



Important Information

For your safety

To prevent severe injury and loss of life/ property, read this section carefully before using the product to ensure proper and safe operation of your product.

WARNING

Power connection

- Use only the power source marked on the product.
- Do not overload power outlets and extension cords. This can result in the risk of fire or electric shock.
- Completely insert the AC adaptor/power plug into the power outlet. Failure to do so may cause electric shock and/or excessive heat resulting in a fire.
- Regularly remove any dust, etc. from the AC adaptor/power plug by pulling it from the power outlet, then wiping with a dry cloth.
 Accumulated dust may cause an insulation defect from moisture, etc. resulting in a fire.
- Unplug the product from power outlets if it emits smoke, an abnormal smell, or makes an unusual noise. These conditions can cause fire or electric shock. Confirm that smoke has stopped emitting and contact an authorised service centre.
- Unplug from power outlets and never touch the inside of the product if its casing has been broken open.
- Never touch the plug with wet hands. Danger of electric shock exists.
- It is advisable to unplug the machine during thunderstorms as the warranty does not cover any damage resulting from lightning strikes and power surges. Lightning protection is advised.

- Do not place or use this product near automatically controlled devices such as automatic doors and fire alarms. Radio

waves emitted from this product may cause such devices to malfunction resulting in an accident.

 Do not allow the AC adaptor or telephone line cord to be excessively pulled, bent or placed under heavy objects.

Operating safeguards

- Unplug the product from power outlets before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners.
- Do not disassemble the product.
- Do not spill liquids (detergents, cleansers, etc.) onto the telephone line cord plug, or allow it to become wet at all. This may cause a fire. If the telephone line cord plug becomes wet, immediately pull it from the telephone wall jack, and do not use.



Battery

- We recommend using the batteries noted on page 3. USE ONLY rechargeable Ni-MH batteries AAA (R03) size.
- Do not mix old and new batteries.Do not open or mutilate the batteries.
- Released electrolyte from the batteries is corrosive and may cause burns or injury to the eyes or skin. The electrolyte is toxic and may be harmful if swallowed.
- Exercise care when handling the batteries. Do not allow conductive materials such as rings, bracelets, or keys to touch the batteries, otherwise a short circuit may cause the batteries and/or the conductive material to overheat and cause burns.
- Charge the batteries provided with or identified for use with this product only, in accordance with the instructions and limitations specified in this manual.







Battery charging

Note when setting up

Note for connections

- The AC adaptor must remain connected at all times. (It is normal for the adaptor to feel warm during use.)
- The AC adaptor should be connected to a vertically oriented or floor-mounted AC outlet. Do not connect the AC adaptor to a ceiling-mounted AC outlet, as the weight of the adaptor may cause it to become disconnected.

During a power failure

The unit will not work during a power failure. We recommend connecting a corded-type telephone (without AC adaptor) to the same telephone line or to the same telephone line jack, if you have such a telephone jack in your house.

Note for battery installation

- Use the supplied rechargeable batteries. For replacement, we recommend using the Panasonic rechargeable batteries noted on page 3, 5.
- Wipe the battery ends (⊕, ⊖) with a dry cloth.
- Avoid touching the battery ends
 (⊕, ⊖) or the unit contacts.

Note for battery charging

- It is normal for the handset to feel warm during charging.
- Clean the charge contacts of the handset, base unit, and charger with a soft and dry cloth once a month. Before cleaning the unit, disconnect from power outlets and any telephone line cords. Clean more often if the unit is exposed to grease, dust, or high humidity.





Note:

- It is normal for batteries not to reach full capacity at the initial charge. Maximum battery performance is reached after a few complete cycles of charge/discharge (use).
- Actual battery performance depends on usage and ambient environment.
- Even after the batteries are fully charged, the handset can be left on the base unit or charger without any ill effect on the batteries.
- The battery level may not be displayed correctly after you replace the batteries. In this case, place the handset on the base unit or charger and let it charge for at least 7 hours.

Making/Answering Calls

Note: When editina:

- To erase a number, place the cursor to the right of where you want to erase the number, then press **[C]**.
- To insert a number, place the cursor to the right of where you want to insert the number, then press the appropriate dial kev.

Pause (for PBX/long distance service users)

A pause is sometimes required when making calls using a PBX or long distance service. When storing a calling card access number and/or PIN in the phonebook, a pause is also needed (page 13).

Example: If you need to dial the line access number "0" when making outside calls with a PBX:

Answering calls

Auto talk

For call waiting or Call Waiting Caller ID service users

To use call waiting or Call Waiting Caller ID, you must first subscribe with your service provider/telephone company. This feature allows you to receive calls while you are already talking on the phone. If you receive a call while on the phone, you will hear If you subscribe to both Caller ID and Call Waiting with Caller ID services, the 2nd caller's information is displayed after you hear the call waiting tone on the handset.

Temporary tone dialling (for rotary/pulse service users)

You can join an existing outside call. To join the conversation, press [] when the other handset is on an outside call.


Chain dial

This feature allows you to dial phone numbers in the phonebook while you are on a call. This feature can be used, for example, to dial a calling card access number or bank account PIN that you have stored in the phonebook, without having to dial manually.







Special programming

Alarm

An alarm sounds at the set time (once or daily) for 2 minutes. You can also customise the repeat times and the repeat cycle (snooze function). Alarm can be set for each handset.

Example: If you want the alarm to sound 3 times, repeating at 5 minute intervals from 7:00, you need to set the alarm as follows; Time: "07:00"

"Repeat Times": "3 Times" "Repeat Cycle": "5 Minutes"



 - "Private": The caller requests not to send caller information.





After you subscribe to this service, your service provider/telephone company's voice mail system answers calls for you when you are unavailable to answer the phone or when your line is busy. Messages are recorded by your service provider/telephone company, not your telephone. When you have new messages, ⊠O is displayed on the handset if message indication service is available. Please contact your service provider/telephone company for details of this service.



Character entry

The dial keys are used to enter characters and numbers. Each dial key has multiple characters assigned to it. The characters that can be entered depend on the character entry mode (page 22).

- Press [] or [] to move the cursor left or right. - Press dial keys to enter characters and numbers.
- To erase a character or number, place the cursor to the right of where you want to erase the character or number, then press [C].
- Press K (A \rightarrow a) to switch between uppercase and lowercase.
- To enter another character located on the same dial key, press [\blacktriangleright] to move the cursor to the next space, then press the appropriate dial key.
- If you do not press any dial key within 5 seconds after entering a character, the character is fixed and the cursor moves to the next space.
