Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the U.S. Government. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.
The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC is $1.6 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{kg}$.*
Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions specified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands.
Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value.

This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.
Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified by the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government-adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model.

Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon availability of accessories and FCC requirements. While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for safe exposure.
The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF emission guidelines. SAR information on this model phone is on file with the FCC and can be found under the Display Grant section

## Optimize your phone's performance

Use the guidelines in this guide to learn how to optimize the performance and life of your phone and battery.

## Air bags

If you have an air bag, DO NOT place installed or portable phone equipment or other objects over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If equipment is not properly installed, you and your passengers risk serious injury.

## Medical devices

Pacemakers-Warning to pacemaker wearers: Wireless phones, when in the 'on' position, have been shown to interfere with pacemakers. The phone should be kept at least six (6) inches away from the pacemaker to reduce risk.
The Health Industry Manufacturers Association and the wireless technology research community recommend that you follow these guidelines to minimize the potential for interference.

- Always keep the phone at least six inches ( 15 centimeters) away from your pacemaker when the phone is turned on.
- Do not carry your phone near your heart.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker.
- If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, turn off your phone immediately.
Hearing aids-Some digital wireless phones may interfere with hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult Virgin Mobile or call the customer service line to discuss alternatives.
Other medical devices-If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of the device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to help you obtain this information.
In health care facilities-Turn your phone off in health care facilities when instructed. Hospitals and health care facilities may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.


## Potentially unsafe areas

Posted facilities-Turn your phone off in any facility when posted notices require you to do so.
Aircraft-FCC regulations prohibit using your phone on a plane that is in the air. Turn your phone off before boarding aircraft.

Vehicles—RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer of the device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your auto manufacturer may be able to help you obtain this information.
Blasting areas-Turn off your phone where blasting is in progress. Observe restrictions, and follow any regulations or rules.
Potentially explosive atmospheres-Turn off your phone when you are in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire, resulting in bodily injury or death.Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, clearly marked.
They include:

- fueling areas such as gas stations
- below deck on boats
- transfer or storage facilities for fuel or chemicals
- vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas, such as propane or butane
- areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders
- any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine


## Use with care

Use only in normal position (to ear). Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on the phone.

## Keep phone dry

Keep the phone dry. Damage can result if the phone gets wet. Water damage is not covered under warranty.

## Resetting the phone

If the screen seems frozen and the keypad does not respond to keypresses, reset the phone by completing the following steps:

1. Remove the battery door.
2. Remove and replace the battery.

If the problem persists, return the phone to the dealer for service.

## Accessories

Use only Kyocera-approved accessories with Kyocera phones. Use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and will invalidate the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

## Radio Frequency (RF) energy

Your telephone is a radio transmitter and receiver. When it is on, it receives and sends out RF energy. Virgin Mobile's network controls the power of the RF signal. This power level can range from 0.006 to 0.6 watts. In August 1996, the U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted RF exposure guidelines with safety levels for hand-held wireless phones. These guidelines are consistent with the safety standards previously set by both U.S. and international standards bodies in the following reports:

- ANSI C95.1 (American National Standards Institute, 1992)
- NCRP Report 86 (National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements, 1986)
- ICNIRP (International Commission on NonIonizing Radiation Protection, 1996)
Your phone complies with the standards set by these reports and the FCC guidelines.


## E911 mandates

Where service is available, this handset complies with the Phase I and Phase II E911 Mandates issued by the FCC.

## Hearing Aid Compatibility (HAC) features

This Virgin Mobile phone has received a HAC performance rating (designated by the letter M followed by a number). The rating for this phone is identified on the outside of this phone's original packaging. While there is no guarantee, digital wireless phones that receive a minimum of an M3 rating should provide acceptable performance with most hearing aids. Hearing loss and hearing aids are highly individualized, however, so optimal performance cannot be guaranteed. Other factors, such as type of hearing aid device or degree of hearing loss, also can affect a phone's performance for a particular user.

## Hearing aids and wireless phones

A hearing aid uses a microphone to collect and convert sound waves to electrical signals. The hearing aid then amplifies and converts the electrical signals back to audible sounds for the hearing aid user to hear. Radio Frequency (RF) emissions generated by digital wireless phones often interfere with the operation of a hearing aid's microphone, distorting the amplified audible sound. In addition, hearing aid microphones tend to collect ambient noise and amplify these sounds, interfering with the desired audio transmission.

## ANSI standard

To diminish interference between wireless phones and hearing aids, the FCC requires wireless carriers to offer phones that meet the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard for reduced RF emissions. Wireless phones that comply with the FCC's hearing aidcompatibility (HAC) regulations must receive a minimum rating of " M 3 " for RF emissions under the ANSI C63.19 standard. The "M" rating refers to the phone's RF emissions level for use with hearing aids operating in the microphone setting.

The higher the phone's " M " rating, the more likely the phone is compatible with a hearing aid operating in the microphone setting. Hearing aids also have ratings similar to wireless phones. Most newer hearing aid models receive at least an M 2 rating.
To determine the level of compatibility between your hearing aid and this Virgin Mobile HACcertified phone, combine the $M$ rating of your hearing aid and the M rating of this phone. For example, if you pair an M3 hearing aid with an M4 phone, you will achieve a combined rating of 7 .

- Any combined rating equal to or greater than 6 provides excellent performance.
- Any combined rating equal to 5 offers good performance.
- Any combined rating equal to 4 offers acceptable performance.
T-Ratings-Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.)
Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you choose the proper rating for your mobile phone. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.

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## 1 Getting started

## Phone battery

## Installing the battery

To install the battery:

1. Hold the phone face down and locate the screw on the back cover.
2. Turn the screw to set the screw slot in vertical position to unlock the back cover.
3. Locate the groove on the left side of the phone and unsnap the hooks to remove the back cover.
4. Place the battery in the phone casing with the metal contacts of the battery touching those of the phone.
5. Replace the back cover by sliding the notches into the opening on the left side.
6. Snap the back panel into place.
7. Set the screw slot in horizontal position to lock the back cover.
Note: To remove the battery,
 make sure the phone is powered off.

## Charging the battery

You must have at least a partial charge in the battery to make or receive calls.
To charge the battery: Connect the AC adapter to the jack on the bottom of the phone. Do not force the AC adapter into the jack. Plug the
 adapter into a wall outlet.
The battery icon in the upper-right corner of the screen tells you whether the phone is:

- Charging (animated icon)
- Partially charged $\boldsymbol{\pi}$
- Fully charged $\boldsymbol{Z Z}$

Warning: The battery does not charge if you use the phone while it is connected to an AC adapter.

## Recharging the battery

You can safely recharge the battery at any time, even if it has a partial charge.

## Caring for the battery

## General safety guidelines

- Do not disassemble or open the battery.
- Do not crush, bend, deform, puncture, or shred the battery.
- Do not attempt to insert foreign objects into the battery.
- Do not immerse the battery or expose it to water or other liquids. Even if a battery appears to dry out and operate normally, internal parts can slowly corrode and pose a safety hazard.
- Always keep the battery between $15^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ and $25^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ ( $59^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ and $77^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ ). Do not expose the battery to extremes of temperature, fire, or other hazards such as a cooking surface, iron, or radiator.
- Never use any damaged battery.
- Only use the battery for its intended phone.
- Only use the battery with a qualified charger. Use of an unqualified battery charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard. If you are unsure about whether a charger is qualified, contact customer support.
- Do not short-circuit the battery or allow metallic conductive objects-such as keys, coins, or jewelry-to contact the battery's terminals.
- Replace the battery only with another qualified battery. Use of an unqualified battery may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard. If you are unsure about whether a replacement battery is compatible, contact customer support.
- Promptly dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations and recycle if possible. Do not dispose as household waste.
- Supervise all battery usage by children.
- Avoid dropping the phone or battery. If the phone or battery is dropped, especially on a hard surface, an internal short-circuit can occur and pose a safety hazard. If you suspect battery damage, take it to a service center for inspection.
- Improper battery use may result in fire, explosion, or other hazard.


## Common causes of battery drain

- Playing games or using the Web.
- Keeping backlighting on.
- Taking pictures with the flash on.
- Operating in digital mode when far away from a base station or cell site.
- Using data cables or accessories.
- Operating when no service is available, or service is available intermittently.
- High earpiece and ringtone volume settings.
- Repeating sound, vibration, or lighted alerts.
- Extensive use of flashlight option.

## Finding your phone's serial number

To activate your Virgin Mobile account, you need your phone's serial number. To locate the number:

1. Turn your phone off.
2. Hold your phone face down.
3. Unlock the back cover.
4. Locate the groove on the left side of the phone. Unsnap the hooks and remove the back cover.
5. Remove the battery by pulling back on the top edge of the battery.
6. Your phone's serial number is an 18 -digit number located below the first barcode, next to the D.
7. Write down the serial number.

Note: With your phone turned on, you can also
select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Phone info $>$
Build info to find your phone's ID number.

## Phone activation

## Activating your Virgin Mobile account

Before you can start talking, messaging, or downloading, you need to activate service with Virgin Mobile. To activate your Virgin Mobile account, do one of the following with your phone's serial number.

- Go to www.virginmobileusa.com and click on Activate.
- Call Virgin Mobile At Your Service at 1-888-322-1122.


## Programming your phone

Once your account is activated, you need to program your Virgin Mobile phone number into your phone. When you are ready, follow these steps to program your phone:

1. Turn on your phone. Program your phone using the external number keypad. DO NOT use the internal QWERTY keyboard.
2. Dial \#\#VIRGIN\# (that's \#-\#-8-4-7-4-4-6-\#).
3. You are now in the Programming menu. Scroll down to "Activate Phone" and hit "OK".
4. Your screen will say, "Do you want to activate your phone now ?" Select "Yes".
5. Your phone will connect to the network, and then the screen will say "Hi. Press Start to continue the activation process". Scroll down to "Start" and hit "OK".
6. Your phone will say "We're getting your phone number for you," then your phone will display your new Virgin Mobile phone number. Write it down.
7. Scroll down to "Finish" and hit "OK" to complete the activation process. Your phone will turn off and back on by itself.
It might take a couple of hours to set up the network. Once set up, your phone displays a text message informing that you can start talking. Also, it may take up to 4 hours for VirginXL, Voicemail, and Top-Up features to come online.

