictures

##### Shooting mode: Viewing pictures

The last picture taken is displayed on the monitor. Press in shooting mode. Press again or press the shutter button halfway to return to shooting mode.

##### Playback mode: Printing pictures



When the printer is connected to the camera, display a picture to be printed out in playback mode, and press .

"Easy print" (P.48)


13  **button****Shooting pictures close to the subject (Macro)**

Press  in shooting mode to select the macro mode.





Press  to set.

OFF	Macro mode is deactivated.
 (Macro mode)	Allows you to shoot from as close as 10 cm/3.94 in. (when the zoom is set for the zoom-out angle) to your subject.
 (Super macro mode)	Allows you to shoot from as close as 1 cm/0.39 in. to your subject.





AUTO (Auto-flash)	The flash fires automatically in low light or backlight conditions.
 (Red-eye reduction flash)	This emits pre-flashes to reduce the occurrence of red-eye in your pictures.
 (Fill-in flash)	The flash fires regardless of the available light.
 (Red-eye fill-in flash)	The flash always fires after pre-flashes for red-eye reduction are emitted.
 SLOW	The flash fires with slow shutter speed. Set the flash timing in [  SYNCRO].  "SYNCRO Selecting the flash timing" (P.30)
 (Flash off)	The flash does not fire.







## 16 button

### Self-timer shooting

Press  in shooting mode to select on and off of the self-timer.  
Press  to set.

 OFF	Cancel the self-timer.
 12 SEC	After the setting, press the shutter button completely. The self-timer lamp lights for approximately 10 seconds, then starts blinking. After blinking for approximately 2 seconds, the picture is taken.
 2 SEC	After the setting, press the shutter button completely. The self-timer lamp flashes for 2 seconds, the picture is taken.

- To cancel the self-timer, press .
- Self-timer shooting is automatically canceled after one shot.
- When [AF PREDICT] or [PRE-CAPTURE] is set to [ON], self-timer settings cannot be made.



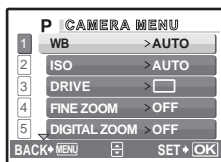
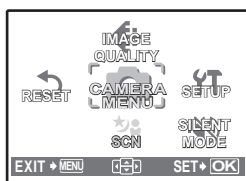


## About the menus

Pressing **MENU** displays the top menu on the monitor or viewfinder.

- The items displayed on the top menu differ according to the mode.

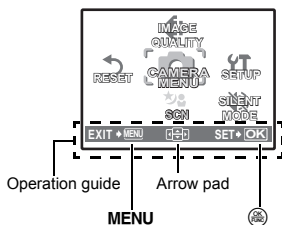
Top menu (When Mode Dial is set to **P**)



- When [CAMERA MENU], [PLAYBACK MENU], [EDIT], [ERASE] or [SETUP] is selected, the menu corresponding to the respective functions is displayed.
- When your camera is set according to the shooting guide with the mode dial set at **GUIDE**, press **MENU** to display the shooting guide screen.

## Operation guide

During menu operations, the buttons and their respective functions are displayed at the bottom of the monitor. Follow these guides to navigate the menus.




- BACK → MENU : Returns to the previous menu.
- EXIT → MENU : Exits the menu.
- [icon] : Press  $\Delta \nabla \leftarrow \rightarrow$  to select a setting.
- SET → OK : Sets the selected item.

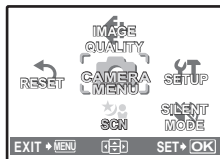

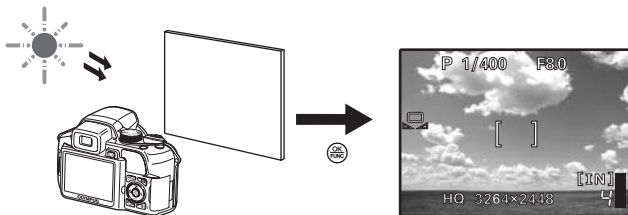
AUTO		The white balance is adjusted automatically for natural color, regardless of the light source.
PRESET		Selects the white balance according to the light source.
	Sunny day	For shooting under a clear sky.
	Cloudy day	For shooting under a cloudy sky.
	Tungsten light	For shooting under tungsten lighting.
	Fluorescent lamp 1	For shooting under daylight fluorescent lighting. (This type of lamp is mainly used in homes.)
	Fluorescent lamp 2	For shooting under a neutral white fluorescent lamp. (This type of lamp is mainly used in desk lamps.)
	Fluorescent lamp 3	For shooting under a white fluorescent lamp. (This type of lamp is mainly used in offices.)
	One-touch WB	For setting a more precise white balance than preset white balance can provide. You can set and save the optimum white balance for the shooting conditions.

### When [PRESET] is selected



Press  $\triangle/\nabla$  to select a white balance setting, then press  $\odot$ .

### When [ONE TOUCH] is selected



- With the [ONE TOUCH WB] screen displayed, point the camera at a sheet of white paper. Position the paper so that it fills the screen, making sure there are no shadows.

### ISO ..... Changing the ISO sensitivity

AUTO	Sensitivity is automatically adjusted according to the conditions of the subject.
HIGH ISO AUTO	This function has a higher sensitivity compared to [AUTO] and stabilizes the blur caused by a moving subject or camera movement when taking pictures.
50/100/200/400/ 800/1600/3200/ 6400	A low value lowers the sensitivity for daylight shooting of clear, sharp pictures. The higher the value, the better the camera's light sensitivity and ability to shoot with a fast shutter speed and in low light conditions. However, high sensitivity introduces noise into the resulting picture, which may give it a grainy appearance.

