### **Warranty Information**

#### **Effective December 30, 2002**

All new Zebra products are warranted by the manufacturer to be free from defect in material and workmanship.

#### **Printers and Related Hardware Products**

Proof of purchase or shipment date is required to validate the warranty period. The warranty becomes void if the equipment is modified, improperly installed or used, damaged by accident or neglect, or if any parts are improperly installed or replaced by the user.

Products returned must be packaged in the original or comparable packing and shipping container. In the event equipment is not so packaged, or if shipping damage is evident, it will not be accepted for service under warranty. Surface transportation charges for return to customers in the continental United States is paid by Zebra. #### **Printers**

All printers (excluding printheads) are warranted against defect in material or workmanship for twelve (12) months from the purchase date.

#### **Printheads**

Since printhead wear is part of normal operation, the original printhead is covered by a limited warranty as indicated below. Warranty period begins on purchase date.

Bar code label and receipt printer printheads	6 months
Plastic card printer printheads	12 months

To qualify for this warranty, the printhead must be returned to the factory or to an authorized service center. Customers are not required to purchase Genuine Zebra Supplies (media and/or ribbons) for warranty qualification.

However, if it is determined that the use of inappropriate or inferior supplies has caused any defect in the printhead for which a warranty claim is made, the user is responsible for Zebra's labor and material charges required to repair the defect. The warranty becomes void if the printhead is physically worn or damaged; also if it is determined that failure to follow the preventive maintenance schedule listed in the Users Guide has caused defect in the thermal printhead for which a warranty claim is made.



### **Unpack and Inspect the Printer**

Make sure the printer is in good condition when you receive it. The instructions below outline what you need to do.

### **Inspect the Printer**

Use this list as a guide to inspect the printer.

- Check all exterior surfaces.
- Raise the media access door and inspect the media compartment.
- In case shipping is required, save the carton and all packing material. Contact your authorized Zebra reseller for instructions.
- A power cord may or may not be included. If one is not included, or if the one included is not suitable for your requirements, see *Power Cord on page 7*.



**Caution** • For personal and equipment safety, always use an approved three-conductor power cord specific to the region or country intended for installation. This cord must utilize and IEC-320 female connector, and the appropriate region-specific three-conductor grounded plug configuration.

### **To Report Damage**

If you discover shipping damage:

- Immediately notify the shipping company and file a damage report with them.
   Zebra Technologies is not responsible for any damage incurred during shipment of the equipment and will not repair this damage under warranty.
- Keep the carton and all packing material for inspection.
- Notify your authorized Zebra reseller.

### **Storage**


If you are not placing the printer into operation immediately, repackage it using the original packing materials. The printer may be stored under the following conditions:

- Temperature:  $-40^{\circ}$  to  $140^{\circ}$  F ( $-40^{\circ}$  to  $60^{\circ}$  C)
- Relative humidity: 5% to 85% non-condensing

### **Printer Overview**

The printer controls are on the front panel. These controls are used to change print settings as needed for your application.

This illustration shows the printer's front panel. The numbered callouts are described in the table that follows the illustration.



Callout	Description
1	LCD shows printer status.
2	Left oval decreases the value, answers NO, indicates OFF, or returns to the previous selection.



Callout	Description
3	Right oval increases values, answers YES, indicates OH, or moves to the next selection.
4	PREVIOUS goes back one step.
5	<b>NEXT/SAVE</b> moves one step or saves settings if used after <b>SETUP/EXIT</b> .
6	<b>SETUP/EXIT</b> enters or leaves menu from the <b>PRINTER READY</b> display.
7	Power light is green when power cord is connected and printer is turned On (1).
8	Take Label light flashes to remind you to take a label when the Peel option is used.
9	Error light shows error condition. Additional lights show where the error is happening.
10	Check Ribbon shows ribbon supply problem.
11	Paper Out shows label supply problem.
12	Pause light shows when <b>PAUSE</b> is pressed and printer is stopped.
13	PAUSE pressed once stops printer; pressed again restarts printer.
14	<b>FEED</b> pressed once feeds a label without printing.
15	Data light flashes to show information going to printer.
16	CANCEL stops current print job.
17	CALIBRATE when used with PAUSE calibrates the printer.





### **Before You Begin**

#### **Load the Printer**

This section gives you a series of instructions to load labels and ribbon (if used).

The instructions that follow are for a standard printer in Tear-Off Mode. For a printer with special options, see *Labels and Print Modes on page 23*. For advanced application instructions, such as how to load different types of labels, or how to choose printing modes, see *Front Panel Controls on page 54*.




**Caution** • Be sure the printer is off (**O**) if you have connected the power cable.

### To load the labels, complete these steps:

**1.** Open the printhead.

This illustration calls out the parts of the printer used when loading the labels.




Callout	Description
1	Printhead lever in open position.
2	Media Guide
3	Media back plate
4	Optional media spindle (media hanger standard)

- **2.** Slide the media guide away from the printer frame. You may need to loosen the media guide screw.
- **3.** Put the roll of labels on the media hanger. (Optional media spindle is shown.)
- **4.** Push the label core toward the printer frame. The labels must be aligned with the label core.

The illustration below shows labels loaded in the printer. The callouts show the labels and the parts of the printer described in the instructions.

- **5.** Feed the labels under the media guide roller and under the printhead.
- **6.** Adjust the media supply guide so it is just touching the edge of the label. The labels should lie flat as shown in the illustration.

- **7.** Are you using direct thermal labels?
  - If yes, close the printhead and go to *To print a configuration label, complete these steps: on page 18.*
  - If no, go to To make a ribbon leader, complete these steps: on page 13.




**Important** • The label type determines whether ribbon is needed.

- **Direct thermal labels** do not need ribbon. Do not load ribbon with direct thermal labels.
- Thermal transfer labels do need ribbon.

#### To make a ribbon leader, complete these steps:

**1.** Unroll about 6" (150 mm) of ribbon from the roll.




- **2.** Tear off a strip of labels and liner about 6" (150 mm) long from the label roll.
- **3.** Peel off a label from the liner and apply half of the label to the end of the liner and half to the end of the ribbon.


This acts as a ribbon leader.



### To load the ribbon, complete these steps:

**1.** Put the roll of ribbon on the ribbon spindle and push the core as far as it will go, until it is against the stop on the ribbon supply spindle.

