## Assembling your phone

Insert the SIM card, attach and charge the battery to use your phone.

## SIM card

When you register as a subscriber with a network operator, you get a SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card. The SIM card contains a computer chip that keeps track of your phone number, the services included in your subscription, and your phonebook information, among other things.
(2) Save contacts to your SIM card before you remove it from another phone. Contacts may have been saved in the phone memory $\boldsymbol{\omega} 23$ Phonebook.

To insert the SIM card and charge the battery


1 Slide the cover open and lift it off.
2 Insert the SIM card. Make sure the SIM card is placed under the silvery holders.
3 Place the battery in the phone with the label side up and the connectors facing each other.
4 Place the cover on the phone and slide it into place.
5 Connect the charger to the phone at the flash symbol. The flash symbol on the charger plug must face upwards.
6 It may take 30 minutes for the battery icon to appear.
7 Wait approximately 4 hours or until the battery icon indicates that the battery is fully charged. For an indication of charging, press - to activate the screen. Remove the charger by tilting the plug upwards.

Some functions use more battery power than others and may cause a need for more frequent re-charging. However talk-time or standby time may become noticeably shorter due to wear and you may have to replace your battery. Only use approved batteries from Sony Ericsson $\Rightarrow 83$ Battery use and care.

## PIN (Personal Identification Number)

You may need a PIN (Personal Identification Number) from your network operator to activate the services in your phone. Each PIN digit appears as *, unless it starts with emergency number digits, for example 112. This is so that you can see and call an emergency number without entering a PIN $\Rightarrow 23$ Emergency calls. Press (C) to correct mistakes.

If you enter the wrong PIN three times in a row, the SIM card is blocked and the message PIN blocked appears. To unblock it, you need to enter your PUK (Personal Unblocking Key) $\Rightarrow 71$ SIM card lock.

## To turn the phone on and off



1 Press and hold (D) to turn on or off.
2 Enter your SIM card PIN, if you have one.
3 At first start-up, select the language for phone menus.
$4-$ Yes if you want the setup wizard to help you with instructions and tips or $>$ No.
The setup wizard is also available in the menu system,
$>$ Settings $>$ General tab $>$ Setup wizard.

## To make and receive calls

Enter the area code and phone number $>$ Call to make the call.

- End call to end the call. When the phone rings $>$ Yes to answer the call.

## Navigating the menus

The main menus are shown as icons on the desktop. Some submenus include tabs that appear on the screen.


- Press the navigation key in the center or in a direction:

Press (© to go to the desktop or to select items.
Press (0), (0), (©), (Q) to move through menus and tabs.

- Press $\oplus$ to go back one level in the menus or to end a function or application.
Press and hold $(\square$ to return to standby.
- Press $\bigoplus$ to select the options shown immediately above these keys on the screen.
- Press © to delete items.


## Shortcuts

From standby, you can use (@), (0), (©), (Q) to go directly to a function.

## To create a standby shortcut

1 If, for example, © has no predefined shortcut. $\downarrow$ Yes.
2 Scroll to a function to create a shortcut to $>$ Shortcut.
To edit a standby shortcut
1 Settings $>$ General tab $>$ Shortcuts and select an existing shortcut you want to edit $>$ Edit.
2 Scroll to and select a function $>$ Shortcut.

## Entering letters

There are two ways of entering letters:

- Multitap text input
- T9 ${ }^{\mathrm{TM}}$ Text Input


## To enter letters using multitap text input

- Press (2) - 9 until the desired character appears.
- Press $\#_{a / A}$ to shift between capitals and lower case letters.
- Press and hold $0+$ - 9 to enter numbers.
- Press \#- to add a space.
- Press for the most common punctuation marks.
- Press $@+$ to enter the + sign.
- Press and hold $\pi^{* a n}$ to change input method.

(2)Multitap input only applies when Latin characters are selected as input language.

