Safety

Use the following guidelines to optimize the performance and life of your phone, antenna, and battery.

Road safety comes first

While driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. A wireless phone can be an invaluable tool, but good judgment must be exercised at all times. Check the local laws and regulations on the use of wireless phones in vehicles. Always obey them, and exercise caution while driving.

Air bags

If you have an air bag, DO NOT place installed or portable phone equipment or other objects over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If equipment is not properly installed, you and your passengers risk serious injury.

Potentially unsafe areas

Posted facilities—Turn your phone off in any facility when posted notices require you to do so.

Aircraft—FCC regulations prohibit using your phone on a plane that is in the air. Turn your phone off before boarding aircraft.

Vehicles—RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer of the device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to help you obtain this information.

Blasting areas—Turn off your phone where blasting is in progress. Observe restrictions, and follow any regulations or rules.

Potentially explosive atmospheres—Turn off your phone when you are in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire, resulting in bodily injury or death.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- fueling areas such as gas stations
- below deck on boats
- transfer or storage facilities for fuel or chemicals
- vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas, such as propane or butane
- areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders
- any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine

Use with care

Use only in normal position (to ear). Don't bend the antenna or touch it unnecessarily. Pull out the antenna when on a call and push it in when the phone is not in use. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on the phone.

Keep phone dry

If the phone gets wet, turn the power off immediately and return it to the dealer for service.

Resetting the phone

If the screen seems frozen and the keypad does not respond to keypresses, return it to the dealer for service.

Accessories

Use only Kyocera-approved accessories with Kyocera phones. Use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and will invalidate the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Radio Frequency (RF) energy

Your telephone is a radio transmitter and receiver. When it is on, it receives and sends out RF energy. Your service provider's network controls the power of the RF signal. This power level can range from 0.006 to 0.6 watts.

In August 1996, the U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted RF exposure guidelines with safety levels for hand-held wireless phones. These guidelines are consistent with the safety standards previously set by both U.S. and international standards bodies in the following reports:

ANSI C95.1 (American National Standards Institute, 1992)



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
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
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1 GETTING STARTED

- Jack for **Hands-free headset** (sold separately) only.
- Home screen. Press () to select Menu.
- **Send/Talk key** starts or answers a call and starts VM.
- Speakerphone key activates the speakerphone.
- Use the **keypad** to enter numbers, letters, or symbols.
- 6 Shift key changes case in text entry mode.
- Extend the antenna to make or answer a call. Push the antenna in when the phone is not in use.



- Navigation key adjusts volume; scrolls up, down, left or right through lists and menus; and selects a menu item or option when pressed in.
- **End/Power key** turns on and turns off the phone, ends a call, or returns to the home screen.
- Clear key erases the last character in text entry, or returns to the previous menu.
- Space key enters a space during text entry.
- **0 key** cycles through word choices in T9® Text Input.
- Jacks for Travel Charger (included) and data cable (sold separately).
- Warning: Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack will damage the phone.



Screen icons

The following icons may appear on your phone screen:



The phone is operating in CDMA digital mode.



The phone is receiving a signal. You can make and receive calls.



The phone is not receiving a signal. You cannot make or receive calls.



A call is in progress.



The alarm clock is set.



The phone ringer is silenced. The phone vibrates or lights up instead of ringing.



The phone is roaming outside of its home service area.



The battery is fully charged. The more black bars you see, the greater the charge.

Press () up.

Press down.

Press to clear an item.

Enter text using rapid text entry (available in English only).

ab^C Enter text using normal alpha text entry.

Using menus

- From the home screen, press in to see menus.
- Press in to select a menu or menu item.
- Once you have selected a menu, press up or down to scroll through the menu items.
- Press to return to the previous screen.
- Press to return to the home screen.

In this guide, \rightarrow tells you to select an option from a menu. For example, **Menu** \rightarrow **Settings** means select **Menu**, then select **Settings**.

Basic functions

This document describes how to use the basic functions of the QCP 3035 trimode phone, with CDMA digital service at 800 and 1900 MHz, and analog service at 800 MHz.

To turn on the phone

• Press and hold about two seconds. Ill and the home screen appear when the phone is turned on and is ready to make or receive a call.

To turn off the phone

Hold down until "Powering off" appears (about two seconds).

To find your phone number

From the home screen, select Menu → Phone Info. Your phone number appears.

To make a call

- **1.** Fully extend the antenna.
- **2.** Enter the phone number.
- 3. Press .

To end a call

• Press .

To answer a call

• Press .

To silence the ringer or alert

• To silence the ringer or stop the vibration alert during an incoming call, press . Press to answer the call.

Note—To silence all sounds, see "Silence All" on page 41.

To mute and unmute during a call

- To turn **Mute** on, press in to select **Mute** from the bottom of the home screen.
- To turn Mute off, press in to select UnMute from the bottom of the home screen.

To adjust the volume

- To manually adjust the earpiece volume during a call, press up or down.
- To automatically adjust the earpiece volume based on the amount of noise around you or the other person's voice volume level:
- 1. Place a call from a quiet environment.
- 2. Press up or down to set the volume to a comfortable level.
- **3.** Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Smart Sound.

- **4.** Select one of the following:
 - Enabled adjusts the volume automatically. The volume you have just set is used as a baseline. You can manually adjust the volume during a call.
 - Disabled keeps the volume level the same unless you adjust it using the key.
- **5.** Press in to save the setting.

To lock the keypad

 To protect your phone from accidental keypresses when a call is not in progress, press and hold for several seconds while at the home screen until the message appears: "Keypad guard is active. Press 123 to unlock."

To unlock the keypad

• Press (2 abc), (3 def) in this order.