- If set to [6400], [IMAGE QUALITY] is limited to below [2048x1536].
- If [FINE ZOOM] or [DIGITAL ZOOM] is set to [ON], [6400] cannot be set.

**DRIVE** ..... Continuous shooting

	Shoots 1 frame at a time when the shutter button is pressed.
	Focus and exposure are locked at the first frame. The sequential shooting speed varies depending on the setting of image quality.
	Pictures can be taken at a faster speed than normal sequential shooting.
	Sequential shooting at a speed of 15 frames/sec.
	Adjusts the focus 1 frame at a time. The shooting speed is slower than for normal sequential shooting.
<b>BKT</b>	Takes pictures sequentially while changing the exposure for each frame (Bracket shooting). Focus and white balance are locked at the first frame.

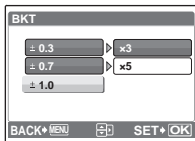

- Press the shutter button completely and keep it pressed to shoot the preset number of pictures. You can stop shooting at any time by releasing the shutter button.

**FINE ZOOM** ..... Zooming in on your subject without reducing image quality

This function allows you to zoom up to 27x by combining the optical zoom and image cropping.

As data with few pixels are not converted to multiple pixels, there is no loss of image quality.

## DIGITAL ZOOM ..... Zooming in on your subject

## METERING ..... Changing the area for measuring the brightness of a subject

ESP	Meters the brightness at the center of the monitor and the surrounding area separately to capture an image with balanced brightness. When taking pictures against strong backlight, the center of the picture may appear dark.
	The AF target mark area is metered. Recommended for taking a picture against strong backlight.
	Meters the brightness over a wide area with emphasis on the center of the screen. This method is used when you do not want to allow surrounding light to affect the picture.

## AF MODE ..... Changing the focusing area

FACE DETECT	When a face is being detected in the screen, the camera will focus on the face. A frame is displayed at the detected position.
iESP	The camera determines which subject within the screen to focus on. Even when the subject is not in the center of the screen, focusing is possible.
SPOT	Focus selection is based on the subject within the AF target mark.
AREA	Move the AF target mark to select the area you want to focus on to take a picture.

- The [FACE DETECT] may not be able to detect the face for some subjects.
- If [FINE ZOOM] or [DIGITAL ZOOM] is set to [ON], [AREA] cannot be set.

### When [AREA] is selected

- To move the AF target mark  
 Press the arrow pad (the AF target mark is displayed in green).  
 You can take pictures while in this status.
- To set the position of the AF target mark  
 Hold down .  
 To change the position of the mark, hold down again.

**FOCUS MODE** ..... Changing the focus method

AF	Press the shutter button halfway. The camera automatically focuses.
MF	Adjust the focus manually.

**When set to [MF]**

- Press  $\Delta \nabla$  to set the focus. During operation, the focus area is enlarged.
- Hold down  $\text{AF-L}$  to fix the focus. The focus is locked at the distance you have set, and MF is displayed in red on the monitor. To adjust the focus, hold down  $\text{AF-L}$  again.
- The distance displayed on the screen is a reference figure.

**FULLTIME AF** ..... Shooting pictures while keeping the subject in focus

OFF	Press the shutter button halfway to focus.
ON	Fulltime AF keeps the subject in front of the lens in focus at all times, without having to press the shutter button halfway. The focusing time is reduced, so you will not miss snapshot opportunities. Also, the subject is automatically kept in focus during movie recording.

**AF PREDICT** ..... Shooting pictures with the focus on subjects moving back and forth

OFF	AF predict is deactivated.
ON	When activated, position the AF target mark on the subject and press the shutter button halfway to engage the AF predict. Then, press the shutter button completely to take the picture.

- $\text{AF-L}$  blinks and AF predict continues to operate while the shutter button is pressed halfway.
- Depending on the subject, the picture may be out of focus even if [AF PREDICT] is set.
- During macro and super macro mode, [AF PREDICT] is not available.

**AF ILLUMINAT.** ..... Setting to light the illuminator in a dark place

OFF	AF illuminator does not light.
ON	Press the shutter button halfway. The AF illuminator automatically lights.

**IMAGE STABILIZER** ..... Shooting pictures using digital image stabilization

This function stabilizes the blur caused by camera movement when taking pictures.

OFF	Digital image stabilization is deactivated.
ON	Digital image stabilization is activated after pressing the shutter button halfway.

- When taking pictures with the camera stabilized (using a tripod), set to [OFF].
- Images may not be correctable if the camera is severely shaken.
- During night shooting or when the shutter speed is very slow, the Digital image stabilization mode may not work.



## ..... Adjusting the amount of light emitted by the flash

Depending on situations such as shooting small subjects or distant backgrounds, it may be advisable to adjust the amount of light emitted by the flash. In addition, this function is useful when increased contrast is desired.

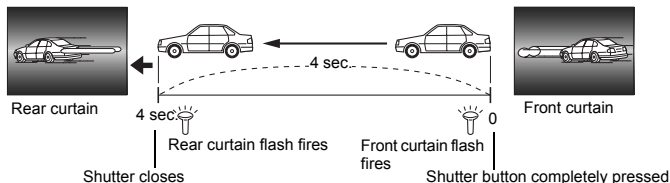

## SYNCRO ..... Selecting the flash timing

 SYNC1	The flash fires right after the shutter fully opens (front curtain).
 SYNC2	With the rear curtain, the flash fires just before the shutter closes (rear curtain). You can use this setting to create interesting effects in your picture, such as expressing the movement of a car by showing the tail-lights streaming backwards. The slower the shutter speed, the better the effects turn out. If the shutter speed is faster than 1/200, the flash fires automatically with the front curtain.