## T9 ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ Text Input

The T9 ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ Text Input method uses a built-in dictionary to recognize the most commonly used word for each sequence of key presses. This way, you press each key only once, even if the letter you want is not the first letter on the key.

## To enter letters using T9 Text Input

1 Messaging $>$ Write new $>$ Text message.
2 For example, if you want to write the word "Jane", press (5) $\square$ 6 (3).

3 If the word shown is the one you want, press \#-) to accept and add a space. To accept a word without adding a space, press @. If the word shown is not the one you want, press (©) or @) repeatedly to view alternative words. Accept a word and add a space by pressing (\#-).
4 Continue writing your message. To enter a full stop or other punctuation marks, press (1) and then (©) or (Q) repeatedly. Accept by pressing (\#-).

## To add words to the T9 Text Input dictionary

1 While entering letters $>$ More $>$ Spell word.
2 Edit the word by using multitap input. Navigate between the letters with (@) and ©. To delete a character, press (C). To delete the entire word, press and hold (C).

3 When you have edited the word $>$ Insert. The word is added to the T9 Text Input dictionary. Next time you enter this word using T9 Text Input, it will appear as one of the alternative words.

## To select another writing method

Before, or while entering letters, press and hold *aIA to select another writing method.

## Chinese input

This mobile phone has different input methods for entering Chinese characters:

- Stroke input
- Pinyin input

You can use these methods, for example, to enter Chinese names and Chinese short messages.

## Switching between Chinese input methods

 In the Chinese editing mode, you can select and switch quickly to another input method by pressing and holding **ath.
## General instructions

Regardless of which input method you choose, your phone has a function to speed up the entry of Chinese characters. Whenever you enter a stroke or a Pinyin letter, a candidate row of the most frequently used characters containing that stroke or relating to that letter appears at the bottom of the screen.

If the character you want is not displayed in the candidate row, press (Q) to present another candidate row. Continue pressing © until the character you want is displayed. Alternatively, you can enter the next stroke or Pinyin letter and a new set of characters will immediately be displayed in the candidate row. To go back to the previous row, press (©). To select a character in the candidate row, press the navigation key or press and hold the key corresponding to the number above the character you want to enter.

## Stroke input

A Chinese character is built up of strokes．There are more than 30 basic strokes，which are grouped into 5 stroke categories．Each category is represented on the keypad by one of the keys（1）－5．The Wild Card key（6），is used when you are not sure of which stroke to use $\Rightarrow 19$ Example of using the wild card key．

## Components

The basic building units of Chinese characters are components that are made up of strokes．After entering the first two strokes of the desired character，the component and character candidates that started with that stroke are displayed in the candidate row． Using components is a fast method for entering complex characters．

（2）
The smaller candidates surrounded by dotted frames are components，and the bigger candidates without dotted frames are characters．

## For example，to enter＂信息＂

1 Enter＂）＂，＂｜＂and＂＂＂．
2 Move the cursor to＂信＂，press © ©
3 Move the cursor to＂息＂，press（©）again to select＂息＂．

## Example of using the wild card key

The wild card key（6），is used to supplement unclear strokes in entering characters．If you want to enter＂互＂，but you only know that＂－＂is the first and the last stroke of the character and that the total number of strokes is four，enter $\square$ ，（6）， 6，（D．The character is displayed in the candidate row．

## Pinyin input

Press the keys containing the required Pinyin letters，and the phone will make various proposals on the screen，according to the pronunciation rules of Mandarin．

Below is the key mapping of Pinyin letters on the keypad.

> （If you want to enter any of the other suggested Pinyin combinations，scroll up or down to the desired combination，then press ©）．
> 3 Press © again to select＂息＂，when＂息＂is highlighted．

## Fuzzy Pinyin

Fuzzy Pinyin is an option for the Pinyin input method，which contains additional spelling alternatives．
When in Pinyin input mode，press More $\downarrow$ Fuzzy Pinyin $>$ On．

> Input punctuation，symbols and smilies Under any Chinese input mode，press＊a／A）， to see the table of punctuation marks，symbols and smilies． Use the navigation key to make a selection．
> Press $\#-$ to enter a space into the text．

## Making and receiving calls

Turn on the phone and make sure you are within range of a network to make and receive calls $\Rightarrow 8$ To turn the phone on and off. If your subscription includes the Calling Line Identification service and the caller's number is identified, the number is displayed. If the number is in the phonebook, the name, number, and picture are displayed. If the number is a restricted number, Withheld is displayed.

