

Precautions

Installing your TV

• Place the TV on the floor or on a sturdy platform. The mounting surface should be flat and steady. If you install the TV on a soft floor, make sure that the floor is not damaged by the weight of the TV.

Use this TV with the Toshiba stand listed in the Specifications section on page 46 only. Use with other stands may result in instability, causing possible injury or death.

• Place the TV far enough away from the walls to allow proper ventilation. This will prevent the TV from overheating and avoid possible damage to the TV. Avoid dusty areas too.

Using your TV

- Do not stand or climb on the TV.
- Do not put any heavy object on top of the TV.
- Do not place containers with liquids such as drinks or cosmetics on the TV. If any foreign material or water leaks into the TV, unplug the AC cord and contact your dealer.
- Avoid displaying stationary images on your TV screen for extended periods of time. Stationary patterns generated by a PIP/double-window display, computer displays, video games, stock market reports, etc., can become permanently engrained on the picture tube. This damage is not protected by your warranty because it is the result of misuse. If you wish to use your TV to display still images, reduce brightness and contrast settings. Never leave a PIP/double-window, computer, or video game display unattended.

Cleaning your TV

- To clean the TV screen:
- 1. First remove the plug from the power outlet to avoid possible shock hazard.
- 2. Use a clean cellulose sponge or chamois cloth dampened with a solution of mild detergent and warm water to clean TV screen and trim. Do not use too much water on the TV screen. Water spills into the cabinet and may cause damage to the TV. Avoid excess water.
- 3. Remove any extra moisture with the same cloth or a dry one.
- To maintain the finish and appearance of the cabinet, polish it from time to time with a quality furniture polish.

CAUTION

Never use strong solvents such as thinner, benzene or other chemicals on or near the cabinet, as they might damage the finish.

NOTICE OF POSSIBLE ADVERSE EFFECTS ON TV PICTURE TUBE

Extensive viewing of fixed (non-moving) images or patterns can cause uneven aging of the picture tube, and leave a subtle but permanent ghost image in the picture. This type of damage is **NOT COVERED BY YOUR WARRANTY**. Never leave the TV on and unattended for long periods of time while the following formats or images are displayed:

- Fixed images, such as PIP/POP windows, stock tickers, video game patterns, TV station logos, and websites.
- Special formats that do not use the entire screen. For example, viewing letterbox style (16:9) media on a normal (4:3) display (bars at top and bottom of screen), or viewing normal (4:3) media on a widescreen (16:9) display (bars on left and right sides of screen).

Welcome to Toshiba


Congratulations! You have purchased one of the finest TVs on the market. The goal of this manual is to guide you through setting up and operating your Toshiba TV as quickly as possible.


Instructions in this manual are based on using the remote control. You can also use the controls on the TV if they have the same name as those on the remote control.

Please read all the safety and operating instructions carefully, and keep the manual for future reference.


Exploring your new TV

You can operate your TV by using the buttons on the front panel or the remote control. The back panel and front panel (behind the door) provide all the terminal connections you will need to connect other equipment to your TV. See "Connecting your TV" on page 5.





Caution: Do not plug the TV in until you have finished connecting all of your equipment.



Note:

If you have a mono VCR, connect L/Mono to VCR Audio OUT using only one audio cable.

If you have an S-VHS VCR, use an S-video cable (in the S-video jacks) instead of the regular video cable.


Do not connect a regular video cable and an S-video cable to Video-1 (or Video-2) at the same time.

Connecting a cable converter box

This connection allows you to watch basic and premium cable channels.

To use the TV's features, select ANT-1. To view premium channels, select ANT-2, tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (whichever channel is vacant in your area), and use the converter box to change channels. You will need:

• two coaxial cables




Connecting a cable converter box and VCR

This connection allows you to watch and record basic and premium cable channels, watch videotapes, and record one channel while watching another channel. To use the TV's features, select ANT-1. To view premium channels or record with the VCR, select ANT-2, tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (whichever channel is vacant in your area), and use the converter box to change channels.