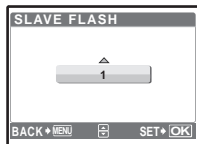





## FLASH ..... Setting to use an external flash

IN	Allows you to take pictures using the built-in flash.
SLAVE	When using a commercially available slave flash that is synchronized with the camera flash, the amount of the light emitted by the flash can be adjusted in 10 levels.

### Selecting an emission level

- When flash is set to [SLAVE], flash mode automatically changes to  (Fill-in flash) for all flash modes except  (Flash off).



Press   to select an emission level from [1] to [10], then press . The bigger number indicates the bigger amount of light emitted by the flash.

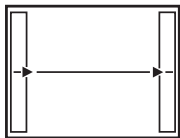

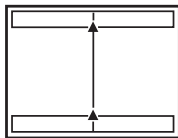

## PANORAMA ..... Creating a panoramic picture

Panorama shooting lets you create a panoramic picture, using the OLYMPUS Master software from the provided CD-ROM. An Olympus xD-Picture Card is required for panorama shooting.



Connects pictures from left to right



Connects pictures from bottom to top

- ▷: The next picture is connected at the right edge.
- ◁: The next picture is connected at the left edge.

- △: The next picture is connected at the top.
- ▽: The next picture is connected at the bottom.

Use the arrow pad to specify at which edge you want to connect the pictures, and then compose your shots so that the edges of the pictures overlap. The part of the previous picture that will be combined will not remain in the frame. Remember the frame displayed on the monitor as a rough indication, then compose the shot so that the edges of the previous picture in the frame overlap with the next shot.



- Press to exit panorama shooting.
- Panorama shooting is possible for up to 10 pictures. A warning mark is displayed after 10 pictures are taken.

## ..... Adjusting the white balance compensation

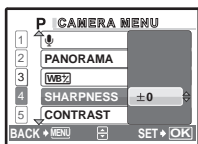


- The white balance can be adjusted in 7 increments in both the [BLUE] and [RED] directions.

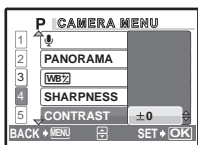

: The image contours are softened. Use this setting when you want to edit images on a computer.

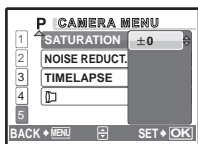
**CONTRAST** ..... **Adjusting the contrast of the image**

△ (Toward +)

: The light and dark areas are defined more clearly, making the image look crisper.

▽ (Toward -)

: The light and dark areas become less defined, giving the image a softer impression. Use this setting when you want to edit images on a computer.

**SATURATION** ..... **Adjusting the saturation of the image**

△ (Toward +)

: Colors become stronger.

▽ (Toward -)

: Colors become weaker.

**NOISE REDUCT.** ..... **Reducing the noise during long exposures**

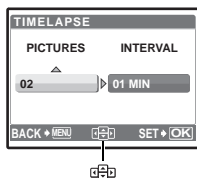
OFF	Noise is not reduced. Noise may be conspicuous at slow shutter speeds.
ON	Noise is reduced. Shooting time takes twice as long as usual. Shooting is not available during noise reduction. Noise reduction can only be used when the shutter speed is slower than 1/2 sec.

- This function may not work effectively with some shooting conditions or subjects.



**TIMELAPSE** ..... Shooting pictures automatically as defined by set conditions

OFF	Timelapse shooting is deactivated.
ON	Timelapse shooting is activated.

**When setting the timelapse shooting**

- Press  $\triangleleft$  to select [PICTURES] and [INTERVAL].
  - Press  $\triangleup$  to set the value.
  - Press  $\odot$  to set.
  - The first picture is taken when the shutter button is pressed, and the pictures thereafter are automatically taken.
  - During timelapse, the  $\odot$  mark lights on the monitor.
  - When recording to either the internal memory or the card, and after the first picture is taken, the camera enters sleep mode. The camera automatically reactivates from sleep mode 4 seconds prior to taking the next picture.
  - When the preset number of pictures is taken, the camera automatically turns off.

  - If any of the following operations occur during sleep mode, the camera cancels the timelapse mode and returns to normal shooting.
    - Opening the battery compartment cover, opening the card cover, connecting the camera to a computer, operating the shutter button, arrow pad or other button.
  - From 4 seconds prior to taking a picture until the time the picture has been taken, all operation buttons, the mode dial and zoom lever do not function.
  - If the internal memory/card becomes full or the battery power runs out during timelapse shooting, a warning is displayed, timelapse stops and the camera automatically turns off.

- Select the picture with  $\triangleleft$   $\triangleright$  and press  $\text{MENU}$ .
- Select the label with  $\triangleleft$   $\triangleright$ , and press  $\text{MENU}$ . (Press  $\triangle$   $\nabla$  to rotate the picture 90° clockwise or counterclockwise.)

**CALENDAR** ..... Create a calendar print with your picture

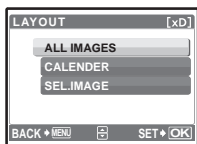
This function lets you select a calendar format, integrate the calendar with a picture, and save it as a new file.



- Select the picture with  $\triangleleft \triangleright$  and press  $\text{MENU}$ .
- Select the calendar with  $\triangleleft \triangleright$ , and press  $\text{MENU}$ . (Press  $\triangle \nabla$  to rotate the picture 90° clockwise or counterclockwise.)
- Set the date of the calendar, and press  $\text{MENU}$ .