To turn on the speakerphone

You may turn on the speakerphone at any time.

- During an incoming call alert, press to answer the call and turn on the speakerphone simultaneously.
- Once the speakerphone is turned on, "■ Speaker is ON" will be displayed on the screen.

To turn off the speakerphone


- Press to turn off the speakerphone.

2 BATTERY

Your phone comes with an external lithium ion (LiIon) battery. The battery is partially charged when you receive the phone.

Before using your phone, fully charge the battery. Connect the travel charger to the proper jack on the bottom of the phone as shown below, then connect the adapter's plug to a wall outlet.

Note—You must have at least a partial charge in the battery to make or receive calls, regardless of whether or not the travel charger is connected to the phone. The battery icon is animated as the battery is charging. The battery is fully charged when "Charging is complete" appears on the screen. You can safely recharge the battery at any time, even if it has a partial charge.



Power-save mode

Your phone switches to power-save mode after several unsuccessful attempts to locate a signal. When the phone is in power save mode, you cannot make or receive calls. "Power Save Mode" and $_{\kappa}$ appear on the screen. Press any key to exit.

Caring for your battery

Follow these guidelines to improve battery performance.


- Do not disassemble, puncture, or short-circuit the battery.
- Keep the metal contacts of the battery clean.
- If you have not used a battery for more than a month, recharge it before using your phone.
- Avoid extreme temperatures, direct sunlight, and high humidity.
- Never dispose of any battery in or near a fire. It could explode.


Removing the battery

- **1.** Power off the phone.
- 2. Hold the phone in your hand with the home screen facing away from you.
- **3.** Place your finger on the upper ridge of the battery latch.
- **4.** Push down with your finger and pull the battery door toward you until it dislodges from the phone.

Inserting the battery

- **1.** Realign the battery to the groove on the bottom of the phone.
- **2.** Push the battery in until it clicks closed.





3 CONTACTS

Use your phone's Contacts directory like a set of phone index cards to store information about a person or company. Before using the Contacts directory, see "To enter letters, numbers and symbols" on page 33.

The Contacts Directory stores a maximum of 400 phone numbers. On each card you can store a name and up to six phone numbers, email addresses, or URLs, as well as street addresses, and notes about the person or company.

You can also set up a speed dial number, designate each card as personal or business to help you find numbers by type, save a voice tag to use with voice recognition, and set up phone numbers and cards as secret so you can only access them with a security code.

Working with contact cards

To save a phone number

- **1.** From the home screen, enter the phone number you want to save.
- 2. Press in to Save New.

Note—To add to an existing contact, select **Add to...** after you enter the number. Select the contact you want to add to, then proceed to step 5.

- **3.** Enter a name for the contact. If you need to know how to use the keypad to enter letters, see page 33.
- 4. Press in when you are done entering letters.
- **5.** Press in again to **Save.**

-or-

Press right then press in toselect **Options**. Press up or down to select an option from the list:

- Save—Save information and return to the home screen.
- Number Type—Select work, home, mobile, pager, or fax.
- Add Voice Dial—Prompts you to add a voice tag to the number.
- Speed Dialing—Select a speed dial location from the list.
- Secret—Asks if you want to set restrictions on this number. Select Yes to hide the number. If a phone number is locked, you must enter your four-digit lock code to view or edit the number. (See "Security" on page 46 on how to find your lock code.) Select No to leave the number unchanged.
- Primary Number—Select Yes to classify this number as the primary number for the contact.
- Classify Contact—Classify the contact as business or personal.
- **6.** If finished, press in to select **Save.** A message appears: "Contact Successfully Saved!"

-or-

If you want to continue entering information, select another option.

Note—You may also save a phone number through the Contacts directory as follows:

- **1.** From the home screen, select Menu \rightarrow Contacts \rightarrow Add New \rightarrow Phone Number.
- 2. Enter the phone number up to as many digits as will fit on the screen.
- **3.** Press when you are done entering numbers.
- 4. Select Next.
- **5.** Proceed to step 3 in "To save a phone number" on page 18.

To enter pauses

You can include a pause in a phone number. A timed pause causes the phone to stop dialing for two seconds. A hard pause causes the phone to stop dialing until you select **Release.**

When you save the phone number of an automated service, such as voicemail, you may include a pause where you would be required to select an option or enter a password. For example, you could enter a phone number, then a pause, then a voicemail extension or calling card number.

- **1.** Enter the phone number.
- **2.** Select a type of pause from the menu and press $_{\bigcirc}$ in.
 - A s will appear in the phone number for a timed pause.
 - A ⊕ will appear in the phone number for a hard pause.
- **3.** Enter the remaining numbers.
- 4. Select **Save New** or **Add to** and press in to save the contact.

Example: 123-456-7890 to 555 would dial the number, pause, then dial the 555 extension.

To edit a contact card

- **1.** From the home screen, select **Menu** \rightarrow **Contacts** or press \bigcirc right.
- 2. To find the contact you want to edit, select either View All or Find Name.
- 3. Press in to select the contact card you want to edit.

You may edit the entire contact card (see step 4) or select a phone number to edit (see step 5).

- **4.** To edit the entire contact card, select **Options.** Select an option listed below and press in, then go to step 6.
 - Add New adds a new contact to the the contact card.
 - Erase Contact deletes the contact from the contact card.
 - Edit Name changes the entry's name. Enter the new name and press

() I

- Classify Contact assigns a classification to the contact. Your choices are Business, Personal, or Neither.
- Exit closes out of the contact and returns you to the home screen.
 Go to step 6.
- **5.** To edit a contact card item (such as the phone number or e-mail address), select it and press . A list of options will appear. Select an option and press . in:
 - View Number displays the phone number.
 - Add Voice Dial adds a voice dial tag to this entry.
 - Speed Dialing dials the entry using one or two numbers.
 - Erase Number erases this entry.
 - Erase Voice Dial erases the voice command associated with this entry.
 - Edit Number edits this entry.