The callouts in the illustration below and the table that follows show the printer components used when loading the ribbon.




Callout	Description

**2.** Pull the ribbon leader up over the top roller, above the printhead.




Callout	Description

**3.** Bring the leader and ribbon under the ribbon takeup spindle. Wrap the leader and ribbon around the spindle. Turn the spindle several times until the ribbon stays on the spindle.

The callouts in the illustration below and the table that follows show the ribbon leader on the takeup spindle.




Callout	Description

#### To print a configuration label, complete these steps:


**1.** Connect the power cord to the printer.


The power connection is at the back of the printer.



**Caution** • For personal and equipment safety, always use an approved three-conductor power cord specific to the region or country intended for installation. This cord must utilize and IEC-320 female connector, and the appropriate region-specific three-conductor grounded plug configuration.

- **2.** To confirm the power connection, turn the printer On  $(\mathbf{I})$ .
- **3.** If PRINTER READY displays on the front panel LCD, go to the next step. If PRINTER READY does not display, go to *Troubleshooting on page 120*.
- **4.** Turn the printer Off (**O**).
- **5.** Press and hold **CANCEL** while turning the printer On (**1**).
- **6.** After the DATA light turns off (approximately five seconds), release **CANCEL**.







**Important** • Your label may look different from the sample.

- The configuration label is a record of your printer settings.
- Keep the configuration label for baseline information on your printer when troubleshooting printing problems.

#### **7.** Did the label print?

• Yes, a configuration label printed. Connect the printer to your computer system. Communication can be handled in many different ways.

More information about the standard interfaces is available in *Standard Ports* on page 38.

• No, a label did not print. Sensors out of position is a common cause of printing problems.

## **Sensor Adjustment**

Adjust sensors **only** when the printer cannot detect the top of the label. The front panel LCD displays ERROR CONDITION PAPER OUT, even though there are labels loaded in the printer.

#### **Transmissive Sensor**

The transmissive sensor consists of two sections: a light source (the lower media sensor) and a light sensor (the upper media sensor). The media passes between the two.


The upper media sensor must be positioned:

- Directly over the hole or notch, or
- Anywhere along the width of the media if there is a gap between labels.

# To adjust the upper and lower media sensors, complete these steps:

- **1.** Remove the ribbon (if ribbon is used).
- **2.** Locate the upper media sensor. The upper media sensor eye is directly below the adjustment screw head.

See the illustration for a simplified view of the media sensor. Callouts in the illustration are explained in the table that follows.



Callout	Description
1	Upper media sensor adjustment screw
2	Upper media sensor




**Note** • If you are using continuous media, position the upper media sensor over the labels so that the printer can detect an out-of-paper condition.

- **3.** Slightly loosen the upper media sensor adjustment screw (use a Phillips-head screwdriver).
- **4.** Using the tip of the screwdriver, slide the upper sensor along the slot to the desired position.
- **5.** Tighten the adjustment screw to secure the upper media sensor.

## Labels and Print Modes Label Types

## **Label Types**

Set up the printer to match the label, ribbon, and printer options you have chosen. If your label style or your printer options were different from those shown in *To load the labels, complete these steps: on page 11*, review the label styles and print modes in this chapter.




**Note** • A calibration must be performed when the labels and ribbon (if used) are first installed in the printer, or when labels or ribbon are changed. The printer default is auto-calibration. Auto-calibration takes place when the printer is first turned on and after the printhead has been closed, unless the settings have been changed through the front panel or through a software command.

### **Types of Labels**


**Non-Continuous Web labels** Non-continuous web labels (shown below) are individual labels that are separated by a gap, notch, or hole. When you look at the labels, you can tell where one label ends and the next one begins.

The callouts in the illustration and the following table identify different types of non-continuous labels.




Callout	Description
1	Non-continuous label with hole.
2	Non-continuous label with notch.
3	Non-continuous labels on continuous liner with 0.07–0.16 in. (2–4 mm) gap between labels.
4	Non-continuous labels on continuous liner with 0.07–0.16 in. (2–4 mm) gap between labels.

**Non-Continuous Black Mark labels** Non-continuous black mark labels have black marks printed on the back of the liner material that indicate the start and end of each label. Shown in this illustration are examples of black marks.



**Continuous labels** Continuous labels form an uninterrupted roll of material (shown in this illustration) that allows the image to be printed anywhere on the label.





## **Print Mode Choices**

The options on your printer may let you set up additional print modes. See *Front Panel Controls on page 54* to set up the printer front panel controls to match the print mode you are using.

#### **Tear-Off Mode**

See *Load the Printer on page 10* to set up roll labels in Tear-Off Mode.

### **Rewind Mode**


Rewind Mode allows the labels to be wound on a core after printing.




**Note** • Rewind Mode cannot be used with the cutter option for any 110XiIIIPlus.

#### To set up Rewind Mode, complete these steps:

**1.** Remove the rewind plate from its storage location inside the printer media compartment.





- **2.** Position the rewind plate so the lip on the attached hook plate points down.
- **3.** Insert the hook plate lip a short distance (1/2 in. or 13 mm) into the lower opening in the side plate.
- **4.** Align the upper end of the rewind plate with the matching opening in the side plate.
- **5.** Slide in the rewind plate until it stops against the printer's main frame.
- **6.** Open the printhead.
- **7.** Slide the media guide and media supply guide as far from the printer frame as possible. Flip down the media supply guide.

- **8.** Load labels as shown in *Load the Printer on page 10*.
- **9.** When loading labels, allow approximately 36 in. (915 mm) of labels to extend past the printhead. Remove all labels from this portion to create a leader.
- **10.** Remove the hook from the rewind spindle. If you are using a core, slide it onto the rewind spindle until it is flush against the guide plate.
- **11.** Wind the label liner around either the 3 in. (76 mm) core or the rewind spindle. Reinstall the hook.
- **12.** Flip up the media supply guide. Slide in the media guide and media supply guide so they just touch the edge of the labels. The labels should lie flat.
- **13.** Before closing the printhead, make sure:
  - The labels are positioned against the inside guides.
  - The labels are taut and parallel to the pathway when wound onto the rewind spindle or core.
- **14.** Close the printhead.

The labels wind on the rewind spindle or core. The callouts in the illustration and table that follow show the printer and labels in Rewind Mode.