## Phone overview

## Getting to know your phone

The phone has two keypads-the number keypad and the QWERTY keypad.

## Number keypad

1. External screen.
2. External Camera key activates picture mode.
3. Volume key to raise or lower speaker volume.
4. Navigation key scrolls through lists and text entry fields and accesses shortcuts from the main screen.
5. Left option button accesses menus and functions.
6. Speakerphone key activates the speakerphone and answers incoming calls.
7. Send/Talk key starts or answers a call. Press once to activate voice command, twice to display the All Calls list, and three times to redial the last number dialed. Press and hold to access voice dial.
8. External number keypad for entering numbers, letters, or symbols.
9.     * Shift key changes the text mode in text entry.
10. Jack for AC adapter (included) and data cable (sold separately).

11. External speaker.
12. Indicator light shows missed alert when in red or incoming call when in green.
13. OK key selects a menu item or option.
14. Right option button accesses the contacts list and other menu options.
15. Back key erases characters in text entry and returns you to the previous screen.
16. End/Power key turns the phone on and off, ends a call or browser session, and returns you to the main screen.
17. \# Space key enters a space during text entry. Press and hold to activate or deactivate Silent mode.
18. Jack for hands-free headset only (sold separately).
19. 0 Next key cycles through word choices during text entry.
Warning: Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack damages the phone.


## QWERTY keypad

When the flip is open, use the QWERTY keypad to enter numbers, letters and symbols.

1. Internal screen.
2. Internal speaker.
3. Navigation key scrolls through lists and text entry fields and accesses shortcuts from the main screen.
4. Left option button accesses menus and functions.
5. Send/Talk key starts or answers a call. Press once to activate voice command, twice to display the All Calls list, and three times to redial the last number dialed. Press and hold to
 access voice dial.
6. Internal Camera key activates picture mode.
7. Custom menu key accesses the custom menu.
8. Symbol key allows you to type symbol characters.
9. Shift key changes the text mode in text entry.
10. Space key enters a space during text entry.
11. OK key selects a menu item or option.
12. Right option button accesses the contacts list and other menu options.
13. End/Power key turns the phone on and off, ends a call or browser session, and returns you to the main screen.
14. Speakerphone key activates the speakerphone and answers incoming calls.
15. Back key erases characters in text entry and returns you to the previous screen.
16. Enter key allows you to enter hard returns.

## Back cover

1. Accessory eyelet (for optional straps and lanyards).
2. Camera flash and flash light.
3. Camera lens.
4. Back cover lock in unlocked status (If locked, the screw slot is in horizontal position).

## Basic navigation

You press your phone keys to access the various menus and other features of your phone. Some of the basic frequently used keys are as follows:

- Left option button: Select items that appear on the lower left of the display. At the main screen, you can select Menu.
- Right option button: Select items that appear on the lower right of the display. At the main screen, you can select Contacts.
- Navigation key: Scroll through menus and options. You can access the following shortcuts from the main screen.
- Scroll left to launch VirginXL.
- Scroll right to access Send text msg.
- Scroll up to access My Account.
- Scroll down to view Recent calls.
- OK key: Select a menu item.
- Back key: Return to the previous menu level.
- End/Power key: Return to the main screen.


## Guide conventions

In this guide the following conventions are used when describing phone features.
Select means to press the left or right option button, or the $\mathbf{O K}$ key to select an item on the display. For example, "select Menu" tells you to press the left option button at the main screen to access the main menu.
Press means to press a phone key. For example, "press the Send key to make a phone call" tells you to press the Send key on your phone.
Scroll means to press the Navigation key to move though a list on the display. For example, "scroll through your contacts list to choose a contact" means to press the Navigation key up or down to scroll through the list on the display.
The greater than symbol " $>$ " tells you to select an option from a menu or list. For example, Menu > Settings means to:

1. Press the left option button at the main screen to select Menu.
2. Scroll to the Settings option.
3. Press the $\mathbf{O K}$ key to select Settings.

## 2 Basic functions

This section explains the basic functionality of your phone. For more detailed explanation of your phone's features please refer to the later chapters.

## Powering up

To turn your phone on, press and hold the End key and wait until the phone display lights up. To turn your phone off, press and hold the End key until the phone turns off.

## Making phone calls

Make sure you are in an area where a signal can be received. Look for the signal strength icon on the main screen. The more bars you see in this symbol, the stronger the signal. If there are no bars, move to where the signal strength is better. When the phone has been idle for a while with no signal, it changes to power save mode. When you see "Power Save" on your phone's screen, press any key to return to normal operating mode. You can make a phone call in one of the following ways.

## Call using a number

At the main screen:

1. Enter a phone number.
2. Press the Send key.

## Call using a contact

At the main screen:

1. Select Contacts to open your contacts list.
2. Highlight a contact and press the Send key.

## Call using voice commands

You can use voice commands to call a contact from your voice dial list or to dial a phone number. For more information, see "Voice recognition" on page 63.

## Redial a number

At the main screen:

1. Press the Send key twice to open your call history.
2. Highlight a phone number or contact and press the Send key.
Tip: To redial the last number called, received or missed, press the Send key three times.

## Answering phone calls

When a call comes in, the phone rings, vibrates, or lights up. The phone number of the caller also appears if it is not restricted. If the number is stored in your contacts list, the contact name appears.
You can answer a phone call in one of the following ways.

## Answer using earpiece

Press the Send key.

## Answer using speakerphone

Press the Speakerphone key.

## Answer using flip

You can set the phone to answer immediately when you open the flip. This feature does not apply to incoming data or fax calls.

## Ending phone calls

Press the End key.

## Verifying your phone number

To verify your phone number, select Menu > Settings $>$ Phone info $>$ Build info.

## Activating voice dialing

At the main screen:

1. Press the Send key once.
2. Follow the prompts.

## Taking a picture

At the main screen:

1. Press and hold the Camera key to start the camera.
2. Focus on the image and select Capture.

## Using custom menu

You can use the custom menu to quickly access your frequently used functions.

1. With the QWERTY keypad, press the Custom menu key to access the custom menu.
2. Select Edit.
3. Scroll through the list of options and press $\mathbf{O K}$ to select your desired option(s). A check mark appears next to each selected option. (You can press $\mathbf{O K}$ again to remove check marks.)
4. Select Save after checking all your desired option(s). Your selected options appear in the custom menu.
5. Scroll through the list of your selected functions in the custom menu and press $\mathbf{O K}$ to access your desired one.

## 3 Call features

This chapter describes call features such as volume, holding calls, speed dialing and other features.

## Volume control

You have several ways to control the volume of your phone.

## Adjust volume during a call

To adjust the earpiece volume during a call, press the Volume key up or down.

## Use the speakerphone

Your phone has a built-in speakerphone. To turn on the speakerphone, press the Speakerphone key. The speakerphone icon appears on the main screen when the speakerphone is on. To turn off the speakerphone, press the Speakerphone key.
Note: If you press the Speakerphone key during an incoming call, you answer the call.

## Silence an incoming call

To silence the phone without answering the call, press the End key or select Silence.
To silence the phone and answer the call, press the End key and then press the Send key.
Note: In the absence of voicemail, this feature drops the call.

## Hold calls

The Hold call feature allows you to place incoming calls on hold until you are ready to answer them. See "Hold call" on page 52.

## Speed dial

Use the speed dial feature to assign a one- or twodigit shortcut to a contact. Before you can use speed dialing, you must save a phone number as a contact and assign a speed dial location to it. See "Contact number" on page 31.
To call a contact that has a speed dial location.

1. Enter the one- or two-digit speed dial location.
2. Press the Send key.

## 1-Touch dialing

The 1 -touch dialing feature is the fastest way to speed dial a contact that has a speed dial location.
See "1-Touch dialing" on page 52.

## Voicemail

## Configure your voicemail

Before your phone can receive voicemail messages, you must set up a 4-10 digit passcode and record a personal voicemail greeting.

When you have set up your voicemail, all unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off.

1. Press and hold the $\mathbf{1}$ key.
2. Follow the system prompts to create a password and record a greeting.

## Check voicemail

When a voice message is received, your screen displays "New Messages" along with the symbol at the top of your screen. The symbol flashes if the message is urgent. Standard airtime charges apply.
If you see "New Messages":

1. Select Call, which initiates a call to your voicemail number.
2. Follow the system prompts to retrieve the message.
Note: To clear the screen without checking messages, select Ignore.
If you see only the voicemail message icon:
3. Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Voicemail.
4. If you have set up your voicemail, select Call, to call your voicemail number.
5. Follow the system prompts to retrieve the message.

## Set voicemail alert

You can set the phone to beep or vibrate every five minutes to remind you that you have voicemail. See "Other alerts" on page 49.

## Emergency services

## Call emergency service

You can call an emergency code, even if your phone is locked or your account is restricted. When you call, your phone enters Emergency mode. This enables the emergency service exclusive access to your phone to call you back, if necessary. To make or receive regular calls after dialing the code, you must exit this mode.
To dial an emergency code:

1. Enter your 3-digit emergency code.
2. Press the Send key.

Note: Regardless of your 3-digit emergency code ( $911,111,999,000$, etc.), your phone operates as described.

## Exit emergency services

When you have completed the emergency call:

1. Select Exit.
2. Select Exit again to confirm your choice.

Note: To determine who has access to your location, see "Location" on page 56.

You can enter letters, numbers, and symbols in contacts, text messages, and your banner with either QWERTY keypad (flip open) or the number keypad (flip closed).

## QWERTY keypad

## Text entry modes

With the flip open, enter text with the QWERTY keypad. The current text entry mode (and capitalization setting, when applicable) are indicated by icons.
The text entry screen has the following features:

1. The number of remaining characters you can enter. Allowed length of messages can
 vary depending on your service.
2. Text entry fields.
3. Current capitalization setting.
4. Current text entry mode.

There are six text entry modes:

| (A) Case change | $1 @$ | Numbers and symbols |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| $a_{b C}$ Normal alpha | $\& ?$ Add symbol |  |
| $e Z i$ Rapid entry | and | Add smiley |

Note: The mode you start in depends on the task you are doing. For example, when entering a phone number, you are in Numbers and symbols mode. When entering a name for a contact, you are in Normal alpha mode.