- Edit Voice Dial assigns a new voice dial tag to this entry.
- Secret sets up your security options for this entry.
- Primary Number sets the entry as the primary number for this contact. The primary contact is the one displayed on the contact list by default.
- Edit Type changes the type of entry: Home, Work, Mobile, Fax, or Pager.
- Exit returns you to the home screen.
- **6.** Enter the new or changed information. To make more changes, press to go up one menu.
- 7. If finished, press in twice to select **Save.**

To erase information from a contact card

- **1.** From the home screen, select **Menu** \rightarrow **Contacts.**
- Find the contact you want to edit by selecting either View All or Find Name.

- 3. Press in to select the contact card you want to edit.
- 4. If you want to erase the entire contact, select Options → Erase Contact. A message appears: "Erase the entire contact?" Select No to cancel, or Yes to erase the entire contact.
- **5.** If you want to erase a number, select the number and press . Then, select **Erase Number** and press .
- **6.** A message appears: "Erase this number?" Select **No** to cancel, or **Yes** to erase the number. The message "ERASED" appears on the screen.
- 7. If finished, press in to select **Exit**.

To search the Contacts directory

The Contacts directory lists entries alphabetically. To search, you can look through a list of all contacts, speed dial entries, or cards of a specific type, or you can enter the name you are searching for.

- **1.** From the home screen, select **Menu**→**Contacts** or press ∵ right.
- 2. Press down to select a search method:

To look through a list of names, select View All, Speed Dial List, Voice Dial List, Business List, or Personal List.

-or-

To search for a specific name, select **Find Name**. Enter all or part of the name and select **Find**. A list of matching names appears.

- 3. Scroll down until you find the name you want.
 - To display the full contact card, press in.
 - To call the contact, select the number and press .

To call from the Contacts directory

1. From the home screen, select $Menu \rightarrow Contacts \rightarrow View All.$

Note—You may quickly access your Contacts list from the home screen by pressing right.

- 2. Scroll to a name on the list and press in.
- **3.** Select the number and press .

Speed Dial and 1-Touch Dial

Speed Dial and 1-Touch Dial allow you to quickly dial a stored phone number by entering the memory location and pressing .

To set a speed dial location

- 1. Open a saved contact card.
- 2. Select the phone number to assign a speed dial location.
- 3. Select Speed Dialing.
- 4. Select a speed dial location.

5. Press in to Assign.

Note—The speed dial location "1" is reserved for your voicemail.

To remove a speed dial location

- **1.** From the home screen, select Menu \rightarrow Contacts \rightarrow Speed Dial List.
- 2. Scroll up and down to select a speed dial location. Press in.
- **3.** Select the number to remove and press in.
- 4. Select Speed Dialing.
- **5.** Choose the speed dial location to remove from the list and press right to select **Remove.**
- **6.** Press in. The screen will display the message "[name] no longer saved in speed dialing."

To speed dial

• From the home screen, enter the one- or two-digit speed dial number and press .

To call your voicemail number

• From the home screen after receiving a notification, press in to select **Voice.**

-or-

• Press and hold your voicemail speed dial number. (is the default.)

To enable 1-Touch Dial

- **1.** Select Menu→ Settings→ Extras → 1-Touch Dialing→ Enabled.
- 2. Press in.

To use 1-Touch Dial

• Enter the one- or two-digit speed dial number and hold down the last number. For example, if the speed dial number is 15, press , then press and hold 5/10.

To redial the last number called

Press twice.

To change your voicemail speed dial number

- **1.** Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Messaging \rightarrow Voicemail Number \rightarrow Edit.
- 2. Enter or change the voicemail speed dial number.
- 3. Select Save.
- 4. Press in.


Note—This will change the default setting for your voicemail number.

Working with the Recent Calls list

The Recent Calls list shows the last 30 calls made and received. Calls are identified by type. (Some types may not be available on all phones. Check with your service provider.)

Note—You may quickly access the Recent Calls list from the home screen by pressing left.

Each type of call in the list is identified by an icon as shown below.



To view the Recent Calls list

- **1.** From the home screen, select **Menu** \rightarrow **Recent Calls**, or press \bigcirc left from the home screen.
- **2.** To view details about a call, select a call entry.
- 3. Scroll left or right to select an option (Save New, Add to, Number, or View Contact).
- 4. Press in.

Note—If the number has been saved as "secret," you will need to enter your four-digit lock code to view or edit the number. For more information about making a phone number secret, see page 19.

To dial from the Recent Calls list

- **1.** From the home screen, select **Menu** \rightarrow **Recent Calls.**
- 2. Select the call entry in the list or display the call detail.
- 3. Press 🕥 .

To enter letters, numbers, and symbols

You can enter letters, numbers, and symbols in a contact card. The default text entry mode is *.

- To enter spaces between words, press #-
- To move the cursor, press in the appropriate direction.
- To erase characters, press

To change cases

- Press *n until you see the appropriate symbol.
 - Capitalize next letter 全
 - All caps 器
 - Capitalize first word of every sentence

To change text entry modes

- **1.** From a text entry screen, press in to highlight the options at the bottom of the screen.
- 2. Press right to find the active text entry mode. Press in.
- 3. Select the text entry mode you want from the list.

Shortcut—Press and hold *n to switch between text entry modes.

abc To use normal text entry

Normal text entry allows you to enter text using one keypress per letter.

