Lyrics on TV screen- displays the lyrics with the tempo of music when playing CD+G discs.
Auto Voice Control - lets you replace the original singer's voice with your own voice when any prerecorded, multiplex karaoke disc or tape is played. To activate, just rotate Mic Volume to a comfortable listening level, and Auto Voice Control for the best balance between playback and microphone levels.
Balance Control - lets you adjust the balance between the prerecorded original singer's voice and the music if you use a multiplex karaoke disc.
Echo Control - lets you add an echo to enrich your voice for a concert hall effect.
Multiple Karaoke music center - it plays audio Compact Discs, CD+Graphics discs.
Built-In Stereo Speaker - lets you share the music with your family or friends.
Auxiliary Input Jacks - lets you connect another audio input source, such as a stereo VCR or a Radio Tuner, so you can sing along with another music source.
Auxiliary Output Jacks - lets you connect another audio output component, such as an equalizer/booster or a PAsystem.
Extension Speaker Jack - allows extra speaker hook-up.
Three CDG Changer - allows up to 3 CDG Discs and/or audio Compact Discs to be played and programmed continuously and automatically.

## REMOTE CONTROL (BATTERIES NOT INCLUDED)

To operate

- Remove rear battery compartment lid, by sliding it away from the back cabinet.
- Install two alkaline AA batteries in the proper position with + \& - polarities as indicated in the battery compartment. Be sure to replace the compartment lid.
- For trouble free use, point remote control directly at the SMG-301.
- If remote fails to operate, change the batteries.
(This Remote Control is not compatible with universal remote controls.)


## MAKING THE CONNECTIONS

CAUTION: The supplied AC power cord, has a polarized plug that fits into the wall outlet only one way. If the plug does not fit properly, turn it over and try again. Do not force it.

## CONNECTIONTOTVSET

In order to display song lyrics from CDG also to appear on TV screen, you must connect the included video cable (yellow colored RCA single-plug) to the Video Output jack on the back of your SMG-301 unit. Then connect the other end of the video plug (yellow) to the Video Input jack of the television. If your television does not have the required Video Input, you will need an RF Modulator (Radio Frequency Modulator), which connects through your TV antenna or cable line and serves as Video Input.

CONNECTING AN AUDIO COMPONENT FOR INPUT
To connect another audio source (such as a Tuner, an AV Receiver or a VCR) so you can sing along with its music, simply connect the Audio Output jacks (Red \& White RCA jacks) to the Singing Machine's AUX IN R \& L jacks.


## MAKING THE CONNECTIONS

Please have the sample CDG demo disc provided with your Singing Machine playing in the Singing Machine when you are making these connections so you will see the lyrics on the screen as soon as you have the setup completed correctly.

You must specify the source you wish to view when you are connecting the video out from the Singing Machine to either a TV or a VCR. Every TV and VCR manufacturer accomplishes the set-up a little differently. Even though every TV and VCR is a little different, the general idea is the same - if you have two sources of video signal (cable or antenna and Singing Machine), you have to specify which one is displayed on the screen.

If you have never used the video input RCA jack on your TV/VCR you should consult your TV/VCR user guide. If you don't have the manual for your TV or VCR, we suggest calling the customer service department for your manufacturer. They will be able to tell you very quickly how to configure your TV or VCR to display the video connection.

The three most common ways to set up the TV/VCR are:

1) A 'Video' button may be on the TV/VCR or on the remote control. Pressing 'Video' may display the input from your Singing Machine.
2) Try looking for a 'Video' channel between the regular channels on your TV/VCR. Do this by setting the channel on the TV/VCR to channel 2 then pressing the 'Down' channel button to see if there is a 'Video In' or 'Line In' between the lowest channel and the highest channel on your system.
3) The configuration may also be located in the set-up menu on the TV/VCR. Look for a section on 'Input Selection' where you might be able to choose the input source i.e. 'Cable/Ant.', 'Video 1', 'Line In' or 'Video In'.

DC JACK OPERATION: 12 V to 14 V maximum.


A DC jack is provided for external DC power for use in a car, boat or RV. Please be sure that inside of the jack is connected to $\oplus 12 \mathrm{~V}$ side and the outside of jack is connected to $\ominus$, negative side battery. 12 volts fuse protected lighter style plug extension cord with adapter is recommended.

## MAKING THE CONNECTIONS

## CONNECTING AN AUDIO COMPONENT FOR OUTPUT

To connect an audio component (such as a power amplifier or a PAsystem amplifier) so you can hear the Singing Machine's music \& vocal through it, plug the audio component into the AUX OUT jacks.


