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Precautions

■ General

 Please ensure that the equipment is positioned in a well ventilated area and ensure that there is at least 10 cm (4") of free space along the sides, top and back of the equipment.



- Use the unit on a firm, level surface free from vibration.
- Place the unit at least 30 cm (12") away from any CRT TV to avoid colour variations across the TV screen. If the variations persist, move the unit further away from the TV. LCD TV is not prone to such variation.
- Keep the unit away from direct sunlight, strong magnetic fields, excessive dust, humidity and electronic/electrical equipment (home computers, facsimiles, etc.) which generate electrical noise.
- Do not place anything on top of the unit.
- Do not expose the unit to moisture, to temperatures higher than 60°C (140°F) or to extremely low temperatures.

■ AC power connection

After checking all the connections have been made correctly, plug the AC power lead of this unit into the wall socket.

Notes:

- Remove all batteries when using AC power.
- Unplug the AC power lead from the wall socket if the unit will not be in use for a prolonged period of time.

■ DC power connection

Caution:

- During battery/DC operation, the unit will be set to Demo mode off with display and subwoofer light in MODE 2 to reduce the battery power consumption.
- When using battery/DC power, the remote control cannot be used to turn on the unit.
- Unplug the AC power lead from the unit before using the DC power. Otherwise the unit will not work.
- Use only a car adaptor with DC 12V output voltage.
- Insert the plugs firmly.
- When the unit is not in use for an extended period, remove the car adaptor from the car supply socket.



Attention: connection of DC lead and battery terminals.

- : Connect the red battery clip to (+) on the battery terminal.
- Connect the black battery clip to (–) on the battery terminal.



DC power can only be used for a 12V battery.

Do not use any battery besides a 12V.

Operation with batteries

- 1 Disconnect the AC and DC power lead, and remove the battery compartment cover.
- Connection of the AC or DC power lead to the unit disconnects the batteries.



2 Insert 10 "D" size batteries (UM/SUM-1, R20, HP-2 or similar) into the battery compartment.

- When inserting or removing the batteries (5) and (10), push them towards the (-) battery terminals.
- Installing the batteries incorrectly may cause the unit to malfunction.
- Batteries are not included.

3 Replace the battery compartment cover.

Precautions for battery use:

 Insert the batteries according to the direction indicated on the rear panel.

- Remove the batteries if they are weak or if the unit will not be used for long periods of time. This will prevent potential damage due to battery leakage.
- Replace all old batteries with new ones at the same time.
- Do not mix old and new batteries.

Battery replacement:

- When batteries are low, battery indicator "---" will blink to show
 that the batteries need to be replaced. sound may become
 distorted and unit may automatically turn off or mute during high
 volume level. Reduce the volume level or replace the batteries.
- When replacing the batteries, place the unit on a cushion or soft cloth to avoid damage.

Cautions:

- Do not use rechargeable battery (nickel-cadmium battery, etc.).
- Immediately remove the discharged batteries. If the chemical leak into the unit, clean it.
- Batteries (battery pack or batteries installed) shall not be exposed to excessive heat such as sunshine, fire or the like.

■ Demonstration mode

- The first time the unit is plugged in with AC power, the unit will enter the demonstration mode. You will see words scroll and the subwoofer light up will operate in the flashing mode.
- To cancel the demonstration mode, press the DEMO/DIMMER button (remote control) during power stand-by mode. The unit will enter the low power consumption mode. The subwoofer light will be off
- To return to the demonstration mode, press the DEMO/DIMMER button again.
- If iPod or iPhone is docked, the unit will begin charging. "iPod CHARGING" will be displayed.

■ Connecting iPod or iPhone to TV

Photo and video files from iPod or iPhone can be viewed by connecting the system to TV/monitor.

If the TV/monitor has a video input, connect it to the VIDEO OUT socket at the back of the unit and set the TV Out on the iPod or iPhone unit to "ON" position.

Note:

Please make sure to set iPod unit to either NTSC or PAL to match your TV signal. Please visit Apple's homepage for further information.