- Press the key once for the first letter, twice for the second letter, and so on.
- After you have cycled through the letters, you may enter the number shown on the key. For example, if you press twice, the letter b appears. If you press it four times, the number 2 appears. Two seconds after you choose a character or number, the cursor moves one space to the right.

To use rapid text entry

T9 Text Input allows you to enter text quickly. For example, to enter the word "how," press (4ghi), (6mho), (9wxy). The software will suggest words as you type.

- Wait until you have typed the entire word before checking the screen to see if the word shown is correct.
- Press
 to cycle through words.
- Once you see the correct word, press ight or to move the cursor and continue entering text.

The number setting allows you to enter numbers using the number keys.

- Press the key once for each number.
- To enter numbers in abomode, see page 34.

&?! To enter symbols

- 2. Press right to the text entry mode you are currently using.
- **3.** Press in to select the mode.
- **4.** Press down through the list of modes.
- **5.** Highlight &?! and press in to select it.
- 6. Press down through the list. Each character is matched to a number key. Press the number key corresponding to the symbol you want to use. For example, to enter a period, press (2abc).
- **7.** To exit the list without entering a symbol, press \bigcirc .

Note—Press during normal text entry to cycle through symbols.

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Silence All

You may silence all phone sounds, including the ringer and all alerts, while leaving the phone on. You can replace the sounds by setting the phone to vibrate or light up.

- **1.** Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Silence All.
- 2. Select an option and press in:
 - No, normal returns the alert to the ringer.
 - **Yes, vibe only** mode sets the phone to vibrate only. The \triangle is displayed on the screen.
 - Yes, lights only mode sets the phone to flash the backlight only.
 The is displayed on the screen.

Note—The phone will ring, not vibrate, if it is attached to a power source (hands-free car kit or travel charger).

Keyguard

The Keyguard locks your keypad to protect your phone against accidental keypresses when the phone is turned on and a call is not in progress. You may still answer and silence incoming calls with Keyguard on.

To turn keyguard on

- **1.** Select Menu → Settings → Keyguard.
 - Highlight one of the locking options and press in to save:
 - Guard Now locks the keypad immediately.
 - 30s auto-guard locks the keypad if no keys are pressed for 30 seconds.
 - 1min auto-guard locks the keypad if no keys are pressed for one minute.
 - 5m auto-guard locks the keypad if no key is pressed for five minutes.
 - Auto-guard off unlocks the keypad and restores it to normal.

While the keyguard is activated, "Keyguard ON" appears where the menu usually appears.

Shortcut—To turn the keyguard on quickly from the home screen, press and hold for several seconds.

To turn keyguard off

1. Press (1), (2abc), (3def). The home screen menu returns.

Sounds

You may change the alert sounds your phone makes.

- **1.** Select **Menu**→ **Settings**→ **Sounds**.
- 2. Scroll to the setting you want to change. For a list of options, see page 39. For information about the automatic volume adjustment, see "To adjust the volume" on page 9.
- **3.** Press in to view the options available for that alert sound.

Headset Ringing

When a headset is attached to the phone, you will hear incoming calls ring only through the earpiece on your headset.

You can set your phone to alert you to incoming calls by vibrating before ringing through the earpiece.

- **1.** Plug the headset into the phone.
- 2. Select Menu→Settings→Sounds→Call Ring/Vibe.
- 3. Select Vibrate then ring.

When an incoming call is received, the phone will now vibrate and then ring through the headset earpiece.

Display

You may change the appearance of your phone's screen.

1. Select Menu→ Settings→ Display, then the option you want. For a list of options, see page 39.

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- 2. To change the appearance of the menus you see when you select **Menu** from the home screen, select **Main Menu View**, then the option you want:
 - Small Icons
 - Large Icons
 - List Menus

Hot Keys

Hot Keys provide shortcuts to commonly used features. They allow you to add a feature to the top level menu view (Web Browser, Contacts, etc.). Once a feature is chosen as a Hot Key, you may access it directly from the home screen after you select **Menu**.

- **1.** Select Menu→ Settings → Display → Hot Keys.
- 2. Select the features you want and press in.

 A check appears in the box of any feature you choose. Multiple features may be selected.

3. When finished, select **Done** and press () in.

Note—If you no longer want a feature to serve as a Hot Key, you must uncheck the box.

Contrast

You may change the contrast of your phone's screen. The default setting is **Medium.**

- **1.** Select Menu→ Settings→ Display→ Contrast Display.
- 2. Select a setting and press in.

Security

You must enter your four-digit lock code (typically 0000 or the last 4 digits of the phone number) to set any of the options on the Security menu.

When you lock your phone, you can only call a number set up as an emergency number, a service provider number, or a priority number. You can still receive incoming calls.

To lock the phone

- **1.** Select **Menu**→ **Settings**→ **Security** and enter the four-digit lock code.
- 2. Select Lock Phone Use and select an option:
 - Never—Do not lock the phone.
 - On power up—Lock the phone every time you turn it on.
 - Now—Lock the phone immediately.
- 3. Press in.

To unlock the phone

1. Select **Unlock** and enter your four-digit lock code.

To limit calls out

- **1.** Select **Menu**→ **Settings**→ **Security** and enter the four-digit lock code.
- 2. Select Limit Calls Out. Select No for unlimited calls, or Yes, to Contacts to allow calls to contacts only.

To change your lock code

- **1.** Select **Menu**→ **Settings**→ **Security** and enter the four-digit lock code.
- 2. Select Change Lock Code. A message appears: "Change Lock Code?"
 - Select **Yes** and enter a new code, then press in. Enter your new lock code again to verify it.
 - Select **Exit** to leave your lock code unchanged.