#### **Peel-Off Mode**

Peel-Off Mode advances one label at a time. The printer does not print another label until the first label is removed. The TAKE LABEL light flashes until the label is removed. The liner is wound on the rewind spindle, but the rewind plate is not used.


#### To set up the printer in Peel-Off Mode, complete these steps:

- **1.** Remove the rewind plate (if installed) from the front of the printer. Store it on the two mounting screws on the inside of the front panel.
- **2.** Open the printhead.
- **3.** Slide the media guide and media supply guide as far from the printer frame as possible. Flip down the media supply guide.
- **4.** Start by loading labels as shown in *Load the Printer on page 10*.
- **5.** When loading labels, allow approximately 36 in. (915 mm) of labels to extend past the tear-off/peel-off bar. Remove all labels from this portion to create a leader.
- **6.** Remove the hook from the rewind spindle. If you are using a core, slide it onto the rewind spindle until it is flush against the guide plate.
- **7.** Wind the label liner around either the 3 in. (76 mm) core or the rewind spindle and reinstall the hook.
- **8.** Flip up the media supply guide. Slide in the media guide and media supply guide so they just touch, the edge of the labels. The labels should lie flat.
- **9.** Before closing the printhead, make sure:
  - The labels are positioned against the inside guides.
  - The labels are taut and parallel with the pathway when wound onto the rewind spindle or core.

#### **10.** Close the printhead.

### **Rewind Mode with Cutter Option**

Printers with the Cutter option can use the Rewind Mode, if you wish to print and save a roll of labels. A cutter, as its name suggests, is a rotating knife with a self-sharpening blade. The cutter is attached to the front of the printer. See <a href="https://www.zebra.com">www.zebra.com</a> for more information about the cutter option.



**Note** • The 110XiIIIPlus printers do not combine the rewind option with the cutter option.

# To set up the Rewind Mode for printers with the cutter option, complete these steps:

- Turn the printer on (I).
   The printer feeds out and cuts one label.
- **2.** Select Rewind Mode from the front panel menu.
- **3.** Remove the rewind plate from its storage location in front of the print mechanism inside the media compartment.
- **4.** Invert the rewind plate so that the lip on the attached hook plate points down.
- **5.** Insert the hook plate lip a short distance (1/2 in. or 13 mm) into the lower opening in the side plate. Slide in the rewind plate until it stops against the printer's main frame.
- **6.** Insert the two small tabs on the rewind plate into the corresponding slots in the cutter support bracket. (The rewind plate should spring into the proper position.)
- **7.** Open the printhead.
- **8.** Slide the media guide and media supply guide as far from the printer frame as possible.
- **9.** Flip down the media supply guide.
- **10.** Load labels as shown in *Load the Printer on page 10*. Feed the labels through the cutter mechanism.




**Caution** • Cutter blade is sharp. Do **not** touch the blade with your fingers.

- **11.** When loading labels, allow approximately 36 in. (915 mm) of labels to extend past the printhead. Remove all labels from this portion to create a leader.
- **12.** Remove the hook from the rewind spindle.

- **13.** If you are using a core, slide it onto the rewind spindle until it is flush against the guide plate.
- **14.** Wind the label liner around either the 3 in. (76 mm) core or the rewind spindle.
- **15.** Reinstall the hook.
- **16.** Flip up the media supply guide.
- **17.** Slide in the media guide and media supply guide so they just touch, but do not restrict, the edge of the roll.
- **18.** Before closing the printhead, make sure:
  - The labels are positioned against the inside guides.
  - The labels are taut and parallel with the pathway when wound onto the rewind spindle or core.
- **19.** Close the printhead.

The labels wind on the rewind spindle or core. The callouts in the illustration and table that follows show the printer and labels in Rewind Mode with the cutter option.

## **Rewind Spindle**

Rewind Mode and Peel-Off Mode use the rewind spindle. Label liner must be removed every time you change labels for the printer to work correctly.



**Important** • It is **not** necessary to turn off the power to remove liner from the rewind spindle. If power is turned off, all label formats and images, as well as any temporarily saved parameter settings stored in the printer's internal memory, are lost. When power is turned back on, these items must be reloaded.

To remove label liner from the rewind spindle, complete these steps:



**Note** • If the labels have not run out, you must cut the label liner at the spindle.

- **1.** Unwind approximately 36 in. (915 mm) of liner from the rewind spindle. Cut it off at the spindle.
- **2.** Pull out the hook. Slide the liner off of the rewind spindle and discard.
- **3.** Wind the labels around the rewind spindle once or twice, then reinstall the hook.
- **4.** Continue winding to remove any slack in the labels.


### **Fanfold Labels**

Fanfold labels feed through either the bottom or rear access slot from outside the printer. The media hanger or media supply spindle are **not** used with fanfold labels.


## Labels and Print Modes Print Mode Choices

### To load fanfold labels, complete these steps:

- 1. Open the printhead.
- **2.** Slide the media guide as far from the printer frame as possible.
- **3.** How do you want to feed fanfold labels?
  - From the bottom slot in the printer body. The callouts in the illustration and table that follow show the printer and fanfold labels loaded through the bottom slot.



• From the rear slot in the printer body. The callouts in the illustration and table that follow show the printer and fanfold labels loaded through the rear slot.

#### Cutter option

- If you do **not** have a cutter, go to *Step 4*, *on page 35*.
- If you do have a cutter, feed the fanfold labels through the cutter.



**Caution** • The cutter blade is sharp. Do **not** touch the blade with your fingers.

- **4.** Slide in the media guide so it just touches, but does not restrict, the edge of the labels.
- **5.** Close the printhead lever.

#### **Ribbon Removal**

When the ribbon has run out or must be changed, remove the used ribbon from the take-up spindle.

- If the ribbon has run out, follow the instructions below.
- If the ribbon has not run out, open the printhead and tear or cut the ribbon as close to the ribbon take-up spindle as possible. Follow the instructions below.




**Note** • Do **not** cut through the ribbon on the take-up spindle. Using the release knob allows you to slide the ribbon off the spindle. Cutting may damage the spindle.

# To remove ribbon from the take-up spindle, complete these steps:

**1.** Open the printhead.

The illustration below and the table that follows show the ribbon take-up spindle. The inset shows the notches in the spindle.