Remote control

■ Battery installation

1 Open the battery cover.

2 Insert the supplied battery according to the terminal indicated in the battery compartment.

When inserting or removing the battery, push it towards the (–) battery terminals.

3 Close the cover.



- Batteries (battery pack or batteries installed) shall not be exposed to excessive heat such as sunshine, fire or the like.

Notes concerning use:

- Replace the battery if the operating distance is reduced or if the operation becomes erratic. Purchase an "AA" size battery (UM/SUM-3, R6, HP-7 or similar).
- Periodically clean the transmitter on the remote control and the sensor on the unit with a soft cloth.
- Exposing the sensor on the unit to strong light may interfere with operation. Change the lighting or the direction of the unit if this occurs.
- Keep the remote control away from moisture, heat, shock, and vibrations.

■ Test of the remote control

Check the remote control after checking all the connections. Point the remote control directly at the remote sensor on the unit. The remote control can be used within the range shown below:



Note:

Exposing the infrared remote control to direct sunlight may cause the remote control to be inoperable.


Carrying the unit

Caution:

Before transporting the unit, remove the iPod, iPhone, iPad, USB memory device and disc from the unit. Then, set the unit to the power stand-by mode. Transporting the unit with iPod, iPhone, iPad or USB memory device left connected or discs left inside might damage the unit.

Using the carrying strap

This unit can be carried by using a supplied carrying strap. Insert the carrying strap carabiner (hook) to each end of the unit as shown below.



Caution:

Before carrying the unit, make sure the carabiner (hook) is properly secured and closed, otherwise it will cause damage and injury.

Placing the unit

This unit can be placed in 2 positions as shown below. **Caution:**

- Make sure that the unit is placed on a flat and level surface.
- Make sure to turn the unit carefully when adjusting the position.
- Do not place the unit other than these 2 positions to avoid damage and injury.





General control



■ To turn the power on

Press the ON/STAND-BY button to turn the power on.

After use:

Press the ON/STAND-BY button to enter the power stand-by mode.

■ Display and Subwoofer light up control

The display and subwoofer light can be changed.

- Press DEMO/(DIMMER)/
 button for more than 3 seconds.

 The current mode will be displayed.
- Within 5 seconds, press DEMO/(DIMMER)/■ button to change the mode.

Remote control:

Press DEMO/DIMMER button to change the mode.

→MODE 1 (Display backlight on and Subwoofer light off)

MODE 2 (Display backlight off and Subwoofer light off)

MODE Off (Display backlight on and Subwoofer light on)

Notes:

- During battery/DC operation, the unit will be set to Demo mode off with display and subwoofer light in MODE 2 to reduce the battery power consumption.
- During MODE 2, press any button to light up the display backlight for a few seconds.

Volume auto fade-in

If you turn off and on the main unit with the volume set to 27 or higher, the volume starts at 16 and fades in to the last set level.

■ Volume control

Press VOLUME +/- buttons (on main unit) or VOL +/- (on remote control) to increase or decrease the volume.

■ Direct key power on function

When you press any of the following buttons, the unit turns on.

■ iPod ►/II, CD ►/II, USB ►/II on the main unit or the remote control: selected function is activated.

- TUNER/AUDIO IN on the main unit: last tuner or audio function is activated.
- TUNER or AUDIO IN on the remote control: the unit turns on with the selected function activated.

The main unit will enter the stand-by mode (when iPad, iPod, iPhone, guitar or microphone is not connected) after 15 minutes of inactivity during:

iPod: Not docked.

Audio In: No detection of input signal.
CD: In the stop mode or no disc.
USB: In the stop mode or no media.

Note:

However, if iPod or iPhone is docked, the unit will begin charging. "iPod CHARGING" will be displayed.

■ Auto resume function

The auto resume function will resume the last function and playback, should there be a power failure or the AC power lead becomes disconnected. However, CD/MP3 programme and random mode are not memorised.

■ Equaliser

When the EQ/(X-BASS) button is pressed, the current mode setting will be displayed. To change to a different mode, press the EQ/(X-BASS) button repeatedly until the desired sound mode appears.

FLAT No equalisation.

ROCK For rock music.