**LAYOUT** ..... Creating an index layout of pictures

ALL IMAGES	All pictures in the internal memory or the card are added to the layout.
CALENDAR	A monthly calendar appears and the pictures you want to make layout are selected by the date.
SEL. IMAGE	Pictures that you want to make layout are specified one by one.



- Press  $\triangleleft \triangleright$  to select a layout, and press  $\text{MENU}$ .
- Select the type of layout picture, and press  $\text{MENU}$ .

- The face may not be detected correctly for some subjects.

**INDEX** ..... Making an index picture from a movie

This function extracts 9 frames from a movie and saves them as a new picture (INDEX) containing thumbnails of each frame.



- Use  $\triangleleft \triangleright$  to select a movie and press  $\text{MENU}$ .
- Use the arrow pad to select the first frame of the part you want to keep, and press  $\text{MENU}$ .  
In the same manner, select the last frame of the part you want to keep and press  $\text{MENU}$ .

## EDIT ..... Extracting a part of the movie

Allows you to specify a part of the movie and overwrite it, or save it as a new movie.

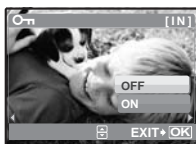

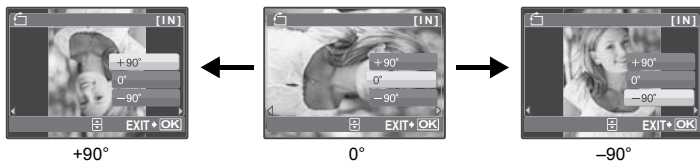

### INDEX PLAY ..... Selecting the playback position of the movie



- Use the arrow pad to select a frame. Push or pull the zoom lever to change the number of displayed index frames.
- Press  $\text{MENU}$ . Movie playback begins from the selected frame.

### ..... Adding sound to still pictures

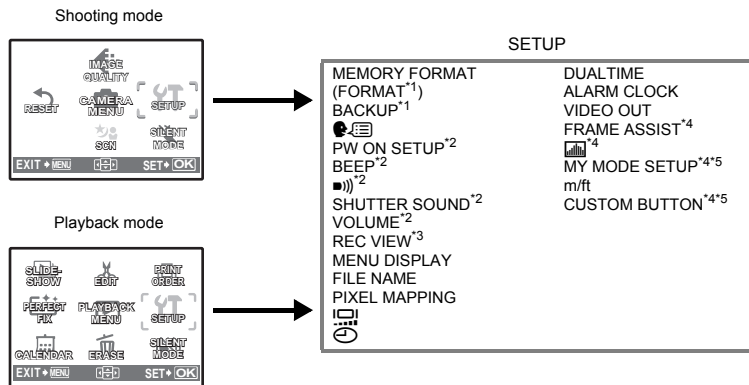

- Be sure that the card is inserted in the camera when formatting the card.
- Before using non-Olympus cards or cards which have been formatted on a computer, you must format them with this camera.

### BACKUP ..... Copying pictures in the internal memory to the card

Insert the optional card into the camera. Copying data does not erase the picture in the internal memory.

- It takes some time to back up data. Check if the battery is not empty before starting the copy, or use the AC adapter.

### ..... Selecting a display language

You can select a language for on-screen display. Available languages vary depending on the area where you purchased this camera.

You can add other languages to your camera with the provided OLYMPUS Master software.

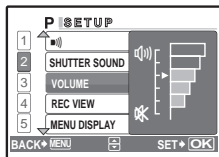

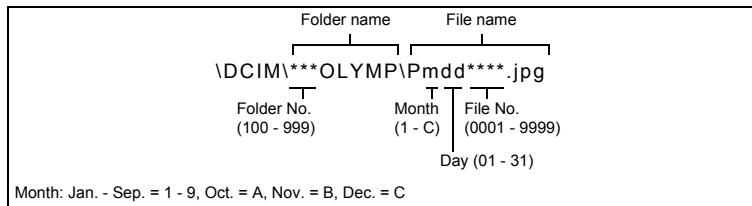

## PIXEL MAPPING ..... Adjusting the image processing function

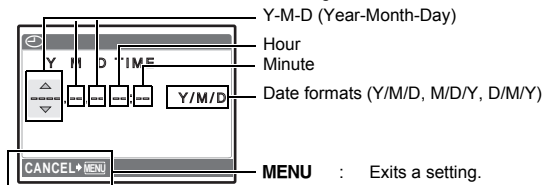
The pixel mapping feature allows the camera to check and adjust the CCD and image processing functions. It is not necessary to operate this function frequently. Approximately once a year is recommended. Wait at least one minute after taking or viewing pictures to allow the pixel mapping function to perform properly. If you turn the camera off during pixel mapping, start again. Select [PIXEL MAPPING]. When [START] is displayed, press .



- △ : Brightens the monitor.

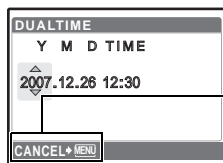
The date and time is saved with each image, and is used in the file name.

## Direct printing (PictBridge)

### Using the direct printing function

By connecting the camera to a PictBridge-compatible printer, you can print pictures directly - no computer necessary. Select the pictures you want to print and the number of prints using the camera's print menus.

To find out if your printer is compatible with PictBridge, refer to the printer's instruction manual.

#### What is PictBridge?

A standard for connecting digital cameras and printers of different makers and printing out pictures directly.

- Available printing modes, paper sizes etc., vary depending on the printer you use. Refer to the instruction manual for your printer.
- For details of printing paper types, ink cassettes, etc., refer to the printer's instruction manual.