## Enter numbers and symbols

- To enter a number or symbol while in Numbers and symbols mode, press the appropriate key once.
- To enter a letter while in Numbers and symbols mode, press the Symbol key once, then press the appropriate key.
- To change to and from Numbers and symbols mode, press the Symbol key twice.


## Enter word letter by letter

1. To enter text while in Normal alpha mode, press the appropriate key once.
2. To enter a number or symbol while in Normal alpha mode, press the Symbol key once, then press the appropriate key.
3. To change to and from Normal alpha mode, press the Symbol key twice.

## Enter symbols

While entering text, you can enter many symbols with the keypad. To access extra symbols:

1. From the text entry screen select Options > Add symbol.
2. Scroll up or down to view the list of symbols.
3. Press the number key corresponding to the symbol to enter it.

## Enter smileys

1. From the text entry screen select Options > Add smiley.
2. Scroll up or down to view the list of smileys.
3. Press the number key corresponding to the smiley to enter it.

## Change default text entry mode

You can change the default text entry mode when creating a text message. This setting applies only to the message body screen, not the "To" screen.
Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Msg settings $>$
Text entry and one of the following:

- Normal alpha enter text in letter by letter.
- Rapid mode enter text with word recognition.


## Change modes

Sometimes you need to change modes. For example, to enter numbers in an email address while in Normal alpha mode, you must change to Numbers and symbols mode, enter the numbers, and then change back to Normal alpha mode to complete the address.
To change text entry modes, press the Symbol key twice, until the icon for the mode you want appears at the top of the screen. You can also select Options and a different mode.

## Capitalization

You can change capitalization at any time while entering text. Press the Shift key while in Normal alpha mode.

## Text entry quick reference

This table gives instructions for entering letters, numbers, and symbols.

## Number keypad

## Text entry modes

When the flip is closed, enter text with the number keypad. The current text entry mode (and capitalization setting, when applicable) are indicated by icons.
The text entry screen has the following features:

1. The number of remaining characters you can enter. Allowed length of messages can vary depending on your service.

2. Text entry fields.
3. Current capitalization setting.
4. Current text entry mode.

There are six text entry modes:

| (A) | Case change | ${ }^{1 @}$ | Numbers only |
| :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: |
| $a b c$ | Normal alpha | \&?! | Add symbol |
| $e Z i$ | Rapid entry | L | Add smiley |

Note: The mode you start in depends on the task you are doing. For example, when entering a phone number, you're in Numbers only mode. When entering a name for a contact, you're in Normal alpha mode.

## Enter numbers

- To enter a number while in Numbers only mode, press a number key once.
- To enter a number while in Normal alpha or Rapid mode, press and hold a number key until the number appears on the screen.


## Enter words letter by letter

1. Press a key once for the first letter, twice for the second letter, and so on.
2. Wait for the cursor to move right and enter the next letter.

Note: To enter a space, press the \# Space key.

## Enter words quickly

When you press a series of keys using Rapid mode, your phone checks its dictionary and guesses at the word you are trying to spell.

1. For each letter of the word you want, press the key once. For example, to enter the word "any" press the $\mathbf{2}>\mathbf{6}>\mathbf{9}$ keys.
2. If the word doesn't match what you want, press the $\mathbf{0}$ Next key to check other word matches.
3. When you see the word you want, press the \# Space key.

## Enter symbols

While entering text in normal text mode, you can enter symbols by pressing the $\mathbf{1}$ key until you see the symbol you want. Using this method, you have access to the following symbols:

To access the full set of symbols:

1. From the text entry screen select 0ptions > Add symbol.
2. Scroll up or down to view the list of symbols.
3. Press the number key corresponding to the symbol to enter it.

## Enter smileys

1. From the text entry screen select Options > Add smiley.
2. Scroll up or down to view the list of smileys.
3. Press the number key corresponding to the smiley to enter it.

## Change default text entry mode

You can change the default text entry mode when creating a text message. This setting applies only to the message body screen, not the "To" screen.
Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Msg settings $>$
Text entry and one of the following:

- Normal alpha to enter text in letter by letter.
- Rapid mode to enter text with word recognition.


## Change modes

Sometimes you need to change modes. For example, to enter numbers in an email address while in Normal alpha mode, you must change to Numbers only mode, enter the numbers, and then change back to Normal alpha mode to complete the address.

To change text entry modes, press and hold the * Shift key until the icon for the mode you want appears at the top of the screen. You can also select Options and a different mode.

## Capitalization

You can change capitalization at any time while entering text. Simply press to choose upper or lower case while in Normal alpha mode.

## 5 Messaging

This chapter describes how to send, receive, and erase messages from your phone. For information on voicemail messages, see "Voicemail" on page 14.
Note: The features and menus described in this chapter may vary depending on services available in your area. Visit www.virginmobileusa.com for details and possible usage charges.

## Text messages

You can send text messages to phones that are capable of receiving them or to email addresses. Text messages have a 160 character limitation including spaces. Charges apply for the use of these features. See www.virginmobileusa.com for pricing.

## Send a text message

1. At the main screen, scroll right or select Menu > Messaging > Send text msg.
2. At the Send To field, do one of the following to enter the recipient's phone number or email address:

- Select Options > Recent list, Recent calls, Contacts or Groups to access your stored contacts.
- Enter the phone number or email address manually. See "Text entry" on page 16 .

You can message up to ten recipients at once. Use a comma or spaces to separate addresses. If you select stored contacts, this is done automatically. Scroll down to move to the next field when done.
Note: The messages are sent one at a time, once to each recipient. Standard text messaging charges apply for each recipient.
3. At the Message field, enter the message.
4. Select Send.

## Include auto text and symbols

During text entry, you can insert prewritten text (auto text), symbols or smileys.

1. From the text entry screen, select Options and one of the following.

- Insert auto text to insert prewritten text from a list.
- Add symbol to insert symbols. Press the corresponding number to select a symbol.
- Add smiley to insert smileys. Press the corresponding number to select a smiley.

2. Complete your message.
3. Select Send.

## Use text message options

When you are ready to send a text message, you have several options for how and when you want it received.

1. After composing your message, select Options and one of the following:

- Add address returns you to Send To field to add another recipient.
- Save message saves the messages in your Drafts folder. This prevents the message from being deleted if you activate Auto-erase.
- Save as auto text saves the message you composed as a prewritten message.

2. After setting options, press the Back key to return to the message window.
3. Complete your message.
4. Select Send.

## Retrieve a text message

When a text message is received, your phone displays a notification and the message icon appears at the top of your screen. The message icon flashes if the message is urgent. Urgent messages are also marked in the Inbox.

## Message notifications

If you see a message notification, select Inbox to view messages. Choose a message and select View to open it. To clear a message notification, select Ignore.

## Message icons

If you see the message icon, select Menu >
Messaging > Inbox. Choose a message and select View to open it.

## View a text message

The options available when viewing a text message may vary. For more information, visit www.virginmobileusa.com.

1. Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Inbox.
2. Select a message to view. If the message is long, scroll down to view the entire message.
3. Select Reply to create a response message or Options and one of the following:

- Erase erases the message.
- Lock msg protects the message from the accidentally deleted.
- Forward forwards the message.
- Reply with copy replies to the message with a copy of the original attached.
- Save message saves the message.
- Save as auto text saves the message text as auto text, which you can insert into other messages. Graphics and sounds are not saved.
- Sender displays the sender information.

Note: If a graphic is too large or incorrectly formatted, and is not received with the message, an icon appears.

## Picture messages

You can send picture messages to phones that are capable of receiving them or to email addresses. Picture messages have a predetermined character and file size limit. Charges apply for the use of these features. See www.virginmobileusa.com for pricing.

## Send a picture message

1. Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Send pic msg.
2. With any picture stored in My pictures, select your desired image to attach to the message.
3. At the To, CC (to send a copy of the message), and BCC (to send a blind copy) fields, do one of the following to enter the recipient's phone number or email address. Scroll down to move to the next field when done.

- Select Options > Recent List, Recent calls, Contacts, or Groups to access your stored contacts.
- Enter the phone number or email address manually. See "Text entry" on page 16 .
Note: You can message up to ten recipients at once. Use a comma or spaces to separate addresses. (If you select stored contacts, your phone does this automatically.)

4. At the Subject field, enter a subject. Scroll down to move to the next field when done.
5. At the Text field, enter a message. Scroll down to move to the next field when done.
6. At the Image field, you can attach or reattach an image file. Select Options and one of the following:

- Take a picture to instantly take a photo and attach it.
- My graphics to attach an existing file from your My pictures or other image folders.
Scroll down to move to the next field when done.

7. At the Sound field, select Options and one of the following to attach a file:

- Record sound to instantly record a sound and attach it.
- My sounds to attach an existing file from your Saved sounds or Voice memos folders.

8. Select Send.

## Use picture message options

When you are ready to send a picture message, you have several options for how and when you want it to be received.

1. While composing your message, select Options and one of the following:

- Auto text adds prewritten text to your message.
- Save as auto text saves your message as prewritten text.
- Preview message plays your message.
- Save message saves the message to the draft folder.
- Add address adds additional recipients to your message.

2. After setting options, press the Back key to return to the message window if necessary.
3. Complete your message.
4. Select Send.

## Receive a picture message

When receiving a picture message, your phone does not automatically download it. A notification appears when a new message is available for download. Charges apply for the use of these features, see www.virginmobileusa.com for pricing.
Select one of the following:

- Yes downloads and opens the message.
- Erase deletes the message.
- Retrieve Later sends the message to the Inbox for you to download and view later.
Note: If a picture message is received during a call, the phone displays a notification after the call ends.


## View a picture message

With a picture message received, the message icon appears at the top of your screen. The message icon flashes if the message is urgent. All notifications or messages are stored in the Inbox.

1. Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Inbox.
2. Select a message to view. If the message is long, scroll down to view the entire message.
3. Select Reply to create a response message or Options and one of the following:

- The options available to you may vary. Visit www.virginmobileusa.com for more information.
Reply all creates a response message to all recipients.
- Forward forwards the message without showing the original address, graphic, sound, and text fields.
- Erase deletes the message.
- Message info displays the message information (priority, sender, subject, time sent and received, and message size).
- Recipients displays all the addressees present in the "To" and "CC" fields.
- Replay plays the message again from the beginning.
- Mute silences the message.
- Sender displays the sender information.
- Call calls the message sender.
- Save picture saves the picture embedded in the message.
- Save sound saves the sound embedded in the message.
- Save address extracts email addresses, phone numbers, and/or URLs from the sender information and message body.
- Save as auto text saves the text in the message to the auto text list.
- Save message saves the message to the Saved Folder.
- Launch Browser accesses a Web site.