## To make a call

1 Enter the area code and the phone number.
$2>$ Call to make the call.
$3>$ End call to end the call.
To make international calls
1 Press and hold $0+$ until a + sign appears on the screen.
2 Enter the country/region code, area code (without the leading zero) and phone number $>$ Call.

## To re-dial a number <br> If the connection failed, Retry? is displayed $\triangleright$ Yes.

Do not hold the phone to your ear while waiting. When a call connects, the phone gives a loud signal.

## To answer or reject a call Yes to answer a call. $\downarrow$ No to reject a call.

To change the volume during a call Move (a) or © to decrease or increase the volume.

## To select more options during a call

Press © and select an option.

## To turn off the microphone

1 Press ( ) Mute microphone, or press and hold (c).
2 Unmute, or press © again, to resume.

## To check your missed calls

1 From standby $>$ Calls and scroll to the missed calls tab.
2 To call a number from the list, scroll to a number $>$ Call.

## Emergency calls

Your phone supports the international emergency numbers, 112,911 and 08 . This means that these numbers can normally be used to make an emergency call in any country/region, with or without a SIM card inserted, if a GSM network is in range.

$(3)$In some countries/regions, other emergency numbers may also be promoted. Your network operator may have saved additional local emergency numbers on the SIM card.

To make an emergency call Enter, for example, $112 \downarrow$ Call.

## To view your local emergency numbers

- Phonebook $\downarrow$ Options $>$ Special numbers - Emergency nos..


## Phonebook

Choose your default phonebook from one of the following:

- Contacts - detailed information saved in the phone.
- SIM numbers - names and numbers only on the SIM card.


## To select your default phonebook

1 Phonebook $>$ Options $>$ Advanced

- Default phonebook.

2 Select Contacts or SIM numbers.
For information and settings in either phonebook $\downarrow$ Options.

## Memory

The number of entries you can save depends on the amount of memory available in the phone or on the SIM card.

## To check the memory status <br> - Phonebook $>$ Options $>$ Advanced $>$ Memory status.

## Contacts

Save up to 510 numbers, add pictures, ringtones and personal information, such as email, Web and street addresses.
Information added to a contact is organized under five tabs. Use (®), (@), (©) and (Q) to scroll between tabs.

## To add a contact

1 - Phonebook $>$ New contact $>$ Add.
2 Enter the name $>$ OK.
3 Enter the number $>$ OK.
4 Select a number type.
5 Scroll between the tabs and select fields to enter more information. To enter symbols, for example, @ in an email address $\downarrow$ Symbols and select a symbol $>$ Insert.
6 When you have entered the information $>$ Save.
Q) Enter the + sign and country/region code with all phonebook numbers. They can then be used abroad or at home $\boldsymbol{\square} 22$ To make international calls.

## SIM numbers

Save entries as a name with a single number.

## To add a SIM number

1 - Phonebook $>$ New number $>$ Add.
2 Enter the name $>$ OK and number $>\mathrm{OK}>$ Save.

## Copying contacts

Copy SIM numbers to and from contacts and the SIM card.

©When copying all contacts from the phone to the SIM card, all existing SIM card information is replaced.

To copy names and numbers to the SIM card 1 Phonebook $>$ Options $>$ Advanced $>$ Copy to SIM. 2 Select Copy all or Copy a number.

## To copy SIM numbers to contacts

1 Phonebook $\downarrow$ Options $>$ Advanced $>$ Copy from SIM.
2 Select Copy all or Copy a number.

## To automatically save names and phone numbers to the SIM card

1 - Phonebook $\downarrow$ Options $>$ Advanced $\downarrow$ Auto save on SIM.
2 Select On.