- **2.** While holding the ribbon take-up spindle, turn the knob clockwise until it stops. This causes the ribbon release bars to pivot down, easing the spindle's grip on the wound ribbon.
- **3.** Slide the ribbon off the ribbon take-up spindle. Once the spent ribbon has been removed, ensure that the arrow on the knob aligns with the indented notch in the ribbon take-up spindle.
- **4.** Remove the core from the ribbon supply spindle.
- **5.** To load new ribbon, see the directions in *To load the labels, complete these steps:* on page 11.


## **Standard Ports**

The different ports available to connect the *XiIIIPlus* printer to your computer or network include:

- Parallel
- Serial RS232
- USB

### **Parallel Port**

A standard 36-pin parallel connector (as shown below) is available at the back of the printer for connection to the data source.



Port selection for status information is determined by the channel sending the request. The parallel port can be set for bidirectional or unidirectional communication. The default setting is bidirectional.

#### **Serial Port**

Communication using the serial data port of the printer requires choosing the number of data and stop bits, parity, and handshaking. Default settings are 9600 baud, 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, no parity, and XON/XOFF. Parity applies only to data transmitted by the printer because the parity of received data is ignored.

The values selected must be the same as those used by the host equipment connected to the printer.

Connect the serial data cable through the female DB-9 connector (shown below) on the back panel of the printer.



Use a DB-9 to DB-25 interface module for all RS-232 connections through a DB-25 cable.



**Note** • For all RS-232 input and output signals, the printer follows the specifications of the Electronics Industries Association (EIA) RS-232 and the Consultative Committee for International Telegraph and Telephone (CCITT) V.24.



## Serial pin configuration

The table below shows the pin configuration and function of the rear panel serial data connector on the printer.


#### **Direct connection to a computer**

The printer is configured as Data Terminal Equipment (DTE).



**Note** • The cable used to connect the printer to a computer must be a **null modem** (crossover) cable. To connect the printer to any other DTE devices, use a null modem cable.

This illustration shows the internal connections of the printer's RS-232 connector.






**Note** • Pin 9 is also available as a +5 VDC power source at 750 mA. The maximum current draw may be limited by option configuration. To enable this capability, a jumper on the computer's main logic board needs to be installed on JP1, pins 2 and 3



#### **DB-9 to DB-25 connections**

An interface adapter is required (Zebra part number 33138) to connect the printer's DB-9 interface to a DB-25 connector. A generic DB-25 adapter may also be used. The +5 VDC signal source would not be passed through a generic adapter.

This illustration shows the connections required for the DB-9 to DB-25 interface.






#### **Modem connection**

When the printer is connected via its RS-232 interface to Data Communication Equipment (DCE) such as a modem, use a standard RS-232 (straight-through) interface cable.


### RS-422/RS-485 Interconnections



**Caution** • A qualified service technician must install a jumper on the main logic board at JP1, Pins 2 and 3 for the RS-422/RS-485 interface adapter to function properly.

An interface adapter (Zebra part number 33130) is required to connect the printer's RS-232 DB-9 interface to a host computer through an RS-422 or RS-485 interface. A generic DB-25 adapter can be used.

This illustration shows the cable wiring for interconnecting the DB-9 to the interface adapter's DB-25 female connector.



### **USB 2.0 Port**

In addition to serial and parallel data ports, a USB 2.0 port (which is USB 1.1- and 1.0-compatible) is available to connect your printer to the host equipment.

**Note** • Use a USB 2.0-certified compliant cable no longer than 15 feet or 5 m long. A 15 foot (5 m) USB cable is available from Zebra (Zebra part number 33011).

#### **Data Cables**

Data cables must be fully shielded and fitted with metal or metalized connector shells. Shielded cables and connectors are required to prevent radiation and reception of electrical noise. To minimize electrical noise pickup in the cable, keep data cables as short as possible.



**Note** • Zebra printers comply with FCC Rules and Regulations, Part 15 for Class B Equipment using fully shielded data cables. Use of unshielded cables may increase radiation above the Class B limits.

- Do not bundle the data cables tightly with the power cords.
- Do not tie the data cables to power wire conduits.



**Note** • RS-422 and RS-485 applications should use shielded twisted pairs as recommended in the Appendix of the TIA/EIA-485 Specification.

## **PCMCIA Card**



**Caution** • The printer electronics are susceptible to static discharge. Before proceeding, ground yourself to the printer to remove any existing static.


See the instructions below to install the Type I- or Type II-compliant PCMCIA card.



**Note** • The PCMCIA card is hot-swappable (it can be installed while the printer is On).

#### To install the PCMCIA card, complete these steps:

**1.** Review the illustration and table that follows to identify the components you will be working with.

- **2.** Remove the PCMCIA card shield from the rear of the printer as shown.
- **3.** Insert the PCMCIA card, with the notch **up**, into the card slot as shown. (Insert far enough to make the eject button pop out.)
- **4.** Reinstall the PCMCIA card shield over the PCMCIA card and card slot.



The printer is now ready to operate with the additional memory or font option.



**Note** • Initialization of the PCMCIA card may take a few minutes; the PAUSE LED flashes while the card initializes. If the card is already initialized, the PAUSE LED flashes only once or twice.

To be sure the card has successfully initialized, print a configuration label as instructed in *To print a configuration label, complete these steps: on page 18* and review it to see whether the new memory card information is listed.



## **CompactFlash Card**

CompactFlash cards are nonvolatile memory cards that store data even when the power to the printer is turned off.




**Caution** • This procedure should only be performed by qualified service technicians.

# To install the Type I-compliant CompactFlash card, complete these steps:



**Caution** • The printer electronics are susceptible to static discharge. Before proceeding, ground yourself to the printer to remove any existing static.


1. Turn the AC power Off (**O**) and disconnect the AC power cord from the printer. Callouts in this illustration and the table that follows show the parts of the printer used in this procedure.

- **2.** Remove the electronics cover by removing the two screws near the bottom.
- **3.** Lift the electronics cover at the rear top corner as shown and pull the corner forward and up, then lift the cover up and away from the printer.
- **4.** Insert the CompactFlash card into the card slot on the upper portion of the option board—the card can be inserted only one way and should snap into place.

# Memory Cards CompactFlash Card



**Note** • The CompactFlash card should be inserted with the **back** (unlabeled) side of the card facing out.

- **5.** Reinstall the electronics cover by lowering the cover so the lip goes into the channel on the top of the printer. Secure the cover by reinstalling the two screws on the bottom of the cover.
- **6.** Reconnect the printer AC power cord.
- **7.** Press and hold **CANCEL** while turning the printer On (**l**).
- **8.** Check the presence of additional memory or optional fonts by looking at the information on the configuration label printed during the power-on sequence.