VOCAL Vocals are enhanced.

HIP HOP For hip hop music.

SALSA For salsa music.

REGGAE For reggae music.

■ Muting


The volume is muted temporarily when pressing the 🕸 button on the remote control. Press again to restore the volume.

■ X-Bass control

When the power is first turned on, the unit will enter the extra bass mode which emphasises the bass frequencies, and "X-BASS" will appear. To cancel the extra bass mode, press the EQ/(X-BASS) button. The last equaliser mode will turn on.

To turn on the X-Bass mode again, press the EQ/(X-BASS) button for more than 2 seconds.

Setting the clock (Remote control only)



In this example, the clock is set for the 24-hour (0:00) display.

- 1 Press the ON/STAND-BY button to turn the power on.
- 2 Press the CLOCK/TIMER button.
- 3 Within 10 seconds, press the ENTER button. To adjust the time, press the I◄◀ ◄◄ or ▶▶ ▶ы button and then press the ENTER button.
- 4 Press the I◄◄ ◄◄ or ▶► ▶► button to select 24-hour or 12-hour display and then press the ENTER button.

→ "0:00" → The 24-hour display will appear. (0:00 - 23:59)

"AM 12:00" → The 12-hour display will appear. (AM 12:00 - PM 11:59)

"AM 0:00" → The 12-hour display will appear. (AM 0:00 - PM 11:59)

Setting the clock (Remote control only) (continued)

- 5 To adjust the hour, press the ◄◄ < or ▶▶ ▶▶ button and then press the ENTER button. Press the ◄◄ ◄◄ or ▶▶ ▶▶ button once to advance the time by 1 hour. Hold it down to advance continuously.
- 6 To adjust the minutes, press the I◄◀ ◄ or ▶▶ ▶ button and then press the ENTER button. Press the I◄◀ ◄◄ or ▶▶ ▶▶ button once to advance the time by 1 minute. Hold it down to advance the time by 5 minutes interval.

To confirm the time display:

Press the CLOCK/TIMER button. The time display will appear for about 5 seconds.

Notes:

- When power supply is restored after unit is plugged in again or after a power failure, confirm the clock, if required, reset the clock (pages 6 - 7).
- The clock will continue counting for a few hours should there be a power failure or the AC power lead becomes disconnected.

To readjust the clock:

Perform "Setting the clock" from step 1. If the "CLOCK" does not appear in step 2, step 4 (for selecting the 24-hour or 12-hour display) will be skipped.

To change the 24-hour or 12-hour display:

- 1 Clear all the programmed contents. [Refer to "Factory reset, clearing all memory" on page 21 for details.]
 2 Perform "Setting the clock" from step 1 onwards.





■ iPod, iPhone or iPad playback (USB only)

- 1 Press the ON/STAND-BY button to turn the power on.
- 2 Press the USB ►/II button on the remote control or the main unit to select USB function.
- 3 Connect iPod, iPhone or iPad to the unit, "USB/iPod" will appear.

4 Press the USB ►/II button to start playback.

Note:

Stop button (**II**) is invalid during iPod, iPhone or iPad playback.

■ iPhone playback

- Sound will only switch from iPhone to the main unit after authentication process is completed in approximately 10 seconds.
- Incoming calls will pause the playback.
- Once the calls are answered, the conversation can only be heard through the built-in iPhone speaker. Turn on the iPhone speaker or undock the iPhone to start conversation.

■ iPod and iPhone connection (Dock only)

Caution:

Unplug all accessories from the iPod or iPhone before inserting it into the dock.

Note:

Do not use the docking station to connect your iPad.

1 Open the iPod door by pushing the iPod door open knob to the area marked 'a'.





- 2 Place the spacer on the space allocated inside the docking station as shown.


■ iPod or iPhone playback (dock only)

- 1 Press the ON/STAND-BY button to turn the power on.
- 2 Press the iPod ►/II button on the remote control or the main unit to select iPod function.
- 3 Insert iPod or iPhone unit into the dock of main unit. "DOCK OK" will appear. Make sure to close the iPod door before playback.
- 4 Press the iPod ►/II button to start playback.