ATTENTION: ELECTRONIC MASTER VOLUME TOUCH CONTROL
To avoid damaging this control, please twist the master volume control gently to the right or left to obtain a desired level setting. This is an electronic knob and is not designed to turn 360 degree. This knob will only turn a half inch in either direction.

## CD OR CD+G OPERATION

* Warning - Tapping or dropping the microphone while it is on can permanently damage your microphone. Resist the urge to swing the microphone around by the cord!


## PREPARATION

- This unit is designed to play CD's bearing the identification logo " conform to the CD standard, they may not play properly.
- Fingerprints and dust should be carefully wiped off with a soft cloth. Wipe in a straight motion from the center of the disc to the outside edge.
- Never use chemicals, such as record cleaning sprays, antistatic sprays or fluids, benzene or thinner to clean compact disc. These chemicals will permanently damage the plastic surface of the disc.
- Always place the compact disc on the disc tray with the label facing upward. Compact discs can be played on only one side.
- To remove a disc from its storage case, press down on the center of the case and lift the disc out, holding it carefully by edges.
- Discs should be returned to their cases after use to protect them from dust and scratches.
- To prevent warping the disc, do not expose it to direct sunlight, high humidity or high temperatures for extended periods of time.
- Do not apply paper or write anything on either side of the disc. The inks used in some felt-tips pens, may damage the surfaces of the disc.


## PLAYING CD OR CD+G DISC

Reminders:

- Never place anything except a compact disc on the disc drawer. Foreign objects can damage the unit.
- Do not apply excessive force to disc drawer.
- Do not place more than one disc in each location of the drawer.


## TURNING POWER ON/OFF

To turn on the Karaoke center, press the POWER button. The VFD will light up. To turn off the system, press the POWER button again, the VFD will turn off. You can also use the POWER button located on the remote control to turn the system ON and OFF.

## FUNCTION SELECT

Press FUNCTION SELECT button to select the "CD" function.

## LOADING A DISC

1. Press the POWER button to turn the power on.
2. Press the FUNCTION button to select the "CD" function. "CD" blinks on the display, then "no disc" appears.
3. Press the CD OPEN/CLOSE button, the disc tray slides out.
4. Place each disc in the tray with the label facing up.
5. Press the DISC SKIP button to turn the carousel to the next tray position.

Note: Do not touch the carousel while it is rotating.
6. Press the CD OPEN/CLOSE button again to close the disc tray.
(Refer to the Trouble Shooting Guide on page E19 if a disc is loaded but the total tracks do not appear.)

## CD OR CD+G OPERATION

## SELECT DISC PLAY

7. Press one of the disc select button (DISC 1, DISC 2, DISC 3) to select the disc to be played. The symbol for PLAY" " and "1 DISC" appears. Play starts from the first track of the selected disc. The track number and elapsed playing time for the current track are displayed. After play stops at the end of the last track of the selected disc, the total number and total playing time of the selected disc and "TOTAL" will appear.
Note: If the disc is loaded with label facing downward, or if a badly scratched disc is loaded, the player will search for a playable disc. If a playable disc is not found, "no disc" appears on the display.
8. Press the STOP $\square$ button at any time to end disc play.

## TEMPORARILY STOPPING PLAY

Press the PLAY/PAUSE / II button. " $>$ " and elapsed playing time blink on the display. To resume play, press the button again.

## SKIP PLAY(For both CD and CDG Discs)

To skip to track 6 while track 3 is playing, press the SKIP $\gg$ button repeatedly unit " 6 " appears in the TRACK section on the display.
To skip back to track 3 while track 6 is playing, press the SKIP I<4 button repeatedly until " 3 " appears.
Note: Skip functions are disabled in Program Mode.

## SEARCH (For audio CD only, SEARCH mode will not operate for CD+Gs)

When playing any audio CD, press and hold the SKIP buttons ( 144 SKIP $\Rightarrow 1$ ), the system will search at high speed in the forward or reverse direction. Normal play will continue when you release the button.

## REPEAT PLAY

This unit has three different repeat modes. Press the REPEAT button on the remote control repeatedly to select the desired mode in the following sequence. The selected repeat mode is shown on the display.

Note:
During programmed play, only "REPEAT" and "REPEAT 1" can appear.

## RANDOM PLAY

1. Press the RANDOM button on the remote control repeatedly, display changes as following.

2 Press the PLAY/PAUSE / II button to start random play.
The player will automatically select and play discs and tracks at random.