## Email messages

You can send and receive email messages from your phone. Check Virgin Mobile's Web site at www.virginmobileusa.com for availability and pricing.

## Sending email message

Select Menu > Messaging > Send email msg to send an email message.

## Accessing Mobile Email

To launch mobile email, select Menu > My stuff $>$ My other stuff $>$ Mobile Email.

## Instant messages

You can send and receive instant messages (IMs) from your phone. Check Virgin Mobile's Web site at www.virginmobileusa.com for availability and pricing.

## Sending IM message

Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Send IM msg to access IM and send an instant message.

## Accessing Mobile IM

To launch IM, select Menu $>\mathbf{I M}$ or Menu $>$ My stuff $>$ My other stuff $>$ Mobile IM.

## Navigating IM

- Scroll through items and to highlight one.
- Press the $\mathbf{O K}$ key to select an IM menu item or option.
- Press the Back key to go back one screen.

Note: A scroll bar on the right side of the screen indicates that there is more text. Scroll down to go to the next screen of text. Press the Back key to move back one screen.

## Ending IM session

Press the End key from any IM page.

## Erasing messages

It is a good idea to erase old messages to free up memory in your phone. You can erase messages
and pages as you send or read them, erasing them one at a time, or erasing them all at once.

## Erase a single message

1. Select Menu > Messaging > Inbox, Virgin Alerts, Outbox, Saved, or Drafts.
2. Highlight the message you want to erase.
3. Select Erase or Options $>$ Erase depending on your selected folder.
4. At the notification, select Yes to erase the message.

## Erase all messages

Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Erase msgs $>$ Inbox, Outbox, Saved folder, Drafts folder or All messages > Yes.
Note: To erase messages from all folders, select All messages.

## Working with messages

The following are some messaging tips.

## Unable to send messages

You may not be able to send or receive messages if your phone's memory is nearly full, or if digital service is not available at the time. To free up memory, erase old messages. See "Erasing messages" on page 26.

## Receive incoming calls while creating messages

If you receive a call while creating a message, a notification appears. You can do one of the following:

- Select Ignore to return to the message creation screen without answering the call.
- Press the Call key to answer the call and save the created message to the Drafts folder.


## Complete messages in Drafts folder

To continue composing a message in the Drafts folder:

1. Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Drafts.
2. Highlight the message you want to complete.
3. Select Edit.
4. Complete your message.
5. Select Send.

## View sent messages in Outbox folder

To view your sent messages, you must first save them in the Outbox folder.

1. Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Msg settings $>$ Save to outbox.
2. Select one of the following:

- Disabled does not save outgoing messages.
- Prompt allows you to choose whether to save the message when sending it.
- Enabled automatically saves successfully sent messages in the Outbox folder.
After saving the successfully sent messages, select Menu > Messaging > Outbox to view them. Scroll through the list of messages. One of the following indicators appears next to each message:


The scheduled message was sent and delivered as scheduled. You cannot cancel delivery of the message. The message has been received.


The message has never been sent or has not been sent since it was last modified. You can cancel delivery of the message


The message has been sent to more than one recipient.

## View failed or pending messages

Failed or pending messages are stored in your Outbox folder. To view messages in the Outbox folder, select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Outbox.
Your list of failed or pending messages will appear with the following symbols.


The message is pending and will be sent when possible. You can cancel delivery of the message.
X
The message cannot be sent because service is not available. An alert appears on your phone if the message cannot be sent.

## Message settings

Message settings help configure your phones text and picture message settings.

## Alerts

Choose how you want to be alerted of voicemail, pages, or text messages. Select Menu >
Messaging $>$ Msg settings $>$ Alerts $>$ Msg alert, Page alert, or Voicemail alert and select a ringtone from the list. (Scroll through the list to hear the different ringtones.)
You can also select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Msg settings $>$ Alerts $>$ Reminder $>$ On to set the phone to notify you with the selected ringtone every five minutes until you address the alert.

## Auto text

Your phone comes with prewritten (auto text) messages, such as "Please call me," which you can insert into the body of a text message. You can edit these messages or create new ones. Your phone stores up to 30 auto text messages, with up to 100 characters per message.

1. Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Msg settings $>$

Auto text and one of the following:

- Highlight an auto text message and select Edit.
- Select New msg to create a new auto text message.

2. Enter or edit the text.
3. Select Done.

Note: You can also save a message you have written or received as auto text.

## Text entry

You can change the default text entry mode when creating a text message. This setting applies only to the message body screen, not the "To" screen.
Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Msg settings $>$
Text entry and one of the following:

- Normal alpha to enter text in letter by letter.
- Rapid mode to enter text with word recognition.


## Signature

The signature you create is included at the end of all outgoing messages and is counted as characters in your messages; however, it does not appear in the message creation screen.

## 1. Select Menu $>$ Messaging $>$ Msg settings $>$ Signature.

2. Enter your signature in the text field.
3. Select $\mathbf{O K}$ to save the signature.

Note: The characters in the signature are included in the total character count of the message.

## Save to outbox

You can save your outgoing messages. Select
Menu > Messaging > Msg settings >
Save to outbox and one of the following:

- Disabled does not save outgoing messages.
- Prompt allows you to choose whether to save your message when you send it.
- Enabled saves all outgoing messages to the Outbox folder.


## Auto-erase

You can set your phone to erase messages automatically when memory is needed for incoming messages.
Select Menu > Messaging > Msg settings > Auto-erase and one of the following:

- Disabled erases no messages.
- Inbox msgs erases old messages in your Inbox when memory is needed.
- Outbox msgs erases old messages in your Outbox folder when memory is needed.
- Both erases old messages in both your Inbox and Outbox folders when memory is needed.


## 6 Contacts

Use your phone's contacts list to store information about a person or company. Each contact entry can have up to six phone numbers, two email addresses, two Web addresses, two street addresses, and a space for notes.

## Viewing contacts list

To view existing contacts in your phone, open the flip and select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all. Your contacts list is displayed alphabetically.
Tip: You can also select Contacts from the main screen to view the directory.
Scroll to highlight the contact you want and do one of the following:

- Press the Send key to call the highlighted contact.
- Press the OK key to view the highlighted contact's detail.
- Select New to add a new contact.
- Select Options to choose one of the following:
- Call to make a call.
- Send text msg to send a text message.
- Send picture msg to send a picture message.
- View contact to view contact details.
- Edit contact to edit contact details.
- Erase contact to erase the contact.
- Contacts menu to access your contacts.


## Adding contacts

## Add contact from main screen

To add a contact to your contacts list:

1. From the main screen, enter a phone number to save (including the area code).
2. Select Save $>$ Save new contact.
3. Enter a name for the contact. For more information, see "Text entry" on page 16.
4. Enter additional phone numbers, email addresses, Web addresses and note, if needed. Scroll up or down to move through the contact fields.
5. When you are done entering information, select Save.

## Add contact from contacts menu

To add a contact to your contacts list:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ Add new.
2. Enter a name for the contact. When you are done, scroll down to move to the next field. For more information, see "Text entry" on page 16.
3. Enter a primary number for the contact.
4. Enter additional phone numbers, email addresses, IM addresses, Web addresses, Street addresses, and note. Scroll up or down to move through the contact fields.
5. When you are done entering information, select Save.

## Add code or extension

When you save the phone number of an automated service, you may include a pause to stop dialing. For example, a pause where you would wait to dial an extension.

1. From the main screen, enter a phone number.
2. Select Options and a type of pause:

- Time pause causes the phone to stop dialing for two seconds.
- Hard pause causes the phone to stop dialing until you select Release while making the call.

3. Enter the remaining numbers and select Save.
4. Select Save new contact.
5. Complete the contact and select Save.

## Working with contacts

Contact details
To edit details of an existing contact:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, select Edit.
4. Edit or add phone numbers, email addresses, IM addresses, Web addresses, Street addresses, and notes. Scroll up or down to move through the contact fields.
5. When you are done entering information, select Save.

## Contact name

To work on the name of an existing contact:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight the name.
4. Select Options and one of the following:

- Ringer assigns a specific ringtone to the contact.
- Msg alert assigns a message alert ringtone to the contact.
- Picture assigns a specific picture to the contact.
- Erase contact erases the entire contact.


## Contact number

To work on the number of an existing contact:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight a contact number.
4. Select Options and one of the following:

- Call sends a call.
- Send text msg sends a text message.
- Send picture msg sends a picture message.
- Add speed dial adds the number to your speed dial list.
- View number displays the number.
- Erase number erases the number from the contact.
- Secret makes the number secret, hiding it from the screen until you enter the lock code. Secret numbers can be called without a lock code. For more information, see "Lock phone" on page 55.
- Primary number makes this number the primary number for the contact.
- Add to Group adds the number to the business, personal or custom group.
- Add voice dial records a voice tag so you can call a contact using voice recognition.
- Erase voice dial erases the voice tag associated with the number.
- Edit voice dial re-records the voice tag.
- Prepend displays the contact's detail screen for you to change the number (adding an area code) or other data of the contact.


## Contact email address

To access the email address of an existing contact:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight a contact email address.
4. Select Options and one of the following:

- Send Email launches the email application.
- Send text msg sends a text message.
- Send picture msg sends a picture message.
- View address displays the email address.
- Add to Group adds the email address to the business, personal or custom group.
- Erase address erases the email address from the contact.
- Secret makes the address secret, hiding it from the screen until you enter the lock code.


## Contact IM address

To access the IM address of an existing contact:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight a contact IM address.
4. Select Options and one of the following:

- View IM displays the IM address.
- Erase IM erases the IM address from the contact.
- Send IM launches the IM application.


## Contact Web address

To access the Web address of an existing contact:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight a contact Web address.
4. Select Options and one of the following:

- Launch web to go to the Web address.
- View web to view the Web address.
- Erase web to erase the Web address from the contact.
- Secret makes the address secret, hiding it from the screen until you enter the lock code.