The printer is now ready to operate with the additional memory or font option.



**Note** • Initialization of the CompactFlash card may take a few minutes. If the process is not successfully completed within 10 minutes, contact Zebra Technical Support at <a href="http://www.zebra.com/SS/service\_support.htm">http://www.zebra.com/SS/service\_support.htm</a> for assistance.

### **Front Panel Controls**

After you have installed the labels and ribbon and printed a configuration label, you can change your *Xi*III*Plus* printer settings using the front panel controls. Basic information about using the front panel controls is included in this appendix. See *Front Panel Lights on page 57*, and *Troubleshooting on page 120* for detailed information on the printer menu and on solving printing problems.

After the Power-On Self Test (POST) is complete, the LCD shows PRINTER READY.



**Note** • Printers that are operating on an IP network can be quickly configured with the ZebraLink™ WebView (ZebraNet® PrintServer II required). For information, see *ZebraNet Networking: PrintServer II Installation and User's Guide*.

### **Enter Setup Mode**

Press **SETUP/EXIT** to enter Setup Mode. Press either **NEXT/SAVE** or **PREVIOUS** to scroll to the parameter you wish to set.

Parameters are shown in the order displayed when pressing **NEXT/SAVE**. Throughout this process, press **NEXT/SAVE** to continue to the next parameter, or press **PREVIOUS** to return to the previous parameter in the cycle.

### **Leave Setup Mode**



**Note** • If you need to restore the printer to its factory default settings, see *FEED and PAUSE Self Test on page 136*.

You can leave Setup Mode at any time by pressing **SETUP/EXIT**. The SAVE CHANGES display appears. Pressing the left or right black oval displays other choices and pressing **NEXT/SAVE** selects the displayed choice.

The five menu choices are described in the table below.

LCD Display	Description
PERMANENT	Permanently saves the changes. Values are stored in the printer even when power is turned off.
TEMPORARY	Saves the changes until you change them again or until power is turned off.
CANCEL	Cancels all changes from the time you pressed <b>SETUP/ EXIT</b> except the darkness and tear-off settings (if they were changed).
LOAD DEFAULTS	Loads the factory defaults. The factory defaults are shown on the following pages.
LOAD LAST SAVE	Loads values from the last permanent save.



**Note** • Loading factory defaults causes the printer to auto-calibrate.

#### **Password-Protected Parameters**

Certain parameters are password-protected by factory default, including the communication parameters.



**Note** • If the parameters are set incorrectly, the printer function may be unpredictable.

The first attempt to change one of these parameters (pressing one of the black ovals) requires you to enter a four-digit password at the ENTER PASSWORD display. The left black oval changes the selected digit position; the right black oval increases the selected digit value. After entering the password, press **NEXT/SAVE**. The parameter you wish to change is displayed. If the password was entered correctly, you can now change the value.



### **Default password value**

The default password value is **1234**. The password can be changed using the **^KP** (Define Password) ZPL II instruction or through ZebraLink™ WebView (ZebraNet® PrintServer II required).



**Note** • Once the password has been entered correctly, it does not have to be entered again unless you leave Setup Mode using **SETUP/EXIT**, or if you turn the printer Off (**O**) and then reenter Setup Mode.

#### Disable the password protection feature

You can disable the password protection feature so that it no longer prompts you for a password by setting the password to  $\emptyset\emptyset\emptyset\emptyset$  via the **^KPØ** ZPL/ZPL II command. To reenable the password-protection feature, send the ZPL/ZPL II command **^KPx**, where **x** can be any number, one to four digits in length, except  $\emptyset$ .





#### **Routine Procedures**

The recommended cleaning schedule is shown in the table below. See the following pages for specific procedures.

**Caution** • Use only the cleaning agents indicated. Zebra Technologies is not responsible for damage caused by any other fluids being used on this printer.

#### **Exterior**

**Caution** • Do not use harsh or abrasive cleaning agents or solvents.

- Clean the outside surfaces of the printer with a lint-free cloth.
- Use a mild detergent solution or desktop cleaner sparingly, as needed.

#### **Interior**

- After every four rolls of labels, inspect the inside of the printer.
- Use a soft bristle brush or a vacuum cleaner to remove any dirt and lint from the interior of the printer.

#### **Printhead and Platen Roller**

After every roll of ribbon, clean the printhead. Clean the printhead more often if you see inconsistent print quality, such as voids in the bar code or graphics.

For 200 and 300 dpi printers Clean after every roll (1500 feet or 450 m) of thermal transfer ribbon or after every roll (500 feet or 150 m) of direct thermal labels or when CLEAN HEAD NOW appears on the LCD.

For 600 dpi printers Clean after each roll (500 feet or 150 m) of labels or when CLEAN HEAD NOW appears on the LCD.



**Caution** • An improperly seated printhead, data cable or power cable could result in the printhead generating excessive heat that could cause harm if it is touched.



**Notes** • You do **not** need to turn off the printer before cleaning the printhead.

If power is turned off, all label formats and images, as well as any temporarily saved parameter settings stored in the printer's internal memory, are lost. When power is turned back on, these items must be reloaded.

If power is removed from a 600 dpi printer when cleaning the printhead, the CLEAN HEAD NOW warning shown on the LCD will **not** disappear.

#### To clean the printhead, complete these steps:

- 1. Open the printhead.
- **2.** Remove the labels and ribbon (if loaded).
- **3.** Moisten an applicator tip with solvent and wipe along the print elements from end to end. (The print elements are on the brown strip just behind the chrome strip on the printhead.)

Allow a few seconds for the solvent to evaporate.

- **4.** Rotate the platen roller and clean thoroughly with solvent and an applicator.
- **5.** Brush or vacuum any accumulated paper lint and dust away from the rollers.
- **6.** Reload ribbon and close the printhead.




**Note** • If print quality has not improved after performing this procedure, try cleaning the printhead with Save-a-Printhead cleaning film. This specially coated material removes contamination buildup without damaging the printhead. Call your authorized Zebra reseller or distributor for more information.