### Easy print

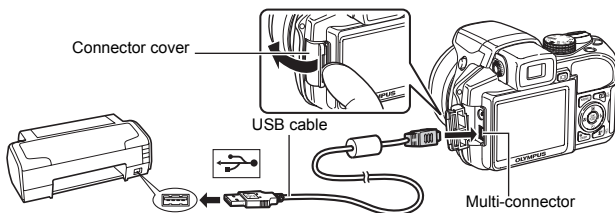
[EASY PRINT] can be used to print out the picture displayed on the monitor.

The selected picture is printed using the standard settings of your printer. The date and file name are not printed.

#### STANDARD

All printers that support PictBridge have standard print settings. If [STANDARD] is selected on the settings screens (P.50 - P.51), pictures are printed according to these settings. Refer to the printer's instruction manual for its standard settings or contact the printer manufacturer.

## Print settings (DPOF)

### How to make print reservations

Print reservation allows you to save printing data (the number of prints and the date and time information) with the pictures stored on the card. With print reservation, you can print out pictures easily either at home using a personal DPOF-compatible printer or at a photo store that supports DPOF. DPOF is a standard format used to record automatic print information from digital cameras.

Only the images stored on the card can be reserved to print. Insert a card with recorded pictures into the camera before making print reservations.

Pictures with print reservations can be printed using the following procedures.

#### Printing using a DPOF-compatible photo store.

You can print the pictures using the print reservation data.

#### Printing using a DPOF-compatible printer.

Printing is possible directly from a card containing print reservation data, without using a computer. For more details, refer to the printer's instruction manual. A PC card adapter may also be necessary.

#### **Note**

- DPOF reservations set by another device cannot be changed by this camera. Make changes using the original device. If a card contains DPOF reservations set by another device, entering reservations using this camera may overwrite the previous reservations.
- You can make DPOF print reservations for up to 999 images per card.
- Not all functions may be available on all printers, or at all photo stores.

#### To use print services without using DPOF

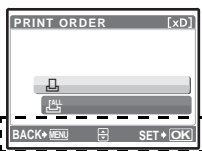
- Pictures stored in the internal memory cannot be printed at a photo store. The pictures need to be copied to a card before taking them.

  - You can make panoramic images using pictures taken in panorama mode.

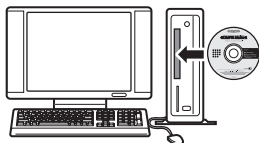

- Operations are not guaranteed when using an added USB or IEEE 1394 (FireWire) port.
- To install the software, you must log on as a user with administrators' privileges.
- Be sure to remove the media (drag & drop onto the trash icon) before performing the following operations. Failure to do so could result in unstable computer operation and the need to reboot.
  - Disconnect the cable connecting the camera to the computer
  - Turn off the camera
  - Open the camera's battery compartment cover/card cover

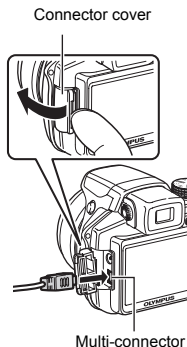

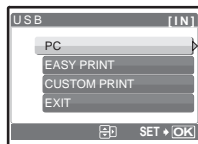


When you connect the camera to your computer for the first time, the computer attempts to recognize the camera. Click "OK" to exit the message that is displayed. The camera is recognized as a "Removable Disk".

#### • Macintosh

The iPhoto program is the default application for managing digital images. When you connect your digital camera for the first time, the iPhoto application starts automatically, so close this application and start OLYMPUS Master.



### Note

- The camera functions are disabled while the camera is connected to a computer.
- Connecting the camera to a computer via a USB hub may cause unstable operation. In this case, do not use a hub, but connect the camera directly to the computer.
- Images cannot be transferred to your computer with OLYMPUS Master if [PC] is selected in Step 3,  is pressed and [MTP] is selected.

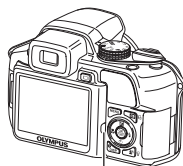

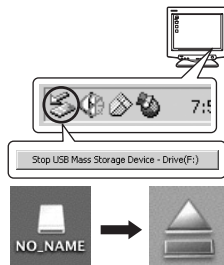

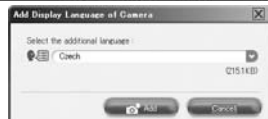

# Getting to know your camera better

## Shooting tips and information

### Tips before you start taking pictures

#### The camera does not turn on even when the batteries are loaded

##### The direction of the batteries is incorrect.

- Insert the batteries in the correct direction.

##### The battery power is exhausted

- Insert new batteries. When using rechargeable batteries, charge the batteries.


##### The battery is temporarily unable to function because of the cold

- Battery performance declines in low temperatures, and the charge may not be sufficient to turn on the camera. Remove the battery and warm it by putting it in your pocket for a while.

##### The camera is connected to a computer

- The camera will not operate while it is connected to a computer.

#### The card cannot be used

- If the contact area of the card is contaminated, data in the card cannot be read and the [CARD SETUP] screen may appear. In this case, select [xD CARD CLEAN], press , remove the card, and then wipe the contact area with a soft dry cloth.

#### No picture is taken when the shutter button is pressed

##### The camera is in sleep mode

- To save battery power, the camera automatically goes into sleep mode and the monitor turns off if there is no operation for 3 minutes when the camera is turned on (when the lens is extended and the monitor is on). No picture is taken even if the shutter button is fully pressed in this mode. Operate the zoom lever or other buttons to restore the camera from sleep mode before taking a picture. If the camera is further left for 12 minutes, it automatically turns off (the lens retracts and the monitor turns off). Press the **POWER** to turn the camera on.

##### The mode dial is set to

- This is the playback mode for displaying pictures on the monitor. Set the mode dial to a shooting mode.