You will need:

- three coaxial cables
- one pair of audio cables (one single audio cable for a mono VCR)
- one video cable (one S-video cable for an S-VHS VCR)



Note:

When you use a converter box with your TV, the remote control will not operate some features, such as programming your favorite channels, labeling channels, and locking channels.

Note:

If you have a mono VCR, connect L/Mono to VCR Audio OUT using only one audio cable.

If you have an S-VHS VCR, use an S-video cable (in the S-video jacks) instead of a regular video cable. Do not connect a regular video cable and an S-video cable to Video-1 (or Video-2) at the same time.


When you use a converter box with your TV, the remote control will not operate some features, such as programming your favorite channels, labeling channels, and locking channels.

Connecting a DVD player or satellite receiver and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DVD/satellite, VCR, and TV programs, and record one TV channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- two pairs of audio cables (one single and one pair of audio cables for a mono VCR)
- one video cable (between the TV and VCR)
- one S-video cable (between the TV and DVD player/satellite receiver)



Note:

For the highest possible picture quality from a non-ColorStream DVD player/satellite receiver, you must use an S-video cable between the TV and DVD player/satellite receiver. (If your DVD player or satellite receiver is ColorStream-compatible, see page 8).

Do not connect both an S-video cable and a regular video cable between the TV and DVD player/satellite receiver at the same time. Doing so will distort the picture.

Do not connect the DVD player/satellite receiver and VCR to the same video channel on the TV. (See the illustrations, which show the DVD player/satellite receiver connected to Video-1 on the TV and the VCR connected to Video-2 on the TV.)

Caution:

The unauthorized recording of television programs, videotapes, and other materials may infringe upon the provisions of copyright laws.

Connecting a DVD player with component video and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DVD, VCR, and TV programs, and record DVD and TV programs. You can record from one source while watching a program from another source.

Your TV has ColorStream component video inputs. Connecting your TV to a ColorStream-compatible DVD player (such as a Toshiba ColorStream-equipped DVD player) can greatly enhance picture quality and realism.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- three pairs of audio cables (two single and one pair of audio cables for a mono VCR)
- two video cables
- one set of ColorStream (component video) cables (one S-video cable for a non-ColorStream DVD player;see notes at right)

Connecting your TV


Connecting a DTV receiver/set-top box with component video and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DTV (digital TV broadcast), VCR, and TV programs, and record DTV and TV programs. You can record from one source while watching a program from another source.

Your TV has ColorStream component video inputs. Connecting your TV to a ColorStream-compatible DTV receiver can greatly enhance picture quality and realism.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- three pairs of audio cables (two single and one pair of audio cables for a mono VCR)
- two video cables
- one set of ColorStream (component video) cables (one S-video cable for a non-ColorStream DTV receiver; see notes at right)



DTV receiver with component video

Note:

For the highest possible picture quality, you must use ColorStream video cables between the TV and DTV receiver. You can connect the ColorStream cables from the DTV receiver to either ColorStream jack on the TV (HD1 or HD2).

The ColorStream HD1 and HD2 jacks can be used with Progressive (480p) and Interlace (480i, 1080i) scan systems.

If your DTV receiver is not ColorStreamcompatible, use the S-video connections (both audio and video) instead of the ColorStream connections. Do not connect both S-Video and ColorStream cables between the TV and DTV receiver at the same time.

To record from the DTV receiver, set the VCR to Line IN. To monitor recording from the DTV receiver, set the VCR to Line IN, and set the TV to Video-1.



Connecting two VCRs

This connection allows you to record (dub/edit) from one VCR to another VCR while watching a videotape. You can also record from one TV channel while watching another TV channel.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- two pairs of audio cables (two single audio cables for mono VCRs)
- two video cables (two S-video cables for S-VHS VCRs)




Connecting a camcorder

This connection allows you to watch video materials recorded on a camcorder.