Notes:

- When enjoying loud music at high volume, sound vibration is transferred to the docked iPod or iPhone. This vibration may cause the song to shuffle if the iPod or iPhone 'Shake to Shuffle' setting is turned on. Should this happen, turn off the 'Shake to Shuffle' function.
- iPod touch and iPhone need to be operated itself in the following operations.
 - 1. Returning to the home screen.
 - 2. Selecting the application on the home screen.
 - 3. Dragging the slider.

To operate the connected iPod or iPhone, turn this unit to position 2 (refer "Placing the unit" on page 5).



■ To disconnect iPod, iPhone or iPad

It is safe to disconnect iPod, iPhone and iPad even during playback. However, attention should be drawn when removing the iPod or iPhone from docking station to avoid damage.

Watching videos on a TV connected to iPod or iPhone

- 1 Press the DISPLAY (TV OUT) button for more than 2 seconds until "V-OUT ON" appear on display.
- 2 Press the ENTER button to start playback.

Notes

- If the TV Out setting is already turned on at video menu, the video is automatically displayed on the TV screen when ENTER key is pressed.
- UŚB terminal does not support VIDEO OUT.
- To return to watching video on iPod or iPhone screen, press the MENU button to enter video menu. Then press the DISPLAY (TV OUT) button for more than 2 seconds until "V-OUT OFF" appears.
- During iPod or iPhone video playback, pressing the DISPLAY (TV OUT) button will not toggle video out display between iPod and TV.

Caution:

Stop button (■) is invalid during iPod function.

■ Navigating the iPod, iPhone or iPad menus

- 1 Press the MENU button to view the menu on iPod, iPhone or iPad unit. Press it again to go back to previous menu.
- 2 Use the TUNING (✓ or △) button to select an item on the menu and then press ENTER button.

Note:

When navigating the iPod, iPhone or iPad menu with remote control, do not operate any of the buttons on the iPod or iPhone unit. The volume level is adjusted by pressing the VOL (+ or –) button on the main unit or the remote control. Adjusting the volume on the iPod, iPhone or iPad units give no effect.

iPod, iPhone and iPad operations:

The operations described below depend on the generation iPod, iPhone and iPad you are using.

System on operation:

When the main unit is powered on, the iPod, iPhone or iPad units will automatically power on when docked or connected in the unit.

System off (stand-by operation):

When the main unit is turned to stand-by mode, the docked iPod, iPhone or connected iPad unit will automatically pause the playback.

Listening to a CD or MP3/WMA disc



This system can play back a standard CD, CD-R/RW in the CD format and CD-R/RW with MP3 or WMA files, but cannot record on them. Some audio CD-R and CD-RW discs may not be playable due to the state of the disc or the device that was used for recording.

MP3:

MP3 is a form of compression. It is an acronym which stands for MPEG Audio Layer 3. MP3 is a type of audio code which is processed by significant compression from the original audio source with very little loss in sound quality.

- This system supports MPEG 1 Layer 3 and VBR files.
- During VBR file playback, time counter in the display may differ from its actual playback time.
- Bitrate which is supported by MP3 is 32 ~ 320 kbps.

WMΔ-


WMA files are Advanced System Format files that include audio files which are compressed with Windows Media Audio codec. WMA is developed by Microsoft as an audio format file for Windows Media Player.

- "MP3" and "WMA" indicator will light up after the unit reads information on an MP3 or WMA disc.
- Bitrate which is supported by WMA is 64 ~ 160 kbps.

■ Disc playback

- 1 Press the ON/STAND-BY button to turn the power on.
- 2 Press the CD ►/II button on the remote control or the main unit to select CD function.
- 3 Open the CD compartment by pushing the CD compartment open knob to the area marked '♠'.
- 4 Place the disc on the spindle, label side up.