To erase all contacts

- **1.** Select **Menu**→ **Settings**→ **Security** and enter the four-digit lock code.
- 2. Select Erase All Contacts.
 - -Select **No** to leave contacts unchanged.
 - -Select **Yes** to erase all contacts. A message appears: "Erase ALL contacts?" Select **No** to cancel or **Yes** to erase all contacts.

To erase recent calls

- 1. Select Menu→ Settings→ Security and enter the four-digit lock code.
- Select Erase Recent Call.

- Select **No** to leave the Recent Calls list unchanged
- Select **Yes** to erase all recent calls. A message appears: "Erase ALL recent calls list entries?" Select **No** to cancel or **Yes** to erase all recent calls.

To reset the phone

- **1.** Select **Menu**→ **Settings**→ **Security** and enter the four-digit lock code.
- 2. Select Phone Reset.
 - Select **No** to cancel.
 - Select **Yes** to reset the phone. A message appears: "Reset ALL phone settings?" Select **No** to cancel or **Yes** to reset phone.

Note—Your four-digit lock code, Recent Calls timer, Contacts directory, InBox and OutBox contents, memos, and service programming are not reset when you reset your phone.

Call Information

This setting allows you to view information about calls and alerts.

Recent Calls Timer

This timer displays the total number and duration of recent calls you have made and received. Press in to select **Reset.** This resets the timer to zero.

All Calls Timer

This timer displays the total number and duration of all calls you have made and received. You cannot reset this timer.

Browser Timer

This timer displays the total number and duration of data calls you have made. Select **Reset** to reset the timer to zero.

Network

Use this setting to view or change options such as roaming and privacy alerts. Some settings may not be available on all phones.

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To select digital or analog mode

- **1.** Select Menu→ Settings→ Network→ Digital or Analog.
- 2. Select an option and press in.
 - Automatic automatically switches the phone between digital and analog.
 - Analog only sets the phone to work in analog mode only.
 - Analog call forces a call into analog mode for the duration of the next call.
 - Digital only sets the phone to work in digital mode only.

Roam Option

This setting determines which signals your phone will accept.

- **1.** Select Menu→Settings→ Network→ Roam Option.
- 2. Select an option and press in.

- Automatic (recommended setting) accepts any system the phone service provides.
- No Roaming prevents you from making or receiving calls outside of your home service area.

Roam/Service Alert

Use this setting to have the phone alert you if you roam outside of your home service area.

- 1. Select Menu→ Settings→ Network→ Roam/Srvc Alert.
- 2. Select an option and press in.
 - Disabled will not alert you if you roam outside your home service area.
 - When no service alerts you with three tones, decreasing in intensity, when service is lost. When service is acquired again, you will hear three tones in increasing intensity.

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- On roam change alerts you with two tones, decreasing in intensity, when roaming service is acquired. When home area service is acquired again, you hear three tones, increasing in intensity.
- On any change alerts you with three increasing tones if there is a change in roaming service or three decreasing tones if the phone loses service.

Privacy Alert

- 1. Select Menu→Settings→ Network→ Privacy Alert.
- 2. Select an option and press in.
 - Disabled does not play any alerts.
 - Enabled plays an audible alert whenever enhanced privacy is lost or regained and a call is in progress.

Note—An alert message always appears on the screen regardless of these settings.

Data/Fax Calls In

These settings tell the phone how to handle voice and data calls.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Network \rightarrow Data/Fax Calls In.
- 2. Select an option and press in.
 - Voice Only allows only voice calls.
 - Fax, next call sets the phone to fax mode for the next incoming call or the next ten minutes.
 - Data, next call sets the phone to data mode for the next incoming call or the next ten minutes.
 - Fax, until off forces the phone into fax mode until the phone is turned off.
 - Data, until off forces the phone into data mode until the phone is turned off.

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Extras

These settings allow you to program various options.

Fast Find

Fast Find allows you to quickly find a number. As you enter numbers, your phone will display all matching entries. You may scroll up and down to view more numbers.

To activate Fast Find, select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Extras \rightarrow Fast Find \rightarrow Enable.

To use Fast Find:

- **1.** From the home screen, press numbers corresponding to the contact you want to find.
 - For example, to find "Joe," press $_{5kl}$, $_{6mo}$. Joe's entry appears. To find "John," continue by pressing $_{4gh}$.
- 2. Continue entering numbers until you find the entry you want or until you reach seven numbers.

- **3.** Scroll to see more possible entries.
- **4.** Press to dial the displayed entry.

Browser Prompt

You may receive a prompt whenever you attempt to start or exit the browser.

 - At End prompts you when you exit the browser.

- Both prompts you when you start the browser and exit the browser.
- No Prompts means you do not receive any prompts.

Messaging

The messaging setting allows you to send, receive, and store messages. You may create your own or use preformatted messages. For detailed information on how to use messaging, visit www.kyocera-wireless.com.

To change your voicemail number

- **1.** Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Messaging \rightarrow Voicemail Number \rightarrow Edit.
- 2. Enter a new voicemail speed dial number.
- **3.** Press () in to save.

To erase messages automatically

Use this setting to have old, read messages automatically erased from the phone if space is needed to store new messages. (This setting does not affect voice mail notifications.)

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Messaging \rightarrow Auto-Erase Text.

 - Disabled disables the option. Messages are accepted until memory is full.

- Low beep once alerts by beeping once (three quick beeps).
- Low beeps alerts by beeping every five minutes.
- Loud beep once alerts by beeping once loudly (three quick beeps).
- Loud beeps alerts by beeping loudly every five minutes.
- **3.** Select **View message** from the menu and press to view the message.

Accessories

Your phone comes with several features for additional convenience.

Power Backlighting

This allows backlighting to remain on when external power, such as a Travel Adapter, is used with the phone.