##### The mode dial is set to **GUIDE**

- No pictures can be taken when the shooting guide is being displayed. Take a picture after making the settings following the shooting guide, or turn the mode dial and set it to the position other than **GUIDE** in the shooting mode.

##### The flash is charging

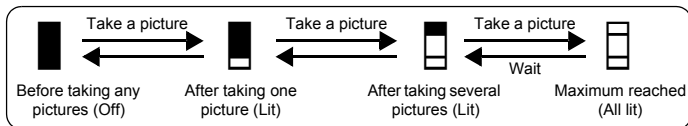
- Wait until  (flash charge) stops blinking before taking the picture.

##### The camera's internal temperature increases

- With prolonged camera use, the internal temperature may increase, resulting in automatic shutdown. If this occurs, remove the battery from the camera and wait until the camera has sufficiently cooled. The camera's external temperature may also increase during use, however this is normal and does not indicate malfunction.

##### The memory gauge is full


- No pictures can be taken when the memory gauge is full. Wait until there is space in the memory gauge.



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### The viewfinder does not turn on


#### The monitor is turned on

- Press  to switch to the viewfinder.

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### The monitor does not turn on

#### The viewfinder is turned on

- Press  to switch to the monitor.

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### The viewfinder or monitor is hard to see


#### There is condensation\* inside the camera

- Turn the camera off. Before turning it on again, wait until the camera adjusts to the surrounding temperature and dries out.
  - \* When it is cold outside, the water vapor in the air is rapidly cooled and turns to droplets of water. Condensation occurs when the camera is suddenly taken from a cold place into a warm room.

#### Vertical lines appear on the monitor screen during shooting

- Aiming the camera at a bright subject in sunlight may cause vertical lines to appear on the screen. This is not a malfunction.



#### The viewfinder is not properly adjusted

- Rotate the diopter adjustment dial slightly and adjust.
  -  "Adjusting the viewfinder's focus using the diopter" (P.9)

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### The date and time have not been set

#### The camera has been used in the same conditions from the time of purchase

- No date and time have been set for the camera at the time of purchase. Set the date and time before using the camera.
  -  "Turn the camera on" (P.6)
  -  "Setting the date and time" (P.44)

#### The battery has been pulled out of the camera.

- The date and time settings will be returned to the factory default settings if the camera is left without batteries for approximately 3 days. In addition, if the batteries are inserted in the camera for a short period, the date and time settings will be returned to the factory default settings more quickly. Before taking important pictures, check that the date and time settings are correct.

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## Shooting tips

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### Focusing on the subject

There are several ways to focus, depending on the subject.


#### When the subject is not in the center of the frame

- Place the subject in the center of the frame, lock the focus on the subject, and then recompose your picture.
- Set [AF MODE] to [AREA].
  -  "AF MODE Changing the focusing area" (P.28)

#### The subject is moving quickly

- Focus the camera on a point roughly the same distance away as the subject you want to shoot and lock the focus (by pressing the shutter button halfway). Then recompose your picture and press the shutter button completely as the subject enters the frame.
- Set the mode dial to **S** to set the shutter speed, and then take the picture. Setting a fast shutter speed lets you capture fast-moving subjects as though they were standing still.
  -  "**S** Changing the shutter speed for shooting pictures" (P.12)

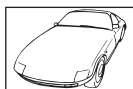
#### The subject is dark.

- Set [AF ILLUMINAT.] to [ON].
  -  "AF ILLUMINAT. Setting to light the illuminator in a dark place" (P.29)

## Subjects that are difficult to focus on

- Under certain types of conditions, it is difficult to focus using auto focus. The green lamp on the monitor lights, allowing you to check if the focus is locked.

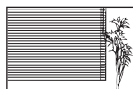

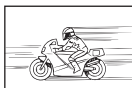

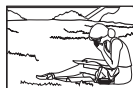

In these cases, focus (focus lock) on an object with high contrast at the same distance as the intended subject, recompose your shot and then take the picture. If the subject has no vertical lines, hold the camera vertically and focus the camera using the focus lock function by pressing the shutter button halfway, and then return the camera to the horizontal position while keeping the button pressed halfway and take the picture.

## Prevent blur by using image stabilization


Be sure to hold the camera firmly with both hands and press the shutter button slowly so as to avoid moving the camera. To correct the digital image, take pictures with  pressed and set  ON]. Pictures are more likely to be blurry when:

- images are shot at a high-magnification zoom setting, i.e. using both optical zoom and digital zoom functions,
- the object is dark and the shutter speed is slow, or
- the flash cannot be used or when a low shutter speed set **SCN** mode is selected.

## Taking stabilized pictures without the flash

To take pictures in low light places without flash, set the following after setting the flash mode to  (Flash off).

### Increase the [ISO] setting


 "ISO Changing the ISO sensitivity" (P.26)

## The picture is too grainy

There are several factors that can cause the picture to appear grainy.


### Using the digital zoom to take close-up pictures

- With the digital zoom, part of the image is cropped and enlarged. The greater the magnification, the grainier the picture appears.

 "DIGITAL ZOOM Zooming in on your subject" (P.28)

### Increasing the ISO sensitivity

- When you increase the [ISO] setting, "noise", which appears as spots of unwanted color or unevenness in the color, can be introduced and give the picture a grainy appearance. This camera is equipped with a function to allow shooting at high sensitivity while suppressing noise; however, increasing the ISO sensitivity creates grainier pictures than when using a lower sensitivity.