Listening to a CD or MP3/WMA disc (continued)



5 Close the CD compartment.

6 Press the CD ▶/II button to start playback. After the last track is played, the unit will stop automatically.

Caution:

- Do not place two discs in the spindle.
- Do not play discs of special shapes (heart, octagon, etc). It may cause malfunctions.
- If TV or radio interference occurs during CD operation, move the unit away from the TV or radio.
- Due to the structure of the disc information, it takes longer to read an MP3/WMA disc than a normal CD (approximately 20 to 90 seconds).
- Do not open the CD compartment during playback or you may be injured.



■ Direct track search

By using the Numeric buttons, the desired tracks on the current disc can be played.

Use the Numeric buttons on the remote control to select the desired track whilst playing the selected disc.

- The Numeric buttons allow you to select up to number 9.
- When selecting number 10 or higher, use the "10+" button.

A. For example, to choose 13

- 1 Press the "10+" button once. 2 Press the "1" button.
- 3 Press the "3" button

B. For example, to choose 130

- 1 Press the "10+" button twice. 2 Press the "1" button. 3 Press the "3" button.

- 4 Press the "0" button.

Notes:

- A track number higher than the number of tracks on the disc cannot be selected.
- During random play, direct search is not possible.

To stop playback:

Press the DEMO/(DIMMER)/■ (■) button.

Repeat play

Repeat play can play one track, all tracks or a programmed sequence continuously.

To repeat one track:

Press the PLAY MODE button repeatedly until "REP ONE" appears. Press the CD ▶/II button.

To repeat all tracks:

Press the PLAY MODE button repeatedly until "REPALL" appears. Press the CD ▶/II button.

To repeat desired tracks:

Perform steps 1 - 5 in "Programmed play" section on page 11 and then press the PLAY MODE button repeatedly until "REP ALL" appears.

To cancel repeat play:
Press the PLAY MODE button repeatedly until "NORMAL" appears

Caution:

After performing repeat play, be sure to press the DEMO/(DIMMER)/ ■ (■) button. Otherwise, the disc will play continuously.

Advanced CD or MP3/WMA disc playback (continued)

■ Random play

The tracks on the disc can be played in random order automatically.

To random play all tracks:

Press and hold PLAY MODE button on the remote control until "RANDOM" appears. Press the CD ▶/II button.

To cancel random play:

Press the PLAY MODE button again. "RDM" indicator will disappear.

Notes:

- If you press the ▶▶▶I button during random play, you can move to the track selected next by the random operation. On the other hand, the I◄◄ ◄◄ button does not allow you to move to the previous track. The beginning of the track being played will be located.
- In random play, the unit will select and play tracks automatically. (You cannot select the order of the tracks.)

■ Programmed play (CD

You can choose up to 32 selections for playback in the order you like.

- 1 Whilst in the stop mode, press the MEMORY button on the remote control to enter the programming save mode.
- 2 Press the numeric button or I◀◀ ◀◀ or ▶▶ ▶▶I buttons on the remote control to select the desired track.
- 3 Press the MEMORY button to save the track number.

■ Programmed play (MP3/WMA)

To play back MP3/WMA (Windows Media Audio) file

There are many music sites on the internet that you can download MP3/VMMA (Windows Media Audio) music files. Follow the instructions from the website on how to download the music files. You can then play back these downloaded music files by burning them to a CD-R/RW disc.


■ About folder playback order

If MP3/WMA files are recorded in several folders, a folder number will be set to each folder automatically.

These folders can be selected by the FOLDER button on the remote control. If there is no supported file formats inside the selected folder, the folder is skipped and the next folder will be selected.

Example: How to set folder number if MP3/WMA format files are recorded as below figure.

- 1 ROOT folder is set as folder 1.
- 2 As for folders inside ROOT folder (Folder A and Folder B), the folder which is recorded earlier on the disc will be set as folder 2 and folder 6.
- 3 As for folder inside Folder A (Folder C and Folder D), the folder which is recorded earlier on the disc will be set as folder 3 and folder 4.
- 4 Folder E that is inside Folder D will be set as folder 5.
- The folder and file order information which is recorded on the disc depends on the writing software. There maybe possibilities that this unit will playback the files not according to our expected playback order.
- For CD MP3/WMA, 999 numbers of folders and files inclusive of the folders which have non playable files can be read.
- Folder mode on/off can be operated by the FOLDER button on the remote control. Files that are played when folder mode is set to the on position, may differ from those played back when folder mode is turned off.