You will need:

- one pair of audio cables
- one video cable (one S-video cable for an S-VHS camcorder)



Connecting your TV

Connecting an audio system

This connection allows you to use an audio amplifier to adjust the audio level. This also allows you to use external speakers.

To control the audio, turn on the TV and the stereo amplifier, and turn off the built-in speakers (see "Turning off the built-in speakers" on page 43).

You will need:

• one pair of audio cables

Note:

To hear sound when using an external audio amplifier, the volume of both the TV and the amplifier must be set above 0 (zero).


Connecting an A/V receiver


This connection allows you to use an audio/video (A/V) receiver to enhance your TV's sound.

If you have a system with Dolby Pro Logic[®] surround sound, you can add to the realism of the sound by using the TV's internal speakers as center channel speakers.

You will need:

- one pair of audio cables
- one single audio cable for the audio center channel
- one video cable

Using the remote control

Preparing the remote control for use


With the remote control, you can operate your TV, most VCR models, and cable TV converters together, even if they are different brands. If you will be using your TV with a Toshiba VCR, your remote control is already programmed and ready to use. If you own different brands of VCRs and/or converters, you first have to program your remote control. (See "Programming the remote control for use with a VCR or a cable TV converter" on page 13.)

Installing the remote control batteries

To install the batteries:

1. Slide the battery cover off the back of the remote control.

2. Install two "AA" size alkaline batteries. Match the + and - signs on the batteries to the signs on the battery compartment.



3. Slide the battery cover back on to the remote control until the lock snaps.

Using the remote control with a Toshiba VCR or cable TV converter

To control a Toshiba VCR:

Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to the VCR position. The buttons shown at right will then control the VCR. The unshaded buttons will operate the TV as usual.

To control a Toshiba cable TV converter:

Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to the CABLE position. The shaded buttons in the top half of the illustration at right will control the cable TV converter. The other buttons will operate the TV as usual.

If you own a non-Toshiba VCR or cable TV converter, you may be able to program the TV remote control to control it. See "Programming the remote control for use with a non-Toshiba VCR or cable TV converter" on page 13.

Note:

Your TV's remote control may not operate certain features on your VCR, cable TV converter, or other electronic device.

Refer to the owner's manuals for your other devices to determine their available features.


If your TV's remote control does not operate a specific feature on a device, use the remote control that came with the device.

Caution:

- Dispose of batteries in a designated disposal area. Do not throw batteries into a fire.
- Do not mix battery types or combine used batteries with new ones.
- If the batteries are dead or if you will not use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries to prevent battery acid from leaking into the battery compartment.

Note:

 Battery life expectancy is about one year with normal use.



Remote Control

The remote control is pre-programmed to operate Toshiba VCRs. To use the remote control to operate a non-Toshiba VCR or cable converter, follow the steps below to program the remote control.

1. Refer to the "VCR code table" or "Cable TV converter code table" on pages 14-15 to find the corresponding code for your VCR or cable TV converter brand.

If more than one code is listed, try each one separately until you find the one that works.

- 2. If you are reprogramming the remote control to operate your:
 - VCR: Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch on the remote control to VCR.
 - Cable converter: Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch on the remote control to CABLE.
- 3. While holding down the RECALL button, press the Number buttons (0-9) to enter the three-digit code for your VCR or cable TV converter.
- 4. Point the remote control at the VCR or converter and press POWER to test the code.


If the VCR or converter responds, you have entered the correct code.

If the VCR or converter does not respond, you may have entered the wrong code. Repeat steps 1-4 using another code.

5. Reset the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to TV to control the TV.

For future reference, write down the code(s) you used:

Note:

- · Each time you replace the batteries, you must reprogram the remote control.
- Some newer VCRs are capable of working on either of two remote codes. These VCRs have a switch labeled "VCR1/VCR2."