## Sending contacts

Send contacts using infrared or a text or picture message.
Q2. If all contacts from another phone cannot be saved to the SIM card, use send all contacts via infrared.

## To send a contact

Phonebook and select a contact $>$ More $>$ Send contact.

## To send all contacts

Phonebook $\downarrow$ Options $>$ Advanced $\downarrow$ Send all contacts.

## To add a picture or a ringtone to a contact

1 Phonebook and select the contact you want to add a picture or personal ringtone to $>$ More $>$ Edit contact.
2 Select a tab and then select a Picture: or Ringtone: $>$ Edit. This takes you to File manager. Select a file $\downarrow$ Save.

## Calling from the phonebook

If contacts is the default phonebook, you can call from contacts or from the SIM card. If SIM numbers is the default phonebook, you can only call the numbers on the SIM card.

## To call a contact

1 Phonebook. Scroll to, or enter the first letter of the contact you want to call.
2 When the contact is highlighted, press (©) or © to select a number $>$ Call.

## To call a SIM number

1 Phonebook. If SIM numbers is the default phonebook, select the name and number from the list $>$ Call.
2 If Contacts is default phonebook $\downarrow$ Phonebook $\triangleright$ Options - SIM numbers and select the number $>$ Call.

## When Chinese has been selected as the phone language

To call a contact written in Chinese characters
$1>$ Phonebook. Press and hold $\#-$ to switch the search language to Chinese. Then enter the first Pinyin letters of the contact you want to call.
2 When the contact is highlighted, press (a) or © to select a number $\triangleright$ Call.

To call a contact written in Latin characters
$1>$ Phonebook. Press and hold $\#-$ to switch the search language to English. Then enter the first letter of the contact you want to call.
2 When the contact is highlighted, press (a) or © to select a number $>$ Call.

## When English has been selected as the phone language

To call a contact written in Chinese characters
1 Phonebook. Scroll to the contact you want to call.
2 When the contact is highlighted, press (a) or © to select a number $>$ Call.

To call a contact written in Latin characters
1 Phonebook. Scroll to, or enter the first letter of the contact you want to call.
2 When the contact is highlighted, press (0) or © to select a number $\triangleright$ Call.

## To edit a contact

1 - Phonebook and select a contact $>$ More $>$ Edit contact.
2 Scroll to a tab and edit the information $>$ Save.

## To edit SIM numbers

1 If SIM numbers is default, $\downarrow$ Phonebook or if contacts is default, $\downarrow$ Phonebook $>$ Options $>$ SIM numbers.
2 Select the name and number you want to edit.
$3>$ More $>$ Edit and edit the name and number.

## To delete a contact or a SIM number

- Phonebook select a contact or number, press © Yes.

To delete all contacts
1 -Phonebook 1 Options $>$ Advanced - Delete all contacts.

## Call list

Information about the last 30 calls is saved in the call list.

## To call a number from the call list

1 Calls from standby and select a tab.
2 Scroll to the name or number you want to call $\triangleright$ Call.

## To clear the call list

- Calls and scroll to the tab with all calls $>$ More $>$ Delete all.


## Speed dialling

Save phone numbers for speed dialling in a list of numbers from 1-9 in your phone and on your SIM card.

To set or replace speed dialling numbers
1 - Phonebook $>$ Options $>$ Speed dial.
2 Scroll to a number in the list $>$ Add or Replace. Select a phone number.

## To speed dial

From standby, enter a speed dial number (from 1-9) $\triangleright$ Call.

## Voicemail

If your subscription includes an answering service, callers can leave a voice message when you cannot answer a call.

## To enter your voicemail number

Press and hold $D$ - Yes enter the number.

## To call your voicemail service

If you have saved your voicemail number, press and hold
D. You get the number from your service provider.