■ Procedure to playback MP3/WMA disc with folder mode on

To play back CD-R/RW.







■ Tuning

Note:

This product can receive FM stereo and FM monoaural brodcasts.

- 1 Press the ON/STAND-BY button to turn the power on.
- 2 Press the TUNER button on the remote control or TUNER/ AUDIO IN button on the main unit repeatedly to select FM Stereo or FM Mono.
- 3 Press the TUNING (∨ or ∧) button on the remote control to tune in to the desired station.
 - Manual tuning:

Auto tuning:



Using the Radio Data System (RDS)

RDS is a broadcasting service which a growing number of FM stations provide. These FM stations send additional signals along with their regular programme signals. They send their station names, and information about the type of programme such as sport, music, etc.

When tuned to an RDS station, "RDS" and the station name will be displayed.

"TP" (Traffic Programme) will appear on the display when the received broadcast carries traffic information, and "TA" (Traffic Announcement) will appear whilst a traffic information is on air.


"PTY!" (Dynamic PTY Indicator) will appear whilst the Dynamic PTY station is received.




You can control the RDS by using the buttons on the remote control only.

Information provided by RDS

Each time the RDS DISP button is pressed, the display will switch as follows:



When tuning in to a station other than an RDS station or to an RDS station which sends weak signal, the display will change in the following order:



Using the Radio Data System (RDS) (continued)

■ Using the Auto Station Programme Memory (ASPM)

Whilst in the ASPM operation mode, the tuner will automatically search for new RDS stations. Up to 40 stations can be stored. If you have already stored some stations in memory, the number of new stations you can store will be less.

- 1 Press the TUNER button on the remote control or TUNER/ AUDIO IN button repeatedly on the main unit to select TUNER function.
- 2 Press and hold down the RDS ASPM button on the remote control.
 - 1 After "ASPM" has flashed for about 4 seconds, scanning will start (87.50 - 108.00 MHz).



When an RDS station is found, "RDS" will appear for a short time and the station will be stored in memory.



3 After scanning, the number of stations stored in memory will be displayed for 4 seconds, and then "END" will appear for 4 seconds



To stop the ASPM operation before it is complete:

Press the RDS ASPM button whilst it is scanning for stations. The stations which are already stored in memory will be kept there.

Notes:

- Any station which has the same frequency as the one stored in memory will not be stored.
- If 40 stations have already been stored in memory, the scan will be aborted. If you want to redo the ASPM operation, erase the preset memory.
- If no station have been stored in memory, "END" will appear for about 4 seconds.
- If the RDS signals are very weak, station names may not be stored in memory.
- The same station name can be stored in different channels.
- In a certain area or during certain time periods, the station names may temporarily be different.

■ Notes for RDS operation

If any of the following events occur, it does not mean that the unit is faulty:

- "PS", "NO PS" and a station name appear alternately, and the unit does not operate properly.
- If a particular station is not broadcasting properly or a station is conducting tests, the RDS reception function may not work properly.
- When you receive an RDS station whose signal is too weak, information like the station name may not be displayed.
- "NO PS", "NO PTY" or "NO RT" will flash for about 5 seconds, and then the frequency will be displayed.

Notes for radio text:

- The first 8 characters of the radio text will appear for 4 seconds and then they will scroll across the display.
- If you tune in to an RDS station which is not broadcasting any radio text, "NO RT" will be displayed when you switch to the radio text position.
- Whilst radio text data is received or when the text contents change, "RT" will be displayed.

■ To recall stations in memory

To specify programmed types and select stations (PTY search):

You can search a station by specifying the programme type (news, sports, traffic programme, etc. ... see page 17) from the stations in memory.

- 1 Press the TUNER button on the remote control or TUNER/ AUDIO IN button repeatedly on the main unit to select TUNER function.
- 2 Press the RDS PTY button on the remote control.



"SELECT" and "PTY TI" will appear alternately for about 6 seconds.