## Contact street address

To access the street address of an existing contact:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight a contact street address.
4. Select Options and one of the following:

- View address displays the street address.
- Erase address erases the street address from the contact.
- Secret makes the address secret, hiding it from the screen until you enter the lock code.


## Contact note

To work on the note of an existing contact:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight a note.
4. Select Options and one of the following:

- View note displays the note.
- Erase note erases the note from the contact.
- Secret makes the note secret, hiding it from the screen until you enter the lock code.


## Assign ringtone to contacts

To assign a ringtone:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight the contact name.
4. Select Options $>$ Ringer $>$ Assign ringer.
5. Select a ringtone from the list. (Scroll through the list to hear the different ringtones.)

## Assign message alert to contacts

To assign a message alert ringtone:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight the contact name.
4. Select Options $>$ Msg alert $>$ Assign alert.
5. Select a ringtone from the list. (Scroll through the list to hear the different ringtones.)

## Assign picture to contacts

To assign a picture:

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, highlight the contact name.
4. Select Options $>$ Picture $>$ Assign picture.
5. Scroll through the folders to select one where to get your pictures.
6. Scroll through to select a picture to assign.

Note: With Mobile Phone Tools (MPT) for Kyocera, you can transfer digital pictures to your phone. To purchase MPT or other accessories visit www.kyocera-wireless.com/store.

## Assign number type

When you assign a number type, an icon is placed in front of the contact number to specify the type of number it is.

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ View all.
2. From the contacts list, select a contact.
3. At the contact's detail screen, select Edit.
4. Scroll down twice to highlight the number type dropdown and press the $\mathbf{O K}$ key.
5. Select General, Work, Home, Mobile, Pager or Fax. The appropriate icon appears next to the number in your phone lists.
6. Select Save.

## Using contact groups

You can assign your contacts to groups that share the common ringtone or image. Your phone comes with two default groups, Business and Personal. You can also create your own groups.

## Create groups

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ Groups.
2. Select New.
3. Enter a name for the group and select Next.
4. Add or remove your desired contacts from the list. A check mark appears next to each selection.
5. After selecting all your desired contacts, select Done.
Your new group appears the next time you view your groups.

## Use a group

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ Groups.
2. Scroll to your desired group in the Groups list.
3. Select Options and one of the following:

- View displays the group details.
- Edit edits the group.
- Erase deletes the group.
- Send text msg sends the group a text message.
- Send picture msg sends the group a multimedia message.


## Customize a group

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ Groups.
2. Select a group from the Groups list.
3. Select Options and one of the following:

- Ringer assigns a ringer to the group.
- Msg alert assigns a message alert ringtone to the group.
- Picture assigns a picture to the group.
- Erase deletes the group.
- Edit edits the group.

Note: Since Business and Personal are predefined groups, you cannot erase any of them.

## Searching contacts

To find a phone number or contact, you can search the contacts list, use the Fast find, or check the Frequent list. See "Fast find" on page 51 and "Frequent list" on page 51.
To search your contacts list, select Menu > Contacts $>$ View all, Find name, Groups, Speed dial list or Voice dial list.
You can also use the Contacts shortcut from the main screen to view the contacts list. To quickly get down the list, enter the first letter of the contact. You skip to that letter of the alphabet.

## Accessing VirginXL

With VirginXL, you can access music, entertainment, and information services from your phone. Download games, ringtones, wallpapers, screen savers, and other content; surf the web; and more. Check Virgin Mobile's Web site at www.virginmobileusa.com for availability and pricing, or check directly from your phone using VirginXL. Charges apply.
To launch VirginXL, from the main screen, scroll left or select Menu > VirginXL.
Note: You cannot receive incoming calls during a VirginXL session. All incoming calls are automatically sent to your voicemail.

## Navigating VirginXL

- Scroll through items and to highlight one.
- Press the OK key to select a VirginXL menu item or option.
- Press the Back key to go back one screen.

Note: A scroll bar on the right side of the screen indicates that there is more text. Scroll down to go to the next screen of text. Press the Back key to move back one screen.

## Ending a VirginXL session

Press the End key from any VirginXL page.

You can manage your Virgin Mobile account directly from your phone. The basic tasks are summarized in this chapter. For more information about your account, go to www.virginmobileusa.com.

## Checking your account balance

You can check your Virgin Mobile account status in one of two ways:

- From the main screen, scroll up.
- Select Menu > My Account.

Your account information appears with Top-Up information relative to your selected plan. When your account is low or empty, you receive a notification to Top-Up.

## Top-Up your account

Top-Up is how you add money to your Virgin Mobile account. You can Top-Up your Virgin Mobile account right from your phone. First, buy a Top-Up card at the thousands of retailers that carry them or register your debit card, credit card, or PayPal account at www.virginmobileusa.com.
When your balance is low, you can Top-Up your account from your phone.

Note: Additional charges may apply for multiple balance checks in one day. Visit www.virginmobileusa.com for more details.

## Top-Up with a Top-Up Card

1. From the main screen, select Menu > My Account.
2. Scroll down to the Top-Up link and press the OK key.
3. Enter your Account Pin (vKey) and press the OK key to login.
4. Scroll down to select Login and press the OK key.
5. Enter your Top-Up card's PIN number and press the OK key.
6. Scroll down to select Top-Up Now and press the OK key.
7. You are now topped up. Press the End key to exit.

## Top-Up with a debit card, credit card, or PayPal account

Before you can Top-Up from your phone with a debit card, credit card, or PayPal account, you need to register the card or PayPal account at www.virginmobileusa.com.

1. From the main screen, select Menu > My Account.
2. Scroll down to the Top-Up link and press the OK key.
3. Enter your Account Pin (vKey) and press the OK key.
4. Scroll down to select Login and press the OK key.
5. Scroll down and select Credit Card or PayPal.
6. Enter the amount you want to Top-Up and press the $\mathbf{O K}$ key. You can Top-Up in amounts of $\$ 20, \$ 30, \$ 50$, or $\$ 90$.
7. Scroll down to select Top-Up Now and press the OK key.

9. You are now topped up. Press the End key to exit.

The My ringtones folder stores your preloaded and downloaded ringtones. You can download ringtones to your phone from the Virgin Mobile Web site at www.virginmobileusa.com or directly from your phone using VirginXL. Select Menu > My stuff $>$ My ringtones $>$ Get more ringtones. Charges apply.

## Downloading ringtones

Before downloading, make sure you have enough money in your account; otherwise you can Top-Up your account.

1. At the main screen, scroll left to launch VirginXL and then search for ringtones.
2. Follow the prompts to purchase and download the selected ringtone.
The downloaded ringtones are stored in the
Menu $>$ My stuff $>$ My ringtones folder in your phone.

## Assigning downloaded ringtones

## 1. Select Menu $>$ My stuff $>$ My ringtones.

2. Select a downloaded ringtone and Set as....

Note: The downloaded ringtone is also listed in the Ringtones folder and available to assign to individual contacts or as the Personal or Business ringer. See "Add contact from main screen" on page 30 and "Assign message alert to contacts" on page 34 .

## My games

You can download games to your phone from the Virgin Mobile Web site at www.virginmobileusa.com or directly from your phone using VirginXL. Select Menu $>$ My stuff $>$ My games $>$ Get more games. Charges apply.
Note: If you don't have enough money in your account, you need to Top-Up before downloading.

1. At the main screen, scroll left to launch VirginXL and then search for games.
2. Follow the prompts to purchase and download the selected games.
The downloaded games are stored in the Menu > My stuff > My games folder in your phone.

## My graphics

You can download wallpapers and screensavers to your phone from the Virgin Mobile Web site at www.virginmobileusa.com or directly from your phone using VirginXL. Select Menu > My stuff > My graphics $>$ Get more graphics. Charges apply. Note: If you don't have enough money in your account, you need to Top-Up before downloading.

1. At the main screen, scroll left to launch VirginXL and then search for graphics.
2. Follow the prompts to purchase and download the selected graphic.
The downloaded graphics are stored in the Menu > My stuff > My graphics folder in your phone.
Note: You can assign downloaded graphics as either screensavers or wallpapers.
To assign downloaded graphics:
3. At the main screen, select Menu $>\mathbf{M y}$ stuff $>$ My graphics.
4. Select My pictures, VirginXL graphics, Wallpapers, Screensavers or Caller IDs, and then $\mathbf{O K}$.
5. Scroll to the graphic you want to assign and select Options.
6. Select Assign or Set default, and press the OK key.

## My other stuff

You can download other stuff to your phone from the Virgin Mobile Web site at www.virginmobileusa.com or directly from your phone using VirginXL. Select Menu $>$ My stuff $>$ My other stuff $>$ Get more stuff. Charges apply. Note: If you don't have enough money in your account, you need to Top-Up before downloading.

1. At the main screen, scroll left to launch VirginXL and then search for applications.
2. Follow the prompts to purchase and download the selected application.
The downloaded applications are stored in the Menu $>$ My stuff $>$ My other stuff folder in your phone.

## My sounds

You can record and save voice memos and all received, attached sound files to My sounds. To listen to saved sounds or recorded voice memos:

1. At the main screen, select Menu $>\mathbf{M y}$ stuff $>$ My sounds.
2. Select Saved sounds or Voice memos and then $\mathbf{O K}$.
3. Highlight a sound and select Options.
4. Highlight Record new, Erase, Lock/Unlock, Rename, Details, or Erase all and press the OK key.

## 10 Recent calls

## Call lists

Details on the last 60 calls you made, received, or missed are stored in the Recent Calls list and are identified by the following icons:


Outgoing call

Missed call (flashing)

## View recent calls

1. Select Menu > Recent calls and one of the following:

- All calls displays all calls made or received.
- Incoming calls displays calls answered.
- Outgoing calls displays calls made.
- Missed calls displays calls received, but not answered.

2. Highlight a recent call.
3. Press the Send key to call the number or select Options and one of the following:

- Save creates a new contact or View displays the contact's detail screen.
- Send text msg sends a text message to the number.
- Send picture msg sends a picture message to the number.
- Erase record deletes the call from the call list.

Note: If the phone number is classified as
"secret," you must enter your four-digit lock code to access it.

## Missed calls

When you have missed a call, "Missed Call" appears on your screen unless the caller leaves a voicemail. You can do one of the following:

- To clear the screen, select $\mathbf{0 K}$.
- To view the call details, select Calls and press the OK key.
- To return the call, select Calls and press the Send key.