## Taking pictures with the correct color

- The reason why there are differences between the colors in a picture and the actual colors taken and the actual color is the light source illuminating the subject. [WB] is the function that allows the camera to determine the correct colors. Normally, the [AUTO] setting provides the optimal white balance, but depending on the subject, it may be better to experiment with changing the [WB] setting.
  - When the subject is in the shade on a sunny day
  - When the subject is illuminated by both natural light and indoor lighting, such as when near a window
  - When there is no white in the center of the frame
- 🔗 “WB Adjusting the color of a picture” (P.25)
- 🔗 “[WB] Adjusting the white balance compensation” (P.31)

## Taking pictures of a white beach or snow scene

- Take pictures with  or  in **SCN** mode. Suitable for taking pictures on a sunny day at the beach or in the snow.
- 🔗 “**SCN** Shoot pictures by selecting a scene according to the situation” (P.13)
- Often, bright subjects (such as snow) turn out darker than their natural colors. Adjust   toward [+] to make these subjects closer to their real shades. Conversely, when you are shooting dark subjects, it can be effective to adjust toward the [-]. Sometimes, using the flash may not produce the brightness (exposure) that was intended.
- 🔗 “  button Changing picture brightness(Exposure compensation)” (P.19)

## Taking pictures of a subject against backlight

- When [SHADOW ADJ. ON] is selected, the face of the subject will appear brighter even against backlight. This function is also effective when shooting indoor pictures from outdoor.
- 🔗 “Shooting mode: Brightening the subject against backlight” (P.18)
- With [METERING] set to , the picture can be taken based on the brightness of the subject in the AF target mark area without being affected by the light in the background.
- 🔗 “METERING Changing the area for measuring the brightness of a subject” (P.28)
- Set the flash to  (Fill-in flash) to activate fill-in-flash. You can shoot a subject against backlight without the face of the subject appearing dark.  (Fill-in flash) is effective for shooting against backlight and under fluorescent and other artificial lighting.
- 🔗 “ button Flash shooting” (P.19)
- With [AF MODE] set to [FACE DETECT], the face of the subject will be given due exposure even against backlight and it will appear brighter.
- 🔗 “AF MODE Changing the focusing area” (P.28)

## When the subject is too bright or too dark

- When taking pictures in **S** mode or **A** mode, the shutter speed or aperture setting may be displayed in red. A red display means that the correct exposure cannot be obtained. If you take the picture as is, the picture will appear too bright or too dark. In this case, use the arrow pad to change the settings.
- 🔗 “**A** Changing the aperture value for shooting pictures” (P.12)
- 🔗 “**S** Changing the shutter speed for shooting pictures” (P.12)

## Additional shooting tips and information


### Increasing the number of pictures that can be taken

There are two ways to record the pictures you take with this camera.

#### Recording pictures to the internal memory



- Pictures are recorded to the internal memory, and when the number of storable still pictures reaches 0, you must connect the camera to a computer to download the pictures, and then erase the pictures from the internal memory.

**Using a card (optional)**

- Pictures are recorded to the card when inserted in the camera. When the card is full, download the pictures to a computer, and then either erase the pictures from the card or use a new card.
  - Pictures are not recorded to the internal memory when a card is inserted in the camera. Pictures in the internal memory can be copied to the card using the [BACKUP] function.



## Extending the useful life of the battery

- Performing any of the following operations when not actually taking pictures can deplete the battery power.
  - The shutter button is pressed halfway repeatedly in shooting mode, activating the auto focus and digital image stabilization.
  - Using the zoom repeatedly.
  - [FULLTIME AF] is set to [ON].
  - The monitor is left on for an extended period of time.
  - The camera is connected to a computer or printer.

## Functions that cannot be selected from menus/buttons

- Some items may not be selectable from the menus when using the arrow pad. (The menu is grayed out and cannot be selected)
  - Items that cannot be set with the current shooting mode
  - Items that cannot be set because of an item that has already been set:

### To print on A5 (8.3 × 5.8 in.) paper and below/ To send as an e-mail attachment or post on a web site



## Restoring default settings

- This camera retains a part of the settings even after the power is turned off. To return the settings to default settings, execute [RESET].

When the mode dial is set to **P**, **A**, **S**, **M** or : the settings are retained even after the power is turned off (except for the settings of , PANORAMA and TIMELAPSE shootings).

When the mode dial is set to **AUTO** or **SCN**: the settings return to default (except for IMAGE QUALITY and IMAGE STABILIZER).

## Confirming the exposure when the monitor is difficult to see outdoors

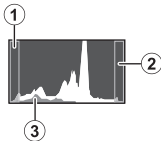
The monitor may be difficult to see (and the exposure difficult to confirm) when shooting under bright light.


### Press **DISP./Q** repeatedly to display the histogram

- Set the exposure so that the graph is concentrated on the outer edges and the graph is balanced on both sides.

#### How to read the histogram

- ① If the peak fills too much of the frame, the image will appear mostly black.
- ② If the peak fills too much of the frame, the image will appear mostly white.
- ③ The part indicated in green in the histogram shows the luminance distribution within the AF target mark.

## Playback help and troubleshooting tips

### The red-eye cannot be fixed.


- Depending on the picture, certain red-eyes may not be correctable. Also, areas other than the eyes may be wrongly corrected.

## Playback tips


### Playing back the picture in the internal memory

- When a card has been inserted in the camera, the picture in the internal memory cannot be played back. Turn off the camera and remove the card to playback pictures stored in the camera's internal memory.


### Understanding the settings and other information of pictures taken

- Play back a picture, and press **DISP./** . Press **DISP./** repeatedly to change the amount of information displayed.

### Quickly displaying a desired picture

- Push the lever toward W to view the pictures as thumbnails (index display) or in a calendar format (calendar display).