## MEGA BASS

When playing CD disc or Cassette Tape, you can press the MEGA BASS knob, the mega bass effect will be turned on and press the MEGA BASS knob again, the mega bass effect will be turned off.

TIME DISPLAY SELECTION
Press the DISPLAY button repeatedly during normal play. The display changes in the following sequence:

REMAIN (Remaining playing time for the current track)
REMAIN TOTAL(Total remaining playing time for the disc)
TOTAL(Elapsed playing time for the disc)

## Notes:

- During programmed play "REMAIN TOTAL" and "TOTAL" cannot be displayed.
- The displayed playing times may differ slightly from the times listed on the notes accompanying the disc.


## PROGRAMMED PLAY

Up to 60 selections, from up to 3 discs, can be programmed for play in any order.

- To begin the programming procedure, select the "CD" function first.
- The discs or tracks must be programmed in the stop mode.
- The same disc or track can be programmed more than once.
- Load the disc that you want to programmed before starting programmed play.


## Programming procedure

Follow the example below to program tracks 2 and 6 on DISC 1, track 9 on DISC 2 and all tracks on DISC 3. In this example, each disc has 9 tracks and DISC 3 is in playing position.

1. Press the PROGRAM button.

2. Select DISC 1 by pressing the DISC 1 button.

- The DISC SKIP button on the remote control can also be used.


3. Select track 2 by pressing the SKIP $\gg$ button.

- The number button on the remote control can also be used.


4. Press the PROGRAM button.

5. Select track 6 by pressing the SKIP $\gg$ button.

6. Press the PROGRAM button.!
7. Select DISC 2 by pressing the DISC 2 button.

8. Select track 9 by pressing the SKIP $\gg$ button.

9. Press the PROGRAM button.

10. Select DISC 3 by pressing the DISC 3 button.

11. Select "AL" (all) by pressing the SKIP $\gg$ button. Until you reach the end of the tracks.

12. Press the PROGRAM button.
13. Press the PLAY/PAUSE / II button to start play.


When all programmed selections have been played, the first programmed track on DISC 1 will appear and "MEMORY" will blink.

- The program contents are retained in memory.
- The maximum number of selections that can be programmed is 60 . If you try to enter more selections, "FULL"blinks on the display.
- The program is cleared when the STOP $\quad$ button is pressed in the stop mode.


## CHECKING THE PROGRAM

Each time the PROGRAM button is pressed in the stop mode, the programmed details sequentially appear on the display.

## CHANGING A PROGRAM

To add a new selection to a program:

1. In the stop mode, press the PROGRAM button repeatedly until " 00 " on the track section appears on the display.
2. Select a disc and track number as explained above.
3. Press the PROGRAM button.

To change a selection:

1. In the stop mode, press the PROGRAM button repeated until the selection to be replaced is displayed.
2. Select a disc and track number as explained above.
3. Press the PROGRAM button.

Note: Programmed tracks cannot be deleted individually.

## CASSETTE OPERATION

LOADING AND UNLOADING CASSETTES
Follow these steps to load and unload cassettes:

1. Press the STOP/EJECT button (9).
2. Insert a cassette with desired side facing you, tape surface down. Avoid touching tape.
3. Close cassette holder/tape deck cover.

To ensure firm locking of cassette holder/tape covers, please press the cassette door(s) at the center point (or the maximum right position) until a ‘click’ sound is heard.
Note: To unload, press STOP/EJECT button (9), remove cassette and close cover.

## PLAYBACK

1. Turn on POWER (1).
2. Press FUNCTION SELECT button to select the TAPE function, then load cassette(s) into Tape Deck 1, Tape Deck 2 or both Decks (5).
3. Depress PLAY button(s) (10) of Deck 1 or Deck 2.
4. Adjust MASTER VOLUME (6), and BALANCE (8) controls to your pleasure.
5. Adjust PITCH (Tape Speed) (7) control if desired. This will alter pitch and tempo. If music is too high for your voice, slow down the tape and it will lower the pitch. If too low, speed up tape and pitch will raise. You will feel a distinct click when the PITCH knob is re-centered.
6. To stop the tape on either Deck, press STOP/EJECT button (9) on that Deck once. (Pressing a second time will eject the tape.) When a tape reaches its end, that deck will automatically stop and its PLAY button will be released.