1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Accessories \rightarrow Power Backlighting.

2. Select **Normal** to keep the default setting, or **Always on** to keep backlighting on.

Auto-Answer

If your phone is attached to a Hands-free Car Kit (sold separately), you may set it to answer an incoming call after five seconds.

Select Menu→ Settings→ Accessories→ Auto-Answer→ After 5 seconds.

Voice Wake-up

If your phone is trained for Voice Recognition, you can plug an external power source into the phone (for example, a Desktop Charger or Hands-free Car Kit), and activate voice recognition with the voice command "Wake Up." See "Voice Training" on page 76 for more information.

Voice Memos

Scheduler

The Scheduler allows you to schedule events, such as meetings or appointments. You can then view these events, and use the alarm to alert you of upcoming events.

- **1.** Select **Menu**→ **Tools**→ **Scheduler**.
- 2. Select **Add Event** and press in.
- **3.** Enter a name for the event. If you need to know how to use the keypad to enter letters, see page 33.

- **4.** Press in when you are done entering letters.
- **5.** Select **Next** to set the time and date of the event.
 - -Press oup or down to select the hour and minutes for the appropriate setting.
 - -Press () left or right to switch between **Start, Duration**, and **Alarm**.
- **6.** Press in to select **Next.**
- **7.** You can add a note to the event, or press in twice to finish.

Once events are entered into the Scheduler, you may view, edit or erase them.

- **1.** Select Menu→ Tools→ Scheduler.
- 2. Select **View Day** or **View Month** to find the event you want to view, edit, or erase.

Note—you must have digital service in order to use the Scheduler.

Alarm Clock

Use the Alarm Clock to set an alert for a specific time. The alert occurs only if the phone is on.

- **1.** Select Menu→Tools→Alarm Clock→Set.
 - Press up or down to select an hour and minutes.
 - Press left or right to switch between hours, minutes, and a.m./
 p.m.
- **2.** Press in to save.
- **3.** When the alarm rings, select **Snooze** to silence the alarm for 10 minutes, or select **Off** to turn off the alarm.

Note—you must have digital service in order to use the Alarm Clock.

Tip Calculator

- **1.** Select **Menu**→**Tools**→**Tip Calculator.**
- 2. Enter the amount of your bill and press in.
- 3. Select the amount you want to include as a tip (15%, 18%, 20%, 10%, 5%, Other) and press in.
- **4.** Your total bill, including tip, is calculated and displayed.

Note—You also have the option of splitting the bill based on the number of guests.

Calculator

Use the calculator for basic mathematical equations.

- **1.** Select **Menu**→ **Tools**→ **Calculator**.
- **2.** Use the keypad to enter numbers.
- **3.** Press in to select mathematical operations.

- Performs the "equals" function.
- Inserts the division character after the last number entered.
- Inserts the subtraction character after the last number entered.
- + Inserts the addition character after the last number entered.
- X Inserts the multiplication character after the last number entered.
- . Inserts the decimal point after the last number entered.
- C Clears all numbers entered and displays a zero.
- MR Displays the value currently stored in memory.
- M+ Adds the displayed digit to the value stored in memory.
- MC Clears the value currently stored in memory.
- ± Changes the sign of the displayed number.
- Clears one function or one digit from the screen and returns the calculator to digit entry mode. Hold down to clear all of the digits and operations and display a zero.
- Exits the calculator and returns to the home screen.

Countdown

This timer counts down for a specified amount of time. It beeps, using the volume set for alerts, when that amount of time has elapsed.

- **1.** Select **Menu**→ **Tools**→ **Countdown**.
- **2.** Press in to **Set**.
- **3.** Press oup or down to set the hours, minutes, and seconds. To move the cursor, press oup left or right.
- **4.** Select **Start** to begin the countdown.
- **5.** Select **Stop** to pause the countdown.
- **6.** When the alarm rings, press for to silence it.
- **5** Stopwatch
- 1. Select Menu→Tools→Stopwatch.
- 2. Select **Start** to have the stopwatch begin counting.

- **3.** Select **Stop** to quit counting.
- **4.** Select **Start** to resume counting, or select **Reset** to set the counter back to zero.

Text Memos

Text Memos allows you to create and retrieve short text messages.

- **1.** Select Menu→ Tools→ Text Memos.
- 2. Select **Add New** to create a message.
- **3.** Enter text as described on page 33, "To enter letters, numbers, and symbols."
- **4.** Select **OK**, then enter a Title.
- **5.** Select **OK** again when finished.

Note—If you do not enter a title, the first line of your text message is used as the default title.

Once you have entered messages in Text Memos, you may edit or erase them as desired.

- 1. Select Menu→Tools→Text Memos.
- 2. Highlight the appropriate message, and press 🥎 in to select it.
- **3.** Edit or erase the message as desired.

Brick Attack Game

- 1. Select Menu→Tools→Brick Attack.
- 2. To start the game, press in.
- **3.** To pause the game, press , then press in to **Resume.**

The goal of this game is to eliminate bricks arranged in levels. To do this, you send a moving ball upward using a paddle at the bottom of the screen. The pauses the game. The game cannot be played or paused while the phone is off.

Browser options

The following options appear on the bottom of your screen. Press () left or right to scroll through the options:

- Mark Site saves the current web page as a bookmark for easy access.
- Bookmarks displays a list of your saved web pages.

Setup

- Help displays help information if offered by the current web page.
- Show URL displays the entire URL for the current web page.
- Phone.com displays information about your browser version.
- Encryption should not be used unless you are instructed to do so by your service provider.
- Set UP.Link allows you to choose a different browser connection.
 You may use this option if you have more than one browser account, such as one for business and one for personal use.