## To check your voicemail number Messaging $>$ Settings $>$ Voicemail number.

## Voice control

Manage calls with your voice and a handsfree. Create voice commands to voice dial, answer or reject calls. Recording time for a voice command is up to 2 seconds with a limit of up to 50 voice commands. Voice commands cannot be saved on the SIM card.

## To set up voice dialling and record names

## Restricted dialling

Restrict outgoing and incoming calls when at home or abroad. You need a password from your service provider.

If you divert incoming calls, you cannot activate some Restrict calls options.

The following calls can be restricted:

- All outgoing - all outgoing calls.
- Outgoing intl - all outgoing international calls.
- Outgoing intl roam. - all outgoing international calls except to your home country/region.

- Inc. when roaming - all incoming calls when you are abroad (when roaming).

If you enter your PIN incorrectly three times in a row, the SIM card is blocked. This is indicated by the message PIN blocked. To unblock it, you need to enter your PUK (Personal Unblocking Key). Your PIN and PUK are supplied by your network operator. You can edit your PIN and select a new four- to eight-digit PIN.

Before handing your phone in for repair, copy all saved files, messages and information to another device as content may be lost during repair.

Grey text indicates a function that is temporarily unavailable. Since you cannot send themes, pictures and sounds that are copyright-protected, the Send menu may be unavailable.

## The phone is slow to respond

Select and delete unwanted content by pressing (C) and then restart the phone $\Rightarrow 8$ To turn the phone on and off.

## No indication of charging

When you start charging a battery that is empty or a battery that has not been used for a long time, it may take up to 30 minutes before the battery icon appears in the screen.

(3)If the setting for display light is power save, press $\rightarrow$ to activate the screen for indication of charging.

## The phone cannot be switched on Recharge the battery 6 To insert the SIM card and charge the battery or $\Rightarrow 83$ Battery use and care.

## Charging a non Sony Ericsson battery

## Codes do not match

When you want to change a security code, confirm the new code by entering it again $\boldsymbol{\square} 71$ SIM card lock.

## PIN blocked/PIN2 blocked

You have entered your PIN or PIN2 incorrectly three times in a row. To unblock 71 SIM card lock.

## PUK blocked

You entered your personal unblocking key code (PUK) incorrectly 10 times in a row. Contact your operator.

## Phone locked

The phone is locked. To unlock the phone $\boldsymbol{\rightarrow} 72$ Phone lock.

## Phone lock code

Your phone comes with the phone lock code, 0000 . You can change it to any four- to eight-digit code $\boldsymbol{\xi} 72$ Phone lock.

## Number not permitted

Fixed dialling is activated and the number you have dialled is not on your fixed numbers list $\boldsymbol{\omega} 35$ Fixed dialling.

This is because the mobile phone is designed to use the minimum power required to reach the network.
Variations in SAR below the radio frequency exposure guidelines do not mean that there are variations in safety. While there may be differences in SAR levels among mobile phones, all Sony Ericsson mobile phone models are designed to meet radio frequency exposure guidelines.

## Driving

Please note that because of possible interference to electronic equipment, some vehicle manufacturers forbid the use of mobile phones in their vehicles unless a handsfree kit with an external antenna supports the installation. Always give full attention to driving and pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

## Personal medical devices

Mobile phones may affect the operation of cardiac pacemakers and other implanted equipment. Please avoid placing the mobile phone over the pacemaker, e.g. in your breast pocket. When using the mobile phone, place it at the ear opposite the pacemaker. If a minimum distance of 15 cm ( 6 inches) is kept between the mobile phone and the pacemaker, the risk of interference is limited. If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, immediately turn off your mobile phone. Contact your cardiologist for more information.

## Power supply

A new battery or one that has not been used for a long time could have reduced capacity the first few times it is used.
The talk and standby times depend on the actual transmission conditions when using the mobile phone. If the mobile phone is used near a base station, less power is required and talk and standby times are prolonged. Under normal conditions the stand-by time for this battery is 175 to 300 hours.