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## CONSECUTIVE PLAY

1. Turn on POWER (1).
2. Press FUNCTION SELECT button to select the TAPE function, then load cassettes intoboth decks (5).
3. Depress PLAY button of Deck 2, which will begin to play.
4. Depress PAUSE button of Deck 1, then the PLAY button of Deck 1. When Deck 2 stops, either by the pressing of the STOP/EJECT button or because the tape reaches its end, Deck 1 will begin to play.

## MICROPHONES/ECHO

When either or both microphones are plugged into the Microphone Jacks (3), their output is mixed with the playback from cassette tapes. Adjust MIC VOLUME (2) for best balance between playback and microphone levels.

## SING ALONG WITH A TAPE

1. Following instructions for PLAYBACK.
a) Turn on POWER (1).
b) Press FUNCTION SELECT button to select the Tape function, then load cassette(s) into Tape Deck 1, Tape Deck 2 or both Decks (5).
c) Depress PLAY button(s) (10) of Deck 1 or Deck 2.
d) Adjust MASTER VOLUME (6), and BALANCE (8) controls to your pleasure.
e) Adjust PITCH (Tape Speed) (7) control if desired. This will alter pitch and tempo. If music is too high for your voice, slow down the tape and it will lower the pitch. If too low, speed up tape and pitch will raise. You will feel a distinct click when the PITCH knob is re-centered.
f) To stop tape on either Deck, press STOP/EJECT button (9) on that Deck once. (Pressing a second time will eject that tape.) When tape reaches its end, that deck will automatically stop and its PLAY button will be released.
2. Follow instructions for MICROPHONES/ ECHO. When either or both microphones are plugged into the Microphone Jacks (3), their output is mixed with the playback from cassette tapes. Adjust MIC VOLUME (2) for the best balance between playback and microphone levels.
Adjust ECHO (4) to add depth and richness to vocals.
3. Adjust MASTER VOLUME, ECHO AND PITCH Controls to your satisfaction. Your voice will be combined with the music and will beheard throughthe loudspeakers.
4. With Singing Machine or similar multiplex cassettes, you can sing duets along with the recorded artist and background music. You can also eliminate the vocal track and do a solo performance with the background music by turning the BALANCE Control (8).

## RECORDING TOTAPE

1. Load a blank cassette in Tape Deck 1.
2. Load a Singing Machine or any other prerecorded tape into Tape Deck 2.
3. Start Tape Deck 2 by pressing the PLAY button.
4. Press both RECORD and PLAY button of Tape Deck 1 at the same time. The combined output of your voice and the playback of Tape Deck 2 will be recorded on the blank tape in Tape Deck 1.

RECORDING - CD or CDG Disc(s)
(Audio only, Video is not possible)

1. Load a blank cassette in Tape Deck 1.
2. Load a Singing Machine or any other prerecorded CD/CDG disc into the CD compartment drawer.
3. Press FUNCTION SELECT button to select the CD function. Press the SKIP button to the desired track number you wish to record from.
4. Press the PLAY button to start playback on the CD player. Press both RECORD and PLAY buttons at the same time to begin recording. The combined output of your voice and the playback of the CD or the CDG sound track will be recorded on the blank tape.

## ADDING EXTRA VOICE(S) / DUBBING OR COPYING

1. Load your previously recorded tape into Tape Deck 2.
2. Load another blank tape into Tape Deck 1.
3. Follow Steps 3 of RECORDING TOTAPE for Recording Sing Along. Your voice will again be added, allowing you to sing duets with your own voice. If you use the microphone input for an instrument, you can record that at a separate time than your voice performance. If you simply want to make a dub or copy, load the tape you wish to copy in Tape Deck 2 and a blank tape in Tape Deck 1. Do not plug in the microphones.

## PUBLIC ADDRESS-USING THE SMG-301 AS A SYSTEM

1. Connect the supplied Microphone to either one of the MIC input Jacks
2. Press the POWER button to turn the unit on.
3. Switch the ON/OFF switch located on the Microphone to the ON position and speak or sing to the Microphone. The Microphone sensitivity and loudness could be adjusted as required by turning the MIC VOLUME control and/or the MASTER VOLUME control.
4. To add depth or ambiance to your voice, adjust the ECHO control until the desired effect is obtained.

## Note:

To prevent feedback or whistling from occurring, please be sure that the microphone is not too close to the SMG-301 unit.

## POWER SWITCH

After using the SMG-301, turn off the power by pressing the POWER button.

## CLEANING THE UNIT

To clean the exterior of the unit, simply wipe with a soft clean cloth moistened with plain lukewarm water.