3 Within 6 seconds, press the PRESET (✓ or ▲) button to select the programme type.



Each time the button is pressed, the programme type will appear. If the button is held down for more than 0.5 seconds, the programme type will appear continuously.

4 Whilst the selected programme type is flashing (within 6 seconds), press the RDS PTY button again.



After the selected programme type has been lit for 2 seconds, "SEARCH" will appear, and the search operation will start.

Notes:

- If the display has stopped flashing, start again from step 2. If the unit finds a desired programme type, the corresponding channel number will lit for about 8 seconds, and then the station name will remain it.
- If you want to listen to the same programme type of another station, press the RDS PTY button whilst the channel number or station name is flashing. The unit will look for the next station.
- If no station can be found, "NOTFOUND" will appear for 4 seconds.

If you select the traffic programme:



■ Connecting a guitar / microphone


Caution:

Be careful not to connect a bass guitar as it might damage this unit.



- 1 Set the guitar/microphone volume (GAIN) knob to the minimum level.
- 2 Connect a guitar/microphone to the correct input socket. Make sure that the cable has a 6.3 mm (1/4") diameter plug.
- 3 Arrange the guitar/microphone cables into the grooves of the cable holder on the left or the right side of the unit. Then, thread the cable through the bottom of the unit.

Do not let the cables to be on top of the unit when using guitar/microphone as it may cause the unit to roll over causing damage and injury.



- To play a guitar or using the microphone only, select 'AUDIO IN' function. Make sure there is no playback from Audio In connection
- 6 Adjust the volume (GAIN) knob on the connected equipment.

Note

Before disconnecting the guitar/microphone, set the guitar/microphone volume (GAIN) knob to the minimum level.

■ Listening to the playback sounds of portable audio player, etc.



- 1 Use a connection lead to connect the portable audio player etc. to the AUDIO IN socket. When using video equipment, connect the audio output to this unit and the video output to a television.
- 2 Press the ON/STAND-BY button to turn the power on.



Timer playback:

Daily timer:




Before setting timer:

- Check that the clock is set to the correct time (refer to page 6).
 If it is not set, you cannot use the timer function.
- For timer playback: Plug in USB or load discs or dock iPod to be played.



- Press the ON/STAND-BY button to turn the power on.
- 2 Press and hold the CLOCK/TIMER button.
- 3 Within 10 seconds, press the I◄◄ ◄◄ or ▶▶ ▶ button to select "ONCE" or "DAILY", and press the ENTER button.

Once timer:

Reusing the memorised timer setting:

The timer setting will be memorised once it is entered. To reuse the same setting, perform the following operations.

- 1 Turn the power on and press and hold down the CLOCK/TIMER button
- 2 Within 10 seconds, press the ◄◄ ◄◄ or ►► ►► button to select "ONCE" or "DAILY", and press the ENTER button.
- 3 Within 10 seconds, press the I◄◀ ◄◄ or ►► ►► button to select "TIM.ON", and press the ENTER button.

■ Sleep operation

The radio, compact disc, iPod, USB, and Audio In function can all be turned off automatically.



Condensation

Sudden temperature changes, storage or operation in an extremely humid environment may cause condensation inside the cabinet (CD pickup, etc.) or on the transmitter on the remote control. Condensation can cause the unit to malfunction. If this happens, leave the power on with no disc in the unit until normal playback is possible (about 1 hour). Wipe off any condensation on the transmitter with a soft cloth before operating the unit.

■ If problem occurs

When this product is subjected to strong external interference (mechanical shock, excessive static electricity, abnormal supply voltage due to lightning, etc.) or if it is operated incorrectly, it may malfunction.

If such a problem occurs, do the following:

- 1 Set the unit to the stand-by mode and turn the power on again.
- 2 If the unit is not restored in the previous operation, unplug and plug in the unit again, and then turn the power on.

- Keep your discs away from direct sunlight, heat, and excessive moisture.
- Always hold the CDs by the edges. Fingerprints, dirt, or water on the CDs can cause noise or mistracking. If a CD is dirty or does not play properly, clean it with a soft, dry cloth, wiping straight out from the centre, along the radius.