#### **Sensors**

Brush or vacuum any accumulated paper lint and dust off the sensors at any time the sensors are blocked. At minimum, clean the sensors (the ribbon sensor and optional label available sensor shown below and the media sensors shown in *Sensor Adjustment on page 20*) according to the schedule in *Routine Procedures on page 112*.


#### **Snap Plate**

Clean the snap plate when label adhesive or a label is stuck to the underside of the snap plate.

### To clean the snap plate, complete these steps:

**1.** Insert a small-blade screwdriver or similar tool into the loop on the left side of the snap plate.

The illustration callouts show the loops and snap plate, as identified in the table following the illustration.

**Note** • Take care not to bend, twist, or otherwise deform the loops. If the snap plate is damaged in any way, you may need a new plate for proper ribbon sensing.

- **2. Gently** lift the snap plate.
- **3.** Insert a small-blade screwdriver or similar tool into the loop on the right side of the snap plate.
- **4. Gently** lift the snap plate.
- **5.** Remove the snap plate from the printer.
- **6.** Clean the snap plate with cleaning solvent and a soft cloth.

- **7.** To reinstall the snap plate, insert the two tabs on the bottom of the snap plate into the two slots of the media path.
- **8.** Slide the snap plate toward you.
- **9.** Press down on the loops to lock the snap plate into place.

#### Cutter

If the cutter is not cutting the labels cleanly, or if the cutter jams with labels, clean the cutter.



**Caution** • Turn the AC power switch Off (**O**) and unplug the power cord. The cutter blade is sharp. Do **not** rub the blade with your fingers.

#### To clean the cutter, complete these steps:

- **1.** Turn Off (**O**) the printer.
- **2.** Unplug the power cord.
- **3.** Clean the stationary cutter blade with a solvent of 90% isopropyl alcohol.

If this does not remove label fragments and adhesive, contact an authorized service technician.

### **Fuse Replacement**

**Important** • The 110*Xi*III*Plus* fuse can be replaced **only** by an authorized service technician.




**Caution** • Turn the AC power switch Off (**O**) and remove the power cord before performing this procedure.

The printer uses a metric-style fuse ( $5 \times 20$  mm IEC) rated at F5A, 250 V. The AC power entry module comes with two approved fuses in the fuse holder: one is incircuit and the second is provided as a spare (see the Fuse Removal illustration below). The end caps of the fuse must bear the certification mark of a known international safety organization.

#### To replace a faulty fuse, complete these steps:

1. Use a small-blade screwdriver or similar tool to remove the fuse holder.

The fuse holder is part of the AC power entry module at the rear of the printer. The illustration callouts and the table that follows identify the parts of the AC power entry module.



**2.** Remove the faulty fuse and install a new fuse in the in-circuit position as shown. If you use the spare fuse, be sure to order a replacement fuse from your Zebra distributor.

- **3.** Snap the fuse holder back into the AC power entry module.
- **4.** Reconnect the power cord and turn the printer On (**I**).



**Note** • If the AC power is not restored, an internal component failure may have occurred and the printer requires servicing by an authorized service technician.



## **Troubleshooting**

If there is an error condition on the printer or the labels are not printing or advancing correctly, review the checklist below.

□What type of labels are you using? Review the types of label and the print modes, see <i>Labels and Print Modes on page 23</i> .
□ Review the label- and ribbon-loading illustrations, starting with <i>Load the Printer on page 10</i> .
□Check the position of the media sensor and move if necessary, as shown in <i>Sensor</i>

Adjustment on page 20.

### **Printhead Adjustment**

**Important** • Print quality depends on the labels and ribbon used as well as the toggle pressure. Make sure your labels and ribbon are right for your application.

- **Direct thermal labels** do not need ribbon.
- Thermal transfer labels need thermal transfer ribbon.

Printhead pressure and the darkness setting affect print quality. If the darkness setting is too high for the labels and ribbon being used, it causes premature printhead wear. If the toggle pressure is not even, labels and ribbon may slip.

Toggle adjustment may be needed if printing is too light on one side or if thick labels are used. Make sure that the toggles are positioned properly.

Both toggles should be positioned so they provide even pressure on the labels. The toggles are positioned by sliding them to the desired location.

- If you are using a 90XiIIIPlus or 96XiIIIPlus printer, position the single toggle over the center of the labels.
- All other printer models have two toggles. If the labels are too narrow to fit both toggles, position one toggle over the center of the labels and decrease the pressure on the unused toggle.


If positioning the toggles properly does not solve the problem, adjust printhead pressure.

### To adjust printhead pressure, complete these steps:



**Note** • Printhead life can be maximized by using the lowest pressure that produces the desired print quality.

- **1.** Print some labels at 2.4 in. (61 mm) per second by running the **PAUSE** Self Test described in *To perform a PAUSE self test, complete these steps: on page 134.*
- **2.** While printing labels, lower the darkness setting using the front panel controls until a gray level of printing is seen.
- **3.** Loosen the adjusting nuts at the top of the toggle assemblies.
- **4.** The 90*Xi*III*Plus* and 96*Xi*III*Plus* printers have only one toggle.Loosen the adjusting nuts at the top of the toggle assemblies.



# To adjust printhead pressure for specialized labels, complete these steps:

- **1.** For label types that require higher pressure to print well, increase the pressure using the adjusting nuts at the top of the toggle assemblies.
- **2.** Increase the darkness level using the front panel controls until the printing is clear.
- **3.** Tighten the knurled adjusting nuts.



#### **Media and Ribbon Sensor Calibration**



**Note** • Before you begin this procedure, make sure that the maximum length is set to a value 1 in. (25.4 mm) greater than the length of the labels you are using. If the maximum length is set to a lower value, the calibration process assumes that continuous media is in the printer. See *Labels and Print Modes on page 23* for more information.

Media and ribbon sensor calibration is one of the most common adjustments to the printer settings. There are two different types of calibration that can be done by the printer.

**Auto-calibration** is done by the printer feeding media when the printhead has been closed and it is first turned on. The printer automatically sets the value it detects for the spaces between labels. This type of calibration also happens as part of both the sensor profile and media and ribbon calibration procedures.

**Media and Ribbon Sensor Sensitivity Calibration** resets the sensitivity of the sensors to detect correctly the media and ribbon you are using. See *MEDIA AND RIBBON CALIBRATE on page 70* for instructions. Changing the type of ribbon and/or media may require resetting the sensitivity of the media and ribbon sensors. When the sensors are at their new sensitivity, the printer performs a standard calibration. Indications that the sensitivity may need to be reset are:

- A CHECK RIBBON light on with the ribbon properly installed
- Non-continuous labels being treated as continuous labels.