## CLEANING TAPE HEAD

When the tape is running, magnetic tape residue, powder and dust naturally accumulate on the tape deck heads, capstan and pinch roller, when they become too dirty, you will find:

- Sound quality deteriorates.
- The output sound level drops
- The previous recording is not completely erased.
- Recording is not performed satisfactorily. Therefore, for continued high performance from the cassette section, periodically clean the heads, pinch rollers and capstans whenever an accumulation of dust and red-brown oxide particles is noticed. To do this open the cassette compartments. Carefully rub each head ( $4,5,8$ ), pinch roller ( 3,7 ) and capstan ( 2,6 ) with a cotton swab (1) moistened with isopropyl alcohol or special head-cleaning fluid.


Proprietary tape head cleaners are available from most HI-FI retail outlets.

## CASSETTE DECK CARE

Use a clean soft cloth moistened with plain lukewarm water and wrung dry. Never use benzol, benzene or other strong chemical cleaners since these could damage the finish or your unit. It is important that no liquid reaches the inside of the unit.

## NOTE

* Screwdrivers and othermetal objects should never be allowed to come in contact with tape heads. These will scratch the sensitive surface causing damage to yourtapes.
* Magnets or magnetized objects should not be placed near tape heads.


> To prevent fire or shock hazard, disconnect your stereo system from the AC power plug when cleaning.

## COMPACT DISC

## Handling Disc

Although the musictracks in the disc are covered with a protective layer, it is still advisable to treat the disc carefully. Ensure that you always pick up discs by the edge, and put them back in their holders immediately after use.


## CLEANING DISC

Cleaning will not normally be necessary. However, should fingerprints, dust or dirt appear, you can wipe them off with a soft, lint-free cloth. Wipe the disc in a straight line from center to edge. You can moisten the disc first with ordinary tap water if necessary.


NOTE: Do not use the detergent or abrasive cleaning agents, for they can damage the disc.

## CD PLAYER

The player mechanism is fitted with selflubricating bearing and must not be oiled or greased.

If you have followed the instructions and are having difficulty operating the unit, locate the PROBLEM in the left column below. Check the corresponding POSSIBLE CAUSE column to locate and remedy the problem.

## THE SINGING MACHINE KARAOKE GLOSSARY OF TERMS

In addition to all of the terminology associated with consumer electronics products, a few additional terms are used almost exclusively in karaoke. These terms are meant to familiarize you with the world of Karaoke. The features listed below may not necessarily pertain to the particular model Singing Machine that you have. The following are some brief explanations of karaoke terms:

## Echo:

Echo adds depth and resonance to a singer's voice, without affecting the music. This echo is produced by creating minor controlled feedback in the singer's voice.

## Multiplex Recording:

Our multiplex recordings contain 2 copies of the same song. One version is a stereo recording of the song without the lead singer. The second version is recorded with the music and background vocals on the left channel and the lead singer recorded on the right channel. This 'split track' recording allows you to control the volume of the lead singer by adjusting the balance control. You can sing a duet with the lead singer or use the lead singer as a guide as you learn the song, gradually fading them out with the balance control until you are able to sing the song on your own.

## Auto Voice Control (AVC):

When the AVC function is activated, the vocals on a multiplex recording are eliminated as soon as the singer begins singing into the microphone. When the singer stops singing, the vocals on the multiplex recording are automatically re-activated. This useful function is used primarily during practice sessions while a singer is learning a song. Please note that the AVC function only works with multiplex recordings and not with standard recordings.

## Pitch Control:

This function controls pitch of music by controlling the speed at which a cassette tape plays back. By increasing the speed of the tape, the music sounds higher (sharp). By slowing the tape speed, the music sounds lower (flat).

## Key Controller:

This Controller changes the key of the CD/CDG music (+ or - steps) to adjust to the singer's voice.

## CDG:

This is an acronym for Compact Disc plus Graphics. You will also see variations CD+G, and CD+Graphics. This is a regular audio CD with information stored on a data track simultaneous to music. In laymen's terms, CDG has a video output for simple graphics (not full motion video). In the case of karaoke, the graphics function is used to store song lyrics, and display the lyrics in synch with music. In most cases, CDG software displays lyrics which change color as they are to be sung. A regular television is all that is required to display CDG lyrics.

NOTE - CDG is a particular type of compact disc encoding system that is different from VCD or DVD. Your Singing Machine can decode standard audio compact discs and CDG discs. It will not read VCD or DVD encoded discs.

Standard audio discs and cassette tapes will not display lyrics on your TV. Audio CDs do not contain the software necessary to display lyrics.