## Set alert for missed calls

You can set an alert to beep every five minutes after you have missed a call. Select Menu > Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Alerts $>$ Missed call alert and select a ringtone from the list. (Scroll through the list to hear the different ringtones.)

## Erase call lists

You can erase your phone's call lists.

1. Select Menu $>$ Recent calls $>$

Erase call lists > All calls, Incoming calls, Outgoing calls, or Missed calls.
2. Select Yes.

## Call timers

You can track the number and duration of calls made and received on your phone. Select Menu > Recent calls and one of the following:

- Recent calls timer tracks all calls you have made and received since you last reset this timer. To reset this timer to zero, select Reset.
- All calls timer tracks all calls you have made and received. You cannot reset this timer.


## 11 Pictures

The following are some tips for you to operate your phone's camera:

- You cannot activate the camera while on an active call or while browsing files in the media gallery.
- Once the camera is active, the main screen acts as the viewfinder.
- If you get a "Low memory" error, check your resolution and quality compression settings.
- If there is no activity within 45 seconds after you turn your camera on, the camera quits and returns to the previous launch point.
- Menu settings and options can only be accessed when the camera is active.


## Taking a picture

To take a picture:

1. Activate the camera in one of the
following ways:

- Press the Camera key until the camera screen appears.
- Select Menu > Pictures > Take a picture.

2. Focus on the image using the phone's display as a viewfinder.
3. Take a picture in one of the following ways:

- Press the OK key.
- Press the Camera key.


## - Select Capture.

4. The picture is saved to the My pictures folder.
5. Select Send to create a picture message or Erase to delete the picture from your phone.
6. Press the End key to exit picture mode.

## Picture mode options

You can set up how your camera takes pictures. While in picture mode, select Options and one of the following:

- Settings displays the following camera settings you may set up prior to taking a picture:
- Flash sets the camera flash as Automatic, On, or Off.
- Resolution sets the horizontal and vertical number of pixels for the picture.
- Low light mode brightens the picture for low light environments.
- Self timer sets up a countdown timer to automatically take a picture when the timer expires. When set, the camera beeps from 3 seconds down to the time the shutter automatically snaps the picture (unavailable for Multishot mode).
- Multishot takes up to six multiple pictures with the Camera key pressed and held. A tone plays each time a picture is taken. A second tone plays when the final picture is taken.
- Shutter sound sets the sound used when the camera takes a picture.
- White balance adjusts the camera for different lighting.
- Color tone sets the color tone of the picture.
- Picture quality sets the picture compression. The higher the compression, the better the detail of the picture (higher pixel rate). When set to High, the picture file size is larger, using more memory.
- LED flashes the indicator light when taking a picture.
- Viewfinder display sets the camera viewfinder as Fullscreen or Actual.
- Brightness adjusts the brightness of the image in the main screen LCD.
- My pictures displays all pictures taken and stored.
- Last picture displays the most recently taken picture.
- Frames adds a frame or a stamp to your picture. A frame or stamp cannot be removed once it has been used in a picture. The picture resolution changes to $\mathbf{1 2 0} \times 160$ (with the number keypad) or $\mathbf{1 6 0 x 1 2 0}$ (with the QWERTY keypad) while taking pictures with Frames enabled. The resolution returns to the original setting with Frames disabled.
Note: The following settings revert to the default setting each time you enter and exit the camera application: Low light mode, Self timer, Multishot, and Viewfinder display.


## Picture mode indicators and icons

The camera may display the following on screen indicators and icons.
Note: Numbers in the top right corner indicate the number of snapshot remaining. Numbers in the bottom left corner indicate the resolution setting for pictures.


Flash is on.
Camera is in picture mode.
Multishot feature is on.
Self-timer feature is on

## Bluetooth

The Bluetooth ${ }^{\circledR}$ wireless technology on your phone enables wireless connectivity with headsets. You must use a Bluetooth wireless technology device (compatible with Class 2 Bluetooth wireless technology, version 1.2) in order to use this phone wirelessly. Bluetooth wireless technology accessories have the $\boldsymbol{*}$ symbol. For additional information on carriersupported profiles and third-party accessory compatibility for Bluetooth wireless technology, visit www.kyocera-wireless.com/support.

## Turning Bluetooth on

You must turn on your phone's Bluetooth feature to use it with Bluetooth wireless technology headsets. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Bluetooth $>$ On/Off and one of the following:

- On Visible allows other headsets to find your phone.
- On Invisible hides your phone for all headsets except those listed in your My devices.
- Off prohibits your phone from being used with any Bluetooth wireless technology headset. To prolong battery life, it is recommended to set Bluetooth to Off when you are not using it.

When you turn Bluetooth On the first time, you are prompted to do a device search. Then you can pair with a headset.

## Pairing

You must first "pair" your phone with the Bluetooth wireless technology enabled headset to allow your phone to communicate with it. Refer to the following instructions for setting up Bluetooth wireless technology in conjunction with the user guide provided with your Bluetooth wireless technology headset.

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Bluetooth $>$ On/Off $>$ On Visible or On Invisible.
2. Prepare the Bluetooth wireless technology headset (Bluetooth accessory) for pairing as described in the other headset's user guide.
3. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Bluetooth $>$ My devices > Find new. Your phone then searches and detects visible Bluetooth wireless technology enabled headsets in the vicinity.
4. With headsets found, select Add to see the list.
5. Highlight your desired headset and select Add.
Note: When pairing is initiated from another Bluetooth wireless technology headset, you are prompted to accept or reject the pairing.
6. If necessary, enter the password provided in the Bluetooth wireless technology headset's user guide and select $\mathbf{O K}$.

Your phone waits for the headset's response. With the password accepted, the headset shows in My devices.

## Using Bluetooth

Before you can use the Bluetooth wireless technology functions of your phone, you must get your phone ready to communicate with a headset. This is called "connecting."

## Connecting to a headset

To connect your phone to an audio Bluetooth wireless technology headset:

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Bluetooth $>$ My devices.
2. At the device list, highlight a headset and select Connect.
A notification appears confirming the connection.
You can now use the headset with your phone.

## Disconnecting from a headset

To disconnect your phone from an audio Bluetooth wireless technology headset:

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Bluetooth $>$ My devices.
2. At the device list, highlight a headset and select Disconnect.

## Device list options

You can change or review the information about each headset you paired with your phone.

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Bluetooth $>$ My devices.
2. Highlight your desired headset.
3. Select Options and one of the following:

- Rename to rename the headset.
- Delete to remove the headset from your phone if you are no longer going to use it.
- Services to view a description of the headset.


## Bluetooth settings

You can set how your phone interacts with Bluetooth wireless technology devices. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Bluetooth $>$ Settings and one of the following:

- My name changes the name of your phone for other devices it is paired with to identify.
- Visible duration sets the time your phone remains visible to other devices.
- Services shows the list of the Bluetooth wireless technology service protocol supported by your phone.


## Keyguard

## Lock the keyguard

The keyguard locks the external number keypad on your phone to prevent accidental keypresses when the phone is turned on and a call is not in progress. You can still answer or silence an incoming call.

- To lock the keypad, press and hold the * Shift key.
- To unlock the keypad, select Keyguard and press the $\mathbf{0 K}$ key.


## Set the keyguard

You can set the phone to lock the keypad automatically when the flip is closed. Select Menu > Settings > Keyguard $>$ Guard on close to activate the keyguard everytime the flip is closed.

## Sounds

Your phone has several settings for sound control. You can select from a variety of ringtones and control the volume.

## Volume

## Ringtone, Key, Earpiece, and Speakerphone Volume

To adjust the ringtone, keypad tone, earpiece, or speakerphone volume:

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Ringtone volume, Key volume, Earpiece volume, or Spkrphone volume.
2. Scroll right to increase the volume, or left to decrease the volume.
3. Select Save.

## Smart volume

To automatically adjust the volume during a call based on surrounding noise levels, select Menu > Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Smart volume $>$ Enabled.

## Ringtones

Your phone has multiple ringtones you can choose for incoming calls. You can also assign ringtones for contacts in your business or personal group. Select Menu > Settings > Sounds $>$ Ringtones, Business ringtones, or Personal ringtones and a ringtone. You can hear the ringtones as you scroll down the list.

## Flip Sounds

To set your phone's sound tones when its flip closes or opens, select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Flip closed or Flip open and a sound. You can hear the sounds as you scroll down the list.

## Power on/off sound

You can set your phone to play a sound when it powers on or off. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$
Sounds $>$ Power on/off sound $>$ Enabled.

## Key length

To control the length of the keypad tones, select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Key length and one of the following:

- Normal sets the keypad tones to normal length.
- Long sets the keypad tones to long length.


## Alerts

## Minute alert

Your phone can alert you with a short beep ten seconds before each minute passes during a call.
Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$
Minute alert > Enabled.

## Other alerts

You can choose the alert type for voicemails, pages, text messages or missed calls. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Alerts $>$ Msg alert, Page alert, Voicemail alert, or Missed call alert and a ringtone. Scroll through the list to hear the different ringtones. You can also select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Alerts $>$ Reminder $>$ On to set the phone to notify you with the selected ringtone every five minutes until you address the alert.

## Display

## Greeting banner

The banner is the personal label for your phone. It appears on the main screen above the time and date. The banner can be up to 14 characters long. To change your banner:

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Display $>$ Greeting banner.
2. Select Edit and press the Back key to clear the current banner.
3. Enter your new text and select Save.

## Menu style

To select a menu style, select Menu > Settings > Display $>$ Menu style and one of the following:

- Graphic displays icons of each menu item, with its name at the bottom of the screen.
- List displays a list of each menu item.

The next time you select Menu from the main screen, your selected menu style appears.

## Wallpapers

You can select a wallpaper for your phone's main screen.

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Display $>$ Wallpapers.
2. Select one of the following options:

- Scroll to highlight a wallpaper, press the OK key, and select Assign to select a wallpaper.
- Select Options > Take a picture to take a new picture.
- Select Options > My pictures to select an existing picture.
- Select Options $>$ My graphics to select an existing image.

3. Follow the prompts to save your selection.

## Screensavers

Screen savers appear on the main screen when the flip is open or closed. A screen saver activates 10 seconds after the last keypress. Incoming calls and alerts override the screen savers. See "Wallpapers" on page 50.