### **Printer Settings Can Be Changed**

Printer settings can be controlled by your printer's driver or label preparation software, as well as at the front panel of the printer. Some examples of ways or places to change the printer settings are:

### **LCD Error Conditions**

The LCD displays messages when there is an error condition. The error messages are listed below with the most likely causes and their solution.

#### **Error Condition Ribbon Out**

Cause	Solution
Thermal Transfer Mode, ribbon is not loaded or is loaded incorrectly.	Load the ribbon correctly, following directions in <i>To load the ribbon, complete these steps: on page 14</i> .
Thermal Transfer Mode, ribbon is loaded but the ribbon sensor is not sensing the ribbon.	Adjust the media and ribbon sensor calibration.
Direct Thermal Mode	Make sure ribbon is not loaded and printer is in Direct Thermal Print Mode.
	Make sure the printer driver and software settings are compatible with Direct Thermal Print Mode.

### **Error Condition—Paper Out**

Cause	Solution
Labels are not loaded or are loaded incorrectly.	Load the labels correctly.
Media Sensor is not adjusted correctly.	Check the position of the media sensors, and adjust if necessary.
Printer is set for non-continuous labels but continuous labels are loaded.	• Make sure the labels and the Media Type settings match.
	<ul> <li>Make sure the printer driver or software settings match the label and Media Type settings</li> </ul>
	• Calibrate the printer.

# Appendixes Troubleshooting

Cause	Solution
Media Sensor does not match labels.	• Using the front panel controls, check the sensor type to ensure that the correct one is used for the labels loaded.
	• Calibrate the printer.

### **Error Condition—Head Open**

Cause	Solution
The printhead is not fully closed.	Close the printhead.

### **Error Condition—Head Element Bad**



**Important** • Does not apply to the 110*Xi*III*Plus* printers.

Cause	Solution
One or more of the printhead elements has failed the printhead element test.	If the failed elements affect your printing application, replace the printhead. To override this error, disable the head test count feature on the front panel by defaulting the value to <b>0000</b> . See <i>Front Panel Controls on page 54</i> .

## Warning—Ribbon In

Cause	Solution
The ribbon is loaded.	• Remove the ribbon and set the printer to Direct Thermal Mode.
	• Ensure that the printer driver and/or software settings are correctly set (if applicable).

## **Warning—Head Too Hot**



**Caution** • The printhead is hot and can cause severe burns. Allow the printhead to cool.

Cause	Solution
The printhead is over temperature.	Printing automatically resumes when the printhead elements cool to an acceptable operating temperature.

## Warning—Clean Head Now

Cause	Solution
The printhead requires cleaning.	See To clean the printhead, complete these steps: on page 114 and clean the printhead.
	<b>Note</b> • If the warning does not go away after the printhead is cleaned, open the printhead and then close it.



## Warning—Head Cold



**Caution** • An improperly connected cable can cause this warning. The printhead is hot and can cause severe burns. Allow the printhead to cool.

Cause	Solution
The printhead is under temperature.	Continue printing while the printhead reaches the correct operating temperature. If the error remains, the environment may be too cold for proper printing. Relocate the printer to a warmer area.
Printhead data cable is not properly connected.	Disconnect and reconnect data cable to the printhead. Ensure that the cable connector is fully inserted into the printhead connector.

## **Warning—Cutter Jammed**

Cause	Solution
Cutter blade is in the media path.	Turn off the printer power and unplug the printer. Inspect the cutter module for debris and clean as needed following the cleaning instructions in <i>To clean the cutter, complete these steps: on page 117</i> .

## **Out of Memory**

Cause	Solution
There is not enough memory to perform the function shown on the second line of the error message.	<ul> <li>Shut off the printer to clear memory and try to print again.</li> </ul>
	• If the error recurs, there is insufficient memory for the label length, downloaded fonts or graphics, and images.
	<ul> <li>Ensure that the device, such as Flash memory or PCMCIA card, is installed and not write-protected or full.</li> </ul>
	• Ensure that the data is not directed to a device that is not installed or available.

## **Print Quality Problems**

## **General Print Quality Issues**

Cause	Solution
You are using an incorrect labels and ribbon combination for your application.	Consult your authorized Zebra reseller ordistributor for information and advice.
The printer is set at the incorrect print speed.	For optimal print quality, set the print speed to the lowest possible setting via ZPL II, the driver, or the software.
The printer is set at the incorrect darkness level.	For optimal print quality, set the darkness to the lowest possible setting via the front panel, the driver, or the software.



Cause	Solution
The printhead is dirty.	Clean the printhead according to the instructions <i>To clean the printhead, complete these steps: on page 114.</i>
There is light printing (or no printing) on the left or right side of the label or the printed image is not sharp.	The toggle pressure needs to be adjusted. Follow the printhead pressure adjustment instructions in <i>Printhead Adjustment on page 120</i> .

#### Gray lines on blank labels with no consistent pattern

Cause	Solution
The printhead is dirty.	Clean the printhead according to the instructions <i>To clean the printhead</i> , complete these steps: on page 114.

## Light, consistent vertical lines running through all of the labels

Cause	Solution
The printhead or platen roller is dirty.	Clean the printhead, platen roller, or both as instructed in <i>To clean the printhead</i> , complete these steps: on page 114.

## Intermittent creases on the left and right edges of the labels

Cause	Solution
There is too much toggle pressure on the printhead.	Reduce the toggle pressure. See <i>Printhead Adjustment on page 120</i> .



#### **Wrinkled Ribbon**

Cause	Solution
The ribbon is not loaded correctly.	Load the ribbon correctly. See <i>To load the ribbon, complete these steps: on page 14.</i>
The darkness setting is incorrect.	Set the darkness to the lowest possible setting for good print quality.
Incorrect printhead pressure or balance.	Set the pressure to the minimum required for good print quality. See <i>Printhead Adjustment on page 120</i> .
The labels are not feeding correctly. They are shifting from side to side.	Make sure that the media guide and media supply guide touch the edge of the media.
	Adjust the ribbon strip plate.



## **Communications**

A label format was sent to the printer but not recognized. The DATA light does not flash.