If your VCR has this kind of switch, it may not respond to any of the code numbers for your VCR brand name. In this case, set the switch to the other position (VCR1 or VCR2) and reprogram the remote control.




The PICTURE qualities you adjusted can be saved in the TV's memory with the SAVE NEW PREFERENCE feature (see page 35). You can keep these settings or choose factory set options, as described under "Selecting the picture mode" above.

Note:

If you select one of the factory-set picture modes (SPORTS, STANDARDS, or MOVIE) and then change a picture quality setting (for example, increase the contrast), the picture mode automatically changes to PREFERENCE in the Picture menu.

To save your new picture quality settings, you must select SAVE NEW PREFERENCE (see page 35) before closing the Picture menu or the TV will return to the previous picture mode.




Saving new preference

You can save the PICTURE qualities (contrast, brightness, color, tint, and sharpness) you adjusted in the picture preference mode.

To save your new preferences:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the PICTURE menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight SAVE NEW PREFERENCE.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \triangleright . When complete, the menu displays "DONE".





Using the flesh tone feature

This feature displays natural flesh tones by correcting the tint.

To turn on the flesh tone feature:

- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight FLESH TONE.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \triangleright to highlight ON.

Selecting the video input source

Press the TV/VIDEO on the remote control or the TV to view a signal coming from another device connected to your TV, such as a VCR or video disc player (see illustrations below). You can select ANT 1, VIDEO 1, VIDEO 2, VIDEO 3, ColorStream HD1, ColorStream HD2, or ANT 2 depending on which input jacks are used for connecting the devices (see "Connecting your TV" on page 5.)

Pressing TV/VIDEO on the remote control <u>displays</u> the current signal source (press TV/VIDEO again or 0-6 to <u>change</u>)

Labeling the video input sources

The video label feature allows you to label each input source for your TV from the following preset list of labels:



- CBL : Cable box

To label the video input sources:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ► until the CUSTOM menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacksquare to highlight VIDEO LABEL.




- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to display the VIDEO LABEL menu.




- Finish labeling the other video sources as desired. To return to the previous menu, press ▲ or ▼ to highlight CUSTOM MENU, and then press ◀ or ►.


Using the closed caption feature

The closed caption feature has two options:

- Captions—An on-screen display of the dialogue, narration, and sound effects of TV programs and videos that are closed captioned (usually marked as "CC" in TV listings).
- Text—An on-screen display of information not related to the current program, such as weather or stock data (when provided by individual stations).

To view captions or text:

- 1. Tune the TV to the desired program.
- 2. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ► until the CUSTOM menu appears.
- 3. Press $\mathbf{\nabla}$ or \mathbf{A} to highlight CC.




- Press ◀ or ► to highlight the desired closed caption mode, as follows:
- To view captions, highlight C1, C2, C3, or C4 (C1 displays translation of the primary language in your area).

Note: If the program or video you selected is not closed captioned, no captions will display on the screen.




• To view text, highlight T1, T2, T3, or T4.

Note: If text is not available in your area, a black rectangle may appear on your screen. If this happens, turn the Closed Caption feature OFF.



To turn off the Closed Caption feature: Highlight OFF in step 4.


Connecting

To set the sleep timer to turn the TV off automatically:



Setting the clock

To set the clock:

- 3. After the number position starts to blink, press the Number buttons (0-9) to enter the correct time. The clock operates on a 12-hour cycle.
- 4. Press ENTER to start the clock.



To display the time on-screen: Press RECALL.

Muting the sound

Press MUTE to temporarily turn off the sound. While the sound is off, the screen will display the word "1/2 MUTE" or "MUTE" in the lower right corner. Every time you press the button, the mute mode will change in the following order.

When you select "MUTE" mode, the closed caption feature is automatically activated. To deactivate this feature, press MUTE again. This feature works only when the closed caption mode is set to OFF. See "Using the closed caption feature" on page 38 for more information.

Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts


The multi-channel TV sound (MTS) feature allows you to listen to high-fidelity stereo sound while watching TV. MTS can also transmit a second audio program (SAP) containing a second language, music, or other audio information (when provided by individual stations).

When the TV receives a stereo or SAP broadcast, the word STEREO or SAP appears on-screen every time the TV is turned on, the channel is changed, or the RECALL button is pressed.

The MTS feature is not available when the TV is in VIDEO mode.

To listen to stereo sound:


- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight MTS.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to highlight STEREO.




You can leave your TV in STEREO mode because it will automatically output the type of sound being broadcast (stereo or monaural). The word "STEREO" or "SAP" displays in yellow in the menu when the TV receives the signal.

If the stereo sound is noisy, select MONO to reduce the noise. To listen to SAP (if available):

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ► until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight MTS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ► to highlight SAP. You will hear the station's second audio program (if available) from the speakers, while viewing the original program's picture (see note at right).





Note :

A second audio program (SAP) can be heard only on those TV stations that offer it.

For example, a station might broadcast music as a second audio program. If you have SAP on, you will see the current program on the screen but hear music instead of the program's normal audio.


However, if you have SAP on, and the station you are watching is not currently broadcasting a second audio program, you will see the picture but not hear any sound. If this happens, put the TV in STEREO mode so you can hear the station's normal audio.

Using the SRS 3D surround sound feature

The SRS 3D surround sound feature expands the audio listening field wider and deeper to create exceptional sound quality from the TV's speakers. The feature uses stereo signals from a TV broadcast or video input.

To turn on the SRS 3D surround:

- 1. Select STEREO mode (see "Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts" on page 40).
- 2. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ► until the THEATER menu appears.
- 3. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight SRS 3D.
- 4. Press \blacktriangleleft or \triangleright to highlight ON.



To turn off the SRS 3D surround:

Highlight OFF in step 4 above.

In general, you can leave your TV in ON mode because it will automatically produce the type of sound being broadcast (surround stereo or monaural).


Adjusting the sound quality

You can change the quality of your TV's sound by adjusting the bass, treble, and balance.

To adjust the sound quality:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight the item you want to adjust.





Resetting audio adjustments

The RESET function returns the audio adjustments to the following factory settings:

To reset the audio adjustments:

Using the sub-bass system (SBS)

The sub-bass system allows you to enhance bass performance, even when the sound volume is low.






The SBS signal does not pass through the "Variable Audio OUT" jacks (see "Connecting an audio system" on page 11); however, the AUDIO menu will appear when the buttons are pressed.

Turning off the built-in speakers

Use this feature to turn the TV speakers off when you connect an audio system (see "Connecting an audio system" on page 11).

To turn off the built-in speakers:

- 1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ until AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight SPEAKERS.

To turn on the built-in speakers:

Highlight ON in step 3 above.

Selecting the Audio OUT sound

This feature allows you to select the sound source (MAIN or PIP) that is output from the Audio OUT jacks.


This is useful when amplifying or recording the PIP/double-window sound with external equipment while hearing the sound of the main picture through the built-in speakers.

To select the Audio OUT sound:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight AUDIO OUT.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to select MAIN or PIP.






Using the TV's Features

Viewing the demonstration mode

When you press DEMO on the TV, the TV will automatically demonstrate several of your TV's features. This function is provided for demonstration purposes only.

To stop the demonstration mode:

Press DEMO again.

Understanding the auto power off feature

The TV will automatically turn itself off after approximately 15 minutes if it is tuned to a vacant channel or if a station completes its broadcast for the day and stops broadcasting on that channel. This feature, however, does not work in the VIDEO mode.

Understanding the last mode memory feature

If the power is cut off while you are viewing the TV and the power is resupplied, the last mode memory feature will turn the TV on automatically.

If the power is going to be off for a long time or you are going to be away from home for a long time, remove the power plug from the wall outlet to prevent the TV from turning on in your absence.