## Backlight

Your screen lights up while you are in a call or when you press a key on the keypad. The backlight automatically turns off when the phone is inactive.

## Backlight duration

You can set the length of time that bright backlighting remains on. Select Menu >
Settings $>$ Display $>$ Backlight $>$ Duration and one of the following:

- Disabled turns backlighting off.
- $\mathbf{7}$ seconds, 15 seconds, or $\mathbf{3 0}$ seconds turns backlighting on for the set time after your last keypress.
- $7 \mathrm{sec} . \&$ in call, 15 sec \& in call, or $\mathbf{3 0} \mathbf{~ s e c}$. \& in call turns backlighting on for the duration of a call, and for the set time after your last keypress.
Note: The "in call" settings drain the battery more quickly.


## Power save mode

You can conserve battery life by activating power save mode to dim the backlight. The power save mode sets the backlight of the phone to the lowest level. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Display $>$ Backlight $>$ Pwr save mode $>$ On.

## Auto-hyphen

Auto-hyphenation, when enabled, automatically inserts hyphens into your phone numbers to be consistent with the U.S. dialing plan, such as 1-222-333-4444. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Display > Auto-hyphen > Enabled.

## Time and date format

Your phone can display different time/date formats. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Display $>$ Time/Date format and a format.

## Brightness

To change the brightness of the display:

## 1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Display $>$ Brightness.

2. Scroll to change the brightness.
3. Select Save.

## Convenience

You phone provides you with settings that may make your phone more convenient to use.

## Open to answer

You can open the flip of your phone to answer a call. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Convenience $>$ Open to answer $>$ Enabled.

## Fast find

To use fast find, select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Convenience $>$ Fast find $>$ Enabled.
With Fast find enabled, you can press one or two keys to view close matches of the number you are looking for.

1. With the number keypad, from the main screen, press the keys corresponding to the letters of the name you want to find. a matching contact or speed dial entry appears.
2. Highlight the contact you want and press the Call key to call the number.

## Frequent list

To use frequent list, select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Convenience $>$ Frequent list $>$ Enabled.
From the main screen, select Contacts. With the Frequent list enabled, the last 15 contacts of your most frequently called contacts appear. Scroll past the double line to view the entire contacts list.

## Hold call

With the Hold call feature, you can place incoming calls on hold until you are ready to answer them.
Note: The Hold call feature does not work with the Open to answer feature enabled. See "Open to answer" on page 51.

## Enable hold call feature

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Convenience $>$

Hold call and one of the following:

- Disabled turns hold call off.
- Enabled turns hold call on.
- Re-record msg records a new hold call message.

2. With no hold message recorded, the phone prompts you to record one, such as "Please hold. I'll answer in a minute."
3. Record the message twice, as prompted.
4. Select Save to save the message or Options and one of the following:

- Play to replay your message.
- Re-record to record your message again.
- Exit to exit.

The next time a call comes in, you can place it on hold.

## Place a call on hold

You can place a call on hold once you have enabled the Hold call feature.

Note: If you are already on a call and you receive another call, you cannot place the incoming call on hold. With no call waiting enabled, the call goes to voicemail instead.
When a call comes in:

1. Select Hold call. The caller is placed on hold and then hear your recorded hold message.
2. Select Answer to speak to the caller on hold or End call to hang up without speaking.

## Change the hold message

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Convenience $>$ Hold call $>$ Re-record msg.
2. Record the message twice, as prompted.
3. Select Save to save the message or Options and one of the following:

- Play to replay your message.
- Re-record to record your message again.
- Exit to exit.


## 1-Touch dialing

The 1 -touch dialing feature is the fastest way to speed dial a contact that has a speed dial location. To use 1-touch dialing, you must enable 1-touch dialing on your phone and have a speed dial location assigned to a contact. To enable 1-touch dialing, select Menu $>$ Settings $>$
Convenience $>$ 1-Touch dialing $>$ Enabled. To
call a contact that has a speed dial location, press and hold the speed dialing number.

Note: If it is a two-digit number, press the first digit briefly, then press and hold the second digit. For example, if the speed dialing location is 15 , press 1 briefly, then press and hold 5 .

## Any key

To set the phone to answer or silence calls when you press any key, select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Convenience > Any key > Any key answer (to answer calls with any key except the End, Back, or Navigation key) or Any key mute (to mute the ringtone on incoming calls with any key except the Send or Speakerphone key).

## Call options

Use Call options to customize the voice commands.

## Add voice dial

You can add a new voice dial to your phone.

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Call options $>$ Add voice dial.
2. At the voice prompt, say a name.
3. At the voice prompt, repeat the name.
4. Select one of the following:

- Add New creates a new contact.
- Add to existing adds the voice tag to an existing contact.


## Erase voice dial

You can erase all existing voice dial tags from your phone. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Call options > Erase voice dial > Yes.

## Voice training

If you phone is having trouble recognizing your voice, you can train with the Yes, No, and Wake up commands. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Call options $>$ Voice training $>\mathbf{O K}>$ Train All or the item you want to train. Follow the prompts for each word until training is complete.

## Voice wake-up

You can set your phone to make a call using a hands-free accessory.
Note: Voice wake-up does not work with keyguard active.

## Enable voice wake-up

Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Call options $>$
Voice wake-up $>$ With accessory to enable calls with an accessory.

## Use voice wake-up

To wake up the phone:

1. Say "Wake Up" and listen for a tone.
2. Say "Wake Up" again until you hear two tones.
If the phone does not recognize your Wake Up command, see "Voice training" on page 53.

## Voice answer

You can set your phone to answer a call automatically when using a hands-free headset.

## Enable voice answer

Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Call options $>$
Voice answer > Enabled to enable answering a call with an accessory. To use the Voice answer feature, you must have the Auto-answer feature (see "Auto-answer" on page 56) disabled and the phone set to Normal Sounds.

## Use voice answer

When you receive an incoming call, the phone prompts "Incoming call, answer?" or "Incoming roam call, answer?" If the caller is recognized as a contact entry in your phone, the phone prompts "Incoming call from (Name), answer?"
Say "Yes" or press any key except the End key to answer. Say "No" and press the End key to silence the alert. Remain silent. The voice alert repeats twice and the phone rings once, then returns to the main screen.

## Expert mode

With the expert mode enabled, instead of speaking a command following the initial voice prompts, you can speak the command after you hear a tone.
Select Menu > Settings $>$ Call options $>$ Expert mode and one of the following:

- Normal sets phone to default voice prompts.
- Expert sets phone to sound tones instead of voice prompts.


## Auto-answer

With a hands-free headset attached, you can set your phone to answer automatically. Select
Menu > Settings > Call options >
Auto-answer $>$ After $\mathbf{5}$ seconds to set the phone to automatically answer after 5 seconds.

## Messaging

Messaging settings help configure your phones text and picture message settings.
See "Message settings" on page 28.

## Camera

You can set up how your camera takes pictures. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Camera and one of the following:

- Resolution sets the horizontal and vertical number of pixels for the picture.
- Picture quality sets the picture compression. The higher the compression, the better the detail of the picture (higher pixel rate). When set to High, the picture file size is larger, using more memory.
- Shutter sound sets the sound used when the camera takes a picture.
- Viewfinder display sets the camera viewfinder as Fullscreen or Actual.


## Security

This section describes all the features involved in securing your phone and preventing access to personal information. All security features are shielded by a four-digit lock code.

## Lock phone

When your phone is locked, you can call only emergency numbers or Virgin Mobile's customer service number. You can still receive incoming calls.

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Security.
2. Enter your four-digit lock code.
3. Select Lock phone and one of the following:

- Never leaves the phone always unlocked.
- On power up locks the phone every time you turn it on.
- Now locks the phone immediately.

To unlock the phone:

1. From the main screen, select Unlock.
2. Enter your four-digit lock code.

## Change lock code

Change your lock code from the default provided by the service provider. The lock code is typically 0000 or the last 4 digits of your phone number.
5. Re-enter your new lock code.

The lock is now changed.

## Emergency numbers

The emergency numbers feature allows you to specify three personal phone numbers that can be called when the phone is locked.

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Security.
2. Enter your four-digit lock code.
3. Select Emergency numbers.
4. Select an Unassigned slot.
5. Enter the phone number, including the area code. Do not enter 1 before the area code.
6. Select Done.

You can view these numbers only when they're being entered for the first time. To make a call to an emergency number from a locked phone, you must dial the number (including area code) exactly as it is stored in Emergency numbers.

## Erase contacts

You can erase all entries from your contacts list.

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Security.
2. Enter your four-digit lock code.
3. Select Erase contacts $>$ Yes $>$ Yes.
4. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Security.
5. Enter your four-digit lock code.
6. Select Change lock code $>$ Yes.
7. Enter a new four-digit code.

## Network

## Privacy alert

To set your phone to alert you when enhanced digital CDMA privacy is lost or regained, select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Network $>$ Privacy alert $>$ Enabled.

## Location

Use this setting to share your location information with network services other than emergency services (for example, 911, 111, 999 and 000) in markets where service has been implemented. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Network $>$ Location and one of the following:

- 911 only (default) shares your position information only with emergency services when you call your 3-digit emergency code.
- Location on shares your position information, in addition to emergency services.
Note: This feature works only when your phone is in digital mode. You cannot turn off the locator to emergency services.


## Accessories

This section describes settings that affect the accessories you use with your phone.

## Headset sound

With a headset attached to your phone, the ringtone can be played through the headset or phone speaker. Select Menu > Settings > Accessories $>$ Headset sound and one of the following:

- Out of phone rings from the phone speaker.
- Out of headset rings from the headset.


## Auto-answer

With a hands-free headset attached, you can set your phone to answer automatically. Select
Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Accessories >
Auto-answer $>$ After 5 seconds to set the phone to automatically answer after 5 seconds.

## Power backlighting

You can set backlighting to remain on when an external power source, such as the AC adapter, is used with the phone.
Note: Power backlighting may not be available with the optional desktop charger or other accessories. The battery charges more slowly with power backlighting on.
Select Menu > Settings > Accessories > Pwr backlighting $>$ Normal or Always on.

Tip: Use the power backlighting as a night light when traveling.