7 VOICE FEATURES

The voice features of your QCP 3035 phone allow you to originate calls and record voice memos.

Saving New Voice Tags

Voice Recognition (VR) allows you to initiate a call to one of your entries in the **Contacts** directory by speaking the name of the person you want to call.

Note—Train commands in a quiet environment. Speak naturally into the microphone.

- **1.** From the home screen, enter the phone number you want to save.
- 2. Press () in to Save New.

Note—To add to an existing contact, select **Add to...** after you enter the number. Select the contact you want to add to, then proceed to step 4.

- **3.** Enter a name for the contact. (If you need to know how to use the keypad to enter letters, see page 33). Press in when you are done entering letters.
- **4.** Scroll right and select **Options**→ **Add Voice Dial.**
- **5.** Follow the voice prompts. The VR says "Speak a name." Recite the name, then repeat as instructed. If a word match is completed, you will hear "(Name) added." If a match is not made, you will be instructed to try again.
- **6.** When finished, a message appears: "Voice Dialing is now available for this number."

Adding Voice Tags to a Contact

Train commands in a quiet environment. Speak naturally into the microphone.

1. From the home screen, select **Menu** \rightarrow **Contacts.**

- 2. Find the contact you want to add a voice tag to by selecting either **View**All or **Find Name**.
- **3.** Press in to select the contact card you want to edit.
- **4.** Select the number you want to add a voice tag to and press () in.
- **5.** Select **Add Voice Dial**, then proceed to step 5 in "Saving New Voice Tags" on page 73.

Voice Dial List

To view which entries have name tags, select **Menu**→**Contacts**→**Voice Dial List.** As each tag is selected, you will hear the recorded voice tag.

Editing Voice Tags

You can edit or erase a voice tag as you desire.

1. From the home screen, select **Menu**→ **Contacts.**

- 2. To find the contact whose voice tag you want to edit, select either **View**All or **Find Name**.
- **3.** Press () in to select the contact card.
- **4.** Select the number you want to edit a voice tag for and press () in.
- **5.** Select **Edit Voice Dial**, then proceed to step 5 in "Saving New Voice Tags" on page 73.

Voice Training

During Voice Training, you speak a command and the VR "learns" your voice. VR knows these command words without training: "Yes," and "No," but to enhance accuracy, you may train them to learn your voice.

Perform Voice Training in a quiet environment, and speak naturally into the microphone.

If the voice commands you repeat during training do not match, VR will ask you to repeat the command. Do not speak a command until the prompt is complete. If you speak too soon, you will hear three tones.

- **1.** Select Menu→ Settings→ Extras→ Voice Training.
- 2. Select the training option you wish to use, and press in to select it. The VR asks you to say a command.
- 3. Say the command you hear clearly into the microphone and listen for "Again." Say the command again until you hear "Training completed."
- 4. Press when finished to return to the home screen.

To end Voice Training at any time, press

or or . The VR recognizes the "Yes" and "No" commands without training. If you are having difficulty using these commands, training the VR will improve performance. If you do not train the VR feature, the "Yes" and "No" commands can be activated by anyone.

The "Wake Up" command allows you to activate VR by voice. You must train the "Wake Up" command, but this feature may only be used with external power or an accessory, such as a hands-free car kit or portable hands-free car kit. Also, **Voice Wake Up** must be activated. To activate the feature:

- **1.** Select Menu→ Settings→ Accessories → Voice Wake-Up.
- 2. Select with ext. pwr. and press in.

To activate VR

Once VR training is complete, you can activate the system in one of two ways:

- From the home screen, press 🔨.
- If you are using your phone with external power, a hands-free car kit, portable hands-free car kit, or car power adapter, say "Wake Up" and listen for a tone. Say "Wake Up" again until you hear two tones.

Shortcut—At this point, you may take advantage of the "hidden expert mode" to make the call. Say the name of the person you want to call after

you hear the first prompt tone. There is no need to wait for the VR to respond (see "To make a call" below).

To make a call

- **1.** From the home screen, press \bigcirc . you will hear a prompt tone.
- 2. The VR responds "Speak a name."
- 3. Wait until you hear another prompt tone, then say the name of the person you wish to call.
- **4.** The VR responds "Calling [Name]". Remain silent to make the call, or say "No" to cancel the call.

If there are multiple matches to the name that you requested, the VR will ask you to verify which name you want to call. Reply "Yes" or "No" until you hear the desired name.

To end a call

To end a call, press . You cannot use voice recognition to end a call.

To receive a call

You may use VR to answer incoming calls. **Voice Answer** under the **Sounds** menu must be active.

Select Menu→Settings→Sounds→Voice Answer→Enabled.

This feature may only be used with external power or an accessory, such as a hands-free car kit or portable hands-free car kit. In order to use this feature, make sure that the ringer is turned on.

- **1.** Select Menu→Settings→Sounds → Call Ring/Vibe.
- 2. Highlight **Ring only** then press in.

Once this feature is activated, the VR alerts you in two ways:

"Incoming call, answer?"

-or-

"Incoming roam call, answer?"

To answer a call

Say "Yes" or press any key except , , or .

To ignore a call

You may ignore an incoming call in two ways:

- Say "No" or press , , . The voice alert is silenced.
- Remain silent. The voice alert repeats twice and the phone rings once, then returns to the home screen.

Voice Memo

The Voice Memo tool allows you to record and name multiple memos.

The following options are available to create and edit your memos:

- **▶ Play** a recorded memo.
- **Pause** a memo.
- **Stop** and return to the beginning of the memo.
- \ll **Rewind** the memo.
- >> **Fast forward** the memo.
- **NAME** Name a memo.
- **ERASE** Erase a memo.