Cause	Solution
The communication parameters are incorrect.	<ul> <li>Check the printer driver or software communications settings (if applicable).</li> </ul>
	• If you are using serial communication, check the serial port setting in the front panel menu. See <i>Front Panel Controls on page 54</i> .
	<ul> <li>Make sure you are using the correct communication cable. See <i>USB 2.0 Port</i> on page 45 for the requirements.</li> </ul>
	• Using the front panel controls, check the protocol setting. It should be set to NONE. See <i>Front Panel Controls on page 54</i> .
	<ul> <li>If a driver is used, check the driver communication settings for your connection.</li> </ul>

A label format was sent to the printer. Several labels print, then the printer skips, misplaces, misses, or distorts the image on the label.

Cause	Solution	
The host is set to EPP parallel communications.	• Change the settings on the computer host to standard parallel communications.	
	• Ensure that the flow control settings match.	
The serial communication settings are incorrect.	• Check the communication cable length. See <i>Data Cables on page 46</i> for requirements.	
	• Check the printer driver or software communications settings (if applicable).	

A label format was sent to the printer but not recognized. The DATA light flashes but no printing occurs.

Cause	Solution	
The prefix and delimiter characters set in the printer do not match the ones in the label format.	Verify the prefix and delimiter characters. See <i>Front Panel Controls on page 54</i> for the requirements.	
Incorrect data is being sent to the printer.	• Ensure that ZPL is being used.	
	• Check the communication settings on the computer. Ensure that they match the printer settings.	

The printer fails to calibrate or detect the top of the label.

Cause	Solution
The printer was not calibrated for the label being used.	Perform the calibration procedure in <i>CANCEL Self Test on page 132</i> .
The printer is configured for continuous media.	Set the media type to non-continuous media.
The driver or software configuration is not set correctly.	Driver or software settings produce ZPL commands that can overwrite the printer configuration. Check the driver or software media-related setting.

## **Printer Diagnostics**

Self tests give information about the condition of the printer. The most commonly used are the Power-On and the CANCEL self test.

#### **Power-On Self Test**

The Power-On Self Test (POST) is performed automatically each time the printer is turned on. During either test sequence, the front panel LEDs light up and the LCD monitors the progress of the POST. If the printer fails any of these tests, FAILED shows on the LCD. If this occurs, notify an authorized Zebra reseller.



#### **Additional Printer Self Tests**

These self tests produce sample printouts and provide specific information that help determine the operating conditions for the printer.

Each self test is enabled by pressing a specific front panel key or combination of keys while turning the POWER On (I). Keep the key(s) depressed until the DATA light turns off. When the POST is complete, the selected self test starts automatically.



**Note** • When performing a self test, do not send a label format to the printer.

For remote hosts, disconnect all data interface cables from the printer. For printers in Peel-Off Mode, remove the labels as they come out of the printer.

**Caution** • Be sure that the print width is set to match the label width you are using before running any self tests. If the labels are not wide enough, the test may print on the platen roller and damage it.

#### **CANCEL Self Test**

The CANCEL self test prints a configuration label. The configuration label tells you the current settings for the printer.

### To perform the CANCEL Self Test, complete these steps:

- **1.** Turn the printer Off (**O**).
- **2.** Press and hold **CANCEL** while turning the powerOn (**I**). Hold **CANCEL** until the DATA light turns off.

A configuration label prints.

The printer configuration can be changed by performing a calibration procedure. See *To print a configuration label, complete these steps: on page 18* for further information about the configuration procedure.




#### **PAUSE Self Test**

This self test can be used to provide the test labels required when making adjustments to the printer's mechanical assemblies. See the sample printout below.

#### To perform a PAUSE self test, complete these steps:

- **1.** Turn off the printer.
- **2.** Press and hold **PAUSE** while turning the power On (**l**). Hold **PAUSE** until the Data light turns off.
  - The initial self test prints 15 labels at 2.4 in. (61 mm) per second (1 in. or 25.4 mm per second for the 96*Xi*III*Plus*), then automatically pauses the printer. When **PAUSE** is pressed, an additional 15 labels print. The labels are like the one shown below.



- While the printer is paused, pressing **CANCEL** alters the self test. When **PAUSE** is pressed, 15 labels print at 6 in. or 152 mm per second (4 in. or 102 mm per second for the 96*Xi*III*Plus*).
- While the printer is paused, pressing **CANCEL** again alters the self test a second time. When **PAUSE** is pressed, 50 labels print at 2.4 in. (61 mm per second). For the 96*XiIIIPlus*, printing at 1 in. (25.4 mm) per second.
- While the printer is paused, pressing **CANCEL** again alters the self test a third time. When **PAUSE** is pressed, 50 labels print at 6 in. (152 mm) per second. For the 96*Xi*III*Plus*, printing at 4 in. (102 mm) per second.
- While the printer is paused, pressing CANCEL again alters the self test a
  fourth time. When PAUSE is pressed, 15 labels print at the printer's
  maximum speed.
- To exit this self test at any time, press and hold **CANCEL**.

#### **FEED Self Test**

This test helps you choose the best darkness setting for your printer.

## To perform a FEED self test, complete these steps:

- **1.** Turn off the printer.
- **2.** Press and hold **FEED** while turning the power On (**I**). Hold **FEED** until the Data light turns off.

This self test prints out a series of labels like the one below at various darkness settings higher and lower than the darkness value shown on the configuration label.



Inspect these labels and determine which one has the best darkness setting for your application. This value can be entered into the printer by setting the darkness during the configuration procedure.

The value printed on that label is added to (plus) or subtracted from (minus) the darkness value specified on the configuration label. The resulting numeric value (0 to 30) is the best darkness value for that specific label/ribbon combination.



#### **FEED and PAUSE Self Test**

Performing this self test temporarily resets the printer configuration to the factory default values. These values are active only until power is turned off unless you save them permanently in memory.

#### To perform a FEED and PAUSE self test, complete these steps:

- 1. Turn off the printer.
- **2.** Press and hold **FEED** and **PAUSE** while turning the power On (**I**). Hold **FEED** and **PAUSE** until the DATA light turns off.


No labels print at the end of this test.

#### **Communications Diagnostics Test**

This test is controlled from the front panel display. See *Front Panel Controls on page 54*. A typical printout from this test is shown below. Turn off the power to exit this self test and return to normal operation.



**Note** • The communications test label is upside down when printed.