## TTY device

You can connect the phone to a TTY device for the hearing impaired.
Note: Enable TTY device only when using the phone with a TTY device.

1. Connect the TTY device to the phone.
2. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Accessories $>$ TTY device (or enter \#\#889 from the main screen and select TTY) $>\mathbf{O K}>$ TTY on.

## Hearing aid

You can use your phone with a hearing aid device.
Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Accessories $>$
Hearing aid $>\mathbf{O K}>$ Enabled.
Note: Enable Hearing aid only when using the phone with a hearing aid device.

## Phone information

You can access information regarding your phone. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Phone info and one of the following:

- Build info shows specific software and hardware information for your phone.
- Icon keys shows the icons used by your phone.


## 13 Tools

## Voice memo

The Voice memo tool enables you to record and play back audio memos.

## Record voice memos

To record new voice memos:

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Voice memo $>$ Record new.
2. Record your voice memo. Select Stop when you are done.
3. Select Save to save your memo.

If an incoming call is received while you are recording a memo, the memo is saved and the incoming call screen appears.

## Review voice memos

To play and use voice memos:

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Voice memo $>$ Recorded memos.
2. At the file list, highlight a file.
3. Select Play to listen to the memo or Options and one of the following:

- Record new to record a new voice memo.
- Erase to erase the memo.
- Lock to prevent accidental erasing of the sound.
- Rename to rename the sound.
- Details to look at details of the file.
- Erase all to erase all memos stored.


## Playback tools

When you playback a sound, scroll left or right to select the playback tools displayed on the screen.
(D) Start or continue the file.
(1) Stop the playback.
(0) Pause the playback.
(4) Mute the playback.
(19) Unmute the playback.

## Scheduler

Use the Scheduler to schedule events and set reminder alerts.

## Create an event

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Scheduler $>$ Add new event.
2. At the Event Name field, enter a name. Scroll down to move to the next field when done.
3. At the Type field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ and scroll through the list to select a type.
4. At the Date field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ to change the date.

- Scroll left or right to move between month, day, and year fields.
- Scroll up or down to change month, day, and year.
Press $\mathbf{O K}$ to save date and move to the next field.

5. At the Time field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ to change the time.

- Scroll left or right to move between hour, minute and AM/PM fields.
- Scroll up or down to change hour, minute and AM/PM.
Press $\mathbf{0 K}$ to save time and move to the next field.

6. At the Duration field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ to change the duration.

- Scroll left or right to move between hour and minute fields.
- Scroll up or down to change hour and minute.
Press OK to save duration and move to the next field.

7. At the Priority field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ and select a priority from the list.
8. At the Reminder field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ and select a reminder from the list.
9. At the Reminder Sound field, press OK and select a reminder sound from the list.
10. At the Silent Mode field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ and select a Silent mode setting.
11. At the Recurring Event field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ and select an option from the list.
12. Select Save.

## View events

You can view the events saved to the scheduler.

## View by date

1. Select Menu > Tools > Scheduler and one of the following:

- View month to see the current month. Days with events are highlighted. Scroll through the calendar and press OK to select a date.
- View day to see the current date. Scroll right or left to move to another date.
- Go to date to select a specific date. Scroll left or right to move between month, day, and year fields. Scroll up or down to change month, day, and year. Press OK to select the date.

2. At the day view, do one of the following:

- Highlight an existing event and press the $\mathbf{O K}$ key to view the event detail.
- Highlight a time and select Add new to create a new event.
- Select Options $>$ Go to today to return to the current date.
- Select Options $>$ Go to Date to select a specific date.
- Select Options > Erase all Events to erase all event for that date.


## View by list

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Scheduler $>$ View all events.
2. At the event list, highlight a event.
3. Select View to see the event detail or one the of the following:

- Select Options > Sort by time to sort events by time.
- Select Options > Sort by type to sort events by type.
- Select Options $>$ Sort by priority to sort events by priority.


## Modify an event

You can modify existing events. From the event detail screen, you can select $\mathbf{O K}$ to return to the previous screen or Options and one the following:

- Edit to change the event.
- Erase to erase the event.
- Copy to copy the event.


## Scheduler settings

You can change the default settings of your scheduler.
Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Scheduler $>$ Settings and one the following:

- Scheduler hours to change the work day.
- Auto delete to select when events are automatically deleted.
- Priority to select the priority given to new events.
- Reminder to select the reminder given to new events.
- Reminder sound to select the sound alert given to new event reminders.
- Silent mode to select whether phone is in Silent mode during the duration of new events.


## Alarm clock

You can set up to four alerts with your phone's three alarm clocks and one quick alarm.
Note: The alert occurs only if the phone is on.

## Use alarm clocks

1. Select Menu > Tools > Alarm clock.
2. Highlight one of the alarms and select Set.
3. At the Time field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ to change the time.

- Scroll left or right to move between hour, minute and AM/PM fields.
- Scroll up or down to change hour, minute and AM/PM.

Press $\mathbf{0 K}$ to save time and move to the next field.
4. At the Alarm Sound field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ and select a sound from the list.
5. At the Recurring Alarm field, press $\mathbf{O K}$ and select an option from the list.
6. At the Note field, enter a note and press $\mathbf{O K}$.
7. Select Save.

When the alarm rings, select Off to turn off the alarm or Snooze to silence the alarm for 10 minutes.
Tip: Opening the flip turns off the alarm.

## Use quick alarm

1. Select Menu > Tools > Alarm clock.
2. Highlight the quick alarm and select Set.
3. At the Time field, select a time option. A notification shows the quick alarm is on.
When the quick alarm rings, select Off to turn off the alarm or Reset to set the quick alarm again.

## Tip calculator

The Tip calculator helps you calculate how much tip to include with a bill.

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Tip calculator.
2. Enter the amount of your bill and select Next.
3. Select the percentage amount to tip. The new bill amount is shown.
4. Select Done to return to menu or Split to split the bill.
5. To split the bill, enter the number of guests and select Next. The phone shows the amount each guest pays. Select Done to return to menu.

## Calculator

Use the Calculator for basic mathematical equations.

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Calculator.
2. Enter the first number.
3. Use the Navigation key to select mathematical operation.

- Press left to multiply.
- Press right to divide.
- Press up to add.
- Press down to subtract.

4. Enter the second number and press $\mathbf{O K}$ to get the result.
5. Select Exit to return to menu or Options and one of the following:

- M+ adds the displayed result to the value stored in memory.
- MR displays the currently stored value on the screen.
- MC clears the currently stored value in memory.


## Timer

The Timer counts down for the specified time and beeps when that amount of time has elapsed.

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Timer $>$ Set.
2. At the Set Timer, enter the time length.

- Scroll left or right to move between hours, minutes and seconds fields.
- Scroll up or down to change hours, minutes and seconds.

3. If need, select Sound and one of the sounds to change the sound.
4. To work the timer, select the following options:

- Start to begin the countdown.
- Stop to pause the countdown.
- Reset to clear the timer.

When the countdown is complete select $\mathbf{0 f f}$ to silence the alarm.

## Stopwatch

The Stopwatch counts time for you.

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Stopwatch.
2. To work the stopwatch, select the following options:

- Start to begin counting.
- Stop to pause counting.
- Reset to clear the stopwatch.

Press the Back key to return to the menu.

## Flashlight

You phone comes with a flashlight. Select Menu > Tools $>$ Flashlight $>$ Turn on to activate the light, which stays on until you turn it off.
Note: You can also press and hold the Back key to turn on the flashlight. Once you release the Back key, the flashlight turns off.

## 14 Voice recognition

With voice features, you can call a contact, dial a phone number, access menus, or find contact information from your voice dial list using voice recognition.
Note: You cannot use voice recognition to end a call; you must press the End key when the flip is open.

## Voice dial list

To call or find a contact using voice dial you must add the contact to your voice dial list. The contact name must not have more than three words or components for voice dialing recognition.

## Add a voice tag

You can add a voice dial tag to your phone. See "Add voice dial" on page 53.

## Edit a voice tag

To edit existing voice dial tags;

1. Select Menu $>$ Contacts $>$ Voice dial list.
2. Select your desired contact.
3. Highlight the number with a voice tag and select Options > Add voice dial, Edit voice dial or Erase voice dial.
4. Follow the prompts.

## Voice commands

With voice commands, you speak your commands into the phone's microphone.

## Start voice commands

1. Press the Call key to initiate voice commands. The phone prompts, "Say a name or say dial".
2. Say one of the following commands and follow the voice prompts.

- "Say a name" to call a contact on your voice dial list.
- "Dial" to speak the digits of the phone number.

3. Press the Call key again to exit and go to the Recent calls list.

## Call a contact

Before calling a person, you need to add the contact name to the Voice dial list.
See "Add voice dial" on page 53.

1. From the main screen, press the Call key. The phone prompts, "Say a name".
2. Say the name of the person you want to call.
3. If the name you said matches a contact in the Voice dial list, the phone responds: "Calling (Name)." Remain silent to make the call, or say "No" to cancel.
4. If the phone finds multiple voice tags that sound like the name you said, the phone lists the names and asks you to verify which name you want to call. Say "Yes" when you hear the correct name. Say "No" when you hear an incorrect name.
5. Press the End key to end the call.

## Call Using Digit Dial

When using digit dialing, you speak digits to dial a phone number.
Note: You cannot speak a string of digits.
You must speak one digit at a time and wait for the prompt.

1. From the main screen, press the Call key. The phone prompts, "Say a name or say dial".
2. Say "Dial". The phone responds "Speak a digit".
3. Speak the first digit of the phone number you want to call. Once the phone repeats the digit, you can speak the next digit.
If you pause, the phone prompts you with one of the following options. After the prompt, speak an option:

- Say "Clear" to erase the last digit entered. The phone responds: "Digit cleared." To clear the entire phone number, say "Clear" again. When the phone prompts you with "Clear entire phone number?", say "Yes" to clear or "No" to cancel.
- Say "Call" to dial the number.
- Say "Verify" to cause phone to repeat the set of digits you input.
- Say "Cancel" to exit voice recognizer and return to the main screen.
- Speak a digit to enter the next digit. Once the phone repeats the digit, you can speak the next digit or pause to hear the prompt.

4. Press the End key to end the call.

## Voice Command Settings

To customize the voice commands, see "Call options" on page 53.

## 16 Consumer Limited Warranty