Note—You must press and hold () to use the **Rewind** and **Fast Forward** options.

To record a memo

- **1.** Select Menu→Tools→Voice Memos.
- 2. Press in to select **Record New**.

The phone says "Please record at the tone." Following the tone, record your memo. The screen will show the duration of the current memo.

3. When you are done recording your memo, select ■ and press in to stop.

To name a memo

Once you finish recording a memo, you may give your memo a name.

- **1.** Select Name and press () in.
- 2. You may enter up to 12 characters for your memo. See page 33, "To enter letters, numbers, and symbols" on how to use the keypad.
- **3.** Press in to select **Save** when finished.

Note—You do not need to enter a name for your memos. "Memo 1," "Memo 2," etc., are used as the default titles.

Once you have entered memos in Voice Memos, you may edit the memo name or erase the memo as desired.

1. Select Menu→Tools→Voice Memos.

- 2. Highlight the appropriate message, and press () in to select it.
- **3.** Edit the name or erase the message as desired.

To listen to a memo

- **1.** Select Menu→Tools→Voice Memos.
- 2. Highlight the appropriate message, and press () in to select it.
- **3.** Select ▶ and press in to play the memo.

What is my lock code?

The default lock code is usually either 0000 or the last four digits of your phone number. If you forget your lock code, call your service provider.

How do I lock and unlock the phone?

Select Menu→ Settings→ Silence All→ No, normal.

How do I change the ringer volume?

How do I change my banner?

Select $Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow My Banner.$ Type your text and press in.

How do I speed dial?

Enter the one- or two-digit speed dial number and press 🔨 .

How do I erase all recent calls?

For detailed instructions, see page 48.

What do the icons on the top of the screen mean?

See page 3 for screen icon descriptions.

My phone displayed the message "Reading Info. Please wait ..." when I turned it on. What does this mean?

Your phone is performing routine maintenance. This normally takes a few minutes.

My phone is out of memory. What do I do?

Erase old messages or contacts or voice tags or voice memos. See "To erase messages automatically" on page 57 and "To erase information from a contact card" on page 24.

My phone is not charging properly. What can I do?

Remove the battery from the phone as described on page 15, and lightly clean the contacts using a white eraser.

Glossary

analog mode	A state in which a phone communicates at 800 MHz and sends voices and key beeps as analog sounds.
Auto-Save	A feature which allows your phone to prompt you to save a phone number after you have dialed it three times.
bookmark	A Web file that lets you quickly connect to a site you have previously visited and marked (like a bookmark in a book).
CDMA	Code Division Multiple Access, a technology that digitally encodes the sound of voices and key beeps to ensure callers' privacy.
call forwarding	A programmable phone option that sends incoming calls to another phone number.
call waiting	A service-provider feature which causes your phone to beep if another call comes in while you are on the phone.

A feature of your phone that works like a set of phone index contacts directory cards, allowing you to save phone numbers and other information. An electrical wire capable of transmitting information between data cable two or more devices. digital mode A state in which a phone communicates at 1900 MHz and sends voices and key beeps as digitally encoded signals instead of analog sounds. See CDMA. The address of a network connection, often in the format domain name server.business.com Electronic mail, a store-and-forward service for text and email graphical messages from one computer to another. To save information in the phone's memory. Press number enter keys to enter information. The worldwide set of interconnected networks that share the Internet

same network address scheme and use the TCP/IP protocol.

hard pause	A delay which is programmed into a stored number. The phone does not continue dialing until you press a specific key.
home screen	The screen that appears when the phone is first turned on.
key beep volume	The level of noise that the phone makes when you press a key.
keyguard	A feature which can be turned on to protect the phone from accidental keypresses when a call is not in progress.
lock code	A four-digit sequence (usually 0000 or the last four digits of your phone number) that lets you restrict access to certain phone numbers or all phone numbers.
menu	A list of choices on the phone screen.
memory location	One of 99 reserved spaces for data. Each memory location can hold a phone number associated text, such as a name.
menu item	A choice within a menu on the phone screen.
power-save mode	A low energy consumption state indicated by the message "Power Save Mode." Press any key to exit.

power off When you turn off the phone, you cannot send or receive

calls.

power on When you turn on the phone, you can send and receive calls.

recent calls list

A list of phone numbers from recent incoming or outgoing calls, when the phone number is available.

roaming Using telephone services outside of the area covered by

your home service provider. When you are roaming, the cost

of phone calls and level of service may vary.

service area An area in which a service provider's terms of use apply

uniformly.

A company which provides certain phone services, such as basic phone service, long distance, call waiting, and three-way calling. Phones may have the ability to perform these functions, but they cannot do so unless the service provider

makes them available.

signal strength	The degree of radio frequency energy available to the phone. Both weather and distance affect signal strength. If signal strength is weak, call quality may decrease or the call may be disconnected.
Silence All mode	A state in which all phone sounds are silenced, including the ringer and alerts. You can set the phone to vibrate or light up.
Smart Sound	A feature which allows the phone to automatically adjust the earpiece volume based on the amount of noise around you or the voice volume of the person to whom you are speaking.
standby time	The amount of time that the phone battery can maintain power when the phone is on.
talk time	The amount of time that you can talk on a wireless phone when the battery is fully charged.
three-way calling	A service-provider feature which allows phone calls between three people instead of two.

travel A cable that connects the phone to a wall outlet and charges

the phone battery.

trimode Able to operate in CDMA digital service at 800 and 1900 MHz,

and analog cellular service at 800 MHz.

URL Uniform Resource Locator, the address of an Internet location.

A URL typically takes the form **http://**

www.locationname.com

web browser A software program which allows you to browse the Internet.

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