### Erasing sound recorded to still pictures

- Once sound is added to a picture, it is not possible to erase the sound. In this case, make a re-recording with silence. Sound recording is not possible if there is insufficient space in the internal memory or on the card.

## Viewing pictures on a computer

### Viewing the entire picture on a computer screen

The size of the picture displayed on a computer screen changes depending on the computer settings. When the monitor setting is 1024x768 and you are using Internet Explorer to view a picture with an image size of 2048x1536 at 100 %, the entire picture cannot be viewed without scrolling. There are several ways you can view the entire picture on the computer screen.












## Camera care

### Cleaning the camera

#### Exterior:

- Wipe gently with a soft cloth. If the camera is very dirty, soak the cloth in mild soapy water and wring well. Wipe the camera with the damp cloth and then dry it with a dry cloth. If you have used the camera at the beach, use a cloth soaked in clean water and wrung well.

#### Monitor and viewfinder:

- Wipe gently with a soft cloth.

#### Lens

- Blow dust off the lens with a commercial blower, then wipe gently with a lens cleaner.



#### Note

- Do not use strong solvents such as benzene or alcohol, or chemically treated cloth.
- Mold may form on the lens surface if the lens is left dirty.

### Storage

- When storing the camera for extended periods, remove the battery, AC adapter and card, and keep in a cool, dry place that is well ventilated.
- Periodically insert the battery and test the camera functions.



#### Note

- Avoid leaving the camera in places where chemical products are handled since this may result in corrosion.

## Battery Handling Precautions

- In addition to the batteries provided with the camera, the following types of battery can be used. Choose the power source best suited to the situation.
  - AA alkaline batteries**  
The number of pictures that you can take may vary considerably depending on the battery manufacturer and shooting conditions.
  - AA NiMH batteries (rechargeable batteries)**  
Olympus NiMH batteries are rechargeable and economical. For details, refer to the instruction manual for your charger.
- **Lithium battery pack (CR-V3) and manganese (zinc-carbon) batteries cannot be used.**
- Power consumption by the camera varies depending on which functions are used.
- Power is consumed continuously during the conditions described below causing batteries to become exhausted quickly.
  - The zoom is used repeatedly.
  - The shutter button is pressed halfway repeatedly in shooting mode, activating the auto focus and digital image stabilization.
  - Set [FULLTIME AF] to [ON].
  - The monitor is left on for an extended period of time.
  - The camera is connected to a computer or printer.
- Battery life varies depending on the type of battery, manufacturer, shooting conditions, etc. Similarly, the camera may turn off without displaying the battery level warning or may display the battery level warning more quickly.

## Useful use of the accessories

### The card

Pictures can be recorded on the optional card.

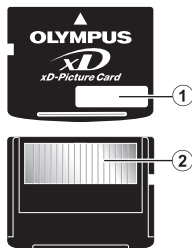
The internal memory and card are the camera's media for recording pictures, similar to film in a film camera.

Pictures recorded to the internal memory or card can be easily erased on the camera or processed using a computer.

Unlike portable storage media, the internal memory cannot be removed or exchanged.

The number of recordable pictures can be increased by using a card with a larger capacity.

- ① Index area  
You can use this space to note down the contents of the card.
- ② Contact area  
The part where the data transferred from the camera enters the card. Do not touch this part with your hands.

### ! Note

- Do not open the battery compartment cover and card cover while the card access lamp is blinking as data reading and writing is in progress. Doing so may damage the data in the internal memory or the card and render the internal memory or card unusable.

## AC adapter

An AC adapter is useful for time-consuming tasks such as image downloads to a computer or when running a slideshow for a long period of time.

Do not use any other AC adapter with this camera.

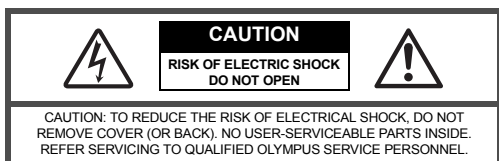
### ! Note

- Do not remove or load the battery or connect or disconnect the AC adapter or the multi-adapter while the camera is turned on. Doing so could affect the camera's internal settings or functions.
- Be sure to read the instruction manual for the AC adapter.

## Using your AC adapter abroad

- The AC adapter can be used in most home electrical sources within the range of 100 V to 240 V AC (50/60Hz) around the world. However, depending on the country or area you are in, the AC wall outlet may be shaped differently and the AC adapter may require a plug adapter to match the wall outlet. For details, ask at your local electrical shop or travel agent.
- Do not use travel voltage converters as they could damage your AC adapter.

## Handling the Camera



### WARNING

- Do not use the camera near flammable or explosive gases.
- Do not use the flash and LED on people (infants, small children, etc.) at close range.
  - You must be at least 1 m (3 ft.) away from the faces of your subjects. Firing the flash too close to the subject's eyes could cause a momentary loss of vision.



- **Keep young children and infants away from the camera.**
  - Always use and store the camera out of the reach of young children and infants to prevent the following dangerous situations which could cause serious injury:
    - Becoming entangled in the camera strap, causing strangulation.
    - Accidentally swallowing the battery, cards or other small parts.
    - Accidentally firing the flash into their own eyes or those of another child.
    - Accidentally being injured by the moving parts of the camera.
- **Do not look at the sun or strong lights with the camera.**
- **Do not use or store the camera in dusty or humid places.**
- **Do not cover the flash with a hand while firing.**

### **CAUTION**

- **Stop using the camera immediately if you notice any unusual odors, noise, or smoke around it.**
  - Never remove the batteries with bare hands, which may cause a fire or burn your hands.
